NOTICE OF DELINQUENCY

In accordance with State Statute §7-38-60, notification is hereby given that delinquent notices have been mailed. Taxes became delinquent on May 12, 2020. Pursuant to State Statute §7-38-61, accounts that have been delinquent for more than 2 years will be transferred to the State's Property Tax Division on July 1st, 2021. At which point the account may accrue an additional fee of \$125.

ATTENTION MOBILE HOME OWNERS

Pursuant to §7-38-53 NMSA 1978, a County Treasurer may collect delinquent property taxes by asserting a claim against the owner's personal property for which taxes are delinquent by service of a demand warrant. At which point an additional \$25 fee may be assessed, and the property may be seized for auction.

To avoid further collection action, please pay delinquent balances by **June 30th, 2021**.

Student-made murals part of Oñate High's rebranding campaign

Oñate High School (OHS) is changing its name to Organ Mountain High School (OMHS) this summer, and four murals at the school were unveiled earlier this month as part of that rebranding.

Student artists “worked with mural artists from Cruces Creatives (a non-profit makerspace), who taught them about the history of public art and showed us the process of mural-making from start to finish,” said Oñate High teacher Stefanie Japel, Ph.D., who led the mural project.

“Each student was given her own sketchbook, and they spent time writing and drawing each day,” Japel said. “Students

were given the freedom to create their own murals from start to finish. The imagery they chose represents the beautiful landscape around us, our cultural heritage as New Mexicans and some deep symbolism about bravery, strength, and what it is to be (New) Mexican.”

The summer school mural project is part of the high school’s extended-learning time program, Japel said. The mural project was made possible with financial support from Las Cruces Public Schools and the high school, Japel said. It was led by Cruces Creatives community muralists Celina Corral and Domenic Altamirano.

The Las Cruces Public Schools Board of Education voted unanimously

last August to rename the school. The move to rename the school came at the request of community members in June 2020, after the death of George Floyd.

The name change will be effective July 1, LCPS Public Information Officer Kelly Jameson said.

“This was a hard decision to make, but we did not want to go back,” LCPS board member Maria Flores said after the vote. “We knew that this change was hard for some. We needed to move forward to allow the healing to begin, requested by Mr. (Jim) Schapekahn, the principal. The goal was to move away from a violent history, to decolonize our school and make

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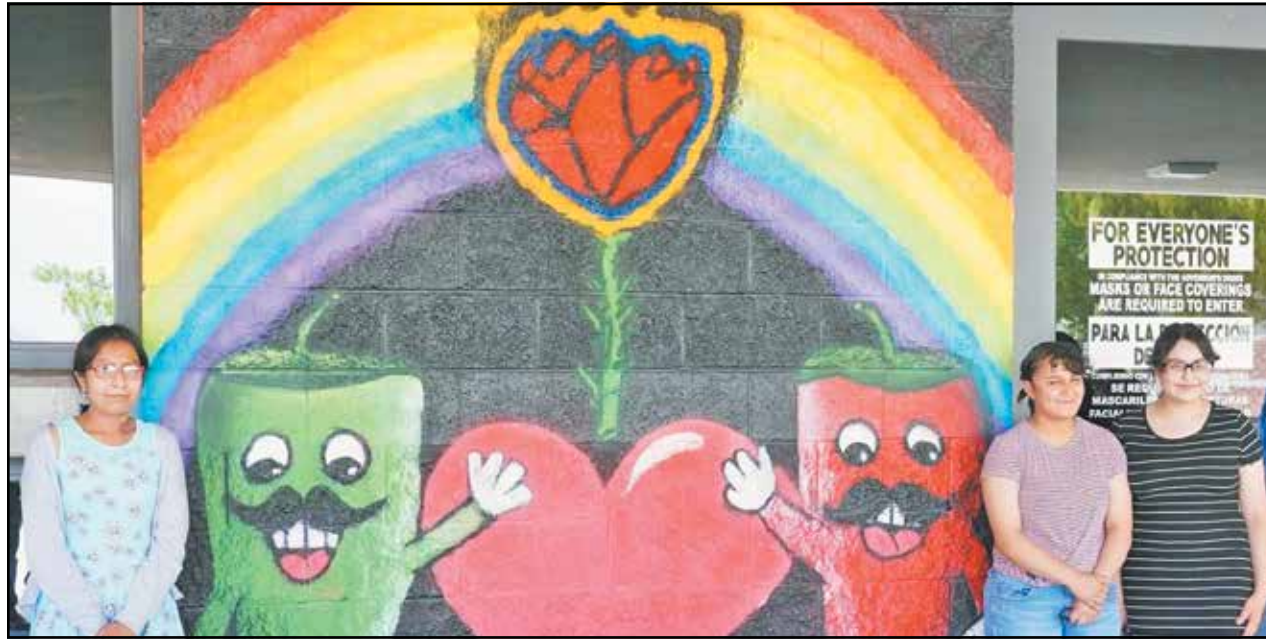

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it culturally appropriate.”

Don Juan de Oñate (1550-1626), for whom the high school was originally named, was the first Spanish governor of New Mexico (1598-1606). An explorer and conquistador, he led colonists north from Mexico into what would become the state of New Mexico in 1598, establishing the first European settlements in the Southwest. Oñate is remembered for the Acoma Pueblo Massacre of 1599 in which an estimated 800 to 1,000 Acoma were killed. He also had Acoma warriors punished by cutting off part of one foot and putting them in servitude. The Spanish government found Oñate guilty of using excessive force against the Acomas.

