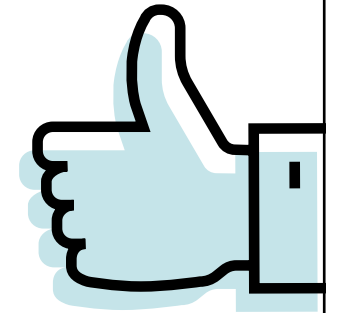

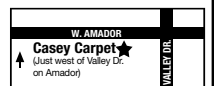

Familiar name to help readers navigate unfamiliar session

There won't be many familiar things about the 2021 New Mexico Legislature.

Senators and state representatives will likely meet virtually rather than in their chambers in the Roundhouse. No one will look familiar, as they'll probably be wearing masks. And some long familiar names — such as senators Mary Kay Papen and John Arthur Smith — will no longer be part of the proceedings.

However, The Bulletin is fortunate to have a familiar name reporting on the session.

Walt Rubel, a seasoned New Mexico political reporter, is returning as a New Mexico legislative correspondent for a collaboration of southern New Mexico media outlets, including the Carlsbad Current-Argus, KRWG-FM, The Las Cruces Bulletin and the Las Cruces

Sun-News.

Rubel has been a Las Cruces journalist since 2002, and his column appears regularly in this publication.

This collaboration allows Bulletin readers to get timely legislative reporting.

“Supporting collaboration is one of our core values at the New Mexico Local News Fund (NMLNF),” said

Rashad Mahmood, co-director of NMLNF, an organization that raises funds to support local news providers and journalists across the state.

“I'm looking forward to it,” Rubel said.

From 2004-07, Rubel was the Santa Fe bureau chief for the Texas-New Mexico Partnership (TNP), which included the Sun-News, the Current-Argus, six other New Mexico newspapers and the El Paso Times.

And while Rubel said he's eager to return to covering the legislature again, he knows it will not be business as usual for either him or the legislators, given the impact of COVID-19.

“It's certainly going to be different without the personal interaction,” Rubel said, recalling the beehive that is the Roundhouse during all other previous sessions, with the buzzing lobbies and busy stairwells and elevators.

“It will be different without the crowded meeting rooms and passing someone in the hallway to get a tip on a story,” Rubel said. “You learn so much from those interactions, especially late in the session, when they're going until two and three in the morning. There are so many emotions among the legislators — exhilaration, frustration. When you're there for the whole 30 or 60 days, you see how each session has its own narrative.”

The NMLNF formed to bring this type of coverage back to southern New Mexico journalism.

“Our primary funder is the Democracy Fund, which is devoted to supporting local news ecosystems as a way to strengthen our nation's democracy,” Mahmood said. “New Mexico got on their radar as a place that could use their support.”

NMLNF also receives significant funding from the Santa Fe-based Thornburg Foundation.

Rubel, who grew up in Denver, has spent his entire career in journalism.

He earned degrees in mass communication and journalism at the University of Northern Colorado in Greeley and was a sportswriter from 1982-97 at newspapers in Colorado, Wyoming, California and Kansas.

On the Edge of Common Sense

Don't let me bleed to death in the street

I was originally not going to include Libertarian candidate Bob Walsh in the U.S. Senate election interviews we conducted recently on community radio, but my co-host, Peter Goodman, argued that if Walsh was on the ballot, he needed to be invited.

I'm glad he did, as Walsh provided my favorite moment of all the campaign interviews this year.

I asked him about the government's role in healthcare, and I put it in the most basic terms I could think of.

"I have no money. I

have no insurance. I get in a car crash. What should happen?"

"Well, you're going to be broke," he said.

I'm already broke. "My question is, should they send an ambulance and take me to the hospital, or should

they let me bleed to death in the streets?"

After a long pause, he replied, "For one thing, you've been totally irresponsible for not having money and not having insurance."

There was no second thing. That was it. Maybe some good-hearted person will stop and help.

Maybe not. I suspect the government would at least be allowed to drag me to the side of the road, so as to avoid a traffic hazard.

Of all the answers given by all the candidates this year in both the Primary and General Elections, that one might have been the most honest. Walsh could afford to be honest, given the impossibility of his potential victory.

Republicans can't afford to be that honest. And, to be clear, I don't believe they share Walsh's view that emergency services should be reserved for those who can afford them. But on the issue of health care,

they don't have a better answer than he does.

For the past 10 years, the GOP has been united in its opposition to the Affordable Care Act but divided on what should replace it. That's why former Sen. John McCain famously turned his thumb down on the final attempt by Congress to "repeal and replace" Obamacare. He knew, just like we all knew, that there was no replacement.

President Trump had been promising a new health care plan that he would unveil after the election, but I suppose that's off now.

Yet Republican attorneys were in the Supreme Court earlier this month,

arguing once again that the nation's healthcare program should be de-

clared unconstitutional.

Ifo Pili: First 60 days have been about learning, listening

Las Cruces City Manager Ifo Pili's first 60 days on the job have included "a whole lot of learning, a whole lot of listening."

Pili became city manager Sept. 8 and has now been joined in Las Cruces by his wife, Jenny Patterson Pili, and their eight children ages 4-17, (six girls and two boys), who are remotely learning in elementary, middle and high school.

Pili, a native of American Samoa, had been with the City of Eagle Mountain, Utah, since 2006, serving as city administrator for the past eight years, before taking the job in Las Cruces.

Pili said he has visited most every Las Cruces street and park since

starting his new job, often traveling with city councilors, city staff and stakeholders to hear their ideas and concerns.

