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Group calls for reform

Advocates say federal immigration inaction prompted Arizona law By Todd G. Dickson

The controversial Arizona law requiring police to check the citizenship status of a suspected illegal alien is the result of Congress' inability to move on meaningful immigration reform, a group of advocates said at a City Hall press conference Monday, June 8.

Federal government inaction on reform led to Arizona taking an enforcement-only response to the problem of illegal immigration, said Sarah Nolan, of Comunidades en Acción y de Fé (CAFé) that organized the event along with the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC).

Speakers called for passage of the Development, Relief and Education for Alien Minors Act, commonly known as the DREAM Act. Introduced in both the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives more than a year ago, the bipartisan DREAM Act would provide a six-year path to citizenship, as long as they get a higher-education degree or serve honorably in the military, as well as not being convicted of a crime.

But more than just the DREAM Act needs to be passed, said Victor Montoya of Anthony, N.M. "We need comprehensive immigration reform."

Montoya said the Arizona law - that was passed in April and amended to include probable-cause conditions - opens the door to racial profiling. The Rev. Linda Mervine of the First

Christian Church-United Church of Christ in Las Cruces, said immigration reform needs to take a humane approach, rather than enforcement. She said her religious beliefs tell her to care for all other people, whether they are a citizen of this country or not.

Melissa Zamites spoke about a family of illegal immigrants from Mexico that took her into their home for two years in Chicago during her troubled youth. The woman who took her in cared for four children, two of which weren't hers. Zamites said she learned that many illegal immigrants work under difficult circumstances.

New police chief sworn in Firm hired to investigate cop complaints

Richard Williams began his new job as the Las Cruces police chief Monday, June 7, by attending the weekly City Council meeting.

Though his swearing-in started the meeting, he stayed because near the end of the agenda was the council's action to accept the recommendation to hire a company to review complaints against police.

The council awarded a \$49,600 contract to Police Executive Research Forum of Washington, D.C., to provide police auditing services.

Last year, another consulting firm from the nation's capital, Justice and Security Strategies (JSS), looked into community complaints about

police use of force and alleged abuse of authority. Instead of recommending a citizen's review, JSS found that for a city the size of Las Cruces, a police auditor is more appropriate.

JSS had offered to provide that auditing service, but state law didn't allow it because the contract would be based on the firm's recommendation, presenting a conflict of interest, said Assistant City Manager Robert Garza.

Based on responses from the city soliciting requests for proposals, a committee rec-ommended Police Executive Research Forum (PERF). According to PERF's website, it is "a national membership organization of progressive police executives from the largest city, county and state law enforcement agencies. See Police on page A3

Heritage Day brings out costumes, cars

Although it was billed as the first Doña Ana Heritage Day, the parade and festivities along Cristo Rey Street Saturday, June 5, in the small, unincorporated village north of Las Cruces was actually the second event.

But locals say that last year's celebration was smaller. This year, though, there was a full parade through the main streets of Doña Ana, during which children waved to parade riders who in return threw them handfuls of candy.

Parade watchers were occasionally startled by the blasts of "gunfire" – blanks, actually – from a group dressed in Old West garb.

The parade ended at the Nuestra Señora de la Candelaria church, which is the first of several historical adobe structures along Cristo Rey Street - once the Camino Real colonial trading route - to be given restoration work. (See related story on page A25.)

At the church's parking lot was another new event – a car show organized by Jake Harkness of Jake's Café. It was at his restaurant in the center of town where auto and motorcycle enthusiasts came up with the idea to make a car show part of the day's events.

Randy Galaz said he was happy to include his "Rasputa" auto – a rusting work of love that has a number of different older models and makes welded together - to the show.

PERF is dedicated to improving policing and ad-vancing professionalism through research and involvement in public policy debate. Incorporated in 1977, PERF's primary sources of operating revenues are government grants and contracts, and partnerships with private foundations and other organizations.

One of the services PERF provides is police-force auditing. The contract will require PERF to evaluate all Professional Standards Unit investigations into complaints about police and to review the department's policies and procedures for han-dling those complaints. PERF's findings can't dispute internal personnel decisions or disciplinary actions, though it can comment on the disciplinary process. PERF will look into all uses of force incidents and the handling of property and evidence.

Councillor Miguel Silva attempted to have the contract tabled because he was concerned that the out-of-town company will not be as responsive as an individual working for the city would, but other councillors were comfortable with the limits and scope of the PERF contract, which only requires two city visits a year and that it report to the council on a quarterly basis.

PERF starts its work July 1. After being sworn in, Williams promised to conduct an internal audit and review of the department. Williams, who had previously headed the Las Cruces State Police office, said his emphasis will be on community policing.

Williams, who is a New Mexico State Univer-sity graduate, promised to reach out to all inside the department and hold community meetings to hear those concerns, as well.

Although he will start his new role auditing the department and reviewing policies and procedures, Williams said the department is filled with many dedicated men and women.

"I want to use this opportunity to take this department to a new level of community engagement," he said.

Las Cruces Bulletin News | A3 State offers tax amnesty program New Mexicans can pay late taxes without penalty

New Mexico Taxation and Revenue Department Secretary Rick Homans announced Monday, June 7, that his department will be offering a tax amnesty program for those who have not paid their taxes prior to the 2010 fiscal year.

The program, dubbed New Mexico Tax Relief, will offer businesses and individuals an amnesty period to report their unreported taxes. Those who are approved for amnesty for the program will be spared accrued interest and penalty fees resulting from their unreported taxes.

"New Mexico Tax Relief is a win-win for all New Mexicans and for our state," Homans said. "It gives families and businesses that have fallen behind, perhaps as a result of the recession, a one-time opportunity to avoid penalties and interest on their tax obligations."

According to the Taxation and Revenue Department, the program is estimated to produce \$7 million for the state. Of that, \$5.5 million will go to the state's general fund and the rest will be spread across local governments.

Homans' announcement kicked off the program, which will wrap up Sept. 10. During this period, those who failed to report, underreported or had unassessed taxes will be able to apply for amnesty. Only taxes due prior to the 2010 year are applicable for amnesty.

Income taxes from the 2009 fiscal year, which should have been filed before April 15 of this year, are not eligible for the amnesty program.

Other stipulations for the program approval are: you must not be under investigation for a tax-related criminal act, you must not be currently involved in bankruptcy proceedings or you have not received an audit-engagement letter. Once an application is approved for amnesty, individuals or businesses will have a 180-day grace period to pay overdue taxes.

The various taxes eligible for amnesty range from personal income and gross receipt taxes for individuals to liquor excise and corporate income taxes for businesses.

New Mexico Tax Relief, originally Senate Bill 2, was overwhelmingly passed during the 2010 Special Legislative Session by both the state house and senate chambers, and was signed by Gov. Bill Richardson on March 19.

The amnesty program is not the first time New Mexico has implemented such an action.

In 1999, New Mexico offered a similar amnesty program that saw almost 10,000 New Mexicans come forward to benefit from it.

What glass ceiling?

Key leadership positions are being filled by women as we throw the 'bums' out and seek new solutions

The days of male dominance in business and politics may be on its way out, at least in New Mexico. For years, we have heard about the artificial "glass ceiling" that supposedly has kept women intentionally out of key leadership positions across America.

Personally, I had never believed the "glass ceiling" concept to be true. From experience, and from hiring and awarding promotions to hundreds of people during my career, I will admit that most of my selections were men. This was not because of any particular bias against women. It was simply a matter of numbers. For most positions, the number of qualified men who applied vastly outweighed the few women applicants.

Obviously, there is a new dynamic afoot as evidenced by what's happening right here in Las Cruces and the state of New Mexico.

In November, New Mexico voters will elect a woman to be governor. Las Crucen **Susana Martinez** currently holds a slim poll lead over current **Lt. Gov. Diane Denish**. Susana is a strong-willed, competitive politician who is unafraid to face tough challenges. With her conservative views, she has endeared herself to many voters in the state.

Denish will be difficult to defeat. A small business owner from Hobbs, N.M., Denish was elected to the lieutenant governor post in 2002. In the past year, she has distanced herself from Gov. Bill Richardson and supported small business in the state, including the expansion of microlending funds and matching education with workforce needs.

This summer's governor race will certainly be interesting. However, one thing is certain. Our next governor WILL be a woman.

As for key women leaders here in Las Cruces, here are a few who immediately come to mind.

Margie Huerta has successfully led Doña Ana Community College's dynamic growth. In January 2011, she is slated to chair the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce.

In January, **Barbara Couture** became the first permanent woman president of New Mexico State University. Recently, she also announced the appointment of two women to key university positions previously held by men. **Wendy Wilkins** was named provost and executive vice president at NMSU after serving for several years in a similar position at North Texas State University. **Christa D. Lowder Slaton** was appointed to be the new dean of the NMSU College of Arts and Sciences. Previously, she had been the associate dean in the College of Liberal Arts at Auburn University.

Ammu Devasthali is currently leading the campaign to fund the \$37.5 million Phase I of the Center for the Arts, the largest single project NMSU has ever undertaken.

Many of our key local legislators are women, including Sens. Mary Kay Papen, Mary Jane Garcia and Cynthia Nava and Reps. Joni Gutierrez and Mary Helen Garcia. Wanda Bowman invested in Las Cruces in 2003 and opened her Ashley Furniture

HomeStore, a business that has become the top furniture retailer in the region. **Kari Mitchell** has not only brought a highly successful manufacturing company,

Las Cruces Machine, to the city, she has been instrumental in developing The Bridge, a broad coalition of educators and businesses designed to train our local workforce. **Pat Sisbarro, Laura Conniff** and **Magellia Boston** have teamed together to lead the

Pat Sisbarro, **Laura Conniff** and **Magellia Boston** have teamed together to lead the world's most successful "Tough Enough to Wear Pink" fundraising campaign, an event that has generated more than \$1 million over the past three years.

Becky Horner, co-owner of PTS Office Systems and division director for the March of Dimes, has served our community both in retailing and charitable fundraising and is an active community volunteer.

Of course, I must not overlook my own boss, **Jaki McCollum**, who is president of FIG Publications LLC, the company that publishes the Las Cruces Bulletin.

These women, along with many unnamed others, are very influential in our community. And, you know what? I have a feeling that there is more female leadership to come. Further, I am convinced that we will all benefit from the shift to this new balance of power.

Tanessa's memory

In the spring of 2008, Rivers Academy implemented a program aimed at addressing the needs of our African-American youth in Doña Ana County. Called "Project Tanessa," the initiative was named in honor of a student I had taught early in my teaching career in Roswell, N.M.

Tanessa Singleton was one of the most brilliant and talented students I ever encountered as a public school teacher. She was an outstanding writer and poet, and was an active member of my yearbook staff.

It was a shock beyond description when early one morning I was informed of her death. I will never, ever forget that day, even though it was more than 20 years ago, and her death affected me for the remainder of my teaching career.

The Bulletin printed a story about Project Tanessa on April 25, 2008. It was stated in that article that Tanessa took her own life, which I had been told at the time of her death. Recently, I was contacted by her family who saw the article online for the first time just a few days ago.

They are justified in their dismay at the story, in that Tanessa did not take her own life, but passed away in her sleep. It is important to them – and to me – that this clarification be made publicly.

We continue to honor Tanessa in our work with African-American youth who come to Rivers Academy for participation in all of our programs. I extend my sincere apology to Tanessa's family and friends who were offended at my misinformation regarding her tragic death. *Nema Rivers-LeCuyer*

watched video of the play after the game, he admitted he blew the call, cursed himself and went to find Galarraga and apologize for costing the kid a perfect game. Galarraga replied that no one is perfect – although he had been that night.

It was an amazing action on the part of Joyce, too. Umpires are never wrong. Players and coaches can be thrown out of a game for questioning them.

And what of Major League Baseball itself? Stuck in 19th century tradition, Commissioner Bud Selig refused to reverse the call despite its injustice.

So why doesn't that happen all the time? We're a good nation of good people. Why don't we always reward good behavior?

I'm speaking, of course, about negative political campaigning. Americans overwhelmingly say they don't like it. Yet, at this moment, there are people in back rooms preparing

attack ads. Why are they doing it? Because the people in the business say the evidence demonstrates that attack ads are necessary in order to win. We don't like them, but we let them influence us.

Arizona law creates divisiveness

SB1070 "Support Our Law Enforcement and Safe Neighborhoods Act." That's the official name of the Arizona immigration law that has caused so much controversy and apparent divisiveness in the country.

You can Google SB1070 Arizona and read the bill yourself. Or you can read this summary I've made because I have just read the 16-page document.

The purpose of SB1070 is alleged to affect the attrition of illegal aliens through enforcement and its provisions clearly will do that, but at a cost.

If you are stopped by the police for exceeding the speed limit, the officer will ask for your driver's license and proof of insurance regardless of gender, race, creed, or ethnic ancestry. We all get to hand over our ID and then wait for the citation.

In Arizona beginning July 1, there is an exception. If the officer suspects you are in the country illegally, he can also demand your proof of citizenship. Now, I'm white and 67 years old. If I were pulled over in

Douglas, Ariz., for speeding, it is unlikely any police officer would ask me for my birth certificate. However, I recently met Eddie. He is a natural-born American citizen whose ancestors are from Mexico. He is a brown-skinned man with dark hair, brown eyes and a mustache, and I'm certain the Arizona police would demand his proof of citizenship.

That's the first thing wrong with this law. It discriminates against Latinos, much the same way in Northeastern cities, police are prone to stop cars with three or more African-Americans because if there are three young black men in a car, they obviously are up to no good. Ask any African-American from Chicago or Detroit or my hometown, Baltimore, and see if they confirm this.

While the intent of this law is to reduce and eliminate people from illegally entering the United States, it unintentionally or perhaps intentionally as well – effects racial profiling.

Now, if the act of checking credentials was clearly legal, there'd be no need for Article 8 of SB1070, which indemnifies officers from legal liabilities when they are sued by citizens for the unlawful demand of their birth certificates. Those of us born in the U.S. do not - or at least have not up till now - had to carry proof of citizenship. SB1070 is a clear violation of our Constitutional rights under Amendment 14 and this law is bound for the U.S. Supreme Court for clarification of that point.

What I find most interesting in this law is the way it handles employers of illegal aliens. It requires an employer to check and verify each employee's citizenship. Not a bad idea. In fact, there is a federal law that requires exactly that.

The penalty for hiring illegals has three parts. Employers must immediately terminate employment of any illegal. The employer is put on probation for three years and must file a quarterly report, and the company's business licenses are suspended. Interestingly, there is no criminal penalty, no provision to investigate whether the employer actually paid promised wages and forwarded withholdings, etc. Just an apparent slap on the hand. Even more interestingly, SB1070 lays out an entrapment defense for employers, clearly laying the blame on law enforcement officers.

I'm not certain whose entrenched vested interests are at stake here, but it is certainly not the average citizen of Arizona. This law is not the way I want to see New Mexico deal with immigration. It is not a solution to our border problems.



Arizona immigration bill strongly opposed

We are writing to express our strong opposition to Arizona's Senate Bill 1070.

This misguided effort targets Hispanics and persons of color of all ages, and creates division and fear between these communities, the police and other authorities when cooperation and trust are so desperately needed.

SB 1070 completely ignores the economic productivity of undocumented immigrants (\$44 billion in 2004 according to the Udall Center for Studies in Public Policy), the impact on legal immigrants' willingness to work and study in Arizona (NAFSA: Association of International Educators estimates that international students and their families contributed \$228,435,000 to Arizona's economy in the 2008-09 school year), and the fact that a number of industries, including the construction trades, rely on the labor of otherwise law-abiding undocumented immigrants. Yet, these statistics tell only part of the story.

Immigrants are so much more than instruments of economic development. They are an integral part of the story of America's founding and the reason for our cultural, scientific, technological, and spiritual richness today. We cannot love the music, art, literature, inventions, and cuisines on the one hand and disrespect the people responsible for this abundance on the other.

While supporters of SB 1070 argue that it does not go beyond the federal law (which is where ultimate authority over immigration and enforcement reside), it creates a new, uneven landscape for citizens and immigrants from Mexico, primarily, but also from Africa, Asia and the Middle East, who become potential criminal suspects until they can show proof of citizenship or immigration papers.

It is virtually impossible to assure that enforcement of the law will not result in profiling since fair-skinned immigrants from Canada, Northern Europe, Eastern Europe and Russia are not subjected to the same suspicion and scrutiny as immigrants with darker skin color.

The law empowers citizens to sue state or local agencies for failure to enforce the law's provisions and it makes persons liable for criminal prosecution who transport or provide employment for undocumented immigrants (this could include giving children a ride to a school soccer game or employing an undocumented housekeeper or gardener – how many citizens of Arizona are guilty of these "crimes?").

The Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights has expressed "doubts about the law's compatibility with relevant international human rights treaties to which the United States is a party." In fact, the law conflates the problems of illegal immigration and criminality. When we make illegal immigration the primary target of criminal prosecution, whether or not a more serious crime has been committed, we take our eyes off the more urgent problems of human trafficking, the drug trade and related murders.

Illegal immigration needs to be addressed through proactive, rather than reactive, means. Our country needs to enact immigration reform so states are not prompted to pursue extreme policies with a host of unintended consequences. The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops is calling for "legislation that keeps immigrant families together, adopts smart and humane enforcement policies, and ensures that immigrants without legal status register with the government and begin a path toward citizenship." Such legislation would certainly help.

The other equally important path is to support those organizations working within Mexico to increase cultural and socio-economic development and opportunity for youth. Instead of eyeing others in our communities with distrust and fear, we need to focus our efforts on building a more civil society that will provide people on both sides of the border with limitless opportunities for themselves and the generations to come.

An important question in current times By Michael Swickard between the two points is the question of each

"Our nation is the United States of America, not the United Government of America. Unlike the European countries, the United States was not founded on monarchs but on the people, not from the top down but from the bottom up." – Jonathan Krohn

This quote by 14-year-old Jonathan Krohn points out two issues: What powers and rights do individual states have in contrast to federal power? And, what are the similarities between the Tea Party movement of 2010 and the independence movement of 1776?

First, throughout our history there has been a fundamental battle over states versus federal government power. Are individual citizens of one state only or citizens of the whole country?

Consider two examples: Can Arizona have a law within the confines of its state that citizens elsewhere find offensive? And, can New Mexico allow persons without legal status in the United States to have identification documents (driver's licenses) and have those documents be valid throughout the nation?

Second, similarities of 2010 and 1776 are that while national leaders have influence and some guidance, the real fire in the belly for both now and then came from the bottom up.

In our Revolutionary War and in the Tea Party rallies, there are people who otherwise never get involved with government issues. In both instances, these people became mad at leaders who were not listening and that anger propelled forward the bottom-up movement.

The founders of our country, both the intellectuals and the people on the street, were worried about tyranny. King George was not listening to the American colonists much like many people feel the Congress of the last two years ignores citizens.

All government is on a continuum of tyranny at one end, where the government is all powerful over citizens, or anarchy, where the government is so weak that citizens must take over roles of their personal defense, education, health and welfare. Neither tyranny nor anarchy is desirable, rather, somewhere between the two points is the question of each election. The founders of our country wrote the

Constitution to severely limit the power of the federal government. It is the rule book for the government, not the citizens. It tells the government what it can and cannot do. Over time, power has concentrated in the federal government to where we are on the brink of tyranny.. In just the last year, 60 percent of our economy has been taken from private control and put in government control.

Our Constitution has only been amended 27 times. However, the way government ran 200 years ago and now suggests that over the last 70 years, our Constitution has become a constitution in name only. It has been "interpreted" rather than amended into something that our founders would not recognize.

I find this Tea Party movement fascinating though I am not a member nor have I gone to any of their meetings. Still, I read and think carefully about the emotions that are prevalent now and were in the American colonies during the Revolutionary War. The Tea Party is an honest movement that is finding itself through local and state meetings. It is not a federal movement yet.

One lesson we can take from the Tea Party: If I want to speak to my state and local leaders, I can do so almost any day. Often I see them in the local market. I sat with a local senator for several hours this last month discussing something important to me.

Contrast that with the five national leaders of our state of whom I have only met one. The power of the citizens is state-centered. New Mexico's national delegation is unreachable. They have political "concerts" where you can go and shake hands but you cannot really express your feelings at length. In fact, last summer the raw emotions expressed by some citizens confused and alarmed members of the national delegation so much that they limited contact with citizens.

Local leaders know that when they anger citizens, they will see and talk to those people morning, noon and night. I support a more states' rights and less federal power approach.

League of Women Voters begins drive

Group seeks to better inform voters

The League of Women Voters of Greater Las Cruces has begun its annual membership and fund drive.

Since the Las Cruces group was first established in 1968, its membership has stayed consistently at about 100, but the group's impact is significant, especially during elections, said President Bonnie Burn.

The league is a nonpartisan organization that sponsors candidate forums, as well as publishing a directory of elected officials. The league also does issue research and takes official positions on those issues.

The league is best known for their candidate forums and the group is currently working on two candidate forums in September – one for state races and one for local races.

Prior to the election, the league sponsors and publishes a voter's guide that provides unfiltered candidate answers to a series of questions.

After the election, work begins on the "Who's Who" directory of elected officials that provides information about how voters can contact those who won election from the president down to local school boards, as well as other contact information for officials, such as the city or county manager.

When there aren't elections, the league's membership is researching issues ranging from whether the local magistrate and municipal courts should merge into a metro court to national issues, such as health care reform. Currently, the league has a group researching the need for mental health services in southern New Mexico.

Marjorie Burr said the current political climate sometimes makes the league's official positions on issues controversial or sometimes raises concerns about the group's nonpartisan nature. She emphasizes that a minority opinion is also released when the league takes a stance on an issue.

Kate Shultz, a new member to the league, said she likes being better informed about issues without the influence of party politics. Often, the league's monthly luncheons have speakers that go into detail about issues that are in the news, she said.

Burn noted that the league membership is not just for women, but men can join, too.

Membership is \$50 for an individual and \$75 for a household.

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Mayor seeks to acquire club without burden on taxpayers

Space would be twice the size of city's largest park

After three years of debate regarding the city's potential purchase of the Las Cruces Country Club land for a new premier park, Las Cruces Mayor Ken Miyagishima has stepped up the debate with three town-hall meetings and a proposed poll of residents.

At the Monday, June 7, City Council meeting, Miyagishima requested the city hire a third-party polling organization to judge the community's response to the potential land acquisition. Miyagishima believes a poll will, once and for all, accurately convey to the council what the community wants.

'I am confident the council will support a poll that shows majority of the citizens of Las Cruces want us to acquire (the LCCC land) in some form or fashion," Miyagishima said. "I am confident at least 75 percent of the public wants us to acquire this park."

Other members of the council disagree with the mayor. In a letter to City Manager Terrence Moore and Assistant City Manager Robert Garza, City Councillor Dolores Connor writes, "A poll is very leading and biased based on how the questions are asked ... I have seen how polls can be made to receive the outcome needed by those proposing the questions."

Further on in the letter, Connor suggests a bond referendum in which citizens vote whether or not they want to inherit the costs of the land, writing, "I am concerned when someone turns to polls as a means to make a decision, as the polls are not equivalent to a vote by the citizens."

According to Miyagishima, to get a bond referendum on the ballot would require 2,100 registered voters to sign a referendum petition, and the council would have to vote on it as well. Already, a group called People for Premier Park, led by John Stevens, has presented the council with a petition of 2,159 signatures of citizens in favor of the land acquisition. Stevens said the names on the petition belong to registered voters, but he has received no response from the council.

"I think at this particular economic time it would be difficult (to implement a bond referendum)," Miyagishima said. "But I also want the public to recognize that it is that economic difficulty and time that has caused developers to scrap their plans and reduce the price (of the LCCC land).

If the city were to purchase the 110-acre lot from LCCC, it would cost the city \$7.8 million dollars, a drop from the original price tag of \$12 million, according to Miyagishima. If the lot were converted to a park it would be twice the size of Las Cruces' largest, Young Park.

Miyagishima hopes a bond referendum is a last resort, hoping to avoid burdening the costs of the land to the public. The mayor does believe the city can potentially sell off some of the more than \$150 million worth of real estate the city owns to offset the costs.

Miyagishima said he will continue the town-hall meetings regarding the potential premier park and obtaining the land would be "a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity."

"If we aren't successful acquiring this, I don't think we will ever have this opportunity again," he said.

LC Downtown director departs Cindi Fargo accepts offer for similar position in San Diego

The Downtown Las Cruces Partnership (DLCP) announced that Direc-Executive tor Cindi Fargo has been recruited for a similar position in a southern California city. Fargo will become president and CEO of a community development corpo-

ration in the San Diego area.

"We have made great strides with Cindi's leadership and expertise, and we know that she wants us to continue that progress," said Greg Smith, president of the Downtown Las Cruces Partnership board.

Fargo has 25 years experience in downtown revitalization and economic development. She secured funds for the La Placita Pavilion, organized the campaign for adoption of the Downtown Tax Increment Development District, worked on Main Street designs, recruited new businesses (including

the soon-to-open La Iguana Restaurant) and worked with property owners to ready their properties for occupancy. The new SalsaFest and Callejoneada events were developed under her direction, and she worked closely with the DLCP Design Committee

to begin feasibility analysis for a downtown mercado. Fargo was hired nearly

three years ago. "I have been privileged to

serve the community of Las Cruces and to participate in one of the most important and necessary Downtown revitalization programs in the country," Fargo said.

"I know that the people of Las Cruces truly want their Downtown to thrive again and return to its glory as the heart of the city. I thank everyone who has contributed to our success."

Bingaman, Udall announce revisions to wilderness bill

Legislation provides border buffer zone

U.S. Sens. Jeff Bingaman and Tom Udall unveiled their new proposal to protect the scenic landscape of the Organ Mountains in Doña Ana County Wednesday, June 9.

Last year, the senators introduced legislation called the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks Wilderness Act (S.1689), which creates wilderness and conservation areas in Doña Ana County that provide for continued public use while protecting the granite peaks of the Organ Mountains and the volcanic cinder cones of the Potrillo Mountains, among other public lands in the county.

Much of the area has been managed as a "Wilderness Study Area" since the 1980s when the Reagan administration first set it aside for protected status. It was later recommended by the George H.W. Bush administration and then-Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan to be elevated to full wilderness status.

S.1689wouldbringBush'srecommendations to fruition by creating 259,000 acres of wilderness and 100,000 acres of National

Conservation Area (NCA). These areas would be managed in ways that protect the landscape from development while preserving current uses - such as hunting and grazing.

When evaluating the existing wilderness study areas in the county, the senators determined one such area, the West Potrillos Wilderness Study Area, could be modified to enhance the Border Patrol's ability to fully patrol the area. Because of the way the boundary was originally drawn by the Reagan Administration, the U.S. Border Patrol has a buffer of only one-third of a mile from the international border and is currently limited in its ability to conduct routine vehicle patrols north of Highway 9.

Acknowledging this border security challenge, S. 1689 proposed to release nearly 16,000 acres along the southern border that had previously been designated as a wilderness study area. It also expanded the buffer from one-third of a mile to approximately 3 miles and carved out specific areas that Border Patrol requested to place its Mobile Surveillance System vehicles. These moves, among others, were developed in direct consultation with Border Patrol and aimed at providing law enforcement with increased flexibility in the area.

At a February Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee hearing in Las Cruces, residents asked the lawmakers to further strengthen the security provisions. Again working with the Border Patrol, the lawmakers developed the new proposal unveiled today. It includes the nearly 3 miles of non-wilderness buffer area contained in the original bill, but adds an additional 2-mile "Restricted Use Area." This area would prohibit motorized access by the general public, but it will permit the Border Patrol to conduct routine patrols and construct communication and surveillance infrastructure as it would on regular multiple-use land.

The revised bill now proposes to un-designate more than 30,000 acres of land currently designated as wilderness study area.

Working with the Border Patrol, I believe we have come up with a very good resolution that both enhances our border security and protects one of New Mexico's iconic landscapes," Bingaman said.

"Once again we have successfully collaborated to produce a modified plan that strengthens our border security with respect to the preservation of the nearby Potrillo Mountains. This enhanced legislation builds upon the principles of the original Doña Ana Wilderness Bill and ensures the protection of both the border and this incredible landscape for generations to come," Udall said.

In addition to the nearly 5-mile buffer, the new proposal also provides an east-west route for Border Patrol to travel between the Potrillo Mountains Wilderness. It underscores current law by expressly stating that the wilderness designation does not affect Border Patrol's ability to conduct overflights above the wilderness areas or other border security activities in the wilderness areas, including the use of motorized vehicles while in pursuit of suspects.

The commissioner of U.S. Customs and Border Protection, who oversees Border Patrol, wrote a letter in strong support of the strengthened proposal. In the letter, Commissioner Alan Bersin states that the bill, as modified, "would significantly enhance the flexibility of U.S. Customs and border protection to operate in this border area.'

The Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee will consider the bill in the coming weeks; if it passes the committee, it will be ready for full Senate consideration.



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
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

Galaz said the Heritage Day celebrations also gave him pride in his village.

"This shows we can do things like other cities," he said.

The celebrations also brought back memories. Galaz said he remembered being told the legend of Doña Ana, a generous woman who always shared her food and gave shoes to children before she was killed by Indians who came down from the mountains.

Portraying the legend of Doña Ana was Elva Melendrez, who said the event is really about recognizing how the village was one of the first settlements of the area with the earliest documentation giving the date of 1842.

Jennie De La O-Carbajal, president of the village's restoration committee, said it also was great fun to dress up in costumes from those earlier times.

"We're hoping that we can do this every year and keep adding attractions," she said.

Besides performances in the church's plaza, visitors were provided tours of the old adobe De La O Saloon and Herman Wertheim home and store currently being restored with another plaza being added, along with a computer center. The work was made possible through \$1 million provided with the help of state Sen. Mary Jane Garcia, who is a lifelong village resident.

Garcia has made restoration of the village's old buildings and community sense of pride her mission. State funds and programs assisted in the restoration of the church and creation of the plaza.

At one time, the village was the center of territorial government from portions of Texas to California. When the states formed, the village lost its place at the center of activities, but that isolation also helped it retain its character.

"There's no reason to treat these good, hardworking people like criminals," she said.

Contrary to what some say, illegal immigrants pay taxes and Social Security, but don't enjoy the government benefits that U.S. citizens get, Mervine said. To punish immigrants is contrary to the nation's value, she said.

'We're a country of immigrants, for God's sake," Mervine said. "If we lose that, we lose what is part of the beauty of being in the U.S.'

Vince Romero, who attended the press conference, said he is glad that people with a more positive stance on immigration issues are coming forward, despite the heightened emotion surrounding the legislation.

Government inaction on immigration reform may have left the door open to states taking steps to control the problem, but the Arizona law's passage was influenced - if not inspired - by the killing of a prominent cattleman, Robert Krentz, on his ranch northeast of Douglas, Ariz., in March. Arizona officials believe that Krentz was likely killed by a drug

cartel scout as he went to check on what he thought were illegal aliens in distress. Krentz was known to often come to the aid of illegal immigrants stranded in the unforgiving desert where he ranched.

Later the same day the Las Cruces press conference was held, a U.S. Border Patrol agent fatally shot a 15-year-old Mexican boy after a group suspected of trying to illegally enter Texas threw rocks at officers near Downtown El Paso, according to the Associated Press.

Mexico President Felipe Calderon criticized "the disproportionate use of force on the part on U.S. authorities on the border with Mexico."

Border Patrol agents were trying to detain an illegal immigrant when other suspects began throwing rocks. Shots were fired, striking one of the young men in the head. The boy's family said the youth wasn't involved in the illegal crossing, but was with friends along the Rio Grande.

Both U.S. and Mexican officials say violent incidents related to illegal immigration are on the rise. According to El Paso Border Patrol statistics provided to the media, agents are increasingly fending off attacks, with rock attacks since October already reaching previous years' totals.

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





The Mountain West wants to see how the dust settles with the Pac-10, Big 12 and Big Ten. They might pick up a few strays there.


Should the Big 12 lose the aforementioned six, Kansas, Kansas State, Iowa State and Baylor are out in the cold.

NMSU cornerback feels confident about team's success

There's new optimism, Davon House believes, surrounding football at New Mexico State.

Despite past failures, Aggie fans, he said, seem convinced NMSU can win this year.

"Even with the losing records, I think people are starting to believe in us," House said. "I hear it on campus, everywhere. It used to be people thought we belonged in Division 2.We want to go out this season and prove all those past doubters wrong."

It'll be a challenge. NMSU opens at home against San Di-ego State (Sept. 11), followed by road games at UTEP (Sept. 18)

and Kansas (Sept. 25). That's not to mention Boise State (Oct. 2) and New Mexico (Oct. 9) at Aggie Memorial Stadium.

There is firm belief that DeWayne Walker, the Aggies second-year head coach, will eventually deliver. Despite a 3-9 record in his first season of command and the difficult 2010 schedule awaiting him, Walker's popularity is high.

His team has already begun its mission toward success, currently laboring through off-season conditioning drills four days

a week. They're working out in the weight room and on NMSU's football practice fields Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday.

