

New Arizona bill spurring controversy

Issue could be key to election races

When candidates began campaigning, immigration was a "back burner" issue, compared to pressing concerns of the economy and government corruption.

But Arizona's new immigration law changed that, and political observers believe it will become a dominant issue by November as the debates heat up over the summer.

Concerns about immigration - coupled with fear that violence is spilling over the U.S.-Mexico border - gave Republican gubernatorial candidate Susana Martinez an issue that helped put her over the top in the primary election. Her stance against illegal immigration amnesty and her opposition to the state allowing illegal immigrants to hold driver's licenses were key features of her television ads.

And Martinez's position is one that clearly distinguishes her from the Democratic candidate, Lt. Gov. Diane Denish. That difference also illustrates how divisive an issue it is, especially in New Mexico where many immigrant families maintain close ties to Mexico.

Martinez's campaign manager Adam Deguire has been quoted about her support of any state that takes actions to protect its citizens.

Though Denish says she doesn't sup-port giving driver's licenses to illegal immigrants and would like tighter restrictions to prevent fraud, she's not calling for a repeal of the driver's license law.

Based on evidence that suggests the law has not worked as intended, the law needs to change," Denish said in a written statement. "As governor, I would approach the law with a thoughtful discussion that focuses on fact - not ideology, fear and divisive rhetoric."

Denish told NMPolitics.net in April that "our immigration laws are broken and that we must do more to secure our borders, but racial profiling is wrong -

Susana Martinez started her gubernatorial run as an underdog, but after Tuesday's resounding victory for the Republican nomination, she is now a legitimate threat to Lt. Gov. Diane Denish's ascension to the governor's office.

As one of five GOP candidates, Martinez won over 61,636 GOP voters from around the state, amounting to a little more than 50 percent of the vote and almost double the number of votes for former party chairman Allen Weh, who came in second.

No other Republican came as close, despite interesting pedigrees. Doug Turner, who tried to evoke the maverick spirit of former Gov. Gary Johnson, came in third, with a little more than 14,000 votes. Pete Domenici Jr., the son of the longtime retired U.S. senator, came in fourth with 8,559 votes and state Rep. Janice Arnold-Jones, an open government advocate, only garnered 3,706 votes.

Before an enthusiastic crowd in the ballrooms at Hotel Encanto de Las Cruces on election night, Martinez quickly thanked Weh for running a spirited contest, asked for party unity and immediately began making her argument against Denish.

Martinez's strategy is to attach Denish to Gov. Bill Richardson's administration that has become marred by pay-to-play corruption, questionable spending - especially in high salaries for a large number of political appointees and risky management that is suffering from the bite of economic hard times.

For seven-and-a-half years, Denish didn't fight Richardson's abuses of power, Martinez said, and only now is speaking out. Denish has been a "good little soldier" for Richardson and his policies that she characterized as failed.

"Diane Denish has earned a pink slip, and not a promotion," Martinez told the crowd.

She reminded the faithful that one of the first actions by Richardson was to get voters to approve taking more money out of the state's permanent fund under the pretext of improving education. Seven years later, New Mexico remains among the bottom rung of states in

Letters to the Editor Proposed exotic pet rules are ominous

The New Mexico Department of Game and Fish (NMDGF) is sharply restricting most types of pets you may own. For now, they are leaving dogs, cats and hamsters alone (leave them to city ordinances), but your rights to have aquarium fish, birds, reptiles and amphibians are disappearing fast. You must act now to keep the government out of your home. The proposed new rules by the NMDGF (www.wildlife.state.nm.us/ documents/ProposedImportationrule2010.htm) are slated to take effect in July. The deadline for public comment is Friday, June 4. To comment, send an email to letitia.mee@state.nm.us.

NMDGF has listed more than 500 species of fresh and salt water aquarium fish (including all tetras and angelfish), crabs and sea animals that would require a permit to own. Parakeets, macaws and parrots are already outlawed under CITES rules (Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species) even though few are endangered.

Chickens are OK, but ducks and geese would have to be licensed. Most reptiles and amphibians are restricted. The procedures to get a pet permit are so difficult and expensive that they amount to pure harassment. The permit costs \$25, but the application requires a "containment or confinement plan" and a "current and valid certificate from an accredited veterinarian" that the animal is in good health and disease free. You have to prove that your animal does not have the "immediate potential to carry infectious or contagious diseases" and that you will notify NMDGF "within 24 hours of any disease indications."

On the face of it, these rules are utterly impossible to follow. Pet shops will lose jobs and income. Exotic bird shops will be forced out of business. The plan will indeed raise lots of money for the department (out of your pockets), but it is hard to see how Game and Fish could actually implement their plan: they do not have the resources or expertise to operate a 24hour reporting system.

Game and Fish are operating under the guise that all exotic and non-native species are bad and that all-wise Big Brother is the sole protector of our precious environment. They claim to be protecting us from non-native and invasive species.

The irony is that they themselves have introduced into the state at least 27 species of nonindigenous fish, amphibians and hoofed animals that have become very widespread.

They claim to be protecting our native wildlife from diseases, but how can they guarantee that their own fish vendors will not introduce whirling disease or chytrid fungus in some of their fish? The scale of their operations makes the individual contribution totally insignificant. How many pet owners will be forced out of the state by these rules? How many people will not come here under these rules? How many jobs will be lost?

I suggest that this bureaucracy needs their funds cut to keep them out of mischief – let them stick with hunting and fishing licenses.

There's an old saying that you shouldn't argue with someone who buys their ink by the barrel. And then there are matters of principle. I choose the latter.

On May 26, I received a telephone call from the Las Cruces Sun-News asking that I place a legal advertisement with it listing the Primary Day polling places and candidates. I declined this request because I had already published this legally required notice in the Las Cruces Bulletin and I would not publish the same information twice in light of the cost involved.

The very next day, in a May 27 editorial, the Las Cruces Sun-News reprimanded me for declining – and I quote – "to officially inform Sun-News readers as to the location of their local polling places for Tuesday's Primary Election. Mr. Ellins claims it costs too much to use taxpayer dollars to publish this government mandated information despite the fact that the cost is set by the state of New Mexico."

Having made the accusation that I broke the law, the editorial then concluded with a rhetorical question: "Indeed, how do you put a price on Democracy?"

I wrote back to the Sun-News, asking it to immediately publish my response to this

offensive and inaccurate characterization of my conduct – namely that I was derelict in my duty to follow state law. To date, my response has not been published. And so, I write this letter to the Bulletin in the hope that it will be kind enough to present my side of the story.

Obviously, the Sun-News omitted the fact that polling place locations and candidates were printed as governmentally mandated, but just in another local newspaper of general circulation, the Las Cruces Bulletin. And clearly, I was not about to print the same information twice, just because the Sun-News wanted the advertising revenue.

As a matter of fairness, it has been the long-standing practice of this office to allocate advertising to both of Doña Ana County's general-circulation newspapers. I think it's both ethical and neighborly to share the wealth as it pertains to legally-mandated advertising.

In the final analysis, the Sun-News' pique is not about any failure by me or my office to officially and legally keep the public informed, but about the money it didn't receive.

National Trails Day: Walking to better health and America's beauty A reflection after hiking on the Appalachian Trail

I just had an amazing time hiking a section of the Appalachian Trail located on the East Coast.

In the past, I have hiked sections of the Continental Divide National Scenic Trail (CDT) and others across the United States. As I reflect upon my recent experience, memories of my youth return from the times I adventured into vast forests and feeling overwhelmed when sighting wildlife, hearing bubbling brooks, admiring the exotic beauty of wildflowers and picking delicious wild berries.

Richard Louv, author of "Last Child in the Woods," writes of saving our children from "nature-deficit disorder" by participating with them in nature adventures that will leave them with lifelong memories as well as good habits. Trails allow children to do what they do best, learn and play and expend youthful energy. Trails can also help adults to increase that special bond with our senior parents, grandparents, cousins, uncles and aunts.

We older folks may have gradually become sedentary and grown distant from the nature we enjoyed as children. We can, and should, revisit those delights and make new memories of walking through forests, mountains or deserts, hearing the soothing sounds of a stream, serendipitously coming upon wild animals or marveling at a mountaintop vista. Continuing a link with nature by walking a trail is a lifelong enjoyment that leads us to wonderful destinations: the possibility of increased health and longevity and enhanced relationships.

While modern medicine may offer longevity to those with sedentary lifestyles, it comes with a high cost. People tend to rationalize their sedentary lifestyle, not realizing it leads to a decreased quality of life. Hiking trails is low-cost recreation that not only provides a link with nature, but is a form of meditation and a way to reconnect with loved ones.

The outdoors is a source of vitamin D (necessary for strong bones). Trails force us to use our bodies for what they were designed: physical activity and the burning of calories. Hiking trails is exercise and exercise may be one of the most important predictors of how long and how well we live our life.

We owe it to our children, our family, our friends and ourselves to spend more time outdoors enjoying the healthy recreation offered by trails.

The couch potato lifestyle - TV watching, Internet surfing, video game playing - all are disincentives of physical activity. Walking on the other hand, helps to increase the heart rate, build muscle tissue and, of course, burn calories. A sedentary lifestyle promotes heart disease, obesity, diabetes and bone disease, to name a few.

In today's world of too much to do in not enough time, some choose to exercise indoors by mall walking or using commercial or home gyms. Such activity is good for our health, but it does not link us to nature or foster relationships with family and friends as we walk a trail with them.

I want to conclude with a statement of appreciation for prior American leaders who envisioned the need for trails to conserve land areas and provide us recreational opportunities. In 1978, the National Trails System Act was amended to include a trail that would traverse the backbone of America. To this day, the Continental Divide Trail captures the grandeur of the Rocky Mountains and has garnered world recognition for its incredible scenery, challenging landscape, rich history and unique recreation opportunities.

When finished, the CDT will stretch 790 miles in New Mexico, the longest section compared to the other states it traverses to the north. Hiking even a short section of it leaves me feeling at peace, inspired and physically and spiritually renewed; after all, it accesses some of the most wild and scenic places left in the world, while conserving the environment and promoting a healthy lifestyle.

New Mexicans should be proud of this new national scenic trail and all it has to offer so please join me in celebrating National Trails Day Saturday, June 5.

Let's go for a hike on Trails Day.

The youths loaded the care packages with magazines and books, paper and pens, snacks, toothpaste, shampoos, tissues, gum, cookies, decks of cards and games.

"Without everyone's participation we would not have been able to send as many packages as we did," Gallegos said. "This is the second year we have completed this project, and we hope to send even more packages during the next year."

The donated items were held in the office of Jeff Witte, director of the New Mexico State University Agriculture Biological Service, and the Doña Ana County Extension Office until they were shipped to the 2nd Engineer Battalion.

Lt. Gov. Diane Denish was also recognized as a "Budget Bulldog" who, along with Cervantes and Nuñez, was honored in Albuquerque for responsible fiscal policies and supporting New Mexico's small businesses. Denish, Cervantes and Nuñez were applauded for their efforts to promote private-sector jobs creation through state tax policies.

"As a small business owner, I share the chamber's efforts to restore a balance between our fiscal policies and spending priorities, and to build our state economy upon stable, highpaying jobs," Cervantes said.

Flight turned hazardous

The Las Cruces Fire Department responded to a single-engine plane crash near the Las Cruces International Airport just after 3 p.m. Sunday, May 30.

Emergency medical services were provided to three people in the plane crash – a pilot and two passengers. They were able to walk several hundred feet to the airport terminal from the crash site, located just southwest of the airport. The pilot of the late-model Cessna sustained trauma to his head and had to be flown out to a nearby trauma hospital by Southwest Medi-Vac. The other two passengers received medical treatment.

According to sources, the aircraft was unable to maintain the speed necessary to sustain altitude shortly after leaving Runway 26. The experienced pilot was able to turn the aircraft around and attempted to make an emergency landing in an empty lot before crashing into a fence and a sand berm in the desert. The pilot was reported to be the general manager of Adventure Aviation. He was taking family members for a sight-seeing trip when the crash occurred.

The plane sustained heavy damage from the crash and firefighters contained a small fuel spill coming from the plane.



NMSU gets high-tech microscope

The National Science Foundation awarded New Mexico State University with a Major Research Instrumentation grant to purchase a highly sophisticated optical imaging microscope.

The laser scanning confocal microscope will boost research efforts with its expanded capabilities and allow NMSU to broaden research and teaching capacities for faculty, graduate and undergraduate students.

When a specimen is examined on any microscope, it is illuminated for higher visibility. During this process there is a fair amount of scattered light, but the confocal microscope removes the out-of-focus light.

"It's also a problem when the tissue sample is too thick and we need to slice it. This microscope allows us to optically section it to look at the volume of the sample; the imaging is much more quantitative," said NMSU Biology assistant professor Jennifer Curtiss, principal investigator on the grant proposal. "We can also look at live tissue in real time."

