SCRTD receives \$62,500 grant for 10-year plan

A 10-year public transportation plan for the South Central Regional Transit District will be launched this

fall, regional planners informed the District Board.

The \$62,500 study and plan, funded through a grant from the New Mexico Department of Transportation and District members will be conducted by SBLB, LLC.

The district last updated its 5-year plan in 2015, available at scrtld.org. SCRTD serves Doña Ana, Otero and Sierra Counties.

"The Plan looks at regional goals and objectives for public transit, route designs, local and regional funding sources, performance measures and targets, levels of service and what areas should be served by transit," said SCRTD's Executive Director David Armijo.

Javier Perea, District Chair and City of Sunland Park mayor, added, "We need to focus on how to respond to growing demand for public transportation throughout our region, while identifying funding to

ensure sustainability."

SBLB, LLC was selected based on experience and expertise in transit planning, ridership, forecasting modeling and its track record working with transit agencies.

Kirk Scott, an SBLB representative will manage the project, direct the planning process and coordinate input and feedback from regional transit operators, including the Mesilla Valley Metropolitan Planning Organization, MPO, and the City of Las Cruces's Road-Runner transit system.

SCRTD's website will be updated throughout the planning process to provide the public up-to-date information and opportunities to participate in the study, via online surveys.

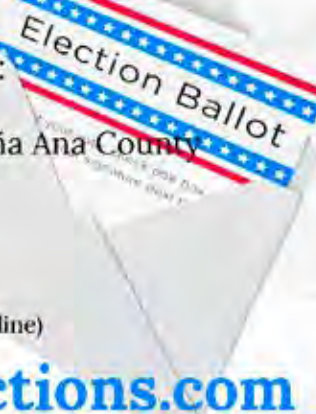

Remembering Sept. 11, 2001

On Sept. 11, both the Las Cruces Fire Depart-

ment and New Mexico State University held remembrance events for those who died 19 years in the 2001 terror-

ist attacks in New York, Washington, D.C. and Pennsylvania.

At Las Cruces Fire Station #1 on Picacho Av-

enue, the fire department honor guard marched from 8:30 a.m. until nearly noon. They performed a bell ceremony at 9:03 a.m. The ceremony ended with the words, "And so, to those who have selflessly given their lives for the good of their fellow man. Their tasks completed. Their duties well done. To our comrades, their last alarm. They're going home."

On the north side of Aggie Pride Field at the Horseshoe on the NMSU campus, the ROTC, Honor Guard and Army Cannon Crew gathered, masked and distanced, to honor the victims of the 9/11/2001 terror attacks.

The cannon was fired six times: at 8:46 a.m. for

Flight 11, which struck the North Tower of the World Trade Center; at 9:03 for Flight 175, which struck the South Tower at the World Trade Center; at 9:37 a.m. for Flight 77, which struck the Pen-

tagon; at 9:59 a.m. for the fall of the South Tower; at 10:03 a.m. for Flight 93, which crashed near Shanksville, Pennsylvania; and at 10:28 a.m. for the fall of the North Tower.

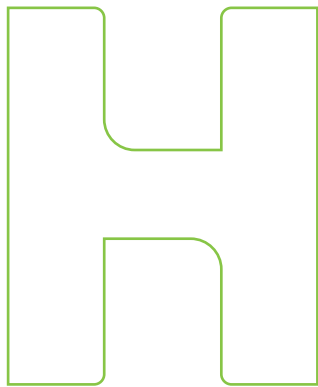

Know Your Metal: Las Cruces Utilities Fights Gas Line Corrosion

Every pipe put in the ground can face damage, like rainwater shifting dirt and a line being punctured by rocks. However, steel gas lines face other challenges; they can corrode with rust over time. There are specific sacrifices involved in maintaining the lines - in this case, it's another chunk of metal, called a sacrificial anode, that takes the heat for corrosion instead of the gas line.

Similar to what might be found in a home's water heater, these sacrificial anodes are designed and placed to protect gas lines, along with specific coating on the pipes themselves that protects the steel from the corrosive effect of the soil.

"One way to think about corrosion is that steel wants to go back to its natural state and the steel uses the weaker metal, the magnesium anode, to absorb the electrons that would cause the corrosion in the steel pipe," said Pete Duran, Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) interim gas system operations supervisor.

Throughout the city, LCU installs magnesium anodes near a gas line, usually based on need and on schedule. The anodes can last up to 10 years and are regularly inspected. If the potential - essentially an electrical reading - in a gas pipe changes, that can be an indication that

an anode might be needed.

Near the I-10 entrance on Avenida de Mesilla, a new anode was being installed by Carlos Lopez, LCU senior gas cathodic protection technician.

"This 17-pound magnesium anode can protect up to 500 feet of a gas line," Lopez said. The metal is surround by a bag

of powdered gypsum and bentonite clay. Once Lopez attaches the wires from the gas pipe to the anode about four feet away, he dumps water to activate the metal and help it settle it into the ground.

Duran said, "With the anode coming in at under a hundred dollars, it's a much cheaper solution than to dig up an entire line when it corrodes."

Save some green chile for this New Mexico greenhorn

“... like a tree planted by the water ... it does not fear when heat comes; its leaves are always green and it has no worries in a year of drought.”

Lying flat on my back, I gazed up through the leaves of the cottonwood tree at a perfect New Mexico sky.

The tree was 30 feet high, and I lay halfway up it. I was able to do this not because I have mastered levitation, but because a billion white gypsum crystals were supporting me. The White Sands, with their unpredictable blowing patterns, had created a dune over this cottonwood, leaving its top half exposed, enabling me to lay underneath it.

On other occasions, hiking through the Sacramento Mountains, I've heard the wind rustling through the aspen leaves, in a way that sounds like there's an ocean nearby, or a raging river.

Aspen trees are related to cottonwoods, and their leaves look a lot alike, at least to my untrained eyes.

I spent 13 years living in Alamogordo, which is a pseudo-Spanish word for “fat aspen.” This month marks my 10th year working at the Las Cruces Bulletin, and my 25th year as a New Mexican. That seems like a lot of time, but in terms of the Land of Enchantment, being here for only a quarter century qualifies me as a greenhorn.

I've walked through pinon trees at Aguirre Spring in the Organ Mountains, in stretches where there is so much greenery and flowing water you would not believe you were in New Mexico. Until, that is, you get to a high spot on the trail, from where you can see the White Sands, the San Andres Mountains, the Missile Range and the whole Tularosa Basin sprawling below.

I've leaned against a cottonwood tree at the edge of the Santa Cruz River, dangling my bare feet in it, after praying at the nearby El Santuario de Chimayo.

I've walked through some of the tallest trees in the state at the Carson National Forest in the Enchanted Circle near Eagle Nest, and shared a post-hike beverage with newfound

friends at the Comanche Creek Brewery, which you won't find unless you already know about it or you're incredibly lucky enough to find the most beautiful setting of any beermaker you could imagine.

I've seen eagles fly frighteningly close to my vehicle in the Cibola National Forest near Corona. I've hiked along the river in Chama Canyon, sharing the big skies and beautiful cliffs with clairvoyant ravens.

For 25 autumns now, I've walked in and among, and driven past the cottonwoods in their golden time of year along the bosque up and down the Rio Grande.

I've planted a beautiful Mexican elder, and buried our beautiful English pointer, Rosey,

Mr. Moses imagined himself dressed like the cowboy on the cover of the catalogue, jangling out to feed the cows and break ice. Him hangin' his giant rowel and jingle bob on the twine as

he kicked a bale off the back of the flatbed.

Being jerked flat into the muddy rut, cows tromping giant footprints on the tail of his coat, the dog running off with his pancake hat. Then rising, sodden and trudging off rattling and clanging like a Moroccan bride with a limp.

“Shoot,” he said, “I couldn't even walk up to a horse dressed like that.”

Mr. Moses considers himself a Carhartt cowboy. For those of you who live in the tropics, Carhartts are warm, insulated canvas coveralls with more zip-pers than a Hell's Angel's loin cloth.

Amendment asks voters to give up power

As a general rule, I think elections are better than appointments, and more perspectives are better than fewer. And so, the proposed constitutional amendment to reform the state's Public Regulation Commission comes to the plate with two strikes against it in my scorebook.

made it to my house thus far. Their primary argument is that energy regulation is a complex field that should be led by experts, not back-slapping politicians who have visited every Rotary Club in their district, but none of the power plants.

There have been plenty of those over the years.

The PRC was created by a constitutional amendment passed by voters in 1996 merging the State Corporation Commission with the Public Utility Commission. The result was a regulatory behemoth responsible for everything from insurance to taxi cabs to power companies.

Voters passed a constitutional amendment in 2012 narrowing the PRC's scope by moving authority to regulate corporations to the Secretary of State's Office and insurance companies to the Superintendent of Insurance.

That amendment also set new requirements to run for office, but the wording is open to interpretation. When current

PRC Commissioner Steve Fischmann ran for the seat in 2018, an unsuccessful lawsuit was filed claiming that his past experience in the state Senate and working for Levi Strauss & Co. did not meet the new requirement.

The push to reform the PRC in 2012 came after a string of news stories showing the agency in a bad light. Commissioner E. Shirley Baca was arrested in 2002 after allegedly being caught with marijuana at the airport. Commissioner Carol Sloan was convicted of two felony counts after hitting another woman in the head with a rock in 2010. She believed the woman was having an affair with her husband. Commissioner Jerome Block Jr. was convicted of multiple felonies for misuse of a state-issued credit card in 2011.

The push for reform this year comes after a dispute between the PRC and the governor's office over a clean-energy bill passed by the Legislature in 2019. Implementation of the Energy Transition Act was stalled by the PRC when it refused to sign off on

financing plans for the decommissioning of the San Juan Generating Station.

In an email exchange with one of his constituents, Fischmann said he supports the proposed amendments, though he shares my concerns. Commissioners don't have a technical knowledge of the field they are regulating, they have had a difficult time retaining knowledgeable staff and too many decisions are based on political considerations, he said.

I'm still thinking it over.

The proposal to amend the PRC is the first of two constitutional amendments that will be on the ballot this year. The second would allow the Legislature to adjust the terms for local elected officials to align or stagger the elections.

The state's Legislative Council Service has a terrific analysis of the pros and cons of both proposed constitutional amendments on the Legislature's website, in the Publications section.

