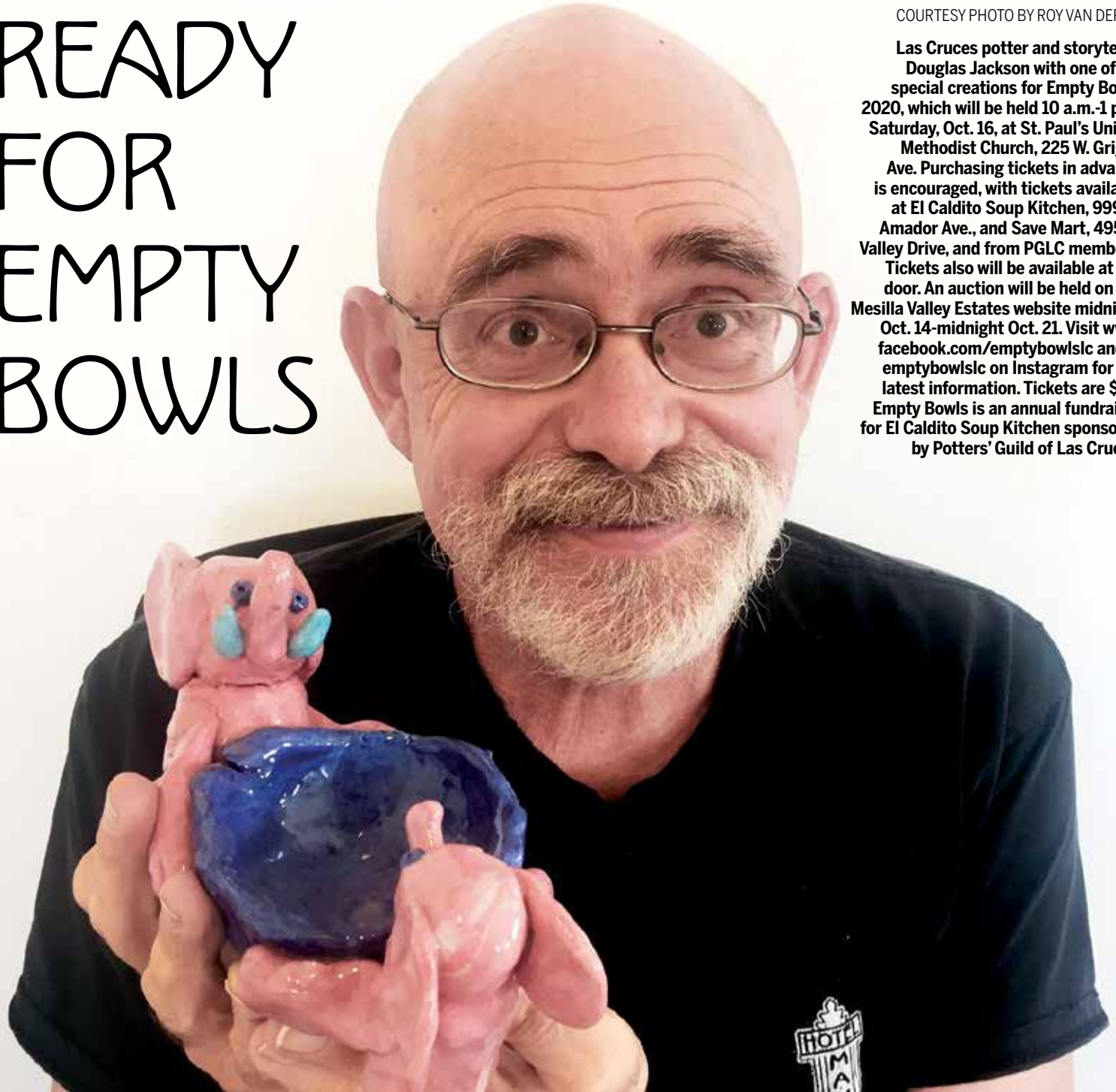

## County renews contract with SNAP, subsidizes services

Doña Ana County and the free spay and neuter program, SNAP, recently renewed their contract to subsidize costs of spaying and neutering pets, especially in rural communities.

“SNAP’s philosophy is that spaying and neutering is the best gift you can give to your pet, yourself and your community,” said Jeanne Quintero, Assistant County Attorney and Interim Manager, Animal Control and Environmental Codes.

SNAP is open and operating, just in a way that supports the safety of clients, volunteers and staff. SNAP is not conducting in-person interviews for applications and vouchers. Instead, they are managing requests by phone.

If the call is not taken at that time, please leave a message with your name and a valid phone number where staff can reach you.

Volunteers will call clients back from their homes and conduct an interview to determine if callers qualify for a voucher and which spay/neuter program is the best, for each. Volunteers will mail an



application, along with instructions to fill it out. The application must be returned to the SNAP office, along with required documentation.

Applicants must be able to show that the animal belongs to them, reside in Doña Ana County and demonstrate low income. Proof of residency in the unincorporated or rural areas in the County is required, such as a current utility bill. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, HUD, low-income guidelines are used to determine low-income status.

Feral cats and dogs, strays and foster animals are not eligible for County-subsidized services. Cats and dogs must be 5 to 6-months old and be current on rabies vaccination, to receive services.

The SNAP office is staffed Tuesday through Friday 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. to receive calls, process applications and notify let applicants when a voucher will be mailed.

SNAP requests no in-person visits. Instead, to apply for a voucher or find out more, please call (575) 524-9265.



## Free “on-call” bus service by SCRTD

The South Central Regional Transit District, SCRTD, now offers free “On-Call,” a convenient customized service transporting residents to medical appointments, work, school or other travel needs.

On-Call is a pilot project operating from the northern boundary of Doña Ana, that is Thorpe Road to the eastern boundary of Elks Drive; Main and Picacho, southern boundary; and the western boundary of the Fairacres neighborhood.

Operating Monday through Friday 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., fares are currently free because of the pandemic. Most trips can be scheduled more than a week in advance, with at least one hour notice.

A Transit District dispatcher will direct bus riders to a safe, nearby pick-up point, within the neighborhood or city. A small bus will arrive to pick up the rider and drop off on the return trip.

The bus will take passengers to any job, school or medical facility located within the city of Las Cruces, including connecting to other SCRTD routes or the RoadRunner bus network. Passengers may schedule daily or monthly appointments and regular pick-ups. The only restriction will be capacity on the bus or schedule.

The regular fare is \$2 and \$1 for youth, elderly, disabled or Medicare-card holders. Transfer to other bus routes is also free.

# November ballot includes funding for NMSU agricultural modernization

Voter approval of General Obligation Bond Issue C on this year's general election ballot will allow New Mexico State University to continue to address important health and biomedical research issues, NMSU President John Floros said. And it will continue construction of the first new buildings on the ag campus in more than 20 years.

In the current public health crisis, "many of the

issues we are trying to address have been brought to the surface," Floros said, in public health, livestock management, food safety and security, water qual-

ity and conservation and technology, along with the need to address infrastructure improvements on NMSU's main campus and at its community

colleges in Las Cruces, Alamogordo, Carlsbad and Grants.

A new biomedical

research building, for example, will allow NMSU to enhance the cancer and virus-related research its already doing, Floros said.

It would “probably surprise a lot of people” to know how much biomedical research takes place in the ag college at NMSU, he said.

With bond funds, NMSU scientists, researchers and faculty members “will be a lot more competitive” as they seek grants and contracts, and the univer-

sity will be able to train many more students “to be leaders” in health and biomedical research and related fields, he said. Funds will help pay for NMSU “research today and tomorrow to solve problems our industry, region and country are facing,” Floros said, and the ability to “do it in a completely new environment.”

If approved by voters, GO Bond C will provide \$30.46 million for construction, renovation and modernization projects across the NMSU system, including \$18 million for biomedical and agricultural

facilities at its Las Cruces campus, NMSU said in a news release.

“We haven’t built any facilities for our ag campus since 1999,” Floros said, noting that NMSU is the state’s ag school and that 20 percent of the state’s GDP comes from agriculture.

Technology improvements made with bond funds will enhance online education capabilities, Floros said, in “a future that may not be all face to face, where connectivity is very, very important at any time and an place all throughout the state.”

The first phase of NMSU’s Agricultural Modernization and Educational Facilities project, which is currently in the design and planning process, is supported by \$25 million in general obligation funding approved by voters in 2018. The New Mexico Legislature approved \$18 million of the \$25 million requested by NMSU in the 2020 bond issue for the project’s second phase, which will focus on improved laboratory, research and classroom spaces for the College of Agriculture, Consumer and Environmental Sciences (ACES). NMSU Architect

Heather Watenpaugh said plans for the agriculture district at NMSU’s Las Cruces campus include new facilities, renovations and demolition designed

to provide premier agriculture education facilities for teaching and outreach, increase hands-on experiential learning, increase opportunities to partner with industry leaders, and support safety with facility design.

The ACES Student Learning and Livestock Outreach Center will provide a central location for both experiential and distance learning models, as instructors create innovative hybrid lessons in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. It will also offer a space for community youth events and therapeutic riding sessions and will be a future home for statewide 4H and FFA conferences when they can safely be held in person.

“These new and modernized facilities will provide a central location

to teach and conduct cross-disciplinary biomedical research,” said College of ACES Dean Rolando A. Flores. “With the right tools and facilities, NMSU research teams can continue their work to help the world understand, prevent and manage disease outbreaks. Building and updating these facilities supports NMSU’s mission to serve the people of New Mexico through teaching, research and extension.”

ACES advances NMSU’s mission by being an engine for the economic and community development of New Mexico. Agriculture and food processing industries generated nearly \$11 billion and 51,000 jobs for the New Mexico economy, according to a recent study. Modernization and

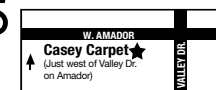

expansion of learning environments help create an agricultural workforce prepared to advance the industry and grow New Mexico's economy.

The last major facility added to the agriculture district at NMSU's Las Cruces campus was Skeen Hall, constructed in 1999 as the Center for Sustainable Development of Arid Lands. Much of the agriculture district, the campus livestock, education and research center, consists of dilapidated and disused facilities whose conditions and use do not align with the ACES needs or the academic advancement trajectory of NMSU in general, Flores said.

GO Bond C includes \$3 million for NMSU's state-wide agricultural science centers, which support fundamental and applied research under New Mexico's varied environmental conditions to meet the agricultural and natural resource management needs of communities in every part of the state. Without major repairs, significant building-system improvements and site

remediation, Watenpaugh said those facilities will struggle to continue serving the needs of New Mexico's diverse population.

The bond also includes \$3 million for data-center infrastructure upgrades in Milton Hall and improvements to the information technology system campus-wide to replace outdated or deficient systems.

Another \$6.46 million will provide campus-wide infrastructure improvements, renovations and equipment at NMSU's community college campuses in Grants, Doña Ana County, Carlsbad and Alamogordo.

In total, the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act will issue just over \$156 million in general obligation bonds for institutions of higher education, special schools and tribal schools in New Mexico. For more information, visit [gobond.nmsu.edu](http://gobond.nmsu.edu).

And, GO Bond B will provide \$3 million state-wide for university library resources, of which the NMSU system will receive a portion.

## In-House Fabrication for Gas Lines: Las Cruces Utilities Behind the Scenes

Natural gas is a clean, easy and cheap way to heat a home or run an appliance. However, working with its connections needs to be done by those certified in the process to make sure that no dangerous leaks occur. For Las Cruces Utilities (LCU), that means helping customers obtain fabricated gas line manifolds that are up to the gas system's standards, by making them in-house.