One thing he's already noticed, Pili said, is that Las Cruces has an "excellent pavement management program," but he would like to see an increase in the \$4 million it spends annually on maintaining city streets.

"That's not a lot of money for a city our size" measured per capita and per mile of pavement, Pili said.

He would also like to see an increase in the budget for maintaining city parks.

Despite the ongoing challenges of COVID-19, Pili said the city is in good

shape financially and in other ways and has a hard-working staff.

Pili said the city has completed the first round of interviews in the search for a new police chief to replace Patrick Gallagher, who retired earlier this year. Pili said a new chief could be in place within about a month.

Pili has also visited different barbershops around the city for haircuts and wants to eat in every Las Cruces restaurant he can to learn firsthand about local small businesses and "meet with as many people as possible."

"He's the first city manager that I have eaten sushi with for lunch," Mayor Ken Miyagishima

said. "I think Ifo is doing a great job! I'm glad he's here."

Pili said it has been exciting to see "how much pride people have in this city. They love this city."

Pili said he has also been impressed by "how many people are working on the same goals" to make Las Cruces better.

"I'm really excited for what we have on the horizon," he said. "I think we're going to do some great things here."

Pili said his main focus as city manager is to reduce Las Cruces' poverty rate. Eagle Mountain saw its median household income increase by \$20,000 in a decade during his tenure there, he said.

"Government didn't do that," Pili said. "It was business that did that."

That kind of growth is

possible for Las Cruces, Pili said.

"We can play in the big leagues right now. We have all the resources," he said. "Going after business and economic development, I honestly believe that's going to move the poverty dial."

Ultimately, Pili said he would like to see Las Cruces ranked as the best place to live in the United States.

From Saputo Cheese of Las Cruces doubling its employment to Electronic Caregiver working toward becoming one of the largest employers in New Mexico, "what we have here is amazing," Pili said. "That message needs to be shared and "shouted from the rooftops."

Pili moved to Orem, Utah in 1994 and gradu-

ated from high school there. He was a lineman with the Brigham Young University Cougars and the NFL's Houston Texans, Philadelphia Eagles and New England Patriots, and has an NFL championship ring as part of the Eagles' 2004 National Football League champion team. He has a bachelor's degree in political science and a masters' degree in public administration, both from BYU.

While serving as Eagle Mountain city administrator, Pili was district administrator for the Unified Fire Service Area and was an adjunct professor in BYU's masters of public administration program.

Harnessing emotions is a caregiver's dilemma

Chinda Lucoski has been a caregiver for 40 years, since her daughter Alicia was a 1-year-old.

With her experience taking care of a child, now adult, on the autism spectrum, Lucoski now is involved with a group supporting people with developmental disabilities and their caregivers, which provides people a place to connect with others in their situation.

She said it is essential

for caregivers to take care of their own needs, as well as those of others.

"You have to take care of yourself before you can take care of other people," Lucoski said. "Be connected with other caregivers to talk to. Find a network for people dealing with similar disabilities."

Caregivers must put up with a lot of emotions, she said, so they need support from others in similar situations to help prevent burnout.

"Learn about stress

management, respite," she said. "You have to get away from being a caregiver 24/7."

Encouraging all caregivers, from unpaid family members to professionals hired in the home, to become familiar with what's going on with the person(s) for whom they are caring, Lucoski suggested searching on a computer, making calls and looking for referrals for the right caregiver coalition for the condition. There often is a small local group or a statewide

organization, she said.

"You need to know why the mood swings," she said. "You have to understand the condition and then try to understand someone. You might have to walk slow, go to an appointment, be patient."

For example, Lucoski said in the evenings a Parkinson's patient might get down and moody. The caregiver will need to be proactive in order to manage the conditions.

Many times, the at-home caregiver might not know what is wrong

with their loved one. One mother had ALS and the daughter/caregiver didn't know and was daily facing frustration until she understood, Lucoski said.

When things are overwhelming "take a break, walk away, no confrontation," Lucoski said.

"You have to learn, don't talk too much. Don't let it out on the patient, but vent to someone," she said. "It's very helpful so that you are not alone to find help, or [have someone] give you a break."

She said she knows letting go and trusting someone else can be very difficult. It was a difficult lesson for her as a mother.

"Before, I refused to go anywhere," Lucoski said. "Now I know it's normal to trust someone, so I can recoup without feeling guilty. There are negative

emotions that come with being a full-time caregiver."

November is Family Caregiver Month, said Chris Chaffin, communications director for the Alzheimer's Association's New Mexico Chapter. With the coronavirus epidemic, things have become even more difficult, he said.

"It's all taking a different spin for care team members," Chaffin said. "The challenges are many, and now we're entering the holidays. Caregivers tend to neglect their own issues which increases mortality. The burden of caregiving is great."

City council approves body-cam contract

The Las Cruces City Council voted unanimously to approve a sole-source contract of a little more than \$1.8 million over five years to provide body-worn cameras (body cams) for all Las Cruces Police Department, Codes Enforcement section and animal control officers.

The contract is with Axon Enterprise, Inc. of Scottsdale, Arizona.

The funding will help the city reach a body-cam inventory of 214, according to city documents.

The contract will satisfy the requirements of New Mexico Senate Bill 8, which was passed by the 2020 New Mexico Legislature and signed into law by Gov. Michelle Lujan

Grisham.

The law mandates that all law enforcement agencies in the state require all their law enforcement personnel to use body cams to record all interactions with the public.

