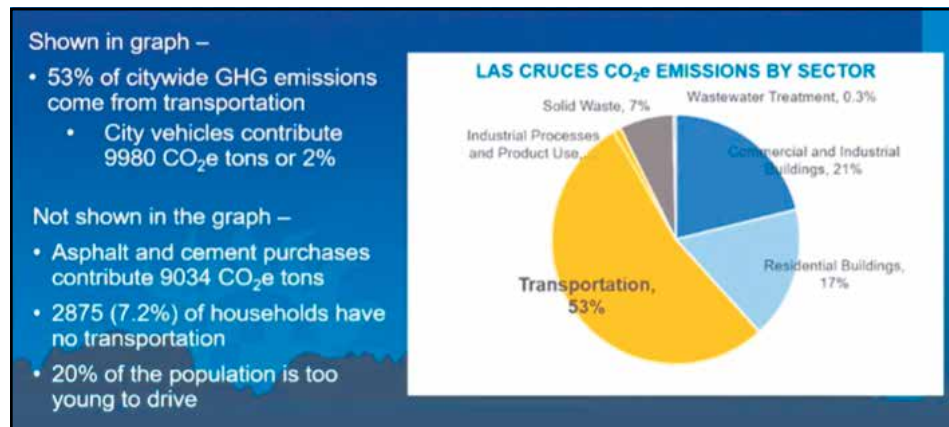

City to begin moving away from natural gas, toward zero-emissions fleet

Color the energy future of the City of Las Cruces greener than before.

At its April 5 regular meeting, the city council voted unanimously to begin transitioning city residents and businesses from natural gas to renewable energy resources, and to transition the city fleet to zero-emissions vehicles.

One resolution passed by the council means the city will begin a plan to phase out natural gas service during the next 30 years, said City Utilities Director Delilah Walsh.

During the transition, it will be essential for the city to ensure that existing natural gas service remains safe and affordable, Walsh told council members during the online meeting.

The city has owned and operated a natural gas utility for 85 years, the city said in a council action and executive summary of the resolution.

The resolution “is in line with our state government,” Councilor Gill Sorg said, including

a community solar bill passed by the 2021 New Mexico Legislature. “This is all coming together,” Sorg said. “We’re making a transition of our energy in this state and our city and, in fact, in the whole country.”

At the same time, “don’t be so alarmed right now about switching” from natural gas to renewable energy, Sorg said. “This is a long-term plan. It’s going to be a gradual transition over time.”

The council also unanimously passed a resolution to transition the city fleet to zero-emissions vehicles.

That transmission is necessary because 53 percent of citywide greenhouse gas emissions come from transportation, city Sustainability Officer Lisa LaRocque told the council.

As part of its support of the Paris Climate Agreement and the city’s sustainability action plans, renewable energy future resolution and climate action plan, the city’s goal is to have at least 50 percent of its fleet zero-emission by 2030, according to the

resolution.

The city will begin purchasing electric-powered vehicles in the coming fiscal year, as the city begins the transition, city Fleet Manager Richard DeWitt said. The city fleet has about 1,000 vehicles in it, LaRocque said.

The resolution also encourages the use of additional zero-emission transportation options like buses, electric bikes and vehicle-sharing services. It also calls for the installation of electrical-vehicle chargers and charging stations throughout the city.

“As we know, climate change is real,” Sorg said. “In the next five years, there will be a lot more charging stations.”

At the meeting, the council also accepted \$750,000 in state legislative capital outlay funds to pay for the construction and renovation of taxi lanes and the extension of runway 12/30 at the Las Cruces International Airport. Another \$720,000 in capital outlay funding will pay for road and drainage improvements on the East Mesa.

Water Conservation in Action with New Las Cruces Utilities NO-DES Truck

With the help of the U.S. Department of the Interior's Bureau of Reclamation (BOR) WaterSMART (Sustain and Manage America's Resources for Tomorrow) project, the City of Las Cruces (City) was awarded a grant for 50 percent of the cost for one of its newest additions: the NO-DES truck.

The NO-DES (Neutral Output Discharge Elimination System) truck and 20-foot trailer, which totaled \$524,907.00, allows Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) to do much less hydrant flushing, which cuts down on service interruptions to customers and is a more sustainable way to solve water quality issues while conserving water.

When attached to two hydrants, the NO-DES pump circulates water at desired flows in the opposite direction of the natural flow of the line being flushed. This action stirs up sediment and

scours the inside of the main, which is more effective than conventional flushing.

Another difference with flushing is that the water being flushed is maintained between the two hydrants so there is no possibility of contamination. Customers will not experience the temporary increase of red water – stirred up iron and manganese that is naturally found in the water supply.

BOR Project Manager John Irizarry came down to see the outcome of the WaterSMART grant in person. The crew was happy to show him both what comes out of the water and gets caught in the filters, and how the mechanisms on the truck work.

"When this project came up, I really wanted to see it happen," said Irizarry. "It's so important for smaller communities to get this help to remove barriers to

sustainable water management."

LCU Interim Deputy Director Water Ronald N. Borunda explained that there is a cost to the City for this process in addition to the water lost.

"Water flushed from the hydrants has been pumped, treated, and distributed at a cost to the utility," Borunda said. "The more we use the NO-DES, the less clean water is wasted."

He wants "to pursue a career in music on the side," Christiano said. His passion for music is something else he found at the Boys and Girls Club, even joining with some friends there to form a band.

Since middle school, Christiano has played bass and guitar, and said he also "dabbles in" keyboards. Christiano also sings and writes music in collaboration with a friend. He recently got a studio-level microphone and recording software.

Spring/summer water restrictions now in place

Citywide spring/summer water restrictions began April 1, the City of Las Cruces said in a news release.

With the restrictions in place, watering outside vegetation is prohibited 10 a.m.-6 p.m. every day.

The city watering schedule allows residents with even-numbered addresses to water outside vegetation during non-restricted hours Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. Residents with odd-numbered addresses are permitted to water Wednesdays, Fridays

and Sundays. No watering is permitted on Mondays.

The Las Cruces Utilities Department (LCU) Water Conservation Program (WCP) has a 24-hour, recorded voicemail hotline, 575-528-4444, to report water waste, including watering on the wrong day or time, water leaving the property or ponding on the property and/or not using a bucket and shut-off nozzle to wash vehicles or pavement. When calling, provide the date and time, along with the location or address of the infraction.

LCU plans 40 years in advance, continuing to

develop and maintain a sustainable water supply through a proactive conservation program using water from Mesilla Basin, Jornada del Muerto and the Rio Grande, according to the city website. LCU is a permitted water system and is allowed only a limited amount of water from the two aquifers, the website said, making water essential.

disprove that reality through mass incarceration have only served to highlight the deeply ingrained injustices in our court system based on race and class. We filled our jails and prisons, but people kept getting high.

Ninety years after government leaders came to the belated realization that they couldn't stop people

from drinking alcohol, government leaders now have come to the belated realization that they can't stop people from smoking pot.

