COUNTY HIGHLIGHTS WORK OF ANIMAL CONTROL AND CODES STAFF

In honor of National Animal Control Officer Appreciation Week, Doña Ana County is highlighting the diligent and hardworking professionals in its Animal Control and Environmental Codes Enforcement Division.

"Animal Control and Environmental Codes Officers work collaboratively on countless cases, which is why the county is recognizing their diligent, combined efforts, to protect our community and animals," said County Manager Fernando R. Macias.

In the first quarter of 2021, Animal Control Officers have responded to 2,535 calls regarding animals. In 2020, the officers handled 7,520 calls for assistance. Due to the heavy volume of calls, this year's caseload will likely exceed 2020 numbers.

Environmental Codes Officers have responded to 1,289 calls in the first quarter of 2021. In 2020, officers addressed 4,147 calls reporting various violations of the solid waste ordinance, such as illegal dumping, accumulation of weeds and inoperable vehicles.

Through additional focused efforts of the county to remediate waste, in the first part of 2021, Environmental Codes Laborers have removed 29,540 pounds of trash from county lands, nearly 15 tons of garbage. In 2020, nearly 54 tons of trash that blighted county lands were collected.

"Responding to urgent calls of animals in distress is not easy; neither is arriving at a location where blatant illegal dumping occurs," said Interim Animal Control and Environmental Codes Manager Jeanne Quintero. "Officers work in difficult conditions, and often long hours, to provide the highest and most efficient level of service to residents throughout the county."

Amador Dayz Super Fresco: 'All the hosts, all the bands, all at once'

"It's all about the experience."

That's what Amador-Live Eatery and Entertainment District Operations Manager Michael Padilla said about the Al Fresco events that have become a Thursday-night fixture at the Amador Patio, Bar & Grill, 302 S. Main St. in downtown Las Cruces — and about the upcoming Super Fresco.

Super Fresco will begin at 7 p.m. Thursday, May 6, as part of Amador Dayz — seven major events in seven days on the main stage and event lawn at AmadorLive.

Super Fresco will bring together "all the hosts, all the bands, all at once," said owner Max Bower.

Super Fresco will incorporate the talents of the Amador's kitchen staff, bartenders and servers, as it pairs great musical entertainment with unique food and drink.

Bower said he and Al Fresco hosts Orlando Madrid and Chris Baker got together and came up with the idea for Super Fresco.

With "an open-mike feel," it will include the music of at least five well-

known local bands, combining rock, country, Jazz, Latin and funk music, plus an expanded menu of the Amador's specialty cocktails (including Crown Peach Lemonade made from scratch; a Pisco Sour, which is the national cocktail of both Peru and Chile; and an Old Forester Mint Julep) and a wide range of menu items (past Al Frescos have featured everything from Indian and Cajun to an American menu that includes chicken pot pie, Salisbury steak, rarebit and bread putting — featured desserts are included). There also will be at least one unannounced guest, Bower

said.

"It's very collaborative, very spur of the moment," he said. "It's like magic."

The variety of creative dishes, drinks, entertainment and surprises "all enjoyed outdoors keeps it fresh," Bower said, and that's why the name Fresco (Spanish for "fresh") is so perfect.

Super Fresco is an event "with a lot of planning that has a spontaneous feel," Bower said. "Everyone's in on it."

Table reservations are highly recommended for Super Fresco, Bower said.



Homelessness: not just a New Mexico issue

Earlier this month, as is the custom, the governor signed approval on many capital outlay projects across the state.

Many of them are predictable infrastructure allotments, for roads, bridge improvements, public safety, utility upgrades and repairs to school buildings.

Another category found in multiple regions of the state are projects to assist the homeless.

In Las Cruces, \$1.8 million will go toward warehouse construction on the Mesilla Valley Community of Hope campus, which serves the homeless. In Deming, \$1 million will go toward a new domestic violence and homeless shelter.

It's tragic that helping the homeless is as standard in our governing as making sure our tap water is safe. This is certainly not just a New Mexico issue. It's a national, as well as international, issue.

In the past couple of years,

the only big cities I've had the chance to visit are Albuquerque, El Paso, Juarez, Fort Worth,

Houston, Los Angeles and Tulsa. In all of those cities, homeless people are readily noticeable. In L.A., I literally had to step over some homeless people sleeping on Hollywood Boulevard.

It's a difficult feeling to process.

You want to respect the people and their humanity. You want to help them but, when they're everywhere, you can't really do it; there's no way you could help them all. Perhaps the over-arching thought, for me anyway, is wondering how these individuals got to this point.

The reasons are as individual as each person's fingerprints, though we know there are many contributing factors. We know behavioral health issues are a common root cause. There's also poverty, crime, health, abuse (physical, mental and sub-

stance) and social causes.

As we know here in Las Cruces, homelessness is certainly not limited to big cities. It's prevalent in cities of all sizes. During the four months of 2021, I've seen homeless people in Alamogordo, Deming, Santa Fe, Silver City and Truth or Consequences.

I am certainly grateful for the many blessings that have been showered on me. These blessings, the support of family and friends, and my ability to get and hold steady jobs my adult life have meant homelessness has never been a real prospect for me.

I'm also grateful for the community we live in. The generosity of the people of Las Cruces has given many homeless people a way out, and hope for a real future.

The Community of Hope is the most obvious example. The elements of the campus (hot meals, dry food, child care, medical attention and shelter) have enabled many homeless to

bridge gaps and break a cycle.

It's hard to create and print a resume if you're homeless. It's hard to shower and prepare for a job interview if you're homeless. Even if you're near homeless, how do you work if you're caring for a small child? And if you've found a place of your own, but barely able to make the rent, how do you feed yourself, let alone your family? The Community of Hope addresses all those needs and more.

There are other agencies in Las Cruces addressing needs. And there are many churches, charitable organizations and lots of generous individuals that help out when they can. One such organization, the Gospel Rescue Mission, has a phrase: "A hand up, not a handout." That's a philosophy almost all these groups share.

I don't have any solutions, but it's troubling to remember that, in our society, homelessness is as much a part of the fabric of life as the roads we drive down every day.

A while back I was asked who has had the greatest influence on my life. I hadn't ever given it much thought, like most folks, I guess. After considerin' for a while I came up with five people that I could say actually affected the direction of my thinkin'. My dad, Doc Brimhall, John Basabe, Red Steagall, Patrick Gottsch and Rupert Mansell.

teacher in Las Cruces from 1961-1962.

"Here by the owl," he would say. "The owl is the symbol of wisdom..."

It's hard for a 16-year-old kid to evaluate wisdom. I remember Rupert, as we referred to him behind his back, tryin' to teach that rag tag bunch of boys anything (it was all boys back then). Lots of us really didn't have much in the way of money. Our projects included four or five scraggly sheep, or

a couple of steers, some pecan trees, rabbits or whatever. Sure, there were a few boys whose folks were good farmers and had impressive projects but most of us didn't. Rupert treated us all the same.

What we all had was a love of agriculture and the optimism of youth. That was what Rupert had to work with. He taught us that dirt was under your fingernails and soil was what you tilled. He tried, often in vain, to teach us how to weld and work on machinery. How to block

sheep, fit a steer, castrate a hog, and how to tell a rib steak from a chuck. It was not until much later that I came to realize how much a vo ag teacher has to know.

I said Rupert treated everybody the same. That's not quite true since he made me feel like I was special. But if the truth were known he probably made each one of us feel that way.

He wasn't impressed by politics so when we decided to

Snatching 20-year slog from jaws of victory

In his 2007 book, former CIA Director George Tenet boasts that the first U.S. covert teams were in Afghanistan 16 days after the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001.