"Our yearly certifications allow some of our associates to fabricate these manifolds in-house to meet our customer needs," said Pete Duran, LCU interim gas system operations supervisor.

Fabrication is the process of welding piping components

– from the main gas line pipe to the lower pressure pipelines that run into a home or business – to the exact specification of what each location might need. Recently, LCU Senior Gas Welder Lupe Valdez had an order of a new connection needed at an apartment

complex. He needed to weld multiple pipes fittings together to fit the specific spacing of the complex, and to make sure that it fits the LCU gas system. "It's a service we provide in order to make sure that from our line to the gas meter, property

owners can feel secure that gas will flow easily and safely," Duran said. Natural gas is a useful fuel but, in its raw state, it is both odorless and colorless. Gas safety measures now include the addition of mercaptan to create a recognizable sulfur smell that alerts customers to a gas leak. If you ever smell the familiar, sulfur rotten egg smell, or just a strong smell around your gas meter or near your natural gas appliances, give Utilities Emergency Dispatch a call day or night, at 575-526-0500.

# A plan to avoid breaking the U.S. Senate

I fear the unfortunate timing of Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg's death may break the U.S. Senate.

It is, perhaps, the inevitable culmination of a battle between Mitch McConnell and Harry Reid that started years ago, where every time the majority changed, so did the rules. About the only thing left protecting the minority party is the filibuster rule, and its days may be numbered.

With his term as majority leader in danger, McConnell is rushing to get Amy Coney Barrett confirmed to the Supreme Court before the election.

To do so, he has changed the rules established four years ago in declining to consider the nomination of Merrick Garland. Back then, he said it was critical that voters had a voice. Now it is critical that they don't.

Republicans in the Senate can confirm Coney Barrett with a single-vote majority because McConnell changed the rules in 2018 to remove the filibuster for Supreme Court nominees, ensuring confirmation at that time for Neil Gorsuch.

Democrats changed the rules in 2013, when Reid

eliminated the filibuster on lower court and cabinet nominees, which were being systematically blocked by McConnell.

Every time the rules were changed, it took away from the protections of the minority party and made it easier for those in power to avoid compromise.

If Democrats win both the White House and the Senate this year, which appears to be possible, more rule changes are likely. And for good reason.

Because of the Electoral College, we are likely to end up with a Supreme Court in which five of the nine justices

were appointed by a president who lost the popular vote. A court with a solid 6-3 conservative majority for the next two decades would be wildly out of step with the nation as a whole and would be in danger of losing its legitimacy.

Sen. Chuck Schumer has said that “all options are on the table” if Democrats win, including adding new seats to the court. To do so, they would have to get rid of the filibuster entirely.

And that would break the Senate, at least the

version that our founders envisioned. No more cooling saucer. It would become the House, but with longer terms.

There has always been a random nature to Supreme Court vacancies, just as there is to any lifetime position. To bring some order to the process, justices often step down when their party is in power to ensure a like-

minded replacement.

Ginsburg will rightly be remembered as a champion for equality and a pioneer for women of all professions, and she was widely praised for her grit and toughness. But she was urged to step down when Barack Obama was in power. In declining, she gambled twice — first

that Hillary Clinton would win, and second, that she would survive for at least four years if Clinton lost.

Only the party in power can stop the constant ratcheting up of partisan advantages. That’s clearly not going to happen in the next few weeks.

If Democrats win, in-

stead of adding seats to the court, they should apply term limits to the position of Supreme Court justice. That would give each president a more equal opportunity to appoint justices and would make for a more orderly transition.

To do so may require Democrats to end the filibuster. Then, after

taking that one vote, they should do the unthinkable — give back all of the powers that have been stripped from the minority during the past decade and start working together to find compromise.

than in real meetings. Charts can be displayed on computer screens in

There are downsides, too, of course, such as not being able to see people or accurately gauge reac-

tions. And it’s a little disheartening when you tell a fantastic joke (or at least you think it’s fantastic) and you can’t hear everyone laugh.

For now, though, it’s

what we’re stuck with. So let’s all try to grin and bear it.

# NMSU modernization projects more important now than ever

The global pandemic we have been navigating together for more than half of this year has truly brought to light the critical importance of cross-disciplinary biomedical research, modern data infrastructure and an efficient, flexible food supply chain.

These are all areas in which the New Mexico State University system is poised to increase its impact, not just here in New Mexico, but nationally and internationally. More than \$30 million in funding for the planning, design, construction and renovation of NMSU facilities all over New Mexico is part of 2020 General Obligation Bond

C, which will be on the ballot this fall for New Mexico voters. Approval of this bond will not raise taxes.

In 2018, New Mexico voters saw the value in the first phase of our Agricultural Modernization and Educational Facilities project, approving a bond issue that designated \$25 million for these facilities. As a result, we are in the final design stages, in alignment with our long-term master plan for the agricultural district of our Las Cruces campus and our LEADS 2025 strategic plan for the NMSU system. Our interdisciplinary research and training in food security and animal production efficiency will help increase the profitability of New Mexico's agricultural industry as it feeds tomorrow's global population, estimated to increase by 70 percent in the next 30

years.

If approved by voters, these GO Bond C funds will also support Agricultural Science Centers all over New Mexico, which conduct agricultural research in our diverse ecological regions and help local producers make the most of their operations.

Bond funding will support data center infrastructure in Milton Hall and important improvements to information technology on our Las Cruces campus. It will allow us to replace outdated technology to support the digital learning environment required to limit COVID-19 exposure and to plan for the needs of our students in the

future.

In the short term, these projects will create hundreds of construction jobs in Doña Ana County and the communities we serve around the state. But the long-term impact is that NMSU will be more competitive: Our faculty will have the fa-

cilities to expand their research programs and to develop opportunities for collaboration. We'll be a premier institution for training future agricultural scientists. And we'll continue to enhance the agricultural economy in

## Trump's economy

To the editor:

Up until January of this year, Trump constantly reminded the American people that he had created the greatest economy ever. He constantly touted the decrease in the unemployment rate and increase in stock values. Under Obama, the unemploy-

ment rate went from 9.9 percent in 2009 to 4.7 percent in 2016, and it went to 3.5 percent at the end of 2019. It is now 8.4 percent. The improvement during Trump's term was a continuation of the Obama years and the high rate now is due to mismanagement of COVID-19.

The stock market has gone up significantly, but

that primarily benefits the super-rich who own most of the stocks. The 2017 Trump/Republican tax cut was a massive fraud, according to The Chicago Times. It mostly went to stock buybacks by corporate executives and never increased economic growth by the predicted amount. Trickle-down economic philosophy — touted by

There were higher average wages up until end of 2019 — but that was due primarily to increases in the minimum

wage in 29 states. There are still 21 states (primarily in the South) that have the \$7.25 federal minimum wage — that has not been increased in 11 years. During that time, cost-of-living has gone up 25 percent. That is why we have so many low-wage households barely getting by — and it

has only gotten worse the last six months.

In conclusion, Trump did not create the best economy ever. It was a vision in his mind only — and his cult of supporters who believe his rhetoric.

# After additional feedback, 'Gateway to NMSU' project moves forward with combined design

Construction of the "Gateway to NMSU," a large-scale construction project on the east side of New Mexico State University's Las Cruces campus, is set to begin in approximately 12 months. The monument, coinciding with the Interstate 25/University Avenue reconstruction project, is designed to welcome students, employees and visitors to campus.

"This presents a fantastic opportunity for us to plan, design and construct monumental signage inside the new roundabout, which will welcome everyone to our campus," NMSU President John Floros said. "We're always looking for opportunities to make

ourselves more accessible to the Las Cruces community and we believe this project will encourage more visitors and help inspire a sense of pride in what we do."

University planners

developed two possible designs for consideration: "NMSU Bold," which is consistent with other stone and metal signage around campus, and "Aggie Gates," based on the original entry gates

to the university. NMSU conducted a 10-day survey soliciting feedback for designs, which was sent to the NMSU campus community. After some initial feedback, the survey was modified to accept

a broader array of responses and was extended for an additional nine days for submissions. In the end, more than 4,100 responses were gathered, with more than two-thirds of responses coming from NMSU students. More than half of those responding preferred the "Combined NMSU Bold and Aggie Gates" option.

"For a project of this size, scope and importance, a great number of university stakeholders must be consulted, and that's why we have engaged so many individuals," Floros said. "We were pleased with the number of responses we received throughout this entire two-year planning process and we worked to incorporate as many of the suggestions as we could."

The project has been

reviewed and approved by NMSU's Campus Planning Committee, Regents Real Estate Committee and the NMSU Board of Regents. It must still go before the New Mexico Higher Education Department and the state Board of Finance.

Total cost for the project is approximately \$1.1 million, which will be paid for by the sale of land for the I-25/University Avenue construction project and additional funding which can only be used for capital improvements and projects of this kind. Construction for the project cannot begin until the I-25/University Avenue project is completed, tentatively scheduled for September 2021.

## Eight district judges up for retention on November ballot, ninth seeks seat

Eight Third Judicial District (Doña Ana County) judges are on the November ballot for retention, and there is one uncontested race for a new district judgeship.

The district judges seeking voter retention are Manuel Arrieta (appointed in 2009, elected in 2010), Marci Ellen

Byer (elected in 2012), Doug Driggers (a former Doña Ana County district attorney; appointed district judge in 2003, elected in 2004), Grace B. Duran (the first woman elected to the Third Judicial District Court, first elected in 1996 and served 1997-2005; elected again in 2018), James T. Martin (appointed in 2005, elected in 2006),

Conrad F. Perea (former county magistrate judge; appointed district judge in 2017, elected in 2018), Mary W. Rosner (elected in 2012) and Lisa Schultz (elected 2006).

Under state law, judges must receive at least 57 percent voter approval to remain on the bench. Retention elections are held every six years.

In the single district

judge race on the ballot that could have been contested, there is only one candidate: Democrat Richard Jacquez.

The judgeship, which is for the new Division 9 in the Third Judicial District, was created July 1 of this year. Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham appointed Casey B. Fitch as judge. He will serve until the end of 2020.

However, because the judgeship was created after the June 2020 primary, state law provides that political parties select candidates for the General Election ballot. The Doña Ana County Democratic Central Committee selected Jacquez as the Democratic candidate. The county Republican and Libertarian parties did not put

forward candidates for the judgeship.

Jacquez was a county magistrate judge, 2014-18, ran unsuccessfully in the June 2018 Democratic primary for district judge and ran unsuccessfully for presiding municipal judge in the November 2019 election. He will serve a four-year term and face his first retention election in 2024.



# Out of the ashes: Counseling facility recovering from 2013 devastation

After a long saga, Bor-

der Area Mental Health Services is changing its name back to Southwest Counseling Center and

is growing again, with plans to open an office in Anthony.

In 2013, then-Gov. Susana Martinez shut down many of the mental health services in the southern part of the state with charges of fraud and overbilling.

Roque Garcia was running Southwest Counseling in Las Cruces, a nonprofit with ties to Border Services Mental Health in Silver City and New Mexico Human Development in Anthony. All three organizations were shut down by the administration at the time.

“We were accused of fraud of \$2.5 million, and they wouldn’t give us any information as to what we had done wrong,” Garcia



said. “So they closed us down. Not only clients, but employees, everybody suffered.”

