

# SNAP sees 50 percent increase with county support

Doña Ana County has partnered with the Spay and Neuter Action Program for years and in August increased funding to provide free spay and neuter surgeries for domestic cats and dogs that belong to county residents in unincorporated areas.

"It has been a very successful partnership for our community. Since August, we experienced a significant increase in the number of surgeries we facilitate and

estimate more than 212 cats and 469 dogs have been 'fixed' for county unincorporated area residents' said Sue Daily, SNAP office manager. The number of cat and dog spay and neuter surgeries overall increased by nearly 50 percent to 1,994 in 2019, from 1,325 in 2018.

"And we know we over it in large part to the

"And we know we owe it in large part to the county's investment and letting people know about it. We especially want residents of rural and unincorporated areas to know the surgeries are available for free, along with microchipping and rabies vaccinations," Daily said.

"Most of the surgeries are at no cost to residents of county unincorporated and rural areas. Even residents of incorporated areas can benefit from a cost reduction," Daily said. Doña Ana County covers the fees in full or in part, based on income and residence, determined through a brief qualification process.

The county's partnership with SNAP dates back years and was recently revised by county

leadership to promote countywide responsible and caring ownership of domesticated animals. "Our overall goal in this partnership and investment is to reduce the number of animals taken into custody by Doña Ana County Animal Control Officers and delivered to the Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley," said County Manager Fernando R. Macias. "Preventing the overpopulation of cats and dogs in our community is the most strategic and humane approach to loose animals and neighborhood nuisance."

Spaying or neutering domestic animals helps control the overpopulation in the county and decreases the number of animals neglected, abandoned or ultimately destroyed. In 2019, animal control officers picked up 1,721 unleashed or stray dogs and 884 roaming cats.

"We are the ones picking up neglected, runaway or abandoned animals. We prefer and are very glad when we pick up dogs or cats that are microchipped and

get reunited with their owner, that same day," said Mary Lou Ward, Doña Ana County Animal Control and Codes Enforcement Supervisor. "On the other hand, it is devastating when we pick up neglected or hurt animals that end up being euthanized."

Thousands of animals are put down each year in shelters across the state, including at the Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley. "Everyone can help reduce the number of euthanized animals by spaying or neutering their companion animals. It is safe for the pet and improves some of their aggressive and risky free-roaming behaviors," Daily said.

To report loose, hurt or neglected animals, please call the Mesilla Valley Regional Dispatch Authority, MVRDA, at (575) 526-0795 and choose option 6. They route the information to the right department and also track the number and type of calls received from each area. # Mayor outlines major initiatives for fourth term

In his 2020 State of the City address, Mayor Ken Miyagishima outlined five major initiatives he supports and believes will "pay valuable dividends for our community for years to come."

Miyagishima, who was re-elected last November to an unprecedented fourth consecutive fouryear term as mayor, made the 30-minute speech Wednesday afternoon, Feb. 19, at City Hall. The audience included former Las Cruces Mayor Ruben Smith, as well as mayors from surrounding communities and Las Cruces and Doña Ana County leaders and elected officials.

"I'm pleased to announce the state of our city is strong," Miyagishima said, as he outlined these initiatives:

· Affordable housing. "Access to quality housing is key to our residents' ability to live as fully empowered members of the local community," the mayor said. "While we haven't had the extreme inflation in housing prices that some communities experience, home ownership and affordable rents remain out of reach for many of our residents. This is especially true for millennials, seniors and disabled people on fixed incomes, and young families with children, even when both parents are working. We can, as a community, do more to meet this need."

Miyagishima said he would like the city "to

make greater use of the investment portfolio of the Telshor Fund, a

public-benefit account created through the leasing of Memorial Medical Center, to make low-interest loans to local housing providers, which he said could then be applied as part of the match for state and local grants.

The mayor said the city should also "be more proactive in acquiring infill property for new housing" so that lower- and middleincome residents can use existing public transit and other facilities and infrastructure and devote more of their incomes to housing. The mayor also called for a wider variety of affordable housing in Las Cruces.

• Developing the 110 acres the city owns on far east Lohman Avenue across from Mountain-View Regional Medica Center. "Rental of commercial real estate along Lohman will eventually provide hundreds of

thousands of dollars annually in non-tax revenue for city activities," the mayor said. "Noncommercial space can be developed, as well – master-planned in a public process to include improvements like open areas, a nature park and a model residential community."

• Behavioral health. "We have all become

more aware of the behavioral challenges facing many in our community, and the role those challenges play in poor school performance, substance abuse, crime, homelessness and reduced quality of life," Miyagishima sad. "We are realizing that law enforcement officers

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# The outdoors is calling **YOU**!

Let's be honest, a lot of us spend our workdays cooped up indoors under bright office lights, our eyes fixed on computer screens for hours, drinking copious amounts of coffee, and then return home to bask in the glow of our TV screens...

But spending too much time inside isn't good for you. And getting outside is beneficial (maybe essential!) for your health. Spending time outdoors doesn't mean that you have to head off to the sporting goods store for camping equipment. It could be taking a walk in your neighborhood or even just visiting your local park. Let's take a look today at why getting outdoors is so important for your health. Even better - it's backed by science!

#### 1. Outdoor activity fights off stress

Something about getting outdoors changes how your body reacts to stress. One study found that people sent camping in the woods for two nights had lower levels of cortisol (your stress hormone) than those who spent that same time in the city. In the office, even the view of nature outside the window is associated with lower stress and higher job satisfaction. So if you don't have a view outdoors while you're working, find small ways in your week to get outdoors more!

### 2. <u>Spending time outside reduces</u> inflammation

In one study, people who spent time in the forest had less inflammation compared to those who spent time in the city. In another, reduced inflammation was noted in elderly people who spent a week in the forest.

#### 3. It helps eliminate fatigue

You know that feeling when your brain feels 'foggy' and you feel extra tired at the end of the day, wanting to do nothing but put your feet up with a brew? Researchers call that "mental fatigue."



Dennis Prickett Physical Therapist and co-owner of Atrium Physical Therapy. One study found that people's mental energy bounced back even when they just looked at pictures of nature. Pictures of city scenes had no such effect. So, if you find it hard to get outdoors often, that's one simple solution to help clear brain fog! You could even set your computer's screensaver to something scenic to feel a benefit.

#### 4. <u>Getting outside lowers blood</u> pressure

With all these effects, it's no surprise that getting outside – which usually involves walking – lowers blood pressure too. One study of 280 participants found that along with lowering our stress hormone by more than 15%, a walk outdoors lowered the average pulse by almost 4% and blood pressure by just over 2%. So you may not need to keep taking pills to keep your blood pressure levels in a healthy state – and instead, go for a gentle walk!

