RETURN TO THE WILD: BOBCAT RESCUED & RETURNED

Doña Ana County collaborated with the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish, and El Paso Electric Company to rescue a bobcat from atop an electrical pole Tuesday evening.

Residents in the Topaz Road area sighted the wild animal at the top of an electric pole and notified authorities and the electric company. Because the cat was stuck and in a precarious location, among live electrical wire, residents' concerns and various other factors, a rescue strategy was needed.

"The county recognized that this situation was an ongoing public safety concern. The bobcat did not seem interested in leaving its perch or was too scared to do so," said County Manager Fernando R. Macias.

To assist state wildlife officials and EPE, the county deployed its Facilities and Parks Department bucket truck, along with employees Andy Segovia and Victor Uranga, to operate the machinery on-site.

Around 4:30 p.m., EPE officials notified the county that they would de-energize the electrical wire in the immediate area after 5:00 p.m., a critical measure to rescue the bobcat. County and Mesilla Valley Regional Dispatch Authority staff quickly worked together to notify area residents via social media and emergency alert channels. The necessary outage lasted for less than an hour; and impacted 42 customers, by 5:45 p.m. all power was restored.

"This level of coordination and support from all entities involved to safely rescue this bobcat really exemplifies our partnership and passion we each share for our community and the customers we serve," expresses El Paso Electric CEO Kelly Tomblin.

"The operation went well, especially considering how quickly it came together," said Sgt. Chris Ortega from the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish. "I'm humbled by the number of people that were willing to assist our department in our efforts to safely remove the animal. The level of interest from the public was outstanding and demonstrates the combined passion individuals have in the protection of wildlife in our state."

On Wednesday, Ortega released the critter in the remote Lake Valley area near Hillsboro in the Gila National Forest. He reported that the bobcat's future consists of abundant food sources and vast rugged terrain to relish.

The New Mexico Department of Game and Fish strongly urges the public to avoid approaching wildlife or getting too close. Advancing towards wildlife is dangerous and causes additional stress on the animal. For assistance with wildlife related issues, the public can call their office at (575) 532-2100. 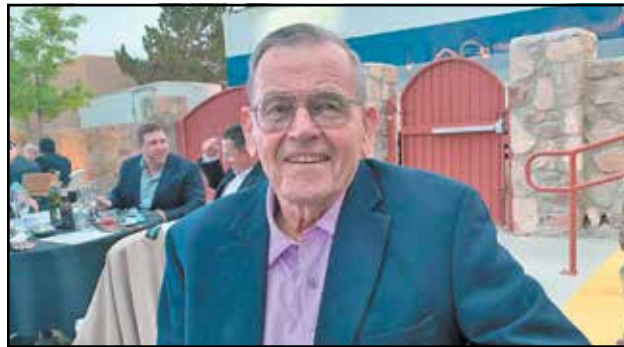

Cleaning Up Our Recycling

Over the past year, it's likely that recycling may not have been a priority. However, you might have had plenty of Amazon boxes that ending up in your blue bin. But, did Styrofoam from curbside pickup or a greasy pizza box end up there too? That's contamination that decreases the quality of our recycling, and it's a problem that takes everyone to solve.

Our desert home is not a wasteland, but a balanced ecosystem that can be disrupted. Recycling is a crucial part of ensuring environmental sustainability. “It's one piece of the waste management puzzle, not a cure-all program,” Patrick Peck, director of South Central Solid Waste Authority, said.

While landfills are a part of the waste management process, they are not ideal. “We know that burying all trash is not the way of the future,” Peck said. “There are issues with landfills creating greenhouse gases and microplastics. Every piece of recyclable plastic we can remove from an inert process in the landfill – and instead captured to be reused

– is part of being responsible with our environmental stewardship,” Peck said. More than ever, it's up to everybody to double-check what goes into their blue bin: are your items on the acceptable list? Check www.SCSWA.net to be sure you know what's recyclable. Is what you're throwing in clean, dry, and free of food contamination?

Double-check that plastic bottles (and rigid plastics); aluminum, steel, and tin cans; and milk and juice cartons are rinsed and dry. Just one swish of water in a milk jug is all we need. Make sure cardboard is flattened.

End users — individuals or businesses repurposing what you recycle — must have the cleanest recycled material possible to

rework it into its next life cycle. Home and business recyclers can bump up the quality in their blue bins: Be mindful. You are recycling materials to be made into something new and clean recyclables are critical.

Residents are reminded to follow the guidance on their blue bins for a statewide initiative called “Know What to Throw.” Quick tips include:

- Do not bag recyclables
- Recyclables must be clean, dry, and loose in the blue bin
- No cords
- No electronic waste
- No Styrofoam
- No food waste that can ruin an entire load of recyclables

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Playing Batman in the 'atomic' car

Thanks to Sisbarro Volkswagen and El Paso Electric, I got to be Batman for a week-end.

I'm a lifelong fan of Batman, in nearly all its forms, particularly the mid-1960s TV show. You know, the one where Adam West as Batman, and Burt Ward as Robin, hop into the Batmobile and say, "Atomic batteries to power! Turbines to speed!" And then they race out of the Batcave toward Gotham City.

Rick Nezzar and Mike Tourtilott of Sisbarro gave me the opportunity to test drive Volkswagen's all-electric SUV, the ID.4. And because El Paso Electric gets about a third to half of its power for Las Cruces from the Palo Verde nuclear power plant in Arizona, you can legitimately call electric vehicles charged here atomic-powered. El Paso Electric also gets power from natural gas plants, and some from solar, but neither of those sound as cool as atomic-powered.

If your impression of an electric car is of a wimpy, low-powered golf cart, think again. Those of you who have driven or ridden in a Tesla know what I'm talking about. The torque on acceleration makes it feel more like a rollercoaster than a car.

