Cinco de Pink expects to continue successes

New Mexico State University Aggies are Tough Enough to Wear Pink organizers are saying they expect this year's fundraising campaign to continue to exceed last year, which raised more than \$530,000.

Although the annual fundraising and cancer-awareness campaign doesn't set a goal, the organizers are constantly looking for ways to expand the reach of the events, said Rick Nezzer, who coordinates the media outreach.

"We are doing more than we did last year, and it is our expectation that the community will step up like it has always done in the past," he said.

Spearheaded by NMSU to incorporate college athletics, the local campaign has become the most successful Tough Enough to Wear Pink campaign in the world.

To keep the effort supportive of cancer-related research at NMSU, the funds raised through the campaign now goes to an endowed fund at the NMSU Foundation. The fund received the first \$275,000 of its \$1.5 million commitment.

Meanwhile, Pink Week is now in full force as it leads up to the Aggies football game hosting University of Idaho Vandals at 6 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 15.

Throughout the week, NMSU and Las Cruces Public Schools have been holding activities.

At LCPS, students, staff and school visitors have been filling buckets with quarters. Donations will continue to be collected until noon Friday, Oct. 14, when the buckets will be picked up to be donated to Cowboys for Cancer Research, said LCPS School-Community Partnerships Coordinator Leslie Cervantes. The schools are winding up a week of pinkrelated events by "pinking out" with everyone wearing as much pink as possible.



Space Week set for launching space biz UP Aerospace, Virgin Galactic make spaceport announcements

On the eve of a week of activities related to new space entrepreneurs, Spaceport America's two primary customers - Virgin Galactic and UP Aerospace - have made major announcements.

UP Aerospace, the company that has conducted a number of traditional sounding rocket launches from the spaceport 45 miles north of Las Cruces, announced this week that it will conduct up to nine new missions

from Spaceport America in 2012 and 2013.

The launches will be for NASA and the Department of Defense. If all the planning launches from contracts are conducted, they will be twice the number of missions UP Aerospace has flown from Spaceport America since 2006.

MRSA jail cases not serious, officials say

Reported cases common in jails, prisons

Following news reports about eight cases of county detainees coming down with a drug-resistant bacterial infection, county officials are assuring the situation is being handled.

The staph infection is Methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus, more commonly referred to as MRSA. What makes MRSA scary to some is its resistance to traditional medications, such as penicillin and amoxicillin.

Though MRSA is very contagious, it is done primarily through contact and not airborne, said Chris Barela, detention center administrator.

Many MRSA cases are "inactive" and it's treated liked handling contaminated material, Barela said. Those who are "active" are quarantined, he said, in which the air flow is even controlled.

"People who come into the detention center, come in with it," he said. "That's when we help them get it under control.

"We help them bring it under control very quickly." Barela said the center works

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Picking our leaders PRC problems rooted in selection process

How is the best way to pick our leaders? It is a problem every democracy wrestles with. In our country, we try it two different ways.

At the federal level, we elect a president and he chooses everyone else. If one of them messes up, the president is responsible, so the appointee usually is gone quickly. The result is a team effort.

At the state level, voters choose a governor, secretary of state, attorney general, auditor, treasurer, land commissioner and five public regulation commissioners. If one of them messes up, that person is responsible. The governor usually is not well acquainted with the individual. Few voters are acquainted with the individual either. They likely voted based on party line.

So the offending public official hires a lawyer and begins the lengthy process of defending himself or herself. Depending on the situation, taxpayers may pick up the tab.

Over the years, New Mexico voters have decided they prefer the second method. In that way, the governor doesn't get too powerful and maybe some of those elected officials might be people they have heard of and they might even like their ideas.

The New Mexico constitutional convention in 1969 tried to switch to the appointive method but voters turned down the new constitution. So now the state spends big money trying to get errant politicians removed from office.

By my count, we have had commissioners from four of the five Public Regulation Commission districts mess up badly enough to either have to resign or come close to it. I haven't been able to find a commissioner from Albuquerque who has stepped in it very badly. Otherwise, we haven't been able to elect very good PRC commissioners often enough

nor to choose his or her top administrators is foolproof either. Several readers have worried that allowing Gov. Susana Martinez to pick new PRC members would negate the entire reason for a Public Regulation Commission by making it a deregulation commission. It would hand everything over to industries that require regulating, they say.

So how do we solve the problem? Make some commissioners elected and some appointed, has been suggested. I'm not sure what good that would do, but it is worth studying.

And what about qualifications? Some states require a degree in engineering, law, economics or accounting. Or an alternative would be five years of work experience in a field regulated to the PRC. Would that run the danger of people who would be disposed toward favoring that industry?

And then we have commissioners without any specialized education or experience ask ing who is to decide they aren't smart enough to learn what they need to know. Besides, experts can be hired to do the technical analysis. We don't need a commission of elites.

True. What we do need is a commission composed of members who know how to do their job and perform their duties legally and ethically. Evidence during the entire life of the PRC and of the elected State Corporation Commission before it tells us it isn't happening. The job, because of its high salary and great power, tends to attract career politicians who too often don't meet the standards required.

The Think New Mexico organization has produced a booklet on rethinking the PRC. Its primary suggestions are to strengthen qualifications of commissioners and to transfer most of the enormous load of responsibilities to state agencies under the governor. Both suggestions seem to be part of the solu-

tion. But I'm not sure it is the total package. For years, lawmakers and other New Mexicans have sought an answer. Many pieces of legislation have been introduced. It

Who are the rich?

Income is not the correct way to measure

Much of our public policy is tied to the notion of citizens falling neatly into three categories: rich, middle class and poor. Those designations are usually based on income, which can be deceiving and is a poor way to look at the rich. We have a wealth of opinions about what wealth is, but no consensus.

Are we wealthy if we have a roof over our heads and three meals a day? Are we poor when we eat ramen in a modest house in a less than upscale neighborhood? Except in the extreme, when Americans talk about rich and poor it depends upon comparisons.

Rich people who do not look rich is the message of, "The Millionaire Next Door: The Surprising Secrets of America's Wealthy' Thomas Stanley and William Danko. Rich people look middle class and a number of middle class people look rich. But they are not rich, they are heavily in debt.

Should our government treat differently those who make more income than others? There is the notion that when someone makes more money than others, something wrong happened.

Someone with a paid-for house, car and college degree is considered less fortunate than someone making a lot



looks at income. Poverty statistics are based upon the lowest 25 percent in terms of income of a society being in a category called poverty regardless of how many possessions those

poor.

people have. Are they poor when they have a roof over their heads and a number of amenities that my parents could only dream of owning?

Other people have a criterion of wealth that is a number. If I have \$1 million, then I am wealthy regardless of expenses. Right now that dividing line seems to be \$200,000 a year of income. Public policy is aimed at those whose income is over that magical number.

This allows for political class warfare. People who are not designated rich can work politically to take the riches away from the rich as a sense of fairness. The usual dialog is that if the rich have more money than they need, then it should go to someone else who might need it.

This is not said quite that plainly but it is the message for those who have more wealth. It started as soon as people learned they could vote the money in someone else's pocket into their own pocket and the politicians found they could get more votes if they ran on the theft platform: "Vote for me and I will take from your neighbor and give it to you." In an unscientific survey voters are more likely to vote for those politicians who proclaim a need to take from the rich and give to the poor. Which poor? Us poor, of course.

How poor are the American poor? Some are quite devastated and I am not speaking of the extremes in poverty. But there are quite a few people who are getting along nicely despite being considered poor. Some people said to be in poverty have more real wealth than those outside of poverty because they have many compensating programs including Medicaid, food stamps, aid to dependent children, etc.

The dialog today is that we must "tax the rich" out of a notion of fairness. In reality there is an undercurrent of feeling that rich people should be held in revulsion. It is an odd thought because most people who have higher incomes are already taxed quite a bit. But it makes for a great photo opportunity for politicians to talk about taxing those rich people who have it so easy.

Every time you hear the "tax the rich" dialog you can label that person a huckster who takes from one American to give to another American for their vote. In America we are left in the debate about the rich with the questions: "What do we do when we have taken all of the wealth from the rich? Who is next?"



More than meets the eye Redistricting a tremendous responsibility

Many constituents that I represent have raised their concern that nothing was done during the recent redistricting session, and I believe they deserve a response.

This year's redistricting legislative session was expensive, contentious and has caused much disappointment to many New Mexicans - there is no denying that. I and my Senate colleagues understand the frustration that the public has with the outcome of the session, especially when our constituents wonder why it took 19 days to develop redistricting legislation that was ultimately vetoed by Gov. Susana Martinez.

The true story of the redistricting session is anything but 19 wasted days of "golfing" and time spent not doing anything. The story of the redistricting session was one of preserving the sacred rights of equal representation and voting rights granted to us through the New Mexico and United States constitutions.

Along with the tremendous responsibility of the session went enormous effort. Preparations for the session actually began in 2010 as the federal government conducted the decennial census. As the 2010 census was being completed the Legislative Council Interim Committee met in January to determine guidelines for the redistricting session.

Subsequently, Sen. Linda Lopez and Rep. Mary Helen Garcia were chosen to serve as cochairs of the Redistricting Interim Committee, which was made up of 40 members of the Legislature. In order to gain community input, the co-chairs convened five meetings

throughout the state from June to August. The interim committee's work developed into eight concepts for the House, nine concepts for the Senate, seven concepts for Congress, five concepts for the PRC and one concept for the Public Education Commission.

We were able to take the interim concepts into the session and that's when much more technical and time-consuming work began.

In the context of an individual senate redistricting concept, we were tasked with assigning 2,059,179 people in New Mexico to 1,483 precincts that make up 42 Senate districts.

Enormous challenges were found at the precinct level. As I worked on my Senate district, I found that simply adding one precinct could require a neighboring senator to pull one or more precincts from their neighbor and a similar occurrence happening thereafter. One precinct change in southern New Mexico would often result in a "domino effect," eventually requiring changes to districts in northern New Mexico. Imagine all the different combinations possible when 42 senators were simultaneously making changes to 1,483 individual precincts.

The previous complexities do not even point out the central rules that were to be followed, such as the Voting Rights Act of 1965, preservation of minority voting rights, one-man-onevote and sustaining communities of interest.

Measuring the success of the redistricting session requires looking beyond clever slogans and glitzy sound bites. An accurate view shows that the work done during the special session was significant, heartfelt and meaningful.



NMSU adopts dining plan Fall enrollment drops by almost 3 percent

At a regular meeting Monday, Oct. 10, in Alamogordo, the New Mexico State University Board of Regents adopted a master plan for dining services at the university.

The dining services plan, which is an addendum to the university's overall master plan, was based on recommendations from Envision Strategies, an operations consulting and strategic planning firm for the restaurant, food service, hospitality and retail services industries.

The firm's June report to the university includes an evaluation of current facilities, programs and services; identifies the demand for dining services across the Las Cruces campus through 2019; and gives recommendations for aligning the dining program with other strategic planning initiatives and optimizing operating efficiencies and financial performance.

A few of the recommendations in the plan include looking at the possibility of "late night options" for students, as well as improving day-to-day menu options.

In retail dining, the plan suggests redeveloping the Corbett Center Student Union Food Court, creating extended-hours cafe types of environments and adding options on the south side of campus, possibly through mobile food solutions.

There are many more recommendations encompassed in the plan, including strategies for catering and conference dining as well as concessions and recreation dining.

Regents also heard reports from NMSU Alamogordo President Cheri Jimeno and Bernadette Montoya, vice president for student affairs and enrollment management.

Jimeno discussed updates from the Alamogordo campus including an HSI STEM Grant for Strengthening Science, Engineering and Energy Career Options, their Completion Programs with the Las Cruces campus and enrollment. She also presented the Regents with the LEED Gold Certification for NMSU Alamogordo's Advanced Technology Center, the second building project on the NMSU Alamogordo campus to be certified LEED Gold by the U.S. Green Building Council.

Montoya gave an update on enrollment at the Las Cruces campus. She said after four years of increasing growth, the fall 2011 enrollment at NMSU Las Cruces is 2.8 percent less than last fall. She discussed the need to focus on retention and graduation rates. She said one of the reasons for a decline in entering freshmen is likely attributed to the decrease in the number of New Mexico high school graduates.

The board also presented the Above & Beyond Award to Julie Weber, director of Housing and Residential Life.

The Above & Beyond Award recognizes full-time employees who go the extra distance in service to any and all aspects of the NMSU system. Individuals are recognized for performance that goes "above and beyond" their regular responsibilities and for demonstrating a positive attitude that inspires others.

Weber is responsible for all aspects of the Housing and Residential Life division including housing facilities, budget/administration and dealing with about 3,000 residents and their families each day at NMSU Las Cruces.

"Many work side by side with Julie to bring our students the highest standard of housing service. But, it is her overall leadership that binds these individuals together so successfully," said Tammy Anthony, associate vice president for Auxiliary Services. "Julie never hesitates to do what is needed to support our Housing and Residential Life students and staff. She does it effectively and with complete commitment to successful resolution of each challenge."

said New Mexico Spaceport Authority (NMSA) Executive Director Christine Anderson. "UP Aerospace has been launching here since 2006, and we are looking forward to hosting UP Aerospace and other commercial space launch providers as they continue to meet the needs of our nation."

NASA's Office of Chief Technologist Launch Opportunities Program awarded UP Aerospace a contract to integrate technology payloads and launch them into space on up to eight flights using its SpaceLoft rocket. This contract reserves two launches with options on purchasing up to six additional flights in 2012 and 2013.

The first launch for NASA is still in the planning phase, but is expected in the first quarter of 2012, according to a news release from NMSA. The second contract was issued by the Defense Department's Operationally Responsive Space Office, and will be a suborbital flight also planned for the first quarter of 2012. "We have a great relationship with Space-

"We have a great relationship with Spaceport America," said UP Aerospace President Jerry Larson. "We are excited to see business ramping up for our SpaceLoft launch vehicles, and look forward to meeting the needs of our customers."

UP Aerospace has provided launch services for the Defense Department previously, although this will be the company's first fully dedicated launch for the military. UP Aerospace has teamed with Schafer Corporation of Albuquerque to provide comprehensive launch and payload integration services for the NASA launches.

At Spaceport America, UP Aerospace has conducted launches test rocket vehicle or booster concepts for companies that do business with the Defense Department.

Virgin Galactic gets the keys

On Monday, Oct. 17, which is the start of Space Week in New Mexico, Virgin Galactic will host a hangar dedication ceremony at Spaceport America, where work on its Terminal Hangar Facility is nearly completed where Virgin will be housing its fleet of spaceliners.

Virgin Galactic is calling the hangar dedication ceremony "Keys to a New Dawn."

Meanwhile, Virgin Galactic has a new Vice President of Operations Michael Moses, a former NASA executive. Moses will oversee the planning and execution of all operations of the company's commercial suborbital spaceflight program.

"Following a distinguished career in NASA's recently retired Space Shuttle Program, Moses brings to

Virgin Galactic a proven record of safe, successful and secure human spaceflight missions, spaceport operations, and human spaceflight program leadership," Virgin Galactic stated in its announcement. "He served at the NASA Kennedy Space Center in Florida as the Launch Integration Manager from 2008 until the landing of the final Shuttle mission in July 2011. He was responsible for supervising all Space Shuttle processing activities from landing through launch, and for reviewing major milestones including final readiness for flight."

Moses also served as chair of the Mission Management Team, providing ultimate launch decision authority for the final 12 missions of the Space Shuttle Program, directly overseeing the safe and successful flights of 75 astronauts.

According to Virgin Galactic, Moses will develop and lead the team responsible for its spaceship operations and logistics, flight crew operations, customer training and spaceport ground operations, with overall operational safety and risk management as the primary focus.

"Bringing Mike in to lead the team represents a significant investment in our commitment to operational safety and success as we prepare to launch commercial operations," said Virgin Galactic President and CEO George Whitesides. "His experience and track record in all facets of spaceflight operations are truly unique. His forward-thinking perspective to bring the hard-won lessons of human spaceflight into our operations will benefit us tremendously."

Prior to his most recent NASA role, Moses served as a flight director at the NASA Johnson Space Center, where he led teams of flight controllers in the planning, training and execution of all aspects of space shuttle missions. Moses also has more than 10 years experience as a flight controller in the Shuttle Propulsion and Electrical Systems Groups.

"I am extremely excited to be joining Virgin Galactic at this time, helping to forge the foundations that will enable routine commercial suborbital spaceflights," Moses said. "Virgin Galactic will expand the legacy of human spaceflight beyond traditional government programs into the world's first privately funded commercial spaceline."

Moses holds a bachelor's degree in physics from Purdue University, a master's degree in space sciences from Florida Institute of Technology and a master's degree in aerospace engineering from Purdue University. He is a two-time recipient of the NASA Outstanding Leadership Medal as well as other NASA commendations and awards.

Carolyn Wincer, who is Virgin Galactic's head of travel and tourism, recently said the company will soon be opening an office in Las Cruces.

Wincer said more than 70 flight tests have made of Virgin's system that launches a sixpassenger rocket from mid-air to reach 70 miles above the Earth's surface.

