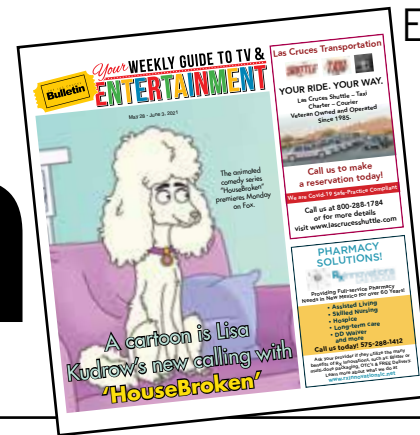

COUNTY SEEKS APPLICANT FOR AIRPORT ADVISORY BOARD

The Airport Advisory Board for the Doña Ana County International Jetport in Santa Teresa seeks applicants to serve on the seven-member body. Applications are due by 5 p.m. on Friday, June 11.

Members work closely with the jetport manager, County engineer, planning director and a representative from the County Legal Department to identify safety, growth, development or administration issues relevant to the airport.

The selected applicant will fulfill the term of an individual that resigned from the Board. The term will run from July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022. The Board serves a staggered three-year term, meets monthly and periodically reports to the Board of County Commissioners. It also recommends changes or informs about upcoming challenges and opportunities in the airport's operations or administration.

All Airport Advisory Board meetings comply with the New Mexico Open Meetings Act, which means, among other things that the Board's agendas for regular and special meetings are available to the public, at least seventy-two hours prior to the meetings and that they are posted on the Doña Ana County website. The meetings are also open to the public.

Applicants must reside in Doña Ana County or El Paso and the application includes an interest in serving, knowledge of aviation and airport issues, along with the applicant's qualifications to serve. Licensed pilots are encouraged to apply.

The City of Las Cruces' garrison flag will be flying on Memorial Day at Veterans Memorial Park, 1151 Roadrunner Parkway, and members of the city Veterans Advisory Board will place candles on the Veterans Memorial Wall.

"Our Veterans Park is better characterized as hallowed ground, recognizing the sacrifices of our brave heroes who served this great country of ours," said Mayor Ken Miyagishima. "While extending an opportunity for our young ones to better understand the role of the U.S. military

and when America needs her heroes, these brave women and men answer the call."

The park was dedicated May 5, 1999. It was built as a cooperative effort by the City of Las Cruces and the Las Cruces Home Builders Association in conjunction with the Veterans Advisory Board and the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board.

The park's memorial walking path guides visitors through monuments honoring Disabled American Veterans, other veterans' groups and military organizations and the wars they fought in.

The Vietnam Memorial honors the 398 New Mexicans killed during the Vietnam War.

The Bataan Death March Memorial was

dedicated April 13, 2002. Bonnie and Gerry Schurtz of Las Cruces traveled across New Mexico taking plaster casts of the bare feet of survivors of the

1942 Bataan Death March in the Philippines for the footprints placed at base of the monument. Members of the Remember Bataan Foundation, com-

prised of descendants of Bataan soldiers, clean and maintain the monument.

The Women Veterans Monument was dedicated March 10, 2018. The project was spearheaded by the United Military Women of the Southwest and is one of only a few of its kind across the country that honor military women.

"Veterans Memorial Park is a very special place," retired U.S. Marine Capt. Carol J. Gaines said. "It pleases me, makes me grateful that veterans are remembered and honored, and sad as I remember those veteran friends from

Who do you carry? Honoring the memory of those who served

Relay manager Michael “Goldy” Golden is part of a mission to bring back the true meaning of Memorial Day.

“The purpose of what it’s about gets lost sometimes,” he said.

In 2011, a couple of Navy SEALs who had lost several friends were disturbed about the way Memorial Day was handled, Golden said. They put backpacks on, put weights in their packs and started walking. They walked around White Rock Lake in Dallas and had some friends join them.

In 2012, they decided to have a relay and walked from West Point, New York, to Dallas, more people joined them and Carry the Load was born. The group became a nonprofit that provides active ways to connect Americans to the sacrifices of the nation’s military, veterans, first responders and their families.

Carry the Load has turned into a worldwide movement to honor and

remember the nation’s heroes, and now has four different relays across the country.

In 2016, the organization opened up the West Coast Relay, traveling 4,600 miles from Seattle to Dallas in 32 days, Golden said as he and other organizers made stops in Las Cruces on May 18.

They left Seattle on April 29 and will arrive in Dallas May 30. The four relays will meet up and hold a rally.

“We meet incredible people along the way,” Golden said. “From a personal perspective, it

gives you the feel of what America is really about.”

Media coordinator Meagan Heathcott said she has always had a deep appreciation for those who protect others.

“It’s important to me and our team to celebrate their life and to honor their sacrifices and to continue to make sure they are not forgotten,” she said.

The team provides support for those on the relay, making sure they are hydrated and have all they need.

“Whether we have a group of one or a group of

30, we make sure they are safe,” she said.

Golden said in 2011 when the event started, when those two guys started walking, an older gentleman looked at them and asked, “Who are you carrying?,” because he could see they had a purpose and he could see there was a mission to what they were doing.

“It was the perfect phrase,” Golden said. “So now we ask, ‘Who can we carry for you? What’s your story? Who are you carrying?’”

“Ultimately we want people on Memorial Day

to remember someone who has served. We expanded; we include first responders as well. Without them taking care of our veterans’ families at home, our service members couldn’t do their jobs.”

He said Carry the Load has bibs they put the names on and participants can carry them on a segment of the relay. Each segment is 2 to 4 hours long.

“Most people do have someone in mind to carry, whether it’s their family or a loved one or somebody they have connections with,” Heathcott said. “And we do display our storyboards. Anybody is welcome to join and keep our stories alive.”

Walking on one of the legs through Las Cruces, Jason Diggins’ carries the load of Deputy Samuel Leonard and Sgt. Stephen Jones of the Concho County, Texas, Sheriff’s Department, who were killed several days earlier when responding to a dog

disturbance when a man came to the door and shot them.

Up to this year Carry the Load has raised more than \$26 million, Golden said. This year, the goal is \$1.25 million and well on its way. The organization does not directly provide services but rather has organizations that apply to them and receive funds.

For example, he said, 22 Kill is an organization

a long time ago and those here in Las Cruces that have died.

“But mostly I think about the veterans in Las Cruces of all services and all eras and the camaraderie that we share ... What could be better than that?” Gaines added. “We have a special bond that others do not understand.”

In November 2019, the Las Cruces City Council voted unanimously to adopt a conceptual master plan for the park that will include the addition of a new parking lot, more space for memorials and monuments and additional landscaping and other features.

The city Parks and Recreation Department is finalizing pathway lighting and design at the park, repairing lighting at the Women’s Memorial, re-coating asphalt pathways and finalizing construction documents for the new parking lot, said Parks and Rec Director Sonya Delgado.

“It is very important that all veterans have an area dedicated to them,” said New Mexico Disabled American Veterans Chapter 10 of Las Cruces Adjutant Jerry Hernan-

dez. “As servicemen and women military veterans, we have also served our country to the fullest and then beyond. We protect our nation and we will not give up even if we do not actually serve anymore.”

Communities give back to veterans and military personnel, Hernandez said, and the park “is one great way of doing that.”

Veterans Park also shows “all those conflicts and wars that we have participated in and honoring those who have passed and served,” he said.

The park is also a connecting point for city hiking and biking trails (www.las-cruces.org/1417/Trails), and it is home to burrowing owls and other desert dwellers.

“Last I heard, that number is down to 17,” Golden said. “So 22 Kill and organizations like it are having an impact. Still even 17 per day is too much.”

Carry the Load’s mission is to provide an active

Remembering the fallen, and also their families

In elementary school, at least in my day, when you made a good grade, the teacher would put a gold star on your paper.

Getting a gold star could make a kid's day.

If you're a mom, however, getting a gold star could darken all the rest of your days.

Families who have a son or daughter serving in active duty military are "Blue Star Families," and often mark the status in their home's window with a small white flag trimmed in red, with a blue star in the center.

If one of those serving is killed in combat, the star changes from blue to gold. Blue Star Families have great pride in their loved ones, but no one wants to become a Gold Star Family.

These star flags are American traditions dating back to World War I.

Going back further, to the end of the Civil War, America

formalized the recognition of its war fallen with Decoration Day. Decoration Day evolved into Memorial Day which, for many years, was set as May 30. Then in 1971, 50 years ago, the U.S. government established Memorial Day as a federal holiday, to be celebrated the last Monday in May.

Americans love the concept of the three-day weekend, and our traditional summers are bookended by Memorial Day weekend in May and Labor Day weekend in September, with the Independence Day celebration in between.

However, the vacation aspects of these federal holidays sometimes take a front seat over the real meaning of the days. We Americans typically mark Memorial Day by shopping big sales. And, of course, it's hard to let the day go by without putting some burgers and hot dogs on the grill.

