Doña Ana County Codes Enforcement re-initiates Community Sweep program in Chaparral

Doña Ana County Environmental Codes is re-initiating a Community Sweep program to work with residents and the community.

County Codes Enforcement staff is currently going door-to-door in the Chaparral area to provide information about county codes ordinances regarding recycling, trash accumulation, inoperable vehicles and weed control, among others, plus potential consequences of noncompliance.

Codes officers will evaluate individual needs, as well as the community's needs and will make recommendations for future clean-up incentives, such as a roll-off containers or tire shredders.

Residents will be notified in advance if a no-charge clean-up dumpster or other incentives are scheduled.

Atleigh Johnson is a home-schooled third grader in Las Cruces who makes care packages for patients at the Memorial Medical Center Cancer Center.

Each package Atleigh makes contains fuzzy socks and foot cream, said her mother, Kendra Johnson.

"This is her second project for the cancer center," Kendra said. "Last year, she sewed about 100 hot packs for both MMC and MountainView Regional Medical Center. She watched me go through chemo for over a year, and once I was done, she

decided she wanted to do something to help people feel better while they were at the cancer center."

"My mom had cancer

and I think it's really important that other people know we care about them," Atleigh said. "I wanted to do this because

I thought it could make them happy while they are at chemo."

LCPS seeks donations for migrant students

Every year, Las Cruces Public Schools (LCPS) partners with community members, local businesses and nonprofits to provide gifts to students who need more support around the holidays.

One initiative that helps to make spirits bright is the "Wish Upon a Star" program, which LCPS sponsors in partnership with FirstLight Federal Credit Union (FLFCU). The program collects warm clothing and gifts for students from migrant families living in Las Cruces.

In previous years, community members could pick a hanging star from a festive tree in front of the LCPS administration building to fulfill a student's Christmas wish. This season may look different without an actual wish tree, but donors can still help make the

wishes of students come true.

Wish Upon a Star is in its fourth year, and with COVID-19 safety protocols in mind, the LCPS Federal & Migrant Education Programs Department (FMEPD) is asking for donations in the form of gift cards no greater than \$25 this season.

FLFCU will sponsor 85 LCPS students with \$25 gift cards to shop at Walmart.

"We are very grateful to be able to assist the community," said FLFCU Community and Media Relations Liaison Cristina Da Costa. "We want people to feel the heart of FirstLight, not just think about us as a financial institution. It's meaningful to the families and to the students."

NASA and Toys for Tots also will help sponsor this year's event. LCPS hopes to provide gift cards to 180 students. Currently, 42 students remain on the wish list. LCPS and FLFCU are asking the community for support to help make Christmas bright for a child this holiday season.

"It's all for the kids," said FMEPD Coordinator Ignosencia Campos.
"This year has been very hard on our families.
Some struggle to pay for utilities. We try to do this so that the kids have something to open on Christmas morning."


A one-time award of \$500 will be granted to the selected teacher in recognition for teaching in 2019 or 2020.



Medrano and Chavez came straight from high school to take part in the LCU Internship Program, which allowed them to take classes at DACC and gain hands-on experience at the City's Utilities Department.

"We got to see behind the scenes and learn about jobs that existed that we had no idea about," Medrano said. "What I liked about it, is

that you're in control of what you learn and are allowed to take on responsibilities under the guidance of those who do it every day."

LCU's Internship Program pays for tuition and other reasonable education-related expenses at DACC, including a monthly stipend and paid on-the-job training to assist with educational and living expenses. Interns work up to 20 hours per week during semesters and 40 hours per week maximum during academic breaks.

Chavez said that the classes complemented his work, and while the math got a little more difficult in the last few classes, there were plenty of opportunities to get help focused on exactly what you needed. He said he's looking to get his next levels – industry certifications that show his abilities – to grow his career opportunities. In return for fiscal

help with their schooling, interns commit to working four to eight years with the City of Las Cruces as an operator or lab technician after graduation. The intern graduates will work at LCU in the Water, Wastewater, or Regulatory Environmental Services lines of business.

Virus can't stop a spiritual experience

Leonard Jimenez was six the first time he went "up the mountain."

There's a good chance he was carted up there a few other times before he could even remember. Just as his grandfather, his dad, his uncle, his cousins, his nieces, neph-

Just as hundreds of other families.

The tradition has been going on in some fashion in southern Las Cruces for nearly 150 years.

The Our Lady of Guadalupe Fiesta at Tortugas, like so many other plans of 2020, is not happening this year.

The mountain of which Jimenez speaks is Tortugas Mountain, also known as "A" Mountain. An integral part of the fiesta is the six-mile processional walk Dec. 11 from the Tortugas Pueblo grounds to the top of the mountain, culminating in a ceremony where the faithful carry their families'

promises. It's happened over the preparation by organizers and years in all types of weather, and some do it barefoot.