"What we have with Axon Enterprise, in my opinion, is the best," LCPD Officer Rob Benavidez said during the Nov. 16 council meeting during

which the contract was approved. Benavidez said Axon provides "an evidence-management system that encompasses all our video and photo needs with unlimited data," which he said is available to the city, LCPD and the Third Judicial District Attorney's office.

The company also supplies LCPD with tasers, Benavidez said.

America's Thanksgiving began almost 400 years ago

This Thanksgiving, Thursday, Nov. 26, is the 399th anniversary of the first Thanksgiving gathering, held in November 1621 in Plymouth Colony, Massachusetts, when the newly arrived Pilgrims sat with the Wampanoag tribe for a three-day feast that included wild deer, fowl and the Pilgrims' first corn crop.

In the 17th cen-

tury, the Wampanoag (waam-puh-now-ag) were a confederation of tribes of Native Americans living in Massachusetts and Rhode Island. Their groups included the Chappaquiddick, the Nantucket, the Mashpee, the Pokanoket and the Herring Pond. Today, the Wampanoag include five officially recognized tribes. The name means "People of the Dawn."

The Pilgrims were the English settlers who

came to America in 1620 aboard the Mayflower and settled Plymouth Colony in Massachusetts. The term pilgrim was probably used for the Mayflower passengers for the first time in William Bradford's "Of Plymouth Plantation" in July 1620, when he quoted an Old Testament passage about "strangers and pilgrims." The word comes from the Latin peregrinus, "one who has come from afar."

The Pilgrims were Brownists, who were separatists from the Church of England. They went into exile because of their beliefs in Holland in 1607-8 before sailing for America Sept. 16, 1620, arriving Nov. 9. A child, Oceanus Hopkins, was born aboard ship during the journey, but died in childhood. Another boy, Peregrine White, was born on the ship as it lay at anchor after arriving in America. (The

Mayflower returned to England May 9, 1621. It was likely sold for scrap about three years later.)

Those in attendance at that very first Thanksgiving included Bradford, a weaver and judge, who served nearly 20 years as governor of Plymouth Colony in five nonconsecutive terms beginning in May 1621. The colony's first governor, John Carver, died in April 1621 after less than a year in office. The Wampanoag

were led by their sachem (leader), Massasoit.

Alas, there was no pumpkin pie – with or without gluten-free crust – at that first Thanksgiving, and the Pilgrims and the Wampanoag had no television to gather around after the great meal to watch football. And there wouldn't be a presidential campaign to reflect on for another 170 years or so. Maybe they just talked about the weather.

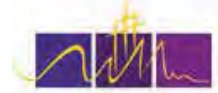

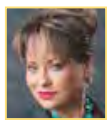

NM to become the third state to host human spaceflights at Spaceport America

What a year this has been for all of us! Spaceport America started 2020 on a high note when we welcomed Virgin Galactic's SpaceShipTwo to Spaceport America in February. Although COVID-19 has slowed down progress and forced us to postpone some launches, we are still looking to end the year with the same excitement we started with.

New Mexico is about to become the third state in the country to host human spaceflight! Virgin Galactic has been gearing up for this next test flight, expected between November 19-23, all year. This flight will see two of their pilots reach the edge of space (over 50 miles above sea level) and return safely to Spaceport America. This is the start of a pivotal moment in the commercial aerospace industry in New Mexico. We are disappointed that we cannot invite spectators to this historical event, but we are excited to share the images and news with you once the test is complete.

Did you catch the Virgin Galactic Mothership VMS Eve over the cities of Las Cruces, Hatch, Truth or Consequences and Elephant Butte on November 3? The education packets that accompanied this flight are available, along with other STEM activities, from our website SpaceportAmerica.com/Education.

Spaceport America is home to four on-site tenants. Virgin Galactic is our largest and employs over 170 people locally. AeroVironment is our newest tenant and they have also had a success-

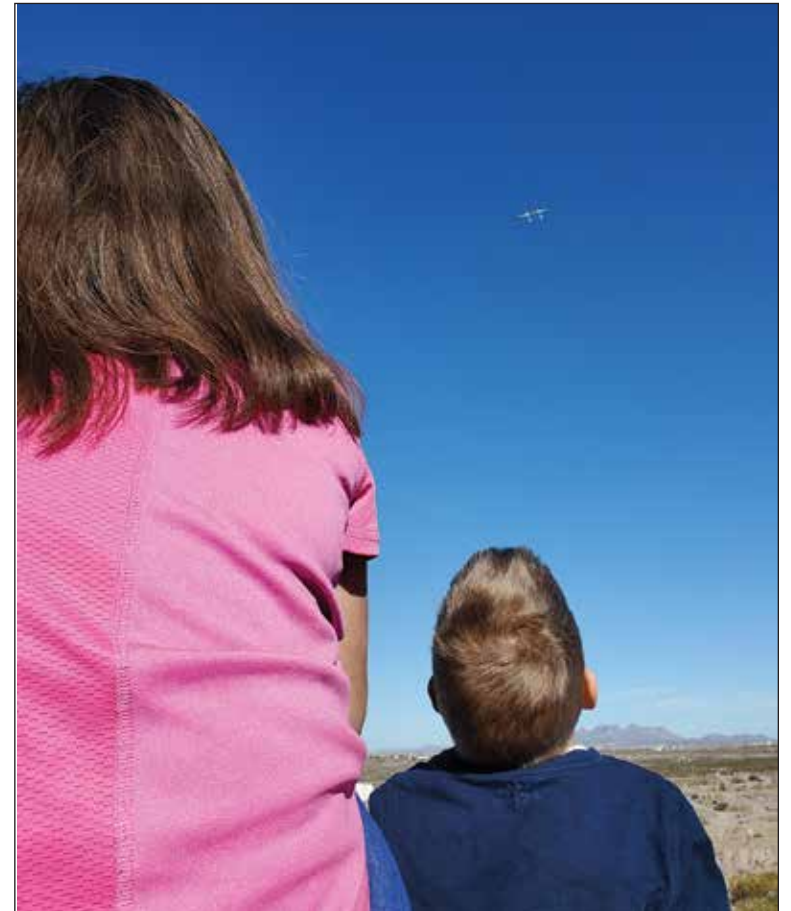
ful year completing construction of their airstrip and testing area in early summer and holding two tests of the high-altitude platform station (HAPS) Sunlider craft. AeroVironment have had at least 35 members of staff working at Spaceport America and hope to employ more in 2021.

