

It's Burger Time big time

Tournament tees off to \$260,000 fundraising goal

It began quietly in 1993, a small, fundraising event and the brainchild of Kevin McGrath, a Las Cruces businessman.

It carried a simple, short name - The Burger Time High School Football Golf Tournament. Nothing fancy.

It was, and still is, played annually at the Las Cruces Country Club.

Proceeds originally went only to the football programs at Las Cruces, Oñate and Mayfield high schools. The first tournament, played in July of '93, raised \$3,000.

Times most certainly have changed.

The 17th annual 2010 Burger Time tournament teed off Thursday afternoon, July 8, with a longer name, proceeds expected to clear \$260,000, and the money earmarked for all sports and other activities at the three local high schools.

The tourney deposits a portion of the earnings to an endowment that has reached more than \$800,000.

"For a rainy day," McGrath said. "If for some reason we can't hold the tournament some year, the high schools can draw from the endowment."

McGrath has named this year's event the It's Burger Time Sandra B. McGrath High School All Activities Golf Tournament, a salute to his wife who passed away Jan. 4, 2003.

In 2007, McGrath, who owns seven Burger Time locations in Las Cruces, Deming and Silver City, decided the tourney was raising enough money to help fund all of the extracurricular activities at each high school.

There was reason behind McGrath's decision to create what has now become a huge community event. "In the late 1980s and early '90s," he said, "they started cutting the schools' athletic budgets.

'There was no way their athletic programs were going to survive. I just felt like we had to do something.

So McGrath and the three high school football coaches at the time - Mayfield's Jim Bradley, Las Cruces High's Don Rezac and Oñate's Tom Essex - decided a golf tournament was the sensible way to raise money.

It was a smart decision. The Burger Time tournament has helped the football teams at

This year the tourney will hold two 18-hole flights - at 7:30 a.m. and 1 p.m. - on both Friday and Saturday, July 9 and 10. Entry fee is \$125 per golfer and \$500 for a team of four. That buys two meals, beverage tickets, use of a golf cart and a shot at prizes awarded each evening following the afternoon rounds.

There's also a silent auction and radio and TV interviews.

Almost every business and organization

Mayfield, Las Cruces and Oñate win 11 state in Las Cruces plays at least 18 holes in this tournament.

"We appreciate the way the city has really gotten behind us," McGrath said. "There is no fundraising golf tournament in the Southwest larger than this one.

"We couldn't survive without our sponsors either.

Six Legacy Sponsors donate \$7,000 each or more. They are Price's Creamery, Memorial Medical Center, First Community Bank, Coca-Cola, Sisbarro and Farmer's Insurance Group.

There are \$1,600 Hole-in-One sponsors, \$1,000 Double Eagle Plus sponsors, \$750 Double Eagle sponsors, \$500 Eagle sponsors, \$300 No.1 Hole sponsors and \$200 Birdie sponsors.

Local restaurants donate breakfast, lunch and dinner all three days of the tournament.

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

Whether you are a newcomer to Las Cruces or a lifelong resident, the Bulletin's 196-page community guide has something for you

This week's home-delivered Bulletin includes a very special publication – the second annual "Life is Good in Las Cruces" community guide. This colorful, convenient-sized, perfect-bound magazine has been a labor of love from the entire Bulletin team.

The idea was to produce a comprehensive publication that would target several audiences – lifelong residents, newcomers, friends and families, businesses and visitors to Las Cruces. A goal was to provide a variety of information that would help residents feel good about the community in which they live, and would invite "out-of-towners" to visit and enjoy the Las Cruces area.

Little did we know that our idea would explode into a 196-page full-color magazine that would test our local printer's capabilities. Our small, Las Cruces publishing company is sometimes challenged to produce our four-section weekly newspaper, along with a bi-weekly real estate magazine and a monthly chamber of commerce publication, and two or more special editions each month.

For us to add another 196 pages on top of these other publications is quite a feat. Our news team had to produce another 50 or so stories along with an array of additional photographs. Our marketing team sold and our graphics team produced 175 new custom-designed advertisements. In other words, we have been pretty darn busy the past several weeks.

Obviously, we could not take on a project like this without some incredible planning and organization. The two key leaders in this project are Special Sections Editor Natisha Hales and Art Director Theresa Montoya Basaldua. Their combined vision for the scope, focus and design for the magazine provided the basic concept that inspired others in news, design and sales departments to exceed their own expectations.

With sample pages in hand, our sales team stirred up terrific support from local advertisers – so much so that we had to continue to increase our page count from last year's 116 pages in order to avoid squeezing out planned editorial content and photos.

What we have found out is that it is one thing to visualize and sell a 196-page publication in the middle of producing 150 pages in other products during the same week. It is another thing to actually lay out, design, edit and proof all those pages in one week's time, in addition to all our other products.

People who have visited our offices know that we work really hard to avoid typos and mistakes on our printed pages. Prior to being sent digitally to our printer, every page is publicly posted on our proofing wall so that every Bulletin employee has the opportunity to assist in the page-checking process. With the community guide added to our regular wall proofs, the idea of proofing more than 300 total pages in one week becomes a daunting task. And with each page being updated an average of three times during the process, after corrections and changes, this means we are actually editing and proofing more than 1,000 pages during the week.

The good news is that we have completed the process, and the 2010 "Life is Good in Las Cruces" community guide is now available to Las Crucens and fellow New Mexicans throughout the state. Thanks to the Bulletin staff for their extra special effort and to the advertisers for making it possible for us to produce this special publication.

Please enjoy this magazine and let us know how we can make it better next year. And, remember ... **Life IS Good in Las Cruces.**

The good news for Republican gubernatorial candidate Susana Martinez is that she out-raised her Democratic opponent, Diane Denish, \$611,000 to \$188,000 last month.

The bad news is that Denish has \$2.2 million in the bank and Martinez has \$300,000. A big chunk of that was a \$250,000 contribution from the National Republican Governors Association. In May, Martinez got \$450,000 from Texas developer Robert Perry. Before that, much of her money was coming from oil interests.

Those sources will continue to help Martinez but there is only so much they can do. New Mexico's economy is not sufficient for Martinez to close her fundraising gap with Denish.

That means Martinez will have to continue

hitting up large out-of-state donors. And as she does, her claims of cleaning up Democratic pay-to-play lose some of their impact.

You can bet Denish is not going to give Martinez the rest of the summer to fatten her checkbook. Many were surprised and disappointed to see Denish begin negative ads the day after the primary election

day after the primary election But Denish's action forced Martinez to immediately start spending down her bank balance in order to fire back. Martinez still has momentum remaining from her impressive primary election victory but she may be hard pressed to keep it while spending large amounts of her time on the phone raising money.

Reports indicate that Martinez is getting on conservative national talk radio shows

where she can energize the faithful. That can help, but to keep them she will have to remain as conservative as she was during the primary.

Steve Pearce tried that against Democratic Sen. Jeff Bingaman two years ago and lost badly. Republicans and Democrats both tend to run toward the middle in general elections in

may have to cede the TV field to Denish for awhile to build up money for the fall. If she has to do that, Denish can go positive during that period and perhaps pick up some of the support lost because of going negative so quickly. The National Republi-

can Governors Association will continue its financial

support of Martinez to the extent it can. New Mexico is a target because winning the gubernatorial race is the only way to prevent Democrats from controlling the redistricting of our state Legislature and Congress.

Continued financial support from Rob Perry over in Texas will come with another cost to Martinez. With the revelation she was born in Texas and is getting significant money from there, some New Mexico prejudices may come into play.

Some hard feelings about Texas have continued ever since our neighbor to the east twice invaded us unsuccessfully and then used its power in Congress to grab over a



half million acres along our shared border. The Associated Press ran a national story in March saying that New Mexico is one of the states that will pick up another congressional seat from the 2010 reapportionment. That is not true. Our neighbors will pick

Since then Branch has become an extremely successful trial lawyer and a big donor to both

Republicans and Democrats. Branch was a major supporter of Allen Weh in the GOP gubernatorial primary. Branch and Weh served together in the Marines.

But Branch says he can't support Martinez and will support Denish. He says over the past 40 years, he has given more to Republicans than Democrats. Some Republicans say that hasn't been the case recently.

The Martinez and Weh camps don't appear to have healed many rifts since the primary election.


resemble jelly beans – in appearance but not substance. Most politicians dial for dollars with the mantra: "Help me get my message out to the people, give me money now and money later and money again."

Wilderness bill will improve border security

Opponents offer nothing but excuses

It has been five years since the debate about wilderness in Doña Ana County began in earnest. These discussions have taken many twists and turns over the years but, thankfully, have resulted in the development of a sound and widely supported proposal for protecting sensitive wildlands in our community.

As a wilderness supporter, I have been proud to participate in a diverse coalition of organizations and citizens who have fought for the central vision of protecting the Organ Mountains and nearby public lands. There has been a lot of information disseminated to the public recently with regard to the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks legislation sponsored by U.S. Sens. Jeff Bingaman and Tom Udall. Sadly, some information has been intentionally misleading and misguided at best. Given this deluge of conflicting views, it would be understandable if many folks are confused about the "real story."

I am writing to address key facts about the legislation, S. 1689, specifically comments made in recent op-eds talking about border security and wilderness.

Since the beginning of this debate, wilderness opponents have used every excuse in the book to fight any wilderness protection in our county. Now, even as the head of the U.S.

Customs and Border Protection has issued a letter stating that the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks Wilderness Act would enhance the security on our border, the fear tactics continue. It's time that we understand the real facts about this bill, as well as about the agenda and history of those that have opposed all wilderness protection in this county from the beginning.

Border facts

1

First off, it's vitally important that Doña Ana County residents be presented with a few basic facts about the border. The most im portant is that we have relatively little illegal immigration that occurs in the county and, specifically, very little that entails crossing the Potrillo Mountains, one of the proposed wilderness areas. This has been repeatedly established by the Border Patrol. The landscape is very rugged and unforgiving and there is no water.

Secondly, the Potrillo Mountains are already a Wilderness Study Area (WSA) and, as

such, have been managed as a wilderness area since 1980. This designation and the area's management have never been stated to be a detriment to our border security by either the ranchers or the Border Patrol. Only after every other argument failed are the wilderness opponents trying to fabricate this concern.

Finally, according to the head of the Border Patrol, the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks Wilderness Act will actually improve our border security.

Even though the Potrillo Mountains are a vast and pristine ecosystem - not easily crossed by illegal immigrants or drug smugglers - Bingaman and Udall have taken the extra step of creating a security zone along their southern border that Commissioner for U.S. Customs and Border Protection Alan Bersin calls an "enhancement" to the Border Patrol's current ability to monitor this area. In plain speak, if we pass the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks Wilderness Act, we are actually improving our current border security.

If we don't pass this bill, we are allowing the objections of an extreme ideological few, like Tom Cooper, to undermine and prevent this enhancement to our border security.

Fear tactics

Since the Border Patrol has said the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks Wilderness Act will improve our border security, why are the op-

ponents of this legislation still trying to convince us it will lead to mayhem? As the old saying goes, "consider the source."

> Recently, at several forums, wilderness opponents stated flatly that we should not have any protected lands within 100 miles of the border." If such a ridiculous one-size-fits-all policy were enacted, our country would immediately have to close White Sands National Monument, the

Gila Wilderness, Big Bend National Park and Guadalupe Mountains National Park. Have vou heard about any of these places being illegal-immigration or drug-smuggling corridors? Given this radical position of local wilderness opponents, no form of protection of the Potrillo Mountains would satisfy their extreme argument short of defeating this legislation in its entirety. Of course, this is the ultimate goal of this fear tactic.

A history of excuses

The wilderness opponents' organization,

People for Preserving Our Western Heritage (PFPOWH), had a very different tone for much of this five-year debate. For most of this time, their total opposition to wilderness was reflected in their proposed plan

to remove wilderness protections from every Wilderness Study Area in Doña Ana County including in the Organ Mountains. Their plan also mandated a selloff of 65,000 acres of land for "community growth." PFPOWH's main partner at the time, the Las Cruces 4 Wheel Drive Club, even went so far as to publish a list of all the reasons wilderness was bad for our county, stating comically that "we don't need wilder-

ness on both sides of our community."

For their part, People for Western Heritage also published their own anti-wilderness laundry list, with one item ironically saying the Organ Mountains and local public lands didn't measure up to "pure wilderness."

Incredibly, they contradicted themselves by both criticizing wilderness as being too restrictive on ranchers while simultaneously saying, "if only these areas were bigger and had fewer roads, we would support it." We see this same disingenuous double speak today.

In what can only be called a revolving door of excuses to oppose wilderness, it was only relatively recently that wilderness opponents have tried to settle on border security as their Trojan horse to stop wilderness protection for the Organ Mountains, Potrillos and other important public lands. Like the other arguments before it, we should not buy it.

A story of compromise

Since the beginning of this wilderness protection effort, middle ground has been sought, concessions have been made and compromises have been achieved. Important agreements were reached with sportsmen regarding roads and access throughout the protected lands. Compromises were made, and a subsequent agreement was reached with the former Las Cruces Home Builders Association Board of Directors that their press release at the time called "historic." Through Bingaman and Udall, extensive outreach, collaboration and compromises were reached involving everything from flood control to power and gas lines.

Back in 2006, wilderness proponents reached out to every single affected rancher. Instead of responding to that outstretched hand, opposing ranchers and off-roaders

called wilderness supporters "eco-terrorists and attempted to spread the same malicious and unfounded innuendo about our support for wilderness designation that they are

now spreading about border security. Their choice then, as it is now, was to fight and call people names. In spite of their often belligerent behavior, Bingaman's staff spent countless hours with each rancher talking about their needs and, most times, making adjustments to the legislation to accommodate their expressed concerns. The senators removed miles and miles of ranching infrastructure from the bill, even though wil-

derness designation would not have impacted or impaired their operations.

