Group frets over voter suppression

Director says voter fraud accusations so far unproven

During a visit to Las Cruces, the head of the state Common Cause organization said he's concerned that accusations about voter fraud and efforts to require photo ID for voting may end up discouraging people from voting.

Steven Allen, executive director of New Mexico Common Cause, said Tuesday, July 26, he's especially bothered that New Mexico Secretary of State Dianna Duran has made voter fraud such as huge issue.

On Wednesday, July 20, the state American Civil Liberties Union sued Duran, claiming she violated the open records law by withholding information about alleged wrongdoing by voters.

At a legislative committee hearing in March, Duran said she had evidence that 37 voters in the last election were not U.S. citizens. The ACLU requested Duran make that evidence public, but the documents she released were so censored they were essentially useless.

Allen, who said he was at the committee hearing when Duran made her claim, said he and state lawmakers have seen the pattern before from Republicans claiming voter fraud. Lawmakers have even held committee hearings to see evidence about voter fraud accusations, but those making the claims never showed, he said.

Allen said Duran also has been unclear about the records of 64,000 registered voters she turned over to state police for further investigation. Duran said the voters in question were found when voter rolls didn't match names, dates of birth and Social Security numbers on file.

Those kinds of questions have been raised before, most notably in Doña Ana County, in which an investigation showed many of the discrepancies were simply minor clerical errors – a slightly wrong birth date entered on the computer – or cases of mistaken identity – names can often be repeated in traditional New See **Voters** on page A11

WWII trials recalled Gen. Eisenhower awarded Silver Star to Hatch man

Like many World War II veterans, 87-year-old Florentino Castillo hasn't talked much about his war experiences. More than 60 years after he entered battle, the memories are still hard for him to describe.

But Castillo's family want his story to be known as the Silver Star veterans now wages another silent battle, this time with lung cancer. Born in Texas and raised in New Mexico, Castillo was 18 when drafted in to the Army in 1942.

As a member of an artillery platoon, he wasn't among those who had to secure the beach in Normandy, France, but he arrived soon after as part of the 150,000 Allied soldiers who took part in the early June 1944 invasion. In one of the few times he's talked about the war, Castillo told his children about seeing bodies

Food bank grows under new owner Distribution exceeding expectations

Editor's Note: This is first in a series of stories about Roadrunner Food Bank programs for southern New Mexico.

In the first six months since Roadrunner Food Bank of New Mexico took on food distribution for the region, it has distributed almost 2 million pounds of food to nonprofits and food pantries in southern New Mexico.

"That was our goal for the year and we met it in half a year," said Roadrunner's southern New Mexico representative Nancy Barnes-Smith.

Headquartered in Albuquerque, Roadrunner took on the area food bank operations from the Community Action Agency of Southern New Mexico at the start of the year. One of Roadrunner's first action was to find expanded See **Food Bank** on page A10



Still competing

Las Cruces has been invaded by nearly a thousand athletes, ages 50-plus, to compete in state Olympics

For the fifth consecutive year, Las Cruces and New Mexico State University are hosting the New Mexico Senior Olympics Summer Games. This year, 917 men and women from across New Mexico have qualified through regional and county competitions to participate in the statewide games in 28 different sports.

After a year of preparation, the 2011 edition of the summer games commenced on the NMSU campus Wednesday evening, July 27, with an impressive and colorful opening ceremony, featuring participants from 29 New Mexico counties.

Three special presentations were made as the games began. Charles Martin, 95, from Roswell in Chaves County was identified as the "Eldest Athlete" in the competition.

Amelia Davis, 84, a Las Cruces resident, was presented with a personalized satin jacket as she was named "Golden Athlete" for her participation as an athlete and volunteer over the past 31 years. Davis has competed in the state competition for the past 31 years in 11 different events. She has also attended the national senior games five times since 1987.

Another Las Crucen, Marian Wolle, was honored with the New Mexico Senior Olympics Courage Award, a recognition given to an individual who has competed in the games despite a physical or mental handicap. A breast cancer survivor since 1984, Wolle currently competes in the 80 to 84 age category in swimming, and has been among the most prolific gold-medal winners in the state games over the past 20 years.

The opening ceremonies were followed Wednesday evening with a meet-and-greet social event featuring popular singer and Grammy Award-winner Vikki Carr.

Friday's schedule includes a health fair from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on the second floor of the NMSU Corbett Center Student Union. Each hour will feature a demonstration in which athletes and guests will be invited to participate. At 4 p.m., the fair will close as NMSO will hold a prize drawing for a 32-inch television.

The games actually began early Wednesday morning with competition in air gun, bowling, cycling, 8-ball pool, horseshoes, pickleball, race walk, shuffleboard, tennis and run/walk. Thursday and Friday competitions featured basketball shooting (free throw and 3-point shooting), field events (pole vault, long jump, shot put, discus, high jump and javelin), golf, racquetball, Frisbee (distance and accuracy), soccer accuracy, softball throw, road race and swimming. The competition will end Saturday with track, huachas, archery, badminton, bowling and the always-popular talent show.

Thanks to all the sponsors who have supported the summer games here in Las Cruces. Major contributors this year were Humana, the City of Las Cruces (Parks and Recreation and Senior Programs), New Mexico Aging and Long-term Services Department, Stryker, Caliente Designs, T-Mobile, MountainView Regional Medical Center, Las Cruces Bulletin and Concilio CDS Inc.

The New Mexico Senior Olympics Summer Games will be held in Las Cruces again next year during the state's centennial celebration. Individuals who desire to participate in next year's state games must meet two criteria. Competitors must be 50 years of age or older in 2012 and they must participate and qualify through new local or regional games that are typically held in the spring.

I am already shopping for my new badminton racquet and visiting the gym daily to sharpen my free-throw shooting in preparation for our state's centennial senior competition.

Who knows? I may even give a shot at pickleball.

An attack on creation

Are House Republicans mad at God, too? You would think so, based on the number of attacks against creation packed into the appropriations bill for FY 2012.

It is larded up with attacks on the environment. More than just funding cuts, these are targeted efforts to dismantle the framework of laws that has been the bedrock of environmental protections in this country for decades. They are nothing more than gifts to the oil companies, agribusiness, big developers and corporate polluters determined to remove all obstacles to making a profit.

One of the bill's provisions is the most sweeping attempt in recent history to gut the Endangered Species Act (ESA) – our most important tool for preventing the extinction of species and the unraveling of creation.

Since its passage the ESA has saved hundreds of plants and animals from becoming extinct, including bald eagles, alligators and grizzly bears. The law benefits humans by protecting natural habitats upon which species depend, which in turn provide us with clean water, fertile soils, clean air and other essential services.

The Extinction Rider would eliminate crucial protections for hundreds of species in trouble. It would prevent the Fish and Wildlife Service from spending any money on listing new species under the ESA, or designating critical habitat, or upgrading a species from threatened to endangered. Tellingly, it does allow the service to spend money on weakening protections for wildlife by removing them from the ESA

Other provisions in the bill would weaken the Clean Water Act, roll back protections for bighorn sheep, end a moratorium on uranium mining near the Grand Canyon, and more. To see the full list, visit www.wildmesquite. org. Barring divine intervention, the bill will soon pass the House and move to the Senate, where it will hopefully die a well-deserved death.

Pet owners making progress

ACTion Programs for Animals (APA) would like to thank the community for working to become more humane and responsible with their companion animals. Too often, we only hear about the irresponsible people causing our ani-mal issues, but we don't hear too much about those working to do the right thing, which we feel is a far greater number.

Because so many people are learning about access to af-fordable spays, neuters and vaccinations, our low-income spay/neuter program (SNAP) and local veterinarians are struggling to meet the current demand for their services and our animal shelter's low-cost spay/neuter program is booked two months in advance.

Because of a wide variety of vaccination clinics held throughout the year by our organization and others and because the mobile Mesquite Animal Vaccination Clinic covers the south part of our county and Las Cruces with

weekly access to affordable vaccinations, hundreds of ani-mals per month are getting their rabies and other shots. In Radium Springs on Saturday, July 16, we had to turn some people away from our first low-cost clinic at the Blue Moon Bar. Veterinarian Dr. Laura Henckel administered 143 rabies vaccinations and more than 100 cat and dog combo shots that day. We plan to be back there Saturday, Aug. 20, to reach the families we missed.

This progress is an important foundation toward our community's no-kill goal.

The Billy the Kid manhunt is on. Go to any county in the state to find some of Billy's loot. At many of these locations, clues to Billy's whereabouts also can be obtained.

The state Tourism Department's summer travel promotion is a state-of-the-art project. It helps to be technologically literate. Fortunately, our children and grandchildren are.

While Jeanette is busy rehabilitating from hip and femur surgery, the family is headed to Santa Fe to be with Mom. And on the way, they are stopping at all the places to find loot and clues.

The posse coming in from the north encountered some kinks in the system while amassing their loot. The game works best if you have a smart phone, on which you have down loaded the Billy the Kid app.

But in north central New Mexico, our daughter's posse members discovered their smart phone didn't have reception so they didn't know how to get to the loot.

When they got to Santa Fe, they knew Hyde Park, just above town,

would have reception. But the area was closed because of fire danger. So they couldn't collect their loot there either.

Leaving Santa Fe, they had better luck. At the Coronado State Monument, they discovered that when their smart phone and GPS matched the GPS of the contest, a message came on their smart phone display screen saying, "Congratulations. Push button and the loot will be credited to your account."

It was that easy to earn 25 coins, which can be redeemed at the contest's online general store. But you need to be a little lucky to drive or walk past the contest location because there are no signs.

They were similarly successful at Blue Lake, west of Grants. The loot there was 75 coins. The hitch was that they had to pay a \$5 entry fee to get to the GPS location.

There were no special provisions for posses engaged in the manhunt, possibly because people at the entry gate had no idea what Catch the Kid meant.

At Gallup, the last stop before leaving the state, the map in-dicated more loot and a clue to finding The Kid. But the icon on the map disappeared before they arrived at the location. Does that mean the loot had been exhausted or that only the first person there got the clue? The rules aren't clear.

And how many state parks, monuments and museums will be open? Will staff be aware of the program? And is paying the entry fee part of the deal to get loot and a clue? Since the idea of the contest is to promote tourism, maybe paying the fee is part of the game.

The new Tourism Secretary Monique Jacobson is to be commended for a creative idea and an attention grabbing subject. The aforementioned kinks need to be worked out and the

contest needs to be explained better. It's a generational thing. Our kids picked up on the idea immediately. My friends still are scratching their heads

even after I explained it to them. They are interested in New Mexico history and have time to devote to traveling the state the next two months of summertime. But they still need a little more confidence to get them out there.

The younger generation's kids will be starting school in a few weeks and the parents' vacation time may already have been used. So something needs to be done to induce them to work the contest into their schedules.

It would have been helpful to get this started a few months earlier. Understandably, this is a new administra-

tion and the logistics of setting this all up took a while.

The \$10,000 prize for being first to execute an arrest warrant on Billy is a big inducement. It even seems a little extravagant - but not when compared to the published \$640,000 price tag for the entire promotion.

Hopeful signs at superintendent's conference

New Mexico Public education has struggled to improve over the years without experiencing success. Our educational leaders might be stupid because they continue to do what they have always done and they continue to get the results they have always gotten. Or is that the definition of insanity? Never mind.


The new school accountability numbers are in and there was not any improvement for the eighth and final year of the "Education Governor" Bill Richardson. How could all of those years and all of that money go by in our state without any real improvement in education? Simple, each year New Mexico had more of the same educational leadership, which resulted in the same results.

I am mindful of this because New Mexico has a new governor with a mandate to make real change, not just political change. There is a new head of the Public Education Department who is dissimilar from all other heads of the New Mexico Public Education Department.

At a superintendent's conference last week in Albuquerque, I noticed the attendees were more optimistic than a year ago at last year's superintendent's conference. Last year, there was uncertainty as to who was going to lead the state and what was going to be the effect of budget issues.

I have been going to these conferences for many years. Will the Susana Martinez administration manage education the same old way governors have done for generations? I think not.

I spoke to a number of superintendents and their staff in the course of the conference and was struck by how much more open they were to permanently solving the education problems. So how can we dramatically improve New Mexico public education?

To get to that answer we must look at three interrelated issues: First, is there research showing how to dramatically improve public education? Yes, it is good practical research. Second, will changing education in New Mexico be easy? No, it will take a major change in practice to be able to use the practical research. Finally, what has been the major barrier to improving education? New Mexico has a culture of mediocrity that allows students to fail without much pressure from the parents, press or politicians.

First, though, we must note that the current practice of the schools does work for some students. It would be insane to change what works for them. So what we are tasked to do is change the educational practice of those students who are not thriving while leaving the rest of the students in a system that works for them.

What I want to see is any change in education supported by peer-reviewed, published research that has been replicated in practice.

For example, there is much buzz nationally about the actions of the Kennewick School District in Washington on the Oregon border. They set a goal of having 90 percent of all of their students reading on grade level. It took a few years, but they applied research and kept working on the goal.

Today, the Kennewick School District is a model of successful research. But while the success they had was interesting reading, it was not until they took that model to school districts in Kentucky and got the same improvement results that most of us started using those approaches.

Here in New Mexico, some of the school districts are using these changes suggested by the Kennewick research, but the state as a whole is still stuck with the political solutions of the past because politicians make the ultimate decisions.

I spent an hour in June speaking to Education Secretarydesignate Hanna Skandera about her vision for using practical research in New Mexico. I came away impressed. She does understand New Mexico's problems and is working toward new solutions based upon the research that has been replicated in other states.

At the superintendent's conference she spoke and a number attendees said to me they were impressed by her grasp of the problems. Next year can be the year real improvement is made in New Mexico public education if all of the stakeholders, including politicians, join hands to solve New Mexico's education problems.

El Paso Electric Co. remains obstinate about demand fees

So, I guess that a 50 percent increase in annual profits, a \$2 million bonus and a \$100,000 raise is not quite enough for the executives at El Paso Electric.

Since time began, the rates that churches paid for electricity were based on the amount of electricity actually used; the same way residential customers are billed. However, as coincidental as it is, suddenly this April (following February's rolling blackout fiasco and subsequent necessary and expensive repairs) El Paso Electric began to charge churches not only for the amount of electricity they use, but now they are charging them for the electricity available. They call this charge a "tariff" and label it a "demand fee." In other words, churches now not only pay for the electricity they use, but now they are also getting charged for just having electricity available.

This "demand fee" is quite expensive. For example, Cornerstone Baptist Church had a June bill that reflected a charge of \$241.44 for actual usage. However, there was an additional charge of \$732.60 for the "demand fee." This brought the total electric bill to \$1,019.65. To say this is outrageous is oversimplifying the matter.

When discussing this with the powers that be at El Paso Electric, the standard answer is that the charges will remain and that is just the way it is. The positioning of obstinacy by the upper management of El Paso Electric is appalling. While millions of Americans are struggling to pay

their mortgage payments, keep food on the table and make ends meet in this poor economy, El Paso Electric rakes in massive profits on the backs of entities that are in the "helping people business," churches. What a sad time we live in, a time when greed and profits come at any expense.

No doubt, El Paso Electric is a giant monopoly with almost unlimited resources to fight off a squeaky wheel like the neighborhood churches in Las Cruces and El Paso, but when will the attempt to make giant profits at any expense end? Maybe it is time to take another look how we get our electricity and from who.

This case is just beginning. A mediation hearing has been ordered by the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission to determine if the "demand fees" are fair and reasonable. My hope is that the officials that we have working for us in Santa Fe will stand for the people and not with the political powerhouse known as El Paso Electric.

Stop voter suppression, support the right to vote

The League of Women Voters believes that for our democracy to work, the voting franchise must be extended to every citizen without discrimination based on race, sex, income, education or failure to possess a governmentissued photo ID.

