Honor Flight takes wing Last of WWII veterans fly to DC memorial

Before sunrise Wednesday, Oct. 5, 22 World War II veterans - including two women - boarded a bus with 26 guardians outside of the Pan American Center to take a trip of a lifetime

The veterans - members of the final flight to be comprised totally of WWII veterans were headed for two days in Washington, D.C., to see the WWII memorial and other sites in the fourth Honor Flight of Southern New Mexico, in which donations paid for the veteran's travel and stay.

For that support and opportunity to see the memorial, the veterans boarding the bus said they were grateful.

"I've been wanting to see the memorial since they opened it (in 2004)," said C.E. Evans, 86, of Cloudcroft, who was in the Navy from 1942 to 1970. "It's been a long time coming."

Likewise for Dee Gober of Hobbs, 78. "I've been ready to go since I first heard

Virgin Galactic plans Las Cruces operations Preparing tourism experience focus of office opening soon

Part of the state's spaceport deal with Virgin Galactic is that the company set up its headquarters in New Mexico, and Las Cruces appears to be that place.

Carolyn Winter, Virgin Galactic's head of travel and tourism, told the City Council Monday, Oct. 3, that the company will soon be opening an office in Las Cruces as the base of its operations in New Mexico. A location has been picked,

but Virgin isn't releasing it yet.

Virgin is ramping up its preparations for when the company begins flying tourists into suborbital space 70 miles above Earth's surface, perhaps even as soon as next year. The company is currently testing the carrier flyer and spaceship, which is launched in mid-air.

Winter said more than 70 flight tests have made of Virgin's first spaceliner, including 16 solo glide flights of SpaceShip Two, a six-passenger version of See Spaceport on page A10

Supporters seek to save Jemez casino Interior rejection 'premature'

Officials from Doña Ana County are calling on the Interior Department to reconsider its decision to reject an application by the Jemez Pueblo for an off-reservation casino in Anthony, N.M.

The Sept. 2 action by an Interior Department official that essentially killed the application was a "premature decision" said former Las Cruces Mayor Ruben Smith, an early supporter of the Jemez casino project.

Smith led a press conference Friday, Sept. 30, from the Anthony,

N.M., Town Hall that included Anthony Mayor Pro Tem Jim Scott, Mesilla Mayor Nora Barraza and Doña Ana County Commissioners Karen Perez and Billy Garrett.

The local officials said the decision was premature because all of them were preparing statements of support for the project due Oct. 25 for an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) on the proposal.

Barraza said the EIS process had promised to give significant weight to the wishes of the local community, but instead those wishes were given "no weight See Casino on page A14

Candidates stick to issues League forum gives glimpses at candidates

All 12 candidates gave their main positions and qualifications at a broadcast forum Tuesday, Oct. 4, sponsored by the League of Women Voters of Greater Las Cruces.

The forum started with candidates for presiding municipal judge with challenger Frank Chavez saying he would bring judicial temperament to the position, and incumbent Melissa Miller-Byrnes cited her experience as presiding judge for 12 years, resulting, she said, in Las Cruces developing a reputation as the most efficient municipal court in the state.

The second segment had the three candidates for mayor trying to gain the favor of voters citywide.

Incumbent Mayor Ken Miyagishima cited progress the last four years, which included the hiring of a new police chief committed to community policing, better reserves in city government accounts and stable employment.

Challenger Michael Huerta said he believes

the city can do better than it has, especially in attracting more jobs. He said the current council is still swayed by insiders.

Councillor Dolores Connor, who is seeking to unseat Miyagishima, emphasized not only her eight years on the council, but also her many community acitivities and involvement in state organizations.

Huerta said he is accepting no corporate money and has capped campaign donations at \$2,300, which he said is the same as state and national limits.

Connor said running for mayor is more expensive than her previous council runs, but that she hadn't received huge donations.

Miyagishima said he won't accept donations of more than \$500 and will never take money from a developer.

The forum gave candidates for the three City Council positions opportunities to give their stances on issues. For more on the City Council candidates, see the story on page A16 from the Las Cruces Association of Realtors forum held the day before.

Bad news gets top billing

Why are today's news folks so intent on reporting why everything going on around us is so terrible?

The 16 oz. glass sitting on the table in front of you contains 8 oz. of water. The age-old question is: "Is the glass half full, or is it half empty?

Psychologists tell us that pessimists tend to observe the glass woefully as half empty, and optimists, by nature, are pleased to see the glass as half full.

The reality is that the glass and the amount of liquid it holds is the same for everyone. It is simply 8 oz. of water in a 16 oz. glass. However, when different people mentally integrate their personalities and their life's experiences with what they have observed about the glass and liquid, they begin to reflect on the meaning of what they see. Then, when they report their observations to others, the information that is shared is biased, based on the individual's point of view.

Unfortunately, in today's world of super-speed, cyber information, it appears that most purveyors of news and information tend to be pessimists. Whether their perspectives are genetic or learned, either way, their attitudes have an impact as to how they see the world around them. And more and more, that perspective is that the glass is half empty.

An example is a CNN television news report last Friday. The reporter was commenting on what he characterized as "disturbing news" emanating from a poll of corporate CEOs in which 24 percent of the surveyed executives said their company was either planning or considering layoffs over the next year. The reporter went on to editorialize his comments by explaining what a terrible impact this would have on our already-fragile economy. In this case, the reporter was looking at a glass that was actually more than three-quarters full, yet he chose to only talk about the negative aspect of the 24 percent.

As I listened to this report, which was replayed every 30 minutes throughout the morning, my thoughts were that these comments were probably encouraging scores of investors to sell off their stocks, because, like in the classic children's fable "Chicken Little," the sky was probably going to fall soon. Wouldn't a better way of publicly reporting the survey have been for the reporter to say that more than three-fourths of corporate CEOs say that their companies planned to either maintain or expand their current number of employees?

I turned the television off and opened a copy of USA Today. Scanning the pages, I was drawn to a story about October being breast cancer awareness month. Thinking I was go-ing to read an article about the successful, national "pink" campaign, I was disappointed and dismayed to find that the story contained several comments that the cancer awareness campaign was bad because it was so successful that it was hurting fundraising efforts for other worthy causes.

So, rather than show how and why the cancer awareness campaign is so successful, and encouraging other similar organizations to follow the "pink" model, the article made it sound like the cancer awareness organizations were doing something wrong. Frus-trated, I put away my USA Today, vowing to read it in the future only for sports scores and statistics.

When Jaki and I started our company in 2003, we wanted to share the pride we had in the communities we served. At the Bulletin and our other community publications in New Mexico, we intentionally try to avoid looking at the world as being "half-empty." Our job is not to shock or scare our readers. Because of how we distribute our newspapers we do not rely on individual newspaper sales as a revenue source. We do not have to sensationalize our headlines to encourage more sales.

Our reporters are all skilled journalists who understand the importance, value and impact of what they do. We spend considerable time in evaluating our news and feature stories and headlines, and how they should be handled in each issue.

This is why we invest hundreds of inches of news space in the Bulletin for local charitable causes such as Tough Enough to Wear Pink and Cowboys for Cancer Research, and hope that others will follow their fine example of investing in our community. So far, our readers and advertisers have appreciated what we do, and as long as that's true, we will continue to see the Las Cruces area as a glass that is much more than half full. We truly believe, "Life is Good in Las Cruces."

Restoring the river

The recent news about a New Mexico company receiving \$14 million to restore 916 acres along the Rio Grande in Albuquerque suggests that the potential economic benefits of river restoration are substantial.

There's plenty of restoration work to be done in southern New Mexico and west Texas, where more than 200 miles of the Rio Grande has been channelized over the past century. The result has been the elimination of habitats, the disconnection of the river from its floodplain and the disappearance of two-thirds of the native fish species that once swam in the river, including big fish such as sturgeon, eels and gar.

Unfortunately, while millions of federal restoration dollars have flowed to the Rio Grande in central New Mexico thanks to the endangered silvery minnow, the river down south has been largely ignored. Hopefully that will change.

In the meantime, the Southwest Environmental Center and other groups will continue working to restore the Rio Grande to ecological health through projects such as the La Mancha Wetlands and Picacho Wetlands.

Gessing not serious

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Block scandal puts focus on PRC Problems continue to plague powerful regulatory commission

The latest Public Regulation Commission scandal should be enough to convince all concerned that something must be done.

There is no need to recount the litany of Jerome Block Jr.'s misdeeds or of those commissioners before him. You are likely as sick of them as I am.

The question is where do we go from here? It has become so bad that even PRC commissioners, Republican and Democrat, are willing to talk about changes. Legislators included the PRC in their discussion of government restructure last year, but the PRC wasn't particularly interested.

But this year, after two commissioners have had to resign due to felony pleas, commission members know they are on the spot.

One of the possibilities being discussed is to transfer of some of the PRC's many duties

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The PRC is a constitutional body, so any change will require a constitutional amendment. New Mexico voters aren't too keen about constitutional changes, but after years of problems, voters may be willing to shake things up.

It has been just 12 years since we last approved a big shake-up. That one combined the much troubled, elected Corporation Commission with the appointive Public Utilities Commission,

thereby combining regulation of all utilities, along with other extraneous responsibilities. Those include insurance, trucking, telecommunications, corporations, pipeline safety, towing, ambulances, limousines, taxis and the state fire marshal's office. That's quite a con-

glomeration of powers. In fact, New Mexico's PRC is one of the most powerful bodies of its type in the nation. It is governed by five commissioners who are not required to have any expertise in any of the areas being regulated.

the areas being regulated. A previous column talked about how many commissioners have been former legislators or other public officials. It also is a good launching pad for sons of high public officials. That, of course, includes Block Jr. whose father preceded him on the commission. Their terms were separated by Ben Ray Lujan, son of House Speaker Ben Lujan.

Talk also is being heard about making the commission appointive or partially appointive. There is no telling how partially appointive would work. A totally appointive commission is desperately needed.

We don't need politicos with scant backgrounds regulating these important industries.

... many commissioners have been former legislators or other public officials.

One solution suggested by PRC Chairman Pat Lyons is to require a college degree or maybe an advanced degree in order to run for the commission. It is not a bad idea.

As of Friday, Sept. 30, 17 applications had been received – with more sure to come – from those seeking to be appointed to Block Jr.'s seat on the PRC. The applicants are promising. Seven of the first 17 are politicos but seven also are engineers along with a lawyer and an accountant. Three have doctorates. Several also have experience in areas related to the PRC.

Gov. Susana Martinez promises to be thorough and deliberate in finding the best person to represent Block Jr.'s constituents. It is highly likely she also will be looking for a

well-qualified Republican who might have a chance of winning the seat in 2012.

But some of the politicos also are Republicans with good qualifications. The quality of Martinez's appointment might have some bearing on whether lawmakers and voters decide to relocate the commission under the governor.

This past weekend, Think New Mexico, a Santa Fe-based think tank, announced it has PRC recommendations to those mentioned above. I haven't seen its report yet, but the group does high-quality work and

is effective in getting its recommendations adopted.

It appears Think New Mexico wants to the commission to become appointive. That is better in terms of accountability, but it doesn't address the problem that voters just don't get adequate information about the candidates.

Too often they vote simply based on political party. Block Jr. was elected even after information surfaced about campaign finance irregularities.

Gov. Susana Martinez must stand up straight and tall and mean the words she says. New Mexico needs someone to do what is right regardless of the anger it causes. In her first year of her first term, it is time for Martinez to serve the people and not do politics as usual.

serve the people and not do politics as usual. What New Mexicans saw during the recent special session of the New Mexico Legislature was totally unacceptable. For the record, there is never a time when one branch of state government is supposed to punt its responsibilities to another branch of the government.

The leadership of the New Mexico Senate and House had no intention of constructing a real redistricting plan. They went through the motions, but no one expected a real plan to be sent to the governor.

Perhaps some individual legislators had that intention but not the leadership. For them this was preparation for the 2012 elections where each party will say the other party failed the people. It was all style and no substance.

Everyone knew the legislature was going to meet and then throw it to the judiciary. Why have a legislature if they are just going to throw their load to another branch of the government?

Likewise, the executive of the state cannot throw her responsibility to the judiciary. The governor needs to do something because it is right and not back away even though it will infuriate the members of the legislature.

She must not allow the legislators to do business as usual and then go home. They must be called back into session and kept in session until they act responsibly.

The New Mexico Legislature is tasked by

the New Mexico Constitution with redistricting. The governor is tasked with accepting their work or sending them back to work. The New Mexico Constitution was not designed to allow two branches of government to shirk their responsibility to the people.

The governor and the legislature represent the people, but the judiciary represents the government in the rule of law. Putting the legislative tasks on the judiciary means the will of the people vested in the legislature is thwarted.

What we in New Mexico have is a "workaround" to actually governing, where the legislators get together with absolutely no intention of finding a solution to redistricting.

Government should work by representatives doing the work they were elected to do. Martinez should call the Legislature back into session and keep calling them into session until they pass a real redistricting plan even if the legislature is continuously in session until Christmas and beyond.

The truth is that by opening day, Sept. 6, heavy lifting of the redistricting had already been completed and all that was left to do was to vote on one of the plans. Instead, there was nothing but delay until a final *sine die* ending. Neither the governor nor the leadership of the Legislature intended to do their duty to the Constitution. Shame on them.

How long would it take to do the mandated redistricting? Not long. The plans are ready. They have been chewed upon since last June. There are consultants and lots of advice. Yes, there will be some bruised feelings and some legislators will not be pleased.

People around the state were far more aware of the Legislature not doing what they were elected to do than in other years. The instant media was all over the story that there was little chance for a solution by and for the Legislature.

What was missing is leadership. Every member of the legislative leadership needs to be thrown out of office if they cannot get this task done. Good news, an election is coming. *Michael Swickard is co-host of radio talk show*





the two-seater that was the first piloted rocket vehicle to reach suborbital space in 2004.

The hybrid rocket engine that will be propelling the passengers and pilots is going through a series of tests, which Winter said she wasn't allowed to say much about for proprietary reasons.

Some 500 experienced test pilots have applied to fly for Virgin Galactic, she said. Meanwhile, more than 500 potential passengers have

put down deposits for the \$200,000 tickets, totaling close to \$16 million, she said.

British business magnate Richard Branson is investing more than \$200 million into development of the Virgin Galactic fleet, while the total start-up budget for Spaceport America is \$209 million. Located 45 miles north of Las Spaceport Cruces, America has a twomile runway ready for the flights and work is near completion on

the Hangar Terminal Facility that will house Virgin Galactic's fleet of spaceliners.

Winter said Virgin has already hired more than 100 people, many of them Americans, because large-scale rocketry falls under the International Traffic in Arms Regulations passed after the 9/11 attacks.

As work continues to make sure the spaceliner is safe for its passengers - with Branson and his family to take the first non-test flight the company is now focusing on preparing the on-ground experiences, said Winter, who has worked for Branson's resorts in the past.

Virgin plans to fly at least twice a day with each passenger arriving two days before their flight. Those passengers also are expected to bring family, friends and others during their visit, she said.

Virgin is currently assessing what kind of "tourism infrastructure" is available, she said, and talking to its future passengers about what

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kind of experiences they would like to have during their stays.

