Spaceport on track to start 2011 launches

Virgin Galactic seeks support for operations

Rick Homans, who starts his second stint as the New Mexico Spaceport Authority's executive director this week, said the \$198 million Spaceport America should be fully operational by mid-2011.

Speaking before the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce Thursday, June 24, at the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum, Homans said a number of new potential tenants are interested in the spaceport.

Homans said new and existing aerospace companies are especially interested in the spaceport's vertical launch area to develop new launch systems as NASA changes its focus.

The potential for new jobs and economic opportunity is what has always drawn him to the spaceport effort, Homans said.

"I'm absolutely honored to be back on the job," he said.

But just as the spaceport authority still has many issues to work through to make Spaceport America operational, local businesses need to get ready as well, said Mark Butler, operations program manager for Virgin Galactic,

Ten marriages renewed at ceremony

Breaks between nuptials range from a few years to multiple decades

Ten couples did something this weekend they had done before. For some, it hadn't been that long. For two couples, it has been 60 and 70 years, but this time they had their family

The 10 couples gathered on Saturday, June 26, at First Presbyterian Church of Las Cruces to again exchange wedding vows.

For Nick and Diahn Nevares, renewing their wedding vows was a way to mark their 10-year anniversary. Those 10 years included having two children - son Dominick, 8, and daughter Adiana, 3.

While this ceremony was less chaotic than

the original wedding, Diahn Nevares said she was surprised to find herself still feeling a little nervous, despite knowing each other since they were seniors at Oñate High School. Both started dating after graduation while attending New Mexico State University - he was studying criminal justice to eventually work for the federal government and she social work, which is on hold as she raises their children.

During the ceremony, Rev. Norm Story talked about how the couples know well that marriage can sometimes be difficult and couples don't always agree. Sitting next to the Nevares couple, Kathy Walker with her husband Wayne at her side nodded as the pastor talked about the challenges of marriage. "We've been through a lot," Kathy Walker acknowledged.

The Walkers were married in 1970 and also decided to renew their vows at the ceremony to

mark their 40th anniversary.
"This is a milestone," Wayne Walker said. "This is a wonderful way to show your commitment."

Much of the Walkers' thoughts about commitment and the challenges of marriage came from their decision to adopt and raise four children. Kimberly Montoya, their oldest daughter, said it was neat to see her parents get married again.

"After 40 years, they still treat each other with love," she said.





Las Crucens have many options to celebrate during America's annual birthday holiday

Believe it or not, I still hear people say there is nothing to do in Las Cruces during holidays, and they are either very bored or have decided to go somewhere else for the weekend. So for those southern New Mexico residents who are in the dark about anything to do this weekend, here's a suggested schedule that will efficiently cover many of the key local events and activities for the Fourth of July weekend.

Friday, July 2

Downtown Las Cruces Ramble: Held in historic Downtown Las Cruces, this free monthly arts event has grown into one of the city's most popular activities. The Ramble begins at 5 p.m. and continues until 7 p.m. or so. It's a terrific family venue with music, refreshments, museums, galleries and good restaurants. At the July 2 Ramble, participants will have the opportunity to "paint the skies" by drawing and coloring their own fireworks "display." Admission is open to everyone.

Saturday, July 3

Electric Light Parade: The popular and entertaining annual hometown parade, sponsored by El Paso Electric Co. and Wells Fargo Bank, is scheduled to begin at 9 p.m. The parade route will commence at Apodaca Park and will travel south on Solano Drive to Hadley Avenue, then east on Hadley to Walnut Street, where it will turn north and proceed to the final destination at Sierra Middle School at Spruce Avenue and Walnut.

Concert: At about 10 p.m., the rock group, Journey Authorized, will perform a free concert at the Ron T. Galla T-ball field in the Hadley Sports Complex on Hadley Avenue.

Sunday, July 4

Garrison Flag Raising: The ceremony will be held at 8 a.m. at Veterans Park, 2651 Roadrunner Parkway. This is a great time to honor our country by viewing the raising of the 20-by-38-foot American flag, and enjoy the park with friends and family while the morning temperatures are relatively mild. The garrison flag will be lowered at 5 p.m.

City of Las Cruces Fourth of July Street Fest and Fireworks: The city has reserved the sports complex at 1605 Hadley Ave. for an evening of entertainment fit for the entire family. At 4 p.m., local bands have been invited to perform. At 8 p.m., the city is sponsoring a free concert showcasing country and western recording artist Clay Walker. At 10 p.m., the lights will be darkened and the city's much-anticipated fireworks display

Mesilla Music and Fireworks: If a bit smaller venue is to your liking, the Town of Mesilla also hosts a free music and fireworks event at the Mercado de la Mesilla, 1740 Calle de Mercado. Recorded music will be played from 7 to 9 p.m. At 9 p.m. the fireworks will be displayed, coordinated with live music by New Horizons Symphony Orchestra.

Elephant Butte Lake Fireworks: More than 15,000 fireworks aficionados from throughout New Mexico will make the trek to watch the annual fireworks display that will commence at 9 p.m. from the lake's Rattlesnake Island. This event is free, and the state is waiving the normal park fees between 6 p.m. and the end of the fireworks.

Home with friends and family: Because the Fourth falls on Sunday this year, many businesses will observe the holiday by being closed on Monday. Wilderness will obstruct securing the U.S. border

NM delegation must listen to constituents and end effort to lock up designated areas

Will we be able to secure the U.S.-Mexico border, or will it be impossible? With the U.S. Border Patrol denied access for routine patrol in federally designated wilderness areas along Arizona's border and with new corridors and safe havens for illegal activities in wilderness along the border in New Mexico, how would securing the border be possible?

Our community has provided evidence of strong opposition to S1689, "The Or-gan Mountains - Desert Peaks Wilderness

Listed among those opposing the legislation are the National Association of

Former Border Patrol Officers, Doña Ana County, New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureaus, Greater Las Cruces and Hatch Valley chambers of commerce, People for Preserving our Western Heritage, New enforcement would Mexico Federal Lands Council, New Mexico Cattle Growers Association, Building Industry Association of Southern New Mexico, Elephant Butte Irrigation District, Doña Ana Soil and Water Conservation Dis-

trict, The Coalition of

Arizona-New Mexico Counties, numerous other organizations, 14 range management professionals and 800 businesses, including many of the major businesses in Las Cruces and Doña Ana County. These organizations and business owners represent thousands of members and employees who are your constituents.

Opposition to federal wilderness designation was initially based on the non-existence of wilderness characteristics; a preference for no designation or a significantly less-restrictive designation; loss of most historic access for the public, for Border Patrol and all law enforcement and for the ranchers; and the loss of ranchers' property rights and ability to continue their ranching operations.

While these concerns remain, opposition has grown significantly in view of the flood control and water management issues which have arisen, and with increased awareness of rampant drug and human trafficking, national security concerns, the inherent danger to U.S. citizens and desecration of the land in wilderness and national monuments on and near the border in Arizona.

Those "protected areas" have become heavily used corridors for illegal and dangerous activities. Photos and videos of the areas show the devastation wrought by the tens of thousands of illegals streaming into Arizona every month, creating roads, trails and erosion, and trashing the areas, each leaving behind an estimated eight

pounds of trash in the form of bottles, cans, diapers, clothing and other waste. Some areas have been declared biohazard sites. Some are closed to the public due to safety concerns. As is typical, ranching has been eliminated from the areas.

The National Association of Former Border Patrol Officers believes that as Arizona strengthens its efforts to deal with these problems, new corridors will be created elsewhere. They believe designation of wilderness in Doña Ana and Luna counties would cause creation of corridors in the Potrillo Mountains area, and substantially increase illegal traffic and crime in all areas included in the legislation.

Incredibly, a few environmental activists

have continued to push for 241,400 acres (377 square miles) of wilderness in eight areas and for two national conservation areas including 99,100 acres (155 square miles). They have no regard for the expected impacts to our communities and counties. More than 75 percent of the proposed wilderness acreage lies in four areas, which in their entirety are less than 25 miles from the border. Border Patrol and all law enforcement would be denied access for routine patrol in all

of the wilderness areas, a primary factor causing the literally out-of-control conditions in Arizona.

We ask you not to repeat Arizona's mistakes by designating wilderness or national monuments near the border in New Mexico. The risks are far too serious

In fact, there is every reason to believe it would bring all the negative impacts Arizona is experiencing. Designation of wilderness or national monuments anywhere within 100 miles of the border is a serious mistake, as evidenced by conditions in designated wilderness in the Tucson, Ariz., and Phoenix areas as well as those along the border. Passage of S1689 would drastically increase smuggling, interdictions, desecration and environmental damage to the land, dangerous and life threatening incidents and the number of illegal aliens

We need to secure the border. We ask our delegation to not impose \$1689 on our counties, our state and our country. It is, in all sincerity, beyond belief that they would consider doing so.

A day to celebrate

July Fourth recognizes the moment that led to America's independence

66 They knew

of treason, and

Why does America celebrate its independence on the Fourth of July? Mainly because it works.

It isn't the day we achieved our independence. That was Nov. 3, 1783. It isn't the date of the first battle of the Revolutionary War. That was more than a year before July 4, 1776. And it isn't the date of the last decisive battle.

We chose the day the Declaration of Independence was signed because that was a magical moment that unquestionably led to the foregone conclusion of American independence.

Or so the story goes. Actually, it was much more difficult than that. Members of the Continental Congress seriously debated whether there was much chance

of winning a revolution against the crown.

The rebels had a ragtag army, not much of a navy and no alliance with any country that could be of help.

But the decision to proceed was made, and most of them signed a document pledging their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor to each other. They knew they were guilty of treason and, if captured, were likely to be hanged.

Were it not for some freelance help by European military officers such as Lafayette, von Steuben, de Kalb, Rochambeau, Kosciuszko, Galvez and others, they would have been in seri-

For the past several years, friends have sent me an essay describing the fate of the signers of the Declaration of Independence, suggesting that I use it in a July Fourth column. Somehow the fate of the signers seemed too grim to be accurate.

So, this year, I Googled "Declaration of Independence signers" and quickly learned that the essay has made quite an impact. No authorship is claimed, but it appears to be a rewrite of an essay by Rush Limbaugh Jr., father of the radio personality.

The fates claimed for the 56 signers all

had grains of truth, but all were considerably overstated. Nine of them did die during the Revolutionary War, but none of them at the hands of the British.

Many did have their homes ransacked, vandalized and occupied by the British, but Jay Miller *Inside the Capitol*



that was because they were in the path of the war. Theirs were mostly big homes that were likely targets for both sides to use as local headquarters or plundered for supplies.

Many lost much of their property and had to sell assets after the war in order to cover debts. but none of them died in rags, as claimed.

In short, all the signers took a huge risk and had every reason to believe they might

well be hanged. Today we should all take time to honor their courageous act. And we also should honor all the colonists who endured hardships and losses, including loss of life, in the cause of the revolution.

The actual stories of the 56 signers of the Declaration of Independence are sufficiently compelling without embellishment. In our comfortable society of today, it is difficult to imagine the hardships they all had to endure. We

easily could call that "our greatest generation." Biographies have been written for all the

signers of the Declaration of Independence. I'm sure they are all good reads. I got much good information from "Adopted Son," by Roswell's Dave Clary, describing the friendship between Gen. George Washington and the young Marquis de Lafayette.

This also is a good day to pick up the Declaration of Independence and read it again. It is a brilliant and inspired argument for overthrowing tyranny that captured imaginations not just here, but in Europe and the rest of the Americas.

Upon winning our independence, we became the world's first revolutionary power, making us the oldest revolutionary government on earth with the oldest written constitution.

Americans have much to be proud of on this day. Let us not forget the sacrifices of our forbearers to obtain freedoms we now sometimes want to limit.

Please excuse me for being partly personal. I have returned to talk radio after being away three years. I love talk radio, it is like sitting in a coffee shop with friends just talking about the news.

Talk radio is a rather recent media phenomenon here in our country. It is the common-person media where everyone has a voice and viewpoint. The ideas are rapid and some even make sense. There are yahoos and heroes and people who are so funny it is almost a danger to drivers who may laugh too much.

I find it amazing people I do not know will share their time and often send me thoughts and ideas.

One idea was that I trade my word processor for a trash compactor, but I thought that suggestion was just humor.

I am fairly hard to amaze. Sure, at times I stand transfixed while I gaze up at the Milky Way and ponder the meaning of life. And I do look with complete wonder at anyone who can dance the polka without moving their lips. And I am always amazed by politicians, though the word chagrined comes to mind often.

Talk radio is much like what happens to me at coffee shops.

First, a story is told, then a joke and then I look up and an hour has gone by. I love sitting in coffee shops telling stories and telling what I would do if I were in charge of things, which I am not, nor should I be.

I have always been a bit shy in many circumstances, but not on stage. Early in life, my parents hung the moniker Little Filibuster on me for some reason or another. Then in college, I learned to play guitar, learned a couple dozen songs and somehow passed myself off as a musician, which was incredible since I had enormous interest and very little talent.

But I would go on stage and time flew nicely, unless some shouted, "Play something you know."

I love sitting in coffee shops telling stories and telling what I would do if I were in charge ...

About 15 years ago, I had a serious spat with cancer and was laid low for quite some time. A friend who had an afternoon talk show here in Las Cruces asked me to come down on Thursdays to his show for two hours and talk about education. At the time I was unsure of my mind, unsure if I could hold a coherent conversation, but I did. It was so amazing that for the two hours on the air I did not feel the hands of sickness, I just soaked in the enjoyment of talking live on

the radio

A few years later, I was at a cross-roads because the Title V grant that funded my position at a community college had ended. I thought carefully about what I wanted to do, and realized that my true interest was in doing talk radio full time.

It seemed one of the few things that I was always jazzed to do, so I talked a local station into trying me and for almost six years I was on from 6 to 10 in the morning, five days a week.

It was quite a load to talk that much, but with guests I really enjoyed it.

Then a calling came to use my education doctorate and introduce to New Mexico public schools a way of dealing with students who do not easily learn to read. Three years passed quickly as I drove all over the state. In the car, I listened to talk radio and felt the tug to be back in it.

Recently, one of my favorite guests when I was doing talk radio, Jim Spence, asked if I would like to return to talk radio and be a co-host with him. I will do so and still be involved in my New Mexico literacy issues. On Thursday, July 1, I return to the airwaves with co-host Jim Spence, from 7 to 9 a.m. Monday through Friday, for News New Mexico on KSNM-AM 570.

Summer program wins fans Parents and children learn together

The Las Cruces Public Schools Toyota Family Literacy Program (TFLP) Summer Academy opened its doors Tuesday, June 1, and continues through Thursday, July 15, at Booker T. Washington Elementary School.

Approximately 30 parents are enrolled in English as a Second Language (ESL) classes, 43 children in grades K-5 and 28 preschoolers are enrolled in the TFLP childcare program.

The Child Development Center provides children with developmental activities, social interaction and sensory skill improvement. The preschool provides children with developmentally appropriate activities, social interaction and preparation for their transition into kindergarten. Both childcare and preschool focus on the stimulation of the four phases of early childhood development: language, social/emotional, gross/fine motor skills and cognitive.

"We have seen an enormous improvement with our preschoolers," said teacher Denise Corrales. "They have acquired many new skills and have further developed and improved many other skills."

Marie Garces said her son, Mahtehy, came home excited, saying, "Mommy, I am having a lot of fun at school and even learned how to write my name already."

Students in grades K-5 are offered academics, summer enrichment activities, nutrition and fitness awareness.

"My kids love to come to school,"

said TFLP parent Roselia Bautista.

Children in grades six through nine help tutor younger students, which supports academics and helps build self-esteem and leadership skills for the youth tutors.

Meanwhile, the children's parents are learning English skills, which they practice throughout the everyday activities with their children.

Student Alessandra Tablon, 7, said she practices speaking more English at home with her family. TFLP parent Norma Gomez said, "I like all of my classes."

Ismelda Hernandez said, "I like learning about computers, and the ability to get into the programs and internet at school is easy."

The summer academy has provided many enjoyable and informative activities for its participants, including visits from members of the Las Cruces Fire and Police departments and emergency medical technicians. McGruff the Crime Fighting Dog, along with his nephew, Scruff, made a visit to encourage a safe and drug free environment - and the children got to meet "Dave" from the Las Cruces Police Department K-9 unit. Teachers, staff, parents and students enjoy weekly cookouts, which provide a friendly and familiar atmosphere. The academy will conclude with field trips to the El Paso Zoo, Insights Museum and Holocaust Museum.

The LCPS/TFLP program was visited by Andrea Flores from the office of U.S. Rep. Harry Teague, D-N.M. to observe the innovative activities that are being implemented

at the academy.

Other comments about the academy include:

"I have learned more in the last few weeks than during a whole semester," said ESL participant Patricia Pompa.

