### 14 file in city races

#### Candidates to be certified Oct. 4

Only one of the announced candidates for the Nov. 8 municipal elections didn't file Tuesday, Sept. 27.

The surprise was that it was Clinton Lanier, who bowed out of the wide-open District 2 race. On the other hand, it was surprising to see Ryan Matthew Dailey file his paperwork - despite his recent DWI arrest in Mesilla – and still attempt to unseat incumbent Nathan Small in the newly redrawn District 4.

Also in the District 4 race is Aaron Henry Diaz, one of the first to announce his candidacy.

District 2 is currently held by Dolores Connor, who is running for mayor and not seeking re-election for her council position. Lanier, a professor who commutes to the New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology in Socorro three days a week, had announced his run, but has reportedly put his support to Fred

The first person to announce a run for District 2 after Connor made her mayoral run official was Greg Smith, who has been active in community efforts, especially Downtown revitalization.

Also running in District 2 is Charles Scholz, chairman of the Las Cruces Planning and Zoning Commission.

In District 1, incumbent Councillor Miguel Silva is being challenged by Natalie Chadborn, a Las Cruces businesswoman.

Candidates had all day to file and the first - at 8:05 a.m. - was Presiding Municipal Judge Melissa Miller-Byrnes. She is being challenged by Frank Chavez, a local attorney.

The last to file was Michael Huerta, who will be challenging incumbent Mayor Ken Miyagishima and Connor, along with Michael Fleming, a newspaper carrier.

City Clerk Esther Martinez said she will announce certification of the candidates at 10 a.m. Tuesday, Oct. 4, and then meet with the candidates at 5 p.m. that day to draw for ballot positions.

### **Mayoral candidates** spar at first debate

#### Candidates offer ways to attract high-tech jobs

The day after filing their candidacies, the four running for mayor took turns answering questions about how to attract high-tech industry to Las Cruces, but the forum also provided opportunities for them to distinguish themselves from each other.

Mayor Ken Miyagishima cited Sapphire Energy as an example of how the city was able to attract a business exploring new technology during a mayoral forum sponsored by the High Tech Consortium of Southern New Mexico Wednesday, Sept. 28, at the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage

Sapphire's research and development on processes to develop biofuels from algae is being conducted at the city's West Mesa Industrial Park. The company is there because the city is able to give it land at no cost so long as it provides high-paying jobs.

This is one of the tools the city government has to attract new

### **Lawsuits already fly** in redistricting fight

#### Special session's failure speeds into the courts

A flurry of lawsuits in state court Monday, Sept. 26, announced the move into overtime in New Mexico's redistricting

State Rep. Brian Egolf, D-Santa Fe, and several voters sued in First Judicial District Court in Santa Fe over plans drawn up in the recent special session. Meanwhile, three

Republican lawmakers, including state House Minority Whip Donald Bratton, filed a separate lawsuit in the 5th Judicial District Court in Lea County.

The sprint to the courts by both Democrats and Republicans wasn't a surprise, given the just-completed 19-day special legislative session that had partisan tempers flaring over the Legislature's constitutional duty to redraw congressional and legislative districts every 10 years.

The coming court fight, however, does come at a time of financial hardship for New Mexico. In recent months, the administra-

### Week to showcase 4-H

### Youth group emphasizes agriculture

The City of Las Cruces and Doña Ana County have proclaimed Oct. 2-8 National 4-H Week.

Karim A. Martinez, County Extension Service interim program director, described the 4-H program as an informal education program dedicated to creating self-directing, productive, contributing members of society.

4-H provides youth with opportunities to acquire leadership and life skills. Through 4-H activities, youths develop an appreciation for the importance of self, science, agriculture and the home.

Doña Ana County has 497 members in 15 clubs from Garfield to Santa Teresa and 233 adult volunteers who work with the youths.

4-H clubs offer youths more than 200 projects, including public speaking, digital photography, rocket science, sports medicine, food and nutrition, sewing, livestock, leather craft and parliamentary procedure, according to Martinez.

"Earlier this month, I had a chance to meet students from High Tech High, which is the No. 1 charter school from San Diego," Las Cruces Mayor Ken Miyagishima said.
"These students are taught leadership skills that include responsibility, self-confidence, self-esteem, communication skills, teamwork and real life work situations. These types of skills are also found through the leadership development programs in 4-H. Additionally, 4-H students can participate in statewide activities and other leadership positions. These youths learn about life skills to help young people become self-directed,

productive citizens."

Speaking for the County Commission, Karen Perez, District 3, said she supports 4-H because it provides a wide range of activities for children of all age groups.

"Through projects, competitions and teamwork, these children learn meaningful social and career skills that create enduring friendships and help keep our agricultural heritage vibrant," Perez said. "The organization also teaches ethical value, responsibility, humane treatment of animals and good sportsmanship, all of which are critical to creating a substantial future work

force of ethical, hard-working adults. The 4-H youths are the best-of-the best. They have impeccable manners and present themselves with confidence."

The joint proclamation also described the symbolic

meaning of the four H's:
The first H stands for head, for critical thinking and problem solving; the second H for heart, for self-discipline, in-tegrity and communication; the third H for hands for serving others; and the fourth H for health and choosing healthy lifestyles.

The proclamation also recognizes the adult volunteers who work with the youths.

Richard Martinez, president of the state letter carriers union, said only two more members need to sign on as co-sponsors to ensure it's immediate passage in the U.S. House of Representatives.

solvent until the last few years, Martinez said. In 2006, Congress directed the Postal Service to pay into a retiree benefits fund for future employees. H.R. 1351 would lift the requirement, letting the Postal Service keep its profits and use surplus retiree funds for the retirees benefits account. The Postal Service is projected to lose \$9 billion this year, and \$5.5 billion of that is the prepayment for the retirees benefits fund, according to supporters of the legislation.

The projected deficit is what's driving the actions to move local sorting services to El Paso and close rural post offices, Martinez said.

'A Gathering of Newspapers' in Albuquerque last week reaffirmed the vital role of our community newspapers

Hundreds of newspaper owners, publishers, editors and advertising leaders came together last week in Old Town Albuquerque at the National Newspaper Conference to discuss the current state and future of the newspaper industry.

The consensus is that newspapers, especially those that are positioned as community leaders in small to mid-sized markets, are doing very well in today's digital age,

despite the difficult economy and the incessant challenges from a variety of Internet competitors.

New Mexico State University College Dean and futurist Lowell Catlett, ignited the conference as the keynote speaker, in his typical ebullient fashion, with a witty presentation about where we, as Americans, have been, where we are and where we are headed. ### Letter to the Editor

#### LCAR off course

In a recent issue of a Las Cruces Association of Realtors insert published by the Las Cruces Bulletin, a column stated that Las Cruces City Council policies are responsible for the downturn in real estate development.

This is unfair to the council, which I have found to be very well-informed and responsive when it comes to serving not just business, but all sectors of our community. In any case, blaming the council for a nationwide real estate downturn is simply an effort to shift attention away from those who are really responsible.

I was in banking for many years and made thousands of residential real estate loans. My job description required me to take the loan application, underwrite applicants' credit, make certain that all legal requirements were met to convey good title to the property, close loans and disburse funds. Many loans remained in the bank's portfolio and I was responsible for making certain that all payments were made on time or to keep in contact with the borrower until all payments were current. During a period of 15 years, there was only one foreclosure, despite some periods of economic downturn.

The builder and developers made money. The Realtors made money. The bank made money and the consumer walked away feeling confident in having made a good investment.

There were regulations and codes that guided lending policies, and adherence to those rules was required and strictly audited.

More recently, financial interests have lobbied, made campaign contributions to politicians and managed to get rid of most of the

regulations that dictate good business practices. "Move in for \$250." What an invitation to take a huge risk. Poor underwriting of the consumer's credit, inflated home prices and building codes that were not properly enforced contributed to the risk.

The builder, the developer, the Realtor and lending institutions made money, but, now, the consumer is bearing the burden of poor business practices. The subprime market has created financial chaos in the United States as well as in other countries. Bailout funds were made available to banks at taxpayers' expense. And there is more financial fallout to come.

An example of failure to enforce building codes can be readily seen in local neighborhoods. A subdivision was added to The Pines approximately 10 years ago and, if you travel Stone Pine Drive in the 2000 to 2100 block, 30 repairs have been made to water lines in that rather short block; repairs of substandard installations that have been made at taxpayer expense.

Rules and regulations are required to protect the average consumer from improper business practices. The Las Cruces Association of Realtors knows this, and they are irresponsible in the charges they make.

### Plenty of blame to go around

### Special legislative session ends without much accomplished



New Mexico's special legislative session on redistricting has adjourned. Everyone is blaming everyone else for not getting much done. They all are correct. Everyone bears some blame.

Democrats control both houses of the legislature so they could pass about anything they wanted. But they knew that Gov. Susana Martinez would veto it. So why go to the trouble of passing something they know she will shoot down?

It now will be up to the state Supreme Court to draw the lines for legislative and congressional redistricting. They know from experience that those lawsuits will cost millions. Some estimates run as high as \$9 million.

Privately, Democrats likely figured the best

strategy would be to get something before the court that is as favorable to them as possible. Let the court start from there. Everyone likes to talk about saving taxpayer money but it may be that none of the parties to this dispute had any intention to keep redistricting out of court.

All legislators who plan to run again for office want to make their district as winnable as possible. Usually the majority party is willing to allow minority party members to protect their seats. There are exceptions, such as eight years ago when Texas Republicans took over their legislature and decided to redistrict their congressional delegation that had been redistricted two years earlier.

That is when Albuquerque had a visit from Texas Democratic senators for several weeks. Numerous Texas Democratic members of Congress lost their seats over that redistricting.

When an area of the state falls behind in growth, such as frequently happens on New

Mexico's east side, someone has to go. That sometimes becomes a personality contest, in which the district of the least popular lawmaker reappears in a fast growing part of the state.

This year, Republicans knew they would see some of their districts squeezed out of some slow growing areas. They hitched their wagon to an argument that Democrats ought to be fair in designing districts that would give them a chance to win in future years. But there is no law requiring political balance in a district.

Republicans knew the governor had their back. If they didn't get everything they wanted in the Legislature, she would be there with her veto pen. That allowed them to be much more demanding than if they didn't have a governor in their corner.

The Senate pulled a fast one on the House, going into the wee hours Saturday morning to complete its business and then adjourning. That left the House with no ability to negotiate any changes in Senate bills.

That led to what may be another first in state history – a redistricting session that didn't produce a U.S. House redistricting bill. The court

will not even have a place to start on that one.

Martinez was no help with redistricting. In fact, she may have been a hindrance, calling in legislators to lobby them on her issues during the session. She said she worked hard during the session but none of it was directed at facilitating agreement on redistricting.

The Legislature passed redistricting bills for the Public Regulation Commission and the Public Education Commission. Will the governor sign them? She says she hasn't reviewed them yet.


It appears that redistricting will be a political topic in next year's campaigns. Martinez often has said that voters should be given a choice of candidates in their legislative districts rather than to have legislators choosing their voters in a redistricting session. It speaks to creating politically balanced legislative districts rather than safe districts.

Three of the 11 items the governor presented to the Legislature during this special session were passed. In-state preferences for state contracts were tightened to cut down on companies opening an office in the state just to bid on a contract.

A food stamp supplement was passed to take advantage of federal money. And \$86.5 million was appropriated for capital outlay projects.

### Tower doesn't belong in our neighborhood

Currently, there is an issue affecting our East Mesa neighborhood where Verizon Communications intends to construct a tall cell tower in the center of a residential community. If this action gets the nod from City Council, it opens the door to creation of an "antenna farm."

There will be a City Council hearing on Monday, Oct. 3, to change the zoning from residential to commercial to accommodate this corporate interest. The city's zoning rules are clear; zoning is not about corporate interest, it's about long-term planning for our community.

The city planning department noted in its approval report that communication structures are not normally allowed in residential

neighborhoods. Despite this, the Planning and Zoning Commission approved the request. This issue is not about overall cell phone service, but about a corporate interest that city rezoning rules do not support.

Our homeowners' association covenants require underground utilities. That's one of the reasons many of us moved to this location. Allowing one service provider to break code ignores the most basic tenant of public policy. If City Council were to approve this rezoning, it would eventually lead to additional cell towers, thus creating an "antenna farm" and then perhaps additional rezoning requests from single family residential to commercial. This is not just an East Mesa issue – your community could be next.

### Telling the truth doesn't win elections

### The American people will go on believing in their illusions



All recent presidents have known the truth about the way Congress manipulates money and makes decisions. Even though they have known the truth, there has been and is no will to confront Congress for their fraudulent accounting. Both political parties are equally unable to call Congress out.

The political question that presidents confront is: "How much truth will the public believe?" The answer is: the citizens will not believe the truth, so the presidents have decided that the public will not be told the truth, since telling the truth to the public does not win elections.

### Move to end social promotion defended

Michael Hays claims that efforts to end "social promotion" by Gov. Susana Martinez and Public Education Department Secretary Hanna Skandera, which was advocated in the 2011 special legislative session, was a "political stunt." Reality could not be further from that.

For starters, efforts to end social promotion are only one of many education reforms that Florida undertook successfully in achieving rapid gains in reading scores. If New Mexico is going to achieve similar success, we must also create additional choice options including tax credits for non-public schools, increased opportunities for a wide array of "virtual" or online education, and additional incentives to hire and retain the

best teachers, rather than an undue emphasis on graduate degrees in education.

In terms of just social promotion, however, it should not cost taxpayers more money for the schools to do the essential job of teaching our children. According to data from the U.S. Census, if per-pupil spending in New Mexico had grown at the same rate as inflation since the mid-1990s, we'd be spending less than \$6,000 annually (rather than more than \$9,000) to educate that same student.

If actually teaching kids basic skills is so expensive, shouldn't New Mexico taxpayers have received rebates every year for the horrible results they are getting? The fact is that accountability and choice matter more than money when it comes to educational results.



## The sheep camp

For those of you to whom the word "sheep camp" conjures up a pastoral, nostalgic, even romantic vision of shepherds watching over their flocks by night, I suspect you've never slept in one.

Sheep camp, in the real world of shepherding, is the wagon where you sleep, live and eat. It looks like a small covered wagon. A round top on a box. There is a built-in-bed with storage underneath. There is a small stove-heater propane unit and a drop-down kitchen cabinet behind. A lantern provides light. The roof could be canvas or sometimes fitted tin.

The wagon has four tires and a tongue and is usually hauled or pulled to the grazing area. In its heyday, the mid-1900s, sheep camps were as common and handy as Airstream motor homes. It was the best of years for the sheep business.

I worked in the ION country (southern Idaho, western Oregon, northern Nevada) in the '70s near the end of good times for sheep business. I worked for an outfit that ran 20,000 sheep on the high desert sagebrush.

In the summer, the herd would be divided into bands of 2,000 to 3,000. One man with his sheep camp, dogs and a saddle mule or horse would watch over his band. He would keep moving them to good forage and try to protect them from predators.

When it was needed, he would hook up his horse and drag his camp to a new location. The boss would drive in with the supplies, including water, at least once a week, maybe more.

These were self-sufficient, hardworking immigrants, often Basques from Spain. Over the years, I watched the Basque improve their lot and be replaced by South Americans. In Wyoming, I have known of white American sheepherders, but that was uncommon.

So, suffice it to say the kind of person who is fit to that life and can do it well,

has to be a no-frills kind of person.

Fast-forward to the sheep business in the U.S. today. We import our lamb from Australia, we no longer subsidize the eco-friendly natural resource wool, and we have posted a mountain of regulations protecting predators, wildlife, grazing land, and the New Zealand sheepherders.

Now this year the Department of Labor has taken it upon itself to write an official sheepherder job description and other requirements, with the object of restricting the hiring of "foreign shepherds." These regulations assure that hiring foreign workers won't deprive any of the 14 million unemployed able-bodied Americans of a job.

My question is, what able-bodied, evicted, food-stamped, credit-revoked, receiving government checks Americanstanding-in-the-unemployment-line today, is going to apply for an outdoor job on Blizzard Mountain, Idaho where you are on call 24 hours a day, know how to bed down 1,800 sheep, can identify Halogeton, and castrate lambs with his (or her) teeth?

Maybe before we pile any more regulations on the overburdened handful of sheep men left, the secretary of labor should spend a night on Blizzard Mountain in a sheep camp with a box of matches, a roll of Downy and a shaker of louse powder.

I think he would be assured there is no real danger of foreign workers depriving our "nanny state" privileged citizens of proper employment.

Besides, any Americans that would make good sheepherders are already at work on the Great Northern Gas Fields, Iraqi pipelines, and Afghanistan security patrols. Like I said, it takes a no-frills kind of person.

### Impact fees kill jobs

### Fees will push new building into the county

A little over a month ago, the Las Cruces City Council voted additional impact fees on new development in Las Cruces. I chose to vote "no" because it is the wrong time and the wrong message to send to people who want to invest in our community. I have no investment property in our community to protect, other than my personal home, and I voted "no" so others will be able to reach their dreams.

Las Cruces has been suffering from the same economic woes as the rest of our country, but we were fortunate to have had some of the largest construction projects in our community (i.e. the federal court house, City Hall, convention center, regional aquatic center) help shoulder some of the downturn in our construction. Those buildings are complete and there are no

"big" projects on the horizon. What wasn't shouldered was the many construction and supplier jobs that have been lost over the past few years, as the home building industry declined precipitously.

Last month, our city manager reported to City Council total construction gross receipts tax has been down for seven of the last eight months for our city. Instead of creating a climate conducive to creating jobs, our mayor has embraced policies that kill jobs after we have lost thousands of jobs in this economic downturn. For example, the Bureau of Labor Statistics shows seasonally unadjusted unemployment in Doña Ana County has more than

doubled, from 3.2 percent in October 2007 to 7.3 percent in July 2011. Joblessness among Hispanics has been in double digits for some time. Many of those jobs were in our own local businesses, especially in our construction industries.