Wayne Savage, who chairs the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce's Commercial Space Committee, said his group is working on issues, such as supporting the tourism experience, but even more critical is trying to make the city a central location for providing supply chain services and other support of the spaceport operations and the companies like Virgin Galactic.

"The good news is that our spaceport is quickly becoming a functioning reality," Savage said.

Operational contracts have recently been awarded to companies that have done work with White Sands Missile Range, he said.

The next day, Pat Hynes, director of the New Mexico Space Consortium, Grant talked about the upcoming International Symposium for Personal and mercial Spr (ISPC Com-Spaceflight (ISPCS) to the Mesilla Valley Economic De-Alliance velopment (MVEDA). More than 500

people - including those key players in developing the private space industry – are expected to attend ISPCS Wednesday and Thursday, Oct. 19-20, at the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum,

4100 Dripping Springs Road. Hynes told those attending the MVEDA luncheon Tuesday, Oct. 4, at the Hotel Encanto de Las Cruces, that there are a number of opportunities for local businesses to make connections at ISPCS.

about it," he said.

Gober first tried to get a trip with the Texas Honor Flight organization, but the demand in the Lone Star State was always too great for him to get a seat on their flights. He recently contacted Honor Flight of Southern New Mexico, and now he's getting that ride.

Besides the WWII Memorial, Gober said he wants to see the memorials for the Korean and Vietnam wars, as well as the statue recreating the flag-raising on Iwo Jima.

"I want to see them for what they symbolize, especially Iwo Jima – that scene is such an icon, even the kids recognize it," he said.

Fredrick Yanker, 90, of Las Cruces, also started his long military career in WWII and

went on to serve in Vietnam, but he wasn't sent to Korea. The trip to the memorials is one he has been wanting to take for some time now.

"I'm enjoying it already," Yanker said before the bus even pulled out of the Pan American Center parking lot, which was lined with New Mexico State University ROTC students saluting the veterans.

Organizers said they believed this group should wrap up the last WWII veterans that they know of who have yet to visit the WWII Memorial. Future Honor Flights will be made up of Korean and Vietnam war veterans.

Premier pushes propaganda Krushchev revels in the USSR's early success in space

New Mexico Museum of SPACE HISTORY Celebrating the Spirit of Exploration!

The first rocket to boost more than one man into space was yet another victory against the United States for Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

For seven years, he'd gloated over the Soviet Union's triumphs, the latest when Voskhod I cosmonauts Vladimir Komarov, Konstantin Feokistov, and Boris Yegorov launched on Oct. 12, 1964.

Yet when they landed the following day, Khrushchev had been "toppled by a cabal led by Leonid Brezhnev and Aleksei Kosygin," reported "Epic Rivalry: The Inside Story of the Soviet and American Space Race."

Khrushchev was a "machine repairman in coal mines," according to the website www.notablebiographies.com, when he joined the Bolsheviks in 1918. Over the years, he increased his power in the Communist Party.

In 1953, after Josef Stalin died, Khrushchev became first secretary. His "dramatic, oftentimes boorish gestures and harebrained schemes (were) designed to attain maximum propaganda effect."

In 1957, the U.S. was in "a scientific race against time to launch the first man-made moon," as Life magazine described satellites in its June 3 issue that year. Life was reporting on the efforts to launch the satellite Vanguard "as a tool for discovery ... during the International Geophysical Year." In hindsight, the subtext is clear.

Life doesn't mention the Soviets, but the urgency was the Cold War space race, and America was losing. On Dec. 6, 1957, the first rocket booster carrying Vanguard – the first of several failures – "fell back to its pad and exploded" after only rising six

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inches, reported "Rockets of the World: A Modeler's Guide." Three months after the Life article, the Soviets tested their first ICBM, proving they had "attained both nuclear capacity and the means of delivery," said "Soviet Aviation and Air Power" (Air Force Historical Foundation/1977).

A month later, on Oct. 4, they acheived the launch of the world's first artificial satellite. Almost immediately, Khrushchev pushed engineers for the next triumph. They gave him Sputnik II. On Nov. 3, the craft carried the dog Laika into space, "a feat far beyond anything then attainable by American space engineers," said "On The Seas And In The Skies: A History of the U.S. Navy's Air Power."

In September 1959, the Soviets "reasserted their superiority in space by launching a rocket to the moon," John Glenn wrote in "John Glenn: A Memoir."

"Luna 2 crash-landed on the moon's surface, but as the headlines pointed out, it was the first man-made object ever to reach the moon. A month later, Luna 3 sent back the first pictures of the dark side of the moon. Khrushchev's boast that America slept under a Soviet moon sounded more threatening than ever."

On April 12, 1961, the Soviets launched Vostok I. Aboard was the first man in space, Yuri Gagarin.

"Not only had the Soviets put a man into space first, they had put him in orbit – something we didn't plan to do for several flights to come," Glenn said. Glenn told reporters, "They just beat the pants off us, that's all, and there's no use kidding ourselves about that."

Less than a month later, on May 5, NASA launched Alan Shepard. His suborbital flight "was greeted as a triumph around the world because it had been visible," Glenn said.

"The world had learned of Gagarin's flight from Nikita Khrushchev. It had learned of Al's by watching it on live television and listening to it on the radio. That openness was as significant a triumph in the Cold War battle of ideologies as Gagarin's flight had been scientifically."

On June 16, 1963, the Soviets launched Valentina Tereshkova, the first woman in space, aboard Vostok 6. Khrushchev personally chose her over two other women because "he liked Tereshkova's looks," as well as her working-class background, said "Almost Heaven: The Story of Women in Space." She and cosmonaut Valery Bykovsky, piloting Vostok V, "passed within three miles of each other," Michael Cassutt documented in "Who's Who In Space: The First 25 Years." NASA wouldn't accomplish such a tandem mission until 1965.

Tereshkova also spent three days in space, "accumulat(ing) more time in orbit than the entire US Mercury program of six manned flights," said "The Encyclopedia of Soviet Spacecraft." "The propaganda ... was tremendous," said the "Handbook of Soviet Manned Space Flight, Vol. 48." "Not so coincidentally,

an international women's conference was scheduled to meet in Moscow less than a week after her return from space. Tereshkova attended several sessions and was the obvious darling of the conference."

Khrushchev's delight of thumbing his nose at the West ended during the Voskhod I mission. The three-man flight was not just the "first space crew," Cassutt said; they were also the "first space travelers to do without spacesuits."

Voskhod had been modified from Vostok, a one-man capsule. So limited was space, "the crew did not wear pressure suits because with them they would not fit inside," said "The Soviet Manned Space Program." "They reportedly had to diet so they could squeeze into the capsule."

During a radio conversation with the orbiting cosmonauts, Khrushchev told them "their work would 'glorify our homeland, our peoples, our party, and the idea of Marxism-Leninism (by) which our state stands and (by) which we achieve all the things we have,' "Robert Zimmerman said in "Genesis: The Story of Apollo 8." But when Voskhod landed, Khrushchev had been ousted in a bloodless coup, in large part a delayed ramification of the 1962 Cuban Missile Crisis.

"President John Kennedy called Khrushchev's bluff, and the latter was forced to remove the missiles from Cuba, with great loss of face both at home and abroad," pbs.org said. "Khrushchev never regained his prestige."

The Soviets would achieve additional triumphs, such as the first man (Alexei Leonov) and woman (Svetlana Savitskaya) to walk in space, but Khrushchev would not be propagandizing. He died in 1971, at age 74, "in peaceful retirement, and was the only Soviet leader not to be buried in the Kremlin wall after his death," said pbs.org.

New Mexico State University announced Friday, Sept. 30, its Physical Science Laboratory is partnering with the United States Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency (DARPA) in developing and testing the agency's Vulture unmanned aerial vehicle program.

The Vulture II Program, a joint venture between DARPA and Boeing, is centered around a new type of UAV with a 400-foot wingspan, weighing just 5,000 pounds. The objective of the Vulture program is to develop and demonstrate the technology to enable an airborne payload to remain on-station, uninterrupted for more than five years, performing intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance and communication missions.

A mixture of solar cells and solid oxide fuel cells will power the vehicle. The system has potential in numerous roles: operation as a single platform, as a formation of multiple aircraft, or as a constellation providing infrastructure augmentation or recovery.

'This is really exciting," said retired Air Force Col. T. Bear Larson, who is NMSU's point of contact with DARPA. We think this is a great opportunity for you guys to see some of our technology and maybe help us out in areas that you are strong in. We love the facilities out here. Everything about this is exciting to me. This technology intrigues me."

The program technology enables a re-taskable, persistent pseudo-satellite capability in an aircraft package. It combines the key benefits of an aircraft - flexibility and responsiveness, sensor resolution, reduced transmit/receive power and affordability – with the benefits of space assets, such as on-station persistence, no logistics tail, energy independence, fleet size and absence of an in-country footprint.

"It's quite an extraordinary accomplishment that's going to bring plenty of attention to New Mexico State University and possibly similar agreements in the future," NMSU President Barbara Couture said. "The initial contract is for about \$2.5 million, and we expect, if this is successful, for more contracts to be down the road. This is a truly experimental aircraft. It's going to be a very exciting, unusual mission right here in our back yard in Las Cruces."

NMSU's PSL will be involved in addressing a variety of technology challenges for the massive UAV, including developing energy management and reliability technologies capable of allowing the aircraft to operate continuously for five years. The Vulture program will conduct full-scale technology maturation and demonstration activities to prove out critical technologies.

Its intent is to advance technology and break the mindset that aircraft are defined by launch, recovery and maintenance cvcles.

Program success would allow a continuous operating airborne platform to remain on-station for multiple years and would increase Depart-ment of Defense capabilities.

In addition, NMSU/PSL will apply their airworthiness assessment, risk analysis and excellent safety record with unmanned aircraft in developing a safe operation to minimize impact to other airspace users.

NMSU maintains the only FAA Authorized Unmanned Aircraft System Flight Test Center in the United States, allowing for UAS operations in the National Airspace System

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or civilian airspace. The NMSU/PSL portion

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of the project will continue through the conclusion of flight testing, which is expected to last into the third quarter of fiscal year 2014. DARPA determined that NMSU/PSL was the only entity capable of meeting the unique facilities, airspace and technical expertise required to oversee and conduct the flight testing of the Vulture while also meeting airspace, available frequency spectrum and takeoff and landing requirements.

"We're going to have a building ready in early 2013 and start assembling the vehicle out here," Larson said. "Our intent is to fly sorties of less than three hours to understand the airframe, and then start climbing in altitude, with the culmination a 30-day flight test to demonstrate it can fly.

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Then we'll bring it back down and do a forensic analysis on all the components."

testing at NMSU's Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) facility at the Las Cruces

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has given NMSU/ PSL permission to build the airport for the Vulture testing on its land at the Jornada Experimental Range, northeast of Las Cruces. The vehicle will require a 3,000-foot diameter circle for level takeoffs. USDA also partners with NMSU/PSL for its UAS program. They use a small UAS for their remote sensing program for ecological applications, including access to airspace, image acquisition, terrain extraction, orthorectification, mosaicking, vegetation classification, geometric and classification accuracies and operational workflows.

Formed though a partnership between the Federal Aviation Administration and NMSU, the UAS Flight Test

Center supports the integration of unmanned systems into the National Airspace System and operates the only FAA approved UAS FTC in the U.S. With more than 13 years of experience and expertise in UAS integration, operations and research and development, it collects data during unmanned flights in public, nonrestricted airspace to assist the FAA in the development of standards and regulations for UAS operators. The UAS FTC's agreement

with the FAA allows it to operate flights in more than 15,000 square miles of airspace in southwestern New Mexico.

Facilities include a 15,000-square-foot hangar at the Las Cruces International Airport dedicated to UAS operations; office facilities and technical support are available on the NMSU campus.

Governor signs bills

In-state preference rules get beefed up

Gov. Susana Martinez visited Jaynes Corporation in Albuquerque Wednesday, Oct. 5, to announce that she has signed a bill passed during the special legislative session that will close a loophole allowing out-of-state companies to receive a preference reserved for New Mexico businesses when bidding on state contracts.

The legislation will require businesses to be housed in the state and employ New Mexico workers in order to be eligible for a five percent advantage when doing business with the state and local governments.

"This important law will assist local companies and create a more competitive playing field for New Mexico businesses, Martinez said. "Making it easier for local businesses to succeed is a critical part of getting our economy back on track. By closing this loophole and creating a more favorable environment for in-state businesses, we will support companies that set up shop in our own back yard and hire New Mexico workers. I appreciate that the legislature recognized the need to provide our businesses with the tools to succeed and passed this bill unanimously through both chambers during last month's special session.'

Similar legislation received broad bipartisan support during the 60-day ses-sion, but an unintended drafting error was uncovered that would have subjected some private businesses to the state's procurement code. Martinez vetoed that bill and pledged to pass a clean bill during the special session.

Martinez also signed legislation to redraw district boundaries for the Public Education Commission.

at all" when the Interior Department official rejected the Jemez casino "on a technicality" that Anthony is too far away from the pueblo, which is located northwest of Albuquerque.

Barraza said Mesilla supports the Jemez project because the town – which depends heavily on tourists – believes it would see more visitors through the lure of a nearby Indian gaming casino. She noted that the Anthony casino planners estimate it could draw more than 7,000 people daily.

"It would be like having a big convention here every day of the year," Barraza said.

Scott said the majority of those elected to the board guiding the creation of New Mexico's youngest city support the casino because it would create thousands of badly needed jobs. He cited President Barack Obama's call on the need for job creation.

"These are tough economic times and we need to pull together to provide more jobs," Scott said.

Perez said the County Commission supported the incorporation of Anthony into a new municipality in anticipation that the casino project would get a fair hearing, which commissioners believed would have won approval because of commitments made by the pueblo to provide support for county services to the area.

If the Interior Department had concerns about the agreement, Perez said the commission was ready to renegotiate because it would still do much to improve the health care and education of those living near the casino, which is one of the poorest areas of New Mexico.

"We're here, in a sense, to talk about fair-ness," Garrett said. "We're here to talk about opportunity.'

Garrett said he was impressed by the level of support for government services the pueblo was willing to give to the community and he also liked that they would be hiring locally with opportunity for advancement.

In an area as poor and rural as the southern part of the county, such opportunity would give workers access and experience to technology in a real-world job setting, he said.

There are people here who really want to work and we need to give them the opportunity to do that," Garrett said.

Smith noted that the casino project won the support of the two most established chambers of

commerce in Las Cruces and would have likely earned a vote of support from the Las Cruces City Council had the EIS process not been stopped by the Interior Department decision.

In a formal statement following the press conference, the group issued a request for reconsideration, saying the project is "too valuable" to be rejected on the basis of a "technicality."

The statement noted that 36.7 percent of the people in Anthony, live below the national poverty line, a rate more than double the national average.