Closing thought

I wholeheartedly agree that it would be nice if all the stakeholders in Doña Ana County were in complete agreement with each other on every single issue, but that is not reality. We cannot control the behavior of others, particularly of those who have made an ironclad bond to fight any and all wilderness legislation. The vast majority of stakeholders are in consensus supporting this important legislation, and recent polling shows that a very high majority of local residents are comfortable with the proposal. By any standard, this is as high a threshold of support as any wilderness bill passed across our great country.

I am proud to say this has been an incredibly inclusive process that has brought about important compromises and historic legislation. Wilderness will be one of Doña Ana County's best and most enduring legacies. As for border security, this bill will make things better. Don't take my word for it, listen to the words of the Border Patrol's leadership and local staff:

"The provisions in this bill would significantly enhance the flexibility of the U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) to operate in this border area." - Alan Bersin, Commissioner of the U.S. Customs and Border Protection.

It's time we move beyond the revolving door of excuses and fear, and all get behind this historic legislation.

Pearce sees momentum going his way Teague focuses on accomplishments in first re-election bid

With an anti-incumbent sentiment and the sluggish economy, Steve Pearce said he thinks he has a good chance of regaining his District 2 U.S. House seat back.

During a recent visit to Las Cruces, the Republican challenger to Democrat U.S. Rep. Harry Teague told the Bulletin he senses voters are angry at government's inability to solve problems, especially the economy.

They just want the government to bring jobs back," Pearce said.

Despite the spending of stimulus dollars, jobs aren't coming back because of taxes and other policy decisions that aren't giving businesses the incentives to create jobs, he said.

The current Congress is passing regulations that are killing jobs every day," Pearce said.

New Mexico is especially hard-hit by regulations making it tougher for mining, oil and gas extraction, Pearce said. New Mexico's oil and gas industry has lost 23,000 jobs since the state government put in stricter pit rules, he said.

Oilman blues

Teague's business fortunes have felt those industry woes. Teague, who ran as an oilman to gain support of the northeastern side of his district, turned over the running of the oilmaintenance business to his son.

According to the Politico website, the value of Teague's business plunged from almost \$40 million to \$5 million. Political blogger Joe Monahan notes that Teague wrote himself checks for \$1.7 million to get elected in '08.

Teague's election support from the left came in large part from his support for health care reform, but he angered many of those supporters when he voted against the original legislation that passed the House.

When he ran for election, Teague touted that his company provided health insurance for its workers, but his health care vote was followed by the news that his company cancelled

health insurance for its 250 employees. Teague responded to the criticism by saying the decision was made by his children who were now running the company.

Teague, however, appeared to be more involved in his company's finances when he recently told the Albuquerque Journal that he plans to quickly resolve a payment dispute that led to the filing of a \$2.7 million civil suit against him and four of his companies.

The Journal reported that Maryland-based SunTrust Equipment Finance and Leasing Corp. is suing for payment from Teague and four companies: Teaco Energy Services Inc., Teaco Drilling Inc., Eunice Well Servicing Co. and ABC Rental Tool Co.


In a written statement to the Journal, Teague said his holdings have submitted a repayment offer to the bank to "render the lawsuit unnecessary.'

Congressional accomplishments

Meanwhile, Teague's office continues to note his accomplishments in getting legislation or amendments passed. Most recently, his office has been issuing releases about his "continued fight against Congressional pay raises."

Teague has joined with a bipartisan group of representatives in sending a letter to the House Legislative Branch Appropriations Subcommittee requesting that the Taking Responsibility for Congressional Pay Act be included in the Legislative Branch Appropriations Act for 2011. Teague, an original co-sponsor of the legislation, signed on to the letter in an effort to expedite a vote on the bill, which would cut pay for all senators and representatives by 5 percent beginning Jan. 1, 2011, in an effort to reduce federal spending.

"I am proud of the work we did to finally stop the automatic pay raise for members of Congress, and given our nation's economic situation, I think it makes good sense for Congress to do something it hasn't done since the 1930s - take a pay cut," Teague said. "Many of my constituents in southern New Mexico are finding ways to cut back, and Congress needs to do the same to show we are serious about cutting down the deficit.



We need to take action sooner rather than later. A vote on this bill will make it clear that Congress is serious about tack-ling our national debt."

In addition to the Congressional paycut, the bill would also block any automatic increase in congressional salaries for next year. If passed, this legislation would be the first salary reduction for members of Congress since 1933.

Teague noted that he has opposed Congressional pay raises since first taking office in January 2009. He is an original co-sponsor of a measure to block federal lawmakers from receiving automatic pay increases for the 2011 fiscal year and

joined more than 100 co-sponsors on H.R. 156, which blocked the automatic pay increase for FY2010. The measure was eventually adopted by Congressional leaders and the 2010 pay raise was eliminated.

Anti-incumbent mood

Pearce, who served three terms before vacating the office for an unsuccessful run for U.S. Senate, said he will regain his seniority if he defeats Teague.

Pearce said the anti-incumbent emotions are not only being driven by the economy, but the federal government's inability to control the border with Mexico.

In terms of immigration and border security, Pearce said the country first needs to secure the border, but he agreed that immigration law needs to be improved.

Pearce said he supported the common-sense approach of making the path to citizenship easier for those in the country illegally, but not engaged in criminal activities.

The anger that voters feel, Pearce said, is not so much against incumbents as against what he called "a vacuum of action."

Pearce said his experience in Congress and as a businessman will sway voters who want government to be effective without inhibiting economic progress.

Las Cruces political blogger Heath Haussamen in his most recent post said voters shouldn't count Teague out yet.

Although Haussamen noted that he ranked Teague as the "second most endangered incumbent in New Mexico this year, behind state Rep. Karen Giannini, D-Albuquerque," Teague still "has a realistic shot at winning re-election.

Haussamen noted that Teague has held on in every poll of the race that has been released publicly, though the margin has been slim. He credits this to Teague's focus on constituent services, his frequent visits to the large district and his accessible personality. Haussamen also said Susana Martinez's run for governor could motivate progressives to vote, and they won't vote for Pearce.

Teague has made improving veteran services a focus of his work in Congress, but Pearce said he also was very active in veteran issues when he was in office.

"Getting a jump start" is how Zachary Eason, 14, also described his decision to attend ECHS. Interested in engineering, Eason said he felt the school will get him in classes that will be the foundation of his future engineering studies.

Because of the rigorous focus, location on a university campus and smaller school size, early college high schools don't offer the kind of extracurricular activities found in regular high schools, such as band. ECHS here is no exception - it will add students each year until it tops out at a student count of 500 and doesn't offer activities, including band.

While he does like to be in band, Eason said his passion is really for engineering. In a regular high school, he said classes such as band would make up for taking classes that don't really interest him.

'Early College High School will allow me to focus on something I really want to do," he said.

But there are aspects that are just like any new high school. One of the first orders of business for the school's four teachers was to get the students thinking about what they wanted for school colors.

"Lime green is out, though," Principal Jennifer Amis joked with the students.

At this point, the only other staff member is an office manager.

Amis interviewed the students and their families to have them selected for ECHS, based on their application to attend the school. One of the things that makes this approach successful, she said, is that its students are self-selected.

While the students come from a wide range

of backgrounds and interests, Amis said the characteristic she was looking for in the students and families was their "total commitment."

This summer will start off with getting some basic class requirements out of the way - including physical education. In the fall and spring semesters, ECHS will be partnering with DACC's Career and Technical Education program to begin introducing them to fields of studies, such as engineering and allied health.

Eventually, ECHS will be located on the NMSU campus at its Arrowhead Research Park, which also will provide opportunities for students to get experience at the park's businesses that are developed from NMSU research.

To avoid waiting for the new high school's buildings at the park, DACC offered use of some classrooms. DACC staff "have been phe-

nomenal," Amis said. DACC already has a good working rela-tionship with LCPS through the dual-credit program at all of the district's high schools, which allows students to take college courses at no cost. ECHS will let students replace high school core requirements with college-level classes, which the district's dual-credit program doesn't permit. The school will have a strong math and sci-

ence focus, Amis said, with emphasis on the use of technology.

A unique aspect of ECHS will be that parents can monitor their children's classes via the Internet.


ECHS is being created because of a push for this type of program by members of The Bridge, a regional education improvement effort that promotes regular conversations be-tween the public schools, higher education and the business community.



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DAMDWCA limits costs No increase planned for water rates

The Doña Ana Mutual Domestic Water Consumers Association (DAMDWCA) has maintained a steady consumer rate for the second consecutive year, the association board announced.

'Our staff has taken the many steps that were needed to control our costs, and we have been able to make significant improvements in our system without increasing our rates for the last couple of years," President Charles Huestis said.

The association uses a tiered rate charge

according to the volume of water used. The average rate is \$41.33 a month per 10,000 gallons, Huestis said.

The DAMDWCA was founded in 1974 with 72 members. Its membership has grown to 3,760 households. The association pumps and stores 4 million gallons of ground water into four tanks.

Through promotion of water conservation the total water consumption in the association's service area has shown only a small increase despite the growth in its membership," Huestis said. "With this policy, we will continue to meet the challenges of future growth in the north valley."

A beaming fireworks show lit up the night sky on the Fourth of July from the Hadley Avenue ballparks. The fireworks could be seen as far away as the East Mesa.





Obituary **Thomas Gale dies at 84** Longtime NMSU educator was active in local causes

Services were held Wednesday, July 7, at La Paz-Graham's Funeral Home for Thomas Gale, former interim provost of New Mexico State University and retired dean of its College Arts and Sciences. Gale, 84, died at his home July 1.

Memorial contributions can be made to the New Mexico State University Center for the Arts or the Thomas M. Gale endowed fund for excellence in the College of Arts and Sciences.

Gale was dean and professor of history at NMSU from 1971 to 1991. During his tenure as dean, he guided the College of Arts and Sciences as it became the largest of the university's six colleges.

Gale was an active supporter of the arts and public education. As dean, he made many contributions to the humanities and performing and visual arts programs, including establishing the Center for Latin American Studies. In the community, he served on many boards for organizations such as the Doña Ana Arts Council, the Academy for Learning in Retirement, the Border Book Festival and the Board of Trustees of the Friends of the NMSU Art Gallery. He co-chaired a committee in 2006 to help pass a school bond issue.

Born in Green Bay, Wis., in 1926 and raised in California, he served in the Army during World War II. He received his bachelor's and master's degrees in Latin American history from the University of California, Berkeley and his Ph.D. from the University of Pennsylvania in 1958.

Before coming to NMSU, he taught Latin American history and was associate dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences at the University of Kansas, where he met his future wife, Mary Hardman.



At the University of Kansas, he directed its Junior Year Abroad in Costa Rica and administered a Peace Corps program in education in Costa Rica – he served in Costa Rica from 1965 to 1969 as a consultant to the Organization of Central American Universities. He was a Fulbright Scholar in Peru and Spain.

After coming to NMSU, he continued to travel to Latin America to interview Latin American university faculty for Fulbright grants in the United States. After his retirement in 1991, he became the chair of the 100-member Las Cruces 2000 Task Force, dedicated to the reform and support of public education. In 1999, he

received the Papen Family Arts Patron Award and was honored with the Branding Iron Award by the New Mexico State University Foundation in 2009.

He was appointed by Gov. Bruce King to the New Mexico Commission on Higher Education in 1993 and served as vicechair from 1997 until his term ended in 1999.

For many years, he served on the NMSU Foundation Board of Directors and was elected board president in November 2001. After being the first chair of the New Mexico Humanities Council (now Foundation) from 1972 to 1978, he was awarded the Endowments Lifetime Achievement Award.

In 2000, he was appointed to the New Mexico Commission on Public Broadcasting. In 2001, he returned to the NMSU to serve in an interim basis as provost while a national search was conducted to fill the position. In 2002, he was awarded the New Mexico Distinguished Public Service Award by Gov. Gary Johnson. In January 2006, he was appointed NMSU's first Regents Emeritus Professor. He was a member and Paul Harris Fellow of the Rotary Club of Las Cruces.

Gale is survived by his wife of 50 years, Mary Margaret Hardman Gale; son Thomas Hardman Gale, daughter-in-law Gail Hudgens Gale; and grandson Thomas Jonathan Gale, of El Paso; son John Martin Gale, daughter-in-law Martha Cameron Willcox and grandsons Nathan Rossiter Gale and Thomas Willcox Gale of Washington, D.C.



Riding on his coattails



It had to be the coaching, right? "Of course it was," said Scott Lieberwirth, the Aggie men's golf coach. Jokingly, of course.

Tim Madigan, Lieberwirth's No. 1 player on New Mexico State's team, won the Albuquerque City Golf Championship last week.

For the third year in a row and with very little drama involved. Madigan blew the field away, shooting 18-under-par 198. He fired rounds of 68-66-64.

"He plays well in the summer months," Lieberwirth said. "He can concentrate on golf alone. He doesn't have to worry about school and other distractions.

'He takes his studies as seriously as golf. He carries almost a 4.0 GPA.

"And it's obvious he doesn't listen to me much. When he does, he plays poorly. What's that tell you?'

Lieberwirth, who's guided NMSU to three straight WAC championships, has to feel pumped about Madigan's victory.

His best player has one more year of eligibility and there's more talent signed and waiting.

NMSU's coach recruits well. "You coach a program like ours, a good one but not on the top 10 list of major college programs, you have to look in the cracks, work a little harder at recruiting," he said.

Lieberwirth has signed one prep school graduate and two junior college transfers. Colin Pratt, who played for Desert Academy prep school in Santa Fe, Korean Joon Lee, a transfer from Western New Mexico, and Zach Fullerton, transfer from New Mexico Junior College, join the Ags next season.

Only Ryan Word graduates from last year's team, leaving Lieberwirth with plenty to work with.

Like most college coaches, Scott still plays. He won the Big West Conference individual championship in 1999 his junior year at NMSU. He was the Big West Conference Most Valuable Player in 2000.

"I'm playing with your boss (Dave McCollum, the Bulletin's owner and publisher) in the Burger Time tournament this weekend," Scott said.

"I know you'll put that in the paper if you want to keep your job."

In three weeks, Lieberwirth is scheduled to play against Madigan in an Albuquerque ProAm tournament.