At the point it closed, Southwest Counseling Center was the oldest community mental health program in the state and the largest except for the one at the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque.

It was several years later before the organizations were given information about the claims against them. At Southwest Counseling, Garcia was able to disprove almost every claim made against his organization.

Inside the clinic, in addition to its other services, the center provides a room where it’s possible to remotely connect clients with their counselors.

“There were three or four claims that I couldn’t find,” he said. “It turned out to be \$350. Everything else we proved.”

The organizations

eventually were granted financial settlements from the state and the organizations were able to

begin a recovery process. Garcia proposed merging the three organizations to consolidate resources and the individual boards

agreed.

“We expanded the board and merged the corporations, and we started providing services,” he said.

Two years ago, the organization, Border Area Mental Health Services,

saw need in the outlying areas and began tele-med services.

“At that point, it was unheard of,” Garcia said. “We were really one of the first in the state. Our therapists work from home most of the time. We provided tele-med in Las Cruces, Deming, Silver City and the reservations — Pinehill on the Navajo reservation, and some in Albuquerque.”

He said it has been more difficult to provide services during the COVID-19 pandemic, but they were able to get a jump on the tele-med portion.

“Our software is excellent,” he said “We are going forward, we are in a pretty good place. We are hiring more psychiatrists and nurse practitioners. We can provide at-home

care or work through a smart phone. We have people with no computers or smart phones, and they can come into the clinic and we can sit them in front of the screen.”

The organization has nine prescribers and eight therapists, he said. Many clients still prefer

in-person visitations, and all clients must visit the clinic for lab-work and other services.

Two of the providers are fluent in Spanish and Garcia said they have a reliable translation service which also offers access to sign language.

They offer psychologi-

cal services, counseling and juvenile community corrections in the Silver City/Hidalgo County area.

The organization takes private insurance, Medicaid and Medicare.

# Virtual Tents to Rents 2020 passes last year's total

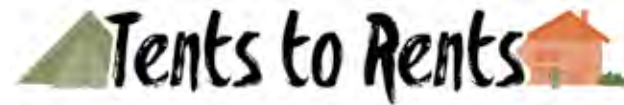

COVID-19 couldn't stop Mesilla Valley Community of Hope (MVCH) and a dedicated group of volunteers from raising almost \$53,000 in this year's Tents to Rents campaign, which moves residents of MVCH's Camp Hope tent city into their own apartments.

This year's campaign, which ran Aug. 14-Sept. 30, raised \$52,684 — \$660 more than the 2019 campaign, said MVCH Executive Director Nicole Martinez.

"We are grateful to those who participated, sponsored and donated to this fundraiser, especially during a time when finances are so unstable," Martinez said. "We are pleased to be able to continue operating Camp Hope, because of the funds raised this year and will continue to house people as quickly as we can."

Camp Hope has no independent funding source, so funds raised



by the Tents to Rents campaign help pay for utilities, tents, tarps, maintenance and insurance, Martinez said.

"It also means we can help move several people into their own apartments by helping with first month's rent, security deposits and utility arrears/deposits," she said. "Likely, we will be able to help at least 20 people with housing assistance directly from the camp and we can continue to shelter at least 200-plus people this year at the camp."

Martinez added that she is regularly contacted about Camp Hope.

"During the pandemic, I can't tell you how many calls I have received from other communities asking for help with creating their own outdoor, sanctioned camps," she said. "We know that this model works and has improved the lives of those

who used its services and we are delighted to share it with others."

The top fundraiser for Tents to Rents 2020 was again Good Samaritan Society Las Cruces Village "Housing Helpers." It raised \$24,243 for this year's campaign, and has raised almost \$49,000 during the past two Tents to Rents campaigns.

"I can't say enough how grateful we are for the support from the folks at Good Samaritan who champion the efforts in ending homelessness," Martinez said.

Martinez came up with the idea for Tents to Rents in 2016. That year, it raised more than \$13,000. In 2017, fundraising totaled more than \$28,000. In 2018, it reached more than \$53,000. Last year's total was \$52,024.

MVCH served 2,744 clients last fiscal year, including 317 veterans, and provided shelter to 234 in Camp Hope Tent City. It provided housing to 570 people, including 150 children. MVCH is located at 999 W. Amador Ave.

## Back Pain Caused By Your Hips? Knee Pain by Your Ankles?

Do you feel pain when you walk, get out of bed, exercise and go about your day? Something could be out of balance (and it's probably not what you think!)

The most common advice you get for things like lower back, knee and neck pain not only fails to bring you the relief you're after – but it can also make your pain worse. For instance, you might have heard from several professionals, family members and friends that you need to "strengthen your back" to get rid of the pain. While this may be true in some cases, if the muscle imbalances associated with your pain have been there for a while and have been tight for months (even years) then exercise will aggravate them even more!

**Do you have neck pain and headaches?** It could be your shoulders. An easy way to find out if there's an imbalance in your shoulder is to stand in front of a mirror and see if one shoulder is higher than the other. If one shoulder is higher – then there's an imbalance, and it could mean there's less room for your shoulder to move fully. When tension builds up in your shoulder muscles – the pain signal is sent to your neck.

But what if your shoulders are even? Your headaches could be from a forward leaning head. If when you look in the mirror you don't see an imbalance in the height of your shoulders, turn to the side – if your head is leaning further forward than your shoulders, this could decrease the amount of blood flow to your head and neck, causing headaches.



**Do you have knee pain when you walk or run?** It could be your hips. The knee has two neighbors – the hip and the ankle.

The pain you feel in your knee could very well stem from tightness and immobility in one - or both - of them. To check if you have good hip mobility, lie on your back perpendicular to a doorway with hands at your sides, palms up, and head on the floor. The midpoint between the knee and hip should be aligned with the doorframe. Lift the leg closest to the doorframe, keeping the foot flexed and knee extended. The other leg and head remain in contact with the floor and the arms don't move. If the ankle of the lifted leg clears the doorjamb and the leg on the floor does not move, you're one of the few with great hip mobility.

But what if your hips are moving ok? Check your ankles! If your hips are mobile (and even if they're not!) your ankles can also cause knee pain. To see how mobile your ankles are (or aren't), face a wall with one knee on the floor and the foot of the other leg in front of you. Both knees should both form 90-degree angles, and the toe of your planted foot should be about four inches from the wall. In this position try to glide your knee over the toes to touch the wall without lifting your heel. If you can reach the wall, your ankle is gliding correctly. If your foot comes up before your knee touches the wall, your calf is tight, causing limited motion in the ankle, and perhaps knee pain.

**Do you have low-back pain?** It might be your hips! As with knee pain, back pain often isn't a back problem at all. If one side of your pelvis is higher than the other, it can trigger back pain, hip pain, groin pain, or even knee pain. Unevenness in your hips can pull on your lower back, causing tightness while sitting all day.

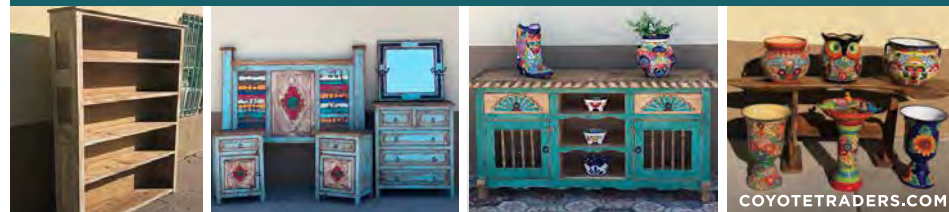

# Three commission seats, county clerk, treasurer are on the November ballot

*Candidate information comes from campaign websites, other candidate sources and Bulletin files.*

Democrats will retain control of the Doña Ana County Commission no matter what happens on Nov. 3, but Republicans are hoping to reduce the Democratic majority. Democratic incumbents also hope to hold the county clerk's and treasurer's offices, as they face Republican challengers in both races.

Two Democratic incumbents are not on the ballot this year, and there is no Republican running in the district two commission race, so Democrats will have at least three seats when commissioners are sworn in next January to begin four-year terms.

## Here are the county races.

- County clerk. Incumbent Democrat Amanda Lopez Askin is opposed by Republican Cheryl De Young. Both candidates are from Las Cruces.

Lopez Askin was appointed clerk by the county commission in September 2018. She defeated one opponent in the June 2020 Democratic primary. From 2005 until becoming clerk, Lopez Askin was a school men-

tal health advocate for the New Mexico Department of Health. She is a graduate of Oñate High School, with a bachelor of science degree in family and child science, a master's in family and consumer sciences and a doctorate in educational leadership administration, all from NMSU. De Young is a native of Las Cruces. She has worked as a volunteer elections official over the course of 30 years. She has a bachelor of science degree in elementary education and was a long-time educator. De Young was a supervisor for Tresco, Inc., served as vice chair and board member for Doña Ana County Senior Olympics and currently serves on the city Senior Programs Advisory Board and the county Election Advisory Council. - County treasurer. Incumbent Democrat Eric Rodriguez is seeking a second four-year term. His opponent is Republican Bernadette A. Dorazio. Both candidates are from Las Cruces.

Rodriguez spent a year as chief deputy treasurer before being elected county treasurer in 2016. He was born in eastern

New Mexico and raised on a ranch on the New Mexico-Texas state line. He graduated from Tatum High School in 2001, has a bachelor's degree in business administration from NMSU and has 10 years' banking experience. He is chair of the county Investment Advisory Committee and vice chair of the New Mexico Treasurers Association. Visit <https://rodriguez4treasurer.com/>.

Dorazio was raised in a Philadelphia suburb and has a bachelor of science degree in behavioral science from Neumann University. She has more than 30 years of financial experience in the banking, insurance and mutual fund industries. Her two most recent positions were at the Vanguard Group and Bank of America. Dorazio said her platform consists of fiscal responsibility, economic growth for the county and a "Treasurer's Treasures" program to teach children about the basics of money. - County Commission District 2. Anthony, New Mexico Mayor Diana Murillo-Trujillo defeated incumbent Ramon Gonzalez in the June Democratic primary. She has no opponent in November and will be sworn in as the new commissioner next January. Murillo-Trujillo is a life-long resident of

Anthony. She has a degree in government from NMSU and was elected mayor of Anthony in 2016. Find her campaign Facebook page at Mayor Diana Murillo-Trujillo County Commissioner District #2 for the people.

- County Commission District 4. This is an open seat, with three candidates in the race: Democrat Susana Chaparro, Republican Stacie M. Durham and Libertarian Buck Bonner. All are from Las Cruces. Incumbent Isabella Solis was elected to the seat as a Democrat in 2016. She switched parties to Republican in 2019 and filed to run for state representative instead of seeking re-election to the commission. Chaparro and Bonner live in Las Cruces. Durham lives in Organ.

Chaparro, a former county magistrate judge who resigned in 2006, won a three-way race in the June 2020 Democratic primary. A native of Las Cruces, Chaparro is a certified court interpreter and owner of a local interpreting and trial consulting firm. She serves as board president of the nonprofit La Casa Inc. domestic violence organization. She is also vice chair of the county Democratic Party. "Now, more than ever, we need dedicated and experienced leadership to guide our community as we help businesses

reopen and work to create new jobs," Chaparro said. Visit <https://susanadistrict4.com/>.

