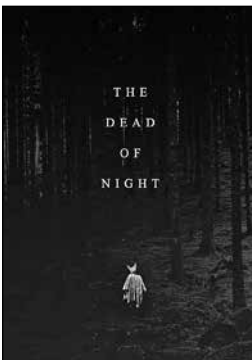

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# WSMR celebrates 75th anniversary

White Sands Missile Range (WSMR) leaders celebrated the 75th anniversary of the range during a small ceremony July 9 in front of Headquarters Building 100. The range was originally established as the White Sands Proving Ground on July 9, 1945.

While due to COVID-19 restrictions the event was limited in attendance, the ceremony can be seen on the WSMR Facebook page (U.S. Army White Sands Missile Range).

For the past 75 years, thousands of military personnel and civilian employees have made WSMR a focal point for scientific and engineering work, managed by the Army.

During the ceremony, WSMR Commander Brig. Gen. David Trybula welcomed state and local leaders and community members to the event.

He said the Army appreciates the support of the state. WSMR encompasses 3,000 square miles and spreads into five different New Mexico counties.

“We continuously work towards a valued partnership,” he said. “We are grateful to be one of the installations that creates a three-part contiguous military space here in the Southwest and are proud of the synergetic work we have been able to accomplish alongside Fort Bliss and Holloman Air Force Base as we simul-

taneously produce readiness for today and for the future.”

Trybula said missile and rocket testing began with the V2s in 1945, followed by a large number and many types of systems tested over the years. The names range from Greek mythology — Ajax, Athena, Hermes, Nike — and Roman mythology — Jupiter, Mercury and Saturn, Trybula said.

“One of the hidden names is the ‘Hound Dog,’” he said. “‘The Hound Dog’ was a missile that was air launched from B52s near Del Rio, Texas into WSMR in the early 1960s. It was the precursor to today’s e-missiles.”

Trybula said WSMR also is the birthplace of America's space activity. Much more than the early rocket research it is known for, the range was

integral to the testing of NASA's Apollo missions, hosted a landing of the space shuttle at the White Sands Space Harbor, and continues to test the Commercial Crew Transport that will ferry astronauts to the International Space Station and return them to WSMR.

“Indeed, WSMR was so important to getting a U.S. astronaut on the moon that President Kennedy personally visited to understand the activities ongoing,” Trybula said. “WSMR's tie to space is firmly entrenched with long-standing NASA tenant organizations and now an element of the U.S. Space Force. As with missiles, for space, WSMR is testing the future, changing the world.”

Trybula thanked the personnel at the range, past and present. Speaking to the current work-

force, Trybula told them they are the essence of

WSMR today.

“Thank you for your dedication, professionalism and devotion to duty,” he said. “Each one of you

contributed to the 75 years of success here at WSMR and are building upon that foundation for the future.”

# Mite infestation affecting local trees, plants

A microscopic arachnid is attacking many local trees and plants.

Damage from infestations of the eriophyid mite complex has been seen on Arizona ash, along with desert willow, mesquite, purple-leaf plum, sycamore, vitex and Chinese

pistache trees, said Doña Ana County Cooperative Extension Service Agronomy and Horticulture Agent Jeff Anderson. Bushes suffering damage include creosote, olean-der, lantana and desert bird of paradise, he said.

Worse, “the host range seems to be expanding,” Anderson said.

Toxin from mites causes

changes to hormones within the buds of trees and plants being attacked so that they do not signal correctly for the plant to grow, Anderson said. The result is that the tree or plant does not leaf out, or new growth is very distorted, creating a witches’ broom effect or a mass of nubbin-like small bumps where the leaves should be coming out. If trees and plants do not leaf out properly, they could die, he said.

Because mites are arachnids (the same class as spiders) not insects, insecticides won’t kill them, Anderson said. “You have to use an arachnicide,” he said.

Anderson has recommended using treatments of liquid sulfur to spray branches and buds, rotating with the miticide Avid. Other miticides may also

be effective, Anderson said, but they produce strong odors. He does not recommend cutting off branches of infected trees and plants.

“That’s the last resort,” Anderson said.

Anyone who thinks they may have mite damage, especially if any is noticed on pecan trees, is asked to send detailed photographs of the damaged tree or plant, along with a phone number, to Anderson at latnz@nmsu.edu.

“I can take a look at it, call you and we can discuss it,” he said.

Anderson said there is no known cause for the infestation. Mites cannot fly, so they are likely spread by the wind or on bird feathers, he said.

If an herbicide has been used nearby, damage to trees and plants

can mimic mite damage, Anderson said, and there could be other causes as well.

“A careful analysis of

each situation is important to make a correct diagnosis and treatment recommendations,” he said.

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# New Mexico behind national average in Census count

New Mexico's self-response rate to the 2020 U.S. Census was 51.4 percent as of July 8, which is more than 10 points behind the national self-response rate of 62 percent, according to the U.S. Census Bureau.

"The 2020 Census will determine congressional representation, inform hundreds of billions in federal funding every year, and provide data that will impact communities for the next decade," according to [www.2020census.gov/en/census-data.html](http://www.2020census.gov/en/census-data.html).

A University of New Mexico study showed New Mexico with the second-worst response rate in the 2010 Census. If the state undercounts again in 2020, it could result in a loss of hundreds of millions of dollars in the next 10 years. The state will lose about \$3,000 a year for every person not counted.

"Federal dollars for sidewalks, Section Eight housing, school lunches, Pell grants; these are just a few of the over 60 different programs your census count brings us," said Mayor Ken Miyagishima.

"We have asked Las Cruces community members to be heroes this year and respond to the census, because billions of dollars are at stake as well as having an accurate representation of elected officials at all levels of government including the United States Congress, New Mexico legislature, and local bodies such as the city council," interim City Manager David Maestas said. "The more people who are counted, the more money [we] get for schools, health care services, hospitals, roads

and public safety."

The 2020 Census count began Jan. 21, when the Census Bureau started counting people in the rural village of Toksook Bay, Alaska. In mid-March, the bureau mailed information nationwide on how to complete the census online, by phone or by mail. In mid-April it mailed paper questionnaires to homes that had not yet responded online or by phone.

Here is the Census Bureau's timeline going forward:

- Now-Sept. 3: Census takers will work with administrators at colleges, senior centers, prisons and other facilities that house large numbers of people to make sure everyone is

counted.

- Aug. 11-Oct. 31: Census takers will conduct interviews at homes that haven't responded to the 2020 Census.
- December: The Census Bureau will deliver apportionment counts to the president and Congress.
- March 31, 2021: The Census Bureau will send redistricting counts to the states. This information is used to redraw legislative districts based on population changes. Forecasters are already projecting that up to 10 states could lose a U.S. House of Representatives seat as a result of the final 2020 Census count, and seven states — including Texas and Colorado — could gain seats. New Mexico is likely to keep its three seats.

The Census Bureau estimates the U.S. population (50 states plus Washington, D.C.) as of April 1, 2020 was 329.5 million, up

6.7 percent from the 2010 Census.

