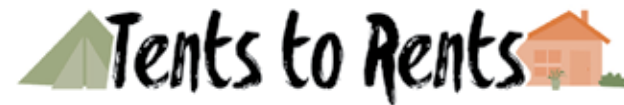

Community of Hope Tents to Rents fundraiser kicks off Aug. 14 online

BULLETIN REPORT

Socially distanced graduation parades and livestreamed weddings are becoming normal, as humans find new ways to connect during COVID-19, and while we are unlikely to see many bake sales or car washes this summer, the fundraising committee of Mesilla Valley Community of Hope (MVCH) is working to shift its large



est fundraising event of the season, Tents to Rents, entirely online.

At MVCH, many programs rely heavily on outside support to run smoothly. In the past, churches, schools, artists, politicians and many local individuals and businesses have joined

together to raise funds for MVCH's Camp Hope tent city to help residents who are struggling with homelessness to move into their own apartments.

The 2020 Tents to Rents fundraising campaign for Camp Hope will begin Friday, Aug. 14, and continue through Wednesday, Sept.

30.

"This is our biggest fundraiser of the year, and we want to be aware and take precautions for the vulnerable communities, but still engage those community leaders and individuals who look forward to participating in our campaign each year," said MVCH Board Chair Carrie Hamblen, who also serves as the chair of the MVCH Fundraising and

Development Committee.

Sierra Middle School Student Council raised \$2,450 for the 2019 campaign, and residents of the Good Samaritan Society, a Las Cruces retirement village, raised \$24,472 for Tents to Rents in 2019.

For 2020, things will look different. With Camp Hope closed to visitors, the pizza party which kicked off last year's event – during which participants visited with camp residents and heard their stories – has been cancelled, as has the closing thank-you reception at Salud! de Mesilla.

This year's Tents to Rents participants will rely heavily on email, Facebook, Instagram and other social-media platforms to spread the stories

of hope and humanity, and hopefully raise the funds to provide not only shelter, but some semblance of comfort as those suffering from homelessness work toward more permanent homes.

MVCH Executive Director Nicole Martinez came up with the idea for Tents to Rents in 2016. That year, with 10 participants and four sponsors, it raised more than \$13,000. In 2017, fundraising reached more than \$28,000. In 2018, more than \$53,000 was raised. In 2019, 16 participants and 14 sponsors raised almost \$52,000

Clarifier Rehabilitation Critical to City Infrastructure

After 37 years of diligently churning through what Las Cruces has to offer it, one of the two primary clarifiers at the Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) Jacob Hands Wastewater Treatment Facility (JHWWTF) is being rehabilitated. The JHWWTF processes 3.3 billion gallons of wastewater per year and the clarifier is a critical piece of infrastructure that supports the city's quality of life.

"Most of its moving parts are constantly underwater, and even with the best upkeep and maintenance, corrosion happens," said John Mrozek, deputy director Wastewater. "Plus, finding parts gets harder from year to year. It's at the end of its useful life."

The clarifier's

job: remove solid particles or suspended solids in wastewater. Sewage flows into the clarifier and is processed by the clarifier's rake arms. What falls to the bottom is sludge and the particles that float to the surface of the water is called scum. Scum includes grease, oils, leaves, and plastics.

The East Primary Clarifier, the one being rehabbed,

is encased in a structurally-sound, round building. However, the huge 40-foot rake arms, attached to a center gear box, are missing bits of steel. This was discovered by recently draining the clarifier and doing a dry analysis inside the tank that holds 670,000 gallons.

The \$1.8 million proposed project has passed the first review and will be heading back

to LCU engineers to integrate comments. It will then be presented to the LCU Board of Commissioners for approval.

"The clarifier is an integral part of how we clean and treat our water," said Mrozek. "Even though we have two, it's much better to upgrade when we have a second clarifier instead of fixing a broken system without a functioning backup."

LCU can be reached at 575-528-3500 from 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. LCU provides services to approximately 100,000 Las Cruces residents and businesses.

What's in a name? Sometimes it's hard to tell

People all over the country are re-evaluating the merits, or lack thereof, of the names of different buildings, parks, military bases, schools, sports teams and just about anything that has a name.

It got me to thinking about names, and how they are used, or not used, in society.

Take for instance, Caliche's Frozen Custard.

The bright neon hotspots for cool treats in Las Cruces and Alamogordo are popular, especially during the summer, and the hot dogs are great, too.

So why do half the people in town call it Scoopy's?

Well, that used to be its name. Turns out there was another Scoopy's elsewhere, so they changed the name to Caliche's, a sort of Spanish reference to the term "concretes" used in other regions to describe frozen custard.

Just as many will always call

Caliche's Scoopy's, many will always call D.H. Lescombes Winery & Bistro, St. Clair, the name it had for years at its location on Avenida de Mesilla.

Our editor, Jess Williams, often adds his middle initial, C., which makes it Jess C. Williams, which makes me think "Jessie," but also puts me in mind of Fred

C. Dobbs, the Humphrey Bogart character in the classic black-and-white movie "Treasure of Sierra Madre."

Another news editor who worked at the Bulletin for several years, also used his middle initial, Todd G. Dickson, which sometimes put me in mind of Maynard G. Krebs, the pre-Gilligan Bob Denver character from the old black-and-white TV Show "The Many Loves of Dobie Gillis."

Another local journalist, S. Derrickson Moore, since retired, initialized her first name in her

byline, and another New Mexico journalist, T.S. Last, with the Albuquerque Journal, just went with all initials. The first shall be Last, or something like that.

You may or may not know Telshor Boulevard is named for two Las Cruces developers, Pardner Tellyer and Bob Short, who created the first Las Cruces housing east of their self-named boulevard, which was a dirt road at that time, in the early 1970s.

I learned this from another former Bulletin colleague, Sid Graft, who described Tellyer as a character. I said, with a name like Pardner, he must have been a character. Sid said Pardner may have been his given, legal name, as he never went by anything else. "If that's the case," Sid reasoned, "his parents must have been characters, too."

And Sid, who you might have guessed is a man, is actually quite the lady, and she's had issues with name confusion her whole life. When she turned 18, she received a draft card dur-

ing the Vietnam War. And later, when she left her hometown of Levittown, New York, to go to college at the distant outpost of New Mexico Highlands in Las Vegas, New Mexico, she found herself the first day of freshman year in a classroom surrounded by young men. Very large men. And Sid, well, she's never seen five feet tall without the benefit of high-heeled shoes.

"Young lady, I believe you're in the wrong place," said the instructor who, as it turned out, was the head of the athletic department. And her classmates were the freshman football team.

"Well, it says this classroom," Sid said, looking down at her schedule, which also included her name.

"Let me see that," the instructor said.

"Oh, I see the problem," he said. "This is actually a problem I'm quite familiar with."

Sid later learned the instructor's first name: Marion.

City residents deserve answers on probe

When I moved to Las Cruces in 2002, The Whole Enchilada Fiesta was the one annual event that was listed in all the national tour guides. When founder Roberto Estrada decided to retire the giant ladle in 2015 at the age of 78, it left a void.

In 2013, the city held its first Country Music Festival, a three-day event featuring both local and national artists held on the streets downtown. It was before construction of Plaza de Las Cruces, at a time when the city was still struggling to breathe life into the downtown area.

The festival was an im-

mediate success, drawing country music fans from throughout the region. After a few years, it grew too big for downtown and had to be moved to the Hadley Complex.

Then, in February of last year, the event was cancelled by the city, with a nonsensical explanation as to why. Country music festivals had become too popular, explained Rochelle Miller Hernandez of Visit Las Cruces. It reminded me of the old Yogi Berra line: "Nobody goes there anymore. It's too crowded."

The more likely reason for the cancellation was

the investigation into the music festival that had been launched months earlier. In 2019, the city hired McHard Accounting and Consulting of Albuquerque to look into the finances of both the Country Music Festival and the nonprofit group, Friends of Visit Las Cruces, that was formed to help with sponsorships and fundraising for the festival.

Philip San Filippo, the city's former economic development director, and Jennifer Bales, former director of Visit Las Cruces, were both placed on administrative leave, and are no longer with the city.

The only two people who have had anything to say about the situation

since then have been San Filippo and Marci Dickerson, whose local nonprofit group Revolution 120 was also included in the investigation.

San Filippo wrote a guest column published after he had been removed from his job in which he denied doing anything improper and said it wasn't his idea to form a nonprofit group to handle the finances.

Dickerson issued a statement saying that she had never been contacted about the situation and called the investigation a personal attack. She and other prominent business leaders involved in Revolution 120 attended the next city council meeting

and warned city leaders that the probe would hamper their ability to raise funds for local causes.

The only other scrap of information we have is that Visit Las Cruces employees worked the festival without claiming those hours as overtime, but that wouldn't merit a year-long investigation.