Guadalupe, the organization that formed in 1914 to build the church and set aside land for the Tortugas Pueblo. It also formalized the fiesta, which by that time had already been going on for 30 years or more.

If you've never experienced the fiesta, there's no way to adequately describe its effect on all your senses. It's three days of ritual, sacrifice, solemnity, tradition, exhaustion, prayer, God. family, friends, music, dancing, eating, celebrating and joy. The three days are a culmination of a year's work, planning and

participants.

The event celebrates the December days in 1531, when Mary, the Virgin Mother of Jesus, appeared before humble Juan Diego, speaking in his indigenous language, in what is now Mexico.

In the nearly 500 years since the original apparitions, stories of other miracles have intertwined, along with the stories of Juan Diego's descendants, the relevance to the Catholic faith, the blending of families and nations, the consequent development of societies in Mexico, the United States, New Mexico, Las Cruces and Tortugas.

That, plus nearly 150 years of celebration, has given this fiesta its unique, complex mix of indigenous, religious, historical and cultural traditions. Most church fiestas take place over a weekend: Friday, Saturday and Sunday. The Our Lady of Guadalupe Fiesta takes place Dec. 10-12, regardless of the days of

the week.

The Tortugas Pueblo and, in turn, the fiesta have managed to honor and respect the traditions of the Tiwa and Piro tribes, as well as the Catholic faith.

"The sounds of the drums, the sounds of the guns, the sounds of the violins, it all sings to your soul," said Jimenez, who has danced with two of the four groups at the celebration. "I've been going to the fiesta since I was 6, and I don't think I've skipped. I'm still in shock it won't be happening this year. I feel like everyone else. In a fog. Ordinarily I would have been practicing for over a month. This week is particularly somber."

Multiple dancing groups play roles in the celebrations, representing various aspects of the cultures. There are the Los Indios, Los Danzanantes, Danza Guadalupana Azteca, Danza Azteca Chichimeca and the

Malinches, young girls dressed in white, who dance with Los Danzanantes.

"For each group, each tribe, each dancer, there's a different dance that tells a different story." Jimenez said. "I've gotten to see two different tribes tell two different stories. Symbolically, it's something you can't replicate."

Neither can you replicate the work and the passion that goes into each fiesta.

"The mayordomos who put it all together, feed the public, feed the dancers, the albondigas, the red

chile, there's nothing like it." Jimenez said.

All of that adds up to a tradition that cannot be stopped.

The coronavirus may have canceled the fiesta at the church and Pueblo grounds, but nothing can stop the fiesta in the hearts of the faithful.

"We are asking the public to continue saying prayers," Castillo said. "You can pray the Rosary on the night of the 10th, you can sing the songs we've sung for many years, you can hold your own individual prayers, you can sing Las Mañanitas before sunrise on the 11th, you can go for a long walk, and even though we won't have the large public mass, you can celebrate at mass at vour church or another church."

Jimenez said he will still pull out his traditional costume, iron it, and have photographs taken of him wearing it.

Even without the public events and ceremonies. Castillo said, celebrating Our Lady of Guadalupe will still have its message.

"It can be a time of renewal," she said, "A reflection time for us to gather ourselves spirituallv."

Our society and our world are in troubled times right now. In many ways, we feel alone.

When Juan Diego encountered the Virgin of Guadalupe, he was alone. He was in troubled times. His uncle was gravely ill. No one would believe the story of his encounter, not even the church bishop. But when he found himself in times of trouble, Mother Mary came to him.

"Go and pick the beautiful flowers, and take them to the bishop," Mary told

Juan Diego, who knew, of course, in December, those flowers were not growing. He went anyway, and was shocked to find a paradise of beauty, color and flowers. He gathered them and went to the bishop

The flowers were so unusually beautiful, and so miraculous, the bishop could not deny the source, and was convinced."

So, no, I won't get to go to the Our Lady of Gua-

dalupe church this year for lunch and dine on the delicious red enchiladas and albondigas soup with a room full of 300 people. You won't get to make the trek up the mountain. We won't get to watch the dancers.

But we can gather ourselves spiritually, have a time of renewal and, just as Juan Diego did nearly half a century ago, find our own beautiful miracle.

Broadband is critical to healthy democracy

If it was not already clear, the pandemic has revealed broadband as an essential utility service that influences the future of our society and our state.

Based on its study of the issue, the League of Women Voters of New Mexico has described "efficient, high-speed access to the Internet for all New Mexico residents regardless of geographic location or neighborhood demographics, as a necessity for assuring equal access to local and state government, for maintaining openness and transparency in government activities, for communicating with legislative leaders, for en-

gaging in political discourse, for competing in the global marketplace and for assuring that voters receive the information they need to participate in our democracy."

Unequal access, especially with education and health care during the pandemic, has been a glaring problem.

