WSIFF expands movie horizons

Las Cruces again hosts local festival for filmmaking

What began as a "little" festival in 2005, focusing primarily on films made in New Mexico or those made by Latino filmmakers, has grown to the point it moved from Alamogordo to Las Cruces and now includes a wide variety of films from around the globe.

The White Sands International Film Festival (WSIFF) began through the efforts of film lovers, artists and industry supporters with a desire to increase the presence of film in southern New Mexico, benefiting the region artistically and economically. Building a film industry in the south would also positively impact the state. The WSIFF staff and volunteers worked tirelessly, and film artists, technicians and other industry professionals began to take notice.

In 2009, WSIFF relocated to Las Cruces. This expansion into a larger market enabled the festival to retain its commitment to attracting high-quality festival programming while increasing awareness of film by area residents and making filmmakers from elsewhere more conscious of New Mexico's unique qualities as a place

The organizers of the festival felt that moving to Las Cruces was beneficial and necessary for it to grow.

"There is more support and resources to carry out a film festival," said festival Executive Director Kierstin Schupack. "The people have been wonderful. It's a great, supportive town for the arts.'

It is hoped that WSIFF will continue to grow. There was a record number of films submitted to compete for a screening this year. Selected were 19 full-length features and 38 shorts with a wide range of subject matter. The titles include Narrative and Documentary Competition films, as well as out-of-competition feature-film selections in the Showcase and Special Events

The festival also will be welcoming a record number of film professionals including producers, directors, actors and technicians to conduct workshops and

NMSU budget debated

Reserves could cushion losses

A faculty union expert is saying that New Mexico State University has enough reserve funding to question the need for program cuts coupled with tuition increases.

Howard Bunsis, an accounting professor from Michigan and treasurer of the American Association of University Professors, analyzed NMSU's 222-page budget document and gave his take on what all the numbers meant at two forums Friday, April 9, on the NMSU campus.

His conclusion: There's no need for department budgets to be cut, and he questioned the need for tuition increases recently passed by the NMSU regents.

NMSU officials say they need to raise tuition by an average of 8 percent and cut departments by an average of 4 percent in response to an almost 10-percent reduction in the university's Instruction and General (I&G) operations funding from the state. That's not a surprising reaction, Bunsis said, because those making budgets tend to

Shelter gets reborn as child crisis center

La Piñon turning vacant facility into safe haven for children

A building that once housed homeless families at the Mesilla Valley Community of Hope is being transformed into a child crisis center by La Piñon Sexual Assault Recovery Services of Southern New Mexico.

La Piñon is currently in the process of renovating the building, which stopped being a shelter more than four years ago and had mainly been used for storage since, and aims to have the child crisis center running by the end of the year.

But there is much work left to be done to

get the building up to snuff – especially fixing the building's electrical system and plumbing, getting appliances for the kitchen and putting

in new flooring suited to young children.

Along with community donations and volunteers, the first steps to getting the center in shape has begun, along with fundraising, such as an enchilada dinner Friday, April 16, at El Caldito Soup Kitchen (for more details see Coming Up on page A10).

Donna Richmond, La Piñon executive director, said she became aware of the need for a child crisis center through her involvement with Child Safe/Niños Seguros, a community group formed in response to child deaths from abuse.

Though La Piñon is more of a response organization to abuse, Richmond said her organization decided to work on creating the child crisis center when no other group took up the challenge.

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

Arts are alive

Our diversified Las Cruces art community contributes to our excellent quality of life

When I first moved to Las Cruces in the late spring of 1996, I needed a temporary place to live until Jaki could join me and we could buy a home. I was hoping to lease a centrally located, cost-effective efficiency apartment where we could negotiate a short-term lease. Because time was short, my new office manager set me up with a room at the Lundeen Inn of the Arts bed and breakfast on Alameda Boulevard.

What an incredible introduction to Las Cruces and New Mexico! Jerry and Linda Lundeen were the ideal hosts for a new arrival like me – fresh in town from the lush, green hillsides and canopied, tree-covered rural lanes of eastern Pennsylvania. At first I only saw "brown" in and around my new desert home. However, Linda was quick to point out the colorful beauty of the delicate desert flowers, the everchanging hues of the majestic Organ Mountains and the breath-taking sunsets.

Jerry, an architect and a circuit-riding minister, carefully shared his thoughts and opinions about the historic homes and business buildings in Las Cruces. He lamented the ill-fated closing of Main Street and the destruction of most of the historic Downtown buildings. He pointed out the artistic concepts used in the design and construction of adobe homes and buildings. It seemed that every home and building had its own story to tell.

My room at the inn was purely Southwest, decorated with American Indian art, Georgia O'Keeffe prints, a roughly hewn pine bed frame and a humongous, bleached cow skull hung directly over my headboard. True to genuine bed and breakfast tradition, each room at the inn was unique. I enjoyed the breakfasts with fellow guests where we compared our individual accommodations and discussed the topics of the day.

One especially intriguing guest was a Pulitzer Prize-winning photographer, Don Ultang. He had moved to Las Cruces from the Midwest. I was in awe as he proudly shared his portfolio of favorite photos. Linda then introduced me to their extensive private gallery, which, to me, seemed to be full of museum-quality painting and sculptures. Many of the pieces had been produced by local artists, and over the course of my two-month stay at the inn, Linda discreetly invited each of the artists, one at a time, to join us for breakfast and conversation about the potential for Las Cruces to become an arts center.

Here we are 14 years later, and Linda's prediction is taking shape throughout our city. Galleries abound in Downtown Las Cruces and Mesilla. Craftsmen display and sell their wares at the Downtown Farmers & Crafts Market each Wednesday and Saturday. Photographers are finding Las Cruces to be an ideal base for their profession. Visionaries such as Mark Medoff and husband-wife team Sam and John Muir believe that southern New Mexico will be the next favorite place for Hollywood to make movies.


New Mexico State University and Doña Ana Community College have beefed up their curriculum for the arts including studies for film production and editing, film crew training, animation, game design and acting. Local high schools, both public and private, now offer classes and internships for a variety of arts activities.

Damming arroyos not cost-effective

I attended the April 6 meeting of the Stormwater and Watershed Infrastructure Management (SWIM) task force. I have to wonder about the agenda of this self-appointed task force.

It is made up largely of representatives from the agricultural community. Nothing wrong with that, except that it seems a regional stormwater task force should have all the stakeholders at the table, not just one set of interests. Kudos to SWIM for getting the ball rolling, but it's time to expand the group.

Certainly there is the appearance, if not the reality, of an anti-wilderness bias to SWIM. Its chairman has worked for the Paragon Foundation, an organization that opposes wilderness designation and questions the legitimacy of federal public lands. One of SWIM's goals is to look at the "implications" of proposed federal legislation to protect certain areas in the county as wilderness areas and national conservation areas. At least one of SWIM's members represents an organization that opposes this legislation.

The need to address aging dams is certainly legitimate, but SWIM's emphasis on "controlling" wild arroyos by building dams where dams currently don't exist suggests that capturing water may also be on the agenda. Again, nothing wrong with this, but let's keep the issues of flood control and water supply separate.

In fact, most of the arroyos in the county are already dammed, which has caused ecological harm to the Rio Grande. Arroyos carry nutrients and coarse materials that benefit fish and other creatures in the river. Fix old dams, yes, but let's look very carefully before constructing new dams.

In the long run, keeping people out of harm's way by discouraging development in floodplains, and restoring wetlands – nature's sponges – is a more cost-effective and sensible alternative to building more dams.

Increasing PTSD awareness

Last year, I wrote about a friend who took his own life after returning from Iraq. He suffered from post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), and I vowed to do all in my power to shine light on this debilitating condition.

In my efforts to learn about and increase awareness of this disorder, I've come to realize that PTSD affects anyone who has suffered from a traumatic event. I focused on returning veterans because of my specific experience, but it is important for all of us to know that this information has broad applications across society.

Following the lead of the Doña Ana County Board of Commissioners in 2009, momentum is picking up at the state and national levels to designate a day each year as PTSD Awareness Day.

I believe that at the community, state and federal levels, we have a collective obligation to educate ourselves on PTSD symptoms and to be unrelenting in referring those who are symptomatic to places where they can seek fellowship and counseling.

The symptoms of PTSD are difficult to deal with because retreat and withdrawal are a part of the disorder. Other symptoms include avoiding social situations, self-isolation, loss of hope for a full and rewarding future and irritability. Anyone who thinks their friend or loved one is suffering from PTSD should seek professional help immediately.

If you have a loved one who is suffering from these symptoms, you need to know that PTSD is very real and that you are not alone. It will be worthwhile and rewarding to seek help to find ways to approach the subject with your loved one. There are therapists who can help you understand how to help. Don't make the mistake that I and so many others did in thinking that it will go away on its own.

When it comes to veterans, we are fortunate in southern New Mexico to have the Las Cruces Vet Center and the Veterans' Service Center as resources. But the fact that those resources are in place does not mean that all veterans are aware of them. The Las Cruces Vet Center, 523-9826, is located at 230 S. Water St. The Veteran Services Center, 524-6220, is located at 2024 E. Griggs Ave.

For non-veterans, counseling is available through churches, private therapists and nonprofit organizations.

On Tuesday, April 27, the Doña Ana County Government Center will proclaim April 28 as the Second Annual PTSD Awareness Day in Doña Ana County. I urge you and your readers to join us in reaching out to our returning warriors and others who suffer in hopeless silence.

Cuts loom for school districts

Budget pain still on the horizon for public education in the state

New Mexico and most other states were able to avoid including public schools in their first rounds of budget cutting. Since education is a state responsibility, nearly all states make it their primary responsibility. Some states pass much of that responsibility down to the local level.

But beginning with this year's legislative sessions, public schools are now part of the budget balancing. Federal stimulus funds have been the savior thus far in helping states avoid cutting into public school budgets. But those funds appear to be ending soon.

The first round of major cuts around the country this year have resulted in furloughs, smaller paychecks, fewer extracurricular activities and decimated summer school programs.

Now get ready for the big cuts. In New Mexico and much of the nation, we will start seeing layoffs and swelling class sizes as states grapple with budget shortfalls that have shown no sign of subsiding. Wall Street may be recovering but that's as far as it goes.

The next round of cuts get even scarier. Full-day kindergartens are being reduced to half-day in many communities. And now the top grades are being targeted. Utah is seriously considering eliminating the senior year of high school.

Legislation has been introduced in Arizona creating a Grand Canyon diploma for students who want to leave at the end of 10th grade. It won't get them into a four-year college, but they can go to a junior college or vocational school. Or they could enter the already bleak job market.

This year, New Mexico's Senate Finance Committee talked about

eliminating funds for the senior year of high school. And there will be serious study at the state level of consolidating small school districts into bigger neighboring districts.

Some of those small districts are leftovers from the massive consolidations of the 1950s that trimmed the number of districts from more than 600 to under 100. Those small districts were able to escape because they had powerful state senators to protect them. In those days, every county, regardless of size, had its own state senator. For some of them, it was a lifetime position.

In the late '70s, a one-person, onevote decision by the U.S. Supreme Court put an end to the rural domination of legislatures. A few efforts were made to legislate further consolidations but the sponsors of such legislation soon discovered the hornets' nests they stirred up weren't worth the effort.

The biggest target, however, for the government consolidators may not be a tiny, rural school district. Las Vegas has two school districts sitting side by

side. Las Vegas always has had a fracture between its east and west sides.

The two municipalities managed to smooth their feelings enough to consolidate several decades ago. But

the two districts never joined - and never will unless forced by the state Legislature.

Elsewhere, an interesting situation I've run into in Scottsdale, Ariz., with our grandchildren is that parents are sent a supply list for the elementary teachers. Parents receive a supply list at the beginning of school. They purchase the items, amounting to more than \$100 apiece, and teachers put them in their personal supply closets.

If they run low during the year, they tell the room mother who notifies every parent of a new round of purchases. If a family can't afford to pay, it doesn't participate, but no one knows other than the teacher and/or room mother.


Besides funding classroom supplies, this district also recently conducted a tax override election to continue funding full-day kindergarten and other school programs. It passed easily.

Next fall, Arizona will vote on a

temporary 1-cent sales tax increase. Temporary taxes are another nationwide phenomenon being used to help get through the current recession.