Those things are fine, and

provide good opportunities for us to be with loved ones.

But let's make a point this year to set aside some time to recognize the reason for Memorial Day.

If yours is one of the unfortunate families who lost someone in combat, you probably honor your hero with a vigil, altar, remembrance, prayers or a combination of those.

The rest of us can also find ways to commemorate the day. It could be putting flowers on the grave of one who made the supreme sacrifice. Maybe it's reading a book or an article about a war or a battle. There have been some powerful movies made on the subject of war and sacrifice; watching one can remind us of the cost of our freedoms.

If you're going to watch a movie, here are some recommendations. Each of these movies deal with the horror and bravery, as well as the emotional and psychological complexities, of war: "The Longest

Day" (WWII, D-Day), "The Hurt Locker" (Iraq War), "Sergeant York" (WWI), "Platoon" (Vietnam), "The Best Years of Our Lives" (WWII).

New Mexico has an important military history, and there are some war movies with ties to our state. There are several movies about the Bataan Death March, which included a lot of New Mexicans, and is commemorated with an annual event at White Sands Missile Range. "The Story of G.I. Joe" is about the great WWII correspondent Ernie Pyle, who lived much of his life in Albuquerque, and died in the line of duty.

I recently learned "The Red Badge of Courage" (Civil War), perhaps my favorite war movie, has a New Mexico connection. The movie's star is Audie Murphy, a war hero himself. One of the supporting actors is Bill Mauldin, a New Mexican who gained fame during WWII for

Our Airport's Future

As Airport Advisory Board Chair for 8 years I found most view an airport from what is called the "Inside the Terminal

View (ITV)", justifiably so because most users of airports only see that side.

Our airport's significance must be viewed from what is called "The Air Side Perspective (ASP)" or outside the glass which explains what viability our airport holds for the community and beyond. We spent thousands of dollars of taxpayer money creating a long-term master plan for Las Cruces airport but it appears

to have been shelved because our City government and populace seem to not be able to venture past the view through the glass.

The Master or Vision Plan was not to be a "Build To" plan but a vision of the possibilities and capabilities our airport possesses as we move through the next 20 years which are easily as uncertain as the previous 20 years. If Las Cruces is serious about scheduled commercial air

service, the City will once again have to do what they did for the past scheduled carrier which was to buy enough of the empty seats so the airline is not flying unprofitably. Beyond that, the City needs to find enterprises that can capitalize on our great airport to the benefit of themselves and Las Cruces.

We need a more honest retelling of our history

I graduated from both high school and college thinking that the Underground Railroad was an actual train, with Harriet Tubman at the controls.

When I read about the controversy regarding plans by the Las Cruces school district to develop a more equitable curriculum, I thought back to my school days and how shallow and misleading my education was as to the contributions made by those who did not sail over willingly from Europe, and their descendants.

The history of our nation taught when I was in school was one that always ended in redemption. I learned that slaves

were brought to America long before the revolution against the British, and that they were treated with horrible cruelty and brutality. But redemption came in the form of Abraham Lincoln and the Emancipation Proclamation.

The assassination of Lincoln then ruined plans for an orderly reconstruction of the Southern states after the Civil War, leading to several more decades of cruelty and brutality. But redemption came in the form of Martin Luther King Jr. and the civil rights movement.

I remember learning about a handful of historical black figures — Frederick Douglass, George Washington Carver and,

of course, Tubman. It's a pretty short list. And in each case, what I learned was the story — the mythology.

I don't remember learning anything at all about the historical contributions made by Hispanics. There was no mention that peaceful, prosperous societies existed on the American continent long before the arrival of Columbus.

Historian James W. Loewen did a terrific job of exploding the myths and explaining the ethnocentric slant of American history textbooks back in 1995 with his book "Lies my Teacher Told Me." It still holds up nearly three decades later.

Which is unfortunate. Change has come far too slowly, and never without

a fight from those still clinging to a more sanitized version of our nation's origin story.

But change is coming. The Las Cruces school district is considering something called Policy JBC Equity and Excellence for All Students. I don't know enough about the specifics of that policy, and what actual changes it would bring to the classroom, to either endorse or condemn it. But I do support the goal, which, according to Associate Superintendent Roberto Lozano, is to develop a curriculum that is more relevant to students of all backgrounds.

The American history

that I and others from my generation were taught in school was literally too good to be true. That's just human nature. People of all nations want to glorify their ancestors and gloss over the darker periods.

But a dishonest recounting of history leaves us unable to learn from past mistakes and more apt to repeat them. And, it makes it more difficult to appreciate how past acts of discrimination still impact our society today.

American history is filled with the heroic exploits of courageous warriors and the life-changing and life-saving inventions of brilliant scientists and inventors. Our ancestors

built the strongest, most prosperous nation on the planet. There is much to be celebrated.

A more honest telling of our history does not mean wallowing in the worst moments and turning all of our founders into demons. But it does mean recognizing the contributions made by all Americans, and acknowledging that not all have shared equally in our prosperity.

I believe that is what school officials are trying to accomplish, and I hope this new policy is the right way to get there..

Between them, Pyle and Mauldin earned three Pulitzer Prizes.

Pyle's books are the best resource I've found for understanding the day-to-day personal challenges, big and small, of

individual soldiers. He told the human story of war in a simple, honest way.

Most years around Memorial Day, I make time to walk through a cemetery. Often, the veterans' graves are clearly marked. Sometimes, the dates of the deceased's life provide clues to whether someone may have died in war.

In Las Cruces, we are

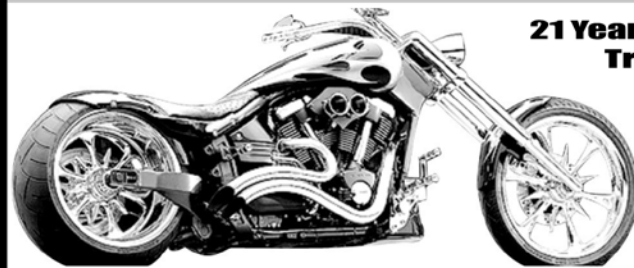
fortunate to have Veterans Memorial Park, with several solemnly beautiful monuments and markers to recognize the accomplishments and sacrifices of our fellow Americans.

Restore the city's heartbeat: Save the Amador Hotel

Next month, City Council will vote whether or not to fund the on-going restoration of the Amador Hotel, at 180 W. Amador, located west of the Visitors Center at the southern gateway to the revitalized Downtown.

Local supporters of the

adaptive re-use project should contact their city representatives now. Current plans, approved by the State Historic Preservation Division in Santa Fe, envision the local landmark as a vibrant cultural hub, museum, events center, business incubator including Wi-Fi access and leased offices. It will once again be a cherished social

destination for locals and tourists alike.

Funding to date for the planning, the selective demolition, the lobby columns conservation effort, asbestos removal, lead paint abatement and the downstairs interior room-by-room preservation work have been accomplished using legislative funding, volunteers and private donations to the Amador Hotel Foundation (AHF) Board.

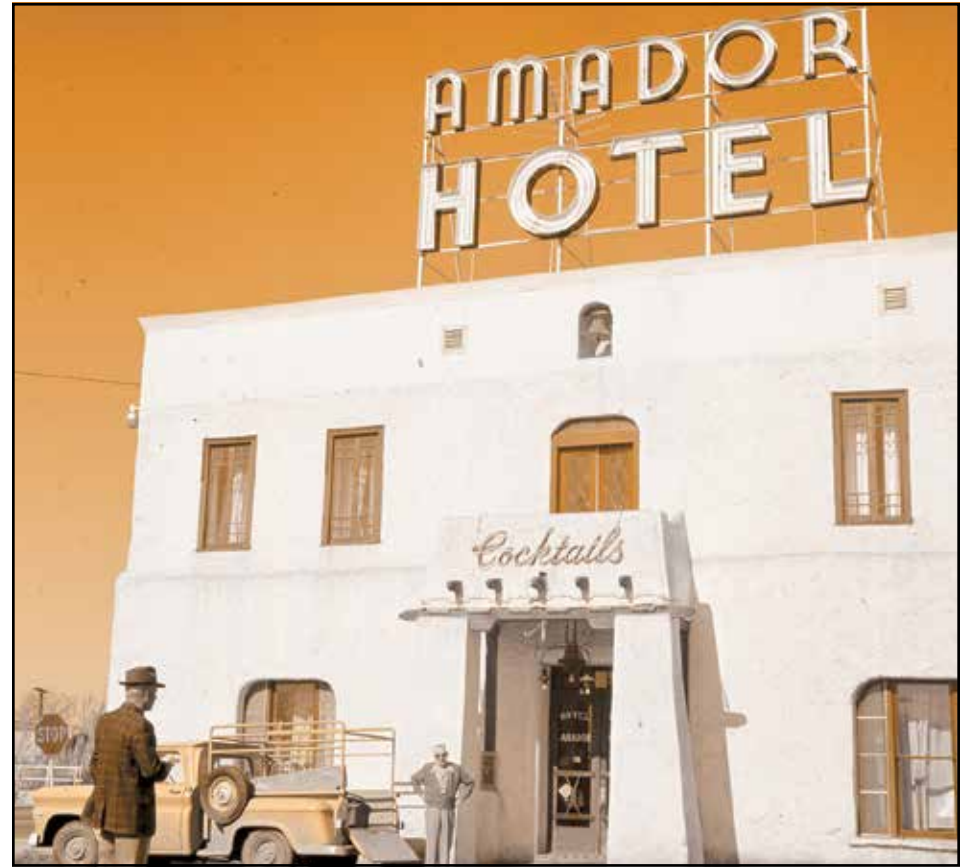
The board is currently requesting \$1.5 million for this phase. The funding will come from Tax Increment Development District (TIDD) monies, which are designated for improvements to the Downtown.

