Labor Day Weekend is one that many look forward to in southern New Mexico, with some of the area's most popular events.

In Las Cruces, the main event is the Wine Harvest Festival from noon to 6 p.m. Saturday through Monday, Sept. 3-5, at the Southern New Mexico State Fairgrounds, 11 miles west of Las Cruces off Interstate 10.

Besides wines from all over New Mexico and the Southwest, there will be many vendors, including those serving food and non-alcoholic beverages. There will be music performed by local favorite groups, as well as a grape-stomping contest every hour.

Admission is \$15 for adults. Those younger than 21 are allowed to attend free so long as they have a parent or le gal guardian with them. All adults must have photo ID, regardless of age. The \$15 admission includes a souvenir wine glass for sampling from each of the participating wineries.

The wine festival also will give a \$3 discount to members of the military Monday, Sept. 5. For info on the festival such as a full schedule of performers, visit www.wineharvestfestival.com

Looking to the north, the Hatch Chile Festival beckons all "chileheads." This is the 40th year for the three-day celebration of all things chile at the place official-ly called the "Chile Capital of the World," at least as proclaimed by the New Mexico Legislature.

There is a parade and a Chile Queen pageant, but many a trek to the town 40 miles north of Las Cruces is often about getting a large bag of chile roasted roadside, often near the fields where the chile was grown.

A little further up the road, Labor Day Weekend is a big one for Elephant Butte Lake State Park for people getting in a little more water skiing, sail boarding and jet skiing before fall arrives.

If you're looking for something a little less adventurous, there is the fifth annual

Martinez rebukes session criticisms

Garcia withdraws support to finish social promotion

New Mexico Gov. Susana Martinez shot back at lawmakers balking that she is putting too much on the agenda for the upcoming Legislative special session that is primarily being called for redistricting.

Besides redrawing boundaries for Congress and the Legislature, Martinez wants lawmakers to take care of nine other issues,

including cleaning ambiguities in the laws for in-state hiring and giving high-wage tax credits.

Among those issues expected to be on the special session is legislation to end the state's practice of not having a U.S. citizenship requirement for driver's licenses, but Martinez didn't mention that contentious issue in an address to the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce at its annual Governor's Update luncheon Wednesday, Aug. 31. She did talk about her de-

sire to have lawmakers take on ending social promotion in the schools, however.

New federal golf rules

An announcement out of Washington that new golf rules will be in effect beginning in September

One of my Internet/Facebook/Twitter/email friends just sent me this announcement that he claims is very important to all Americans. I am not sure of the authenticity of this message, but I feel a certain responsibility to share it with all my golfing and non-golfing friends anyway.

My friend advised that our president has recently appointed a Golf Czar and major rule changes in the game of golf will become effective Sept. 1. Here is a brief look at just a few of the changes that have been released to date. This is

Here is a brief look at just a few of the changes that have been released to date. This is a partial listing because the complete rule book, (expected to be 2,000 or more pages) is in the process of being rewritten by a special bipartisan committee charged with updating the obviously archaic game of golf. A goal of the modifications is to provide change to ensure that all Americans, including Tiger Woods, can compete more evenly with others on the golf links across our great nation, and by regulating the cost of green fees that more people can afford to play.

Some of the items included among the many changes are the following:

- Golfers with handicaps:
- Below 10 will have their green fees increased by 35%.
- Between 11 and 18 will see no increase in green fees.
- Above 18 will get a \$20 check each time they play.
- The term "gimmie" will be changed to "entitlement" and will be used as follows: • Handicaps below 10, no entitlements.
- Handicaps from 11 to 17, entitlements for putts less than 10 feet.
- Handicaps above 18, if a player's ball is on or near the green, the player does not need to putt. The ball can just be picked up.

These entitlements are intended to bring about fairness and, most importantly, equality in scoring.

An 18-plus handicap player who accidently hits his ball into a sand trap or water hazard is permitted one free toss by hand per incident to anywhere on the fairway or green. Reasoning for this rule change is that it was not the player's fault that someone else placed a hazard near where the ball might be hit. Therefore the less-skilled player should not be penalized by the difficult playing conditions.

Another change is that a player will be limited to a maximum of one birdie or six pars in any given 18-hole round. Any excess scores, at or below par, must be given to those fellow players who have not yet scored a birdie or par. Only after all players have received a birdie or par from the player actually making the birdie or par, can that player begin to count his pars and birdies again.

Golf club members are expected to not only accept nonmembers into their club, they are also now mandated to permit the nonmembers to eat and drink at the clubhouse, and the members then must equally share in paying for the costs incurred by the nonmembers.

The current USGA handicap system will be used for the above purposes, but the term "net score" will be available only for scoring those players with handicaps of 18 and above.

These modifications are intended to "re-distribute" the success of winning by making sure that in every golf competition, the 18-and-above handicap players will post only "net scores" against every other player's "gross score." These new rules are intended to change the game of golf.

According to the latest press release out of Washington, "Golf must be about 'fairness.' It should have nothing to do with ability, hard work, practice and responsibility. This is the right thing to do."

Thank goodness these long-needed changes are coming. Now, maybe I can finally break 100.

In Tokyo Harbor, 66 years ago Japanese surrender a display on America's strength, but choreography exposed some internal jealousies

On Sept. 2, 1945, Japan made formal the surrender it had declared on Aug. 15. The ceremony occurred aboard the USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay.

The Japanese delegation, unable to find any vessel seaworthy enough to take them into the bay, boarded an American destroyer to take them on the 16-mile journey.

An impressive 258 Allied warships filled the bay, making it one of the most formidable displays of naval power ever assembled in one anchorage. Many more could have joined them, but it was an invitation-only event for warships that had distinguished themselves in Pacific battles.

The Battleship New Mexico was there, honored for her service in the Gilberts, Marshalls, Solomons, Marianas, Philippines and Okinawa. In her last two battles, she suffered three kamikaze hits, killing a total of 83, including the commanding officer, and injuring 206.

Also present was Gen. Jonathon Wainwright, the beloved commanding officer who remained in the Philippines after MacArthur left.

Wainwright, who had endured all the prison camp atrocities experienced by his troops and looking like a skeleton, was quickly rescued from a prison camp in China and brought to the ceremony

He took a place of honor, near MacArthur, and reportedly received the first ceremonial pen when MacArthur signed the surrender document as the Supreme Commander of Allied Powers in Japan.

The Navy was not impressed that MacArthur became supreme commander or that he would conduct the surrender ceremonies. MacArthur's promotion made it appear that the Army had won the war in the Pacific and not the Navy.

Obviously, it took both, but neither wanted to admit it because the two services were completely separate entities. Had Japan not created the same problems for itself, our divided command would have caused us even more problems.

The only reason the Air Force wasn't part of the argument was that it wasn't created until 1947.

The solution to the Navy's displeasure was to have Mac-Arthur conduct the ceremony aboard a Navy ship. And to get President Harry Truman's cooperation in the deal, the vessel chosen for the surrender ceremony was the Battleship Missouri.

Instead of being conducted on the broad fantail of the Missouri, the signing took place on a narrow quarterdeck, around a worn table from the ship's galley, covered by a coffee-stained green tablecloth. The ceremony was short, which pleased both

Another indication of evident downplaying of the ceremony was that the American officers wore khaki uniforms, the British wore shorts. Our other allies wore dress uniforms. The Japanese wore top hats and tails. That's an interesting progression from those who had the most to do with winning the war to those who lost.

MacArthur and the Japanese.

Although the ceremony was simple and understated, it was followed by a massive show of strength, as 1,900 Allied aircraft came roaring overhead.

Following the Aug. 15 surrender declaration by Emperor Hirohito, it took two weeks before the first American soldiers

landed in Japan. Air drops to prison camps had been occurring and agents from the Office of Strategic Services had parachuted into prison camps to keep order until troops arrived.

One of the first tasks of the soldiers who landed was to get to the airfields to remove propellers from Japanese aircraft. There still was unrest among many of the military and a fear that mutinous kamikaze pilots might make a last-minute bid for immortality during the surrender ceremonies.

The first stage of the occupation was to provide for the care of Allies who had been held captive. It was

accomplished as quickly as possible because our troops were clamoring to get out and families back home wanted to know of their loved ones.

The Battleship Missouri can be visited in Honolulu by going to Pearl Harbor and taking a shuttle. Tours are conducted of various parts of the ship. Or one may go directly to view the sur-

render location and listen to a recording of MacArthur's words.

So far, the American "War on Drugs" has worked exactly like the first Prohibition, which concerned alcohol. Sadly, the object of our current prohibition, illegal drugs, is even more prevalent now

than when the War on Drugs started. Worse, as a nation we have spent billions of dollars making our country into almost a police state without affecting the availability and use of these drugs other than to clog the prisons with drug users and sellers. The tools and sophistication involved in this battle have increased, but the basic

premise of the intervention has not. It would seem that we as a country learned nothing from the turbulent years when as a nation we tried to prohibit the sale and consumption of alcohol. President Calderon is correct; our country is the greatest drug consumer in the world. It is hard to deny American's love for drugs. What is the effect of that love?

Before you get hopeful, I do not have a plan to deal with illegal drugs. Shuckins. But at least I admit that I have no plan. In the 1960s, the plan was to catch some users and get them to name their supplier and then incar-

cerate those people. As a society we have incarcerated millions of suppliers, and the supply of illegal drugs is exactly as robust as it always has been.



done? We are still getting what we have always gotten, namely, not anything sustainable.

There are some people who would like to give up on the prohibition of drugs and have the government tax and license those substances. I have never advocated this approach, but lately it is looking better, as everything else does not have any effect on the illegal drug problem. Catching users and sellers does not seem to change the fortunes of the cartels and drug producers.

If we are to deal with the drug problem, we have to state the problems. First, our nation's approach to illegal drugs provides a fertile ground for the development of criminal activities and crime syndicates both nationally and internationally. Second, the drugs being used by Americans are of uncertain origin, strength and purity. Finally, millions of people are being incarcerated without changing the availability of illegal drugs. It is time for an honest appraisal of our drug policies. I

know it is an industry, both in providing and trying to stop the importation and use. Millions of people make their living on the misfortunes of those poor souls who use drugs.

Maybe legalization with pharmacy control is the only way to keep the money out of the hands of the drug cartels. All I know is there are no other approaches that show any signs of success. We must find new ways to deal with these problems regardless of the answers.

Condemn the vandalism: Firmly held beliefs don't justify illegal act

On May 24, a citizen relinquished his dog to Animal Control because he could not afford urgently needed veterinary care. The dog died. On June 2, the dog owner was cited for failure to provide veterinary care.

Soon thereafter, his truck tires were slashed and the words "Dog Killer" and abstract designs were spray-painted on his truck.

Animal control officers (ACOs) may euthanize an animal in the field if it is seriously ill or injured. In this case, the ACO took the dog to the shelter. The shelter director thought the dog was treatable, and turned it over to a volunteer rescue group. The rescue group thought the dog was treatable, and took it to a veterinarian. The veterinarian thought the dog was treatable, and treated it. If all these experienced people thought the dog was treatable, then the dog owner cannot be blamed for not knowing that his dog was near death

dog was near death. The Baby Brianna case was the worst case of child abuse any of us had ever seen. But no one vandalized the accused persons' property.

Even though the vandalism was done in the name of animal welfare, animal advocacy groups and individuals have not publicly repudiated the vandalism, nor have they made visible attempts to amend the wrong done to the dog owner. A local church held a memorial service for the dog, but they made no public expression of sympathy for the dog owner. The city-county animal board, whose membership includes two county commissioners and three city councillors, reacted with dead silence.

Is this our new morality? Is vandalism OK if it is motivated by firmly held beliefs? I hope not. Vandalism is not civil. It is not decent. It is not right.

Guest Column Impact fees target specific beneficiaries Mayor says they help prevent tax increases for residents

It has been extremely important to me as mayor, and to the current City Council, that the City of Las Cruces remain on solid financial footing, that city services be continued without interruption, and that we do everything possible to support economic development and a good quality of life for our citizens.

That we have been successful in this endeavor in spite of a very difficult economic period for the state and country is a testament to the hard work and foresight of the council as well as to their willingness to consistently do the right thing for the people of Las Cruces, whatever pressures or misrepresentations they have to endure in the process.

Recent attacks have challenged our adoption of impact fees to cover the infrastructure required by new development, infrastructure that everyone agrees has to be paid for by someone.

Opponents of impact fees were quick to suggest charging current residents for these costs through increases in property or sales taxes. The City Council instead decided to charge fees based on the additional infrastructure actually required, with those who directly benefit from the new development – "the developers and new homeowners" – paying a portion of those new infrastructure costs through impact fees.

It's important to note that the road and drainage impact fees apply only to new construction in new growth areas at the



margins of the city. Second, the road and drainage impact fees are not scheduled to be implemented until January 2013, with plenty of time to postpone them if the building industry has not recovered by that time.

Third, the road and drainage impact fees do not represent additional costs to the developer/future homeowner, but rather a reallocation of costs that are already being collected for new development. Developers have always paid for the roads in their development, including a pro-rata share of major roadways that adjoin their subdivision. The problem has been that these costs are collected on piecemeal basis, so it can take years for principal roads and arroyo crossings to be completed.

With impact fees, funds can be pooled into a cash stream that will enable the city to bond the construction of major roads and arroyo crossings in a clear and predictable way that is fair to all developers, and which doesn't unfairly saddle current residents with an increased tax burden or the use of general city funds for uncovered infrastructure.

The public safety impact fee is the only one that will apply to new construction throughout the city, a fee dedicated to building the infrastructure necessary for the fire, police and emergency response services associated with an increased population.

The new 911/police/fire facility on the East Mesa is an example of a project that can be financed through the public safety fee collected from new construction.

It is a misrepresentation for opponents of impact fees to call them new taxes. In fact, impact fees will help keep taxes lower for current residents, since new development will be required to pay for facilities required to directly serve it, as opposed to raising property and sales taxes on all residents.

It is also a misrepresentation to claim major retailers like Walmart will avoid building a facility in Las Cruces due to the requirement they pay for the infrastructure that serves them.

The public safety impact fee will cost Walmart a one-time assessment of \$73,500 for a 100,000 square-foot building, which is a small price to pay for the kind of police and fire protection required for one of their large retail stores.

I know it's an election year, but it's disappointing that some of those who have pushed so hard for new growth in the city have been so reluctant to find the means to pay for it. Fortunately, the City Council and I have been willing to tackle this problem, ensuring a system that will keep taxes low while providing for the kind of roads, drainage and public safety our people deserve. This is good government in action, and I'm proud we have made the best choice possible for the people of Las Cruces.

Farming: A life-changing experience

Keith was driving me into Edmonton, Alberta, on Highway 26 from the west. The large grain and cattle farms began to shatter into smaller pieces of property; 40 acres, 20 acres or 12 acres. The countryside was still green and well kept with fields of five horses or three cows. Usually it included a nice home with landscaping and a manicured entrance.

"More farm ground is disappearing every year," Keith said, noting the loss of big farmsteads. He was right but it has been going on since the pilgrims set foot in Newfoundland; it is the inexorable roll of civilization.

These smaller plots, "ranchettes," are a stage in this progression. But, I've noticed one very positive side of those new "rural lifestylers." With the intention to teach their children some connection to the land and livestock, or for their own sake, they take on projects like gardening, raising sheep, llamas, rabbits, goats, ducks, horses or cows.