The ID.4 doesn't have quite the torque as a Tesla, but it costs about \$25,000 less, too. And the Volkswagen is no slouch when it comes to acceleration. I loved the way it handled, braked and kicked in the power when I needed it.

As in the Tesla, much of the vehicle is operated from a big computer screen panel on the dashboard, about midway between the driver and the passenger. The screen takes some getting used to as you learn all the intricacies and capabilities. And the dash is not the only difference from the typical combustion-engine vehicle.

Ironically, the same day I picked up the ID.4 from Sis-

barro, I also picked up my car from the repair shop, which had about \$250 of repairs done to parts an electric car doesn't even have.

An electric car, of course, has no gas tank. It also has no oil pan, spark plugs, radiator, fuel pump, water pump, manifold, pistons and other gas-engine standards. An electric car still needs windshield wipers, a fan and, not just a battery, but a great big battery.

If you had your own electric car, you'd have a power plug-in station at your home, and you could charge it every night. Without that, or when you're traveling, you'll have to know where all the charging stations are on your route.

A fully charged ID.4 will give you about 250 miles of range. Because I didn't have the capability to charge the vehicle for a full 8 hours, I had to do intermittent charges. It was kind of cool, on Saturday, to plug the ID.4 at the public station on Organ Street Downtown, while I sat on the Boneyard Cantina patio, eating nachos and listen-

ing to Chris Baker as I kept an eye on the vehicle.

I wasn't so lucky on Sunday. I had driven the vehicle down to a 45-mile range, and was sweating a bit the drive downtown for another charging. It made it fine, only dropping down to about 40 miles in range, but, unfortunately, another vehicle was using the Downtown charging station. Thankfully, another charging station, in front of City Hall, was available. There is another charging station at the Staybridge Suites at U.S. 70 and Del Rey Boulevard, but other than the car dealers themselves, I couldn't find any more stations in Las Cruces.

Tesla, in an apparent attempt to be the Apple of electric car manufacturers, created a charging system unique to its vehicles, so it's not interchangeable with other electric vehicles.

It's clear electric cars will be a part of our transportation future, but predicting their niche is still a bit tricky.

If I were to own an electric

For those of you who forgot how easy it was to get started in farming, let me tell you about my friend Con.

Many years ago, he bought a farm in the wilds of Minnesota. The feller that sold him the farm had his farm sale the day Con arrived to take possession of the land.

Now, Con had been a cow-

Symbolism, not security, reason for border wall

For the past four years, our nation's immigration policy was the equivalent of a "Keep Out" sign on the front yard. That didn't stop desperate migrants from seeking refuge.

The border wall was the physical embodiment of that policy. It was the top priority for the previous administration, and the most motivating issue for the Republican base, who were promised that Mexico would pay for construction.

Former President Donald Trump routinely battled with members of Congress, including those from his own party, over

funding for the wall. That dispute led to a 35-day shutdown of the federal government in 2018, the longest in our nation's history.

Trump resolved the dispute when he gave up on budgeting new money and decided instead to divert money that had already been budgeted for other purposes. He took \$3.6 billion intended for military projects throughout the world, and funneled it all to the southern border.

Money diverted from New Mexico bases included \$40 million approved for a new information systems facility

at White Sands Missile Range; \$85 million for a training facility and \$4.2 million for a ground control facility at Holloman Air Force Base; \$42 million for a new cargo pad and facility at Cannon Air Force Base; and \$16.3 million for security improvements at Kirtland Air Force Base.

It is estimated that by the time he left office, Trump had spent about \$15 billion and completed some 738 miles of new barrier. None of that has been successful.

Despite that massive investment, the Border Patrol has reported a record number of apprehensions at the southern border this year. There are more migrant children in fed-

eral shelters now than ever before.

Last week, new President Joe Biden pulled the plug on the whole operation. He announced that they would end contracts for wall construction, and return money that had been diverted back to the Department of Defense.

Beyond that, they also announced that they would spend some of the \$1.4 billion appropriated for wall construction to repair environmental damage caused by the wall.

It is, obviously, the height of wasteful spending to halt a project midway through, but this project never should have been started.

The notion that we

were going to build an impenetrable wall the length of the southern border to solve our immigration problem was always going to work better at campaign rallies than in reality. And, the notion that we would bully Mexico into paying for a wall intended to keep their citizens out was simply absurd.

The border wall was always more about symbolism than security. It was a message to not only those in Mexico but all of our southern neighbors that America has become a gated community.

Along with halting construction of the wall, Biden has also ended the remain in Mexico policy that had been imposed by

Trump. That has led to a temporary crisis at the border, with more unaccompanied children flowing in than the system can accommodate.

The solution is not a wall, but rather investment in shelters that will allow unaccompanied children to be housed humanely; and in immigration courts that will allow for their cases to be resolved quickly, followed by speedy removal of those who do not qualify for asylum.

The wall was a simplistic attempt to solve a complicated problem. Now we need to get serious.

Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) and its Utilities Customer Advisory Group (UCAG) wants your opinion on the gas rate review and its recommendations. UCAG informs the Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) Board of Commissioners (Board) then, in turn, submits its recommendation to City Council.

Flores says she is running again in District 6 to 'preserve continuity on council'

Yvonne Flores will seek a second four-year term on the Las Cruces City Council in this November's combined local election.

A late entry into the 2017 District 6 council race, Flores won a 57-43 percent victory over first-term incumbent Ceil Levatino in a sprawling district that stretches west from Telshor Boulevard, south from U.S. Highway 70 and north from Hillrise Drive, zig-zagging along its southern edge to include residents south of Missouri Avenue and of Vista Primera

Road and Paseo de Oñate.

Flores, 70, said she made the decision to run again "to preserve continuity on the council."

District 5 Councilor Gill Sorg has announced he will not seek re-election this year. Councilor Gabriel Vasquez has also announced that he won't be running again in District 3.