Regulate nicotine locally

To the editor:

The Las Cruces City Council has passed a resolution urging the New Mexico State legislature to repeal a state law initiated by the tobacco industry that does not allow counties or other municipalities to pass regulations more stringent than state law regulating the

sale of cigarettes, tobacco products and electronic smoking devices.

Data from the Center for Disease Control and Prevention indicate that, prior to COVID-19, tobacco use was the cause of 20 percent of annual deaths in the United States, making tobacco the leading cause of preventable death in the United States (JAMA, 4/28/2020). Survey data of

New Mexico high school students from last year (Youth Risk and Resilience Survey, 2019) shows that more than 30 percent of New Mexico youth used electronic vaping products at least once in the previous month.

Vaping and youth consumption of other nicotine products in New Mexico are at higher rates than the national average. Reducing nico-

tine exposure to tobacco products in youth is vital. Exposure to nicotine during adolescence may affect brain function in the areas of thinking, attention and mood. (JAMA, 4/28/2020).


Current state law contravenes the Office of Disease Prevention and Health Promotion’s goal to “eliminate state laws that preempt stronger local tobacco control

laws.” It seizes control from local policy makers who are uniquely positioned to better meet the needs of their communities and places it 300 miles away. Local policy makers, like the city council, have a better awareness of local circumstances.


The Unified Prevention Coalition for Doña Ana County wrote a strongly supportive letter to the

city council in favor of this resolution. We assured the council that we are ready to provide the City of Las Cruces backing and assistance in future public awareness and public education campaigns. We invite them to call on us.







Nuclear waste

To the editor:

I spent my 57-year career in science, so I ask us all to consider the issue of spent nuclear fuel burial in New Mexico.

The pro side: Safe burial of high-level waste supports nuclear electricity generation, which is low-carbon. Any relief from the carbon economy

and climate change is valuable. Keeping spent fuel at reactors around the country is some kind of accident waiting to happen. Finally burying it anywhere is a relief. France has an admirable record of managing nuclear power generation and waste disposal. Evaluating real risk vs. perceived risk overwhelmingly favors nu-

clear over coal. Estimated deaths from Chernobyl total 2,000, with a similar number from all causes (mostly evacuation accidents and degraded living conditions after evacuation) for Fukushima.

Reactors of intrinsic safety are being evaluated. The liquid fluoride thorium reactors (LFTR) and allied designs are promising; a 60 MW

LFTR operated at Oak Ridge for years but got killed for political/military reasons. China is building some now. The US legacy of expensive reactor designs came largely from the incompetents at the Department of Energy and the Nuclear Regulatory Commission back in the late '50s onward. Some house-cleaning has been

done, and more needs to be done, but we're on a better path now for reactor design, assessment, testing and certification. We just don't have many nuclear engineers now; they couldn't wait 30 years to be hired in our rather bizarre sociopolitical climate.

Cons: Fast-tracking might be done by the current administration, mak-

ing the safety evaluations quite suspect. This, too, shall pass.

New Mexico must take a reasoned stand. If we accept the spent fuel burial here, we must ask for deep consideration by the rest of the states. I think it can all be done, for the good of the planet.

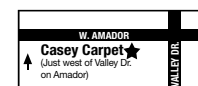

What's in Your Mailbox? Neither snow nor rain nor heat nor gloom of night

In 1775, Benjamin Franklin was appointed the first postmaster general of the United States.

Letters were taken to a post office, where the postmaster would note the postage in the upper right corner. The postage rate was based on the number of sheets in the letter and the distance it would travel.

Postage could be paid in advance by the writer, collected from the addressee on delivery or paid partially in advance and partially upon delivery. The Post Office Department issued its first postage stamps on July 1, 1847. In 1863, the cost to send a letter was two cents.

For more than 245 years, the Postal Service has lived by its unofficial creed: "Neither snow nor rain nor heat nor gloom of night stays these couriers from the swift completion of their appointed rounds." Unfortunately today, the "swift" part of that quote has slowed down a bit due to financial and legal concerns.

More than 200 federal laws protect the sanctity of the mail, and they are enforced by the Postal Inspection Service, which safeguards the Postal Service and its customers.

The Postal Service is the only delivery service that reaches every address in the nation: 152,920,433 residences, businesses and post office boxes (2013 statistic). No single operation in the world comes close to matching this level of connectivity.

No email in my computer box matches the connectivity and delight of finding a piece of personal, colorful, cheerful mail in my mailbox. This happens fairly often because I am signed in to postcrossing.com (yes, by website and email it's true and ironic), which gives me addresses from across the world to send postcards and gives others my address for postcards.

Personally I love this for many reasons:

- I get to share my beautiful part of the world with people across the world, specifically, 206 countries.
- I see many interesting things I never knew existed.
- I hear from folks from China to Timbuktu and Boston.
- I get messages, short and sweet, about other lives, books to read, life quotes, people's joys and so much more.
- I enjoy stamps – sharing them, looking at them. Stamps are little reflections of the life around them.

Since July 14, 2005, Postcrossing's inception, almost 58 million postcards have been received in mailboxes around the world by strangers reaching out to connect to one another. Personally, I have sent postcards for a total distance of 4,897,477 miles around the world since April 2009.

Postcards not your favorite thing? There are plenty of other options to share positive snail mail. There are pen pal sites, prison-letter specific sites and sites

where your mail can make a difference in a life that needs cheer — like moreloveletters.com, which connects you to people with mental and physical challenges who could use some positive connections. If you start a browser search with "write letters to," you can find many options.

The unofficial motto of the U.S. Post Office, the one about snow, rain and sleet, etc., derives from a passage in George Herbert Palmer's translation of "Herodotus' Histories," referring to the courier service of the ancient Persian Empire:

"It is said that as many days as there are in the whole journey, so many are the men and horses

that stand along the road, each horse and man at the interval of a day's journey; and these are stayed neither by snow nor rain nor heat nor darkness from accomplishing their appointed course with all speed."

This "Creed of the Postal Service" can be found on the wall of a former Washington D.C. post office, now the Smithsonian's National Postal Museum:

*Messenger of Sympathy and Love;
Servant of Parted Friends;
Consoler of the Lonely;
Bond of the Scattered Family;
Enlarger of the Common Life;
Carrier of News and*

*Knowledge;
Instrument of Trade and Industry;
Promoter of Mutual Acquaintance;
Of Peace and Goodwill,
Among Men and Nations.*

– Charles W. Eliot

President Woodrow Wilson changed the text slightly before the inscription was carved in the white granite of the building.

The Post Office has been connecting people to one another, delivering bad news and joy, documents and goods, according to a promise made 245 years ago by the government of these United States. Let's lay politics aside and celebrate the connection.

months, as have calls to the help lines.

Risk factors for suicide include isolation, financial strain, increased substance use and physical health issues — all factors experienced by our soci-

ety and exacerbated during this crisis. We want our community to know there are actions that can help. Effective programs and services exist, and assistance is available.

Know someone who may need help? Reach out. Direct them to a crisis line or to a behavioral health provider. In case

of emergency, call 911. We all have a role to play in suicide prevention, not only during the month of September, but all year long.

October has Harvest Moon, Blue Moon

There are two highly significant full moons in October 2020: The Harvest Moon, and, as any second full moon in a calendar month is called, the Blue Moon.

The Full Harvest Moon occurs at 3:05 p.m. MDT Thursday, Oct. 1. It's named the Harvest Moon because it's the full moon closest to (either before or after) the fall equinox, which is on Sept. 22 this year.

The second full moon in October, the Blue Moon, is at 8:49 a.m. Saturday, Oct. 31 – Halloween! Maybe this is blue because it's bumping the traditional October Full Moon, the Hunter's Moon.

As the full moon begins to rise in the east about sunset, it may appear bigger and more orange than it really is. That's called the moon illusion.

"Most of the time, the full moon isn't perfectly full," says space.com. "We always see the same side of the Moon, but part of it is in shadow. Only when the Moon, Earth and the Sun are perfectly aligned is the Moon 100 percent full, and that alignment produces a lunar eclipse."

"It turns out that the moon can appear bluish, as it did in 1883 after the volcano Krakatoa erupted (producing possibly the loudest noise in human history)," space.com Reference Editor Tim Sharp said. "Dust in the air acted as a filter, causing sunsets and the moon to [appear] green and blue all over the world, an event that NASA said is thought to have spawned the

Autumn: the defining season

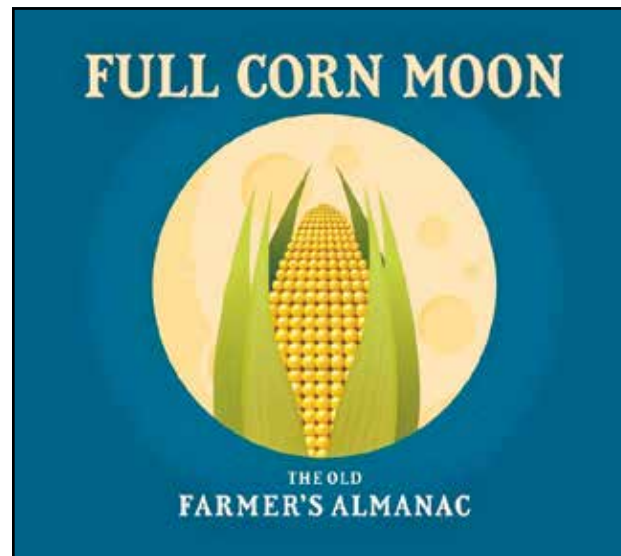

The long, hot summer of 2020 officially ends at 7:31 a.m. MDT Tuesday, Sept. 22: the fall equinox.

In much of the country, autumn is, of course, when leaves start turning from green to gold and orange. In New Mexico, it's when we roast chile.

"Equinox" and "autumn" are *aequus* (Latin for equal) in their loveliness, because each leads to multiple opportunities for word play; to wit:

The rest of equinox, *nox*, means "night." It is just about the only Latin root word I can think of that is spelled the same in the English version. Usually, there are several vowels, a couple of tildes and a



hyphen or two separating the Latin from the English – or perhaps they just highlight the yawning gap in my classical education.