Sadly, the history of the United States is fraught with attempts to suppress voter turnout. Property ownership, gender, literacy tests and poll taxes have been used as obstacles to voting. Every obstacle creates, intentionally or otherwise, an adverse impact on some class of citizens.

The League, in particular, takes note of studies that show that photo ID requirements for voting disproportionately impact the young, the elderly, the poor and racial minorities. Gabriel Sanchez of the University of New Mexico polled voters leaving the 2006 Bernalillo County polling places. He found that 6 percent of white voters, 8 percent of Latinos and 14 percent of those 65 or older did not have driver's licenses. These percentages may not appear to be large, but with our already low-voter turnout, it is politically significant if 1 or 2 percent of citizens are denied the right to vote.

Implementing photo ID would require significant state funding with no return on the investment. Missouri estimated that photo ID

would cost the state close to \$6 million in the first year and around \$4 million in the second and third years of implementation. Could New Mexico ever justify such an expense when one of four citizens lives in poverty?

To those who argue that it takes a photo ID to fly on an airplane or rent a movie, so why shouldn't we have the same requirement to vote, we respond that it is a matter of indifference to the general welfare of our society and our democracy whether one uses a charge card, rents a movie, or flies on an airplane. But it is not a matter of indifference to our democracy whether citizens are allowed to vote.

Voting is not a privilege; it is a protected right under our federal and state constitutions. Voting is the backbone of our representative democracy. Absent proof of voter fraud, which is scarce to non-existent, there is no justification for making a citizen jump through multiple intimidating hoops in order to vote. The current voter ID statute, mirroring the requirements of the 2002 Help America Vote Act that was passed by bipartisan majorities in Congress, provides for effective voter identification.

Let's leave what's working in place and invest our time energy, and finances in improving the quality of life for New Mexicans.

Communitarians seek to restrict personal freedom

Unfortunately, their community values often trample individual rights. To create their utopian society more activities are identified as unacceptable or criminal such as diabetes, smoking, name calling, heavy energy consumption, neglect (in their view), driving when you could ride your bike or take public transportation. Other examples include areas of public health versus individual privacy, prayer in school, advocate taking your child away because of obesity, or codes enforcement that criminalize behaviors such as failure to cut your weeds or recycle your trash.

Their actions always result in more restrictive laws that adversely impact personal freedoms.

Disposable tailgates

Our regular goin'-to-the-pasture rig, a one-ton four-wheel-drive '97 GMC diesel with 256,439 miles, was in the shop. So we brought out the ol' standby; a 1969 Ford F-250 three-quarter ton, four-speed with split rims and a manual choke. It has a B&W turnover gooseneck ball made during the Civil War, I think.

My son hooked up the old Ford to the gooseneck trailer, loaded the horses and went to check the cows. They came back, unhooked the trailer and took a load of trash to the dump with the Ford.

I returned from the shop with the Jimmy and backed up to the trailer. In the rear view the trailer's electric hook-up looked different. On closer exam, I could see the male plug was gone and the wires had been stripped.

It happens to us all. It's one of those moments like accidentally drilling a hole in the gas tank, or tightening a bolt till the head breaks off, or thinking "It'll hold one more cow!"

My Iowa friend Steve has a history of minor collisions. It's always entertaining to ride with him. Some farmers of his caliber paint their company name or logo on the truck door; Agri-Beef or Sky View Farms. Steve's vehicles are easily recognized by their damaged fenders and tailgates. I remember staring at the back of his fairly new pickup and asking, "How's the new gooseneck?" Then I looked closer. New Mexico State University's Astronomy Department, the Las Cruces Natural History Museum and the Southern New Mexico Natural History Foundation invite the community to celebrate the beginning of the NASA Dawn mission's yearlong visit to the protoplanet Vesta, 143 million miles from Earth.

A labor dispute might have set back the United States' push to be first to land men on the Moon. But, according to the website http://history.nasa.gov, on July 31, 1961, President John Kennedy thanked unions for their cooperative spirit. Secretary of Labor Arthur Goldberg, at Cape Canaveral, delivered Kennedy's "message praising the voluntary, no-strike, no-lockout pledges ... at missile and space sites."

"The nation cannot afford the luxury of avoidable delay in our missile and space program," Goldberg quoted Kennedy.

Over the next year, NASA engineers began developing the lunar landing program, said NASA's 1969 publication "The Apollo Spacecraft: A Chronology, Vol. 1." Included were "Saturn launch vehicles that were under development or in planning stages." The agency "summarized its conclusions on the selection of a lunar mission mode" on July 30, 1962.

German expatriate Wernher von Braun "was the consummate manager of the gigantic Saturn booster project that sent two dozen Apollo astronauts to the Moon," Michael Neufeld wrote in "Von Braun: Dream of Space, Engineer of War." Saturn "finally (gave) the United States a shot at equaling the (Soviet Union's) obvious and embarrassing heavy-lift capability."


Saturn, though, was not an easy sell. Neufeld said the Department of Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency lacked adequate funds because of Eisenhower administration budget limits for FY 1960. So, in January 1959, von Braun publicly pleaded for an extra \$50 million to \$60 million for the big rocket. He did not get it.

However, the two-month-old NASA soon assimilated Saturn. From 1961-64, the agency carried out six Saturn I tests, said history.nasa.gov. One deployed Project High Water, releasing 30,000 gallons of water at 94 miles altitude to study the effects on radio transmission and changes in local weather conditions, said http://science.ksc.nasa.gov.

"Explosive devices ruptured (tanks) and in just five seconds, ground observers saw the formation of a huge ice cloud estimated to be several (miles) in diameter," the website said.

Four operational Saturn I launches followed in 1964 and 1965. The latter three carried Pegasus satellites that studied micrometeorite impacts. Next came nine Saturn IB launches,





including Apollo V and VII, three Skylab missions, and in 1975 boosted the Apollo-Soyuz Test Project astronauts. Among them was Deke Slayton, who co-authored "Moon Shot" with Alan Shepard, and described a IB liftoff thusly: The "rocket spewed bright orange flames as it lifted Apollo 7 into orbit. Halfway through the powered ascent on the first manned flight of Project Apollo, and the first manned liftoff for the Saturn IB, Commander Wally Schirra radioed back, 'She's riding like a dream.'"

Among the Saturn V missions were Apollos 11-17. "We were alone, almost 400 feet in the air on top of a Goliath that seemed to have a life of its own," Frank Borman wrote of Apollo 8, in his autobiography "Countdown." "It swayed slightly in the early morning breeze and I heard the gurgles of the fuels being routed for ignition. It seemed like listening to the digestive system of an overfed giant whose stomach is acting up." At liftoff, he said, "the noise generated by 3,000 tons of metal pushing through the atmosphere" trailed beneath them.

CBS News correspondent Reid Collins described Apollo 11's liftoff: "We have tremendous flame out there. ... We're beginning to feel the first thunderous roar. I can see her rising now as she's going up straight into the roll program which she should be completing. We should expect to hear from the astronauts as this spit of land is beginning to shake from the power of it."

"Everything about the Saturn 5 was big," John Noble Wilford described in "We Reach The Moon." "Its first, or booster, stage was the biggest aluminum cylinder ever machined. Its valves were as big as barrels, its fuel pumps (for feeding engines at the rate of 700 tons of fuel a minute) were bigger than refrigerators, its pipes were big enough for a man to crawl through and its engines were the size of trucks."

Martin Caidin, in the April 1970 Popular Mechanics, called the Saturn V "the biggest bomb ever made ... 6,400,000 pounds of supercold, superhot hell waiting to explode in a titanic blast if just one of several million parts doesn't work exactly as designed."


In his article, "The Hottest Job In The World," Caidin profiled the Astronaut Rescue Team. Eleven men from contractor TWA-Wackenhut, alongside three defense department medical technicians, waited out each launch just 1,800 feet from the Saturn inside modified armored personnel carriers, shielded with an ablative material. At liftoff they endured "a cataclysmic shriek that pounds with painful force against the body."

NASA created the Astronaut Rescue Team after the Apollo I fire killed three men.

"Whatever the danger, once members of the team are committed to the rescue attempt, they don't stop. It's all the way, even if the whole pad seems about to go up with the force of 1,000 tons of TNT," Caidin said.


A high-speed elevator would whisk the rescuers up 320 feet to the White Room outside the capsule. "If the astronauts inside haven't opened the hatch, or can't open it, the rescue force beaks the seal," Caidin said. The team then "leans in with a special 'gaff hook,' snags it on an astronaut's pressure suit and literally hauls (out) the spaceman."

At that point, depending on the situation, rescuers would either hustle the crew down the elevator and into the "shielded personnel carriers;" into a cage that rapidly slid on a wire 2,000 feet out and down to a concrete bunker; or, "make a dash for the 'doom room' – a shelter directly beneath the Saturn V, designed to

let the astronauts and rescuers ride out in safety an explosion." With so many variables, Caidin said, "no one knows exactly what would happen if the Saturn V should burn on the pad or explode."

But the causes could be countless.

"The guys who washed the cavernous interior of the rocket before fueling had to be careful," said Borman, "because if a single thumbprint left enough grease to react with the liquid oxygen oxidizer, we could have had an explosion."

warehouse space at 2001 Copper Loop, which also allowed the regional food bank to provide more refrigerated foods. Road-runner also conducted outreach to the local communities to help ensure it was reaching all the food pantries and groups needing the food.

In addition to packaging pallets of food, which can now be ordered online by the different groups, the food bank warehouse converts daily into a mini-supermarket with items on display for its customers to use. Fresh vegetables and baked goods are provided at no costs, while the other packaged food is sold for 19 cents a pound.

During a recent shopping trip at the warehouse, Bert Crisp with St. Genevieve's Village said he's seen great improvements since Roadrunner took over – to the benefit of his residents. St. Genevieve's Village is a low-income, 42-unit apartment living complex for the elderly whose ages range from 62 to their 90s.

Crisp said he comes to the food bank two or three times each week and puts in orders online.

"I love it," Crisp said. "The food is very fresh."

And the price is right. At 19 cents a pound, Crisp said he has been able to expand the selection of food offered at the village's own food pantry.

"I can buy five canned goods for a dollar," he said. "You can't find anything like that at the store."

The packaged food comes mostly from retail stores – primarily from Walmart and Sam's Club, Barnes-Smith said. The items may have slightly damaged packaging, but there's nothing else wrong with them, they just aren't suitable for display sales, she said.

Barnes-Smith said the stores have been very generous, as have the local produce growers, giving the food bank a good selection of vegetables.

"This has been a huge commitment from Roadrunner Food Bank," she said. "To us, it's as much about providing good nutrition, not just feeding people."

Crisp said he was taken advantage of the fresh vegetables

and fruits – watermelons, bell peppers, onions, potatoes, sweet potatoes and such. "We never had these opportunities before," Crisp said. "We

also never had this kind of assistance. Roadrunner has really helped me improve the quality of life for my residents."

That same morning, Pamela Finch of Girls Stepping Stones, a girls group home and runaway shelter operated by Families & Youth Inc., was also shopping at the food bank, which she said she does at least once a week.

In a time of tight government funding, Finch said the food bank improvements have come at the right time. Finch said not only does the food bank have good, nutritious food, but it also has fun comfort food, such as pastries.

"It helps our budget tremendously," Finch said. "With this food bank, we're still able to provide the girls extra special things here and there."

One way that Roadrunner has been able to improve the local food bank offerings is its association with the national Feeding America organization, Barnes-Smith said. The relationship is another reason the food bank is able to offer more to its customers, she said.

Mexico families.

Duran has not specified if she is seeking a criminal investigation, which is implied by her turning over the names to the state police, Allen said. Duran recently told the Legislature's Courts, Corrections and Justice Committee that criminal wrongdoing was not part of the investigation. Duran said she was relying on the police department's expertise in identity verification.

"I told the people of the state of New Mexico last year ... that I would do my best to serve in the best possible way that I could to assure integrity in the election process, integrity in the election system," she told the committee. "That's all that is going on here. It is not a witch hunt. It is not a fishing expedition."

Allen said Common Cause, a nonpartisan group promoting open government, is against voter fraud, but so far those making the accusations haven't provided proof.

Similarly, Allen said, the need for a photo ID to vote hasn't been supported by proof that people are using the current voter identification process - which allows substitute identification such as utility bills - to commit widespread voter fraud.

Considering the historically low voter turnout in New Mexico and general citizen apathy about their elected officials, Allen said he doesn't understand why the secretary of state would be pursuing these issues that will only serve to discourage people from voting.

"This has been irresponsible," Allen said. "The real problem with our democracy is that we don't have enough people participating."



of American soldiers floating all around his landing craft. He and his fellow soldiers had to move bodies out of the way to land ashore.

Early in the fighting, among the hedgerows of the French countryside, Castillo, whom his fellow soldiers nicknamed "baby" for his young age and youthful appearance, would face the most frightening experience of his life.

Pinned down by sniper fire, he was among a small group of soldiers who went out to bring the sniper down. As they neared the area where the sniper fire was coming from, Castillo said he spotted a little, black-and-white dog. Castillo credits the dog for saving his life, because it showed him where the German sniper was in the trees.

"I fired a shot and ran like hell," Castillo said.

Castillo didn't run far and returned to fire five more shots at the sniper, one of them killing the German officer. This led to the surrender of the other German soldiers under the dead officer's command.

For his actions, Castillo was awarded a Silver Star in the field by Gen. Dwight Eisenhower. For Castillo, the ceremony was not so much memorable for getting the medal from the supreme commander of Allied forces in Europe, but because he got to enjoy coffee and doughnuts.

It would be one of the few moments of pleasure for Castillo as he figures he went all over central Europe fighting on the front lines until the final surrender of Germany in May 1945. Everywhere he went, there was death and destruction.

"It's hard to talk about," Castillo said, "all I went through and what I saw."

His daughters, Gloria Hernandez and Terry Apodaca, said their father has told them about he and other soldiers having to eat their k-rations huddled behind the carcass of a bloated, dead cow, as a precaution against sniper fire.

The happiest moment for Castillo was getting word that the war had ended and he could go home, completing three years and 11 months of military service.

Castillo does become emotional recalling his homecoming Nov. 18, 1945. After arriving in Hatch by bus, he returned to his parent's home at night. Castillo's eyes well with tears as he remembers the scene and has to pause to compose himself.

From a large family, Castillo and was one of five brothers who all went to war and who all made it home.

After his return, he reunited with his high school sweetheart and they married. Besides his daughters, Castillo and his wife Susie also raised three sons – Danny, Michael and Bobby. After his return, Castillo went back into the family business of growing chile and cotton.

A member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 1208, Castillo was among the first group of to take an Honor Flight to the World War II Memorial in Washington, D.C.

"He'll say he's not a hero," Apodaca said. "He is a hero in our eyes."



Buurma, who missed last fall's rivalry game against Mayfield with a broken collar bone, said the players have united for a common goal.


"It's a South pride thing," Buurma said smiling. "We all want to beat the North. We can be friends ... for a week."

In 2011, Jones was the honored with the National Strength and Conditioning All-American Award. It goes beyond personal achievement to sharing for Jones. She volunteered with many children's

after-school programs and the United Blood Services Blood Drive. As you might For the past three years, she has been involved with the "Dress a Child" organization where she helps young children in need select clothing. Jones also volunteers with softball camps to help younger players learn the game and improve their skills. Her coach couldn't be prouder.

"We have a philosophy in Aggie softball - that we will be the

change we want to see on campus," softball head coach Kathy Rodolph said. "Kandis Jones embraced that philosophy, lived it and encouraged others to do the same on campus. Our campus, our community and our program are in a far better place now with the commitment and leadership of Kandis Jones.'

Former New Mexico State running back Seth Smith and tight end/long snapper Kyle Nelson have both signed free agent contracts with National Football League teams, ac-cording to a NMSU press release. Smith signed with the San Francisco 49ers, while Nelson signed with the New Orleans Saints.