### 5. <u>Nature could improve your short-term</u> <u>memory</u>

Find yourself getting a bit forgetful? Well, there may just be a natural remedy for that! Several studies have shown that nature walks have memory-promoting effects that other walks don't. In one study, a group of students was given a brief memory test, then divided into two groups. One group took a stroll around a park, and the others took a walk down a city street. When the participants returned and did the test again, those who had walked among trees did almost 20% better in the test than the first time. The ones who had taken in city sights instead did not consistently improve.

Get outside as much as you can! Walking is a great way to keep active, mobile and give you an energy boost. It doesn't have to be a difficult or long hike. Enjoy a gentle stroll - a walk in the park or a light ramble in your neighborhood. That's all it takes!

better.


"I believe that as a community we can find the solutions to fix our state. I plan to work to get us back to what makes this state and our country so great."

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

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# In Las Cruces, home means something

've thought a lot about home the past few weeks. Not the home where I grew up in Tulsa, Oklahoma although I do think of that home often, especially lately - but I mean the broader meaning of home.

half a world away. When he came home it was to his country, his state and his city. And his hometown responded not only to Rodriguez, but also what he represented, showering his memory with honor and dignity as the hearse carrying his body traversed the city.

My friend and former Bulletin editor Brook Stockberger shared the story of his young son, Grant, who attends Valley View Elementary, across the street from Immaculate Heart of Mary, where Rodriguez's funeral services took place.

The day before, when Grant learned the students would be allowed to go outside and salute the hearse, Grant insisted he wear his Scout uniform for the occasion. So, mom, Terri Ritter-Stockberger, got the uniform washed and ready. Grant believed wearing the uniform "would show respect."

If you live in a place where even young boys make it a

point to show respect and honor at your passing, you have a wonderful place to call home.

At the Las Cruces Hispanic Chamber of Commerce Banquet Feb. 21, the keynote speaker was Virgin Galactic CEO Mike Moses. He discussed what home means, and talked about each of the places he's lived, starting with growing up in Pittsburgh, chasing a dream of flight and space travel. The dream took him to key locations of America's space story: Cape Canaveral, Houston, California.

"When it comes to space, New Mexico has historical impact and future destiny," Moses said. "Space is incredibly difficult, but incredibly rewarding. At Virgin Galactic, we were founded on the principle of customer service. We have a chance to change the world for good."

As Virgin Galactic employees have moved from California to Las Cruces (and in the process, purchasing \$9 million worth of homes), I've had a chance to meet a few of them. To a person, just as Moses described, they sincerely feel at home in Las Cruces.

For some, it's an escape from relentless metro traffic. For others, it's an escape from humid weather. For others, it's an escape to beautiful views and the possibilities of their mission. For all of them, though, the people of Las Cruces are what they point to

If you live in a place where you can do amazing work and people treat you as a friend, you have a wonderful place to call home.

At that same banquet, Stephanie Medoff, presented the award for Citizen of the Year. A year prior, she accepted it on behalf of her husband, Mark, was too ill to attend in person. He would pass away two months later. She talked about why her Tony Award-winning husband stayed in Las Cruces, when he could have lived anywhere. Ultimately, she said, he stayed because of the "richness of the hearts" of the people of Las Cruces.

Earlier that Friday night, I had the chance to meet three new people: Darrell Martin, Andrea Kabwasa and Chris Williams. They are three of the four new inductees of the Aggie Sports Hall of Fame.

I had arrived at the reception in hopes of visiting the one inductee I was familiar with: former NMSU basketballer Wendell McKines, one of my favorite Aggie hoopsters ever. Travel connections, however, had delayed McKines' arrival.

Instead, I visited with Martin, who was one of NMSU's track and field greats, a sprinter; Kabwasa, one of the greatest-ever NMSU women's basketball players, with a complete game; and Williams, an Aggie footballer who has played in the NFL and starred in the Canadian Football League.

Unlike McKines, imposing at 6-6, 230, and always vocally entertaining, Martin, Kabwasa and Williams were each about 5-8, still in good shape and very low-key.

Kabwasa has had an unexpected odyssey in her post student-athlete days. She's

earned additional degrees to augment her NMSU bachelor's, and has worked in art, nonprofits and now teaches special education in Los Angeles. She has a wonderfully calm peace about her, belying the energy and command she displayed on the basketball court.

I only got to see Williams in one game as an Aggie, but last week I watched on YouTube a five-minute highlight reel of his 2012 season in the CFL, scoring touchdowns every way possible including - something that could only happen on the extended field of the Canadian game - a 121-yard kickoff return for a touchdown. He made uncatchable catches and unbelievable moves and bursts of speed to elude tackles. In short, he was a monster. That made meeting him in person a shocker. I'm no athlete at all, but at 6-2, 180, I had about 6 inches and 25 pounds on Williams. He speaks very softly and very articulately, and if you encountered him on a city street and were challenged to guess his occupation, pro football player probably wouldn't be in your top 50 guesses.

They were genuinely humbled to be named inductees, and even though each only lived in Las Cruces for a short while, they were sincerely grateful for their time as NMSU athletes, and how it helped them become the people they are.

If you live in a place where you are presented with oncein-a-lifetime opportunities, make lifelong friendships and receive a life-changing education, then you have a wonderful place to call home.



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

If you watch cable TV and the nightly news, over the course of a month or so you would have been exposed to commercials marketing these 52 drugs and

others courtesy of Big Pharma. The pharmaceutical giants have captured our health care system, our national politicians and relentlessly bombard our airwaves, generating hundreds of billions in profits for pharmaceutical corporations and their stockholders.

The U.S. and New Zealand are the only two countries that allow prescription meds to be advertised on television. Sanctioned drug pushers like Bayer, Johnson & Johnson and Pflizer inundate our airwaves to entice consumers to seek the newest "wonder" drugs, most of which have a plethora of negative side effects.

The U.S., which has 5 percent of the world's population, accounts for 42 percent of the money spent on prescription drugs. Medicare Part D explicitly prevents the government from negotiating prices with Big Pharma for the drugs it purchases, so drug prices escalate. This is unethical and insane.

Our lawmakers have the right, and more importantly, the obligation, to stop this madness. A good place to start is preventing television advertising of drugs. New Zealand's government is reconsidering its position. Our government should, too.

# Engineer deans established student-centric culture at NMSU

Feb. 16-21 was National Engineers Week, with the theme "Engineers: Pioneers of Progress."

Throughout
its century-plus
history, the New
Mexico State University College of
Engineering has had its
share of pioneers.

In my preparation for an interview on the historical impact of Ralph Goddard on the college, I discovered that he and other leaders developed a progressive studentcentric culture that is as old as the college itself.

During the humble

beginnings of the college, during the second decade of the 20th century, the troubles on the U.S./
Mexico border created a "feeling on campus ... one of goodwill, hard work and mutual

support." It was noted that faculty members frequently made small loans to students or invited them home for dinner.

Dean Goddard was known to have traveled the state giving lectures and demonstrations aimed at attracting new students for the young engineering college. He organized a radio club at his home in 1919, with students invited to listen to the receiving set he had constructed in his basement.