Selective demolition of the interior currently proceeds. Exterior work at the west elevation will commence soon. The requested \$1.5 million funding will be used to begin the installation of interior electrical, plumbing, communications and security systems, and to continue the exterior adobe and lime plaster work.

Anyone who has traveled to other cities has seen for themselves the renovations that can occur with vision and community support.

Santa Fe's abandoned

railroad depot corridor is now a bustling Farmers' Market.

Each of these creative adaptive re-uses transformed unsafe neighborhood blights into self-sustaining civic enterprises. Upon successful completion, the Amador Hotel will be a source of pride and revenue for the City. With your support, we can finally restore the City's heartbeat!

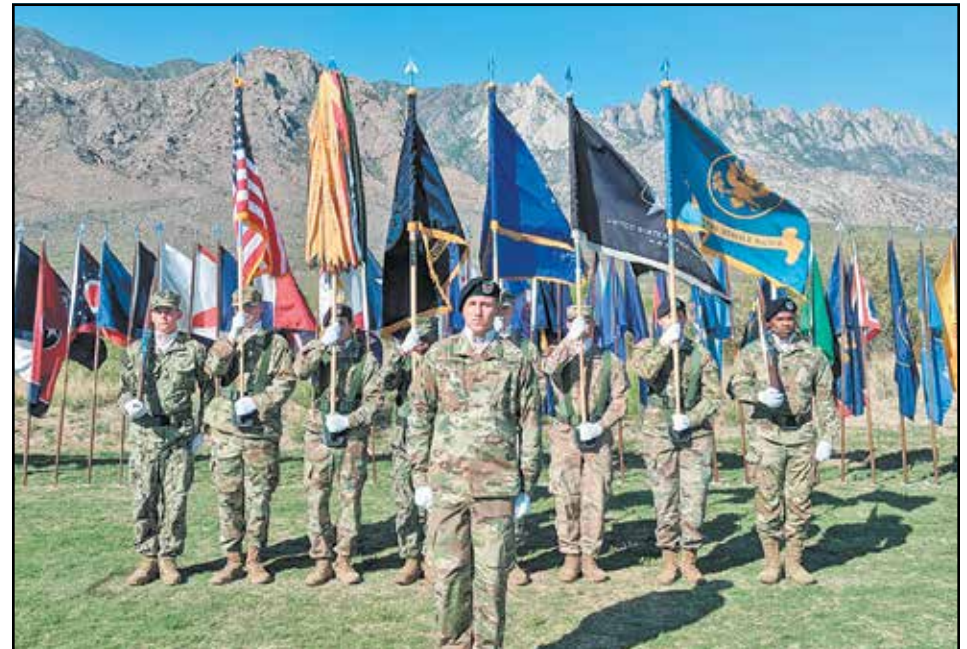

New Bulletin editor has heart for community news

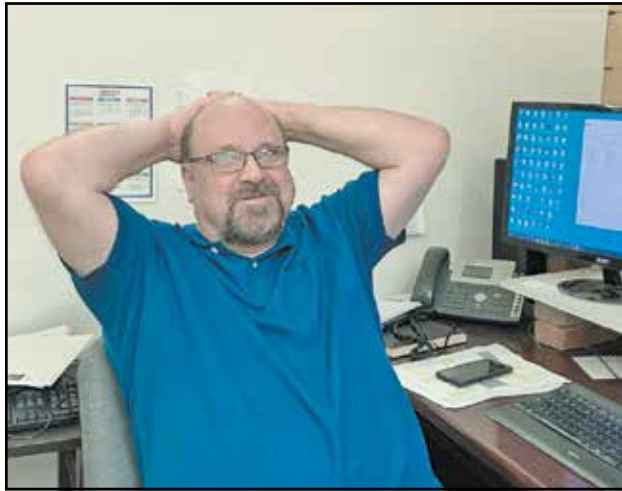

Newspapers have a serious role in the world.

“We need to be watchdogs, watch the cities, the boards and stuff like that,” said the Las Cruces Bulletin’s new editor Dave Burge. “But what I really like is a good story whether it’s a movie, a newspaper story or a book.”

Burge said he doesn’t want to live in a world where the only news comes in 20 cell phone alerts daily about some official in the presidential administration who has quit but the local school board goes uncovered.

“I think the Bulletin

has latched on to the winning formula of print journalism,” he said. “Going forward we need to remain focused on local. People need

to know what our kids are doing when they are doing good stuff. Community journalism plays a huge role as far as what the founders of the coun-

try wanted as far as a balancing act.”

“Dave is an old-school newspaper guy with a new-school understanding of the way audiences use all forms of media,” Bulletin publisher Richard Coltharp said. “He’s got great energy for the work, and great enthusiasm for telling the stories of Las Cruces.”

Burge has lived in the desert southwest since 1996 when he moved from California to Farmington to take a job at the Farmington Daily Times.

“If you wear out a pair of boots out here you will spend the rest of your life in the Southwest,” a Daily Times coworker told him. And here he still is.

“I fell in love with the beauty and the culture out here in New Mexico and west Texas,” he said. “When I lived up in Farmington, I had a map and I had a hundred places I wanted to visit, and I think I got to about 85 of them when I was there.”

One of those visits took him from Farmington to the southern part of the state including Bosque del Apache, the Valley of the Fires, and earned him a speeding ticket as he was trying to get to White Sands by sunset. He made it though and even got up early the next day and hiked at the sands. He stopped at the Three Rivers petroglyphs on the way back up.

“It was really my introduction to southern New Mexico and this part of the country,” he said. “I’ve been in love with Southwest ever since.”

Growing up in the 1970s everybody was kind of influenced by Vietnam and Watergate, Burge said. The specters of that, Woodward and Bernstein, “All the President’s Men” and the energy of the era made him want to be a reporter.

“The thing that really hit me in its heart and spirit was the movie ‘The Man Who Would Be King,’” he said. “That’s what really made me want to be a storyteller.”

New state laws fight discrimination, promote Black history, culture

Two new state laws will fight discrimination in New Mexico and promote Black history and culture, Black leaders from across the state said in a Zoom presentation sponsored by New Mexico State University Black Programs.

The No School Discrimination for Hair Act (NSDHA) and the Black Education Act were passed by the state Legislature during its regular session earlier this year. Two identical versions of NSDHA, one in the New Mexico House of Representatives and one in the state Senate, passed with only a single “no” vote in the House. BEA passed both houses unanimously. The acts were signed into law April 5 by Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham.

“These bills are really coming from the community,” said New Mexico state Sen. Harold Pope, Jr., D-Bernalillo, a co-sponsor of both bills.

Pope, who is the first African-American to serve in the state Senate, joined with leaders across the state to participate in a Zoom presentation called “Real Talk: 50 Shades of Blackness” put on by NMSU Black Programs.

Others who participated included: House Majority Leader Sheryl Williams Stapleton,

D-Bernalillo (also a co-sponsor of both bills); state Office of African-American Affairs Director Amy Whitfield and Deputy Director Nicole Bedford; NMSU Black Programs Interim Director Kimberly York; NMSU professors Henrietta Pichon, Ph.D., and Eric House, Ph.D.; NMSU American Indian Program Director Michael Ray; and NMSU Black Student Association Vice President Ignacio Alvarado.

Pope, who defeated a longtime Republican incumbent in Albuquerque’s District 48 in 2020, said he was crying on the Senate floor when he introduced the bill, showing an enlarged photo of himself when he was the only Black student in his kindergarten class and was made fun of because his hair was in corn rows.

Stapleton, an NMSU graduate and a state representative since 1995, said the new law



“represents the work that the community has put forth together. It is representative of the people who reside here in New Mexico.”

NSDHA, whose sponsors included both Pope and Stapleton, prohibits “the imposition of discipline, discrimination or disparate treatment in schools based on the hair or cultural or religious headdresses of a student,” according to the act.

“It is discrimination,” Whitfield said. Creating NSDHA will address “a lack of opportunity and access” in the state, she said. Black women are three times more likely to get things “written in their evaluations about their looks,” Whitfield said. “That is stopping us from exceling. That is stopping us from moving forward.”