The word autumn comes from the Middle English *autumpne* and the Latin *autumnus*. I like the

Latin version particularly, i.e., "There's a certain autumnus in the fall air." According to Wiktionary, the plural vocative case (it's a noun thing) of autumnus is *autumni*. That sounds to me like a bunch of rich people partaking of some decadent pleasure: "While the rest of us rake leaves, just look at all the *autumni* idling in the fall weather, sipping margaritas in their enclosed porches and laughing at us. I hate the autumnni."

Wiktionary says the origin of autumnus is unclear, but it could be

based on a Lithuanian word, *austi*, which means "to cool off." There is also a possibility that it comes from the Proto-Indo-European *h₂sows*, which means dry. It may also have been influenced by *auctus*: enriched, enlarged, ample.

All of this may explain why we often just call it the fall.

Por cierto (by the way), I also love the Spanish name for fall; esto es (to wit): "Mi estación favorita es el otoño."

Now for the tutorial:

"During the equinox, the Sun crosses what we call the 'celestial equator,' an imaginary extension into space of Earth's equator line," according to www.almanac.com. "The equinox occurs precisely when the Sun's center passes through this line. When the Sun crosses the equator from north to south, this marks the autumnal equinox; when it crosses from south to north, this marks the vernal (spring) equinox."

Community of Hope continues to pitch Tents to Rents

Tents to Rents, the campaign to help more Las Cruceans who are struggling with homelessness move into their own apartments, continues through Wednesday, Sept. 30. It takes only the touch of a computer button at tentstorents.org to make a donation of any size.

There are 11 sponsors this year, and you can make a donation to one of their Tents to Rents fundraising campaigns or donate without a sponsor. Good Samaritan Society Las Cruces village "Housing Helpers" raised \$24,472 for the 2019 Tents to Rents campaign, and the group was nearing the \$22,000 level for this year as of Sept. 10.

Because of state public health orders in response to COVID-19, the 2020 Tents to Rents campaign has been conducted entirely online. It had raised more than \$35,600 as of Sept. 10, said Mesilla Valley Com-



munity of Hope (MVCH) Executive Director Nicole Martinez. Since this year's campaign began Aug. 14, she said, MVCH has already been able to move two people into their own homes.

"We are so grateful for our participants raising the funding to support Camp Hope (tent city) as an emergency shelter and a springboard where people are helped to obtain housing," Martinez said.

Martinez came up with the idea for Tents to Rents in 2016. That year, with 10 participants and four sponsors, it raised more than \$13,000. In 2017, fundraising exceeded \$28,000. In 2018,

School district already thinking about 2022 bond issue; many 2018 projects complete

Second in a two-part series on Las Cruces Public Schools

Because of continuing population growth in that area, the construction of one or two new elementary schools on the East Mesa like will be at the top when Las Cruces Public Schools puts together its final list of bond projects to go before voters in February 2022, LCPS Superintendent Karen Trujillo said.

Construction at Columbia Elementary School likely also will be on the 2022 bond. The school closed in September 2018 because of mold.



LCPS is starting a feasibility study for the school that is expected to take two months to complete, LCPS Public Information Director Kelly Jameson said. "We don't know how much of the original building — if any at all — will be salvageable until that feasibility study is complete," Jameson said.

LCPS purchased the building that housed the Boots and Bourbon

bar next to the school district's central office at 505 S. Main St., and its renovation as a part of the continued construction of a new LCPS Operations

Complex could also be on the 2022 bond issue list, Trujillo said.

It also likely will include renovating multipurpose rooms at some elementary

schools; replacing school roofs; upgrading heating, ventilating and air conditioning (HVAC) systems; and other improvements to school buildings and

classrooms, Trujillo said.

LCPS is “trying to be as transparent as possible” as it moves forward with proposed bond projects, the superintendent said.

- High School intercom system: \$185,000; LCPS is working on the project design, with construction expected to begin in October; 3) IT projects: complete.
- Americans with Disabilities Act compliance districtwide: \$200,000, in progress;
 - Athletics: 1) New girls' gym lockers at Picacho Middle School: \$100,000, complete; 2) New gym bleachers at Oñate High School: \$280,000, complete; 3) Field of Dreams baseball complex field lights: \$120,000, complete; 4) New basketball court at Camino Real Middle School: \$55,000, complete;
 - New multipurpose room with new kitchen, remodeling of existing multipurpose room for additional instructional space at Fairacres Elementary School (\$7 million), Hillrise Elementary School (\$6 million) and Desert Hills Elementary School (\$2 million). Mayor, city councilors differ sharply on minimum wage

Mayor Ken Miyagishima and several Las Cruces city councilors exchanged sharp words during the Sept. 14 city work session as the council discussed an increase in the city minimum wage mandated to begin Jan. 1.

Under city ordinance, the local minimum wage would increase from \$10.10 an hour to \$10.25 an hour Jan. 1, 2021. That increase is based on the federal Consumer Price Index in August, which the U.S. Department of Labor just announced, city Chief Budget Officer Leeann DeMouche said at the meeting. But the

actual increase will be to \$10.50 an hour because the higher figure is the state minimum wage adopted by the New Mexico Legislature, which the local minimum wage must equal.

Currently, tipped employees (waiters and waitresses) in Las Cruces earn 40 percent of the minimum wage, \$4.10 an hour, as compared to the state minimum wage for tipped employees of \$2.35 an hour.

The mayor suggested that the council consider temporarily following the state minimum wage for tipped employees. Those employees would have guaranteed earnings of at least \$10.50 an hour

beginning in January even with the temporary reduction, the mayor said, because employers would be required to make up any gap.

"If we could drop to the state rate, I think it would be extremely welcome," Miyagishima said. He suggested that the reduction be for four months, six months or up to one year before returning to the higher pay rate.

"You guys have no idea what it takes to run a business," Miyagishima told the council. "It's hard to make the payroll. This is the time they need us."

With some federal support for businesses during the current public health pandemic having run out,

he said, "the next two months are going to be very, very difficult" for local businesses, including restaurants. "The business owners are in for a tough time," the mayor said. "This is an opportunity to help. This is what our reality is. They've mortgaged everything they have."

"I want you to acknowledge this is difficult for the workers as well," Mayor Pro-tem Kasandra Gandara replied to the mayor. She recommended separate council work sessions for business owners and employees before the council makes a final decision. "Business owners would overpower workers' concerns," Gandara

said. "Workers feel ... that they don't have a voice in this. I just want to make sure that we are helping everybody out."

"I'm really disappointed in your reaction, Mayor," Councilor Johana Bencomo said. "This is a team effort. Low-wage workers are also on life support. Let's find ways to support our small business community that isn't on the backs of our workers."

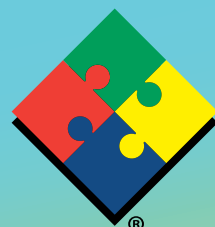
Councilor Tessa Abeyta-Stuve said she would like to "hear from servers right now – What is it looking like right now during this time of COVID?" The council, she said, should "be specific in our language to make sure the workers are pro-

tected as well."

"This is a tough one," Councilor Yvonne Flores said. "With COVID the way it is, I don't think it's going to change in six months. I think we've had so much upheaval already between business and employees, I'd rather leave it the way it is now, because we're higher than the state minimum wage for servers, for tipped workers." The "scenario has changed because we have a lot fewer people eating out," Flores said.

DeMouche said the city must advertise the new minimum wage by Oct. 15.

The council has scheduled a Sept. 22 work session to further discuss the matter.

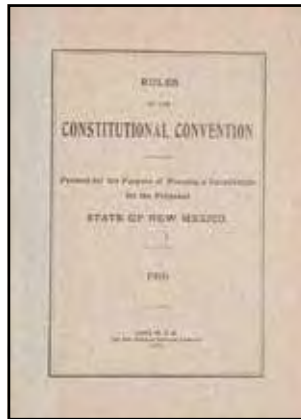
November ballot includes two constitutional amendments, three bond issues

In addition to candidates running for federal, statewide, legislative and local offices, the 2020 General Election ballot contains two proposed constitutional amendments and three statewide bond issues.

Constitutional amendments

- One proposed amendment would change the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission from a five-member elected body to a three-member appointed body. If the amendment passes, beginning Jan. 1, 2023, the commission would drop from five to three members who would be appointed by the governor with the consent of the state Senate. The governor would make appointments based on recommendations from the state Public Regulation Nominating Committee. Appointments



- would be for six-year terms, with no member serving more than two consecutive terms. No more than two members of the commission could be of the same political party. The first three members of the commission would be appointed to two-, four- and six-year terms so staggered going forward.
- The other proposed constitutional amendment would allow the state legislature to adjust non-statewide elections and terms of office to balance the number of offices that are on the so-called



presidential and gubernatorial ballots. New Mexico gubernatorial elections are in 2022 and every four years after that. Presidential elections after this year are in 2024 and every four years after that. The amendment was proposed after the New Mexico Supreme Court ruled that certain provisions of state House Bill 407 were unconstitutional. That bill, passed in 2019, divided non-statewide elections between presidential and gubernatorial ballots, but district attorneys whose terms would have been lengthened by two years under the law filed suit against the state.

Bond issues

- One bond issue would

allocate \$33.3 million for 96 senior-citizen facility improvement, construction and equipment-acquisition projects statewide, including these in Doña Ana County: \$249,000 to purchase vehicles for the Anthony Community Center; \$100,000 for renovations to the Doña Ana Community Center; \$930,000 for the East Mesa/Sage Cafe Senior Center; \$974,000 for Munson Senior Center; \$45,000 for renovations to the Placitas Community Center; and \$116,000 for renovations to the Radium Springs Community Center.

- Another bond issue would allocate \$9.7 million for library acquisitions at public libraries, public school libraries, academic libraries and tribal libraries statewide, including \$3.5 million to purchase and install broadband Internet equipment and infrastructure at public and tribal libraries

statewide; \$3 million for supplemental library resource acquisitions, including books, equipment, electronic and other resources for academic libraries statewide; \$3 million for equipment and acquisitions at public school libraries statewide; \$3 million for supplemental library resource acquisitions and other resources for academic libraries statewide; and \$3 million for equipment and resources at public school libraries statewide.