Smith, a native of Oak-land, Calif., played from 2009-10 at NMSU in the running back position. In 2010, Smith rushed for 385 yards and three touchdowns, while catching five passes for 29 yards. For his career, Smith rushed for 1,401 yards and four touchdowns. In 2009, Smith became the first Aggie running back to rush for more 1,000 yards in a season since the 2000 season.

The men's City of Las Cruces Golf Championship will be contested July 29-31. The women's championship was concluded July 23-24, and congratulations to my friend Mary Armstrong for her win.

I've always planned my game and looked ahead to the end

of July, trying to mold my game into shape to peak at the right time of year. In years past, I'd get around and play the three courses at least twice, and get plenty of practice time on the range and putting greens.

Believe me, I would like to be back to defend my last two senior wins, but regrettably, I will not be playing in this year's championship due to my mishap back in February. I have been practicing and am playing golf again, but the consistency is not yet there. Plus, it would be really tiring for me right now to play competitively three days in a row.

The organizing committee, headed by Lee Webb, and the volunteers have earned well-deserved kudos for all the hard work they do in putting the city tournament together; it's re-ally a treasure for Las Cruces. I'll be back next year.

In the meantime, here's what you need to keep in mind in order to play well in an event like the city tournament. The biggest problem I have noticed over the years is with the rules. Many players are "uncertain" about certain rules. The rules mean counting every shot, no "gimmie" putts (putt everything out) and when and where to drop a ball for ground-under repair and penalty drops.

The ball must be played as it lies except for cases where it is a place that is designated and marked as ground-under repair. Typically, there will be a white line on the ground defining ground-under, or a rope attached to stakes. If your ball comes to rest in this area, you are entitled to free relief at the closest point not nearer the hole.

First, announce your intention to your fellow competitors, then place a tee to mark the position of the ball before you pick it up. Of course, you have to take relief from the area marked, within a club-length distance. The same holds true when the ball comes to rest on a legitimate (i.e. paved) cart path. The rub comes with the "closest point of relief" stipulation. Sometimes your closest point may not be too desirable to

play from. You can't always make your drop where you would like it. But you might be able to hit a decent shot from the path

The other important issue with respect to rules has to do with red, yellow and white stakes. Players sometimes don't know the difference. White stakes define out-of-bounds. If you hit it O.B., you must drop a ball where you last played your shot, with a stroke penalty, while counting the first shot in your score. For instance, let's say you hit your ball into the yard of a house left of No. 1 at Sonoma Ranch. That's one. You place a second ball on the tee; that's two, and you're now

hitting three. If you're not certain you hit it O.B., simply announce plainly to your So many golfers playing partners that you're hitting a provisional" ball. Make sure your provisional ball is marked so that anyone can tell the difference between the two.

Over the years, I've been struck by the ignorance of many golfers (including juniors) when it comes to the difference between red and yellow stakes, and how they should proceed when their ball finds one or the other. Yellow stakes around a body of water (wet or dry) mark a water hazard. Red stakes mark a lateral hazard.

It would be cumbersome to delve into the specifics of the rules in each case, but you should read the USGA Rules of Golf book pertaining to hazards.

In either case, you may take the original shot over again under the penalty of one stroke; you may do that on any shot. You can also play the ball out of a hazard, but you better be careful. You can't ground your club in a hazard.

When you incur a penalty because of a hazard, you're entitled to drop within two club lengths, as opposed to dropping within one club length when a penalty is not involved, such as in the case of a burrowing animal hole. Be sure to follow the customary procedure when dropping a ball. It isn't necessary to play a provisional ball when it is plainly evident that the ball entered the hazard.

As for strategy for the city tournament, there is not too much to worry about. The one thing to keep in mind is you can't win your flight in the first round, but you can certainly

attention to detail. Picacho Hills has danger lurking on every hole, and requires very accurate tee shots and a conservative approach to risks, I feel. Las Cruces Country Club is flat with open fairways, but demands that you hit a lot of greens in regulation, since up-and-downs are decidedly tricky with smallish "push-up" greens. With Sonoma Ranch the greens are quite large and have distinct quadrants, often with bowls, meaning you'll get a lot of very long putts so that the key is skilled lag putting. The New Mexico State University Golf Course will be back in the rotation next year.

It's easy to get uptight and anxious when the City Championship rolls around. So many golfers play so few stroke-play tournaments they are out of their comfort zone. The critical thing is to keep the ball in play and avoid shooting yourself in the foot.

Smart golf is usually winning golf. Here are three examples of smart golf.

On the short par-4 second hole at LCCC, keep your tee shot well back to about 100 yards to avoid the huge willows and give yourself a clear shot over a small pond to a flat green. For the third and 11th par-4 holes at Picacho, which strike me as quite difficult, consider making these play like par 5s, especially if you're not a long hitter, and you take a snowman out of play. At Sonoma, you must play away from the very penal fairway bunkers on the ninth, 15th and 16th holes, since those huge sand pits practically guarantee a dropped shot.

One thing I have learned over my years of competitive golf (and other sports, as well) is to be patient. One year in the city, I think I was tied for the (senior) lead starting the last round. My opponent started with a birdie and a par on the first and second holes, while I started bogey, triple. I kept my head and patience paid off; I played two-under the rest of the round and won by six shots.

Remind yourself to relax and have fun. Don't worry about how the other players are doing. It's stroke play, and you add the numbers up at the end and see who won. Most of all, be courteous to your fellow golfers and volunteers, and pay attention to proper golf etiquette.



Mesilla trustees at their board meeting Monday, July 25, approved a resolution lifting the burn ban within town limits.



LCPS school makes AYP Test changed, but requirements higher

The New Mexico Public Education Department (PED) recently released information regarding the number of schools in New Mexico that made Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP).

The results show Las Cruces Public Schools (LCPS) has one school – White Sands Middle School – that made AYP this year. This compares to last year's number of three schools that made AYP – Hillrise, Loma Heights and Mesilla elementary schools.

AYP represents the annual academic targets, primarily in reading and math, that schools must reach to be considered on track with the federally mandated goal by No Child Left Behind (NCLB) of 100 percent proficiency by school year 2013-14.

Under NCLB, schools strive for annual improvement, which is measured for students in grades three through eight and 11. Students are tested each year with the New Mexico Standards Based Assessment (NMSBA). The results of the tests are used by the PED to determine school designations such as "meets AYP," according to a LCPS press release.

The release of AYP information gives district officials "a big picture" look at how well students did on the NMSBA, the release stated, and asked community members to "not jump to conclusions" until LCPS Accountability, Assessment and Research Department has analyzed the data.

"From our preliminary review, it may appear that LCPS students did not improve as much as we had hoped," the press release stated. "We know there is some decline in some grade levels in subjects such as math and reading, and improvements are needed across the board. And yet, many areas of success and increases in academic performance can also be seen.'

The release notes that the 2011 NMSBA tests were changed from the previous year, with more multiple-choice questions and fewer open-ended questions. That made the test performance standards more difficult to compare to the previous year.

PED Secretary-designate Hanna Skandera

in a July 1 memo to all New Mexico superintendents said the new scores are "not comparable" to past years, requiring a conversion of the results.

The change in the baseline has impacted test results, the LCPS release stated. As an example, it now may take a 95 percent score

to make an "A" whereas in 2010, it took a 90 percent score.

'It's also important to consider that the Annual Measurable Objective, the targets of how many students should test 'proficient or above' in reading and math, was raised significantly this year in order to reach the federal NCLB goal of 100 percent proficiency by 2014," the LCPS release stated.

The NMSBA performance standards were changed to remedy a long-standing problem that impacted sixth-grade scores.

"The change was done to repair performance standards that falsely made sixth-graders underperform compared to students in adjacent grades, a problem that has troubled New Mexico educators for years," the LCPS release stated.

LCPS Superintendent Stan Rounds said he encourages everyone to take these factors and other considerations into account when reviewing the AYP information that will be posted on the LCPS district website, www.lcps.k12. nm.us. As the AYP data is broken down and analyzed, the results will be further explained to the community, he said.

"I want to commend the hard work of our teaching and instructional staff," Rounds said. As our teachers already know, NMSBA test scores are only one indicator of how well our students are doing.

Rounds noted that two schools - Camino Real Middle School and San Andres High School - decreased the "indicators missed" number to less than three. Also, eight schools decreased their "indicators missed" overall Sonoma and University Hills elementary schools; Camino Real, Lynn, Picacho, Sierra, and White Sands middle schools; and San Andres High School.

I remember being younger and shopping with my family at the mall. My brother and I would get bored and to appease our restless minds - and to keep my mother sane – Dad would take us to ride the escalator. No, Waco, Texas, did not have an escalator, so these memorable experiences only occurred when we would travel to neighboring cities – Dal-las, Fort Worth, Austin, etc. I called them "the big places."

The escalator was first invented in 1859 as an advanced replacement for stairs. Nathan Ames is credited with patenting the first "escalator," but the first model was not produced until 1896 by an inventor referred to as Reno. The "inclined elevator" was installed along the Old Iron Pier in New York. After a few trials, the young inventor of the escalator partnered with Otis Elevator Co., to work on his invention. Since then, many inventors have come along, adding their own enhancements to the moving stairs and working toward what we know today as an escalator.

Although it may seem like a small step, having an escalator in Las Cruces is just another reminder that we are "moving on up."

Business A store built for all NMSU adds upscale bookstore to campus

On Monday, Aug. 1, the wait will be over for New Mexico State University's new bookstore. Not just open to NMSU students and faculty, the Barnes & Noble bookstore will also cater to the community, offering a Starbucks café, Aggie gear and general books, including a large selection of children's books and games.

"This building has so much art and history in it," said Mark Cramer, a senior communications specialist for NMSU. "It has a re-ally unique feel to it."

On a tour throughout the 33,000-square-foot bookstore, the attention to detail cannot go unnoticed. From the antique pictures to the airplane hanging from the second floor, every aspect of the building depicts NMSU in some form or fashion.

"Each Barnes & Noble is designed specifically for the campus it is on," said Joanna Koliba, general manager of the NMSU bookstore. "The art and graphics throughout tell the history of NMSU and really depict the community that surrounds it."

Along with all the extra artwork, the Barnes & Noble also welcomes a new café.

"That is really the only big change this bookstore has that the other one does not," Koliba said about the new Starbucks café. "All of the other enhancements are just extensions of what the other store had."

Divided into two levels, the first floor has Aggie merchandise, Starbucks and other snacks and treats. After a ride on the escalators to the second floor, guests will

find students' textbooks, school supplies and a mini Apple store/ technology center. Selling everything Apple, except iPhones, the store will carry iPads, Mac computers, iPods and accessories.

"If people are worried about parking, we have addressed that issue already," said Cramer, adding that 90 parking spots are devoted specifically to the bookstore. "They have a two-hour limit, which should be plenty of time for people to come in and get everything they need."

Keeping a close watch on parking will be easier for NMSU's parking officers since they are moving their facilities to offices in the bookstore. The Auxilary Department will also be housed in the building as well as additional office spaces that are to be rented.

"The bookstore warehouse is also in the building," Cramer said, "making it so much easier for employees to stock the shelves."

Though the store's main goal is to provide and sell needed items to the community, the bookstore was also designed to foster a relaxed atmosphere for studying, reading and just hanging out.

"This is my favorite place in the store," Koliba said about one of the bookstore's living rooms. "It just makes me want to grab a book and curl up in a chair. The natural lighting and great pictures make it look like a real living area."

In addition to the tables placed throughout the second floor, an outdoor fire pit was built for hanging out during cooler weather, and Koliba said she hopes to see people gathering around the pit with a cup of hot coffee when it gets cold enough.

While the bookstore does boast

Since a significant amount of capital is often required for a bank loan, Vasquez said alternative lenders will also be available.

In addition to all the financial support, other business maintenance organizations will also be available, such as WESST Corp., SCORE, the Mesilla Valley Economic Development Alliance (MVEDA) and the City of Las Cruces.

"The city is going to be there helping peo-ple work with their new permitting process," Vasquez said. "They are streamlining their system to make it more user friendly."

Partnership works to help adolescents in Las Cruces

Four area high schools will meet the health care needs of students while participating in a communitywide partnership devoted to adolescent health.

Oñate, Las Cruces, Gadsden and Chaparral high schools have school-based health centers that will each receive new equipment from a federal grant awarded to the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico (CFSNM) to be used for much-needed equipment purchases.

The grant funds, totaling \$117,134, were awarded to the CFSNM in collaboration with Las Cruces Public Schools (LCPS), Gadsden Independent Schools and Memorial Medical Center's Family Medicine Residency Program by the Health Research and Services Administration (HRSA) as a result of the Affordable Care Act.

'This funding is huge as far as updating the equipment in these centers," said Beverly Hine, R.N., director of Health Services/ Medicaid for LCPS. "This will help us have a community-wide look at adolescent health."

School-based health centers offer a full range of age-appropriate health care services, including primary medical care, mental/behavioral health care, dental/oral health care, health education and promotion, substance abuse counseling, case management and nutrition education.

Students can be treated for acute illnesses, such as the flu and chronic conditions, including asthma and diabetes. They can also be screened for dental, vision and hearing problems. With an emphasis on prevention, early intervention and risk reduction, school-based health centers counsel students on healthy habits and how to prevent injury, violence and other threats.

In 2009 and 2010, 1,317 youth made 4,600 visits to local school-based health centers.

The centers are a source of care for the kids who don't have coverage, but they are also used by the students because they are more of a natural habitat, as opposed to visiting a doctor's office," Hine said. Some students who visit the centers go with needs they ordinarily would not bring up with their parents or their own doctor, and others go with one concern, but soon find out

there is an underlying problem. 'If there is a primary care provider, the school makes every effort to communicate with them," Hine said.

Need for updated equipment was apparent at each school and the funding will cover new exam tables, vital sign monitors, urine analyzers, BMI Scales, vision screeners, spirometers and eight computers. Having the equipment will standardize treatment and equipment across the four centers.

Beginning in 1999, the Healthcare Foundation, a supporting organization of the CFSNM at the time, received a federal grant to partner with MMC's Family Medicine Residency Program to provide adolescent health services at Las Cruces High School. Since then, the project has expanded to three additional high school based health centers. In early 2010, the CFSNM became the fiscal and programmatic sponsorship of the project. The CFSNM will purchase, distribute and maintain inventory of all the equipment for each of the four target school-based centers.

The New Mexico pecan industry did well in production and revenue last year, even thought it was an "off year."

An "off year" refers to the tendency of pecan trees to alternate heavy bearing years with low bearing years, something farmers call the pecan bearing cycle. Heavy bearing years mean increased stress on the nut-bearing trees, and

they typically produce a smaller crop the following year.

But the bearing cycle may become a thing of the past if farming practices being instituted by many New Mexico farmers continue to show results.

One way farmers are stabilizing production is by aggressively pruning trees. "When a pecan grower

looks at a block of trees and they look like they will give a heavy crop that year, and it had a low yield the year before, they know by pruning a certain percent they can probably prevent a heavy harvest and a lighter harvest the following year,'

San Saba Pecan broker Phil Arnold said.

Pruning allows sunlight to penetrate the canopy and helps new growth, which will produce more pecans. Pruning also allows the growers to move in equipment to spray and control insects.

"Overproduction hurts the pecan quality, and the trees need a year to recuperate after

heavy production," Arnold said.

Pecan trees seem to have a built-in sense to know what is good for them, Arnold said, and during the summer, pecan growers see what they call the "August drop," when trees begin shedding nuts if they are overloaded.

Managing production by pruning stabilizes the pecan market and protects the kernel quality, Arnold said.

In addition, many Mesilla Valley farmers are planting pecan trees, switching from cot-

ton and alfalfa, which is also disrupting the bear-ing-cycle, Arnold said.

'I anticipate that in a few years, we'll see the numbers - high and low yields – come together through good manage-ment and we'll see better averages in production," Arnold said.

Pecan trees are a longtime investment. It takes about seven years for growers to harvest break-even yields and about five more years before they make a profit, Arnold said.

