County hosts Virtual Read Across America day

Doña Ana County will host a virtual, live stream children's book reading from 9 a.m. to 10 a.m. on Tuesday, March 2, as part of Read Across America Day, RAAD a national initiative that encourages children to read.

A link to the live stream will be shared with teachers throughout Doña Ana County's three school districts and Holy Cross Catholic School, who will integrate the reading of one book in English and one in Spanish, as part of the day's schedule. The program will also be recorded to provide students and their families another opportunity to view the program and encourage reading together.

All students are welcome to view the live stream or video recording, whether they are part of the Las Cruces Public Schools, Gadsden Independent School District, Hatch Valley Public Schools, Holy Cross Catholic School, or any other school in the county.

Locally, Doña Ana County's Community and Constituent Services Office coordinates the countywide RAAD program. During the program, the adults who read are county employees, various local elected officials and external agency personnel. In a given year that the countywide RAAD is held, readers visit more than 45 elementary schools throughout the county in one day, exceeding 100 separate reading sessions requested by school officials.

The Countywide RAAD also serves as a Career Day, in which the readers connect the importance of literacy to a wide range of jobs. Since the first Countywide RAAD in 2016, 11,693 children have participated. With private foundation funds, the county donated 717 books to participating elementary schools in 2019.

To further encourage reading, Doña Ana County partnered with the City of Las Cruces and the Thomas Branigan Memorial Library on Books by Mail Services.

To participate, Doña Ana County residents in unincorporated areas must register with Books by Mail Services at the Thomas Branigan Memorial Library.

LCPS unveils plan to reopen schools

“We’re looking forward to moving in the right direction,” Las Cruces Public Schools Superintendent Karen Trujillo said during a Feb. 16 LCPS Board of Education meeting as she and other administrators presented a plan to re-open schools.

The board approved the re-opening earlier this month.

The plan, which Trujillo described as a modified hybrid of online and face-to-face instruction, will bring some students back into schools for limited classroom instruction, with different strategies for elementary, middle and high schools.

The plan prioritizes “students not engaging, not attending, not submitting assignments,” LCPS

said.

High schools will re-open Feb. 22, with middle and elementary schools to open March 1.

“It’s extremely complicated,” said board President Ray Jaramillo. “We have to stay in yellow, we have to move toward the green for this to work,” he said, referring to the state’s red-to-green framework for monitoring COVID-19 cases county by county.

“We want to move forward, and it’s going to take everyone,” Jaramillo said.

“Full enforcement [of state health protocols] all the time,” Trujillo said, “that’s what’s going to keep us safe. The last thing we want is to open just to close.”

Trujillo said the plan is based on the voluntary return of staff to schools,

adding that it ensures adequate staff at high schools to allow their participation in state-sanctioned activities.

Trujillo said 82 percent of the 1,911 LCPS employees who requested COVID-19 vaccinations have received at least the first dose, including 87 percent of nearly 1,300 school-building staff requesting it. LCPS has 3,412 employees.

“You’ve made a lot of kids happy in allowing us to proceed with this,” said Assistant Superintendent for Special Education and Leadership Michael Montoya, a former middle and high school principal.

At Trujillo’s request, the meeting also included a moment of silence for five LCPS staff who have died of COVID-19 or COVID-related illnesses since November.

Fire department battalion chief completes prestigious program

“I believe in the Las Cruces Fire Department. We’re definitely one of the best departments in the nation,” said LCFD Battalion Chief Mike Daniels.

After retiring from military service in 2005, Daniels graduated from the fire academy and joined LCFD in 2006. He has been a paramedic for 10 years and became battalion chief in 2015.

Just before celebrating his 15th anniversary with the department this month, Daniels completed the Federal Emergency Management Agency’s Executive Fire Officer (EFO) program. The training spans four years and

is considered the flagship program of the National Fire Academy (NFA), according to the U.S. Fire Administration.

For Daniels, the course was an opportunity to develop his skills as a leader, researcher and writer. In addition to eight weeks of in-person training at

NFA headquarters in Emmitsburg, Maryland, the course required writing and defending papers on officer development, mass sheltering and LCFD’s Mobile Integrated Health program (MIH). Daniels’ MIH presentation earned a perfect score and received the outstanding research award in community risk reduction.

His paper on mass sheltering, which also earned a perfect score, came from direct personal experience in Las Cruces. In 2019, Daniels was temporarily reassigned to the joint Doña Ana County/ City of Las Cruces Office of Emergency Management as area commander dealing with providing humanitarian aid to about 17,000

asylum seekers who were brought to Las Cruces by U.S. Border Patrol agents.

Daniels said EFO training has helped him to focus on strategic risk reduction/prevention and to help “people know how to protect themselves.” The training included an understanding of local demographics like poverty rates and drug use — and even the incidence and prevention of falls.

Daniels said his daily management skills also were challenged by the course, which focused on critical thinking and re-evaluation, he said.

Instead of “This is how we’ve always done it,” Daniels said, EFO emphasizes, “You should question ‘why’ all the

time.” And even when the department is operating efficiently, “that doesn’t mean we can’t get better,” he said, noting that innovations often lead to better public safety.

The training forced participants to think outside their traditional roles, Daniels said, and to “look beyond the scope of what you’ve done for the last decade.”

Through EFO, Daniels said he also developed a valuable network of peer support that stretches across the country and provides information about other fire departments’ “innovative ways to manage.”

LCFD responds to thousands of fire and medical emergency calls each year,

and also has a hazardous-materials team and even a swift-water team, he said. LCFD leadership must manage day-to-day staffing (including dealing with issues like COVID-19) of all department staff, along with the incidents firefighters regularly respond to, staff certification, training, logistics and data research and analysis.

“It’s not our job to shy away from adversity,” Daniels said. “The bar for us always stays really high.”

After receiving his GED, Daniels earned a bachelor’s degree in individualized studies from New Mexico State University and a master’s degree in business administration from Western New Mexico University.

City of Las Cruces

The City of Las Cruces' services spread wide across the area, particularly noticeable when Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) gives a tour. Covering the East Mesa Water Reclamation Facility to the West Mesa Wastewater Treatment Facility, a tour of essential utility sites was given to City Manager Ifo Pili and Assistant City Manager Ikani Taumoepeau to see the systems in place that serve residents.