The Census Bureau reported that 132 programs used Census Bureau data to distribute more than \$675 billion in funds during FY2015. Recipients included medical, child-care, school lunch, housing, education (including Head Start), food and small business development programs.

The Project On Government Oversight (POGO), a nonpartisan independent watchdog ([www.pogo.org](http://www.pogo.org)), said in March that 316 federal programs will distribute \$1.5 billion based on 2020 Census re-

sults.

POGO said New Mexico received nearly \$11 billion in census-guided federal spending in FY2017. That amounts to almost 13.1 percent of personal income, ranking New Mexico fifth nationally. New Mexico's final self-response rate for the 2010 Census was 60 percent, according to POGO.

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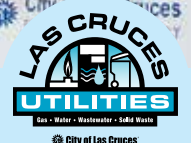

## Valley Drive construction nightmare finally over

*(Publisher's note: Please turn to the center spread of this edition for more info about the history and businesses of Valley Drive and its construction.)*

I badly needed to go to the restroom.

It was Saturday, Nov. 10, 2018. I remember the date for two reasons: 1.

It was the day of the Las Cruces Veterans Day Parade and, 2. It was the day of Bedlam (the annual football game between the evil OU Sooners and my alma mater, Oklahoma State University).

My daughter, Avalon, and I had just left the parade and were searching for a place to use the restroom and watch the game.

It was to be a very quick trip from downtown to Mesilla via Avenida de Mesilla. Avalon had just gotten her learner's permit and was driving the car. Although, very soon, she wasn't really driving, because Avenida de Mesilla had inexplicably turned into a parking lot.

Unwittingly, we had discovered construction crews had

begun work on the Valley and Avenida de Mesilla intersection, which wasn't supposed to happen until an earlier phase of the project had been completed.

This turned the New Mexico Department of Transportation construction project, already a major inconvenience, into the worst nightmare for

every business on or near Valley Drive. (Well, it did work out OK for the business at 1865 S. Valley Drive – Las Cruces Barricades.)

A coincidentally concurrent City of Las Cruces project just east of Valley on and around Hadley Avenue compounded the issue for businesses near the Hadley/Valley intersection.

La Fiesta Bakery closed due to the negative impact. Patrons of the often-packed Nellie's and High Desert Brewing Co. at times found themselves literally cut off from their beloved haunts.

After sitting on Avenida for nearly 30 minutes that November 2018 day, we finally found a restroom and a place to watch

the game (which ended in another heartbreaking Cowboy loss, as OU won 48-47).

But businesspeople and others who regularly have to use Valley Drive would have to wait another 18 months for relief.

The Valley Drive nightmare finally ended in May 2020, as construction crews wrapped up the loose ends, resulting in a beautiful roadway. I'm sounding pretty negative about the construction, but repairs had been badly needed for a while, and the infrastructure in place now is an improvement that should last a long time.

If the construction had followed the originally promised pattern, things would have been reduced. There were originally three phases: Phase I was from Picacho to Hadley. Phase II was from Hadley to Amador. Phase III was from Amador to Avenida de Mesilla. Starting on Phase III when Phase I wasn't complete not only violated the agreed-upon plan, it held captive every business between Picacho and Avenida de Mesilla.

We all have several horror stories like mine of being

trapped in one segment or another of the construction. But businesses in the middle of it didn't have the option of taking a different route.

"First we had the construction, now the virus," said Mary Lopez, owner of One Stop convenience store on Valley, which has some of the best burritos in town, including the only Spam, egg and green chile burrito around. "It's been very tough on small businesses. Very difficult. But we're going to make it. Somehow."

When Mary says "somehow," it's not terribly convincing. Many of these businesses won't recover from the construction/COVID double whammy. And those that do survive will never recover the losses.

"I am not the most accurate business to ask about being affected," said George Vescovo of Vescovo Toyota, which broke the ribbon on its brand new Valley Drive building in March 2018, about a month before construction kicked in.

"We were fortunate to have a very loyal customer base and

# Pride and liberty are making us sick

Six months into this pandemic, it has become tragically clear that the coronavirus has no understanding of or regard for American exceptionalism.

Other nations have seen the spike and fall that we were told to expect last spring, and they're now bracing for the possibility of a second wave in the fall. We had the same kind of spike, but no fall.

There are many reasons for that, including some that may be out of our control. We'll learn much more after the pandemic is over, when experts can view the event in its entirety and have a better understanding of the virus.

But there's no denying we've done a lousy job on the stuff that we can control.

Based on the limited knowledge we have now, the best way to stop the virus from spreading is to stay home as much as possible; maintain distance from others and wear a facemask when we do go out; and then wash our hands as soon as we get back home. Those are the steps people in other countries have taken to control the virus.

We decided that those measures were bad for business, which they most certainly were. But beyond that, some of us also decided that they were also un-American. They were violations of the freedoms and liberties that we cher-

ish and hold so dear.

A popular video in the early days of the pandemic showed a Costco store clerk taking a full cart away from a customer who refused to wear a facemask. "I won't do it because I woke up in a free country," the man explained.

I can understand the economic argument that led our leaders to reopen businesses too soon. But I'm having a more difficult time understanding the argument that the Bill of Rights somehow offers unique protections against a virus.

To deal with those few local residents who refuse

to wear masks in public, the City of Las Cruces has passed a new ordinance requiring them. The new law puts the onus on business owners, who can be fined for each person in their shop not wearing a facemask.

That would seem to conflict with the current push for police reform, which suggests that not every problem should be solved by someone armed with a pistol, taser and nightstick. This will give police one more issue to deal with that doesn't fall into the category of crime solving and prevention.

Codes officers will be able to assist with enforcement, according to Deputy Las Cruces Police Chief

Miguel Dominguez. Fines are \$100 for each person not in compliance, up to \$500 per incident.

My guess is this will be similar to when no-smoking laws first went into effect. Police will issue a lot more warnings than actual citations. Some business owners may take a stand to make a point, but that will get expensive. Before long, masks will become the norm, just like going outside to smoke is now.

Like most people, I don't like wearing a facemask. They're hot and they make my glasses fog when I breathe. They're another reason not to go out unless I must.

I don't wear one to make a political statement, and having one on does not make me feel morally superior to anyone. I eagerly look forward to the day when they won't be needed.

But with death rates climbing every day and no

better solution available, facemasks are one of the few tools we have. It can't be an individual choice. Only a collective effort will be effective.

### Make taxes fair

To the editor:

On June 28, Grover Norquist and Paul Gessing had a commentary published strongly recommending that the New Mexico legislature not raise taxes in their special session to cover reductions in tax revenue due to the Coronavirus and falling

oil prices. On June 30, Gov. Lujan Grisham signed a budget bill that vetoed \$30 million in budget cuts for public school support, but reduced 2021 fiscal year appropriations by about \$415 million dollars. Proposed salary increases for teachers were reduced from 4 percent to 1 percent. Taxes were not raised.