Originally located at Sierra Middle School beginning in 1988, Oñate High School moved into its own building at 5700 Mesa

Grande Drive in 1993.

Artist quotes

Here is what student muralists from the soon-

to-be-renamed school said about their work on the murals:

• Olive Japel: “We decided to paint this because

we liked the idea of having something related to New Mexico.”

• Mazie Japel: “We will definitely keep painting.”

• Tahlor Triolo and Sarahi Alvarado: “We painted this because we wanted to paint something that represented New Mexico.”

• Jessica Arias, Reyna Arias and Gabriela Arias: The rainbow in their mural, “The Happiness of New Mexico and Our Creativity,” represents emotions in each color. The rose represents bravery (it’s on fire in the mural, but “hasn’t been burned to ashes”). The red and green chiles are part of New Mexican culture. “The heart represents the love of New Mexico.”

• Yanelly Garcia, Mariana Cordova and Jennifer Cordova: “Our mural title is ‘Nuevo Mexicanas.’ We chose this name because we are from New Mexico, but we are Mexicans. We painted this mural because we and our family like to do these things.”

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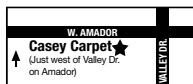
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A toast to a better-than-normal Monday

A few times during the pandemic's second wave, I wandered down to the Mesilla Plaza, taking a walk and fretting because it felt like a ghost town.

Stores and restaurants closed. Music silenced. The occasional piece of paper or plastic bag catching a wind gust and rolling across the Plaza grass like a lonely tumbleweed.

"There will be a day," I told myself, "when this will all be a memory. The Plaza will be back, full of laughter, full of sound, full of life."

I didn't think it would be a Monday night, after a day when temperatures reached 103 degrees.

Yet there it was, on June 21, the first full day of summer.

A tequila tasting dinner at La Posta de Mesilla's Fiesta Room was a great start. La Posta owners Tom and Jerean Hutchinson hosted Alberto and Dan Becherano, the father-and-son duo

behind Cantera Negra tequila. The two visited Las Cruces from Mexico to tell the story of their tequila, and to share it with 75 or so local aficionados, the beverage paired with some delights from the La Posta kitchen and bar. Serenading the group was Las Cruces Rob Palacios, singing Mexican tunes with his guitar, unknowingly accompanied by Alberto Becherano, who was singing along from the middle of the room.

"This is not 'prom' tequila," the younger Becherano said of his family's quality brand, which began about 35 years ago when the elder Becherano decided to stray from the family tradition of being an accountant. Many Americans' first experience with tequila is a negative one, shooting Jose Cuervo in college, or at some other youth-oriented event. The Becheranos are spreading the gospel of good, sipping tequila, meant

Jerean couldn't hide her joy at one point: "It's just so good to see everyone's smiling faces again."

I had to agree, seeing some folks I hadn't seen since pre-Covid, and

enjoying some excellent food and drink. I also had the good fortune to be seated with the Becheranos, and absorb the passion they clearly hold for their work. They make small batches of their 100 percent agave elixir, and avoid some of the tricks of the mass producers, such as aging tequilas for exact times.

"We age it until it's ready," Dan said. "It takes time for the agave to be all it can be."

Upon leaving the dinner out La Posta's west side door, we were immediately hit by a too-long-unfamiliar sound: more live music, this time coming from the patio at NM

Vintage Wines, which had also had a good crowd, defying the logic of a heat-muddled Monday. But it was relatively cool and comfortable in their beautiful outdoor setting.

Heading from there into the heart of the Plaza, still more music echoed against the storefronts.

The sound came from

the Plaza gazebo, a single viola player.

I recognized the tune, "A Mighty Fortress is Our God," which juxtaposed perfectly with the silhouetted musician in

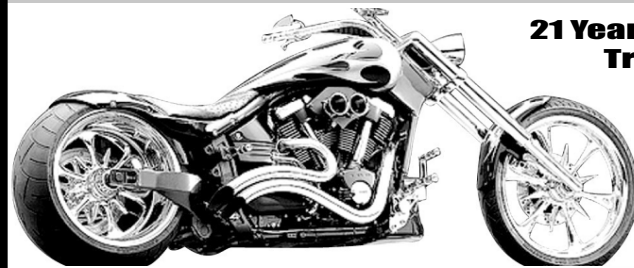
the shadow of the mighty fortress of God known as the Basilica of San Albino, still lit with the fading rays of sunlight.

It was a damn near perfect evening.

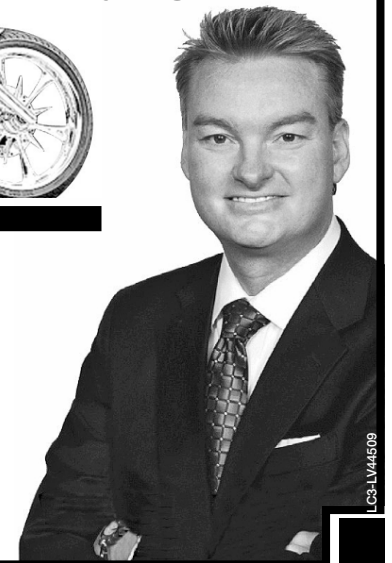

A lot is happening at the airport

To the editor:

A recent letter to the Bulletin's editor entitled "Our Airport's Future" (5/28/21) seemed to indicate that the City Council and Airport Administration are singularly focused on establishing regularly scheduled commercial air service at Las Cruces International Airport (LRU). This is simply not the case.