In the words of Hugh Milton, who served as dean of engineering. NMSU president, and went on to become the undersecretary of the U.S. Army in the 1950s, "the decade of the Goddard administration [1914-29] was characterized as one of consolidation and formalization of the engineering program. The objective was to strengthen the curricula, secure a fully competent faculty and provide the best equipment with the available monies."

Milton, a speaker, writer and historian himself, also writes, "... to him [Goddard] must be given great credit for the future prestige of the Engineering College of New Mexico State University."

Milton also took steps to advance the college for the benefit of students. It was he who prepared for and achieved accreditation for the civil, electrical and mechanical engineering programs—a step that enabled graduates to gain registration

for state professional engineering boards.

The accreditation committee commended the broad scope of the engineering curriculum that emphasize professionalism of engineering along with practical aspects.

In 1938, Milton was followed by another legendary dean, Daniel "Dad" Jett, who had been chosen the most popular faculty member for seven different years. Taking the leadership of the college almost simultaneously with the beginning of World War II, Jett corresponded with his students serving in all branches of the

military. It is remarkable that a college dean could have, or would have, maintained detailed correspondence with hundreds of students serving in every corner of the world.

These three extraordinary leaders established the tenor of the College of Engineering from its very beginning.

How interesting it is that this unique studentcentered DNA of this college has persisted for more than a century now.

and classroom teachers have ended up being frontline responders for individuals in crisis and that the county jail has become our de facto treatment facility, a role it was never intended to play.

"The most effective responses work by drawing together the entire community ... to collectively plan and develop comprehensive, multi-faceted services for affected residents," he said.

The mayor said he supports the collaborative effort being led by Mayor Pro-Tem Kasandra Gandara to combat adverse childhood experiences and Local Collaborative 3, which Families and Youth, Inc. and more than 50 local partners are creating to

"coordinate and align" the local behavioralhealth system.

Miyagishima said he has asked Gandara to work with the city council, the county and surrounding communities "to create a countywide Behavioral Health District, governed by a joint-powers agreement among the various entities," which he said would better align governmental services and investments with the overall efforts of the larger behavioral health community, to provide better services and outcomes for us all."

• El Paseo Corridor Blueprint. "The development of a major commercial and transportation corridor along El Paseo and Main Street, linking Downtown with New Mexico State University and the Las Cruces Convention Center [would connect] NMSU students and visitors with downtown restaurants and brewpubs, shopping, museums and cultural activities, the Plaza and community events," the mayor said.

The corridor could include "a well-landscaped

thoroughfare with wide sidewalks for pedestrians, designated bike lanes and leafy trees and shade structures along the way," he said, along with "frequent transit service ... with distinctive vehicles."

· A low-carbon future. Miyagishima said "concern about a rapidly warming climate has only deepened" since he spoke about the issue in his 2019 State of the City address. "In addition to effects already in evidence around the world - rising seas, failing agricultural regions, climate refugees, wildfires, unprecedented storms and widespread flooding – we can expect to be especially challenged here in southern New Mexico by extreme heat, extended periods of drought and threats to our river and aquifer from increased pumping and less water arriving from snow melt in the northern part of the state," the mayor said.

As a result, "one thing we can expect is a steadily accelerating trend toward electrification of everything possible," he said, "because electricity can be generated by non-carbon sources like wind, geothermal and solar, and stored and distributed for later use by new technologies, many of which are already less expensive than fossil fuels. We want our community to ride this wave rather than be swamped beneath it," the mayor said.

At an April work session, Miyagishima said the city's sustainability officer, Lisa LaRocque, and city staff "will begin outlining the full range of implications for the city of this energy transition, to include our fleet of vehicles, our buildings -- both existing and proposed -- and countless other impacts only now being realized."

Miyagishima said the state of the city "will only remain strong if we keep learning together, reaching out to one another and building on our strengths and ties as human beings. One city, one people, in one community – serving one another and, in turn, being served."

# Local behavioral-health collaborative forming

More than 70 people, including Las Cruces Mayor Pro-tem Kasandra Gandara and Doña Ana County Commissioner Shannon Reynolds, attended a Feb. 18 organizational meeting as Las Cruces continues creation of the LC3 Behavioral Health Collaborative.

Families and Youth, Inc. (FYI) Collaborative Coordinator Rose Ann Vasquez said the collaborative has 54 community partners, including La Clinica de Familia, the city, the city police and fire departments, the Doña Ana County Health and Human Services Department, Memorial Medical Center, Las Cruces Public Schools, Doña Ana Community College, La Casa, Inc.'s Domestic Violence Program and National Alliance on Mental Health New Mexico.

LC3's purpose is "to build an 'ideal behavioral-health system' model in New Mexico, which facilitates a community collaborative that is inclusive, organized, centered on the individual and family and is committed to providing the best services for people in our communities."

Vasquez said work to create the collaborative began last December, with 35 people attending the first organizational meeting, 65 attending a second meeting in January and 72 attending the Feb. 18 meeting.

A BHC board of directors was elected at the Feb. 18 meeting. They are Paul Ford, coordinator of the Las Cruces Fire Department's Mobile Integrated Healthcare unit; Judy Baca, community liaison for Mesilla Valley Hospital; Sandra Emmanuel, chief executive officer of Peak Behavioral Health Services; Melissa Ontiveros, special operations

coordinator for the Community Action Agency of Southern New Mexico: Tenika Sosa-Gonzalez. RN, behavioral health director for Memorial Medical Center: Julie Molina, supervisor of FYI's Juvenile Assessment and Reporting Center; John Burch, life coach; Maria Bagwell, a social worker for La Clinica de Familia: David Reyes, peer advocate for the local chapter of the National Alliance on Mental Illness; Marianne Hernandez, protective services manager for the New Mexico Children Youth and Families Department; and Jolene Martinez. FYI clinical director, as an exofficio member.

Vasquez said additional board members may be elected at the collaborative's next meeting.

The collaborative has identified three objectives:

ioral-health priorities for restoring system stability through the development and wide-scale distribution of a strategic plan that clearly defines behavioral-health goals and allows for the coordinated facilitation of those goals.

• Develop regional training capacity through evidence-based, behavioral-health-provider training opportunities that build the behavioral-health system and support access to specialty providers.

• Work with local and regional behavioral-health providers and system of care administrators to develop services and programs that fill service continuum gaps.

In his 2020 State of the City address, delivered Feb. 19 at City Hall, Mayor Ken Miyagishima said LC3 is working toward "the creation of a diverse, cross-sector coalition to coordinate and align, within a jointly developed plan and vision, the work of all the many heroic individuals and organizations that make up the behavioral health system for members of our community."

Vasquez said LC3 meetings are held 11:30 a.m.-1 p.m. the third Tuesday of each month, with the next meeting being March 17, at La Clinica de Familia, 385 Calle de Allegra.