Only those three council seats are on the 2021 ballot, which will also include seats on the Las Cruces Public Schools Board of Education and the Doña Ana Soil and

Water Conservation District Board of Supervisors.

"I love Las Cruces," Flores said. "I love the people here. I love the potential."

The City of Las Cruces "is a five-star organization," she said.

"I can only speak in superlatives" Flores said of City Manager Ifo Pili. In hiring him in 2020, the city council "hit the jackpot," she said. "He was everything he was on paper and then some."

Flores also praised city staff, including Sustainability Officer Lisa LaRocque, Public Outreach Manager Jamey Rickman, Grants Administrator Amy Johnson Bassford, Las Cruces International Airport Administrator Andy Hume, Chief Budget Officer Leann DeMouche and new Utilities Director Delilah Walsh.

Flores expressed admiration for Mayor Ken Miyagishima and her fellow council members, list-

ing Mayor Pro-Tempore Kasandra Gandara as "one of my heroes."

Being a city councilor is a 24-7 job, Flores said. "It's full time, and I love it."

In a second term, Flores said she wants to "continue with projects that we set as priorities," including getting roads paved and septic tanks installed in District 6, along with completing other infrastructure projects.

Flores said she has a passion for Branigan Cultural Center and looks forward to the completion of its renovation this summer, and to "more equity in (city) cultural programming that reflects more of who we are historically." Flores said she also wants to continue to "participate in solutions" to climate change issues facing the city.

"Every decision we make has an impact on everybody who lives in Las Cruces," Flores said.

Quality of life should be a consideration in all council decisions, she said.

Flores is a member of

the City Art Board; city Airport Advisory Board; and the city economic development, finance, health, housing and public safety policy review committees (PRC), serving as chair of the economic development PRC. She also serves as secretary of the South Central Regional Transit District Board of Directors.

"A lot of these projects are like my children," Flores said.

"I look at life as a glass half full, as a cloud having a silver lining, that nothing bad ever happens," she said.

Dealing with Covid-19 during the past 13 months "forced us to look at the inequities in our city, our state, our country and our world," Flores said. "It forced us to look at what we should have been looking at years ago."

The pandemic was "a travesty on the lives of our children more than anyone else," she said, and pointed to the "extraordinary work to keep children's programming going" at Thomas Brani-

gan Memorial Library.

The city council and city staff "are working very hard to assure we continue to contribute to agencies to ameliorate hardships Covid has brought," she said.

Flores was born in El Paso and raised in Ciudad Juarez and Los Angeles. Her father, Ernesto Rey Flores, was a planning commissioner, councilor and mayor of Santa Fe Springs, California, for 20 years.

Flores has a bachelor of arts degree in Spanish literature from California State University at Sacramento and a juris doctorate from the University of California, Hastings College of the Law in San Francisco. She bought a home in Las Cruces in 2005 and has made Las Cruces her permanent home since 2012. Flores has two grown sons, Joaquin and Gordon.

Connie Chapman is Flores' re-election campaign manager. Doña Ana County Commissioner Shannon Reynolds is her campaign treasurer.

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Vasquez won't seek re-election to city council District 3

Las Cruces City Councilor Gabriel Vasquez has announced that he will not be a candidate for re-election to a second term this November.

Vasquez was elected to represent District 3 on the council in November 2017, winning 70 percent of the vote. District 3 includes east-central Las Cruces.

Vasquez, 36, is a project director for the Western Conservation Foundation.

"I intend to continue serving the community and state that I love, but in a different capacity," Vasquez said. "What that looks like remains to be determined, but I will continue to seek op-

portunities for public service, volunteerism and work that contributes to creating a healthy, vibrant, fair and equitable community here and across the state.

Vasquez's decision not to run again means there will be at least two new council members come January 2022. District 5 Councilor Gill Sorg announced in April that he also would not seek re-election. District 6 Councilor Yvonne Flores said she will seek a second four-year term on the council.

Vasquez, whose term continues through the end of 2021, said he is proud of his accomplishments on the city council and looks

forward "to opening the doors to a new, dynamic, thoughtful and motivated candidate to continue the work we've started in District 3 and to bring new ideas, perspectives, and initiatives to the table."

In his three years on the council, Vasquez said he has "led the charge to complete the Nevada Neighborhood Cooling Corridor project, catalyzed the reconstruction of the city's lone skate park, secured funding for the design of what stands to be the city's largest urban open space in Villa Mora Dam, led the charge to fund the city's first response to the asylum-seeker crisis and led the formation of the new El Paseo-Solano corridor redevelopment project, among many other proud

accomplishments that have delivered tangible results to the people and communities of District 3.

"This job has been incredibly rewarding, and the trust and confidence of the voters of this district will continue to inspire me to serve my community in other ways," Vasquez said. "I remain steadfast in my belief that when we reinvest in the inner part of the city, everybody benefits, and we begin to slowly tackle the inequities that permeate throughout our city, our state and our country. In Las Cruces, we can continue to lead by example with bold, forward-thinking leadership that values every life, every neighborhood and every young person's future.

"I'm also proud to have been such an outspoken advocate for issues at the state and federal level, that I remain incredibly passionate about, and that I believed have moved the needle toward transformative reform, such as liquor license reform and cannabis legalization," he said.

"I look forward to finishing my term strong and placing a particular focus on delivering policy recommendations to the city council that will transform the El Paseo and Solano business and residential corridors for generations to come."

A native of El Paso, he is a first-generation Mexican-American whose parents were migrant workers.

Vasquez grew up in

Juarez and El Paso and has lived in Las Cruces since 2002. He graduated from New Mexico State University in 2008 with a bachelor's degree in English with a minor in journalism and public relations.

His professional experience includes working as the business editor of the Las Cruces Bulletin, executive director of the Hispano Chamber of Commerce de Las Cruces, as vice president of public relations for a local medical monitoring device company and as an aide to U.S. Sen. Martin Heinrich. Vasquez has also worked in Washington, D.C., as a communications director and public policy expert for a nonpartisan children's advocacy organization.