When funding for the investigation was approved, City Attorney Jennifer Vega Brown said it would take at least 90 days to complete. It took almost a year. McHard filed its report earlier this month, but we don't get to see it.

The report has been turned over to the State Auditor's Office, which

has denied a public-records request for its release, explaining that there is still an ongoing investigation.

While that is a valid reason for denial, it can't stand for long. There have been too many allegations and innuendos swirling for too long, involving not only our most popular annual event, but also some of our most prominent and influential residents.

The people of Las Cruces need to know the facts. The innocent need to have their names cleared. The problems need to be addressed. And it needs to happen soon.

Survey says: Small business, agriculture, film are New Mexico's most favorable industries

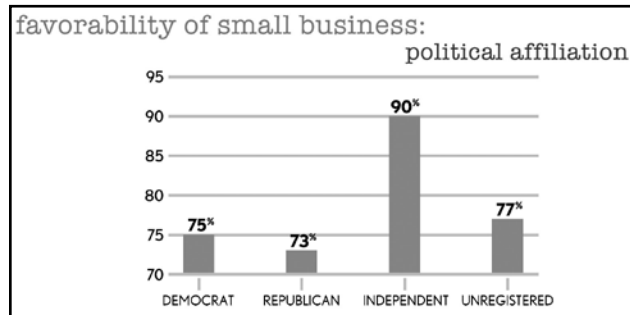
Small business, farming and ranching, the film industry and community colleges are at one end, and the medical system, public schools, national banks, the mining industry and the courts are at the other in a 2020 survey of the industries most and least favored by New Mexicans.

Those results are part of this year's Garrity Perception Survey, conducted by Research and Polling Inc. for the Garrity Group Public Relations. Both companies are based in Albuquerque.

Garrity has commissioned the survey annually since 2011 to measure "who residents trust, which industries are favorable and how residents access news and information," according to www.garritypr.com. The results are based on phone interviews of 408 randomly selected adults. The survey has a margin of error of plus or minus 4.9 percent.

Here are some of the survey's main findings:

- Overall, small businesses are viewed the most positively by New Mexicans, with 79 percent having a favorable opinion (receiving a rating of a four or five on a five-point scale), followed by the farming

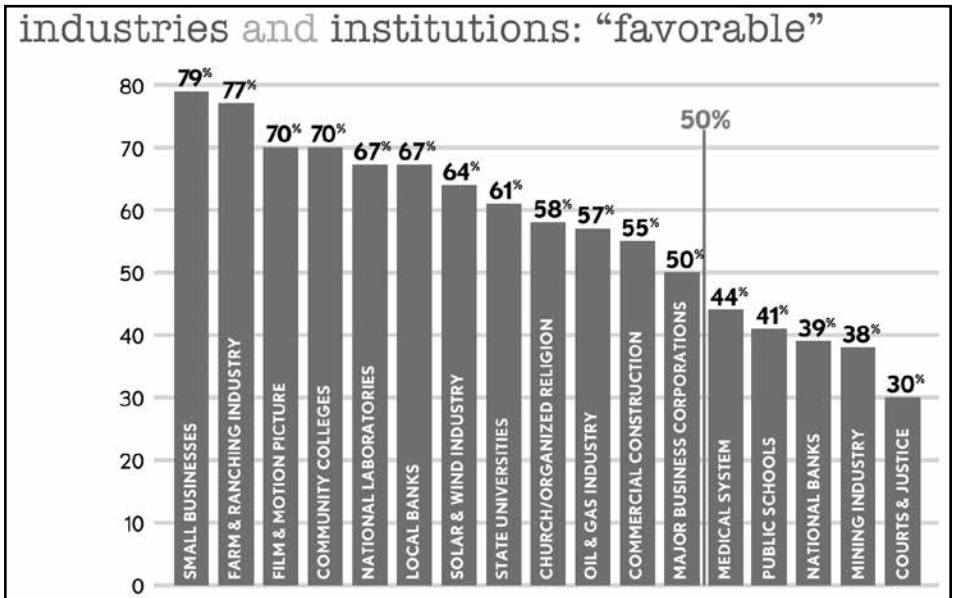


and ranching industry at 77 percent. 70 percent have a favorable opinion of the film industry. 70 percent have a favorable opinion of the state's community colleges, while 61 percent rate state universities favorably and 41 percent have a favorable opinion of the state's public schools.

- The solar and wind industry tends to be viewed more favorably than other energy or extractive industries. However, public opinion of both the oil and gas industry and the mining industry has improved over the past three years. 64 percent

of those surveyed have a positive opinion of the solar and wind industry, while 57 percent (up from 41 percent in 2017) have a favorable opinion of the oil and gas industry and 38 percent have a favorable opinion of the mining industry. 55 percent have a favorable opinion of the commercial construction industry and 50 percent have a favorable opinion of major business corporations. 44 percent say they have a favorable opinion of the medical system, but 29 percent said they have an unfavorable opinion of it.

- 30 percent have a favor-

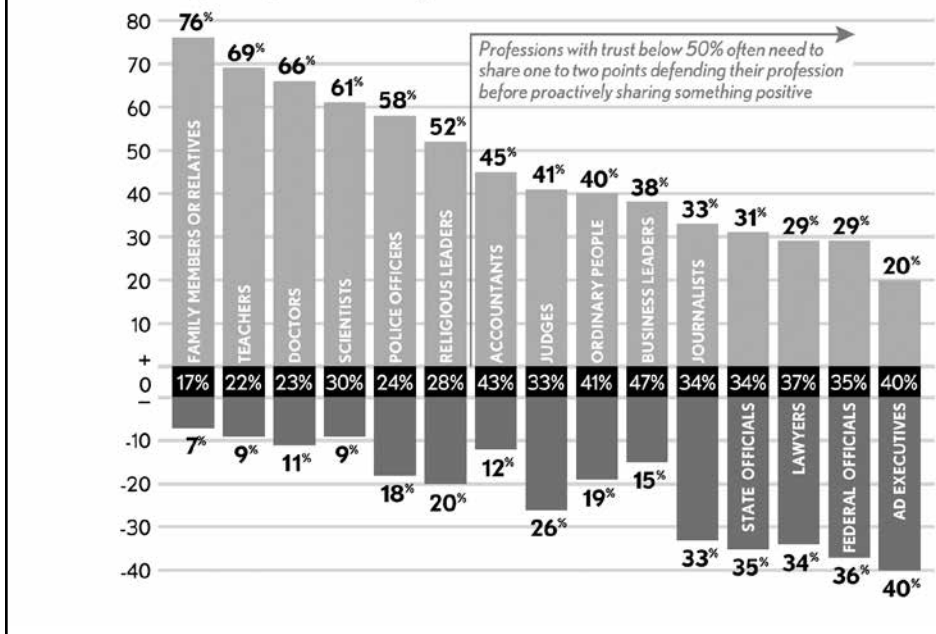
as being trustworthy, which Garrity said is a decline from 62 percent in 2017.

- Less than half of those surveyed view accountants (45 percent), judges (41 percent), the ordinary man or woman (40 percent), and business owners/executives (38 percent) as trustworthy.
- One in three views journalists as being trustworthy, while 33 percent distrust journalists and another 30 percent have mixed feelings. Residents living in New Mexico for more than 20 years have a higher level of trust (35 percent) for reporters than do residents

who have been here for fewer than eight years (20 percent). More women (41 percent) than men (25 percent) trust journalists. Democrats (40 percent) and independent voters (30 percent) trust journalists more than Republicans (28 percent).

- Of those surveyed, 29 percent trust federal government officials (an increase from 14 percent in 2013), while 36 percent distrust federal officials. 31 percent trust state government officials (an increase from 15 percent in 2014), while 35 percent distrust state officials. More Republicans (56 percent) distrust state government officials than Democrats (24 percent).
- 72 percent say they get

trust of people and professions

ethnicity, Hispanics access television as a news source 56 percent of the time, compared to anglos, 44 percent. Survey respondents

access radio either “a lot” or “somewhat,” both at 24 percent, for news and information. Hispanics (30 percent) are more likely to get news and information from radio “a lot” than anglos (17 percent). Print or online newspapers are accessed by 48 percent of residents as a news source. Based on income, 53 percent of residents earning less than \$20,000 annually and 51 percent of those earning in excess of \$80,000 access newspapers on a regular basis. 58 percent say they rely on Internet news sites either “a lot” (33 percent) or “somewhat” (25 percent).

