

WSMR commander promoted to brigadier general

On May 1, Col. David C. Trybula was officially pinned with the flagofficer rank of brigadier general.

Trybula is the 38th commander of White Sands Missile Range. According to a WSMR press release, the ceremony was conducted by Maj. Gen. Joel Tyler, commanding general of the U.S. Army Test and Evaluation Command, via video teleconference.

Prior to taking command at White Sands, Trybula served as the deputy chief of staff for Army Futures Command Headquarters in Austin, Texas.

"What a humbling experience," Trybula said following the ceremony. "This is truly the result of investments by soldiers, civilians and family members throughout my career. My deepest gratitude goes out to each and every person who has been a part of my development. Today is your

day, as well! I am thrilled at the opportunity to continue to contribute and serve our nation."

Trybula came aboard at WSMR on July 17, 2019, when he took over from outgoing commander Brigadier General Gregory J. Brady. Brady introduced Trybula on that day as "the right leader at the right time."

"The Trybulas are present for duty and humbled to be counted as part of the Army Test and Evaluation Command Team and stand proud with all the outstanding soldiers, sailors, airmen, civilians and family members of the White Sands Missile

Range community," Trybula said as he took command last July. "Truth in testing. Army strong."

Upon graduation from the U.S. Military Academy in 1989, Trybula was commissioned as an armor officer and served his company-grade time in armor and cavalry units before receiving his functional designation as an operations research systems analyst. He holds a bachelor's degree from the United States Military Academy and a master's degree and doctorate in philosophy in economics from the University of Texas at Austin.

Early voting begins at alternate locations

Early in-person primary voting begins Saturday, May 16, at consolidated alternate voting sites in Las Cruces and throughout Doña Ana County.

Here are the locations:

EARLY VOTING: May 16 – May 30

LAST DAY TO APPLY FOR **ABSENTEE BALLOT:** May 28

Corbett Center, 1600 International Mall on the NMSU campus; and Sonoma Elementary School, 4201 Northrise

At the county clerk's office, early, in-person voting is available 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday-Friday and 10 a.m.-6 p.m. and on the Saturday (May 30) immediately before primary election day. Alternate voting locations will be open 11 a.m.-7 p.m. Tuesday-Saturday through Saturday, May 30.

Same-day voter registration is available at all these locations during early voting.

Health precautions

All voting stations will be at least six feet apart and no more than five voters at a time will be allowed in a voting location. Doña Ana County Clerk Amada Lopez Askin said. Poll workers will wear personal protective equipment and plexiglass separators will be used

to provide a safety barrier between voters and poll workers, she said. disposable wooden sticks will be used in place of a stylus for signing ballots, all pens will be sanitized after each use and regular sanitizing will take place at voting locations.

"I am so grateful that we have so many community partners that are willing to work with us on giving access to voters while at the same time maximizing the precautions we take while they are voting," Lopez Askin

Lopez Askin recommended voting by absentee ballot in the primary and she encouraged people who vote in person to wear a mask, but said, "We're not going to deny a person access to the ballot box because they're

not wearing a mask." She said a limited number of masks will be available to be given to voters who don't have a mask.

Thursday, May 28, is the last day to apply for an absentee ballot to vote by mail in the primary. Voters can drop off their completed ballots in sealed envelopes at any polling location throughout the county. Immediate family members or caregivers can drop them off a voter's sealed absentee ballot at the county clerk's office at the county government building. Completed absentee ballots must be turned in by 7 p.m. on election day, which is Tuesday, June 2.

To receive an absentee ballot, voters can fill out and mail back the absentee-ballot request form they receive from the Doña Ana County Clerk's office, or they can apply for an absentee ballot at https://portal.sos.state. nm.us/OVR/WebPages/ Absentee Application. aspx. Or visit www.donaanacounty.org/elections/elections-info and click on NMVote.org to request an absentee ballot online. It takes less than five minutes to fill out the request.

Hummingbirds return

Hummingbirds are native to the Americas, and there are nearly two dozen varieties making their homes in the desert Southwest. The four most common locals, according to the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish (NMDGF), are the black-chinned, broad-tailed, calliope and rufous. Some weigh less than a penny, but even the largest weighs less than an ounce). Hummingbirds' wings can beat 50-200 times per second with an average heart rate of about 1,200 beats per minute. They need to take about 250 breaths per minute. In contrast, a typical healthy human at rest takes 12-20 breaths per minute. Murder is not a common occurrence in Las Cruces, thankfully. But when it does occur, it doesn't typically happen to someone who is later in life, someone who has spent that life building a respected business, and who is beloved by friends and the community.

Those words and many more positive and happy ones describe Oscar Amezquita. No

> one could ever imagine the words "murder victim" would also describe him.

Since the 1960s, Oscar, 79, was the proprietor of Landis Boot and Shoe Service, which had already been in Las Cruces for generations.

He was shot to death about 6 p.m. Saturday, May 9, at the location of his business near the intersection of Lohman Avenue and Esperanza Street.

As of this writing, the Las Cruces Police were still looking for information. If you know anything to help identify a suspect, call the police department at 575-526-0795, or anonymously to Crime Stoppers at 800-222-

I met Oscar several vears ago when looking for a certain style of shoelaces, which Landis didn't have. However, as I'm

guessing happened to many, if not all, of Oscar's customers. we got into an engaging conversation.

He seemed impressed by my music trivia knowledge, but not nearly as impressed as I was by his shoe and leather knowledge. He taught me about leather care and the importance of shoe trees, and then the discussion turned philosophical. We covered a lot of ground in a short time, and I appreciated his clear communication.

I'm not sure either of us realized it in the moment, but he had just sold me as a customer. From then on, I never took my footwear anywhere else. When I saw him interact with other customers, I saw the same thing. He treated everyone as if they were important.

The shop did great work on both my dress shoes and my ropers, and I made a mental note to come back and interview him, because I thought his story would make a great col-

umn in The Bulletin. We even had a time set up once, but we both had to cancel.

There's a lesson in there about seizing the day.

In a few cases, getting new heels and a sprucing-up for my shoes or boots cost me nearly as much as a brand-new pair. But the price didn't bother me, because the work was top-notch, and also because I found value, benefit and entertainment in the conversations with Oscar.