Breaking ground on Casa for a Cause

You may know it as the Las Cruces Home Builders Association Anniversary House.

Its new name is Casa for a Cause.

But whatever you call it, this community construction project is one of the best fundraisers in Las Cruces. That's saying a lot, because we have many great fundraising events in this relentlessly generous community.

If you're not familiar, here's how it works.

A local builder volunteers to build a home. This year it's Adam Juarez of A New Beginning Custom Homes. The builder then works to find subcontractors and suppliers who will

provide their services and materials at or below costs, to reduce expenses as much as possible. This year's project will get a jump start to one of LCHBA's founding members, Eddie Binns, who donated a portion of the land for the home.

When the house is completed, it goes on the market at or above the going prices. Because the expenses have been charitably reduced, the profit is much higher. The LCHBA then takes those profits and puts them back in the community to help charity groups and nonprofit organizations.

The previous four houses have raised funds ranging from \$64,000 to \$125,000, and supported dozens of nonprofit

groups in the Mesilla Valley. By extension, thousands of people have benefited from that infusion of support.

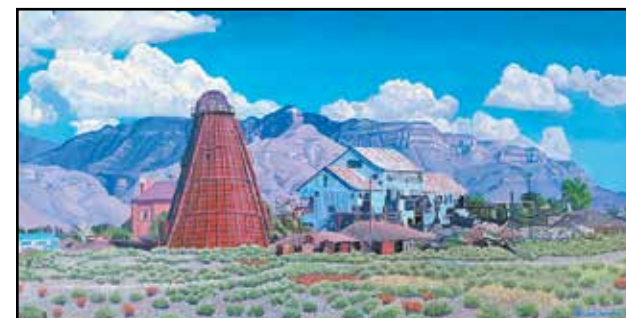

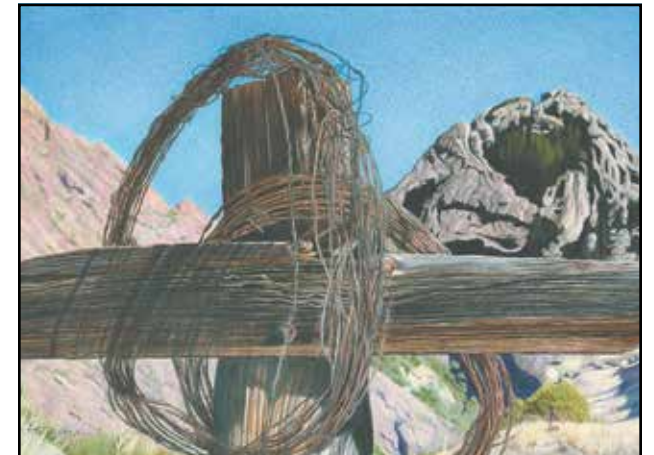
Rutherford, a contemporary realist colored pencil artist, is well versed in the use of graphite, charcoal, watercolor and pen and ink. Rutherford's unique style allows her to highlight features and expressions in the faces of both people and animals. Through layering, mixing and blending, she can uncover the soul of her subjects.

The gallery's newest member is artist Rhoda Winters. Drawing in class helped Winters remember what the teachers said. The Organ Mountains are in most of her earliest childhood memories. She perceived life to be an overwhelming tangle of confusion, and yet she sensed that there is an organized structure that extends from the galaxies through life in all its variety, all the way down to the structures of the

individual atoms.

Winters explores the wonder of the moment, the beauty of life and the structure of the natural world in her art. From City Council to Arts Council: Greg Smith talks about art's broader impact on community

Transitioning from an elected office to running a nonprofit within a couple of months at the end of 2019 and the beginning of 2020 was a “big shifting of gears” for Greg Smith.

But moving from the Las Cruces City Council to the Doña Ana Arts Council (DAAC) “connects in with a lot of what I think is important with Las Cruces and Doña Ana County going forward,” Smith said in a recent interview.

“I’m really happy to be here doing this,” Smith said. “The arts is very much a part of what I was trying to do politically.”

In addition to serving as DAAC executive director, he is also chair of the city’s Arts and Cultural District (ACD) Coordinat-

ing Council, which was created in 2015 to help develop arts and culture assets in downtown Las Cruces.

It was a busy and challenging first year at DAAC for Smith, as he helped guide the arts council through Covid-19 and its move to a new home at 250 W. Amador Ave. The move returned DAAC to the ACD, across the street from the historic Amador Hotel and adjacent to the site of the home built by Martín Amador (1836-1903), patriarch of one of Las Cruces’ earliest and most influential families.

“It all connects,” Smith said.

And the new location “is working for us in so many ways,” he said.

Like many other nonprofits, DAAC hosted online exhibitions, workshops and fundraisers on-

line throughout 2020, and is looking forward to a return to live, face-to-face events as it celebrates its 50th anniversary and the 50th anniversary of its signature event, the Renaissance ArtsFaire, in 2021.

DAAC also has a full lineup of in-person youth art camps this summer and other events are in the works.

Reflecting local history and their connections to space, engineering and agriculture, the arts present “a bright opportunity to have Las Cruces and Doña Ana County shine,” Smith said, and “take pride in who we are and what we are.”

The arts, he said, also offer great educational and economic development opportunities, he said, and can help keep local youth living and working “where they grew up.”

The arts are also “part

of a larger community,” Smith said. They won’t necessarily bring a grocery store to a food desert, he said, but they are “part of the environment for those things to happen.”

With nearly \$2 million in capital outlay funding, ACD has plans for wayfinding, lighting and unique transportation in the downtown area, Smith said. And the coordinating council wants to help with the development of performance venues, galleries and artists’ lofts that will attract artists and visitors to downtown and its neighboring Mesquite and Alameda Depot historic districts.

