County fire department provides tips to prevent winter fires

The Doña Ana County Fire and Emergency Services Department reminds us that half of home heating fires happen in December, January and February – a majority of them involve heating equipment.

To help prevent winter fires, keep portable generators outside, away from windows and as far away as possible from your home. Also consider the following:

- Install and test carbon monoxide alarms, at least once a month.
- Plug only 1 heat-producing appliance, like a space heater, into an electrical outlet, at a time.
- Never use an extension cord with a heat-producing appliance.
- Extension cords should only be used temporarily.

Vaccine system working – mostly

Online, close to 300,000 people have registered for the Covid-19 vaccine and many have already received their first dose. Register on the New Mexico Department of Health's (NMDOH) website at <https://cvvaccine.nmhealth.org>.

The registration process is straightforward: each user creates a profile, enters health and other information and then waits to receive notification from NMDOH when vaccine is available to them.

Users who have ques-



tions or would like support with the registration process, including New Mexicans who do not have Internet access, can dial 1-855-600-3453, press option 0 for vaccine questions, and then option 4 for tech support. Users who have other vaccine-related questions can call 1-855-600-3453 and simply press option 0.

"New Mexico is working to deliver vaccine as quickly and efficiently as possible. We encourage



everyone to register, and we are pleased to provide in-person support to assist with that process," said Dr. Tracie Collins, NMDOH secretary-designate.

The vaccine is already scheduling for the second group, individuals 75 or older, and is available to New Mexicans in the following sequence:

- All persons serving in

health care settings who have direct or indirect exposure to patients or infectious materials and are unable to work from home, as well as residents of long-term care facilities. Also includes workers in congregate settings.

- Individuals 75 years of age and older
- Individuals 16 or older with underlying medical conditions that place them at greater risk from COVID-19
- Frontline essential workers who cannot work remotely
- Vulnerable populations (residents of congregate care settings)

During an online press conference Monday, Collins said the state's system will send out notices when booster shots are available. She also said there is no critical point where a booster will be ineffective, so if they are received several days or even weeks after the 28-day recommended period, they should still be effective.

While wait times on the hotline are reported to be in excess of an hour, Collins said the department is working on improvements to the website and expanding the workforce for the hotline so people will not be experiencing long periods on hold.

City ordinance has decreased false alarms

The City of Las Cruces alarm-systems ordinance has now been in effect for eight years and has seen a 59 percent decrease in false alarm calls that place an unnecessary burden on first responders and taxpayers.

The ordinance, approved by the Las Cruces City Council in January 2013, implemented mandatory alarm systems registrations within city limits, fines for excessive false alarms and an education campaign for those who utilize alarm systems that directly notify the Mesilla Valley Regional

Dispatch Authority 911 center(MVRDA) when activated.

In the year before the ordinance, Las Cruces police and fire responded to 7,747 false alarms. In

2020, the number of false alarm calls decreased 59 percent to 3,210. Las Cruces police saw a 61 percent decrease from 6,991 false alarm calls in 2012 to 2,696 in 2020. Las

Cruces fire registered a 32 percent decrease from 756 false alarm calls in 2012 to 514 in 2020.

Fewer false alarms allow police and fire personnel to more efficiently

respond to legitimate calls for service. Fewer false alarm calls also save taxpayer dollars otherwise spent on personnel responding to illegitimate calls.

After studying how other jurisdictions addressed similar problems, several public input meetings and meetings with those in the alarm industry, the decision was made to:

- Require alarm-monitoring companies to make two phone calls to the alarm site to determine the legitimacy of the alarm before MVRDA dispatches police or fire.
- Deter false activations

by creating fines for alarm sites with repeated false alarms.

- Identify nuisance alarm sites and only respond when an emergency has been verified by a means other than an alarm.
- Require new alarm systems be installed with equipment designed to prevent false alarms. MVRDA administers the ordinance, collecting alarm-registration fees, monitoring instances of false alarms and issuing fines for three or more false alarms per year. Through Jan. 5, 2021, 5,263 false alarm fines have been issued.

It's a common sight across Las Cruces; masks are strewn across the dashboard of a car or even hanging from a review mirror. The habit has developed to keep our neighbors safe, and now the City of Las Cruces (City) Mayor and City Council are focusing its efforts on a Red to Green campaign by sending masks directly to almost 40,000 residences.

"Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) is doing its part to further reduce the spread of COVID-19 by wearing Utility issued face masks or neck gaiters, or disposable face masks while working," said Delilah Walsh, LCU director. LCU worked with local vendors to create Utility masks, which were distributed to each LCU associate.

"Our associates, especially crews who work directly with

customers like field services technicians who do activations or furnace relights, have been wearing masks since March," Walsh said. "The Mayor asked LCU to help facilitate a citywide mask mailing as part of the Red to Green campaign by coordinating the same database and postal company we use for distributing our

Utility bills." Nearly 40,000 residences will receive disposable masks provided by the City's Fire Department; customers will see two disposable masks per property in their mail. The Las Cruces Economic Recovery Board has also recommended support for masks at local businesses

and is working with the City's Economic Development Department to facilitate that effort. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), COVID-19 spreads mainly from person-to-person through respiratory droplets. Respiratory droplets travel into the air when you cough, sneeze, talk, shout, or sing. Masks are a simple barrier to help prevent your respiratory droplets from reaching others. "At this point, most of us have masks in our car, in our purses, and even stuffed into our jackets," Walsh said. "But extra disposable masks can still be given to others in situations where they forget one."

Don't forget what actually happened

Rioting Americans overtook the U.S. Capitol building and tried to interfere with the Presidential election certification.

By the time I write this, and by the time you read it, millions of words will have been said and written about those events of Jan. 6, 2021.

I've read and listened to a lot, and it appears people are already forgetting the What, the Where and the When. There has been explanation after explanation, much of it rationalizing or even defending the actions. There has been deserved criticism of the inadequate security. There has been discussion about who was, or who wasn't, in the angry mobs.

Those discussions muddle the essence of the events.

To repeat: Rioting Americans overtook the U.S. Capitol building and tried to interfere with

the Presidential election certification. Jan. 6 could have been worse.

It was learned one group of rioters turned left in a hallway, and reached locked, secure doors to the Senate chambers. Had they turned right, they would have found open, unlocked doors. At this point, there were still lawmakers inside. Shortly thereafter, all the lawmakers were cleared and the doors secured. Frightening to think what might have happened had the rioters turned the other way.