There was also something special in saving something that still had good life left in it — doing a little re-furbishing instead of just throwing away something of value.

Sadly, painfully and pointlessly, Oscar was robbed of his opportunity to continue his good, humble work.

A wonderful human life that still had a lot of great value has been discarded, treated worse than an old pair of shoes.

Oscar Amezquita was a good man. Las Cruces lost a treasure.

Stupid masks

To the editor:

On Saturday, May 9, I shopped at three big-box stores in Las Cruces. At two of them, a slight majority of customers wore

masks. At the other. most did not. Some folks behind the cloth looked like bank robbers, others like surgeons.

I was unmasked. Perhaps they viewed me as irresponsible.

I saw them as overreactive to a pandemic no more lethal than the common flu: their garment is not going to repel or contain a sub-microscopic particle about 10,000

times smaller than the width of a human hair (Thomas Webster, Northeastern chemical engineer specializing in nano-scale medicine and technology).

Stopping a coronavirus with a cotton mask is akin to blocking mosquitos with a chainlink fence. We're never going to "defeat" or hide from this virus; it has to mutate out, ushered by herd immunity.

Yet, government often feels compelled to do something, anything, re-

gardless of necessity. So. now that we've flattened the curve, Las Cruces City Council is considering requiring everybody to wear masks in public.

Harris County, Texas (Houston), went this route several weeks ago, and a sheriff's spokesman told a local radio host his department was flat-out not enforcing it. that police have more important issues to confront.

Give citizens a break. They've been cooped up, can't eat out, can't go to a ballgame, can't use a park. Some have lost their jobs, their business. And now they're forced to cover their face every time they step out in 95-degree weather? Because two people have died from COVID-19 in Doña Ana County as of May 10 (NM Department of Health)?

Las Cruces is a diverse, polite city where adults can choose their responses to this "crisis" and mingle. Presumably, all shoppers last Saturday found what they were looking for and made it home to survive another day.

You can't hold town hall meetings. You can't

walk the neighborhood knocking on doors. You can't hold swanky meetand-greets in the backyards of wealthy donors.

Heck, you can't even shake

hands. And the idea of kissing somebody else's baby seems almost criminal.

Not to mention the

fact that it's hard to get people's attention when all eyes are on a death toll that keeps climbing.

But this election will decide who leads us out of this pandemic. That makes it more important, not less. And, in several local districts, the Primary Election now will be more important than the General Election in November.

Fifty years of experience in the state Senate is on the line in just two

races. Mary Kay Papen, first elected in 2000 and now president pro tem., and John Arthur Smith, first elected in 1988 and now chairman of the powerful Finance Committee, both face strong challengers.

Carrie Hamblen, the incredibly active and public CEO of the Las Cruces Green Chamber of Commerce, will challenge for Papen's seat. Neomi Martinez Parra, a former vice chairwoman of the state

Democratic Party, will try to take the seat that Smith has held for 32 years.

Other big races are in Senate District 31, House District 34 and County Commission District 5.

For the past several weeks, Peter Goodman and I have been co-hosting on-air forums for local candidates on community radio, KTAL-LP 101.5 FM. They are available online at lccommunityradio.org.

KRWG is taping a de-

bate with Yvette Herrell, Claire Chase and Chris Mathys, the three Republican candidates running for the chance to face Xochitl Torres Small in November.

This may not feel like an important election, but it is. And you can safely participate by absentee ballot without putting your health at risk.

The Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico (CFSNM) continues to seek donations and award funds to help local residents and organizations during the public health emergency.

Here is an update from CFSNM President and CEO Terra V. Winter.

• Together Las Cruces has funded more than 1,300 individuals and families. At this time, applications have closed due to low funding. We are continuing to raise funds in hopes of covering the more than 200 applications waiting within our system. Thanks to the hundreds of donors who have given and continue to give. Our goal is to award all eligible who are in the pending applications. In total, we have awarded \$392,500 thus far.

Former New Mexico Gov. Bill Richardson and actors Edward James Olmos and Danny Trejo have created a fund to assist families in colonias in southern Doña Ana County severely impacted by the current public health emergency.

Partnering with the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico and the Community Action Agency of Southern New Mexico, the fund offers applicants a one-time check of \$150 for individuals or households without children and \$300 for individuals or households with one or more children, the Richardson Center for Global Engagement announced in a news release.

"The pandemic has only increased the economic strain facing the families of the colonias with many out of work and unable to afford groceries, gas, rent, utilities and other basic essentials," the news release said. Many colonias lack infrastructure like paved roads and functioning sewer systems.

"The colonias have always had a special place in my heart, especially when I was governor," Richardson said in the news release. "The impact of this pandemic on already-struggling areas, like the colonias, has been catastrophic."

"I cherish my time working and filming in southern New Mexico and with the people of New Mexico," Olmos said. "All of us have been impacted greatly by the spread of COVID-19, but it's our collective responsibility to make sure that there's a safety net for our most vulnerable families."

"I've been doing what I can at home to protect and provide for those most at-risk for COVID-19 and I am honored to join with Gov. Richardson to help the people of the colonias in Southern New Mexico," Trejo said. "Now more than ever we should reach out and support our neighbors."

The Richardson Center donated \$10,000 to jump start the fund, the news release said. Donations of any size are welcome. Falling into space with the Spaceport Authority

Alice Carruth has been in New Mexico for six vears, having arrived with her husband who came here to work at White Sands Missile Range. She has adopted southern New Mexico as her home and says it is a fabulous place to raise her children. But even more than that, it is the place to be when talking about space. And talking is what she will be doing as the new public relations coordinator for the New Mexico Spaceport Authority.

Carruth, one of the primary organizers of the Las Cruces Space Festival

since its inception, calls it a "fortunate accident" that, when she came to Las Cruces, she "fell into space."

"I have followed all things space for years and have been a fan," she said. "Then I discovered this whole history in New Mexico."

No stranger to the communications business, Carruth was a London television producer and brand manager at ITV, an independent British network group. She also worked for Al Jazira English in the Middle East for nearly six years as a news-room producer.

Last year, she got a job as an executive assistant with Solstar, working with social media. When she saw the job opportunity at the New Mexico Spaceport Authority, she put her hat in the ring and was hired, starting in April.