Some 500 experienced test pilots have applied to fly for Virgin Galactic, according to Wincer. Meanwhile, more than 500 potential passengers have made downpayments for the \$200,000 tickets, totaling close to \$60 million in deposits.

Virgin Galactic also will host the first-ever "Industry Day" for potential suppliers and partners at Spaceport America on Tuesday, Oct. 18. The invitation-only event is designed to educate potential companies on the type of goods and services that will be needed as commercial space travel becomes a reality at Spaceport America.

"Virgin Galactic and (its sister) The Spaceship Company are looking to create relationships with local, regional and global suppliers to support their operations at Spaceport America," Anderson said. "The organizers of this event have stated their intention to hire locally as much as possible, which is good news for New Mexico companies."

The daylong event will include presentations by Whitesides, Anderson and New Mexico Department of Economic Development Secretary Jon Barela.

Attendees will have an opportunity to see the WhiteKnightTwo and SpaceShipTwo vehicles in their new home at the spaceport.

Space gathering an international event

After the Virgin Galactic event, the International Symposium for Personal and Commercial Spaceflight (ISPCS) begins at New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum, 4100 Dripping Spring Road.

A Growing Community Partnership Luncheon will be held Tuesday, Oct. 18, at the Commercial Space Exhibit Hall inside the museum. The \$50 luncheon includes a talk by Allan Lockheed, son of the aviation pioneer who created what is now Lockheed Martin Lockheed will talk about how the space industry will coalesce around Spaceport America – an industry that is currently supported by \$60 billion just in government spending.

More than 500 people – mostly key movers in the private space industry – are expected to attend ISPCS Wednesday and Thursday, Oct. 19-20. Panel discussion will cover a host of topics, including creating the supply chain support.



He was 35 and making his first space flight. Born on Oct. 17, 1933, William Anders "was a member of the first crew of space travelers to leave the Earth and orbit the Moon," said "Who's Who In Space: The First 25 Years.

Aboard Apollo 8, Anders, Frank Borman, and James Lovell were also "the first to set eyes on the whole Earth, and the first to see the dark side of the Moon," Robert Poole wrote in "Earthrise: How Man First Saw the Earth." Then, during their fourth lunar orbit, Poole described how the astronauts personally witnessed an Earthrise, previously unseen by human eyes. He said Anders hurriedly loaded color film into a camera and snapped the shot.

Poole quoted Anders later recalling: "We'd spent all our time on Earth training about how to study the Moon, how to go to the Moon; it was very lunar oriented. And yet when I looked up and saw the

Earth coming up on this very stark, beat up lunar horizon, an Earth that was the only color that we could see, a very fragile looking Earth, a very delicate looking Earth, I was immediately almost overcome by the thought that here we came all this way to the Moon, and yet the most significant thing we're seeing is our own home planet, the Earth."

Anders, whose father was a naval aviator, was born in Hong Kong, his biography at jsc.nasa.gov said. "When the Japanese attacked Nanking,

China in 1937," the family "had to flee for their lives, Robert Zimmerman wrote in "Genesis" (Four Walls Eight Windows/1998).

Anders, then four, "was pulled from his bed to stand on a rickety wooden porch and watch bombs crash down several hundred yards from their hotel in Canton.'

Anders grew up in San Diego, "attracted to science and engineering," Zimmerman said. He didn't decide early on a career; he only knew "he didn't want to do anything boring." His parents hoped he'd emulate his father so, in 1951, Anders entered the Naval Academy at Annapolis.

"It wasn't long, however, before Anders had second thoughts about spending the rest of his life on a ship," Zimmerman said. "Each summer the academy sent the midshipmen off on what they called 'cruises.' " On his first one, Anders was on deck in 'Navy whites," an hour and a half early to "make the right impression." Suddenly, "the ship's smokestack belch(ed) out a big black cloud of thick soot." Anders' uniform was soon "speckled," which he only worsened trying to brush off the soot.

"When a few minutes later he found himself being harshly chewed out for wearing a dirty uniform, the midshipman began to wonder at the justice of the Navy." He joined the Air Force after graduation in 1955. In 1962, Anders earned a



nuclear engineering from the Air Force Institute of Technology at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base. NASA chose him two years later and assigned him to study the effects of radiation and develop environmental controls, jsc.nasa. gov said.

Apollo 8 lifted off on Dec. 21, 1968, the first manned launch from NASA's new Moonport. The Saturn V rocket booster had been "tested only twice before, and never before used to put human beings in space," Žimmerman said

It was on Christmas Eve, flying 70 miles above the Moon, that Anders shot the definitive Earthrise image. Shortly before, Borman had snapped a black-and-white picture of what Zimmerman described as the "first Earthrise ever witnessed by humans," making the picture one of the first shots humans took from deep space. Lowerquality black-and-white

Earthrises had been taken, but by satellites, according to Poole: NASA's Lunar Orbiter 1 in August 1966, and the Soviet Union's Zond 6 in November 1968.

Borman's photo showed Earth just clearing the horizon. Anders' showed Earth several degrees over the lunar surface. Often printed horizontally, Anders is emphatic the Moon was vertical. That evening, the astro-

nauts also read from the biblical Genesis. An estimated one billion TV viewers watched the first ever broadcast of the lunar surface. Anders began, reciting: "In the beginning, God created the heavens and the Earth." After finishing with, "And God saw the light, that it was good. And God divided the light from the darkness," he passed off to Lovell. Borman concluded, then signed off with, "And from the crew of Apollo 8, we close with good night, good luck, a Merry Christmas, and God bless all of you – all of you on the good Earth.'

Poole said religious leaders praised the event. Among them, the Archbishop of Canterbury stated that space travel should in fact strengthen our sense of dependence upon God as the creator of the universe.

However, atheist Madalyn

Murray O'Hair "collected 28,000 signatures on a petition, and went to court demanding a ban on any Bible reading by any U.S. astronaut or any government employee while on duty," Zimmerman said. But "NASA received more than (2.5 million) letters and petitions ... supporting the right of American astronauts to exercise their religious beliefs publicly." The court dismissed the suit. On Dec. 27, Apollo 8

splashed down "an hour before dawn," Zimmerman said, making the first such "landing in the dark."

Anders is a retired Air Force reserve major general. In 1975, President Gerald Ford appointed him "the first Chairman of the newly established Nuclear Regulatory Commission," jsc.nasa.gov said. The Rhode Island Aviation Hall of Fame inducted him in 2010, pointing out in a press release: "Anders is perhaps best remembered for his inspirational quote, 'We came all this way to explore the Moon, and the most important thing is that we discovered Earth."

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NMSU working on getting more women in STEM jobs High schoolers to visit campus for math

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A recent U.S. Commerce Department report revealed that women are an untapped resource when it comes to careers in science. technology, engineering and math (STEM).

The report shows women make up almost half the $\dot{U}\!.S\!.$ work force yet hold less than a quarter of STEM jobs. New Mexico State University is making an effort to influence those statistics by sponsoring a math day for young women at local high schools.

There is an endemic underrepresentation of minority students at the highest levels of professions that are mathematics-intensive.

Females, and minorities in general, seem to quickly stray away from mathematics starting in middle school," said Tiziana Giorgi, an associate professor at NMSU's mathematical sciences department.

More than 50 students from two area high schools will attend the Sonia Kovalevsky High School Mathematics Day from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Friday, Oct. 28, in the Science Hall building. The day is named for a woman born in 1850 who was not only a mathemati-

cian, but a writer and women's rights advocate whose groundbreaking work in mathematics forced her male counterparts to reconsider notions of women's inferiority to men in science and mathematics. Her struggle to obtain an education helped to open doors at universities to women.

"We believe that by providing an informal setting where these students can interact with female mathematicians, activities where the fun and beauty of mathematics can be seen, and follow up contacts with female professors in our department, we might influence their future choices of classes and career paths," Giorgi said.

The day will begin with an array of handson games and workshops with titles such as "Spirals, Knots and Tessellations," "Energy Minimizers and the Beauty of Soap Bubbles' and " Engaging Geometry & Art Projects."

"Events like Sonia Kovalevsky Day are not just geared toward the more advanced students, they are also geared toward the more interested ones," Giorgi said.

"It helps in keeping them motivated and focused."

The high school girls, from grades nine through 12, will have lunch with their math mentors and end the day interacting with a career panel.

According to the Commerce Department report, women in STEM fields earn 33 percent more than their non-STEM counterparts, and employment in these fields has grown much faster than employment in other occupa-

tions - the trend is expected to continue. The career panel will provide guidance to these students in pursuing educational options and career opportunities in the various mathematics fields

The day is sponsored by the Association for Women in Mathematics, the NMSU College of Arts and Sciences, the NMSU ADVANCE Foundation and the NMSU Department of Mathematics.










Office seekers promise to resist raising taxes

The three candidates running for Las Cruces mayor and the seven aspiring to win seats on the City Council gave their stances on a variety of issues Monday, Oct. 10, at the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce Candidates Forum.

Most candidates agreed to the chamber's opening question asking if they'd be willing to have proposed ordinances go through an evaluation of their effects to the city government processes, taxpayers and business owners.

Though the idea of having such a review is similar to the kind of costs versus benefits analysis businesses conduct before making decisions, Mayor Ken Miyagishima said he's not sure that all proposed ordinances need such a review.

District 2 candidate Charles Scholz said this kind analysis could potentially add more cost and delays to the process.

Miyagishima said there us a financial review of every proposed ordinance, but that he "had a problem with it being mandatory."

District 1 incumbent City Councillor Nathan Small said the proposal had merit, so it should be explored.

The candidates gave their ideas for topics ranging from impact fees to the city's traffic light camera enforcement. Council and mayoral challengers Michael Huerta, Dolores Connor, Aaron Diaz, Natalie Chadborn and Aaron Diaz called for the repeal of recently approved impact fees on new construction.



closely with the state Department of Health. After a detailed discussion about MRSA at the County

After a detailed discussion about MRSA at the County Commission meeting Wednesday, Oct. 12, officials are now urging calm with reasonable precautions. The detention center, which houses about 850 detainees, has inmates with a variety of medical conditions and there have been detainees with MRSA before, said county spokes-man Jess Williams. Nor is MRSA as acutely contagious as

some make it out to be, he said. According to medical literature, MRSA belongs to a common family of staph bacteria found in one of every four

people. Most people don't suffer severe symptoms as serious staph infections are more common in people with a weak immune system.

About two out of every 100 people carry a strain of MRSA that is resistant to antibiotics. MRSA infections can cause infections with a red, swollen and painful area on the skin. There may be drainage of pus or other fluids from the site of contact. (For more about MRSA, see the Health & Well Being section.)

Not everyone who comes in contact MRSA becomes infected, Williams said.

"Really, the situation is no different that last week, or last month for that matter," he said. "It's under control and we're handling it at the detention center as we've always handled it.'

Jonte Green, senior defensive back for the New Mexico State University Aggies, says he loves wearing pink

When the idea of Tough Enough To Wear Pink Week began to sweep the nation a few years ago, football players wearing pink might have seemed somewhat unusual to some people, but not anymore.

"Pink Week is big now," Green said. "People have lost family members to breast cancer. I'm all for it, I'm all for having it. I love wearing pink when it's Pink Week.'

Green said the Aggies plan on wearing pink socks, gloves and wristbands. They will also have pink ribbons on their helmets.

When he takes the field against Idaho at 6 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 15, at Aggie Memorial Stadium, Green said he will have "extra motivation" because he will be playing for his aunt as well.

Sheila Green, his father's sister, died of breast cancer while only in her 40s, he said. She battled the cancer while Green was in Lakewood High School in St. Petersburg, Fla.

"She went from bad to good then bad again, then she passed away," he said. "It was my senior year."

Green said he still remembers his aunt's up-and-down, day-by-day battle with the illness.

"It will be an emotional and competitive game for me," he said. Aggie wide receiver Jerrel Brown also

lost a family member to breast cancer, his great-grandmother. He said he was too young to remember much about it, but he knows how cancer affects so many people and that "it's tough to get past it."

Brown said on Saturday night he will "be playing for my great-grandmother and for all those who have been affected by it (breast cancer)."

At the Oct. 11 football press conference, NMSU Regent Laura Conniff, along with TETWP co-chairs Mary Henson, Magellia Boston and Pat Sisbarro, stated that since Pink Week was launched in Las Cruces in 2007, local fundraising efforts have raised almost \$2 million for breast cancer research for NMSU and the University of New Mexico Cancer Center.

Last year, Conniff said, Las Cruces raised more money than any other Tough Enough to Wear Pink campaign in the world.

"More importantly," she said, "Tough Enough To Wear Pink has raised the level of breast cancer awareness in Las Cruces and southern New Mexico. We've not just touched one or two lives. We've touched many, many lives.'

So, even though the Aggies' slogan is "We are all Crimson," at Saturday night's Idaho game, we will all be Pink.

Or mostly crimson with some pink flourishes.

You know what I mean. Go Aggies.

Sports Keeping a step ahead Aggies expect a lot of blitzing from tough Idaho defense

They are big guys, and they like to blitz. That's the bottom line on the University of Idaho Vandals, who will take on New Mexico State University at Aggie Memorial Stadium at 6 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 15.

Idaho (1-5, 0-2 in the Western Athletic Conference) has a reputation as a good defensive team.

'The statistics don't do justice for how they do defensively," said NMSU football coach De-Wayne Walker. "They are very aggressive."

Last week, the Vandals defense shut down Louisiana Tech on 13 of 16 third-down conversion attempts. They sacked the quarterback twice and had him on the run often with seven quarterback hurries. The week before, they held the University of Virginia of the Atlantic Coast Conference to 21 points in an overtime loss. The defense is led by Gary Walker,

Tre'Shawn Robinson and Korey Toomer. The trio combined for 35 tackles in the 24-11 loss to Louisiana Tech.

Walker said as far as the Aggies are concerned, they will treat Idaho as if it were a 5-1 team, not a 1-5 team.

"It's going to be a fight for us," he said.

The Idaho game, which is also the annual New Mexico State University Aggies Are Tough Enough to Wear Pink game, will give the Aggies (2-3, 0-1 WAC) a chance to even both their overall and conference records.

The Aggies saw a lot of blitzing in the 16-10 loss to UTEP Sept. 17, but they will be ready for Idaho, according to Walker.

"We will be a step ahead of the posse," he said. In films, he noticed that the Idaho defense tends to give away when it's about to blitz. That will give the Aggies an opportunity to pass and run into the spaces they leave behind, he said. Starting quarterback Matt Christian said he

hopes the tempo of the Aggie offense can keep the Idaho defense off-balance, and he also said their tendency to blitz might leave the Vandals vulnerable to the big play.

Like several other Aggie players, Christian noted both the size and aggressiveness of the Vandals.

"They bring the wood," he said. "They like to hit."

Offensively, Idaho has been struggling, Walk-er said, especially at quarterback. The Vandals' starting QB, Brian Reader, completed only 19-of-47 pass attempts in last week's loss to Louisiana See Aggies on page A25

Hall chewing up yards for 'Dawgs LCHS fullback running in the footsteps of older brother

Xavier Hall receives the pitch from the quarterback and takes off. He reads the block of his fullback, breaks inside, accelerates and bounces off a couple of would-be tacklers before finally going down 12 yards later.

It's a scene that has been played over and over the last three seasons for the Las Cruces High Bulldawgs. The running back has been devouring real estate at an impressive rate since he earned a starting job as a sophomore two years ago.

This year, Hall has rushed for 1,176 yards on 157 carries in only seven games for an average of 7.5 yards per carry. Many of those yards have come on Hall's favorite play, the power toss.

"That's our bread-and-butter play," Hall said. "The fullback kicks out the (defensive) end and I usually go off his block.'

A 10th blocker on the play is the quarterback who joins in the fun after tossing the ball to Hall.

"We put a hat on a hat and have a lot of people in the hole," LCHS coach Jim Miller said. "It makes it difficult for the defense. 'X' probably averages 7 to 10 yards a pop on that play."

'X" has picked up right where his brother left off three years ago. James Hall Jr. was the Bulldawgs' top rusher from 2006-08 before signing with New Mexico State University. James has since transferred to Tiffin University in Ohio.

Just when opposing coaches were celebrating James Hall's high school graduation, an-other Hall stepped into the Bulldawg backfield. Xavier made a big splash right away, having what he thinks may have been his best game ever during his sophomore year – a 260-yard rushing performance against Manzano.

James and Xavier piled up yards in somewhat different ways. The comparisons are inevitable.

"It was a pleasure to have both of them in my program," Miller said. "James was a little quicker and X is more powerful. They both got a lot of yards in a little different ways. They both have good vision, but X is more of a downhill runner."

"My brother was a more elusive running back and I'm a little more powerful," agreed See Hall on page A25 Las Cruces Bulletin

Battle to the finish Aggies fall short in 3-2 loss to the Wahine

For four sets, the New Mexico State University Aggie volleyball team was as good as the No. 8 team in the nation.

