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Miyagishima shifts stance on racetrack

Mayor says plan is viable if move becomes inevitable

At the end of the Monday, Aug. 2, City Council meeting, Mayor Ken Miyagishima reported that Ann McGovern, general manager of Ruidoso Downs Race Track and Casino, told him that Las

Cruces remains the preferred location for moving the horse racetrack and casino.

Saying he felt it was important to share the conversation with the councillors, Miyagishima said his talk with McGovern made him think about possible locations, especially in light of Sunland Park Racetrack & Casino's promise to cut off support for New Mexico State University if a competing racetrack is in a 50-mile radius. Miyagishima said he thought a possible location for the racetrack in Las Cruces could be at the West Mesa Indus-

His statements were reported in the Las Cruces Sun-News Tuesday, Aug. 3, the same day as the Ruidoso Free Press reported seemingly conflicting statements.

In the Free Press story, Miyagishima is quoted as saying he didn't want the racetrack to move – noting that Las Cruces is much hotter in the summer than Ruidoso - and that no one from the city government was actively pursuing the question of attracting the racetrack.

"This is one of few times that you see a mayor saying we don't particularly see a business come into our area," Miyagishima is quoted as saying.

In an interview Wednesday, Aug. 4, with the Las Cruces Bulletin, Miyagishima said his comments were in the

Private shelter extends pets' time

Director says more owner responsibility needed in Las Cruces

The dogs and cats that find their way to the Safe Haven Animal Sanctuary can truly be

Privately run by a nonprofit organization, Safe Haven is the area's no-kill shelter. It doesn't take any animal, nor does it allow just anyone to adopt one of the dogs and cats in its possession.

We do have the luxury of being selective," said Lorna Harris, Safe Haven's executive director.

The Safe Haven compound is located on the far East Mesa and is currently home to a little less than 30 animals.

Charles Burns, who was a dog trainer before becoming the shelter's manager twoand-a-half years ago, said most of the shelter's animals were surrendered by the owners for a variety of reasons.

For example, assistant manager Rebekah Coffing tells how one couple became too elderly to properly care for Tinker, their 12-year-old Chihuahua that is well-behaved and simply needs a good caring home for an older dog.

Harris recalled how an owner dying of cancer gave his dog to the shelter, which gave him

City votes to take over Moongate Water

Council starts condemnation process to end costly lawsuits

After years of battling Moongate Water Co. over service areas on the East Mesa, the Las Cruces City Council is moving ahead on a legal action to take over the private water system.

Over the years, there have been numerous lawsuits between Moongate and the city, costing the city more than \$1 million, attorney Kurt Wihl told the council Monday, Aug. 2.

To bring the seemingly endless litigation to a close, Wihl recommended the city begin a condemnation process that would force Moongate to set a price for its system for the city to purchase if the courts agree to the public need of the eminent domain action.

Wihl laid out the foundation for the need by saying Moongate was depleting the Jornada Bolson – a major underground aquifer primarily north of U.S. Highway 70 – without recharging it. Although the city's wells tap from the same aquifer, the city is taking actions to have more surface water provided with recharge back into the aquifer.

According to Utilities Director Jorge Garcia, the goal is to have ground water sources like the Jornada Bolson be used only during peak water usage.

In a press release Tuesday, Aug. 3, from Moongate, the private water company – which pioneered water service to the East Mesa in 1971 – contends the city is a greater drain to the Jornada Bolson than Moongate and that

the city's efforts to tap the aquifer prompted many of the company's legal actions.

The city "pumps more water from the Jornada basin than all other water providers combined," the release stated. "Moongate, not the city, has acted to provide water to those on the East Mesa whose shallow wells have been made unusable by the city's pumping of its large production wells."

Wihl also said there is a public safety concern in that he claimed Moongate does not provide adequate water supply and pressure to meet fire-flow standards - especially for

context of a proposed business retention tax question in Lincoln County.

Miyagishima told the Bulletin that, to him, the race-track is central to Ruidoso's identity as a community.

If voters in Lincoln County don't pass some kind of tax incentive or break to keep the racetrack viable in the mountain community, then the racetrack's owners will probably have no choice but seek a new location.

Should that be the case, "we'll be more than happy to roll out the red carpet," Miyagishima said.

Despite Miyagishima's conversation with McGovern, there are two other communities also being considered – Clovis and Alamogordo, with both doing a little bit more than getting the red carpet ready.

The Ruidoso racetrack move was brought up during an Alamogordo City Commission meeting last month on a proposed Gross Receipts Investment Program (GRIP) that offers a gross receipts tax break to entice businesses to locate or stay.

Reportedly, Clovis has already offered the track an incentive package, which was cited as a reason for the Alamogordo commission to act on the GRIP ordinance. Because commissioners couldn't agree if the idea should be put before voters, the GRIP proposal was tabled.

During his statements Monday, Aug. 2, to the Las Cruces City Council, Miyagishima noted that he was aware other communities have submitted proposals to lure the track, but he said McGovern "made it pretty clear to me that Las Cruces remains their top priority."

In the Ruidoso Free Press story, Downs owner R.D. Hubbard said the lure of Las Cruces is its large population without a nearby tribal casino. Hubbard blamed casinos run by the Mescalero Tribe for cutting into the racetrack's customer base with a lower state tax rate than that assessed against the racetrack.

The lack of a tribal casino in the Las Cruces area could change with the recent re-submission of a request to the Interior Department from the Jemez Pueblo to open a casino in Anthony, N.M.



There wasn't time to think about whether or not to kill the intruder. I figured it needed to be killed, and that we could discuss later whether or not we should have killed it.


The snake was tough as I whacked at it, just behind its evil head, until it quit biting at the hoe, although its writhing body continued to twist on the warm concrete.

Future of Medicare remains uncertain

I write because many of our senior citizens who depend on Medicare for their very survival don't know that the Medicare they worked for all of their lives to earn is facing an uncertain future.

Across the country, many physicians have already made the difficult decision to reassess their willingness to treat Medicare patients. Some turn away new Medicare patients, while others have dropped Medicare patients altogether. Their decisions are due, in large part, to decreasing Medicare reimbursement rates.

Why is this happening? Medicare law specifies a formula for calculating the annual update in payments for physician's services, based upon the annual percentage change in the gross domestic product. Beginning in 2002, this formula, called the Sustainable Growth Rate (SGR), resulted in updates that were actually cuts to physician reimbursements instead of increases. As of June 1, physicians faced a cumulative cut of 21 percent.

On June 7, seven days after the 21-percent cut to Medicare payments started, the Senate began consideration of a bill that could have stopped the 21 percent cut to Medicare payments. On

June 18, the Senate was able to pass a six-month extension to the SGR to prevent the cuts. On June 24, after some House delays, the Medicare fix was passed and signed into law. This extension replaced the pending Medicare cuts with a 2.2 percent retroactive increase in reimbursements, until Nov. 30.

However, we must remember that the 21-percent cut to Medicare physician reimbursements has not been eliminated. It is simply delayed until December. Unless Congress acts in a timely manner to fix the flawed SGR formula then we are back at square one and the cuts will continue to grow.

Because of this, several Las Cruces physicians have already dropped Medicare.

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A look at legislative pay and busted state budgets

A curious correlation: Higher pay means larger state revenue shortfalls

Are New Mexicans getting their money's worth out of our 112 state legislators? A recent report indicates we may be getting a very good deal indeed.

The Illinois Policy Institute looked into the range of salaries paid to state legislators across the country and found that the states that pay their lawmakers the most also have the highest budget shortfalls.

The average budget shortfall for the states with the top 10 salaries is more than 30 percent. The average for the bottom 10 states is less than 19 percent.

Data used for this study is from the fiscal year that ended June 30. I reported to you

recently on data ending June 30, 2009. California ended its 2009 fiscal year with a 49 percent budget gap. This year, it was 65 percent. New Mexico's figures were a 6.3 percent gap last year and 22 percent this year.

California pays the highest legislative salaries in the nation at \$95,291. Other states in the top 10 are Michigan, New York, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Massachusetts, Ohio, Alaska, Wisconsin and New Jersey, which pays a salary of \$49,000.

The bottom 10 in legislative compensation are New Mexico, Utah and Texas with no salary. They are followed by Mississippi, South Carolina, Nebraska, North Carolina, Rhode Island, Arkansas and Louisiana with a salary of \$16,800.

New Mexico, Utah and Texas all pay mileage and per diem to their lawmakers, but so do many states that pay salaries.

Other factors also enter into the correlation of legislative pay with budget deficits. The states that pay the highest salaries also have the longest legislative sessions, many lasting for most of the year.

How much more work and higher quality work does this produce? Maybe not much because there is no incentive to finish their work until the final days when they hold lengthy sessions on nights and weekends just as New Mexico does.

New Mexico's 90 days of regular sessions over a two-year period make almost every minute count. Our lawmakers find it necessary sometimes to hold special sessions, but so do the legislatures that meet for longer.

If a legislature is going to meet almost year round, it becomes necessary to pay a salary since its lawmakers can't hold a regular job. That has become a problem in at least one state – New York – with one of the biggest budget shortfalls in the nation. It has suspended its own pay since April, forcing many members to borrow money in order to survive.

One other factor relating to the correlation of pay and budget deficits is that the 10 states with the highest legislative pay also are some of the wealthiest in the nation in terms of household income. Evidently the wealth of a state has an effect on how far it can fall during a recession.

New Mexico's good sized budget shortfall has caused both gubernatorial candidates to stop banging on each other and come up with some plans to plug our budget hole.

Both have promised to reduce the number of political appointees. That is the most popular budget cutting device currently mentioned. Reportedly, cutting back to the level of exempt employees at the end of the Gary Johnson administration is most often mentioned. That is said to save about \$8.8 million a year.

Another popular cut is the sale of the state jet, purchased in 2005 for \$5.5 million. Martinez is for it. Denish says this is a bad time to sell because so many similar jets currently are on the market.

Here's an idea. We could sell the jet and maybe the turbo props too and charter flights when absolutely necessary. Former GOP gubernatorial candidate Allen Weh has a very successful worldwide charter service I'm sure they could use.

But then, Weh aired a campaign ad during the primary indicating he would use his pickup to get around the state.

Efficiency is energy key

Saving energy much more affordable than creating new generating capacity

Adding new electric generating capacity is expensive. Data from New Mexico's largest electric utility, PNM, shows that it costs \$150 per megawatt-hour to add new natural gas power generating capacity, \$140 to add coal power, \$130 for nuclear, and \$85 for wind. New generation is so costly that whenever new capacity is added electric rates go up.

By contrast, installation of energy-efficiency measures costs about \$20 dollars per megawatt-hour saved, according to PNM. In other words, electric consumers save somewhere between 75 percent and 87 percent when we invest in efficiency rather than building new electric plants. Efficiency also largely eliminates the pollution, health, noise and landscape impacts that come with new power generation.

Energy efficiency should be an equal partner with renewable development in our policies, but currently gets short shrift. New Mexico law requires that 20 percent of our year 2020 power generation from investorowned utilities come from renewable technologies, but asks for only a 10 percent improvement in energy efficiency during the same time period.

the same time period.

It's easy to see how this came to pass.
The cost of wasting energy seems inconsequential for years until consumers are hit with the cost of a half billion dollar generating facility to meet growing demand. We are lulled into complacency. In contrast, the cost of implementing efficiency measures hits immediately. Locked in a cycle of false economy, we balk at making the \$2 efficiency investment today and instead are forced into a \$10 generation investment tomorrow.

We can dramatically improve adoption of energy efficiency without expensive government programs or raising overall utility rates. All it takes are revenue neutral changes in the way we charge for power. Water utilities in El Paso, Santa Fe and, to a lesser degree, Las Cruces have all experienced success using this strategy to reduce water usage. It is time we applied the same common sense to our gas and electric utilities.

Power companies have historically charged lower rates to high usage customers. The theory was that it is less expensive

per kilowatt-hour (kwh) to service big consumers. If you look a few years out that theory falls apart. That profligate neighbor down the street who runs the air conditioner with the windows open, and never turns off the lights or the TV, is the same guy who makes it necessary to add expensive new electric generation. In return for his low bills, that guy costs everyone else a bundle. To add insult to injury, the low cost of wasting electricity has given home builders and appliance makers little incentive to design efficient products. That has further inflated our energy bills.

inflated our energy bills.

Three pricing strategies for residential customers have the power to drive market based energy efficiency that will result in lower future utility bills.

lower future utility bills.

Inclining block rates: An example of this billing model would be charging residences 10 cents per kwh for the first 400 kwh of monthly power usage, 20 cents for the next 400 kwh, and 30 cents per kwh for any additional usage. While total billings would be no higher than charging a flat 20 cent rate, the savings for eliminating high cost usage above 800 kw h makes adopting efficiency measures very attractive. Installing sun shades, compact fluorescent lighting and efficient appliances suddenly becomes a fast payback. And that guy down the street? Odds are he will stop running his air conditioner with the windows open.

Decoupling: This strategy has been implemented successfully in 12 states. Utilities currently earn more money the more power they sell. This has encouraged marketing practices that entice consumers to use more electricity. Decoupling allows regulators to tie utility revenues to the number of residential customers served – rather than kwh delivered – through a monthly billing adjustment. This gives utilities the opportunity to earn just as much money by selling fewer kwh, insulates consumers from big swings in energy costs during unusually hot or cold years and maintains a stable bottom line that allows utilities to continue reliable service.

Eliminating fixed monthly charges: If my monthly electrical bill is \$80, but \$20 comes via a fixed monthly charge, my efficiency efforts can only affect the remaining \$60 on my bill. The fixed charge penalizes consum-

ers who conserve electricity by effectively charging them more per kwh consumed. It also puts a bigger burden on low-income consumers. Since the data tells us energy efficiency is the surest route to minimizing monthly utility bills and long-term prices, regulators should require utilities to minimize fixed monthly charges and tie all charges to energy use instead. Better yet, eliminate fixed monthly charges altogether.

The good news is that utilities such as PNM and El Paso Electric are more amenable to implementing inclining rates and decoupling than they have been in the past.

The bad news is they threaten to undo the benefits of these strategies by pushing for higher fixed-monthly charges.

The Public Regulation Commission can help contain utility price increases, improve our environment and put money in your pocket by requiring implementation of all three pricing strategies. Adopting phased-in implementation of these strategies in annual increments would give utilities and consumers time to adapt while giving regulators an opportunity to adjust to any implementation surprises. It is the best favor the commission can do for New Mexicans and our economy.

Local leadership shows lack of trustworthiness

City's actions leave partners scrambling

In the last month, I have had a front row seat to a controversy where the Las Cruces leadership has acted improperly. At stake are millions of dollars and jobs for our local economy. Also at stake is the reputation of our city with companies wanting to do business, but unsure if the city leadership can be trusted.

Several years ago, a golf course to replace the Las Cruces County Club course was built on the East Mesa as the centerpiece to a large development. Last year, a road was put in

by the developer of the project to the golf course, but the city council said a second road was necessary for the facility to be used. So the golf course has sat as a stranded asset for a long time using water but not generating tax revenue. Concurrently, the Las

Concurrently, the Las Cruces Public Schools (LCPS) decided to build an elementary and a middle school near the golf course, in part to use a planned four-lane road for access and the water and sewage development. The first de-

veloper left the project unresolved and the current developer, who has been in the community for 20 years and has successfully done several large projects, tried to find a win-win method to resolve getting the development project done while providing infrastructure for the schools.

The stimulus money that might have built the \$10 million 2-mile, four-lane road with the water and sewer was lost when the funds dried up last year. So late last year, the four-lane road was planned using a financing method called a Special Assessment District. This is an often-used method of privately financing infrastructure development.

Staff members at both LCPS and the city, along with city bond counsel, the city finance director and the single property owner/ developer in the Special Assessment District, worked diligently and reached detailed agreements in January. The Las Cruces City Council reviewed the proposal and voted 7-0 in favor of a resolution to get the private funding for the Special Assessment District finalized and the road completed. Detailed descriptions and surveys of the property to be

assessed to pay for the project were sent out for an independent appraisal after the council's unanimous vote.

Then, inexplicably, and without any notice to LCPS staff or the business people funding the Special Assessment District, in an early April work session it became clear that six city councillors, all speaking from what seems the same talking points, reversed their January positions so the project stalled. The schools have moved as quickly as they could and hope to have a temporary two-lane road to their schools. But in doing so they have had to spend money they had not intended to lose to the

infrastructure cost.

Thousands of hours of planning and untold dollars spent in good faith were squandered. These six councillors left LCPS, local area residents, the business people providing the financing and all local unemployed road building and construction workers in the lurch. During the April work session, only the mayor tried desperately to avert the disaster.


On the talk show I host with Jim Spence, "News New Mexico," Mayor Ken Miyagishima attributed the problem to the "inexperience" of

the other six councillors as well as misinformation fed to councillors by still unknown parties. The mayor also made it known for the first time that the school district would lose out on a \$1 million reimbursement commitment from the Special Assessment District property owner so now the schools must spend their own money and the temporary road will be removed when the real four-lane road is finally built.

Confirming the details of this was LCPS associate superintendent Herb Torres. Local businessman John Moscato, representing the sole property owner providing the assessed property for the entire road building project also confirmed what Miyagishima had said.