"We love it here," she said. "I recently became a U.S. citizen and am loving life in New Mexico."

Carruth said she also loves being part of the Spaceport America familv.

"We are on the cusp of becoming the largest commercial spaceport in the country and the only one with both vertical and horizontal launch capability," she said. "We also have other customers than Virgin Galactic, including Boeing testing here, as well as Spinlaunch. We regularly have EXOS, Sugarhouse and Up Aerospace."

Out at the Spaceport on Friday, May 1, when Virgin Galactic completed the first successful test at the spaceport of the suborbital spacecraft, VSS Unity, Carruth said she was able to be there and never gets tired of being at the facility. The space vehicle is scheduled to stay in New Mexico permanently.

"The test flight was a

huge success for us," she said. "We took all the recommended precautions for coronavirus safety and made sure we were following all the guidelines. All their staff and our staff were eager to be part of that. The flight went exactly as planned."

She said one challenge she faces is educating people about ongoing operations at the facility.

"There is still a crazy misconception that nothing happens out there," she said. "I have been shocked at how many customers we have lined up. It's really good news for New Mexico. We are very, very lucky to have this facility at our doorstep."

City allocates \$400,000 for publicservice programs; more for COVID-19

A total of 16 local nonprofit organizations will share in \$400,000 for healthrelated, public-service programs for fiscal year 2021-22, the city has announced.

The Las Cruces City
Council authorized the
funding from the city's
Telshor Facility Fund
(TFF), which is money the
city receives for the lease
of Memorial Medical Center that is jointly owned by
the city and county. The
council made the authorizations during a recent
regular meeting.

The funding, available July 1, is for the specific purpose of providing operating expenses to eligible nonprofits in exchange for qualified health care to the sick, indigent and low-income community members of Las Cruces.

The city conducted a competitive application process for the provision of responsive, cost effective, quality health-related public services through partnerships with nonprofits. Grants are awarded on a two-vear funding cycle. with renewed funding based on overall program performance, quality of data collection methods and record keeping, satisfactory monitoring reviews and availability of city funding.

These nonprofits each received \$27,500 in funding: Mesilla Valley Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA), for volunteer

development and support; Community Action Agency of Southern New Mexico, for the CARE cancer support program; El Caldito Soup Kitchen: Mesilla Valley Community of Hope, for its disability and homeless income program: Southern New Mexico Diabetes Outreach, for diabetes detection prevention, education and support: Big Brothers Big Sisters Mountain Region, for mentoring low-income, at-risk youth; Casa De Peregrinos emergency food program; Boys and Girls Club of Las Cruces.

These nonprofits received \$23,500 each: Families and Youth Inc. for its El Crucero permanent supportive housing program; Jardin De Los Niños childcare for homeless and near homeless children for its Healthy and Wise wellness program; La Casa, Inc. domestic-violence program for its child and youth program; Roadrunner Food Bank, for hunger relief in Las Cruces; Amador Health Center, for its **Amador Care Connection** program; Mesilla Valley Hospice, for pain control

and comfort care for its patients; and La Piñon Sexual Assault Recovery Services, for its Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner program.

Catholic Charities of Southern New Mexico received \$15,500 for its crime and domestic-violence program.

"The need for community-based services is great, especially during this pandemic," Mayor Ken Miyagishima said. "My fellow city councilors and I are committed to assisting our vulnerable populations, and the TFF allows us to provide this badly needed support."

The council allocated an additional \$35,000 from TFF and repurposed a previously awarded \$100,000 to assist with the impact of the state public health order to address COVID-19: \$75,000 for state programs to purchase and distribute essential supplies; \$30,000 to Third Judicial District Court, for veterans treatment court: and \$5,000 to Mesilla Valley CASA, for direct services to children aging out of foster case. \$100,000 was allocated to

Doña Ana County to receive nearly \$290,000 in federal COVID-19 relief funds

Doña Ana County will receive \$119,303 to supplement emergency food and shelter programs in the county and \$170,092 from the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act, local Emergency Food and Shelter Program board chair Amanda Morales said in a May 4 news release.

The awards were made by a national board chaired by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency and consists of representatives from American Red Cross; Catholic Charities, USA; National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA; The Jewish Federations of North America; The Salvation Army; and United Way Worldwide. A local board made up of the Salvation Army, the Catholic Diocese, United Way of Southwest New Mexico, Protestant Council of Churches and private-sector agencies will allocate funds to emergency food and shelter programs run by local service agencies. 

Funeral industry adjusts to services amid social distancing

The COVID-19 pandemic has had major effects on almost all businesses. The Bulletin reached out to Chad Getz of Getz Funeral Home to ask about operations in his industry during the pandemic.

Bulletin: How has planning and executing a funeral changed in the time of COVID?

Chad Getz: The biggest change comes in the planning of a funeral or memorial service. Most of our arrangement conferences are done over the phone and with electronic signatures. If someone has the need to come in

and make arrangements in person, we can have two representatives of the family come in. This is much different than the way we used to do it. Before COVID-19, we regularly had 10-12 family members in a room working on what they would like to do to honor their loved one.

Executing a funeral hasn't changed much. We still follow all protocols of the church in which we are having the service, or beliefs of the family. Some families choose to just have people get up and tell stories of their loved one. The biggest hardship is only having five people in the service that are immediate family only. I have

had people tell me that they have been to services where the firm lets five people in each room of their facility and rotates them. To me, this does not make any sense, because you're just moving people from one contaminated place to another, exposing everyone in the facility.

Bulletin: What precautions does your staff take when meeting with families?

Getz: When meeting with families, we require our staff to wear a mask and minimize contact. This is hard for us in such a tight-knit community, where hugging is just a step above a handshake. We're used to being there to comfort, support and guidance. Now, we just have to use our words a little better.

Bulletin: If you know a person died of COVID, are there different protocols for handling/preparing the body?

Getz: Yes, we do use a higher level of personal protective equipment (PPE) when an individual has COVID, using respirators instead of masks and limiting the number of employees who are in direct contact with the deceased. The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) has stated that a deceased can be embalmed and buried.

According to the CDC, there is not a concern of contracting COVID while in the same room as a deceased, but they do recommend not touching or kissing the individual if they did have COVID.