The only positive thing to come out of Jan. 6 was the return of the legislators to the Capitol, to finish what they'd started, even if it took them until nearly 4 a.m. They were understandably shaken, but unbowed. "Let's get back to work," Vice President Mike Pence told the Senate.

When they reconvened, Republican Senator Pat Toomey of Pennsylvania was one of the speakers. Many of the objecting senators and representatives objected to results in states they don't represent. But Toomey, who voted and campaigned for Trump, was not an objector, even though Pennsylvania was one of the target states.

"The Trump campaign took their case of irregularities into the courtroom of Judge Matthew Brann, in federal district court," Toomey said, noting Brann is a conservative Republican. "And here's what he said about the Trump campaign case, and I quote, 'This court has been presented with strained legal arguments without merit, and speculative accusations unsupported by evidence. In the United States of America, this cannot justify the disenfranchisement of a single voter, let alone all the

voters of the sixth most populated state.'

"Joe Biden won the election. It was not what I had hoped for, but it happened. It was an honest victory."

Overtaking the U.S. Capitol is inherently different from entering any other building in the U.S. And overtaking the Capitol to interfere with the Presidential election is inherently different from any other reason for entering the building.

America has always been a violent nation. But we typically find peaceful and legal ways to address political concerns, and our smooth transitions of presidential power have always been a hallmark of our country. That ended Jan. 6

Let's not be distracted. Let's never forget what actually happened Jan. 6: Rioting Americans overtook the U.S. Capitol building and tried to interfere with the Presidential election certification.

with the tax cuts, deregulation and friendly Supreme Court justices. But that was always a bargain with the devil.

New Mexico needs to revise its tax code

New Mexico's legislators will soon be making critical decisions about funding essential services, including education (which accounts for about 57 percent of the total budget).

While the latest revenue estimates indicate the state's finances are not as challenging as was anticipated during the 2020 special session, the pandemic has focused attention on significant inequities across the state in the delivery of education, health care and broadband. As a result, there are calls for more attention to these issues.

About 84 percent of New Mexico's total an-

nual revenue of almost \$8 billion comes from taxes. Although we sometimes hear taxes described as a burden which no one wants to pay, most of us do value government services ranging from libraries and education to streets and highways, police and fire protection, city and state parks. We all have an obligation as members of the community to contribute to the common good.

Based on studying state government revenues, including taxes, the League of Women Voters supports a tax system which is progressive, meaning

those at higher income levels pay a larger percentage of their incomes in taxes than those at lower income levels. The League also supports a tax system through which deductions are based on promotion of equity and yet revenue is sufficient to meet essen-

tial needs.

Data assembled by New Mexico Voices for Children show our state income tax is progressive but not sufficiently to overcome the regressivity of our other taxes such as gross receipts (broad-based consumption tax) and property taxes.

Overall, the 60 percent of New Mexicans with the lowest incomes pay 10 percent or more of their incomes to support state government while those in the top 5 percent pay less than 7.5 percent of

their incomes. It is critical to a more equitable system that we shift more of the tax burden to those who can better afford it.

For example, several recent evaluations of our tax system suggest moving in this direction by reversing the income tax rate reductions enacted in the early 2000s for New Mexicans at the highest income levels.

Another aspect of state finances that may be discussed during the session involves the Land Grant Permanent Fund. Under the state constitution, a percentage of the

five-year average balance in the fund is distributed annually to support education.

There are periodically efforts to direct more of the fund into the state's operating budget, an action that would require a constitutional amendment. A major issue is the impact of such changes on the long run earnings of the fund.

That is, earnings from the fund in the future will be lower to the extent that the body of the fund is reduced to support current expenses.

It is the obligation of the legislature to collect revenues to fund services that are the state's responsibilities. Hopefully, legislators will focus on equity and social justice as they make these critical decisions.

Against trapping

To the editor:

Concerning the letter in the Dec. 25 edition, one would expect as much from the president of the New Mexico Trapping Association. The first sentence states people keep saying how horrible and archaic trapping is, and the only choice is to ban

it. I totally agree.

To me, the bottom line is, "Does the animal Suffer," and the answer is yes. You mention the North American model of wildlife conservation, which means use of a trap to catch an animal. In a few cases, the animal would then be released, maybe in another area where it would not be in

jeopardy or be a pest to humans or their livestock or animals.

Thedford is talking about trapping that causes slow death. A device clamps down on the animal's leg or foot and causes excruciating pain, suffering until the trapper checks on the trap.

It is a contradiction to state that the NMTA ex-

trapping. Traps are also a danger to our pets, especially with more people getting out into natural areas to escape the pandemic.

Thedford states extremists have learned how to use the courts and loopholes to outlaw what they don't like in society, whether they understand it or not. Trapping is not

a difficult scenario to understand. With closed eyes, I can see the ugliness of it. I'd much rather be called an extremist than an exterminator. Evolution is mighty slow for the creatures that can't control their own destiny.

NMSU pepper grant is nothing to be sneezed at

A research team from the College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences at New Mexico State University is working in partnership with colleagues from Texas A&M AgriLife Research to study issues affecting pepper production in the Southwest.

The collaboration received a \$914,000 grant from the USDA-Specialty Crop Multi-State Program through the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Soum Sanogo, professor of fungal plant pathology in the Depart-

ment of Entomology, Plant Pathology and Weed Science, is leading the NMSU team, which received a \$450,000 grant.

The NMSU research team also includes Ram Acharya, associate professor of agricultural economics and agricultural business, and Willis Fedio, research associate professor and director of the NMSU Food Safety Lab.

Kevin Crosby, professor of plant breeding and genetics at Texas A&M University, is serving as the lead principal investigator of the project and directing the Texas A&M AgriLife research team.

“Hot pepper production in New Mexico,

Texas and Arizona is

constrained by several

factors such as labor cost and environmental and biological stresses, including soil-borne diseases,” Sanogo said.

The goals of the project, Sanogo said, are to identify high-yielding pepper varieties that are tolerant to environmental and biological stresses and adapted to specific locations, and to implement strategies to detect, monitor and control plant pathogens on peppers.

“Additionally, our teams are also working to develop cost-of-production budgets to identify the most profitable combinations of cultivar, location and production, and to assess the socio-economic impacts of improved pepper production,” Sanogo said.