In an intense, well-played match, the Aggies split the first four sets with the University of Hawai'i Rainbow Wahine 25-17, 21-25, 20-25 and 27-25. Unfortunately, the Aggies had a team letdown in the fifth set, losing the set and the match 15-5 at the Pan American Center Wednesday, Oct. 12.

"There's no doubt we can play with the best volleyball teams in the game, but we aren't consistent enough to beat them yet," NMSU coach Mike Jordan said. "We have work to do."

The Aggies fell to 16-5 overall and 5-1 in the Western Athletic Conference. Hawai'i moved to 16-1, 6-0 WAC. With the win, Hawai'i took over sole possession of first place in the WAC.


The Aggies came out on fire in the first set, jumping out to a 10-3 lead behind the wild cheering of 3,066 fans. Michelle Kuester deflected several Hawai'i shots and Meredith Hays had two kills to spark the opening run.

Hays finished with seven kills and senior Jenna DeVries had 12 assists as the Aggies won the set, 25-17.

However, the Wahine showed why they are the best hitting team in the WAC by hitting .343 and .424 in back-to-back set wins to take a 2-1 lead. Hawai'i's Kanani Danielson broke out of her slump with six kills in the second set, and she was joined in the attack by Hawai'i freshman outside hitter Jane Croson, who added three kills on the way to a 17-kill night. The second set saw 12 ties and six lead changes.

Danielson and Croson combined for 12 kills in the third set, leading the Rainbow Wahine to a 25-20 victory. At one point, NMSU held a 15-14 lead, but then Hawai'i went on a 9-1 run, sparked by three straight Danielson kill shots.

The Aggies battled back in the fourth set with a dramatic 27-25 win behind five team blocks and five kills by Hays. A couple of key

kills by NMSU senior Kelsey Brennan for points 24 and 25 were critical for the Aggies.

But when it came to the decisive fifth set, the Aggies appeared to be out of energy. Hawai'i jumped out to a 13-3 lead before the Aggies scored two points in a row.

The Aggies next match will be at the Pan American Center at 2 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 15, against San Jose State University.

NMSU soccer looks for win at home

Aggies in tie for fourth going into Idaho game

After a dramatic 2-1 overtime win over Nevada, the New Mexico State University soccer team will be under the Friday night lights at Aggie Memorial Stadium 7 p.m. Oct. 14 to face Western Athletic Conference rival Idaho and junior forward Chelsea Small, the 2011 WAC Offensive Player of the Year.

"Chelsea Small is one of the best goal scorers in the conference," said Aggie coach Blair Quinn. "She can turn and shoot in one or two feet of space. She's that dangerous."

Small has scored seven goals this year for the Vandals, who

Currently, there is a four-team tie for fourth place in the conference, with the Aggies (8-6-1, 1-2-0 WAC) being one of those teams.

"This will be separation weekend," Quinn said.

The Aggies will keep up the pressure on Small, he said. She has had 38 shots on goal this year out of 70 attempts for an impressive .543 average and enters the game with 28 career goals.

NMSU sophomore Erin Wosick will start as goalkeeper. Her four shutouts this year have set a team record. Her 1.02 goals against average is third in the WAC.

"The goal is to always get a shutout," she said.

Against Nevada at home Oct. 9, Wosick had a 1-0 shutout going with less than four minutes to play when Nevada's Kori Disarufino scored on a breakaway shot to tie the game. But Wosick said she does not let that kind of thing get to her mentally.

"You always expect the worst to happen, that applies to many things," she said. "If you give up a goal, you have to regain your composure. Stuff happens, things go wrong, but it's never the end of the game. You can come back."

The Aggies did come back against Nevada, winning four minutes into overtime when Yolanda McMillion kicked in a ball that had eluded Nevada goalkeeper Dana Moreno.

"The ball was just bouncing around," McMillion said. "So I said. I'll shoot it."

It was the fourth goal of the year and second game-winner for the junior forward. Senior forward Cassandra Branch scored NMSU's other goal on a first-half breakaway.

Quinn said one of the keys to the victory was the Aggies' ability to win the second ball. The first ball is the one that is up in the air, he said. Winning the second ball means not only directing it where you want it to go, but also having the whole team anticipate where it is going and running there well in advance. "The team that wins the second ball is usually the winner," he

"The team that wins the second ball is usually the winner," he said. "We won the second ball in both halves against Nevada."

Another key to the victory, he said, was the pressure the Aggies put on Nevada throughout the game. "Their [Nevada's] defenders had trouble getting the ball out

"Their [Nevada's] defenders had trouble getting the ball out of their backfield all day," he said.

Quinn said NMSU has two very good goalkeepers in Wosick and redshirt sophomore Jessica Schutter, who has posted one shutout this year. He gave credit to Wosick for making several key saves in the Nevada game.

Going into Friday's game, Fresno State is first in the WAC at 2-0, followed by Hawaii and Utah State both at 2-1. San Jose State is 1-1, and NMSU is tied with three teams at 1-2. The top six teams will advance to the WAC Tournament after the regular season. NMSU has four regular season games left, only two at home: Friday's Oct. 14 game against Idaho and the season finale Oct. 28 against Hawai'i.

Tech and threw three interceptions. The Vandals only managed two-of-16 third down conversions. Compared to a year ago, Idaho is scoring less points (20.2 average in 2011) and rolling up less total yards (293.5).

In addition, Idaho averages only 74.4 yards rushing per game. Running back Princeton McCarty leads the team with 243 yards on the season.

NMSÚ defensive back Jonte Green said he expected Idaho to try to expose the secondary with a lot of deep passes. He also noted that Idaho's offensive players were "big guys, big weight-room guys."

Last year, the Aggies lost to Idaho on the road, 37-14, a game that Christian said he remembers well.

"If we hit 'em for the big play, we'll have success," he said. The Aggies are coming off a bye week. NMSU steam rolled UNM 42-28 in Albuquerque Oct. 1 with a balanced rushing and passing attack.

rushing and passing attack. However, UNM is currently ranked the worst team in the nation, according to ESPN.com's "Bottom 10" ranking. The Aggies were once in that bottom 10 but after the victory over UNM are not only out of the rankings, but also off of the waiting list.

The Idaho Vandals, however, are currently fifth on the waiting list.


Xavier, who hopes to play college football. "But I can make some cuts and make people miss."

Golf school returns to Sonoma Ranch

School offered only once during 2011

Back in February, when I was in the hospital after my accident, I wasn't sure I would be playing golf again – ever. My close friend and mentor Herb Wimberly came to visit me several times a week, and we came to the conclusion that we wouldn't be doing golf schools this year.

Well, things have changed.

My recovery has progressed so beautifully that I've been back playing golf since early July, and I feel normal again, except for the shattered wrist. Yesterday, I shot 71 (1-under par) from the white tees at Sonoma Ranch Golf Course, which seemed to me a blessing from above.

Wimberly and I talked it over, and Wimberly is confident that I can teach golf again. So, we went ahead and scheduled a Performance Golf School on Saturday and Sunday, Nov.19-20, at Sonoma Ranch Golf Course, 1274 Golf Club Road.

Performance Golf Schools actually has its origins in Gunnison, Colo., where Wimberly, one of the most respected golf teachers in the entire Southwest, offered weeklong golf camps throughout the summer at the Rocky Mountain Golf School. In 1995, I spent some summer weeks giving mental game clinics there, and later briefly took over directing the school.

Many Las Cruces golfers are graduates of the school, including former Gov. Garrey

Carruthers. In 1998, Wimberly and I started Performance Golf Schools, envisioning making our brand of golf performance enhancement available and affordable in key locations in New Mexico and in far west Texas. It's always been a traveling show, where we come to you.


Unlike some of the "big name" golf schools featured in the magazines, our approach is based on the recognition that solid fundamentals are needed by all golfers at all levels, and that each golfer is a unique individual with certain strengths and body type. There is no "cookie-cutter" or "best" way to teach everyone.

"Our goal is to provide folks with personal attention and highly useful information that will have an immediate impact on how they swing and play," Wimberly explains. "The idea is that each person is different, and each person needs our hands-on individual attention for more than just a few minutes.

"It's the extended learning periods with lots of practice time and tutoring that gets results."

Over the course of two days, students learn proper technique for woods, irons, chipping, putting, bunker play and trouble shots. The emphasis is on adapting and adjusting one basic golf swing to nearly all circumstances while reducing mistakes.

The format of each Performance Golf School is two days of intensive lessons and on-course enjoyable play. Instruction starts early on Saturday morning with a 30-minute clinic we call Wimberly's "Get Set" clinic. Since most golfers make basic mistakes with stance, posture, grip, ball position, alignment and aim, Wimberly addresses these

fundamentals by demonstrating proper or conventional technique.

"Bad shots are usually caused by problems that occur before you ever take the club away," advises Wimberly.

To get your alignment square, Wimberly suggests that you place two parallel clubs on the ground pointing in the direction of the target.

"If the best golfers in the world practice this way, why shouldn't you?" Wimberly asks.

The morning is filled with personal lessons combined with "mini-clinics" on things such as finding a good pre-shot routine, focusing on each practice shot, aiming at a specific target and controlling your emotions.

Both afternoons are spent on the golf course with playing lessons in a fun-filled, no-pressure scramble format complete with prizes.

What about the bottom line: After golf school, do people really get better?

This is what Jeff Wilson, who is a financial advisor at Morgan Stanley in Las Cruces, has to say about his experience at golf school:

"It's a lot of practice and a lot of balls to hit in two days, but I know that my swing is better because Herb and Charlie point out what's good about your swing, what to get rid of, and specifically what you need to work on.

"For me, I look at it over the long term and it's the mental preparation before each shot, and my decision-making that has really improved."

Reflecting on Wimberly's vast fund of golf knowledge and experience, Wilson adds, "It's comparable to what's in Harvey Penick's famous Little Red Books."

One former Performance Golf School student recently told me, "Heck, getting to spend two days with Herb Wimberly – just to listen to him talk golf – is worth it just for that alone. He's a golf legend."

After playing college golf at the University of New Mexico, Wimberly came to New Mexico State in 1962, and was largely responsible

for the wonderful golf course the university has today. Wimberly coached the Aggie men's golf team for 31 years, and was elected to the Golf Coaches Hall of Fame in 1994. Among his All-American golfers were Rich Beem, Larry Beem, Bart Bryant and Tom Byrum, all PGA professionals.

Wimberly's résumé is so full of accomplishments that it would take a much larger column than I enjoy here to cover them, but I'm sure his lasting legacy at New Mexico State is the vision to bring the PGA Professional Golf Management program to the University in 1988.

Part of the NMSU College of Business, the PGM program is now an international one that attracts prospective PGA professionals from all over the U.S. and several foreign countries. It is regarded among other PGM colleges as the model program.

On Sept. 23, Wimberly was honored by the university by being presented with the Traders Award for his exceptional services to the College of Business.

Back to golf school. The schedule involves two full days of personal instruction with mini-clinics and on-course play. We are planning on a fairly small and intimate group, so the student-teacher ratio is low. We pair up folks for play in the afternoon so that each group has a mix of ability in it. We usually have men, women and a junior or two, and play a scramble format. The cost is \$250 (which is reduced this year, because this is our only school), and that includes virtually everything: You get lessons, a tee prize gift, PGS golf cap, scramble prizes, greens fees with cart, unlimited range balls and loads of fun. Aggies get ready for Idaho Vandals



The bye week came at a good time this year for the Aggie football team. I don't think this will dampen the momentum the Aggies gained in rolling over New Mexico in the win that was the largest margin of victory for De-Wayne Walker as a head coach.

If, Air Force leaves for the Big East and Boise State goes there or the Big 12 as has been bandied about, that would leave the Mountain West with only eight members. Twelve is the magic number for conference size and there are four schools west of the Mississippi in the current WAC lineup.

Sometimes minimums become maximums and selfpreservation frequently leads to alliances that previously seemed unappealing. I make no predictions but as the late Ernie Mills used to say, "Don't say, we didn't tell you."

SportsBriefs Aggie softball team earns academic honor

One year after achieving a top 40 national ranking for team grade point average, the New Mexico State University softball squad improved its standing to No. 21 in the country when the National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) announced its 2011 All-Academic Teams and Scholar Athletes.

NMSU rated No. 21 among Division I squads in the country with a team GPA of 3.37. Only 133 of the 289 schools that sponsor softball made the cut, meaning the Aggies' ranking was well within the top 10 percent of Division I programs.

For the second straight season, the Aggies were the top-rated program in the Western Athletic Conference (WAC) and were one of only 24 programs with a GPA of 3.35 or higher. Tennessee Tech led Division I with a team GPA of 3.619.

Additionally, eight Aggies on the 2011 team earned NFCA Scholar Athlete honors by achieving a GPA of 3.50 or above. Three of those honorees return for the 2012 season: Teresa Conrad, Kristi Covarrubia and Amber Oliver.

Young NMSU equestrian team hopes to repeat top-10 ranking

Aggies will host Texas A&M at Equestrian Center

In a coaches' poll held at the end of last season, the New Mexico State University equestrian team was ranked 10th in the nation. The 2011-12 team is a younger group, according to head coach Audrey Buck, with nine freshmen and several transfers as part of the 25-rider squad, but she said the team hopes to do even better this year.

"Generally, we would like to be even higher than (10th),"

Palmer, a sophomore from Albuquerque (Eldorado High School), posted his best overall finish of the season at the Grand Canyon Invitational by placing eighth overall and first for the Aggies with an 8K time of 25:47.9. Palmer beat out some of the region's best athletes, including many runners from No. 23 Arizona State and Arizona.



said Buck, who is in her second year as head coach.

She said the first 2011-12 coaches' poll will be out later this month. There are 22 universities that compete in the emerging sport of NCAA varsity equestrian horse riding.

Texas A&M University, which was ranked first at the end of last season, will ride into Las Cruces for a head-to-head competition at 10 a.m. Saturday, Oct. 15, at the NMSU Equestrian Center, off Stewart Street towards Union Avenue.

"We have the home-field advantage," she said. "We know the horses, the arena, the conditions. We can pull out a win if we ride with confidence. I want them to be confident in every competition we go to."

The Aggies are 1-1 on the season, taking the home opener against West Texas A&M 15-2 on Sept. 18. NMSU lost to Fresno State 15-5 in Fresno Oct. 8.

"In the first game we had the home advantage – we knew our horses, we were nice and fresh and ready to go," Buck said. "Then we went to Fresno, and a lot of the inexperience of the younger riders just got to them. It had been raining there, something we usually don't see. It was a sloppy, wet arena. That kind of threw us for a loop."

In any equestrian competition, the team uses 20 riders – five each for four events. The two events in the Hunter Seat competition are derived from English fox hunting horsemanship, Buck said. In equitation on the flat, riders are judged for performing skilled maneuvers on flat ground, whereas in equitation over fences the horses jump over a series of obstacles.

In these events, Buck said, "Everything you do is very difficult, and you have to maintain position and make it look very easy."

The two Western events are geared more toward working horses, she said. One competition involves horsemanship, the other is Reining: a fast, dynamic, intense event involving gallops, turns and stops.

Against Fresno State, NMSU's Chelsea Campbell was named MVP in the Reining competition, even though she lost her head-to-head match 78-75.

"The judge saw her skill, even though it wasn't her best match," Buck said.

Campbell is one of four NMSU riders Buck said were good ones to watch in their events. She also mentioned Megan Gould in Western Horsemanship, Emily McConnell in equitation over fences and Stephanie Gershon in equitation on the flat.

As in any sport, the mental game is an important part of equestrian, she said. It's important to stay positive as mistakes



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

do happen.

"I'm as tough as the next person when it comes to practice and wanting perfection," she said. "But there's a lot of pressure on the riders. We don't dwell on the past."

Although the home team supplies horses for any event, they are distributed by random draw, Buck said.

"It can backfire on you," she said, but noted that it still gives the home team an advantage.







Smaller banks woo customers

To pay or not to pay – soon that may not be the question.

Starting in 2012, Bank of America, like many other banks, will start charging a \$5 monthly fee to customers who use debit cards.

The company said the fees will be rolled out in stages, but has yet to say which states will be affected first.

There once was a time when consumers were paid to use their debit cards. Now, economists say signs are pointing in the opposite direction and what we are calling "outrageous" could be "the norm."

Several banks are testing a debit-card fee. Chase and Wells Fargo are testing \$3 monthly debit card fees in select markets, but neither have released a final decision on implementing the charge. Citibank will also double the monthly service charge on EZ checking accounts from \$7.50 to \$15 in November. SunTrust, an Atlanta-based bank, started charging customers a \$5 debit card fee. Regions Financial in Birmingham, Ala., also plans to start charging customers \$4 a month.

These charges have been brought on because starting Saturday, Oct. 1, banks were capped on the amount they can collect from merchants whenever customers swipe their debit cards. For an average debit card transaction before Oct. 1, Bank of America charged merchants 44 cents, but the cap has limited that amount to 24 cents, 20 cents more in a business' pocket and 20 cents less for the bank.

These fees generated \$19 billion in revenue for banks in 2009.

