

City poised to redraw districts

Plan F variations to be discussed

The Las Cruces City Council will consider changes to council redistricting Plan F at a special work session 10 a.m. Monday, June 20, at City Hall, 700 N. Main St.

The special work session will precede the regular council meeting during which the council will consider the first reading of an ordinance to move forward with the adoption of a chosen plan.

A recent work session reviewing eight redistricting plans resulted in the council forming a consensus for plans F and F1, but councillors asked for more options to keep Downtown historic neighbors in a single district. The re-worked plans are referred to as F2 and F3.

Research & Polling Inc., the company hired to redraw City Council districts, created the re-worked plans based on the council input.

The re-worked plans, F2 and F3, are printed on page A3, and also available online at www.las-cruces.org.

Redrawing city council district boundaries is required by state law and the Las Cruces City Charter to coincide with the federal census every 10 years. Based on the official federal census counts, district boundaries are drawn primarily to give equal population representation on each council district.

Guidelines for the redistricting process are:

- Each district shall contain, as nearly as possible, substantially the same population based upon the most recent federal census. To be equal in population in the context of state or local districting would require the total population of any one district not have more than a 5 percent variance from a mathematically equal population for all six districts.
- Plans must avoid dilution of minority voting strength. With respect to racial or ethnic communities, courts often refer to a "totality of circumstances" in judging whether or not a plan

Sunspots fading researchers say

Significant solar finding announced in Las Cruces

A major announcement about changes in solar sunspot activity is getting international attention, though some of the speculation about the findings reach further than what the scientists are willing to venture.

At the American Astronomical Society's conference held at the Las Cruces Convention Center Tuesday, June 14, three scientists studying different aspects of solar activity related to sunspot cycles found indications of the same trend – that sunspots are fading faster than normal, calling into question when the next sunspot cycle will occur – or even if sunspots

will return.

Sunspot activities can interfere with radio and telecommunications. Sunspots are relatively cool regions of hot gas on the sun's surface, buoyed at the surface by intense magnetic fields. The cycles for sunspots to wax and wane averages 11 years.

Frank Hill, an associate director with the National Solar Observatory in Tucson, Ariz., said the movement of the magnetic fields act similar to jet streams in Earth's weather patterns, migrating from the sun's poles to its equator. The current cycle is near the equator, but new sunspots have yet to begin forming at the poles, which is when the next cycle of sunspots usually begin.

"This leads us to believe that the next cycle will be delayed, very weak or not at all," Hill said.

Richard Altrack of the Air Force Research Lab also found indicators that these magnetic fields were not rushing back to the poles as they had done in past cycles. He said there appears to be magnetic migration, but it is happening later and slower than past cycles.

"It looks tremendously different than the previous two cycles (measured since 1990)," Altrack said

Matt Penn, another researcher with the National Solar Observatory, also found decreasing magnetism in the sunspots themselves







- harms minority group voting strength.
- Communities of interest shall be preserved whenever reasonable within a single district. Maintaining and preserving communities of interest has no precise mathematical solution.
- The boundary lines for each district shall

be contiguous. All parts must be together with no separated "islands" of territory.

- Each district shall be compact. The total length of all district boundary lines shall be as short as possible.

Both state law and the city charter require the city council to make the final determination of the redistricting plan it feels best meets the needs of the city and its voters.

District 1 is represented by Miguel Silva and his term expires this year.

District 2 is represented by Dolores Connor whose term expires this year, but she is vacating her seat to run for mayor. District 3 is represented by Olga Pedroza and her term expires in 2013. District 4 is represented by Nathan Small and his term expires this year. District 5 is represented by Gill Sorg and his term expires 2013. District 6 is represented by Sharon Thomas and her term expires in 2013. Mayor Ken Miyagishima is elected at large and his term expires this year.

Above are the Las Cruces City Council's finalists for the reorganization of council districts within the city. In these two iterations, districts 2, 5 and 6 are essentially identical. The variations are in districts 1, 3 and 4. The council meets Monday, June 20, to consider the plans.



American Dreams

As our leaders deal with a fragile economy and social entitlement, what has happened to common sense and individual responsibility?

I have been blessed to have lived during the best of times in the greatest country in the history of the world. Forged by fierce independence, innovation and a strong sense of pride and destiny, the United States of America has set a standard of excellence that is unparalleled.

However, the very freedoms for which our citizens have battled to instill and protect over the past 250 years are now at risk. The entrepreneurial spirit of America is being choked by a creeping socialism that threatens our American way of life, including the opportunity to aspire to achieve the "American Dream."

From a societal standpoint, our prevailing, liberal definition of "freedom" might pose the greatest risk. As a conservative, God-fearing, USA-loving American, I am stunned to see what has now become acceptable for entertainment, government control and even education, under the guise of "protecting our freedom."

Something is terribly wrong when we realize what we have lost in the past two generations. The Pledge of Allegiance has been eliminated from protocol from many of our schools, in part because some people claim to have been offended by the term "... one nation, under God." Gone from traditional school curriculum are the formerly required classes in civics and geography. Prayers at public events have been replaced with a "moment of silence." High school and college bands have generally abandoned the traditional patriotic songs and marches. When was the last time we heard "Stars and Stripes Forever" played at a football game or a parade?

Youth organizations such as the Boy Scouts of America have come under fire and are not held in the same high esteem as they were in past generations. My experience with scouting taught me to respect others and take pride in my country. I learned individual responsibility, teamwork and how to measure success and gain recognition through the scouting merit badge program.


My education was consistent and reinforced among my parents, local schools, church and local civic organizations. An example of parental education that helped form my perspective on business was with my first job. At age 14, I worked as a general laborer for an oil-field construction company and earned about \$50 per week. After taxes, my net take-home pay was about \$42.50. My dad strongly suggested that I buy a \$50 U.S. Savings Bond each week at a cost of \$37.50. He then charged me 25 cents per day for the round trip cost of his driving me to and from work. He asked to be reimbursed 35 cents per day for the lunch box meals my mom prepared. Dad loaned me \$4.50 to purchase a new lunch pail and Thermos, and for the first five weeks of work, dad charged me \$1 a week to pay off the loan, including 50 cents interest. This meant that while I was paying off the loan, my net pocket money was \$1 per week.

After the first five weeks, the loan was repaid with interest and my net weekly earnings doubled to \$2, an amount that was quite adequate for a non-driving teenager at that time. Obviously, this was my first lesson in cost accounting. Two things I learned from this experience was the value of savings and that a person should always consider all the costs of an action.

Today, our challenges are different than they were 50 years ago. Owning a business is not as simple as it once was. In the past month, our company has been required to pay federal and state taxes in advance, fill out seven different government reports and deal with two situations where the government had made errors in handling our payments, and we had to invest time and money to show that we had paid proper amounts on time. We also learned, without advance notice, our unemployment tax rate nearly doubled.

As business owners, we are willing to do our part, within reason, to help our state and country get back on track to a sound economic footing. We will also encourage our fellow citizens, educators and elected leaders to instill traditions, encourage appropriate work ethics and individual responsibility in order to minimize an attitude of entitlement and government dependence.

Our dream is that we can regain the values that have made our country great. We can do this because, in America, we should expect our dreams to come true, as we live together in ... one nation, under God.

Column a new low

Michael Swickard's column "Land of Enticement" (Friday, May 27) is a new low in opinion writing.

Swickard's premise: Some politicians require money for access or influence. Swickard's evidence: If a politician gets contributions "it means something."

The sneak attack

There is more than one definition for pasture roping, as Carter pointed out to me. It was during calving season. He and his wife were making the 5 p.m. heifer check. They were in the pickup driving through the calving pasture and noted a good size critter in the process of calving. They had seen it earlier. Jemez Pueblo's plan to build casino in Anthony still faces uncertainties

Sunland Park owners, Mescalero Apache voice opposition

The Jemez casino at Anthony, N.M., doesn't look nearly as sure today as it did a month ago when the Bureau of Indian Affairs issued a very rosy draft environmental impact study of the proposal.

Evidently, the draft was prepared by the Jemez Pueblo for the BIA's consideration. The negative side of the proposal was not mentioned, but now it is coming out.

The Jemez Pueblo wants to build a casino at Anthony, south of Las Cruces, to attract the large population in the El Paso and Juárez area, which don't have casinos.

Jemez has the misfortune of not being located on a major highway. So it has petitioned the BIA to allow it to locate a casino on land it would purchase almost 300 miles to the south.

Obviously, few people from Jemez would work at the site but the income from the casino would be very helpful. And Anthony, in an economically depressed area, could benefit from the jobs.

Santa Fe businessman Gerald Peters also is involved in the deal. He would build and operate a hotel at the site. An application by the Jemez and Peters was rejected during the George W. Bush administration. But the current administration is reviewing those rejections.

Other casinos in the area now are letting their thoughts be known. Sunland Park Racetrack & Casino is located about 15 miles to the southwest. The racino contends that another casino in the county would be economically devastating.

The Mescalero Apache tribe, located 100 miles away, says it also would be harmed. Somehow, nearly a dozen Indian casinos and a racino are successfully operating in the Albuquerque-Santa Fe area.

The Mescaleros have a point when they contend that the proposed casino would be on land where Apaches once roamed – not the Jemez or any other pueblo.

Gov. Susana Martinez also gets to weigh in on the approval before it is granted. She has said that she is open to considering it, but lately has sounded more wary of the arrangement.

Lurking in the background are other issues that could have an even greater effect on the final decision.

If approved, this casino reportedly would be the farthest distance of any casino in the nation from the reservation operating it. And if this one is approved, it could set a precedent for going even farther off a reservation.

The Fort Sill Apaches in Oklahoma want to open a casino at Akela, between Las Cruces and Deming. This was their homeland until the U.S. government moved them out.

After Geronimo's death, the Apache band was allowed to return to the Mescalero Reservation in New Mexico. But some

decided to stay in Fort Sill. They are the ones who want to build a New Mexico casino – but they don't want Geronimo's remains moved back here.

Another issue involves Stan Fulton, owner of Sunland Park Racetrack & Casino. He has candidly said he is willing to spend whatever it takes to keep out any competition. He has given millions to New Mexico State University, which also is named in his will to receive half ownership of the racino upon his death.

The only proviso is that all competition be kept out of Doña Ana County. He has asked NMSU to oppose the Anthony casino. It hasn't, but some of its regents reportedly have personally opposed it.

Numerous business and governmental groups in the area have supported the casino, but NMSU doesn't show up on that

list either. Fulton is not from the area. He lives in Las Vegas, Nev., and is in the gaming business.

The New Mexico Indian Gaming Association also opposes the Jemez request. That is unusual because nearly all the casinos are owned by other pueblos, which usually have good relations.

A few years ago, the Pojoaque and Nambé pueblos traded land parcels so Nambé could have land for a casino fronting the highway, squeezed between the Pojoaque and Tesuque casinos.

The good, the bad and local tourism draws

Pat Garrett gets no respect

Years ago, at an informal meeting of tourism planners, I watched as they searched for money-making ideas. One said New Mexico wastes perfectly good weekends when there are no celebrations. The “tourist-to-local ratio” turns heavily local. The group agreed that we already have the locals' money, we need more tourists.

So they ordered another round of drinks and brainstormed celebrations. Here are a few of the “better” ones: Dust Days (March or April), Cow Chip Days (any month), Bow Tie Days, Horned Toad Days, Siesta Days and my personal favorite, Hot Steering Wheel Days.

But seriously folks ... A while back a television crew from Phoenix came to Las Cruces to do a story on famed Old West Sheriff Pat Garrett. They called on me because the idea for the television story was inspired by one of my columns.

Garrett was a real life hero, who was honored and respected, while Billy the Kid is a myth made up in the 1926 book by Walter Noble Burns. It is an insult to the Garrett family when people celebrate a myth and forget the real story.

Over the last 30 years, I have written a yearly column because I feel we should not celebrate an outlaw scum, who rustled cattle, stole horses and killed unarmed people.

Consider this: A celebration of Garrett would get national attention and, even more important, send the correct message about gangs and outlaws to our children. It is true that Garrett had rough edges, as did many people in those days. He was no saint, though comparing Garrett to the Kid is like comparing Charlie Sheen to Charles Manson. One is a bad boy while the other is a monster.

In August each year, there is the Lincoln Days celebration in Lincoln County celebrating Billy the Kid. Each year I do not go to celebrate an outlaw thug.

Instead, I bore my friends and acquaintances with Garrett stories. Each year I bend every elbow and ear I can find by pushing the idea of New Mexico Pat Garrett Days in Las Cruces to give tourists to our fair state a choice of who they want to celebrate.

I am not one of those “nuts” who thinks all celebrations have to be entirely “truth” based. We can have fun with a Garrett celebration. For example, I give my “Roswell smirk” when the subject of space aliens comes up. Hey, a good time is had by all. But I do not have that same feeling about Billy the Kid.

My grandmother taught in a one-room school and roomed with Susan McSween Barber, one of the Lincoln County War's central survivors. I was steeped in Lincoln County War stories as a child. But I take my cue from my grandmother who was much more interested in the Garretts as a New Mexico family, especially Elizabeth, the blind daughter who wrote New Mexico's state song.

Despite liking her host, she joined most of New Mexico in celebrating Garrett and vilifying Billy the Kid. It was that way in New Mexico until the publication of the Walter Noble Burns revised history book. We have had a couple of generations who did not realize they were celebrating a Charles Manson type.

The Billy the Kid story we know is false. In Fort Sumner there is a Billy the Kid headstone that tourists stand before reverently with nothing under it. No one knows where the Kid's remains are buried. Garrett's grave is surrounded by family and friends in the Masonic Cemetery, in Las Cruces. He was a real person who made a difference in our state. He had guts and gumption and fought the outlaws.

President Theodore Roosevelt said, upon learning of Garrett's death, that Garrett was not the man who upheld the arm of law and order in New Mexico; he was the first man to introduce law and order. Pretty high praise from the president of the United States.

A Pat Garrett Days celebration is a lot better than holding Scum Days just because some tourists do not know Old West scum from an Old West hero.

Los Alamos tested nuclear engines for spaceflight use

No record of flight tests ever being conducted during program that was terminated in 1972

Following the reactor test, a B-57 flew into the “billowing cloud of white smoke” to “search for radiation,” The Las Vegas Review-Journal reported on June 21, 1959. The crew detected none.

The test at Jackass Flats, Nev., on Saturday, June 20, 1959, was the first ever for the Atomic Energy Commission's nuclear rocket engine Kiwi-A.

“The experiment was conducted as part of the AEC's Project Rover,” the Las Vegas Sun said in its June 21 story, “to determine whether it is feasible to develop an atomic rocket engine for outer space travel.”

Kiwi-A was a “non-flying prototype of the nuclear rocket engine which scientists hope some day will propel man through outer space,” the Review-Journal stated. According to a Feb. 19 feature in The Wall Street Journal, the engine's namesake was the flightless New Zealand kiwi bird.