That live cell imaging is another one of the confocal microscope's major capabilities and will be useful in the lab exercise on fruit fly eyes.

Several departments in different colleges at NMSU worked to acquire the funding for the grant including co-principal investigators Charles Brad Shuster, Michele Nishiguchi and Elba Serrano within biology, departments in the College of Engineering, departments in the College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences, and Laura Haas and Sudha Murthy in the office of the vice president for research.

Those departments wrote letters to be included in the grant proposal detailing the diverse needs and uses NMSU has for this type of instrument.

They will use the microscope and laboratory for their individual research purposes; it will be housed in the Electron Microscopy Laboratory (EML) in Skeen Hall.

Laboratory manager and co-PI on the grant Peter Cooke will oversee the microscope's operations for the different groups that will be using it and adjust the instrument accordingly.

"This is really a new and maturing technology for research for the university, it's state of the art," Cooke said. "The integrated imaging is a modern effort where different types of images come together to give a fuller image of the samples."

The EML currently houses an older version of the confocal microscope that was new at the time of acquisition in 1999. It won't go to waste though – that instrument will go to Jessica Houston in the chemical engineering department.

academic performance, she said.

Martinez's nomination secures the historic nature of the November general election. Whether it's Denish or Martinez, New Mexico will have its first woman governor at the start of 2011.

Besides this race becoming only the third woman-against-woman gubernatorial general election race in U.S. history, Republicans made it even more historic by nominating an all-Hispanic ticket, by pairing Martinez with John Sanchez, the 2002 GOP candidate for governor. Sanchez beat out two other Anglo GOP males to be Martinez's running mate for lieutenant governor.

And recent history also is working for Martinez. Since 1983, the person sitting in the governor's office has alternated between Democrat and Republican for the last five office-holders, despite the Democratic Party's predominance in the state.

Momentum is currently with Martinez, with her campaign eroding Denish's 19-point lead to a dead heat in recent polling.

In her victory speech, Martinez made it clear she was going to campaign on cleaning up state government and tarring Denish with the blemishes of the Richardson administration.

"We are saying no to the status quo," she said. "We are saying no to the corruption that has deprived New Mexico of the integrity it deserves."

Denish and the Democrats are already firing back, questioning her record as Doña Ana County's district attorney and criticizing her willingness to accept donations from ultra-conservatives.

Meanwhile, Denish learned that her run-

ning mate will be Brian Colón – the former state Democratic Party chairman – beating Lawrence Rael by more than 5,000 votes in a five-candidate field for lieutenant governor.

Republicans at the Martinez rally were ready to take on Denish. Ray Storment, a former county sheriff who is now running for magistrate judge, said he heard that Denish had dismissed Martinez as a relatively unknown prosecuting district attorney from southern New Mexico.

"I wonder what she thinks about that little ol' DA from the south, now?" he said.

State Land Office race

In another crowded race, Ray Powell beat both Harry Montoya of Santa Fe and Public Regulation Commissioner Sandy Jones to win the Democratic nomination for state Land commissioner. Powell, who was the state land commissioner from 1993 to 2002, won the nomination with a little more than 48,000 votes, beating Montoya by more than 4,000 votes and Jones by more than 18,000 votes.

In November, Powell faces Republican Matt Rush who soundly beat Bob Cornelius.

Public Regulation Commission

In the only real surprise of the primary election, Ben Hall, a former legislator from Ruidoso, won the Republican nomination for the District 5 seat of the state Public Regulation Commission (PRC), despite a heated contest between Las Crucens

Jamie Estrada and Kent Evans, a former county commissioner. In November, Hall

will face Democrat Bill McCamley, also a former Doña Ana County commissioner.

In District 2, State Land Commissioner Patrick Lyons beat Robert Corn and will

face Democrat Stephanie Dubois in the gen-

eral election.

Other races

State Rep. Andy Nuñez, D-Hatch, survived two Democratic challengers, but still faces Republican Debra White in the general elec-

plain and simple - and the new Arizona law goes too far."

That the Arizona law – which requires police during lawful stops to inquire about immigration status when there is "reasonable suspicion" of illegal entry - could lead to racial profiling is what's driving much of the opposition.

During the recent state convention for the League of United Latin American Citizens held in Las Cruces, leaders called a press conference denouncing the law, calling it racist because they believe those suspected of illegal entry would be almost exclusively Hispanic.

The debate has even reached local government. Las Cruces Mayor Ken Miyagishima had proposed passing a resolution against the Arizona bill, but pulled it after he said he learned more about how the law would be applied.

That prompted City Hall protests at the May 17 City Council meeting, during which Neil Hardirector of New Mexico vev – State University's Center for Latin America and Border Studies urged the council to go forward with the resolution. Harvey, who noted he was speaking as a resident and not on behalf of NMSU, said the Arizona law makes the mistake of linking crime to immigration and that it will inevitably create less security because immigrants will be less likely to trust local law enforcement.

Several NMSU staff members accompanying Harvey spoke to the council about the city's diversity and how undocumented residents would be driven further into the shadows without true immigration reform.

Miyagishima said he originally proposed the resolution because he heard that New Mexico driver's licenses wouldn't be accepted as proof of citizenship for residents traveling to Arizona. He said he later learned that wasn't the case and withdrew the resolution.

That question became the sticking point for County Commissioner Karen Perez when she became the lone vote against a similar resolution condemning the Arizona law. Perez said she couldn't vote for the resolution because it included inaccurate language about the New Mexico driver's license issue.

Las Cruces City Councillor Olga Pedroza said she would still like to see the city take a stand on the Arizona law. She said immigration and border security are complex issues and "to blame the migrant is a big mistake."

She said most of those in favor of the Arizona law are doing so out of fear and misinformation. Pedroza said it reminded her of past immigration disputes.

Councillor Dolores Connor said she falls on the other side of the debate, but expressed concern that the council jumped into the debate too soon and caused upset in the community. Connor said federal immigration reform action is needed to resolve the issue.

Ron Camuñez, a local resident from a longtime family in the area, said the city is surrounded by border checkpoints and people have to have identification to get through those.

But New Mexico is different than Texas, as was explored in a recent New York Times report. It noted that the New Mexico House of Representatives unanimously was passing a resolution recognizing economic benefits of illegal immigrants in response to the Arizona law.

The article said that even New Mexican supporters of the Arizona law don't believe that such a measure ever would pass in their state because of the concern about it leading to racial profiling. Reasons the story gave for that difference included New Mexico having the highest percentage of Hispanics of any state - 45 percent compared to 30 percent in Arizona – with more Hispanics holding political power. Also, it noted the state constitution protects Spanish-speaking citizens.

That same report quoted Steve Wilmeth, a cattle rancher near Las Cruces, 30 miles north of the border. Wilmeth said he was frustrated with illegal immigrants crossing his property and supports the Arizona law, which he said "is a desperate attempt by the people of Arizona to do something about the onslaught they face."

As the debate continues over the summer, the Las Cruces Bulletin will cover both sides of the issue - from planned panel discussions at NMSU to visiting with ranchers who live in the southern part of Doña Ana County. And the Bulletin will regularly be running what local residents think about the Arizona law - see page A16.

Following an uncontested democratic primary election, Lt. Gov. Diane Denish kicked off her bid for governor alongside Democratic lieutenant governor nominee Brian Colon Wednesday, June 2, in Mesilla.

Denish appeared before a crowd of supporters at the historic Mesilla Plaza, which included Las Cruces Mayor Ken Miyagishima, state Sen. Mary Kay Papen and Mesilla Mayor Nora Barraza. Denish said she was excited to finally get to the general election and that she can now set her résumé straight for the record.

"(New Mexico families) want a different kind of governor who will fight hard for what New Mexico families care about. And you know what they say? They say, 'How do we know you'll be a different kind of governor?"" Denish said. "Here is what I say, 'I've been a different kind of lieutenant governor."

Denish said the issues she hopes to focus on for the upcoming election are job creation, bettering the education system and eliminating predatory lenders from New Mexico.

"I know New Mexico," Denish said, referring to her constant travel across the state while she has been lieutenant governor.



The lieutenant governor addressed her Republican opponent's record, saying that Martinez may talk a lot about job creation in New Mexico, but it has been Denish who has had her "head down, doing the hard work and getting the job done.' Denish also addressed Martinez's plea bargaining record with felony DWI offenders.

"My opponent's record does not match her rhetoric. What we know is that she pledged to you, the voters, that she would not plea bargain felony DWIs, but she did it," Denish said. "She not only did one, two, 20, a hundred, but she did 800 felony DWI plea bargains."

But Denish added that she ex-

pects a spirited and competitive race in the next five months between herself and Martinez.

Introducing the lieutenant governor was the man who hopes to replace Denish's expiring position, New Mexico Democratic Chairman Brian Colón, who edged out Lawrence Rael by a little more than 5,000 votes in the primary election. Denish and Colón stood side by side, and both vowed to work hard for the interests of New Mexico families over the election season.

"I will have a lifelong relationship with you, the people of New Mexico. I have had a lifelong commitment, and I am a lifelong New Mexican," Denish said. "Now let's get to work."

Las Cruces Crime Stop pers is offering \$1,000 for information that leads to the arrest of the three men responsible for an armed robbery committed in the early morning of Memorial Day.

At about 2 a.m. Monday, May 31, Las Cruces Police were called to a report of an armed robbery at an apartment on the 500 block of West Griggs Avenue. Officers learned that three men - two of whom were armed with handguns - entered the apartment and ordered the residents to empty their pockets.

The suspects then forced the victims into a bathroom



and took a large, flat-screen television, a computer and a shotgun. The victims were frightened, but otherwise uninjured.

Burger Time is nearing



This year, Kevin McGrath named it The Burger Time Sandra B. McGrath High School All Activities Golf Tournament.

Then he ran out of paper. On Thursday, July 15, the Las Cruces Country Club braces for the annual three-day assault on its golf course.

The Burger Time tournament still holds the record for being the biggest and longest named golfing event in the Southwest.

"We'll have at least 600 players this year," McGrath predicts. The format will be the same: two 18-hole flights Thurs-day, Friday and Saturday. Take your pick. "But you better sign up fast," McGrath warns. "The flights are filling up quickly." Interested parties should telephone

McGrath's office at 526-4976.

It costs \$125 per golfer or \$500 for a team of four to play in this baby. That gets you two meals, a golf cart, golf balls and several good looks at the beveragecart drivers.

The Las Cruces Country Club was supposed to be relocated east of the city years ago. When that magical moment finally occurs remains in question.

Meanwhile the old course will have to do. No sweat. It has survived 17 years of punishment from McGrath's tournament and lived to tell about it.

There is serious purpose behind this golfing tragedy. Proceeds help support athletic activities at Oñate, Las Cruces and Mayfield high schools. It's a big reason all three stay competitive in each of the state's District 5A sports each year.

McGrath owns and operates seven Burger Time franchises in Las Cruces, Silver City and Deming. He dedicates the tournament each year to his wife Sandra, who passed away a few years ago.

Last year's tournament raised a record \$260,000.

"As usual, we want to go higher this year," McGrath said.

The tournament hands a large portion of the earnings to the three high schools and deposits what's left into an endowment which McGrath said has reached more than \$800,000.

Seven local businesses each donate \$7,000 or more to the event. They are Sisbarro, Coca Cola, Memorial Medical Center, First Community Bank, Wal-Mart, Farmer's Insurance and Price's Creamery.

For those who plan to gallery the tourney, McGrath suggests they stand in the fairways or on the greens where shots seldom land.

Vehicles should be parked away from greens. Incoming shots occasionally find windshields.

And if you have any complaints, direct them to McGrath.

He'll be headquartered in the 19th hole.

Popular performer bids farewell to his 'alter ego'

In May, a student by the name of D.J. Downs walked on the stage for the New Mexico State University graduation ceremony, adorned in cheers by alumni, staff, faculty and his peers for his accomplishments as the betterknown Pistol Pete. Downs called the moment

"bittersweet."

For two-and a-half years, he donned the black mustache and sixshooters of Pistol Pete, the Aggie mascot. During

time, Downs treated his role as Pistol Pete more like a carefully crafted alter-ego of a su-perhero than just an extracurricular

gig. "Pistol Pete is someone who is like my best friend," Downs said. "I feel like I know him inside and out."

Downs received the role as Pistol Pete in August 2007 as a sophomore and immediately began re-tooling the mascot. Two years prior to Downs donning the mustache, Pistol Pete's guns were traded for a lasso in all official university logos and the word "pistol" was dropped from his moniker.

Shortly before Downs' try-out, "Pistol Pete" was restored and his guns revived, but the morale toward the beloved mascot was at an all-time low.