"The local officials agree that it is unacceptable and inexcusable for a project of this size and importance to be terminated before receiving all the facts," the statement said. "The Jemez Anthony casino project can make a positive difference in the quality of life for so many families currently struggling in two of New Mexico's poorest communities. We ask only that this proposal be given the consideration it was promised, and that Washington, D.C., deliver on the vow to fight poverty and increase opportunity in our nation's poorest communities

According to the statement, the Interior notified the Pueblo of Jemez in mid-August that the application for the casino was still at the regional level in Albuquerque, and dismissed the need for meeting with decision-makers in D.C. Pueblo officials spent Aug. 30 working with the staff at the regional office.

Then came the Sept. 2 ruling by Assistant Secretary of the Interior for Indian Affairs Larry Echo Hawk.

'The Department of Interior rushed to judgment and shut the project down on technicalities that can be overcome," the statement said. "There are more than a dozen factors involved in determining if the project is in the best interest of the tribe and its members, and not detrimental to the surrounding community. The opinions of the local elected officials should be given greater weight, and the regional office was in the process of collecting those views. The merits of this project bear greater scrutiny than has been afforded by circumventing the process that was initially established by the federal government, which has apparently now decided to ignore its own policies.

Smith said he believes that he will never see in his lifetime a single project such as the Jemez casino that could dramatically transform the economic opportunities for people living in southern New Mexico. And it would be job creation without spending any government money, he said.

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
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LCAR hosts opening forum for City Council elections Jobs, public safety, roads, quality of life among issues in three council positions

After being certified earlier Tuesday, Oct. 4, the six men and one woman running for the three Las Cruces City Council positions up for election participated in a forum sponsored by

the Las Cruces Association of Realtors. The issues ranged from concerns about jobs and public safety to wanting to preserve the quality of life in the city within limited revenues available.

In District 1, incumbent Councillor Miguel Silva said he ran four years ago during a critical time for the city's self-identity. He said the council then made decisions without public participation, and city government now operates with more involvement from citizens and with greater transparency.

Silva took responsibility for auditing the Las Cruces Police Department and seeking a formal inquiry into the cost overruns of the new City Hall.

Silva said he is a strong advocate for Downtown neighborhoods, such as the Mesquite Street neighborhood. When relatives come to visit, Silva said he wants Las Cruces residents to take them Downtown instead of Mesilla.

District 1 challenger Natalie Chadborn, who has a bookkeeping business, said she is listening to the residents of the district and they are worried about public safety. She said people are frustrated with the red tape at City Hall and fed up with the conduct of codes officers.

Chadborn said she believes in limited government, but with greater support for small business owners.

District 2 doesn't have an incumbent running as Dolores Connor isn't seeking re-election and is pursuing a run for mayor. Attempting to fill that seat are three candi-

Attempting to fill that seat are three candidates – Fred Espinosa, Charles Scholz and Greg Smith.

Espinosa, who has worked in sales and

customer service, said many in the business community don't feel city government does enough to be helpful in a down economy.

Espinosa said residents in the district are worried about public safety as his neighborhood has recently seen several break-ins. The Las Cruces police force has not kept pace with growth of the city, he said.

Scholz, who chairs the city's Planning and Zoning Commission, said he is running to make sure the city grows in a good direction in which the quality of life is retained while providing professional government services.

In going door-to-door, Scholz said he is hearing from residents in the district that there isn't adequate east-to-west crosstown access and they are against reducing University Avenue to two lanes.

With the district serving the student population attending New Mexico State University, Scholz said there needs to be more rental apartments available.

Scholz said the city Parks & Recreation Department is very underbudgeted, and poor park conditions hurt the quality of life in the area.

Smith said he chose to live in Las Cruces and has been active in efforts to improve the community, especially Downtown revitalization, which he said is key to the city's future.

If elected, Smith said much of his focus would be on job creation.

"The city can't create these jobs, but it can create an environment to make those jobs happen," he said.

One economic opportunity that has promise is support work for Spaceport America, Smith said.

Smith noted the city has a lot of unused land, much of it is publicly owned. He said the city should find ways to put the land it holds to good use.

In District 4, Aaron Diaz is challenging incumbent Councillor Nathan Small.

Diaz cited his family's long ties to the community and that he would listen to his neighbors for "tempered growth" that also includes making "Las Cruces business-friendly once more."

City government needs to get back to providing good basic services, Diaz said, and providing solutions to problems

Diaz agreed parks and recreation is one of the most important departments in the city because it serves primarily youth and that it should be well-financed, but not through any kind of tax increase. Perhaps, Diaz suggested, some of the lodger fee – which he called a "bed tax" – paying for the convention center could go back into parks and recreation facilities.

Small said much of his focus the past four years has been fighting for making improve-

ments to existing neighborhoods. He noted his district is now seeing road improvements and progress on the El Molino drainage project.


"I think we've done a lot in a really difficult time," Small said.

The district also is seeing new business, such as the new Tractor Supply Co. on Picacho Avenue, as well as the Pro's Ranch Market arrival to El Paseo Road.

Small also touted Sapphire Energy's arrival to the West Mesa Industrial Park and the growth of unmanned aircraft at the Las Cruces International Airport.

On some issues, most of the candidates were on the same page, such as being against the city taking over Moongate Water Co. through an eminent domain condemnation process.



Hazards include five lakes and 76 bunkers. The course covers 200 acres and is noteworthy for its links-style features, its rolling and generous greens, and its challenging yet spacious design.

Currently, the golf pro emeritus is PGA Master Professional Bill Eschenbrenner.

Alan Salter, certified golf course superintendent, is and Red Hawk's head superintendent. As director of golf instruction, Joey Castaneda brings to Red Hawk more than 15 years of experience in the golf business, most notably as assistant golf professional at Paa-Ko Ridge Golf Club and at Picacho Hills Country Club.

The course offers standard rates of \$30 to \$40 depending on the day of the week and a discount for seniors 65 and older, active military, students and twilight tee times. The course also has monthly passes for sale – \$195 per person, \$285 per couple or \$365 for a family. The pass includes unlimited golf, but tee times are still required. The pass also entitles holders to tee times eight days in advance – the normal amount of days is 15 – free clinics for adults and juniors, special club fitting and discounts on golf shop merchandise.

Range balls are \$4 for a small bucket and \$7 for a large bucket. Pricing for green fees and cart rental for 9 holes is one-half the pricing for 18 holes. Student pricing is available only for full-time students under the age of 30; a current student ID is required. Carts are mandatory for tee times through noon. NASA workers donate tons of food White Sands Test Facility delivers to local food bank

With food banks facing severe shortages of nonperishable items, federal employees nationwide were challenged to step up and meet this need by gathering 2 million pounds of food for hungry families.

Johnson Space Center (JSC) challenged its employees to donate enough food to match Space Shuttle Endeavour's payload of 28,951 pounds.

JSC's White Sands Test Facility (WSTF) joined the Feds Feed Families Program with a food drive campaign that Sandy Ruttle, Hardware Processing Office chief, officially kicked off June 1.

"Our program will help local food banks and shelters such as Casa de Peregrinos, Jardin de los Niños, La Casa, Roadrunner Food Bank and the Children's Crisis Center," Ruttle said.

Kathleen Franklin, the Hardware Processing Office's administrative assistant, organized the food drive at WSTF and delivered the collected food each evening to local agencies. After each food delivery, Franklin requested a new list of foods the organizations needed and asked for these items or quantities from her co-workers. "If we had enough food for 26 children

when there are 55 children in need, then I would be disappointed," Franklin said.

Contractor employees in WSTF's Construction Maintenance and Operations (CM&O) section stood in total agreement with Franklin. With 54 employees, the CM&O section donated 26.5 pounds of food per person.

food per person. "I feel strongly about helping others," said Eddie Rodriguez, a general maintenance mechanic in the CM&O section at the test facility. "We have good jobs and good health, and we should share with those who don't."

Franklin attributed her success to simply asking.

"I have requested donations from every one of my coworkers," she said, "and the CM&O group has proven to be the heart and soul of the test facility, not only of this campaign, but also of our site's daily operations."

Franklin's strategy of "asking" paid off. When the food drive ended Aug. 26, WSTF employees had donated a total of 16,087 pounds of food, which pushed the joint amount raised by JSC and WSTF far past the 28,951-pound goal for the 2011 Feds Feed Families program. In August, 10,851 pounds of food was donated by WSTF employees.

"Everyone's donation is appreciated, but mention should be given to the eight Oxygen Group members, who averaged 223 pounds per person," Franklin said.

"White Sands Test Facility, thank you for your amazing effort. We are grateful for your diligence in this project," said Lorenzo Alba Jr., executive director for the Casa de Peregrinos Emergency Food Program.

That's what the back of her T-shirt said: Peace – Love – Aggies. NMSU student Holly Bond bought the

T-shirt somewhere other than Las Cruces, she said, but when she saw it, she knew she had to have it.

"I thought it was perfect," Bond said. Perhaps Bond is onto something. At the present moment, peace and love do reign with the Aggies, as both the football and volleyball teams crushed the UNM Lobos this week.

The volleyball team boosted its record to 14-4 after beating UNM in an intense four-set match Oct. 4. The Aggies will go on the road for two matches then return home Wednesday, Oct. 12, to face arch-rival Hawai'i, perennially the most dominant team in the WAC.

The team hopes to break the all-time attendance record of 7,115 set in 2005. If you've never seen an NMSU volleyball match, you need to go. No, seriously, you need to go. College volleyball is an excit-ing, fast-paced sport and the Aggies are

good. They are very good. The football team, now 2-3, shellacked UNM 42-28 in Albuquerque on Oct. 1 with a balanced offensive attack led by quarterback Matt Christian's 296 passing yards, 101 rushing yards and four touchdown passes, all career highs. Christian earned the WAC Offensive Player of the Week honor for his performance. The Aggies started fast, scoring touch-

downs on their first three drives to take a 21-0 first quarter lead. Christian was 7-of-7 for 150 yards in those three drives, and finished the night 16-for-27, hitting six different receivers, four of them for touchdowns. Kenny Turner had 109 rushing yards as the Aggies rolled up 538 total yards.

What was most impressive in the Aggies' win was their ability to put together a number of sustained offensive drives. They had touchdown drives of 97, 90, 80 and 72 yards. On three occasions, they had drives of a dozen plays or more, including a 13-play, 8-minute drive in the fourth quarter. Even though the 46-yard drive did not result in a touchdown, it kept the ball out of UNM's hands for the better part of the quarter.

Christian gave credit to the offensive line for making those drives possible.

"The O-line is playing really well right now," he said. "When we go for 10 or 12 plays, that's the O-line."

Offensive coordinator Doug Martin said Christian ran both play-action passes and the option well at UNM. He said Christian's "mobility" was a big factor in the success of the offense.

NMSU's goal is to be a 30-point offense, Christian said. The UNM

NMSU soccer hosts Nevada in WAC home opener Oct. 9

If you think the New Mexico State University soccer team is in a rebuilding phase, first-year coach Blair Quinn would like to disagree - politely, he said.

"We are in it to win right now," he said. "Our bare-minimum expectation is that we will qualify for the WAC tournament."

The soccer program is in its third year. NMSU surprised many in its first year by making it to the WAC tourney, which takes the top six teams from the conference. Last year, the Aggies fell short. Quinn said NMSU soccer has

a "whole new style of play compared to last year.

In a nutshell, the new style can be described as "putting it up the middle," he said. Using a 4-3-3 formation with four defenders, three middle fielders and three forwards, the Aggies rely heavily on the middle fielders to control the flow of game, he said.

Quinn said throughout the sea-

son – the Aggies are 7-5-1 overall and 0-1-0 in the WAC – the team has been building its defensive blocks. In addition, with six players at the front in the 4-3-3, the Aggies have also been attacking a lot more, he said. In practice this week, he said he has been working with the team to take more shots and to take higher-quality shots.

"We are trying to score goals," he said. "We've been in a little bit of a rut."

The Aggies have lost two games in a row to New Mexico and Loui-siana Tech. They hope to get back on track Friday, Oct. 7, when they travel to Logan, Utah, to take on Utah State. They will host their WAC home opener against Nevada at Aggie Memorial Stadium at 1 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 9.

Nevada is a good team that has played a tough schedule this year," he said. "The Wolf Pack has faced such top-tier teams as UC-Santa Clara and Penn State.

'We have to be ready to play well," he said.

Volleyball powerhouse comes to Pan Am

When you go to the Aggie-Hawai'i volleyball game Wednesday, Oct. 12, you'll probably notice Meredith Hays making a lot of shots. If you are sitting in the front row, you might want to be careful because her kill shots come sizzling across the court faster than you can think.

The 5-11 freshman from Hereford, Texas, hits the volleyball with such force and topspin that she has become the Aggies' go-to outside hitter.

In NMSU's Oct. 4 win over the UNM Lobos, Hays took more than 40 percent of the team's shots (60 out of a total of 145)and 20 of them were kills. As of Oct. 2, Hays ranked first in the Western Athletic Conference and 27th in the nation with 4.21 kills per set.



"I'm going to miss her next year." Kuester has seen a lot of things in her collegiate career, from a 60-game


schedule at IWCC complete with 12hour van rides, all the way to playing a match at the University of Hawaiʻi.

Smart and smarter will beat dumb and dumber every time

Play to your capabilities and don't give up



Folks sometimes ask for my help in getting around the golf course with fewer mistakes. "I just don't make the kind of scores that I ought to," they complain.

So I've been thinking more about the issue of how to play smarter. In golf, as in football, sports and even life, avoiding needless mistakes is a good thing. The term "course management" has come

The term "course management" has come to signify the proper use of smart strategy and the decisions a player makes during any given round. When it comes to cutting strokes off your score in the quickest way possible, better planning and positioning your shots will do it.

The main object of golf is to play all nine or all 18 holes in the fewest strokes possible. Often that task involves not only making good golf swings and good golf shots, but also making good decisions on what club to hit and where to hit the ball. Conventional coaching wisdom now is seeking to switch off the brain in golf, but I say that making intelligent decisions well before you swing the club will pay great dividends. Don't stop thinking; simply think at the right times.

There are multiple factors, of course, that affect the outcome of any given shot – and any given round of golf. Most of the factors are within our own control. But some are not.

Bounces can be good, bad or indifferent. Luck can be good or bad. The ball can come to rest in a good or bad lie. A wind gust can come up or lay down at the moment of impact. Distractions and noises come and go. Cups can be cut in the ground with precision and respected by the other players, or they can be cut haphazardly and damaged by clumsy sloths, causing the ball to lip out.

But for the most part, you and I control how we golf our ball around the golf course. Here is some advice for playing your golf course – or any golf course, for that matter – in the fewest strokes for you.

Let's say you hit your ball into the bushes, and you have a couple of options. Of course, there are always options or choices. You can chip out 20 yards sideways and have 180 yards to the target. Or you can take a much riskier, more direct line, leaving 100 yards.

I say, if the risk is serious, chip out, take your medicine, and then hit. A lot of highhandicappers compound their mistakes in these situations. First, they don't size up the risk with the escape shot. Second, they don't think in terms of options. Then they often try to hit a shot that's not within their capability.

Let's say you face a shot to the green that has a 210-yard carry over water. You hit your three-wood 215. What do you do?