New Mexico Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham was determined not to wait another year after watching legislation that had enough votes to pass this year die instead on the New Mexico State Senate floor when the clock ran out on this year's regular session.

Big, important bills like marijuana legalization al-

most never get voted down on the floor. It's a lot easier to just wait until noon on the final day, then explain that we just didn't have enough time this year. Maybe next year.

It is to the governor's credit that "wait until next year" was not an acceptable answer. With legislation passed in the March 30-31 special session, New Mexico will become about the last of the western states to legalize marijuana sales. There's a lot to learn from both the mistakes and successes other

states have had.

Digging: Your Rights and Responsibilities

Know what's below. Call before you dig.

New Mexico excavation law places certain responsibilities with the excavator (a person using a mechanical digging device) for preventing damage to underground facilities. The law provides for a one-call system that the excavator can use free of charge to arrange to have underground facilities located and marked before an excavation occurs.

State Law Requires Excavators to:

- 1) Plan your excavation.
- 2) Mark the excavation area in white.
- 3) Call before you dig.
- 4) Determine the location of any underground facilities.
- 5) Call the one call center if any facility is not marked to determine if it is "clear."
- 6) Preserve line location markings or provide offsets.
- 7) Expose any conflicts and maintain at least 18 inches of clearance from the horizontal mark and the edge of the mechanical digging device.
- 8) Support underground facilities during excavation as necessary.
- 9) Backfill in a careful manner.
- 10) Notify facility owners and 811 of any damage immediately.
- 11) Standard locate tickets are valid for 10 working days.

What Happens When You Call:

Once you provide the necessary information, the one call operator will confirm all pertinent details. It is your responsibility to ensure the information was properly recorded on the request. Likewise, faxed or on-line requests will be returned to you as confirmation, and it is your responsibility to immediately confirm the information is correct.

Escarbar: Sus Derechos y Responsabilidades
Entérese de lo que hay abajo. Llame antes de escarbar.

La ley de excavación de Nuevo México impone ciertas responsabilidades al excavador (Es una persona que utilice un artefacto mecánico para escarbar) para prevenir daños en las instalaciones bajo tierra. La ley provee un sistema de "una llamada" que el excavador puede utilizar sin costo para hacer arreglos para que le localicen las instalaciones bajo tierra y que estas sean marcadas antes de que la excavación ocurra.

La ley requiere que los excavadores hagan lo siguiente:

- 1) Planeé su excavación.
- 2) Llame antes de escarbar.
- 3) Marcar el área de excavación en color blanco.
- 4) Determine la ubicación de cualquiera de las instalaciones existentes bajo tierra.
- 5) Llame al centro de "una llamada" si alguna de las instalaciones no está marcada para determinar si es "seguro proseguir."
- 6) Conserve la ubicación de las líneas marcadas o proporcione la distancia/desvío.
- 7) Avise de cualquier conflicto y manténgase al menos 18 pulgadas al margen y de la orilla de algún artefacto mecánico para escarbar.
- 8) Apoye/conservar las instalaciones bajo tierra según sea necesario cuando este excavando.
- 9) Rellene con cuidado.
- 10) Avise a los dueños de las instalaciones y marque el 811 inmediatamente para reportar cualquier daño.
- 11) Las peticiones estándar (ticket) son válidas 10 días hábiles solamente.

Qué pasa cuando usted llama:

Una vez que usted proporcione la información necesaria, la operadora de "una llamada" le confirmará acerca de los detalles pertinentes. Es su responsabilidad asegurarse de que la información sea registrada adecuadamente en el documento de la petición. A sí mismo, mande por fax o por Internet su petición, se le mandará una confirmación, y es su responsabilidad corroborar de inmediato que la información es correcta.

details. Sometimes, as

with the recent voter suppression law in Georgia, the devil is the point of the bill. But in this the case with the New Mexico

marijuana bill, the devil is in the details, and there are lots of them.

Sponsors of the bill seemed intent on reversing two centuries of injustice with one piece of legislation. And while that may have been a noble effort, the result is a new law that falls short of the stated goal, which is to create an environment of responsible usage.

Responsible usage means adults only. And we can't achieve that without some kind of disincentive applied through law enforcement to both those who illegally provide cannabis to underage users, and to the users themselves.

Drafters of the bill explained that they didn't want mistakes made by teens to haunt them for the rest of their lives, which is understandable. But the legislation is so permissive toward juveniles that it almost ensures there will be widespread underage usage.

My hope is lawmakers revisit the legislation frequently in the years ahead, after listening to law enforcement, educators, employers, health officials and users about what is working well and what needs to be changed.

Hopefully, the experiences of neighboring states have dispelled some of the mythology about marijuana created by decades of misinformation from the federal government, which still classifies the drug as being more dangerous than cocaine, meth or fentanyl.

But there will be impacts to both public health and public safety that we need to be aware of and prepared for. There will be new challenges for employers that will differ from one industry to the next. And there will be a need for more drug treatment resources.

All of that should be pointed toward an ultimate goal of responsible usage.

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NMSU receives NASA engineering grant

New Mexico State University has been selected to receive a NASA Early Stage Innovations grant to conduct game-changing space technology research. NMSU's proposal was one of 14 university-led research proposals chosen to receive up to \$650,000 from NASA's Space Technology Research Grants program for up to three years.

Krishna Kota, associate professor of thermal sciences and energy in the NMSU Department of Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering, will lead the project to conduct fundamental research toward development of compact,

high-performance heat exchanger technology for cryocoolers intended for long-duration space missions. Mechanical engineering associate professor Sarada Kuravi and professor Vimal Chaitanya are co-principal investigators on the project.

"We are very pleased and proud of Dr. Kota and his team's accom-

plishment in their work on what NASA deems 'game-changing space technology,'" said College of Engineering Dean Lakshmi N. Reddi. "This research award stands among other recipients of NASA Early Stage Innovations research awards representing some of the nation's leading universities: Stanford University,

Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Johns Hopkins University, Texas A&M University and others. This is indicative of the high-quality of our faculty and our research programs and what we have to offer students here at the NMSU College of Engineering."

"Inventions such as infrared thermometers and invisible braces were collaboratively developed by NASA and industry for specific applications, and they are now being widely used in everyday life," Kota said. "Similarly, heat exchangers are used in numerous cooling and heating applications. For example, in cloud data centers, automobiles, air-conditioning units and

power plants, among others. Owing to their wide applicability, this research has the promise to make an impact beyond space and impact our everyday lives in the future. This project also will provide a valuable opportunity to train and nurture our students into becoming engineers and scientists who would contribute to our nation's space research."

This award is NMSU's first Early Stage Innovations grant since the program began in 2012.

"This research has the potential to make space heat exchangers lightweight and compact," Kota said. "At present, these heat exchangers are very bulky and large, but they are necessary for

enabling long-duration space missions beyond the low-Earth orbit. Compact heat exchangers will lower the cost of space missions. They will help in saving space and reducing the weight in the spacecraft, and these savings can be used for carrying other mission-critical components."