Bulletin: What platform(s) are you using to facilitate video services?

Getz: We decided to go with Facebook live. The equipment we purchased has the ability to give us high quality video through Facebook, and it's portable. We can broadcast from any facility with WIFI or cell service.

Bulletin: Do you get about the same number of viewers via video as you were used to pre-COVID?

Getz: Some of the greatest steps forward in life have come out of hardships. I don't know that any firm in the area had any form of webcasting before this. Adaptation is key. I have had services with five people in attendance but 250 watching safely from home. For a long time, I've seen large families worry about

scheduling services where everyone can make it.
They worry about the one family member out of 12 that can't make it. This will continue to give that family member a chance to participate in a small way, even after this pandemic is under control.

Bulletin: What's the future look like for your industry in the near future if the stay-home order is lifted?

Getz: I think this is something that will affect our lives forever. One of the things that makes our community so amazing is how tight our families are. Even if you aren't blood family, you're still family. Many of us grew up in each other's homes. This makes social distancing hard for many people. Hugging, physical comforting and outward expressions of grief are a big part of our culture. I don't think that will change. I think technology helps us improve what we are already doing

Bulletin: What have been the hardest adjustments for you and your staff during this weirdest of times?

Getz: I think the hardest adjustment for us is not having as much face-to-face contact with our families. Sometimes you can see in the face of someone if they just need a hug, or just need a shoulder to cry on for a minute or just to have someone help them get through a time that will ultimately be one of the hardest of their lives.

Shredded tires being utilized at county landfill

At the Corralitos Regional Landfill, a big "Shark" is laying waste to a very tiring stacked eyesore: thousands of used tires. The South Central Solid Waste Authority (SCSWA) has rented a TANA Shark shredder, which is ripping its way through the old trashed tires set aside at the landfill.

"Scrap tires are problematic. Stacked against a building or scattered across the desert, they become a breeding ground for mosquitos with the least amount of rain," said Miguel Fernandez, SCSWA program admin-

istrator. "When landfilled, the whole tires tend to rise back to the surface of the solid waste, so we shred them. The shreds then have a beneficial use in trash management."

Fernandez said the SCSWA recently collected hundreds of tires due to community cleanups, especially from a recent Chaparral beautification effort. Plenty of illegally dumped tires are still found in our surrounding desert, but group cleanups help remove the hazard from the desert.

While SCSWA has a mobile shredder, it cannot handle the large number of scrap tires that have come in. The TANA Shark spits out different sizes of material, from fine rubber crumbs to 3-inch and 6-inch tire shreds, about the size of a fist, all the way up to pieces that are one foot square.

"We're thinking we may rent the shredder quarterly," Fernandez said. "We can use the shredded material as alternative daily cover at the landfill. Alternative daily cover means we can use this material instead of six-inches of soil at the end of each day to cover

the compacted waste to control insects, odors and blowing litter."

The Corralitos Regional Landfill, located along I-10 about 15 miles west of Las Cruces, is in the process of building a new 14-acre cell to contain waste on its 600 acres. This will be the fourth cell at Corralitos – a highly engineered, lined, permitted, award-winning facility that is the repository for the solid waste generated by the regional population.

Extension Service keeps extending services during COVID-19

COVID-19 hasn't stopped the New Mexico State University Cooperative Extension Service (CES) from continuing to provide services and outreach in every corner of New Mexico, including Las Cruces and Doña Ana County.

"We have continued to maintain phone calls. emails and occasional house calls from clientele who are experiencing issues in their landscape and home gardens," said **CES Program Director** Teresa T. Dean.

Here is some of what CES staff have been working on since the onset of the pandemic:

• Gardening "Jeff Anderson, CES' long-time

agronomy and horticulture agent and director of the county's master gardener program, "assists clientele diagnose the problem and give them advice on how to remedy the situation."

"Jeff filmed four videos at Rich Global Hemp for posting to the CES Facebook page," Dean said. "These videos were created to help farmers consider micronutrients in their soils, and a set of three videos to help farmers secure New Mexico-produced seed for 2020 planting. In addition, he also produced several 'how to' garden Facebook live videos utilizing his own yard to serve as a teaching tool to educate the public."

agent in addition to being county director, has been providing information and educational material to the public regarding the rabbit hemorrhagic disease virus and vesicular stomatitis virus in horses that were found in Doña Ana County, she said.

Dean said she has also been asked a lot of questions regarding a possible beef shortage, so she has been providing information on what people need to know when buying beef from ranchers.

· Family and Con-

sumer Science DAC Family & Consumer Sciences agent Bea Favela hosted Kitchen Creations, a four-week diabetic cooking class. The series, which is typically provided in person, has been transformed into a virtual class which teaches participants to plan meals to help them manage their diabetes. To accompany the classes,







For Michael Poncé, returning home means bringing his art full circle

Artist Michael Poncé studied art and worked in New York City and London but chose to return to his native Las Cruces to paint, teach and open a gallery.

"I was born here. I love it here," Poncé said. "I decided to move back here. not to follow any trends. but to paint from within and just enjoy what I do. I honestly feel like I'm not really an artist, but just somebody who loves to paint. I just love creating things. My passion is creating."

At the New York Academy of Art (NYAA), Ponce how to paint," said Poncé, said the instructor from whom he learned the most was acclaimed artist Steven Assael.

"He put the canvas up and had the model there. and he said, 'watch," Poncé remembers. "It was amazing to see the paint come alive (even though) most of the time he (Assael) couldn't describe it. There's no vocabulary for art."

"It's very easy to learn who has been teaching art for 15 years. "It's not easy to be an artist. There are some technical aspects that you teach. Art history helps and knowing paintings and painters. I think painting's just like any-

thing else – you can teach anybody how to do it, but you have to have the passion."

Poncé teaches art privately and at Doña Ana Community College. He has also taught at NYAA and at Vista College and the Museum of Art in Las Cruces, and he was, for six really, really deep." years, a member and curator at the National Arts Club in New York City.