Wind sprints. Stepping over blocking dummies laying horizontally on the ground. Coordination drills. Lifting, pulling - every exercise that Gary Uribe, the Ags' strength and conditioning coach, can throw at the players

Call it devotion. "You gotta love it," House laughed.

"We work out in the mornings," House said. "For me, it's summer classes in the afternoons."

Last Friday, House sat in the Aggies' air-conditioned meeting facility following a hot 90-minute drill and talked about NMSU and his future. He said a bowl game was the No. 1 priority. "We want one," he said. "It's been too long.

"I'd like to play well enough this year to maybe make some kind of an all-American team. That would be nice," he said. "I'd like to get drafted after school. I plan to graduate in December, early enough to get invited to some NFL rookie camps. You have to be through with school before See **House** on page A20

Aggies third in WAC Commissioner's Cup New Mexico State has improved steadily since joining the WAC

The New Mexico State Athletics Department finished third in the 2009-10 Western Athletic Conference Commissioner's Cup announced by the league office. The Aggies, who finished fifth last year,

earned a total of 80.75 points, winning post-season championships in men's basketball (their second) men's golf (their fourth) and women's cross country (their first) during the 2009-10 academic year.

Since New Mexico State joined the WAC in 2005, the university has improved each year in the Commissioner's Cup standings.

The Aggies have made a more significant

improvement in the Commissioner's Cup than any other WAC school since 2005, moving six spots from ninth to third.

During their first year in the league (2005-06), the Aggies finished ninth overall, followed that up with an eighth-place finish a year later. The Aggies finished fifth in 2007-08 and

2008-09. NMSU scored in 16 of the 19 WAC sponsored sports, excluding men's indoor and outdoor track and gymnastics.

Boise State won the 2009-10 WAC Commissioner's Cup with 92.25 points, followed by Fresno State (83.75), New Mexico State, Nevada (76.50), Utah State (74), Hawai'i (68.50), Idaho (68.00), Louisiana Tech (57.50) and San Jose State (51.75). New Mexico State earned 13.5 points more in 2009-10 than in 2008-09. The WAC awards its Commissioner's Cup

to the school that performs the best in each of the conference's 19 men's and women's championships. Points are awarded in order of finish, equal to the number of teams that participate in each sport. They are averaged between a team's regular-season finish (if applicable) and its WAC championship finish.

Teams that do not qualify for a postseason tournament due to a smaller field, receive points equal to their regular-season finish. Ties are not broken but instead are averaged between the tied teams. Affiliate members are not eligible for the Commissioner's Cup, but their standings are still used for determining the outcome.




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Diep makes academic All-American team

you can go to one." House listed reasons why he thinks NMSU

will succeed this year. "Our secondary will be better," he said. "I don't know who the quarterback will be, but we will be improved there. We have several good candidates.

"Jeff (Fleming) has a year under his belt. Christian (Matt) is smart. He can read defenses well. And Rust (Tanner) redshirted last year and has a year under his belt.

House failed to mention incoming freshman Andrew Manley, the 6-foot-3, 215-pound QB from Leiluhua, Hawaii. He comes welladvertised.

'Our offensive line is experienced," House said. "They'll be better."

House believes the Aggies were good defensively in '08 but better last season. "When coach Dunn (Joe Lee, former defensive coordinator) was coaching our defense, we were successful against the pass but not very good against the run. We were too small.

'Under coach Walker, we were better overall."

House was a force in '09. He made 68 tackles and three key interceptions. He stole a pass against Hawai'i and returned it 58 yards for a touchdown. At Louisiana Tech, he returned a fumble for 38 yards and a TD. He owns nine career interceptions at NMSU.

House said he tries to prepare well against each opponent. "I watch a lot of film," he said. Lots of it, trying to learn the tendencies of the other team's quarterback."

House, a 6-0, 190-pound senior from Palmdale, Calif., also knows there is life after football. "I plan to graduate with a degree in Family and Child Science," he said. "I want to work with kids.

"Right now, at 2:30 in the afternoons, I work for three hours counseling children. It's part of my class work.

"I get real enjoyment out of helping them. They're so appreciative. Thankful for what you do for them.

"I didn't have it so good when I was growing up. There was always food on the table, but I kind of grew up under my brother's shadow.

"My family did the best they could, but it seems like there was never enough money around."

WAC's Benson calm about realignment Rumors continue to proliferate

The news that the Mountain West would expand and offer membership to Boise State must have come from the same source that "guaranteed" New Mexico State football head coach DeWayne Walker was headed for the NFL.

When WAC Commissioner Karl Benson discussed various scenarios last month, his calm tone implied to me that he wasn't assuming the worst. His comments at the time came from confidence as he took the stance that Boise State would be in a better situation by staying where they were.

Benson also commented that the Broncos were asked to think about what the Mountain West would come to be when the smoke of conference realignment clears. His comments explained that conferences were now the major players economically, and they all had an underlying need to make more money. The Big Ten

Network is aiming for \$300 mil-

lion in gross revenue and serves as the model business plan for the NCAA major leaguers. The need for "mo money" is why there is so much talk about leagues cherry picking the top producers from other conferences to equal the Big Ten's bank book. The biggest revenue stream for all conferences flows from television.

The WAC has a deal with ESPN that gives national exposure and revenue to the league. The Mountain West Conference has its own network, but unlike the



Big Ten, it is regionally based and falls short in terms of the benefits that WAC members enjoy. Some irony in this is that if the future holds Pac-10 and SEC pay cable channels, then ESPN will have more air time to fill with more air time for schools they have relationships and

contracts. The WAC is coming up on the second year of its contract that has increased the coverage for football and men's basketball but also for other WAC sports as well.

Aggie volleyball's home match with Fresno State was added in with the football and basketball coverage for NM State on the national scene. The truth is no one is certain how conference realignment will shake out. School presidents, not athletic directors, are involved in these decisions, and they are a different breed of cat. They tend to look at a larger picture

that includes academic credentials and a school's mission outside of athletics. Sometimes egos exist in the president's office and things like that can be a part of the decision process as well.

The changes could benefit the Aggies in scheduling. Schools that are culled out of the BCS ranks would have dates to fill and new alliances could be formed. This isn't to say that the coast is clear as far as changes in the future of the WAC, but it is one less thing to worry about for now.

Making steady progress Commissioner's Cup rank shows the Ags have been successful in WAC competition

So, third place in the WAC Commissioner's Cup standings. That is where NM State finished this year, which is a good indicator of the progress made by the Aggies in the time spent in the WAC.

Ole Pete is poppin' his buttons because every year has seen a higher finish in the standings for NM State.

Last year, the Crimson and White was fifth, after three league championships and strong showings in some other sports pushed us up two spots for 2010. The first year of membership in the new league showed that competition in the WAC was a much steeper climb than previous conferences. Too many fans base their evaluation of the athletics department on one sport and assume the best or worst about everything else based on one team's progress. 

Onthegreen: Surprise dad with a thoughtful gift

Don't insult papa with a dorky piece of junk

Just in case it slipped your mind, or you haven't figured out the calendar reminder on your BlackBerry, Father's Day is coming up on Sunday, June 20. A lot of dads are golfers – not all, but a lot – and so I'll help you out with my most thoughtful gift guide on what to get dad the linkster and what definitely not to get him.

These gifts measure up

At the top of my list is a GPS distancemeasuring device. For anyone who is a regular golfer and plays more than just one golf course, this is a must-have piece of equipment. In case you're not familiar with this stuff, golf GPS devices work just like a Garmin or a Tom Tom navigational gadget for your car, receiving a signal from a satellite, and then giving you point-to-point distances (accurate to one meter) on just about any golf course. The most popular state-of-the-art golf GPS product these days is the SkyCaddie SGX, which can store up to 30,000 pre-loaded golf courses. These are ground-verified maps, ready to utilize on the course with detailed green information. The SGX has a 3-inch, high-res screen, complete with info on hazards, carries and lavups, and comes equipped with software for digital scorecards and stat tracking. The pro shop at New Mexico State University Golf Course has these units in stock for \$399.

Don't get dad a cheap "golf-style" monocular.

The other hot GPS device is put out by Callaway and is called the uPro "Go." Selling for \$299, the compact uProGo gives you an on-screen rendering of a virtual green and other golf course features. The beauty of the uProGo, which comes pre-loaded with measurements for some 20,000 golf courses, is that there are no annual fees; just a one-time activation fee. Right now you can get a \$50 mail-in rebate on this unit at the NMSU pro shop.

I haven't seen this next item in any stores,

but I'm asking my sons to get me what I consider the real state-of-the-art in laser rangefinders, the "IdTech" from Callaway. I saw it in Orlando and noticed this is a brilliant design with a digital display on the side that shows you the elevation (incline/decline) on any shot, and allows you to get the "real" yardage on any shot anywhere (from 11 to 555 yards). It's how the tour caddies map out the courses and make yardage books for their playing pros. Check out one for \$429.95 at www.callowayrangefinders.com.

If your budget for making dad happy is a little more modest, say around \$20, think in terms of a plush animal cover for dad's big 460 driver from Daphne's Headcovers. For one thing, a new manufacturer's headcover, like one from Ping or Titleist or Taylor-Made, just shouts to anyone eyeballing your clubs what's in your bag ready to be swiped. A Chocolate Lab headcover gives it some disguise. My other favorites are the Polar Bear, Rottweiler, Pony, Cougar, Leopard and Owl. Both NMSU and Sonoma Ranch pro shops have a big selection from \$20 to \$25.

Don't get dad a package of little rubber covers for his irons – too dorky. And don't get dad a fishin' pole extendable golf ball retriever; better a Golden Retriever headcover.

Better vision, better golf

If you're still in the under-\$75 range for dad, think about getting him a fine pair of Tifosi sunglasses, specifically designed with optics for golf. Tell dad he'll now be able to spot subtle breaks on the putting green. These are more than the poor-man's Oakleys or Maui Jims; these are designer optics for golfers with a lot going on. Tifosi optics have a tint designed for athletes seeking an edge in distinguishing terrain details. The lens material increases light contrast by flattening the blue light spectrum that is responsible for optical blurring and decreasing contrast in bright light conditions. Tifosi optics feature "object illumination," which enhances your ability to pick up a ball in flight by providing a balance of target and background brightness.

Tifosis also have temples made of hydrophilic rubber for better sweat-resistant grip and are adjustable for a more comfortable fit. There are dozens of styles and lense colors to choose from. Keeping your eye on the ball is good. We're talking only \$39.95 to \$59.95 in the pro shop at Sonoma Ranch.

Don't buy dad a cheap pair of shades from Wal-mart; he'll know the difference.

If you think dad is going to like a dozen or two golf balls, don't cave in and get a box of \$4 balls from the drug store. Go over to NMSU and buy two or three boxes of Bridgestones. Here's the deal. You buy two dozen B330s and you bet a really nice golf shirt and a good cap – free. That way you can surprise dad later on another occasion, maybe a birthday. Buy three dozen of the e-series balls and you get the same stuff.

While you're there pick up a really nice golf towel by either Callaway, Ping or Titleist for around \$20.

Online ideas

One of my more unique finds for Internet shopping is an item called the "G-Handle Sostin." Pronounced "SOAS-tin," this Velcro glove-drying gear-holder easily carries, secures and organizes things like sunglasses, golf gloves, rangefinders, keys, Sharpies, club brushes and almost anything. Keeps you from losing or misplacing this stuff.

I know it's an unusual name, but this is a must-have for with-it golfers. The G-Handle is actually an all-in-one gear holder. It's a little unit that clips onto anything and holds valuable objects. It can be used on anything (golf bag, athletic bag, backpack, etc.). It's basically a bag tag on





steroids, and made right here in the USA. I saw this little gem at the PGA Show and it's for real. Go to www.ghandle.com. It's only \$24.95 plus shipping.

And while you're shopping online, visit www.eyeline.com and check out my favorite putting training aid – the Dual Plane putting mirror by Eyeline Golf at \$69.95 plus shipping. Another really clever and unique gift item is the Robo-Cup available from TGW and other online retailers at \$59.95.

You simply place the battery-powered Robo-Cup into a real golf hole cup, and the return device allows you to (practice) putt to a cup, wait a second and watch the ball get flung back to you saving you time and steps. Happy Father's Day.

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

Bulletin Church | A25 Using rewards correctly Adults, kids should watch their words

Previously you addressed the use of rewards in influencing kids. Isn't a mother manipulating the child by using rewards and punishment to get him to do what she wants?

No more than a factory supervisor manipulates his employees by docking their pay if they arrive late. No more than a policeman manipulates a speeding driver by giving him a traffic ticket. No more than an insurance company manipulates that same driver by increasing his premium. No more than the IRS manipulates a taxpayer who files his return one day late by charging a penalty for his tardiness. The word manipulation implies a sinister or selfish motive of the one in charge. I don't agree.

I worry about putting undue emphasis on materialism with my kids. Do rewards have to be in the form of money or toys?

Certainly not. A word of praise is a great enticement to some children. An interesting snack can also get their attention, although that has its downside.

When my daughter was 3 years of age, I began to teach her some prereading skills, including how to recognize the letters of the alphabet. By planning the training sessions to occur after dinner each evening, bits of chocolate candy provided the chief source of motivation. (I was less concerned about the effects of excess sugar consumption in those days than I am now.)

Late one afternoon, I was sitting on the floor drilling her on several new letters when a tremendous crash shook the neighborhood. The whole family rushed outside to see what had happened. A teenager had overturned his car on our quiet residential street. He was not





badly hurt, but his automobile was a mess. We sprayed the smoldering car with water and called the police.

It was not until the excitement passed that we realized our daughter had not followed us out of the house. I returned to the den where I found her elbow-deep in the large bag of candy I had left behind. She must have put a half-pound of chocolate in her mouth, and most of the remainder was distributed around her chin, nose and forehead. When she saw me coming, she managed to jam another handful into her chipmunk cheeks. From this experience, I learned one of the limitations of using material, or at least edible, rewards.


Anything the child wants can be used as a reinforcer, from praise to pizza to playtime.

I really believe in giving children the freedom to do wrong as long as there isn't any danger involved. For example, I let my kids curse and use swear words and don't see any harm in it. Do you agree?

No. I would hope that parents wouldn't use that kind of language and certainly don't believe they should permit their kids to do so. It is disrespectful, crude and unnecessary to talk like that.

The big heart of Doña Ana shines Restored church gets fresh paint for fiesta

Just after the Doña Ana Heritage Fiesta parade Saturday, June 5, Marcial Sambrano sat down in back of the restored Nuestra Señora de la Candelaria church to marvel at its restoration when he came across an old friend, Daniel Sandoval.

Though at different times, both had been altar boys at the church, which almost was torn down in the 1970s.

Sandoval said it made him happy to see the church not only still standing, but restored.

"It's one of the oldest churches in New Mexico," he said.

Indeed. The church is believed to have been built in the mid-1800s.

Sambrano said he thought the restored church was even brighter than what he remembered. Perhaps, the new ceiling latillas lets in more light. The old vigas had a dark patina from aging, for sure. There is definitely more electrical lighting.

The community rallied to save the old church, much of which was made possible through the efforts of a local preservation committee and state Sen. Mary Jane Garcia. The six-year effort brought in village at-risk youths to work with Cornerstone adobe restoration experts on rebuilding the church's walls, roof and ceiling.

This was one of Cornerstone's first youth training, Cornerstone's website states, and young workers "pioneered the re-introduction of the old lime plaster tradition, a knowledge that has since helped save other adobe structures in the area."

The work has been credited

with keeping those young people out of trouble. The church also has been accented by a plaza opened in 2005. The restoration of the church and the project's positive effect on the community leaves Sandoval with a sense of pride, he said.

"A lot of people in Doña Ana did a lot of work here," Sandoval said.

"For more than 125 years, the old church was the focal point of the village until a new one was constructed in the 1970s," Cornerstone's website notes about the project and the community's commitment to the project.

> Along the street leading to the church and plaza, about \$1 million of work is being done to restore the De La O Saloon with an adjacent computer center, as well as stabilizing the Herman Wertheim mercantile and home. That street – now called Cristo Rey – is believed to have been part of the original Camino Real colonial trading route. Besides the former store and bar, its old adobe buildings also once were the territorial government offices and early fort.

good cause Event proceeds to provide mobility

Fundraising for the Free Wheelchair Mission continues with the second annual Fajita Fiesta from noon to 8 p.m. Saturday, June 12, on the Mesilla Plaza.

While sampling some of Las Cruces' best fajitas from several local restaurants, attendees also will be entertained by mariachis, folklorico and dance to the music of M. Ramos and the Sound Connection. Arts and crafts vendors also will display their products for sale.