SpinLaunch have been constructing the world's largest evacuated centrifuge on the southern point of Spaceport America. This will be used to test technologies used for "kinetic launch," whereby non-rocket technologies are used for the first stage. At least 55 full-time employees work out at the site and we are expecting testing to begin next summer.

UP Aerospace has been launching rockets to the Karman line from Spaceport America since 2006. Although they have not been able to launch this year, they have been to Spaceport America to conduct engine testing ahead of flights expected in the spring.

We have also welcomed customers from across the globe this year to hold unmanned aerial vehicle testing, rocket launches and rocket motor testing at Spaceport America. We had a full calendar in the spring that had to be postponed but we are hopeful to bring back more events, launches and the annual Spaceport America Cup in 2021 once the pandemic is more under control.

Sending consistent newsletters to your followers gives you the ability to develop a “Know, Like and Trust” relationship with them that will dramatically increase your brand visibility and market reach.

FROM THE LOS AMIGOS CHAIR

Serving during time of crisis

Since the pandemic began in March, United Way of Southwest New Mexico has worked to support the response and recovery efforts in the Southern region of our State. United Way's role in the community is to understand community needs and respond and recover in the near-term as we reimagine and rebuild more resilient communities. We have seen an outpouring of great work as our local partner agencies have leveraged resources, forged new partnerships, and elevated their relevance in these uncertain times.

With emergency assistance as an integral part of our mission at the United Way of Southwest New Mexico, this time of crisis has provided an opportunity for our organization

to re-establish our role as a funder to many local organizations in our community. In the recent months, we have worked on two different funding initiatives with some of our partners such as the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico, Casa de Peregrinos, and the Las Cruces Hispanic Chamber of Commerce.

The Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico in partnership with the United Way of Southwest New Mexico have been able to create the Nonprofit Emergency Fund to provide micro-grants to nonprofit organizations in Southwest New Mexico, spanning 7 counties; Dona Ana, Grant, Hidalgo, Lincoln, Luna, Otero, and Sierra counties. The fund, which operates on an as-needed basis,

assists nonprofits as they adapt to how services are provided to their clients during this COVID-19 health pandemic. Applications requesting funding for technical assistance will be considered. Awards will range from \$2,500- \$5,000. It is our goal to fund at least 9 organizations as they adapt to the new normal of virtual meetings and providing classes virtually.

The other initiative

provided by United Way of SWNM is the Stamp Out Hunger Donor Drive which is a fundraising effort in partnership with Casa de Peregrinos and the Las Cruces Hispanic Chamber of Commerce. The current pandemic-related economic shutdown has worsened food insecurity that affects many individuals in our community, including children, elderly and military veterans. And although food insecurity has only worsened, local food pantries are continuing to work hard to serve our community and help the growing number of families who are food insecure.

During the month of September, community members and local businesses contributed to this online fundraising effort for a total of \$14,000! All funds raised

will be distributed during the month of November to 8 local food pantries in Dona Ana and Sierra counties. These micro-grants will help supply emergency food for our most vulnerable neighbors and make a large impact for these local food pantries. The grant is timely, especially as the holiday season is quickly approaching.

Even though United Way

of SWNM is part of a much larger network of other United Ways and, we know that we can't accomplish work locally without our local nonprofit partners. It is our hope that with both of these initiatives we assist sustaining those organizations doing important work in the region, so they can keep serving our community even in times of crisis.

Securing our Health Care: How the Affordable Care Act saves lives and helps small businesses in New Mexico

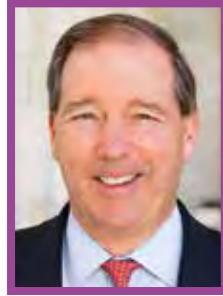

For many families and business owners, access to quality and affordable health care has never felt as urgent as it does today, while we live through a once-in-a-century pandemic. I have been working hard to connect New Mexicans with the federal resources they need to stay safe and healthy. Unfortunately, a years-long assault on our health care system by Republicans and the Trump administration is threatening to upend the Affordable Care Act at precisely the time that we need it the most.

In addition to connecting hundreds of thousands of

New Mexicans with accessible and affordable health care, the Affordable Care Act (ACA) has provided an economic boost to New Mexico's small business owners and entrepreneurs. Nationally, more than half of all ACA marketplace enrollees are small business owners, self-employed individuals, or small business employees.

The ACA has created a path to independence and cost savings for so many New Mexico small business owners and entrepreneurs. I have had the privilege to meet so many business owners across our state who—in addition to operating establishments that help

make up the foundations of our communities— treat their employees like family.