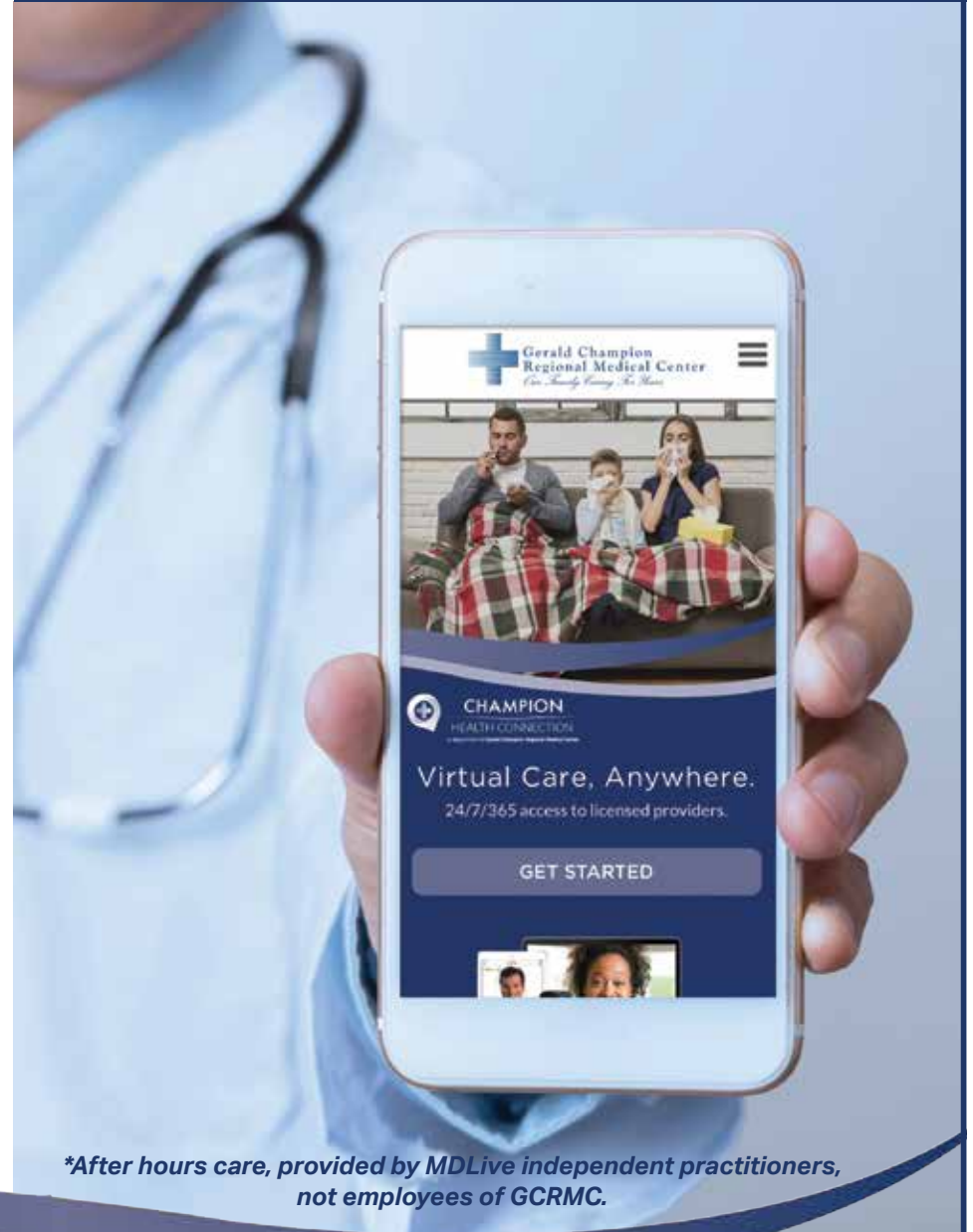

Got Shots? Immunization clinics to run July 25 – Aug. 15

Providers offer special hours to get children immunized in time for school

In New Mexico, all children enrolled in school

from kindergarten to grade 12 must have current vaccinations, said Shawna Bailey, coordinator of Health Services for Las Cruces Public Schools. Despite COVID-19 restrictions, children are required to be up to date on immunizations for school.

The New Mexico Department of Health

(NMDH) — in partnership with the New Mexico Immunization Coalition (NMIC), the New Mexico Primary Care Association (NMPCA) and healthcare providers from across the state — is helping coordinate immunization clinics July 25 through Aug. 15 for all children 18 and younger. The clinics are part of the Got Shots? immunization campaign.

“We are very lucky our generations don’t have to deal with the mass cases of polio, measles, diphtheria and [whooping cough]

that previous generations did,” Bailey said. “New Mexico is one of the top states for having immunizations up to date.”

“COVID-19 is a great example of why we need vaccines,” said NMDH Cabinet Secretary Kathy Kunkel in a news release. “While we don’t have a COVID vaccine yet, we are able to protect families and children against many diseases with safe, effective immunizations. I encourage all New Mexico parents to take advantage of the clinics.”

Participating providers will offer immunizations to any child, regardless of whether they are a patient or have insurance as part of Got Shots? Some providers hold clinics on weekends or during evening hours to accommodate parents’ schedules. Parents should call ahead to check if an appointment is needed.

Due to COVID-19, special procedures will be in place, such as waiting in the car until summoned. Parents must bring their child’s shot records and

Medicaid or private health insurance card, even though immunizations are provided at no cost to parents.

Gutierrez-Spencer looks back on long career

During her 24 years as director of Chicano Programs at New Mexico State University, Laura Gutierrez-Spencer worked to change perceptions and perspectives.

It was important for Gutierrez-Spencer, who retired June 30, to recognize students' linguistic and cultural differences and to encourage others to do the same.

"Stop assuming everyone came from a middle-class background," she said. Gutierrez-Spencer said it's important to

recognize that not all students being served are products of the same culture and may find its structure and rules confusing and off-putting.

For example, Gutierrez-Spencer said she and her staff made a point of not using the word "help" in their work with students.

"I defy you to find that word on our website," she said. "That was like kryptonite" to students who came from working-

class backgrounds that stressed self-reliance.

"That's a strong value," Gutierrez-Spencer said.

Instead, Gutierrez-Spencer said she and her staff offered guidance to underrepresented students so they could grasp how NMSU is organized and navigate the many services and programs it offers in a way that recognized their vulnerability and preserved their dignity.

That included connecting some students with the tutors they needed while being conscious of their concern that if you need a tutor, "maybe somebody is going to

look at you like, 'I'm not smart,'" she said.

A student who grew up in the anglo culture knows "office hours" means the time when an instructor is available to meet with students. But to a freshman from a different culture, it might mean, "Don't bother me during these hours because I'm busy with office work."

In Gutierrez-Spencer, students found someone who could explain that "office hours" meant "student hours."

Many of those served by her office came from poor families and were first-generation college

students paying their own way to attend NMSU, Gutierrez-Spencer said. Others struggled with sexuality or identity issues. All wanted to feel a sense of belonging.

Shepherding them through the system required a different approach and a skill set that allowed Gutierrez-Spencer "to see things from their perspective."

Often, the key was language, she said, taking the time and having the sensitivity to understand how a student thinks and how he or she interacts with reality and makes sense of the world.

Closing the gap in the graduation rate for Hispanic students often meant giving them more attention during their first two years at NMSU. By year three, the gap began to disappear, she said.

Gutierrez-Spencer speaks five languages. She is a native of Las Cruces and grew up in Silver City. She attended

Agnes Scott College in Decatur, Georgia, for two years before earning her bachelor's degree from the University of Colorado, Boulder, a master's degree from NMSU and a Ph.D. (in Latin American Literature) from the University of New Mexico.

After seven years on the faculty of the University of Nevada, Las Vegas, Gutierrez-Spencer returned to Las Cruces to lead Chicano Programs in 1996.

At Chicano Programs, she was especially proud of *Generaciones*, a mother-daughter program for fifth-grade girls and their mothers, and her work with the Danny Villanueva scholarship program. But listening to and working with students – "That's what I enjoyed the most," she said.

In retirement, Laura Gutierrez-Spencer now has time to work on her new project. She is the screenwriter and executive producer for a movie called "Magic Love Dust."

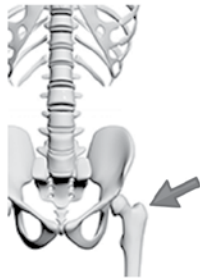
WHAT IS BURSITIS

We frequently have people come in for treatment for bursitis, but very few actually know what a bursitis is. A bursae is a fluid filled sac (think of them as tiny cushions), that sit underneath tendons and on top of bones to keep the two from rubbing together. Tendons anchor muscles to the bone. They are very strong and are under a lot of stress. Therefore, a bursae is necessary to ensure the tendon doesn't always rub on the bone.

I'm sure you have all seen the films where the hero is dangling on an old rope desperately trying to climb to the top of the cliff, while the rope gradually frays off the edge of the cliff. This is what would happen to the tendon if the bursae were not there to reduce this friction. As the tendon continually rubs against the bursae during repetitive activities it can become swollen, and this causes pain and discomfort.

