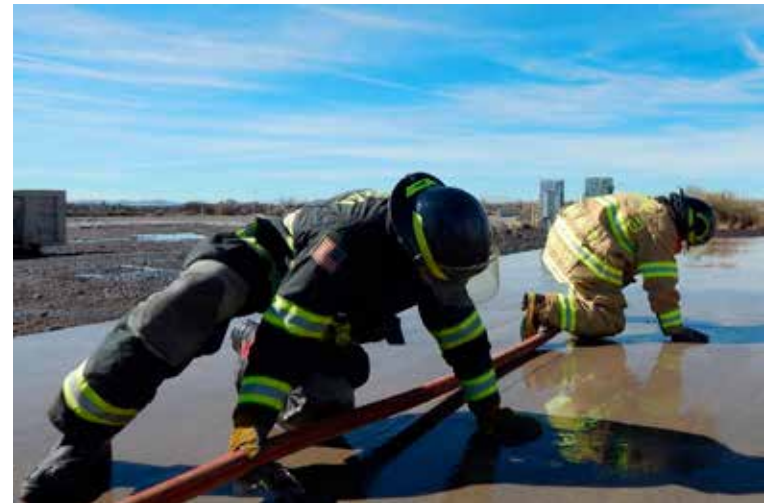

County Fire & Emergency Services adjusts to pandemic, starts hybrid training

Doña Ana County's Fire & Emergency Services Department will offer its first hybrid training ever, a Firefighter One Certification starting in November. "Before the pandemic, we were not prepared to train cadets remotely, so we had to learn, adjust and do so very quickly," Fire Chief Eric Crespin said. "Now, we are excited to offer a hybrid training which means classroom time will be replaced with remote learning and the physical training will follow social distancing and disinfecting guidelines, while wearing masks." Virtual training will still include an in-

structor, testing and discussion. To attend the course, firefighters must have access to a computer, video camera, microphone, speakers and access to the Internet. The schedule of classes will be extended by several weeks, to accommodate remote learning needs and working in smaller groups for skill training, drills and evolutions. DAV Chapter 38 of Mesilla: Veterans helping veterans

For Disabled American Veterans (DAV) Chapter 38 Commander Kevin Dasing and other members of Chapter 38, based in Mesilla, helping veterans is a calling.

Help comes in a variety of ways, including providing transportation back and forth from Las Cruces and El Paso to medical appointments in Albuquerque (they also pick up and drop off veterans at stops in other communities along the way), help with applying for a disability and completing other paperwork and providing food, clothing, blankets and cash to veterans in need, including those struggling with homelessness.

Dasing, who retired in 1994 after 20 years with the United States Army and four years with the Texas State Guard, has been the Chapter 38 commander since 2013. He is past commander of DAV Chapter 10 of Las Cruces.

Dasing said he has worked with veterans with combat-related disabilities and a wide range of non-combat injuries incurred during military service, including one veteran who survived a plane crash.

Dasing also is DAV SEC District 4 commander, overseeing five chapters in the area. He visits every chapter at least once every three months and has helped get them all connected by com-

puter.

Dasing is a past commander and district commander of the American Legion and a member of

the VFW, the Southwest Native American Veterans Association and Blue Star Moms, and is an associate member of the

Marine Corps League.

Dasing is also one of five members of the National DAV Legislative Committee, and has traveled to Washington, D.C. to speak before members of Congress about federal legislation important to veterans, he said. He also has lobbied the New Mexico Legislature on behalf of veterans' issues, participated in honor flights and the local Veterans Day Parade and even helped get a New Mexico

license plate honoring women veterans (www.mvd.newmexico.gov/military-and-veterans.aspx). Dasing has also been a member of the Las Cruces Mayor's Veterans Advisory Board and former U.S. Rep. Steve Pearce's veterans' advisory group, he said. He has also helped create monuments at Las Cruces' Veterans Memorial Park (<https://las-cruces.org/1726/Veterans-Memorial-Park>).

DAV Chapter 38 meets at 8 a.m. the third Saturday of the month at Rudy's Country Store and Bar-B-Q, 1020 N. Telshor Blvd. DAV 38 officers meet 10 a.m.-noon every Friday at Mesilla Town Hall, 2231 Avenida de Mesilla, where they are available to assist veterans. "Bring your records," Dasing advised.

Disabled veterans host fundraiser

Since we're at the edges of the colder season, it might be time to dust off the neglected old furnace. If you're feeling squeamish about lighting your furnace and want to make sure there aren't any gas leaks, Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) will come out for free to relight it, check for leaks, check that your air conditioning is winterized – all for free.

Scheduling is easy: Call Customer Central (575) 541-2111 and representatives will schedule an LCU field service technician to be dispatched to your home at a time convenient for you. An adult at least 18 years old must be present when the technician arrives. Last year alone, LCU serviced over 350 customers.

Tis the season: Las Cruces Utilities Relights Furnaces for Free

LCU Field Services Technician Jessie Vargas may be the one to help you relight your furnace this season and check for gas leaks. Gas relights are free to residential customers and include a check for gas and carbon monoxide leaks.

"It's a courtesy we extend to our customers, especially since it gives a peace of mind that there are no dangerous gas leaks in the home and a confidence that it's done correctly,"

Jose F. Provencio, LCU deputy director Business Services said. Technicians will check for gas leaks, the safety of the furnace enclosure, and ensure that the furnace filter is ready for operation.

Residents will be instructed on the purchase of a new filter if it is needed.

"When we relight the furnace pilot, we will also complete a cycle operation, and check for proper combustion with the carbon monoxide test," Provencio said. Carbon monoxide poisoning can be very dangerous, and even deadly, with symptoms that include headache, dizziness, weakness, upset stomach, vomiting, chest pain, and confusion.

While natural gas keeps a furnace and other appliances running, in its natural state, the gas is odorless and colorless. However, for safety measures, LCU Gas includes the addition of the chemical mercaptan to create a recognizable sulfur smell that alerts customers to a gas leak.

If you ever smell an unfamiliar sulfur rotten egg smell, or just a strong smell around your gas meter or near your natural gas appliances, give Utilities Emergency Dispatch a call day or night, at 575-526-0500. A Gas service associate will be dispatched, regardless of the time.

votes, but I do have some comments about the questions you'll find on your ballot regarding bonds and constitutional amendments.

BOND C

We all know the importance of New Mexico State University to Las Cruces, but NMSU also has a vital importance to the state of New

Mexico, to our southwest region and beyond.

We are an agricultural school and should strive to be the nation's best one. Bond C would help fund NMSU'S Agricultural Modernization and Educational Facilities project. The project, which includes a building for biomedical teaching and research, could give NMSU some of the best agricultural facilities in the nation. That would boost

our student opportunities immediately, but also make NMSU attractive for top agricultural faculty, as well as for international research projects.

In other words, it's a chance for NMSU to take a giant leap forward, providing tremendous opportunities for our community and our state. In 2018, New Mexico voters stepped up to pass the bonds for the design phase of these projects. We need Bond C to help push it toward the finish line.

In New Mexico, we are sick and tired of languishing at the bottom of so many lists. NMSU has long been recognized nationally as one of the best educational values in America, and we're also one of the top Hispanic-serving universities. The improvements and opportunity Bond C would create for NMSU could dramatically enhance and

advance our university's mission. Give us a chance to make a true bold step forward.

AMENDMENT 1

Constitutional Amendment 1 would change the way the state's Public Regulation Commission is created. This is the body that oversees public utilities in New Mexico. Currently, there are five elected members, one each representing a geographic district in the state. The amendment would reduce the commission from five to three and make them governor appointees rather than publicly elected.

The PRC has always been an unusual election. It is challenging both from the standpoint of finding qualified candidates and educating the voters. Voter turn-

Six ways to make our elections better

Every four years at this time I have the same thought: Isn't there a better way to do this?

Much of my frustration is tied to the fact that we don't pick our nation's leader in a national election. Instead, we have 50 local elections held on the same day, providing 50 opportunities for local officials to tinker with the process.

For example, the governor of Texas has ordered that there be just one ballot drop-off box for the 2.3 million residents of Houston. Blatant voter suppression in national elections impacts us all.

Here are six suggestions to improve the presidential election:

1 Hold one national

Primary Election with all 50 states voting on the same day. Letting Iowa and New Hampshire win now the field each election cycle makes no sense.

One national Primary in either May or June would increase participation and require candidates to take a broader, national approach.

2 Cut the political conventions to one day. The decision by the GOP this year not to adopt a platform has made it of-

ficial — conventions are now entirely pointless. Let them have their one-day infomercial, but no more.

3 Establish national standards for mail-in voting. Every election, thousands of mail-in ballots are rejected because of a mistake made by the voter. Oftentimes, whether to accept or reject a ballot is a judgement call made by partisan election officials, adding to distrust of the mail-in process. There should be one national standard as to when a ballot is rejected, accompanied by a massive voter-education campaign to ensure that everyone knows the rules. And, all mail-in ballots must have

the postage prepaid.

4 Bring some level of regulation and transparency to campaign advertising. The Citizens United Supreme Court ruling of 2009 has, as expected, opened the floodgates to waves of negative, dishonest campaign advertising. Required taglines at the end, like "Citizens for Prosperity and Nightly Flossing is responsible for this ad," aren't helpful. I'm not sure what new laws could be passed, given the court ruling. But Congress needs to give it another try.