Gov. Bill Richardson suggested a quarter-cent temporary increase in New Mexico this year. Republicans and conservative Democrats killed the idea, saying there is no such thing as a temporary tax. Arizona's governor and both houses of the Legislature are Republican.

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Morehead new education dean

Selection called 'innovator'

Michael Morehead has been named the dean of the New Mexico State University College of Education.

Morehead, associate dean and professor in the College of Education, has been serving as the interim dean since 2008.

"Dr. Morehead is recognized as a successful collaborative innovator, and brings a significant amount of experience to this position, having led the college as interim dean twice in the past 10 years," said Interim Executive Vice President and Provost Jay Jordan. "He is highly respected by our local community of educators and has an outstanding research and teaching record."

"This is an extremely healthy college, with tremendous faculty, staff and students," Morehead said. "We want to continue to excel at meeting the college's service and research mission and continue to support faculty and staff so they can be successful and productive in their roles. We also will continue to build a sense of community among our students."

Morehead said he has five focus areas for the college moving forward including excellence in research, strong partnerships with public schools and university partners, a focus on border issues, advancing new technologies in instruction and enhancing external support for the college.

Originally from St. Louis, Morehead has a bachelor's in education, a master's in educational administration and a doctorate in educational administration from the University of Missouri in Columbia, Mo. Prior to joining the NMSU College of Education in 1992, he worked in administrative roles at Northern Arizona University and Emporia State University. He has been an educator since 1971, including teaching at the middle and high school levels and serving as an administrator in secondary schools.

Morehead's primary research involves teacher education, program quality, student internships and accreditation. Morehead has been involved extensively with K-12 education throughout his career and has been instrumental in establishing linkages and outreach initiatives that foster collaboration between higher education and public schools. In the last five years, Morehead has been instrumental in establishing the Alliance for the Advancement of Teaching and Learning – a collaborative among New Mexico State University, K-12 education and other agencies that support teaching and learning in New Mexico.

Preparing for an uncertain future

Couture: New Mexico State will maintain core programs

The first few months of my presidency at New Mexico State University have been packed with activities vital to the future of our university and the instruction, research and service it provides for citizens of our state and beyond.

At each turn, I have found students, alums, faculty and staff, legislators and

businessmen and women who are committed to our pursuit of academic quality and research that enhances the economic and social development of our state. NMSU stands proud among a number of strong institutions dedicated to serving the diverse needs of our citizens.

During these trying economic times, we have significant difficulties to overcome. Recently, our Board of Regents passed a tuition increase and budget that reflects our state revenue projections and the need for us to focus our priorities. The budget they recommended responds primarily to two key factors:

A significant reduction of our I&G budget (9.8 percent) in the state government appropriation that was passed by our Legislature and the governor, and projections of further budget decreases mid-year.

Our need to maintain academic quality, protect our core programs and continue to advance the priorities we identified in our strategic vision.

With the approved tuition and fees increase of 8 percent and our proposed uses of revenue sources, we are still required to enact an average budget cut of 4 percent across our programs and departments. At the same time, we pledge to you to maintain the programs, research and community-development activities that you have come to depend on from your state land-grant university.

We can do so because we have done much in the past year to reduce the impact of overall cuts through achieving administrative efficiency. For instance, we've had a concentrated effort to become more sustainable by reducing utility and paper usage and streamlining our vehicle fleet. And we will do more.

I recently pledged to the regents that I will establish a

high-level committee, with input from faculty, staff and students, to identify additional ways that we can become more efficient and effective while protecting revenue sources.

Given that these efforts are successful, the budget guidelines outlined by our Board of Regents include a reallocation pool and retain important investments allocated previously by the board to meet our strategic vision. Our first priority is to ensure that the university can withstand another round of mid-year appropriation reductions without compromising our commitment to excellence in our core mission of instruction, research and public service. Once addressed, our plan to reinvest in the institutional priorities will:

- Support the recruitment and retention of students, thus addressing a high investment priority recommended in the university's strategic vision
- Enhance merit-based scholarships
- Address high-priority needs to retain faculty and reward faculty and staff performance
- Address student concerns about maintaining faculty, program quality, and essential instructional services
- Meet the goals of the university's benchmarking vision to build excellence in all that serves our mission

I am encouraged by the foresight of our regents and the dedication of our faculty and staff to meet the challenges ahead. New Mexico State University has earned a reputation for graduating students well-prepared for the workplace and for leading our state and nation in research that advances our communities and enhances our quality of life. You can count on us to keep this promise and more. Thank you for your continued support of NMSU.

Not everyone concerned about government is an activist

The 'silent majority' still does not shout

There is an old saying that humans were created to give mosquitoes something to eat. Likewise, some people think citizens are created to enable government to get bigger. I would like to believe the myriad government rules put upon citizens each day are of the utmost necessity and not just our government training us to be compliant citizens.

A free society still must abide by rules to ensure each citizen is free to be free but some rules seem to only enhance government's reach into our lives. we do not flaunt it. Importantly, most of us are too busy making a living to be much of an activist, but it does not mean we do not care deeply for our country and the direction it is taking.

The media spends its time on whether the Democrats or Republicans should run our country. They speak of the political left or the right. Those labels are meaningless politicalspeak. It is wrong to say, "Communists are on the left and fascists are on the right."

W. Cleon Skousen's great book, "The 5,000 Year Leap," states that both communists and fascists want more government control over the lives of the people; therefore they are both moving toward the side of tyranny, which is complete government control of people. The other end of the continuum is anarchy, where there is no government control and each citizen must look out for themselves individually.

Neither absolute tyranny nor anarchy is

Each election in our country is not about which political party will prosper, rather, this fundamental question is "Do you want to move toward tyranny or anarchy?" It does not ask if you want complete tyranny or anarchy, only if you want to move that direction. Each candidate espouses values that move toward more or less government control of our lives.

Our country falls in three general groups:

about 17 percent want bigger government; about 33 percent do not want bigger government; and about 50 percent are not politically minded at all. In fact, half of the people in our country of voting age care so little about politics they are not even registered to vote by choice. After all, we are at liberty to not exercise our right to vote. In countries with tyranny such as in 2002 Iraq, 100 percent of the people voted for Saddam Hussein.

Back to our country. In political terms only half of our country does vote. In that group a third say they are conservative and a third say they are moderate. That leaves a third to be progressive. 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County considers cutting extension

4-H, nutrition, master gardener programs on the chopping block

The Doña Ana County Extension Service failed to get definite answers at a County Commission meeting Tuesday, April 13, about reports the county is eliminating its extension match funding.

A preliminary county budget does not include its share of funding for the Extension Service, which program Director Karim Martinez said would force the service to close its office when the fiscal year starts in July.

Commission Chairman Oscar Vasquez Butler said County Manager Brian Haines and Martinez would meet to review county revenues and expenditures.

More than 150 volunteers and supporters, wearing "Save the Extension" labels, attended the commission meeting.

After the meeting, Martinez said there appeared to be progress.

"I feel that the county commission is willing to work with us," said Southwest Extension District Department Director Charles Siepel, who is based in Lordsburg and works with nine counties in the state's southwest. "Everyone is getting back to the basics, and the Extension Service is part of the basics."

Faced with sluggish revenues, staff pre-

Faced with sluggish revenues, staff prepared the county's preliminary budget based on what services the county absolutely had to perform. Extension supporters contend that state law mandates the county provide one-third of the Extension Service budget, with the federal and state governments also providing matching funds. For the coming fiscal year, the Doña Ana Extension Service is requesting \$122,406 of the county. The Extension Service also gets support from

grants, sponsorships, partnerships and volunteers, which is estimated to be worth more than \$1 million, Martinez said.

If the Extension Service doors close, that would mean the end of such programs as 4-H clubs, expanded food and nutrition education and master gardeners, she said.

The Doña Ana County 4-H Clubs have 440 members in 13 clubs from Hatch to Santa Teresa and about 500 volunteers.

"Each level of government is requested to contribute a corresponding one-third share of the total cost of the County Extension program," Siepel said in a prepared statement for the commission. "A product of this arrangement results in a form of economic development for Doña Ana County.

"Each dollar funded by the county will be matched by \$1 of state funds and \$1 of federal funds. In addition to the \$2 match of state and federal funds an additional \$665,706 will be made available from grants for county Extension programs. Grant funds are truly an economic development function for the county and only made possible by the cooperative one-third funding from the County of Doña Ana for the County Extension Office."

"For almost 100 years the NMSU Cooperative Extension Service (CES) has partnered with local county governments to offer practical, research-based knowledge and programs to improve the quality of life for people in New Mexico," Martinez said. "CES-based programs are in the areas of agriculture and natural resources, consumer and family issues, 4-H youth development and community economic development. CES provides programs to improve the health and well-being of individuals, communities and the environment."

look at revenues coming and make decisions about increases or decreases in comparison to the previous year's budget.

Too often, however, budgets aren't compared to actual spending by the large, complex educational institutions, Bunsis said.

Looking at the I&G part of the NMSU budget is only a small slice of the whole NMSU financial picture. Besides money from state government and student tuition, the university operations are supported by a variety of funding – assorted use fees, grants that cover academic overhead, industry contracts for research and development, game tickets, parking tickets and many other sources, including property leasing

property leasing.

All of NMSU's functions – with branch colleges included – amounts to more that \$500 million of economic activity, with the I&G portion a relatively small feature in the total budget, according to Bunsis.

After comparing the university's assets against its actual spending, NMSU ended the last fiscal year with reserves of \$154 million, Bunsis said.

The share of NMSU funding to come from the state will decrease from \$214.2 million to \$193.8 million.

"This is not the end of the world when looking at total reserves," he said. "The univer-

sity is not even close to being broke."

In fact, NMSU's finances are so healthy the university enjoys a very high bond rating.

Even after examining the university's commitments to future spending, there remains "significant liquidity" in NMSU's coffers, Bunsis said.

Yes, NMSU's investments suffered loses in the stock market, but at the same time the university enjoyed healthy growth in enrollment and grants, he said.

Enrollment growth has been a key player in keeping NMSU finances healthy, according to Bunsis. Between 2005 and 2009, NMSU's total enrollment went from 26,391 students to 34,150 – a 29-percent increase in four years.

"That is really incredible enrollment growth," Bunsis said. "I've have never seen such consistent growth at any other institution."

Meanwhile, student tuition and fees increased at a greater rate than inflation while faculty salaries still lag behind those at NMSU-designated peer institutions, according to Bunsis. Also, faculty salaries amount to a little less than 15 percent of the total budget, he said.

Bunsis urged faculty attending the forums to change the debate from where to make cuts to how to better allocate resources to the institution's core mission of education. And Bunsis contends that NMSU is flush enough to make those changes without cutting or making NMSU overly costly to students.

"This university is in a stronger financial situation than most universities in the country and that is a fact," Bunsis said.

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

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Treasurer: Property taxes due May 1

Several ways available to make payment

Doña Ana County Treasurer David Gutierrez is reminding property owners they have until May 10 to pay their second-half property taxes before statemandated interest and penalties begin to accumulate. More than 39,500 second-half tax bills have been mailed out.

In an effort to make the payment process as convenient as possible, Gutierrez said he has implemented a number of ways for property owners to remit payment:

Mail the payment to the Treasurer's Office using the self-addressed envelope provided with the tax notice.

- Take a check or money order to any Wells Fargo Bank branch located in Doña Ana County.
- Pay in person at the Treasurer's Office from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday (excluding holidays), at 845 N. Motel Blvd.
- Use the drop box inside the Doña Ana County Government Center, adjacent to the Treasurer's Office teller windows
- Pay online at at www.donaanacounty. org/tax with a credit card, debit card or electronic check. (There is a fee for utilizing this option.)

"We make every effort to notify every property owner of their tax obligations," Gutierrez said. "If you haven't paid your property taxes, please don't miss the May 10 deadline. We urge all property owners to avoid state-mandated penalties and interest by making arrangements to pay their property taxes on time."

Property owners with mortgages will, in nearly all cases, have their property taxes paid by the escrow holder.

Property owners who have not paid their taxes in full and have not yet received second-half bills should immediately contact the Treasurer's Office at 647-7433.