The first stop was at the LCU's Solid Waste Fleet Shop, detailing the savings from having everything from mechanics to welders in-house and the upgrades to the trash trucks with Routeware. Robin Lawrence, deputy director Solid Waste, showed the images the trucks take from missing or overfilled bins and how rebalancing the routes – with drivers having a more even amount of pickups

– will allow for LCU to absorb future city population growth.

Next was a stop at the Jorge A. Garcia Water Quality Laboratory, where staff explained how state certification was delayed due to COVID-19. Still, as the lab now has been certified, LCU can now possibly look at providing testing services for other agencies. Then it was onto Jacob Hands Wastewater Treatment Facility, where the newest

addition was the co-generators that convert methane from the wastewater treatment process into electricity that can help power the facility during the day.

Stops at the Martinez and West Mesa Gas Regulator Stations gave ample time to explain how natural gas is taken from a cross country, high-pressure transmission line down to local distribution lines

and into low-pressure lines that run into neighborhoods and homes.

Pili congratulated the entire Natural Gas team on its clean facilities and rapid response statistics to locating lines, particularly when finding leaks. "With our City's 30-year plan to get to a sustainable energy future, Natural Gas will still be the key because you can't beat its affordability and reliability," Pili said.

Lawmakers should keep efforts focused on COVID-19

We will be dealing with the fallout of COVID-19 for years.

The fallout will include nearly immeasurable long-term issues with health (both physical and behavioral), many social issues and far-reaching negative economic impacts, some of which we may not even realize right now. Not since World War II has an event had such far-reaching impact on humanity.

The American and New Mexican responses require urgent action.

Why then, are our federal and state governments spending so much time on things distracting attention away from the pandemic response?

Our U.S. House of Representatives and Senate spent the first six weeks of the 2020 Congress on the impeachment of a man who's no longer president. And while Americans have strongly differing opinions on what that outcome SHOULD have been, almost everyone knew from Day One what the outcome WOULD be.

Consequently, valuable time working on national pandemic responses was lost.

In addition, Congress has spent time on several other non-pandemic issues.

Our state legislature, which has far less time, has delved into a lot of issues irrelevant to the most pressing issue of the day.

Here are just some of the

bills and issues our state legislators have introduced, discussed and debated since they

convened Jan. 20 for a 60-day session:

- Auto racing on city streets
- Putting the words "In God We Trust" on all public buildings and license plates
- Confinement of egg-laying hens
- Creating a state-run bank
- Abandoned automobiles
- Barber and cosmetologist duties
- Habitual offender judicial flexibility
- Statewide weather stations
- There seem to be fewer of those notorious non-binding, time-taking measures — memorials and resolutions — but there is one addressing New Mexico/Taiwan relations.

I may be missing something, but I haven't heard a reason explaining any urgency regarding New Mexico's relations with Taiwan. Lawmakers believe all their bills are important to constituents, but few, if any, have COVID-19's urgency. Anything not directly related to getting us out of the physical, social and economic drawdown of the pandemic is not urgent. Almost anything else can and should be delayed.

Both our federal and state legislatures need to be taking an all-out assault on addressing the many aspects of our

society under siege due to the pandemic. The efforts need to be well-thought-out, forward-thinking, aggressive and as fiscally prudent as possible. Attention needs to be laser-focused.

One area both our federal and state governments have spent too much time on is the oil and gas industry. For our country, and much more so for our state, revenues from the oil and gas industry are vital to our economy.

I agree we need to address issues regarding climate change. But emissions from U.S. and New Mexico oil and gas extraction are a tiny piece of the worldwide problem. Current Congressional efforts to curtail drilling on federal lands, and multiple New Mexico Legislature efforts to restrict the industry, could add another drastic negative impact on an already reeling economy.

In New Mexico, almost half of our state's revenue comes from oil and gas taxes. And almost 40 percent of that is from drilling on federal lands such as the Bureau of Land Management. If the harshest of those restrictions, both state and federal, come to pass, it will essentially mean the end of the state of New Mexico as we know it.

We're already just about the poorest state in the U.S. If we lose nearly half of the revenue we have, what then?

Chances are, you and I won't be able to stay here and

be employed. And there won't be much consolation knowing we helped reduce the world's carbon emissions by 0.000001 percent.

Some changes forced by pandemic worth keeping

The Australian Open Tennis Tournament is being played without line judges this year to reduce the number of people in the arena. And it's much better.

A computerized camera system shows exactly where the ball bounced. There's no more arguing about the call, so the game goes much faster. And we don't have to worry about those poor folks lined up against the wall with 150 mph serves whizzing by their noggins.

Which makes me wonder if we've seen that last of line judges, at least in the big tournaments where they can afford the technology.

Necessity is the mother of invention, and COVID-19 has been one powerful mother. It has forced us to find new ways to do old things.

This year's 60-day session of the state Legislature has been conducted entirely online, and it's been a challenge. Debates take twice as long as they normally would because there's so much dead time between speakers, and so many opening sentences lost.

The most commonly heard phrase thus far

this session has been, "You're still on mute."

Beyond the strained debate among lawmakers, the greatest challenge has been allowing for public comment. Each committee sets its own rules, but all start by dividing supporters from opponents.

Some committees will then give each side a certain amount of time. Others will put limits on each speaker.

For the person conducting the meeting, the new system is a whole lot easier than having to verbally interrupt a speaker whose time has expired. They just flip a switch and go on to the next person.

But for anybody with expertise on a complicated bill who needs to take a little bit of time to fully explain why there may be some problems the sponsors hadn't considered, there really is no place for that in the process.

And, to ensure that their voice comes through clearly, speakers often will turn their video off so we can't see them as they are talking. With no time to delve into details and no capacity to visually express emotion, speakers rush through

pre-written scripts that deliver the same emotional punch as a telemarketer.

Because the House and Senate each set their own rules, the pandemic has impacted them differently. House Speaker Brian Egolf tightened their rules early in the session when a representative and staff members tested positive for COVID-19.

Now, many of the representatives are at home, dealing with childcare issues, home maintenance, feeding the pets and all the other things they would normally have to deal with when at home.

To be fair, they are putting in long hours six days a week on Zoom, and they will only get longer from here on out. But there can't be the same casual collaboration and singular focus as there is when everybody is forced together for 60 days in the same building.

There are, however, a few forced changes that have been positive. Experts like department secretaries are able listen in on two committee meetings at the same time, and pop in on either as needed.