A study by Bankrate.com reported that 45 percent of checking accounts are free with no strings attached, many of them being community banks, credit unions and online checking. This number was down from 65 percent last year and 76 percent in 2009. "We are pushing free checking and

"We are pushing free checking and intend to maintain totally free or minimal banking fees are long as we are able," said Gary Lenzo, president of Century Bank in Las Cruces. "(With the new government ruling), any increase fees for See **Bank fees** on page B4

Preserving Las Cruces history

Chamber collaborates with Armijo family, community to save home

"Grand Phantom Balls" once graced the rooms of the historic Nesto Armijo House that has been slated to be the new home to the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce.

On Tuesday, Oct. 4, chamber board members, along with members of the community and nearby neighbors, gathered to listen to members of the Heritage Foundation talk about plans to "save the Armijo House." The foundation is a 501(c)3 started by the chamber to allow donors to benefit from tax credits associated with donating to a nonprofit.

History

The Nestor Armijo House was named after its owner, a prosperous businessman and rancher during the heyday of the Santa Fe Trail. Armijo bought the original four-bedroom adobe home from Maricita Daily in 1877. He enlarged and furnished in elaborate Victorian décor.

"By the turn of the century, Las Cruces had all the requirements of a civilized town," according to the Rio Grande Republican, a Las Cruces publication from 1881 to 1914. "Meeting the evening train had become a popular past-time, while formal activities included a 'Grand Phantom Ball' held at the home of Nestor Armijo. Beatrice Armijo masqueraded as a Chinese lady of rank."

"Nestor expanded the house to the north and built the second floor," said Bud Colligan, great-great grandson of Armijo.

According to Eric Liefeld, president of Mesilla Valley Preservation, Nestor Armijo was a dynamic person who did things "larger than life."

life." "Nestor was a freighter and also owned the building across the street," he said, adding that what is now known as Lohman Avenue was

once called Covenant Street. "He was educated in St. Louis and raised in Albuquerque. He became famous by running freight with large mule trains from Chihuahua City, Mexico, to Santa Fe on the Santa Fe Trail.

"Las Cruces is considered an historic crossroads, and it is a key piece to tell that story – Nestor's involvement."

The Armijo House was the first of its kind in Las Cruces with electrical wiring and a twostory addition, constructed with 3-foot-thick adobe walls.

"It is an early example of the two-story adobe house," Liefeld said. "The adobe is notable because for a second story, you didn't see much of that when dealing with all that weight and mass. It was a very grand home and to be able to afford electric lighting showed Nestor was clearly an influential person."

Liefeld said what makes the home so unique is its actual survival and integrity.

"The word 'integrity' is used a lot in preservation," he said. "The Armijo House is unique in terms of surviving houses in Las Cruces, especially for that time frame. Very few houses survived with a lot of historical integrity, and how it kept its original features shows Nestor knew what he was doing. A lot of time has passed and little has changed outside. The home has kept its ornaments and porches; they need help, but the details are remarkable."

EPE brings power from the sun

NRG Energy opens new solar facility in Santa Teresa

El Paso Electric Co. is supplying power to customers that is generated by solar panels that were dedicated Friday, Oct. 7, by NRG Energy at its Roadrunner Solar Generating Facility in Santa Teresa.

The facility is the second largest photovoltaic plant in the state. The photovoltaic plant puts out direct electrical power, but a converter at the plant switches the power into alternating current for El Paso Electric customers.

"Today marks another step towards American energy independence with the completion of the Roadrunner Solar Generating Facility," said Lt. Gov. John Sanchez in a NRG news release. "This 20-megawatt photovoltaic project is diversifying New Mexico's economy and creating good jobs for our state. I want to thank See **NRG** on page B2

Over the next 100 years, six generations of the Armijo family have lived in the house, including Josephine Gallagher, one of Armijo's granddaughters and Colligan's grandmothers.

It is rare to know much about a building like the Armijo House, but Liefeld said the family has such incredible information and history to convey that preservation has been greater than usual.

"We always slept upstairs in one of the two big bedrooms of the house," Colligan said about his annual trips from California to Las Cruces via Route 66. "I still remember waking up in the bedroom and going into my mother's room, which was the other big bedroom upstairs. It had a blue ceiling like the sky and brass bed from England with a lace canopy. It is at the Branigan (Cultural Center) right now, in storage."

Colligan said his family, including six children, spent four to six weeks every summer at the historic home.

"There wasn't a lot to do in Las Cruces for a kid, so we would play in the area behind the house, which was a dirt field with tumble weeds," he said. "We would also hang out on the porch where it was cool. We had an Irish mail that was like a scooter with four wheels, a seat and crank like an old rail cart. We would ride it back and forth on the porch."

The house also had a big wooden swing that could fit three to four people and hung from the east side, Colligan said.

"I would like to see that put back on the porch (during the restoration)," he said.

The first renovation

In 1982, Pioneer Savings and Trust, with the help from land grant-in-aid funds from the New Mexico Historic Preservation Bureau, restored the Armijo House for its branch office. The house has changed hands several times from a law firm to a real estate company, but due to its vacancy, it fell to the wayside once again.

"Its always a good thing to find a good occupant, in an old building," said Tom Hutchinson, owner of another local historic building that houses La Posta de Mesilla. "The best way to make sure a historic building is well-kept is to have a living, breathing business in it.

"We can't preserve all the buildings in Las Cruces, but there are some that deserve being saved."

"The Armijo family wants to see the house used," said Terra Van Winter, chair of the capital campaign charged with raising funds for the chamber. "Making it a living, breathing building, seven days a week, has been really exciting for them."

And Colligan said he hopes the chamber will make it a permanent home.

"Hopefully the chamber will be around as long as Las Cruces will be," Colligan said.

Chamber plans

"This project is so important because it is the preservation of my family's history and of the history of Las Cruces," Colligan said. "My great-great-great grandfather was a prominent citizen in Las Cruces, and his father was an early governor of New Mexico. So, I think it's a prominent house in southern New Mexico and has deep memories for our family that are buried in Las Cruces' history. I feel a strong draw to preserve that heritage for our family, for the city and for the state."

Chamber plans wouldn't be possible without the help of strong financial backers, and Citizens Bank as well as its owner, Amador Bank Shares, has stepped up in a big way.

"Amador Bank Shares, which owns Citizens Bank and the Armijo House, has donated the house to the chamber," said Hutchinson, board chair of Citizens Bank. "Citizens Bank also contributed \$50,000 to the project.

"Everyone recognizes the Armijo House as one of the more prominent buildings in the community, the trick was finding a business to use the space that was just as prominent. We were hoping the chamber or visitor's bureau would be interested because they have good uses for the building, and the location has an abundance of parking. We are delighted to pull the chamber back in town in a prominent location."

And the chamber is just as excited about their future home.

"This project is important because we are helping to save a piece of property with a significant and long history," said Kiel Hoffman, chair of the Heritage Foundation. "On the business side, we get to be in the middle of Las Cruces, and I think we belong in the Down-

town corridor. The Armijo House will give us the facilities to grow to meet chamber needs in the future, as well." The home will house only a

portion of the chamber offices, and an additional building will be built to hold a large boardroom as well as additional offices and small conference rooms.

The Armijo House is about 3,000 square feet, and the new building will also be about 3,000 square feet.

"Five staff members and seven offices will be in the new building,"Van Winter said. "We will also have a courtyard that will be able to hold events.

"The large hallway and additional space on the first floor will have original artwork and furniture – pieces of the home that were there 100 years ago – so when someone comes to pick up a relocation guide, they will be greeted with a historical museum right away."

Construction on the house will begin early next year and will take about 18 months. By the end of 2012, the chamber expects to have the rest of the \$2.3 million

raised.

"We are about half-way there," Van Winter said. "We are at 54 percent of our goal. We've been in the process for a year as a silent campaign, looking at different locations and come across the house. A feasibility study was performed with the focus group to see if the Armijo House was viable to save."

Van Winter said the results came back very well and many people saw it as the perfect home for the chamber.

"I am excited to welcome this type of industry to Doña Ana County," County Commission Chairwoman Dolores Saldaña-Caviness said. "It's a whole new sunny world."

actually a bigger part of the community." Van Winter said she is encouraging 100 percent giving on the chamber board and has already received 100 percent giving from the chamber staff.

"Everyone has been excited to get behind it, now we are focusing on key stakeholders and financial institutions," Van Winter said.

the donation. Van Winter said the chamber is also seeking help from volunteers as well as work from local contractors.

"We are trying to reach out to local providers," she said. "Steve Newby is the architecture provider and donated a large portion of the work."

Perhaps the most important aspect of preservation, Van Winter said the chamber is very adamant about keeping the building on the historical record for the state and for the nation.

"It was one of the first buildings on the state history registry," she said. "We are concerned about the adobe, and we are working with local preservation organizations. Collaboration is a big thing for us."

Should funds fall short by the committee's goal, Van Winter said alternatives will be pursued.

"Our goal is to raise all of the money in hand or through pledges through 2012," she said. "We are also working on

a low-interest construction loan with banks. If we don't reach the goal, we will look at other avenues, such as grants on the basis of it being a historical building." The Heritage Foundation committee in-

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

services are going to fall on the consumer as (banks) argued through the debate – not only could there be additional costs to the consumer, but freebies would also go away."

Lenzo said many of his customers are "buzzing" about the added fees, but it is too early to tell the direct effect of customer's leaving banks that have added the fees.

Other bank fees are slowly creeping up, such as ATM fees, up 7 cents from last year – \$3.74 to \$3.81 – and overdraft fees, up 36 cents – \$30.47 to \$30.83. An Associated Press poll

An Associated Press poll found that two-thirds of customers use debit cards more frequently than credit cards. Out of the same group, 61 percent said they would find another way to pay – cash or check – if they were charged \$3 a month, and 66 percent said they would change their payment method if a \$5 per month charge was implemented.

When I moved to New Mexico, my bank was not located in the state, but I kept it anyway because I still had incentives. But even a \$5 a month charge would send me packing. Don't banks know we still have choices ... for now? Email me at samantha@ lascrucebulletin.com.

Time to think about retirement

National Save for Retirement Week is Oct. 16-22

You may not see it posted on your calendar, but Oct. 16-22 is National Save for Retirement Week. This annual event, endorsed by Congress, is designed to raise awareness about the importance of saving for retirement – so you may want to take some time this week to review your own strategy for achieving the retirement lifestyle you've envisioned.

If you're not convinced of the need for an event such as National Save for Retirement Week, just consider these statistics, taken from the Employee Benefit Research Institute's 2011 Retirement Confidence Survey:

- The percentage of workers not at all confident about having enough money for a comfortable retirement grew from 22 percent in 2010 to 27 percent – the highest level measured in the 21 years of the Retirement Confidence Survey.
- Fifty-six percent of respondents say that the total value of their household's savings and investments, excluding the value of their primary home and any defined benefit plans (i.e., traditional pension plans) is less than \$25,000.
- Less than half of the respondents say they and/or their spouse have tried to calculate how much money they will need for a comfortable retirement. These numbers are obviously

troubling – and they indicate that most of us probably need to put more thought and effort into our retirement savings. What can you do? Here are a few suggestions:

- Determine how much you'll need in retirement. Try to define the lifestyle you want during retirement. Will you travel the world or stay close to home? Will you work part-time or spend your hours volunteering or pursuing hobbies? Once you know what your retirement might look like, try to estimate how much it might cost.
- Identify your sources of retirement income. Take into account your IRA, 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan, Social Security and other savings and investments. How much income will they provide? How much can you withdraw from these vehicles each year without depleting them?
- Calculate any retirement shortfall. Try to determine if your savings and investments will be enough to provide you with an income stream that's adequate to meet your retirement needs. If it isn't, develop an estimate of the size of the shortfall.
- Take steps to close savings "gap." If it doesn't look like you'll have enough to meet your retirement needs, you may consider adjusting your savings and investment strategy. This may mean

contributing more to your IRA, 401(k) and other retirement accounts. Or, perhaps your investment mix may need to be reviewed to find a better balance growth potential with risk. Or you may need to take both of these steps.



Most likely could have been prevented



This is part one of a two-part column.

The story I'm about to share with you is true. It took place Sept. 17. It was on that dreadful day the home of my very dearest friend was burglarized – in broad daylight.

As a front-row observer of the aftermath, I witnessed the coming together of the circumstances leading up to the event. It was the deconstruction of those circumstances that led me to conclude that the burglary could most likely have been prevented. Here's how the story unfolded:

According to police interviews with my friend's neighbors, someone kicked in her front door at around 10:30 a.m. on that busy Saturday morning. That's when the next-door neighbor reported hearing a loud "sound" coming from the home. Shortly thereafter, a second neighbor observed two men walking down the street and away from the property. Neither thought anything they saw was out of the ordinary, so they went about their respective business. Lucky for my friend, she wasn't at home.

Around 11 a.m., another neighbor reported hearing the sound of my friend's car alarm blaring from the garage. As did the other two neighbors, she thought nothing of the noise and went about her business. Shortly after the alarm sounded, the first neighbor observed a family transferring one of their children from an unknown vehicle into my friend's car, which was now parked in front of her house. Both cars drove away. My friend arrived home about 20 minutes later.

Upon investigation, police determined that the two men kicked in the front door and entered the home at around 10:30 a.m. While inside, they ransacked the place and gathered together everything they intended to steal. The culprits then left the residence and walked down the street. After returning in their automobile a short while later, they

Economic performance is not a laughing matter Recovery slow but continues as expected



A joke economists make among themselves is they can tell when people are worrying because that's when we get invited to give speeches.

Apparently, there is a lot of fear about a double-dip recession because my speech calendar is getting full. The gloom is overdone.

Technically, we can't have a double-dip recession as the previous recession, which ended August 2009, is already too far in the past. But for Americans who have become used to one recession per decade, this is a difference without a distinction. The economy hasn't fully recovered from the previous downturn, yet a new recession is a reasonable fear.

A lot of the worry seems to be originating in the Eurozone. Greece is on the verge of bankruptcy with major negative implications for European banks. Spain's and Italy's debt has been downgraded by bond-rating agencies, while Belgium has been put on Moody's Analytics watch list. Europe is weighing down business's

expectations.

Add to this the uncertainty around health care reform, which will likely be ruled on in the next November elections. It is easy to see the cause of business reluctance to hire new workers. Last month's employment numbers were better, up nearly 100,000. That is good news, but still only about half of what is needed.

A new national recession, although not out of the question, is unlikely. In fact, the recovery is right on course. Recessions associated with a financial crisis, like the most recent, tend to be twice as severe and twice as long as regular recessions. And indeed, a normal recession lasts 10 months; the most recent recession lasted 20 months. Normal recoveries are characterized by rapid economic growth as the economy returns to trend. The current recovery is anemic, less than half the normal pace, again as expected.

The cause of the slow recovery is the continued aftereffects of the subprime mortgage meltdown and the subsequent real-estate bubble burst. The recession started in real estate and full recovery is unlikely until that sector recovers. Real estate values continue to fall, down 2.6 percent nationally in the last year according to real estate website Zillow.com. Values are down 6.7 percent for Las Cruces.

That the recovery is right on track is thin gruel for those who are unemployed or whose businesses continue to suffer slow sales growth. Economists' usual recommendations in such a situation are tax cuts and spending increases. Unfortunately, such proposals aren't very popular in the current environment of record high deficits. Even so, President Barack Obama has proposed the American Jobs Act, which is a package of tax cuts and spending increase designed to help get the economy going.

Unfortunately, the American Jobs Act isn't enough. The economy is currently suffering from a \$900 billion output gap. A stimulus package needed to deal with such a shortfall would require an increase in the federal deficit of around \$750 billion. The American Jobs Act falls \$300 billion short of this. This means continued slow recovery but probably no double dip.

The views expressed here may not be shared by the regents or administration of NMSU. gathered their contraband and made room for it in their car by transferring one of their children, and her car seat, into my friend's car. In a matter of minutes, my friend's belongings and her vehicle were long gone.

Could this situation have been prevented? I firmly believe so.

As with most cata-

strophic incidents, it's the convergence of a number of small events that combine to trigger the main event. That's exactly what happened in this case. For starters, three nearby residents missed an opportunity to thwart the assault. While most of my friend's neighbors know one another, they don't actively work together to protect each other's interests.

Would more attention have been paid to the noises if a Neighborhood Watch program had been in place? I think so. The whole purpose of the program is to raise awareness. I've started a movement

in my neighborhood, and you might consider doing the same in yours. LCPD Community Liaison Officer Jose Rodriguez has the information you need to get started. He can be reached at 202-1573 or jorodriguez@ las-cruces.org.

Then there's the issue of the home itself. My friend's home was ill protected. Most windows, according to the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ). DOJ reports that in a third of completed burglaries, the burglar forced entry into the home. Burglars gained entry through an unlocked door or open window in about two-thirds of the cases. DOJ also

notes that in 28 percent of burglaries, people were at home. Seven percent of burglaries turn violent; as in the case of fellow Realtor, Jack Hadley, who was tragically murdered last month when he confronted a burglar in his Las Cruces home.