Robin Colts, 46, was reported missing from her home on McArthur Road, in east Las Cruces, on Feb. 15. The Doña Ana County Sheriff's Office entered Colts into the National Crime Information Center as a missing-endangered person.

Colts is white, 5 feet 2 inches tall and weighs 110 pounds. She has blue eyes and shoulder-length dyed black hair. Colts was last



seen wearing a blue shirt and green Lucky Charm sweatpants, or pajamas. Even though Colts disappeared in mid-February, when temperatures were cooler, she was not wearing a jacket or shoes at the time she was last seen.

Investigators learned that at around 8 a.m. on Feb. 15, a motorist saw a woman who matched the description of Colts standing just off the roadway near the



NASA-Baylor Canyon Road intersection on U.S. Highway 70.

not us, then who?" Richmond said.

In looking for a place to house the center, the unused homeless family shelter was an opportune facility and La Piñon was able to convince all the entities in charge to use it. About a year and a half into the effort, La Piñon is now working with various government agencies – from police and emergency care providers to social work and family service agencies – to prepare for all the services that will be needed.

The center will start by housing as many as to 12 children up to the age of 5 who are not attending school because the organization is not ready yet to provide school transportation. The center will only house children watched over by staff 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Children will be able to stay at the center up to 30 days and parents will be able to have supervised visits, depending on the child's crisis.

Richmond said what the center defines as a crisis will be flexible. It could be as severe as getting the child out of a home situation where there is some kind of immediate hazard, or it could be as moderate as a young parent feeling overwhelmed by his or her new responsibility. The focus of the center is to prevent tragedy, she said.

Children can return to their original home so long as caseworkers determine it is a safe, healthy environment. The center will help link the children's parents to local services.
For Richmond, the child crisis center is long overdue, espe-

cially in light of the deaths of seven children from abuse last year. "We couldn't get it done soon enough," she said.

A smart With an eye on politics

Ags' leading hitter looks at life off the diamond

A long time from now, when Leo Aguirre quits baseball, a career in politics is a strong possibility.

Real strong.
"I'm thinking about setting up my own office some day," said Aguirre, New Mexico State's leading hitter.

Aguirre is personable, talks comfortably and is quick with a handshake, admirable qualities for a politician.

Moreover, his father, Leo Sr., is well connected as a lobbyist at the state capitol in Austin, Texas.

Lena Guerrero, his mother who is deceased, became the first female seated on the Texas Railroad Commission.

"She knew everybody," Aguirre said. "She played golf with Willie Nelson. I remember she asked him once what was par for the hole they were about to play. He told her that 'Par is whatever I make it to the hole in."

Aguirre, a senior marketing major, figures heavily in New Mexico State's 2-2-1 early-season WAC record, good enough for second place behind Fresno State's 3-1 mark.

The Ags are 24-11-1 overall, thanks to a .370 team hitting average, the league's best.

Aguirre is batting .421 with seven home runs and 36 RBI. He's swatted 15 doubles and owns a .706 slugging average.

"He's a doubles guy," said coach Rocky Ward. "Hits a lot of line drives.

Aguirre was selected WAC Player of the Week and collegebaseballinsider.com's West Regional Player of the Week for his performance March 29-April 4.

He hit .565, going 13 for 23 with six doubles and seven RBI. He did not strike out at the plate during that span.

Aguirre plays both left field

Oñate Knight track team fields crop of skilled, talented athletes

In his 20 years as an assistant and head coach at Oñate High School, David Nuñez has worked with many good track and field teams and many outstanding individual athletes.

He says this year's team is one of the

best.
"There are good athletes on both sides (boys and girls)," he said. "Usually, one team has more than the other. We have sprinters, distance runners, relays, throwers and jumpers.

"It makes for a good team."

Nuñez has coached athletes that have set eight state records over the years and have won about 33 state championships.

'In the early 1990s, we had some quality girls teams that won state championships, he said. "This one is very close to those. This team may have more in the field events."

The Oñate boys have won two meets

this year and have finished near the top in the others, and the girls have finished in the top three in each meet.

Senior Zoe Meade, a transfer from Las Cruces High last summer, has qualified for the state championships in six events, although she can only compete in five. She has reached the state standard in the high jump, long jump, 200 and three relays. Meade currently has the fastest 5A time in the state in the 200 meters - 25.04.

Another top performer on the girls' side is junior Kendra Walker, who currently holds the best time in the state in the 100 meters – 11.98. She also anchors the team's two sprint relay teams.

"She's been a great addition to the team," Nuñez said.

Walker finished second at the Sepulveda Invitational meet in Albuquerque on Monday, while Meade won the high jump,



Looking back at some recent golf stories

Risk-reward follow-up

On March 19, I addressed a reader's question on how to figure out the best play on a shot that is high-risk and high-reward. Mary Armstrong, a scratch golfer at Sonoma Ranch, wrote in an email the following to expand on my thoughts.

"I would disagree with you on the description of an ideal risk-reward hole only slightly. First of all, risk-reward is pretty much the epitome of the game – and most every good hole has some degree of it. In my opinion, the best risk-reward holes give you the reward of a much easier following shot. Furthermore, the risk should be consistent with the reward."

Thanks, Mary. It turns out that Armstrong is, in fact, a professional golf course designer and has been the architect of several important projects mainly on the East Coast.

"When I design these holes," she said, "I try to make the risk involved with the two routes (to the green) fairly equal so that it becomes a difficult choice and an exciting hole."


Tour Edge clubs produce fabulous results for one golfer

Lastly, there's a lesson that comes with confidence. When you play top quality equipment that you know is crafted and produced with you in mind, you feel good about it. 

Secondary is key to slowing high-powered WAC offenses

Depth elusive in defensive backfield

One area of the NM State football team that appears to have the potential for real depth is the defensive secondary. Returning coach Mike Rutenberg and new coach Will Martin have a good selection to choose from through the spring drills and into the fall season. Aggies fans have a chance to see them in action during the spring game at 11 a.m. Saturday, May 1, inside Aggie Memorial Stadium.

First team All-WAC cornerback Davon House is back with three productive seasons under his belt in WAC play. House's running mate, Jonte Green, is returning after some intense on-the-job training during his first year in Division I. House has the Aggies' season record for interception return yards and has been prolific in turning takeaways into points. He has returned two picks for scores in his career and ran a fumble home for a score last year at Louisiana Tech. Green learned the lessons early on and became a steady defender by year end.

Their backups have the type of on-field experience that will enable them to step in as needed without a drop off in skill level. Donyae Coleman has settled in on the defense after starting out catching the ball rather than stopping it. Ben Bradley returns, and redshirt freshman Devin Jackson is waiting in the wings.

At the safety positions, Stephon Hatchett is taking a break from drills this spring to polish his grades. Hatchett is a main piece of



the defensive puzzle so his eligibility is critical for good things to happen. Alphonso Powell is ready and willing after solid freshman and sophomore years, with ready backups in Michael Zant, redshirt freshman Josh Smith and junior college transfer Shemar Gaines, who will get here in the fall.

So why is this area so significant? The WAC is still top-heavy with passing teams. The most consistent WAC teams use the pass as a wicked counterpunch to their running game. Boise State mixes a variety of formations and trick plays to keep defenses guessing, and the pistol offense invented by Chris Ault at Nevada is another formation that can hit a pass for long yardage if your secondary isn't sharp.

Rutenberg proved that he is wiser to the gridiron wars far beyond his youth with his work last season. His career résumé shows work with Joe Gibbs, and the desire to learn was so strong that he volunteered at UCLA to work with head coach DeWayne Walker. Martin came from College of the Desert where he was assistant head coach and defensive coordinator.

Depth has been an elusive term when Aggie football is discussed. Its presence in the secondary can prove to be a solid building block for a consistent winner.

Riding to the top

Equestrian team takes saddle seeking national championship

An NM State team is competing at its national championships this weekend and ole Pete likes its chances. Fresh off the men's entry in the basketball championships, Andrea Hanson's equestriennes are in Waco, Texas, for the Varsity Equestrian National Championships. Now saddling up and riding the range like Pete does every now and then is a might different from the competitive riding these young women are engaged in.

Hanson has her squad seeded high in both riding categories. They are seeded No. 7 in Western and No. 9 in Hunter Seat competition. Not every school qualifies both of its squads, but qualifying for the championship is something the Aggies have done five years in a row. In 2005, they also claimed the regional championship. The Aggies have held their own this year during both fall and spring seasons, at one point they had a four-event winning streak. They have taken the measure of TCU, Oklahoma State, Baylor and Fresno State for the highlights.

Hanson is pleased with the year to this point.

'This year has been a success for both teams," she said. "We made great strides on the Hunter Seat team, especially in Equitation on the Flat. Our Western team has been strong all season long and is going into the championships with a ton of experience. We are looking forward to competing against Fresno State in the Hunter Seat competition and South Carolina on the Western side.'

The Aggie Western team is competing against the No. 10 seed South



Carolina. Looking at the bright side of things, if the Aggies win their firstround match-up then they advance to meet the No. 2 seed Auburn. The Hunter Seat squad faces the No. 8 seed Fresno State. This season, the Aggies lost the first meeting against the Bulldogs but won their second meeting late in the season.

Two NM State riders were also selected to compete at the finals as individuals. Rebecca McReynolds was selected to compete in the Reining competition, while Chelsae Keyes earned an individual spot in the Equitation on the Flat competition. The Equestrian program's success is a prime example of a sport starting at the right time in the right place, and they have known nothing but success

This trip to Waco doesn't just involve athletes. Each school must bring its share of horses to compete as well. That way the rides are all "neutral courts" so to speak when each gal saddles up. Pete sees these Aggies riding out of the sunset and into the Mesilla Valley with a championship trophy in their saddle bags.



Anxiety about the future can spoil the present

Keep a lighthearted spirit when dealing with toddlers

My children are still young, and they are doing fine now, but I worry a lot about the adolescent years that lie ahead. I've seen other parents go through some pretty terrible things when their teenagers began to rebel. How can I help my sons avoid that turmoil 10 years from now?

The apprehension that you describe is well-founded, and many parents feel something similar today. The most important suggestion I can make is for you to redouble your efforts to build good relationships with your kids while they are young. That is the key to surviving the adolescent years. If they emerge from childhood with doubts about whether you really love and care for them, anything is possible during the turbulent teens.

Boundaries, restrictions and threats will be no match for adolescent anger, frustration and resentment.

As author Josh McDowell said, "Rules without relationship lead to rebellion."

He is right. That's why parents can't afford to get preoccupied with business and other pursuits that interfere with the task of raising children. Kids are young for such a brief period. During that window of opportunity, they must be given priority.

Once you've done what you can to lay the proper foundation, I urge you to approach your parenting duties with confidence.

Anxiety about the future is risky in itself. It can make parents tentative and insecure in dealing with their youngsters. They don't dare cross them or deny their wishes for fear of being hated in the teen years. Teenagers pick up those vibes intuitively, which often generates disrespect in return. Don't make that mistake. You have been placed in a position of authority over your young children. Lead them with confidence and care.

If it is natural for a toddler to break all the rules, should he be disciplined for routine misbehavior?

Toddlers get into trouble most frequently because of their natural desire to touch, bite, taste, smell and break everything within their grasp. These are normal and healthy reactions that should not be inhibited.

When, then, should they be subjected to mild discipline? When they openly defy their parents' very clear commands. When he runs the other way when called, purposely slams his milk glass on the floor, dashes into the street when being told to stop, screams and throws a tantrum at bedtime, or hits his friends. These behavior patterns should be discouraged.

Even in these situations, however, severe punishment is unwarranted. A firm rap on the fingers or a few minutes sitting on

a chair will usually convey the same message as convincingly. Spankings should be reserved for a child's moments of greatest antagonism, usually occurring after the second, third or fourth birthdays.

Without watering down anything I have written about discipline, it should also be understood that I am a firm believer in the judicious use of grace (and humor) in parent-child relationships.

In a world in which children are often pushed to grow up too fast, their spirits can dry out like prunes beneath the constant gaze of critical eyes. It is refreshing to see parents temper their harshness with a measure of "unmerited favor." Likewise, there's nothing that buoys every member of a family quite like laughter and a lighthearted spirit in the home.