The ACA has made it easier for small business owners to offer competitive benefits to their employees and save money on insurance premiums. It's also protected over 800,000 of our family members in New

Mexico with pre-existing health conditions, to which we unfortunately have to add the over 30,000 COVID-19 survivors. While the ACA can be improved, it is clear that the law has lessened health disparities across our state and saved lives.

Instead working to improve health care for New Mexicans and Americans, Republicans and the Trump administration are attempting to once again eviscerate the ACA – this time in the Supreme Court. After years of trying and failing to repeal the ACA without offering a replacement, Republicans have taken this fight to our nation's highest

court and rushed a new confirmation to overturn the law just days before the election. The Court will hear arguments on November 10 and the future of the ACA hangs in the balance.

I have joined Democratic lawmakers to support the ACA. I submitted an amicus brief with Senate Democrats urging the Supreme Court to protect health care because I know how important this law is for New Mexicans. I also support improving upon the ACA to expand coverage to even more families and businesses. Health care is a human right and no one in this country should have to go without it, especially

during a pandemic.

It's simply good business to have good health care. Small businesses can compete more effectively when they can offer their employees affordable health coverage. Entrepreneurs are more likely to act on their great ideas when they know they can count on health care no matter what. Above all, we all do better when our employees, our families and ourselves are healthy.

There is a lot at stake in this fight. I want small business owners and working families to know that I am in your corner and will be working to protect your health care during this pandemic and beyond.

Keeping Schools Safe

I am enormously proud of the record turnout of voters in New Mexico and across the whole country who made their voices heard in this year's election. I cannot wait to work alongside President-Elect Joe Biden and Vice President-Elect Kamala Harris to unify our country and confront the pressing challenges we face. It has been an absolute honor to work with Senator Tom Udall and Congresswoman Xochitl Torres Small for these last years, but I am just as eager to find new ways to keep fighting for southern New Mexico alongside Senator-Elect Ben Ray Lujan and Congresswoman-Elect Yvette Herrell.

No matter who is sitting in the White House or which political party con-

trols the United States Senate, I remain firmly committed to delivering for New Mexico workers and families. As we all look toward these coming months and the year ahead under new leadership, we must take on the COVID-19 pandemic armed with facts and science, rebuild our economy and communities, and build a fair and equal playing field for all Americans. That needs to start with a focus on our schools.

To say that New Mexico's parents and teachers have gone above and beyond during this pandemic would be a real understatement. So many of our educators have worked even

longer hours and have been forced to come up with creative solutions to unforeseen problems. We must do better to provide teachers, students, and parents with all of the training

and resources they need to cope with these challenges. However, we must also acknowledge that remote learning can never fully replace the rich experiences teachers provide in their classrooms.

A recent report presented to the New Mexico Legislative Finance Committee found that far too many of our students and families are falling behind in the remote learning landscape. The report found that teachers have been un-

able to contact 1 in 5 New Mexico students and that 33 percent of students in our state are not participating in remote instruction. Those devastating statistics show us why we must prioritize securing the resources, equipment, and support schools need to safely reopen for in-person instruction so all of our students can succeed.

As part of that effort, I convened educators from districts across New Mexico last month to discuss how we can improve indoor air quality in our schools. The latest science shows that creating safer indoor environments is necessary if we want to reopen our schools and businesses. Replacing old HVAC systems and investing in modern proven technologies will help with filtering out viral particles. This is the right thing to do in context

of the pandemic and also for better long-term health of students and educators.

I'm pleased that the New Mexico Public Education Department has been working with school districts to assess and upgrade air filters as part of their plans to safely restart in-person instruction. However, I recognize that districts will need significant financial and technical support. That's why I introduced the Keeping Schools Safe Act to provide \$1 billion in federal grants to help elementary and secondary schools across the country build safer and healthier indoor environments.

I am calling on congressional leaders on both sides of the aisle to include resources for schools to help them improve their indoor air ventilation and air decontamination in the

next major relief legislation we pass. This should be in addition to the \$175 billion of additional funding that Congress urgently needs to dedicate for the Elementary and Secondary Emergency Relief Fund. Without that funding, schools are already facing desperate financial circumstances and deep uncertainty as cases of the virus spike and we head toward the end of the fall semester.

I will never stop fighting for the support New Mexico families and workers need, the science-based public health response necessary to save lives, and economic investments to rebuild our communities. Faith-based distributor to take 'Walking With Herb' worldwide