The challenge for DAAC and ACD, Smith said, is “How do we make ourselves both viable and integral to what’s happening in Las Cruces and Doña Ana County going forward?”

Arts Council has full slate of summer camps on tap; registration deadlines approaching

The Doña Ana Arts Council (DAAC) is currently planning in-person summer camps that will follow state Covid guidelines, DAAC said in a news release. The camps will include Career Art Path, Missoula Children’s Theatre and Opera Storytellers Camp.

• **CAREER ART PATH:** will be held 8:30 a.m.-2 p.m. weekdays, Monday, June 14- Friday, June 25, and is a visual arts camp for 30 fifth- to eighth-graders. During this two-week experience, participants will explore art-related careers through hands-on activities and speakers. Lisa Carlson, a Kennedy Center-trained art teacher who had a long and distinguished career as an art teacher with Las Cruces Public Schools, and Hiba Mohammed, who is an LCPS art teacher, will co-coordinate the program. Tuition is \$100 per student. The registration deadline is Monday, May 24.

• **MISSOULA CHILDREN’S THEATRE:** will be held 10 a.m.-2:30 p.m., Tuesday-Saturday, July 6-10. This year, a cast of 60 student actors will perform “Sleeping Beauty.” Tuition is \$60 per student with a discount for children in the same immediate family. Students must pre-register by Tuesday, June 15. Pending possible changes in state public health orders, the cast is expected to be comprised of 16 students entering first grade to age seven, and 44 students ages 8-18.

• **OPERA STORYTELLERS CAMP:** will be held Monday, July 19-Friday, July 30. It will be directed by Christa Fredrickson, who is director of choral activities at Centennial High School and an adjunct instructor in the New Mexico State University Theatre Arts Department. Earlier this year, she co-directed the Theatre Department’s Destination Broadway production. The camp is open to students in grades three-12. Participants will compose and perform their own 30-minute musical drama based on the hero’s journey and will learn the technical aspects of lighting and sound, as well as set and costume design. No experience is required for the camp. Tuition is \$300. The registration deadline is Tuesday, June 15.

Las Cruces improv group has first performance in mid-May

Five veteran Las Cruces actors have formed an improvisation group and will have their first public performance Friday, May 14, 7:30 p.m. in the courtyard at Black Box Theatre (BBT), 430 N. Main St. downtown.

The Super-Secret Improv Show (SSIS) was founded by Josh Taulbee in 2020 and also includes Erin Wendorf, Cassandra Galban, Rachel Thomas-Chappell and Teddy Aspen-Sanchez.

Three of the actors have theater degrees. Aspen-Sanchez is also a graduate of an improv school in Massachusetts and Thomas-Chappell is a graduate of the Second City improv school in Chicago.

Collectively, the five actors have performed in more than 100 plays, including productions at virtually every theater venue in Las Cruces. They also variously have experience as directors, play and skit writers and set designers. Aspen-Sanchez is also a standup comedian.

Aspen-Sanchez has wanted to form an improv group in Las Cruces since about 2007, he said. The idea finally came to fruition during a conversation he had with Galban and Taulbee while the three were performing together in Eugene Ionesco's "The Killing Game" at BBT in early 2020.

They added Thomas-Chappell and Wendorf to the group, and had time for a couple of in-person rehearsals before Covid-19 public health orders put New Mexico into lock-



down, closing theaters and cancelling live productions.

SSIS rehearsed via Zoom for more a year, only returning to in-person rehearsals — following state public health guidelines — when New Mexico returned to yellow status in the state's red-yellow-green-turquoise tiered risk system.

Improv has no script and often derives its performance subjects from audience members. It likely traces its roots to ancient Rome about 400 B.C. Modern improv games began as children's exercises created by American John Dewey (1859-1952) about 1916. These short-form improv games are familiar to many from the television series "Whose Line Is It Anyway," which began airing on American TV in 1998.

"Improv forces me into the moment in a therapeutic way," Galban said. "Being put on the spot and having to think of something exaggerates life and makes everything else so much easier."

Improv is "really open," Wendorf said.

It's easy to be typecast in theater, but through improv she can "enjoy being a person I'm not," Wendorf said.

"It's a unique experience we get to share," Taulbee said. Whatever the group creates "wasn't ever seen before and probably won't ever be replicated."

Improv to Thomas-Chappell is "making fun, making magic," she said. "You trust your fellow players. You know they've got your back."

For Aspen-Sanchez, good improv is about telling a story more than anything else, including comedy.

"I always wanted to be a storyteller," he said.

Most people are familiar with the short-form improv that is featured in "Whose Line Is It Anyway," Aspen-Sanchez said. The improv games SSIS played during a recent rehearsal at BBT included "The Actor's Nightmare: Cockroaches," "Foreign

Film: Swedish Film," "Film and Theater Style" and "Double Entendre." There are many others.

Aspen-Sanchez plans to introduce long-form improv to Las Cruces audiences. It is less structured than short-form, he said, and often adds tragedy and drama as well as comedy. Like short-form, it is completely unscripted and relies on suggestions from the audience.

The long-form session that was part of the recent rehearsal had Keanu Reeves and the game Jenga as its audience-suggested themes. Most long-form improv runs 30-60 minutes, Aspen-Sanchez said.

In either format, improv gets an actor's energy up,

Thomas-Chappell said.

"The audience will feed it back to you," she said. "They get on that journey with you and can't wait to see what you pull out your hat next."

Unlike standup comedy, Aspen-Sanchez said improv audiences are pulling for the performers to succeed. "It's their ideas, and they want them to work," he said.

Trying to be funny is a mistake that many improv actors make early on, SSIS members said.

"That's not honest," Thomas-Chappell said.

There is "a mental state of being in the moment


that I find in improv acting," Galban said. Staying in the moment is "a muscle we exercise in improv class."