“Less than two and a half months later, a core group of 90 CIA paramilitary officers, along

with a small number of special forces units, in combination with Afghan militias and supported by a massive aerial bombardment by the U.S. military, had defeated the Taliban and killed or captured one quarter of Usama bin Ladin’s top lieutenants, including his military commander, Mohammed Atef, a key player in the 9/11 attacks,” Tenet wrote. “Kabul had been liberated and Hamed Karzai named president by a national council. Afghanistan would be CIA’s finest hour.”

Taliban leaders fled from Kabul on Nov. 13, and on Dec. 5 the Bonn Agreement was signed in Germany, installing Karzai as president and giving majority power to North-

ern Alliance - Afghan militias who had worked with the U.S. in defeating the Taliban.

There were 12 U.S. casualties in Afghanistan at the time the nation was liberated in 2001. There have been more than 2,300 in the nearly 20 years since then.

Now that President Joe Biden has announced that all remaining troops will be removed from Afghanistan by the 20th anniversary of the 9/11 attacks later this year, it’s a fair question to ask what has been gained from two decades of war.

Especially since those who insisted that we remain in Afghanistan for the last 20 years are now criticizing the president’s decision to leave. They argue that it will result in a return to Taliban rule, with its mistreatment of women and aid toward other radical groups.

If that is true, what have we gained from the past 20 years of sacrifice? And, why will things be different if we were to stay for another 20 years?

Or 200 years?

Like most Americans, I supported the original strike against the Taliban because I was outraged by the terrorist attacks and I thought there was legitimate value in sending a message that state actors will pay a price for participating in terrorist plots against us.

Well, some state actors. Those without the money and influence of Saudi Arabia.

But, none of those supporting the war in 2001 signed on for a 20-year effort to bring Jeffersonian democracy to the remote mountain villages in the Wakhan Corridor.

There was really only one major piece of unfinished business in late 2001 after we had taken out the Taliban. And he wasn’t hiding in Iraq.

It would be another 10 years before we were able to find and kill bin Laden. His decade of free-

dom came as the U.S. had turned its attention away from the 9/11 attack and toward Iraq, a country that had no part in that atrocity.

We went to war in Iraq when that nation’s leader refused to hand over weapons of mass destruction that he no longer possessed. Which was not the CIA’s finest hour.

During the early stages of the Iraq War, President George W. Bush made the mistake of posing beneath a banner that declared

“Mission accomplished.”

But I think his mistake was not in having that photo op too soon, but rather in having it too late. If he had rolled out that banner in December 2001 and declared victory after having banished the Taliban, the war in Afghanistan would have

been seen as a great victory, the message would have been sent to nations throughout the world, and the casualty count from the war would have stood at 12.

Voter and democracy suppression on the rise

During the pandemic, access to voting increased and contributed to higher voter participation in 2020. Since the election, there have been efforts to reduce voter rights based on disinformation about voter fraud.

The Brennan Center for Justice reported that more than 250 bills have been proposed in 43 states this year that would restrict access to the ballot. Some proposals take away the vote-by-mail option, some tighten ID requirements, some rig the redistricting

process, some slash voter registration opportunities, some purge voter rolls and others directly attempt to suppress democracy. This includes ways for state legislators to modify the election process if they do not like the results.

Recently in Georgia, the governor signed a bill to make access to fair elections much more difficult, to make giving food and water to voters waiting in line to vote a misdemeanor and to give state legislators the option to remove the secretary of state and change memberships on county election boards after the election process.

Texas has some of the most restrictive voting laws in the country, and yet their governor is supporting additional restrictions, taking aim at local governments. In Harris County, which includes Houston, officials want to send applications to vote by mail to every registered voter and to provide widespread drive-thru voting. Texas lawmakers are proposing to prohibit counties from sending out mail-in applications unless they are requested by a voter, bar drive-thru voting and require voters with disabilities to provide documentation before being allowed to vote by

mail. These proposed laws would have a disproportionate effect on under-represented voters and suppresses our democracy.

A few years ago, at an October Celebrate Democracy event at the Doña Ana County building, a local elected official told the audience, "We are not a democracy; we are a republic." This suggests that suppression of democracy did not start this year. Our government can be called a representative democracy or a democratic republic.

The republic part of our government provides an organizational struc-

ture. It's a form of government where the power a) rests with the people, b) is exercised through representative government and c) has a fairly elected head of state. The democracy component provides ideology and values that include access to free and fair elections for every qualified voter, citizen participation for all and human rights to express peaceful opinions and participate in government without fear or intimidation. When these values are under attack in any state, they are under attack in the whole country.

What can we, the people, do? Send thank

you notes to our U.S. congressional representatives when they support legislation that expands voting rights and strengthens our democracy. Charge them to immediately pass the For the People Act (HR1 and S1) and the John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act. These acts will help stop voter intimidation and the spread of disinformation. Also advocate for passage of the Civics Secures Democracy Act (HR1814), which authorizes funding for federal civics-education grants. If we want a healthy representative democracy, we must stand up for it!

Guest column: Let's rethink education now

Concerning our district's efforts to move on from this pandemic-induced situation, the insights I share come from 20 years of teaching in three states — middle school, high school, college, Title 1 schools and gifted programs — and years of professional development in art education.

I'm disappointed to see the term "Learning Loss" at the center of all this. It shows me how we're completely missing this opportunity to do what the pandemic could have engendered: re-thinking education drastically. Seems like we'll just double down on failed strategies.

Sure, kids have missed a lot of instruction, but we've all learned a lot this past year. What our students at Rio Grande Prep Academy have shown me is that for so many of them, nothing about the curriculum we offer, the modalities we use, the threats we make or the high school diploma we offer are sufficient to get

them to engage in what we do. My colleagues around the district see the same thing. And that was often true before the pandemic.

What will work, I've come to believe, is waking up to the world we inhabit and stop behaving like it's the same one from 100 years ago. Like there's something magical about moving high school kids from teacher to teacher, subject to subject, at the ring of a bell. Quizzing and testing, percentages and letter grades, Core Curricula, detention and suspension to remove the "problems."

What if we created an environment that spoke to children's souls? That sparked their curiosity? That valued who they are and what they bring? What if we put them at the center of their learning?

K-6th grade – Lots and lots of play, structured and un-structured. Yes: fundamentals of reading, arithmetic and the self-discovery of the scientific method, learning by trial and error. And complete abolishing of grades, ei-

ther as numbers or letters. Kick the data nerds, the testing corporations and the policy wonks out of the henhouse and listen to the educators — kids need smaller groupings, close relationships and self-motivation. Say it with me: Authentic Assessments — notes, portfolios, recordings, artworks. And lots and lots of movement, music, dance, art, theater and play.

If we don't have them loving school at this age, we've lost many of them for life.

I taught eight years at a charter middle school — dual-language and arts-based — and for a good stretch, we were pretty successful with our students due to having strong, consistent leadership, relentless outreach to families, and a rich arts curriculum and all the community-building that creates — kids who practice together, play together and perform get highly — and naturally, authentically — invested in each other and their academic success. And many of the teachers

spent a lot of time playing sports, music and games with the kids at lunch and any other breaks we had, during testing, on half-days, etc.

7-9th – Making sure fundamentals are sound still, but self-interest can drive most learning. Student choice, project-based learning, heterogeneous grouping where interdependence is valued over individual excellence.

Where nobody lets anybody fail.

10-12th – Real world applications. Community

partners, mentors and internships. Entirely project-based, teachers and administrators are facilitators, content experts, resources and guides. Peers are those things, too.

Students move on at their own pace — ready for college at 16? Prove it, and off you go. Ready to work or apprentice at 16 or 17? Based on your skills, as demonstrated through industry-provided means — interviews, portfolios, tests — cool.