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



# Emergency food program sees increase in output

Casa de Peregrinos (CdP) emergency food program put 3.8 million pounds of food on the tables of hungry people in Las Cruces and surrounding communities in 2019, according to the annual report that CdP released in mid-February.

That's an increase from 3.5 million pounds in 2018, said CdP Executive Director Lorenzo Alba. Last year's food provided almost 3.2 million meals and was valued at \$6.5 million, he said.

"The need is constant," Alba said. "Hunger continues to be prevalent in our community and our state. Children and seniors continue to be most vulnerable."

meals and a \$100 contribution will pay for 600 meals, which he said is enough to feed a family of five for more than a month.

Here are some statistics from CdP's 2019 annual report:

• Clients served by CdP have increased from 12,500 in 2014 to 14,000 in 2015, to 15,000 in 2016, to 16,000 in 2017, to 18,200 in 2018 and to 21,090 in 2019.

• CdP distributed 39,710 food baskets in 2019 to 29,886 unduplicated clients, including 904 clients struggling with homelessness (1,578 food baskets), 2,233 clients served through summer programs (3,053 food baskets), 17,953 food-security clients (21,969 food baskets), 4,745 rural clients (7,587 food baskets), 2,107 seniors (3,209 food baskets) and 1,334 student clients

(2,314 food baskets).
• CdP rescued more than 1.2 million pounds of food, valued at almost \$2 million, that would have been thrown away otherwise. Through CdP's food-rescue program, retailers donate "perfectly edible food" which has passed its sellby date. Since 2013, the program has rescued more than 5.4 million pounds of food with a value of \$9.8

million.

• CdP's expenditures were less than \$602,000 in 2019, which means it distributed more than six pounds of food for every dollar it raised.

"Today, as I do usually once per week. I volunteered at CdP food pantry," CdP board member and volunteer Dick Miernyk said in the annual report. "Today, 263 families came through our door to request help with food. Some had already expended their monthly allotment of food stamps; some were homeless: and some were experiencing a financial emergency. And, thanks to the generosity of our community, we were able to send each of those families home with about 80 pounds of food: canned goods and staples, some meat and

dairy, produce, bread and pastries. Their gratitude echoes in my ears as I write this."

Alba said CdP is on its way to a new facility that will triple its available space, thanks to \$664,000 in state legislative capital investment program funds.

CdP celebrated its 40th anniversary Aug. 16, 2019, honoring Sister Rose Kidd, who was the first CdP director.

CdP's office hours are 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday and by appointment on Tuesday and Thursday.

# Desert-plant workshop coming March 5

This might be a great time to walk around gardens in Las Cruces, including the beautiful landscaping at City Hall, to simply observe and see which plants are doing well.

According to David Cristiani, former landscape architect and upcoming presenter at Las Cruces Utilities' (LCU) Lush and Lean workshop, now is the time to investigate how

plants function in mild winter weather. Those are the hardy plants you want in your garden.

Cristiani's presentation "Water-Efficient Landscape Design" is coming up Thursday, March 5, 2020, at Thomas Branigan Memorial Library. Walking nearby in front of City Hall, he points at the different hybrid trees, like a Desert Museum Palo Verde, and ground covering that does well in Las Cruces, like the red and yellow ice plant or the wind-catching mounds

of beargrass.

"We'll talk about some of the basic components of landscape design," Cristiani said. "We'll think about knowing the space in order to improve the space. We're solving a functional issue — having a space that works but also provides habitat, is nice to look at and one you want to spend time in."

Garden owners might do well to be reflective on their desires. "Many times, they say they want a lowmaintenance garden, when they truly want a no-maintenance garden," he said.

Sometimes the pendulum swings the other direction.

"There's a region-wide issue of over-shaping plants, which prevents them from blooming as intended and really does a disservice to the plant and the garden as a whole," he said. "That's ironic to waste such money in our area regarding our landscaping, since many individuals have tight budgets or municipalities claim they are understaffed. Sometimes it's best to make sure that certain plants aren't crowded. However, sometimes certain plants do well together, one provides shade or groundcover to another. It takes research."

That leads to his other recommendation: Find



deners to not only think conceptually about their gardens, but also to consider basic components to create a successful outdoor space. Join him at the free Lush and Lean presentation on Thursday, March 5, at the Thomas Branigan Memorial Library at 5:30 p.m.

and keep it looking healthy. Or, as a starter, pick up

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your own garden.

"You can create a waterconserving and easy-tomaintain landscape that can provide multiple functions like erosion control and cooling your home with shade," Cristiani said, "but the first step is to get informed about life - and plant life - in the desert."

All LCU Lush and Lean workshops are free and open to the public. They are held Thursday evenings at the Thomas Branigan Memorial Library, 200 E. 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# NMSU Black Programs: Our culture is your culture

New Mexico State University's Black Programs doesn't just serve the approximately 800 African American students on campus. "It's about people and community – that sense of belonging," said the program's acting director, Patrick E. Turner, Ph.D. "Everybody is welcome."

The program is about mentoring students from Las Cruces, other parts of New Mexico and the U.S. and from countries around the world, said Kimberly York, a volunteer and mentor with the program who become coacting director in January.

"Act locally but think globally," York said.
"There's a lot to be learned and a lot to be shared among cultures." And that goes beyond black culture, Turner and York said, to include other ethnicities and "in-

tersecting identities" like Chicano, Native American and LGBT+.

Black Programs, Turner said, works with students from all different backgrounds "to understand and be aware of the different identities our students have." That diversity of knowledge and experience "only strengthens the knowledge of self," Turner said.

While NMSU creates a sense of belonging, he said, Black Programs goes a step further to create a sense of welcome.

For some students, like the large contingent from Ghana or the single student from Nicaragua, Black Programs' role may be to help overcome a language barrier, York said. For others, it's finding housing, seeking financial aid and pursuing academic success. For some students, being at NMSU is their first experience in the U.S. They have no idea where

to go or who to talk to, much less how to identify groups and individuals who share their cultural backgrounds.

Black Programs is "providing students with the necessary support to gain access to a quality, education" Turner said. It's also connecting them with the music, food and art they identify with in Las Cruces, El Paso and the surrounding community, he said. "They're so amazed at what we have here."

### Remembering Clara Belle Williams

As part of its Black History Month programming in February 2005, NMSU renamed its English building Clara Belle Williams Hall "in honor of a person who was unquestionably a pioneer," said then-NMSU President Michael Martin.

Williams was the first black student to graduate from New Mexico College of Agriculture & Mechanic Arts, now NMSU. She studied at the University of Chicago before enrolling here in 1928. Williams taught at Booker T. Washington Elementary School in Las Cruces for more than 20 years. While teaching, she took summer courses and graduated with a bachelor's degree in English in 1937 at age 51.