"Look, I know he'll beat me," Lieberwirth said. "I just don't want to get embarrassed.

"That's why I'm heading to the practice tee right now."

Sports Mitchell keeps looking ahead

Las Crucen makes deaf all-American team, sets sights on her college career

Following two years of excelling in athletics and academics at the New Mexico School for the Deaf, Karina Mitchell is now preparing for college, more mature from the leadership role she found at the state boarding school in Santa Fe.

A few years ago, Mitchell was frustrated because her high school in Las Cruces wasn't providing her enough time on the basketball court, though she also participated in other more individualized sports, such as track and field.

Although her family wanted to keep her close to home, they made the decision to send her to NMSD to give her an environment where her deafness wasn't an issue.

"It was the best thing we ever did," said her father Tony Mitchell.

In basketball, Karina Mitchell went from a benchwarmer to being in Deaf Digest and a National Association

of Deaf Interscholastic Athletics All-

American both years, as well as twotime All-District, two-time All-Tournament at the Great Plains School for the Deaf tournaments in Missouri and Iowa and two-time All-Tournament Evangelical Christian Academy Tournament. She also played in the Roadrunner Classic All-Tournament and was on the USA Deaf Basketball All-West team for the East-West All-Star game, which the West won for the first time.

In the USA Deaf Basketball tournament, Karina Mitchell scored 9 points. During her two years at NMSD, she averaged 12 points, 6.5 rebounds, 2 assists and 3 steals.

In track, she qualified for state both years in the 100-meter hurdles, 100-meter dash and triple jump. She also quali-fied for state in the long jump and 300-meter hurdles in different years. She was district champ in the 100-meter hurdles and triple jump both years. She set the district's 100-meter hur-

dle record, came in first in the 100-meter dash in 2009 and second in 2010.

It started out as a light-hearted, friendly challenge. A minute or two later, Rick Vira-

As practice concluded one day, the coach engaged in some friendly banter with junior guard Andrea Reiff about her ability to shoot the ball.

"I told her, if you can make 10 3-pointers in a row, I'll treat you to Texas Roadhouse," Vi-ramontes remembered. "She made the first nine and I was sweating. She missed the 10th

one." "He reminds me of that story all the time," Reiff said. Viramontes learned a lot

that day about the sharp-shooting Reiff who would go on to lead his team for the next two seasons. She won't back away from a challenge, and she can shoot the basketball.

"She can light it up when she gets in

a groove," he said. "She could score 20 at anytime.'

Reiff, who graduated from Oñate in May, is taking her confidence and immense skills to the next level. She recently signed to play for

the women's basketball team at Gillette College in Gillette, Wyo.

During her four years at Oñate, Reiff played for three different coaches. Her goal as her career began to wind down was to lead the Knights to the state tournament and a winning record. Mission accomplished last season.

"She meant a lot to our team," Viramontes said, who retired again at the end of the school year and was replaced last month by Ben Trujillo. "I had to have her on the court nearly all the time. I might take her out a little to rest.'

Reiff, who represented Oñate in the North-South All-Star game last month, admitted that her enormous amount of minutes on

the court could be taxing. "Last year as a point guard, I rarely came out of the game," she said. "I did what I could

In the long jump, she was second in 2009 and third in 2010. She won district in the 300-meter hurdles in 2009, but did not compete in them in 2010.

At the Great Plains School for the Deaf Track meet in 2009, Karina Mitchell was first in the long jump and 100-meter hurdles, in which she set a meet record, and second in the 100-meter dash. At the Deaf Nationals in

Washington, D.C., this year, she came in third in the 100-meter hurdles, first in triple jump and third in long jump. Not bad for a young athlete

with asthma.

At NMSD, she was named Outstanding Female Basketball Player both years, and Outstanding Female Track Athlete in 2009, as well as Athlete of the Year for 2009.

Karina Mitchell also excelled academically at NMSD. She was the winner of the Robert and Irene Clingenpeel Scholarship, Bandy Scholar-

ship, St. John's United Methodist Women's Scholarship and High School Mathematics Award.

She graduated NMSD as the school's valedictorian.

For Karina Mitchell, however, the best part of the last year was the improvement of her team, something she helped bring along through her aggressive playing style and leadership. Her athleticism was nurtured by her father, starting with BMX racing in middle school. Since he didn't treat her differently, her playing style was less inhibited than the other girls who came from more protective homes.

During her visits back to Las Cruces, Karina Mitchell said she has gotten over most of her

bitterness about how coaches in the hearing world treated her.

"At least I got to show everyone that I can play," she said.

The one basketball coach she still harbors some anger at actually did her a favor, Tony Mitchell said. That pushed the family to sending her to NMSD, which allowed her to learn more about her deaf side, he said.

Tony Mitchell said he always pushed his daughter to be able to function in the hearing world, but now he realizes that he also denied her deaf side. Being in a deaf world gave her room to grow academically, athletically and personally, the father and

daughter agree. My wife and I, we learned


a lot about this whole deaf world," Tony Mitchell said. "It's a whole different world.

"Originally, I wanted her to be able to survive in the hearing world ... but now I'm seeing a whole side of her I neglected."

Mitchell once Karina dreamed of attending Gallaudet University, but now she is looking at attending either Eastern Arizona Community College or the

Rochester Institute of Technology, two hearing schools with good support programs for the deaf. Though she can hear with the help of hearing aids, she still needs to read lips and the assistance of an interpreter in a classroom setting to catch all the nuances. Interested in science and math, she said academic strength with that deaf support are important considerations, when it comes to choosing a college, though she is still continuing her athletic training and would still like to participate in college athletics.

When asked about a profession she sees for herself, Karina Mitchell doesn't know yet. "There are so many things I want to be," she said.


the head coach.

Ag hoops opens in Canada Pre-season b-ball trip includes three cities

New Mexico State men's basketball coach Marvin Menzies isn't afraid to recruit internationally, and now he is taking the Aggies abroad.

Menzies is taking a preseason trip to Montreal, Quebec, and Ottawa, Ontario, Canada, Aug. 8 through 16.

Currently, the Aggies are slated to play McGill University in Montreal and Carleton University in Ottawa. Dates and game times will be announced at a later date. Exhibition play against NCAA Division I teams isn't a new trend for Carleton, a six-time Canadian National Champion, as the Ravens have played Cincinnati, Louisville, Kansas, Alabama, Illinois and Villanova in recent years. This season, Minnesota, Northern Arizona and Kentucky also have preseason tours to Canada planned.

"It's a tremendous competitive advantage to be able to participate with our own players that early in the year," Menzies said. "A benefit of going to Canada, where we have several players from that area, is to allow their families to see them play as well as continuing to grow the established recruiting roots that we have in that area."

The Aggies have three Canadian players on the roster, including junior guard Hernst Laroche (Montreal, Quebec), sophomore forward Tyrone Watson (Hamilton, Ontario) and incoming freshman guard Christian Kabongo (Toronto, Ontario).

The preseason trip allows incoming freshman

center Tshilidzi Nephawe and Kabongo to develop as collegiate players before official practice begins in October.

"The advantages of getting the new players on the floor early in the year along with players that didn't see many minutes last year are tremendous," Menzies said. "It sets a good foundation entering the non-conference schedule and gives us a better familiarity with what we have to play with and the ability to tweak some things. "From a coach's perspective there is noth-

"From a coach's perspective there is nothing but positives to taking a trip of this nature. "This trip would not have been possible without the support of the Sixth Man Club and its members."

The Aggies were 22-12 in 2009-10 after winning the WAC Tournament and advancing to the NCAA Tournament. The Crimson and White return three starters, senior forward Wendell McKines, junior center Hamidu Rahman and Laroche along with junior forward Troy Gillenwater and senior guard Gordo Castillo.

The NCAA permits a foreign tour every four years along with 10 practices prior to the trip. Before the 2006-07 season, the Aggies traveled to Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, for a four-day tour.

The Aggies posted a 4-0 record on the last trip to Canada when they defeated Douglas College, 101-60, University of Saskatchewan, 101-61, University of British Columbia, 74-63, and the Vancouver All-Stars, 112-90, four years ago.

Onthegreen: Proper training for young 'Tigers'

Junior golfers present unique coaching challenges

Summer is the time when I work more with junior golfers. It seems that parents realize their child is genuinely interested in golf and may have some potential. Both parent and player have more time - time to practice, time for a few tournaments and time for golf lessons.

I need to explain right away that I'm not a swing teacher. True, I help folks with their golf swings at our Performance Golf Schools, which is both a matter of necessity and something favored by my partner Herb Wimberly, but I'm not a swing guru.

My one and only role with youngsters is that of a performance coach. Coaching

takes place on the practice ground, the putting green, the golf course, the office, the telephone and electronically.

The first thing I do is try to get to know the kid I'm working with, as well as the parents. Each young golfer I coach has a different personality and different temperament, and responds uniquely to interventions. I always have the golfer fill out a 100-item Performance Golf Ability Rating questionnaire, which is usually an eye-opener for the young golfer, since he or she had never contemplated questions like, "Are you always purposeful

and target-oriented in practice and play?" A few of the other questions that seem to surprise kids new to mental coaching concern: (a) being disciplined with pre-shot routine; (b) demonstrating solid visualization skills; (c) having a realistically positive attitude; (d) avoiding self-defeating thoughts; (e) making consistently good on-course decisions; and (f) acting with poise and grace under pressure.

Out of the hundred items for self-rating we pick six or eight areas to focus most intently on. The parent is informed and involved in the process.

My coaching of kids has led me to realize that there are certain special problems that pop up frequently with junior golfers. In addition, parents have their challenges and blind

spots - we'll discuss those in a moment. As a disclaimer, let me point out that the majority of juniors I have had the pleasure of working with are terrific, friendly kids with good values, who are very coachable.

Frustration tolerance

Still, there are some typical tendencies that seem to hamper their performance as golfers. One is the tendency toward low frustration tolerance. Golf is a game that requires patience along with passion and thoughtfulness. Some kids expect too much too soon and then become very upset and

disappointed when it doesn't happen. With boys whose expectations are unrealistic or don't match their ability level, we often see angry tantrums and emotional explosions.

I have told more than one of my temper-prone students, "Son, you're just not good enough yet to get that mad at yourself." With girls who see their results as failing, we more often see dejection and a disheartened reaction, frequently with sulking and withdrawal.

Another tendency is for kids to pay way too much attention to social evaluation, figuring that everyone around them notices every

little thing and is hanging on their every move and is definitely judging them. This is partly the natural narcissism and self-absorption of adolescence. But on the golf course, excessive self-consciousness can be a major distraction. Boys and girls can be petrified with fear about what others will think of them if they screw up. They can nearly freeze with anxiety, and then later be depressed.

With training in mental toughness, including positive self-talk and learning to stay calmly focused, these undisciplined habits can be changed. I can't change the boy's or girl's self-concept, but I usually can train them to avoid self-defeating thoughts and to maintain their concentration for 42 hours. I've found that both the intelligence level and the willingness to adopt new habits are quite good with these juniors.

A balancing act

There is no getting around my role of giving advice to parents of young golfers. Most parents seem to be able to give their children the space they need to learn and develop; but others just don't seem to "get it."

Tyrannical and overbearing mothers and fathers who bully and smother their aspiring golfer are doing them a great disservice. Sometimes it comes close to abuse.

A few years ago when I gave a presentation on "golf parents" to the New Mexico high school golf coaches group, I told them that being a sports parent was basically a "balancing act." You're continually challenged to find the healthy middle between pushing too hard and not pushing hard enough, between tormenting the kid and abandoning the pursuit altogether. Between trying to get total control of everything and avoiding over-involving yourself.

I notice that while most parents keep a respectful distance during tournaments, for example, others seem to feel it is their right and duty to be overbearing cheerleaders and assistant coaches.

That's one reason I turned down coaching in the schools. Despite their good intentions, mischievous parents can be unnerving, regardless of what sport you're talking about.

My mantras for sports parents go like this: Support your kid, don't constantly rescue him; encourage her but don't badger; set healthy boundaries and limits but don't be a Gestapo; applaud and champion the future star; and don't over-control.

I occasionally witness some astonishing parental behavior in junior golf, like the father on the practice range yelling furiously at his small daughter with the most venomous, demeaning words you've ever heard. Hardly ever does harsh

criticism, brow-beating or attempts at embarrassment ever work positively.

The right to fail – or succeed

My other note of caution for parents is to monitor their natural inclination to live





the sport vicariously through their child. It's nice to bask in reflected glory, but our kids have the right to stumble and fail, and to overcome and be victorious, all on their own.

With regards to exposing your young potential golfer to the game, this is what the late Earl Woods (Tiger's dad) had to say:

"Arbitrary imposition of the game is guaranteed to bring about negative results. It should be a willing, cooperative, exciting time. You're not only teaching your child about golf, but also about our societal values, customs, and traditions.

"Let's face it: your child is learning about life. The by products of golf are integrity, responsibility, and patience. The game builds character ..." (From "Training a Tiger: A Father's Guide to Raising a Winner in Both Golf and Life").

Regardless of how recent events have unfolded, or what you may think of Tiger, the game of golf may still be the best at teaching kids how to lose with grace and how to win with humility.





Girls with ADHD are sometimes 'faraway'

Parents should work to treat compliant, rowdy kids equally

My daughter has some of the symptoms commonly associated with attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, but she is a very quiet child. Are some ADHD kids withdrawn and sedate?

Yes. ADHD is not always associated with hyperactivity, especially in girls. Some of them are "dreamy" and detached. Regrettably, they are sometimes called "airheads" or "space cadets." Such a child can sit looking at a book for 45 minutes without reading a word.

One teacher told me about a girl in her class who would lose every article of clothing that wasn't hooked to her body. Nearly every day, the teacher would send this child back to the playground to retrieve her sweater or coat, only to have her return 15 minutes later without it. She had forgotten what she went after. A boy or girl with that kind of distractibility would find it extremely difficult, if not impossible, to get home night after night with books and assignments written down, and then to complete the work and return it the next morning.