So how many layers of security are required to protect a home from your average, everyday housebreaker? After accompanying my friend on her mission to answer that very question, I can suggest a few low cost and effective ideas that'll help get the job done. I'll do just that in next week's column.

Recent graduates forced to make sacrifices, but there is an alternative

I heard a shocking statistic – 85 percent of the class of 2011's college graduates were expected to move back home to Mom and Dad, according to a study by Twentysomething Inc., a consulting and research company that studies 'Generation Y" (today's 15- to 34-year-olds).

The reason they're not able to spread their wings, according to a story that ran in multiple publications, was because they are starting life with some of the highest student loan debt in history. Combine that with one of the worst job markets in decades, and it's easy to see why parents are paying for room and board while the now-former students attempt to find jobs to provide the incomes that enable them to pay off the debts.

As someone who graduated college in the middle of the oil bust of the late 1980s, I remember how frustrating it was to work so hard through college, have very few job openings and even then have to compete against someone who's been in the job market for five



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Edward Jones MAKING SENSE OF INVESTING or 10 years. And when the student loan bill comes due six months after graduation, that's just adding insult to injury.

Today's poor job climate, mixed with the cost of higher education, is why it's critically important that we build a strong educational pipeline that's connected to the job needs of our county and state. Students need pathways that connect seamlessly and efficiently from high school to college to careers.

We need to identify the strategies that help young people complete their degrees within the shortest possible time frames, ensuring they graduate workforce ready and employable, while keeping the cost of their education (and their student loan debt) to a minimum.

A recent report by Complete College America, Time is the Enemy, highlights this need to help students complete their college education in a timely fashion. The study found that the longer students took to pursue a career certification - an associate degree or a bachelor's degree - the less likely they were to graduate. Whether they completed or not, they still racked up significant amounts of debt, but didn't have the job prospects to pay off their loans. The report found the majority of students

attending college are only attending part-time, and the likelihood they'd complete went down dramatically. Full-time students were twice as likely to graduate, but again, the longer it took, the lower the graduation rate.

New Mexico is one of 29 states identified in the report working to make the highereducation system more efficient. These states are committed to supporting efforts that help students graduate, increase the return on investment of educational dollars for taxpayers and strengthen the economy.

Interestingly, state-specific data in the report pointed to the fact that there will be a 32-percent gap between the number of jobs in 2020 that required career certificates or college degrees and those qualified to fill them. The good news is the jobs are there. We just need to of Southern identify the efficiencies that reduce the time, and increase the likelihood for students to graduate.

Fortunately, the leaders

of Doña Ana County have been having this conversation for the past four years, and we're well on our way to solutions.

The state's first early college high school, and four other proposed early college high schools, go beyond even what the report's writers recommend. Students who graduate at 18 years old with a high school diploma and associates degree are only two years away - not four, six or eight – from earning a bachelors degree, if they choose to pursue more education. It's easy to expect their college-completion rates will far exceed the current numbers. If those graduates choose to go to work, they will enter the workforce two years earlier and be well trained to pursue careers in growing and relevant industries here.

It's also just one more reason to support dual-credit courses, which get students moving toward their college degrees while they are still in high school. Taking college courses in high school reduces the amount of time students will be in college. It also reduces the need for remedial classes - those courses add to the time it takes to graduate and greatly reduce the likelihood they will.

Strong collaboration between Doña Ana County's educational institutions will continue to help our students be more successful and more likely to finish their college careers. The partnership between the Las Cruces, Gadsden, and Hatch school districts; Doña Ana Community College; and New Mexico State University, along with a committed business community, gave birth to the state's first early college high school. There's no doubt it will be the birthplace of many more innovations that create a bright future for the "Generation Y" of Doña Ana County.



Bill promotes economic growth

Congressman Steve Pearce applauded the unanimous passage of H.R. 1461, the Mescalero Apache Tribal Leasing Authorization Act. Pearce introduced the bill, which will promote economic growth and honor the right for American Indian communities to exercise self-determination.

"The unanimous support for this legislation exemplifies the positive effect that it will have for the tribes of New Mexico," Pearce said. "This legislation is important to both the people of the Mescalero Apache Tribe as well as surrounding communities. The revenue gained from leasing this water will go to shore up vital services on the reservation, including elder care, scholarship programs and infrastructure improvements."

Martinez favors local businesses

Gov. Susana Martinez signed a measure into law Wednesday, Oct. 5, to ensure New Mexico businesses hold an advantage over out-of-state competitors when bidding on state government contracts.

Supporters say the contracting preference can help provide jobs in New Mexico.

"This important law will assist local companies and create

a more competitive playing field for New Mexico businesses," Martinez said. "Making it easier for local businesses to succeed is a critical part of getting our economy back on track."

The new law tightens contracting requirements to prevent out-of-state businesses from qualifying for a preference that's supposed to go to in-state businesses when bidding on statefinanced construction projects.

Under the contracting-preference system, a bid by a qualified New Mexico business is considered 5 percent lower than the submitted amount – potentially helping the company be selected as the low bidder on a project.

Inaugural golf tournament to benefit junior golf

The Barry McClure Memorial announced the first annual golf tournament to honor Barry McClure and to support his passion – creating opportunities for local youth to become involved in sports. Martinez signs Capital Outlay Bill

The Economic Development Department's MainStreet Program has received a \$1 million appropriation for MainStreet infrastructure projects statewide. The appropriation was included in the Capital Outlay bill passed during the 2011 Special Session and signed by Gov. Susana Martinez.

The funding will be awarded to eligible MainStreet and Arts and Cultural Districts through a competitive Request for Proposals (RFP), which is expected to be released in early 2012. Eligible projects range from master planning of downtowns and streetscape improvements to planning for financing tools such as Business Improvement Districts, Tax Increment Financing Districts and Tax Increment Development Districts. To apply for project funding, New Mexico MainStreet communities and State Authorized Arts and Cultural Districts must be in good standing with the Economic Development Department, have spent at least 90 percent of previous MainStreet capital outlay appropriations and attend training on project management, including historic preservation requirements. Making fresh, homemade salsa just got easier with the help of Indoor Garden Supply, a one-stop-herb shop that specializes in unique soils, nutrients, lights, fans and anything needed to successfully grow an indoor garden.

Opening just a few weeks ago - Oct. 1 -Indoor Garden Supply co-owner Tony Miller said he and fellow co-owner Jerry Mitchell are excited to pack his store with exotic house plants and interactive exhibits.

The business is located at 1001 S. Solano Drive, and Miller said the location used to house a Pic Quik more than 30 years ago.

"My grandparents have owned the building for years," said Miller, adding that he grew up in adjacent apartments. "It was a Pic Quik and then a gift shop with ceramics and house décor.

Miller, who was born in Las Cruces, said the gift shop closed about 10 years ago and the building has remained vacant since then.

"I was in Colorado for 12 years and then I started traveling, building bridges and roads," he said. "But I got sick of chasing work and decided it was time to quit traveling and settle down.

"I was sitting on this building and thinking of what I could do with it."

Miller said he got his inspiration for the Indoor Garden Supply from his stint in Colorado.

They are everywhere," he said about the category of business. "When I realized Las Cruces didn't have one, I knew it was an opportunity. I started talking to friends and opened the store Oct. 1.'

Indoor Garden Supply carries a complete line of nutrients, soils, soilless media, light reflectors, ballasts, bulbs, rooting supplies, fans, carbon filters and much more, Miller said. Since tomatoes are typically used in mass quantities, especially in salsa, Miller said he does not recommend a large restaurant trying to sustain their tomato consumption on an individual garden.

"But an individual, yes, they can definitely grow enough tomatoes," said Miller, adding that he has seen the cost of or-

ganic tomatoes for as much as \$3 per pound. "Outdoor gardening in southern New Mexico is tough. We have a lot of sun, but a very harsh climate. You can garden

indoor year-round? According to Miller, an indoor garden ranges in size based on the amount of light and window space.

"Anyone could easily sustain his or her own herb garden by a large window," he said.

The store also has a full line of hydroponic and soil garden supplies, which enables plants to grow faster.

It's the most efficient way to grow a plant," he said. "You are force feeding the plant nutrients and control-

ling exactly how much they get." But the store is not just for buying gardening supplies; Miller said he wants to have plants at all stages.

adding that they will be grown in hydroponic

soil. Another aspect of his business will be plant rental.

"Cut flowers are gone after an event, but these large plants I have can be rented for events, halls and weddings," he said.

In his spare time, Miller said he is working on a partnership with Las Cruces Public School Districts to help educate children on growing.

"I want to help kids grow their own plants," he said. "It's all about 'grow your own' and being organic. I want people to know what is on the vegetables they are eating and be able to sustain their own fruit and vegetable (needs).

Miller said he also has big ideas for an interactive kids area with a large fish tank and clear bee hive for viewing.

Local crops fight A kid store for kids harsh conditions

Ag survives despite dry weather, diseases

By Marvin Tessneer

Though 2011 has been an unbelievably dry year, Mesilla Valley chile, cotton and cattle farmers have fought off diseases and overcome callous conditions.

Chile

Doña Ana County chile growers are switching from green to red harvest as the pods mature and change color.

The chile crop survived early wind stress that delayed emergence.

"But for the most part, the crop bounced back," said Stephany Walker, New Mexico State University Extension vegetable spe-"And we cialist. didn't have any disease problems that we normally see in wet years."

Growers found a little curly top virus that is spread vegetables. by the leafhopper, an insect host. Lack of winter rain to produce weeds kept the insect numbers down, she said.

Most chile crops are contracted, and the projected production is from 8,000 to 9,000 acres, about the same as last year, Walker said.

Dickie Ogaz in the Hatch Valley is phasing his 110 acres of green chile harvest into red pods. Any left-over green pods will be picked as red. Most of his red pods to will be transferred to processors for dehydrating, he said.

"The only problem we had was a little tip burn," Ogaz said. "We were short of water, and you can start having tip burn. About 95 percent of our irrigation this summer was by pumps.'

The Elephant Butte Irrigation District's 2011 allocation was 4 inches of river water, far short of the normal amount of 3 acre-feet. This summer, chile farmers were limited to one surface water irrigation.

Cotton

Keith Deputy, who grows 2,700 acres of upland cotton in the southern end of the county and some in Texas, reported that for the past few weeks he has been spending much of his time pumping ground water to his fields.

"It's been almost 24 hours a day," he said. "We've been pumping somewhere, sometimes all the time. When you get a drought, it complicates things.

He has been able to keep his cotton alive, but he also has to irrigate

alfalfa, pecans and onions. Deputy said his cotton bolls are starting to open, and he is planning to start picking his cotton in a couple

of weeks. He also said he has started defoliating with chemicals.

Defoliating gives you a cleaner lint for ginning, and it makes it easier to pick," he said.

Cotton seems to be free of disease this year. Wilt sometimes invades cotton fields, but that is spread by wet climate conditions, and the hot, dry summer seems to have headed off that disease,

Deputy said.

The arid climate has also helped some cotton fields mature early, and Mesa Farmer Co-op Gin processed its first module this week that was shipped in from Luna County, said gin manager Alberto Pando. He said the gin

crew is busy getting the machinery ready for a good cotton crop. "We're expecting

a really good cot-ton crop this year," Pando said. "We had perfect weather and

Many farmers cut back on vegetables.

Because of persistent drought conditions, cattlemen have reduced cow herds by 30 percent in New Mexico and 40 percent in Texas, according to a survey conducted by the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

The last good rainfall that the Mesilla Valley received was on Sept. 15 when 1 inch was recorded. After that, no rain was recorded until Oct. 3-0.05 inches. The normal October precipitation is .94 inches, state climatologist David DuBois said.

The climate forecast is for a highpressure ridge to move over the area to bring in temperatures of normal to higher than normal, he said.

The storage for both reservoirs is down, Elephant Butte is at 203,280 acre-feet, or 10.8 percent of capacity, and Caballo is at 9,070 acre-feet.

Consumers could spend less

NMSU report predicts drop in holiday shopping this season

Retailers in New Mexico and across the nation could be singing the blues this holiday season.

A report from New Mexico State University predicts holiday sales this year will drop 0.7 percent in the state and 1.8 percent in the U.S. compared to 2010.

"I hope I'm wrong, but my forecast for 2011 holiday retail sales is a lot worse than those of my fellow forecasters," said Bruce Huhmann, an associate professor of marketing at the NMSU College of Business.

The International Council of Shopping Centers, Shoppertrak, Kantar Retail Group and Deloitte's Retail Group are predicting a national increase in 2011 holiday sales ranging from 2.5 percent to 3.5 percent compared to 2010.

Huhmann said his predictions for a decline have less to do with the actual health of New Mexico's and the nation's economy and more to do with consumer fears.

A falling stock market, unstable home prices, continued high unemployment nationally and dysfunction on Capitol Hill likely portend that consumers will be spending carefully this holiday season, Huhmann said.

New Mexico will fare only slightly better than the rest of the nation in holiday retail sales this year for two main reasons, Huh-, mann said.

The first is that the unemployment rate in New Mexico has been falling at a much more steady pace than that of the rest of the country.

Unemployment here remains below the national average and has decreased from a seasonally

adjusted 6.7 percent in July to 6.6 percent in August. The unemployment rate in New Mexico stood at 7.5 percent last August. Meanwhile, the U.S. unemployment rate remains mired at 9.1 percent.

New Mexico's tendency to be more insulated from the rest of the nation's up-and-down economic cycles is the second reason for the less-pronounced predicted drop in holiday sales this year, according to Huhmann. The state's insularity comes from a large portion of the state's residents working directly or indirectly for the state and federal governments. However, this insularity could be eroded if the so-called "super committee "in Congress tasked with getting the nation's budget on track hits a stalemate.

'While (government employment) is normally a benefit to New Mexico's economy, the large numbers of New Mexicans affected by government spending could become a drag on the state economy if the congressional super committee is deadlocked and automatic budget cuts come into effect," Huhmann said.

New Mexico also faces its own challenges that will keep holiday sales down. The debt load many New Mexico residents are still carrying from the housing bubble bust is shared with the rest of the country.

This will put a damper on retail sales, especially in urban areas of New Mexico and those that attracted many retirees during the housing boom, such as Silver City," Huhmann said. "Many of these newcomers to New Mexico were wealthy retirees from other states who are still waiting for their retirement portfolios and housing values to fully recover from the 2007-09 recession."

Also, fuel prices are falling. That's good news for the average commuter in other parts of the country, but not in energy-producing states such as New Mexico, where the "economy is closely tied to commodity prices for wealth creation and job growth," Huhmann said.

In a survey of likely holiday shoppers in New Mexico, Huhmann found that 70 percent of consumers plan to target their dollars at discount retailers, with 62 percent also spending some money in department stores. Forty-nine percent say they also will buy from online retailers, while 48 percent say they plan to shop at grocery and specialty stores as well. Twenty-one percent of shoppers say fabric and craft stores, along with drug stores, will get some of their dollars.

As for retailers hoping to get the most dollars from shoppers, Huhmann's survey found that 37 percent of consumers want sales or price discounts, 24 percent look for a greater range of merchandise selection, 14 percent like everyday low prices, 12 percent prefer product quality, 7 percent opt for a convenient location and 4 percent keep an eye out for good customer service.

"Due to consumer worries over the economy and their personal financial futures, shopping is forecasted to be value-focused. Value is not solely about price, but a balance between price and benefits," Huhmann said. "We also expect consumers to reduce their shopping trips with a greater proportion of trips driven by value to discounters, retailers holding promotional sales or offering quality merchandise for a reasonable price."

Jon Barela: Continuing success in Santa Fe

Economic secretary uses experiences to support NM businesses

Politics, entrepreneurship and corporate affairs have helped pave a path of success for designate New Mexico Secretary of Economic Development Jon Barela.



Barela was born and raised in Las Cruces and attended Las Cruces High School.

"I am proud to be from this area," Barela said about Las Cruces. "I was raised by parents, who instilled a work ethic in me. My dad was a bluecollar worker who went back to school - New

Mexico State University - to get his degree, and my mom worked at (NMSU's Physical Science Laboratory) for many years. They taught me to be proud to work hard and value an education as well as treat people with respect."

Barela took these ethics with him to Washington, D.C., where he attended Georgetown University. He graduated from Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service with a bachelor's degree in history and diplomacy in 1984

"Since I was a sophomore in high school, I knew the career path I would take," Barela said. "I was always fascinated with history and foreign affairs, so I stayed focused in high school and was fortunate to accomplish what I have. I was blessed to attended such a

great university."

Unemployed and looking for a job, Barela said he woke up one morning and put on his only suit.

"The day after Congressman Joe Skeen was sworn in, I went into his office," he said. "I planned on dropping off my résumé and leaving, but when I presented it to his chief of staff, he told me to sit down."

Barela said Skeen called him back to his still unpacked office and asked just a few questions.

"He said, 'Are you looking for a job?' and When can you start?," Barela said.

So Barela started right then, unpacking boxes for the congressman. "Joe became a political mentor," Barela said

about the southern New Mexico native. "He taught me about public service and ethics in government. I had the best of both worlds because I was still in touch with New Mexico."