But attendees also will be supporting an even bigger cause - increasing mobility. Money raised at the Fajita Fiesta will benefit the Las Cruces Free Wheelchair Mission, which has a goal of distributing 1,100 wheelchairs to Mexico by the end of the year.

This will be the third year the community - led by humanitarian and local advocate Dennis Prickett - has rallied behind the efforts of the Free Wheelchair Mission, which provides wheelchairs to impoverished disabled individuals in developing countries. This is the second year Las Cruces has been a distribution partner of FWM, which means instead of just donating money, Prickett and other volunteers will assemble the chairs and donate them to those who need it most across the border.

"Two years ago, when I started this, I had no idea of being a distribution partner," Prickett said. "I was just raising money for wheelchairs to go, you know, wherever they needed them, when we all of a sudden realized we had the opportunity to meet the needs of some of the people right next door.

He and local advocates started in 2008 by sending 10 wheelchairs to Las Cruces' Sister City of Lerdo, Mexico, collaborating with the city's Lions Club. Since then, thanks to the collaboration of several community organizations and Las Crucens who wanted to volunteer their time, 250 chairs have been distributed to Ciudad Juárez, Mexico, and 300 more are

Fajita Fiesta Leading cancer treatment supporting TomoTherapy technology sets MMC apart from the rest

In terms of cancer treatment, Memorial Medical Center has continued to be a leader in the region, especially when the Memorial Ikard Cancer Treatment Center began using innovative TomoTherapy to treat its first patient, Matthew Wray, in May 2009.

A year later, Wray remains cancer free, and the Ikard Cancer Treatment Center is still using that technology to provide quality radiation oncology services and is the only cancer treatment center in southern New Mexico to have the technology. Unlike standard linear accelerators that treat cancer patients with radiation therapy, TomoTherapy provides treatment over a 360-degree rotation, said radiation oncologist Dr. Cherie Hayostek. The beams delivered using TomoTherapy are able to provide higher doses of radiation in a more precise area while minimally affecting the normal tissue around the tumor.

"Our goal is to have a better chance at blocking out the nor-

cially with prostate, neck, throat mal tissue," Hayostek said. Hayostek said better results and brain cancers. were found using TomoTherapy in several cancers where radia-

tion treatments may affect im-

portant organs and tissues, espe-

Hayostek said TomoTherapy is commonly used in early-diagnosed prostate cancer patients from their first treatment. Because the

prostate is so close to the bladder and the rectum, she said a standard linear accelerator may provide more acute, short-term side effects, such as painful urination or hemorrhoids.

With TomoTherapy, we are really seeing less side effects and getting better tumor control," Hayostek said.

Better tumor control means a good chance of eliminating the cancer altogether.

"There's a good chance of curing it if we are giving radiation treatment precisely," she said. "I can't say there will be zero side effects, but 85 to 90 percent of early-treated patients might be cancer free five years from now with less than a 1-percent chance of severe side effects."

Coupled with other advanced technology, Hayostek said it's even easier to plan an effective treatment. Using image-guided radiation therapy, each patient undergoing TomoTherapy receives a CT scan before each treatment to determine where it is needed. With prostate cancer, this is especially

Surgical robot is a work of art

Da Vinci technology is the first of its kind

MountainView Regional Medical Center unveiled its newest piece of technology, the da Vinci Robotic Surgical System, Friday, June 4. The hospital has high expectations for the revolutionary robot.

The \$1.5 million da Vinci robot is comprised of two arms and a 3-D camera, which is connected to a control console. At the console, surgeons operate and guide the da Vinci's arms and use foot-pedal controls to zoom in and out of the 3-D image presented to them.

MountainView has already begun to use the da Vinci for surgical procedures, primarily See Da Vinci on page A30

hysterectomies, with OB/GYN specialists Drs. Ismael Lopez and Anthony Levatino being the first to use the robot.

"This is just one step up on procedures we already know how to do, it is just a different way of doing it," Levatino said. "We're not learning from scratch. What we're learning is the practical differences ... but in the end, it is the same procedure we've done before."

Key features that make the da Vinci preferable to traditional laparoscopic surgeries are the "endowrists" on its robotic arms. The endowrists permit the surgeons to move the robotic arms as if they were their own, allowing for greater flexibility and smaller incisions

"Using the device allows for better view and more precise surgery," Lopez said. In traditional laparoscopic surgeries, the arms used to perform the procedure are straight, much like a human arm without the movement of a wrist.


Denten Park, CEO for MountainView, said although surgeries performed by the da Vinci will come at a greater cost, the benefits of the robot's capabilities would offset the initial cost. Those who opt to use the da Vinci for surgeries will have a faster, less invasive surgery, meaning less scarring and faster recovery time, which Park said will prevent patients from missing long periods of work.

'There is a lot less blood loss and a lot less pain compared to traditional gynecological procedures," Lopez said. "There is less potential for complications with robotic-assisted surgery, and a



patient's stay in the hospital can often be reduced to one day." The da Vinci is the first robot of its kind in southern New Mexico and is the fourth in New Mexico, with two da Vinci robots in Albuquerque and one in Santa Fe. Park said other departments in the hospital would eventually use the robot as doctors begin to learn the technology. Park plans to move the robot beyond gynecological procedures to encompass urology and general surgery in the near future.

MountainView will host a community demonstration of the da Vinci robot at 10 a.m. Saturday, June 26. The demo is open to the public and will begin in the main lobby of the hospital.

helpful, because the prostate could move depending on a full bowel or bladder.

We could never see that before," she said.

Before, when localizing the prostate for treatments, patients underwent a procedure where three to four gold seeds were implanted in the prostate. X-rays were then taken to localize the prostate.

Now patients don't have to do that," Hayostek said. In fact, not counting wait and prep time, treatments

usually take no longer than 15 minutes, including the CT scan and the TomoTherapy. The CT scan takes an average of five minutes, as well as the TomoTherapy. And right away, Hayostek said she is able to see the dosage distributed to the tumor and the surrounding areas.

"With TomoTherapy, we're seeing smooth dose dis-tribution and not a lot of 'hot spots," she said.

Treatments are given Monday through Friday, and the number of treatments depends on the type of cancer. Though it may seem like an inconvenience - and what cancer isn't - TomoTherapy treatments don't put as much of an impact on the patient's quality of life.

Patients could be in and out within an hour, and they're usually able to schedule that into their lifestyle," Hayostek said. "Our prostate cancer patients can do normal activities, and, for most people, the side effects are mild. It has been exciting to get one year of experience, and I'm just ecstatic about what we can do.'

Adler, who has a significant interest in the diagnosis and treatment of patients with malignant diseases, is a member of the multidisciplinary cancer committee at Memorial Medical Center.

Cancer Liaison Physicians are responsible for spearheading CoC initiatives within their cancer program; collaborating with agencies, such as the American Cancer Society (ACS); and facilitating quality improvement initiatives utilizing data submitted to the CoC's National Cancer Database (NCDB). The CoC collects data from its accredited cancer programs and provides tools back to these facilities to facilitate the analysis of patterns of diagnosis, treatment and quality of care.

The NCDB currently contains patient demographics, tumor characteristics, treatment and outcomes information for more than 25 million malignant cancers diagnosed and treated at hospital-cancer programs in the United States between 1985 and 2007. The Cancer Liaison Physician works with the cancer program staff to facilitate the submission, presentation, use, and interpretation of NCDB data. Analyzing and sharing these data with the cancer committee can have a positive impact on cancer patient care at the facility.

Fan drive to benefit elderly

Primary Care Association receives \$2 million grant

The New Mexico Primary Care Association in Albuquerque will receive more than \$2 million in grant funds to help adopt electronic health records (EHR) and other health information technology (HIT) systems.

The \$2 million is part of the \$2 billion allotted to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act to expand health care services to low-income and uninsured individuals through its health center program. More than \$83 million will be distributed to 45 health center networks nationwide, including the New Mexico Primary Care Association, in this round of grants.

The 45 grants will support new and enhanced EHR implementation projects as well as HIT innovation projects. Funds will allow grantees to use EHR technology to improve health care quality, efficiency and patient safety. Eligible professionals practicing within health centers who are able to demonstrate meaningful use of certified EHR technology may be eligible for incentive payments provided under Medicaid and Medicare.

Health Center Controlled Networks (HCCNs) improve the operational effectiveness and clinical quality in health centers by providing management, financial, technology and clinical support services. The networks, comprised of at least three collaborating organizations, are community-based groups that support HRSA-funded health centers that provide primary health care to nearly 19 million patients - a number expected to double over the next five years as health care reform is implemented.

Truth crew coming to Las Cruces

Young adult crew members from the truth youth smoking prevention tour will stop in Las Cruces Wednesday, June 30, with the Vans Warped Tour at New Mexico State University, with a goal of trying to keep local teens from starting to smoke.

These crew members have dedicated their summer to traveling the country in an effort to educate the youth of America about tobacco. Over the summer, the truth tour plans to reach more than 500,000 teens at popular concerts in 26 different states across the country. Truth is bringing its distinctive orange "truth trucks" rigged with DJ decks, video monitors and more, in order to help spread information about tobacco products

and give teens the knowledge needed to make informed choices about smoking.

At each stop on the nationwide tour, the truth zone will feature a fun and engaging atmosphere, allowing truth crew members to discuss tobacco issues with teens in a "non-preachy" way. Crew members will hold fashion shows, dance contests and freestyle rap "battles," playing educational games and conducting DJ lessons through "Scratch Academy." They also will give away truth-branded gift items such as sunglasses, gym bags and T-shirts.

The truth campaign, which celebrates its 10-year anniversary this year, was launched in February 2000 by LegacySM, a national public health foundation created to help youth from smoking and helping smokers to quit. The campaign exposes the tactics of the tobacco industry, the truth about addiction, and the health effects and social costs of smoking.

According to research published in the American Journal of Public Health, there were approximately 450,000 fewer youth smokers between 2000 and 2004 as a direct result of the truth campaign. A growing body of additional research has confirmed the efficacy of the campaign in changing teens' attitudes, beliefs and behaviors toward smoking.



Conference highlights industry's achievements, challenges

The United States must make drastic improvements to its clean, renewable energy portfolio and it must act fast.


That was the message that dominated the conversation during the second annual Re-Energize America conference, hosted by New Mexico State University June 3 and 4 at the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum. "We're really looking at bold, conventional

"We're really looking at bold, conventional solutions for the energy problem in this country," said panelist Michael Eaves, vice president of technology for Clean Energy Fuels, the largest provider of natural gas for transportation in North America. "We're looking at the reverse transfer of wealth from overseas to our economy, at our resources vs. theirs, and at our people and our jobs."

Eaves was just one of several speakers who touched on the threat of increasing international competition in the renewable energy sector and the need to secure America from dependency on foreign oil sources, especially those in unfriendly nations.

"I have told people in Las Cruces, Hobbs, Roswell and all across southern New Mexico that technology such as wind, solar and biofuels were not only good for the environment, but they would also create jobs for our communities and bolster our national security," said U.S. Rep. Harry Teague, a lifelong oilman who ran on a campaign platform in 2007 focused on energy independence and security.

Teague again was the honorary chair for the conference, which was co-chaired this year

by NMSU President Barbara Couture. For the second year, the conference brought together leaders in policy, education, industry and science to discuss a short-term plan for long-term energy independence.

Biofuel industry works to put a dent on diesel, looks to NM for new opportunities

Algae, mostly single-cell organisms that use the sun to convert energy and exert a "slime" that contains up to 30 times more oil than crops such as soybeans, could be the solution for the future fuel needs of the heavy truck and aviation industries.

"There's a lot of hype today about algae, and rightfully so," said José Olivares, executive director of the National Alliance for Advanced Biofuels and Bio-Products. "There's a lot of promise in algae, but there are also a lot of technological challenges associated with algae."

Certain strains of microalgae, very small organisms – about one micron and smaller than a human hair in diameter – produce oil under the right condition, converting other things like sugar, cellulose and carbon dioxide into oil as a storage mechanism for survival. These algae will produce oil up to 50 to 80 percent of its weight.

"The promise is that it produces a lot of oil," Olivares said. "There are not many plant organisms out there that use this much oil. It can produce it fast and it can reproduce itself and have a harvest in days."

The high-yielding algae doesn't need much processing or refining before it can be used to power a car, truck or plane, and the multitude of sites suitable for its production are more than enough to put a serious dent in the imports of foreign oil. This algae "hype" has prompted energy entrepreneurs in the country to invest into perfecting a way to turn the pond scum into dollars.

"Our hope is to be able to take on this dream that our kids have – to replace the oil industry," Olivares said.

Development Department; Marcilynn Burke, deputy director of programs and policy for the Bureau of Land Management; and Jim Conca, senior scientist for the Institute for Energy and the Environment at NMSU.

Topics discussed included creating a national plan for new energy jobs, creating jobs through investments in energy efficiency, the technology beyond energy independence, creating new energy entrepreneurs on private lands, new jobs in nuclear energy and the role of oil and gas in the energy independence transitional period.

The conference was broken up into six sessions with several keynote speakers delivering remarks over the two days.

David Hadley of the Technology Transfer Division of LANL opened the conference with discussion of how to create a national plan for

creating new energy jobs. Hadley, along with panelists Terry Brunner of the USDA Rural Development Department, Tim Zenk of Sapphire Energy and Rusell Schmit of CleanSwitch, agreed that public policy, specifically the creation and continuation of energy-related tax incentives, must be implemented in haste to spur small businesses and entrepreneurs to create new jobs in the industry.

Robert Czerniak, associate dean of the NMSU College of Arts and Sciences, moderated the discussion of creating jobs through investments in energy efficiency.

"Energy efficiency is not sexy for most people, not like all the new energy technologies out there," said panelist and state Sen. Steve Fischmann. "But when you step back and look at the policy, of all the new technologies, the least expensive, in terms of providing new en-

ergy resources, is energy efficiency." Fischmann, who represents District 37 in the New Mexico Senate, has long been an advocate of energy efficiency, renewable energy and lower fuel costs, serving as chair of the

Southwest Energy Alliance and on the board for the Southwest Environmental Center and the Coalition for Clean and Affordable Energy.

He said it doesn't take government policy or a government-sponsored program to start securing America's energy future.

"Every time we save, we're making energy cheaper," he said. "Energy efficiency is the most powerful tool for our energy security and it's not only the cheapest, it's also the best for our environment."

By putting more money in people's pockets from utility bill savings, Fischmann said, it would spur the creation of new jobs from increased consumer spending.

Leaders from the state and nation's scientific communities also discussed the latest in alternative-energy technology, giving conference attendees the latest information on the development, industry integration and commercialization of green tech.

"It's going to be very difficult to supplant the high-density fuel that's needed for the heavy truck and aviation industry," said José Olivares, executive director of the National Alliance for Biofuels and Bio-Products.

Olivares added that more research and development was needed in the area of battery technology to fulfill the future needs of fuel in the transportation industry.

"A new market and new infrastructure also has to be created in order to adapt that technology," he said. "Supplanting that infrastructure will be a huge investment and it will be very difficult."

Other panelists also talked about the emergence of algal biofuels, a new genetically engineered microorganism with the potential to excrete two times the number of oil as algae, solar conversion and bio-processing technologies and the adaptation of ethanol into commercial gas pumps.

Specific to New Mexico, Mondragon led a discussion on expanding the alternative energy workforce in the state.

To do that, we must create an environment where we can create more new jobs for New Mexico, which has the (potential) for \$5 billion per year of activity occurring in the state," said David Blivin, a venture capitalist and founder and managing director of Cottonwood Technology Group.

Blivin said he conducted a two-year study of the resources needed to create a robust alternative energy sector in the state, and has since developed close working relationships with key leadership in the public policy, industry and scientific sectors.

"I started looking at opportunities here and it struck me that New Mexico doesn't really focus on all of the resources and keeping them in New Mexico for the benefit of New Mexicans. he said. "There is \$4 to \$6 billion in annually funded research in the state - that's the equivalent of 10 Stanfords or the (Massachusetts Institute of Technology).

New Mexico is ranked second in scientists and engineers in the state per capita, Blivin said.

Specifically for land owners and potential entrepreneurs, a group of panelists from state and federal government spoke about developing non-arable and other lands for biofuel, wind and solar photovoltaic sites.

"New Mexico has the resources consistent for utility-scale production," said Dennis Garcia, deputy commissioner for the New Mexico State Land Office.

The conference closed with discussions on creating new jobs in nuclear energy and the future of oil and gas during the clean energy 'transition" period.

"We need more jobs in oil and gas. We need more jobs period," said Jim Peach, an economics professor at NMSU who led a study to evaluate the economic impact of the oil and gas industry in the state. "Let me assure you that oil and gas production is positively associated with the local level in income, employment and population growth."