His dedication to his role as Pete only grew for Downs, as he constantly studied new routines he could incorporate in the athletic events he attended. Pistol twirls, "Thriller" dances, skateboarding tricks, crowd-hyping antics and high-energy demeanor propelled quickly Downs' – as well as Pete's – popularity.

Downs' popu-larity within the NMSU community flourished more so following an alter-cation he had with Utah State

Brown is a 5-9 forward who was second in the state in rebounding, and was second team, all-state.

Both matches start at 7 p.m. The Aggies will then take on UTEP Sept. 7 in El Paso before heading out to Baton Rouge, La., for the Louisiana State University Tournament. Aggies face another battle at quarterback

Competition nothing new at NMSU

New Mexico State football head coach DeWayne Walker and his offensive coordinator Mike Dunbar have a troupe of quarterbacks to evaluate in order to set up the pecking order of who will run the offense this fall.

Junior Jeff Fleming is a returning starter, freshman Tanner Rust watched last year, wearing a redshirt, and Matt Christian played in the spring while rehabbing an injured clavicle.

A freshman is coming in as well, so there are plenty of possibilities on the board.

I would like to take you back through the history of multiple Aggies competing for the signal-calling position to refresh your memory on how two of those competitions resolved themselves.

In 1999, then head coach Tony Samuel had inherited Ty Houghtaling, who was competing with Samuel recruit K.C. Enzminger. Houghtaling had led the team to its first-ever win over Nevada the previous year, but Enzminger was T-Sam's guy and the heir apparent.

guy and the heir apparent. Samuel had a tough call, but he and offensive coordinator Barney Cotton went with Enzminger, and it led to a winning season.

NM State went 6-5 during Enzminger's sophomore year, and he stuck around to get an advanced degree in English and is now an educator. Samuel's choice was not an easy one in choosing a sophomore over a senior, but coaches decide those things with the team's greatest good in mind. That is what Walker will have to do this fall.



There was one more quarterback battle in recent years, and it was between two of the best ever to run an NM State offense.

In 2002, it was northern California versus the southern part of the Golden State. Buck Pierce was from Gasquet, near the Oregon border, and Paul Dombrowski was from Hesperia in the L.A. urban sprawl. That season, Samuel and Cotton couldn't decide and let both take turns running the show.

Pierce directed the throwing game more effectively and could run, but Dombrowski's athletic ability was so diverse he wound up playing three different positions, setting the school record for receptions in a season as a senior. The pair's skills led NM State to a winning season that year as well, going 7-5 with a 5-1 mark in conference. Pierce has played for several years with the B.C. Lions of the Canadian Football league, earning a Grey Cup title ring in the process. Dombrowski has stayed in town and is now an investigator for the Las Cruces Fire Department when he is not playing fetch with his Pekinese dogs.

Having to choose a quarterback isn't an easy chore, but it isn't a bad thing. Walker and Dunbar have a talented crop to choose from. Let's hope history is repeated with a winning season.

Scott Robertson's love of golf and perseverance in the face of adversity can be inspiration to us all

Let's face it, golf is a hard game. To play it well takes superb coordination, a certain amount of strength and a lot of patience.

A good swing has your body, shoulders, back, hips, legs, arms and hands all moving correctly in sync. The short game requires touch, feel and really good technique with sand wedges and putter. Then there's the mental game, where we notice a premium on a positive attitude, strong self-confidence and real mental toughness.

One weak or limp aspect of your game, and you're sunk for the day.

Reasons to golf

And why do we play golf? Each of us has our own reasons. For me, it's a sense of mastery of the difficult. For others, it's doing something outdoors with friends and family. For some, it's a form of gaming and gambling on grass, and still others just like the nice clothes, shiny clubs and fast carts.

Scott Robertson likes golf because it gives him a sense of redemption. A sense of accomplishing things that once did not seem possible or even likely.

"I was first introduced to golf in 1985 while living in Hawaii," Robertson said, "when I met two golf pros named Jack and Sheri Burges.

I was hired on at the Kiahuna resort on Kauai as a golf course marshal and a hospitality escort to take Japanese visitors around the golf course and take their pictures holding golf clubs, making like they were playing. After that I traveled all over the South Pacific, spending months in Australia and New Zealand, playing golf all the way."

Robertson loves golf.

"In 1987, I got a golf job in California at the Chardonnay Golf Club in Napa Valley running the cart barn and had 13 guys working for me," he said.

Robertson, who is 46, now works on the golf course and range staff at Picacho Hills Country Club.

Restless to play more golf and take his golf game to a different level, Robertson decided to go back to school and study golf.

'Back in California in 1988 a kid who worked for me showed me an info packet for the PGA-sanctioned Professional Golf Management Program at New Mexico State University," Robertson recalls.

"I wrote to Herb Wimberly and he invited me to come to NMSU. So I did." Robertson loves golf.

left side from a near-fatal motorcycle accident in 1981.

"I was almost killed and was in a coma for two weeks," Robertson said with an easy unforced smile and a direct manner that is almost astonishing considering his misfortune. "I had right-sided hemiplegia, which left me with no feeling on my left side and no grasping use of my left hand. They had to put my eye back into the socket and reconstruct my face and teeth.

Robertson's face looks normal, and he has decent range of motion with his paralyzed arm, and he walks with some limp.

"I'm just gimpy," he jokes easily.

Taking a break

Robertson swings from a left-handers stance, taking a full arc with only his right arm.

A little research revealed that the Society of One-Armed Golfers was founded in 1932 when members were primarily survivors of World War I. After about 1945, there were more members from World War II, as well as survivors of polio and Thalidomide. In more recent years, the society now has members who have had industrial and motor vehicle accidents and, of course, neurological problems. These circumstances can cause paralysis of one side, but leave the other side fit and well. Robertson fits the latter profile with his right side strong and well-trained.

Robertson talks about playing in golf tournaments and even organizing events that were geared mainly for amputees.

"They didn't like me playing," he recalls, 'since none of my limbs were cut off. It was tough back then.

So he decided to take a break from golf for a while. In 1993, he married Darlene, and raised two children, living what he describes as "a non-golf life." He said that he remembers when he originally contacted Wimberly and mentioned that he had ideas of working with disabled individuals and that he thought he could use golf to motivate them to reach higher.

Although the idea never really caught fire, Robertson did succeed in helping the disabled, but it was out in California during the mid-1990s.

"I ran a disabled shelter called River House," he said, "located in the San Francisco Bay area, and it eventually housed some 800 disabled people, some 300 families.

Hard work and perseverance

But Robertson has a big heart. And he loves golf, bringing him back here in 2008. Since that time I have known Robertson, always finding him upbeat, talkative and polite. He works hard at PHCC, finding time to work on his game when the paid work is done. Watching him swing a golf club - right arm only - gives one a sense that golf may really be more simple than we make it.

Personally, I have practiced hitting balls one-handed; it's a stress and I could never generate great power.

"My driving length is about 240," Robertson said.

That's pretty good; far longer than the average 46 year-old golfer with all body parts. I wanted to say "able-bodied," but that would do Robertson an injustice, because it's obvious to me that he is able-bodied. Like an injured warrior, he has compensated for his loss with abilities that are the result of many hundreds of hours of hard work and perseverance.

Robertson's personal best score at Pica-cho Hills is 82. That's nice, considering that 90 percent of the golfing public never breaks 100. He has had two holes-in-one, and his best score ever is 79. Wow.

After completing the trip to Scotland, which he has saved for, he is off to Prince Edward Island in early July to play in the North American (one-armed) Championship.

I asked Robertson about his game. He said his strength is his chipping and putting. At first it seemed odd, but then I thought that, of course, those are basically one-handed strokes.

One-armed players, affectionately called "single-wingers," generally feel that it's advantageous on these shorter shots - they just let the club do the work – a good method for the rest of us.

Thanks, Scott, for the inspiration. And good luck in Scotland.

Las Cruces Bulletin **Remembering Families must unite when** those who've passed facing a drinking problem

Kids are growing, maturing faster than a century ago

My husband drinks excessively. Aside from getting help for my family, what should I do specifically for him? How on earth am I going to get him to go to Alcoholics Anonymous or some similar treatment program? He is deep in denial, and I'm not even sure he's thinking right now. He couldn't make a rational decision to save his life. How am I going to get him to cooperate?

You're right about the difficulties you face. Begging won't accomplish anything, and your husband will be dead before he admits he has a problem. Indeed, thousands die each year while denying that they are alcoholics.

That's why Al-Anon teaches family members how to confront in love. They learn how to remove the support systems that prop up the disease and permit it to thrive. They are shown how and when to impose ultimatums that force the alcoholic to admit his or her need for help. And sometimes they recommend separation until the victim is so miserable that his or her denial will no longer hold up. In essence, Al-Anon teaches its own version of the "love must be tough" philosophy to family members who must implement it.

I asked one recovered alcoholic I know if he was forced to attend Alcoholics Anonymous - the program that put him on the road to recovery. He said:

'Let me put it this way. No one goes to A.A. just because they've nothing better to do that evening. Everyone there has been forced to attend initially. You

just don't say, 'On Monday night we watched a football game, and on Tuesday we went to the movies. So what will we do on Wednesday? How about going over to an A.A. meeting?' It doesn't work that way. Yes - I was forced - forced by my own misery. Pauline allowed me to be miserable for my own good. It was loving duress that moved me to attend."

Though it may sound easy to achieve, the loving confrontation that brought Bob to his senses was a delicate maneuver. I must re-emphasize that families should not attempt to implement it on their own initiative. Without the training and assistance of professional support groups, the encounter could degenerate into a hateful, vindictive, name-calling battle that would serve only to solidify the drinker's position.

Al-Anon Family Groups and Alcoholics Anonymous are both listed in local phone books. Also to be found there is a number of the Council on Alcoholism, which can provide further guidance. For teenagers of an alcoholic parent, there is Alateen. Teens can go there and share without their parents' permission or knowledge, and it's free.

Children seem to be growing up at a younger age today than in the past. Is this true, and if so, what accounts for their faster development?

Yes, it is true. Statistical records indicate that our children are growing taller today than in the past, probably resulting from better nutrition, medicine,





exercise, rest and recreation. And this more ideal physical environment has apparently caused sexual maturity to occur at younger and younger ages. It is thought that puberty in a

particular child is triggered when he or she reaches a certain level of growth; therefore, when environmental and general health factors propel a youngster upward at a faster rate, sexual maturation occurs earlier.

For example, in 1850 the average age of menarche (first menstruation) in Norwegian girls was 17 years of age; in 1950, it was 13. The average age of puberty in females had dropped four years

in one century. In the United States the average age of menarche dropped from 16.5 in 1840 to 12.9 in 1950. More recent figures indicate that it now occurs on average at 12.8 years of age. Thus, the trend toward younger dating and sexual awareness is a result, at least in part, of this "fast track" mechanism.

The study is funded by the National Institutes of Health and is looking at how babies learn and remember.

in the sun Prevent burns and skin cancer

Attracting new residents each year to the region is southern New Mexico's warm climate and abundance of sun, which some may argue shines a little too brightly during the summer months.

However, clear skies and the mild climate make for excellent outdoor excursions and barbecues, and added exposure to the sun. Appropriately timed, June 6 through 12 is Sun Safety Week, and the Sun Safety Alliance is using this week to inform residents on UV exposure and protection from harmful rays.

Now that school's out for most children, they're spending a lot of their time outdoors, up to three times more than adults, according to the Sun Safety Alliance. Without sunblock, a blistering sunburn can come sooner than you think, and that burn can double a child's lifetime risk of developing skin cancer, the alliance reports.

The organization offers the following "sun safety tips" so everyone can make the most of sunny days without the adverse effects of serious skin damage and possibly skin cancer.Keep in mind the sun is strongest be-

- tween 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.
- Wear dark and tightly woven clothing. Wear a wide-brimmed hat and sunglasses.
- Remember that UV rays bound off sand, concrete and water. These surfaces reflect 85 to 90 percent of the sun's UV ravs.
- Do not use sun-tanning beds. Keep infants 6 months old or younger
- out of the sun. Apply sunscreen liberally and evenly over all exposed areas before going outdoors and reapply often, especially after swimming, perspiring and toweling off.
- Use sunscreen with a sun protection factor of 15 or higher whenever you're outdoors. For children, the SSA recommends sunscreen with an SPF 30 or higher.
- Don't forget to apply sunscreen to your neck, ears and lips. For people with thin or thinning hair, apply sun-screen to the scalp as well.
- Stay in the shade whenever possible.
- When selecting a sunscreen, make sure you find one that provides both UVA and UVB protection.

Though UV exposure is greatest dur-ing the summer months in the United States, the Sun Safety Alliance also urges people to remember that UV rays reach Earth every day – even on cloudy days – and people should follow these important guidelines year-round. Mosquito carries harmful disease

As New Mexico's summer monsoon season begins, residents will again see an increase of mosquitoes and other flying insects.