Pichon called the new law groundbreaking.

“People don’t realize

that we get discriminated against because of the way our hair grows out of our scalp,” Pichon said. Passing the act, she

LCPS ahead of state average for students back in schools

Las Cruces Public Schools has a higher percentage of students engaged in in-person education in schools across the district compared to the state average.

The New Mexico Public Education Department (NMPED) said 51 percent of students are back in classrooms at 817 public schools across the state as of mid-April.

At LCPS, the total in early May was more than 63 percent, with 14,884 students in classes and 8,594 continuing to do distance learning, LCPS said. The district's total enrollment was 23,478.



The LCPS figures include 71 percent of elementary school students in classrooms, almost 64 percent for middle-school students and more than 51 percent of high-school students.

White Sands K-8 and Mesilla Elementary School had the highest percentage of in-person attendance at more than 79 percent, with 223 of

282 students in classrooms. That was followed by Central Elementary with 77 percent of its students — 141 of 183 — in classrooms. Booker T. Washington, Conlee, East Picacho, Hermosa, Highland, Hillrise, Jornada, MacArthur, Monte Vista, Tombaugh and Valley View elementaries all had more than 70 percent in-person attendance. No elementary school had in-person attendance below 60 percent, the report said.

Among LCPS' eight middle schools, average in-person attendance was almost 64 percent. Among LCPS' six high schools, average attendance was more than 51 percent.

"As a district, we

worked methodically to ensure our buildings were safe and ready for students to return," said LCPS Public Information Officer Kelly Jameson. "The sizable numbers of in-person learners, especially in the elementary and middle school levels, confirms that families were also ready and confident in our return plan.

"Moving forward, the remote model of instruction is something we will continue to accommodate

because it works best for some of our students, especially at the high schools," Jameson said. "In elementary grades, we juggle working parents, daycare and the difficulty of sitting in front of a computer for long periods of time. In-person learning is more ideal at that level."

Jameson said the 2020-21 school year will end Wednesday, May 26.

Summer classes

LCPS will host summer classes for credit recovery, with all fees waived, Jameson said.

The district also will have 10 days of extended learning at every school, Tuesday, June 1 to Monday, June 14.

"This accomplishes a couple of things," Jameson said. "It provides added instruction for students who struggled, and it addresses learning loss from nearly a year of online instruction."

said, will "open opportunities and open conversations."

Many New Mexico residents "didn't even realize people were being discriminated against because of their hair," Pichon said.

"It is not just a hair issue. It's a human rights issue," Ray said. "You don't realize how much this impacts your life."

There are Black students in every Las Cruces school, said Doña Ana Elementary School Principal Cherie Love. Passing the hair discrimination law will positively impact their self-esteem, she said. "I think it's just so important," she said.

A hairstyle "can be indicative of your culture, your religion and you as a person," Alvarado said. "It represents who I am. I'm showing the world

who I am."

Hair discrimination is "a shared experience across so many populations," York said. "This is for all of us. We can all benefit whether or not it is a lived experience."

York, an independently licensed mental health therapist, testified before the New Mexico House "about the psychological harm associated with natural hair discrimination."

A former counselor at Lynn Middle School, York was also involved with the Black Education Act (BEA), serving on the committee that drafted the bill.

BEA, cosponsored by Pope and Stapleton, helps to address the "lack of culturally relevant curriculum in the schools," York said.

The act requires "racial sensitivity and anti-racism training or professional development for school personnel";

mandates that the state Public Education and Higher Education departments work together to develop programs and curricula "that recognize and teach Black culture and anti-racism; and improve job opportunities for Black people in public and higher education."

The state has a Hispanic Education Act and an Indian Education Act, Bedford said. Passing the Black Education Act was a necessary next step.

The new law will help schools "focus on Black stories and Black history," House said.

Southern New Mexico sees first space flight as VSS Unity glides home

“Wow, look at the view,” can be heard from one of the pilots as a video shows Virgin Galactic’s VSS Unity spacecraft turning slowly to reveal Earth from space on May 22.

Saturday’s flight saw New Mexico become the third state in the country to launch humans into space.

VSS Unity achieved a speed of Mach 3 after being released from the mothership, VMS Eve, and reached space, at an altitude of 55.45 miles (89.2 km) before gliding smoothly to a runway landing at Spaceport America, according to a press release from Virgin

Galactic.

This flight was held in preparation for taking space tourism to a realistic level as 500 ticket holders await their turn to ride the Virgin Galactic project with the goal of making space accessible to the public.

This flight represented a number of firsts including: being the first spaceflight from the Gateway to Space at Spaceport America and having CJ Sturckow become the first astronaut to have flown into space from three different states.

To celebrate the first human spaceflight from New Mexico, VSS Unity sported the Zia sun symbol of the state flag. In addition, Chile seeds took

the flight, representing the state’s rich agricultural and culinary history.

“After so many years and so much hard work,

New Mexico has finally reached the stars,” said Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham who was on hand for the event. “Our state’s scientific legacy

has been honored by this important achievement, one that took guts and faith and an unwavering belief in what New Mexico can achieve.”

“The Spaceport has always been about the future of New Mexico,” said former Gov. Bill Richardson. “So many of New Mexico’s children will benefit from both the educational opportunities and the career opportunities that the space industry offers.”

Following the flight, Virgin Galactic is reviewing the test data gathered and thoroughly inspecting the spaceship and mothership.

“We will immediately begin processing the data gained from this successful test flight,” said Michael Colgazer, Virgin Galactic CEO. “We look forward to sharing news on our next planned milestone.”

LCPS holds in-person grad ceremonies

Sorg looks back on three terms on Las Cruces City Council

Income inequality and climate change.

City Councilor Gill M. Sorg has kept those two issues in mind during every vote he has cast as a council member during the past 11-plus years.

Sorg, 74, announced in April that he will not seek a fourth four-year term representing District 5 on the Las Cruces City Council.

“It’s time to let someone new have a chance,” he said. Sorg moved to New Mexico from Montana in June

1998, and to Las Cruces in December of that year. He was first elected to the city council in November 2007, defeating incumbent Gil Jones.

The Great Recession began a short time later, damaging economies around the world and reversing job growth and low unemployment in New Mexico. Sorg said helping to rebuild the city’s economy by getting infrastructure projects – utility connections, street improvements, new parks – back on track is among his proudest accomplishments as a council member.

He’s also proud of the minimum wage increase that he voted for and the council passed in 2015, along with the work the

city has done in the last few years to increase the availability of affordable housing.

In the last year, Sorg said, the city has done everything it could to help lessen the impact of Covid-19.

The council has allocated more than \$3 million since the pandemic started to help businesses and nonprofits in the city, with most of the money coming from the Telshor Facilities Fund (TFF) rather than from the city’s general fund.

“I’m glad we had that,” Sorg said about TFF, which is funded from a pre-paid lease payment the city received for Memorial Medical Center.

He is also pleased that

Las Cruces is “a much greener city” than when he took office, Sorg said.

The city has converted all its street lights to LED, which is saving about \$100,000 in energy costs, he said; it has installed solar panels on city buildings and parking lot structures and has more solar projects on the way; and it has begun the move toward a hybrid city-owned fleet and electric buses.

“I’m looking forward to riding an electric bus,” Sorg said. “I’m going to ride all over the city.” (Sorg drives a 2013 Prius hybrid.)

With new initiatives in place, including the construction of all-electric homes complete with outdoor chargers for electric vehicles, the city could surpass its goal of being 50 percent carbon free by 2030, Sorg said.

Going forward, Sorg said he is hopeful the city can be part of a film and media studio and soundstage in Las Cruces.

There are “so many aspects of Las Cruces that would fit the film industry,” he said, including generous film credits for shooting in the area, the local climate and the wide availability of locations.

The film industry would provide the good-paying jobs and economic diversity Las Cruces needs, Sorg said. Film, he said, along with local agriculture-based businesses, including the newly expanding Saputo Cheese USA, Electronic Caregiver, new cannabis-related businesses and others can give the city

“nice diversity,” he said.

During his council service, Sorg said he has heard about all kinds of issues from constituents, including whatever is on that week’s council meeting agenda, and especially speeding on city streets.

Whatever the issues, Sorg said the best advice he could give his successor in the District 5 council seat is to “stay in contact with your constituents. Respond to inquiries, questions and concerns.”

It’s also important for people to have the facts about what the city is doing, he said.

“It’s all about correct information,” Sorg said.

Sorg said he is hopeful whoever follows him on the council will continue to work on issues of income inequality and climate change as the city implements its comprehensive plan.

“There’s so much work to be done there,” he said.

Sorg said he plans to continue working on those and other issues he cares most about after he leaves the council next January. In addition to the committees he serves on as a city council member, Sorg is a member of the state Workforce Development board and the Outdoor New Mexico board, and is chairman of the Paseo del Norte Watershed Council.

