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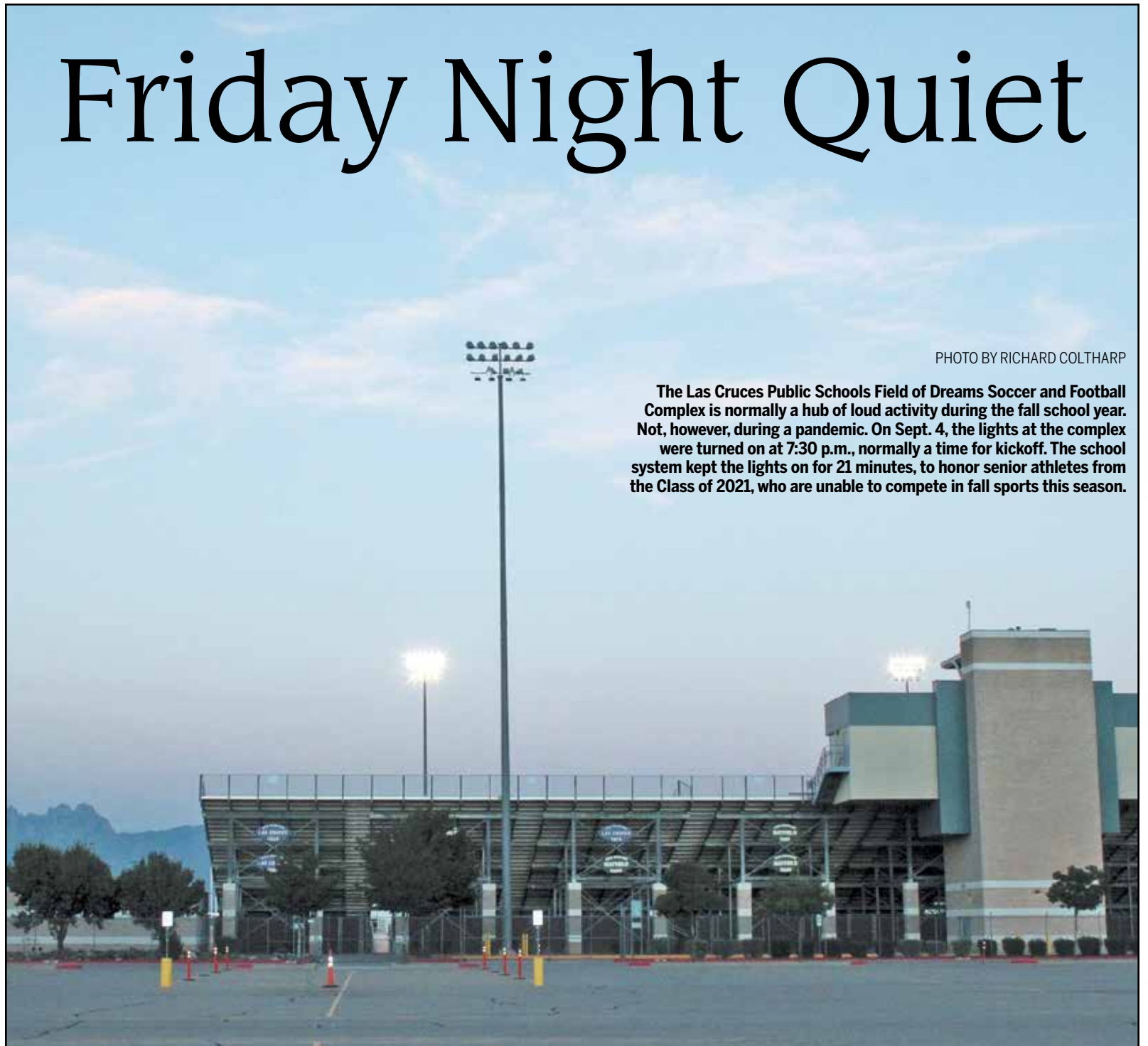

Roadwork nears completion in Organ

A significant street paving improvement project in the townsite of Organ is scheduled to be completed before the end of September, 2020. The project was started in May and was funded by a legislative appropriation totaling \$400,000 spearheaded by Senator William Soules, District 37, who sponsored the request for the funds.

“When the opportunity for this funding came up, I knew I wanted to use it in Organ,” said Senator Soules. “It was important to me to improve the quality of the roads in Organ because it also improves the quality of life for the residents there,” the senator said.

The funding was used to reconstruct 4 roadways; Old Organ Main Road, 1st Street, Furnace Road and 4th Street from Highway 70.

“We are grateful to Senator Soules for his commitment to community improvement,” said Fernando Macias, Doña Ana County Manager.

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A world unkind: Sept. 11, 2001, remembered

When Pat Gallagher and his men finally got out of the dark, unstable and dust-filled tunnel, it looked like a nuclear strike had smashed into his city.

"We faced New York City and all you saw was dust and papers," he said. "I remember papers falling from the sky, papers that were probably important and on somebody's desk a short while ago."

The day, of course, was Sept. 11, 2001. Las Cruces Police Department's (LCPD) retired chief Gallagher was with the New York Police Department. He was working as an investigator with internal

affairs, supervising a group of officers at the time.

"We were deployed to a mobilization point in Manhattan and saw the second tower fall from the highway," Gallagher said. "We had a perfect view. We got to the mouth of the tunnel and they told us, 'We are not sure of the structural integrity of the tunnel,' and they handed us those crappy masks like the ones we have now. There was no electricity. Even emergency lights were useless because there was so much dust."

What they saw was hard to believe, he said, because it started out as such a beautiful day, clear

and warm. They went into the dust, told it was safe, to do their jobs.

"I am still losing friends who were breathing in the dust," he said.

"Every time I see dust on my car, all I think of is the dust from there. Some of it might have con-

tained human remains." Gallagher was assigned to a temporary command at Harlem Hospital to identify people as they got there.

"And we waited for the injured to come," he said. "Fifteen hours later, we were dismissed, because the injured never came —

City of Rocks State Park

City of Rocks State Park gets its name from the incredible volcanic rock formations found there. The "city" is a geologic formation made up of large, sculptured rock columns, or pinnacles, rising as high as 40 feet and separated by paths or lanes resembling city streets. These rocks were formed about 34.9 million years ago when a very large volcano erupted. Then, erosion over millions of years slowly formed the sculptured columns seen today, creating a stunning, otherworldly landscape. Located about halfway between Silver City and Deming, City of Rocks offers camp sites, hiking trails, excellent mountain biking, wildlife viewing, birding, stargazing, picnic areas and a desert botanical garden.

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County honors first female Eagle Scout, women's suffrage anniversary

The Doña Ana County Commission declared Aug. 25 Valerie del Plain Day in recognition of her becoming the first female Eagle Scout in Las Cruces, county media and public communications manager Catherine Zaharko said.

Del Plain attended the commission meeting to receive the recognition, along with her parents, Robert and Alejandra del Plain, and her brother, Richard.

She is a graduate of Oñate High School, attending Brigham Young University at its Idaho campus, where she is

majoring in music.

Valerie del Plain joined Girl Scout Troop 9-3/4 (so named for the infamous train platform in the Harry Potter books that took students to Hogwart's) in 2019 and began working on her merit badges and Eagle Scout requirements. Her project consisted of cleaning off graves at Hillcrest Cemetery in Las Cruces, taking pictures of the headstones and uploading the pictures into an app where people can find their ancestors.

The rank of Eagle Scout is attained by fewer than four percent of all scouts and represents an accomplishment in leadership, commit-

ment to community and an understanding of the scout oath, Zaharko said.

The Boy Scouts of America changed its name to BSA and began to include girls in 2019.

Also at the Aug. 25 meeting, the county commission issued a procla-

mation declaring August as Women's Right to Vote month, in celebration of Congress passing the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution — giving women the right to vote — on Aug. 26, 1920.

Prior to passing the 19th Amendment, scores

of suffragists fought for decades for the right to vote, the county said. Congress and state legislatures debated the amendment for more than a year. New Mexico was the 32nd of 36 states needed for ratification of the 19th Amendment.

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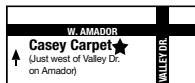
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Outstanding teacher nominations sought for VFW awards

The chills are with us still: 'This is no accident'

In the summer of 1945, on a very foggy day in New York City, a B-25 military plane crashed into the Empire State Building.

All three crewmen died, as well as 11 people inside the building.

It happened to be a Saturday. Otherwise, the number of casualties inside might have been much greater.

On a bright, clear New York morning 56 years later, an airliner hit the north tower of the World Trade Center.

Even in 2001, plenty of people still recalled that 1940s incident. The network television morning shows, airing from New York City, quickly made those comparisons, and some had already dug up and broadcast images from the old event.

On that Tuesday, Sept. 11, however, there was no fog, eliminating that as a possible cause for the accident. News

hosts wondered if the plane might have malfunctioned. A few people thought maybe it could be a hijacking.

The speculation didn't last long.

Seventeen minutes later, another airliner crashed into the south

tower.

With live cameras fixed on the smoking north tower, millions of Americans saw the second crash live as it happened.

Everyone who saw it said, collectively, "This is no accident."

The myriad ramifications of that day are still with us, 19 years later.

At the time, I was publisher of the Alamogordo Daily News, and early in the day we learned one of New Mexico's own, former Alamogordo police officer Al Marchand, had died on the plane. We followed the stories for several days, including in an "EXTRA" edition.

Even the skies recognized the sadness, as it rained the whole week in Alamogordo.

Because the memories are so clear for so many of us, it makes it more difficult to realize we just graduated a group of high school seniors who weren't even born when 9/11

happened.

Anyone who is 25 or younger has no live recollection of the events.

As we look around at our nation today, divided in so many ways, arguing constantly about matters both deathly serious and frivolously trivial, maybe it's worth a backward glance at 9/11. There was a positive side effect out of that truly horrible day.

We Americans came together.

I'll never forget attending a special Mass one evening that week. The church was packed, and everyone expressed their care and their hearts.

