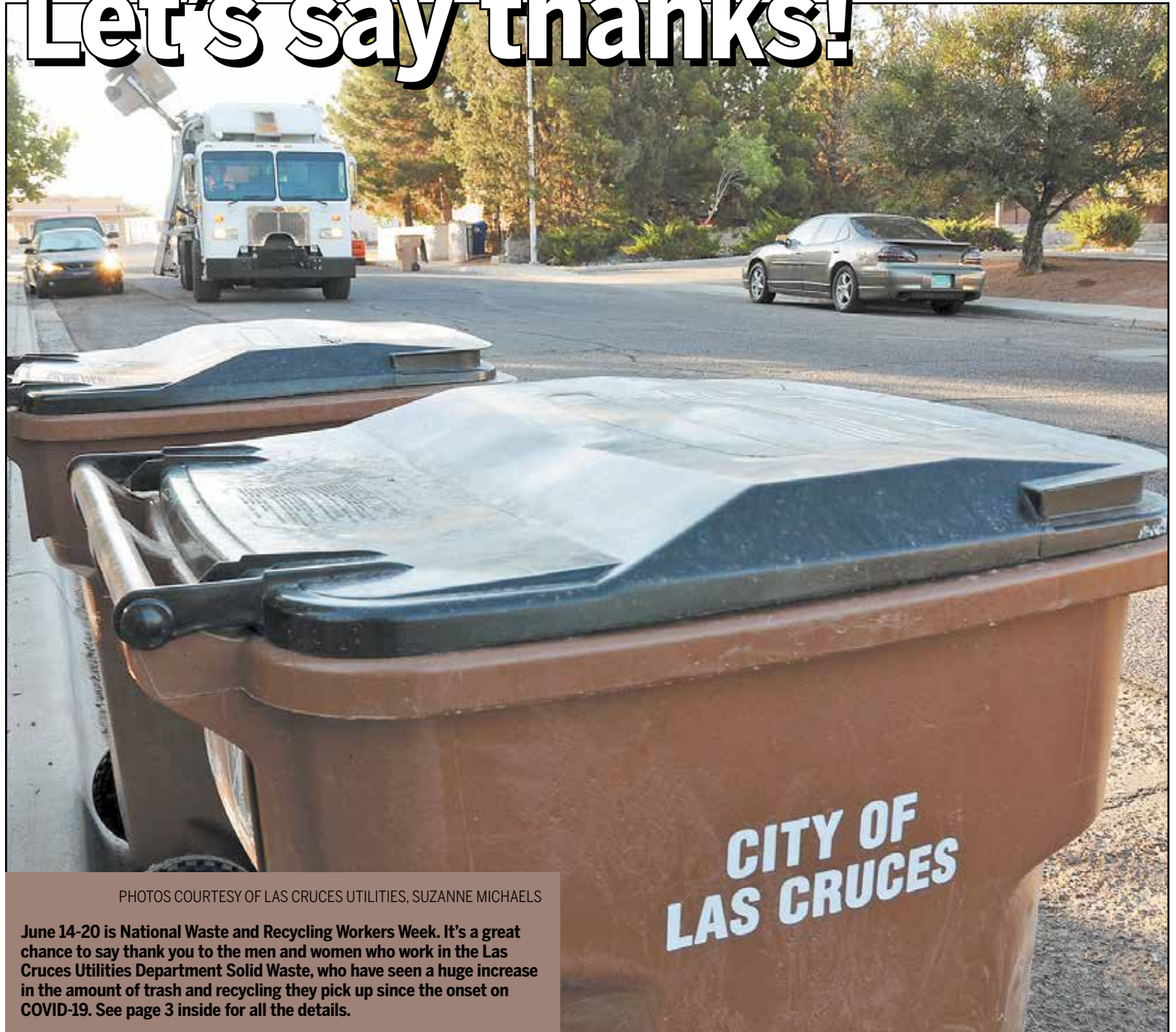

DASO hands out masks countywide

Doña Ana County Sheriff Kim Stewart distributed thousands of cloth face coverings to residents, curbside throughout the County, starting in late May and continuing through the first two weeks in June.

City of Anthony; 2,500 were provided in Chaparral and 2,500 at the Government Center in Las Cruces. DASO deputies also distributed masks in Vado, Organ, Radium Springs and Doña Ana setting up for curbside, drive-through service at each location and ensuring minimal contact, enabling residents to remain in their vehicles. Up to ten masks were provided per vehicle.

The New Mexico Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Management donated face coverings to DASO for public distribution.

Wearing a face covering while in public will help mitigate the spread of COVID-19, protecting the individuals wearing it and everyone around them.

At print time, DASO plans to provide face coverings on June 11 at Fairacres Elementary School and on June 12 at Our Lady of Guadalupe Parish. DASO distributed face coverings at locations throughout the county, including 1,700 masks handed out in partnership with the Hatch Police Department. In Anthony, 2,500 masks were provided, in partnership with the

County again limits access to Government Center after elections

The Doña Ana County Government Center, 845 N. Motel Blvd. is again closed to the public, after the primary elections.

This action supports an effort to help prevent the spread of COVID-19 by minimizing in-person contact. No date has been set for re-opening the Government Center. However, all departments continue to provide essential services.

Community Resources Centers are still closed, but will continue to provide meals for seniors.

The Board of County Commissioners meetings will continue to be available via livestream.

Employees providing essential services who have a job that requires them to be in the field, such as for public safety, animal control/codes enforcement, Office of Emergency Management, utility workers and road crews will remain active, to meet the community's needs.

Residents can continue to access county services via telephone, or by making an appointment. If you do

come the Government Center to meet with county staff, a face covering and social distancing are required.

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Next week: perfect time to say thank you to waste collectors

June 14-20 is National Waste and Recycling Workers Week: A great time to say thank you to the men and women who staff the City of Las Cruces Utilities Department (LCU) Solid Waste, picking up garbage and trash, especially since their volume of work has increased dramatically since more people began staying home and cleaning houses, garages, yards and storerooms during the state emergency orders.

As the Bulletin reported last week, Green Grappler pickups went from 772 in February to 1,658 in April; Regular Grappler pickups went from 1,602 in February to 3,199 in April; residential solid waste rose from 2,257 tons collected in February to 2,936 tons in April. Commercial tonnage went down, but LCU put out three temporary containers the last week of April that were emptied 21 times in six days, collecting 50 tons of trash. And this was all done with the same number of staff.

So, how do you say “thank you” to LCU employees during a time of social distancing and limited personal contact, especially when much of their work is done before many get up in the morning? LCU Deputy Director Robin Lawrence (RL) had some input:

Bulletin: What kinds of items could be left out for the Grappler guys and/or for the trash collectors?



RL: During our current situation, we are, of course minimizing contact. One idea might be making giant cards or posters saying thank you that could be placed in the yard or near the trash containers.

Bulletin: When would be a good time for this recognition?

RL: It just so happens that National Waste & Recycling Workers Week (formerly National Garbage Man Day) is the week of June 14-20. (Here are a couple of links that explain what this is about and how it originated: www.waste360.com/business/national-garbage-man-day-gets-official-name-change and www.daysoftheyear.com/days/garbage-man-day.) We pick up trash once a week at every residence and business; days vary by the areas of the city; Grappler services are offered once a month on residential accounts on a designated day on the same day their trash is picked up. We have an on-

line lookup for Grappler service days by address: www.externalforms.las-cruces.org/Grappler/Grappler.

Bulletin: What time should items (trash, recyclables and thank you messages) be left out?

RL: Trash containers and grappler items may be set out the night before, on the street against the curb, but must be out by 6 a.m. the day of service.

Bulletin: Just in case our readers are wondering, what items can be left for grappler pickup and what can't, how they should be sized, arranged, etc.?

RL: Our website (www.las-cruces.org/186/Solid-Waste-Collections) has various information related to our services: 1) information on what size containers are available; 2) When to put containers out, where to place them, how to place them, and other items related to “trash etiquette”; 3) What is not allowed in containers; and 4) How much/what types of items can be left out for the Grappler or Green Grappler (for example: All Grappler and Green Grappler items should be placed

at the curb, should be at least five feet away from all other items and obstacles such as any other trash, furniture, trash containers, cars, trees and mailboxes). Also visit

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Governor appoints Spaceport Authority board members

Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham has appointed three new members to the New Mexico Spaceport Authority and re-appointed three other members.

The new appointees are Ethan Epstein of Los Rancho, Peggy S. Johnson of Williamsburg and Eric J. Schindwolf of Tijeras.

Johnson is a native of Truth or Consequences and has served both as mayor and city commissioner for the city. She said she is excited about the appointment and is a big spaceport supporter.

"I supported the [Spaceport] gross receipts tax way back when," she said.

"With everything going on with NASA and Elon Musk, it's just all happening right now."

She said the first board meeting is coming up in a few weeks. The date has yet to be determined. Some of the most respected companies are already operating at the spaceport, she said.

Living in the Las Palomas neighborhood on top of a mesa, Johnson said her yard looks over a gap in the Caballo Mountains where Spaceport America is on the other side, "so it's like the spaceport is in my back yard."

In terms of economic development, she said some of the companies bring their families in, buy homes and put their children in schools. Johnson said she would like to encourage southern New Mexico residents to check out the facility and the area around T or C.

"It's just a wonderful place," she said. "I hope

everyone gets to see it. You can go in the office in T or C and book a tour. It's really important for people to get onto the spaceport site, and [the tour] pretty much explains everything, and the building downtown is like a mini museum.