The most common type of bursitis that we see is trochanteric bursitis. This involves the bursae that sits on the outside of the hip. If you put your hands near the top of your pockets, and then slide your hands to the outside of the hip, you will feel a large bony area that sticks out slightly. This is known as the greater trochanter of the hip - it is where several tendons attach. Sitting just underneath these tendons is the trochanteric bursae.

We often see the onset of this bursitis when people become more active and start doing activities that they haven't been doing. Going from doing nothing to running or cycling for hours, not adequately stretching, warming up or cooling down can lead to increased demand on muscles and excess pressure on the bursae.



Signs of a bursitis can be:

- A sharp or aching pain in the outside of your hip.
- Pain referring down the outside of your thigh.
- Pain when lying on your side, directly on the greater trochanter.
- Pain that is worse at night or aggravated when going from sitting to standing.

Although it can be hard to avoid bursitis, there are precautions that can be taken to help limit the chance of developing it:

There are a few large and very powerful hip muscle tendons that pass over the trochanter. If any of these muscles becomes tight, more pressure will be placed on the bursae.

Hip stretches - particularly of the gluteal muscles and iliotibial band - can help to release this pressure.

Limit repetitive hip bending and extending activities if you start to feel discomfort.

Icing the area can help to reduce the amount of swelling and reduce pain in the bursae.

It is important to have a full assessment of your pain in this area to be sure that it is bursitis. There are various structures around this area and they need to be ruled out to identify the culprit so that it can be more effectively treated. Your Physical Therapist can fully assess to determine the exact nature of the injury and whether other structures may be involved which need attention.

Fitch takes the bench as ninth district judge

The caseload for judges in New Mexico's Third Judicial District — traditionally one of the state's busiest court districts — will ease up a bit when a new judge comes on board to fill a new position approved by the state legislature.

Last week, Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham appointed four New Mexicans to fill new judicial positions created by the legislature:

- Casey Bruce Fitch

to the Third Judicial District Court serving Doña Ana County

- Kathleen McGarry Ellenwood to the First Judicial District Court serving Santa Fe, Rio Arriba and Los Alamos counties
- Lucy Boyadjian Solomon and Clara Marissa Moran to the Second Judicial District Court serving Bernalillo County

Fitch left private practice in 2017 to join the U.S. District Court for the District of New Mexico as a

career law clerk. He is an Albuquerque native and a 2003 law graduate of Seattle University. He moved back to New Mexico in 2010 after stints in Michigan and Washington state.

Fitch will join the team of Chief Judges Manuel I. Arrieta and Judge Marci E. Beyer, Conrad F. Perea, Mary W. Rosner, Lisa C. Schultz, James T. Martin, Douglas D. Driggers and Grace B. Duran.

The Third Judicial District Court encompasses all of Doña Ana County and deals with cases involving adult and juvenile

criminal activity, divorces, custody and child support, water rights and civil lawsuits, among others. The courthouse is located at 201 W. Picacho Ave., in the building that originally housed Las Cruces High School.

The governor signed legislation in March creating five new state District Court judgeships in the four judicial districts with the highest need. She has yet to fill the fifth new judgeship, serving the 12th Judicial District, made up of Lincoln and Otero counties.

Mayors team up to seek indoor dining return

Las Cruces Mayor Ken Miyagishima has teamed up with Carlsbad Mayor Dale Janway to write Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham about reopening restaurants.

Their letter points out that patio dining in 100-degree heat is impractical, and most restaurants are practicing enhanced sanitation, table distancing and other precautions against the spread of COVID-19.

Lujan Grisham's latest public-health order was issued July 9 and went into effect July 13. It prohibits indoor dining.

Miyagishima and Janway argue in their letter that closures will permanently close many establishments, causing many to lose investments and/or become unemployed.

"We're writing to strongly urge you to consider reversing last week's amended health order restricting restaurants to outdoor seating and delivery only," the letter states. "A high percentage of our local restaurants have passed their breaking point and will likely permanently close if they are not allowed to open back up soon."

The letter promises compliance with safety measures.

"We have not seen evidence of a connection between the new cases and our restaurants having been allowed to open at a limited capacity for the past few weeks," it reads. "What we have seen are people following the instructions you've given them by wearing masks into the building and remaining isolated with their families... Let's work together to combat COVID-19, but [let's] strive to do so in a way that does not cause irreparable injury to some of our state's most economically at-risk citizens."

Subsequent to the mayors' letter, a district judge ruled indoor dining could resume for 10 days beginning July 20, but the decision was almost immediately reversed by the New Mexico Supreme Court.

School will start remotely, Oñate High School to be renamed

Following a presentation of the 2020 Return Plan to the Las Cruces Public Schools (LCPS) Board of Education on Tuesday, July 14, and more than three hours of discussion with the board, LCPS Superintendent Dr. Karen Trujillo said remote learning will begin Aug. 12 — the original day classroom instruction was scheduled to begin.

"Our staff worked diligently on the hybrid plan as directed by the New Mexico Public Education Department," Trujillo said. "However, as coronavirus numbers increase in our community, we realize that we cannot safely put our students and staff in buildings as early as Aug. 12."

Under the remote plan, students will engage with their teachers in a virtual setting for the foreseeable future. There will be additional accommodations made for special education and English learners. LCPS administration will reach out to engage students to ensure social/emotional learning needs are met.

On a separate issue, the school board also voted to rename Oñate High School. While a community survey — including

Oñate students, staff and parents — voted 1,350 for to 4,129 against changing the name of the school, the majority of the school board voted in favor of the change.

A new name was not chosen, but in a call for name suggestions (also part of the survey), Organ Mountains High School was an overwhelming top choice. Other suggestions made by students and community members during the earlier survey include Organ, Bataan,

Obama, Ocotillo, East Mesa, O'Keefe, Viramontes, Dan Sosa Jr. and Knights High School.

School member Ray Jaramillo, the only no vote on the board regarding the name change, said he does think the name should be changed, but considering the pandemic, the cost of around \$200,000 to change the name and the results of the survey, "left me no option."

The cost of changing the name includes the need for new uniforms, ban-

City council approves solid waste rate increase

To cover a \$1.34 million shortfall in the City of Las Cruces solid-waste utility's ability to maintain its level of service, the Las Cruces City Council unanimously voted to increase the fee for monthly residential solid-waste service by \$2, to \$15.25 for a 96-gallon container.

The new rate should take effect in about a month, city officials said at the July 20 council meeting.

The current monthly cost of \$13.25 can be maintained by residential customers if they opt for a smaller, 64-gallon container, the city said. The city also has a utility-assistance fund to help residents who cannot afford to pay their utility bills. Visit www.las-cruces.org/1961/Utilities-Billing-and-Receiveables.

"This is something we have to do," said Councilor Gill Sorg, a long-time member of the Las Cruces Utilities Board (LCU board).

The solid waste short-

fall includes nearly \$650,000 to purchase new vehicles, according to city documents.

The city's Utility Customer Advisory Group (UCAG) conducted 12 community conversations about the proposed rate increase beginning in September 2019, with a total of 41 people attending, according to city documents. Last Dec. 11, UCAG voted to recommend the rate increase, which was approved that same month by the LCU board.

The resolution also

includes a "wide range of commercial solid waste rate changes." Commercial increases include an increase of 20 cents per month from \$27.80 to \$28 for a 96-gallon container and an increase from \$55.60 to \$60 per month for two 96-gallon containers. There will also be increases for commercial cubic-yard containers and compactors.

The solid-waste utility's operating cost was \$14.4 million in FY2018, according to city documents.

In other actions at the July 20 meeting, the coun-

cil voted unanimously to name the city's production studio the Udell F. Vigil Production Studio, to honor Vigil, who retired earlier this year as the city's communications director. Vigil joined the city as public information officer in January 2001.

The council voted 5-2 to table until Aug. 17 a proposed resolution that would update fees and charges for services provided by the city's Community Development Department (CDD). The council will hold an

Aug. 11 work session on the proposed resolution, which would create a new fee schedule that "establishes a standardized approach to assessing building fees and charges that encourages usage/participation, enables a reasonable degree of cost recovery and reduces the burden on the general fund for construction-related regulation," according to city documents.

If approved, the new fee schedule would allow CDD to address a budget deficit of almost \$1.2 million.

NMSU students take part in COVID-monitoring trial

Selected students returning to New Mexico State University (NMSU) this fall will participate in a trial program designed to monitor them for symptoms of COVID-19.

Electronic Caregiver of Las Cruces (ECG) is partnering with a faculty research team for the project, which will outfit each participating student with the company's Premier telehealth system, a touchless temperature probe and a pulse oximeter. Premier is programmed to monitor COVID-19 symptoms and features a small electronic device known as the Premier Portable Safety system, which connects directly to ECG's health-

monitoring center and health-care providers.

After completing the daily self-reporting process on Premier, participants will receive a prompt of action based on their responses, giving them clearance to proceed

with regular daily activities or alerting them to seek medical attention.

