New lines drawn for high schools

Superintendent vows to watch transfers closely

The Las Cruces school board approved new high school attendance boundaries Tuesday, Nov. 15, amid concerns that an open transfer policy could result in the new \$110 million Centennial High School not having enough students when it opens next fall.

Between now and mid-January 2012, school officials will reach out to students and parents in the new high school attendance neighborhoods to assure them Centennial will have the same caliber of programs as the district's other three comprehensive high schools, said Superintendent Stan Rounds.

Any student – these will be freshmen and sophomores - can request a transfer to allow them stay at the high school they would have attended before the change, said Rounds, who didn't modify his promise to allow all such requests.

Some have criticized Rounds for not being more steadfast about having students stay in their attendance area.

School Board Secretary Bonnie Votaw said it's important for Centennial to have about 1,100 students when it opens because the whole point of drawing new district lines was to alleviate overcrowding in the other high schools.

Votaw said she believed the advisory committee gave what was asked in terms of providing boundaries to equalize the school populations. The concerns of students and families should be accommodated, she said, but the board needs to have frequent reports on how the enrollment and transfer numbers are playing out.

Board Vice President Maria Flores asked what will happen if Centennial ended up with a lot less students than intended.

Rounds said officials will become more aggressive about finding students from out of Centennial's district to transfer to the new school. There will be some See Redistricting on page A12

Mesilla to ask voters to approve GO bond

Board OKs drafting ballot for vote on \$1.5 million bond

The Mesilla board of trustees took the first step to asking voters in the historic tourist town for approving a \$1.5 million bond when, at its meeting Monday, Nov. 14, they approved hiring the Modrall Sperling law to draft the ballot language.

Mesilla Mayor Nora Barraza said the bond is the only way the town can get enough funds to make needed repairs and

upgrades to its Public Safety Building, which houses the fire and police departments.

The Town of Mesilla belongs to us and we need to invest in our community," she said.

Should everything go ac-cording to schedule, the bond question will go before voters in March 2012 and would result in a property tax increase during the life of the loan, which will be either 10 or 15 years.

Mesilla has not seen an increase in property taxes since it was incorporated in 1959. Nearly as old is the original portion of the Public Safety Building, which was first constructed by residents. The building has been expanded See Mesilla on page A12

New council poised to work on poverty

Election debates sharpen focus on economy and jobs

Although the forums leading up to the municipal elections didn't generate high voter turnout or major changes to the City Council, candidates who won the vote say the issues debated will help shape the agenda for Las Cruces city government.

For example, Mayor Ken Miyagishima has scheduled a series of public meetings around the city (see related story on

page A3) to get input on the growing problem of burglaries and automobile thefts, a problem raised by his opponents running on platforms of prioritizing public safety.

Just as people are hearing about more break-ins and thefts, Miyagishima also said he has been made more aware that the city has a significant portion of its population living in poverty and he wants the council's agenda in the coming year to focus on finding ways to help the poor and economic development.

One area Miyagishima said he believes the city can help is through easing the cost of electricity. If the city can provide electricity to the See **Election** on page A13

Giving thanks

November is the perfect month for Las Crucens to celebrate the things for which we are thankful

Last week our community celebrated Veterans Day with a wide-ranging variety of events and activities focused on those fellow citizens who have served in our armed forces. Next week we observe Thanksgiving Day, a traditional time for us to reflect on all the things for which we are thankful. For me, these two holidays are inexorably connected. Without the patriotic Americans who served our country over the past 235 years, we would not be celebrating the freedoms we now enjoy, and often take for granted.

I was fortunate to have spent my childhood in a community environment where families, schools, businesses, churches and civic organizations took the time to commemorate what it meant to live in a free country and to be an American. Our small community in north central Oklahoma, like many other towns and cities across America, had constructed a permanent monument to honor our veterans. The memorial was located on a prominent downtown corner just across from the local theater on one side and the post office on the other. Inscribed on the large commemorative plaque were the individual names of community members who had served in our nation's military forces. An asterisk by a name meant that the person had lost their life defending their country.

You could not drive through our town without observing this impressive monument. Our schoolteachers encouraged us to always respect our veterans, our flag and our country. In church, we prayed for world peace and for every person in the world to have the same freedoms enjoyed by all Americans. Additionally, we were invited to give of our time and resources to support other community members who were in need.

Today, it is a good feeling to live in a community like Las Cruces where traditional values remain high. Just like the veterans monument in my original hometown, our Las Cruces Veterans Memorial Wall and public park on Roadrunner Parkway is a tribute to all veterans from this area.

Las Cruces is a very "giving" community. We are blessed to have people and organizations who are dedicated to helping others. For example, the four women, now known as the "Pink Ladies" – Pat Sisbarro, Laura Conniff, Magellia Boston and Mary Henson, paint our town pink each October and lead the fundraising drive that has produced more than a half million dollars annually for breast cancer awareness. Complementing the Pink campaign in helping fund cancer awareness and research is the year-round effort by Denny and Geraldine Calhoun who serve as spokespersons for the innovative Cowboys for Cancer Research (C4CR) organization.

Local March of Dimes director Becky Horner has led the local charge to "Save the Babies" by funding research for premature births. Becky and her team have made the March of Dimes spring Walk-a-thon and the fall High Heels for High Hopes events two of the most productive fundraising efforts in our community. Karen Bailey of US Bank has been an advocate for the local Coats for Kids project for several years. The Salvation Army's annual Dress the Child fundraising dinner, now headed by Doug Boberg, helps dozens of local children throughout our region.

These are just a few examples of the broad efforts in Las Cruces to help others. And, of course, each of the people named above have scores of volunteers to help them with their missions.

In last week's Bulletin, readers found a simple 16-page magazine insert that may be the single most important section we produce each year. The 2011 Community Wish List includes lists, provided by local charitable organizations, of specific items and services that are required to help provide for those in need. On Oct. 28, Gov. Susana Martinez announced that learning centers across the state of New Mexico will be receiving the 4 percent of the reimbursement rate that was taken from them in November 2010 and taking 1,300 children off the waiting list where 6,800 are currently listed. This is a great start, but not a permanent fix.

I am the owner and director of His Kidz Learning Center in Deming. I have been in early education for 20 years and owned my center for 10 years, and this is the worst I've ever seen it.

The return of the 4 percent will allow me to meet my employee payroll on time and will allow me to give employees their 40 hours back without taking out a line of credit. It is not a permanent solution for the crisis within early childhood education. Since they were running paycheck to paycheck before the cut, many centers had to cut staff hours, directors had to go into the classrooms, owners had to work for free and when centers closed kids were left without a place to go.

In the year since providers were cut, 59 centers across New Mexico have shut their doors and left many children without a safe place and learning environment to go to. This is all on

Voter fraud not so scary Some problems found, but only in relatively small numbers

How much voter fraud do we have in New Mexico? Voter fraud stories are rampant. And fun to tell.

We hear of stuffed ballot boxes, boxes that disappear on their way to county clerks' offices, boxes that are found by county clerks just before tallies are finalized, fixed voting machines and dead men voting.

A favorite story told for years involves a statewide candidate in danger of losing an election, who calls a northern New Mexico county chairman and asks how many votes he has for him. And the chairman replies, "How many do you need?"

In Texas, the favorite stories are about Lyndon Johnson. He won his first election by only a handful of votes, leading to the nickname Landslide Lyndon.

Stories soon emerged that the night before the election, Johnson was seen in the local cemetery copying names off gravestones. It became known as the night of the living dead. The story was told that a young boy found wailing in the street the day after that election. He explained, "They told me my dead father came back to vote for Lyndon Johnson, but he didn't come by to see me."

I recently read that the same story was told almost a century earlier following President Rutherford B. Hayes' suspicious victory over Democrat Samuel Tilden.

Later, Hayes played a role in trying to straighten out New Mexico political corruption. Upon learning of Gov. Samuel Axtell siding with the Santa Fe Ring in land and economic disputes, Hayes replaced Axtell with respected Gen. Lew Wallace.

Unfortunately, Wallace was more interested in finishing his book, "Ben Hur," so the trouble continued in Lincoln, Colfax and other counties.

Political corruption and voter fraud have been present since free elections began. Both parties have been guilty. Usually the party in power has been guiltier. That is likely why the focus has been on the Democratic Party for the past many years in New Mexico.

Control of the secretary of state's office by Democrats during the past 80 years didn't help reduce suspicions.

Last November's victory by Dianna Duran, a respected state senator and former Otero County Clerk, finally presented the opportunity for a close look at past practices.

Duran reported her concern to the 2011 Legislature that many people are illegally registered to vote and that some actually vote. That was followed by her request to the state police to

A great time for young workers Hard workers don't have much competition from peers

I do not know his name, but he taught me a lesson at the same moment as I taught him the same lesson. We were at a fast-food-style restaurant. It was just a 61-year-old writer and talk show host and him behind the counter.

He said, "You sure were lucky to be young when it was still possible to become wealthy."

He said it like, "Nice weather. How about those Aggies. Whatcha want?" I was startled by the notion that I grew up in a better time. Truth is: I went to school because I was placed on a school bus with instructions to not hit anyone. For the record, I only hit back but the second kid is usually the one caught so I was typecast.

I was born in 1950 and he in 1990. They were different societies such that I got my first firearm at age 6 and still have it. By age 12 I could drive many of the trucks, tractors and cars out at the ranch and do so on our own private land. While growing up I was not thought to be college material and was set to skip college but my grandmother fought all of us to a standstill and so I went and found an academic life.

This young man seems industrious enough. He comes to work regularly and stays busy without the boss having to keep an eye on him. Other than that I know nothing about him other than he mistakenly thinks I am wealthy, I suppose because I tip well.

"Heck no," I said. "Today is the best time ever to be young and going into the job market."

I said this with a convincing nod of my head like everyone knows today is a better time to make your wealth than in the past. He was incredulous. "How so?"

That was when I stumbled into a great insight that I wish I could say I had planned in advance but our conversation



was all that was keeping me from my coffee and bagel so I just fired away.

"You see," I said, knowing he did not, "I grew up with a lot of other young people who were like me. They worked all the time and were in a hurry to make some money and move away from home. I had lots of competition for even the entry jobs. Not many of us were slackers so we each had to do well or we were quickly replaced."

Then I dropped the bomb on him.

"But most of your same-age contemporaries have not even had a job yet. Most are standing around waiting for a handout. They think that money flows to them for just being alive and having needs. Most are not out beating the bushes for a job. You are the exception in your generation.

"Employers are caught with a generation of workers who first want to know how much holiday time off they get and then will talk about coming to work. But you work hard every day and I know so because I see you do it. Your buddies are exercising their thumbs texting and complaining the government just is not giving them everything they desire.

"You are going into the workforce with significantly less competition and you have the work habits of a hard worker. Who is going to get rich, the ones waiting for a handout or you who knows how to work hard?"

That set him up for the rest of the time I was there. It was like he had won the lottery. Myself, I had worried about this generation of young people who do not seem to care to work hard for their money. But there are some young people, like this young man, who already have the work ethic and so will prosper. That is as long as we do not redistribute the wealth this young person creates to those who are sitting around just waiting for a handout.

This is a great time to become wealthy simply by working hard.

look into 64,000 registrations in which there were inaccuracies. She also told lawmakers in March that she had found 37

people who had obtained driver's licenses with foreign national credentials who had later registered to vote. She didn't know if any of those people had actually had voted.

This month we have gotten some updates. Two non-citizens have voluntarily reported to her office that they registered to vote. One said she had never voted.

The other said he has been voting regularly, thinking that would help him on his road to citizenship. He was surprised to learn he was breaking the law and seriously hurting his effort.

The following day, Duran announced her office has found 641 deceased people on the state voter list. She didn't know if any of them voted. County clerks regularly check death notices in the papers and delete those names from voter rolls.

Duran soon will be able to check voter rolls against lists of deaths from the Vital Records Office for an even better tally. She attributed the delay to lack of action by her predecessor and failure of the state's computer system to do the job it is supposed to do.

But even with those obstacles, it appears the secretary of state and county clerks are doing a bang-up job of maintaining New Mexico's voter rolls containing more than a million names.

And maybe we will find out that the unsuccessful efforts by the George W. Bush administration to dig up voter fraud mean there really isn't that much anymore.

It all is coming home

My father was too old for the Second World War, so I was not a child of the "Greatest Generation." Lucky me. Many of that generation were hard workers and great fighters, to whom great tribute is due – but many were lousy parents.

They over-compensated for their deprivations and hardships by indulging themselves when they returned from war. They left the crowded cities for the sprawling suburbs; weakened the family and social networks that guide and nurture adults and children; in an unprecedented buying spree, bought homes, appliances and cars; and increasingly, left home for two jobs to pay for them. TVs instead of tables became the centerpiece of family togetherness, with everyone watching the box, not conversing with each other.

Self-indulgence became generational. Thus arose the boomer generation, those born after 1945, many of whom grew up believing themselves entitled to whatever they want when they want it and feel victimized or become resentful if they do not get it. Self-centered and materialistic, they have lived on credit consumerism without saving and avoided sacrifice by opposing, then eliminating, the draft. With the economy in its worst condition since the 1930s, they sense that the bill is coming due, but, neither well raised by parents nor well educated by teachers, they have no clue.

Thus raised, thus self-replicating, as many boomers raised their children – I call them boomlets – even more self-centered and materialistic, and increasingly clueless.

Instead, they are well versed in "reality shows" – a fitting phrase for the confusion of the real and the illusory. They are equally steeped in the inanities of Twitter and Facebook, the perfect technologies to divert the idle or mindless into revealing the triviality or vacuity of their lives in trivial or vacuous messages, complete with pictures. Their idea of getting serious is distilling their political and social wisdom into semi-literate, 140-character, messages of even less value than 30-second sound bites.

Boomers and boomlets received, and want their children to receive, an education reflecting their lifestyle: teachers who cater, or pretend to cater, to individual learning styles and needs; courses which stress self-expression and relevancy; and social promotion, high test scores, and excuses to celebrate a graduation or a diploma. Long gone are rigorous curriculums of structured sequence of information and skills to be acquired and applied, as the basis for what matters in education: inquiry, critical thinking and problem solving.

The result is a dark hole of ignorance and ill manners which is sucking almost all politicians into it, in a race to the center of stupidity and boorishness. Educated, decorous candidates are, by definition, elitists, not ordinary Americans like them.

Boomers and boomlets have lived in denial of reality, but reality has not lived in denial of them.

Not surprisingly, they are surprised that the vacuum created by their vacuity powerful commercial interests have been happy to fill. The empty and hateful sloganeering on the Right and Left; the angry and indiscriminate flailing at big business or big government; the swinging-to and swinging-fro in responses to candidates, one dumber than another – such emotional and erratic behavior reflects those without mental or moral compasses.

The economy has collapsed, probably not soon to recover, because boomers and boomlets built it, not on the rock of self-improvement and productivity, but on the sands of indulgence and pleasure. The mental and moral slovenliness of it all is coming home, not just to haunt us, but also to hurt us.

Guest Column Impact fees add fairness and will save Las Cruces money Developers will avoid cost of building roads

According to a recent editorial in The Bulletin, there's a common misconception that the City of Las Cruces pays for new infrastructure. I don't agree.

I think most people, especially those living in the newer areas of the city, already know that the developers currently build the roads and drainage within the subdivisions. And, if their project is adjacent to an arterial road, they also put in half of that road. Many also know that this practice has resulted in building roads in

a piecemeal fashion that means parts of roads are missing for years. This approach has become totally unreasonable and unreliable.

This practice is also a maintenance nightmare, because different sections need repair at different times. In addition, a sections will never get done if the developer leaves. Then we have to use taxpayer money to finish the road. Remember Sonoma Ranch Boulevard? It's still not fully finished.

When the drainage doesn't get done, people are trapped without access to public safety services. Remember Del Rey? For years, all the people who live in subdivisions along Del Rey could not get in or out when it rained and the arroyo filled with water. There was no access if they needed emergency services. All those subdivisions got built without any arroyo crossing.

Fortunately, stimulus funding came along and the arroyo crossing finally got built. Of course, the taxpayers got the bill (again).

Another problem with the current system is that it's not fair. Some developments are adjacent to arterial roads and arroyos. Building that infrastructure adds cost and the developer adds that cost to the lots when they are sold, putting homeownership out of reach for some people. The location of other developments means those developments do not face the same requirements, so they don't have the added cost. Seems developers would want a fair system.