"We have got to stay positive because it is going to be wonderful," she said.

Reappointed members include Michelle Coons, who has a long career in banking and finance in New Mexico, most recently with First National Santa Fe and Strategic Growth Bancorp; Laura

Conniff, a real estate broker in Las Cruces and owner of Leveldale Farms and Conniff Cattle Company; and Richard Holdridge, a retired Air Force Officer with a PhD in Astronautical Engineering from Stanford University.

Conniff has been on the board for four years.

"I think it is a great organization," she said. "There were many who were not in support, but the state approved a \$200 million deal. So, what I think is that we need to make it work and do it well."

Since her tenure on the Spaceport Authority Board, CEO Dan Hicks has been hired and a variety of tenants have moved to the spaceport.

"And I think very soon we will have a lift off with Virgin Galactic," she said.

The board provides oversight, Conniff said, managing contracts with various groups that have dealings with the spaceport, like security.

"It's a very interest-

ing board," she said. "I do think it's going to make a huge difference in this community. It's an extraordinary facility. There is a lot going on out there. Everybody should take some time and go out there."

The Spaceport Authority is administratively attached to the New Mexico Economic Development Department (EDD). It consists of eight members; six are appointed by the governor and confirmed by the state Senate. The lieutenant governor (or designee) and the EDD secretary also are members. By statute, no more than three of the appointed members can belong to the same political party.

EDD Secretary Alicia Keyes is the chair of the Spaceport Authority.

"The New Mexico Spaceport Authority is transitioning into a new era of operations and I look forward to invigorating the board to support current clients and to recruit additional aerospace companies to the state and grow this exciting economic sector," Keyes said.

Spaceport America is an FAA-licensed launch complex, situated on 18,000 acres adjacent to the U.S. Army White Sands Missile Range. It currently hosts flight testing and operations with Virgin Galactic, Boeing, UP Aerospace, EXOS Aerospace, HyperSciences and SpinLaunch.

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Celebrating
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How 'Black Lives Matter' differs from 'All Lives Matter'

When someone proclaims "Black Lives Matter," a common response is, "All Lives Matter."

And that is certainly true.

Biblically, in Matthew 6:26, Jesus talks about how much God values humanity: "Look at the birds of the air, that they do not sow, nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not worth much more than they?"

And in America's Declaration of Independence, it's right there near the beginning: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal ..."

But wait.

That doesn't say "all lives are created equal."

In forming America's Constitution, many of the same men who signed the Declaration also helped craft language that said, "Representatives and direct Taxes shall be ap-

portioned among the several States which may be included within this Union, according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole Number of free Persons, including those bound to Service for a Term of Years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three fifths of all other Persons."

That last part of Article 1, Section 2, known as the "three-fifths compromise" has generated scholarly debate for years. Even if you don't take it to mean the framers viewed slaves literally as three-fifths of a man, the fact it was part of a "compromise," meant slaves were discussed as property, and clearly not equal as men. Indians and women didn't receive much credit, either.

Our country has been around for almost 244 years, but women only earned the right to vote 100 years ago (19th Amendment,

1920). Black men earned the right to vote, constitutionally anyway, with the 15th amendment in 1870. We all know, however, that wasn't accepted practice. Even after the Civil Rights Act of 1964 was passed, outlawing discrimination and segregation, it was still difficult for blacks to vote. In many instances, obstacles still exist.

Jim Crow laws persisted for 100 years beyond the official end of slavery, treating blacks as less than second-class citizens. Slaves first arrived on what would be American soil in 1619. Through the institution of slavery and government-sanctioned discrimination, white Americans by the 1960s had been taught for 345 years that black lives did NOT matter.

But the Civil Rights Act would suddenly correct all that, right?

Well, the Civil Rights Act was signed in 1964. That was 56 years ago. If civil rights had made 56 years' worth of progress in that time, we wouldn't be

having this conversation.

Segregation was sanctioned by the Supreme Court in the 1896 Plessy v. Ferguson case, allowing separate but equal facilities for blacks and whites. The separate part certainly was enacted in practice — we've all seen the photos of the "Colored" water fountains and other separate facilities; many of you lived it — but the equal part didn't make it, even in theory.

Schools and Real Estate

Segregation in America's public schools was officially outlawed in 1954, with the Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka Supreme Court case. Implementation across America took years. In the Midland and Odessa school districts in Texas, officials didn't start addressing segregation until 1966, and it wasn't officially off the books until 1982, a full generation after Brown v. Board.

Quiet, passive protests won't change anything

Do government officials get to tell the people protesting against them how, when and where they can protest?

I saw that concept taken to its absurd extreme in 2004 when I went to Boston to cover the Democratic Convention, where Bill Richardson was serving as chairman. About a block away from the convention center, police had fenced off an area of the street for a designated protest zone.

Each day as I went into and came out of the area, I passed a cage of protesters holding signs and chanting in unison. There

were always more at night as I was coming out than in the afternoon when I was going in. But either

way, they were easy to ignore. Which, of course, was the intent.

As I listen to government officials these days calling for "peaceful" protests, I suspect what they

really want are protests that are easy to ignore.

Government officials demand that the protests against them be lawful, then they change the laws. Curfews that go into effect hours before the sun goes down make criminals out of those who only want to march

and make their voices heard.

On Saturday, a small group of protesters in Las Cruces momentarily blocked traffic on Lohman Avenue, which was an unusual display of civil disobedience for our community.

I always worry tactics like that will turn people against the cause. And, there is always the potential for things to end badly. Those who decide to walk in traffic are putting their lives in the hands of others, and one person did drive through the group of protesters.

But, if the point was to be heard, they were on the front page of the daily newspaper the next day

and led all the nightly newscasts. That probably wouldn't have happened if they had stayed on the sidewalk.

It is easy to identify the arson and looting that took place in the early days of the protests, and now gets played on a constant loop by conservative news outlets, as going way over the line. But there are other activities, like marching onto the highway, staying out past curfew and disobeying police orders, where the line may be blurrier.

The cell phone video of General Floyd's murder has unleashed a wave of protests against systemic racism and brutality that has existed in police de-

partments across the nation since its founding.

In Kentucky, they're protesting for Breonna Taylor. In New York, they're protesting for Eric Garner. In Minnesota, it was Philando Castile before it was George Floyd.

And now in Las Cruces, we are protesting for Antonio Valenzuela. His death in a police chokehold on Feb. 29 has been ruled a homicide, and the former officer who was allegedly responsible has been fired and arrested.

My hope is that these protests will continue to grow, and that over time police and protesters will come to a better understanding of how to manage them with fewer

violent interactions. But they aren't partners. The intent is to force change on a group that has been stubbornly and successfully resistant to that change.

The number of protests, and their incredible racial diversity, have created a sense of optimism that I've never seen before. Maybe this really is the time things will change.

But we know from past experience that deeply entrenched systems are not overturned easily. We have to keep making noise.

Mask ordinance

To the editor:

On Monday, June 1, I watched the city council discussion on the proposed mask ordinance. Though the mayor, police chief and city attorney have concerns about the ordinance, all councilors indicated they would vote for it. I have concerns about misinformation disseminated by the council as well as the lack of critical thinking they displayed.

Councilor Vasquez believes he should support the ordinance because El Paso has one. He must have missed that the order was rescinded by Gov. Abbott on April 28 after being in effect six days.

Councilor Abeyta-Stuve doesn't want this to be too punitive, stating state fines could be up to \$5,000. Councilor Stuve must not be aware the \$5,000 fine is for violating the Public Health Emergency Act, which doesn't allow the

state to force citizens to wear masks.

Chief Gallagher expressed concerns about consistent enforcement and escalation, and he confirmed the force is trained in de-escalation techniques.

City Attorney Jennifer Vega-Brown said any ordinance should be

consistently, routinely and evenly enforced, otherwise risking "serious issues, constitutional issues. One of the things I heard was that the officer would have the discretion to walk away or enforce. This is placing an officer in a position to use too much discretion in certain situations. When this is

done broadly and you are applying to an entire ordinance, it could raise other problems."

So, let me get this straight. They need this ordinance because El Paso has one, but they don't. And they are doing this to protect citizens from a \$5,000 fine. Except the \$5,000 doesn't apply to

masks. They aren't really expecting enforcement, but if enforced on a hit and miss basis, it ensures a flood of lawsuits.

Got it. Makes total sense. To quote the Cheshire Cat in Alice and Wonderland, "we're all mad here."

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Supporting southern New Mexico in times of crisis

When the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico (CFSNM) decided to close our office one Friday afternoon in March and work from home, we weren't sure what to expect. Like so many in our community, there was a looming sense of the unknown regarding COVID-19 at the time. We discussed a plan to push us through weeks of remote work, and we said our goodbyes. By Monday, it was evident that "working from home" also meant our team would take on a new challenge

during an unprecedented time of state mandates and social distancing: crisis response.

In recent months, the CFSNM's mission to serve, connect and support our community has held a new meaning, as our foundation housed five emergency funds in response to the COVID-19 health pandemic. While some of the funds granted in a traditional manner to nonprofit organizations in our region, the CFSNM was able to support individuals and small businesses as well, through emergency funds Together Las Cruces, Governor Richardson, Olmos, Trejo, Lopez Emergency Fund for the Southern

Colonias of Doña Ana County, and Thank You Las Cruces Restaurants. Together Las Cruces was launched in late March to support qualifying Doña Ana county residents who were laid off or furloughed or experienced a significant loss of income as a result of state social-distancing orders. Through the generosity of local philanthropists, the City of Las Cruces, and the WK Kellogg Foundation, more than \$425,000 was raised for the fund, allowing more than 1,500 applicants to receive a hardship grant. As restaurants were able to open for carry out options, Thank You Las Cruces Restaurants sup-

ported locally owned restaurants to provide more than 1,000 meals for families in need, healthcare workers and Las Cruces residents.