Born Clara Belle Drisdale in Plum, Texas, Oct. 29, 1885, Williams was the oldest child of Isaac and Matilda Drisdale. She was valedictorian of her graduating class at Prairie View Normal and Independent College (now Prairie View, A & M) in Prairie View, Texas, in 1908. She mar-

ried Jasper Williams in 1917 and had three sons: Jasper, James and Charles. Her sons all became doctors, founding the Williams Clinic in Chicago. Son James (May 28, 1919-Nov. 23, 2016) was a member of the Tuskegee Airmen and a prominent Las Cruces surgeon.

In 1961, NMSU named Williams Street in Clara Belle Williams' honor. She received an honorary doctorate of laws degree from NMSU in 1980. Williams died July 3, 1994, at age 108.







The choir has been raising money to help pay for the trip since last May, Bolding said.

A March 10 Italy sendoff concert is a fundraiser, she said. It will include accompaniment by internationally recognized organist Patrick Scott, who is flying in from Memphis for the event.

The Chamber Singers are one of four NMSU choirs, along with the Statesmen men's chorus, which has 45 members, the Women's Chorale, which has 35 members, and the Masterworks Choir, which has 70 members and includes students, NMSU faculty/ staff and community members.

A recent "battle of the sexes" carwash to raise money for the choirs' activity account was won by the Statesmen, who outraised the Women's Chorale by 87 cents, Bolding said. Collectively, the two groups raised about \$1,000, she said.

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# Las Crucen wins best-actor award

Las Cruces actor Eric "Knut" Brekke went to Albuquerque last spring to audition for a small part in a short film. He wound up with the lead role and a best-actor award at an international film festival.

Brekke, 35, was recognized at the 2020 Cinema on the Bayou Film Festival in Lafayette, La., for his portrayal of Woodrow Willis in "All Around Cowboy," which was filmed in Bernalillo. N.M., last March and also features Las Cruces actors Taylor Rodriguez and Nicole Bartlett.


Brekke traveled to

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Lafayette in January to accept both his own award and the special jury selection award for best narrative short for the 17-minute film that was written and directed by Albuquerque filmmaker Cole Brewer.



Set in northern New Mexico, the film is about a rodeo cowboy (Rodriguez's character, Bo Wills), who is injured and unable to make money on the pro rodeo circuit to support his family. Bo's wife, Jessie (Kristina

Krell), asks Woodrow to join Bo in the lucrative cattle-rustling business.

One of the highlights of the film is a confrontation between Woodrow and Bo. with, "all the years of tension just exploding in that moment," Brekke said.

"I honestly had the time of my life on that film set." he said. "I really wanted to do a good job for everybody involved. I got

something (the acting award) that told me I did right by my cast and my crew."

Brekke saw the audition notice for the film on Facebook and traveled to Albuquerque in early 2019 hoping to land a small part as a cattle rus-

tler, he said. He read for that part and was asked by Brewer to read for the part of Woodrow, which he got.

Brekke got a week off from his day job as an educational assistant at Mayfield High School to shoot the movie, he said. The eight days of filming included an overnight campout with cast and crew in a canyon near Albuquerque.

Brekke said he has no personal experience as a rodeo cowboy, so he spent some time researching what a champion bull rider like Woodrow would have experienced in "the rodeo lifestyle and what it takes to be part of that," Brekke said. "It's a hard. hard life."

Brewer relocated from the state of Washington to Albuquerque to study film at the University of New Mexico in 2016. His film "The Unknown Outlaw," won best New Mexico film at the 2019 Las Cruces International Film Festival.

Brekke's first as a film actor, and his role as Woodrow was his first paying film gig. He's played roles in other small films in Las Cruces and acted in many local plays and musicals.

I love acting," Brekke said. "I want acting as a steady pursuit."

Brekke is a graduate

of Desert Mountain High School in Scottsdale. Az. He has a theaterperformance degree from Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff.

Brekke said 1,200 films from around the world were submitted for the 2019 Cinema on the Bayou Film Festival, and only 200 were selected.

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# 'Astronaut' showcases Dreyfuss' charm



Although her career took a different path, "spending many months visiting my mother at a nursing home was a lifechanging experience for me. Not only because I was about to lose my mom, but also because the journey from her being an independent woman to becoming a frail, frightened and overlooked old lady, was a heartbreaking one.

In the nursing home garden, there was an old man. He sat in his wheelchair, staring up at the sky for hours. One day I asked him, 'What is it that you're looking for up there ...? 'Another go,' he said." Her conversation with him that day became the genesis for "Astronaut".

"Astronaut" is a deeply personal story, and one that I feel is timely and I hope will resonate with a universal audience," McLeod said. "We are all on a one-way journey - and what if we could, at our bleakest moment, perhaps the end of our life, take the trip of our dreams and have another go?"

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
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# 'Invisible Life' lacks cohesiveness

This film, 'Invisible Life' was Brazil's official submission for Best Foreign Film at the recent Oscar ceremony. One wonders why.

The film is the tale of two sisters who, during the first minutes, become separated in a tropical environment, which kind of puts the film into its proper setting.

The time is the early 1950s and the place is Rio de Janeiro. One of the sisters is Eurídice (played by Carol Duarte), who happens to be a teenage piano wunderkind who dreams of studying at a European conservatory.

The older sister, Guida (played by Julia Stockler), has no such talent or goal, but rather she wants to marry Iorgos, her Grecian beau, but fears introducing him to her somewhat backward and abusive father, Manuel.

One evening, in a curious turn of events, while the family has guests over, Euridice is able to create a ruse for Guida, who sets off for a night of partying. However, it turns out that Guida has eloped and is on her way to Europe with Iorgos, scamming, somewhat, her own sister.

Before long, Guida returns with her husband, and she is heavy with child. At first elated, she goes to her home only to have Manuel reject her completely and toss her out of the house. He then proceeds to keep the sisters apart, telling Guida that Euridice has indeed gone to study at the conservatory, but also withholds all news

of Euridice from Guida.

He's rather childish and quite pompous, to say the least. Guida soon gives birth but doesn't seem to embrace motherhood to any degree.

Euridice ends up marrying and living in a loveless and cruel marriage, while Guida ends up a single mom, but has help from the kindness of Filomena, an aging lady of the night. But even then, Guida is often in a bind, even trading sexual favors for the drugs that Filomena needs.

The film feels dull and lifeless, including the several sex scenes, which are made without passion or feeling. Just sex. Especially the awkward wedding-night scene.

This is a melodrama without music, I feel. There is a lot of sex, bare bottoms, a bathroom scene or two, childbirth, and the entire film should be filled with more gusto and interest, but it is not.

In fact, it reminded me of a saying that once was told about majorleague baseball pitcher Stu Miller, when it was said that his pitching encompassed three speeds: slow, slower and reverse. The film embraces all three of those speeds.

Nice camera work, beautiful shots of Rio and vicinity and what could be an intriguing story just don't fit together, allowing this applauded Cannes Film Festival work to sink into its own morass of bleakness.

Starts Feb. 28 at the Fountain Theatre in old Mesilla. It is in Portuguese and Greek with subtitles. It plays for one week.