Under an impact fee system, every project that requires new infrastructure pays impact fees. So, under an impact fee system, the impact fees collected for all those subdivisions along Del Rey would have paid for that arroyo crossing a long time ago. Those who created the need for new infrastructure would have paid for that infrastructure.

Finally, roads in older neighborhoods have suffered because the city has had to use recurring road funding to build the missing pieces of roads in new areas of development.

Under an impact fee system, we can finally free ourselves from the current unreasonable and unreliable system. The developers will continue to build the roads and drainage infrastructure within the subdivisions and com-

mercial projects. They will not build the arterial roads (such as Sonoma Ranch and Del Rey). The city will build those kinds of roads. The city has an excellent credit rating and can borrow larger sums of money than a developer can. That means we can build the whole road at once and use the impact fee revenue from the new development to pay off the bond over time. No need to raise taxes.

This approach will be far more efficient and will open up more areas for development at the same

time, will provide safe access for both construction workers and new homeowners, will result in fewer maintenance problems and (given the economy of scale) will likely cost less.

As for all us who live in areas that already have infrastructure, we do not need to line up and go into the city and pay our past due impact fees. We have already paid for that infrastructure in our areas because that cost was included in the price we paid for our lots and homes. That cost just wasn't called impact fees because the money did not go to an impact fee fund. It went to the developers who put in the infrastructure and then added that cost to the lots.

So, an impact fee system also means that developers can charge less for their lots because they are no longer responsible for the major roads.

They won't have that extra expense. That should put home ownership within reach of more people.

Run for vice president caused damage to his reputation

Editor's note: This is part two of a two-part story.

Gen. Curtis LeMay's "men detested him because he drove them so hard," said Warren Kozak, author of "The Life and Wars of General Curtis LeMay," in an interview on the website frontpagemag.com. "It was only later, sometimes even after the war, that they realized that his demanding nature saved their lives."

In 1942, LeMay – who four years later would foresee a supersonic and space-bound Air Force – "organized and trained the 305th Bombardment Group," according to the Air Force's website. He developed new "formation procedures and bombing techniques," and as "commanding general of the 3rd Bombardment Division, (England), he led the famed Regensburg raid" into Germany. According to "A History of the United States Air Force 1907-1957," Regensburg "was a bold test of the effectiveness of the German fighter defense system."

"The men in the U.S. Army Air Forces were ... really not ready to go up against the best air force in the world at that time – the Luftwaffe," Kozak said "This was a calculated decision made in Washington to sacrifice these troops in order to whittle down the Germans. The U.S. leaders understood that they could replace their planes and crews faster than the Germans. It was a bloody war of attrition."

Standard flight defense strategy was "to zig-zag into the target to try to avoid the flak," Kozak said. But "LeMay ordered everyone to fly straight in with no deviation ... One pilot stood up at the pre-flight briefing and said they'd all be slaughtered. LeMay looked straight at him and, showing the most brilliant form of leadership, simply said: 'No, I think we can take it and to prove it, I'll fly the lead plane.'" Kozak pointed out "LeMay was the only general in World War II to fight in front of his troops. On every dangerous mission, he insisted on flying the lead plane in the formation."

Of the 146 bombers, the Germans downed just 24. "Apparently not expecting such a deep penetration, the Nazis shot their bolt too soon, for as the bombers approached Regensburg the fighter attacks slackened, enabling the bombardiers to take good aim. Their accurate releases damaged every important building in the Messerschmitt plant," said "A History of the United States Air Force 1907-1957." Afterward, expecting the formation to return to England, German "fighter packs waited for them" in ambush. Instead, LeMay led the bombers "over the Alps and proceeded unopposed to Africa."

"LeMay was perhaps the most brilliant military strategist this nation has ever produced, not my words but those of the late (Secretary of Defense) Robert S. McNamara," Kozak said. "LeMay believed that you should always negotiate from a position of strength and he made sure that the civilian leadership in our country always had the strongest possible military in its dealings with our adversaries."

LeMay next went to the Pacific from where, in March 1945, he launched "massive incendiary attacks on sixty four Japanese cities," including "the firebombing of Tokyo," said 506thfightergroup.org. Dubbed The LeMay Plan, he loaded 325 B-29s with thermite firebombs "and ordered the bombers out at (5,000-9,000) feet over Tokyo." Bombers never attacked below 20,000 feet, but according to "World War II in the Air: The Pacific," LeMay's "decision to switch the tactics ... to low-level night fire bomb raids on Japan constitutes one of the great military decisions of all time."

"In a three hour period they dropped 1,665 tons of incendiary bombs," said 506thfightergroup.org. LeMay, in his 1965 autobiography "Mission With LeMay," said "intelligence reported that ninety per cent of the structures in the world's largest city were made of wood. ... The Tokyo fire chief reported that the situation was out of control within thirty minutes."

The damage: "Thirty-two square miles of Japan's four principal cities demolished," said "World War II in the Air," "hundreds of vital war plants destroyed; hundreds of others put out of operation; (and) gas, electricity, heat, light, water, transportation disrupted." Different documents estimate between 100,000-350,000 civilians died.

"These were totalitarian regimes led by fanatics that were intent on dominating the world," Kozak said. "It was only because of people like LeMay and a lot of American teenagers that these monsters were defeated."

"They were military targets on which the attack was, in my opinion, justified morally," LeMay wrote. "I've tried to stay away from hospitals, prison camps, orphan asylums, nunneries and dog kennels. I have sought to slaughter as few civilians as possible."

LeMay's post-war achievements included organizing the Berlin Airlift, according to the Air Force's website, and building "from the remnants of World War II, an all jet bomber force": the Strategic Air Command.

"On bases scattered over more than half of the Northern Hemisphere," said "Strategic Air Command: A Portrait," "jet bomber and tanker crews live near their combat-ready aircraft parked at runway ends. A blast of a klaxon horn would send them racing to their aircraft, ready to go through another practice alert exercise or to take off on the war assignments they know so well. At hundreds of other sites within the continental U.S., SAC missile crews wait in their underground launch-control centers ready to launch their awesome birds if the fateful command ever comes."

As SAC commander (1948-1957), "his first war plan," said strategic-air-command.com, "proposed delivering 'the entire stockpile of atomic bombs in a single massive attack.' That meant dropping 133 A-bombs on 70 cities within 30 days. He argued that, 'if you are going to use military force, then you ought to use overwhelming military force. Use too much and deliberately use too much. You'll save lives, not only your own, but the enemy's too.'"

Such an attitude led critics and the press to dub him "Nuke 'Em LeMay" when, in 1968, he ran as vice-president with George Wallace on the American Independent Party ticket.

"LeMay completely destroyed his reputation by running," Kozak said. "Wallace was a racist, but here is the distinction: LeMay was not. He actually helped integrate the Air Force ahead of the Navy and Army in 1947 and in all of his papers and letters, there is not one derogatory comment towards any minority group. ... Of course, just by running with Wallace, LeMay was supporting those policies, which shows that for all his military brilliance, LeMay was a neophyte politically."

Student studies rare apes Orangutans losing feeding grounds

In what used to be one of the more remote areas of the world, humans have encroached with near devastating effects.

New Mexico State University student Zachary Brecheisen has seen this firsthand during two visits to the Southeast Asian island of Bor neo, where commercialized farming, illegal logging and intentionally set fires have claimed large swaths of rainforest, threatening one of the world's most diverse biosystems.

What took Brecheisen to Borneo was a desire to help one of those threatened life forms, the orangutans, which are losing their feeding grounds as the rainforest disappears. According to the World Wildlife Fund, it's projected that the rainforests in Borneo will be almost gone by 2020 unless serious action is taken.

'Orangutans are very specific animals. They only eat ripe fruits and the trees that produce this fruit and the fruits themselves are often just a long ways apart," Brecheisen said. "They need a lot of area in order to find enough fruit to feed themselves. So when people start chopping down and fragmenting all of these different areas, it makes it really hard for the orangutans to find enough food to support themselves or their offspring."

This past summer, Brecheisen, who is working on bachelor's degrees in conservation ecology, biology and anthropology, as well as a supplemental major in sustainable development, spent six weeks in Indonesian Borneo volunteering with the nonprofit Orangutan Foundation International.

A \$5,000 NMSU Honors College Scholarship for International Research funded this second visit to the island.

During his first trip, Brecheisen focused solely on efforts by OFI's volunteer program to save Borneo's dwindling orangutan population. On his most recent trip, the Los Lunas High School graduate still was working to help the orangutans, but he also was observing the wider effects deforestation are having on the global economy.

The main culprit in Borneo's deforestation is the palm oil industry. Palm oil is used globally in a vast array of products such as chocolate, ice cream, potato chips and detergent.

"My area of interest for the honors thesis is

looking at the impacts of globalization and the (palm oil) commodity market and how it is affecting this area," Brecheisen said. "They chop down all the rainforest so they can install these palm oil plantations.

"I was interested in seeing how the world's demand for what seems like a harmless ingredient is really devastating orangutan ecology.

As the WWF points out, the irony of palm oil is that while it is a clean biofuel, its manufacture is destroying critical ecosystems in Borneo and Sumatra.

Along with razing the habitats of the orangutans and native Borneans, employees on palm oil plantations often kill orangutans that wander onto the plantations in search of food. Some adult orangutans are killed for bush meat, but baby orangutans are often captured and sold on the black market. In the process of capturing the babies, their mothers are killed.

"As the orangutans run out of normal forest to live in, they're more and more often forced onto these plantations or into other areas that are frequented by humans," Brecheisen said. "We are forcing ourselves into their areas."

OFI, which is buying as much rainforest in Borneo as it can, finds and saves these kidnapped orangutans and re-introduces them into the wild. That's where Brecheisen's work comes in. In order to monitor the animals being re-habituated into the wild, OFI volunteers and workers must traverse peat bogs and other areas that are easily swamped by rain. To make the monitoring easier above ground, wooden walkways are constructed.

"What these bridges are built out of is ironwood. It's extremely dense and really heavy. So you have to carry the wood from one place to another and then chop and hammer on it and then move those pieces around through swampy jungle and stuff," Brecheisen said. "Just working with and moving some of the stuff on dry ground is difficult because it's extremely heavy.

"It was very demanding work, but it also was very rewarding. You get to see the benefit of seeing the use of your work right away when the OFI caretakers take the orphans out each day to rehabilitate them using the walkways." Besides battling the jungle, bugs, 80 percent

humidity and cultural differences, Brecheisen also dealt with homesickness. The NMSU senior describes his Borneo experience as "very intense." He planned his stay in Borneo so he would arrive with one group of volunteers and leave with a second group.

"As the first group was leaving, there was a part of me that was wondering, 'Why did I want to stay so long?' But after we got back into (work) again, it was a lot of fun," he said. There are a million bugs that bite and sting you and it's hot and humid, but it was really great. Staying that long would definitely not be for everyone."

Then, Brecheisen isn't just anvone. The energetic, articulate young man won over the scholarship selection committee at the Honors College with his ambition and enthusiasm.

Zachary is devoted to preserving endangered species and has dedicated his talents and education to this crucial work. To prepare himself for a career in the challenging field of envi-ronmental conservation, he has undertaken a rare quadruple major – with additional minors in creative writing and renewable energy technology," said Tracey Miller-Tomlinson, former Honors College director of the national scholarships and international education.

students attracted to the idea of going to a new building with new programs.

"It's important to move forward," Flores said. "We can't predict the future.

"We need to allow things to work out the best way they can for everyone."

Rounds said the board would get weekly updates and regular reports at school board meetings. Rounds - in coordination with Associate Superintendent for Learning, Teaching and Research Steven Sanchez - will sign off on all transfers involving the new high school.

"I personally will take the responsibility to make sure we meet the individual needs of a student," Rounds said. "That's why it is at my desk.'

School board member Chuck Davis said he thought the committee did good work, and believes that the proposed process can work.

Rounds said the goal of the transition period will be to see no student is underserved. The first focus, he said, will be on those students who don't want to go to Centennial, and then the "back-draft" focus will be on those who want to transfer from out of district.

Students who attend the new high school from out of the attendance district will have to provide their own transportation as the district cannot afford the extra busing cost, Rounds said.

It's not busing that concerns parent Frank Sage of the Elks Drive neighborhood. Sage said he is concerned about students who drive to school having to cross town through the busy U.S. Highway 70 and Interstate 25.

Also, parents of younger students who aren't of driving age but are involved in "zero hour" extracurricular activities have to drive them to school, which Sage said is putting a hardship on parents.

That students living in the Las Alturas area will be attending Las Cruces High School

mystifies Sage. He criticized the school site northeast of the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum off Dripping Spring Road as making the task of balancing school populations more difficult. He also was critical of the public input process, saying parents didn't get to see the hard statistical data the district's consulting company had to work with.

After listening to comments by Sage and advisory committee member Earl Nissen, the board approved the new boundaries as they were given to the board last month.

said, and the town leaders aren't asking for all the money.

Barraza said the town government has cut its expenses in every possible way, but continues to struggle as the economy remains slow. Mesilla's operating funds come almost exclusively from gross receipts taxes (GRT), which are down because of a lack of tourists. Bar-

raza said the town's share of GRT is already as high as allowed.

Gray said his department's budget is \$370,000. He does get some grant money and buys high-mileage replacement vehicles through special law enforcement programs.

Fire Chief Kevin Hoban has tried to get grants for the building repairs, but those funds also are in great demand, Barraza said.

"There's not enough money to put some aside for maintenance," she said.

The town's public works department only has one lawn mower, she said, without money to buy a replacement if it breaks down.

The town's roads are need of repair, she said, but there are also no funds available for road work.

"This is embarrassing what our employ-ees have to work with," Barraza said. "We have to do something.'

other with metal, and now the building is pulling apart, said Town Marshal Jeff Gray. Also, the wiring, heat-

ing and air condition-ing systems are either very old or added on to the original systems, he said, which is creating a variety of issues. For example, a new stove for use of the firefighters has sat idle for two years be-cause of codes violations with the wiring and ventilation, he said.

In fact, the building has more than 20 code violations and is in danger of being shut down. Fixing up the building is more affordable than razing it and building a new home for the fire and police crews, equipment and vehicles.

If the building is closed because of code violations, it will cost homeowners more money in homeowner insurance, Barraza said.

"We are not proposing to raise taxes, but renovate what we already have," she said.

After the meeting, Barraza clarified her statement, saying the base property tax rate of 69 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value one of the lowest in the state – would remain unchanged, but that tax payments would be more than that to an amount needed to help pay off the bond, she said.

Should the town's residents and leaders not see another urgent community needed when the bond expires, then the amount Friday, November 18, 2011

Mabus has awarded the Legion of Merit with combat "V" to retired Navy SEAL Chief Petty Officer Gerhard Klann, for the instrumental role he played in a 1980 mission to penetrate

Iran and collect information concerning the location of 52 American hostages originally seized on Nov. 4, 1979.

Klann, assigned to SEAL Team Two's counter-terrorism platoon, volunteered and was the only person selected to conduct this intelligence mission deep in denied territory. Undertaking a journey that subjected him to the intense scrutiny of a number of hostile foreign intelligence services, Klann operated under a cover for 10 days in August 1980 and was able to provide instrumental information which aided decision-makers and saved American lives.

"By his courageous actions, keen judgment and loyal dedication to duty, Klann reflected great credit upon himself and upheld the highest traditions of the United States Naval service," according to the award announcement.

Upon his return he was chosen to become "Plank Owner" of SEAL Team Six which was formed as a direct outcome of his successful return. That SEAL team performed the successful raid this past May into Pakistan that took the life of al-Qaida leader Osama bin Laden.

grid through solar generation, then residents should get a break in the "fuel charge" portion of their electric bill.

Miyagishima said he also wants to see ways the city can provide support for nonprofits because they are vital in providing resources to people the city is unable to provide.

City government needs to be frugal and conscious of anything it may do to add costs to the citizenry, the mayor said. For example, while the city may have untapped capacity that could fund projects through a general obligation bond, Miyagishima said the resulting increase in property taxes would life harder for lower-income homeowners and less attractive to those looking at Las Cruces as a place to live.

"Yes, we may have some roads that are not the best, but they're OK and we can live with them for now," he said.