While a consultant has

been hired to determine the viability of commercial service at LRU, the possibility of such service is only one element of the vision for the airport's future. There is also a new Airport Master Plan in the works, which will definitely be a "Build To" vision for the airport's future including new signage, enhanced landscaping, building many more hangars and aircraft shelters, lengthening runways and expanding the terminal and offices as well determining the vi-

ability of commercial air service on the airfield.

During my two years on the Airport Advisory Board, I have witnessed the manifestation of the airport's current Action Plan (contrary to the aforementioned letter, its title implies that it too is definitely a "Build To" plan in addition articulating a vision for the future and definitely hasn't been "shelved") including repaving wide expanses of the runways and tarmac, installing an impressive security fence around

the entire huge footprint of the airport, setting up a new restaurant near the terminal, converting to LED lighting on all runways and taxiways and installing solar panels on the parking lot shade roofs. In addition to some local tax dollars, these projects are mostly funded by federal grants.

The issue of commercial air service has only recently been discussed in earnest.

The heart and soul of LRU will always be general aviation and the com-

munity-oriented aviation organizations that operate from the airfield such as the Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA), Civil Air Patrol, National Guard, LCFD's Station No. 7 and NMSU's drone program.

There are also many tax-paying, revenue-generating private businesses that successfully operate on the airfield. If it can be demonstrated that commercial air service can also serve the citizens of Las Cruces, it might be added to the mix as one

component of the diverse, multifaceted enterprise that is our beautiful and busy airport.

If you want a peek at the "airside" of our airport, be sure to visit the airplane and car show "Wings and Wheels" that will once again be held at LRU this fall. Then you will get some insight into how many different projects are in the works at your airport.

In the last 40 years, income and wealth inequality in the U.S. has gone through the roof, especially as compared to other rich countries. As discussed above, unfair tax arrangements is one reason, but another is lack of access to a quality education for everyone. In the U.S., education quality is based on your zip code.

Poor districts are put at a major disadvantage as compared to rich ones. It is time we consider a wealth tax to promote fairness in our tax system and provide access to a quality education and re-training needs for all.

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Las Cruces Utilities Crew Practice Scenarios To Keep Customers Safe

Ruptures or breaks in natural gas lines are serious business. And in most cases, they are innocently caused by people who don't take the proper precautions before digging in their yards. Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) is a part of the national "call before you dig" network, which urges customers to call 811 before they dig on their property. While preventing disasters are easy, accidents still happen all too frequently. To prepare for gas line breaks, LCU conducts mock training exercises for work crews in conjunction with the Las Cruces Fire Department (LCFD). "A mock gas line rupture shows the dangers of digging without permission and also helps us improve our communication skills with the LCFD," said Ramiro Pereyra, LCU Gas systems inspection supervisor.

A typical training exercise involves a mock scenario where LCU receives a call of a hit on a gas line. Once the call is received, dispatch sends an LCU service member trained as a first responder to the location. "For the field exercise, we bury a polyethylene (poly) line in the ground and run air from a compressor through the line to simulate a gas leak. It won't smell, but you can see it and hear it," said Jeff Griffith, LCU Gas safety training coordinator. The service member evaluates the situation, sets up a hot zone (danger zone) and monitors the situation until a repair crew pinches or plugs the line to stop the flow of gas. LCU crews use breathing equipment, hand tools, shovels, and backhoes for the exercise – everything necessary in actual situations. What people don't understand is that most low-pressure

lines are poly lines, and they don't have shut off valves to isolate them. "One of the reasons we pinch the line where it's broken is to minimize disrupting gas flow to other customers' homes and businesses. If we had to shut off valves, it would stop service to larger sections of the city," said Griffith.

During the exercise, as in a live event, LCFD is called to assist. "They set up an incident command center, take control of the perimeter and deploy their hoses. If things go bad, they can perform rescues and evacuate

people from homes and businesses," said Pereyra. This year the day-long exercise was at the Las Cruces International Airport. Afterwards a briefing takes place between crews from LCU and LCFD to review how the training protocols were followed. "This is more of a communication exercise, so if something does happen, and God willing nothing will ever happen, we have open communication. They know what to expect from us, and we know what to expect from them," said Pereyra.

Striking a natural gas line is not something anyone should take lightly. LCU reminds everyone to call 8-1-1 before digging in your yard or around your home or business to avoid serious injuries to yourself or others. "It happens frequently because gas lines are not that deep - only 18 to 24 inches below the surface," Griffith said.

Court adopts new pretrial services

Third Judicial District Court (Doña Ana County) will roll out a series of "pretrial justice improvements" in the next few weeks, the court said in a news release. The improvements include a pretrial services program and assessment of defendants, the news release said.

"It is vital our pretrial justice system makes deliberate, informed decisions throughout the process," said Chief District Judge Manuel Arrieta. "These improvements will help us uphold the law, improve decision making and ensure community well-being and safety is strengthened."