Frankly, the "faraway" child worries me more than the one who is excessively active. She may be seen as a good little girl who just isn't very bright, while the troublemaker is more likely to get the help he needs. He's too irritating to ignore.

Those who are and are not hyperactive have one characteristic in common. It is distractibility. Even though they flit from one thing to another, the name attention deficit hyperactivity disorder is not quite on target. It's better than the old term ("minimal brain damage"), but there is also misinformation in the current designation.

The problem is not that these children have a short attention span. At times, they can become lost in something that greatly interests them to the point that they aren't aware of anything going on around them. Instead, they have an insatiable need for mental stimulation during every waking moment. The moment they become bored with what they are doing, they dash off in search of the next exciting possibility.

Dr. James Dobson Focus on the Family One father told me about his 4-year-old

One father told me about his 4-year-old son with ADHD. He said, "If you let that kid get bored, you deserve what he's going to do to you." That applies to millions of children.

What are the special needs of a compliant kid – one that goes along to get along? Does he have any special needs?

That's a great question, and the answer is yes. When one child is a stick of dynamite and the other is an all-star sweetheart, the cooperative, gentle individual can easily be taken for granted. If there's an unpleasant job to be done, he may be expected to do it because mom and dad just don't have the energy to fight with the tiger.

When it is necessary for one child to sacrifice or do without, there's a tendency to pick the one who won't complain as loudly. Under these circumstances, the compliant boy or girl comes out on the short end of the stick.

The consequences of such inequity should be obvious. The responsible child often becomes angry over time. He has a sense of powerlessness and resentment that simmers below the surface.

He's like the older brother in the parable of the Prodigal Son told by Jesus. He didn't rebel against his father. He stayed behind and ran the farm while his irresponsible brother squandered his money on fun and games. Who could blame him for resenting little bro? His response is typical of the compliant, hardworking sibling.

I strongly recommend that parents seek to balance the scales in dealing with the compliant child. Make sure he gets his fair share of parental attention. Help him find ways to cope with his overbearing sibling. And, within reason, give him the right to make his own decisions.

There's nothing simple about raising kids, is there? Even the "easiest" of them needs our very best effort.



overweight Monitor fat, sugar and salt amounts

Americans eat too much and eat the wrong foods. We like to eat. We cook for ourselves too infrequently. It is easy to send out for pizza, stop on the way home from work and pick up a bucket at the colonel's place or go out to eat, rather than prepare food when we get home after a hard day at work.

We do not have to encourage our kids to eat when we order out fast food, as they love it. It is easy to eat fast food while watching TV or playing video games, and we do not have to think about what we eat while we are doing these other things.

To control our weight, we must make better choices. We need to cook more for ourselves at home. The crock pot allows us to easily prepare dinners while we are away working so that it is ready when we get home, but we need to make better food choices when we eat out.

If we are lucky enough to have a job, many people work long hours, or two jobs, and are too tired or get home too late to prepare meals. So it is convenient to just let someone else prepare our food. And they do it with delight.

The food industry has grown to fill this need. In fact, they have encouraged eating out to increase their profitability. But the way they have succeeded is by learning what we like to put in our mouth. They have learned that to sell processed or prepared foods it must contain enough fat, sugar, salt and feels right in our mouths - they make millions.

This is the secret of Oreo crème-filled cookies. They combine sugar, fat and salt, and can be enjoyed eating assembled or by separating the components and eating the filling (fat and sugar), then eating the cookie (sugar, salt and fat). Just the right ingredients and the right "crunch." They did it so well that this remains one of the best-selling cookies of all time.

What about chips and salsa served as an appetizer in almost every Mexican food establishment? Chips are full of fat and salt, and the salsa is heavy in sugar (tomato) and salt. It crunches right and combined enough fat and sugar to delight our tastes.

If we consider the sugar, fat and salt in the food that we order, we can do better than we have at controlling our weight. We also need to exercise control over the size of the portions that we consume. The moguls of the food industry meet often to consider how to create new combinations of fat, sugar and salt to create new products to titillate our appetites and sell more to us without regard to how it worsens the weight problem in the United States. They are interested in profitability. They use words such as "low fat" to hide the sugar

Why we are **Pets need to eat right, too**

A healthy diet is crucial to well being of dogs and cats

Weight issues and dieting are quickly becoming a conscious concern for many Americans and their families, but with such focus on what we are eating, we can sometimes forget about our furry friends

Much like humans, canines and felines can have weight and diet issues, too, that can drastically affect their well-being. Taking time to address what your pet needs in their daily nutrition can save owners in the long run and can lead to a longer, healthier life for your pet.

Cheap pet food vs. name-brand food

One of the more common mistakes owners make is buying cheap food for their pet. Although you may think you are saving money in the long run, the fact is you aren't. Many cheap dog and cat foods contain "fillers," which usually consist of corn, wheat or other low-price ingredients.

Foods containing fillers do not provide pets with enough of the three key nutrients to their diet carbohydrates, protein and fat. In turn, your pet must consume more of the cheaper food in order to get those nutrients.

You may be paying half as much as the name brand foods, but your pet has to consume three times more of the cheaper food to satisfy their diet. Beware of foods that list grains as their number one ingredient.

In today's tight economy,

paying extra for dog food may seem daunting, but there are ways owners can avoid the high costs of name brand food.

Just like with groceries for you and the family, coupon clipping or joining store reward programs can reduce the cost of name brand food. Buying bulk can help alleviate the costs of name brand food. Although the up front price may be intimidating, the price per pound of food drastically decreases with larger quantities. And with a large supply you won't have to worry about feeding Fido during months where finances may become tight. Buy pet food at livestock

supply or ranch stores. Local livestock supply stores often do not have nearly as much of a price mark-up that grocery stores and pet stores have.

Raw meat or vegetarian diets

Another mistake pet owners often make is trying to revert dogs (and sometimes cats) back to their natural carnivorous ways by feeding them raw meat. This is a common misconception.

Dogs and cats are susceptible to the same gastrointestinal diseases as humans, and raw meat contains a wide array of diseases. Pets can get salmonella, campylobacter, vibrio, E. coli or yersinia.

It can be argued that for millions of years canines have eaten raw meat and managed to survive, but comparing a wild

which add no nutritional value to the diet of your pet. canine to a domesticated canine is like comparing apples to oranges.

What you feed your dog or cat can have a drastic impact on

their diet and health. Cheap pet food can often contain "fillers,"

Wild canines depend on what can be a weekly meal of raw meat and flesh, whereas domestic canines need more of a consistent diet in their lives for longevity purposes. Wild canines have a drastically higher mortality rate, acquiring numerous diseases and medical conditions due to their diet. Also, canines are actually omnivores and rely heavily on other food sources such as fruit

and grains for key nutrients.

As for felines, they are "obligate carnivores," meaning they must have meat in their diet to furnish their need for high amounts protein. Many vegetarian and vegan pet owners will impose their lifestyle on to their animals. For cats this is a big mistake that can eventually kill them.

For dogs, a vegetarian diet will not have as great of an effect on their diet since canines are See Pet food on page A26

Stay heart healthy Add superfoods to your diet

When you're paying attention to good nutrition, it's easy to spend a lot of time focusing on what not to eat - all the stuff that clogs your arteries and expands your waistline. Now's a good time to look at the things that you should eat and the things you can do to keep your arteries healthy, and to fully understand why paying attention to arterial health is important.

Some foods pack more punch than others. Here are five foods that have a lot of disease-fighting power, and it's a good idea to regularly make room for them in your meals.

The five superfoods



Salmon: As far as seafood goes, this delicious fish is one of your best food sources of heart-healthy omega-3 fatty acids, which can help keep your heart rate steady, lower your triglycerides – a type of blood fat - and slow the growth of athero-

sclerotic plaque. You can bake it, broil it, roast it, poach it, or enjoy it smoked or in sushi. The FDA recommends that people eat up to 12 ounces of fish weekly.



Broccoli: It may not rank as the favorite food of kids, but as an adult you can probably appreciate the health benefits that broccoli offers. Its mildly bitter taste comes from chemicals it contains that may provide cancer protection. Experts think

anti-cancer substances in the green veggies may act as antioxidants or encourage enzymes that detoxify harmful chemicals in your body, according to the American Cancer Society. Since cooking may destroy some of the helpful compounds, cook it as lightly as possible.



Almonds: These tasty nuts are a good source of fiber and the antioxidant vitamin E, and the fat they contain is mostly monounsaturated, which is considered a "good" type of fat that can help lower your cholesterol. They may also help control

blood sugar and insulin levels. Research has shown that eating 2 ounces of almonds daily for 10 weeks didn't cause people to gain weight. A daily serving size is the amount that you can fit into two sections of an ice-cube tray, suggests the American Dietetic Association.



Blueberries: These vivid little orbs are chock-full of antioxidants, which can help lower your risk of heart disease and cancer by neutralizing free radicals, rogue oxygen molecules that can contribute to atherosclerosis and damage your DNA.



Green tea: This drink contains chemicals called polyphenols, which act as antioxidants. One of these, called EGCG, may encourage cancer cells to die, though more research is needed to show whether drinking

green tea can reduce your risk of cancer. However, it may also help control your blood sugar and lower your cholesterol. All these add up to plenty of good reasons to switch some of your daily servings of soda with green tea. Drink it iced or hot. It is delicious either way.

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Preparing for research careers NMSU program is third largest in the nation

Bacteria, electric fish and cancer may not sound like they have a lot in common, but students in the New Mexico State University Minority Access to Research Careers program may one day change the biomedical field through their research in these areas.

The MARC program is in its 34th year of existence at NMSU, making it one of the oldest in the country, as well as the

third largest. The program's goal is to increase the number of minorities receiving doctorates in biomedical fields. Faculty members mentor participants during the two-year program. The students work in their mentor's lab as well as take an honors course on careers in biomedical research and receive training in how to give presentations and manage their time and stress.

During their second summer, they attend a summer internship in a lab at another research university. This summer, NMSU students have internships at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, Baylor University and the University of California-Berkeley. The MARC program, in conjunction with the hosting program, pays for the trip.

Those participating in the program span departments, colleges and research interests across campus, in-

Chemistry major Leticia Montoya recently graduated and will attend the University of Oregon this fall to start working toward her doctorate in biochemistry. While in the MARC program, Montoya researched the physiological role for the drug metabolism enzyme Cytochrome P450 2S1 (CYP2S1) in human lung cells. She was mentored by Aaron Rowland, assistant professor of chemistry and biochemistry.

ed by cancer, which greatly influenced her decision to pursue a career in cancer research. She works with Jeffrey Arterburn, a professor in the chemistry and biochemistry department, to develop new diagnostic imaging agents that would allow medical experts to detect the presence of a specific protein that has been associated with aggressive types of breast, endometrial and ovarian cancers.

"Achieving the objectives of this research project would be an important step towards the ultimate goal of providing new clinical tools to help diagnose and treat these types of cancers," Arterburn said.

Natalie Aarons Cooke works with electric fish that have the ability to regenerate any tissue that is lost, such as a tail or other body part, and explores how the fishes' stem cells differ from

human stem cells. Mentored by Graciela Unguez, an associate biology professor, she isolates stem cells from electric fish and keeps the cultures alive in Petri dishes to promote the growth of new muscle.

Biology professor Michele Nishiguchi works with three MARC students in her lab. Former MARC student Ferdinand Rivera is currently researching the interactions among strains of bacteria. By isolating strains of the bacteria Vibrio fischeri from squid, he has been able to identify beneficial interactions among the strains.

Another of Nishiguchi's students, Clayton Gorman, is identifying biofilm formations and studying the characteristics they have enabling them to survive. Jonathan Easterling is studying the response rates in bacteria when put in extremes of salinity and temperature. Through a series of growth experiments, he is researching what types of changes

occur and their causes.

Although the bacteria the students work with are not pathogenic, they are closely related to ones that are, such as Vibrio cholerae, the bacteria that causes cholera, which means the research explored in Nishiguchi's lab offers a better understanding of how bacteria interact with its host.

Many of the students have won awards while in the NMSU MARC program, and have won awards as graduate students as well. Past graduates of the program have gone on to doctoral programs at Harvard, Yale, Stanford and the University of Arizona, just to name a few.

Numerous career opportunities are available for those with a doctorate in a biomedical field. These include becoming a university professor, a scientist at a national or industrial laboratory, in pharmaceutical development or working for the Environmental Protection Agency and the Centers for Disease Control.

Are you vigilant over what you send via email to friends and coworkers?

Are you one of those people who forwards funny emails, chain letters or has entire conversations with other employees via email?

Maybe the joke you were forwarded and subsequently passed on was too raunchy, risqué or was plain inappropriate, and you wish you could take it back.

I can think of at least a few county employees who wish they could take back their email forwarding habits in the past few weeks. But that's another story.

With the increased scrutiny of professional communication in the workplace, developers are working on new ways to make email communications "vanish."

According to software-maker VaporStream, one in five outgoing emails contain content that poses a legal, financial or regulatory risk for businesses and their employees.

VaporStream and other companies are developing software for email communication that is safe, secure and is intentionally not stored or documented - much like a water-cooler conversation.

This new software makes emails unable to be forwarded or even cc'd to other users. The emails can't even be saved or printed. The conversation remains with the respondents with the help of encryption technology and the email itself is broken into several parts before being sent over the Internet.

But you might say, this isn't eliminating the problem that exists in workplace communication, just masking it. The software can serve other useful purposes.

Take the health care industry, for example. People in the business of health care know how important patient record confidentiality is. That's where Vapor-Stream and other similar software can actually do some good.

Business **Off the Bingaman talks shop**

Congressman says current job growth not enough to lift economy

New Mexico's senior senator said he's doubtful the U.S. economy will pick up enough jobs to sustain a balance between unemployment and job growth in the coming months.


During an economic update Tuesday, July 6, hosted by the Hispano Chamber of Commerce de Las Cruces, U.S. Sen. Jeff Bingaman told listeners that it's "very unfortunate" the national economy remains unsteady, at least in terms of employment growth, which he said is the only road that leads to long-term economic recov-

ery. "We did have some private-sector, nonfarm-payroll employment growth in June, but not near as much as we need," he said. "Given the size of our economy, you've got to create a little more than 100,000 jobs each month to stay even - as far as the unemployment rate?