What is meant by "broadband?" It is one of a variety of high-speed Internet technologies that is faster than the traditional dial-up. To be considered broadband. the download speed needs at least 25 Megabits per second (Mbps) of data and the upload

needs three Mbps. These minimums are not particularly fast.

According to "Broadband Now," (https:// broadbandnow.com/ New-Mexico), New Mexico is ranked 49th for state broadband access. Rural areas are at the top of the list for lacking connectivity, as are some

The hardware being used makes a difference in speed and influences connectivity issues. Providing hardware and support services are as important as the infrastructure.

In a wealthy country like the United States, these inequali-

ties are unacceptable. Anyone living in the United States should have the type of dependable broadband needed for light (one device and basic functions) to heavy (several devices and highdemand applications) use at home.

Solving the problem will take private- and

urban neighborhoods. public-sector investors working together. Microsoft is working with numerous states and partners through a program called "Microsoft Airband Initiative," using a mixed model, combining wireless technologies, traditional fiber-based connectivity, satellite coverage and TV white spaces (unused "buffer" gaps between TV channels).

> This is intended to reduce the cost and time of extending broadband access to communities across the country. Microsoft is even involving 4-H youth in developing technology skills with the public.

The New Mexico De-

partment of Information Technology (DoIT) has developed a Broadband Strategic Plan with goals to eliminate the broadband gap in New Mexico.

Schools can get discounts for construction and installation of broadband infrastructure through a special program funded by the **Federal Communications** Commission.

A DoIT survey of public school technology directors gave specific information about students' access to devices, as well as the Internet. The information guides funding and project development.

The City of Las Cruces administration has announced the selection of Miguel Dominguez as chief of police.

Dominguez has resided in Las Cruces since 1985. He graduated from the Las Cruces Police Department's 34th academy and has served as interim chief since the retirement of Patrick Gallagher earlier this year.

Dominguez served as deputy chief of field operations 2016-18 and in September 2018 was named deputy chief of investigations and administrative support services.

He also has served as a patrol officer, field training officer, patrol sergeant, lieutenant in patrol and special services and west area commander.

"The city is

certainly going to benefit from the experience Dominguez brings to this position. He has served the city for nearly two decades. We look forward to

cades. We look forward to what Dominguez and his law enforcement team will bring to the city," said City Manager Ifo Pili.

"It's always great to see


Funding these ambitious goals will take collaboration among private businesses, grant programs, service providers, schools, students, organizations, tribal, local, state and federal governments.

The average person should get a weekly total of 150 minutes of moderate aerobic activity (e.g., brisk walking, swimming, etc.) or 75 minutes of vigorous activity (e.g., running, cycling, aerobics, etc.).

Strength training for all major muscle groups should be done twice each week. This involves at least a single set of exercise per muscle group, at a weight that tires your muscles after 12 to 15 reps.

And be sure to consult your physician and your physical therapist before getting started on any new program. Once your specific exercise requirements are set, the next challenge is establishing a consistent routine. For this, we offer the following advice:

Set a Goal: Write it down, and be as specific as possible. "I want to lose weight" won't work. A better goal would be, "I want to lose 15 pounds over the next 90 days."

City has six items totaling \$7 million in legislative capital outlay requests for upcoming 2021 session

The Las Cruces City Council has compiled a list of six capital projects with a total price tag of just more than \$7 million that it will send to the New Mexico Legislature for consideration during the 2021 session that begins Jan. 19.

The list was approved at the Dec. 7 council meeting, as the city reduced its

final priorities list from nine items totaling \$9 million that it had discussed in October.

The funding priorities

· East Mesa roads and drainage: \$1.25 million to acquire rights of way, plan, design and construct roadway, utilities

and flood-control infrastructure.

- · Septic system replacement: \$3.8 million to plan, design and construct septic system replacements and improvements to include Hacienda Acres. Brittany Estates and other areas of Las Cruces.
 - Madrid extension:

\$400,000 to acquire rights of way, plan, design and construct roadways to extend Madrid Road from Martha to Triviz, including utilities and floodcontrol infrastructure.

· Public safety communications upgrades: \$844,000 to plan, design, purchase, install, construct and equip upgrades to P-25 interconnectibility for the Las Cruces police

and fire departments.

- · Las Cruces International Airport Terminal: \$500,000 to plan, design, construct, equip and furnish an expanded terminal building at Las Cruces International Airport.
- Branigan Cultural Center phase two improvements: \$1.5 million to plan, design, construct, equip and install improvements at the downtown


cultural museum.

At the October meeting, city legislative lobbyist Larry Horan said the continuing impact of COVID-19 on the state's budget could mean the legislature will have little or no capital outlay funding available for local projects during the 2021 session.

"At a time like this, the shorter the list the better," Horan said.

America's Christmas comes from around the world



Pop quiz: What do Santa Claus, Christmas trees, mistletoe, poinsettias, wreaths, stockings and candy canes have in common? They are all American winter holiday traditions, and they were all imported from other parts of the world.