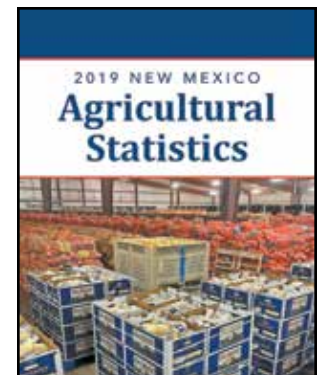

Legislature likely to increase education budget

The New Mexico Legislature is likely to add about 4.4 percent to the state public education budget during the 2021 session, said State Sen. Bill Soules, D-Doña Ana, who chairs the Senate Education Committee.

The 2020 legislature increased public education's general fund budget to about \$3.4 billion.

The state is under court order to provide constitutionally mandated "educational sufficiency" to all students as a result of a

state district court judge's 2018 ruling in the Yazzie v Martinez lawsuit.

"I agree with the lawsuit," Soules said. "We need to do better for our kids and education."

At the same time, the legislature "must be careful and cautious that we aren't wasting money," he said. "It would be wonderful if we started providing more than sufficiency."

In addition to an increase in the amount of recurring revenue that was expected to be avail-

able to legislators during the 2021 session, Soules said there also will be a large amount of non-recurring revenue that can be used for one-time projects.

Some of those funds, he said, should be used to address broadband access so students can do their schoolwork remotely without having to drive around to find a hotspot. Spending \$500 million "to insure we have broadband access everywhere makes sense for the whole state," said Soules, a retired

principal and classroom teacher, and former member of the Las Cruces Public Schools (LCPS) Board of Education.

Nonrecurring revenue should also be used to help public schools build vocational tech centers, Soules said, and to build advanced manufacturing centers at high schools so students can graduate with "high quality, industry-level certificates."

The money should also pay for teacher professional development, he said.

Soules said legislators disagree with the New

Mexico Public Education Department regarding control of some education dollars, but most of the funding is under the control of local school boards.

"I think everyone recognizes we've got to pay teachers better," Soules said, so school districts can hire and retain better teachers and provide better educational services to the children who are most at risk.

There are 89 school districts in New Mexico, including three in Doña Ana County: LCPS, Gadsden Independent School

District and Hatch Valley Public Schools.

Soules said he also is concerned that the state may be putting too much money into cash reserves. About \$2 billion "is sitting there not invested in the future of New Mexico, just protecting 'what if,'" he said.

Soules, who begins his third four-year term in the New Mexico Senate when the 2021 session convenes Jan. 19, has bachelor's and master's degrees in psychology and a Ph.D. in education and psychology from New Mexico State University.

Academy for Learning in Retirement focuses on Russia, Putin in January

The Academy for Learning in Retirement (ALR) first 2021 series continues in January with discussions on Russia, Ukraine and Vladimir Putin.

The complex relationship between Russia and

Ukraine has had massive impacts in Europe and the world for centuries, and in particular during the past 100 years.

The presenter is Elmo E. Roach, an emeritus professor from Bradley University who was director of Bradley's

International Programs Office 1990-2005. Roach has B.A.s in history, political science and philosophy, an M.A. in history and a Ph.D. in history.

Roach will discuss the geographical and cultural features that shaped

Ukraine and Russia and examine the history of the region from Kyivan Rus' to Muscovite Russia and to Imperial Russia, ALR's Jeffrey Brown said. "He will further examine the historical narrative from the Russian Revolutions of 1917 to Putin's rise to power in 2000, including relations between Russia

and the United States. His final presentations will focus on Putin's strategic objectives and his record of expansionism in Ukraine and beyond.

Roach will share some of his experiences from two dozen or more trips to Ukraine, Russia and Siberia, from his days as a graduate student to those

as a senior researcher and project manager, Brown said.

Partnership works to expand broadband access

BULLETIN REPORT

According to data collected by NMSU's Center for Community Analysis (CCA), 41 percent of households earning less than \$20,000 a year are without Internet access in the Las Cruces Public School district.

That number increases when looking at Doña Ana's surrounding more rural districts: 58 percent in the Gadsden district and 70 percent in the Hatch district. As much as 22 percent of New Mexicans are underserved when it comes to broadband.

In the wake of COVID-19, the disparities have been amplified. However, so has the opportunity to

highlight the urgency to policymakers and generate the collective voice needed to do something about it, according to Sommer Mitchell of the Success Partnership, which is dedicated to making broadband access available to more New Mexicans.

The Success Partnership is a prenatal-to-career readiness education initiative launched in 2013. The collaborative is supported by more than 100 cross-sector organizations comprised of parents, education professionals, nonprofits, businesses, regional partners and community leaders committed to improving educational outcomes in Doña Ana County.

The primary support organizations for the Success Partnership collaborative are Community Action Agency of Southern New Mexico, Ngage New Mexico, La Clinica de Familia Family Services and the NMSU Center for Community Analysis.

Cost estimates to ensure broadband connectivity statewide are anywhere from \$2-5 billion, "but we have the opportunity to ensure at least \$1 billion becomes available to approach this critical need in New Mexico in the upcoming legislative session," Mitchell said.

An education-context report compiled by CCA states, "Inequitable access to the Internet and technol-

ogy, otherwise known as the "digital divide," has long signaled one of the great inequities in education."

In early 2020, Mitchell said, the Success Partnership and school districts across the state began to see "the resounding need for access to technology surface in a way that could not be ignored."

In a July work session, the Leaders Circle, a group of more than 30 community leaders who govern the Success Partnership, invited members of the K-12 community to share concerns and made access to broadband a priority.

"In light of the pandemic's devastating impact on student access to educa-

tion, the Leaders Circle of the Success Partnership strategized around the best way they could use their voices to advocate for students' and educators' needs, and broadband access was the clear choice," said Lori Martinez, executive director of Ngage New Mexico.

Martinez said the group devised four strategies for concerned residents to get involved in the effort:

- Sign a letter asking Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham to allocate \$200 million in capital outlay funds that will allow the state to qualify for \$1 billion in federal funding resulting in statewide connectivity. Find the letter at www.SuccessDac.org/ConnectNM.