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Clemson 8 Challenge draws thousands of virtual marchers

The Clemson 8 Challenge, held March 21-28, as an offshoot of the White Sands Missile Range Bataan Memorial Death March, included 1,106 participants from 33 states and the District of Columbia, Germany, Great Britain, Guam and Bahrain, along with 19 high school JROTC programs from Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina, said Clemson University Assistant Athletic Director

John Seketa.

Each participating high school had to have at least eight members to compete, Seketa said, and some had more than that.

"I estimate the JROTC number to be at least 140," Seketa said. "This puts us over 1,242 (total participants), which is the number of days from April 9, 1942 (the first day of the eight-day death march in Bataan) until the end of the war."

Reaching or surpassing that number of participants was one of the goals for the 2021 challenge,

Seketa said.

"We raised \$22,264 by 457 donors through the on-line sign-up," he said.

With other donations to the Clemson University Foundation, this year's challenge achieved its fundraising goal of \$25,000, Seketa said. The money helps send Clemson ROTC cadets to participate in the memorial death march each year.

This year, because of the pandemic, it was a virtual race, with participants completing at least eight miles in eight days, walking, running or hik-

ing in their communities.

The challenge commemorates eight Clemson University graduates who survived the Bataan Death March, only three of whom survived the POW incarceration that followed. One of the eight, U.S. Army Col. Ben Skardon, who turns 104 in July, is a challenge par-

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Virtual Bataan Memorial Death March starts today

The 32nd annual Bataan Memorial Death March will be hosted virtually for the first time in event history. Marchers will be able to participate anytime Friday, April 9-Sunday, April 18.

The decision by White Sands Missile Range to host the event virtually allows leadership to keep COVID-19 safety the top priority for participants,



volunteers, staff and community supporters. It also gives participants the

flexibility to choose a date and route that works best for them, while honoring the memory of World War II heroes.

On April 9, 1942, tens of thousands of American and Filipino Soldiers were surrendered to Japanese forces and were forced to march more than 60 miles in scorching heat through the Philippine jungles. Thousands died and those who survived faced the hardships of prisoner-of-war camps.

The Bataan Memorial Death March is a challenging and grueling march that tests both mental and physical abilities. For the 2021 virtual experience, marchers are encouraged to choose a challenging stretch of road or trail in honor of the historical march. Marchers can choose between the full 26.2-mile marathon length or a 14.2-mile honorary distance.

The march officially

kicks off April 9, and participants may choose any day April 9-18 to complete their mileage. The march must be completed in one day. Returning marchers will find they will only need to select their distance for the 2021 march, as multiple categories are not necessary in a virtual environment. Event organizers still encourage participants to march in their own way, to include in uniform or with a "ruck" if desired

and safe.

The registration fee will include a Bataan marcher tee shirt, marcher bib, commemorative dog tag and participation medal.

As with all virtual fitness events, the march is based on the honor system. Event organizers will not be tracking finishing times, instead focusing on the memorial aspect of the event.

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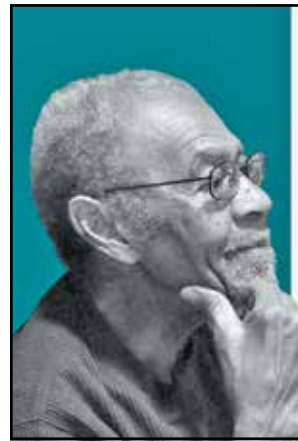

In honor of long-time Las Cruces educator Clarence Fielder, the Community Foundation of Southern Mexico (CFSNM) will match do-

nations up to \$2,500 to its new Equity and Inclusion Scholarship to “support further diversity, equity and inclusion in our scholarship funds while also lifting up the educational aspirations of African American students in

our community,” CFSNM said in a news release.

“Fielder (1927-2015) was a beloved teacher and advocate in the Las Cruces community,” CFSNM said. “He always believed that students should come first. Mr. Fielder was born in Las Cruces and was the grandchild of early African American pioneers, Daniel and Ollie Hibler. The Hiblers built Phillips Chapel C.M.E. Church, which served as a segregated school 1925-34. Clarence was educated at the segregated schools for Black

children in Las Cruces at the Booker T. Washington School (BTW) when it was just two tar-paper

shacks on the north side of town. Later he graduated from the newly built BTW, where all Black children attended grades 1-12. Mr. Fielder received his bachelor's degree from New Mexico A&M College, now known as New Mexico State University.”

Fielder’s “life was filled with many accomplishments, perhaps his biggest is the advocacy for preserving African American history and recognizing that while the past cannot be ignored, the future can be changed,” the

news release continued. The Equity and Inclusion Scholarship was created in 2020 to honor this philosophy. The fund is designed to support African American students from historically underrepresented backgrounds. The scholarship will start to be granted this year,”

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A TRIBUTE TO STAFF SGT ELIZABETH DURAN (AUGUST 3, 1964 – JANUARY 31, 2021)

Staff Sgt. Elizabeth Ann Duran served our country honorably in the U.S. Army from November 8, 1988 to April 6, 2008; a commitment she said she made to herself at the age of seven, that when she grew up she was going “to be a soldier like my father.”

Her father, SGT Richard L. Duran was killed in action in Vietnam in 1969 when she was five years old. Sadly, she does not remember him, but remembers the pain that his death brought to her family.

Soon after she joined the Army, she was deployed to the Persian Gulf War and from there to combat duty in Operation Enduring Freedom. A couple of close calls caused her to think that if anything happened to her in combat, her family would again go through the pain and turmoil experienced when her father was killed in action. That’s when she decided to end her active-duty service, but remain a U.S. Army Reservist for the remainder of her career. Some of her awards earned were the National Defense Medal/ 2nd Award, SW Asia Service Medal with 3 Bronze Stars, Armed Forces Service Medal, Army Service Medal, Overseas Service Medal, the Kuwait Liberation Medal and the Army Commendation Medal/2nd Award. Every soldier who completes Combat Basic Training is taught the Seven Army Values: Loyalty, Duty, Respect, Selfless Service, Honor, Integrity, and Personal Courage. Elizabeth took these lessons to heart and truly lived them every day.

I am the Chair of the Veterans Memorial Wall Committee. On our Veterans Wall, at the Veterans Park, at 2651 Road-

runner Parkway, we have over 8,000 names of the armed forces on the Wall who have served our country from Doña Ana County. Included are the names of a mother who served in the Persian Gulf War and her son who served in Afghanistan. We also have the names of sons and grandsons who followed the careers of their fathers and grandfathers to serve our country. Elizabeth’s name is listed on both the Persian Gulf War and the Iraq/Afghanistan panels and she is the only Gold Star daughter listed on the Wall.

I first met Elizabeth in 2012, when we started the Memorial Day Candlelight Ceremony at Veterans Park for the service members from Doña Ana

County who were killed in action. She shared with me that she wanted to light a candle for her father killed in action in Vietnam. She didn’t remember him she said, but we remember the sharp salute she gave her father after placing the lit candle on the Wall every year.