Regardless whether it is an organic garden, a litter of pigs or one calf, once they get their hands dirty they begin to have an inkling of what it takes to make food out of dirt and water. It is a life-changing experience.

I think that before any person is tricked into sending money to PETA, the Humane Society of the United States, ALF, ELF or any of those two-faced groups whose goal includes the elimination of modern farming practices that person should be allowed to raise at least one baby Holstein calf from birth to edible, or to grow enough vegetables in one summer to feed a family for just seven days.

Once they are engaged in the process of raising food, they will appreciate that farming is a complicated process that guarantees risk, pitfalls, hard work and commitment. But they will also comprehend the sense of accomplishment of becoming part of nature, not just the skim on the top. This experience will qualify them to examine with

This experience will qualify them to examine with a keener eye the often sleazy, forked-tongued and gratuitously morbid supplications for money, money, money from the animal rights grubbers.

Our 20-acre neighbors will gain the ability to distinguish their local humane societies, county agents, district agriculturalists, and veterinarians from the National Beggars Association of ANTI's who haven't raised a calf, had it butchered, or fed their family for a week from their own labors in the soil.

My advice to you farmers and ranchers who miss the old days, is to befriend your new neighbors and offer to teach them Beginning Agriculture 101. Let them experience the deep pride one gets from personally participating in one of life's most basic occupations. They will learn where food comes from.

And, I repeat, it is life changing.

Judge stops driver's license residency check

New Mexico District Court Judge Sarah Singleton issued a temporary restraining order (TRO) Wednesday, Aug. 31, to stop Gov. Susana Martinez's "Residency Certification Program" for foreign nationals that asks thousands of foreign nations holding New Mexico driver's licenses to verify their residency.

Critics of the program, such as Somos Un Pueblo Unido, said it is inefficient, costly, confusing and is being used to intimidate immigrant families in New Mexico who have already complied with state law by obtaining their licenses, registering their vehicles, buying insurance and presenting a record available to MVD and law enforcement officials.

"The re-verification program is nothing more than a bullying tactic that intimidates and threatens people for no reason," said Marcela Diaz of Somos Un Pueblo Unido. "This TRO will come as a relief to many families who simply could not comply with this absurd program. New Mexico needs our leaders to agree on a sensible license policy, not one that unnecessarily and unfairly targets immigrant families who have gone through the proper channels to get their license. Getting rid of the current law and continuing the re-verification process doesn't make sense - it punishes people for being honest and would force foreign nationals to drive without proper licensure and insurance.'

Martinez said she will again aim for repeal of the current driver's license law during the special session, scheduled to begin Tuesday, Sept. 6. During the 2011 regular legislative session, Martinez didn't support legislation passed by the Senate that would have tightened residency requirements. She supports repeal of the current law that doesn't check if a person seeking a driver's license is a U.S. citizen.

Martinez, said New Mexico's law has made it a magnet for undocumented immigrants seeking driver's licenses. Supporters of the repeal said current law presents a security risk because driver's licenses are often seen as proof of U.S. citizenship.

The judge's ruling was prompted by a lawsuit filed by the Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund. The lawsuit claimed Martinez's administration had wrongly singled out one group of people to prove their residency.

The next step is a hearing before Singleton on Sept. 13 to determine if the injunction against the governor's program should be extended.

NMSU studies driver's license controversy

Allowing undocumented immigrants to obtain driver's licenses or requiring lawful residency identification has an "insignificant impact" on the percentage of uninsured drivers in New Mexico.

That's according to New Mexico State University's J. Tim Query, an associate

professor of finance and business law, who decided to test assertions on both sides about the correlation between driver's licenses for undocumented immigrants and the number of uninsured motorists.

New Mexico is one of three states - including Utah and Washington - that allows immigrants to apply for a driver's license without proving their legal residence.

Gov. Susana Martinez has proposed that the state stop issuing driver's licenses to undocumented immigrants. That issue will be among others state lawmakers will consider during a special legislative session in September.

New Mexico is second in the nation in uninsured drivers at 25.7 percent, with Washington in 11th place at 16.1 percent. However, only seven states have a lower percentage of uninsured motorists than Utah. That state has an estimated 8.2 percent rate of uninsured drivers, which is well below the national average of 13.8 percent.

Utah's driver's licenses can only be used for driving.

"When examining data from the Insurance Research Council's (IRC) periodic study of uninsured motorists," Query said, "evidence is somewhat mixed in that states with loose requirements for a state-issued driver's license did not have uniformly lower percentages of uninsured motorists."

For example, according to IRC figures, Arizona saw its uninsured motorists rate drop from 17.8 percent in 2007 to 11.9 percent in 2009 – a full year before its tough immigration law went into effect. Meanwhile, California's uninsured drivers rate fell from 18.1 percent in 2007 to 15 percent in 2009. The IRC provided no reason for the drop in both states.

Query based his conclusions on statistics derived from the IRC, the Pew Hispanic Center, the Insurance Identification Database and the New Mexico Motor Vehicle Division. Most of the data dates to 2007, when Hawaii, Maine, Maryland, Michigan and Oregon also allowed undocumented immigrants to obtain driver's licenses. The most recent IRC data is from 2009. Query conducted his research with Risa Kumazawa, an assistant professor in the department of economics and quantitative sciences at Duquesne University in Pittsburgh.

Query identified factors that did cause an increase in the uninsured driver rate: the actual number of undocumented immigrants and unemplovment.

"On average, a 1 percentage point increase in unauthorized immigrants relative to the labor force increases the uninsured motorists rate by 0.54 percentage points," Query said. "We also find that a 1 percentage point increase in the state unemployment rate increases the uninsured motorists rate by 1.74 percentage points."

Query points to other studies that find the uninsured driver rate drops when mandatory insurance laws are enforced more strictly and poverty rates are lower.

"While the fraction of unauthorized im-

Groundbreaking held for water cleaning plant

A groundbreaking ceremony to mark the start of construction of a facility to remove a groundwater contaminant in the central part of Las Cruces will be held at 1 p.m. Friday, Sept. 2, at the intersection of Griggs Avenue and Walnut Street.

Members of the Las Cruces City Council, City of Las Cruces administration and staff, the Doña Ana Board of County Commissioners, Las Cruces Utility Board, the Environmental Protection Agency and representatives of U.S. Sens. Tom Udall and Jeff Bingaman will be in attendance.

The new facility will extract the chemical

perchloroethylene, commonly referred to as PCE, from groundwater in the area known as the Griggs and Walnut Ground Water Plume Superfund Site.

In June, the Las Cruces City Council and the Doña Ana Board of County Commissioners, in separate actions, approved the EPA's Modified Administrative Order and provided an intent to comply to EPA standards. The action allows for the construction of the water treatment facility. The treatment process utilizes an air stripper that exposes the impacted water from two off-line municipal wells to oxygen, which dissipates the PCE. The cleansed water is then suitable for drinking.

The project, jointly funded by the city and county, is expected to cost \$3.5 million to \$4 million. Project funding is being supplied by the New Mexico Finance Authority Drinking Water Loan Program. Construction is scheduled to be completed in May 2012.

Police put limits on escorts for funerals

Two traffic officers only will be allowed to accompany hearse and family to grave

Local funeral home operators say they are disappointed that the Las Cruces Police Department has decided to greatly limit the use of escorts on funeral processions.

Funeral homes were recently notified that starting Thursday, Sept. 1, the police will just provide two police motorcycles as escorts to only the hearse and immediate families at funerals.

In a letter dated Aug. 22, Police Lt. Rudy Saenz wrote that the change was being made "regretfully" so there would be adequate officers to respond to other traffic needs and still offer "the time-honored and free service" of the funeral escort.

"We will respond to the church after an announcement has been made by the funeral home, church official or clergy to the congregation to please meet at the specified gravesite and stand by for the honored arrival of the deceased and the immediate family members who will be escorted by the Las Cruces Police Department," Saenz wrote in the letter.

The new policy states that no more than three vehicles will be allowed for the transport of immediate family members and will not allow other vehicle to join the procession.

Steve Getz of Getz Funeral Home said he and his family were saddened by the decision.

Getz said Las Cruces is "a little big city" where many people turn out for funeral services. For example, he said a service this past Saturday had more than 300 cars following the hearse to the cemetery.

That's not that unusual here, Getz said. "It's cultural."

The new sequence as detailed in Saenz's letter concerns Getz in the case of such large funerals. Getz said it's a safety consideration in getting that many vehicles from the church to cemetery ahead of the hearse.

Also upsetting to the funeral homes was how the police informed them.

The letter was given to them following a meeting called to supposedly hear their ideas, said Ruben Benavidez, funeral director of Baca's Funeral Chapels.

Benavidez said getting the letter so soon after the meeting made them feel like their suggestions were ignored. For example, he said, the funeral home operators were willing to pay a fee for the additional escorts, something that they have to do in other places, such as El Paso.

To get the letter a week after the meeting made funeral home operators feel they had wasted their time, Benavidez said.

"We thought we had an opportunity to give input," he said.

Adding to the aggravation was the police's decision to not put out an announcement about the change.

"We asked them if the city could put out a press release or something," Benavidez said. "They basically put it onto the funeral homes to tell the public."

In a way, Getz said, the change will be the loss of something that makes Las Cruces different than many cities. He said funeral guests from other places have commented on how nice it was to have the full police escorts.

Getz added that the funeral homes have always known the availability of escorts was a matter of priority in that they may not get a full escort team if officers are needed elsewhere at the time.

Space belts save lives on Earth

Dr. John Paul Stapp, the 'fastest man on Earth,' became a believer and promoter of seat belts in automobiles

"Click it or ticket." Law enforcement agencies use the phrase to encourage vehicle occupants to wear seat belts. In the early 1950s, Col. John Paul Stapp, an Air Force flight surgeon, tested the safety device he envisioned would protect ejecting pilots and astronauts. Stapp also backed the belts' installation in vehicles, the Alamogordo Daily News reported on Sept. 7, 1955.

Two days later the newspaper announced Time was putting Stapp, chief of the Aero Medical Field Laboratory at Holloman Air Force Base, on the cover of its Sept. 12 issue. The magazine dubbed him "the fastest man on Earth," and described him as "a 45-year-old doctor with the deceptive paunch of a country doctor, the ramrod posture of a professional soldier and the relentless curiosity of a dedicated scientist."

'Accidents will happen," the ADN quoted Stapp, who then pointed out that ignoring safety features that could minimize injury and reduce death was "negligent suicide."

Stapp personally tested restraints riding sleds at Muroc Air Force Base (now Edwards AFB), and then Holloman, where he arrived in 1953, Time said. On Dec. 10, 1954, strapped atop Sonic Wind 1, the first five seconds of his 6.4-second ride

reached Mach .9 (632 mph), according to the Holloman publication, Major Achievements in Biodynamics: Escape Physiology at the Air Force Missile Development Center 1953-1958. Mach 1 at sea level is 760 mph. "The jolt Col. Stapp received," the document stated, has been compared with that "an auto driver would experience were he to crash into a solid brick wall at 120 miles per hour.'

In the 1.4-second deceleration, Stapp suffered "strap bruises and the usual blood blisters from grains of sand," along with "extremely painful effects on the eyes." Blood vessels burst in his eyes, leaving him blind for eight and a half minutes - and with two black eyes, the Holloman publication documented. In Stapp's own words, on entry into the water brakes his vision became a "shimmering salmon," followed by "a sensation in the eyes ... somewhat like the extraction of a molar without anesthetic.'

His eyes bulging from their sockets, held only by muscles, caused the pain. "I lifted my eyelids with my fingers, but I couldn't see a thing. It was as though I was looking directly at the sun through closed eyelids," Time quoted him.

At the end of the track, Stapp always parked his Cadillac and an ambulance. He knew he'd leave in one.

"They put me on a stretcher and in a minute or two I saw some blue specks," Time quoted Stapp. Eight minutes later "the blue specks become constant and pretty soon they became blue sky and clouds. I saw one of the surgeons wiggling his fingers at me and I was able to count them. Then I knew that ... my retinas had not been detached and I wasn't going to be blind."

Stapp's risk-taking, he told the ADN, proved a "properly shock-mounted human body seated in the forward facing position can sustain four tons of force applied within one quarter of

a second and suffer no disability." He touted the "experiments are as significant for automobiles as they are for the airplanes which prompted the research, for they indicate that the forces encountered in the large majority of automotive crashes are survivable without serious injury if the occupant distributes the force over the strong solid quarters of the body by means of webbing straps.'

Auto manufacturers planned to introduce seat belts as "optional on the 1956 models," Stapp said in the ADN. He also felt dashboards should be padded, what he called "delethalized." Time said; "doors should be fitted with safety locks so they will not fly open in crashes"; and "rear-window shelves should be removed because "objects on them have a horrible habit of spewing into passengers' heads during crashes.'

Two years later, on Aug. 5, 1957, the Associated Press reported Stapp had testified

before a House Commerce Subcommittee "considering installation of belts in many government vehicles.' "I couldn't afford to be caught dead without one," The AP

quoted Stapp. The story cited "700 airmen died in air accidents last year

(1956) as compared with 673 killed in car crashes." While Stapp survived his 29 sled runs, anthropomorphic

dummies occasionally paid dearly. Time reported that at Muroc, the dummy Oscar Eight-Ball "lurched forward" after the sled's brakes grabbed. Oscar "broke his harness, slammed through an inch-thick pine windshield as if it were tissue paper, and soared 710 (feet) down the track bed." Stapp immedi-

ately installed stronger belt webbing.

Stapp founded the Car Crash Conference, holding the first one in May 1955, said the webpage Stapp.org. He invited "some 26 individuals" to Holloman to watch a "sled demonstration and auto crash tests as well as to participate in discussions on automotive design and safety features."

At the end of the track, Stapp always parked his Cadillac and an ambulance. He new he'd leave in one.

Participants represented not only the military and auto manufacturers, but also "universities ... research laboratories, traffic and safety councils, and medicine." The 55th annual conference will be Nov. 7-9 in Dearborn, Mich.. The website describes the event as the "premier forum for presentation of research in impact biomechanics (and) human injury tolerance."

Stapp's sled rides were not his only experience with speed.

"It was news throughout the nation when the 'fastest man' was cited by the Alamogordo police for speeding at 40 miles an hour in a 25 mile zone," the Holloman document said. The justice of the peace "managed to divert part of the publicity to himself by dismissing the charge against Stapp, issuing a new citation against a fictitious "Capt. Ray Darr," and paying the fine from his own pocket."

The fine was \$12.50.

Teachers taught to use technology used by students

New Mexico State University's College of Education is setting the standard for how technology is used in higher education after an iPad2 workshop for faculty in July.

Students are familiar with the uses of multiple types of technology, so the purpose of the seminar was to help faculty be aware of the most up-to-date technology so that they may integrate it into courses.

Nearly 30 faculty members from both the College of Education and the College of Engineering participated, which was much more than expected by College of Education Dean Michael Morehead, who kicked off the four-day event with a presentation about technology in education.

"Technology will reshape the way we educate, both nationally and internationally, so education colleges need to be the place where new technology is modeled and integrated, in terms of pedagogy," Morehead said.

The goal is to have one program in the college be entirely virtual - no paper or books. Another goal is to have NMSU's College of Education be seen as a place where people in technology industries can come and partner with the faculty.