Project Rover began in April 1955, the Sun said, but was not revealed publicly until the next year, the Santa Fe New Mexican documented on March 27, 1960. In a story headlined “Chance Remarks Reveal Project Rover,” writer Peggy Corbett said that “on Sept. 5, 1956, the United States revealed it had embarked on one of the most important research projects in recent history – but not with fanfare of publicity and a presidential announcement.” A New Mexican reporter discovered the classified project buried in a Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory ad, including one in the New York Times, announcing engineering jobs. The ad mentioned: “N division is concerned with the research and development of nuclear

rocket propulsion.”

U.S. Sen. Clinton P. Anderson, who represented New Mexico, and who was chairman of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy, questioned the project's classified designation. Corbett said he “pointed out that the military has set up no requirement for the project and it is not even mentioned in the NASA's ten-year program.”

As Rover took shape there was apparently very little news nationwide, except in local newspapers, until the Kiwi-A test. The Wall Street Journal may have been the exception. Corbett said that from 1956-1959 the media was “so poorly informed on the subject that the lists of scientific achievements for 1959 fail to mention the test.”

Less than two weeks after the test, the July 2 Los

Alamos employee bulletin, LASL Community NEWS, announced plans for a “permanent Nevada colony in support of (the) Kiwi-Rover Project.” Two years later, however, The New Mexican (July 2, 1961) reported “acceleration of the Rover program may be hampered for the lack of 20 housing units in Los Alamos.”


The bulletin also published photographs showing a handful of reporters awaiting the Kiwi-A firing. They were from the Sun and Review-Journal, and would also file their stories with the news agencies The Associated Press and United Press International. There was also a separate UPI photographer, and a New York Times reporter.

On July 13, 1959, Time described Kiwi-A as “a high-power density reactor” that heated hydrogen to 2,000-3,000 degrees Fahrenheit, and proclaimed the test “an event most newspapers ignored.”

The Dec. 3, 1959, LASL Community News informed readers the Voice of America radio network would broadcast an interview describing Kiwi-A, taped at Los Alamos radio station KRSN, “to the people of Germany.”

Three months later, on March 20, 1960, The New Mexican reported that Los Alamos scientists were headed to Washington to present Project Rover to the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy. They would enlighten the “Congress and the public of prospects for important long-term advances in nuclear energy.”

The website Lanl.gov said Kiwi-B followed, which “increased power by ten-fold.” Phoebus-1 (1965) and -2 (1968) were phase two of

Rover, the latter “the most powerful nuclear reactor ever built” at the time. Pewee was phase three, “a smaller version of Kiwi” that was flight-sized.

The New Mexican, on March 25, 1960, said the AEC intended to have a reactor ready to propel a rocket into space in five years, (although there is no record that ever occurred). The Sept. 8 edition noted NASA's Nuclear Propulsion Office had partnered with the AEC to advance Rover. On Oct. 14, the paper announced a Kiwi-A3 test would take place the following day. On Nov. 1, a UPI story in the paper reported the federal government had “announced a speedup ... in Project Rover to develop a nuclear rocket for manned missions to the moon and planets.”

Then, on July 27, 1961, the LASL News noted AEC-NASA had “officially named” Jackass Flats the National Nuclear Rocket Development Center.

On Nov. 7, 1961, a Kiwi B-1A engine exploded. The December 1961 Nuclear News attributed the cause to a hydrogen leak. A “portable metal shed temporarily housing the reactor” was “completely wrecked,” and metal smashed the top of a pickup truck. Four men variously “suffered” a broken arm, a fractured

bone, a cracked kneecap, and perforated eardrums.

Project Rover “ended in 1972” according to the November 1997 LANL publication Reflections, most likely due to budget cuts.

Around the same time as Project Rover began, the Review-Journal reported guards at the Titanium Metals Co. in Henderson, Nev., sighted four UFOs one night. The “oval in shape and silver-white in color” discs flew first in “circular formation, to a straight line formation, and back to a circular formation.” A second story reported on “a rash of flying saucer reports.” Witnesses included a sheriff's sergeant and staff at the civil-

ian McCarran Field control tower. Nellis Air Force Base and McCarran officials determined the object was a “dying meteor” and not “one of those airborne weirdies.”

The “only disappointed persons in the matter were avid science fiction readers and relentless pursuers of unidentified flying objects, who didn't like logical explanations about a meteor,” the story said. “A tourist also reported seeing a UFO, but then tourists see a lot of things.”

Any protestant or protestant's may appeal the decision of the Board directly to District Court within 10 days of the adoption or rejection of the Resolution."

since 2000. These three independent observations led them to hold the press conference to announce their belief the current sunspot cycle is ending without another one immediately following, he said.

As soon as the announcement hit the Internet, speculation began about it being a signal of a new colder period of weather on Earth – global cooling instead of global warming.

Between 1645 and 1715, astronomers observed little to no sunspot activity – referred to as the Maunder Minimum – during which the Earth's weather was very cold. Some speculate this current sunspot trend could mean a calmer sun, resulting in a similar "Little Ice Age," the term given to the weather experienced during the Maunder Minimum.

Scientists at the Las Cruces press conference wouldn't venture to say what it means to the Earth's weather.

Hill said sunspots may play a role in climate change, but that doesn't mean there won't be other solar activity, such as the recent massive solar flare that occurred even as the strengths of the current sunspots are dissipating. The kind of coronal mass ejection that barely missed the Earth last week is more commonly seen at the peak of sunspot cycle activity.

"It's unclear what will happen," Altrock said. This change is significant for the sun, Hill said, making the coming years very exciting for solar scientists. Should sunspots eventually return, scientists can observe their creation from the beginning, rather than emerging as part of a cycle migration of magnetic fields on the sun, he said.

News New Mexico is aired on KSNM from 6 to 9 a.m. weekdays. It includes a website, www.newsnm.com, and has been picked up by stations in Carlsbad, Artesia, Clayton and Alamogordo.

Swickard said the show came about from conversations he had with Spence

Technology is able to make News New Mexico a broader, more active talk show than his previous radio work, Swickard said. For example, he had sound clips before, but Spence "put it on steroids" with more clips used throughout the program.

Spence also built studio space for News New Mexico at his business off Triviz Drive and purchased equipment to make the syndication possible.

County fireworks laws to be strictly enforced

Doña Ana County Fire and Emergency Service Department and the Doña Ana County

Sheriff's Department will work closely with other law-enforcement agencies during the upcoming July 4 holiday weekend to strictly enforce all laws pertaining to the sales, possession and use of fireworks during the current extreme drought conditions.


While there is no provision to ban firework sales outright, close attention will be paid to how they are sold and subsequently discharged.

Due to the drought, Doña Ana County has banned the use of all fireworks within areas that are covered wholly or in part by timber, brush or native grass. Permissible fireworks can only be discharged in areas that are paved, barren or that have a readily accessible water source. Permissible fireworks allowed to be purchased and discharged are ground and hand-held sparkling and smoking devices, including cone fountains, crackling devices, cylindrical fountains, illuminating torches, toy smoke devices and wheels.

Fireworks prohibited for possession, sale or use in the unincorporated areas of Doña Ana County are aerial and ground audible devices such as aerial spinners, helicopters, mines, missile-type rockets, Roman candles, shells, stick-type rockets, chasers and firecrackers.

Small-tract watering date set

The Elephant Butte Irrigation District will conduct its small-tract irrigation on Saturday or Sunday, June 25 - 26, treasurer-manager Gary Esslinger announced.

Since the EBID 2011 allotment is only 4 inches, there probably will be one small tract delivery.

"As a reminder, small-tract irrigators can water their acreage on either Saturday or Sunday, but not on both days," Esslinger said. "Another option may be to irrigate along with a farmer instead of on a small-tract weekend. This may be an option when a small-tract parcel is located adjacent to a farm or is on the same irrigation ditch. Coordinating flat-rate and farm irrigation is encouraged and beneficial to EBID by making water delivery more efficient."

Flat-raters are encouraged to discuss deliveries and options with their ditch riders or to call the EBID at 526-6671

High school redistricting committee begins work

It doesn't open for another 14 months, but Las Cruces' newest high school, Centennial, is becoming a recognizable structure as it takes form on the southern end of Sonoma Ranch Boulevard. It's set to open its doors in August 2012. As construction continues, Las Cruces Public Schools is taking the first steps to develop the new school's boundaries.

The boundary lines will determine the school's attendance zone, which lets students know whether they will attend the school, based on where they live, said Superintendent Stan Rounds.

"There's always a lot of interest in the community when we begin discussions about high school redistricting," Rounds said. "This will be a process that spans several months and will

include a great deal of public input."

The Las Cruces Board of Education recently appointed a citizen-based advisory committee that will develop boundary recommendations. Local resident Merrie Lee Soules, who chaired an LCPS redistricting committee in 2009, will chair the Committee. Their first meeting was held Thursday, June 16.

Other appointed community members are: Tracey Alexander, Gilbert Apodaca, Cindy Aragon, David Fierro, Larry Garcia, Michael Hays, Patty Hughs, Irene Montoya, Earl Nissen, Janel Ortiz, Susan Palmer, Lucy Rathgeber and Dawn Starostka. LCPS administrators on the committee include Centennial High Principal Michael Montoya, principals from the other large high schools and Associate Superintendent for Operations Herb Torres.

Torres said the committee will follow a process similar to what was done when adjusted boundaries were needed for a new elementary (Monte Vista) and middle school (Mesa). Over several months, the advisory committee will spend many hours reviewing data such as student population, growth trends and capacity of existing schools, to help draw the attendance zones. Their recommendations will be presented with maps at several public meetings before the school board makes the final determination.

Man plans to enter mayor's race


Las Cruces may have another candidate to choose from in the November mayor's race.

Water lawsuit settlement possible

Agricultural water rights dispute may be resolved

Parties in the 3rd Judicial District Court water rights litigation are working together on a proposed settlement for equitable agriculture water rights in the lower Rio Grande.

The case still is open, and District Judge Jerold Valentine has set a hearing date for Friday, June 24, to review the parties' arguments. Representatives of the organizations involved say they are optimistic they can have a settlement ready for approval by then.

The litigation parties are the Southern Rio Grande Diversified Crop Farmers Association, New Mexico Pecan Growers (NMPG), Elephant Butte Irrigation District (EBID) and the Office of the State Engineer.

"The New Mexico Pecan Growers Association has successfully worked with farmer groups and the EBID to arrive at an equitable settlement of the water requirements for all crops in the lower Rio Grande," Tessa Davidson, legal counsel for the NMPG, reported to the organization's board. "The new settlement sets an annual irrigation duty of 4.5 acre-feet

per acre for all crops. However, it also allows those farmers that need more than 4.5 acre-feet the opportunity to obtain the amount their crops need by providing evidence of historical use of water in excess of 4.5 acre-feet.

"As pecan orchards are high water use and permanent crops, it was necessary to provide pecan farmers the ability to prove up their orchards' real water needs. NMPG believes the new settlement provides a fair solution for all farmers in the lower Rio Grande and is encouraged by the spirit of cooperation shown by the farmers, EBID and the state in reaching

an agreement in this important issue." There is 90,640 acres of land with surface water rights in the EBID.

The NMPG association has scheduled two member meetings to explain the proposal at the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum 1:30 p.m. Wednesday, June 22, and 9 a.m. Thursday, June 23, Davidson said.

"It's better to get an agreement without going to the expense of going to trial," said David Salopek, NMPG president.

A.J. Olsen of Henninghausen and Olsen, Roswell representing the Southern Rio Grande Diversified Crop Farmers, said all parties are meeting to work out the final terms.

"I'm very pleased that all parties in this case have come together to work out an agreement, which is in the best interest of everyone in the lower Rio Grande," Olsen said.

Drought stresses grazing livestock

Ranchers try to help herds

New Mexico ranchers are hanging on to their breeding stock through this persistent drought, hoping they can rebuild their herds.

Ken Treadwell raises Black Angus cattle in Luna, Sierra and Grant counties, and is being hit hard by the prolonged drought. Treadwell, like other New Mexico cattlemen, is trying to figure out how to survive.

"There's some grazing left from last summer, but only about half as much as usual, but it's going to be gone before long," he said. "A lot of our cows are having calves, and if cows have calves at their sides, they need to produce milk. Right now, we're giving them supplemental feed, like alfalfa. But that could only last another month or six weeks, and then it'll be another story."

The cattle shortage has

driven up prices. Ranchers could move their cattle to other pastures, but that would be very expensive.

"This year there aren't any places to move our cattle, like Oklahoma or Colorado," Treadwell said. "The drought is hitting everyone."

The Monday, June 6, storm, the first rain in 119 consecutive days, was sporadic and didn't improve range soil moisture, said state climatologist Dave DuBois.

The National Agricultural Statistics Service reported most ranges are in poor to very poor condition. Doña Ana County ranges are rated in extreme drought, but the eastern part of the state is rated "exceptional drought."

Many range windmills have been sucking mud because the ground water table has dropped, and ranchers have had to turn to electric pumps to lift the water for their cattle.

This is truly a great team. It's a huge honor to be a part of this."

Austin Trout fell short of his prediction of knocking out David Lopez, nevertheless the Las Cruces boxer defeated the Mexican brawler by unanimous decision to retain his WBA Super Welterweight title.

The Las Cruces southpaw dominated the fight Saturday, June 11, winning 119-109, 118-109, 117-110.

"He came to win. He gave a lot and took a lot," Trout said. "He was experienced and was a tough guy. I hit him with a lot of stuff."

Lopez wouldn't quit, constantly shaking off the champ's punches.

"I thought he would go down," Trout said. "I'd go in for the kill and he would cover and come back with something of his own. He showed a lot of heart that night."

Trout doesn't have another fight set in stone, but said his camp is working on getting a fight in Australia with Anthony Mundine (42-4, 25 KO).

"I've always wanted to go to Australia and I'll get paid to go," Trout said. "I want to go scuba diving in the Great Barrier Reef. That's on my list of things to do before I die. I'm going to get my certification for scuba diving, so I can go over there and just jump in there."


When he's not daydreaming about exploring the deep blue waters off Australia, Trout is busy training and becoming a better boxer.

While Trout has had success in the ring, he's not been able to land a marquee matchup that could elevate his career.

Trout is 23-0 with 13 knockouts and the holder of the WBA Super Welterweight Title. However, he's not the best in the world or even one of the top 10 fighters in his weight class, according to Ring Magazine.

The top-ranked light middleweight is Miguel Cotto, who holds the WBA Super Welterweight Super title, and Trout wants a match.

"I'd love to fight Cotto. He needs to cut that out so I can take that strap off his back," Trout said. "The politics of this game is so disgusting. It's up to Cotto's promoter. I'm not holding my

breath, but I'm going to make sure I get the fight eventually. Until I get Cotto, I'm going to keep fighting and building up my legacy until people like Miguel Cotto have no choice but to fight me."

He will be at two different events Saturday, June 18. Trout will start off at the Habitat for Humanity ReStore, 2301 S. Main St., from 9 a.m. to noon and will be at Sisbarro Buick-GMC, 425 W. Boutz Road from 12:30 to 2:30 p.m.