After fighting in two wars for our freedom, she lost her battle to cancer on January 31, 2021. Attendance at her funeral services on February 24, 2021 at St. Genevieve Catholic Church was limited in compliance with the COVID-19 pandemic; however, her lifelong friends and her Harley-Davidson brothers and sisters, all wearing masks, waited outside the church to escort the motorcycle carrying her remains for “one last ride” across the street to the San Jose Cemetery where the VFW Post 3242 members led their special ceremony. Military Honors were provided by the Marine Corps League, El Perro Diablo Detachment #478.

Our heartfelt condolences to her mother Anna McGrath, step-father Robert McGrath, brother Jeffrey McGrath, and Gold Star grandmother Manuela Duran.

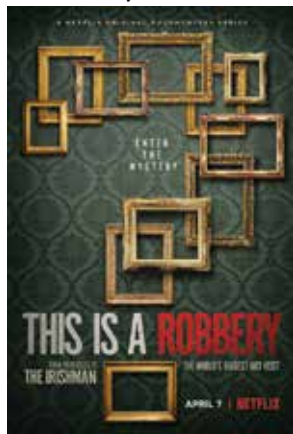

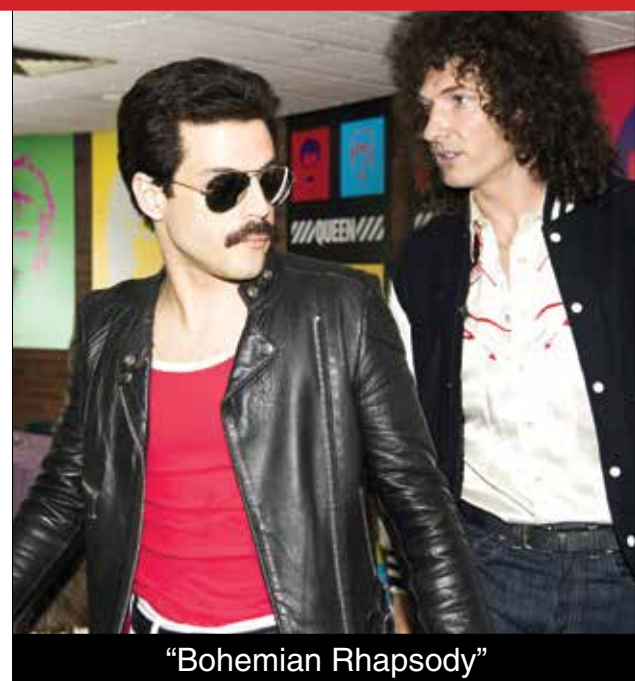

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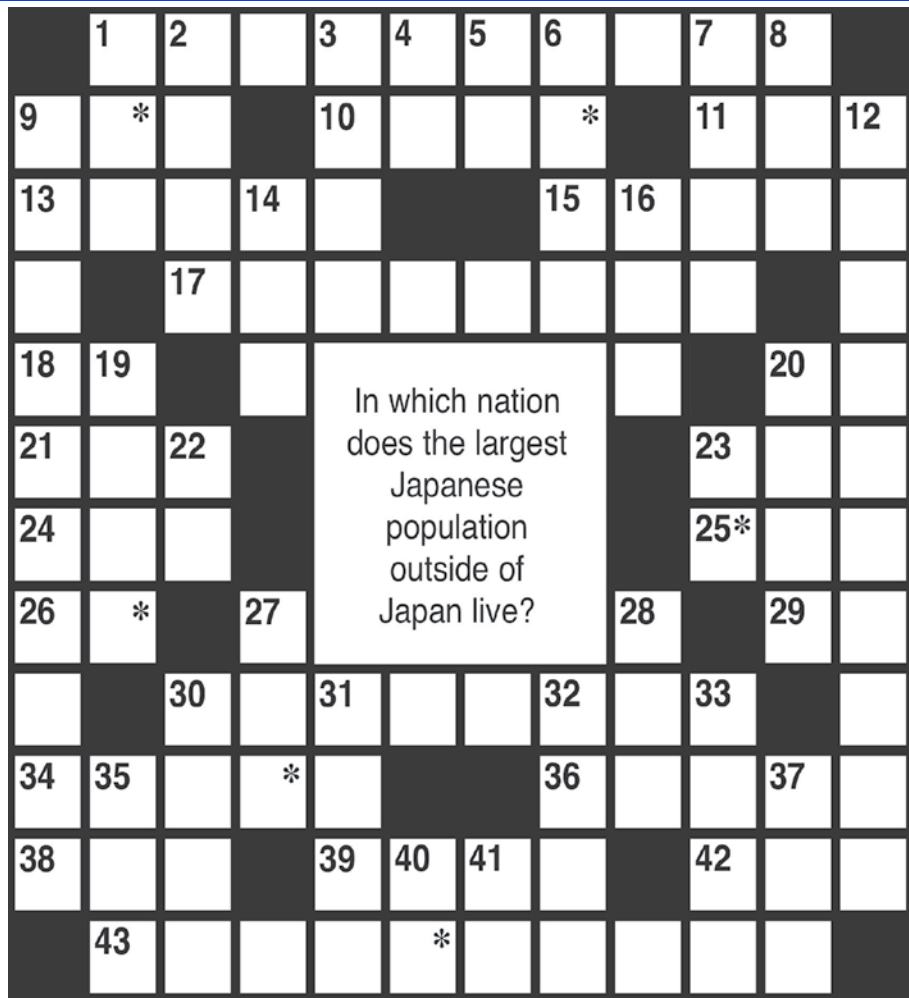

Rotarians deliver dictionaries to third graders

"Pandemic" is just one of the thousands of words third graders can look up in the new dictionaries they received from the Rio Grande Rotary Club, along with words like "generosity," "service" and "compassion."

The club has donated and delivered nearly 30,000 dictionaries — enough for every Las Cruces Public Schools third grader — since 2007. It didn't happen last school year for the first time in 15 years because of the pandemic, but club members figured a way around

COVID-19 this year.

On March 15, LCPS employees picked up two years of dictionaries (more than 3,400 total) and delivered them to all LCPS elementary schools "so that teachers could give the books to the students," said club member Gene Gant, who is a former member of the LCPS Board of Education and the state Public Education Commission.

"This is not the usual manner of doing the delivery but the only way that it could happen," he said, because of state public health orders.

The dictionaries the third graders receive "are not just words," Gant said. Each dictionary also has a small encyclopedia section that includes information about American presidents, the Declaration of

Independence, the states and more.

The project will happen again during the 2021-22 school year, Gant said.

"It is just hoped that we will be able to pull it off as we have in the past," he said.

That will mean 60-65 Rio Grande Rotary Club members will visit every LCPS elementary school to personally deliver the dictionaries and tell students about the Rotary Club's Four-Way Test and "its importance in the everyday lives of Rotarians and how it can be used in the lives of each student," Gant said.

Since that couldn't happen this year, the club created a video that will be available on YouTube explaining about the dictionary donation.

Engaging wildflowers: Explore the great outdoors by observing what grows naturally in southern New Mexico

It is easy to see the appeal of blazing orange desert poppies covering a vast foothill slope.