Greg Daviet, who grows pecans on 250 acres south of Las Cruces, said he had

NMDA public information officer a record harvest last year, 625,000 in-shell pounds, although he can't explain how it happened, either management practices or climate.

"I usually average 450,000 pounds a year," Daviet said. "But I grew more pecans last year than I've ever known.

"I also had a record price, \$2.90 a pound inshell. One reason was because we had a weak

Gov. Susana Martinez is using her authority to replace current State Engineer John D'Antonio by accepting applications for the office, but she is not calling it a search committee, said Scott Darnell, Martinez's public information director.

Martinez said her purpose for opening up the position in this vital office, especially with drought conditions, is to seek opinions on how the office is operated and to consider applications of people who are interested

and qualified for the position. The governor said her administration has sought input about the position from farmers, businesses, agricultural organizations and agencies.

As current state engineer, D'Antonio serves on the Interstate Stream Commission, the Water Trust Board, the Governor's Water Infrastructure Investment Team, the

Upper Colorado River Compact and the Governor's Drought Task Force as well as the New Mexico Commissioner to the Rio Grande.

About two weeks ago, D'Antonio, with his authority as a Rio Grande commissioner, offered EBID a loan up to 100,000 acre-feet of up-stream water to help the district get through the current drought. EBID rejected the offer because the loan water would have come out of next season's allocation and left the district in debt, the board said.

"The governor appreciates the services of our current state engineer, John D'Antonio,

dollar and a high foreign demand."

Daviet said his grandmother, Lady Day Daviet, started establishing the orchard in 1965. He is expanding his operation by building a pecan cleaning plant that will have a capacity of 50,000 pounds a day, he said.

In 2010, the New Mexico pecan production was 66 million pounds, a decrease from 68 million pounds the previous year, but good for an off year. The state pecan record production was 74 million pounds in 2007.

Pecan prices in 2010 averaged \$2.83 a pound in-shell and brought in \$186.7 million in USDA National Agricultural Statistical Service. The national pecan production was down



from 302 million pounds in 2009 to 293.7 million pounds last year, but the demand was greater.

"The year 2010 was really a good year for the New Mexico pecan industry because of the big demand and with domestic prices at record high levels," said Noreen Jaramillo of the New Mexico Department of Agriculture.

Pecans grown in the Southeastern U.S. average 45 to 48 percent meat content while pecans grown in the Western states average 57 to 58 percent, which affects the price, Arnold said.

A time to rent, a time to buy Housing market makes a great time to buy ... for some

Back in the 1990s and into the early 2000s, when home prices were appreciating at the modest rate of 3 to 4 percent per year, property owners could sell their homes and recover the costs of sale after about two years of ownership. Today, market conditions have pushed back the break-even point to who knows where.

Will it take three years to break even? Five years? Seven years? Since the answers to those questions are so elusive, many potential homebuyers are reluctant to "jump in" and purchase a home today. An investor who paid cash for such a property could easily earn upwards of \$12,000 or more per year from the rental proceeds. That's a 8.6 percent annual return on the buyer's \$139,000 cash investment and an 11.3 percent return on the \$106,000 purchase. Not bad compared to other rates-of-return available to today's investors.

Tóday's investors are also taking a hard look at small and large apartment complexes. As homeownership rates continue to decline, more and more people are choosing to rent. Vacancy rates are dropping and rental rates are increasing in the Las Cruces area, Gregory said, making now a great time to become a landlord.

First-time buyers and retirees are also in the long-term category. First-timers who plan to start a family and remain in their homes for five to 10 years are certainly excellent home-buying candidates. So are retirees, who typically remain in their homes for a very long time. Another good reason to lock-in a property today is the fact that it will be much harder to qualify to purchase a home in the future. Freddie Mac, which purchases almost all of today's mortgage loans, recently increased its minimum credit score requirement from 580 to 620. Some local lenders now set their own minimums, some as high as 680 for certain loan products. Congress's current quest to raise the minimum down-payment requirement to 20 percent of the purchase price for all, but the most creditworthy borrowers will also make it more difficult to purchase a home in the future.

On the positive side, mortgage rates are currently at levels not seen for almost half a century, making homeownership more affordable than at any time in recent memory. If you consider yourself to be a long-term prospect, now's the time to jump in and start reaping the benefits our marketplace can provide. See you at closing.

Consumer financial protection needed to avoid a future crisis



The new Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB) is officially up and running. The new bureau was created in the wake of the subprime mortgage crisis and the consequent financial meltdown, the effects of which we are still feeling.

The CFPB seeks to ensure consumers get the information needed to make the best financial decisions. The goal is that prices are clear and up front, risks are visible and nothing is buried in the fine print.

In a market that works, consumers should be able to make direct comparisons among products. But this is often difficult with complicated financial products. Moreover, the impacts of a mistake can have substantial, life changing consequences.

One might expect competition to eliminate many abuses and, in fact, it does. But financial purchases are often one-offs, in which the consumer faces a steep learning curve. A wrong choice today can mean substantially lower income later in life or retirement.

Of course, for sophisticated investors, such as those who read this column, there is no need for a CFPB. Similarly, for honest bankers, the CFPB imposes an expense that isn't necessary as they already take their customers' needs into account. The problem arises when an unscrupulous lender meets a naïve consumer.

An example, I received an offer in a mailer from Countrywide, which at the time was the largest mortgage lender in the United States. The deal was really very good. When I went into the local Countrywide office, the local representative, who was very young and very poorly trained, made me a completely different offer – a a two-year teaser rate with a balloon payment. She wasn't authorized to make the loan in the mailer.

In effect, Countrywide was engaging in a-bait-and-switch. I pushed and got the original offer honored, but how many others fell for the ploy?

This sort of shenanigans is the type of thing that would hopefully be prevented by the CFPB, but at the cost of considerable more regulation and increased cost to consumers. Some people who might have qualified for a loan will be priced out, others will receive a better deal, and a few will be protected from unsuitable loans. Clearly a balance needs to be struck.

The CFPB largely gathers together existing regulation and centralizes it into a single agency, the idea being that a dedicated agency will more efficiently enforce existing law. Republicans fear the CFPB will be too zealous.

Republicans have two major objections to the CFPB as currently structured. First, they argue its director is too powerful and should be replaced with a panel of five, similar to other regulatory bodies, such as the Labor Relations Board and the Federal Trade Commission.

Second, Republicans complain about funding, which under the current law comes from the Federal Reserve, not Congress. They want the CFPB to be subject to normal congressional budgeting oversight.

Republicans have bounded to refuse to confirm the director-designate unless their desired changes are made.



Last month, the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce added a new aspect to its Business of the Month feature, which is published in its monthly publication – The Bottom Line. Instead of selecting just one business, the chamber has doubled the number, giving a small business – less than 10 full-time employees – and large business their time in the spotlight.

This month, the chamber has chosen Roberto's Mexican Food as the large business and Business Products Center as the small business.

"We're very excited to start recognizing a small and large business each month at the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce," said Joel Courtney, communication and leadership director for the chamber. "We have so many businesses in the community that give back and support charitable causes and organizations, we wanted to make sure that they all had a chance to receive recognition. Every business that gives back to the community should be recognized for their efforts, whether it is a huge corporation with offices all over the globe or a start-up company that operates out of someone's home."

Roberto's Mexican Food

Owner Roberto Estrada started his business venture – La Bonita Mexican Food on Picacho Avenue – in 1968, but the native Las Crucen started working in the food industry long before, at Las Cruces Foods.

Since then, he has expanded his operations to include New Mexico Foods, which was once Marquez Brothers Tortillas and Roberto's. With nearly 100 employees, Estrada said he likes to keep things family-oriented, which is evident by the large amount of family working for him – two sons, daughter and 10 grandchildren.

Now a local legend, Estrada shows off his enchilada skills at the annual Whole Enchilada Fiesta.

The signature dish, created during the weekendlong event, has evolved from a flat, three-layer enchilada with a diameter of 5.5 feet to a world-record enchilada that is 10.5 feet in diameter, using 750 pounds of masa, 75 gallons of red chile sauce, 175 pounds of grated cheese and 50 pounds of onions. Estrada has held the world record since 2000.

This year's Enchilada Fiesta will be held Friday through Sunday, Sept. 23-25.

Business Products Center

Local CEO combines education with passion

Community Action Agency (CAA) of Southern New Mexico CEO Dawn Hommer wasn't born in New Mexico, but to her, "this is home."

Growing up in Easton, Penn., Hommer lived in many parts of the country, following her adventurous spirit. But it wasn't until 1997 that her "gypsy heart" led her to Las Cruces.

"My mom and her husband had gone on a vacation out West," Hommer said. "They asked me to watch over their cabin in Pennsylvania while they were traveling. When they got back, my mom said she was moving there because she fell in love with the weather and the people. She asked me to come along with her, and my gypsy heart said 'yes.'

"I have lived in Florida, and it was beautiful, but I love being (in Las Cruces) because people here are so sweet, and I fell in love with the weather, food and culture. There is nothing not to like."

Upon arriving in the Land of Enchantment, Hommer pursued her bachelor's degree at New Mexico State University, graduating in December 2003 with a degree in marketing and landing her first job.

"When I finished my (bachelor's degree), I started looking

for a job and was very fortunate because the Arrowhead Center was just starting up," she said.

Run by Kevin Boberg, NMSU's Arrowhead Center is an economic and business resource, helping to create an environment for small businesses to grow and thrive. Hommer started in the entrepreneurship unit of the center, working as a project manager with graduate assistants.

"There was such a great diversity with the projects," she said. "From restaurant ideas and nonprofits to technology projects in Los Alamos. I was managing about 20 to 40 projects a semester and 15 to 20 students at a time. It was a blast. Since the program was so young – only about a year old – we were laying the groundwork for what was to become of it. We were working with students of every background."

While at the Arrowhead Center, Hommer said she decided to go back to school for a master's degree from NMSU.

I chose marketing and business as my direction because I feel they gave me options and a focus at the same time," she said. "I still have the flexibility to go into a variety of careers, but feel that the course I took gave me a clear focus.

Another hobby of Hommer's is working with nonprofits, which helped her land her current position at the CAA.

In June, Hommer was appointed as the new CEO of the nonprofit and she said this position allows her to utilize many of her talents.

"When the position became available, I had three or four people mention it to me," said Hommer, adding that she took this as a sign and applied for the job. "I had done volunteer work with the Rivers Academy, a nonprofit that works with (troubled teens), and always had a place for it in my heart.

"My new job lets me pursue that while also using my MBA, making the perfect mix."

Though Hommer has only been in her position for a month, she said she is picking up on things quickly.

"First, I have a phenomenal team – the best," she said. "Everyone is supportive and each individual brings something great to the table. We have so many great programs that we are working on and cover such a large area - all of southern New Mexico. But everyone is focused on our vision - economic success, and long-term growth for individuals."

Although the CAA provided food bank management in the past, Hommer said the organization no longer supplies this type of "emergency response" and instead has shifted their focus solely on long-term success.

CAA programs include asset development, financial literacy and individual account development.

"We are trying to scale up Doña Ana County in rural areas,

and match funding for people who are able to save a certain amount of money," she said.

"We also want to build up the Tres Manos program, which is a weaving program for women in San Miguel. We help them sell their work and it brings in extra income for them. And they love the social component."

To educate the community, Hommer said the CAA covers 10 counties, not just Doña Ana.

"We literally serve thousands of people a year and need community support to help us grow," she said.

In the little extra time she has, Hommer said she enjoys spending time with her two children and catching up on reading.

"It is my little bit of peace," she said. "But really, I feel like I am living the dream. Like I should click my heels and wake up from all of this."

C2 | Arts & Entertainment Las Cruces Bulletin Missoula Children's Theatre rolling through Las Cruces Sixty local children to shine in 'Pinocchio'

It is a process I have witnessed literally dozens of times over the years and it never ceases to impress me.

To witness the professional actors and directors of the Missoula Children's Theatre (MCT) as they roll into town on a Sunday evening, hold auditions on Monday morning and put together a completely staged musical play using about 60 local children by Saturday makes me, as a long-time theater educator and performer, shake my head in amazement.

But the nonprofit MCT has been doing it successfully for 40 years. Co-founders Jim Caron and Don Collins met by chance in a production of "Man of La Mancha" in Missoula, Mont., in 1970. Local productions featuring occasional child actors developed into having actor/directors travel to nearby towns, casting local children and putting on plays.

MCT's 45 two-person teams perform 1,200 weeklong residencies in all 50 states and 20 foreign countries – more than 65,000 children will participate this year.

The original scripts feature classic stories and fairy tales adapted by MCT – a number by Caron and Collins. They follow a highly successful formula and are designed to allow each child an opportunity to shine.

The "little red truck" has everything needed to put on the play – costumes for about 60 children, make-up, scripts, scenery, lights and souvenir T-shirts. Not to mention the personal property of the two – that's right, there's only two – tour actor/directors.

This year's MCT professionals are Katherine "Kate" Clark and Hannah Bagnall. Clark was born and raised in New York and graduated with a dual degree in theater and English literature from Saint Michael's College in Burlington, Vt. Bagnall is from Rolla, Mo., and just graduated with her bachelor's degree from Southeast Missouri State University. This is the first year for either of them with MCT, and neither has been to New Mexico before. They are both thrilled to be spending their summers working with children and doing what they love, they said.

"We're both big theater dorks," Bagnall said. "And we are so happy being with Missoula."

The duo left Missoula seven weeks ago after two weeks of intensive training. Their first show was in Chama, N.M., and they have since done residencies at several other New Mexico and West Texas locations, including Roswell and Ruidoso's Spencer Theatre. They are excited about performing at the Rio Grande Theatre, which they feel is perfect for the intimate folksy style of the play.

"Pinocchio" follows the original fairy tale quite closely with a few exceptions. Clark will take her turn this week as Mrs. Geppetto since both members of the team are female. Bagnall directs after taking her turn as Pinocchio's "mom" last week.

The hardest part of their jobs – indeed the only drawback they can see – is having to turn kids away because so many show up for auditions. At the local auditions, 102 children ages K-12 auditioned for only 60 roles. They were impressed, though, how well those who didn't make it handled the situation."

The two try to make sure the children know it isn't because they aren't any good, but on this particular day they weren't accepted for reasons that don't necessarily have anything to do with them.

"We always wish we could cast them all," Bagnall said.

"But it's a bit of a reality check for them and for us too," Clark continued.

The two are amazed and fully aware that sometimes in smaller communities, MCT might be the only theatrical experience or opportunity some of the children might ever have and many have no idea about what it means to perform in front of an audience.

"At MCT, the focus is on the positive things that theater can do for your life," Clark said. "It's not about making you a fantastic actor – it's about making you a better person."

"At this age, there really isn't a sense of competition – who's better," Bagnall said. "It's more about 'You're good, I'm good, we're all good and it's going to be a great show!""

"We both really like the fact that we are part of a global theater community," Clark said. "It's something you can stand behind."

"It's like the theatrical Peace Corps," they said almost simultaneously.

"It's called 'play' for a reason," Bagnall concluded. "And we get to play every day."

The 60 cast members and student directors should enjoy playing this week as they prepare for performances Friday night, July 29, and Saturday afternoon, July 30.

I remember my son, now a 21-year-old, as a toy soldier in the cast of this same play when he

was 7 years old. Did it necessarily shape who he has become? Well, he drifted away from performing although he has deejayed and been involved in presenting music – and presentational skills are important in his chef-ing/culinary work.

Did it help him with being able to know that if he really tries he can accomplish great things? Probably – although he may not be aware of it. Who knows? Maybe being in "Pinocchio" helped him become a real boy.



Bringing colors to a world with none Author draws inspiration from blind child

"When Michaela came to our house for the first time, the first thing I noticed was her groovy white cane," writer Audrey Hartley said. "It was tricked out with little trinkets and stuffed animals. I had never seen a blind person's cane decorated that way."