The longer I teach, the more I want to throw out

everything we're doing wrong. Let's re-envision together and push our state in the right direction.

Digging: Your Rights and Responsibilities Know what's below. Call before you dig.

New Mexico excavation law places certain responsibilities with the excavator (a person using a mechanical digging device) for preventing damage to underground facilities. The law provides for a one-call system that the excavator can use free of charge to arrange to have underground facilities located and marked before an excavation occurs.

State Law Requires Excavators to:

- 1) Plan your excavation.
- 2) Mark the excavation area in white.
- 3) Call before you dig.
- 4) Determine the location of any underground facilities.
- 5) Call the one call center if any facility is not marked to determine if it is "clear."
- 6) Preserve line location markings or provide offsets.
- 7) Expose any conflicts and maintain at least 18 inches of clearance from the horizontal mark and the edge of the mechanical digging device.
- 8) Support underground facilities during excavation as necessary.
- 9) Backfill in a careful manner.
- 10) Notify facility owners and 811 of any damage immediately.
- 11) Standard locate tickets are valid for 10 working days.

What Happens When You Call:

Once you provide the necessary information, the one call operator will confirm all pertinent details. It is your responsibility to ensure the information was properly recorded on the request. Likewise, faxed or on-line requests will be returned to you as confirmation, and it is your responsibility to immediately confirm the information is correct.

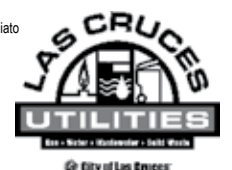
La ley de excavación de Nuevo México impone ciertas responsabilidades al excavador (Es una persona que utilice un artefacto mecánico para escarbar) para prevenir daños en las instalaciones bajo tierra. La ley provee un sistema de "una llamada" que el excavador puede utilizar sin costo para hacer arreglos para que le localicen las instalaciones bajo tierra y que estas sean marcadas antes de que la excavación ocurra.

La ley requiere que los excavadores hagan lo siguiente:

- 1) Planeé su excavación.
- 2) Llame antes de escarbar.
- 3) Marcar el área de excavación en color blanco.
- 4) Determine la ubicación de cualquiera de las instalaciones existentes bajo tierra.
- 5) Llame al centro de "una llamada" si alguna de las instalaciones no está marcada para determinar si es "seguro proseguir."
- 6) Conserve la ubicación de las líneas marcadas o proporcione la distancia/desvío.
- 7) Avise de cualquier conflicto y manténgase al menos 18 pulgadas al margen y de la orilla de algún artefacto mecánico para escarbar.
- 8) Apoye/conservar las instalaciones bajo tierra según sea necesario cuando este excavando.
- 9) Rellene con cuidado.
- 10) Avise a los dueños de las instalaciones y marque el 811 inmediatamente para reportar cualquier daño.
- 11) Las peticiones estándar (ticket) son válidas 10 días hábiles solamente.

Qué pasa cuando usted llama:

Una vez que usted proporcione la información necesaria, la operadora de "una llamada" le confirmará acerca de los detalles pertinentes. Es su responsabilidad asegurarse de que la información sea registrada adecuadamente en el documento de la petición. A sí mismo, mande por fax o por Internet su petición, se le mandará una confirmación, y es su responsabilidad corroborar de inmediato que la información es correcta.

NMSU likely to receive state funding increase

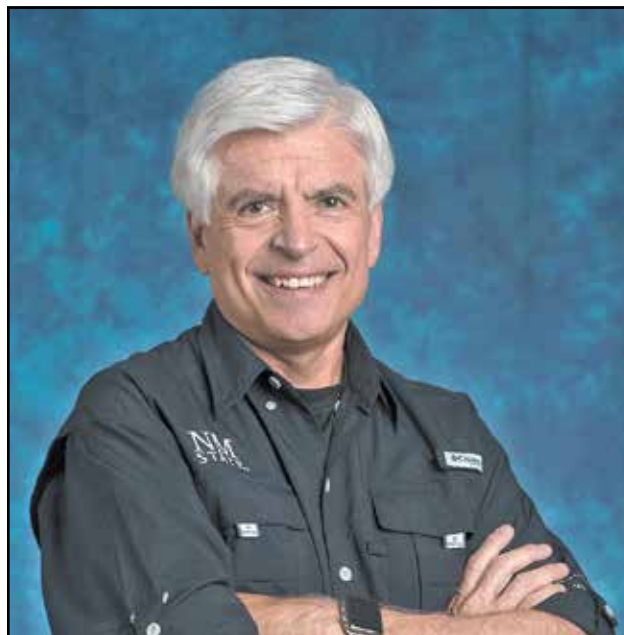

New Mexico State University will see a funding increase based on appropriations bills passed during the 2021 session of the New Mexico Legislature.

"I am happy to report that it appears our university system will see an overall increase in funding from the state for our upcoming fiscal year," NMSU Chancellor Dan Arvizu said in a legislative update.

The 60-day session ended March 20, and Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham signed the bill with some line-item vetoes to modify some language.

Among the NMSU highlights of appropriations bills awaiting action

- More than \$33 million in new financial aid for students.
- A restoration of federal funding that was swapped out during the previous session.

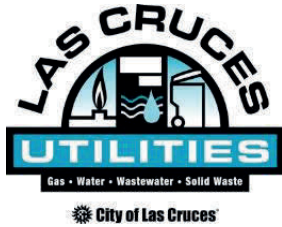

THERE'S A WEB SITE FOR THAT! LCU Customers Able to Track Bill and Usage

If you're looking to track your water usage or you're wondering if your bill is within budget, there's now a website for that! As a Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) customer, you now have access to a new tool to manage your monthly bill while conserving water and natural gas. Appropriately named UtilityHawk, the recently launched web portal can be used on any device (smartphone, laptop, tablet, and desktop computer, etc.) to access information 24-hours-a-day, seven days a week. "The user-friendly web portal provides immediate access for our customers," said Jose Provencio, LCU deputy director Business Services, "allowing them to have more control over their monthly water and natural gas consumption and in turn their pocketbook." The UtilityHawk application turns "Big Data" into information customers understand and use to their benefit. You can

also set your language preference to English or Spanish.

Register your account

Getting started is easy. Existing LCU customers can easily register to use UtilityHawk. Just enter an email address, name, contact information, and create a password at this link lascnm.utilityhawk.us today.

How to use UtilityHawk

The UtilityHawk web portal contains a host of information and options to keep you informed about your natural gas and water usage. Get current and projected bill amounts, set thresholds and alerts, and view your usage history. If you have multiple natural gas and water accounts, you can access the information for all accounts.

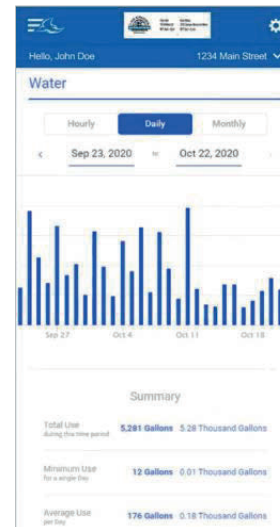
Once you sign in, you'll see information for the current billing period with both the estimated and projected bill amounts as well as the amount of

water and natural gas used.

Set Alerts

From the home page, you can access thresholds and alerts, see history of alerts, and change account settings. The Threshold page allows you to set an amount for the month and set alerts to inform you when you're getting close to the threshold amount and when you've exceeded it. This feature helps you track and take measures to adjust your usage in real time, giving you control over your monthly bill. UtilityHawk also provides Advanced Thresholds, which allows you to set limits based on amount of water and natural gas used.