"As an organization, we feel grateful that the community trusted us to support families, businesses and nonprofits in our region during a time of crisis," said Terra V. Winter, president and CEO of the CFSNM. "We are moved by the generosity of our friends and neighbors who wish to help those impacted, and we understand that even though social-distancing orders are changing and businesses are reopening, there is still a continued need for support in southern New

Mexico. Our work is only just beginning."

The CFSNM plans to continue its emergency response funding through the Southern Colonias Fund, All Together NM and the Nonprofit Emergency Fund. All Together NM is a state-wide relief fund launched by Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham and the New Mexico Coalition of Community Foundations to help New Mexico respond to and eventually recover from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Applications are open for organizations requesting assistance through All Together NM. Additionally, together with the United Way of Southwest New Mexico, the CFSNM

launched its Nonprofit Emergency Fund in March to assist nonprofits in time of great need due to a community need, natural disaster and/or response to overwhelming loss of operational revenues. During the first grant cycle, more than \$102,000 was granted to 29 organizations from across the region. The CFSNM hopes to continue growing the Nonprofit Emergency Fund, and open applications again in the fall for regional organizations that need continued support.

"We will continue to work within our communities and be a resource

Continued court oversight of Yazzie/Martinez needed

The League of Women Voters of New Mexico (LWVNM) urges Governor Lujan Grisham, the Public Education Department (PED), and the Legislature to withdraw their motion to dismiss court oversight of the Yazzie/Martinez Compliance and to invest in priority funding for education in New Mexico. Strengthening educational systems and funding education at this time has the potential to support the economic recovery and development needed in the State.

In July, 2018 Judge Sarah Singleton issued a Decision and Order in the Yazzie/Martinez lawsuit, finding

that New Mexico had failed to comply with its constitutional mandate to provide a sufficient education for children living in poverty, English language learners, Native American students, and children with disabilities. Inadequate training for teachers was also cited by the Court. Native American and Latino communities have waited for a multicultural/multilingual educational system since New Mexico became a state in 1912. And now the pandemic has highlighted inequities in education for vulnerable people in our State.

The New Mexico Legislature and the PED have taken significant steps to address the Court find-

ings. Funding for education has been increased by 25% since the 2018 session. The PED developed an Educational Plan, Budget Submission Process, and support materials for each district and charter school to implement culturally and linguistically responsive frameworks, and requires each school district to establish an Equity Council, as well as a monitoring system. Changing major systems takes time. Monitoring of the process by the court continues to be necessary until there is more evidence of the desired outcomes for the groups identified in the lawsuit.

The following outcomes need to be addressed in ac-

cordance with the Yazzie/Martinez Decision and Order:

1. Teacher salary increases must be sustained to attract and retain qualified teachers.
2. Equitable funding must be provided for SUFFICIENT services for at-risk Pre-K-12 students.
3. The following changes in educational systems must be implemented in all NM public schools:
 - a. expanded multicultural curricula
 - b. learning experiences involving family and community
 - c. enriched resources
 - d. multiple, relevant assessments
 - e. ongoing professional development for edu-
4. The Equity Councils designed to address multicultural education needs in all New Mexico schools must function as intended.
5. The infrastructure for technology resources and communication must be developed in rural and low-income areas of New Mexico.
6. All New Mexico public schools connect children and families to social services, including physical and mental health services.

As the Legislature determines how to reduce the budget, investing in education will help decrease poverty and needs to be the number one priority

for funding. The federal CARES Act may temporarily defray some state funding, but cannot supplant the state's commitment. Education influences every other issue in the State and can drive economic recovery and transformation. Funding needs to be funneled to the students identified in the lawsuit, with oversight of the process by the PED. Lack of funds is not a defense for infringing on constitutional rights. Legislators are well aware of revenue sources. It is imperative to re-prioritize more funding for education.

The Legislature is urged to pass legislation that

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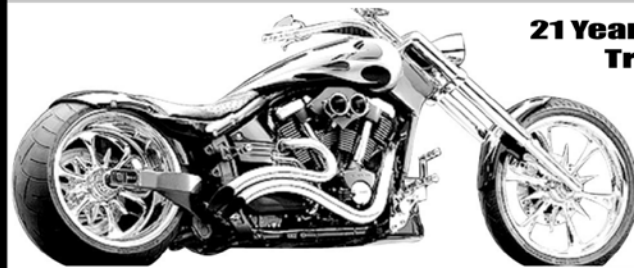

Maybe not by law, but in practice, even today in many parts of the country, school districts remain one of the most segregated institutions in America, perhaps second only to churches. Sunday mornings have long been termed “the most segregated hour in America.”

It’s also commonplace that many minority-dominant schools have much worse conditions and amenities than their white-dominant counterparts. That is, in many cases, a function of real estate and property taxes, which often fund school districts. In many cases, schools in areas densely populated by African-Americans are surrounded by houses and real estate valued much lower than in predominantly white areas.

That is also rooted in a practice that perpetuated black lives DON’T matter.

Housing discrimination wasn’t an issue for much of America’s history because, for the most part, black people were not allowed to own property. When African-Americans started buying houses after World War II — or at least trying to buy houses — the discrimination quickly surfaced. Real estate discrimination was specifically addressed in the Fair Housing Act of 1968, which languished for over a year on Capitol Hill because of opposition in the House and Senate. Racists are great at finding loopholes, though, and while sellers could no longer legally discriminate against black people, lenders still could, which brought about the Equal Credit Opportunity Act of 1974.

Newsday, a newspaper in Long Island, New York, did a lengthy investigative journalism project that uncovered rampant racial discrimination in real estate. Reporters and experts discovered discriminatory practices in real estate

processes at the following rates with prospective minority buyers:

- Asians - 19 percent
- Hispanics - 39 percent
- African-Americans - 49 percent

That Newsday project was conducted not in the 1960s, 70s or even 80s. It took place in 2019.

Military and Sports

During World War II, more than 400,000 German and Italian prisoners of war were interred at military posts in the United States. African-American soldiers and nurses stationed at those posts consistently reported receiving worse treatment than the P.O.W.s and, for instance, were relegated to the “Colored” mess hall, while the German prisoners were allowed to eat in the “White” sections. So, back then, black military lives did NOT matter and, in fact, mattered less than Nazi war prisoner lives.

Some of the walls of military dis-

crimination began to come down thanks to a case involving a familiar name: Jackie Robinson. Before he became a baseball pioneer, Robinson served in the U.S. Army. While stationed at Fort Hood, Texas, in 1944, Lt. Robinson was ordered by a bus driver to move back, further from whites. Robinson refused, and the situation escalated, resulting in Robinson’s court-martial. At the trial, Lt. Robinson was found not guilty.

Less than three years later, Robinson would be the Brooklyn Dodgers’ opening day first baseman, breaking baseball’s longstanding color barrier. That didn’t stop relentless abuse and name calling from fans, opponents and, in some cases, Robinson’s own teammates.

It’s no surprise Robinson was being called the n-word in the 1940s and 50s.

Another African-American player, Torii Hunter, a native Arkansan, played 19 years in the major

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County has state's lowest turnout for Primary

Doña Ana County had the lowest turnout by percentage of all 33 New Mexico counties in the June 2 Primary Election, according to unofficial numbers from the New Mexico Secretary of State's office (NMSOS). It also has the highest percentage of voters registered as independent or declined to state (DTS).

The Primary turnout is based on the number of registered Democrats, Republicans and Libertarians — the three major

parties recognized in New Mexico — who voted in the Primary.

For Doña Ana County, that means slightly more than 26,000 of 88,932 eligible voters voted early or on Election Day.

Because New Mexico is one of 13 states with a closed Primary, only voters registered within a party can vote in that party's Primary. Voters who register as independent or decline to state a party affiliation are locked out of the Primary process.

The county's turnout for the Primary

leagues, and also reported being called the n-word regularly, especially when visiting Fenway Park in Boston, home of the Red Sox, the last major league team to integrate, 12 years after Robinson. The abuse was so consistent for Hunter he had a no-trade-to-Boston clause in his contract.

Hunter was not a player in the 1960s, 70s or even 80s. He played from 1997-2015.

Blatantly and Subtly

Discrimination against blacks originated in the perception slaves were subhuman, and perceived as wholly inferior. Later, when it was discovered they could learn to read and write, black people were still considered intellectually inferior and their skin color considered impure. Science has long since proven there are no significant genetic differences between human ethnicities, yet millions still discriminate by skin color. There are millions more who may not practice physical discrimination, but social discrimination, based on perceived cultural or class differences between African-Americans and whites.

After 400 years of having it both blatantly and subtly reinforced in America that black lives DON'T matter (not to mention native lives, Asian lives, brown lives, Jewish lives, female lives, homosexual lives, Muslim lives), and that white lives (more specifically, straight, white, Christian male lives) intrinsically DO matter, there is an important distinction in saying Black Lives Matter. Saying All Lives Matter is akin to saying, "The sky is blue." It is inherently true, but does not inform or enlighten.

Saying Black Lives Matter is akin to saying, in the 19th Century, "The world is round." Even though, by then, it was

theorized for 2,000 years, and science had proven it for 250 years, many still would not accept the world as being round. They could not visually see it, and their experience was that the world could ONLY be flat.