He’s also looking forward to exploring parks and remote areas.

And, he will continue to live in Las Cruces.

“This is paradise. Why would I leave?” Sorg said.

City, county relax mask mandates; city renews emergency orders

The Las Cruces City Council unanimously approved a resolution renewing an emergency proclamation regarding Covid-19 and relaxing requirements for wearing masks in the city. The vote came during a May 24 special council meeting.

The Doña Ana County Commission took similar action at its May 25 regular meeting.

The city resolution mirrors Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham's May 14 state-wide executive order.

"If you've been vaccinated, you don't have to wear a mask in any city building," Mayor Ken Miyagishima said at the meeting.

Also in keeping with state public health orders, the city will not require

those who are vaccinated to wear masks outside. Masks are not required for gatherings of 20 or fewer people, but are required for gatherings of 20 to 150. Gatherings of more than 150 are prohibited. The new resolution is effective immediately.

Because vaccinations are not available to children under age 12, Miyagishima said soccer players ages 8 to 10 must wear masks.

Within the city, businesses and nonprofits may continue to mandate that facemasks be worn on their premises, the mayor said. Masks also continue to be mandated on public transit because of federal mandates, Miyagishima said.

The resolution also asserts that the city remain in a state of public health emergency because of

the pandemic.

At its May 25 regular meeting, the county commission unanimously passed an ordinance repealing a previous ordinance "requiring face coverings or masks be worn in public in Doña Ana County."

The county action also "would follow the exact same guidelines the rest of the state is following under the public health orders and emergency declarations from the governor," county attorney Nelson Goodin said at the meeting.

Goodin said the new ordinance, which governs unincorporated areas of the county, will not take effect until it is published

in late June. That means the current ordinance requiring facemasks remains in effect for those unincorporated areas.

Goodin said he was not aware of any citations issued by the county for violations of the current ordinance.

Under the governor's

May 14 executive order, the state adopted the national Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) guidance on facemasks, which states that "fully vaccinated individuals are no longer required to wear a mask in either indoor or outdoor settings. All individuals

who are unvaccinated or not yet fully vaccinated are still required ... to wear a mask in public settings."

Under the public order, "all individuals, including those who are fully vaccinated, should continue to wear well-fitted masks where required by localities, tribal entities and individual businesses."

The public health order also requires that masks continue to be worn "by all individuals, regardless of vaccination status, in healthcare settings (hospitals, longterm care facilities and doctors' offices), homeless shelters and public transportation (buses, trains and planes, airports and stations). And, "masks continue to be required in schools for all students and school staff regardless of vaccination status."

Southwest Research and Production Complex Looks to Change Research in NM

It was a turn-key location with so many opportunities that Wes Richins couldn't pass it up. With over 100-acres, and seven buildings outfitted for different needs, Richins saw that this could be a site to develop not only his business ventures but collaborate with like-minded businesses. The area – located in the Las Cruces Innovation and Industrial Park (LCIIP) at 9035 Advancement Ave – became the Southwest Research and Production Complex (SWRPC).

“It had an open feel, with some land for development, but the office buildings were ready for us

to use right away,” Richins said. Owner of SCALE Ag Services, Richins saw a power for collaboration with other businesses that focused on agriculture and health and well-being. “The infrastructure at the park allowed us to get up and running right away and start those conversations with other businesses,” he said.

SCALE Ag Services covers a broad spectrum of agricultural elements, including specialized micro-nutrients and specialty fertilizers, alfalfa seeds and other forage seeds, and humic acid that

stimulates microbial activity in the soil. The newest addition will be the addition of environmentally friendly and sustainable gypsum used in farming. For Richins, the expansions at LCIIP made sense to build a hub for agricultural research, a complex unlike anything in the southwest.

Current tenants share his mission of wellness. The laboratory already on-site welcomed Burrell College of Osteopathic Medicine, which is developing critical research opportunities for their faculty and graduates. Greenhouses are being used by a

company that cultivates trees for erosion control.

“Our location on the border, and that we're so close to I-10, is a benefit to any company who might be doing trade outside New Mexico,” Richins said. “But we're focused on working with other businesses that are working on the greater well-being in environmentally sound, conservation-based methods.”

Local mountain gorilla advocate hopes to fund conservation center

El Paso author Rick LoBello acknowledges that he is probably the area's "only active advocate for the preservation of mountain gorillas."

His dream is to build a conservation and education center in the El Paso-Las Cruces area devoted to the endangered species that is native to central Africa.

"Mountain gorillas are just so fascinating," LoBello said. "They're so much like us. Their family structure is so humanlike."

LoBello, who grew up near Buffalo in western New York state, became interested in mountain gorillas while reading about them in his high-school library. He particularly remembers a January 1970 edition of National Geographic with primatologist Dian Fossey (1932-85) and

two orphan gorillas on the cover.

"That's when I started to dream about going to Africa," LoBello said.

He got a job at the Buffalo Zoo, which was home to a gorilla that LoBello would visit every day.

LoBello moved west to earn a degree from Sul Ross State University in Alpine, Texas, and stayed in west Texas, moving to El Paso 21 years ago.

LoBello had a long career with the National Park Service, serving as executive director of the Carlsbad Caverns-Guadalupe Mountains Association and Big Bend Natural History Association and as a park ranger at several national parks. He recently began a second career as education curator for the El Paso Zoo.

LoBello has visited Rwanda three times since 1989 and is working on the fourth revision of his

"Guide to Rwanda's Volcanoes National Park, Home to Critically Endangered Mountain Gorillas."

The book is on the recommended reading list of the Dian Fossey Gorilla Fund (<https://gorillafund.org>), LoBello said.

His visits with mountain gorillas as Karisoke Research Center, which Fosse founded at Volcanoes

National Park, have been life-changing experiences.

"You feel like you're connecting with an ancient part of the Earth," he said.

"I'm not just interested in revising my book and going back someday," LoBello said. "I do have a vision to build a mountain gorilla education center."

The center, which likely will cost about \$1 million,

he said, will help people learn about mountain gorillas and the model conservation project that has preserved them.

A daily reminder of his dream is a photo that hangs in LoBello's El Paso office. Taken by world-renowned illustrator Jay Matarnes, the photo shows Fossey in her Rwanda cabin in front of a painting depicting a family of

gorillas.

LoBello got a digital copy of the photo from Matarnes and got his permission to hang it "so I could look at it every day to remind me of my dream to build this mountain gorilla conservation center."

LoBello said Chidester met Fossey and was a caregiver for an orphaned mountain gorilla Fossey was hoping to reintroduce into the wild.

Retiring symphony director introduces 'Lonnie's Klein's Favorite Memories'

Lonnie Klein brought many world-class musicians and singers to town to perform with the Las Cruces Symphony Orchestra (LCSO) during his 21 years as director.

A few days before his May 31 retirement, Klein will release "Lonnie Klein's Favorite Memories," a free, more than 2 and 1/2 hour, online collection of eight of his favorite full movements from live LCSO concerts, 1999-2020.

Here is the lineup:

7. Pianist Jeremy Denk (whose father, Joe, was a beloved Las Cruces actor), performing a triple concerto with violinist Ruggero Alliffranchini and cellist Edward Arron

Klein said the greatest challenge in putting the free DVD/CD together was choosing eight performances from among those of the more than 100 guest artists he brought to Las Cruces to perform with LCSO, over more than two decades.

Klein said he made the final selection based on full, unedited performances "that really connected with me, the orchestra, the audience — that really knocked our socks off. I cherry picked whom I thought were the most memorable performances."

Time limitations and copyright restrictions prevented Klein from including some performers, he said, including Doc Severinsen's 2007 concert with the symphony at Pan American Center.

The DVD/CD includes

brief introductions of each performance from Klein, with his personal recollections about each performer.

Klein said he decided to put together the memories collection as a follow up to the archival DVD/CD released last November that "featured and highlighted the most memorable moments of the LCSP musicians."

Today,” the story of the numerous dams along the Nile and what effect they have had on the Egyptian environment. Key worked in Egypt for 20-plus years and has lectured on various topics of Egyptian history, geography and engineering in the UTEP continuing education program.

It will include works by Morrow, along with Jan Archey, Kathy Baker and Lisa Carlson.

"Each artist will have their wonderful creations set up in a unique backyard setting," Morrow said.

"We are four women all working in clay but all in very different ways," she said. "We are all getting fresh air and wanting to share our art. I am so excited for this event to become an annual gig!"

The sale will begin with a talk by Morrow on how to make a handmade tile backsplash like the one in her just-completed kitchen.

Archey has lived in Las Cruces since 1977 and taught at Doña Ana Community College for more than 40 years. Archey is currently working on wall "paintings," using minerals, sands and mud from the earth and glazes. Her work often consists of a variety of firing techniques from raku to wood-fired ceramics.