What is obvious at this point is that this is no way for the City of Las Cruces to do business. Many other companies will be watching to see if the city can be trusted to stand by their word. One thing is for sure, this time they did not.



LCAR opposes wilderness act

Real estate group adopts position on proposed legislation

At its regular monthly meeting on Wednesday, July 28, the Board of Directors of the Las Cruces Association of Realtors Inc. voted unanimously to support the position of the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce, the Building Industry Association of Southern New Mexico, Elephant Butte Irrigation District, and People for Preserving Our Western Heritage in opposition to the Organ Mountains

– Desert Peaks Wilderness Act as cur-

According to the group's press release, LCAR shares the concerns of these organizations that the act would create more than 380 square miles of wilderness "where Border Patrol and other law enforcement agencies would be denied access for routine patrol." The group cited the position of the National Association of Former Border Patrol Officers, which said "the risks are far too great that illegal entry and dangerous drug and human smuggling activities would escalate."

The release said the LCAR board strongly believes that designating wilderness on or near the US-Mexico border would have a negative impact on national security and the economy of Doña Ana County.

ward without the needed fire-flow, leaving East Mesa residents isolated from businesses. Councillor Sharon Thomas, whose district is primarily on the East Mesa, agreed that the fire-flow concern limits services available to East Mesa residents.

East Mesa residents - from Baylor Canyon Road to the Talavera subdivision - spoke out against the action, saying they are satisfied with Moongate's service, water quality and low prices. Las Cruces Mayor Ken Miyagishima contended that an improved fire-protection rating would save East Mesa residents on their homeowners insurance and offset the cost

The Moongate press release stated its service exceeds requirements set by the state Environment Department, Public Regulation Commission and the Office of the State Engineer as well as exceeds fire-flow standards for city- and countyregulated subdivisions.

Residents at the City Council meeting remained skeptical with many of their questions unanswered, especially on questions about rates for rural water usage.

Cynda Zavaski, who lives near Baylor Canyon Road, said she is concerned the city would charge her a significantly higher rate because she needs water for livestock in addition to her residential usage. Another East Mesa resident, Alan Call, said he also was concerned that he'd end up paying a lot more to water his small grove of trees.

Some of the Talavera residents are suspicious of the city's motivations behind the action, saying the acquisition of water service could be the first step toward unwanted annexation.


Moongate's press release said it shared the residents' lack of trust with the city. The company contends it provided water service to residents that the city previously refused and that the action is meant to squash a 2004 lawsuit in which the company accuses the city of "cherry-picking" high-density developments in the Moongate service area.


Miyagishima and councillors – except Miguel Silva who cited a conflict of interest and didn't participate in the discussion or action – say the action is a first step in the process to acquire Moongate's water system, which the city would be forced to acquire in the future if the company ever folded.

Wihl said the condemnation process would require that a fair market value be assessed for Moongate's assets and, should the company not agree to be bought out, then the question would be taken to court for a final decision.

Miyagishima and councillors said this action would be a better use of taxpayer money in the long run than continuing litigation with Moongate.

In other action, the council approved extending the grandfathering clause to 2012 for residents and businesses to come in compliance with its lighting ordinance because the standards are currently still being revised.





No-kill shelter will take time Animal rights group gives advice to effort

By Jimmy Currier

The Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley put down 9,346 animals last year.

Dr. Beth Vesco-Mock, director of the Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley, said she knows that number remains too high. Although she wants the euthanization rate to decrease and for Las Cruces to become a no-kill community, Vesco-Mock realizes it is a formidable objective.

'What I'm looking toward is a no-kill community," she said. "I don't think the community understands that when the shelter becomes no-kill, it means the community is no-kill."

Vesco-Mock explained that a nokill community means that adoptable animals aren't put to death.

Vesco-Mock and animal advocates are one step closer to having a no-kill community after a town hall meeting Tuesday, July 27, at Las Cruces City Hall. Representatives from the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA) listened to residents' concerns and said the city's animal groups should work together.

"How do we get people in the community to work together instead of finger pointing?" asked Tami McReynolds, Community Initiatives Director for ASPCA. "How do we professionally manage to get everyone in the community to work for the shelter?

We need a change in mentality."

Vesco-Mock said she was encouraged by the dialogue at Tuesday's meeting. "I think this is a stepping stone," she said. "That's why I invited this group. I

asked them to bring a team out here to accomplish this goal. It's going to take time and not going to happen overnight, unfortunately, but I am encoured officials. aged to see new faces in the room that

I have never met before." Bob Villenueve, who lives a mile

outside of Las Cruces, volunteers with the animal shelter and fosters kittens. He was pleased with the meeting.
"I just want to see everybody on

the same page. I don't want to see any friction," he said. "In the past there's always been friction on one side or the other. I want everybody to work together. There are so many animal enthusiasts in this county. If we all worked together, it would be amazing.

'Unfortunately, it doesn't happen all the time. Dr. Beth Vesco-Mock is trying real hard to get everyone together. There are enough people to do the job.

While the ASPCA can provide resources to help control the animal population and ultimately reduce animal euthanizations, a partnership with ASPCA is not a pre-requisite to begin working collaboratively.

There are lots of activities to work on together. Find one thing to work together and partner on that," said Kate Pullen, ASPCA senior director. "Work on one goal and test the collaborative manner."

Bill Hart, who operates Southern New Mexico Basset Hound/Beagle Rescue, asked how could the people motivate the elected officials to see that there is an animal population problem and euthanasia is not the answer.

"How do we motivate our elected officials to see this is a serious problem?" he asked.

One idea Hart shared at the town hall was having the county and city partner with some of the big-box retailers and local merchants to offer a \$20 gift card for having their pet spayed or neutered.

Karen Medicus, ASPCA senior community outreach director, said it's important to work with the elect-

"Build relationships with councillors and commissioners," she said. "Focus on working smarter, not harder. The most expensive thing we can do is house animals in the shelter. It's a lot cheaper if we put some of those resources into spaying and neutering. Keep them out of the shelter."

In 2009, the shelter took in 15,060 animals and euthanized 62 percent.

That's a big number and it's disgusting," Vesco-Mock said. "The goal is to slowly reduce the euthanizations so we're not euthanizing based on space. The problem is we had too many come in.

Vesco-Mock said 1,700 cats were euthanized last year for being feral, 1,200 dogs were euthanized because of behavior and 280 pit bulls were put to death because of space.

"Pit bulls don't have much of a chance," she said. "We put 280 down last year to free space. There was nothing wrong with them. They weren't dog-aggressive, human-aggressive or sick.

Unfortunately, animals are very disposable in Doña Ana County, Vesco-Mock said.

"We won't reach the goal of being a no-kill community until the intake slows down and the people in the community learn that animals aren't disposable, but living creatures and have the right to live," she said.

One way to reduce the intake, Vesco-Mock said, is to have animals spayed and neutered.

peace of mind knowing his dog would be cared for until it found a new home. They usually do, Harris said, with an average stay of about three months.

Burns recalled when he first started working at Safe Haven, there were a few animals that had been there a few years, and he's made a push to get these longer residents new homes – a goal he's been able to accomplish so that the longest stay is now at a year.

Formed in 1996, Safe Haven is supported by its thrift store – located at 144 Wyatt Drive - which will have a sidewalk sale Saturday, Aug. 28. It also gets support from donations, fundraisers and the occasional grant, but receives no government funds, Harris said. Because more people shop at thrift stores during hard economic times, she said Safe Haven's finances are holding their own.

A real need, besides finding

good homes for the pets, is "dedicated" volunteers, she said, at either the thrift store or at the shelter to help with such things as giving the dogs walks.

Nevertheless, Safe Haven's nokill mission makes it a costly service. The animals get good medical care and food, she said.

The shelter also gets help from some in the community. For example, Burns has been able to nurse four kittens back to health with the help of Las Cruces Animal Hospital, where the weak and sickly litter was left.

That story illustrates how far the community still has to go from treating animals as disposable rather than a responsibility.

Four grants given statewide

The New Mexico Congressional delegation announced that four airports in the state have been awarded grants through the Federal Aviation Administration, including the Las Cruces International Airport.

Aztec Municipal Airport will receive a \$1.2 million grant for reconstruction work on runway 8/26.

Three other airports were awarded grants to conduct a Wildlife Hazard Assessment at the airports. The assessment will gather data on the wildlife that occupy the airport property. The data will help to identify the different species and will provide insight on their daily/seasonal activities, populations and their local movements. The Las Cruces and Clovis airports will receive \$95,000 each and the Grant County Airport will get \$100,000 for the assessment.

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School tax break on this weekend

Annual shopping holiday can save parents big bucks

It's that time of year again when the State of New Mexico foregoes collecting some taxes to keep back-to-school shopping in the state.

The annual New Mexico Gross Receipts Tax Holiday starts just after midnight Friday, Aug. 6, and runs through the weekend and ends at midnight Sunday, Aug. 8.

During this weekend, the state suspends collection of gross receipts tax on sales of qualifying items, which means back-to-school purchases can be tax-free.

For the purchases to qualify as tax-free, clothing or shoes must be priced at less than \$100 per unit. The price limit for desktop, laptop or notebook computers is \$1,000, and for related computer hardware it is \$500. School supplies for use in standard, general-education classrooms must be under \$15 per unit. There are items specifically excluded by statute in all categories. Those items are always taxable.

Tax-free clothing includes aerobic clothing, aprons, baby clothes, diapers, belts, bibs, blouses, boots, bras, caps and hats, coats, overalls, cowboy boots, most gloves, shoes, dresses, ear muffs, mittens, graduation caps and gowns, hosiery, jackets, jeans, jerseys, lingerie, nightgowns, pajamas, pants, ponchos, shirts, shorts, skirts, slacks, sleepware, socks, stockings, suits and sports coats, sweaters, ties, T-shirts, undergarments such as long johns, underwear, most shoes, windbreakers and wraps.

Computer-related items include disks, most computer parts such as the keyboard and hard drive, computer printers, paper and ink cartridges and computer speakers.

School supplies include backpacks, binders, book bags, school-related books, calculators, clipboards, construction paper, daily planners, flash cards, glue, high lighters, index cards, most paper, notebooks, markers, pencils, pens, poster board, lunch boxes, scissors and a variety of art supplies.

GOP AG candidate critiques King

Chandler: Sitting AG did nothing to fight corruption

Republican candidate for state attorney general Matt Chandler, a prosecuting district attorney like GOP gubernatorial candidate Susana Martinez, sees the office as essential to clean up state corruption that has plagued Gov. Bill Richardson's administration, as well as the Democratic-dominated Legislature.

"We've had an epidemic of corruption," Chandler said during a visit to Las Cruces. "I firmly believe that politics has been put before the people."

As a prosecutor in Clovis, Chandler said he made his reputation fighting corruption – taking more than 30 cases to court since his DA election in 2004, including when it involved members of his own political party.

But Democrat incumbent Attorney General Gary King has not been aggressive in pursuing political corruption cases, Chandler said.

"In fact, a blind eye has been turned to it by the AG's Office," he said.

According to Chandler, the AG Office should be leading the charge in prosecuting the kind of pay-to-play deals and other kinds of politically motivated or assisted fraud.

"The attorney general is intended to be the chief law enforcement officer in the state," he said.

Despite scandals since the start of the Richardson administration, King has yet to prosecute a corruption case, Chandler said. And that hurts everyone in state government, he said.

"I know there are honest people in state government," Chandler said. They deserve to have something other than government scandal as the lead news story almost daily, he said.

King's inaction on whistle-blower lawsuits also doesn't encourage them

to speak out against corrupt practices, Chandler said.

Chandler's website notes that state Rep. Joseph Cervantes "is on record as taking the current attorney general to task for his inaction on these whistleblower claims."

But King's passions are more political than prosecutorial, Chandler said. Too often, he said, the attorney general position has been a stepping stone into larger politics for some and a political resting stop for others.

"If people elect me, they'll get a career prosecutor, not a career politician," he said

In a recent guest column posted on NMPolitics.net, Chandler acknowledged Roberta Vigil as the only corruption case King has initiated and resolved within his

four-year term.

"Vigil was convicted of two felonies after blowing thousands of school money on a party," Chandler wrote. "This convicted criminal was facing more than four years in prison, but when it was all said and done, she walked out of the courtroom with probation and no time behind bars."

Chandler's website notes that in 2006, the New Mexico Bar Association named him as "New Mexico's Law Enforcement Prosecutor of the Year" for his ability to work with law enforcement officers and his reputation for fighting crime.

Chandler said the AG Office, under King, has not been very transparent and accountable. It's outreach has been lackluster, so people's understanding about what the office does is poor, he said.

Police issue 94 tickets in one afternoon

Most citations were issued for cell phone law violations

A traffic enforcement operation conducted Tuesday, Aug. 3, along Missouri Avenue netted 51 citations for violating the city's cell phone ordinance and another 43 citations for other offenses.

The operation was conducted between 1:30 and 5 p.m. along Missouri Avenue between Payne Street and Don Roser Drive.

Las Cruces Police officers cited 51 motorists for violating the new municipal ordinance that prohibits drivers from using a cell phone without a hands-free device.

Among the citations, two motorists were arrested after officers discovered one had an outstanding warrant and another was driving on a suspended license.

The city's cell phone ordinance went into effect Feb. 5. The penalty for violating the ordinance is \$92. That includes a \$56 fine plus the \$36 mandatory court fee.



The ordinance prohibits cell phone use while driving within city limits. The ban includes engaging in a phone call or creating, sending and reading text messages or email while operating a motor vehicle.

Engaging in a conversation on a cell phone is permitted within city limits if the driver is utilizing a hands-free device and the use does not interfere with the safe operation of the vehicle.

Not counting Tuesday's operation, the Las Cruces police have issued 274 citations from Feb. 5 through June to motorists who violated the city's cell phone ordinance.

Despite rumors to the contrary, Herb "Touchdown" Taylor, the Aggies' senior associate athletics director, has a job after all.

"Be sure to put in there we schedule at least five years ahead of time," Taylor said. "If you wait too long, it is almost impossible to find teams to fill available dates."

"I telephoned Arizona recently to see if they were available in 2013," Taylor said. "They are booked through 2017.

Taylor and Boston try to book at least six home games a year for NMSU. On even numbered years, the Aggies can play 12 games. On odd numbered years, when they travel to Hawai'i, they can schedule 13.

When Boise State agreed to bolt the WAC to join the Mountain West Conference in 2011, it created an additional headache for NMSU.

Ag football drills begin on Aug. 11

At 3 p.m., Wednesday, Aug. 11, Kenny Turner's long wait ends.

That's when the highly publicized running back joins New Mexico State's team for its first football practice of the 2010 season.

Until he signed with NMSU last March 3, Turner was considered a recruiting risk. He was hands off, despite his recording phenomenal numbers as a running back at Fullerton, Calif. Community College in 2009.

"It wasn't my ability that kept them away," Turner said. "It was my past."

The list of interested parties was extensive. Teams like Iowa State, Arkansas State, Illinois, Utah - interested at first, but in the end,

In 2002, after his sophomore year as a promising wide receiver at Olympia High School in Orlando, Fla., Turner was involved in gunplay on the Orlando streets. He spent five years in several federal prisons, charged with a second

Following his release in 2007, he enrolled at Fullerton. Then came two knee injuries, the last one requiring surgery. Turner endured extensive recovery before returning to football in

He rushed for 1,513 yards, scored 15 touchdowns and averaged 6.4 yards a carry. He averaged 126.1 yards rushing per game and helped the Hornets to a 10-1 record

Laroche's family has never seen him play collegiate basketball in person. That will change Tuesday, Aug. 10, when the Aggies play McGill University and Vanier College in Montreal.

New Mexico State will play McGill again on Wednesday, Aug. 11, and also play Dawson College. On Thursday, Aug. 12, the Aggies face a professional team.

They're (my family) going to feel proud and I'm going to feel great (playing in Montreal)," Laroche said.

"It's not just my parents, but most of my family and a lot of my family from New York is going to come to Montreal to watch me play."

Laroche said he knows most of the guys from McGill and Vanier. While they haven't had contact, Laroche said they know he is

coming.
"All the guys are going to try to put on a show and show them how D-1 basketball is," he said. "I just want to be back home and have a great show over there."

Onthegreen: Your questions answered

About 'going low,' range specials and motivating girls

After reading about a couple of PGA players shooting 59s in the last few weeks, I'm wondering what's going on. It reminds me a little of major league baseball where they fostered the home run fests to promote fan appeal. What say you?

Rudy G., Las Cruces

My take is that the golf courses for nonmajor tournaments are so perfect, and the greens roll so smooth, that anything is possible. And everyone knows the ball is "hot"

these days.

Jack Nicklaus and Gary Player have talked about using a PGA Tour only ball, which would be different than a consumer ball, for that reason.

For players on tour, par fives are the starting points for going low. Most par fives are reachable for the pros, so they're starting with an advantage of several under par, in most cases. Eagles are nice bonuses. If the greens

are soft and receptive, as it appears they were for the Greenbrier tournament – where Stuart Appleby shot 59 in the final round and won – guys can hit it close.

Earlier in July, Paul Goydos shot 59 at the John Deere Classic, but they were playing lift-clean-and-place conditions. Back in 1977, Al Geiberger was the first player to officially shoot 59. It was like breaking the four-minute mile, since other pros then knew it was possible. Chip Beck did it in 1991 and David Duval shot 59 in 1999.