Improv also makes actors better performers in scripted shows, all the SSIS members said.

"You pay attention" to the other actors, Wendorf said. Good improv is about "listening to your partner."

The May 14 performance is \$10 per person, but seating is limited. Call BBT at 575-523-1223 for information. The show will be suitable for all family members. Actors will wear microphones.

The event is free and open to the public.

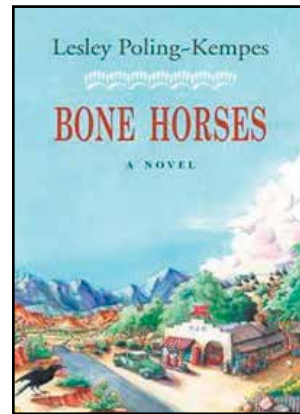

Poling-Kempes is a multiple award-winner for both scholarly nonfiction and contemporary fiction.

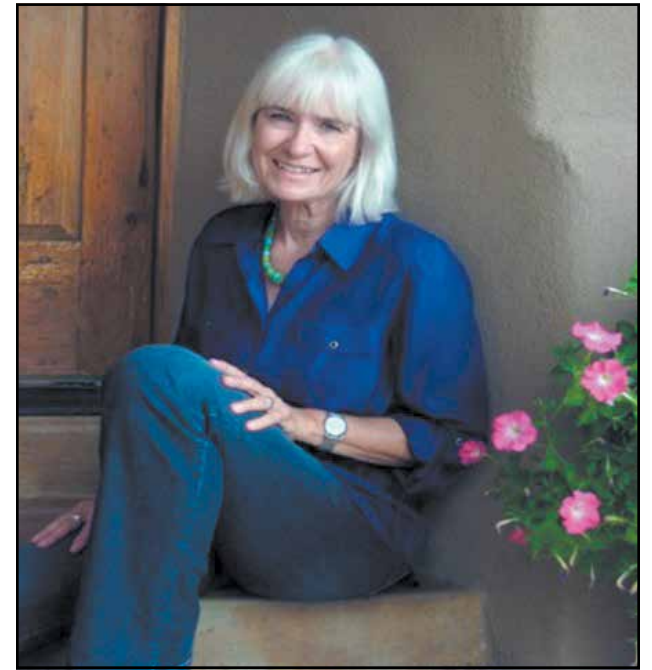
"For several decades,

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Looking for newer ways to read the Bible

Translators are traitors. That's an old saying from centuries ago. Translators are Trojan horses, bringing foreign forces into your midst. I think a lot about this because of working with biblical texts for over half a century as both a reader and a scholar. In many cases translations commit what literary critic (and translator) Robert Alter calls "the heresy of explanation." What a terrific phrase!

Alter's point is well taken. Bible translation has often tried to twist the reader's mind to read the text from the translator's perch. Such "transla-

tion" tries to explain the text, rather than simply to render Greek or Hebrew into English. Many contemporary translations fail because of this.

People may lose interest in reading when they suspect they're being manipulated. I'm not addressing my comments to those who think the Bible is not worth reading. I'm thinking of those who struggle to make sense of texts locked in ancient history or linguistic peculiarities. I understand the struggle.

I was reading the Bible in Greek and Hebrew before I was old enough to vote, so I have some

right to comment on problems of translation. It's a struggle to assist people to hear the Bible precisely because these texts are old. They do need interpretation and commentary to be heard anew. But at the same time a delicate balance must be struck so as not to wind up explaining via translation. Such "translation" equals special pleading for a particular way to read the texts. We who live in these texts really want them to be heard apart from our prejudices and predilections.

Here's one example of many: in Genesis 31, Laban the father of Rachel and Leah, Jacob's two wives, overtakes them on their way with their possessions, for which Jacob

had toiled 20 years. They left without a blessing, but Rachel had taken the household gods and hid them under her saddle. This was a powerful response to her father because the household gods — little statues placed at the corners of a dwelling — represented a claim on Laban's property.

The text notes that she was "after the way of women," meaning that she was in her menstrual cycle and, thus, untouchable. No way was Laban going to get those statues. The cleverness of her move may pass without notice. Without understanding the cultural norms, we can miss the enormity of this challenge to her father.

To let that text speak,

some interpretation is necessary, but it mustn't overpower the craftsmanship of these few words. Literary craftsmanship is evidenced by the textual brevity. In the scriptures, just a few choice words may carry enormous significance. This is true throughout the Hebrew Bible, and in the New Testament as well. Ernest Hemingway said that he tried to write so that people could read the spaces between the words. The Bible is writ like that, but so often the flatness of many translations overshadows such a close reading.

How to proceed? Get a good study Bible, like the Oxford Annotated or the Jewish Study Bible. Better still, buy Alter's three-volume set. It's worth every

dollar if you're a serious reader. Alter has painstakingly given us a version that captures the nuances and flow of the Hebrew text, and avoids "the heresy of explanation."

On one hand you need helps for the history and language. On the other hand you want a readable text that doesn't try to convince you about the text by explanation. That's the bargain you need to strike, and when you do, the Bible may come alive for you in ways it never has.

Progress being made, but more work to be done to combat hate

In my months of retirement, I have been reviewing files that I accumulated during my rabbinate. I am keeping special mementos of important events in which I participated.

One item which I retained was from the local newspaper in Topeka, Kansas. It was a full-page ad responding to a planned Neo-Nazi rally on the steps of the Kansas State Capitol on Aug. 24,

2002. On one side was a colorful poster that read, "Hate is not a Topeka value."

In a statement on the opposite side, two city council members called on local citizens to support a proposed anti-discrimination ordinance which would extend

legal protections to members of the LGBTQ community. They explained, "We sent a million of our finest sons and daughters

in harm's way in Europe and Asia to combat the evil of hate because of one's appearance, religion, or personal beliefs." They urged local leaders to take a stand for equality for all.