In June, the private sector added only 83,000 jobs. Total non-farm payroll employment declined by 125,000 during that month and the unemployment rate edged down to 9.5 percent, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. The decrease is largely due to the loss of about 225,000 temporary census jobs.

"You probably see the results of that, to some extent, here in southern New Mexico," Bingaman said.

Locally, Las Cruces is faring a little bet-ter, with an unemployment rate hovering at around 8 percent, according to the latest figures from the Department of Workforce Solutions. See **Bingaman** on page B3

Pro's is on hold for now

Opening date still uncertain

A planned grocery store, eatery and tortilleria that promised to revitalize a dreary shopping center on El Paseo Road has been delayed.

Pro's Ranch Markets, a Hispanic-themed supermarket chain popular in California and Arizona, plans to occupy the former space of the Community Action Agency, 320 E. Wyatt Drive. Plans are now on hold until a deal with the state that provides financial incentives can be finalized, said Walt Skowronski of NAI 1st Valley, the property manager for Pro's.

The financing they have been working on, which involves some incentive-type financing from the state, is looking like it's coming to completion," Skowronski said. "They already own the building, so they're already putting money into it."

Pro's was scheduled to open this summer, and already, some tenants have inked deals and **B2 | Business Pro's**

moved into adjacent properties anticipating the increased traffic the new grocery store will bring

The owner of Tip Top Nails, for example, a business located in the plaza, plans to open a Vietnamese restaurant in the former space of Beltran's Meat Market, but that's pending the arrival and opening of the next-door grocery store.

"He knows and feels comfortable enough to do it," Skowronski said.

A new laundromat and women's retail store are also in the works to locate in the same plaza, Skoworonski said.

Mark Lewis, a spokesman for Pro's, said the company had not yet set a firm opening date, but confirmed that paperwork related to financing the business was in its finishing stages.

"We don't yet know the exact opening date, but we're getting closer," he said. "We will have some exciting news to share soon about some other incoming tenants."

Pro's has had great success in other Southwestern communities. It has several locations in Arizona, Texas and New Mexico, including a store in the Atrisco Shopping Center in

Albuquerque and one in El Paso's Lower Valley. 'It's amazing the response we have had," Lewis said in a former inter-

view. "We expect the same in Las Cruces." Skowronski said he anticipates 2,500 to 3,000 people in and around


the plaza daily once the market opens.

Pro's has made some outreach into the community. It hosted a "Posada Navideña" and Free Toy Giveaway in December 2009, with the store's mascot, Ranchie the Bull, greeting kids and Pro's representatives raffling off TVs and other electronics.

Pro's hosts about 10 charity events in each of its markets, Lewis said.

A year ago however, the area's unemployment rate was 6.3 percent.

Bingaman said there is still a "significant amount of expenditure" that will occur from the recovery act and is hopeful it will push month-over-month job creation in the private sector closer to 100,000 to balance out unemployment.

'At some point in the very near future, Congress is going to be required to essentially cut off any stimulus funding and go ahead with deficit reduction," Bingaman said. "But we need to focus on getting job creation going before we focus on the deficit."

Roque Garcia, CEO of Rio Grande Behavioral Health Services, thanked the senator for being up-front.

There is so much misinformation out there, that I appreciate (Bingaman) addressing the unemployment issue," he said.

Changes to health reform

About 22 percent out of the 26 percent of people living in the state without health insurance will be covered by 2020, Bingaman said, ushering in a new era of health coverage that is not only fair and widely available, but eliminates doubtful honesty and legality from the private insurance market.

"We have protections in (the health care reform bill) against rescission of existing coverage when someone finds out they are sick," he said. "The practice, unfortunately, has been

really prevalent that companies start looking for ways to drop coverage when they learn someone is going to contract a serious illness.'

The end result of health care reform will be improving coverage in the state, more choices and a greater ability for people to choose what's affordable for them, Bingaman said.

For concerned small business owners, however, it's a different story.

According to the U.S. Department of Health & Human services, small businesses pay about 18 percent more for the same health insurance policy as large firms. They lack the purchasing power of large businesses

The Affordable Care Act, signed into law March 23, makes some provisions to offset those costs. Businesses with up to 25 employees that pay average annual wages below \$50,000 and provide health coverage qualify for tax credits up to 35 percent now and up to 50 percent by 2014.

The employers' share of the premium could be reduced by virtue of these tax

"We said that any place up to five miles north of the border, there is no restriction on what Border Patrol can do as far as regular touring and patrolling," he said. "Above that, in wilderness areas, they will still have the authority to take whatever action they require in pursuit of a suspect or in pursuit of a particular circumstance.

We worked with Border Patrol in developing these changes and we've gotten strong sup-port from Border Patrol officials saying this gives them much greater ability to do their job then they have under the current law."

Angel Montoya, a sportsman from Las Cruces, said he fully endorses the bill.

"It's a way of us protecting these areas for the future," he said. "I have a 6-year-old I want to take out hunting years from now and not have to run into a four-wheeler in the desert. I'm really appreciative that I can pass on this tradition to my sons."

Fielding a question about immigration reform, Bingaman said there's no chance comprehensive immigration will be introduced or passed this year.


We've never been able to get a combined bill that the two Houses of Congress can agree upon," he said. "A lot of the supporters of the earlier immigration reform legislation we considered no longer support it." Maria Flores, a Las Cruces Public Schools

board member, urged Bingaman and the current administration to be steadfast in their approach to immigration reform.

"As a New Mexican, as a mother of a son that's often stopped by Border Patrol, I ask that immigration reform be brought up," she said. 'It's affecting our families, my family and the children in school. Reform is badly needed for all of the Southwest. Since you're so much closer to the president, please relate this urgency."

How old is your Realtor?

Chances are, she's 54 and well-educated

Earlier this year, the National Association of Realtors (NAR) surveyed approximately 120,000 of its 1.2 million members, asking them to answer questions about their business activities and other facets of their profession. Results from the surveys were used to form the "2010 National Association of Realtors Member Profile."

Here are some of the more interesting characteristics of our nation's Realtors.

According to the survey, the typical Realtor is a 54-year-old, college-educated woman who has been in the business for 10 years. She works for an independent, non-franchised real estate firm and specializes in selling residential properties.

Just under one-in-five Realtors previously worked in business, financial services or management positions prior to obtaining their licenses, while around 15 percent worked in sales and retail.

Almost 10 percent worked in office or administrative positions before taking the plunge, with only 5 percent choosing real estate as their first career (How many times have you heard a child say: "I want to be a Realtor when I grow up?").

When it comes to education, almost half have earned a bachelor's degree or higher.



Ninety-four percent are registered to vote, compared with about 66 percent for the U.S. as a whole. Ninety-one percent reported that they voted in the last national election, while seven out of 10 were married.

The vast majority of Realtors, around 75 percent, specialize in residential real estate, and approximately 20 percent of members hold a broker's license. The typical Realtor works 46 hours per week, with one-in-five reporting that they work a minimum of 60 hours per week.

The survey indicates that brokers earned an annual median income of \$35,700, down 3 percent from the previous year. Realtors with 16 years or more experience had a median gross income of \$52,300, compared to those with two years or less experience who had a median gross income of \$8,800. Nearly 4 in 10 members reported gross incomes below \$25,000. Sixteen percent reported incomes of \$100,000 or more.

Approximately 20 percent of members are fluent in languages other than English (I

happen to speak fluent Canadian), while 9 percent of respondents were born outside of the United States.

The National Association of Realtors is the nations' largest trade association, with members practicing in all areas of residential and commercial real estate. From property broker-age to property management – from appraisal to relocation – Realtors provide important services to their clients and customers.

The survey also confirmed that when it comes to value, Realtor services are hard to beat. Think of it in this way: the ranks of Realtors would quickly shrink if brokers and agents could not produce better results than buyers and sellers could produce on their own. And because the vast majority of Realtors are only compensated through commissions paid after a transaction is completed, they are highly motivated to provide the highest possible level of service to American property owners. Economic growth brings voter happiness but stains resources Politicians, responding to their constituen-cies, have created a global economic system Stepping off the treadmill won't be easy

An unstated assumption underlying many of my columns is that economic growth is good.

I'm not alone in making this assumption. Most politicians make the same assumption and with good reason. Politicians presiding over no-growth economies don't get reelected. Case in point: the current electoral prospects of Democrats in the upcoming midterm elections.


Once basic needs are met, more wealth does not bring with it additional happiness. People with homes are happier than the homeless, but people with big houses aren't happier than people in more modest houses. That wealth doesn't lead to happiness is such a regularity that economists even have a name for it - the Easterly Paradox - named for Richard Easterly, who first documented this phenomena in a 1974 report.

It turns out that people quickly become used to their circumstances. A lottery winner is ecstatic about winning, is happy for a few months and then returns to a normal state. Similarly, with society as a whole, a pay raise makes us happy, but we need another pay raise next year to maintain that happiness. Psychologists call this process, by which our happiness changes only temporarily, as adaptation, a behavior that seems to be hard-wired. We are programmed to continually strive, to be never satisfied with the status quo.

So if politicians are to ensure the electorate is happy, they need to ensure that, on average, each of us continues to get ahead. That means we need a growing economy. This applies certainly to democracies, but it also applies to other types of government. The Chinese leadership, for example, bases much of their legitimacy on their ability to provide prosperity. Meanwhile, the breakup of the Soviet Union was driven in large part by the loss of legitimacy of the Communist Party arising from their failure to promote economic growth.

designed to satisfy our desire to become not wealthy - but rather continuously wealthier. The problem, of course, is that the global economy appears to be outstripping global resources. Global warming is the latest manifestation of the limits to growth to gain public notoriety, but other examples include habitat loss and rising energy prices.

There are ways around our global environmental limits. Technology can save us. But implementing these solutions will result in slower global growth in the short run. Carbon trading is an example of this sort of policy. Carbon markets will bring to bear on the issue of global warming the same intention of purpose that characterizes other capitalist activities. But in the short run, carbon trading will raise prices, lower productivity and generally slow economic growth. Politicians focused on the short run are reluctant to implement carbon trading. The outcome is a failure to deal with our environmental problems.



But it doesn't have to be this way. In the 1970s, we adopted landmark environmental regulation that among other things, established the Environmental Protection Agency. This was among the most progressive legislation internationally passed up to that time. The result was slower economic growth during the 1970s. Think back to the unpopular Nixon and Carter administrations. Their unpopularity was in part driven by poor economic performance arising from environmental regulation.

Can politicians see past their short-term election concerns to enact needed environmental reforms? A better question might be: Can we see past our short-term need for continual wealth accretion to allow our politicians to pass needed reforms? I'm afraid I'm not very optimistic on this score.


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Soccer scholarship helps local student Wong benefits from one of foundation's various education funding opportunities

Gabe Chavez: Community service is alive and well

Chavez embodies the spirit of giving back

Gabe Chavez, a career miner, is no stranger to compassion. Ask anyone involved in nonprofit work in Las Cruces and they'll tell you.

'I was working a full-time job by the time I was 14, but that's also when I started volunteering," Chavez said. "It was tough having to quit school to go to work, but I had to do it."

Chavez, born in Winston, N.M., and raised in the Grant County city of Bayard, recalls a tough but rewarding childhood.

Winston, right up there near T or C, was a small mining town where my father worked," he said. "My dad worked around the mines, did a little bit of everything. We had to move after the work dried up.

"But with only a sixth-grade education, I had to quit school to start working. Everything from construction to the dairies."

At 19, Chavez started mining. It began at a lead and zinc mine near Silver City, which eventually led him to Baghdad, Ariz., where he worked on a copper mine for more than 20 years.

"At 14, I was an assistant scout master and did a lot of work with Boy Scouts," he said. "In my 20s, I was a volunteer firefighter in Arizona and I eventually became the captain of the mine rescue team in Baghdad.

"I also was a volunteer for the county's search and rescue team and for a long time I was an umpire for a little league there as well."

Along the way, Chavez managed to raise a family of six in very tough economic conditions.

Following his stay in Arizona and with his children growing up and pursuing their own careers, Chavez returned to New Mexico - first Grant County, then Albuquerque, Truth or Consequences and eventually Las Cruces, the hometown of his wife Connie.

"When I came to Las Cruces, about 22 years ago, my wife said, 'You need to do something. Get out and volunteer,'" Chavez said.

So Chavez began volunteering at the soup kitchen, forming a bond with the Las Cruces community that has been recognized as far as Washington, D.C.

"I started there, at the soup kitchen, then started volunteer-ing for the Red Cross," he said. "Then I went on to volunteering at the prison, visiting the inmates there. And I managed a baseball team for a little league for more than 10 years.

"I was a board member for the Community of Hope, the Mesilla Valley Clothes Closet, the hospitality house at the prison and I was on the advisory council for the RSVP program for the city."

At one point, Chavez kept a list of all his charitable endeavors, but admits he's misplaced it. Regardless, the awards and recognitions he's received during his time in Las Cruces is testament to his goodwill.

The cause that has stayed closest to Chavez' heart is that of helping feed the needy - regardless of age, sex, gender, economic status or nationality, he said. Chavez has volunteered for El Caldito Soup Kitchen for more than 20 years and has served as its board president for 11 years.

"I helped start the very first gleaners community," he said. "It's a saying from the Bible – after the harvest, you go out and pick the leftovers. That's what we do, we go out to the farms, the stores, hospitals and other places to pick up leftover food items that we can use in the soup kitchen."

Of the nearly 300 people the soup kitchen serves every day, an overwhelming majority are men, mostly veterans, Chavez said.

"You see kids too, some families," he said. "Some are low-income, some are homeless. Others just need to really save money. Anybody that can benefit from our food, we serve them. It goes a long way.

When Chavez first started volunteering, the soup kitchen

only served four times a week.

"Now we're serving every day and we have great programs that we do for Christmas and Thanksgiving, which people here really appreciate," he said. "The food has changed a lot too. At first, we were just serving soup and stuff like that. Now we can give them enchiladas, spaghetti, casseroles and all kinds of stuff. Because of the help from the community, we can afford it."