"Parents are more comfortable and confident in speaking English and express their happiness to be part of the program and learn," said ESL instructor Olga Aizpuru.

"I have seen such positive growth in all of our participants – language has increased at all levels, you can see that their confidence and self-esteem has grown to be a natural integrated part of their family life. We look forward to another successful project with the TFLP participants," said LCPS Title I Social Worker/Program Lead Yoli Silva,

"I personally believe the academy has provided a great opportunity for our families to extend their school year with lots of fun and learning," said Dennis Zamora of LCPS. "We provide project-based learning activities with a thematic approach for the entire family. The concept is to actively involve the entire family in learning and have lots of fun in the process."

The LCPS Partners in Education (PIE) program provides staff for the academy. Throughout the year, their services to Las Cruces families (from the very youngest to parents and grandparents involved in the education of their children) include parental involvement, early childhood education, family literacy, homeless education and social services.

Main Street work starts

Prep work is under way for the second phase of redevelopment of Downtown Las Cruces, which is the re-opening of Main Street from Las Cruces Avenue to Lucero Street.

Fencing has been erected in the area north of Las Cruces Avenue with construction scheduled to begin early next week.

As part of the project, several large trees in the area will be relocated to various city parks. Other, larger trees will be utilized by local artists for works of art that will be exhibited in a future art show.

All businesses and museums in the impacted one block area will remain open to foot traffic and may be accessed from Main Street.

Teague votes for Wall Street Reform Act

Congressman Harry Teague voted Wednesday, June 30, to pass the Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act, which he described as the most comprehensive financial legislation since the Great Depression and a "powerful response to the 2008 financial meltdown and resulting economic recession," according to a press release.

The legislation reins in Wall Street, ends taxpayer bailouts of big banks, and creates a consumer financial protection bureau, the release stated. The bill also seeks to prevent failing banks and other financial institutions from becoming "too big to fail" and weakening the national economy.

Teague said the Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act also makes important distinctions between the independent banks and small businesses found in New Mexico communities and the risky practices of Wall Street giants. The bill protects responsible community banks, credit unions and small business from unnecessary regulatory burdens, he said.

"The recent breakdown of our country's financial system made it clear that we need to change how Wall Street operates," Teague said. "Families across New Mexico should not be struggling to make ends meet while big banks continue to get richer thanks to abusive lending practices. The bill we passed today will end the era of Wall Street bailouts, crack down on dangerous and predatory lending practices and ensure that taxpayers on Main Street won't be forced to pay for risky behavior and other mistakes made on Wall Street.

"I had concerns with the original legislation passed by the House last year, but I am confident that this conference report protects small community banks and credit unions and that it improves enforcement and imposes stricter penalties all without creating a new, expensive government agency."

Las Cruces man noted in ACLU challenge

The American Civil Liberties Union filed a first-of-its-kind lawsuit Wednesday, June 30, on behalf of 10 U.S. citizens and lawful residents who are prohibited from flying to or from the United States or over U.S. airspace because they are on the government's "No Fly List."


None of the individuals in the lawsuit, including a disabled U.S. Marine Corps veteran stranded in Egypt and a U.S. Army veteran stuck in Colombia, have been told why they are on the list or given a chance to clear their names. One of the clients on the ACLU's case was born and raised in Las Cruces, according to a press release.

Steven Washburn, a U.S. citizen born and raised in Las Cruces and an Air Force veteran was prevented from flying from Europe to the United States or Mexico; he eventually flew to Brazil, from there to Peru, and from there to Mexico, where he was detained and finally escorted across the border by U.S. and Mexican officials.

"More and more Americans who have done nothing wrong find themselves unable to fly, and in some cases unable to return to the U.S., without any explanation whatsoever from the government," said Ben Wizner, staff attorney with the ACLU National Security Project. "A secret list that deprives people of the right to fly and places them into effective exile without any opportunity to object is both un-American and unconstitutional."

The ACLU of New Mexico joined the national ACLU and its affiliates in Oregon, Southern California, and Northern California in filing the lawsuit against the U.S. Department of Justice, the FBI and the Terrorist Screening Center in U.S. District Court for the District of Oregon.

According to the ACLU's legal complaint, which is available online through its website, thousands of people have been added to the "No Fly List" and barred from commercial air travel without any opportunity to learn about or refute the basis for their inclusion on the list. The result is a growing list of individuals who, on the basis of error or innuendo, have been deemed too dangerous to fly but too harmless to arrest.

Mental health advocacy recognized

Sen. Papen responds to need for more services

State Sen. Mary Kay Papen, D-Doña Ana County, was recognized Saturday, June 26, by the National Alliance for the Mentally Ill - New Mexico (NAMI-NM) for her work to improve New Mexico's policies and services for the mentally ill.

Each year, the NAMI-NM Board of Directors selects and bestows its U.S. Sen. Pete V. and Nancy Domenici Family Award to an individual, consumer, family or organization who has advanced advocacy work for persons and families with mental illness in New Mexico.

Besides serving in the Legislature, Papen also has served on the Governor's Mental Health Planning Council, the Doña Ana-Las Cruces area Mental Health Task Force and the Forensics Intervention Consortium for Doña Ana County, as well as other groups working in the field of mental health.

The initiatives she is being recognized for include efforts to de-criminalize mental illness, provide affordable housing and improving access to mental health treatment. Her advocacy stems from her experience as a family member of someone with a mental illness.

"These tough financial times make funding for mental health programs a hard sell, so these programs are often at the bottom of governmental funding priorities," Papen said. "But we have to re-

member that mental health programs not only allow individuals and families to lead productive, active lives that contribute to New Mexico's economy, they also allow our state to avoid the 'hidden costs' of domestic violence or incarceration."

Papen noted many New Mexicans are returning from Iraq and Afghanistan in need of mental health services.

Hatch gets Thor missile for display

Cold War relic to draw space-related tourists to area

It's just not something you see every day driving down Interstate 25 between Albuquerque and Hatch, but Friday, June 25, travelers got an eyeful of a 65-foot-long ballistic missile (sans the warhead) casually heading down the interstate to its new home in Hatch. The Thor missile, named for the Norse god of thunder and the free world's first operational intermediate range ballistic missile, is on loan to the village from the New Mexico Museum of Space History. The village plans to use the Thor as a draw for its museum and community. The Hatch Museum currently features exhibits on the community and some displays related to Spaceport America.

At 8 feet in diameter and atop two flatbed trailers, the Thor towered above the other vehicles on the road. As it turned off I-25, it was met by Hatch Fire Engine No. 12. With red lights flashing and sirens blaring, No. 12 led the convoy through downtown Hatch and many people stopped what they were doing to take a look. The giant missile slowed to a stop in midtown, parking temporarily in the Pic Quik parking lot for a welcome from community officials.

Hatch Mayor Pro Tem Andy Nuñez was on hand for the arrival.

"I am here to welcome the Thor to Hatch. This is one of the first steps towards the future of Hatch, just the beginning of what our village has coming. I hope that before long, Hatch will have a welcome center for the Spaceport. The Thor missile will be a giant reminder for people to stop and visit our community," Nuñez said. "In addition to our hopes for a welcome center, we are also looking at several possibilities to enhance transportation to the spaceport, including trains available in the region."

Nuñez added that he felt the Hatch schools should be in-

Nuñez added that he felt the Hatch schools should be involved in working to restore the rocket to displayable condition. "It's an opportunity for them to give something to Hatch that will be here for a long, long time. They'll be able to show their kids, and maybe even their grandkids, what their hard work accomplished," he said.

Nuñez expressed his thanks to Jim Hayhoe, Wayne Savage and Rob Spence for their hard working in arranging for the loan and transportation of the Thor.

Transport of the Thor to Hatch was provided by the donations of several local citizens. Jim Hayhoe of Spaceport America Consultants, who worked with the village on this project said, "A private land owner has offered to lease the village several prime acres of land for one dollar per year as a host site for the Thor. Although plans have not yet been finalized for the exhibit location, this generous offer shows the level of enthusiasm locally for the future of Hatch."

The Village of Hatch Board of Trustees voted unanimously on June 8 to approve the Joint Powers Agreement between the village and Museum of Space History, which allowed for the loan of the Thor.

"The Village of Hatch welcomes the partnership we have developed with the NMSHM," said Hatch Mayor Judge Nordyke. "It is very beneficial for the Hatch Museum to have the ability to share with the NMSHM, and display important artifacts from New Mexico's long history of space ventures. We are particularly pleased with the loan of a Thor missile, which will help draw visitors to our museum and area. The Thor will become one more link in establishing Hatch and the Hatch Valley as a tourist and visitors point of interest and the gateway to space."



Grill safety tips

Avoid injury and fire hazards

With the outdoor cooking season heating up, the Las Cruces Fire Department would like to remind residents of some safety tips that can help keep their homes and families safe.

According to national statistics, more than 6,500 fires related to outdoor grilling result in injuries or property damage each year. As a result, an estimated \$27 million in property loss is reported annually.

The Las Cruces Fire Department recommends residents follow all safety recommendations for the grill and fuel source being used. Gas, charcoal or electric grilling can be done safely by following these and other safety tips:

- Maintain, clean and check your grill regularly. Check all hoses, tanks and other equipment that pertain to your grill prior to each use.
- Place the grill a minimum of 10 feet away from your house, garage or trees, and do not grill on flammable

surfaces (wood decks, etc.) or enclosed areas.

- Charcoal burners and open-flame devices are not permitted on apartment balconies or decks.
- Use long-handled utensils and avoid wearing loose clothing that could catch fire.
- Never leave a lighted
- grill unattended.
 Keep children and pets away from fires and grills. It is a good idea to establish a safety zone around the grill and instruct children to remain outside the zone.
- Have a fire extinguisher or suppressant available at all times.
- Prevent the build-up of grease and oil to avoid fires. Grease and oil fires are best extinguished by smothering the flames. Never use water to extinguish a grease or oil fire.
- Never dispose of hot coals. Douse coals with plenty of water and stir to ensure they are no longer burning.

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BLM cites safety in closing pit in Robledo Mountains

Danger of rockfalls cause for concern

In a move to protect public safety, the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) has implemented a temporary closure to all public use of the former Community Pit No.1 northwest of Las Cruces.

The safety issue stems from public use of an area that was previously used for the mining of decorative rock. The mining activities resulted in unsafe conditions, including unstable, layered rock walls in excess of 150 feet, and a continuing danger from falling rock.

"This closure is necessary to prevent property damage, personal injury or even loss of life," said Bill Childress, manager of the BLM's Las Cruces District. "We are pursuing funding options and hope to secure funding in the near future. After funding is secured, it will likely take one to two years to fully remediate the location."

Remediation of the 67.5-acre site would include eliminating the rock walls to the extent possible and filling in the pits so they can no longer hold water. At the point that funding is secured, the BLM may consider the possibility of turning the former community pit quarry into a parking lot and entry point for the adjacent Prehistoric Trackways National Monument.

There are several other opportunities for folks to enjoy outdoor recreation on public land nearby, Childress added, including the recently designated national monument, which is accessible by traveling north of Las Cruces on Highway 185, turning west on Shalem Colony Road and turning north on Rocky Acres Trail. The monument has limited access off of Rocky Acres Trail for vehicles with high clearance.

The BLM is in the process of developing a management plan for the monument, which will also address access needs for public use. The 5,280-acre monument is open to hiking, mountain biking, sightseeing and off-highway vehicle use on designated trails. People can also enjoy a variety of hiking opportunities in the Organ Mountains, including the Dripping Springs Natural Area just east of Las Cruces.

Since the community pit was closed, the BLM has tried to block public access to the area using a gate and earthen barriers, but the gate has been torn down and people have been able to bypass the earthen barriers. Although the gate has been repositioned and additional barriers have been installed, the BLM decided to implement a legal closure of the area to provide needed limitations on public use of the site.

The quarry was closed in 2007 after concerns about safety and damage to fossils in the area, including unique prehistoric trackways and plants that pre-date dinosaurs.

Officials urge July 4 caution

Fireworks restricted

The Las Cruces Fire Department is reminding residents how to safely and legally use fireworks during the Fourth of July.

According to a 2006 ordinance, the only fireworks allowed to be purchased and discharged in city limits are ground and hand-held sparkling and smoking devices including cone fountains, crackling devices, cylindrical fountains, flitter sparklers, illuminating torches, toy smoke devices and wheels.

Fireworks prohibited for possession, sale or use in Las Cruces are aerial and ground audible devices such as aerial spinners, helicopters, mines, missile-type rockets, Roman candles, shells, stick-type rockets, chasers and firecrackers.

Fireworks purchased outside of Las Cruces may be prohibited within the city, and may result in citations or fines if possessed or discharged within city limits. With different regulations applicable in the county and the Town of Mesilla, it is advised to possess and discharge fireworks in the locale where they were purchased.

The Las Cruces Fire Department offers some rules and safety guidelines, including not allowing intoxicated people to use fireworks. Keep in mind the hour of use and be considerate of neighbors. Dry weather conditions have left grasses and weeds susceptible to fire, so keep a water supply handy. Children should never use fireworks without adult supervision. Light only one item at a time and move away from it. Use fireworks outdoors only and keep them away from combustibles and busy areas. Purchase fireworks only from a licensed vendor. Follow all label directions carefully and use common sense. Clean up debris.

Spaceport

Spaceport America's anchor tenant. "A lot of things need to happen," Butler said of Virgin Galactic safety testing its newly developed spaceliner system. "But let's say that if we start flying 18 months from now, a

lot of supply chain issues need to be

worked on now."

That's because, Butler emphasized, Virgin Galactic's primary focus will be flying customers into suborbital space at \$200,000 a ticket. With these people paying so much for their trips, Virgin Galactic can't allow the cancellation of a single flight because of something as minor as a lack of spare parts, fuel or materials - let alone something as miniscule as running out of bolts, he said.

Local businesses need to realize that these new passengers aren't just going to be coming for a quick flight and leave. It will be at least a twoand-a-half-day stay during which the passengers will go through training to prepare them for their spaceflight experience.

That means hotel stays – nice hotels. Butler said he believes one nice hotel near the spaceport won't be enough.

These customers will want to find fine dining, preferably food made with quality local ingredients. Their visits will require reliable transportation to and from the spaceport in the desert between Las Cruces and Truth or Consequences.

There will be a need to provide activities for friends and families of the passengers while they are going through their pre-flight training. Though local businesses should offer experiences for these accompanying families and friends. Butler admitted that a jaunt to Las Vegas, Nev., is not that far of a trip for them and will likely be a draw away from local sites.

There are many needs in the

direct supply chain of the Virgin Galactic flight system that should preferably be made readily available locally, Butler said, such as repair materials for the specialized carbon fiber composite materials manufactured by Burt Rutan's Scaled Composites operation in California.

Virgin's owner, British billionaire Richard Branson, is requiring his network of companies to reduce its carbon footprint and be as ecologically sensitive as possible. Part of the philosophy includes having these kinds of resources close to operations, which requires less shipping, Butler said.

Each flight of the spaceliner will require the replacement of the hybrid rocket engine, fueled by specially shaped rubber particles and nitrous oxide. Having the manufacturing of those fuels locally would provide additional assurance as well as satisfy the company's ecological desires.

Considering the money at stake, reliability of those suppliers also will be tantamount, he said.

Because Virgin Galactic's primary mission is making sure the customers experience safe flights, Butler said the company isn't interested in coming up with all the "trinkets" and mementos passengers will want to take home from their trip. That is another opportunity for local businesses, he said.

Since Virgin Galactic is an international company, all of its American employees will have be U.S. citizens to comply with international trade agreements, he noted.

These are some of the reasons why the chamber has created a working group for the spaceport, said Wayne Savage, who chairs the committee. Butler's talk gave some insight to kinds of jobs and money the spaceport could bring to the region, he said.

"We haven't seen this kind of a catalyst for the local economy since the creation of White Sands Missile Range," Savage said.

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Immigration debate

NMSU to examine controversy

Professor: Humane immigration policy needed

Arizona's newly passed immigration enforcement law has intensified public debate about immigration issues and inspired the "Summer Institute on Immigration Reform and Human Rights" at New Mexico State University July 6 through 14.

NMSU's International Relations Institute and the Center for Latin American and Border Studies invite the public to participate in the program aimed at raising awareness about immigration issues and the need for human rights-oriented immigration reform.

"The institute provides a forum for presentations and discussions on various aspects of this complex issue: legalizing the immigration status of residents who are currently undocumented, understanding the impacts of border and interior enforcement and developing policies that address future immigration, or 'future flows,'

and the root causes of migration," said Neil Harvey, government professor and Center for Latin American and Border Studies director.

"Our goal is also to increase our own understanding of this important issue and contribute to the national debate in ways that promote the human rights and the dignity of all people."