Durham defeated two opponents in the June Republican primary. She has a bachelor of independent studies degree with disciplines in business, anthropology and museum conservation. Durham has lived in Doña Ana County for 25 of the past 40 years, also working for 15 years in the travel and hospitality industry in California. With her tourism background, Durham said she wants to "bring in a revolving economy to boost recreation and hospitality in the Mesilla Valley," and will focus on public safety and making transportation and government programs, including libraries, more available in rural areas. Bonner did not respond to an email message or a cell phone text from the Bulletin, and no website or Facebook page for his campaign could be located.

- County Commission District 5. Incumbent Democrat Manuel Sanchez is opposed by Republican Robert Bruce Flora.

Sanchez, of Las Cruces, was appointed to the commission in March 2019, when Karen Trujillo resigned to become secretary of the New Mexico

Public Education Department. Sanchez, who lost to Trujillo in the 2018 Democratic primary race for the seat, was unopposed in this year's Democratic primary. A native of El Paso who grew up in Anthony, New Mexico, Sanchez has a bachelor of science degree in mechanical engineering from MIT. He has worked for General Electric in aviation and power for 19 years and currently serves as technology and productivity manager. Visit [www.manny4dac.com](http://www.manny4dac.com).

Flora was born in Elwood, Kansas, and raised on a farm near Kansas City, Missouri. He served 20 years in the U.S. Air Force, where he was an electronics technician trained on F-4 jets, a broadcast television engineer and a certified master technical trainer. # Socialist candidate for president visits Las Cruces

The global health pandemic, police brutality and a host of other economic and social issues are causing fear and insecurity across the United States, Party for Socialism and Liberation (PSL) candidate Gloria La Riva said.

“The anger’s building,” La Riva said during an Oct. 1 campaign stop in Las Cruces. “The key is action — organized action.”

Giving the nation’s power and wealth to its workers instead of allowing it to remain concentrated in the hands of a small number of corporations and individuals is central to PSL’s platform, she said, and to changing

the course for the United States.

“Socialism is humane,” La Riva said. “It’s for the people. It’s for everybody.”

La Riva said she has participated in protests against police brutality in Albuquerque and other cities across the country, and she has been arrested several times. She was even shot in the leg once with a rubber bullet.

PSL’s 2020 socialist campaign program includes making access to food, housing, water, education, health care and employment into guaranteed rights; replacing capitalism with socialism; ending racism, police brutality and mass incarceration; paying reparations to the African American community;

giving full rights to all immigrants; shutting down all U.S. military bases around the world; honoring native treaties; giving full equality to the LGBTQ+ community; equality for women and abortion on demand; defending and expanding unions; and “the takeover of stolen wealth of the giant banks and corporations.”

La Riva said her candidacy is an important alternative to Republican President Donald Trump and Democratic challenger Joe Biden.

“I don’t want those two clowns,” is something La Riva said she has

heard at many campaign stops across the country. Trump, she said, “should be in jail for what he’s done.”

“Working people scrape by with multiple jobs, accumulating debt,” is part of the message on a PSL 2020 campaign card. “It does not have to be like this. Every gain we made — Social Security, unemployment, civil rights — was won by people organizing in mass movements. We fight for reforms, but ultimately we need socialism, where all the wealth that work-

ers produce is owned and shared by all.”

PSL was formed in 2004. La Riva was its presidential candidate in 2008 and 2016, and also was a third-party candidate for president in 1992, and four times for vice president.

In 2016, PSL was on the ballot in eight states, and La Riva received about 76,000 votes, or about 0.05 percent of the total national vote. Because of party members’ determination this year, despite COVID-19 restrictions, she said, PSL is on the ballot in 15 states (again including New Mexico), and hopes to receive more than 100,000 votes.

Through ballot access, “we gain much more than the vote,” La Riva said. “We let people know

there’s a socialist party.”

“My support for Gloria, as for the PSL, is because she represents a real alternative for American politics,” said PSL member Ken Hammond of Las Cruces. “The two major parties are really just two sides of a system which supports and perpetuates the power of wealth over the lives of working people. Ordinary people need a way to express their frustration, and to, quite literally, cast a vote for something radically different. Gloria’s candidacy rejects ‘business as usual’ and stands for economic justice and social equality. New Mexicans want and deserve real democracy, not the revolving door of Democrats and Republicans who simply pass the buck back and forth without ever making real changes despite their repeated pledges and campaign promises,” Hammond said.

# Early voting is underway

Absentee ballots may be returned by voters, voters' immediate family members or voters' caregivers at the clerk's office on the first floor of the county building or any early-voting site.

Voters may request an absentee ballot ap-

plication from the clerk's office by emailing [elections@donaanacounty.org](mailto:elections@donaanacounty.org) or by printing an application and mailing it to Doña Ana County Clerk, 845 N. Motel Blvd., Las Cruces, N.M. 88007. If a qualified elector chooses to register to vote immediately prior to voting, there are some identification requirements. The voter must provide 1) a New Mexico driver's license or New Mexico

identification card issued through the state Motor Vehicle Division of the New Mexico Taxation and Revenue Department; 2) any document that contains an address in Doña Ana County, together with a photo identification card; or 3) a current, valid student photo identification card from a post-secondary educational institution in New Mexico, accompanied by a current student fee statement that contains the student's address in the county.

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 1

Proposing to amend the Constitution of New Mexico to provide that the Public Regulation Commission consist of three members appointed by the Governor from a list of professionally qualified nominees submitted to the Governor by a nominating committee as provided by law and that the commission is required to regulate public utilities and may be required to regulated other public service companies.

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 2

Proposing to amend article 20, section 3 of the Constitution of New Mexico to permit the adjustment by law of terms of non-statewide elected officers and to standardize the date an officer begins to serve.

## BOND QUESTION A

"The 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of senior citizen facility improvement, construction and equipment acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed thirty-three million two hundred ninety-two thousand one hundred forty-one dollars (\$33,292,141) to make capital expenditures for certain senior citizen facility improvement, construction and equipment acquisition projects and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law?"

## BOND QUESTION B

"The 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of library acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed nine million seven hundred fifty-one thousand four hundred thirty-three dollars (\$9,751,433) to make capital expenditures for academic, public school, tribal and public library resource acquisitions and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law?"

## BOND QUESTION C

"The 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of higher education, special schools and tribal schools capital improvement and acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed one hundred fifty-six million three hundred fifty-eight thousand four hundred seventy-five dollars (\$156,358,475) to make capital expenditures for certain higher education, special schools and tribal schools capital improvements and acquisitions and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law?"

## SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 1, 53RD LEGISLATURE - STATE OF NEW MEXICO - FIRST SESSION, 2019

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO PROVIDE THAT THE PUBLIC REGULATION COMMISSION CONSIST OF THREE MEMBERS APPOINTED BY THE GOVERNOR FROM A LIST OF PROFESSIONALLY QUALIFIED NOMINEES SUBMITTED TO THE GOVERNOR BY A NOMINATING COMMITTEE AS PROVIDED BY LAW AND THAT THE COMMISSION IS REQUIRED TO REGULATE PUBLIC UTILITIES AND MAY BE REQUIRED TO REGULATE OTHER PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANIES.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. It is proposed to amend Article 11, Section 1 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"A. The "public regulation commission" is created. Until January 1, 2023, the commission shall consist of five members elected from districts provided by law for staggered four-year terms beginning on January 1 of the year following their election; provided that after serving two terms, members shall be ineligible to hold office as a commission member until one full term has intervened; and provided further that commission members elected for terms beginning January 1, 2021 shall hold office for two years.

B. Beginning January 1, 2023, the commission shall consist of three members. The governor shall nominate members from a list of qualified nominees submitted to the governor by the public regulation commission nominating committee, as provided by law, and by and with the consent of the senate shall appoint members to fill positions and vacancies on the commission; provided that no more than two commissioners shall be members of the same political party. Members so appointed shall serve six-year staggered terms; provided that, after serving two consecutive six-year terms, members shall be ineligible to hold office as commissioner until one full term has intervened. A person appointed to fill a vacancy on the commission shall serve for the remainder of the unexpired term.

C. A six-year term for a commission position shall begin on January 1 of the year following the expiration of the prior term for that position; provided that in January 2023, one member shall be appointed for an initial term of two years, one member for an initial term of four years and one member for a six-year term.

D. The legislature shall provide, by law, for professional qualifications and continuing

education requirements for commissioners and for the creation of and procedures for the public regulation commission nominating committee.

E. A commission member may be removed by impeachment for accepting anything of value from a person or entity whose charges for services to the public are regulated by the commission, malfeasance, misfeasance or neglect of duty."

SECTION 2. It is proposed to amend Article 11, Section 2 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The public regulation commission shall have responsibility for regulating public utilities as provided by law. The public regulation commission may have responsibility for regulation of other public service companies in such manner as the legislature shall provide."

SECTION 3. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date that may be called for that purpose.

## House Joint Resolution, 53RD LEGISLATURE - STATE OF NEW MEXICO - FIRST SESSION, 2019

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND ARTICLE 20, SECTION 3 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO PERMIT THE ADJUSTMENT BY LAW OF TERMS OF NONSTATEWIDE ELECTED OFFICERS AND TO STANDARDIZE THE DATE AN OFFICER BEGINS TO SERVE. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. It is proposed to amend Article 20, Section 3 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"A. The term of office of every state, county or district officer, except those elected to fill vacancies, shall commence on the first day of January next after the officer's election.

B. A state, county or district officer elected to fill a vacancy in office shall take office on the first day of January next after the officer's election to serve the remainder of the unexpired

C. The term of a state, county or district officer may be adjusted by law to align or stagger the election of officers for a particular state, county or district office throughout the state. Any such adjustment shall require a legislative finding that the adjustment is to provide for consistency in the timing of elections for that office or to balance the number of offices appearing on the ballot. The term of any officer affected by such adjustment shall not be shortened or extended by more than two years. An extended term shall be counted as one term for the purposes of any limitation on the number of terms an officer may serve. A shortened term shall not be counted as a term and shall be disregarded for the purposes of any limitation on the number of terms an officer may serve. No statewide elective office may be adjusted pursuant to this subsection."

SECTION 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date that may be called for that purpose.

## SENATE Bill 207, 54th LEGISLATURE - STATE OF NEW MEXICO - FIRST SESSION, 2020

AN ACT RELATING TO GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS; AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF CAPITAL PROJECTS GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS TO MAKE CAPITAL EXPENDITURES FOR SENIOR CITIZEN FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS, CONSTRUCTION AND ACQUISITIONS, FOR LIBRARY ACQUISITIONS AND FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS AT INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION, STATE SPECIAL SCHOOLS AND TRIBAL SCHOOLS; PROVIDING FOR A PROPERTY TAX LEVY FOR PAYMENT OF PRINCIPAL OF, INTEREST ON AND CERTAIN COSTS RELATED TO THE BONDS; REQUIRING APPROVAL OF THE REGISTERED VOTERS AT THE 2020 GENERAL ELECTION OF THE STATE; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.--This act may be cited as the "2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act".

SECTION 2. PURPOSE.--For the purpose of providing funds for capital expenditures as authorized in the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, general obligation indebtedness of the state is authorized for the purposes and in the amounts set forth in Section 10 of that act.

SECTION 3. BOND TERMS. --

A. The state board of finance, except as limited by the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, shall determine the terms, covenants and conditions of bonds issued pursuant to that act, including: (1) date or dates of issue, denominations and maturities; (2) principal amounts; (3) rate or rates of interest; and (4) provisions for redemption, including premiums, registration and refundability, whether the bonds are issued in one or more series and other covenants relating to the bonds and the issuance thereof.