"Oh yeah, I'll bring my belt," he said. "All of my belts."

North Dakota is new home for former Aggie volleyball player Krystal Torres

NMSU libero finds new comfort zone on the great plains

Spending time in Honolulu as well as her hometown of Las Cruces, Krystal Torres knew about adjusting to different environments and appreciating other cultures.

But then came North Dakota.

For a southern New Mexico girl, who was born in Hawaii, the move to the University of North Dakota in Grand Forks last year wasn't easy. The former Mayfield High School and New Mexico State University volleyball standout packed her warmest clothes and hesitantly began the next chapter in her life.

It wasn't the first time volleyball took Torres out of her comfort zone.

She played basketball and volleyball at Mayfield, excelling to the point that she was recruited in both sports. While she was more comfortable playing basketball and spending time with her basketball teammates, there was something about playing volleyball at the next level that she couldn't resist.

NMSU volleyball coach Mike Jordan had been watching Torres for years, he said.

"Even at an early age, you could tell she was a special athlete," Jordan said. "We started recruiting her during her junior year, but we weren't sure she wanted to play volleyball because basketball seemed to be her first love. But we stayed patient and kept recruiting her."

Torres hit it off with the volleyball coaches and decided to play the sport at NMSU, "because I had this feeling like I should," she said.

The initial transition wasn't all that comfortable, however. Torres, who described herself at

the time as "a tomboy who was quiet and reserved," took some time to fit in.

"Volleyball players are just different than basketball players," she said. "They have different personalities. Volleyball players are girly-girls who usually grew up in well-off families and could afford to play on club teams."

Torres, at 5-5, also was several inches shorter than most of the players. But that didn't stop her from making a big impression soon after joining the Aggies.

"With her size, I thought playing libero would fit her pretty well," Jordan said. "As a freshman, she played some and was in the starting lineup as a sophomore. You could see it coming together. She was a special athlete."

Jordan said three things made Torres exceptional as a collegiate defensive specialist – "fast-twitch muscle, an ability to find the ball quickly and a love to compete."

She also began to fit in with the other outstanding players on Jordan's great teams.

"They really welcomed me," Torres said. "I was so quiet at first, but we got to know each other and everything was good."

She was selected to the all-Western Athletic Conference second team in 2006 and the all-WAC first team in 2007 and 2008. She holds the career record for digs at NMSU with 1,942. She also was named first team All-District by the AVCA and also earned honorable mention All-America honors from the organization.

As she completed her bachelor's degree in kinesiology from NMSU, Torres did her internship and spent 2009 as a volunteer assistant volleyball coach at Hawaii Pacific University in Honolulu. Her father and his family live in Hawaii

so the time there was like a reunion, she said.

When it came time for her to find a graduate school last year, Torres' eyes turned north. One of Jordan's assistant coaches, Ashley Hardee, is head coach at the University of North Dakota, and the athletics director is former NMSU AD Brian Faison.

"I knew Ashley was up there, so I got in touch with them and we were able to work something out," Torres said.

Grand Forks, N.D., was like no place she had ever spent time before, she said. Ethnically, she was a major minority, and the weather was a drastic change. The average high temperature in January is 14 degrees. Volleyball was volleyball, but the weather and the culture were something different.

"It was really, really hard at first," she said. "Culturally, it was just so different, and it never got warmer."

The turning point came when Torres said she "got plugged in to a really good church."

"That really fixed everything," she said. "That was a main factor in allowing me to get comfortable up there. They're like family ... they're my church family. It's the best thing ever."

Ironically, some of Torres' friends at Cottonwood Community Church in Grand Forks had spent time in El Paso in recent years, helping to start a new church there – The Rio Church.

"I saw these pictures of El Paso and I was like, 'wow,'" she said. "It's great how it all worked out. When I'm back in Las Cruces, I go to The Rio Church in El Paso."

Torres also has settled in as an assistant coach and will finish up her master's degree in May 2012.

Her academic focus is health and wellness with an emphasis on heart disease education and prevention. She's not sure if she wants to be a volleyball coach or not, but says it's "definitely an option."

Jordan said Torres has some unique qualities that would make her successful.

"Everyone thinks so highly of her off and on the court," Jordan said. "She's someone that people want to follow. I think she would make a great head coach."

Seattle joins WAC stable

Redhawks will not compete in football

The Western Athletic Conference has announced an invitation for membership has been issued to and accepted by Seattle University to join the conference effective July 1, 2012. The announcement comes following the conclusion of the board of directors meeting in which the presidents of both the current schools and the previously announced incoming schools for 2012 met to address several issues important to the WAC.

With the addition, the WAC will consist of nine full-time members for the 2012-13 season; Denver (non-football), Idaho, Louisiana Tech, New Mexico State, San Jose State, Seattle (non-football), Texas State, UTSA and Utah State.

"We are pleased to announce that Seattle University is joining the WAC," said Commissioner Karl Benson. "Seattle's tradition and history along with a strong commitment to academics, its athletics program and their facilities make the university ... a great fit for the WAC."

Seattle, currently an independent, is a private institution founded in 1891 with an enrollment of 7,751. The Redhawks sponsor 19 sports, 17 of which will compete in the WAC (men's and women's cross country, women's soccer, women's volleyball, women's swimming and diving, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, men's and women's basketball, softball, baseball, men's and women's golf and men's and women's tennis). The Redhawks were a Division I team from 1950-80.

Academically, Seattle received APR Public Recognition Awards this past May for women's soccer, women's tennis, women's outdoor track and field, men's golf and men's cross country, as each of those teams had perfect scores of 1,000 in the NCAA's measurement of academic success.

See it, feel it, trust it

Developing feel is an under-appreciated art

I have gotten quite a few questions from readers and others about the topic of "feel." As I see it, golf is all about feel, and how it translates into hitting shots.

For years, golf club manufacturers have made the sound of their clubs a paramount consideration for their marketing efforts. The sound of the ball coming off an acrylic face of a persimmon driver 30 years ago is a far cry from a ball being hit by a 460 cc titanium driver these days. The sound of the ball being propelled by the golf club, the golf companies discovered, was perceived by almost all golfers as the secret to a good golf club – one deserving of their purchase. This was because they inferred or translated sound into feel. Club-makers were partially right, but not entirely.

It was much the same with golf balls. TaylorMade did a study a few years ago where players were asked to hit a sampling of balls and identify them according to soft or hard balls. Players put on headphones and hit balls while a recording of the impact played in their ears, and they accurately identified each ball. Then, the researchers played the impact sound of the opposite type of ball. Again, golfers were completely consistent; but this time they guessed incorrectly 100 percent of the time. They relied on the sound instead of the feel of the ball coming off the club face. The golfers relied on the sound they heard, not the sensation they felt. An article on the study stated, "Not only did these players make decisions based on sound, they did so quickly and unequivocally; and without knowing how they did it."

There is much more to feel than what goes in your ears.

Many golfers confuse feel with touch. The two talents are related but, in fact, feel is about using all your senses and knowing what your body and the club are doing, along with being able to correctly execute what you're attempting to do. It's translating what you have imagined and planned into something that is almost perfect in its correctness.

Touch, on the other hand, is more in the interpretation and execution. Think of playing the piano or the violin. You can be a skilled reader of the music, knowing each note, bar and innuendo; but if your fingers don't accomplish the polished striking of the keys, frets and stings, the music won't be pleasing to the ear.

Interestingly, the world's most acclaimed violinist, Joshua Bell, who is a recreational golfer, stated flatly, "Golf is simply similar to playing the violin."

So how do we go about developing feel for our golf game, and the accompanying touch?

Self awareness

The very first thing is to create some awareness within yourself, whereby your senses are intimately involved with playing the game. For my money, it's not a matter of whether you are a "feel player" or a "non-feel player." It's a matter of incorporating a sense of feel into your ability to execute shots.

It would be very hard to categorize tour players as feel or no-feel.

Ben Hogan was as cerebral as they came when it came to studying the swing, crafting his equipment to the precise measurements he thought he needed, and being almost maniacal with his discipline for practice. Yet, he didn't want to be told the yardage on the course, and he insisted on using unconventional strategies on holes where only he knew

what he was doing. He made the swing with robotic-like mechanics, but he hit the ball purely out of feel.

Phil Mickelson is a bit like that, but he relies more on his caddy, Bones. Bones says Phil has more shots than he knows what to do with, but it is mostly up to him (the caddy) to advise him which club to use in a given situation.

To develop feel, sound is important, to be sure. It isn't everything. Pay attention to the "clank" or "clang" sound of the club face versus a crisp zing or steel sound that is produced by a fine metal alloy. Pay attention to where the ball goes and the shape of the shot. Was it as you visualized?

So many golfers I see on the practice range are out there swinging at ball after ball and ignoring what has just happened with their swing and the nature of the resulting shot. My experience is that beginner or high-handicap golfers don't understand their own swing, don't have a feel for what they are supposed to be doing with the golf swing, and don't internalize the information from good or bad shots they end up hitting. It isn't that hard, but it does take a willingness to be aware and a certain amount of discipline and mindfulness.

Good technique and repetition

As for practice itself, try getting in touch with how the ball reacts when struck with different types of shots, from different clubs, different lies and different target areas. Golf writer Jaime Diaz had this to say a few years back: "(Feel) might sound complicated, but it's amazing how much your brain can process if you let your imagination do its job. If you lay the groundwork by ingraining good technique with lots of repetition, you can develop the comfort and confidence to focus on the target and let your athletic instinct take over. That's when your touch will be most sensitive and when you will truly be playing with the greatest feel."

Further, go to the practice range and take out a single club and get the feel of creating five different shots with that club. For example, use a six iron. Hit a high draw, a

hard low shot that rolls a ton, a left-to-right fade, a pure and straight shot that spins and low stinger type punch. Next, take your three wood, and create another five shot repertoire. Then your wedge, with another five shots. Given the right practice, some lessons and a certain amount of patience, you will be able to have a handful of shots with one club if you understand how to grip the club up and down the shaft, and how to use half, three-quarter and full swings. Each club has multiple uses. It's about feel.

When I was working with the Aggie men's golf team in the 1990s (helping Coach Ross Nettles) I used to take the players to the putting green to improve their feel and the resulting confidence they would have. My favorite drill was having them hit chip shots to a target 50 feet away from off the green by using all 14 clubs in their bag. They would have to hit 14 shots, each with a different club, starting with whatever club they chose – putter through driver. They would keep doing the drill until all 14 balls, with all 14 clubs, ended up within a five-foot circle to the hole. Several of the college players got upset with how long it took; several of them decided to change their preferred chipping club (mostly going to a nine iron instead of sand wedge), but every golfer on the team doubled their sense of feel around the green.

Thinking is part of feel to be sure. Using your imagination for tricky shots is a part of the game. Your decision-making about when to use a particular club or when to hit a home run will affect your score, good or bad. However, when it's time to swing the club and hit the ball, whether on the tee, in the fairway or on the putting green, you should rely on your feel and not on thinking.

Once you settle on the shot, take your brain out of it, and trust your feel.



Out of the Past



100yearsago

1911

The Rio Grande Republican reported that almost every week, it was necessary to call attention to horses or buggies left untied by their owners. A large heavy horse with a light buggy attached was left in front of May Brothers Store without a check weight and untied. The streets were full of supper shoppers and the nervous horse started at some noise, suddenly reared and plunged toward the walk. "As he came down with his force upon the walk, the quick actions of Hugh Swift saved his little son from instant death beneath the feet of the plunging animal." On another occasion, a heavy wagon drove into the front wheel of a light buggy driven by a girl of perhaps 12 years of age. The wheel of the buggy was pulled off and the girl's horse started to run but was caught by the crowd before the girl was injured.

A building fund for the purpose of erecting a Presbyterian church in Mesilla Park was well under way. The church was using the

public school building for services. The Episcopalians had plans drawn for a church and the return of their pastor, Rev. Hunter Lewis, was expected in September.

According to El Paso newspapers, the El Paso and Southwestern Railroad Company was surveying a line from El Paso north to Elephant Butte on the west side of the Rio Grande. However, the railroad's general manager, H.J. Simmons, said the survey was only preliminary to ascertain costs and no rights of way had been secured.

1936

Water users of the Elephant Butte Irrigation District were warned to conserve as much water as possible during the remainder of the irrigation season. Records of the Bureau of Reclamation showed that twice as much water was used to May 31 as had been used to that date the previous year.

Thirteen members of Boy Scout Troop 61, sponsored by the Lions Club, left for summer camp on the Ruidoso River. Dick Lumas, assistant scoutmaster was in charge of the group. 



LCPS graduation rate increases

Superintendent says study finds 'huge' improvement

An increase in the Las Cruces Public Schools graduation rate, which puts the school district above the statewide average, is "statistically huge," said LCPS Superintendent Stan Rounds.

"I am delighted," Rounds said. "This is a very relevant increase and shows that our efforts to increase graduation rates and reduce the dropout rate are paying off."

Statewide four-year cohort graduation rates were announced Wednesday, June 8, by the state Public Education Department. The statistics show LCPS with a 2010 graduation rate of 71.2 percent, compared to 64.9 percent in 2009 and 54 percent in

2008. The statewide graduation rate for 2010 was 67.3 percent.

Showing marked improvement compared to the previous year were the LCPS graduation rates for economically disadvantaged students (52.7 percent up to 62.1 percent), students with disabilities (66.2 percent up to 71.1 percent) and those who are English language learners (51.5 percent up to 65 percent).

Tracie O'Hara, director of LCPS accountability, assessment and research, said a cohort represents a group of students who were tracked each year from the time they were ninth-graders, in this case in 2006-07, to the time they were expected to graduate by Aug. 1, 2010.

"Cohort information for determining graduation rates is extremely important data for our district," O'Hara said. "This data shows that students starting in ninth-grade are finishing

and the programs that we have in place are working."

Rounds said the increase in the cohort graduation rates are due to a number of factors. In particular, he credited the district's 90 percent attendance policy, enacted two years ago by the school board. It mandates students attend each one of their classes at least 90 percent of the time in order to receive credit.

"As our daily attendance rates go up, we are seeing a corresponding increase in the graduation rate," Rounds said.

Rounds also credited teachers across the school district for "giving attention to students and their individual needs and for providing high quality instruction in the classroom. I believe we have the most committed and dedicated employees of any school district in the nation, and these numbers bear that out," he said.

Rounds said Arrowhead Park Early College High School (APECHS), which opened to 116 students in July 2010, is another innovative way to keep students engaged in their education so that they graduate within four years.

"Four APECHS students moved away but continued their education in other school districts - not one of the 112 remaining students dropped out," Rounds said.

Couture visits China

NMSU president builds educational partnerships during overseas voyage

China – one of our greatest economic challenges and opportunities. And New Mexico State University is right there, ready to help with both. I recently returned from a great trip to confirm ongoing partnerships with Chinese universities and establish new ones for NMSU.

Why is that important? China has become a significant trade partner for New Mexico's agricultural and technical products. The young men and women we are educating at NMSU need to know about China, and many of them can and will benefit from a student exchange experience there.