5 Get rid of antiquated rules and make sure that the winner wins. In 2016 we learned about "faith-

less electors," Republican members of the Electoral College who attempted to vote for somebody other than the candidate to whom their votes were pledged, Donald Trump. Now we're learning that state legislatures have the power to overturn the will of their voters. While it is doubtful anyone could successfully take advantage of these archaic laws, still having them on the books only adds to voters' concerns and anxieties.

6 Get rid of the Electoral College. Speaking of archaic laws, now that two of the last three presidents have been elected with fewer votes than their opponent, it's time

to scrap the Electoral College. Smaller, rural states already have an enormous advantage with equal representation in the Senate. When it comes to choosing the leader of the nation, everybody's vote should count the same.

Those are my dreams for the future. For now, we've got this messy, imperfect process nearing its conclusion. Millions of Americans like me have already cast our votes, knowing the system is flawed, but understanding it's still the best way to make our voices heard.

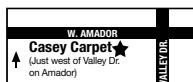

Retain your vote, reject Amendment One

Toward the bottom of your ballot you will find Constitutional Amendment 1. There are at least three good reasons to vote NO on Constitutional

Amendment 1: the problem it seeks to fix has already been addressed; the amendment is being presented in a misleading manner; and a mysterious political action committee (PAC) is spending

hundreds of thousands of dollars to promote the amendment without disclosing the source of that dark money.

Let's start with that final point. In recent weeks, a PAC called the "Committee to Protect New Mexico Consumers" has sent out four slick and misleading mailers in support of Constitutional Amendment 1 at a cost of more than \$264,000.

The PAC was cited by the state Ethics Commission for failing to file required disclosures, and it still adamantly refuses to disclose where all that money is coming from. If this constitutional amendment is really good for consumers, then why are the people who are bankrolling it, hiding their identities from the public? (In a recent Albuquerque Journal article, one of the PAC's board members promised to reveal the donors — after the election.)

Second, I join Public Regulation Commission (PRC) Commissioner Steve

Fischmann in objecting to the way Constitutional Amendment 1 appears on your ballot. The description of the amendment never indicates that the PRC is being converted from an elected commission to an appointed one; it fails to inform the public that if they vote in favor, they will be giving up their power to elect and hold accountable future PRC commissioners.

As Fischmann put it, "The ballot description of Amendment 1 deliberately conceals its real purpose — taking away your vote." Why the need to hide the ball from voters?

In 2011, Think New Mexico published a policy report recommending several reforms to the PRC. Based on the research laid out in that report, Think New Mexico successfully advocated for the enactment of three constitutional amendments that were approved by the voters in 2012.

One of these amendments empowered the

legislature to increase the qualifications of PRC commissioners. Prior to that reform, the only qualifications required of PRC commissioners were that they had to be at least 18 years old, had lived in New Mexico for at least a year and were not convicted felons.

Those minimal qualifications resulted in many commissioners who were not able to do the job well. So Think New Mexico's constitutional amendment and the law enacted the following year to implement it required that PRC commissioners have at least 10 years of relevant work experience or education.


These reforms have had a positive effect. Current commissioners include an environmental engineer, an attorney, a business executive and people with experience in state and federal government. In northern New Mexico, there is an election now for a PRC seat between a Democrat who is a civil engineer and a former mayor, and a Lib-

ertarian who has a Ph.D. in physics and who runs a green energy company.

Contrary to the core argument being made by the proponents of Constitutional Amendment 1, the PRC doesn't lack for professional qualifications, and the criminal behavior that it references has not been a problem since voters overwhelmingly passed the 2012 constitutional amendment to raise the qualifications for PRC members.

The current system strikes a good balance by requiring commissioners to be qualified to do the job while still being accountable to the public that elects them. I encourage you to vote against Constitutional Amendment 1. Please also share this letter with your neighbors, friends and family.

out for the PRC has historically been low, in part for those reasons. And despite being a practical and important commission, it doesn't have the broad appeal to voters of a more

well-known office, such as governor or senator.

That said, I believe making them governor-appointed positions makes them much more political than they may already be. The people's direct voices are getting muted enough these days.

I'm not well-versed

on public utilities, but certainly there could one day be a highly politicized issue surrounding public utilities, creating an opportunity for a governor to stack the PRC deck in his or her favor, creating an angry backlash among New Mexicans.

And then, sure enough,

we'd have a push for another constitutional amendment changing things back the way they were.

Seems to me, in a government of the people, we don't want to take their powers away. Let's keep the PRC commission elected by the people.

Mary Kay Papen stepping down from state Senate after 20 years

“I hope that we can stay a family. I want this bipartisanship to stay alive,” New Mexico State Senate President Pro-Tem Mary Kay Papen, a Las Cruces Democrat, said as she prepares to step down after 20 years’ service in the New Mexico Legislature.

Working “across the aisle” with state Senate Minority Leader Stuart Engle of Portales and other Republicans, “that was just paramount to me,” Papen said. “It’s not right to not hear the other party’s input. I think we have an obligation to listen.”

Papen lost in the June state Senate District 38 Democratic primary to Carrie Hamblen of Las Cruces, who is on the Nov. 3 general election ballot against Republican Charles Wendler.

Papen said she was disappointed, “not that I lost, but disappointed

in the race that was run against me.” More liberal Democrats “were determined to take any of us who were moderates out.” The “beauty of the Democratic Party” is that it is a “big tent,” Papen said, and it needs to continue to be.

Across the country, the amiability in politics “has sort of gone away,” she said. “It’s so vicious and so ugly.” Papen said she is “very concerned about Trump,” and expects Democrat Joe Biden to carry New Mexico on Election Day. She also expects Democrats to continue their control of both houses of the state legislature.

Her loss in the pri-

mary coupled with the defeat of state Sen. John Arthur Smith, a Democrat from Deming who has served in the state Senate for 32 years and is chair of the Senate Finance Committee, means “we’ve lost a tremendous amount of power in the south,” Papen said.

Losing Smith is “horrible for the state,” she said, calling him “honest, tough and fair. He watched the state’s money like he was watching his own money. He’s a totally honorable man. I feel so fortunate that I got to know him. Of all the people we lost (in the June Democratic primary), myself included, John was the

giant.”

Papen, 88, said she has no plans to run for office again.

“I’ve got plenty of things to do in my life,” she said, including being with family and friends and taking care of her Las Cruces home and yard. “I’ve got a very full life beyond politics,” she said.

“I feel like I did an awful lot, especially for mental health and the colonias,” Papen said, as she reflected on her service in the state Senate.

Papen said she worked hard to secure and maintain funding for roads, water systems, sewer systems — “all the things they need” in the colonias.

“My work with mental health absolutely has been near and dear to my heart,” she said. Getting Katie’s Law (the Katie Sepich Enhanced DNA Collection Act of 2010) passed was also an important accomplishment, Papen said.

In the 2021 legislative session — the first she won’t be part of since

2000 — Papen said she expects bills to be introduced to change New Mexico’s abortion law, increase taxes and take money from the state permanent fund. Papen said she also thinks there will be a move to “clamp down” on the state’s oil and gas industry. Oil and gas generate about 40 percent of the state’s general fund, and Papen said the legislature needs to “be careful slapping the person that feeds us in the face.”

Papen said the 25 percent state reserves approved during the 2020 legislature will help New Mexico deal with an anticipated budget shortfall in 2021.

Papen said she made “some really good friends on both sides of the aisle” during her tenure in the state Senate and will miss them. But she plans to keep the house that she and her late husband, Frank O’Brien Papen, bought in Santa Fe in 1992. Frank O. Papen held the District 38 state Senate seat 1969-86.

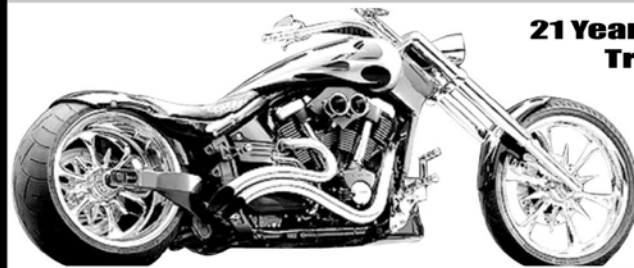

Candidates given a do-over in aftermath of voter guide

A voters' guide produced by the Las Cruces chapter of the League

of Women Voters (LWV) was included as an insert in the Oct. 9 edition of The Bulletin.

The Bulletin has since been contacted by three

candidates, one of whom — Beth Miller — contends her answers as printed in the LWV guide are not reflective of what she actually sent in. Two

other candidates — John Foreman and Susana Chaparro — contend they sent in responses to the LWV, but their responses were not in-

cluded in the guide.

Although the guide was produced by the LWV independent of The Bulletin's oversight or editorial control, those

three candidates' responses to the LWV questions are being included in this week's edition of The Bulletin as a courtesy.

John Foreman: Republican for state representative, District 52

LWV: Are public schools adequately funded to provide strong learning experiences and adequate infrastructure during the pandemic?