For example, if a participant reports one or fewer symptoms, an oxygen-saturation level of 92 percent or higher and a normal temperature around 98.6

degrees, the system will inform the individual that they may proceed with either work or school.

But if a participant reports two or more symptoms, an oxygen-saturation level of less than 92 percent and an abnormal temperature above 98.6 degrees, the system will inform the individual of potential concern and send an alert to the researchers overseeing the project. A student research assistant will then ask the person in question to seek further medical guidance and assessment with their primary care physician or the Aggie Health and Wellness Center.

While the NMSU pilot project is targeted to students, the company said similar monitoring

programs can be implemented at "any business, school, facility or event."

ECG Chief Technology Officer Dr. David Keeley said the program is "a highly cost-effective method for organizations to add additional layers of protection for employees, customers and administration."

"We can repeat this investigation repeatedly with each group that has interest," Keeley said. "Organizations that wish to participate can call ECG's main number (833-324-5433) to speak with ECG's business-development team about details."

Private individuals can also apply for monitoring services, Keeley said.

"We have other available solutions at a variety of price points that

should allow individuals and organizations of any and all sizes to select the most effective solution while staying within their desired price point range," he said.

He said activation fees are being waived for the time being, and the monitoring system normally costs \$49.99 a month with a six-month minimum agreement. For an extra \$10 a month, the Pocket MD is included. Thermometers can be purchased for \$125 each, although users can opt to use their own thermometers. And for a one-time fee of \$55, clients can purchase a pulse-oxygen sensor that ties into the monitoring system. All clients receive daily reminders and a daily survey.

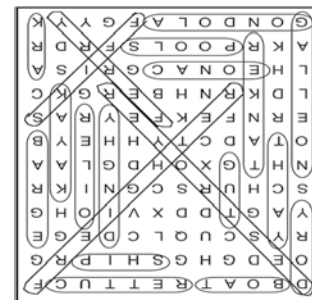

CAREing in Las Cruces and southern NM

As springtime hit in 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic also swept across the globe. All of a sudden, restaurants closed and schools stood empty. Farmers lost their markets, and fresh food rotted in the fields.

Then the government stepped in. One of the things provided by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act was to pay farmers for their products.

“The CARES Act did a lot of good things,” said Associate Pastor Thomas Bulger at Heart for the World Church in Las Cruces. “One of the things was, they said, ‘we will buy these products from these dairy farms and farmers so they can at least get some money for their crops, and then they established a new distribution chain, and the congressional appropriation pays for it.’”

Heart for the World has stepped to the plate and taken on the role as

a distribution point for some of the food. In fact, every Tuesday, semi-truck loads of produce boxes roll into the church parking lot on Valley Drive. The boxes are picked up by non-profit and church organizations from across southwest New Mexico for free distribution in area communities – Las Cruces, High Rolls, Cloudcroft, Deming, Lordsburg, Alamogordo, Silver City and others.

Bulger said they can order up to 4,800 boxes for the people of the area. Then on Wednesday, the

church and other organizations distribute the food to anyone who can use 25 pounds of the seasonal produce.

“It’s a beautiful box of produce,” Bulger said. “Lettuce, oranges, onions, celery stalks, strawberries, lemons.”

The food is distributed through El Paso, and the system works on a simple text-message basis. Organizations interested in picking up and dispersing the produce can call the church at 575-523-1113 and will be put on a text-message system where they can ask for one or more boxes. Then, when the trucks leave El Paso, they get a text, and all they have to do is meet the trucks in the church parking lot to get loaded up and ready to go.

On any given distribution day, volunteers show up to do the loading and unloading work. This also happens on a simple text system, so anyone interested in helping can also call the church number

and get a code for text messages.

Bulger said distribution was originally set to take place at Casa de Peregrinos, but there was little room in the parking lot for trucks to maneuver, much less for agencies to pick up their boxes, so Heart for the World volunteered its parking lot and services as the distribution location.

With the CARES Act still in Phase II with Phase III already appropriated, the distribution will continue through at least October. On Wednesdays, between 10 a.m. and noon, the church hands out its own boxes to its parishioners. But, Bulger said, no one is turned away.

“We want to help you with some provisions, anybody and everybody,” he said. “We don’t ask for anything. If you drive up, you will get a box of food. We also have a food pantry where people can come and get staples. Part of what we do here is pray and ask how people are doing.”

Those who drive up may encounter Senior Pastor Dale Walker as well as other clergy helping with the distribution. Often, he prays with the people who drive through.

“You start doing a few things, and then opportunities grow,” Walker said. “When you give a little bit, you start momentum. You create a cycle, and before you know it, you are a river not a reservoir, and you are able to do things that you didn’t think you could ever do.”

NMSU film students create documentaries of hope, resilience, mirth during COVID-19

Ilana Lapid's film students were halfway through the spring semester when the worldwide pandemic hit, and the New Mexico State University campus transitioned to online instruction.

Students in Lapid's Border Documentary Film Production and the Social Impact of Film classes were left wondering what to do next. Three students had filmed enough material to complete their border-themed documentaries. The rest were forced to abandon those projects and come up with something new.

"Across the board, my students rose to the occasion and impressed

me with their creativity, flexibility and resourcefulness, in spite of the many challenges they were dealing with," said Lapid, associate profes-

sor of NMSU's Creative Media Institute (CMI). "Virtually from one day to the next, their lives had radically changed. Many were forced to move back home with their families. They had to adjust to the reality of online classes. Some had lost their jobs and sources of income. They had to pivot mid-semester and begin a new film project, which they would have half the time to complete, without access to CMI's equipment," Lapid said.

Out of the chaos emerged six short documentaries that speak to the heart of family, community and human

resilience in the time of COVID-19. Lapid was so impressed with the students' films that she approached KRWG-TV to air them on Las Cruces' public television earlier this month.

"They made incredible films," Lapid said. "They threw themselves into their projects and their final films are by turn thoughtful, moving, funny and poignant. Across the board, all the films are socially relevant."

Christina Zuni focused her film, "Protecting Native Nations," on the impact of COVID-19 on Native American communities.

"Although I am a hands-on filmmaker, I was able to put my producing skills to the test and put out a call sheet for submissions via Facebook, Instagram and Twitter," Zuni said. "Within a two-month timeframe, I had gotten submissions from over 15 people from three different tribes in New Mexico and South Dakota."

Gabe Balderas' documentary, "How to Keep Dad Safe," hits close to home and is personal.

"My dad is currently on peritoneal dialysis. He has been for a year now, as we await the go-ahead for a transplant," Balderas

said. "Mostly people don't know that or the fact that I plan to donate one of my kidneys to him. That was a matter I always wanted to keep private. However, I have no idea how much time my loved ones have left in this world, or even me for that matter, so I decided to make this film. I owe that man my life, and the least I can do is make a film about him."

Araceli Hernandez and Dominic Vincent's short documentary idea began with immigration, took a few turns and ended with "Success!" – sort of.

"The first half of the

semester was focused on capturing stories from the Mexican-American border," Vincent said. "While working on that project, I learned a lot about the lives of immigrants and how unique every single story truly is. The doc was about two women who spent 14 months helping Central American immigrants begin their lives in the U.S., and it was life-changing."

The team had to set the immigration documentary aside temporarily and begin another project. When that too failed, their third try was something completely different.

"After our attempts to find good news stories within our community

failed, we decided we would make a documentary about making a documentary," said Hernandez. "We kind of just went with it and tried to make light of our failed attempts."

"Success!" is really a documentary about failure and how to learn from it, and then taking

something that didn't turn out so well and making it better," Vincent said.

Hernandez agreed. "We would just like for people to laugh with us and be able to laugh at their own setbacks, too. I guess we just felt that the world needed a little more optimism considering everything that's going on.



We just wanted to create something lighthearted and fun."

Michael Stewart's docu-

mentary, "Cosplay Lockdown," centers on the art of cosplay, the practice of dressing up as a character

from a movie, book or video game.

"My film is about wanting to cosplay during the COVID-19 pandemic lockdown," Stewart said. "I express how, for some people, cosplaying is a way to express oneself and bring out their creative side. I hope people can see that there are cosplayers in New Mexico, and not just cosplayers, but black cosplayers, as well. I want to show that there are cosplayers still creating their visions even during the lock-

downs."

Lily Valerio's film, "The Girl in A302," turns the camera on her roommate as the NMSU senior negotiates her final days toward graduation amid the pandemic.

"What I wanted to explore in my film was the way that people were adapting their daily life routines to the quarantine, and I knew that Yamilex, my roommate,

would be a good subject for it," Valerio said. "She is very opinionated and has no problem expressing her thoughts and feelings. Besides, she has an amazing personality that I knew would transmit through the camera."

Joshua Trinidad's film, "Alone Together," is about his experience practicing social distancing with his family.