The Las Cruces Potter's Guild, for example, organizes the Empty Bowls event each year, which raises a significant amount of funds to help stock the kitchen throughout the year.

"We also have grants from the city, the Daniels Foundation and the Stocker Foundation. Curves on Del Rey does a big food drive for us every year. A class at Las Cruces High School collects items for us twice a year.

"There are other big organizations that help us with fundraisers. The Democratic Party has been very helpful. The Moose and Elks Lodge help get the word out. And then there's the Knights of Columbus, they help a lot too."

Chavez, with the help of volunteers, has forged a strong network in the community to ensure the continuity of El Caldito for years to come, he said.

"We can't forget the churches, they help us so much too," he said.

Chavez said El Caldito accepts donations in virtually any form, "cash, food, donated items - we'll take it."

Although Chavez has received countless recognition for his contributions to the community, the most notable, perhaps, was receiving the Daily Points of Light Award from President Barack Obama.

On Oct. 16, 2009, Chavez traveled to College Station, Texas, to join more than 150 volunteers from around the country hand-picked to receive the Daily Points of Light Award at a ceremony hosted by former president George H.W. Bush, former first lady Barbara Bush and Obama.

"That was really something to get an invitation from the president himself, saying that he'd like to honor the work that I have done," he said. "It means a lot to me."

Chavez said he doesn't see himself slowing down anytime soon

"I always tell my wife, I'll do it for another year. Just another year," he said. "But the years pass and I'm still here. As long as I'm able to, I will keep helping, until one of these days when I'm not able to get around.



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

Center for the Arts is on its way

Groundbreaking event to take place Thursday, July 15

It's always been a pretty quiet little corner. Not much going on, some grass and trees. A few years ago, an outdoor band shell was added. Still fairly unassuming.

But at 9 a.m. Thursday, July 15, shovels will turn some earth then the pastoral plot and the southeast corner of University Avenue and Espina Street will begin to be transformed into a place many students, faculty and artists have only dreamt about until now - the Center for the Arts.

Phase I of the of the three-phase project,

the Dance and Theatre Arts Performance Hall. includes a 400-seat auditorium, classrooms, rehearsal space, state-ofthe-art sound and lighting technology and fly space (an area above the stage that uses a system of counter weights and pulleys to raise and lower large scenery pieces and other equipment).

As an undergraduate

majoring in secondary education with drama and English as my teaching fields, I learned to act and practiced a craft that I loved on the stage and in the undersized classrooms of the Hershel Zohn Theatre. As emotionally attached to the place as I am, it was crowded and under-equipped even in the early '70s. But, if I may say so, we did some really good theater in those days.

Just imagine what today's students could accomplish in a facility that is modern, attracts high-quality professionals as faculty and brings, it is hoped, audiences to watch their product.

Dance at New Mexico State University has never really had a place to call its own. Program Director Debra Knapp has done amazing things with no real facility. What could the dance department be with room for Knapp to spread her wings and give her a space in which to fling her seemingly unlimited energies?

And what could come about through collaborative efforts between the dance and theater arts departments? That is one of the benefits of creating the Center of the Arts. Clustering the performing arts together to feed off each other's collective creativity. It will ultimately include the music, creative media and visual arts departments.

Phase II will give the visual arts a longoverdue and much-needed home. I remember when Williams Hall was a sweaty ole gymnasium. The Visual Arts Center will provide studio and classroom space for various art programs. It will include an art conservation laboratory (which doesn't mean saving the art for a rainy day, but preservation of the art and therefore our cultural heritage, all supported by research and education). An Art Museum and Gallery will allow for displays and storage for permanent collections.

And finally, a Grand Performance Hall (Phase III) will seat up to 1,200 for large vocal, instrumental and touring performances. Does this mean we wouldn't have to go to El Paso (always a plus) or Albuquerque (even

plus-sier) to see "direct-from-Broadway" stuff? I really hope so.

In all my history with NMSU, I really feel for once that the arts are being recognized for their importance. They are finally thought of as being more on par with engineering or agriculture (well, maybe not on par but at least not a

triple bogey). I guess it's unrealistic to expect the arts will ever be as important as athletics, but there are those of us to whom making an audience laugh, cry or think can get us just as "stoked" as scoring the winning touchdown or basket.

The groundbreaking is great but those who care will all have to be patient; it's still a long way off. May the time pass as quickly as possible.

While you are waiting, if you want to help out, any size donation makes a difference. One of the goals of the Center for the Arts is to be as accessible to as many people as possible – not just the university community. It is a true public-private partnership that is meant to improve the quality of life for everyone in the state and border region. Teen is active volunteer

Mural is just one project of many

A concrete retaining wall near a pe-destrian underpass – Kohl's is on the Triviz Drive side of the freeway and Ruby Tuesday is on the Telshor Boulevard side - might seem like a strange place to see lyrics from a song by Gogol Bordello, but there they are, thanks to Denali Wilson. There could be unplanned examples of the group's lyrics out there, but "gypsy punk" bands aren't usually revered by 'tagger" types.

"Start wearing purple wearing purple Start wearing purple, for me now All your sanity and wits, they will all vanish ...

The mural came about because Denali's father Donald "goes everywhere on his bike" Wilson, saw the wildlife mural on the other side of the freeway damaged by the aforementioned taggers. Wilson was looking for a project to accumulate some credit for a class at Mayfield High School that required community service. With her artistic ability it seemed like a good plan. In August 2008, Wilson and a friend, Ashley Sosa, repaired the graffiti-damaged mural.

Wilson then approached Keep Las Cruces Beautiful coordinator Craig Fen-ske and asked if she could design and paint her own mural near the underpass. The plan was approved, and Wilson began the mural in 2009.

Completed earlier this year, the mural turned out to be much bigger than planned, and so she had input, like those song lyrics, from her friends and family as to how to fill the space.

Wilson's mother Lesa always encouraged her daughter's artistic side by signing her up for all sorts of art-related classes. She also took art classes in school, studying most recently with Shelly Black at Mayfield.

The Career Art Path (CAP), a summer program through the Doña Ana Arts Council, also had an impact.

"I took the workshop in sixth and seventh grade," Wilson said. "I just finished my second year assisting the teachers." Another way she satisfied her class

requirements was to teach after school enrichment to students at East Picacho and Fairacres elementary schools. She has been approached to teach private lessons, but hasn't decided if teaching art is something she wants to do. "Teaching is hard," Wilson said. "All those rules.

The 17-year-old soon-to-be senior is not planning to make a career of art even though she really loves it, especial-

ly portraiture. "I'll still keep art as a hobby for the rest of my life," she said. "But I like to do it for fun. I wouldn't enjoy it so much if it was a job."

Wilson volunteers all over the place, is a jewelry maker, short film producer and animator, award-winning artist, poster creator, T-shirt designer, writer and honor student.

But what does she want to do with her life?

"I am really interested in a science career. I'll probably major in biology," Wilson said. "I am really looking forward to taking anatomy and physiology in the fall and AP (advanced placement) biology in the spring. If I could have my dream job it would be biological illustration, but there aren't a lot of openings."

Denali Wilson's mural will continue to be a tribute to her friends and family for a long time. And when her dad commutes to work on his bike, he'll go right by something to remind him of his daughter's dedication and talent.







"Starry, Starry Night," an ethereal evening showcasing a variety of familiar songs, opens Friday, July 9, at the Boba Cabaret.





I realized that I probably haven't had a "real" breakfast there – or if I have I don't recall. Of course I have eaten their great pastries – muffins, cinnamon rolls, croissants and, my personal favorite, scones. And Spirit Winds has always been known as a great place for coffee drinks, tea and chai.

Richard Parra started Spirit Winds in Mesilla in 1978 as a gift shop. When he added the coffee bar element in 1998, the operation expanded and moved to its current location at 2260 Locust St.

The thing I have always appreciated and enjoyed about Spirit Winds is the positive energy the place exudes. There



is a joyousness and whimsicality in this the merchandise – the cards, clothing, the jewelry, soaps, lotions, incense and other gift items – and they all reflect Parra's ing personality. He is just a positive sort of guy with, apparently, a little off-kilter out

sense of humor. The coffee bar side of things doesn't necessarily have a wackiness about

it – just a friendly atmosphere, good food and the opportunity to sit and soak in the positive feelings that are oozing from the "gift source" side.

Sandwiches, salads, wraps and soups make up the basic food choices. "When you have a limited menu," Parra said, "you can concentrate on making those things really good. People come in, and they know they are going to get the same

quality every time." All the ingredients are fresh, and a baker comes in every day at 4 a.m. to "make the donuts," etc.

I tried the "El Jefe," which is your choice of bagel with a spicy sauce adding zing to the egg, sausage and cheese filling. I also tried the weekend special – a sausage, green chile, egg and cheese biscuit. But this wasn't your typical stuff between two halves of a regular biscuit, this was a double-fist-sized biscuit with the center hollowed out and filled with the goodies. And good news for morning people. Beginning in August, Spirit Winds is adding a line of waffles. "With our own spin," Parra said.

At a couple of different lunches recently I tried what I like to call the "Sophia's Choice." Would it be the spicy hummus wrap

or the black bean burger (which is the most popular food item they serve)? Well, in a very un-Meryl Streepish way, I went for both. (Not at the same time! Whaddya think I am?) Both delicious and both made even more appealing with the accompaniment of the pesto pasta salad.

Spirit Winds has been recognized nu-

merous times over the years by various publications as "Best" – coffee bar, gift source, etc. Where does Richard Parra keep the plaques commemorating those accolades? On the walls in the bathroom. Of course you have to turn off the blue twinkle lights and turn on the overhead light to see them. But it does make for some enlightening bathroom reading.

I can't help but smile when I walk in to Spirit Winds.

Family Secrets come out 'City Island' amuses

Andy Garcia is back! And he is in fine form in this combination of comedy, drama, disbelief and touch of cliché.

Garcia plays Vince, a struggling prison guard. Woe is he ... he can't get no respect at home, and the entire family - Vince, his wife and two children – never reveal anything about their lives to one another.

Vince is a wanna-be actor who is secretly trying out for a role in "the new Scorsese film," wife Joyce smokes and is slowly being drawn to infidelity, Vince Jr. is into online fantasy sites, especially those that show women eating large amounts of food, and daughter Vivian has secretly become an exotic (not erotic) dancer to help pay for her college tuition.

Thrown into this slightly flammable and semi-dysfunctional mix is Tony, and it turns out that Tony is Vince's son from a long-ago relationship.

In a clever story twist, Vince meets Tony when he is locked up for the umpteenth time, and since most of his crimes involve property not people, Vince is able to wrangle his supervisors into letting him take Tony to live near his home. Not in it, mind you, as poor Tony, a likable, if not somewhat caustic lad, is placed in a workshop out back, and ordered, more or less, to start getting his life together.

This adds still another secret to the Rizzo household (these folks are so non-communicative that they could easily be related to Ratso Rizzo of "Midnight

Cowboy" fame).

Still another character enters the mix, in the form of Emily Mortimer as Molly, who Vince Sr. meets in his acting class (which is taught by Santa Fe resident Alan Arkin). She becomes a major cheerleader for him and is the one to convince him to try out for the Scorsese film, which results in the funniest scene of the movie.

All of the secrets slowly start to unravel, as the Rizzo family members start guessing and accusing each other

of things that they think are secret, such as Vince Sr. having an affair with Molly; Vince Jr. having a bedroom-style relationship with a neighbor, who just happens to operate one of the websites that Jr. is really into; or that Joyce slept with Tony.


It might sound somewhat confusing, but the story rolls out clearly and openly, holding back a bit on tension and revealed honesty while blending that with just the right size shot of comedy. Direction is top notch, as done by Raymond DeFelitta, who did the vaguely similar "Two Family House" in 2000. "City Island" (the title is from a small non-descript area on New York) is much superior in many ways.

"City Island" has become a sleeper hit on the "indie" circuit

this year and will certainly help pump up the sagging career of Garcia, who I think has been miscast in many of his recent films.

The wintry scenes of New York will certainly help take the edge off this horribly uncomfortable summer in Las Cruces, and "City Island" will not keep you in stitches, but it will keep you intrigued and amused.

This dumb 'bender' sucks some major air Maybe M. Night needs an avatar

Not familiar with the source material for "The Last Airbender." I understand it is an animated series on Nickelodeon, "Avatar: The Last Airbender," with quite a following. This movie apparently took a bit of a hit when James Cameron decided to call his little movie "Avatar."

The "Airbender" avatar can control the elements – "bending" air, water, fire and earth. He is supposed to bring peace to the warring tribes of the world, each of whom have members who can bend one element, but he's the only one who can bend them all. Got it? During the film (the 2D version), I sat next to a young man about 11 or 12 years old who obviously knew the series because he could (and did) say out loud the names of characters or other situations before they were explained onscreen. I wished I had his enthusiasm for what was happening in the movie.

Behind me and to my right sat a young couple who whispered, from what I could tell, derogatory remarks about various bits of dialogue or action sequences that seemed – how shall I put this? – lame.

As much as I wanted to like "The Last Airbender" – I thought the trailer looked pretty interesting – I found myself siding with the talking couple against the talking kid. I

wanted to be on his side, but I just couldn't.

Once I got through the first 10 minutes or so of unbelievably bad dialogue and into the first action sequence where Aang (is he "the" avatar?) blows away – not literally, just making an air joke about 10 times funnier than anything in the movie – the fire guys and escapes with his 007-kite in a fighting staff rig, I kind of perked up. This was more like it. But then it was back to the plot.



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Mediterranean style sprinkled with comfort

Game room and lap pool provides Mesilla home with an abundance of entertainment

On Laguna Drive, off Avenida de Mesilla, one can find a home that combines ornate details with comfortable living.

Mesa View Homes owner Fred Chavez mixed elements of luxury and everyday living in his 3,600-square-foot personal home at 2281 Laguna Drive.