Our own city manager's report says those new infrastructure costs from impact fees will raise the price of an average Las Cruces house by \$6,336. An important note is that if you build outside the city limits, there are zero impact fees. I want newcomers and those seeking the American Dream to buy and build in our city and not outside our city limits. Impact fees will drive people to the county and future taxpayers will have to pay for the additional infrastructure.

These impact fees will not only affect residential homes. New commercial construction for both large and small businesses would face these increasing costs. I don't know about you, but adding \$291,600 to the cost of a 100,000-square-foot project (\$2,916 per 1000 square feet) without even turning a bit of dirt, is not something I would call a small price. That is a big deal to me.

Developers already pay impact fees and construction costs. What has been proposed are additional fees, which won't start until 2013 and be fully implemented in 2014, well after this

November's election.

I've been a homeowner in Las Cruces for almost 40 years. I am proud of my middle class background. And I know how all citizens' struggle to raise a family in hard economic times. I have heard from many constituents expressing concern over what they are seeing and experiencing in our current economy The council's answer to all this is to tax a suffering industry and ask mostly the middle and lower class to step up and pay the new tax on their American Dream when fewer people can even qualify for home ownership.

As mayor, I want to take our city in a new direction that encourages business to create iobs. We should be welcoming business into Las Cruces, making it easier to do business and in turn will help increase our tax base, employing more people and bringing more value to our community. I believe that is how we move Las Cruces forward. If we don't take action to grow our economy, the pressures will be on future city councils to raise taxes, cut city services, or both.

We must take action to change the focus of the City Council to those proven policies that will improve our economic vitality. Now is the time to change that direction.



tion of Republican Gov. Susana Martinez has laid off dozens of state workers. Meanwhile, New Mexico has asked state workers to pay more into their retirement plans so the state could reduce what it contributed by the same amount.

Months of litigation over redistricting plans will surely add to New Mexico's financial strain. The last time New Mexico tackled redistricting 10 years ago, the state paid \$3.5 million in costs related to legal challenges to several plans, including those that redrew state House and congressional districts.

During the just-ended special session, the Legislature passed redistricting plans that would redraw district boundaries for the state House, state Senate, Public Regulation Commission and the Public Education Commission. A congressional plan failed to pass, a fact Martinez used Monday to highlight the Legislature's performance.

The Governor's Office said in a statement issued Monday that Martinez was "very disappointed that Democratic leaders spent over \$1.5 million and 19 days in session" only to produce "partisan redistricting maps that reflect no attempt to compromise and which the governor will veto in order to protect the voice of all New Mexicans. In fact, the Legislature even failed in its constitutional duty to pass a congressional redistricting plan."

Martinez also took legislative leaders to task for not tackling two of her priorities – ending New Mexico's practice of giving illegal immigrants driver's licenses and ending third grade social promotion. In addition, lawmakers also failed to pass legislation that would shore up the state's unemployment fund and a bill giving local authorities the power to ban fireworks.

Two of the suits filed in Santa Fe on Monday asked the courts to stop New Mexico from using current state House and Senate districts for future elections. While the Legislature passed plans redrawing House and Senate districts, the governor is expected to veto them.

The third suit filed in Santa Fe asked the court to draft new boundaries for New Mexico's three congressional districts after the Legislature failed to pass such a plan.

The lawsuit filed in Lea County, meanwhile, challenged the state legislative and congressional plans as well as plans drawn up for the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission.

There are murmurings that more legal challenges could be on the way.

While it is unclear whether the competing lawsuits will be consolidated or heard separately, 10 years ago, the New Mexico Supreme Court appointed a state District Court judge to hear all the various redistricting cases.

The turn to the courts following legislative redistricting efforts is nothing new in New Mexico. In addition to the courts adjudicating the state's redistricting battle 10 years ago, the courts had the last say in the 1970s and '80s, according to an analysis by the New Mexico Legislative Council Service.

The only time in recent decades that New Mexico escaped litigation was in 1991, the legislative agency noted. That "marked the first time in more than 30 years that New Mexico conducted its decennial redistricting without any involvement in litigation," the agency wrote.

The U.S. Department of Justice, however, did pre-clear New Mexico's 1991 redistricting plans, the analysis said.

# Getting to the moon

### Scientists counted the ways to make the trip

Jackie Gleason, portraying "The Honeymooners" Ralph Kramden on TV, frequently spouted, "To the Moon, Alice!" Get-

ting there, though, was the scientists' job. "American spacemen are currently studying three different systems for landing men on the moon," Sky and Telescope magazine reported in the October

The first was "a direct flight," but one that would demand "the most booster power," said the article, "Planning Manned Flight to the Moon.' However, the magazine stated, "no conventional rocket is expected in the near future to provide sufficient power" for a direct

The second method, while needing less power, was more complicated in nature, requiring refueling of a space vehicle while it is still in orbit around the Earth, Sky and Telescope reported. The plan involved a "rendezvous of two or more ships." One, a "60-foot-tall liquidoxygen tanker, weighing some 100 tons," would refuel the lunar-bound spacecraft before it left Earth orbit.

The more promising plan, the magazine said, was "a direct flight to a circumlunar parking orbit." This would "save from six to 15 months in preparing and testing equipment," an important factor in the Cold War space race against the Soviet Union. A three-stage Saturn

C-5 would give "7.5 million pounds of thrust" alone in the first stage, and a million pounds in the second to put the third-stage payload and capsule into Earth orbit.

"If all goes well," Sky and Telescope said, "the third-stage engine will be fired to give the vehicle escape velocity, starting it

Ten years earlier, in 1952, the Fawcett publication "The Mystery of Other Worlds" published various launch methods engineers were investigating. The cover featured photographs from the 1951 Paramount Pictures/George Pal Technicolor film, "When Worlds Collide." The movie rocket gained escapevelocity racing along on a sled track. Dr. John Stapp, who in the early 1950s studied aircraft pilot restraint systems at Holloman Air Development Center, considered vertical launches a waste of energy, he said in a 1993 radio interview with Alamogordo's KPSA. Stapp stridently stated a track should begin atop the San Andres Mountains in southern New Mexico, and descend to

White Sands Missile Range. Traveling across the Tularosa Basin, the rocket would gain speed before ascending up the Sacramento Mountains.

A painting by renowned space artist Chesley Bonestell in the Fawcett publication, illustrating Harland Manchester's article "Space Ships Are Already Here!," depicted "space-going rockets ... released above the stratosphere by huge jet-transports." Manchester pointed out: "For years, sensible adults have been amused by the talk of small fry about space ships, interplanetary travel, and the weirdly-garbed science-fiction characters of extra-terrestrial domains. Now it appears that the

children were right, and the minds of their elders were hopelessly earthbound. The prospect of travel in free space – beyond the limits of the Earth's atmosphere and gravitational pull – has virtually been assured by the latest scientific and technical developments." In the May 1951 "Astounding Science Fiction," Russell Saunders, in his article "Clipper Ships of Space," postulated a different means of thrust once the spacecraft was free of Earth's gravity.

It is becoming more and more taken for granted that the only possible method of propulsion in a vacuum is the rocket, Saunders wrote. "I intend to propose another method ... based on present day physics." He hypothesized "using a 'sail' to obtain mechanical forces from the sun's radiation of great enough magnitude to drive a spaceship between the planets," because light, he said, "exerts pressure on material bodies.'

Saunders described the process thusly: 'In order to test the feasibility of this idea we must decide what ac-

celeration of sail must produce. Since the is applied continu-

amount required will be minute compared to rocket accelerations. It is important to note that both the gravitational attraction of the sun and the radiation pressure on the sail decreases inversely as the ship's distance from the sun. This means that, when the sail is erected, the ship will behave as if the mass of the sun has been suddenly reduced. If the sail produces a force equal to the attraction of the sun at any distance from the sun, the two forces will balance at any other distance and the ship will travel in a straight line through the solar system."

In the same issue, writer Willy Ley reviewed Saunders' theories. Ley said while "the idea itself is fascinating and ... somebody in the future may decide to try it ... I think that any try-out will be essentially in the nature of a

"For thousands of years man has dreamed of going to the moon," the May 1958 Popular Science said. "Today that dream is almost a reality. Many of the older people and all of the

young who read this will be around when a human being lands on the moon. This will take place by the year 2000 A.D. - give or take a few years. It may be longer if wars intervene to halt the rapidly accelerating technological advances. It will be shorter if a technological breakthrough like a nuclear-powered rocket materializes.'

The United States won the space race in July 1969 when NASA landed Apollo 11 astronauts Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin on the Moon. A Saturn V booster launched them and command module pilot Michael Collins. The Saturn's stage one "F-1 engines which lifted the rocket off the pad were monstrously muscled but not particularly sophisticated," the astronauts wrote in their 1970 book, "First Men on the Moon." "They (the engines) had only one job to do and it would all be over in less than three minutes."

At that point the crew prepared for translunar injection.

"We like TLI," they wrote. "It gives us an orbit-and-one-half around the Earth, or two-and-one-half orbits if need be, to check the spacecraft, and check out a lot of other things. We don't need to take off for the moon until we are sure that everything







Prior to the conference, ISPCS also is hosting the Growing Community Partnership Luncheon from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 18, at the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum.

The ISPCS Commercial Space Exhibit Hall and Exhibitor Portal will be open to attendees of the event to engage and inform members of the general public on the commercial space industry. Attendees will come from southern New Mexico and El Paso.

#### Outside PAC upsets candidate

Huerta, after filing his paperwork, spoke about the controversy growing around an out-of-town Political Action Committee (PAC) called Total Newport Campaign of Rhode Island.

Huerta said he never invited the PAC to help his campaign. He said his early announcement to refuse to accept corporate and other large donations reportedly inspired a supporter to contact Total Newport Campaign, which is causing a stir because of accusations it's already making about Miyagishima.

The total lack of campaign contribution controls is one of the issues Huerta said he is running on. Currently, he said, there are absolutely no limits to how much

money an individual, business or special-interest group can contribute or spend on behalf of a candidate in city

"The current mayor and council have known this, but have done nothing about it," Huerta said.


Huerta said he has even turned down a donation offer

The lack of meaningful changes made by the current council and mayor is why Huerta said he is running for

mayor.





business, Miyagishima said, as well as industrial revenue bonds in which the business gets a tax break with the city acting as a financial partner.

The city is fortunate, he said, to have community partners in education – such as the job training at Doña Ana Community College and research at New Mexico State University in areas of aerospace, engineering, solar and other renewable energy – to provide added interest for companies looking for a place to locate or relocate.

There also is an economic consideration, said City Councillor Dolores Connor said Companies are looking for low-cost communities, which is why the city needs to re-examine its tax rates and impact fees, she said. Las Cruces loses business opportunities to El Paso because of costs added by both local and state government, Connor said.

Connor said Las Crucens need to get past skepticism about the new private space industry and get behind Spaceport America, 45 miles north of the city, or risk losing the benefits that places such Huntsville, Ala., enjoyed during the boom of government-funded space exploration through the NASA program.

Challenger Michael Huerta said that when it comes to attracting high-tech jobs in the 21st century, the lure isn't always financial incentives. The U.S. still leads in manufacturing of new technology, he said, and these new startups are looking to locate in areas with a university, airport, great weather and communities of good character with education systems that focus on science, technology, engineering and math.

I say they are looking for Las Cruces," he said. "And the mayor of Las Cruces should advocate for bringing those kind of companies here."

Promoting the city to potential new business is one of the primary jobs of the mayor, Huerta said, but Las Cruces failed to capitalize on the

film industry coming to New Mexico even though the city is surrounded by scenic and unique geography.

When asked about the potential for attracting more solar-related business, Miyagishima said the trick is finding companies that are successfully developing new technologies and working with utilities to get more homes and businesses using solar.

Connor said over the last three years, several companies came to see City Council about locating here, but only one company will be putting up solar panels at the industrial park. The problem, she said, is that solar generation doesn't generate a lot of jobs in light of the area they take up.

As she did throughout the forum, Connor cited her experience in working on statewide issues and said the state Public Regulation Commission also needs to provide more incentives for attracting the solar industry here.

In recent years, New Mexico was ranked at the top for its solar potential, but at the bottom in actual solar generation, Huerta said. Though the state has a lot of solar potential, solar generation on both a commercial and private scale are expensive propositions, he said.

Another challenger, Michael Fleming, said that despite the city's abundant sunshine, "we do have keep in mind the upfront costs are astronomical." The private sector should be taking on the risk, not the local government, he said.

Upfront costs is often the reason many great ideas don't get up and running, Miyagishima said.

Connor said that too often governmental red tape is part of that prohibitive upfront cost, and the community needs to push legislators to work with Gov. Susana Martinez to make doing business in the state less difficult.

Fleming agreed that the city has too many rules and regulations that make it costly for businesses to relocate here.

Nevertheless, Huerta said it's the job of the city's elected officials to go out and attract these companies.

When asked about the lack of access to

high-speed broadband throughout the city, the candidates agreed that coming up with an answer that filled all the connectivity gaps is a costly proposal for local government.

Huerta said the city could make more efforts to educate Las Crucens about the importance of the Internet, "and even what the Internet is and can do for them."

Fleming said every Las Crucen now has access to the Internet, such as Thomas Branigan Memorial Library.

#### Impact fees, poverty

Miyagishima said the City Council passed new impact fees to get the developers to pay their fair share because the alternative was residents paying a higher gross receipts or property tax to provide the services and make improvements in new development.

Connor said she did vote against impact fees (see guest column on page A7) but she didn't want people to think she was for raising taxes.

"We have to remember that government can't do it all," she said. "It's going to take collaboration from lots of entities.

One of the fiscal realities the city faces is

that a large part of the population is making less than the medium income, Connor said.

Huerta said he was glad to hear Connor talk about the poor and those struggling to make ends meet because that really represents the need facing most city residents.

Las Cruces does have many poor and unemployed, he said.

We need to talk about those people and work to make things better for them," Huerta

Miyagishima said the city government is more financial stable than it once was and has doubled its account reserves.

Connor said the city may have healthy reserves, but no fluff in the budget. Connor said she has the experience to say what can be realistically accomplished and the ability say "no" to unrealistic ideas.

Huerta said he is able to motivate volunteers and has been able to get more small individual donors than the other candidates.

Fleming, whose livelihood is selling newspapers, said his experience has made him financially astute and conservative. If elected, he promised to hold City Council accountable to make sure money is spent judiciously.



Continuing an autumn tradition that started in 1999, the Mesilla Valley Maze opened its gates on Saturday, Sept. 24, and area families and their children are already visiting the corn maze. This year's maze theme is "United We Stand." The Mesilla Valley Maze features a wide range of family-oriented activities, music and the ever-popular pumpkin patch.

"We want to give teachers and parents an opportunity to explore our nation's history through our theme while having fun together, so our maze is cut into an American flag," Maze owner Anna Lyles said.

Several educators have indicated to her that they were going to use the maze to teach students about the evolution and development of the American flag, and what it means.

The maze starts as a pencil sketch that gets converted into a series of points on a Global Positioning Sensor (GPS) device. The corn seed is planted with a grain drill in early July, and about a month later, survey equipment using GPS coordinates is

set up. A small farm tractor cuts the pattern following the GPS points, and cuts miles of 6-foot wide paths across the nine-acre field.

The Mesilla Valley Maze is open 11 a.m. to 7 p.m daily through Sunday, Oct. 30. Admission is \$10 for adults and \$8 for children, with free parking.



Fight Song is probably one of the most interesting college fight songs in the United States, and not only because some of its best lyrics are unofficial.

It's because of that closing line: "We'll win this game or know the reason why."

While some earnest NMSU professors may hope the line is a call to raise the level of critical thinking on campus, the lyrics were written at a time when mere straightforward thinking did the job. Seen in context of the rest of the song, the closing line is a continuation of the theme of never giving up and staying positive in the face of defeat.

For fans of Aggie football, the past two weeks have brought two difficult losses to UTEP (16-10) and San Jose State (34-24)

After NMSU's stunning 28-21 victory over Minnesota, many fans hoped the Aggies would have racked up several

But for those fans who may feel disappointed, now is the time to take a lesson from the Fight Song and not be discouraged by defeat.

After all, that's what NMSU head coach DeWayne Walker and his players

That's not to say that Walker and the Aggies aren't hungry for a victory, especially this Saturday against the UNM Lobos in Albuquerque. In a press conference this week, Walker said, "Rest assured we're more competitive, but when you get more competitive, you want to win."

At the same time, Walker had little interest in dissecting plays that contributed to the loss against SJSU, saying one play does not diminish the overall effort of any player. His focus is strongly on moving ahead, not looking back.

Linebacker Bryan Bonilla echoed that feeling when he said, "We need to stay positive, we need to believe in each other ... forget about the last play, go on to the next play."

Defensive back Jonte Green admitted that "every loss is frustrating," but at the same time he said, "We have got to get past that."

While fans of Aggie football may have heard similar remarks from both coaches and players over the years – as a Bulletin sportswriter in 1988, I recall then-coach Mike Knoll vowing his team would "erase the past" — there is no doubt that Aggie football is improving under

Both Walker and his players downplayed the big news that came out of Albuquerque this week, namely that UNM head coach Mike Locksley was fired Sunday, Sept. 25, after the Lobos lost 48-45 in overtime to Sam Houston State, a Division I-FCS team. Defensive coordinator George Barlow was named interim head coach for the remainder of the year.

Locksley's record at UNM was 2-26. During Locksley's tenure, the Lobos were outscored on average by 25 points a game (41-16), and attendance for the Sam Houston State game, 16,313, was the lowest for a UNM home game since 1992.

In addition, Locksley was plagued by a series of controversies off the field.

UNM senior Bubba Forrest said, "It's a tough situation for everybody ... It's over now, and we have to direct our concentration on New Mexico State."