Mosquitoes are a primary source for the spread of West Nile Virus (WNV). The New Mexico Department of Health reports the illness affected at least eight New Mexicans in 2009 and resulted in one human death.

According to the Centers for Disease Control, 722 cases were confirmed in the United States in 2009, causing 33 deaths. As many as 209 cases in New Mexico have been reported in previous years.

In humans, WNV causes encephalitis or an inflammation of the brain. The illness also affects horses, causing stumbling, a lack of coordination, muscle twitching and a weakness of the limbs. Eight cases in horses were also reported in New Mexico during 2009.

"There is no human vaccine for the West Nile Virus," said Dr. Francine Olmstead, Medical Director at New Mexico Travel Health. "There is a vaccine available for horses, but under no circumstance should it be used as a human vaccine."

WNV was first discovered in Uganda in 1937 and is now commonly found in Africa, Western Asia, Eastern Europe and the Middle East. The virus appeared in the United States in 1999.

Olmstead is a specialist in travel health and one of just a few thousand medical providers worldwide to have earned the Certificate of Knowledge in Travel Health, administered by the International Society of Travel Medicine.

Heartburn is off the menu Simple advice can keep you are prone to heartburn, the fire where it belongs

While a little burning is expected when you fire up the grill, Dr. Michael Rahmin, a leading gastroenterologist based in the New York Metropolitan area, says that if you follow some simple, at-home guidelines, you may be able to avoid the burning sensation in your chest.

"By making a few simple adjustments, you can enjoy the barbecue season and help keep your heartburn at bay," says Rahmin. "Don't miss the parties this summer, just protect your stomach both before and after you hit the grill.'

Rahmin recommends the following tips for a healthier,

happier barbecue season:

Don't overdo it. Smaller, more frequent meals help optimize the digestive process. Eating big portions can put more pressure on your stomach and lead to heartburn. Remember that the next barbecue is probably around the corner so be reasonable about portion sizes.

Watch out for triggers. If

be cautious when considering certain foods that are known to cause problems, including caffeinated drinks, alcohol, chocolate and spicy, fatty foods.

Barbecue alternatives to consider include lower-fat dogs instead of traditional beef hot dogs, or make your burgers with lean ground turkey. With the right condiments, it's hard to tell the difference. Since all stomachs are not created equal, also be aware of your own personal triggers and try to cut back or at least avoid them late in the evening.

Let gravity help. Although that hammock may be calling your name, keep away after a big meal. To help your food digest properly, stay in an upright position rather than lying down after you eat. The natural force of gravity helps with the digestive process.

Keep your medicine cabinet stocked. If you are a frequent heartburn sufferer, try an over-the-counter medication, such as an OTC proton pump inhibitor (PPI). PPIs work by deactivating acid-producing pumps in the stomach, offering 24-hour relief of frequent heartburn with one dose per day.

> they do not become breeding ground for more mosquitoes. Keep window and door screens in good repair as well.

"A common sign that West Nile Virus is in our area is an increase in the number of dead birds," Olmstead said. 'Those should be reported to New Mexico Epidemiology and Response Division."

The agency can be reached at 505-827-0006.

Peak mosquito hours are from dusk to dawn. New Mexicans out during the evening or early morning hours should use insect repellent, and wear longsleeved shirts and long pants.

"By taking precautions, New Mexicans can greatly reduce any risk of West Nile virus," Olmstead said.

Business Point, click, make it big

Are you a tightwad?





There's no doubt we, as a nation, are not spending as much as before.

Blame it on the collapse of the housing market, the recession, whatever. We're cheapskates now.

A recent survey conducted by the Associated Press asked 44 leading economists if the recession created a "new frugality" among consumers that will continue past the recession. They said it would. Maybe it's a good thing, but there's reason to believe otherwise.

There's the famous Paradox of Thrift, or paradox of saving, an economic theory made popular by economist John Maynard Keynes during the time of the Great Depression.

The paradox states that if the populous tries to save money during the time of a national recession, aggregate demand will fall and lower total savings.

I explored this issue somewhat at the peak of the recession in the March 2009 Las Cruces Bulletin business story, "Spend or Save?"

Chuck Olson, owner of Exit Realty Horizons, said, "When people begin to feel more confident, it will result in a sharp upturn in the economy as they begin to increase their consumption.

I don't know about you, but it still seems gloomy out there. I'm not stuffing cash under my mattress or hiding it in an oatmeal box, but I am doing my best to keep a healthy reserve should an emergency situation arise.

Back when everyone was being extremely frugal, the government upped the ante by offering programs such as the Cash for Clunkers and the First Time Homebuyers Tax Credit. Both initiatives

temporarily spurred spending. "If we save, but don't spend, we are hoarding money to the point of eco-nomic drought," said Benjamin Liechti of the Miller Financial Group. With only a few billion dollars left

in the coffers of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act and a nationwide budget deficit for almost all 50 states numbering in the billions, state deficits must be made up, in a hurry.

Already we've seen services cut and agencies consolidated in New Mexico.

It's only a matter of time before consumers come to their senses and recognize their role in getting us out of this recession.

Manufacturing interest rising National companies eyeing Las Cruces, Mesilla Valley

The manufacturing industry may be the decisive factor in pulling the United States out of recession.

That's according to Gail Houser, western regional director for the National Tooling and Machining Association, a nonprofit trade group that represents more than 1,400 small manufacturing companies in the United States.

Why in the world would anyone be interested in the manufacturing sector of our economy at this time?" Houser asked a group of business and community leaders during an economic forum hosted by the Mesilla Valley Economic Development Alliance (MVEDA) Tuesday, June 1. "I propose to you that it's pos-sibly because of the 1.8 to 2.1 job multiplier effect for new job creation in (the manufacturing industry). Or maybe it's because manufacturing is currently getting the U.S. out of this recession."

Partly because of "re-shoring," Houser said, manufacturing is seeing substantial growth all across the country. Re-shoring is the result of a host of problems that U.S. manufacturing customers have encountered as more and more production was exported to national markets, most notably Asia, Houser said.

Chris Faivre, media publications manager for the Las Cruces Convention & Visitors Bureau, said he encourages locals to join the fun and turn on their "tourist" thinking caps.

"We think this is a great promotion for the state. Anytime you can get local residents to take a different look at their community and capture the moment, it can inspire more travel within the state," he said. "When you start looking at your community through the eyes of a tourist, you may begin to think differently and re-visit places in the area. I think this will be a great success."

Richard Eeds, director of the state tourism department's advertising, marketing and promotion division, said "the contest has exceeded all expectations. Visits to newmexico.org are skyrocketing in part to the interest generated by our new culinary trails' promotions, but primarily because of the photo contest.

"On average, visitors are spending an amazing six and onehalf minutes on the Day of Enchantment website, looking at and submitting photos. This is about double the amount of time spent at a typical tourism website."

Eeds said it's too early to tell if the increased web traffic will translate into increased tourism, but he's optimistic.

The state tourism department's nine visitor information centers reported 105,001 visitors in April, an increase of 10 percent from April 2009. To date, the centers have consulted with more than 350,000 tourists to New Mexico, the majority of which are from California, followed by Texas. Together the two states amount to about one-third of the total number of visitors to the centers, according to the department.

Problems with deliveries and customer change orders, damaged parts and quality, rising costs and financial terms, inventory problems, counterfeiting and cost of capital are among some of the problems often encountered with overseas manufacturers.

Wham-O Inc., for example, recently brought production of half of its signature product – the Frisbee – back to the United States from China.

"Maybe a 14,000-mile supply chain may not actually be the most sound business strategy," Houser said.

In 1995, manufacturing GDP accounted for 19 percent, or about one out of every \$5, of the nation's economy. Houser said that number, in 2009, was roughly about 12.2 percent, "a substantial reduction."

"It's been said that one out of every six factory jobs have disappeared since 2000," Houser said. "That's 3.2 million factory jobs."

MVEDA CEO Davin Lopez said his organization has seen a substantial increase in leads generated from manufacturing businesses.

"If you look at the numbers in May, manufacturing has represented 36 percent of our leads while the alternative energy sector is at about 25 or 26 percent," Lopez said, a "reversal" of the past year's trend.

In the past two quarters, manufacturing has added 44,000 jobs, and has added 101,000 since December 2009, Houser said. Production orders for new goods have began flooding many companies, forcing a "bottleneck" that's leaving manufacturers struggling to keep up with demand, Houser said, a possible reason for renewed interest in the area.

"A manufacturing bottleneck is like trying to suck a golf ball through a straw – it's almost impossible to accomplish but it can be done over a period of time with enough money, ingenuity and creativity," Houser said. "It's incredibly difficult to ramp back up that quickly – you have to have a huge capital investment."

For the Mesilla Valley and New Mexico, the conditions may be just right to grow their manufacturing sectors.

Houser said only 4 percent of total companies and 7 percent of non-public employees in the state are from the manufacturing industry, and that production worker wages in the state ranked 50 out of 50 nationally, "a reason why they may be interested in coming here," Houser said.

"Why are they interested?" he said. "The low production worker wages? Is it the per-capita personal income that's ranked 43 out of 50? The very inexpensive direct labor? And if manufacturers only want to move to our state because of low operating costs and personal income, do we really want them here?"

Houser said most companies overlook the state completely because of its lack of workforce in the industry.

"Will they move here and find out they can't find the skill sets, manpower and intelligence, and drop us in our tracks and move to the next lowest-cost state?" he added.

Out of 90 major manufacturers that have left the state of California in the past year because of rising operating costs, only one has relocated to New Mexico, Houser said. The majority has chosen the "top 3," Texas, Nevada and Idaho.

He said to increase its competitiveness when courting such companies, the state must provide "top-notch" educational opportunities, training and re-training common to the national industry standard, form a true partnership between regional and state economic organizations and financial incentives must be provided to attract the industry. and communicate your success. A viable, healthy manufacturing industry can be developed in the state with the right cooperation and ingenuity."

Kari Mitchell, owner of Las Cruces Machine, a small manufacturing company that employs 65 and occupies more than 40,000 square feet of industrial space in Mesilla Park, said manufacturing jobs are critical because of their multiplier effect.

"For every engineer you have, you need five technicians for support," she said. "But Gail's core point is right – if we want to reap the benefits that manufacturing can bring us, this has to be a massively large-scale collaborative effort to make it happen, otherwise we'll stay at the same numbers we have, and have always had. We have the capability to exceed that."

Crops faring well during spring harvest

Onions ready to ship, chile delayed by cold weather

Barker Produce is shipping out 10,000 to 12,000 sacks of onions each day out of its West Mesa grading shed as it builds momentum for the harvesting of spring crops in the Mesilla Vallev.

"We're right on schedule," said Brandon Barker, vice president of Barker Produce. "The onions look healthy, they're a good size and the yields are good."

The Barkers are shipping out yellow, white and red onions for the retail market. Last week, they wrapped up shipping 6,000 bags of onions for processors out of their Fabens, Texas, packing plant.

Barker Produce has added a shed at its complex on the West Mesa where it will start sizing, sorting and topping yellow onions for processors.

Barker Produce has been in business for about 14 years and ship onions throughout the year. Steve Lyles grows onions for the company on 450 acres in the Fairacres area.

Scott Adams also is harvesting and grading onions at his Adams Produce shed in Hatch. His crews are harvesting yellows, whites and reds on 630 acres near Garfield and Deming and in the Uvas Valley. Adams is "custom harvesting" 150 acres for other area growers.

"We're in full swing," Adams said. "The onion quality is excellent and the sizes are average or a little below. Our Luna yellows are a little below average size, but I expect them to go above average later (in the season)."

Onion production is one of New Mexico's top field crops, grossing \$47.5 million in 2008. The production remained steady, 3.3 million hundred-weight compared with 3.5 million the previous year, according to the latest New Mexico Agricultural Statistics Bulletin, which is published by the New Mexico Department of Agriculture and USDA.

Adams also grows about 260 acres of chile in the Hatch and Uvas valleys. The chile pods

The IRS wants to help Agency to host Open House Saturday, June 5

The Las Cruces Internal Revenue Service office, 505 S. Main St., will host an Open House from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, June 5, to help small business owners and individuals solve their current tax problems.

"Our goal is to resolve issues on the spot so small businesses and individuals can put any issues they have with the IRS behind them," said IRS Commissioner Doug Shulman. "If you have a problem filing or paying your taxes or resolving a tough tax issue, we encourage you to come in and work with us.'

IRS Open Houses help taxpayers and businesses work through their problems and walk out with solutions.

For example, a taxpayer who cannot pay

a past-due tax balance can discuss with an IRS professional whether an installment agreement is appropriate and, if so, fill out the paperwork then and there. Assistance with offers-in-compromise will also be available. Likewise, a taxpayer struggling to complete a certain IRS form or schedule can work directly with IRS staff to get the job done and more.