Built in 2005, the builder said he chose the .4-acre lot for its proximity to Mesilla, Interstate 10 and Las Cruces businesses.

"It's in walking distance to everything," he said. "It's so convenient."

Featuring a Mediterranean style found in most of the homes he constructs, Chavez included pitched and flat roofs as well as high ceilings and detailed tile work.

"I just like the idea of breaking up the pitch of the roof," he said. "You can do more of a unique design.

"I also like to do as much tile as I can in a house. And I try to keep it as low maintenance as possible."

Stone work graces the stucco façade as an iron gate leads to the small front courtyard, complete with rock landscaping and small plants.

Once inside the glass-and-iron front door of the three-bedroom home, guests are greeted by an elaborate formal living room.

"My wife always wanted a formal living room," he said. "It's kind of isolated from the rest of the house."

The Chavezes wanted the room – featuring 18-foot ceilings speckled with square windows of varying sizes for natural light – to make a design statement, which is why they went against the typical box layout.

"It's an octagon shape just to get away from the square feeling that comes from most homes," he said.

To the left of the formal living room are the bedrooms. A guest room near the front of the home includes a three-quarter bathroom as well as views of the neighborhood.

"All the bedrooms have their own bathroom," he said. "That way, in case you have guests, you always have your own privacy."

Down the hall, past the second bedroom, is the master suite. Designed for elegance, Chavez included ornamental cove ceilings.

"I wanted something a little more decorative," he said.

The master bathroom includes a Formica countertop surrounding a sink as well as hickory cabinets, which were used throughout the house. Near the jetted bathtub is the snail shower, lined in tile detail.

On the other side of the home is the kitchen, dining area, family space and game room. Chavez said he designed the home to be split into two areas for privacy.

Designed with an open floor plan, visitors in the dining area, family room or kitchen can interact in the cozy space without walls separating them.

"This is all wide open so when you're entertaining, people are never in a different room," he said. "They're always in the same area. No one ever feels left out."

Paying extra attention to the oversized kitchen, Chavez

Thursdays from 4 to 6 p.m. designed the room for multiple uses. One person can man the stovetop as another washes vegetables in the sous-chef sink located in the island as yet another sits at the bar.

"One of my favorite areas is the kitchen," he said. "When we're all in here cooking, we can talk. It's perfect for enjoying food and good conversation."

At the end of the home is the game room, which shares a two-way fireplace with the family room and has its own heating and cooling system. Designed purely for entertainment, the room includes a built-in wet bar and is large enough for a pool table as well as a poker table. The room also features domeceiling accents painted in metallic paint to break up the white space.

The home's entertainment features continue to the backyard, which contains a large covered patio with a built-in grill and speaker system, as well as a lap pool measuring 3 feet deep on the sides and 5 feet deep in its center.

A 990-square-foot detached garage is located next to a ponding area to prevent flooding.

"The garage has its own half bathroom," Chavez said. "It can be used as a hobby area."

The rock landscape includes a small section of grass as well as ash trees for shade, different colored shrubs, fragrant rosemary bushes and oleander along the wall for privacy. A pond and waterfall complete the lush at-home getaway.

"I just like to hear the sound of the water and its tranquility," Chavez said.

With so many different features, Chavez said he worked to create a lavish home that also felt comfortable.

"The way I designed the house, it is low maintenance," he said.

One low-maintenance feature of the home is the heated ceramic tile floors. In addition to keeping residents' feet warm in the winter, Chavez said the floors helps those with allergies since it retains air moisture.

"There isn't any dry air," he said. "The humidity stays indoors."

By combining ornate features and cozy characteristics, Chavez built a home distinctively his own.

"The location is what makes it unique," he said. "The neighborhood is really quiet. For the location, size and amenities it's a great value. It's really good quality." Details





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Adding that final touch

Muralist Ray Acosta works to transport viewers

Pass by Dave's Comics & Games on the corner of Solano Drive and Idaho Avenue, and you may notice a mural of a ferocious green Hulk busting through the wall. What you may not see, however, is the small signature of artist Ray Acosta.

Since forming Rayz Art Work in 1999, Acosta has been hired by several local businesses and homeowners to add his creative touch to an otherwise ordinary building.

"I thank God for my talents," he said. "I haven't found something I can't accomplish."

The Las Cruces native described his younger self as a "lazy artist," explaining that he had no interest in his high school art classes even though he had a natural knack for the discipline.

"I did everything the last minute," he said. "I did all nine weeks worth of projects in one day ... My teacher still had to give me an A because they were good."

After high school, Acosta moved to San Diego and began his art career as a faux artist correcting chips and gashes in concrete and painted flooring as well as other surfaces.

"I was a patch-and-match kind of guy," he said.

He came back to the City of the Crosses and received his first taste for mural art through Newman Outdoor Advertis-

ing, where he worked as the foreman of a five-men crew that painted billboards.

From pictorial artist to muralist

As a pictorial artist, Acosta said he hand painted the billboards – "I call them murals. They were giant paintings." He would sometimes sneak in little visual jokes that were too small to be seen from below.

"For a restaurant, I put a lizard in the salad, stuff like

that," he said.

be the best.

He spent several years with the company – until technology caught up to the industry, and his natural artistic talents were no longer needed.

"Now, they use vinyl sheets with the image printed on them," he said.

After being pushed out of the billboard industry by computers, Acosta took on several odd jobs – everything from construction and plumbing to picking grapes, he said.

construction and plumbing to picking grapes, he said. "I hated it, I didn't enjoy it at all," he said. "I decided to refine my skills. The thing is I didn't trust enough in my skills. I

knew my skills were there, but I didn't have enough confidence."

Acosta said he tried his hand at a variety of art media, including woodworking and pastles.

"I'm an all-around artist," he said. "I do almost anything. I can figure things out really well."

He was soon approached by concerned Doña Ana citizens who asked him to paint a mural on an old meat market building that was repeatedly tagged by vandals. He accepted and painted the scenic landscape of the Organ Mountains.

"It was never tagged again after I painted the mural," he said.

He was then commissioned by other local businesses and organizations, including Code Red and Cha Chi's Restaurant. The Boys & Girls Club of Las Cruces

also sought Acosta to transform its facility into a more exciting and kid-friendly surrounding.

"I just about painted the entire building," he said. "I made it all up right there. It was a lot of fun."

Each room had its own theme, which included Legos, "The Wizard of Oz," Disney characters and a gigantic pool table. He added found materials to create depth and dimension to the otherwise flat surface, which he said he does often.

"On one of the inside walls and ceiling, I painted a tornado

(from "The Wizard of Oz") and created a three-dimensional, Styrofoam house," he said.

While the Hulk may be his most well-known mural, Acosta said Palacio Bar in Mesilla was his biggest project, taking him almost two weeks to complete. In addition to replicating a black-and-white photograph from the 1940s, he also painted a mountain scene that featured cars coming around the pass with actual working headlights.

Not only has Acosta made a name for himself with businesses, he also has established himself as a go-to home muralist working with homebuilders and homeowners alike.

He said he has been asked to create everything from faux windows in a room and leaping dolphins surrounding a swimming pool to giant scenic murals covering entire patio walls

ming pool to giant scenic murals covering entire patio walls. "I really like murals," he said. "I have a long line of murals that I've done."

Working to be the best

Last year alone, Acosta said he was commissioned for more than 50 mural jobs, mostly thanks to referrals and word of mouth from satisfied clients.

"The reason I say I'm the best is because I do what it takes Continued on following page

Continued from previous page to be the best," he said, explaining that he devotes long hours to matching colors and conducting research. "I spend a lot of time fixing my work so it's perfect."

After meeting with a client, Acosta said he draws up several renditions of what they want, examining possible detail options.

"It's usually the first sketch that they want. It happens all the time," he said, explaining that he can also piece together features from each sketch to create the exact image the client

wants. "My slogan is 'I'm not here to make a killing, I'm here to make a living.'

A staple of southern New Mexico, Acosta said his most requested image is the Organ Mountains.

"I can do a pretty accurate skyline of the Organ Mountains without looking," he said.

Acosta said he owes much of his artistic success to his father, who also was an artist, but didn't have the opportunity to pursue it as a career.

"My hobby has turned into a job, and I love it," he said. Thanks to his experience

as a pictorial artist, Acosta said his murals look life-like, transporting viewers out of their surroundings and into the scene.

"I want people to see what I see, and that's why I paint it that way," he said.

With so many mural commissions coming his way, Acosta said he is looking into hiring an assistant and starting a website. He is also preparing to take his business and talents outside of Las Cruces in the future. "I want my name to be fa-



Rich decorating

Tricks to get an 'expensive' look

You don't have to spend an arm and a leg to look as though you have. Such decorating need not be expensive – it simply needs to be unexpected. A little extra attention needs to be paid to the details.

Recently, I needed a place for three towels to hang in a bathroom, with very little space for them. The answer was three crystal doorknobs mounted on an old carved board. It made a perfect towel rack without spending a lot of money while, at the same time, providing an elegant and different look. It looked expensive. I've also used drapery tiebacks for hanging towels in the past. They are available in a lot of different "looks" and are not expensive.

Don't forget your ceilings as a place to decorate. I've never been a fan of skylights in a master closet. While they provide light, they also can easily fade clothing over time. We bought a house that had a skylight in the master closet and needed to block the light without it looking like that's what we were doing.

Our answer was a stained-glass window that we had gotten from a church in the Midwest. The size was right and the deep colors would defuse the light. We hung it from the ceiling just below the skylight so the light would pass through it. You can do the same thing with a beveled-glass window that will deflect the light and cast rainbows of light around the walls.

You can also suspend interesting metal and wood pieces from the ceiling in appropriate areas. I've hung interesting metal grates over kitchen tables to add interest to the room.

You could also hang such a piece over a kitchen island and hang decorative pots and pans from it. It's much unexpected and draws lots of compliments.

Using obviously old things with new things can be very attractive. You can mix the two elements together into a very elegant style statement. An example would be on your bed in the master bedroom. Take a plain pillow cover and add a decorative scarf, fabric tassels or an old

piece of lace. Take tasseled curtain tiebacks, knot them at each end and add them to a pillow sham. Using several layers of these things can create a rich and elegant look. Keep your eyes open at estate sales for things that can be added on. Then, when the compliments flow, you can say, "I did it myself."

When making an arrangement of accessories on a tabletop or shelf, there are lots of things you can do to make them more interesting and elegant. Use an eclectic group of items that provide a variety of textures, colors and sizes. Or you can go in the opposite direction and display a collection of like-items.

Whichever direction you choose, here are a couple of hints to make them more interesting: first, always use an uneven number of items. While it does so unconsciously, uneven numbers attract the eye. Next, consider taking the display to a new level by using something to raise part of the display. An example of this would be a bookshelf where you have chosen to display a number of family pictures. Instead of just placing them all in

the shelf, you can create interest by having some of them at different heights. Laying a couple of books flat or adding a decorative box and then setting a picture on top will break up the levels on the shelf and create a great deal more eye appeal.

Layer things with a scarf, piece of fabric or throw to make them more interesting or elegant. I have a friend who collects perfume bottles. She arranged them on a silver tray with a piece of old lace covering just a part of the tray. Seasonally, she adds freshly picked flowers from the garden. The tray resides on her vanity table in the master bath. She has added beads and old jewelry that came from her mother to the display. It gives her daily pleasure and it has a rich, elegant look.

While you may have a hurried life, you can surround yourself with a few decorating embellishment that create wonderful moods, give you a sense of accomplishment and provide a rich look that you won't see in other homes.

"There is never enough time to do a job right the first time, but there is always time enough to do it over...?

I am not sure who gave us this wisdom, but it sure rings true in our daily lives. The amount of time and resources spent to correct problems that would have been easily averted with preparation, planning and research is considerable for any complex project. Construction of new a home is no different.

I attended a PNM/NM Gas utility sponsored meeting in Albuquerque last month where Sam Rashkin was the keynote speaker.

He is one of the leading experts on residential building science in the United States and was responsible for the 1996 implementation of EPA Energy Star for Homes. Rashkin has continued to administer the EPA Energy Star for Homes program since the beginning. One out of every five homes built in the United States last year was Energy Star certified.

Rashkin contends that we have a "100-year opportunity" when building a new home. Builders can incorporate proven strate-

gies at the time of construction that make a home comfortable, healthy to live in, energy efficient and durable or ... builders can skip some key details and homeowners pay the price in increased health problems, maintenance costs and utility dollars during the life of the home. When you need to sell in the

future, expensive retrofits to make the home market competitive are likely.

The "costs" of not doing the job right are also shouldered by the builder in the form of increased call backs, lower sales volumes and diminished reputation in the market. More and more local successful homebuilders continue to educate themselves about efficient, sustainable construction and to incorporate the use of industry sponsored programs that help homes take advantage of the "100-year opportunity."


Programs such as Build Green New Mexico in our state and national programs such as LEED for Homes, Building America and Energy Star for Homes are robust resources for comprehensive proven processes and evolving best practices in residential construction. Participating builders concentrate on quality

construction and reap the benefit of independent, on-location third-party quality assurance inspection and field testing to help get the home built

right – the first time. Energy Star and related green-building programs are synonymous with efficiency, but some of the most important benefits of the best-recognized green and efficient building strategies are not reduced energy use. Key details are, for the most part, not particularly high-tech or expensive. Consider these simple

durability measures:

- Carefully enclosing insulation in contact with wall, floor and ceiling assemblies limits moisture movement, prevents unwanted condensation, stops pests and helps ensure good indoor air quality.
- Sizing air conditioning equipment



- Good flashing design at roof, window and door installations limits the risk of mold and dry rot in walls and reduces the number of times you will need to seal, paint and caulk the exterior.
- Tight ductwork can extend heating and air conditioning equipment life and will reduce the amount of times you have to dust the home every month.
- A low sone (quiet) laundry room exhaust fan installed to run continuously at slow speed will expel household air contaminants and may reduce the number of colds in your family.
- Water-resistant backing installed at tubs and showers make tile installations last and mitigates possible water damage to wall structures.