The Pretrial Services Planning Committee that recommended improvements includes: Third Judicial District and county magistrate judges; officials from the state Administrative Office of the Courts; the Third Judicial District Attorney's

Office; the public defender's office; the Doña Ana County Sheriff's Office; the Doña Ana County Detention Center; the Doña Ana County Health and Human Services Department; and La Casa Inc., domestic violence prevention program.

Pretrial justice "upholds people's rights when they are accused of a crime but presumed innocent," the news release said. During the pretrial phase of a criminal court case, a judge must consider what the defendant needs to reasonably ensure that he or she will make future court appearances and remain arrest-free during the pretrial period.

Beginning June 29, Third Judicial District Court will implement a public safety assessment (PSA) and pretrial services program.

A PSA provides research-based information about defendants to

judges, prosecutors and defense attorneys. Courts are responsible for deciding whether to release defendants from custody while awaiting trial or detain them because no release conditions will reasonably protect the community. Judges must follow the law, using their experience and information presented by the defendant, prosecutor and defense attorney.

The PSA will offer additional information to help judges make more consistent, transparent decisions. It will estimate the likelihood of defendants attending future court hearings and remaining law-abiding while on pretrial release, and will help identify those who would benefit from additional services.

A pretrial services program will provide defendants on pretrial release with support services and supervision aimed at increasing court appearances and community safety.

Pretrial staff will meet regularly with defendants, will provide court date reminders and will inform the court, district attorney and defense attorneys of any violations of defendants' conditions of release.

"These pragmatic and comprehensive advancements to our pretrial system are the result of meaningful collaboration among justice system stakeholders, public health experts and victims' advocates," said District Attorney Gerald Byers, a Pretrial Services Planning Committee member. "These improvements will help our community achieve better

pretrial outcomes."

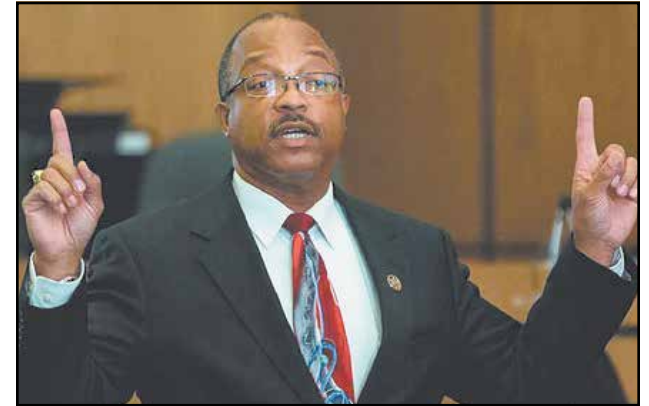
Improvements to New Mexico's pretrial justice system in recent years have shifted from using money such as a financial bond as a condition of release, to a system that assesses a defendant's likelihood of success – court appearances and law-abiding behavior – while on pretrial release. Research shows that using money as a release condition does not make communities safer or in-

crease court appearance.

About New Mexico's Pretrial Initiative

The pretrial initiative is supported both nationally and locally with technical assistance from the National Institute of Corrections, which promotes evidence-based practices that improve decision-making at the pretrial stage of the criminal justice system.

Volunteers mapping graves at cemetery

For Rosemary Leyva, mapping the graves in San Jose Cemetery is a labor of love. It's about family and history.

The eight-acre cemetery, which contains thousands of graves, is located at 100 N. Espina Ave. and is the oldest cemetery in Las Cruces. It's one of two cemeteries managed by St. Genevieve's Catholic Church, which is next door to San Jose Cemetery and across the street from Saint Joseph Cemetery.

"I see so much of history here," said Leyva, who has been working with José Tapia and volunteers from the Doña Ana County Genealogical Society and others to create a map of San Jose Cemetery's graves to help family and friends find their relatives buried there since 1859. Leyva also has spent several months scanning St. Genevieve's cemetery records.

The cemetery includes the remains of some of Las Cruces' earliest

residents, most prominent families, the last person hanged in Las Cruces and veterans of the wars Americans have fought in for the last 160 years.

"I like working here," said Leyva's project partner, Jose Tapia.

"It's beautiful here," he

said.

"It's very peaceful," Leyva added.

She, Tapia and the other volunteers began working early mornings in May and had put in more than 100 hours collectively on the project by June 1, when they had completed mapping graves in two of the cemetery's four garden sections. The cemetery also contains a large historic section that is home to Martin Amador and his family, members of the Barncastle family, the Armijo family and many others who are well known in the history of Las Cruces.

Here you can find the grave of Adolphe Lea of the 1st U.S. Dragoons, for whom nearby Leasburg Dam State Park is named; and Eugene Van Patten (1857-1926), of the U.S.

Cavalry, for whom Van Patten Avenue in Las Cruces is named. You'll also find the grave of Theodore Rouault, who owned Las Cruces' first cannery and invented a plow, Leyva said.

Here, Leyva also tends the grave of her great-grandfather, Baltazar Madrid (1865-1922), one of Las Cruces' first residents. The headstones for her family members are easily recognizable because their crosses are titled at 15 degrees, Leyva said.

Here also is the grave of Frank C. Brito (1877-1973), the second-to-the-last surviving member of the First U.S. Volunteer Cavalry (Teddy Roosevelt's Rough Riders).