Likewise, city services that could stand some improvement will depend on how much they are needed, Miyagishima said. The city should resist adding onto its gross receipts taxes – the primary funding for city operations – because Las Cruces retail businesses benefit by attracting shoppers from El Paso who want to pay less of sales tax on what they buy.

Greg Smith, the new city councillor for District 2, said his constituents have concerns about the quality of infrastructure, but he acknowledged the challenge will be finding the money for making improvements.

Smith is the new face on the council because District 2 was without an incumbent candidate as Dolores Connor made her unsuccessful bid to unseat Miyagishima.

Smith, Miyagishima, District 4 Councillor Nathan Small and District 1 Councillor Miguel Silva will be sworn in by Presiding Municipal Judge Melissa Miller-Byrnes after she takes her oath of office at the City Council meeting Monday, Nov. 21, in council chambers at City Hall, 700 N. Main St.

The meeting starts at 1 p.m. with the present council, which includes Connor finishing old business agenda items – that are only consent approvals – before the oaths of office are given and the new council starts work on new agenda items, which includes looking at plans for maintenance to the city's 7-mile-long floodwater dam east of North Telshor Boulevard built by the Army Corps of Engineers in the 1970s.

There's a lot of different ways people might describe a Las Cruces dust storm. 'Divine intervention" is usually not the first phrase that comes to mind.

Quarterback Matt Christian said it really wasn't what the Aggies needed at the moment. NMSU was trailing Fresno State 45-41 in a pass-crazy shootout.

However, with just under two minutes left to play, a sudden gust of wind held up and then pushed back a higharcing pass that Christian had lobbed to wide receiver Taveon Rogers.

In a moment that will live on for many Aggie fans, Rogers ran back and hauled in the pass almost as if in slow motion.

Rogers then took a wide left turn around a disoriented Fresno State defensive back and ran in for the gamewinning 37-yard touchdown. Aggies 48, Fresno State 45.

It was NMSU's first-ever victory over the Bulldogs in the 18-game history of the series.

After the game, Rogers said he wasn't exactly sure what had happened, but that sudden gust of wind that suspended the ball in mid-air did seem like divine intervention.

Christian said it seemed like the ball was held up not just for a minute, but "more like five minutes."

It was a wild finish to a great game. The win was a complete team effort, Rogers said.

The Aggie defense stopped Fresno State cold on their last two drives. After the go-ahead touchdown, the fired-up Aggie defense broke up four pass attempts by Bulldog quarterback Derek Carr. David Nuimatalolo and Bryan Bonilla knocked down the first two passes, a cluster of Aggies broke up the third, and then 5-9 cornerback Courtney Viney knocked down the fourth down pass. It was all over.

"Football is like life," Viney said. "There's an ebb and flow to things. We had our ups and downs tonight. But what matters is we showed up when it counted.'

For coach DeWayne Walker, the Ag-gies' determination "showed people you can win in New Mexico."

It was a win that earned respect for the program, he said. It was a win for the university, the community and the state.

"This is how we want to play Aggie football," he said. "And we want to win."

Divine intervention? Perhaps. A gutsy performance by a football team worth watching? Definitely.

MVCS faces Fort Sumner for championship

A little over three years ago, Charles Gleghorn was waiting on his team's first football helmets to be delivered. He was teaching his new players how to put on pads and how to lift weights. He was teaching them the game of football.

The Mesilla Valley Christian Schools football team's rise over the three years of its existence is amazing to most people. To Gleghorn, it's right on schedule.

The coach, who had led Hatch Valley to three state titles on the Class 2A level, was confident he could take the SonBlazers to similar heights.

MVCS will play host to top-ranked Fort Sumner in the 1A championship game at 1 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 19, at Gadsden High School's field in Anthony. The SonBlazers defeated Mc-Curdy last week in their semifinal game.

"It's working out," Gleghorn said with a chuckle. "We're glad we made it, but we're also glad Fort Sumner is there, too, because when you have the opportunity to play for a championship, you want to play the best team available. And they certainly are."

While Gleghorn was ordering equipment at MVCS, Fort Šumner was stockpiling championship trophies.

The Foxes, who have won seven of the past nine 1A state championships, are led by a trio of seniors - quarterback Kolter West, running back Skyler McMath, and tight end/defensive back Brody Stallard.

'They like to run the ball," Gleghorn said. "They have a quarterback and a running back who do a good job. They're seniors and were part of last year's championship team."

Gleghorn said Fort Sumner, who defeated Jal in the other semifinal game last week, runs the ball effectively out of a single-wing See **SonBlazers** on page A21

Golf legend takes honors in stride Herb Wimberly earns accolades for career at NMSU

As friends and colleagues tell it, there are two things Herb Wimberly, the former long-time coach of the New Mexico State University golf team, will never do: criticize your golf swing or pat himself on the back.

"He's a class act. You hear that term 'class act' all the time, but Herb is class without an act," said Van Bullock, a professor of economics and international business at NMSU who played on a Wimberly-coached golf team in 1967. "The Herb you see in public is the same Herb you see in private. He's a genuinely sincere and classy guy. There is no pretense associated with Herb at all."

Wimberly lacks that pretense despite having two scholarships, a street and a golf tournament named in his honor. Over



the years, Wimberly has accumulated numerous other accolades, with the latest being the Traders Award, which was given to him on Sept. 23 during the NMSU College of Business Hall of Fame ceremony. Introduced in 2006, the Traders Award recognizes individuals who have given exceptional service to the College of Business.

True to his friends' words, Wimberly is self-deprecating about this latest honor.

"When (College of Business Dean Garrey Carruthers) called and said this is what we would like to do, I said, 'Garrey, maybe you called the wrong person," Wimberly said. "He laughed and said, 'Nope, I've got the right person and this is what we want to do.' So it's happened and it's quite an honor. What I've done is just something I would have done anyway whether there was an award there or not."

And Wimberly has done much for NMSU and the community. Born and raised in Baton Rouge, La., Wimberly's family moved to Albuquerque during his senior year in high school. He stayed behind to finish up school before re-joining his family and enrolling at the University of New Mexico. After graduation, he left Albuquerque for a few years before returning to UNM to assist his former golf coach. Then, in 1962, NMSU recruited him to head up the college's golf team, where he stayed for 31 years. During his tenure, Wimberly was named Coach of the Year six times by the Missouri Valley Conference and once by the Big West Conference.

His teams' accomplishments have become the stuff of college golf legend. They won six Missouri Valley Conference championships and one Big West. Wimberly also coached two All-American Golf Teams that played in the first International Collegiate Golf Matches in Chiba City, Japan. Eighteen of his players earned All-American honors, with two, Larry Beem in 1964 and Ben Kern in 1968, named as first team All-Americans. Many of Wimberly's golfers have gone on to play on the PGA Tour, including Beem's son, Rich, who beat Tiger Woods to win the PGA Championship in 2002.

It's his former players' successes on and off the course that make Wimberly most proud.

"What's so gratifying to me is to see what they have done past their careers at New Mexico State," he said. "They are just highly successful community leaders in many different professions. We've had great golf teams and many successes with golf, but to see what all these people have done past that is really gratifying."

Bullock says he and many of Wimberly's former players attribute their post-golf accomplishments to Wimberly's teaching, mentoring and optimistic personality.

"He is one of the best people I have ever met. Throughout my life in dealing with people I often sit back and think, What would coach have done here, what would coach have said," Bullock stated. "If you look at what former players have done, almost all of these young people have gone on to be successful. They've given back to the university. And it all starts with the experience they had here as athletes under Herb."

Besides the wins from the golf team, Wimberly and his brother, Guy, also presented an opportunity to NMSU that would reap the college many future rewards. In 1988, the two brothers brought the PGA Golf Management program to the College of Business. The program started with 26 students. Today it has 188.

However, NMSU almost didn't get the program. Wimberly said he and his brother, who was a national PGA director at the time, initially approached their alma mater, UNM, out of a sense of loyalty. The university turned them down flat. According to Wimberly, Guy told UNM he would then take the program to "the better school down south."

Soon after, Wimberly approached then-NMSU College of Business Dean Curtis Graham, gave him information on the program and asked for feedback in a few weeks.

"The next morning, I was loading the team in a van at the golf course to leave on a golf trip and this fellow came out and said you have a phone call you need to take," Wimberly said. "It was Curtis and he said, 'I didn't hardly sleep all night. I was looking through all this material. How soon can we get this thing going?" "I think (UNM) regrets their decision to this day," Wimberly

"I think (UNM) regrets their decision to this day," Wimberly added. "They really lost out on a gem of a program."

"Herb may be one of the most encouraging people I've ever known," Bullock said. "He's the exact opposite of most successful people. Gore Vidal said, 'It's not enough to succeed. Others must fail.' I've never seen an individual in my life who took more pleasure out of other people's success than Herb. He relishes in your success."

Now 77, Wimberly is able to spend more time with his wife, Carleene, and visit the couple's nine children, 20 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. In between visits, Wimberly is still teaching and playing golf.

coach Michael Bradley said the two teams that met then are not the same teams that will meet Friday night in the quarterfinals. "We were a young team," Bradley said. "It was only the fourth

game of the season and we had not solidified our linebacker spots and we were still looking at defensive ends and defensive backs. And Eldorado had lost everybody the year before. We were two young teams. We are two different teams now. We've both grown up a lot."

The Eagles, who beat Highland in the quarterfinals last week, 35-21, are led by 6-5, 215-pound junior quarterback Sam Gentry.

to open home season Nov. 19 The Aggies enter their first home game with a 2-0 record after a surprising 62-53 win over University of New Mexico Lobos in the Pit, Wednesday, Nov. 16. The victory was the first for the Aggies in Albuquerque since 2002. The Aggies also defeated Northern Colorado, 89-75, in Greeley, Colo., on Nov. 12.

The New Mexico State University men's basketball team will face I-10 rival UTEP in the home opener at 6 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 19.

Coach Tim Floyd's Miners are in a rebuilding year. A media poll picked UTEP to finish 11th out of the 12 teams in Conference USA.

Nevertheless, NMSU coach Marvin Menzies said the Miners are a dangerous team.

"A lot of people have written them off, but we have to make sure we don't make that mistake," he said. "Tim Floyd has done a phenomenal job in his career ... This is a rivalry game and it's going to be exciting. We've upset them before. There are a lot of games in a season. Anything can happen.'

The Miners beat UC Riverside 52-41 in El Paso Nov. 13. Junior guard Jacques Streeter has a team-high 11.5 points per game.

The Aggies faced Streeter when he played at Cal State Fullerton. Despite falling to the Miners twice last season, the Aggies have a 102-98 advantage in the all-time series. UTEP won 73-56, Nov. 23 in El Paso, and 74-72, Nov. 30 in Las Cruces.

Unveiling of new floor set Saturday

Maple floor continues parquet tradition

Prepare to be floored.

The new basketball floor at New Mexico State University's Pan Am Center will be unveiled in a special ceremony at 4:30 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 19 before the NMSU-UTEP men's basketball game.

And, yes, it will be a parquet floor.

However, the flow of the graphics and the overall design will be new, according to Scott Breckner, NMSU's director of special events and facilities management.

Players from past Aggie teams and legendary NMSU coach Lou Henson will be part of the 15-minute ceremony.

The new floor was made possible by \$200,000 of state money allocated during the administration of Gov. Bill Richardson, who made a personal visit to the Pan Am Center to see about the floor.

The new maple hardwood floor was made in Dollar Bay, Mich. Its zipline design will significantly reduce the amount of time it takes to take the floor apart and put it back together, Breckner said.

'We'll also be able to use a floor covering and have certain kinds of functions on top of it," he said. However, one of the most important

features of the new floor is that it will allow for side-by-side volleyball games, opening up the possibility of spring volleyball tournaments. In addition, it's a benefit for coach

Mike Jordan's volleyball team. "Multiple courts on the floor gives the whole team more time to practice." Ior-

dan said. "We carry a large squad size and with only one court. Not everyone can get the reps they need." The old floor, which saw 18 years of

use, said Breckner, will be put in storage. However, it's very likely that the floor will be broken down into pieces that will be sold as commemorative gifts, he said.

According to coach Marvin Menzies, the new floor should not have an impact on the outcome of the NMSU-UTEP rivalry game.

'I don't think it will really be a factor," he said.

Aggie look for upset in Provo BYU 'solid and physical'

Temperatures may drop into the 20s for the 8:15 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 19 football game between New Mexico State University and Brigham Young in Provo, Utah.

Will that be a concern for the Aggies, who enjoy 350 sunny days a year?

"This is football, we don't roll out the tarps," said NMSU senior quarterback Matt Christian. "The first couple of hits are going to sting, but we'll get used to it ... I heard there were going to be snow flurries. I think it's going to be exciting."

Christian – who has sustained injuries to his shoulder and hip this season and had a fuzzy head moment against Georgia – apparently isn't worried about chilly weather.

Brigham Young, an independent team, is 7-3 after thrashing Idaho 42-7 Nov. 12. The Cougars have won six of their last seven games by combining great defense - they've held opponents to an average of 21.7 points and 325 total offensive yards per game – with a balanced offensive attack.

NMSU coach DeWayne Walker said BYU was a solid and physical team.

"We have to play the best game we have ever played, and hopefully they won't play their best game of the year," he said.

BYU starting quarterback Riley Nelson sustained a serious lung injury and two broken ribs in the Nov. 12 Idaho game. A running quarterback, Nelson is largely responsible for the Cougars' phenomenal 51.5 percent conversion rate on 3rd downs.

His backup, sophomore Jake Heaps, is a "good thrower," said Walker, and is dangerous in his own right. He hit 15 of 20 pass attempts for 185 yards and two touchdowns in the win over Idaho.

Despite the loss of Nelson, BYU has a strong running game. Walker said the Cougars have three good running backs – Michael Alisa, JJ Di Luigi, and Bryan Kariya - who helped BYU roll up 191 yards on the ground Nov. 12.

"Our defense has to stop them first," Walker said.

Cornerback Courtney Viney, who made a key play to help the Aggies defeat Fresno State 48-45 Nov. 12, said the defense must "go out and execute.

BYU coach Bronco Mendenhall, in his weekly press conference, said the Aggies "are very explosive offensively, with speed and athleticism at running back, receiver and a mobile quarterback."

Walker was an assistant coach for LaVell Edwards at BYU in 1994 and said he had great respect for Mendenhall, who has a 63-24 record in seven seasons at Provo.

The two teams have never met on the football field before. However, they had a common opponent in Idaho. The Aggies outlasted the Vandals 31-24 Oct. 15.

NMSU is coming off a tremendous win in which Christian passed for 360 yards and two touchdowns, completing 25-for-43 attempts. Kenny Turner rushed for 112 yards, his fifth 100-plus yard game, and now has 799 yards on the season. He ran for three touchdowns and caught a pass for a fourth. At his current pace, he will top 1,000 rushing yards for the season.

Taveon Rogers continued his phenomenal play this season with a 99-yard kickoff return TD and 10 receptions for 166 yards. He is No. 1 in the nation for allpurpose yards.

The Aggies are now tied for fifth place in the WAC. After Brigham Young, they face Louisiana Tech (6-4, 4-1 WAC) and Utah State (4-5, 2-2 WAC).

The Brigham Young game will be televised on ESPNU. Fans can also follow the game at watchespn. com

Happy valley isn't so happy anymore

The down side of sports idolatry

This column is not about golf. It's about what has happened at Penn State.

Since I was 16, playing football in Ohio, I loved Penn State. State College, Pa., was far enough away from home that I liked the distance. I intended to go there as my second choice. But, finally I chose Notre Dame (or rather it chose me) – one of the three best decisions of my whole life.

Being a pretty avid football fan, I'm troubled by the pedophile sex scandal at Penn State, as I'm sure any true college football fan is. On Wednesday, Nov. 9, John Surma, vice president of the Penn State Board of Trustees announced that PSU football coach, Joe Paterno, was fired. PSU President Graham Spanier was also ousted simultaneously. Athletic Director Tim Curley, who was slated to receive an award later this season for top AD, was indicted for perjury, and resigned under duress and Vice President Gary Schultz has taken a second retirement.

Paterno, affectionately known as "Joe-Pa," has been the face of Penn State football since he became the head coach in 1966. He has won more games (409) in Division I than any other coach living or dead. And he was still coaching, and still winning, until a week ago. He's 84 years old. He should be called "The Ole' Ball Coach" instead of Steve Spurrier.