"Setting alerts through the thresholds and/or advanced thresholds will let you know of any unusual changes to your utility usage and your account status. This will allow you to react and start correcting any problems," said Jeff Dillard, LCU business

systems analyst. This is important because a problem can raise your bills significantly or can potentially cause damage to your pipes and residence/business.

UtilityHawk also provides natural gas and water consumption information in easy-to-understand graphs. See your usage with hourly, daily, 48-hour, 72-hour, monthly, or yearly views to help with budgeting or conservation efforts. See how you're doing against your estimated budget and check usage on any date and time, including minimum, average, and maximum usage.

If you're looking for an easy-to-use way to track and budget your natural gas and water usage, get signed up on LCU's UtilityHawk web portal. The best part is it's free to all LCU customers.

one, they initially optioned the book and partnered with author Joe Bullock. Espinosa and his company took the idea to the studios to see what they would say about funding and distribution commitments.

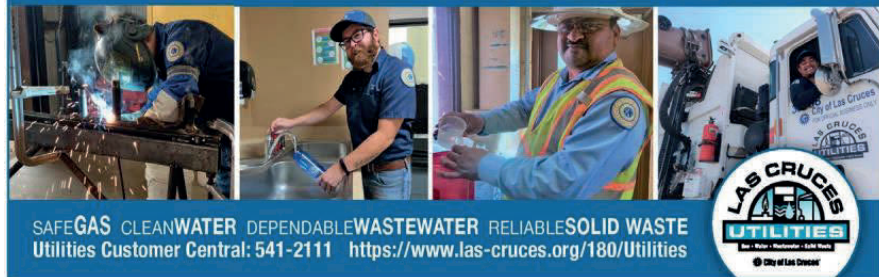
"This was very special," he said. "Very early when we started sending out the script, the actors loved it so much and wanted to do it. We decided to do independently."

SCSWA: Helping Las Cruces Grow

The growth of Las Cruces means that extra trash is on the horizon. On the West Mesa, the horizon includes the Corralitos Landfill managed by South Central Solid Waste Authority (SCSWA), which will see two new infrastructure projects in the coming years that will help support that growth.

“We are anticipating our future needs strategically,” Patrick Peck, SCSWA director, said. SCSWA released a Ten-Year Financial Plan to guide their priorities, especially at Corralitos and for recycling in Doña Ana County.

“First, we are creating a gas system at Corralitos to collect and monitor the gas emissions,” Peck said. “The EPA [Environmental Protection Agency] lowered the threshold for gas emissions, which means that we needed to go

to the next level and enhance the protection of our environment while we take care of our trash.”

Other projects include the expansion of the Chaparral Transfer Station in 2024 and the construction of Cell V at Corralitos in 2026.

SCSWA is also looking at the future of recycling. In 2023, Las Cruces will see the creation of its first Materials Recovery Facility. The facility will sort high-value materials – like clean cardboard and aluminum – out of what residents recycle and allows SCSWA

to negotiate with processors directly.

“This sorting was a process done externally before, and we’re going to pull it in-house,” Peck said. “The facility will allow us to keep all of the revenue for use in our city and be a pipeline for new jobs.”

To support this, residents will see their curbside recycling rate increase \$0.35 in 2022. If residents want to look at the financial plan in detail, it’s available online at: <https://scswa.net/FinancialPlan.pdf>

Sorg won't run for re-election to city council, Flores will run

Las Cruces City Councilor Gill Sorg will not be a candidate for re-election this November, but Councilor Yvonne Flores will run for a second term. Councilor Gabe Vasquez is expected to announce his decision about running for re-election in the near future.

City council districts 3

(Vasquez), 5 (Sorg) and 6 (Flores) will be on the Tuesday, Nov. 2, combined local election ballot, along with two seats on the Las Cruces Public Schools Board of Education and seats on the Doña Ana Soil and Water

Conservation Board of Supervisors.

"It's a difficult decision to decide what to do," Sorg said in an email to

the Bulletin. "On the one hand, I feel I am doing a lot good for the city and there is more to do. (On) the other hand, 12 years is a lot and it is time for some new person to contribute."

Sorg is completing his third four-year term on the council.

Flores said she has decided to run for re-election to the District 6

seat on the council. She defeated incumbent Ceil Levatino 57-43 percent in November 2017. Before Levatino's election in 2013, the seat had been held by Sharon Thomas, and before her by Mayor Ken Miyagishima.

Sorg won the District 5 council seat in 2009, defeating incumbent Gil Jones. Sorg was re-elected in 2013, defeating challenger David Roewe 54.8-

45.2. Sorg was re-elected in 2017 with 51 percent of the vote, compared to 41 percent for Steve Montanez and seven percent for William Fuller.

Vasquez was elected to his first term on the council, representing District 3, in 2017 when he defeated Bev Courtney, 70-30 percent. The seat had previously been held by Olga Pedroza, and before that by Dolores Archuleta.

Society of New Mexico to provide native plant identification signs for the outer garden area at the Dripping Springs Visi-

tors Center and along the La Cueva Trail. FOMDP worked with the Las Cruces chapter of the Native Plant Society and Bureau of Land Management (BLM) employees to select the native plants that would be identified with

signs by walking through each area. This process resulted in 29 plant signs being selected for the outer garden area and 39 signs selected for the La Cueva trail.

For each of the plants selected, a spreadsheet

was developed that contained the Spanish common name, the scientific name and the English common name for each of the identified native plants.

In 2021 the Dripping Springs trail will have

plant signs installed similar to these, so please look to explore the native plants along that trail later this year.

East Lohman Avenue development 'a defining moment' for city's mayor

Mayor Ken Miyagishima remembers visiting the East Lohman Avenue area in a gold Pontiac Bonneville in the early 1970s with his brother, Jim, who was teaching him to drive.

More than 40 years later, in 2017, the mayor led negotiations with the City of Albuquerque to purchase 110 acres on East Lohman between Roadrunner Boulevard and Sonoma Ranch Boulevard for \$500,000 — a fraction of the land's market value — in what Miyagishima called “a defining moment” of his administration. In 2019, Miyagishima decided to seek a fourth term as mayor in part to help guide the area's development, he said.

That development took a major step forward during an April 13 special city council work session, as the mayor, councilors and members of the city Planning and Zoning Commission (PZC) heard an update on the city's plans for the area.

The council still must vote to approve a final plan, which could take place this summer. Miyagishima said builders could “begin turning dirt” on the project as soon as next spring.

Even with \$3.5-\$4 million spent to clean up the land added to the purchase price, Miyagishima said the city could see a profit of \$45 million or more on the sale or rental of the property to builders and developers.

Miyagishima shared credit for acquiring the land with current city councilors, and with

former councilors Ceil Levatino and the late Olga Pedroza, along with then Las Cruces Utilities Department Director Jorge Garcia, who retired in 2020. The mayor also credited Las Cruces builder Eddie Binns, who did a land swap with the city that helped make the purchase from the City of Albuquerque possible.

Miyagishima said the City of Albuquerque had owned the land for a number of years, and likely acquired it when a previous owner left the land to the city in a trust.

Development plans

Several members of Sites Southwest, the city's consultant on the project, spoke at the April 13 joint work session about how the company, which has offices in El Paso and Albuquerque, came up with a “draft preferred scenario” plan for the area's development.

The plan devotes about 20 percent of the site to commercial use, including retail businesses, offices, hotels and restaurants, said Sites Southwest principal George Radnovich. The other 80 percent would be residential property that would be for sale and for rent.

The development plan also calls for bike lanes,

multi-use trails and open spaces. It also will “assure integration and connectivity with the recreation facilities and natural arroyos present in the proposed plan area,” the city said.

Several council members told Radnovich the plan must include housing for a range of incomes, with “affordable housing spread out across the whole development,” said PZC Chair Sharon Thomas, who is a former city councilor.