We Americans still have that care and those hearts.

We don't have to have a national tragedy to use them.

Remember.

pens, in the processing area, loading fats and raising orphan calves.

There are exceptions in both genders, of course. There are plenty of men who don't feel the need to jab a new steer two times with a hot shot before the tailgate opens ahead of them. There are men who exercise patience when pulling a calf from some fat pregnant feedlot heifer. And there are men who have some compassion for a beast in trouble.

On the other hand, there are women who treat cattle like inanimate objects or judge a good day by the number of head processed rather than how much

unnecessary stress was created. If women are easier on cattle, maybe it's the mother instinct.

Workin' feedlot cattle requires more stamina than strength. We have hydraulic squeeze chutes, front end loaders, nose tongs, horses, pulleys, push gates and hot shots, which allow humans to handle critters considerably bigger and stronger than them. But it takes stamina to process or doctor eight hours a day for three weeks straight. Women are long on stamina.

One of the biggest deterrents for women has always

Don't defund police

Defunding the police is a response to the symptom and not to the real problems. The answer is to reform the police. The police face many challenges today. We expect them to be social workers, truant officers, healthcare workers and lie detectors.

Suggested reforms to solve policing problems: Each individual must be accountable for their actions; strengthen recruitment/screening; change the unions; identify officer candidate tendencies early; institute community policing; and establish community review boards to work with the police.

Society is also responsible. We have to learn to communicate with our police officers and learn to understand their problems. We have to learn why they issue the commands they issue and why we need to follow them immediately and cooperatively. We have to learn that free speech and protests do not mean we as citizens are entitled to loot and burn. Rioting solves nothing.

What's Next? We work together to understand and find solutions for the identified issues: Demilitarize the police, and call the National Guard if you need a military response; weed out those individuals in the police forces

who are inclined to use excessive force in any situation; rebuild a trust relationship between the communities and the police force; and union and management have to work together along with their local governing bodies to turn this trust into reality.

We must encourage local management of the police to involve citizens in discussions with police. Get the dialogue going. Write opinion pieces for the newspaper. Do a ride along with one of the patrolmen and find out who the police report to in your locality (police commission or city council).

According to a study by the Recycling Partnership, prior to COVID-19, the U.S. only captured roughly 32% of the 37.4 million tons of collected single-family recyclables. This means over 20 million tons of single-family recyclables ended up in landfills. Due to the Pandemic, those figures are likely to change, regrettably not for the better. That is why setting zero-waste goals could go a long way towards protecting our environment.

As families are staying home, ordering takeout and online products more than ever before, the amounts of recyclables and trash are increasing. To help divert recyclables from going to the landfill, it is important to know what should “not” go in your blue recycling bin and limit what goes in your trash bin. Let us recycle right, by following these tips:



RECYCLE RIGHT TIPS:

- Don't** throw PPE masks and gloves in blue bins
- Don't** bag your recyclables
- Don't** throw plastic bags in blue bins
- Don't** throw Styrofoam in blue bins
- Don't** throw plates and cutlery from takeout in blue bins
- Don't** throw food-tainted items in blue bins
- Don't** throw napkins or paper towels in blue bins
- Don't** throw plastic straws in blue bins (avoid using them)
- Don't** throw tanglers in blue bins (i.e., cords, hoses, wires, zip-ties, etc.)
- Don't** throw wood pallets, clothes, or trash in blue bins
- Break-down** all cardboard boxes

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State's early education system ranked in top 25

New Mexico's early education system is ranked 21st among all states and the District of Columbia in a survey by the personal finance website WalletHub.

For the study, WalletHub compared the 50 states and D.C. using 12 key metrics, including share of school districts

(New Mexico has 89) that offer a state pre-K program, number of pre-K quality benchmarks met and total reported spending per child enrolled in pre-K.

With a total overall score of 53.55 out of a possible 100, New Mexico was ninth in accessibility, 38th in quality and 25th in resources and economic support.

D.C. was ranked first with a score of 75.41, followed by Nebraska, Maryland, West Virginia and Arkansas. The bottom five were Massachusetts, Arizona, North Dakota, Missouri and Indiana, which had a last-place score of 24.2.

"A study by the National Institute for Early Education Research showed that students enrolled in full-day pre-K programs do better on math and literacy tests than their peers who attend only partial-day preschool," WalletHub

said. "In addition, those who attend pre-K programs have been shown to have less risk of future crime than those who do not. Plus, early education programs may generate billions of dollars for the economy over a few decades, due

to lessening the need for social services and creating more productive citizens."

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Superintendent: 'Community is awesome' as schools deal with COVID-19

"The community of Las Cruces is awesome and amazing," Las Cruces Public Schools Superintendent Karen Trujillo said of the community's response to COVID-19.

The pandemic and its myriad collateral issues create "tons of challenges every single day," Trujillo said. "It's tough, but we're doing all right."

In dealing with the pandemic, including state public health orders, online learning and planning for partial and full reopening of schools, Trujillo said she is "so happy about the collaboration in the community" that includes the City of Las Cruces, Doña Ana County, state government agencies, New Mexico State University, local nonprofits, Comcast cable and other businesses, the National Education Association-Las Cruces teachers union, the LCPS Board of Education, staff, students and parents.



"We are building capacity," she said. "No one hesitates. It truly is a model for other communities across the state and across the country."

LCPS is "really making that connection with parents and students through their teachers" to make sure student needs are met as online learning moves forward into the fall semester of the 2020-21 school year, Trujillo said. The most asked question to students and families, she

said, is "What do you need?" With 100 percent online learning currently in place, the biggest needs have included computers and Internet access, Trujillo said, with more basic school supplies also in demand.

In partnership with Comcast and the city, LCPS has created a database of families in the cable company's local service area, Trujillo said, to make sure they all have Internet access, which LCPS will continue to pay for as needed

LCPS has spent more than \$1 million to pay for 600 hot spots, the superintendent said.

The district continues to identify families with online challenges, she said. For example, a mother called recently because she had four children at home and the one hot spot available to them wasn't working. In cases like that, Trujillo said, the school district must provide an alternate or multiple hotspots.

"If you're having those needs, let us know," Trujillo said. The best way to do that, she said, is for a parent to call his or her child's school.

Trujillo said LCPS won't look at moving to a hybrid learning model – combining online and in-school instruction – until mid-September at the earliest. The school board meets next Sept.

In following state public health orders, LCPS has to consider many factors before partially or fully reopening schools, Trujillo said, including how students safely pass in hallways and ride school buses. Protocols will vary from one school to another based on student population, ranging from a small elementary school to Las Cruces High School's more than 1,700 students.

LCPS has begun making plans for the return of "a small, specific group of students," Trujillo said. "We're just going to have to do it slowly and methodically" to develop a healthy hybrid model.

Developing that model includes working closely with NEA-LC, she said, to identify not only students and families but also teachers who want or need to stay fully remote.

Even though learning is taking place online, students still need school supplies, Trujillo said. And the need is as great as ever, because each

student must have his or her own set of school supplies at home — there aren't common crayons and other basic supplies available as they were in the past at elementary schools, and sharing school supplies isn't going to be possible going forward because of the pandemic.

New on the list of needed supplies since schools shut down in March is headphones, Trujillo said. With multiple family members at home, they have become an "important learning tool," she said.

Fairacres Elementary School was closed Aug. 28 after two staff tested positive for COVID-19, in addition to a staff member who tested positive Aug. 21, LCPS said in a news release. After deep cleaning in accordance to CDC guidelines, staff is expected to be allowed to return Tuesday, Sept. 15.

"We have to guarantee that safety," Trujillo said. Visit www.lcps.net.

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Exercise For Seniors Part 6

For the past several weeks, we've been talking about starting an exercise program, particularly for our older adults. We've talked about the benefits of exercise, how to get started, creating goals and a plan, and exercise in the presence of chronic conditions. Hopefully you've used this information to get started in an exercise program, and now you're several weeks into it. So what's left? For many people, staying motivated is a common problem. This week, let's finish up this series with some tips on staying motivated to exercise.

Physical activity is a great way for older adults to gain substantial health benefits and maintain independence. Try to make exercise a priority. Remember that being active is one of the most important things you can do each day to maintain and improve health. Try these tips to help you stay motivated to exercise:

Find Simple Ways to Make Exercise Fun and Enjoyable

Some people like to walk on a treadmill at the gym. Others find that kind of activity boring. The key to sticking with exercise is to make it interesting and enjoyable. Be creative. Do things you enjoy but pick up the pace. Variety helps keep things interesting, so try something new periodically - a new activity, a new setting, a new piece of equipment. These things can keep your interest alive.

Find Ways to Fit Exercise into Your Day

You are more likely to exercise if it's a convenient part of your day. Try exercising first thing in the morning, or make a set time each day. Combine physical activity with a task that's already part of your day, such as walking the dog or doing household chores. If you don't have 30 minutes to be active, look for three 10-minute periods. As you progress, add more 10-minute sessions until you hit your goal!

Make Exercise a Social Activity

Many people agree that an "exercise buddy" keeps them going. Take a walk each day with a friend or neighbor. Try a dance class—salsa, tango, square dancing—it's up to you. Use family gatherings as a time to play team sports or do outdoor activities.

Keep Track of Your Exercise Progress

The best way to stay motivated is to measure and celebrate your successes. Make a chart for each of the following categories, and at the end of each month, test yourself to chart your progress:

- **ENDURANCE:** Pick a fixed course, such as the distance from your house to the corner or once around the shopping mall, and see how long it takes you to walk that far.
- **UPPER-BODY STRENGTH:** Count the number of arm curls you can safely do in 2 minutes with the same amount of weight in each hand.
- **LOWER-BODY STRENGTH:** Count the number of chair stands you can safely do in 2 minutes.
- **BALANCE:** Time yourself as you stand on one foot, without support, for as long as possible. Repeat with the other foot.
- **FLEXIBILITY:** Note how far you can reach toward your toes until you feel a stretch.