Poncé said he is especially drawn to works by

artists from the Romantic Period, including English artist J.M.W. Turner (1775-1851) and Spanish artist Francisco Goya (1746-1828). "I always feel a connection to them just because of the way they studied and the way they used paints," he said. "It's

Poncé grew up in a poor family in Las Cruces. "My parents had many jobs, cleaning houses, cleaning yards. We always worked," he said. "I didn't start painting until later in life. I used to draw a lot - since I was a kid, I was always drawing. My teachers and my mother always loved my drawings [and] that would motivate me to keep drawing."

museums.

"I really loved those religious paintings and I tried to copy them," he said, adding that after he enrolled in art school, "it all came together" in his mid- to late-20s.

In addition to graduate work at Oxford University, he has an BFA from the Fashion Institute of Technology in New York and an MFA from NYAA.

In New York, Poncé said he was inspired to paint everything from workers in the fashion industry to horses at Aqueduct and Belmont Park racetracks.

One of the reasons he returned to New Mexico was "to get away from that kind of painting," Poncé said. "My paintings here are more idealized and more from imagination. A lot of my paintings right now have been of Trisha, my girlfriend. I also love

the colors in the sunset."

Poncé recently opened the Mandrake Gallery to exhibit the works of artists from the Las Cruces area and some of his friends from New York City. The gallery is located at the corner of Mesquite Street and Hadley Avenue in the Mesquite Historic District, where he grew

Community theatre moves 'Harvey' to August

Las Cruces Community Theatre (LCCT) is looking forward to bringing live theatre back to the Las Cruces stage when the timing is right, but is proceeding cautiously as the public health emergency continues.

The LCCT board met recently, via Zoom, to discuss how it will move forward with reopening the theatre amid social distancing requirements and public health restrictions.

"The LCCT board has made the tough decision to push our production of 'Harvey' back into the August 14-30 time slot and postpone our production of 'Gypsy' to August of 2021," said LCCT Board Presi-

dent Janet Beatty-Payne. "We certainly wouldn't want to create a situation where our patrons and performers/volunteers are at risk of exposure, and postponing a big, expensive-to-produce show like 'Gypsy' that really needs huge audiences to financially break even and generate sustaining venue for the theatre, really seems like the best choice for LCCT amid the COVID-19 safety restric-



tions currently in place."

With those considerations in mind, 'Harvey' will be the next show to open at LCCT, 313
N. Main St. downtown, "once the restrictions are lifted and it's safe to hold live theatre gatherings again, even if we have to continue to push back the dates and roll the 2020-21 season back accordingly," Beatty-Payne said. "Safety is our number one priority at this point."

"All subscriptions and

tickets will move to the new dates automatically," Beatty-Payne said. "We will inform everyone about date changes when they are made." "Harvey," which stars Las Cruces artist Bob Diven as Elwood P. Dowd, was in rehearsal in March when the order came to restrict large

gatherings and then to shut down all non-essential businesses in the state. Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham announced in late April that the state would begin easing some of those restrictions effective May 15, but the governor has not yet announced when public performances, including those produced by LCCT and other local theatre groups, can return, or the specific health guidelines under which they will be allowed to operate.

Iconic windmill moves to the entrance of Farm and Ranch Museum

The skyline at the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum has a new look.

The large windmill next to the Museum's Bruce King Building was taken down and moved to another part of the 47-acre property on Monday, May 4. The 20-foot fan is now on a new, 40-foot, steel tower near the front gate.

There are safety and aesthetic reasons for the move. The old, wooden tower, which was built in 1998, is in a high-pedestrian traffic area and was beginning to show signs of decay. In its new location, the structure adds a dramatic look to the front entrance of the campus, where the gate and arch were to be painted this week.

The windmill is an Aermotor 702 model, with a 20-foot wheel, or fan. It was built circa 1933-58 and was donated to the museum by the Chihuahuan Desert Rangeland Research Center north of Las Cruces. It was used by the College Ranch Camp Well site until 1981, when it was abandoned due to an equipment malfunction. It was re-erected in 1998, the year the museum opened.

Warren Construction worked on the relocation project for a few weeks, building the new footings and steel tower. Weaver's Crane Service helped



move the massive fan.

Windmills were important for agriculture in the Southwest. While they could not pump sufficient amounts of water for large-scale irrigation, they could be used for herds of livestock, and watering vegetable gardens and fruit trees.

The museum has three

other windmills on site, one near the livestock pens, and two indoors in the Heritage Gallery.

The museum is currently closed to the public due to the COVID-19 health pandemic.

The backstory behind **Cruces Creatives**

I completed a bachelor's degree in ceramics in Dayton, Ohio, in 2009, and as I got ready to graduate, I realized that graduating meant I would lose access to all of the tools I had just spent so much effort learning.

There was no way that I or most people could afford all the tools myself, but with a cooperative approach — like a gym for tools the question of tool access seemed to change completely. I learned that a gym for tools was called a makerspace, and I decided to make

At about the same time, my Dad, a career Navy veteran, died as a result of medical malpractice at the VA. My family won a lawsuit, and although the award was ultimately modest, the settlement made it possible for me to work toward launching the makerspace. I wanted something good to come out of my Dad's death, and since the settlement came from taxpaver money. I wanted that something good to give back to our country.

I didn't think the makerspace could work in Dayton, so I started researching cities across the United States, looking for mid-sized cities with lots of local businesses, a reasonable cost of living, relatively centralized development and land use, a university with good art and engineering programs, an active but not oversaturated arts community, a responsible local government, a friendly community and all sorts of other factors.

In the summer of 2009, I visited the top cities on the list, and I fell in love with Las Cruces. I started getting ready, and in 2012, my husband (then fiancé) and I moved to Las Cruces to start the work of launching the makerspace.

After almost 10 years of preparation, including receiving master's degree of fine arts from NMSU and working and leading multiple community events as projects such as the Earth Day Fair and the MESA Project, we officially opened Cruces Creatives in June 2018 with the help of many volunteers and local donors.

Cruces Creatives: a makerspace that hums with art, invention

In 2018, Lea Wise-Surguy chose Las Cruces as her laboratory for a new idea that she'd been putting together in Dayton. Ohio. The laboratory now operates as Cruces Creatives (CC) at the 205 E. Lohman Ave., where — in normal times — the place bustles with staff and volunteers chasing dreams and projects in a space created for exactly those pursuits.