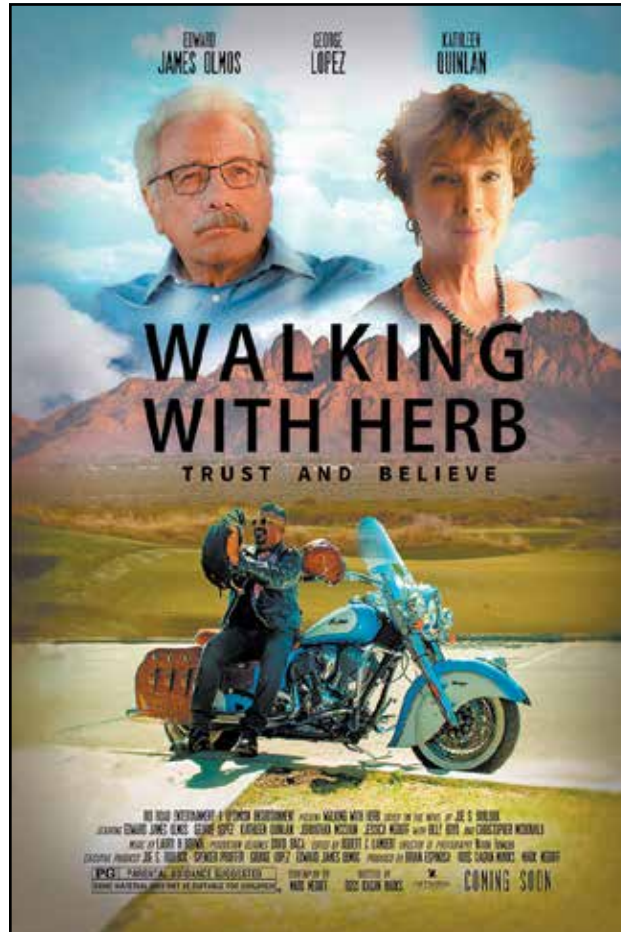

Faith-based film studio Pure Flix/Quality Flix is in the final stages of acquiring the international distribution rights to "Walking With Herb," the movie made in Las Cruces in 2018 with a cast including Edward James Olmos, George Lopez, Kathleen Quinlan, Christopher McDonald and Billy Boyd.

In addition to discussing his book during the Branigan Zoom event, Wheeler will speak about his research, writing style and literary influences.

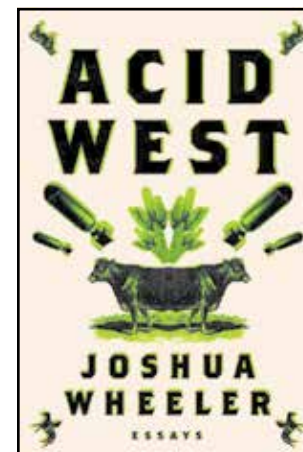

Mesilla Valley Fine Arts Gallery features Madrid, Spellenberg in December

The Mesilla Valley Fine Arts Gallery (MVAG), 2470-A Calle de Guadalupe, across from the Fountain Theatre on the historic Mesilla Plaza, will feature the works of two talented local artists during December: Jane Madrid and Richard Spellenberg.

Madrid has been a resident of Las Cruces since 1959 and has painted since the age of 8, MVAG said in a news release. Her serious work began about 2005, when she gradually prepared for the end of a successful information technology career with the U.S. Department of Justice.

Madrid's main media is oil, with some acrylic. Her major artistic themes center around nature, with a particular emphasis on animals, flowers, birds, butterflies, landscapes and the interaction of these within the environment.

Originally from California, Spellenberg is a retired New Mexico State University biology professor who has lived in Las Cruces since 1968. A botanist, Spellenberg has written several books about plants of the Southwest.

His medium, wood, is a continuation of his scientific endeavors. Spellenberg has a minor in art with woodturning courses. He said he "toyed" with his father's treadle lathe as a teenager and, since retirement, his interest in the differences in the

woods and patterns has deepened.

MVAG's newest member is Suzanne Thiesfeld, a fabric artist. Her inspiration is from nature, especially in landscapes, still life and observations of things surrounding her, the gallery said. Fabric allows Thiesfeld to use colors and shapes quickly and forces her to be loose in her compositions. However, print fabrics in some pieces make her collages come to life.

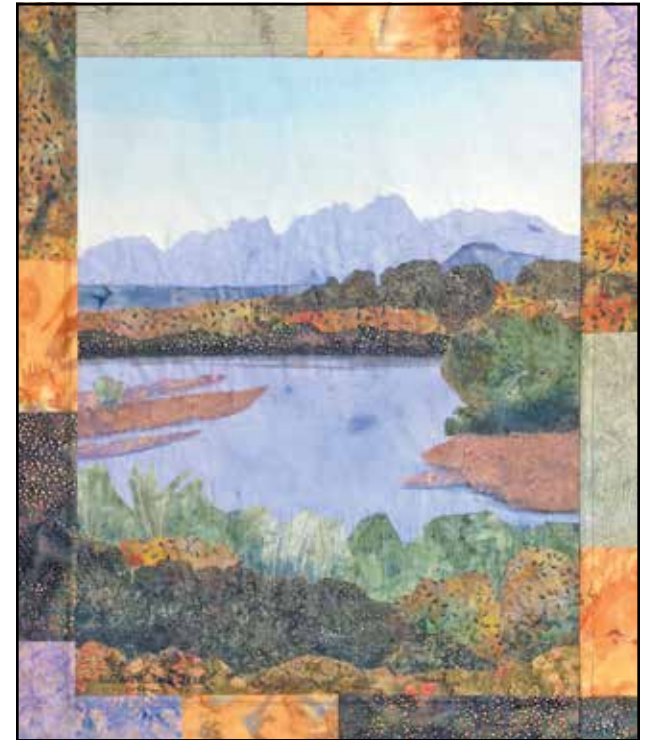

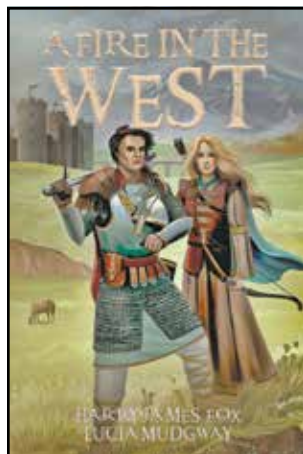
Local author earns prize with Christian adventure book

When the 2020 New Mexico-Arizona Book Awards finalists and winners were announced, local author Harry James Fox of Sonoma Ranch garnered first place for his novel, “A Fire in the West,” in the religion category. He co-authored the book with an accomplished author from Australia, Lucia Mudgway.

“I started writing on it a long time ago,” Fox said. “It turned too big for one volume and became a trilogy.”