My usual answer, in this and many other things, is "It depends." If you can hit the big shot nine out of 10 times, go for it. If it's a match with nothing to lose, go for it. If it's a stroke tournament, where a mistake can be very costly, realize that you would have to pull off the perfect shot to stay dry. You're not Tiger Woods, hit the safe shot and lay up – and be sure to aim safe. Smart-golf-challenged players don't check their aim and alignment carefully enough. Last week I had a good lesson in course management, when I miss-hit a tee shot and found the ball buried in the steep face of a fairway bunker. Rather than try to hit a low-chance shot out of the bunker directly toward the green, I hit it out sideways to the fairway, and then hit a short wedge shot to the green. I then made the putt to save par, and won the hole.

If I had tried to hit the "miracle" shot from

the bunker I probably would have been looking at seven or eight. In that case damage control was the strategy. Always know the situation.

Another, less dramatic, aspect of course management has to do with simply playing intelligent shots. That means noticing bunkers and irregularities in your line. Chipping safely. Staying out of awkward places. Choosing clubs that are easy, not hard, for you to hit. Better to advance a seven iron 120 yards than top a three wood 30 yards.

Here are a few key principles and learning "takeaways" for smart course management.

- Know your personal capabilities and play within those capabilities.
- Enhance your awareness and size up the situation properly and realistically.
- Quickly factor in at least three choices that you have for every play.
- Manage yourself and your emotions, not just the golf course.
- Think in terms of probabilities of success or failure; risk and reward.
- Be keenly aware of where to miss and where not to miss.

As Herb Wimberly and I work with some higher handicap golfers in our Performance Golf Schools, we often notice they are reluctant to really change what they are doing, even when it clearly isn't working. Just recently I watched a fellow hit a nice

Just recently I watched a fellow hit a nice drive to a slope in the middle of the fairway. From an obvious downhill lie he took out his sand wedge and hit well behind the ball, advancing it only a few more yards.

A very difficult shot, to be sure, but what amazed me is that this gentleman proceeded to try the same thing three more times, with no success. He could have turned an eventual eight into a five by simply running the ball up to the green along the ground, perhaps with a threewood or a putter. If we really don't know how to hit a certain shot, let's accept it for now, and use an alternative method. Let's avoid self-sabotage.

Pro golfers do what is commonly called "grinding." Grinding is where you focus all your effort and intensity in getting it up and down for the best score possible in that situation. When you miss the green, or hit into a bunker, or have to play from an awful spot, you just need to keep grinding to eke out a par. It seems to me the secret to grinding is not to give up on the hole.

Sometimes grinding means taking your medicine, without worsening the matter, and don't give up on the hole. Keep your focus, stick to your routine, look at the options and stay patient. Try to make the best play you possibly can, and accept what happens as a result. You have to be a grinder – a smart grinder – to win. Some folks become totally amazed at "miracle" par saves, but in reality they are witnessing a failure to quit.

To turn yourself into a smart, winning golfer, you sometimes have to take "par" out of the equation. In some ways par is a fictitious number or concept, representing mostly a way to classify golf holes as to their length and difficulty. Your task is to play each shot as intelligently as you can, and each hole in the fewest number of strokes – "par" notwithstanding. At times that means keeping your ball near

At times that means keeping your ball near the ground and not out of position, making sure your next shot is easier than the last. And lastly, you should avoid focusing on the scorecard. You play 18 holes and add up the score at the end – not in the middle.

Country singer Rodney Atkins has it right in his hit song "Tips:""It's not about keeping count of what you got; it's about making what you got count."

"Insanely competitive."

That's the phrase New Mexico State University cross country coach Meaghan Harkins used to describe this year's men's and women's teams.

"This is the best team we've ever assembled, both men's and women's teams," Harkins said. "We have not even scratched the surface."

On Oct. 1, the women's team placed seventh and the men's team 10th at the Oklahoma State Cowboy Jamboree - an impressive showing against some of the top teams in the region. The Aggies were led by a pair of siblings on

both the men's and women's teams.

Courtney and Camilla Schultz, twin sisters and redshirt juniors, placed sixth and 12th overall, respectively. On the men's side, brothers Jonah and Ian Ruybalid were 49th and 63rd.

Courtney Schultz kept pace with several all-America athletes, Harkins said. Both Courtney and Camilla have been on the verge of qualifying for the NCAA championships since their freshman year.

Harkins said the team is hoping to improve on last year's showing in the WAC championships. The men ran second and the women third in 2010. Harkins expects Idaho and Utah State will be the toughest competitors on both the men's and women's side. The NMSU women's team took the WAC in 2009, and they would like to recapture the title, Harkins said.

Harkins said she has been working to raise the level of intensity on the cross country team since she and her husband, Paul Harkins, took over the program five years ago. Paul Harkins accepted the head coaching job for the Yale University men's cross country team this year, so Meaghan Harkins said she has twice as much work to do, but she doesn't mind.

"I believe in this team," she said.

In addition to instituting both rigorous strength and speed conditioning, Meaghan

Harkins said she expects members of the team to commit to running as a total lifestyle.

"It has to inform everything they do on a daily basis," she said.

The NMSU cross country team has been built from the ground up, she said, into one of the best teams in the WAC.

"We've been raising the level of expectation," she said.

The Aggies will travel to Goodyear, Ariz., on Sunday, Oct. 8, for the Grand Canyon Invitational.

The team then travels to Terre Haute, Ind., for the Pre-National Meet Oct. 16 before the WAC Championships in Honolulu Saturday, Oct. 29. The NCAA Mountain Regional follows two weeks later in Provo, Utah, Nov. 12.



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New book showcases the humanity in the disabled Book signing and reading set for Friday

A book signing of the new poetry and essay collection, "Beauty is a Verb: The New Poetry of Disability," co-edited by staff member Sheila Black at New Mexico State University, will be held at 1 p.m. Friday, Oct. 7, at the Barnes & Noble Bookstore at NMSU.

"Beauty is a Verb" was published by Cinco Puntos Press of El Paso and was released Sept. 25. It will be sold at the Barnes & Noble Bookstore at NMSU.

Noted critic Ron Silliman recently wrote that the book is "going to be one of the defining collections of the 21st Century." An anthology of poetry by American poets with physical disabilities, the poems and essays in the collection consider how poetry, paired with the experience of disability, speaks to the poet and impacts his or her poetic practice. The work also contains poems and an essay by Kara Dorris, an alumna of the NMSU Master of Fine Arts program in creative writing.

Black, senior prospect research coordinator for University Advancement and co-editor of the book, said disabilities are often misunderstood or ignored in society. Disabilities often affect how a person is viewed, but that does not mean the disability defines the person, Black said.

"Disability doesn't have to be seen as a trag-edy," Black said. "The stories in this book are compellingly beautiful. They show how imaginative and adaptive people with disabilities are and also how, in many ways, disability can present a profound shift in perspective – a shift that is often enlarging." Sections of the book also will be read dur-

ing the 18th annual Casa de Peregrinos Hunger Benefit at 5 p.m. Oct. 7 at Beverly Hills Hall, 150 Hermosa Ave.

Every fall, La Sociedad para las Artes orga-



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nizes a benefit reading for Casa de Peregrinos, an emergency food bank in Las Cruces that feeds thousands of hungry people each year. The event will

feature live music, carnival games, a cash bar and book readings. Black; Jennifer Bartlett, co-editor of the book; and

Jim Ferris, well known poet and

author of "The Hospital Poems," and others, will present readings during the event. The benefit is a really great opportunity to

come out and have fun for a good cause," Black said. "It also gives people the chance to understand different types of experiences they might not have understood before."

One of the main messages of the book is

that people should not be reduced to their disabilities. The public should not be afraid to ask questions and learn more about disabili-

ties, Black said. "I hope reading the book will expose people to radically new perspectives on disability, a little like visiting a new country,"



State engineer to change jobs Search begins for new boss over NM's water

State Engineer John D'Antonio Tuesday, Oct. 5, announced his resignation after nearly nine years as New Mexico's top water official. "I have deeply enjoyed my tenure as state engineer and I

Thave deeply enjoyed my tenure as state engineer and I feel that I and my colleagues have greatly improved the office and made tremendous progress on the big water issues facing New Mexico," D'Antonio said. "I remember with particular satisfaction our work on Indian water rights settlements – and relations with tribes and pueblos in general, adjudication advancement – particularly in the lower Rio Grande, and implementation of the Pecos Settlement, domestic well regulations and active water resource management."

D'Antonio announced he was taking a position with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in its Albuquerque office as the deputy district engineer for programs and project management. He will stay on as state engineer for 30 days while Gov. Susana Martinez designates a successor.

"I will do everything I can to ensure a smooth transition for my successor," D'Antonio said. "I feel very strongly that having the office of the state engineer competent and impartial in its administration of state water law serves the interests of all New Mexicans."

A Republican, D'Antonio was appointed state engineer by Gov. Bill Richardson in 2003 after serving in the position as cabinet secretary of the New Mexico Environment Department under the Lyndon B. Johnson Administration.

The Office of the State Engineer is charged with administering the state's water resources. The state engineer has the responsibility to allocate, measure, administer and oversee the distribution of all surface and groundwater in New Mexico, including streams and rivers that cross state boundaries. The state engineer is also secretary of the Interstate Stream Commission.

"I'm grateful for Mr. D'Antonio's service as State Engineer and the important work he has done on behalf of the people of New Mexico," Martinez said. "As we navigate the many water issues that are central to our state, it's important that we thoughtfully and deliberately work through the process of selecting a permanent state engineer."

"Gov. Martinez has received applications from a number of highly qualified candidates for the state engineer position," D'Antonio said, "and I'm confident that she will select a long-term replacement that will serve the best interests of all New Mexicans."

Apple announces new tech

Apple is taking over the world, and a recent iPhone event on Tuesday, Oct. 4, reaffirmed that thought with the announcement of new products by CEO Tim Cook. (Former CEO Steve Jobs retired in August due to his declining health and passed away Wednesday, Oct. 5.) Sources say Cook has limited cha-

risma on stage in comparison to Jobs, but nonetheless "he is comfortable on stage" as he started announcing updates on current products, including the much anticipated iPhone 4 replacement. Cook gave a few startling statistics,

such as use of iPads in schools and iPhones in Fortune 500 companies, but the real fun (for me) was the announce-ment of new Apple features, software and product updates.

The conference announced that more than 93 percent of Fortune 500 compa-nies are testing the iPhone. Also, every state in the U.S. has, or plans to have, an iPad pilot program.

Apple is also pushing iCloud, a tool that connects multiple Apple devices in regard to storage and projects. For example, if you are working on your Mac and downloading an album, the software would provide an easy switch if you were to go mobile and switch to an iPad. As for the iPhone, Phillip Schiller, se-nior vice president of Worldwide Prod-

uct Marketing and reports to Apple's CEO, announced a new one – the iPhone 4S – that is said have a thinner body and clearer picture. "Don't be deceived," Schiller said. "In-

Despite rumors, the conference did not discuss a release date for the iPhone5.

Nonprofit begins fifth contract with local missile range

Working with the AbilityOne program, Tresco Inc. has placed more than 80 workers at White Sands Missile Range, providing custodial and ground support. This contract has doubled its presence at the base for a total of 135 employees.

AbilityÓne is a federal program that was established to promote employment for people with disabilities.

Today, the program operates two central nonprofits – NIB and NISH – acting as liaisons between federal community rehabilitation programs and nonprofits.

"To participate in the program, organizations must be a nonprofit and have a mission that supports employing people with disabilities," said Pam Lillibridge, president/CEO of Tresco Inc. "There are about 600 of these organizations and 47,000 people in the program.

But the work being done in southern New Mexico is unique.

Tresco has five contracts at WSMR, including its most recently enacted contract that began Saturday, Oct. 1.

"Most of our contracts are for custodial work," said Scott Launer, director of WSMR contracts for Tresco. "We provide services to the (Bureau of Land Management) recreation and restroom areas and Las Cruces City Hall."

Since 2006, Tresco has provided custodial grounds services at the Dripping Spings, Baylor Canyon and Aguirre Springs recreation areas east of Las Cruces. The contract is valued at \$40,000 per year and employs three individuals.

The first contract between Tresco and WSMR began in 1989 and is valued at \$330,000. The contract employs 12 people. Tresco followed that with a contract providing facility and test support to the High Energy Laser System Test Facility. The contract is valued at about \$2 million per year and employs 37 people.

In 2004, Tresco work extended to facilities management at the Naval Surface Warfare Center. The support includes electrical, HVAC, custodial grounds and maintenance support. The contract is valued at \$800,000 and employs 10 people. Tresco also started providing dining facility services and cook support for WSMR in April. The contract is valued at more than \$900,000 and employs 38 people.

"We hired 86 people for our newest contract," said Launer, adding that Tresco has about 200 people in the AbilityOne program.

"Employing these people is important because 70 percent of people with a disability are on unemployment or underemployed," said Lillibridge, adding that 75 percent of the direct labor hours performed on a contract are from people with a significant disability.

The benefits are extensive. According to a study done by AbilityOne, every full-time custodial employee saves the federal government an average of \$6,918 per year.

The study indicated that 100 percent of AbilityOne contract employees got off of welfare; 93 percent discontinued food stamps and 4 percent reduced food stamps; 59 percent discontinued Supplemental Security Income and 31 percent reduced the additional income amount; 67 percent discontinued public housing assistance; 49 percent discontinued Medicaid; and 27 percent discontinued Medicare.

The program also pays workers a "fair" amount at an average salary of \$13 an hour as well as provides the respective nonprofit with additional funds to by its employees health care benefits and establish a retirement account.

"For every hour worked, the government pays us \$3.59 to purchase benefits for our employees," Lillibridge said. "We are also building retirement assets.

"We are given the funds to buy everything See Tresco on page B2


City takes stance on water lawsuit EIS disputes cause arguments with federal government

The federal government did not proceed far enough in an environmental impact study and the city is petitioning a federal court to intervene on the side of the State of New Mexico in the lawsuit filed by Attorney General Gary King against the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation (BOR), said city attorney Marci Driggers.

In mid-August, State Attorney General Gary King filed a suit against the BOR with the announced intention of protecting New Mexico's water. He charged that in late July, the federal government reclassified 65,000 acrefeet of water that belonged to New Mexico so the water could be made available to Texas for

we need in regard to equipment, materials, vacuums, mops, mowers, etc. The bid we send to them includes all of that."

This money is also used to make adjustments to it easier for a person to work or make their services more efficient.

"What a lot of employers don't know is that most accommodations cost less than \$500, such as a different desk," Lillibridge said. "We work really hard to place people where they will be the most effective. If someone can't wake up until 10 a.m., then we place them in a part-time job.'

Another positive to the AbilityOne program is the value-added component, Lillibridge said.

"Once you are on the 'list," you don't have to re-advertise services as long as you are per-forming on the contracts," she said.

With firm-fixed contracts, Lillibridge said Tresco is able to establish long-term relationships with partners such as WSMR.

and there is no burden on the taxpayer," she said. "Without programs like this, some of the people would be sitting at home. This gets them out and changes the stereotype - they are not a burden on taxpayers; they are helping to contribute."

To me, I truly support the AbilityOne program, said Tim Bynes, contracting division

chief with Mission Installation and Contracting Command at WSMR. "I have worked with the nonprofit for a while and they are an exceptional contractor. They are receptive and eager to perform. They are a great partner for WSMR."