You can also find the grave of the Rev. Father Andres Echallier, who carved the crucifix that hangs over the altar inside St. Genevieve's, Leyva said. He even carved his own coffin.

The earliest recorded burial at the cemetery is Maria Magdalena Cordero, age 12, who was buried there May 11, 1859. That's the year St. Genevieve Church began keeping vital parish records.

In many cases, grave markers were constructed by hand by family members of the deceased, Leyva said. Many of the other graves have no headstones and some aren't even marked. Some grave markers have been vandalized – kicked over, run over with vehicles or broken into pieces. Some made of wood have been damaged by termites. Some have simply suffered the ravages of time

and weather.

Many graves have been lovingly restored by volunteers like Leyva and Tapia and others from St. Genevieve's, the genealogical society, Eagle Scouts, Knights of Columbus and even U.S. Army soldiers stationed at White Sands Missile Range.

Wood for hundreds of new crosses erected in the last year came from lumber companies and even from scrap lumber left over when Leyva renovated her carport.

San Jose Cemetery is the final resting place of rich and poor, children (including almost 100 babies) and adults, soldiers and priests, the famous and the unknown. There was a Catholic section, a Protestant section and

even a potter's field, although religious affiliation didn't matter when it came to burying someone there, Leyva said.

Leyva said she got interested in the cemetery's restoration after her father died in 2004.

"I needed something," she said. "I come here and walk because it's so peaceful."

As of 1912, the cemetery had 3,352 burials, Leyva said. No bodies have been buried in the cemetery since then, although cremated remains have been allowed burial there, she said.

The cemetery is open to the public 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

To view the application and supporting documentation contact the State Engineer District Office to arrange a date and time for an appointment located at 1680 Hickory Loop, Suite J, Las Cruces, NM 88005. Any person, firm or corporation or other entity having stood to file objections or protests shall do so in writing (objection must be legible, signed, and include the writer's complete name, phone number, email address, and mailing address). The objection to the approval of the application must be based on: (1) Impairment; if impairment, you must specifically identify your water rights; and/or (2) Public Welfare/Conservation of Water; if public welfare or conservation of water within the state of New Mexico, you must show how you will be substantially and specifically affected. The written protest must be filed, in triplicate, with the State Engineer, 1680 Hickory Loop, Suite J, Las Cruces, NM 88005 on or before August 20, 2021. Facsimiles (faxes) will be accepted as a valid protest if the hard copy is hand-delivered or mailed and postmarked within 24-hours of the facsimile. Mailing postmark will be used to validate the 24-hour period. Protests can be faxed to the Office of the State Engineer, at 575-524-6160. If no valid protest or objection is filed, the State Engineer will evaluate the application in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 72 NMSA 1978.