And that's it! Over the last 6 weeks, I've given you a lot of information which should have you started on the path to

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A very English quarantine

I flew to Manchester, England at the beginning of March. Any real COVID-19 scare had yet to reach the States, and like other recent pandemics, we've been seemingly invincible in comparison to the rest of the world, so I assumed this would blow over accordingly. I touched down and immediately began my Ph.D. studies and found myself acting on a film set.

After one day of shooting, we were shut down, marking the beginning of how real this pandemic was for me and how close I was in proximity to it. As I rode the train from London back home, my anxiety began to increase. It was less the fear of actu-

ally catching the virus, but more of the fact that all of the things I do through my work as a filmmaker, to the basketball club I just joined, upcoming film festivals, to the plane tickets purchased for the wedding I'm due to attend — all of these things are now canceled.

At the beginning of the pandemic, my attire when stepping outside my flat was apocalyptic more than anything. Mask, shades, hood, long black jacket and kitchen gloves. Think Batman with bright yellow mitts. It was a bit over-the-top, as are most reactions when responding to unknown things; hence the toilet paper crisis.

As I compared my situation with that of those back in the States, I recognized I was fortunate,

because there seemed to be calmness amongst the community I was surrounded by, which eased my own anxiety. I was so proud to let people know when they asked me how things were in America to claim that New Mexico is handling the pandemic better than the majority of the country. New Mexico was handling it better than the majority of Britain as well. If I walked outside today, you would think the pandemic was over.

I broke my social distancing streak in May by attending a Black Lives Matter protest that was happening five minutes from my flat. It has been a mentally exhausting period, still processing from constant injustices and murders facing the black community.

Being in the midst of a moment where over 1,000 people marched through the streets of Manchester chanting George Floyd's and Breonna Taylor's names was something special. Just as they began protesting after we protested in America, we began tearing down statues after they tore down a statue of theirs in Bristol.

I believe what this pandemic has allowed us to do is think and consider our priorities without being distracted by the daily grind. When we were

forced to stay at home, we discovered what really matters to us.

The whole world is going to be a new place once we accept whatever "normal" becomes. The pandemic being our cocoon, we can choose the person on the other side of this metamorphosis.

I fly back to the States in a couple of weeks, and I'm not sure what to expect. I've been fairly cooped up in my flat for the last five months and have adapted to the British COVID-19 regulations, but what is

it really like in America right now? Talk about a Social Distance Culture Shock!

Local races for state legislature include incumbents, challengers, two open seats

The New Mexico Legislature is a powerful body of 42 state senators and 70 state representatives charged with, among other duties, approving New Mexico's more than \$7 billion state budget and redistricting after the decennial census. Legislators receive no salary but are paid per diem. State representatives serve two-year terms, while state senators serve four-year terms. There are no term limits for legislators.

All 112 seats in the legislature are on the Nov. 3 ballot this year, including the 14 that contain some portion of Doña Ana County: eight in the state House of Representatives and six in the state Senate. All local races are contested between Democrats and Republicans.

Here are the 14 legislative races:

NEW MEXICO HOUSE RACES (districts are entirely in Doña Ana County unless otherwise noted):

- **District 33:** Incumbent Democrat Micaela Lara

He said he is disappointed that Patriot Day

ceremonies have been postponed in Las Cruces for 2020 due to the COVID-situation, although he knows it is important to keep people safe. He said the people here are great and the community

is supportive of its law enforcement but “this year especially it would be good to give [law enforcement] a pat on the back.”

“These days, it would have been nice to have

[the ceremony] to remind people of the importance of law enforcement,” he said. “Speaking as a veteran of law enforcement, it’s disheartening that people have forgotten. We are human.”