According to Walker and NMSU players, the upheaval in Albuquerque does not afford the Aggies any advantage. Neither would they comment on whether a coaching change might

### High-scoring 'Blazers right on schedule

### Gleghorn has football team getting up and down the field

The Mesilla Valley Christian Schools football program is right on schedule.

people thought it could be.

Competing at the Class A level, the Son-Blazers had a solid first season in 2009 and made it to the state semifinals in 2010.

Mesilla Valley opened 2011 with a 43-6

win over Tornillo, and followed that up with a 43-8 win over McCurdy and a 44-2 win over Cloudcroft.

The team's only loss was the next week against Eunice, 48-42. Eunice is the state's topranked Class 2A team.

The SonBlazers rebounded last week with a 55-20 win over New Mexico Military Institute.

Averaging more than 45 points per game, it's the MVCS offense that has been most dominant. Gleghorn, who won multiple state championships as the head coach at Hatch Valley, has molded a group of eager athletes into a football scoring machine in his offense that

emphasizes short passes.

Gleghorn said his offense is similar to the run-and-shoot offense used by coach June Jones, who now is the head coach at Southern Methodist University. The pass routes are short and quick and a premium is put on the ability to gain yards after the catch.

The yards-after-catch (YAC) statistic is a good gauge for the offense's effectiveness.

The Aggies have won the last two games against the Lobos, 20-17 in Albuquerque in 2009, and 16-14 in Las Cruces last year. Walker acknowledged that the rivalry is big for football fans in the state, but NMSU's main goal is to "get back on track with a W no matter who it is"

Defensive back Jonte Green described the rivalry game as "a really big game for us," but added that he expected it to be a hard-fought

"We have to be competitive on every play as if it's our last," he said.

It's no secret that the Lobo defense is struggling. So far this year, the Lobos have given up 43 points and 518 total yards per game. But Walker said simply, "Their defense is good enough to play well."

The Aggie defense will be forced to make adjustments as UNM switches back and forth between quarterbacks, he said, but the two-quarterback strategy is not necessarily an advantage for the Lobos, he said.

"Switching back and forth makes the defense have to adjust, but on the other hand they (UNM) may not have the kind of continuity they would like," he said.

UNM's B.J. Holbrook engineered the Lobos' second-half comeback against Sam Houston

State last week, completing 19-of-30 passes for 289 yards and two touchdowns. Sophomore quarterback Tarean Austin, who has started all four games for the Lobos this year, is averaging 168 passing yards per game.

Freshman receiver Deon Long has been a favorite target for the Lobos. Long has amassed 636 all-purpose yards in just the last two games. Wide receiver Ty Kirk had 13 catches for 127 yards last week.

However, the Aggies are coming off one of their best offensive performances of the year. Senior quarterback Matt Christian threw for a career-high 238 yards on 17-of-28 passing in the 34-24 loss at San Jose State last week.

"Matt played well enough for us to win," Walker said.

In addition, Kenny Turner, who has taken over at running back after an injury to Robert Clay, rushed for 129 yards on 17 carries last week. Turner will start at running back this week, Walker said. Wide receiver Taveon Rogers caught five passes for 120 yards against SJSU and is ranked second in the WAC and 13th in the nation with 170.2 average all-purpose yards per game.

Walker said the Aggies will be without middle linebacker Alexander LaVoy, who has possibly broken his foot and will be out for at least three to four weeks. Boyblue Aoelua will start at middle linebacker, with Bryan Bonilla at strong-side linebacker and B.J. Adolpho at weak-side. Dylan Davis will be the backup, he

Saturday's game will be the 103rd meeting between the two rivals.

#### Men's golf ninth at Iowa tournament

The New Mexico State University men's golf team placed ninth out of 15 teams at the 2011 Golfweek Conference Challenge at the 7,360yard, par-72 Spirit Hollow Golf Course in Burlington, Iowa, finishing at 26-over par. NMSU carded its best round of the tournament with a team score of 5-over-par 293 on the final day.

Junior Justin Shin had a monster day on the links with a 4-under-par 68, finishing third overall as an individual with a three-round score of 4-under-par 212. Shin recorded four birdies and an eagle in the final round with just two

Senior Gaston De La Torre shot his third straight round of even par golf with a 72 in round three. De La Torre finished the tournament tied for eighth overall with a threeround score of 216. He tallied four birdies in the final round.

Freshman Cosme Beamonte had his best round of the tournament with a 3-over-par 75 in round three. Beamonte tied for 61st overall with a three-round score of 16-over-par 232. He recorded two birdies for the day. Senior

Zachery Fullerton finished 60th overall with a threeround score of 15-over-par 231. In his final round, Fullerton shot a 6-over-par 78 with three birdies.

Junior Derek Baade struggled in the final round with a 9-over-par 81. Baade finished 26-over-par 242 and tied for 73rd overall.

Arkansas took the team title with a 5-under par, followed by Chattanooga (+2), Oklahoma State (+3), New Mexico (+11) and California (+14). Chattanooga's Stephan Jaeger earned the individual title with a three-round score of 7-under par.

The Aggies will be back in action at the William H. Tucker Intercollegiate Sept. 30-Oct.1 in Albuquerque.





## Want to slay your demons?

### Get rid of troubling habits – let 'em go

When we learn to swim, we learn to let go of the float. When we launch our children into the real world of life, we have to let go of them. It's hard, but there's no other way.

Growth, progress and change are difficult things, and require that we give up something in return for gaining something better. Personal growth and healing often involve some form of letting go.

So it is with golf. To get better at golf, we have to give up some old habits. If you want to become the wonderfully competent golfer you really are deep down inside, it may mean you will need to put aside certain thoughts, attitudes and behaviors that are no longer serving you well.

Here are some suggestions for things to let go of.

Let go of fear. What are you really afraid of, anyway? Looking foolish? Being seen as a loser? Or someone who chokes? Get in touch with yourself, and identify boldly what your inner fears really are. Then choose to let them evaporate.

Remember, a person with true courage is not someone who is fearless. It is someone who acts correctly, resolutely and decisively in the face of fear. It's like going into battle with the feeling that you need to do this regardless of the consequences.

I've talked with numerous World War II survivors of bloody Omaha Beach at Normandy and they all say the same thing: "Blast it anyway, and go ahead and do it no matter what."

I suppose the golf swing equivalent of this letting-go concept is the "release," where you allow your wrists to unhinge and your hands to roll over to create a snap of power at impact. Even if you're afraid, do it anyway.

Let go of bad shots, bad holes and bad rounds. Don't carry the misfortunes and the mis-hits around with you. It's OK to experience regret and remorse for an instant, but then erase it and go on. Let go of the tragedy, but keep the lesson.

Golf is a question of how good your misses are, and all shots are misses to some extent. When we play golf we automatically expose ourselves to mistakes – a lot of them. Don't be a silly perfectionist. Your main task is not to make perfect shots; it is to minimize your mistakes. That's how a U.S. Open is won. That will be how your personal "major" will be won – the fewest mistakes for 72 holes.

Let go of tension. Mental tension – nervousness and anxiety – leads to bodily tension. Just about the biggest enemy of a good swing is nervous tension. Be positive. Be relaxed. Breathe freely. Feel the joy in the game, rather than feel you have to do a certain thing.

Golf really is "flow," where there is movement and fluidity and a wholeness, playing outdoors over 18 holes that take up roughly 200 acres of land. Keep it simple, like pro golfer Lon Hinkle once said: "Golf is golf. You hit the ball, you go find it. Then you hit it again." It's a game we play.

Let go of bad habits. This is personal. One person's bad

Let go of bad habits. This is personal. One person's bad habit might be showing up at the golf course late, without any time to warm up, while another's might be drinking too much while playing. Let go of the things that don't work for you. Replace your old bad habits with good ones.

Be willing to do things differently, mindfully. Let's say you have a bad habit of rushing a short putt when there's some pressure (read: \$). Make it a point to slow things down. Mark the ball. Go tie your shoe, or do something. Then line it up

carefully. Go through your normal routine deliberately, and then make the putt. Just like the pros, who do it for a living.

Keep in mind, the gist of Steven Covey's Seven Habits of Highly Successful People is that achievers typically have numerous habits that work for them instead of habits that work against them.

Let go of your demons. "Jinx." "Choke." "Pressure." "Demons." These are all bad words. Each represents bad karma. Some would say that there is no such thing as mental "pressure." "Can you touch it?" they would challenge. "Can you measure it?" they would argue.

To me, that's like saying there's no such thing as depression, since you can't put it under a microscope and look at it. Know anybody who is depressed? It's real. From someone (me) who has played competitive

sports for more than 60 years, I can tell you that pressure, and the feeling it produces, is real.

As a sport shrink, I have watched grown men and women sob

As a sport shrink, I have watched grown men and women sob as they sit on my couch and talk about choking under pressure. I can tell you that every player has his or her demons to conquer.

Unless you try – really try – to become excellent in your endeavor, whether it's golf, selling or playing the violin, you probably have not had to deal with the demons. You have to have an intense desire to succeed and win. Insatiable drive is what spawns demons and the desire to let them go. The need to achieve and to rise above.

Slackers probably don't have to deal with demons. The demons don't care much about underachievers, those ne'er-do-wells who don't bother living life with passion and purpose. There's the irony. If you lay your soul on the line, in whatever you do, you subject yourself to failure. Whether it's failure by being beaten, or failure by bad luck, of failure by choking, it still hurts badly. Like depression. Let it go.

For golfers, their demons lie deeply buried in their innerpsyche, a perfect example might be a tendency to miss a short putt when a lot is on the line. The "four-footer demon" may stay asleep for an entire round – maybe two rounds – and then the ugly, obnoxious creature can be startled awake like a mad dog while you're standing over a virtual gimmie on the 18th green. When that nasty, slimy demon calls to you from deep within the

brain stem, "better not miss this one," a low-level panic attack sets in. Great players, amateurs and hacks have felt the voice. Near the end of his tournament career the legendary Sam Snead said the yips and fear of choking got so bad he could barely take the putter back. All we can do is let the demons go.

Let go of doubt. If you doubt that you can play your best when you step onto the golf course, it is unlikely that you will play your best. If you doubt that you can win, it makes winning much harder. Doubting yourself is born of insecurity and not trusting

Doubting yourself is born of insecurity and not trusting yourself. Being delusional is thinking you can hit the miracle shot. Be positive, but not out of touch with reality. Practice with discipline, know your game, and trust yourself to play your game solidly. That's all you can do.

The guru of mental toughness, Dr. Jim Loehr, tells us that emotions always follow thinking, not the other way around. If you start thinking of the awful consequences of screwing up, Loehr says, you may quickly be an emotional noodle. Let go of the negative emotions and start practicing sticking to positive thinking, especially as the pressure rises. Let go of thoughts like "What if I miss," and quietly self-affirm with "I'll make this." Positive performance is likely to follow.



# Perseverance pays of

#### Ziegler comes back from injury

A year ago New Mexico State volleyball player Stephanie Ziegler was a couple weeks into rehab from a broken leg suffered while playing in a match against Rice University at a tournament

in Baton Rouge, La. It was such a severe injury, it would have been conceivable that Ziegler's career might have been over. But that was never an option for the Tucson, Ariz. native who has willed her way back into the starting lineup 12 months later.

"From a mental standpoint, I had no idea what I did at the time," Ziegler said about laying under the net in the Pete Maravich Center that fateful afternoon. "I didn't even know it was possible to do what I did."

At the time, the sophomore was coming into her own as a passer and attacker in the starting line up. The match was stopped for several minutes and Ziegler was carted off on a stretcher. The crowd and her teammates knew her season was done. No one would have blamed her if she'd have called it a career, but that isn't the way Ziegler thinks.

She put a ton of work into her rehab and was really motivated to get healthy and get back on the court," NMSU volleyball coach Mike Jordan said. "I was proud of her effort in rehab. There isn't a lazy bone in her body. I think she loves volleyball and it showed in her rehab."

Granted a medical redshirt, Ziegler is back in the starting lineup again. This season she has had to learn to use her body differently following the devastating injury, just like she has had to learn to mix up her shot selection.

"I'm learning to use the tip more effectively and I'm learning to see the court in a different way," she said. "I'm working on being a smarter player."

Last Saturday night, Ziegler totaled 10 kills in the sweep of Louisiana Tech, boosting the Aggies' record to 11-4 overall and 1-0 in the Western Athletic Conference.


"I really liked the match last Saturday," Ziegler said. "Every thing was clicking for me. I really focused in on my passing. If I concentrate on passing first, everything else follows

Ziegler is also learning off the court as an industrial engineering major and as a representative from New Mexico State on the WAC Student Athlete Advisory Committee. The WAC SAAC provides recommendations and positions on specific conference and NCAA proposed legislation and it addresses national issues that may have an effect on the well-being of student athletes.

"I love being a part of the WAC SAAC," Ziegler said. "We went

to the conference this summer and talked to student athletes from other WAC schools and exchanged ideas.

"One of the things we do at NMSU that is different from other WAC schools is community service. We're the only school to enforce the 15 hours of community service and our teams work to-

gether. Other schools are more relaxed with community service"

Ziegler has already accomplished a lot in her Aggie career. Coming back from a broken leg and being the NMSU female representative on the WAC SAAC are two of the biggest things to hang her sombrero on. But there is one thing she would love to

learn before she leaves NMSU – what the postseason feels like. "I haven't seen the NCAA Tournament yet," Ziegler said. "I want to get into that and do well."

# A birthday ... and a farewell

#### Hundreds honor Bishop Ramirez as he turns 75, faces retirement

The annual birthday charity event for Most Rev. Ricardo Ramirez, bishop of Las Cruces, became an occasion for nearly 400 people to say a fond farewell to the man one speaker called "our first bishop, our best bishop."

The event, held at the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum Friday, Sept. 23, raised \$19,179 for the bishop's discretionary charitable fund. But what was most noteworthy were the series of warm, personal remarks made by several well-known Las Crucens in honor of the bishop, who celebrated his 75th birthday Sept. 12 and in keeping with Catholic canon law submitted his resignation as bishop that day.

Ramirez will continue serving as bishop until his successor is named.

J. Paul Taylor, the longtime political statesman and educator from Mesilla, called the bishop "beloved" for "your kindness and service to

You have been an inspiration to

all of us," Taylor said.

Writer Denise Chavez told both humorous stories of meals shared with the bishop and inspiring stories of the bishop's deep caring for migrant field workers and the poor.

Bishop Ricardo Ramirez," she said. "This is your day." The crowd, which included the Most. Rev. Armando X. Ochoa, bishop of El Paso, gave Ramirez a standing ovation.

In his closing remarks, Ramirez said, "This is my home, you are my people," and said he wanted to continue to be involved in the education of young people, serving as "some kind of positive influence.

In an interview with the Bulletin, the bishop said he hoped people will remember him as one who handed on the faith.

'A bishop's life is very unique," he said. "It's a heavy burden, but there are also many blessed memories that I will treasure for the rest of my life."

- The Mesilla Valley Fair was taking place Sept. 28-30. "Three days to enjoy the biggest little city in the Southwest," a large advertisement in the Rio Grande Republican said. The El Paso Chamber of Commerce commissioned a special train to bring visitors from the Texas city. The fare for a round trip was \$1.60. Prizes were awarded on Thursday, Friday was El Paso Day, with a big barbecue scheduled and Saturday would be devoted to the upper valley.
- Dr. C.T. Ray, an osteopathic physician, announced his location to Las Cruces, with treatment rooms in the Campbell House.

#### 75yearsago

#### 1936

• More than 500 people attended the dedication of Quesenberry Athletic Field at the state college. Dean Hugh Milton presided as master of ceremonies. Gov. Clyde Tingley was expected to speak but was called away by the death of his mother. The field was named in honor of Joe Quesenberry, the first soldier from Doña Ana County to die in battle during the "Great War." Quesenberry's parents were guests of honor.

- The Aggie football team defeated Panhandle Okla. 58-6 and were preparing to play Adams State Teachers College from Alamosa, Colo.
- Work was set to begin on a new wing of the engineering complex at the state college. The new wing was expected to cost \$41,000.

#### 50yearsago

#### 1961

- The New Mexico State Aggies' 16-game winning streak came to an end at the University of New Mexico with a 41-7 defeat by the Lobos. Next up for the Aggies was McMurry College at Aggie Memorial Stadium. The Aggies defeated McMurry in 1960 47-17 but had been behind at halftime.
- Las Cruces High School dropped a close game to El Paso Austin High School and were set to host Albuquerque Highlands.
- Garnett Burks won top honors at a meeting of the Toastmasters Club at the Cork N Bottle Restaurant. Burk's winning speech was "Where We Getting the Brain Storm."
- Cotton harvest was running a week behind schedule due to the fact that cotton was late. The harvest was not expected to get fully under way until the end of the month.



World's Largest Piñata" in addition to "the World's Largest Enchilada." Mr. Whole Enchilada was 27 feet tall and designed to look like a face. The piñata was 20 feet wide and made of chicken wire and rebar sprayed with foam and then painted.

• Mesilla Valley VFW Post 6917 was a casualty in a water war between the City of Las Cruces and Moongate Water Company. Moongate had obtained a certificate of service from the New Mexico Public Service Commission after the commission determined the post was not located in any water company's service area. Later, however, when Las Cruces annexed the area, the city demanded independent water companies enter into a franchise agreement with the municipality. Lou Gariano, owner of Moongate Water Co., said the franchise

fee of 2 percent of the company's gross was "a tax on top of a tax," and refused to charge his customers in the city more for water. He also said the city had not responded to his attorney's letters on the issue. The city and the independent water companies were also at loggerheads over the city's requirement that water lines be capable of supplying 500 gallons per minute to fire hydrants, which none of the independent water companies lines on the East Mesa could meet. Meanwhile the VFW was continuing to meet at the Moongate Fire Station on Moongate Road and at least one family in the effected area was forced to haul water.





#### **Block resigns from PRC**

Attorney General Gary King said Public Regulation Commissioner Jerome Block Jr. has agreed to resign and plead guilty to multiple felonies involving two separate cases.