The workshop covered topics such as iPad2 basics, the status of technology in education and the status of Apple technology in education. Participants received exposure to a variety of iPad apps, including productivity, social, educational, educational games, music and strange and awesome applications (better known as apps), and gained experience designing lessons. Strategic planning activities to support technology growth in the colleges also were discussed.

"We want to foster an environment where technology is integrated in our

college on a comprehensive basis and faculty and students have access to the most up-to-date technological advances," Morehead said.

Julia Parra, assistant professor of curriculum and instruction, coordinated the workshop, with support from Karin Wiburg, associate dean of research, and the NMSU Learning Games Lab's Barbara Chamberlin, Milos Savic, Michelle Garza and Karen Trujillo. Apple representative Glen Banks also presented a session.

At the end of the workshop, participants presented their ideas for utilizing the concepts learned throughout the four davs

"Workshops like these are important to support faculty in the development of personal and professional technology skills. The iPad, considered a 'disruptive technology, is an incredibly engaging device and the opportunity for faculty to be immersed in a learning experience to-gether was quite exciting," Parra said.

called a press conference to announce adding social promotion to the session's agenda. Senate Majority Whip Mary Jane Garcia of Doña Ana - a supporter of legislation to end social promotion that died in the last regular session - disagreed with Martinez about having it on the special session agenda.

At the press conference in Santa Fe, Garcia said the special session's agenda was becoming too unwieldy and costly at \$50,000 a day.

In her Las Cruces appearance, Martinez said the original bill had bipartisan support, but now some sponsors have withdrawn their support to play politics. Ten years ago, she said, lawmakers accomplished redistrict-

ing in 17 days and past 30-day sessions have dealt with numerous controversial issues along with passing a state budget.

Those objecting to taking up nine other issues with redis-

"Redistricting is very important work, but so are the education of our children, so are the creation of jobs," Martinez said. To those saying, 'We don't have enough time,' I say, 'You're right, we don't have time – to waste.'

Other issues being proposed for the special session include funding for a supplemental food stamp program and capital outlay.

Martinez said the state has the money to handle these needs because of austerity measures taken in response to a projected \$450 million shortfall when she took office.

The governor, who was a longtime prosecutor in Doña Ana County, touted the Union Pacific intermodal rail hub by Santa Teresa as an example of her administration's commitment to job creation. The project will bring more than 3,000 construction jobs and more than 600 permanent jobs, she said.

Martinez said the Union Pacific project is an example of how New Mexico can be competitive with states such as Texas by providing the same kind of tax breaks and incentives, which in this case has a locomotive diesel fuel tax break.

"Whatever it may be, we need to be competitive," Martinez said.

New Mexico's port of entry with Mexico at Santa Teresa also is poised to see more activity with the state allowing heavy trucks to cross, she said.

'We expect government to be leaner and not be an impediment to business along the way," Martinez said. The governor also reviewed accomplishments from the last

session, including capping the film industry subsidy at \$50 million and improving its transparency.

To attract the film industry to New Mexico, former Gov. Bill Richardson pushed through support where film and television production companies were reimbursed 25 cents for every dol-lar they spent in the state, Martinez said. Last year, that cost the state \$102 million, she said. "We had the courage to take on the film industry, but in a

positive way," Martinez said.

The past session also saw the expansion of Katie's Law. Now, every person arrested for a felony offense in New Mexico has their DNA tested and registered to solve crimes.

One of her first actions, Martinez said, was establishing a state office for business advocacy that has helped more than 62 businesses cut through governmental red tape and created more than 420 new jobs.

The capital outlay spending – which was at more than \$200 million when it failed to make it through the last regular 60-day session - must have a regional impact to win approval, Martinez said.

She urged the business community to pressure their lawmakers to make this special session scheduled to begin Tuesday, Sept. 6, productive.

"My concern is that politics will be put in front of kids and jobs," Martinez said. "I need your help to make sure that this special session doesn't get snowballed by politics."

NMSU hosts the Ohio Bobcats to open 2011 football season

While many locals are grumbling about the recent late-summer heat wave, at least one Las Crucen is hoping the heat stays on, at least through Saturday, Sept. 3. That's when the New Mexico State Aggies open their 2011 football season by hosting the Ohio Bobcats at 6 p.m. in Aggie Memorial Stadium.

Aggie coach DeWayne Walker said he wouldn't mind seeing the visitors from Ohio sweat a little.

"We are hoping that the elements work in our favor," Walker said during a press conference Tuesday, Aug. 30. "We hope it's 100 degrees, and they don't have a lot of water on the sidelines.'

Walker may have been in the mood to joke a little bit because his Aggie football team should show improvement over last year's squad – especially on the offensive side of the ball.

Since last year, the Aggies have brought in a new offensive coordinator in Doug Martin, who coached at Kent State University last season. Martin is the third offensive coordinator in three years, but he said the team has responded positively to his system.

The kids have really embraced the offense quickly. They learned it quickly. I think they have responded to the diversity of it," Martin said. "We use players in a lot of different ways. We give them the ball in a lot of different ways. It's a player's offense, it puts them in position to make things happen.

One player who has embraced Martin's system is sophomore quarterback Andrew Manley, who will start for the Aggies.

'I love coach Martin's offense," Manley said. "He likes to run the ball first and throw the ball second. We have the athletes to do it."

A lot of Martin's offense is predicated on getting off the line

Martin, who coached in the Bobcat's Mid American Conference (MAC) last season at Kent State, said he expects the Aggie offense to be competitive Saturday.

"I was telling coach Walker, I really felt like if our offense were in the MAC we'd be one of the top offenses there, especially with the additions, the freshmen we brought in at the wide receiver positions. I think we have a chance to be a really good offensive football team," Martin said.

On the defensive side of the ball, the Aggies will be missing some key players on the defensive line, but should be improved in the secondary. Senior defensive back Djonte

Green said the Aggies have matured on defense.

"I think our secondary will be strong, but I think as a whole we are all going to come together and play as one," he said. "I think the linebackers will be better this year as well. We have some new talent in there and some returning line-backers too, I think they will be maturing as well."

Alexander LaVoy, a transfer linebacker from Butte Community College, said the Aggies have

from his parents and grandparents.

"A lot of love came with it," he said. "I started working at a young age. We grow chile, onions, hay ... I was driving a tractor at 8 years old. I could barely reach the pedals."

The family farm not only yielded plenty of produce and feed, but also a quarterback.

"He comes from a great family ... a farming family," Bradley said. "Farming families believe in hard work and everyone pulls their own weight. You don't see that much anymore. In the summers, Axten would be here for practice in the mornings, then go work in the fields the rest of the day. He would show up the next day, all bright and cheery. It's in his blood."

The family moved to Las Cruces before Franzoy's freshman year, but they still maintain the farm near Hatch. Franzoy said he was just as excited about the academic environment at Mayfield as the athletic offerings.

"Hatch was a good school, but they have more advanced placement courses here," said Franzoy, who is considering attending medical school. "I like the teachers here, and some of my buddies I grew up with are here and they liked it."

Franzoy also was a great fit for the Mayfield football program, buying into the tradition from day one. He had played football since third grade and had always been a receiver. It wasn't until his sophomore year at Mayfield that he moved to the quarterback position.

Assistant coach Jim Bradley, Michael's dad, tutors the Mayfield quarterbacks and Franzoy was the ideal pupil for the demanding, legendary teacher. Here was a smart, attentive, diligent kid who said "yes sir" and "no sir" and also had some athletic ability.

"My dad ranks him right up there with his wife and his dog," Michael Bradley said with a laugh.

Hays ready to make an impact for NMSU Freshman leans on faith during transition

In many ways Meredith Hays is like a lot of freshmen in the first month of their college career. The Hereford, Texas, native is navigating a new environment, meeting new friends and managing her time as efficiently as possible on a campus as full of things to do as there are pecans under trees during a Mesilla Valley harvest.

In other ways, such as her athletic ability, Hays is anything but a typical freshman at New Mexico State University. In her collegiate volleyball debut Aug. 26 against the fifth-ranked Nebraska Cornhuskers, Hays delivered a match-high 18 kills in the near upset. December of my junior year of high school, I had a good feeling about NMSU and committed in March. The city of Las Cruces is a larger version of my hometown. I felt it is where God wanted me to be."

Hays isn't afraid to speak publicly about her Christian faith; she relishes it because she is training to go into full-time ministry following graduation.

One moment during Hays' recruitment stood out to her as a heaven-sent sign that NMSU was the place for her.

NMSU was the place for her. "NMSU and the University of Houston were my final two choices," Hays said. "I prayed really hard that God would make it clear to me which place I was supposed to be. Directly following that I heard the coach at Houston resigned. At that point, I knew I was supposed to be in Las Cruces."

August two-a-days can take their toll on a player's, mind, body and soul. The first two weeks of two-a-days were like a roller coaster ride for Hays with a decent practice followed by a poor practice, normal for a player making the adjustment from high school to Division I. After a couple of weeks of those draining training sessions, a bit of doubt wiggled in to her mind if she could perform at a high enough level.

"The morning practice of the day before school started was a really bad practice for me," Hays said. "In between practices, I was really down. I cried and called my mom. I was asking myself 'What am I doing here?' I spent a lot of time on my knees praying."

The afternoon session was a breakthrough for Hays as she regained that mental toughness that had been a strength during her dazzling high school career and would carry her to a phenomenal first weekend of competition.

The Aggie faithful are one of the reasons she compares Las Cruces to Hereford.

"Volleyball is important in both places. It is a beloved sport and many people attend games," Hays said. "The fans want to get personal and know the players. It is great to see

Hunting for Bobcats

Aggies hope to snare visitors



Well, it's here. Opening night of year three of the DeWayne Walker era is Saturday, Sept. 3. It is a bit of a homecoming with the return of former Aggie coaches Gerry Gdowski and Keven Lightner, who are now members of the Ohio Bobcat staff.

Ohio is an interesting opponent for a season opener. The Bobcats were beaten in the last regular-season game of 2010 by Kent State, coached then by the Aggie offensive coordinator Doug Martin, but it didn't keep them from going to a bowl game. In a thumbnail sketch, they have a good amount of experienced offensive linemen to block for their sophomore redshirt quarterback Tyler Tettleton. They have a returning multi-year starter at middle linebacker named Noah Keller and a senior running back named Donte Harden.

The Bobcats run a single back offense and have a versatile all-purpose back that can run the Wildcat offense. Phil Bates is that "back of all trades," and can run or pass from the Wildcat and will line up as a wide receiver as well. He has missed practice this fall, but head coach Frank Solich says he will play.

Ohio's defense was staunch last year and that is where most of the starters have departed. Solich

also lost two defenders penciled in to start to injuries at nose guard and weak side linebacker. This compounded the rebuilding difficulties. The secondary does not have a senior in it. Of the 10 corners and safeties, six are juniors with a pair of sophomores and freshmen thrown in.

That amount of youth probably looks tempting to the catchand-run offense run by sophomore quarterback Andrew Manley.

The Aggies' strongest suit appears to be receivers this year. Joseph Mathews has shown flashes of being a dynamic playmaker, Taveon Rogers is the most improved offensive player and Todd Lee has been a steady receiver since his freshman year. There are a pair of tight ends that are pass gobblers as well. Trevor Walls is ready to become the latest Aggie quarterback to become a stellar tight end and freshman Jackson KaKa has shown in the fall that he has to be taken seriously when on

a pass route. The Aggie defense is looking solid in the middle with Alex LaVoy and Boyblue Aoelua tagteaming at mike linebacker; add Donyae Coleman's senior savvy at strong safety to seal up strikes up the middle. If the Aggies are consistent on offense, look for a game with scores in the high 20s.

The Bobcats are a relatively young team that has to travel a long way to a climate they can't replicate in Ohio. NM State can win this game with a complete game. It is hard to do on opening day, but not unprecedented.

Sifting out a silent accomplice Dr. Golf hears the true confessions of a sandbagger

For the benefit of you innocent souls who haven't been jaded by the darker side of the game of golf – gambling – the term "sandbagger" is used to describe any golfer who misleads others about his ability level, claiming to be worse at golf than he actually is.

More specifically, a sandbagger is seen by many as a golfing lowlife who artificially inflates his handicap index in order to better his chances of winning money in tournaments and golf bets.

Let's say your true golfing ability is at about a score of 80 for 18 holes, but your handicap puts you at about 88 – you just bought yourself eight extra strokes off your score and boosted your odds of winning a "net" event. Note that if you do not belong to the USGA – as most golfers should – you need to join the association at your golf club and post all your scores on their computer. The USGA will establish and update your handicap for you.

While most sandbaggers vehemently deny their guilt, I found one who was unabashed about being a past target, but shy about his cleverness at posting deceptive scores. He agreed to an interview under the pseudonym Jake.

Dr. Golf: Thanks for agreeing to talk with me about this delicate topic. When did you start becoming a sandbagger?

Jake: Oh, I guess I go back about 10 years ago to when I used to play golf with a group of good ol' boys, and these guys played what they called "adjusted skins." They all thought I was better, so I didn't get any strokes. I'd lose 20 bucks every round. I guess I was a pigeon back then.

Dr. Golf: Then what?

Jake: Probably back in the day I was a reverse sandbagger, with a vanity handicap. That's where I would turn in only my good scores. But when those \$20 bills started flying out of my wallet, I figured out that I needed to play it loose, forgetting vanity, and get my handicap up to about 16. That way I could point to the system as my evidence regardless of how I hit the ball.

Dr. Golf: Isn't that cheating?

Jake: Do you think you're cheating when you claim expense deductions on your income tax return that are, shall we say, creative and embellished?

Dr. Golf: Still sounds like cheating.

Jake: I remember my daddy had an old saying that went, "If ya ain't cheatin' ya ain't tryin."

Dr. Golf: Do you post scores on the computer for your handicap?

Jake: Sure I do.

Dr. Golf: I've played golf with you. You're pretty good. How do you manage to keep your handicap number at 16? I mean you shot 76 in a pro-am where we were both playing. You beat your pro for crying out loud. You won your flight with net 59 and 60!

Jake: That was just a great day. Everything went my way. Dr. Golf: Reaching the 530-yard par five in two and then making eagle; just going your way?

Heck, I've seen you shoot 77 playing with me.

Jake: C'mon, man, there's all kinds of tricks. Once, I shot 75, but I was in another state. Didn't count. (Meaning it wasn't on the computer.) Another time I was using borrowed clubs and playing with my wife, didn't count, either.

Dr. Golf: The USGA says you can only claim certain maximum scores for any given hole, regardless of how many strokes you took.

Jake: Maximum, schmaximum. Those things are way too complicated, sorta like the IRS rules. A nine or a 10 is a nine or a 10. I'm not smart enough to be a dad-blasted golf accountant.

Dr. Golf: I have played in some of the same local tournaments where you and your partners have won your flight, usually by a bunch. You must have a lot of pro shop credit accumulated by now.

Jake: Golly, I don't know. It's probably a couple of thousand (dollars). The thing is they set up these events so the guys with

the higher handicaps have a chance. Heck, I can't play straightup with you, Doc. You're what, a four?

Dr. Golf: Three. But here's my key question to you. Why don't you spend more time and effort getting better instead of nursing your handicap? *Silence*

Jake: Awe, now you're trying to embarrass me. I ain't no professional golfer. I just play golf to take a few bucks off my friends. I need to finagle all the strokes I can. In all honesty it's just gambling, and golf is the way we keep score. Dr. Golf: What would you do if the club's handicap com-

Dr. Golf: What would you do if the club's handicap committee found you out and simply lowered your handicap on their own?