The second thing she thought about was how the 4-year-old would maneuver her way through the house with its animal inhabitants – a Rottweiler, rat terrier and three cats.

"Her father said to just lead her through the house one time, and then she was like a bat out of Carlsbad," the writer said. "She just pinged her way around."

Hartley looked at her daughters Blair and Brock – who hadn't been told ahead of time their visitor was blind – as they interacted with Michaela and she was struck by the fact that all three of them had needed to overcome physical obstacles in their short lives. Blair has had to deal with a heart condition and Brock suffered severe hearing loss.

"All three of these children understand what it means to be challenged, but if you look at them you would never know," Hartley said. "That's when I realized we wear our scars mostly on the inside."

After Michaela (who is now 8 years old) left, Hartley and her daughters discussed what sort of challenges the blind child had – the biggest, of course, being that she could not see.

"I asked them how they would describe colors to Michaela," Hartley said, adding the three of them sat in a circle with their eyes closed. "I would call out a color and they would say 'It tastes like this. It smells like this. It feels like this. It sounds like this.' Then I put it all to poetry and there you have it."

Color-matched pages describe the color in terms of the other senses –

"Green is the grass on a warm summer day.

The sound of a bullfrog just croaking away.

Pine trees with needles in a forest so deep.

And chile on food that New Mexicans eat.

It's on parakeets' feathers flashing in flight –

The taste of a lime ... one's lips puckered tight."

Hartley began writing – primarily poetry – when she was a junior in high school. One of her mentors was her grandmother, the iconic New Mexico State University English professor Marion Hardman – for whom Hardman Hall is named.

Hartley graduated from NMSU with a bachelor's degree in journalism and a minor in English, received her master's degree in Communication Studies and became a broadcaster in both television and radio. Hartley has used her broadcasting skills to do the online audio version of the book, which is available with

its purchase. The audio version is also available from Amazon. com and can be ordered as an e-book from Barnes & Noble via their Nook device.

Hartley always told her original stories to her children, and her husband John encouraged her to share her stories with others.

"He even threatened to send them out himself if I didn't start submitting them to publishers," she said.

She began sending the manuscript to publishing companies and experienced her share of rejections. "Colors for Michaela" was eventually picked up by Tate Publishing in Oklahoma. Tate also publishes the "Left Behind" series. "Colors" is brightly illustrated by one of Tate's staff illustrators, Kathy Hoyt.

Hartley has spent a good portion of her professional career working in the hospital and senior living industries.

"I love working with medical professionals," said Hartley, who currently is community relations manager at Mountain-View Regional Medical Center. "But writing is my passion."

Hartley admits to being old school when it comes to her writing process and puts everything down in pen before transferring it to the computer. She hears her story poems in her head much as songwriters hear music and lyrics. The mood may strike her at anytime – recently writing a new book during a layover at the airport in Nashville. She has a number of story ideas she plans to eventually finish and hopes to have published.

One such idea deals with the severely disabled son of a friend, and she marvels at their remarkable ability to rise to the challenges they face and finds that she can learn so much from them.

"I have learned so much from my own disabled children," she said. "What I hate is the thought some people have that disabled people can't teach you anything. To look at my children you would never know that there was ever anything wrong with them, but I have learned more from those kinds of people than anyone else except my grandmother." Uncovering a mother's life in the Middle East 'Incendies' is superlative on all aspects

The Oscar-nominated film "Incendies" succeeds on every level.

The writing, adapted from a stage play, is superlative. The directing is top-notch, and the performances are believable and nuanced. Although it is a heavy drama that takes in part of the "usual" scenario of most films about the Middle East, "Incendies" is much better than that.

Jeanne and Simon are twin sister and brother who live in Canada. Their mother Nawal has died recently, and they are meeting with a notary, who also was their mother's employer and the person she has selected to read her will and make her final wishes come to be.

Her final requests are unusual and puzzling to the twins. The

notary has two letters Nawal wanted delivered to people in her unnamed homeland (the film was partially shot in Jordan, but the story takes us to a more violent and sectarian land) – one to their father, whom the twins thought was dead, and the other to a brother that they never

knew they had.

Disagreements arise. Jeanne, who we can assume was always much closer to her mother than Simon, decides to go back to the homeland to fulfill her mother's wishes and to meet the family she never knew existed.

Simon, thinking his mother was not well when she made these requests, is embarrassed by the requests and refuses to go.

From the start, Jeanne's journey is a mess. Upon arriving at her mother's tiny home village, she quickly discovers that even so many years later, she is a pariah, held in contempt for some unnamed acts for which she has not been forgiven.

As Jeanne's attempts to find solace for her mother's spirit become more difficult, we are taken back via flashback to the years Nawal lived in this country to find out what happened to her, and, to a lesser degree, to "all" of

her children. Nawal's first major

"sin" was being a Christian who fell in love with a Muslim. Even worse, it was during a time of ultra-strict division of religions and a time of violence for those who did not adhere. Nawal's second "sin" was to become

politically motivated to change such things, which eventually leads her down an erroneous path, shall we say.

Imprisoned for her actions, she becomes still another victim of those who feel that their god or gods are better than the god or gods of others. Does anyone's god or gods tell them to kill people because they don't believe the same thing that they do? Not that I know of.

After a fashion, Simon joins Jeanne, as they weave their way closer to the truth with the help of a few – very few – compassionate souls.

The ending of "Incendies" is like none I have seen in many a year of watching movies. At once it is moving and also believable, also shocking and saddening. Nawal's actions are not for naught, we learn, but her life was never easy because she was able to love and not hate (usually).

The title of the film, as quoted by French director Denis Villeneuve, "refers to an inferno that leaves something totally destroyed, totally transformed ... destruction that you cannot change afterwards."

Quite true for this movie of love over hate, common sense over selective religious beliefs and might does not always make right.

Canada's submission earlier this year for the Academy Award for best foreign film, "Incendies" is the film I believe should have won from the list of nominees.

It is intense and vigorous and not to be missed.

On the 'Road to Nowhere' Film is Hellman's first in 21 years

FILM REVIEW

"Incendies" opens Friday, July 29, at the Fountain Theatre. It is rated R and runs for about 130 minutes in French, English and Arabic, subtitled as needed.

The CineMatinee for 1:30 p.m. Saturday, July 30, is "Road to Nowhere" (2011, 120 minutes, rated R).

Monte Hellman's first feature film in 21 years is one of his finest and deepest, comparable to his 1971 masterpiece, "Two Lane Blacktop." "Road to Nowhere" displays this director's trademark virtues – an elegant compositional eye, tough-minded thematic sense and sharp sensitivity to what goes unspoken between people, especially in moments of deepest feeling – with such energy that movie lovers and critics should embrace it on the festival circuit.

Possessed of the same qualities that have given long life to Hellman films such as "The Shooting" (1966), "Ride the Whirlwind" (1966), "Cockfighter" (1974) and "Iguana" (1988), the film toys right away with expectations: An opening credit reads "Directed by Mitchell Haven." One might wonder fleetingly, "Is Hellman directing this under a pseudonym?" Instead, we are meeting protagonist Haven a young filmmaker coping with a maze of catastrophic events that plague a small picture he is directing in North Carolina.

Such film-within-a-film tropes are never overdone; Hellman teases with skill. We're seduced into watching Haven's crime picture inspired by a so-called "true story" about a murder-disappearance involving a wealthy couple and a subsequent intrigue over some

missing cash.


The plot keeps you hooked, but a more compelling line of tension emerges in the foreground, as the young director falls prey to a passionate fascination with his leading lady, a new actress who is fond of declaring "I'm not an actress." Yet her performance in Haven's film is so vivid that certain onlookers wonder whether she is the actual femme fatale from the original crime who's still missing, and whether she is cleverly hiding center stage, so to speak, under this ultimate false identity.

What keeps "Road to Nowhere" rooted in feeling as opposed to intellect are an outstanding ensemble of players, with particular attention owed to the trio at its heart.

With his air of intellect and his easy, romantic-tough-guy vibe, lead actor Tyghe Runyan brings to mind the virtues of the late Warren Oates, who did his best work with Hellman, beautifully reinforcing the sense that "Road to Nowhere" is but the latest in a still-growing, fully alive body of work.

CineMatinee is a unique blend of movies presented by the Mesilla Valley Film Society which showcases unique films, past and present, often with an emphasis on life in the West – which could mean the new West, the Old West or anything in between – and "movies that missed us" – films that are notable, but never had a lot of publicity.

The series is designed to show area residents that film is a form of art and education as well as



entertainment. At least one film a month for this series has a New Mexico connection, drawing from the vast pool of movies made in the state (nearly 500) or perhaps featuring a star/story from New Mexico talent ... film festival-quality movies in an old adobe theater.



I'm just an old softie ...

Especially when it comes to tacos By David Edwards

I have become a soft taco nut lately. I always liked them before – hey, it's Mexican food – but my recent increase in favoring them can only be attributed to a recent focus on trying to make more healthy choices in my eating.

As much as I love flour tortillas, fried corn tortillas and all the other delicious, but problematic healthwise, ingredients (hello there, cheese!) I have tried to make some right decisions.

Little corn tortillas – not fried; grilled meats, especially chicken and seafood; plenty of chile, of course, and other fresh ingredients, such as cilantro and pico de gallo; these are all better choices when it comes to Mexican food. Just don't expect me to ever give up the fried, saucy and cheesy dishes – enchiladas, burritos, tostada chips and regular tacos.

Sergio Almaraz, co-owner of El Taco Mexicano #2, may have just what the doctor or dietitian ordered. The restaurant offers a variety of soft tacos – along with burritos, quesadillas, flautas and something called a sope, which is like a gordita with the good stuff on top rather than stuffed inside. There is also all-you-can-eat menudo on Saturdays and Sundays.

The Almaraz brothers have been offering their variety of tacos at the Solano Drive location since 1999. They opened the Mariscos Taco Mexicano on North Main Street in 1996 after coming to Las Cruces from California. The North Main location offers Mexican seafood dishes, while #2's menu features beef, pork and chicken tacos. There isn't anything too distinctive about the majority of taco filling choices. Al pastor is shepherd's style in Spanish and the meat is usually spit-roasted pork. Carnitas are braised or roasted pork - usually shoulder cuts. Carne asada is thinly sliced, grilled, marinated beef. Pollo is chicken of course, but here's where El Taco Mexicano changes things up a bit. They feature a pollo adovada. Now adovada is traditionally pork marinated in red chile but this is a delicious

Get ready to go really off the board here. El Taco Mexicano serves up cabesa or cabeza meat, which is literally from the head of the cow – more precisely its cheek. The beef is very lean compared to some other cuts. I have only seen it offered in a



few places around town.

But the menu item that really distinguishes the restaurant from anyplace else is the Taco de Lengua (tongue). Most people think tongue must be tough, but this braised meat is very tender and flavorful. Don't be put off, give it a try.

El Taco Mexicano has some excellent horchata (rice water drink) and a very vummy melon (cantaloupe) drink as well as lemonade and sodas.

The tacos are very basic in their presentation. They come to the table with nothing on them except the meat filling in the center of the great little corn tortillas. It's up to you to add your extras, including a couple types of salsa, onions, cilantro, lime and pico. There are some killer grilled jalapeños as well.

My dear mother has often spoken highly of El Taco Mexicano and their cute, little corn tortillas. She wasn't very adventurous on our visit - sticking to the combination plate which comes with two choices of meat tacos, rice and beans. She tried the pork al pastor and the beef asada tacos.

Sis went for the pollo adovada and kept it simple by getting four of the same and several horchata refills. She really loaded up on the salsa bar items. Tacos are \$1.25 each or four for \$4.50 and everything else is very reasonably priced.

Girlfriend chose one each of the asada, al pastor, pollo and lengua. I was the beneficiary of the asada she couldn't finish and a couple of mom's as well.

I tried to go for a little variety with carnitas, pollo adovada, cabesa and lengua, and I think I at least temporarily satisfied my soft taco cravings

El Taco Mexicano #2 is a very

modest place, recognizable as a former Taco Bell. The Almarazes are trving to sell the small North Main location and consolidate the two. expanding the Solano restaurant to include the seafood items in a larger dining area.

Have I mentioned how hooked I am on shrimp tacos and grilled fish tacos? Well, let me tell you ...





'Captain America (the Beautiful)'

'The First Avenger' is promising prelude to series Review by **David Edwards** A major complaint I had with "Thor" – as

I have been keeping my fingers crossed that the upcoming comic book movie "The Avengers" was going to be cool. The path which leads to that super-hero success has been something of an up-and-down journey so far.

"Iron Man" – particularly the first installment – has been rock solid, due mostly to the presence of Robert Downey Jr. in the title role.

I enjoyed "The Incredible Hulk" but it received mixed reviews. Grossing more than \$260 million worldwide didn't automatically assure a sequel, and star/screenwriter Edward Norton walked away from the franchise. He has been replaced by Mark Ruffalo, and I wonder if it really matters who plays Bruce Banner – the human scientist who becomes the green goliath.

Bombast seemed to dominate at least the first third of "Thor" – but after all we were talking about Norse gods so I guess that was somewhat necessary. It took too long to get to the meat of the story – his encounters with earthlings and ... all right I'll admit it ... Natalie Portman.

Up to this point I was hanging in about 50/50 on the optimism scale but then a red, white and blue hero tipped the scales in a favorable direction.

"Captain America: The First Avenger" hit the screens this past weekend and it was highly entertaining.

I had my doubts when I first saw the trailer. It seemed a bit too retro – Cap's uniform was too baggy and not form-fitting enough. It reminded me of the old Superman and Batman serials before it was possible to make our comic book heroes possess the overdeveloped musculature of the drawings.

But I stopped thinking about that fairly quickly as I got swept up in the story and the uniform even seemed appropriate to the time period. Cap's look will likely be updated for "The Avengers." I ultimately was grateful that he didn't look like the likely computer-aided body sported by Ryan Reynolds in "Green Lantern." A major complaint I had with "Thor" – as I mentioned above – was that the back story took too much time away from the "good parts." I found myself acknowledging that "Captain America" is about 99 percent back story. But it wasn't the least bit pretentious and was much more down-and-dirty accessible as we track how Steve Rogers went from 98-pound weakling to super soldier and all-American hero.

The film opens with a mysterious aircraft being discovered buried in the ice and the uncovering of Captain America's famous shield. We then flash back to the '40s and Rogers' various attempts to enlist in the Army despite his obvious physical shortcomings.

Chris Evans – who already had his shot at comic book super stardom as the Fantastic Four's Human Torch Johnny Storm – is right on target as Rogers. He is aided considerably in the early going by the special effects wizardry that allowed Brad Pitt to go from old man to youngster in "The Curious Case of Benjamin Button." Evans' head does occasionally look too big for his scrawny body but the early sequences before he is given the super soldier serum don't take up much of the film and the effect doesn't draw much attention to itself.

I won't go into why because it would be a bit of a spoiler, but Rogers ends up being the only soldier of his kind and one of the more enjoyable and amusing sections of the film involve his superior abilities being wasted as he travels about with a group of chorus girls stumping for war bonds. He soon tires of that and takes it upon himself to rescue a group of prisoners who are being forced to work for the secret Nazi terrorist division known as Hydra. ("Cut one head off, two more take its place.")

Hydra is led by Johann Schmidt aka the Red Skull (played with his usual menacing aplomb by Hugo Weaving). Schmidt has acquired a strange supernatural energy force which somehow originated with Odin. (Dang those pesky Norse Gods anyway!)

Rogers recruits a rowdy group of Allied soldiers from among those he rescues and along with his Brooklyn buddy Sgt. James

"Bucky" Barnes begins destroying Hydra's bases. The Red Skull – who was the first subject of the super soldier serum in an earlier less successful version – begins hatching plans that go beyond even what Der Führer has in mind and goes off the evil genius mastermind deep end. The inevitable final confrontation between Captain America and the Red Skull looms of course.