The program comes with a small price, and Tresco pays 3.6 to 8.5 percent to AbilityOne, which then uses the money to run the two nonprofits.

In the future, Launer said Tresco hopes to strengthen the organization's relationship with Las Cruces Public Schools.

"We have 12 people at LCPS and two to three at Gadsen (Independent School District)," he said. "We want to strengthen this relationship

because some of the people (we employ) don't think there is anything for them after high school. Maybe there is not enough funding or they have to get on a long waiting list to get help. We want to offer another alternative."

agricultural irrigation.

King termed the action "illegal." But the city is looking beyond that issue, Driggers said.

The city argues the federal government did not conduct an adequate environmental impact study of the water appropriation according to the terms of the 2008 Operation Agreement.

The agreement mandates the government conduct a scientific study that extends over the term of the agreement, which would end in 2050, or 42 years. But the government conducted a study that covered only five years, the city contends.

"We believe that if the government had used a full-blown scientific impact study, they would have seen the negative effect of the operation agreement on the river water.' Driggers said. "They only did a mini-study,

and that's a big concern for the city, and we've asked the court to join in the suit." The operations agreement had been con-

sidered a break-through in a legal dispute that had dragged on for more than 29 years. The agreement stipulated the Elephant Butte Irrigation District would deliver river surface water to the El Paso Water Improvement District according to an equation that had been developed in 2006 and based on data that had been compiled on drought years from 1951-78.

The city is interested in the allocation of surface water because it plans to build a water plant to treat river water and has been buying up agriculture water rights for a supplemental source. Currently, the city relies on wells for its water supply.

Building a river water treatment plant would be an expensive project, and the city wants to know the effect of the operation agreement before it starts designing and building the plant.

"If the agreement reduces the amount of river water that the city could run through the treatment plant, we want to know about it," Driggers said. "We would like the BOR to analyze the effect to the agreement for the full life of the agreement, not just for five years.

'Even if we weren't in a drought cycle, like we're having now, the city wants to know if there would be enough river water to run through the treatment plant before it starts planning to build it.'

El Paso is currently operating two surface water treatment plants.

Another city concern is after the 3rd Judicial District Court judgment, pecan growers will pump more ground water.

District Judge Jerald Valentine ruled that farmers with only surface water will be allowed 3 acre-feet per acre. But farmers who can prove they irrigate with more than 4.5 acre-feet of water, such as pecan orchard men, can apply for allotments of up to 5.5 acre-feet of combined surface and ground water, according

King had charged in his suit the BOR was attempting to reclassify water that had been stored and classified as New Mexico credit wa-

ter to a different designation to that it would be released to Texas.

King labeled this alleged action as inappropriate, and he added that he had filed to suit, "to protect New Mexico's water.'

King also contended in his suit the operations agreement to divide the surface water had been modified to allocate 38 percent to EBID and 65 percent to EPWCD, "a reversal of historic allocation percentage," he said.

He also contended in the past three years that EBID farmers have seen their surface water decreased while they were raising crops on the same amount of land.

The EBID irrigation quota for 2011 was 4 inches, and it ended its season in early July after one irrigation release.

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

NMSU announces major UAV project with DARPA, Boeing

New Mexico State University on Sept. 30 announced its Physical Science Laboratory is partnering with the United States Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency in developing and testing DARPA's Vulture unmanned aerial vehicle program.

The Vulture II Program, a joint venture between DARPA and Boeing, is centered around a new type of UAV with a 400-foot wingspan, weighing just 5,000 pounds. The objective of the Vulture program is to develop and demonstrate the technology to enable an airborne payload to remain on-station, uninterrupted for more than five years, performing intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance and communication missions.

A mixture of solar cells and solid oxide fuel cells will power the vehicle. The system has potential in numerous roles: operation as a single platform, as a formation of multiple aircraft, or as a constellation providing infrastructure augmentation or recovery.

Economic office awarded \$81,000 grant to promote exports

The New Mexico Economic Development Department's Office of International Trade has been awarded an \$81,000 federal grant from the U.S. Small Business Administration, New Mexico Economic Development Department Secretary Jon Barela announced Friday, Sept. 30.

The \$81,000 grant will be part of a larger initiative the Office of International Trade will execute in the next 12 months that will increase the number of small businesses in New Mexico who want to export and increase the value of exports for small businesses that currently export.

"I would like to thank the U.S. Small Business Administration for extending this grant to our state," said New Mexico Gov. Susana Martinez. "The Office of International Trade's export strategy will identify geographic areas and industry sectors for participation in foreign trade missions that have the potential to improve export activity."

The state of New Mexico will provide a cash match of \$10,125. The SBA State Trade and Export and Promotion (STEP) Grant Initiative is designed to increase exporting by small businesses. STEP grant funding is available for two additional years.

Plans to implement the grant funding include: establishing a State International Trade Council, producing a first-ever New Mexico International Trade and Export Strategy, conducting export workshops called "MBA in a Day" and leading delegations on trade missions to China, Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Germany and Austria. Zia applies for cost adjustment

Zia Natural Gas Co. has applied to the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission to adjust its Gas Cost Factor for the next year, effective Oct. 1. For the Doña Ana County System, the new Gas Cost Factor is \$0.5206, up from \$0.4585/ccf.

The average residential customer uses 40ccf in October. Therefore, the average bill will increase from \$37.66 to \$39.84. The cost of purchasing and transporting gas to Zia's system is passed directly through to the customer as the Gas Cost Factor. A regulated utility is not allowed to make or lose money of the cost of gas.

As always, Zia Natural Gas Company encourages all of their customers to winterize their homes and conserve energy by lowering the thermostat when not at home. For customers who do need help with winter heating bills, assistance is available through the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) at the local Human Services (HSD) office, 524-6500.

The New Mexico Oil & Gas Association filed proposed changes to Rule 19.15.17 of the New Mexico Administration Code, commonly referred to as the "pit rule." The changes are designed to make the oil and gas industry in New Mexico competitive with surrounding states for new drilling and development while maintaining groundwater and environmental protections.

The changes, if approved, will encourage additional drilling by allowing lined production pits and on-site burial of drilling cuttings where the distance to groundwater is sufficient for these activities to be performed in a manner that is protective of the environment. In addition, the proposed changes provide for updates to the rules governing siting criteria, construction and closure of below-grade tanks and other facilities.

A hearing on the proposed changes before the New Mexico Oil Conservation Commission is expected to begin in late 2011 or early 2012. Sharp drop-off in unemployment rate in the midst of job loss indicates discouraged workers

The unemployment rate in New Mexico has seen a sharp drop, but the reason is not good news. It's because people are dropping out of the labor force – not because they are finding jobs.

New Mexico has seen the largest drop in the unemployment rate of any state, declining nearly 2 percent between August 2010 and August 2011, the latest month for which we have data. Meanwhile, our state continues to shed jobs.

Unable to find work, New Mexicans are leaving the workforce at a rapid pace. Over the 12 months ending in August, New Mexico led the nation in the decline in workforce participation. Unable to find jobs, New Mexicans are giving up looking.

The unemployment rate is such a difficult statistic to interpret. If the rate is falling because people are finding jobs, that is good



news. If it is falling because people have given up looking, it's then bad news. It's the same statistic in either case, but different implications in different circumstances.

One suspects some of the sharp decline in labor force participation in New Mexico is at least partially a statistical artifact - the result of measurement error. The unemployment rate is a statistic generated from survey data, for which the sample size is pretty small for New Mexico. When one sees an outlier like we are observing now, the concern turns to sampling error.

But even then, the sharp fall in labor market participation is not all error. The state economy is suffering real problems. There has been a decline in labor market participation. A great many of New Mexico workers are giving up on finding a job. The ongoing state level recession is taking a toll on job seekers.

Falling labor-market participation is affecting our poverty rate as well. A report released by the Census Bureau last week ranked

New Mexico third highest in poverty, behind Louisiana and Nevada.

The best way to help someone out of

poverty is to find them a job. People who work 40 hours a week, 52 weeks a year, seldom are poor. Minimum wage, earned income tax credits and in-kind programs such as food stamps see to that. Work also gives people valuable experience that translates into higher wages in the future.

Turning the economy around is no easy task. To a large extent, the factors causing the current state-level recession are outside the control of the legislature and the governor.

Sure, at the margins, state government can have some effect. Passing the governor's capital projects bill during the special session would have helped create jobs. Here in Las Cruces, the ramp-up of construction of the new Union Pacific facility will be a major boost to our economy that was helped along by the passage of a tax exemption on train fuel.

Jerry Pacheco: International business is his game IBA executive director wears many border hats Details

The future set up for Jerry Pacheco was the logging business, but he chose a different route – international business and trade. Pacheco is the executive director of the International Busi-

ness Accelerator (IBA), a division of the New Mexico Small Business Development Center, and each of his experiences have led him to his current position.

Pacheco's family grew up in Mora Valley in northern New Mexico before moving to Española. "I am the son of a logger," Pacheco said. "I was the first in my

family not to be a logger. My father, grandfather, great grandfather and great-great grandfather were all in the business, so my dad assumed I would go into the business with him – as he and his father had done.'

But Pacheco said he had something else in mind.

'I always thought I was going to go into finance," he said. Pacheco graduated from the University of New Mexico with a bachelor's degree in business marketing.

"I went to work at a sawmill, stacking lumber when every-one started getting hurt," he said. "My dad, uncle and I were all injured. Plus, the '80s were a hard time for the business because a lot of restrictions came into play."

All loggers have a sign of some injury, Pacheco added.

So he decided to go back to school for a master's degree in Latin American studies from UNM.

"I pretty much paid my way through college with music," he said, adding that he is an avid guitar and bass player as well as a singer. "The band I was in played in northern New Mexico and up to Colorado."

After graduation, Pacheco faced an unfortunate time - a recession and lack of jobs.

"I ended up taking an internship with the New Mexico Development Department Trade Division.

"Apparently I did a good enough job because they hired me full-time in North American trade," Pacheco said. "I was responsible for increasing trade."

At just 23 years old, Pacheco began what he didn't know at the time to be his long-term career. "That job started it all," he said. "I was working with depart-

ment stores in London and trade deals with Japan when New Mexico Gov. Bruce King approached me about starting the first New Mexico Foreign Trade/Tourism Office. King always had a big interest in Mexico.

'Since I was young, they would fly me back and forth to Mexico to set up the office.

The press was printing 'New Mexico office still not established,' so King called me back up to talk about it. Then, when I got there he said, 'You know, you have been setting this office up, I want you to run it.'

Pacheco said he took the position and moved to Mexico City to run the office with a \$100,000 budget, including his salary.

"I had no money," he said, adding that he considers the experience his career starter. "You have to live in a country to

understand it. You have to speak their language, wake up to their culture and live that life. Living in Mexico defined my career. It gave me street credibility."

Just 26 years old, Pacheco began utilizing his resources and helped establish a cooperative internship program at New Mexico State University that is still used today.

"The school had money and I needed money," he said. "So, in the business school, I helped set up a program that allowed NMSU students to travel to a foreign location and work. We staffed the office with young interns who signed six-month or one-year contracts to work at the office. Today, the IBA still uses that program."

After three years in Mexico City, Pacheco said he was contacted again by King to start an office of border affairs that incorporated all of the international business offices into one.

I was tired of working for state government, so I took a job as the vice president of a bank in Albuquerque," Pacheco said. "And I am glad I did because I realized I hated it."

After that, Pacheco started teaching at UNM and started his own company - Global Perspectives Integrated Inc., which he still owns and runs today.

"I started the company in 1996 and didn't get any business for two years," he said. "So I was teaching like crazy. Then, some of my partners and I started getting contracts."

Pacheco said the company was primarily hired to do marketing entry research for companies in Mexico interested in doing business with the U.S. and vice versa. Global Perspectives Integrated was contracted to work for Santa Teresa Development Řeal Estate Corp. – later bought out by the Verde Group.

"Santa Teresa Development Real Estate Corp. was owned by two guys from Rio Rancho, N.M., and two guys from Boston,' Pacheco said. "They had like 2,600 acres and the idea to develop industrial parks on it. In 1997 or 1998, we were asked to do their marketing and business recruiting.

We had the hot ticket, a foundation would be poured, and we would have the space leased before the walls were even built."

Pacheco said the company became more confident and 40,000-square-foot buildings turned into 100,000-square-foot buildings and then 200,000-square-foot buildings.

'We moved in 35 (major companies) to the area," he said. "And then the world stopped - 9/11 hit and so did a recession. We had a lot of debt and no movement."

Pacheco said the Verde Group made the real estate company an offer they couldn't refuse.

"I was glad that I kept my own business going this whole time," he said. "Then I was approached about working at the IBA and I told her I was looking for something different." But Pacheco got roped in to "starting" the company and has

led the office since 2003.

"I would love to see all the work that has been done in Santa Teresa over the past 20 years to pay off," said Pacheco, adding that he filed the federal paperwork to put a port of entry in Santa Teresa. "I am optimistic that it should all come together. Great strides are being made with Union Pacific and FoxConn. It is time for the border to have its due.

Armijo House to get new owner

Chamber kicks off fundraiser, begins title exchange

Leading a \$2.3 million project, the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce formally announced its effort to save the historic Armijo House on Lohman Avenue. Chamber board members and members of the community gathered Tuesday, Oct. 4, behind the old house as speakers from the chamber and Armijo family proclaimed their dedication to the building's restoration.

"I am proud to announce that we are at 54 percent of our fundraising goal," said Terra Van Winter, chair for the capital campaign that is charged with raising the remainder of the funds. "We hope to raise the rest of the money in the next year."

The chamber thanked Bud Colligan, a member of the Armijo family, for his support as well as the contributions of his family members.

The family's support, as well as a donation

from Citizens Bank, allowed the chamber to really kick this off, said Kiel Hoffman, chair of the Heritage Foundation.

"I remember spending my summers in this house," said Colligan, adding that his grandmother once occupied the house. "My family and I are committed to supporting this project with monetary means as well as donate art and furnishings.

The \$2.3 million plans include restoration of the house as well as building an adjacent office for the chamber, including a courtyard between the two buildings.

Steve Newby Architects and Associates has been selected to design the restoration project as well as the new chamber offices.

"We want to create a meeting place for people in the community as well as maintain the same characteristics and keep continuity between the before and after," said Waheed Oroyinyin, an architect with Steve Newby Architects

Agriculture secretary announces funding

Creating more jobs and improving rural water systems are key goals

Secretary of the U.S. Department of Ag-riculture Tom Vilsack announced funding for rural water projects to create jobs and improve rural water and wastewater systems in 26 states.

The announcement was made on Vilsack's behalf by Jonathan Adelstein, USDA Rural Development's Rural Utilities Service (RUS) administrator. Adelstein made the announcement during remarks at the State and National Rural Water Association's H2O

XPO in Louisville, Ky. "Clean water is a basic necessity for the health and economic growth of our rural communities," Vilsack said. "Constructing and improving rural water systems benefit communities by providing reliable access to clean water and create

jobs that strengthen economies."