Also, our faculty is doing important work that can be enhanced through partnerships with faculty experts at top Chinese research universities. Plus, China cannot meet its educational needs and has many outstanding students to send to American universities – that's good for enhancing student's contact with students from other countries, and it's great for our university budget, too.

We traveled to China with NMSU's Vimal Chaitanya, vice president for Research; Ken Hammond, director of the Confucius Institute; and education faculty members Dana Christman and Jeanette Haynes Writer.

In addition to meeting with several leaders of Chinese universities, I also met Madame

Xu Lin, director-general of Hanban, the Chinese national language and culture institute that funds our Confucius Institute. Did you know our Confucius Institute provides Chinese language instruction for 3,000 students in New Mexico's public schools?

Everywhere we went we found Chinese faculty to be impressed by the breadth and depth of NMSU's offerings in engineering, science, technology, business and the humanities and social sciences.

We began our trip at Donghua University in Shanghai, where we have had a long and successful student exchange program. We arrived on the day of

Next, it was on to East China University of Science and Technology, which is strong in chemical engineering, mechanical engineering, information technology, and biochemical engineering. They are interested in partnerships in these fields, plus sociology, social work, English and business. And were they ready for us.

The foyer of their international services building was decked out in silk chile ristras. How fitting. East China is also strong in engineering, and recently developed a cooperative agreement with the University of Houston.

In Beijing, our delegation met with faculty and administrators from Beijing University of Chemical Technology, another university very interested in joint or dual degree arrangements. BUCT recruits 500 students annually in chemical engineering alone, and

their faculty members are eager to establish research relationships with our own.

From Beijing, we sped overland – with a crazy driver – to Shijiazhuang Technical College and Chinese Language Institute, the institution with which we have partnered for our Confucius Institute. Shijiazhuang has several opportunities for internships for business students with Chinese industries. In the evening, we met with the director of education for Hebei Province. The province has 70 million people in it, and includes the cities of Beijing and Shijiazhuang. Provincial leaders have great interest in having NMSU increase its contacts with their top universities.

Then on to Xi'an – the ancient capital of China in the northwestern part of the country. Xi'an is where the famed terra cotta warriors are housed. The city is surrounded



Shanghai is noted for milder tastes, Beijing for the all-important Beijing duck, and Xi'an for a great flat noodle served with peppers and sweet and sour sauce – yum.

Science teacher picked as LCPS top teacher for 2012

Teacher's passion comes from caring

Zia Middle School science teacher Paulo Oemig has been selected as the 2012 Las Cruces Public Schools Teacher of the Year.

Oemig is also the LCPS nominee for the New Mexico Teacher of the Year competition.

"He has a great passion for teaching and his students sense this – they feed off that energy," said Zia Principal Jed Hendee. "When you enter his classroom,

you'll always find students actively engaged and diligently working on higher level experiments with Mr. Oemig coaching and encouraging them to draw educated conclusions."

"This district has so many talented teachers, and Mr. Oemig is one of those who stands out and embodies what good teachers are all about," said Superintendent Stan Rounds.

As Teacher of the Year, Oemig received a \$1,000 check from FirstLight Federal Credit Union, in addition to several gifts from local businesses and sponsors.







Double dip recession unlikely

Could be avoided but not ruled out

The single best indicator of the direction of the economy over the next six months is the stock market, which just finished six down weeks, the worst performance since 2002.

Weak housing, falling car sales and the end of the second round of Quantitative Easing (QE2) all indicate a weakening economy.

Still most economists, including myself, believe that the economy will right itself. At least three factors indicate this. First, disruptions caused by the earthquake and tsunami in Japan are expected to ease. Second, severe weather and flooding in the Southeast and Midwest that disrupted economic activity have run their course. Third, gasoline prices appear to have peaked and are now beginning to fall.

The last double dip recession was in 1981 when accelerating inflation caused the Fed to allow interest rates to climb above 20 percent, a move that Paul Volcker, who was then Fed chairman, acknowledged was a mistake after the fact. Such a policy error is unlikely in the present environment of low inflation. Indeed, the fear is not inflation but deflation, although this fear has receded in recent months. Currently, U.S. bond rates remain near historic lows.

The main risk facing the economy is the ongoing budget debate. Should Congress

fail to raise the debt ceiling, the consequence could be default. In fact, the Treasury Secretary Timothy Geithner would be faced with whether to violate the 14th Amendment that says the government can't default on its debt; or violating the body of the Constitution that says only Congress can authorize borrowing.

A default would likely cause interest rates to rise dramatically, which could trigger a recession in itself. Geithner will likely find a way to avoid default. A popular idea is to divert spending from government programs to debt service, thereby avoiding default, but triggering a partial government shut down.

A partial government shutdown is the lesser of evils, but such an event would cause major problems for the economy. Government workers would be laid off; government contractors wouldn't receive payments; and, most feared of all, the elderly might not receive Social Security payments.

If a budget compromise, when it is finally brokered, involves deep cuts in government spending, that also could cause a recession. Indeed, the failure of Congress to extend the stimulus package is one of the reasons for the slowdown we are now facing.

The national economy has important implications for Las Cruces. We are seeing a soft spot, with employment growth declining, year over year, in each of the first four months of 2011. Should it materialize, a national recession would mean additional downward pressure on the local economy.

LC Downtown TIDD paying off ... literally

Las Cruces repays large debt in record time

Revitalizing Downtown takes big bucks, but thanks to the combined efforts of the Downtown Las Cruces Partnership (DLCP), Downtown property owners, the City of Las Cruces, Doña Ana County and our local legislative delegation, generating the cash to complete the project became a little easier in 2007.

That's when a majority of Downtown property owners and registered voters approved the formation of a Tax Increment Development District (TIDD) in a special election.

The purpose of the TIDD is to create an income stream that can support the repayment of tax-exempt bonds issued by the city to fund Downtown infrastructure improvements. The district is bounded by Picacho Avenue on the north, Alameda Boulevard on the west, Campo Street on the east and California Avenue on the south.

Here's how it works:

The gross receipts and property tax bases within the TIDD are "frozen" at the pre-development levels for bookkeeping purposes. The state, city and county then return to the district 75 percent of the taxes derived from increases in assessed values and gross receipts brought about by new development in the area for the next 20 years. Typically, the increased taxes would be added to the city, county and state general funds.

The first distribution of the city's GRT increment was \$1,485 in March 2009, according to city of Las Cruces Downtown Development Coordinator William Slettom. Through April of this year, the city's contribution to the TIDD was more than \$1.1 million. During the same period, Doña Ana County's contribution totaled more than \$178,000, although

the county has not yet provided any funds derived from increases in property taxes. The state began contributing its portion of the collected taxes in October 2010, adding an additional \$740,000 of the fund. Total income for the TIDD through April of this year was almost \$2.1 million, Slettom said.

The first use of TIDD funds was to close the \$1 million gap between the amount needed to fund the opening of the northernmost blocks of Main Street and the amount of funding the city had on hand for the project. To close the gap, the city borrowed \$1 million from its reserve fund. The loan was amortized more than 15 years, but was repaid last month – just one year from the date the funds were borrowed.

The TIDD funding is designed to cover approximately \$8 million of the estimated \$12 million required to complete Downtown revitalization projects, which includes the opening of the southernmost blocks of Main Street. In addition, plans are in place to use TIDD funds to finance the reconfiguration of Water and Church streets to accommodate two-way traffic, and to redesign the portions of Las Cruces and Griggs streets that run between Alameda Boulevard and Church Street.

WSMR to host 2,000 testers and evaluators

The testing operations will take place 24 hours a day Monday through Friday each week. During the weekend, Fort Bliss soldiers will return home; however, the majority of the 2,000 testers and evaluators will remain in area hotels.

The testing and evaluation will also cause an increase in military vehicle traffic on the roads between WSMR and Fort Bliss and an increase in regular vehicle traffic around the WSMR entrance points and Las Cruces.

George Pintar: Pintar is no procrastinator

Local businessman practices what he preaches

Procrastination is not in George Pintar's vocabulary. The 80-year-old Illinois native is a go-getter.

"The way to do it is to not sit back, but to do it," he said. "Nike has the right attitude. Just do it. Those people who procrastinate have a hard time gearing up, but if you get up with an attitude of this is what I'm going to do and do it, then at the end of the day, you will feel very good about yourself and your business. So, the idea is to get up and do it."

Pintar wakes up every morning and enjoys going to work. Whether it's his clothing alteration shop, A Perfect Fit, the Las Cruces Event Center, or a business networking meeting, Pintar takes advantage of each day.

"I think it's just the things my parents told me that to be successful in business, you got to get up with a positive attitude about your business and life in general," he said. "You have to stay positive and stay with the idea that you're going to help somebody every day somehow, some way."

Growing up in Canton, Ill., a town of about 15,000 people outside of Peoria, Ill., he's proud of his roots and the entrepreneurial spirit his parents imparted to him, operating a service station.

"The Little Giants,' that's what our town was known as," Pintar said. "Our teams were

always smaller than the other teams, but we always had a winning tradition, much like the communities here."

Pintar competed in football, basketball and track in Illinois and credits sports for his success in business.

"Sports helps develop business character," he said. "Sports teams give you a chance to organize, set goals, compete and get rewards. Sports are important in the lives of young people. In sports you're competitive and in business you're competitive."

Just like in sports, practice is paramount to success in business.

"You practice your business, you practice your business, then you get better and are ready for the next step," he said. "The idea is practice, practice, practice. Those people who dislike practicing their business don't become successful."

To illustrate this practice principle, Pintar explained what he does to get referrals, which he says is crucial to a business' success.

"I write four postcards, send four emails and make four telephone calls to my cus-

tomers thanking them for their business," he said. "Every day, I do that and when the day is up, I try to find out if those people responded by coming to my business. I practice and do it on a daily basis. It's very good to do it first thing in the morning."

Before moving to New Mexico in 1996, Pintar ran a large consulting firm in Illinois called

Professional Educator Management Associates. Before starting his business, he spent 29 years in education in Illinois, working as a school teacher – teaching business and kindergarten – school district superintendent and a member of the Illinois State Board of Education.

His wife, Jean, moved to Deming in 1989 for health reasons. Pintar stayed in Illinois, but would frequently fly to see her. Pintar didn't take Southwest or American, but flew his own plane.

Wanting to be closer to his wife and with the Southwest growing on him, Pintar said he decided to move to Deming in 1996. Citing a need for an alteration shop in the small railroad town, he decided to open one, along with a second-hand store and a small factory making practice vests for football players. Pintar was proud that he had not only started a successful business, but also had put 25 people to work.

After closing the factory in 2004, Pintar and his wife moved to Las Cruces because he was hired by New Mexico State University as a rural economic development and tourism consultant.

"We wanted to move here because the medical facilities are better for my wife," he said. "We enjoy Las Cruces a lot. It's a great town to conduct business."

"It has all the potential to make anybody who works hard, very prosperous," he said. "But, you got to work hard."

Pintar credited the City Council and NMSU for helping make Las Cruces a business-friendly city.

"I think the city does a great job of helping small businesses get started," he said. "The resources from the university, SCORE and various business advocate groups are very sound."

Pintar also praised the chambers of commerce for their marketing efforts.

"The Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce did a superb job of getting us ranked as one of the best places to retire, as a great place to live, great climate and a great place to do business," he said. "There's been a distinct effort on the part of the City Council and city management that this is a great place to retire."

While Las Cruces has been named as a great place to retire by AARP, Pintar doesn't plan on retiring any time soon.

"My goals are to continue to stay healthy, No. 1," he said. "No. 2, I want to impart to people who want to listen some of my success stories. No. 3, I want to help people succeed. A lot of young people need mentors to help them succeed. I know SCORE does a wonderful job of that. My personal goals with the Las Cruces Business Network are to help people succeed. You can't succeed on your own. You have to have the help of others."

Nowadays, especially when watching late-night TV, there are dozens of advertisements and infomercials for “get-rich-quick” schemes that promise an unrealistic profit in a short amount of time, but what ever happened to putting in the man hours and hard work?

For Wes Rinteien, partner and general manger for Border International, the hard work is paying off and the success is evident.

Born in Truth or Consequences, Rinteien enlisted in the Marine Corps after high school. In 1994, he started a welding company in T or C, and later added tire services.

“I have always been a hands-on kind of guy, but I have also always been an entrepreneur,” Rinteien said. “I grew up working on farm equipment. I started the welding business because after I got out of the Marines, it is what I knew, and I added the tires because that was easy.”

The capitalist in Rinteien led him to sell his business in T or C and pursue bigger opportunities in Las Cruces. In the City of the Crosses, Rinteien started working for Woods Truck Shop and said he bought the company within a year.

“I was able to (quadruple) the size of the company in nine years,” he said. “I believe if you work hard and give an honest price, then you will be successful.”

Rinteien said Woods Truck Shop became the largest independent industrial truck dealership in southern New Mexico before merging with his current partners, creating Border International.

In 2006, Rinteien partnered with Royal Jones and Jimmy Ray to construct a more inclusive full-service international truck dealership that served west Texas and southern New Mexico.

“I really felt the merge came at the right time,” Rinteien said. “Border International was a better opportunity because it had such a potential for growth.”

Today, the company has two location – one in Las Cruces and one in El Paso.

“We do everything for diesel trucks,” Rinteien said. “We sell them, repair them and service them. We can also work on heavy truck trailers, RVs, fork lifts and probably anything diesel.”

Rinteien said the diesel repair facility also operates a 24-hour roadside assistance program.

Though times are tough in the

economy, Rinteien said Border International has seen little changes in overall cash flow.

“With increased gas prices, we are seeing fewer new trucks being sold,” he said. “However, we have also seen an increase in truck repair. People are trying to hold on to their equipment and trucks longer.”

While some people are consolidating to lower their costs, Rinteien said they have not thought about it.

“The El Paso store specializes in new-truck sales and the Las Cruces office focuses on used-truck sales,” he said. “This difference will keep our two offices operating collaboratively but independently for a while.”

Rinteien contributes their steady success to consistent customers with growing fleets.

“We have loyal customers,” he said. “Large local providers, such as Mesilla Valley Transportation and Wild West Express, have growing fleets, and we benefit from their growth.”

Along his road of entrepreneurship, Rinteien said he has learned two valuable lessons.

“Only provide the services you are good at and can deliver 100 percent,” he said. “Also, do not make any kind of short cut.”

Rinteien said the success of Border International is due to long-

standing relationships.

“Other than Jim Barker, a former diesel shop owner, we have been here the longest,” Rinteien said. “I think that, along with word of mouth has helped us be so successful.”

“There are many challenges to the business, such as keeping our costs down for the customers even though our personal costs are increasing. We make small sacrifices, such as putting

off small cosmetic improvements to the building, but there are also things we can’t sacrifice.”

From barely making payroll his first week, to owning a large-scale trucking company, Rinteien said he has believed in one philosophy throughout his trials and tribulations, “When you see a successful business, someone made a courageous decision.”