- A third bond issue would allocate \$156.3 million for public higher education institutions, special public schools and tribal schools, including about \$30 million for New Mexico State University. NMSU projects would include, in Las Cruces: \$18 million for science and engineering facilities for agricultural research; \$3 million for information technology infra-

structure upgrades and replacement and a new infrastructure and information technology building; \$1.86 million for a creative campus media building at Doña Ana Community College; in Alamogordo: \$900,000 to renovate and repair ductwork and boiler feed lines in classroom buildings; and \$900,000 to renovate and furnish the physical plant building; in Grants: \$1.3 million to upgrade Martinez Hall; in Carlsbad, \$1.5 million for campus-wide infrastructure, parking lot and site improvements, including roofs and accessibility compliance; and statewide, \$3 million to renovate and improve NMSU agricultural science centers.

County clerk's office begins sending absentee ballot applications

Pursuant to changes enacted by the New Mexico Legislature during the 2020 special session, the Doña Ana County Clerk's Office began sending absentee ballot applications to more than 90,000 eli-

gible voters Sept. 14.

The mailing will include voters who have voted, registered to vote or updated their voter registration since Dec. 31, 2015. It will not include voters who already successfully applied for an absentee ballot for the 2020 general election before Aug. 31.

"We want to make sure

we are doing all we can to offer eligible voters every opportunity to make their voices heard in this year's election," said Doña Ana County Clerk Amanda López Askin. "Whether voters decided to participate via absentee ballot, in person during early voting or in person on Election Day, I know that

when more eligible voters vote, the better we are as a community. Our office is hoping and preparing for a large turnout."

Voters only need one approved application for the 2020 general election on file to receive an absentee ballot, and applicants can track the status of their applications online at

NMVote.org. The deadline to apply for an absentee ballot is Tuesday, Oct. 20.

As of Sept. 14, more than 15,000 of the county's registered voters had already successfully applied for an absentee ballot for the 2020 general election. The clerk's office will begin to mail absentee ballots to voters with ap-

proved applications Oct. 6.

The voter or the voter's immediate family member or caregiver may return a completed absentee ballot to the clerk's office or to any voting convenience center during early voting and on Election Day. If returning an absentee

Six presidential candidates are on the New Mexico ballot

There are six candidates for president of the United States on the Nov. 3 ballot in New Mexico, including one who is a native New Mexican and another who was born in El Paso.

The candidates are

- Republican incumbent Donald John Trump, 74, a native of New York, who had never held public office before being elected the 45th president of the United States in 2016. Former Indiana Gov. Michael Richard Pence, 61, is seeking his second term as vice president. Pence, a native of Columbus, Indiana, served in the U.S. House of Representatives, first representing Indiana's second district and then its sixth district, 2001-13. He was governor 2013-17.

- Democrat Joseph Robinette Biden Jr., 77, was the 47th vice president (2009-17) and was a U.S. senator from Delaware, 1973-2009. Biden was born in Scranton, Pennsylvania. Biden's running mate is California U.S. Sen. Kamala Devi Harris, who turns 56 in October. A native of

Oakland, California, Harris was San Francisco district attorney, 2004-11, and California attorney general, 2011-17. She was elected to the U.S. Senate in 2016.

- Green Party candidate Howard Gresham "Howie" Hawkins, 67, was born in San Francisco. He is co-founder of the Green Party and has run for governor and U.S. senator in New York and for mayor of Syracuse. His running mate is Angela Nicole Walker, 46, of Wisconsin. She was the Socialist Party candidate for vice president in 2016 and ran for sheriff of Milwaukee County, Wisconsin, as an independent in 2014.
- Libertarian Party candidate Joanne Marie "Jo" Jorgensen, 63, was born in Libertyville, Illinois. She ran for vice president on the Libertarian ticket in 1996 and was a candidate for the U.S. House of Representatives in South Carolina in 1992. Her 2020 running mate is Jeremy "Spike" Cohen, 38, an entrepreneur and podcaster, who is a native of Baltimore, Maryland.
- Constitution Party Sheila "Samm" Tittle,

57, is a native of El Paso who now lives in Virginia. The national Constitution Party nominated Don Blankenship of West Virginia for president, but the New Mexico party chose Tittle.

- Party for Socialism and Liberation (PSL) candidate Gloria La Riva, 66, was born in Albuquerque. 2020 marks La Riva's 10th consecutive campaign for president or vice president. She has also run for governor of California and mayor of San Francisco. PSL candidate for vice president Sunil Freeman is a poet and essayist who grew up in Maryland.

There have been a wide range of third-party candidates in American history, including those of the anti-Masonic, Nullifier, Liberty, Free Soil, American (also known as the No Nothing Party), Southern Democratic, Constitutional Union, Greenback, Prohibition, Union Labor, Populist, Socialist, Progressive (three different parties), Union, States' Rights, American Independent, Independent, Libertarian, Reform and Green parties.

America's first presi-

dent, George Washington, was elected twice without a political party. 1796-1848, the U.S. elected one Federalist candidate, four Democratic-Republican candidates and two Whig candidates as president.

Since the election of 1852, only a Democrat or a Republican has been elected president. John Quincy Adams was elected in 1824 (the only U.S. presidential election decided in the U.S. House of Representatives) as a Democratic-Republican but ran unsuccessfully for re-election in 1828 as a National Republican.

Henry Clay ran unsuccessfully as a National Republican candidate for president in 1832.

Since 1832, the third-party candidate receiving the highest percentage of the popular vote was Theodore Roosevelt, who earned 27.4 percent in 1912. Roosevelt had served as president 1901-09, but chose not to run for re-election in 1908, instead backing U.S. Sec. of War William Howard Taft, who easily won that year's general election.

Roosevelt was unhappy with Taft's presidency and ran against him in the 1912 Republican Primary. Taft won the Primary

but finished third in the General behind Democrat Woodrow Wilson and Roosevelt, running as a Progressive. It's the only time in American history that an incumbent president has finished third in a general election, and the only time a third-party candidate has finished ahead of a Republican or a Democratic candidate in the popular vote.

Former President Millard Fillmore, running as the American Party candidate, got 21.4 percent of the popular vote in 1856. Businessman Ross Perot (Reform Party) got 18.9 percent in 1992; Vice President John C. Breckenridge got 18.2 percent in 1860, running as a Southern Democrat; U.S. Sen. Robert LaFollette (Progressive) got 16.6 percent in 1924; Alabama Gov. George Wallace (American Independent) got 13.5 percent in 1968; former U.S. Sen. John Bell (Constitutional Union) got 12.6 percent in 1860; former President Martin Van Buren (Free Soil) got 10.1 percent in 1848.

Breckenridge earned the highest percentage of electoral votes of any third-party candidate: 72 in 1860. The Democrat, Stephan A. Douglas, got

more popular votes than Breckenridge, but only 12 electoral votes. The winner, Abraham Lincoln, who was the nation's first Republican president, got 180 electoral votes and almost 40 percent of the popular vote. Bell won 39 electoral votes.

Theodore Roosevelt earned the most electoral votes, 88, of any third-party candidate, in 1912. Incumbent Taft received only eight electoral votes. The winner, Wilson, received 435.

The last third-party candidate to earn electoral votes was Wallace, who garnered 46 in 1968. Then South Carolina Gov. J. Strom Thurmond (States' Rights/Dixiecrats), earned 39 electoral votes in 1948, and LaFollette received 13 (winning his home state of Wisconsin) in 1924.

In the 2016 presidential election, Libertarian candidate and former New Mexico Gov. Gary Johnson earned almost 4.5 million votes, equal to 3.28 percent of the total. Green Party candidate Jill Stein received almost 1.46 million votes, or 1.07 percent. Constitution Party candidate Darrell Castle received 203,000 votes, or 0.15 percent.

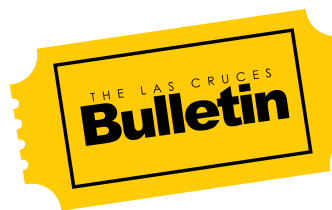

Understanding Peripheral Artery Disease

Peripheral artery disease (PAD) affects as many as 12 million Americans. Read up on the symptoms and learn what you can do to reduce your risk.

Many people know that the buildup of fatty tissue called plaque is the cause of coronary heart disease. However, pesky plaque can also build up in other vessels outside the heart. This condition is called PAD.

PAD usually affects the legs, but can also affect the vessels that carry blood from your heart to your head, arms, kidneys and stomach. The plaque that builds up in these arteries can become thick enough to reduce blood flow and cause a blood clot that could narrow or completely block the artery.

One of the greatest risk factors for PAD is age—one in three Americans age 70 or older has PAD. If you are older than age 50 and smoke or have diabetes, you are also at a greater risk for PAD. If you're 50 or younger, be on the lookout for PAD symptoms if you have:

- Poor cholesterol. Your low-density lipoprotein and high-density lipoprotein cholesterol (or "bad" and "good" cholesterol) affect your risk.
- High blood pressure. Also called

hypertension, blood pressure at or above 140/90 increases your chances of PAD.

- Smoking. The chemicals in cigarettes damage your blood vessels and restrict the flow of oxygen.
- Insulin resistance and diabetes. Either of these conditions can impact your cardiovascular health.
- Physical inactivity and obesity. Staying sedentary fuels your chances of developing PAD.

Many people who have PAD have no ill effects from the disease, but others may experience pain, numbness, aching or heaviness in the leg muscles when walking or climbing stairs. Weak or absent pulses in the leg, pale or blue skin color, and poor nail growth are also symptoms of PAD. Many problems associated with PAD flare up during physical activity, then go away after a period of rest.

Lifestyle changes are one of the best ways to prevent PAD and other cardiovascular problems. Increased exercise, smoking cessation and blood sugar management can go a long way toward reducing plaque buildup in your peripheral arteries and your heart.

If you develop PAD, your



physician may prescribe medication to treat high blood pressure and cholesterol, prevent blood clots, or ease pain. Several surgical procedures also can treat the root cause of PAD, depending on the severity of plaque buildup.

Research indicates that women are just as likely to get PAD as men—but women are often uneducated about what PAD is and less likely to be screened by their healthcare provider for the condition. Women also typically have more severe cases of PAD and are more likely to have their quality of life affected by this disease.

Despite this seemingly bad news for women, a new study from the Journal of the American College of Cardiology found that surgical interventions for PAD are just as effective in women. Talk with your physician about your overall risk for cardiovascular diseases, including PAD.