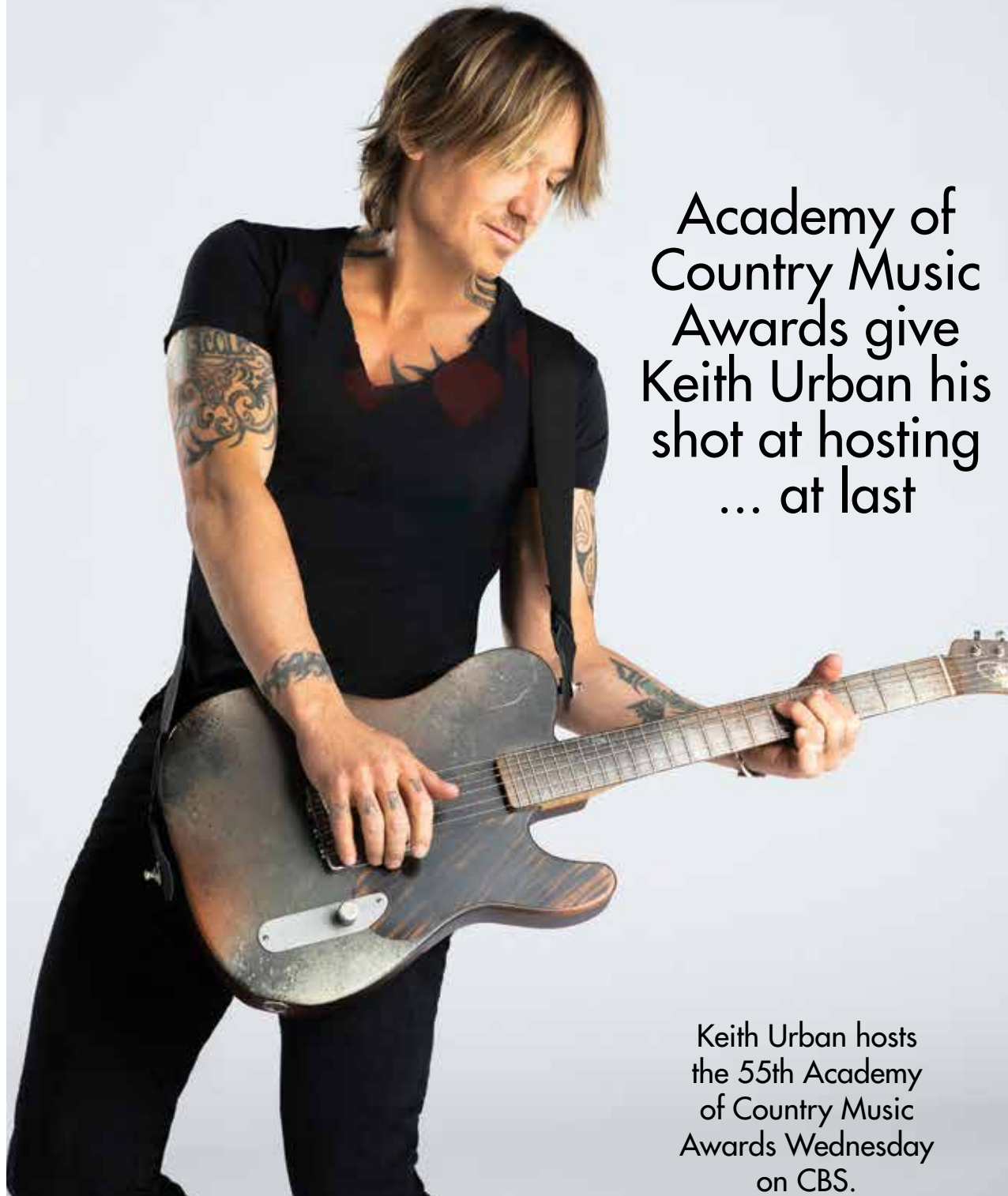

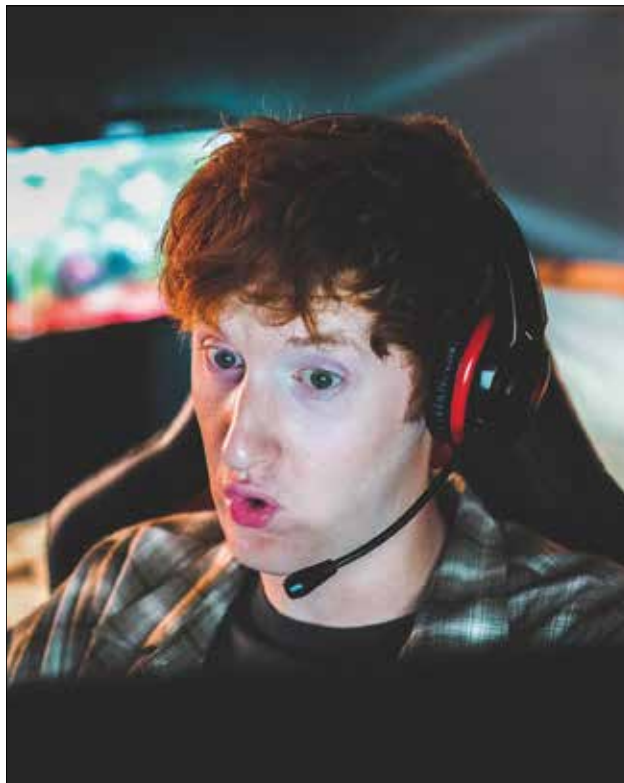

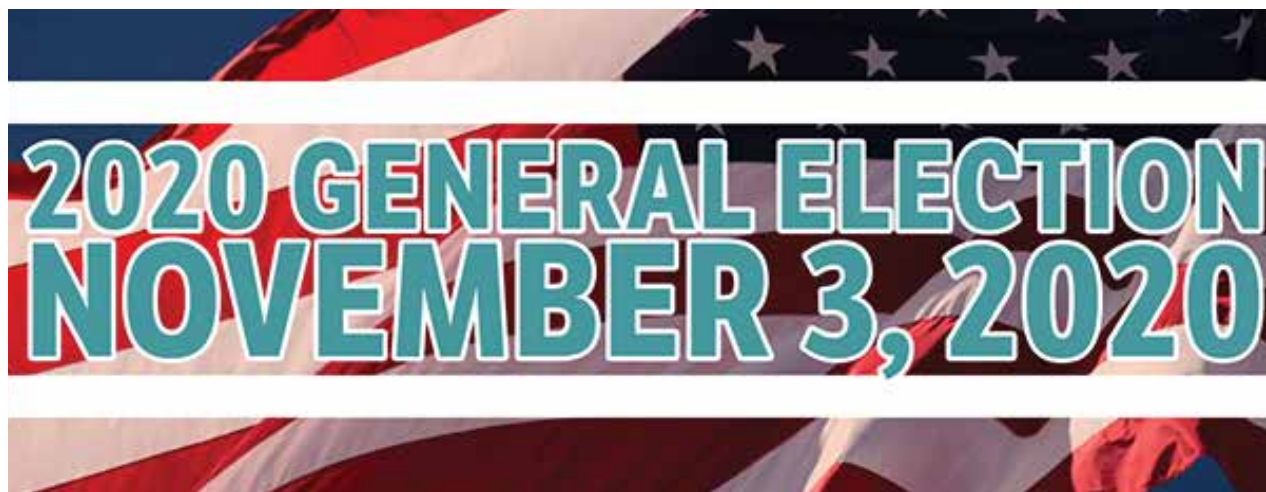

The 2020 General Election will include a number of races including County Commissioners, County Treasurer, County Clerk, State Representatives, U.S. Representative, U.S. Senator and President of the United States. All registered voters are eligible to vote. Registered voters may update their party during the same day voter registration period.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the County Clerk is strongly encouraging voters to consider voting via absentee ballot during the 2020 General Election. Any registrant may vote by absentee ballot for all candidates and on all questions appearing on the ballot as if you were casting it in person at a regular poll-



ing place on Election Day. You will need to formally request an absentee ballot. You may request a ballot by:

- Submitting an application online at www.sos.state.nm.us/voting-and-elections/voter-information-portal/ *Note: This option will not be available until late August or early September.*

- Printing an application at www.donaanacounty.org/sites/default/files/pages/Absentee_Application_New_Mexico.pdf and mailing it to our office at 845 N. Motel Blvd., Las Cruces, NM 88007.
- Returning a completed application that you received in the mail from our office or the Secretary

of State to our office at 845 N. Motel Blvd., Las Cruces, NM 88007.

- Emailing www.elections@donaanacounty.org to request an application.

Note: Please only mark "General Election" on your application, as we have to have a different, approved absentee application on file for each election in which

you are applying to vote via absentee ballot. For more information about how to fill out an absentee ballot application please read the guide at www.donaanacounty.org/sites/default/files/pages/2020_Absentee_Application_Instructions.pdf.

All absentee ballot applications must be re-

ceived no later than October 20th. Once we receive, review and approve your request, beginning Oct. 6th, we will mail you a ballot and the required envelopes you will use to return the ballot to us. Tracking for the status of your application and receipt of your ballot by our office is available at NMVote.org.

Ballots can be returned by the voter, the voter's immediate family member, or by the voter's caregiver by mail or at any voting convenience center during Early Voting and Election Day.

All ballots must be returned in the provided envelopes by 7 p.m. on November 3rd, 2020.

Ron Cavill and his wife, Susan, joined the long line at Dairy Queen, to get a dipped cone.

With COVID-19 limiting our lives at every turn, an ice cream treat is one of the few simple pleasures available these days. But how simple is it, really? Cavill wondered.

He saw the crew, many of them teenagers, working in a small kitchen with a relentless backlog of customers.

We're aware of the medical professionals dealing with the Coronavirus, and the first responders and teachers going the extra mile.

But when the Cavills saw that crew, they realized how many people are working in so many unheralded ways behind the scenes and hidden in plain view to keep our world limping along.

Sure, an ice cream cone isn't that big of a deal, but many of us are hanging by threads, emotionally, economically and otherwise. You never know if something as simple as a frosty treat and a smile is what keeps us from unraveling.

Here are some of Ron's direct words on the subject:

"There is no question the entire community of Las Cruces has been impacted by this pandemic. Some have experienced a heavier load, but all have felt the weight and the disruption of these past months.

"How deeply we are ultimately affected will be, in large part, dependent on how we react as a community.

"We can all agree first-line workers deserve a big vote of appreciation: Those individuals who did not

have a choice and answered the call to give it their best effort. We extend our love and support to them. They are heroes.

"Let us not forget the thousands it took to keep our community operating in a somewhat normal capacity. We were notably inconvenienced by a lack of toilet paper and other 'essentials' for a short time. However, we made it!

"We made it because of the thousands who went to work every day to fulfill our needs and to maintain a level of normal life support.

"I think of the grocery-store workers who were there every day. I think of the fast food workers working in tight quarters to provide an alternative to a can of tuna fish. I think of the delivery people who brought dinner, clothing, books and supplies.

"In our city, the largest employer is government. The government continued to work with various degrees of success. The next five largest employers are 1) health care and social assistance; 2) retail trade; 3) food service and lodging; 4) waste management and administrative services; and 5) construction.

"Many of our neighbors employed in these six industries have found themselves totally out of work. That is regrettable. Nonetheless, thousands of others have buckled down and gone to work. Many had no choice – some did make the conscious choice. They deserve our support and admiration.

Community rallies around Jardin de los Niños

The COVID-19 Public Health Orders have undoubtedly impacted everyone over the last five months. On March 16, Jardin de los Niños was closed to comply with the stay-at-home order, and our children and staff immediately transitioned into remote learning. La Tienda de Jardin also closed on March 18, which posed a financial impact on Jardin de los Niños. Many challenges are present in the lives of the children and families that we serve at Jardin. COVID-19 has heightened those challenges for many of our families. Our approach to serving our families has become very adaptable due

our limitations related to the Public Health Orders and limited in-person contact. During the stay-at-home order, Jardin staff still provided emergency assistance and case man-

agement, which included stabilizing the family and providing basic need support—Jardin provided food baskets to ensure that our families received food daily. Jardin's holistic, strengths-

based approach to serving the entire family has continued to encourage ongoing communication and support for our families despite the many challenges that we face daily.

After working from home for three months, La Tienda opened to the public on June 15 and the children and staff returned to Jardin on June 22, both locations returned with limited capacity. Only Jardin staff and children are able to enter the building as a safety measure. La Tienda relies heavily on our volunteers to support the operations of the boutique. Our volunteers at both locations have not been phased into our re-entry plan as a precautionary measure. We hope to welcome our volunteers back in phases and when it is safe. This has had a great impact on our organization. Jardin's re-entry plan has taken into account many factors: sanitization and safety are the number one priority. Our procedures

for drop-off and pick-up, daily wellness checks and receiving donations are at the forefront and have all been greatly impacted. Our cleaning practices have changed immensely at both Jardin de los Niños and La Tienda de Jardin. Jardin has moved to a Monday-Thursday schedule with Friday serving as the deep sanitization day. Ongoing sanitization takes place at La Tienda de Jardin. Through this global pandemic, we have learned that our children, families and staff are extremely resilient! The community has rallied around Jardin when we have needed support for our families, and we continue to implement new procedures when warranted to ensure the safety of everyone that we serve.

The United Way a Grounded Infrastructure for the Community

Many have heard of the organization, United Way, but when asked, What does the organization do? Many can't seem to find an answer. For many years, United Way has been known as a funder. And while yes, we still continue to provide grants to local nonprofits in our community, our organization has morphed into something more.

With over 1,300 United Way organizations worldwide, we have built the strongest and most locally-grounded infrastructure for community change at scale. Because of our large outreach, we are uniquely positioned to solve problems no organization can solve alone.

Emergency assistance is an integral part of our mission at the United Way of Southwest New Mexico. Our efforts to mobilize the

caring power of our community are only made possible with the collaboration with partners such as the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico, Casa de Peregrinos, and the Las Cruces Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, just to name a few. In the recent months, we have worked on two different initiatives with some of the partners listed above.

Because of individual and company donations it has become possible that the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico in partnership with the United Way of Southwest New Mexico have been able to create the Non-profit Emergency Fund to provide micro-grants to nonprofit organizations in Southwest New Mexico, spanning seven counties; Doña Ana, Grant, Hidalgo, Lincoln, Luna, Otero, and Sierra counties. During this

pandemic, nonprofit services have become essential, with a high demand from individuals and families because of the increase of unemployment. However, with the increase in need of services, on the other end, there has been an economic downfall with the decrease in monetary donations. The fund, which operates on an as-needed basis, assists nonprofits in time of great need due to a community need, natural disaster, and/or response to overwhelm-

ing loss of operational revenues during this COVID-19 health pandemic.

The other initiative we have is the Stamp Out Hunger Donor Drive which is a fundraising effort in partnership with Casa de Peregrinos. The current pandemic-related economic shutdown has worsened food insecurity that affects many individuals in our community, including children, elderly and military veterans. Local food pantries are continuing to work hard to serve our community and help the growing number of families who are food insecure. These families are so limited in their resources to buy food that they are running out of food, reducing the quality of their food, cutting out meat, feeding their children unbalanced meals, or skipping meals so that their children can eat.

To address this program, starting Tuesday, Sept. 1, community members who would normally leave food by their mailbox on the second Saturday in May for letter carriers to collect as part of the Stamp Out Hunger community-wide food drive, can accomplish the same thing via this online fundraising effort. Working to rebuild New Mexico together

Growing up in New Mexico, I know firsthand how special our community is and how lucky we are to call it home. Because of this, I've made it a priority in my first term in Congress to help create good, reliable jobs so that future generations can stay in New Mexico and continue to make it home.

However since March, COVID-19 has devastated our economy, with thousands of workers across our state losing their jobs through no fault of their own. As we've continued to work to address challenges, I've heard from employers struggling to rehire and safely reopen, as well as from families who are fighting to make ends meet.

That's why I introduced the Back on Your Feet Act with Rep. Horsford from Nevada to support our Main Street businesses with rehiring efforts and extend unemployment assistance. Specifically, our bill would reinstate the federal weekly \$600 unemployment compensation until January 31, 2021 and provide a single federal "Back on Your Feet Pay" in the amount of \$3,600 to workers who are able to return to work safely, to help cover costs of housing, childcare, transportation, food, PPE, and other necessary expenses.