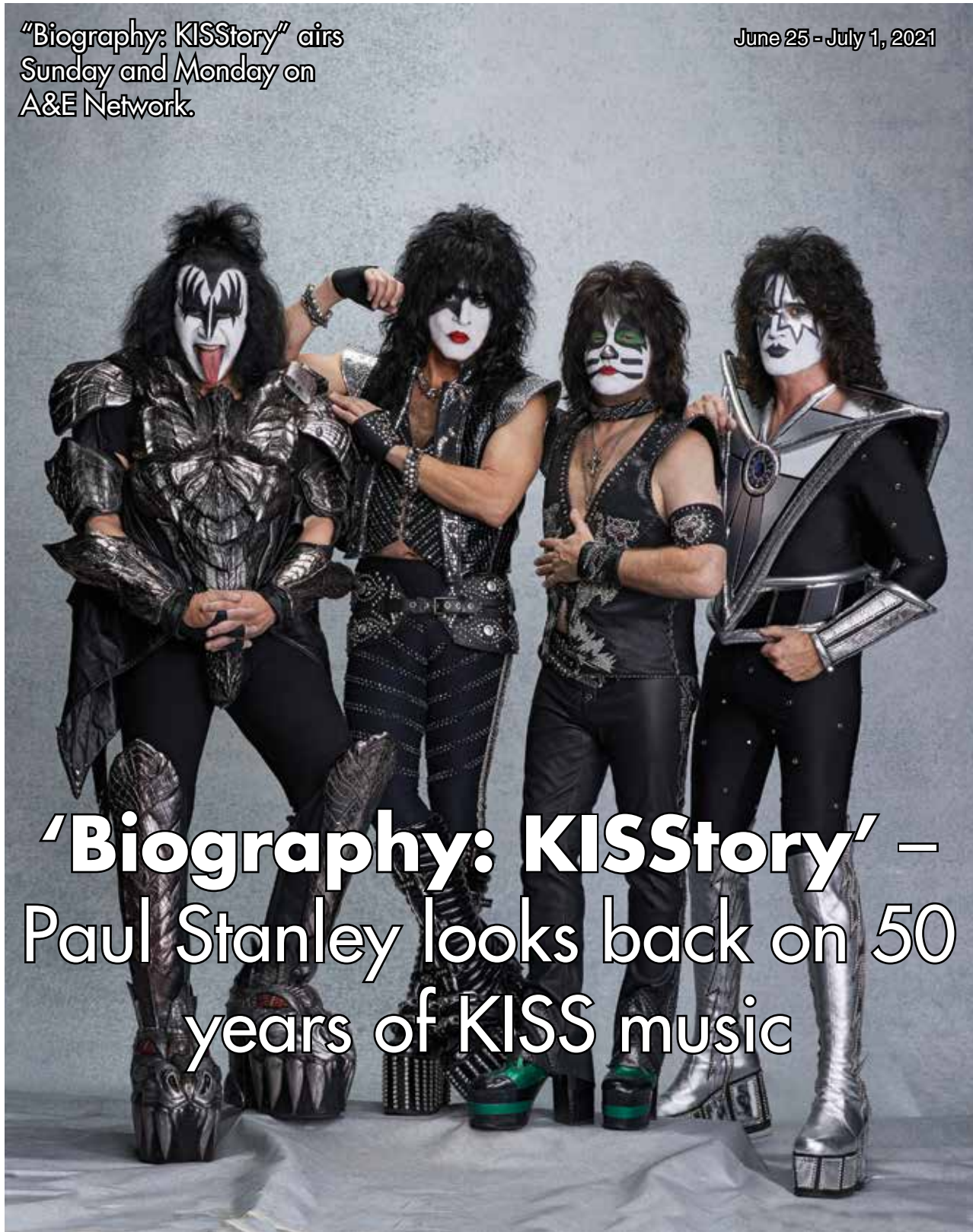

Giving these benign creatures a new future requires Medellin to track their epic migration across Mexico, sprinkling harmless UV dust on the bats and then following their glowing quano.

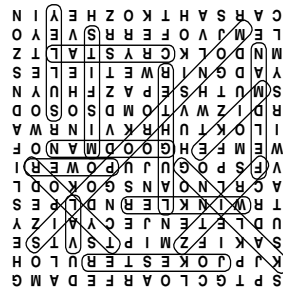

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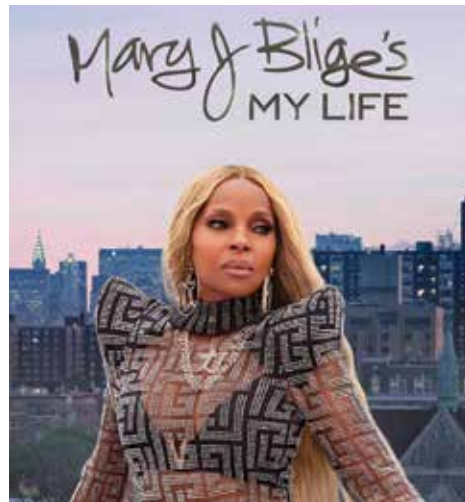

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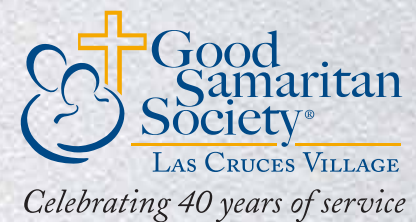

County to hire more than 600 student interns

Thanks to a \$1.3 million grant from the New Mexico Public Education Department, Doña Ana County will hire 620 students from high schools in the Las Cruces, Gadsden and Hatch school districts to work in a variety of jobs throughout the county during a six-week summer internship program.

County Manager Fernando Macias introduced some of the new interns to county commissioners at their June 22 meeting at the county building.

Macias said the students will be working “throughout the community and throughout the county,” for school districts, the City of Las Cruces, New Mexico State University, Doña Ana Community College, Burrell College of

Osteopathic Medicine, Memorial Medical Center and other public entities, along with private businesses and nonprofits. “We have hired the equivalent of half of our workforce in the last week,” Macias said. “The effort to do that was enormous.”

Macias said the program so far has hired 340 students from Las Cruces Public Schools, 68 from the Gadsden Independent School District, 14 from Hatch Valley Public Schools and 29 from charter schools.

County Commission Chair Manuel Sanchez welcomed the interns at the June 23 commission meeting.

“The way the staff has been able to quickly turn this around is amazing,” Sanchez said. “It’s amazing to see the outreach we’ve received from the communities.”

Las Cruces storyteller wins national award for 'talent, vision'

Storytellers of Las Cruces (STLC) President Sarah Addison, who tells stories under the name "Juba," has received an Oracle Award from the National Storytelling Network (NSN).

Addison was one of four recipients of NSN's regional service and leadership award.

An STLC member for 18 years, Addison has served several terms as president.

"It is no overstatement to say that she has transformed the group with her talent, vision, dedication and generosity," STLC member Douglas Jackson said in his letter of support for her award nomination.

"Sarah was full of ideas when she first came and still is, and she shares her knowledge and makes other storytellers better," Jackson quoted 60-year STLC member Pat Gill as saying about Addison.

"When Sarah tells a story, you are in it with her," he quotes long-time STLC member Florence. "She did Cathy Williams justice. She became that soldier and you were marching right with her, afraid of getting caught."

("Cathy Williams was an African-American woman who in 1866 enlisted in the U.S. Army and served, disguised as a man, as a Buffalo Soldier," Jackson said.)

"Juba's tales have been a magical part of countless meetings, festivals, seminars, workshops, conventions, Tellabratons and other special events," Jackson said in his letter.