RACERS PREPARE FOR ANNUAL TORTUGAS EVENT JUNE 24-26



Fun, food, music and turtles

Annual San Juan Turtle Fest is June 24-26

More than 50 years ago, the beginning of summer meant one thing for the tight-knit community of Tortugas – it was time for the Annual San Juan Turtle Fest.

David Fierro, a native of Tortugas and organizer of the event, invites everyone to come celebrate this year's version of the Turtle Fest, June 24 - 26.

"It's a long-standing custom and when you have a custom and keep continuing it, it enriches the event," Fierro said. "I grew up there and I remember the fiesta. I want my grandkids to remember it the same way I had it, so we try to keep the Fiesta the same way with the same kind of format that we had when we were little so our kids can enjoy it the same way."

The event, sponsored by the Shrine and Parish of Our Lady of Guadalupe, draws about 3,000 people and is one of the largest fundraisers for the church. Fierro estimates that \$20,000 to \$25,000 will be raised for parish projects, specifically youth programs.

The Tortugas community is south of Las Cruces, and started by the Piro-Manso-Tiwa Tribe. The tribe was granted 40 acres in 1912 so the people could continue their customs and traditions in the village.

Fierro gave three explanations on how the

village got its name.

One explanation is that when their ancestors settled, they were slow moving from Isleta del Norte to Isleta del Sur and ended up staying in the village of Tortugas.

Another reason is that the village is close to Tortugas Mountain, also known as "A" Mountain.

The final explanation is that when it rains a lot, turtles would gather in one of the low areas near the village.

"In Tortugas, we're not rich in terms of buildings or material wealth, but we're rich in traditions and customs, which is more valuable than anything monetary," Fierro said. "As long as we continue this fiesta, and it's a quality fiesta, it will continue to grow."

The fest begins with the sixth annual Tortugas Open Golf Tournament at Sonoma Ranch Golf Course, or as it will be known on June 24, the Tortugas Golf and Country Club. Registration starts at 7 a.m., with a shotgun start at 8 a.m. The entry fee is \$90 per player and it is a four-person scramble. The entry fee covers the golf, golf cart, goodie bag and a "Tortugas style" meal after the tournament.

"It's the best meal of any golf tournament in the valley," Fierro said.

The field is limited to the first 36 teams that

pay and sign up. Hole sponsorships are available. For more information, call David Fierro at 496-1693 or Frank Torres at 640-4354.

The fest will embrace the theme of "All Tortugas Turtle Futurity" on Saturday, June 25. In the evening, Genie and the Starliners will entertain the crowd at the Pre-Derby Tardeada. The dance will be held in the covered pavilion from 8 p.m. to midnight. Tickets will be sold at the door for \$5 per person. In addition to the music, traditional fiesta food will be sold during the event and there will be a cash bar.

Sunday, June 26, is the big day, with all events free and open to the public. The main event is the 23rd annual San Juan Turtle Derby Races. Registration of the racing turtles begins at noon, with the races starting at 3 p.m. To kick off the event, celebrities from the local area will participate in the annual Celebrity Turtle Race.

It's not just racing turtles on Sunday. The festival doors open at 9 a.m. with the sweet booth operating, followed by the other food booths selling at 10 a.m.. Food offered includes enchiladas, gorditas, hamburgers, scones and other drinks. There will be games a dunking booth and entertainment in the Kid-die Booth.

At noon, register for the Tortugas Got Talent event, which will showcase the local talent. Prizes will be awarded and the show starts at 1 p.m. Following the turtle races, Fierro Band will perform until 8 p.m. and there will be two raffle drawings. One for \$500 cash and another for two round-trip Southwest Airlines tickets.

Recycled jewelry is 'Splendid'

NMSU music major strikes a new chord

It was just last Christmas that Mae Walker needed a little extra cash – something we all could use around the holidays.

"I had tons of old jewelry that my grandfather had collected," she said. "A lot of it was broken and messed up, but it was pretty cool stuff. I decided to re-work it into something else."

She got a booth at the Las Cruces Farmers & Crafts Market and sold out the first week she was there.

"I sold out the next week and the next," she said. "So I thought 'I guess people must like it.' It just grew into its own thing. I didn't start out to have a recycling-based business."

Splendid by Mae has gone so well, in fact, that Walker quit her full-time job to focus on making her recycled jewelry. Though she has been at it for less than a year, she has branched out into online sales and now spends about 60 hours per week on her new business.

"But I don't mind because it's what I want it to be," she said.

When asked how she uses her time, she replied that she typically spends the first part of the week hitting the thrift stores and estate sales.

"People now know that I will buy their old costume jewelry," she said. "And I spend the second part of the week creating – putting things together."

Walker's grandfather was a jeweler and taught her some tricks of the trade when she was just 8 or 9 years old. She used to make jewelry as a hobby or to make gifts for people.

She generally knows right away when she sees a piece of old jewelry what it will become. Chains are shortened into bracelets and clip-on earrings become rings. Her house is her work space and it is crowded with suitcases filled with broken watches and other jewelry items.

"I see something and right away I know 'That's a ring.' Or 'That's a necklace.' I know right off what it's going to be," she said.

Walker's major at New Mexico State University was music. She still plays the guitar and composes her own songs. She was one of the kick-off performers for the Las Cruces Farmers & Crafts Market 40th anniversary celebration in May. She has performed at various venues around town and will continue to do so. But this fall, when she returns to school, her major will be business.

"I really want to focus on making my jewelry business better," she said. "Besides, jobs in music are scarce."

To hear Walker tell it, she was always a "vintage girl" who loved old things and always wore the thrift store stuff.

"I consider myself lucky," she said. "And while I make everything with the intention of selling it, I can make something for myself right away. If I put on an outfit and need something to go with it I can usually think of something I have that will work. I bet I make something for myself four days a week."

However, she does get attached to certain pieces and keeps them for herself.

Another obsession is old suitcases, which she uses for display purposes.

"I love things that have a story behind them," she said. "Even if I don't know what the story is. Like luggage – somebody loved this suitcase. They put their name on it and took it with them to Chicago back in the '50s."

Walker is a big believer in social networking and offers email

specials and deals on her website. Besides the farmers market, she participates in other shows around town. She is taking part in a fashion show based on recycled and upcycled fashion and will be one of the suppliers of what models wear as they walk the runway.

What she likes most about her work is the past and future feelings it evokes.

"When I see a really rad piece of jewelry, I think 'It's been loved.' It carries such a good feeling knowing somebody used to love it," she said. "And here I am re-working it into something that will be loved again."

The 'Coyote' continues to howl

Open mic coffeehouse provides venue and opportunities

"We really are the grandfather of them all," Bob Burns, founder of the Howling Coyote Coffeehouse and Open Mic, said. "We spawned the other open mics in town."

Burns and his wife Melody started the Coyote

in February 2005 and it really was an extension of something they did at home.

"When we were looking for a house to buy, one of the criteria was that it had to have a big enough living room so we could have music gatherings," Burns said.

Burns had always thought that "Howling Coyote" would be a good name for a coffeehouse and it was always intended to be an open mic format.

At the time, the pastor at the Mastery of Life Center (now the Center for Spiritual Living) was very interested in having the church be a center for community activities. So the coffeehouse began presenting performance nights on the first and third Fridays of each month. Eventually, the Mesilla Valley Jazz and Blues Society also began meeting there. After four and a half years, the Coyote moved to a new space and is currently located at the First Christian Church on El Paseo Road.

Originally, the sign-up for performance started at 6:30 p.m. with the show beginning at 7 p.m., but the open mic became increasingly popular and the process switched to a lottery system with performers drawing numbers to determine the

order they appear on stage.

When all the performers are finished – the number is limited to 18, with each one allowed 10 minutes on stage – there is an open jam session which continues until everyone is ready to go home.

In addition to maintaining a positive, encouraging atmosphere – it is also family friendly with no alcohol or off-color material allowed – Burns is proud of the friendships and collaborations that have formed over the years.

"You hear someone play and they're good so you ask them to play with you at a future gig," he said. "There is a group called East Mesa that all met here and they are doing some really nice work together."

Jack Rokowski is a fledging musician whose weapon of choice is the Hammond organ.

"If you are new in music, it is very productive to play in front of other people," he said. "It's really different than just playing at home. Howling Coyote offers

that opportunity, plus you get to see what other people can do."

"Our audiences are fun. They're very encouraging," Burns said. "They never make you feel bad – there's no hook."

A closer look at 'The Last Lions'

Human emotions applied a little thick in this animal film

Editor's note: This is not to be confused with "African Cats," the Disney film released in April.

Maybe my anticipation was too high for this (still) interesting documentary after hearing an interview with the filmmakers and listening to what they had to go through to achieve the film.

I found myself slightly disappointed at the end product, which has a great story, but at times feels and looks falsely edited and assigns human emotion to lions in far too big a dose. That comes, in part, from the narration of actor Jeremy Irons, whose voice tone and utterances make the documentary feel forced and a might pucky.

The story follows one particular lioness, Ma di Tau ("Mother of Lions," but we'll call her "Ma" for the sake of brevity in this review) and her three cubs as they are forced to new hunting grounds after her mate, a somewhat older male, is killed in a territorial dispute.

To further her plight, human encroachment has started and continues to shrink the lion's territory considerably, while hunters and poachers have helped reduce the lion population from an estimated 450,000 to a present 20,000.

Certainly, these beasts are still on top of the food chain, and are even known to mate on occasion with other large cat species, but good old humankind in all its irreverent glory is making sure the competition for zebra steaks is less keen.

Anyway, Ma and her sweet brood are pursued and pushed out of their territory, and more or less forced to take up residence on an island created by a river delta. Food is somewhat abundant, but not necessarily easy to get, and her three cubs are always a cause for alarm as they teeter on tragedy throughout the entire film.

It is Ma's job to provide food for the youngsters, but it's not as easy as it sounds. Who knew water buffalo, her most common and numerous neighbors, were so smart and clannish?

On the other hand, the unneighborly pride of lions (which can range from five to 30) have decided Ma should keep moving on. Another lioness, dubbed Silver Eye, who Ma defeated in battle, whose motives as narrated by the trill Irons, seem particularly bent on revenge – something that probably doesn't really happen in the world of lions.

As Ma continues her pursuit of food, shelter, and peace, it also feels like she is not very adept at doing any of these things. Time after time, she is foiled in her attempts at food, and at one point, apparently in desperation, snags a large bird for her own dietary needs.

Joubert, co-directors and conservationists, spent a number of years filming this piece, and their diligence and skills have, for the most part, paid off. In spite of the somewhat suspicious editing, the film does a great job of presenting its story, offers some fascinating insight into the lifestyle of these magnificent beasts and it holds your interest.

There are parts of the story that feel forced, but if you look at the film as a mild learning experience, you won't be disappointed.

Gentle viewers should note this film contains animal combat.

But that's life in the jungle, no?

Las Cruces rarities on screen

Film, TV episode showcase another side of the Mesilla Valley

The CineMatinee for 1:30 p.m. Saturday, June 18, are made in Las Cruces rarities – "The Devil's Mistress" (1966, 65 minutes, not rated) and "Calhoun, County Agent" (1964, 60 minutes-unaired TV pilot episode).

Sadly, Las Cruces and the Mesilla Valley are not very well known for the films that have been made in this area. Certainly, the area's biggest claims to fame are 2009's "The Burning Plain" and "Hang 'Em High" from 1968, which starred Clint Eastwood.

However, a number of other smaller productions have been shot in and around Las Cruces, including these two rarely seen pieces.

"The Devil's Mistress," which was directed by Orville "Bud" Wanzer, who worked at New Mexico State University for many years, and Forrest Westmoreland, the producer and a co-

star, are invited special guests for the screening of their small budget spooky western which was filmed in the Organ Mountains.

"The Devil's Mistress" is the story of a bewitching and beautiful Indian half-caste, Liah, who takes her revenge on four ruthless cowboy desperadoes who have gunned down her husband for the sheer joy of killing. Using her enigmatic charm in a way that is fatal to the outlaws, the haunting young woman's vengeance is meted out in a strange, occult manner.

"Calhoun, County Agent" was the pilot episode of a planned TV series that starred Jackie Cooper and Barbara Stanwyck. It was shot locally and put on the fall schedule, but the series was canceled before it ever aired. This piece was shot in and around Las Cruces and Mesilla and tells the story of a county

agent, who is working to save the area's orange crop from destruction by an unknown malady.

In author Merle Miller's book, "Only You, Dick Darling!" a humorous yet damning account of the five and a half months he spent trying to make the show with CBS for the 1963-64 season based on an idea of studio executive Jim Aubrey's, about a county agent, Miller describes how Aubrey would simply walk out of meetings without offering any substantive comments on Miller's program and the 19 rewrites he did of the pilot episode.

Miller was assured by other CBS executives that Aubrey's silence meant things were fine – Kempton quoted a CBS producer telling Miller, "This has nothing to do with a good script or a bad script. It has to do with pleasing one

man, Jim Aubrey. Don't ever forget it"

Due to the rarity of these films, the quality of the DVDs to be shown is not up to our usual standards, but we are sure you'll enjoy seeing these rare and interesting films nonetheless.

CineMatinee is a unique blend of movies presented by the Mesilla Valley Film Society which showcases unique films, past and present, often with an emphasis on life in the West – which could mean the new West, the Old West or anything in between – and "movies that missed us," films that are notable but never had a lot of publicity.

The series is designed to show area residents that film is a form of art and education as well as entertainment. At least one film a month for this series has a New Mexico "connection," drawing from the vast pool of movies made in the state or perhaps featuring a star or story from New Mexico talent.

Unless otherwise noted, screening time is 1:30 p.m., and admission is \$4 for everyone except film society members who are admitted for \$1. The theatre is located at 2469 Calle de Guadalupe. For more information, call 524-8287 and leave a message.

Strike while chef's waffle iron is toasty

La Waffle keeps Belgian breakfast tradition alive

Back in my school teaching days, some of my students created a persona, or alter-ego, for me. A mighty proponent of that all-important first meal of the day, I was known as "Mr. Breakfast."

It's a bit of a long story to relate his origins, but we had a good deal of fun with Mr. B – I still have some caricatures drawn of me in costume and I am the proud owner of a bowling shirt with Mr. Breakfast embroidered on the back.

There were lots of little catch phrases and slogans such as "Who's the most with the butter and toast? It's Mr. Breakfast. Yeah." Or one of my favorites, "You won't feel so awful if you'll just have a waffle."

Even then, I knew that waffles were a powerful tool for good. Now, I know that Belgian waffles are even better.

But where in Las Cruces can you get a real Belgian waffle? A bite of Belgium, as it were?

Happily, it only requires a Saturday morning trip to the Las Cruces Farmers & Crafts Market and a stop at La Waffle.

"Some people open a package and say they are doing a Belgian waffle," owner Michel Mal said. "That's like saying that just because you dress like Santa, you are Santa Claus."

Mal was born in Belgium, spent a good portion of his childhood in the Belgian Congo and eventually went to chef school in Brussels. From the age of 6 he spent time in his mother's kitchen and learned about cooking.