- Ask others to sign the letter.
 - Submit a video or text testimonial regarding how broadband would elevate the community or focusing on how lack of broadband adversely affects education, health care, access to job opportunities, etc.
 - Share and follow #ConnectNM on social media using the hashtag #ConnectNM and tagging the governor's office, in an effort to build on the initiative's history and highlight ongoing efforts through individual pages and outlets.

Highlights of the 2019 New Mexico bulletin include:

- Total value of agriculture production was \$3.44 billion.

- Milk sales were \$1.38 billion.
 - The state ranks first nationally in both chile and pecan production.
 - Value of livestock production was \$2.43 billion.
 - Value of hay production was \$211 million.
- Each year, a team of enumerators collect the data, and the USDA-NASS state and federal staff compile the data to publish the New Mexico Agricultural Statistics

bulletin.

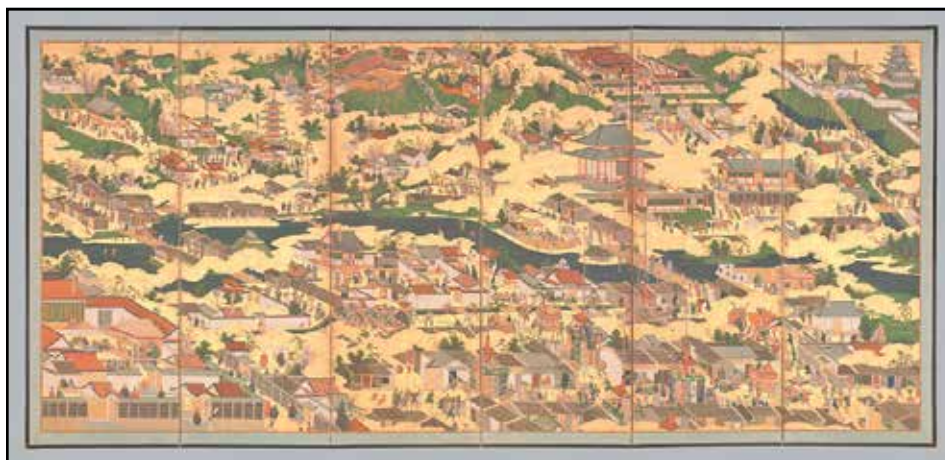

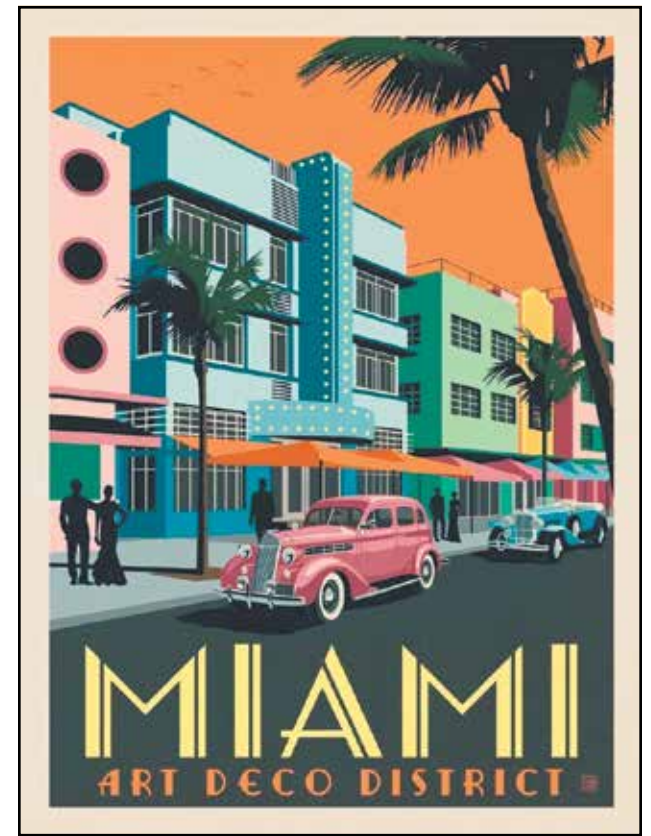

Elementary teacher takes gifted students on Zooms around the world

In her work with students at Doña Ana and Fairacres elementary schools, teacher of the gifted Barb Ericson, along with other LCPS teachers, is using a learning-management system called Canvas that she calls “a one-stop shop for teachers, students and parents.”

“We Zoom through it, organize our lessons and put assignments on it,” Ericson said.

Students can turn in their completed assignments on Canvas, and lessons are recorded on it in case students can't make it to a Zoom session, she said.

Ericson bought a green screen, a standing desk, a ring light and an additional monitor to teach classes via Zoom.

“All of those things really help me out,” she said.

One of Ericson's recent projects with gifted students at the school has been to teach about different cultures and countries around the world. For a recent study of Germany, many students made German cakes, she said, while one made an entire meal and other students made miniature castles.

Ericson's students also have learned recently about Australia.

Toward the end of 2020, her students “requested

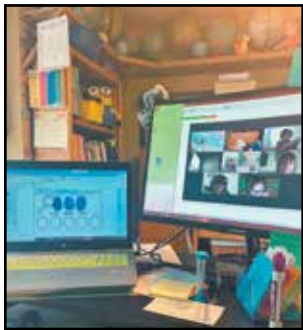

Black Box Theatre's 'Karl the Magnificent' is free, fun escapism

If you need a break from the world — and who doesn't right about now? — I have a suggestion for you: Watch Black Box Theatre's virtual production of playwright William Missouri Downs' "Karl the Magnificent."

The play continues streaming through midnight Sunday, Jan. 17, and there is no charge to watch it. All you have to do is make a reservation by sending Ceil Herman an email at nstcbbt@zianet.com. She will send you back the login information to watch the nearly 92-minute production.

Words like zany and madcap were coined to describe "Karl the Magnificent." There are some interesting subtexts at work and a deeper message about how we treat one other, but mostly this is just light-hearted fun.

I laughed out loud both when Maggie and Raymond tried to revive Karl the Magnificent ("It's not a puppet, it's a dummy") using resuscitation paddles and when they learned that the end of the world had been confirmed in a tweet from the president of the United States (the play's only overt political reference).

The play begins as Maggie (Rachel Thomas-Chappell) and Raymond (Genno Tafoya) attend a

four-hour Exxon-Mobil training seminar about hostile workplaces. They are told they have failed the seminar and either will be terminated or must attend the birthday party of office nerd Karl Heimlich (Monte H. Wright).