Creating a great impact

Maria Ruiz shares her story of feeding those in need

Sometimes the smallest beginnings have the greatest impact.

That was the message Maria Ruiz of Jesus es Mana (JEM) Ministries told a group of interested community members during a presentation Tuesday, April 13, at University United Methodist Church.

"Since 1996, God's calling in my life started with one feeding and it became many feedings," Ruiz said.

After attending her grandmother's funeral in Juárez, Mexico, Ruiz said she gave her aunt a ride home to Tierra Nueva, Mexico. Once they arrived, she discovered that her aunt was living in a home created from pallets and trash bags.

"When I saw that, it really broke my heart," she said.

Ruiz then visited the local school, also made of pallets. To her horror, the classrooms packed with children didn't have electricity, flooring, water or food. Distraught, she returned home and told her husband Jesús about what she had seen.

"I told my husband I wanted to do something," she said. "I wanted to give them apples and bananas and oranges and Twinkies." Touched by his wife's generosity, Jesús Ruiz gave her his paycheck to purchase a large amount of food to take to the school.

"Never did I know that that first meal would turn into thousands of meals," she said.

Within a week of her first visit to deliver food to the children, Maria Ruiz had established a feeding program and created JEM Ministries, based out of El Paso. For three years, Ruiz said they would feed 1,200 children each day.

"It was amazing how God just provided in every way," she said.

In 2000, after the Y2K scare, Ruiz said donations slowly began to drop as their vision began to expand.

"That's when God provides in extraordinary ways," she said.

The Mexican government gave JEM Ministries land to build facilities, including an orphanage to house 100 children, a community kitchen to feed 500 and a training center that will offer classes in English, computers, carpentry and other skills.

Around that same time a church group from North Star Vineyard in Ohio came to Juárez and was so moved by Ruiz's work they began sponsoring the nonprofit organization.

As the Ruiz family, including daugh-

ter Elizabeth and son Jesús Jr., traveled to the city across the border almost daily, their own home remained unfinished and was considered to be below the poverty line.

"I kept thinking how blessed we are in the United States," she said. "We have our basic needs met."

Ruiz and her hard work received national recognition when she was honored during the 2008 CNN Hero of the Year ceremony and in 2009 when "Extreme Makeover: Home Edition" gave the El Paso family a new home.

"Everyone has a calling," she said.
"When you obey his calling, God will move you in ways you'll never know."

Ruiz said she continues to make meals every day as well as distribute hygiene products and clothing. The Juárez facilities should be completed later this year.

"We now have electricity and sewer and water," she said. "It's about 50 percent done."

She added that the nonprofit is in need of donations of funds and food.

"We all can make a difference," she said. "It doesn't have to be something big. It can just be a smile or opening the door for someone."



'Superbug' is hard to squash

MRSA is resistant to multiple drugs

Dr. James Steckelberg, an infectious disease specialist at Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., says the media calls the highly drug-resistant bacterium called MRSA (methicillinterium called MRSA (methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus) a "superbug" because of its resistance to multiple drugs. Commonly called "staph," this bacterium can cause serious, sometimes fatal, infections that resist treatment with all but a

MRSA has been a problem in hospitals and other health care settings for years. However, because of its role in several deaths among healthy school-aged athletes, MRSA has recently garnered more media attention.

At any given time, staph bacteria can be found in the nose or on the skin of about three of every 10 people. Steckelberg said if you have staph in either of these places but aren't sick, you are considered "colonized" but not infected. Although 30 percent of the population may be colonized with ordinary staph at any given time, a small percentage of that group is colonized with MRSA. Healthy people can be colonized with MRSA and have no ill effects. The problem, though, is that they can pass the germ to others by sharing such items as clothing, towels, and athletic equipment.

Preventing MRSA infections

Several steps can be taken to protect yourself, family members and friends from MRSA infections if you

- are in the hospital:

 Ask all hospital staff to wash their hands or used an alcohol-based hand sanitizer before they touch you.
- Frequently wash your hands.
- Be sure the person inserting catheters and intravenous tubes wears a mask, gloves and gown, and sterilizes your

You also can protect yourself from MRSA in the community by taking some common-sense precautions:

- Wash your hands by scrubbing them briskly for at least 15 seconds, drying them with a disposable towel and using another towel to turn off the faucet. Carry a small bottle of hand sanitizer that is at least 60 percent alcohol for times when soap and water is not available.
- Don't share such personal items as clothing, sheets, towels, razors and athletic equipment.
- Keep cuts, abrasions and other wounds clean and covered with dry, sterile bandages until they heal. Pus from infected sores may contain MRSA.
- Shower immediately after an athletic game or practice, use soap and water and don't share towels.
- If you have a wound that appears infected or is draining, don't participate

in athletic games or practices until the wound has

- If you have a cut or sore, set your washing machine to hot water and use bleach when you wash towels and bed linens. Set your dryer to hot. Wash gym and athletic clothes after each wearing.
- · If you have a skin infection that requires treatment, ask your doctor if you should be tested for MRSA. This testing may get you the specific antibiotic you need to treat your infection effectively.
- If you have to take an antibiotic, take all of the doses even if the infection is getting better. Don't stop taking it without your doctor's permission, don't share antibiotics and don't save unfinished antibiotics for another time. Inappropriate use of antibiotics, including overuse or lack of appropriate use, helps MRSA become more drug-resistant.







All hail the iPad

I'm no technophobe.

I grew up with technology, from the Commodore 64 to the Nintendo 64. But the iPad just rubs me the wrong

Maybe it's because I already have

a laptop, smartphone, flat-screen TV and an iMac at work. So why purchase another gadget that does ... well I'm not quite sure yet.

More than 560,000 consumers have shelled out at least \$500 to find out,

I'm in no rush.

Will it be a Kindle killer? Put newspapers out of business? Make laptop-makers shake in their boots? Doubtful.

Apple's new iPad allows users to surf the web, download and play games, read electronic books, watch movies, listen to music and so on. The same things you can already do with an iPhone, which fits comfortably in your pocket, features 3G and Wi-Fi connectivity and allows you to make phone calls.

Essentially, Apple has attempted to consolidate a netbook, e-reader, gaming device, photo frame and iPod in its new deluxe gadget. It also features Bluetooth, a 10-hour battery life and access to its much-touted App Store. But is it more of a laptop or a giant iPhone? Depends on whom you ask.

Some love the iPad's large size (8-by-10-inches, 9.7-inch LED screen), but others hate it. It tries hard to mimic the specialized products it seeks to replace, but it can't entirely accomplish that, given its dimensions.

I'll admit I'm a bit of a cynic, but mostly because the price tag is too hefty. Critics say the iPad's limiting multi-

tasking capability, lack of video camera, Adobe-product support and video output seriously hinders its ability to compete with netbooks.

iPad groupies, on the other hand, will tell you it's an unprecedented device that will change the way we play and work.

Denish outlines plans for economic development

During a webcast press conference hosted by Lt. Gov. Diane Denish last week, she said the state's economy could recuperate by "doing things we never believed

One of those "impossibles" includes laying the foundation for a statewide rural broadband network that would allow workers in agrarian areas high-speed access to the Internet to work remotely with industry partners and other businesses, she said.

Small towns continue to suffer from what we know as the digital divide," she said. "Many people want to live and work in small, rural communities and the way we can make that possible ... is to make sure they have broadband connectivity."

In December 2009, the New

Mexico Congressional Delegation announced the state was awarded \$1.45 million in recovery funding to expand broadband technology to rural areas across New Mexico.

Dubbed the "Fast Forward New Mexico" program, administered through a partnership with the University of New Mexico, Global Center for Cultural Entrepreneurship and the 1st-Mile Institute, the initiative aims to increase statewide broadband adoption and promote computer literacy and Internet use in rural, Hispanic and Native American populations. The initiative will also reach out to small businesses and entrepreneurs.

Denish said rural economic development will remain one of her "highest priorities."

Exactly how those funds will be used and in what communities is yet unknown.

Another economic-boosting program for rural New Mexico is the proposed creation of a "Farm to Table" initiative that would mandate municipal, county and state institutions to buy local agricultural products.

"Our schools, our correctional facilities and government institutions who need to buy food and fresh vegetables can do it all at the local level so that we support our agricultural industry in New Mexico," she said. "I can't think of a better way for good food, good farmers and good people to connect in small towns.

A more businessfriendly government

If it weren't for Alaska, New Mexico would be dead last in the race to get its people accounted for and ensure proper representation

But that could soon change, said Veronica Reyes, a media representative from the U.S. Census Bureau.

"Starting in May, we're going to have a non-response follow-up, during which time we will be going door-to door to every household that didn't mail back their census form," she said. 'It's the second phase of census operations and we hope to count everybody that way."

The deadline to mail back questionnaires is

As of Tuesday, April 13, New Mexico ranked second among all 50 states for non-responding households, 57 percent, second only to Alaska, 56 percent. In the 2000 count, New Mexico's response rate was 65 percent. Thus far, the national average is 66 percent.

The 2010 census will decide the number of seats New Mexico occupies in Congress. An accurate count means better infrastructure and more services from designated federal funding for the state. Federal dollars go towards funding projects such as hospitals, job-training centers,

schools, senior centers, roadwork and emergency services.

'Just like we can't survive without roads and bridges, the country doesn't function well without an updated census to distribute funds to areas that most need them and to support community decisions about their own future," said Robert Groves, director of the U.S. Census Bureau in a news release.

Reyes said she suspects the low response rate is primarily due to the large agrarian population in the state.

'We don't have a specific answer as to why we have had such a low response rate, but I think the rural nature of New Mexico definitely has something to do with it," she said. "Cities such as Las Cruces and Albuquerque, and other metro areas that have regular household addresses have been more responsive.'

The response rate for the Las Cruces metro area thus far is

63 percent, compared to 71 percent in 2000. Albuquerque's is 64 percent, compared to 72 percent in 2000.

The Census Bureau measures participation using the mail "participation" rate rather than mail response rate. Mail participation rate is the percentage of forms mailed back by households that received them. The rate excludes households whose forms were returned as "undeliverable."

"We are still in the motivating phase, trying to encourage as many New Mexicans as possible to fill out and mail back their forms," she said.

Starting in May, census workers will be scouring the streets collecting data from non-responding households. They'll be carrying tote bags with the census logo and an official ID

"We encourage all households to please cooperate with them," Reyes said.

Another problem related to the state's low-response rate is the inability of census workers to visit "hard to reach" areas.

'In some areas of northern New Mexico, we are dealing with places that are under 4 feet of snow, so our census workers have not been able to make it out there," she said.

Nathan Small, city councillor and chair of the Complete Count Committee, a group created by the city to promote the census, said despite the sluggish statewide response rate, local participation has been on the rise.

"We're really starting to see an uptick in response rate," he said. "We have one week left, and I'd like to emphasize that folks still have time to mail out their forms."

People who have not received their census forms should call 866-872-6868 to request the questionnaire. Spanish-speakers can call 866-928-2010.

the state must remain competitive with neighboring states in its approach to business growth to get the economy back on its feet.

Denish echoed those same sentiments and vowed to take action.

'We need to adopt an Administrative Practices Act that works well in New Mexico," she said. "We're one of the few states that doesn't have one. This will give our businesses timelines and predictability. We think it's very important to create that kind of environment for New Mexico businesses.

State and federal administrative practice legislation includes law that governs the way in which administrative agencies may propose and establish regulation, including for businesses.

Denish also added that a full and thorough review of workman's compensation law was overdue.

"People are saying things are out of wack, there's too much paperwork and it doesn't work quick enough," she said. "We will review workman's comp law to see what works and what needs to change."

To streamline the process of starting and owning a business, Denish also proposed the creation of a "one-stop shop" for small business owners.

"If you're a business owner or thinking about starting a business, you need five or more stops to find out what you need to do," she said. "An online, one-stop shop will create a place for licensing, permits, registration forms and a directory of state services that would be important for any business owner looking to see what they need to start a business.

Access to capital

Denish said she knows all too well of the current credit crunch.

"Small business people know when they can, want or need to create a new job or product, and they need to have the access to capital to do that," she said.