He came to the United States 27 years ago after being offered a job at an Albuquerque French restaurant and it wasn't long before he opened his own. Jobs in other restaurants led him to Las Vegas, Nev., where he worked at the Mirage and Rio hotels.

While running a small restaurant on the outskirts of Las Vegas, he met his wife Eva. The couple spent time in Washington state before semi-retiring in Las Cruces. Mal worked at Meson de Mesilla before deciding it really was time to retreat from his chef-ing lifestyle.

"I really like Las Cruces and I wanted to give them a unique product," he said. "So I went back to my roots and something I grew up with."

Using the kitchen of his friend Thierry Marceaux at Le Rendez Vous, Mal gets little sleep on Friday night as he prepares the waffles for Saturday's farmers market. He makes the plain and organic whole wheat waffles as well as some little dark chocolate-covered, white chocolate-drizzled devils called "wallis." They all can be warmed up on a small grill for immediate consumption or taken home and lightly toasted – eaten plain or with various toppings. Mal is working on having a cart built so he can actually prepare the waffles on-site.

I took a three-pack each of the plain and whole wheat waffles – as well as a walli apiece – to my mom's so she, my sister and I could have a late lunch. For fruit toppings, we had fresh blueberries, raspberries, mango and kiwi. A little whipped cream and a few pieces of fruit will make you forget what ails you.

You can also put a little butter on your waffle, if you like, but I skipped that and went straight for the vanilla and strawberry ice cream.

I am not ashamed to admit that Nutella makes me weak at the knees – even Mr. Breakfast himself has no power over its chocolatey-hazelnutty deliciousness. Let's just say that a little of this spread on a Belgian waffle tasted "OK" and leave it at that – I don't want to remember too hard.

At my son's suggestion, I split a waffle in half and toasted each half open-faced with some cheese on one side and ham on the other. Then I put the two halves together and the result was a bit of a sweet sandwich reminiscent of a Monte Cristo without batter stuff on the outside.

I managed to save a couple of waffles for the girlfriend who was gallivanting around in Santa Fe. Upon her return, she warmed one up and tried it with a little syrup.

Now, let me say that these waffles are plenty sweet as is. This isn't just pancake batter cooked on your Presto electric. It is a heavier, chewier brioche-type dough cooked between two heavy metal plates. Mal uses imported pearl sugar made from white beets that doesn't melt as quickly and it often caramelizes on the edges of the waffle. Tiny bits of this wonderful sugar are found throughout the pastry.

So you've been warned – now go and put whatever goodies you want on that waffle. Just remember we're not talkin' Eggos here.

Mal is very philosophical when it comes to promoting his product.

"There is no discrimination here," he said. "Some people don't like certain types of food. But regardless of national origin or age, everyone eats my waffle."

And Mr. Breakfast says, "Go for it."

A 'Super 8' start to the summer

Amateur filmmaking kids uncover strange stuff

I was going to start off with one of those clever comparisons that describe a movie and give the reader a point of reference about what can be expected when seeing said movie. You know "Z" felt like a cross between "X" and "Y." That sort of thing.

I tried mightily to think of some examples. Things such as – the end of "Atonement" feels like a cross between "Pride and Prejudice" and a Fellini movie. Not bad.

How about "Inception" feels like a cross between "The Matrix" and Alfred Hitchcock's "Vertigo." That's maybe a little better.

"Big Mommas: Like Father, Like Son" feels like a cross between "Big Momma's House" and "Big Momma's House 2." There we go. That's mint.

"That's mint" is something Charles the fledgling film director (played by Riley Griffiths) in the new film "Super 8" would say.

It's the summer of 1979, and a group of misfit middle school kids are sneaking out of their respective homes to make a zombie movie

on Super 8 film. Kids after my own heart.

"Super 8" actually begins four months earlier. Joe (Joel Courtney) – the special effects/make-up artist of the group – has just lost his mom in an industrial accident. Joe's dad Jackson (Kyle Chandler) is busy being a deputy sheriff and the two don't have the closest relationship.

Flash forward to an early summer night when our erstwhile filmmakers are meeting to film. Not only has the crush-inspiring girl Alice (Elle Fanning) "borrowed" her dad's car to take them to the filming location, she has agreed to play the wife of the zombie-tracking detective.

While filming at the out-of-town train station, the kids witness – and catch on film – a horrific train accident caused by a pickup truck driving onto the tracks. The kids discover their biology teacher was responsible for the crash and remarkably survived. He warns them not to speak of what happened and instills the fear in them that something bad will happen if they do.

There are oddities about this crash – its cargo consists of a large number of white metallic Rubik's cube-looking things and when the film from the shoot is developed a few days later, it reveals "something" escaping from one of the wrecked train cars.

In the meantime, strange things are occurring around town. People are disappearing, pets are running away and all sorts of metal objects from engine blocks to microwaves are taken. To pique all our government conspiracy paranoias, the Air Force shows up to take over the train wreck investigation – and as one might expect, they aren't too forthcoming with information about what exactly is going on.

I really can't say much more without giving away too many plot details, but the kids get involved in trying to find out what is truly happening.

Director J.J. Abrams has been responsible for a number of successful film and television ventures. He was executive producer of "Lost" and directed the pilot episodes of that popular series. He wrote episodes of "Alias" and

"Fringe" and has a new show this fall called "Person of Interest."

The script for 1998's "Armageddon" was his work, as well as directing the highly entertaining reboot of the "Star Trek" film franchise, "Mission Impossible 3" and he was the executive producer for "Cloverfield." Sequels to all three of those films are currently in the works.

Abrams gets marvelous performances out of his teen actors – a number of whom are in major films or major roles for the first time. Courtney does a great job as the sensitive model-making awkward-around-girls hero, as he and Griffiths play off each other well. Ryan Lee shines as the firework-obsessed Cary, Zach Mills nerds it up as Preston and Gabriel Basso hilariously pukes it up as Martin.

Elle Fanning – sister of another exceptional young actress Dakota Fanning – is just extraordinary as Alice. As the rather tough-appearing girl with the alcoholic father, she has brilliant moments as both Alice and the zombie-detective's wife in the film within the film. She and Courtney have great chemistry together and both make sure not to give away too much when it comes to why their respective fathers don't want them to hang around together.

The adults do pretty well also. Kyle Chandler (Friday Night Lights) is intense as the deputy suddenly in charge of everything – including a teenage son he doesn't really know much about. Ron Eldard is surprisingly sympathetic and tortured as Alice's father and Noah Emmerich is sufficiently villainous as Nelec, the Air Force colonel obsessed with retrieving the train's "cargo."

One of the best cameos – and a critical one – is David Gallagher as the stoned-out film store clerk with the nice car who helps our heroes retrieve some important information.

"Super 8" was produced by Steven Spielberg and it has a feel like some of those classic '80s films. And now here is the consensus among my friends and I who thoroughly enjoyed "Super 8."

It feels like a cross between "E.T." and "The Goonies" and another film that I can't say the title of without revealing too much. (Hint: It's a J.J. Abrams project.) It's funny, intense, exciting, entertaining and the kids are great. Be sure to stay through the credits for more home-made zombie movie footage.





Is Primitime Fitness competing with Fitness One? Does Jazzercise compete with Zumba? The answer to these types of questions is a qualified "No."

You, the consumer, will decide on the best location and fitness program to meet your goals. Hopefully, you will make this decision after you have tried several different programs to find the best fit.

Most health clubs and programs offer a free or discounted trial of their services to get you in the door. Will they try to get you to sign up right away? Of course, they will. This is why I gave you a qualified "No" earlier. By you walking in the door, they have a fighting chance against their stiffest competition – the couch.

When you finally get home at night, you sit down for a well-deserved rest. After all, you have already put in a full day's work and you still had to take the kids to practice, then come back home and make dinner. This 'Fantastic Voyage' educates

NMSU project creates colon cancer awareness

It may bring back memories – for those old enough to remember it – of the 1966 science fiction film "Fantastic Voyage," where miniaturized humans in a shrunken submarine explore the interior of a human body.

You won't need special equipment, though, to explore the inner recesses of the Inflatable Colon, now appearing at health fairs and other events around southern New Mexico.

The visual aid for promoting colon health recently was introduced to the region by New Mexico State University health educators staffing the Colorectal Cancer Awareness information booth at the Las Cruces Farmers & Crafts Market.

"This is actually the first time we're using this educational tool to inform community members about the importance of screening to detect colon cancer at an early stage or before it develops," said Janeth Sanchez, community health educator for the project. "Past research shows that visual aids can help individuals make positive changes in their health behaviors, such as getting screened, eating healthier and exercising."

The Inflatable Colon was acquired through funding from the National Cancer Institute's National Outreach Network, according to Sanchez. She said the overarching purpose of that grant, which also created her position at NMSU, is to address cancer health disparities in the region. The funds also support the establishment of a network for educational outreach activities, particularly in underserved

communities.

The Inflatable Colon is nearly 8 feet tall. It is essentially a tunnel, open at both ends, with interior walls representing polyps, various stages of colorectal cancer and Crohn's disease as well as normal colon tissue. Bilingual signs affixed to the interior walls label the three-dimensional

features in this very large intestine.

At the farmers market, the colon was set up on the main thoroughfare near tents featuring freshly baked bread and framed artwork. It was hard to miss, and a steady flow of people wandered through. In addition to Sanchez, NMSU


It was a busy day Tuesday, June 14, at the United Blood Services facility, and hospitals in Las Cruces, El Paso and surrounding areas were the beneficiaries.

World Blood Donor Day is set aside each year as a special day to call attention worldwide to the need for blood donors, and the benefits derived from those efforts.

The blood donated in Las Cruces goes to a larger blood bank in El Paso, and from there, it helps fill the needs of 18 hospitals in the region, including Deming, Alamogordo and other communities. All of the blood stays where it is donated, unless there is some desperate need elsewhere or a special type of blood is needed some place else.

World Blood Donor Day was a special day at the United Blood Services offices on Commerce Drive, but it is not the only time a person can donate blood. There are other special events during the year, but perhaps more important, donors can make arrangements to donate blood at any time by contacting their office. Walk-ins also are OK.

Staff members at United Blood Services said they were extremely pleased with the turnout on World Blood Day, with 48 donors

processed during the event. All of the blood donors were there as volunteers and described by staff members as "incredible people."

Potential donors going into the offices are given a four-page pamphlet that fully explains the procedure.

First, before the interview starts, donors will be asked to show ID containing their name and one of the following: date of birth, blood center assigned donor number or photo, such as driver's license or passport.

educational specialist Vanessa Martinez was on site to explain the risks of colon cancer and the need for screening after age 50.

Janeth's sister Jenny Sanchez was also there as a volunteer, handing out literature and encouraging people to fill out a survey.

While it may not be as fun as inflatable playground equipment youngsters jump on, slide down and bounce off, the Inflatable Colon does attract kids as well as adults.

"We hope to basically encourage individuals to get screened at an early age and we have actually had interest from the young ones," Sanchez said. "They've come by and gotten information. So we encourage them to educate either their parents or their grandparents, since they're at a screening age."

The team was pleased with the results of its heightened visibility. Sanchez said by mid-morning they had probably talked to more than double the number of people they previously interacted with in an entire morning.

One visitor to the display was Albert Saldana, a firefighter from El Paso.

"It answers some of the questions that I had," Saldana said. "It makes me wonder: when should I go get tested, follow up with my doctor and try to see if I have some diseases going on? And if not, also try to prevent it and live a healthy lifestyle."

Although Las Cruces provided the venue for the colon's debut, the Colorectal Cancer Awareness team has attended health fairs in six additional New Mexico communities: Alamogordo, Deming, Hatch, Lordsburg, Silver City and

Truth or Consequences. Anthony is also on its itinerary for the future.

Upcoming summer appearances for the team and the Inflatable Colon include:

- June 25, Las Cruces Health Fair, sponsored by the Las Cruces Sun-News, at the Las Cruces Convention Center
- July 23, Lordsburg Health Fair
- July 30, Alamogordo Men's Health Fair

There are also research aspects to the Colorectal Cancer Awareness initiative.

The voluntary surveys visitors fill out help the team evaluate participants' current knowledge and behavior and their future intentions.

"From the assessments, we have found that from those individuals who should be getting screened for colorectal cancer, age 50 and older, only about 50 percent have gotten screened," Sanchez said. "Therefore, it is crucial for us to continue educating the southern New Mexico communities in an effort to encourage them to get screened."

She said they will also be contacting doctors' offices in the cities they are visiting with their education booth.

"We are going to be comparing screening rates in southern New Mexico from 2010 and 2011 in the future," she said.

The Colorectal Cancer Awareness initiative is a small part of a large and well-established collaboration between NMSU and the Seattle-based Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center, the Partnership for the Advancement of Cancer Research: NMSU/FHCRC.

This two-institution team has been funded by the National Cancer Institute's Minority Institution/Cancer Center Partnership Program since 2002.

NMSU is a Hispanic Serving Institution and involving minority and female students in the STEM areas (science, math, engineering and technology) is an institutional priority.

The lead NMSU researcher for the partnership is Mary O'Connell, a Regent's Professor in the Department of Plant and Environmental Sciences. She is an expert in Southwestern medicinal plants and is actively engaged in assessing the cancer-fighting properties of some of their chemical compounds.

The partnership has included NMSU-FHCRC exchanges of students, faculty and staff over nearly a decade, she reports.

"Each summer, eight NMSU students work as interns in research groups at the FHCRC; others work on collaborative research projects year round, with shorter trips to Seattle for specialized techniques," O'Connell said.

She said, to date, 188 NMSU students have been supported by partnership funds to work on various cancer projects.

According to O'Connell, \$15 million in NCI grant money to the two institutions has been invested in cancer research, training and outreach activities related to the issue of cancer health disparities in New Mexico. The partnership has engaged 18 NMSU faculty members from a diverse set of departments. While the majority of them are doing lab-based projects, others are focusing on issues such as the value of gardening in improving health on the Navajo Reservation, the impact of exposure to heavy metals on cancer risk in southern New Mexico, and the improvement of community outreach efforts promoting cervical cancer screening.



Next, a sample of blood will be taken, the type determined and tested for hepatitis, syphilis, HIV (AIDS), HTLV and other blood-borne infections. These tests are performed to protect the patients who receive blood.

In some cases, additional blood samples may be required. If any of the tests show the donor may transmit any of the above named diseases, or other agents, or the testing cannot be completed, the donor's blood will not be transfused. Positive test results will be reported to the health department, if required by law.

The blood center may conduct research related to improving blood safety and public health. All research studies are evaluated and reviewed by a committee that considers the donor's rights if they are a research participant. If the results from any study could affect

a donor's health, that person will be notified. All personal information regarding the test results is held in a confidential manner. If a donor wishes to participate as part of their blood donation, they will indicate that on a signed consent form.

All equipment used in the donation process is sterile and used only once, virtually eliminating the possibility of contracting an infectious disease by donating blood.