The "Summer Institute on Immigration Reform and Human Rights" will include six evening lectures and events. It will open at 7 p.m. Tuesday, July 6, in NMSU's Anderson Hall Auditorium with a lecture by Roxanne Doty, associate professor in the School of Government, Politics and Global Studies at Arizona State University. The talk, "SB1070: It Didn't Start in Arizona and Of Course It's About Race," will focus on Arizona's new law and how it relates to broader issues.

From 7 to 9 p.m. Wednesday, July 7, in the Anderson Hall Auditorium, presentations will focus on historical and comparative aspects of immigration and border policies.

The next session will be from 7 to 9 p.m. Saturday, July 10, at the Newman Center, 2615 S. Solano Drive. It will include student presentations.

The institute will continue from 6 to 8:30 p.m. July 12 through 14, at the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum, 4100 Dripping Springs Road, with sessions on immigration policy and reform, enforcement and due process, future immigration flows and the causes of migration.

ACLU issues Arizona alert

The American Civil Liberties Union of New Mexico has issued a "travel alert" to residents traveling to Arizona, warning of "potential threats to the constitutional rights and civil liberties" because of the state's stance on immigration enforcement.

"Although the law is not scheduled to go into effect until July 29, 2010, and multiple lawsuits have already been filed to prevent it from

taking effect at all, a history of rampant racial profiling by law enforcement officials in Maricopa County, Ariz. (which includes the cities of Phoenix, Glendale, Mesa and Scottsdale) and a stated policy of 'attrition through enforcement' adopted by lawmakers in the state give credible reason to be concerned even before the date SB 1070 is supposed to go into effect," a press release about the travel alert stated.

National Guard boosted

Seventy-two members of the New Mexico National Guard will be temporarily sent to the U.S.-Mexico border region to assist Border Patrol in securing the area.

This is in addition to the 70 members of the New Mexico National Guard Gov. Bill Richardson sent to the region in recent months

"While we have made important strides in reducing the number of people illegally en-

work to do when it comes to addressing drugrelated criminal activity along the border," said U.S. Sen. Jeff Bingaman. "This increased National Guard presence will be helpful as we continue to find permanent solutions to securing our border communities."

Arizona will get 524 National Guard troops, Texas 250 and California 224, according to plans released Monday, June 28.

College football will keep its hands open for more money forever, it seems.

The Big 12 held on to 10 of its original members, the Mountain West Conference lost Utah to the Pac-10 but welcomed Boise State into the fold.

The remaining eight members of the Western Athletic Conference haven't made up their minds about the future. Do they steal one or two new teams from other leagues?

For New Mexico State, the loss of Boise State will hurt financially. The Broncos shared their lucrative BCS paychecks with the rest of the WAC membership. Last season, the Aggies made approximately \$500,000 off of Boise's victory over TCU in the Fiesta Bowl. Not much budget wise, but it helped pay the rent.

Outside of that, Boise State contributed little in other sports. It was very average in both men's and women's competition.

Think about this. In the Mountain West Conference, the Broncos must face teams like Brigham Young, TCU and San Diego State week after week. Teams probably close to being as physically talented as they are. They dominated the WAC against inferior rosters. Boise State lived off of upset victories against big names like Oklahoma and TCU in the Fiesta Bowl. Games the Broncos had weeks to prepare for.

They usually beat one heavyweight early in the regular season after a summer of preparation.

Timing has led to Boise's success. In the Mountain West Conference, the Broncos will have only three, maybe four days to prepare for big and physical BYU. Then perhaps another four days to get ready for TCU. They may find Wyoming a challenge with few days of preparation. Not to mention the injuries they will surely incur against a stronger schedule.

For Boise State, there'll probably be no more unbeaten seasons. Big bowl payouts. High rankings in the polls.

payouts. High rankings in the polls.
One more thing. The Broncos live off of television and bowl revenue.
Bronco Stadium seats a mere 30,000.
Boise State may be the only BCS team to draw crowds less than many of the nation's high school teams.

How impressive will that look in the Mountain West Conference press guide?


Four-time coach of the year steps down

After 25 years at the helm of the New Mexico State men's and women's tennis programs, head coach Don Ball is retiring.

As a staple of Aggie Athletics, Ball is the longest tenured coach in school history.

"New Mexico State has afforded me a great opportunity, and hopefully, I have given them back as much or more," Ball said. "I think I

have left the program a lot different from when I got here with basically 10 pretty good courts. Now we have the finest facility in the WAC and one of the finest in the country, and I would like to think I was a part of that, not all of that, but a good part of that."

Ball has coached more than 1,100 dual matches in his illustrious career and has won 562 combined matches from his men's and women's teams. He came to New Mexico State in the fall of 1985 after serving as the head tennis professional at the El Paso Tennis Club.

Since taking over the Aggie tennis programs, his men's squads have gone 274-280 (.495), while the women's program has a 288-289 (.499) record under Ball's guidance.

"I have two really, really good assistants that will jump in and take my place and I don't think we'll miss a beat," Ball said.

"They might even be better than in the past and that's exciting. I want to see this (program) succeed, and I want to be a fan. I only see bigger and better things for the tennis program at NMSU. I'm glad I was a part of it."

On May 12, 2009, Ball was named the 2009 Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) Mountain Region Coach of the Year for guiding the men's team into the national rankings for the first time since 2004. That was his fourth coach-of-the-year honor, joining his selections as the 1999 Big West Coach of the Year (men), the 1999 Southern USPTA Coach of the Year (men) and the 1988 High Country Athletic Conference Coach of the Year (women).

Boxing club keeps kids off the streets

Doña Ana facility is a step up from resident's back yard

Larry Clark didn't necessarily mind having dozens of young boxers working out in his backyard each evening, but he's happy the

group now has a new home.

The Doña Ana Village Boxing Club moved into its new building last year and is a major step up from Clark's backyard, which included a makeshift ring with a wood floor made of 2-by-6 boards, and a wall to support the speed bags

"I loved to do it," said Clark, who lives in Doña Ana. "We used my backyard for six years."

The state Legislature provided the funding for the boxing club's new facility in Doña Ana and it features a beautiful new ring, heavy bags and speed bags, several weight-lifting machines, lockers, an office and plenty of air conditioning

Clark, a 1978 Golden Gloves state champion, is joined by Joe Triste and Gabriel Bencomo as volunteer coaches at the gym. Clark said 30 to 40 boxers use the gym on a daily basis, and some of the area's professional boxers, including David Rodriguez and Austin Trout, also work out at the facility regularly.

The amateur boxers and anyone else interested in working out are always welcome. The gym is open to the public from 4:30 to 7 p.m. each day, and there is no charge.

"They just have to sign a waiver," Clark said.
"The people that come here are respectful. We have rules and everyone goes by them. The

boxers have to wear shirts, there's no cussing and you have to respect the coaches."

Posters of some of the sport's greatest line one of the walls in the gym. Two brothers work the heavy bags near the posters, while another boxer jumps rope in front of a mirror. Meanwhile, a couple of elementary-school-aged kids are doing push-ups in the ring. As 5 p.m. approaches, the gym begins to fill.

"This helps keep the kids off the streets, especially in the summertime," Clark said.

Clark said the boxers range in age from 6 to late 40s. The coaches work with athletes of all skill levels.

Clark hopes at least four of his boxers will be able to compete later in July in the state Golden Gloves tournament.

"I like seeing these kids have a good time and learn something," Clark added. "I like doing things for others and all of the coaches feel that way. I've been doing this my whole life. This is my home and I love it."

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
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FishingReport

This fishing report, provided by the Department of Game and Fish, has been generated from the best information available from area officers, anglers, guides and local businesses. Conditions may vary as stream, lake and weather conditions alter fish and angler activities.

Northwest

Animas River – The flow is 440 cfs. Caddis hatches are going on and fishing is picking up. Caddis pupa, hare's-ear nymphs and pheasant-tail nymphs are working well. 443 triploid rainbows were stocked last week.

Chama River – Upper section flow is at 75 cfs. There is no fishing report. 741 rainbow trout were stocked above El Vado Dam last week. Below El Vado Dam, the flow is 699 cfs and the water is green and murky. Fishing is fair to good for 17- to 21-inch browns on orange streamers, night crawlers or rapalas. Fishing for stocker-size rainbows is reported as fair. More than 370 rainbows were stocked below El Vado Dam last week.

San Juan River – Upper section: Catch and release, flow is 889 cfs and visibility is 2 to 3 feet. Fishing is good with San Juan worms, pink or chartreuse egg patterns, olive zebra midges, gray foam wing emergers and gray bead head RS2s. Dry fly action is good with Parachute Adams, black ants or dead chickens. Lower section: Open waters, fishing is slow to fair. The caddis hatch is still going on and elk hair caddis or buckskin double bead caddis nymphs are successful. More than 2,870 triploid rainbows were stocked last week.

Abiquiu Lake – Fishing is slow from shore, but fair to good from boats. Walleye are fair to good with spinners, minnows and worms, and several more than 5 pounds have been reported. Bass are good with spinners or crank baits and blue gills are good on worms. No reports on other species.

El Vado Lake – No report.

Heron Lake – The larger kokanee are schooling and trolling spinners at 17 to 24 feet is picking up 12- to 16-inch salmon. Many limits have been reported. Trout fishing is fair from the bank with salmon eggs or power bait.

Jackson Lake – Trout is reported as fair to good with spinners or power bait.

Lake Farmington – Trout fishing is fair to good with spinners or power bait.

Morgan Lake – Bass fishing is slow.

Navajo Lake – Pike fishing is good with spinners, crank baits and jerk baits. Smallmouth bass are good with jigs, tubes and soft baits. Largemouth bass fishing is reported as fair with jerk baits and tubes. Crappie fishing has slowed. Kokanee fishing is starting to pick up and reports are fishing is fair trolling Z-rays at 30 feet around La Jara and the dam.

Northeast

Cimarron River – The flows are 34 cfs below Eagle Nest Dam and 35 cfs near Cimarron. The entire river is very good for trout. Fly fishermen are reporting catches with stimulators, Parachute Adams, Goddard caddis, elk-hair caddis, midges and bead-head midges. Browns are also hitting on Pistol Petes or Panther Martins. Stocker-size rainbows can be caught on salmon eggs or worms. More than 1,790 triploid rainbows were stocked last week.

Costilla Creek – The flows are 84 cfs below the dam and 100 cfs near the town of Costilla. Try golden stones, Copper Johns, small grasshoppers or ants.

Red River – Flows at Questa are 84 cfs, and 114 cfs below the hatchery. The water has cleared and fishing has improved. Dry droppers with Copper Johns or caddis nymphs are good in the slower waters. Dry fly action is good with yellow stimulators, No. 20 Parachute Adams and Goddard caddis. More than 1,330 rainbows were stocked above Questa last week.

Rio Grande – Flows are 422 cfs at Taos Junction Bridge and 176 cfs near Cerro. Browns and rainbows fishing is reported as good with stonefly nymphs or No. 6 to No. 8 Poundmeisters. Caddis patterns are good in the late evenings. Pike fishing is fair using big streamers.

Rio Hondo – Trout fishing is good in the lower Hondo with caddis nymphs. The upper Hondo fishing is good.

Rio Pueblo – Flow is 16 cfs. The water is low and fishing is slow.

Rio Pueblo – Flow is 16 cfs. The water is low and fishing is slow More than 880 triploid rainbows were stocked last week.

Cabresto Lake – No report.

Charette Lakes – Fishing is sporadic. On a good day, limits of 14- to 20-inch rainbows are being caught on Pistol Petes, power bait or worms. No reports on perch.

Clayton Lake – Trout fishing is good from the shore with worms or power bait and many limits have been reported. Bass fishing is generally slow with an occasional report of one being caught while fishing for trout. Walleye fishing is slow with night crawlers working best. Catfish fishing is fair

using chicken liver or stink bait.

Eagle Nest Lake – Trout fishing is good trolling Panther Martins, Pistol Petes or Platte River Specials. Trout fishing is fair from shore, fishing 3 to 4 feet off the bottom with power bait. Kokanee fishing is reported as good trolling double whammies tipped with corn or Panther Martins. Perch fishing is good with worms.

Lake Alice and Lake Maloya – Fishing is reported as good at both lakes for stocker-size rainbows using spinners, spoons, Pistol Petes, power bait or salmon eggs.

Maxwell Lakes – Fishing has slowed, but an occasional 18- to 20-inch rainbow has been caught on power bait. Catfish fishing is good with cut bait. No reports on other species.

Santa Cruz Lake – Trout fishing is fair from the bank and trolling with Pistol Petes, worms and power bait working best.

Shuree Ponds – The Valle Vidal opened July 1.

Springer Lakes – Catfish fishing is fair with cut bait. Pike fishing, up to 26 inches, is fair with Rat-l-traps and Mepps spinners. Bass fishing is slow.

West Central

Jemez River, East Fork, Guadalupe and San Antonio – Flow on the Jemez River is at 22 cfs. The streams are low and fishing is fair to good. Dry flies that are working well are yellow stimulators, black ants and hopper patterns. Panther Martins, power bait or worms may also pick up some trout. Last week, 741 rainbows were stocked in the Jemez, and 556 in the San Antonio.

Metro Drainages - No report this week.

Bluewater Lake – There has been light pressure and fishing is slow for all species.

Cochiti Lake – The water is clearing and visibility is 5 to 6 feet. There has been moderate pressure and the best fishing has been from boats. Walleye fishing is good with Rapalas and spinners. Pike, in the 25- to 30-inch range, fishing is good with large Rapalas. Bass fishing is reported as fair to good using crank baits. Catfish fishing is good off the dam with liver and worms. Crappie fishing is slow.

Fenton Lake – Fishing is fair for 9- to 16-inch rainbows. There is an algae bloom, so brightly colored power bait is working best. Fly fishermen are having some success with white moth patterns.

Tingley Beach – South Pond catch and release: Trout fishing is poor with white leeches working best in the early mornings. Central and Children's Ponds: Bluegill fishing is good with bacon or worms. Catfish fishing is good using stink bait. No reports on other species.

East Central

Coyote Creek – Flow is 1.9 cfs and the water is low and murky. Trout fishing is fair with Pistol Petes, salmon eggs and orange power bait. More than 590 triploid rainbows were stocked last week.

Pecos River – Flows are 104 cfs near Pecos and 1,410 cfs below Sumner Dam. Hatches are still in progress and trout fishing is good below Terrero. The area below Sumner Dam is closed to fishing because of the water release. Last week, 2,109 rainbows were stocked from Cowles to the Village of Pecos.

Conchas Lake – Walleye fishing is good with chartreuse Gizits, jigs and worms. Crappie fishing is scattered and slow. A few smallmouth and largemouth bass have been caught with Senkos. Catfish fishing is good using stink bait or worms.

Morphy Lake – Trout fishing is reported as fair with orange power bait and salmon eggs working best.

Santa Rosa Lake – Water is being released and fishing has slowed considerably. Walleye fishing is slow with jigs, worms or minnows. Smallmouth and largemouth bass fishing is reported as slow with spinner baits and jigs. Crappie fishing is slow using minnows. No reports on catfish. Last week, 70 channel catfish were stocked.

Storrie Lake – Trout fishing is reported as good in the mornings and early afternoons with yellow power bait and fireballs. Catfish fishing is good in the mornings with cut bait or chicken liver. No reports on bass.

Sumner Lake – Winter trout waters, stilling basin: The water is muddy due to the water release out of Santa Rosa Lake. Fishing is slow for all species.

Ute Lake – The water is clear and temperature is 75 degrees. Walleye fishing is good trolling crank baits or spinners with leeches. Smallmouth and largemouth bass fishing is good at 12 to 15 feet with soft plastics. White bass are schooling and are being caught on the surface with crank baits. Catfish fishing is good using stink bait. No reports on crappie.

Southwest

Gila River – The flow is at 38 cfs and the water is murky. Fishing is slow in the Middle and East Forks with Panther Martins, spinners and salmon eggs. Reports are fishing is fair at Willow Creek and fishing is good with salmon eggs off

the Catwalk.

Rio Grande – The flow is 2,160 cfs below Elephant Butte Dam. No fishing report.

Bill Evans Lake – Winter trout waters: Trout fishing is reported as good trolling cowbells. No reports on other species.

Caballo Lake – White bass and walleye are hitting on worms and fishing is good from the bank and trolling. Catfish fishing is good with worms or minnows. Crappie fishing is good along the west side of the lake using minnows.

Elephant Butte Lake – White bass fishing is reported as very good trolling shiners or sassy shad. Largemouth bass fishing is good with white bombers or slab spoons. Walleye are fair using bombers, Rapalas or shiners. Crappie fishing is very good with jigging spoons and minnows. Striped bass fishing is slow to fair trolling live bait. Most have been in the 20- to 22-pound range. Catfish fishing is good on shrimp.

Glenwood Ponds – Trout fishing is reported as slow with salmon eggs or power bait.

Lake Roberts – Trout fishing is slow. Catfish fishing is fair near the dam with chicken liver and worms. No reports on bass.