It's hard to escape the headlines, but if you don't follow sports or football, the turmoil has centered on one Jerry Sandusky, a longtime assistant coach under Paterno, who was indicted by a grand jury for allegedly having sexually abused eight young children since he retired in 1999.

A ninth alleged victim has since come forward.

In 2002, according to his recent grand jury testimony, assistant coach Mike McQueary told Paterno that he had seen Sandusky sodomizing a boy about 10 in the shower in the PSU football complex. Nine years later – Monday, Nov. 7 – Sandusky was led from his home in handcuffs and taken to jail.

For the past two weeks, we have heard "alleged abuse," which allegedly was perpetrated by the alleged perp coach Sandusky. I thought we live in a country ruled by a judicial system whereby you were innocent until proven guilty. Apparently Pennsylvania has other rules.

Everyone, including Tom Corbett, governor of the Keystone State, has presented the appearance of operating on the presumption of guilt, including with the firing of Joe-Pa.

"Certainly every Pennsylvanian who has any knowledge of this case, who has read the grand jury report, feels a sense of regret and sorrow to also see careers end," Corbett said to the Associated Press Friday, Nov. 11.

It strikes me that Corbett caused careers to end, including Joe-Pa, because of a statewide corrupt reporting, institutional and child-

protective system.

Back to my previous statement about innocence, I'm not doubting that the facts, once they become public, will convict the alleged criminal acts of Sandusky, but what I'm saying is that Penn State (and everyone else) can't have it both ways. Either the man will be found guilty of abusing children or not. (Hung juries, inadmissible evidence, jury tampering and more alleged wrongdoing all are possible.)

How can a fellow serving on a university board decide? In fact, since they did not take proper action almost 10 years ago as they should have, why shouldn't the entire board of trustees be replaced for gross negligence?

If called before a grand jury they would plead, "I didn't know about the abuse." Bunk. A (private) source close to PSU

football told me, "Everyone who counts knew about this thing."

Other big-time college football programs have been raked over the coals in the past year. Ohio State fired its head coach Jim Tressell last May over a scandal involving players, including standout Terrell Pryor, for frequenting a drug-infested tattoo parlor and selling teamrelated merchandise. The University of Miami football and basketball programs came under fire for accepting mucho thousands of dollars in payoffs from convicted Ponzi-schemer Nevin Shapiro.

Was Donna Shalala fired? Alexander Wolff, the writer at Sports Illustrated, issued a public letter in that magazine to the university that they should post-haste drop football. That was the second letter by him, following a similar public letter he wrote in 1995, on the heels of the Hurricanes' Pell Grant scandal, and in the wake of the "Catholics versus Convicts" showdown in which Notre Dame defeated Miami in South Bend.

And then there's the deranged Alabama "fan" who fatally poisoned the 100-year-old tree that stood sentinel at the entrance to Auburn's campus. Not burned at the stake?

On the Internet, nbcsports.msnbc.com has taken to calling the scandal "the Sandusky thing." On Nov. 14, the website posted a story written by Ethan Skolnick which covered an account by Matt Pankis, who said the "Sandusky thing" hit home with him as he scrolled the web on the story, because he was both a grad-assistant under Paterno (and Sandusky) and a child-abuse victim.

"I was up until two in the morning, getting more enraged," Pankis, now 49, told Skolnick. Pankis has a web blog he titles "Absolute

Power Corrupts Absolutely."

What perked me up when I read about Pankis reportedly said to www.nbcsports.com: "I'm just tired of all these little fieldoms popping up everywhere, and people hiding in the back office, surrounded by all their henchmen, and doing the wrong things. It's got to stop. Someone has to step up."

It's interesting that Pankis recalled some of the conversations with Sandusky in which the latter said "I hated Joe." I guess Joe-Pa never realized that; otherwise he would have had him arrested back in 2002. That wouldn't be the style of the governor of Pennsylvania.

The allegations of abuse date back to 1994, according to the grand jury report. It was reported to authorities way back in 1996 that coach Sandusky inappropriately touched a child. In 1998, another child's mother reported that his hair was wet when he returned home, and he told her Sandusky was in the shower with him.

Then in 1999, Sandusky retired from the Penn State coaching staff, after 20 years under coach Paterno, and now draws nearly \$59,000 in retirement pay. He was granted full access to PSU football facilities. In 2000, it was reported that Sandusky had engaged in improper physical acts with a youth, but that still didn't cause a fire storm in State College. Apparently none of the alleged contact with kids was ever reported to police.

As of the filing of this account Jerry Sandusky has been indicted on no less than 40 counts of child abuse, and maintains his denial of all "wrongdoing." "I shouldn't have showered with those

"I shouldn't have showered with those kids," was all Sandusky could say.

On Nov. 12, Jerry Sandusky was set free on an unsecured bail of \$100,000. Sounds like a lot, but it means he doesn't have to pay virtually anything, and that he agrees to sacrifice that amount if he skips bail. The judge who granted bail to Sandusky was a volunteer for his charity for "troubled" children the Second Mile. That is the same self-founded charity

through which Sandusky allegedly made contact with all of his victims. The Second Mile board is allegedly conducting an internal investigation. Stay tuned fans, this could get pretty ugly before it's over.

Right now, if I were a college president, who wants to keep his or her job and reputation, I would comb every nook and cranny of the campus, and interview anyone who has anything to do with sports at my school, for any shred of evidence or rumor or hearsay related to abuse of any form, and pull all parties under a spotlight so bright that they talk no matter what.

Why? There is a false idol called sports. Ask yourself, "Do physics departments lead to public adoration?"

Sports lift colleges up – so it is believed. But when over-served, they more bring colleges down.

The men's team finished 12th overall out of 17 teams in the 8K. The Aggies had two athletes finish in the top 50. Sophomore Kevin Palmer finished first for NM State and 36th overall with a time of 31:34.5. Junior Jonah Ruvbalid finished second for NM State 45th overall with a time of 31:51.3. Jonah's brother Ian finished close behind with a time of 32:19.5, which placed him third for NM State and 58th overall. Congratulations to coach Meghan Harkins for her hard work and direction that paid off at championship time.

Aggie recruiting ranked in top 20 Trakh fills need at guard

Coach Mark Trakh's first round of recruits for next season's New Mexico State University's women's basketball team has been ranked among the top 20 mid-major recruiting classes in the nation by ESPN's Hoopgurlz website.

Trakh and his staff signed Abby Scott, a 6-1 guard from Ma-dras High School in Madras, Ore.; Sasha Weber, a 6-0 guard from Timberline High School in Lacey, Wash.; and Shay Young, a 6-0 guard from Mount Miguel High School in San Diego on Nov. 9.

These kids had solid West Coast Conference, Big West, Mountain West Conference, even Pac 10 potential," Trakh said. "Looking at the teams they turned down, it's very impressive they chose us

Trakh said Sasha Weber in particular could have signed with a Pac 10 team. Weber chose NMSU over Oregon State, Brigham Young, UNLV and Fresno State.

In their visits to NMSU, Trakh said the new recruits were impressed by the Pan Am Center and other facilities, enjoyed the school spirit shown at the UTEP football game, and liked their potential new teammates and the university's quality academic programs.

The new recruits will fill an immediate need at guard, Trakh said.

Scott, Weber and Young are the only recruits to sign on with NMSU during the 2012-13 early-signing period. The Aggies have two additional scholarships to fill in the spring to complete the 2012 class at five

Trakh is in his first and rebuilding year at NMSU, after two successful runs as coach at the University of Southern California and Pepperdine University. He has taken five teams to the NCAA tournament.

Trakh said he enjoys the rebuilding phase of developing a program.

"There is a psychological advantage," he said. "There's no pressure on me or on the kids. We just go out and play."

At this point, he said, the goal is just to show improvement. Especially during the non-conference schedule, he said, he is not concerned about wins, but rather on working on specific goals. For a start, he said, the Aggies need to handle pressure better and not create so many turnovers. In addition, they need to hold their motion offense together rather than falling back into the habit on going one-on-one. Another shooter has to step up to help top scorer Tabytha Wampler, he said.

"I tell the kids, 'Let's keep improving' ... if you concentrate on the process every day, eventually you'll see results," he said.

Trakh said he attended a social event with Aggie fans after the team's home opener Nov. 14, a 59-42 loss to Idaho State. He said he was very pleased by the warmth and support of what he called "a small but hardcore group of fans." However, he said, he knows that only a winning program will consistently draw big crowds. He said NMSU has the potential to build the kind of team that can bring 3,000 to 4,000 fans per game to the Pan Am Center.

"We've got to take care of business," he said. "If you don't win, they're not going to come out."

The Aggies won their season opener on the road against Houston 63-62 Nov. 11 before dropping the home opener against Idaho State $Nov. 14. Wampler led the Aggies in the Idaho\,State\,game\,with\,her\,11 th$ career double-double, scoring 16 points and grabbing 16 rebounds. On Wednesday, Nov. 16, the Aggies lost 76-72 to UTEP in overtime. Trakh called UTEP a "borderline top 25" team. "They bring the pressure," he said.

AG wins Medicaid fraud conviction

Las Cruces provider bilked system through overbilling

Prosecutors from Attorney General Gary King's office were successful in obtaining guilty verdicts against a Las Cruces Medicaid provider and four individuals on Medicaid Fraud and other charges.

Counseling and Mediation LLC and Arcilia Holguin, the owner of Counseling and Mediation, were indicted in April 2010 on various counts of Medicaid fraud, fraud and other related charges.

Testimony at trial showed that Holguin and her employees were failing to provide the services they had contracted with Medicaid to provide, altering documentation to make it look like they were providing an appropriate service and billing outrageous amounts of time for providing certain services, according to a press release from the AG's office.

Holguin and Counseling and Mediation Services LLC were tried by a jury the first week of November, and were each found guilty on all the counts. Holguin was found guilty of Medicaid fraud-falsification of documents (a fourth degree felony), fraud over \$20,000 (a second degree felony offense), Medicaid fraudexcessive claims (a fourth degree felony offense), Medicaid fraudsubstantially inadequate treatment over \$20,000 (a second degree felony offense), and fraud (over \$20,000). Counseling and Mediation LLC was found guilty on similar charges.

AG prosecutors were able to show that Holguin and Counseling and Mediation LLC overbilled Medicaid of more than \$218,000. The corporation is also potentially subject to \$500,000 worth of fines for the felony convictions, based on the Medicaid Fraud Statute Section 30-44-7 (G). Holguin has 36 years exposure to jail time and the AG's office will recommend restitution, although sentencing has not yet been scheduled.

"It is not often that a corporation is found guilty in Medicaid fraud cases so this is a great win for the people of New Mexico and hopefully serves as a warning for other providers," King said.

NMSU students missing from games

Task force seeks answers to lackluster sports attendance

Free T-shirts, more traditions, a winning team – what exactly will it take to get more New Mexico State University students to attend the school's sporting events?

That's one of the questions the Aggie Spirit Game Day Experience Task Force, created earlier this year by NMSU President Barbara Couture, is trying to answer. The latest step in the effort was a snapshot survey of two Aggie home football games this season conducted by a class of marketing students at the College of Business. So far this year, overall attendance at home games has averaged about 16,000, according to the NMSU Athletics Department. On Saturday, Nov. 12, just more than 14,200 fans watched as the Aggies squeaked by Fresno State, 48-45, for the team's first win over the Bulldogs in school history.

Elise "Pookie" Sautter, head of the marketing department for the College of Business and a member of the task force, had students in one of her classes direct to an online survey fellow students on the main campus who had attended the University of Texas at El Paso and Ohio University home games. The survey tracked what the students liked and didn't like about their game-day experiences. The students' actual attendance at the games were verified through their student IDs.

"The thing the students like most about the game is the band. They love the Pride Band and how it contributes to the game day experience," Sautter said. "They like the video boards, they like being with their friends – the whole social atmosphere."

Sautter cautioned that the survey was very small – only 140 students were queried – but added "it provides some exploratory data on student satisfaction with some of the recent changes that have been made."

Some of those changes include Sodexo replacing Aramark as the university's food services provider at the concessions, as well as a new tailgate tradition that began this year just outside of the north entrance of Aggie Memorial Stadium. Attendees can visit "Pistol Pete's Paddock" and get some pre-game food and entertainment.

Still, Sautter said, the overwhelming feeling expressed by many of those surveyed was that the game day experience needed to be more participative.

"In basketball now, (the Aggie fans) do the 'guns up' where everybody sticks their finger up in the air when the team is shooting free throws," she said. "(Football) needs to go into that line. When you think about it, NMSU doesn't have any real chants to engage the crowds."

Among the survey's findings:

- Of the two games spotlighted, not surprisingly the UTEP contest drew the most attendance from the respondents at almost 71 percent.
- Close to 68 percent of the students said supporting the team or team members drew them to the game, as opposed to 48 percent saying they tagged along with friends and family.

The largest number of respondents, almost 44 percent, said they spent between one and three hours "at pre-game activities surrounding the stadium prior to kick-off." The next largest group of respondents, 21 percent, spent 30 minutes to an hour on pre-game festivities.

Asked how long the students stayed at the games, 56 percent remained until the clock in the final quarter ran out.

Steve Macy, associate athletic director for marketing and promotions, said that although the most recent study was small, it does track with a much more comprehensive online survey conducted by the athletics department in March. For that report, 555 students, the vast majority of whom lived on campus, were asked why they didn't attend NMSU athletic events and what could be done to improve attendance. The survey skewed toward on-campus student residents because they were contacted via the housing email database, while off-campus students were recruited through flyers.

As the athletics department's survey showed – and what is of main concern to the Aggie Spirit Game Day Experience Task Force – is that students are not showing up to NMSU sports events in the vast numbers possible.

Only 29 percent of those asked in the March survey said they attended Aggie sporting events in their free time. Naturally, studying and hanging out with friends outmatched Aggie sporting events at 89 percent and 72 percent, respectively. Still, 41 percent of those asked preferred to go out to restaurants and 35 percent opted for seeing a movie in their spare time.

Overall, the survey found that 82 percent of the respondents said they had gone to at least one Aggie sporting event over the past year. As for which sporting events they attended, 71 percent said football games and 60 percent said basketball. Softball recorded the lowest attendance number at 14 percent. The survey also found that the older students get, the less likely they are to consider themselves fans.

The survey also asked why students don't attend games, with the majority at 44 percent saying they weren't interested. Thirty-four percent said they lacked the time and only 4 percent cited the teams' performances.

Of those who did attend Aggie basketball or football games, the largest number of respondents at 36 percent said they went to be entertained, primarily through a fun atmosphere and a competitive game.

"Most of all, we learned that they want to be engaged and entertained throughout the game," Macy said. "Regardless of what is transpiring on the field, ensuring that our students have fun activities in the stands is what can drive greater student satisfaction."

Satisfying students is important because the virtually untapped number of them that can fill seats is considerable. The survey found that 13 percent qualified as "super fans," 37 percent were "casual fans," and 32 percent were "potential fans." The casual and potential fans are the obvious ripe fruit.

So what will it take to get more Aggies students to root for the home team? Well aside from winning teams, "the students said pretty strongly (in the survey) that giving them free stuff was a

really good way to entice them to come to games," Macy said. Seventy-nine percent of the students surveyed said giveaways at some home games would very or somewhat likely entice them to attend matches. Eighty-three percent said free or discounted concession items at some games would very or somewhat likely lure them to games.

As for the giveaways, 84 percent of students said they wanted T-shirts, 63 percent opted for backpacks and 55 percent voted for hats. Only 30 percent said they wanted cowbells, which were the giveaway at the Ohio University game – and the number of bells given out was limited at that.

"Right now, the way we're budgeted, we don't have the ability to do giveaways," Macy said.

However, both Sautter and Macy go back to their findings that making the games more exciting, especially in the stands, will go a long way toward attracting students. Sautter suggests holding an online media campaign where students, faculty and even the public can share ideas for chants or activities.

"I think there were some major improvements (this football season) and certainly the team getting better is going to help down the road," Sautter said. "I think the biggest problem is really trying to sustain some level of satisfaction and enhance crowd participation to keep people coming back."

NMSU welcomes PR guru

Many factors affect this year's holiday spending

According to economists, this year's holiday spending might be one of the hardest to predict because of increased transportation costs, increased food prices, an extended Black Friday and an unstable economy.