B. The bonds shall be in such form as the state board of finance determines with an appropriate series designation and shall bear interest payable as set forth in the resolution of the state board of finance.



**BOND** CONTINUED FROM 25

C. Payment of the principal of the bonds shall begin not more than two years after the date of their issuance, and the bonds shall mature not later than ten years after the date of their issuance. Both principal and interest shall be payable in lawful money of the United States at the office of the paying agent within or without the state as the state board of finance may direct.

D. The bonds shall be executed with the manual or facsimile signature of the governor or the state treasurer, and the seal or a facsimile of the seal of the state shall be placed on each bond, except for any series of bonds issued in book entry or similar form without the delivery of physical securities.

E. The bonds shall be issued in accordance with the provisions of the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, the Supplemental Public Securities Act and the Uniform Facsimile Signature of Public Officials Act and may be issued in accordance with the Public Securities Short-Term Interest Rate Act.

F. The full faith and credit of the state is pledged for the prompt payment when due of the principal of and interest on all bonds issued and sold pursuant to the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act.

**SECTION 4. EXPENDITURES.**--The proceeds from the sale of the bonds shall be expended solely for providing money to be distributed for the purposes and in amounts not to exceed the amounts set forth in Section 10 of the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act and to pay expenses incurred under Section 6 of that act. Any proceeds from the sale of the bonds that are not required for the purposes set forth in Sections 6 and 10 of that act shall be used for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the bonds.

**SECTION 5. SALE.**--The bonds authorized under the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be sold by the state board of finance at such time and in such manner and amounts as the board may elect. The bonds may be sold at private sale or at public sale, in either case at not less than par plus accrued interest to the date of delivery. If sold at public sale, the state board of finance shall publish a notice of the time and place of sale in a newspaper of general circulation in the state and may also publish the notice in a recognized financial journal outside the state. The required publications shall be made once each week for two consecutive weeks prior to the date fixed for the sale, the last publication thereof to be at least five days prior to the date of the sale. The notice shall specify the amount, denomination, maturity and description of the bonds to be offered for sale and the place, date and hour at which the sealed bids shall be received. At the time and place specified in the notice, the state board of finance shall open the bids in public and shall award the bonds to the bidder or bidders offering the best price for the bonds. The state board of finance may reject any or all bids and readvertise and may waive any irregularity in a bid. All bids, except that of the state, shall be accompanied by a deposit of two percent of the principal amount of the bonds in a form acceptable to the state board of finance. The deposit of an unsuccessful bidder shall be returned upon rejection of the bid. The state board of finance may also sell the bonds or any part of the bonds to the state treasurer or state investment officer. The state treasurer or state investment officer is authorized to purchase any of the bonds for investment. The bonds are legal investments for any person or board charged with the investment of any public funds and may be accepted as security for any deposit of public money.

**SECTION 6. EXPENSES.**--The expenses incurred by the state board of finance in or relating to the preparation and sale of the bonds shall be paid out of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds, and all rebate, penalty, interest and other obligations of the state relating to the bonds and bond proceeds under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, shall be paid from earnings on bond proceeds or other money of the state, legally available for such payments.

**SECTION 7. PROPERTY TAX LEVY.**--To provide for the payment of the principal of and interest on the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the provisions of the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, there shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied during each year in which any of the bonds are outstanding an ad valorem tax on all property in the state subject to property taxation for state purposes sufficient to pay the interest as it becomes due on the bonds, together with an amount sufficient to provide a sinking fund to pay the principal of the bonds as it becomes due, and, if permitted by law, ad valorem taxes may be collected to pay administrative costs incident to the collection of such taxes. The taxes shall be imposed, levied, assessed and collected at the times and in the manner that other property taxes for state purposes are imposed, levied, assessed and collected. It is the duty of all tax officials and authorities to cause these taxes to be imposed, levied, assessed and collected.

**SECTION 8. TREASURER--DUTIES.**--The state treasurer shall keep separate accounts of all money collected pursuant to the taxes imposed and levied pursuant to the provisions of the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act and shall use this money only for the purposes of paying the principal of and interest on the bonds as they become due and any expenses relating thereto.

**SECTION 9. IRREPEALABLE CONTRACT--AUTHORITY FOR ISSUANCE.**--An owner of bonds issued pursuant to the provisions of the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act may, either at law or in equity, by suit, action or mandamus, enforce and compel the performance of the duties required by that act of any officer or entity mentioned in that act. The provisions of that act constitute an irrevocable contract with the owners of any of the bonds issued pursuant to that act for the faithful performance of which the full faith and credit of the state is pledged. Without reference to any other act of the legislature, the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is full authority for the issuance and sale of the bonds authorized in that act, and such bonds shall have all the qualities of investment securities

under the Uniform Commercial Code, shall not be invalid for any irregularity or defect in the proceedings for the issuance and sale of the bonds and shall be incontestable in the hands of bona fide purchasers or holders thereof for value. All bonds issued under the provisions of that act, and the interest thereon, are exempt from taxation by the state and any subdivision or public body thereof.

**SECTION 10. PROJECTS.**--The proceeds from the sale of bonds issued under the provisions of the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be distributed as follows for the purposes and in the amounts specified:

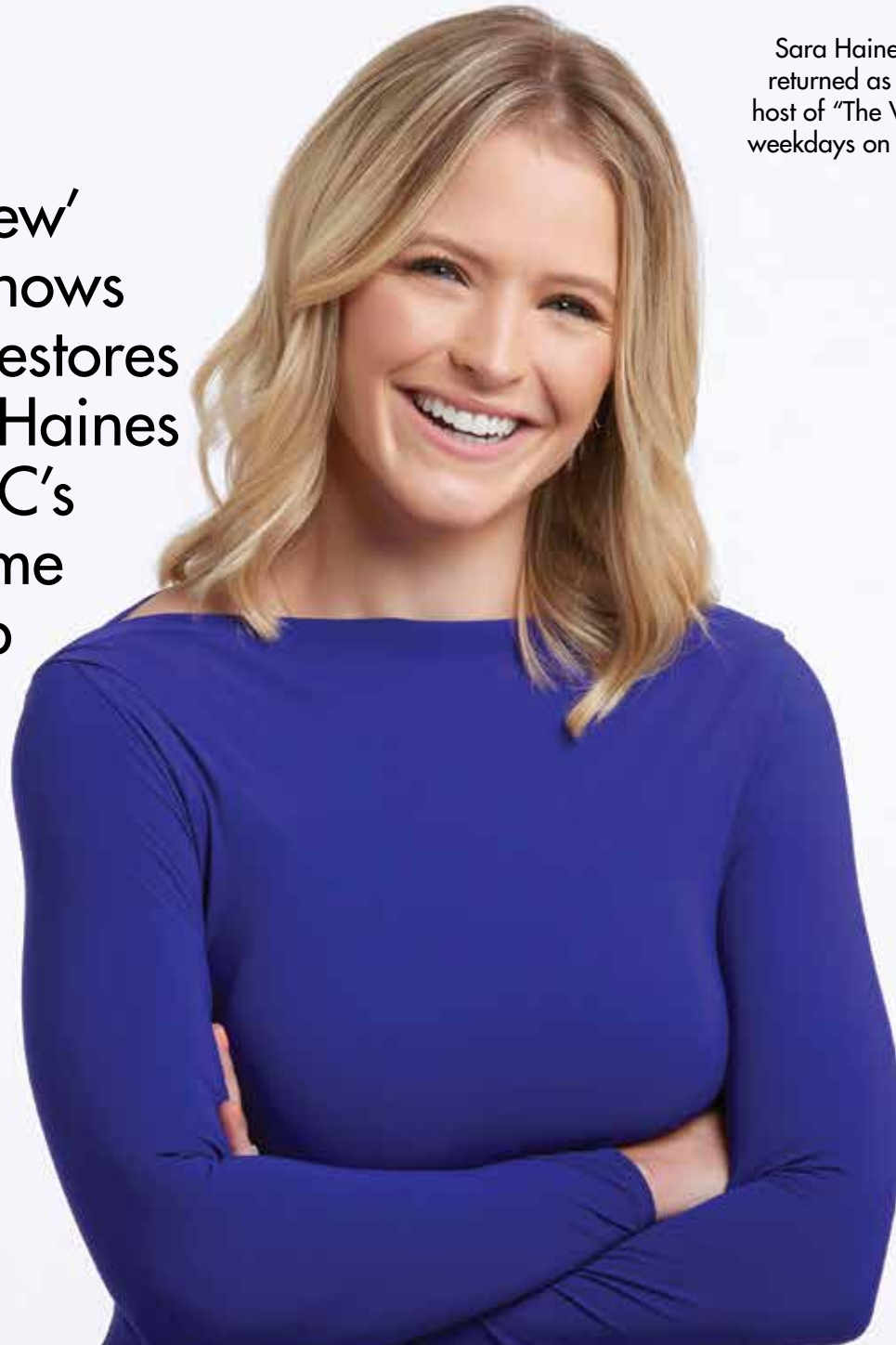

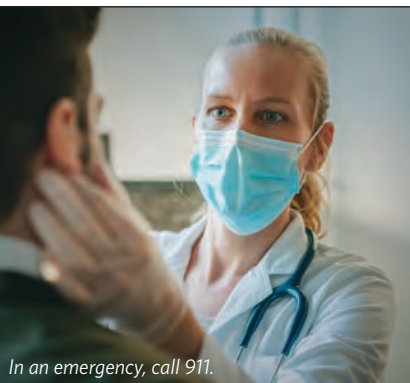

# Continuing to provide resources

The Chamber has sponsored a “Friday Zoom” series available to all businesses in our region focused on topics relevant to Covid safe practices, financial assistance, new marketing tips and navigating the challenging waters. The Chamber staff

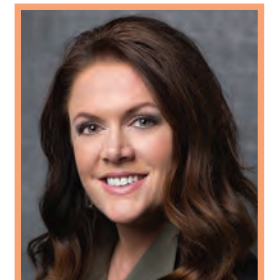
created a “Safe Re-Open” brochure with follow up seminars as well as helped to promote business counseling, educational opportunities, NM Safe Certification, NM Promise and LC Safe Promise.

Debbi Moore, our Chamber President and CEO, has been a driver in local and state collaboration during this time. She has facilitated an LC Re-Opens recovery taskforce consisting of over 15 related organizations across the county that continues to meet regularly. She has worked with state elected officials on the design of the low-interest loan program for small businesses that was approved in the special session, and has led the coordination of recovery efforts with other chambers around the state as the President of the NM Chamber Executives Association. The Chamber has been represented on the Las Cruces Economic Recovery Board and the Save Small Business national coalition. Most recently, Debbi was selected as one of just 42 nation wide to attend the Association of Chamber Executives Fellowship on Economic Recovery.

The advocacy for local businesses is always a core part of the Chamber operations, but this year it has been more important than ever. The Chamber is fortunate to have the close relationships with our elected officials and to always have a seat at the table to work on items such as expanding financial opportunities for businesses in the long term. In addition to all the education, resources,

collaboration and support, we have also been fortunate to provide tangible items to our membership. I know masks seem plentiful right now and are available for purchase at most check-out counters, but at a time they were not easy to come by, the Chamber was selected to distribute over 40,000 masks from the Governor’s office directly to businesses. I am particularly excited that the Chamber was selected to serve as the CAREs Act Grants Administrator for Doña Ana County as we will soon be a key part of getting businesses direct additional financial support.