Saying "the sky is blue" as a response to "the world is round" is irrelevant.

There are more people now than ever who believe the world is round. And, there appear to be more people now than ever who believe Black Lives Matter. There are people who believe it not just on 38th Street in Minneapolis (where George Floyd was killed), but worldwide, including Atlanta, Washington D.C., Seattle, Houston, Baltimore, Buenos Aires, Berlin, London, Toronto, Sydney, Paris, Los Angeles, Tokyo, Seoul, Kenya, Lebanon and right here in Las Cruces.

But yet, just as there are people who still believe the world is flat, there are also people — way too many people — who still believe black lives DON'T matter.

was 29.3 percent. That's despite Republicans choosing candidates for the U.S. Senate and House, Democrats choosing candidates for county offices and members of both parties choosing candidates for the state legislature and county commission and deciding how the state's presidential delegates would be allotted.

Campaigning was

limited because of COVID-19, but the Primary generated a huge amount of attention in April when the state Supreme Court ruled that in-person voting must be allowed. Eligible voters got absentee-ballot request forms in the mail and there was a flood of mailers from candidates. Even so, more than two out of every three eligible voters in the county did not vote in the Primary.

Santa Fe County was reported to have had a

turnout of 59.69 percent, the state's highest.

The statewide turnout was 42.46 percent, as 422,000 of the state's nearly 994,000 eligible voters turned out.

Now for the other number.

In Doña Ana County, 45.8 percent of registered voters are Democrats, 26 percent are Republicans, almost one percent are Libertarians, less than one percent are "other" and 26.4 percent – the highest in the state – are independents or DTS.

That means there are more independents/DTS than Republicans in the county.

The county has 122,061 registered voters, or 9.465 percent of the state's 1,289,494 eligible voters. Statewide, 45.6 percent are Democrats, 30.5 percent are Republicans, 0.9 percent are Libertarians, one percent are "other," while

22.1 percent are independents/DTS.

There has been much to keep each of us awake at night, over the past several months: the most significant pandemic in over 100 years, the resulting impact upon our nation's economy and now, the civic protests and resulting unrest cascading across our nation. We are truly living through momentous times.

Not surprisingly, these times have had significant impact upon our organization and the communities we so proudly serve. They made it crystal clear just how much communities rely on their local hospitals and also how much we rely on you. During the past few months, we've felt an outpouring of support, and we are grateful to everyone who has delivered a meal, sewn a facemask, left a card, a sign or a chalk drawing, or who has just reached out to one of our caregivers and support team to say—"Thank you". Thank you for doing that.

It is only human to be anxious in such times. This pandemic is unlike anything any of us has ever experienced, and, we know it has created anxiety for many people, especially when it comes to seeking healthcare services. You have enough other things to be concerned about. Getting the healthcare you need should not be one of those. However, for several months now, your access to certain healthcare has not existed. The steps taken to address the

COVID 19 pandemic significantly altered the procedures and surgeries we offered. These were the right and proper steps for us to take. Now, however, we are entering new times and now learning how we will live and work in a post COVID world.

We began reopening to select, non-emergent procedures on May 11 and, since then, implemented a phased approach that is progressing as we speak. We continue, however, to hear from many of you of your concerns about seeking healthcare, at this time.

The safety of our patients and staff remains our top priority, and we are working to ensure a safe environment for care, as we take a measured approach to returning to elective and other non-urgent healthcare services.

You can count on us to maintain a safe environment for patients and employees. We are taking extraordinary measures—going above and beyond all of our normal efforts to keep our hospital, emergency rooms, urgent care centers and clinics, clean and safe—because if you need healthcare, we want you to feel confident and to know you are protected.

Numerous precautions for infection prevention, access control, social distancing and patient flow are in place to maintain a safe environment of care. Everyone who enters the building, including staff, is screened, and all employees, physicians and patients are expected to wear masks. The daily number of procedures performed is being managed, and furniture in waiting areas has been spaced to maintain appropriate social distancing. Cleaning and disinfection of frequently touched surfaces and caregiving spaces has

been intensified. Visitor restrictions for inpatients remain in effect, with exceptions for laboring mothers, pediatric patients, and end-of-life situations.

Non-COVID-19-care zones have been defined in the hospital, where patients, who are screened, as negative for COVID-19, will receive care from dedicated staff. If, at any time, we are caring for COVID-19 positive patients in the hospital, those patients are grouped together in the same unit, away from all other patients.

All patients, scheduling surgery or other invasive procedures, will be tested for COVID-19 in advance of the procedure. The hospital is closely monitoring its inventory of test kits, personal protective equipment, medications and other needed supplies, to ensure sufficient resources to support the number of patients in care.

At the same time, MountainView Medical Group physician practices have opened back up for in-person visits. Telehealth will continue to be available for visits, as needed. Clinic staff will be kept to a minimum to maintain appropriate social distancing.

I am so proud of our team and the way they have stepped up to this new normal. I am also proud of everyone in our community, who has helped flatten the curve and limit the spread of COVID-19.

Standing together, we have seen how powerful our human connection really is. So, keep standing together—but stay six feet apart. Wash your hands frequently. Tell someone how much you appreciate them. And, if you need healthcare, please don't be afraid. We are here and prepared to care for you, and also to keep you safe.



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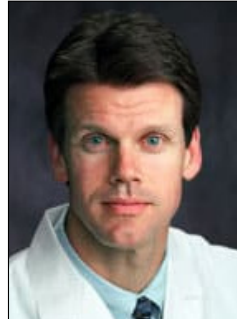

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Providing COVID-Safe Care

Keeping Our Patients Safe

Keeping you safe when you are in our hospital or other care locations is our highest priority, especially while we are all working to eliminate COVID-19. Our team is taking extraordinary measures to provide COVID-safe care for the protection of our patients, our caregivers and the community.

What is COVID-safe care?

Numerous precautions are in place to ensure you can safely receive the medical services you need.

- Entry points are limited so we can screen everyone who comes into the facility.
- Everyone who comes to our hospital is screened for symptoms before being allowed to enter.
- Visitor restrictions reduce the number of people in our hospital to enable social distancing and to keep our patients even safer.
- Facemasks are worn by everyone inside the hospital—patients and employees – and our caregivers are using other appropriate PPE (personal protective equipment) and washing hands before and after caring for every patient.
- Our normal deep cleaning processes are already intense and designed to protect people in our hospital, but we have enhanced all cleaning protocols with extra measures and increased frequency, including disinfection of frequently touched surfaces and all patient care areas.

- Furniture in waiting areas has been rearranged to ensure appropriate social distancing.
- We are limiting the number of procedures performed each day.
- Patients who are undergoing elective surgeries and other discretionary procedures are tested and cleared before coming to the hospital for their appointments.
- Non COVID-19 care zones have been established where patients who are screened as negative for COVID-19 receive care from a dedicated group of physicians and nurses. If, at any time, we are caring for COVID-19 positive patients, those patients are grouped together in the same unit, separated from all other patients and cared for by a dedicated team of caregivers.

Emergency Care

Delaying care during a medical emergency can put your life at risk. Our Emergency Department safety protocols are designed to ensure you can seek emergency treatment confidently. In the event any patients come to either of our two ER's with COVID-19 symptoms, they are separated from other patients immediately. Our caregivers and all patients wear facemasks and we are taking extraordinary measures to keep our Emergency Departments safe and clean.

When every minute counts.

Never delay emergency care for sudden symptoms that may indicate a medical emergency, including:

- Chest pain, shortness of breath and other heart attack warning signs
- Stroke symptoms including facial drooping, arm weakness or difficulties with speech
- Accidents resulting in injuries, burns, or possible broken bones
- Sudden or severe headaches
- Abdominal pain that comes on suddenly or is severe or persistent
- Significant bleeding
- Coughing up or vomiting blood

In a major medical emergency, call 911 and get help as fast as possible. This list of emergency symptoms does not include all emergency conditions.

Protect Yourself And Others From COVID-19

The best way to protect yourself and others from COVID-19 is to limit close proximity to other people and to follow infection prevention recommendations.

- Put distance of at least six feet between yourself and other people.
- Frequently wash your hands for at least 20 seconds with soap and warm water or use hand sanitizer containing 60% or more alcohol.
- Avoid touching your face, especially your eyes, nose and mouth.
- Wear a facemask to cover your nose and mouth when you are in public places where you may come into contact with other people.

- Cover your cough or sneeze with a bent elbow or tissue and immediately dispose of the tissue.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.
- Stay home when you are sick, except to get medical care.

If You Get Sick

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention advises: mildly ill patients should be encouraged to stay home and contact their healthcare provider by phone for guidance.

Patients who have severe symptoms, such as trouble breathing, persistent pain or pressure in the chest, new confusion or inability to arouse, bluish lips or face should seek emergency care immediately.

Older patients and individuals who have underlying medical conditions or are immunocompromised should contact their physician early in the course of even mild illness.

What is telehealth?

Telehealth simply means a doctor visit on the phone or via video using a smartphone or computer. You will be able to talk with your provider from the comfort of your home or other locations just as you would in the doctor's office.

How does it work?

Many different platforms enable physicians and patients to connect in a telehealth visit. Some work through a simple app download and registration. Others require no downloads and visits begin by clicking a link sent by email from the practice. The practice will provide instructions about your telehealth visit when you schedule the appointment.

How do I make a telehealth appointment?