Maintaining a positive slope away from the foundation walls minimizes the chance of flood damage during storms, limits settling of the foundation and cracking of the walls and reduces the chance of mold.

If you are planning to buy or build a new home, consider how that home may look in 2110 and how much fuel, time and dollars it will take to get it that far. Also, weigh the cost to build or purchase against what it will cost to own the home for the 10 to 20 years you will live there.

Taking the time to do the purchasing decision job right on your next new home may keep you from having to do it over.

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Proposed alterations can go into effect as early as 2011

A public hearing was held Wednesday, June 30, by the New Mexico Regulation & Licensing Department Construction Industries Division to gather input from industry individuals about proposed code changes that would affect a variety of building standards in the state, including energy efficiency, plumbing and fire suppression, among others.

While many voiced support for the proposed rule changes – which are planned to go into effect Jan. 1, 2011, with a six-month grace period – others said the new codes will cost builders extra, which would then be passed on to the consumer.

"We wish to delay the code adoption to 2013," said Building Industry Association of Southern New Mexico Executive Director David Roewe.

Roewe said code changes generally increase the cost of construction and estimates the cost of a modest home will rise about \$4,000 to \$6,000. He added that pushing back the date of the code changes will allow industry professionals to catch up, especially appraisers.

"The codes will require more training during a time when budgets are at an all-time low," he said. "... There isn't any valid reason to rush into these codes."

A need for energyefficiency training

Of the several code changes, many spoke about was the requirement of energy efficiencyrelated design and construction.

"Homebuyers and owners appreciate and buy energy efficiency," said Realtor Renee Frank,

who is also the board chair for the Green Chamber of Commerce, which supports the energyefficient code changes. "It saves homebuyers money. We need to be moving forward."

State Sen. Steve Fischmann said he also supports the proposed upgrades to the building codes for several reasons.

"When one consumer uses less energy, they save themselves money and everyone else in the community over the long term," he said, explaining that it costs twice as much to add a kilowatt of energy as it does to eliminate a kilowatt of demand.

The money that is saved can then be used on other items, helping to spur the local economy, he added.

While many supported the green push, others said more needs to be done by the state.

"Just like any change, there is a learning curve," said Frank, who added that colleges throughout New Mexico are beginning to teach green construction techniques. "As builders get familiar with these and learn to build more efficiently, (costs) go down."

"On a local level we're proceeding with green building concepts," Roewe said. "Many builders are offering homes with advanced energy features. The success on this process is very important. The state needs to take a stronger role."

While many local builders are choosing to go green, Roewe said industry appraisers aren't factoring the energy-efficient features into their appraisals, which may be a result of a lack of education and training.

Marie Voorhees, green building coordinator for the state, said efforts are currently being made to create a training program for appraisers and other building officials thanks to funding that will be available next year.



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"The training is set for September 2011," she said. "By pushing back the code changes you will be shooting yourself in the foot because the funds won't be available in 2013."

In addition, Frank said it is important to educate consumers and those in the real estate industry about the importance and benefits of energy-efficient building.

"We have got to educate Realtors," she said. "They can help the consumer make the right choice."

Finding a home for solar panels

Another energy-efficiency concern expressed during the hearing involved codes concerns that dealt with solar panels. According to the new electrical code, the service equipment of the panels would be installed from an accessible point in the garage, which isn't a location of value, said Mellow Honek of Sunspot Solar Energy Systems.

He added that solar panels are usually placed close to the electric meter, such as a roof on the southern exposure. The new codes would house the panels in ineffective locations.

Honek suggested that the language of the code should be changed to indicate better locations. "We need to look at practices and principles,"

he said.

Once again, training is a concern when it comes to solar panels. Michael Gray of Beehive Technical Services said there is an absence of proper education for inspectors and many inspectors are unfamiliar with various systems and other practices used by organizations such as the Electrical Contractors board.

"There seems to be a lack of training with inspectors on the different systems," Gray said.

Fire suppression conflict

One of the most talked about code changes was the addition of fire suppression systems – such as sprinklers – to one- and two-family dwellings and townhomes.

Roewe said research conducted by the National Association of Home Builders showed fire sprinkler systems are an "unnecessary expense" – adding a minimum of \$2,000 to a home's cost – and can cause property damage when they malfunction, which had several builders concerned about liability.

"We're going to make houses unaffordable," he said, adding that he saw the negative effects of similar codes in Washington. "As it increases the cost factor with new houses, it raises appraisals on other existing homes."

"From the builders' perspective," said Ned Tutor of Ned Tutor Builder Inc., "the cost of housing has become a particular problem in our city, our surrounding area and our county. I find myself more and more in competition ... and I have to explain myself because of the cost of a house."

He also said the suppression system is an unnecessary cost.

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"There is no way as a general contractor I can absorb the extra cost of a fire sprinkler system," he said. "I'll have to pass it on to the consumer. It's a given that we shouldn't impose more costs on a home that are unnecessary."

Josh Rardin, who represented the Building Contractors Association of Otero County, echoed those concerns, saying sprinkler systems can cause large amounts of water damage, which may in return cost builders.

Several members of the public spoke in favor of sprinkler systems, including retired Las Cruces Fire Chief Adolf Zubia, who said such codes enforced elsewhere have been shown to save lives.

"What (code) gets developed is in the best interest of the public," Zubia said. "We need to look out for what is best for the community and safety.

"My hope is locally there are some things that can be worked out."

Doug Lenberg of Real Green Building Systems in Farmington, N.M., said the CID should implement fire-suppressing systems immediately, adding that such systems used in homes constructed in the northern New Mexico town have caused a cost reduction of \$10,000 in fire protection.

"Fire protection costs about \$1,800 to install," he said. "Many use plumbing-based fire protection systems. They're installed by plumbers who are on site already. The cost issue is nonexisting."

Zubia said state officials need to work with builders to help alleviate the added cost of fire sprinkler systems.

"Anytime you go from one code to another, there is added cost," he said. "It's a simple thing that needs to be worked in."

Other concerns

Lenberg said there are several misconceptions about the codes, and similar ordinances in Farmington have helped lower the cost of homes and construction.

Daniel Lorimier, the Conservation Coordinator for the Sierra Club Rio Grande Chapter, said he feels that New Mexico is moving in the right direction and should stick to its proposed timeline.

While there were mixed feelings and responses to the proposed code changes, Fischmann said implementing so many new code changes at once will have long-term benefits since it will cause less frequent changes in the future.

"The minimum standards cause more work in the long run," he said. "It's a good time now since it's not the busiest time in the construction industry. It will be harder to train when the market picks up."

Asian-Style Chicken-Salad Wraps with **Fried Shallots**

Wraps:

- 2 cups leftover baked chicken, shredded 1 teaspoon freshly grated ginger
- 1/2 cup red bell pepper, stemmed,
- seeded and finely diced 1/3 cup Asian-style sweet-chile sauce
- 1/3 cup mayonnaise

1/3 cup fresh mint, chopped Freshly ground black pepper

Shallots:

Extra-virgin olive oil, for frying 2 large shallots, halved lengthwise

and thinly sliced crosswise 1/4 cup cornstarch Four (12-inch) whole-wheat wraps

4 large butter lettuce leaves 1 lime, quartered

In a large bowl, combine the shredded chicken with the ginger and red bell pepper and toss to mix. Add the chile sauce, mayonnaise and chopped mint and stir until combined. Add the salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste. Cover the bowl with plastic wrap and refrigerate for at least two hours or overnight.

In a small cast iron skillet, heat 1 inch of oil over medium-high heat until hot. In a bowl, toss the shallot rings and cornstarch until the shallots are coated. Place the shallots in a mesh strainer and gently shake to remove any excess cornstarch. Fry the shallots in batches until light brown and crisp, about 25 seconds. Drain the fried shallots on a papertowel-lined plate and season with the kosher salt. Set aside.

Lay the wraps on a work surface and place a butter lettuce leaf on the lower third of each wrap. Divide the chicken salad evenly among the four wraps. Top with the fried shallots and a squeeze of lime juice. Gently roll the wraps starting with the lower third, tucking the ends in as you roll. Slice the rolls in half and serve. Makes 4 servings. Spicy Ground Turkey Lettuce Wraps

1 pound ground turkey McCormick's Montreal Grill Seasoning



There's more to salad than plain, ho-hum greens.

- Salt and pepper to taste 1 teaspoon sesame oil
- 3 tablespoons hoisin sauce
- 1 tablespoon cider vinegar
- 2 teaspoons lite soy sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon fresh grated ginger
- 1/4 cup sweet chili sauce
- Dash of black pepper
- 4 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 large red bell pepper, stemmed,
- seeded and diced
- 2 cups (packaged) cole slaw 3 scallions, chopped diagonally
- 1 (6-ounce) can sliced water chestnuts,
- diced into small pieces
- 1 head butter lettuce

In a medium bowl, sprinkle turkey with grill seasoning, salt and pepper. Stir to combine. In a separate smaller bowl, combine sesame oil, hoisin, vinegar, soy sauce, ginger, sweet chili sauce, pepper and garlic in a small bowl stirring well with a whisk.

Heat a large skillet to hot. Add olive oil, then turkey. Cook turkey 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Add the red peppers, cabbage and carrot mix, scallions and water chestnuts and stir-fry another 2 minutes. Add sauce mixture and sauté until warm, about another 2 minutes.

Spoon about 1/3 cup turkey salad in the center of each lettuce leaf. Turkey salad can be served at room temperature or chilled. Makes 4 servings.

Sky-High Salad 'Sandwich' with **Basil Vinaigrette**

Sandwich:

- 4 large heirloom tomatoes, sliced into thick slices
- 4 butter lettuce leaves 1 pound fresh mozzarella,
- sliced into thick slices 1/2 cup loosely packed basil leaves Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

Basil vinaigrette: 1 small shallot, roughly chopped 1 serrano pepper, stemmed,

seeded and chopped 1 cup loosely packed basil leaves, torn 2 tablespoons water

- 2 tablespoons high-quality
- white wine vinegar
- 1 teaspoon kosher or sea salt or
- 1/2 teaspoon table salt

6 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil To prepare the basil vinaigrette, add the

shallot and serrano pepper to the blender. Next add the basil leaves, water, vinegar and sea salt. Blend. Slowly drizzle in the olive oil as you are blending.

To assemble salad, layer the tomato, butter lettuce, fresh mozzarella and basil leaves. In between each layer, season with sea salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste. Chopped Mexican Salad with Sweet Habanero **Citrus Dressing**

2 red bell peppers, halved and seeded then grilled and diced 2 yellow bell peppers, halved and seeded then grilled and diced

- 2 large heirloom tomatoes, diced
- 1 medium jicama, diced
- 2 avocados, peeled, pitted and diced
- 1 (15-ounce) can black beans, drained
- 1/4 cup cilantro, chopped

Sweet Habanero Citrus Dressing: 1 clove garlic, minced

- 1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil
- 3 tablespoons freshly squeezed orange juice
- 3 tablespoons freshly squeezed lime juice
- 1 shallot, finely chopped
- 2 tablespoons honey
- Pinch habanero powder or

substitute cayenne pepper 3/4 teaspoons cumin, toasted and ground

Salt and pepper to taste Grill bell peppers and corn on a gas grill, turning often until the pepper skins blister and blacken. Cool. Place peppers in a re-sealable plastic bag and steam for 10 minutes. Peel skins and dice. Using a sharp knife, remove corn kernels from cob. Mix salad ingredients in a large bowl. Melon Chile de **Arbol Salad**


1/2 ripened cantaloupe 1/2 green bell pepper 1 chile de arbol, crushed Olive oil 2 teaspoons honey

A public threat that needs to be taken seriously

Africanized honey bees, or so-called killer bees, have posed a serious public threat in the United States since being discovered in Texas in October 1990.

Known for their extremely aggressive behavior - there are documented cases of fatal attacks on human beings and animals - killer bees were accidentally released from research hives in Brazil in 1956. In the years since, they have slowly spread through South and Central America, through Mexico and, in the last decade, have begun to appear in the United States – specifically here in southern New Mexico as well as Arizona, Texas and California.

As anyone who has seen them in action can tell you, there's nothing cute about Africanized bees. In fact, it's almost impossible to tell an Africanized bee apart from the regular honeybees we're accustomed to seeing in our yards.

What distinguishes killer bees is their aggressiveness, i.e. their touchiness. The slightest vibration, odor or movement near a colony is interpreted as an attack and they come after



you with the relentless-, ness of kamikazes, chasing you for much greater distances than a swarm of angry, European honeybees.

Most people see bees in one of four situations.

On or around flowers: Honey bees are familiar sights buzzing about petals or bulbs, collecting pollen and nectar as well as pollinating flowers.

Around water: Honey bees need water to survive, so particularly during the dry seasons

they'll help themselves to swimming pools, coolers, dog bowls, etc., occasionally becoming a nuisance. But honey bees near water and flowers are rarely a real problem and will sting only in self-defense.

In swarms: A swarm of honey bees is created when a hive gets too crowded and half of the bees leave with a queen to look for a new home. As many as 5,000 bees may make up a swarm. Both European and Africanized bees may swarm while looking to build a nest, temporarily taking over a tree branch or some similar site. Because there is no nest to defend, regular honey bees are less defensive while swarming.

In nests: Bees look for cavities to build their nests – a hole in a tree, for example. A nest that is managed by a beekeeper is called a hive. An unmanaged nest is called a colony.

What homeowners need to be on guard against, particularly homeowners in our region and other states, are wild colonies of Africanized bees. When killer bees decide to take up residence in a rain gutter, appliance duct or in the eave of a roof, homeowners and their family members can be subjected to the serious threat of injury if and when the bees attack.

While European honey bees tend to swarm in the spring months, Africanized bees, known to inhabit warmer states with tropical weather patterns, swarm and move their nests all 12 months, making prevention a year-round concern.

In terms of prevention, there is new technology that plays on the way insects communicate through chemicals called pheromones. Through an attractant, the bees can be drawn to a manmade hive. Once they enter the hive, it can be sealed and the bees can be eliminated with soapy water. Your local pest control professional may offer services to help seal the hives.