The conference was organized by NMSU's Institute for Energy and the Environment and sponsored by ConocoPhillips, Lockheed Martin, LANL, Sandia National Laboratories, Sapphire Energy and the Carlsbad Department of Development.

Local growth

Microsoft co-founder and billionaire Bill Gates, along with Venrock Associates, the Rockefeller family's venture capital firm, have invested some \$100 million into Sapphire Energy Inc., a California-based company with a 100-acre testing facility in Las Cruces.

Sapphire, with 140 employees, has also attracted \$104 million in federal funding to develop a 300-acre site in southern New Mexico to build the first algal biofuel refinery to produce the renewable, green gasoline.

The company's Las Cruces testing facility has been operating for about 20 months and groundbreaking for the new refinery is planned for September, according to company officials.

Bill Sims, president and CEO of Joule Unlimited Inc., a biofuels company headquartered in Cambridge, Mass., is also looking to New Mexico to expand its operations.

The company has genetically engineered microorganisms similar to algae and has developed a "revolutionary" process to convert sunlight and waste carbon dioxide directly into clean, fungible diesel fuel, "bypassing the limitations of biofuel production."

"As a result of this process, we will be able to produce liquid hy-drocarbons as low as \$30 per barrel," Sims said.

The company is banking on its ability to build above-ground fuel reserves that can be deployed wherever needed, overcoming the risk and cost of oil and gas exploration and production. Sims said he and other members of his company have been in active conversation with the economic development leadership in the state to bring a Joule production facility to New Mexico.

We are looking for our first location for a commercial facility and have been in discussion with folks in New Mexico, and other states as well," he said. "We're very interested in (developing a site) here in New Mexico. The land in this area has all the key requirements we need sunlight, open land, access to carbon dioxide and non-fresh water."

Sims said the Joule production

facility, at 5,000 acres, would create up to 1,500 jobs and produce 1.8 million barrels of diesel per year and use 750 tons of carbon dioxide.

Truly we believe this is a solution our government and most people need, and we are ready to in-troduce it to the world," Sims said. We hope to do so right here in New Mexico.

The promise of Camelina

Jeff Trucksess, founder of Green Earth Fuels, a Houston-based biodiesel producer, is working to commercialize Camelina, an oilseed crop known for its low-nutrient requirements and insect resistance that's seen as a viable feedstock for the biodiesel industry.

Green Earth Fuels is already one of the largest biodiesel producers in the country, producing 95 million gallons per year.

The company has identified a strain of Camelina that's well-suited for the Southwest desert environment. The strain is hearty and lowmaintenance.

Sustainable Oils, a spinoff seed company of Green Earth Fuels, is looking to commercialize the strain by selling it to farmers and owners to grow as a dedicat-

ed energy crop. The company is growing trials of Camelina in New Mexico.

"It's a great oppor-tunity and has great potential," Trucksess said.

The energy crop, which produces about 100 gallons of oil per acre, can be rotated with other environment-appropriate crops to maximize profit, Trucksess said. "We are having significant success do-

ing this," he said. The limitations

lengthy process it takes for herbicide

registration - one to two years - and to use the by-product for cattle and animals, it also takes about a year to attain the proper licensing.

"I think because of the opportunity in New Mexico and the leadership in the state, it's really a place we can make it happen," Trucksess said.

A coordinated effort

A statewide push to attract the biofuel industry and develop a comprehensive plan for biofuel production in the state is also placing much of its focus on Camelina.

The Southwest Biofuels Association is a nonprofit organization that promotes biofuels through partnerships between the Southwest's biofuel industry, universities, national laboratories, state agencies, educators, entrepreneurs and environmental organizations. Its founding members include Sandia National Laboratories, Los Alamos National Laboratory and New Mexico State University.

"We agreed that our state of New Mexico needed a coordinated, strategic and most important, intelligent comprehensive plan to capture more than our share of the growing biofuels industry," said Maria Zannes, SWBA outreach director.


The organization is also promoting Camelina as viable feedstock for the biofuels industry.

"For every 12,000 acres cultivated with seed energy crops, 1 million of gallons of

biofuel could be produced," Zannes said. "If only one half of the suitable land in the will be able to state is cultivated in rotation with produce liquid other crops, we're looking at \$250 hydrocarbons million a year into the economy and as low as \$30 more than 5,700 new jobs created." What are biofuels?

Biofuels can be liquid, solid or gaseous fuels derived from renewable biomass sources. Biomass can be burned directly for thermal energy or converted to other highvalue energy sources such as ethanol, biodiesel, methanol, hydrogen or methane.

How much biofuel does the U.S. produce?


Most of the 4 billion gallons of ethanol produced in 2005 came from 13 percent of the U.S. corn crop, a 17 percent increase from the 3.4 billions of gallons produced in 2004. In 2005, 75 million gallons of biodiesel were produced.

How much gas and diesel does the U.S. consume?

In 2004, the U.S. consumed 20.7 million barrels of petroleum products per day, or about 7.5 billion barrels per year. A barrel contains 42 gallons. Total petroleum consumption in 2004 was 318 billion gallons. About 60 percent of petroleum consumed was from foreign sources, with about 13 percent coming from Persian Gulf countries.

Oil and gas: The bridge to independence

Domestic energy exploration crucial to national security

Former U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici vehemently expressed it months before retiring from the Senate – oil and gas must be the cornerstone of the bridge toward energy independence.

Other political and industry leaders have subscribed to the same doctrine, saying that domestic sources of both onshore and offshore oil must be further explored and developed to lower the nation's dependency on foreign oil.

During a panel session held June 4 at the Re-Energize America conference, industry experts said much the same.

"People in the oil and gas industry know the most where the technological gaps lie and know where there's a lack of education and understanding, and so they can better make a decision on how to best get from one point to another," said James Pappas, vice president of technical programs for the Research Partnership to Secure Energy For America, speaking about the "bridge" to energy independence.

Currently, the United States imports about 60 percent of its petroleum from foreign sources, about 13 percent of which is coming Persian Gulf countries, according to the U.S. Department of Energy.

Section 999

Pappas talked about Section 999 of the Energy Policy Act, signed into law in 2005, that supports oil and gas research and development. Section 999 essentially created the Ultra-

Deepwater and Unconventional Natural Gas



and Other Petroleum Resources Program, a public-private partnership designed to increase America's domestic oil and gas supply. A portion of the funding is directed toward costshared research partnerships while another portion is used for Department of Energy research efforts.

"The members of (the program) are all over the country, and the Land of Enchantment has more than its fair share of participants," Pappas said.

The initiative is necessary because of a steep decline in research funding for domestic oil and natural gas exploration at a time when it has become the most critical, Pappas said.

"If you're in oil and gas, the unconventional resources right now are a really hot topic," he said. "This is where shale gas comes in, which is what (New Mexico) has. There are a huge number of opportunities but we're limited on funds."

Pappas' research partnership helps break down every step in the function of research and development – from scouting to drilling and eventually beginning a commercial operation, he said.

In order to have the least environmental impact, at least in the area of shale hydraulic fracturing, plans are being developed for a conceptual drilling design for semi-arid ecosystems that has a low-impact logistical support that leaves a very "small footprint" per drilling rig, uses "disappearing" roads and causes minimum disturbance to the surrounding environment.

He said the technological challenges for small producers in the state is that they would probably need to leverage existing infrastructure instead of developing or buying brand new equipment, a problem Section 999 seeks to solve.

The Department of Energy will contribute \$356.2 million over 10 years to the Section 999 program while matching funds from industry will be at least \$87.6 million, based on a minimum 20 percent share of research and development efforts. Of those funds, 35 percent will be dedicated to projects to explore ultradeepwater resources, 32 percent will go to unconventional natural gas and other petroleum resources, 7.5 percent will go toward solving the technological challenges of such exploration for small producers and 25 percent will be for fundamental research complementary to these areas.

Pappas said he sees the program as vital – a necessary step to achieving American energy independence.

Jobs for New Mexico

Ken Huseman, CEO of Basic Energy Services Inc., an oil and gas company headquartered in Midland, Texas., talked about his organization's drilling operations in New Mexico.

"We now employ about 250 to 260 people in New Mexico, which is down from 350 in 2008," Huseman said. "Most of the cause for that the state can't do anything about, but it certainly can do something about the climate and business environment for oil and gas production."

Most of Huseman's New Mexico employees, he said, are "folks like truck drivers, well-servicing rig hands and derrick hands. Jobs that have an impact on their local communities."

The average pay for a crew chief working for Huseman makes about \$19.50 per hour, followed by a derrick hand, \$15 per hour, and a floor hand, \$13.40 per hour. In 2009, the company's total New Mexico payroll was \$12.5 million, it spent \$10 million on supplies and estimates it put \$22.5 million into local economies around the state. That's a significant reduction from 2008 when it paid \$19 million in salary, purchased \$14.8 million in materials and put \$34.6 million back into local economies.

"Just the tax impact for each job has been reduced to \$13,000 a year, down by 23 percent from 2008," he said.

To promote oil-field job retention and growth, the state should be proactive in promoting access for responsible development, including federal lands, must be careful of imposing regulations which could hinder further development and support the industry with college and other vocational programs for providing qualified workers in the areas where work is performed, Huseman said.

"It must avoid the not-in-my-backyard syndrome," Huseman said. "If we're going to have affordable energy, we're going to have to have it in our backyard. If the world wants cheap energy, we're going to have to be tolerant of having it in close proximity."

Hydraulic fracturing

Michael Eaves, vice president of technology advancement for Clean Energy Fuels, one of the country's largest producers of natural gas for the automotive industry, said New Mexico is ideal for hydraulic fracturing to extract hardto-find natural gas in shale formations.

"A 2010 assessment suggests we have 200 years of natural gas in the U.S.," he said. "And we have a couple of large shale (formations) here in the state of New Mexico."

Eaves said his company has sufficient resources to make an impact on backing out of foreign oil. Using natural gas, the transportation industry could reduce about 10 percent of its on-road transportation fuel from foreign sources, he said. The U.S. currently as about 100,000 commercial heavy-duty vehicles that operate on natural gas, compared to 11 million that the rest of the world has.

"All major U.S. truck manufacturers will offer natural gas for port and regional trucking by 2012 or 2013," he said. "And new engines are being developed, prompted by market demand."

Re-Energize America 2010

International competition dominates energy industry

Lack of manufacturing power, research and comprehensive policy hurting United States

In most, if not all panel discussions and keynote speeches held during the 2010 Re-Energize America Conference, energy industry leaders expressed the urgent need to gain a stronger foothold in global energy markets.

The aggressive expansion of national and international alternative energy sectors in countries such as China, France and Germany, are putting a serious dent in U.S. leadership as a global innovator and competitor.

"The rapid pace at which our international competitors are investing in and supporting alternative energy technologies is nothing short of breathtaking," said Stephen Ward, chief of staff for the office of U.S. Sen. Jeff Bingaman. "There are crucial challenges we have to meet."

An energy empire

China is rolling out the red carpet to attract international manufacturers to develop new and existing alternative energy products. It is also making billion-dollar investments in research and development, infrastructure and is rapidly deploying new energy technologies for commercial use.

'They're creating their own markets," Ward said.

It's no mystery that China uses a massive amount of energy as the world's most populous country. The country has emerged from being a net oil exporter in the early 1990s to becoming the world's third-largest net-importer of oil in 2006. China is also the world's largest producer and consumer of coal, giving the nation significant importance in world energy markets.

"A recent study reports that over the next five years, the governments of China, Japan and South Korea will invest half a trillion dollars in clean technology industries," Ward said.

China has also built the world's largest solar panel manufacturing industry by exporting more than 95 percent of its products to Europe and the United States.

Ward said when an international manufacturer shows interest in setting up operations in China, economic development officials in each specific province will court the companies to the point of sheltered protectionism for China's economy.

They'll take you to a building, tell you that

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they will build you a building just like theirs, underwrite the funds and infrastructure for the facility, train your people and give you tax credits beyond the horizon," he said. "They'll even take orders on the first five weeks of production and install the products on government buildings.'

The world's largest equipment manufacturer for solar, Applied Materials - an American company - has built the largest solar manufacturing facility in China, Ward said.

"The competition is getting very, very tough," he said. "We're seeing a birth of a new era."

Leveraging U.S. strengths

To better compete in the global market, America must rely on three "pillars" of progress, Ward said: Clean technology research and innovation, domestic manufacturing capacity and the development of domestic markets.

In the energy sector, both private and public funding has remained at low levels for almost a decade.

This is not a path toward success," Ward said. "We lack a coordinated, well-funded national clean energy research agenda that can maintain our innovation advantage.

The ability for the U.S. to invest in new research efforts is realistically impacted by the financial resources the country will have during the next three years.

To bring manufacturing jobs back to the U.S., a term known in the industry as "re-shoring," policy must be in line with economic development to make international manufacturers' operations economically viable.

"Our manufacturing sector has seen a significant contraction over the last decade," Ward said. "We can reverse the decline in our manufacturing sector overall and revitalize American manufacturing in places with significant energy resources like here in New Mexico.

Ward agreed that both national and state tax policies must be "reliable and predictable" to spur industrial job growth, specifically for the manufacturing industry.

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act created such incentives by setting aside \$2.3 billion for Clean Energy Manufacturing Tax Credits. The law provides a 30 percent tax credit for investments in 183 manufacturing facilities for clean energy products across 43 states. The investment will be matched by as much as \$5.4 billion in private sector funding, according to



the White House.

Ward said President Barack Obama has called for an additional \$5 billion once the tax credits are exhausted.

A nuclear revolution in France

France acquires more than 75 percent of its electricity from nuclear energy, in part due to a long-standing defense policy based on energy security. The country is the world's largest net exporter of electricity due to its low cost of gen-

eration and has been very active in developing nuclear technology over the past decade. Reactors and fuel products and services are one of the country's major exports.

The United States, by comparison, uses nuclear for about 20 percent of its total electric consumption and hasn't built any new nuclear facilities since the 1970s.

Two nuclear power plants are now under construction in Georgia, thanks to an \$8 billion loan guarantee approved by the Obama Administration in February.

"The problem with the nuclear industry in the U.S. is that

in the '60s and '70s, we were still experimenting," said Jim Conca, senior scientist for the Institute for Energy and the Environment at New Mexico State University. 'Every single reactor in the U.S. is different than the other. That's not how you build something that's cost-effective.'

A retiring workforce in the nuclear industry makes the challenge more daunting, Conca

"We don't have the workers," he said. "In the next five years, we're going to lose half of our

workforce in nuclear. If you start building reactors now, the workforce will take off just like it did in the '60s. We can do it again, and there really is an urgency, a time crunch, that is not trivial."

Dan Hicks, chief of staff for White Sands Missile Range, said the Department of Defense is looking at nuclear as a possible solution for independent power generation on U.S. military bases

"One of the things the department has been


pushing is how to get places like Fort Myers and WSMR off the grid," he said.

A nuclear test reactor already exists at WSMR, but has not been used for power generation, Hicks said.

John Kelly, senior manager for advanced nuclear energy programs at Sandia National Laboratories, said to make significant advancement in achieving energy independence over the next 30 years, "we would have to build 200, to perhaps 300 nuclear reactors."

Because of the enormous cost of building a utility-scale one- to two-unit nuclear power plant, Sandia is developing small-scale reactors that could be built cheaper and used in smaller-scale set-

tings and cities. "We believe there are a number of good applications domestically for this – creating a new industry with potential for international export," he said. "Currently the international community, particularly France and Japan, have the upper hand. The United States needs to take (nuclear) serious and understand the technologies we can produce to compete in the global market."

Sowing seeds to create new energy jobs

Green industries have an explosive growth potential By Gabriel Vasquez

Researching and developing new, renewable sources of energy doesn't make much sense, or cents, if the job market doesn't rival that of the oil and gas industry.

Energy pioneers in the state and in the U.S. are working diligently to make sure that job creation is an integral part in developing a new, green economy.

oping a new, green economy. "What can New Mexico do to take advantage of its raw materials and create jobs? I've been in New Mexico for two years trying to figure it out," said venture capitalist David Blivin, founder and managing director of the Cottonwood Technology Group.

Blivin, along with other in- and out-of-state investors, are waiting for the chance to capitalize on the clean energy industry, he said.

he said. "I think we are all painfully aware that oil and gas revenue, as a percentage of (the state) budget, places the state at risk," he said. "What I did was pull together a council of leadership from the state – predominantly from five research centers to figure out a plan."

Blivin is working with researchers at New Mexico State University, the University of New Mexico, Sandia National Laboratories, New Mexico Tech and Los Alamos National Laboratory, along with business leaders and policy-makers, to "categorize" the intellectual capital of the state to create a knowledge bank for the green industry.