Georgetown University, Barela helped Skeen with daily operations of the office as well as provided legal assistance. As a senior aide to Skeen, Barela focused on House appropriations and legislative processes.

"You have to have confidence in life," Barela said about going to Skeen's office with little knowledge about the outcome. "If you want to accomplish your goals, you must believe in your abilities. Having courage means you are not afraid to fail, and you have faith in the circumstances.'

After his stint in Washington, D.C, Barela returned to New Mexico, something he said he always had plans of doing.

"I love the desert," he said.

In the Land of Enchantment, Barela joined the Modrall Law Firm where he staved for four years.

Barela was New Mexico's Assistant Attorney General in the early 1990s and joined Intel in 1993. In 2002, he co-founded Cerelink, a hightech computing provider to the motion picture industry.

"I have always been internally curious," he said. "I enjoyed practicing law and have valued all of my experiences, including the ups and downs of running a small business."

Also in the 1990s, Barela was awarded the NAACP Martin Luther King Jr. Community Service Award for his commitment and outreach to underrepresented communities.

"This award showed that everyone has the same goals," Barela said, "and connected a conservative like myself with an organization that didn't think (the party) could help.

"Now, I am in this job (at the New Mexico's Economic Development Department) and believe my past experiences have prepared me well. I have the law perspective; I understand what small businesses go through from trying to find the funds for hiring to government and taxes.

to New Mexicans, such as speaking to young people about pursuing a college career and giving advice.

"If I could give advice to anyone seeking my position, I would say the No. 1 thing to remember is know you are seeking to serve," said Barela, adding that having motivation comes in a close second. "You work tirelessly to fulfill obligations of service and do so with ethical standards. Another thing to keep in mind is this position, like any position, is temporary. Once a title becomes bigger than a person, mistakes are made. That has affected so many politicians."

Speaking to a lot of people, Barela said the message he gives on continued education is always the same.

"There is just no excuse to not go to college and achieve the goal of furthering your education," he said. "The only thing that can get in their way is themselves. We live in a country

where anything is possible."

As for personal growth, Barela said he sees every day as educational.

"I go back to school every day," he said. "I am constantly learning from my friends, colleagues and even my children."

After his time in office, Barela said he hopes to pick back up his marathon running as well as return to the small-business sector.

'Right now, I am enjoying my time in the office, serving the state of New Mexico and trying to find ways to create jobs. It is an honor," he said.

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
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



Potters' guild supports the local soup kitchen

El Caldito Soup Kitchen has been dedicated to serving the struggling families of Las Cruces for more than 27 years.

The nonprofit organization started in January 1984 by a few individuals who understood the needs of the community

and worked to collect food and provide meals for homeless and impoverished people of Las Cruces.

On average El Caldito serves more than 90,000 meals – free of charge – each year to needy individuals. With a small staff of volunteers who prepare food, serve meals and handle the entire cleanup "Empty Bowls is so important to El Caldito, especially now with the economy being so poor," said Rebecca McNair, special events coordinator for El Caldito. "Donations are down, but the need is stronger than ever."

McNair, along with Cally Williams and Jan Archy, was instrumental in getting Empty Bowls started in the Las Cruces area. The program has chapters throughout the United States, all dedicated to bringing the community together in support of local soup kitchens.

Empty Bowls was originally started in Michigan by a grassroots movement of teachers and pottery lovers around 1990 and has continued to spread throughout the country, reaching

after each service, the soup kitchen provides meals seven days a week for anyone who walks through the door.

Handling the cost of providing these meals is a huge undertaking, which is where the support of the community and fundraisers such as Empty Bowls come into play.

"I found the program on a website and knew it was the perfect combination of art and a way of helping the less fortunate," said McNair, who is hoping each of their bowls finds a home. "The turnout is just

wonderful; it's really amazing to see how many people care." This year, the 19th annual Las Cruces Empty

Bowls, El Caldito's major fundraising event, is being held with help from the Potters' Guild of Las Cruces. Each year, Empty Bowls is organized to help raise hunger awareness and provide El Caldito with the funds it needs to continue the nonprofit operation.

The event will be held from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Friday, Oct. 21, at St. Paul's United Methodist Church, 225 W. Griggs Ave.

Over the last six months, Potters' Guild members have used studio workdays to create more than 1,000 bowls. The studio time was donated by the Las Cruces Museum of Art to allow the artists a space to work and ovens to fire their pieces.

The crafted bowls, each as unique as it is beautiful, are provided at the Empty Bowls event, where attendees enjoy soup, bread and drinks donated by 35 local restaurants. Ticketholders are able to take their handmade bowl with them after the event as a souvenir and reminder that hunger is an ongoing issue, and preventing it is an unending battle.

"It really takes a community to bring this all together," said Letha Rushing, a member of the Potters' Guild. "We couldn't do it without the help and support of local people, vendors and organizations."



Performer spins craft for reading foundation

Monika Mojika, actor, writer, performer and full-time mother, has been bringing imagination to Las Cruces since

she arrived at New Mexico State University as a freshman looking to major in theater.

Born in El Paso, the 30-something artist began helping others in Las Cruces realize their acting aspirations by accepting a teaching position at Doña Ana Community College, where she currently leads a course on introduction to theater and acting.

"I love every aspect of the theater business," Mojika said. "I've grown so

much over the years from writing, to performing, and back again.'

'They accused my mom of writing my stories for me," Mojika said. "It hurt my feelings, but pushed me to be even better."

Since her husband is Fred Bugbee, the head of the NMSU Percussion Studio, it came as no surprise when Mojika set her tales to music.

"The sound provides a heartbeat," said Mojika, who acts out the stories rather than just reads them. "It helps create a living, breathing tale."



Back at the Rio Grande

Russian pop artist makes a stop in Las Cruces

During her first visit to Las Cruces, Russianborn pop artist Marina V loved it so much that she decided to return to the Mesilla Valley for an encore performance Friday, Oct. 14, at the Rio Grande Theatre, 211

N. Main St. Playing piano, Marina V will fill the theater with a voice that has been deemed "hauntingly beauti-

ful" by the Los Angeles

Times. "My sound is melodic and passionate pop rock," she said. "When I was growing up, I listened to a lot of Beatles and Russian folk music. The Beatles, their music is amazing, and Russian folk music is loaded with emotions and passion.

Maybe the combination of both made its way into my sound."

Born in Moscow, Russia, Marina Verenikina moved to the United States on a scholarship when she was 15 years old. While she had been singing she was a baby – "my mom said I was singing before I was talking," she said - Marina V took the plunge in the professional music world when she was in college.

"It just felt right," she said. "I sold my pickup truck as a freshman (in college) and bought my



own keyboard."

From there, she began writing and composing music and decided to moved to Los Angeles and pursue the career full time. Since then, her career has blossomed, and she as performed at venues such as Hollywood, Calif., Kodak Theatre,

the American Embassy in Moscow and countless clubs from Paris to Sydney.

> She wrote the theme song for the film "Fallen Idol" and "Truth About Kerry" and has had her songs featured on television shows, including "Days of Our Lives" and "The Good Wife."

Her focus now is her new album "My Star," which was released in January.

"I wrote all of the songs expect for a Guns N' Roses cover and a

Russian traditional song that I sing a cappella," she said. "I recorded in the studio with the producer for the Gypsy Kings in Hollywood. I

raised \$30,000 from fans to make the album." When she comes to the Rio Grande Theatre, Marina said she promises to perform her original music and keep the audience entertained with funny snippets.

'Russian humor doesn't always translate," she said with a laugh, "but I promise to entertain and hopefully move the crowd. And they can expect a hug from me. I stay and hug everyone who wants







Local play goes 'Online' Social networking takes a sharp turn

Local author, comedian - and now playwright - Alan Riehl's first-ever produced play "Online" premieres in Las Cruces Friday, Oct. 21, at Mikey's Place – A Workshop for the Arts, 3100 Harrelson St.

While the comedy is the first produced play for Riehl, the play also tells a story that has never been touched on before. Social networking is everywhere, but in "Online," the story takes a different turn than one would expect.

The opening scene starts out with Jason, the lead character, arguing with his soon-to-be ex-girlfriend Allison. Jason is ultimately a jerk who is sarcastic and hateful, and when the two break up, Allison becomes gay.

After hatefully telling his ex-girlfriend that he can be a better woman than she can, the story begins to unfold. Jason's friends convince him to, in fact, become a girl, but over the Internet.

"He learns that it's not easy to be a female online," Riehl said. "He goes through a lot of what other females go through online.

Despite adult themes that surround poten-

tially serious issues and "no redeeming characters," the play is a comedy. A perfectly cast comedy at that.

A playwright has in mind exactly the type of person who would play each role, and Riehl said he was lucky enough to fill each position nearly to a T.

"Jason is the aggressive, kind of in-yourface guy who's not afraid to say anything. (Rafael Medina, who plays Jason) exerted the perfect energy for that part," Riehl said. "The director said that the pieces just fit together like a puzzle. It was really great casting. The director has done a really good job of putting everything together."

In addition to Medina, the cast includes Marissa Bond as Alison Anderson, the ex-girlfriend.

"Rafael and Marissa are boyfriend and girlfriend in real life, so their chemistry is priceless," Riehl said.

Along with being assistant director of "Online," Alex Wheeler plays the "perfect" Heather, Jason's psych major friend who plays along with Jason only for her benefit. Autumn Gieb is Amy, Jason's older sister who has total control of her 15-year marriage to Peter, played by

Chris Wilkinson. Cody Dalton is Grant, Jason's "not-so-smart" friend who assists with the cruel joke.

The remaining cast members fill in the roles of other online characters. Jade Diaz is the voice of "Bunny Buns" and other online female roles; Mark Ross Edrys is the online character Johnny Rondo; and Frank Alvarado also lends his voice to male characters online.

They're all part of the fictional social networking site, Facespace. Since the play is mostly set in cyberspace, the set is minimal and all scenes take place in a bedroom or living room.

Georjina and Martha Nogal are stage managers and Don McCoy is production manager for the play.

For his first produced play, Riehl admitted there were some challenges, but for the most part, it has been an enjoyable experience to get him prepared for what lies ahead. It was help from the local theater community that helped prepared for the production of his play.

"I did six rewrites on my play," he said. "A group of theater actors read the play and they helped me with it, and they're all acknowledged in the play. Because of the fact I am new to the theater scene, I wanted the input of the pros, and they were extremely helpful."

Other organizations were helpful, he said, including sponsor Mikey's Place, MDC Computers, Dublin's Street Pub and Wild Horse Design Co.

Though he may take a break from playwriting, the next step for Riehl, is writing the screenplay, which he said he'll get started on



Finding yourself amid chaos

After catastrophic event, 'Anita' finds a way home

Based on a true event and starring a real non-actor, "Anita" is one of the most moving and vibrant films I have seen this year.

The film takes place in Buenos Aires in 1994. Anita is played by 37-year-old Alejandra Manzo who has Down syndrome, the genetic condition that was often referred to in our more ignorant and insensitive days as mental retardation. Thankfully, that term has been exiled by people who understand stigmas.

Anita is happy in her life, as long as her routine is strictly adhered to. She lives with a loving, supportive mother who runs a small shop in the city and she adores her older brother, who does not have Down syndrome and is completely unreliable. His wellmeaning promises to Anita often are broken, something she takes to heart a little bit, but at the same time, she continues on with her life, which she appreciates in a subtle, understated way that most of us cannot relate to.

I hate to give away this part of the story, but I can't think of a way around it, so if you are not wanting what I consider to be a major "spoiler," just skip down a few paragraphs.

One day as Anita and her mother are walking to an appointment, a bomb explodes in the offices of the Argentine Israelite Mutual Association. This is the true portion of the story, as this attack killed nearly 100 people, in





the country that has the largest Jewish population of any in South America.

Anita is knocked for a loop, but her mother is not as fortunate. Unable to find her mother and unable to understand what has happened, Anita is soon wandering the streets of the city, trying to find her way home.

She sort of knows her address, but not really. She knows what a telephone is, but is unsure as to how it works, and if she did, chances are, unless it was written down, she'd not know the number to call.

During her journey, Anita meets a number of people, some kind, some not so kind and some who are philosophical. These people all have one thing in common – they don't want Anita to be given to the "authorities," as they know she will be plopped into an institution.





Anita's main benefactors, helping her to clean up, feeding her and actually allowing for room and board in exchange for some simple tasks at the woman's business.

An alcoholic photographer, Ariel also plays a role in Anita's story, but it is Anita herself, using her wits, resources and common sense, who becomes her own benefactor as she wanders for days, relying on the kindness of strangers. She is patient, kind, loyal and obedient to a fault, especially in a slightly humorous scene when Anita is told to stay put, no matter what. The film is flecked with such breaches of quiet humor, and this allows it to have even more humanity, as it takes the edge off an often-precarious situation.

Manzo does a superior job in her role as Anita and director Marcos Carnevale matches that performance with a story that is believable and balanced, while leaving the opportunities to make it maudlin far behind.

This film is another of those small films that deserves a better chance and a bigger audience – you should be one of that number.

Playing with 'Green Fire' Documentary follows work of Leopold

The CineMatinee for 1:30 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 15, is "Green Fire: Aldo Leopold and a Land Ethic for Our Time" (2011, 75 minutes, not rated, partially filmed in New Mexico).

The documentary film "Green Fire" explores conservationist Aldo Leopold's personal journey and reveals how his idea of a "land ethic" resonates today with people across the entire American landscape, from inner cities to the remotest wild lands.

The impact of his own gunshot from a rimrock in Arizona that killed a wolf changed Leopold's own thinking. Join the Mesilla Valley Film Society as it trace Leopold's personal journey and follow

the threads that connect to his legacy today.

The film provocatively examines Leopold's thinking, renewing his idea of a land ethic for a population facing 21st century ecological challenges. Leopold's biographer, conservation biologist Dr. Curt Meine, serves as the film's on-screen guide.

"Green Fire" describes the formation of Leopold's ideas, exploring how it later per-meated through all arenas of conservation. The film challenges viewers to contemplate their own relationship with the land community.

"Green Fire" also features commentary and insight from some of today's most recognized and credible scholars and conservation leaders, including three of Aldo Leopold's children – Nina, Carl, and Estella Leopold – scholars, noted environmental writers, scientists, humanities experts, public policy leaders, business leaders and leaders of nonprofit groups inspired by Leopold.

This film is being shown with sponsor-ship from the Southwest Environmental Center and with support from the Silver City International Film Society and Keep Las Cruces Beautiful.





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

Boston zoo takes local show

Endangered animal exhibit travels to New England By Natisha Hales

Local artist Linda Miller, whose "Endangered Wildlife" exhibit premiered in Las Cruces, has donated her one-of-a-kind portraits to Zoo New England.

Miller, a snowbird who lives part-time in Las Cruces and the remainder of the year in New England, shared her exhibit – which includes 26 oil paintings of endangered animal species – with the Franklin Park Zoo as a major fundraiser. The magnitude of the show will expose her work to thousands of zoo supporters, and it will also spread awareness of the critical situation, which is the show's original purpose.

When the show opened at the Blue Gate Gallery in February 2010, the response was "heavy," said gallery owner Flo Hosa Dougherty. Against a black backdrop, the extreme close-ups of each animal were on display along with information about their critical condition from the International Union for Conservation of Nature Redlist of Threatened Species and other related organizations – 26 pairs of eyes staring right back at you.

Those eyes stared back at thousands more when it was on display in the zoo Oct. 1, 2, 8 and 9.

"I'm so delighted for her," Dougherty said. Not only will Miller donate her work, but Dougherty said Miller was invited to create work alongside a "talented ape" at the zoo.

The inspiration for the exhibit, according to Miller in an earlier interview, was found after a challenge to paint eyes. It was animal eyes that came to mind for Miller, and she discovered everything she had painted was on the endangered species list – the big horn sheep, grizzly bear, giant panda, Rothschild's giraffe, etc. They all had similar stories – habitats were destroyed, hunting, poaching, even in the United States.

"They're not all exotic jungle animals," Dougherty said. "Some of these are right here in the Southwest."

Miller helped bring attention to the issue and is satisfying her goal in donating the show to different wildlife organizations for them to use as fundraisers.

Honor recognizes 44-year contribution

When New Mexico State University's Center for the Arts opens in fall 2012, its theater will have a familiar name to many in the Mesilla Valley.

The NMSU Board of Regents voted Monday, Oct. 10, to name the theater in honor of Mark and Stephanie Medoff.

"The Medoffs have made a lasting imprint on the arts in our region and it is fitting that we honor their dedication and talents," said NMSU President Barbara Couture. "NMSU's Department of Theatre Arts and the Creative Media Institute would not be what they are without Mark's perseverance and talent. He has made a difference to so many students whose lives he has touched."

The multi-phased Center for the Arts project is designed to consolidate NMSU's arts programs into one centralized location. Phase I, which is under construction now, is a threestory academic facility, about 59,000 square feet in size, at the southeast corner of University Avenue and Espina Street.