At the March 27 IRS Open House, 88 percent of the taxpayers who came in for help had their issues resolved the same day, said Bill Brunson, regional IRS spokesman.

Locations for the 200-plus IRS offices hosting open houses across the country on Saturday, June 5, can be found on the IRS websites, www.irs.gov.

are past the emergence stage and establishing good stands. "We lost a little to wind earlier, but it's look-

ing fine now," he said. In the southern part of the county, Dino Cervantes in La Mesa reported that earlier cool weather has put plants behind schedule, but

his chile has emerged into good stands. Cervantes grows cayenne for sauces and jalapeños and New Mexico 6-4 and Sandia green chile varieties for processing.

His cotton also was delayed a little by the cool weather, but, he added, "It's supposed to warm up, and hopefully things will get back to normal.

The use of improved green varieties helped chile growers increase their 2008 production to 60,140 tons from 49,000 tons. The gross value was \$42.3 million, 48 percent increase from the previous year, the Agricultural Statistics Bulletin reported.

The Elephant Butte Irrigation District also has helped farmers by boosting their water allocation to two-acre feet, still short of a full quota of three acre-feet. The board was able to increase the quota when the Bureau of Reclamation reported the anticipated Rio Grande snow runoff flow at San Marcial into Elephant Butte Reservoir would be 480,000 acre-feet, 80 percent of average. The bureau also allocated 117,695 acre-feet to the EBID, 49 percent of a full supply.

Cotton in the Mesilla Valley has emerged beyond the seedling stage and is doing well, according to Tracy Carrillo, researcher and seed certification director a New Mexico State University. Currently, he is working on a new variety he's calling White Sands, an Upland variety with high Pima fiber qualities and higher yield. It has been modified naturally and without introducing new genes, Carrillo said.

"We're trying to find a market niche for this variety for fabrics in overseas mills," he said.

Research also is being conducted on this variety to use the seed as a by-product to produce biofuel, Carrillo said.

The university also is conducting research with a glandless Acala cotton seed that is high in protein and may be used as a human or animal food product, he said.

State Upland cotton production continued to decline as it dropped from 89,000 bales in 2007 to 71,000 bales with a revenue of \$19 million, according to state statistics.

Budget shortfall could slow recovery Federal bailout may be the solution

The worst recession since 1937 has caused a steep decline in state tax receipts.

Even after spending cuts and tax increases over the last two years, states continue to face large budget gaps. Forty-eight states have addressed or still face shortfalls to their budgets for fiscal year 2010, totaling \$200 billion. The states' expected shortfall for fiscal year 2011, which for most begins July 1, is projected to be \$180 billion.

What is true for states in general is also true for New Mexico. The latest numbers released by the Legislative Finance Committee indicated tax collections for New Mexico are off 16 percent compared to fiscal year 2009, through March. Forecasts for fiscal year 2011 have not been updated recently, but the shortfall can be expected to carry forward. Should reserves be depleted, as is likely, Gov. Bill Richardson is authorized to cut spending across-the-board, and Legislative Finance Committee Chair John Arthur Smith is warning state agencies to expect cuts of 5 percent for fiscal year 2011.

With private sector businesses still not in full recovery, now is not the time for further state cuts. Budgets have already been pared to the bone, teachers are being laid off, capital projects are being cancelled and furloughs are limiting access to needed state services. Perhaps worst of all, should taxes be increased rather than services cut, consumer spending in the private sector will be hurt.

The cause of the budget shortfalls is the relatively weak recovery in the national economy. Ironically, it is the weak economy that makes state budget shortfalls such a danger to the private sector. In normal times, state cutbacks or tax increases would be taken in stride by the private sector. But in the period of high unemployment and slow growth that we are experiencing, now is not a "normal" time. A major sector of our economy, state government, is still in recession and is a drag on the rest of the economy that will slow the already anemic private sector recovery.

Federal aid to states provided in the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act has lessened state cuts in services and tax increases. This aid is nearly gone, however, with only about \$40 billion remaining. The federal government could help avert additional budget cuts that would further harm the economy by extending assistance, an idea that has been gaining momentum among Democrats in Washington, D.C.

Federal aid makes a lot of sense. Unlike most state governments, the federal government can borrow funds to finance spending so federally funded state spending doesn't come with automatic tax increases. For example, the Keep Our Educators Working Act, proposed by the Department of Education and supported by President Barack Obama, would provide \$23 billion nationally to keep teachers in the classroom. This would have a direct simulative effect here in Las Cruces, where current budget plans would reduce the number of teachers in the classroom next year without federal help.

Other ideas include federal funding of state capital projects that otherwise would be cancelled. This has the advantage of providing employment specifically to the group that has been hardest hit by the current recession – undereducated male workers.

Of course, federal bailout of state government doesn't come without a cost – an increased federal deficit. And those concerned about the deficit, including the tea partiers, have a point. Countries with reserve currencies, such as the United States, don't default, but they do engage in inflation. Still, the time to balance the budget is not during a recession, or the recovery from a recession, but when the economy is back to full employment. Patience is called for now when it comes to the federal deficit.

In any case, even if you think balancing the budget is an immediate priority (something I don't agree with), that doesn't mean budget cuts should come at the state level, which has already seen massive cuts. Much more fat remains at the federal level; that is where we should look as we seek to get our fiscal house in order, whether now or in the future after the economy recovers.

Use security freeze to protect your identity

Low-cost service could save your credit

Purchasing a home requires good credit. The quickest way to lose your hardearned credit score is to have an unauthorized scammer access your credit file. The quickest way to protect your good credit is to use a tool called the "credit security freeze." In essence, the "freeze" locks, or freezes, access to your credit reports and scores so that potential creditors, aspiring thieves and other third parties won't be able to poke around in your files unless you give them the OK.

Who may take advantage of this protective gizmo? Any New Mexico consumer

is eligible to order a freeze, but keep in mind that freezing a credit file slows down the approval process for any type of credit you may want to obtain.

To place a freeze on your credit files, you can simply submit a request to each of the three credit bureaus: Experian, TransUnion and Equifax. The bureaus are obligated to put the freeze in place within three business days if they receive the request by mail, or within 15 minutes if

they receive the request by a secure electronic method (such as the credit bureau's website) or by telephone. Once the freeze is in place, the credit bureaus will issue you a pin number so that you can unlock your files at will.

For consumers over the age of 65 and/ or those who have been the victims of identity theft, the credit-reporting agencies will initiate the service at no charge. For the rest of the population, putting the freeze in place will cost \$10 at each of the three repositories.

The freeze will stay in place until you say otherwise, but certain entities will still have access to your information. Your current creditors and collection agencies

acting on their own behalf are two such entities. Other creditors who want to make offers of credit will have access to your "credit header," but won't be able to access your actual file.

Government agencies will also be allowed to nose around in your files if they're collecting child

support payments, taxes or investigating Medicaid fraud. Search warrants, administrative orders and subpoenas issued by government agencies are also keys that can easily unlock your files. Security freezes can

be lifted for a brief period of time by paying a \$5 fee to each repository. As in the initiation process, senior citizens over 65 years of age and folks who have been the victims of identity theft are not charged the fees. To learn all there is

to know about security freezes, fraud alerts and identity theft, contact any or all of the three credit bureaus and the Federal Trade Commission. They have the definitive answers you need to protect your good credit.

Program brings space research down to Earth

Help with technology analysis, application is available

During his years in the hotel and hospitality business, Nate Mandalia of Alamogordo struggled with a problem experienced by many people who have to dress professionally for work: How to keep the hem of his pants from bunching up on his shoe or dragging on the ground. Mandalia came up with a solution – an invention he calls the "hemlock."

With assistance and advice from the Space Alliance Technology Outreach Program (SATOP), Mandalia applied for a patent for his shoe accessory and completed several prototypes. His next step is to proceed from prototype design to mass manufacturing.

"I'm not an engineer," Manda-lia said. Marketing an invention "is more difficult when you don't have experience doing (it)."

Brain meld

SATOP is a nationwide cooperative program that provides up to 40 hours of free technical assistance to small businesses or entrepreneurs wrestling with engineering challenges that are impeding their success. SATOP uses technical expertise derived from the U.S. space program to address a variety of problems faced

by existing or startup entities.

SATOP assistance is provided by its Alliance Partner Network, which is made up of more than 45 companies, universities, colleges, national laboratories and NASA centers (Johnson Space Center in Texas, Kennedy Space Center in Florida and White Sands Test Facility in New Mexico). Program organizers link professionals in these organizations with eligible members of the smallbusiness community.

While many businesses approved to participate in SATOP use far less than the maximum allowable hours of free technical assistance, Mandalia's challenges required the full 40 hours, most of which were used to refine the design and engineer his product. The program matched him with Yu-Ping Tang, an engineer at New Mexico State University's Manufacturing Technology and Engineering Center.

Help on many levels

While Mandalia sought help with a product design suitable for mass manufacturing, SATOP's cooperating professionals can assist a small business or entrepreneur with any type of engineering conundrum - from questions about adhesives and acoustics to those concerning materials and fluid dynamics and everything in between. SATOP has helped companies with machine design,

engineering, material process selection and just about any other issue imaginable.

A company does not have to be technology-based to receive assistance, as Mandalia's example demonstrates. The program has processed more than 3,000 requests since it began in 2001, and more than 2,500 resolutions have been provided to businesses - usually within 90 days of the start of collaboration.

The program's success has created intense demand for assistance, though SATOP's resources are limited. Business owners interested in applying for assistance can learn more about SATOP at its website, www. spacetechsolutions.com.

In a snag? Call Armando

Mobile service offers variety of legal troubleshooting

Armando Ochoa had the right idea, "on the money," he said.

Ochoa, a native of Las Vegas, Nev., has recently started his business, Armando's Mobile Legal Aid & Notary Public, offering residents of southern New Mexico most of the perks of having an attorney without the accompanying price tag.

"Unfortunately, there are a lot of people out there with legal issues that don't have time to follow the legal proceedings or don't know what steps to take," he said. "My primary goal is to help and educate those people."

Prior to starting his business, Ochoa visited the folks at the local SCORE office. SCORE of Las Cruces helps existing and potential business owners with business counseling services everything from formulating a sound business plan to staff evaluation.

"I talked with the folks at SCORE, and they liked the idea of what I was trying to do," Ochoa said. "We worked out the details, and it gave me the confidence to move ahead and start the business."

For a small fee, Ochoa will come to your place of work, or home, and facilitate the legal process for a variety of proceedings and transactions. These include, but are not limited to. driver's license renewals, vehicle registrations, uncontested divorce cases, domestic violence hearings, restraining orders, child custody cases, court motions, appeals and responses. He'll even pay your traffic ticket.

"So many people here just can't afford an

attorney," he said. "The time passes by for them. It could be one or two years before they ever think to fill out any paperwork, and by that time, it's too late.'

So far, Ochoa said a majority of his customers have asked him for assistance translating legal Info

documents. "A lot of people are dealing with immigration issues, they don't know how to fill out their forms or bring the documents and information they need," he said. "And many are afraid to be detained in public, so I appear for

them. Although Ochoa's specialty is family law, he said he lets clients know up front he does not have the same power as an attorney.

"I tell them right away I'm not an attorney, and that I'm there to help as a mobile legal aid," he said. "Once we get to court for a hearing, they represent

Ochoa goes as far as offering some of his services free of charge, if a hardship case merits such action.

"I'm here to help because I know how overwhelming legal procedures can be," he said. "In one particular case I agreed to help a young woman free of charge, because I knew she couldn't afford to pay, and she really needed the help. If she missed work to go to court, she would be fired.

The bulk of Ochoa's work, aside from document translation, has been in divorce, child custody and paternity hearings.

"That seems to be the major market here," he said.

Ochoa is also willing to work after hours. "If it's 10 p.m. and you need a document stamped by a notary public, call me," he said. "There's no set hours or a fixed schedule." For more information, call 805-1205.

economies when our own is in need of repair."

Support for renewable-energy development on disturbed lands continues to grow with efforts like the Arizona Bureau of Land Management's Restoration Design Energy Project gaining traction and support, as well as increasing interest on the part of federal lawmakers, including the Cleanfields Act introduced last week by U.S. Sen. Frank Lautenberg.

Chevron's groundbreaking pushes forward the development of this facility on a Superfund site that until now was of no use. This facility will bring new jobs to New Mexico as well as much needed power for continued growth in the region.

'When we can find ways to encourage clean energy development while aiding our local economy we a stand to gain," said Questa Mayor Esther Garcia. "We need jobs. We need to ensure we are finding ways to revitalize wastelands in our area."

The molybdenum mine has operated under various owners in Questa since the 1920s, including a period of open pit mining from 1965 to 1983. Waste rock, tailings, runoff and leachate contaminants released at the site are designated for Superfund cleanup. Some of the miningimpacted areas are in the process of re-mediation, and other areas are scheduled for cleanup.