What's wrong with this

picture? For more than 50 years, conservative policy proposals have been reducing taxes and regulations, destroying unions and building wealth for billionaires on the backs of average workers. Businesses do a good job of producing and selling everyday goods and services — but do not provide resources for good education for all students,

physical and mental health access, infrastructure like roads, bridges and broadband internet for rural and poor families and support for people that need a helping hand.

We used to do this back in the 50s, 60s and 70s. Top-down tax and other policies have created economic inequality that does not exist in other developed coun-

tries. Pulling yourself up by the bootstraps doesn't work if you have no straps, like wealth, education or contacts.

New Mexico is one of the largest tax havens in the U.S., offering numerous economic incentives and tax breaks for personal and corporate incomes. A person with a million-dollar income pays the same tax

rate as someone paid \$16,000. There is no inheritance tax, estate tax or franchise tax. And businesses (film industry, Spaceport, etc.) are constantly receiving tax incentives to come to the state. What happened to the progressive tax system based on ability to pay?

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# Oil/Gas Association awards include Las Cruces nonprofit

The New Mexico Oil and Gas Association's (NMOGA) Brighter Future Fund awarded \$50,000 to six New Mexico nonprofit organizations in support of efforts to increase economic opportunities and fight hunger, including Jardin de los Niños in Las Cruces, NMOGA announced in a news release.

Jardin, which provides education and childcare services to homeless and near homeless children and families, and the other five nonprofits serve people in 10 counties across New Mexico.

"This funding will be utilized to support the families that we serve to



meet their basic needs, and we are extremely grateful for it," said Jardin Executive Director Michelle Adames, Ph.D. "The goal of this project is to make sure that children have food and nutritious meals over the weekends and holidays when the school is closed. The impact we've seen is that children are more alert, attendance rates increase and after children return from the weekends, we can

quickly begin the learning process. Beyond that, decreasing food insecurity supports social-emotional learning and development."

Jardin received \$5,000 from NMOGA. The other nonprofits receiving funds were CLN Kids, \$10,000 to support efforts to reduce hunger; Community Learning Network, \$10,000 to increase economic opportunities; Desert Forge Foundation, \$10,000 to increase

economic opportunities; Flower Hill Institute, \$5,000 to increase economic opportunities; and Gallup Main Street, \$10,000 to increase economic opportunities.

"We are honored to have the opportunity to support these organizations in their efforts to strengthen New Mexico and create a brighter and better future for our children," said NMOGA Executive Director Ryan Flynn. "These community-based initiatives are game-changers, and all New Mexicans should be proud of their work. The strength and resiliency of the oil and gas industry makes it possible for NMOGA to invest in these efforts across our

state so that more New Mexicans have the opportunity to maximize their potential and achieve their dreams."

Since December 2019, the Brighter Future Fund has awarded \$155,000 to organizations in every corner of New Mexico. 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# Wine industry wonders why it can't operate

The grapes might hang on their vines this year, ripening, rotting and falling to the ground as New Mexico wineries struggle to keep their 391-year-old industry alive.

Paolo D'Andrea is manager of New Mexico Vineyards in Deming, the largest grower/producer of grapes in the state.

"We supply grapes to many of the others," he said. "We do 17 in New Mexico, three in Arizona and three in Texas."

He said picking season begins July 20, but several facilities have canceled their orders due to lack of ability to market their products.

Wineries and breweries have the same licensing, D'Andrea said, but while breweries can open, the wineries are shut down by the governor's public-health order.

"The governor decided the wineries can't open for tastings but allowed the breweries to do it," he said. "The wine growers association is upset. We carry the same license. We feel like we're not being

treated equally to similar businesses."

Many of the small wineries are dependent on tasting rooms and wine festivals, he said. So financially "they are not doing well at all."

And because New Mexico Vineyards is an important Luna County employer, D'Andrea said, the county will suffer.

"Considering we are also located in Luna County and it is the highest unemployment county in New Mexico, if we have to close New Mexico Vineyards, many full-time employees will lose their jobs and that makes additional stress on the people

in Deming, he said.

D'Andrea and his wife, Sylvia, own Luna Rossa Winery, which is closed on the Deming side but surviving in Las Cruces because their outlet is a restaurant. Unless something equitable happens soon, D'Andrea said he does not have much hope for New Mexico's 2020 vintage. The wine cycle has been stopped in New Mexico.

He said the process of making wine is completely different than that of making beer.

"With wine, if you miss the harvest, you don't

have wine until the next year," he said. "You have to take the opportunity when the grapes are ready, and it takes two or three years before the bottles will be ready."

Christopher Goblet, executive director of the New Mexico Wine and Grape Growers Association, said there are three types of local producers — breweries, wineries and distilleries — and all are regulated in the same way and have the same licenses.

"You have Bosque Brewing operating two tasting rooms and you have

to communicate with us since June 15. It doesn't make any sense when your industry is shuttered with no explanation."

The only difference between wineries and breweries is that the brewers don't grow anything, he said.

"If we can't sell wine, then we don't have room in our tanks for this year's grapes," he said. "Our cycle is based on Mother Nature. You will have an entire 2020 vintage that falls to the ground. It's the domino effect."

Several attempts by the Bulletin to contact Lt. Gov. Howie Morales and Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham regarding this issue received no response.

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# Extreme heat is here; protect people and pets

The hottest days of the summer have begun, with consecutive days forecast for highs well over 100 degrees. Both people and companion animals are vulnerable to heat-related health complications that can be deadly.

According to the National Institute on Aging (NIA), older adults are more susceptible to heat-related health complications than younger, healthy people. Symptoms can range from mere discomfort to death.

The NIA advises older people to seek out cool places, elevate the legs and – above all – stay hydrated by drinking water

throughout the day.

Both the City of Las Cruces and Doña Ana County designate specific buildings each summer as cooling spaces, although in the time of COVID-19, entrance to these shelters — once they're announced — are likely to require social distancing and masking.

Visit both [www.las-cruces.org](http://www.las-cruces.org) and [www.donaanacounty.org](http://www.donaanacounty.org) frequently during hot weather for updates on available cooling centers and operational requirements.

The Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) devotes a page of its website to companion animals in the heat.

"The summer months can be uncomfortable

## Keep 'em cool

— even dangerous — for pets and people," the website states. "It's difficult enough simply to cope with rising temperatures, let alone thick humidity, but things really get tough in areas that are hit with the double blow of intense heat and storm-caused power outages, sometimes with tragic results."

The website offers the following tips to keep pets healthy during a heat-wave:

- Never leave a pet in a parked car, not even for a minute! Not even with the car running and air conditioner on. On a

warm day, temperatures inside a vehicle can rise rapidly to dangerous levels. Your pet may suffer irreversible organ damage or die.

- Humidity can exacerbate heat. Humidity can affect your pet," says Dr. Barry Kellogg, VMD, of the Humane Society Veterinary Medical Association. "Animals pant to evaporate moisture from their lungs, which takes heat away from their body. If the humidity is too high, they are unable to cool themselves."
- Limit exercise on hot days. Adjust intensity and duration of exercise in accordance with the temperature. On very hot days, limit exercise to early morning or evening hours, and be especially careful with pets with white-colored ears, who are more susceptible to skin cancer, and

short-nosed pets, who typically have difficulty breathing. Asphalt gets very hot and can burn your pet's paws, so walk your dog on the grass if possible. Always carry water with you to keep your dog from dehydrating.