"I hope I am wrong, but my forecast for 2011 holiday retail sales is a lot worse than those of my fellow forecasters," said Bruce Huhmann, an associate professor at New Mexico State University who specializes in marketing communications, international marketing, consumer behavior and retail marketing. "Most predictions are very positive, but I think we will see a 1 percent drop in spending." The International Council of Shopping Centers (ISSC) released its annual study, stat-

The International Council of Shopping Centers (ISSC) released its annual study, stating retailers will see about a 3 percent increase, said Susan Palmer, marketing manager for Mesilla Valley Mall.

Breaking that number down, Huhmann said the same study shows a 3.5 percent increase in chain store sales; a 3 percent increase in general merchandise, apparel, furniture and other non-auto or food retail sales; and a 2.2 percent increase in shopping center sales.

"There are two competing trends recognized to various degrees," Huhmann said. "A lot of consumers are getting tired of cutting back and not spending. We have had a couple of Christmases where people felt they should be more conservative. I can see those people spending more money because they would like to have a good Christmas, maybe spend a little more on the kids."

Holiday spending this year could see as much as a 3 percent gain or a 1 percent loss due to increased costs of necessities and an unstable economy.

On the other hand, the unstable economy is still causing fear for some consumers.

"New Mexico is dependent on the government because of the military bases and much of the land is government owned. If the government issues cutbacks, people may take a step back (in spending)," Huhmann said. As of Friday, Nov. 18, Christmas is just 37

As of Friday, Nov. 18, Christmas is just 37 days away and Black Friday is seven days away. With these days approaching, holiday spending may be soon enough to dodge the effects of a potential European crisis or cutbacks from the Super Committee.

"When I made my predictions in September, it looked like something was going to happen in the following three months," Huhmann said. "So far, we have avoided anything too negative.

"I think Europe will be able to kick the can past New Year's and postpone. The same goes for the Super Committee; they will find a way to stall."

that is right here in our backyard. We felt that Paleozoic Trackways would most greatly benefit from a YP grant by putting the funds toward preservation and education - two key environmental concepts.'

The Paleozoic Trackways in the Robledo Mountains were discovered 22 years ago by Jerry MacDonald. The grassroots effort started in 2005, and the foundation focused on bringing to public attention the importance of the finds and working to make the area a national monument, which was signed on March 30, 2009.

The foundation is dedicated to educating the public that the first discovery was not just occasional tracks, but contains fossilized tracks extending more than 20 feet and evidence of a petrified forest rising from the desert floor. Recently discovered petrified wood is unique and rare as it contains preserved wood cells, which are exceptionally valuable for research scientists.

With the creation of the Prehistoric Trackways National Monument, the focus of the foundation turned to obtaining the necessary funding to maintain the site and exhibit the remarkable discoveries uncovered there.

However, there is still at least one factor that will affect holiday spending - gas costs.

In 2011, gas prices reached as high as \$5 per gallon in some parts of the U.S., and southern New Mexico saw \$3.90 per gallon and more at some stations.

"For every 1 cent gas prices increase, consumers lose about \$4 of spending power," Huhmann said. "Gas has come down, but was still higher in 2011 than 2010."

High gas prices don't just hurt the consumers. Increased transportation costs for manufacturers and retailers could cause increased retail prices this year.

"The higher transportation cost could be the 3 percent increase that economists are predicting," Huhmann said. "After talking to people early in the fall, most people said they were planning to spend about the same or a little less, telling me there might be a 1 percent drop, which is still bad news for retailers."

America has also seen an increase in another necessity - food.

According to Reuters.com, more than onethird of U.S. consumers expect rising food prices to cause them to cut back on holiday spending.

The all-food consumer price index (CPI) projected a 1 percent increase throughout 2011. The CPI for all food increased 0.4 percent from August to September, increased 0.5 percent from July to August and was 4.7 percent above level as of September.

These increased food costs could cause Americans to cut back spending.

The National Retail Federation predicted the average American will spend \$704.18, down \$14.80 from last year.

However, Palmer said it appears stores at the mall looked stocked as normal.

Huhmann said he expects stores to keep their inventory levels on the low side "just in case.

"We expect the November numbers to be up," said Palmer, adding that the mall will be staffed for a typical Black Friday crowd. "I think retailers are counting on any increased spending to come from Black Friday weekend performances. People are in the best price and bargain mode.'

Palmer said Sears and JCPenny are opening at 4 a.m. Friday, Nov. 25, and the mall opens at 6 a.m.

"It would be great to have a good holiday season because it is always a good prediction for the coming year's economy," Huhmann said.

Examining water systems

Small community systems serve mobile parks, villages By Marvin Tessneer to improve their services and demonstrate how the smaller

Many New Mexico rural homes are supplied with water though small community systems, and the Environment Department monitors the sources to make sure the water is safe.

Most of these water systems are small and designated to serve 25 or more users, or has 15 or more connections for domestic purposes, such as drinking, dish washing, cooking or washing, said to Andy Edmondson, technical services manager of the Drinking Water Bureau.

'Our responsibility is to ensure public water systems meet the requirements of the New Mexico Drinking Water Regulations and the Safe Drinking Water Act," Edmondson said.

Doña Ana County has about 60 public water systems, ranging from mobile park and mutual domestic systems adjacent to the Rio Grande to the Las Cruces municipal system that serves 93,000 customers.

Five former valley mutual domestic water associations have merged to form the Lower Rio Grande Public Water Authority



systems are expanding. The merger included Mesquite, Berino, Desert Sands, Vado and La Mesa.

The board members are Roberto Nieto, chairman; Santos Ruiz; Rosaura Pargas; and Blanca Martinez.

The merger qualifies the authority to build larger projects, reduce duplication of service, apply for funding for future projects and purchase in larger volume to reduce costs, said general manager Martin Lopez.

The former associations have been working to create the public water authority since 2006. The authority service is based in Mesquite, an unincorporated village. Formerly, Lopez worked with the Mesquite association for nine years.

The LRGPWA has 4,000 customers, including 15 dairies along Interstate 10.

The authority pumps water from 11 wells and has not reported any drop in the water table as of October.

"Our wells are petty deep, from 300 to 900 feet deep," Lopez said.

The authority plans to improve its distribution lines system, which extends for 26 miles. Some lines have a diameter of two inches, and the authority plans to expand them to six or 12

inches, Lopez said.

"Some of those lines are 40 to 50 years old," he said.

The authority was organized in 2009 under H.B. 185 during Gov. Bill Richardson's administration. Authority status provides more power, including issuing revenue bonds to enlarge and improve services.

Mutual domestic systems are limited to providing water and sewage service.

Up the Rio Grande, Doña Ana, another unincorporated village, operates the Doña Ana Mutual Domestic Water Association that supplies water to 4,000 consumers, the largest mutual domestic water service in New Mexico, board chairman Kurt Anderson said.

The other board members are Emma Garcia, vice chairman; Charles Huestis; Agnes Balizan; and David Jacquez.

"Our water table has dropped slightly, but we're not terribly concerned," said board chairman Kurt Anderson. "All of our wells are at least 700 feet deep. If the wells were shallow, we would be concerned. We're not worried because we're in good shape now, but if the current drought continues for a long time, we could be in trouble. We'd have to drill deeper and pump harder. We keep monitoring our wells.

Doña Ana pumps all of its water from wells.

The Doña Ana system also has four tanks but not specifically for storage.

"We have water storage to maintain pressure and for treatment for health reasons," Anderson said. "We keep clean water flowing.




A monopoly can be hard to determine

Business strategy depends on market type

I had a discussion recently with a clerk at a local utility.

I complained about the long wait for service. The clerk claimed the line wasn't any longer than the lines at the electric company or at the city. I said that was because all these are monopolies. The clerk became indignant, claiming her company wasn't a monopoly.

So what exactly is a monopoly? I spend a considerable amount of time discussing this issue with my students as determination of a business's market power is a critical management issue.

In competitive markets, a business will have little or no control over price and must take the price as given. As monopoly power increases, the business has more and more influence over its own price. With a pure monopoly, the firm can set the price constrained only by the ability of its customers to pay.

Of course, few businesses are pure monopolies, the electric company being one of the few examples, which, of course, is regulated. But most businesses do have some market power. Even restaurants have some say over prices. Take, for example, my favorite burger, which is from Chilito's. The restaurant can charge more for a hamburger because I prefer its food. But it can't raise prices too much because while Chilito's burgers are delicious, there is a limit to how much extra I'll pay.

Is the cable company a monopoly? It depends on how you define the market. There are always other alternatives for obtaining programming, but these alternatives suffer from deficiencies relative to cable. So the cable company has considerable market power, but is not a pure monopoly.

power, but is not a pure monopoly. The cable industry doesn't want to be regulated, so has long argued it isn't a monopoly. But even if one thought satellite and over the air were a perfect substitute for cable, that won't make the market competitive. Under the best assumptions, a household might have two or three alternatives to cable, a market structure that qualifies as an oligopoly. Nevertheless, the cable industry has been effective in convincing policy makers not to regulate. Rates were effectively deregulated effectively with the 1996 Telecommunications Act.

Of course, most monopolies aren't regulated. Indeed, regulation, with its accompanying bureaucracy, often is a cure worse than the disease. Electricity is something with which modern life isn't possible, so regulation to ensure efficient pricing is justified. The argument for cable is much weaker both because there are alternatives and because cable is less essential. For many other monopolies, the idea of regulation is not on the table.

When it comes to businesses servicing small markets, such as Las Cruces, monopolies are common. But as a community grows, it can support more competition and new business will enter to compete for market share. I've seen this happen time and again since moving to our community. The population of Las Cruces has about doubled; competition has increased accordingly to the benefit of consumers.

Housing supply at 5-year low

Low-home inventory could stabilize economy

What a difference a few years can make. From the time I relocated to Las Cruces in 1992 until the mid 2000s, sales of new and existing Las Cruces area homes, townhomes and condominiums plodded along at a humdrum pace. Our local listing inventory contained more than 300 new and existing homes,

values were appreciating at around 4 percent annually, and new-home sales accounted for approximately 17 to 18 percent of the total number of closings. Then everything changed.

Congress authorized Freddie Mac and Fannie Mae to purchase mortgage loans made to just about anyone who could fog a mirror, igniting a fire under our nation's housing market. Buyers came out of the woodwork, causing the demand for housing to outpace the supply. Enter the builders.

Subdivisions sprang

up all over town and new-home construction was off and running. First-time buyers were purchasing almost half of the available homes, while investors were snapping up almost 40 percent of the inventory for rentals and vacation getaways. By late 2007, our listing inventory had ballooned to almost 1,750 homes. Then everything changed, again.





The housing market peaked and began its downward descent. Builders curtailed their efforts and began focusing on reducing their inventories of unsold homes. Homeowners who thought they could cash in on the hyper-appreciation created by the buying frenzy began to realize that they'd be lucky to sell at all much less make a profit. As a result, inventories of new and used homes began to shrink.

Today, our local inventory contains just 1,095 new and existing homes. That's equal to the number of homes for sale in January

2007 and a 37 percent reduction from the 1,745 properties for sale when the inventory peaked at the end of 2007.

Let's hope our local home inventory continues to shrink. A reduction in the supply of homes will help stabilize prices as buyers vie to purchase the best properties for the money. Add in a few additional buyers and the supply and demand pendulum could swing even further toward a balanced Las Cruces market.

In January 1997, D.J.'s Welding started in Las Cruces. That company has since transitioned into Denco Inc., a full-service facility management and specialty construction company.

After spending time in California, Denco vice president and owner Dennis "DJ" Jonas-

son was working for TRW on a project at HELSTF - High Energy Laser System Test Facility – when he met his wife, Cynthia.

When the project ended, the couple was thinking about going back to California, but saw Las Cruces as a better place to raise a family.

"We wanted to stay in Las Cruces because California was more high-paced and our quality of life in Las Cruces was a lot better," said Cynthia Jonasson, current president of Denco.

"(My husband) was and still is a very good specialty welder. And I had done some bookkeeping. I knew what we needed to do to start a business. I knew I could take care

of the books. So we decided to give it a try for a year and see what would happen. It just worked out for us."

In 1999, the couple incorporated D.J.'s Welding.

"Shortly after, we were doing facilities maintenance and building up infrastructure for a new project for a client of ours at HEL-STF," Cynthia Jonasson said. "The client wanted us to change our name because we were doing construction and not just welding. When it was time for us to get paid, their books read a large amount of money was going just to welding. The (government) would tell our client, You can't be using that much welding.'

Cynthia Jonasson said one of her sons suggested to name the company Dennis Co. or Denco.

> Since then, the company has multiplied.

'We started with me, my husband and one other employee," Cynthia Jonasson said. "Now, we have about 75 employees.'

Since becoming Denco, the company has also widened its services, including commercial and industrial construction.

"We have done a lot of construction work for the government and had contracts all over (White Sands Missile Range)," she said. "We have also done work for the Army, the Navy and currently hold an (indefinite delivery indefinite quantity) contract with the Defense Threat Reduction Agency. We

get a lot of task orders from that."

With a focus on government contracts, Cynthia Jonasson obtained an 8A certification from the Small Business Administration that has allowed her company to be sole-sourced by the government and avoid bidding wars.

Denco is in a transition phase as it moves locations and prepares to graduate from the

Exploring clustered works at the fall tour

Local artists join together to celebrate diversity through art

With so many artists living in the creative mecca along the Picacho corridor, it was a nobrainer to designate a day to explore the tightly clustered neighborhood of galleries.

Local artists open their gallery doors for the 2011 Picacho Corridor Fall Studio Tour. Over Thanksgiving weekend, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Nov. 26-27, yellow "open studio" signs will be posted to light the way among participating venues along Picacho Avenue.

"We've been doing this for five years," said Ouida Touchón, artist and mastermind behind the artistic gathering. "If other smaller towns were able to gather their local artists for community outreach shows, Las Cruces could, too."

Touchón said she was drawn to the idea of clustering artists five years ago, after realizing that the creative minds were drawn to Picacho Avenue and realized just how close their galleries and homes were to each other. "The idea is to create a cohesive neighborhood," Touchón said.

This year, there are a total of 16 studios that will be open in the area, containing work from 21 artists, each with their own grassroots links to the community. A variety of different media will be showcased, such as painting, pottery, textiles, photography and jewelry.

"It's a chance for all of the artists located in the corridor to share their work, their visions with the people in their neighborhoods." Touchón said. "We wanted to keep it limited to the Picacho corridor in order to create stronger community bonds."

The Picacho Corridor Fall Studio Tour provides community members with a unique opportunity to talk with the artists and to ask questions about the creative process or the story behind a particular piece. As the holidays approach, it's also an opportunity to pick up a unique piece of local culture, directly from the source.

Visitors can expect a casual, studio environment with refreshments and excellent pricing for those interested in bringing local talent into their homes. The Fall Tour is free for everyone. The artists are clustered along the stretch of Picacho Avenue between Motel Boulevard, to the west, and Tornillo Street, just above Mesquite Street, to the east.

Painting the 'Colors of Wind'

Local blind artist reveals his kaleidoscopic world

Blind artists seem almost as puzzling to the outside world as deaf musicians, but their unique perspectives have formed some of the greatest works our community has ever experienced.

For George Mendoza, a Las Crucen who is legally blind since a rare, degenerative disease began to corrode his eyesight at 15, the world is a bright network of colors, shape and inspiration.

The effects of the disease caused Mendoza to lose all of his central vision, and maintaining only a grey, foggy peripheral vision. Instead, as Mendoza describes it he has developed, "Kaleidoscope eyes," or an intense chancing visual images of colorful bursts.

Mendoza didn't always appreciate his new type of vision. "At one time, I was suicidal over it," he said. "I wanted out

of this. I was going crazy, and a priest (I visited) said, 'Paint them. Make designs out of the craziness.' So I did, and the rest is history.'

Mendoza is also known for his athleticism, setting the record in the 1979 for the mile-run as a blind runner. He was also a member of the U.S. team for the para-Olympics in the 1980s.

When I run, I'm distracted from the constant colors," Mendoza said. "It's an escape for me, in the same way painting its."

In 1994, William J. Buchanan penned Mendoza's biography, "Running Toward the Light," which detailed his experience in losing his sight while continuing to be a world-class athlete.