Quemado Lake – Trout fishing is slow with salmon eggs or corn. Tiger muskie fishing is reported as good with yellow Z-rays or corn. A few of more than 40 inches were caught and released last week.

Snow Lake - No fishing report.

Southeast

Black River – Flow is 5.2 cfs. No fishing reports.

Bonito Creek – Trout fishing is good with worms and salmon eggs. Last week, 738 triploid rainbows were stocked.

Rio Ruidoso – Flow is 13 cfs. Trout fishing is reported as good with worms and salmon eggs working well. Last week, 1,849 triploid rainbows were stocked.

Bonito Lake – Fishing is good with Pistol Petes, salmon eggs and worms. Last week, 4,438 triploid rainbows were stocked.

Bottomless Lakes – Winter trout waters: There will be no more reports until stocking resumes in the fall.

Brantley Reservoir – A mandatory catch and release is in place at Brantley Lake from the Department of Game and Fish. Pesticides, DDTs have been found in the fish, do not keep or eat them.

Carlsbad Municipal Lake – No report.

Grindstone Reservoir – Trout fishing is reported as fair with Pistol Petes, worms and power bait.

Lake Van – Winter trout waters: There has been light pressure and fishing is slow.

Weslynn Reno rode for three first places as he led with 40 points in the 6-and-Younger Division, barrels, 18.70 seconds; flags, 8.53, and poles, 22.88.

More than 55 riders competed in the June gymkhana, Romer said.

Brown's basketball work included Bradley University, Drake University, the Big Ten, the Atlantic Coastal Conference, Missouri Valley Conference, Notre Dame and the Metro Conference TV networks as well as TV announcer for the Chicago Bulls from 1974-78. Brown is a member of the Illinois Basketball Coaches Hall of Fame.

with at least 10 victories. New Mexico State finished the year with an 11-14 record that included a victory over Fresno State for the first time since joining the WAC. Sophia Marks was a second team All-WAC selection in singles, which was the 21st all-conference selection on the women's side under Ball's guidance. Marks along with Manon Sylvain were named second team All-WAC in doubles. They are

the ninth women's doubles teams that have received all-conference honors during Ball's tenure.

The highlight of the past 25 years is seeing the maturity of the players and hopefully, I have given them some life lessons as well as tennis lessons and that is the most rewarding part of it all," Ball said.

Along with the accolades for the high performance under Ball, his student-athletes have received more recognition for their work in the classroom. Ball has had four academic All-Americans. Diep earned ESPN The Magazine Academic All-

America Men's At-Large first team honors in 2010 after he was a second team selection in 2009. Additionally, Sandra Mayr was the last female academic All-American, and she was a third team selection in 2004. Simone Bock was named first team academic All-America in 1997 and 1998, and Iudy Kirk was a first team selection in 1989 and a second team selection the two years prior to that.

Ball's 2008 women's team had eight student-athletes named scholar athletes, which was the most from one team in the country. His women's teams were selected to the ITA All-Academic Team list from 2002-06 and 2008-09. He has had 14 ITA women scholar athletes, many of whom have received the honor several times. On the men's side, his squads earned ITA All-Academic Team recognition in 2005-06 and in 2008-09, and he has had nine scholar athletes.

In the five seasons that New Mexico State has been a part of the Western Athletic Conference, Ball has had 14 women named to the academic all-conference list and 11 men.

Ball has received recognition for his community service efforts over the years. In November 2007, he was given the ITA Southwest Section USTA/ITA Community Service Award.

One of his greatest career accomplishments has been the development of the New Mexico State Tennis Center, which opened in the spring of 2006. The 12-court complex is one of the premier outdoor facilities in all of college tennis and it is attributed to Ball, who was fundamental in overseeing the development, construction, maintenance and growth of the tennis center, where he serves as the director.

Before his coaching days began, Ball was an outstanding collegiate tennis player. He began his collegiate career at New Mexico in 1967, where

he posted a 28-3 singles record in two years. After the 1968-69 season he transferred to Idaho State, where he played his final season. A team captain as a senior in 1971, Ball played at the No. 1 singles position and his team named him the most valuable player. He was the runner-up in No. 1 singles at the Big Sky Conference Championships.

After graduating from Idaho State, Ball entered the U.S. Army where he was a member of the U.S. Army Tennis Clinic Team. In 1974, he was the U.S. Army TRADOC singles and doubles champion. Following his discharge from the Army, Ball moved to New Jersey where he became the promoter and director of the \$25,000 Allaire Open in 1978, a tournament on the American Express Professional Circuit.

In 1980, Ball became the head instructor at the El Paso Tennis Club. There, he coached five nationally ranked junior players, three sectional champions, one national champion and more than 50 sectionally ranked juniors.

Ball's family has always been heavily involved with the sport of tennis and for all of the family's work, the United States Tennis Ássociation named them the USTA National Family of the Year in the spring of 1991. The award was in honor of Don, his father, Russell Ball, as well as the rest of the Ball family for their efforts in the sport over the years. Ball and his wife, Denise, have two grown children, Donny and Darcy.

Assistant coaches will take over tennis program

Vargas and Fernandez to coach men's, women's teams

New Mexico State Athletics Director McKinley Boston didn't have to search far for the new tennis coaches. Longtime tennis assistant coaches Carlos Vargas and Ivan Fernandez are tasked with leading the Aggies following Don Ball's retirement.

Vargas becomes the new men's head coach after he spent the previous 19 seasons as an assistant while Fernandez is in charge as the women's head coach following his eighth season with the Aggies.

Being the head coach has always been

Vargas said. "I'm thankful to coach Ball for giving me the opportunity to work with him and turning my life passion of playing tennis into a coaching career. I'm looking forward to being in charge of the men's team."

In addition to his coaching duties, Vargas serves as an instructor in the School of Physical Education, Recreation and Dance at New Mexico State, and he gives lessons to Las Cruces area tennis players at the New Mexico State Tennis Center.

Along with his coaching responsibilities, Fernandez continues to give private and group lessons and he has been charged with managing the day-to-day operations of the New Mexico State Tennis Center.

"After nine years as an assistant coach, it's great to get the opportunity to run my own program," Fernandez said. "It's a really exciting time, and I'm looking forward to this next endeavor."

In 2010, the Aggie men were ranked for a school-record 11 weeks in the ITA national rankings, and they were ranked as high as No. 51. New Mexico State advanced to the WAC Championship quarterfinals for the fourth time in five seasons and concluded the season with an 11-8 record. The Aggies defeated three ranked teams, including No. 42 Hawai'i, No. 57 New Mexico and No. 58 Texas A&M-Corpus Christi.

Vargas has coached 13 different singles players to all-con-



ference accolades and 10 of his doubles teams have received all-league honors. In 2009, he was named the ITA Mountain Region Assistant Coach of the Year.

He helped the Aggies succeed in the classroom as well with Gustave Diep earning ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Men's At-Large first team honors in 2010 and second team honors in 2009, a first in program history.

In the 1999 season, Vargas led the Aggies to a program-record 17 dual match victories and was named the Region Seven Assistant Coach of

the Year. Vargas has twice led the Aggies into the NCAA Tournament, first in 1997 and again in 2000. A native of Caracas, Venezuela, Vargas came to the United States in 1980 to play tennis at the New Mexico Military Institute in Ro-

swell, N.M. As a sophomore at NMMI, he was named the Broncos' Most Valuable Player when he played at the No. 3 singles position. After two years with the Broncos, Vargas accepted a scholar-

ship at Arkansas State. There, he played both No. 1 singles and doubles for two seasons. He graduated from Arkansas State in 1985 with a bachelor's degree in business administration. Vargas resides in Las Cruces and has two sons, Emilio and Estefano.

Fernandez first began his career at New Mexico State in the 2000-01 season and returned to Las Cruces in 2006, after a twoyear absence.

This past year, the NMSU women recorded their season with at least 10 victories for the 19th straight time. The Aggies finished 2010 with an 11-14 record and defeated Fresno State for the first time since joining the WAC in 2006. Sophia Marks was a second team All-WAC selection in singles. Marks along with Manon Sylvain were named second team All-WAC in doubles.

After his first three years with New Mexico State from 2000-03, Fernandez spent the 2003-04 season as a women's assistant coach and college instructor at Florida International in Miami. There he was responsible for the development of practice plans and conditioning routines for both in and offseason practices, in addition to his numerous other duties at FIU.

Following his stint at FIU, he was the assistant coach for the men's team at East Tennessee State. That season, he coached the Buccaneers to a 2005 Southern Conference Championship and a NCAA bid, following a perfect 13-0 conference record.

Fernandez is a Certified Tennis Professional with the United States Professional Tennis Association (USPTA) and has been a member of the United States Professional Tennis Registry (USPTR) since 1995. He has been teaching tennis since 1990 and coaching in the collegiate ranks since 2000.

In addition to his coaching duties with the Aggies, he is Red Cross CPR and First Aid certified and has been a USRSA (United States Racquet Stringers Association) member since 2004.

He earned a bachelor's degree in psychology from St. Edward's in Austin, Texas. Fernandez and his wife, Lausanne, reside in Las Cruces.

Women's players Simone Bock, Sandra Mayr and Judy Kirk also were chosen Academic All-Americans while at NM State.

But Ball is so much more than a guy who helped others learn how to get their first


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Onthegreen: Message to the angry, rude and clueless

Negativity can be a real downer for your fellow golfers while playing in a casual golf game investigation, but rather just an exercise for Is it especially difficult and nerve-racking to

While playing in a casual golf game recently, I noticed a few of the other players becoming surly and extremely upset, throwing what amounted to temper tantrums when the slightest thing went wrong. An errant shot just short of the green, a missed four-footer, a chunked chip shot.

Loud staccato expletives disturbed the morning quiet, as clubs were hurled about. I was struck by the intensity of anger and frustration that exploded at certain times during the round, especially when there were no trophies at stake and not much money involved. As I later reflected on what I had witnessed that day, I was amused at the contrast between grown men participating in a recreational sport and the emotional eruptions that spoiled the serenity of the afternoon.

"Golfers just out having fun," I joked to one of the calmer members of the group.

But sometimes the tantrums and the surly behavior of weekend golfers can be a drag on the enjoyment that others could be getting from the game. It's like they cast a pall over all the fun we could be having. And mainly it's because they are not really aware of their own actions and how those actions affect folks around them. The self-contempt I see with a lot of golfers can not only be a disappointing distraction, but bring others down as well. Infantile adult golfers fail to comprehend that their misery does not enjoy company and is not welcomed.

I am a strong believer in maximizing our self-awareness – that's the only way we can actually improve our behavior and our attitudes, where they need changing. It's a fundamental tenet of emotional intelligence, which in some respects is more useful for success in this world than regular "IQ" type intelligence.

With the thought in mind of raising our personal awareness as golfers, I began preparing a set of questions – a self-test, as it were. This is certainly not a scientific project or

investigation, but rather just an exercise for you to focus on gaining insight for yourself as a golfer. The questions are intended to be proactive and start you thinking.

What I'd like you to do is proceed down the list of questions, jot down your responses (yes or no) and then write a few thoughts about them in a log or a journal. The idea is that the more honest you are with yourself, the quicker you can change.

Doc's Self-defeating Behavior Quiz:

When things don't go so well, do you typically get down on yourself?

Are you prone to get really upset and lose your temper when you get bad breaks? Do you tend to let little things, seemingly insignificant things, annoy you?

Would you describe yourself as a generally negative or pessimistic person?

When setbacks occur and misfortune strikes, does it usually result in failure?

Do you find it extremely difficult to bounce back from adversity?

Are you typically unable to accept small failures and continue on a path to success? Do you often mentally replay and dwell on

previous misplays and mistakes? Are you too hard on yourself – too self

critical? When things turn sour do you sometimes belittle yourself and call yourself names?

When it comes to personal performance, do you tend to worry a lot about what will happen?

Does your inflated ego cause you to resist, or even dismiss, expert advice?

Are you someone who gets stuck in old habits and resists changing?

Do you feel that you are usually powerless to influence the outcome of things you attempt?

When you notice pressure to perform at your best do you tend to tense up and then falter?

Is it especially difficult and nerve-racking to have other people watching you play golf?

Are you prone to choke under pressure?

When you feel pressure and pervous ten-

When you feel pressure and nervous tension do you notice that your thinking is clouded?

Do you have persistent issues with perfectionism?

Are you sometimes unable to stop unwanted thoughts from dominating your awareness?

Does competition increase your nervousness, muscle tension and anxiety?

Do you think you have to constantly struggle with self-confidence?

Do you believe deep down that you absolutely

always must win or look good?
Would you say that you are mostly unaware of

your own behavior on the golf course?

Do you agree with the statement or idea that "Golf should always be fair?"

Are you extremely fearful of being embarrassed, being seen as inept or looking bad? Do you seem to lack a sense of resilience? Do you tend to avoid setting specific challeng-

ing goals, knowing you won't improve? Do you have a great deal of difficulty venturing outside your comfort zone?

In general do you get the feeling you are lacking in mental toughness?




there is a good chance that you are experiencing difficulties with a negative attitude about your worth as a golfer, and may even benefit from personal coaching.

Conventional wisdom in sports performance dictates that emotional volatility, plus negativity, generally results in performance that is unsatisfactory or inferior – or at least below the player's potential. That can't be satisfying. It can be devastating to let a negative attitude interfere with your performance on the golf course. I'm not saying you have to be Mr. Congeniality on the golf course, but I will tell you it can be mighty discourteous to let your temper and constant complaining ruin golf for those around you. You can't easily transform your personality, but you can turn your maladaptive attitude around.

Would you like to be seen as a friendlier golfer who is better company on the golf course? Hopefully you do care about that.

Early childhood is key to intellectual progress

Counseling needed to overcome an abusive relationship

We have a 1-year-old daughter and we want to raise her right. I've heard that parents can increase the mental abilities of their children if they stimulate them properly during the early years. Is this accurate, and if so, how can I accomplish this with my baby?

Research has shown that parents can, indeed, increase the intellectual capability of their children. This conclusion was first reached through the renowned Harvard University Preschool Project. A team of researchers led by Dr. Burton White studied young children aged 8 to 18 months over a 10-year period, hoping to discover which experiences in the early years of life contribute to the development of healthy, intelligent human beings. The results of this important study are summarized below.

1. It is increasingly clear that the origins of human competence are to be found in a critical period of development between 8 and 18 months of age. The child's experiences during these brief months do more to influence future intellectual competence than any time

2. The single most important environ-

mental factor in the life of the child is his or her mother. "She is on the hook," said Dr. White, and exercises more influence on her child's experiences than any other person or circumstance.

3. The amount of live language directed to child (not to be confused with television, radio or overheard conversations) is vital to his or her development of fundamental linguistic, intellectual and social skills. The researchers concluded, "Providing a rich social life for a 12- to 15-month-old child is the best thing you can do to guarantee a good mind."

4. Those children who were given free access to living areas of their homes progressed much faster than those whose movements were restricted.

5. The nuclear family is the most important educational delivery system. If we are going to produce capable, healthy children, it will be by strengthening family units and by improving the interactions that occur within

6. The best parents were those who excelled at three key functions:

They were superb designers and organizers

of their children's environments.

They permitted their children to interrupt them for brief, 30-second episodes, during which personal consultation, comfort, information and enthusiasm were

They were firm disciplinarians while simultaneously showing great affection for their children.

Occasionally, information comes along that needs to be filed away for future reference. These findings from the Harvard University Preschool Project are that significant. You will not want to forget these six findings. I believe they hold the keys to raising healthy children.

I have a friend who is a frequent victim of spousal abuse. How would she go about dealing with her husband's problem?

The principles of "Love Must be Tough" offer the best response to an abusive husband. They begin with a recognition that behavior does not change when things are going smoothly. If change is to occur, it usually does so in a crisis situation. Thus, a crisis must be created and managed very carefully.

After moving out and making it clear that the woman has no intention of returning, the ball moves to her husband's court. If he never responds, she never returns. If it takes a year, or five years, then so be it. He has to want her badly enough to face his problem and to reach out to her. When (and if) her husband acknowledges that he has an abusive behavior pattern and promises to deal with it, negotiations can begin.

A plan can be agreed upon that involves intensive Christian counseling with a person of the wife's choosing. She should not return home until the counselor concludes that she will be safe and that the husband is on the way to recovery. Gradually, they put their relationship back together.

Oncology society publishes reports

You may have noticed more headlines and news stories about the results of new cancer treatments in the month of June. One reason for this is that the American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO) held its 46th annual meeting June 4 through 8 in Chicago.

At this meeting, researchers from around the country and the world present the results of their cancer research. This year, about 3,000 abstracts, or summary reports, were published in the annual meeting proceedings.

Although these summary reports are important, the scientific community doesn't generally accept the results until a full report of the research is published in a peer-reviewed scientific or medical journal. This means that the scientific methods, as well as the results, are reviewed by a panel of experts before the full report is published.