"New Mexico has a long suit in energy, it's no surprise to anybody," he said. "And where are the national and international (economic development) opportunities? It's in energy. If there has even been a time in New Mexico's history to stand up and be counted, it's today."

The state investment council should go as far as allocating a significant part of its permanent funds – about \$14 billion – into clean energy research and development, Blivin said.

"Other states are making big bucks for their economic future," he said. "They're not all in energy, but they're all serious. How do we compete with that?"

Blivin suggested developing a marketing plan for the state that leverages its most plentiful natural resource, the sun, and pouring a significant investment into showcasing the state's achievements and promoting renewable technology to the world.

"We're already making a substantial investment for energy and the sun, we're just not promoting it that way. Most of these states are investing in the billion dollar range," he said. "We must commit to a number in that range to be taken seriously. The film industry has addressed many of the (issues) of workforce development and public policy. Now we need to focus additionally in the area of technology commercialization."

Reducing the reliance on funding from federal government and oil and gas revenues would create additional jobs in New Mexico, Blivin said.

"That will result in many more small businesses starting, and

small-business growth is really the source of all net job growth," he said.

A nuclear solution

District 55 state Rep. John Heaton is putting his money on nuclear and geothermal energy.

"If we look at even the first step of (developing) nuclear power, we see that we have a great deal of uranium in New Mexico," he said. "In the nuclear power arena, we have tremendous opportunity for growth and job development, power plants, uranium mining and uranium enrichment."

A recently dedicated uranium enrichment plant in Eunice, N.M., in the northwest part of the state, will create more than 500 jobs each year once fully operational, Heaton said.

The facility, to be operated by Urenco, will have the capacity of processing an annual 5.7 million separative work units (SWU), the measure in which U235 uranium is separated from U238. A large nuclear power station with a net power generating capability of 1,300 megawatts requires about 25 tons of enriched SWU.

"About 1,200 jobs are created in just the construction phase and in the mining and operation phase you'll see around 8,000 jobs," he said. "Those are significant jobs for northwestern New Mexico, which is really in trouble with their economy, much more so than here in the south."

To build a utility-scale nuclear power plant, about 5,000 jobs are created during the three- to four-year construction period, he added, and 800 direct jobs are subsequently created to operate the plant.

"Would you rather have a coal plant with high-cost fuel and 50 workers, or would you rather have a nuclear power plant that has 800 people working and a very low-cost fuel source?" he said. "There's no question in my mind of what I choose."

Part of the problem is that most nuclear plants are located near large metropolitan areas, mostly in the East Coast and Pacific West, he said. A plant would ideally have to be located in Albuquerque to operate most efficiently. Another challenge is the need for an interim storage facility for nuclear waste and reprocessing the spent fuels, but taking on such a task, although daunting in scale, would be an enormous job-creator in the state.

"When it comes to reprocessing, we could create about 4,000 jobs," he said, "and another 2,000 jobs for fuel storage. Expanding the nuclear industry in New Mexico would mean an enormous

growth for the state, some 18,000 jobs with an average pay of somewhere in the neighborhood of \$70,000 a year."

Commercializing federal lands

The Bureau of Land Management owns about 30 percent of New Mexico's land, and helping to make it commercially available for the clean energy industry is Marcilynn Burke, deputy director of programs and policy for the BLM.

"Now is the time for America to step up to the development of renewable energy from domestic resources," she said. "Until now, America's vast plains, deserts and forests have largely been unexplored for their tremendous renewable energy potential."

New Mexico is ranked highest of the 11 Western states in renewable energy generating capacity, she added.

"This is for solar and wind projects, as well as transmission," she said.

Although there are no utility-scale energy facilities located on BLM lands in New Mexico, "the applications are pouring in, so it's only a matter of time," said Burke, adding that to date, the BLM has received 220 land-use applications for utility-scale solar developments in the West.

The BLM manages about 240 million acres in 12 Western states, including Alaska, she said. About 38 million of those acres have excellent "solar potential," and 21 million are well suited for wind projects, she said.

"As that land manager, the BLM plays an integral role in the development of America's renewable energy future by authorizing the exploration, testing and development on public lands," she said.

With the aforementioned solar and wind resources, "we estimate we could generate 20 percent of our energy by 2030 and create 230,000 jobs."

The BLM estimates electricity generation from the state's wind capacity to be 490,000 megawatts, and has approved five energy wind-testing applications on federal lands.

In addition, the federal agency has been conducting environmental impact studies on lands prime for solar, wind, geothermal and transmission projects for several years.

"The BLM has been laying the framework for future renewable energy projects over the last few years by preparing these environmental impact statements," she said.

In and around Las Cruces, the BLM has identified three specific solar-energy study areas totaling more than 12,000 acres, she said.

"The BLM will meet both the challenges and opportunities as we begin to implement a new energy agenda for America," Burke said.

A return to agriculture

The business model for the production of biomass for biofuel production, using both algae, other microorganisms and feedstock, is taking off.

Already, Sapphire Energy, a San Diego-based company backed by two of the biggest venture capitalists in the world – Bill Gates and the Rockerfeller family – has set up a test-and-demonstration 100-acre facility near Las Cruces in preparation for a much larger biofuel production facility. The new refinery will be 300 acres and employ more than 100, according to the company.

Similarly, a Massachusetts company by the name of Joule Unlimited Inc. is looking at New Mexico to build its first biofuel production facility. Joule President Bill Sims said the state is at the top of his company's list and expects an announcement to be made soon.

The Joule plant, at an estimated 5,000 acres, would create up to 1,500 jobs in the state, he said.

Bringing more jobs to New Mexico and other Western states is also the focus of the Southwestern Biofuels Association, an organization formed from founding members who attended the 2009 Re-Energize America conference.

"Where other crops would fail, crops such as algae will prosper in the Southwest's unique climate," the organization states. "Additionally, southern New Mexico has the Permian Basin, a vast brine water aquifer that can supply water for the construction of algal ponds from which biodiesel can be produced." 🗲 Re-Energize America 2010

Proposed cap-and-trade policy is overly ambitious

Legislation goes in the right direction, but implementation has many problems

> The administration of Gov. Bill Richardson is proposing new greenhouse gas regulations that would establish a capand-trade system in New Mexico. The plan calls for distribution of permits to large greenhouse gas producers that

could then be bought and sold.

Cap-and-trade plans such as the one proposed in New Mexico have been effective in reducing pollutants. Trading allows participants with lower abatement costs to overcomply and sell their unneeded permits to participants for whom abate costs are higher, thereby reducing the overall cost for achieving a given abatement goal. Cap and trade was used successfully to reduce acid rain in the 1990s. A cap-and-trade scheme called the European Union Emission Trading System remains a pillar of the European climate policy.

Under the New Mexico plan, large sources emitting more than 25,000 carbon-equivalent tons of greenhouse gas per year would be covered, mainly electric generating facilities, but also oil refineries, gas compressor stations and other miscellaneous sources. Here in Doña Ana County, at least two facilities are subject to the new rules – El Paso Electric's Rio Grande Plant and New Mexico State University. As of 2008, there were 63 facilities statewide that could be regulated.

The caps proposed are not particularly onerous. Initially, each producer would receive enough permits for current production. A small number of permits would be set aside for new production, up to 3 percent. Each year, the number of permits issued would be reduced by 2 percent.

The New Mexico proposal is part of a larger Western Climate Initiative to create a regional cap and trade system. The WCI consists of seven Western states and four Canadian provinces. New Mexico's plan won't kick in until sufficient other WCI programs have come on line to ensure a competitive market.

The big problem with the Richardson cap-and-trade proposal, indeed with any carbon abatement proposal, is the problem of leakage. That is, that production will migrate from regulated to unregulated jurisdictions so that, on net, there is no reduction in greenhouse gases. All that happens is that economic activity in New Mexico is less than it would have been otherwise. That means fewer jobs for New Mexico residents and more for other states.

Embedding New Mexico's cap and trade program within the WCI helps, but a regional cap and trade is still subject to leakages. The WCI, for example, does not include Oklahoma and Texas, two states that often compete with New Mexico for new businesses.

Electric generation is especially subject to leakage, as a kilowatt-hour produced anywhere in western North America is equivalent to every other kilowatt-hour produced in



western North America. If carbon trading increases the cost of electric generation in New Mexico, then production shifts from New Mexico to Oregon, or Baja California, or anywhere else to the West. Oil refineries are also sensitive to leakages. Should a cap-andtrade program raise the cost even slightly, New Mexico refineries will lose market share to out of state competitor.

The current status of the Richardson cap and trade proposal is uncertain. It has been placed on the agenda of the June 24 Environmental Improvement Board meeting, but the issue of whether or not the board has authority to impose cap and trade is currently before the courts.

The Kerry-Lieberman Bill now being considered before Congress includes cap and trade as part of a comprehensive climate policy. An integrated national program is less subject to leakages than would be a statebased program, although given our globalized economy, even a national program could lose business through leakage to less regulated nations. In the best of all worlds, we would have a global system like that envisioned in the Kyoto Accord. But a global policy isn't happening. A unilateral adoption of climate policy in New Mexico is no substitute.

Pending sales decline as closings increase

By all accounts, the recently expired New Homebuyer Tax Credit produced its intended result: additional home sales.

According to the Multiple Listing and Information Service (MLIS) arm of the Las Cruces Association of Realtors (LCAR), a total of 498 new and existing homes, townhomes and condominiums were sold between Jan. 1 and May 30 of this year. That number exceeds by 38 units, or 8.3 percent, the 460 homes sold during the first five months of 2009.

The number of closings continues to rise as buyers who contracted to purchase by the April 30 deadline now rush to close their transactions prior to the upcoming June 30 cutoff date. There's a fly in the ointment, however, that indicates the number of closed

sales will soon begin to decline.

The most accurate indicator of future closings is the Pending Sales Index. A sale is considered pending once the purchase agreement has been signed. It remains in that category until the transaction closes. Las Cruces-area pending sales peaked at 292 units during the second week in May, according to MLIS. Between May 14 and May 31, the number of newly minted contracts declined by 62 units, or 21.1 percent. By June 9, the number had dropped another eight units to

224. The decline will continue as we march	
toward June 30.	

The good news is the additional tax-credit closings are now hitting the books. MLIS reports that the 44 closings during the last week in May exceeded by 27 units, or 159 percent, the 17 closings reported the second week of April.

The steady decline in pending sales will result in a lower number of closed sales going forward. There may be a silver lining to this cloud, however, and that's our entry into our

"summer selling season."

Historically, around 56 to 57 percent of our annual sales take place during the spring and summer months. Will the increased activity generate enough new buyers to offset the reduced number of pending sales? Only time and the economy will tell. See you at closing.

NM submits insurance pool application

On June 1, the New Mexico Medical In-surance Pool (NMMIP) in cooperation with the New Mexico Human Services Department (HSD) submitted an application to contract with the federal government to operate a temporary federal high-risk insurance pool program in New Mexico. The new high-risk health insurance pools are designed to provide temporary insurance until 2014 for uninsured individuals denied insurance coverage due to pre-existing medical conditions. The pools are expected to open within 90 days and are part of the new health care reform law, which has allotted \$5 billion for them.

NMSU import system awarded

U.S. Food and Drug Administration inspectors have doubled the number of risky products they can find among the millions of imports arriving at U.S. ports each year, thanks to an innovative system developed at New Mexico State University with assistance from two small business consulting companies. An open house at NMSU Tuesday, June 15, will showcase the PREDICT project, which has earned a 2010 FDA Honor Award. The PREDICT (Predictive Risk-based Evaluation for Dynamic Import Compliance Targeting) system allows the FDA to focus inspections on the riskiest shipments of food, medicines, pharmaceuticals and vet-

erinary products, while speeding up entry for products that are safe. The FDA officially be-gan using PREDICT at the Port of Los Angeles in September 2009. The system is now also being used by the New York Import District and will be rolled out to all FDA import districts across the U.S. by the end of 2010.

Gas prices dropping

The average price for a gallon of unleaded regular gasoline dropped 1 cent in New Mexico and 2 cents nationally last week. That's the sixth consecutive week in a row, according to the AAA New Mexico Fuel Gauge Report. Motorists in New Mexico are paying \$2.70 and the national average is \$2.72. 

Dry spell stressing range EBID keeps water flowing, ups supply

Doña Ana County ranchers are watching the horizon for the summer monsoons to green up their ranges, but the Elephant Butte Irrigation District has been able to supply farmers with water as the hot and dry season continues.

The Mesilla Valley did not receive any rain during May, about a quarter-inch less than normal. The precipitation that could be measured since Jan. 1 is 1.64 inches, slightly above normal, according to the New Mexico State University Plant and Environmental Science Department.

Earlier this week, when the temperatures surpassed the 100-degree mark, EBID ditch riders were diverting about 126,500 acre-feet of water from canals into the farmers' fields to irrigate onions, alfalfa, pecans and cotton, said EBID water master Ricardo Bejarano.

The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service reported earlier that the March-July snowpack runoff in the Rio Grande at San Marcial above Elephant Butte Reservoir would be 480,000 acre-feet, about 80 percent of normal. This encouraged the EBID board of directors to increase the 2010 allocation from 1 to 2 acre-feet.

The U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, El Paso Field Office, also has granted the EBID

117,695 acre-feet of water for the irrigation season, or 49 percent of a full supply. The total storage for Elephant Butte and Caballo reservoirs is 614,050 acre-feet, compared with 586,760 acre-feet at the same time last year.

Tom Mobley, who ranches in the Las Uvas Mountains area, said his range received about 6 inches of rain from November 2008 to February 2009 that built up a good cover of grass.

There's still some green and protein in the grass," Mobley said. "And the cows are looking better at this time of year than I've seen in a long time.'

Tom Cooper, who runs his cattle west of Mobley in what is known as the Butterfield Trail Range, noted that his range needs the rain to green up the forage.

"We're ready for some rain," he said. "It's really been dry and hot for quite a stretch.

The Texas A&M Drought Watch, which is based in El Paso, reported the current precipitation that has been recorded for southern New Mexico at this time of year is normal. The annual precipitation average for this area is 8.5 inches, and most of the rain arrives from late June to early September, the Drought Watch reported.

The range conditions for the southwest part of the state are rated poor to fair, the USDA National Agricultural Statistic Service reported.





Collaborating by 'Chance' A new and unique multimedia experience By David Edwards dancers Katy Taylor and Carlos Saucedo dance

An extraordinary synergy will begin Friday, June 11, at the Black Box Theatre.

More than 100 dancers, musicians, filmmakers and visual artists will present a collaboration of artwork unlike anything ever seen in Las Cruces.

Directors Megan McQueen and Shannon Ellison solicited local composers and musicians for original musical compositions. They selected 16, including pieces by New Mexico State University graduate Justin Raines, local artist Bob Diven, along with lyricist Michael Cook and bluegrass performers Steve Smith and Chris Sanders.

The call went out for choreographers and filmmakers to create dances and videos inspired by the music. Visual artists were asked to create pieces based on the music as well.

But here's the catch. None of these three groups were aware of what the others were doing. The choreographers had no idea what the filmmakers were doing and vice-versa. The visual artists were also working independently.

The result was 16 films and 12 choreographed dances – four of the songs are video only – and numerous visual pieces. Visual artists display their work in the the atregallery in the lobby of the Black Box Theatre at the same time the films are screened and dances performed.

For example, "Seattle," by Mick Harris, will be represented in a film by Alicia Doyl while

dancers Katy Taylor and Carlos Saucedo dance Taylor's choreography. This particular dance is unique in another way as it was created using a "touch" technique. Taylor designed the dance using touch-based cues that begin each section, but the dance is improvisational until the next cue signals a change in the movement. So in a sense, it is almost new and different each time it is performed.

"The whole process has been pretty incredible," McQueen said. "Some of the similarities and themes that cropped up among the three areas were amazing." At last Sunday's rehearsal, McQueen was

At last Sunday's rehearsal, McQueen was meeting some of the dancers for the first time and was astonished to discover that one of the dances had been choreographed knowing only the title and length.

"Even the instrumental music had elements in film, dance and visual art that were reminiscent of each other. I think everyone has had a great time putting this all together," McQueen said.



El Patrón Café is 'the boss'

Serving comfy food is the goal

You gotta root for the "mom and pop" places. The little cafés that got their start because someone had a dream - or bought a stove.

El Patrón Café is not exactly "mom and pop" – it's more like "mom and son and daughter with pop helping out," but it still fits the bill of being a small place with big dreams.

It's a small place - seating about 20 to 25 customers, not counting a couple of outside tables. As I sat there, I just kept thinking how it felt like sitting in someone's kitchen. The windowsills had their knick-knacks and a shelf above held a couple of cookie jars. On a wall behind me hung an apron embroidered to indicate it belonged to "Grandma Rose" above the names of the grandkids whom I assumed were the givers. It just felt like home.