While New Mexicans are hurting, it's critical Congress provides the federal relief needed and come to the table with bipartisan solutions. Initiatives like Back on Your Feet Pay would help New Mexicans return to work and support businesses with rehiring efforts, while extended unemployment insurance would provide vital support for New Mexican eager to get back

to work but who cannot get jobs during this unprecedented time. If passed, this legislation will support our economy and help thousands of New Mexicans get back on their feet as we continue on the path to recovery.

The bill also provides \$2 billion in funding to help states process unemployment applications and pay benefits. It also requires states and the Department of Labor to report on the number of people still waiting for benefits while developing "corrective action" plans for backlogs.

As we continue our battle against COVID-19 together, I am grateful to continue this work with you. I am committed to fighting for your priorities, from supporting our Main Street businesses and workers to providing immediate relief to families, and helping our community manage long-term challenges.

Make your voices heard New Mexico: complete the census and vote!

Two deadlines critical to our state's future are fast approaching -- the 2020 Census and the November 3rd general election. It's imperative that New Mexicans fully participate in both.

First, the Census. The September 31st deadline for completing the Census is just around the corner, and New Mexico's participation rate is not good. We were nearly last in the nation, at 55%, but that has now risen to 80%.

The Census determines federal funding over the next 10 years for vital programs -- Medicaid, the Children's Health Insurance Program, Head Start, school lunches, food stamps, and many more.

Every single person counts. Missing only one person can translate into losing \$3,000 per year over 10 years. A 1% state-wide undercount can lose \$600 million over the next decade. And we will lose billions if our participation doesn't turn around dramatically.

Please complete your Census form. And urge your family, friends, and co-workers to do the same. It takes only 10 minutes, and can be completed by mail, telephone and, for the first time, online at <https://my2020census.gov/>.

Next -- everyone should make a plan to vote in the upcoming election. Nothing is more fundamental to keeping our democracy secure and alive than casting your vote.

In New Mexico, every seat in the state legislature and the U.S. House of Repre-

sentatives is on the ballot, along with a U.S. Senate seat, the presidency, and local races. There are close races all across the state -- and your vote counts.

Because of COVID-19 -- it's especially important to figure out how to safely vote. In addition to voting in person on Election Day, you can vote absentee by mail or vote early in person. All the information

you need to plan is on the New Mexico Secretary of State's website at <https://www.sos.state.nm.us/voting-and-elections/> or the Dona Ana County Clerk's website at <https://www.bernco.gov/clerk/bureau-of-elections-overview.aspx>.

We've heard from the President that voting by mail is fraught with fraud, but this is categorically false, as the FBI recently confirmed -- finding no evidence of fraudulent vote-by-mail schemes this year.

We've seen the U.S. Postal Service administration recently institute measures in New Mexico and across the nation that are delaying mail and could undermine timely delivery of ballots. While some of those measures have been reversed, we still see delays.

I'm fighting hard in the Senate to safeguard the integrity of the upcoming election and ensure that USPS has the resources to do its job.

Now is the time for New Mexico to be heard. Please complete your Census form and vote in the upcoming election -- and help determine the future of our state and nation.

We must support NM workers and families

As we head into the fall of perhaps the most difficult year any of us will ever experience, there remains so much uncertainty about whether or not schools, child care centers, and small businesses will have the resources and equipment to reopen safely. And while New Mexico continues to do better than our neighboring states in containing the spread of the coronavirus, our families are still experiencing great loss and, particularly in southern New Mexico, we must remain vigilant.

I want you to know that I am continuing to do everything in my power to fight for the support New Mexicans need in the near term, the science-based public health response necessary

to save lives, and economic investments to rebuild our communities and regrow our economy in the long-term.

I remain deeply frustrated that both President Trump and Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell refuse to act in good faith to negotiate our next urgently needed package of economic relief. We need to act with real urgency when so many workers remain out of work and when too many of our families are worried about where they will get their next meal or fear eviction because they weren't able to pay their rent.

Despite this stand-still on the next major legislation,

I am continuing to fight for New Mexico priorities. That includes securing resources for smaller metropolitan areas like Las Cruces and rural communities across the nation

that are facing enormous economic burdens and costs during this crisis. It is crucial that we provide the same direct emergency assurances to smaller towns, counties, and cities and grant them the same stability that we are providing our larger metropolitan areas.

Earlier this year, I introduced the Coronavirus Community Relief Act to provide \$250 billion in stabilization funds geared towards localities with pop-

ulations under 500,000 that are struggling in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The House passed this support for local governments in their relief bill, the Heroes Act, and the Sen-

ate needs to do the same. I am also steadfast in my support for New Mexico small business owners. Since this crisis began, my office has assisted hundreds of small business owners in securing the help and resources they need to stay afloat. That includes helping them receive funds from the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) that has served as a critical lifeline for so many business owners.

When Congress first established this program in the CARES Act earlier this year, I heard from many local business owners about problems in its implementation.

While I shared their disappointment with those initial delays, I also went right to work to fix problems and be sure assistance is reaching the New Mexicans who need it most.

Thanks to key reforms that I supported and passed, PPP funds are now much easier for small businesses—including smaller microbusinesses that are so common in New Mexico—to access. With a much more simplified loan forgiveness application, business owners can focus on their work instead of lengthy applications. There is also much more flexibility built into the program to allow businesses to address their specific needs and still get their loans forgiven.

I am also working to make sure our small businesses and schools can

access the resources and equipment they need to reopen safely. That includes access to testing, PPE, and cleaning supplies. As scientists learn more about the way the virus spreads, I am also encouraging a greater focus on improving indoor air ventilation through solutions like upgrading air filters and using portable HEPA filter units, or by investing in new HVAC systems. That's why I am preparing legislation to help schools upgrade and improve their air filtration systems.

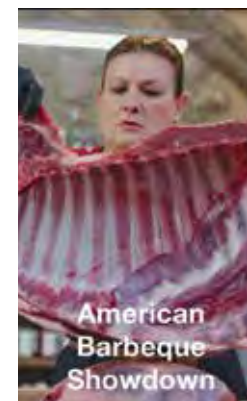

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Sarah Paulson explores the backstory of 'Ratched' in Netflix suspense series

on tap

Anyone who saw the 1975 feature film "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest" undoubtedly remembers Louise Fletcher's Oscar-winning turn as domineering asylum Nurse Ratched. Now Sarah Paulson takes on the iconic character in an origin series upcoming on Netflix.

In "Ratched," which begins streaming its eight episodes Friday, Sept. 18, Paulson reteams with her "American Horror Story" boss, creator Ryan Murphy, to tell the story of the future 1960s mental hospital tyrant made famous in the film and in Ken Kesey's seminal 1962 novel. Here, it's 1947 and stylish Nurse Mildred Ratched arrives at a leading psychiatric hospital in Northern California, where disturbing experiments have begun on the human mind.

Though the very image of a dedicated, competent caregiver, Ratched has issues bubbling beneath her calm, cool exterior that portend danger as she begins to infiltrate the mental health care system and those within it.

The high-profile production boasts an impressive cast including Emmy winners/nominees Cynthia Nixon ("Sex and the City"), Sharon Stone ("The Practice"), Judy Davis ("The Starter Wife") and Finn Wittrock ("American Horror Story"). But obviously that wasn't the only draw for Paulson, who jumped at the chance to play such a memorable character, albeit with substantial trepidation.

"In this case, it was obviously heightened because I have such respect and admiration for Louise Fletcher as an actress and her work in that movie was just absolutely phenomenal," she explains. "There is a sense of wanting to get it right for the people who love the movie and who love the book. And at the same time this is really an origin story and so there's a lot of it that was not part of the book and not part of the movie that (is) sort of a world that we are creating. And that was really exciting because then there's a little bit more freedom."

So in creating a young Ratched, Paulson focused on detail, like how Fletcher as Ratched held her keys. She also imagined what a 1940s version of the character's hair might look like.

"I tried to honor her," the actress says, "and also tried to give people an opportunity to maybe get a little bit deeper inside a character that — you know, because in the movie and in the book, you never learn about her life outside of the hospital.

"So how and why she behaved the way she did, how did she land where she landed, why does she have the belief system she held so tightly about rules and regulations and how did she get that way? And so this story is the Ratched experience to sort of dive into her past and what potentially could have gone on that created the character we see and that we know so well and that we love from the movie."

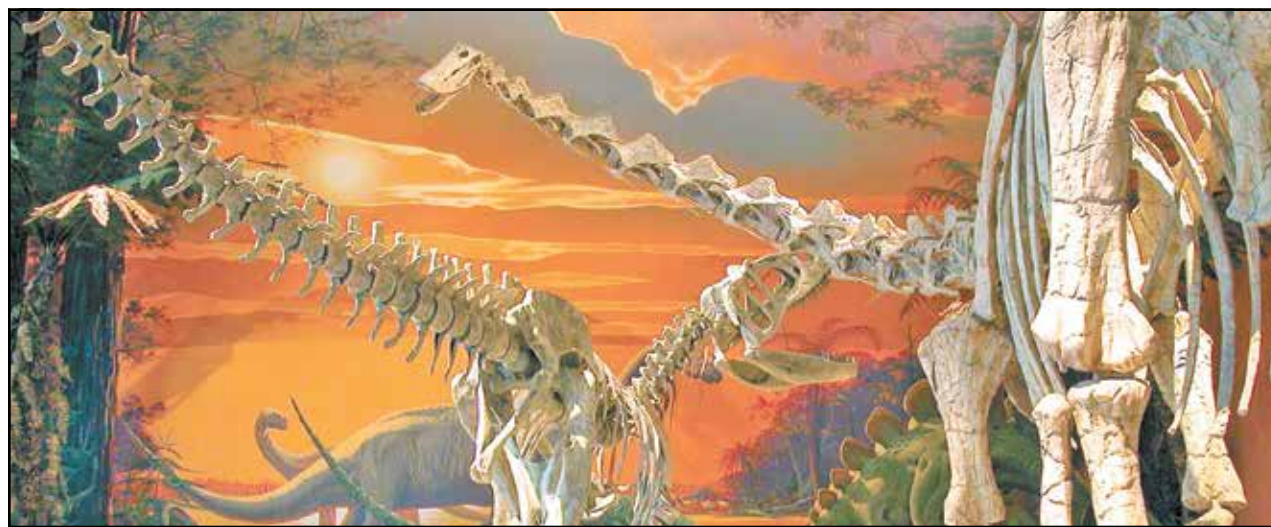
With time and (virtual) space in abundance for many people because of public health orders, now may be the perfect moment to connect with world-class museums and cultural sites outside Las Cruces.