Evans is ably supported by Sebastian Stan as Bucky, Dominic Cooper as Howard Stark (yes, the father of Tony Stark aka Iron Man), Stanley Tucci as good scientist Abraham Erskine and Tommy Lee Jones – providing some needed humor and gruffiness as Col. Chester Phillips. The va-va-va-voom factor is supplied by Hayley Atwell as the veddy, veddy British and veddy, veddy beautiful agent Peggy Carter. The courtship between Carter and Rogers contains the only clunky dialogue but

it's easy to see why Cap would want to take her for a twirl on the dance floor. For those who had their doubts about Captain America, all I can say is "Talk to the





I'm not typically an emotional person (my family may beg to differ), but a recent trip to the Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley nearly had me in tears.

Meeting with Executive Director Dr. Beth Vesco-Mock, she told me how many animals they had killed in June alone and took me on a tour, telling me that the ones who didn't come to the gates eagerly probably wouldn't make it through week's end because they just weren't happy there, or maybe they were getting sick.

The whole situation is sad, and it seems like there's nothing you or I can do about it. I have to admit, I'm one of those people who drives away from the situation and purposely forgets about it.

But there is something that we can do.

The shelter is in desperate, desperate need of volunteers to help walk the dogs. You can see just how often a dog gets walked through the "enrichment board" hanging in one of the kennels. Consisting of a table with all the dogs' names and the days of the week, the enrichment board will tell you that four or five dogs have been walked maybe once during this week. The shelter also has dog runs that have plenty of space for dogs to get exercise, but they're simply not being used.

It's not something the staff at the ASCMV can handle, since they only have a few things to do - you know, like everything else you can possibly imagine. But it's something that volunteers can do.

With less than a hundred active volunteers, Dr. Beth said that number is simply not enough.

There are places that have (700) or 800 volunteers," she said. "We need that here."

And it's not the staff who needs it. It's the dogs. Imagine having to be confined to a space – there's plenty of room to walk around - without having ample space to run, jump and be a dog. And it's perfect for those of us who can't handle having a pet, either because of space, time or other reasons. We can volunteer for an hour or so a day, walk and play with dogs and return to our regular schedule. If you walk along Triviz Drive, and you'd like to volunteer, there are plenty of trails around the shelter where you can walk the dog. You can even bring your kids along for the ride. What kids don't like animals?

You're happy. Puppy's happy. Kid's happy. And so is Dr. Beth.

In New Mexico, one of four residents receive health care through the Medicaid program, which Squier's presentation projects to result in state Medicaid spending accounting for 16 percent of this

year's budget. The federal government pays for 69 percent of the Medicaid costs, with state government picking up the rest, according to Squier's presentation to attendees. The Associated Press puts the combined Medicaid spending in New Mexico at about \$4 billion this year.

According to Squier's presentation, about 550,000 New Mexicans

are enrolled in Medicaid, which includes those in the State Coverage Insurance (SCI) program. About 335,000 are children. Squier's Medicaid moderniza-

tion is guided by four principles: Develop and implement a

One step at a time ASCMV inching toward its goals

For the public, it's hard news to take. In June alone, the Animal Services Center took in 1,600 animals. That month, 1,100 animals were euthanized.

The statistics are grim for outsiders look-ing in, but for ASCMV Executive Director Dr. Beth Vesco-Mock, they're better numbers than before.

"We don't just spend our time up here kill-ing," she said. "We've dropped the euthanasia rate by 20 percent since I came here in 2008."

Amid negative press and rumors, Dr. Beth – as the community has come to know her - said the negative feedback sometimes has her walking through the shelter's wards observing the animals and wondering if she's failing in her responsibilities as executive director.

"Am I making a mistake?" Vesco-Mock asked, gesturing toward the five crates she has in her office for small, sick dogs. "It's either the crate or the garbage bag, but once they're dead, they can never get a forever home. Here, they have playmates."

Since Vesco-Mock took over operations of the city- and county-owned shelter, the animals have more playmates than usual. In the adoptable wards for larger dogs, there are two to a kennel and five per dog run in the newer, medium-sized adoption ward. Vesco-Mock also added an outdoor kennel for new intakes and litters, kept separately from the general population to ward off disease.

Those who contract diseases are not immediately euthanized, either. Using the former residence owned by the Doña Ana County Humane Society, Vesco-Mock said the ASCMV was able to purchase the home and transform it into an infirmary. Not only are the animals in the infirmary separated from the general population, but they're provided with ample space to exercise, and nearly every animal greeted the executive director with loud barks, tail wags and whimpers.

"I seriously look at the animals, and you can tell who is not happy here," she said dur-ing a tour. As she rattled the gates, the dogs eagerly greeted her, except for the few who curled up in the corner or merely looked up. "Those are the ones who usually go."

It's a harsh reality for the staff of the ASCMV and a decision Vesco-Mock has to make on a daily basis.

"It's a very tough decision," she said. "Some decisions are based on behavior. Oh yeah, a lot are rehab-able, but not in this environment or with the intake we have.

Skimming the surface

To lower the euthanasia rates and address overpopulation, the shelter has held more than 100 off-site adoption events and "special" adoptions, such as the inaugural My Furry Valentine and Fourth of July-themed events.

"We're making great progress," Vesco-Mock said. "We're working hard to get these animals adopted."

Other animals are kept off-site in a foster program, with 30 to 35 active fostering partners caring for 90 to 110 animals at any given time. Another 250 animals are in the fosterto-adopt program. These animals are "extremely young," Vesco-Mock said, and they are fostered for 30 days to ensure that they build an immune system so that they are able to undergo the sterilization procedure.

Vesco-Mock also works with the three breed rescue programs in Las Cruces and others throughout the region to get animals together.

Addressing the high intake and the challenges at the shelter is just skimming the surface of the problem, which is a community issue, Vesco-Mock said.

Before taking on the daunting challenge of teaching responsible pet ownership to the entire community, Vesco-Mock started with changing the culture in the shelter. She increased the staffing greatly, she said, after discovering some unnerving practices. She found the staff didn't feed the ani-

mals until 3 p.m. because they were under the impression of "Why feed them if we're going to kill them?"

They would just go down the line, and if their three days was up, they were eutha-nized," she said. "I let it happen for a couple of days, but on May 1, when they were going down the list, I said, 'What do you think you're doing?'

"I changed the building from a culture of death to a culture of life. We think how can we help these animals live, not how soon can we kill them."

By changing the expectations of every worker and enforcing the fact that each is an animal caregiver, Vesco-Mock said she praises her staff "up one side and down the other" for saving lives.

She's also in the "discussion phase" of updating animal control policy when it comes to picking up stray animals officers know come from a home, and she's pushing for more own-



5,000 a year," she said. "Since the program started in August 2009, we've done 2,600. It's a lot, but there's more to do."

When it comes to owner surrenders, there is no consequence, and Vesco-Mock said she'd like to see that changed as well.

"We gotta focus on lowering our intake," she said, "and part of that is pet retention by owner. Now, there's no charge, and I'd love to see that change because taxpayers are paying for that."

Under fire

Despite the progress Vesco-Mock said the shelter has made, there are still some who are critical of its practices.

Frank Bryce, president of the Humane Society of the Southern New Mexico and owner of the Doggie Dude Ranch, said there is a philosophy that comes out of the shelter management that adds to the issues found at the shelter - an issue he has seen in his nearly 20 years of animal advocacy in Las Cruces.

"Air conditioning, medical protocol and the public's response, those in my opinion have been ignored by leadership for so many years, and it has become euthanized," Bryce said. 'Our own leadership hasn't set the example.'

Bryce said the shelter not only has a problem with handling the animal population in the shelter, but he said the humane society has found that the number of reported missing and stolen animals has increased "sevenfold" - from 11 in 2008 to 72 in 2010.

"There's a real issue there. No one has investigated it or taken adequate steps to prevent it. What is happening here?" he said. "We were told – and this came from a person in administration - that that is only .01 percent of the animals in the shelter, as if that was OK. Those animals may well belong to a family."

While he said he agrees the problem as a whole is pet responsibility from the community, Bryce said there are completely separate issues that are created by the animal shelter alone

"It's such a convoluted mess of different circumstances," he said. "What's the definition of hoarding? Overwhelmed caregiving. You don't have the money, the time, the resources and the animals begin suffer. That's exactly what's going on there. I think it's very ineffective fiscal management of resources, ineffective medical protocols and overwhelmed caregiving.

"They're doing the best they can, but the problem is their very best just is not good enough. Their best is something that I would fire people for."

A positive attitude

ative reviews - she even jokes that someone wants her fired every other month - she said she doesn't view her work as a thankless job. That's because she doesn't focus on the death of animals, but instead the happy endings.

'I love my job, I love saving lives," she said. "I don't do this for accolades from humans, I do this for the animals. Many have an opinion of what I should be or what could be, but they don't know. They're not here. How many lives have they saved?"

While she's not looking for praise, Vesco-Mock said she finds it - everywhere she goes from complete strangers who recognize her face from articles in the paper.

"I greatly appreciate the support and I have faith in the community," she said. "I am a public servant, and I'm here to do what I feel the public wants me to do.

"I said I wanted (the ASCMV to be a no-kill shelter) in five to seven years. I don't know if we're going to make it. But we'll get there as long as I have the support of the community.

Making strides

Here are a few of the ASCMV's accomplishments since its creation in 2008:

- Creation of a 230-plus page Policies and Operating Procedures Manual, which utilizes modern disinfection chemicals and techniques recommended by national experts who have been brought on-site to provide their expertise to administration and staff.
- Creation and renovation of a separate infirmary to house and treat canines with upper respiratory infections. The building also allows recovering animals to receive exercise and socialization in large open-air enclosures for more than 10 hours each day.
- Installation of an industrial washer and dryer.
- Hiring of a full-time groomer.
- Installation of an industrial dish washer, which allows staff to clean and disinfect a large number of food and water dishes.
- Installation of seamless flooring ideal for disinfection throughout the general cat population ward, adoptable cat ward and exam and surgical room.
- Construction of an initial impoundment ward where dogs are scanned, collared, vaccinated and de-wormed before entering general population.
- Construction of an additional adoption ward where 25 medium-size adoptable dogs can be housed.
- Construction of six large open-air canine enrichment yards, where volunteers can take long-term canine residents to run and fetch and receive socialization.
- Installation and renovation of a surgical suite that has been used to perform more than 2,600 affordable sterilizations for members of the public. That does not include all of the sterilizations performed on our shelter animals.
- The ASCMV in now a Veterinary Facility licensed by the New Mexico Board of Veterinary Medicine.
- Creation of a foster-to-adopt program, which allows animals to be removed from the shelter setting and be placed into foster homes where they can receive one-on-one attention and become fully immunized.
- Renovation of the SA ward, euthanasia room and dish room, including sealed floors and walls ideal for cleaning and disinfection. Further renovations are in the works.
- Set up rescue transport partnerships with agencies as far away as Denver, which has resulted in more than 2,300 animals transferred out of the shelter to rescue organizations.
- More than 100 off-site adoption events in the community each year.
- Held educational lectures for sixth-grade classes and community civil groups.
- Installation of a modern security system throughout the facility
- Maintain between 30 and 40 foster homes at all times, which care for between 90 and 100 animals at any given time
- Maintain between 80 and 120 active volunteers. • The ASCMV has made the first real and promising
- attempt at updating the ordinances used by the two local animal control agencies; currently being reviewed by the ASCMV Board of Directors to then be passed on to the corresponding legislative bodies.
- In 2010, periodic radio interviews on the subject of pet ownership responsibilities were conducted with the executive director.
- Televised interviews about pet ownership responsibilities on the "Animal Talk with Dr. Beth" show, which aired on the Las Cruces Channel.






Friday, July 29, 2011 Share the road Motorists may be unaware of hazards posed to cyclists

A number of people, most of them well meaning, have asked me why I often ride in the automobile traffic lane rather than on the berm marked off by the right side white line. This deserves an answer.

Since the majority of motorists don't cycle, they are unfamiliar with hazards that exist alongside curbs and even in marked bicycle lanes. Unfortunately, we see very little maintenance on the edge of roads. Cars stay in the marked auto lanes, and that action helps to clean those lanes. Therefore, gutters tend to become glutted with all sorts of debris. On a recent Wednesday, I kept track of the mess on the side of the road during a 25-mile ride outside of the city.

Here's my inventory: coins (mostly pennies but an occasional quarter or nickel – I'll stop for quarters); paper clips; base plates for electrical outlets; wires; string; rope; spark plugs; strips of metal or chrome from cars; aluminum cans; beer and other bottles, both whole and broken to bits; cardboard of all sorts; newspapers and other paper goods, like magazines; garbage bags full, empty or broken open; nails,

screws, bolts, nuts and washers of various sizes; lots of Styrofoam cups; one Phillips-head screwdriver that I stopped to retrieve; and the usual gravel, sand and other road rubble you'd expect. Unfortunately, we find lots of broken glass from motorists who carelessly throw beer bottles out the window, and they shatter on the curb.

I don't expect motorists to recall the side of the road gets no traffic. Because this absence of traffic is true, however,

the cracks across the automobile lanes get worn down and flattened out by traffic, especially in hot seasons, but not on the sides. One small example is Avenida de Mesilla from the railroad tracks by Bosa Donuts west to Valley Drive. The road surface is good and flat and poses no problems. The side of the road, however, which has a decent wide berm for cyclists, is cracked and bumpy. Six inches inside the roadbed, it's flat and smooth.

Culverts and drains pose a separate problem, so cyclists often weave around them, carefully. This may confuse motorists who don't think about such things as obstacles and may think you are weaving into their lane.

With all these hazards, is it really any wonder that cyclists prefer to ride in the traffic lanes rather than off on the side?


Rain raises other issues. I have ridden the City to Shore MS 150 (it's actually 170 miles most years) from exurban Philadelphia to Wildwood, N.J., along with about 7,000 other folks. In years when it rains in late September, the berm becomes hazardous for tires. One year there was so much rain

that my friends at my local bike shop said they fixed at least a hundred flats.

They were but one of many shops volunteering service for riders. Flats occur because all that little junk on the side of the road – especially bits of wire and ground glass – mixes with the rain and becomes a gritty soup that eats right through your tires. That's one more reason we ride in traffic lanes, admittedly a bit extreme and removed from New Mexico, but still worthy of consideration, especially during our rainy season.

So motorists, when you see folks riding in the automobile lanes, please don't think we are trying to pretend we are cars. We're just avoiding the junk that you rarely, if ever, see alongside the roads we all share. Just give us a break, and we will all try to be careful out there. Share the road.

Way more than just a thrift store Catholic Charities Executive Di-Catholic Charities spread smiles and positivity

Making a difference in people's lives is, for some, the best reason to get up in the morning.

That is what volunteering for the Catholic Charities store of Las Cruces provides for Alfonso Simental, a legally blind man who has been turned away from other businesses due to his disability.

"I love this place, my managers and co-workers are very supportive of me," said a smiling Simental.

As part of his responsibilities, Simental works at the front of the store greeting and helping customers as well as sorting through the donated items.

The Catholic Charities Store is a nonprofit organization that seeks to give back to the community by accepting a wide range of new and used items and refurbishing them at low prices.

Walking along the aisles, small strips of orange tape may catch the eye, which is just one way in which Simental said his co-workers help him out.

"The bright colors help me see where I'm going so I can walk around

on my own," said Simental of feeling the independence from relying on others.

Glancing around the store will reveal clothes, furniture, household wares, home appliances, a soon-tobe children's corner filled with books

and toys and many other hidden treasures.

One area of the store is dubbed the "marketplace," dedicated to selling the unique and homemade crafts of vendors from the Southwestern as well as six different areas in Mexico.

rector Claudia Moncada-Trueblood said these special items may seem expensive compared to the "secondhand" sections of the store, but the story behind their creation is worth the price.