“A Fire in the West” is the third and last book in the Stonegate series. The three books comprise



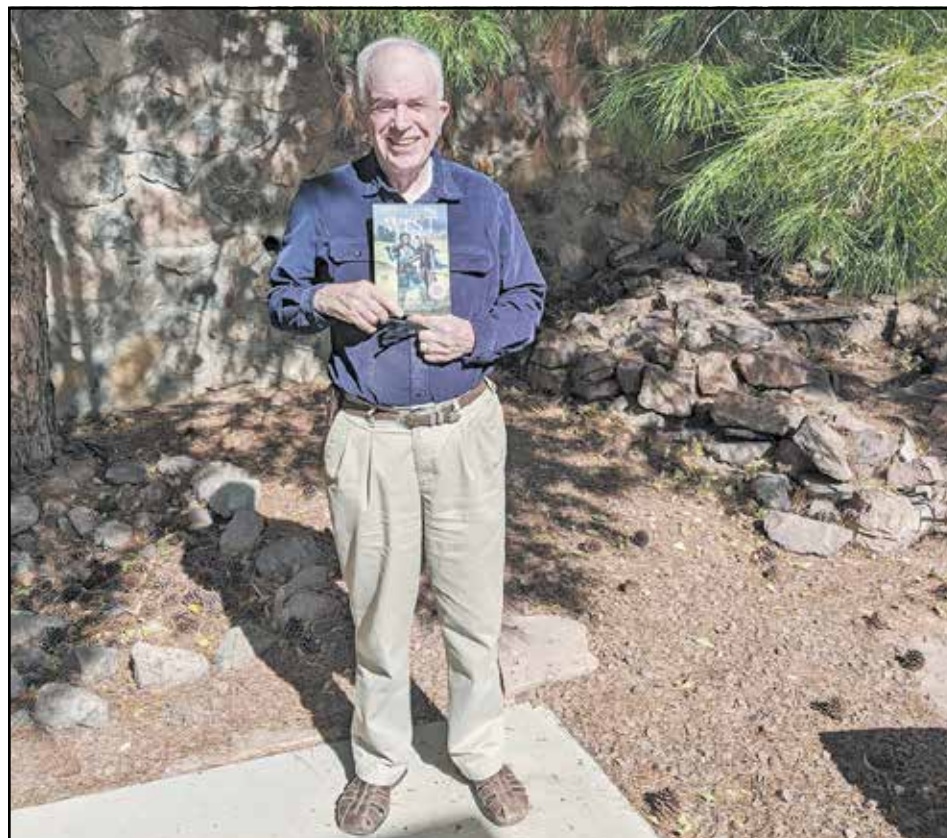
tales of a future New Mexico and Colorado a century after a virus pandemic caused a collapse of civilization.

“These books are often called ‘fantasy’ but are really an imagined future history that looks very much like the distant

past,” Fox said. “It is somewhat ironic that we are receiving this award in the midst of a real pandemic, differing only in degree from the fictional one.”

Looking to write about an individual with a modern world view who was placed into a violent cultural setting which was contrary to all his values, Fox considered time travel, science fiction and historical fiction before settling on simply fiction set in the future.

“In the first book, the main character, Don, grows up immersed in the past,” Fox said. “He read writings of the past, which is our current world.”

In the story, Don meets a girl who gets captured by raiders, and he goes to rescue her and finds himself in the middle of a war. In the second book, he manages to be a warrior transitioning from being bookish to be a fighter and leader. In the end, he beats back the forces of evil.

“A Fire in the West” takes place a generation later. Fox said it is another coming of age story, about

a boy and a girl who are cousins.

“Some of the characters have a Christian world view,” he said. “The young man is struggling with his faith and realizes what he has been searching for is God. It’s a major part of the story.”

Fox, who was raised on a ranch in Colorado, said he draws on his love of Colorado and New Mexico landscapes for his books.

“In the end, a big element is horses,” he said. “And the people travel through landscapes of Colorado and New Mexico. People have told me the landscape is almost a character in the book. I had fun with it, imagining how it would look in a future time.

The book is available on Amazon in paperback, as an audiobook and on Kindle as an eBook.

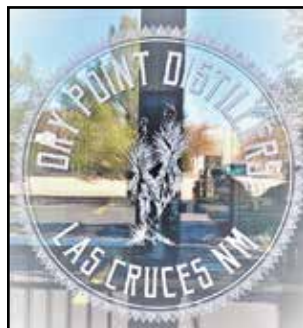

Amid online learning, challenges can be overcome

It's hard to believe it, but there will come a time when COVID is not ruling our lives. But right now, it's stealing not just health and wellbeing, it's stealing jobs, students' learning, our sense of community and the freedom to move about unencumbered.

It's also stealing hope and futures. What we thought would be something we dealt with for two weeks, then four more weeks, and then another month is now eight months in duration, with no clear end in sight. This feels like "normal" now. But it's not.

And this version of "normal" is really hurting our kids, our families and our community.

We're seeing student learning take a real hit across the board. A Spot-

light report to the New Mexico Legislative Finance Committee indicated that middle and high school students are failing their remote classes at far too high rates, and 20 percent of students hadn't even been reachable by their schools.

The report projected that the challenges with remote learning could generate a 9 percent increase in the state's dropout rates. We just can't let that happen.

Long before COVID, we knew that the most effective strategy for student success was career development and job training. Why? Because it's future-focused and helps contextualize learning in

a practical, applicable way.