Foreman: Overall, I would say yes, although my colleagues in school leadership will need to make even harder priority spending decisions than usual. If some short-term

additional funding is needed, I would support it if there is accountability and assessment of whether the spending made a difference. Each year we spend 50 percent of our state budget on education but are last in student test scores and

first in HS drop-out rates. The lack of money has not been the problem and tax increases/new spending has obviously not been the solution. The

primary challenge is not a lack of spending, rather a lack of effective money management — as every

family in our state must do each week for their families.

LWV: What actions, if any, should the state take to mitigate the impact of climate change?

Foreman: I support continued investment in our gas and oil industries, one of the largest providers of state income. But I also support renewable

energy, I believe there is room for both. I support tax breaks for those who bring solar into their homes or businesses, those who invest in energy types that do not bring harm to our state and continued research to see how we can best continue to be energy independent, which is one of the greatest accomplish-

ments in our country this past three years, which often does not receive the attention it deserves. I would not support current statewide efforts to make our state a refuge for nuclear waste, regardless of the income it may bring. I feel the potential hazards far outweigh any potential

LWV: What further steps, if any, should be taken to ensure that the county's triage center will

open and operate successfully?

Chaparro: The county's triage center contract was

approved in August, and it runs through June 30, 2021. The contract can be renewed for seven additional years. Hopefully, the provider who is running the center will be able to get licensed and begin operation this year. The county also is waiting on the provider, RII, to secure a reimbursement rate for Medicaid. With input from the team at the Triage Center and the county, the commissioners will be able to monitor the progress at the center. At this

time, the present plan is viable.

LWV: What actions, if any, are needed with respect to providing affordable housing?

Chaparro: Being able to afford a good place to live is important to everyone. The county has partnerships with Mesilla Valley Public Housing Authority, Sunland Park Housing Authority and Tierra Del Sol to help provide county residents with affordable housing. As I have visited with people in District 4, I have become aware that some are on a waiting list for housing. If elected, I will work on making sound decisions on where

to place growth and to decide what kind of development will strengthen our communities in District 4.

LWV: What more can be done to reduce homelessness and poverty in Dona Ana County?

Chaparro: I will begin with thanking the board of directors, the executive directors and the staff of Mesilla Valley Camp Hope and Casa de Peregrinos in Las Cruces. The homeless population has surged in the last few months and these two organizations have been working non-stop to provide hot meals and a safe place to sleep for homeless people and

those in need. The county should help to identify and provide more shelter services, case management and permanent housing programs.

LWV: In what ways, if any, should the city and county be coordinating recycling services?

Chaparro: South Central Solid Waste Authority has collection centers in Hatch, Hill, Garfield, Anthony, La Mesa, La Union, Butterfield and Mesquite. These centers allow residents to drop off recyclables. Providing education for residents on the importance of keeping our environment clean and healthy is a priority. The county and the city

should work together to expand collection centers and thereby make it easier for people to participate.

LWV: What changes, if any, are needed to improve policing in Dona Ana County?

Chaparro: Before the COVID-19 stay-at-home order, I was fortunate enough to interact with many deputies for several years. Recently, some officers have shared with me that Sheriff Kim Stewart is working hard and developing programs throughout the county to keep our residents safer. If elected, I will work with my fellow commissioners to support the sheriff and her depu-


ties.

LWV: What do you think are the most urgent and important issues for Dona Ana County to address?

Chaparro: As a court interpreter, I have participated in dozens of hearings via telephone, Zoom conference or Google Meets or other platforms. One thing that jumped out to me quickly was the fact some people in Dona Ana County have spotty access or no access to the Internet, yet we are expecting them to attend school, contact the court, attend counseling, order groceries, etc. The county needs to work on obtaining funds to expand broadband service. In District 4, working on infrastructure is a must.

YOU HAVE SYMPTOMS

Symptomatic people displaying the COVID-19 symptoms of cough, fever, shortness of breath, chills, repeated shaking with chills, muscle pain, headache, sore throat, congestion or runny nose, nausea or vomiting, diarrhea, and/or loss of taste or smell.

YOU HAVE COME INTO CONTACT WITH A COVID-POSITIVE PERSON

Asymptomatic people who are close contacts or household members of New Mexico residents who have already tested positive for the coronavirus. "Close contact" means spending 3 minutes or longer within 6 feet of someone who is confirmed to have COVID-19 when that person was in their infectious period. Wearing a mask or cloth face covering does not affect the definition for close contact.

YOU LIVE OR WORK IN A COMMUNAL SETTING

Asymptomatic people who live or work in congregate settings such as detention centers and long-term care facilities.

YOU HAVE A SURGERY OR MEDICAL PROCEDURE SCHEDULED

Patients who are scheduled for surgery and whose provider has advised them to get tested before the procedure.

LWV: Are public schools adequately funded to provide strong learning experiences and adequate infrastructure during this pandemic? Explain.

Miller: COVID-19 has revealed inequities among schools and students, particularly related to technology. Students in geographically isolated areas may not have Internet or do not have computers. I believe infrastructure investments at the dis-

trict and state levels are necessary. Bold action is needed now! Gratitude is due to administrators and teachers who faced these logistical challenges and stepped up to meet the needs of all children. Doing this our children will be the winners in this crisis!

LWV: What actions do you advocate to improve the accessibility and quality of health care in

New Mexico? **Miller:** Four words summarize the Hippocratic Oath, the guiding light of medicine: "The patient comes first." For doctors to accomplish this, quality healthcare is needed. Obstacles limit health care when people lack affordable insurance and with an outdated Medicare program. Steps to improve health care: Address physician short-

ages; use cost-effective Telehealth and remote patient monitoring; common-sense medical liability reforms; better N.M. Medicaid reimbursement.

LWV: In what ways, if any, should the tax system in New Mexico be reformed? Explain.

Miller: Here are two examples why we need tax reform. N.M. needs broadband deployment to reach homes, especially in sparsely populated areas because of COVID and at-home instruction. The state imposes a GRT on broadband investments that hinders the installation of the much-needed infrastructure statewide. Since 2016, no action has occurred to fix this issue. Next, is the state's tax on retirees' Social Security. New Mexico is one of 13 states doing this. This keeps retired people from looking at N.M. to call home.

LWV: What actions, if any, would you support to create more stable

revenue streams for state government?

Miller: I would support fiscal responsibility, curb government overspending, overhaul the Gross Receipt Tax and exempt taxing retirees' Social Security. Attracting new retirees and keeping existing ones here creates additional revenue. Next, attract businesses from agriculture to technology, with a "path of opportunity" to locate in N.M. This translates into jobs. Diversifying our economy will create stability, and we must demonstrate that we have a strong, well trained workforce to support businesses.

LWV: What actions, if any, should the state take to mitigate the impact of climate change?

Miller: Clean air and water in a livable environment is possible. I propose advanced technology research and development that would combine green resources with natural oil and gas production. This will

create jobs, revenue and a sustainable future for New Mexico. Our nation needs New Mexico's oil and gas, as well as wind, bio-gas and solar industries to power up America. A bold vision and a shared stewardship of our natural and renewable resources is important now and in the future.

LWV: Discuss the extent to which the public should have a role in the redistricting process that will occur in 2021.

Miller: Residents of New Mexico are the key stakeholders in this process, and it must be transparent. I propose the following guidelines: An Independent backup commission draws the lines in the event that the state legislature cannot approve a plan. No commission member can hold office in the legislature for four years after redistricting. This is to guard against gerrymandering, a way that gov-


erning parties try to keep themselves in power by manipulating the political map in their favor.

LWV: Would you support the establishment of a State Bank in New Mexico? Explain.


Miller: A state bank is controlled by and principally funded by the government using taxpayer money. Only one

state bank exists in the U.S. (North Dakota, 1919). Twenty states have studied this concept, and not one has advanced legislation to support a state bank, including New Mexico in 2018. State banks are expensive, face legal and regulatory hurdles and are vulnerable to political control. We have more pressing concerns like a huge budget deficit to take care of. I would not support a state bank.

benefits in this area.

LWV: Discuss the extent to which the public should have a role in the redistricting process that will occur in 2021.

Foreman: I would like to see two things in this area; 1) True public input, not just gathering data for a pre-determined plan. 2) To be truly bipartisan rather than an over rep-

resentation of any party or group. It is vital that the voice of all people is represented, regardless of the size of their community.

LWV: What actions would you support to create more stable revenue streams for State government?

Foreman: For far too long New Mexico has been an unfriendly state to businesses, large or small. At our border is the #1 state economy in America

(Texas). In speaking with those who have tried to start small businesses in recent years, they have told me the process is very complicated with far too many regulations. They also experience challenges in communication with governmental agencies which make start-ups very difficult if not impossible at times. History has taught us that lowering taxes and eliminating unneeded regulation stimulates an economy, creates and attracts new quality jobs, thus increasing revenues to the state. Improving our student test scores will also be a significant factor in attracting new businesses and families who have school aged

children.

LWV: In what ways, if any, should the tax system in New Mexico be reformed? Explain.

Foreman: Two things come quickly to mind; 1) Eliminate the tax on Social Security benefits; New Mexico is one of only three states to do so. This drives away retirees from our state as it makes it more difficult for those who reside in New Mexico to enjoy their retirement years on a fixed income. 2) Reduce or eliminate (at least for six months) the GRT on service providers. These are among the hardest hit businesses in the past six months yet employ thousands of people statewide. We need to

do all we can to help them stay solvent and get back on their feet economically. Our state is one of the few states to tax service providers in this manner.