Interestingly Pia Nilsson, the former Swedish national golf coach, established a program some 10 years ago called "Vision 54," so named because she thought a perfect score of 18 under par was doable.

It may be.

A junior golfer recently posted a tournament score of 57. If we consider the larger picture of human performance, in the context of both Olympics and professional sport, the top performers are going higher, farther and faster. Records are broken every year. As the bar continues to get raised, golf will be

no different. Plus, as the PGA Tour says so often, "These guys are good!"

I'm just starting to get into golf and I think I should probably go to the range and practice more. But I get so self-conscious, thinking everybody's looking at me thrash away in my currently inept way. Just call me "range-shy."

Dear "range-shy," you're not alone. Lots of folks feel that way, while unrealistically overestimating how much they are being observed. The truth is other golfers around you are mostly so engrossed with what they are doing, or trying to do, that they aren't paying attention to you.

The two public practice golf ranges in town are at Sonoma Ranch and at the New Mexico State University golf complex. Both are fairly wide open, with good turf and inexpensive buckets of balls.

Starting this week, on Tuesday and Thursday evenings, you can get golf tips at the range at NMSU. From 5 to 7 p.m., the teaching staff from the pro shop will be out helping golfers and sharing their skill and knowledge right there on the range. The beauty of the evening of free coaching is that you won't have to flail away at balls not having a clue about what you should be working on, as so many range players end up doing. For the Tuesday and Thursday evenings, you can hit unlimited range balls for only \$10. In addition, the beverage cart will be coming around with drink specials. Maybe that will loosen you up.

I have a 14-year-old daughter who is learning to play golf and shows some promise. One of her friends plays on the high school golf team and she thought it looked pretty neat, so I bought her golf clubs and she took a few lessons. She goes to the range once a week and plays nine holes. She's athletic and can hit fairly long drives, but then struggles from there; she hasn't broken 110. I want her to do well, and have fun, but now

I'm frustrated. How can she get better and play right along with the other girls?

Dear "frustrated," you raise an interesting issue: How do we get young girls interested enough in golf to want to go out and practice until the sun goes down? The fact is that golf is a sport that is relatively hard to learn, and long hours of practice are required to become any good at it. The golf swing is actually fairly simple, but the game itself is difficult, since it has so many facets and nuances.

In his groundbreaking book "Outliers: The Story of Success," Malcolm Gladwell identified the "10,000-hour rule" as the sine qua non of being at the top in any competitive field, whether it be music, computers or sports. After making an exhaustive study of thousands of successful people, Gladwell concluded that true expertise and mastery (as in playing the violin, for

example) required no less than 10,000 hours of work and practice before rewards would come your way.

That's basically working at it nearly every day for something like five to six hours over a span of maybe six or seven years! The Asian girls (especially the Koreans) don't seem to have a problem with that. American girls do. And maybe American parents do. It appears that in the case of Tiger Woods, since early toddlerhood, the 10,000 hours was only a start.

Frankly, I haven't decided which is best for kids: for parents to push them really hard; or to just leave them alone and let them motivate themselves. Fewer and fewer kids are self-starters. It seems there are so many distractions in our culture that it's hard for a kid to get zealously focused and become singularly goal-oriented. For that reason I lean toward pushing, but only up to the point when it is reasonable and not overpowering, smothering or abusive.

Your daughter needs to understand that to get good at anything you need to practice, practice, practice and play, play, play. Arrange for a regular teacher, and keep trying to get her interested in learning more about the game — it's history, the rules, the professional tours, the stars and possible role models. There seems to be one constant associated with this year's Aggie defense and his name is Davon House. Every preseason magazine and online conference preview I have seen lists No. 4 in Crimson as one of the WAC's best defensive backs.

House came in from Palmdale, Calif., during the Hal Mumme era and has flour-ished under all of the defensive schemes he has been thrown into. House is certainly one of the highest scoring DB's in Aggie history, returning interceptions and recovered fumbles for touchdowns three

for touchdowns three different times. He led the conference in pass breakups and interceptions last year en route to a spot on the first team All-WAC, a first for NM State in football.

House was a quick learner as a freshman when he was paired with Marvin Betts, a senior who saw real potential in House.

"He's young but can do it all," Betts said in a radio interview. "He is

going to be one of the best here for sure," Betts added back in 2006.

The touchdowns House has put on the scoreboard have come in dramatic fashion, both plays put House into the NM State record book. During his freshman year, he plucked an Idaho pass in the Vandals' end zone and took it the length of the field tying a record set in the early 1980s by Dennis Owens. Last year, House snagged a pass in Aloha Stadium that ricocheted off a receiver and swerved through the rest of the Hawai'i tacklers to the end zone.

That return put him first for yards gained off an interception, a record that was held by Michael Hall.

House is able to make these types of plays because of his football instincts and quickness. Those qualities have enabled him to stay in the

opposing receivers' pattern, forcing most quarterbacks to look elsewhere for downfield yardage.

I met House's folks on a road trip and realized immediately where he got his outgoing nature. Kevin and Sheltne House were strolling down Kalakaua Avenue in Honolulu Saturday morning proudly wearing their son's replica jersey. The warmth of their greeting to a fellow Aggie made me feel "at home on the road."

House's development as a junior could be traced to the coaching from Mike Rutenberg and the "guru" of defensive back coaches DeWayne Walker. Drills start soon for House's senior year at Aggie Memorial. It promises to be a gateway to another bright future for an NM State athlete.

First step: The football players fundraising telethon raised \$10,000 for the football program. Most of the money came from previous players. Sometimes all it takes is a simple phone call to reconnect with those who want to help.

Staying in compliance

Reams of paperwork involved in keeping NMSU athletes eligible

Aug. 3 was a very important and exciting day for me. My wife Ashley probably thinks I am talking about our anniversary and although that was important, Aug. 3 also signified the start of the 2010-11 year for compliance.

As a compliance staff, we had the privilege to meet with 28 women's soccer student athletes including 12 newcomers. Over the next two weeks, we will meet with 450 student-athletes including 150 new students. During these couple of weeks, we have the opportunity to speak with returning student athletes and meet all of the new Aggies. Some of the incoming student-athletes we have met during their official visits, some we have spoken to on the phone and others we only know by their high school or college academic record.

Over the next four to five years these incoming freshmen will be the leaders of our athletic department, of their respective teams and leaders in different capacities throughout the university.

The compliance staff spends all spring

The compliance staff spends all spring and summer preparing for the arrival of the new student athletes and tracking information about their incoming eligibility, their high school scholarships and their amateurism.

Although this time of year is extremely busy for the compliance office, it gives us an opportunity to take a break from sifting through cell phone records, analyzing practice logs and reviewing travel records. During the initial team meetings, each student athlete is asked to complete 20 pages of forms about themselves including standard information such as address, date

of birth and more in-depth information such as what kind of car they drive, where they were employed this summer, have they ever modeled for a business, have they ever appeared on television, etc.

The current NCAA manual includes 420 pages of rules and regulations that New Mexico State must comply with as a member. The compliance staff will spend the next few weeks reviewing each form that was completed by each student-athlete – totaling more than 9,000 forms that must be reviewed and followed up on before a student athlete is allowed to compete.

I have read the NCAA manual several times and although as a member of the Las Cruces and Mesilla Valley community you are not allowed to purchase a meal at a restaurant, buy school supplies or provide a student-athlete transportation, I can guarantee you there is no NCAA rule or regulation prohibiting you from telling a student-athlete "welcome to Las Cruces and New Mexico State University."

As the compliance staff at this great university, we do our best to monitor the entire athletics program, including all of the 450 student athletes, but as can be seen on a daily basis this task is too great for any one office. We appreciate the support you show our student-athletes by attending their events, purchasing tickets and wearing Aggie merchandise, but if you ever have a question about something being permissible, I remind you of our slogan "ask Aggie compliance before you act."

Before I forget, I did want to wish my wife a happy anniversary and as always – go Aggies!

Tough schedule awaits Knights

With few starters returning for Oñate High School, coach McKee is uncertain about the season ahead

The Oñate Knights began last football season with exclamation marks.

They were talented. They were experienced. They were contenders.

The Knights enter the 2010 season with question marks.

Coach Kelly McKee does know that he returns only four starters (two on offense, and two on defense) and that his team's schedule is extremely challenging. The Knights open the season at El Paso Franklin on Friday, Aug. 27.

"I would have liked to have played this year's (pre-district) schedule with last year's team when we had returning starters all over the place, and played last year's (pre-district) schedule with this year's team," McKee said.

"We have a very aggressive schedule this year. We open with Franklin and Americas, and play both Rio Rancho schools, and they're both loaded.

"But sometimes, you can't pay too much attention to schedules."

Last year, the Knights finished with 9-3 record, making it to the state quarterfinals.

When McKee and his coaching staff enter practice next week, most of their attention will be on finding players

and putting them in the best positions possible.

The only returning starters on offense are offensive linemen Angelo Pacheco and Jeff Stewart. Pacheco, who played center

last year as a junior, will be one of the offensive tackles this year, while Stewart is a guard.

Two players battling for the quarterbacking duties are senior Lawrence Sanchez and junior Raymond Carbajal. Because of the inexperience at quarterback and the lack of a dominant fullback, the Knights will run less option plays this year, McKee said.

"We may be running more traditional running plays this year," McKee said. "In the past,

the quarterback and the fullback led us in carries. That won't be the case this year."

Sanchez could also see some time at running back, where he will be joined by senior Ty Muldrow and juniors Aaron Esquibel and Cesar Chavez. McKee likes the group's speed.

"We may be inexperienced, but we have really quick backs," the coach said. "As a group, they may be the quickest we've ever had. I just don't know if we have the power to go with it."

On defense, only linemen Tyler Gilliland and Jose Hernandez return as

starters. McKee said the coaches expect good things from middle linebacker Henry Lesai in the 4-3 scheme.

"We're completely inexperienced at linebacker and in the secondary," McKee said. "We may turn out to be very good, just inexperienced. We have a lot of question marks to be answered."

McKee said it's difficult to know what to expect from this year's seniors. He said predictions based off of how they did as junior varsity players aren't

always accurate.

"We've had junior varsity teams that don't do very well come up to varsity and play well," he said. "So that's never been a very good indicator for us. This senior group won only three games as freshmen (3-6 record).

"Now we'll get to see how much they've improved over the past three years."

"Hey," he said, "if you have any kids you want me to counsel or talk to, let me know.

"We'll have to be careful and balance our practice schedule," Walker said. "We play 12 straight games without a week off.

"We'll have two or three days where we hold walkthroughs in the morning and full practices in the

Turner spent July in Las Cruces, going through NMSU's summer conditioning drills. He is currently back in Fullerton and will return when practice begins.

"The heat," he said. "I haven't forgotten the heat back there.

"I thought coach Uribe (Gary, NMSU's strength and conditioning coach) does a good job. My knee held up fine."

After Turner suffered the first

knee injury at Fullerton College, he re-injured it in 2008, making a cut on a kickoff return. The knee then required surgery.

'I don't even wear a brace on the knee anymore," Turner said.

He believes NMSU has winning potential. "They have a good, hard work ethic," he said.

The offense and defense are both good. Everybody wants to win. Credit coach Walker for that.

'One of the reasons I came here was coach Dunbar (Mike, the Ags' offensive coordinator). He knows what he's doing."

Turner's dream is playing in the NFL, where Chris Johnson, his high school teammate, stars for the Tennessee Titans.

"I don't only hope to play in the NFL," Turner says, "I will play in the

New Mexico State swimming and diving head coach Rick Pratt and the Aggies hope to build on a program-best runner-up finish at the 2010 WAC Championships and are looking ahead to the 2010-11 season.



Culture at large affects quality of kids' education

Schoolhouse lessons can influence your adulthood

You've been somewhat critical of America's public schools in recent years. Who do you hold accountable for what has gone wrong?

I share the concern of many others about falling test scores, increasing violence on campuses and the high illiteracy rate, among other serious problems with today's schools. But I am not quick to blame educators for everything that has gone wrong.

The teachers and school administrators

who guide our children have been among the most maligned and underappreciated people in our society. They are an easy target for abuse. They are asked to do a terribly difficult job, and yet they are criticized almost daily for circumstances beyond their control. Some of their critics act as though educators are deliberately failing our kids. I strongly disagree.

We would still be having serious difficulties in our schools if the professionals did everything right. Why? Because what goes on in the classroom cannot be separated from the problems occurring in culture at large.

Educators are not responsible for the condition our kids are in when they arrive at school each day. It's not the teachers' fault that families are unraveling and that large numbers of their students have been sexually and/ or physically abused, neglected and undernourished. They can't keep kids from watching mindless television or R-rated DVDs until midnight, or from using illegal substances or alcohol. In essence, when the culture begins to crumble, the schools will also look bad. That's why even though I disagree with many of the trends in modern education.

I sympathize with the dedicated teachers and principals out there who are doing their best on behalf of our youngsters. They are discouraged today, and they need our support.

You've said that schools need to have enough structure and discipline to require certain behavior from children whether or not they have a natural interest in the subject being taught. Then you must favor a very structured, teacher-led program, where student behavior is rather tightly controlled. Why?



pare a young person for later life. To survive as an adult in this society, one needs to know how to work, how to get there on time, how to get along with others, how to stay with a task until it's completed and, yes, how to submit to authority. In short, it takes a good measure of self-discipline and control to cope with the

demands of modern living. Maybe one of the greatest gifts a loving teacher can contribute to an immature child, therefore, is to help her learn to sit when she feels like running, to raise her hand when she feels like talking, to be polite to her neighbor, to stand in line without smacking the kid in front and to do English when she feels like doing soccer.

I would also like to see our schools readopt

reasonable dress codes, eliminating suggestive clothing, T-shirts with profanity, etc. Guidelines concerning good grooming and cleanliness should also be enforced.

I know! I know! These notions are so alien to us now that we can hardly imagine such a thing. But the benefits would be apparent immediately. Admittedly, hairstyles and matters of momentary fashion are of no particular significance, but adherence to a standard is an important element of discipline. The military has understood that for 5,000 years! If one examines the secret behind a championship football team, a magnificent orchestra or a successful business, the principal ingredient is invariably discipline. Preparation for this disciplinary lifestyle should begin in childhood.

That's why I think it's a mistake to require nothing of children - to place no demands on their behavior – to allow them to giggle, fight, talk and play in the classroom. We all need to adhere to reasonable rules, and school is a good place to get acquainted with how that is



More than 1,000 athletes enjoy 2010 Senior Games in Las Cruces

The 2010 New Mexico Senior Olympics Summer Games were a success. That's how Cecilia Acosta, executive director of the New Mexico Senior Olympics, described the five-day event in Las Cruces that concluded Aug. 1.

This was the fourth consecutive year the Senior Games were held in the City of the Crosses. Twelve of the 32 games have been held in Las Cruces. At the Senior Games, 1,086 athletes competed in 30 events, ranging from horseshoes to Pickleball and javelin to swimming.
"(The games were) a giant

success," Acosta said. "They truly were a success. The games just all came together."

Acosta cited the volunteers, the weather and the logistics as factors for success.

"I think that seniors can get around pretty easily to the venues so they can do multiple sports," she said. "The game shuttle was an added service that helped seniors get around a little quicker and go do another sport."

Don't just take Acosta's word – the comments from several athletes and volunteers who participated said the games were a hit.

"The Olympics are well organized. There's nice people and great weather," Avi Fuerst said. "It's fabulous. Last time it was hot, but today it's great weather. There's also a lot of good restaurants."

Fuerst took three gold medals back to Albuquerque, winning the 20K bicycle race, Pickleball singles and Pickleball doubles.

Barbara Hayes, Francis Donald and Maureen Knightly, all from Santa Fe, had glowing remarks for the Senior Games.

The games are well organized and the people are friendly," Donald said.

"The views are beautiful and we love your mountains," said Hayes.

"This is a well-run event and we are enjoying ourselves," Knightly

Hayes, Donald Knightly competed in table tennis, while Knightly also competed in horseshoes, for which she took home the gold in the 65-69 age group. Knightly won bronze in singles and doubles table tennis and with Donald picked up the gold medal in mixed doubles.

More than 300 volunteers helped make the games a success, Acosta said.

"Volunteers are very essential," she said. "They are the backbone of running the tournament. It takes a lot of bodies - everything from retrieving soccer balls and Frisbee discuses thrown out. An amazing number of bodies are needed to

keep the event running smoothly."

"I try to help out and volunteer at as many events as I can," he said. The shuffleboard is competitive. I love to see the competition. It's amazing.

There's the track competitions, but it's nothing like this," Martinez said. "If it's close to the line and the competitor wants that point, they want to get that point. They are so well-versed in the rules and regulations."

Martinez and Jimenez talked fondly of watching the athletes compete and seeing the smiles on their faces.





Quite often, people tell me about startups and small businesses they would like to create. Some of their ideas sound very feasible. Others are just "dream"

Still, there are plenty of talented, dedicated and intelligent people out there that are thinking about making the leap to entrepreneurship.

Most, however, will never end up following through with their ideas. Some opt out of starting their own

business because of the inherent risk involved. Regardless of what funding is out there, you have to pay to play, and that means possibly losing a huge capital investment.