"If I were to label my medium, I would say that I am a fiber artist first, but also a potter, weaver and gourd artist," Baker said. "I use natural elements: shells, wool roving, discarded feathers

and dried-plant materials such a dried corn husks in my weaving, clay pieces and gourds. Many of my basket reeds and hand-spun art yarn are solar dyed in our New Mexico sun."

An art teacher with Las Cruces Public Schools for 16 years, Carlson said her artwork is inspired by her "deep love for the Hill Country (Texas), the rivers there and appreciation for a wide arrange of country music."

Carlson retired from Las Cruces Public Schools in 2019 and is enjoying her time as a

studio artist. "I have been designing tile tables, clay beads, silver and copper jewelry."

"The hunt and gathering is a joy in the creative process," said Morrow, who grew up in Deming and moved to Las Cruces from Scottsdale, Arizona in 2018. "There is so much fun and creative thought in 'making the parts' from handmade tiles or beads, rusting the piece or fabric, creating patina on metals, making paper to weaving wire parts. Finally, all the pieces come together creating an assemblage appealing

In the production, TDE "has chosen to explore

mental illness loosely based on the children's book 'Where the Wild Things Are' by Maurice Sendak, Rivera said. "Max is a businesswoman working in a high-stress company. She has always felt out of step with the world, but there is no room for second guesses in corporate America.

"Our story begins in the company office where Max navigates the demands of her job. In the

beginning she is able to manage the stress of the job and panic attacks that plague her; however, she slowly loses control, and the Wild Things creep in.

"Her friend tries to help her through the ups and downs but eventually guides her to get professional help. Once Max is in a facility to help her, she goes through the trial of finding out what exactly is wrong with her and what medicines she needs to

take. She is reluctant to listen to the doctor at first, but with her friend's help begins to realize that it is necessary. All the while, the Wild Things try to influence her.

"Max is able to return to work at the company. She is met with the same stress as before, but this time is different. She is able to cope with the stress and able to expel the Wild Things as they start to creep in again. She is on

the right path in a long journey of coping with mental illness."

"Max, Lost and Found" is "a mature show," Rivera said. "There are a couple of curse words in the music and narration."

TDE is a nonprofit, community dance collective dedicated to creating performance and choreography opportunities for community members who might not otherwise get to perform and choreo-

graph, according to TDE's website. It was founded in 2016.

Las Cruces artist hopes celebrity drawings can benefit others

Las Cruces native James “Dusty” Richardson took a photo of his young daughter, Madelyn, one morning several years ago right after she got out of bed. Richardson and his wife, Erica, wanted the photo so they could show Madelyn as an adult what she had looked like as a young child “doing funny things” first thing in the morning.

The photo also sent Richardson on a personal journey of rediscovery, as a drawing he made from the photo reminded him of his love for drawing — a talent his wife didn’t even know he had.

Richardson has continued to draw ever since.

One of his most recent works of art, a pencil and charcoal drawing of actor Edward James Olmos, was auctioned for \$1,000 at the April premiere of “Walking With Herb.” Olmos, who came to Las Cruces to film the movie, autographed the drawing for Richardson, and the money it made

at auction was donated to Jardin de los Niños, the Las Cruces nonprofit that provides childcare and education to children and their families

who are struggling with homelessness.

Richardson has also made drawings of other celebrities, including Clint Eastwood, Robin

Williams, Michael Jordan and Kobe Bryant.

He hopes to complete “a whole series of celebrities,” and, if possible, get them autographed

and auction them off like the Olmos drawing to benefit those in need.

“If this is the way I can help, that’s awesome,” said Richardson, who is a

self-taught artist.

Richardson first got interested in art at about age 5, he said, when his father, James Ricardson III, began taking him to Branigan Cultural Center (BCC), where the elder Richardson served as the first curator when BCC opened in 1981 and is commemorated in its Richardson Gallery.

The younger Richardson graduated from Oñate High School, where he played the baritone, trombone, tuba and drums, in 1994.

Now a stay-at-home dad, Richardson said his family comes first, but he finds time to draw at the dining room table after Madelyn, now 7, and younger daughter, Marlee, 4, have gone to bed. His stepson, Anjel, 19, is going into the U.S. Army in August.

Richardson said he would love to be a full-time artist, working on private commissions. But doing more art to benefit Jardin “just to help out, would be ideal,” he said.

“I’m so glad I was able to get back into it,” Richardson said.

Farm and Ranch Museum has summer camps, at-home activities

The New Mexico Farm and Ranch Heritage Museum is offering a variety of summer activities and camps that can be done at home and virtually.

Here are the summer activities:

• **Poking Around: Native Desert Plants of the Southwest:** May 29-June 1, for ages 9-13, virtual/

at-home, recommended \$3 donation. Camp materials will provide all the necessary information to become familiar with our unique desert landscape and the flora that inhabits it. Campers will receive: 1) a reference guide to the most common native plants in the area, 2) journal pages to fill out while observing the plants in real life, 3) supplies to recreate desert plants with modelling clay and 4) a live plant to keep. Optional 40-minute June 1 Zoom instruction.

• **LEAP into Science Week:** June 8 (ages 4-5) and June 10 (ages 6-10), free. Celebrate National LEAP week with online science and literacy programming. Each day, a different story will be read on Zoom and campers will be given activities they can do at home at their own pace. The only requirement is a flashlight. Materials will be given out the week prior. Details will be announced.

• **Storytelling Around the Campfire:** June 12, all ages, at-home, free. Learn about the art of storytelling and how impor-



tant it was in cowboy life. Campers will receive recipe cards for “campfire” snacks, stories to read out loud and templates to create their own campfire stories. This camp does not require any virtual instruction and can be used year-round.

• **Down on the Farm:** June 22-24, ages 5-8, recommended \$3 donation. Learn what animals live on a farm and what they need to be able to survive. Campers will learn to identify the source of the food they eat and investigate the processes and people involved in getting food from farm to table. All materials will be provided and can be picked up the week before. Activities can be done at your own pace at home or Zoom sessions will be available.