“We did consider mixed affordability in the housing,” Radnovich said. “We’ve heard that repeatedly from the public, and from council and planning and zoning and that is part of the planning effort that we’ve gone through and it’s also in the market study,” he said.

Sites Southwest planner Danni Wilson said public

engagement on the project included stakeholder meetings last August, a community charette in December and a public survey that garnered nearly 400 responses.

With the council's input from the April 13 meeting, Radnovich said Sites Southwest likely will present a final draft plan to the city council and to the public in May or June, with a final plan ready for a council vote in June or July.

The East Lohman area “could be a net-zero energy community,” Councilor Gill Sorg said. “I think we can make this a 21st century city with 21st century planning.”

He said the final plan should also include habitat preservation and a target of 20 percent affordable housing.

“I think this project can be very visionary, very collaborative,” Councilor Johana Bencomo said. The city's marketing strategy should include an explanation of why affordable housing is a necessary part of the development, Bencomo said.

City Community Development Director Larry Nichols said the city has already been contacted by developers who are

interested in the project and describe it as “a very attractive parcel of land for development,” Nichols said, saying, “Let's do it right; let's make it unique.”

“I'm just so pleased with the planning you've come up with here,” Thomas said. “It's something we've talked about for so long.”

The development should include the same amenities and quality of life for people of different incomes, Councilor Gabe Vasquez said.

“Let's promote as much sustainable energy production and net zero as we can,” Vasquez said.

“I think what you've developed is a wonderful plan,” PZC Commissioner Harvey Gordon said. He called for an access road on Lohman Avenue as part of the plan.

Mayor Pro-Tempore Cassandra Gandara said she is “very much for” at least 20 percent of the development's housing being mixed-income housing, and is pleased that the area is pedestrian- and bike friendly.

“I think this is a great, great concept,” Gandara said.

“It's really exciting,” Miyagishima said, adding that the site “may be too large for one developer.”

The city might break it up into three or four parts, he said, and could use a public-private partnership in development plans. The mayor also said he will reach out to engineering students at New Mexico State University to assist with infrastructure development.

Governor signs for \$28 million in county

The capital outlay bill signed last week by Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham includes more than \$28 million in funding for projects in Doña Ana County, as well as mil-

lions for other projects in southern New Mexico.

The bill funds more than \$511 million in projects throughout the state, including roughly \$64 million for water and wastewater improvements, \$53 million for roads, \$49 million for higher education, \$48 million for

public safety and \$8 million for acequias, dams and ditches. There is also \$12.5 million to support Local Economic Development Act (LEDA) projects and \$10 million for health facilities and prisons.

Lujan Grisham used her line-item veto authority to strike less than two percent of the projects included in the bill, explaining in a news release that that the projects she vetoed lacked proper planning, had unused funds from previous years or were not large enough to qualify for capital appropriation.

“Capital funds should be targeted toward well-considered and more significant infrastructure projects, and not relatively small pork items,” the news release stated.

In Doña Ana County, the most significant appropriations this year include \$3.125 million for a county flood diversion project, \$3 million to repair the utility tunnel at New Mexico State University, \$2.095 million for improvements to Sunland Park Road, \$1.839 million for warehouse construction on the Mesilla Valley Community of Hope campus in Las Cruces, \$1.3 million for improvements at the Las Cruces Armory and \$1.2 million to the Lower Rio Grande Public Water Works Authority for a new operations center.

The money for the

diversion project will be used to acquire property and to plan and construct drainage channels to the Brahman diversion channel, about four miles north of U.S. Highway 70 at Holman Road.

“That will help us considerably,” said County Manager Fernando Macias, who noted the county received nearly \$10 million in funding, more than half of its total request this year.

Among the projects vetoed by the governor were more than \$1 million for construction of a new state Department of Agriculture facility; \$811,000 for improvements to the water research lab at NMSU and \$350,000 for renovations to the Pan American Center.

Eddy County received more than \$7.8 million in funding. That included just under \$2.7 million for sewer-line extension on Old Cavern Highway, \$1.5 million for phase two of construction of the Southeast Loop Bypass Road and \$1.4 million for renovation of the Carlsbad Bataan Sanitary Sewer Lift Station.

The governor vetoed \$400,000 for improvements at NMSU Carlsbad, which will soon break away from NMSU and become an independent community college, as directed in other legislation passed this year.

More than \$9 million was approved for projects

in Chaves County. The largest appropriation was \$2.475 million, which will go toward sewer-line and infrastructure improvements at Eastern New Mexico University-Roswell.

More than \$3.5 million was approved for bridge construction on Riata Road/Pecos Road, topping the list of projects for Otero County. Other projects include \$1.725 million for construction of a new Mescalero Apache public safety building and \$1 million for replacement of the Suzy Ann Street bridge. The county received more than \$11.6 million in all.

Lea County received more than \$8.6 million, including \$1.75 million for security and safety improvements at New Mexico Junior College in Hobbs and \$1 million each for renovation of the Lea County Courthouse and an addition to the county detention center.

More than \$1.5 million in improvements for the Ruidoso Sewer System topped the list of projects in Lincoln County, which received more than \$4.5 million.

The Western New Mexico University-Deming Learning Center will receive \$3.5 million for phase two of an ongoing construction project in Luna County. The county also received \$1 million for construction of a new domestic violence

and homeless shelter and more than \$7 million total.

In Grant County, more than \$11 million was appropriated for capital projects, including \$2 million for improvements to the labor and delivery rooms at Gila Regional Medical Center. The county also received \$1.52 million to relocate its magistrate court. Other projects approved include \$1.4 million for improvements at Fort Bayard, \$1 million for Bayard water tanks and \$1 million for improvements to Little Walnut Road in Silver City.

Sierra County received a little more than \$1.7 million in total projects. The top expenditure was \$550,000 for construction of the Elephant Butte water system.

In Hidalgo County, a little more than \$1.3 million was approved. The top project there was \$500,000 for improvements to the Glen Acres drainage system.

This will be the last year that legislators will not be required to disclose their capital outlay allocations. A bill passed this year will establish a new public database where future allocations will be posted for each member of the Legislature.

"In partnership with the Ford Foundation, NALAC will grant \$1.42M across California, Texas, Arizona, New Mexico (including Mondragón and La Semilla) and transnationally to a cohort of 27 artists and organizations," said NALAC Communications Associate Gabriel Magraner.

NALAC Border Narrative Change grant recipients "were selected through a series of virtual cafecitos with artists, activists and cultural leaders across the U.S.-Mexico border region," NALAC said in a news release. The awards are part of a larger three-year initiative in which NALAC will partner with the Ford Foundation, Borealis Philanthropy, the Center for Cultural Power and the National Association of Hispanic Journalists to launch Reclaiming the Border Narrative.

Focusing on faces: Bunch comes into her own

The only spanking long-time Las Cruces artist Carolyn Bunch ever got was for ruining her mother's fountain pen when she used it to draw a picture of Snow White.

"It wasn't positive reinforcement, but it didn't stop me either," said Bunch, a native of Fairfield, Iowa who moved to Las Cruces from California in 1953.

Throughout her many years as a fixture in the local art scene, Bunch said her favorite subject has always been people.

"I really enjoy the human face," Bunch said.

She studied figure drawing for two years at the Chicago Art Institute, and also had two years of

college before coming to Las Cruces. Bunch earned a degree in art education from New Mexico State University and became one of Las Cruces Public School's three elementary art teachers, traveling among schools across the district for 15 years before her retirement in 1974.

"It was a joyous thing to go from room to room because the kids were so happy to see us," Bunch said. Using large sheets of paper or drawing on the blackboard (she has loved colored chalk since childhood), Bunch taught young children to draw simple pictures, often still life, using crayons.