The New Mexico Department of Cultural Affairs (NMDCA) brings the state's "unique blend of cultures into your home through its museums, historic sites and cultural institutions," NMDCA said in a news release.

Created in 1978 by the state Legislature, NMDCA is New Mexico's "cultural steward, charged with



preserving and showcasing the state's cultural riches," NMDCA said. "With its eight museums, seven historic sites, arts, archaeology, historic preservation and library programs, NMDCA is one of the largest and most diverse state cultural agencies in the nation. Together, NMDCA facilities, programs and services support a \$5.6 billion

cultural industry in New Mexico."

"Newmexicoculture.org makes it easy for New Mexicans across the state to connect with an array of NMDCA's programs offered through our museums, historic sites and other institutions, via online or on social media," said NMDCA Sec. Debra Garcia y Griego. "For example, residents in the southern part of the state are able to enjoy virtual programming that's available in Albuquerque, Santa Fe and at our historic sites throughout the state, without leaving home. These virtual offerings further the department's mission to celebrate the rich cultural diversity of our state."

There is also a link to a Cultural Atlas of New Mexico mobile app.

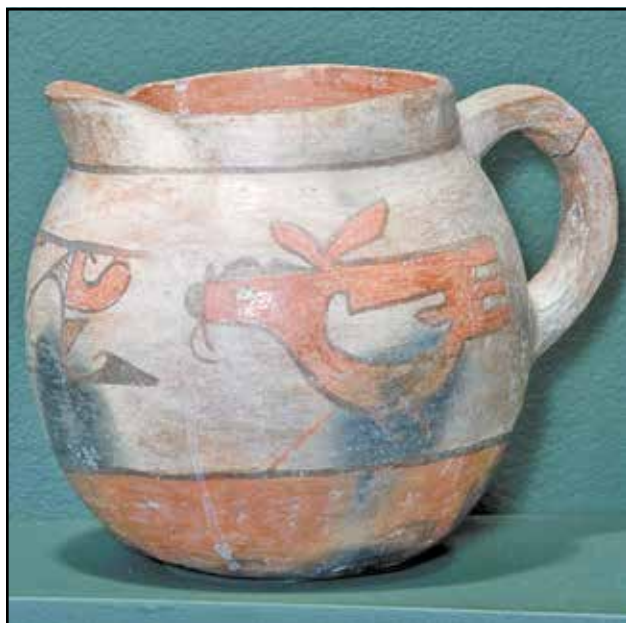

The New Mexico State University Academy for Learning in Retirement (ALR) will begin its fall 2020 Zoom presentations next week, led by current or retired NMSU faculty and staff members.

The first presenter is Lt. Colonel Wes Childs, a retired professor of Military Science at NMSU. His topic will be "The Evolution of U.S. Military Operations, Past and Present." Childs will explore how United States Army operations evolved, changes in planning and technology and the ways in which the Army's studies about past military operations have affected its modern devel-

Childs' Zoom sessions will begin at 10:30 a.m. Audience members may log in via Zoom at 10 a.m.

Here are the topics of each presentation:

- Tuesday, Sept. 15: Using DOTMLPF (Doctrine, Organization, Training, Materiel, Leadership and Education, Personnel and Facilities), the Blueprint of the U.S.

Military, to Study Military History

- Thursday, Sept. 17: Becoming a Modern Military
- Tuesday, Sept. 22: Military Operations in a Modern Age
- Thursday, Sept. 24: Contemporary Military Operations and Wrap-Up.

Childs served in the Army 1994-2020. Beginning as an enlisted soldier, he graduated from West Point in 2001 with a bachelor's degree in general management and a minor in nuclear engineering. Childs earned his master's degree of military art and science from the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College's School of Advanced Military Studies in 2014.

Prior to arriving at NMSU, Childs served in Mosul, Iraq, with the 1st Cavalry Division (later reflagged to 1st Armored Division). He was a campaign and transition planner with the International Security Assistance (ISAF) Force Joint Com-

mand at both the ISAF and Resolute Support Headquarters in Kabul, Afghanistan.

Childs served as NMSU professor of military science and ROTC post commandant from August 2018 until his July 31, 2020, retirement.

Childs focused much of his career on solving complex logistics problems, and he studied novel approaches to preventing stress-related injuries and increasing individual performances. He wrote a monograph in 2014 suggesting that applying a traditional martial-arts training methodology to the Modern Army Combatives Program could increase individual resilience within U.S. Army soldiers.

Childs is married to Dr. Megan Childs. They have three sons.

In addition to Childs' presentations, ALR will hold a special Zoom sessions at 10 a.m. Sept. 14, to discuss all ALR fall programs and to answer questions about Zoom.

Audience members can enroll for individual sessions at \$5 per session. If they pay a \$3 fall membership fee, the price for the individual sessions would drop 20 percent to \$4 per session. 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'Sorry for the Mess, Las Cruces': NMSU Art Museum announces first 2021 show

In an exhibition that originated at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas's Marjorie Barrick Museum of Art (MBMA), artists Justin Favela and Ramiro Gomez came together for the first time in "Sorry for the Mess," an exhibition of collaborative artwork about labor, childhood memories and life as first-generation Americans in the South-west.

As a collaboration between the New Mexico State University Art Museum (UAM) and MBMA, this installation draws on key themes in the practices of both artists, merging a child's imaginative experience with the adult realm of work and history.

The exhibition will be on display in the UAM's Contemporary Gallery Jan. 21-March 17, 2021. (Installation of the show at UAM will begin in December, after "Labor: Motherhood & Art I 2020" closes Dec. 6.)

The visual language of children's television recurs throughout the show. Programs like "Mister Rogers' Neighborhood" and "Sesame Street" helped many of us form ideas about the world when we were young, and the artists draw on that

familiar framework to connect such disparate subjects as the dolphins living in aquariums on the desert-bound Las Vegas Strip and the skeleton of the prehistoric ichthyosaur that used to lie at the center of the MBMA floor.

Playfully subverting our mental habit of blowing important objects up to huge proportions, Favela and Gomez create a giant landscape where the artifacts of "unseen" casino labor loom with the surreal monumentality of TV props. "Sorry for the Mess" is rooted in on-site observation, regional research and conversations with workers and families.

True to the humanistic ethos of both artists, construction of the installation focuses on hand-made surfaces and widely available materials such

as cardboard and colored paper. Parts of the work will be built for the NMSU Art Museum as Favela and Gomez invite students to join them in their process.

Favela is working on the commission that will be integrated into the exhibition to make it specific to Las Cruces. He also will create a virtual workshop in November, including pre-made art kits, similar to the kits for our Out-smART workshops this summer, with materials

Favela will suggest so Las Cruces can make piñata-style paper desert garden sculptures inspired by Justin's artwork. They also will be integrated into the January exhibit.

Known for large-scale installations and sculptures that manifest his interactions with American pop culture and the Latinx experience, Favela has exhibited his work both internationally and across the United States. His installations have been commissioned by the

Denver Art Museum and Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art in Bentonville, Arkansas.

His latest major project, "Recuérdame," was on view at the Sugar Hill Children's Museum of Art & Storytelling in New York City. Favela hosts two culture-oriented podcasts, "Latinos Who Lunch" and "The Art People Podcast." He graduated from the UNLV Department of Art with a bachelor's degree in fine arts in 2010, and he lives in Las Vegas.

Gomez, of Hollywood, California, uses the visibility of contemporary painting and sculpture to distinguish the workers whose everyday labor goes unrecognized by the

society they serve. He focuses in particular on the lives of migrants in Los Angeles. Gomez's work has been exhibited in institutions across the United States, among them the Smithsonian

Portrait Museum, the Los Angeles County Museum of Art (LACMA), the Denver Art Museum and the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston.

A participant in the 2017 Whitney Biennial, his work was featured in three exhibitions of the Getty's Pacific Standard Time: LA/LA initiative, including LACMA's important international group show, "Home — So Different, So Appealing." Gomez studied at California Institute of the Arts.

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NMSU's Borderlands and Ethnic Studies interactive virtual art exhibit unveils the history of social justice

New Mexico State University's Borderlands and Ethnic Studies (BES) program has received a \$50,000 grant from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation (WKKF) to support an interactive virtual art exhibit to engage the often-untold history of social justice issues in the border region, enhancing a program whose enrollment has doubled since last year.

"This virtual art show comes at an excellent time when racial justice is being fought for in the streets, and people's hearts and minds are softening to the idea that a pluralistic and welcoming world for all is possible," said BES Director Dulcinea Lara.

The program is in the NMSU College of Arts and Sciences, where it

provides students a multidisciplinary graduate certification that aims to educate graduate students, including local teachers, to build their capacity to help students explore issues that are dividing the nation. Many students come from out-of-state to learn about the field of ethnic studies from a border perspective.

"In light of recent events surrounding global and national racial justice movements, students have written to me directly asking how they can get into the program because they want to be equipped for the changing times and to learn about what it really means to 'decolonize' and to be 'anti-racist,'" Lara said.