Through use of the New Mexico Small Business Investment Corporation (NMS-BIC), created by state legislation in 2000 to provide equity or loan capital to small businesses, "more than 1,800 businesses through New Mexico have either grown, expanded or got started," Denish said.
"It's one of those things we think has

been able to shore up small business in these tough times," she said. "I propose we reinvest in that program, making it possible for small business to continue to have access to capital on a regular basis."

Upping the ante in the lending area even more, Denish said she would lead the way in creating a loan-backed guarantee program for community banks that will allow small financial institutions to "make more loans and have a little bit less risk."

"We would put \$2.5 million dollars in this loan-backed guarantee program that would allow (community banks) to loan to up to 500 businesses in New Mexico," she said "We need to work with our state investment folks."

Procurement and tax credits

Locally, the City of Las Cruces gives a 5-percent procurement preference to state companies who bid on city projects. Santa Fe, on the other hand, gives a 10-percent preference to local business. Overall, the state needs to do a better job to improve those efforts, Denish said.

"We must give procurement points to New Mexico businesses," she said. "We need to to do what we say we're going to do and that's grow New Mexico business. As we go forward, giving New Mexico business procurement points is one way we can do it. It helps support local business. It's just common sense for us to do that."

To further incentivize job creation in the small business sector, Denish said she'd like to see a \$2,500 tax credit for every job created in state.

"It would have to be a (position) making the average salary in the county, would have to have benefits, and it would also make certain that there is a state benefit," she said. "For every tax credit, the state would receive \$3,700 in increased revenue. That's a win-win for the business owner and the state."

To better link private industry with public policy, Denish also proposed the creation of a small business ombudsman in the governor's office.

"(If elected governor), I want a small business ombudsman talking to me," she said. "We've had it in the lieutenant governor's office, we want to continue that in the governor's office - simply because too many times small and rural businesses get left out of the equation."

Playing down the film monopoly

There's no argument that Albuquerque and Santa Fe have snagged the majority of the state's film projects since it first started offering rebates, in the form of tax credits, to filmmakers who come to New Mexico.

When asked if the state would become roactive in marketing other parts of New Mexico as a filmmaking destination, Denish said it was a "no-brainer."

"We will require the movie industry to use (alternative) locations throughout New Mexico," she said. "It's a very strong, emerging industry in New Mexico and you can depend on me to continue (directing) where (films) need to go - such as Las Cruces, the Hatch Valley, Sierra County and all its surrounding areas."

When asked if the lucrative film credits have helped the economy, Denish said the industry has created 10,000 jobs since the credits were first offered.

"We are working closely with the industry to make sure those credits are job creators," she said.

A more liquid solution

Many small towns in New Mexico no longer have a center gathering place, Denish said – no inn, no tavern, no local restaurant or watering hole.

'Many small communities have lost their liquor licenses to larger communities or corporations," she said. "Liquor licenses are many times required for places with social gatherings.'

But with the contention of a "very strong" liquor lobby in Santa Fe and the limitation of licenses, those small communities have been hard pressed to create legal venues that would fuel economic development.

"There's a lot of talk going on right now about this. I've spoken to regulation and licensing about reviewing the alcohol license (policy) in New Mexico," she said. "We can do that and create a category of liquor license for smaller areas or certain counties. We've got to get the liquor lobby to get on board with us and make sure that it happens."

To reform liquor license law, "all stakeholders must sit at the table to make sure a win-win for business and the communities that are in desperate need of being able to open a (gathering place) but don't have a quarter of a million dollars

Upward trend could reverse starting in June

The pace of Las Cruces-area real estate sales during the first threeplus months of this year is running neck and neck with the pace set during the same period last year, according to statistics from the Las Cruces Association of Realtors.

The median price of the new and existing homes sold during the two periods has also remained steady. Only the percentage of the sales attributed to new homes has changed - only slightly.

Take for example the number of homes sold. A total of 279 new and existing homes, townhomes and condominium sales were closed between Jan. 1 and April 10, 2009. During the same period this year, 280 units were reported sold. In 2009, a little more

than 27 percent of the sales were attributed to new homes. In 2010, the new-home market share dropped to 21.8 percent.

Prices remained steady in the year-overyear survey. The median new-home enough money to price gained a slight advantage over its existinghome sibling. The median price is where half

the homes sold for more and half sold for less. The \$169,950 median new-home price reported this year betters 2009's median price of \$165,000 by almost 10 percent. The median price of the existing homes sold remained virtually unchanged at \$165,000.

While these numbers paint a picture of steadiness and stability, conditions could change for the worse in the near term. Why? There are three main reasons.

First is the expiration of the homebuyer tax credit, which re-

quires buyers sign a purchase agreement by April 30 and close by June 30. Since first-time buyers currently constitute about 40 percent of all buyers, it's predicted the number of newly minted purchase agreements will decline beginning in June.

The second obstacle facing the recovery of the market is the Fed's commitment to purchase \$1.25 trillion worth of mortgages has ended. The government was forced to purchase mortgages as investors fled the market due to the proliferation of bad loans in recent years. How

quickly investors will ramp up their purchases of mortgage-backed securities is anyone's guess, but it's a known fact that today's mortgages are only being made to the most creditworthy purchasers.

Finally, and probably the most daunting challenge to the recovery, is the issue of unemployment. Let's say that number

of first-time buyers doesn't drop, and that the ending of the Fed's buying spree has no negative effect. Real estate will still be troubled until people make enough money to buy

At a recent economic update forum, Jim Peach, a professor in the College of Business at New Mexico State University, said the addition of 160,000 jobs nationwide in March was "good news." Peach also noted the nation needs to add 8 million to get back to pre-recession employment levels. Even if 200,000

new jobs were created each month, Peach noted, it would take at least 40 months for the employment picture to return to normal.

At the same forum, business professor Chris Erickson remarked that our area's current job growth is a negative 3.3 percent.

That's a steep decline and indicates the state is still in a recession," Erickson said.

He remained optimistic, however, noting, "We're very near the end of, if not past, the local recession."

While pending sales booked through April 30 will generate additional closed sales in May and June, fewer signed purchase agreements filling the pipeline going forward will result in fewer closed sales beginning in July. On the positive side, approximately 56 percent of our area's yearly sales take place in the spring and summer, which will hopefully keep our market afloat. The down side is that only about 44 percent of our annual sales take place during the fall and winter, leaving open the door to fewer sales near the end of the year.

Should the perfect storm of job growth, continued low inflation and the perpetuation of low interest rates converge in the near future, the stage will be set for a good, if not great, real estate market in 2011. See you at closing!

Where are the pop megahits of today?

Music industry decline has lessons for the rest of us

When historians look back, they may view the '70s and '80s as a golden age of musical creativity. It's the period of time in which technology allowed the development of mass media, in which a successful artist could sell millions of albums, becoming rich in the process. Those riches attracted talent that produced some of the best music of the 20th century.

But technology has dramatically changed the music industry. It's hard to make a living selling records and the lessons of the music industry may be a lesson for the rest of us who live by creating ideas.

Think back to '70s and '80s. The convergence of Top 40 radio play, music store record sales and concert tours meant that a top musician could make a fortune. Artists such as the Eagles and Michael Jackson sold millions of records. Even moderately successful artists – such as the J. Geils Band – could do quite well.

In the era of music downloads and file sharing, the old business model has broken down. Music industry revenues fell from \$14.6 billion in 1999 to \$6.3 billion last year. Meanwhile, unit sales set a new record in 2009.

To an economist, the cause of these changes to the music industry are characteristic of a formerly monopolistic industry becoming competitive. Barriers to entry meant that those who did gain access to Top 40 play would reap the riches. Today, anyone can upload a music video to YouTube, and profits have evaporated.

But isn't competition good, you say? Shouldn't it benefit consumers? Well, yes and no.

Competition is very good


at providing high volumes of low-cost products, but competition also wrings out the profits. Competition is very good at forcing businesses to adopt efficient production methods but quality may lose out to quantity.

With music, competition means that few are making a living at playing. This has substantially reduced the incentive to engage in creativity. If you can't raise a family from earnings on downloads, then you can't give up your day job. You will spend less time writing songs or composing music. The result is less creativity.

Don't get me wrong, there are exceptions, Lady Gaga, for example, or Shania Twain. But, while it has never been easy to make a living as an entertainer, downloads have made it much harder. In fact, based on music industry revenues, about half as many people are making a living now as a decade ago.

What has happened to the music industry has implications for the economy in general. Many have pointed out that the United States is becoming a nation that specializes in creating intellectual property. We make the movies, craft the inventions, and produce the content that will power the information economy of the 21st century. But in a world where movies can be downloaded from Netflix and blueprints can be sent to the opposite side of the world in a microsecond, relying on a business model that depends on copyrights and patents may not serve any better in protecting our intellectual property than it has the music industry.



Scoping meetings are scheduled in your area for the SunZia Southwest Transmission Project

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) is hosting two public scoping meetings in support of an environmental impact statement (EIS) for the proposed SunZia Southwest Transmission Project. SunZia Transmission, LLC proposes to construct up to two 500kV power lines, approximately 500 miles long, stretching between New Mexico and Arizona. A strange name, a well kept-secret

Antix serves Las Cruces for 33 years

Walk into a bank or school in Las Cruces and chances are you'll see one of Antix's products.

Antix Inc., in business in Las Cruces for more than 33 years, specializes in the design and fabrication of custom mill and casework, such as that seen at customer service and teller areas and classroom cases in many Las Cruces businesses and public school facilities.





La Viña offers great blues, jazz and wine

When I think of wine and wine festivals I automatically conjure up an image from the 1940 animated Disney film "Fantasia." It's from the Beethoven Pastoral Symphony portion in which the centaurs are getting ready for the arrival of Bacchus, the god of wine, by pouring grapes into a huge wooden vat and crushing them into juice.

Bacchus arrives – large,

round and happily tipsy riding on a small, donkev-like unicorn who appears to be in the same condition and, as they say, hilarity ensues. Does anyone else think of the same thing? Anyone? Or is it just me?

When I think of blues and jazz music I automatically conjure up an image of some smoky bar, crowded with patrons enjoying the musical stylings of Jake and Elwood Blues, aka John Belushi and Dan Akrovd, as they perform Sam and Dave's "Soul Man," on their car crashfilled journey to save the orphanage. Does anyone else think of that? Anyone? Surely it's not just me.

It is spring and wine time, and while there may not be any heavyset fellows in dark suits and sunglasses wildly dancing or demi-gods in togas with grapes behind their ears staggering about, there is La Viña's Blues and Jazz Festival to celebrate the beginning of the

From noon to 7 p.m. Saturday, April 24, and Sunday, April 25, the winery hosts this annual familyfriendly event with food, entertainment and, of course, vino. More than 20 wines will be available for tasting and purchase. Tents, tables and chairs are provided in the park-like atmosphere with great musical entertainment being provided by local and regional talent. More than 60 vendors have fine art, arts and crafts and food items ranging from freshly roasted quesadillas to gourmet hamburgers.

• The winery hosts this family-friendly event with food entertainment and, of course, vino.

Adult admission to the festival is \$15 and includes a souvenir glass and a choice of nine wines for sampling, or you can put all your grapes in one basket and pick just one glass of wine. There is a \$5 admission for those 12-20 years of age, and anyone under the age of 12 will be admitted free. There is an ATM on the premises. No pets

or picnic baskets, please.
The winery is located at 4201 S. Highway 28 in La Union. To get there from Interstate 10, take the Vinton Exit (No. 2 in Texas) head west on Vinton road, approximately 4 miles to Highway 28, then right 1 mile to the winery. Or you can take the more leisurely drive through the valley by taking Highway 28 the entire way south from Mesilla.

La Viña is New Mexico's oldest winery and boasts some of

New Mexico's finest wines. Open year-round, not just at festival time, the winery provides state-of-the-art wine-making facilities and a tasting room as well as grounds and patio suitable for weddings, picnics or any special event.

The winery is open Thursday through Tuesday – closed Wednesday – from noon to 5 p.m. Proprietors Ken and Denise Stark offer tours by appointment at 11:30 a.m. La Viña also hosts a Harvest Festival and Grape Stomp each year in October as well as an old-fashioned country picnic and open house on July 4. Something else I think about when I think of wine and music is that song "Bottle of Wine" by the Jimmy Gilmer and the Fireballs from Raton, N.M. It was 1967, and I didn't know much about wine and we had yet to discover its powerful antioxidants.