"Bunch's mother bought she and her sister a new box of Crayolas every month. Blue — 'every shade' — has

always been Bunch's favorite color.

Bunch said she usually makes a sketch or takes a photograph of something she wants to paint — "when I see a face I like; it has to be an interesting face," she said — and then returns to her studio to create the actual painting.

Bunch opened her first gallery in 1983 in a renovated adobe building in Mesilla that dates back to 1853.

"It was a spacious building constructed around a large indoor courtyard," Bunch said. "The gallery was one side, and the living quarters — where she and her husband, Henry Bunch, lived — were on the other side. There were four iterations of the Adobe Patio Gallery until the most recent closing in 2016," she said.

Henry Bunch has just completed work on a new studio and art library for Carolyn that is part of their Mesilla Park home. The sun-filled space will include Bunch's faces

and figures, along with a handful of her landscapes.

She has found people — and especially faces — to paint during travels around the world, including Ireland, England, Guatemala, Morocco, Yugoslavia, Italy and the San Miguel de Allende Institute of Art in Mexico.

"Florence is still my favorite place in the world," Bunch said. Florence is also the birthplace of her favorite artist, American portrait painter John Singer Sargent (1856-1925). Sargent mastered "darker darks and lighter lights," she said. Bunch also admires the work of Dutch painter Johannes Vermeer (1632-75) and Spanish painter Francisco Goya (1746-1828).

Visiting the Prado Museum in Madrid with her son, artist Tony Pennock, in 1974 was "such a wonderful time," she said.

Bunch said Pennock is the only one of her five children to follow in her footsteps as an artist.

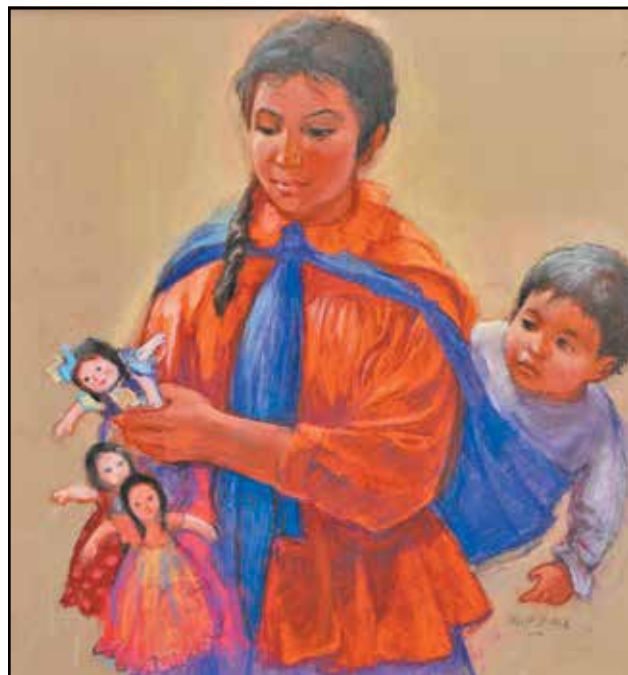


The creator of 10 water-tank murals in and around Las Cruces, Pennock is among the most popular and prolific artists around.

Bunch also has 15 grandchildren (two are artists) and six great-grandchildren. They are

often the subjects of her paintings.

Painting in her in-home studio "is the most relaxing thing I do," Bunch said. "It's also the most intense thing I do. It takes continuing effort. You can be happy but never be satisfied with it."

University Art Museum hosts live, virtual MFA, BFA thesis exhibitions; timed tickets available

The New Mexico State University Art Museum (UAM) will host "Syn-2021 Thesis Exhibition," featuring the work of MFA candidates Ger Xiong and Cierra Redding, Friday, April 23-Saturday, May 15.

Also April 23-May 15, UAM will host "Dispositions," featuring work by bachelor of fine arts candidates Jesus Del Rio, Jiyong Kim and Blanca Martinez.

Virtual and live opening receptions will be held 5:30-7:30 p.m. April 23. The receptions are free and open to the public.

UAM is located in Devasthali Hall, 1308 E. University Ave. The museum

is regularly open noon-4 p.m. Wednesday-Saturday.

Visit UAM's timed-ticket website at <https://uam.nmsu.edu/> to register for free tickets to attend current exhibitions at <https://uam.nmsu.edu/timed-tickets/>.

All visitors must sign up for timed entry. Based on public health orders, 10 visitors are allowed into the museum at one time in half-hour increments. Visitors must enter the museum on the northeast side of Devasthali Hall and wait on the outside patio until their scheduled visit time. All staff and visitors, except for children ages two and under, are required to wear masks while visiting the

museum. Visitors must practice social distancing and must wash or sanitize their hands before and during each visit. Sanitizing stations are available throughout the museum wing.

The MFA exhibition "looks at how each artist navigates their identities differently through the use of materiality, form and objects, UAM said in a news release. "Within the exhibition space, viewers are confronted with histories of loss and absence."

"Between them exists an engaging discourse, which feels timely and timeless," said NMSU Art Department assistant professor Joshua Clark. "Both artists are wrestling with one of the oldest human conundrums: how to conserve the worthy aspects of our past, both collectively and personally."

"Xiong's work depicts the navigation and negotiation of his cultural identity of being Hmong American," UAM said.

"Through the lenses of assimilation, migration, colonization, commodification and resilience of being Hmong, his finely crafted textiles and wearable objects are visual narratives, telling stories of his and his family's migration. As (part of a) stateless people within dominant spaces, his work becomes a tool of documentation and storytelling to preserve his identity, history and culture, connecting stories of our past to the present."

"Born with a rare eye condition called Nystagmus, Redding explores her surroundings through touch," the news release said. "In this body of work, Redding focuses on lost interactions in a world of human separation and social isolation. To deal with her own isolation, Redding was inspired by a quote from family therapist Virginia Satir that prescribes a regimen of eight daily hugs to maintain emotional

well-being. In search of a remedy, Redding followed this guidance by sculpting eight 'hug' impressions to document and display the loss she has endured, while paradoxically giving herself the opportunity to experience the feeling of physical touch."

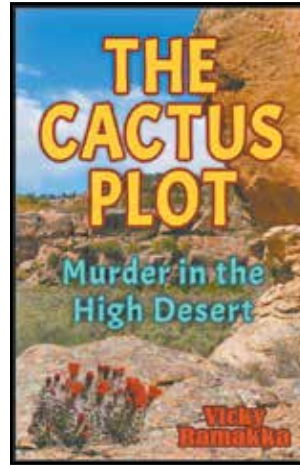

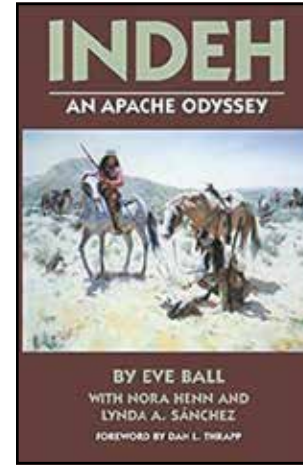

Builder Kimball Hakes: Casa for a Cause is ‘a lot of great people motivated to help other people’

Kimball Hakes and his brothers, Chris and Josh, opened Hakes Brothers builders in 2006 in Las Cruces. In 15 years, they have grown it into the largest homebuilder based in New Mexico. The company passed the 3,000-homes-built mark earlier this year and now has offices in Las Cruces, Albuquerque, El Paso and San Antonio.

The brothers wanted to give back to the community they love, he said. So, in 2014, when he was president of the Las Cruces Home Builders Association (LCHBA), Kimball Hakes suggested a fundraising project for local nonprofits called Anniversary House because it celebrated LCHBA's 55th anniversary.