The party is held at the local Ramada Inn, with Burger King Whoppers as Karl's dinner choice, disco dancing and Karl's special announcement.

Despite their claims to migraines, groin injuries, hypoglycemia and vegan diets and the rabbi convention next door, Maggie and Raymond must endure Karl's endless dialogue about his hobbies: doing magic, playing the accordion — from which he draws his Superman (the 1940s-80s version, not the later one) strength — and his latest: ventriloquism.

Enter Karl the Magnificent (Joseluis Solorzano), Karl's alter-ego dummy, whose favorite word seems to be dumbass.

Finally, it's time for Karl's big announcement: The world will end "within a matter of days" because fracking has caused a shift in the tectonic plates beneath Yellowstone National Park that has activated a millennia-old volcano. Karl discovered the shift during regular visits to a lake in the park where he frolicked with Sister Alice (Autumn Gieb, who

also plays the punk waitress and her twin), the former Miss Wyoming, a barrel-racing, accordion-playing nun (the Benedictine Convent of Perpetual Adoration).

Following several rounds of murder and mayhem, Maggie and Raymond are frantic to find the deep-sleep cocoon pod that Karl built under his house — "bless his nerdy little soul" — to survive the cataclysm.

See what I mean about zany and madcap?

Five liftings of the taped glasses (nerd salute) to the cast, playwright and director, Ceil Herman, and also to the remarkable crew: puppet (I thought it was a dummy?) artisans Gieb — who also did the costumes — and Peter Herman, sound designer Ceil Herman, props artisan Joshua Taulbee, technical director Peter Herman and costumer Gieb.

Financial pro seeks to help others succeed

When he was in the ninth grade, Wacinque Amistad Kaizen BeMende got interested in the stock market, and his interest spawned a lifetime of learning, investing and helping other people.

BeMende – a 40-year veteran of the U.S. military – serves as chief poverty consultant and financial inclusion officer at FinEd Consultancy KaizenRhino Solutions, based at White Sands Missile Range.

He was nominated as an Everyday Hero by his colleague, Wendell Bandy.

“The financial impact of COVID-19 is compounded by individuals being unbanked and underbanked, plus in their past not being able to build up three to six months of savings,” Bandy wrote in his nomination email. “Wacinque has labored tirelessly to educate and inspire individuals about the benefits of saving. Imagine believing that it is possible to reduce to zero individuals unbanked and underbanked when no one else does.”

But like Roger Bannister and the four-minute mile or 2020 and warp speed to a vaccine, both occurred under a cloud of, ‘It is impossible.’ Although Wacinque often sounds like a broken

record, he is that person fearlessly driven to prove warp speed may be the new economics leading to another Roaring ‘20s and a warp-driven economy.

This, I believe, makes him an everyday hero.”

Bandy said BeMende also is an avid consumer of local news.

“Your Bulletin readers should know Wacinque reads the paper each week like he believes the billion-dollar, lottery-winning numbers are hidden within, and he will drive from White Sands to the Bulletin office to get a copy of a missed week,” Bandy wrote. “Who does that?”

In his nomination email, Bandy also noted that BeMende has consistently demonstrated a drive to succeed and achieve his goals.

“Wacinque was able to serve 40 years in the military, starting in the Marine Corps and achieve NCO rank in two years and senior NCO rank in three services, because he is not only mission-driven, but has all the necessary full-stack skills to achieve the mission,” Bandy wrote. “I did not understand what that means day-to-day, but with COVID-19 and its impact, I’m motivated to nominate him because I want to share another view of why an Everyday Hero includes not giving up the fight even when nobody

knows you are fighting. Today, I know persistence is a quality of an everyday hero.”

Bandy attached several documents to his nomination email, including one noting that BeMende was inducted into Securities Industry Financial Management Association Hall of Fame when his primary job was serving in the military.

“Yet, he still found a way to give back and motivate others to learn about saving and how to successfully learn to invest,” Bandy wrote, noting that BeMende enrolled in a master’s degree program after he retired from the military.

“Why would a person who could be fishing and has personally benefited from a long history of understanding investing start a master’s degree program?” Bandy asked. “I know it’s because he believes it may help him help others. When your

mission is to end people being unbanked, you clearly are not in it for the money. It’s plain to see being a wealth manager for individuals of means with Wacinque’s level of knowledge and experience in the financial industry would make more sense, thus it is possible helping individuals in nearly perpetual financial distress is the kind of decision an everyday hero may make.”

Bandy said BeMende remembers well how his own interest in investing and wealth-building began at a young age, and he continues to focus not only on helping adults manage their money, but also on sparking young people to see a financial path forward.

“Childhood poverty is persistently high in New Mexico,” Bandy wrote. “This is something Wacinque believes he can change. He is not from New Mexico, but he chooses to live here

Fitness with a side of dysfunction?

This time of year, many people are focused on fitness so it's worth taking a look at what fitness really means. The dictionary defines fit as "sound physically and mentally, healthy." Using that definition, many "fitness" routines fall short of the goal. If you don't enjoy running and dread every workout, you're probably falling short of the "sound mentally" should be enjoyable, reduce stress, and leave you feeling better, not worse.



No Pain no Gain?

Exercise should also leave you feeling better physically. If you can run a good time in a 5k, but have aches and pains for days after, you're not "sound physically." If you are increasing your weight on the bench press, but your joint pain is increasing right along with it, you're not "sound physically" either. Sure, some muscle soreness and fatigue after a hard workout is normal. But if you're having pain that doesn't go away, sore joints, or trouble moving after exercise, you're probably developing movement dysfunction along with your fitness.

That means moving in a way that is less than optimal. For a while, it works. But eventually it leads to injury. Think of someone who has trouble bending one knee doing squats. When one knee bends further than the other, it will cause one side of the pelvis to drop lower than the other. When the pelvis isn't level, the spine bends towards the high side to stay balanced. When that one side of the pelvis drops lower than the other one, it also usually rotates. Now the spine has to bend to the side and twist to keep you upright. As weight gets added to the squat, and the repetitions add up so does the risk for a back injury.