The groundbreaking ceremony for the Emerging Solar Technology Demonstration Project in Questa, N.M., was attended by Hansjorg Lerchenmuller, Concentrix CEO; Desmond King, Chevron Technology Ventures president; Esther Garcia, Village of Questa mayor; Fred Nelson, Chevron Mining Inc. president; Bill Richardson, New Mexico governor; Luis Reyes, Kit Carson Electric Cooperative CEO; Malaquias Rael, former mayor of the Village of Questa; and Ron Curry, secretary of the New Mexico Environment Department.

As part of the solar installation agreement, Chevron will use the 30 acres of the plant as a pilot demonstration ground to evaluate different soil depths suitable for use at the closure of the mine, in an attempt to show that shallower depths of 2 or 1 foot will still ensure no adverse impacts to the health of the local

community and the environment. These demonstration sites will be closely monitored over a period of five years by the EPA and evaluated in conjunction with the New Mexico Environment Department.

The Questa community is looking forward to turning brown into green," Garcia said.

B12 | Business Las Cruces Bulletin Students design, build remote UAV

Plane crashes, but project deemed a success

Their plane may have crashed on the competition runway, but the members of New Mexico State University's American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics (AIAA) student club are unanimous in proclaiming their project a success.

Oscar Torres spoke for the team when he said, "Success was getting a plane designed and built in a short time and it flew on its test flight here."

Fellow team member Alaa Husini added, "It worked! We did it. The plane reached about 100 feet during its flight out at Mesa Grande. And made it there (Wichita, Kan.), passed pre-flight inspection and even received compliments."

High winds during the competition proved insurmountable. Next time, the team will be sure to test in windy as well as calm conditions.

The "Crimson Jett" (an adaptation from Jett Hall, the campus building that lodges the Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering Department) was a first entry for the AIAA student chapter in the annual design, build, fly competition sponsored by Cessna Aircraft Co. and Raytheon Missile Systems.

First came a design in accordance with competition rules: remote-controlled, propeller-

driven, maximum power of 40 amp current; and the plane, with full payload, must weigh less than 55 pounds. A report presenting the design and production plan must be submitted and pass standards before a team is fully accepted for participation.

The team divided itself according to project needs (design, fabrication and electrical system) and all contributed to the report, which was one of the 68 approved out of the 79 submitted to AIAA.

Initially somewhat daunted, Husini said, "We can do this. We learned techniques and tools for design in ME 159 (Graphical Communication & Design) and ME 222 (Intro to Product Development). We applied what we had learned in many other engineering courses, too."

Besides the basic aircraft structure, the team also had to treat its design as a "Baseball Team Plane," which would carry payloads of "balls" and "bats." The balls had to be carried within and the bats attached to the outside of the aircraft. The aircraft itself had to be broken down into components and fit into a case 2-feet-by-2-feet-by-4 feet, another design requirement.

The UAVs were to fly three missions during the event: ferry flight without payload; payload with 6 to 10 softballs; and payload with a random number of bats. The design constraint for

the balls, Husini explained, was to retain balance whether carrying six, seven, eight, nine or 10 balls.

"I was so excited when the design idea emerged," he said. "A compartment with five rows of three spaces."

Department Head Tom Burton and instructor Jon Davis gave advice and support as the project progressed. Jesse McAvoy, a Ph.D. student who has extensive experience with remotecontrolled air vehicles, also lent assistance.

Like all projects, the Crimson Jett ran into problems. The laser cutter at NMSU could not cut through the thickness of the wood used for the structure. A solution came through a mechanical engineering graduate, Ken Ruble, who enlisted a friend from Chaparral with the needed equipment to cut the ribs. Springloaded electrical connecting rods for the detachable wings were fabricated in Ciudad Juárez. Also, the plane experienced some damage in an incident after the test flight and had to be quickly repaired before the team headed out for Wichita.

Burton, who accompanied the team to Wichita, said, "This is one of the best student competition design teams I have seen. These eight students were competent and dedicated, and they did an excellent job of airplane design and fabrication. I think they will do even better next year."

The AIAA student chapter plans to join the competition again in 2011.

Featured artist: *Dale Pawley* **The 'Main Man' of musicals** Staging of 'Joseph' was a long time coming

For the last several years, Dale Pawley has filled the role of "Mister Musical" on the local theater scene.

He has directed the enormously successful "Hello, Dolly!" and "Crazy For You" at Las Cruces Community Theatre and "Always, Patsy Cline" and "Godspell" for the No Strings Theatre Company.

Pawley began his theatrical career in 1987, when he enrolled in a theater class taught by local educational theater icon Robert Gaines at Las Cruces High School.

"When I transferred later to Oñate High School, I gave up drama in favor of creative writing," Pawley said. "But I got re-bitten by the acting bug when I went to college at New Mexico Highlands University. There, under the direction of Steven Wallace, I became a theater arts major."

It was at Highlands that Pawley had his first taste of directing when, in 1995, he staged a production of

the black, satirical comedy, "Sister Mary Ignatius Explains It All For You."

After leaving New Mexico Highlands, Pawley returned to Las Cruces, where he began auditioning as an actor. He eventually got cast at New Mexico State University's American Southwest Theatre Company's production of "The Beaux Stratagem," a Restoration comedy by George Farquhar.

Roles at the community theater soon followed, and though he enjoyed acting, it was only a short time before he began wantir

before he began wanting to direct again.

"So far, I have directed seven shows at LCCT and three shows at No Strings Theatre Company,"

DALE PAWLEY, Director Pawley said. "While my focus the past few years has been on musicals, I still love straight plays and am looking forward to directing my first non-musical in eight years this fall at No Strings." That production will be two

tion will be two Texas-based, oneact comedies "Lone Star" and "Laundry and Bourbon" by James McLure.

Pawley says as a director, he enjoys taking shows and doing something new and interest-

ing with them, presenting them in a way that is unexpected, or at least a little "off-kilter."

"With 'Joseph,' I am going for a more contemporary look and feel, to match the music styles," Pawley said. "I am also having the actors really play up the 'cheesiness' factor, by pointing out to the audience how laughably simple and fake the props and background are.

"I figure the audience is already thinking, 'Wow, those sheep are kinda cheesy, and that well doesn't even begin to look like a real well.' Why not let them know that the actors are in on the joke?"

Pawley has been in love with "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat" for several years. When the movie version, starring Donny

Osmond in the title role, was released in 2000, he knew after watching it that "someday, somehow, I had to see this show produced locally."

He approached his friend and frequent collaborator Janet Mazdra with the idea.

"She and I had already worked on a couple of different projects together, and after she watched the movie, she was on board right along with me."

Their early attempts at getting the show produced met with failure and frustration. Pawley's proposal to include the show as part of the LCCT slate was either turned down for various reasons, or else it was accepted, only to be dropped because of lack of funding – musicals are very expensive to produce.

Finally in 2007, LCCT accepted it as part of its 2007-08 season.

"Just as success seemed within our grasp, however, we hit another unexpected roadblock," Pawley recalled. "The rights holders denied us the rights to the show, and we had to scramble to find a replacement."

The result of all of this was the production of the hugely successful "Hello, Dolly!" Pawley says he was too "dispirited" to submit "Joseph" again the following season and, instead, ended up directing "Crazy For You," another very successful show.

It took some convincing from some of the board members, but by the time submissions were being taken for the 2009-10 LCCT season, Pawley decided that it was time to try again. Once the rights were secured, "Joseph" was added to the season.

According to perhaps the bestknown song from the show, "The world and I, we are still waiting, still hesitating, any dream will do."

But not any dream is going to satisfy Dale Pawley, just the one that involves "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat," opening on June 11.

Chinese eatery gets a 'golden star'

Fresh and fast by friendly servers

A glass-bricked building with a '50s feel might seem like an odd place for a Chinese buffet, but Golden Star Chinese Fast Food makes it work without a paper

lantern in sight. It is an efficient, inexpensive place to grab a quick, fresh, tasty meal when you have a craving for something besides burgers or Mexican food in the fast food corridor also known as El Paseo Road.

The restaurant has been open since January in the building that formerly housed a couple of different burger joints. It's a fun building in a great location, and I was glad to see it occupied after a period of dormancy.

According to manager Marina Ortiz and server Bernadette Dominguez, things were "pretty crazy" when the place first opened.

"We had lines out the door," Dominguez said. "We're still really busy at lunch being so near the high school. But things have settled down. It still is pretty busy. We have our regulars, and we have a great relationship with them."

The owners of Golden Star are Danny Fong and Yuan Long Yu, otherwise known as "Dragon." They came to the U.S. from

China about 15 years ago with the express desire to open a restaurant. Their first was in Silver City and then in Deming followed by the Las Cruces addition. They are hoping to expand to El Paso.

What appeals to me about the place, apart from the friendly service, is the freshness of the choices on the steam table. Food is served buffet-style with beef, chicken, pork, seafood and vegetarian selections. Everything has retained its color and crispness - done but not overdone. Nothing soggy and limp here, looking like it has been out a bit too long. I have, to date, avoided the battered,

fried, then sauced entrées (just out of a veneer of healthfulness more than how they look – which is tasty) opting for the stir-fried choices. I haven't been disappointed. The spicy chicken and spicy shrimp, the green pepper beef (although lately it has been a great shade of orange), chicken and mushrooms served as individual dishes of various sizes or as a combo with rice or noodles are all very worthy offerings. What I really want to talk about are

the soups. I can sum them up in one word - soupadelicious.

The barbecue noodle soup consists of noodles with mushrooms, carrots, broccoli and barbecued pork medallions layered on top. Really great. But the wor wonton soup is unbelievable. Chicken, shrimp, wontons, crispy vegetables - my, my, my, here's sriracha in your eye. And these soups are in large bowls. I mean vou could float a junk in there and still have room for a terra cotta warrior. OK, they're not that big, but they are definitely a meal by themselves and maybe even to share - which I don't - ever.

And of course all of this is very reasonably priced. The special combos are: one item with fried rice and chow mein for \$3.95; any two items is \$4.95; and add any other item for a dollar more. There are egg foo young dishes, chop suey, chow mein and egg rolls, crab rangoons, dumplings and wontons in the appetizer department. Party trays are available.

So don't let the '50s diner look fool vou. Route 66 never had Chinese fast food like Golden Star.

'Chloe' seduces us

"Chloe," the new film from usually reliable Canadian director Atom Egoyan ("Where the Truth Lies," "Exotica") is not one of his best works.

Or does she?

Hampered by careless editing and continuity errors, "Chloe," a sometimes sexy thriller/mystery, ostensibly is the story of a young call girl who is recruited by a successful ob-gyn (no symbolism here!), Catherine (a slightly miscast Julianne Moore), to try and catch her roving eye professor husband David (Liam Neeson) in an act of infidelity.

The film opens with a sexy scene sparked with candor as Chloe is leaving the bed of a client, and narrates a bit of the story as she seductively pulls on her scattered clothes.

Upon meeting Catherine, Chloe is reticent about getting involved in the dealings of a jealous and suspicious spouse, but of course money talks and Chloe is soon trying to make eye candy contact with David at a busy coffee house.

Or is she? After each encounter, Chloe reports back to Catherine, with each episode becoming more and more steamy, culminating, (maybe) with a union of body parts at a botanical garden (no symbolism here, either).

Catherine, now outraged, insists that she did not "ask" Chloe to do

such things, and that she only asked her to see if hubby would take the bait. I mean, after all, Catherine has already snooped through his cell phone to find suggestive text messages and photos of him frolicking with students. Or was he?

However, the tables turn when it turns out that the slightly wicked Chloe falls in love and bed with the good doctor after seducing her teenage son (but thankfully not at the same time), leaving the innocent (?) professor to flirt with coeds via

instant messaging.

Everything has now spun completely out of control – including the script – and Moore needs to dispatch (peacefully) Chloe with all due abandon. Or does she?

I found it very hard to believe much of this story, since both Moore and Amanda Seyfried as Chloe seemed miscast. Moore's doctor's office scenes feel tacked in and odd, while Seyfried, with her wide set eyes and lack of panache, seemed uncomfortable whether or not she was dressed. Neeson's part, somewhat underwritten, felt obligatory, but wow, do the doc and prof have a handsome angular house, and the scenes of Toronto, a favorite city, are terrific. Egoyan's directing, if you'll excuse the cliché, felt phoned in. Or was it?

The whole thing feels fake, discomfited and stagy, although Moore does her best with a story filled with clumsy plot twists that once again ask her to be naked in a somewhat obligatory sex scene.

But it remains a passable film to watch, just don't expect to remember much the next morning. Or will you?