At the ASCO meeting, physicians and scientists learn about scientific discoveries from both the laboratory and the clinic. Some of the best information obtained in clinical research is through clinical trials. Clinical trials are one of the final stages of the cancer research process. These studies are done with cancer patients to find out whether various methods of cancer treatment, prevention or diagnosis are


In general, clinical trials progress in an orderly series of steps, or phases. This allows scientists to gain information in a way that is reliable and safe for patients. The majority of clinical trials are classified as phase I, II or III trials.

A phase I trial is a study done to determine the safety of a drug or new treatment. The study might test how a new drug or treatment should be given, how often and what dose can be given safely. Most of these studies involve only a small number of patients.

A phase II trial continues to test the safety of the treatment, but it also evaluates the effectiveness of the treatment and helps determine which cancer would be most suited to that treatment.

Phase III trials are the best trials to determine if a new treatment is as effective, as or better than, the previous standard treatment. Some of these studies involve thousands of patients. In these studies, participants are randomized to either the standard treatment or the new treatment. This means a patient who decides to participate in a trial with two different treatments has a 50-percent chance of receiving either treatment.

Food-borne illness could come from unwashed fruits, vegetables

With delicious fruits and vegetables in season, it's not a surprise to find strawberries or cucumbers on sale at the grocery store. As more and more consumers stock up on produce, they should be aware of where it comes from and how to clean it before consuming.

According to a food safety report from New Mexico State University Cooperative Extension Services Food and Nutrition Spe-cialist Martha Archuleta, up to 33 million people suffer from foodborne illnesses each year in the United States, costing between \$5.6 billion and \$9.4 billion in medical care and lost productivity. In some cases, food-borne illness can be life-threatening, especially for pregnant women, infants and toddlers, the elderly and those with compromised im-

When it comes to fresh produce, it should always be washed just before serving. If you wash it before storage, the food will spoil faster because you're removing the natural protective coating that all produce has to keep in moisture and freshness.

If the produce is bought from a grocery store, it probably has an additional wax coating that helps keep fruits and vegetables firm and crisp, but can't be removed by washing. Don't worry, though,

the U.S. government regulates the waxes for safety, and they don't cause harm if eaten. If you still don't want to eat the wax, purchase fruits and veggies without the coating or peel them before

When it comes to washing fruits and vegetables, follow these simple recommendations:

Apps ready for early retiree plans

Affordable Care Act offers relief for employers

The Department of Health and Human Services' Office of Consumer Information and Insurance Oversight (OCIIO) announced that it will begin accepting applications for the Early Retiree Reinsurance Program (ERRP).

Created by the Affordable Care Act as a bridge to the new health insurance marketplace established by the exchanges in 2014, this \$5-billion program provide much-needed

financial assistance for employers, including businesses, unions, state and local governments and nonprofits, so retirees can get quality, affordable insurance.

"The Affordable Care Act not only helps consumers cut their health care costs and have more access to quality care, it also is designed to help employers afford coverage. The Early Retiree Reinsurance Program will help employers continue to provide much-needed health insurance to their retirees," said DOH Secretary Sebelius. "Today, Kathleen Americans who have retired but are not yet eligible for Medicare are often unable to find coverage that is affordable and meets their health needs on the individual market.

"This program will help both retirees and employers facing spiraling health care costs, and ensure more Americans have access to the health care they need."

Many Americans who retire without employer-sponsored insurance and before they are eligible for Medicare are denied coverage or see their life savings disappear because of exorbitant rates in the individual market. Until Americans have access to affordable insurance plans health through insurance exchanges in 2014, this program will make it easier for retirees and their families to maintain their employer-based coverage.

The Early Retiree Reinsurance will Program reimburse employers for medical claims for retirees age 55 and older who are not eligible for Medicare, their spouses, surviving spouses and

dependents. Employers, including state and local governments and unions, who provide health coverage for early retirees are eligible to apply.

Reimbursements will be available for 80 percent of medical claims costs for health benefits between \$15,000 and \$90,000. Program participants will be able to submit claims for medical care going back to June 1.

Applications are now being accepted. A draft application was made available June 7, and OCIIO has hosted several stakeholder outreach calls to explain the program. Additional application assistance, including a webinar, is available online.

refrigerator, cookware and cutlery.

- Under clean, running water, rub fruits and vegetables briskly with your hands to remove dirt and surface micro-organisms.
- Produce with a firm skin or hard rind, such as carrots, potatoes, melons or squash, may be scrubbed with a vegetable brush and water.
- Discard the outer leaves of leafy vegetables such as lettuce and cabbage before washing.
 Always wash squash and melons, even if you don't eat
- Always wash squash and melons, even if you don't eat the rind or skin. When you cut the fruits, bacteria can easily be transferred to the inner flesh.
- Don't use detergent or bleach solutions. Produce is porous and will absorb the solutions, which are not intended for use on foods and can still make you sick. However, some sprays are available for purchase, but the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Federal Drug Administration does not recommend them. Washing with tap water is usually adequate.

A cancer patient who participates in a clinical trial is helping future cancer patients. Many important developments in cancer treatment were learned from phase III clinical trials, including major studies finding that women with breast cancer live just as long, whether they undergo a mastectomy or a lumpectomy. The dramatic improvement in survival of children with leukemia came as the result of a series of phase III trials. Every day, patients with esophageal cancer are treated with both radiation therapy and chemotherapy because a major clinical trial proved that the combination of these was better than radiation therapy alone.

In New Mexico, most oncologists participate in clinical trials through the New Mexico Cancer Care Alliance. This organization is dedicated to providing New Mexico cancer patients with access to investigational treatments.

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




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

Don't get mad, find a solution

It's a cliché, but a good one – just take it one day at a time.

Often, and especially in fast-paced or high-stress working environments, our co-workers can "make us mad."

But experts agree that becoming angry is a choice, not an emotion imposed upon us by others.

In other words, what we choose to think about a particular experience or a particular person is a decision we have complete control over.

If you are criticized, it's easy to make a villain of the person who shares their opinion. It's harder, however, to step back and put everything into perspective. Does the criticism hold weight? Does that person have a reason to express their feelings about you? Ask yourself if the situation merits you getting upset, angry or even frustrated.

If you come to realize that it's trivial,

If you come to realize that it's trivial the person is just insensitive or you're actually at fault, let it go. Look at what you could change on your end and accomplish it.

When faced with a negative situation, I've been taught to find a way to turn it around – find a positive solution.

Unresolved anger leads to resentment and bitterness and can permanently damage a relationship, professional or otherwise. With that damage comes increased stress, decreased enjoyment of life, of the workplace and a negative

Janet Pfeiffer, a motivational speaker and author of the book "The Secret Side of Anger," offers the following tips on dealing with anger in the workplace.

- The moment you feel anger well up inside you, use SWaT: Stop, Walk and Talk. Stop what you're doing. Walk away. Create distance and cool off. Then, talk yourself calm. Discuss your feelings and situation with a neutral party to seek a deeper understanding and guidance. If no one is available, talk it over with yourself. Repeat calming statements, if necessary.

Agriculture department showcases dairy industry

F&A Dairy doubles its cheese production in one year

Tankers full of milk are rolling in and out of area dairies, including at the F&A Dairy Products plant on the West Mesa Industrial Park, which processes raw milk directly into various cheeses for deli and pizza products.

Each tanker hauls approximately 6,000 gallons of milk, and the tankers transport 3.4 million pounds of milk to the F&A plant each day, said plant superintendent Carl Gutierrez during a site tour Friday, June 25.

The tour was part of the New Mexico Department of Agriculture's celebration of Dairy Month and its efforts to promote the dairy industry in southern New Mexico.

"The dairy industry isn't just important because it puts a glass of milk on the breakfast table but think about all the dairy products Americans consume each day, cheese for instance," said Noreen Jaramillo, NMDA public information officer. "One of the state's major cheese producing plants is right here in Doña Ana County."

At F&A dairy, the unprocessed milk is transferred into the plant via overhead pipes into storage silos, which hold 50,000 gallons each. From there, the milk is pasteurized.

F&A has a new brine-tank system for cheese

F&A has a new brine-tank system for cheese treatment. The plant started production in 1995 and at first the cheese was treated in open brine vats.

"With the new brine-tank system, we're able to produce a better quality cheese," Gutierrez said. "We were able to double our cheese production in 2009."

F&A processes the milk to make mozza-

rella and provolone cheese, producing up to 340,000 pounds a day.

"People in general don't know how New Mexico plays such an important part in the dairy industry," Gutierrez said.

Gutierrez, who has worked at F&A for 12 years, grew up working in the dairy industry at the former Price-Black Dairy in Arrey, N.M., east of Caballo Lake. He expanded his

State tax hikes now in effect

Increase in GRT, cigarette tax will help balance state budget

Smokers are now shelling out 75 cents more per pack and New Mexicans are paying a higher tax on goods and services, but a proposed food tax approved by the state Legislature was vetoed by Gov. Bill Richardson during the 2010 legislative session.

The tax changes, which went into effect Thursday, July 1, are part of the state's efforts to shore up the state budget. Altogether, the tax increases signed by Richardson is expected to generate about \$170 million to help finance government.

The proposed food tax, which the Legislature estimated would generate \$68 million over a year, was vetoed because Richardson said it was "the right thing to do, and the responsible thing to do." He said repealing the food tax would be one of his "legacies" as governor. The state originally repealed the food tax in 2005.

State Sen. Steve Fischmann said the governor made the right decision.

"It puts a burden on the folks that can least afford it," he said. "We have a lot of other tax alternatives that would be more fair."

State Sen. Mary Jane Garcia, who first opposed the food tax, voted in favor of restoring it to prevent funding cuts to education.

"We passed it very much against our better intentions," she said. "We were pressured into pushing it because we were told there would be no cuts in education, so we went ahead and passed it."

State Rep. Joni Gutierrez said the decision to increase GRT was not an easy one.

experience in the industry by earning a degree in animal science at New Mexico State University.

F&A Dairy was started in 1958 by brothers Frank and Angelo Terranova in Grand Rapids, Mich. In 1965, they purchased a manufacturing plant in Amery, Wisc., and in 1995, expanded production with the construction of the facility in Las Cruces.

New Mexico has 161 family-owned dairies that milk 325,000 cows. Milk production is the leading agricultural commodity in New Mexico, with about \$1 billion in cash receipts annually, the NMDA reported.

New Mexico ranks eighth in the United States in cheese production, about 600 million pounds annually, which is 6 percent of the nation's total. In 2009, New Mexico cows averaged 24,320 pounds of cheese per cow, the highest per-cow average in the U.S. New Mexico also ranks ninth in the nation for milk production.

Most New Mexico dairies recycle and use the same water three to five times for cooling, sanitation of equipment, flushing feed lanes and ultimately to fertilize alfalfa fields, according to the NMDA.

"I can't stress how awful it was for us to have to raise taxes but we realize that it was the only way that we could save jobs," she said. "It was very tough."

With the new increase in cigarette tax, considered a "sin tax," smokers are now paying \$1.66 per pack, estimated to generate another \$33 million for the state. A measure introduced that would repeal the tax in 2014 was vetoed by Richardson. In provisions included in the cigarette tax hike, Richardson also vetoed a proposal that would earmark part of the tax money to fund early childhood programs.

Fischmann, like the governor, is also in favor of the new cigarette tax.

"The major reason being is that it appears from experience in other states, that we would end up with some real savings on the back end in terms of reduced health care costs," he said. "I have heard responses from both sides (of the issue), and understandably, smokers don't like it. A lot of them say that they will hurt sales in a weak economy.

'You can always come up with something that adds a dollar to our economy, but boy, we could make everyone sick and that would add another dollar to our economy. Is that something we want to do? The answer is no."

The state's increase in gross receipt taxes, which apply to both goods and services, are now one-eighth cent higher, estimated to provide about \$60 million next year. The rate is now 5.125, previously 5 percent.

"I hate taxes – I hate raising taxes," Garcia said. "But the financial situation that we find ourselves in now, it's difficult not to raise them.

"I don't know how else we would fund state government. We did the best we could, and I hated having to vote for the (GRT) increase."

In addition to the GRT and cigarette tax, Richardson approved raising personal income taxes for about one-fourth of state taxpayers, expected to generate \$66 million. The new personal income tax will apply to state income taxes deducted on federal returns for itemized deductions not counted as income for state tax purposes. For a large portion of taxpayers, that means they will see their tax liability rise when they file returns in 2011

As part of the state budget bill, \$5.6 billion will be used to fund public education and government programs, a \$100 million reduction from spending in those areas during the last budget year. The current budget year is from July 1, 2010, to July 1, 2011.

Despite the increases, Fischmann said there are other ways to save money, such as eliminating subsidies for private industry such as the state's Film Tax Credit and getting rid of Tax Increment Development Districts.

"I think we're really missing the boat right now. We're doing tons of subsidies in the name of economic development that really, are just giveaways to certain private industries and companies,' he said. "They're just not well-thought through and I think we need to start pulling those back. We're always in dangerous territory when we, as a state government, collect taxes to support private entities.?

Garcia said she's optimistic the state and national economy will stabilize and further tax increases can be avoided.

"I'm hoping and praying the economy is going to turn around. I'm very optimistic about that," she said. "They say it's going to take about three years, but I sure hope it's sooner than that."



Proposed solar plant switches gears

Solar-thermal technology to be replaced with PV

The NRG Energy company is planning to use a different power generation system than originally proposed for its Santa Teresa facility. It now plans to use tracking mirrors and photovoltaic panels to convert New Mexico's ample sunlight into electrical power, a company spokesman reported.

Previously, NRG had planned to use a solar-thermal system that reflected and directed sunlight with mirrors at a steep angle into towers that boiled water for steam-powered turbines to generate electric power.

The company now intends to use solar panel arrays to generate electric power with a photovoltaic system because using a solar-thermal array would take longer, said NRG spokesman David Knox.

"What we have in this system is transforming solar power directly into electrical power," Knox said. "We've been working with El Paso Electric Co. to determine a schedule to bring solar power on line as soon as possible."

NRG decided to make the change to com-

ply with New Mexico Public Regulations Commission (PRC) time line requirements. NRG also has a purchase agreement with El Paso Electric (EPE) Co.

NRG and EPE had first agreed on a 92-megawatt generation facility, but because the photovoltaic system is a new technology, they agreed to reduce the generation to 20 megawatts, the power company reported.

Construction dates for the photovoltaic plant proposal are pending a review and approval by the PRC, Knox said.

The photovoltaic panels will be set up in arrays. The panels will absorb light photons to turn into electricity.

"When photons strike the solar cells contained in a solar panel, they can be reflected, absorbed or passed through the panel," according to a First Solar information source. "When photons are absorbed, they have the energy to knock electrons loose, which flow in one direction in the panel and exit through connecting wires as solar electricity, ultimately providing power for residential and commercial users."

First Solar is the leading photovoltaic panel

manufacturer in the United States and has been providing panels for the NRG Blythe Solar Project in Riverside County in southeastern California

"Power generated by the Blythe Solar Plant can provide enough energy to serve the needs of about 17,000 homes at peak capacity and will replace more than 12,000 tons of carbon dioxide emissions per year from fossil fuel generation," a First Solar information release states.

NRG is planning to install the photovoltaic arrays on 450 acres near Santa Teresa, 10 miles west of El Paso. But it has not named a solar panel manufacturer for the project, pending PRC approval, Knox said.

When completed, the solar-power system will be connected with an EPE transmission line, avoiding additional construction, the utility company reported.

NRG has been conducting a 21-megawatt solar power research and development project at the commercial Blythe plant since 2009. The solar-generated power has been sold to Southern California Edison under a 20-year purchase agreement.

"This project demonstrates leadership for California in the utility-scale solar market, providing the lowest-cost solar energy available and helping the state meet its renewable portfolio standard," the company reported.

Too-big-to-fail not adequately addressed by financial reform

Bill increases regulation without dealing with fundamental problems

A federal financial reform bill is expected to be passed and signed into law by July 4, but the bill does not adequately address the fundamental issue of too-big-to-fail.

The reform bill, officially known as the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act, is an attempt to address the issues associated with the sub-prime mortgage crisis of 2008. The meltdown in real estate mortgages and consequent loss in value of sub-prime mortgage-backed securities precipitated a recession in the U.S. economy that up to now has been hurting not only America, but most of the rest of the free world.

The extent of the crisis became obvious with the failure of Lehman Brothers on Sept. 15, 2008. Lehman's collapse made clear what had been common knowledge in financial markets. The global financial system has become hostage by too-big-to-fail banks that had gained more and more market share thanks to implicit guarantees by the national government.

Primary among the too-big-to-fail are

Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac, two institutions established by government mandate and implicitly guaranteed by the government. Fannie and Freddie are prime poster children for toobig-to-fail not only because of their implicit government guarantee but also because of their implication in the run up to the subprime crisis. Also included among too-big-to-fail are the 19 largest U.S. banks given a clean bill of health by the U.S. Treasury Department after they passed mandated stress tests a year ago, as well as large insurance companies epitomized by AIG.