LWV: What actions do you advocate to improve the accessibility and quality of health care in New Mexico?

Foreman: One of the lessons we have learned through COVID-19 is that being dependent upon other, less friendly nations to produce needed prescription drugs which could be produced in our own country, has been a mistake and one we should change. I believe there are free-market ways to substantially lower health care costs

for all without the state taking on additional costs. We need to not only attract quality healthcare professionals into our state (again, improved educational scores and options will greatly assist in this), but also invest in our own young people for professional and tech careers in the field.

LWV: Would you support the establishment of a State Bank in New Mexico? Explain.

Foreman: As this concept is very much in the theoretical stage at this point, I would be skeptical. Banking and business are best when they are kept in the free market, a lesson many nations have learned the hard way.

Early voting runs through Oct. 31; Election Day is Tuesday

You can still cast your absentee ballot and vote early, or you can vote on Election Day, Tuesday, Nov. 3.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS

The last day to apply for an absentee ballot was Oct. 20. All ballots must be returned in the provided envelopes by 7 p.m. on Election Day, Tuesday, Nov. 3.

Absentee ballots can be returned by mail or they can be hand-delivered by the voter, a member of the voter's immediate family or by the voter's caregiver at any voting convenience center during early voting and on Election Day. All early voting sites, including the Doña Ana County Government Center, will have outdoor absentee-ballot return boxes manned by election officials.

There will be outdoor return boxes at 14 Election Day voting centers: Anthony City Hall (Anthony, N.M.), Chaparral Middle School (Chaparral), Desert View Elementary School (Sunland Park), Santa Teresa Middle School (Santa Teresa); and these locations in Las Cruces: Desert Hills Elementary School, Corbett Center (NMSU campus), County Government Center, Jornada Elementary School, Las Cruces City Hall, Lynn Middle School, Mayfield High School, Oñate High School, Sierra Middle School and So-



nomia Elementary School.

At all other Election Day voting centers, indoor, tabletop boxes will be utilized for absentee ballots. These boxes also will be manned by election officials.

SAME-DAY VOTER REGISTRATION

If a qualified elector chooses to register to vote immediately prior to voting, there are identification requirements. The voter must provide 1) a New Mexico driver's license or New Mexico identification card issued

through the state Motor Vehicle Division of the New Mexico Taxation and Revenue Department; 2) any document that contains an address in Doña Ana County, together with a photo identification card; or 3) a current, valid student photo identification card from a post-secondary educational institution in New Mexico, accompanied by a current student fee statement that contains the student's address in the county.

To register to vote or check voter registration status online and to access a sample ballot, visit www.NMVote.org.

PROVISIONAL VOTING

If you go to vote and election workers cannot locate your information, they will offer you a provisional ballot. Voting by provisional ballot is slightly different from regular voting, but, if you are a qualified voter, your vote will count. Once you complete a provisional ballot, instead of placing it into a machine to be read, you will place it in a sealed envelope, which you will sign. These sealed provisional ballots will be returned to the county clerk's office on election night for review. After review, they will be taken to the canvassing board to be counted or rejected depending on the qualifications of the voter.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 1

Proposing to amend the Constitution of New Mexico to provide that the Public Regulation Commission consist of three members appointed by the Governor from a list of professionally qualified nominees submitted to the Governor by a nominating committee as provided by law and that the commission is required to regulate public utilities and may be required to regulated other public service companies.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 2

Proposing to amend article 20, section 3 of the Constitution of New Mexico to permit the adjustment by law of terms of non-statewide elected officers and to standardize the date an officer begins to serve.

BOND QUESTION A

"The 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of senior citizen facility improvement, construction and equipment acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed thirty-three million two hundred ninety-two thousand one hundred forty-one dollars (\$33,292,141) to make capital expenditures for certain senior citizen facility improvement, construction and equipment acquisition projects and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law?"

BOND QUESTION B

"The 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of library acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed nine million seven hundred fifty-one thousand four hundred thirty-three dollars (\$9,751,433) to make capital expenditures for academic, public school, tribal and public library resource acquisitions and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law?"

BOND QUESTION C

"The 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of higher education, special schools and tribal schools capital improvement and acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed one hundred fifty-six million three hundred fifty-eight thousand four hundred seventy-five dollars (\$156,358,475) to make capital expenditures for certain higher education, special schools and tribal schools capital improvements and acquisitions and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law?"

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 1, 53RD LEGISLATURE - STATE OF NEW MEXICO - FIRST SESSION, 2019

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO PROVIDE THAT THE PUBLIC REGULATION COMMISSION CONSIST OF THREE MEMBERS APPOINTED BY THE GOVERNOR FROM A LIST OF PROFESSIONALLY QUALIFIED NOMINEES SUBMITTED TO THE GOVERNOR BY A NOMINATING COMMITTEE AS PROVIDED BY LAW AND THAT THE COMMISSION IS REQUIRED TO REGULATE PUBLIC UTILITIES AND MAY BE REQUIRED TO REGULATE OTHER PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANIES.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. It is proposed to amend Article 11, Section 1 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"A. The "public regulation commission" is created. Until January 1, 2023, the commission shall consist of five members elected from districts provided by law for staggered four-year terms beginning on January 1 of the year following their election; provided that after serving two terms, members shall be ineligible to hold office as a commission member until one full term has intervened; and provided further that commission members elected for terms beginning January 1, 2021 shall hold office for two years.

B. Beginning January 1, 2023, the commission shall consist of three members. The governor shall nominate members from a list of qualified nominees submitted to the governor by the public regulation commission nominating committee, as provided by law, and by and with the consent of the senate shall appoint members to fill positions and vacancies on the commission; provided that no more than two commissioners shall be members of the same political party. Members so appointed shall serve six-year staggered terms; provided that, after serving two consecutive six-year terms, members shall be ineligible to hold office as commissioner until one full term has intervened. A person appointed to fill a vacancy on the commission shall serve for the remainder of the unexpired term.

C. A six-year term for a commission position shall begin on January 1 of the year following the expiration of the prior term for that position; provided that in January 2023, one member shall be appointed for an initial term of two years, one member for an initial term of four years and one member for a six-year term.

D. The legislature shall provide, by law, for professional qualifications and continuing

education requirements for commissioners and for the creation of and procedures for the public regulation commission nominating committee.

E. A commission member may be removed by impeachment for accepting anything of value from a person or entity whose charges for services to the public are regulated by the commission, malfeasance, misfeasance or neglect of duty."

SECTION 2. It is proposed to amend Article 11, Section 2 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The public regulation commission shall have responsibility for regulating public utilities as provided by law. The public regulation commission may have responsibility for regulation of other public service companies in such manner as the legislature shall provide."

SECTION 3. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date that may be called for that purpose.

House Joint Resolution, 53RD LEGISLATURE - STATE OF NEW MEXICO - FIRST SESSION, 2019

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND ARTICLE 20, SECTION 3 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO PERMIT THE ADJUSTMENT BY LAW OF TERMS OF NONSTATEWIDE ELECTED OFFICERS AND TO STANDARDIZE THE DATE AN OFFICER BEGINS TO SERVE. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. It is proposed to amend Article 20, Section 3 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"A. The term of office of every state, county or district officer, except those elected to fill vacancies, shall commence on the first day of January next after the officer's election.

B. A state, county or district officer elected to fill a vacancy in office shall take office on the first day of January next after the officer's election to serve the remainder of the unexpired

C. The term of a state, county or district officer may be adjusted by law to align or stagger the election of officers for a particular state, county or district office throughout the state. Any such adjustment shall require a legislative finding that the adjustment is to provide for consistency in the timing of elections for that office or to balance the number of offices appearing on the ballot. The term of any officer affected by such adjustment shall not be shortened or extended by more than two years. An extended term shall be counted as one term for the purposes of any limitation on the number of terms an officer may serve. A shortened term shall not be counted as a term and shall be disregarded for the purposes of any limitation on the number of terms an officer may serve. No statewide elective office may be adjusted pursuant to this subsection."

SECTION 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date that may be called for that purpose.

SENATE Bill 207, 54th LEGISLATURE - STATE OF NEW MEXICO - FIRST SESSION, 2020

AN ACT RELATING TO GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS; AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF CAPITAL PROJECTS GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS TO MAKE CAPITAL EXPENDITURES FOR SENIOR CITIZEN FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS, CONSTRUCTION AND ACQUISITIONS, FOR LIBRARY ACQUISITIONS AND FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS AT INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION, STATE SPECIAL SCHOOLS AND TRIBAL SCHOOLS; PROVIDING FOR A PROPERTY TAX LEVY FOR PAYMENT OF PRINCIPAL OF, INTEREST ON AND CERTAIN COSTS RELATED TO THE BONDS; REQUIRING APPROVAL OF THE REGISTERED VOTERS AT THE 2020 GENERAL ELECTION OF THE STATE; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.--This act may be cited as the "2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act".

SECTION 2. PURPOSE.--For the purpose of providing funds for capital expenditures as authorized in the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, general obligation indebtedness of the state is authorized for the purposes and in the amounts set forth in Section 10 of that act.