The building will house the 450-seat theater performance space to be named for the Medoffs, a 74-foot-high fly tower and full theater and dance support areas. The structure also will contain public space, shared classrooms and a home for the theater department. Phase I is scheduled for completion in November 2012.

Mark Medoff has played an important role in the growth of the theater arts program at NMSU since he arrived in 1966 to be an instructor in the Department of English. He co-founded the American Southwest Theatre Company with the late Bruce Streett in 1981

to facilitate bringing guest artists to campus to provide students and faculty with professional enrichment experiences.

"I was 26 when I arrived here," Medoff said. "I knew no one. I was going to stay a year. Forty-four years, three daughters and sons-in law, and six grandchildren later, it's fair to say the vast majority of my friends and students passed through this city and university and helped to define me as a teacher and an artist. To be recognized as part of the NMSU legacy honors not only the Medoff family, but everyone who has touched our lives."

Mark and his wife, Stephanie, also have generously donated nearly half a million dollars to NMSU to establish endowments for student scholarships and support other programs across campus, most recently a generous gift of land to support the construction of the Center for the Arts.

Beyond his monetary generosity, it has been Medoff's active mentorship of students while they were enrolled at NMSU and continuing as they went forward to pursue professional careers that has made a lasting impact on the many students who studied here during his more than 20-year tenure, as well as his passion for the theater arts department as a whole and the newly formed Creative Media Institute, for which he serves as artistic director, that would be recognized with this naming honor, said Dennis Prescott, president of the NMSU Foundation, who presented the recommendation to the regents.

"Mark is above all a man of honor and commitment. He has been pressured many times over the past 40 years to leave here for the more visible show business venues of New York and Los Angeles or for the greener pastures of larger, richer universities. But he made

a commitment in his heart to me, to our children, and to Las Cruces and New Mexico State University, and what is in his heart always wins out in the end," said Stephanie Medoff.

College of Arts and Sciences Dean Christa Slaton nominated the Medoffs for the honor, saying, "As the Department of Theatre Arts prepares to relocate in the new Center for the Arts, it would be very appropriate for their

performance space to carry the name of one of the visionaries who put the department on the path to excellence.'

Medoff was instrumental in the current NMSU theater being re-named for one of his mentors, Hershel Zohn.

"Hershel encouraged me to write for the theater and then produced my first full-length play in 1968," Medoff said. "I got to introduce Hershel to a full house on the night his name went officially on that building. Were he here, Hershel would know the part he played in the current moment in NMSU history. We look forward to entering the Mark and Stephanie Medoff Theatre in the not too distant future. And, of course, I look forward to the opportunity to try the place out."

Medoff has written more than 28 plays and 12 screenplays. An early success was "When You Comin' Back, Red Rider?" and in 1980 he received a Tony Award for his Broadway hit "Children of a Lesser God." Medoff was named a Guggenheim Fellow (1974) and a Fellow of the College of Fellows of the American Theatre (1999). He is the recipient of numerous awards including the Drama Desk Award (1974 and 1980), the John Gassner Playwrit-ing Award (1974), the Obie Award for Distinguished Playwriting (1974) and the Kennedy Center Medallion for Excellence in Artistic Education and Artistic Achievement (2006). He also has directed six movies and more than 24 plays and musicals, many of which were works by some of his protégés.

Medoff said two of his proudest accomplishments are his 1974 Westhafer Award for Excellence in Creative Activity, NMSU's highest faculty honor and his 1980 Governor's Award for Excellence in the Arts, the State of New Mexico Lifetime Achievement. During his acceptance speech he said, "Though not born in New Mexico, I am a New Mexican."


"Real Steel," an action thriller set in the near future, explores a world where the sport of boxing has been taken over by giant, battling robots.

Charlie Kenton (Hugh Jackman) is a washed-up fighter who lost his career when human boxing was no longer profitable. Instead, the show falls on remote-controlled giant, 2,000-pound, 7-foot-tall steel robots that fight each other.

He hits rock bottom and reluctantly becomes partners with his estranged, 11-year-old son Max (Dakota Goyo). They team up to build and train their next robot champion.

With the old-fashioned case of, "Dad, can I keep him?," Max decides that a sparring robot named Atom, aged and without real fighting skill, is their best bet. Soon, as Atom begins tearing through the competition, Charlie begins to realize this is his last shot at a comeback - and a hefty paycheck.

The movie invites you to follow the fatherson team through the trials and tribulations of fighting Atom against larger, more brutal

bots. The plot is predictable - a typical underdog story that left me rooting mostly for Max instead of the robot. The film's saving grace was Goyo's dance moves, which, of course, he taught the robot.


The father-son relationship is a little dry, mostly due to Jackman's inability to convince us he cares for his son. Goyo shoulders the great surprise of this movie and most of the acting weight. He is delightfully stubborn and just cute enough that we still care. Had they made him 14 instead of 11? I doubt we'd have cared at all.

Charlie's strained relationship with Bailey Tallet (Evangeline Lilly), the daughter of his boxing mentor, is obvious and takes away from the action. Lilly pulls off the strong but vulnerable role, but we've seen this character before. "Lost," anyone?

Despite the David-and-Goliath premise and the obvious ending, the special effects and the buckets of money producers threw into this film salvaged it. It was cheap entertainment that has relied on the industry's ability to use computer graphics to convince us the robots are real.

In the spirit of "Rocky," Atom, with his name painted red white and blue, gets his shot at the biggest, baddest, foreign-owned robot around. What you end up with is "Transformers" without the explosives-lover Michael Bay or the train wreck that is Megan Fox's acting career.

"Real Steel" is entertaining, but lends very little value to the art of film or to Jackman's career.

Going green and getting healthy

As residents of Las Cruces, we are residents of the desert. At times, it can be easy to forget that the resources we do have, especially water, are limited.

It may seem daunting when trying to balance the many tasks of our daily lives, to take the time to be environmentally conscious.

As the fall weather sets in, this is the perfect time of year to think about the simple things we can do to make a positive impact on our surroundings.

Additionally, most of the things we do to benefit the environment have personal health benefits and usually save us money in the long run. Here are a few easy things that anyone can do to make a positive impact.

Consider adding them all, or just a few, to your daily life. Spending the extra time now will be worth the pay off for the environment and as an individual.

Travel by bike. As the change in weather makes for beautiful temperatures, consider leaving your car at home and commuting by bicycle. Most car trips the average family makes are within a two-mile radius of the family's home, a distance that is easily bike-able. Riding your bike eliminates car emissions, is great exercise and will quickly save you money as you spend less on gas each week.

Plant a fall garden or consider an early spring garden. This is the perfect time of year to put in seeds and start-ers for your fall garden. Plants such as greens, squash, herbs and beans grow well in the fall. Growing your own food is beneficial for the soil, allowing you to control the amount of pesticides you put into your system and eliminates trips to the grocery store for produce (subsequently eliminating unpleasant car emissions.) Growing your own food may motivate you to eat the food which may help you increase the number of

Staph infections are preventable

Tips to keep you and your family healthy Cover all wounds with a clean bandage, and avoid contact with soiled

A recent outbreak of the MRSA bacterium found in eight detainees of the Doña Ana County Detention Center has prompted renewed attention to the common staph infection.

MRSA is a strain of the staph.aureus bacteria, which is immune to antibiotics and can cause more serious symptoms.

The U.S. Department of Health estimates that one in four carry the staph bacteria on skin or in nasal passages that usually does not cause illness or infection.

Staph infections can occur if the bacteria enters a person's body through cuts or sores, and can cause minor skin irritations such as pimples.

MRSA, or methicillin-resistant staphylococcus aureus, is a strain of the staph bacteria that is resistant to most antibiotics and can cause more serious complications to the heart, lungs, blood or bone.

their battle against breast cancer. "My struggle to get in shape and finish this thing is nothing compared to the fight they have dealt with," Salgado said.

The hardest part, Salgado added, is not being in the city to train with the rest of her team, but the Komen foundation has been helpful in providing training suggestions and schedules to be on track with what it takes to finish.

Together with a team composed of nine other women, each of whom are required to raise \$2,300 in order to participate, Salgado's team "Simply the Breast" has already raised amost \$25,000 to go toward the Komen Foundation.

Surrounded by a support network of family, friends, co-workers and students, Salgado has not had to do it alone.

Staph infections occur most often in people who have shared equipment or personal items with others such as athletes and members of the military. The more serious staph infections

Clean your hands before and after playing sports. Shower right after exercising and do not share soap or

towels with other people. If you share sporting equipment, clean it first with antiseptic solution and then use clothing or a towel between your skin and the equipment. Avoid common whirlpools or saunas if another participant has an open sore. Always use clothing or a

towel as a barrier. Symptoms of the severe MRSA infections can include chest pain, chills, cough, fatigue, fever, headache, muscle aches, rash and shortness of breath.

If you think you may have a MRSA infection, do not try to treat the infection yourself. A qualified doctor will take appropriate tests and prescribe corresponding medications.

The leading cardiology program manager, Sam Bustillos, reported that MountainView's average response time for a heart attack is 43 minutes, less than half of the national average of 90 minutes.

In addition to continuing its reputation of being a leader in cardiac care, MountainView has officially embarked on work to gain a primary stroke care center accreditation from the Joint Commission.

Bustillos, also the stroke coordinator, said work began on the project a mere two days after accreditation was granted for the chest pain center, and it was "two days too long."

The news of advancing the hospital's stroke treatment program comes as welcome news for local stroke survivors, and their families, who have struggled firsthand with the lack of care previously available in this part of the state.

Following a stroke experience in 2008, Las Cruces residents Dave and Judy Bess were frightened as well as frustrated by the medical attention they received locally. They said it caused them to question their wisdom about moving to southern New Mexico for retirement.

Traveling to their home state of Michigan shortly after Dave's stroke, they were told by one of the top stroke researchers in the state the care they received in Las Cruces was consistent with practices that were "20 years old."

Dave Bess was fortunate.

An avid runner and bicyclist, he was essentially able to cure himself during his emergency room visit because of the built-up tPA, a clot busting protein, in his system.

Most stroke victims are not so lucky, and, if they survive, many suffer a wide range of long-term physical and mental disabilities that take years of physical therapy to overcome.

"It's not something we're taking lightly, to become the first accredited stroke program in southern New Mexico," Bustillos said.

According to the New Mexico Department of Health, Doña Ana County sees about one stroke patient per day, making it a very urgent health care need in the state.

Spurred by their experience, Judy and Dave Bess began working to help others avoid the scare they endured. They became active in the American Heart & Stroke Association, (AHA/ASA) and pursued avenues with government agencies at all levels to advance New Mexico's stroke treatment programs.

"We wanted to be part of fixing this big problem in New Mexico, and not leaving our friends and neighbors to learn the hard way from personal experience as we had," Judy Bess said.

On Sept. 29, the Besses were invited to kick off MountainView Regional Medical Center's announcement to begin work on becoming a primary stroke care center, which they "enthusiastically and proudly participated in." "We are thrilled beyond belief that finally after three

"We are thrilled beyond belief that finally after three years of imploring people to do something for the community, (Mountain View) has a leadership team unlike anything the city has ever seen," Dave Bess said.

MountainView now has a neurosurgeon on call 24 hours a day, and instead of flying stroke victims to El Paso or Albuquerque during crucial minutes of their lives, appropriate care for most stroke victims can be given right here in Las Cruces.

Some simple steps for athletes include: pulling together resources from car washes and ribbon-sellings, Salgado's part



Since 2000, Veloz Homes has provided the Las Cruces area with affordably priced homes. Now, the company is introducing a new twist to its product.

Located at 4248 Canterra Arc, the model home for the new "BellaSpazio" collection, completed two weeks ago, showcases the company's new dedication to style, detail and efficiency in the \$189,999 to \$270,000 price range

We have been very good at hitting the price point in the \$130,000 to \$200,000 range," said Billie Haynie, sales manager for Veloz Homes. 'We hadn't attracted the luxury homebuyers because of the market. We're trying to get back into that market. We've had people come through our models who have wanted larger homes with more amenities."

Listening to that request, Haynie said Veloz Homes President has used inspiration from his travels around the country to create a line of homes that aren't common.

different than a typical Veloz home," Haynie said. "The homes have all of these pretty things. It's pretty without having to spend too much."

As guests drive through the Del Prado neighborhood, they'll come to the 2,239square-foot home located on a corner lot.

"It's called the BellaSpazio Collection, which means 'pretty spaces,'" Haynie said. "We made sure it was a unique space inside and out. If you look, the side of the home is as pretty as the front. We didn't just focus on the front."

Designed in a Spanish colonial style, including a combination pitched and flat roof, the home is surrounded by rock landscaping of varying colors, which complements the rock detailing on its façade.

Through the front door, guests are greeted by tile flooring and a chandelier hanging from the groin ceiling.

To the left is a study area, which can also double as an at-home office. Lined with wood flooring, the room includes a checkered pattern on the ceiling. The matching dark features on the floor and ceiling pop against the light tan walls.

Beyond the entrance to the right is the formal dining room. Colored a bright turquoise, the tray ceiling is painted two tones of tan. The room has a recess with spot lighting for a hutch, or other furniture item.

"This room can be converted into a media room," Havnie said.

The hall, speckled in lighted nichos, leads to the open living room-kitchen area.

"It's an open space, but we've defined the space with varying ceiling heights," she said.

The living room, which includes an accent wall painted in the same vibrant turquoise, features a gas fireplace set in a wall of rock. Above this is an area for a flat screen TV. An interesting detail, Haynie said all of the wires and components for the entertainment center are located in a closet in a bedroom on the other side of the wall.

"Nothing is sitting out," she said. "There isn't any clutter."

A tech desk and informal dining area separate the living room from the kitchen. Juparana Bordeaux granite from Brazil, which is also found in the two bathrooms, lines the kitchen countertops and surrounds the granite-composite sink.

Beside the kitchen is the master suite. The relaxing atmosphere includes the same detailing as the rest of the home, such as the accent colors and unique ceiling treatment that includes rope lighting to give the space a soft glow, Haynie said.

The bathroom of the master suite continues that sense of comfort.

"It's a spa-like bathroom," Haynie said.

Consisting of his-and-her sinks as well as an island bathtub drenched in tile, the room also features a separate shower as well as a walk-in closet.

The other side of the home includes the two guest bedrooms as well as a full bath. An interesting design feature, Haynie said the bathroom includes a large walk-in shower rather than a bathtub.

"More people are asking for this," she said. 'It's becoming really popular."

Back at the living room, 8-foot sliding glass doors lead to the covered patio. Beside the covered patio, which over looks the flagstone and rock-covered backyard, is the outdoor living area.

A new feature for the company, the enclosed space includes a fireplace and protects visitors from the elements so it can be enjoyed yearround, Haynie said.

While the home's style makes it pop, its efficiency is also an important feature. Havnie said Veloz Homes can build homes that are to - or even beyond – Energy Star standards.

"This home was built with a staggered 2-by-4 construction," she said, adding that the building technique is more efficient because it allows for the blown-in Fiberglas to completely fill the cavities. "It makes the home very insulated.'

Featuring a Home Energy Rating of 60, the residence uses 40 percent less energy than that built to current building codes and 25 percent less than that built to Energy Star standards.

Haynie said the collection comes in three styles and homeowners can choose a variety of lavouts and design elements.

We have very accommodating floor plans," she said. "I think this will spark people's imagination.'

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Advanced framing You won't be spooked by this skeleton

Miles Dyson Living Green

Wood lumber framing is the skeleton for most homes.

Wood is one of the least expensive and most renewable materials used in construction. For this reason, the majority of homes in southern New Mexico and the United States are built using traditional wood "stick frame" construction techniques.

Prompted by increased energy costs and lumber shortages in the 1970s, the National Association of Home Builder's Research Foundation conducted studies to identify what wood frame structural configuration was necessary to maintain superior strength and allow the maximum insulation in wall cavities to improve energy efficiency. The result was called "optimal value engineering" (OVE).

Optimum value engineering - or simply "advanced framing" - has two main benefits. No. 1, it eliminates framing components that serve no structural purpose, this reduces waste as well as unnecessary costs for the buver. No. 2, it makes more room for insulation and limits hot or cold spots, making the house more comfortable and less expensive to heat and cool.

The insulating value of Fiberglas, cellulose, spray foam or cotton batting materials is much greater than the adjacent wood framing. A wall described as R-19 will only have the rated insulating value in the space

between the wall studs. The R-value at the point in the wall where there is no space for insulation is only about R-6 or 7 (at the stud). Additional or unnecessary wood framing decreases the insulating performance of any wall system. A traditional framed (16-inch on center) 2-by-6 wall with R-19 insulation will have an overall thermal performance of only about R-13.

An OVE wall with studs spaced at 24-inch on center can improve cumulative wall system insulating performance to R-18. This means a builder can net almost a 30 percent improvement in wall system performance by adopting advanced framing techniques.