Heart attack signs women can't afford to ignore

Each year heart disease claims the lives of more women than any other health condition. Heart disease can result in heart attacks, yet the symptoms of a heart attack aren't always obvious, especially among women.

The most common sign of a heart attack is chest pain. In women, that pain may feel like a fullness, squeezing or pressure, or follow the telltale pattern of a

crushing ache.

Other heart attack symptoms include shortness of breath, nausea, feeling lightheaded or breaking out in a cold sweat. Discomfort may also radiate in the back, jaw, shoulder, arm or stomach.

If you think you're having a heart attack, call 911 or go to an emergency room as soon as possible. How you respond to a heart attack could save your life.

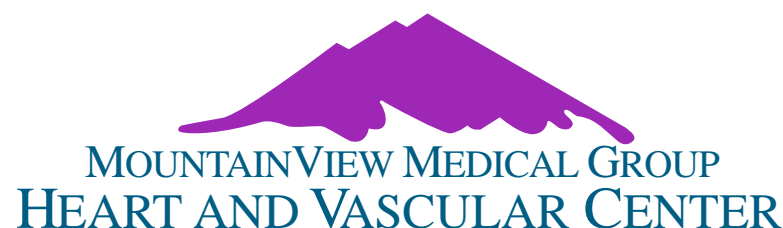

Common heart problems

Your heart has two systems, vascular and electric. The vascular system is made of veins that carry blood into the heart and arteries that carry blood from the heart to cells throughout your body. The electrical system stimulates the heart muscle to contract. "Heart disease" is often used synonymously with "heart attack." However, a heart attack (the total blockage of an artery that leads to the heart) is a vascular problem. There are other kinds of heart conditions as well.

When you have a problem with the electrical impulses that stimulate the heart, you have an arrhythmia. An arrhythmia can affect the top or bottom chambers of your heart. It can make your heart beat too quickly, not quickly enough or out-of-sync. When your heart flutters or skips a beat, this is a palpitation that could be caused by arrhythmia. Other symptoms include:

- Dizziness and light-headedness
- Fainting

- Fatigue
- Shortness of breath

Most arrhythmias are harmless, but some may require treatment.

As part of the vascular system, the heart has four valves that open and close to control blood flow in the heart.

- Heart valve disease occurs when one or more of your valves don't work correctly.
- Regurgitation is when blood leaks through a valve in the wrong direction.
- Stenosis is when a valve is narrowed and blood cannot flow properly.
- Valve prolapse is when a valve does not close tightly enough.

Valve problems may be present for no apparent reason, or they may be caused by infections, heart attacks or heart disease. The most obvious symptom of heart valve disease is a murmur, an unusual heartbeat that can indicate a problem.

Many arrhythmias don't cause

long-term problems. However, atrial fibrillation (or A-fib) can put you at risk for serious cardiac conditions.

In a healthy heart, the heart contracts and releases to a steady beat. With A-fib, the upper chambers of the heart quiver or flutter instead of strongly contracting. A-fib makes you five times as likely to have a stroke, according to the American Heart Association. Heart failure and chronic fatigue are also associated with A-fib.

About 6 million Americans have A-fib. Those at high risk include:

- athletes, as A-fib can be triggered by a rapid heart rate
- binge drinkers
- older adults
- people with underlying heart disease or high blood pressure
- those with sleep apnea

A fluttering heartbeat is the most common symptom of A-fib. You may also become fatigued, dizzy or short of breath, especially when exercising.

Heart Disease vs. Stroke

Stroke and coronary heart disease (CHD) are two distinct conditions, but they have more in common than you might think.

The main distinctions between stroke and CHD lie in how they develop and which parts of the body they affect.

Most strokes occur when a blood clot forms in an artery that delivers blood to the brain or the clot travels to one of those arteries from elsewhere in the body. In either case, the result is the same: The clot prevents oxygen-rich blood from reaching the brain, causing tissue death. Less commonly, stroke may occur when a blood vessel in the brain bursts, flooding the brain with blood.

CHD affects the arteries of the heart rather than those of the brain. It develops over time as plaque accumulates and narrows the arteries — a process called atherosclerosis. If an artery is so affected that little or no blood reaches the heart, a heart attack can occur.

If you have atherosclerosis in your coronary arteries, chances are good that arteries elsewhere in your body — including the cerebral (brain) arteries — have experienced narrowing, too. Stroke and heart disease share risk factors that contribute to atherosclerosis, including smoking, high cholesterol, high blood pressure and obesity. Blood clots that travel to the cerebral arteries and cause strokes most often originate in the heart. Other forms of heart disease, such as atrial

fibrillation and heart failure, can also increase stroke risk.

If you modify these risk factors, you may be able to protect yourself from two serious health threats.

Heart disease and stroke have a tragic connection: They are both among the top five leading causes of death for American women, ranking first and fourth, respectively, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

One characteristic shared by stroke and heart attack — one of the most serious consequences of coronary heart disease — is the importance of seeking swift treatment when symptoms appear.

With heart attacks, most experts agree that permanent tissue damage begins to occur if the heart is deprived of oxygen for more than 20 minutes. The quicker doctors are able to remove the obstruction in a patient's artery and restore blood flow to the heart, the better.

Similarly, during a stroke, the longer the brain is without oxygenated blood, the more cells die, and the more likely irreparable damage becomes. Individuals who have the most common type of stroke have a three- to four-and-a-half-hour window of time after symptoms appear to receive a medication to dissolve a blood clot and have a greater chance of successfully recovering.

If you suspect you or a loved one is having a heart attack or stroke, don't waste a precious second — call 911 immediately.

Heart Health Glossary

Coronary heart disease, electrocardiograms, cardiac stress tests, stents — you've likely heard these common terms. But do you know what they mean?

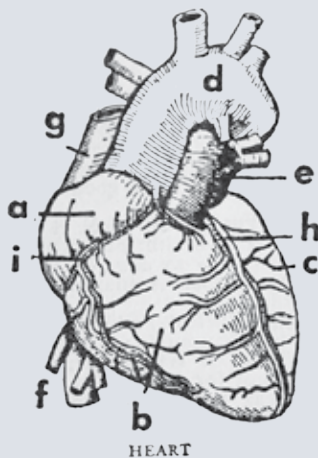
Review this glossary to get up-to-date on heart-healthy lingo.

1. **Coronary heart disease** — Also known as coronary artery disease, coronary heart disease is the most common form of heart disease. The condition occurs when cholesterol and other substances build up in the arteries, which causes them to harden or narrow. Over time, this limits the heart's access to oxygen and can lead to a heart attack.
2. **Electrocardiogram (EKG)** — During an EKG, a technician places stickers containing electrodes on your chest, arms and legs to measure your heart's electrical activity. The test can tell your doctor several things about your heart health, including whether or not your heart is working too hard or if you have an arrhythmia (an irregular heartbeat).
3. **Cardiac stress test** — Exercise stress tests help determine if you have coronary artery disease or an arrhythmia that occurs during exercise. To perform a stress test, technicians place EKG electrodes on your chest and arms. You will then be asked to exercise on a treadmill or stationary bicycle. The speed and incline of the treadmill or bike will increase throughout the test to see how your heart tolerates physical activity.
4. **Stents** — If you have a blockage in one of your arteries, your doctor may place a stent in that artery. Stents are small tubes usually made of metal, mesh or fabric that are used to open blocked arteries and help restore blood flow. By placing a stent, doctors can often avoid invasive open-heart surgeries.

If doctors suspect you have a blockage in one of the arteries of your heart based on results from tests, such as an electrocardiogram or cardiac stress test, they may recommend you visit the cardiac catheterization laboratory for further diagnostic testing.

One of the most common procedures performed in the cardiac catheterization laboratory is a coronary angiogram. This test is used to diagnose coronary heart disease and involves using a special type of dye to view how well blood is circulating through the arteries. Once the dye is injected into the heart, an X-ray is taken to show whether or not the dye is moving properly through the arteries, which highlights potential blockages.

If a blockage is present, doctors may recommend placing a stent in the artery via a procedure known as coronary angioplasty with stenting.

Signs, Risk Factors, Treatment and Prevention

Critical Limb Ischemia (CLI) is a severe obstruction of the arteries which dramatically reduces blood flow to the hands, feet, and legs, and has progressed to the point of severe pain or skin ulcers and sores. CLI is a serious condition that requires immediate treatment to re-establish blood flow to the affected area or areas (most patients with CLI have multiple arterial blockages).

Warning Signs and Risk Factors

Some of the symptoms are:

- Severe pain or numbness in the legs and feet while not moving
- A noticeable decrease in the temperature of your lower leg or foot compared to the rest of your body
- Toe or foot sores, infections, or ulcers that will not heal, or heal very slowly
- Gangrene
- Shiny, smooth, dry skin in the legs or feet

- Thickening of the toenails
- Absent or diminished pulse in the legs or feet

Risk factors include:

- Age (Men over 60 and women after menopause)
- Smoking
- Diabetes
- Overweight or obese
- Sedentary lifestyle
- High cholesterol
- High blood pressure
- Family history of vascular disease

Treatment and Prevention

Medical care can be quite complex and individualized, but the overall goal is to reduce the pain and improve blood flow to preserve the limb. Treatments include medications, endovascular therapy and arterial surgery. Endovascular treatments are the least invasive and involve inserting a catheter into the artery in the groin to allow access to the diseased portion of the artery. Angioplasty

may be used to open blockages by placing small balloons introduced with a catheter into an artery. If the arterial blockages are not favorable for endovascular therapy, surgery is often recommended. This involves removing or bypassing the arterial disease with either a vein from the patient or a synthetic graft.

MountainView Medical Group Heart and Vascular Center has a team of board-certified cardiologists and vascular surgeons offering both preventive heart care and chronic cardiovascular disease management. Since treatment depends on the severity of the disease and many individual parameters, it is essential that someone with ulcers, or pain in the legs or feet when walking or at rest, see a vascular specialist as soon as possible. The earlier a diagnosis can be made, the earlier treatment can be started with less serious consequences.