For many, this delightful sight might get the ball rolling. Poppies come and go. The question is, what else grows and blooms out there in southern New Mexico? It turns out that there are hundreds of blooming plant species that can be seen throughout the growing season from the low desert to the pine forests. These native wildflowers of New Mexico beg to be noticed.

“The resident plant species that evolved within, or naturally dispersed to, these regions are ‘native’ or ‘indigenous,’” Bob Sivinki said in “What Is a Native Plant?” “All of our native plants evolved here and have been subjected to long periods of natural selection. They are perfectly adapted to the climate and habitats of New

Mexico. Native plants are in balance with the ecosystem, provide cover and food for native animals and have developed a surprisingly diverse array of relationships with soil fungi and other native microorganisms,” Sivinki said.

You have to hit the trails to find wildflowers in bloom. All trails in the Organ Mountain Desert Peaks National Monument (OMDPNM) provide good access to wildflower viewing. One approach is to let yourself be surprised by what you find on a hike. Another is to look specifically for spring flowers, mainly in March and April, or summer flowers that come with summer rains in July and August.

Sadly, the spring of 2021 has been second-rate for wildflower output. Inadequate rainfall during the winter and early spring is to blame. Maybe the coming summer will bring more moisture. We could all use it!

loaded with scrumptious photos, maps and flower profiles. The guide covers 40 hikes in New Mexico. Most of the meticulously described hikes are in the northern half of the state, or in higher-elevation areas. Included from our neck of the woods are the Pine Tree Trail and the Baylor Canyon Pass Trail in OMDPNM.

Many wildflowers are relatively easy to find because their colorful flower petals are perfect

attention-getters. For example, it is effortless to realize from the road that the time to see blooming claret cup cacti is April. However, it pays to slow down and discover many exquisite, diminutive plants that hide in cracks, under bushes and in grasses. A hand lens or magnifying glass will reveal the structure of the flower, and often also the insects that visit or live

As you become a more experienced observer of native flora, you will learn which plants assemble in communities, or which plants prefer higher elevations. Hiking in the Organ Mountains will demonstrate which plants you are more likely to see on the western slope as opposed to the cooler east-

ern slope.

Photograph your finds

with a smart phone. More satisfying still is the use of a camera with a macro lens or macro-lens setting, which will reduce your field of view to a few inches, thereby excluding anything that might distract from a flower portrait. Many people use the app "iNaturalist" to share their wildflower photos.

The old-fashioned way to identify blooming native plants is to acquire a field guide. Here are two books that hopefully are still available: "Northern Chihuahuan Desert Wildflowers," by Steve West, and, because a number of Sonoran Desert wildflowers spill over into the Chihuahuan Desert, "Sonoran Desert Wildflowers," by Richard Spellenberg.

The Native Plant Society of New Mexico (NPSNM) is an invaluable resource for anybody who

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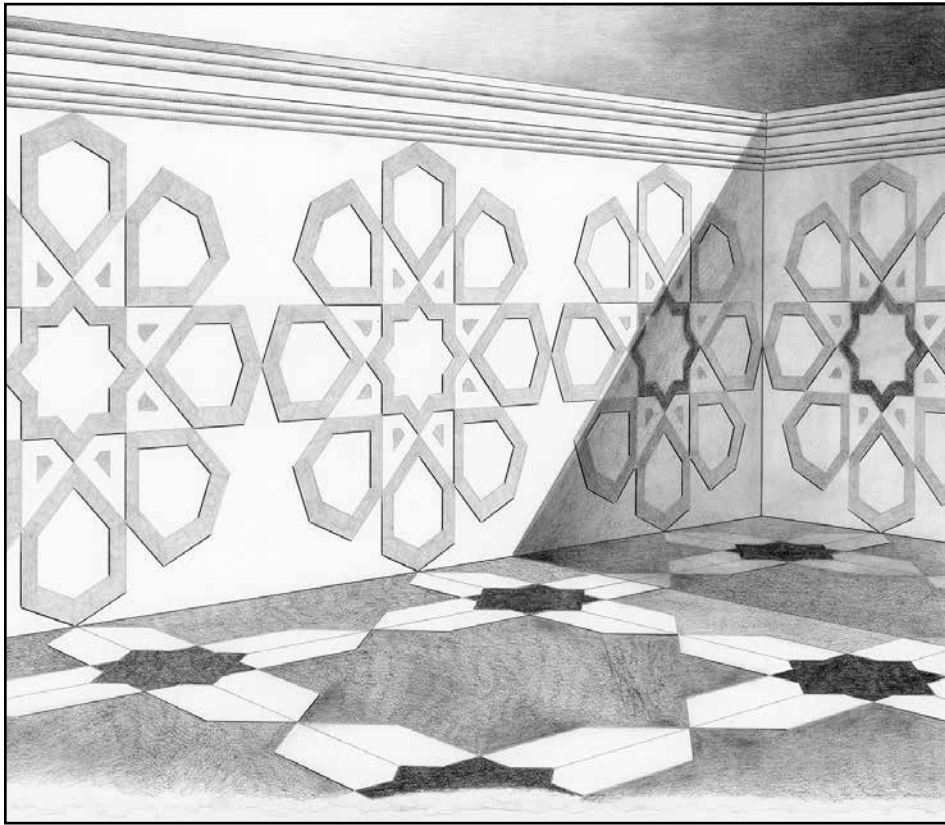

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April ALR presentations focus on Reconstruction

The New Mexico State University Academy for Learning in Retirement (ALR) will host four Zoom presentations in April by NMSU Department of History professor Jamie Bronstein. Her topic will be "Reconstruction: America's Missed Opportunity."

Bronstein earned a Ph.D. in history from Stanford University in 1996, when she was hired by NMSU.

Bronstein is the author of five books, most recently "Two Nations, Indivisible: A History of

American Inequality" (2016), and numerous articles, including most recently "Big Trouble in Little Texas: The Chicano Movement in Southern New Mexico" (New Mexico Historical Review, 2020).

Zoom sessions will begin at 10:30 a.m. Audience members may log in via Zoom at 10 a.m.

Bronstein's ALR presentations will be:

- Tuesday, April 13: "Reconstruction in Myth, Memory and History."

This lecture will give a brief overview of Reconstruction and the way in which the period was re-

membered, mythologized in popular culture (as in the 1915 silent film "Birth of a Nation") and written about by historians from the Dunning School of thought (circa 1900-30) forward.

- Thursday, April 15: "Forty Acres to Sharecropping: The Economics of Reconstruction." This lecture will explore the shortcomings of post-Civil War provisions for the formerly enslaved in the realms of landownership and education, the rise of sharecropping and similarities to and differences from slavery and the im-

pact on wealth inequality then and since.

- Tuesday, April 20: "Citizenship and Terrorism: The Politics of Reconstruction." This lecture will focus on the meaning of the Civil War Amendments (13th, 14th and 15th) to the U.S. Constitution, the accomplishments of integrated postwar legislatures and the violent backlash by white Americans who felt threatened by these changes.