Call your provider and ask if your appointment can be done by phone or video. Some appointments require a physical examination in order for the doctor to meet the standard of care and make fully informed decisions. But many appointments can be managed well through virtual interaction. These may include certain visits for:

- Minor illnesses such as colds and allergies
- Minor injuries such as sprains
- Follow-up care
- Medication management
- Chronic disease management
- Back pain
- Other specialty care

Are telehealth visits covered by insurance?

Many insurance plans cover telehealth visits. Video visits are typically required, although some payers will cover visits by phone only. Check your plan coverage or ask when you make an appointment.

Can I have a telehealth visit with a doctor I've never seen before?

Telehealth visits through our medical group are for new and existing patients.

Can I have a telehealth visit with any physician in the group?

Many of our providers offer telehealth. Call (575) 532-9355 to confirm if virtual visits are available with your selected provider.

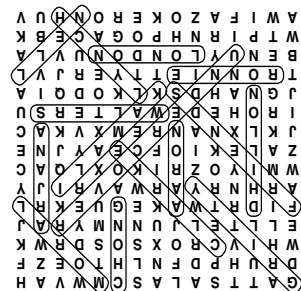

Alyssa Newton grew up in Las Cruces and always loved the country/pop sound.

"I grew up on Taylor Swift," she said. "I was fascinated with the entertainment industry and started writing in elementary school."

She wrote her first song at 9, titled "Sugar Rush" about a boy at a bake sale.

After graduating from Mesilla Valley Christian Schools in 2015, she was off to Nashville to attend Belmont University, where she majored in songwriting and graduated in 2019.

Newton was invited to participate in the NBC songwriting reality show, "Songland," which bills itself as "an authentic view into the creative process of songwriting. It gives undiscovered writers the chance to pitch their original song to top producers and recording artists in the music business."

On June 1, Newton appeared on the show to pitch a song she cowrote with and two others: "Made for Something." She sang it to guest celebrity artist Bebe Rexha and producer-mentors Ryan Tedder, Shane McAnally and Ester Dean. Rexha was looking for a song for

the Tokyo Olympic Games, and the episode was recorded before the COVID-19 epidemic and the cancelation of the games this year.

She had seen Rexha when the performer opened for the Jonas Brothers.

"It was pretty surreal," Newton said. "There were a lot of people I look up to. I dropped into a new world really fast. It was pretty neat for someone who is as fascinated with the entertainment industry as I am. It's not every day that Ryan Tedder of One Republic hums your song."

Although her song was not chosen by Rexha, Newton was pleased with the whole experience in Los Angeles, where she spent a week getting ready for the show.

"It was a whirlwind of an experience," Newton said. "It was styling appointments, interviews and we filmed around the art district of L.A. We did a lot to get it ready for the show. The amount of time spent filming interviews is so much more than the final cut."

Newton's father, Joel, and sister, Aharayah, are attorneys, but her family is very supportive of her pursuits and used to her love of the industry.

"Dad always told me to 'love what you do and respect it, or you are never going to do it,'" she said.

The song she pitched on the show, "Made for Something," is one that is close to her heart, she

said. It means a lot to her, she said, because it's about taking the opportunity to create something with the world.

"Believe in your purpose," she said. "It's about following the dream you get tugged to. You've got to sing it and live with it."

Newton said she gets her inspiration from many sources.

"Faith has always been big for me," she said. "The creator is always a part of my life. Songs are about inspiration. It can come from anything — friends, shows, experiences. And it doesn't necessarily strike all the time."

Newton was featured in the eighth episode of

Participating artists are Silvia Saenz Sierra, Mark Morden and Storm Sermay.

Here are the biographies of the participating artists, from each artist:

• **Silvia Saenz Sierra's** interest in pastel and oil painting started more than 30 years ago when she enrolled in a class at New Mexico State University while pursuing a masters of arts in inter-

disciplinary studies. As other priorities entered her life such as family and work, oil and pastel painting shifted to the sideline of her daily life, but not from her awareness. Four years ago, Sierra was introduced to Raven Studio artist Rick Rotante and through his training and guidance Silvia enjoyed learning and exploring oil as well as pastel painting. During her training under Rodante, Sierra had the delight of venturing into her own artistic quest of painting with pastel as a medium from hard to soft to the enticing beauty of oil paints that has guided her to a deep-seated level of self-expression. artistic pursuits into fine art paperfolding. He created a number of original pieces and participated in exhibits around the Pacific Northwest. Two significant international exhibitions included his works: ORIGAMI MASTERWORKS – Innovative Forms in the Art of Paperfolding, 2003, at the Mingei International Museum in San Diego (Morden's piece "United We Stand (1000 Cranes)" is now part of the museum's permanent collection), and Masters of Origami, 2005, at the Hanger-7 gallery in Salzburg, Austria (Morden had two pieces included in the show). Since moving to Las Cruces, Morden has been able to develop his talents in drawing and pastel painting. Because of his life-long interest in architecture, most of his painting subject matter is the built environment. His

focus is on capturing light and shadow along with design and composition of the piece. Morden also draws and paints portraits and includes figures in his drawing work. Morden studied for about 18 months with Rick Rotante at the Raven Art Gallery and Studio. The DAAC show is the first exhibition of his pastel pieces.

• Born in New York and raised in Florida, **Storm Sermay** has lived in New Mexico for 46 years. Her photography began in 2008 after taking classes at Mesilla Digital Imaging in Las Cruces and at Santa Fe photo workshops both in the U.S. and internationally. She works in both black and white and color. She also does hand-colored photographs in pencil and pastel. She enjoys street photography and has also

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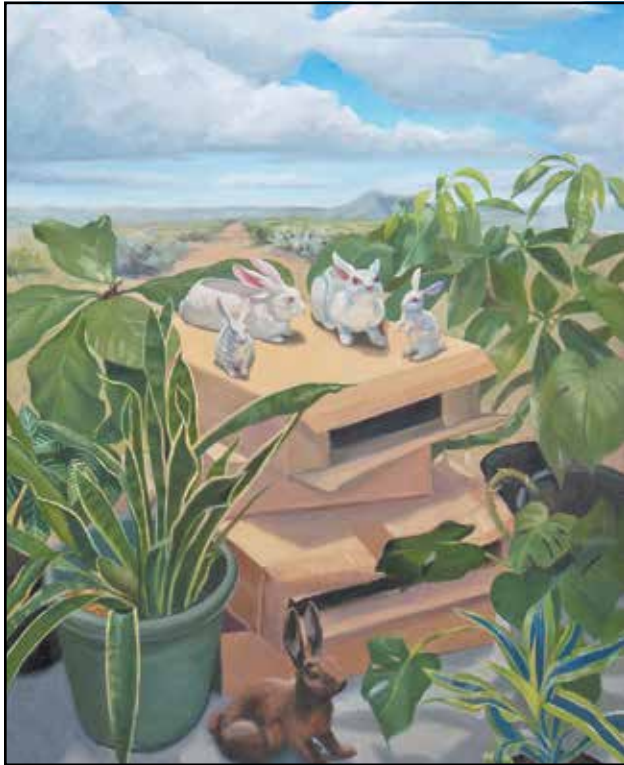

Artist Jean Wilkey: Reality, color, animals, landscapes, objects

Las Cruces artist Jean Wilkey "combines objects, landscape, animals and the figure to explore aspects of perception, identity and our relationship to nature," according to her website. She paints realistically and loves "certain colors for the way they make me feel when I look at them." Her favorite color changes over time, but right now, she is "obsessed with pure Manganese Blue."

Here are Wilkey's answers to a few questions about her art.

Bulletin: You're a native of Fort Worth. What brought you to Las Cruces?

Wilkey: Although I was born in Texas, I moved

away right after college and lived in Honduras, Costa Rica and Israel before returning to care for family. We moved to New Mexico because I wanted to get my master's degree in painting and my husband didn't want to live anywhere that had snow. We arrived (in Las Cruces) in 2005 planning to stay for only three years. New Mexico is not only is the Land of Enchantment but also of entrapment, or perhaps I should say entrenchment. It's home.

Bulletin: Is there a particular award or recognition you are most proud of?

Wilkey: Not an award per se, but I did a painting of my cat that a friend bought. His wife had recently passed away, and he hung it in his bedroom

so that he could see it first thing every morning. It makes him happy, because it reminds him of his wife, who used to collect stray animals. What more could an artist want from their work?

Bulletin: Do you have an in-home studio?

Wilkey: I have a studio at home, but I also have a public studio and gallery

space at 221 N. Main St., where I teach and show my own work and that of other artists. Right now, due to COVID-19, I'm teaching online, and the gallery is only open by appointment or by chance, but I hope it will soon reopen with set hours.

Bulletin: Do you paint every day? Do you have a favorite time of day to

paint?

Wilkey: I like to paint daily, but it's not always possible. I prefer to do email and errands in the morning and then get into the studio with a free mind by 10 and paint until 5 or 6, but in the past few

years, it hasn't been happening that way. So, I grab studio time when I can. I find if I go more than a couple of days without painting, self-doubt begins to creep in.

Bulletin: Do you have a favorite piece of art?

Wilkey: One of my favorites of my own work is “Big Pink,” a five-foot tall painting of a plastic rabbit. It always makes me want to laugh when I look at it.

Bulletin: Can anyone learn to paint?