And, there is value to allowing the public to weigh in during com-

mittee meetings without needing to drive to Santa Fe in the winter. Perhaps in the future there could be some allowance for remote testimony to supplement what is given in person.

Everybody hopes they are able to get through the next five weeks without any more positive tests, and everyone similarly looks forward to getting back to normal next year. But lawmakers

should take advantage of what was learned this year to improve the process moving forward.

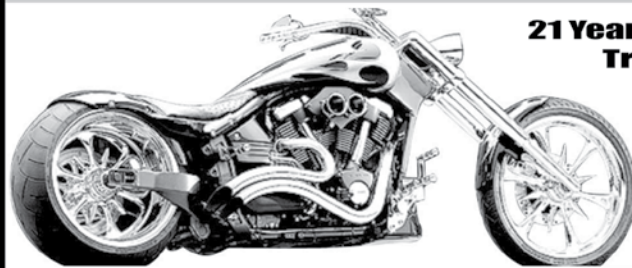

Medical professionals encourage fix to healthcare

Near the beginning of the 2021 New Mexico Legislature, nine state-

wide health professions' organizations sent a letter to legislators and the governor in support of the 2021 Health Security Bill. As a board member of the Health Security for New Mexicans Campaign, I am pleased to share the letter with readers.

Dear New Mexico Legislators,

Our nine organizations represent almost every arm of the state's healthcare system. We treat those with heart disease,

and we start IVs. We help people with debilitating pain find relief, as well as those with mental health conditions. We fill prescriptions, do health screenings and deliver babies. In clinics, offices, pharmacies, ERs and hospitals across New Mexico, we are there. And during the COVID-19 pandemic, we have continued to be there for our fellow New Mexicans.

Your political philosophies, as well as personal or family experiences, likely shape your conclusions about how to fix the widespread problems in American healthcare. Those factors hold true for us, too. But unlike most of you, every week we see up close the harm done from being uninsured, the tough dilemmas from being underinsured, the worry caused by provider shortages and the distress about unaffordable medications.

Too often, it seems we are wasting considerable time, money and morale as we navigate — for our patients — irrational obstacles to care. Those come from insurance company authorizations, differing drug formularies, computer entry requirements, too many middlemen, byzantine coding systems, rejections of legitimate charges, distorted incentives and more.

All this means that we have, collectively, a deep understanding of what is broken and wasteful in today's health system. Many of us have watched for decades as one hot new reform after another has been tried, with most leading to more complexities, less focus on the patients we serve and mind-boggling costs.

Given this background, the organizations we represent believe the proposed Health Security approach has multiple major advantages over today's complicated system. Taking this path would ensure near universal health coverage in our state, with most New Mexicans covered by the comprehensive Health Security Plan itself. That would allow providers to focus much more on each patient's needs, and less on their insurance plan. Drawing clinicians to the state would likely get much easier.

We also appreciate that the Health Security Plan eliminates networks for its members but does not disrupt how care is actually delivered via private and public practitioners and facilities. In addition, three independent analyses have shown that Health Security would save New Mexicans hundreds of millions of dollars each year. Importantly, the 2020 study explicitly assumes stable

provider incomes and fair future increases.

For these reasons and more, we support the passage of the Health Security bill this winter. We are pleading with you: please listen to those of us in the trenches and take this critical step now, so that we clinicians can, in just a few years, be less burdened while giving high quality care to all New Mexicans at a lower cost.

- Press releases, utility billing inserts, letters to the editor/guest editorials, and similar materials concerning rate reviews pending before the Utilities Board will be approved by the UCAG prior to release or publication:
 - Press releases approved by the UCAG will be submitted to and issued by the City's Public Information Office following standard procedures.
 - Utility billing inserts approved by the UCAG will be submitted to the assigned City staff at the Utilities Department and may be reformatted for consistency. The printing costs for billing inserts will be paid for by the Utilities Department.
- The UCAG will terminate upon completion of the duties set forth above upon notification by the Utilities Director to the City Clerk.

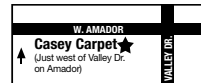

House moves forward with marijuana bill

With two competing cannabis legalization bills having been under consideration, much of the debate Saturday, Feb. 13, in the House Health and Human Services Committee was about how — not whether — to tax and regulate the legal sale of marijuana.

By Monday afternoon, Feb. 15, the dust had settled and House Bill 12, sponsored by Rep. Javier Martinez, D-Albuquerque, moved forward. It now goes to the Judiciary Committee.

The competing bill, House Bill 17, sponsored by Rep. Tara Lujan, D-Santa Fe, was tabled and is unlikely to resurface.

HB12 is similar to a bill introduced in 2019 that passed in the House but never made it to the Senate floor. HB17 was described by Lujan as a more streamlined bill that would establish a framework to tax and sell marijuana but leave many of the details to be handled by a new commission.

Unlike in past years, no law enforcement officers weighed in during the public-comment part of the Feb. 13 meeting.

Only two people opposed the bills: Allen Sanchez, executive director of the New Mexico Conference of Catholic Bishops, said he was concerned about parenting under the influence; and, Jack Bent of the New Mexico Business

Coalition noted that fatal car crashes and emergency room visits both increased in Colorado after legalization.

HB12 allows for home growing and has no limits for commercial licenses or plants. Opponents feared it could lead to an increase in supply for the black market. Martinez said supporters wanted to ensure medical marijuana patients would not have their supplies threatened, and that all New Mexicans had a chance to get a license and start a new business.

Unlike alcohol licenses, which have a strict limit and can be sold, often for \$1 million or more, cannabis licenses would have to be renewed yearly, and could not be sold or transferred, Martinez said.

HB12 gives each county the option of imposing a gross-receipts tax, and it earmarks some of the money for the low-income medical patient subsidy fund and the community grants reinvestment fund. HB17 would have had

a tax rate of 20 percent throughout the state with no earmarks on revenue.

During the Feb. 13 meeting, Rep. Gail Armstrong, R-Magdalena, asked if law enforcement was in support of either bill, and Rep. Stefani Lord, R-Sandia Park, asked if there were a way to test for inebriated drivers.

Martinez conceded law enforcement remains opposed. And, Rep. Debbie Armstrong, D-Bernalillo, acknowledged there is no reliable chemical test for marijuana like there is for alcohol. But, she said, there is specialized training to allow officers to identify when a driver is impaired.