"Our mission is to connect people with the tools, training and community

to make practically anything." she said. "This broad mission encompasses related goals for advancing education, the WISE-SURGUY arts, economic

development, environmental protection, social wellbeing and scientific research in Doña Ana County and throughout New Mexico."

To facilitate the mission of Cruces Creatives, Wise-Surguy said the physical space has to be both educational and practical. and it has to have broad appeal to a wide spectrum



of people in the community.

"People can be involved at CC in multiple ways," she said. "Outside of pandemic times. one of the most

straightforward ways to get involved is to attend a class or workshop. During regular operations, there are 60-75 educational events each month, covering every tool area in the makerspace, and many classes and workshops are free."

To fund the operation. Wise-Surguy said CC sells memberships and relies

heavily on a cadre of volunteers to keep overhead to a minimum. Individual memberships, she said, are \$45 a month, which includes access to the tools and equipment during open hours, discounts on all classes and workshops, multiple free classes and workshops and some members-only events. Other membership options are available for groups and people who volunteer rather than shell out cash.

"Cruces Creatives is run primarily by a team

of more than 60 volunteers, and three hours of volunteering per week equals a membership," she said. "Volunteering options are available in pretty much every aspect of the makerspace, from fixing tools, helping keep the space clean, working on marketing, grant writing, accounting or teaching classes and workshops. In almost every area of interest and ability, there's a volunteer position available."

She said people can also support the makerspace by donating cash or tools.

"Cruces Creatives has been built without any major funding using a sort of 'stone soup' approach to gathering and sharing tools, and more cash and tools are always welcome," she said.

Like every other place deemed non-essential when the COVID-19 pandemic reared its head, CC closed its doors to the public when the stayhome order came down from the governor's office. But that didn't mean the space was idle. Wise-Surguy said the staff and volunteers seized on an opportunity to be of assistance to the larger community.

"We're producing personal protective equipment for medical personnel using makerspace tools and a network of 80 volunteers," she said. "We're developing systems and procedures for a tool-lending library, which has been a long-time goal that COVID ac-

celerated and we're using the downtime to plan multiple programs and partnerships that we can launch when it's again safe to open."

As the pandemic comes under control, Wise-Surguy said CC will adopt a phased approach to reopening — and she forecasts growth in both the facility size and the scope of operations going forward.

"We're currently in a 12,400 square-foot facility with hundreds of different tools and dedicated areas for woodworking, electronics, 3D printings, laser cutting, bicycle building/repair, audio recording, photography, textiles, children's learning and more," she said. "In the 5- to 10-year timeframe, we're working to establish a roughly

40,000 square-foot facility that can provide access to world-class tools and draw international artists and inventors to Las Cruces. On the way there, we're continually expanding the tools and programs that we offer, and we're finding more and more ways to benefit the community in cooperation with other partners."


City, Arrowhead Center partner to spotlight local businesses





Amador Health Center continues full service during COVID-19

During the COVID-19 pandemic, Amador Health Center (AHC) is considered an essential service, and all staff from the janitor to the CEO are considered healthcare providers. So, when the COVID-19 cases started to crop up in New Mexico on March 11 and the governor declared a public health emergency, AHC's staff of 30 dug in their heels for the journey.

"Staff seemed to be sharing the same level of anxiety coming into work every day and potentially exposing themselves and loved ones to potential viral infection," said Richard Wright, a recovery support specialist at Amador Recovery Project, one of AHC's programs. "At first there was terror and a feeling of not being prepared to handle a pandemic crisis, on top of caring for people who are already living with chronic illness, homelessness and mental health and substance use disorders." Wright said.

While staff began ordering disinfectant supplies and personal protective equipment (PPE) in early February, availability was already strained through its various vendors. Like the rest of the nation, policies and procedures addressing who would wear what type of PPE and in



what circumstances were dictated by the availability of supplies, not by actual safety.

The weekend of March 13-15, the national news became ever more dire as thousands of people were being infected and dying across the nation, including the medical providers and maintenance workers caring for them.

"We implemented changes even before the governor placed New Mexico on a 'stay-at-home' order and that I think has made a big difference to our clinic's safety," said **AHC Medical Director** Fatima McElveen. On March 16, AHC staff, she said, took action before the first case was reported in Doña Ana County March 20. All staff and patients were screened for fever and symptoms of COVID-19 before they entered the building. The front doors were locked and a stone pathway leading around the building to an outdoor lobby and screening area was set up.

"Our CEO and administrators supported local businesses by purchasing cloth face masks for personnel and their families. which was very thoughtful and beneficial,"

McElveen said.

These initial steps were just the beginning of multiple levels of safety changes that took place in the initial weeks of the pandemic's assault on Doña Ana County.

"We altered staff schedules, took inventory of our supplies and created a plan to use supplies when necessary to decrease the potential exposure of COVID-19 to staff and patients," McElveen said. That included limiting face-to-face contact with patients and converting medical and behavioral health visits to telephone calls or web-based programs. Two staff started working from home, and they and their patients are adapting well to counseling through telehealth.

Many others are opting to stay in the workplace, although the work environment has been altered

through increased disinfecting and social distancing to minimize exposure.

"Every day I struggle between wanting to stay safe at home and not wanting to abandon clients and co-workers at work," Wright said. "Clients still need medical care, substance-abuse treatment and counseling. Just because a virus has our attention at the moment, the difficulties that people had before COVID-19 don't end. Mental illness doesn't take a break, substance use doesn't stop, people still experience suicidal ideation,"

Amador Recovery Project Director Ray Stewart said that while some services like Smart Recovery meetings were paused in the short-term, they've redesigned some workflow processes to reduce risk. His program has a walk-

up window where people can request harm-reduction supplies (syringe exchange, naloxone) and staff deliver it outside the building.

"There is a tremendous opportunity to do good in so many angles with our clients," Stewart said. "Just delivering a food box or prescriptions, helping someone avoid eviction or assisting in applying for Medicaid or SSI/SSDI may improve an individual's health status."

With a clinic that integrates behavioral health with medical care, AHC provides in-depth primary care to anyone in the community, even if for now it is at a distance of six feet or by telephone or video. A prescribing psychologist and a medical provider can serve a patient for their depression as well as their chronic

disease condition. While patient visits are down by about 30 percent and the clinic has seen a decline in revenue from insurance billing, there have been several federal funding infusions for the clinic through its federal Health Resources Services Administration grant.