I've done a bit of research over the years and gathered these historical tales. Before you go firing off angry emails or letters to the editor to say, "Grandma Bella actually met Santa Claus once, and here's what she told me ..." or "My Great Uncle Filbert was actually there when George Washington cut down the first Christmas tree ..." please remember that these are traditions that have been passed down for hundreds if not thousands of years. Sources and histories vary.

· Santa Claus comes from Holland. Father Christmas is based on a real person, St. Nicholas, a Christian leader from Myra (in modern-day Turkey) in the fourth century AD. He wanted to give money to poor people without them knowing it was from him, so, one day, he climbed on the roof of a house and dropped a purse full of money down the chimney. (Another legend says one such purse landed in a sock hung by the fireplace to dry, and so was born the Christmas stocking.)

Nast drew Santa Claus for Harper's Weekly in 1862 as a small elf-like figure who supported the Union in the Civil War. Nast continued to draw Santa for 30 years, putting Latvia, in 1510. The tree him first in a tan coat and then changing it to red. Starting in 1931, magazine ads for Coca Cola featured Santa as a kind. jolly figure in a red suit. The Santa we see today is largely thanks to Coke.

· Christmas cards come from England, where the tradition started in 1840, when the first "penny post" public postal deliveries began. As print-

ing methods improved, Christmas cards began being mass produced about 1860.

· Christmas trees were first documented in Riga, is the one symbol that unites almost all the northern European winter solstice traditions. Live evergreen trees were brought into homes during harsh winters to remind inhabitants that soon their crops would grow again. Christmas trees weren't popular in America because they were viewed as pagan. Then, in 1846, Queen

Victoria, Prince Albert and their children were sketched in the Illustrated London News standing around a Christmas tree. That made them fashionable in England and America. Christmas ornaments began arriving in the U.S. from Germany in the 1890s. · Yule logs and mistle-

toe come from northern Europe, where pagans celebrated the winter solstice with Yule or Yuletide festivals honoring the birth of the pagan sun god Mithras on the shortest day of the year. It was customary to light a candle to encourage Mithras and the sun to reappear each year, and huge yule logs were burned in their honor. The world "yule" means wheel, which was a pagan symbol for the sun. Mistletoe was considered a sacred plant and the custom of kissing under the mistletoe began as a fertility ritual.

· Wreaths date back to the Persian Empire where they were first used as symbols of importance and victory. The evergreen circle symbolized the recurring seasons and candles represented the coming light of spring. Holly berries, by the way, were thought by ancient pagans to be a food of the gods.

 Candy canes come from Germany, where in 1670 the choirmaster of the Cologne Cathedral gave his young singers sugar sticks to keep them quiet during long ceremonies. He had the

sticks bent in the shape of shepherds' crooks to celebrate the Christmas season. White candy canes have been produced in the U.S. since 1847. Bob McCormack started Mc-Cormack's Candy Co. in Albany, Georgia in 1919. His Starlight Mints are still produced today. Mc-Cormack's brother-in-law, Father Gregory Harding Keller, helped make the manufacturing process easier in the 1950s when he invented machines to twist the candy dough into spirals and cut it to put the cane shape into it.

· Luminarias date back hundreds or perhaps even thousands of years and may have originated right here in New Mexico, which was then a part of Mexico. They began as bonfires built to guide the faithful to Christmas mass. U.S. settlers brought Chinese lanterns from overseas in the early 19th century to hang from their doorways instead of lighting bonfires, and then began making their own small lanterns using paper bags, sand and candles. Most northern New Mexicans insist the correct term for these little lanterns is actually farolito.

• Reindeer come from northern Europe, but it took a poem ("A Visit from St. Nicholas") written by Clement Clarke Moore in New York in 1923 to give Santa's original eight reindeer their names. Robert L. May invented Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer as part

of a Montgomery Ward promotion in 1939. His brother-in-law. Johnny Marks, wrote the eponymous song, first recorded by Gene Autry in 1949.

 Elves come from house gnomes that have been part of the lore of Scandinavia for centuries.

· Holiday gift giving began with the Roman celebration of Saturnalia, when people would exchange lucky fruit gifts as part of a winter feast. When the Christmas tree became popular, small tovs were tied to its branches.

· Snowmen date to the Middle Ages, if not earlier, and the first documented American snowman was apparently built by a man and his nine-vear-old daughter in Eau Claire, Wisconsin on Jan. 7, 1809. The daughter's name was Yetty, but there is no apparent connection between her and abominable snowmen (Yeti). "Frosty the Snowman" is a Christmas song written by Walter "Jack" Rollins and Steve Nelson. It was first recorded by Gene Autry and the Cass County Boys in 1950.

 Poinsettias are native to Central America. The name comes from Joel Roberts Poinsett (1779-1851), an amateur botanist, who is credited with introducing the plant to the U.S. while he was serving as the first U.S. minister to Mexico, 1825-29. The plant is called Flor de Nochebuena. Christmas Eve flower or Catarina, in Mexico.