"Life is funny, sometimes," said Mendoza. "I never thought I

would be here, doing this. It's mind-boggling." A jack-of-all-trades, Mendoza's art has been the real inspiration of the community. His paintings have been featured at museums and galleries in Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, New York and Texas.

In 2010, at a show at the Ellen Noel Art Museum in Odessa, Texas, Mendoza's works caught the attention of Doylene Land. With her help, Mendoza reached out to the Smithsonian Affiliate Exhibition Exchange who agreed to sponsor his show, "Colors of the Wind." The program helps place art shows into galleries across the nation.

"I think once people see 'Colors of the Wind,' they'll just get hit by so much color and emotion, they'll come out singing," he said.

Mendoza's love for art stemmed from his unusual sight, and stemmed from one moment in his life he said blossomed his artistic side. "What color is the wind?" a little girl, born blind, asked him.

"That question just blew my mind because I was just losing my sight then," Mendoza said. "She woke up my creative sense by asking me that question." It wasn't until 1993 that Mendoza began to paint full time.

He said he remembers physical sight, and his paintings often re-flect vivid visual memories and dreams. Eyes are a reoccurring theme within his art and are often used to explore a spiritual, mystical and playful side of the human spirit.

His designs have also been taken up by textile company Westminster Fabrics and made into brightly colored swatches of cloth. The Las Colcheras quilting guild in Las Cruces has used these patterns to create quilts for art shows and nonprofit causes across the community.

'I'm so proud to be a New Mexican artist. The local support has just been incredible," Mendoza said. "As an artist, it's an amazing place to live and work."

Christmas tree comes to life

The Living Christmas Tree Concert of First Baptist Church has become an annual holiday tradition for many of the residents of the Mesilla Valley. In 2010, more than 3,000 southern New Mexicans attended the unique, festive blend of Christmas traditions with the tools of technology.

It takes courage to be a whistleblower

Female officer tries to expose Bosnia scandal

"The Whistleblower" is based on the true story of a Lincoln, Neb., police officer who signed up to work as a United Nations International Police Force Monitor by DynCorp as part of the peacekeeping mission that took place at the end of the Bosnian conflict.

Kathryn Bolkovac, divorced and somewhat broke, discovered the job opportunity as she sought to find a better paying job. What's better than \$100,000 for six months of work, with little experience required? Her experience as a cop, however, would certainly help. Rachel Weisz plays Bolkovac, a sharp,

Rachel Weisz plays Bolkovac, a sharp, direct, strong and compassionate woman. She is soon enmeshed in some of the ugly situations that were (and may still be) taking place in Bosnia.

Bolkovac is soon put into a supervisory position, but along the way, she has had the creepy feeling that something is quite amiss in the country of Bosnia. We are soon to find out just what it is.

Intermingled with Bolkovac's story is that of a number of young women who, by one horrid method or another, are forced to become dancers or prostitutes for the local populace, and more jaw-dropping for a number of local police, "protectors," and, even worse, for the UN force itself. Since a curfew was in place, the locals were exempt, shall we say, from participation in these activities, so it was all for the "pleasure" of those who should have been protecting the women.



The film focuses on several young women lured to the "job" by false promises and paid-off friends. As in the majority of these situations, the women end up "owing" their keepers for the "job," and escape is nearly impossible, as they are always watched and have had their passports confiscated.

Bolkovac is soon onto this, but finds little help. And why should she? The sex trade business is hugely profitable and besides which, the perpetrators can also take advantage of their charges. She does find allies in some local police, but in general, she is on her own. Requests from her higher-ups go largely ignored or twisted and, as we find out, some of those in charge are also involved.

The film boosts a strong supporting cast, including Vanessa Redgrave as a human rights official who can only offer moral support and David Straithairn, who may or may not be an ally. In "The Whistleblower," Rachel Weisz plays Kathryn Bolkovac, a United Nations police officer in Bosnia, who uncovers a scandal involving prostitution. The film is based on a true story.

As Bolkovac, Weisz gives a resilient performance, only held back by her sometimes naivety, as a woman in a man's world.

This is a dark film, one filled with imagery that is certainly accurate, but harrowing. It takes place often at night, and a main objection I would offer is that it is often somewhat off balance. Its pacing is far too brisk, and sometimes I felt that the scenarios were meant to push me toward even more rage and empathy, something that I didn't need to feel any more of.

In the real story, Bolkovac became the whistleblower after being wrongfully dismissed from her position. A number of those involved had immunity, due to their jobs in Bosnia, and not one was ever charged or

brought to trial, although some were fired. Another whistleblower, Ben Johnston, was fired for similar reasons, and later taken into protective custody.

Additionally, DynCorp, as U.S. military contractor, has millions of dollars in Iraq and Afghanistan, and child sex trafficking charges in these countries have been brought out as well.

According to the know-it-alls at Wikipedia, "in the summer of 2005, the United States Defense department drafted a proposal to prohibit defense contractor involvement in human trafficking for forced prostitution and labor. Several defense contractors, among others, DynCorp, stalled the establishment of a final proposal that would formally prohibit defense contractor involvement in these activities."

"The Whistleblower" is a strong film in many ways, one that brings to the forefront an issue that is taking place much closer than Bosnia – certainly not far from Las Cruces.

Dine at 'Alice's Restaurant' Massachusetts is at the center of dysfunction

The CineMatinee for 1:30 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 19, is "Alice's Restaurant" (1969, 111 minutes, rated R). Bring a usable, non-perishable food item for donation to the El Caldito soup kitchen and get a free small popcorn.

Oscar-nominated director Arthur Penn ("Bonnie and Clyde" and "Little Big Man") brilliantly captures the end of an era in this poignant and funny dramatic rendition of folk singer Arlo Guthrie's 20-minute song, "The Alice's Restaurant Massacre." The best-selling song was written by Guthrie as a commercial for the new small restaurant of his Stockbridge, Mass., friends Alice and Ray Brock.

After a gathering for a Thanksgiving Day feast, Guthrie and his hippie friend Roger are arrested by the police chief for littering. As a result Guthrie is fined \$50 and has to pick up the half-a-ton of garbage he dumped down a cliff (because the town dump was closed for the holiday) and ends up dumping it at a NYC Sanitation Department site. This arrest turns out to be a good break for Guthrie, as he's rejected for military service because he's perceived as an unrehabilitated'criminal.

Penn aims for more than telling about Guthrie's hippie adventures, as he uses the song as the centerpiece to ask what went so wrong with the communal aspects of the hippie movement. The film takes a hard look at the joys and emptiness of the movement, and how it could be just as dysfunctional as growing up in a traditional family. This film looks better with the passing of time, as it closes with Alice's unforgettable haunting look at her unstable hubby, the empty church and with her seemingly thinking to herself that we really blew it. Despite being surrounded by decent people with similar peaceful interests, the couple couldn't keep things together because of their own personal issues, sexual rivalries and the inability of the peaceniks to freely love one another – which the rejection of mainstream life for a life as a carefree spirit was supposedly all about.

CineMatinee is a unique blend of movies presented by the Mesilla Valley Film Society which showcases unique films, past and present, often with an emphasis on life in the West – which could mean the new West, the Old West or anything in between – and "movies that missed us" – films that are notable but never had a lot of publicity.

The series is designed to show area residents that film is a form of art and education as well as entertainment! At least one film a month for this series has a New Mexico "connection," drawing from the vast pool of movies made in the state (nearly 500) or perhaps featuring a star/story from New Mexico talent – film festival-quality movies in the world's oldest adobe theatre!

Unless otherwise noted, screening time is 1:30 p.m., and admission is \$4 for everyone except film society members who are admitted for \$1. The theater is located one-half block south of the Mesilla Plaza.

Slouching toward Santa Fe Filmmaker tells story from his perspective

Film festivals are created for and by people who love films. Of course, right?

I worked for the largest film festival in the world as part of the year-round staff. I've served as a judge for three film festivals and attended several as an exhibiting filmmaker or an avid attendee. I've been a film critic for two newspapers and a television show. My ideal job would be bouncing from fest to fest, meeting filmmakers and festival organizers, seeing the latest crop of cutting-edge cinema and getting paid for it. It's good to have goals.

Film festivals, as it turns out, are a dime a dozen. Every town desperate for tourism dollars and an artistic pinpoint on the map hosts a film fest. The larger cities host more than one. Even Santa Fe has four. Las Cruces and Mesilla, in fits and starts, has attempted several over the years and has now acquired the White Sands Independent Film Festival from Alamogordo. After three years, it now seems to be an annual fixture.

With the exception of the half-dozen or so high-profile fests in the U.S., most fests attract lower-budget, independent films trawling for a distributor. Some will get lucky, many will not. That is why at a film festival you will see films you will never have the opportunity to see again. Especially short films. The market for shorts is very limited and a festival is where you can view a good sampling of these gems.

Long a fan of the form, short stories, plays and films have attracted me as a consumer and creator in my own right. My latest short film, "Low Riders," was made in 2010 in Las Cruces. When completed, I began investigating what festivals I might submit it to.

Most fests charge a submission fee and have their own criteria for official selection. So far, "Low Riders" has made it into five festivals, the latest was this October at the Santa Fe Independent Film Festival.

Attending a film fest out of town is great because you get to sample the town and the films, and the organizers love it when filmmakers accompany their films.

The weather in Santa Fe was beautiful, and the fest exhibited a great variety of more than 100 narrative features, documentaries and shorts. Mine was the only film from Las Cruces.

My film was grouped into the opening night screening of New Mexico shorts. It was clearly the audience favorite of the six films shown, though it was still the first day of five. With more than 100 films, five venues and

attended by Oscar winners and nominees, it was a tribute to the spirit of independent filmmaking. Twenty-seven features, 87 shorts plus workshops and discussions. What's not to love? Did I mention the weather was great?

A major concern for festival-goers is selecting which films to see without conflicting with other films screening at the same time. Some festivals will repeat conflicting films allowing pass holders to see everything. Sadly, this is not happening in Santa Fe or Las Cruces, but all festivals have room for improvement. Most festivals also hand out awards. The awards party Saturday night at the Santa Fe Film Festival was a hoot held at the San Francisco Bar & Grill. Prizes were given to Best Feature, Documentary, Short Film, Best Actor and two Honorary Mention awards; the final one for my film "Low Riders."

Next stop for "Low Riders": the Taos Shortz Festival in March 2012.

Classic flavors, unique twists with daring presentations

Aqua Reef masters the art of Asian fusion cuisine

Walking into the cozy, new-age restaurant I was delighted to find an aqua bar of wooden boats, which chauffer around plates of sushi to

The few tables in Aqua Reef, 900 S. Telshor Blvd., Suite B, are intimate, and the décor is modern and sophisticated with a twist of Asian influence. The combination of glass and stone creates the feel of a chic, contemporary retreat, but all of that is overlooked once the food arrives. The menu is full of traditional sushi rolls, most of which are mild as far as seafood goes to suit the tastes of the region. In addition to beautiful sushi rolls and tender cuts of tuna sashimi, Aqua Reef offers a variety of Pan-Asian inspired meal options. The tastes and flavors stretch across the globe, fusing many culture's cuisines into one menu. Some of their delights include pad Thai, teriyaki chicken, seafood paella and

Having traveled both coasts and

spending a considerable time living and dining in Seattle, I've come to recognize and appreciate good seafood. The cut and quality can vary depending on where you go and the time of year. My expectations for the desert were realistic; after all it's a 12-hour drive to anything resembling the ocean.

The Dragon Tail Roll was the special of the night - fried eel skin wrapped around crab, cream cheese, avocado and smothered in dynamite sauce. Basically, it was a typical mildly flavored California coll, jazzed up. Despite the eel skin, which I didn't think was going to be a great addition, I ordered one. The roll itself was gigantic, as though they'd cut it right off a sleeping dragon. Fifteen pieces is large for a sushi roll, which usually only has eight to 12, but man was it impressive to look at.

The plates at Aqua Reef are definitely about the flavor, but the presentation is equally dramatic. With bold colors, and unique set ups, each plate is a visual work of art. With such a meticulous arrangement, my expectations shot through the roof and the first bite of the dragon's tail was a little like

The eel skin was a crisp toppin to the inner roll's flavor, which had just enough of each ingredient to



create complex flavors. The dynamite sauce was explosive with flavor, and an unexpected heat which brought the entire roll together. Sushi rolls run \$13 to \$16, but will easily feed two people. Expect to pay around the \$12 for other entrées and \$8 for appetizers.

The order of sashimi maguro. small, sliced fillets of raw tuna complemented by the heat-packed wasabi (horseradish paste) and the spicy but sour pickled ginger, was of equal quality.

When tuna is frozen, especially raw, it looses its consistency, begins to break down and fall apart. Each cut of this incredibly tasty ocean delicacy was firm but mouth-melting, a signature of quality.

The dessert menu was a blend of classic offerings and typical Asian dishes, including chocolate wontons, dessert fruit sushi and tempura ice cream. I opted for the cheesecake spring rolls with a mix of intrigue and curiosity.

It was served in two massive pieces with a delicately sliced strawberry and a dollop of rich whipped cream. Few things are more different than cheesecake and spring rolls, but bringing them together was a sheer stroke of brilliance. The outer pastry was light and crisp, the innards were warm and rich. I was fortunate to have someone to share it with to limit the inevitable sugar coma.

Aqua Reef blends a contempo rary feel with deliciously traditional cuisine in a unique blend of Asianfusion. It's freshness and quality is worth the moderate price of the plate and exceeded all expectation of seafood in the desert.

English professor wins book award

New Mexico State University assistant professor of English Carmen Gimenez Smith recently added a national award to her list of literary honors. In October, Gimenez Smith received a 2011 American Book Award from the Before Columbus Foundation for her memoir, "Bring Down the Little Birds: On Mothering, Art, Work, and Everything Else." She accepted the award at a ceremony at the University of California Berkeley.

Published in 2010, her book is an exploration of the many faces of motherhood from her own experience as a mother and her memories of her own mother, who was diagnosed with a brain tumor and Alzheimer's disease.

"This award gives me legitimacy as a nonfiction writer, which is important to me because I identify as a poet and a nonfiction writer," said Gimenez Smith. "It also helps my students understand it's a possibility for them to write nonfiction."

The Before Columbus Foundation, founded in 1976, is a nonprofit educational and service organizational and service organization dedicated to the promotion and dissemination of contemporary American multicultural literature. The goals of BCF are to provide recognition and a wider audience for the wealth of cultural and ethnic diversity that constitutes American writing. The American Book Awards are not associated with any industry group or trade organization. Award winners are nominated and selected by a panel of writers, editors and publishers who also represent the diversity of American literary culture.

"This award was started to recognize the diversity of voices that exist in the world of publishing," Gimenez Smith said. "The award doesn't just go to writers of color, it goes to all sorts of writers, but it is interested in representing diversity, because for a long time, awards did not represent diversity. It calls attention and gives distinction to the work for that reason. It is a well-respected award."

Gimenez Smith won two awards earlier this year for both her poetry and creative nonfiction works. She will have another collection of poetry coming out in November and two more collections coming out in the next year.

Gimenez Smith is the editor-in-chief of NMSU's literary journal Puerto del Sol and a publisher of Noemi Press, which publishes poetry and fiction. She is the author of two previous collections of poetry, "Odalisque in Pieces" (University of Arizona Press, 2009) and "The City She Was" (Center for Literary Pub-

A portrait of a brilliant, repressed, enigmatic man

'J. Edgar' is a dark, edgy film filled with powerhouse performances

What kind of man rises to power through innovative ambition and keeps it by blackmailing any who threaten his reputation?

That is precisely the question the audience is asked to explore through Clint Eastwood's depiction of the lift of J. Edgar Hoover.

Revered, respected, reviled and celebrated as the founder of the FBI, Hoover is a complex film that addresses the motivations and maniacal obsessions that created the 50 years of Hoover's career.

John Edgar Hoover (Leonardo DiCaprio) is an unreliable narrator dictating his autobiography through the course of the film, as he begins the telling of his life's work, centered on creating the FBI and ushering it to perceived greatness. He begins in 1919, a 24-year-old with the Justice Department who witnesses the bombing of the Attorney General's home by fanatical Socialists.

Immediately, we understand how brilliant the man is, the first bright light in understanding the importance of evidence and surveillance. Hoover takes Helen Gandy (Naomi Watts), his date and eventual secretary, into the Library of Congress, to see the catalog of books, which he helped create.