At this point, I’m sure I have exceeded my 450 word maximum so I will summarize by thanking Debbi, Brandi, Cyndi and the entire Chamber Board who continue to support our local business community in more ways than I can list in this piece. - Business has been forced to close or severely curtailed business operations as a result of closure orders from the State;
- Have 50 or fewer full-time equivalent employees;
- Have an annual revenue

of \$2 million or less prior to the impact of COVID-19;

- Businesses must have had a start date prior to March 1, 2019;
- Non Profit organizations as designated by IRS and have a certificate of good standing with the State of New Mexico.

"We are encouraging businesses to apply as soon as possible," said Debbi Moore, CEO of the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce.

Distribution of funding will begin upon review of completed applications.

For \_\_\_\_\_ Against \_\_\_\_\_"; (2) "The 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of library acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed nine million seven hundred fifty-one thousand four hundred thirty-three dollars (\$9,751,433) to make capital expenditures for academic, public school, tribal and public library resource acquisitions and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law? For \_\_\_\_\_ Against \_\_\_\_\_"; and (3) "The 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of higher education, special schools and tribal schools capital improvement and acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed one hundred fifty-six million three hundred fifty-eight thousand four hundred seventy-five dollars (\$156,358,475) to make capital expenditures for certain higher education, special schools and tribal schools capital improvements and acquisitions and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law? For \_\_\_\_\_ Against \_\_\_\_\_".

C. Each question set forth in this section includes a specific work or object to be financed by the bonds. If any such question is not approved by a majority vote of the electorate at the state's 2020 general election, the issuance of bonds for the work or object specified by the question shall be excluded from and shall not be part of the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act. The failure of a question to be approved by the electorate at the 2020 general election shall not affect those questions that are approved at the election.

D. The secretary of state shall include the submission of the capital projects general obligation bonds to the people at the 2020 general election, and it shall be included in the general election proclamation. The secretary of state shall cause the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act to be published in full in at least one newspaper in each county of the state if one be published therein, once each week, for four successive weeks next preceding the general election as required by the constitution of New Mexico.

**SECTION 12. ART IN PUBLIC PLACES.--**Pursuant to Section 13-4A-4 NMSA 1978 and where applicable, the appropriations authorized in the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act include money for the art in public places fund.

**SECTION 13. PROJECT SCOPE--EXPENDITURES--REVERSION.—**

A. If an appropriation for a project authorized in the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is not sufficient to complete all the purposes specified, the appropriation may be expended for any portion of the purposes specified in the appropriation. Expenditures shall not be made for purposes other than those specified in the appropriation.

B. The state agencies and state institutions to which money has been appropriated in the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be responsible for monitoring the projects funded in that act to ensure compliance with the constitution and laws of New Mexico and shall cause to be reverted any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the earlier of the third full fiscal year after issuance of the bonds or the termination or

**SECTION 14. SEVERABILITY.--**If any part or application of the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is held invalid, the remainder or its application to other situations or persons shall not be affected.

**SECTION 15. EMERGENCY.--**It is necessary for the public peace, health and safety that this act take effect immediately.

## In both New York and Las Cruces, for pianist, guitarist Mark Klett, it's all about the music

Las Cruces native Mark Klett has spent much of the last decade making a name for himself as a talented and versatile musician, performing and accompanying other performers at venues throughout the community.

Klett, 30, has played piano and guitar for productions in the New Mexico State University theatre and choral departments, Las Cruces Community Theatre, Boba Cabaret, Scaffolding

Theatre Company of Las Cruces and other venues. He also has served as accompanist for the Singing Out Choir, at NMSU and local high schools, and as musical director for Well-spring Church. He also teaches music privately and at Las Cruces Academy of Music and Dance.

"NMSU Theatre Arts and the American Southwest Theatre Company are extremely fortunate to be able to work with Mark Klett, who is such an accomplished musician," said NMSU Theatre Department Head Wil Kilroy. "Whether pro-

viding accompaniment for a class or audition or playing for a show, Mark's talent is exemplary and has consistently raised the quality of our work at NMSU. In addition, Mark is such a pleasure to work with as he is so caring, open, collaborative and flexible, exemplifying an excellent role model for our students."

Klett packed up his guitars and keyboards and headed to the East Coast last February to pursue his dream of being a professional musician in New York City. He leased an apartment in Manhat-

tan and started answering ads, finding work playing keyboards alongside British composer and conductor Alastair King ("Harry Potter and the Half-Blood Prince," "Doctor Who") for the world-premiere production of King's off-Broadway musical "The Little Match Girl." Klett also was the accompanist for more than 550 wannabe performers during two days of open-audition calls – "a real exercise in site reading and endurance," he said.

But then, COVID-19 hit, and Klett was forced to moved back to Las Cruces

in mid-March.

"My epic run in New York City lasted one and a-half months," he said.

But, while Klett said he's disappointed that his plans were interrupted (and he's still paying the lease on his Manhattan apartment), he's happy to be back in Las Cruces. He may try his luck again in New York when the pandemic is over, but staying put is also an option.

"I love it here," Klett said. "If I wind up being here, that's not a bad life."

Klett said he's proud of what he has accom-

plished in Las Cruces, and grateful for the support he's received.

Wherever he calls home going forward, Klett said he knows music will be calling him.

"I just like playing music," he said. "I like recording. I'm open to any career path that lets me do those things."

Klett began taking piano lessons at age 5 from Sylvie Peal, whom he called "a great lady." He learned to play on the baby grand piano that's still in his parents' Las

Cruces house.

“I fell in love with it,” he said. “Piano came naturally and easily for me.”

Klett has never stopped tickling the ivories. He added guitar to his musical skill set while a student at Las Cruces High School.

After graduating from LCHS in 2008, Klett studied mechanical engineering at NMSU for more than two years before realizing, “I don’t want to be an engineer. I want to give music a try.”

That’s when he went to work for Leslie Kowalski at the Academy of Music and Dance and began “hustling in the mean streets of Las Cruces” looking for work as a freelance professional musician.

“Mark has been with me since 2011,” said Kowalski, who described Klett as “a talented pianist and guitarist.”

Thanks to support from performer and director

Megan McQueen, who co-founded Scaffolding Theatre Company, Klett said he has become particularly fond of performing in musical theatre.

“That’s the one I’ve had the most fun with,” he said, adding that one of his life goals is to compose a musical.

“Mark is a rare confluence of talent and dis-

cipline,” McQueen said. “His skills as a musician are ever improving, where most people would have been satisfied many hours – years – of practice earlier. He eagerly applies critique and regularly creates new challenges for himself. That is the mark of an incredible artist.”

Klett said he makes mu-

sical videos for YouTube and livestreams his music on Facebook, where he

already has thousands of subscribers on his way to a goal of 100,000.

Klett said he owns and treasures 10 guitars and two keyboards.

“They’re almost like my children,” he said. Learning the piano “laid out the whole foundation of my musical career,” he said. “The guitar lets me show off my razzle dazzle.”

“I love playing the music of the great composers,” Klett said. (Chopin is his favorite.) “I have such respect for what they created. It takes me to a different place.”

“I’m thankful every day I do music,” Klett said. “No matter what’s going on, it’s something I love to do.”

They recently took a break from rehearsals and used Zoom technology to present "Mr. Icky," a short comic play written by novelist F. Scott Fitzgerald in 1922.

BBT also has available online a collection of Shakespeare monologues, directed by Taulbee.

Also online are monologues and short plays written by Colorado playwright Dinah Swan (who is also a talented artist whose work has recently been on display at the Doña Ana Arts Council and the New Mexico Farm and Ranch Heritage Museum).

Two of Swan's pieces were directed by theatre co-owner Ceil Herman and are available on YouTube: Rachel Thomas-

Chappell performing "The Make Over," a comic monologue about a worldly wise east Texas makeup artist; and Marissa Bond performing (in her kitchen) "White Trash Etiquette," a true story about Southern cooking, bad husbands and redemption. Swan has performed this monologue at several theatre festivals, and she said it's one of her favorite pieces.

Swan began writing plays in the mid-1980s because, "as a theatre professor, I had a theatre," she said.

"I wrote a Durango history play/musical about Durango's first newspaper, 'The Durango Record,' and its female

editor/owner, Carolyn Romney," Swan said. "Encouraged, I followed up with 'Butter Beans and Anglers.'"

Swan said she began painting about a decade ago, and began focusing on her art. She is also a successful novelist.

"After retiring from college theatre teaching, I no longer had a theatre and actors at my disposal," Swan said. "There's a reason Shakespeare, in addition to his genius, did so well: He had a theatre."

Swan's novels include "Romantic Fever," "Hacienda Blues," "Cana Rising," "Now Playing in Cana" and "Cana Crossroads." She has written a novella titled "The Root Cause"; short stories titled "Doing Good," "Lemuel" and "Anna's Tree House"; the non-fiction book "Fame Theatre Groups";

Building on changing relationships between the governments of the United States and Cuba, the exhibition includes more than 25 Cuban artists' "ruminations on the quotidian, social and political realities of the island and the contemporary world," the news release said. "The island geography and political intensity of Cuba inform the work in a way that is immediately identifiable, often concealing coded, even subversive, ideas while simultaneously celebrating the richness of Cuba's cultural identity. Peeling away the layers of Cuban art often reveals a story of struggle

caused by economic and political consequences and the social upheaval that a true revolution produces."

The exhibition's artists include Lidzie Alvisa, José Bedia, Los Carpinteros, Yoan Capote, Enrique Celaya, Roberto Fabelo, Diana Fonseca, Pedro Pablo Oliva, Kcho, Sandra Ramos and Estero Segura.

"Spanning several generations, these contemporary Cuban artists come from an unusual place: a country often isolated because of its socialist revolution," the news release said. "All of the artists in this collection grew up in

# Storytellers of Las Cruces honor 60-year member

On Oct. 1, Pat Gill's friends and fellow storytellers got together on Zoom to give her an award for 60 years as a dedicated member of Storytellers of Las Cruces (STLC) and to let her know how much those 60

years of service through storytelling had meant to them and to the community.

Gill was invited to join the group by a fellow Sunday school teacher back in 1960. She was mentored by the group's founder and lifelong leader, Jennie George Curry.

"She was the most accepting and encouraging person," Gill said.

Gill tells stories everywhere – parks, classrooms, churches, libraries, festivals, service club meetings, bookstores and anywhere else that generations of story lovers might gather to hear her. She even told tales underneath the university's Story Tree.

Gill not only told stories, but she mentored other storytellers and advanced the art of storytelling in general. an indispensable part of human development.

"I like the stories where a problem is solved, and people learn to get along," she said.

Her Zoom audience let her know that those feelings were reciprocated.

"Pat has always been a wise mentor, encouraging nascent storytellers by giving positive feedback and reflecting joy and appreciation for the unique style of each presenter," said Gloria Hacker. "I have always felt supported by her open, nonjudgmental presence."

"Pat Gill has been our rock and foundation," said Jean Gilbert. "STLC is grateful beyond measure for her commitment and dedication over 60 years. Gill has shown us by example the meaningful connections we can make through the power of stories."

"Pat and I first crossed paths as storytellers at a performance at Branigan Cultural Center in 1985,"

said Sharlene Wittern.