Preventive Medicine

Pain during workouts, or pain and soreness that don't go away after can be warning signs of a movement dysfunction. If you're experiencing any of these, your physical therapist is a movement expert who can help. PTs are trained to analyze movement, and figure out the root cause of problems. They can then design a program to treat the cause and correct the abnormal pattern. There is no need to wait until you're injured to see your physical therapist. In fact, it's preferable not to wait. Getting minor problems fixed early means fewer visits to the PT, less pain, and not having your workouts put on hold by injury.



Movement Dysfunction

In the dictionary you'll find that dysfunction is "impaired or abnormal functioning." Movement dysfunction is impaired or abnormal movement. When someone has a movement problem - a sore joint, limited range of motion, or strength loss - the brain finds a way to get the body to do what it wants.

Step away from the computer and play

I live near an elementary school, and before the reign of COVID-19, I enjoyed the happy hum of children's play emanating from the playground. Now, as I walk around my neighborhood, I rarely see or hear even one child outside at play.

While social distancing may curtail the social aspects of large games, children still need daily outlets away from the computer. A great deal of education occurs during self-directed play.

Educational and health-care professionals have long been concerned that children might not be re-

ceiving enough play time to support learning and emotional well-being.

According to the American Academy of Pediatrics 2012 clinical report, "Play is essential. Unstructured time is vital for development, stress reduction, physical and mental health.

Play gives children a wide range of critical cognitive, physical, emotional and social benefits. Play, in all its forms, needs to be considered as the ideal educational and developmental milieu for children, including for children in poverty. The lifelong success of chil-

dren is based on their ability to be creative and to apply the lessons learned from playing."

Now, when children are isolated from their friends, solitary play takes on an even more important role. Frequent open-ended activities, sprinkled throughout the day, provide the breaks that young minds need to refresh between their academic lessons.

Outdoor activities give eyes a rest, release tension, provide exercise and provide opportunity to play in the dirt, jump rope, skip, look for pretty rocks and chalk up the sidewalk. Physical play improves sensory integration skills in motor, cognitive, social and linguistic domains.

At least one hour a day outside is considered a healthy minimum for everybody.

Free-form play indoors allows children to express their creativity and explore their passions.

Children's brains are already programmed for learning through play, from making up their own games, playing pretend with their toys, creating with clay, dressing-up, dancing and splashing in the tub.

Free-form play often creates an imaginative private reality and contains elements of make believe.

Children naturally engage passionately. Becoming engrossed in play builds executive function-

ing skills and contributes to readiness for more formal ways of learning.

Experts are becoming more and more convinced that children need less time at the computer and more time to play. While school is closed, screen-time lessons are necessary. Taking frequent breaks will improve attention. Bored children are hard to teach.

The United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child has enshrined the right to engage in play that is appropriate to the age of the child.

According to their report, "Play is not just about having fun but about taking risks, experimenting, and testing

boundaries. Play is not frivolous; it is brain building. Play is fundamentally important for learning 21st century skills, such as problem solving, collaboration and creativity, which require the executive functioning skills that are critical for adult success."

Couldn't we all use a little more play in our lives right now?

Label printer Cymmetrik settles in Santa Teresa

A third Taiwanese company is locating a manufacturing operation near the Santa Teresa Port of Entry, New Mexico Economic Development Department (NMEDD) Sec. Alicia J. Keyes has announced.

Cymmetrik signed a lease and is set to begin operations in New Mexico early this year. Cymmetrik, a Taiwanese family-owned company, is the largest label printer and converter in China, with three factories in Southeast Asia. The expansion of manufacturing to Santa Teresa represents its first presence in North America, NMEDD said in a news release.

Cymmetrik joins Admiral Cable and Xxentria as

Taiwanese-based companies moving operations to Santa Teresa, NMEDD said. The New Mexico location offers Cymmetrik and other companies assets that include the Union Pacific Intermodal Terminal, the Doña Ana County International Jetport and access to Interstate 10.

Bringing one business from Taiwan is an anchor, bringing two is a movement and bringing three is “a compelling story that New Mexico is in a great position to re-shore Asian business,” said Border Industrial Alliance (BIA) President Jerry Pacheco of Santa Teresa. 2020 is “the best year we’ve ever had in terms of building new space and recruiting new business,” Pacheco said.

Santa Teresa, he said



is “very primed to hit the ground running” and have another great year in 2021.

“New Mexico’s border region is well positioned for growth as companies from all over the world look to diversify their production plants and distribution centers to locate closer to North American customers,” Keyes said. “Admiral Cable, Xxentria, and now Cymmetrik see the advantages of being close to the international border in New Mexico, and others will follow.”

Cymmetrik is a world leader in applied printing, processing and manufacturing, and the company has established deep, firm partnerships through the

years with top-tier global names in electronics, personal/home consumables, personal/medical and automotive industries, communications technology and automotive companies,” Cymmetrik’s North American spokesman Anton Tao said.

NMEDD and state officials made a 2019 trade visit to Taiwan, the news release said. NMEDD has

also opened a trade office in Taipei. This liaison will work with existing Taiwanese companies looking to expand into North America to familiarize them with New Mexico and will work with the New Mexico Department of Agriculture, based in Las Cruces, to increase state agricultural exports in the region.

The logistical connectivity to Mexico and the rest of the United States, coupled with competitive production costs, is making Santa Teresa the fastest growing industrial base on the U.S.-Mexico border, NMEDD said.

New Mexico led all 50 states in 2019 export growth (31 percent), according to statistics from the U.S. Census Bureau, NMEDD said. Additionally, New Mexico’s export growth to Mexico (68 percent) leads the nation and is directly attributable to the expansion in Santa Teresa.

With about 5,500 residents, Santa Teresa has .001 percent of New Mexico’s population, but generates more than half the state’s nearly \$4 billion in exports to the world, Pacheco said.

Formed in 2009, BIA is a nonprofit industrial advocacy group comprised of 125 industrial members that account for 6,000 employees and billions of dollars in value-added production in the Santa Teresa/Las Cruces corridor. It is the largest industrial association in New Mexico.

New Mexico has awarded \$160,000 from its Local Economic Development Act job-creator fund to Cymmetrik for 10 new jobs, the news release said. Xxentria is planning to hire 35 supervisory employees in New Mexico and Admiral Cable is hiring 342 employees for manufacturing at its new 195,000-square-foot factory set to open this year.