Wilkey: Talent is a big myth. I believe people have proclivities. Perhaps they love music, so they start playing the guitar, or they are more visual and start drawing for fun. They receive praise for what they do, so they keep at it. It’s the keeping at it that pays off. No one expects someone to become a concert pianist without practicing scales

and studying for years, but somehow in the visual arts we think either we can draw, or we can’t. The joy of self-expression is what’s important. It’s the comparison thing that kills that for people. Just express yourself in a way

that makes you happy, and if you’re lucky, makes others happy too.

Bulletin: What is most rewarding about teaching art?

Wilkey: I love it when I see someone “get it.” They understand what you are

showing them, and now they can do it — they can

apply that to their own work. It gives them great

pleasure to achieve something, and it is wonderful to watch that.

Bulletin: What else would you like to say?

Wilkey: Art is a powerful thing. In the writings of the Baha’i faith it says that “art is worship.” I think that being creative is an act of homage to the Creator. We all can exercise that attribute of creativity regardless of what field we pursue. As visual artists, we can choose to create beauty where it might not exist and meaning where it can help us all to grow, evolve and become better people. I hope my work uplifts people and gives them pause for reflection about their lives.

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Arts Council and artist Sally Quillen team up for online art 'challenges'

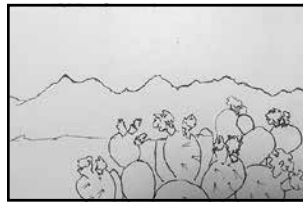

Bulletin: What do students learn in a challenge?

Quillen: The purposes of these challenges are several: 1) It is important in this difficult time to stay in touch with your creative, imaginative side. It helps keep you grounded and focused and painting is wonderful escapism. 2) It is a way of keeping in touch with former students, encouraging them to keep paint-

ing and hopefully having them eventually return to regular classes. 3) There is something very special about artists getting together and talking about art. \$) it is important to me to keep teaching art on some level because that is who I am.

Bulletin: What are the challenges of teaching online?

Quillen: I miss the face-to-face interaction. Online is more impersonal. I miss the chance of being able to explain something while they are painting, and fixing problems as they come up. It is also a challenge to write down complete

enough instructions that students can follow.

Bulletin: Are there any advantages to teaching online?

Quillen: Of course, right now it is safer, and it is better than not teaching at all. It also offers the possibility of reaching more people at one time.

There is no charge to participate in a challenge.

Nicholson, Brando star in the gritty Western few have seen

The Missouri Breaks

Made in 1976 and directed by Arthur Penn, "The Missouri Breaks" stars (among others) Marlon Brando, Jack Nicholson, Randy Quaid, Kathleen Lloyd and John McLiam. The score is by John Williams.

I've introduced this film to a lot of people through the years, and few knew it existed, despite its all-star cast and musical genius. It's a masterpiece of a Western that somehow slipped through the cracks in the same year that "The Outlaw Josey Wales" was released.

It's part classic Western: Horse thieves, a hanging, belligerent ranchers, a train robbery and lots of shooting.

It's part love story:

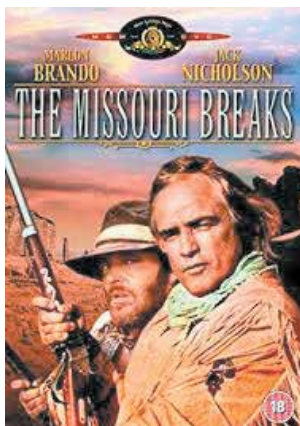

Nicholson's and Lloyd's characters have a tumultuous (and often hysterical) romp that helps carry the plot.

It's part action film: Lots of tension and chases, albeit on horseback.

The movie opens with three men on horseback talking about the beauty of David Braxton's (McLiam) ranch. The scene is an early indicator of the cinematography the viewer can expect going forward, which is stellar. It's also a lead-in to the larger plot, as it slowly becomes apparent that the middle rider is appreciating the beautiful scenery for the last time. He's about to be hanged for stealing horses from Braxton's ranch.

A couple states away, Tom Logan (Nicholson) sits in a rustic cabin with his small band of horse thieves, and they are told by Little Tod (Quaid) that



he witnessed the hanging, and it didn't happen fast. Their friend strangled and dangled before finally dying. They share stories — funny and sad — about their departed friend, and then they hatch a plan to get even with Braxton by buying some land near his ranch, where they can stage horses — Braxton's among them — to move along the Missouri Breaks.

To get the money they'll need, they stage a train robbery. No spoilers, but you may wet yourself laughing at parts of it, and you'll definitely want to be prepared for the guy who eventually pleads guilty

to the robbery and asks to be remembered as "The Lonesome Kid."

Along the way, enter Lee Clayton (Brando), who rides up to Braxton's ranch concealed by his own horse, startling Braxton's daughter, Jane (Lloyd), before barging into the home, where Braxton's ranch manager lies in state, having been hung from the same tree as the young horse thief.

Clayton is introduced to the assembled ranchers as a "regulator," who will hunt down the ranch manager's killers and slay them with his trusty Creedmoor rifle.

The plot is now set in stone — Clayton vs. Logan and crew — and things go racing wildly forward from there.

Clayton is, to put it mildly, eccentric. But he's also a creative killer with true aim and a keen ability to track and execute. He sometimes cross dresses and refers to himself as "Granny." More often, he wears a frilly white outfit and enjoys a large chaw of

terbacky while scoping things out with his binoculars. He loves his horse, and he hates his mule.

Logan is wily and oddly charming, as well as exceptionally bright and ruthless. While his men are out stealing, he tends a small garden.

They both know their trades, and the result is a rollicking Western set against beautiful music and shot amid stunning scenery.

The love story that unfolds in an ungainly fashion between Logan and Jane Braxton gives the viewer some much-needed breaks from the movie's otherwise near-constant tummy-twisting tension as the hunter and the hunted do their respective things.

The Canadian Mounties even get in on the action. Having set up their staging ranch near Braxton's spread, Logan sends some of his men north to stage a daring Sunday morning heist of the Mounty's horses while they sing in church.

This section of the movie contains two of its most hysterical lines: "Damn, I don't know why they had to put Canada way up here," says a ride-weary Little Tod.

And, when the Mounties successfully catch up to the thieves and begin shooting, Little Tod gets off another zinger amid the gunsmoke: "We're in America. Is this even legal?"

I won't spoil the outcome of either the Mounty heist or Clayton's quest for blood that runs through the film, other than to say it's all worth watching, and my experience tells me most Western lovers will want to watch it more than once.

There is considerable violence and strong language throughout, so it's not a film I'd share with my granddaughters for a few years, but my son and I have enjoyed in on a few lazy afternoons. "The Missouri Breaks" just never gets old. I give it five shiny stars, and it stars about five film legends.

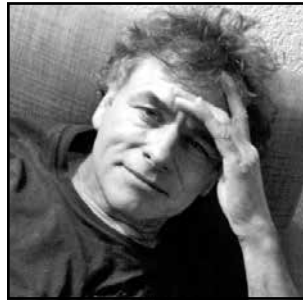
The state's public health order prohibiting large gatherings doesn't mean you can't watch a play presented live by Black Box Theatre (BBT).

"inviting you to join the performance," Ceil Herman said. You don't need a camera on your computer to watch the show.

Las Cruces actor and artist Joshua Taulbee is directing the play for Black Box. The cast is comprised of Teddy Aspen Sanchez, Scott Brocato, Debbie Jo Felix, Rachel Thomas Chappell and Luz Resendez.

BBT has produced five of Downs' plays, "Cockeyed," "Mad Gravity," "Seagulls in a Cherry Tree," "Headsets: A View from the Light Booth" and, most recently, "How to Survive Your Family at Christmas."

Downs, who lives in northern Colorado, has won awards as both a playwright and a screenwriter. His plays have been

produced in more than 150 other theatres worldwide. Downs has an MFA in acting from the University of Illinois and an MFA in screenwriting from UCLA. He worked as script secretary on the NBC television series "Moonlighting," was a staff writer on the "My Two Dads" series and also wrote episodes for the series "Fresh Prince of Bel Aire" and "Amen."

"Directing 'Asking Strangers About the Meaning of Life' for BBT is an exciting opportunity," said Taulbee, who has acted in many plays at BBT and also has designed sets for the theatre.

"It's a play about now,"

she said. "It's about the struggles we all have been facing in these recent times. The show was appealing to me because it eloquently describes life during a pandemic and exposes the absurdity and uncontrollable nature of our current situation. Ultimately, though, for me, this show is about hope and finding a way forward, whether it's through dancing, taking a 'jump of faith,' or looking for a good book. Many theater companies have turned to Zoom and other streaming services to present their work. I am thrilled that BBT will be joining them. It will, of course, come with its own

set of challenges, but fortunately I was able to gather a cast of theater veterans who will undoubtedly rise to the task. It's a monumental task, but an important one."

"We are delighted to be producing Bill Downs' sixth play at the Black Box Theatre and to be able to offer our audiences some theatre in a format that is

completely safe for them, as well as the actors," Ceil Herman said. The Defendant UNM says that it has done nothing wrong. The Court has not decided who is right because the parties agreed to a settlement. The Court has given preliminary approval to this settlement. The Court will have a hearing to decide whether to finally approve the settlement on **July 28, 2020 at 9:00 a.m.**

Who is included in the settlement? You may be a Class Member if you are a family member or beneficiary of a deceased pediatric cancer patient diagnosed with ALL who was treated at UNM between January 1, 1977 and March 31, 1997 and who died on or before December 1, 2019. This lawsuit is principally about whether pediatric cancer patients who were treated for ALL at the UNM between January 1, 1977, and March 31, 1997, were given proper care.