Rep. Phelps Anderson, I-Roswell, asked about the impact of marijuana consumption on young users. Dr. Neal Bowen, director of the Behavioral Health Services Division for the Human Services Department agreed there are risks for young users. Sponsors stressed sales to teens would be illegal. And, they argued, edu-

cation programs giving teens accurate information on the harmful effects of marijuana are more effective than prohibition.

“We need to create a culture of responsible use,” Martinez said, adding that the same concept applies for alcohol and vaping.

Debbie Armstrong said as long as the drug is illegal, the only message from the school can be “just say no.” This will give students the information they need to make informed decisions when they come of age, she said.

Two marijuana legalization bills also have been introduced in the Senate: Senate Bill 13, sponsored by Sen. Daniel Ivey-Soto, D-Albuquerque; and SB 288, sponsored by Sen. Cliff Pirtle, R-Roswell. Both are awaiting their first hearing in the Tax, Business and Transportation Committee.

Physical Activity For Seniors

How much do you need?

Most people know that physical activity is important. In fact, not getting enough has been linked to illnesses like heart disease, stroke, diabetes, Alzheimer's, high blood pressure and lung disease. So the important question is not if you need to be doing some form of physical activity to protect against diseases like these, but **how much is enough?** The US Department of Health and Human Services answered that question for us in 2008 with their recommendations for physical activity. To improve or maintain health, adults over 65 need to do 2 types of physical activity: aerobic exercise and strengthening.

AEROBIC EXERCISE

To meet the recommendations for aerobic exercise you should try to be active daily, and perform your aerobic activity for at least 10 minutes at a time. Each week you should aim for 150 minutes of moderate intensity activity OR 75 minutes of vigorous intensity activity.

The general rule is that 1 minute of vigorous activity is equal to 2 minutes of moderate intensity activity, so a combination of moderate and vigorous activity can also be used to satisfy the recommended 150 minutes each week.



Some examples of moderate intensity aerobic activity would be:

- Walking
- Water aerobics
- Riding a bike on a level surface
- Doubles tennis



Vigorous intensity activities include:

- Running or jogging
- Riding a bike fast, or on hills
- Singles tennis
- Hiking uphill

STRENGTHENING

Muscle strength is important for all daily movement, and in older adults it can help to maintain strong bones, as well as reduce the risk of falling. The recommendation for strengthening is to work each major muscle group twice a week.

Examples of strengthening activities include:

- Carrying heavy loads
- Lifting weights
- Exercises using your own body weight like push ups, sit ups, or squats

For each exercise you should try to perform:

At least one set
8 to 12 repetitions
in each set

Your resistance should be heavy enough that the last repetition is hard to complete.



These guidelines are general recommendations and do not take into account previous injuries, medical conditions, or limitations that individuals may have. Your physical therapist is an expert in exercise and physical activity who can help design a program to maintain or improve your health while considering your past medical history, limitations, and goals. Your PT can teach you safe exercise technique, and help you safely progress your program as you get fitter to continue making improvements in your overall health.

Community Foundation awards more than \$1 million in grant funds, scholarships in 2020

The Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico (CFSNM) invested more than \$1 million in local nonprofits and scholarship funds in 2020, CFSNM said in a news release.

CFSNM's 2020 impact report includes the following:

- With five new funds created in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, CFSNM raised more than \$670,000 to support five funding programs: Together Las Cruces, The Nonprofit Emergency Fund, Thank You Las Cruces Restaurant



Fund, All Together New Mexico and the Southern Colonias Fund.

- CFSNM awarded more than \$215,000 to 295 students in scholarship funds. CFSNM manages more than 30 scholarships, including seven new scholarships created, like the Clarence H. Fielder Scholarship created to assist African American students.
- CFSNM awarded grants of more than \$350,000 to 55 nonprofits in its seven-county service region.

- CFSNM raised \$50,000 from annual events, including the Gatsby Gala and Estate Planning Institute. As a result, gala grants were awarded to four nonprofits, including the Doña Ana County Humane Society and Mesilla Valley Court-Appointed Special Advocates.

CFSNM holds more than \$20 million in assets, which represents a \$7 million increase during the past four years. CFSNM's goal is \$30 million in assets by its 40th anniversary, in 2029.

It is the embodiment of "Team WSMR."

Master gardener classes start in March

concentrating on gardening in the Chihuahuan Desert, said county Agronomy and Horticulture Agent Jeffrey L. Anderson.

The program includes classes taught by New Mexico State University

professors and regional specialists. Some of the topics are basic botany, integrated pest management (IPM), plant propagation and tree trimming.

To become a certified master gardener (CMG), students/interns must


successfully complete the master-gardener training, Anderson said. Additionally, students must complete 10 hours of hotline duty and 20 hours of continuing education.

To maintain CMG status, candidates must volunteer at least 40 hours each year: 10 hours of hotline duty, 20 hours of community outreach and 10 hours of continuing education.

As one of the most comprehensive domestic violence agencies in the state, one of the focus points is on its youth program, and Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month, February, becomes an opportunity to educate.

“Three in four [teens] will experience some form of domestic violence and 89 percent of college students say they are not confident in their ability to recognize the warning signs of dating violence,” Cisneros said. “We want to make sure that not only the parent knows the signs, but that teens know the signs and can call us for help.

“When I was young, everything ended at 3:30 when school was over — now its 24 hours a day, seven days a week. It is so much easier for teenager to fall into that, easier to stalk someone,” she said.

Domestic violence cycles go back generations, La Casa Executive Director Henry Brutus said.

“We are doing a lot of outreach in the schools,”

he said. “It’s about prevention. We’re doing Zoom this year, focusing it mostly on the middle schools and high schools.”

He said he usually can speak one-to-one with the students following presentations at the schools, but because of the pandemic, he won’t be able to do so this year.

“After delivery last year, I had a line of people waiting to talk to me,” he said. “There is definitely interest and need.”

Brutus said he hopes young people will still reach out with questions.

“When it comes to preventing teen dating violence, the ultimate goal is to stop the violence before it even begins,” Cisneros said. “As a result, the most effective prevention begins by educating preteens and young teens about how to form healthy relationships with others. It also involves teaching them important life skills like assertiveness and solid communication skills. They also should learn how to disagree with others in a healthy and respectful way.”

Abuse and bullying

in a dating relationship involve more than just hitting, kicking, slapping and punching. In fact, most abusive relationships start out with subtle signs that many teens mistake for love, she said.