Oil and gas contributed \$2.8 billion to state's economy in FY20

A new analysis from the nonpartisan New Mexico Tax Research Institute reports state revenue from oil and natural gas production in New Mexico totaled \$2.8 billion in FY20, accounting for 33.5 percent of total state spending, the New Mexico Oil and Gas Association (NMOGA) said in a news release.

Despite lower commodity prices throughout the spring of 2020, record production kept oil and gas revenue at the second highest total ever reported, the news release said.

"The oil and gas indus-

try continues to be the key driver of New Mexico's economy, delivering for New Mexico in a significant way despite the challenges we've all encountered during this unprecedented public health crisis," said NMOGA President Ryan Flynn.

Of the \$2.8 billion, \$2.376 billion was allocated to the state budget for recurring spending, \$192

million for non-recurring spending and \$232 million for reserves. Federal mineral leasing, the target of several proposals to restrict domestic oil and gas development, is the single largest source of oil and gas revenue to the state at nearly \$809 million, NMOGA said.

The report notes that the decline in oil and gas revenue from FY19-20

stems from an "abnormally high level reached in FY19 due to one-time [federal] bonus payments."

Public schools are the largest beneficiary of oil and gas revenue, taking in nearly \$1.1 billion of the total. Spending for health and human services is second with more than \$640 million, while higher education is third with just over \$290 million.

Bernalillo County is the largest recipient of funding, with more than \$409 million in K-12 and higher education funds supported by oil and gas. The University of New Mexico is the largest higher education recipient at nearly \$69 million.

In Doña Ana County, oil and gas revenue supported 6,375 jobs, paid \$299 million in labor income, added \$425.6 million to the county's economy and provided \$185.24 million for education, including \$119 million in K-12 funding and \$65.1 million in higher education funding. New Mexico State University in Las Cruces received more than \$57 million, NMSU-Alamogordo received

\$2.45 million, NMSU-Carlsbad received \$1.545 million, Doña Ana Community College received more than \$8 million and NMSU-Grants received nearly \$1.2 million. Las Cruces Public Schools received more than \$71.8 million, Gadsden Independent School District received almost \$42 million and Hatch Valley Public Schools received almost \$3.9 million. Charter schools in Las Cruces received more than \$4 million in funding.

"Every New Mexican relies upon the oil and gas industry to put teachers in our public schools, keep first responders ready to help, and to ensure health-care resources are available to thousands of our neighbors," Flynn said.

New Mexico is the third-largest producer of oil and the eighth-largest producer of natural gas in the United States. In 2019, New Mexico oil and gas production set new highs, topping 330 million barrels of oil, and more than 1.8 million cubic feet of natural gas.

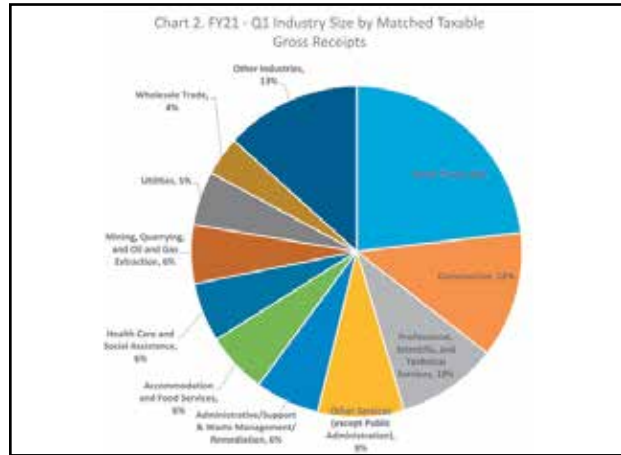

Doña Ana County gross receipts revenue continues climb

The New Mexico Economic Development Department (NMEDD) has published the most recent series of county economic reports with detailed economic and employment data for all 33 counties, as well as a statewide snapshot for the first quarter of the 2021 fiscal year — July, August and September 2020 — during the COVID-19 public health emergency, NMEDD said in a news release.

Data from Doña Ana County (DAC) shows gross receipts for the county, which includes Las Cruces, Sunland Park, Hatch, Santa Te-

resa, Mesilla and other communities, has continued to increase during the pandemic.

The statistical information is compiled from several sources, including

the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis, New Mexico Department of Workforce Solutions and state Taxation and Revenue Department.

DAC gross receipts have trended upward over the last eight quarters, the report said.

From the fourth quarter of FY20 to the first quarter of FY21, gross receipts increased by \$36 million, or four percent.

Retail trade and construction continue to be the largest contributors to the county's gross receipts, at 42 percent through the first quarter of FY21. That is a decrease from 47 percent in the fourth quarter of FY20.

The retail trade industry saw the largest growth, an increase of \$24.4 million, when the first quarters of FY20 and FY21 are compared, as

gross receipts tax revenue rose by about \$531,000 (five percent) from the fourth quarter of FY20 to the first quarter of FY21. Overall, from the first quarter of FY20 to the first quarter of FY21, the year-over-year growth for DAC was \$814,000, or almost eight percent, the report said.

DAC gross receipts revenue from agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting grew 122 percent, from \$2.175 million to almost \$4.8 million, from the fourth quarter of FY20 to the first quarter of FY21.

Arts, entertainment and recreation (AER) were down 44 percent for the same period, from almost \$6.07 million to almost

\$3.375 million for DAC. AER was down statewide 57 percent, including 72 percent in Santa Fe County and 71 percent in Bernalillo County.

Statewide, 14 counties saw a year-over-year increase in matched taxable gross receipts, though the state as a whole saw a decrease of nine percent. Despite the overall drop, the largest category, retail trade, recorded a seven percent increase in GRT collections.

The state's gross domestic product decreased by seven percent year-over-year in the fourth quarter of 2020.

Public bank idea gaining steam in New Mexico

Legislation to create a public bank is likely to be introduced during the 2021 legislative session. The idea is to create a bank that receives deposits from local governments and lends to New Mexico businesses to promote economic development. The bank would be capitalized by a \$50 million contribution from the state treasurer, thereby

creating a non-profit owned by the State of New Mexico.

The effort to create a public bank in our state is part of a larger national movement with about half the states actively considering establishing such banks. That said, the Bank of North Dakota is the only one operational. Here in New Mexico, the effort to establish a public

bank is being led by the Alliance for Economic Prosperity.

There are valid reasons for creating a public bank. First is to provide funding for profitable businesses that otherwise would go unfunded. This is not currently a problem. The Federal Reserve has inundated the economy with liquidity to offset the effects of the pandemic.