Together, these entities are holding our economy ransom. "Guarantee our debts," they say, "or experience financial meltdown like nothing you've ever seen before. Don't believe us? Just look at what happened when you let Lehman go!"

Now, if these too-big-to-fail firms where the result of market forces, I'd say that is life. But they are not. These firms have gained their immense size based on an implicit government subsidy. The very concept of toobig-to-fail is what allowed these companies to raise capital at below-market rates, thereby financing their growth. Privileged access to capital allows excessive leveraging, exposing us all to systematic risk.

The Dodd-Frank bill does implement some needed reforms, especially in the area of consumer protection. But the bill's authors fundamentally misdiagnosed the current crisis. The bill also institutes a new mechanism for resolving very large failures, including a mechanism whereby financial firms finance bailouts through a fee system. But bailouts continue. Lenders to large financial institutions are still protected. Too-big-to-fail is perpetuated.

What is needed is increased competition and the bill does little to encourage this. The bill is an exercise in state capitalism, in which the government chooses the winners, not based on efficiency and consumer sovereignty, but based on political considerations. Large financial sector firms make massive political donations and are protected under


the new legislation.

What should have been done was to increase capital requirement on large banks so as to prevent massive leveraging. Big banks that expose the economy to systematic risk should be required to hold more capital than small banks.

Large financial firms don't like this idea because it means lower returns. They argue it will force them to move offshore. To which I reply, good. Let some other country's taxpayers pay for too-big-to-fail excesses. Besides, where are they going to go? The regulations being adopted in other countries are more stringent than here.

The Dodd-Frank bill is a missed opportunity. Financial regulation reform should impose increased market discipline by eliminating the implicit subsidies given to too-big-to-fail banks. This means forcing large banks to hold adequate capital to avoid failure.

Area new-home sales beat the street

National drop in new-home sales doesn't reflect local trends

Have you heard the one about the huge drop in nationwide new-home sales? The recently released report from the U.S. Commerce Department was no joke. New-home sales in the month of May fell 32.7 percent from April to a seasonally adjusted annual sales pace of 300,000 units – the slowest sales pace on record since 1963.

Las Cruces-area home builders fared much better, however, closing 33 new-home sales in May. That's an 83.3 percent increase over the 18 homes sold in April, but a 10.8 percent decline from the 37 new-home closings reported in May 2009.

Nationwide, May's median new-home price of \$200,000 remained virtually unchanged from April but was 4.1 percent lower than it was one year ago. Las Cruces' May median price of \$155,000 was 6 percent lower than in April and 4.8 percent higher than a year ago. The median price is where half the

homes sold for more and half sold for less.

The nationwide Pending Home-Sales Index for May produced a positive number, increasing 6 percent over April and 22.4 percent over May 2009. Locally, the 77 new-home sales reported pending at the end of May represented a 5.2 percent increase over the 81 units reported pending in April and remained unchanged from one year ago. Pending sales are the best

indicators of future closed transactions.

It is interesting to note that while the number of Las Cruces-area pending sales reported at the end of May were higher than at the end of April, it fell eight units, or 10.9 percent below the peak of 85 transactions pending on May 19.

Pending sales will continue to decline as buyers who contracted to purchase by April 30 work to close their transactions in time Gary Sandler Real Estate Connection



to meet the June 30 deadline for collecting their Homebuyer Tax Credit. Since lenders in some parts of the country are having trouble processing the new sales in a timely manner, Congress is contemplating extending the closing deadline to Sept. 30 – but only for homebuyers who contracted by April 30. If you're in that category, congratulations! It won't be long until I ...

"Kevin would have been so proud that this scholarship in his name is related to soccer," Susan Riedel said of the scholarship awarded to someone who is somehow involved in soccer and academics. The Harold Cousland Fund for Young Journalists Scholarship was created in memory of Cousland, who was editor of the Las Cruces Sun-News from December 1991 until he died at age 58 on Sept. 21, 2001.

Established to honor the memory of Dorothy Ellen Baker, who, above all, valued the importance of higher education for women, the Over the Rainbow Scholarship is awarded to women who are non-traditional students with a financial need attending New Mexico State University or Doña Ana Community

New Mexico's May unemployment rate drops

New Mexico's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 8.4 percent in May 2010,

down from 8.7 percent in April, but up from 6.8 percent a year ago, according to the Department of Workforce Solutions. The national unemployment rate dropped to 9.7 percent. The rate of over-the-year job growth, comparing May 2010 with May 2009, was negative 1.5 percent, representing a loss of 12,300 jobs. Four of the state's 13 industries have posted job growth since last year, while nine others reported employment declines. Government employment added more jobs than any individual private industry, with the largest increase resulting from the federal government hiring thousands of temporary census workers. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in Las Cruces was 8.1 percent in May 2010, down from a revised 8.3 percent in April. A year ago, the area's unemployment rate was 6.7 percent. Over the month, the Las Cruces economy gained 700

Kevin Horner:Copy-machine guru replicates business success

Former Aggie pitcher doubles as family man and local philanthropist

Born and raised in the small northern New Mexico town of Raton, Kevin Horner was more interested in perfecting his fastball than starting his own business.

Horner, owner of PTS Office Systems, a company that has been in Las Cruces since 1986, came to Las Cruces in 1984 on an Aggie baseball scholarship as one of New Mexico State University's pitchers.

"I actually got into this line of business because of playing baseball," Horner said. "A friend of mine asked me to play ball on his team during the summer, and I told him I needed a job if I was going to do that. He got me a job at a copier place and I began to learn how to work on them."

While working at Business Products Center, Horner decided to strike out on his own, putting his copy-machine service and repair skills to the test, but even more so, putting himself at great risk as an entrepreneur with little experience in business management.

"It became a 'What should I do?' situation," he said. "Go to work for someone else, or become my own boss? I always wanted to be my own boss."

So he partnered with David Mosher to help run PTS Office Systems.

"At the time, David did a lot of cartridge manufacturing and I was focused on providing the service for our business products," Horner said. "So I was able to approach my previous clientele and add them to the business as service customers."

Horner bought out Mosher's share of the company about 11 years ago, he said, and began an aggressive expansion and marketing campaign to grow his business.

First located on Main Street and 3 Crosses Avenue, PTS moved to another location on El Paseo Road, now the Family Dollar, before migrating to its state-of-the-art office center on North Telshor Boulevard in 2009.

"This new place is what I consider to be the cream of the crop," he said. "Being at this location is the equivalent of having three or four billboards in town. The visibility is great and people know where we're at.

"There was a big market for what we were doing here. Most people that start businesses in this industry are from the sales side. I had the uniqueness of being a service technician, and I really focused on the customer service side of the business."

Good service is paramount to good business, and Horner has not only made that his business philosophy, but the cornerstone of his professional success.

"In this industry, service is the most important thing," he said. "If you don't have the resources and the service department to provide to customers, nothing else matters."

Horner has partnered with Kyocera to become one of its authorized service centers, offering a full line of its printers, copiers, facsimiles and wide-format imaging systems to Las Cruces businesses.

"Kyocera has been named the most reliable copier the last four of five years," he said. "Kyocera copiers use printer-based engines, and printers are very reliable machines."

Horner has also expanded his products to include Sharp products.

"Sharp has come a long way, very quickly, in this industry," he said.

Regardless of the brand, printers and copiers have evolved since the 1980s when Horner first started as a service technician.

"It used to be a very mechanical job to work on these machines," he said. "And now, it is both mechanical and computer-oriented. Ninety-nine percent of our machines are now on people's networks and our technicians are trained to work on the software end of things as much as hardware."

Horner has 18 full-time employees that service and staff PTS' three locations.

"We have PTS locations in both El Paso and Juárez," he said. "It only made sense to move into those markets."

When asked about the dangers of operating a business across the border, Horner had no reservations.

"Our business has been robbed twice, once at gunpoint," he said. "It's a scary situation, but we have to provide that service out there."

Horner is thankful that his employees are just as dedicated as he is, exceeding the level of service and expertise many customers expect.

"The employees are really the ones that make this all happen," he said. "Without them, I wouldn't be here today."

When not managing the business, a fulltime, often stressful job, Horner participates in various community organizations, such as the 4-H Bullseye Club, a group that mentors young kids interested in becoming sportsmen;

the March of Dimes, of which his wife Becky has been a proud supporter for many years; the Greater Las Cruces and Hispano chambers of commerce; The Sandra B. McGrath Burger Time Golf Tournament; Sixth Man Club; and Aggie Scholarship Association.

"One of my philosophies is that we are part of this community and as a business in the community, it's our business to donate and give back," he said. "We donate heavily to NMSU, high school athletics and nonprofits.

"When people ask, we try to do the best we can."

In the meantime, Horner is content with keeping his business at a slow, but steady growth. His wife and two children, Courtney, 16, and Tristian, 13, keep him pretty busy anyway, he said.

"Courtney's involved in 4-H, she shows lambs at the fair, and is in the honors program and events education program at Las Cruces High School," he said. "Tristian will be attending Cruces High this year and he's also in 4-H, shows lambs, and is very interested in band. He plays the clarinet.

"Until my children are off to college and away from home, I'll keep the business the way it is. I don't ever want to be one of those fathers who are not around. After they leave, I'll begin to look at expanding the business more aggressively."

To honor his business acumen and contributions to the community, Horner was named as Businessperson of the Year by the Hispano Chamber of Commerce de Las Cruces during an awards ceremony held Friday, June 25.



The Preston Contemporary Art Center in Mesilla will showcase six artists working in various media in the gallery's 2010 Summer Exhibition from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m., Friday, July 9, with an opening reception for the artists. The exhibit, a colorful celebration of the second anniversary of Preston Contemporary Art, will run through Saturday, Sept. 25.

Included in the 2010 Summer Exhibition are works by Judith Content, fiber; Richard Heinsohn, painting; Tom Millea, photography; Louis Ocepek, mixed media; Ho Baron, sculpture; and Valente Francisco Saenz, paint-

Artist Content, of Palo Alto, Calif., discovered the textile arts while a student at San Francisco State. There, she began work on striking wall hangings - deeply textured and colorful - demonstrating artistry that has received recognition for decades.

Today, she creates hand-dyed, pieced and quilted silk wall pieces for corporate and residential environments. Her current work explores a contemporary interpretation of the traditional Japanese dye technique called "arashi-shibori." She says the pieces are inspired by the interplay of light and shadow as fog descends and dissipates along the Pacific Coast. Her works display the colors, patterns and textures of stone, sky, fire and water.

Tennessee artist Heinsohn explains that using the language of abstraction in painting allows him to express fascination with the mysteries of life and convey this intrigue to others. His approach is expressive and as chaotic as it is ordered. His intuitive style connects him to the universal energy that exists between all matters, bringing the viewer into the explosive and exciting paintings.

Working actively, he applies large amounts of paint with his hands, of wood pieces and improvised tools, and he suggests making these

images is somewhat like automatic writing. He sometimes includes objects such as wood scraps, worn-out gloves or discarded toys "to further indicate how we are interwoven into a multidimensional flow of things. The vivid colors and simple shapes are meant to provoke contemplation of the vast process and our tiny place in it, and to stimulate meditation of the human spirit."

Millea's photographs on display at the Preston Contemporary Art Center are his most recent explorations in a career that has placed him among the leaders of artists and curators working in the photographic medium. He was one of the very few photographers to reintroduce platinum printing, an older process that basically had to be reinvented with the introduction of new chemistry to the process.

Living in Carmel Valley, Calif., Millea began the first of his large bodies of work – "The Carmel Valley Series." Another widely exhibited body of work done in the small town of Death Valley Junction, photographs of people and the landscape, won the Friends of Photography Ruttenberg Grant in 1982.

He currently continues work on "Women in Black Velvet," a series of portraits and figure studies. In 1989, Millea began to study digital printing, finding these a strong complement to his platinum prints. Photographs in this Preston exhibition are from his newest

project, "The Book of Palms."

An interest in the spiritual potency of ritual icons as they are expressed in various cultures is the basis for the current body of mixed media works of Las Cruces printmaker Ocepek.

The mixing of media encourages the creation of rich lavers of color and texture, which form a lush spatial backdrop for detailed graphic and linear elements," he said.


Ocepek both conventional and digital media to create relief constructions, digital prints and illustrations. Other artworks include screen prints created by successive overprinting of multiple stencils.

Ocepek taught at New Mexico State University from 1985 until 2001. He served for six years as art department chair and won the Westhafer Award for Excellence in Teaching. His book "Graphic Design: Vision, Process, Product" was published in 2002. Ocepek's works in graphic design, illustration and printmaking have been published and exhibited internationally and are included in numerous corporate, institutional and private collections.

Sculpture has been Baron's passion for more than 30 years, though he has also found expression in a variety of visual arts and broadcast media. Sculpture's tactile aspects, its challenges and varied methods in producing each piece hold his continued attention, he said. He abstracts the human form with unique motifs of surreal imagery.

They are intuitive translations of a fluidlike imagery, an impulsive metal flow that unfolds in an arduous sculptural process and evolves from a lump of clay into a humanoid of bronze, cast stone and sometime resin," he

The Taoist belief that every living thing has a place in the natural order of things and each person has a destiny to fulfill is the philosophy that has guided emerging artist, Francisco Saenz of El Paso, in his development as a painter. Crisis, both local and worldwide, has heightened his concern for contemporary global issues, the focus of his current body of work. 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Flamenco fusion

Almitri & Bennett at the Boba Cabaret

A small, but appreciative crowd was the beneficiary of a wonderfully unique music performance this past weekend at the Boba Cabaret.

The two musicians from Juárez played an entertaining and often educational set of what might be described as jazz and flamenco fusion with some Middle Eastern vibes and traditional Mexican thrown in, but that wouldn't really come close to being an accurate depiction of their repertoire.

Almitri Diazmuñoz and Ricardo Bennett – known professionally as Almitri & Bennett – combine the former's agile guitar work with the latter's amazing array of percussion instruments to create melodies and rhythms unlike any I have ever heard.


The instrumental set included fingerpicking blues accompanied by a conga played with brushes, and that may be the extent of what can easily be described. Music from the Middle East combined with what the two described as "country" and later there was a Mexican classic "El Jinete" by Jose Alfredo Jimenez that didn't sound like any Mexican classic that I have ever heard. And I mean that they had an original spin on the tune that was very catchy and enjoyable.

During the course of the 55-minute set, Bennett played a Thai healing drum, a drum that looked like a short log that was supposed to bring rain, a Nepalese ocean drum that simulated wave sounds, a Peruvian cajón, a Tarahumara Indian drum and a brass bowl that simulated chimes and made a metallic hum when stroked by a wooden stick. This was all complemented by the impressive guitar work of Diazmuñoz.

Almitri & Bennett will be appearing locally again soon and they deserve to reach a larger audience.

It's hard to believe now, but Vincent Hallett didn't draw very well when he was in high school. By taking about every class he could, he could paint pretty well, but not draw. So his friend Allan Kraayvanger helped him out.

Years later, he discovered that not only was Kraayvanger teaching art, but had written several books specifically on the subject of figure drawing.
"It's so funny," Hallett said.

"He didn't do anything in high school. And he has this big, thick book to teach drawing to his students."

The books by his old high school friend really sealed the deal when it came to Hallett's interest in and ability to draw figures. Given the choice, figure drawing has become his passion. He works in oil, watercolor, pen and ink, charcoal

and pencil.

"I'll work in any medium and paint or draw anything," he said. "I always say 'Give me a bucket of mud and I'll give you a painting."

That ability to create art under any circumstances is, according to Hallett, a result of many years in the commercial art field. He started right out of high school doing hand lettering for a department store in Milwaukee.

He then did a stint in the U.S. Army Corps of

Engineers in Korea but received an honorable discharge before the Korean conflict began.

Hallett worked as a railroad switchman for five years even though his wife disapproved because of the danger involved. Each time he tried something else as a profession, he always came back to commercial art.


He worked for printing companies and did artwork on packaging. In Chicago, he started working for an outdoor advertising company painting billboards. That led him to California, where he worked for Pacific Outdoor.

"Most guys would take a week or so to do a billboard," he recalled. "They would keep their paints in soup cans and throw a lot of it away. I would use a large palette and I could do the same work in about a day and a half. Plus I didn't waste all that paint."

After California, Hallett spent five more years working for the railroad until he broke

his leg so badly it required surgery. He finally retired and moved to New Mexico. This July will mark 21 years here. He recently donated an extensive collection of art to the Las Cruces Museum of Art.

Hallett will have an exhibit of his figure drawings and paintings at the Main Street Gallery beginning at 5 p.m. Friday, July 2, as part





Museum of Natural History attracts thousands to see 'Hatching the Past'

Visitors are pouring into the Las Cruces Museum of Natural History, located in the Mesilla Valley Mall, to see the traveling exhibit "Hatching the Past: Dinosaur Nests, Eggs and Young," which gives a glimpse into the lives of young dinosaurs.