Others swear by their idea. They say their invention will revolutionize a par ticular industry or product, but they don't have the means to manufacture it.

And if you're like me, you've tossed around dozens of ideas in your head, done your own internal feasibility studies and have written it down on a piece of paper or in a document somewhere, only to be forgotten years later.

A friend of mine spent the better part of two years trying to devise a plan to create a "universal salsa top and dipping bowl." Sounds corny, I know. His idea was to create a salsa top that would fit on different brands and act as a dipping bowl

When he was finally ready to get serious about it, he first tried to register the concept with the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office. His idea was already taken. In fact, conceptual designs of the product were readily available online.

As bummed out as he was, he decided to take a different approach. He knew he wanted to work for himself one day, so he set out on a course to find a product or service that would be a good fit for the local market.

He first went to the Doña Ana County Small Business Development Center, 2345 E. Nevada Ave., where he sought out the advice of small business advisers.

The folks at the SBDC are extremely knowledgeable and helpful. Best of all, they're honest.

SBDC helps its clients develop a business plan to start a new business or make an established business more efficient. Most importantly, it can assist people in

Spaceport branches out

Local businesses encouraged to fuel supply chain

By Todd G. Dickson

Because Spaceport America is located in the desert between Las Cruces and Truth or Consequences, it will be left up to businesses in surrounding communities to provide support services, such as providing communications and spare parts.

Fortunately, Las Cruces already has a supply-chain model in White Sands Missile Range for envisioning what services and products will be needed.

That's why most of the panelists at the July 29 Las Cruces Spaceport Community Council meeting said they had the experience necessary to help local businesses.

The panel was moderated by Charlie Garcia of Trax International, a corporation that provides extensive engineering and technical support services to WSMR.

That same kind of information technology and engineering support is going to be needed for Spaceport America once it's fully operational, Garcia said.

With the NASA space program seeking more private industry providers, Spaceport America's viability is no longer a question of "if," he said. "It will happen."

Garcia said the trend in government at all levels is to increasingly form public-private partnerships. One of the most promising areas for such partnerships is in renewable-energy services, he noted.

Garcia said his company is interested in Spaceport America because it has the expertise and capabilities to support it in a number of areas, such as coordinating telemetry and tracking with the adjacent missile range in more traditional rocket systems.

Gary Aschbacher of FastWave.Biz said he expects to help the spaceport and its customers be able to move large amounts of data - be it imagery from the launches and spaceflights or raw measures of onboard systems and experiments. His business specializes in moving data by microwave and transmitting it via the Internet, he said.

FastWave's service is especially attractive to isolated rural communities where other transmission options are limited by the lack of DSL, fiber optics and other below-ground infrastructure. Spaceport America, to avoid having mishaps damage local property or injure people, is in one of the least populated

"It's in the middle of nowhere for a reason,"

Aschbacher said his business already has gotten a taste of the spaceport's opportunities in its work with UP Aerospace for its sounding rocket launches from Spaceport America. He admitted his company didn't make a lot of

Hit a snag? Let NMSBA do the work

State program offers free technical assistance to small business owners

Have a manufacturing problem that requires a brilliant, intuitive solution?

Or maybe your inventory management is out of control and you need to streamline your shipping and delivery process.

Most small businesses lack the intellectual capital and expertise required to tackle complex situations or technical hiccups, but there's a state program designed to help small business owners bridge that gap.

"People have either not heard of us or they're confused about who we are and what we do," said Leigh Schutzberger, project manager for the New Mexico Small Business Assistance Program (NMSBA). "The goal of (NMSBA) is to bring the technology and expertise of our (national) labs to small businesses."

Schutzberger highlighted the program during the monthly meeting of the Mesilla Valley Economic Development Alliance Tuesday, Aug. 3, at Hotel Encanto de Las Cruces.

The program was created in 2000 through the Laboratory Partnership with Small Business Tax Credit Act, which earmarks \$4.8 million each year to Sandia National Laboratory and Los Álamos National Laboratory to run the program. The program is designed to create mutually beneficial relationships between the state's small business community and national laboratories.

In 2009, \$4.3 million was used to support 320 small businesses in 25 counties throughout the state, mostly in rural areas.

We have an emphasis on rural economic development," Schutzberger said.

The only county in New Mexico identified "urban" is Bernaillo, Schutzberger added.

The program is offered at no cost to forprofit businesses located in New Mexico that are U.S. owned and operated. Businesses in "rural" counties qualify for up to \$20,000 worth of assistance.

"The funding covers everything from lab staff hours to technical consulting," she said.

"That much funding means a lot to a small business.

"Roughly, for about \$5,000, you get about 40 hours of a scientist or engineer's time."

The program is aimed at helping small businesses create and retain jobs, increase revenue, decrease operating costs, make more investments in New Mexico goods and services and procure new funding opportunities.

'It doesn't just have to be for product development," Schutzberger said.

Although the program has lax requirements, project selection is a competitive process.

"Over the years, we have gotten so many applications that we had to (develop) a ranking process to identify projects with the best chance for success and economic impact to the state," she said.

The NMSBA program helped Bill Reeves, owner of Allied Medical Technologies, bring an innovative new technology to the market. Thanks to help from Sandia, the company hopes to roll out a rapid healing device that uses silver nanotechnology delivered by a DC micro current in the near future.

NMSBA also helped Firefly Lighting Inc., a Santa Fe company, expand their \$1 million market and increase production of their line of standardized fixtures for big contracts that included the Buffalo Thunder Resort.

Albuquerque entrepreneur Dennis Salazar used NMSBA to help manufacture a new invention, ICE-LOC, a product that uses highperformance flexible tube to protect pipes from freezing in the winter.

"Don't be afraid to ask for help. Be humble and transparent and people will go out of their way to help you," Salazar said.

Project applications can be submitted to NMSBA any time of the year, although Schutzberger advises that business owners first contact NMSBA to see if their project idea is viable. Businesses can fill out applications for assistance from the program's website, www. nmsbaprogram.org.

Assistance is offered in three categories: individual, leveraged and contract based.

Individual assistance is offered to one business while leveraged projects allow multiple small businesses that share the same technical challenges. Funding for leveraged projects can be up to \$100,000 per laboratory. Contract projects allow the NMSBA to partner with other entities that provide small business assistance services not available in the private sector.

Schutzberger said since the program started in 2000, 1,020 jobs have been created and retained with a mean salary of \$39,063. Businesses helped have collectively increased their revenue by \$39 million and cut \$28 million in

finding the financial resources and assist in the application process for business loan assistance. Once a business is off the ground, the SBDC (www.nmsbdc.org/lascruces) also offers assistance in marketing, financial statement analysis and cash flow projecting. The SBDC regularly hosts workshops and events tailored for small business owners. Most, if not all, of the events are listed in the Las Cruces Bulletin's Business Agenda.

A similar organization, SCORE (www. scorelascruces.org) is made up of experienced business and not-for-profit experts and is ready to help. SCORE counselors serve their clients in face-to-face sessions, over the Internet, in seminars and workshops, and all of its services are free.

SCORE, located at 505 S. Main St., offers business startup counseling, business plan assistance, business loan assistance, a "Start Up Business Kit," business seminars and workshops for nonprofits.

WESST Corp., a nationwide organization originally created to help minority and


women business owners, offers business assistance to all from its local office at 2907 E. Idaho Ave. WESST also helps clients start or expand a business, with a client base ranging from contractors, hair salons, spas, maintenance companies, consultants, manufacturers, jewelry-makers, artists, designers and many others. WESST offers a free orientation at 10 a.m. every Monday morning, although reservations must be made in advance by calling 541-1583. WESST's services range from \$5 to \$10 an hour.

Lastly, the Arrowhead Center at New Mexico State University offers help to more established clients – that is, people with a solid, proven business plan that want to take their business to the next level.

The folks at Arrowhead's Entrepreneurship Institute can conduct complex marketing and feasibility studies, market and industry and similar services, with the help of students and computer modeling programs. Arrowhead targets those with businesses that deal with engineering, science and technology.

So, if you're ready to pull out those old notepads and get back to the drawing board – help is here.

Pecan Workshop slated

Extension to host grower's event in September

The Doña Ana County Extension Service is supporting the pecan industry with its first Pecan Workshop, scheduled for Sept. 8-10.

Extension will conduct educational sessions the first two days at Hotel Encanto de Las Cruces and field trips on Friday to the Young Pecan Plant, Achen and Arnold Pecan Farms and the Levendecker Plant Science Research Center, said Extension Horticulture Agent Jeffrey Anderson.

This short course is basically for people getting into the pecan orchard business and people with orchards who need a refresher course on their pecan-growing skills," Anderson said.

The Wednesday, Sept. 8, morning educational program will cover pecan botany, economic trends and outlook and pecan orchard site selection and design.

The educational specialists will be Richard Heerema, Extension pecan specialist, New Mexico State University; Jose Peña, Extension economist, Texas A&M University; Robert Flynn, Extension agronomist, NMSU; and Monte Nesbitt, pecan and fruit specialist, Texas A&M.

Wednesday's afternoon agenda includes: varieties and rootstocks, grafting and budding, soils, nutrition and fertilizers and food safety.

Speakers that day will include Heerema, Nesbitt, Anderson, Jaime Iglesias, El Paso County Extension agriculture agent, and Nancy Flores, Extension food technology specialist, ŃMSU.

On Thursday morning, Sept. 8, specialists will discuss irrigation scheduling, training and pruning, orchard floor management, pest management, pecan aphids, casebearers and weevils, diseases and marketing pecans.

These subjects will be covered by Heerema, Nesbitt, Jamshid Ashigh, NMSU weed specialist; Carol Sutherland and Brad Lewis, NMSU entomologists; Natalie Goldberg, NMSU plant pathologist; Jay Lilllywhite, NMSU agricultural economist; and James Ditmore, New Mexico Department of Agriculture marketing specialist.

Las Cruces now feeling some of the effects

Less than a month ago, Lawrence Yun, chief economist for the National Association of Realtors (NAR), said in a press release, "Broadly speaking, sales closed after the homebuyer tax credit will be significantly lower compared to the credit-induced spring surge." He went on to say, "Only when jobs are created at a sufficient pace will home sales return to sustainable healthy levels.'

How did he know? As they say around here, one doesn't need to be a rocket scientist to see the handwriting on the wall. The signs were everywhere.

The scenario began in January as buyers started taking advantage of the government's tax credit program. First-time and repeat homebuyers were eligible for a tax credit of up to \$8,000 and \$6,500, respectively, if they signed a purchase agreement by April 30 and closed their transactions by June 30 (Congress recently extended the closing deadline to Sept. 30, but only for buyers who signed their purchase agreements by April 30). The incentive program did its job and ignited a fire under the real estate market, which temporarily boosted home-sale numbers above 2009 levels. Once the program ended, however, home sales began to decline both nationally and in Las Cruces.

As the accompanying tables illustrate, Las Cruces area pending sales began to pick up in February. A sale is considered pending after the purchase agreement has been signed and before the transaction has closed. The number of signed contracts peaked at 280 units on April 30 – the day the tax credit expired. Shortly thereafter, the number of pending sales moving into the sold category began to exceed the number of new pending sales coming on line. The Pending Sales Index is the best indicator of the number of closings that will take place 30 to 60 days into the future.

Since the majority of closings take place within about a month of the execution of

the purchase agreement, closed sales began to rise in May. Between the April 30 and June 30 deadlines, local buyers and sellers closed 277 of the formerly pending transactions. Fast forward to July, when most of the pending transactions had already closed and just 80 sales were reported closed during the

What does the future hold for our Las Cruces market? The outlook isn't pretty. Around 56 percent of Las Cruces area sales take place in the spring and summer months, with a slowdown in production beginning in August. Add to the mix a reduced number of buyers opting to purchase due to economic concerns and you have a recipe for a sluggish fall and winter.

A noteworthy unknown is whether our economy and the jobs picture will improve in time to fuel the increase in sales that would typically take place as we cycle into the 2011 'selling season." Even with historically low mortgage interest rates in place, consumers are becoming more cautious than usual when it comes to the long-term commitment that accompanies the joy of homeownership.

The Forch E. Atkinson Memorial Scholarship is an annual scholarship for graduating seniors from Lovelady High School who want to enroll in post-secondary education. With the scholarship Jones will pursue a degree in animal science from Texas A&M in Kingsville, Texas

Atkinson, who was born March 26, 1910, in Lovelady, spent most of his life focused on education. In 1938, he left Lovelady to become an elementary school principal in Sealy, Texas, where he met his wife Edith Marian

In 1944, Atkinson served in Europe with the U.S. Army until the end of World War II in 1945. Returning home, Atkinson became a principal at Tucumcari Junior High School. He developed curriculum and guidance programs that became his master's thesis at Sam Houston State Teacher's College, where he received his master's degree in educational administration. In 1954, he arrived in Las Cruces as the director of instruction for Las Cruces Public Schools, a position he held until his retirement in 1973.

Atkinson spent his career in Las Cruces bettering the district and the schools within it. He wrote "A Philosophy of Education for the Las Cruces Public Schools," established

reading programs for elementary schools and established enriched/ accelerated programs in English, mathematics and science for Las Cruces High School. His paper "The Position of Director of Instruction in the Public Schools of the State of New Mexico" became

his thesis for his degree of educational specialist, which he completed at New Mexico State University in 1959.

Atkinson passed away on June 30, 2007, in Las Cruces at the age of 97.

By receiving the scholarship created in Atkinson's memory, Jones will receive help paying for his books and living expenses, allowing him to better spend his time on his studies.



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New revenue forecasts paint a bleak picture

Funding for LCPS and NMSU face additional cuts; Medicaid hit hard

The July update to the state revenue forecast has been released and the outlook is not good. The fiscal year 2011 shortfall – after authorized transfers from reserves – is \$151.7 million, or 3.2 percent.

This will mean across-the-board cuts to government programs including K-12 and higher education. The fiscal year 2011 General Appropriations Act requires the governor — with Board of Finance approval — to reduce allotments given revenue shortfalls. This is bad news for Las Cruces as this will adversely affect both public schools and New Mexico

State University, two of our largest employers.
The cause of the forecast revision is straightforward, which is higher-than-expected unemployment and slower economic growth. The results are reduced personal income and gross receipts tax revenue. Corporate income taxes are also down in part due to the film tax credit.

A bright spot in the revenue outlook is energy. While energy prices aren't at the heady levels of three years ago, they remain above the lows of last year. Oil prices are expected to hover at \$75 per barrel while natural gas is expected to be at \$5.60 per 1,000 cubic feet.

The new forecasts are based on revenue growth for fiscal year 2011 of 7.3 percent after a very weak fiscal year 2010. More than half of this growth is attributable to new legislation, which among other things, increased state level sales taxes from 5 percent to 5.125 percent. Without new legislation, the predicted increase in revenue for fiscal year 2011 would have only been 3.4 percent. Adjusting for inflation brings real revenue growth for the state down to less than 2 percent, modest but much better than the 9 percent decrease in fiscal year 2010.

The estimates above assume that Congress will extend the enhanced federal matching

assistance percentage rate (FMAP) for Medicaid. This program, which was originally passed as part of the stimulus package but is now scheduled to expire, increased the share of Medicaid paid for by the Federal government. Extension is viewed as unlikely by people who follow politics in D.C.

This is bad news for our state as New Mexico is one of 21 states without a contingency plan for the end of enhanced FMAP. Without enhanced FMAP, Medicaid revenue will fall by \$180 million for fiscal year 2011. Because of federal matches, a \$180 million funding shortfall by the state translates into a \$720 million dollar cut to Medicaid, which amounts to 23 percent of Medicaid expenditure. Such a cut is not possible without legislative authority.

Solving the Medicaid shortfall won't be easy. One idea would be to further trim non-Medicaid programs. A further reduction of 3.5 percent would cover the Medicaid deficit. That would bring the total reduction to non-Medicaid programs to 6.7 percent. Such cuts would be crippling for many programs. Another idea would be to increase taxes, but there seems little appetite for this.

Anyway you dice it; New Mexico faces a tough situation. In three years, revenues have fallen more than \$1 billion. Programs have been cut to the bone. Moving forward will require tough choices. Cutting government programs further will hurt those least able to cope. But raising taxes is unpopular and hurts working families that are trying to meet a budget. The next governor will have her hands full.

CNN tags Las Cruces in economic report

CNNMoney.com, a service of CNN and Money Magazine, has placed Las Cruces and Doña Ana County as No. 14 on its list of "Where the Jobs Are" in America. The article cites the region as being a "burgeoning economic oasis" with more than 34 percent economic growth since 2000. It mentions the Foxconn bi-national development near Santa Teresa, Spaceport America and New Mexico State University as driving economic factors in the area.

IRS releases proposed preparer fees

The Internal Revenue Service last month released proposed regulations that would establish a fee for individuals who apply for a preparer tax identification number (PTIN). Proposed regulations issued in March would require certain tax return preparers to obtain a PTIN. The IRS is working to finalize those proposed regulations, which are the first of a series of steps planned to increase oversight of federal tax return preparation.

The proposed regulations would establish a fee of \$50, payable to the IRS, to cover technology costs as well as compliance and outreach efforts associated with the new PTIN program. The proposed regulations would also provide for an additional fee (expected to be substantially lower than \$50) to be charged by the third-party vendor chosen to operate the new online system. That fee amount is expected to be announced soon.