- Thursday, April 22 – "The Jim Crow South and the Price of Failure." This lecture will assess Southern or "Redeemer" Recon-

struction, the Jim Crow South, lynching and the long-term consequences of the failure of Reconstruction to confront issues of racial inequality.

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Talking stories offer character in traditional tales

The Lascaux caves in southern France are the oldest known signs of storytelling. “A 36,000-year-old painting in the Chauvet cave,” according to a 2018 article in NewsArtnet, “is thought to tell the story of a volcanic eruption.”

Perhaps cave paintings were like PowerPoint presentations: graphics to amplify the story being told, and notes that served as visual reminders to tell that story again next winter when the community retreats into the cave once more. Maybe it served as a test question for youngsters preparing to be storytellers themselves.

Stories have been foundational to the cohesiveness of every culture.

Sitting together listening to familiar stories increases a sense of connection and conveys shared values, history and cultural norms. Storytellers have been essential conveyors of shared history and genealogy, answering questions about creation, life and the afterlife.

The Agta people are hunter-gatherers descended from the first colonizers of the Philippines 35,000 years ago. According to research published in “Nature Communications,” their storytellers are more popular than even the best foragers, have greater reproductive success and are more likely to be cooperated with by other members of

the camp.

Griots in sub-Saharan Africa perform the functions of storyteller, genealogist, historian and ambassador. Historically, this profession was hereditary. Now there are griot schools for formal training in storytelling.

The native Hawaiian word for story “mo’olelo,” also means history, legend and tradition.

As groups grew and spread out, the story tellers kept them connected. Medieval troubadours and Irish seanchaí spread the news and recited ancient lore, tales of wisdom and adventures of kings and heroes. All over the world, Jewish families retell the biblical story of Exodus every spring in a ritual known as the Passover seder.

Stories spark imagina-

tion, inspire and pass on the group’s cultural values to the next generation. When people feel connected to characters in stories, their brains release oxytocin, the “love” hormone, increasing compassion and kindness toward each other. Stories develop communications skills. Listening strengthens the brain’s ability to focus and concentrate.

We depend on science and facts for so much of our information that it is easy to forget the power of stories to reshape our perceptions. The role of stories in the future of our species is unknown, but the present struggle between facts and stories in current events could be predictive. In her book, “The Influential Mind,” neuroscientist Tali Sharot argues that story is one of

the most powerful influences on our behavior.

“Facts alone,” she writes, “overlook the core of what makes us human; our fears, our desires, our prior beliefs. To make a change we must tap into those motives, presenting information in a frame that emphasizes common beliefs, triggers hope and expands people’s sense of agency.”

If cave paintings were the PowerPoint presentations of old, perhaps Zoom meetings in the time of social distancing are the modern equivalent. Children’s Reading Alliance is offering “Talking Stories/Cuentos que hablan” for families via Zoom to promote character and social justice through traditional tales. (Talking Stories/Cuentos que hablan is made possible by the New

Mexico Humanities Council, the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Las Cruces Bulletin.)

On April 16, Michael Mandel will tell Jon Scieszka’s “True Story of the Three Little Pigs by A. Wolf,” which is suitable for families with school-age children. In May, Carlos Aeves and Lucia Carmon combine story and music in Spanish and English to share the native American fable “How the Raven Got a Crooked Nose.”

Aggie Cupboard continues with food assistance for NMSU community; donations welcome

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, the lack of groceries available in stores for the community and an increase in unemployment rates, especially in households that went from one source of income to no income, brought an increased need for Aggie Cupboard emergency food program at New Mexico State University.

Aggie Cupboard remains open and continues to provide food for students, faculty and staff. It

is an on-campus service department within the Aggie Health and Wellness Center that provides students and staff with free supplementary food assistance.

Aggie Cupboard’s Mobile Food Pantry (MFP) provides another resource for assistance on campus. With the support

of the Roadrunner Food Bank and the Casa de Peregrinos emergency food program, MFP offers perishable food items once a month.

While the need has decreased, Aggie Cupboard is still helping more individuals than the semesters prior to the pandemic, when the numbers were 70

to 80 individuals per week.

Aggie Cupboard, 906 Gregg St. on the Las Cruces campus, is open for food distribution 11 a.m.-1:30 p.m. Tuesdays and 3-6 p.m. Thursdays. Once a week, students, faculty and staff may pick up non-perishable items with a valid Aggie ID.

MFP distribution is at the southwest corner of Preciado Park noon-2:30 p.m. the fourth Tuesday of every month. The park is located on the Las Cruces campus of NMSU, between Stewart and Gregg streets and between Sweet

and Williams avenues.

Aggie Cupboard has limited its capacity to four people at a time because of the pandemic and encourages social distancing at the pantry and MFP. Volunteers have made boxes to help distribute food more easily and to limit the number of people touching food. In addition, Aggie Cupboard ensures the sanitation of the facility with the help of NMSU’s Facilities and Services.

Aggie Cupboard accepts donations of non-perishable foods as well as toilet-

ries. The most needed item is evaporated milk, Nuñez said. The organization also accepts monetary donations, which can be made at <https://mas.nmsu.edu/project/2816>.

Additionally, participating Chick-fil-A restaurants in Las Cruces and El Paso will donate 50 percent of the proceeds from chocolate chunk cookie purchases to the student emergency funds at NMSU and UTEP during the month of April.

Casa de Peregrinos met COVID-19 challenge in 2020; expanding in 2021, 2022

“The COVID epidemic has drastically exacerbated food insecurity, nationwide and in our own community,” Casa de Peregrinos (CdP) emergency food program of Doña Ana County said in its 2020 annual report.

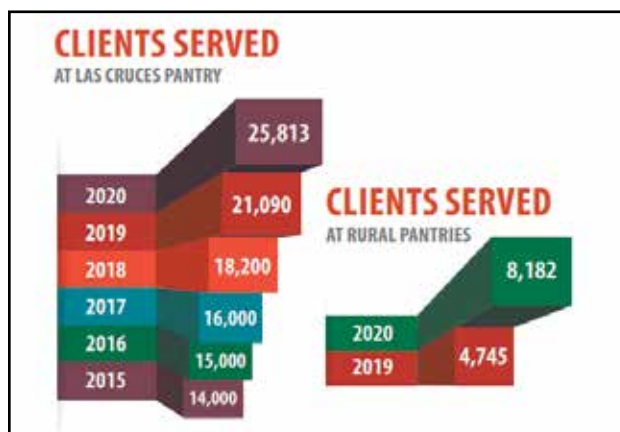
Food insecurity rose from a five-year national average of 11-12 percent to 38 percent nationwide in March and April 2020, the report said. 54 million people could be food insecure because of the pandemic, including 18 million children, CdP said. That includes a four percent increase in New Mexico.

CdP has “significantly changed its operational models” to maintain the health and safety of its staff, volunteers and clients, the report said.

The pandemic caused the cancellation of major CdP fundraising events in 2020, and the CdP saw its Food Rescue Program drop to less than half the normal 35,000 pounds of food it collected each week, resulting in an ongoing expense of more than \$6,000 per week to make up difference, the report said.