"Another important step was taken today in the prosecution of government corruption in New Mexico," King said. "I congratulate my Government Accountability Division staffers for their good work and dedication in pursuing this matter."

The PRC Commissioner agreed to plead guilty to two separate embezzlement charges; fraudulent use of a credit card; theft of identity; violation of the state Election Code, Campaign Reporting Act and Voter Action Act; and conspiracy to commit violation of the Election Code.

Block has also agreed never to seek public office again and to repay the state for all improper charges involving state gasoline charge cards. The attorney general said the state can likely save a million dollars in expected costs for impeachment proceedings in the Legislature.

A sentencing agreement requires the defendant to successfully complete a drug court program and meet other requirements before final sentencing by the court.

### NMSU ROTC to see off Honor Flight

More than 50 World War II veterans from southern New Mexico will visit the WWII memorial in Washington, D.C., when the New Mexico State University Army and Air Force ROTC ceremoniously sends them off at 5:30 a.m. Wednesday, Oct. 5, from the north side of the Pan American Center parking lot.

"The people on the Honor Flight, they've served their country, and some haven't seen the memorial before, so it's an honor for them to go see the monument," said Lt. Col. Daniel Bennett, AFROTC commander. "It'll mean a lot to the cadets to see just what kind of heritage they're getting into."



### Powerball ticket won by longtime city spokesman

Udell Vigil, a longtime spokesman for the City of Las Cruces, is the winner of a \$200,000 Powerball prize.

Vigil's quick-pick ticket for the game's Sept. 24 drawing matched the winning white ball numbers of 3, 4, 12, 27 and 44. He missed the red Powerball of 26, which would have snagged the night's jackpot of \$30 million.

Vigil, who admits to buying tickets only to squirrel them away, had to be reminded twice to check the ticket for prizes.

"The girl who sold me the ticket offered to check it for me, but I couldn't remember where I left it," Vigil told lottery officials in Albuquerque Tuesday, Sept. 27.

Sunday evening, his family mentioned the ticket and helped him find the missing wager under a plate on the kitchen table. At the lottery's website, Vigil discovered his ticket was worth \$200,000.

"It was hard to sleep that night," he said.

Vigil, who said his prize is bound for the bank, said he plays lottery games because ticket sales fund college scholarships. His two sons received Legislative Lottery Scholarships to attend New Mexico State University. One son has graduated with a degree in fine arts while the other son is still a student studying criminal justice.

Vigil is the City of Las Cruces director of communication and is a former TV news anchor, reporter and news executive at television stations in Albuquerque and El Paso. Vigil also acts and has played small parts in movies made in New Mexico.

Vigil holds a bachelor's degree in journalism and mass communications from New Mexico State University.

The winner bought his lucky ticket at Pic Quik No. 72, located at 4675 Sonoma Ranch Blvd. The store has sold five other large prize-winning tickets paying between \$1,000 and \$5,000.

Other recent winners from Las Cruces include Ross Schafer, who won \$30,000 playing scratchers, and Mike Caro, who won a \$10,000 Hot Lotto prize. Bernarda Perez from Doña Ana won a \$30,000 scratcher prize.

Since 1996, the New Mexico Lottery has raised \$493.9 million for education and more than 68,000 students have attended college on Legislative Lottery Scholarships. As of the spring 2010 semester, 7,540 students from Doña Ana County have received \$38.5 million in Legislative Lottery Scholarships. ### **Home homicide**

Doña Ana County Sheriff investigators believe the fire was set to destroy evidence and that it did not contrib-




ute to Hadley's death. The cause of Hadley's death is yet to be determined, but there was sufficient evidence for the investigation to proceed as a homicide.

### Tashiro closed for season

### Football fans urged to use other routes

Las Cruces Public Schools is working with the Las Cruces Police Department to assist with traffic to and from football games and other athletic and fine arts events at the LCPS Field of Dreams (FOD) Activities Complex during the partial closure of Tashiro Road. The twolane street, one of two primary roads to the athletic fields, will be closed and will remain inaccessible for at least three months.

Tashiro Road, south of the Field of Dreams, connects Valley Drive and Motel Boulevard. The portion of Tashiro Road that will be closed runs from Valley Drive to the east gate of the FOD, as the New Mexico Department of Transportation continues construction on Valley Drive.

"We anticipate that the closure will impact high school football games at the FOD beginning with the Friday, Sept. 30, game between Las Cruces High School and Artesia High School," said LCPS Athletic Director Ernest Viramontes. "Spectators will have to use the alternate route throughout the remainder of the football season and during any playoff games held at the complex in November and early December – as well as soccer games, marching band events and other activities at the FOD through the end of the calendar year."

One of the most critical times for traffic at the FOD will be shortly before the end of all football games. Viramontes said the Motel Boulevard traffic will not be allowed to turn onto Tashiro Road, because, beginning approximately four minutes before the end of each football game, both Tashiro lanes will be used for westbound traffic as spectators exit FOD parking lots. (This will be the practice only for football games and does not apply to other events at the FOD.)

Athletes participating in games at the FOD will also be directed by police to continue down Motel Boulevard to the northwest corner of the stadium for drop-off and pick-up.

Drivers who are picking up students or spectators at the end of the game will be directed to continue north on Motel Boulevard, past Tashiro Road, where they can pick up passengers and then make a U-turn on Motel Boulevard to exit back toward Picacho Avenue.

Viramontes said the district is working closely with city police on the deployment of additional traffic control officers to ensure the fastest and easiest possible entry into and exit from the football and soccer field parking lots.

"We want everyone to be aware of the steps we are taking, including the deployment of additional officers around FOD before, during and after games and the placement of signage to help direct traffic," Viramontes said.

"We are advising people to leave home about 30 minutes earlier than they normally would to attend events at either the football or soccer fields while the closure continues," said Viramontes. "With the cooperation of the police department and the public, we will make this temporary closure as painless as possible for everyone involved."

"For at least 90 days, the Valley Drive-Tashiro Road intersection will be closed to traffic, so the only access to the football and soccer fields will be from Motel Boulevard," said Dane Kennon, LCPS associate superintendent for operations. "The school district has a number of events planned during this time frame, so cooperation by motorists will be important."

### Road work also changing **University Hills drop offs**

A temporary fence will divide the bus lane at University Hills Elementary School so that part of it can be used as a parent drop-off lane during construction work that begins at the school on Monday, Oct. 3, said Principal Judy Foster. A letter from Foster will be sent home to parents on Monday, Sept. 26, she said.

"A fence dividing our current bus lane will be in place on Oct. 3," Foster said. "That is the same date of the closing of our south parking area to be used for a staging area for construction," she said. LCPS Safety and Security Coordinator Todd Gregory said he will monitor traffic flow during student pickup and dropoff during the first few days of construction to make sure it is proceeding smoothly.

The \$4 million project will include the renovation of older classrooms and the construction of a new wing with four new classrooms and restrooms. The school parking lot will also be upgraded. University Hills Elementary, 2005 S. Locust St., was built in 1965.

"This project will be done in two phases," said LCPS Construction Projects Manager Gloria Martinez. "Phase I will be to build the new classroom wing and should be complete by May 2012 (including the re-opening of the school's parent drop-off lane). Phase II, which consists of the renovations, will start next summer and should be complete by October



# The truth about food

Agriculture is a common topic in the Mesilla Valley, but the conversation typically revolves around crop yields, drought conditions or the labor force.

What about the New Mexico State University Board of Regents? Did you know this board of five serves as ambassadors of agriculture for New Mexico?

The Secretary of Agriculture, appointed by NMSU's regents and approved by the governor, is under the executive branch.

governor, is under the executive branch.

"The governor, plus NMSU's board of regents, are the New Mexico statewide board of agriculture," said Jeff Witte, secretary board of agriculture. "I hope that hits home and they realize the responsibility they have."

Though NMSU's regents may be aware of this reality, Witte said some Americans are clueless about the truth of food.

food.

"The good news for farmers is everyone has to eat," Witte said. "There is no
alternative."

But do Americans take for granted how easy it is to eat?

Food is too easy to access, Witte said. By the year 2050, farmers will need to produce 100 percent more food. Currently, every farmer produces enough food for 134 people. By 2050, farmers will need to produce for as many as 500 people.

As the market becomes more global, Americans might see more food coming from foreign companies, but according to Thomson Reuters, a leading source of intelligent information for businesses and professionals, people aren't too worried about the source.

More than 57 percent of Americans said they were concerned with food safety, a 15 percent decline from last year.

On the same survey, meat (which is mostly raised in the U.S.) generated more concern than any other type of food at 44.1 percent, followed by fresh produce at 30.2 percent, seafood at 20.1 percent and dairy products at 5.5 percent.

"Look on seafood packages, they say 'From China,' or in Indonesia or Vietnam," Witte said.

The day before my 22nd birthday, I came down with food poisoning — worst experience of my life. And it was from lettuce. I feel better about my meat because it is cooked, but those fresh veggies straight from the crop? Please wash your greens. Email me at samantha@lascrucesbulletin.com.

# Sapphire continues on with expansion

You have to see it to believe it.

The research on algae biofuel at Sapphire Energy could change the world, literally. Research and development measures at the compound could lead to replacing millions of gallons of transportation fuel a year with pond scum.

Currently, New Mexico is a leader in the world in terms of algae-based production because of its environmental conditions.

"Algae likes the hot weather and lots of sunshine," said Tim Zenk, vice president of corporate affairs for Sapphire Energy. "It even likes the slightly cooler temperatures during a New Mexico winter."

"Algae also likes brac water," said Denise Gitsham, Sapphire's director of corporate affairs and legislative council. "Southern New Mexico has an abundance of salty water perfect for algae growth. And we are only using land that can't be used for other purposes. We are not competing for drinking water or agricultural land.

"We are creating the first above-ground renewable oil field."

These reasons have led Sapphire Energy to name Las Cruces as its research and development facility, a component that will remain when the Columbus, N.M., site, which is currently under construction, is completed.

Sapphire Energy started in 2007. The company has 155 employees across three facilities and more than 50 employees in Las Cruces.

"Sapphire purchased 10 acres at market value and promised to invest \$6 million and create 30 jobs in three years," said Christine Logan, economic development administrator for the City of Las Cruces. "In exchange, the city made 90 acres available at no cost. Sapphire surpassed their (promise) short of a year and a half."

Las Cruces serves as a testing and development center, operating plot farms. The area is small in comparison to commercialization of the algae product and what will be done in Columbus but large by world standards, Zenk said.

"We understand the business principles to make commercialized algae biofuel successful,"

On Tuesday, Sept. 27, the first day of a four-day job fair, more than 800 hopeful Las Crucens stood in a single-file line for the chance to schedule an interview with Pro's Ranch Markets, Las Cruces' newest soon-to-open grocery

Pro's Ranch, which is scheduled to open in the coming months, sees 2,000 to 3,000 people at each of their job fairs, said Tina Huff, human resources director for the Californiabased grocer.

"We have seen a lot more over the last few years," Huff said.

Las Crucen Melissa Mendoza, who didn't see a Pro's Ranch employee until 9:45 a.m., said she joined the line at 8:15 a.m.

"I knew there would be a lot of people, but I did not expect this many," Mendoza said.

At Sapphire, algae is shipped in and placed in Petri dishes (1), which are then transported to flasks and then to "carboys" (2). This process is considered the "nursery of algae." After research and testing as been performed, algae strains are moved outside to small ponds (3) and then to Oswald ponds or runway ponds (4). From an Oswald pond or large pond (5), which is what the Columbus, N.M., facility will contain, the extraction process begins at a daft system (6), which removes about 95 percent of the water from the substance, sending a 5-percent solid to the extraction facility (7). At the extraction facility, the algae is mixed with a hexane solvent that sends the oil to the surface.

Zenk said. "We know we have to be concerned about crop protection, (fuel) extraction and crop yield as well as the biology and engineering behind the process.

"Historically, 99 percent of crude oil has come from diatoms and algae. If Mother Nature can do this naturally, then so can we in petri dishes. And then take that to small ponds, to large ponds and to commercialization."

Currently, the Las Cruces facility is operating at four different levels - petri dishes, small ponds, runway ponds and large ponds. The Columbus facility will have more large ponds connected back to back.

"Our (final) goal is to produce 5,000 gallons of oil per acre per year," said Bryn Davis, New Mexico operations manager.

Once the biofuel is capable of being produced on a large scale, Zenk said Sapphire's initial target client will be the U.S. Department of Defense

The DOD has led the way for every energy change," Zenk said. "There is strategic planning going on right now for the next (energy) transition.

"There will be an opportunity to be at the forefront of this technology, and a big proposal will soon be released by the U.S. Navy asking for largescale efforts to supply biofules. The Navy is going to look at communities with the technol-

ogy and the community support. They don't want to push a technology on a community that doesn't want it. Therefore, it is very important for the Las Cruces community and southern New Mexico to rally around our efforts and see the benefits for all sectors.

Zenk said the request for information was due at the end of September.

"The (request for proposal) will be released around the beginning of next year," he said.

The Columbus site is expected to open by the

spring or summer of 2012 with 100 acres and will spread over 300 acres upon final completion

in 2015. Columbus is expected to produce 100 million gallons of diesel fuel per year.

At phase three, the Columbus site will be a demonstration facility that Sapphire hopes to use as an example, attracting investors.

"At that scale, the site will demonstrate operations for a larger facility," Davis said.

Davis said there is little time to talk about algae because developments are happening so

"We are competing with other nations," he said. "When we broke ground in Las Cruces, I was already shopping for the land in Columbus. We have to think about the next step because there is not a lot of time."

"China's No. 1 objective is to develop a new source of energy," Zenk said. "It is us versus them. We can fight over energy or develop a new source. It is the only hope for our military.'

New Mexico State University also has a large role to play in Sapphire's success.

"Our goal is to create a center of excellence with advanced biofuels," said City Councillor Nathan Small.

Currently, more than \$15 million has been invested into the Las Cruces community, and Sapphire Energy has hired more than 50 people – many NMSU and Doña Ana Community College graduates – for the Las Cruces facility.

Spin-off business will also be created through growth of Sapphire and commercialization of the algae biofuel.

"We use a large amount of CO2," Zenk said. "To produce one gallon of algae fuel, we use about 20 to 25 pounds of CO2.

Finding a consistent source of carbon dioxide is crucial. The pipeline in Lea County is very valuable to us. I can also see a business in managing

Gitsham said she expects to see more graduates of NMSU and DACC staying in southern New Mexico as a result of the work at Sapphire.

"We are still at the dawn of the algae business," Zenk said. "The biology is only four years old, and there is still a lot more ahead of us. If someone told you they knew everything about algae biology, they are probably lying."

At the end of the process, Huff said the company plans to hire a mix of 300 full- and part-time workers.

"These jobs range from entry-level positions to skilled labor, and the salary really ranges based on the position," Huff said.

### Incentives may be key to education reform

Poorly designed incentives can be worse than no reform

Incentives motivate behavior. Reward a behavior, and you will get more of it.

Of course, this is nothing more than any businessperson will tell you. This is the logic that underlies the common suggestion that teachers be compensated based on student achievement. But providing the correct incentives that motivates desired behavior is critical. Poorly designed incentive can do more harm than good.

The best evidence indicates the single most important factor in a student's success is the teacher, but also very important is the school and the principal. Indeed, the best results are achieved when the teachers in a building work together as a team. Good teachers do best in a supportive environment.

Incentives that emphasize the performance of individual teachers too much can undermine team effort. If success depends only on individual efforts, then there is little incentive to help colleagues succeed. Yet a strong team benefits

students most. The New Mexico Teacher Effectiveness Task Force has developed a set of recommendations on teacher compensation, a version of which Gov. Susana Martinez is expected to propose to the legislature in January 2012.

The task force has suggested teachers who teach grades or subjects that are currently tested, 50 percent of their evaluation be based on the test scores of the students of the individual teacher. The recommendation puts no weight on teamwork, despite the proven importance of overall building performance on educational outcomes.

The task force also made recommendations on how to reward teachers who aren't assigned to grades or subjects currently tested. This second group of teachers would be rewarded, in part, on the overall performance of the building. Adapting that standard for all teachers would be an improvement.

Stan Rounds, superintendent of Las Cruces Public Schools, has proposed an alternative, which would focus rewards on school success, not on individual teachers. He would give a cash bonus to teachers in schools that achieve exceptional progress toward meeting educational goals. Teachers at poor performing schools would receive no bonus. Schools that back slide would lose their bonuses. Rounds thinks a bonus as small as \$1,500 per year would be sufficient for motivation.

Improving educational outcomes is a critical issue for our children. A teacher who can improve student achievement by one and a half years in a year can increase the lifetime earnings of a class of 25 students by \$300,000 to \$400,000, according to one study. That is a huge return to a modest improvement in performance.

An estimated 330,000 students attend school each day in New Mexico. Coming up with the right incentives that motivate teachers to provide the best education to our students is critical. Reforms focus on teamwork and building performance are what is needed.



Juan Morales, owner of Santa Fe Grill, was born in Mexico, but his family settled in the Mesilla Valley in the late '70s.

"I was drawn in to the busy environment," Morales said. "A lot of people were in and out of the restaurant. It was the hottest ticket in

> Morales said he took pride in the restaurant's unique menu – such as its most popular item Filet Marco Pollo created by his brother Chef Carlucci, who is the current master chef of Santa Fe Grill.

"We created a fine baseball teams. I support dining establishment that had fast food," Morales said. "That is what we still try to do at Santa Fe Grill."

It was the late '80s, and Morales said he was young and eager to please, so he started

looking for his next business venture.

In 1997, Santa Fe Restaurant transitioned into Santa Fe Grill and the first grill opened inside of a Pic Quik.

"It was a two-man operation," Morales said referring to himself and Bannister.

The first year, the duo opened three locations.

"In January 2006, Scott gave me the golden spatula," said Morales, adding that he bought out Bannister and took over operations of the company.