Manufactured home sales on the rise

Clayton Homes has released a report indicating a 22 percent growth in the company's regional sales, which includes Las Cruces. The nation's seasonally adjusted annual rate of new single-family home sales in May 2010 was 300,000, down almost 33 percent from the month before, which was down 18 percent from the month before that, according to the U.S. Census Bureau and the Department of Housing and Urban Development. According to The New

York Times, nationally, manufactured homes made up nearly a quarter of all new homes sold for less than \$200,000 in 2009.

Federal unemployment extension takes effect

The New Mexico Department of Workforce Solutions last week announced the extension of eligibility for Emergency Unemployment Insurance Benefits through Nov. 30. Two types of potentially eligible claimants are affected. The first type, those who have been certifying weekly since June 2, will be paid upon their next weekly certification. The second type, claimants who stopped certifying in June and may be eligible, will receive a letter directing them how to re-engage their benefits. On July 22, President Obama signed an extension of the Emergency Unemployment Compensation Act of 2008. Emergency unemployment compensation benefits will be available to individuals who have exhausted regular unemployment compensation under state law.

AG praises new debt settlement regulation

New Mexico Attorney General Gary King has released a report about a new federal regulation that bans advance fees by debt settlement firms but warns that it does not go into effect until this Fall.

The Federal Trade Commission has just adopted a new regulation applicable to for-profit debt settlement companies that offer services including credit counseling, debt settlement and debt negotiation services represented to reduce credit card or other unsecured debt.

Portions of the new regulation will take effect in September and October 2010. King worked with other attorneys general in support of this regulation to expand protection for consumers who are struggling to overcome credit card debt. In many cases, these companies make false promises of reducing credit card debts while charging up-front fees – but never deliver on their promises. Consumers often end up having paid the fees and still owing the debt, plus additional interest.

NMSU offers new pecan growers course

Pecan growers and those interested in becoming pecan growers are encouraged to register for the Western Pecan Production Short Course hosted by New Mexico State University Sept. 8 through 10 at Hotel Encanto de Las Cruces. The course is designed for anyone seeking to grow pecans in New Mexico, west Texas, Arizona or California. During the twoand-a-half-day course, experts from NMSU and Texas A&M University will present lectures specifically for growing in the Western region of the U.S. Topics will include orchard site selection, planting, variety selection, grafting and budding, pruning and training, irrigation, fertilizers, pest and disease management. The course costs \$240 per person, which includes lectures, course materials, refreshments, three lunches and field trip transportation. The registration deadline is Friday, Aug. 6. Pump prices increase

The average price for a gallon of unleaded gasoline increased three cents in New Mexico from \$2.76 to \$2.79 last week. The national average increased from \$2.72 to \$2.74, according to the AAA New Mexico Weekend Gas Watch. The New Mexico average is five cents above the national average. At \$2.72 a gallon, Albuquerque has the cheapest gas in the state. The most expensive is in Las Cruces and Santa Fe at \$2.75.

NMSU wins \$1.5 million for Arrowhead improvements

Money will expand research park, help build Arrowhead Drive

The U.S. Economic Development Administration has awarded New Mexico State University's Arrowhead Center a \$1.5 million grant for infrastructure improvements to the Arrowhead Business and Research Park and to expand the newly created Arrowhead Drive.

The Arrowhead Business and Research Park covers 224 acres at the southern end of NMSU's Las Cruces campus between Interstates 10 and 25. Its goal is to link scientists, technologists and entrepreneurs in developing emerging technologies that contribute to the state's economic development.

"This funding will help the park continue its expansion and aid us in attracting companies seeking to work with NMSU faculty members and students," said Pam Wood, research park director.

The university completed a mile-long extension of Payne Street through the research park earlier this year. This new grant will allow the university to expand that section of road, now named Arrowhead Drive, from two lanes to four. The grant will also allow NMSU to finish the park's wastewater system, to install street lighting and to conduct an engineering study to help better plan for the next stages of development.

The Arrowhead Center won a similar, \$900,000 grant from the EDA to help pay for construction on the first part of Arrowhead Drive and its accompanying utilities. Other money for that project came from the state of

New Mexico, local road funds, the New Mexico Department of Transportation and NMSU.

"These investments by the Economic Development Administration and other partners are not only making the park more accessible and attractive to new businesses, they're also helping lay the groundwork for a lot of exciting developments yet to come," said Vickie Galindo, Arrowhead's director of business development.

The Arrowhead Business and Research Park's most recently completed building, Spaceplex 2, is home to General Dynamics and opened last

summer. The park's next building will be more than 8,000 square feet and broken into smaller, 1,700-square-foot pads for businesses intending to establish themselves before jumping into larger spaces. That building is currently under construction and scheduled for completion in the coming weeks.

Other plans for the research park include working with the Las Cruces public school district to construct an early college high school where high school students could take collegelevel courses for credit.

How to create a New Mexican job

Fishing in bigger waters leads to prosperity

In 2007, I wrote the Strategic Five-Year Plan for the state's Economic Development Department.

For three months, I crisscrossed the state, talking to economic developers, city managers, mayors and chamber of commerce officials. I was pleased that they willingly answered the tough questions I had developed that dealt with infrastructure, tax bases, their principal industries and demographics and their vision of their town or city 10 to 15 years from now (then). I was also glad they agreed on the necessity to attract "21st century industry" and that it was this industry that would create jobs – not government.

Most of us don't focus on the ratio of private to public sector jobs in our state, but without going into too much detail, let's just say that without our public sector jobs our unemployment rate would be in the high double-digit range. While some might say that makes a strong case for retaining our government jobs, the truth is we can't afford all of them, especially at the state level.

Our current public sector looks like a fat man at a pie-eating contest. After gorging ourselves, we're now paying the price with a bad case of economic gout. It doesn't take a genius to know that we must economize, keep the jobs and services we need and jettison the rest and steadily convert many of those jobs to the private sector.

Today, we have less than 30,000 manufacturing jobs in the whole state, and

despite some gains, we've not been able to shift into higher gear and see real improvement. Three counties don't even have one manufacturing job.

So how do we create the jobs necessary to reverse the public/private imbalance?

We can start by acknowledging our strengths, which infrastructure and resource advantages we offer, and then ask ourselves the big question – why would a company want to locate or expand here? Aside from the obvious, companies need the fundamentals to be just right, to be in or near population centers with stable, trained workforces and customers (and other businesses) with reasonably high disposable incomes. Too many fixed-income families aren't considered an asset in the business world. There is hope, however.

Export markets and out-of-state companies

We cannot add enough local jobs to turn our state's economy around quickly enough, but that doesn't mean we should stop trying. Just giving out loans won't solve the problem. We need to realize that small businesses have a myriad of challenges, and not all of them can be solved with a micro-loan. While we must help our 136,000 plus small businesses stay viable and grow, we need to simultaneously fish in bigger waters and convince non-New Mexican and even non-U.S.-based companies that New Mexico means business – in any language.

We need to focus on 21st century

We need to focus on 21st century technology-based companies that need our rich resource of researchers, technologists and national labs. That will require a massive push by all of us, but most of all by our recruitment experts. We must re-double our efforts and double their budgets to get them, but get them we must

but get them we must.

We need better and more targeted incentives, tax breaks that are tied to job creation, more commercially-relevant education in our schools and a state government that works smarter and more efficiently with our communities. On a national scale, we must bring back manufacturing jobs and grow our exports. If our exports represented a higher percentage of our sales, we wouldn't be as vulnerable during times of domestic decline.

This is an election year, and job creation must not be a political football that's passed laterally down the field. We must urge our candidates to give us their specific plans for New Mexico's recovery, not general statements like, "I'm for job creation." Businesses can't wait for Nov. 2 to make plans or their investments, and we should give them the information they need to help them survive and thrive, now.

In this global economy, we are not only competing with our neighbors, we are competing with cities thousands of miles away, in other countries and on other continents. Patrick Geddes, the Scottish town planner and activist had it right – think globally, but act locally. I would add, the sooner the better.

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Aggie grad builds site to help employers, college students

By Gabriel Vasquez

It's something of a paradox that to find a job waiting tables, it, well, requires a lot of waiting.

Or pain, as New Mexico State University graduate Josh Shakra refers to it.

"It has really become a pain to apply for restaurant jobs," Shakra said. "You have to fill out the same application every week, go to the restaurant between a certain time each week and if the manager's not there or the restaurant's not hiring, your paperwork will go 'on file.' That means it will probably never be found.

Shakra, a former server with a bachelor's degree in psychology from NMSU, has recently launched LasCrucesWaitingJobs.com, a site built to facilitate the hiring process for both students and their potential employers.

When I came back to Las Cruces to find a job, I immediately thought about serving, but thought to myself, 'I don't want to go through this again," he said. "Instead, I decided to create a website to help other people find similar jobs.

Shakra's website isn't just for servers, but all positions within the restaurant industry, he said, including busers, cooks, bartenders, cashiers, catering staff, chefs, cocktail waitresses, hosts and hostesses and managers.

"The beauty of the site is that it's so simple to use," he said. "For both restaurant owners and those looking for work, it's a very easy process.'

Students looking for a restaurant job log on to the website, enter their personal information and submit a photo and résumé if

desired, and if a job is available, they can apply for it immediately by filling out an online job application. The employer, who must first register as a business on the site, can then screen applicants and read over their application or résumé.

The cost to businesses ranges from \$5 to \$15 either per job or per month, although because the site is fairly new, "we're giving deep discounts right now," Shakra said.

Shakra recently returned to Las Cruces from Montana, where he said he began to brainstorm about the possibility of creating his business, one he hopes to expand to other communities

"My target right now is to have five sites, some in Montana and others in New Mexico," he said. "Ultimately, I'd like to offer this service to Albuquerque, but right now it's a learning process. I think I can do it when the time is right."

After graduating and before moving to Montana, Shakra worked at the local Social Security Administration office and said he chose to become an entrepreneur because "it was either choose my retirement plan or do something I've always wanted to do."

"I got the idea in December, found a designer in February, pulled out the money from my savings account and launched the site about a month ago," he said.

"So far the response has been good. I have some contacts with the restaurant owners here, so they have been very receptive. The challenge now is to convince the other restaurants that this is a worthwhile service, one that will enhance their existing hiring practices, not replace them."

Employers simply log on to the site, type out their mission statement, employment summary or any additional information they would like, upload a logo and select the jobs they're hiring for. Later, they can check the site to see who has applied and what their employment history is, Shakra said.

"We even have a Google map system for new students who may not know their way around town that need to know where

these places are," Shakra said.
"Too often, the larger restaurants with a lot of walk-in traffic miss out on great employees because the manager isn't there or he's too busy. They have no way of following up with them," he said. "And it helps the small restaurants, too, especially the ones who don't see a lot of applicants. Not only can they find quality employees but it will increase their foot traffic."

Shakra said for college work, nothing beats a job serving.

"In college, I was working maybe four hours a night and making \$100," he said. "You're not going to find any other job out there that's to going to pay a college student \$25-plus an hour."

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



Ramble? It's definitely 'on'!

Despite construction, galleries and museums still 'bring it'

It looks like a war zone, I know. The yellow-brick road is gone, the trees are gone, the planters are gone and those god-awful awning/ shade structure/thingies have been gone for a while now

In their places are dirt, fences and ... dirt. In spite of the devastation there is still beauty, tranquility, creativity and aesthetic enrichment to be had. You just have to be brave and look the other way when confronted with the unattractiveness and perhaps inconvenience of the soon-to-be former Downtown Mall (I sooo look forward to the time when I never have to use those two words together again) as it gradually becomes Main Street once more. At least the section between Las Cruces and Griggs avenues is still open and ready for rambling.

For art lovers and entertainment seekers, the first Friday of the month has meant the Downtown Art Ramble and while the north section of Main Street is going through its awkward, ugly "adolescent" stage, the gallery owners and museum staff are soldiering on and are determined to continue the ramble until the transition to the new look-Downtown is complete.

From 5 to 7 p.m. Friday, Aug. 6, take a chance - put on your ramblin' shoes (and other protective gear) – and hit Downtown for some art, socializing and free munchies.

The Rio Grande Theatre galleries are presenting a display of digital photography from the "Bad Dog Kids" – a Salt Lake City, Utah, nonprofit group that encourages youth from diverse cultures to "Imagine, Dare, Create!"

As part of cooperative arrangement, teens from Utah (the first time Bad Dog Kids had ventured outside their home state) worked with teens from Las Cruces in a digital photography workshop led by Paul Schranz of the Preston Contemporary Art Center, part of a two-week art apprenticeship program funded by National Endowment for the Arts, to show that lives and communities can be transformed through the creative arts.

M. Phillip's Fine Art Gallery will be featuring several new works by gallery artists from Spain, France, the United Kingdom and Russia. In particular, Rob Hefferan (British, b. 1968), Tatyana Klevenskiy (Russian, b. 1961), Marcel Demagny (French, b. 1949), three works by now deceased Salvador Caballero (Spanish, 1943-2006) and a work by Ventura Diaz (Spanish, b. 1948). In addition to several new antiques, they sculptures in a variety of media two glass sculptures by I. Roubleff, an alabaster carving by Adolfo Cipriani and a bronze on marble sculpture of two Belgian draft horses from the French School (ca. 1900).

Exhibiting through August at the Main Street Gallery is "A Lifetime of Figure Studies," an exhibit spanning decades of figure studies by Vincent Hallett, and Nancy Frost Begin's relief hand-colored prints and hand-carved "Monster Boxes."

Other exhibiting Main Street Gallery artists include Winfrey Hearst, Judy Licht, Daphne Wirthlin, Lois Wilson, Lynn Unangst, Margaret Berrier, Joanna

Bradley, Robert "Shoofly" Shufelt, Rudy Lucero, Paula Gonzalez, Jan Severson, Jim Turrentine and Annette Paaianen.

Flo Daugherty will display some of her plein air works at the Blue Gate Gallery. En plein air is French for "in the open air" and refers to painting outdoors. Maps of where the works were painted accompany each one.

Quillin Studio and Gallery has been in a whimsical mood this summer. Various artists will join Sally Quillin, Dedri Quillin and Aline Fister in showing a potpourri of whimsy. Kim Gaskill works in stained glass, among other things, and will present her original designs. Catherine Milligan is a seamstress who just

doesn't and will show bowls her other and bright, cheerful objects she says "useful," but really belong on the wall. Sally will have new paintings and she will also have a new line of original cards in watercolor, acrylic, and printmaking techniques. Dedri Quillin will show new weavings. Aline Fister will display some of the ceramic jewelry she's been playing with.

Las Cruces Museum of Art continues with shows by four artists - "Remembrance: An Artistic Tribute to the Organ Mountains, Groundbreaking and Visionary Art of Jess Reinhard and Eric McKinley"; "Barocco en la Frontera/Baroque on the Border" by Rigoberto Gonzalez; and "Poetic Objects" by Kathleen Carricaburu.

A photo essay by Linda Montoya titled "People of Chiapas" opens at the Branigan Cultural Center. In 1984, Montoya visited Chiapas, Mexico, and photographed the people. She returned in 2003 and sought out the same people. "People of Chiapas" documents the changes she found. Concurrently, "Chiapas: People, Architecture and Landscapes," photographs by Susan Bryant (see cover photo) will be on exhibit in the Richardson Gallery. Bryant belongs to an organization that works to establish relationships with several groups of indigenous peoples in the rural areas of Chiapas. This work is part of a series of images that she made during trips to Chiapas in 2004 and 2005.


Thetheatregallery at the Black Box Theatre presents a photographic retrospective of the first 10 seasons of the No Strings Theatre Company by Peter Herman.

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Cultural Spotlight The Klipsch Museum

The 'gold standard' in audio

NMSU alumnus created perfect speaker

Paul Wilbur Klipsch was a genius, no doubt about it. He designed and built the best audio speaker in the world, the Klipschorn. For his accomplishments he received the Silver Medal from the Audio Engineering Society – the organization's highest honor – for his contributions to speaker design and sound distortion measurement.

Klipsch was inducted into the Audio Hall of Fame in 1984, and in 1997 was inducted into the Engineering and Science Hall of Fame joining the likes of Thomas Edison, George Washington Carver and the Wright Brothers.

Paul Klipsch is also an Aggie.

He received his bachelor's degree in electrical engineering from New Mexico State University in 1926. He played cornet in the university band and was part of the award-winning rifle team. His love of music led him to develop an audio speaker that perfectly reproduced recorded sound, as most designs at the time were extremely unsatisfactory.

Klipsch received an honorary Doctor of Laws degree from NMSU in 1981. The university's engineering department was renamed the Klipsch School of Electrical and Computer Engineering in 1995 in his honor. This brilliant man is obviously held in high

This brilliant man is obviously held in high regard by the university and throughout the world by those who are engineers, audiophiles and music lovers. His foundation annually awards scholarships that support approximately 45 students each semester. It also endows four professorships that help attract quality professors to the Klipsch School at NMSU. Klipsch died in 2004 at the age of 98.

But there is a little-known jewel tucked into a small area at the engineering complex – the Paul W. and Valerie S. Klipsch Museum.

It is a fascinating look into the history of this audio pioneer, plus it's a great place to hear some music played through some killer speakers. Joe Creed, Assistant Dean and Professor Emeritus of the NMSU College of Engineering and long-time friend of the Klipsches, wants people to know about it.