A combination of hands-on exhibits, educational panels and models of dinosaurs is enough to make any dinosaur-loving kid – or adult – quite satisfied. Beautiful illustrations give details about what dinosaur life may have been like.

The exhibit opened in May with more than 2,000 visitors attending the first Saturday. Since then, there has been a steady stream of people coming to explore the lives of dinosaurs. It stays in Las Cruces until Sept. 12, so you have time to visit more than once.

Only part of the museum is dedicated to the "Hatching the Past" exhibit. The permanent exhibit on the Chihuahuan Desert is always available for viewing, featuring everything from a rattlesnake to a vinegaroon, or whip scorpion. A variety of turtles,

reptiles and insects make interesting subjects for study. You never know what you might discover. On a recent Sunday, Naturalist Richard Quick showed visitors a Double-tailed Swallowtail Butterfly that hatched the previous night, before setting it free on the desert willow trees just outside the museum.

The museum offers a number of fascinating programs. If your little naturalists want the opportunity to learn more about science, they can attend the Saturday Science program at 11 a.m. Saturday, July 10 to learn about rockets or Animal Encounters at 4 p.m. Saturday, July 31, when guests can meet the animals of the desert. For adults and kids, Descubra el Desierto at 7 p.m. Tuesday, July 20, shares topics about natural history while the Sky Safari at 9 p.m. Saturday, July 17, at La Llorona Park (where Picacho Avenue crosses the Rio Grande) gives the chance to explore the night sky with telescopes under the expert guidance of the New

Mexico State University Astronomy Department. Science Café, 5:30 p.m. July 29 is the opportunity to discuss topics of current scientific interest with experts. The NMSU chapter of Sigma Xi and the museum partner to provide these monthly science round table discussions.



Don't be confused by the name - they have chicken

Hmm, what do you think they serve there?

The name doesn't conjure up anything too fancy or elegant – no jade pagodas or golden dragons here. It's straightforward and simple. Teriyaki – Chicken – House. It's a name that pretty much tells you what to expect. You see it and you don't have to think too hard about what's on the menu.

You don't see Teriyaki Chicken House and think to yourself, "Gee, I wonder what they have to eat there?"

Let's say you have a craving for ... I don't know ... teriyaki chicken and you find yourself saying, "I wonder where I can get some? Oh, here's a place called Teriyaki Chicken House. I'll bet they have just what I am hungry for."

Carving a niche for yourself in the food scene isn't easy, but that's just what they've done at Teriyaki Chicken House. They specialize in "you know what" and I've never had any better.

To be honest, they do have about 17 different plates or combination platters and a few other items such as dumplings, egg rolls (with chicken and green chile, quite tasty) and a lovely green chile tempura. But all the plates start with the same basic premise – well-prepared meat on a bed of really nice and sticky rice with some crispy steamed broccoli and

carrots on top.


Teriyaki is a Japanese word that means glaze (teri) plus broil (yaki). It is a dish that has permeated just about every place that serves Asian cuisine, but I haven't had it prepared quite the way it is at TCH" – not locally anyway.

They offer chicken, beef and either skewered/ grilled or fried shrimp on the teriyaki plates with deep-fried sweet and sour chicken as another option. There is a seafood salad or grilled shrimp salad. The meat comes in various combinations or the dreaded "double" portion. You can also substitute fried rice for steamed or get noodles instead.

One entrée that particularly interested me was the General Tso chicken - which is very spicy – and of course the yakisoba chicken, which comes with green chile (you can get it with other meat choices as well).

Now Teriyaki Chicken House has been around for quite a while – almost 14 years I was surprised to know. It has always been well-run and high quality. What you probably didn't notice is that it changed hands back in January. You likely didn't notice because it stayed the same - no changes in efficiency or quality.

The new owners are Ken and Edlinn Hong who moved here from Los Angeles just to

take over the place. Edlinn's family was acquainted with Trinh Ngo and Xeng Thach, the previous owners, and when it became available they looked at owning their own place as a great opportunity. Ken Hong was a CPA and Edlinn had experience in the Chinese fast food business. Las Cruces is quite a change from LA.

The couple works together in the operation with Ken Hong doing prep work and cooking (or supervising the kitchen) and Edlinn Hong managing the front. They

do have to balance running the restaurant and raising Alyssa, their 16-monthold daughter. And they are proud that not only are all the ingredients fresh daily, but they use no MSG.

"We were lucky to have a good customer base to begin with," Ken said. "We have kept them and built up our own."

One change that is obvious is that TCH is, as of May, open on Saturday. For a long time it was only open Monday through Friday and I remember numerous times hearing people bemoaning the fact that they couldn't get the good – say it with me now - "teriyaki chicken" on Saturday.

So before you go looking for teriyaki chicken or other delicious things and find yourself scratching your head in front of the Ming Dynasty Paper Lantern Inn of the Seventh Happiness and wondering what they serve, remember these three words Teriyaki Chicken House.

'The Girl with the Dragon Tattoo'

Swedish film based on popular novel is not for the faint of heart

Dark and a bit too long, "The Girl with the Dragon Tattoo" weaves its way through an underworld of Nazi sympathizers and through the avenues of the power and wealth.

Lisbeth, a tattooed, pierced and mystery-filled computer whiz of a young woman begrudgingly forms an alliance with disgraced journalist Mikael Blomkvist to find out who murdered the niece of a family patriarch some 40 years earlier.

Lisbeth is the no-nonsense type, and at first refuses to help Blomkvist, only relenting after much groveling and deal making with him. Humorless and bleak, Lisbeth's

emotional content is stunted, and even though she later beds Mikael, who becomes more and more fascinated and smitten with her, the encounter allows her to just use him to meet her most basic sexual needs ... something she does with others of both genders to achieve her minimal emotional quota with other humans.

They set off to find evidence of the killer of Harriet, the young, attractive niece of Henrik, who believes she was murdered by a member of his own family many years earlier.

They form a truly odd couple of sleuths as the film weaves in and out of a labyrinth of secrets, false leads and possibilities as Mikael and Lisbeth follow each tiny grain of evidence to conclusion.


And along the way there are several other mysterious and sometimes ugly murders and other occurrences, all of which keep the quick pacing of the film busy enough to cover up several plot holes.

Lisbeth is definitely in charge here, and it is only through her smarts and diligence that any progress is made, as they follow the bloody trail that gives new meaning to the term dysfunctional family.

Complicating things for Lisbeth is the fact that she is on probation, and only receives good reports from her creepy probation officer by satisfying his increasingly bizarre sexual demands ... at least for a while.

Partly Gothic thriller, part serial murderer epic and part feminist anti-hero flick, (and not for the timid), "GWTDT" carries itself well to the conclusion, which is somewhat unexpected.

The film is from a series of novels by



Noomi Rapace as the no-nonsense title character in "The Girl with the Dragon Tattoo."

Swedish writer Stieg Larsson, and there are two more films with Lisbeth as the main character waiting in the wings "The Girl Who Played with Fire" and the wonderfully titled "The Girl Who Kicked the Hornet's Nest," scheduled for release later this year. It will be interesting to see how the follow-ups to this dark, harsh, punk-style mystery play out.

One of the most popular films ever made in its native Sweden, it is a taut well-made and occasionally violent (those into rape revenge should line up to see this one) piece, which will certainly be reduced a peg or two in credibility when the planned U.S. remake is unleashed.

See it now, not then ...

'Captains Courageous'

Film is old-fashioned, quaint

The CineMatinee movie for Saturday, July 3, is "Captains Courageous" (1937, 111 minutes, in black and white). Nominated for four Oscars (winner of one), Victor Fleming's "Captains Courageous" is a warmhearted, old-fashioned, and quaint little adventure story based on a novel by Rudyard Kipling. It earned nominations for Best Editing, Best Screenplay and Best Picture, but the film's only win went to Spencer Tracy – for playing a broad (yet lovable) Portuguese caricature named Manuel.

Harvey Cheyne is a spoiled little bugger indeed. When he's not bullying, whining or using his rich father's name as currency, he's just a stuck-up little jerk in general. But after Harvey's latest scam goes awry, his loving-yet-harried tycoon of a father decides to bring the kid on his next business trip.

Thanks to his own ego, Harvey ends up falling off a cruise liner, only to be rescued by the aforementioned Portuguese fisherman. Stuck aboard the fishing trawler "We're Here," Harvey must get used to his smelly surroundings and learn the value of

humility ... because the kid's got a few solid months before he can return to the lap of luxury.

Young Freddie Bartholomew is devilishly entertaining during Harvey's early mischief, and the kid actually brings some emotional weight to his later scenes, once the appropriate lessons have been learned. As the salty "We're Here" captain Lionel Barrymore steals just about every scene he's in, while Melvyn Douglas does a fine job as Harvey's loving yet perpetually distracted papa. As far as Mr. Tracy's Oscar-winning performance goes, well, it's really kinda broad and exaggerated and sometimes silly ... on the surface, anyway. Once you get used to the actor's cartoonish Portuguese accent, there's a real sweetness to his performance that's absolutely integral to the film.

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

A home so nice, they built it twice

Hilltop home combines Southwest architecture with a chic Mediterranean flair

Sometimes a piece of property is more than dirt and sand.

For Alma and Bosko Lemez, their 1-acre lot at 1190 Boling Lane in Picacho Hills allowed them to create the home of their dreams with ample space and breathtaking views.

"The lot is big," Alma Lemez said. "There is a big difference between having 1 acre and one-third of an acre. There is more privacy."

With their dream lot chosen, the couple hired Summit Building & Development in 2005 to build the home. The couple didn't have to look far for design inspiration.

"We were so impressed by the location, we decided to move and build the same house," Alma Lemez said.

The couple said they loved their home in El Paso so much that they decided to build it again in Las Cruces with a few minor changes, such as flipping the floor plan to better fit the lot and capture the views and adding square footage.

"We made it a little different," Bosko Lemez said. "We kept everything that was good in the house and left out the bad. We also added some stuff to be different."

The couple had to develop and level the lot, which took a bulldozer two days to complete, Bosko Lemez said. Next, the couple worked closely with Harlo Dynek, owner of Summit Building & Development and their neighbor, to perfect the 3,125-square-foot home.

"Bosko had this vision of how he wanted things," Dvnek said.

Part of the vision for the Southwest home with touches of Mediterranean style throughout included custom elements, such as 8-foot teak wood doors, oak cabinets and Italian tile.

"Everything in this house was built here," Bosko Lemez said of the cabinets. "Nothing

was (store) bought."

Near the front of the home is a formal living room, perfect for entertaining, the couple said. Large arches lead to the formal kitchen.

The Lemezes said they were influenced by homes in Mexico and used bold accent colors, such as terra cotta, rust and green, to break up the white walls.

At the back of the home is the informal living room and kitchen, which are surrounded by windows to bring in the view of the Organ Mountains and city lights.

A kiva-style fireplace can be found in the informal living room. Vigas line the 14-foot ceiling, which includes several small windows for extra light.

"It's nice in the evening," he said. "You can see the sky."

As one of the family's most-used rooms, Alma Lemez said she wanted the kitchen to reflect their active lifestyle.

"I built it exactly how I like it," Alma Lemez said.

"Our roots are European," Bosko Lemez said. "We spend most of our time in the kitchen so we wanted to have space."

Italian granite countertops cover the kitchen, including the oversized island, as oak cabinets fill the spacious room.

Bosko Lemez said the home's four bedrooms – two of which share a bathroom – include more square footage than that found on the original floor plan, as well as more windows to bring the view of Picacho Peak indoors.

One bedroom, finished in a light pink paint with built-in shelves, features its own bathroom, which Bosko Lemez said is great for guests or teenagers.

Terra cotta paint decorates the master bedroom, which includes the couple's favorite view.

"When I wake up in the morning, I can see the Organ Mountains," Bosko Lemez said.

The master bathroom includes a jetted

bathtub – encased in creamy neutral tones that can be found in all of the bathrooms – and a standing glass shower.

Almost another room, the backyard includes a covered patio as well as a flagstone path to a pallet, perfect for an outdoor barbecue.

"The house was built to spend more time outside," Bosko Lemez said.

A small rock wall surrounds the backyard, although the property extends around the wall and to Barcelona Ridge Road. The heart of the yard is the swimming pool, which Bosko Lemez designed himself.

"He orchestrated the backyard and pool into what he wanted," Dynek said.

Measuring 32-by-15 feet and 5 to 7 feet deep, the Roman-style swimming pool features

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a waterfall spa and lights that change colors.

Surrounding the backyard, as well as front courtyard, are about 22 palm trees as well as several native shrubs, succulents and rose bushes.

"We bought based on what we liked," he said. A small garden bed resides beside the home, and includes several herbs for homemade tea.

Bosko Lemez said the couple's enjoyment of the home changes with the seasons, explaining that in the winter their favorite area is next to the fireplace while in the summer the couple likes lounging around the pool and in the spring they can be found working in the garden.

Overall, the couple said it has been the majestic views and gracious amount of room that they have delighted in the most.

"We like a lot of open space," he said. "Since we're on top, we can see (our neighbors), and they can't see us."





State leads the nation in weatherization efforts

DOE congratulates New Mexico for weatherizing more than 880 homes

The U.S. Department of Energy announced Friday, June 18, that New Mexico has weatherized 881 homes under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act as of May 31.

New Mexico is one of the country's weatherization leaders and has now weatherized more than 30 percent of their total targeted homes.

Through the Weatherization Assistance Program, the state is making low-income homes more energy efficient, saving families an average of more than \$400 on their energy bills, according to a recent study by Oak Ridge National Laboratory.

The Recovery Act-funded program is also creating jobs locally. According to the state, state and local weatherization providers employed nearly 50 workers during the first three months of the year.

What we see here today is that states like New Mexico are moving forward aggressively with the weatherization program, delivering energy and cost savings for the families who need it most," said Cathy Zoi, DOE assistant secretary for Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy. "This Recovery Act funding is helping to create jobs in local communities while putting America on the path to a clean energy future.

As part of the weatherization program, states and local organizations are investing in workforce development and green job training. On Friday, June 4, the Department of Energy announced that the New Mexico Mortgage Finance Authority in Santa Fe was selected to receive almost \$1 million in additional funding to develop and expand New Mexico's weatherization training programs.

The main objectives of New Mexico's \$919,579 project are to create a system for training the weatherization workforce in New Mexico by developing state technical standards and an online curriculum, equip a training center at Santa Fe Community College (SFCC), and train the existing weatherization

workforce on the state's new technical standards by 2012.

David Bates is a subcontractor with the largest local service provider in New Mexico, the Los Amigos Educational Resource Center in Santa Fe.

"Jobs in New Mexico were getting thinner and thinner because there wasn't much building going on. Because of the Recovery Act, I've been able to offer jobs and training to New Mexicans that make them employable for years to come," Bates said. "I truly believe that the only way we can move to adopting clean energy is through energy efficiency. This program is paying off in all kinds of ways."

Under the Recovery Act, New Mexico was allocated \$26.8 million for the weatherization program. The state previously had access to the first 50 percent of the funding. By weatherizing more than 30 percent of their total estimated homes and meeting a series of aggressive accountability and reporting milestones, New Mexico now has access to the full \$26.8 million to continue weatherizing homes across the state.

New Mexico plans to weatherize more than 2,780 homes with its Recovery Act funding. Since February 2009, the state has weatherized approximately 950 additional homes under its annual weatherization program. Together with the Recovery Act funding, the state has now weatherized more than 1,800 homes since the Recovery Act began.

Under the weatherization program, states partner with local community action agencies or nonprofit organizations to provide wholehome weatherization services. This includes conducting an energy audit in the home to identify the most cost-effective improvements and implementing solutions that range from installing additional insulation and weatherstripping, sealing windows and doors, caulking cracks in the building and replacing inefficient heating and cooling systems.

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The mighty ketchup

Condiment is for more than French fries

Whether you know it as ketchup, catsup or catchup, the tomato condiment has graced picnic tables and diner countertops since the early 1800s.

Created from tomatoes, vinegar and a variety of spices, ketchup goes hand in hand with French fries, hamburgers and meatloaf, and is one of the most popular condiments in the United States.

According to www.globalgourmet.com, approximately 97 percent of American households have ketchup. Even more astonishing, the website states that a person eats about three bottles of the goopy substance each year. This can be attributed to its taste, functionality or the fact that 4 tablespoons of ketchup has

the nutritional value of a whole ripe, medium tomato.

If you don't feel up to eating your three bottles of ketchup, use the condiment around the home in creative ways.

1. Treat your hair: After spending the summer at the swimming pool, your hair may become discolored and smelly from the chlorine. Treat these hair dilemmas with the help of ketchup. In the shower, massage a generous amount of the condiment into your hair and let it sit for 15 minutes. Then rinse it out and wash your hair with baby shampoo. The odor and color will be gone.