Today, Santa Fe Grill has 11 locations in Las Cruces and one in Hatch all located in Pic Quik, what Morales calls "the perfect marriage."

"I order more than 1 million pounds of ingredients a year," Morales said.

But Morales' hobbies and career are also a good fit. The Las Crucen said in his spare time he likes cooking good food on the grill at a New Mexico State University tailgate.

"I cheer on the Aggies and the high school football and baseball teams," he said. "I support the youth athletics because they are the ones who buy my burritos.

"My family is also very close and we stay in touch with barbecues or watching football



## National media overstates down payment requirements

Las Crucens can still buy with little or nothing down



When George and Tanya Young heard on the evening network news lenders are now requiring down payments of at least 20 percent, they thought they'd have to postpone their Las Cruces area home purchase for at least five years – the time they thought it would take for them to save up the down payment. Their logic was seriously flawed because it was based on information that was more national in nature than it was local.

According to First American CoreLogic's Quarterly Core Mortgage Risk Monitor's Q2 2011 report, Doña Ana County is considered a low-risk area when it comes to future mortgage defaults. A low-risk rating translates to increased loan activity and lower interest rates for states and counties that carry the ranking.

So, just how available and inexpensive is mortgage money for Las Cruces area homebuyers?

"Very," according to Shelly Sanders, assistant vice president of mortgage loans at First American Bank in Las Cruces. Sanders points out the latest trend in mortgage lending is to curtail making mortgages to people who can't afford them and, instead, make the mortgage money available to those who can fully qualify for the loans. As a result, mortgages requiring little or nothing down are still available to creditworthy Las Cruces area homebuyers, they're just a little harder to obtain. Here are a few basic examples of locally available loan products:

FHA loans. 30-year fixed-rate FHA loans with mortgage interest rates in the mid-4 percent range are readily available to qualified borrowers in the Las Cruces area, subject only to the maximum loan limits set by HUD. In Doña Ana County, the maximum mortgage amount of a conforming FHA loan is \$271,050. Larger loans are available, but with

different terms and costs. Conforming FHA loans can be obtained with as little as 3.5 percent down, and down payment funds can be a gifted to the buyer by the buyer's family, employer or a qualified nonprofit.

Sellers may opt to pay the buyer's closing costs, making it possible for a buyer to purchase without using any of their own funds. In addition to making a principal and interest payment each month, FHA buyers also pay a mortgage insurance premium to cover the cost of FHA insuring the lender against a default by the borrower.

VA loans. 30-year fixedrate VA loans priced in the 4 percent range are available to all qualified Armed Forces and National Guard veterans and in some cases their spouses. While there is no maximum loan amount associated with VA financing in Doña Ana County, veterans who purchase a home for \$417,000 or less can purchase with no down payment required. Above \$417,000 a down payment of 25 percent of the amount over \$417,000 is needed to meet VA loan rules. VA loans are also assumable by

veterans and non-veterans alike, which could prove valuable if mortgage rates at the time the veteran sells his or her home are higher than the mortgage rate on the assumable loan.

Sellers are allowed to pay the veteran buyer's closing costs, making the zero-down purchase a true reality. VA borrowers pay a one-time "funding fee" at the time the loan originated, which is normally rolled into their loan. The fee is placed in a fund that backs VA's guarantee to our nation's lenders that it will buy-back the house from the lender in the event of a default by the buyer.

Conventional loans. 100 percent loanto-value, 97 percent loan-to-value, and 95

percent loan-to-value 30-year fixed rate Conventional loans are readily available in the high 3 percent to low 4 percent range to creditworthy Las Cruces area buyers, but they are more costly to obtain and service than government-backed loans. Conventional loans with less than 20 percent down must be insured against the buyer defaulting and/ or walking away from the loan – which can easily add the equivalent of 1.0 percent to 1.5 percent annually to the mid-five-percent cost of the mortgage itself.

Gift funds are allowed with conventional loans, but rules governing their use are more complicated than those of their government siblings. Sellers are still allowed to pay the buyer's closing costs, however, so the buyer's cash investment can usually be held to the amount of the minimum required

MFA first-time buyer programs. MFA is an acronym for the New Mexico Mortgage Finance Authority. MFA provides subsidies and downpayment assistance to so-called First-time Buyers and others who qualify under their program guidelines. I say so called, because firsttime buyers are defined as persons who have not lived in a home that they have owned during the past three years. One could have owned six homes during the past three years and still be

considered a first-time buyer as long as he or she didn't live in any of them.

Programs such as those offered by MFA are to mortgage loans what ski racks are to automobiles. In the case of the MFA programs, the automobiles (typically, FHA, VA and Conventional loans) already exist in great numbers. The First-time Buyer programs (aka the ski racks) can be mixed and matched before being strapped to the roof of one of the automobiles. MFA even has a special ski rack for active duty military, making it possible for them to obtain first-time buyer benefits even though they may currently own a home.

The end result is that FHA, VA and Conventional borrowers who meet MFA program guidelines may be eligible to purchase at below-market rates with subsidies that result in the buyer obtaining a 30-year fixed loan with little or no money down. MFA is not a direct lender, however, so all inquires for this type of financing should be made through local MFA approved lending institutions.

USDA rural development loans. USDA is an acronym for the U.S. Department of Agriculture. USDA makes 100 percent loans in rural areas where lending guidelines make it difficult for out-of-area properties to qualify for normal mortgage loans. For the most part, properties in the areas of Doña Ana County that lie north of Radium Springs in the north valley, and south of Salopek Road in the south valley, are eligible for USDA loans. These loans are very attractive because they require no down payment and can be amortized for

Keep in mind that it pays to shop around before obtaining a mortgage. Mortgage lenders are like shoe stores because they're both retailers. Just as the various shoe stores carry hundreds of different shoe products, the various mortgage lenders carry hundreds of different loan products. And even if two shoe stores carry the same shoes, they may not offer them at the same price. One Las Cruces area lender currently requires a minimum credit score of 640 for FHA loans, while a competing lender down the street requires a minimum score of only 620 for the same exact loan.



Glenn Schwaiger of Agave Arts and his team (including a few volunteers) have been creating a real masterpiece on the surface of La Placita. This mosaic, an original design of Schwaiger, depicts the night sky to the west of the center sunburst and the desert during the day to the east. The process of creating a mosaic of this scale is pretty amazing from cutting more than 100,000 tiles in the studio, laying out the design on large mesh pieces and transporting to the site to fit these pieces into existing design and placing infill pieces that must be meticulously selected and placed to make the entire design come together. Schwaiger and the crew are working on weekend mornings, so be sure to stop by and check out the work of a true artisan.







## Reinvesting dividends key to increasing wealth

# Control part of the stock market – your number of shares

When you invest in stocks, you want their price to go up. But, of course, you can't control the rise and fall of stock prices. However, there is a key element of investing that you can control – the number of shares you own. And in the long run, share ownership may be more important than rising stock prices in determining your long-term investment success.

Of course, you might think the advice of "buy more shares" is easier said than done. After all, not everyone can easily find a lot of extra money to invest. But you don't need access to vast wealth to increase your share ownership – you just need to consistently reinvest your stock dividends.

Just how important are reinvested dividends to wealth accumulation, as compared to capital gains (the increase in stock prices)? Throughout the 135-year period from 1871 to 2003, owning stocks and reinvesting the dividends produced 97 percent of all stock market returns, with only 3 percent coming from capital gains, according to a major study done by Jeremy Siegel, one of the world's leading researchers on stock market performance. Other studies have also pointed to the importance of dividends as a component of total returns.

What are the implications of this disparity between the effectiveness of dividend reinvestment versus that of capital gains?

First of all, it suggests that you may not want to spend an undue amount of time and effort in chasing after "hot" stocks, hoping for big capital gains. For one thing, by the time you buy these stocks, they may already be cooling off, but even more importantly, your focus on achieving

large capital gains may not be the best use of your financial resources.

Ultimately, the power of dividend reinvestment means, not surprisingly, that you may be able to help yourself if you look for quality dividend-paying stocks – and then reinvest the dividends, month after month and year after year.

With just a little research, you can find stocks that have paid – and even increased – dividends for many years in a row. Keep in mind, though, that not all stocks will pay dividends, and even those that do can reduce or discontinue them at any time. Dividend reinvestment does not ensure a profit or protect against loss. So, to help boost your share ownership, consider reinvesting the dividends back into the stock, rather than taking them as cash payments.

If you do choose to reinvest your dividends, though, you will need to look to other types of investments to provide you with income, assuming you need some income from your portfolio, which may become more necessary during your retirement years. Your financial advisor can help you determine the appropriate investments to help provide this income.

But in any case, if you can do without the current income provided by dividends, give careful consideration to reinvesting them. Dividend reinvestment is not a glamorous investment strategy, and it won't help you "get rich quick," but it can help you make steady progress toward your long-term financial goals – and that's a key dividend in itself.

## **Monument nears 100 years**

Southwest dam rededicated as historic engineering project

In the annals of civil engineering, it stands as a historic monument to the ingenuity of the human race. The Elephant Butte Dam on the Rio Grande in southern New Mexico was completed in 1916 and changed a flood-prone high desert into an agricultural oasis and an economic dynamo for the entire region.

In 1977, the American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE) designated the dam as a National Historic Civil Engineering Landmark joining other iconic structures such as the Washington Monument, the Golden Gate Bridge and Hoover Dam. After the attacks on America on 9/11, the monument designating the dam was closed off to the public as part of Bureau of Reclamation security protocols on its important structures. On Sept. 22, the ASCE rededicated the relocated monument against a backdrop of its geological namesake, the flat-topped butte that resembles the front of a giant elephant rising up out of the lake.

Water and civil engineering dignitaries gathered on a site above the dam under cloudless, azure New Mexico skies to unveil the relocated monument. Adding gravitas to the event was the U.S. Commissioner of the Bureau of Reclamation Michael Connor. He noted the BOR delivers water to 31 million people in 17 western states and one in five farmers in the U.S.

"New Mexico has grown up around this facility," Connor said to the assembled water warriors and bridge builders.

He said the core mission of his agency is delivering water, providing power and taking care of the environment.

"As a New Mexican and commissioner of the Bureau of Reclamation it's a pleasure to participate in these ceremonies," Connor said.

Connor is an engineering graduate of New Mexico State University. Connor agreed that Elephant Butte Dam and its related power, water and recreation operations are a "crown jewel" in the BOR system. "Absolutely, I think you look at the historical significance and we really cut our teeth in New Mexico for some of the large engineering marvels we subsequently constructed," Connor said. "This was one of the first projects that was authorized and constructed."

Gary Esslinger, treasurer and general manager of the Elephant Butte Irrigation District, said it was amazing that such a structure was built considering the tools and technology engineers didn't have at the time.

"It's amazing to imagine what our forefathers'

vision was a hundred years ago to impound this river and begin developing a water-resource supply for the future," Esslinger said. Connor also pointed to the "harsh environment" in which the dam was constructed in remote, steep desert canyons and mesas.

"It was viewed as the driving force and the engine that fueled economic growth and the settling of southern New Mexico," Connor said. "And, as somebody pointed out, it was also the first facility of its kind that really was the basis for meeting commitments on water deliveries to the Republic of Mexico and the international water deliveries we have now in several river basins."

EBID covers 90,640 acres of irrigable farmland and serves 8,500 constituents from small farms of less than two acres to farms as large as 6,000 acres.

"One thing that's important to know about this

"One thing that's important to know about this dam is that it was built for a single purpose and that was agriculture," Esslinger said.

He said the dam drew people and caused communities to spring up all along the EBID system. Now the dam provides water not only for farmers but also for folks in the cities along the Rio Grande. It also provides hydro-electric power and numerous recreational opportunities on its two lakes, Elephant Butte and Caballo.

"Agriculture has always been here but there was an unreliable supply of water every year and with the dam being built, there became certainty to a supply of water. It's still an important structure nationwide and at one time it was the largest and highest dam in the world," Esslinger said.

For Main Street Boutique owner Misty Alaniz, finding a good bargain is a hobby, which she has turned into a business.

"I love to bargain shop," said Alaniz, a mother of three. "I can turn hamburger meat into filet mignon. I would rather tell you about how inexpensive a piece of clothing cost than the opposite."

In addition to the bargains, Alaniz said she also loves a good project, so when her most recent home demolition wrapped up, she started brainstorming her next move.

"I can't sit still," Alaniz said. "I had talked about a few businesses run out of my home – trunk shows or a personal shopper. My husband and I also looked into a few franchises, but quickly decided we didn't want to have all the regulations or pay for a company's name. We wanted to do our own thing."

So Alaniz, who originally went to school to pursue a career in education, opened Main Street Boutique Saturday, July 9.

"The (concept) of Main Street Boutique is to take the idea of bargain shopping, but putting it into a boutique," she said. "I don't want anyone to leave here with buyers remorse; they should be happy and excited about the good prices.

"I have friends with great style, but I still consider myself a casual girl who likes to play dress up."

Alaniz said she values more than just a good price; she also searches for quality.

"When I go shopping for my store, I look for the new, up-

and-coming items from bigger cities, such as Los Angeles and Las Vegas," she said.

Another goal for the store is to carry items for women of all shapes and sizes.

"We have preteen through as young as you feel," she said. "We have up to 3X, and the only reason I stopped there was because that is as far as the company makes. I want women to feel beautiful at any age and any size. So when I shop for plus sizes, I look for cute clothes, instead of plain, simple tops."

Alaniz said her favorite part of the job is when a group of girls come in and she can tell they are having fun.

"I love it when they are in and out of the dressing room, asking their friends what they think," she said. "It is that 'comelook-at-me attitude,' and they have tried on 47 outfits. I will just keep bringing them clothes. It is nice to be helpful."

Alaniz said she also enjoys getting someone out of a "rut."

"Some people need help stepping out of their comfort zone," she said. "Maybe they only wear black or T-shirts. When I go shopping, I can keep this in mind. I have clients call me all the time and say, 'I have this event tonight and nothing to wear, can you help?' Of course I can help.

"On one occasion, I snapped a quick photo of a shirt, sent it to the customer and she responded with 'Bring it the next time I see you."

To separate her boutique from big department stores, Alaniz said she only carries six of an item – maximum.

"If you shop here, chances of seeing someone in the same thing are very slim," she said. "I buy two smalls, two larges and two mediums; and that is it. It hurts business sometimes because customers will come in and request specific items, but carrying a limited number makes this boutique store special."

Popular items at Main Street Boutique have been school spirited items, such as shirts, hats and accessories.

"Las Cruces High School football moms will line up if they hear I have new LCHS items," said Alaniz, adding that she also has a large selection of breast cancer awareness items as well as children's clothes and "diva dresses."

"Everything you find here is going to be great quality, but not at department store prices. I know for a fact some of these items I carry, such as Miss Me Jeans, are sold for double at other stores"

The average shirt at Main Street Boutique is \$20.

"I almost had a heart attack when I priced a jacket for \$42,"

In addition to clothing, Main Street Boutique also carries, jewelry, belts, purses and gift items.

"Clothes are the big seller," Alaniz said. "The other items are just hopuses"

In the future, Alaniz said she hopes to bring in more items

## Mesilla plaza comes alive with jazz music

Luring visitors to the quaint town of Mesilla with the rhythmic stylings of jazz music, the Mesilla Plaza will come alive Saturday, Oct. 1, and Sunday, Oct. 2, with the Mesilla Jazz Happening.

With a lineup of six jazz bands from the region, this is the event's 10th anniversary, and the fourth year the Mesilla Valley Jazz & Blues Society has assisted with organizing the event.

Though the event has always been called the Mesilla Jazz Happening, jazz has not always been the music featured over the weekend, said Bob Burns of the jazz and blues society. Once the society became involved; however, jazz is all that is featured.

"We didn't have much of a jazz community then," Burns said, "but there are more and more coming. But it's all in the spirit of let's get things happening, and the best thing to get things happening is live music."

Groups will play throughout the weekend as listeners are encouraged to visit the area shops, galleries and restaurants.

But the groups are also good enough for listeners to do just that – sit and listen.

"The No. 1 thing is for people to hear really, really great music," Burns said. "We have high-quality musicians and some have extensive backgrounds."

Kicking off the Mesilla Jazz Happening will be The Butlers, featuring Gordon Butler, a

violinist who plays with the Las Cruces and El Paso symphony orchestras.

Butler is well-known for the variety of styles he plays, evidenced in his years of performing with The Desperados, a regional Western Swing band, as well as the jazz stylings in the tradition of Stephane Grappelli and Django Reinhart.

The Butlers are a talented family – Gordon Butler's brother John is an accomplished flautist visiting from Washington, D.C., who will play with the group. Their father, Oscar Butler, now in his 90s, has been presenting music in Las Cruces for more than 50 years. John Butler's son Charlie Himel will also join the group playing bass and tenor sax at the happening, as well as Curt Warren on guitar and Ruben Galvan on drums.

The Diffusion Saxophone Quartet follows The Butlers and is led by Jon Swann on baritone sax, also featuring Esteban Camacho and Emilio Meza on alto sax as well as Stephanie Muñoz on tenor sax. The quartet exists to promote the saxophone and the versatility of the instrument as well as having fun and presenting new compositions and arrangements.

Mack Goldsbury will close the first afternoon of jazz in Mesilla. He is considered a living legend for his jazz talents. Growing up in El Paso and attending New Mexico State University before making his mark in New York City, Goldsbury has performed with most of the jazz greats. He spent 16 years in New York, and played all over Europe, where Goldsbury is well-known and returns for tours several times in the year. Playing tenor and soprano sax, as well as jazz piccolo, Goldsbury will be joined at the happening by Curt Warren on guitar, Erik Unsworth on bass and Ricky Malichi on drums.

Opening the second and final day of the event, Sunday, Oct. 2, will be the Helen Sachs Trio, featuring vocalist Helen Sachs. Born in the Dutch Indies, but spending her professional years in the jazz scene in Germany, Sachs has lived in Las Cruces for nearly 20 years. Her jazz stylings have been compared to Ella Fitzgerald, and she also performs in South American and bossa nova traditions.