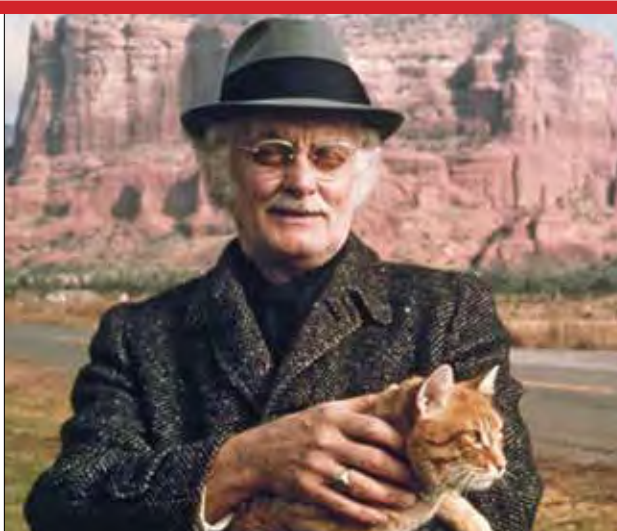

Backing into the music: musician starts with words

James Ethington III started collecting guitars long before he could play them.

"I had five guitars and couldn't play a lick," he said.

Fascinated by music and liking the way guitars looked, it was not until he was 19 that he picked one up and learned how to play it. Today, his collection has grown to 40 guitars, and he can play them all.

"Alamogordo is a small town, not much to do," Ethington said. "Through the years I was planting seeds for music. I had fun exploring sounds, and it was positive. I could have gotten into a lot of negative."

It was the late '90s and the music Ethington loved was his father's: Al Green, Smokey Robinson and the Miracles and most of all, the Jackson 5.

"I would be mesmerized just watching them," he said. "I watched Tito playing guitar, watched Jermain playing bass. Then I got into like the Beatles, Eric Clapton, and I knew whatever I can do with music, I have to try, because I've got to do something with my life."

But for Ethington, it was the lyrics that came first. He started out with

stories, writing when he was in elementary school.

"I was known for writing stories," he said. "I was either writing stories or making up stories. I used to get in trouble."

In his early days he told his teacher he had nine brothers.

"I would come to school every day and tell her elaborate stories about all these brothers — my brother did this to me, my brother did that to me — then one day I told her one of my brothers died, and she believed it."

When his parents went to the school soon after, the teacher got "all mad because they weren't sad about it. My dad told her, 'I'm glad he's gone, because James always makes up these stories.'"

Soon he got into writing poetry and then, in sixth grade, one of his poems was published in an anthology.

"I was always writing, but never had the music," he said. "I couldn't play anything. I just loved to write and create."

So, the words came first, the playing came after. But there is no doubt today that the music has been mastered, as Ethington sits and plays on the patio of a café, his fingers dancing their ways across the strings as he talks about his dreams.

"At the end of the day, I want to look back where I came from, and I want to talk to kids who, like me, felt hopeless," he said. "I felt the world is too big to conquer, and there's not a way out when you feel like that. There's a lot of things to hold you down. Drugs, alcohol and all these other things are right around the corner everywhere. Hopefully I can be as successful as I can be with music. It's going to be great for me, but it's going to be even better if I can leave a lasting impression that is positive — if I can be a trailblazer for kids."

In addition to performing for area charity

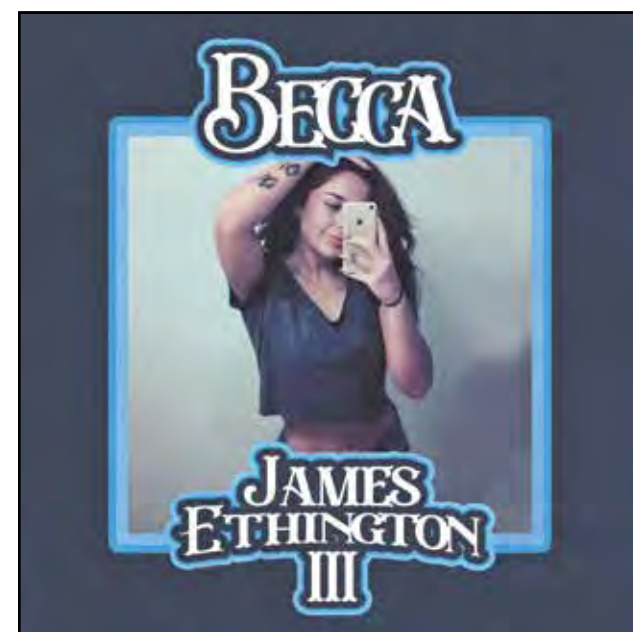
events, like Relay for Life, Ethington has been to Santa Monica Beach, California, Phoenix and Austin.

Ethington recently released a new EP, "Rheacycle," which is an eclectic, five-song mix reminiscent of the glory days of alternative acoustic music.

Tracks on "Rheacycle," include Ethington's signature song, "Becca," and "Sexy, Juicy, Bouncy."

or two."

Kilroy said letters and even poetry were submitted by community members, and he and the cast tried to work some of it into the production.

"The piece is meant to be provocative, with information taken from recent news stories and interpreted via a variety of characters that convey different viewpoints," he said. "The hope is the

audience will see all of these various characters and viewpoints and think about how they feel, perhaps discuss the ideas with friends and family, so that this work is a catalyst for those exchanges, and maybe even change itself."

KTAL Radio presents original radio play about El Paso Bath Riots

At 7 p.m. Saturday Sept. 19, KTAL Radio (101.5 FM) of Las Cruces will present the original radio play “NO MÁS,” the story of Carmelita Torres and the El Paso bath riots of more than a century ago, KTAL announced in a news release.

In January 1917, “the mayor of El Paso and the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service set up what they called The El Paso Disinfection Plant at the Santa Fe Bridge (between El Paso and Ciudad Juarez), allegedly to combat the disease typhus,” the news release said. “It required all immigrants coming from Juarez to file through the facility and strip naked, where they were doused with kerosene, gasoline, sulfuric acid and the notorious chemical Zyklon B, the toxic gas later used in the Nazi death camps. The workers, both men and women, were subjected to this treatment every day before they could enter El Paso for their daily jobs.

“Carmelita Torres, a young housekeeper from

Juarez, refused to submit to this humiliating procedure and led more than 200 women in a sit-down action in front of the trolleys that shut down the city for three days.”

“Before I started doing research on the 1917 Bath Riots, I didn’t know what a ‘Greaser’ film was, playwright Meagan O’Toole-Pitts said. “I didn’t know that the filmmaker who made ‘The Birth of a Nation’ first made ‘Greaser’ films, which were films that depicted Mexican characters as immoral ‘bandits’ and villains. I didn’t know that one of our El Paso mayors once called people crossing the bridge, ‘dirty, lousy, des-

ried a citizen of another country. (American men did not risk losing their citizenship, no matter who they chose to marry.)

“All of this I didn’t know,” O’Toole-Pitts said. “It was all eye-opening. Carmelita Torres was living in a world that was openly and brazenly racist. ‘Greaser’ is a racial slur that refers to a person of Mexican descent. ‘Greaser’ films were popular in the 1910s and shown in Nickelodeons throughout the country. I was astonished to learn how much racism and negative stereotypes would have been in her face, day in, day out. And on top of that, now she had to strip naked in front of Ameri-

can men and be deloused just to go to work every day? Why? She must’ve asked herself why. ‘Is it because they think I’m dirty?’ she must’ve thought. I can see why she decided one morning: Enough is enough. I can see myself getting just as angry and fed up, although I don’t know if I would’ve had her courage. She is a truly remarkable person in history, and I feel almost robbed that I did not learn about her sooner, that there is not a parade or holiday or statue in her honor. She’s a hero for the Mexican people and women.

“So, I felt compelled to give her a voice,” O’Toole-Pitts said. “First, I wrote

a stage play and then another. But the pandemic forced me to rewrite again, this time a radio play. A radio play allowed me to conduct rehearsals remotely and offer the performance remotely, keeping the actors and audience safe. It took me about two months to write “NO MÁS,” the radio play. I completed it in April 2020. I wanted the play to be as historically accurate as possible.”

‘NO MÁS’ will be performed by members of the Lustre Theatre Company of El Paso.

NMSU Art Museum to reopen Sept. 19

The New Mexico State University Art Museum (UAM) will re-open its doors for the first time in more than five months in compliance with all state guidance and policies. Starting Saturday, Sept. 19, visitors will be able to return to view all displays in the museum including all of its galleries and its ongoing and popular exhibition, "Labor: Motherhood & Art in 2020," which has been extended until Dec. 6.

The museum will run on a timed entry system, allowing up to 10 people to enter in 30-minute

time blocks. This system will welcome visitors on a first come, first served basis. Guests can reserve a spot in advance from the art museum website (<https://uam.nmsu.edu/timed-tickets/>). Museum staff will be following strict cleaning procedures to ensure the safety of all visitors.

"Engaging with art has become even more crucial since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, and we are deeply excited to be able to invite our regional community back into the museum," said UAM Director Marisa Sage. "While we were forced to close only two weeks after our grand opening, we

were able to transition the majority of the associated programming online to stay connected with our community."

In addition to previously planned programming, the staff also created "ALONE/TOGETHER," a series of online Saturday programs in collaboration with artists

and programming partners from "Labor: Motherhood & Art in 2020." The series was fully online, utilizing different social media platforms and online apps.

Artist brings Las Cruces icons to life in I-25/University Avenue public art project

The New Mexico Department of Transportation's (NMDOT) Interstate 25/University Avenue construction project will not only improve traffic safety and flow for residents and visitors, it will add unique and beautiful art to city bridges and interchanges.

Because the I-25/University Avenue interchange is a major gateway into the community and to New Mexico State University, NMDOT wanted to "incorporate artwork that reflects our region, culture and history" for the construction project's public art component, according to the project website (www.i25-university.com).

NMDOT chose native New Mexican and Latina artist/designer Collette Marie, "to create a look and feel that would make

the project unique and memorable."

Marie, who holds a bachelor of fine arts degree from NMSU, selected "Cultivo y Cultura" (Cultivation and Culture) as the title of her work, which includes aesthetic treatments for the infrastructure's abutment walls, retaining wall, piers and pedestrian railing. Marie has incorporated themes of "the Southwest, desert plants, cultivation of crops, academia and Las Cruces culture and history" into the art, she said. Because NMSU is an ag school, Marie said she chose four of the state's specialty crops to use on the Triviz/NMSU side: chile, cotton, pecans and onions.