# Coronavirus remains a concern in N.M.

**BULLETIN REPORT** 

The New Mexico Department of Health (NMDOH) is now one of 25 states and the District of Columbia named high performers in the Trust for America's Health annual report on public health emergency preparedness. The news comes as NMDOH continues to monitor and respond to the novel coronavirus (2019-nCoV) outbreak originating in China.

Following updated guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the Department of Health asks anyone returning to New Mexico

from China to call the 24-hour hotline at 505-827-0006 for guidance on how to protect yourself, your family and your community from the novel coronavirus, even if you are not sick.

The Department of Health advises all instate healthcare providers to stay proactive and vigilant with regards to 2019-nCoV, especially if they find themselves treating anyone returning home from China and presenting with fever and lower respiratory symptoms, like cough and shortness of breath.

"While we currently do not have a case of novel coronavirus in New Mexico, we remain on high alert and expect our medical community to do the same," said Department of Health Cabinet Secretary Kathy Kunkel. "Our team at NMDOH is showing why they have risen to the top tier of states for our level of

preparedness."

ism" is an annual report evaluating the level of readiness of state health departments nationwide. It is created by Trust for America's Health, a nonpartisan public health policy, research and advocacy organization.

# Mutual support key to meaningful fitness regimen that works

L. Prickett said he is frequently asked about how people can help one another to live in a more healthful way.

"We all want our loved ones to be around forever, so from the start, they should know you're coming from a good place," said Prickett, owner of Atrium Physical Therapy in Las Cruces. "And, while health and exercise may be difficult topics to breach, the long-term benefits are worth the uncomfortable conversation."

Prickett suggests the following:

Set an Example: Your concern will certainly carry more weight if you regularly exercise yourself. But beyond that, resolve to also set a new wellness goal or try a new activity. People are more likely to be active and try something new when someone close to them is doing the same.

Do Activities Together: The buddy system works. Exercising and being active together will help you both be more motivated, more willing to try new things, and develop more consistency.

Make It a Routine: Speaking of consistency, this should be part of any new effort to be more active. Creating a routine is one of the best ways to establish accountability with one another (i.e., a little positive peer pressure) and help ensure the effort is long-lasting.

Give Healthful Gifts: This can be touchy. However, if you're both truly on board with helping one another be more active, gifts like a yoga mat, a fitness tracker, a piece of exercise equipment or a gift certificate to try a new class or activity should be appropriate.

Just Be Supportive:
Re-establishing new routines and habits is difficult, especially if someone has been in a rut for a long period of time. Simply offering support, encouragement, a kind word, a listening ear or a compliment can go a long way.

Also, if you discover pain or physical limitations are keeping your loved one from exercising or living a more active life, have him or her see a physical therapist.

Following an initial assessment, a physical therapist can uncover the cause of the limitation, then establish a personalized program for treating and/or overcoming the issue in order to help them reach their goals.

# Horse etiquette protects people, animals

Most people are drawn to horses. They are elegant beings who possess gentleness coupled with great size and strength. They can be dangerous to the inexperienced person; the inexperienced person can be dangerous to them.

When a horse lives in the neighborhood, it is a magnet to many. If you find yourself wanting to visit a horse that is not yours, ask the owner for permission, and never visit if the owner is not there.

You should never feed a horse you do not own. Horses have complicated digestive systems. They cannot vomit, and they choke easily. If you think the grass clippings from your lawnmower would

Horses love carrots and apples. Both contain sugars that are dangerous for a horse with metabolic issues (linked to insulin resistance). Letting a horse bite off pieces of a whole carrot from your hand could teach him to bite a finger off of someone else. Horses cannot see what is held by their mouths, they cannot tell the

difference between a carrot and a finger until they taste it!

A whole apple offered to a horse can be grabbed and swallowed, which will choke it so quickly that it cannot be saved.

People foods can be toxic to horses. Any gasproducing vegetables like cabbage, kale, broccoli, etc. will cause colic. Chocolate is dangerous, as are many weeds that grow along ditches. To pull plants growing nearby and hand them to a horse might poison it, especially if the plants have been sprayed with chemicals.

Even appropriate horse food can be detrimental if a horse is not accustomed to it. It takes 10 days to gradually change a horse's diet; so to suddenly give it unfamiliar hay or grain can be damaging.

Going into a pen or field with a horse you don't know puts you at risk. Horses are prey animals who react quickly when frightened and, while they will turn and run away (the flight instinct), they often kick out defensively as they flee. If a horse lands a kick, the sheer force of it can break bones or worse. And flimsy footwear puts you at risk of severe foot injury should you get stepped upon.

A horse's owner can take you in to meet the equine,

and the owner's presence reassures that horse. Should the horse become worried, the owner will recognize that and keep you (and the horse) safe. Each horse has individual mannerisms and levels of tolerance that can only be perceived by primary caregivers.

Consideration and awareness can make you an advocate of horses. That neighbor with the beautiful mare will be grateful for your thoughtfulness in asking permission to pet, visit

or feed the horse. And if the owner declines, know that it is just to protect the horse. They are complicated and fragile creatures.

# Humane Society reels in grant

Civility seems to be a dead cause these days. I mourn for its loss because it was once considered the fundamental rule of human communication.

True conversation begins to occur when you accept your partner as an individual and an equal, not a member of a class or a representative of a political or religious stance. For example, I have grown enormously through decades of interaction with Jews and Muslims in a mutual attempt to know each other beyond the surface level.

True conversation begins to occur when you engage in active listening. Perhaps you've heard of the concept or have been involved in a class to learn it.

The idea is simple, but the execution is difficult.

It means that you focus completely on what your partner is saying and resist the temptation to respond before he or she has had the time to unravel a complete thought.

Most of the time we are not listening; we are waiting for an opportunity to put in our two cents, which means we don't hear what the other person is saying.

You have to drop your response agenda in order to actively listen. Then you will begin to invite the other person to express more than he or she initially shares. That invitation is part of active listening.

True conversation begins to occur when you don't hold back but are as honest as you can be. Part of that honesty has to do with examining stereotypes one by one and learning to drop them in the interest of a deeper relationship. We spend a lot of time "othering" people. It makes the world a lot simpler to do so, but it also makes the world a

lot less true.

You will gain by being honest and forthright with and about your beliefs.

The challenges that a person of another faith bring to you will make you think more deeply

and express yourself more clearly.

All this work aids toward genuine conversation.

You may feel called eventually to study the other person's faith in order to discover your shared values and virtues; you may discover them simply through conversation. Both approaches are rewarding and fulfilling.

Genuine conversation is a spiritual exercise. In some faith traditions, it is grows out of seeing the image of God in all people and honoring it.

Just people refrain from spreading false information and making accusations with no basis whatsoever, refusing to join any person or group who would perpetuate a hurtful lie.

Just rules attempt

food for thought to prevent people with power from skewing the process of due justice.