The Border Jazz Quartet follows Sachs' performances, but they are considered leaders in the local jazz scene, performing at El Patio for more than 17 years and the past six years at Lorenzo's de Mesilla. The quartet consists of Roman Chip, alto and tenor saxophone; Billy Townes, keyboard; Tony Movsesion, bass; and Mike Matthews, drums.

With El Paso and Las Cruces musicians, Jazz Unlimited Big Band will close the weekend of jazz music. Featuring former Las Cruces Mayor Ruben Smith, Jazz Unlimited will perform traditional big band charts as well as modern jazz compositions and arrangements Details

His career took a big jump from there. Transforming his work from small wine bottles to large-scale projects, the owners of Blue Teal Winery needed signs and commissioned Goodheart to do the work. Goodheart also painted some murals in the Blue Teal-owned restaurant, Way Out West, which has closed in recent years.

"That's how it started," Goodheart said. "And little by little, it just grew from there"

Goodheart's large-scale work soon became his livelihood, and working for Jones & Co. Jewelers only helped him network and gain more exposure.

"As the years went by, I got a lot of work that way," he said. "I've slowly been doing it since 2000."

In the past 11 years, Goodheart has completed murals for private residences as well as commercial locations, including the Holiday Inn Express pool and Jacuzzi areas and the mural on the building that houses Gold-n-Cash Roundup

at the intersection of Main Street and Madrid Avenue.

Goodheart said he's capable of doing any job he is commissioned to do – whether it's a one-of-a-kind mural or accents for a favorite room.

"My goal is to translate your personal vision into reality," he said. "I use the finest materials to assure your art will stand the test of time and durability. I work together with my clients to create a product that reflects their needs and tastes. Pretty much, what they want, I can do. I do fine art, too, but it's mostly the murals."

When he's not working on a piece for someone else, regional landscapes are Goodheart's favorite subjects.

"I paint my surroundings," he said.
"That's kind of what I focus on. I focus a lot on the agriculture and migrant workers in the fields, things like that. But it's mostly landscapes."

He has shown in galleries throughout the Southwest, but currently has art hanging in the newly opened Baqueras Jewelers, 141 S. Roadrunner Parkway, Suite 127.

## Crooked Beaver Creek playing at SNM State Fair

They've only been officially a band since 2009, but already Crooked Beaver Creek has landed big

The group opened for Reckless Kelly at last year's Southern New Mexico State Fair & Rodeo, and this year, they're back at the fairgrounds to open for the Josh Abbott Band Saturday, Oct. 1.

But that's not all they've played. Crooked Beaver Creek was the headlining act on the Roberto's Stage at The Whole Enchilada Fiesta Sept. 24.

We had a lot of fun (at The Whole Enchilada Fiesta)," said Javier Figueroa, drummer and vocalist for the group. "There was a good crowd."

A good crowd seems to follow wherever the group has played since it was started in 2009, after three friends who attended New Mexico State University decided to jam together.

Lead guitarist Mike Granado and bassist Jacob Guajardo grew up together in Artesia, N.M. In Las Cruces, while at NMSU, they met up with lead vocalist A.J. Alba and decided to start a band and call it Crooked Beaver Creek.

"The name is unique, people aren't used to hearing it," Granado said. "And we're able to have a mascot. I think it's more effective and it ties together the music. You can't put a title on what our sound is - we're a blend of a bunch of different types of music."

Guajardo, Granado and Alba practiced together for about seven months before taking the show on the road – or even in public. Playing with various drummers and playing gigs at local venues around town, including El Patio Bar, the trio finally found a good fit with Figueroa in January 2010, who joined after his latest venture dissolved.

We did a jam and practically gelled right then and there," Figueroa said. "I'm in it for the long

It wasn't much longer after Figueroa joined Crooked Beaver Creek the band got its big break after playing for the college crowd at the St. Patrick's Day party at Dublin's. A promoter told them they needed to play at larger venues and offered them the opportunity to open for Reckless Kelly at the fair.

"It was awesome," Figueroa said. "It was a humongous stage and the whole crowd was into it."

Since then, good news has traveled fast, and the right people have seen them play and have opened the door for more shows throughout the

Playing Texas country music and beyond, the group has been inspired by the sounds of Led Zeppelin, Black Sabbath, AC/DC, Chuck Berry and the Beatles. Though they say you can't pin their sound down with one genre, they like to characterize themselves as a Texas country, Southern rock band.

While some of the band's songs are covers, Crooked Beaver Creek has plenty of original songs, since Alba can write songs "like it's going out of style," according to Figueroa. The songs coming together with the melodies, however, is a group project.

'We play all of our originals at our events," Granado said. "Eventually, we want to play only originals.'

Original songs are featured on the group's album "Desert Bred," which includes their mascot, the beaver, drawn in the likeness of all four group

"Even if you're not a fan of country music, we have a sound anyone would like," Granado said. "All of our songs have at least one catchy thing that attracts people.'

## All in the 'Names of Love'

## You can't change the world, but you can try with love

The wonderful adage of "make love not war" has returned and not a moment too

That bit of rarified humor covers only a miniscule part of the smart, funny and irreverent story contained within "Names of Love."

Baya, richly played by Sara Forestier, is a beautiful young woman with a non-pedigreed background. She is smart – though not a Ph.D. – and exuberant and outgoing. Not one for regular employment (she frantically quits a call center job after only one phone call, setting the tone for what she is going to do next), she embarks on a plan to change the ideas and mores of people in high places, especially those that she meets from

the right wing.
To do so, she decides to casually use her - shall we say – feminine wiles to convince them that right is wrong and left is right (which is often accurate). By sleeping with the enemy, she hopes to

Martin, a French government ornithologist whose job it is to scare the hell out of people by announcing on the radio that every dead bird he finds is going to lead to some un-

named viral calamity.
Baya, who initially thinks that the much older Arthur is a fascist, barges into his radio show, gets tossed out after making her pronouncement and ends up inviting the bewildered Arthur for coffee and a roll in the hav.

But Arthur politely demurs; not to say he is not interested. They begin a warm, odd relationship, while Baya continues on her expedition that would make Fox News.

From that point on, Baya sets out to change the world - romantically - while dealing with her own dark past, which includes being molested by a piano teacher and com-

ing to terms with her Algerian father. Her father is an immigrant handyman, but also an artist, and she is determined to have him start working on his art rather than fixing the neighbors' toasters.

Arthur also has a set of concerns, the main one being his mother refuses to acknowledge the fact that her parents

perished in a concentration camp in World War II. Frequently, throughout the movie, younger versions of Baya and Arthur appear with them, sort of like childlike consciences. We also witness visits from his mother's parents, Greek Jews who are waiting for acknowledgement in the afterlife.

The relationship between Baya and Arthur grows, even after she "marries" another so he can become a French citizen and beds several cads and bounders of the right-wing variety.

Arthur accepts it all – and it all works perfectly because of the near-perfect comic timing of the film – carried all the way through by Arthur and especially the uninhibited Baya

(who is so distracted that at one point she forgets to dress after a shower, not noticing it until she gets on the metro), and pinpoint direction by Michel Leclerc.

The film also takes note of many of France's peccadillos, which, at least in theory, can be subscribed to the good ol' USA, as well.

Too bad love and sex can't change the world for the better. "Names of Love" would be a good film to use as a guideline.

## This satirical film is sure to be a crowd-pleaser

The CineMatinee for Saturday, Oct. 1, is "Mars Attacks!" (1996, 100 minutes, rated PG-13).

Ever want to see the U.S. Congress evaporated by a Martian ray gun? We thought so ... hence, one of many reasons to come and see this off-the-wall comedy starring Jack Nicholson, Glenn Close, Pierce Brosnan and, believe it or not, Tom Jones (among many

What is "Mars Attacks!"? A satire of modern America? A '60s B movie with a '90s budget? A sideswipe at the output of the Hollywood film industry? A chance to see lots of Hollywood stars and bits of Las Vegas get blown up? A funny cameo by Tom Jones? All of the above and more. Most importantly though, "Mars Attacks!" is silly good fun.

Martians decide to invade Earth, and Earth fights back. That's the plot, as old as Hollywood itself, and "Mars Attacks!" is a first-rate B movie in that regard. Full of evil aliens from the Red Planet and the inevitable realization that it's up to the good ol' God-fearing U.S. of A to save the day.

The sideswipe at Hollywood is evident in the casting and the consequent demise of several big Hollywood players. Big-hitters such as Nicholson, Close, Martin Short, Michael Fox, Brosnan, Danny De Vito, Sarah Jessica Parker and Rod Steiger are impotent in the face of such adversity.

It's up to '70s icons such as Jim Brown and Pam Grier and the new wave of Hollywood talent such as Natalie Portman and Lukas Haas to save the day, though not before much of Washington, D.C., Las Vegas and the rest of the world gets zapped by the Martians' Death Ray.

With all this going on, the real stars (and collectively the biggest characters) are the Martians themselves. Beautifully animated (computer generated to look like stop-motion), they excel because they do what they do for the sheer hell of it with a decidedly wicked sense

of humor. You can't help but enjoy "Mars Attacks!" for there is so much to please, be it the anarchy present in the breaking of every Hollywood movie rule, the bizarrely romantic relationship between Donald Kessler (Brosnan) and Nathalie Lake (Parker), or the constant sending-up of modern America. If you don't, then it may just be a cultural misunderstanding, "Ak Akk Akk!



Not sure the last time I had lunch in an elementary school, but it was a surprisingly pleasant experience. Some of it was quite familiar, such as the cardboard milk cartons. Some of it was a little different; I had to pay \$2.75 instead of the 40 cents I paid as a kid back in Oklahoma.

After I explained, I asked her how her sweet and sour chicken


"It's awesome!" she said. Sierra also offers a snack bar, which opens after lunch and includes pretzels, pickles and other goodies.

## Nearly two hours abducted from my life

#### Teen heartthrob not an ideal action-thriller star

Rule No. 1: Don't take a teenage heartthrob and make his first breakout movie a violent

It seems that famed action director John Singleton (who did well with "2 Fast 2 Furious" and "Four Brothers") broke that very rule when he cast "Twilight" series star Taylor Lautner in the thriller "Abduction."

Lautner plays teenager Nathan Price, who is dealing with feelings of rage and random thoughts that he is living someone else's life. He has recurring nightmares about watching a woman get married and consults a psychiatrist, Dr. Bennett (Sigourney Weaver), to

While working on a school project on missing children with his neighbor Karen, played by Lily Collins ("The Blind Side"), Nathan discovers a picture of himself when he was 3 years old on a missing children's website. Not just an amazing resemblance, Nathan discovers the same shirt the 3-yearold is wearing in his basement.

Soon after, he finds out his parents aren't his birth parents, and they're hiding a very dangerous secret. One they could get killed

That premise alone seems to build up to an amazing, suspenseful thriller, and as one who has enjoyed many of the films on Singleton's

directing résumé – which includes "Boyz N the Hood" and "Baby Boy," two of my favorites - something just didn't add up.

I already had my reservations with Lautner being cast in the lead role. Could "Harry Potter's" Daniel Radcliffe play an action star escaping the CIA and Russian terrorists? What about Robert Pattinson, the leader of Team Edward? Nope, he's better off in romantic,

feel-good movies like "Beastly," alongside other teenyboppers like Vanessa Hudgens (who should not have been in the grownup movie "Sucker Punch").

Not to say that Lautner didn't do well with the task at hand. He worked through all of his physically straining stunts very well, and I don't think he was a terrible actor. However, despite him being able to pull off the role, the casting is a huge issue.

Who's going to come to these movies? The adult audience the movie is targeting? Or the "Twilight"-obsessed fans who are wearing their "Team Jacob" shirts?

aspects of the movie, I stumbled over something that sums up the point I'm trying to prove perfectly.

The website, www.commonsensemedia. org, lists a whole bit on "What Parents Need to Know" about "Abduction," even listing the curse words said in the film. Really? Maybe that's why it was rated PG-13.

If teens are the only ones who might see "Abduction," then producers shouldn't hope to break even. And if you're an adult who is interested in those action thrillers regardless of the star and his abs, there isn't even a good enough plot to make it worth your

We know Nathan isn't who he thinks he is. Well, who is he? I don't feel there was enough information about Nathan's past and background, and it was something juicy, since CIA agents and assassins are targeting

They're also targeting his neighbor Karen, and since her parents are strategically out of town, Nathan takes her along to flee the trouble with him.

All along the way, the pair is determined to find out who he is and where he really came from. He does find out, and we discover Nathan doesn't really have much to do with it – it's really his biological father's beef – but he's the key to stopping it all, in

With a big-time budget of \$35 million, the movie made just more than \$11 million at the box office in its opening weekend. It's a shame, too.

You would think with Singleton's reputation, it would be easy to be able to break even on the first weekend, but now they're probably just hoping it even stays in theaters long enough to do so.

I hope Lautner has a thick skin, because critics have been tearing this movie apart.

Gabriel Rochelle Cycling the Mesilla Valley

There are no health benefits to cycling," said one rider in the Bike and Chowder Society (a retired physician), "it's just that you feel like you're 10 years old again."

To which another person replied, "Sort of says it all, doesn't it?"

Yes it does, on one hand, but for a more complete answer we might ask what it was like to be 10 years of age, and go from there.

When I was 10, I was full of energy, able to run a long time without losing stamina or breath and my muscles were well-developed.

I had a strong sense of balance, I paid attention (to the things I was interested in), I was healthy and as far as I can remember, I had no stress at all.

Life was a lark, and every time I took off on my bicycle, it got even better. The freedom of mobility was exhilarating. I remember my first 25 mile ride when I was 13. What a rush that was.

Joe Friel has been around since the 1980 as one of the premier trainers and explorers of athletic training. I bought his book, "Cycling Past 50" when I was in my mid-50s and it helped significantly with

my attitude and my performance.

I recommend that book together with a newer one, by Roy Wallack and Bill Katovsky, "Bike for Life: How to Ride to A Hundred." The authors are serious about the title; there are interviews in the book with non-agenarian cyclists. Friel long ago listed 10 benefits to cycling. Based on research, he claims that cycling:

- Promotes a healthy heart
- Improves blood chemistry, including the good cholesterol HDL
- Lowers blood pressure
- Decreases the risk of cancer
- Builds stronger bones
- Reduces the chance of diabetes
- Promotes greater muscle strength
- Reduces stress
- Decreases chronic pain (arthritis, back pain)
- Improves digestion, lung function and flexibility.

Some benefits relate to weight loss and muscle toning. Cycling burns 300 calories an hour. If you cycle at a good rate for half an hour a day, you will "automatically" lose 11 pounds a year.

I am not a medical doctor, but most of us know that keeping weight down increases your health potential and cuts the risk of diabetes and cancer.

Cycling is not the only answer for weight problems, but it is part of the answer.

There is a common misconception, that cycling builds only your lower body. While much of the benefit for muscles is, of course, in your thighs, calves and buttocks, it's not true that your other muscles See Bike on page D2

Feeling 10 Struggling with diabetes

#### Local family's story shared by millions

It's easy to dismiss the warnings day-in and day-out coming from health care specialists and doctors about the innumerable benefits from getting enough exercise and eating right.

It can be downright tiresome to hear about what you should be doing and what you shouldn't be eating when you, along with the majority of Americans, just need a quick fix meal during or after a long day of work.

Refusing to heed these warnings, however, could one day mean adding your name to the list of more than 150,000 people in New Mexico diagnosed with diabetes.

For Las Cruces residents Brian and Amy Kord, prevention was not even an option when their daughter, Shelby, was diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes at 17 months old in 1998.

There is no way to cure diabetes, and, unlike Type 2, Type 1 diabetes cannot be prevented according to the American Diabetes

"It wasn't from eating too much candy or drinking sugary drinks," Amy Kord said.

Brian Kord said he took Shelby in to the doctor one month early for her 18-month routine checkup, because she was lethargic and drinking excessively.

"I was later told if I had not taken her to the doctor that morning, she may have died that afternoon," Brian Kord said.

Amy Kord describes living with Shelby's disease as "a battle every single day."

Every day is literally up and down, some days are good and sometimes only hours of the day are good," Amy Kord said.

Shelby Kord, now a freshman at Las Cruces

High School, has not let diabetes stop her from trying to live a normal life in school. She is a manager of the freshman football team and

#### **Udall announces \$1 million** for New Mexico nutrition aid improvements

U.S. Sen. Tom Udall announced Tuesday, Sept. 27, that New Mexico will be awarded more than \$1 million in recognition of the state's improved administration of the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP).

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) rewards states that ensure SNAP benefits are received in a timely manner and administered with efficiency and integrity. New Mexico was recognized for "Best Application Processing Timeliness."

"I applaud New Mexico for making sure this important program is run responsibly and efficiently," Udall said. "In these tough economic times, when so many families are struggling to put food on the table, the SNAP benefits program is a vital lifeline."

According to the latest census data, New Mexico has the highest poverty rate in the country with more than 20 percent of New Mexico families living below the poverty threshold.

The SNAP benefits program is a nutrition program for families and individuals that meet certain income and resource guidelines that allow them to purchase food to feed their families.

This award is part of a larger announcement of USDA incentive funds, which provide monetary incentives to the six states with the highest rate of timely processed applications, an important indicator of customer service in administering the program.

Working in collaboration with USDA, state agencies continue to enhance the SNAP program's integrity, even as demand has increased in response to national economic conditions. This year, USDA is investing in efforts to examine local office processes and improve their effectiveness and efficiency.

are "untouched" by cycling.

At an advanced age, however, it is better for all of us to be doing some weight training to build upper body strength.

You may wonder about the relative merit of cycling, particularly in urban areas, compared to the risk of air pollution and traffic hazards.

A report in Environmental Health Perspectives, August 2010, concluded that the health benefits outweighed the potential problems on a scale of 9-1.