SECTION 3. BOND TERMS. --

A. The state board of finance, except as limited by the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, shall determine the terms, covenants and conditions of bonds issued pursuant to that act, including: (1) date or dates of issue, denominations and maturities; (2) principal amounts; (3) rate or rates of interest; and (4) provisions for redemption, including premiums, registration and refundability, whether the bonds are issued in one or more series and other covenants relating to the bonds and the issuance thereof.

B. The bonds shall be in such form as the state board of finance determines with an appropriate series designation and shall bear interest payable as set forth in the resolution of the state board of finance.

BOND CONTINUED FROM 23

C. Payment of the principal of the bonds shall begin not more than two years after the date of their issuance, and the bonds shall mature not later than ten years after the date of their issuance. Both principal and interest shall be payable in lawful money of the United States at the office of the paying agent within or without the state as the state board of finance may direct.

D. The bonds shall be executed with the manual or facsimile signature of the governor or the state treasurer, and the seal or a facsimile of the seal of the state shall be placed on each bond, except for any series of bonds issued in book entry or similar form without the delivery of physical securities.

E. The bonds shall be issued in accordance with the provisions of the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, the Supplemental Public Securities Act and the Uniform Facsimile Signature of Public Officials Act and may be issued in accordance with the Public Securities Short-Term Interest Rate Act.

F. The full faith and credit of the state is pledged for the prompt payment when due of the principal of and interest on all bonds issued and sold pursuant to the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act.

SECTION 4. EXPENDITURES.--The proceeds from the sale of the bonds shall be expended solely for providing money to be distributed for the purposes and in amounts not to exceed the amounts set forth in Section 10 of the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act and to pay expenses incurred under Section 6 of that act. Any proceeds from the sale of the bonds that are not required for the purposes set forth in Sections 6 and 10 of that act shall be used for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the bonds.

SECTION 5. SALE.--The bonds authorized under the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be sold by the state board of finance at such time and in such manner and amounts as the board may elect. The bonds may be sold at private sale or at public sale, in either case at not less than par plus accrued interest to the date of delivery. If sold at public sale, the state board of finance shall publish a notice of the time and place of sale in a newspaper of general circulation in the state and may also publish the notice in a recognized financial journal outside the state. The required publications shall be made once each week for two consecutive weeks prior to the date fixed for the sale, the last publication thereof to be at least five days prior to the date of the sale. The notice shall specify the amount, denomination, maturity and description of the bonds to be offered for sale and the place, date and hour at which the sealed bids shall be received. At the time and place specified in the notice, the state board of finance shall open the bids in public and shall award the bonds to the bidder or bidders offering the best price for the bonds. The state board of finance may reject any or all bids and readvertise and may waive any irregularity in a bid. All bids, except that of the state, shall be accompanied by a deposit of two percent of the principal amount of the bonds in a form acceptable to the state board of finance. The deposit of an unsuccessful bidder shall be returned upon rejection of the bid. The state board of finance may also sell the bonds or any part of the bonds to the state treasurer or state investment officer. The state treasurer or state investment officer is authorized to purchase any of the bonds for investment. The bonds are legal investments for any person or board charged with the investment of any public funds and may be accepted as security for any deposit of public money.

SECTION 6. EXPENSES.--The expenses incurred by the state board of finance in or relating to the preparation and sale of the bonds shall be paid out of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds, and all rebate, penalty, interest and other obligations of the state relating to the bonds and bond proceeds under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, shall be paid from earnings on bond proceeds or other money of the state, legally available for such payments.

SECTION 7. PROPERTY TAX LEVY.--To provide for the payment of the principal of and interest on the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the provisions of the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, there shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied during each year in which any of the bonds are outstanding an ad valorem tax on all property in the state subject to property taxation for state purposes sufficient to pay the interest as it becomes due on the bonds, together with an amount sufficient to provide a sinking fund to pay the principal of the bonds as it becomes due, and, if permitted by law, ad valorem taxes may be collected to pay administrative costs incident to the collection of such taxes. The taxes shall be imposed, levied, assessed and collected at the times and in the manner that other property taxes for state purposes are imposed, levied, assessed and collected. It is the duty of all tax officials and authorities to cause these taxes to be imposed, levied, assessed and collected.

SECTION 8. TREASURER--DUTIES.--The state treasurer shall keep separate accounts of all money collected pursuant to the taxes imposed and levied pursuant to the provisions of the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act and shall use this money only for the purposes of paying the principal of and interest on the bonds as they become due and any expenses relating thereto.

SECTION 9. IRREPEALABLE CONTRACT--AUTHORITY FOR ISSUANCE.--An owner of bonds issued pursuant to the provisions of the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act may, either at law or in equity, by suit, action or mandamus, enforce and compel the performance of the duties required by that act of any officer or entity mentioned in that act. The provisions of that act constitute an irrepealable contract with the owners of any of the bonds issued pursuant to that act for the faithful performance of which the full faith and credit of the state is pledged. Without reference to any other act of the legislature, the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is full authority for the issuance and sale of the bonds authorized in that act, and such bonds shall have all the qualities of investment securities

under the Uniform Commercial Code, shall not be invalid for any irregularity or defect in the proceedings for the issuance and sale of the bonds and shall be incontestable in the hands of bona fide purchasers or holders thereof for value. All bonds issued under the provisions of that act, and the interest thereon, are exempt from taxation by the state and any subdivision or public body thereof.

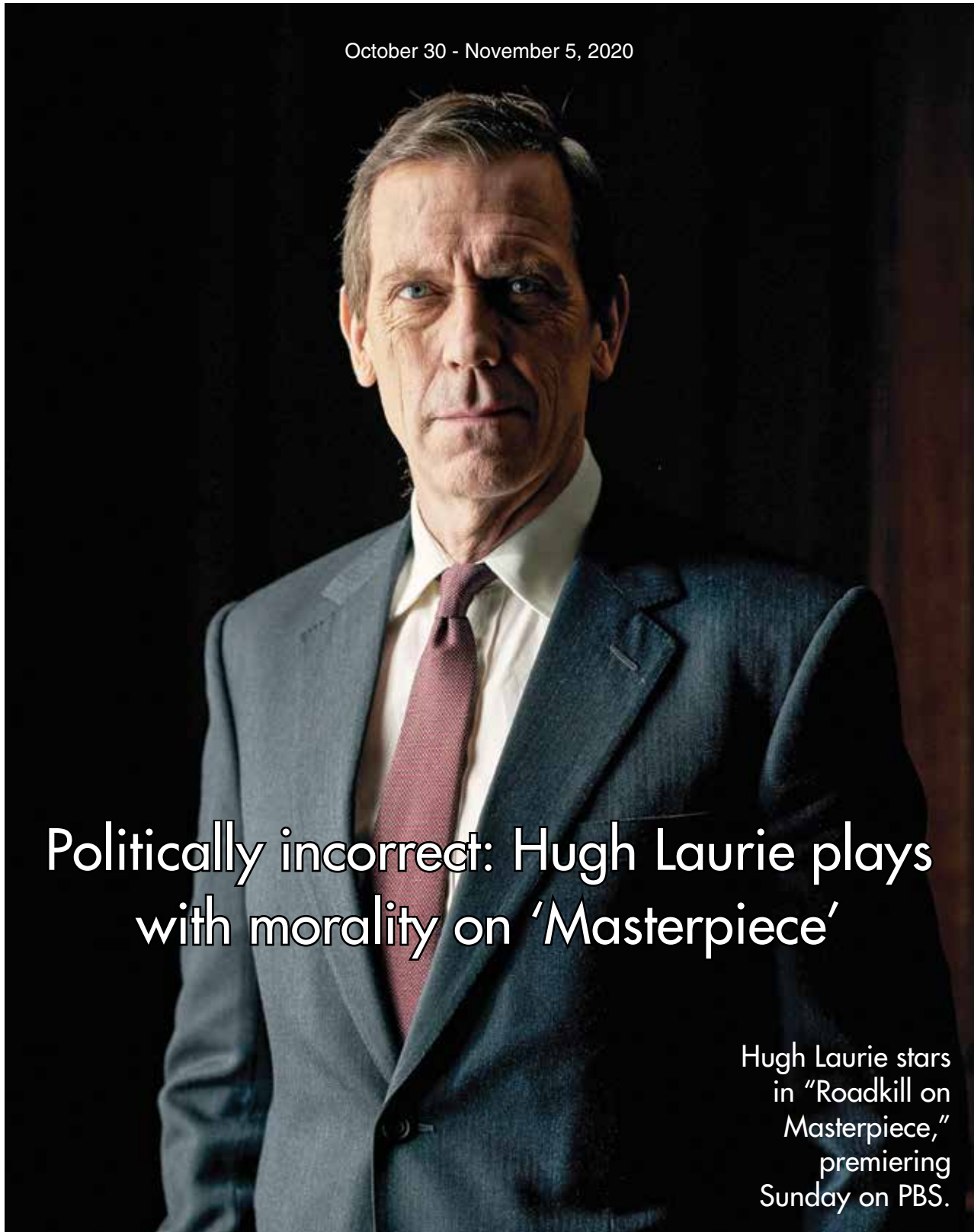
SECTION 10. PROJECTS.--The proceeds from the sale of bonds issued under the provisions of the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be distributed as follows for the purposes and in the amounts specified:

SECTION 11. ELECTION.—

A. Bonds issued pursuant to the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be submitted to the registered voters of the state at the general election to be held in November 2020, and, if they receive a majority of all the votes cast thereon at such election, shall take effect upon certification of the state canvassing board announcing the results of the election. No bonds shall be issued or sold under that act until the registered voters of this state have voted upon and approved the bonds and property tax as provided in this section. Any bonds issued under that act shall be issued within thirty months from the date of such election.