"This program will build awareness and cultural understanding of life at the U.S. and Mexico border, and allow students to examine the intersection of race, ethnicity and gender and its impact on

our communities today," said Victoria Tafoya, program officer with the Kellogg Foundation. "By engaging students and their families in the process, this exhibit will create a much-needed space for learning and healing."

Lara, an associate professor of criminal justice, and fellow criminal justice associate professor

Nicholas Natividad will lead the creation of the new museum installations, titled "Pasos Ajenos," that will speak to the social inequalities and injustices along the border. Lara and Natividad will work with local artist and museum fabricator Daniel Aguilera, an NMSU alumus, to create what they describe as an "inviting, beautiful and healing experience."

"We hope the interactive museum exhibit will facilitate a much-needed dialogue on all the dehumanizing practices in the border region," Natividad said. "We are at a critical moment in this country where we need to increase conversations on social justice and develop and build a 're-humanizing' curriculum in higher education. The exhibit and new Borderlands and

Ethnics Studies program will achieve both."

The 14-part installment will be open to the public, in both English and Spanish, later this fall at the NMSU Art Museum, pending the COVID-19 pandemic. Some of the installations featured will take a closer look at immigration policies, labor laws, environmental justice issues and the omission of indigenous perspectives in the shaping of the borderlands.

"Foremost in our imagination and intent is that 'healing' is central to our exhibit's purpose," Lara said. "Living in the borderlands comes with challenges presented by historical legacies of injustice and pain. We want visitors of all ages to come and see themselves in an exhibit that speaks unapologetically to problems

we face in this region in order to spark thoughtful dialogue about how to start mending oppressions and inequalities."

The WKKF, founded in 1930 as an independent, private foundation by breakfast-cereal innovator and entrepreneur Will Keith Kellogg, is among the largest philanthropic foundations in the United States.

Guided by the belief that all children should have an equal opportunity to thrive, WKKF works with communities to create conditions for vulnerable children so they can realize their full potential in school, work and life. Visit www.wkkf.org.

NMSU, DACC among film schools receiving New Mexico Film Office funds

The New Mexico Film Office (NMFO) has announced that 20 film programs at higher education institutions throughout New Mexico — including New Mexico State University and Doña Ana Community College — have received a total of \$330,000 in funding from the NMFO’s Non-Resident Below-the-Line Crew Credit Program.

Funds will be utilized to purchase equipment, soft-



ware, materials and supplies and can be applied to student scholarship programs and other student opportunities, NMFO said in a news release.

The Giveback funds come from film and television production companies that have taken part in the state’s film incentive program. The purpose of the program is to strengthen New Mexico’s

educational programs that teach film/television production and related fields, thereby supporting growth of the film industry workforce in New Mexico.

“The Giveback Program was established to ensure production companies that come to New Mexico also make an investment in New Mexico’s future workforce,” said New

Mexico Economic Development Department (NMEDD) Cabinet Sec. Alicia J. Keyes.

NMFO is part of NMEDD.

Schools receiving funding include DACC and NMSU Las Cruces, Alamogordo, Carlsbad and Grants.

“These awards are another example of the positive and wide-reaching impact film and TV production has on a community, beyond just the cast and crew, or even shoot-

ing location. Students in Alamogordo and Portales benefit from productions that are shot in Albuquerque and Las Cruces,” NMFO Director Amber Dodson said. “The funds from the studios and production companies are an important contribution to, and a long-term investment in, New Mexico’s film industry, and are key to continuing to support and expand our world-class workforce.”

The Giveback program was initiated to support

the growth of the New Mexico film industry’s future workforce. Productions filmed in New Mexico that participate in the Non-Resident Below-the-Line Crew Credit Program are required to provide 2.5 percent of direct production expenditures for the payment of wages, fringe benefits and per diem for non-resident industry crew to support educational or workforce development efforts in New Mexico.

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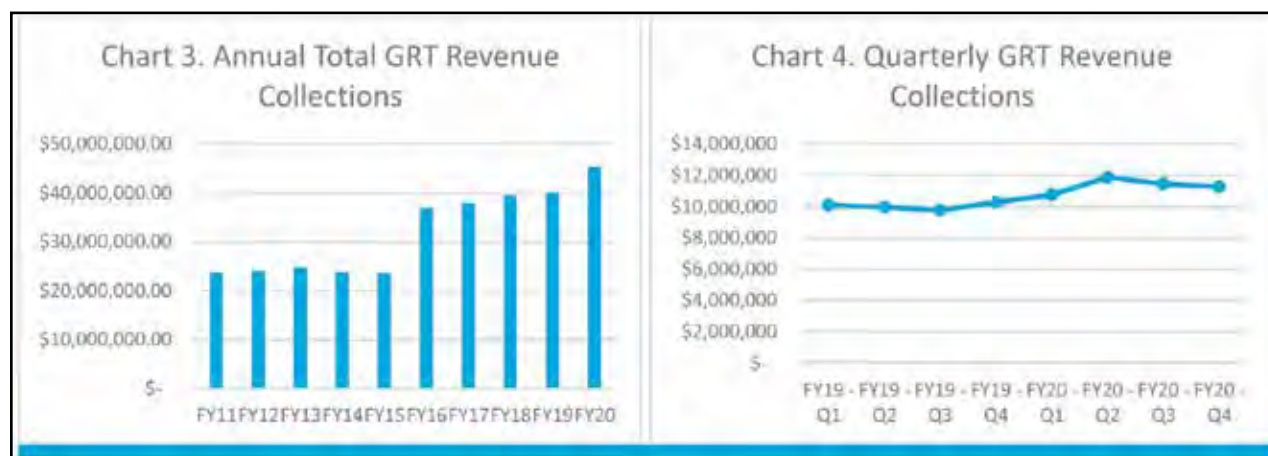

Consumer spending shows resiliency in many of New Mexico's counties

A report from the New Mexico Economic Development Department (NMEDD) shows that New Mexico “might be more resilient than first expected,” Deputy NMEDD Sec. Jon Clark said, despite the impact of COVID-19. While consumer spending as shown through gross receipts dipped in many counties during the last quarter of FY19 (which ended June 30), it remained steadier over the 12-month fiscal year, Clark said.

“We know accommodations and food services, as well as arts and entertainment, have really suffered,

but construction has remained robust, and not just in the counties with energy production,” Clark said.

Clark said there is still a great deal of uncertainty because so much of the consumer and business spending was boosted by emergency federal stimulus to unemployed workers, families and business owners from U.S. Small Business Administration loans.

The decline in federal stimulus money for the unemployed means \$40 million less a week in available spending from state residents, he said.

“The reports show that New Mexico can climb

back out of the hole and we don't have to have a deep recession,” Clark said. “But we are going to need a little continuing federal support until businesses can fully reopen.”

Overall matched gross receipts tax (GRT) statewide declined two percent in the quarter, with food and accommodation seeing a 31 percent statewide decline and arts and entertainment dropping 68 percent, the report said. GRT for retail trade, including some online sales, increased 11 percent statewide in the quarter. Construction GRT statewide was 28 percent higher in the quarter.

The County Reports

project is an NMEDD initiative to offer more comprehensive data about spending, unemployment and wages to local communities, NMEDD Sec. Alicia J. Keyes said.

The most recent data covers the last three months of fiscal year 2020 — April, May and June. Clark said that the latest information is aggregated from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, the U.S. Census Bureau, the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis, NMEDD and the New Mexico departments of Taxation and Revenue and Workforce Solutions.

Construction industry drives county increase in gross receipts

Doña Ana County saw a decrease of \$11.9 million (one percent) in its matched taxable gross receipts from the third to the fourth quarter of FY20, the New Mexico Economic Development Department (NMEDD) said in an August report. The county saw a \$51.7 million (five percent) increase in the FY20 fourth quarter as compared to the same three months in FY19, NMEDD said.

The county's construction industry did particularly well in the FY20 final quarter, the report said, with a growth of \$81.6 million over the fourth quarter of FY19. The accommodation and food services industry saw the largest decline, dropping by \$23.3 million when the final quarters of FY20 and FY19 were compared.

The arts entertainment/recreation industry saw the largest percent change in Q4 FY20, declining by 81 percent (\$6.3 million).

The unclassified establishments industry saw a 76 percent decrease in the fourth quarter, NMEDD said. This decrease is not necessarily related to the negative impacts of COVID-19, the report said, and may be due to the correction of classification errors by the businesses in the industry.

Annual gross receipts tax (GRT) revenue collections saw a 13 percent increase from FY19 to FY20 in the county, with FY20 totaling \$45.4 million. Quarterly GRT collections saw a two percent decrease from the third to the fourth quarter of FY20. The fourth quarter saw an increase of 10 percent, equaling a growth of \$990,000 over the same quarter in FY19.

Among metropolitan areas of New Mexico, Doña Ana County (Las Cruces) showed a five percent GRT increase in the fourth quarter of FY20, NMEDD said. Sandoval County (Rio Rancho) showed an increase of 37 percent, while Santa Fe County (City of Santa Fe) was down 16 percent and Bernalillo County (Albuquerque) was down six percent.

Area entities to receive \$17 million in CARES Act funds

Doña Ana County and the cities of Las Cruces, Anthony and Sunland Park will share in more than \$17 million as part of almost \$150 million in federal CARES Act grants to local governments and small businesses across the state to offset expenses related to COVID-19.

"It goes to show that we understand the impact not only across New Mexico but across the country that this pandemic is having," Lt. Gov. Howie Morales said.

Morales said the state is grateful to its federal

congressional delegation for their support, and for its partnerships with communities across New Mexico.

"We're all in this together," Morales said.

The grants also point out how important an accurate count in the 2020 U.S. Census is for New Mexico, Morales said, because federal funds are allocated based on population figures. The Census has been taken every 10 years since 1790, the lieutenant governor said, and has shown a gradual decline in participation during the past two-plus centuries.

"We have to reverse that," Morales said, noting that accurate numbers will impact the federal funding New Mexico receives for health care, childcare, infrastructure, education, etc.