Scanning the menu, I found a variety of traditional Mexican dishes along with burgers, soup and salad. When I asked, as I always do, which was hotter, the red or the green, the server – who I would later discover was daughter Annette Tirre – declared the red hotter but described the green as more "comfy." I was also presented with a "special of the day" option – a burger known as "The Beast" with marinara sauce and mozzarella cheese. I would later learn it was "Italian Day," and lasagna was often on the menu.

So "comfy" would seem to be an

appropriate way to describe what mom (Rosella Tirre) and son (Patrick Tirre) are trying to create at El Patrón - comfort food of all types.

Patrick Tirre attended the School of Hotel, Restaurant and Tourism Management at New Mexico State University. He first took culinary classes in high school and did an internship at the then Hilton Hotel. He also worked at Sonoma Ranch's

for her family, inspired by her mom Anita Alvarez. Many of the recipes and items in the café belonged to her, including a recipe box and metal spice containers. Rose Tirre still makes her red chile sauce with a small home-size blender - and it shows.

Mom and son were actually inspired to start their own restaurant because they bought a stove. It sat in the back of pop Tirre's truck for a long time before the building at 1103 S. Solano Drive became available. The place was basically a shell, according to Patrick Tirre, and the family did all the re-decorating themselves. On June 13, they will have been open two months.

In addition to the regular menu, the daily offerings change quite a bit, in a rather free-form style, Rose Tirre explained. The chicken salad is becoming very popular, and they have a "crazy club" sandwich day that is getting raves.

Some days there is brisket on the menu, but you need to call ahead to make sure it's available. I bring this up because of the brisket nachos.

The legend goes that one day a collision occurred between a server carrying nachos and one with a brisket order. The exchange went something like this. "You got nachos in my brisket." "You got brisket in my nachos. Hey, it's delicious!'

Well ... let's just say that I wish I could have Mom Rose and Patrick Tirre make them for me every day. And don't get me started on the homemade cherry, lemon and pineapple-upside-down cake.

El Patrón touts itself as "the tiny place with BIG taste." That's big taste as in what you might find in mom's kitchen - made with love and care.


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

'The Ghost Writer' is intense and stylish Brosnan and McGregor head an excellent cast in taught thriller

"The Ghost Writer," while not a spooky story, is an intense thriller that does have its share of spooky and unsavory characters well played by the cast, which includes Pierce




"The Ghost" (Ewan McGregor) is hired to "write" the memoirs of a disgraced politician in "The Ghost Writer."

Tone and detail play important roles in the film, which opens with a mysterious body being found on the seashore one gray morning.

It turns out that it is the first author who had been hired to write the memoirs of Adam Lang, a disgraced and garish former prime minister (probably based on former PM Tony Blair) of England, who is trying to recover his life and reputation. As played by Brosnan, who I am now seeing as a rather underrated actor, Lang is part scalawag and all politics. He does not have a grasp on reality and is probably one of those who is so out of touch with the real world, he would get lost in the grocery store.





The search is soon on for someone to take the place of the mysteriously deceased "ghoster," and the interviewer happens upon McGregor's character, who is never given a true moniker. "The Ghost," who has an affection for the bottle, is not at all interested at first, since ghost writers never get the glory, bends his will when a multimillion dollar offer is made. Money, the hint of mystery attached to the seaside corpse and the unfinished manuscript eventually causes the writer to change his mind.

He is soon placed at the (hmmm ...) seaside villa of Lang, where he meets the staff – all of who are just that – staff. Gruff and businesslike, there are few friendships to be made here. Although there is one totally unnecessary bedroom scene, which is a distraction and adds nothing to the story.

Trips to the local pub in the evening allow the local wags to do what they do best – gossip and tip tall glasses of refreshing ale and shandys.

Then there is the issue of the original manuscript that the first writer was working on before his unfortunate demise. It is kept under lock and key, but The Ghost claims he needs it for his own work. Such is allowed, but only under careful supervision, and it becomes one of two key plot turns – the other concerns the U.S. government of recent past and their shenanigans and deceitful ways.

And that's all I'm going to tell you, except to watch for a wonderful cameo by veteran actor Eli Wallach, who plays a very sane oceanside hermit.

"The Ghost Writer" is a visual treat – all gloom and mystery. Lang's opulent seaside palace is awash in dark clouds. The characters are believable and appropriately cast for the film, and the direction and story are "par excellence." With some of the now 76-yearold Polanski's flair, and with fresh and exciting material, "The Ghost Writer" is a brilliant film and one of my favorites so far in 2010.

'Hachi' is no dog Film is captivating, simple

The CineMatinee movie for Saturday, June 12, is "Hachi: A Dog's Tale" (2009, 90 minutes, rated G). Based on a true story from Japan, "Hachi: A Dog's Tale" is a moving film about loyalty and the rare, invincible bonds that occasionally form almost instantaneously in the most unlikely places.

College professor Parker Wilson (Richard Gere) finds a young Akita puppy that's been abandoned at the local train station, and the dog instantly captivates him. Assuming the dog's owner will return to the train station to claim him in the morning, Parker takes the puppy home overnight. But when no one comes to get the dog, Parker convinces his wife Cate (Joan Allen) to welcome him as part of the family. He dubs the puppy Hachiko – Hachi, for short – because of the Japanese symbol for good luck that's hanging from his collar.

Hachi is a somewhat peculiar dog that refuses to learn to fetch or master other people-pleasing tricks, but he is a faithful companion and friend to Parker, alerting him of potential dangers and accompanying him to the train station each morning and meeting him there after his return trip each evening. An unforeseen event will continually test Hachi's devotion. This film is neither overwrought nor sappy; it is heartfelt and immensely powerful and believable.

'Greek' delivers jokes on a rock star schedule

Expect excess of sex, drugs and clichés

Over the life span of rock 'n' roll, the off-stage antics of rock stars have become more popular than their on-stage musical performances.

Many young adults from generation to generation experience that phase where the fast-paced, drug-infused and promiscuous rock star life seems more appealing than a 9-to-5 job. Movies such as "Almost Famous" enhanced that appeal in my youth – a young, innocent journalist befriends rock stars and becomes immersed in

their neurotic lives. "Get Him to the

Greek" follows suit with "Almost Famous," but perhaps the excess of profanity, drug use, vomiting and adulterous encounters in "Greek' shows that the rock star lifestyle isn't all it's cracked up to be.

"Greek" begins with English rock star Aldous Snow (Russell Brand) and his pop-star wife Jackie O (Rose Byrne), who are working on Snow's latest album "African Love Child." Through a montage of "Entertainment Tonight," "Access Hol-lywood" and "E! News

clips," we learn that "African Love Child" is one of the worst records ever made and as a result, Snow and Jackie break off their marriage

We then meet Aaron Green (Jonah Hill), a passive, but quirky employee at Pinnacle Records who leads a monotonous life at home with his doctor-girlfriend Daphne (Elisabeth Moss), who never can stop talking about sleep.

When asked by his record executive boss, Sergio Roma (Sean "P. Diddy" Combs), to come up with the next big idea, Green points

out the upcoming 10-year anniversary of Snow's best-selling live album at the Greek Theatre in Los Angeles. Green, an obvious fan of Snow, believes a modern reboot of the famed concert at the Greek will help the record company bounce back.

Green is charged with the task of bringing Snow from London to Los Angeles, with only three days remaining until the concert at the Greek. Sounds easy, right?

Once in London, Green finds that Snow thinks the concert is still two months away and


One day to go.



Getting people into houses USDA programs offer rural housing loan opportunities

USDA Rural Development introduced its homeownership loan programs to a group of Realtors Thursday, June 3, just one of the many ways it is improving the lives of those living in rural America.

Dedicated to improving the quality of life, the USDA is working to provide community members with safe, wellbuilt and affordable homes through its guaranteed and direct loans. These loans are geared toward low- to moderate-income families and individuals who live in rural areas.

"The whole intent of this is to get people into homes," said Art Garcia, pro-gram director for the state. "These are two great tools to help you make deals."

Guaranteed loan

The guaranteed loan program is designed to help those qualifying applicants who aren't able to receive a conventional loan without a guarantee. The loans are made with another lender, such as banks or credit unions, and are guaranteed by USDA Rural Development.

"We are working with the lenders you work with," Garcia said. "When you walk in with a USDA loan, 90 percent of their risk is covered."

With the loan, homebuyers don't have to pay money down or a primary mortgage insurance, which decreases their monthly payments. There also isn't a maximum purchase price, asset limit or reserve minimum.

"Anything connected to the home purchase or construction will be covered," Garcia said.

The loan, which has a 30-year fixed interest rate, is designed to work with the homebuyer, and Garcia said it has flexible credit guidelines and generous income limits that vary from county to county.

"For those who have a credit score less than 620," said USDA Area Specialist Liz Duran, "we look at nontraditional things, such as rent history, money in the bank, utilities paid over a year."

When compared to other loan programs, Garcia said "we will always be the lowest in terms of payments."

Along with the potential homeowner, the location of the property - which can be an existing, modular or manufactured home as well as townhome, condominium or half of a duplex - must meet USDA guidelines.

Once the homebuyer and location qualify, the process to getting the loan is very quick.

"It's very simple to do one of these loans," Garcia said. "There is only one extra piece of paper to fill out."

In addition to assuring lenders that their loans will be covered even if there is a default, Garcia said the loan program also makes sure those receiving the loans get the best deal, which includes interest

rate guidelines for the lenders.

"You don't have to worry about the client getting any outrageous interest charges," he said.

Lastly, Garcia said those who receive a guaranteed loan don't have to worry about recapture, exhausted funds or long closing time frames.

We do everything we can to keep you within your time frame," he said.

Direct loan

Unlike the guaranteed loan, the direct loan program is for low- and very lowincome families and individuals who are unable to get a loan from a bank or other conventional lending source.

Through the program, applicants re-ceive a loan directly from USDA, which Garcia said has one of the largest loan portfolios of all of the government agencies.

"This direct program is out of our office, not a bank," Garcia said.

As with the guaranteed loan, USDA will be flexible with those who don't meet the program's 640 credit score requirement by looking at different aspects of their finances.

"If they have had a foreclosure or filed bankruptcy, we won't look at a deal unless it was three years ago," Duran said.

Those who qualify for a direct loan must attend homebuver education classes provided by the Rural Development Housing Program.

"They have to have the classes before they close," Garcia said. "What we are doing is setting people up for successful homeownership."

Eligibility of guaranteed and direct loan applicants and property locations, which must be in a rural area classified by Rural Development, can be determined online at the USDA website, www. rurdev.usda.gov.





No-see-ums, also known as midges, deliver painful bites and typically feed in June and July.

Small no-see-um delivers huge bite

Insects known as midges attack under the cloak of darkness



We all know how fast time passes, but it's certainly not quick enough to escape the no-see-um.

You may have never seen one of these annoying pests, but it's almost guaranteed that you've felt them. They're the teeny tiny flies also called midges that deliver painful bites from beneath a cloak of invisibility – or so it seems. Residents who live in areas plagued by no-see-ums know it

can be nearly impossible to enjoy the outdoors without being eaten alive.

Female no-see-ums need blood meals to reproduce and typically feed in June and July. Municipalities typically debate at this time of year just what to do to avoid spraying often-ineffective chemicals in areas that may be environmentally sensitive.

Some remedies employ a carbon dioxide trap that lures no-see-ums and kills them. The University of Florida has had some success reducing midge populations in test areas in south Florida using this technique.

Other sprays, such as a synthetic or natural repellent derived from the chrysanthemum flower, are used as well as DEET sprays that kill mosquitoes, too. Make sure to carefully read all warnings if you are thinking about using these products.

One of the most effective ways to avoid no-see-ums is to stay inside at dawn and dusk or stay in an area enclosed in a very fine mesh or screening. Ceiling and window fans can be effective in keeping these weak fliers out of small areas. Don't wear perfumes or scents when outside. Help keep no-see-ums out of the yard by eliminating standing water when possible.

Court Youth Center feeds students with community garden

Since its inception in 2002, Alma d'arte Charter High School at the Court Youth Center (CYC), 402 W. Court Ave., has allowed students to find new and creative ways to artistically express themselves through forms such as painting and dance. Now gardening joins the list. In January, the high school, in collaboration

In January, the high school, in collaboration with CYC and AmeriCorps members, opened an edible community garden to educate students and community youth on the science of growing and the art of nature.

"I call it the gardening arts class," said AmeriCorps and After School Director Armena Taylor. "It's gardening with arts."

"We want to grow our culinary arts program and use the garden to provide them with produce and herbs," said Irene Oliver-Lewis, executive artistic producer of Alma d'arte Charter High School. "We're an art-based school. Every program has an art approach."

Taylor, a gardener, said she wanted to create a community garden at CYC for about seven years, and in 2002, before the high school was established, a small garden of native and ornamental plants was sown in the building's court yard.

After receiving funding from the City of Las Cruces and donations and consultation from Sierra Vista Growers, Taylor said everything came together last year, and they were able to add the edible garden across the street in an old apartment complex owned by the school.

"We transformed the apartment complex and area," Oliver-Lewis said. "The students are showing those in the community what you can do in an actual living situation."

With the help of Ameri-Corps artists Kelly Henderson and Karina Johnson, high school students have learned how to care for plants and the scientific aspect of maintain-

ing a garden, such as the role butterflies and birds play in pollination.

What began as a small cold-frame garden is now a large plot with a variety of heirloom vegetables, herbs and fruits not normally

found in the grocery store, such as purple and yellow carrots.

"Our goal was to produce as many vegetables as we could and herbs and anything else the students could take home and use," Johnson said. "We wanted to bring in a lot of varieties they haven't seen." With a large tree stump

With a large tree stump and flowerbed at its center, Johnson said the organic garden was divided into sections based on how much sun and shade each native plant variety needed. As the culinary and medicinal herbs reside between two buildings, the three sisters plot – made up of beans, corn and squash – is nestled beside the food orchard of peach, persimmon, pomegranate and plum trees.

"We want to do a food forest that will incorporate different types of plants with the trees, like shrubs and flowers," Johnson said.

Near the center of the garden are the vegetable beds, which currently include egg-

plant, bok choy and tomatoes, but will change every planting season. At the back of the lot is the bean trellis and a vine garden that features cucumber and more squash.

Wanting to involve all of the students, the

garden is decorated with murals created by the Community and Street Art class with the help of AmeriCorps artists. Students from the 'Zine class, a literary course, also created a colorful word-collage on the shed.

The almost 60 students who worked on the garden also created planters and art from recycled materials, including plastic bottles, soda cans, tires, toilets and reused railroad ties covered in plastic and burlap.

"We wanted to use as much recycled material as possible," Johnson said. "We wanted students to see that they can bring in anything from home and make a garden."

"We put art in once again to make it beautiful," Taylor said.

Since the creation of the garden, Johnson said she has noticed a difference in students' demeanors.

they put in the time and care.

"Several students have told us they have started a garden at home or now help their parents in the garden."

Taylor and Johnson said they have several long-term goals for the edible community garden, including expanding the plot and selling produce at the Las Cruces Farmers & Crafts Market.

"I want to see all of the classes and teachers involved in the garden," Johnson said.

"I really would like to work with other charter schools," Taylor said.

Oliver-Lewis said they would like to one day get members of the community more involved with the garden.

With such a successful first semester, the garden arts class will return in the fall, and during the summer, CYC is holding a gardening program for 10 middle school students.

"It's a great project," Johnson said. "It's been really great to work with the students."

Since Henderson is heading back to Ohio at the end of the month, Taylor said they are looking for a horticulturist AmeriCorps member. Anyone interested should call Taylor at 541-0145, ext. 103.

"It was a risky time to start from scratch,"

he said. "I thought I would get the knowledge a lot faster if I worked with someone with experience."

Lorenz soon met Rafael Veloz of Camino Real Homes and found the mentor for which he was looking.

Value and style

In 2007, Lorenz went to work for Camino Real Homes, which was established in 1999 by husband-and-wife team Rafael and Thelma Veloz, and was later renamed Veloz Homes in 2008.

Wanting to be as active in the company as possible, Lorenz worked to sell the spec and semi-custom homes and took every opportunity to learn from Rafael Veloz's years of experience.

"He helped me get my foot in the door," Lorenz said. "He has an incredible knowledge of homebuilding and business in general. He's taught me almost everything I know about this business."

By 2009, Lorenz was ready to expand his role in the company and became more involved in the administrative side of the operation.

"I brought an analytical approach to the company," he said. "It's helped during the struggling market conditions."



"You can see an evolution of our style.

"Most came into this business from the homebuilding side, not the real estate side. I have a little better understanding of what people ask for and want."