8 p.m. on FOOD Buddy vs. Christmas



the CARES Act caps at 100 percent of Adjusted Gross Income. The window for taking advantage of these tax deductions closes Thursday, Dec. 31, 2020.



Telehealth Information

Call (575) 532-9355 to schedule a telehealth visit with any of our other providers.

What is telehealth?

Telehealth simply means a doctor visit on the phone or via video using a smartphone or computer. You will be able to talk with your provider from the comfort of your home or other locations just as you would in the doctor's office.

How does it work?

Many different platforms enable physicians and patients to connect in a telehealth visit. Some work through a simple app download and registration. Others require no downloads and visits begin by clicking a link sent by email from the practice. The practice will provide instructions about your telehealth visit when you schedule the appointment.

How do I make a telehealth appointment?

Call your provider and ask if your appointment can be done by phone or video. Some appointments require

a physical examination in order for the doctor to meet the standard of care and make fully informed decisions. But many appointments can be managed well through virtual interaction. These may include certain visits for:

- Minor illnesses such as colds and allergies
- Minor injuries such as sprains
- Follow-up care
- Medication management
- Chronic disease management
- · Back pain
- Other specialty care

Are telehealth visits covered by insurance?


Many insurance plans cover telehealth visits. Video visits are typically required, although some payers will cover visits by phone only. Check your plan coverage or ask when you make an appointment.

Can I have a telehealth visit with a doctor I've never seen before?

Telehealth visits through our medical group are for new and existing patients.

Can I have a telehealth visit with any physician in the group?

Most of our providers offer telehealth. Call (575) 532-9355 to confirm if virtual visits are available with your selected provider.





Emergency Care

Delaying care during a medical emergency can put your life at risk. Our Emergency Department safety protocols are designed to ensure you can seek emergency treatment confidently. In the event any patients come to our ER with COVID-19 symptoms, they are separated from other patients immediately. Our caregivers and all patients wear facemasks and we are taking extraordinary measures to keep our Emergency Department safe and clean.

When every minute counts.

Never delay emergency care for sudden symptoms that may indicate a medical emergency, including:

- Chest pain, shortness of breath and other heart attack warning signs
- Stroke symptoms including facial drooping, arm weakness or difficulties with speech
- Accidents resulting in injuries, burns, or possible broken bones
- Sudden or severe headaches
- Abdominal pain that comes on suddenly or is severe or persistent
- Significant bleeding
- Coughing up or vomiting blood

In a major medical emergency, call 911 and get help as fast as possible. This list of emergency symptoms does not include all emergency conditions.





Resolution No. 21-078: A Resolution Providing for Determination of Reasonable Notice Of Meetings Of The City Council And Its Boards, Committees, And Commissions For Calendar Year 2021.

The City Council is informed that:

WHEREAS, the Las Cruces City Council met in a regular session at 1:00 p.m. on December 7, 2020; and WHEREAS. Section 10-15-1(D) of the Open Meetings Act requires the Las Cruces City Council to determine annually what constitutes reasonable notice of its public meetings; and WHEREAS Section 10-15-1(F) of the Open

Meetings Act increased the time that public bodies must make the agenda available to 72 hours prior to a meeting, except in the case of an emergency; and

WHEREAS, Section 10-15-1(F) also requires that agendas be posted on the public body's website within the specified time periods if a website is maintained.

NOW, THEREFORE, Be it Resolved by the Governing Body of the City of Las

THAT pursuant to NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1(A) and (B), all meetings of a quorum of the City Council of the City of Las Cruces, New Mexico, held for the purpose of formulating public policy, discussing public business, or for the purpose of taking any action within the authority delegated to the City Council, as further described in Sections III and IV of this policy, shall be made open to the public, except as otherwise provided by law. Any member of the public may attend an open meeting and listen to the deliberations and proceedings of the City Council.

THAT pursuant to NMSA 1978, Sections 10-15-1(H) and (I), the City Council upon its own motion may close a meeting to the public if the subject matter of such discussion or action is included in Subsection H of the Open Meetings Act of if the need to close the meeting is required by other laws which specifically preserve the confidentiality of certain information that is to be considered at the closed meeting. If any meeting is closed pursuant to exclusions contained in Subsection H, such closure: (1) if made in an open meeting shall be approved by a majority vote of the quorum of the City Council and the specific statutory or other authority for such closure, and the subject to be discussed, shall be stated with reasonable specificity in a motion calling for the vote on a closed meeting, and such vote shall be taken in an open meeting with the vote of each Councilor recorded in the minutes; or (2) if called for when the City Council is not in an open meeting, such closed meeting shall not be made until public notice, appropriate under the circumstances stating the specific provision of law authorizing the closed meeting, and stating with reasonable specificity the subject to be discussed, is given to members of the general public. Only those subjects announced or voted upon prior to closure by the City Council shall be discussed in a closed meeting. Following completion of any closed meeting, the minutes of the open meeting that was closed or in the minutes of the next open meeting if the closed meeting was separately scheduled, shall state whether the matters discussed in the closed meeting were limited only to those specified in the motion or notice for closure.