Ever-persistent violence in southwestern border towns is making it increasingly difficult for vendors who rely on tourism to sell their goods and, Moncada-Trueblood said, selling their goods is a great opportunity for these businesses to enterprise.

Filled with intricately designed aprons, tablecloths, placemats, backpacks and more, every item is handmade and different in its own way.

'Our goal is to eventually work with other Catholic Charities around the country to create opportunity for more vendors in the area who are struggling," said an ambitious Moncada-Trueblood .

Another big emphasis the store promotes is to always "reuse and recycle," said Store Manager Araceli Landeros, as she pointed out all the different recycle bins the store separates things that cannot be used

"Most things are sorted into different departments, so we try to make it as easy as possible for people to find what they are looking for,"

Even with hardworking volunteers such as Simental, the No. 1 thing the store is in desperate need of, Landeros said, is more volunteers.

As a line formed outside the door waiting for opening time, Landeros said the store usually stays busy throughout the day and the need for help is strong.

'Even someone giving one hour of their time can help out more than they would ever know," Landeros said.

The store also offers a pickup service on Saturdays, in which a truck is sent out to collect donation items of a larger nature.

The Catholic Charities services 10 counties in southern New Mexico, providing a range of services to those in need including legal services, social action, emergency assistance, financial education and networking. Both Landeros and Moncada-

Trueblood said one of their best moments of working for the Catholic Charities is when someone is happy from finding something they otherwise wouldn't be able to afford, which happens nearly every day.

"We can't forget the reason for the store, is to help those that really just wouldn't be able to afford (to buy things) anywhere else," Landeros said.





comprehensive, coordinated service delivery system

- Personal responsibility
- Pay for performance

 Administrative simplicity Squier described the goal of the first principle as creating the second genera-tion of managed care for Medicaid. She acknowledged there is a passionate split about whether behavioral health services should be part of that managed care system or dealt with separately. She said there are too many Medicaid providers, which puts an administrative burden on her department.

As for personal responsibility, Squier said she and her staff are "playing around" with a concept much like a savings account to encourage preventative and healthy choices, such as prenatal care or quitting smoking.

When a patient goes to the doctor over and over and doesn't get better, the Medicaid spending needs to be justified, she said in framing the pay for performance guideline.

On the administrative level, Squier described federal Medicaid regulations "are as convoluted and complex as the IRS," which is why New Mexico's system is operating under 12 waivers. Having that many waivers also consumes administrative services, she said.

Squier said her goal is make it so the state's Medicaid program is operating only under one waiver, while still retaining flexibility.

The New Mexico Health Department announced that a 23-year-old man from McKinley County has died from hantavirus pulmonary syndrome (HPS). This is the fourth case of HPS in New Mexico this year.

"We extend our sympathy to this gentleman's family and friends," said Cabinet Secretary Dr. Catherine Torres. "I am advising all New Mexicans to follow our prevention guidelines to keep themselves and their families safe, as HPS can be a serious and sometimes fatal disease."

"It is important to remember that the best defense against hantavirus is to avoid disturbing areas of rodent infestation, including nests and droppings, and to air out cabins and sheds before entering them."

The three previous cases this year are a 51-year-old woman from McKinley County reported in January and a 35-year-old man from Torrance County reported in May, both fatal; and a 39-year-old man from McKinley County in May who recovered. In 2010, there were two cases, both from McKinley County and both recovered. In 2009, New Mexico had four cases of HPS, none fatal, from Santa Fe, Taos, San Miguel and Rio Arriba counties. In 2008, New Mexico had two cases of HPS, both fatal, from Taos and Otero counties.

Adoptions will take place from 8 a.m. to noon at the Las Cruces Farmers & Crafts Market along Downtown Main Street. From 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., adoptions also will be facilitated at Pet's Barn, 1600 S. Valley Drive. From 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., adoptions also will be facilitated at The Gold Store, 3530 Foothills Road.

Adoption fees are \$75 for dogs/puppies and \$50 for cats/kittens. The fee includes the first set of vaccinations, spay/neuter and microchip. At the Pet's Barn event, microchipping for pets that already have homes will be available to the public for \$20, and city pet licenses will be available to neutered pets for \$5 each. Licenses for un-neutered pets are \$25 each. Proof of spay/ neuter is required before a \$5 license will be issued. Pet owners also must bring current proof of rabies vaccination for each animal to be licensed.

The Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley also offers low-cost spay/neuter operations at the rate of \$35 for dogs and \$25 for cats. Appointments can be scheduled by calling the shelter offices.







The 2011 Spring Showcase of Homes dis-played a variety of lavish homes scattered throughout the Mesilla Valley, including a contemporary Southwest abode located off Dripping Springs Road at 8705 Regal Mist Court.

A lone house standing on the left hand side of the road, the Capron Builders & Design Co. creation was finished in April and consists of 2,566 square feet of refined detail and comfortable living.

"It has a great livability," said Tom Capron, owner of the homebuilding company. "You walk in and it feels open and pleasant."

Looking for a reasonably priced lot that offered a scenic surrounding, Capron found just the place in the Desert Mirage subdivision, located near the base of the Organ Mountains.

"Desert Mirage offered the best views and the best value," Capron said. "It's a great location. I bought four lots (in the subdivision)."

Wanting to take full advantage of the oneof-a-kind view, Capron

designed and built the home to feature the Organ Mountains in almost every room.

He oriented the house so as to maximize the views," said Realtor Christi Koch of Exit Realty Horizons, who represents the listing. "He put a lot of thought into the design of this home."

Building in a variety of styles, from Tuscan to Southwest, Capron said he chose to do something a little different with the home on Regal Mist.

'I wanted to create a style out there that was architecturally pleasing," Capron said. "It's Southwest mixed with some Anasazi elements. It's something different and unique."

The gravel driveway leads past a short rock wall that encloses the courtyard, which includes a few native plants and a view of the valley. Anasazi-influenced angular columns and art deco elements are found on the façade of the home, which Capron said are carried inside as well.

Surrounding the large front door is a unique decorative border, a composite piece created by Capron's other company, Architectural Elements.

The front door, which Koch said was painted in a patina that makes it look old and rustic, leads to the entrance. Separated by a short partition, the entrance leads to the formal living and dining room.

"(The partition) divides the room up, but allows you to walk in and still see the view," Koch said. **66** It's a very

"You can do several types of furniture set-ups," Capron said. "It's a very flexible space. There are a lot of things you can do with this floor plan. It's a very versatile floor plan."

The formal living room features large windows to incorporate the outside indoors. Not skipping on the detail, the windowsills are lined with stone, adding an extra visual touch, Koch said.

"Tom is very detail oriented," she said.

Featuring the home's only fireplace, the mantel - in addition to the ceilings crown molding - were also created by Architectural Elements.

Also lined in large picture windows, the formal dining room features a stylish ceiling treatment of slices of cream-colored brick laid in a diagonal pattern accented in wood beams.

The area leads into the kitchen, which opens up to the informal living room. Granite covers the countertops as custom-made alder cabinets line the kitchen. A tumbled stone backsplash connects to a large slab of granite under the hood. A hallway beside the kitchen leads to the two-car garage and an abundance of storage.

"He makes great use of the space, nothing is wasted," Koch said.

Stacked shelves accented in a stone detail can be found in the informal living room.

The living room features a built-in enter-tainment unit with room for a wide-screen TV and staggered shelves lined in the stone found throughout the home.

Designed in a split floor plan, the master bedroom is located off the master suite.

"It has a split floor plan, so the areas are segregated yet open," Capron said. "There is a lot of space.

Accented in the same crown molding, the large master bedroom includes a door to the back patio, two walk-in closets and a linen closet strategically hidden behind a full-length mirror.

The bathroom, encased in porcelain tile, includes a jetted bathtub resting between two granite-covered sinks. A nicho lined in stone rests around the relaxing bathing area. The room is finished with a freestanding shower. Unique in design, the shower includes tumbled stone laid in varying patterns.

"The master bathroom has a nice layout and use of space," Capron said. "There is a lot of room for two people."

On the other side of the kitchen, along a hallway that leads past a curved wall, are the other two bedrooms as well as another bathroom.

The use of space continues outdoors. Located on 1 acre, Koch said the house features a large patio, designed to maximize the view and entertainment opportunities.

"It's made into another living space," Koch said.

"The back patio is designed so it's protected from the western elements - the western sun and wind," Capron said. "That way you can enjoy it year-round. You're out of the wind and sun, and still have that view."

Surrounding the patio is a combination of rock and desert-plant landscaping connected to a drip system. By incorporating the New Mexico landscape with the home's living space, Koch said Capron has creating an inviting residence

'The quality of his building and the quality of his design with the views makes this home one-of-a-kind for this area," Koch said.

The mythical 'drac'

Dragonflies keep on going after all these years

The dragonfly is rare in the insect world: It doesn't bite or sting humans, and it doesn't cause problems during the harvest season. It's a good bug. Instead, dragonflies hover around water and help control the mosquito population by eating the biting insects.

Dragonflies have been flying around for about 300 million years, in fact there are fossils with wingspans of 26 inches, imagine that! They were here when dinosaurs ruled the Earth, and today there are about 6,000 species of dragonflies in all shapes and sizes. Certain species are known to have flight speeds up to nearly 60 miles per hour.

When it comes to mating, a mature male dragonfly establishes his own territory by chasing out other males from his area. Then, like most any other girl-boy tale, he meets a female dragonfly with whom he will mate. After he fertilizes her eggs, many females break hearts and leave the male. But there are other couples that stay together and fly in formation one in front of the other as she goes about laying her eggs.

Female dragonflies lay eggs in or near water, often on floating plants. When laying eggs, some species will immerse themselves in water completely.

Immature dragonflies spend their lives beneath the water's surface, using internal gills to breathe, and extendable jaws to catch other invertebrates or even vertebrates such as tadpoles and fish.

As for the name, there is an interesting theory about its origin, according to researchers at Texas A&M University. The name dragonfly actually came about because of an ancient Romanian folktale.



Dragonflies have been around for millions of years and even have a place in Romanian folktale.

In the folktale, the devil turned a beautiful horse belonging to St. George into a giant flying insect. The names used by the Romanians for the giant insect when translated into English means "St. George's Horse" or the "Devil's Horse."

The Romanian word for devil "drac" also means dragon. Eventually, when it was translated into English, the name dragonfly stuck.

So next time you're out, try and find one and watch it. It's quite a striking and harmless insect with a story behind its name.

You can balance the changing sunlight of an eastern exposure with a mix of colors. And neutral colors will create a soothing effect in a west-facing room that captures the sun's fading light in the late afternoon and early evening.

When choosing colors that will relate well to a room's natural light, remember that the color will look different in your home than it does on the paint chip or in the home decor store. By keeping these rules of thumb in mind, you'll be able to select color families that are most likely to work well with a room's natural light.

Garden hose gets a few new tricks

Different ways to use this old greenthumb accessory ^{By Beth Sitzler}

With rain clouds surrounding Las Cruces, teasing the area with showers, you may still need to use your trusted garden hose to nourish your plants if the drops don't fall.

A simple flexible tube of synthetic rubber or soft plastic, the garden hose is a staple of most backyards and is possibly the easiest way to transport water from the spigot to your plants.

hose is typically found in green or black. Over time, the color can fade and the material can begin to crack. If it's time to retire your garden hose and replace it with a shiny new one, reuse the old hose in some new and creative ways.

1. Scare away pesky birds: If our feathered friends are making a mess in your yard or garden, give them a good spook by making a decoy out of an old garden hose. Replicate their natural predator, the snake, by cutting a short length of the hose and laying it in on the grass or along your garden. Make sure it is in a snake-like position – the birds won't be able to tell the difference and will stay clear.

2. Stabilize a tree: That same short length of garden hose can also help you tie a young tree to a stake for added support. The hose will be flexible enough to bend in the wind when the tree does, while remaining strong enough to keep it standing on its own. An added bonus, the hose is soft enough and has some give so it won't damage the bark of the tree as it grows.

3. Pad the chains of a swing set: The chains of a swing will keep the play thing strong and intact, but it can also pinch and be hot to the touch after baking out in the hot summer sun. Protect your kids' hands by covering the swing chain in an old garden hose. Measure the chair and cut a portion of the hose to fit, making sure to cut off the nozzle. Next, unhook the end of the chain and slip the hose over it. If you can't detach the chain, simply cut a slit up the middle of the hose and slip it over the chain. Close the slit with a few strips of duct tape.

4. Protect your sharp blades: Whether a handsaw or ice skates, these utensils need to have the sharpest blade possible to properly get their job done. Left exposed, the blades can become dull from being knocked around. A good way to stop this from happening is to transform an old garden hose into a sheath. Using a portion of the hose slit it up the length and place it over the blade. This trick will work on any blade needing protection.

5. Get a grip: At some point or another, all how

homeowners will have on their do-it-yourself chore list the daunting task of painting. Lugging around heavy paint cans can be rough on your hands so get some help from an old garden hose. Take a piece of your hose with a slit cut along it and wrap it around the handle. It will offer you some extra padding while also giving you a better grip on the handle.

6. Capture annoying bugs: Have earwigs made your comfy home their own? Getting rid of the tiny insects is easy when you have an old garden hose lying around. Cut several footlong portions of a dry hose and leave them in the areas the earwigs congregate. They will find the dark cylinder as the perfect resting place. In the morning you can simply toss out the hoses, taking the bugs with them.


7. Wash out your downspout: Leaves, twigs, bugs and other debris can clog up your downspout, and with the threat of monsoon hitting anytime soon, you'll need your pipe to be clear and ready to work. One way to take care of this problem is to flush it out with your garden hose. Using it like a plumber's snake, stick it

into the opening on top of your roof and let the water flow. Any clogs in the way will be dislodged and knocked out of the downspout.

8. Sand those hard-to-reach areas: At some point or another, hobbyists and remodelers alike have run into the problem of having to sand a tight corner, concave curve or other difficult area. Reach these tricky places by turning an old garden hose into a sanding block. Just wrap a piece of the hose with sandpaper and you'll have cylindrical, flexible sanding utensil.

9. Create a wreath: An unusual holidaythemed arts-and-crafts project is making a seasonal wreath out of a garden hose. Just bend, cut and glue into the correct shape. The flexibility of the material will make it easy to manipulate. When you're done, decorations can be added for an extra, spirited flair.

10. Make a telephone: Sure everyone knows you can make a primitive telephone with a couple of cans and a piece of string, but did you know you can also use a hose? The hose will carry the vibrations of sound and provide children with hours of fun.

Of the 14 Habitat for Humanity affiliates in New Mexico, the Las Cruces-based Mesilla Valley Habitat for Humanity (MVH-FH) was the highest-producing chapter for the 2010-11 build season.

Constructing six homes throughout the season to claim the No. 1 spot – beating out Albuquerque, which produced five, and Santa Fe with four – MVHFH Development Officer Marie Schwartz said the honor is due to the hard work of the staff and volunteers.

Hiring those who have compassion and a desire to contribute to Habitat's mission to provide low-income families throughout

"It's the team we have working," Johnson said. "Everyone knows what their position is, and they know what needs to be done. But also, everyone is willing to help wherever it is needed."

"Our relationships with the city and with donors, both financial and material wise, is great," Schwartz said. "We appreciate them."

She added that another group who is very supportive of their work are the Habitat for Humanity Care-A-Vanners – a group of usually retired individuals who travel the country, helping various Habitat projects along the way.

"We treat our Care-A-Vanners like family," she said. "That atmosphere makes people want to come back. Plus, Las Cruces has great weather and friendly people, too."

Housing visiting Care-A-Vanners at their RV lot – which has been dubbed the "Habitat RV Resort" – Johnson said they're provided with a laundry facility, Internet access and full RV hookups, which not a lot of Habitats offer.

"We try to make their stay as comfortable as possible," he said. "We help them with whatever they need, whether it's a doctor or a restaurant suggestion."