Morales said that while there is "a lot of fear" among some residents about filling out the Census form, it is "simply just a population count." The form contains no questions about citizenship or political affiliation and does not require a Social Security number.

Morales said the CARES Act funds can be spent on a wide range of expenses that governmental entities have incurred during COVID. A news release from the governor's office said those expenses include childcare assistance, personal protective equipment, public health and

safety personnel, senior programs, corrections, law enforcement, fire and EMS services.

The small business grants can go for payroll, rent, mortgage payments, insurance, utilities and technology to facilitate employees working at home, as well as health and safety and other business expenses.

The New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration received 83 local government applications for \$199.83 million in CARES Act funds made available to local governments and 66 applications for \$49.963 million made available to small business grants via

local governments, the news release said. Applications were open to almost all of New Mexico's local governments for those funds, except for the city of Albuquerque and Bernalillo County, which received CARES Act funds directly from the federal government.

Local government grants went to the City of Anthony: \$50,000; Doña Ana County: \$1.4 million; City of Las Cruces: \$7,104,802; City of Sunland Park: \$77,656. The local grant awards for small businesses via local governments were Doña Ana County: \$3,039,750; City of Las Cruces: \$5,440,188.

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THE LAS CRUCES
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Out of the Darkness Walk aids suicide prevention

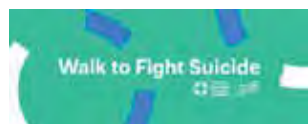

New Mexico is the state with the highest suicide per capita deaths, said Robyn Rehbein-Narvaez, a board member and walk organizer for the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention-New Mexico Chapter.

“It’s taking away so many of our people, and most people know somebody who has attempted suicide or lost someone who committed suicide,” she said. “It’s killing our New Mexicans, but it’s absolutely preventable.”

The Las Cruces Out of the Darkness Walk, she said, is an opportunity for people who have been touched by suicide to come together for education and support. Rehbein-Narvaez is a clinical supervisor and registered play therapist-supervisor at a local mental health facility, and she said it is critical for survivors to know they are supported and not alone.

“This year [on Sept. 19] it was to be our third annual walk,” she said. “However, due to COVID-19 restrictions, we have moved the walk to a virtual experience. While the Out of the Darkness Walks in New Mexico are going to look different this year, our mission to save lives and bring hope



to those affected by suicide has not changed.”

A mental health practitioner since 2003, Rehbein-Narvaez said she works with individuals who are suicidal and has seen the numbers get worse and worse.

“My nephew took his own life at age 27 and that spurred me into more advocacy,” she said. “In February 2018, I lost my nephew to depression and anxiety by the means of suicide. The answer is mental health resources. Typically, they are someone suffering from a mental health issue. What can we do? Meds, therapy, watching for signs, asking the person how they are doing, getting them help and treatment of the mental health issue.”

While Rehbein-Narvaez said she doesn’t have any statistics about how isolation engendered by the COVID-19 fears has impacted suicide rates, she does know of at least two local teenagers who have taken their own lives over the summer.

Las Cruces high schoolers normally have the opportunity to visit school-based health centers and talk confiden-

tially with a therapist. But now, she said, they can’t go there and receive those services.

“Mental health and suicide prevention are more important than ever,” Rehbein-Narvaez said. “We’re confident that with your help we can reach more people than ever before. Our community has always been the heart of the Out of the Darkness walks. We realize that nothing can substitute the experience of coming together in person, and we will continue to seek ways

in which we can do that safely. Until that time comes, we will use our voices and share our stories virtually to provide hope.”

The New Mexico Out of the Darkness Experience is a real walk this year, she said, but on individual terms. Walkers get to choose their own course, what time they start and who walks next to them (within safe distancing guidelines).

New Mexico has the highest percentage of children in need

BULLETIN REPORT

In late August, the personal finance website WalletHub released its report on 2020's States with the Most Underprivileged Children, showing New Mexico as the state with the highest percentage of children in need.

WalletHub compared the 50 states and the District of Columbia using

three key dimensions: socio-economic welfare, health and education, along with 27 measures of neediness to create the report.

Here are New Mexico's welfare of children rankings (first is the most, 25 is average):

- Second in percentage of children in households with below-poverty income

- 10th in percentage of maltreated children
- Second in child food-insecurity rate
- 14th in percentage of uninsured children
- 30th in infant mortality rate
- Fourth in percentage of children in single-parent families
- 15th in child and youth homeless rate

- 21st in WalletHub's "States with the best health infrastructure for coronavirus" tally. New Mexico was followed in the report, in second-fifth place, by Mississippi, D.C., Alaska and West Virginia. New Jersey was the state with the lowest percentage of underprivileged children, the report, said, followed,

in second-fifth place, by Utah, Connecticut, Virginia and New Hampshire. Arizona was 10th in the survey, Texas was 31st and Colorado was 40th.

The U.S. has the seventh highest rate of child poverty — more than 29 percent — among economically developed countries, the WalletHub

report said. According to the Children's Defense Fund, a child is abused or neglected every 47 seconds and the total costs of maltreatment per year reach \$80.3 billion.

Spirited conversation about children's books is both stimulating and entertaining. Getting together with someone else to think up new endings for familiar stories is fun, requires critical thinking and provides opportunity for meaningful dialog.

Reading together with children and with other adults invites us to consider how the choices characters make affect story outcomes.

Playwright Topher Payne hosts a weekly online children's story time as part of the Atlanta Artists Relief Fund project. He encourages parents and children to talk about the choices characters make and imagine what would happen if they made other choices.

"I started goofing around with picture books by looking at them through a contemporary lens," Payne said. "My silly little parodies are

inspiring some not-so-silly conversation, and I think that's swell."

He started with "The Giving Tree," by Shel Silverstein. "Even as a child," Payne says, "I felt that the boy was up to no good." In his parody, the title has been tweaked to "The Tree that Set Healthy Boundaries."

In Silverstein's story, a boy and a tree have a special bond. As Boy grows up, the tree is always there to provide for him until the tree is reduced to a stump.

In Payne's revised ending, the tree suggests they develop a healthier relationship. After some serious self-improvement Tree and Boy go into business together selling apple pies.

Writing new endings is thought provoking and leads to great conversations for adults as well as children. This is a great activity to try with your

friends.

I was surprised by differing views and very spirited conversation when I shared Payne's revision of Robert Munssh's "I Love You Forever" with three friends.

"It's a beautiful story," Payne said. "When the mother's actions are taken metaphorically, it expresses a parent's boundless love for her child and the desire to nurture and offer affection at all stages of the child's life. But when taken literally, it's a bit iffy, to say the least — especially because of the implication that the son will repeat his mom's slightly creepy behavior."

In Payne's version, "I Love You Forever, and I'll Call Before I Come Over," the grown son draws the line when his mother sneaks into his bedroom while he sleeps. He bars the windows and shuts mom out. Later, he realizes that they both are hurt by this enforced isolation, so he engages mom in an honest conversation

about each of their needs and limits. In the revised ending, the son says, "I love you forever, I like you for always, as long as I'm living my mommy you'll be."

Next time you Zoom with your book club or writers group, try this: Get a copy of a well-known classic and discuss how you would change the main character's behavior at a crucial moment, or download a copy of Payne's beautifully illustrated alternate ending from <https://www.topherpayne.com/fixed-it>.

Bifurcation: Golf for pros, and for the rest of us

Last week, we examined golf's Distance Insights Project report announcing the long-awaited concerted research effort to explore in great detail the detrimental effects that the distances many of the PGA Tour pros are driving the golf ball are having on the game.

Up for research are clubs, balls and other distance-related issues. The game's guardians feel that distance needs to be reined in for the sake of golf's own future. Distance worries involve a mere 0.1 percent (at most) of golfers everywhere. Lots of seniors, including me, want golf balls that

go farther, not shorter.

A monumental issue in launching the Distance Project is what's called "bifurcation," which simply means the idea of having one set of rules and equipment specs for the pros (and elite players) and a different set for everyday recreational golfers.

Let's start with equipment. Tour pros get their clubs tweaked every week, because the club companies have workshops inside their vans on-site. Tour officials test a small fraction of clubs (mostly drivers) for nonconformance, but the truth is that many il-

legal clubs make it to the course.

When I go to the PGA Show in Orlando, I get to try a dozen clubs for a day. The pros try clubs week-in and week-out. They get virtually fitted daily, partly via expensive Trackman units.

What's more, the tour provides fitness trailers, like fully enclosed gyms, at every tournament site. We don't have that.

A few weeks ago, Brooks Koepka had a personal trainer come out on the golf course to limber up his stiff hips mid-round. I sometimes need limbering up between nines. Where are my trainers? Bifurcation.

Dare I mention rules of officials and free drops from

things like grandstands, when the shot probably was out of bounds? Just one example of different rules for the PGA is that a player may not change brand or style of ball throughout the round; we can legally change balls every hole. Bifurcation.

It means "divided into two branches;" yes, the pros and everyone else. True, the idea of the game is still the same; the appearance of golf courses, generally speaking, is the same. But there are two different types of players, two different conditions and two different circumstances.

How about ShotLink data, indicating precise distances of every shot to a fraction, along with

calculations of strokes gained for every possible variation, so players know exactly what to improve on? It's a wonder they're not even better!

And caddies. I wish we had caddies. I like to walk, but I dislike lugging a bag or pulling a trolley. Caddies know yardages from even the weirdest spots, and they know when to calm their player down. They help their players interpret the always available (but expensive) greens books. Where are our greens books? Don't forget the dozens of TV cameras that show the blades of grass (and ball wobble) in close-up and slow-mo.

For the PGA Tour pros, golf is a job. For the rest

of us, it's a pastime and recreation. Therein lies the main bifurcation. The pros have a team: a personal trainer, swing coach, mental coach, agent, accountant, chef and others.

We have daily blogs on GolfPass and Morning Read. Then there are the course conditions. Yes, tour rough is longer, but the bunkers are dry, white and fluffy, and easier to hit out of. Greens are smooth, fast and pristine. But we play in four hours.