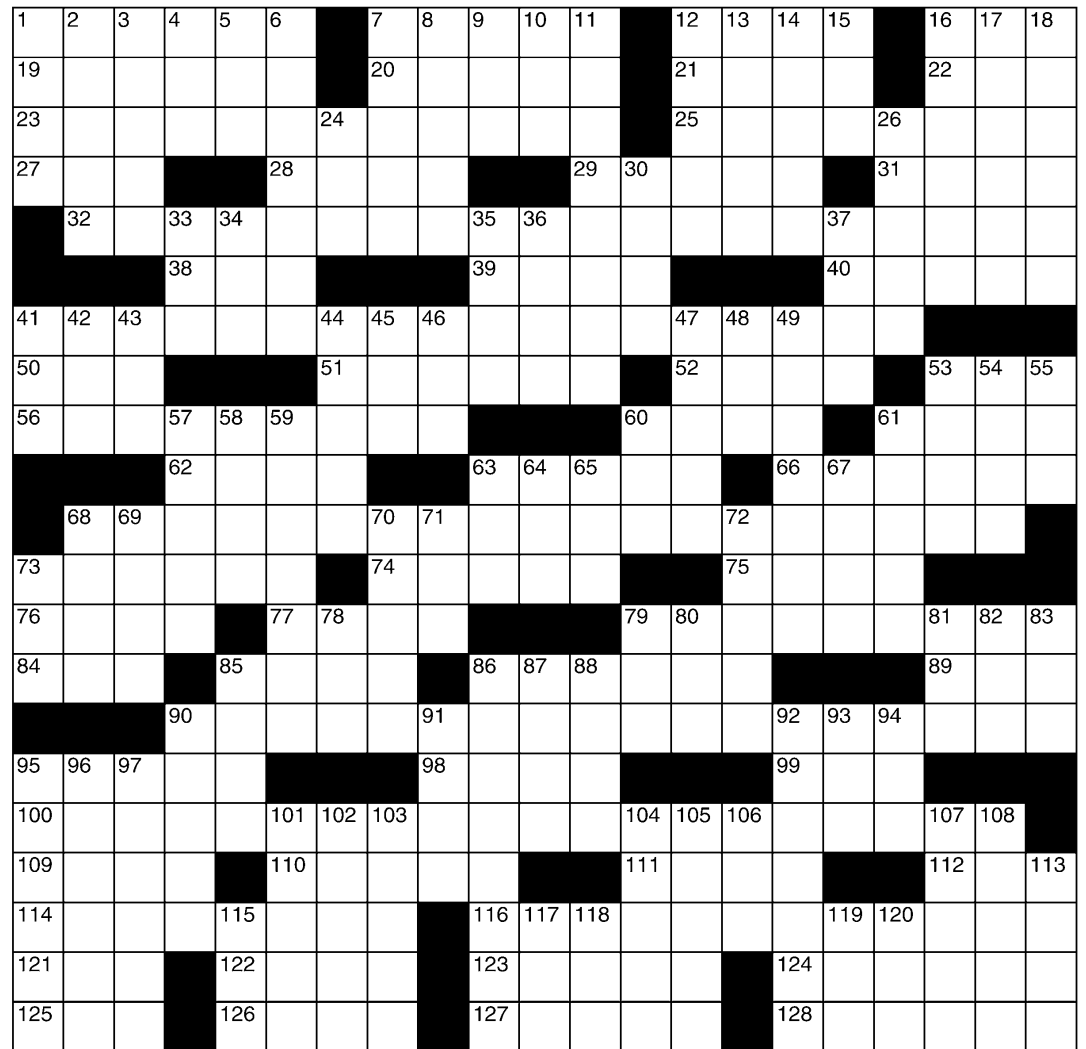

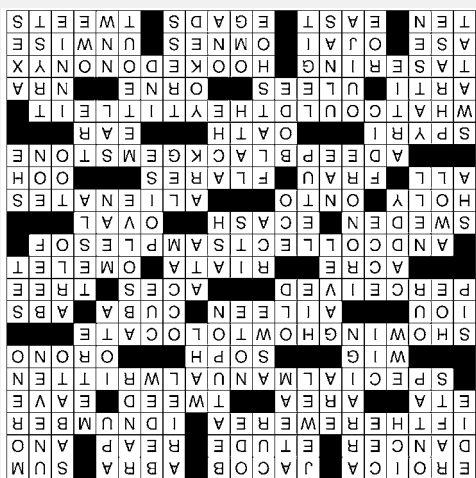

Memorial Medical Center to continue Pastoral Care Ministry as program's founder retires

It was both an ending and a continuation as Memorial Medical Center (MMC) celebrated 40 years of its Pastoral Care Ministry and said goodbye to the Rev. Dr. Margaret Short, the hospital's director for Pastoral Care who retired May 21 after 24 years.

The hospital hosted a celebration for Short and volunteer chaplains May 19. Speakers included MMC CEO John Harris and Mayor Ken Miyagishima.

"It's a very long tradition," said Short, who became the first director of MMC's Pastoral Care Ministry in 1997.

Before that, the pro-

gram had been staffed entirely by volunteer chaplains, she said.

Under Short's leadership, the ministry has provided 24-hour, on-call, bilingual spiritual and

emotional support to thousands of patients, visitors, physicians and MMC staff of all faiths. Except for 2020, Short and the program's many volunteer chaplains and the Catholic hospital ministry have averaged 13,000 to 21,000 annual visits at MMC.

"Through her dedication and compassion, thousands of patients, staff and providers found spiritual strength during both celebratory and difficult times," Harris said. "Rev. Dr. Short developed a vast network of clergy to serve the needs of our community through strength and perseverance – This is her true legacy. Ministers of faith are an essential part of

the healthcare team at Memorial, and we are fortunate to call them friends and partners."

The ministry was especially valuable during Covid-19, when it was "not just families that needed ministering to, but the whole hospital," said the Rev. Pastor James Gildon of Las Cruces First Church, one of MMC's longtime volunteer chaplains and president of MMC Pastoral Care Ministry.

Gildon said he is very happy that MMC will continue the program after Short's retirement.

"MMC still values the spiritual wellness of its community," Gildon said.

"We are so appreciative that the hospital agreed

with us to join hands for patients in the community," said Dennis Diaz, pastor of Desert Oasis Church and another volunteer chaplain.

"People value having prayer support," Diaz said.

Patients are sometimes "scared to death," he said, and chaplains can "be the presence of God in a sense," and help "get them to the point of recovery. People do well when their spiritual needs are met."

The ministry has "value in our community," said Dale Walker, pastor of Heart for the World Church of Las Cruces and another volunteer chaplain for the MMC program. "This community showed up through their

pastors."

Walker remembers a family's gratitude to him because "you stayed awake with us," when he came to the hospital one night to be with them in a time of need.

Short and volunteer chaplains have ministered to patients as they faced surgery and the end of life. Some family members need spiritual guidance to help make end-of-life decisions about their loved ones, Gildon said. He or another chaplain might also be called to MMC to administer last rites.

"I've been called in the middle of the night," Gildon said, to minister to a family he didn't know.

Phillips Chapel celebrates 110th anniversary

The Phillips Chapel in Las Cruces recently celebrated its 110th anniversary.

Here's some history.

The lot that would become home to Phillips Chapel, 638 N. Tornillo St., was deeded to the church back on May 1, 1911.

The land was purchased by Daniel and Ollie Berry Hibler for \$45. The Hiblers, who

moved to Las Cruces from Texas in the early 20th century, deeded the land to the Colored Methodist Episcopal Church in America for what would officially become Phillips Chapel Christian Methodist Episcopal Church. It is today the oldest existing African-American church in New Mexico.

The Hiblers were the grandparents of longtime Las Cruces educator Clarence Fielder (1927-2015). Fielder was a lifelong

steward of the church, helping get it placed on both the state and national registers of historic places in 2003.

Fielder "was the inspiration and driving force behind the complete restoration of the church in 2014," said Las Cruces historian Beth O'Leary, New Mexico State University anthropology professor emerita, who worked closely with Fielder on the restoration.

The chapel's history

includes its 1925-54 service as Lincoln High School, after the local school board voted to segregate Las Cruces schools.

Students in an adobe restoration class, taught for three semesters in 2010-11 by Pat Taylor at Doña Ana Community College, assisted with the church's restoration. Taylor estimated that volunteers contributed at least 20,000 hours to the restoration program during a five-year period.

"Many patients don't have pastors," Gildon said.

"People don't think about God until tragedy strikes," he said. They need "somebody to walk through this with them."

Chaplains also minister to MMC staff as they deal with the trauma of hospital work, Short said.

Or someone might simply want a blessing for his or her child.

"Who can we serve in this hospital and how can we serve them the best?" Gildon said.

Through its pastoral care program, MMC has put prayer boxes near the ER and the intensive care and critical care units. The requests for prayers from patients, family members and hospital staff are regularly taken

from the boxes.

"We pray over them," Gildon said.

MMC's chapel, which has stained-glass windows depicting the Organ Mountains, is welcoming to all faiths," Short said.

"It's amazing," she said. "It's a holy place."

"All of this came through Sister Margaret (Short)," Gildon said.

Short also was co-founder and a member of the Southern New Mexico

Suicide Prevention and Survivor Coalition. She is also a member of the New Mexico Injury Prevention Coalition, the NMSU Department of Public Health Sciences advisory board, the NMSU-Fred Hutchinson Partnership for the Advancement of Cancer Research, the International Society for the Study of Trauma and Dissociation and other local, state and national associations.

Price spike in April raises fears of inflation

Greater risk is putting on the brakes too soon

April's inflation number was the highest in 12 years. Meanwhile, the news is full of stories about record-high lumber prices, chip shortages disrupting auto manufacturing, soaring real estate prices, difficulty in hiring thwarting restaurant reopenings.

Some point to these supply-side bottlenecks as indicating an overheated economy. They argue that urgent action is needed to prevent runaway inflation. Time for the Fed to put the brakes on!

Nonsense. We are still in the midst of the worst recession in the memory of any living person not

a nonagenarian. We are still 8 million jobs down from pre-pandemic levels. That we should worry about inflation with millions without jobs is silly.

In fact, it is that we are having difficulty ramping back up to full employment that indicates the need for continued expansionary policy. As the old saw goes, high prices is the cure for high prices in the sense that high prices brings on increased supply, which pushes down prices.

Besides, inflation isn't necessarily that bad. Inflation was much higher in the 1970s and early 1980s than anything we are likely to see now, top-

ping out at 14.6 percent in March 1980. Inflation-adjusted median family incomes increased throughout those two decades. Meanwhile, the low inflation 1990s and 2000s are associated with slower growth in inflation adjusted median incomes.

I am not saying there is cause and effect here. I am just saying that moderate inflation is not necessarily bad for the typical household, at least not historically. Wages keep up and can even outpace inflation.

The impact of inflation on different societal groups is complicated. Generally, the poor suffer the least adverse effect. Government programs that help the poor are often indexed for infla-

tion. Tight labor markets associated with high inflation can push up wages for marginal workers. And of course, the best way to eliminate poverty is to give a poor person a job.

The middle class can benefit from inflation. Real estate is an asset class that tends to do well during inflation. Given that a personal residence is often the primary asset owned by middle-class families, inflation can help these families accumulate wealth.

Inflation generally is bad news for the wealthy. They tend to hold disproportionately large amounts of their wealth in stocks and bonds, assets that do not typically do well during periods of inflation.

Of course, inflation can get out of hand. Very high inflation can cause

hyperinflation, a loss in confidence in the currency. When this happens, people stop using the local currency in exchange, often substituting a foreign currency but sometimes being forced to resort to barter.

Hyperinflation is very destructive and is often associated with failed states and a breakdown of social order. Venezuela comes to mind in this context. That country experienced an inflation rate over the 12 months ending in March of more than 3,000 percent or about 16 percent per week.