Jake: Probably quit the club.

Actually golf clubs have had a long standing concern about lowering handicaps for members due to the implication that they were cheating. One California club pro was quoted as saying: "These days people are so lawsuit-happy, a pro or even a committee member might just open up the club to legal action for defamation of character (by lowering a handicap number)." However, with justice prevailing, precedent was set in the Montana Supreme Court with a 1986 ruling (Johnson v. Green Meadow Country Club), deciding that a club lowering a sandbagger's handicap "not only had the right but the responsibility under the USGA Handicap System to do so."

Few topics spur spirited discussion in clubhouse grillrooms more than the business of sandbagging. There is more than one side to the issue, to be sure. My friend Jake, whose golfing ego seems fragile, would take offense at the accusation that he is a hustler with his 16 strokes, and then quickly point out that he has had plenty wind-blown struggles breaking 93.

Those golfers who establish a "vanity" handicap by posting falsely low scores, whether by picking up all four-footers or "bumping" the ball or forgetting penalty strokes, seem to be regarded roundly as fools. It's the false postings of high scores that bother most folks. Dean Knuth, the USGA's director of handicapping, also has the website www.popeofslope.com in which the following is written: "The very term sandbagger may be part of the problem. It's a cutesy word that covers up the nature of the crime ... meaning that anyone who intentionally establishes a falsely high handicap is a cheater, no more or less, than the golfer who miss marks his ball on the green or foot-wedges it in the rough."

Quarter horse culture has taken over the Southern New Mexico State Fairgrounds, where the Southwest Quarter Horse Association is putting on its Fall Futurity.

The futurity event opens Friday, Sept. 2, and will extend until Monday, Sept. 5. More than 200 riders have brought their horses to Las Cruces to show their young horses in more

than 350 halter and performance events, SWQHA president Elfigo "Fig" Padilla said. Futurities allow owners

Futurities allow owners to show young horses for the first time, qualify for the Quarter Horse World Show, scheduled later this year in Oklahoma City, and earn premiums, Padilla said.

"This futurity is our biggest show of the year," said Jack Younker, SWQHA vice president. "The futurity is good for the horse people and brings lot of people to the community."

The futurity also offers

substantial premium dividends, money from the entry fees and \$4,000 from a SWQHA contribution, Younker said.

"And in our futurity we have a staff that keeps track of the winners as the classes are

being conducted," Younker said. "When your class is over, you can walk into the office and get your check. And the SWQHA Futurity is probably the longest running futurity in the Southwest."

Martha Sayles of Sayles Quarter Horses remembers the SWQHA Futurity started in the 1960s.

Hugh Trotter, Anthony quarter horse breeder and trainer, noted the futurities bring a lot of business to the Las Cruces motels and restaurants and retail stores.

"The quarter horse is the most versatile horse in the world," Trotter said. "They have a good disposition, and you can do just about anything with them."

The reputation of New Mexico Quarter Horses has extended to Europe. Recently, Joe Armstrong, who runs a equine center near La Mesa with his son Josh, returned from Germany where he has been conducting quarter horse clinics for the past 12 summers.

Quarter horses earned their name during the American colonial period because of their speed in a quarter-mile sprint. But as the United States extended its frontier to the West, they became popular with ranchers because of their athletic abilities and "cow sense."

Veterans talk about health care needs

VA hospital boss on hand for town hall By Rachel Christiansen

Veterans from the Las Cruces area were given a chance to let their voices be heard during a town hall meeting with Congressman Steve Pearce Monday, Aug. 29.

Pearce stood alongside El Paso Veteran Affairs hospital staff to field questions and concerns regarding disabled veterans' health care and other issues.

"We began these (meetings) about six years ago after we noticed there are many recurring problems veterans are facing," Pearce said.

Impassioned veterans brought a range of issues to the table, such as needing assistance with claims, the inaccessibility of VA staff, inadequate assistance for disabled veterans with special needs and current payment systems.

Pearce is a Vietnam veteran who campaigned on the promise of helping disabled veterans receive the care they need.

Resident John Ayers said he was in attendance to ask Pearce why he was unable to receive his VA benefits due to his wife's income.

"Her income is being used against me, even though she can't use the VA services," he said.

Ayers said the combined salaries put him a mere \$200 over the cutoff for receiving benefits, so he has been paying for doctor's visits and medications out of his own pocket.

After corresponding with staff in Washington, D.C., Pearce responded that the law has been in place for several years due to the tough economic times, but that he would continue to look into changing those guidelines.

El Paso VA Hospital Director Joan Ricard also took questions regarding availability and assistance and touted the Veterans Health Adminis-

tration's new online service, "My HealtheVet."

According to Ricard, the "My HealtheVet" program allows veterans to independently refill prescriptions, update personal health records and get helpful wellness reminders.

"We're trying to gear toward really looking at the care you need and really get to the point of what you want from your health care providers, instead of us always telling you," Ricard told the audience.

Ricard said high patient volume in the Las Cruces and El Paso areas combined with a lack of staff to deal with such numbers could be a reason for the inefficiency on patient requests.

"We have a tremendous backlog in the travel pay system, we're dealing with staff turnovers, and I'm sorry," she said.

There to represent the Hearing Loss

Association of Las Cruces was John Johnson, a disabled vet since 1971, who contends that he feels isolated due to his disability.

"There is a serious lack of effort within the system to accommodate those people like me who can't hear a word people are saying," Johnson said.

According to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, hearing loss is one of the most common military service related injuries.

Johnson suggested using new closed captioning technology that is currently being used more in other parts of the country and has helped veterans understand more about their everyday lives.

Pearce said all the issues brought up in the meeting were being recorded and changes made if possible.

MHS teacher picked for academy Group learns latest ways to make agriscience relevant

Mayfield High School's Kim O'Byrne was among 20 of the nation's finest agriscience teachers selected from 18 states to attend the ninth annual National Agriscience Teacher Ambassador Academy (NATAA) at DuPont's Chesapeake Farms.

The academy is a professional development program in conjunction with the National Future Farmers of America (FFA) Foundation and the National Association of Agricultural Educators (NAAE), where agriculture teachers learn new inquiry-based teaching techniques to improve science learning. Ecology, genetics and biofuels were just a few of the subjects investigated this year.

"It was an amazing opportunity, and I learned so much," said O'Byrne, who was one of seven New Mexico teachers to receive the 2011 Golden Apple award and attend the academy in August.

Besides teaching agriscience, O'Byrne is also Mayfield's

FFA sponsor.

More than 125 teachers have been a part of the academy since its inception, and interest in the program has exploded. This year, there were 140 applicants for the 20 slots – double the number of applicants from the previous year.

The goal of the program is to incorporate more science into existing curriculums, make learning fun and challenging for students and, as a result, improve student performance in standardized science test scores.

"The DuPont Ambassador Academy helps agriscience teachers see and connect the bridge between agriscience and agribusiness applications and science and math concepts so that student achievement is enhanced as measured by standardized tests," said Jay Jackman, NAAE executive director.

NMSU christens new playground

Collaborative efforts made bright playground possible

Children who live in the family housing area on the New Mexico State University main campus now have a brightly col-ored playground, thanks to a combination of resources.

The playground, located on a corner plot between Stand-ley and Poe drives, near Wells Street, used to be a plain grass field with large shade trees, said Julie Weber, NMSU's director of housing and residential life.

Recently, her department had been replacing older appliances, such as swamp coolers, to earn rebates from El Paso Electric Co. Those added up to \$95,000, which was enough to buy the equipment, Weber said.

Then, the question became how to install it. She talked to Fred Briscoe, project manager with Sundt Construction who was working on the second phase of Chamisa housing. He told her his company is always looking for a local community project and would be glad to help install the equipment. Another company that works with NMSU, Steinberg Ar-

chitects, donated the design for the colorful playground. These kinds of projects are part of the Community Build initiative spearheaded by Landscape Structures, according to an NMSU press release.

Finally, Southwest Contract donated \$5,000 towards the purchase of customized TuffRiders - spring-mounted riding seats that are popular playground attractions - with a Pistol Pete likeness.

NMSU purchased landscape equipment from Exerplay of Cedar Crest, N.M., and the new playground officially opened Monday, Aug. 29, with a ribbon-cutting ceremony led by NMSU

President Barbara Couture. "I am so proud of this," Weber said. "This has been one of the most rewarding things I have ever worked on. It was remarkable how everything came together so quickly."

Although there is other playground equipment in Preciado Park by O'Donnell Hall, those are for younger children. The new playground equipment is geared toward older children and is located by a school bus stop for children in family housing. People may not realize it, but NMSU is home to about 900

children, Weber said. Their parents are students and many also hold jobs. This park will provide another safe place for children on campus, she said.

"Kids need a place to play," Weber said. "This is going to make so many people happy."

Spaceport wins FAA grant Federal funds will go to vehicle building

For the second consecutive year, Spaceport America has received a federal grant award to help fund new spaceport infrastructure. The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) grant is worth \$249,378 toward the cost of a rollback vehicle integration building at Spaceport America.

The FAA announced the Space Transportation Infrastructure Matching (STIM) grant award Friday, Aug. 26. The matching grant program was created to ensure the resiliency of the space transportation infrastructure in the United States, which will rely more heavily on the commercial sector for future space activity, research and exploration.

These matching funds from the FAA are crucial for improving our vertical launch capabilities and expanding services for our launch customers," said New Mexico Spaceport Authority (NMSA) Executive Director Christine Anderson.

The roll-back vehicle integration building will be located inside the Vertical Launch Area

(VLA) of Spaceport America and will be able to accommodate the larger vehicles that are under development.

'Currently, we can only accommodate vehicles up to approximately 24 feet long and five feet wide," Anderson said. "New vehicles under development are much longer, and some have wings for gliding recovery. The new roll-back vehicle integration building will let us handle these new vehicles as they come on line."

The roll-back vehicle integration building is projected to cost \$498,756, of which the FAA grant will pay for half.

Last year, Spaceport America received its first grant from the FAA. On Sept. 10, 2010, the NMSA announced the FAA would provide a matching grant of \$43,000 to help fund an Automated Weather Observation System III (AWOS III). This system provides timely and accurate meteorological information to aircraft and spacecraft operations at Spaceport America, including visibility information and cloud data

Relocations, additions and openings power local economy

Call the movers and start building boxes. More than a dozen businesses in Las Cruces are making big changes, such as adding on, relocating, closing shop, opening a second location or opening in general. Businesses in the City of the Crosses are making changes.

Pro's Ranch

Perhaps one of the most anticipated business move-ins is Pro's Ranch Market, a Mexican-style grocery store complete with an extensive produce section, tortilleria and general grocery items.

According to Rick Provenzano, vice president of operations for the family-owned grocery store chain, Pro's Ranch will open in November, "at the very latest."

In addition to the grocery store, the rest of the plaza, with the exception of three small retail outlets, has also been leased by various businesses, such as Cricket, Melrose and Ranchie Wash, a laundromat subsidiary of Pro's Ranch.

"We are more than a grocery store," Provenzano said, "we are also a restaurant. If you buy fish here and want it fried, we will fry it for free. Most grocery stores employ about 100 team members, we have anywhere from 200 to 300."

Though the cost of labor is higher, Provenzano said the grocery store looks to make up the costs in the overhead.

"We don't ship in frozen tortillas and sell them thawed," he said. "We make them fresh here. We can make them for cheaper than we can buy them. Plus, they are fresh and it adds to the customer experience.

"We are back there cooking corn for the tortillas for eight hours. We will make five types of corn tortillas and chips on location and have fresh flour tortillas shipping in daily from El Paso."

NRG to power thousands

El Paso Electric partners with local solar company

The Las Cruces community will connect with renewable energy when NRG Energy starts generating power this fall at its Roadrunner Solar Plant in Santa Teresa.

The solar panel plant is being set up on a 210 acres of privately owned land, 10 miles west of El Paso adjacent to El Paso Electric Co. transmission lines.

The plant is designed to create 20 megawatts of solar generated electrical power that will be sold to El Paso Electric Co. under a 20-year power purchase agreement. NRG also plans to invest \$21 million in the project in the next three years, according to an NRG Energy news release.

"We're very pleased that the NRG Roadrunner Solar Facility in Santa Teresa is coming along according to schedule, and we're looking forward to the site's presentation this fall," said El Paso Electric Chief Executive Officer David Stevens. "Our 20-year contract to purchase the power from the facility demonstrates El Paso Electric's on-going commitment to solar energy research, education and utilization in this area."

At full capacity, the Roadrunner Solar plant will, in domestic terms, supply enough energy for 16,000 families, according to an NRG Energy news release.

The electricity is generated by what is referred to in the industry as photons in solar photovoltaic panels that are manufactured by First Solar, a company in California.

When photons strike solar cells in the panel, they are reflected, absorbed or passed through the panel. When they are absorbed, they have the energy to knock electrons loose, which flow in one direction within the panel and leave the panels through transmission wires as electric power, according to a First Solar fact sheet.

Voltaic solar panels generate direct current, and El Paso Electric converts it to alternating current with an inverter for domestic and business use, the power company reported.

Electric power generated at the Roadrunner plant will avoid an annual emission of 27,000 tons of carbon when compared with fossil fuel generation, NRG Energy reported.

The advantages of solar power, zero-emission, sustainable energy, coincident with peak demand and compliant with the state are convincing, said David Crane, NRG president, in an earlier news release.

Capitalists, researchers meet clients

Conference fosters trade with entrepreneurs and customers

The business of ensuring the nation's security has evolved into a vast and intimidating industry, but that doesn't mean entrepreneurs and innovative researchers are shut out of the field.

The 2011 National Security Technology Conference & Expo, hosted by New Mexico State University's Arrowhead Center, is committed to helping entrepreneurs and researchers create networks, get valuable advice about venture capital and log face time with representatives from some of the biggest names in national security.

"This conference and expo will provide a venue for technology entrepreneurs and researchers to network with and learn from federal agencies, contractors and venture capitalists," said Garrey Carruthers, dean of the NMSU College of Business and vice president for economic development.

The conference, sponsored by the Arrowhead Technology Incubator in support of a grant from the U.S. Department of Energy and the National Nuclear Security Administration, takes place Sept. 12 at the Las Cruces Convention Center, 680 E. University Ave.

Kathy Hansen, chief operating officer of the Arrowhead Center, said the conference aims to bring technologies being developed in labs to the attention of commercial ventures, as well as take technologies being developed by small businesses and expose them to potential customers.

One small business ready to make its National Security Technology Conference & Expo debut is the Navitus Group, a current client of the Arrowhead Technology Incubator. Josh Kauffman, the CEO and chief technology officer of Navitus, has developed a battery management system that is capable of handling high-current loads. The system also is constantly monitoring and maintaining the battery, which can make it stronger and increase performance.

With a booth at the expo, this is the first time Kauffman and Navitus are taking on the role of vendors.

"I'm usually on the other side - the guy walking around looking at other companies and their technologies," he said. "The exposure and the clientele that are going to be walking through this conference are just too much not to be there.'

Small businesses will have booths at the expo alongside major entities, such as Sandia National Laboratories and Los Alamos National Laboratory. Hansen hopes small businesses and researchers in the region will take advantage of the exposure the expo offers as a way of bringing attention to their products.

"Many times, smaller businesses have a hard time knocking

on the door and getting into DOD (Department of Defense) or DOE," she said. "One speaker will talk about how DOD and DOE need to go to technology incubators such as Arrowhead in order to get access to those technologies being developed by small businesses.