B. The ballots used at the 2020 general election shall contain substantially the following language: (1) "The 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of senior citizen facility improvement, construction and equipment acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed thirty-three million two hundred ninety-two thousand one hundred forty-one dollars (\$33,292,141) to make capital expenditures for certain senior citizen facility improvement, construction and equipment acquisition projects and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law? For _____ Against _____"; (2) "The 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of library acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed nine million seven hundred fifty-one thousand four hundred thirty-three dollars (\$9,751,433) to make capital expenditures for academic, public school, tribal and public library resource acquisitions and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law? For _____ Against _____"; and (3) "The 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of higher education, special schools and tribal schools capital improvement and acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed one hundred fifty-six million three hundred fifty-eight thousand four hundred seventy-five dollars (\$156,358,475) to make capital expenditures for certain higher education, special schools and tribal schools capital improvements and acquisitions and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law? For _____ Against _____".

C. Each question set forth in this section includes a specific work or object to be financed by the bonds. If any such question is not approved by a majority vote of the electorate at the state's 2020 general election, the issuance of bonds for the work or object specified by the question shall be excluded from and shall not be part of the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act. The failure of a question to be approved by the electorate at the 2020 general election shall not affect those questions that are approved at the election.

D. The secretary of state shall include the submission of the capital projects general obligation bonds to the people at the 2020 general election, and it shall be included in the general election proclamation. The secretary of state shall cause the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act to be published in full in at least one newspaper in each county of the state if one be published therein, once each week, for four successive weeks next preceding the general election as required by the constitution of New Mexico.

SECTION 12. ART IN PUBLIC PLACES.--Pursuant to Section 13-4A-4 NMSA 1978 and where applicable, the appropriations authorized in the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act include money for the art in public places fund.

SECTION 13. PROJECT SCOPE--EXPENDITURES--REVERSION.—

A. If an appropriation for a project authorized in the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is not sufficient to complete all the purposes specified, the appropriation may be expended for any portion of the purposes specified in the appropriation. Expenditures shall not be made for purposes other than those specified in the appropriation.

B. The state agencies and state institutions to which money has been appropriated in the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be responsible for monitoring the projects funded in that act to ensure compliance with the constitution and laws of New Mexico and shall cause to be reverted any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the earlier of the third full fiscal year after issuance of the bonds or the termination or

SECTION 14. SEVERABILITY.--If any part or application of the 2020 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is held invalid, the remainder or its application to other situations or persons shall not be affected.

SECTION 15. EMERGENCY.--It is necessary for the public peace, health and safety that this act take effect immediately.

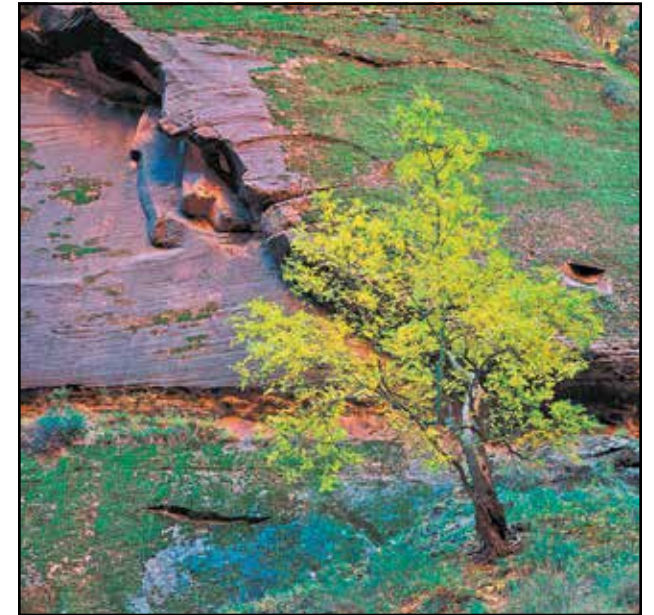

Converge Director John Craig said. "His use of large-format cameras slows the picture-taking process down and creates images with unsurpassed detail, depth and color."

Converge Gallery exhibits and represents contemporary artists who focus on issues such as the environment, global warming and identity, the gallery said

critical issues with an up-and-coming art market.

NMSU Theatre is filming 'The Land Where We Stand' for world premiere virtual viewing

Student-staff collaboration celebrates the history of NMSU

The New Mexico State University Theatre Department is working toward a world premiere of its own production of "The Land Where We Stand."

"Filming of this unique event will happen in early November, with a release date of late January for virtual viewing," said Theatre Department Head Wil Kilroy.

"This project is being created collaboratively with a group of students," said Theatre Department Associate Professor Larissa Lury, who is directing the production.

"We began by sharing our own curiosity about where we live," Lury said.

"I asked students what they wanted to speak about or to shed light on. I asked them who and what they wanted to know more about. I also asked them about what's special to them about this place."

Lury said she wanted to do the project because she

has so many questions about where we are.

"I've lived in Las Cruces and have been teaching at NMSU for several years now, but there is still so much I do not know about the history of this place, and even about its present," she said. "Who and what was here 50, 100, 400

or 1,000 years ago? Who helped to make this place what it is today? Who is here with me at NMSU right now? What is on the minds of those I see around me? What has each person's experience been like here? What are their hopes for themselves and for this place we now

share a history with?"

With those and other questions in mind, participating students "conducted interviews with other students and faculty on campus, as well as family members and friends in the broader community," Lury said. "We sought out those who have a history with NMSU, and those whose

families have a history with the land here that predates NMSU."

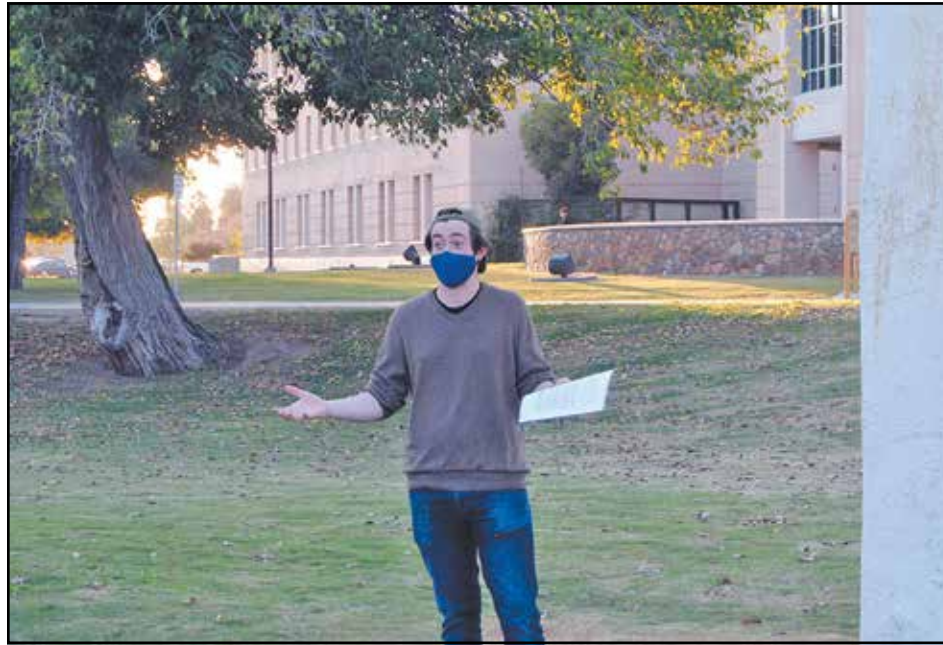

Reyes, Esther Rogge and Alexander Shannon. The crew comprises of Sammi Armstrong, Chad Gonzales, Chung Sekka, Yocilin Torres, Amy Treko and Peyton Womble.

“I’m so proud of the way the NMSU Theatre faculty and staff have adapted to this ‘new normal,’ such as Professor Lury giving students the opportunity to have their individual voices heard, as well as collaborating with others in our community,” Kilroy said. “As a result, we will present an original, educational and entertaining piece of theatre, which is directly linked to our community and environment. While ‘The Land Where We Stand’ is based on local history and perspectives, the themes are universal and can appeal to anyone, and we’re excited that this year, with virtual offerings, we have ticket holders from around the country.”

After purchasing tickets, those allowed to attend the live production will receive a link to downloadable audio tracks and “a time to begin your journey,” Lury said. “Upon arriving (at NMSU), you will travel with a small group of people, maintaining a safe distance, as you make your way from site to site across the NMSU campus. Most audience members will walk or roll, but we plan to have golf carts available for those who need them,” she said.

At each site, live perfor-

mances created by NMSU theatre students “will capture stories of NMSU’s past, and the voices of those here now,” Lury said.