Featured artist: Stan Blitz

Local author tells 'The Untold Story'

The truth behind 'Bandstand' is Blitz's passion

Born and raised in Philadelphia, Stan Blitz had a front-row seat to the rock 'n' roll revolution. His coveted seat was, like many teens in the burgeoning mecca of the music genre, in the living room where he watched "American Bandstand" five times a week after school.

It wasn't the "American Bandstand" everyone knows, with the ageless Dick Clark introducing superstars in the making such as The Beach Boys and Janet Jackson. It was the original "Bandstand," created and hosted by Philadelphia personality Bob Horn.

To Blitz, that was even better.

"I was supportive of (Bob Horn) beyond belief," Blitz said. "I loved the show. Bob Horn was a pioneer of the era. Anybody who was anybody appeared on 'Bob Horn's Bandstand.'

Horn had successfully transitioned the show – called "Bob Horn's Bandstand" – from radio to television in 1949. The idea was to have a dance program that targeted teenagers. It not only featured teenagers on the set, but "Bandstand" introduced Philadelphia to rising stars of rock 'n' roll. Horn was the go-to person for the next biggest record to hit stations, and

soon his show was well known nationwide.

But just as Horn rose to stardom himself, his reputation suffered when he suddenly faced charges of statutory rape and driving under the influence in 1956. Although he was later acquitted of the charges, Horn spent two months in prison.
"Bandstand" became a network television

show Aug. 5, 1957, on ABC, with 25-year-old host Dick Clark. The rest, they say, is history.

Blitz definitely wasn't convinced.

"I never bought the story growing up in Philadelphia," he said. "1956 was the rock 'n' roll revolution, and Bob Horn was 40. They didn't want an older man hosting a show for kids, so they concocted a drunken driving campaign and statutory rape."

On his quest to find the truth and get Horn rightfully inducted to the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in Cleveland - Dick Clark was inducted in 1993 – Blitz started his research in 1983.

Blitz uncovered the truth, he said, and though he had only known Horn through his TV screen, he got to know the players in this "historical mystery." He talked with Horn's wife. Ann, and learned about her husband who passed away in 1966. He also became acquainted with media magnate Walter Annenberg (who owned TV Guide and Seventeen magazines, among others), WFIL-TV Business Manager Roger Clipp, WFIL-TV executive George Koehler, WFIL-TV talent scout Jack Steck (for whom Dick Clark auditioned) and "Bandstand" co-producer (and Horn's best friend) Tony Mammarella.

He interviewed more than 300 people related to the story, researched paperwork and police reports. Blitz left no stone unturned in his quest to find the "real" truth, which he found came down to money.

"If Bob Horn would have sold to Walter Annenberg, there would have never have been a Dick Clark," he said.

In 1997, Blitz's baby, "Bandstand: The Untold Story," was published.

"I'm an overnight success after 15 years," the mecca of rock 'n' roll to the Mesilla Valplayed an integral role in the hit TV show.

He even markets the book on his own. From 4 to 5 p.m. Tuesday, April 20, Blitz will be the guest speaker on KSNM-AM 570's "Senior Living." From 10 a.m. to noon Saturday, April 24, he will be at COAS Books, 317 S. Main St., for a booksigning. From 1 to 2:30 p.m. Saturday, May 1, at Thomas Branigan Memorial Library, 200 E. Picacho Ave., Blitz will speak


"It's my passion," Blitz said. "I love this story because it's my youth."

'Diary of Anne Frank' aired for Holocaust remembrance

PBS adaptation tells the complete story

For an ever-shrinking number of Holocaust survivors and liberators, every day is Holocaust Remembrance Day.

Sunday, April 11, 2010, was officially designated as Holocaust Remembrance Day, Yom HaShoah in Hebrew, an annual commemoration of one of the most tragic chapters in world history.

This year, PBS and its award-winning Masterpiece Classic made Yom HaShoah even more significant by broadcasting a riveting and fascinating new adaptation of "The Diary of Anne Frank."

Since its first publication in 1947 in Dutch, and its English translation in 1952 with an introduction by Eleanor Roosevelt, the words of a young Jewish adolescent, written while she and her family were in hiding in Amsterdam, has touched the hearts and lives of generations of young readers of all faiths. Frank's diary has been required reading in many schools for years all over the world. Translated into dozens of languages, it has become the world's most widely read work of nonfiction after the Bible.

In 1955, Anne Frank's diary was turned into a Pulitzer Prize and Tony

Award-winning play on Broadway, and productions continue in community theaters, high schools and on college campuses. Several attempts to translate the play to film and television were also made. None really gained the acclaim of the diary's powerful words.

In 1945, when Miep Geis, the office worker who discovered the diary on the floor of Frank's hidden annex returned it to the bereft Otto Frank, he was persuaded by Doubleday and the American Jewish Committee to prepare the diary for publication in English. At that time, Otto Frank made the decision to excise parts of the diary in which Anne, with hormones raging, expressed a panoply of emotions including anger toward her parents and sexual longings. Her father felt these sections were inappropriate to share. As stipulated in his will, in 2000, 20 years after his death, the previously censored sections of Frank's diary were restored.

Now, starting with a complete and restored diary, Masterpiece's "Pride and Prejudice" adapter Deborah Mogatch created a two-hour script that removes a lot of the "fluff" of prior theatrical and film productions and focuses on Frank's deeper, more personal feelings. Through the medium of the big screen, accompanied by skilled direction and refined performances, emotional subtleties can be given their due. The impact is amazing.

Having written my rabbinic thesis on "The Image of the Jew on the Broadway Stage from 'The Diary of Anne Frank' to 'Fiddler on the Roof," I was at first taken aback by the editing and removal of key scenes and characterizations from the play. I had to adjust to some of the newer aspects of the story.

For instance, the entire Chanukah celebration during which the warehouse is vandalized and the family's joy is shattered is missing. Other aspects of the plot that allowed for broader performances by actors are eliminated and replaced with more intimate, subtextual confrontations between personalities.

The "romance" between Frank and Peter plays out more realistically and less "romantically." The tension between Frank and the dentist Mr. Dussel who must share the same room is palpable.

In sum, I realized this is a far more intense and deeper adaptation based on the same seminal work, and in most cases exceeds the original because this is a fuller retelling of the complete diary.

The performances are compelling. Ellie Kendrick, whose physical attributes remind us of the photos seen for years, plays the part of Anne

with a unique depth of understanding. Iain Glen as her loving father and Tamsin Greig as her long-suffering mother provide nuanced understanding of their complex roles. In lieu of a bumbling Mr. Dussel, originally played by Jack Gilford, Nicholas Farrell shows us a more dignified and pained portrayal. Lesley Sharp and Ron Cook turn in strong performances as the Van Daans, and Geoff Breton plays a more vulnerable Peter than the original script.

In sum, this BBC production will be a defining interpretation of Anne Frank's slender journal. It is hoped that its message of ingenuous hope will inspire many generations to come. As Frank herself wrote on Feb. 23, 1944, "Riches, prestige, everything can be lost. But the happiness in your own heart can only be dimmed; it will always be there, as long as you live, to make you happy again."







Some seriously tasty bites

El Tiburon satisfies predatory palates

In Spanish, El Tiburon means "the shark," and everyone knows that a shark is a perfect eating machine. Been feeling like that lately? Need to satisfy those urges to devour some tasty Mexican-style seafood? Then swim or drive or walk to the local restaurant named after el rey del mar, the king of the sea, el tiburon.

El Tiburon staked out its territory at 504 E. Amador Ave. in May 2009 offering a selection of appetizers, soups and main dishes of mostly seafood variety. While they do offer some steak and chicken entrées and both barbacoa and carne asada tacos, the specialty of the house is mariscos.

Owner Ana Medina says the style is similar to dishes found around Puerto Peñasco or Rocky Point on the Gulf of California in northwest Mexico. Appetizers include oysters on the half shell and mussel soup as well as various tostadas topped with ceviche - cold, marinated fish, shrimp or a seafood medley. They also offer stew or caldo with fish or beef.

The sopa marinera is a stew medley of octopus, clams, shrimp and fish. The shrimp and mixed-seafood cocktails are local favorites.

Entrées offered are fried, breaded or pan-seared fish fillets and a shrimp or Camarón Fiesta with jumbo shrimp wrapped in bacon. Most entrées are served on a bed of rice, or if you must, with French fries.

There is a salsa bar with a good variety of tasty, but not necessarily hot, salsas. The chips are light and crisp and not at all oily or greasy. The atmosphere is reminiscent of a beach "shack" along the coast of the Sea of Cortez. The place is clean and bright, and the servers are courteous and efficient.

The tostada ceviche was piled with spicy fish chunks and avocado slices. The caldo de pescado, or fish stew, had an ample supply of fish pieces in


let, el pescado de la plancha, was lightly pan-fried, and the rice was very moist and fluffy. The bacon-wrapped shrimp was worthy of a higher-level predator. Overall, a very satisfying dining experience and definitely deserving of a return visit.

The prices were very reasonable with nothing more expensive than \$11.95. There is a children's menu with fish sticks, chicken strips and cheeseburgers and in case you desert your shark-like tendencies and opt for dessert, there is cheesecake and an intriguing carrot cake that serves four.

El Tiburon is also available for private parties and catering. Beer and wine are served and there is a breakfast buffet from 8 to 11 a.m. Saturday and Sunday with menudo, pancakes and omelets for only \$6.99.







Sprucing up a mundane topic

Brooding, reserved housekeeper gets a new outlook in 'The Maid' film

Subtlety is not a strong point for house-keeper Raquel in this darkly comic, somewhat dramatic tale of a domestic's semi-bliss.

She has worked for the Valdes family for many years, filling in many roles from nanny to maid to cook, while keeping her dower profile and an excruciating emotional distance from most of the family. Raquel is also suffering from headaches and dizzy spells, none of which bodes well for her and her work.

She is efficient, but this house is her life. The kitchen is her sanctuary, and the awkwardness, even after 20 years of work for the Valdeses, seems to partly stem from the difference in emotional and intellectual levels.

The Valdes family is not one that consists of a bunch of airheads who take advantage of Raquel or mistreat her. The opening scenes have them proffering her a surprise birthday party, and even with this, Raquel keeps her margin of safety about her.

Oh, to be certain, she does have interac-

On, to be certain, tion with the family, mostly with their two children – a son whom with she flirts in a silly and fun way while carrying on constant warfare with the snippy and trite teenage daughter, Camila.

However, the lady of the house is soon suspect as to whether Raquel is still able to handle the workload of the

household and begins to hire a series of "helpers," none of whom Raquel is in the least bit interested in working with.

This house is her territory, completely, and no outsider is going to muscle in on that.

Not Mercedes, the first new hire that the family takes to immediately, but who Raquel successfully drives out of "her" palace.

Nor Sonia – tough as nails and a take-noprisoner type – with whom Raquel gets into a fight while the family is out. She successfully drives Sonia out, but collapses from exhaustion herself.

When she comes back to work, Raquel must now deal with the younger, smarter, kinder and chirpier Lucy, who was hired while Raquel was recovering and has already been adopted by the family.

Raquel's up to her old tricks, but nothing works on Lucy. Her bright outlook on life is something that mystifies Raquel, who slowly, very slowly, starts to look at things a little bit differently. A holiday away with Lucy's family finds her having a brief fling with one of Lucy's relatives. All in all, Raquel is finding that it is indeed time to lighten up.

"The Maid" is superbly directed by Chilean Sebastian Silva, who blends his quiet gray humor with real-life situations that allow us to follow and believe the story quite easily.

The unsmiling and brooding Raquel is well-played by Catalina Saavedra, and the supporting cast, without exception, does an exceptional job of quickening what could have been a tired look at a common subject.

Earth Day celebration encourages activism

Film society to screen three films Saturday

Beginning at 1:30 p.m. Saturday, April 17, the Mesilla Valley Film Society will screen three special films for an Earth Day celebration. Total running time of the films will be just over three hours, and there will be a short intermission between films.

"The Man Who Planted Trees" (1987, 30 minutes) is, quite simply, a masterpiece of animated art from gifted Canadian-German animator Frédéric Back. It is also a joyously uplifting chronicle of the generosity of one man who left his indelible mark upon the earth, and an affirmation of the enormous amount that can be accomplished through the dedication of a single person.