What does the settlement provide? The University of New Mexico has agreed to create a fund of \$38,050,000.00 to be divided among all Class members. The Settlement Agreement, available at the website below, describes all the details of the proposed settlement.

Your share of the fund will depend on the number of valid claims that are submitted by eligible Decedent Class Members, whether a deceased pediatric cancer patient has more than one statutory beneficiary entitled to compensation, the total amount of claims administration expenses, taxes, service awards to the named Plaintiffs in the case, and attorneys' fees and expenses.

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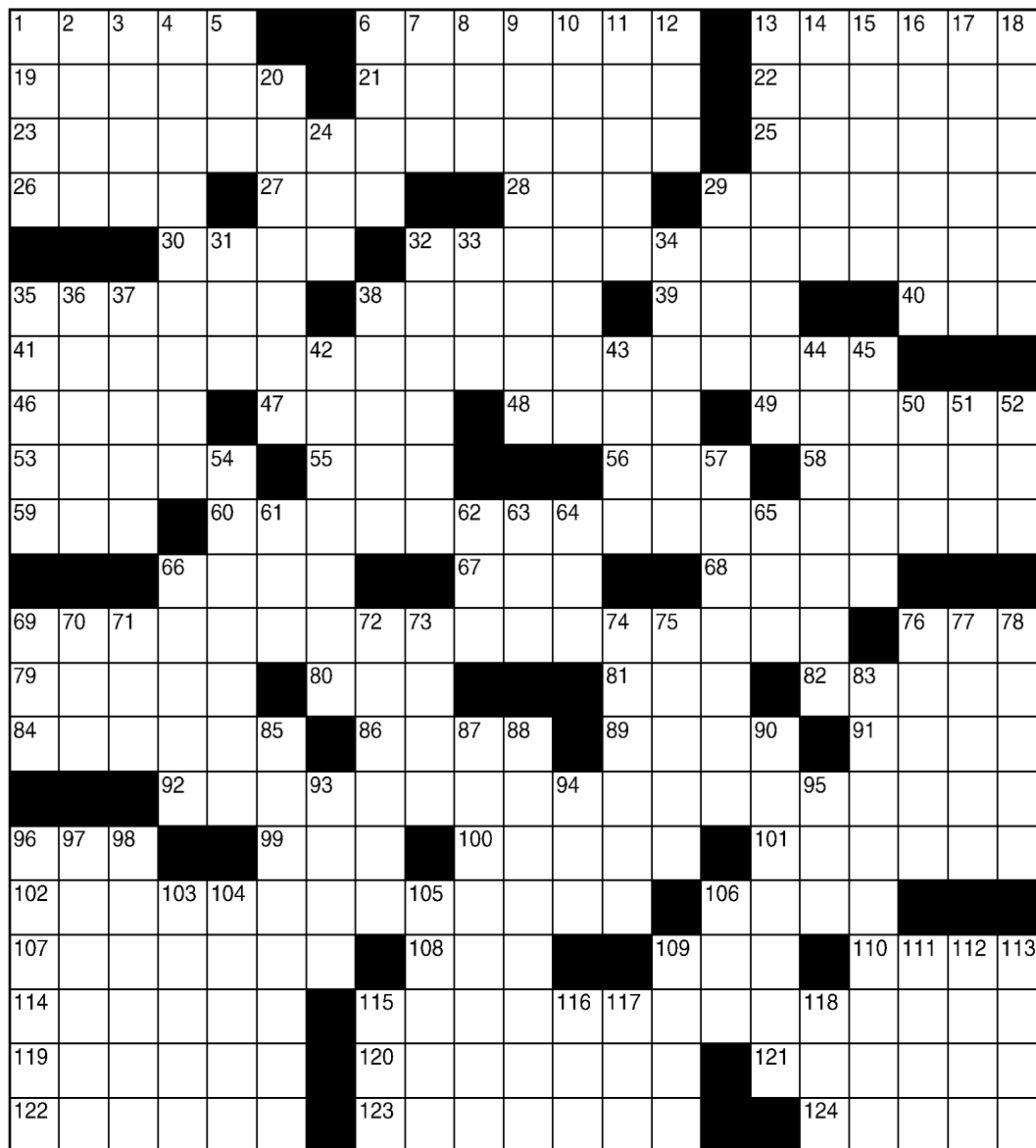

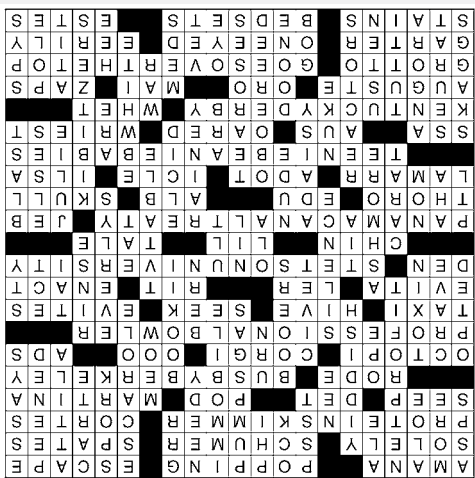

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Speaking, listening come easy; reading must be taught

After thousands of years of evolution, human brains are hard-wired for speaking and listening. Children naturally pick up language from their parents. Written language has a much shorter history, so our brains are not predisposed to read and write and must be taught.

As parents take over a more significant teaching load at home, many are discovering that figuring out what kind of reading instruction they should be providing can be challenging.

An Internet search reveals an array of information from the overly simple to the disarming complex. On the simple side, there is a plethora of easy suggestions from which to choose. There are lots of good ideas for keeping kids busy and entertained with worthwhile activities geared for teaching various parts of the reading process. Focusing on the specific skills your child needs requires some knowledge of effective

reading instruction.

The National Reading Panel (NRP) report in 2000 defines reading

as an equation; Decoding (recognizing words) times Linguistic Comprehension equals Reading Comprehension. Five instructional elements are identified as necessary

for proficient reading: phonics, phonological awareness, fluency, vocabulary and comprehension.

Phonics: Because phonics instruction has been largely ignored in American classrooms for the last 40 years, most parents are not familiar with it. Evidence collected by NRP confirms that making the crucial connection between the letters on the page and the sounds of the words is best taught by teaching the 44 sounds of the English language and the letters and letter combinations that represent them.

I recommend "The Writing Road to Reading," by Romalda Spalding. Most elementary curricula

provide up-to-date and engaging phonics lessons for children. For adults who wish to teach themselves the basics, I still recommend the Phonogram Cards produced by Spalding International.

Phonological awareness: Phonological awareness is taught even before print is introduced by manipulating sounds to become words through rhyming (songs, nursery rhymes, poems), by changing a sound to make a new word (cat, sat, bat, mat), blending sounds into words (stretching out the sounds as you write your child's name) and segmenting a word into sounds (pointing to the letters as you sound out the word). It is never too early to start enjoying singing and clapping games with your little one.

The parieto-temporal region is where the brain processes visual images. Using this function, children easily recognize images such as objects and faces. There isn't a naturally occurring connection between vision and speech, so neural con-

nections are made through practice and stored in the brain's occipito-temporal region.

Fluency: The occipito-temporal region is where automatic word recognition occurs. Once the neural channels that connect sounds and symbols are strong, words become easy to access. At this point, the words can be understood on sight, and reading becomes automatic. Retrieval of stored words requires less brain energy, allowing for more thought to go into constructing meaning from what is read. Reading fluency increases as more words are recognized on sight.

Vocabulary: Vocabulary is knowing lots of words and what they mean. A robust vocabulary increases our breadth of knowledge, as well as our ability to understand and use words to express thoughts and abstract ideas with precision. Everyday vocabulary is achieved through conversation. The most effective and enjoyable way to build a large and varied vocabulary is reading

aloud to children. Include informational texts about subjects that interest your child, read stories that stretch your imaginations and take you to new places and share the stories that were meaningful to you as a child. Your child's listening comprehension is stronger than his/her reading ability, so there's no need to limit your read-aloud books to their grade level. Besides, you are there to explain and discuss anything they don't understand.

Comprehension: Hollis Scarborough, senior scientist at Haskins Laboratories, is a leading researcher of early language development and its connection to later literacy. She compares teaching reading to "a woven rope by which word recognition and language comprehension combine as skilled reading is accomplished."

Language comprehension is built on background knowledge, vocabulary, knowledge of language structures, verbal reasoning and literacy knowledge. Background knowledge is learned

from our environment and can be built in a rich environment of new and interesting experiences, conversations and books.

Language structure includes grammar, word choice and rules for combining words and sentences. Verbal reasoning is the ability to extract meaning from text, think constructively and answer true false questions. Literacy knowledge involves understanding print concepts, ranging from how to hold a book and read from left to right to recognizing genres.

Observing your child will provide clues for where to start. Start by noticing how s/he responds to learning activities and to books. Adjust to a level where s/he can be successful 90 percent of the time. Gradually increase the challenge as confidence grows, and celebrate new achievements. Enjoy the gift of this extra time you spend getting to know your child.

when we can reconnect with them and know they are doing well in these difficult times. Being closed for almost three months has been a real challenge. outlets, such as supermarkets and gas stations.

The World Health Organization (WHO) has specifically warned about alcohol use during the pandemic. WHO advised that alcohol consumption during emergencies can intensify health vulnerabilities, risk-taking behavior, violence and mental-health and substance-abuse issues.

Social isolation and distancing from family, friends and support networks, not being able to work, economic uncertainty, being stuck in the house for too long and worrying about COVID-19 has heightened anxiety

and depression for many. These factors may contribute to people self-medicating with alcohol or to fill their time by drinking out of boredom.