- Don't rely on a fan. Dogs sweat primarily through their feet. And fans don't cool off pets as effectively as they do people.
  - Provide ample shade and water. Make sure they have protection from heat and sun and plenty of fresh, cold water. In heat waves, add ice to water when possible. Tree shade and tarps are ideal because they don't obstruct air flow. A doghouse makes heat worse.
  - Cool your pet inside and out. Whip up a batch of quick and easy DIY pupsicles for dogs. And always provide water, whether your pets are inside or out with you. Use a cooling body wrap, vest or mat. Soak these products in cool water, and they'll stay cool (but usually dry) for up to
- three days. If your dog doesn't find baths stressful, treat it to a cooling soak.
- Watch for signs of heatstroke. Heatstroke is deadly. Some signs of heatstroke are heavy panting, glazed eyes, a rapid heartbeat, difficulty breathing, excessive thirst, lethargy, fever, dizziness, lack of coordination, profuse salivation, vomiting, a deep red or purple tongue, seizure and unconsciousness.
  - How to treat a pet suffering from heatstroke: Move it into an air-conditioned area. Apply ice packs or cold towels to the head, neck and chest or run cool (not cold) water over it. Let it drink small amounts of cool water or lick ice cubes. Take it directly to a veterinarian.
  - Prepare for power outages. Before a summer storm takes out the power in your home, create a disaster plan to keep your pets safe from heat stroke and other temperature-related trouble.

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## COVID and DIY

Even if you get "in the zone," make it a point to take frequent breaks to stand up, stretch, walk around and hydrate. If you find yourself bent or hunched over a lot during the project, for example, take time to stand and do some back bends to equalize pressure in the spine.

### Practice Proper Lifting

When lifting heavy objects, always bend with the knees and lift with your legs, keeping your back upright, and the bulk of the weight close to your body. Also, don't hesitate to ask for help if the item's too heavy or awkward.

### Use the Buddy System

Along with help lifting, be sure to recruit some help whenever your project requires the use of sharp objects, power tools, ladders, etc. Don't risk accidents. A good partner can help slow you down (in a good way) and keep you mindful of personal safety.

### Make Time for R&R

# City looking at detailed police audit; review board possible

Having both a “robust” citizens’ review board and a police auditor would be ideal for the City of Las Cruces, City Councilor Gabe Vasquez said during the council’s Monday, July 13, work session.

“Do we want a police auditor vs. a citizens’ review board or both?” Mayor Pro-Tem Kasandra Gandara asked. “I just want the public to be very much part of this process.”

“An intense, comprehensive auditor” can lead to a better police

force that has community trust, Councilor Johana Bencomo said. But, she said, having police officers conduct the review “gives a lot of pause to a lot of community members in terms of trust in the process.”

The city has had a police auditor since August

2014, City Attorney Jennifer Vega-Brown said at the meeting. A contract with a private auditing company, Public Safety Strategies Group (PSSG) of Townsend, MA, was renewed five times and terminated in August 2019, she said.

Vega-Brown said a sixth contract renewal was underway when the city decided a new RFP should be created to track more specific data about the performance of the Las Cruces Police Department. PSSG had issued twice yearly reports to the council.

Vega-Brown said the city is not required to

conduct police audits, and there are no specific standards to guide them. She said a city advisory committee that includes local law enforcement officials and auditors from the cities of Las Cruces and El Paso, convened Jan. 8 to help craft the new RFP. The issue was brought before the council at the July 13 meeting to get councilors’ input, Vega-Brown said.

The revised audit process will include an anonymous hotline to receive complaints, she said, and audits of the complaint investigation process will “ensure investigations were complete, objective,

thorough and fair and that all actions taken were appropriate.”

Complaints may include issues related to the code of conduct/ethics, recording devices, use of force, vehicle pursuits and other matters.

Audits would also be done of police operations, including policies, procedures and training issues, with recommendations for improvement to increase police accountability and transparency included in the complaint process, Vega-Brown said.

She said audit services will include follow-up audits to evaluate “pro-

cedural, practical or other barriers that may suppress or discourage reporting of complaints,” and will also include statistical and trend analyses, such as offender and victim demographics, location of incidents, criminal charges, disposition of cases, police violations and police-officer demographics.

Vega-Brown said written and evaluation reports will be submitted to the city within 30 days of receiving a complaint, and written semi-annual reports will be submitted that are compliant with the city’s accountability-in-government ordinance.

# Floros: The sky is not falling at NMSU

During a town hall meeting held on Zoom Thursday, July 9, New Mexico State University President John Floros addressed issues related to returning to classes and the university’s finances.

Floros started the meeting by acknowledging “we live in difficult times for many.” He said it’s important for leaders to be respectful.

“We do live in a democracy,” he said. “... and a democracy is a messy thing. You have to bring people with you, you can’t expect them to know. We all deserve a little bit of respect and trust. Don’t automatically assume we

are here to do the wrong thing. We are here to do the right thing.”

Speaking about international students, Floros said new federal guidelines state international students cannot stay in the United States if their classes are online only.

“[NMSU] leadership believes this is the wrong way to go,” he said. “We have more than 1,000 international students. We are trying to figure out ways for our own students to stay.”

Dr. Luis Cifuentes, NMSU vice president for research, said international students are being evaluated on a case-by-case basis, while NMSU develops a way to fill requirements so they can

stay.

Floros said NMSU plans to reopen for the fall semester.

“So, for the international students, at this point, you should have the ability to register for face-to-face classes, and we will also try to help as we move forward,” he said. “We also want to make sure all of you — faculty, staff and students — [can choose] to come or stay home. Don’t automatically assume you have to come to campus.”

As Floros turned to a discussion on the NMSU budget, he said that 40 percent of the budget comes from the state. He said the state is in a bad fiscal position, partly because of the virus, partly

because of oil prices and partly because there is a national/international slowdown in the economy.

During the special legislative session in June, the state rescinded four-percent compensation increases awarded during the regular session in January. The state also cut the higher-education budget up to six percent across the board. Finally, it clawed back two-thirds of the federal funds from the CARE Act for virus-related expenses.

Floros said the net result nears a 10 percent adverse impact on the budget, but he also said that while adjusting to financial shortfalls may be painful and stressful, things are not impossible.

“Yes, it’s not pretty,” he said. “But it’s not ‘the sky is falling.’ We will get through this. It may not be what we wanted, but we will get through it.”

# Las Cruces near the top for unemployment recovery

Las Cruces is rated as the sixth best city in America for unemployment recovery since the onset of COVID-19.

According to a report released Wednesday, July 1, Las Cruces has the second-best recovery among all states in its unemployment rate since the onset of COVID-19.