“In one part of the performance, a student traces the lineage of her family back to [Chiricahua Apache leader] Cochise (1805-74),” she said. Another segment includes fictional scenes “inspired by the true stories of meetings and breakups taking place at the alumni pond,” Lury said, adding that there is also a segment celebrating the search for identity

and finding a place in the LGBTQ+ community, a piece inspired by interviews with Black NMSU students and a piece about “the shoulders we each stand on to be where we are today.”

“Our hope is that through the piece, whether in person or online, you will see the campus and those you pass here with new-found layers, that we’ll spark your curiosity to learn more about the land we’re standing on and the people who have called and now call this place home, and that in some small

way, we’ll satisfy the need for connection with one another that so many of us are craving right now,” Lury said.

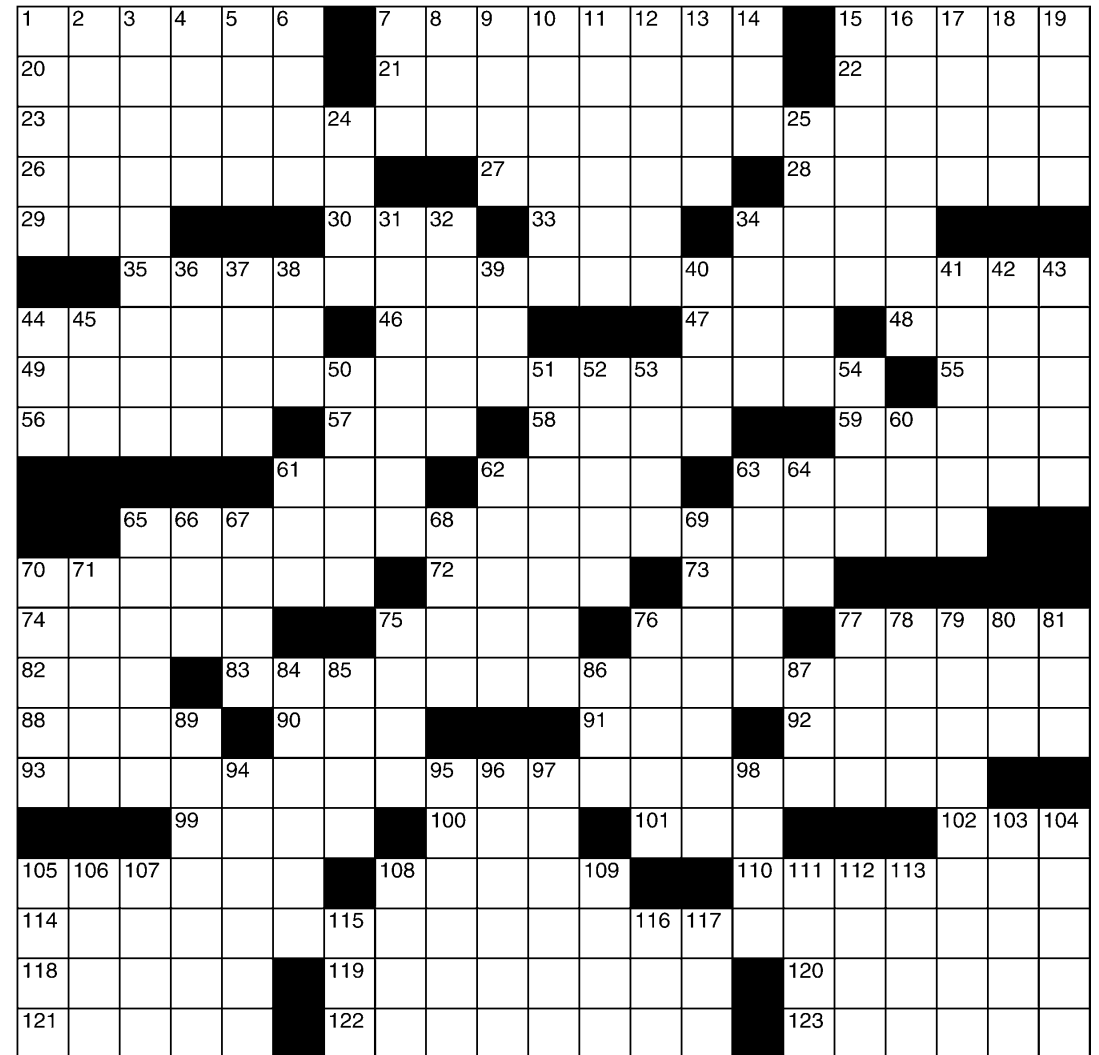

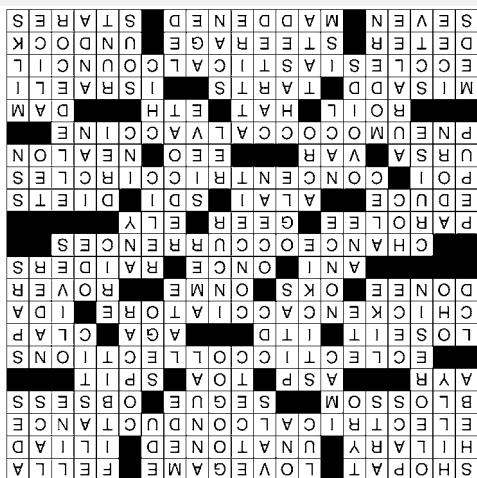

Wisconsin manufacturer to open facility in Santa Teresa

BULLETIN REPORT

Prent Corporation, the world's leading designer and manufacturer of custom plastic, rigid thermoform packaging for the medical, electronics and consumer industries, will open a new manufacturing facility in Santa Teresa, N.M., the Mesilla Valley Economic Development Alliance (MVEDA) and the New Mexico and the New Mexico Economic Development Department (NMEDD) have announced.

Prent plans to invest \$12.5 million and create 85 new jobs in Santa Teresa, MVEDA said in a news release. The company is headquartered in Janesville, Wisconsin.

MVEDA and the Borderplex Alliance worked together to attract Prent Corporation to New Mexico.

"Prent recognized immediately the logistical advantages that Santa Teresa had to offer," said



MVEDA President and CEO Davin Lopez. "Access to rail and our international port of entry, combined with strong incentives from the State of New Mexico made their decision very clear. Additionally, Prent saw the value of our regional partnership efforts and its ancillary value to the long-term success of their operations in the region."

"I think they just saw a vision for themselves here in the Southwest," Lopez said in a phone interview. He said Prent's commitment to 62,500 square feet of space in Santa Teresa is hopefully phase one, with the possibility that the company could "double the size of that facility going forward."

"This the second company we announced within the past 10 days that is coming to our

Santa Teresa industrial base," said Border Industrial Association President Jerry Pacheco. "We are on track to have the best year ever in Santa Teresa in terms of new construction, investment and jobs created."

"When El Paso, Ciudad Juarez and Doña Ana County work together and market ourselves as a region, there is no limit to what we can accomplish," said Borderplex Alliance CEO Jon Barela. "Together, we are more competitive, attractive and offer a unique advantage to potential new businesses."

"The Borderplex region makes perfect sense for Prent," Prent Senior Vice President of Manufacturing Mark Rothlisberger said in a news release. "It's an area ripe for innovation and partnership. For more than three years, we've worked closely with partners in the region to make this a reality. Over and over, we heard that

the strength of the region is its collaboration across borders."

The state is supporting the expansion with \$500,000 from the Local Economic Development Act (LEDA) fund, a job-creation or closing fund administered by the NMEDD.

Prent also is receiving economic assistance from Doña Ana County (DAC) with a proposed industrial revenue bond (IRB) ordinance that goes to public hearings in the coming weeks, the news release said.

"Prent Corporation's opening will add a substantial number of good paying jobs to DAC," said County Commission Chair Lynn Ellins. "Santa Teresa is an excellent location for contributing to Prent's success. This is especially good news to receive in the midst of a pandemic."

Once the IRB is approved, Prent will build a 62,500 square-foot facility at the Santa Teresa

Gateway Rail Park with the capacity to double its footprint in five years. With almost 600 employees, Prent has opened five greenfield facilities in the last 10 years and has never laid off an employee in its 53-year history.

The rail park — owned and operated by Ironhorse Resources, Inc. (IHR) — recently completed the development of 87 acres of rail-served lots of five-20 acres, the news release said. Santa Teresa Southern Railroad, an IHR subsidiary, has completed construction of an additional 10,500 feet of track and 10 acres designed as a train-loading facility for windmill components.

"IHR appreciates the opportunity to work closely with the Borderplex Alliance, MVEDA, the New Mexico Partnership, the State of New Mexico and DAC to bring Prent Corporation to the region," said IHR Director of Land Development Hildeberto Moreno. "With the infra-

structure, services and incentives provided by these organizations and the county and state and IHR's commitment to growing our facilities, it is clear that we are a community ready to accommodate the expansion of local and regional companies and to attract new companies to our region."

Operations are expected to begin in fall 2021, with construction starting as soon as approvals are in place. The average hourly wage is expected to be \$26.14 for full-time employees and \$15.75 for part-time.

Prent was founded by Jack and Carol Pregont in 1967. The Santa Teresa manufacturing facility, Prent's 11th, will, like its others, utilize the same Prent designed/built thermoformers (fabrication techniques) used globally. The majority of parts that Prent produces are sterile barrier packages for medical devices.

attracted to what Las Cruces and Doña Ana County have to offer.