When he first began designing the homes, Lorenz said it was a melding of the old and new style, mixing Rafael Veloz's floor plan and his architectural designs.

"It was fun and neat to work on a house together," he said.

Lorenz said he spends his time at home, sitting on his couch, creating homes with computer-aided design software that reflect what he feels Las Crucens want and expect from a Veloz home.

"We don't miss any opportunity," he said. "A lot of the time, people do what is easy. We challenge ourselves to look for opportunities to be unique."

He said one way they do this is by adding extra framing for architectural details, so the walls aren't plain and flat.

"I try to give them a quality home at a good price with some unique style," he said.

Despite the challenges of handling multiple aspects of the company and staying busy in the slow housing market, Lorenz said seeing delighted customers, especially first-time homebuyers, makes his job very rewarding.

"First-time homeowners are so happy," he said. "Some of them are 22, some of them are 45. It's rewarding to see them achieve that.'

He added that first-time homeowners are usually more involved in the building process than those who have previously owned a home.

'They're on site every week," he said. "Every Saturday they're looking at the home. I like to meet them. I have a different relationship with them now than when I was selling. Then, I was first in line, carrying them through the process. Now, I'm behind the scenes.'

Lorenz said he is proud of what he has done in the home industry in such a short time and looks forward to continuing to expand the Veloz Homes' brand.

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

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

My next honey-do found me last weekend. While sitting at the breakfast table enjoying my second cup of coffee, I noticed that even though it was not quite 8 a.m., my chair seat was already getting a little sticky and a good sweat was starting on my upper lip. A few weeks earlier, the kitchen's east facing windows let in welcomed light and warmth to start the day, but now that same area felt like a heat-lamp warming tray at a fried chicken joint.

Exterior shading of a home's walls, windows and skylights in the summer is one the first and best ways to keep inside temps comfortable and save on the cooling bill. As I've discussed before, heat energy that never comes into the home does not have to be removed by expensive mechanical equipment. Interior blinds and shading work well for privacy and, to some extent, to prevent radiant heat loss in the winter.

In summer, interior shades are merely a road bump for the massive heat load penetrating window assemblies. The air at the space

excess heat

between the shade and the inside of the window quickly heats up (similar to a solar collector panel), and begins to rise and move creating a convective current. This heated air quickly moves up and away from the window and into the living space of your home - now your air conditioner has even more work to do. Exterior shading blocks this solar energy from ever contacting window glass or frames, and greatly reduces the radiant and convective heat load entering the home.

Effective exterior shading of west and east facing areas can be accomplished in many ways. Strategically placed trees and vegetation work great, but can take a few seasons for plantings to reach a size that will do the job. Arbors, patios and porches are often used to shade key exterior wall areas, but high installation costs can quickly come in to play.

With our beautiful mountain views, many Las Cruces homes are oriented facing east and west. This reduces the shading effect from patios and overhangs due to the low angle of the morning and



afternoon sun.

Exterior mounted solar screens are a great low-cost method of solving exterior window shading problems. Solar screens make a great do-it-yourself, honey-do project (I should know even more about it this weekend) - or you can use a local installer.

Solar screens come in many styles, types and colors. Mechanical retractable shades are hand or motor operated and can be raised or lowered quickly depending on daily or seasonal weather changes. Fixed solar screens look like and install similarly to typical insect screens. The key difference being that the solar screen material blocks up to 90 percent of the sun's energy.

In preparation for my project, I found there are some decisions to make. You can choose solar screen frames that match your existing window frames and house colors. The most commonly available are white, bronze and tan. The solar screen material itself is also available in a range of shades from white to tan and from charcoal to black. With these choices, you can either match the siding color of the home or choose to have a contrasting look - just keep in mind that the darker screen material (like charcoal or black) gives better visibility from inside to the exterior.

You can select from a range of shading coefficients - this is the percentage of solar heat gain that is transmitted to the interior through the glass and shading system to the interior. The lower the number, the less solar heat will enter your home and the lower your cooling bills will be.

Many of our local and big-box hardware stores carry solar screen

material and frame assembly components. Call ahead to see if they have the colors and types you need for your project. There are dozens of online sources that can supply DIY information and solar screen kits. You can build your own or take measurements and have them shipped to you pre-assembled.

Local window, shade and awning and remodeling contractors provide complete design, assembly and installation of solar screens - in case you don't have room on your honey-do list this summer.



El Paso Electric Co. also recog nizes the energy saving potential for exterior shading and offers a rebate for the installation of solar screens for its New Mexico service areas. The rebate is \$1 per square foot of solar screen installed at east or west facing windows. You can see the details at www.epesaver.com.

Lead training held **BIA-SNM** hosts required course

Due to increased demand, the Building Industry Association of Southern New Mexico, in partnership with Santa Fe Commu-nity College, will once again hold the "Lead Safety for Renovation, Repair and Painting Initial Training Course" from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday, June 29, at its office, 2825 N. Main St.

This course is being offered to association members for a discounted rate of \$300 per person. Non-members may register for \$350 per person.

Beginning in April, a new federal law based on the EPA's Renovation, Repair and Painting (RRP) Rule and HUD's Lead Safe Housing Rule took effect. This new law requires contractors who perform renovation, repairs and painting jobs in pre-1978 housing to become EPA Lead Certified Renovators. The new law also

applies to work done on facilities occupied by children. Fines issued for uncertified contractors are significant.

This course will provide the necessary training to meet the new federal requirement and teach safety in lead-based paint facilities. This course is primarily geared toward persons working in the fields of renovation, repair and painting. However, the course is also recommended to individuals working in social service organizations, state or municipal agencies and home inspection contractors. Anyone requiring this training is encouraged to attend.

The course is strictly limited to 30 participants. Registration forms are available online at www. biasnm.org or in person at the BIA-SNM office.

These colorful ties aren't just for bread bags

It's amazing that something as small as a twist tie can determine the longevity of your delicious loaf of bread.

A metal wire encased in a thin piece of paper or plastic, the twist tie is commonly used to secure the opening of bags. Invented by California-based packaging company T and T industries in 1939, the bendy stick comes in a variety of colors, sizes and strengths.

Despite its traditional use, twist ties can be used in several different ways around the house.

1. Organize electrical cords: Keep your entertainment center or computer desk clutter free with the help of twist ties. Twist unruly electrical cords together and bind them with several ties, placed about 2 inches apart. If you encounter an oversized cord, use a twist tie to secure the excess material.

2. Give your plants something to climb: Allow the vines of climbing annuals to grow vertically by creating a trellis out of twist ties and old six-pack plastic rings. Attach the twist ties to the holes of the plastic ring. Staple or nail the rings to a fence, then wrap the ties around vines. As the plant matures, it will climb up the fence, creating a cascade of leaves and flowers.

3. Hold up your plants: If your tomato plants are looking

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a little droopy, give them new strength with twist ties. Secure the long stems of tomatoes or other plants by using the ties to attach them to a post or chicken wire. Don't tie the twisties too tight, because they can damage the stem and restrict growth.

4. Repair a busted eyeglass: Say your reading glasses lose a screw, causing the arm to fall off, what will you do? Instead of rushing to get the eyeglasses repaired or trying to live without clear eyesight, fix it with a twist tie. Trim the edges off the tie so you're left with only the center wire. Weave it through the small screw hole and tie it off. Cut off the excess wire so you don't scratch vourself.

5. Create a shoelace: The next time your shoelace breaks and you're left without a way to hold your shoe together, grab some twist ties. Use one twist tie across each opposing pair of eyelets. Your shoes will stay on your feet while you make an interesting fashion statement.

6. Hang Christmas tree ornaments: When it comes time to trim your Christmas tree in December, forget commercially bought hooks and hang your decorations with twist ties. Wrap the tie around the ornament's hole and secure it to the tree. For heavier ornaments, use more than one twist tie.

7. Track your keys: If you have a bundle of keys that look similar, make each one stand out with the help of twist ties. Using different color ties, loop a twisty through the hole of the keys. The next time you need to quickly unlock your front door, you can go straight for the key with the blue twisty instead of fumbling through your entire key ring. **8. Keep loose-leaf paper together:** Organize stacks of paper with the help of twist ties. Wrap the tie around the top hole of

the papers. This will not only keep the loose-leaf paper in order, it will also make the pages easier to flip through.

Fun with bruschetta Hearty snack gets new and spicy life

Brus'ketta, the Italian pronunciation for bruschetta, is an appetizer from central Italy that dates back to the 15th century.

According to food writer Sharon Herbst, bruschetta comes from the Italian word bruscare, meaning "to roast over coals." This tasty, crunchy bite is prepared with toasted bread rubbed with garlic cloves, brushed or drizzled with extra virgin oil and then heated and served warm.

In Italy, the bread is grilled using a brustolina, a gadget that fits over a gas burner. Common toppings are tomatoes and freshly chopped basil. But more recently, the list has grown to include beans, cured meat, chicken, cheese and veggies, such as chile pepper.

I like it with corn kernels and cooked spinach crowned with a blast of shredded habanero cheese. Use your imagination. It's easy to prepare and is always a hit at gatherings. Goda di! (Enjoy!)

How to prepare the bread

Use bread with a thick crust, such as baguette, French bread or hard rolls.

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Slice bread on a diagonal into 1/2-inch pieces. Brush one side of each slice with garlic and olive oil. Place oily side down on a baking sheet. Bake for 10 to 12 minutes or until crispy. Serve on a platter with favorite toppings.

Tomato-Onion Bruschetta Sauce Recipe

1 cup tomatoes, diced

1/2 cup onion, diced

2 tablespoons olive oil 1 tablespoon balsamic vinegar

1 teaspoon basil

Roasted green chile slab, for garnish

Mix together and garnish with green chile. Makes 2 servings.

Zippy Bruschetta Sauce Recipe

1 (14 1/4-ounce) can diced tomatoes

- 5 tablespoons red wine
- 1/2 onion, chopped
- 5 Kalamata olives, pitted and sliced in half 2 tablespoons fresh basil, chopped
- 1 to 2 teaspoons cayenne pepper
- 1 teaspoon freshly ground pepper 1/2 teaspoon Hungarian paprika
- 2 teaspoons oregano, preferably fresh
- 4 garlic cloves, minced or pressed

Pour the diced tomato in a nonstick pan, cover and cook over medium heat. Prepare onion, cloves, olives and basil and set aside.

Add red wine to tomato. Stir, adding the chopped onions. Cook until the onions are transparent.

Add remaining ingredients except garlic. Stir over medium heat until sauce reduces. Add garlic (pressed is best). Cook an additional 5 minutes. Serve warm or chilled. Makes 6 servings.

Tomato Feta Olive Sauce

1/4 cup basil

1/3 cup Kalamata olives, chopped2 tablespoons red onion, finely chopped 1/3 cup feta cheese , chopped 2 tablespoons olive oil 1 (28-ounce) can plum tomatoes 1 chile de arbol, crushed Kosher salt Coarse pepper

Mix all in bowl; serve at room temperature. Keeps well in fridge for four to five days. Makes about 6 servings. Note: Ingredients can be adjusted to taste.

Tomato Bruschetta Hot Sauce

2 large, ripe tomatoes, finely chopped 3 tablespoons capers 3 tablespoons fresh parsley, chopped

1 1/2 tablespoons scallions, chopped 1 teaspoon balsamic vinegar 2 teaspoons or more bottled hot sauce Salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste French baguette 1/4 to 1/2 cup olive oil

3 medium garlic cloves, minced

Combine tomatoes, capers, parsley, scallions, vinegar and hot sauce in a medium bowl. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Taste and adjust seasoning. Allow the flavors to blend for 15 minutes.

Cut the bread into 22 1/4-inch thick ovals. Heat olive oil on low in a large skillet. Sauté garlic for 1 minute, then toast bread on the grill. Arrange tomato mixture on top of the bread and serve immediately. Makes 22 appetizers. Spinach-Basil **Bruschetta Topping**

2 tablespoons fresh basil leaves, chopped





Bruschetta sauce makes a tasty appetizer or a hearty snack.

1 can (14 1/2-ounce) diced tomatoes, drained

2 tablespoons spinach leaves, chopped

1 tablespoon extra virgin olive oil

1 clove garlic, finely chopped

16 (1/2-inch thick) baguette slices, toasted Habanero shredded cheese

Stir together tomatoes, basil, spinach, olive oil and garlic.

Spoon mixture onto toasted bread slices. Top with shredded habanero cheese or other favorite chile pepper cheese. Serve immedi-ately. Makes 16 appetizers

Bruschetta Serrano Sauce for One

5 tomatoes 2 basil leaves 1 serrano pepper, minced

1/4 tablespoon olive oil 2 cloves garlic Salt and pepper

Cut the tomato in slices and then each slice in four pieces. Put all of the tomato in a pot with just a bit of water, salt, pepper and two raw, unchopped garlic cloves. Slow cook until tomato looks overcooked. Remove pot from stove and mix with chopped basil, minced serrano and olive oil. Spread on bread.

Enchanting **Bruschetta Sauce**

1 pound tomatoes, chopped

- 1/2 cup red onion, chopped 1/2 cup pitted and quartered brined
- olives, such as Kalamata 1/4 cup sweet marjoram leaves,
- finely chopped

1/2 cup Italian parsley sprigs, finely chopped 2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper 1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil Tia Rita's Red Chile Pepper Seasoning Salt to taste

In a mixing bowl, combine tomatoes (and their juice and seeds), onion, olives, marjoram, parsley, vinegar, pepper and oil. Cover and allow to rest at room temperature for up to two hours. Add chile pepper seasoning salt to taste. Serve with bruschetta. Makes 3 1/2 cups.

To make bruschetta, slice a loaf of French bread diagonally into 1/2-inch slices, discarding ends. Brush lightly with olive oil. Bake at 375 degrees for five to six minutes, or until lightly browned.

It's worth the extra effort Kitchen remodel can help sell a home later

I just met with a couple that wants to remodel their kitchen. They need to update its look without investing a lot of money. They are at the start of a 10-year plan to remain in their current home. At that point in time, they will retire and move to another location.

Many questions arise as to what they really should want



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Tim Sneed Casey Carpet of Las Cruces, Inc. to achieve before a plan can be put together. Here are some things to help them (and you) maximize your investment in this situation; things to ask yourself before you start your remodeling project:

First, am I crazy? (Just kidding.) What are your priorities? It should take six to 12 months to really analyze your needs. Be sure to really think it through so you don't change your mind during construction. It is costly to tear out and re-do, and it plays havoc with your budget.

Think and study how you use your kitchen. Do you need a place for two people to work in food preparation? If you have children, they must be part of the plan. Smaller children mean avoiding sharp corners on countertops and storage that can be used for things children may use.

Next, consider keeping the same "footprint" for your remodeled kitchen. You will save lots of money if you don't need to rearrange walls.

The clients I am working with on this project are going beyond this and tearing out a wall that is currently between the kitchen and dining room. By opening up the space between the kitchen and dining room, we will be able to add a bar area with barstools. Since we are removing a wall and not building one, the cost will be kept to a min Be sure to really think it through so you don't change your mind during construction.

ing one, the cost will be kept to a minimum. Next, plan your lighting well in advance and determine what

electrical work will be necessary to accomplish your needs. You'll want "task" lighting over the sink and/or food prep area. If you have the old recessed fluorescent fixtures you will need to add new recessed can lighting, track lighting or pendant lighting over the bar. Ambient lighting can be added with rope lights above the cabinets and dimmer switches for mood.

Add storage, not space. In our current project, we are removing a 36-inch lower and upper cabinet, which allows us to add a pantry closet. You can store a lot more in a pantry than you can in the cabinets we're removing. We had enough counter space that we didn't run short because of removing the cabinets.

Match appliances to your needs and your skill level. Don't over-invest in a six burner professional range if you go out to eat most of the time. Save thousands of dollars with trusted brands by checking out Consumer Reports or www.epinions. com. The newest microwave unit is the below counter microwave by Sharp. See it on www.sharpusa.com; you may find it hard to live without.

Focus on durability and functionality. Look for low maintenance and long warranty periods. Granite is a good example. It looks great, costs more than laminate or tile, but has lasting beauty. Ten years down the road, it will still be beautiful and desirable. If you do have plans to sell your house at some point, it can be an advantage when you put your house up for sale.

it can be an advantage when you put your house up for sale. Finally, seek some professional help. Good planning will save money and assure you get the kitchen you want. Being able to communicate your wants and needs will go a long way in making the remodeled kitchen affordable and efficient.

People invest more money on kitchen remodeling than any other home improvement project – and with good reason. The kitchen is the hub of your home. It's the No. 1 reason someone may buy your house. It should be designed to satisfy you and any future buyer. It's worth real planning.