Even though donor reactions are rare and usually mild, most of them occur within the first 15 minutes or so after the blood donation. Donors should be especially careful during this period, so the staff at the United Blood Services has tried to make those 15 minutes enjoyable. Donors are offered a snack plate of various items, some desserts and refreshments while they wait.

Not a bad reward for the donors who have volunteered to give blood to help others.



A sight that should be seen

Quinones home features unique Southwest style

More than four walls and a roof, a home can provide residents with a bevy of architectural details that delight and interest the eye anywhere they look.

This visual appeal is what drew Bettye and Lyle Wood to the home at 2965 Scenic Ridge Loop, built in 2002 by Bill Quinones of Quinones/Design Build Inc.

"(The home is special) because it's visually stimulating," Bettye Wood said. "I can be standing in the kitchen making breakfast and look up and see something new."

Wood said the couple had been working with Quinones on building a home in the neighborhood on Lookout Ridge and would often visit the Southwest-inspired home, which was being used by the home construction company as an office at the time.

"We just loved the house," she said. "At that time, the area was just being developed and the views were spectacular."

After frequently visiting the home, the couple decided it had everything they wanted, so instead of building a residence with similar features, they purchased the property.

"Every time we came in (the home), we would see something new, a different detail we hadn't noticed before," she said. "There is so much to look at in this home."

Designed by architect Ron Nims of Studio D Architects, Wood said the home was constructed to fit the .25-acre lot and fans outward from the entrance to take advantage of every inch of space.

"When you look at the home from the outside, you have no idea how big it is," she said.

Located on the bend of the road, the exterior of the home features a stacked design, creating a layered look. A pathway leads past several bushes with yellow flowers to the front door.

Created from two different woods, the door is surrounded by a few glass-block windows, which bring light and interest into the entrance. Once inside, guests are greeted by a curved hallway.

"The entrance was the first thing that caught our eye," Wood said.

Tan and gray tile create a pathway, guiding guests under the numerous sconces, skylights and vigas that cover the ceiling, elements found throughout the house.

"The vigas start outside the front door," Wood said. "It brings the eye into the property."

"You can get this 'wow' factor with

this art gallery entrance," said Realtor Becky Mitchener of Steinborn & Associates Real Estate, who represents the listing. "Bill's concept of the entire home is very unique."

The hall branches off to an area of the home that contains three of the bedrooms.

"One cool thing about the house is that no room is square," Wood said. "They're all different shapes and sizes."

One of the rooms is the master suite. The large area includes a door to the wrap-around patio as an interesting ceiling treatment.

"One characteristic that is a signature feature of Bill is what he calls a sky island," said Mitchener, explaining that this is a tray ceiling covered in wood planks.

The master bathroom lies behind French doors and includes a jetted bathtub decorated in tile. A separate shower and double sinks rest beside the bathtub.

A guest bathroom completes the area. Mimicking the bend of the hall, the bathroom features a curved wall of frosted glass blocks. The blocks fill the area with light while keeping the space secluded and private.

The fourth and last bedroom is located down a separate hall with the laundry facility, giving it privacy and seclusion.

The center of the home includes the kitchen. Featuring light wood cabinets, the room connects to the dining area, which showcases a two-way fireplace to the living room.

"The architecture in here is just tremendous," Wood said.

The living room, Wood's favorite area of the home, features a 12-foot ceiling and several windows that bring in natural light as well as a 180-degree view looking out to Picacho Peak, Doña Ana Mountains and Organ Mountains.

"It's so light and inviting," she said. "There aren't any obstructions so the view is spectacular."

"You can watch the sunrise at this window and the sunset at that one."

Along with the view, Wood said the room is unique because it is versatile and can be zoned for different entertainment activities.

Outside, an enclosed dog-run is placed on the side of the home beside the angled porch surrounded by a low-maintenance yard.

"We've got so much porch space," Wood said.

In addition to the view, the high elevation also helps with the sound, said Wood, pointing out that even though Roadrunner Parkway is right next to the home, they can't hear any traffic noise.

"It's very peaceful," she said.

Carpenter ant or termite?

Both can infest a home to homeowners' dismay

They're both critters that can eat their way through your home. Termites do it faster than carpenter ants, but the end results are the same: up to tens of thousands of dollars in damage.

For many homeowners, the challenge is how to tell the difference between these bugs. Each requires a different strategy to combat them.

Next week is Carpenter Ants Awareness Week, June 20- 26. It comes at the height of the carpenter ant and termite season, and it's an opportune time to learn about the differences.

Both termites and carpenter ants are swarming species that create colonies with hundreds or even thousands of members. Carpenter ants differ from termites in their dark-colored bodies and bent antennae. Unlike termites that eat wood, carpenter ants only excavate the wood to create living space. They leave behind a sawdust-like material, that under careful scrutiny usually contains dead ant parts they discard, which provides clues to their nesting location – unlike the mud tubes and piles of wings left by termites.

It's common to find carpenter ants and termites in homes and businesses during the spring and summer months. The ants aren't scared of people one bit and are frequently seen out in the open, but usually in the early morning or evenings. Termites are more likely to stay hidden within the walls of a home and may not be found until it's too late.

Truly Nolen recommends the following precautionary tips for dealing with carpenter ants and termite:

- Determine whether it's an ant or termite problem.



Often mistaken for a termite, the carpenter ant can be just as destructive to a home.

- Eliminate moisture around your home that comes from standing water and leaky faucets since carpenter ants look to nest in these areas.
- Seal and check window sills, support posts, basement window frames, wood porches and cracks in cement for any termite damage, droppings or wings.
- Replace any moisture-damaged wood around your home.
- Make sure wood or lumber stored in a garage or near the house is kept dry and elevated to allow air circulation.
- Remove trees, shrubs, stumps, roots and branches that overhang or touch the base of your home.

Tips for entertaining in the summer weather


Cold drinks can complement a casual ambiance

Kiddie pools are in season year-round

Container can be used in some surprising ways

As temperatures continue to rise in the coming weeks, a great way to cool down this summer is to take a dip in a swimming pool.

In use since the ancient Egyptians, swimming pools have been used to have fun, get fit and simply relax for centuries. The summertime necessity has seen several changes throughout the years – from the first public pool built in Oxford in 1839 to the first modern above-ground pool installed in the Racquet Club of Philadelphia in 1907.

Now available in a variety of materials and shapes, there are also swimming pools specially designed for children. Known as kiddie pools, these containers can range in size from 30 gallons to more than 700, and are usually created from either a hard plastic or an inflatable material.

Not just for swimming purposes, a kiddie pool can be used around the home in several ways.

Details

Kiddie pool safety

Although small in size, a kiddie pool needs to be treated with the same level of safety as a normal pool. Never leave children unattended in the pool, no matter how shallow the water. Also, be sure to keep flotation devices near the pool. Not only will this help children safe, it will also give them something to play with. It is also important to know CPR in case of an emergency. The local Red Cross chapter offers CPR class and can be reached at 526-2631. For more information, visit www.swnmredcross.org.

1. Keep toys organized: Have your kids' toys taken over your living room? Regain order in your home by using an empty kiddie pool to store and organize the playthings. This is especially helpful for parents with multiple kids or those who operate a child care facility. Not only will this keep things neat, it will help teach your kids the importance of picking up after themselves.

2. Make a sand box: Living in Las Cruces, we tend to encounter more sand than water. Good thing you can transform that dirt-covered kiddie pool into a sand box. More affordable than a store-bought sand box, just fill the pool with specially designed play sand and toss in a few toys. Although it can offer hours of entertainment, when it isn't being used, cover it with a plastic tarp weighed down with a few bricks. This will help keep out water, debris and animals.

3. Fashion a reading zone: Motivate young kids to read by creating a comfortable getaway using a mini pool. Bring in a clean pool and lay down a few blankets and a pillow or two in the container to create a soft environment your kids will want to be in with a good book.

4. Create a mini garden: A plastic kiddie pool can be transformed into a mini container garden for those with space limitations in a few simple steps. Place the pool in your backyard or on your porch, and fill it with potting soil. Plant a variety of vegetables, flowers, whatever your heart desires. Creating a mini-garden is also a great project for children. This will teach them about how plants grow and how to care for them through planting, weeding, watering and harvesting.

5. Get your own ball pit: No longer will the kiddos have to wait for a trip to McDonald's to play in a ball pit – just create your own at-home funland using a kiddie pool. Fill the empty pool with the colorful balls and you'll instantly have a play area the kids will enjoy for hours. Use an inflatable pool because it will be softer when the kids fall or jump around.

6. Give your dog a bath: Sure little Fido is

cute, but his dirty paws and dust-covered fur can make a big mess in your bathroom when washing him. Instead of spreading that dirt inside your home, give him a bath outside in a kiddie pool. Move the pool to your porch and fill it with water. Be sure to lay an old towel on the ground and have several near by to thoroughly dry off your pooch before allowing him back into the home.

7. Keep your drinks cool: While most of the previous suggestions have been centered on children, the kiddie pool can also be beneficial to adults. The next time you throw a get together, transform this childhood staple into a giant cooler. Fill the container with ice and store your beverages and food. This is great for pool parties, backyard barbecues and picnics in the park.


Pool cleaning

- Skim the surface to remove any debris.
- Add a pool sanitizer to kill any harmful bacteria in the water (there is pool sanitizer available made specifically for kiddie pools).
- Keep your pool covered. If your pool doesn't come with its own cover, create one using a large tarp.
- Change the water every two to three weeks, depending on the amount of use and how well maintained the pool is.

Go green with purple plants

Break up landscaping with this interesting, colorful focal point

I know it seems almost impossible to have too much green here in our great Southwest. If this is ever the case, a well placed “purple” or “bronze” colored plant or tree might just do the trick to break up the constant “green zone.”

One of the new trees on the market is the summer chocolate mimosa. This beauty has scented pink flowers with purplish foliage throughout the summer months. It grows approximately 20-foot-high to about 15-foot-wide and thrives in full sun. This umbrella shaped tree needs only occasional watering once it’s established.

Purple fountain grass will make a quick growing focal point in the landscape. This weak perennial needs full sun to keep its best color through the growing season. Depending on the severity of the winter months, this plant may or may not recover from its winter slumber. On the upside, a newly planted one will grow quite large on its very first year.

The purple smoke tree is another small-sized tree or shrub – depending upon how it gets pruned – that is suited for our intense sun. The attractive foliage, along with its plume like blossoms, which resemble “smoke” from a distance, make this a very interesting contrast to almost any landscape. This plant suffered no winter injury from our last winter storm, however, it

does lose its leaves during the winter. Barberry is a small deciduous shrub that also has purplish red or bronze colored foliage. There are several cultivars to choose from that will vary in shade of color and ultimate size. This shrub does have spiny thorns that may or may not be desirable. This one might be used in front of a window for an added measure of security. Tropicanna cannas have beautiful purple striped leaves with bright reddish-orange flowers. This hardy perennial gives a “tropical feel” to just about any landscape. It grows in full sun but its color seems to look better with a little bit of shade, kind of like us! It prefers regular watering and can even grow in a pond with aquatic soil. Like all other cannas, it multiplies and should be thinned out every few years.

The purple leaf plum is one of those trees that can be seen in many landscapes. It is one of the first trees to bloom in early spring. Light pink flowers cover almost all of the limbs, making it quite striking. The deep purple foliage lasts from spring through mid to late winter, depending upon the severity of the cold season. This tree generally grows up to 20 to 25 feet high and almost as wide. It is susceptible to borers (small pinholes in the trunk) and shot hole fungus (small tiny holes in the leaves). The first ailment can be prevented by a systemic, such as Bayer Tree and Shrub Insect Control, the second ailment can be prevented with a spray containing “clorothalonil.”

So if you are looking for that “special look” or a focal point in your landscape, one of these plants just might be the answer.

Cooking with sunshine

Annual Solar Cook-Off will fill Mountain View Market parking lot

To help educate community members on using the sun's rays to make a variety of dishes, Mountain View Market will hold its third annual Solar Cook-Off beginning at 10 a.m. Sunday, June 19, during the Sunday Growers Market in the co-op parking lot, 1300 El Paseo Road.

"It's responsible and very practical," said Randy Harris, a representative for Global Sun Ovens. "You can do anything that you can do in an oven, except burn food and use fossil fuels."

A vendor of the co-op's Sunday Growers Market selling solar ovens and rain barrels, Harris said he wanted to spread awareness on how easy it was to use the alternative cooking source by holding a community cook-off using only solar ovens.

"It just seemed like a fun thing to do," Harris said.

Harris said often times, cooking with a solar oven is an isolated act, which is why a cook-off seemed like a great way to educate the public as well as gather users.

"It's fun to cook together and eat together," he said.

The first solar cook-off hosted 10 participants, Harris said. After word spread about the event and the benefits of using solar ovens, the second year featured about 24 competitors whipping up their best recipes.

"More people are becoming energy conscious," he said.

This year, Mountain View Market Community Outreach

Coordinator Mo Valko said she expects the entire event to be bigger, not just the cooking portion.

"We're going to open the market up to more vendors," she said, adding that there will also be live music and two DJs.

"It will probably be bigger and better," Harris said.

New to the event this year, Valko said Albuquerque artist Saba, who designed the logo of the Oasis Earth Day event in March, will return to the City of the Crosses to do screen-prints during the event.

"People can bring in or buy shirts, bags, hats, whatever, and get them screen printed," she said. "The main thing, though, is the cook-off."

Valko said solar chefs using homemade or store-bought ovens can compete in four categories – dessert, bread, meat and vegetarian. The dishes will then be judged by selected Sunday Growers Market vendors. The winner of each category will be awarded a \$10 gift card to the co-op.

"We have all kinds of different people participate – some people who haven't done a lot of solar cooking ... others who have cooked with a solar oven a lot," said Valko, adding that they also receive a variety of dishes.

Several other activities will take place, including the next installment of the monthly Kid's Craft series, which will focus on creating a variety of ice creams.

"We wanted to have it on that day because we wanted to make it more kid friendly," she said. "People can come check out the market and then come inside for the class."

Valko said the class, which will be from 11 a.m. to noon, is for children of all ages and their parents.

"Parents have a lot of fun in these classes, too," she said. "We're going to show them the process of freezing the ice cream and the whole chemical process of taking something from a liquid to a solid."

After the event, Valko said the parking lot will be cleared and local jazz trio Red Hot & Red will perform for free from 3:30 to 6:30 p.m. inside the store.

"(Holding these events) is a good way for us to connect with our clientele and the community on a different level," Valko said.

Not just a way to go green and use less energy, Harris said a solar oven makes a great backup "just in case."

"If the fire burning (in Arizona) hits the El Paso Electric lines, those people with solar ovens will still be able to cook and sterilize water," he said.

Taking place on Father's Day, Harris encourages community members to visit the cook-off and possibly "get Dad a solar oven instead of a tie."

"Just come down and have fun," he said. "There is stuff for everyone to do."

A quicker way to clean

Grill block removes burnt material for a healthier surface

People love to grill – it has become a favorite activity of families during the summer when everyone is hanging out on the patio or around the pool.