Such organization is a predecessor to the type of sequential file keeping that would shape the events of his career. Hoover narrates the story, telling of his "heroic" deeds, seizing foreign nationals, creating pamphlets about Socialist movements, trying to create a name for himself.

Through the complex workings of his rise to power, we are faced with individuals that help shape the man he becomes, namely his mother Anna Marie (Judi Dench). She portrays the protagonist in the background, dotting on her son for his ambition, then discouraging him from showing any personal flaw.

One of the most powerful scenes of the movie, and perhaps for explaining the underlying repressed personality of Hoover, a rumored closeted and chaste homosexual, was Anna Marie's confession that she'd rather have a dead son, than a "daffodil" (a feminine or gay man). It is through this lens that we watch the dark-toned portrait of miserable, intelligent and paranoid leader.

Hoover is plagued by his feelings for his right-hand man, Clyde Tolson (Armie Hammer), who takes on the role of companion rather than co-worker. Socially inept and lacking a solid personal life, Hoover is cast as the loner, obsessed with keeping America safe because he does not feel safe himself.

His relationship with Tolson remains chaste despite their obvious emotional connection. Instead, their bond is formed from a constant companionship, sharing meals, vacations and a few touching moments together. Tolson is the mirror image of Hoover and, in some ways, humanizes the tyrant, showing us there is more behind the lies, the wire-tapping and the blackmail of powerful political figures.

Tolson is an emotional connection to Hoover, best seen when he erupts in a jealous rage over Hoover's confession to sleeping with a woman. His relationship with Tolson and his entire career can boil down to those few moments of the scene.

Powerfully written, with a powerhouse performance from both DiCaprio and Hammer, it conveys a tragically misplaced love.

"J. Edgar" is more than an explanation of Hoover's career, but of the forces behind the scenes that created this manipulative man. His confidential files are said to include powerful figures such as President Kennedy's affairs, Eleanor Roosevelt's love letters to Lorena Hickock and Martin Luther King Jr.'s indiscretions. These files have, to this day, never been recovered and there is speculation that is shown in the ending scene of the film that Hoover's trusted secretary destroyed them.

Under Eastwood's direction, the film is a complex exploration of the man behind the FBI. With memorable performances from Hammer, Watts and DiCaprio, "J. Edgar" is a film that does a great job of compressing 50 years of scandal into two and a half hours of film.

Some knowledge of the time's politics is almost required to understand some of the downplayed scandals and make for a more complete film experience.

Warrior to civilian life transition

This week's column is intended to assist my fellow members of the U.S. military, veterans and their families. There is currently a bombardment of political rhetoric and associated bureaucratic programs claiming the solutions for the transitioning military service members and veterans.

These claims of new programs and incentives for transitioning from military to civilian life due to limited or no resources are only partially true. Resources and incentives for transition from military service have existed since the time of the American Revolution.

Programs and incentives have increased and decreased since that time in our history. Additionally, the programs in existence since the 1990s are too numerous to count. There will always be room for improvement as long as the bureaucratic process is involved.

My focus is not the current bureaucratic problems; rather, it is to provide the reader with problem-solving information they may use individually or to help a family member.

I will use my own personal experience in the U.S. Army as a case study. During my military career, I spent approximately 18 years on parachute status – jumping out of perfectly good airplanes and helicopters.

This included extensive experience in the Middle East and east Africa. It included 11 out of 20 years in the U.S. Army Special Forces – Green Berets – including a six-month tour in Somalia from March 27 through Sept. 13, 1993.

My service in the U.S. Army taught me a great many skills and challenged my leadership ability in order for me to perform at my best. Needless to say, I was challenged physically, mentally and emotionally during that first 20-year career of my adult life.

I can definitely concur that the training I received in the U.S. Army more than prepared me for my military assignments, deployments and my current profession. The major skills utilized during my military service that resulted in a successful military career included leadership and leadership counseling, role modeling, mentoring, teaching and training.

Additionally, the challenges and commitment to mission accomplishment are essential to fostering a good work ethic.

In my opinion, I have listed the applicable combination of skills that all military service members should have obtained. These skills from a military career directly transfer to a civilian career.

Activity club kicks off first campaign

It's a proven fact that kids learn most of what they do through observation and imitation of those around them.

With parents having to work longer hours to keep up with the tough economic times, it may become more difficult for them to spend time with their kids.

Instead of just handing the kids over to be babysat by the neighbors or worse, electronic devices, try checking out what local after-school programs have to offer.

Activity clubs such as the Boys & Girls Club of Las Cruces has been trusted and respected in the community since 1963.

The club now helps more the 300 kids ages 6 to 18 every year become stronger adolescents through providing a good place to go after school.

More than that, the club provides positive role models parents can trust to lead games and activities, which promote strong physical and social growth.

However, they can't do it alone. The Boys & Girls Club of Las Cruces is reaching out to the community for help through its first Lend a Hand for Hope campaign.

"We're really trying to engage people and educate them about what we do here and the importance of having an activity club in the community," said campaign chairperson Kelli Burchell.

Burchell said the Lend a Hand for Hope campaign aims at "bridging the gap" for managing operational costs of helping these kids,

which are about \$3,700 per year per child.

"Even though there are scholarships out there for some, grant money is really competitive and really hard to come by in this area, especially in this economic climate," said Burchell.

Every little bit counts when it comes to activities the club provides, which include power hour (a time for homework and tutoring), sports, arts and crafts, computer skills, safety training, playground activities, field trips and daily snacks.

Compare that with challenges youth in Doña Ana County have to overcome which include gangs, poverty, pregnancy, abuse and lack of adult – especially male – role models, Burchell said.

There is never a dull moment at the club, thanks to the efforts of program directors such as Brian Johnson, who works hard to find the See Lend a hand on page D2

These jobs have been very rewarding and extremely satisfying. It is mission accomplishment when contributing to another person's success or coping with a difficult problem.

Regardless of the job a military veteran chooses, the skills learned in the military if applied – will result in post military or civilian transition success.

Just like in the military, civilian life brings new and different opportunities to excel in challenges. That is exactly what service in the military is all about.

In the military, I took an oath to "support and defend."

In civilian life, I maintain the same ethics and professional standards. If transitioning military service members and veterans apply these learned skill sets, they will maximize their opportunity for success in civilian life as well.

Flu prevention in the workplace

Don't lose days due to the flu

Flu season is upon us and that means runny noses, chills and body aches. For a small business and its employees, that can mean days spent home in bed or feeling sick in your office, which results in lost working hours.

Flu costs businesses approximately \$10.4 billion each year in direct costs for hospitalizations and outpatient visits for adults. The best prevention method is getting your flu vaccination. Everyone 6 months of age and older should get an annual flu vaccine, even if they were vaccinated last season.

In addition, there are some other tips you can follow to ensure you and your co-workers aren't knocked out by the flu. Staples offers these easy flu prevention tips to keep your workplace as flu-free as possible.

For employees

Most importantly, wash your hands frequently with soap and water for 20 seconds or use an effective alcohol-free or alcohol-based hand sanitizer if soap and water are not available.

Clean hands, either through washing them or using hand sanitizer, can lead to a 20 percent reduction in absenteeism in a workplace situation.

The Center for Disease Control (CDC) and other flu prevention sites say you should avoid touching your nose, mouth and eyes, so any germs you may have come in contact with in the office can't make their way into your body.

If you cough or sneeze, cover your mouth and nose with a tissue, or cough and sneeze into your upper sleeve. If your office has them, dispose of tissues in no-touch trash receptacles.

Routinely clean frequently touched objects and surfaces at your own work station such as keyboards and phones, to help remove soils containing germs. Why is it so important to clean these areas? The average desktop has 400 times more bacteria than the average toilet seat.

Clorox, a cleaning products provider, calls these areas "germ hot spots" and recommends you try not to use other workers' phones, desks, offices or other work tools and equipment. If necessary, consider cleaning and disinfecting them. It may make for an awkward moment when you wipe down a co-worker's phone before using it, but that's better than getting sick.

If you do begin to feel sick while at work, go home as soon as possible so you can minimize your co-workers' exposure to the flu, or whatever else you may have.

In a poll conducted by Staples last year, 85 percent of employees said they'd come into work even when sick, but 34 percent said they'd prefer it if their co-workers stayed home when they were sick. If you wake in the morning and feel sick, alert your boss.

More and more companies these days have flexible work arrangements, so if you can work from home, do so. Call your doctor to see if you need to schedule an appointment. Your doctor may be able to prescribe medicines to make the flu illness milder and shorten the time you are sick, which will get you back to work quicker.

For small business owners

If you own or run your own small business, you probably already know how the flu can affect production. On average, workplace absenteeism due to personal illness costs U.S. businesses \$230 per employee. If you're a small business of even 30 people, that means almost \$7,000 lost annually.

In addition to encouraging the flu vaccination for all your employees, it's also important to encourage effective communication throughout your company, according to Staples Advantage, the business-to-business division of Staples. Make sure you provide information on the importance of flu vaccination, proper cleaning and disinfection, flu facts and office wellness tips to employees and staff. If you have the available resources, spread the message about flu prevention with posters in the break room or handing out flyers in employees' mailboxes.

Also, make sure you're prepared. According to a survey cited by GOJO, makers of skin health and hygiene solutions, 25 percent of standard bulk soap dispensers have harmful levels of bacteria, so stock the office with appropriate hand sanitizers in areas identified as germ hot spots and consider hands-free soap dispensers in the bathrooms and kitchens.

Not only are these low-cost items, but they're actually better at stopping the spread of germs. Step up your cleaning program to more frequently clean commonly touched surfaces such as door handles and elevator buttons. The CDC says you should keep a full supply of tissues, soap, paper towels, alcohol-based

hand rubs and disposable wipes.

Finally, consider some flexibility in scheduling to let staff get their flu vaccination, stay home when they're sick, or work from home. Even though people should stay home for at least 24 hours when sick with the flu, the latest technologies, such as tablets, laptops and other home office solutions are making it easier for employees to be productive remotely.

Entertaining luxuries

Tall ceilings, various amenities make Southwest home a destination

Surrounded by contemporary creations in Denver, Daryl and Tamara Shepherd wanted their new home to reflect the unique architectural style of Las Cruces.

Hiring Paul Curry to build a comfortable yet elegant Southwest home in 2005, Daryl Shepherd, who owns Automotive Services of Las Cruces, said they chose the .28-acre lot at 3170 Eclipse Ridge Lane off Roadrunner Parkway.

"We wanted to live in an area that was close to schools and felt like a community," he said. "We saw this area and fell in love with it."

A curved arch leads guests into the front courtyard. Covered in tile, the space also includes a few plants among tan rocks. There is also a bench in the area to look out to the neighborhood.

The large, carved-wood front door includes copper detailing and leads guests into the home. Greeted by hand-textured walls and a 16-foot ceiling lavished in vigas and wood planks, a hallway splits into an L-shape, taking visitors to either the bedroom wing or shared living space.

In the bedroom wing, which is also accessed by the kitchen, are the three bedrooms. The two guest rooms are painted in a different color palette and include murals designed by a street rod pin striper at Automotive Services. The artist's work can also be seen along the home's two fireplaces.

Across from a full bathroom that features double sinks is the master suite. Large double

doors set inside an arch lead into the grand bedroom. Showcasing enough space for a TV or reading area, the room includes a tray ceiling.

The master bathroom, beside the walk-in closet tucked behind sliding mirrored doors, was designed to be a retreat with the double sinks set in granite and a shower accented

in tile and glass blocks. A jewel in the room is the claw-foot bathtub. Selected by Tamara Shepherd, the cast-iron bathtub is from the 1920s or '30s and was refurbished for the home.

"She wanted an old tub," Daryl Shepherd said. "A lot of bathrooms nowadays have jetted bathtubs, so this is something a little different."

Back near the entrance is a half bathroom decorated in a deep terracotta color. Even this small space includes a unique element – a metal sink bowl sitting on top of a stone countertop attached to iron legs.

Located in the back of the home is the living room. Also featuring 16-foot ceilings lined in vigas and wood planks, the

space was designed to reflect the Southwest styling. In addition to nichos surrounding the built-in entertainment center, there is also a kiva-inspired fireplace in the corner. The faux painting on the fireplace is designed to look as if brick was exposed, giving the space a rustic, Old World feel.

"All of the faux paintings were done freehand" Daryl Shepherd said.

That Old World influence continues to the game room, which is located off the living room. Enclosed behind large 100-year-old wood double doors Curry salvaged from an old church, the space was created to give the Shepherds a place to kick back and relax.

Capable of being used as an office, the room features a tray ceiling as well as stacked windows for natural light and laminate flooring.

A bar seating area in the living room looks into the kitchen. Designed by Tamara Shepherd, the space has everything she would need to work efficiently.

"She had this whole thing in her head," Daryl Shepherd said.

Coming from a large family that loves to entertain, the Shepherds included two of just about everything: two sinks, two garbage disposals, two dishwashers, two ovens, even two different types of granite – a slab of pink granite with dark speckles on the island and black granite tiles with large flakes along the countertop.

The hood, positioned over the stovetop and pot filler, was painted to resemble aged metal. The kitchen opens to the

dining room, which includes a second fireplace, adorned with Saint Pascual Bailón, a friar well-known for his work in Spain. If the kitchen is Tamara Shepherd's favorite room in the home, then the garage would be Daryl Shepherd's.

Accustomed to his four-car garage in his previous home, Daryl Shepherd had to make adjustments to his new, three-car garage. Instead of selling one of his beloved vehicles, he purchased a car lift, which allowed him to store and work on his street rods while keeping his everyday automobiles accessible.

While the 3,036-square-foot home offers various entertainment options, the fun doesn't stop inside. Tall doors – to match the high ceilings, Daryl Shepherd said – lead to the backyard.

A covered patio with a wet bar looks out to the lagoonshaped swimming pool. The area, surrounded by colored concrete designed to look like flagstone, also includes a hot tub, which features a waterfall into the pool. As with the front of the home, the rock landscape is speckled in native plants.

NMSU gets curbside recycling

Another effort in university's quest to be more green By Beth Sitzler Las Cruces Bulletin

On Oct. 12, residents of the Student Family Housing neighborhood on the New Mexico State University campus were awakened by a different sound - dump trucks carrying away their recyclables.

Although homeowners throughout the city have had access to curbside recycling since April, students at NMSU have just received the service. It is one of many ways the university is becoming more environmentally aware, said Greg Block, associate director of Housing and Residential Life at NMSU.

"The university had been looking at a lot of ways to make the campus more environmentally friendly," he said.

In 2007, former NMSU President Michael Martin signed the American College and University Presidents' Climate Commitment, which gave the institution tangible actions, such as waste minimization.

"We got to participate in Recycle Mania," said Art Lucero, manager of solid waste, recycling and custodian at NMSU. "It's a competition among colleges and universities around the nation. We've participated in it the last four years, and have placed in the top five universities.

He said these efforts included placing 400 recycling collection points in buildings throughout the university as well as supplying 3,500 recycling bins to every desk, which is picked up once a week.



Residents of Student Family Housing on the New Mexico State University main campus received curbside recycling containers from Southwest Disposal. The 300 containers will be picked up every other Wednesday and marks the completion of phase one of the university's four-phased plan to provide all student residents with recvclina.

"We've collected 5,000 pounds a day from just the offices," he said. "Also, since 2008, we've collected 1.6 million plastic water and soda bottles.

Placing No. 5 out of 203 universities in last year's Recycling Mania, Lucero said they were inspired to take their recycling efforts even further and he put together a request for proposal to bring curbside recycling to NMSU.

"We've now added the rest of the campus," he said.

"We have student residents asking, 'When can we participate in (curbside recycling)?" Block said. "Students coming in from places that have recycling programs want it.'

Working with Southwest disposal, Block said 300 blue recycling canisters were distributed to residents of Student Family Housing.

Offering pickup every other Wednesday, Roger Bristow, district manager of Southwest Disposal, said response to curbside recycling, which collect the same items as the city, so far has been positive. About 50 percent of the cans distributed were picked up during the first week of collection and almost 70 percent during the second.



"As people become more accustom to it, I think we'll soon see 80 percent of them participating," he said.

"In the housing office, we have students in other locations asking, 'When can we have it?'" Block said.

Block said their work isn't done - efforts to get recycling to campus residents has been divided into four phases, with Student Family Housing being phase one.