For example, the Town of Marion, Miss., will receive \$3.7 million to provide sewer treatment for residents of rural Lauderdale County. USDA funds will be used to install approximately 14 miles of sewer lines and three lift stations for sewer treatment at reason-

able rates and terms. In addition to directly benefitting the thousands of residents in that county, this project is a catalyst necessary for economic development in that county.

In Texas, Skywater Water Supply Corporation in Castro County will receive \$1 million to build a new water system. The existing system was shut down in 2009 when the wells failed, forcing residents to haul water more than 10 miles. The funds will also be used to build storage facilities and four miles of new distribution line to benefit rural residents.

The \$66.7 million in loans and \$48.9 million in grants are provided by USDA to help rural communities build and upgrade rural water systems. RUS funding will provide thousands of new connections to water and wastewater facilities, improve water quality and increase the efficiency of water use, while reducing reduce. Funding for distribution cooperatives, which provide

power to consumers, will benefit more than 15,000 rural businesses and residents. The announcement is part of a series of

rural infrastructure investments expected by Vilsack during the next two weeks. This effort supports the goal of the American Jobs Act, which makes critical infrastructure improvements to put people back to work immediately.

On Sept. 8, President Barack Obama pre-sented the American Jobs Act in an address to Congress. The purpose of the American Jobs Act is simple: Put more people back to work and put more money in the pockets of working Americans.

The American Jobs Act is specific. It will put people back to work right now, and it will not add to the deficit. Through a combination of direct spending, such as infrastructure investments, and tax relief, such as an extension of the payroll tax cuts, it will lead to new American jobs. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, 21 direct or indirect jobs

are created for each \$1 million invested in infrastructure.

significant steps to improve the lives of rural Americans and has provided broad support for rural communities. The Obama Administration has set goals of modernizing infrastructure by pro-

viding broadband access to 10 million Americans, expanding educational opportunities for students in rural areas, and providing affordable health care. In the long term, these unparalleled rural investments will help ensure that America's rural communities are repopulating, self-sustaining and Thriving economically.

USDA, through its Rural Development mission area, administers and manages housing, business and community infrastructure and facility programs through a national network of state and local offices. These programs are designed to improve the economic stability of rural communities, businesses, residents, farmers and ranchers and improve the quality of life in rural America. Rural Development has an existing portfolio of more than \$155 billion in loans and loan guarantees.

Job growth at stake for natural gas industry Chemicals released in waterways draw concern

A New Mexico company may have a solution to the problem of water threatened by expansion of natural gas extraction from a large source in the eastern United States.

Frac flowback water is the term used for water potentially endangered by hydrofracking, a chemical and water-pressure process that releases underground natural gas. Concerns over the risks could possibly shut down the natural gas industry in those areas.

The Marcellus Shale, reaching from New York through Pennsylvania to Ohio and West Virginia, has been called the Saudi Arabia of natural gas. But getting to that gas and bringing it to the surface requires hydrofracking, the micro-scale breaking up of rock under the ground with high-pressure water and chemicals. If those chemicals threaten our environment, the entire natural gas industry and the jobs created from the Marcellus Shale play could be eliminated.

Pennsylvania regulators expressed concern this May after they discovered improperly treated frac water being dumped into area waterways, which were showing high levels of harmful chemicals, such as bromide, benzene and other radioactive material, in river water tests. If companies can't clean up their frac water, more than 4,000 new hires in the industry throughout Pennsylvania could face unemployment.

With the moratorium on hydrofracking currently clamping down on natural gas jobs in New York, only 42 jobs in New York's natural gas industry were gained in 2009 and 2010. Due to frac flowback concerns, New York has yet to lift its moratorium on natural gas drilling, a move that could secure 37,000 jobs a year for the state, according to the Public Policy Institute of New York.

However, there is a solution to the problem of hydrofracking flowback water - a solution that could return water to the rivers without any harmful effects to humans or wildlife.

Altela Inc., a company in Albuquerque, has pioneered a water treatment system that can treat frac water to better than drinking water standards. The AltelaRain 600 is currently treating 100,000 gallons of frac water from the Marcellus Shale every day in Williamsport, Pa. The treated water can be used again for hydrofracking or put into our rivers with no harmful effects to people or wildlife.

"It's a win-win situation. We can make sure

frac water meets state and federal standards, and we can keep Americans working in the natural gas industry," said Ned Godshall, CEO of Altela.

The new Altela technology in Williamsport, at Clean Streams LLC, successfully removes salts and contaminants to safe water standards, according to state and federal officials. Also, Altela's water treatment systems use one-third to one-fourth the amount of energy that traditional water treatment systems use and Altela's systems are proven to treat frac water thoroughly and completely. The PA DEP has determined that Altela's technology can meet or exceed state water standards.

"Natural gas is a cleaner burning fuel for America," Godshall said. "Our country needs energy independence and jobs, and our technology will grow the industry and create jobs."





When previous first-time buyers Robert and Estella began to outgrow the starter home they purchased a few years back, they decided to replace it with a newer home which could more easily accommodate the needs of their growing family.



An injury can be scary; learning how to heal afterward can be even more frightening. Atrium Physical Therapy is making the rehabilitation process more manageable, providing at-home comforts to its patients.

Owner Dennis Prickett, who is also the practice's main physical therapist (PT), started his career as a PT more than 20 years ago.

"I played soccer in high school and had some knee in-juries," Prickett said. "I guess through my rehabilitation from surgeries I started to gain an interest in rehab."

Prickett entered the University of New Mexico with the intention to graduate with a bachelor's degree in athletic training, but switched to physical therapy as his interest in medicine rehab strengthened.

After college, Prickett practiced with pediatric schools in Albuquerque and nursing homes. He moved to Las Cruces in the mid-'90s to work for a home-health clinic. Prickett started his private practice in 1998, specializing in orthopedic physical therapy on Boutz

Road and Main Street before moving his practice a few times and finally ending up at its current location at 1115 Commerce Drive, Suite C, in the old Bank'34 building.

While operating his practice, Prickett started another company in Las Cruces – a health club and fitness center that was open from 2003-09.

"I saw that my physical therapy clientele wanted a facility that catered to the senior population," he said about the fitness center. Throughout the moves of his PT practice

and the run of his health center, Prickett said he has learned some valuable lessons about entrepreneurship. "Operating a 1,000-square-foot building

with a few employees cannot even compare to a health club operation that is open from 6 a.m. to 8 p.m. six days a week," he said about the differences in his two ventures. "Having staff members and full-time managers required a

lot of leadership and created a lot of staff challenges. There is a special skill set required to run a business of that (magnitude) and the experience was an eye-opener."

Prickett said the health start a business, club closed with the sharp downturn in the economy.

"We really saw our membership decline when stocks tanked," he said, adding that many of his members' income were supplemented by social security, stock bonds or investments. "A lot of businesses fail because they don't have the funding to get through a bad economy. I don't think that is why the health club closed. If anyone is trying to start a

business, I would suggest having a strong business plan and seek the advice of people who have been in business.

With some freed-up time, Prickett said he has been able to devote more time to his PT practice and preaches that his facility provides at-home comfort from a licensed physical therapist nearly 100 percent of the time.

"We offer the best patient care," he said. "I

went into the business to treat patients, and I enjoy patient care."

Prickett said the treatment staff consists of him and a part-time therapist.

"I like keeping a small staff," he said, adding that other staff members include his assistant Mary Grace Froehlich, office manager Heather Guzman and Philip Montoin, his wife's brother

who helps out occasionally with greeting patients and paperwork.

Atrium Physical Therapy offers a pulmonary rehabilitation program, stroke rehabilitation and neurological rehabilitation.

Though the office doesn't have a pool like some centers, the practice offers warm, comfortable rooms and a gym big enough to run around.

"I work to make this place homey and comfortable," he said, adding that he has decorated his building with handmade artwork from his wife's kindergarten class and photos taken by friends.


"For the most part, all of my patients see me every time. My assistant works primarily with the pulmonary program."



'The Hedgehog' breaks through tough shells A pointed reminder of what life is about

Paloma – what a cool name. In Spanish, as many of you know, it means dove. But 12-year-old Paloma is hardly a dove in this terrific French drama/dark comedy.

Rather, she is an acute observer of life; so much so, that she has decided to end it all on her 12th birthday, due to the fact that she finds life to be, shall we say, absurd.

This is not an observation taken with a "boo-hoo" attitude, or one caused by bullies or bad parents, it is strictly because, well, she finds the inconsistencies of life to be too far-fetched.

The film is inspired by a novel of the same name, penned by Muriel Barbery and said to be true to the story. Having not read the book, I'll take others' word for it.

However, as they are wont to do, things change when Paloma meets a new tenant who moves into her tidy Parisian apartment building. Kakuro Ozu, from Japan, is about to change things for several people, especially after he gains the acquaintance of Renee, the concierge of the building, a grumpy gal who describes herself as "ugly, short and fat."

Her interactions with the human race are polite but brief and, safely, not emotionally engaging. A self-imposed hermit at heart, she rarely comes out of her apartment when not working, escaping into the luscious stories of the numerous books that fill her small living space.

Paloma remains the narrator through the film and also has highgraded her father's old video camera, which she uses to document most everything around her. At times, it feels like she is making her own slightly off-kilter, slightly dark documentary before offing herself with the stash of pills, secreted away from her mother's daily medications. Her final goal is to finish her "movie" before doing that.

But again, through this second camera's eye and Paloma's own statements, we start to see a change in her. She finds realness in Kakuro and Renee that she has not realized before, as Kakuro begins to quietly and gently court Renee, who is always sure she is not deserving of



his kindness and teachings.

The film is mostly shot in the apartment building and in the homes of the three main characters. Wisely, it is shown how one's lifestyle and home set up can easily and quietly reflect one's inner-self. Paloma's home is one of busy parents, an annoying sister, a goldfish she despises and a quirky emptiness. Renee's, as mentioned, is small and filled with bound volumes of escape, while Kakuro's home exhibits an openness and lightness that would certainly allow anyone who enters to feel welcome and alive.

"The Hedgehog" (you'll learn the reason for the title during the film) is, on one hand, a film about change and hope and, on the other hand, not about either of those things. It offers glimpses into the inner workings of our three protagonists, but all might not be as it seems, of course. It is a life celebration handed from older folks to a young woman, but

not one made of falsehoods marked by trips to the seaside and gallons of creamy root beer.

"The Hedgehog" is yet another film that I was glad to see was made by the French. A favorite for 2011, "The Hedgehog" combines realism with laughter and tragedy, and reminds us of just how frail we all can be.

From city to country Steenburgen stars in 'Cross Creek'

The CineMatinee for 1:30 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 8, is "Cross Creek"

(1983, 125 minutes, rated PG). Mary Steenburgen stars in this adaptation of Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings's classic novel about her experiences living in rural Florida during the 1920s and '30s.

Mixing elements of both "Cross Creek" and "The Yearling," director Martin Ritt creates a glowing period piece that finds the essence of both books. In the film, Mrs. Rawlings (Steenburgen), a New Yorker, buys an orange grove in the Florida swamps for the purpose of going there to write the gothic romance she can't seem to finish in the city.

As soon as she arrives, Rawlings becomes immersed in the colorful backwoods community that surrounds her grove, and acquires a young cook named Geechee (Alfre Woodard) as well as farm hands to work the groves. Enchanted by life in Cross Creek, Rawlings finds herself writing not gothic romances, but tales of small town life in rural Florida. Next thing she knows, her stories catch the attention of a major publisher.

A lyrical meditation on both rural life and the nature of creativity, Martin Ritt's film is filled with lush imagery and standout performances. In particular, Rip Torn's performance as Marsh Turner, a drunken but loving father, is outstanding, and it rightfully won him an Oscar for Best Supporting Actor.

CineMatinee is a unique blend of movies presented by the Mesilla Valley Film Society that showcases unique films, past and present, often with an emphasis on life in the West and "movies that missed us" – films that are notable but never had a lot of publicity.

The series is designed to show area residents that film is a form of art and education as well as entertainment. At least one film a month for this series has a New Mexico "connection," drawing from the vast pool of movies made in the state or perhaps a star/story from New Mexico.

Painting with no regrets Abstract artist influenced by O'Keeffe, Van Gogh

Looking at Wayne Huber's fluid, abstract mountainscapes, it's difficult to tell the artist was once on the path to become an architect.

Huber left the "more practical" career for his first love of art 50 years ago, and his current show at the Mesquite Art Gallery is a celebration

that he made the right decision with no regrets. He has nine new acrylic washes of mountainscapes on display through October.

"I think I've been working in landscape all my life off and on," Huber said. "Even though I left architecture, I worked with a major landscape architect for about 20 years. I love the land, and I love landforms." Though he left the architecture profession when he was 21, Huber worked as an architectural draftsman when he moved west to Tucson, Ariz., before he decided that he was ready to pursue art as a career. He returned to Michigan and earned his bachelor's degree in art education from Eastern Michigan University.

On his new path, he taught art education for three years at a juniorsenior high school. Huber returned to Tucson with his wife in 1968 to get his Master of Fine Arts in painting and drawing. After he graduated in 1970, he taught at the college level for 25 years in the St. Louis area and opened a private art school overlooking the Mississippi River where he taught adult and children art classes.

He finished his art teaching career in Las Cruces.

"I fell in love with Tucson and the Southwest," Huber said. "I enjoyed teaching and working there, and I decided that if I ever retired it would be in the Southwest."

Lured to the Mesilla Valley after visiting his brother Hale several times, Huber said he liked the size of the town. He moved to Las Cruces in 2000, teaching art in Las Cruces Public Schools before he retired in 2007. Now, he teaches art classes at the Las Cruces and El Paso museums of art.

"The transformation of the arts in Las Cruces has been quite amazing since I arrived here in 2000. We are very blessed to have the community. It's very exciting to see."

Huber is part of the excitement with his show, which will include pieces from graduate school as well. Inspired by Paul Cezanne, Huber said he also is influenced by the work of Vincent Van Gogh and Georgia O'Keeffe. "Her paintings have a huge effect

on me," Huber said. "I've been teaching the work of O'Keeffe since the mid-'60s when I started teaching. I've visited the (Georgia O'Keeffe) Museum in Santa Fe many times. I'm very impressed with her work. Her abstractions are very exciting."

Also citing other 20th-century artists Willem de Kooning and Richard Diebenkorn as important influences in his art, Huber said viewers will be able to see the artists' effects on his painting in the Mesquite gallery show.

"My work is very expressive," he said. "I've had exposure to many contemporary artists over the years and have been influenced in very abstract directions. I tend to push the envelope.

"I'm not interested in representation. I'm interested in an emotional response to the landscape."


Get involved with city museums Volunteer training offered through October

AtTheMovies Survival rate: '50/50'

There's always a chance that laughter is the best medicine

It's a beautiful thing to have gut-busting laughter one minute and heart-wrenching tears the next.

The rollercoaster of emotion is wonderfully blended in the comedic drama "50/50." The acting was incredible, and the cinematography flawless in telling the tale, which is inspired by a true story.