The most common warning signs include displaying jealousy, asking for passwords to one’s devices or accounts and insisting on spending every free moment together.

To help children understand, parents can initiate conversations about relationships. Use a scene from a movie, an excerpt from a book or a news story to get the conversation started and talk about what is and is not healthy in a relationship.

It also helps if parents don’t shy away from difficult topics like sex, Cisneros said. Discuss the importance of respect in a relationship. Make sure your teen knows that they deserve respect. Likewise, they need to be respectful of others.

She said parents can make sure teens know that while disagreements are normal, handling them in an aggressive or disrespectful way is not acceptable. Likewise, violence, abuse, namecalling and sexual bullying are not acceptable.

Equipping teens with the ability to clearly state their feelings, opinions

and desires is one of the best things a parent can do, Cisneros said.

Abusive relationships often lead to secrets, she said. For instance, young people often know what is happening is not right, but instead of talking about it, they keep it a secret. Relationships that involve a lot of secrecy usually also contain a lot of other hurtful behaviors like manipulation, she said.

“Any time you recognize small changes in your child’s behavior, like a change in mood, sleeping patterns or eating habits, you should take notice,” Cisneros said. “Even a drop in grades, fewer friends hanging around or dropping a once-favorite sport are causes for concern.”

Often these changes are early warning signs that something is going on in a teen’s life that is upsetting them, she added.

“If your teen is being abused, don’t try to handle the situation on your own,” she said. “The most effective plans for getting your daughter or son out of an abusive relationship involve a team of people, including you, a school professional and sometimes even the police.”

The first celebration

of Black History Month was in 1970 at Kent State University in Kent, Ohio. American historian and author Carter G. Woodson (1875-1950) proposed the creation of Negro History Week during the second week of February — it coincided with the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln (Feb. 12) and Frederick Douglas (likely Feb. 14) — in 1926.

Woodson, a native of Virginia, founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History, and he is often called the father of Black History.

Black History Month is celebrated in February in the United States and Canada, and in October in Ireland, the United Kingdom and the Netherlands.

Meals program continues through Feb. 28, maybe longer

A program created by the City of Las Cruces to provide meals to low-income residents during COVID-19 and to give an economic boost to local restaurants during the pandemic will continue at least through Feb. 28, and possibly longer.

With a voucher to a local restaurant, "someone who is low income or in financial distress can get a hot meal," said city Housing and Neighborhood Services Manager Natalie Green. The program, she said, has "a secondary benefit of helping restaurants."

The restaurant voucher program was started last year, after state public health orders closed restaurants and other businesses and caused job losses and economic hardship. A second round of the program began in December. The program could be extended for a third round,

with approval from the Las Cruces City Council.

The program is funded with \$182,000 from the city's Telshor Facilities Fund, which is money the city receives from the lease of Memorial Medical Center. The city owns the hospital jointly with Doña Ana County. The council has authorized spending of more than \$3 million for a variety of services to the community during the pandemic.

The city contracted with Families and Youth, Inc. nonprofit of Las Cruces to administer the voucher program, Green said.

The city issued 15,000 meal vouchers under the program, which FYI and other nonprofits have distributed to those in need. Each voucher is valued at \$10, which can be used to purchase a single meal or as part of the purchase price of a more expensive meal at a participating restaurant, said FYI HIV/STI Services Coordinator Javier Garcia, who is ad-

ministering the program.

Participating restaurants turn in the vouchers received to FYI, which then reimburses them, Garcia said. He said all available vouchers have been distributed and are being redeemed by the people who have them.

"The community has been very responsive," Garcia said. "It's a win-win for everybody."

Working with the city on the program is "something that resonates with our mission," Garcia said, which is "to promote a safer and healthier community." It's also been a way for FYI to partner with the city, locally owned restaurants and other nonprofits that are passionate about helping people, Garcia said.

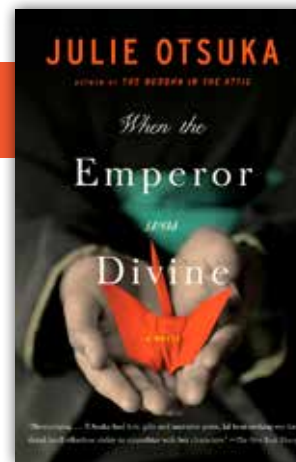
The owner of one participating restaurant "grew up being poor," Garcia said, "and knows what it is to be hungry." Participating in the voucher program "is a good way to give back to the community."

Garcia said restaurants participating in the second round of the voucher program are Dick's Café, Pit Stop 292, Mix Pacific Rim, La Nueva Casita, New

Mexico Spanish Kitchen, Chilitos, Boba Café, Cafecito Divino, Zia Café, Mother's Place, Mariscos Boca Del Rio y Comida Mexicana and Chachi's

Mexican Restaurant.

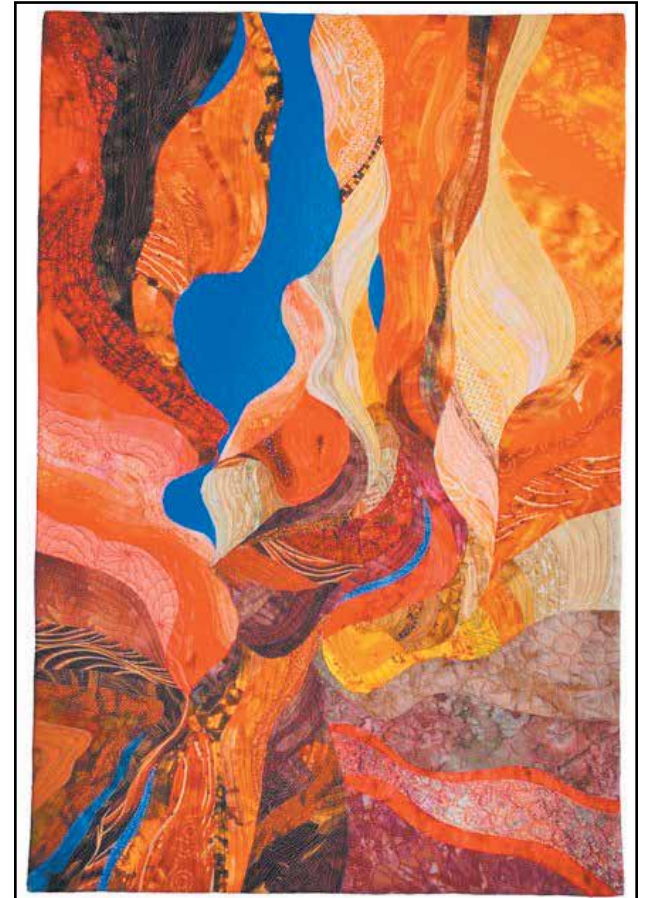

Black Box Theatre owners Ceil and Peter Herman make a rare appearance in front of the curtain in the No Strings Theatre Company production of “Connections,” which continues streaming free of charge through Sunday, Feb. 21.