"The Man Who Planted Trees" tells of Elzéard Bouffier, a solitary shepherd who, through patience and perseverance over the course of nearly 40 years, single-handedly brings back to life a onceravaged and desolate region in the French Alps. A feast for the senses and the spirit, "The Man Who Planted Trees" is a gift to be treasured many times over by adults and children alike.

"The Man Who Planted Trees" is followed by "A Voice in the Wilderness" (60 minutes, 1993, updated in 2006), part documentary, part biography, part tribute. The film is a look back at author Edward Abbey's life as remembered by 16 of his closest friends and family members.

Images of the places Abbey loved and defended so fiercely are woven through-

out the program. They include Arches and Canyonlands National Park, Grand Canyon National Park, Zion National Park and the Desert Southwest. Rare film clips and interviews with Abbey combined with more than 120 rare and largely unpublished pho-


tographs offer an insightful look into the personal life and philosophy of this iconoclastic writer.

Following is "At the Edge of the World" (2008, 90 minutes). Controversial Canadian activist Paul Watson sets sail with a crew of 46 volunteers who draw on the spirit of piracy to protect the treasures of the sea.

Whale poaching is a lucrative trade, one that the Sea Shepherd Conservation Society is determined to put to an end.

The captain of the Sea Shepherd, Watson left Greenpeace behind in favor of operating by his own methods. The Jolly Roger flag that flies atop the ships serve as a symbol and a warning to poachers everywhere that the Sea Shepherd Conservation Society isn't afraid to get aggressive. As the crews of the Robert Hunter and Farley Mowat face mental and physical challenges, the viewer gets to see firsthand just how far some people are willing to go to save an animal's life.

Funny dangers of married life

'Date Night' film keeps audiences laughing after one little mistake

Ah, date night – that special occasion when a couple can escape the chaos of home and work and reconnect over potato skins, upcoming schedules and mimicking others. Or at least that's what it means to the Fosters.

In "Date Night," Phil and Claire Foster (Steve Carell and Tina Fey) are a loving couple who have fallen into a rut. Between their two rambunctious children and exhausting careers, the only time the couple can make for their relationship is through their book club – filled with hostile women – and date night.

They see no problem with their routine, until their dear friends, who everyone thought were happy, reveal they're getting a divorce. Fearful that they are heading for the same dismal fate, the Fosters try to shake up date night.

The New Jersey couple heads into Manhattan to eat at the latest and hottest restaurant, Claw, where soup costs \$50 and the host forgets you within 10 seconds. Denied a table at the fancy restaurant, the Fosters are cast aside to stand at the bar with the other unfortunate souls.

As Claire begins to throw in the towel and suggests heading

back to the quaint steakhouse they always visit, Phil refuses to admit defeat and hatches a clever, but misguided plan – take the reservation of a no-show couple, the Tripplehorns.

This is the first time the audience comes to realize Phil doesn't have very good

plans. Sure, sitting at their table, eating their luxurious risotto and enjoying their close proximity to Will.i.am seemed like a good idea – until two rough looking men in leather jackets ask them to step outside.

Thinking the jig is up and they have to admit they aren't the Tripplehorns and shamefully retreat back to New Jersey, the Fosters discover they aren't that lucky. The men, hired thugs, are there on strict orders to get back mob boss Joe Miletto's flash drive and kill the Tripplehorns.

Unable to convince the men they aren't the Tripplehorns

and realizing they can't go to the police, the Fosters must find the real culprits before they get "whacked off," as Claire puts it.

They turn to Claire's former real estate client Holbrooke (Mark Walhberg), a shirtless government operative who uses his many gadgets to help them find the Tripplehorns.

After locating the scoundrels, whose real names are Taste and Whippit (James Franco and Mila Kunis), the Fosters break into their apartment and retrieve the flash drive, following some ineffective trash talking.

Now, they just have to get it into the right hands before its


"Date Night" is full of hilarious and suspenseful moments, including an unbelievable car chase involving Holbrooke's Audi that becomes attached to a New York cab as well as some tantalizing robot dancing.

Director Shawn Levy, who was behind other family-related comedies such as "Cheaper by the Dozen" and "Just Married," puts together a great cast, which includes a low-voiced Common, Ray Liotta as the slimy mob boss and William Fichtner, who plays DA Frank Crenshaw, a corrupt attorney with a freaky side.

The belly laughs of the movie, however, come from Carell and Fey. Their obvious chemistry as comedians transfers well into their characters and adds a new twist on the typical marriage-in-trouble flick. In fact, they are so delightful and lovable that I left the theater wishing they were a real married couple.

You also have to admire the duo's ability to poke fun at themselves and those around them. I nearly died of laughter when they re-entered Claw, posing has hipster members of Will.i.am's posse and throwing around as much attitude as the snotty hostess

"Date Night" has plenty of elements that appeal to both men and women, with only a few moments that focus on the Fosters' relationship and marriage. But, yes, there was one overly sappy scene that caused the audience to fill the theater with awes of adoration.





No. 10: Add an area rug. Be sure it's big enough so the back legs of your chairs don't "hang up" in the rug as you move the chairs in and out. If you have enough room to allow 3 feet beyond the edge of the table, do it. You can also put an area rug on top of an existing carpet, to provide more color and design. There is a product called "Rug Hug" that can be put under the area rug to keep it from moving on the carpet.

No. 9: Add a drape. A simple top treatment or sheer will add more ambiance to your room. I know you've heard that before.

No. 8: Add slipcovers. Cover all of the chairs, or at least the two at the ends of the table. You can have a simple wooden chair and change its look totally with a slipcover.

No. 7: Add a table runner. This can be either the same as the drapery or reversible, with another

colored fabric. Don't forget other materials used for runners such as bamboo and mirrored runners. I found some beautiful shawls at Walgreens, of all places, that cost \$5 and look beautiful as runners.

No. 6: Paint the room. Some dining rooms have natural start and stop places for an accent color. If yours does, consider red, green, purple, rust, orange or charcoal. Co-

ordinate with something you have: a flower arrangement, the drapery, table runner, slipcovers or rug.

table runner, slipcovers or rug.
No. 5: Wallpaper the ceiling.
Yes wallpaper – it looks wonderful.
Today, papers can look like wood,
stone, faux finishes, bamboo and so
many other materials and textures.

No. 4: Paint the legs and apron of your dining room table. Pick a coordinating color such as black,

dark green, beige or rust. Coordinate the color with other items in the room. If your tabletop is light, go dark. If your tabletop is dark, go light. Try a crackle finish. You can find several finish applications that go over paint at the home stores.

No. 3: Change your chandelier. The proper size is about one-half the width of your table. I recently hung two chandeliers where one

would have normally gone, because the space was so big. The table and the room were very large. The chandeliers just fit the table. Consider a cord-cover for the chain. They too come in an assortment of fabrics and colors.

No. 2: Add crown molding to the ceiling (either foam or wood). If you have a step ceiling, add it on both steps. What a difference it makes to a room. And the No. 1 thing you might

do is sell your table and chairs on www.craigslist.com and turn the formal dining room into something totally different. Always wanted a library? Now you have one. How about a craft room, an office or an exercise room? If you have another space for dining (usually an eat-in kitchen) and you very seldom use the formal dining room, then consider how you might live without it. Would converting it to another use give you a more productive and useable room? It's only space! Take down the chandelier; put in a fan with a light, or track lighting, and proceed with your new space that was your old dining room.



Bakers' slippery delight

Wax paper uses extend outside of the kitchen

Ask any baker about the kitchen tools they can't function without and on that list will be wax paper.

Wax or waxed paper is moistureproof because it is coated with wax. The non-stick substance is the perfect surface for kneading breads, molding doughs and creating chocolate-dipped delights.

While wax paper is great for preparing baked goods, it shouldn't be placed into the oven, since it will smoke, burn and cause a mess. The paper, however, can safely be used in the microwave and is considered to be a great alternative to plastic wrap and aluminum foil.

In addition to its many cooking tricks, wax paper has other uses outside of the kitchen.

- 1. Get help with cake decorating: Want to create a visually appealing cake for that special someone, but your piping and decorating skills aren't up to snuff? Don't leave the work to the experts, instead get some help with wax paper. Using the cake pan as a guide, cut the wax paper into the shape of the cake. Pipe letters, flowers and other designs on the paper and place it into the freezer. After 30 minutes, the frosting should be frozen. Loosen the frosting with a cake spatula and place it on the cake.
- 2. Make a funnel: Avoid making a mess when filling small jars with narrow openings by fashioning a funnel out of wax paper. Cut the paper into a square and roll it up into a funnel shape, securing the edge with a piece of tape or your fingers. Place the small end of the funnel into the jar and pour in your spices, beads, whatever. For funneling liquids, layer the wax paper so the seams are offset and will be less likely to leak.
- **3. Protect your cutting board:** Prevent meat juices from penetrating the pores of your cutting board with the help of wax paper. Cover the board with several layers of the paper. After preparing the meat, throw out the paper.
 - 4. Temporarily fix your waffle iron:

If the nonstick surface of your waffle iron has begun to fade, you most likely will end up with messy, hard-to-remove waffles. Get a temporary fix to this cooking dilemma with wax paper. Place a sheet of the paper between the plates of the machine for a few minutes as it heats up. The wax from the sheet will transfer onto the plates, allowing the waffles to be removed with ease.

5. Easily uncork bottles: After a bottle of wine has been opened, it can be difficult to cork, uncork and re-cork. Next time, before re-corking the bottle, wrap the stopper in wax paper. The paper will make it easier to remove and will help prevent small bits of cork from falling into the wine.

6. Prevent rust: Stop your cast iron cookware from rusting with the help of wax paper. Rub a sheet of the waxy material over the cast iron skillet or pan after it has been washed, but while it is still

warm. Then store the item with a sheet of the paper between its pot and lid. The next time you take it out to use, it will be ready to go.

7. Store delicate fibers: Special fabrics, such as lace handed down through the generations, can become weak and decay when not properly stored or cared for. Keep these items intact with the help of wax paper. Store the fabrics with pieces of wax paper between each item. This will block damaging light and stop the transfer of dyes. Plus, the wax paper won't trap moisture.

8. Line refrigerator drawers: Stop soggy vegetables and leaky meat packages from creating a mess in your refrigerator by lining the drawers with wax paper. The sheet will catch debris, making cleaning the bins quick and easy.

9. Keep your cabinets dust free: Cleaning the top of cabinets that don't quite reach the ceiling can be a challenge. Instead of standing on a chair and twisting your arm, line the top of the cabinets with wax paper. The dust will collect on the paper, allowing it to be easily tossed out and replaced.

10. Line your craft area: Most children craft projects include glue or glitter, which can be hazardous to your furniture. Protect the work surface by lining the area with wax paper. The paper will prevent drops of glue from damaging the table or countertop. It also will catch left-over glitter, allowing it to be easily funneled back into its container.

11. Eliminate water spots: After frequent use, faucets and sinks can develop water spots. Keep them at bay with the help of wax paper. Clean the area, and then rub it with a sheet of the paper. The wax will rub off onto the faucet and repel water droplets.

12. Improve your car antenna: Dirt and dust attached to your car antenna can interfere with its reception, causing an unpleasant sound to emerge from your car speakers. One way to prevent this is by occasionally rubbing the entire antenna with wax paper, which will repel the grime. If you car antenna extends, this trick will help it from sticking.

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Dipping Chocolate

1 1/2 cups miniature semisweet chocolate chips (use pure chocolate chips)
2 tablespoons shortening

Place the chocolate chips and shortening in a 2-cup measuring bowl. Place the bowl into a larger bowl that contains very warm water, about 100 to 110 degrees. The water should reach only halfway up the 2-cup bowl with the chocolate.

Stir constantly with a small spatula until the chocolate is melted and the mixture is smooth, about 16 to 18 minutes – do not rush the melted process. If necessary, replace the water with more very warm water.

with more very warm water.

Remove the 2-cup bowl with melted chocolate from the water and continue to stir until all the chocolate is cooled slightly, about 2 to 3 minutes.