The museum was dedicated in October 1997 and is kept open through the support of a foundation established by Valerie Klipsch.

"Valerie still lives in Hope (Ark.) and is constantly on the lookout for any speakers that Paul built," Creed said. "I make trips up there to visit her and get them back down here."

The small space is packed with personal memorabilia, photographs, personal letters, awards and a selection of every type speaker Klipsch built. You can sit and hear a demo and it is really impressive.

The Klipschorn was designed as a corner speaker utilizing the walls as an extension of the "horn" concept used by much larger speakers used in theaters and concert halls. They have beautiful wooden cabinets and are almost works of art in themselves.

"We would like to be open regular hours and by appointment," Creed said. "I'll open anytime for anyone who wants to see the museum."

Klipsch's career

Following his graduation from NMSU, Klipsch worked for General Electric designing radios that were sold to RCA. He spent three years in Chile maintaining electric locomotives before attending Stanford University, where he earned a master's degree in electrical engineering — all the while continuing to work on his audio speaker design.

After graduation he worked as a geophysicist for Gulf Oil and then enlisted in the Army as a Major during World War II. He specialized in ballistics and worked at the Southwest Proving Ground in Hope. Klipsch and Associates began making loudspeakers in 1946, building them by hand. He hired another employee in 1948 and eventually built a plant in Hope, which still operates today - although making only special orders. Paul Klipsch sold his company in 1989 to his cousin Fred Klipsch. A wide variety of Klipsch speakers are still produced today and considered by many as the industry standard. but the corporate headquarters have moved to Indianapolis.

The Klipschorn speaker has been in continuous production, relatively unchanged, for more than 60 years and it is the only speaker in the world that can make that claim. Paul Klipsch was a maverick, eccentric genius who brought much passion and inventiveness to the field of audio and consequently brought enjoyment to those who appreciate beautiful music. NMSU can make a unique claim as well – his formative college years were right here in Las Cruces.

Operatic dreams

Modern operas shine in Santa Fe

Developing a love of opera takes time. One cannot simply be "dipped" in the pool of "Aqua Verdi" and come out an opera lover. One cannot drink some magic potion of "Puccini Pepsi" and transform oneself into an opera aficionado.

It is best to ground oneself on a foundation of opera classics, but at the Santa Fe Opera, they mix it up each year – some old,

On our first visit, we had a chance to see "Classics" - Mozart's "The Magic Flute," Puccini's "Madame Butterfly" and Offenbach's "The Tales of Hoffman." My reviews of these productions appeared in the July 23 issue of the Las Cruces Bulletin.

During this trip, we saw the remaining two operas in the 2010 season, which are more modern. We were pleased with both the world premiere of Lewis Spratlan's "Life is a Dream," based on a 1635 play by noted Spanish writer Pedro Calderon de la Barca, and Benjamin Britten's wry social commentary "Albert Herring."

Composer Spratlan won the Pulitzer Prize for Music in 2000 following a concert performance of the second act of "Life is a Dream" at Amherst College, where he taught. The work was originally commissioned by the New Haven Opera Theatre, which closed its doors before Spratlan finished the work in 1978 with an added English libretto by James Maraniss. Thanks to the vision of SFO's general director Charles MacKay, Spratlan's 'Dream" came to life.

Any opera production with merit must contain a healthy mix of excellent production values, as well as fine performance elements enmeshed around a compelling story. This was the case with "Life is a Dream." In a word, this production is amazing and worth your consideration of a trip to Santa Fe.

Spratlan and Maraniss only made some minor adjustments in the score and libretto. Under Leonard Slatkin's baton, the SFO's orchestra showed the brilliance of the atonality and complex instrumentation of the score.

The story of Prince Segismundo - imprisoned in a secluded tower by his father, King Basilio because he fears the prince will become a tyrant - has a fairy-tale quality about it. Years later, the king decides to give the prince the opportunity to rule, but creates a plan in which his son is drugged and then brought to the palace. If the prophecies are correct, Segismundo will be re-drugged and returned to his tower and told that his day as a prince was "only a dream."

The music is complex and difficult to sing, and yet the cast overcame the vocal hurdles, especially Canadian tenor Roger Honeywell as Prince Segismundo. The role is a tour de force.

What propels this production into the realm of one of the finest operas I have seen in Santa Fe is the scenic design by David Korins and the lighting design by Japhy Weideman that dazzle and amaze. A series of lighted "arms" descend and revolve throughout to

alter the scenes. The effect is mesmerizing. The costumes by Jessica Jahn add to the timeless quality of the piece.

What a privilege it was to share some thoughts with professor Spratlan, who sat in front of us. He reveled in the well-deserved glory of his visionary work and was thrilled to accept our praise. Perhaps the entire opera can be submitted for a second Pulitzer Prize for the complete work.

Britten wrote "Albert Herring" in 1945, on the heels of his more serious "Peter Grimes." Based on a short story by Guy de Maupassant, Britten and his librettist Eric Crozier moved the locale to his native England. Over the course of the "chamber opera," we see the transformation of a shy, introverted greengrocer into a self-assured adult. Some say that this is a thinly veiled wish fulfillment for Britten – a "coming out of the closet" story for the gay composer.

The current production boasts a cast headed by diva Christine Brewer as the faux aristocrat, aptly named "Mrs. Bellows," who is unable to find this year's Queen of the May for the East Anglican village of Loxford. She must settle on the introverted Albert Herring as King of the May. Her entourage is right out of the British comedies we see on public television, most especially her housekeeper Florence, played and sung masterfully by Jill Grove, who is also reminiscent of the broad comedic style of Carol Burnett.

Alek Shrader, remembered from his extraordinary rendition of the tenor aria from "Daughter of the Regiment" in the documentary "The Audition," is exceptional in the title role mixing vocal strength, subtlety and humor into a nuanced performance. In sum, while the music under Sir Andrew Davis' baton was a bit loud at times, the overall effect of the work was delightful.

While in Santa Fe, as is our custom in recent years, we attended one of the concerts at the Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival. We were fortunate to attend a performance featuring Las Cruces native Jeremy Denk. His work in the turbulent Piano Quintet in F Minor by Cesar Franck was nuanced and strong. Also performing were violinists Cho-Liang Lin and Jennifer Frautschi, Toronto Symphony's principal violist Teng Li and Los Angeles Philharmonic principal cellist Peter Stumpf.

Also part of the program were the same artists in a perfect rendition of Schubert's Trio No. 1 in B-flat Major. They were, joined by noted bassoonist Christopher Millard in Franz Danzi's Bassoon Quartet in B-flat

What is amazing about attending a Chamber Music concert in St. Frances Auditorium is the ability to hear how each instrument weaves its way through each work. A veritable treasure trove of top musicians from the finest orchestras in the world perform annually at this internationally acclaimed Festival.

Together, the Santa Fe Opera and the Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival beckon us each summer with opportunities to escape the desert heat and enter the elevated realm of refreshing, delightful music in a matter of hours. Both events run through the month of



No argument from me -Rolly's makes a fine pizza

Family supplies pasta and pies to the East Mesa area

I have a running ... discussion, shall we say, about pizza. And whether you can get a good one in Las Cruces. (I have these argum ... talks about other foods as well but it all started with pizza.) I hear "you can only get good pizza in New York" or "this isn't Chicago there's no good pizza around here." Nonsense.

Are you saying that someone who makes a good pizza in New York couldn't come here and make the same exact pizza? It's the water, they say - or the oven or the altitude or they don't hold their mouths the same way or some other ridiculousness. Given the same exact conditions and you would have the same exact pizza.

When I was in New York City in May 2008, I made it a point to eat at Ray's Pizza because I heard it was the gold standard and somewhat legendary. After all, in "Iron Man," Tony Stark has a Ray's pie brought to him when he returns home after three months of captivity in a cave in Afghanistan.

I have to tell you that the slices I had were OK but no better than what I have had locally. Could it be that there is some emotional connection with this

pizza or the fact that it is "New York" that makes it seem to taste better? That's what I suspect.

Since I haven't profiled a local pizza establishment, I chose to journey to Rolly's (pronounced like roly-poly) Pizzeria at 5195 Bataan Memorial West. I say "journey" because you have to drive a bit. Take U.S. Highway 70 East, exit at Porter Road, cross under the highway then head west until you are almost back to Mesa Grande Drive. Rolly's is on your right.

"People say we are a hidden treasure on the East Mesa," said Martha Gutierrez, who along with husband Ron (aka "Rolly") owns the place.

Not that hidden but certainly a treasure in my estimation.

Ron (Rolly) Gutierrez started many years ago at the Holiday Inn in Las Cruces. He moved to Hollister, Calif. to help a friend establish an Italian restaurant. After moving back to Las Cruces, he worked for 18 years at Casa Luna. He and Martha took the gamble almost five years ago and started their own place.

"There aren't that many restaurants out here," Ron said, referring to the East Mesa, "and no pizza except us. It seemed like a good place to be."

Veronica Gutierrez, Ron and Martha's daughter, helps out in the kitchen and does the bookkeeping. She is studying business at Doña Ana Community College but finds the time to be on the

"She's my pride and joy," said Ron. "And she can do everything back in the kitchen."

The lunch "peeps" and I tried the Rolly's special – pepperoni, sausage, mushrooms, ham, black olives and green chile (hold the onions) and the large two topping special with extra cheese and pepperoni. I wanted to get a varied experience and I hear that New Yorkers just like the cheese pie or maybe just one- ingredient pizza (maybe pepperoni). I wanted to be as "authentic" as possible. We also tried the fettuccine alfredo with chicken (it passed the picky "nephew" test), spaghetti and (large) meatballs, artichoke salad and an order of hot wings.

I am not a big crust kind of guy – I can take it or leave it and prefer the toppings (or as I like to call them "the main event"). The toppings were all great and the crust was just the right chewiness with a bit of charring on the outside edge, which I also approve of. And if you really like crust, try the calzone, which is a medium pizza with your choice of toppings folded over and served with some really nice marinara sauce. It's a crust

They recently added Chicago dogs, Coney dogs, cheese fries and mac 'n' cheese. Lasagna is available on Friday and Saturday only and there is a pizza and salad buffet on Friday from 5 to 8 p.m.

Pizza good. Pasta good. Salad good. Wings good. Calzone good. People great.

I don't know if it is "real" pizza or not but in my world it does the trick and you don't need to have Iron Man bring you a slice.

Branigan Cultural Center celebrates 75 years with a Frida Kahlo exhibit

Facility plays integral role in the Las Cruces museum system

Seventy-five years ago, what is now the Branigan Cultural Center was built as the Branigan Library.

It has been a key part of the City of Las Cruces museum system since 1981, now housing a permanent exhibit on the history of the Mesilla Valley and hosting a variety of exhibits and special events throughout the year.

The Branigan was built in 1935 in a Pueblo Revival Style.

Former state Rep. J. Paul Taylor said of the building, "In this erstwhile building people of all ages have read, seen and transmitted what they have learned for timeless generations."

In honor of its importance to the community, the Branigan was recently placed on the National Registry of Historic Places. The plaque will be dedicated with a celebration

at 5 p.m. Friday, Sept. 3, during the monthly Downtown Ramble. A few speeches will commemorate the event and refreshments, provided by the Foundation for Las Cruces Museums, will be offered. Ballet folklorico performances and music will add to the festive feeling of the event.

A week prior to the dedication, the Branigan opens a highly anticipated exhibit, "Frida Kahlo: Through the Lens of Nickolas Muray, from the collection of the Nickolas Muray Archives." Muray, a Hungarian, had a 45-year career as a photographer in New York. He was also Kahlo's lover for 10 years and filled his largest body of work with photographs of the famed Mexican painter, who was in turn married to muralist Diego Rivera.


Carbro prints of Muray's portraits of Kahlo are in the permanent collection of the Frida Kahlo Museum, The George Eastman House, The National Portrait Gallery/Smithsonian and The Metropolitan Museum of Art. The exhibit at the Branigan is part of a national tour over a two-and-a-half-year period containing 46 photo-graphic prints reproduced from the original negatives.

Museum Director Garland Courts said of the exhibit, "Nickolas Muray is the photographer behind most of the iconic Frida Kahlo photographs that people know of; this exhibit includes all of them."

This special exhibit kicks off with an opening hosted by the Foundation for Las Cruces Museums from 5 to 7 p.m. Friday, Aug. 27. To provide the right ambiance, a trio will perform Mexican acoustic music. The exhibit continues through Oct. 9.

The Branigan Cultural Center is located at 501 N. Main St. across from the Museum of Art. The museum may be accessed from Water Street, where parking is available. It is open 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday. For further information, visit www.las-cruces. org/museums.

Discovering a 'secret' Best foreign film Oscar-winner is darkly drawn

Why, you might ask, did this slick Argentinean film, "The Secret in Their Eyes," win the Oscar for Best Foreign Language film earlier this year?

Hard to say, but looking back on my "best of" list for 2009, there doesn't seem to be too much competition.

Other foreign films I liked included the barely released World War II piece "Flame and Citron," the barely released "Absurdistan," the barely released "Ricky" and the just released "El Traspatio," which was Mexico's entry for this year's awards. If they would have asked me, I'd have said "A Year Ago in Winter," a beautiful German film, with second place going to "Julia," starring my next wife, Tilda Swinton.

But since they didn't, I'll tell you what I saw when I viewed this efficient and slightly dark drama that has a small drop of comedy.

Benjamin Espósito lives in Buenos Aires, and is a retired criminal investigator. He has never been able to forget the case of many years earlier, wherein a young woman was sexually assaulted and killed.

As a form of penance, sort of, but mostly to help rid him-

self of the memories of the case, which he could never solve, he sets forth to write a novel about it.

But it's not as easy as it sounds. While researching the case, Espósito starts picking up clues - both visual and by memory - of things that he missed when he did his original investigation. He also has similar revelations when he revisits a past colleague, Irene, now a judge, a woman who he was more than smitten with, and vice versa. Kept apart by Espósito's own feelings of inferiority that the confident and intelligent Irene does not suffer from, he begins to secondguess himself on this issue as well.

For a bit of comic relief, Espósito's partner (when he was an investigator) Sandoval, also comes back into the picture. A raging alcoholic, who is still much more intuitive and detailoriented than Espósito, Sandoval remains a close friend and confidante, even while pickled.

Through more flashbacks, Espósito is finally, after nearly 30 years, able to put the case together and ID a prime suspect

- again using memory and finite detail as his greatest tools. He is able to track the suspect down, and even chase him through a soccer stadium that is packed with fans – it is an amazing sequence.

But the mystery remains, as this taut and usually believable thriller introduces us to real characters doing real things while living real lives, including the still-saddened husband of the victim who has been conducting his own "private'

Darkly drawn, but highly believable, and with just enough intrigue to keep your interest, "The Secret in Their Eyes" is aptly titled, and thankfully, since it did win the Oscar, we all have a chance to see it in spite of the horrific distribution

system that foreign films have to weave their way through.

The CineMatinee film for Saturday, Aug. 7, is "Red Rock West" (1993, 98 minutes). "Red Rock West" is a diabolical movie that exists sneakily between a western and a thriller, between a film noir and a black comedy.

This is a movie like "Blood Simple," constructed out of passion, murder, revenge and a quirky sense of humor. The plot is incredibly complicated. It is also easy to follow and, eventually, makes perfect sense. This kind of lovingly contrived melodrama requires juicy actors, who can luxuriate in the ironies of a scene, and the movie has them – Nicolas Cage, J.T. Walsh, Dennis Hopper and Lara Flynn Boyle. They must have had a lot of fun with this material.

The movie stars Cage as a poor but honest drifter, who arrives nearly broke in the small Western town of Red Rock. He walks into the local saloon, and is mistaken by the owner (Walsh) for the professional killer from Texas that Walsh has hired to murder his wife (Boyle). Cage plays along with the joke, collects an advance on the hit, and goes out to Walsh's ranch to visit the wife. There is, of course, an immediate sexual attraction between them. He thinks it only fair to let her in on the secret. She then offers to pay Cage to murder her husband.


So Cage has two offers on the table when a stranger (Dennis Hopper) drives into town. This is, of course, the real hit man from Texas. Walsh is not amused to discover he has paid an advance to the wrong man.

At some fundamental level, all Cage's character really wants to do is get out of Red Rock and never come back again, and the movie's running gag is that he keeps leaving town and finding himself returning to it. The "Welcome to Red Rock" sign turns up in the movie like a signpost in a nightmare. And eventually it's clear that Cage, along with all the others, is going to be trapped there until they bring their deadly quadrangle to some sort of a conclusion. "Red Rock West" was directed by John Dahl who co-

wrote it with his brother Rick. It's the kind of movie made by people who love movies, have had some good times at them and want to celebrate the very texture of old genres like the western and the film noir. In a sense, we've been in Red Rock many times before - It's a town where plots lie in wait for unsuspecting visitors, where hatred runs deep, where love is never enough of a motive for doing anything when cash is available.

I have been waiting all summer for the ultimate movie blockbuster. An action-packed adventure flick with romance, suspense and lots of chills and spills – iconic characters

you actually care about. A movie that has you still "amped up" when you leave the theater.

"The Kids Are All Right" is not that movie.