In less than 35 minutes, the Hermans perform as the aging couple Jack and Esther, who meet for the first time in a park — or did they meet decades before in a Hollywood taxi? Then, they are “He” and “She” in 1921 in brightly colored masks and a very brief but

colorful word exchange. And, finally, at a formal-dress ball at a lunatic asylum in late 19th-century London, they are the sultana of Zanzibar and a dear friend of William

the Conqueror — or are they really Miss Manners and Capt. Fielding?

The three short plays — “A Walk in the Park,” “The Illuminati” and “A Pair of Lunatics” — have

been cleverly linked in this engaging production whose works stretch across more than a century.

So often during the past 20-plus years, I’ve been to BBT to see shows (and performed in a few) that Ceil directed and/or produced and Peter lit and did other technical work for. It was fun to see them in character, in costume and on stage.

“Are words nothing?” “Everything!” is one of their characters’ exchanges in “The Illuminati.” Indeed — and the masks are brilliant.

I think my favorite line is one that one of Ceil’s characters says: “I

knew it — he’s a lunatic. I must humor (more likely spelled humour because it’s a British play) him and get away.”

In shadow and in light, in formal and informal costume, in memory and make believe, Ceil and Peter connect with a bit of lunacy, a lot of humor (or humour), tenderness (I loved them holding hands in “A Walk in the Park”), good fun and a lovely opportunity to get away.

Mario Valencia worked the camera for “Connections,” and Sigi Treviso did the sound and lights. The mood lighting and camera moves are an important part of the

shows, and the music was especially delightful.

There is no charge to watch “Connections,” which streams 24 hours beginning at 7 p.m. Friday, Feb. 19, and Saturday, Feb. 20. That means the Friday performance continues through Saturday evening, and the Saturday performance continues through Sunday, Feb. 21.

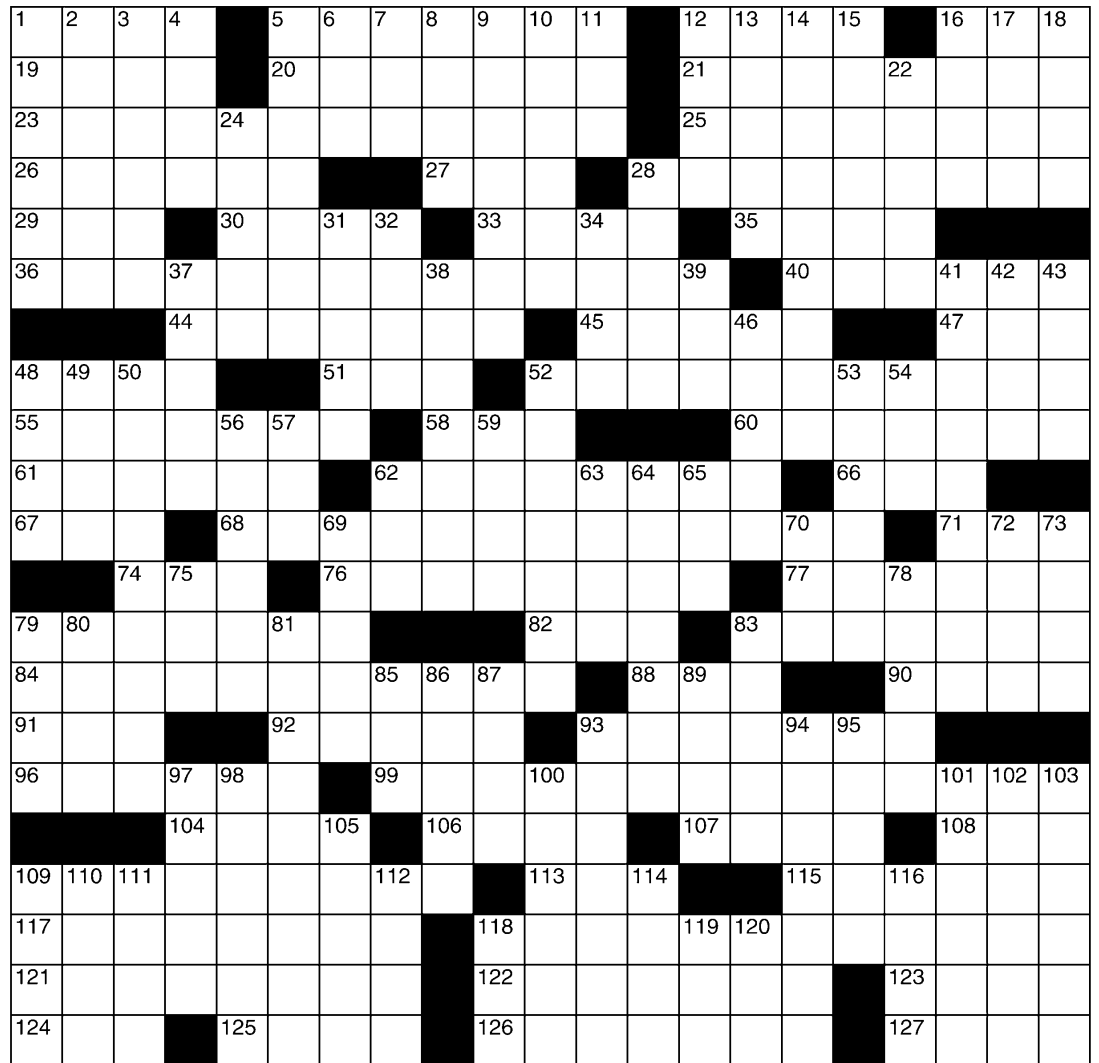

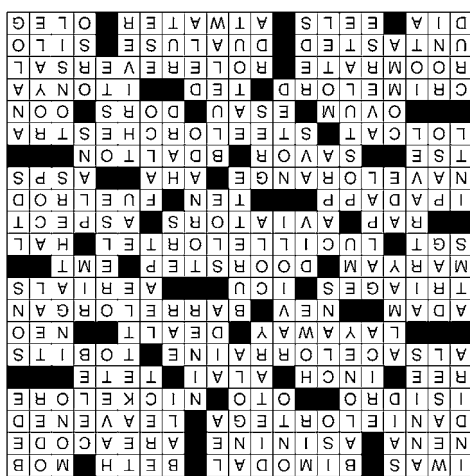

Snowbirds start up Mesilla shop

After five years of visiting, snowbirds Bob and Sandy White moved south permanently to Las Cruces a couple of years ago, when Bob's doctors told him the high altitude of their beloved home near Cuchara, Colorado, was bad for his health.