The report by the personal-finance website WalletHub says Las Cruces had the third-best recovery among 180 cities in the U.S. when May 2020 unemployment (4,025) is compared to January 2020 (2,478). That's a change of 62.4 percent. Las Cruces is ranked second.

Las Cruces' official un-

employment rate for May 2020 is listed as 9 percent, the 20th lowest in the U.S. But WalletHub said the adjusted rate is 11.1 percent when workers on temporary layoffs are counted.

The latest jobs report shows the national unemployment rate at 13.3 percent, 10 percent below the peak of 14.7 percent during the COVID-19 peak, WalletHub said. When adjusted for temporary layoffs, that figure could be 23 percent higher, the website said.

By way of comparison, New York City, which had, at one time, experienced the largest number of COVID-19 cases in the U.S., showed a 365 percent increase in unemployment from January-May 2020, WalletHub said. The national average increase

## Las Cruces named fourth best-run city in U.S.

Whoever becomes the new Las Cruces city manager will inherit leadership of what the personal-finance website WalletHub has listed as the fourth best-run city in the United States. For each city, WalletHub said it constructed a "Quality of City Services" score – comprising 38 performance indicators grouped into six service categories – that was then measured against the city's total per-capita budget.

Here is how Las Cruces scored among the 150 cities included in the survey: (1=best run, 75=average); financial stability: 49; education: 44; health: 22; safety: 41; economy: 111; infrastructure and pollution: 76; total budget per capita: 9; states offering the most coronavirus support: 11.

Las Cruces was ranked 30th in quality of city services.

Nampa, Idaho was ranked No. 1 in the survey, followed by Boise, Idaho; Provo, Utah; Las Cruces; Durham, North Carolina; Lexington-Fayette, Kentucky; Missoula, Montana; Fort Wayne, Indiana; Virginia Beach, Virginia; and Nashua, New Hampshire.

The bottom 10 in the survey, ranked 141st-150th, were Flint, Michigan; Chicago; Detroit; Oakland, California; Hartford, Connecticut; New York City; Chattanooga, Tennessee; Gulfport, Mississippi; San Francisco; and Washington, D.C.

Albuquerque was ranked 25th in the survey, and El Paso was ranked 40th.

was 260 percent. New York City's overall unemployment rate is 18.2 percent.

Ahead of Las Cruces in the overall national rankings were Lincoln, Nebraska, Washington, D.C., Omaha, Nebraska, New

Haven, Connecticut, and Gilbert, Arizona. Seventh-14th places in the survey were all Arizona cities.

Albuquerque was listed as 15th, and El Paso was ranked 100th. The bottom five in the report were Ho-

nolulu, Las Vegas, Nevada, North Las Vegas, Nevada, Detroit and Orlando, Florida.

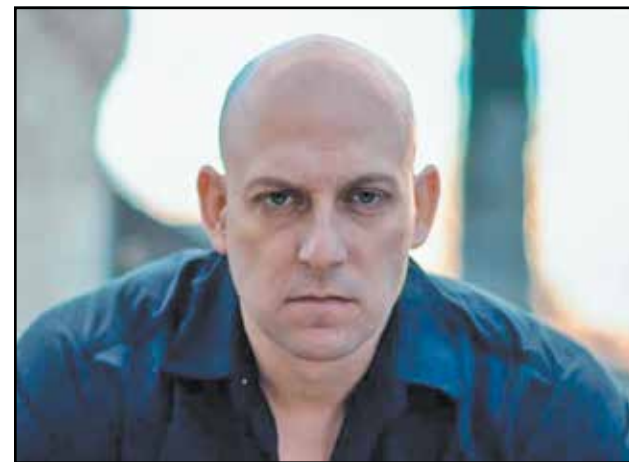

## Las Cruces writer/director brings childhood fear to the big screen with Lance Henriksen, Matthew Lawrence

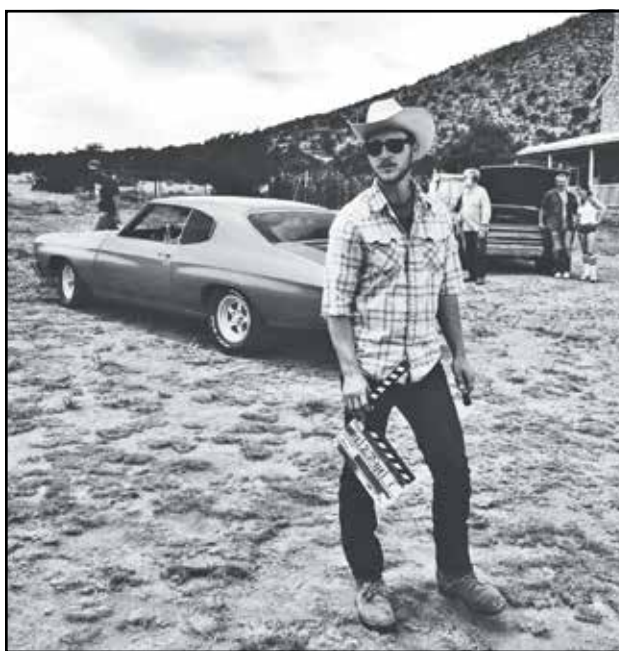

Las Cruces writer/director Robert Dean's latest movie, "The Dead of Night," is based on one of his childhood fears.

"There is something about growing up on an isolated ranch that truly inspired yet frightened me at the same time," Dean said. "Rural America is a strange crossroads where recluses, drifters and outlaws like to dwell. It's eerie out there — being in the middle of nowhere, especially at night. These feelings are what spawned 'The Dead of Night.' I couldn't be prouder of this film and every single individual that believed and helped bring this vision to life."

In the film, which stars Lance Henriksen, Matthew Lawrence, Colby Crain and Jake Etheridge, violent, masked drifters dressed as wolves arrive in a small rural town, a local young couple goes missing and their bodies are discovered near a ranch run by brother and sister Tommy (Jake Etheridge) and June (Colby Crain). Her ex-boyfriend and local Deputy Sheriff Luke Walker (Matthew Lawrence), starts suspecting Tommy of murder, leaving the siblings ostracized and disenchanted with the community.

The next day, Tommy catches the killers committing another murder nearby and moves in closer to investigate, but he is spotted by one of

the drifters and chased across the ranch, running for his life. Isolated, the siblings find themselves being hunted and terrorized by the nomadic kill-

ers, setting the scene for a startling twist and a gruesome outcome that will change the town forever.

Las Cruces actor Jack Lutz plays one of the wolf-

clad killers. One of his recent Facebook posts sums up his experience.

"When I got offered the role of The Coyote Killer, I was in a very weird place in life, mentally that is," Lutz wrote. "Heartbroken, bitter, worried about the health of certain loved ones and grieving the loss of someone close. I needed an outlet, and this was it. I put all my anger, all my bitterness, all my frustration and all of my fear into this very evil person, and when filming was done, I left him in the mountains of Capitan. What I didn't expect was to have the greatest time of my life. I didn't expect to form friendships and create memories with such amazing people, but it happened and I'm glad

it happened, because not only do I treasure these memories, but I treasure these people and friendships as well. Thank you to director Robert Dean for letting me put the mask on, and I can't wait for this little film to pick up momentum. To the entire crew for 'The Dead of Night,' thank you for giving me one of the best experiences of my life. Each and every one of you now has a friend for life, as well."