It's better than that. It doesn't have any of those blockbuster characteristics – except that "characters you actually care about" part.

"Kids" has such real characters experiencing real emotion that it will never be a summer blockbuster. It's too well written, well directed and well acted to qualify. It will

stay with you though.

This movie is never going to be an audience favorite either. It is difficult to watch at times because the circumstances are very personal and the emotion is very raw. Often the excellent direction by Lisa Cholodenko, who also co-wrote the screenplay, peels

back the skin and gives us a touching, sometimes painful, look at what's underneath.

"The Kids Are All Right" isn't an escape the summer heat, idle entertainment – it's a powerful look into family and relationship dynamics.

Nic (Annette Bening) and Jules (Julianne Moore) are a long-established couple with two children – Joni (the excellent Mia Wasikowska) and Laser (Josh Hutcherson).

Fourteen-year-old Laser is starting to feel a void in the

older male influence department and asks his 18-year-old sister to contact the sperm donor responsible for the artificial insemination that created them both. The same donor was used for both pregnancies, but Joni's birth mother is Nic and Laser's is Jules.

Joni (named for singer Joni Mitchell) is soon off to college and wanting a more-than-just-friends relationship with her best boy bud. She is reluctant at first, but eventually initiates contact with Paul, the "60 dollars a pop" sperm donor from 20 or so years ago.

Paul (played by one of my very favorite actors Mark Ruffalo) is a free spirit, organic farmer/restaurant owner who has never been married and does his own thing. "Right on."

Paul begins to establish relationships with his offspring and they start to bond. Nic, the more stable of the partners, is leery about Paul interfering with their lives but Jules, at loose ends and a bit of a free spirit herself, sees nothing wrong with it, even accepting Paul's offer to be her first client in a fledgling landscape design venture.

Paul's inclusion in the family dynamic is the crux of this fascinating tale.

While non-traditional families are becoming increasingly common, many members of the audience may find they are moving through unfamiliar territory. While there is some curiosity at the beginning about the same-sex partner with kids arrangement, you soon forget about that and watch the story unfold. You stay interested because the characters are three-dimensional and their sexuality is a non-factor. They are just people going through a life-altering period. Kind of like real life should be.

"Kids" earns an "R" rating and there are some amusing forays into the sexual practices of Nic and Jules. We also have a window into Paul's sex life. None of these scenes are in any way exploitative and are key to the story line.

The acting is superb, even the small characters. Tanya (Yaya DaCosta) Paul's coworker/sleepover pal, Luis the landscaping assistant (Joaquín Garrindo) and Joni's sex-obsessed friend Sasha (Zosia Mamet) all have clearly defined moments that tell us significant things about who they are.

Bening and Moore have never been better. They bring Nic and Jules to life before our eyes so fully and with such gut-wrenching clarity that we feel we have been part of this loving, but sometimes "off the tracks," family.

Who would have thought that in a blockbuster summer of super heroes, super spies, super villains and super disappointments, my favorite movie moment would be two middle aged "moms" holding hands as they drive down the highway?

A great find, dazzling view

Couple discovers Tuscan home, makes it their own

It can sometimes take years to find that perfect home – one that fits your lifestyle and deco-

rative personality.

Rick and Lisa Nelson stumbled upon just that home during a joy ride through the Dripping Springs Road area in 2008.

"We were driving around looking for a home when we saw it," Lisa Nelson said of the home at 4101 Camino Bonito. "It's everything we wanted in a house."

"We were looking for a home that had great views, lots of space and privacy," Rick Nelson

Built by a local custom builder, the 3,150-square-foot home was about a month away from completion when the Nelsons first visited it. Captivated by its ornate detail, Tuscan style, an up-close view of the Organ Mountains and various living spaces, the couple decided it

was time for a change.
"It's not a typical Southwestern or Californiastyle home, and I like that," Lisa Nelson said.

The home sits on more than 2 acres, but despite its size, Rick Nelson said the home feels comfortable – not intimidating or ostentatious.

'It's a large home, but it's not too big," Rick Nelson said. "It's manageable and proportionate."

A long driveway leads to a rock wall and tower with a gate. Behind the gate is the large front courtyard, which features a view of the city lights. Flagstone pathways lead to a fountain and a seating area in front of a wood-burning fireplace.

"The courtyard is so private," Lisa Nelson said. "Once you shut the gate, you're in your own private world."

Once inside, travertine floors, slate accents and wood beams greet guests. The entryway features a 20-foot ceiling complete with a chandelier and windows for natural light.

To the right of the entrance is a half bathroom, which features copper fixtures, and an at-home theater.

The narrow, 9-foot double wooden doors, complete with iron handles and clavos, is what originally drew Lisa Nelson to the room - her favorite area of the home.

"When I walked into the house, I noticed the doors right away," she said. "It's nice to have the family over, and have dinner and go watch a movie.'

Up to six people can gather on plush couches in front of the 100-inch screen and enjoy the surround sound.

Designed to be a split-bedroom floor plan, three of the home's four bedrooms are located near the theater, around a curved hallway filled with illuminated nichos and linear windows that look out to the courtvard.

'The house looks like a Tuscan castle," Lisa Nelson said.

The third bedroom, at the end of the hall, features a separate door to the front courtyard, making it perfect for an at-home office or hob-

At the center of the home is the open living

room and kitchen. As a gas-log fireplace resides in the corner, large-pane windows frame the Organ Mountains as pieces of art in the living room, which has a 14-foot ceiling.

The kitchen, enclosed in slate tile, includes a bar area that can seat about five people comfortably. The granite countertops, which also line the large center island, complement the travertine hood and backsplash.

In addition to stone, wood also plays an important role in the room as cabinets with crown molding fill the walls and large wooden beams surround the ceiling.

Beside the kitchen is the dining room. Once again designed to showcase art, the room features numerous nichos built in to a wall painted with a pop of color.

'The dining room is really nice for parties and entertaining," Lisa Nelson said. "We just open up the double doors and people can go outside to the patio. It's great."

Beyond the dining room is the master suite. Filled with a mixture of small and large windows – for both the view and natural light – the master bedroom features a nook for the bed. While built-in shelves eliminate the need for side tables, the nook's faux painting features layers of colors found throughout the home, from red to gold to brown.

The master bathroom can be accessed from two entrances and includes his-and-hers closets and two linen closets. The room also features two sinks enclosed in granite, a jetted bathtub and a snail shower with multiple windows.

To make the home their own, the Nelsons added the final touches, including the landscaping and outdoor living area - Rick Nelson's favorite feature.

'We're close to the mountains, but we have all the amenities of a resort-type home," he said.

From the covered patio and fireplace to the outdoor kitchen, complete with a grill and sink, the backyard was designed for entertaining. In addition to the patio seating, the space also includes a 12-by-14-foot cedar pergola, covered in lattice and surrounded by a curtain for privacy.


"The outdoor living area with the pool is one of the focal points of the home," Rick Nel-

As for the landscape, the couple wanted to keep it as simple and low maintenance as possible. Native plants on a drip system can be found among the tan rock. The couple used gray stones to maintain the property's natural arroyos.

The mighty potato

Get a grip with this root vegetable

Whether you like them baked or fried, potatoes make a great addition to just about any

Cheap and easy to grow, potatoes can be found in more than 120 countries throughout the world. Grown in all 50 states, the potato is the one of the most consumed foods in the United States, second only to dairy products.

According to www.wisconsinpotatoes.com, the popular root vegetable is about 80 percent water and 20 percent solid material, which is good for the human body. It also is rich in potassium and vitamins.

1. Get rid of stains: After handling delectable fruits and vegetables, such as cherries and carrots, your hands may be left stained. Get rid of the unwanted color by rubbing your hands with a raw potato. The lightening-enzyme catecholase found in potatoes will break down the dyes, known as anthocynins, contained in staining fruits and vegetables.

2. Heal a wart: If an unsightly wart has crept up on your finger or toe, forget those smelly over-the-counter remedies and banish it with a potato. Gently rub the area with a piece of potato until it is covered in the vegetable's juice. Do this daily for a week. The potato's phosphoric acid will kill bacteria around the wart, while its iron and potassium will naturally dehydrate the virus.

3. Take salt out: The next time you're making a stew or soup and are a little heavy-handed with the salt, don't fear – get a potato. Chop the potato into chunks and add them to the pot while it is still on the stove. When they start to become soft, which should take about 10 minutes, remove the potatoes, taking the excess salt with them. The potato can then be reused in another dish, such as mashed potatoes.

4. Fight off fog: Intrusive fog can cloud up windows, mirrors and goggles - and usually at the worst time. Keep fog away with the help of a potato. Cut a raw potato in half and rub the flesh part over the inside of your windshield, or other item. The potato will coat the surface with a starchy, clear substance that will deflect visually impairing vapors.

5. Create floral arrangements: Get help keeping your floral arrangements in place with potatoes. Cut a potato in half and poke several holes into its round side. Next, set the flat side on the bottom of a vase and stick the stems of the flowers in the holes. Not only will the flowers stay put, the sugars in the potato will help them stay alive up to five days longer.



6. Make a stamp: Add your own flair to letters and card, or just give your kids a fun arts-and-crafts project, by creating decorative stamps from potatoes. Cut a potato in half widthwise. Carefully carve a design, such as star or smiley face, in one half. Once it is finished, coat the design in ink and use it like a regular stamp. Not only will your friends and family appreciate the personal touch, it will save you money.

7. Remove a broken light bulb: If a light bulb breaks in the socket, don't risk cutting your hands and instead remove it with a potato. Be sure to turn off the light or unplug the lamp first. Cut a potato widthwise and insert it into the broken bulb. Twist counterclockwise until the bulb comes out, and then throw the potato and the broken glass away.

8. Polish your silverware: Skip the chemical silver polish products the next time you want to shine your flatware by grabbing a bunch of potatoes. After boiling them, remove the potatoes and place the silverware in the water. Let them sit for about an hour and then wash them will soap and water. The tarnish will be gone and the leftover potatoes can be used to make a tasty side dish.

9. Soothe puffy eyes: After a long night with little sleep, your peepers may be puffy the next morning. Comfort them with slices of cold, raw potatoes. Place the slices on your eyelids for about 15 minutes or longer. Your eyes will look refreshed and less puffy.

10. Lure worms out of your houseplants: Keep your houseplants free from root-damaging worms with the help of a potato. Slice a raw potato and use it to line the base of the plant. If the plant has worms, which can be harmful to its root system, the pesky insects will be drawn to the potato slices. Once they crawl out to eat the starchy treat, remove the slices, taking the worms with them.

11. Restore your shoes: If your scuffed shoes don't shine anymore, revive them with a potato. Cut a raw potato in half and rub it on the shoe's surface. After the shoes have been coated in the potato's juices, polish them as usual and they will look as good as new.

12. Make a hot or cold compress: Potatoes retain warm and cold temperatures very well, which makes them a great compress material. If you need a hot compress for aching muscles, boil a potato, wrap it in a towel and place in on the area. To make a cold compress, throw a potato in the freezer for several hours.

13. Comfort a minor burn: The next time your pinky grazes a stovetop burner, get relief from a potato. Peel and dice a raw potato into a piece that will cover the burned area. Add enough water to form a potato paste and apply

the mixture to the burn. Let it sit undisturbed for several minutes. Remove the paste once the pain of the burn has been soothed.

14. Relieve a headache: While it may seem like the only way to get rid of a throbbing headache is with aspirin or other medication, there is another way. Slice a potato in half and place each piece on either side of your temple. Gently rub with the potatoes until the pain goes awav.

15. Stay beautiful: It may come as a surprise, but potatoes can be used as an anti-aging agent. Grind up a potato with water and wash your face daily with the concoction. The potato juice will prevent wrinkles and give your face a vibrant glow.

16. Unstick glue: After a day of arts-andcrafts projects, your hands will most likely be covered in glue. Remove the sticky substance with a potato. Wash your hands with the spud and its coarse skin will make quick work of the

He worked as a business developer for a Las Cruces air ambulance company until the travel schedule became too much. It was at that time he decided to continue his work on his master's degree and began working for a real estate developer, helping renovate flip

In 2009, after earning his master's degree, Campion said he was once again on the hunt for a job when he called the CAA about its vacant Housing Department director position.

"I was really interested in working in the nonprofit sector," he said. "I thought it was a unique opportunity to give back while I

After rushing to Las Cruces from El Paso to turn in his application, he met with CAA Chief Operating Officer Carolyn Kuhn.

"I interviewed on a Thursday, I was hired two weeks after that and it's been a blur ever since," he said. "It's pretty fast paced."

Finding the right place

Since joining the nonprofit in May 2009, Campion said that quick-moving feeling hasn't let up - and that is just the way he wants it.

"It really wasn't until I interviewed for the position that I became excited about it," he said. "I was told how fast paced it was and that excited me."

Described as a "fish fry" with multiple tasks and responsibilities taking place at once, things quickly picked up at CAA thanks to stimulus funds from the Recovery and Reinvestment Act.

"A few months after I started, we had our funding multiplied," he said, adding that while in 2008 the CAA serviced 192 units, the nonprofit doubled its production to 400 units

To accomplish such a feat required a well-trained staff and the ability to juggle – a skill Campion has mastered as housing director.

The most challenging and the most exciting thing about my job is the number of moving parts at any given moment," he said. "We have four programs, two offices, 24 staff members and an intense production schedule that requires both quantity and quality.

Although CAA has affordable housing units and a rehabilitation program - which conducts \$5,500 worth of repairs in homes that are too far gone – its most popular program is its weatherization effort.

"Weatherization takes up about 90 percent of my time," he said, adding that he has worked closely with energy auditors. "Through stimulus money and training, we've really developed their 12 years of practical skills into industry recognized certifications.'

Campion did find time to implement a new program at the agency – building affordable green houses.

'We only build green," he said, explaining that in addition to being socially and economically responsible, building green saves the homeowners in the long run.

Tasked with building five green and energy-efficient certified homes that remained affordable, Campion relied on skills he had previously acquired.

"More than anything, the homebuilding process has solidified my reason to be here," he said.

A week before construction of the homes located on the East Mesa was scheduled to begin, Campion said the contracted builders came to him and said they were filing bankruptcy – a tragic occurrence that would not only delay breaking ground, but could also impact the homeowners' ability to receive the First-Time Homebuyers Tax Credit and a fee waiver from the city.

"It was a dire situation," he said. "It was the first moment I knew I was at the right place because I had the skills to finish the homes. We were able to finish the project."

Going into its second year, Campion said construction on the next five green affordable homes will begin in either late August or early September.

The first five homes was an incredible learning process," he said. "With the next five, we will be experts, and the process should be smoother and faster."

More growth to come

Covering 22 counties, Campion said the nonprofit covers about half the state geographically - from the Arizona border to the Texas border - which is one reason why a new CAA office was recently opened in Roswell.

He said that for the 2011 fiscal year, CAA Housing Department will service 700 families – another large increase for the agency.

"We are really making a huge difference in the lives of our clients, and we're doing something great for the environment," he said. "The staff at the Community Action Agency are the best people I've ever worked with."

Driven to help community members acquire financial wealth through homeownership, Campion said he feels a large responsibility to his clients.

'I'm always willing to work a little longer and harder to be the best," he said.

Just as with homebuilding, Campion's other experiences have helped him in a variety of ways.

"I think that having studied culture has really provided insight into working with people of diverse backgrounds and varying social economic levels. I feel very comfy in different environments," he said, adding that this can be from guiding a U.S. senator through a home to helping a client find the right program for them.

I feel really lucky because I have found a field that is challenging and rewarding and socially responsible. I've learned that service to the community is its own reward, and I know I'd like to stay in this field a really long time."

The five green homes feature traditional and Southwest styles and fulfill five green certifications.

Because of the recent economic downturn, Reeves said they have to deal with cuts in funding and belt tightening as well as a greater client need.

"It's important for the community to get involved," she said. In addition to the volunteer chefs – who pay for the materials to make 100 sample-size portions of their recipe – Anaya said local businesses and sports groups will donate their time. Best Buy employees, Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce Conquistadores, the New Mexico State University soccer team, the Rebel Girls softball team and others will help set up, operate and clean up the event.

Anaya said community support has also been tremendous with several individuals donating large amounts of money without expecting anything in return.

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Builders oppose proposed impact fees

Industry officials worry 'unfair' tax will hinder growth

While the city is trying to bolster its finances, many builders feel proposed impact fees are not only unfair, but will hinder future growth and create residential sprawl.

Affecting only new construction, impact fees already exist for water, wastewater and parks, with new impact fees on transportation, drainage and public safety being proposed.

'It's an admission tax to come into a community and build there," said Building Industry Association of Southern New Mexico Executive Director David Roewe.

A common misconception is that impact fees don't affect developers, said John Moscato, president of Bright View Land Co.

Described as a "hidden tax," Roewe said to build a new \$100,000 house, the city currently charges \$9,558 in impact fees. If the new fees are put in place, that charge will jump to an estimated \$14,785.

Roewe said there are also new proposed sewer and water hookup fees that will drive the cost up to \$28,102

"Plus the dust ordinance," said Roewe, which is a \$8,000 fee per lot.

Roewe said there are four ways the city can generate income - gross receipts tax (GRT), property tax, excise tax and impact fees. Of these four fund generators, impact fees are the only ones not voted on by the people.

He said additional impact fees will have negative effects on the community.