"Over the next year, we're going to go phase by phase so by next year, every (student living on campus) has access to some form of recy cling," he said.

Phase two, which should be implemented by spring break, will be bringing single-stream recycling dumpsters to all on-campus apartments - Cervantez Village, Vista del Monte and Chamisa Village - as well as the on-campus Greek complexes.

"The single-stream will mirror what the city is doing," Bristow said.

Phases three and four will include bringing the single-stream containers to Cole Village, the two-story housing complexes near Sam Steel Way, as well as all residence halls. Block said it is the university's goal to have phase four completed in August 2012 just in time for the beginning of the new school year.

"That means that everyone on campus all 5,000 plus people – will be covered," Block said.

After collecting about 1 ton of recyclables in its first month, Block said curbside recycling is here to stay.

"That's 1 ton of material that isn't going into the landfill," he said. "My hope is that the campus becomes more environmentally friendly. Every pound that doesn't go into the landfill is good for all of us.'

With each person producing 4.5 to 6.5 pounds of trash a day, according to Bristow, Block said teaching those young children who live on campus about recycling early will instill in them values they will carry throughout their lives.

De-fat your holiday gravy

Separator makes quick work of bothersome grease

Thanksgiving is less than a week away, and now is the time to perfect the dishes you plan on serving to your family and holiday guests.

While cranberry sauce, pumpkin pie and mashed potatoes are staples for the feast-themed day, one item that shouldn't be overlooked is the gravy.

Gravy is a thick sauce created from the drippings and juices that naturally run off meat when it's being cooked. Although many have their own tricks to creating lip-smacking gravy, most will agree that the homemade variety beats out store-bought or pre-package types.

Creating that gravy, however, can be a messy task that begins with removing the fat from the meat juice collected. This tedious job can be quick work if you happen to have a fat separator around.

What is it?

The fat separator, also known as the gravy strainer and soup strainer, is a utensil that allows liquid fat to be collected and removed from juices that are produced from roasted meats, stews, soups and stocks.

There are three types of fat separators: the pitcher-type measuring cup with a sharply angled spout opening out from the base of the cup; ladles with slots around the perimeter; and "fat mops," which have long, soft bristles made from plastic fibers.

Probably the most well-known fat separator, however, is the pitcher variety, which resembles a watering can. Some chefs believe this is the most authentic form of fat separator.

How does it work?

While in most recipes excess fat can be easily skimmed off the top, there are some dishes that make this task more difficult. This is where the fat separator comes in, no matter the variety.

Simply pour the liquid into the container and soon the fat will accumulate at the top of the contents, separating from the other juices. The fat and water won't mix because their molecular structures are incompatible and their electrical charges keep them apart. Also, because fat is less dense than water, it will float to the top.

After it has sat for several moments, simply pour out the juice. The spout located toward the bottom of the gadget will allow the liquid to be easily removed, just be sure to stop pouring when you reach the layer of fat.

When you're done, wash the fat separator by hand, using hot water and dish soap. Place in the dishwasher if the manufacturer says it's OK. It is important to wash the gadget immediately after every use to prevent any grease from building up.

Where can it be found?

The fat separator can be found at cooking supply stores, including Target, Walmart and Bed, Bath & Beyond.

How much does it cost?

The fat separator is a relatively inexpensive kitchen utensil. The pitcher variety can cost anywhere from \$7 to \$30, depending on its size, manufacturer and material. The ladle and mop types also vary in price, from \$5 to \$20.



Get color in winter Cold weather doesn't stop evergreens

Just because we're heading into the winter season does not mean we should be void of garden color. I don't mean flowers this time; there are some evergreen shrubs that will "flush" a red or purplish hue throughout the winter season.

Abelia "Kaleidoscope" has white flowers, with yellow and green leaves during the spring and summer months. During colder weather, the leaves turn into a beautiful red color. It grows between 2 and 3.5 feet tall and wide. It should be on a drip irrigation system, especially during the summer.

Euonymus "emerald 'n' gold" has a bright yellow and green leaf during the spring and summer months, then it turns into a purplish hue during the cold months. This one has no flowers and can grow up to 4 to 5 feet high and 3 feet wide. It can also be easily sheared into an easy maintenance ground cover.

The "emerald gaiety" euonymus has the same look as the emerald 'n' gold, but has white and green foliage. This one also takes on a purplish hue in winter as well. Both need full sun to help prevent powderv mildew.

The Youngstown Andorra juniper grows up to 1 foot tall with a 6 foot spread. Again, this one has greenish foliage up until the winter months, where it then turns into a plum color. This makes a great low-maintenance, droughttolerant groundcover that contrasts beautifully with its green and brown surroundings.

Heavenly bamboo, or Nandina

Domestica, is an old favorite that has been used in landscapes for many years. Although not a true bamboo as the name suggests, it does have the appearance of one, but can take considerably less water once it is established.

This shrub grows up to 6 to 8 feet tall and 2 to 3 feet wide. It has white flowers followed by orange berries. Its light green foliage turns to different shades of reddish orange to purple or plum colored hues. At times, the some hints of stubborn green foliage will linger during the cold winter months, thus adding even more interest.

Some cultivars have come from this plant such as "Sienna Sunrise," "Gulfstream," "Woods Dwarf" and "Firepower." All these hybrids have their own individual attributes, which vary from leaf color or leaf texture to more compact growing habits.

The Oregon grape holly, or "mahonia," has serrated leaves that turn purplish red during the winter. The new spring growth is bronzy red turning into deep shiny green. It has bright yellow flowers followed by dark bluish berries. The compact variety typically grows three to four feet tall and wide. The serrated leaves are very prickly and can be used as a "security" shrub next to low windows.

The shrubs listed above will definitely add winter interest to any landscape or garden. Perhaps shopping during the winter months for these beauties may prove quite fruitful.

Wondering about a cold winter?

Spy on a woolly bear caterpillar

It's not just groundhogs who can tell us how long the winter will last. Just find a woolly bear caterpillar and check out its coat.

The fuzzy caterpillar has an orange band around its midsection, and the two ends of its elongated body are black. Folklore has it that the amount of black versus orange can predict the severity of the coming winter.

According to legend, a banded woolly bear that has a wider middle orange section predicts a milder winter to come. Conversely, a narrow orange band is said to predict a harsh winter.

The woolly bear looks like it has its coat on, bundled up to endure unforgiving winter weather. But in reality, the caterpillar is only looking to do one thing all winter - take a nap until spring. The woolly bear is found during the fall months while it's preparing for the colder months.

While the woolly bear's coat may look fuzzy, it doesn't feel much like wool - these caterpillars are covered with short, stiff bristles of hair.

The caterpillar feeds on a variety of plants, and after getting enough to eat to get through the winter, it will find a protected

nook and spin a cocoon.

This insect is common throughout northern Mexico and the United States. The woolly bear is also found in many cold regions, including Antarctica.

There are many believers in the caterpillar's predictive power. But others go for the scientific answer that says the orange bands will grow while the black bands decrease in size as the larva matures, according to Iowa State University.

Come spring, the woolly bear caterpillar produces the Isabella tiger moth – an unusually colorful moth.

Whatever you believe, keep an eye out for these little fuzzy guys as winter approaches. It just might give you a hint whether you'll need to bundle up against a harsh winter.

Chile adds a fiery twist to traditional meal

Perk up jet-lagged, out-of-town Thanksgiving weekend guests with an "old-fashioned" Southwest Thanksgiving dinner meal.

It's all about chile, of course. Give Tom Turkey a spicy sweet rub with one of Bobby Flay's time-tested recipes. Then stuff Tom with a recipe that calls for double doses of corn (hominy and cob kernels) and chile (fresh green and red powder). Once Tom is ready to be plated, bring out the Southwest

'gravy" bowl – salsa loaded with cranberry and chile pods teased with orange zest. Serve the works with a side of green chile au gratin potatoes. And what's for dessert? How about rustic red chile pecan pie sprinkled with mozzarella cheese. (Warning: They may not want to leave town.) Happy Thanksgiving, chileheads!

Bobby Flay's 16 Spice Poultry Rub

Several years ago, Bobby Flay posted this poultry rub recipe on his website (www.bobbyflay.com). It received rave reviews. The different levels of chile heat, plus the addition of sweet spices, makes this autumn rub ideal for a Thanksgiving turkey. (And it's a breeze to prepare!) Store in a plastic container. Leftovers can be used to season chicken and pork.

- 3 tablespoons ancho chile powder
- 3 tablespoons pasilla chile powder
- 3 tablespoons ground cumin
- 3 tablespoons ground coriander
- 3 tablespoons ground ginger
- 2 tablespoons garlic powder
- 2 tablespoons onion powder
- 1 tablespoon allspice
- 1 tablespoon cinnamon
- 1 tablespoon ground cloves
- 1 tablespoon ground fennel seed
- 1 teaspoon chile de arbol, can substitute cayenne 3 tablespoons brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons kosher salt
- 2 tablespoons coarsely ground black pepper

1 teaspoon cayenne pepper (heat level: 8) Whisk all ingredients together and add the rub on a turkey and bake or grill. Makes 3 cups.

Easy Hominy Cornbread & Chile Stuffing

This stuffing recipe is easy to prepare and chockfull with our favorite pepper colors. Hominy and corn kernels add texture and lots of corny flavor.

1 pound prepared cornbread, cut in 1/2-inch cubes 1 can (15-ounce) whole hominy,

- thoroughly rinsed and drained
- 1 can (11-ounce) corn kernels, drained
- 1 can (4-ounce) mild, diced green chiles, drained 2 teaspoons vegetable oil, preferably corn oil
- 1 large onion, diced
- 1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning
- 1/2 teaspoon pounty seasoning1/2 teaspoon oregano, preferably Mexican oregano1 teaspoon New Mexico hot red chile powder
- 1 can (15-ounce) diced tomatoes,
- preferably fire-roasted, drained 1 can (10.75-ounce) chicken broth

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Toss cornbread, hominy, corn kernels and chiles on a large, rimmed sheet pan and bake for 10 minutes, until the cornbread is toasted on its edges. Toss and bake for five more minutes. Transfer to a large mixing bowl.

Meanwhile, heat the oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add the onion and sauté until lightly browned, about 4 minutes. Add poultry seasoning, oregano and chili powder and sauté 30 seconds, stirring constantly. Add tomatoes and

chicken broth and heat to boiling. Pour over toasted ingredients and toss to moisten. Cool before stuffing into the cavity of a 12- to 15-pound turkey. The stuffing can also be prepared in the oven; mound in a casserole dish and cook in a 350 degree oven for 20 minutes. Serve turkey with chilled Orange Jalapeño Cranberry Salsa (recipe below). Serves 12 or stuffs a 12 to 15 pound turkey.

Orange Jalapeno Cranberry Salsa

Sliced turkey slathered with cranberry salsa is a refreshing alternative to traditional gravy. Cranberry salsa also tastes good on mashed potatoes.

- 2 tablespoons orange peel
- 2 cups fresh cranberries, minced
- 1/4 cup onion, minced
- 1 tablespoon cilantro, minced
- 1 tablespoon fresh ginger, peeled and minced
- 1 jalapeño, stemmed, seeded and minced
- Salad oil to taste (optional)
- Mix the ingredients together. Makes about 3 cups.

Green Chile Tater Au Gratin Casserole

A Southwest Thanksgiving dinner isn't complete without a recipe for green chile potatoes. Rather than traditional mashed, give this au gratin recipe try. A pinch of cayenne pepper gives added kick.

1 medium yellow onion, diced

- 4 fresh medium to medium-hot green chiles, stemmed, seeded and diced
- 4 tablespoons of butter, divided 2 cloves of garlic, minced
- 1 teaspoon cumin
- 2 teaspoons salt (or to taste)
- 1 teaspoon black pepper (or to taste)
- A pinch of cayenne pepper
- 2 pounds of Russet potatoes, peeled and cut into small dice
- 1 cup heavy cream
- For garnish: 1 red jalapeno pepper,
 - stemmed, seeded and julienned

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a large cast-iron skillet, set on medium-low heat, melt two tablespoons of butter and then cook onion and chiles until onions begin to brown. Turn off the heat. Mix together the garlic, cumin, salt, black pepper and cayenne pepper. Add the diced potatoes to the skillet and mix with the onions and peppers. Stir in the garlic and spice mixture.

Pour the cream over the potatoes and cover skillet with foil. Bake for one hour.

After an hour, cut up remaining two tablespoons of butter and dot on top of cooked potatoes. Place skillet under the broiler for two minutes or until butter has melted and potatoes are starting to brown on top. Let casserole cool a bit and serve. Garnish with red chile. Makes 6 to 8 servings.



This Thanksgiving, consider New Mexico-style red chile pecan pie garnished with shredded mozzarella cheese.

Mesilla Valley Red Chile Pecan Pie

I'm not fond of overly sweet pecan pie, too much corn syrup for my liking. So when I came across this recipe, it caught my attention. No corn syrup but plenty of "sweet" pecans coated with earthy red chile seasoning.

2 eggs

- 1 cups brown sugar
- 1/4 cups white sugar
- 1/2 cups melted butter
- 2 tablespoons New Mexico medium to medium-hot red chile powder
- 1 tablespoon all-purpose flour
- 1 tablespoon milk
- 1 teaspoon bourbon or vanilla extract
- 2 cups pecans*, chopped
- 1 pre-made 9-inch pie shell (or make your own) Garnish: Shredded mozzarella cheese, if desired

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. In a large bowl, beat eggs until foamy. Stir in melted butter, brown sugar and flour. Mix thoroughly, then gently stir in milk, bourbon (or vanilla) and pecans. Pour into an unbaked 9-inch pie shell. Cover the edges with foil, and bake at 400 degrees for 10 minutes. Remove the foil, reduce the temperature to 350 degrees, and bake for about 20 to 30 minutes longer or until the center is set. (Insert a toothpick into the center of the pie. If it comes out clean, it's done. Recipe adapted from www.veggieobsession.com.)

*Chile seasoned pecans can be substituted. If you substitute, reduce red chile powder from 2 tablespoons to 1 or to desired red chile taste.

Our father was our biggest influence, he was such a hard worker," Georgette Malooly said. "He was an excellent salesman and a very good person."

"He had a restaurant, the flooring store, a

furniture store, a dairy and six kids," Barbara Malooly said. "He would work in the carpet store and then go to the restaurant at night.'

Learning hard work from their father, both girls ventured out of state for college. Georgette Malooly attended the University of Texas at Austin where she earned a bachelor's degree in liberal arts. She taught sixth-grade students at a school in El Paso for one year before rethinking her career choice.

"I didn't like it," she said. "I didn't have the patience to teach."

While Georgette Malooly tossed around the idea of becoming a stockbroker, her father convinced her to spend the summer helping him at the store.

"And I have never left," she said, adding that she officially took over the flooring store in 1980. "The minute I got into the business, I got my calling, I knew it was for me. I liked everything about it, especially the people. It's just a lot of fun to help them fix up their house?

Barbara Maloolv went to the University of North Texas in Denton, Texas. Earning a bachelor's degree in accounting, she began a 10-year career with a Texas utility company. In 1987, she decided it was time to head back to the City of the Crosses.

"I wanted to come help my sister," said Barbara Malooly, whose husband, Mark Quigg, also works at the flooring store.

While the two El Paso locations have recently been sold, Malooly's Flooring Co. has seen great expansion throughout the years, the sisters said.

"We started with one employee and one crew," Georgette Malooly said. "Now, we have nine employees and six crews.'

"Each crew has about two to three people," Barbara Malooly said. "So we employ about 27 people."

The rise in employment coincided with expansion at the store. Originally supplying only carpeting, Malooly's Flooring Co. offers tile,



wood, vinyl, laminate as well as area rugs.

"We had to adjust," Georgette Malooly said. "Carpeting has leveled off nationwide. People are using more hard surfaces. It's about 50-50 now."

Another popular trend is the use of green materials.

"There are a lot of new fibers out," Georgette Malooly said. "Carpets have become more pet friendly."

Manufacturers are creating carpets that are more durable and easier to clean. Tile and wood flooring, which have come down in price in the last few years, are also making great strides. Georgette Malooly said in addition to tiles designed to look like wood, using renewable materials, such as bamboo and cork, are also becoming popular.

There is carpet made out of corn," she said. "It saves 1 gallon of gas for every 7 yards (made). There is also carpet made out of recycled plastic bottles.'