His uncle was president of a home builders association in Utah and had participated in several home-building projects to benefit community-based organizations, Hakes said.

Hakes thought it “would be a great project to connect (Las Cruces) homebuilders to the community ... and give us an opportunity to give back and to support a lot of these outstanding causes that we have from local nonprofits.

“We just decided we were going to do it,”

Hakes said. The LCHBA board discussed it, he said, and “everybody was excited to do it. Hakes Brothers got the privilege to be the first ones to do it. We chose a popular floor plan and put it in a popular community, Metro Verde.”

Hakes said he and his brothers contacted their contractors, suppliers, lenders, title company and the City of Las Cruces to ask for donations and support.

“Everybody contributed,” he said. “Everybody stepped up.”

That first year, the profit from the sale of the finished house was \$64,000, which was donated to a number of local nonprofits.

“We were shocked” by the amount raised with that first house, he said. “We didn’t expect it to be that successful. We were amazed at the generosity of all the people involved



in constructing a home.”

Houses built in 2015, 2017 and 2018 have generated an additional \$280,000 for local nonprofits.

LCHBA changed the name of the project from Anniversary House to Casa for a Cause for the 2021 build. The goal for this year’s builder, Adam Juarez of A New Beginning Custom Homes, is to top the 2018 profit of \$125,000 by at least \$1.

“I just think it’s a great project,” Hakes said.

“It’s a great opportunity. I’m excited we’re doing it again. I think it’s the obligation of the business community to give back to the community — all businesses, not just home-

Hakes Brothers STEM Scholarship Offers \$6,000 Opportunity

Through the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico (CFSNM), the Hakes Brothers have created the Hakes Brothers STEM Scholarship, which will provide a New Mexico State University student with an opportunity to advance his or her education with a \$6,000 scholarship, CFSNM said in a news release.

A student who applies for the scholarship must: 1) be a New Mexico resident attending NMSU or any of its branch campuses; 2) be studying in a field associated with science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) or accounting; 3) be a single parent; 4) have provided some community service as a volunteer; and 4) demonstrate a financial need, with a family income less than \$50,000.

“The STEM Scholarship provides us with the opportunity to give back to a community that has allowed us to grow,” said Hakes Brothers President Kimball Hakes. “We continuously strive to stay involved in ongoing partnerships with local organizations that assist in providing support to families, individuals and the area community at large.”

builders, but everyone. That’s our obligation as citizens of our community.”

Anniversary House/Casa for a Cause also “has raised our awareness of all that goes on in the community and how important it is,” Hakes said. “At the same time, I think it also shows the economic power involved in construction and homebuilding,” he said.

“There’s about 30-40 businesses involved in build-

ing a home, contractors and suppliers. A healthy construction industry is healthy for communities. It’s healthy for so many people and their livelihood.”

Anniversary House/Casa for a Cause is “just one little glimpse of how important that economic energy is for our community,” he said.

Hakes said home building continues to be very strong in Las Cruces — “one of the only bright

spots during the pandemic.

“There’s a lot of reasons for that,” he said, including Las Cruces’ great weather, its smaller population compared to big cities, the health and safety of the community and lower interest rates.

“I love it here so much,” Hakes said. Natives of Arizona, the Hakes brothers came to Las Cruces when their father, former Doña Ana County Commissioner Kim Hakes, came here to lead Community First Bank in 1999.

“We are focused on hitting the sweet spot for buyers” that comes between the design and the construction, Hakes said.

“People want to have a home that inspires them, that they feel comfortable in and can enjoy,” he said.

“Design is a huge element for us. We focus on the quality of the build. There’s a lot of hidden values of a home that aren’t readily apparent because they’re behind the wall,” like insulation, electrical and heating and air conditioning, he said. Visible components, including everything from the roof to kitchen cabinets, fixtures and the paint job — “We want these things to be high quality,”

NMSU film students launch campaign to encourage donations to Camp Hope

New Mexico State University's Creative Media Institute (CMI) not only teaches state-of-the-art filmmaking and animation techniques to make students marketable for jobs in the film and television industry, but one course is helping them use the tools of filmmaking to make a difference in the Las Cruces community.

"I think a lot of people think about the kinds of movies you see at the Allen Theaters, when they think of what it is we do as filmmakers, and creating moving images for entertainment is definitely a big part of what we teach at CMI," said CMI professor and department head Amy Lanasa. "But film is also a medium that allows us to tell genuine human stories about complex societal problems, and it can be used as a catalyst for organizing, network-building and civic action."

Recently, one team of NMSU student filmmakers shot a film and coupled it with a GoFundMe campaign to raise \$10,000 in 45 days to fund one year of resources for 50 people at Camp Hope, which serves people struggling with homelessness at Las Cruces' Mesilla Valley Community of Hope

(MVCH). The campaign, launched in late March, encourages the community to donate a portion of their stimulus checks to Camp Hope. In its first two weeks, the project has raised nearly \$2,500.

"I have worked with MVCH before at Jardin de los Niños (childcare for children and their families struggling with homelessness), so I was aware of some of the basic ideas of what they did for their residents in that area," said Fernando Rivera, a CMI senior studying digital filmmaking.

Samantha D'Amico, Mario Martinez and Kyle Ivy teamed up with Rivera on the project for NMSU professor Ilana Lapid's course about the social impact of filmmaking.

"I want to encourage my students to harness the power of visual storytelling to not only entertain, but also to engage with the pressing issues of our time," Lapid said. "Issues that matter to them. I want to train my students to be content creators who can also be change makers in the world, who can choose to create media that has impact in their community."

"I had a preconceived idea of what causes someone to become homeless yet after hearing all of their unique stories I gained a fresh perspective

and a deeper compassion," D'Amico said.

The students based their fundraising goal on supporting one year of services for high-cost items like tents, sleeping bags and laundry detergent.

"The residents of Camp Hope were excited to share their stories with the students from NMSU," said MVCH Executive Director Nicole Martinez. "We had more participation for interviews from the residents than we typically have had in the past. From those we asked, they said they were surprised that students wanted to give up some of their stimulus checks to help homeless people they did not even know."

As student filmmakers interviewed residents at Camp Hope for their film, they were surprised to discover the range of diversity among Las Cruces' homeless population and the various stories that led them to Camp Hope.

"The backgrounds of their experiences ranged from being an engineer and having everything to escaping an abusive family," Rivera said. "Through film we not only express our ideas but we have the power to express our emotions."

Santa Teresa lands two Chihuahua food distribution operations

BULLETIN REPORT

Rio Blue Produce and Sierra Madre Produce, both with operations in Chihuahua, Mexico, have selected Santa Teresa to grow their North American markets, the Garrity Group Public Relations said in an April 12 news release.

The two companies will occupy a combined 92,000 square feet of warehouse and distribution space in Santa Teresa, the news release said.

Rio Blue Produce, an international onion producer, will hire 20 employees to facilitate packaged onions, watermelons and chile peppers in a 60,000-square-foot



food distribution warehouse in Santa Teresa. The company was founded in 2016 and is expecting to make 1,500 truck crossings across the United States-Mexico border at the Santa Teresa Port of Entry (STPOE) annually.

“Santa Teresa is ideally located for us to conduct our cross-border business between the U.S. and Mexico,” Rio Blue President Denver Penner told Garrity Group in the news release. “Its superior infrastructure and fast-crossing port of



entry are ideal for our business.”

Sierra Madre Produce will hire 12 employees to work in its 32,000-square-foot warehouse. The Nuevo Casas Grande region produce company will import onions, chiles and tomatillos grown in Mexico.