Except as provided in Section 10-15-1(H) of the Open Meetings Act, any action taken as a result of discussions in the closed meeting shall be made by vote of the City Council in an open public meeting.

THAT meetings at which a quorum of the City Council discuss or adopt any proposed resolution or ordinance, or take any other formal action, are open to the public. Pursuant to NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1(C), a councilor may participate in any open meeting called to take formal action by means of a conference telephone or other similar communication equipment. Participation by telephone or other similar communication is permitted

when requested by a councilor and approved by Council. Requests shall be considered on a case-by-case basis provided that each councilor participating by conference telephone can be identified when speaking, all participants are able to hear each other at the same time, and members of the public attending the meeting are able to hear any councilor who speaks during the meeting.

A. Regularly Scheduled

Open Meetings. Unless the business before the City Council dictates otherwise, the City Council will conduct open meetings to take formal action on the first and third Monday of each month at 1:00 p.m. as referenced in Exhibit "A." When Monday is a city holiday, the meeting shall be held on the next business day. The City Council has the authority to change the meeting time with minute action in compliance with the Open Meetings Act, for subsequent regular meetings. Staff is hereby authorized and directed to publish this resolution one time as a legal advertisement in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Las

Cruces. The City Council will conspicuously post an agenda of the meeting at least 72 hours prior to the meeting. In accordance with this resolution, the agenda shall be issued and circulated to the press, radio, and other public information media who have provided a written request for such notice and posted on the bulletin boards of City of Las Cruces City Hall, Thomas Branigan Memorial Library, and on the city's website.

The agenda shall indicate the date, time, and place of the meeting, a list of all action items to be considered at that meeting, and a list of any other specific items of business to be transacted The City Council shall only take action on items appearing on the agenda.

B. Hearings Before the City

Council. At any hearing at which a quorum of the City Council will be present, the City Council will provide notice of the hearing as an open meeting to take formal action and shall issue an agenda as prescribed in Section III(A) or (C) of this policy. Within a reasonable time, but in no less than 72 hours prior to the hearing, the City Council shall also provide actual notice to all parties in that case or their counsel and to any other person who has requested such notice of the date, time, location, and purpose of the hearing.

If during the course of a public hearing at which a quorum of the City Council presides, the City Council determines that the hearing should be recessed and reconvened to a date subsequent to that date stated in the meeting notice, the City Council will specify the date, time, and place for the reconvened meeting prior to recessing and will conspicuously post notice of the date, time, and place for the reconvened meeting near the door of the place where the original meeting was held and on the bulletin board in the lobby of City Hall.

C. Other Open Meetings In Between Regularly Scheduled Open Meetings.

If the public interest requires other formal action by the City Council in between regularly scheduled open meetings, the City Council may conduct an open meeting to take formal action at such times. Except in the case of an emergency as defined in NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1(F), the City Council will provide notice of each such meeting by conspicuously posting an agenda and a notice of the date, time, and location of such open meeting on the bulletin board in the lobby of City Hall, the city website, and by emailing a copy of the notice to the press at least 72 hours prior to the special open meeting.

Work Ses-

THAT a quorum of the City Council will also meet periodically in "work sessions." A "work session" is any meeting of a quorum of the City Council which does not involve any formal action by the City Council. Such sessions include but are not limited to (1) discussion related to the formulation of public policy prior to the formal discussion or adoption of any resolution or ordinance pending before the City Council; (2) discussions of internal administrative actions concerning the operations of the City Council; and (3) information discussions between staff and the City Council in preparation for formal discussion or action. Work sessions of a quorum of the City Council are open meetings and are open to the public, unless the subject of the work session is included in Subsection H of NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1 and the City Council decides to close the work session to the public in accordance with NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1(I) and Section II of this policy. Any person wishing to attend a work session of the City Council, which has not been closed pursuant to NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1(H) and 10-15-1(I) and this open meeting policy shall be allowed to attend and listen

Emergency Meetings THAT emergency meetings

to the instructions.

will be called only under unforeseen circumstances which demand immediate action to protect the health, safety, and property of citizens or to protect the public body from substantial financial loss. The Las Cruces City Council will avoid emergency meetings whenever possible. Emergency meetings may be called by the Mayor or a majority of the members upon four (4) hours' notice, unless threat of personal injury or personal damage requires less notice. The notice of all emergency meetings shall include an agenda for the meeting or information on how the public may obtain a copy of the agenda. All emergency measures

adopted must be submitted to the Attorney General within 10 days of the meeting at which the action was taken, provided that the requirement to report to the Attorney General is waived due to state or national emergency.