Adding to this concern is the fact that alcohol increases risks of conflict and domestic violence. Also, people who drink, smoke or use other substances may already have impaired immune systems, which increases their risk of infection by COVID-19.

Over time, alcohol impairs the body's immune function and especially the lungs' ability to combat infection.

The Unified Prevention Coalition of Doña Ana County (UP!) encourages people to limit their alcohol consumption as one step that can be taken to

stay healthy. Also never provide alcohol to those under the age of 21.

In addition to the steps individuals can take, there are measures cities and municipalities can take to reduce potential alcohol-related harms by limiting the hours and days of alcohol sales and limiting the amount of alcohol that can be purchased at one time.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Taskforce on Community Prevention Services advises that if cities take steps to reduce alcohol availability, they could prevent excessive alcohol use and mitigate the multitude of related harms.

Taking advantage of this opportunity to provide sensible limits on

alcohol sales will protect the public from a potential surge in alcohol-related violence, as well as reduce the likelihood of the myriad of other potential physical and mental health issues that could arise.

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Gage Gavin Memorial Tournament may be rescheduled in the fall

Gage Gavin died unexpectedly in his sleep on June 22, 2015, the morning after Father's Day. His father, Pat, wanted to celebrate his son's life, so he created an endowed scholarship in his son's name, and began staging an annual golf tournament to raise funds to support the fund.

The event was first staged on March 26, 2016, which would have been Gage's birthday, and it also coincided with the annual NMSU PGA Golf Management alumni reunion.

During the four years the tournament was held, more than \$400,000 was raised, which has been used to establish four en-

dowed scholarships. To date, 30 students have been assisted with scholarship funds to help with university expenses, including tuition.

Because the scholarships are endowed, they are designed to help students each year in perpetuity.

Ten additional students will be chosen to receive

the scholarships this year, except there was no 2020 tournament due to COVID-19.

Pat Gavin said he hopes to reschedule the tournament to the fall and then return to the normal rotation in 2021, but if holding it this year isn't possible, he's planning an online auction instead.

Pat Gavin was born and raised in Las Cruces, and graduated from Las Cruces High School in 1983 and NMSU in 1987.

"I came back to NMSU for my MBA in the early '90s," he said. In 1993 "I came back to NMSU as a director of the Professional Golf Management (PGM) program. I have known New Mexico golf legends Herb Wimberly and his brother Guy Wim-

berly for most of my life."

Pat Gavin said the NMSU PGM program is entering its 28th year. NMSU was the third university to offer the degree, which is accredited by the PGA of America.

"Due to the overwhelming success of the original four programs — Ferris State, Mississippi State, NMSU and Penn State — there are now 18 universities around the country that offer this degree," he said. "We pride ourselves on our program and continue to make changes and upgrades to stay relevant in the golf industry. This includes creating a state-of-the-art indoor teaching studio, which utilizes the leading technology, Trackman."

Pat Gavin describes

the program in one word: "perfect," and he said the alumni and program team are close enough to refer to one another as family. He said he talks to alumni of the program on a regular basis.

In addition to Pat Gavin, the two other PGA professionals on staff are Josh Salmon and Henry Stetina. "All three of us teach different components of the PGA-specific education," he said. "In addition, all our students are required to complete 16 months of internships, working at courses during their summers all over the country. I would guarantee that every course in the country has been touched by the NMSU PGA Golf Management Program at some point over the years."

Through it all, Pat Gavin said his mind never wanders far from his son, Gage.

"Gage had graduated from Oñate High School just four weeks prior to his unexpected passing," Pat Gavin said. "He was planning on working at Sonoma Ranch Golf Course that summer, then had planned to start take some classes at NMSU and Doña Ana branch that fall semester. He was very fun to be around and loved to hang out with the PGA students for fun and laughs."

Soccer turns to Electronic Caregiver for health app

As COVID-19 regulations ease, Las Cruces-based health technology company Electronic Caregiver (ECG) has developed a digital application to help professional soccer players in Austria resume training and competition as safely as possible.

ECG was subcontracted by Paracelsus Medical University (PMU) in Sal-

zburg, Austria to build a data collection interface and mobile app, called Wallpass, to identify and track COVID-19 exposure risk among players of the Austrian Soccer Bundesliga, the highest-ranking national league club competition in Austrian soccer.

ECG and PMU will collaborate with the University of Salzburg and the Red Bull Athlete Performance Center (APC) in Salzburg to help maintain

overall athlete and staff members' health.

"This project, coupled with other initiatives that ECG is working on right now, is targeted toward helping the world get back to some semblance of normalcy and will allow people to begin living their lives again," said ECG Chief Technology Officer David Keeley.

Apple Inc. recently approved ECG's digital app for testing. Professional soccer players

participating in the study to evaluate the efficacy of the app will register and download the app so that it can begin collecting data on physiology, standard training and competition, recovery and COVID-19 or infectious disease exposure risk (including survey question responses and geopositioning). PMU's research team and medical staff will review the data and quantify the safeness of returning to play.

The results of this study will provide new and much-needed data on the prevalence, nature and behavior of COVID-19-related illness in professional athletics.

"From a medical perspective, it is very important to gain and analyze data regarding risk factors and prevention approaches against COVID-19 in professional sports to get a better understanding and improve safety as best as possible

Happier days ahead? Time will tell the story

As of June 1, virtually 100 percent of the nation's golf courses were open for play, albeit with a few adjustments and restrictions. There's even been some live golf on TV, although mostly charitable events with small numbers of players.

Golf has emerged from the darkness that began in March. All local golf courses are now quite busy. Some tee sheets may be filled by those who can't go to work and have opted to play golf with their newly found spare time.

Sonoma Ranch, NMSU, Picacho and Red Hawk all have rebounded from the forced no-play break with the grass and greens in wonderful condition. The greens have raised cup liners or pool-noodle inserts so players don't touch the flagsticks. No bunker rakes, tee times at 15-minute intervals and one golfer to a cart. (Please follow the rules.)

During the six-plus weeks of suspended on-course play, the golf industry was busy collaborating on the "Back2Golf Operations Playbook," which provides detailed procedures and recommendations to lead the judicious and safe return of golf in such trying times.

Input for the playbook

came from industry organizations that included the PGA of America, PGA Tour, LPGA, USGA, Golf Course Superintendents Association of America, Club Management Association of America, National Golf Course Owners Association, World Golf Foundation, American

Junior Golf Association and The First Tee.

The industry-wide Back2Golf initiative has been primarily focused on ensuring golf courses that have remained operational, or recently re-opened, do so responsibly to protect golfers, employees and all members of the community.

"Golf is more than a game – it is a community, and this effort is one of the most recent examples of how we can all work together and provide the best support to our industry," says Mike Davis, CEO of the USGA.

The latest data suggests that, in the U.S., golf is primed for a big comeback. With nearly all golf retail locations now open for business, including most pro shops, folks appear to be showing less concern about visiting retail locations.

A recent National Golf Foundation report indicates that golf retail is

showing positive signs of recovery, and that there may be an emerging boom among golfing beginners.

"There seems to be a surge in participation among beginning golfers and those who haven't played for a while," said Joseph F. Beditz, CEO of NGF. "Course operators are telling us they are seeing lots of new faces, and retailers are saying they are moving an unusually large number of beginners' boxed sets of clubs."

If there is a dark cloud on all of this, it is the news that many colleges and universities are eliminating sports programs, including golf. Brown University, an Ivy League school, recently announced that it was cutting men's and women's golf as varsity sports, while the University of Akron is scrapping men's golf.

Total program elimination of all sports now number more than 100. Sports administration experts say that the coronavirus pandemic is a convenient excuse and justification for such wholesale cuts, but the underlying reason is trimming bloated athletics budgets.

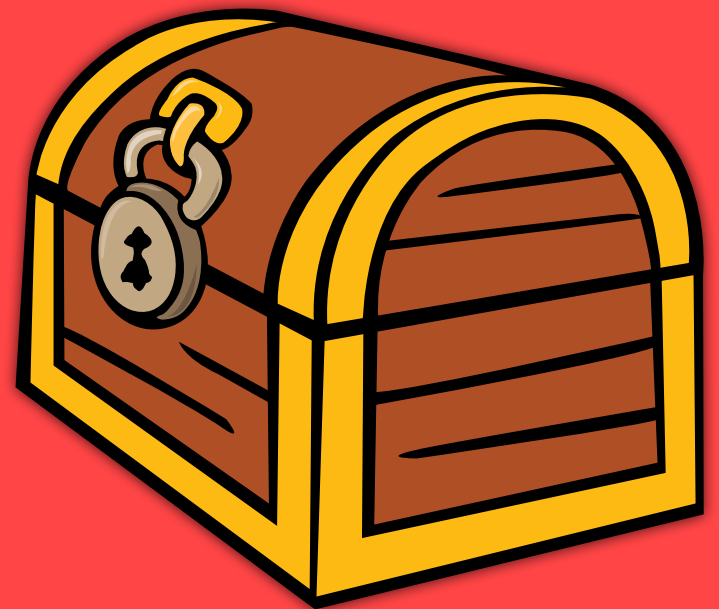

- Ask your parents to write a letter to you, talking about the current day or about what they hope for the future. Friends can also write letters. Keep them sealed and place them in box, no reading!

Now put the treasure in a safe place and see how long you can wait before checking it! Two months? Six months? One year? Ten years?