"We have two stores in Colorado, a couple running them," Sandy said. "We couldn't go home last summer because of COVID-19. He gets all antsy, and the doctors told him if you are so bored, open a store down there. So, he did."

The Whites opened their store in Mesilla Jan. 2. Bob turned 86 Jan. 11.

"They say that's what keeps him going," Sandy said.

The couple has had their two Colorado stores for 21 years, having opened them after they retired. Sandy was a medical assistant and Bob the director of a local Disabled American Veterans group.

The Cuchara stores are tourism based. The town is in south-central Colorado, about 40 miles northwest of Trinidad, near the San Isabel National Forest.

Their stores, including the one in Mesilla, Dakota Dukes Wild Coyotee, have a lot of tourism-related stuff but hold surprises for the locals, too.

And, while Sandy continuously brags on Bob and his doggedness, working seven days a week and keeping everything going, she keeps busy herself making much of

the jewelry at the store, including mask holders, glasses holders, earrings, hair clips, hair ties, necklaces, bookmarks and key chains, just for starters.

The store also sells t-shirts, sweatshirts, birdhouses, toys, essential oils, canes and handmade wooden bowls. There are goat milk soaps and lotions, CBD oil and salve, too.

"We invite anyone to compare our prices to others," Bob said.

Along one wall and around a corner, the unique and tasty products of The Amish Buggy out of Newton, Illinois, draws the eye and tickles the salivary glands.

"We have really been selling a lot of the Amish stuff," Bob said.

Along with some strange and intriguing

preserved goods in jars, like Chow Chow, bread and butter squash, boysenberry jam and corn relish, there are various brittles, chocolate-covered nuts, noodles and caramels in sea salt, vanilla and butter-rum flavors.

"Those noodles are fabulous," Sandy said of one of her favorite products.

"We've had these products for 21 years in Colorado, and their products are fantastic," Bob said. "I've known that company for a long time and never had one complaint about their products. People love it."

Bob said the main goal for him is customer service.

"That's how we do business," he said. "Customer service is 75 percent of any business. If you can't give customer service, you are doomed for failure. I just want to take care of the people of Mesilla, serve them our different products and serve them in any way we can."

He is hopeful the store carries the right kind of product, but is happy to adjust the stock.

"We may not have all the right things, but we will find them," he said.

Bob said he has too much to do yet with his life.

"I'm just getting started," he said.

The store is in a little plaza at 2470 Calle de Guadalupe, behind the Mesilla Valley Fine Arts Gallery, across from La Posta.

NMSU will host hemp production workshops

Following USDA approval of the New Mexico Department of Agriculture's state hemp-production regulatory plan in October 2020, New Mexico State University's College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences (ACES) Coop-

erative Extension Service (CES) has created a series of workshops to help stakeholders learn more about the emerging crop for agriculture producers statewide.

The first workshop will focus on research-based information and business advice about growing and processing hemp. CES and

ACES faculty will offer a virtual workshop, "Cultivating a Hemp Based Business in New Mexico: Production, Processing and Profitability," 9 a.m.-4:30 p.m., Thursday, Feb. 25.

"The goal of the workshop is to provide research-based information to anyone interested in de-

veloping a hemp business in the state," said NMSU Extension Los Lunas Agricultural Science Center Integrated Pest Management Specialist Amanda Skidmore.

NMDA representatives will present crop-regulation sessions during the morning of the workshop. Afternoon sessions will

focus on production, processing or business operations and marketing. Participants can select a session to attend the day of the event and will receive links to watch recordings from the other two sessions. After the event, registration will remain open for anyone who missed the workshop and

would like access to the recordings.

Presentations focusing on growing hemp will include cultivation, soil health, pest management, plant diseases and disorders, and processing options. Results from trials conducted across New

Dr. Joseph Goins, president of NS4ed, is working in partnership with the state on both projects and is a

long-time partner with The Bridge of Southern New Mexico. Thanks to the solid foundation of cross-sector relationships, career pathways and employer engagement built through the Workforce Talent Collaborative, the voices and

involvement of Doña Ana County will be key players in both projects.

For the curriculum project, each lesson will be available online to all schools in New Mexico. Accompanying actual explanations of various careers will be testimonial videos of real New Mexicans doing these jobs in high-demand, skilled and technical high-wage careers.

They will answer questions like:

- Where did you grow up, and what was it like growing up where you did? Do you have any interesting stories from your childhood that you think happened to you only because of where

you grew up?

- Thinking back to when you were in high school, what classes did you take that taught you skills you use today at your job or at home?
- What are any interpersonal or soft skills you have learned that you use at your job or at home? These could be anything from, "I arrive 10 minutes early because being on-time is the same as being late." Or "I listen twice as much as I speak, because I have two ears and one mouth for a reason."
- Do you need a certification or special license to do your job? How did you earn it?

What does your typical day at work look like? What do you do at work? What is your favorite part of your job? What part of the day do you look forward to the most?

Where do you see yourself in five years? What is the next step in your career? What is one thing you're doing right now to prepare for that next step?

For the second project, it's only just the beginning, but our partners in this county will work with the project team

on the initial design and testing. It helps address the issue that, as stated by the former head of the Association of Career and Technical Education, "Children cannot become what they cannot see."

Traditionally, career awareness began in high school or college. This project backs it up into the middle schools, the ideal time to start exposing students to a host of careers they may never even have dreamed of pursuing, mostly because they simply didn't know they existed.