50/50" is about Adam Learner (Joseph Gordon-Levitt), a normal 27-year-old guy from Seattle who doesn't drink, smoke and plays by all the rules. He has a beautiful girlfriend, Rachel (Bryce Dallas Howard), a job he's passionate about, and his best friend Kyle (Seth Rogan) who adds comedic complications to his life.

The movie follows Adam as he fights to beat the 50-percent odds of survival with the help from his fresh-faced therapist, Katherine (Anna Kenrick), and Kyle when he is diagnosed with Schwannoma neurofibrosarcoma, essentially, a tumor on the spine. Adam starts the trials and tribulations of chemotherapy with limited support from Rachel, and instead finds strength in a few courageous, cookieproviding retirees.

Levitt and Rogan make an amazing duo, with Rogan's powerhouse comedy working brilliantly with Levitt's light-hearted, yet serious demeanor. It's surprising how little Levitt actually says; instead the audience is told the tale through powerful facial expressions and body language.

Viewers are invited to watch the reaction

- physical and emotional - to the realization of his diagnosis, and what that means for friends, family and Levitt himself. The writing is spectacular, each line and scene for a purpose, and not a single syllable is wasted. As time passes, you feel what Adam feels. As an audience member, you become involved with Adam's fight, as if it were your own life on the line. Levitt's performance is Oscar-worthy and shows the incredibly dynamic talents of the former child star.

Seth Rogan provides the comedic backbone of the film, balancing the perfect amount of laugh-out-loud humor, sometimes crude and profane, with the darkness of Adam's diagnosis. Rogan's acting is less dynamic, as Kyle is similar to a lot of the characters he's portrayed over the years. In this instance, however, his personality nailed it. His whole purpose is to help the audience laugh when dealing with such a serious topic, and Rogan is at the top of his game. He does a great job in finding that place between supportive and hilarious.

The greatest surprise in the film is Adam's therapist, Katherine. A current Ph.D. student, Katherine has had limited experience and the process of helping Adam deal with his diagnosis is one of trial and error. It also provides some of the funniest, most awkward scenes of the movie, which keeps the delicate balance of humor and drama.

Kenrick is surprisingly funny, with well-timed humor and a great deal of

uncomfortable moments between therapist and patient. Her performance here is enough to forgive her for taking up a role in a teenage vampire disaster.

For the audience, it's a chance to find humor in the darkest of places and realize that the connections between others and ourselves are the most intricate that exist. A cancer diagnosis doesn't just affect the ill, but the people around him, who all react in different, sometimes ridiculous ways.

50/50

In this realistic approach to cancer, treating it both as a tragedy and a comedy, it reminds us how some people deal with the terrible things in life, by laughing their sorrows away.

Finally, Rogan found a movie where his boisterous, lewd humor makes the difference in a film. Who knew it would be about cancer?

Local 'hero' hits the red carpet on all fours

Hollywood's red carpet is known for showcasing all the biggest trends in fashion, hotshot movie stars, entertainers and - now - dogs.

On Oct. 1, the American Humane Association held its annual Hero Dog Awards in Bev-erly Hills to honor the best of the best of the canine service industry. From more than 400 service dogs nominat-

ed throughout the nation, eight finalists were chosen by a public vote on the AHA website, held June 20 through July 31. With more than 300,000 votes, Bino (pro-

nounced Bihn-oh), a Dutch Shepherd hailing from Las Cruces, won the "Military dog" category, and together with owner Debbie Kandoll, hit the red carpet for the paw-studded event.

'It was like the Academy Awards, with the red carpet and the 'puperazzi' doing inter-views. But Bino just did his thing, he was very cute," Kandoll said.

Bino began his career serving the country as a military working dog in 2002, stationed at Fort Gordon in Augusta, Ga. Bino was deployed to war-stricken Iraq in 2006 and returned home 14 months later. He "retired" from the military in 2010, when he was adopted by the Kandoll family

As a 13-year-old "retiree," Bino and Kandoll still make weekly visits to Fort Bliss to educate soldiers and train other service dogs to be used

by soldiers who suffer from post-traumatic stress disorder, traumatic brain injuries or severe depression and anxiety.

Several animal-loving stars attended the black-tie gala, including Betty White, Julienne Hough and Jason Lewis.

"Dancing with the Stars" contestant and "Queer Eye for the Straight Guy" starlet Carson Kressley hosted the awards show and presented the winners from the categories of emerging hero, guide dog, hearing dog, law enforcement/arson dog, service dog, search and rescue dog, therapy dog and – of course – military dog.

Highlighting the end of the evening was the presentation of the "American Hero Dog of the Year," selected by a panel of judges including White, Whoopi Goldberg, Kristen Chenowith and Victoria Stillwell.

Roselle, a seeing-eye guide dog from New York, took home the honor. Roselle led her blind handler, Michael Higson, down 78 flights of stairs in Tower One of the World Trade Center on 9/11.

Unfortunately, Roselle, at 13 years old, died in June, but her compelling story attracted more than 400,000 votes.

La Casa promotes awareness

Domestic violence shelter offers premier comprehensive care

Pink is not the only color to wear during October.

National Domestic Violence Awareness month has officially begun, and the staff at La Casa domestic violence shelter are encouraging people to wear purple in support of those who have been affected by domestic abuse.

"It's our opportunity to educate the community, honor those who have been affected and pay tribute to those who have lost their lives because of it," said La Casa Executive Director Amy Bassford.

La Casa was established in 1981 by a group of women volunteers who opened up a small house for women to seek shelter if being verbally or physically abused.

As the need for a safe haven grew stronger than the small house could handle, La Casa gathered its resources and moved to its current location in 1995.

Now La Casa is one of the premier comprehensive domestic violence shelters in the state, offering a multitude of services and help for those being abused.

'There's not one standard program that will fit the needs of everyone. Every person has their own story, each with their own specific set of needs," Bassford said.



More than 300 people were in attendance at the Rio Grande Theatre Sunday, Oct. 2, for a Neil Diamond tribute concert, "Play Me," in honor of Domestic Violence Awareness Month, hosted by La Casa domestic violence shelter.

La Casa has risen to meet those needs with programs including an emergency 24-hour shelter, a children's program, a men's program, transitional housing, satellite programs, par-enting, education and prevention, a non-residential program and legal services.

Last year, Bassford said, La Casa helped more than 900 people in the emergency and non-residential programs alone.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human

Services reports that one in four women have experienced some sort of domestic violence, with 2.2 million cases of injuries, costing more than \$37 billion per year in health care costs nationally.

Bassford, who has worked at La Casa for the past three years, says she has witnessed firsthand that domestic can affect anyone, regardless of age, status or race.

Kandoll, an advocate for soldiers' rights to use service and military working dogs in the case of PTSD and other service-related injuries, says her experience with Bino has been "humbling."

"They are truly soldiers with four paws," Kandoll said.

Kandoll, founder of the Military Working Dog Adoption nonprofit organization to help unite civilians with retired service dogs in the adoption process, has lobbied for legislation for the use of service dogs to be an acceptable form of treatment in the military sector.

The government has long researched benefits of using service dogs to help soldiers who have received physical injuries, but is only beginning to explore the

service they can provide to those soldiers who suffer emotional trauma.

Kandoll said she has seen firsthand success stories of soldiers using service dogs as a form of therapy, said it is still hard to spread the word.

The U.S. military does not unanimously recognize the effectiveness of soldiers having service dogs and, according to Kandoll, their use is only allowed per commanding officer.

"Those commanders that aren't on board create such havoc in these soldiers' lives by not allowing them to use what doctors and caregivers are prescribing them," Kandoll said.

What has owning a military dog done for Kandoll?

"I think it has made me a better person, certainly a better dog owner," she said. "He lives to be at my beck and call, and that's still something I can't get over."

"It can happen to someone in Picacho Hills or Sonoma Ranch just as easily as it could happen to someone in the middle of town," Bassford said.

A big problem for this area, according to Bassford, is a rural community attitude that abuse problems should stay within a family to be solved in private.

"People in rural areas tend to be afraid to speak out against violence for fear of being ostracized from their family and friends," she said.

Bassford said another big problem for the area is the high number of abuse cases coming from immigrant families.

According to Bassford, fear of the government and being deported, language barriers and a lack of knowledge on the American way of life are all reasons victims stay in abusive situations.

"Things like knowing how to ride the bus or paying bills are things that we take for granted. A lot of times we have to start teaching people these basic things in order for them to survive," Bassford said.

La Casa has organized an effort to help battered immigrants get work visas as well other educational services about their rights to guide them to a better life.

As part of a national campaign to raise awareness, La Casa will host its 14th annual vigil, to be held at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 18, at St. Paul's United Methodist Church, 225 W. Griggs Ave., to honor those who have lost their lives due to domestic violence.

The keynote speaker of the Vigil is Lynn Rosenthal, White House Adviser on violence against women.

At the Dress the Child days, children and their escorts will visit local stores to purchase their clothes. The first three days are as follows.



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

Telephone Pioneers to honor Rawley Jackson

Cowboys for Cancer Research has gained national recognition with the announcement that the Telephone Pioneers will name Rawley Jackson for a Centennial Lifetime Achievement Award on Nov. 5 at its centennial celebration in Boston.

Services for Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year, were held from last Wednesday through Friday, which begins 10 days of repentance.

We think about the last year and how we can improve," said Karol, adding that during this period, people seek forgiveness from those they've wronged and look to God through prayer.

On Rosh Hashanah, Karol said it is customary for congregants to gather at a body of water and cast in breadcrumbs, which is symbolic of a verse found in the book of Micah that references "throwing away your sins." "It's uplifting," he said.

Looking to reach the highest potential possible, the somber event ends with Yom Kippur, also known as the Day of Atonement, during which community members fast from sunset to sunset and say confessional prayers as a congregation.

"This is done in a community rather than as individuals," said Karol, adding that this year, Yom Kippur begins on the evening of Friday, Oct. 7, and continues through sunset Saturday, Oct. 7, and commarce and 10 urday, Oct.8. "That way we can support each other. It's like saying we're all humans and we all make mistakes, but we can make amends

and change and improve. "This is a contemplative time, a time of personal reflection."

In addition to the evening and morning ser-vices, Karol said Yom Kippur typically includes time to study as well as a memorial service for those who are no longer with us. After Yom Kippur – the holiest day on the

Jewish calendar – comes to an end, the com-munity comes together to "break the fast," Karol said.

Five days after Yom Kippur, Sukkot – the Feast of Booths or Feast of Tabernacles – is held. During this joyous event, Karol said it is customary for a booth to be built and decorated.

'It's a harvest festival in origin," Karol said. "The focus is to connect with nature. To thank God for the bounty of nature.'

Karol said all branches of Judaism observe these Holy Days for the same reason and often share the same prayers and structure of the services. Even those members who aren't part of the Jewish faith can benefit from this time of reflection.

"The message for everyone is that it's important to take time out to look at themselves and think how they can change and grow," she said. "The focus is on each of us and the community as a whole.'

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



When Schaefer Ranchwear owners Rick and Lynn Grant relocated to the Mesilla Valley from their Colorado home base, they wanted a residence that allowed them to reflect their Western roots.

The clothing manufacturers found just the home they were looking for in 2007 at 2905 Mesilla Acres Road, a Tuscan G.L. Green & Associates creation.

"We definitely liked a Tuscan home," Rick Grant said. "It's one home style that you can Western-up fairly easily."

Discovering the home in the framing stage, its style wasn't the only thing that drew in the

"When we started looking in the area for a place to move, we looked at some out of the valley in Sonoma Ranch and Organ Mesa,' Grant said. "I asked Arlene (Ehly, a Realtor with Steinborn & Associates Real Estate) where the green was. She brought us to this area and we fell in love with it."

Located in the gated Mesilla Acres Estates, the front of the home is lined in green grass, a complement to the 1-acre property's lush landscaping.

"We love being outside, so we planted a lot," said Grant, adding that they installed more than 350 plants and 18,000 square feet of grass. "The landscaping is completely custom

Inside the wood door, a 30-foot-tall entrance area greets guests. The grand space is accented in an antler chandelier created by an artist in Colorado. This is one example of the home's Western-style influence, Grant said.

A second 30-foot tower can be found next to the entrance. In this area, dubbed "the guest wing," are three of the home's four bedrooms, a half and a full bathroom and an office. Originally designed as a media room, the office is tucked behind Old World doors imported from Mexico. A chandelier hanging from the checkered-pattern ceiling is decorated with belt buckles and leather, continuing the home's Western décor. Double doors leading to the side of the residence complete the area

Not one for clutter, Grant said the home includes several built-ins, such as dressers in the closets and extra shelving in the bathrooms, to use all of the available space.

At the center of the home is the living room, which opens up to the kitchen.

'The floor plan of this house really gives you a sense of space," Ehly said.

A built-in entertainment center, which can be accessed from the closet of a bedroom, covers one wall. A fireplace lined in tile is found in the corner of the room that features a 14-foot-high ceiling. Large windows peer out to the backyard.

The kitchen, separated from the rest of the open space by two rock-covered bars lined in granite, was rearranged to better fit the couple's needs, Grant said. Upgraded stainlesssteel appliances, including a paneled refrigerator, complement the ornate custom alder cabinets. The enlarged hood was designed to match the fireplace, while a pot filler is conveniently placed over the stove in the light colored tile backsplash. An island with a prep sink finishes off the space.

"This is my wife's dream kitchen," Grant said.

As with other rooms of the home, large wooden beams wrapped in copper accents add style to the shared living space. The doorway to the laundry room is decorated with a roof detailing that "adds authenticity to the Mediterranean style," Ehly said.

Beyond the kitchen is the dining room, which features a built-in nook designed to match the kitchen for the couple's dishes and wine collection.

"It's casually elegant and it fits their lifestyle," Ehly said.

The master bedroom is also hidden away by Old World doors. An alcove surrounds the bed as more copper-lined corbels speckle the tray ceiling.

The master bathroom includes his-andher closets, at the center of which is a jetted bathtub draped in tile. Next to it is a snail shower. Featuring fine detailing, the shower also includes several windows that overlook the side of the property.

Coming from Steamboat, Colo., Grant said outdoor living was essential to their new home. The covered patio is divided into two areas – a relaxing seating space beside a fireplace and an outdoor kitchen, complete with barbecue grill and refrigerator. From the patio, guests can enjoy the view of the orchard behind the home or the Organ Mountains.

At the center of the yard is the swimming pool. A large rectangle, measuring between four and six feet deep, the pool features a built-in spa. The refreshing space is surrounded by numerous rose bushes, which can be found throughout the property.

"There are at least 60 rose bushes," Grant said.

Oleanders, ash, live oak, weeping willows and crape myrtle surround the backyard as a raised planter box wraps around three sides of the home. In addition, the couple planted a vegetable garden behind an iron fence in the corner. Using it year-round, Grant said they plant various vegetables according to the seasons.



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Breaking out of the kitchen

Oven mitts have a place in other rooms of the house

An overlooked kitchen accessory, the oven mitt is the best friend to any chef – after all, it's entire purpose is to keep your hands protected from hot pots, warm plates and other potentially harmful cookware.

Nowadays, oven mitts come in a wide range of materials. In addition to the traditional fabric variety, those made from silicone are also popular. This type offers more insulation and a sleek, modern design.