The first funding from the federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act is intended to address preparation, prevention and response and included enough funding to purchase a vehicle, more PPE and workstations to separate staff. The second infusion is for "Safety. Response, and Capacity" and will help AHC meet existing needs while remaining secure in the future.

The state's public-

health plan includes increasing COVID-19 testing and tracing positive exposure connections to help reduce the spread of the virus. AHC has helped coordinate two testing events through the New Mexico Department of Health for essential volunteers and staff, as well as clients on the Mesilla Valley Community of Hope (MVCH) campus. Of the 100 tests performed April 22, two percent of those tested were positive and put into self-isolation. which is less than the state average of five percent. The results of the May 11 testing event are not yet available.

With the federal funding. AHC has maintained its full staff and is providing testing at local housing programs, as well as hosting its own testing events. Due to the lack of COVID-19 test kits available, AHC has only been performing tests for people who are showing symptoms. The commercial lab that services AHC will be providing more tests as they become available and more PPE orders are delivered.

Funding that helps AHC keep its doors open to those in need of services has also allowed staff to feed their families and pay their bills.

"I feel very honored to be part of a healthcare organization and campus of nonprofit agencies serving people coping with extreme poverty or experiencing homelessness or housing instability," Stew-

art said, adding that if people in the community take personal responsibility by practicing social distancing, washing their hands often and vigorously and wearing masks of any type in public, it may help slow the course of the disease in our community and encourage Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham to further roll back some of the restrictions on businesses that are deemed non-essential.

"I feel that it is our duty to keep ourselves healthy, for staff to practice good hand hygiene, maintain proper social distancing and cover our coughs and sneezes," McElveen said. "We all must be good stewards to our fellow

human beings and ourselves."

AHC is located on the MVCH campus alongside a soup kitchen, day-care center, food bank and housing-service center. Its hours of operation are 8 a.m.-4 p.m. Monday through Friday. Appointments for medical, behavioral health or substance-use services are open to the entire community and can be made by calling 575-527-5482. MountainView RMC resumes outpatient surgeries, elective procedures

MountainView Regional Medical Center (MVRMC) resumed outpatient elective services May 11.

The hospital is following Gov. Michelle Lujan Grish-

am's latest public-health order allowing elective surgeries and procedures. Safety remains the hospital's highest priority.

Numerous precautions for infection prevention, access control, social distancing and patient flow are in place to maintain a



safe environment of care. Everyone who enters the building, including staff, is screened, and all employees, physicians and patients are expected to wear masks. The daily number of procedures performed is being limited, and furniture in waiting areas has been spaced to maintain appropriate social distancing. Cleaning and disinfection of frequently touched surfaces and caregiving spaces has been intensified. Visitor restrictions for inpatients remain in effect, with exceptions for

laboring mothers, pediatric will receive care. COVIDpatients and end-of-life situations.

"As we reopen elective procedures, our entire MountainView team is working diligently to keep every patient safe," said MVRMC Chief of Staff Karina McArthur. "Patients who delayed surgery or other non-emergency procedures can now work with their physicians to schedule necessary care as we resume elective procedures, surgeries and diagnostic studies."

Non-COVID-19-care zones have been delegated in the hospital, where patients who are screened as negative for COVID-19

19 positive patients are grouped together in the same unit away from all other patients.

"As we resume more healthcare services, we are laser focused on patient safety and taking many steps to create safe care environments for all of our patients" said MVRMC CEO Derrick Cuenca.

All patients scheduling surgery or other invasive procedures will be tested for COVID-19 in advance of the procedure, the news release said. The hospital is closely monitoring its inventory of test kits, personal protective equipment, medications and

other needed supplies, to ensure sufficient resources to support the number of patients in care.

At the same time, MountainView Medical Group physician practices are opening back up for inperson visits. Telehealth will continue to be available for visits, as needed. Clinic staff will be kept to a minimum to maintain appropriate social distancing.

At just 29 years old, Spenser Lopez should be having the time of his life. Instead, he's in a fight to

Lopez and his mother, Guenevere "Genni" Mc-Mahon, are spending this week settling into unfamiliar living spaces in Denver, where Lopez is awaiting a heart transplant.

His ordeal began in late 2018, when local doctors found evidence of a streptococcal infection that was manifesting itself in his heart and moving through his bloodstream to other areas of his body. most alarmingly, his brain. He was in constant pain.

After weeks of a series of misdiagnoses and wrangling with insurance companies — as well as regimen upon regimen of


antibiotics and IV therapies — Lopez eventually underwent surgery in Albuquerque on Feb. 11, 2019, to install two artificial heart valves designed to repair the areas damaged by the infection.

Having the surgery meant he would have to take blood thinners and other medications for the rest of his life, and his recovery was both slow and painful, but he and his family had hopes that the worst of his ordeal was over.

It wasn't.

On Sept. 9, 2019, Lopez began experiencing chest pain and shortness of breath. The diagnosis came relatively quickly: His heart was failing. One of the valves had begun to separate. He would likely need a transplant.

Weeks of wrangling with cardiologists and insurance companies began anew, and McMa-

caregiver — began to feel

overwhelmed by both her

to the University of Colorado/Denver Heart Transplant Program (UCDHTP) for evaluation and determination of whether he would be a candidate for transplant. Although the referral meant the beginning of yet another process to navigate, Mc-Mahon felt like there was light at the end of the tunnel.

He was approved for evaluation and on Dec. 11, 2019, with his first in-person appointment scheduled for Dec. 30. There

was more wrangling with insurance companies, but McMahon eventually solicited the assistance of Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham's Office. Then things began to move quickly, and for the better.

They arrived in Denver for the evaluation process to begin on March 8, 2020. The UCDHTP, she blogged, was everything that healthcare should be in America: A team that cared and anticipated next steps; a support network whose people listened and cared and treated both she and Lopez like people instead of adversaries; a patient-centered approach to best outcomes. They even helped her wrangle records from past providers, as well as insurance assistance from reluctant corporations.

"It was a long day," she wrote at the end of March 9. "The standard of care here is leagues above and beyond what we experienced in New Mexico. They seem to really care,

they are on his side and want to help us succeed. It's really refreshing."