Among these, increased lung capacity in cyclists helps expunge air pollution at a faster rate than if you are driving.

This is a dense scientific report you can find online by searching for the journal and typing in "cycling" on the journal's search tab, if you are really interested.

You know instinctively that cycling supports your health when you

You are more alert, more attentive, your muscles are working and your breathing is deepened. Your speed, stamina and strength increase together. So what's keeping you back? Get out there and ride.

plays the cello.

It is not easy though, and Shelby said she has lost friends because "they just don't want to deal with me."

Even teachers have treated Shelby differently, she says, by either giving her too much attention, or by not allowing her to leave the classroom for medications.

In addition to the emotional toll diabetes has taken on the Kord family, it is also a huge financial commit-

"Insurance payments, supplies and medicine, doctor's visits and sadly, hospital and emergency room stays are apart of our never ending fight," Amy Kord said.

She added that the closest pediatric endocrinologist is located in Albuquerque, and travel to and from is required at least six to seven times per year.

According to diabetes education

is a high-risk state for diabetes due to its diverse culture and ethnic backgrounds that make up such a large part of the population.

Hispanics and African-Americans are twice as likely to develop diabetes than Anglos, but it can affect people of all ages and ethnicities. Those in the pre-diabetic stages of Type 2 diabetes, however, do have the chance to turn it around.

'Culture and family ties do have a lot to do with how someone manages their health," Hurst said, "but people shouldn't resign to accepting diabetes as their fate just because it has affected a family member."

As people become accustomed to combining traditional Mexican and New Mexican foods, which are high in fat and carbohydrates, with American convenience foods, also highly caloric, Hurst said, it makes it very difficult for people to practice healthy eating habits.

"I also try to educate people that they don't have to give up what they

love to be able to manage this disease," Hurst said.

More than 25 million people in the United States are affected by diabetes, and of that number, more than 7 million are unaware they have it, according to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

Unfortunately, symptoms of Type 2 pre-diabetes are subtle and may easily be overlooked, such as fatigue, thirst, frequent urination and an unsatisfyable hunger.

Hurst advises to make healthier shopping decisions by buying products on the "outer parameters" of the grocery store, only visiting those aisles with fresh fruits, vegetables, meats and good dairy products.

"Also, taking the steps to pack your lunch or your child's lunch is so much healthier than going for that double cheeseburger in the drive-thru or having your children go through the lunch line every day," she said.

Hurst added that while some people think convenience foods are cheaper and more economical, they actually end up costing more in the long run, as opposed to buying foods to prepare wholesome meals with.

The Kords said they always try to make Shelby's schools aware of her condition and explain how diabetes

affects her life, and also are very involved in the New Mexico Branch of the Iuvenile Diabetes Research Foundation (JDRF).

Amy Kord said when she was informed back in 2004 that JDRF did not have community events in Las Cruces, she enlisted family and friends to get a fundraising "walk" started.

Since then, southern New Mexico has raised more than \$100,000 to JDRF towards finding a cure for dia-

"If you ask any person who is in one way or another touched by diabetes, the first thing they will tell you is that they wish for a cure. We just want Las Cruces to be a part of our wish," Amy Kord said.

#### Noise Exposure Hazardous to Your Health?

Noise exposure is one of the most common causes of hearing loss, and one of the most widespread occupational hazards in the United States. A single shot from a shotgun, experienced at close range, may permanently damage your hearing in an instant. Repeated exposures to loud machinery may, over an extended period of time, present serious risks to your hearing.

- 10 million Americans have already suffered irreversible hearing damage from noise.
- 30 million are exposed to dangerous noise levels each day.
- The effects of noise on hearing are often underestimated because the damage takes place so gradually.

#### **Pet Adoptions**

The Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley will conduct two off-site pet adoption events Saturday, Oct. 1. Available for adoption will be dogs, puppies, cats and kittens.

Adoptions will take place from 8 a.m. to noon at the Las Cruces Farmer's and Crafts Market in Downtown Las Cruces and from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., at Pet's Barn, 1600 S. Valley Drive. Adoption fees are \$75 for dogs and \$50 for cats. The fee includes the first set of vaccinations, spay/neuter and micro-chip. At the Pet's Barn event, micro-chipping for pets that already have homes will be available to the public for \$20 and city pet licenses will be available to neutered pets for \$5 each. Licenses for un-neutered pets are \$25 each. Proof of spay/neuter is required before a license will be issued. Pet owners also must bring current proof of rabies vaccination for each animal to be licensed.

#### **Doña Ana County will be a zoo** for World Rabies Awareness

The Doña Ana County Special Projects Office is teaming up with the Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley (ASCMV), Action Programs for Animals (APA), the Spay/Neuter Action Program (SNAP) and the Humane Society of Southern New Mexico (HSSNM) to coordinate a rabies-only vaccination clinic, pet adoptions and a pet-food drive for low-income families.

The event will run from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. on the north lawn of the Doña Ana County Government Center. Tents will be erected for shade, and veterinarians will be on hand to administer and document all vaccinations.

Rabies vaccinations will be provided free from APA, SNAP, and HSSNM for pet owners who can show proof of government assistance. Pet owners without public-assistance documentation will pay \$5 per vaccination. The event is open only to residents of Doña Ana County.

## Tips to create a bike-friendly city

#### Simple road rules for drivers and bikers

Las Cruces could be a bike commuter's dream. The weather and topography alone offer some of the most pleasant conditions for hopping on your bike rather than in your car.

Cycling is a great form of exercise, as it builds cardiovascular health and is low impact on your body. Unlike other sports or recreation, almost everyone can ride a bike.

Whether used for running errands or getting to work, biking can save you a few bucks while keeping you in

More importantly, biking is just plain fun. Remember how it made you feel as a kid? I still get that feeling every time I get on a bike, whether I'm commuting to campus or out on a long weekend ride.

I try to ride my

bike to school every couple of days, and while I see a few others riding as well, it's a shame that more people do not take advantage of this fun, healthy mode of transportation.

Cycling is not without its risks, and because bike culture is relatively nascent in Las Cruces, bikers and drivers alike have an obligation to make this city more bike-friendly. I've seen – and experienced – a few near

It is incredibly scary for a cyclist to brave the roads, not because I believe Las Cruces drivers are intentionally making the streets unsafe, but because having to share the road is a new concept here.

Sadly, New Mexico is ranked sixth highest in the U.S. for most bicycle fatalities, and the majority of these fatalities are children.

In a Center for Injury Prevention report done in 2000, New Mexicans cited dangerous streets and drivers as the primary reason for not riding a bike.

The following are a few simple tips that we

can all do to make biking in this city safer:

• Drivers, please slow down. Since humans power bikes, they are going to be slower. Try as bikers may to keep up with the flow, cars whizzing past make it difficult to change lanes or cross traffic.

Treat bikes like cars by always giving plenty of room between your car and the cyclist. Recognize that bikes need to use traffic lanes to make turns as well.

- Bikers, act like cars by obeying traffic laws, stopping at signals and signs and riding with the flow of traffic.
- Drivers and bikers both need to use turn signals; neither should have to guess where the other is going.
- Drivers, please get off your cell phones.
- Bikers, wear your helmets. Wearing a

helmet is the first step to ensure safety in the event of an accident. However, when drivers are talking on the phone or doing something else distracting, it becomes difficult to pay attention to the person in the bike lane attempting to cross traffic to get into the turn lane.

Las Cruces already is a likeable city. Now, it has the potential to be a "bikeable" city. Bikers

and drivers alike have a responsibility to make the "Share the Road" mantra more than a

When more people in the community feel safe to ride their bikes, more people can fall in love all over again with an activity that keeps them healthy and having fun all year long.



## Living on top in Las Alturas

## Grand estate includes indoor basketball court

A hilltop palatial estate, overlooking the city lights and mountainscape, with a playground, swimming pool and indoor basketball court may be on the list of several people's dream home.

For Dr. Chetam Shivaram and his wife Archana Shivaram, that dream home became a reality when they purchased the 5,595-square-foot residence at 5252 Eagle Pass Road.

"It had everything we wanted," Archana Shivaram said. "It's open and very comfortable."

Built in 1993 by Sun Valley Venture, the spacious abode was featured in the Spring Showcase of Homes that year.

Beginning a family, Shivaram said the couple was looking to leave their High Range abode for something that offered more space, scenic views and a comfortable yet elegant living space. Finding just the place, the family purchased the home in 1999.

There was some work that had to be done before the family could move into the home, however. Shivaram said they completely revamped the kitchen – which included putting in new, stainless-steel appliances and granite countertops – and updated the bathrooms. The couple also added rock walls to the front of the home and redid the stone steps.

Located on a corner lot, the home features a fountain set in a zia-symbol-like design on the bottom of a slope. A gravel driveway extending up and over the hill, leads to the front of the home.

The home features a pueblo style with whitewashed vigas, beams and a stacked design with pots along the façade. The front includes a brick covered porch as well as two flagstone-covered areas from with visitors can enjoy the view of "A" Mountain.

Inside, guests are greeted by a sweeping staircase and saltillo tile across the floor. Beside the stairs is a half bathroom and a few steps that lead down to two bedrooms in the four-bedroom home.

Up the grand staircase, which features nichos for art and a small balcony to gaze over the interior of the home, is a third bedroom. The room is attached to a bathroom and is the perfect place for visitors. The area also

includes access to a deck that captures the spanning view – from the city lights to the surrounding neighborhood and picturesque mountains.

Back downstairs is the living room. Featuring a 12-foot ceiling covered in vigas and wide planks, the room connects to the dining room, but remains private, thanks to two half walls and a wood-burning, kiva-style fireplace painted in bright shades of red.

The dining room rests inside a rounded wall of windows that bring in natural light as well as the view of the front.

The dining room wraps around to the remodeled kitchen. Dark granite countertops offer a nice contrast to the lightly colored cabinets. The new appliances include a sleek hood over the stovetop located in the island as well as two dishwasher drawers.

The area is completed by an informal dining space and a family room. The family room also features a colorful kiva-style fireplace – this time in deep purple – and is separated from the living room by a wet bar.

The space also connects to the master suite. The bathroom of the relaxing space offers a luxurious retreat with double sinks, a free-standing shower and a corner jetted bathtub.

The back of the home consists of an enclosed sunroom. This area then leads to the home's most unusual attraction, which the couple added before moving in – an enclosed basketball court.

"It was my husband's dream to have a basketball court," Shivaram said. "He wanted to go from the bedroom to the basketball court."

The space is entirely wooden – floors, wall and ceiling – with a wall of windows that looks out on the property and city lights. Well-lit with skylights and canned lighting, Shivaram said the room isn't just enjoyed by her husband.

"It's great for the kids to play in, too," she said.

Rock stairs outside of the basketball court lead down to the pool and cabana area. In addition to a shaded area for lounging, there is also a covered kitchenette with a sink, refrigerator and fireplace.

Sitting on 1.8 acres, the property also includes an enclosed backyard as well as a playground. The playground, located on the side of the home, is next to the three-car

garage, which also houses an at-home office.

In addition to the various types of native plants surrounding the home – including yucca, palm trees, ocotillo, barrel cactus and sage bushes – Shivaram said there are also several different kinds of fruit trees. Plum, peach, Asian pear, cherry, apple and pistachio trees are scattered throughout the property.

"Even though it's really big, there isn't much to maintain," she said. "It takes care of itself."

The pueblo-inspired home is just another compliment to the Summit Chase Subdivision, located in the Las Alturas area.

"It's a very quiet neighborhood," Shivaram said. "At night we don't have street lights so you can see the stars and the open sky."



## LCAR holds city forums

## Members get insight into upcoming elections

Members of the Las Cruces Association of Realtors will gain insight into candidates of the upcoming City Council and mayoral elections during two forums held at the association's office, 150 E. Idaho Ave.

LCAR CEO Isaac Chavez said the organization began holding the forums two years ago, during the last election season, as a way to allow members and association affiliates a closer look at issues that concern the industry.

"We do focus most questions on real estate and development issues, such as impact fees, the dust ordinance, property tax and zoning," he said, adding that the LCAR Legislative Committee comes up with the questions.

In the past, Chavez said they would send out a short questionnaire of five to six questions to candidates for possible

"We would only get to see one side of the candidate," he said. "We wouldn't be able to see their demeanor, how they answer questions, if they can think on their feet. With a forum, you really get a sense of how serious a candidate is."

The first forum, to be held from 2 to 4 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 4, will be for City Council candidates, while the second, to be held from 3 to 5 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 13, will be for mayoral candidates.

"We try to make things interesting," said Chavez, adding that these are forums, not debates.

One thing, he said, that makes the LCAR forums different from others held by various organizations throughout the city is that challengers and incumbents aren't treated as equals each has their own set of questions to answer.

"You can't expect a challenger to have as in-depth of an answer as someone who is already in office," Chavez said.

He said those in office will be asked to explain their stance on things they've voted, while challengers will be asked how they would have voted if a city councillor.

Also different, Chavez said those participating in the forum will not receive the questions prior to the event, ensuring that they haven't prepared a statement and are knowledgeable on various topics facing Las Cruces.

"Anyone running for an important, paid office should be educated enough on the issues to speak off the cuff," he said. "It's a way to separate the legitimate candidates and those who are running to get their name out. ... You can tell which candidates are truly interested.

Chavez said the No. 1 issue that will be discussed will be the three new impact fees recently passed.

'Only one of the impact fees will take effect right away,'

Chavez said. "The new City Council coming in can help decide not to enforce the last two that will start in 2013.' Growth, Vision 2040 and their stance will also be an Low-Cost **High-Speed Internet** wildblue

important topic during the forums, Chavez said.

While the City Council forum will focus on specific issues, Chavez said that for those running for mayor will be more broad base, since they are responsible for the entire city, not a singular district.

'Each candidate will get more time as well," he said.

Chavez said they will also accept questions from the floor during the forums.

After the forums, Chavez said the Legislative Committee and Realtors Political Action Committee (RPAC) will get together and determine if they want LCAR to support any of the candidates. If so, they then will discuss how they'd like to offer that support, such as paying for an ad or making a campaign

"The LCAR board of directors will then decided to accept, amend or deny those recommendations," Chavez said. "If we do decide to support someone, we'll send a request to RPAC at (the Realtors Association of New Mexico).

"This is serious; it's not for the wary. They have to stand up and defend why they're running. We expect them to know their

Ultimately, Chavez said the forums are designed to provide the members with the information needed to make a well-informed decision.

We want our members to be as well educated as possible when they go to vote on voters day (Nov. 2)," Chavez said.

After a successful run in 2009, Chavez said he has high hope for the upcoming forums.

"Last time, every single candidate showed up," he said. "We expect everyone to show up this time as well."

While the forum is only open to LCAR members and affiliates, Chavez said they are looking into streaming the events live on their website, www.lcar.biz.

### Temperatures drop, pests move inside

#### Fight back against bugs searching for warmth

The official fall season is here, and that means bugs start looking for warmth indoors.

Insects typically thrive in warm weather. They're cold-blooded creatures, and any significant drop in temperature will affect their metabolism. So insects will seek heated indoor space, or they'll crawl up the sides of buildings to higher areas to get some sun.

The most common indoor pests during the colder months are:

**Cluster flies** are found throughout the U.S. They get their names because they cluster together in large groups in one spot. They resemble the common housefly, but are actually a bit larger and darker.

These nuisance pests tend to enter a home through any crack, crevice or small opening, and are capable of living in very small spaces such as attics and storage areas. They are often seen on walls and curtains in the

In areas that have warmer winters, such as the Southwest and West, the American **cockroach** thrives. Roaches are strong, adaptable and persistent and quickly multiply in areas with moisture, food and dark hiding places, all of which spell trouble for homeowners.

The **boxelder bug** is another insect that likes to cozy up indoors during the winters. The adults reach about a half an inch long and have gray wings with red bodies. They're not great flyers and are not dangerous to people, they are plant feeders. But they do give off a foul odor when they are crushed. Stepping on one in your house is not the best idea.

While the landscape and temperatures outdoors begin to change, each fall insect can be handled with the following fall prevention tips:

- Seal cracks and small holes as soon as possible. Plan ahead for falling temperatures.
- Make sure doors and windows have tight-fitting screens and repair if necessary.
- Repair leaky faucets and avoid any water accumulation.
- Regular vacuuming and cleaning lessens the likelihood of pest outbreaks.
- Keep trash contained to decrease the smell and
- Keep food sealed tight.

## Solar Smart Living offers insight into being green

As many in the Southwest look into harvesting the power of the sun, Solar Smart Living is doing its part to serve Las Cruces and El Paso with its solar panel and other green building needs.

Larry Perea, an El Paso native who was the engineering site manager for the Delfy Steering plant, which is part of General Motors, created Solar Smart Living in 2008.

"I was always in the engineering field," he said. "My father worked for (White Sands Missile Range) in the auto pool. I'd go with him on the weekends."

This first exposure to mechanics encouraged Perea to join the Air Force, where he did aircraft maintenance, before ultimately attending college and earn a bachelor's degree in engineering.

The University of Texas-El Paso graduate was recruited by General Motors out of college to test and validation of steering equipment in Michigan. He then attended Kettering University, formally the General Motors Institute, and earned a master's degree in manufacturing management.

The car company then transferred him back to his hometown, where he overlooked the production design for steering systems.

Perea said his family owns a farm in La Mesa, which consisted of 20 acres of organic vegetables. Back in the Southwest, he said he began to look at how to use solar when irrigating the farmland with a drip irrigation system.

"In organic farming, you don't want a lot of weeds to grow, so you have to drip water on the plants that you want," he said.

Through his investigation, he learned that at the time the area didn't have much to offer in the way of solar panels, even though it was just the place for such operations.

"I figured out that the region was an ideal place for solar energy," he said. With the automotive industry suffering at

With the automotive industry suffering at the time, including General Motors declaring bankruptcy, Perea said he decided that it was time to take his fascination with solar power to the next level and begin his own business.