My congregation held a service for the greater community to communicate a message of mutual respect and understanding on Aug. 23, 2002. Two weeks later, at the Sept. 10 city council meeting, I spoke in favor of the ordinance (which passed to some extent).

Nineteen years later, I can say that communities in our country have made some progress towards combating prejudice and promoting equality.

However, it is clear that we have much work to do. Hatred persists. The Anti-Defamation League recently held a press conference to release its report on the many incidents of anti-Semitism in 2020. Presenters lamented recent attacks on members of the Asian-American Pacific Islander community and examples

of racist behavior against people of color in our society.

Concerned members of the Las Cruces community have joined together to combat prejudice and discrimination. During my decade here, people gathered to stand up for DACA recipients and to call for immigration reform.

Memorials were held after the violent attack at Pulse nightclub in Orlando, Florida in 2016, the shootings at Pittsburgh's Tree of Life Synagogue

in 2018 and the attack at the El Paso Walmart in 2019. Religious leaders and community members came together in 2017 to oppose proposed immigration standards that targeted members of the Muslim community.

We know, deep down, that it is always time to come forward in order to pursue equality and justice, and to act with fairness and compassion.

In April, I attended Holocaust Remembrance

Barbara Chichester, a Las Cruces artist, was chosen by Admiral Beverage as the artist for the new beverage product Roadrunner Tea, launching in New Mexico now.

The legal teams got together, and they bought the rights to the piece now being used on the cans. Chichester said the tea is coming out in Pic Quik stores now and will be coming out at other locations soon.

Not having a local studio or local retail outlet for her art, Chichester sells solely from her website at barbara-chichester.pixels.com. She said if someone in the local area wants her art, she can do

special requests.

"Mostly I sell from the site," she said. "Europeans are big on art of the Southwest. I sell a lot in Europe."

Chichester said she sold a huge print once of a giant Coors beer sign to a pub in Ireland.

Art is her first love, she said. She approaches much of her work starting with photography. Creating art since 2012, she developed her own technique she calls paint-ography.

Sometimes, it will be a digital painting and sometimes, she paints on her photographs. On her site, the art is made into all sorts of things, available as posters, furniture and handbags.

"When you photograph something, you really see it," she said. "When I do portraits of pets, I get really familiar with them. I make my own textures and sometimes will layer the textures. I have some software programs I use. It's all mixed media. It works for me."

Chichester retired from her work as a commercial real estate broker and began to pursue her "heart's desire" of art. Doing it as a hobby has now turned into a business she loves.

"It takes a lot of time," she said. "Sometimes when it hits you as an art-

ist, you would wake up at 5 a.m. — then suddenly it's 6 p.m. I enjoy what I'm doing. I enjoy it so much!"

Having lived in Las Cruces off and on for 20 years, Chichester and her husband finally settled down here permanently.

"Once you're here, it grows on you and you can't leave," she said. "The rule is you are only allowed to tell one person about this place."

The design of the can itself was carefully thought out to reflect life in New Mexico, according to a release from Admiral Beverage.

"We support local businesses and support New Mexico State athletics here in Las Cruces," he said.

Admiral Beverage wanted the product to resonate with the consumer, said Robyn Bryant, vice president for marketing.

"Packaging graphics is

very important and need to represent the look and feel of the product," she said. "We googled 'roadrunner' graphics and one of my associates found a beautiful picture that Barbara Chichester had created, so we went to her website to review her work. Her artwork has captured the look that we wanted for the product. She is an amazing artist and she is from Las Cruces. It doesn't get any better than that."

Admiral Beverage supports local retailers and employs local people, Bryant said.

Roadrunner Tea depicts New Mexico with its graphics and tea flavors. Right now, it is only being sold in New Mexico. Roadrunner is coming out with Peach Mango Tea, Watermelon Tea, Sweet Tea and Green Tea with Ginseng and Honey.

While she was a student in high school in Uniontown, Kansas, Megan and two of her classmates created a history day project that highlighted the courageous acts of Irena Sendler, who saved over 2,500 Jewish children from certain death in Warsaw, Poland, during World War II.

The project participants had several opportunities to meet with Irena Sendler in person in Poland. She told the students:

"You honor me because I am one of the few remaining to bear witness. But I tell you, I only did what any decent person would do in such horrible times. I do not consider myself a hero. A hero is someone doing extraordinary things. What I did was not extraordinary. It was a normal thing to do. I was just being decent."

So may we have the courage to be decent, which is, truly, extraordinary and heroic.

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Hatch Valley coach gets solace from the game he loves after death of his beloved wife

The Hatch Valley girls basketball team is off to a strong start this season.

“This is the most athletic team I’ve had here in Hatch,” said head coach Ben Trujillo.

The Bears have a roster with seven seniors.

“We can go 10 deep and we really don’t lose anything,” added assistant Taralyn Trujillo.

But one key member of the program is no longer with them. Back in February, New Mexico suffered a tragic loss when Las Cruces Public Schools Superintendent Karen Trujillo was killed after being struck by a vehicle while walking her dog.

“She was always there, even at our away tournaments,” said Hatch Valley senior Natalie Molinar.

“She helped with concessions. She literally did anything we would ask her to, but her passion was to come and watch these girls play and announce the games,” said Taralyn Trujillo, about her mother.

“There’s still those moments, whenever we have our home games, we’re used to her announcing every play and I still look over and wait for her to announce,” said Hatch Valley junior Makenzie Williams.

Following the death of his wife, it would be easy for Hatch Valley head coach Ben Trujillo to walk

away from the game. But instead, he embraced it. “Basketball to me has always been my oasis, my get out of stress-free card,” said Ben. “I enjoy working with kids. I guess you should if you’ve done it for 37 years, right?”

To help in the healing, Ben has his daughters by his side to help coach the program. “A lot of it is coping and it is helpful to do the stuff that we love,” said Tavyn Trujillo. “He loves coaching; I love the sport.”