Although they may seem old fashioned, those cloth oven mitts are still useful in several ways around the home and beyond.

1. Make a cosy: After taking the time to heat up that cup of coffee or tea, the last thing you want is for it to go cold. Protect it from sitting out, exposed to the elements, by placing an oven mitt over it. The cooking accessory will insulate the cup and keep it warm until the beverage can be enjoyed. Please guests with gooey cheese Brie baker enhances this French culinary delight

October is a good month for food lovers – in addition to being national apple, caramel, chili, cookie, dessert, pork, pretzel and vegetarian awareness month, it is also National Cheese Month.

In honor of National Cheese Month, be adventurous and try something new. Grab that Gouda you've been eyeing. Please your palate with Port Salut. Brighten your day with brie.

Brie is a soft cheese named after the region in France from which it originated. Pale in color, the cheese includes a rind of white mold, which can be eaten or removed, depending on

preference

Thanks to its complex flavor, brie is known as "The Queen of Cheeses," and is a dessert cheese.

Although brie comes in the shape of a wedge, it is traditionally a wheel. There are several ways this cheese can be eaten, such as served at room temperature on bread. For an even more decadent delight, prepare your wheel in a brie baker.

What is it?

While eating cold or room-temperature brie is perfectly acceptable, there is nothing like dipping a piece of bread into the hot, gooey substance.

The brie baker is an easy way for you to heat up the delicate soft cheese in your oven. A ceramic pot, sometimes with a lid, the brie baker is available in a variety of sizes to fit any wheel of the cheese. Not just for brie, the baker can also be used with camembert, another soft cheese.

How does it work?

The brie baker not only allows you to create hot, runny liquid cheese, but you can also enhance the robust flavor.

Incredibly easy to use, just place the wheel of cheese into the ceramic pot and slide it into a heated oven. Before being baked – which can take anywhere from 10 to 30 minutes, depending on the size of the wheel – toppings can be added to the brie, such as nuts, chutneys and honey, among others.

While baking, the rind might break, causing the cheese to ooze out. Make clean-up easier by greasing or buttering the ceramic pot beforehand. You can also wrap the brie in phyilo dough or pastry crust before baking.

When the brie is done baking, leave it in the pot and serve. Brie is usually served with baguette slices, crackers and fruit wedges, but don't be afraid to use your imagination.

Most brie bakers are dishwasher safe, however, they can also be washed by hand using soap and hot water.

How much does it cost?

Depending on its size and manufacturer, the brie baker can cost anywhere from \$15 to \$30.



Cool temps ideal for new growth

Yes, I know some days it does not feel like fall right now, but it is here now. At least the calendar says so.

This is the best time to plant 95 percent of the outdoor plants available. The cooler nights and warm soil provide ideal conditions to plant just about anything. When the atmospheric temperatures decline, the tops of most plants begin to slow down in growth, resulting in a lower water requirements.



To help aid with the success on new plantings, it is recommended to use a soil amendment and root stimulator. The soil amendment will help retain moisture and the root stimulator will aid with rapid root growth.

Although watering is not as critical now as the in the summer months, the soil should still be kept moist – but not soggy. Watering in winter should be reduced to a minimum, but not to a complete stop. The roots underground still need moisture, especially when there is no rain or snowfall. This is true for dormant plants and lawns.

If you're looking for flowering color, you can plant pansies, snapdragons, dianthus, stock, flowering cabbage or kale and viola, to name a few. These will actually give color from now up to late spring.



If you are looking for "autumn" color then red oak, Chinese pistache, Raywood ash, crape myrtle (yes, these have excellent fall color), ginkgo biloba and nandina, will provide brilliant color for our dry Southwestern climate.

So get out there, get some gardening exercise and enjoy the soon-to-be much cooler autumn days, they really are just around the corner.



October means ghosts, goblins and insects

Halloween candy, old pumpkins can attract some creepy guests

As the little ones get dressed up in their creepy costumes to head outside for trick-or-treating, the real creepy crawlers are looking to come inside.

While children dressed as ladybugs and bumble bees may be cute, the last thing homeowners want are the not-so-cute earwigs, brown recluse spiders or rodents at their doors looking to get in. October marks the beginning of the cooler months, which drives the bugs and rodents inside.

So, while the kids are getting ready to enjoy the spooky holiday, keep in mind steps you should take to keep an insect infestation from cropping up and coming in after all the treats shared this month.

Earwigs are nocturnal insects that hide in small, moist crevices during the day, and are active at night. They have a

pair of forcep pincers. Earwigs are abundant and are mostly found in the Southern and Southwestern states. They don't survive outdoors during the winter months so they start looking to move indoors as the temperatures drop in October.

Another not-so-fun October surprise is the brown recluse spider. This spider is light to medium brown and has a dark fiddle or violin shape down the middle of its body – hence their common name "Violin or Fiddle-back spiders." They have six eyes while most spiders have eight, and have been known to survive up to six months with little or no food. This spider survives longer in a relatively cooler, stable environment, which it can find in your home.

Rodents are around all year, but come October they want to come inside out of the cold winter weather. These animals are trying to find food and can be real pests if candy is purchased early for the holiday, old pumpkins are left outside or left over candy from Halloween is left out or uncovered. Rodent-borne diseases can be spread directly to humans by consuming food or water that is contaminated. Tips for trick-o-treaters and homeowners to stay on the look out for during October:

- Keep candy from Halloween stored in a tight-lid container.
 Don't leave empty candy wrappers lying around and dis-
- pose of old pumpkins.Seal cracks and small holes as soon as possible.
- Make sure to put trash in garbage cans with the lids on to keep critters out.
- Keep trash contained to decrease the smell and attraction.

Incentives can change

2012 is fast approaching and time is running out on the 2011 solar incentives. Beginning Jan. 1, 2012 incentives decline significantly for new solar PV systems installed on homes and businesses.

The two incentives impacted as we enter 2012 are Renewable Energy Certificates (REC) and tax depreciation rules. Changes in the REC program apply to both homes and businesses, whereas the tax depreciation rules apply only to businesses.

RECs have been a key incentive for the past three years, making it financially worthwhile for hundreds of homes and businesses in the Las Cruces area to add solar. We expect this incentive to drop up to 45 percent starting January 2012.

The current REC incentives are packaged into two programs: small and medium. Small system RECs are currently worth 12 cents per kilowatt-hour, and medium system RECs are worth 15.5 cents per kilowatt hour. Both programs run for 12 years, commencing with the activation of your PV system.

Even though the program terms for 2012 are not yet determined, the most optimistic outcome would see them fall by only 45 percent for the life of the program beginning the first half of 2012.

The small system program drops to 10 cents per kilowatthour, and the medium system program drops to 12 cents per kilowatt-hour. The length of the program is also reduced. Now all new programs end on Dec. 31, 2020. That means the sooner you enter the program, the greater your value.

For the past few years, home and business owners who installed PV systems are enjoying a more valuable incentive program than will be available in 2012.

Changes to REC program require you to increase the size of your system to zero your electric bill. When the system




is larger, so is your upfront cost. Yet you can achieve faster payback and lower upfront costs by getting into solar this year versus next year.

Now to focus on special tax deprecation rules for businesses. Only business owners, accountants or people who have trouble falling asleep may want to read this section.

In addition to the REC incentive, businesses adding solar to their property this year can still benefit from the federal and state accelerated depreciation program + Bonus Depreciation. Modified Accelerated Cost Recovery Systems (MACRS) + Bonus Depreciation enables businesses to depreciate 100 percent of the basis cost of the system the first year. If your business would benefit from depreciating a large asset on an accelerated one-year schedule, you may want to grab this.

If federal tax rules proceed as planned, in 2012 the MACRS will drop to a 50 percent first year depreciation. The remaining 50 percent will depreciate according to the standard MACRS schedule.

Still awake? Good, then get out a pencil, do the math and



see if you can benefit from either of these programs, because if you can you'll need to move fast. With both the REC and Tax Depreciation rules changing in 2012 there is not much time left in 2011 to get in ahead of the changes.

Garcia Hall's green upgrade Cool roof saves university upfront, long-term costs

These days, just about everyone is doing their part to be more energy efficient and lighten their share of the power load - including New Mexico State University, which recently received a more than \$11,000 rebate check from El Paso Electric Co. for the installation of a cool roof on Garcia Hall.

Greg Block, assistant director of Student Housing for NMSU, said the roof of the residence hall was due for a maintenance update and instead of going the traditional asphalt route, they decided to go green.

"Billy (Massie of El Paso Electric) and I had a meeting and he told me about the roof rebate they offered and that got the ball rolling," Block said.

This roof is the first to be done under our cool roof program," said Massie, adding that EPE began offering the roof rebates Sept. 1, 2010.

Selecting Elastek of El Paso for the project, the insulation of the cool roof began in May shortly after the spring semester ended.

"It's a sustainable roof," said Vincent Martinez, a sales and technical representative of Elastek. "There is no maintenance, except for the annual inspections that must take place. Then,

every 10 years, we'll come up here and reapply another coat."

Martinez explained that a cool roof - which is a white elastomeric product - is different than an asphalt roof in many ways, beginning with insulation. While installing an asphalt roof requires the old roof to be torn out, costing thousands of dollars and forcing the building to be closed, the cool roof is simply sprayed over the existing surface.

"It would have cost \$524,000 to replace this roof with as-phalt," Martinez said. "We saved them \$300,000 up front."

In addition to installation costs, the cool roof will save on energy and utility bills because it will block UV rays before they turn into heat. By reflecting the rays instead of absorbing them, Martinez said the roof temperature will be about 85 degrees – a large drop from the 150 to 160 degrees it was before.

While Block said it is too early to see the cost savings of the new roof, Martinez said in general, cool roof system users see a reduction in cooling costs as high as 40 percent and no less than 20 percent.

"With the old roof, the heat would transfer to the rooms and the air conditioners would have to work harder to cool," Block said. "Now, there will be less heat transfer."

"It pays for itself," Martinez said.

The six-week installation process began by power-washing

and preparing the roof for the material, Martinez said. After it was properly prepped, the product was sprayed on with a twocoat application process that resulted in a 25-to-30-millimeterthick membrane.

"The product is designed to degrade half a mil per year," Martinez said.

Because the substance is a low-volatile organic compound, making it non-toxic, Garcia Hall didn't have to be shut down while it was being applied.

By using the EPE rebate program, NMSU received 15 cents for every square foot of the 78,000-square-foot roof covered, saving the university 14 percent of the cost of the project.

'The rebate allowed them to get a much better, more efficient roof," said Massie, adding that the electric company has worked with NMSU on other rebate programs, such as retrofitting its light fixtures and replacing its evaporative cooling units.

"Because of the savings, we were able to get a better product with more lifespan," Block said.

Thanks to the success of the Garcia Hall cool roof, Block added that the university will consider similar roofing projects in the future.

"It's great," he said. "It helps with the budget while at the same time being environmentally friendly."

Installing cool roofs all over New Mexico and west Texas, Martinez said Elastek has conducted several in Las Cruces, both residential and commercial. He added that he is currently working with the City of Las Cruces, White Sands Missile Range and Holloman Air Force Base on projects of varying sizes.



Before the installation of the cool roof system in May, the roof of Garcia Hall was covered in asphalt, which made the building inefficient because it would absorb heat, making the air conditioning units work harder to cool.

Make room for squash

Fall's versatile vegetable teams up with chile

A favorite autumn veggie of mine is acorn squash. I'm fond of its sweet and flavorful taste. Plus, it's a breeze to slice and to cook – cut it in half, scoop out the seeds and it's ready for the oven or microwave.

I enjoy it buttered and sprinkled with brown sugar that's been tossed with a dose of cayenne pepper. Two other favorite recipes, shared in this week's column, I spotted in Gourmet magazine several years ago. The roasted squash is drizzled with pod-hot lime vinaigrette. Another recipe calls for curry, chile powder, cinnamon, ginger and brown sugar. You're going to love these flavor melds! Each pairs well with just about any cut of meat. For me, a grilled center-

cut pork chop or

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baked chicken breast.

Acorn squash is versatile. It tastes exceptional in casseroles, stir-fries and soups. Oh, be sure to save the seeds. Roast and spice them as you would pumpkin seeds. Eat 'em by the handful or sprinkle them on salads for texture, crunch and pizzazz.

Roasted Acorn Squash with Chile-Lime Vinaigrette

2 (1 1/2 to 1 3/4 pound) acorn squash 1/2 teaspoon black pepper

- 1 teaspoon salt
- 6 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 garlic clove
- 1 1/2 tablespoons fresh lime juice, or to taste 1 to 2 teaspoons fresh hot red chile,
- including seeds, finely chopped
- 2 tablespoons fresh cilantro, chopped

Put oven racks in upper and lower thirds of oven and preheat oven to 450 degrees. Halve squash lengthwise, then cut off and discard stem ends. Scoop out seeds and cut squash lengthwise into 3/4-inch-wide wedges. Toss squash with black pepper, 3/4 teaspoon salt and 2 tablespoons oil in a bowl, then arrange, cut sides down, in 2 large shallow baking pans. Roast squash, switching position of pans halfway through roasting, until squash is tender and undersides of wedges are golden brown, 25 to 35 minutes.

While squash roasts, mince garlic and mash to a paste with remaining 1/4 teaspoon salt. Transfer paste to a small bowl and whisk in lime juice, chile (to taste), cilantro and remaining 1/4 cup oil until combined. Transfer squash, browned sides up, to a platter and drizzle with vinaigrette. Makes 4 servings. (Recipe adapted from Gourmet, October 2006.)

Indian Summer Squash

acorn squash
 teaspoons olive oil, or to taste
 teaspoon curry powder
 1/2 teaspoon chili powder, or to taste
 Salt and pepper
 tablespoon butter
 tablespoon dark brown sugar
 teaspoon cinnamon
 teaspoon ginger

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees. Cut the acorn squash in half and scoop out the strings and seeds. Place in a small pie pan or baking dish. Rub one half with the olive oil, coating the cavity well. Then rub in the curry and chili powders and some salt and pepper. Rub softened butter in the other half and sprinkle with brown sugar, cinnamon and ginger. Bake for 50 to 60 minutes or until the squash easily comes up with a fork. Let cool for a few minutes, then eat straight from the rind, mashing it up with a spoon. Makes 1 serving.

Autumn Veggie Roast

small butternut squash, cubed
 red bell pepper, seeded and diced
 poblano pepper, seeded and died
 sweet potato, peeled and cubed
 Yukon Gold potatoes, cubed
 red onion, quartered
 tablespoon fresh thyme, chopped
 tablespoons fresh rosemary, chopped
 tablespoons balsamic vinegar
 Salt and freshly ground black pepper

Preheat oven to 475 degrees. In a large bowl, combine the squash, red bell and poblano peppers, sweet potato and Yukon Gold potatoes. Separate the red onion quarters into pieces, and add them to the mixture. In a small bowl, stir together thyme, rosemary, olive oil, vinegar, salt and pepper. Toss with vegetables until they are coated. Spread evenly on a large roasting pan. Roast for 35 to 40 minutes in the preheated oven, stirring every 10 minutes, or until vegetables are cooked through and browned.