This year, the organizers of the National Security Technology Conference & Expo have opted to focus the event on the fields of cyber security, energy and aerospace.

"We tried to pick the areas that were the hottest topics, and energy is hot and certainly we have local businesses and researchers at NMSU involved in that," Hansen said.

Also this year, a group of private investors and venture capitalists will be on hand to discuss what business sectors and technologies they are interested in funding.

That's very important, because a lot of ideas and technologies die for lack of that funding." Hansen said. "Of course, the venture capitalists are usually later-stage funding. They are going to be funding technologies that look like they have nearterm commercial potential.

Kauffman understands all too well the importance of venture capital funding. His company already has received an initial investment of \$200,000 and he credits the incubator at Arrowhead, particularly Chris Penner, director of business incubation, for helping him reach that milestone.

"I don't have any doubt that the incubator has helped tremendously," Kauffman said, "I think we would have gotten there eventually, but I think the incubator has accelerated that and I'm talking accelerated by years."

That statement underlines Hansen's assertion that business incubators are a vital part of the economy.

'There is a much higher success rate for businesses that have been incubated than those that have not," Hansen said. "Of course, our end goal is to grow the region, do economic development here and try to grow the number of jobs.

Do FSBOs save cash? Realtors could help you get more money

Not long ago, I had the opportunity to show one of my listings to a prospective homebuyer who responded to one of my advertisements.

At the conclusion of the showing, I inquired about her current housing situation and buying plans. She indicated that she and her husband were planning to move out of their home in the city and into a home located in a more rural setting. When I asked whether they intended to sell their present home or keep it as an investment, she indicated they did intend to sell their home – by owner. When I asked why they were contemplating selling on their own instead of using the services of a Realtor, she replied with the answer I hear most often: "to save the commission." But what if selling on one's own isn't synonymous with putting more money in one's pocket? In fact, it's not.

According to the experts at the National Association of Realtors (NAR), "Sellers make more money when they use a real estate professional."

Think of it in these terms: Realtors don't get paid until the job is done. If selling on one's own would regularly produce a better result than produced by a professional, there would simply be no need for sellers to hire agents.

NAR goes on to reveal "the level of homeowners selling without a real estate agent has declined." Several factors appear to account for the decline. First, the increased complexities of the transaction process, with more disclosures and legal requirements than ever before, and second, security concerns about the motivation of strangers who walk around at will looking in rooms, closets, nooks and crannies. In addition to the factors identified by NAR, private sellers are also more likely to leave dollars at the closing table.

A case in point revolves around a client of our firm who recently purchased a for-sale-buy-owner property through our office. According to our firm's market analysis, the \$150,000 FSBO asking price was an easy \$20,000 below the property's true value. Subsequently, our client paid full price for the property and gained the full \$20,000 in builtin equity the very day his deed was recorded. A great deal for the buyer, but potentially a less-than-great deal for the seller.

The sellers missed an opportunity to put somewhere around \$9,000 additional tax-free dollars into their pockets had they sold for market value through a professional, even after paying a brokerage fee.

According to an NAR survey, getting the price right is one of the hardest tasks for sellers to accomplish. Proper pricing and accurate timing are illusive issues for sellers because they don't have access to critical, timely data on factors, such as depreciation rates, the numbers of available buyers in a given price range, the pricing strategies used to produce the most profitable results and the information needed to qualify buyers. And then there are the negotiating skills required to achieve the win-win situation.

In most cases, today's sellers tend to price their homes in line with the asking prices of nearby properties. The only flaw is there are currently only enough buyers in our marketplace to purchase somewhere around 10 percent of the available homes. That means that somewhere around 90 percent of sellers have priced their homes too high. See you at closing!

Gold price indicates problems in the global economy

Dollar's strength shows confidence in U.S. compared to trading partners

People can be emotional about the value of the dollar. A strong dollar evinces pride while there just seems something un-patriotic about a falling dollar. But we economists look at the dollar from a more clear-eyed perspective. The issue for us is what the dollar can tell us about the future of the economy.

The value of the dollar relative to other currencies depends, at least in the short run, on the expected return to U.S. investments compared to foreign investments. The expected return on U.S. investments, in turn, depends on the relative outlook for the U.S. economy. If the U.S. economy is booming, domestic corporations will earn higher profits on average and the dollar appreciates. A recession means the reverse.

Despite the slowing economy, the dollar remains strong, only having depreciated 2.3 percent relative to our major trading partners since the Standard & Poor's downgrade. This indicates a continuing confidence in the economy relative to our trading partners despite large ongoing deficits, downgrades and bitter political wrangling. Of course, our major trading partners

Of course, our major trading partners face problems that equal or exceed ours. Europe faces a real debt crisis, not the made-up, Washington created crisis we lived through last month. There is a real chance of a Greek default that could result in a break up of the Eurozone.

United States other major trading

partner, Japan, faces major challenges as well. Japan just picked its sixth prime minister in five years. Japanese government debt is 230 percent of its GDP and was recently downgraded to Aa2. This was the fourth downgrade for Japanese debt in recent years.

So relative to our trading partners, our problems aren't that great. Still even if people think the United States is doing relatively well, that doesn't mean things are perfect. Indeed, the yield on treasury's is less than 1 percent while inflation is running 3.6 percent.

Here, the high price of gold becomes understandable. Gold can be thought of as a "stateless" currency – a currency whose value is not directly tied to the actions of any one national government. As such, it can serve as a safe haven when people are distrustful of governments in general, as now seems the case. One has a choice of holding dollars and weathering the vagrancies of debt crises only to earn a negative real return after inflation. Or one can hold gold, which pays no interest, but which is relatively insulated from U.S. and world politics. And so gold reaches new highs and is trading above \$1,800 as of Aug. 27. High gold prices mean that international investors are saying "a pox on all your houses."

But I'm not a gold bug. Ultimately, the U.S. will recover. Ten years from now, our economy will be doing well. When the recovery does come, gold will lose its luster and the dollar will still be the world's reserve currency.

They both have a lot of good people, and there is not a huge adjustment to teaching at one or the other," he added.

After his stint in Missouri, Chaffin and his wife, whom he met at Wavland Baptist, decided to head south and found themselves back in Texas.

that had it all. In May, Chaffin's dreams came true

and he took a position at NMSU. "I knew some of the faculty at NMSU, and one friend in particular told me about the open position," he said. "I knew moving to Las Cruces would be an excellent decision because NMSU has great faculty members and great performers. In addition to his personal participation, Chaffin said he also encourages other NMSU faculty to be involved in the Las Cruces arts community.

Born in 1914, Pat Campbell graduated with a bachelor's degree from Rice University in 1938 and moved to Las Cruces shortly after.

He founded Pat Campbell Insurance in 1946 with a small office in the Masonic Temple building.

"The company was founded on principles to provide a comprehensive portfolio of insurance products for individuals and businesses, and that is what we still stand for today," said Kerry Hixon, current owner of Pat Campbell Insurance.

In 1968, the business moved to Las Cruces Avenue and added a team member that would be the next owner of the company – Jack Hixon, father to Kerry Hixon.

What once started as a good, old-fashioned, backyard barbecue celebrating the chile harvest 40 years ago in Hatch, has now developed into the world's largest and most sought-after chile festival.

For Hatch, a village that centers rich agricultural life and a population of 1,670 people around two two-lane highways, a festival that attracts more than 25,000 people every year is, needless to say, a big deal.

What's different about this year's festival marking the 40th anniversary?

"Not a whole lot, maybe the birthday balloons everywhere, and a few special presentations," said Marcia Nordyke, president of the Hatch Chamber of Commerce, "but we decided a while back that what's not broken doesn't need to be fixed."

Many things may have changed over the last 40 years, but all of the traditional chile festival events will be upheld, including the "Chile Festival Queen" coronation, chile and watermelon eating contests, food and drink vendors, a carnival and a chile fine arts show.

People from all over the country, even the world, seem to be quite satisfied with the momentous annual event just the way it is: a festival centered around the area's most popular crop – the chile pepper.

"I've gotten information requests from people as far away as China and Korea about this festival," Nordyke said.

She said the chile festival originated as a way for farmers to say "thanks" to their

workers around harvest time. Throughout the years, schools and local businesses started incorporating fundraisers, booths and other events that progressed into creating what the festival is today.

There will be an array of activities and good eats for all those chile enthusiasts, as well as the opportunity to stock up on this year's cream of the crop chiles.

Boasting of being one of the most aromatically friendly festivals around, the weekend would not be complete without the chile roasters working to make one's sensors go into overdrive.

Kicking off the Labor Day weekend celebration is a parade at 10 a.m. Saturday, Sept. 3, filled with cars and floats to lead the way into the day's activities.

Nordyke said everyone is invited to attend the parade, as long as they come "dressed for a birthday party."

Once the parade docks, this year's Chile Festival Queen Selinda Garay will be "coronated."

A tradition since 1972, the Chile Festival Queen is chosen every year to be a representative of the Hatch Valley community by promoting good citizenship and support for local businesses.

The Bank of the Southwest in Hatch sponsors the Chile Queen competition, requiring junior and senior applicants from the Hatch Valley High School to submit proof of outstanding academics and a dedication to the community.

According to bank representative Tina Cabrales, Garay was chosen because of her



"excellent speech and presentation on a computer program she put together that measures the heat of the chile pepper.

"We want the Chile Queen to be an ambassador for the community and, of course, she has to know a lot about chile," Cabrales said.

The Chile Queen has all summer to prepare for her main event at the festival, the Queen's Auction, in which items from local businesses are auctioned off to the highest bidder.

Garay said she has collected a wide range of items, all from local vendors, such as ice chests, blankets, cookbooks and pieces of art.

"Hatch Valley is just a part of who I am, and I want to represent it the best way possible," Garay said.

The Chile Queen gets to keep the earnings from the auction in the form of a college scholarship at the end of the year.

During the parade, Cabrales said there will be a "tribute" float marking the 40th anniversary, honoring all of the Chile Queens in the years passed.

On Sunday, Sept. 4, the festival begins at noon with more local musicians and the infamous chile-eating contest.

Participants are required to eat eight to 10 full chile pods – seeds, veins and all – and the winner of the contest is determined by whoever finishes off that last bite, first.

"We have some pretty strong folks, but we usually do see a lot of crying, sweating and eyebulging," Nordyke said.

The festival tries to offer something for the whole family to do, so for the "little tykes," Nordyke said, the chile-throwing contest is usually the most popular event as well as the all-day carnival.

Something new for this year's festival is the chile photograph contest. The contest is broken into two age groups -15 and younger and 16 and older - in which participants bring in their best pictures of "anything to do with chile," according to Nordyke, to be put on display throughout the weekend.

The Delk Band, the Las Cruces High School Mariachis and the Yarborough Family Band will provide live music both days of the festival.

All-day events include the Chile Capitol Artists Fine Arts Show, Bennett's Carnival and food vendors including beer supplied by the High Desert Brewing Co.

The festival offers a little something for everyone – mild, medium, hot, red and green – and can be a great place to take family and friends to celebrate what Hatch is famous for.

The cost is \$10 per car-load, and those with military IDs can get in free. For more information, visit www.hatchchilefest.com.

Chorus celebrates American music

Singers present encore for 9/11 commemoration

In a can't-miss concert Saturday, Sept. 10, the New Desert Harmony Singers will celebrate all things American and remember those lost in the 9/11 attacks.

All things American doesn't just mean patriotism - although there are popular patriotic songs in the repertoire. Through music, the chorus will celebrate American heritage in a concert that includes a spectacular stage settings, choreography and graphic presentation that was first presented as the group's annual summer show in June.

The concert is aptly titled "A Celebration of American Music." The first act, "Made in the USA," is a medley that will cover the blues, rock 'n' roll, country and patriotic genres, lasting about 40 minutes. The 50-minute second act salutes "100 Years of Broadway," paying homage to classic Broadway musicals such as "Cats," "South Pacific" and "Hello, Dolly!"

The concert is an encore performance of the New Desert Harmony Singers' annual summer show. Since the group rehearses year-round but usually performs two concerts a year, the chorus convinced Director Dave Kinkaid to put on the additional performance.

"We put a lot of effort into it," he said. "This is too important of a show not to be seen, and it was so well-received (when the show debuted in June)."

Kinkaid has been directing the chorus since it was known as the Las Cruces Grande Sweet Adelines Chorus, the female version of the International Barbershop Chorus. Though the group was formed in the mid-1980s, Kinkaid started directing the music in the mid-'90s. After five to six years directing the chorus, he took a break, during which the chorus dropped its Sweet Adelines International affiliation and changed its name to the Desert Harmony Singers.

Kinkaid returned to direct the chorus in 2004 and convinced the group to include male and female singers. What emerged was the New Desert Harmony Singers.

Different from other choral groups in the area, the New

Desert Harmony Singers are unique in that they don't have a set season, they rehearse year-round and everything is recited from memory.

'You can't do choreography with your face buried in music," Kinkaid said.

The choreography for "A Celebration of American Music," is "completely professional," he said, with input from the New Mexico State University's dance department. Department Director Debra Knapp will perform two dance solos during the show as well.

The entire show is professional - from the set to the promotional material - thanks to the help of show chairman and choir member Don Harlow.

Harlow, who has been involved with the chorus for about a year, helped with the sound system, and stage design for vignettes – even creating functional streetlights. He also designed the tickets, programs and advertisements for the concert. And the graphics displayed throughout the performance? Harlow had a hand in that, too.

And he'll perform a solo or two as well.

'There are quite a few solos in this group," Kinkaid said. "Members of the group are blessed with very fine voices, and it's nice to highlight them."

Though some of the songs will be sung a cappella, as in the tradition of the former Sweet Adelines chorus, the majority of the songs will be have pre-recorded accompaniment by a full orchestra.

On Sunday, Sept. 11, the group will head to Alamogordo for a 2 p.m. matinee performance of "A Celebration of American Music" at the Flickinger Center for Performing Arts. Following the show, the group will participate in the city's 8th annual 9/11 commemoration ceremony at 7:30 p.m. at the New Mexico Museum of Space History. New Desert Harmony Singers will sing patriotic songs at the event.

As the group continues to rehearse each year, Kinkaid said he hopes the shows are bigger and better each time they perform, and they are always looking for new members, who can sing in tune, of course.

The New Desert Harmony Singers rehearse from 7 to 9:30 p.m. every Tuesday at St. Paul's United Methodist Church, 225 W. Griggs Ave. Those interested in joining are welcome to attend a rehearsal and inquire about the chorus from there. For more information, call Kinkaid at 650-4417.

It's not a flight of fancy

Three women's lives intertwine in 'Bride Flight'

Ignore the silly title of "Bride Flight," a Dutch/New Zealander film, and tolerate the capricious editing, since there is a good story beyond all of that.

The film is based partially on a true story of three women who remain friends for decades after choosing to leave their flood-devastated homes in the Netherlands to reunite with husbands or fiancés in New Zealand. "Bride Flight" follows their friendship and very different personalities over the course of time to a reunion at the funeral of a mutual male friend, for whom all three once had a spark.

The Last Great Air Race took place in 1953 and was a race from London to Christchurch,

New Zealand, partially to show New Zealanders that air flight was a good way to travel. This is where our story starts.