"She invited me to join the group, and we've been close friends now for 35 years."

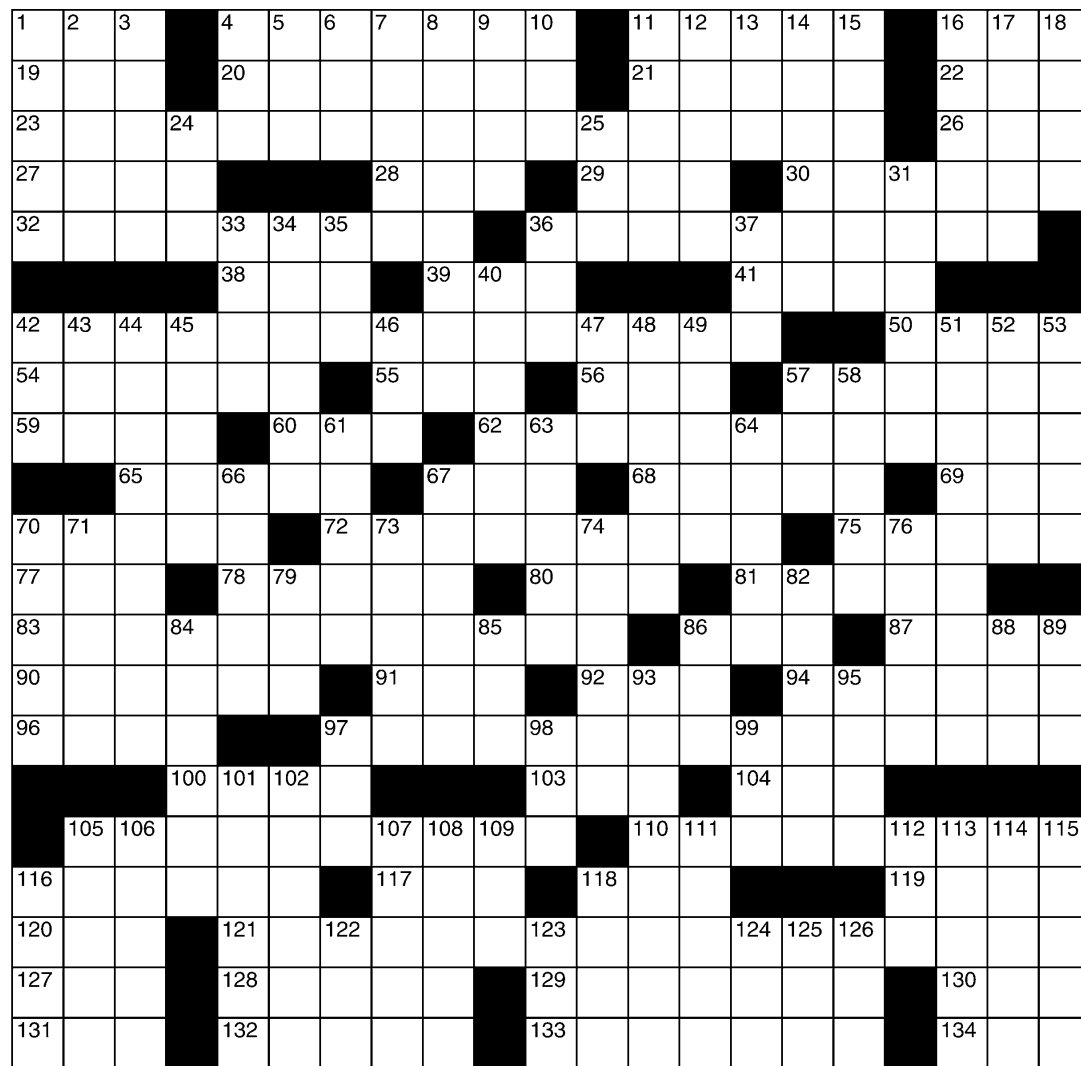

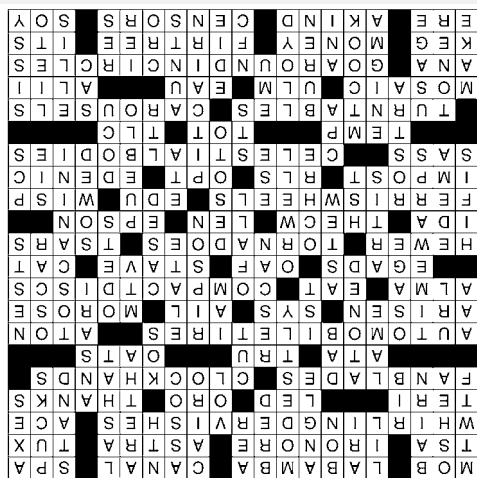

## New mental health agency launches in Las Cruces

### BULLETIN REPORT

Las Cruces Annette Mirabal and Laura Bruggemann have opened 4 Directions Integrative Mental Health at 125 W. Boutz Road and have begun accepting referrals from Las Cruces and surrounding areas.

4 Directions “views integrative mental health as the utilization of evidence-based methods while also incorporating traditional and cultural approaches in the treatment of trauma, depression, anxiety and substance use, among others,” the company said in a news release.

Services provided include an intensive outpatient program (IOP) that runs three hours a day, three days a week, and



traditional mental health therapy through telehealth options, the news release said. If clinically appropriate, in-person sessions are available by abiding by all regulatory safety precautions.

“I know it is a challenge to open a business during a pandemic,” 4 Directions co-owner Bruggemann said, “but we feel mental health treatment is a service this community would benefit from, exactly because there is a pandemic.”

“From my experience working in the treatment of addiction, when stressors increase and resources decrease, substance abuse and mental

## LFC meetings stress need for strategic workforce development

Smart, strategic workforce development lies at the epicenter of New Mexico’s economic recovery. A vast majority of the unemployed are going to have to reskill or upskill to take on new jobs in industries that will recover, because many pre-COVID jobs simply won’t be coming back.

This finding has been highlighted in two recent presentations made to the New Mexico Legislative Finance Committee (LFC). This month, New Mexico State University’s professor emeritus Dr. Jim Peach spoke to the LFC about the future of New Mexico’s economy in light of COVID-19 and declin-

ing oil and gas industry revenues.

He pointed to a transformation on the horizon, as the state will move from high numbers of people employed in small businesses to greater reliance on larger corporations, which have been more successful in riding out COVID. Peach indicated concern there aren’t more of those corporations here.

He also talked about

something that hasn’t gotten much attention. “New Mexico’s economy is being propped up by massive injections of federal funds,” Peach said.

Indeed, the CARES Act federal stimulus funds flowing into the state have artificially propped up the economy, as they were designed to do. He specifically discussed how the additional \$600 unemployment benefit was a significant contributor to

the state’s economy, with more than 130,000 people receiving it when it was available.

We also don’t yet know our unemployment rate, as the work-search requirement for those on unemployment insurance was suspended until Oct. 25, meaning some of the unemployed aren’t showing up in the count yet. As of August, the Las Cruces Metropolitan Statistical Area (which includes the

rest of the county) stood at 10.9 percent (twice the rate pre-COVID). What we do know is that 9,907 were filing for unemployment benefits on Oct. 5, down from a high of 13,327 mid-June. We should know the accurate rate in November.

Two of Peach’s suggested remedies for the state’s recovery included increased investments in

education and workforce training, exactly what The Bridge of Southern New Mexico and the Workforce Talent Collaborative have been advocating all along.

Peach's recommendations mirrored those from the August LFC meeting in a Spotlight report from

Dr. Sarah Dinces of the LFC's Program Evaluation Unit titled, "Workforce Development Post COVID-19 Pandemic," that examines what New Mexico gets for the estimated \$322 million it invests in workforce development.

The Spotlight reported 40 percent of the jobs lost are in three of the state's largest private indus-

tries: accommodation/food service, retail trade and healthcare/social assistance. Those most impacted were in lower-wage jobs and under the age of 24. It also referenced a study by the University of Chicago estimating 32 percent to 42 percent of lost jobs won't return.

What did Dinces's report recommend? "New Mexico needs to adopt and expand proven strategies to increase employment."

Some of the recommendations included:

- Focusing on proven

strategies and best practices.

- Focusing on education and training for jobs and careers in industries poised for recovery and growth.
- Insisting on better outcomes from the local workforce boards and increasing transparency on outcomes and better return on investments. Dinces indicated that all four regional boards were failing on some of their outcome metrics.
- Increasing the connec-

tions between job seekers in the Workforce Connections system and colleges and universities, including offering advisement to students about in-demand employment information and better tailoring of college programs to meet local workforce needs.

- Diversifying and expanding apprenticeships into target industries.
- We simply must do all we can to encourage and help our neighbors

displaced by COVID to reskill and upskill with skills-specific training and employer-valued career-related credentials and degrees. Reemployment will, in fact, drive recovery.

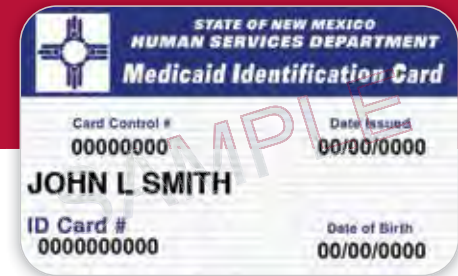

# APA seeks donors as move looms

ACTion Programs for Animals (APA) is growing, and part of the growth is moving from its present location at 800 W. Picacho Ave. to a new, larger facility at 537 N. Solano Dr.

As is the case with most nonprofits, APA relies heavily on financial support from the community to further its mission.

To that end, the organization participated in El Paso Giving Day Oct. 15, which was an online charitable giving campaign designed to support causes in the community.

While that event has passed, APA continues to seek community support for its activities, most of which center around pulling animals from the Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley (ASCMV) and finding good homes for them. APA also operates a pet food bank for low-income individuals.

“After years of tireless work from a very small facility, we are making the move to a larger building with the hopes of being able to rescue more animals from the shelter,” said APA Executive Director Michel Meunier.

Meunier said all funds raised will go to:

- New, bigger dog kennels to rescue larger dogs.
- Outfitting feline rooms with outdoor “catios” (cat patios).
- Re-doing the heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) and air exchange system to keep the animals healthy.
- Installing privacy fencing.
- Purchasing paint and other supplies to improve the building.
- Creating a space to engage with the public and for humans and pets to fall in love.

Meunier said funds also will go to the Prisoners and Animals Working Toward Success training program, in which APA partners with the Southern New Mexico Correctional Facility to provide an opportunity for inmates to learn life skills while training adoptable dogs. In return, APA can adopt out fully-trained, well-behaved dogs to new

homes at no additional cost.

APA, Meunier said, is a progressive animal welfare organization seeking to improve the quality of life for companion animals in Doña Ana County and greatly reduce the number of unwanted animals impounded and euthanized at the ASCMV.

Since May 2012, she said more than 4,800 animals

have been rescued.

“The majority of these have been dogs and cats/kittens,” she said. “We do this through volunteer work of rescue/foster coordinators, foster families, weekend adoptions and donations.”

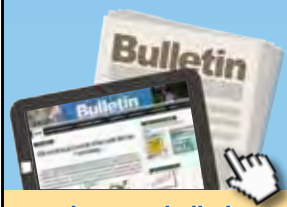

# Saying goodbye is a process, not a word

I don't know how it is at your house, but we have an old custom at ours which has been developed over the years and becomes more of a ritual each time we do it. Let me describe it.