Council Appointed Commissions, Committees, and

Board Meetings THAT Commissions. Committees, and Advisory Boards of the City of Las Cruces shall similarly issue their agendas by posting one on the City Hall bulletin board, the Thomas Branigan Memorial Library bulletin board, on the city's website, and furnishing copies to the news media, and provide such other notice as may be required by ordinance and law. Such issuance and posting are determined to be reasonable notice.

Compliance

THAT substantial compliance with any one of the foregoing methods of giving notice shall constitute compliance with this resolution and NMSA 1978, Sections 10-15-1 through 10-15-4. Nothing herein shall prevent the use of additional means or methods of giving notice of regular or special meetings. Nothing herein shall require new notice of any public meeting for which notice has been given and which is recessed or adjourned. However, in recessing the meeting, the presiding officer shall announce the meeting, the time, and the place the meeting shall reconvene.

Accommodation THAT in addition to the information specified above, all notices shall include the following language: "If you need an accommodation for a disability to enable you to fully participate in this event, please contact us 72 hours before the event at 5 4 1 - 2 1 1 5 / V 541-2182/TTY.





Film Las Cruces: New intimacy coordinator program offers film industry opportunity

The New Mexico Film Office (NMFO) has announced a new intimacy coordinator (IC) training program aimed at increasing safety on film and television sets in New Mexico, according to a news release.

NMFO is partnering with the Intimacy Professionals Association (IPA) Intimacy Coordinator Training Program on the new initiative to prepare individuals in New Mexico's film and television industry to work as intimacy coordinators in full-length feature film and television productions upon completion of the training.

ICs "are a fairly new category of industry professionals who work on film and television productions to create a safer environment on set for actors performing in scenes involving physical touch, nudity, intimacy and simulated sex, while also helping the director to achieve their creative vision," the news release said.

"The film industry is always evolving to meet the challenges of the world we live in," said Las Cruces/Doña Ana County Film Office Director Don Gray. "Creating an environment which is inclusive, respectful and comfortable should always be a part of our industry. This unique new role on a film set addresses those goals and creates opportunities for folks in the southern



region to carve out a high paying job in the thriving media industry in New Mexico. Film Las Cruces highly recommends any local residents who are interested to take advantage of this new program. As always, if you have any questions about this or any other aspects of or opportunities in the industry, please don't hesitate to contact us – we're here to help," Gray said.

The training program is a 16-week course of online training, as well as a weekend choreography workshop (pending COVID-19 restrictions), NMFO said. Students will learn the trade of intimacy coordination through a combination of lectures, assigned readings, experiential practices, homework assignments, quizzes and mentorship. The training



cohort may include up to 12 participants. NMFO will cover 60 percent of tuition for up to three New Mexico residents who are accepted to the IC training program.

Topics covered in the training will include: What Is Intimacy?; Consent, Boundaries and Power Dynamics; Sexual Harassment; Race, Intimacy and Power; Closed Set Protocols; Working with Actors and Directors; Choreography and Movement Coaching; Set Etiquette; Sensitivity; Sexuality and Gender Literacy; How to Be an Advocate and Ally to LG-BTQIA+ Cast and Crew; Trauma Awareness; Communication and Conflict World; and Professional Development: Website, Resume, Press and Interviewing Skills.

"It's extremely gratifying to see the entire industry recognizing the importance of intimacy coordinators through training programs like this, and it's precisely the reason we created standards and protocols to provide a framework for the use of professional, skilled intimacy coordinators throughout the entire production process, said SAG AFTRA President Gabrielle Carteris. "Through this training program, NMFO's dedication to their ever-expanding film and television production industry will help ensure safer and more collaborative sets."

IC training will begin Feb. 7, 2021. A virtual information session will be held Dec. 15 with a panel discussing the training, career opportunities and importance of ICs in the film industry.







Conniff retires from dentistry after 45 years

How do you handle a cow that's lost and needs attention?

How do you float a fly from a fishing line to hit just the spot you want?

How do you attempt to help raise someone else's children?

How do you calm an 8-vear-old into whose tooth you're about to drill?

How do you respond to the community that is the foundation of your career?

If you are John Conniff, the same two words answer all of these questions:

With care.

Just before Thanksgiving, an appropriate time for a grateful man, Conniff retired from his career as a pediatric dentist, nearly 45 years after he first set up shop in Las Cruces.

"Caring and loving," is how Laurie Gormley, who began working with him in 1991, describes Conniff. "Kids know if you care. They're like animals. You can't fool them."

A couple of years after he took on Gormley at his practice, Conniff began another important partnership, marrying Laura, with whom he recently celebrated their 27th wedding anniversary.

"He married me only

because my children didn't have any cavities," Laura joked recently.

One of those children. Sarah, grew up to become a dentist herself, working now in Austin. The other. Ryan, is a doctoral candidate in Atlanta.