The Venezuelan economy is in shambles. Socialist policies, government crackdowns and

hyperinflation have made life unbearable for many. About 70,000 Venezuelans are now refugees in Colombia.

The modest inflation we are experiencing in the United States, while higher than in recent years, is a good thing if it helps Americans get back to work. But too much inflation should be avoided.

Tresco employee talks about how organization 'changed' her life

Lydia Hernandez has been lead custodian at the U.S. District Court building, 100 N. Church St., for the past 10 years.

At the end of April, the Las Cruces native got to share her employment story with other people with disabilities as one of 50 self-advocates selected from across the country to participate in the annual SourceAmerica Grassroots Advocacy Conference which was held virtually this year.

Hernandez was selected to participate by Tresco, Inc., a Las Cruces-based nonprofit that helps employ people with disabilities. Tresco provides adult community supports services and children's services (early intervention and the DayOne program).

It has more than 520 employees and more than 50 contracts employing about 230 disabled people, including Hernandez, in

11 New Mexico counties.

Becoming lead custodian at the federal courthouse "changed my life," Hernandez said in her conference speech. Her job has "a lot of responsibility," Hernandez said. "I try my best. I accomplish something. I like the people I work with. I like the people in the courthouse. They're very nice."

At the courthouse, Hernandez oversees a staff of five who are responsible for cleaning and maintain-

ing the entire building and its grounds.

"Lydia is just one of the people I consider a breath of fresh air," said U.S. District Court Judge Kenneth Gonzales, who is presiding federal judge in Las Cruces. "She's a wonderful person. She works very hard."

"In addition to all of Lydia's fine qualities is her extra care for our safety, including arriving early and staying late to personally ensure door

handles and high-touch surfaces remain safe for everyone in the courthouse."

Gonzales, who has been on the federal bench in Las Cruces since August 2013, said Hernandez is "very modest, (and) would never speak about her honor."

"We're very proud of her," Gonzales said. "We thoroughly enjoy having her here."

The five-day advocacy conference, which was held virtually April 26-30, also gave Hernandez the opportunity to advocate for better jobs for the disabled, as she met via Zoom with staff members in the Washington, D.C. offices of U.S. Sen. Martin Heinrich, D-N.M., and U.S. Rep. Yvette Herrell, R-N.M.

"Lydia is the one who holds everything together at the federal courthouse," Tresco Project Manager Robert Leonard said. "She's on top of everything."

In addition to their regular duties, Leonard said, Hernandez and her staff also are responsible for unscheduled service calls in the federal courthouse. That has recently included everything from disinfecting courtrooms, cleaning up a gasoline spill in the basement and cleaning up blood after a stabbing outside the building, he said.

"We are blessed to have her on our team," said Tresco Community Engagement Manager Stacie Allen. "She's so good at her job."

When she's not working at the federal courthouse, Hernandez is a caregiver for Ambercare, helping several clients with cleaning, shopping, doctor visits and more. She often stays after her shift is over to talk to her clients, Hernandez said.

Hernandez's dream, she said, is to win the Powerball, buy a piece of land and put a double-wide mobile home on it.

Hernandez's personal philosophy is "I just go do it," she said.

Tresco's mission "is all about the people we support," Allen said. "They're the best workforce — reliable, determined, persistent."

Allen said she is hopeful the conference and the stories presented by Hernandez and other self-advocates will help more businesses to "open up their doors" to the disabled and "explore those possibilities."

Tresco employs people with a wide range of physical and mental disabilities, Allen said. They work as custodians, plumbers, electricians, welders and much more. Many, she said, are military veterans dealing with combat-related injuries.

Like Hernandez, "they have a lot to give," Allen said.

Future bright for Aggie golfers after strong regional showing

To quote a one-hit wonder band from the 1980s, their future is so bright they have to wear shades.

That's an apt description of the New Mexico State University men's golf team.

At the beginning of the season, they were as green as, well, a putting green.

The team, with just one upper classman, jelled at the right time and won its first WAC championship since 2015, beating Grand Canyon University by a single stroke at the conference championships.

That gave the young Aggies a berth in the

NCAA regionals in Albuquerque, just up the interstate.

There, the Aggies turned in another powerful performance.

Sophomore Garrison

Smith turned in the best individual performance by an Aggie golfer at an NCAA regional since 2013.

Smith, from Mansfield, Texas, finished tied for 18th with a 3-under three-day total of 213.

The last time an Aggie had finished in the top 20 at an NCAA regional tournament was eight years ago when Justin Shin shot a 3-under 207 in Tempe, Ariz., to take 11th

place and Brett Walker shot a 2-under 208 for a 17th-place showing.

Smith was the model of consistency in Albuquerque, carding rounds of 71, 70 and 72. That's the type of performance weekend-warrior golfers salivate over.

As a team, the Aggies took 12th place in their first trip to an NCAA regional since 2015. Overall, they shot a 19-over 883. Of course, this young bunch saved their best for last with a 2-over 290 on the third and final day in Albuquerque.

Freshman Joseph Robson, of Newcastle, England, followed an opening round of 77 with consecutive 72s to finish with a 5-over total of 221, good for 47th place.

Aidan Thomas, the WAC Freshman of the Year, shot rounds of 76, 76 and 70 for a 6-over 222 in Albuquerque, good for a tie for 51st. Thomas put in his stellar third-round effort in front of friends and family in his hometown.

Cole Grossl, of Keller, Texas, shot a 14-over 230 for a 64th-place finish, while Alvaro Morales, from El Espinar, Spain, shot a 15-over 231 for 65th place.

Grossl and Morales are — you guessed it — freshmen.

It all adds up to a rosy future for Aggie golf under the guidance of head coach Mike Dirks, who was named WAC Coach of the Year for the fourth time this year.

Dr. Golf reveals hidden secrets to conquering mental game

Years ago, Yogi Berra offered us this piece of wisdom: “Half of the game is 90 percent mental.”

Maybe it's even more than that. Teaching gurus, golf writers, sports announcers and coaches all expect us to assume they know all about the “mental game.” But do they?

Let me give you my take on such a complex topic. First of all, I don't believe it's really possible to compartmentalize the physical skill from the mental skill in any human endeavor. That would be like separating mind and body; or thought and spirit. The two are inexorably connected, whether it be for a concert violinist or a professional golfer.

Over 100 years ago, James Allen wrote the small but profound book “As A Man Thinketh” in which he explained that all of behavior, including perceived conditions in life, is

connected to thought; and with the proper attitude anything is possible.

“Thought and character are one, and as character can only be manifest and discover itself through environment and circumstance, the outer conditions of a person's life will always be found to be harmoniously related to his inner state,” Allen counsels.

Folks, you can't do golf all by yourself. The true mental game is knowing how to learn, how to think and how to practice. The brainy golfer is one who recognizes his shortcomings and is smart enough to ask for help, take lessons and get some feedback and advice.

The mentally competent golfer is also someone who sets specific goals for himself and keeps his expectations realistic. Goals and a plan: having a purpose and making plans. If you

don't know where you're going, any road will take you there. For example, a plan of action would be to add 20 yards to driving distance, to hit 60 percent of greens in regulation, to up sand saves to 2 out of 3 and to improve putting to less than 32 putts per round.

We don't have the space here, but each of those major plans requires a detailed specific plan for how you're going to accomplish those stats.

In the words of James Allen, “Until thought is linked with purpose there is no intelligent accomplishment ... that strength can only be developed by effort and practice.”

A hundred years ago Allen seems to have put a pen to what we call the mental game: these are principles of total focus, lack of fear and systematic routine, methodological preparation with emotional resiliency, and today they still remain critical for success.

Coachability, constantly

striving for improvement, a super-positive attitude and the heart of a champion will produce a winning performance, even when talent is seemingly underrated. And make no mistake growing mentally tough takes discipline.

Perhaps the most underestimated aspect of the mental game happens to be the ability and determination to bounce back (forward?) from a setback.

A setback may be anything from a score-ruining quadruple bogey in a tournament or a devastating loss in a match because of a stupid self-imploding brain-dead mistake.

Setbacks take all forms, even serious injury. Life is virtually guaranteed to be

full of setbacks, losses and disappointments. The challenge is how we respond after we have suffered enough.

To respond successfully means to pick yourself up, forget the temporary painful moments and go out and perform stronger than ever the next time. Like war and peace. It's called emotional resiliency; winners have it, losers don't.

Truly, the most exceptional performers are absolutely fearless. There is no fear of failure – no fear of success. Still, there's more to self-confidence (which is learned and deliberate) than lack of fear, but it is required.

Take putting, for example. Young junior golfers

who are grounded in solid skills and fundamentals are fearless on the putting green.

The older golfers get, after 40, nerves may creep into their game. Hogan, Snead, Watson and Miller all struggled with yips late in their careers.

As Allen writes, “He who has conquered doubt and fear has conquered failure.”