Place a strawberry, banana, pretzel or other treat on a fork and dip into melted chocolate. Gently tap the fork against side of the bowl to remove any excess melted chocolate. Place the item onto baking sheet lined with waxed paper and repeat.

If the chocolate becomes too thick for dipping, place the bowl containing the chocolate into the bowl with warm water until desired consistency is reached. (Recipe adapted from www.recipezaar.com.)

CAA finishes first affordable green LEED-certified homes

Five families move into their new, energy-efficient houses next week

When most people think of affordable housing, they picture a square box filled with bare walls and hard floors. The Community Action Agency of Southern New Mexico, however, sees a different image.

Through its Sierra Norte Green Homes Project, the CAA set out to dispel the negative connotation associated with affordable housing.

"As an agency, we wanted the houses to look as nice as they could and still be affordable," said CAA Housing Director Douglas Campion. "We wanted to change the perception of what an affordable house is."

Campion and his team of builders and local craftsmen began constructing five homes located off Sonoma Ranch Boulevard in July 2009. Along with being visually appealing, Campion said the agency wanted its affordable homes to also be green.

"When the project first set out, we wanted to shatter the affordable home idea and make them environmentally friendly," Campion said.

Now completed, the new homeowners will move into three-bedroom, two-bathroom homes next week. Campion said each of the five residences have five different green certifications, including Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design, Build Green New Mexico, National Association of Home Builders Green, Department of Energy Builder's Challenge and Environmental Protection

Agency's Energy Star.

"They're the first LEED-certified affordable green homes in New Mexico," he said

Since this was the first project of its kind conducted by CAA, Campion said it was a learning experience.

"At times it was complicated, especially with five individual green certifications," he said, adding that he is still completing the required paperwork for each certification.

To make the homes special, Campion said each were designed to fit the lot and include various upgrades and green features, such as water-efficient landscaping, finished garages with insulated doors, tankless water heaters, high-efficiency ventilation systems and Energy Star windows and doors.

"I said, 'For the price, let's get as much bang for our buck as we can,'" he said.

While two of the homes feature pitched roofs and a contemporary design, three of the homes were built in a Southwest fashion and include flat roofs.

To make the houses – which range from 1,200 square feet to 1,380 square feet – feel more custom and specialized for each family, Campion said the homeowners were involved in the entire construction process.

"It ultimately will be their home so I wanted them to be involved in every phase," he said, adding that they chose the cabinetry, countertops and colors of the landscaping, carpet and tile.

He said the carpenter also worked with each owner to design the closets to fit their needs. "They've all said that they are happy to be part of the process," said Albina Ceballos, administrative assistant for CAA's Asset Development department. "It made them feel like it's their own home."

Ceballos worked with the homeowners through the CAA Individual Development Account program, which is a matched savings account that can be used for various items including their down payment.

The program also offers financial literacy classes to teach participants how to maintain a budget and purchase bigticket items.

Throughout the educational courses, Ceballos said the homeowners would share pictures of their homes and stories about their experiences.

"What they expressed to me is that they're glad they already know their neighbors because they all worked together," she said.

Through the project, Campion said CAA has been able to acquire talented local craftsmen who will have a better approach to constructing a green home.

"I'm really proud of how (the homes) turned out because they're as nice as any custom home in the area," he said. "It's a richly rewarding experience to work with first-time homebuyers."

With such a successful first run, Campion said CAA will continue the affordable green homes project in the future with a better understanding of what is required of them.

"We want to continue this process," he said. "Now that we have experience, we know which green certification is best for the environment and home type. The CAA now has skills to design a home that will more easily achieve green certification ... It's not hard once you learn how to do it."

Plant flowers to bring butterflies to your yard

Butterflies are truly the upside of the world of insects, delighting us with their fanciful flight and markings reminiscent of stained glass. They are mesmerizing as they dance in the breeze on a summer morning and alight on a bright flower awash in sunlight.

Chancing upon such fascinating creatures is pleasing. But you can attract them rather than relying on serendipity by choosing the flowers you plant in your garden and designing it with butterfly needs in mind.

There are a few things that will help every butterfly garden. The sun should shine on it five to six hours a day, but it should be protected from the wind. A small

puddle or pond will allow you to provide a water supply for thirsty butterflies. For the butterflies' safety, don't use insecticides in your garden.

The plants you choose depend on what butterflies you'd like to attract. A good way to begin your garden is to do a little research on what butterflies live in the area and which you'd like to see. Choose plants that are native to the area.

Do your homework, be creative and soon you'll be enjoying a yard full of butterflies.

If you'd like to attract painted lady butterflies, for instance, there are a variety of flowers from which to pick, according to www. butterflywebsite.com. To provide a home and food for the caterpillar, you could plant thistle, daisy or hollyhocks, to name a few. And plant aster and zinnia to supply nectar for the butterfly.

Monarch caterpillars favor milkweed and butterflies are attracted to buddleia. Common buckeye caterpillars do well with snapdragon and loosestrife and their butterflies with carpetweed. Mourning cloak caterpillars like a variety of plants, including elm, willow and wild rose, while the butterfly finds butterfly bush and shasta daisy alluring

Do your homework, be creative and soon you'll be enjoying a yard full of beautiful butterflies.

Let's do lunch

Traditional lunchbox sandwiches get an upgrade

When it comes to lunch, I'm lazy and not inventive. I often throw together a crunchy peanut butter and jelly (or banana) sandwich. Boring. I scarf them down to ward off hungry tummy groans. And I certainly can't afford the expense to dine out every day.

Inexpensive fast food isn't a choice. Processed offerings taste too salty and bland. The grease is unforgiving and the whopping calories ghastly. Two hours later, I feel bloated and sleepy.

Recently, however, I lunched

Recently, however, I lunched with a friend at a local bistro. Ten bucks for a Basiled Chicken and Brie Sandwich. Ouch! Fortunately and gratefully, my friend doled out the dollars for this delicious entrée. The seasonings were savory, spicy and memorable.

Unable to polish it off, I doggy bagged the remaining half and devoured it the next day at lunch. This simple meal kept my tummy happy until dinnertime. That's when I decided to thumb through my cookbooks for sandwich ideas – recipes that are exciting and imaginative and when prepared, flaunt oodles of flavor and zest to keep me going till the dinner bell rings.

Southwest Club Wraps

"In this scrumptious wrap, you'll find all the flavors of a good club sandwich, plus the addition of a little heat and creamy avocado. You may never go back to the original version." – Barbara Pool Fenzl, cookbook author, "Seasonal Southwest Cooking," Northland Publishing 2005

1 teaspoon chopped chipotle chile in adobo sauce 1/4 cup mayonnaise 4 (10-inch) flour tortillas 12 turkey breast, thin slices 1 cup Hand-Mixed Guacamole (recipe below) 1 cup tomato, seeded and diced 8 slices bacon, cooked crisp and chopped 1 cup alfalfa sprouts 2 cups lettuce, finely chopped

Combine the chipotle and mayonnaise in a small bowl. Spread 1 tablespoon on the surface of each tortilla. Cover the mayonnaise with thin slices of turkey breast (about 3 per tortilla) and spread about 1/4 cup guacamole over the turkey. Sprinkle tomato and bacon pieces over all and top with sprouts and lettuce. Starting from

the bottom of each tortilla, roll it in a tight roll. Slice the roll in half diagonally and decoratively place two pieces on each serving plate. Makes 4 servings.

Hand-Mixed Guacamole

2 ripe Haas avocados,
peeled and pitted
2 teaspoons fresh lime juice
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1 serrano chile, seeded and diced
1/4 cup tomato, seeded and diced
1 teaspoon tomato, finely chopped
1 teaspoon garlic, finely chopped
2 tablespoons green onions, diced
1/4 cup sour cream

Note: To ripen hard avocados more quickly, put them in a brown paper bag with a ripe banana (bananas give off the same ripening gas as avocado) and store in a dark place until they are soft enough, usually 24 to 48 hours.

In a medium glass or ceramic bowl, mash the avocados with the back of a fork. Sprinkle with lime juice, salt and mix again. Add serrano, tomato, garlic, green onions and sour cream and stir until mixture holds together. If not using right away, place plastic wrap on the surface of the guacamole (air is what causes it to turn brown) and refrigerate. Bring it back to room temperate before serving. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Spicy Tuna Salad Lettuce Wrap

2 (6-ounce) cans waterpacked albacore tuna
1 carrot, chopped
1 jalapeño, seeded and chopped
1 stalk celery, chopped
1/2 cup walnuts, chopped
2 green onions, chopped
2 tablespoons fresh
parsley, chopped
2 tablespoons mayonnaise

In a medium bowl, mix together the tuna, carrot, celery, walnuts, onion, parsley and mayonnaise. Serve immediately or refrigerate and eat later.



Sandwiches, especially the lunchbox variety, don't need to be boring. Get creative. A little spicy dab will do the trick.

For each Lettuce Wrap: 1 serving Spicy Tuna Salad 4 Romaine or Boston lettuce leaves 1/4 ripe avocado, peeled and sliced 2 tomato slices, cut in half 4 thin slices zucchini Handful of sprouts

Place the tuna salad on one leaf of lettuce. Add avocado, tomato, zucchini and sprouts. Roll up. Repeat with remaining lettuce leaves. Makes 3 servings.

Muffaletta, Sorta

This sandwich is based loosely on the New Orleans version of an overstuffed deli sandwich, in the same family as a hoagie or hero. (Adapted from "Serves One," Toni Lydecker, Lake Isle Press, second edition, 2005.)

3 to 4 pickled hot pepper rings 3 pitted green or black olives, chopped 1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil 1 teaspoon white wine vinegar or balsamic vinegar

1 round sandwich roll, such as a Kaiser split 2 thin slices fresh or smoked mozzarella cheese

(about 2 ounces)
4 to 5 slices Italian cured
meat (about 2

ounces), such as

Genoa salami or prosciutto) Shredded lettuce

In a small bowl, combine the pepper rings, olives, olive oil and vinegar. Tear some of the soft bread from the cut sides of the roll; discard or use for another purpose.

Spread the olive-pepper mixture on the cut sides of the roll. Top the bottom half with the cheese, meats and lettuce. Place the other half of the roll on top. Makes 1 serving.

Salsa Chicken Breast Sandwich

1 baked chicken breast, shredded 5 to 6 ripe Roma tomatoes, chopped 1/2 cup onion, chopped

4-6 serranos, stemmed, seeded and chopped 1/2 cup cilantro, chopped 2 teaspoons salt (or to taste) Juice from 1/2 fresh lime

Combine the chicken, tomatoes, onion, chiles, cilantro, salt and lime juice in a sauce dish. Stir well. The salsa tastes best it you let it set an hour before serving. Wrap in a tortilla or a Romaine lettuce leaf or heap it between a sliced Kaiser roll.

Spicy Black Bean Sandwiches with Chipotle Mayo

1 tablespoon reduced fat mayonnaise 3 tablespoons nonfat sour cream or nonfat yogurt

2 teaspoons canned chipotle peppers in adobo sauce, chopped 1 (16-ounce) can black beans, rinsed and drained

3/4 cup red onion, chopped 3 tablespoons fresh cilantro, chopped 1 clove garlic, finely chopped 1 tablespoon mild chili powder 1 teaspoon ground cumin 2 tablespoons freshsqueezed lime juice Salt to taste

2 large squares corn bread, sliced horizontally* 1/2 small head iceberg lettuce, shredded 1 ripe avocado, pitted, peeled and sliced

1 ripened tomato, cored and sliced In a small bowl, stir together mayonnaise, sour cream and chipotle peppers. Set aside.

In a large bowl, combine black beans, red onion, cilantro, garlic, chili powder, cumin, lime juice and salt. Lightly mash the beans while stirring, until all ingredients are incorporated and the mixture just holds together (or use a food processor and pulse until it comes together)

Toast the corn bread slices. When they are toasted, remove them and slather the top piece with some of the chipotle mayonnaise. Then put on a couple of slices of avocado and some tomato (or lettuce). Pile on some of the black bean mixture and cover with the bottom piece of cornbread. Turn sandwich over. * If preparing for your lunchbox, skip toasting the cornbread or wrap in a wheat flour tortilla or spoon into pita bread slices. Also tastes good sandwiched between a sliced asiago bagel.