Tests upon tests were performed. The six-day evaluation process was thorough and methodical. And in the middle of it came the serious reactions of state and federal authorities to the emerging pandemic of COVID-

McMahon and Lopez traveled back to Las Cruces on March 18, taking precautions all along the route. The next afternoon, she was notified by UDHTP that Lopez was eligible for transplant. He was placed on the waiting list process that day and by April 2, he was officially a candidate for a new heart.

"Meanwhile," she blogged, "we shelter in place, wear our masks and wait."

A telemedicine conference took place on April 13 to nail down logistics and timelines to the greatest degree possible, as

well as to discuss how COVID-19 might affect the process. They were told to keep their guard up, but be ready.

Less than a month later. on May 2, they were given six days to relocate to Denver. A May 8 parade was held by family and friends to show support for Lopez in front of Mc-Mahon's Mesilla home. They arrived in Denver Monday, May 11, with plans to stay there until a heart is available.

McMahon is taking her sewing machine with her to continue to make artful masks for friends, family and others. With no certain date for a transplant on the horizon, neither Lopez nor she can make long-term plans.

But it's coming. And it's almost certain that when he turns 30 this coming September, Lopez will have a new heart beating in his chest, giving him back a semblance of the life a young man deserves a shot at living.

Social Security projects 2035 as depletion date

The Social Security Board of Trustees has released its annual report on the long-term financial status of the Social Security Trust Funds. The combined asset reserves of the Old-Age and Survivors Insurance and Disability Insurance (OASI and DI) Trust Funds are projected to become depleted in 2035, the same as projected last year, with 79 percent of benefits payable at that time.

The OASI Trust Fund is projected to become depleted in 2034, the same as last year's estimate,

with 76 percent of benefits payable at that time. The DI Trust Fund is estimated to become depleted in 2065, extended 13 years from last year's estimate of 2052, with 92 percent of benefits still payable.

In the 2020 Annual Report to Congress, the Trustees announced:

The asset reserves of the combined OASI and DI Trust Funds increased by \$2.5 billion in 2019 to a total of \$2.897 trillion.

The total annual cost of the program is projected to exceed total annual income, for the first time since 1982, in 2021 and remain higher throughout the 75-year projection period. As a result, asset

reserves are expected to decline during 2021. Social Security's cost has exceeded its non-interest income since 2010.

The year when the combined trust fund reserves are projected to become depleted, if Congress does not act before then, is 2035 – the same as last year's projection. At that time, there would be sufficient income coming in to pay 79 percent of scheduled benefits.

"The projections in this year's report do not reflect the potential effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on the Social Security program. Given the uncertainty associated with these impacts,

the Trustees believe it is not possible to adjust estimates accurately at this time," said Social Security Commissioner Andrew Saul. "The duration and severity of the pandemic will affect the estimates presented in this year's report and the financial status of the program, particularly in the short term."

Other highlights of the Trustees Report include:

· Total income, including interest, to the combined OASI and DI Trust Funds amounted to \$1.062 trillion in 2019. (\$944.5 billion from net payroll tax contributions, \$36.5 billion from taxation of benefits,

and \$81 billion in interest)

- Total expenditures from the combined OASI and DI Trust Funds amounted to \$1.059 trillion in 2019.
- Social Security paid benefits of \$1.048 trillion in calendar year 2019. There were about 64 million beneficiaries at the end of the calendar vear.
- The projected actuarial deficit over the 75-year long-range period is 3.21 percent of taxable payroll — higher than the 2.78 percent projected in last year's report.
- During 2019, an estimated 178 million

people had earnings covered by Social Security and paid payroll taxes.

- The cost of \$6.4 billion to administer the Social Security program in 2019 was 0.6 percent of total expenditures.
- The combined Trust Fund asset reserves earned interest at an effective annual rate of 2.8 percent in 2019.

him so, under the guise of camping out with friends, they pack bedrolls and head along the tracks to the place the body lies. The way proves to be many things – fun, frightening, tiring, bonding and a life-changing rite of passage.

As they walk, the boys flee a junkyard dog, fall in a swamp full of slugs, must run from a train when they are caught on a trestle bridge and, eventually, find the body. They have to face off with Ace's gang for the glory of discovery and, in the end, find their motivation has changed. One of the big messages here is about learning what it does and doesn't mean to be a hero.

This movie is full of touching moments, one of the most powerful when they find the body, and Gordie stares at it asking, "Why did he have to die?" We know he is not talking about the dead kid, but about his older brother.

"Stand by Me" is perhaps the king of comingof-age movies, addressing the formative moments of children entering the confusion of growing up and universal truths at the same time. It is probably the best film adaptation of any of Stephen King's work and, while containing none of his signature supernatural horror elements, it captures the spirit of innocence and childhood wisdom.

DIY Cold Porcelain Modeling Clay - No heat, air-dry recipe

Have you ever tried making clay from jellies, juices, and oils? Cold porcelain modeling clay is made from common household ingredients and once dried, it will harden and become denser than many other do-it-yourself clays. Give it a try!

City of Las Cruces M U S F U M S

Supplies:

1.5 cups of cornstarch (base ingredient)

1 cup of glue (base ingredient)

1 tablespoon of olive oil (helps create a smooth surface)

0.5 tablespoon of lemon juice (helps preserve the clay)


0.5 tablespoon of Vaseline jelly (adds plasticity)

Plastic wrap and airtight bags

Directions:

- 1. Mix the cornstarch and glue together to make a paste.
- 2. Slowly add the olive oil and lemon juice and then mix.
- 3. If the mixture is too sticky or moist, add in a teaspoon amount of cornstarch and mix again. Repeat if necessary.
- 4. Add the Vaseline jelly and mix.
- 5. If the mixture is still too sticky, add cornstarch again.
- 6. Spread a small amount of Vaseline jelly on a sheet of plastic wrap and wrap the clay (not too much, we don't want the jelly to saturate the clay).
- 7. Place in an airtight bag and leave in a cool dry place for 24 hours (do not refrigerate or put in direct sunlight).
- 8. After you shape your clay, leave it to dry in a cool place out of direct sunlight for at least 24 hours. Once it has sufficiently hardened, you can decorate it with inks and paints or other materials of your choosing!