The project will design a step-by-step progression of career awareness,

Christensen feted by Nusenda

The Nusenda Foundation has announced April Christensen, founder and program manager of the Kids Can youth entrepreneurship initiative, based out of the Community Action Agency of Southern New Mexico (CAASNM) in Las Cruces, as its quarterly financial-education innovator.

“For almost two years, Nusenda Credit Union and Nusenda Foundation have showcased New Mexicans who aim to increase economic mobility in their communities with innovative strategies to improve financial well-being,” said Nusenda Vice President of Community Relations Sara Keller. “April’s mission to help her dyslexic son embrace learning transformed into a program that teaches thousands of at-risk youth in southern New Mexico valuable skills in money management, business development, entrepreneurship and financial wellbeing.”

A strong financial education has been shown to have a positive effect on the economic wellbeing of individuals and their families and also predicts future healthy behaviors around savings, credit card usage, spending and risk, Nusenda said in a press release.

Prosperity Now, a national, public policy organization in 2018 ranked New Mexico 50th in income poverty and 46th in the number of households that don’t use traditional financial institutions, such as a bank or credit union, the release said.

The Nusenda Foundation, the release said, recognizes Financial Education Innovators who are working to buck these trends on a quarterly basis. Nominees are accepted year-round and can be from diverse backgrounds, such as community organizations, nonprofits, education and government sectors across New Mexico. Awardees receive \$5,000 from the Nusenda

Foundation to help develop or grow their initiatives.

Christensen comes from an entrepreneurial family — her father owned several businesses in northern California, which helped her develop a sense of community, and helped her become a problem solver. When her son was diagnosed with dyslexia, she started looking for options to help in his education.

“He’s so successful and intelligent, but I saw him struggling in school, because he learns differently,” she said. “I saw on Facebook a school in Dallas that held a fair with 100 kids who owned their own businesses. It was an epiphany. He really thrives in this arena, and I was 100 percent sure this was something I needed to do.”

Christensen took her idea to CAASNM CEO Dawn Z. Hommer, whose organization provides services to at-risk children and families across five counties in southern New Mexico. It is now part of

the organization’s pillars of service, which aim to creative thriving, equitable communities.

“Dawn’s support helped this program to really flourish by providing support and resources,” Christensen said. “She understood the impact this program would have on kids and families — giving them tools to succeed for a lifetime.”

Student entrepreneurs learn how to create a product line, how to pitch their product to customers, how to problem solve and how to properly manage finances so their businesses can succeed. With the help of parents and family members, students hold twice-a-year fairs at Las Cruces’ Downtown Plaza. Products range from paintings, greeting cards, keychains and jewelry to soaps and hand sanitizers — even a laser-guided marshmallow blowgun.

Parents and family members also are part of the program, the release said, helping to set up tents

for their own children, as well as other participants who may not have a strong support system.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, Christensen said her team took their program virtual, preparing thousands of science- and entrepreneur-based summer activity kits to keep teens across southern New Mexico engaged in learning. The program expanded into Grant and Sierra counties in January. Additionally, the program has created service-based programs, so teens can learn skills in babysitting, farming, yardwork, photography, contracting, cooking, mechanical and other skills.

Additionally, adult volunteers have helped the

young entrepreneurs with virtual business counseling, website and social media development to take their endeavors online.

“When all this started, I didn’t know what it meant, or what it would lead to. I didn’t set out to make this a national entrepreneur program, which is where I feel this is leading me,” Christensen said. “I’m a mother, and I knew my kiddo needed it — which meant others needed a program like this to thrive.”

To improve your game, manage the course

The term, “course management” is classic golf jargon and short for “managing yourself around the golf course for the best possible results.” Skillful and effective course management involves several things, but mainly it is about playing for position. You need to play shots that get you in the best position to make a good score, while avoiding hitting shots that wind up out of position. We must understand that golf course designers lay holes out with the most (and least!) desirable areas from which to play, thereby rewarding strategic play.

When you play for position, you’re playing shots that are going to make putting easier. Think of the greens on every golf course in terms of quadrants or sections. Most courses have a yardage book with a diagram of each green, often with numbered locations. (Our local courses do not yet have “greens books” per

se.) You can even make your own sketches of the greens as a reminder for where you want your ball to wind up.

In most cases, the desirable play is to the center, or the “fat,” of the green, which allows for slight misses right, left, short or long, while still giving you a reasonable putt at the hole. As you get better, your target can narrow, to where you can zero-in on one particular section of the green. Of course, there are places on the green which are desirable, and there are locations where you are “dead.”

A dead spot, for example, is where you are on the putting surface, but with so much fringe to traverse that you’d be better off chipping than putting. Another important factor to consider with aim to the green is a “false front” and fall-offs on the sides or the backs of the greens, similar to what they have at Red Hawk.

Regardless of your handicap, what you should be working toward is playing shots that get you in a place on the green where you have a good opportunity to make a putt. Also, please realize that the closer shot is not always the best shot, since you want mostly uphill putts, rather than roller-coaster downhill putts, that have three-jack written all over them. For Ben Hogan, course management meant giving himself an uphill ten-footer for birdie. Do that and you will score well!

Another aspect of adept course management concerns your estimate of the probability of success on a particular shot, which will largely dictate your final club choice and shot selection. Decisions on the golf course frequently involve risk versus reward, leaving you with options.

Let’s say you have 220 yards to the front of the green for your second shot on a par-five hole, but there is a pond you have to fly your ball over with

a carry of 200 yards. What to do? Well, how badly do you want (or need) a putt for eagle, compared to how much you would like to avoid a double bogey?

Golf lore is full of actual cases, like the scenario in the movie “Tin Cup.” And here’s where golf tends to reflect personality. In my case, I would rather avoid trouble than pull off a hero shot, but that’s just me, calculating the probabilities. Yet, for some, the occasional, rare rewards of a miracle shot are addictive, like a random big win at the casino.

For a lot of golfers, the most upsetting course management mistake is selecting the wrong club, mostly hitting too little club. You may think that you know the “right” club only after you’ve hit the shot. If you don’t use both a laser and a GPS unit to get the exact yardage, you’re playing with an additional handicap.

We all can do a better job of determining the best club to hit for the effective distance for where we want the ball to end up. Are you getting older, and hitting your average shot a bit

shorter? Are your misses mostly short of the green? When you regularly start hitting it long over the green, then you can adjust back to less club.

Here are three course management lessons in a nutshell: Don’t fire at tucked pins; never leave a 10 foot birdie putt short; and always take plenty of club.