In fact, the problem is not a lack of funding but a lack of profitable projects to fund. Bank reserves — funds available to lend — currently are greater than \$3 trillion. These are idle funds banks would lend if only they had profitable customers willing to borrow. To further make clear the point, note that interest rates are at or near all-time lows.

To the extent that a public bank makes loans to business that would otherwise qualify for a loan from a traditional private bank, the public bank is not adding to total investment in the state. Rather, it is simply replacing a private lender

with a public lender. Given my Libertarianish leanings, I do not think this positive.

Another valid reason for a public bank is to channel funds to socially desirable projects that are not profitable in the conventional sense. For example, the savings and loan industry was established in the 1930s precisely to fund 30-year fixed-rate mortgages, which had been rare previous to the savings and loans. Because of special tax incentives, savings and loans were incentivized to make mortgage loans, thereby helping to achieve the socially desirable goal of widespread home ownership.

And if in fact the lawmakers want to establish a public bank to subsidize certain favored projects viewed as socially beneficial, I'm okay with that if done with open eyes. A public bank that funds socially-desirable-but-unprofitable projects will operate at loss, and will need taxpayer-funded subsidies. Those subsidies may be explicit in the form of bailouts or they may be implicit in the form of lower returns than could be earned on deposits in private banks.

While there are valid reasons for establishing a public bank, those are not reasons emphasized

2020 took some of golf's greats from us, Part 2

One of modern golf's most prolific and admired golf course architects, Pete Dye, Jr., died early last January at age 94. Dye was born Dec. 29, 1925, in Urbana, Ohio, and in 1943 won the Ohio state high school golf championship.

In 1944, at age 18, he enlisted in the U.S. Army and went to airborne school to be a paratrooper, but the war ended before he got a chance to jump in combat. While he was at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, Dye worked as greenskeeper on the base golf course.

As Dye recalled, "I played the [nearby] golf course at Pinehurst No. 2 for six solid months and got to know Mr. Donald Ross. Famous for designing No. 2. Ross, like Dye, is one of the most famous golf architects ever.

After his Army discharge, Dye enrolled at Rollins College in Winter

Park, Florida, where he met his wife, Alice, in 1950. The two moved back to Alice's hometown of Indianapolis, where Pete sold insurance before finding his true lifelong passion as a course designer in 1961.



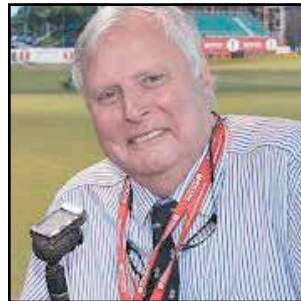

During the course of his golf architecture career, Dye designed more than 119 golf courses in the U.S.

and 11 in foreign countries. I have played only six of them. My favorite is Red Mountain Ranch Country Club in Mesa, Arizona.

Other recognized courses include TPC Sawgrass (Stadium), Harbour Town Links, Kiawah Island (Ocean), Whistling Straits, Blackwolf Run and Crooked Stick in Indiana.

In 2004, Dye was the recipient of the PGA Distinguished Service Award which recognizes individuals who display

leadership, integrity, sportsmanship and enthusiasm for the game of golf. A year later he was given the PGA Tour Lifetime Achievement Award.

But among the many other honors and awards bestowed on Pete Dye, the one that stands out the most is his 2008 induction into the World Golf Hall of Fame by Australian golfing legend Greg Norman.

Peter Alliss, who died Dec. 5, 2020, at age 89, was a professional English golfer, controversial TV golf commentator, author, golf course designer and the "voice of golf" in the U.K. for 30 years.

From the time he turned pro in 1947 until he retired from golf in 1975, he won 31 tournaments around the world and played on eight European Ryder Cup teams.

In October 1958, Alliss won the Italian, Spanish and Portuguese Opens in three successive weeks.

Alliss began his broadcasting career in 1961 doing television work for the BBC at the Open Championship. He continued with the BBC, ABC Sports and ESPN as a golf analyst until 2015.

Alliss was accustomed to speaking his mind, no matter what, with a style as a golf broadcasting

figure that often rubbed folks the wrong way.

Of his many famous quotes, I like this one about noisy tournament spectators: "Some of the fans there (seem) fueled by the local giggle-juice." And on the golf itself, "It's an enigma wrapped in a mystery impaled on a conundrum!"

Alliss was inducted into the World Golf Hall of Fame in 2012.

On Friday, May 1, 2020, my longtime friend Guy Wimberly died at age 81. Guy was born in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, and moved to Albuquerque as a child.

He started out his golfing career by helping Highland High School win the New Mexico state high school championship in 1956.

He served four years in the U.S. Air Force, where he met his wife, Alice. He then went on to play golf for Coach Dick McGuire at the University of New Mexico, where he was

a two-time NCAA All-American in 1963. In 1969, he became a PGA golf professional.

I first met Guy when he was co-head pro at Arroyo Del Oso golf course in Albuquerque. Guy and his brother, Herb, developed the Professional Golf Management Program at NMSU in 1988.

In 2006, Guy retired to Elephant Butte, where he was instrumental in developing Sierra del Rio Golf Course. He was honored with the Sun Country PGA Section's Lifetime Achievement Award in 2001 and inducted into the PGA of America's Hall of Fame in 2011.

Having grown the game selflessly for over four decades, Guy Wimberly was known as Mr. New Mexico Golf.

by the proponents. Proponents don't argue that profitable enterprises are short of funding, nor do they argue for subsidizing socially desirable projects. Rather the argu-

ment is about Wall Street. Proponents want to stop sending profits to big banks out of state. This is left-wing twaddle.

Proponents argue that the public bank will operate more efficiently and at lower costs than for-profit banks. Thus, a public bank will both pay a

higher return to the state and offer lower-interest loans.

This argument misunderstands capitalism and the working of markets. Private businesses, including banks, make a profit by providing high-quality services at low cost. Too often, govern-

ment sponsored agencies like a public bank, because they are not disciplined by the profit motive, do not operate more efficiently than private businesses.

One doesn't want to paint with too broad a brush, as many government agencies are

efficiently run by professional staff who seek to achieve the public interest. But one needs only to think of Spaceport America or of Visit Las Cruces to realize that an efficiently run public bank is far from certain.