"I wanted my film to evoke a sense of positivity in a world full of pessimism and negativity, to inspire others to look

around their own lives and find fulfillment," Trinidad said. "My family was always a constant driving force to achieve the best. This documentary is a tribute to them. With every project I get involved in, I always put my heart into it with the idea that I can make a change in the world. Even if the world doesn't change, you keep going and keep creating. That is something Ilana taught us very well — to be resilient."

As the global pandemic continues to evolve, Lapid said CMI remains com-

mitted to training students to become skilled visual storytellers, working across media platforms. CMI faculty will continue to keep NMSU students safe while providing them with opportunities to make films. She added the department will create new protocols in keeping with government health organizations and university policies — perhaps smaller crews filming in open spaces where students can maintain social distancing.

"I'm very proud of everyone on the CMI faculty who worked extremely

hard to innovate their teaching methodologies while still holding true to learning objectives," said CMI Department Head Amy Lanasa. "The work from Ilana's classes is a great representation of how our faculty and students rose to the challenge. But we're also built for this kind of thing. Filmmaking is, by nature, an exercise in creative problem solving. Ilana helped her students navigate this new terrain with such empathy and enthusiasm, which resulted in this beautiful, often vulnerable work, created in

a non-traditional manner, during a very weird time in the world. I'm so grateful to see that such things can still exist," Lanasa said.

NMSU’s CMI animation/visual effects program among top 25 in U.S.

The “Animation Career Review” ranks New Mexico State University’s animation and visual effects program 22nd among the country’s public-animation schools and colleges for 2020.

The NMSU Creative Media Institute program also ranks sixth among the top 10 animation schools in the Southwest.

“First and foremost, the CMI animation and visual effects faculty are the heart of that program, and the primary reason we received those rankings,” said CMI Department Head Amy Lanasa. “They work tirelessly, teaching our amazing

students the artistic, technical and storytelling components of putting together animated films, which is no easy feat.”

CMI’s animation curriculum highlighted by the review include focus on the art and craft and business of storytelling, as well as such as 2D animation, 3D animation, character design and development, digital illustration, drawing for animation, modeling, rigging for 3D animation, screenwriting, sets and environment, 2D and 3D production studio, visual effects and writing for animation.

Other program highlights include internships and study-abroad opportunities, access to

a state-of-the-art digital projection screening room, post-production lab, animation lab and production space and free entry into the Las Cruces International Film Festival.

“Our faculty have built a robust curriculum that prepares students not only for jobs in our indus-

try, but that also transfer to other non-entertainment venues, making our alumni very employable in today’s workplace,” Lanasa said. “Our students are decathletes when they graduate. They can do anything. We are all grateful to see their work recognized in this manner,


and we’re hopeful that we’ll be able to grow this program in the future.”

NMSU’s animation and visual effects program was one of 192 colleges considered for the rankings.

“Animation Career Review” has been publishing regional and national

rankings since 2012, with an end goal to provide students and their parents with access to information about various programs.

Federal training funds okayed for local film and digital industry

In a new partnership between Film Las Cruces (FLC), the film and digital media industries and the Southwestern Area Workforce Development Board (SWAWDB) (part of the New Mexico Department of Workforce Solutions [NMDWS]), significant U.S. Department of Labor funding under the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act will now be available to train and equip people in Doña Ana County and southwest New Mexico to support the film and digital media industries, as well as to promote economic development in New Mexico.

This opportunity is made possible through the local workforce board's June 30 decision to designate occupations within film and digital media as in-demand.

The designation was based on the significant growth in these sectors statewide (and has become a targeted priority for the state), as well as local efforts by FLC and others to expand local film and digital media jobs and economic development.

New Mexico State University and Doña Ana Community College are eligible training providers for New Mexico. The DACC Art Department, which offers multiple degrees and certificates in film and digital media, has

filed paperwork to include its training courses on the eligible training provider list, including film-crew training, digital film, game development, digital graphics technology and commercial photography.

If a worker or student qualifies for the program, he or she can sign up at the local New Mexico Workforce Connection office. Training funds can cover tuition, equipment, books, technology and travel assistance. It is intended to train workers and help provide the tools they need.

A prime example is the DACC Film Crew Training Program (FTTP), which takes place at FLC Studios. FLC Studios has hosted recent film productions,

including "The Mule," "Walking with Herb" and "Death in Texas," and offers multiple film sets for training and production.

FLC has been working toward this partnership for the last year, having extensive meetings with regional staff and with NMDWS Sec. William J. "Bill" McCamley.

"We look forward to supporting economic development through sector partnership strategy activities," said SADB Chair Joshua Orozco. "By working with industry stakeholders, both the educational training providers and workforce partners will help design training programs that meet the needs of businesses by

developing a skilled and ready workforce."

"Growing the film and digital media industries in Las Cruces and Doña Ana County remain an exciting target for us," said state Sen. Jeff Steinborn, D-Doña Ana, chair of the nonprofit FLC board. "They will play an important role in growing a creative economy to help retain some our best and brightest and create good jobs and local economic development."

"Creative Media Technology brings together various dynamic technologies, including digital media, web design, multimedia, photography, animation and digital film," said DACC Arts Department

Chair and FLC board Vice President Matt Byrnes.

"There may not be a better time to get state-of-the-art training in film & digital media technologies."

"I like the outdoors and I like old things," Yost said. "I like to paint old buildings, especially old adobe churches, bottles, cars and other things I find outdoors. I'm a scientist, and I guess I bring that to my work. Getting detail and exactness is important to me."

Yost has exhibited in

numerous juried shows, including NMWS, Arts for the Parks, the Southwest Federation of Watercolor Societies, Masterworks of New Mexico and the International Art Show in El Paso.

Las Cruces community radio celebrates third anniversary

Robert McCorkle has spent two and a half years on the board for local community radio station, KTAL-LP at 101.5 FM. He also can be heard on the air as one of the Cosmic Troubadours with Marty Racine. The two have completed more than 140 live shows from the studio.

This year, the little local station is celebrating its third year and struggling to stay afloat like so many other businesses in the time of COVID-19. July 26 marks the third anniversary of KTAL (aka Radio Que Tal) going on the air throughout the Mesilla

Valley. In 2019, a musical Roadrunner Revue brought community members together for a grand fundraiser.

“To get enough funding to run the station, we count on memberships,” McCorkle said. “Last year, the Roadrunner Revue was exceptionally good entertainment. We had a great silent auction, the

ticket sales were good, so we got to do a fundraiser the old-fashioned way.”

Due to the impact of COVID-19, KTAL’s board of directors has canceled the Second Annual Road-

runner Revue benefit event, which had been scheduled for later this year at the Rio Grande Theatre.

Instead, Las Cruces community radio will hold a third anniversary fundraiser online during live shows from Aug. 1 through Aug. 8 to raise funds necessary to keep the all-volunteer, non-profit radio station on the air.

Listeners are invited to provide what support they can during the fundraiser by visiting the KTAL website (www.lccommunityradio.org) and hitting the “donate” button, and while there, make a comment on what they think of current programming and suggest how KTAL can better serve the community.

McCorkle said the variety of programming and community service the station provides is important to Las Cruces. It provides an informative alternative to the people of the community, he said.

“We feel like we give a voice to some of the voiceless in Las Cruces,” he said. “We are an outlet for artists and musicians, an alternative to traditional commercial radio. We do everything from public-affairs shows to spiritual, environmental and science, as well as a variety of music, including progressive rock from the 60s to today’s jazz to blues.”

In service to the community, the station has also broadcast live local high school graduation ceremonies and weekly coronavirus updates and has several shows devoted to sharing information about businesses and activities in the area.

In addition to donations, the station also relies on grants to pay for licensing fees, tower rental and the usual things needed to run an office space/studio.

“We appreciate the help of the community,” McCorkle said.

Station General Manager Bruce A. Ernst

oversees the day-to-day running of the facility. He and two others, Linda Hall and Nan Rubin, are responsible for selecting the programs.

“For the most part, the station runs itself,” Ernst said. “I’m really happy to be part of this. I think it’s a great thing for the community.”

But KTAL runs solely on volunteer power, he said. The show hosts and board members all put in their time to help keep the station going. Several of the board members also host shows and serve on the Program Advisory Council. In total, there are about 45 volunteers who put their hearts into the station.

“I have always enjoyed radio since I was a kid,” Ernst said. “I would listen to everything from music to news. And we are trying to bring more local news and cover more in depth. We already have interviews lined up for the electoral races coming up.”

This is UAM's third in its Mama Create-Ups online series. It focuses on the Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA) with Dr. Dulcinea Lara, an associate professor in the New Mexico State University Criminal Justice Department and director of the Borderlands & Ethnic Studies Program.

In this part-lecture, part-discussion and collaborative project, Lara will give a basic overview of FMLA and its formation and evolution, as well

Lara's current book project details the story of teachers Nadine and Patsy Cordova and their reasonable-radical commitment to a social justice-centered education in Vaughn, N.M., in the late 1990s.