“We are coming to Santa Teresa because of its locational advantages and fast commercial

crossings at STPOE,” said Sierra Madre Produce President Steven Romney. “And the overriding factor that sealed our choice of Santa Teresa is the overweight cargo zone (a 12-mile overweight cargo zone that allows trucks to enter New Mexico from Mexico for a single \$250 annual permit), which will provide us with significant logistical savings.”

“Fernando Thome’s leadership of STPOE has resulted in cargo crossing in 10-30 minutes compared to two to six hours in El Paso and Tucson,” said Jerry Pacheco, senior business advisor with the New Mexico Partnership. “When you

consider the border efficiencies, availability and affordability of industrial space and access to interstates, rail and an international airport, companies are making the decision to locate warehouse and distribution operations in Santa Teresa.”

The New Mexico Partnership is designated by the State of New Mexico as the single point of contact for locating businesses in New Mexico, the Garrity Group news release said.

Garrity Group said Santa Teresa offers other important advantages, including access to the Union Pacific Intermodal Facility; regular 737 cargo jet service at Santa

Teresa Jetport; Port of Entry in El Paso, which is said has a wait time of two to six hours; and companies’ ability to reach 75 percent of the U.S. population in two days.

“These projects add to a growing cluster of our value-added agriculture industry in Doña Ana County, enhancing the visibility of logistics to further service existing, as well as support the attraction of new, food processing and manufacturing operations,” said Mesilla Valley Economic Development Alliance (MVEDA) President and CEO Davin Lopez.

State grant helps La Primera Tortilla Factory expand

La Primera Tortilla Factory, 102 Palomas Place in Sunland Park, will receive assistance from the New Mexico Economic Development Department (EDD) that will allow it to double in size and add more than a dozen employees, EDD said in an April news release.

La Primera is the “premiere source of authentic Mexican tortillas,” according to www.laprimera-tortilla.com.

Founded by Jose and Aurora Favela in 1984 in Sunland Park, La Primera relies on a family recipe “passed down through many generations,” the website said.

The family business



started by selling fresh tortillas wrapped in paper and stored in a container to stay warm for customers, La Primera secretary-treasurer Juan Carlos Favela said in the news release. It still sells that product, but also produces in quantity for regional

retail stores, including Walmart and Lowe’s grocery stores in the El Paso and Doña Ana County area.

“A lot of people call us from all over the United States,” Favela said. “We ship tostadas, we ship tortillas. We’ve always

tried to keep it as fresh as can be. But we have never had enough space to do everything we want. Now with the state partnership we can expand in New Mexico, grow, hire new workers and have financial stability.”

EDD’s assistance “will help the company grow manufacturing at its existing facility, “essentially doubling its space to sell to schools, hospitals, jails and other institutional customers, the news release said.

The company has qualified for a \$50,000 Local Economic Development Act (LEDA) job-creation grant for the expansion. La Primera plans to invest \$2.7 million in equipment and add 14 employees over the next three years.

This is the third LEDA project in 2021, along with Los Poblanos Historic Inn and Organic Farm and Bueno Foods, to boost local food capacity and create jobs in value-added agriculture and food processing, EDD said.

The City of Sunland Park is the fiscal agent for the La Primera project.

“La Primera Tortilla Factory is a testament of successful partnerships



that prove that Sunland Park is the place to be,” Sunland Park Mayor Javier Perea said. “The city looks forward to their expansion and is commit-

ted to connecting even more local business to resources that help them grow.”

Horse N Hound settles at home at new location on Motel Boulevard

After many years at its well-known location on Amador Avenue, Horse N Hound Feed N Supply moved to a new location at 208 N. Motel Blvd. last June, and changed ownership.

The new location is bigger than the Amador Avenue property, which was sold to the City of Las Cruces and will become part of the Casa de Pergrinos emergency food program. And, under new owner Clay Franklin of Food Innovations, LLC., Horse N Hound is more focused on animal food and animal health than merchandise, said Assistant Manager Vince Gardner.

With a staff of 10, Horse



N Hound has food and everything else needed to provide for the health and welfare of both household pets and livestock, Gardner said.

That includes horses and cattle, dogs and cats, tortoises and rabbits and even lizards and fish. Horse N Hound also regularly fills special orders

for alpaca food, said Gardner, a native of Portales who has a special place in his heart for dairy heifers because he used to show them.

Gardner said the move from Amador Avenue to Motel Boulevard took about three months, and the pandemic has prevented Horse N Hound from hosting a grand opening event – but that may still be coming up, he said.

Edge and LaRue Edgmon began the history of Horse N Hound in 1983 when they opened a Purina Feed Store in a small warehouse, according to www.horsenhoundfeed.com/about-us. The Edgmons sold the business to their grandson, Curtis Creighton, in 2005. He

moved the store into a larger location and expanded the selections of merchandise. Franklin bought Horse N Hound last year.

At least a dozen authors have written books having to do with winning "the game of life." Life is not a game. Just ask the living Holocaust survivors whether they regard life as a game.

Back to golf. If we pay attention closely, golf can provide myriad life

lessons, while awareness of the complications of successful living can offer lessons which will strengthen your golf

game. The possibilities, for both learning opportunities, are truly limitless. In my personal library of about 800 golf books there are many dealing with

golf and life, including "The Golfer's Guide to the Meaning of Life" by Gary Player, and "Golf and Life" by Jack Nicklaus. However,

let me present my own thoughts regarding this question of lessons of golf and life.

I think one of the most important aspect of sports, and golf in particular, is the matter of sportsmanship. (As far as the history of the Olympics go, I guess the Russians didn't get the memo.) How does good sportsmanship in golf pertain to everything else you do? Golf is a game of honor. It's important how you handle yourself and treat and respect our fellow competitors. You might be

able to figure your own sportsmanship grade by whether other golfers relish the opportunity to play with you. Behavior counts in just about everything we do. Countless business executives, celebrities and politicians can attribute their failures on bad behavior. A round of golf offers ample occasions for expressing fine sportsmanship.

The most challenging difficulties we inevitably face, both in golf and in life, involves dealing

with adversity. Personally, I had to handle major adversity after a nearly fatal falling accident 10 years ago. I kept a positive attitude, and thanks to my wife, family and friends, I did not get down one bit. Ever since I have maintained my single figure handicap. During every round of golf we face bad breaks, crazy bounces and occasional "disasters." The key is never give up!

One of the principles of life as applied to golf is awareness and adjustment. A lesson golf requires is an almost continual demand on our awareness of conditions and multiple other factors, along with the

skill to adjust to multiple changes. Shot for shot, hole for hole, good golf depends on being able to sense what is happening and make the necessary corrections. How many times have we failed to understand the wind, or miss-read the slopes and the hills, or gone brain-dead on the speed of the greens? Anyone who has a job they want to keep should internalize the idea of awareness and adjustment. And a man-

ager, supervisor, CEO or in any position of authority, even including being a parent, is wise to think awareness and adjustment.

Life, like golf, seems to be a process. Mostly, if one is not a trust-fund child, it is a matter of effort and work. In my case, trying to make it as a corporate suit didn't work out. Being a retail entrepreneur wasn't satisfactory, so I reinvented myself, starting in 1986.

In 1988 I came to NMSU to become a practicing clinical and sport psychologist. I was fully committed to my new calling and my mission, and it was years of effort and work to see that my private plan was a good one. Improving your golf game, as a senior may take reinventing yourself as a golfer. It will take a vision, commitment, effort and work.

There is no question that a fundamental part of playing personal satisfying golf is emotional stability. It's an interplay between thoughts and emotions. Science suggests that emotions

(rage, elation, etc.) trump thinking. We all know that good golf relies on good nerves, and nerves rely on emotions. Success in business and life depends on stable emotions. As a golfer, who has thought about

golf, what have you learned about yourself?