Fish out of water Film tells tale of culture shock

The CineMatinee movie for Saturday, June 5, is "Necessities of Life" (2008, 102 minutes, in French and Inuktitut). "The Necessities of Life" is a beautiful, bittersweet story of an Inuit hunter trying to make it in the strange southern world of '50s Quebec. Natar Ungalaaq (the star of "Atanarjuat: The Fast Runner") plays Tivii, a hunter who is forced to descend from his home to a sanatorium when he is diagnosed with tuberculosis.

Inspired by actual tuberculosis epidemics among Canada's Inuit population in the '40s and '50s, "The Necessities of Life" is a beautiful fish-out-of-water drama about a man torn from his home and everything he knows and placed into a strange and foreign world (Quebec City, to be precise). The profound culture shock is juxtaposed against some equally intense moments of human connection. Indeed, the film is all about creating a balance of opposites – from the stark, empty vistas of his far northern home to the cluttered views of Quebec City's tree- and building-filled streets.

In spite of the language barrier between him and everyone in the hospital, Tivii understands he'll probably be there for a long time and despair sets in, only to be slowly lifted through gentle interactions with fellow patients and caring nurses. An orphaned Inuit boy appears on the scene to act as Tivii's translator and the older man takes him under his wing, teaching him about the customs, myths and traditions of his people, most of which he's long forgotten.

The mid-20th century period details are well handled by director Benoit Pilon, who's directed mostly documentaries up to this point. Obviously his eye for realism and detail is well suited to telling this subtle and emotionally potent story.

The film was nominated for eight Genies, the Oscar for best foreign language film and a slew of other awards. It's all just another sign that Canada's far north is developing a deeply powerful cinematic voice.

Unless otherwise noted, screening time is 1:30 p.m., and admission is \$4 for everyone except film society members who are admitted for \$1. The theatre is located one-half block south of the Mesilla Plaza. For more information, please call 524-8287, and leave a message.

'Prince of Persia' sometimes mired in excess

Is there something we should be dune instead?

I've never been good at video games – even in the days of Pong. Terrible at Space Invaders. Stank up the place at Centipede. Pac Man? Forget it.

But despite my below-average capabilities, I have tried today's more sophisticated ones – with their amazingly realistic graphics, the complicated leaping and flipping maneuvers, the high-tech weaponry and fighting techniques required to "beat" the game or advance to a higher level of accomplishment. They are so far beyond the days of a simple joystick and maybe a firing button or two.

And the stories – I guess you could call them plots, in a way. Gone are the days when you simply avoided the bombs from a flying saucer or tried to eat as many dots and fruits as possible before the ghosts got you. (Damn you, Blinky!) There are now fantastic tales of heroes doing battle with all sorts of evildoers from aliens to warlocks. You can be a soldier called to duty or try to avoid being busted for grand theft auto. You can even decide which character you want to be and get them involved in all sorts of adventures.

All these elements and the development of the video game by the same name led to the movie version of "Prince of Persia: The Sands of Time." The complex plot, especially at its climax, is – to use terms tossed about in the film – a blessing and a curse.

The movie is blessed with some fun and interesting characters – I am not sure how much I cared about any of them, though. The ostriches used during one scene inspired a good deal of empathy, however.

Prince Dastan (Jake Gyllenhaal) is adopted by the Persian king when he is just a wily street urchin. Dastan is raised alongside the king's other two biological sons.

Flash forward and the Persian princes, counseled by uncle Nizam (Ben Kingsley), are about to unleash the might of the Persian army upon a holy city, Alamut, which is suspected of making and smuggling arms to Persia's enemies.

This is all complicated due to the presence of Alamut's beautiful princess Tamina (Gemma Arterton). She is the guardian of a fabled dagger that can unleash the Sands of Time, which not only can turn back the clock, but, in the wrong hands, could destroy the world.

Naturally evil forces and treacheries come into play, and Dastan and Tamina team up – with the typical "I love you, but I want to kill you or maybe I just want to kill you" dynamic – to protect the dagger and fight off the bad guys. By the way, if Dastan can't tell which family member is really pulling the strings then he ain't really that wily.

Whenever Dustan has to avoid the evil minions, he starts leaping from rooftop to rooftop or swinging on conveniently placed

poles that protrude from the walls of just about every building. At those times I could almost feel every audience member familiar with the game hitting "up C" or whatever on their game controllers.

There are enjoyable moments. Alfred Molina elicits some laughs as Sheik Amar, a rogue who runs several nefarious side businesses, most notably races featuring the aforementioned ostriches, and spends his time trying to avoid paying taxes. Arterton is truly beautiful, and despite being in fantasy/myth mode these days (see "Clash of the Titans") is a promising young actress.

The final battle where the future – or is it

the past – of the world hangs in the balance is pretty hard to follow so the director throws in a lot of explosions, fire, lava, whirlwinds and, of course, sand until the movie reaches its rather anti-climactic ending.

But maybe the film, and this could apply to lots of them nowadays, would have been better if it hadn't been cursed with the video game plot extravagances and just avoided the ghosts until the hero could eat some fruit and turn the tables, but then the ever-increasing need for excess in all our entertainments wouldn't be satisfied, and we'd be stuck hitting an electronic blip between two electronic paddles. Game – slightly above averagely – over.

While the home of Bronte and Ed Nelson, at 4870 Mother Lode Trail, doesn't have a Rosie, it does feature several automated elements in addition to expansive views and a contemporary motif.

The California couple hired Alex de la Pena of DLP Building Co. to construct their home in 2007.

The Nelsons originally purchased a lot twice the size in the Organ Mesa subdivision, which had several natural arroyos. This made designing the home a challenge, so de la Pena took it upon himself to find the couple a new piece of property that included spectacular views of the Organ Mountains and city lights.

"He drove around and found this lot, then he presented his idea to us," Ed Nelson said. "We went to our real estate agent and said we found a new property."

Wanting their home to be one-of-a-kind and customized in every way possible, it took the Nelsons and DLP Building Co. longer than expected to build the 3,015-square-foot house. "We missed the showcase of homes both

times," Ed Nelson said.

For Ed Nelson, he wanted his home to reflect his love of technology and incorporated a system that automated several repeat functions such as locking and unlocking the door, listening to music, setting the alarm and turning lights on and off.

As for the look of the home, Ed Nelson said that was determined by his wife.

"My wife had a really clean, crystal clear idea of what she wanted to do," Ed Nelson said. "The stuff behind the walls was mine, the design was my wife's."

Bronte Nelson said the home was based on a Frank Lloyd Wright design and features several

contemporary elements, such as clean lines and angles and natural products, including concrete, stone, wood and tile.

"I've always loved Frank Lloyd Wright, his craftsmanship and the use of natural elements," she said.

In addition to the famous American architect, the couple found inspiration from various homes they visited around the United States.

"I see it as a contemporary, state-of-the-art home," said Realtor Laura Szalay of RE/MAX Classic Realty, who represents the listing. Gravel, a rock arroyo and

Gravel, a rock arroyo and several native plants greet guests to the home. Through the large iron-and-glass front door – accented with squares and circles – is the frosted-glass waterfall, which turns on automatically.

To the right of the entrance is a purple-and-lavender half bathroom hand painted by Bronte Nelson. Colorful, deco-

rative tile and tempered glass can be seen in each bathroom, which took long time to be mastered.

"The labor to do the tile work we needed was an extra challenge," Ed Nelson said. "It had to be redone three times."

At the center of the home is the kitchen and living room area. "I really think this is the most dynamic

a really think this is the most dynamic space," Szalay said. "It's great for cooking and entertaining."

"I love my kitchen," Bronte Nelson said. "I love that open concept and the colors. It turned out to be everything I wanted."

She said the Asian-infused kitchen was inspired by a picture she saw in a magazine. Green paint and stacked cherry wood cabinets fill the room, as an unique forest marble lines the countertops. A stained-glass pantry door and black, streamlined hood complete the kitchen.

Along with style, the kitchen also is functional. Next to the copper sink is a built-in cutting board that slides out to reveal a trashcan.

The living room features a copper fireplace surrounded by floor-to-ceiling windows that capture the view of the Organ Mountains.



A half bathroom features hand-painted walls, tempered-glass tiles and a stylish vessel sink, all of which add to the home's contemporary feel.



A soothing waterfall, surrounded by copper and stone, graces the entrance of the home and turns on when the front door is opened.

Past the elevated desk area, which includes a door to the patio, is the master suite. The bedroom, painted a pale robin-egg blue with dark brown accents, includes a sitting area as well as several small rectangular windows, a motif that can be found throughout the home.

The master bathroom includes granite countertops and cherry wood cabinets. Stained glass decorates the cabinets. Bronte Nelson said she selected glass that features blue and purple swirls to highlight the colors of the granite.

Unlike other master bathrooms, the Nelsons didn't want a large soaking or jetted bathtub. Instead, they opted for an oversized athletic shower surrounded by green tile with two showerheads and a bench.

"We wanted it big enough that one of us could be washing and the other could be drying off," Ed Nelson said.

Designed with a split floor plan, the dining room and other private rooms are located on the opposite side of the home. Bronte Nelson hand painted each room,

including the dining room ceiling, which was made to look like wood.

After visiting a home in Florida, the Nelsons were inspired to incorporate their indoor and outdoor living spaces by continuing the ceramic tile on the patio.

"My favorite place is standing on the back patio looking over the city," Ed Nelson said. "It's really neat at night."

With a five-panel fold-up door, the couple can open up the living room to the outdoor kitchen, which includes a grill.

"The whole wall goes away, and it becomes a shared space," he said.

Szalay said the home is not like any other with its futuristic features.

"The creative aspect comes through in every room," she said. "The colors, windows, shapes, vessel sinks – every room holds a new surprise."

Say goodbye to hard sugar

The Brown Sugar Bear keeps baking staple moist longer

As you go to whip up a batch of your favorite brown sugar concoction, you may be disappointed to discover that your bag of sugar, which has been sitting on the shelf for months, is now as hard as a brick.

A common ingredient of molasses, brown sugar received a bad rap in the 1800s when those connected to the white sugar industry stated it was an "inferior" product. The two substances are in fact similar in several ways,

Brown Sugar Cookies

- 1 cup butter or
- margarine, softened
- 1 cup brown sugar, packed 2 cups all-purpose flour
- egg
- teaspoon vanilla
- 1 teaspoon baking soda 1/8 teaspoon salt Nuts to taste, optional
- Blend the butter and

sugar together, then beat in the egg and vanilla. Stir in the flour, baking soda and salt together, then add to egg mixture. Mix well

Drop by teaspoonfuls onto greased cookie sheets. Bake in a preheated oven at 350 degrees for 6 to 8 minutes. Makes 4 dozen.

Featured kitchen gadget: Brown Sugar Bear

except brown sugar is believed to contain slightly more vitamins, calcium and iron than its refined counterpart.

Over time, however, moisture is sucked out of the sugar, leaving it hard and difficult to work with in the kitchen.

While apples, bread and other degradable materials have been used to keep brown sugar moist, a reusable gadget that won't contaminate the taste or quality of your sugar is the Brown Sugar Bear.

What is it?

Sugar Bears Inc. founder Barbara Gillies of Calgary, Alberta, Canada, created the Brown Sugar Bear in 1996. A potter for more than 20 years, Gillies discovered that fired clay soaked in water helped extend the life of soft brown sugar.

First sold in Canada, this baker's dream gadget has spread into the United States and Europe.

How does it work?

To use, simply soak the Brown Sugar Bear in warm water for 20 minutes and place inside a bag with the sugar. The clay bear will keep the sugar moist for three to six months, depending on the climate. The bear can then be resoaked and used again.

The Brown Sugar Bear can be used for more than just the sweet baking ingredient. When soaked, it will keep cakes and cookies moist, and help coconut, popcorn, licorice, raisins and other dried fruits stay fresh

The bear also can keep spices, salt, electronic equipment, crackers and chips dry. Simply dry the gadget in the oven, let it cool, then place it into a sealed container with these items.

Where can it be found?

The Brown Sugar Bear can be found



around town at stores such as Ace Hardware and Bed, Bath & Beyond. It can also be purchased online at www.amazon.com and www. sugarbearsinc.com.

How much does it cost?

The Brown Sugar Bear costs between \$2 and \$5, depending on where it is purchased. If you buy the gadget online, remember shipping and handling fees will be charged.

Helpful hint:

If bears aren't your thing, the brown sugar gadget comes in a variety of designs including an apple, honey bee, gingerbread man, mouse and maple leaf.

While journeying down Spruce Avenue, drivers may notice a fastfood restaurant or two, several local businesses and a few schoolyards. They may also notice a quaint plot of raised garden beds.

Opened May 6, 2009, by Las Esperanzas, a nonprofit organization dedicated to the preservation of the Mesquite Street Original Townsite Historic District, Jardin de Esperanzas consists of 18 6-by-3-foot concrete plots available to neighborhood members.

'The plots are rented out to people in the district or related to those in the district," said Jardin de Esperanzas coordinator Andrea Camunez. "The idea is to bring the community together."