> Just people realize that preserving a just society requires them not to bow or to give in to anyone only because of the power they possess.

Just rules demand impartial judgment, whether one is rich or poor, well-known or little-known.

Just people believe in holding all people accountable for their actions, no matter what their status in society or their place in life.

Just rules are blind to

whether people approach one another in friendship or in animosity, directing everyone to treat others with decency.

Just people approach fellow human beings with respect and full consideration.

Just rules do not present one set of standards for those who are wellto-do and another set of laws for those who are in dire straits.

Just people do all they can to be sure that people of all means have the possibility of competent advocacy for their case in the midst of a dispute.

Just rules intend to prevent untrue accusations from leading to a conviction and sentence that cannot be undone.

Just people seek to uncover charges that are inaccurate and untrue, and they try to assure that the system of justice will, as much as possible, protect those who are innocent.

Just rules prohibit promises of money, power or favors to produce a result not based in fairness and honesty.

Just people do not offer or take bribes, and they seek to expose those who do.

Just rules treat all people living in a community with equal consideration, whether they are native or newcomer, resident or visitor.

Just people try to be welcoming and respectful, helpful and generous, always remembering from where they came.

# Luna Rossa Winery brings home the gold

Every year, Luna Rossa Winery enters its products into various regional, state and international competitions, and they enter 2020 boasting that when it comes to bottling Pinot Grigio, they compete with the best in the world.

Luna Rossa's 2018 Pinot Grigio took home the coveted Double Gold Award at the 2019 San Francisco International Wine Competition, according to Enologist Marco D'Andrea.

D'Andrea said his family is no stranger to winning awards for their wines, but the significance and prestige of the Double Gold Award elevates their name and brand to a whole new dimension.

The competition is decided by a panel of expert

tasters who are not privy to the winery or label of the wines in the competition, so to come out on top is "pretty amazing," D'Andrea said.

Typically, the family enters only four or five of its varieties in any given contest, but through the years, they have brought home multiple top awards for their wines. D'Andrea said the entry submissions each year go to three or four annual competitions.

Luna Rossa produces upwards of 84,000 bottles of wine in any given year, and in addition to their Double-Gold-winning pinot Grigio, they have earned gold awards for their Reserve Agianico, their Tempranillo, their Sangiovese, their Cabernet Sauvignon and their Nini.

The winery also boasts silver awards for its Carmenere, Chenin Blanc,

Malbec, Merlot, Montepulciano, Shiraz, Viognier, Refosco, Reserve Barbera and Reserve Nebbiolo varieties.

D'Andrea's father, Paolo D'Andrea, was born in northeastern Italy in the wine making region of Friuli. The family's vineyards – planted in 1999 and in production since 2001 – are located on 30 acres of land just outside Deming, N.M.

The family opened its Las Cruces restaurant in 2011 at 1321 Avenida de Mesilla.

In addition to producing their own line of wines, Luna Rossa supplies grapes and grafted vines to wineries throughout the state and beyond.

Marco D'Andrea holds a bachelor's degree in enology and viticulture from the University of Udine in Italy.



You might not expect a sauce called Hawaiian Riptide to be made in Las Cruces, but it is. And you might not expect a Las Cruces husband and wife with respective backgrounds in martial arts and photography (and a shared love of scuba diving) to be its full-time creators and marketers with the help of nearly 30 friends and relatives helping out, but they are.

"Follow what you believe in your heart," said Ray Lucero, who cofounded Hawaiian Riptide with his wife, Sue, in 2017. They produced their first bottle of "Heritage" marinade and sauce in January 2018.

Two years later, the couple has added "Hola Aloha" marinade and sauce, featuring Hatch green chile, to their product list, and they have more unique flavors in development, including red chile, which is the next one in line for production.

"You can use it on anything," Ray said about each of Hawaiian Riptide's flavors. Its unique blend of the islands and the Southwest compliments everything from

meat, poultry and fish to salad dressing and salsa, he said.

The Luceros have even found it delicious in draft beer, and Let Them Eat Cake bakery (1001 E. University Ave., Suite D4 in Las Cruces) has included the Heritage flavor in a cupcake recipe.

The Luceros are also trying it out as a flavoring for jerky, and Sue is taking wine appreciation and brewing science classes at New Mexico State University to help the couple incorporate their product into wine.

"It's a whole new language I'm trying to learn," Sue said.

Ray and Sue met at a scuba-diving class in Las

Cruces. He's a native and a graduate of Las Cruces High School. She moved here at age five and graduated from Mayfield High School. They've been together for 20 years and married – in Hawaii – in 2006.

Ray and Sue came up with the idea for Hawaiian Riptide during their travels around the world, eating local food and embracing local cuisine, Sue said. They particularly enjoy the foods and flavors of the Hawaii Islands and began experimenting with their own creations.

"What if we bottled it?" Sue said they asked each other one day. "That might be fun!"

Both were busy with other careers, she said, and it was "completely ridiculous for us to be pursing this. Like we need something else to do!" But everyone they shared their sauces with loved them, Sue said, and "It just stuck with us."

"It's God's dream," Ray said. "God always has a bigger plan."

Today, the Luceros are pursuing Hawaiian Riptide full time. Ol' Gringo Chile Company of Las Cruces does the bottling for the Luceros, who hope to have their own production facility soon. They already have team tee shirts and they're adding branded cooking equipment.

"It's our baby, and we

want to grow it and see where we can take it," Sue said.

The Lucero team of nearly 30 people helps to come up with ideas for new flavors and products.

"They always take care of us, so later on we will take care of them," Ray said. "We love our team."


The entire group is also using Hawaiian Riptide as a way to give back, with a goal of "impacting communities around the world," Sue said.

The Luceros are strong supporters of the Ellen DeGeneres Wildlife Fund, with \$1 from the sale of each Hawaiian Riptide bottle and \$10 from each gallon going to the fund.

The company even got an online shoutout from

DeGeneres late last year. Sue and Ray encourage members of their team to select their own charities to eventually benefit from Hawaiian Riptide profits.

# **NMSU** inducts four into Hall of Fame

Four former Aggie greats are the latest group inducted into the US Bank/New Mexico State University Athletics Hall of Fame.

Andrea Kabwasa (women's basketball), Wendell McKines (men's basketball), Darrell Martin (track & field) and Chris Williams (football) all returned to Las Cruces over the weekend for the induction and a presentation at halftime of the Aggies' men's basketball game Saturday, a 78-62 victory over University of Texas-Rio Grande Valley.

"I couldn't be happier to recognize and honor our former student-athletes with their induction into the US Bank/NM State Athletics Hall of Fame." Director of Athletics Mario Moccia said. "Being inducted into your alma mater's hall of fame is the highest honor one can be bestowed, and all four are deserving of this recognition."