“By the year’s end, CdP had spent over \$430,000 on food purchases, compared to just over \$187,000 in 2019,” CdP said.

Here are some additional



CdP statistics from 2020:

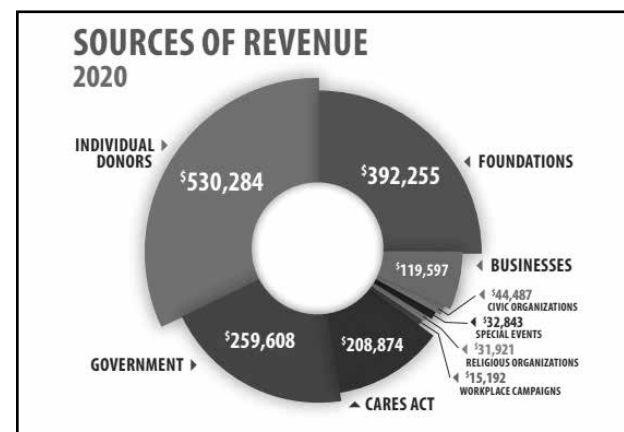
- CdP distributed more than 4.7 million pounds of food, compared to 3.8 million pounds in 2019.
- CdP served more than 35,000 individual clients, an increase of more than 5,000 (16 percent) as compared to the three previous years.
- CdP saw an increase of almost 75 percent in families coming to its pantries in rural parts of the county.
- CdP served more homeless clients in September 2020 than it did in all of 2019.
- CdP distributed almost 3,000 more food baskets in 2020 than it did in 2019.

“Even in the midst of the pandemic, CdP remained committed to providing healthy, nutritious food to families experiencing a financial crisis,” CdP Executive Director Lorenzo Alba Jr. said. “Our doors remained open to all those in need,” Alba said, noting that no one was turned away in 2020 or placed on a waiting list to receive food.

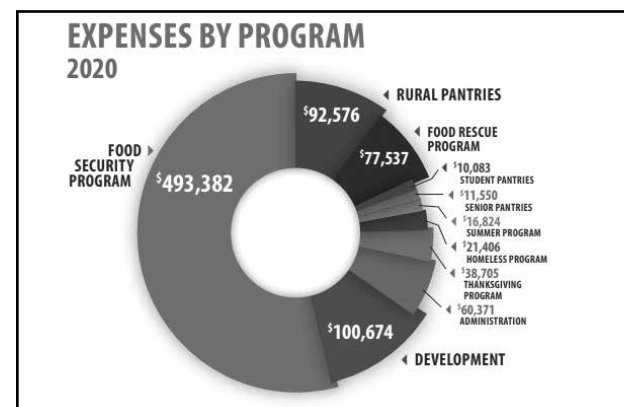
For example, CdP partnered with other local organizations to distribute more than 3,800 holiday baskets at Thanksgiving. That compared to 3,672 baskets in 2019 and 1,300 in 2016, the report said.

Also in 2020, the number of participants in CdP’s Hunger Strike fundraiser quadrupled from 2019, raising \$30,665, an increase of more than \$6,000 over the previous year.

CdP increased its services in Sunland Park, where it serves an area with a 46.2 percent poverty rate, more than twice the rate for Doña Ana County as a whole. With a grant from Con Alma Health Foundation and a partnership with the Southern New Mexico Project, CdP distributed 200 food baskets a month throughout 2020, using a site provided by the City of Sunland

Park.

Also in 2020, the City of Las Cruces purchased the former Horse N Hound building in front of the Mesilla Valley Community of Hope campus that includes CdP, to serve as CdP’s warehouse, pantry and food distribution center. CdP’s current 4,000-square-foot facility was designed in 2003 to distribute 500,000 pounds of food annually.

With its food distribution now approaching 10 times that amount, the new facility will allow CdP to increase the amount of food it stores and distributes, Alba said, and will add a teaching kitchen. A ribbon cutting is planned for June 2022, Alba said. CdP has committed \$200,000 from its 2021 budget to begin a capital campaign, “Hope

for Tomorrow,” to improve the new facility.

In 2020, volunteers recorded 9,016 hours at CdP pantries and through board and community service, the report said, which is the equivalent of 4.3 full-time employees with a value of more than \$175,000.

“We’ve come so far from our roots at a kitchen table in La Mesa, and from my first week as director (June 2011) when we served 38 families and ran out of food on Friday,” Alba said.

CdP office hours are 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday and by appointment Tuesday and Thursday.

Citizens celebrates 50th, plus one

The founders, board members and staff members of Citizens Bank have always prided themselves on forward thinking.

So perhaps it's fitting the book they created commemorating the bank's golden anniversary is titled "The First 50 Years." It leaves little doubt they are planning to be around another half-century.

Citizens Bank opened in April 1970, 51 years ago. The bank had 50th anniversary plans slated for 2020, but just like so many other activities, they were postponed by the pandemic.

Over those first 50 years, the bank grew from its one original location, in the historic Amador Hotel, to its current number of eight locations. The bank has grown from \$4.4 million in assets the first year, in 1970, to more than \$613 million in assets in 2019.

When the bank launched operations in the Amador Hotel it soon adopted the "El Cortijo" as its symbol representing a marketplace. This symbol depicts the sun radiating to neighboring communities surrounding the central area of trade. The bank's founders chose the symbol because they viewed the responsibility of the bank as being the heart of the community, providing

needed financial services to communities it served.

Another key part of the bank's growth has been its technological advances through the years.

Remember in 1999, when everyone was worried about computers crashing at the end of the millennium? Or maybe you haven't thought about it since Jan. 2, 2000, when it became clear the world wasn't coming to an end. Part of that becoming a non-event was the diligence of large institutions making proper preparations.

Citizens Bank was right there, too, and began testing data processing in 1998. The bank promoted its readiness with posters and advertisements pronouncing "We're A-OK for Y2K!"

And while Citizens Bank has long seen technology as an important tool, the bank was founded on the principles of taking care of people.

The initial marketing slogan for the bank was "Modern Banking in the Old Friendly Tradition."

Tom Hutchinson, the bank's board chair since 2008, said the bank doesn't add technology for technology's sake,

but adds it when it can enhance the bank's efficiency and improve the customers' experience.

"Because we don't live in a big city, we're able to watch the banking industry reinvent itself, without having to be a national leader in it," Hutchinson said. "We recognize technology is changing daily, but we've been smart and strategic in changing it where it makes most sense for our community and our customers."

Jed Fanning, Citizen Bank's current president/CEO, added to Hutchinson's comments.

"Even with technology and tools and social media and all the things people use to communicate, banking is still very much a people business, and that's what Citizens Bank has done a good job of preserving — the people part," Fanning said. "Technology has brought an additive to help us provide even more cus-

tomized and personalized service to what we call relationship banking, but it's not at all a replacement."

The pandemic year presented another challenge for Citizens Bank to help its customers with something new and unfamiliar, yet invaluable for many businesses.

"The Paycheck Protection Program is a good example where we had to utilize technology in the form of a portal with the Small Business Administration (SBA). The most important part was simple but necessary communication with our customers," Fanning said.