Recently hitting the one-year mark, the community garden is working to grow vegetables and herbs as well as unity in the community.

Community roots

David Chavez, Las Esperanzas president, said the idea of a community garden in the historic district first sprouted seven years ago. After several years of looking for a plot of land, the nonprofit received help from district resident state Rep. Anthony Lujan, who acquired funding for the project.

The city gave Las Esperanzas the land on the corner of Spruce Avenue and San Pedro Street, and within nine months, Chavez said, the organic garden was ready to be opened to the public.

"We're trying to bring the neighborhood back up," Camunez said. 'Crime levels (in the Mesquite district) have reduced since Las Esperanzas began."

The community garden has worked to connect neighborhood members as well as provide them with nutritious food.

"We're trying to keep it as organic and healthy as possible," Chavez said.

To help spread the message of neighborhood unity and producing quality food, Camunez said several events have been centered around Jardin de Esperanzas.

In addition to a plant giveaway held in conjunction with Local Solutions, which worked to beautify the historic district, the community garden was one of eight sites on the 2010 Las Cruces Tour of Gardens. We wanted to open it up for the public to look at for a day," Camunez said.

Gardening classes have also been held for Jardin de Esperanzas participants, during which master gardeners or those affiliated with the Doña Ana County Extension Office speak to the group.

This year, the community garden held a potluck, and Camunez said they are planning a barbecue later in the season to roast vegetables that have been grown in the garden.

"I hope to do one thing a month," she said. "You can meet people you normally wouldn't meet. It's more functional than just a park. Here, you get involved with growing and get to meet people.

"More new people are coming through. The sense of community is building. The garden is becoming a talking point."

Several Mesquite district community members are now showing interest in the garden, including Chavez, who has a plot this year.

"I'm looking forward to my first harvest," he said.

Benefiting young and old

Located at the gateway to the community, Jardin de Esperanzas is designed to be used by everyone - from children and the elderly to those who are handicapped.

"Half of the beds are designed to be used by those in wheelchairs," Camunez said.

Buzzing culprit causes cutouts

Crop circles? Well maybe not exactly.

You may have seen semicircles cut out of the leaves of some of your trees or shrubs, and the leaf cutter bee is the culprit. It is a small grey bee that makes her nest out of the missing pieces of leaves you worked so hard to plant.

Native to the western United States, the leaf cutter bee is an important pollinating insect, so you really should not kill this annoying critter. Read up on dwindling bee populations and what it means to our food supply.

The good news is the bee won't kill your plant, it just makes it look bad. (Good news? Yeah, right.) This insect usually attacks new plantings, and after the second season the damage, if any at all, is much less evident. It can attack roses, lilac, crape myrtle, pear trees and chitalpa, among other plants in your garden.

If you tend to over fertilize and/ or over water your plants, you usually will produce lush soft tissue growth that the bee just can't pass up. Avoid high nitrogen fertilizers



or use organic fertilizers instead.

Try using a garlic spray as a repellant. There used to be a product on the market specifically for this, but due to label requirements from the state, it is not for sale in New Mexico. It was just concentrated garlic juice. It worked on an array of insects and kept the leaf cutter bee away. If you can live with a few holes in your leaves for a season without losing sleep, then you win. If the circles really bother you, then plant more trees and shrubs or have your neighbor plant more trees and shrubs (it doesn't hurt to try). I figure the more leaves the bee has to choose from, the less damage each plant will receive - in theory, of course.

Cut an old wine cork into thin slices and attach them to the bottom of the chair's legs with a dot of wood glue. This trick also works on picture frames. Not only will the wall be protected, the cork will grip the surface and keep the frame in place.

8. Craft stamps: Fashion a personalized stamp by carving the end of an old cork. Using a sharp knife, carefully shape your desired design, then press it into an ink pad or dip it into paint. Your new cork-stamp will come in handy the next time you or your kids want to decorate handmade cards.

9. Make a bead curtain: Dress up a plain window or doorway with a bead curtain fabricated from old wine corks. Delicately drill a hole into several corks and string them onto a line of yarn or a cord. Add beads for a splash of color. Make as many cords as needed to cover a curtain rod.

10. Fasten an earring: The tiny backings to earrings can easily become lost. Save yourself a trip to the jewelry store by making your own earring back out of cork. Cut a small divot of cork the size of a backing and push it onto the earring.

11. Quickly make sowing holes: Creating straight garden rows with evenly spaced holes for seeds can be time consuming. A wine cork can quicken the process. Use a board the size of the garden bed and drill drywall screws into it about 3/4 inch apart. Attach corks to each screw and press the board into the soil. Remove the board and you will be left with even seed holes.

12. Clean a knife: Has your carbon-steel kitchen knife lost its shine? Clean it with a wine cork. Dampen the end of the cork and dip it in scouring powder. Pass the powder-covered end over the blade of the knife then rinse.

13. Hinder rust: Keep your kitchen utensils and garden tools in tip-top shape with the help of a cork and cooking oil. Dip the end of the cork into the oil and rub it on the item. The oil will stop rust from forming.

14. Make a place card holder: The next time you host a dinner party, create specialized place card holders for your table using cork. Cut about a quarter of the cork's length off to make a flat base. Slice a slit in the top of the cork and insert a place card with the guest's name into it.

There are also several other ways to recycle and reuse cork around the house.

1. Create a fishing bobber: As the weather warms up, a trip to Elephant Butte may be on the agenda. Even if you don't have any fishing bobbers, you can still enjoy a day of fishing by creating a floaty substitute from a leftover wine cork. Insert a staple into the top of the cork. Make sure there is enough space between the staple and the cork to string the fishing line through.

2. Protect your table: That ceramic vase or piece of pottery sure makes a nice addition to your hardwood table, too bad its rough edges can cause damage. Prevent the bottom of the item from scratching and scuffing your tabletop by covering it with cork. Do this by either cutting a large piece of corkboard or slicing

Spring renews aphids' honeydew Sweet substance harms plants, attracts predators

Honeydew isn't always as welcome as a ripe green melon. The sticky substance excreted by aphids, called honeydew, can ruin garden plants when it turns black with fungus. In large numbers, aphids can cause damage in other ways, causing yellowing curled leaves on plants. Some species will cause gall formations and others will cut short a plant's growth. They may not necessarily kill plants, but they'll cause a lot

of damage.

What's a gardener to do?

This is an insect that has friends that will protect it – for example the ants that offer protection in exchange for the aphids' honeydew. But the aphid has plenty of enemies, too. They provide an effective solution to keeping aphid populations down.

I've written about several beneficial pests that would be all too delighted to munch on some tasty aphids. And they're commercially available, making aphid control in the reach of those nurturing even the smallest garden.

Some of these gardeners' avengers are more common than many would expect. The simple lady beetle is a great champion and will gobble up aphids at an amazing rate. They may provide control for a while before they move on from your plot.

There are others, including the lacewing and syrphid fly. Another mortal enemy is the parasitic wasp, which will lay eggs inside aphids.

The bottom line is that aphids can be controlled in many ways, including natural remedies that just take a bit of consideration to determine which is best for you.

Great find on the sale rack 'Chipotle' features delectable dishes

Some of the best cookbooks are discovered on sale racks. Such was the case when I recently came across Leda Scheintaub's cookbook, "Chipotle - Smoky Hot Recipes for All Occasions" (Paragon, 2008). The \$2.99 full-color keeper is chock full of more than 40 tasty, easy-to-prepare recipes enlivened with chipotle pepper.

Chipotle – a smoked and dried red jalapeño can be purchased in powder form, dried whole or canned packed in adobo sauce. I especially favor the latter. Adobo sauce is made from a delightful blend of ground chiles, herbs, tomatoes and vinegar and is used as a marinade for meats or as a serving sauce.

Although traditionally added to Mexican recipes, in recent years chipotle has made its way into the international dish scene including Indian and Asian. Scheintaub delivers a sample of each in "Chipotle" – a hot buy that sizzles with palate-pleasing recipes. "Chipotle" can be purchased new and used at many online bookstores.

Almond-Crusted Steak with Chipotle Butter

If you're in a hurry, you can make this recipe without the almonds. Chipotle butter on its own adds a beautiful touch to a steak dinner

2 (1-inch) thick boneless top

loin (strip) steaks 1 cup blanched almonds,

round to a powder Salt

2 teaspoons vegetable oil Chipotle butter (see following recipe) Greens and roasted potatoes, to serve

Pat the steaks dry and sprinkle with salt. Place the almonds on a plate and press the steaks into the almonds to coat. Set aside for 15 minutes.

In a large heavy skillet, heat the oil over medium-high heat until hot, but not smoking. Cook the steaks, one at a time if necessary, about 4 minutes per side for mediumrare. Transfer to a cutting board and let rest 5 minutes before serving.

Slice the steaks, arrange the slices on serving plates, and top with a dollop of chipotle butter. Serve with greens and roasted potatoes.

Chipotle Butter

Use this butter on hot biscuits, to top off steak, or in place of plain butter whenever you want to add a little heat.

1/2 cup (1 stick) unsalted butter, softened 4 teaspoons canned chipotle chiles

- in adobo sauce, minced
- 1 tablespoon adobo sauce from canned chipotle chiles
- 1 1/2 teaspoons fresh lime zest
- 2 teaspoons fresh lime juice
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Place all the ingredients in a food processor and blend until fully incorporated. Place the mixture in a container, cover and refrigerate until ready to use. Makes 1/2 cup.

Hummus with Roasted Garlic & Poblano Chiles

This might seem like a lot of garlic, but roasting mellows the garlic and lends a slightly sweet buttery flavor to the hummus. Serve with tortilla chips, toasted pita chips, or carrot, celery and jicama sticks. 1 head garlic

1/3 cup extra virgin olive oil, plus extra for roasting the garlic 1 large poblano chile

2 cups drained cooked or canned chickpeas, plus whole chickpeas for garnish

- 1/2 cup tahini (sesame paste) 1 teaspoon Smoky Chili Powder plus extra for garnish (see following recipe)
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1 to 2 teaspoons canned chipotle

chiles in adobo sauce, chopped 3 tablespoons fresh lime juice, or to taste

Salt Preheat the oven to 375 degrees. Peel off the

papery outer layers of the garlic head and cut off top 1/2 inch. Place the garlic on a piece of aluminum foil large enough to fully wrap it. Drizzle with a little oil and sprinkle with salt. Wrap in the foil and roast for about 45 minutes, or until the garlic cloves are soft enough to slide out of the skin when pressed. Let cool and then pop the cloves out from the skin.

Roast the poblano chile directly over a gas flame or place under the broiler, turning with tongs until all sides are blacked. Place the chile in a heatproof bowl, cover with a large plate, and set aside for 20 minutes. Remove the chile from the bowl. Remove the skin, stems and

seeds, and finely chop.

In a food processor, combine the chickpeas, tahini, roasted garlic, chili powder, cumin, canned chipotles, oil, lime juice and salt to taste and process until combined. With motor running, add water, up to 1/2 cup, through the hole in the feed tube, until the mixture is smooth, scraping down the sides of the machine a couple of times. Fold in the poblano chiles. Taste and add more lime juice or salt if needed. Serve garnished with the whole chickpeas and a dusting of Smoky Chili Powder. Makes about 2 cups.

Smoky Chili Powder

2 tablespoons ground cumin 1 tablespoon chipotle chili powder 1 tablespoon ancho chili powder

- 2 tablespoons dried
- oregano, crumbled
- 2 tablespoons garlic powder

Thoroughly combine all the ingredients in a medium bowl. Transfer to an airtight container until ready to use. Makes 1/2 cup.

Smoky Gazpacho

You'll need to make this soup at least an hour in advance – or better yet, the day before – to fully allow the flavors to come out.

1 pound tomatoes (about 2 large tomatoes), peeled, cored, seeded and finely chopped







1 small cucumber, peeled, seeded and finely chopped

1/2 medium red onion, finely chopped 1 small red bell pepper, cored

- and finely chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 tablespoon red wine vinegar
- 1 tablespoon fresh lime juice, or to taste
- 1 tablespoon extra virgin olive oil 1/2 cup fresh cilantro, loosely packed
- and chopped, plus more to garnish 1 1/2 cups unsalted tomato juice
- 2 teaspoons canned chipotle chiles in adobo sauce, minced
- Salt In a large bowl, combine the tomatoes,

cucumber, onion, pepper, garlic, vinegar, lime juice, oil, cilantro and salt to taste.

Place the tomato juice and chipotles in a blender and blend to purée the chipotles. Add half of the vegetable mixture and blend to a chunky purée.

Return the purée to the bowl and stir to combine with the chopped vegetables. Taste and adjust the seasonings; adding more lime juice or salt if needed.

Chill, covered, for at least 1 hour, or until cold. Spoon into bowls and serve garnished with cilantro. Makes 4 servings.