What if we use this time to help students think about and explore prospective careers? What if we engage them in thinking about how they can be

Interestingly, students are already gaining skills that will equip them for the seismic shifts in work that will last beyond COVID. Learning to navigate and succeed in remote learning will translate into the "soft" or employability skills they'll need for remote work.

Those who are succeeding in remote instruction are mastering problem solving, critical thinking, self-direction and self-advocacy, and personal responsibility, alongside hard skills in digital literacy and use of technology.

We've also posted "Career Pathways" that show well-paying careers here and how to use education to get there, but also exactly what employers here are looking for in their future talent, from what are

the essential skills they need to what trade, college and university credentials they value. We've completed five of the eight industries listed there, with the other three on the way. And, there will be more to come.

Our job right now is to help our children and our families not lose their sense of hope and their belief in the possibilities that lie before them in the future. City Hall lights up for Diabetes Awareness Month

The west side of Las Cruces City Hall, 700 N. Main St., will be lit in blue every night through Monday, Nov. 30 in observance of national Diabetes Awareness Month, the City of Las Cruces said in a news release.

Blue LED floodlights have been temporarily installed at the base of each of 10 columns on the west side of City Hall, facing Main Street. They were first turned on at dusk Nov. 12.

The nonprofit South-



ern New Mexico Diabetes Outreach (SNMDO) is encouraging businesses and organizations to help promote public awareness and support for Las Cruces and Doña Ana County residents who have diabetes. SNMDO

has been in Las Cruces since 1998.

From blood glucose screening tests conducted on 1,300 people, SNMDO determined that 42 percent of those tests revealed blood glucose levels above acceptable levels, indicating a large number of residents who have

diabetes, the news release said, adding it is estimated that one in three U.S. residents has diabetes. Body mass index tests indicated that as many as 63 percent of those tested were overweight, which is a leading cause of diabetes.

SNMDO held its 16th annual Diabetes Expo

Saturday, Nov. 14. The free, virtual conference included healthcare professionals sharing information for diabetics on diet, exercise and other topics.

I told them how his kindness, laughter and all-over beautiful personality not only made people laugh but brought them joy in such a strange time.

beings, we're all trying to just figure out what's normal.

I can say this: Kindness goes a long way.

Make a funny video, laugh with your kids, love them extra on the hard days, pay for the person's coffee behind you, tip your server extra and try daily to make someone smile.

Especially your loved ones.

In a world that can get so dark, do what's kind even though it may not be easy.

Force multipliers can help improve your game

If you are a golfer who longs for increased distance, listen up. The military concept of “force multiplier” is something you need to know about.

In military science, force multiplier refers to a factor or a combination of factors that gives a person or equipment the ability to accomplish far greater feats than without it.

For example, in the Battle for the Atlantic in World War II (1939 to 1945) the United States started using newly built smallish aircraft carriers, which were converted merchant ships, to search for and sink German U-boats, which had been taking a huge toll on convoys transporting strategic

goods to England. These ships were “escort carriers,” or CVE’s and had 25 to 30 planes, with flight decks only 500 feet long. Whereas an anti-submarine warfare destroyer escort (DE) equipped with radar could check only 75 square miles of ocean an hour hunting for U-boats, in the same amount of time a plane with microwave radar could cover 3,000 square miles. Eventually, the strategy effectively put an end to the sinking of convoy merchant ships. This was a force multiplier!

Let’s apply this notion of a quantum leap in force (results) to your golf game. Suppose you were hitting your average drive 20 yards farther that you

do now. And as a result, you were hitting two less clubs for your shots to the greens.

Bryson Dechambeau made his game a whole lot easier for himself by making a leap in body size, strength and applied force. He is averaging 344.4 yards. driving in this 2020-21 season and has had carries over 400 yards. Recently, he recorded a ball speed of 206 mph.

I’m not suggesting everyday golfers try a “bomb-and-gouge” approach. But we can find ways to apply a force multiplier to our game.

If you’re not working out at the gym or at home with weights and up-to-date apparatus, you’re sacrificing serious gains in distance, flexibility and swing mobility. Strength training helps your body

handle faster swing speeds safely and prevent injury.

If you don’t care to visit a gym, check out “golffor-ever,” the digital golf exercise program you can do anywhere to increase flexibility and distance while reducing back and joint pain. There are several apps available. Also, try goldigest.com and golf.com for their programs.

Marty Jertson, a Ping Golf fitting expert and professional golfer, also favors “speed training” where one swings sticks at high speeds that are either lighter or heavier than a driver weight.

“If you pick up just five mph of club head speed, and you have the same three-dimensional dynamics of delivery at impact, you’re going to generate 200 to 300 more rpm of

spin,” Jertson says. That’s 10 to 15 yards of distance because of more applied force. Remember, that won’t happen overnight. As you pick up club head speed, you may have to get re-fit for your driver.

Another force multiplier to consider is upgrading your technology where needed. Do you use a laser rangefinder? Our Air Force, Navy and Marine fighter jets use precision-guided munitions, better known as laser-guided bombs, to achieve pinpoint accuracy (within a meter). You should too. Are your golf clubs up to date? They should be. Things change after eight years!

How about putting? Here, we’re talking fine motor skills, meaning touch, feel, visualization and technique. Would you

like to have four fewer putts, on average, per round? Would that not be a force for the better in your game?

Then get out there and practice. What? Practice? You say you don’t have time. Maybe less time playing around with your phone and eyeballing stuff on Facebook would free up some practice sessions. It’s called “time management” bunk.

Practice time on the range and the course gives you the chance to improve your whole technique and course management, all while fixing score-ruining flaws.