Esther, a fashion designer, hopes to start her own business and continue her career in New Zealand. Of Jewish descent and pregnant by another gentleman, her engagement doesn't



last long upon her arrival, as her soon-to-be ex-fiancé proclaims their new life together will be guided by Jewish custom. Not to be bound by him or the customs, she is soon looking for a new mate.

Ada, who is pregnant from a one-time encounter with the man she is supposed to marry, soon discovers he, too, is moribund by his religion, and he decrees that she will be as well. Unable to do what Esther has done, Ada becomes trapped in a loveless marriage. However, during the flight, she has met and become very attracted to Frank, the man whose funeral the women will be attending in the future. They keep up a correspondence over the years, and she has fallen in love with him, even in absentia.

Frank, played in his later years by Rutger Hauer, has decided to go to a new land to try

his hand with ranching, and he becomes a very successful landowner and sheep rancher.

Marjorie, certainly the most levelheaded of the three women, is soon married to a pleasant fellow, but complications arise when she finds that she is unable to have children. Esther gladly

decides to help with that situation.

The film bounces from the present, back to the '50s and to the '60s, offering rather in-depth looks at these characters and their lives. While a lot of this could fall into a deep dish of soap opera, director Ben Sombogaart wisely keeps the story alive and away from the bubble bath. Compelled as well by fine scenery and an interesting story, he allows us to approach, have empathy for and like the characters, in spite of their warts.

A subplot develops between the women and Esther's feelings for the son she has given away, and this is what might hamper the story and editing slightly. It seems unnecessary and takes the film down a path it doesn't need to follow.

"Bride Flight" is a good blend of drama and romance, and also allows for a great scene that reminds us all that sex between two consenting adults is much more than the melding of body parts.

Take the film to heart and allow yourself to fashion your own life journey from this emotionally complex and lively picture.

Let the labor wars begin 'Matewan' examines life in the coal mines

66 'Matewan'

achieves a rare

degree of moral

complexity

The CineMatinee for 1:30 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 3, is "Matewan" (1987, 135 minutes, rated R). A little-known chapter of American labor history is brought vividly to life in this period drama from writer-director John Sayles.

It's a fictional story about labor wars

among West Virginia coal miners during the 1920s, but every detail is so right that the film has the unmistakable ring of truth. The tension begins when the Stone Mountain Coal Co. of Matewan, W.Va., announces a lower pay rate for miners, who respond by calling a strike under the leadership of a United Mine Workers representative (Chris Cooper).

Proving strength in numbers, the miners are joined by black and

Italian miners who initially resist the strike, and a fateful battle ensues when detectives hired by the coal company attempt to evict miners from company housing. Violence erupts in a sequence of astonishing, cathartic intensity, and "Matewan" achieves a rare degree of moral complexity combined with gut-wrenching tragedy.

The film salutes a pacifist ideal while recognizing that personal and political convictions often must be defended with violence. To illustrate this point, Sayles enlisted master cinematographer and New Mexico resident Haskell Wexler who creates the film's authentic visual texture – a triumph of artistry over limited resources. The result is a milestone of independent filmmaking, and

"Matewan" remains one of Sayles' finest achievements.

A room with three views 'Suite' comedy

playing at LCCT Review by David Edwards

"Plaza Suite" is one of those Neil Simonpenned mainstays of community theater. The play is more than 40 years old so dare I use the word "classic?"

It opened on Broadway in 1968 and has a rather unique structure in that it all takes place in suite 719 of New York City's famed Plaza Hotel. Each of the three acts tells a different story with different characters – except for the occasional room service waiter. Simon repeated the device in his plays "California Suite" and "London Suite."

The original production featured George C. Scott and Maureen Stapleton in all three acts – quite an amazing acting feat – but later in the run the two were replaced by six actors with a different couple in each act. Since then the play is more likely to be presented in that format, especially in community theater where the idea is to involve as many people as possible.

Directors Les Boyse and Indrani Rauth have assembled a versatile group of actors for the current Las Cruces Community Theatre production of "Plaza Suite." The three acts each require a slightly different skill set as the tone of each one is different.

Act One – Visitor from Mamaronek – is the most serious of the three scenarios. Karen Nash, played by Susie Whelpley, has rented suite 719 on the 24th anniversary of her marriage to husband Sam (Ken Eastlack).

It turns out that Karen doesn't have a very good memory for dates, ages or room

numbers and Sam seems a bit befuddled at first by her surprise celebration. Sam is a workaholic, it seems, and the marriage has been stagnating. Karen is hoping that by returning to the room where they spent their wedding night will stir up some old feelings.

Bobby Senecal is the "Visitor from Hollywood" of Act Two as he portrays big shot producer Jesse Kiplinger who is thrice married and divorced and gets in touch with his old Tenafly, New Jersey sweetheart Muriel Tate (Autumn Gieb). Muriel is now married with three children and keeps up with every facet of Jesse's career – even though the last time they were together was 17 years ago. Jesse lures her to suite 719 with the intention of re-kindling those old sparks. Of the three acts, this is the one directed by Rauth and it is more lighthearted than the first story.

Act Three – Visitor from Forest Hills – is played strictly for laughs with broad characters and farcical humor.

Roy and Norma Hubley (PJ Waggaman and Terri Conatore) have paid for an expensive wedding for their daughter Mimsey (Rebeckah Shempp) at the Plaza. The "big moment" has arrived but the problem is that Mimsey has locked herself in suite 719's bathroom and won't come out. Hilarity – as they say – ensues.

The play takes place in 1968 and no attempt was made to update some of the references – not a criticism just an observation. Audience members may find themselves scratching their heads at mention of late film director Otto Preminger (who died in 1986).

Non-New Yorkers don't appreciate the mention of Bonwit's for example or the demolished-in-1964 Savoy-Plaza Hotel. Most of us probably haven't seen or definitely not stayed at the Plaza Hotel – having to be satisfied with seeing it in movies or on television. For the most part New Yorker Simon still makes us laugh even though we might not "get it."

The entire cast deserves praise as well as both directors for keeping things generally light and well-paced but Gieb and Senecal seem especially comfortable with their roles.

Other productions of "Plaza Suite" that I have seen or been involved in haven't included the all-important bathroom as part of the visible setting. The choice was made, interestingly so, to include it here. A special shout-out goes to Rebeckah Shempp for being visible and in character for the entire third act while her parents battle to get her to come out. Farrell a more feral vampire

Improvements to 'Fright Night' remake mostly cosmetic

The original "Fright Night" (1985) was a surprise hit and well-received critically. I must confess I have not seen the film from beginning to end, only in snippets on cable over the years. Because of its reputation as a good scare it has always been on "the list" - just not too high, I guess. It still gets a 93 percent on RottenTomatoes.com, which translates to five big thumps on the Bulletin's Picking the Flicks feature.

Since it does have a "rep," is well regarded by fans and made a good profit at the box office, it absolutely ... had to be ... (sigh) remade.

Of course the big question with remakes is always, "Why?" ("Straw Dogs" anyone?) And the answer is always, "It could make some money." Let's not forget another reason to remake even average films is the lack of originality that often runs rampant in Hollywood.

This just in: You should know that I paused here in the writing process and decided that before I ranted too much I had better watch the original movie. I wasn't able to find it to rent or even buy so I had to download it on YouTube - something that almost no one envisioned could happen 26 years ago.

Something else not likely thought possible at the time are the advances in technology and visual effects that movies have experienced. "Fright Night" of 1985 looks very different than "Fright Night" of 2011 and it's not just my crappy laptop. The original looks very



much like an '80s movie and the effects look a little cheesy even though at the time they were considered pretty good thanks to Rick Baker and "An American Werewolf in London."

Tom Holland wrote and directed the original and even by today's standards the last 30 minutes or so hold up pretty well.

The plot is fairly simple: A slightly nerdy boy with a cute, much-too-hot-for-him girlfriend discovers the guy who just moved in next door is a vampire. No one believes him, of course, and he recruits a very reluctant vampire "killer" - who may be a bit of a sham - to help him rid the neighborhood of the blood thirsty scourge. The locale of the movie has been shifted

from an unidentified middle-American town to Las Vegas, which is perfect for a vampire with its transient population, many of whom

work at night and sleep during the day. Albuquerque doubles for Vegas here and director Craig Gillespie, who helmed the terrific "Lars and the Real Girl," takes advantage of one of those impersonal cookie cutter developments on the edge of town to create a perfectly isolated feeding ground for our fangster.

Charlie Brewster is the boy – played well by Anton Yelchin - who recently escaped his nerd past and, partly because his face cleared up – has a gorgeous girlfriend (Imogen Poots). His mom is rather self-involved (the always wonderful Toni Collette), sells real estate and worries about the dumpster still in front of the house next door. "What kind of construction work could he be doing? He isn't building a pool. Help me load up these realty markers on wooden stakes will you?'

And the guy next door is pretty intriguing - darkly handsome and a good physique, works at night it seems. His name is Jerry ("That's a terrible vampire name") and he

Chris Sarandon created the role of Jerry Dandrige in the original and he was smooth, sophisticated, suave and a good dresser. Farrell, who has said that out of respect for Sarandon's portrayal didn't want to mimic it, has gone a more, shall we say, earthy direction. He's kind of grungy, drives a pickup, smells the air a lot and drinks beer.

Let me just make a little whinge here about this eating and drinking thing. I am of the school that vampires don't eat or drink anything other than blood. (When it is offered, Bela Lugosi's Dracula responds, "I never drink ... wine.") Vampires are dead right? All their internal organs are dead too - unless you are a vampire on "True Blood" and then your sex organs are definitely alive. Sarandon and Farrell both have a penchant for munching apples for some reason. OK, got that off my chest, now move on.

Charlie is made aware of the increasing number of fellow students and their families who are disappearing by a buddy from his dork days, Ed (Christopher Mintz-Plasse). He is skeptical, naturally, but when Ed turns up missing and he sees Jerry take a stripper into his house with obviously evil intentions, his suspicions are aroused.

The title of the original "Fright Night" comes from one of those old monster movie television shows hosted by vampire killer Peter Vincent, a hammy, washed up actor played by Roddy McDowall. In the updated version, "Fright Night" is the name of a Las Vegas magician's show where he battles the undead. Vincent is played the time around with relish by former "Doctor Who" actor David Tennant.

The new "Fright Night" looks better, more contemporary, obviously, and the story is still good, but is that reason enough to remake a movie?

I enjoyed it to a point, but wasn't scared or amused. Hold up a mirror to the movie and

in India



While many New Mexico State University students vacationed, took classes or worked in the United States over the summer, others chose to spend part of the break working overseas.

Charles Wemple, a seventh-semester nursing student, spent two months working with schizophrenic homeless people in India. His research was funded by ASNMSU and Aggies Go Global, an organization funding global learning op-portunities for NMSU students. This was his fourth trip to India, a country that's about one-third the size of the U.S., but with four times the population. **Bob Nosbisch:** What did you do

before you came to NMSU?

Charles Wemple: I worked for five years as a crisis worker at a community mental health center in Taos. That's when I realized I wanted to be a nurse, with the ultimate goal of earning a doctorate to enable me to serve as a psychiatric nurse practitioner.

BN: So what did you do on this latest trip to India?

CW: I conducted research and did volunteer work at Shraddha, a nonprofit rehabilitation center for homeless people with schizophrenia. Shraddha is close to the town of Karjat, about two-and-a-half hours by train southeast of Mumbai. For a long time, I've been interested in agriculture as a therapeutic model for mental health rehabilitation. Some western European countries use this technique, calling it "Green-care." I was curious whether this approach was being used in developing countries. BN: Did someone recommend

Shraddha to you?

CW: No, Í discovered Shraddha while conducting an Internet search. I was excited that Shraddha incorporated agriculture in their rehabilitative work with homeless men and women with schizophrenia. Shraddha's founder and guiding light is Dr. Bharat Vatwani. He's tireless and committed to his mission. He gives up half of the proceeds he earns in his private practice in Mumbai to maintain Shraddha. At any one time, the center can house up to 70 patients. Shraddha is located on 6.5 green rural acres and provides rehabilitation through participation in the See **India** on page D2

A summer Planning a cookout?

Prevent food-borne illness at your next barbecue

As residents of the Mesilla Valley pull out the grill and head to picnic in parks or at the lake for the last big hoorah of the summer, it's important to keep food-borne illness at bay during your outdoor barbecue (and indoors as well).

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that food-borne diseases cause approximately 76 million illness, 60,000 hospitalizations and 5,000 deaths in the U.S. each year.

In New Mexico, Blue Cross Blue Shield of New Mexico paid 459 claims related to foodborne illness, costing just more than \$416,000. The costs related to food-borne illnesses

tend to be more expensive than other illnessrelated costs, said Dr. Matthew Fontana, chief medical officer for Blue Cross Blue Shield of New Mexico.

"People tend to present themselves to an emergency department for their acute symp-toms, and that's an expensive place to get care," Fontana said. "It's a significant problem."

To keep costs down and health up, Fontana said prevention is the key, and his

recommendations are quite simple.

Chill. Keep food refrigerated to impair bacteria proliferation in food, Fontana said.

'If you can't be somewhere you can refrigerate it, you may need to change your menu, Fontana said.

Separate. A common-sense, but not widely practiced rule of thumb, Fontana said, is to keep foods separate so as not to spread disease. For example, don't cut chicken on the same cutting board as fruits and vegetables without cleaning them first.

Clean. A clean kitchen, counter, hands, utensils and cutting board are essential in preventing the risk of food-borne illnesses.

'If you wash the cutting board, but don't ash the knife, that's not really a good practice," Fontana said. "Everything needs to be clean."

Fruits and vegetables also need a good washing," even if they're from organic settings. Growers can use fertilizers such as manure, which carries E. Coli bacteria and can increase the risk cross-contaminating other foods if not cleaned properly.

Cook. Though he said a meat thermometer is not used frequently, Fontana suggests that See Food on page D2

MMC encourages early literacy

Books for Babies launched in August By Natisha Hales Las Cruces Bulletin

Helping children get an even earlier head start on language recognition and literacy skills, Memorial Medical Center has teamed up with the Children's Reading Foundation of Doña Ana County to create the Books for Babies program.

Launched in August, Books for Babies provides a book – English or Spanish – a bib that says, "Read to Me," and a pamphlet on the im-portance of reading to children. The packets are given to parents of newborn babies at the same time the infant receives a hearing screening.

This gives the parents the start for reinforcing the importance of reading to their children from the day they're born," said Terry Miller, vice president of the Children's Reading Foundation of Doña Ana County. "(MMC CEO) Paul Herzog was not only willing to institute (the Books for Babies program), but pay for it as well. That's huge because we're a nonprofit and we're just getting started.'

cooking meat thoroughly is critical to ensure it's safe for consumption.

"You can't tell by looking that a food is thoroughly cooked," he said. "You need to get to the center of the burger. If it's pink in the center, you might get a juicier burger, but you're taking a chance."

When it comes to preparing foods, take extra caution if pregnant women, children, the elderly or those with compromised immune systems are on the guest list. Fontana said these people are at a higher risk of con-

a low-cost outlet to purchase the high volume of books for the program. MMC Marketing Director Mandy Leatherwood estimates 2,000 books will be distributed in one year.

Critical to the program's success was the hospital's auxiliary department, which already oversees the Cuddle Program and provides the free hearing screening for newborns.

"Since we have contact with all the babies, it's the easiest way to get the books to the babies," said Edna Marie Chavez-Gibbs, co-chair of the Cuddle program. "This helps parents become more aware of the importance of reading to their babies."