The worst part of grilling: the cleanup. No one likes to scrub at the grate with a wire or metal brush, which is a little like a nightmare at the dentist's office. Burnt grease, sauce and food all need to be removed before the next time you use it, because a clean grill is a healthy grill. You can try the whole repertoire of grill cleaning sprays, brushes and just about everything else and each have their pluses and minuses when it comes to getting that grate clean in your grill.

One way to clean the cooking utensil is with a grill block, or a grill stone, which makes the task at hand quick and easy. Grill blocks are lightweight and compact, so it can easily be packed for camping, RVing and picnics away from home.

What is it?

Most grill stones are a 4-by-2-by 3-inch rectangular block of recycled material that feels similar to a pumice stone – light and airy, but tough and scaly to get the job done. Most don't have chemicals and are non-toxic.

A few variations include a stone that is attached to a long plastic handle, in order to keep hands away from the heat and grime of the grill. Some are fairly disposable, and are only good for a few cleanings (but often come in multi-packs). Others are sturdier, and better for multiple uses. Once used, the abrasive sides grind down, taking the grease and food with them, gradually shaping itself like the grill, to reach the sides of the grate. This ensures a unique and grill-specific fit, which means a more complete clean.

The life of the grill stone often depends on your specific grate configuration and how often you use it. If you grill more frequently and need to clean your grate more often, the stone will of course wear down faster.

How does it work?

Grill stones are surprisingly easy to use, and can be put to work on hot or cold grill surfaces. They keep your grill and food free from harmful bacteria attracted to aging food particles.

Traditional wire brushes push the grime and grease around, and often get clogged or the bristles become stuck together, making them harder to use.

You can use the block alone, holding it securely in your hand as you rub the scaly surface over the grate of the dirty grill. If you prefer a block with a handle, clip and secure the block, then simply move the block back and forth in the same direction as the grill grates. Within one or two passes, the block conforms to grates, allowing it to reach the sides of the grates brushes can miss.

Let the block do the work. Apply extra pressure only if

needed. Tap the block to remove any excess burnt-on residue. Using a cloth, wipe off the grill grates.

When the cleaner block is used up, release the block from the accessory handle and discard, or save it for your next cleaning. Use a grill block on iron, steel, enamel or porcelain grill grates or flat griddle surfaces. Do not use a grill stone on plastic, glass, aluminum or stainless steel, as the stone will likely scratch these surfaces.

Where can it be found?

You can find grill cleaning stones at any home improvement or kitchen merchandiser, including Home Depot, Bed, Bath & Beyond and Lowe's Home Improvement Store, or order one online at www.amazon.com. Select a brand that is nontoxic and recyclable.

How much does it cost?

Most single stones sell for less than \$8, or you can purchase a multi-pack of disposable stones for less than \$10. Complete

Pineapple Grilled Pork Chops

1 (8-ounce) can pineapple rings, juice drained and reserved
1/4 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup soy sauce
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
4 pork chops
1 pinch ground black pepper

Mix the drained pineapple juice, brown sugar, soy sauce and garlic powder together in a large plastic zipper bag, and smash the bag a few times with your hands to mix the marinade and dissolve the sugar. Place the pork chops into the marinade, squeeze out any air in the bag, seal it and refrigerate overnight. Reserve the pineapple rings. Preheat an outdoor grill for medium heat, and lightly oil the grate.

Remove the chops from the marinade, shaking off excess and grill until browned and the meat is no longer pink inside, and the meat shows good grill marks, 5 to 8 minutes per side. Brush several times with marinade and let the marinade cook onto the surface of the meat. Discard excess marinade.

While the meat is grilling, place 4 pineapple rings onto the grill, and allow to cook until hot and the slices show grill marks; serve the chops topped with the grilled pineapple rings.

cleaning stone kits, including accessories such as plastic handles or finishing cloths, can be a little pricier and run upward of \$17.

Helpful hints

- Clean the barbecue as soon as you have used it. It will be easier to clean if it is still warm as the food won't have had time to adhere to the grates.
- Clean the barbecue before you use it. Dust, dirt and bugs may have found their way into your barbecue so a quick clean is vital for your health.
- Cover your barbecue when not in use to protect it from the elements.
- If you are finding it hard to remove baked-on grease and food, heat up the grill and scrape it off while still hot.



Scent and sight combine for a truly stylish home

Use essential oils to add fragrance without exposing self to chemicals

Whether your home is an expression of clean-lined modernism in stainless steel and glass or a warm and worn harmony of earth tones and antique furnishings, an often-overlooked element of home style is the unseen atmosphere that you breathe. 

Fabric freshening mist

Use this simple, natural option (rather than a chemical cover-up spray) to deodorize your home.

- 4 ounces water**
- 24 drops essential oil blend**

Combine water and oils in a small spray bottle. Shake vigorously and lightly mist curtains and upholstered furnishings.

Candle lamp diffusion

Use a candle lamp diffuser – with an unscented, paraffin-free tea light candle – to suit your individual decor. This is a much less toxic option than synthetically scented candles.

- 1/4 cup water**
- 10 to 12 drops essential oil blend**

Place water in bowl of diffuser lamp. Add oil. Light candle and warm the liquid to release the aroma. Note: Extinguish candle before bowl burns dry.

Dried botanical diffusion

Sprinkle your aroma blend over an artful selection of dried botanical specimens – such as dried flowers, seed pods, whole spices, cones and interesting twigs. You can collect these items from nature or buy them at craft stores.

- Bowl of dried botanicals**
- 10 to 12 drops essential oil blend**

Arrange botanicals and sprinkle with oil. Refresh as needed.

- Sleek and modern style: Middle note: four drops neroli; top note: six drops eucalyptus; base note: two drops cedarwood.
 - Earthy and natural style: Middle note: Five drops balsam fir; top note: five drops grapefruit; base note: two drops vetiver.
 - Light and airy style: Middle note: eight drops pine; top note: two drops peppermint; base note: two drops cedarwood.
 - Passion and mystery style: Middle note: three drops jasmine; top note: four drops lemon; base note: five drops patchouli.
- Feel free to experiment with the proportions (making sure to keep good notes so you can replicate the aroma) until you arrive at your ideal.
- When you have your blend ready, it's easy to incorporate the scent into one or more natural and stylish home scenting options. Finger foods for Father's Day

Quick and easy recipes great for any get-together

Finger foods aren't only fun to nosh, but more times than not, they're easy to prepare – and easy to prepare means they're ideal for last minute get-togethers, for Father's Day, the advent of summer and just because.

A favorite finger food cookbook of mine is "Snack Attack, Quick Recipes to Conquer Your Cravings" by Mad Coyote Joe (Northland Publishing, 2002). The small, 66-page, full-color "tome" packs in nearly 90 recipes that take an hour or less – on average 20 minutes – to prepare. Lest I forget, Mad Coyote Joe devotes a section "for the little buckaroos," recipes for kids under 10 years or for the "kid in you."

Way back when, Mad Coyote Joe (Joe Daigneault), a resident of Cave Creek, Ariz., hosted "The Sonoran Grill," a popular Southwestern TV show. Sadly, after complications from a 2003 surgical procedure, Daigneault was forced to retire from the cooking series. Fortunately, he continues to share sassy recipes on his blog madcoyotejoesblablablog.blogspot.com.

"Snack Attack," along with Joe's other cookbooks, is available used at most online bookstores, including www.amazon.com. I share a few of my favorite "Snack Attack" recipes, plus an extraordinary recipe for green chile cheeseburger "bread" loaves. (Simply slice and dip into ketchup, mustard or a favorite salsa.)

Chicken Enchilada Dip

- 1 pound skinless, boneless chicken breast halves
- 1 (8-ounce) package cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 1 (8-ounce) package Cheddar or Monterey jack cheese, shredded

- 1 (4-ounce) can diced green chiles
- 1 jalapeño, finely diced
- Corn chips or crackers for dipping

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Bake chicken breast in the oven for 20 minutes, or until no longer pink at center (center should be 165 degrees). Remove from oven, cool and shred. In a medium mixing bowl, combine the shredded chicken, cream cheese, mayonnaise, Cheddar cheese, green chile and jalapeño. Transfer the mixture to a baking dish and bake uncovered for 25 minutes, or until the edges are golden brown. Serve warm with corn chips or an assortment of crackers. Recipe is ready to eat in 60 minutes. Makes 10 servings.

Mexican Hay Basket

The Sonoran version of French fries.

- 1 baking potato, peeled and cut into 1/4-inch fries, set in cold water
- 1 sweet potato, peeled and cut into 1/4-inch fries

- Corn oil for frying
- Salt
- Chile powder seasoning (favorite)
- Green ends of 2 scallions, finely chopped
- Lime wedges

Pour 2 inches of oil into a deep frying pan and heat to 375 degrees. Meanwhile, drain and pat dry the potatoes. Deep-fry the sweet potatoes for 2 minutes. Remove from hot oil, drain on paper towels and

salt immediately. Then deep fry the dried potatoes in the oil for 3 minutes, making sure the oil is still 375 degrees. Remove from hot oil, drain on paper towels, and salt immediately. Carefully toss the two potatoes together, season with chile powder seasoning, and top with scallions. Serve immediately with fresh lime wedges on the side. Recipe is ready to eat in 30 minutes. Makes 2 to 3 servings.

California Crab Dip

- 2 (8-ounce) packages cream cheese, softened
- 2 tablespoons onion, minced
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire Sauce
- 3 dashes Tabasco or your favorite hot sauce
- 2 (6-ounce) cans crabmeat
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1 handful slivered almonds
- Assorted crackers


Mix all ingredients together, except almonds and crackers, until well blended. Top with almonds. Bake in a preheated 325-degree oven for 25 minutes. Serve warm with an assortment of crackers. Recipe is ready to eat in 45 minutes. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

Instant Pizza Party for Kids

- 2 English muffins (4 halves), toasted
- 1/4 cup pizza sauce (the bottled kind is fine)
- 1/4 cup mozzarella cheese, grated
- Parmesan cheese to taste

Put a little sauce on each English muffin half, add the desired toppings, and then cover each with mozzarella cheese. Pop them under the broiler until the cheese is melted and starting to brown. Take them out of the oven and allow to cool. Finish by sprinkling each with a little Parmesan cheese. Other suggested toppings include pepperoni, sausage, chorizo, onion, green peppers, green chiles and black olives.

Makes 2 servings. Recipe is ready to eat in 15 minutes.

Green Chile Cheeseburger 'Bread' Loafs

- 1 pound lean ground beef
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1 small onion, chopped
- 1 small garlic clove, minced
- 1/4 cup medium-hot green chiles, stemmed, seeded and chopped
- 1 (16-ounce) box hot-roll mix
- 1 1/4 cups warm water
- 10 slices sharp Cheddar cheese

Heat the oven to 375 degrees. Brown the beef in a nonstick skillet over medium-high heat. Drain off the fat and stir in the salt and pepper. Transfer the beef to a bowl and set it aside.

Heat 1 tablespoon of the olive oil in the skillet and sauté the onion and garlic for about 1 1/2 minutes. Stir in the beef.

In a large bowl, combine the roll mix, water and 2 tablespoons of the olive oil. Stir until the dough is formed. Turn it out onto a floured surface and knead it for 5 minutes.

Line a 10-by-15-inch cookie sheet with parchment paper and lightly grease the paper. Place the dough on the sheet, cover it with a kitchen towel, and let it rest for 5 minutes.

Press the dough out to the edges of the cookie sheet and slice it lengthwise to create two 5-by-15-inch rectangles. Sprinkle the beef mixture over the two dough rounds and top it with the slices of cheese.

Fold over about 1 inch of the short ends, and then roll up each rectangle the long way to create 2 loaves. Pinch the ends closed. Reposition the loaves so they're evenly spaced on the cookie sheet and brush the tops with the remaining olive oil. Bake for 20 minutes or until golden brown. Let the loaves cool for about 7 minutes before slicing. Slice into individual servings for dipping in ketchup, mustard or favorite salsa. Makes 24 servings. Presenting the Recycler of the Year

SCSWA director recognized by NMRC for expanding program

Within the last few years, Las Cruces has seen great expansion to its recycling endeavors and outreach, and on Thursday, June 9, the New Mexico Recycling Coalition (NMRC) honored that effort during its annual awards ceremony in Albuquerque.

While Las Cruces and influential community members have been recognized during past NMRC award ceremonies for their work, this year, the organization honored South Central Solid Waste Authority (SCSWA) Director Patrick Peck as the 2011 Recycler of the Year.

"I'm happy the program has been awarded," he said. "It feels good to have all of our hard work recognized, and the community, too."

Peck said he began with SCSWA in 2004, around the same time the city implemented a pilot curbside recycling program. Although the city was looking at ways to go green, he said many community members were against the \$8 addition it would bring to their monthly waste pick up bills – increasing the total cost to \$15.

"It never got out of City Council," he said. "It never got through, it just died. It all had to do with the cost of the service."

With recycling in Las Cruces needing help, the SCSWA board of directors tasked Peck with taking over the effort in 2008.

"When we took it over, the city had source-separate recycling, which meant everything – paper, plastic, cardboard – had to be separated into piles. This made it almost impossible to pick up effectively," he said.

Peck went on a fact-finding trip to northern California to learn how other communities efficiently conduct their recycling programs.

He said he discovered that the city needed to hand over its efforts to a materials recovery facility (MRF), which collects, separates and prepares recyclable materials for marketing to end-user manufacturers, allowing for recycling to be done on a larger scale.

"Once I came back, I proposed a regional effort," he said. "I also proposed going to a sing-stream format. I got the go-ahead from the board and the City Council loved it."

Partnering with Friedman Recycling in El Paso, Peck said they introduced single-stream recycling and went from collecting 2,500 tons of material to 4,000 tons a year.

In addition to a regional effort, Peck said he worked to reach out and educate the community on the importance of recycling.

To do this, he first went to the Las Cruces Public School District. While the pilot school recycling program began in only six elementary schools, Peck said it will soon take place in all schools within the district.

Along with doubling its activity with the commercial business community and putting containers into five state parks, Peck said SCSWA formed the South Central Recycling Partnership (SCRaP) to give interested and concerned Las Cruces a voice.

The hours of hard work paid off April 4, when Las Cruces finally received curbside recycling. Though he helped lead the charge, Peck said he isn't the only one who was instrumental to the program.

"I'm a little embarrassed to take it as an individual award because there were a lot of people involved," said Peck, explaining that these people included everyone from city councillors to eager community members. "It's not just me, it's the whole community."

Growing the program leaps and bounds in recent years – Peck estimates SCSWA will collect 10,000 tons of recyclables this year – he said the entire state has taken notice of the community.

"Other communities are looking to us as an example," he said.

With work "far from done" for the growing recycling program, Peck said he and his team are looking into several new projects.

"Glass is one," he said, adding that they have teamed up with the New Mexico State University Arrowhead Center to conduct research on its recycling uses. "We're also figuring out how to expand the existing programs we have into the county."