The house is full of company — a dozen or so guests. They have come to share a potluck meal with us and enjoy an evening of good conversation for two or three hours. Then the time comes for them to go home. The ritual begins.

One of the guests announces that he and his family really must be going home. Others begin

to murmur essentially the same thing, and a few feet begin to stir. One forthright soul even gets up as if to leave.

Then the host or hostess says, "Must you leave so soon?" The reply: "Oh yes. I'm afraid we must.

The children have to get up early for a field trip tomorrow. Thank you for your hospitality. It was great being here."

Then things really begin to warm up. Guest A says goodbye to the host and hostess and the two children one by one, while expressing their thanks. If they are relatives, hugs

and kisses may go with each goodbye.

Guest B follows the same procedure as Guest A. Then guests C, D, E, H, I, J, K follow suit. Before the crowd has departed out the front door, at least 48 separate goodbyes have been said to the host and his family.

It gets even more exciting when Guests A, B, C, D and E start telling Guests F, G, H, I, J and K goodbye, as they too must part company and go to their separate homes.

Now if you think this is the end of the party, you're wrong. Out the front door go the guests with all the members of the family following. A

few more words are exchanged, overlooked questions asked, best wishes extended, and the goodbyes start all over again. This may mean 20 or so more goodbyes.

Down the steps and out into the yard go the entire crowd. Conversations continue. Then a couple courageously gets into their car, others following their example, and the goodbyes start again, perhaps another 20 or so.

At last they are all in their cars, the engines start and the hand waving begins. A few more goodbyes are said by at least half the crowd to everybody in general so that the silence won't get too awk-

ward while the engines are warming up.

Finally, the cars start to move and the hand waving and goodbyes continue until the last car is out of sight. A good five minutes worth of arm exercise has been expended during this time. A quick mathematical calculation reveals that at least 298 goodbyes have been said in the departure of our guests, to say nothing of the goodbye value of the hand waving.

This reminds me of the time when a bachelor friend of ours stopped by for a visit. We had a good time together for about an hour. Then, he finally said, "Well I guess I'll be

going home."

Just then our attention was momentarily diverted by one of our small children, and when we looked around, our friend was already out the door and starting his car. He really meant it when he said he was leaving. We appreciated his economy of words, but we weren't quite ready for his abruptness in leaving.

Somehow, we want to soften the blow of parting with friends and loved ones, so we leave in stages.

## Open enrollment underway for Medicare

Medicare open enrollment began Oct. 15 and continues through Dec. 7.

New Mexico's State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP) offers free, unbiased, expert information and assistance to New Mexico residents.

For most people, open enrollment is the one time of year that they can change Medicare coverage.

It is important to review the materials sent by the plan, like the "Evidence of Coverage" (EOC) and "Annual Notice of Change" (ANOC).

Medicare health and drug plans can make changes each year — things like cost, coverage and which providers and pharmacies are in-network. Also, health needs may have changed, making a comparison of Medicare health and drug plan

choices key to ensuring the best coverage for the coming year.

"Medicare scams and high-pressure advertising can be issues for seniors during open enrollment," said Kris Winterowd, SHIP coordinator. "Getting free, unbiased information and assistance from a SHIP counselor can really help reduce stress and help people have confidence in their choices. Plus, we can often help people save

money."

In past years, SHIP counselors traveled to senior centers and other sites in the state for in-person Medicare counseling during open enrollment, which will not be possible this year due to the pandemic.

All counseling will be conducted via telephone at 800-432-2080. This year Medicare beneficiaries can request a phone appointment with a counselor.

Having a complete list of medications and dosages at the time of appointment

# Aggie football memories: A streak-breaking victory in 1958

The Las Cruces rumor mill hummed in December 1957 with uncertainty swirling about Tony Cavallo, head football coach at New Mexico A&M College. When he was selected prior to the 1955 season at the princely annual salary of \$9,000 in a four-year contract, Cavallo became the college's second consecutive hire from the high school coaching ranks, and neither he nor his predecessor, James Patton, experienced much success leading the Aggies.

Upon concluding a 3-7-0 season in 1957, in which his overall record stood at seven wins, 23 losses and zero ties during his tenure, Cavallo's future stirred up plenty of conversation. While public opinion was divided on his status, most people agreed that hiring another former high school coach was not the solution to rebuild the Aggies' flagging efforts on the gridiron since the disruption wrought by the Second World War.

Cavallo's three seasons at the helm of Aggie football failed to improve its standing in the Border Conference football standings. Between 1946 and 1954, the Aggies played 43 conference games, winning seven of those league contests, tying one and

losing the rest of them, to find themselves perennially cellar dwellers in the conference's final standings.

Cavallo's charges failed to win a single Border Conference game in 12 attempts between 1955 and 1957. So, in early 1958, college officials decided on a new direction for the football program and released Cavallo from his contract, replacing him with Warren Woodson.

Although he'd been away from coaching for a year, Woodson had previously led the Hardin-Simmons University Cowboys (1941-51) and the University of Arizona Wildcats (1952-56), two Border Conference members.

On Feb. 18, 1958, the Aggie Booster Club feted Coach Woodson at the

Town and Country Restaurant with more than 300 in attendance. Asked when the Aggies would field a winning football team, Woodson stated, "This fall."

If incredulity simmered among the Aggie faithful, their hesitancy was understandable. The Aggies' most recent conference victory occurred in Las Cruces on Nov. 21, 1953, when the West Texas State College Buffaloes returned to Canyon on the short end of a 19-13 final. Since then, the Aggies had dropped 16 consecutive Border Conference games, including being shut out five times.

The results were disheartening: against Arizona, a 58-0 pounding; 0-4 against both Hardin-Simmons and West Texas

State; three losses against the Bulldogs of Arizona State at Tempe; and, worse, four losses against the Texas Western Miners, who outscored the Aggies 146-32.

But the firm certainty in Woodson's two-word reply must have convinced the room that he would lead the Aggies to previously unknown heights. The proof resounded in the conviction of his voice.

The Aggies' 1958 football schedule included four Border Conference games; five non-conference match ups against teams from Texas, New Mexico and Colorado; and the first game in an eventual three-game international series against the Universidad Nacional Autónoma de México.

September's results were mixed at best. When the Aggies opened the season at home against Trinity University of San Antonio, Woodson started many freshmen on both sides of the football, and they endured a 20-0 beating. He sent out his charges the following Saturday to defend Memorial Stadium against the upstate archrival Lobos, and in defeat the Aggies displayed more prowess in a 16-7 loss.

With two losses to open the season, the Aggies quickly needed to stem the tide before the season slipped away. The pros-

pects appeared dim entering the contest against the visitors from Mexico City, as both team captains, Art Hernandez and Joe Kelly, were sidelined with injuries. Although México scored first, the young Aggies, led by quarterback Charley Johnson and running back Louis Kelley, scored two fourth-quarter touchdowns to earn a 28-14 win, the first victory for Coach Woodson in Las Cruces.

Afterwards, the Aggies split two non-conference games with a loss at Denton to North Texas State and a win in Gunnison, Colorado, against Western State.

Next up on the schedule was a home game against the Aggies' other archrival, the Texas Western Miners, an opponent the Aggies had not defeated since 1946.

With Joe Kelly back in the lineup after recovering from a peptic ulcer, Charley Johnson welcomed the return of a reliable playmaker, and the offense played well with Johnson connecting on pass after pass and Richard Cohee rushing for 105 yards on 25 carries.

But two plays late in the game sealed its outcome. When an Aggies' drive stalled at the 13-yard line, Danny Villanueva calmly booted a field goal to grab the lead from the Miners, but quarterback Bob Laraba and running back

Jackie Meeks of Texas Western had no intention of losing to the Aggies.

With little time remaining in the fourth quarter, Meeks broke free for 64 yards and a clear path to the end zone before Billy Ray Locklin "brought him down from behind with a tackle that could be heard all the way to El Paso," in the words of Abe J. Perilman of the Las Cruces Sun-News.

Before 7,000 fans at Memorial Stadium, the victorious Aggies carried Coach Woodson off the field on their shoulders. In one evening, two unenviable streaks ended, and the Aggies found themselves tied with Hardin-Simmons for first place in the Border Conference race.

In the game's waning seconds, for local fans, according to Perilman, "the realization came that the new era in Aggie gridiron fortunes had truly arrived."

Although the balance of the season resulted in three conference losses and a win over McMurry College of Abilene, Texas, and a season record of 4-6-0, Woodson was correct: his freshman-laden team indeed made an impact in the Border Conference.

With now tested players on offense and defense, the foundation was firmly in place for the outstanding seasons of 1959 and 1960.

# The myths of golf debunked, Part One

**Myth:** You should always aim at directly at the pin in order to make more birdies.

**Truth:** There are “red light” and “caution light” hole locations, but few “green light” pins. For recreational golfers, going for

every pin can balloon your score. Middle of the green is generally best.

**Myth:** The “yips” are all in your head.

**Truth:** If you have ever had the putting yips, you know that it is an affliction with no known cause and

no absolute certain cure. Especially on shortish putts, you tend to jerk with a seemingly uncontrolled muscle spasm at the moment of impact. Several years ago, researchers found that yips were a matter of vision coupled with muscle tenseness. A possible answer may be the long putter. Fooling your mind into not caring about results works wonders.

Try putting with your eyes closed, like Sergio.

**Myth:** On a lay-up hole (mostly par 5s), you should make your shot close to the green so that you have a shot as short as possible.

**Truth:** If you're a mid to high-handicapper, a 50-yard flip lob wedge may be virtually impossible for you, even though you're close to the green. Lay up to the distance where you can avoid a hazard and can hit your next shot with the club in which you have the most confidence.

**Myth:** If ya' ain't cheatin', ya' ain't tryin'.

**Truth:** This myth came from an old baseball player turned golfer. Football, baseball, soccer, hockey auto racing and road cycling all encourage com-

petitors to cheat and not get caught. Roger Clemens, Tom Brady and Lance Armstrong got caught. Golf is played as a gentleman's game where cheatin' ain't allowed nohow. Get it, sandbaggers?

**Myth:** All this visualization and imagery business is just hocus-pocus foisted on us gullible hacks to sell books.

**Truth:** The power of the subconscious mind is not to be underestimated or unappreciated. Just try picturing the shot you don't want to hit — like “don't hit it in the water,” and see what happens. The power of visual imagery before every shot, which few other competitors recognized at the time, is what gave Jack Nicklaus the edge.

**Myth:** If you're capable of hitting your seven iron 150 yards, that's what you should use for your approach shot every time.

**Truth:** What you're capable of and what club you should be using are two different things. Pick the club for the distance you can hit accurately four out of five times, not one out of five. Factor in the slope, the lie, the wind, the roll and how you've been swinging during the round. I'm not saying you should get Bryson-type slow, but think about what you're doing. For better golfers, those mental and visual calculations are nearly automatic.

**Myth:** When you're hitting into a strong headwind, it's best to close the

clubface and swing really, really hard.

**Truth:** That myth is akin to the old saying, “Swing hard in case you hit it.”

**Myth:** If you're over 50, regularly shooting sub-70 rounds, you should give the Champions Tour a try.

**Truth:** Those guys are champions. It's the equivalent of an aging hippie country singer in a honky-tonk bar out in the Midwest cornfields thinking he's going to win American Idol. Monday qualifiers are hard.