"Pecan trees are a particularly important theme," she said, because NMSU identified them in its master plan as "a

campus entry icon" and "perhaps the most noteworthy signature tree on

campus."

Marie's chile artwork honors Fabian Garcia, an

I-25 University Project expected to continue through next summer

The New Mexico Department of Transportation's (NMDOT) Interstate 25/University Avenue Project began Jan. 2 and is expected to continue through the summer of 2021, according to www.i25-university.com.

The \$33.3 million project will add capacity to the I-25 southbound off-ramp at University Avenue, reducing congestion and providing direct connections to Pan American Center parking lots.

Project improvements include a new University Avenue bridge over I-25, a Triviz Drive underpass under University Avenue connecting north and south Triviz, continuation of the multi-use Triviz Trail to the new NMSU trail system, better local traffic flow through roundabouts merging traffic on both sides of the University/Triviz underpass, a new entrance ramp from NMSU to southbound I-25 and roadway improvements to University Avenue from Triviz Drive to Las Alturas to accommodate pedestrians and bicycles, the website said.

agriculture professor at NMSU, 1906-45, first director of the state Agriculture Experiment Station in 1913 and a chile-crop pioneer.

On the I-25 side, Marie chose several examples of southern New Mexico flora and fauna, including ocotillo and agave plants, the whiptail lizard, a sun disk and sunburst and an earth-and-seed concept "representing both a planted seed in the earth and symbolic of academic growth."

Marie said she chose the whiptail lizard (the state lizard) instead of the greater roadrunner (the state bird) since the roadrunner is already well represented in the city.

Native grasses were

also incorporated into the design, along with a song sparrow, which Marie said she dedicated to her grandmother, Alvita Trujillo Flores, who fostered her development as an artist from an early age.

"She was in my thoughts as I was competing for the contract and designing for this project," she said.

Marie's color scheme includes the earth tones of ivory, beige and terracotta.

"Earth tones have mass appeal and age well," Marie said. "These specific colors are found in the Spanish Renaissance Revival architecture on campus."

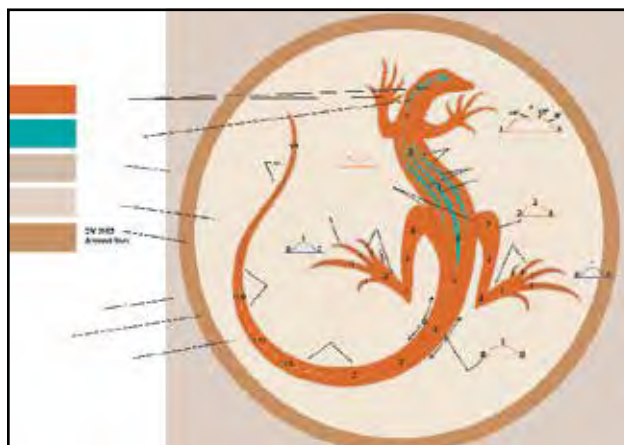

Marie said her goal is to “bring rural elements to an urban landscape” so travelers who are passing through “can get a feel for the culture and rural life in the Mesilla Valley.”

“I had been wanting to design the aesthetic treatment for a bridge for a long time,” Marie said. And, she wanted to “add a unique dimension and style ... in contrast to the

artwork on other interchanges and bridges in Las Cruces.”

But Marie said she had never worked with concrete before, and she had to create specifications with numbers and color-coded lines to translate her vision to Fitzgerald Formliners, the Santa Ana, California-based company that fabricated the formliners (concrete panels) for the project.

“I had to take my 2-D designs and imagine them in 3-D,” Marie said. “That was pretty challenging for

me.”

Marie said she is “just so pleased” with the work Fitzgerald Formliners has done.

“It has been a real treat to see my artwork unveiling in different sections of the interchange over time,” she said.

Exhibitions of Marie’s work include a 2015 solo exhibit, Native New Mex-

The heart of Heart for the World

Pastor pens 'Plenty Too Much, Making Your Biggest Difference'

Dale Walker has been a pastor since he was 20 years old, almost 40 years. During his time as a pastor in El Paso he met a man from the Philippines who talked about the “plight of a lot of people without food and in great need.”

That plight challenged Walker to action.

“In 1987 I went to visit [the Philippines] and became extremely challenged by the rest of the world being so underserved, especially orphans and others that had great need,” he said. “They lacked so much, and I would say that up until that time, I certainly lived in a box.”

He said he cared about his people and his church, but he heard a call to become more generous and more effective in helping people who were doing good work in other countries.

As Heart for the World grew, Walker felt called to move to Las Cruces with the idea that he could do more good by mobilizing people to find their gifts and ways of helping the underprivileged.

“So that became the

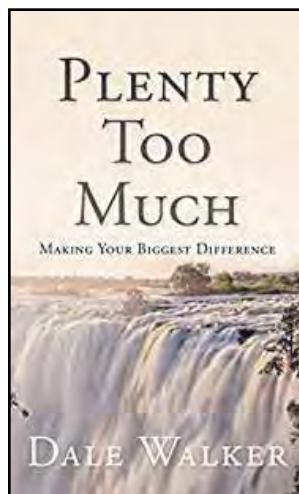
calling card of this church — giving our best to those who have the least, being a neighborhood church on a worldwide mission,” he said. “It’s that feeling of God saying to me that if I would care for the needs of these people, he would always take care of our needs. I think that I have proven that.”

He has written a book, “Plenty Too Much: Making Your Biggest Difference,” which is about the mindset of generosity, he said.

“I believe it [the generosity mindset] allows God to work in many ways,” Walker said. “We limit him because of the size of our faith or the fear that we have. My hope was through my story and what this church has been able to do, just to prove a principal that is true, giving more than you can ask is happiness. The happiness was just sort of my story.”

Walker believes people want the permission to be generous. People have experienced the “giver’s high,” and want to keep giving.

Part of the Heart for the World mission is to identify the “hidden heroes,” Walker said. These are people who live in the



small towns and villages in remote places where people are in great need. They would never send out a mailing list, or create social media posts, he said, “but they are doing heroic community work.”

For example, he said, Vicky Ponce has been working just across the border near Ciudad Juarez, where she not only started a church but also feeds children and makes sure they can be in school and mentors them. She has faced all kinds of opposition and is right in the middle of drug cartel operations.

“We helped her build a fence around her place,” he said. “Now, for 20 years, she has helped a whole generation of kids from broken families.”

Other hidden heroes

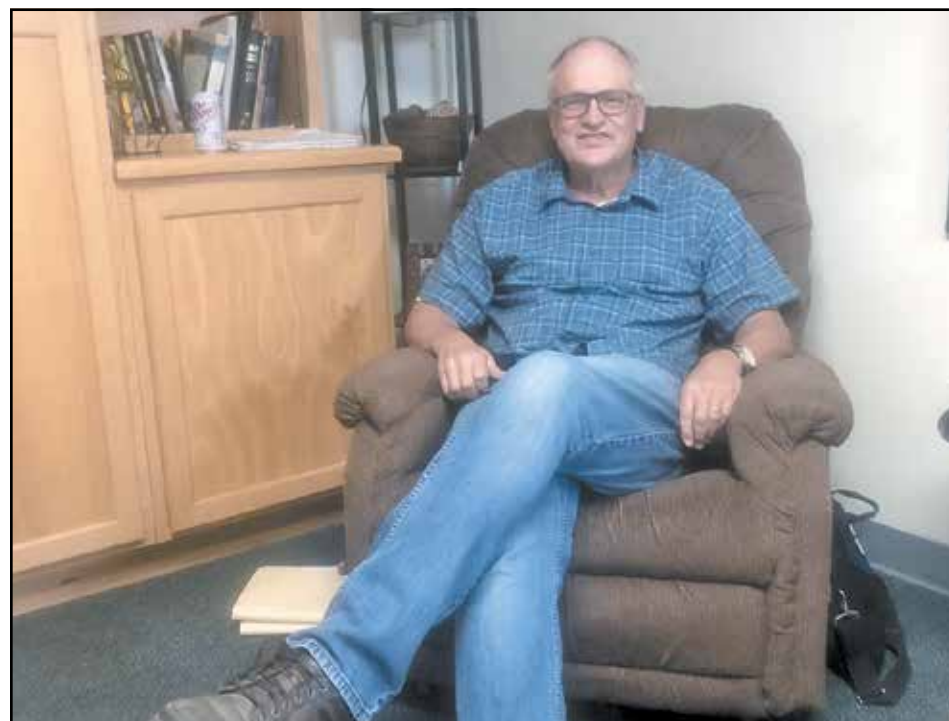

include a pastor helping with the refugees in Palomas, Mexico, since the asylum seekers have been turned back – they created a shelter and a schoolhouse. In the Philippines, two social workers started a clinic among the Bajau, sea gypsies, who had no access to any kind of health care.

“These kinds of people are incredible in their faith and generosity,” Walker said. “We have about 30 different ones [hidden heroes] who we

help including in Mexico, the Philippines and Zambia. It doesn’t make sense to not care about those who are at extreme risk and on the edge of survival.”

Heart for the World parishioner and former Bulletin Editor Marty Racine offered to help edit the book when he heard Walker was working on it. Racine said he was one of several helping with the project.

“I think it’s basically what Christians do is

help people less fortunate than themselves, turn people on to Christianity,” Racine said. “[Walker] is kind of an average guy. He doesn’t hold himself up as special. He’s just a regular guy like the rest of us. He teaches you to appreciate what you have and not pine after what you don’t – you already have plenty too much.”

Aerial inspection company plans major New Mexico expansion

State assistance from LEDA helps LaSen Inc. move to global marketplace

A company that specializes in aerial inspection and mapping services is planning a major expansion in New Mexico, more than doubling its highly trained workforce and speeding global expansion, New Mexico Economic Development Department (NMEDD) Cabinet Sec. Alicia J. Keyes announced.

LaSen Inc. has been awarded a state Local Economic Development Act (LEDA) grant of \$750,000 to construct a larger headquarters facility, add new drones and helicopters, and hire 79 additional employees over the next five years.

The company will invest \$8.4 million into a new 37,000-square foot location at the Pioneer Industrial Park, west of Chapparral Building Materials and ProCon, off of West Amador and Pioneer avenues, south of former San Saba Pecan in Las Cruces.