"She has told stories at churches, schools, bookstores, art galleries, national parks and concert halls," Jackson continued. "Her tales have been an integral part of our annual Storyfest honoring STLC founder Jennie Curry. We have been particularly inspired by the way Juba, a descendant of griots (West African historians, storytellers, poets, musicians, singers) frequently honored previous generations by sharing



their stories."

"She has voiced the sagas of those whose struggles and sacrifices have been ignored by history, frequently portraying the unsung heroes themselves," Jackson said.

"Juba learned the art of storytelling from her grandmother Sarah Jane, a descendant of West African griots," according to Addison's biography on www.storytellersof-newmexico.org. "She is dedicated to performing, preserving and promoting traditional storytelling for people of all ages and cultures. Juba entertains audiences of adults, families and children with her



repertoires of folklore, fables and fairy tales, plus historical and inspirational stories."

Juba has performed at White Sands National Park, Fort Selden State Monument, the Border Book Festival in Las Cruces and the Chamizal Festival in El Paso.

Juba's mission statement as stated on the Storytellers of New Mexico website is, "I share what I know so that others may grow."

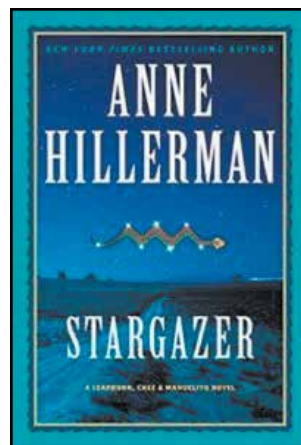

Las Cruces author revisits notorious Fountain murders

Las Cruces author Mary Armstrong has published "The Mesilla - The Two Valleys Saga: Book One," which is available at www.amazon.com and at COAS bookstores.

"Nearly 125 years ago, a prominent Mesilla Valley lawyer, politician and civic leader (Albert J. Fountain) and his 8-year-old son were murdered as they returned from Lincoln, where Fountain had indicted a large number of cattle rustlers in the Tularosa Valley," Armstrong said, and that is the basis for her book series.

"Their killers nor the bodies were ever found. The mystery and tension between two valleys simmers below the surface even today," she said.

Armstrong said her books (the second in the anticipated four- or five-book series is expected this Christmas season) "explore the 10 years leading to that fateful day."

"The story is told by Jesus, a fictional nephew

to the later murdered Fountain," Armstrong continued.

"Jesus' coming-of-age story will take you to the wild Southwest, a brewing range war, a territory struggling toward statehood, courtroom dramas, 'reading law' and the adventures and adversities of a boy's quest for manhood."

Armstrong moved to Las Cruces from the Boston metro area with her husband, Norman "Skip" Bailey Jr., in 2010. A native of Ottumwa, Iowa, she earned a degree in landscape architecture from Iowa State University. Her career included planning and design for recreational and real estate developments, national wildlife refuges and environmental centers.

She started Armstrong Golf Architects in 1990, fulfilling a lifelong dream

of designing new golf courses and renovations. Armstrong earned a Green Planets Architect citation for environmentally sensitive golf course design and worked on more than 120 golf courses worldwide.

After a rigorous transition of more than two years, she had gender reassignment surgery and became Mary Armstrong. Armstrong has con-

tinued to do golf design, including redesigning all the bunkers at Picacho Hills Golf Course in 2012.

Armstrong also has an extensive career as a writer.

"During my more technical/design career, I wrote thousands and thousands of pages of technical specifications, planning documents, environmental impact statements and assessments

and some trade articles," she said. "At ISU in 1974, I used an early computer to do early forms of Geographic Information Systems (GIS)."

In 2007, Armstrong began working on "a dystopian dysgenic futuristic novel that is 'on the shelf'" and she says she needs to do a road trip from Iowa to New Hampshire to finish it. She also wrote a golf column for the Las Cruces Sun-News from 2010-12.

"I became interested in local history almost immediately after moving here," she said, reading as much as she could about the Fountain murders.

Armstrong wrote a

play about the murders, "It is Blood," which was performed at Las Cruces Community Theatre in 2017, and then began work on her book series.

Armstrong said her reason for self-publishing is linked to her mother, who still lives in Ottumwa.

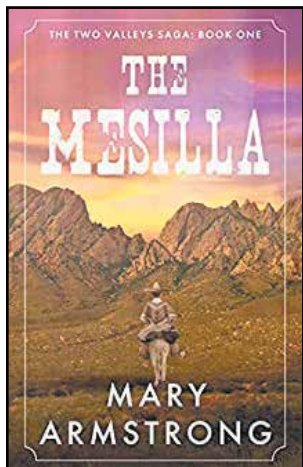
"This genre is one that she loves," Armstrong said. "I talk with her every day at 4:15 p.m.

When I was writing the manuscript, she wanted to hear what I had written that day. It took me a year to write (originally almost 800 pages, now split into two books) and six months to edit. As we neared the completion of the draft manuscript, my mother's health began to go downhill and a couple months ago she had a fall. She has talked about holding the book in her hands."

"I haven't done it all and I may have done too much, but damn the torpedoes and full speed ahead," is Armstrong's life motto, she said.