Dean not only wrote and directed "The Dead of Night," he also served as the movie's production manager.

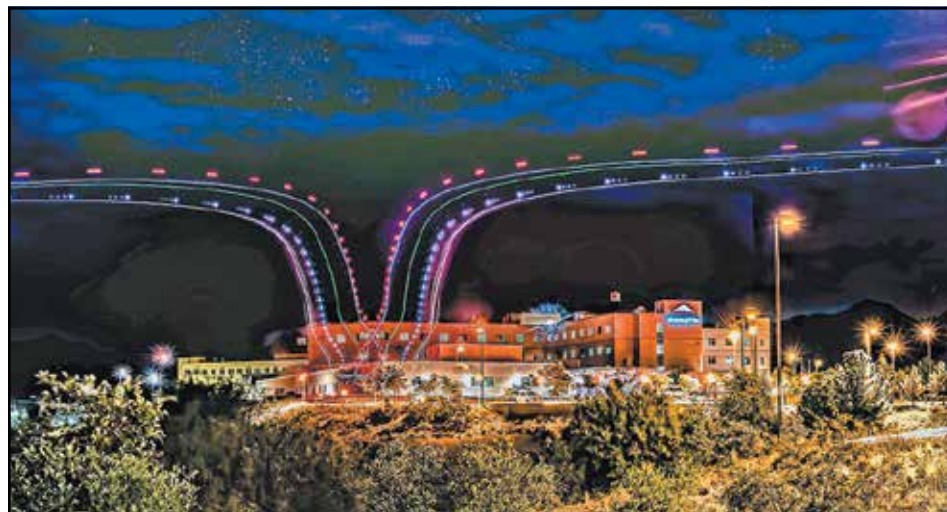
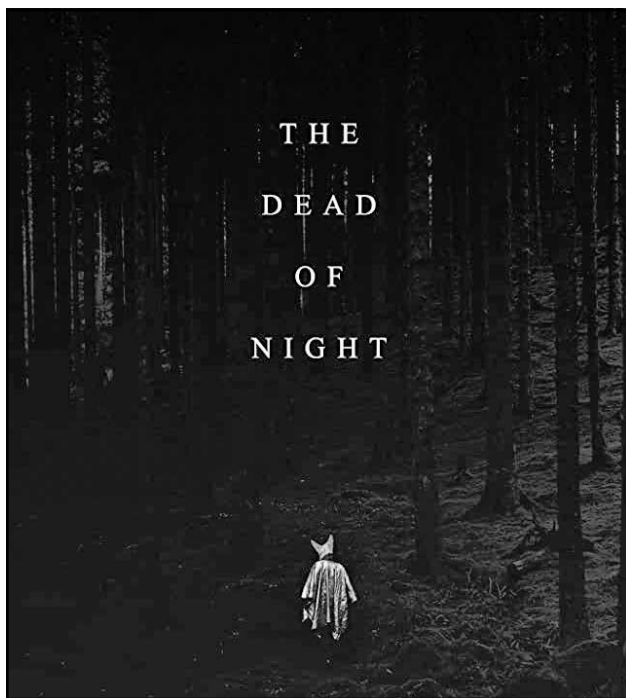

## Las Cruces artist teaching workshops at home studio

At her Black Bird Studio on Watson Lane in Mesilla Park, artist Noël Sandino is teaching various types of printmaking, including collagraph, monotype and relief-edition printing.

Some students use the studio's two-foot by four-foot etching press, but Sandino also teaches workshops that exclude the press.

Sandino participated

in an annual free event called Print Day in May a couple of months ago, and invited a few people to her studio for the first time "to check things out and experiment with printmaking," she said. "We all had fun sharing that day."

"I've only lived here in New Mexico for the past three years," Sandino said. "Prior to that, I was teaching in my home state of California. I've been showing my prints for many years and have sold many in local galleries.

I always seem to come back to teaching, though. I really love sharing the experience and seeing what others come up with as they try out new ideas using a medium that may not be familiar to them. There are so many possibilities with printing that even can translate into painting styles."

Sandino is available by appointment any day of the week for preliminary inquiries, she said. Her fee varies for each type of class she teaches.

"Typically, a private class would run \$100 per session, which would in-

clude supplies," Sandino said, "but small group classes are generally fun for those who want to bring a friend or two." Her studio will accommodate four people.

"My goal is to expand the love of printmaking in Las Cruces and to eventually begin collaborative project ideas and student studio shows," she said. "I am happy to teach anyone from 8-80-plus years old. I also plan on having an open studio day once a month where people can come use the press without formal instruction and pay a small usage fee."

## Former city councilor recognizes leaders, offers leadership skills in new book

Self-published earlier this year, the book includes Eakman's personal experiences with strong and effective leaders in his own life and details the leadership skills and styles of some of Las Cruces' and New Mexico's most prominent leaders, including The Bridge of Southern New Mexico President and CEO Tracey Bryan, banker and author Joe Bullock, businessman and Burrell College of Osteopathic Medicine President John Hummer, Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce President and CEO Debbi Moore, Doña Ana County



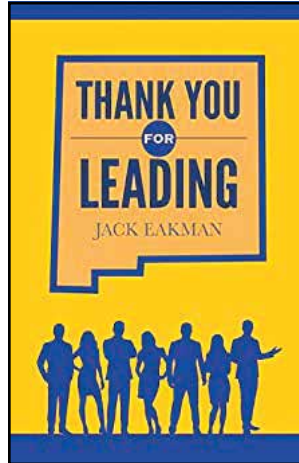

What do all 12 of the leaders Eakman included in his book have in common? Their "uncommon commonalities," he said, include "a deep sense of purpose and mission," core beliefs, courage, communication skills, ethical standards and magnetism.

Here is what Eakman says about Debbi Moore: "Debbie measures her success through the lens of watching people grow in their responsibilities and in their personal



sphere of influence in the world. The accomplishments of those she has mentored, she acknowledges, is the most important scoreboard anyone could have."

Here is what he says about Sheriff Kim Stewart: "Up until now, the only Doña Ana County sheriff that became legendary was Pat Garrett. I predict that is about to change."

And about John Hummer: "He is supremely optimistic about the future that his mission will improve. If he were a corpo-

rate stock, I would borrow money to buy!"

Growing up in rural Pennsylvania, Eakman and his two brothers began learning about leadership at a very early age.

Their father was a kosher butcher five days a week and a pastor on Sundays. Their mother taught piano lessons, with their father driving her to students' homes every Saturday and writing his sermon for the next day while waiting in the car.

"My mother and father became leaders right before my eyes," Eakman said, "transforming themselves from the effects of backbreaking laborers into spiritual beacons."