As a result, Lopez said, "lead generation numbers started to rebound in June and July. Projects we had been working for a while started to come to fruition."

MVEDA's most recent successes include bringing Mass Markets call center to Las Cruces and Prent Corporation to Santa Teresa – potentially creating nearly 400 jobs between them. And there are more possibilities on the horizon, Lopez said, as MVEDA and its partners focus on the aerospace and unmanned aerial vehicles (UAV) industries, value-added agriculture and the remote-work

industry that has expanded with the onset of COVID-19.

"We think from a policy standpoint at the state and even locally, things need to change to make us more viable to attract remote-work companies that want to hire people in Doña Ana County," he said.

That means partnering with New Mexico State University and others "to equip local workers with the skills to be strong remote workers" to attract companies from across the country.

Lopez said MVEDA is developing a white paper on remote work that will present "local strategies that make sense for us."

Partnerships continue to be the key to successful economic development and job creation for Las Cruces and Doña Ana County, Lopez said, including those that reach across state and international borders.

"We believe Mexico is going to be the biggest beneficiary of near-shoring," he said, as U.S. manufacturers look to more secure supply chains in North America. Partnerships in El Paso and in Chihuahua and San Jeronimo help put Santa Teresa "in a prime position" to benefit, he said.

MVEDA also is "utilizing our digital marketing campaign to identify

companies on the cusp of moving out of Asia and get in front of them, telling our story," Lopez said.

"We don't have the luxury of being everything to everybody," he said. "The more niches we can create, the more we can distinguish ourselves from other parts of the country."

"We're just showing really positive results," he said. "The pipeline is growing."

Founded in 1994, MVEDA is a nonprofit public-private economic development partnership that Lopez has headed since February 2009.

Don't forget to reset clocks, Daylight Saving Time ends Nov. 1

Before you shutter your business and hang up the 'Closed' sign Halloween night, remember to turn your clocks back ("spring forward, fall

back") one hour.

Daylight saving time (DST) ends at 2 a.m. Sunday, Nov. 1. It won't return until Sunday, March 7, 2021.

Changing your clocks is also an excellent time to change the batteries

in your smoke alarm(s), both at home and in the office.

"The history of standard time in the United States began Nov. 18, 1883, when U.S. and Canadian railroads instituted standard time in

time zones," according to Wikipedia. "Before then, time of day was a local matter, and most cities and towns used some form of local solar time, maintained by some well-known clock (for example, on a church

steeple or in a jeweler's window)."

The idea for DST was actually proposed by New Zealand entomologist and astronomer George Vernon Hudson in 1895. The German Empire and Austria-Hungary organized the first nationwide implementation of DST—beginning April 30, 1916.

Since 2007, DST has begun the second Sunday in March and ended the first Sunday in November. Only the states of Arizona (except for the Navajo Nation) and Hawaii do not use DST.

Standard Time 2020-21 will last 126 days, or a little more than one-third of a calendar year.

Sadie's story is truly one of rags to riches

No one really knows what the first seven years of Sadie's life were like, but the fact she had a microchip could indicate she had a loving, responsible family for at least a portion of that time. Her eighth year tells a story of both tragedy and redemption.

A post on an Internet neighborhood site, Nextdoor, alerted Deborah Scott to the plight of an abandoned dog out on the East Mesa. Scott said the photo showed "a dog that looked like it needed help."

Armed only with a general location where

the dog had been spotted, Scott drove the area looking for the dog. For four days, three or four times each day, she drove. And on the fourth day, she found the object of her search.

The dog's hair was matted so badly that it impaired its ability to walk or raise its tail. The matting was so dense, Scott said, that when she eventually lured the dog to her side with food and captured it, she was unable to identify its gender.

Going against her own rules for handling unfamiliar animals, Scott said she did what she thought she had to do.

"I don't recommend picking up an animal a

person is not familiar with, but it was that or she would have hurt herself," Scott said. "I'm lucky she didn't try to bite me. She smelled terrible, with matts, ticks, fleas, briars and God only knows what else trapped in that fur."

Despite the dog's stench, Scott placed it in the passenger floorboard of her car and began to drive back home to figure out what to do next. But the dog was making plans, too.

"I had only gone a half mile when she crawled up and into my lap, licking my arm as if to say, 'I'm sorry I gave you a hard time, but I was scared,'" Scott said.

Once home, a neigh-

bor lent Scott a small enclosure to keep the dog isolated from Scott's other animals until its condition could be assessed. The hour was late, so the assessment would have to wait until morning. Scott thought about it and knew what she needed to do.

"I ended up spending the night outside with her to keep her calm," she said. "Besides, she had been abandoned, so she didn't need to be alone on her first night at my home."

The next morning was transformation day at the Scott home, where the worst of the dog's mats were carefully cut away so the dog could walk freely.

"I took off only what

was necessary to allow her to get used to me and the new environment," Scott said. "She was calm and seemed relieved they were being taken off."

It was also investigation day. Scott called a local rescue organization, Barkhouse, and spoke with Nancy Dionne about low-cost vaccines and the proper procedures for notification of found dogs to see if an owner could be located.

Scott had the dog bathed and groomed, vaccinated and checked for overall health. Besides tick and flea bites, which healed quickly, the dog was in fairly decent shape. She also had been spayed.

A check of her micro-

chip yielded no working phone number, and the abandoned mobile home listed as the address was where Scott had found her.

Scott and her husband decided that the dog's abandonment issues, size and temperament – and the fact she had survived what looked like been months of abandonment and neglect — meant she wouldn't be just a foster.

In that instant, Sadie had a new name and a new home.

"The first week she ate like every meal was her last," Scott said, "but she's better about her food now, although if my other dog

Arthritis: Arthritis is a common inflammatory condition that affects the joints and results in pain; the most common types including osteoarthritis and rheumatoid arthritis. Both types of arthritis can greatly impact the foot and ankle joints.

Fractures: A fracture occurs from excessive force or trauma to the bone, causing it to crack or break entirely. A fracture to the foot or ankle can result in weeks of downtime to ensure proper healing.

Tendinitis: Tendinitis occurs from excessive overuse of the tendons, causing them to become inflamed for a long time.

Bursitis: Bursitis occurs when the tendons rub against the "bursae" or anti-friction sacs, causing them to become irritated and uncomfortable.

Fallen arches: When the tendons of the foot pull together properly, your foot will form a proper arch, providing an important mechanical system which is part of walking and running. When the tendons do not pull together properly, your foot will form a very small arch or no arch at all. This is referred to as "fallen arch" or "flat foot" and can cause pain or discomfort with time.

Plantar fasciitis: Plantar fasciitis is an inflammation in the connective tissue on the bottom of your foot. This can occur from aggravated overuse, such as constant standing, improper posture, or misalignment in the lower extremity.

Tarsal tunnel syndrome: Tarsal tunnel syndrome occurs when the tibial nerve, which runs from the ankle to the foot) becomes pinched and inflamed.

After signing his winning score card, Cink told reporters: "Think about it. I've got my son (24 year-old Reagan) caddying for me, my wife (Lisa) is in almost five-year remission (from breast cancer) and she's walking out there just on the other side of the ropes, and at 47 I'm able to compete at the highest level and win."

Cink's heartfelt sentiments got me to thinking about so much I'm grateful for. After an almost fatal falling accident nearly 10 years ago, and open-heart surgery six years ago, I feel very grateful for family and friends, doctors and healthcare professionals in Las Cruces, and to be playing golf to my single-digit handicap. On my 78th birthday in past August, I shot (gross) 73. I like shooting better than my age!

I am certainly grateful that we have not just one but four championship golf courses in our city, which we can play year 'round, with the exception of a cold day or two. And my sense of gratitude extends to the golf course owners, the

puts down a treat, Sadie is likely to snag it."

Sadie still has issues, but Scott says they are understandable, given her past.

"She has separation anxiety, fears strange noises and hands coming at her. I've only had her for three weeks, so I think she is doing well considering what she has been through," Scott

said. "Sadie is beginning to walk well on a leash, and she relieves herself outside on a regular basis, although she doesn't like to go out by herself. That will be a breakthrough when I don't have to go with her every time."

As the days progress, so does Sadie's improvement and socialization.

"I'm allowing her to get acquainted with friends as they come by, in my arms, which seems to make her comfortable," Scott said. "Sadie is most comfort-

able with my other dog, who I rescued three years ago. Remarkably, they have the same coloring. Like her, he is a Shih Tzu mix. She likes to go on walks with him, go outside to relieve herself with him and to steal his toys."

While Sadie settles into the Scott household and relearns the love of a caring family, Scott said she

remains concerned about the other abused and neglected animals in the community. She said she appreciates the assistance of Barkhouse, and she applauds other animal-welfare entities, as well.

"I think it is important for the public to know about these rescue groups because, they're working on little to no

funding," Scott said. "I'm sure there are people who would want to help with donations of food, supplies or in a monetary way, if only they knew. Also, there are some who may know of an animal who is in a neglectful or abusive home but don't know who to call for help. Many are afraid if they call a shelter, the animal

will be put down or as is the case now, the shelters are full."

While the work goes on among agencies and entities that concern themselves with animal welfare, one thing is certain for Sadie. She went from rage to riches, thanks to Scott's compassion and efforts to end her suffering.