An application bottleneck with the SBA resulted in many applications nationwide getting kicked out of the system. So Citizens figured out an alternative way of processing that involved expanding the work day.

"Executive Vice President Tim Hargrove spread our workload over

more hours," Fanning said. Staff staggered their schedules so the work was getting done from as early as 4 a.m. to as late as 8 p.m. This enabled Citizens to better conquer the PPP learning curve.

"It also enabled us to support our customers and many other businesses who weren't getting the service they needed," Fanning said. "I'm particularly proud of our team; it was brand new for our team members as well as our customers, but what didn't change was the value of our personal interactions."

Hutchinson and Fanning represent another thing on which Citizens Bank prides itself: continuity.

In the 51 years of Citizens Bank, Hutchinson is just the fifth board chair, and Fanning is just the seventh president/CEO.

"I'm so proud we have stayed locally owned," Hutchinson said. "Es-

pecially in a time when banks are constantly changing names. I love the way the bank has adjusted and evolved over time, and continued to meet needs of community. We just don't make a lot of guesses. We have a lot of smart, hard-working people who are also very loyal, as evidenced by the number of people who have been with the bank for a long time. When you walk in the doors of Citizens Bank, you'll find it's very customer oriented, service oriented, and the people have a can-do attitude. We find a way to make it work."

"And it's not just the end result that we get for our customers," Fanning said. "In my mind it's so much around how we get there. That 'how' has everything to do with relationship banking, and how we personalize things for the customer. It's what makes us enjoy getting up in the morning and coming to work."

Home Builders to break ground on fifth Casa for a Cause (formerly Anniversary House)

Former Las Cruces Home Builders Association (LCHBA) President Kimball Hakes wanted to do something to benefit the community as the association celebrated its 55th anniversary in 2014.

So, Hakes Brothers home builders built LCHBA's first Anniversary House that year, with contractors and subcontractors either donating time or materials or providing them at cost. Once the house was built, its sale resulted in \$64,000 in profit, which was donated to Doña Ana County nonprofits.

Three more houses have been built as part of the program: Veloz

Homes built a house in 2015, generating \$82,000; Arista Development was the builder in 2017, raising \$74,000; and Desert View Homes built the house in 2018, generating \$125,000 in profit, LCHBA Executive Officer Nicole Black said.

Collectively, the houses have generated \$345,000

for local nonprofits.

Local home builders also began the LCHBA Aggie Builder Endowed Scholarship at New Mexico State University in 2014, Black said.

This year's builder, Adam Juarez, owner of A New Beginning Custom Homes of Las Cruces, has a goal of at least \$125,001

in profit, Black said.

Ground will be broken at 10 a.m. Tuesday, April 13, on the fifth LCHBA house, which, for the first time in 2021, is called Casa for a Cause.

The three-bedroom, two-bath house will be built on a corner lot at 3029 Little Creek Court in the Diamond Springs

Subdivision, Black said, on land partially donated by Las Cruces developer Eddie Bins, one of the founders of LCHBA.

Juarez may already have a buyer for the house, she said.

Black said construction will be completed on the house by September so it can be included in LCHBA's Showcase of Homes. She said awards to nonprofits from the sale of the house will likely be made in late September or early October.

All nonprofits in Doña Ana County can apply to be included among those receiving funds from this year's profits, Black said. The application process will open April 13.

Monetary donations as well as donations of

supplies are welcome for the project not only from homebuilders, but also from the community — "anybody who would like to give to this cause," Black said.

"We're so excited," she said, noting that LCHBA already has builders lined up for Casa for a Cause to continue in 2022 and beyond.

"It's a good feeling for us here at LCHBA," she said. "We are a nonprofit and we are able to give back to other nonprofits."

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Nuggets of wisdom from Coach Wimberly

Herb Wimberly served as the Aggie men's head golf coach for 31 years, retiring in 1994. Some of the notable golfers who played for Herb "back in the day" are Rich Beem, Larry Beem (Rich's late dad), Bart Bryant, Steve Haskins, Tom Byrum and Tom's brother, Curt

Byrum. Curt has been an analyst for The Golf Channel for several years.

As a player, Herb was a standout at the University of New Mexico. Over his long span of years competing in professional events in the Southwest, Herb won dozens of tournaments, including the 1974 Sun Country Match Play Championship, the 1960 and 1962 New Mexico Opens, the 1960 Hilton Open and the 1987 Senior-Junior Team Championship with his late brother, Guy. Not long after retiring from coaching, Herb was inducted into the College Golf Coaches Hall of Fame.

I met Herb within a few days after moving here

to Las Cruces in August 1988. Herb greeted newcomers in the old pro shop at the NMSU golf course in a manner as if he had known you for a long time.

"There aren't any new friends, just good friends I'm meeting for the first time," he said once.

It wasn't until later that I found out more fully why the young men who played golf for Herb regarded him almost as a god, not so much because of how he coached, but more so how he handled himself with and around others. A true professional and a gentleman golfer.

In addition to being a stellar college golf coach, Herb was an extraordinary golf teacher. As a PGA instructor, Herb had given golf lessons to countless thousands of adults, kids and NMSU students (in golf classes) over the years. So, I thought I would share some of the nuggets of wisdom and unique in-

sights Herb passed on to the people he taught.

One of the main things Herb emphasized is that "the swing is basically easy, but the game itself is hard." That was meant to put beginners and struggling golfers at ease. By grasping the few fundamentals of the swing — grip, posture, backswing, body movement and release — everyone can strike the ball with a reasonable shot. The other parts of the game — chip shots, shots from sand bunkers and putting — are more difficult to master. For golfers who play regularly but have difficulty scoring and hitting consistently solid shots, Herb advised that "developing a better golf swing necessarily involves a process of change."

That's essentially what

folks attended our performance golf schools to learn. Herb and I conducted over 100 two-day golf schools, helping some 1,500 golfers over the years.

If you think about it, the golf swing doesn't remain static. Otherwise, icons like Tiger Woods and Phil Mickelson wouldn't have swing coaches and wouldn't continually be tweaking their swings, always searching for improvement. As a corollary to the principle of change, Herb tells us that "the more uncomfortable you feel when making a swing adjustment, the more you know you're changing." He says that a comfortable feeling with the golf club (like a big bend of the lead arm) is not really the correct feeling.

When it comes to the short game, Herb notes that chipping and short pitching strokes "represent the full swing in miniature." What he means is that the very same fundamentals apply to small strokes as they do to full strokes. "Ball contact positions for the full swing and the short swing are (basically) the same." Herb understood that putting was really "a game within a game," but that it required most of the same fundamentals. One of those basics that we all need to be reminded of is that "your head stays behind the ball as you accelerate at impact."

One thing I have learned from Herb Wimberly over the 30-plus years I have known him is to not get discouraged. Herb has faced plenty of adversity in his golf and personal life, but he is a resilient person seeing the brighter side. His perspective on golf is very telling: "There are no style points on the card; just get it in the hole in the fewest strokes possible any way you can."