# Andrea Kabwasa | Women's Basketball | 1988-92

Kabwasa starred for New Mexico State under the watch of two separate head coaches, Doug Hoselton and Joe McKeown. By the time her playing career was a matter of record, the Hawthorne, California, native stood as the program's all-time leading scorer, assist generator and stealgetter.

Kabwasa was an All-Big West second team choice in 1991 and earned a spot on the All-Big West First Team as a senior in 1992. She closed her career with 1.778 points, 675 rebounds, 499 assists and 273 steals. To this day, her 17 assists against Arizona in 1991 remains a single game record for NMSU and her 224 assists in 1991-92 stand as the season record.

# Darrell Martin | Track & Field |

Few Aggie track & field athletes have compiled a résumé

quite as extensive as Martin, who starred through the mid-1970s, when NMSU still had a men's track team. Martin amassed nine collegiate medals on the conference scene and departed Las Cruces as the program's record holder in four events (60-meter dash, 100-meter dash, 220-yard dash and 440-yard dash).

A team captain on the Aggies' 1978 squad. Martin went on to participate in the 1980 Jamaican Olympic trials.

# **Wendell McKines | Men's Basketball | 2008-12**

A staple on two NCAA Tournament teams during the Marvin Menzies coaching era, McKines was both a fan favorite and a force to be reckoned with by Aggie opponents.

The eventual All-WAC First Team choice and WAC Tournament MVP averaged 18.7 points and 10.7 rebounds per game in his farewell season, 2011-12. On the national scene, McKines ranked eighth in rebounds per game and was the land's 29thleading scorer. Twenty of his 47 career double-doubles came in

# Aggies keep streak alive

Former NMSU great Wendell McKines got to be on the Lou Henson Court for one more Aggie victory and one more WAC championship in the Pan American Center.

At halftime of NMSU's game against UT-Rio Grande Valley, McKines and his fellow Aggie Hall of Fame inductees were honored at center court.

The rest of the night belonged to the current Aggies. who won 78-62 to wrap up their third consecutive Western Athletic Conference regular-season championship.

Led by Jabari Rice's 20 points and 18 from Terrell Brown, the Aggies secured their 31st consecutive victory against WAC opponents. It was also their 16th straight victory overall, tying them with Dayton for the longest current win streak in the country. NMSU and Dayton are also the only two teams still undefeated in conference

The Aggies have three more regular season games remaining, and their last home game is Thursday, March 5, against Cal Baptist.

the 2011-12 campaign and helped NM State go 26-10.

McKines finished his career with 1,521 points and 1,135 rebounds to become just the second Aggie to record 1,000 or more points and 1,000 or more rebounds in a career. His career scoring total is the ninth-highest in program history while his rebounding total ranks second, behind only Sam Lacey.

After NMSU, McKines became an excellent player overseas. During his seven-year overseas career, McKines played in France, the Philippines, South Korea and Israel.

# **Chris Williams | Football |** 2005-08

Producing all manner of eyepopping numbers seemingly every time he found himself lining up against defensive backfields around the nation, Williams is the standard all current and future New Mexico State wide receivers will be measured against.

During a four-year run in the mid-2000s, Williams made a living rewriting the Aggies' record books and hung up his collegiate cleats as the program's all-time leader in receiving yardage (3,555), touchdown receptions (32) and 100+ yard receiving games (18). Williams found himself on the receiving end of four of the 10 longest pass plays in the history of the program. In addition to his receiving prowess, he served as one of the best allpurpose players in Aggie history.

An undrafted free agent, the Rio Rancho High School graduate has enjoyed a fruitful career in the Canadian Football League (CFL). In 80 games with the Hamilton Tiger-Cats, Ottawa Redblacks, BC Lions and Montreal Alouettes, Williams has amassed 5.634 receiving vards and piled up 34 receiving touchdowns.

With Hamilton, he was the CFL's Rookie of the Year in 2011 and the Special Teams Player of the Year in 2012. And in 2016, he was with Ottawa when they won

# When your game goes south, here is my seven-rules revamp

A lot of you may be currently struggling with your golf game. Maybe you've had several rounds where you scored miserably and were thinking, "what's wrong with me?" It's healthy to be upset for not living up to your self-styled personal standard of golf mastery; but just don't take it to an extreme.

So here are my Seven Quick Rules for Revamping Your Golf Game.

Rule One is identifying your "growth opportunities." Simply look at your whole game, honestly and critically, to find your weak spots, your strengths and weaknesses. Go to work on specifically what is really hurting you. Is it your driving? Your approaches? Your

playing a personal three ball "scramble." In other words, hit three shots from the same place and note which one is the best – or acceptable. If it's pretty good, then you have the shot. If none of the three are any good, you don't yet have that shot and you need to try something different or different club.

Rule Three came from a former baseball player golfing friend of my mine who reminded me that when MLB ball clubs go into spring training in February they always go "back to basics." Our golf basics include grip, stance, posture, ball position, swing tempo, alignment and balance. They also involve ball flight, spin rate, trajectory, contact, club speed and acceleration. Check that you're repeating a fundamentally solid swing and then look at the other basics, like chipping, bunker shots and lag putting. Paying close attention to fundamentals of your game will pay off.

Rule Four is taking a lesson. Have a teaching pro look at your swing and your putting, and give you some feedback and professional advice. Ask for two or three keys you can work on to tighten up your swing and scoring. Teaching legend Butch Harmon says that "feel and real are never

the same," meaning that what you think you're doing with your swing, and what you're actually doing can be a lot different. It's not true what comedian Phyllis Diller once said: "The reason the pro tells you to keep your head down is so you can't see him laughing."

Next, consider updating your equipment (Rule Five). Take a look at what you're playing and ask yourself if you're handicapping yourself by not playing with the latest and best golf clubs. If you can afford to play golf regularly, you can afford new golf clubs! Or at least the best recent models. You don't need to spend a ton of money on clubs, you just need to do yourself a favor and play with stuff that isn't

putting you at a disadvantage. Your equipment should include a GPS or laser rangefinder, or both. Having attended the PGA Merchandise Show in Orlando for the past 22 years has made me realize how much things are evolving and quickly changing in golf.

Revamping someone's game, especially a golfer over the age of 60, commonly includes the goal of getting longer off the tee. If you want to play better you usually (but not always) have to hit the ball farther than you're hitting it now. That's Rule Number Six. In my case, I had a miserable time after my rather serious accident in early 2011, and my open heart surgery in August of 2014. Once I was able to

play golf again, I discovered the problem was several "power leaks" that had crept into my game. I went to a slightly longer driver which forced me to slow down my swing, recovering almost all of those lost 20 yards. "Twenty more yards" seems to be golf's Holy Grail for senior players; but the caveat is to not let the driver get you into trouble.

Lastly, my Rule Seven is simple: go to the gym and workout regularly. There is really no substitute for maintain strength and flexibility as we get older. Not only will doing weights and equipment at the gym help maintain and improve our golfing, fitness exercise serves to prevent falls and other accidents that can present