Eakman himself was a hospital administrator, business improvement consultant and Las Cruces city councilor (2015-19). He has a bachelor's degree in business administration and a master's degree in public administration.

Eakman's book both

chronicles the leadership skills of others and guides the reader in recognizing and developing his or her own leadership skills. There is a chapter on self-development and another containing "assembly instructions" that invites the reader to inventory his or her strongest areas of talent.

Eakman identifies 17 "talent areas that directly relate to the ability to lead with excellence." With that inventory, you can follow Eakman's leadership development plan "to bring you and yours more satisfaction, more challenge, more opportunities

and more rewards."

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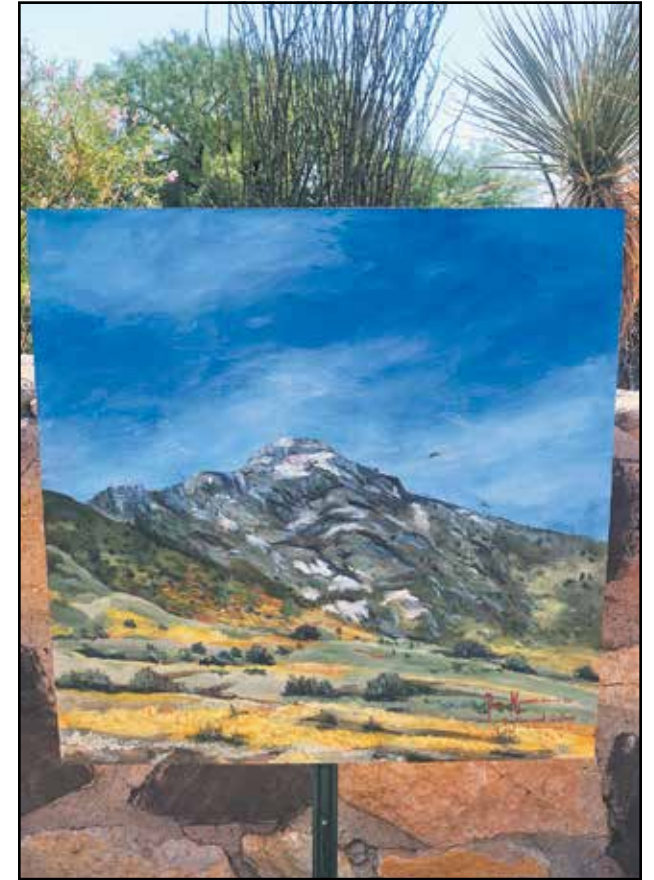

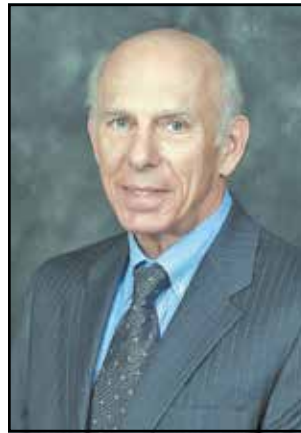

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# A beautiful community rooted in unity

“We must learn to live together as brothers or perish together as fools.” – The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Across the country, we’re seeing what began as a righteous protest to an inexcusable death transform into a movement that’s destroying livelihoods and claiming lives. Stories of violence and division rule the nightly news these days, and it’s heart-breaking to watch as innocents, especially children, suffer.

But it doesn’t have to be this way. The answers these communities seek come not from division, but from unity – in relationships, purpose and action.

I’ve seen unity transform a long-underinvested community in San Diego. And I’ve seen unity’s power in our own.

The Diamond Neighborhoods of San Diego had suffered decades of disinvestment. Carved up by freeways, the Diamond was home to 20 different cultural groups

that spoke 12 different languages and suffered a history of blight and a reputation for violence.

But those who lived there could agree on one thing -- they wanted a different story for their community and its children.

A foundation that was supporting a great after-school science program in the Diamond wanted to find a better way to do philanthropy, one that created lasting change. The leader of that science program encouraged them to start their work by focusing on the Diamond.

Change began with conversation. First, asking people what they wanted their community to be like, what they wanted for their children, what services or businesses were needed there. Then, people were asked if they were willing to be active participants in creating

what they envisioned.

Translating dreams into reality takes work and more conversation. At first, much of the discourse focused on distrust and grievances. Distrust of their neighbors from different cultures, ethnicities and backgrounds. Grievances about the history of the community. And, disbelief that anything would ever be different.

But as these neighbors met, each was invited to share the food, music, traditions and even art that defined their cultures. They found out they had much in common. Breaking down that which had divided them, they found common ground on which they could build something special together.

They transformed a blighted piece of property in the middle of the community into The Village at Market Creek: a gathering space, a retail center meeting the needs of the community, a place

for cultural performances and a revitalized natural space. They developed businesses and created jobs. The foundation worked alongside them as peers and partners, but with the community always in the lead.

Ultimately, they also created the mechanism for owning what they created. It changed everything in philanthropy, community ownership of change, community engagement and community building – and it changed what the residents of the Diamond believed was possible.

What emerged was so much more than the start. It was a new identity for that community. Built on deep, trusting relationships, shared goals and united action, it became a place that served the needs of the community while also attracting others from all over the area, the state, the country and the world.

Today, this kind of united effort is called

“collective impact.”

That same spirit of unity exists here in so many organizations that unite diverse people toward shared actions: The Bridge of Southern New Mexico, the Workforce Talent Collaborative, Ngage, Resilience Leaders Task Force and now the Las Cruces Reopens effort led by the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce.

In each of these efforts, we see needs and work together to address them. The success of each rides on relationships built on trust and a commitment to the people of our community. We are already

seeing success, because we bring our respective resources to the table to create the change our community wants. We have made great gains, and without question there's more work to be done.

As long as we continue to see each other as brothers, sisters and neighbors and work together, we'll all get where we're trying to go.

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# Rapid money growth raises fears of inflation

The correlation between money growth and subsequent inflation has as long a pedigree as any relationship in the social sciences. There are elements of the idea in Aristotle, and the concept was well understood by the time of Henry VIII. Milton Friedman famously quipped, "Inflation is everywhere and always a monetary phenomenon."

This is why recent developments in money supply are raising eyebrows among economists. M2, the most commonly used measure of money, has

increased 19 percent since Feb. 24, the fastest six-week pace of growth in 40 years. Many are asking, does this mean inflation is coming?

The reason for the money growth is straightforward. To combat the reduction in total demand from the pandemic lockdown, The Fed is pumping billions of dollars into the economy. The hope is that resulting record-low interest rates will convince consumers to buy and businesses to invest. As the (COVID-19) lockdown relaxes, the collective hope is for a quick

recovery.

The Fed's strategy may be working. The June relaxation in the lockdown was accompanied by record high employment growth. The Fed's actions, especially support of financial markets and increasing the money supply, facilitated this recovery.

This is good news, and most think The Fed's actions supporting the economy are justified. But what about after the pandemic? Are we in for a bout of post-COVID inflation?