Mobile pressure-washing business aims to keep things clean

Your trash bins are filthy, and a new veteran-owned Las Cruces business aims to change that. New Mexico Under Pressure (NMUP) comes directly to customers' homes to — among other things — make those bins shine like new and smell pretty.

Owned and managed by Keith Kalson, NMUP employs pressure washers and industrial deodorizers to bring new life to residential and commer-

cial trash and recycling containers. And garbage containers are only the tip of the trashberg.

“My mission is to help people stay healthier by cleaning the things that often go overlooked,” Kalson said. “I enjoy helping others keep their homes beautiful, and to help store fronts and other businesses put their best foot forward.”

While most businesses are adapting to the COVID-19 pandemic, Kalson opened NMUP this month as a direct result of the pandemic.

“I wanted to help people stay healthy after reading about how dirty trash cans really are,” he

said. “There are 411 million bacteria per square inch in a trash bin, such as Salmonella, Listeria, and E. Coli, among viruses, bugs, maggots and mold.”

In addition to cleaning trash bins, NMUP also offers the following pressure-washing services: homes (top to bottom), driveways, sidewalks, awnings, patios, decks, swimming-pool areas, drive throughs, dumpster pads, parking lots, grease/oil spills, masonry, solar panels, windows, signs, tile/grout,

grease traps, graffiti, boats/aircraft/vehicles and all types of walls and fences.

“We also offer wood staining and sealing for wooden fences,” Kalson said.

Kalson said he offers discounts to clients who sign up for monthly or quarterly services, as well as to first responders, veterans, seniors, disabled persons and teachers.

Economics: Those who refuse to mask are just wrong

A fundamental assumption underlying libertarianism is each person's sovereignty over their own physical bodies. This idea is the foundation of the right to private property, which is ownership over the product of one's physical body.

Personal sovereignty also provides the fundamental logic to the adage, “Your right to swing your fist ends at the tip of my nose,” or to rephrase in a way more relevant to the time of COVID, “Your right to spew virus ends at my nasal cavity.”

For Libertarians and Libertarian fellow travelers, like me, these are always the hardest questions. Where does the right to swing end and the nose begin? It's a hard question.

For those who simplistically state that it is their American right not to wear a mask, they are wrong, because the right they claim conflicts with others' right to go into public without being coated in virus-laden spittle. Among the fundamental functions of government, according to Libertarians, is the adjudication of conflicting

rights. For government to decide that the balance falls on requiring masks in public is not in conflict with basic American liberties. For government to decide the opposite also is not conflict. Balancing competing rights is a basic element of politics. One idea would be to abandon a pure Libertarian approach to bring in utilitarian considerations. Utilitarianism is the school of thought that argues for the application of cost-benefit analysis in determining the best policy to pursue.

In the case of masks, the Utilitarian would compare the cost or harm

imposed on the wearer to the benefit accruing to others. For example, one economic study found that mandatory mask laws reduced transmission rates by 10 percent, which would have reduced cumulative deaths in the United States by 40 percent through the end of May, about 40,000 lives.

The EPA uses \$7.4 million as the value of a statistical life, meaning saving one life on average is expected to add \$7.4 million in economic output. If wearing masks saves 40,000 lives, that translates into an expected savings of \$296 billion.

A disposable face mask

costs about 40 cents, so giving every American one mask a day for 90 days costs about \$12 billion. The net monetary benefit from wearing masks is about \$284 billion, or \$811 per person for the three months ending May 31.

Of course, the above calculation does not take human suffering into account. The suffering of the millions who have contracted COVID, as well as the suffering of their loved ones, must be weighed against the discomfort felt by reluctant mask wearers. I think it's obvious where the balance falls.

That is not to say that

reluctant mask wearers don't have a point. They are being asked to sacrifice their comfort and incur what they perceive to be an indignity for the benefit of others. This when the science, while becoming more certain, is still evolving.

Here Libertarian ideals can come to the rescue. The solution is to compensate mask wearers for giving up their property right, which is the joy of going maskless. Exactly how this would be done isn't completely clear, maybe with a tax write-off.

A simpler and more

effective payment might well be to say thank you to those around you wearing masks, in acknowledgment of their considerate

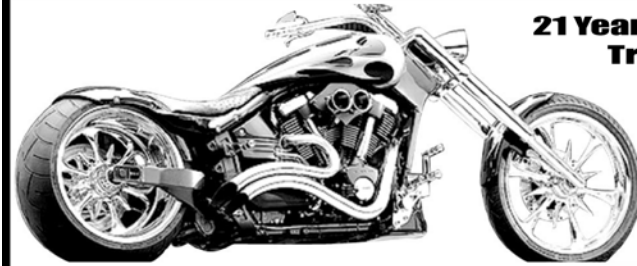

Businesses offered virtual lifeline

New Mexico State University's Arrowhead Center will offer two free business accelerators designed to help Las Cruces businesses affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Las Cruces BizSprint will run two eight-week sessions for 30 local companies in the late summer and fall, focusing on best practices in business management and e-commerce training.

"We are together working to help our small

businesses adapt and find new opportunities," said Griselda Martinez, City of Las Cruces Economic Development director. "Our local businesses are the core of our economy and the source of jobs for our community members. When they grow stronger, it helps us all. We are committed to continue to find ways to assist and support."

New Mexico businesses and industries have been devastated by mandatory closure of non-essential businesses, stay-at-home orders that

severely curtailed business patronage and foot traffic and consumers forced to spend less due to reduced income.

"We've seen a shift in the needs of businesses that come to Arrowhead Center to pivot their business model because of the pandemic," said Kathryn Hansen, director of Arrowhead Center. "Our programs are flexible in that they shift to build on the needs of each cohort for different sprints."

Each cohort will support 15 businesses, and each session will last eight weeks. BizSprint will offer participants intensive, cohort-based experiences that guide entrepreneurs through business creation, pivots and growth, with an emphasis on customer discovery, market insight and e-commerce. There will also be time dedicated to teaching the basics of economics, building an online pres-

ence and cash management.

Participants will gain access to high-quality curriculum, exposure to resources, connections within the NMSU system, different opportunities, one-on-one assistance and mentorship from Arrowhead staff members and the organization's large network of Enterprise Advisors — experts in industry sectors and/or business development areas necessary for successful entrepreneurship.

"We designed the Las Cruces BizSprint program to assist local businesses affected by COVID-19," said Dana Catron, director of strategic operations at Arrowhead Center. "This programming will help participants maintain solvency at present and build capacity for resilience in future times of economic uncertainty."

Because BizSprint is delivered virtually, the program is positioned to help businesses immediately, even while social distancing is still mandated.

A Moment in Time: Albert Fountain and the Nutt Grassland

The 1860s were perilous times, with both the Civil War and the Apaches making it difficult to settle the Nutt-Lake Valley in present-day Sierra County, north of Las Cruces.

As a result, the first ranching and mining activity in the southern Black Range occurred in the mid- to late-1870s with the founding of Hillsboro in 1877 and Lake Valley in 1878.

The mining industry attracted thousands who must have quickly decimated the deer, elk and antelope populations.

This created a large demand for beef. The McEvers Ranch and Lloyd's Ranch, both attacked by Victorio's Apache in 1879, must have been some of the earliest ranches in the area.

With the growth of Lake Valley, a stage line (1878) and a railroad (1881-82), crossed the Nutt Grasslands and connected Lake Valley to Nutt and the rest of the world.

Demand for beef and the establishment of ranches quickly led to large-scale cattle rustling. In 1883, Major Albert Fountain and the Mesilla Independent Cavalry or Mesilla Scouts,

as they were known, were authorized by the governor of New Mexico territory to pursue and capture members of a large gang operating in southern New Mexico.

With some gang members already in the Mesilla jail, Fountain received word from mine owners in the Lake Valley area that a number of the wanted men were staying at Irwin's Ranch. Loading 45 men and

horses in box cars, the Mesilla Scouts arrived at Nutt Station in the wee hours of the morning, where they unloaded their horses and rode across the grasslands to Lake Valley.

Arriving at Irwin's ranch at 2:30 a.m., they surrounded the house and, after firing through the windows, effected the capture of six men. Continuing toward Hillsboro, the party made a stop for breakfast. Three of the men slipped their bonds and made a run for it. All of them were immediately shot down. Fountain's tactics, although lawful, were considered by some to be high-handed. The ill will that

Fountain earned during this incident set the stage for Hillsboro to be the preferred change of venue for the trial of Oliver Lee and Jim Gilliland when they were tried for the murder of Fountain's son in 1899.

Las Cruces author details Fountain murders based on Pinkerton investigation

The disappearance of Judge Albert J. Fountain and his eight-year-old son, Henry, on Feb. 1, 1896, is one of the great and enduring mysteries of the Southwest.