Teams are honoring Karen with stickers on helmets, and recognizing the Trujillo family before games. Ben says the outpouring of support throughout the entire state has been overwhelming.

“The community across the state, all the stories they shared with me,” said Ben. “I’ve said this many times, it’s like I have

my own ‘Chicken Soup for the Soul’ book.”

“Like my dad says, it’s good for the soul to hear all the stories of things she did because she was very modest with things,” said Taralyn.

“We didn’t even realize how active of a person she was in other people’s lives,” added Tavyn. “We saw the top level of it, but all the little stories, down to the detective. Even he had a story to share of stuff she did for his wife. It’s crazy how many people have reached out and shared amazing stories and tributes to her. We’re not the only ones that lost her.”

Ben says staying involved and surrounding himself with loved ones helps get him through the grief. “Those kids, they help a lot,” he said with tears.

The games aren’t the same for the Trujillo fam-

ily. A wife, mother and dedicated educator is no longer around, but the family knows that she is still with them every single day. “She’s cheering us on,” Taralyn said. “My dad and I always say we have to put one foot in front of the other. We can see her up there saying, ‘Keep moving forward, keep living your dreams, do what you’re supposed to do, don’t stop your life because I’m gone.’”

“There truly is no guarantee for tomorrow,” Ben said. “There’s no guarantee for 10 minutes from now, right? We talked about this all time, about being present and enjoying the moments you’re in.”

The moment they’re in, right now, is a winning one. With everything the program and their coach has endured off the court this year, what would it mean to see his team

New Infrastructure for West Mesa Industrial Park Treatment Facility

The West Mesa Industrial Park Wastewater Treatment Facility (Facility), operated by Las Cruces Utilities (LCU), treats approximately 150,000 gallons of wastewater per day. There's plenty of equipment that helps those thousands of gallons get processed, and over time, that equipment needs to get replaced.

"Those aeration blowers were originally purchased and installed new at the Jacob Hands Wastewater Treatment Facility in 1983 and 1984," Joaquin Murillo, LCU assistant plant manager, said. "They supplied air for our Jacob Hands Wastewater Treatment Facility Aeration Basin up until the year 2000 when LCU added a second aeration basin to the process."

During that time, the aeration blowers were swapped out for four new natural gas aeration blowers. The old ones were refurbished and repurposed to supply air for the West



Mesa Industrial Park Wastewater Treatment Facility. The motor was pulled out, inspected, and repaired as part of our preventive maintenance program.

Located at 999 Crawford Road, the Facility is authorized by the New Mexico Environment Department to treat up to 400,000 gallons per day of domestic and industrial wastewater, so it's ready for the growing Las Cruces Innovation & Industrial Park (LCIIP).

The Facility not only serves the LCIIP but also serves the Las Cruces International Airport. However, most of the waste currently comes from



the Southern New Mexico Correctional Facility.

Can an old dog learn new tricks? Research says yes

The more we learn about the human brain the more amazing it is.

New research in neuropsychology is telling us that, as we get older, our brains can actually get better, instead of the other way around.

The phenomenon is called “brain plasticity,” and I am excited about it. Our brains may be the most adaptable organ we have.

While it was once thought that our brain just gradually deteriorated as we aged (from about age 50 on), neuroscience is demonstrating that the aging brain can change and actually improve.

This means that learning new ideas, skills, attitudes and behaviors is possible. But learning

requires memory, suggesting that brain training and brain experiencing are certainly worthwhile, even while we get older and our bodies stiffen.

Let's take the average 65-year-old golfer. He's been playing about the same game, on the same golf course, with the same group, using the same

swing, getting the same results, for about the last 20 years now.

Time and habit, along with Charlie (horse) and Arthur (itis) have beaten him into submission, so he tends to accept golf stagnation.

One of the things we know about the aging brain is that if you keep doing the same thing, over and over again, especially when you're

older, you end up making your brain and actions more rigid. Do you want a cemented brain? Basically that's what happens with individuals who have Obsessive-Compulsive Disorder (OCD), where the mind-driven behavior becomes stereotyped and automatic, mostly beyond their control.

Fundamentally what I'm saying is that if you want to improve your golf game as a senior you can't rely on only upgrading your physical skills.

You have to change your brain and here's some of what you need to know to do exactly that. First of all, brain plasticity requires motivation. You have to be willing to change and be in a mood to learn new stuff. In golf, that translates to taking lessons and trying things which are out of your comfort zone. It also

means getting into a more golflike routine of practicing and maybe even working out.

Secondly, we can only change things we're aware of, and things we're paying attention to. I'd like you to note that high self-awareness is one of the key requirements of mental toughness. It's also a critical element in high emotional I.Q. — the very thing that helps us to succeed in social and business settings. Just like executives, professionals and public servants, golfers need a lot of feedback. When you heighten your self-awareness you increase your chances of understanding what went wrong — and then being able to correct it. Feedback for golfers unquestionably involves regular lessons from a golf teacher; otherwise you're flying blind.

Thirdly, challenging ourselves with new tasks and games turns on the brain plasticity switches. We can try playing new courses, perhaps even with different companions. Also, be open to upgrading your equipment and taking advantage of new technology. We absolutely have to step out of our comfort zone once in a while if we are to grow and improve, regardless of our age. Are you a student of the game? Do you want to reach your full potential?

So I'm suggesting that your brain is inviting you to be young again. The bottom line for you and me as senior golfers who want to get better is skill acquisition.

We can go a long way by promoting positive brain

change (no, it's not too late!) by harnessing our potential for brain plasticity.

If you're not happy with your current game, change it. Revamp your swing; develop new shots; hit the ball farther. Skill building certainly extends to learning new mental toughness techniques, such as acute visualization. Be open-minded. Try different problem-solving approaches. In golf that means different shots and creative strategies. We absolutely can't afford to get stuck in old habits.