Since the program started, MMC already has distributed nearly 200 books to parents, and the response has been positive.

"I have been called twice by one of the parents, and the second time I talked to her, she told me, 'I've read that book to my baby about 50 times,'" Miller said. "What a wonderful thing. That's what this is about.

The foundation focuses on parents educating

tracting a food-borne illness. And as temperatures continue to hover near the 100-degree mark, it may be difficult to keep things cool. "The main thing is to keep hot things hot and cold things cold," Fontana said.

If someone does get a food-borne illness, they may have symptoms that include nausea, vomiting, diarrhead, fever and chills. If the fever is higher than 101.5, you can't keep anything down or your symptoms last more than three days, Fontana suggests being seen by a doctor as soon as possible.

"The key is prevention, especially this time of year," he said. "All it takes is careful consideration and preparation that people can do themselves."

their children from birth to 5 years old to ensure all children have the necessary skills when they begin kindergarten. Though the Children's Reading Foundation is a national organization, the local group recently got started after the initiative of state Sen. Steve Fischmann.

Miller said Fischmann learned about the Children's Reading Foundation and reached out to Las Cruces Board of Education member Maria Flores and Miller and asked if they would bring the organization to the county.

"It's a wonderful, wonderful organization," Miller said.

When the organization had a formal kickoff in May, it hit the ground running, hosting a literacy conference that same weekend to encourage collaboration among literacy providers, educators and community members.

The group will provide more information at local festivals, including The Whole Enchilada Fiesta and the Renaissance ArtsFaire.

"We're all working together toward a common goal of expanding literacy," Miller said. "The idea is to blitz the community with books and reading and the importance of both."

growing of rice, vegetables and bananas and the milking of cows. But Shraddha's ultimate mission is to reunite these patients with their lost families.

BN: What was the most challenging part of your time over there?

CW: I would say the realization that all the work that was done at Shraddha was only a drop in the bucket. There is an immense need for mental health care in India, a nation of 1.2 billion people with only 3,500 psychiatrists.

BN: Did you stay at Shraddha?

CW: Yes. I slept on a 1-inch mattress of beaten-down cotton in a patient ward along with three other social workers. We lived, worked, ate and slept at the center. The exceptions were the times we would take patients to be reunited with their families.

BN: Were you the only non-Indian working at Shraddha?

CW: Yes.

BN: What kinds of challenges did that pose?

CW: The other workers were most curious about my desire to help. They wondered why someone from a big, rich country like the U.S. would want to help homeless people in India with psychotic disorders. The biggest challenge, though, was in terms of communication, how much English the patients and staff could speak versus how much Hindi I could speak.

BN: What was the most rewarding part of your two months at Shraddha?

CW: I was grateful for the entire experience. I joined patients and staff in milking cows and planting rice. I assisted the nurses in physical assessments and administering medications. But I'm especially thankful

I had the opportunity to reunite a total of eight patients with their families. Some of the patients had wandered the streets for years and families had long ago given up hope. One of our patients had been lost for about eight years. We spent about 24 hours trying to track down her village of nomadic construction workers. Her family had given her up for dead and when we brought her back ... it was incredible, the entire village came out for the reunion. The joy on the faces of her family was overwhelming.

BN: Did the families tend to accept their long-lost loved ones or did they try to pretend they did not exist anymore and were someone else's problem?

CW: Even though these families were already struggling, they accepted their loved ones back into the fold. It was well worth the hours spent.

BN: So how many reunions have taken place?

CW: Since the farm was started in 2006 almost 1,400 patients have been reunited with their families.

BN: Did you have any other comments? **CW:** I'm grateful to Aggies Go Global, especially Dr. Gary Lowe and Dr. Vatwani for making my trip possible, and to the patients and staff at Shraddha for allowing me to be a part of their world. Also, many thanks to the faculty of the NMSU School of Nursing for their support. While memorable, my experience at Shraddha was all too brief. The need for mental health care in India and elsewhere is immense. Though we're limited as to how much we can do, we must cherish those victories we can make.

The upcoming 10th anniversarv of the terrorist attacks on 9/11 will undoubtedly invoke memories close to every American heart.

Whether remembering the tragedy as it unfolded on national television while the whole country held its breath, or if the events impacted a loved one, everyone has their own unique story about that day.

For those wishing to reflect on what this day means for them, St. Paul's United Methodist Church will host a remembrance choral performance at 2 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 11.

"It's something everyone, regardless of faith, can come together and enjoy," St. Paul's Musical Director Douglas Weeks said.

What makes this concert special, in addition to the momentous day, Weeks said, is the piece chosen to perform.

German composer and pianist Johannes Brahms wrote his Requiem in 1865 to deal with the pain of the passing of both his mother and mentor.

It was the first public performance done by the New York Philharmonic Orchestra just five days after the attacks on Sept. 11, 2001.

The choice of text is very appropriate because Brahms chose biblical scriptures that have to do with comfort and change."

Co-director of the choir David Klements explained that unlike other requiems that usually focus on the end of life, Brahms' incorporates text that is more "uplifting" about peace and life after death.

"It's incredibly consoling so it just seemed perfect," Klements said.

With the anniversary of the attacks falling on a Sunday this year, Klements said he hopes people will take the opportunity to turn a normal prayer and meditation day into one that focuses on dealing with these specific memories.

The response within the choir community about performing such an inspirational piece was nearly instantaneous, and participants from more than 14 choral groups are being represented.

Weeks said word traveled fast within the singers of Las Cruces of

the piece.

Sometimes it's so hard to get an audience here for some reason, even though there are so many people in this town who love this type of music," Sperling said.

Newspaper articles and headlines from the days and weeks following the attack will be on display in front of the audience for a visual aide in the remembrance.

Blank note cards will also be available, and audience members are encouraged to write their thoughts and feelings down as the performance progresses to leave with a flower display, as was done at Ground Zero.

The nose knows There's much to tell about a pet's nose

They always find you. It doesn't matter if you're hiding under the sheets, behind the couch or across the yard.

Our four-legged friends are the masters of hide-n-seek, thanks to their remarkable noses. They use their keen sense of smell to warn us of invaders, find explosives or alert their owners of oncoming seizures.

"There are many things that dogs tell us by using their nose," said Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley volunteer Lindsay Martinez, "but there's also a lot that their noses can tell us about them."

Noses, especially those belonging to cats or their canine counterparts, are often a very good indicator of the animals overall health. With animals, some coloration change may be as simple as a change in seasons. White-coated canines can often have "snow nose," a condition where their noses change from dark to light as the winter months roll in. In felines, especially of the orange tabby variety, black spotting on the nose and gums is a common condition called lentigo simplex. It's harmless and similar to freckles in humans.

"Any bumps or spots that cause pain are an indicator that something is wrong," said Vet Tech Danny Burns at Jornada Veterinary Clinic. "You should always have your vet check out any nasal inflammation."

Some dogs can lose pigmentation, or the

coloring of their nose, naturally, as some humans do on their hands or feet. As long as the surface is not scabbed, cracked or begins to lose its cobblestone appearance, the animal is generally considered healthy, he said.

A pet's nose can go through phases of dry and wet, depending on the temperature and humidity of the environment. Burns said not to worry, unless that dry or wet nose is accompanied by "vomiting, diarrhea, lethargy or loss of appetite." These could all be signs of serious illness, and your pooch or feline should be brought in to see the vet.

Although a wet or dry nose alone may not indicate illness, other symptoms may mean something more serious. Cats and dogs can be especially prone to sunburns and skin cancer on their noses, since the nose is one area of their bodies not protected by layers of fur. A dog's fur helps to protect from UV rays in the same way clothing does for humans.

The leading cause of dry nose and irritation around the nose and mouth of most house pets is called plastic dish dermatitis. This occurs when the animal eats or drinks out of plastic or rubber bowls and has an allergic reaction to the many chemicals found in the dishes. There's a simple solution.

"Ceramic bowls make great feeding dishes," Martinez said. "Or there's stainless steel, which is easy to clean and naturally anti-microbial."

Paying attention to small details, such as the way your pet's nose looks or feels, may help him live a long and healthy life.



Know more about noses

- The canine nose has no sweat glands; and the natural moisture is caused by the mucus lining.
- Dogs don't get colds like people do, but they do get respiratory infections.

- Some dogs sneeze from excitement or nervousness that stimulates the nerves in the nasal passages. Many Akitas make "happy sneezes" after playing.
- Persistent sneezing without discharge indicates a problem such as a polyp, tumor or inhaled foreign body.
- Several diseases involve nasal discharge, including distemper, bacterial rhinitis, infected sinuses, and kennel cough so a trip to the veterinary clinic is definitely in order if Fido's nose begins to run.
- Collies and related breeds can get a weepy, crusty dermatitis on the nose if they spend too much time in the sun. Once the nose is treated and healed, it is often blackened with tattoo ink to protect it from sunlight.

Wind Dancer Trail home features flexible layout designed for entertaining

The 2011 Spring Showcase of Homes took visitors all around Las Cruces, including the spacious abode at 8945 Wind Dancer Trail located on a dirt road in the Talavera area.

Completed in time for the showcase, the three-bedroom home was constructed by John Hadley of Desert Sky Builders and reflects a relaxed Mediterranean style.

"I built the same house a few years earlier down the road on Modoc Hills," Hadley said.

Designing the 3,470-square-foot home from a floor plan for a 2,400-square-foot residence, Hadley said the layout was tweaked a little, with most likely the biggest change being to the roof - which went from flat to pitched.

In addition to the roof, Hadley also changed the original floor plan to capture the view of the Organ Mountains and surrounding scenic landscape.

"What I try to do with all of my clients is try to fit the home to the lot," he said.

To capture the view of the Organ Mountains, Hadley said he had to flip the floor plan so the garage was on the west side of the home. Also, it was positioned so the east-facing windows looked through an "alley" between the two neighboring properties, offering a clear shot of the mountainscape.

'The house was sited for the view," said Realtor John Bacon of RE/MAX Classic Realty, who represents the listing. "The neighboring houses are already built and this house is set in such a way that they won't block the view.'

A short drive on Wind Dancer Trail, located off Soledad Canyon, leads to the home. A gravel driveway accompanied by rock landscaping speckled with native plants takes visitors to a set of double doors measuring 8-by-6 feet. Behind the doors is a surprise – a 410-squarefoot tiled courtyard.

"It's a little different," Bacon said. "It's kind of a surprise entry because with the door closed, you think you're going into the main house, but instead you walk into this open front courtyard."

'During the showcase of homes, everyone went in and said, 'Wow, these big wood doors are deceiving," Hadley said. "It's a layout I like because it has this open courtyard."

The front door, which closely resembles

the entry into the courtyard, takes guests into low-e windows and dual-flush toilets.

At the end of the hall is the master suite. With oversized windows to capture the view and bring in natural light, Bacon said the master bedroom is a relaxing retreat. The bathroom is also an escape, thanks to its large jetted bathtub set in tile and separate shower that features two showerheads.

Outside, Bacon said, there is 2,157 square feet of covered patio space. A tiled patio, featuring an irregular shape, includes the home's second fireplace as well as an area for a large flat screen TV. The patio, he said, is ideal for relaxing and taking in the peaceful surroundings.

Beside this covered patio is another, larger patio area. Hadley said the 77-by-20-foot covered patio includes four different areas that are plumbed for a wet bar or barbecue grill. Mystery of the silvery slime Slow traveling snails find way into gardens

A trail of silvery slime leads up to your garden, and as you move closer to your plants, you spot a snail. For them, it's mealtime.

Snails use slime to help them move, and it protects them when they move over sharp objects, such as glass. They can't hear anything, so they rely on their sense of touch to interact with each other. Also, they use their sense of smell to help them find food, which often they find in your garden.

Snails have been around for more than 600 million years. They can adapt and survive in almost any condition, including the dry climates in New Mexico. They're often imported into the state in new plants, and once here, they're difficult to get rid of. It's also a struggle to keep their popula-

tions down in order to minimize the damage they do.

All snails, whether they live on land or

in water, are vegetarians. The marinebased snails usually eat algae. Their life span can be as short as a year, or up to 30 years in captivity. They can be very small, but some sea types can grow as long as 30 inches and weigh 40 pounds.

The snail is synonymous with being slow, and if you have the chance to watch one, you can clearly see why. The snail might move about 0.03 miles per hour, but can still do a good amount of damage to a garden. Snails are most ac-

Have a leaky faucet in your kitchen? According to the EPA, a drip rate of just one drip per second can waste more than 3,000 gallons of water per year. So even if it seems like a small leak, it could be costing you big time.

Many faucets can be easily tightened and fixed to eliminate leaks – otherwise, consider installing a new WaterSense-labeled faucet.

Dishwashers can be another huge water drain. Remember to only run loads when the dishwasher is full, or invest in a dishwasher with a half-load cycle option. Lawn leaks

Creating whimsy, drama and elegance in a room while regulating how much light enters can be done with the selection of one key element - the curtains.

While choosing the perfect curtain to fit the feel and function of the room, another, seemingly simpler, selection is the curtain ring on which it will hang.

A clasp designed to hold a curtain on its rod, allowing it to be opened and shut, there are several types of curtain rings that come in a variety of shapes - from circle to pear. Created from metal, wood and plastic, the rings are also essential in holding up a shower curtain.

No matter if you've switched from drapery to blinds or swapped your plastic shower curtain rings for the metal variety, save those old and leftover curtain rings to be used in other ways around the home.

1. Make cabinets toddler proof: A curious toddler can be cumbersome to keep tabs on. Help keep them out of your kitchen and bathroom cabinets with a curtain ring. Use the shower accessory to lock them out of these areas by attaching the ring over the handles. The rings will be hard to remove, keeping baby away from chemicals, pots and pans and whatever is hiding under the sink.

2. Keep track of your hammer: Taking care

of around-thehouse repair jobs can require getting up high on a ladder or getting down low in the rocks. No matter the task, keep both of your hands free with the help of a curtain ring. Selecting one of the metal varieties. attach it to you belt or belt loop and slide your

hammer through the circle. The hammer will stay at your side, allowing you to easily reach for it when needed.

3. Hold onto washers and nuts: A clean workshop is a safe workshop. It's easy to keep everything organized, even those tiny washers and nuts. Open up a metal, pear-shaped curtain ring and weave it through the tiny bolts' openings. Place them so the nuts and washers of similar sizes are next to each other, making it easier to select the right size in a hurry.

4. Don't lose your mittens: When the temperature drops in Las Cruces, parents and children everywhere will be reaching for their winter gear. If you, your child or a loved one has the unpleasant habit of losing mittens, keep track of them with a curtain ring. Hammer a nail next to the front door and place a curtain ring on it. Every time you come indoors, hook your gloves or mittens to the curtain ring and hang them on the nail. Never again will the pair magically wander off.

5. Bring in light: While curtain rings are designed to hold up curtains to block light, they can also be used to hold back curtains to allow light in. If you're looking to add a little light to a room, just gather your curtain around its middle, place the ring around it and snap it closed. The ring will keep the curtain drawn back, allowing the room to be filled with more light.

6. Create a napkin holder: Making your own napkin holders can be a fun, simple proj-

ect if you have a few extra curtain rings and a hot glue gun. Using clear, wood or metal rings, decorate them with a variety of craft items, such as sequins, fake leaves or flowers or ribbon. Design them to fit any occasion or dinner party. When you're done, fold the napkin and use the ring as you would any other napkin holder.