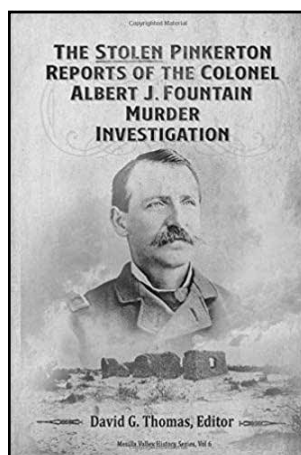
"The evidence indicated that although Fountain was killed during the ambush, his son was taken alive, and only killed the next day," Las Cruces author David G. Thomas said in his new book, "The Stolen Pinkerton Reports

of the Colonel Albert J. Fountain Murder Investigation." Thomas is listed as editor of the book.

"The case file for the crime contains no information," Thomas said. "There are no trial transcripts (Oliver Lee and Jim Gilliland were tried for and found not guilty of Henry's murder) or witness testimonies. The only

reports that exist today of the investigation of the case are these Pinkerton reports, which were com-

missioned by the territorial governor and then stolen from his office four months after the murders. The reports, now recovered, are published here."

The Pinkerton report is based on the investigation conducted by the agency's most competent operatives, John Conklin Fraser and William C. Sayers, Thomas said. His book, published earlier this year, is based on a copy of the Pinkerton report that is part of the Katherine D. Stoes Papers in New Mexico State University's

Archives and Special Collections. Stoes' husband, Henry Stoes, was a member of the Fountain posse.

Fountain was the staff attorney and lead investigator for the Southeastern New Mexico Stock Growers' Association, Thomas said in the book's first paragraph. "He had been aggressively pursuing a campaign against rustlers in southern New Mexico." Fountain traveled from Mesilla to the county courthouse in Lincoln County to place evidence he had collected before a

grand jury.

"Colonel Fountain was well aware that he had a risky job, that the men he was pursuing were capable of extreme violence," Thomas said. "It was this self-evident danger that had induced Col. Fountain's wife, Mariana, to convince Col. Fountain to take his son with him on the trip to Lincoln. She believed that the presence of her youngest son would prevent any violence directed at Col. Fountain."

In operation since January 2019, Viva New Mexico has no storefront, so the Farmers Market and the venture’s website (www.vivanm.us) are the sole points of sale.

When COVID-19 shut down the Farmer’s Market, Scott Krahlung laid low like most of his fellow vendors, but he continued having products printed for when things opened up

again. He proudly noted that all his printing is done locally.

“For most of the outbreak, we were shut down,” he said. “Now that the market is back, we’re providing hand sanitizer and requiring masks.”

Scott Krahlung said the entire venture is rooted in

a deep love of the nature of southern New Mexico, and so he keeps the product line simple in an effort to free up plenty of time to hike and explore with his family.

“Our main products are t-shirts and stickers,” he said. “We have regular customers who are always

Thomas’ book details the lives of all those involved in the case, including Col. Fountain, Henry, Maria, Doña Ana County Sheriff Pat Garrett and defense attorney Albert Fall.

It gives lurid details from the crime scene near La Luz, which included a pool of blood that “was 7 or 8 inches deep and twice or three times as large as a spittoon.” Marks on the

ground at a nearby campfire “suggested that Col. Fountain’s body had been carried there wrapped in a blanket and that Henry was still alive.”

The book also details the investigation of the disappearance and the 1899 trial of Lee and Gilleland in Hillsboro. It has nearly 30 images of the people and places involved, including a hand-drawn map of the routes taken by the Fountain posses.

Thomas learned earlier this month that another

Spiking heat merits caution by golfers

As I write this, we are experiencing more than two weeks with 100-plus degree temperature, and 10 days have set record

highs, ranging from 105 to 109. Golfers who go out early in the morning and finish well before noon will be warm but safe.

Golfing in the dazzling, broiling midday sun presents real health dangers, with the two main concerns being sun damage to the skin and heat illness. Prolonged solar radiation for golfers (and other) can cause sunburn, sun poisoning and even heatstroke. Over-exposure to ultraviolet radiation (UV rays) can result in painful tingling, skin swelling, headache, dizziness, fever, chills, nausea and a painful rash.

Sunburn is due to over-exposure to UV rays, with symptoms ranging from bright reddish color to painful burning and blistering. For folks who are new to the desert Southwest, it only takes a half hour or less of being out in the hot sun to get sunburned.

Golfers and outdoor enthusiasts should be aware of the potential dangers of heat-related illness. Prolonged or intense exposure to extremely hot temperatures can lead

to heat exhaustion, heat cramps and potentially heatstroke, which happens when the body suffers from long, extreme exposure to heat and loses its ability to cool itself.

Under prolonged heat conditions, the part of the brain that normally regulates both body temperature and

body movements tends to malfunction, decreasing the body's ability to sweat and cool itself. That's when trouble begins, since rational thinking may become clouded.

If you suspect sun poisoning or heat prostration, you should get out of the sun immediately. As soon as possible take a cool (not cold) shower and/or apply cool compresses. Aloe gel is recommended for sunburned areas, and if pain is substantial, then over-the-counter pain relievers are often suitable.

Stay out of the sun until the condition resolves, and completely cover sunburned areas when going outside. You should seek immediate medical attention in cases where the sunburn forms a large area and is very painful.

Prevention is the key. For golfers, it's important

to wear looser, breathable clothing and not sticky cotton. Broad brim hats will keep the sun from doing further damage to ears, face and neck. The most important prevention is to apply sunscreen, SPF 30 or higher, generously and often. WebMD online recommends applying sunscreen 15 to 30 minutes before going outside, and reapplying every two hours, because sunscreen washes off with sweat and none are really waterproof. Dermatologists advise that when applying sunscreen, we should cover our face, ears, nose, neck, arms, back of hands and legs.

Doctors who treat sun stroke and heat-related illnesses note that, when recognized in the early

treated at home. The first thing is to stop the vigorous activity, get out of the heat and rest. Get into a cooler environment, like shade or an air-conditioned space, and elevate your feet while removing as much clothing as practical. First aid involves cooling the person's body by sponging cool water.

When we indulge in outdoor endeavors like golf, or even yard work, the only way to cope with the desert heat is to hydrate, hydrate, hydrate. Beer is not hydrating. Drink water, while replacing electrolytes with legitimate sports drinks.

Sports physicians tell us to drink at least a

quart of hydration every hour when the temp is over 70 degrees. Since there are no drinking fountains and few water coolers on golf courses these days, bringing your own water in an insulated jug is smart. Excess alcohol consumption on the golf course on hot days will only make heat prostration more probable.

Remember, don't drink and drive — don't even putt!

A tangram is a puzzle made up of seven shapes: 5 triangles, 1 square, and 1 parallelogram that can be rearranged into endless silhouettes.

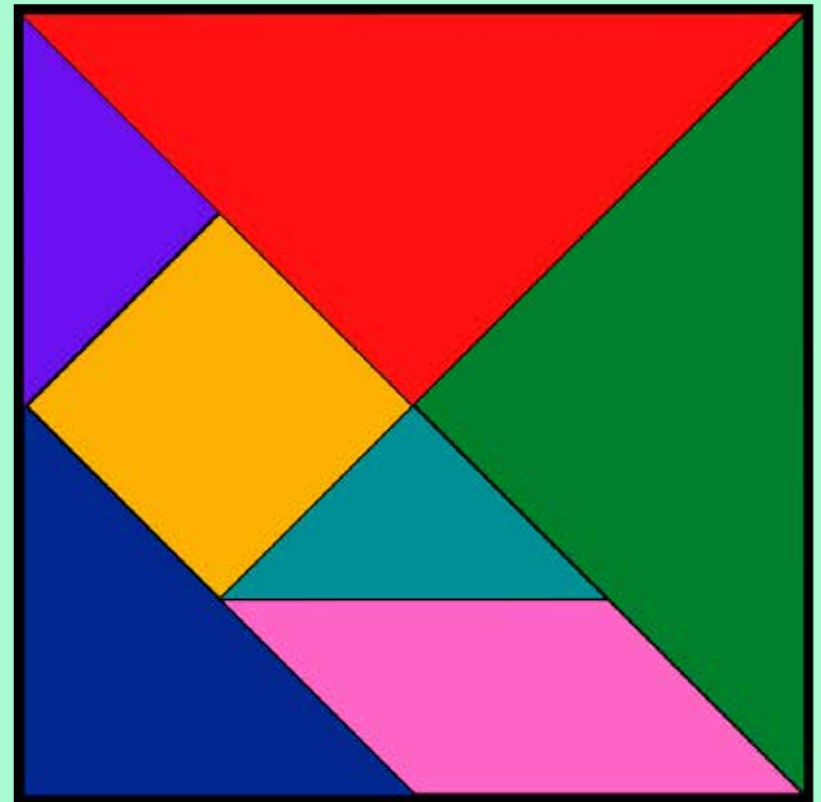