OVE, advanced framing practices can include:

- Walls framed with support studs on 24-inch centers rather than on 16-inch centers
- Corners made from two studs rather than four (allows for insulation at house corners - standard framing leaves gaps with no insulation)
- Headers sized according to the load they actually carry.
- Roofs built with engineered trusses rather than framed conventionally on site
- Floors framed with smaller/stronger laminated I-joists rather than dimensional sawn lumber
- Ladder blocking for partition wall intersections
- Stacked loads from trusses down to the foundation - alignment of truss loads over wall framing maintains structural strength with fewer wall studs
- Structural insulated sheathing can replace



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conventional plywood or oriented strand board (OSB) used for exterior sheathing Variations include offset 2-by-4 framing

on 2-by-6 plates - this allows space for insulation at each stud providing a thermal break between the interior and exterior. These Advanced Framing or OVE practices

are quietly being integrated as a new standard of home construction in our area. Most framing contractors have begun to use at least some of these recognized OVE features. Builders certifying homes with Energy Star, Build Green New Mexico or LEED for Homes work with framers to maximize the benefits of smart framing. The kicker is, you won't know if your new home has this feature unless you ask about it.

OVE framing can't be seen after insulation and drywall are installed. Homes with a Home Energy Rating Index completed during the construction process have the type of wall framing and the amount of insulation installed described and documented by an independent third-party inspector.

Don't be haunted by high-energy costs in your next new home. Learn about advanced and OVE framing and make sure this skeleton feature is working for you.

"New Mexico and west Texas were underserved," he said, adding that the region offers geographical challenges because the major cities are so spread out. "I saw potential in the territory and in the industry."

Having spent 28 years in the construction industry in one form or another, Martinez said he joined Elastek because he thought it was a progressive company, and he was eager to serve the Southwest, where he was originally from.

"They saw what the industry was doing and decided to branch out and expand," he said, adding that Elastek served Arizona and California.

Since branching out, Martinez said the mpany has seen much

company has seen much success and continued growth. "Coatings are the

fastest growing segment of the roofing industry," he said. "People are starting to realize that they don't have to replace their roofs."

Martinez explained that replacing a roof is a complicated process that can be very costly, while a cool-roof system is relatively simple.

"It's practical," he said.

Conducted on already-established roofs, Martinez said the coating is applied after the

surface has been properly cleaned and prepped. The substance isn't a paint, but rather a liquidapplied membrane that forms a sheet of plastic, he said.

While there are various white-roof coating systems available, Martinez said what makes Elastek stand out is its choice of resins, which influence the longevity of the product by making it more resistant to UV degradation.

"It's all about the resins," he said. "A lot of manufacturers put in fillers.

"Ours is very resistant to UV rays. UV degradation is a roof's worst enemy."

Martinez explained that there are two key characteristics of a cool roof: its reflectivity – how much heat and light are bounced back into the atmosphere – and emissivity – the

ability to release heat.

"It doesn't hold the heat in," he said, adding that the roofs will be about 20 degrees cooler than before.

Applicable on flat and low-slope roofs, Martinez said he has conducted mostly commercial projects in El Paso while installing the system on both residential and commercial buildings in Las Cruces.

"It's been fun because everywhere I go everyone is eager to learn about (cool roofs)," he said. "There has been an extreme amount of growth here. When the company first came to the market here, we didn't know how fast it would grow."

Traveling all over New Mexico and west Texas, Martinez said he has conducted projects with several entities, including New Mexico State University, University of Texas-El Paso, the Albuquerque Museum of Natural History, Los Alamos National Laboratories and the cities of Albuquerque, Santa Fe and Las Cruces.

Working not only with roofing and general contractors, Martinez said he also calls on property managers and maintenance, architects and engineers.

"Everyone wants to know about it," he said, adding that the product is economical, energy efficient and environmentally friendly.

While there are a few contractors Martinez said he works closely with in Las Cruces, he added that homeowners could do their own roof coating application, if desired.

"Tucson has more coated roofs per capita than anywhere else, and everyone does it themselves," Martinez said. "It can be a do-ityourself project with the proper research and education."

Established as a family-owned operation, Martinez said the original owners recently sold Elastek to Illinois Tool Work (ITW), a worldwide manufacturing company with a diverse product line.

"It was time for the company to grow, and ITW realized its potential," Martinez said. "The Elastek brand will go around the country, not just regionally."

Through this, the company has merged with ER Systems out of Minnesota and Pacific Polymers in California.

"We're getting into waterproofing membranes and sealants," he said, adding that waterproofing is conducted to an entire building. "We're taking all three brands nationally. It will kick off in July. The future of Elastek is very exciting."

With new products currently being tested and the industry constantly evolving, Martinez said he looks forward to meeting even more people interested in the green roofing material.

"I get to meet people from all walks of life," he said. "I enjoy educating people and talking to people."

Plan ahead to guarantee decorating success

Setting goals and drawing floor plans can help create a beautiful, complete room

Having a clear vision of what your goals are in your next decorating project will help you to accomplish exactly what you want.

You know the old saying "look before you leap"? The true meaning of that in decorating is to prepare yourself before you begin. Careful planning and a clear vision of what you're trying to achieve will ensure that your next decorating project will be a success.

It's so easy to jump into a project because you want immediate gratification. But I would encourage you to first write down what you're trying to achieve.

Make a list of goals to be achieved and the scope of the work that you're going to do. For example, you might write, "decorate the bathroom area by Nov. 1." You may be thinking that the goal is simply to make the room look as beautiful as possible, but you really need to dig a little deeper: Is your project tied to an all-over improvement plan; is it just a quick fix; will the project increase the value of your home; are you giving your room a partial or complete makeover? You get the idea.

Take your time and really make an effort to determine why you're doing this home decorating project and what you hope to achieve. It's really critical to complete this first step before you move on to another.

You need a budget before you can go much farther. How much will it cost to turn your decorating ideas into a reality? To create a budget you need to list the cost of materials and services in as much detail as possible. Contact craftsmen in your area for the cost of services such as painting, plumbing and electrical work. Once you have put together your totals, add 10 to 20 percent as a contingency to cover unexpected costs. Can you live



with the final dollar amount? If not, you'll have to decide what to cut or to make changes in. Find your decorating style. Knowing your decorating style

will make it easier for you to identify furniture and accessories that will fit well together and work for you. Are you a traditional, casual or contemporary person? Or, are you a mix of more than one of them? That style is called eclectic. Eclectic people occasionally rebel against conventional decorating rules. I would define my own decorating as eclectic – mostly because I love every style and want to use them together.

Another thing that most people don't do is to create a floor plan. Using a pencil and graph paper, make a drawing that represents the length and width of your room. Be sure to locate windows and doors and any other architectural elements. Actually draw shapes to represent your sofa, chairs, tables, bed, etc., to make sure everything fits. Buying too much furniture that won't fit into your space is a costly mistake. Planning ahead to know it will fit is your best bet.

Most rooms have an architectural focal point built-in (fireplace, bookcases, or a window with a view). If, however, your room is focal-point-challenged, you'll need to create a focal point. This isn't difficult to do. It can be a large armoire, a painting or a decorative rug. The key is to remember that you need to identify that focal point and work with it. It will also make your decorating easier because you'll arrange your conversation area so it will naturally flow from it to the focal point.

Probably of no big surprise to you is that creativity and imagination are essential to bringing life to your decorating project. If you feel you are challenged in that area, seek out an interior designer to work with or look at online pictures, decorating magazines or books for your ideas. Many times my first assignment to new clients is to find pictures of things they like so we know how to define their style and taste.

Have fun in finding things you love and making your space your own. The best compliment I receive as a designer is that the room or house looks exactly like the owner and not me.

Colander uses outside the kitchen Sieve has a range of applications that don't involve pasta

Whether a miner enthusiastically panning for gold or a bartender straining a signature drink, a sieve is a handy tool to keep around.

Also known as a sifter, a sieve simply separates desirable elements from unwanted materials, such as a solid from a liquid. The tool consists of some sort of mesh or perforated material held together by a band.

While sieves are used for a variety of applications, the most common is cooking. In the kitchen, there are several types of sieves, such as the flour sifter used to aerate the fine powder, cocktail strainer used to chill mixed drinks while they're being prepared and the mesh strainer used to declump foods.

Probably the most well-known type of cooking sieve, however, is the colander. This bowl-shaped tool is used to strain food when cooking. Especially popular for pasta, the holes in the contraption allow water to fall away.

Available in plastic and metal varieties, the colander is a whiz in the kitchen - as well as in other rooms in the house.

1. Reduce grease splatter: The next time you're frying up your favorite dish, help keep the mess and pain of spitting grease with a colander. Simply place it upside down over the fry pan. This will allow the heat to be released while containing the majority of the grease.

2. Scoop out bathtub toys: After your toddler enjoys bath time, next comes the task of removing all of the toys that have fallen to the bottom of the tub before the water can be drained. Be sure to save those rubber duckies and G.I. Joes from becoming washed away or lodged in the drain by scooping them out with a colander. The water will pass through the holes and the toys will be safe.

3. Store berries: While keeping your berries in the plastic container they come in seems to be the most likely storage choice, it might not be the best. The fruit will stay fresh better when air can circulate around it, a task that might not be capable with the plastic vessels. Next time, try storing your berries in a colander. The holes in the bowl will let air circulate through.

4. Create a craft template: Drawing

the perfect circle can be a daunting task, the results of which usually end up more oblong than round. The next time you're charged with such a feat, get help from a colander. Just place it upside down on your paper, trace and then cut out. It will be easier than trying repeatedly to do it freehand.

5. Stop bugs: An outdoor picnic can quickly turn into a bug-covered mess. Stop those unwelcome guests from feasting on your delights by keeping them covered with a colander. Just place it over your dish upside down. The flies will be kept out and picnic guests will have no problem getting to the food.

6. Make a holiday display: The holidays are quickly approaching and it will soon be time to fill your home with decorative cheer. While bowls of pinecones and wreaths of holly are typical ornaments during this season, get creative. For those who are looking to be creative while remaining on a tight budget, simply grab a colander and a string or two of Christmas lights. Ball, fold and bend the string of lights and place inside the colander. The holes will create an interesting display when plugged in.

Enjoy pumpkin dishes before heading into Christmas

As if I need to mention this: I do not have a problem with the colors red and green, especially of the pod varieties. But when red and green holiday decorations flood store shelves three months in advance of "the" day, I heave a big sigh (more of a groan).

This year, the décor arrived before the spooks and goblins even got a chance to scream, "Boo!" And was Thanksgiving missed? Whatever. Albeit Halloween is still more than two weeks away, I thought I'd squeeze in a couple of sweet and spicy pumpkin columns as a reminder that there's still time to dance to the Monster Mash and to ready your home for an eerie haunt.

Chilly Nights Pumpkin Dip

Consider serving this tasty dip in a hollowed out small, decorated pumpkin.

1 (8-ounce) package cream cheese, softened

2 cups powdered sugar

- 1 cup canned pumpkin
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1 cup frozen whipped cream, thawed Mesilla Valley pecans, crushed as garnish

Mix together all ingredients until well blended. Sprinkled with crushed pecans. Serve chilled or at room temperature with gingersnap cookies, apples or cinnamon graham sticks. Makes about 3 cups (Recipe adapted from http://quick-dish. tablespoon.com.)

Halloween Scone Screams

1/4 cup butter or margarine, softened slightly

- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 2 tablespoons corn syrup
- 1 cup canned pumpkin
- 2 2/3 cups all-purpose flour 2 teaspoons cream of tartar
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- Pinch of salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- Pinch of ground ginger
- Pinch habanero powder
- 1/3 cup milk (or less)

Stir together the flour, cream of tartar, baking soda, salt, ground nutmeg, ground ginger and habanero powder. In a separate bowl, beat butter and sugar together with an electric mixer. Mix in the egg and corn syrup with a spoon. Stir in the pumpkin and half of the sifted dry ingredients. Add the rest of the dry ingredients with just enough of the milk to make a soft dough. If it is too sticky to work, add a sprinkle (or two) of flour. Knead gently until you can pat it out into a large rectangle about 3/4-inch thick. Cut into 12 pieces with a floured knife. Transfer to a lightly greased large pizza or similar pan. Bake at 450 degrees for 18 minutes.

Mummy's Green Chile **Pumpkin Quiche**

- 1 9-inch unbaked pie crust
- 4 slices Canadian bacon, chopped
- 1 to 2 tablespoons olive oil 1 small onion, chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/2 cup poblano pepper, stemmed, seeded and chopped 1 small serrano chile pepper, stemmed, seeded and chopped
- 1 cup pumpkin purée
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 4 eggs, lightly beaten
- 1 cup shredded Swiss cheese

1/2 cup shredded Parmesan cheese

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon black pepper Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Sauté onion and garlic in olive oil until softened, but not browned. Remove from heat. Stir in chile peppers. Cool slightly.

Mix pumpkin and cream well in a food blender. Mix in eggs, cheeses, salt and pepper. Stir in bacon and chile pepper mixture. Pour into unbaked piecrust. Bake at 425 degrees for 15 minutes. Reduce heat to 350 degrees and bake for an additional 30 minutes, or until set. Cover edges of crust with foil or piecrust shield if they brown too quickly. Cool 10 minutes before slicing.

Charlie Brown's Great and Sassy **Pumpkin Crunch Casserole**

- 4 cups pumpkin purée
- 4 tablespoons maple syrup
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup red chile seasoned pecans, chopped
- 1/4 cup flour
- 3 tablespoons butter, softened

Mix the pumpkin purée, maple syrup, milk, egg, vanilla and salt and mash. Mix the brown sugar, pecans, flour and butter. Pour the pumpkin mixture into a baking dish (or dishes) and top with the pecan mixture. Bake in a preheated 350 degree oven until golden brown on top, about 30 minutes.

Haunting Chili

- 1/2 cup onion, chopped 1 cloves garlic, minced 1/2 cup red bell pepper, diced 1/2 cup green bell pepper, diced
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1 pound ground turkey

1 (28-ounce) can diced tomatoes, undrained

1 3/4 cup canned pumpkin

- 1 (15 1/4-ounce) can kidney beans, rinsed and drained
- 1 (15-ounce) can tomato sauce
- 1 (4-ounce) can diced medium-hot green chiles or 1/2 cup roasted, stemmed and seeded medium-hot green chiles, diced
- 1/2 cup frozen corn kernels
- 1 tablespoon chili powder 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon black pepper
- Garnishes: Sharp shredded Cheddar cheese,
 - diced green onions and sour cream

Sauté onion, garlic and peppers in oil in 6 quart saucepan for 5 to 7 minutes or until tender. Add ground meat, cook until browned; drain. Add remaining ingredients except garnishes. Bring to a boil; reduce heat, cover and simmer 30 minutes. Serve in bowls and garnish with your favorites. Makes 10 servings.

Pumpkin Pie Muffins

- 1 3/4 cups flour
- 1/2 cup brown sugar 1 cup mashed pumpkin, cooled
- 1 cup of raisins
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon cayenne powder
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- 1/2 cup whole milk
- 1/2 cup of butter, melted


Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Grease a 12-muffin tin with oil. Sift the flour, baking powder, cinnamon, cayenne powder, nutmeg and salt into a bowl and stir in the sugar and raisins.

Mix the eggs, vanilla, butter and milk in another bowl. Stir in the pumpkin.

Pour the egg mixture into the flour mix and fold (do not stir or over mix) in with a fork. Spoon the mixture into individual cups. Bake for approximately 15 to 20 minutes. Check for doneness. Insert a toothpick in the center of muffin. If it comes out clean, it's done. Cool on a wire rack before removing muffins.


Who's afraid of the big bad bat? The winged creatures come out in the dark of night

Bats conjure up dark and scary images this time of year in contrast to their true nature. A big reason is that in popular culture vampire bats often get the most attention – as does the legend that they live on human blood.

In reality, there are more than 900 species of bats, and they help rid us of a more common blood-sucking creature, the mosquito.





Bats are grouped according to what they eat. One species, known as flying foxes (the world's largest), eats fruits and flowers. Some bats are even important pollinators in parts of the world. A few species eat frogs, birds and fish, but most bats feed on insects.

Often thought of as flying mice, they are more closely related to primates, including humans, than they are to mice. They're the only mammals that are capable of sustained flight and live in large colonies. Certain species can reach ages of up to 30 years. They range in

to 30 years. They range in size from tiny with forearms that measure under an inch to bats with wingspans of up to 5 feet, according to the Smithsonian Institution. Baby bats, born singly and known as pups, live on their mother's milk and learn to fly as early as three weeks.

Bats rely on their sense of hearing and a sonar-like system for communicating. They are not typically blind, which is a common misconception. Part of the bat's mystery comes from the fact that they live in caves and other dark places where they hang upside down. They're nocturnal and can also be found in attics, barns,



trees and rock crevices, to name a few places. They can carry diseases such as rabies, but that's rare.

Bats are found throughout the world, and in the U.S. they are most common in the Southwest. Vampire bats live in Central and South America. They don't actually bite and suck blood, but make a small cut with their sharp incisors and lap the blood that flows from the incision. They will feed on any quietly resting warm-blooded animals such as cows, horses and deer. They rarely bite humans.

In China, bats are symbols of happiness and good luck. Considering all that they do, that may be the truer picture.