2. Shine copper pots: If your copper pots, pans and decorative molds become dull and tarnished, bring them back to life with ketchup. Not only is the tomato byproduct cheaper than store-bought tarnish removers, it is safer

and can be applied without the need of gloves. Coat the surface of the object with the goop and let it sit for five to 30 minutes, depending on its condition. The acids in the ketchup will react with the tarnish, removing it. After you rinse the item, dry it immediately.

3. Clean your silver jewelry: Don't let time ravage your silver jewelry – renew its sparkle with ketchup. Submerge that dull ring, earring, bracelet or necklace in a bowl of ketchup. After a few minutes, remove the item, rinse it clean and dry. Be sure not leave the jewelry in for too long because the ketchup can damage the silver. If the item has a detailed surface, use an old toothbrush to work the ketchup into the crevices.

4. Beat skunk odors: Chances are that at some point or another while living in New Mexico, you or a pet have had an unfortunate run in with a skunk, which might have resulted in being sprayed. 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

Crape myrtle care

Plant location is vital to its survival

Now is the time when the crape myrtles are coming into their full glory. If you don't have one, you can still plant one now.

You must be prepared to water on a regular basis, if you plant now. Use root stimulator and compost, or other soil amendments, when planting these beauties. They will favor a slightly acidic, organically rich soil and moisture retentive soil. They will also thrive best on a drip system.

Crapes should be placed in areas that receive full sun. The sun and summer heat are needed to help them bloom their best. This will allow for beautiful orange and red mixed fall-colored foliage. Placing them in full sun will also help keep powdery mildew at bay.

Fungicides are available in many forms

and should be used as soon as you see signs of powdery mildew. This looks just like it sounds — as if someone sprinkled baby powder on the leaves. If left untreated, this mildew will spread rapidly, and weaken the plant.

Cut old faded blossoms off to help make way for new flowers. Use a water-soluble fertilizer, such as Peters, Gro More or Miracle Gro, on a regular basis. This will help keep the foliage deep green and keep your plant full of color. Additional amounts of iron chelate should also help keep the leaves deep green and give the blooms a vivid hue.

Do not be alarmed when you see the bark peeling on these plants. This occurs naturally on crapes and adds winter interest, especially on older trees. **Gary Guzman** *Gardening Guru*



You may still lightly prune your crape during this time of year if needed. Prune only to keep the shape you are looking for. Remove "suckers" from the base of the plant if you want a single, or multi-trunk look.

If you are having trouble getting your plant to bloom, try using a fertilizer with a high middle number such as Br-61, or Super Bloom. These fertilizers are designed to help just about any plant produce blossoms – assuming they are planted in full sun.

So, if you're looking for that special plant with a "wow" factor, turn to the crape and enjoy color all summer and into the fall season.

Box elder bugs are beginning to bug

New Mexico homeowners face non-threatening nuisance

With temperatures on the rise following a cooler winter, one of nature's biggest nuisance pests is beginning to swarm.

Box elder bugs, which normally live in and feed off maple trees, are starting to appear on the exterior walls of homes in large numbers, thereby causing headaches for homeowners.

This time of year they will start to see thousands of box elder bugs on a homeowner's wall. Fortunately, they do not spread disease, but they are a serious annoyance to homeowners.

Similar in appearance to Florida's love bugs, which pose no threat other than being an automobile windshield nuisance, the box elder bug is black with red lines. During the winter months, they search for a place to keep warm, causing them to hide in a home's cracks, crevices and attic and window casings. The shift in temperature brings them out into the open, and though they pose no threat to humans, their excrement spots on draperies and walls are hard to remove.

By the time autumn rolls around, the nuisance factor for the box elder bug reaches its highest point, and people become interested in ways of treating them. However, one of the difficulties with this particular insect is that many pesticides that eliminate other insects simply don't work on the box elder.

We recommend a household vacuum cleaner and household spray cleaners as temporary measures in combating them during their life cycle. The other proven way to assert control over this pest is being proactive in screening or sealing cracks throughout the home.

By taking simple precautions each year and understanding why the box elder bug appears when it appears, a homeowner can begin to fight back.

NMSU explores lavender research

University only center in Southwest to develop crop

As New Mexico is becoming known internationally for its production of quality lavender oil, New Mexico State University's Sustainable Agriculture Science Center at Alcalde, N.M., has stepped up its research in variety trials of this specialty crop.

"There are outstanding researchers studying this valuable crop in other areas of the country, but we needed research specifically tailored to the growing conditions of this area," said Charles Martin, NMSU agricultural specialist and principle herb researcher at Alcalde. "To my knowledge, we are the only research center in the Southwest developing this crop. We want to help the growers solve their problem of matching the right varieties to our growing conditions so they can expand the lavender industry in New Mexico."

Lavender is an increasingly popular specialty crop for New Mexico and other parts of the Southwest because of its suitability for cultivation in alkaline, sandy and low-fertility soils; its relative heat and drought tolerance; and its preference for arid conditions with low humidity.

There are two main species of lavender that are cold-tolerant: English, or true lavender, (Lavandaula augustifola) and lavadin (Lavandula x intermedia), which is a hybrid that does not produce seeds.

"In our first variety trial, which was a comparison of six different varieties of both English lavender and lavandin, we confirmed that these varieties, all previously shown to grow well elsewhere in the United States, also have potential to do well in New Mexico. Of the first varieties investigated, Grossa and Super, both

lavandins, performed the best in hardiness and yield," Martin said.

For growers wanting to enter the high-end commercial lavender sales, English lavender oil is more valuable than lavandin oil. So Martin is conducting further trials focusing exclusively on English lavender varieties.

"From a small-scale grower's stand point, they stand to make more on a per-acre basis on English lavender then they do from the lavandin," he said. "Because our mission here at the Alcalde experimental station is to help small-scale farmers improve their profitability per acre, I decided to investigate further which English lavender varieties work well for northern New Mexico growers."

Martin's work will help find and develop English lavender varieties that will produce the traits the commercial lavender industry is seeking and be able to thrive in New Mexico's extreme growing conditions of cold winters and the extreme temperatures of springtime, as well as the high wind.

"Some commercial growers in New Mexico reported winter dieback during the last few seasons. A couple of seasons ago it was especially severe," Martin said. "So in our selection process, we want to minimize or eliminate those losses."

For the new variety trial, Martin collected many different kinds of lavender from all over the world, as far away as Canada, France and the Netherlands, as well as from researchers in the United States.

"As it turns out, some of the English lavender varieties that we got from right here in the U.S. are the best performers," he said. "We have such

extreme growing conditions here in northern New Mexico that the plants that are developed elsewhere in the world simply are not adapted for these kinds of conditions"

kinds of conditions."

For example, Martin said they found that the Maillette variety, which is one of the most popular English lavender varieties in France, doesn't survive as well in the climate of northern New Mexico.

"Maillette had the highest mortality rate of all varieties planted during the first season," he said, "while the varieties Buena Vista, Graves, Munstead

and Royal Velvet, which were suggested by American growers, had the highest survival rates."

Entering the second year of trials, Martin said this year's cooler spring and higher winter moisture levels will allow him to compare this year's planting with the survivors of last year's planting, which was in hot, dry conditions.

As the trials evolve, Martin is using intensive line selection to find hearty varieties for northern New Mexico growers.

"We're letting the plants tell us

which is best for this region by how the different varieties grow during the trials," he said. "These are common practices that anyone can follow. A grower can apply these methods to find or develop their own particular lavender variety adapted to their particular growing conditions. This method takes advantage of the evolutionary process of natural selection. By using nature to weed out the weaker or less robust plants, we end up with varieties that are vigorous, sturdier and better adapted to a given environment."



When purchasing these knives there are a few things to look for. Each knife should have full tangs, which means it should have metal that runs from the blade through the full length of the handle. Next, you should always hold a knife to make sure the weight is comfortable in your hands.

Other items to consider are how the knife can be sharpened and cleaned and if it has a lifetime warranty. Knife sets (which are often featured in a block for storage) offer an ideal and affordable option.

With these few quality items, you'll soon notice that your work is easier, your cleanup faster and your results better and more professional. And the best news is that each is affordable. So stop living without and make your kitchen the kitchen of your dreams.

Celebrate National Grilling Month in a sizzling new way

July 1 marks the beginning of National Grilling Month. To celebrate the occasion, I suggest grilling juicy, T-bone steaks gently seasoned or marinated in a spicy sauce.

The key to succulent, done-to-a-T steak doesn't take rocket science, according Klaus Fritsch, co-founder of Morton's Steakhouse. Fritsch offers the following simple tips:

- Before grilling, meat should be brought to room temperature.
- A good cut of meat has some marbling (fat) for flavor.
- To avoid over-grilled, dried out meat, select steaks 1-inch to 1-1/2-inches thick, preferably USDA Prime Aged Beef or Choice Beef.
- Lightly oil the grilling rack to prevent sticking and to seal in natural juices.
- Always preheat the grill for 30 to 45 minutes before adding steaks.
- To retain the natural flavors of a steak, avoid over-seasoning.
- Flip steak only once after five minutes of grilling.
- To retain meat juices, use only tongs or a spatula to flip the steak. (Fork piercing drains the juices.)
- Never slice a steak to check for doneness.
 Rather, press on the steak with the palm of
 your hand. If it feels spongy, it's rare. If it
 has some resistance, it's cooked medium.
 Firm, it's well done.
- Rest (or relax) cooked meat for two to three minutes before cutting. Resting allows the juices to reabsorb rather than "rush" or "spill out."

Simple? You bet! Is it worth it? Yes!

"Grilling skill comes with experience, but it can be gained quickly," writes John Harrison in the preface of his book, "Omaha Steaks: Let's Grill (Omaha Steaks, 2001).""... grilling always offers something new and fun to learn ... (it) allows an unmistakable smoky flavor, perfectly seared crust and the attractive crosshatch grill marks that set the mouth watering and invite the hungry to dig in."

Garlic and Serrano-Stabbed T-bone Steaks with Grilled Corn Relish

Relish:
1 red bell pepper
4 ears fresh sweet corn, husked
3 tablespoons olive oil, divided
1/4 cup onion, diced
3 tablespoons diced sun-dried
tomatoes, packed in oil
2 scallions, sliced
1 tablespoon freshly squeezed
lime juice (1/2 large lime)
1 tablespoon sherry vinegar

1 tablespoon sherry vinegar 1/2 tablespoon marjoram, minced Salt to taste

To prepare the relish, roast the bell pepper on the grill and let steam*. When cool, peel,

seed and dice the pepper, and place in a mixing bowl. While the pepper is cooking, brush the corn with 2 tablespoons of the oil and grill over indirect medium heat for about 15 minutes, turning frequently, until lightly browned on all sides. Remove and, when cool enough to handle, cut the kernels from the cobs and add to the mixing bowl.

Heat the remaining 1 tablespoon of oil in a skillet and sauté the onion over medium-high heat for 3 or 4 minutes, until soft. Add the sautéed onions, sun-dried tomatoes, scallions, lime juice, vinegar and marjoram. Season with salt and toss to combine.

*To roast and steam bell peppers: Grill over medium-high heat (stems intact), turning frequently until blackened all over, about 10 to 15 minutes; do not overcook or you will scorch or burn the flesh. Remove with tongs and place in a metal bowl. Cover with plastic wrap and let "steam" for 10 minutes. Avoid peeling roasted bell peppers under water – the natural oils and flavor will be diminished.

T-bone steaks:

4 T-bone steaks, about 1 pound each, 1-inch thick, preferably prime or choice 6 cloves garlic, cut lengthwise into thick slivers about 3/8-inch long

1 serrano chile, seeded and cut lengthwise into thick slivers about 3/8-inch long Salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste

Using the tip of a sharp paring knife, make incisions in the steaks about 1/2-inch deep. Insert the garlic and serrano slivers into the incisions, making sure they are embedded beneath the surface of the steaks. Season with salt and pepper, and bring the steaks to room temperature

Grill over direct medium-high heat for 5 or 6 minutes per side for medium-rare, 7 to 8 minutes for medium, or the desired doneness. Serve with relish. Makes 4 servings. (Adapted from "Omaha Steaks: Let's Grill" by John Harrison, Omaha Steaks, 2001.)

T-bone Steak with Chipotle Hot Sauce Seasonings

1/2 cup water
1/2 cup lite soy sauce
2 tablespoons brown sugar
2 tablespoons freshly squeezed lemon juice
2 tablespoons red wine vinegar
2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
1 tablespoon steak seasoning

1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
1/2 teaspoon chipotle hot sauce

1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

2 to 3 cloves garlic, pressed 2 T-bone steaks, 1-inch thick

In a large resealable plastic bag, combine the first 11 ingredients. Add steaks. Seal the bag and turn to coat. Refrigerate overnight, turning as often as you can. Drain and discard marinade. Grill steaks over high heat for about 5 minutes on each side or until meat reaches desired doneness (a meat thermometer should read 145 degrees for medium-rare, 160 degrees for medium and 170 degrees welldone). Makes 2 servings.

Sassy Citrus Marinade for T-bone Steaks

1/2 cup teriyaki sauce 1 cup Sprite 1/2 cup extra virgin olive oil

1/4 cup dark brown sugar
1 teaspoon garlic powder
1/2 teaspoon black pepper
1 Vidalia onion, chopped
1/2 teaspoon onion powder
3 tablespoons freshly squeezed lime juice
3 tablespoons freshly squeezed orange juice
3 tablespoons freshly squeezed lemon juice
1 teaspoon hot sauce

Combine all the ingredients in a glass dish, stirring briskly with a metal whisk until the steak marinade is even and smooth. Place T-bones in a plastic bag. Add marinade and seal. Refrigerate overnight or for at least 8 hours. Makes 6 servings.

Habanero Spiced Teriyaki T-bone Steaks for Two

2 beef T-bone steaks, cut 1-inch thick (1 3/4 to 2 pounds total)

1/3 cup teriyaki sauce

2 tablespoons green onion, sliced

1 tablespoon honey

1 tablespoon lemon juice or rice vinegar

1 tablespoon fresh ginger, finely chopped 1/4 teaspoon habanero powder

1 teaspoon toasted sesame oil

1 clove garlic, minced

1/4 teaspoon coarsely ground black pepper

1 small fresh pineapple, cut into wedges and cored4 1-inch thick slices tomato or sweet pepper1 tablespoon cooking oil

Trim fat from the steaks. Place them in a plastic bag set in a shallow dish.

For marinade, in a small bowl combine teriyaki sauce, green onion, honey, lemon juice, fresh ginger, habanero powder, sesame oil, garlic and black pepper. Pour over steaks; seal bag. Marinate in the refrigerator for at least 4 hours or up to 6 hours, turning bag occasionally. Drain steaks, reserving marinade.

Preheat gas grill. Reduce heat to medium. Place steaks on the grill rack directly over heat. Cover and grill until steaks are the desired doneness, turning and brushing once with marinade halfway through grilling. Allow 8 to 12 minutes for medium rare or 12 to 15 minutes for medium.

While the steaks are grilling, brush pineapple wedges and tomato slices with cooking oil; add pineapple and tomato to grill. Cover and grill for 6 to 8 minutes or until slightly charred, turning once halfway through grilling. Serve the steaks with pineapple and tomato. (Recipe adapted from www.bhg.com.)

Transform your can

Bottle Top prevents spills, loss of carbonation

As the thermometer creeps into the triple digits this summer, an ice-cold beverage can cool you down.

The beverage can is one of the easiest ways to enjoy a refreshing drink. Manufactured from aluminum or steel, the liquid container was invented in the early 20th century and has been used for everything from iced tea and juices to soda and beer.

As enjoyable as a can of cold liquid can be, spills and loss of

carbonation may result from its unmanned opening. One way to improve your can drinking experience is with the Bottle Top.

What is it?

The Bottle Top transforms a beverage can into a re-sealable bottle. The gadget resembles the top of a plastic bottle, which is placed on the opening of the can.

The lid of the Bottle Top prevents the beverage from spilling and splashing out, so you can take it just about anywhere. The lid will also keep nosy insects out of your drink.

In addition to preventing spills, the Bottle Top also keeps the carbonated drink from going flat.

Since the Bottle Top comes in a variety of colors, it will be easy to tell drinks apart during your next get together.

How does it work?

The Bottle Top is easy to use. First and foremost, wash the top with dish soap and water. Next, open the beverage can, which should be cold, and place it on a flat surface. Place the gadget on top of the can and gently push down until it snaps, creating a secure hold.

The Bottle Top works on most cans. The gadget should be slightly larger than the can to properly snap on.

A little muscle power is needed when it comes time to re-

move the Bottle Top. After the can is empty, squeeze it and pull off the top. Wash the gadget as before and recycle the can.

The reusable Bottle Top can be enjoyed numerous times.