"I ran a division of 150 employees, managing an \$11 million operating budget, I didn't think it would be that difficult," he said. "Of course, it was."

The two biggest challenges, he said, was getting the banks to look at his business plan to give him a loan, and learning the regulatory side of electricity, which included the different rate

structures and utilities that operated in New Mexico and Texas.

Taking about a year to learn the ins and outs of the industry, Perea said he and his team of four engineers and a master electrician officially began generating sales and installing panels in 2009.

"We've always served El Paso and Las Cruces," he said, adding that the company has also ventured to Carlsbad, Deming and Lubbock, Texas.

"When we talk to a client, we emphasize that we can deliver the product. We're competent and well trained."

While the team may focus on solar energy – especially solar electricity and solar water and pool heaters – Perea said Solar Smart Living offers much more, including green building consultations, such as retrofitting lights.

"We look at ways that they can be more efficient and use incentive money to drive costs down," he said. "We learn early on that a lot of homes are inefficient. If the homeowner makes a few changes before we put on the panels, they can make the home more efficient and will need smaller panels."

As HERs raters and LEED-accredited professionals, he said things they recommend to eliminate waste include sealing cracks, installing solar screens and using more insulation in the ceiling.

"We see and suggest things that will help drive down their loads," he said. "These home improvements and using the solar panels will put money into their pocket."

He added that this includes educating customers on what incentives are available through the state and El Paso Electric Co. Solar Smart

Living is currently working with El Paso Electric on a demonstration project on the east side of El Paso that will show how photovoltaic systems operate. They also work with electrician students at El Paso Community College.

While the last two years have been a nonstop adventure, he said he is pleased with his new career choice.

"It's very different than what I used to do," he said, adding that before, he would spend 13 hours in a building for meetings and conferences. "With this new venture, I've met more people in the last two years than I did when I sat in the office. It's been a very welcomed change."

With several more things to come, Perea said he is looking into various endeavors, including working with Tierra del Sol, an affordable housing development corporation located in southern New Mexico.

"The future holds great promise," he said. "We're motivated by what we're doing. There are several projects we'd like to get our hands on."

## Finding space for that home office

Many homes today do not offer an extra room dedicated solely to an office and, more specifically, to a computer setup. You may have to get creative on where to put an office and how to set up the space for it. Here are a few options of spaces that you might use

few options of spaces t for a home office.

Recently, I converted an old TV armoire (they will be dinosaurs soon) into a computer armoire. We added a pullout shelf to house the computer keyboard and it was ready to go. You can also buy a computer armoire ready made. They take up minimal space when closed, yet are very functional when opened.

When you close the doors, no one knows what's behind them. When you are finished working all you have to do is close the doors, leaving the mess, and turn off your computer. It can either be a desktop or a laptop. Computer armoires are usually 42 to 54 inches wide and 68 to 82 inches high. They provide room for both a printer and a tower and, since it is vertical space,

you can fit it into lots of small areas around the house.

If you have an extra closet in the home or a larger walk-in closet, you could easily convert it to a small office or computer work area. Consider purchasing a pretty desk chair instead of a traditional office chair. It can be stashed near the area or next to that computer armoire without being so obvious that this is actually an office work area.

Many people choose to work in their breakfast or dining room area. If you have an eat-in kitchen and a formal dining

room, are both necessary? If your formal dining room is not used more than two to three times a year, you have my permission to convert it to a home office and go out for Thanksgiving. If you want to keep both but want to work in the formal dining room, a small computer table or armoire will take up less space than a china cabinet. You can use your desk covered in a tablecloth as a serving table or sofa table. Use one of your dining chairs as your desk chair. I relate computer equipment

in the same way that I do stereos, TVs and exercise equipment. It's not always pretty, but it is a fact of life.

If you're really trying to conceal the fact that you have a home office, you can take the corner of any room and conceal it with a full screen when not in use. This would work well in a formal living room, family room or game room.

If you have a staircase, you might have some unused space under your stairs. You might be able to utilize this space to create a home office or use it as storage for your office supplies and equipment. Many times, we will take space under the stairs and put in a closet. That could also be the closet that you convert into a computer space

Given the extra space on your property and a budget, you can add a small building

or addition in the back of your home to be used as a studio, workshop and/or home office. This is a much more expensive alternative, but many people earn their livings in their home offices and it may be worth the expense. A less expensive approach would be to renovate a garage, basement or, if you're one of those rare people in this part of the country who has one, an attic.

Look around your home and you may be surprised about how many places there are to make a personal home office. I've



found that many people "wish" they had such an area in their homes but never actually analyze possibilities if they don't have a bedroom that can be converted.

Starostka said in the past, they have seen everything from smoothies and breads to cheesecake and brownies all made with pumpkin.


"One year, there was an apple crumble-type dish made with pumpkin," she said. "There has been a little bit of everything."



## **Gardening with suede**

## Supple, yet strong gloves keep hands protected

Thorns, goat heads and sharp-tipped branches have been the rue of gardeners as long as people have been tilling the soil. Protecting your hands against the bite of your roses can be just as important as watering them. Plants that need pruning, and hands-on affection to become healthy and happy, often require some level of handling, so people turn to gardening gloves to help gentle the interaction. made of cloth, with either leather or rubber palms, to remain tough but pliable. Leather is known for cracking, and tearing with age, brought on more rapidly by those hot summers in the toolshed. Rubber can stiffen or melt, often becoming too rigid to be used that next spring. Gardeners have discovered a new solution to this harsh wear and tear, and are now looking to gloves made with synthetic suede for all of their prickly needs.

#### What is it?

Synthetic suede is a soft, but strong fabric that is resistant to tearing and weathering, and will remain pliable and protective under intense heat or dire cold. The resilience of the fabric is one of the

main reasons many plant lovers are making the shift to suede gardening gloves.

Suede gloves come in several sizes for men and women, their cotton tops providing a close fit for the greatest comfort. Their palms and fingertips are lined with the suede material to provide protection and are thin enough for wearers to have the greatest dexterity of their hands.

Unlike leather, suede won't shrink, stretch or crack. This is the reason many car manufacturers are now using this type of suede on automobile interiors to replace hard-to-care-for leather.

#### How does it work?

Synthetic suede is a polyester or nylon microfiber material. The microfibers, 1,000 times finer than silk, are intricately formed into a cloth that closely simulates the natural structure of leather. The material that is created through this process is supple yet unusually strong – stronger than leather on a strength to

weight ratio.

It resists sagging, tearing, stiffening, cracking, piling and shrinking and is very abrasion-resistant. Synthetic suede is water-resistant yet breathes more freely. It has a soft, plush hand and is soothing to the touch in any climate and requires minimal care as it is both spot-cleanable and washable.

## Where can it be found?

Suede gardening gloves are quickly gaining popularity among the backyard community, and are popping up online and in retail stores.

Many home improvement and hardware stores, such as Home Depot or Lowe's Home Improvement, carry some brand of suede gloves.

#### How much does it cost?

Synthetic suede gloves are slightly more expensive than others you'll find, but they outlast all of the other materials combined. You might have to spend a little more initially, but you can be sure that you won't need to replace them every season. A good pair should run you less than \$20.

#### Details

#### **Cleaning Process**

- Begin by brushing off as much dirt as possible from the gloves, paying special attention to the fingertips, which often collect the most grime.
- 2. Fill your bucket with cold water and mix in salt and mild soap.
- 3. Gently wash the gloves in the water, rubbing the dirt away with your fingers.
- 4. Rinse the gloves in a second bucket filled with the rinse water.
- 5. Remove as much water as possible by gently squeezing the gloves in a downward motion.
- 6. To keep the fingers from losing their shape, place an old fashioned clothespin in each finger.
- 7. Hang the gloves in an open area using clothespins and allow them to air-dry.
- 8. Remove the clothespins from the fingers of the glove when the gloves are partially dry.
- 9. Massage or knead the gloves to soften the suede and keep it from getting stiff.
- 10. Continue to knead and massage the gloves every couple of hours until they are completely dry.

#### Cleaning tips

Depending on the type of dirt that you are working in, your gloves may need to be cleaned daily or once every couple of months. Keeping dirt on the gloves for an extended period of time will cause them to stiffen and become uncomfortable. So it is very important that you clean them regularly, to extend the life of any fabric, not just suede.

You will need

- Two buckets
- Cold water
- Salt
- · Mild soap
- Rinse water (water combined with a few drops of olive oil)
- Clothespins both the clip and old fashioned types

## The wonders of baking soda

#### Homemade volcanoes not the only trick up this baking staple's sleeve

Sodium bicarbonate - a difficult name, but a necessity in the kitchen.

The substance, better known as baking soda, has been used in households since the ancient Egyptians, who used a natural deposit of natron – a mixture of sodium carbonate decahydrate

of household problems - from cooking to cleaning. Everyone knows that baking soda can be used to freshen refrigerators, deodorize shoes and make homemade volcanoes fizz, but there are several other unusual uses this kitchen staple has to offer.

1. Clean a mildew-covered shower curtain: After frequent use, even the most well-cared for shower curtain or liner will get specs of mildew on it. Bust through the grime with the help of baking soda. Toss the shower curtain in your washing machine with two bath towels and add 1/2 cup of baking soda with your detergent. Set it to the gentle wash setting and be sure to add 1/2 cup of vinegar during the rinse cycle. When it's done, let the curtain air dry – do not put it into

water. You'll notice a difference in their blooms.

3. Soften your skin: Dry, rough skin can be treated with an unlikely source - baking soda. While washing a pile of dishes, create a paste out of water and baking soda and coat your hands. It will help your hands as well as assist in removing tough baked on food. Also, a cup of the powder can be added to your bath water. It will soften your skin as you soak, plus it will help soothe any skin irritations you may have.

4. Easily remove burned-on messes: For those burned, food-coated pots, instead of spending hours scrubbing away, grab the baking soda. Heavily coat the mess and add about an inch or so of water. Place the pot on the stove and bring it to a boil. After boiling for a minute or two, scrub away. The mess should clean away with relative ease.

5. Soothe heartburn: While the grocery store has shelves lined with various antacid products, ease the pain of heartburn with a non-chemical remedy. Just add a teaspoon of baking soda with half a glass of water and drink the solution down. The discomfort will be lifted.

6. Treat a jellyfish sting: Sure, New Mexico isn't riddled with ferocious jellyfish, but just in case your next trip to the ocean results in a sting from the water-dwelling creature, you'll

8. Use as deodorant: You may have noticed that several manufacturers of hygiene products have begun to include baking soda in their toothpastes and deodorants. You don't have to buy a specially designed deodorant to keep your armpits fresh, however. Apply baking powder directly to the area using a powder puff and get the same pleasant smelling results.

9. Help a stuffy nose: With the change in temperature, it will soon be the dreaded flu and cold season. If a bug that has resulted in a stuffed-up nose has hit you, get help unblocking the congestion with a bit of baking soda. Just add a teaspoon of the substance to your vaporizer and breathe in deeply for relief.

10. Repel raindrops: New Mexico rainstorms can be quick and ferocious. Give your windshield wipers a hand by dusting the glass with some baking soda. The powder will help repel the drops from your windshield.

11. Substitute baking powder: If your cookie recipe calls for baking powder and you're all out, skip the emergency trip to the grocery store and make a replacement. Simply mix baking soda with cream of tartar or vinegar and you'll be ready to go.

12. Remove chicken feathers easier: While most of us buy our poultry prepackaged, de-feathered and separated, those who still do all of the work themselves can get some help from baking soda. When boiling the chicken, add a teaspoon of the stuff to the water. It will help the feathers come off easier and it will make the flesh clean and white.

13. Stop that fishy smell: Nutritionists are constantly preaching the health benefits of adding fish to your diet. Don't let that unpleasant smell be the reason you skip this healthful meat. Remove the fishy smell from your fillets by soaking the fish when it's raw in a baking soda solution for about an hour. Be sure to keep it in the refrigerator.

14. Fluff up your omelet: Droopy omelets can be a thing of the past if you have baking soda on hand. Just add half a teaspoon of the ingredient to your eggs when whisking. The eggs will come out fluffier as a result. Just remember, use half a teaspoon for every three eggs used.

15. Freshen up your house: Smelly shoes aren't the only items that should fear the odor-busting power of baking soda. The powder can also be used to dry-clean carpets and upholstered furniture. Sprinkle the stuff over the fabric and fibers and gently brush it in. Let it sit for an hour, or even overnight, then

## Celebrate High Holy Days with fiery treats

Happy Rosh HaShahah to my Jewish friends! In Hebrew, Rosh HaShahah means "first of the year" – Jewish New Year, a time for introspection and a time for "resolutions."

Rosh Hashanah (5,772 based on the lunar calendar) begins at sundown Wednesday, Sept. 28, and starts the Ten Days of Repentance and Introspection, which culminates with Yom Kippur, a full-day fast beginning at sundown Friday, Oct. 7, and ending with a festive breakfast Saturday, Oct. 8, explains retired Las Cruces Rabbi Jerry Kane of Temple Beth-El. The days between Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kipper are known as the Days of Awe and High Holy Days.

Part of the holiday tradition is dipping apple into honey to ensure it will be a sweet year for all. To celebrate the occasion, Rabbi Kane shares a recipe for Habanero Glazed Chocolate-Drizzled Lemon Pecan Shortbread Cookies prepared with the tasty flavors of Triple Sec (orange liqueur), zesty lemon and the tropical heat of habanero. Rabbi Kane said these cookies taste especially yummy accompanied with sliced apples dipped into honey (consider enchanting green chile honey). I also share two other recipes: Granny Smith Cayenne-Cinnamon Tube Cake and Chicken with Honey-Hab Fruit Sauce.

L'shanah tovah! (For a good year!)

#### Jerry's Habanero Glazed Chocolate-Drizzled Lemon Pecan Shortbread

**Cookies:** 

1 1/2 cups unsalted butter, softened

1 cup sugar\*

2 egg yolks

1 teaspoon vanilla

2 tablespoons Limoncello or Triple Sec

2 tablespoons freshly squeezed lemon juice

4 tablespoons lemon zest

2 3/4 cups flour sifted with 1/2 cup of corn starch to make 3 cups of cake flour

1/2 cup pecans, toasted, cooled and coarsely chopped 1/4 teaspoon salt

\*Note from Rabbi Kane: "Some may consider replacing the sugar in the cookies with honey, but I would not."

#### Glaze:

1 1/3 cups powdered sugar

2 large lemons, zested

3 tablespoons fresh lemon juice

1/4 teaspoon habanero powder

#### Topping:

1 cup semisweet chocolate chips, melted/tempered

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Line a 17-by-12-by-1-inch baking pan with nonstick foil. Toast pecans in a warm oven and let cool completely before chopping. Cream together butter and sugar. Add egg yolks, one at a time, beating mixture until smooth. Beat in vanilla, liqueur, lemon juice and zest until well incorporated. Stir in cake flour (or corn starch and flour), pecans and salt.

Spread dough evenly into pan, making it smooth and flat as possible (about 1/4 high). Lightly score dough with a knife into approximately 60 squares. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes or until brown. Turn off oven and allow cookies to sit in oven, with door ajar, for 15 minutes. Remove from oven. Cut cookies along score lines while slightly warm.

In a medium bowl, whisk together the powdered sugar, lemon zest and lemon juice until smooth. Brush a thin layer of the glaze onto each cookie with a pastry brush. Allow the glaze to harden.

Melt chocolate chips in microwave. When able to drizzle, drizzle lightly over the lemon-glazed cookies. While cookies are cooling, melt the chocolate chips using either a microwave oven or a double boiler. Let chocolate cool slightly. When cookies are completely cool, drizzle melted chocolate on each cookie in a random design. Allow chocolate to harden. Store in an airtight container in layers, separated by parchment paper. Enjoy! Makes about 6 dozen.

## **Granny Apple Cayenne- Cinnamon Tube Cake**

2 cups sugar

1 1/2 cups canola oil of your choice

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

2 well-beaten eggs Juice of 1/2 lemon

1 teaspoon salt

3 cups flour

1 1/4 teaspoon baking soda

1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon cayenne powder

3 cups (about 3 to 4 apples) Granny Smith, peeled, chopped and drizzled with a bit of additional lemon juice to prevent browning

1 1/2 to 2 cups pecans (consider chile seasoned pecans)

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Grease a tube pan and dust with flour. Combine sugar, oil, vanilla extract, eggs, lemon juice and salt in a large mixing bowl. Beat well. In a bowl, mix flour, baking soda, cinnamon and cayenne powder and add to the first mixture and beat well. Add apples and pecans and mix well. Pour into prepared tube pan. Bake 1 1/2 hours, until golden on top. Let sit a few minutes, then unmold. Makes about 12 servings.

## **Chicken with Honey- Hab Fruit Sauce**

Pairing fruit or anything sweet with habanero peppers releases the pepper's tropical flavor and reduces its intense fiery heat.

Celebrate the Jewish New Year with retired Rabbi Jerry Kane's Habanero Glazed Chocolate-Drizzled Lemon Pecan Shortbread Cookies.

3/4 cup apricot jam

1 1/2 cups orange juice

1 1/2 cups red wine

1 tablespoon ginger 2 teaspoons garlic powder

1 1/2 teaspoons thyme

2 tablespoons honey

1/4 teaspoon habanero pepper or 1/4 fresh stemmed, seeded and minced habanero (or adjust to desired head level)

2 teaspoons corn starch

2 teaspoons cold water 6 ounces apricots

6 ounces prunes

3 to 4 pounds cut-up chicken

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease a baking dish. Place chicken parts in dish. Set aside. Place apricot jam, orange juice, red wine, ginger, garlic powder, thyme and honey in a saucepan. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer to reduce to 3 cups. Stir in cornstarch and water and blend. Add apricots and prunes. Pour over chicken. Bake in preheated oven 45 minutes or until chicken is done. Makes 6 servings. (Recipe adapted from http://jta.org.)