This is on everything, not just single-family housing," he said. "Everything will be taxed to this extent."

The effect of impact fees

Moscato said because new building projects will be subjected to "tens of thousands of dollars in fees," more people coming into the community will purchase existing homes, which don't

'Fees like this will inevitability have an effect on growth and construction," he said. "New construction is at more of a disadvantage than existing homes.

"Why would a family moving here from Colorado have more of an impact if they move into a new home than if they move into an existing home?"

He said all homeowners, whether they purchase a new or old home, need infrastructure and services, and questions why one should get a "free ride" while others "have to pay for more than

"It's ironic that a City Council that encourages smart growth would consider impact fees like this," he said.

Moscato said that if the city hadn't grown in recent years, the community wouldn't have the new City Hall, aquatic center or convention center – all buildings that were funded by GRT.

'Thirty percent of gross receipt tax comes from construction," Roewe said. "This will affect the GRT and programs fund-

A hallmark of growth, Moscato said, is density – which will be discouraged, causing sprawl throughout the surrounding

"Either you want growth or you don't want growth," said Roewe, adding that it will cost less to build the same home in Picacho Hills – which is outside the city limits – than it would in Sonoma Ranch. "People who want to come to the Las Cruces area won't build within the city. People will go to where the fees aren't so high."

Not only will the funds go to the county and not the city, Moscato said residents who build outside city limits will benefit from city services without paying for them.

There is probably not the same range of services outside of the city limits as inside and it will cause a strain," he said.

The new fees will also impact affordable housing, Moscato said, since developers are required by the city to provide a certain amount in every subdivision.

'It makes it less available and less affordable," he said.

Roewe said the negative consequences of impact fees can be seen in Santa Fe, which only had 46 new home starts last year due to the high cost of housing.

'People who work in Santa Fe can't afford to live in Santa Fe, so they live in Rio Rancho and commute," he said.

In addition to discouraging new home projects, Roewe said the proposed impact fees will also increase the cost of commercial construction.

"It will affect businesses from coming in," he said. "It will drive businesses out of town."

"As a result, those businesses will go to other cities all together," Moscato said.

impact fees.

Because impact fees can only be spent on the area they are designated for, the money collected can't be placed in the gener-

al fund like connection fees can. This leads to complications, Roewe said.

'The city can't maintain what (parks) it has," he said. "Impact fees are only for development, not maintaining."

The problem with the proposed transportation impact fee, Moscato said, is that the developer usually pays for the roads and sidewalks. As a result, the roadways are paid for twice - once by the developer and a second time by impact fees.

"It's a coordination issue," he said, adding that developers usually can't rely on the city to follow their time schedule. "We should be reimbursed."

What it comes down to, Moscato said, is fairness.

"With the fees, they need to look at are they fair, can they be realistically put in

place and what are the unintended consequences?" he said. "I don't think they're fair. Older developments require roads to be built as well and take advantage of new roadways.'

While reimbursement for services may be one solution, Roewe said there are others, including eliminating impact fees altogether and putting in place an excise tax that will affect everyone equally.

He said city officials should look at Albuquerque, which reduced its impact fees by half in the hopes of generating more GRT.

He also suggested re-examining the entire fee structure as well as possibly privatizing utilities, which don't issue impact fees.

Roewe said the proposed fees will go before City Council in about three weeks and will most like quickly go into effect if they don't encounter opposition.

Things that go munch in the night

Beetles and moths are among insects invading your pantry



Whether you are a Southwest Tex-Mex fan or enjoy simple, basic foods, your pantry is the life-blood of your kitchen.

With the price of groceries seemingly rising every day, people are trying to stock their pantries with as many foods as possible to help get them through these tough times. As pantries become full, however, the possibility arises of unwanted visitors – an infestation of insects and other pantry pests.

Stored foods commonly infested include flour, cereals, baking mixes, processed foods, crackers, macaroni, cured meats, powdered milk, dried fruits, nuts, popcorn and spices. Insects that feed on these products may also infest other grain-based items such as pet foods, birdseed and ornamental corn. Imagine how upset you would be if you've spent more than \$100 in groceries and returned home to see insects enjoying the foods you were looking forward to eating!

Unfortunately, many insects can infest food in a warehouse before they reach the grocery store and do not make themselves known until they reach the home. The most common pantry pests include:

Beetles, including drugstore beetles, confused flour beetles and red flour beetles, prefer flour, cornmeal, boxed mixes,

dry pasta and dry cereals. They can bore through paper or cardboard packaging to enter or exit the food source.

- Rice weevils are tiny black beetles with a short snout that love to infest whole grain foods as well as cornmeal and flour.
- Moths, such as the Indian meal moth, prefers nuts, pasta, birdseed and dry pet food while the Angoumois grain moth prefers popcorn, Indian corn decorations and seeds in dried flower arrangements. Food infested with moths will contain webbing and small caterpillars that will leave their feeding area and spin a cocoon in a hidden location such as a crack or under other food packages.
- Ants, such as sugar ants, also known as pharaoh ants, on occasion infest peanut butter, sugary cereals and sometimes jams or jellies that are not properly sealed.
 Here are some things I highly recommend you do in order

to best protect yourself from these awful infestations:

- Whenever possible, buy food in small quantities so that it will not be stored for a long period.
- If foods are kept long periods, remove them from their original containers and store them either in airtight glass, metal or plastic containers or in the refrigerator.
- Caulk cracks and crevices where food debris could accumulate.
- Clean up any spillage in cabinets immediately and thoroughly.



Rice weevils, among other insects, can infiltrate food packages, especially whole grain foods, cornmeal and flour.

 Give food storage cabinets a thorough cleaning at least once a year.

If you have continued problems, be sure to call in a local pest control professional.

Stay safe while grilling

Tips help prevent danger while cooking outdoors

Summer is here and so is grilling season. Before firing up the grills, however, weekend warriors should observe a few simple precautions to ensure that backyard barbecue bashes don't go up in flames.

Casual cookouts can turn dangerous – and sometimes deadly – if safety is ignored, according to leading home insurer MetLife Auto & Home.

"Every year, we see dozens of fire-related claims reported throughout the summer because of simple carelessness," said Mike Convery, vice president and chief claim officer at MetLife Auto & Home. "Keeping safety basics top-of-mind can help prevent losses from occurring and help you avoid needless hassle and property damage – and in some situations, injury to you or your loved ones."

Follow these easy pointers to make grilling safer:

Keep barbecue grills on a level surface away from the house, garage and, most importantly, children and pets. When grilling on your patio, make sure all furniture and accessories are far from the grill. On balconies, it is always safer to move festivities to available lawn space. Never grill inside the home or garage, even if it is raining.

For gas grills, always store gas cylinders outside and away from your house, and be sure the valves are turned off when not in use. Check the tubes regularly for cracking, brittleness and leaks in the connections. To determine if there is a leak, simply pour soapy water over the line with the gas valve turned open. If gas is escaping, bubbles will appear. Should you detect a leak, immediately turn off the gas and don't use the grill until the leak is repaired.

• Your grill generates high temperatures, so keep it covered whenever possible. Keep lighted cigarettes, matches and open flames away from the grill, and move gas hoses as far away as possible from hot surfaces and grease. Use a can to catch excess grease.

 Make certain your grill is kept at least two to three feet away from wood or vinyl siding. Placing the grill too close to your home, especially one with vinyl siding, can result in melting, burning, or even a fire. Also, keep in mind that while vinyl siding and composite decking have a higher "burn point" than wood, it's also easier for these materials to melt and discolor, which can result in a costly claim for property damage.

For charcoal grills, use only starter fluids designed for your grill and never use gasoline. Limit the amount of fluid used. If the fire is too low, use dry kindling and add more charcoal, if necessary. To avoid a flash fire – a fire that spreads rapidly through the vapors of an ignitable liquid – never add more liquid fuel to a lighted grill.

 When using bamboo or wood skewers, soak them in cool water prior to use so they won't ignite on the grill.

Keep a fire extinguisher accessible and never leave a grill unattended once it has been lit. If an extinguisher isn't available, consider keeping a bucket of sand or a garden hose nearby.

Never allow burned coals to smolder in any container on a wooden deck and make sure to soak your coals be-

fore disposing of them by wrapping them in heavy-duty aluminum foil and putting them in a non-combustible container away from the house.

"These precautions should be used for all outdoor cooking devices, including propane turkey fryers and out-door fire pits," Convery said. "Above all, remember that whatever you're cooking with outdoors will remain hot for hours and that wooden surfaces, such as decks, can present fire hazards, so never place cooking devices directly upon them. We have received serious home insurance fire damage claims, some involving loss of life, that started because cooks forgot that the party isn't over until the last flame has been extinguished."

The Lytles produce such favorite roasters as mild (NM 6-4 Variety), medium (Big Jim Variety), hot (Sandia Variety) or extra-hot (Lumbre Variety). As we twiddle our thumbs waiting for the harvest to hit grocery store produce aisles, whet your appetite with the following spicy, low-calorie recipes.

Maize and Green Chile Salad

2 cups frozen corn, thawed and drained 1 (10-ounce) can petite diced tomatoes, drained

1 to 2 serrano peppers, stemmed, seeded and minced

1/2 tablespoon vegetable oil

1 tablespoon lime juice

1/3 cup green onions, sliced 2 tablespoons fresh cilantro, chopped

Combine all ingredients in a medium bowl and mix well. Serve at room temperature or chilled. Makes 4 servings.

Homemade Black Bean Cakes

1 1/2 cups zucchini, chopped

1 tablespoon organic olive oil

1/2 cup sweet onion, chopped

1 cup organic black beans, drained

3/4 cup fresh bread crumbs

1/2 teaspoon lemon juice

1 teaspoon sea salt

1/2 teaspoon chili powder

1/2 teaspoon cumin

1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper

Pepper to taste

1 tablespoon organic olive oil 2 tablespoons Avocado Crème (recipe below)

Top with queso fresco

Sauté zucchini over medium heat until it begins to soften, about 3 minutes. Add onions and cook until they soften, about 4 more

Add black beans along with the zucchini and onion combination to a blender and

begin to combine. Add in bread crumbs and continue to combine. Add the lemon juice. salt, chili powder, cumin, cayenne pepper and pepper, and fully incorporate.

Form into four patties with your hands. Make them flat enough that they will cook all the way through.

Heat a non-stick skillet to medium and add oil. Cook the patties about 4 minutes on each side, until firm and browned. Top the patty with Avocado Crème and cheese.

Sassy Serrano Cactus Salad

1 (14-ounce) jar cactus, drained and rinsed 1 small white onion, cut into thin wedges

1 serrano chile, finely chopped

3 tablespoons cider vinegar Pinch of salt, optional

1 small head of romaine lettuce, shredded

1 tomato, finely chopped

2 radishes, thinly sliced

In a medium bowl, mix cactus, onion, chile and vinegar. Add salt, if desired. Let stand 15 to 30 minutes. Place lettuce on a platter. Top with marinated cactus mixture, tomato, radishes and cilantro. Garnish with queso fresco or mozzarella cheese, if desired.

Avocado Crème

1 avocado

1/2 teaspoon sea salt 1 tablespoon sour cream Drizzle with lemon juice

Remove the skin from the avocado by carving around it lengthwise. Sink a large knife into the large seed in the middle and turn. With a paring knife, crisscross the flesh of the avocado and then use a spoon to remove the flesh

Add to a bowl along with salt, sour cream and lemon juice. Use a fork to combine until it's a mash consistency.

White and Spicy Gazpacho

2 medium cucumbers 2 cloves garlic, crushed 1 pint sour cream

1/2 to 3/4 cup low-fat yogurt, as needed Salt and pepper to taste

1/4 to 1/2 cup chicken stock, if needed

3 dashes hot sauce

Scallions and parsley, chopped, for garnish Slivered almonds, for garnish

Peel cucumbers and mince in food processor. Add garlic, sour cream, 1/2 cup yogurt, salt and pepper, and blend. Adjust consistency by adding stock if too thick or more yogurt if too thin. Add hot sauce and adjust seasoning to taste. Place in covered container and chill overnight. To serve, garnish with scallions, parsley and almonds.

Bean Gazpacho

4 cups cooked pinto beans

1 quart low-sodium tomato juice

4 tablespoons lime juice

2 teaspoons reduced-sodium

Worcestershire sauce

1 (16-ounce) can salt free stewed tomatoes

2 cups cucumber, peeled,

seeded and chopped

1 cup celery, thinly sliced

1 cup onion, chopped 1 cup green pepper, chopped

2 teaspoons roasted garlic, minced

1/2 small avocado, peeled and chopped

1 cup croutons

Process beans, tomato juice, lime juice and Worcestershire sauce in food processor or blender, and pour into large bowl. Mix in remaining beans and ingredients, except avocado and croutons.

Refrigerate until chilled about 4 hours. Mix avocado into the soup and pour into bowls; sprinkle with croutons. Makes 6 servings.

Poblano Rellenos

4 poblano peppers

Blister the peppers on all sides on a grill or under the broiler. Plunge immediately in ice water to maintain firmness. Leaving stems intact, remove skin.

Filling:

2 ears of corn

1 medium onion, diced

1 teaspoon garlic, minced

3 to 4 Roma tomatoes, chopped

4 ounces asadero cheese, cut

lengthwise in small strips

4 to 5 stems cilantro leaves, chopped 1/2 teaspoon pepper (or to taste) Salt to taste

Oil to sauté onion and garlic

Sauté chopped onion and garlic in oil until transparent. Add chopped tomatoes, pepper and salt, and heat thoroughly. Place in large bowl, and stir in shredded cheese and cilantro.

Carefully cut lengthwise a full slit in each skinned pepper – remove seeds and membranes – and add filling.

Cheese Sauce (cut this in half if you just want to "top off" the peppers):

4 tablespoons butter

2 tablespoons all-purpose flour

1 3/4 cups milk

8 ounces asadero cheese,

slivers or small cubes

Melt butter and gradually add in flour, stirring constantly to make a roux. Add milk, stirring in slowly and keep it simmering, and let it thicken. Add cheese and stir to melt.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Place peppers in a casserole dish and cover with cheese sauce. Bake for about 45 to 60 minutes.

Note: You can stuff peppers ahead of time and refrigerate. Bring to room temperature while preparing sauce and then bake.

Tips for a successful home makeover

Budget, color, lighting needs play role in room renovations

Here are a few tips for you before you start a room or whole home makeover. I always find the best way to start is to step back, take a deep breath and consider your room(s), your budget, your needs, yourself and your family. It's very important that this all be done before you plunge in headfirst. Feel free to eliminate any of the steps below if they don't apply to your project.

Set your budget. Know how much you have to invest. Be realistic – it's better to know how far your purse strings will stretch before you fall in love with the most expensive thing. If you're like me, the most expensive thing in the store seems to act like a magnet.

Get some inspiration for your new look. Check out the home decorating magazines and television shows. Head for the bookstore and check out the many decorating books. Keep a file with pictures and notes of what you like. Create a "Mood Board." For each room you're redoing, make a board with the pictures and notes you've made. It should include colors, furniture and room layouts — anything you think you might want to incorporate into the room. Think style, color, feel, look, furniture, lighting, etc.

Choose your colors. With the help of research and your boards, you should be ready to make some color decisions. It may just be a color that you like, or it could be a color from a fabric you plan to use, a picture or a rug. If this step makes you a little nervous, start with a neutral base and add colorful accessories. Use a paint deck to select your color(s) and remember that one wall will reflect off the others, which intensifies the color. You may need to back the color down just a little bit to get what you're actually going for.

Think about proportion. Match the scale of your furniture

Think about proportion. Match the scale of your furniture to the scale of your room. Lamps, accessories and furniture must be scaled to fit the room. Many rooms I go into have very small accessories while the room itself is very large (I refer to these as "peanuts"). If you have a large room, you need to invest in a few large accessories.

Suit the scale and types of lighting to the room and needs. A larger room, with larger side tables will require larger lamps. The type of lighting will determine the "personality" of the room, whether it's mood lighting or utilitarian lighting. Consider dimmer switches to give you control over the lighting through the day and evening. What a change the lighting can make in a room.

Consider the use of patterns very carefully. Be careful about using the same pattern on a sofa, love seat and chair. They should go together, not match. You will tend to tire of it soon. Investing in a solid or near-solid sofa and adding colorful patterned pillows that can be changed may keep you happier for longer.

Decide on the order of the work to be done. The magnitude of the project will necessitate a schedule that will be both efficient and productive. Always do the messy jobs first. If you're adding or subtracting walls, you'll need to determine where electrical plugs go. You should decide on all electrical outlets before the electrician starts. Don't forget a plug in the middle of the floor, if you intend to float your sofa in the living room. Be sure you know where the furniture will go, so the plug is placed in the right area.

If you're ordering furniture, get the things that take the longest to come in first. Custom upholstery usually takes eight to 10 weeks, while custom drapery takes from four to 12 weeks, depending upon the availability of the fabrics. If you're ordering cabinetry, it may take even longer. I usually order cabinetry first, so we can be working on walls, electrical, etc., while waiting for the cabinets to arrive. A schedule helps you to get work done and materials received in the proper order and time.

I know that a remodeling job can be fun if it is planned and executed properly. Even given the usual delays and unexpected problems, you can enjoy watching a room come into being when it's happening according to a plan.