Also providing visitors with social opportunities, Johnson said they have made several friendships with their Care-A-Vanners, which helps encourage them to come back.

"From Oct. 15, 2011, through May 2012 (the 2011-12 build season), two-thirds of that time is already totally full," Johnson said of MVHFH's RV park. Constantly looking to improve its operations and services,

We treat our Care-A-Vanners Schwartz said they often visit other communities to learn how to grow in success when it comes to building homes as well as run its ReStore, 2301 S. Main St. "We want to see how we can do better," she said.

Johnson said in recent years, they have begun an exchange of information with other Habitat for Humanity affiliates in Colorado, Utah and New Mexico.

"We're trying to get the best practices and learn from each other," he said.

Receiving such great feedback from visiting Habitat members, Johnson said the Las Cruces chapter has been selected to host the state Habitat meeting in November, which will also bring in people from Habitat for Humanity International.

While being named No. 1 is an honor for those associated with MVHFH and the community as a whole, Johnson pointed out that other affiliates in the state are working just as hard to provide for families in need.

"But even in the small communities, like Grants, that only built one home, that's one family they've been able to

help," he said.

Committed to building at least five homes during the 2011-12 build season, Johnson said MVHFH will continue to work hard to provide for area families as well as share its secrets of success to other Habitat affiliations.

"Everyone has challenges acquiring land and handling funding cuts," he said. "We are in so many different businesses at once. From retail to mortgages to building to fundraising, there are so many different things, it's a huge challenge. But we've hired the right team and we have a relationship with our community. We're having fun while we're doing it all."

Discount, rebate program can help with closing costs

While there are several ways to say "thank you," Homes for Heroes is doing it by proving real estate rebates and discounts to individuals who work every day to make their community a better, safer place to live.

Beginning almost 10 years ago, after 9/11, the program originally provided these services to firefighters and public safety officers, but has expanded to include active-duty and retired military personnel, teachers, educational support staff, health care professionals, youth workers and pastors.



"They really put it out there to the Realtors in town and no one jumped on it, so I did. I thought there was a need out there that needed to be met and I was excited to do it."



Smoker is an easy way to add to your barbecue repertoire

Grilling is one of the great American rites of summer, but your average burgers and brats can only take you so far.

If you're looking for a way to take your barbecue experience to another level, adding a smoker to your arsenal can really help you bring more flavor to your gatherings.

You might think using a smoker would be labor-intensive and time-consuming compared to using a standard grill, but smoking is actually easier than you might think. Smokers are

also versatile and comparable in price to a nice grill, making buying one affordable for anyone who takes their barbecue seriously.

Smoking is a great method for adding flavor to ribs, wings or a pork roast," said Masterbuilt CEO and cookbook author John McLemore. "It's also as simple as preparing your meat, placing it in the smoker and letting it cook while you spend time with your guests on the patio. Once it's done, your meat is ready to serve."

McLemore offers the following tips for those who are looking to try their hand at smoking:

- Before you cook anything in your new smoker, season it by filling it with a handful of wood chips and setting it to its highest temperature with the air vents open. Let it run for about two hours, adding wood chips twice during the process
- Part of the fun of a smoker is that you can use multiple types of wood chips to add different flavors - from standard mesquite and hickory, as well as the less common, but flavorful, apple or pecan. Repeat the process of seasoning your smoker with each new flavor.
- An electric smoker can make for simple and convenient barbecuing. For example, the Masterbuilt Electric Smokehouse features a digital thermostat and remote timer that make it easier to monitor your roast.
- If your meat reaches your desired temperature before you are ready to serve, simply wrap it in aluminum foil and reduce the smoker temperature until mealtime.
- Overloading the smoker with food may cause uneven cooking and extend cooking time. It's best to allow enough space for proper heat circulation.
- If you're smoking wet ribs, apply barbecue sauce about an

hour before you are finished cooking and wrap with aluminum foil. If you prefer a dry rub, apply the seasoning before placing the meat in the smoker.

Barbecue sauce isn't the only thing you can use to flavor meat. For example, try mixing things up by complementing your pork roast with peanut butter to add a delicious nutty flavor.





Place the wings on the top rack of the smoker and cook for 25 to 30 minutes. Turn wings and cook for another 25 or 30 minutes, or until done. While the wings are cooking, mix the honey, barbecue sauce and apple juice in a small saucepan. Cook over medium heat until warmed through. Remove the wings from the smoker and place in a disposable aluminum foil pan. Pour the warm sauce over the wings and toss to coat evenly. Return pan to smoker on middle rack and cook for another 25 minutes. Remove from the smoker and serve immediately. Serves 4 to 6.

Mayonnaise:

- 2 large egg yolks 1/4 cup red wine vinegar
- 1 tablespoon dijon mustard

- 1 1/2 cups neutral-flavored oil (such as vegetable, canola or peanut)

Make the mayonnaise, put the egg yolks in a food processor and add the vinegar, mustard and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Turn on the machine and very slowly start to drizzle in the oil (drip until the mixture starts to look like mayonnaise, then you can start adding it in a slow, steady stream). If the mayonnaise is too thick, add a few drops of water; if it is not thick enough, add a little more oil with the motor running.

Make the salad, put the potatoes and garlic in a large pot. Add enough water to cover the potatoes by 2 inches and season generously with salt. Bring the water to a boil over high heat, then reduce the heat to medium and simmer until fork-tender, about 10 minutes.

Meanwhile, cook the bacon in the olive oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat, stirring occasionally, until browned and crisp, about 10 minutes. Remove from the heat and stir in the onion, celery and vinegar. Season with salt.

Drain the potatoes and transfer them to a large bowl (discard the garlic). Add the bacon-onion mixture to the hot potatoes and stir to incorporate. Gently stir in 1 1/2 cups mayonnaise and the mustard and season with salt. Refrigerate until cold. (Recipe adapted from www.foodnetwork.com.)

When it comes to the kitchen, very few tasks are as easy as boiling water. After all, the job only requires a pot of water and a working stovetop.

While a seemingly easy feat to accomplish, at one point or another, every at-home pasta lover or potato enthusiast has left their container unattended for too long and the water has boiled over.

A boring task, no one wants to stand around waiting for their water to boil – after all, "A watched pot will not boil." With several factors coming into play, including altitude and the temperature of the water that goes into the pot, it can be hard to perfectly time when it will reach its boiling point - 205 degrees in Las Cruces.

Not only can boiling over create a mess in your kitchen, it can ruin the food that is being cooked. While there is no magical tool to use to stop your water from boiling over, you can be alerted when it's getting close by using the pot watcher.

What is it?

Created by Norpro, the pot watcher is your answer to the dreaded problem of liquid spilling over your pot and onto your stovetop when boiling.

Norpro was founded in 1973 by CEO Gunnar Lie, who had a vision of designing, manufacturing and supplying high-quality kitchenware. Those affiliated with the company have traveled the world to study trends to create cutting-edge products that help solve everyday cooking problems.

A simple glass circle, measuring more than 3 inches in length, the pot watcher does all of the work of keeping tabs on your boiling water for you, making it great for cooking pasta, eggs, potatoes and much more.

In addition to alerting you when your liquid has come to a

boil, it also is able to help heat circulate evenly as well as absorb some of the heat that causes a boil over – allowing you to reach your pot before that happens.

How does it work?

As easy to use as boiling water, the pot watcher is simple to use. When filling your pot with water, add the glass gadget to the mix. Set the pot on a burner and turn it onto

your desired heat temperature. When the water starts to boil, the pot watcher will begin to rattle against the pot. This is because the disk is light weight and will move with the bubbles that are created. Also, its slanted sides trap vapors and bubbles, which will also help the gadget rise from the bottom to the top of the vessel.

Featured kitchen gadget: Pot watcher

These two elements cause it to knock into the sides and lid of the container. All of the noise will alert the cook that it has reached its boiling point and the heat needs to be turned down or shut off

Not just great for water, the pot watcher can also be used when heating up milk, cream and other liquids.

When your fluid is boiling, either leave the pot watcher in the container or scoop it out with a durable kitchen spoon. Wash the pot watcher by hand and let it dry so it will be ready to use the next time around.

Where can it be found?

The pot watcher can be found at specialty cookware stores and online at websites such as www.amazon.com and www. mykitchenco.com.

How much does it cost?

The pot watcher costs around \$2 and is usually no more than \$5

Perfect pepper pockets

Gordita packs a powerful punch

The first gordita I sampled was at Saenz Gorditas, 1700 N. Solano Drive. Oh my, it was definitely a memorable palate-pleaser! Muy delicioso!

"Gordita" is Spanish for "little fat one" The puffy "pouches" are prepared from a grilled, thick corn tortilla that is fried and stuffed – traditionally with fried pork or chorizo, beans and cheese.

One source reports that gorditas have been in Mexican food history since it was recorded. Yet "the little fat one" is fairly new to America. Gorditos didn't become popular here until 1997 when Taco Bell introduced its "Gordita Supreme," chockfull with ground beef, sour cream and cheese. But there are oodles of recipes and homemade gorditas are best, especially if the stuffing is laced with our spirited valley chile pepper.

Chile-Cotta Gorditas

1 cup instant polenta

- 2 cups water
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking powder 1 teaspoon margarine
- 2 green chiles, roasted,
- stemmed and seeded
- 1 cup ricotta cheese Oil

1/2 head iceburg lettuce, shredded Favorite salsa

In a nonstick pan cook the polenta, water, salt, baking powder and margarine over low heat, stirring, until the mixture leaves the pan's side easily.

Divide into 12 balls. Flatten each in turn on a sheet of baking paper and turn onto a heated griddle or dry skillet. Cook, turning until a crust develops on both sides.

In a small bowl, mix the chile into the ricotta.

In a heavy frying pan or skillet, heat the oil over moderate heat. Fry

the cornmeal cakes until golden and slightly puffed. Drain and split open. Fill with ricotta mixture and lettuce. Serve immediately with favorite salsa. Makes 12 servings.

Valley Gorditas

- large tomatoes, roasted, peeled and seeded
 poblano chiles, roasted, peeled
- and seeded-sliced thin
 cup medium-hot green chile,
- roasted and chopped 2 cups shredded cooked beef or 2 cups cooked pork or 2 cups
- cooked chicken, seasoned cooked chicken broth
- 2 cups farmer cheese or 2 cups Monterey Jack cheese
- or 2 cups queso fresco 1 3/4 cups masa harina mixed with 1 cup very warm tap water
- 2 tablespoons lard or 2
- tablespoons shortening 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/3 cup flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder Vegetable oil
- Shredded lettuce Corn salsa
- Bean salsa

Mix the masa harina with the water, mix well and set aside. In a large saucepan, combine the tomato, chiles and broth. Bring to a boil, reduce heat to a simmer and cook for 10 minutes. You want the mixture on the thick side. Add the shredded meat and heat for another 2 to 3 minutes. Remove from heat and set aside.

When warm to the touch, stir in the cheese and season with salt if needed.

Take the prepared masa harina and knead in the lard, salt, flour and baking powder. You may need to add a little more water. Divide into 12 pieces, roll into balls and place on a plate, cover with plastic and let rest for 20 minutes. Place a heavy skillet, cast iron if you have it, over medium heat.

Place a heavy freezer bag on the counter and place a masa round in the center.

Gently roll out or pat into a 4-inch round. Pick up plastic, peel gordita away from it and place on the hot skillet.

Cook for 1 minute and flip over, cooking for 1 minute-repeat. You will want the gordita golden brown on both sides. Remove to a wire rack to cool and repeat until all gorditas are cooked.

Heat 3/4 inch of oil in a heavy skillet. When hot add one gordita at a time, cooking for about 2 minutes total. Flip them a few until puffy. Remove and drain on paper tow-

Remove and drain on paper towels, repeat until all are done. Split fried gorditas with a knife but not all the way through, and fill with the meat and cheese filling. Top with lettuce and various salsas. (Recipe adapted from "Authentic Mexican" by Rick and Deann Bayless.)

Green Chile Beef Gordita Stuffing

3/4 pound 93 percent

lean ground beef 1/4 cup frozen diced onions 1 envelope (1.25-ounce size) taco seasoning mix 1 cup medium-hot roasted

green chile, stemmed, seeded and chopped 1 medium tomato

- 1/4 cup sour cream
- 1/2 cup shredded lettuce 1/4 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 4 teaspoons sliced black olives, drained
- 4 gorditas (Follow directions for Valley Gorditas)

Place large sauté pan on high heat. Place beef, onions, taco seasoning and green chiles in pan. Brown ground beef 5 to 7 minutes until meat is brown and no pink remains. Stir frequently and break up meat as it cooks.

Wash and dice tomato. Divide meat mixture evenly onto four hot gorditas. Spread 1-tablespoon sour cream over each gordita. Sprinkle each with lettuce, cheese, tomatoes and olives. Fold in half and serve. Makes 4 servings.

Shredded Beef Steak Gordita Stuffing

1 1/4 pounds boneless beef chuck

steak, cut into 4 pieces 3 small white onions, diced 4 garlic cloves, peeled and finely chopped


- tablespoon vegetable oil, plus oil to a depth of 1/2-inch for frying
 (28-ounce) can good-quality
- whole tomatoes in juice, drained and chopped or 2 cups ripe tomatoes, chopped 2 to 3 serranos or 1 to 2

jalapeños, stemmed, seeded and very finely chopped Salt

In a medium saucepan set over medium heat, combine the meat with 2 quarts salted water, about 1/3 of the onions and half of the garlic and simmer until the meat is very tender, about 1 1/2 hours. Strain, reserving the broth for another use. When the meat is cool enough to handle, shred it into coarse strands

with your fingers or 2 forks - don't worry that there are bits of onion and garlic mixed with the meat. Wash and dry the saucepan, set it over medium heat and add 1 tablespoon of the oil. When the oil is hot, add half of the remaining onions and cook until golden, about 6 minutes, then stir in the remaining garlic and cook for another minute. Add the tomatoes and chiles and cook until most of the juice has evaporated, about 3 minutes. Stir in the shredded meat and simmer for a few more minutes, then taste and season with about 1/2 teaspoon salt. Remove from the heat. Serve in a bowl with hot gorditas. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

Caring for your color Tips help plants looking lush throughout summer

Just because it is hot outside it doesn't mean you can't enjoy vibrant colors.

Summertime can have more potential to be just as beautiful as our spring. Look around, you will see crape myrtle, mimosa, phlox, vinca, lantana, red yucca, abelia, bird of paradise, tecoma, trumpet vine, oleander, vitex, chitalpa, Texas ranger (leucophyllum), desert willow and geranium, to name a few all in full bloom. At least they should be in full bloom.

If this is not the case, then you plants are missing something. It might be not enough water, or in some cases too much water. It also could be not enough fertilizer, particularly phosphorous. Your plant or tree may be producing seeds, which will take tons of energy to produce at the expense of new flowers.

Water can be an issue especially since we have had very little rainfall. It is important that your plants get a good soaking when needed. If your plant "wilts" between waterings, then you should water either more frequently or, better yet, more deeply. A drip system seems to be the most efficient way of watering most plants and trees. The key is to make sure the entire root-ball gets wet, so dripper placement is important. If it is a new planting, it is essential that you water thoroughly to ensure good root development and prevent wilting in between irrigation times.

In order to keep the color going through the summer, it is best to use a fertilizer that is high in phosphorous. This is the middle number found in any N-P-K fertilizer. Super Phosphate and Triple Super Phosphate, which come in granular form, have only phosphorus in them and can be used on just about anything that produces flowers or fruit. Br-61 made by Carl Pool, and Super Bloom made by Greenlight are water soluble fertilizers that can be used on any flowering plant grown in the ground as well as containers.

Finally, prompt removal of spent flowers and/or seedpods will aid in the production of new blossoms. You can lightly shear some items while others may need selective pruning. It is better to remove the spent flowers before they have a chance to turn into seedpods, in most cases.

Taking these steps at this time of year should yield late summer color now and up to the fall months.