7. Save closet space: Is a cramped closet hindering your style? Get some more space with the help of curtain rings. After placing your piece of clothing on the hanger, hook the hanger to a closed ring. Repeat this process with other articles of clothing, attaching each

ring to another to create a chain. The first ring can then be looped around the rod, allowing the clothing to hang vertically, freeing up space along the rod.

8. Make an accessories chain: In addition to saving closet space, that same curtain ring chain can help you get organized in another way. Use it to hold belts, handbags, scarves,

jewelry, hair scrunchies - whatever else you'll need to complete your look. This will save you room and keep all of your accessories at your finger tips.

9. Get a head start on your day: If you're anything like this writer, you're not a morning person, which makes getting to work on time a challenge. Overcome this by planning ahead and getting organized, which is as easy as reaching for the ol' curtain ring. Select your outfit the night before, and loop your accessories - scarves, belts, necklaces, bracelets, etc. - to the ring. Place the ring with your outfit and in the morning, everything you need is right there. No more wasting time searching for the perfect belt or trying to find a necklace to match.

10. Hang a wet bathing suit: One of the joys of traveling is taking a dip in the hotel pool. Don't let that fun excursion turn into a soggy mess - hang that wet bathing suit out to dry on curtain rings. Keep a couple rings in your bag and when you're done swimming, attach your bathing suit to them and hang from the shower rod.

11. Bundle your luggage: Speaking of traveling, curtain rings can also be used to lighten the load you have to carry. Free up your hands by using a ring to attach any small pieces of luggage to your rolling suitcase. This is also a good way to ensure nothing gets lost amongst the hustle and bustle.



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We all scream for ice cream Homemade frozen treats just as good as any

The excruciating heat we've seen this summer will fade into distant memory in a couple of months, so it's time to enjoy some nice cold treats while we still can.

Ice cream is one of those foods people can be very picky about. Whether it's the certain flavor, texture or one brand preferred over the other, there's certainly plenty to choose from at any grocery or corner store.

It can also be a region specific thing. For instance, if you ever have traveled through Brenham, Texas, home of the first Blue Bell Ice Cream creamery, residents will likely be quick to tell you what they think is the best ice cream.

Or, here in the Southwest, where the decadent pistachio flavors run rampant, other parts of the country may think it's unheard of to put pistachios in ice cream.

Making your own ice cream; however, can be a great weekend project with the kids or a fun and tasty addition to any barbecue- and there probably won't be any complaining about the taste.

It may take a little more time for preparation than just buying at the store, but the taste is unlike any other and well worth the wait.

What is it?

There are several different types of ice cream machines, both electric and manual, but they all have the same general concept.

It is a way to make small quantities of ice cream at home, allowing the creative juices to flow with flavors and added toppings to make a delicious, personalized frozen treat.

The manual versions may take a bit of extra work, but, it could be a good way to keep the kids – or other rambunctious family members - busy while the rest of dinner is cooking.

How does it work?

In order to produce delicious, creamy ice cream, the ice cream mixture must be kept frozen and constantly churned.

In most traditional electric ice cream makers, there will be two stackable bowls; one on the outside with a freezing mixture that usually contains rock salt – the manufacturer will tell you how to make the freezing mixture - and one on the inside containing the actual ice cream.

Also depending on the manufacturer, there may be a 24hour freezing period for the bowls.

The churning process takes about an hour, and it is usually a good idea to freeze the finished product for another half hour or so to achieve a good consistency.

How much does it cost?

Ice cream makers range from \$75 to \$200, depending on the style (electric versus manual) and convenience factor. Some more expensive, high-tech models require no additional freezing and do all of the labor for you.

Where can I find it?

Keep an eye out at secondhand and thrift stores as well as garage and yard sales for these machines. They have been around for years and some people may not get use out of them anymore.

If that doesn't work out, Bed, Bath & Beyond carries an electric machine in stock, and other home retailers such as Walmart and Target carry them in their online catalogues.

Peach and Toasted Pecan Ice Cream

- 3/4 cup sugar 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1/8 teaspoon table salt 2 cups milk
- 1 cup heavy whipping cream
- 1 egg yolk 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla bean paste*
- 1 cup peaches, peeled and
- coarsely chopped tablespoons light corn syrup
- 1 1/2 tablespoons butter
- 1 cup pecans, coarsely chopped
- 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt

*Vanilla extract may be substituted. Whisk together first three ingredients in a large heavy saucepan. Gradually whisk in milk and whipping cream. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly for 10 to 12 minutes or until mixture thickens slightly. Remove from heat.

Whisk egg yolk until slightly thickened. Gradually whisk about 1 cup hot cream mixture into yolk. Add yolk mixture to remaining cream mixture, whisking constantly. Whisk in vanilla bean paste. Cool 1 hour, stirring occasionally. Meanwhile, cook peaches and corn syrup

in a small saucepan over medium heat, stirring often for four to five minutes. Coarsely mash, and let cool 30 minutes. Stir peach mixture into cooled cream mixture.

Place plastic wrap directly on cream mix-ture and chill 8 to 24 hours.

Meanwhile, melt butter in a small skillet over medium heat; add pecans, and cook, stirring constantly for eight to nine minutes or until toasted and fragrant. Remove from heat, and sprinkle with 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt. Cool completely (about 30 minutes).

Pour chilled cream mixture into freezer container of a 1 1/2-quart electric ice cream maker, and freeze according to manufacturer's instructions. (Instructions and time may vary.) Before transferring ice cream to an airtight container for further freezing, stir in pecan mixture. (Recipe adapted from www.southernliving.com.)

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Grilled Pesto Potato Salad

3 pounds medium-size red potatoes Olive oil cooking spray 1/3 cup white or golden

balsamic vinegar 1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil 1/2 teaspoon sea salt 3 cloves garlic, minced Freshly ground pepper to taste 1/3 cup shredded Parmesan cheese 1/4 cup fresh basil, finely minced 1/4 cup toasted pine nuts (optional)

Place potatoes in a large microwave-safe bowl. Cover with lid or plastic wrap. Note: If using plastic wrap, make sure plastic wrap is not touching any ingredients and poke one small hole in cover to vent

Microwave on high for 10 to 12 minutes or until potatoes are tender (cooking time may vary depending on microwave). Use oven mitts to carefully remove from microwave. When cool enough to handle, cut potatoes in half or quarters and spray liberally with olive oil spray. Grill over high heat for 5 to 7 minutes,

turning occasionally, until grill lines are apparent. Remove from grill and let cool. Cut into bite-size pieces and place in a large bowl. Whisk together vinegar, oil, salt and garlic; pour over potatoes and toss lightly to coat.

Season with pepper, then cover and refrigerate until ready to serve. Just before serving, toss with Parmesan cheese and basil, then sprinkle with pine nuts. Makes 8 servings.

Serving spicy seafood

Shrimp, crab get dressed up with fiery peppers

Spicy seafood is a delightful change of pace for a carnivore such as myself.

When I think spicy seafood, two chile peppers in particular come to mind: jalapeño and red chile. Green jalapeños deliver a crisp, garden fresh veggie flavor while red varieties provide a distinct potent punch.

When two friends recently shared favorite seafood recipes that included my preferred pods, I asked if I could "steal" 'em for Chile Knights. New Yorker Carl Johnson contributed a lump crab cake recipe prepared with "the best canned lump crab you've ever had," and Arizonian Mary Keelan Williams' "rockin' shrimp tacos ... with the spiciness of jalapeño crema (and crushed red chile)." Perfect, Williams said, for a Mexican-Argentinean fiesta!

I also include a recipe for a lobsterjalapeño salad sandwiched between a hoagie and served with blue corn chips and my sassy Margarita Mango Salsa.

Chimichurri Shrimp Tacos with Slaw and Jalapeño Crema

Chimichurri sauce:

1 cup (packed) fresh Italian

- parsley, finely chopped
- 1/2 cup olive oil
- 1/3 cup red wine vinegar 1/4 cup (packed) fresh cilantro,
- finely chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, peeled and finely minced
- 1/2 teaspoon dried crushed red chile pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon dried oregano leaves
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

To make the chimichurri sauce, add all the ingredients to a small bowl and mix. Let it sit for 1 hour.

Jalapeño Crema:

1 to 2 (1 1/2 tablespoons) roasted

- jalapeños*, seeded and finely minced
- 1/4 cup heavy cream
- 2 tablespoons sour cream 1 tablespoon cilantro, chopped
- 1 teaspoon fresh lime juice

Kosher salt and cracked black

pepper to taste

To roast the jalapeño peppers, using a gas stove, place the jalapenos directly over the flame and blacken on all sides. Put in a paper bag when completely black for about 10 minutes. Scrape off the black skin (do not rinse) and chop. Set aside. If you don't have a gas stove, use the oven and set to broil. Put the peppers as close to the broil as you can and turn occasionally so all sides get blackened.

To make the Jalapeño Crema, whisk cream in a bowl to soft peaks, add the remaining ingredients and mix well. Set aside. If you want the crema spicy, just add more jalapeños.

Avocado Cabbage Slaw:

2 ripe avocados, seeded, peeled and diced 2 cups purple cabbage, finely shredded 1 tablespoon red onion, finely diced 1 tablespoon pepitas, toasted 2 teaspoons canola oil 2 teaspoons fresh lime juice 1/8 teaspoon Dijon mustard 2 teaspoons fresh cilantro, chopped fine 1/2 teaspoon honey Kosher salt to taste

To make the avocado cabbage slaw, mix the oil, lime juice, mustard, cilantro and honey in a small bowl. Season with a little kosher salt. In a larger bowl, add the avocados, cabbage, red onion and pepitas. Refrigerate until right before using and then drizzle the dressing over and serve immediately.

Grilled shrimp:

1 1/2 pounds medium sized shrimp, peeled and deveined 8 small white corn soft tortillas

Garnish

8 lime wedges

To make the shrimp, put the shrimp in a large resealable bag. Add the chimichurri sauce and let the shrimp marinade for about 1/2 hour in the refrigerator.

Heat a barbecue grill to medium heat. Put the shrimp on skewers and grill on both sides until pink, or sauté on medium heat in a sauté pan until done. Remove from the grill and take the shrimp off the skewers.

Heat a large sauté pan to medium heat. Spray with a non-stick spray. One at a time, heat the tortillas on both sides for about 30 seconds on each side. Put aside and keep warm.

To assemble the tacos, lay a tortilla flat and add the shrimp, then the slaw and then drizzle the crema on top. Garnish with a wedge of lime. Makes 8 servings.

Carl's Crab Cakes

1 (6-ounce) lump crabmeat, preferably Miller's Select*

1 egg, beaten 1/4 cup red onion, finely chopped

1/4 cup cracker crumbs, finely ground (I used Multi-Grain Wheat Thins) 1 1/2 tablespoon mayonnaise

1 tablespoon Dijon mustard 1/2 jalapeño, stemmed, seeded and minced

2 sprigs cilantro, chopped Extra virgin olive oil

Âdd all ingredients in a bowl. Mix well with a fork. Form mixture into patties. Heat about 2 tablespoons of extra virgin olive oil to a frying pan. Add patties. Fry on both sides until golden brown. Serve with a swirl of sour cream. Makes 4 to 6 patties.

2 fresh chilled mangoes, peeled and diced 1/2 cup crushed pineapple 1 tablespoon mango margarita mix Splash tequila 1/4 cup red bell pepper, diced

and finely chopped

1 tablespoon canola oil

1/4 cup red onion, chopped 2 tablespoon fresh cilantro, chopped

or fresh basil, chopped

2 teaspoon fresh lemon or lime juice Sea salt and freshly ground

black pepper to taste

Combine in a bowl. Serve with blue corn tortilla chips. Recipe can be used as a topper for fresh fish, chicken or grilled pork. Makes 2 1/2 cups.

Spicy Jalapeño **Lobster Hoagies**

1 (1 1/2) pound lobster, cooked or canned and chilled 1 large stalk celery, fine chopped 1/2 red bell pepper, seeded and finely chopped



1 jalapeño, stemmed, seeded and finely chopped 3 tablespoons mayonnaise

1/2 teaspoon Dijon mustard

- Salt to taste
- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter 4 hoagie rolls

Chop lobster, if necessary and place in a bowl. Add the celery, bell pepper, jalapeño, mayonnaise and mustard. Stir to blend and season to taste with salt.

Heat a frying pan over medium heat. Butter the cut sides of the rolls. Place the rolls, buttered side down, in the pan and toast until golden brown, about 3 minutes. Transfer the rolls to plate, fill with lobster salad, and serve with blue corn tortilla chips with Sunny's Margarita Mango Salsa, see recipe below. Makes 4 servings.

To clean or not to clean Low-maintenance solar panels don't need extra care



Mellow Honek Living Better Solar Powered

How fortunate we are to live in southern New Mexico? The many enemies that attack solar photovoltaics system performance elsewhere in the country are minimal or all together absent in this area. Here in New Mexico, your grid-tied solar PV system is almost completely free of maintenance.



Solar energy systems come in different configurations and each require a different approach and effort level to maintain peak performance and long life. In this article, I am addressing grid-tied systems. Several hundred of these systems are installed across Doña Ana County.

One frequent question is how often the roof-mounted solar panels must be cleaned. When trees are not present, my answer is always the same: let the rain clean them. I recommend against homeowners climbing onto their roofs to clean the panels. Climbing onto a roof is one of the most dangerous activities for a homeowner. With modern glass surface treatments, even a light rain can

effectively wash the dust from your solar panels.

But there are still some who are determined to scale a ladder in order to squeeze an extra kilowatthour or two from their systems. For them, I offer a challenge to prove they receive a worthwhile increase in production equal to the risk of climbing on the roof. I suggest they clean the dust from only a few panels while leaving the others untouched.

All of our clients enjoy micro-inverter systems, which have the advantage of being able to monitor the production of each individual solar panel. After cleaning a few of the panels, the homeowner can retreat to relative safety at With modern glass surface treatments, even light rain can effectively wash the dust from your solar panels.

ground level. Now, it is easy to compare the performance of the washed verses unwashed panels using a web browser on their personal computer. Many of our clients have conducted this experiment and concluded that it is unclear if there is an advantage. Most agree it is not worth the risk of a trip to the roof and vow not to do it again.

OK, so some of you are still unconvinced. For those few, here are my recommendations on cleaning your solar panels. Rain water is best for cleaning solar panels ... OK, I had to try one last time to dissuade you.

If you must clean them yourself, use only water to wash the panels. Deionized water works best and will not leave mineral or water spots. Remember, any spots will sit and bake until the next time the panels are washed. If you can't use deionized water, or even if you do, be sure to squeegee the water from the panel surface to eliminate leaving water or mineral spots behind. The rubber seals are not engineered nor tested for exposure to detergents or other cleaning agents, so keep it pure. If birds have left their mark, use a soft brush and water to remove the offending stain.

One last tip: clean the panel surface early in the morning before they, and you, get too hot. That's it. I told you these systems are low maintenance. Were you expecting electrical testing methods?

Phrases you can Google to find some of the tools I mentioned in this article are "solar panel cleaner" and "hose water deionizer."

If you have trees near your solar array, be sure to keep them trimmed in accordance with the instructions from your installer. Allowing those trees to grow in a way that causes shade on your panels will reduce production far more than a little dust.

My best advice is to relax and enjoy the impact on your electric bills. Learn a lesson from the military, they park their jets in the desert to help preserve them. The solar panels were made to live outside for many decades without your help.