Though he has no biological children, "they are his kids," Laura said of the wav Conniff has treated Ryan and Sarah.

When John and Laura found themselves single in the early 1990s, it seemed like all of their mutual friends wanted to set the two up. It didn't take too much convincing for either one, especially when they discovered a common fondness for horses and cattle.

Laura grew up in a livestock family in Illinois, and that business brought her family to Las

Cruces. John grew up in Albuquerque, but always had an interest in ranching. While some couples like beach vacations or cruises, John and Laura were more content taking trips to stock shows.

The first big gift Laura got for John was not a nice watch or a diamond ring, but cattle embryos.

"He told me he'd had horses, but never had cattle. And these were Queenie's embryos!" said Laura, referencing the lineage of award-winning livestock.

Conniff named two of the resulting calves Ryan and Sarah.

HE'S GOT YOUR BACK

When Conniff arrived in Las Cruces to begin his practice, there were two things that set him apart.

"He was the only pedi-

atric dentist in the southern half of the state." Gormlev said.

"And he took kids on Medicaid from Day One," Laura said. "Not everyone the back of his marriage does that."

Gormley had only been practicing a year when she began working with Conniff, and was immediately grateful for her decision and his leadership.

"He was very much a mentor," Gormley said. "Not only in dentistry, but in how to handle staff and how to run a business."

After two years working together, Gormley became a business partner to Conniff.

"The failure rate for partnerships in dentistry and medicine is very high," Gormley said. "I

count myself fortunate. Our magic formula was we were very busy watching each other's backs."

Conniff has also had partner.

"We had only been married three years when I was diagnosed with breast cancer," Laura said. They discussed the options. and she was concerned what he might think. She recalls his response being all about her.

"He said, 'You need to decide what you're comfortable with. I don't want you to worry about anything. Whatever you decide is fine with me. All I want out of this is YOU.'

"He supported me through the surgery and ever since," Laura said.

With John at her side, Laura came through well. and in 2007, joined Pat Sisbarro, Mary Henson and Magellia Boston as the guiding forces of the "NMSU Aggies are Tough Enough to Wear Pink" campaign, which raised millions of dollars for breast cancer research. and gained national accolades. Laura and others worked tirelessly on the project.

Laura also served on the NMSU Board of Regents, another responsibility which took a great deal of her time and energy.

"He's always been there for me," Laura said. "He's iust the best."

Conniff has also been there for the community, including seeing children at local elementary schools on an annual basis.

"He has a passion for the wellbeing of the community," Gormley said. "He's very kind and fair.

In addition to his dental work, Conniff has also served with the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association and is a board member. He's also been involved behind the scenes with many efforts.

"He's done a lot in the community and for the community," Laura said. "He works hard, he doesn't talk much. When he's got a job to do, he gets it done."

Don't always follow trends; follow tips, too

First, a little background. I, of course, am an

avid golfer. Probably an addicted golfer. I almost always have fun playing with my friends, but I do take it seriously. I try to perform my best, with the scoring bar set below my current age (78).

Looking at my scorecards since May 1. I have shot my age or better more than 90 percent of the time. Teaching golf with Coach Herb Wimberly for 15 years taught me a lot: what to look for, how to evaluate.

I have made my best effort to share my insights and expertise through these columns. Below I have shared some trends and tips to help make your

golf better.

My first trend example is how easy it is for golfers to become enamored by the latest golf equipment, including new clubs, training devices, gadgets and technology. We like stuff we can see and touch and

handle. But hardware is external.

My tip here is to focus on the intangibles. Focus on how you are playing the game. Get in touch with strategic thinking, emotional control and mental toughness. These are the essential intangibles which will lead to game improvement.

Work on concentrating fully for four-and-half hours, all 18 holes. Fulfill your commitment to maintain a totally positive attitude coupled with encouraging self-talk. I promise you it will benefit you far more than a fancy

new hybrid. Internal stuff matters most.

Another trend I've noticed is golfers spending all their time working on their full swing and practicing with the driver. When the golf course requires a high fade or a low draw, or when the conditions dictate a low boring shot into the wind, the weekender is lost, stumbling with halfwedges, greenside chips and putting.

But here's a tip. Practice your short game. The tour pros spend half their time chipping and putting. They work a lot on bunker shots and half wedges. That's

why the pros make lots of birdies and can get it up and down from the ball washer. Spend time on and around the putting green. Practice greenside chips and pitches.

The last trend is many regular golfers avoiding vigorous exercising. I have always recommended a certified, well-equipped gym, but who knows when our local gyms will be open permanently?

Therefore (tip), working out at home. You're a simple Google search away from finding dozens of workout routines and videos for golfers stress-

ing strength and flexibility. Buy yourself some weights, dumbbells and some stretch bands.

There are so many products, including new "wonder" golf clubs, swing gadgets, shoes and balls, that promise more distance, but the real secret is club head speed that comes with greater strength, more flexibility and better swing technique.