Perhaps, but probably not. For 200 years, the United States enjoyed stable prices. Then came

the 1970s and the bout of inflation associated with the Vietnam War. To quell inflation, The Fed raised interest rates dramatically, reaching 22 percent in December 1980. That quieted inflation but also caused a sharp recession.

Forty years later, people have forgotten the inflationary '70s. Most were not even alive then. People have come to take low inflation for granted. Expecting little inflation, workers are willing to accept modest pay increases, so costs raise slowly. At the same time, businesses can't raise prices for fear their competitors will underprice them. Thus, low-inflation expectations lead to low inflation, which leads to low-inflation expectations, and so on.

This virtuous cycle

coupled with the current 11 percent unemployment rate gives The Fed a great deal of running room. It can increase money growth, yet, at least in the short run, inflation remains steady. For right now, there is little inflationary pressure.

Post-COVID, when unemployment returns to normal and people begin to spend again, will inflation accelerate? As it turns out, The Fed has a trick up its sleeve that wasn't available during prior inflationary episodes. Prior to 2007, The Fed paid zero-interest bank reserves. This provided banks with an incentive to lend out any excess over the legal 10 percent reserve requirement and keep loans at the maximum allowed.

Any increase in the monetary base increased lending by banks, hence, spending by consumers and businesses.

Now that The Fed has started to pay interest on bank reserves, it has an additional powerful tool for controlling bank lending. By paying more on reserves, The Fed incentivizes banks to lend less and hold excess reserves. By throttling back on bank lending, The Fed can cool inflation by slowing consumer and business spending.

## Las Cruces rabbi: pray, reach out, stay positive during COVID-19

Abraham Lincoln is quoted saying that in life, “We can complain because rose bushes have thorns or rejoice because thorn bushes have roses.”

The Bible repeatedly reminds us that the best and most successful approach in any unnerving situation is to remain positive, with a solid trust in God that all will be well, while taking all the necessary steps within our ability to protect ourselves and each other.

True, the bush we are currently dealing with seems to have a disproportionate amount of thorns, but we must constantly

remind ourselves and our loved ones that God — the Gardener in Chief — is with us every moment, and we therefore know that all will be well.

With the Jewish Holiday of Passover right at the start of the pandemic, we were able to get more than 300 meals and loads more Passover necessities picked up or delivered to Jewish residents throughout Las Cruces and southern New Mexico.

With Shabbat (Sabbath) Observance an integral part of Judaism, on Fridays we deliver 25-30 Shabbat Pick-Me-Up packages to the doors of friends, neighbors and community members within the Jewish Faith.

These bags include the traditional foods of Challah bread, chicken matzah ball soup and chocolate Babka cake, as well as a candle-lighting kit with which Jewish women and families usher in the Shabbat each Friday evening. Of course, all this

is done with utmost care to social distancing and hygiene.

Chabad has opened a Corona fund ([www.chabadlc.org/coronafund](http://www.chabadlc.org/coronafund)) to help the entire community with basic needs and groceries, even rent and a car payment. One can also donate to help cover the cost of personal protective gear that we have been distributing free of charge to the larger Las Cruces community.

In April, Chabad hosted a drive-thru giveaway of packages containing masks, toilet paper and hand sanitizer. All 300 packages were given out, plus many hundreds more masks and toilet paper were given out free of charge to whomever needed them, no questions asked. We are hoping to do more giveaways in the coming weeks.

Although one might think that the job of rabbi is purely to help with spiritual matters, at

Most important is reach out and touch someone: Make a point of contacting two people each day to see how they’re doing. Being a good neighbor and looking out for each others’ well-being extends itself to our entire com-

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## As innovators and players, blacks have set trends, Part 2

During the first half of the 20th century, there weren't many black Americans playing golf, let alone many who owned golf courses. The first was the duo of George Adams and Helen Webb Harris, who founded two important golf clubs in Washington, D.C.: the Royal Golf Club and Wake-Robin Golf Club, respectively.

These two public courses led the fight to desegregate D.C.'s public golf courses, which succeeded in 1941. Adams was among the co-founders of the United Golf Association, started as the alternative to the then-segregated PGA.

The other groundbreaking (literally) pioneers were father and daughter Bill Powell and Renee Powell. Businessman Bill Powell was the first black American to build, own and operate a golf course in the United States: Clearview Golf Club in East Canton, Ohio, which opened in 1948.

Renee Powell was the second black woman to gain LPGA membership; the first was former tennis pioneer and great Althea Gibson. The Powells were awarded the Jack Nicklaus Golf Family Award by the National Foundation in 1992. Both are in the PGA of America Hall of Fame.

Ann Gregory was a frequent United Golf Association tournament champion. In 1956, she became the first black American woman to play in a USGA championship at the U.S. Women's Amateur. Despite her success, she faced blatant discrimination throughout her career. In 1959, after the U. S. Women's Amateur, the Congressional Country Club in Washington, D.C. refused to allow Gregory in its clubhouse for the players' dinner. Gregory was runner-up in the 1971 USGA Senior Women's Amateur, and one year before her death, she won the 1989 U.S. National Senior Olympics golf tournament by 44 strokes.

George Franklin Grant, a dentist, was the first black American faculty member at Harvard University. He is also the inventor of the modern golf tee, patented Dec. 12, 1899.

One of the most interesting black American golfers of the past is Jim Thorpe, who was born in Roxboro, North Carolina, the ninth of 12 children of a golf course superintendent. He attended Morgan State University before turning pro in 1972. Golfing insiders call him "Thorpey." He often wore a Tam O'Shanter golf cap, reminiscence of Ben

Hogan, Payne Stewart and, nowadays, Bryson DeChambeau.

In June column on [www.golf.com](http://www.golf.com), longtime golf writer Michael Bamberger started with the this, "If Jim Thorpe isn't the most popular man in golf, he's in the conversation." But not according to the feds, who charged him with failure to pay \$1.6 million in taxes from 2002 and 2004. On Jan. 22, 2010, Thorpe was sentenced to a year in prison for tax evasion.

Thorpe won three times on the PGA Tour: the 1985 Greater Milwaukee Open and the 1985 and 1986 Seiko-Tucson Match Play Championship. At age 50, he moved to the Senior PGA Tour, now called the PGA Tour Champions. During the next seven years, Thorpe won 13 tournaments.

The very first black American man to ever design and build a golf course was Joseph Bartholomew. He was a kid caddie in Louisiana, but he learned about golf course architecture in

New York. His first construction project was for the Metairie Golf Club in New Orleans. But he was barred from playing there because of segregation.

Bartholomew designed and built several other courses across Louisiana and was the first black American inducted into the Greater New Orleans Sports Hall of Fame. A

book worth reading is "Uneven Lies: The Heroic Story of African Americans in Golf" by Pete McDaniel.

This just in: The PGA has just renamed the Horton Smith Award the "PGA Professional Development Award."

Smith was a two-time Masters Champion (1934 and 1936) and PGA presi-

dent 1952-54. Too bad that he was a staunch defender of the "caucasians only" clause which remained in PGA bylaws until 1961.