The average annual wage for employees is \$80,000, and the expansion is expected to have a state-wide economic impact of \$463 million over 10 years. The City of Las Cruces has made an additional



\$400,000 offer to the project from its local LEDA fund. LaSen expects to move into the new facility in the summer of 2021.

"I'm thrilled about the expansion of this cutting-edge company in Las Cruces. It will bring even more highly skilled, high-tech jobs to New Mexico," Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham said.

LaSen has developed a niche in the oil and gas industry by providing detection of pipeline leaks and hazards using aerial observation from helicopters and drones, utilizing sophisticated LiDAR mapping, high-resolution video and sensing technology that can detect leaks from 300-500 feet above the ground.

The mid-infrared laser used by LaSen is particularly well suited for detec-

tion of hydrocarbons such as methane, propane and butane, as well as volatilized liquid petroleum products.

The economic development assistance not only helps with physical expansion, it also gives the company the resources to move into new global markets by providing aerial leak inspection and safety monitoring of power lines to potential new customers in Australia, Canada, Belgium, Germany and Portugal.

"LaSen is a company with experience in New Mexico. It now wants to further invest in the state and expand its workforce so it can provide services around the world," Keyes said. "These new high-paying jobs coming to southern New Mexico, as a result of our LEDA

investment, will help diversify our economy and move the state toward recovery. LeSen's expansion is part of a trend we are seeing: Companies want to double down here or move from busier cities into New Mexico, where they can have a better quality of life with their families."

The aerial and unmanned technologies allow for a more complete and safer inspection of power lines and equipment damaged by wind, lightning or even animals. Aerial technology is quickly replacing physical inspection by workers driving down rugged backroads and walking right-of-ways with cameras and notepads.

LaSen has its own flight operation and it manufactures the LiDAR sensor. It also has its own maintenance and machine shop, which is at capacity in its current space, 300 N. Telshor Blvd., according to LaSen President Tim

Goolsby.

"We've been talking about getting out of this building for the last two years. LEDA allows us to make that decision a lot sooner and with a little more comfort," Goolsby said. "We want to make the right decisions that will keep us in New Mexico for a long time."

The City of Las Cruces is the fiscal agent for the project and the Mesilla Valley Economic Development Alliance (MVEDA) provided location and technical assistance.

"We are excited to be in a position to help foster the growth of technology companies like LaSen and bring high paying jobs to Las Cruces," Mayor Ken Miyagishima said. "The close collaboration between the NMEDD, the City's Economic Development Department and MVEDA allowed us to quickly respond to LaSen's needs and secure Las Cruces as their long-term home."

"It has been rewarding to work with the team at LaSen and assist in their growth here in Las Cruces," Davin Lopez, president and CEO of MVEDA, added. "Their expansion is indicative of the robust industry supporting aerial assets that can be found in the region and the opportunities we have to further grow this industry, with LaSen as our flagship."

LaSen was founded in 1989 to commercialize technology developed for the U.S. Department of Defense, tested at White Sands Missile Range, to detect biological and chemical pathogens. The advancement into methane detection was a logical progression for LaSen, and in 2004, after being awarded a Small Business Innovation Research Grant (SBIR), LaSen developed the Airborne LiDAR Inspection System (ALPIS). ALPIS has inspected more than 500,000 miles of pipeline right-of-way, detecting more than 40,000 leaks and saving more than 44.6 billion cubic feet of methane from escaping into the atmosphere.

The company has a quick-response model with helicopters available in cities in California, Colorado, Texas, Kentucky and British Columbia. Pilots work staggered schedules in several locations in order to be available 24 hours a day.

State makes loans available for businesses

Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham's Economic Recovery Council is urging small businesses that have been hard hit by the COVID-19 public health emergency to apply for an emergency loan program now available through the New Mexico Finance Authority.

The Small Business Recovery Act of 2020 set aside \$400 million from New Mexico's Severance Tax Permanent Fund to provide loans to New Mexico businesses and nonprofits that have experienced financial hardship during the pandemic.

"This is a great opportunity for businesses to

get some critical help that could make the difference in being able to navigate through this very difficult period," said Economic Recovery Council Chair Christina Campos. "It's so important for our recovery that our state's small businesses get through this."

"This is a program that is especially beneficial for small businesses that may not have been able to access federal relief or

who need more flexibility. We'd love to see more businesses take advantage of what is available," said council member Jason Sandel.

Businesses may be eligible for loans of up to \$75,000. The loans do not require a personal guarantee or collateral and carry an interest rate of 1.625 percent, fixed for the life of the loan. The loans can be used to cover rent, payroll and other

expenses.

Among other criteria, eligibility includes the following:

- Must be a New Mexico business or a nonprofit organized under Section 501(c)3 or 501(c)6 that has closed or reduced operations due to the public health order, and
- Had annual gross revenue of less than \$5 million as determined by its 2019 federal income

tax return or Form 990, and

- Experienced a 30 percent decline in monthly gross receipts or monthly revenue in April and May 2020 as compared to the same months in 2019.

Fall Prevention

Every September during National Falls Prevention Week (Sept. 21-25, 2020), physical therapists join other medical professions across the country in reminding Americans that falls are not just common among older Americans. They're often debilitating, costly and even deadly.

Falls present a real public health problem among older adults, but so often they are caused by things that are easy to identify and fix. Balance and strength issues, trip hazards in the home, poor vision, and even certain prescription medications can increase someone's chance of falling. These are all things that can and should be addressed as people enter their golden years, before they experience a fall.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimate that one in four Americans 65 and older experience a fall each year. Less than half actually report the incident to a doctor or loved one. Of those falls, about one in every five result in a serious injury (i.e., a broken bone or head injury), leading to more than 3 million emergency room visits and 800,000 hospitalizations each year. In 2015, these treatments and hospitalizations cost a total of about \$50 billion, three-fourths of which was paid for through Medicare and Medicaid.

We like to shine a spotlight on this critical issue because it's one that we can improve with a more preventive mindset. One of the ways we can do this is by setting the record straight about some common myths older people have about falling.

The following beliefs are either incorrect, misleading, or both:

"Falling is just a part of getting older." Wrong! Falling does not have to be a part of aging. As already discussed, the most common causes of falls are easy to identify and fix before a fall happens.

"I won't fall if I just stay home and limit my activities." First off, more than half of all falls take place in the home. It's true, and it's likely because our guards are most often down when we're home. Home is also where we spend most of our time, including moments when we're not always the most alert (i.e., mornings, middle of the night, etc.). As for reducing activity, this can actually increase your chances of falling. When you become more sedentary, you begin to lose muscle mass, flexibility, and range of motion, which can drastically affect your balance. Declining strength and flexibility are inevitable. Yes, it's true that the body tends to become weaker and less flexible as we age, but most older adults can recoup and maintain a lot of this through **regular exercise and activity**. It's never too late to improve your strength, flexibility and balance.

"Using walking aids make me less independent."

Some older adults can benefit from the use of a cane or walker, and there's no shame in this.



When used properly, these devices can improve your mobility and make it possible for you to live a more active life.

"There's no point in talking about falls unless they happen." If you're concerned about falling either in the short term or the long, don't keep it to yourself. By garnering support from loved ones and teaming up with a physical therapist, your fall risk can be properly evaluated and improved.

Golf is rebounding, but challenges remain

Many golf courses around the country were closed for play starting in March, including those here in New Mexico. Nearly all of our courses opened May 1, thanks to the efforts of several golf-related organizations, most notably the Sun Country Section of the PGA of America, along with PGA consultant and Las Cruces resident Dave Kimble, who has just been named New Mexico Amateur Golfer of the Year for

2020.

Yet another indicator of how golf is doing is the fact that, nationwide, 99 percent of golf courses are open for play, albeit with some adjustment and concessions to social distancing and contact protection.

Many clubhouse amenities and services, including pubs and restaurants, have not yet opened or are operating on a limited basis. The number of golf rounds played in March

and April decreased by 20 million compared to 2019, but there was a major increase in May and June, almost making up the deficit.

The National Golf Foundation reports that, based on current trends, 2020 could actually see even slightly more rounds than 2019, despite the pandemic. And the non-profit group Youth on Course, reports that golf rounds YTD for kids ages 6 to 17 are up 80 percent compared to last year, with people of color accounting for one-quarter

of those rounds.

So what about the future? My research indicates that things are looking quite positive. Golf has been able to adapt and adjust to a somewhat new reality. Golf fits well with the premium on "safe" activities outdoors, which makes it more attractive. More nine-hole rounds are being played than ever before.

Local golf courses are more available to people working at home and with flex hours. Some see golf taking advantage

of health benefits with time-saving shorter versions involving six holes, nine holes and practice sessions. Golf epitomizes "a walk in the park." And golf is ideally suited for social distancing, as courses typically cover 100 to 200 acres; that's less than one golfer per acre at a time, where folks enjoy open space and fresh air without crowding.

However, the fact remains that many facilities depend on food and beverage revenues, especially events for large

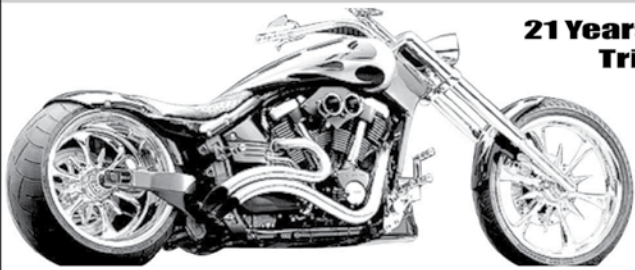
gatherings (like post tournament receptions, weddings, meetings, etc.), to be profitable.

Who knows when, or in what form, these types of events may return? Regular dining, if it's continuing to be available, is going to be at reduced capacity, whether inside or outside, for some time to come.

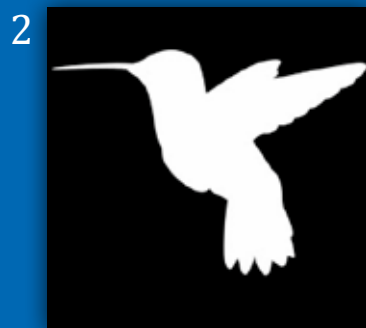
Positive and Negative Space