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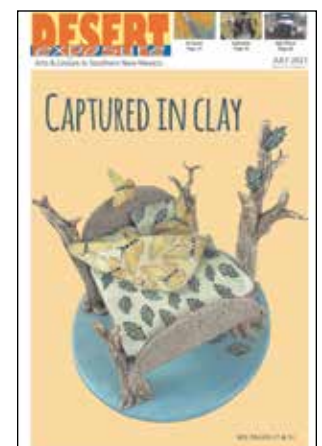

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Catering on menu as restaurants pivot after Covid

“It was like flipping a switch,” Corner Deli owner Mark Stephens said about the collapse of his catering business when Covid-19 hit in March 2020.

Stephens, who has owned Corner Deli, 2139 N. Main St., for 31 years, had been catering a lot of parties and special events – “six-inch subs were a big thing,” he said – as well as events for public schools and New Mexico State University, before the pandemic.

Corner Deli has survived during Covid because of takeout orders, which it was doing a lot of before Covid, Stephens said, and because of the continuing support of longtime, loyal customers.

Catering was 10 to 15 percent of Salud! de Mesilla’s business before Covid, said co-owner Christopher Schaljo. Salud!, 1800 Avenida de Mesilla, is beginning to see “a little uptick” in

catering, Schaljo said, and he expects it to continue to increase.

“I think everything’s going to come back,” said Schaljo, who owns Salud! with partner Russell Hernandez.

Curbside service helped Salud! get through the pandemic, Schaljo said, and the restaurant also changed its business model by creating family-pack entrees – everything from lemon and herb

chicken to salmon and serrano aioli, which can feed a family of four and are “priced well,” Schaljo said – which are available for take-out only.

“That sustained us,” he said.

Catering “almost completely shut down” for Dickerson Catering, said owner Marci Dickerson.

But, her core catering staff of five “never missed a paycheck” throughout the pandemic, Dickerson said, and her whole team is in place as catering begins to return.

The catering business “won’t ever go back to what it was,” Dickerson said, because some businesses and organizations that hosted large in-person conferences, employee-training sessions and special events before the pandemic will continue to do them remotely going forward. Catering for smaller events like birthday parties and

weddings will take several months to recover, she said.

“There are many challenges still facing the restaurant industry and the tourism industry,” Dickerson said. Labor shortages and “rising costs across the board” are “a by-product of decisions made by the government and our leaders over the last year,” she said.

After the pandemic hit, Dickerson quickly added additional outdoor space to the restaurants she owns, The Game Sports Bar and Grill and The Game II, to serve customers when indoor dining was restricted. She even helped other, smaller restaurants add or expand their own outdoor service areas.

“Everybody has to survive to make this work,” Dickerson said.

Dickerson also got a real-estate license during Covid, and opened Dick-

erson Group real estate, to go along with her catering business, The Game (2008), Game II (2016), her Revolution 120 nonprofit (2017) and The Association, a women’s development group Dickerson started with Sumer Rose Nolen in 2020.

Real estate is “a great industry to get into to help stabilize the economics of our future,” Dickerson said. “The extension into real estate is very natural,” she said, and necessary “in order to help provide for my family and my employees.”

With help from the federal Paycheck Protection Program, Dickerson has been able to continue paying 100 percent of her 120 employees throughout the pandemic, she said.

“We were very fortunate in many ways,” Dickerson said.

“We’re still here,” Mark Stephens said about Corner Deli, which was actu-

ally located on the corner of north Main Street and Madrid Avenue for 14 years before Stephens and his wife, Cindy, moved it into the shopping center at that same location, right next to Chiropractic Caring For You.

“We never closed,” said Stephens, who has kept all nine employees who worked for him before the pandemic hit.

You can call in an order – the staff will even bring it out to your vehicle – or you can go inside Corner Deli to place your order.

But Stephens is not allowing indoor dining until the state has lifted its color-coded risk-assessment framework, he said. The framework limits the maximum capacity of food and drink establishments to 75 percent of maximum capacity under the turquoise level of the framework. Doña Ana County and all other New Mexico counties are now in the turquoise, or least restrictive, level of the framework. Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham has said the restrictions will be lifted when the state reaches 60 percent full vaccination of eligible adults, plus two weeks.

“It really does feel good,” Schaljo said, as Salud! and other restaurants and businesses reopen.

How the rich avoid taxes and why that's unfair

Who isn't fascinated with the machinations of our plutocratic overlords? That is why the recent ProPublica publication of the tax returns of our country's 25 richest multi-billionaires has generated such buzz. It turns out to the surprise of no one, the super-rich do not pay income taxes.

The reason the rich pay so little is that their wealth arises from the sharply climbing value of their assets. These gains are considered unrealized under the U.S. tax code until sold.

ProPublica calculated that the average income tax paid as a percentage of their increase in wealth by the 25 richest Americans during the five years ending 2018 was just 3.4 percent. During the same time period, an equivalent tax rate on wealth increases for the average American was 95 percent.

Should the richest Americans pay more? After all, the rich are, as was famously said by President Bush the Younger, job creators. Sure a 3.4 percent tax rate seems ridiculously small but would a higher tax rate on the rich make the average American better off, or would a higher tax rate on the rich disincentivize investment, thereby

destroying jobs, perversely making average Americans worse off.

Taxing wealth will reduce wealth and, on the margin, this means fewer jobs. But studies show the effect is small. The rich, after all, are rich because they save a lot and saving behavior is remarkably insensitive to taxes.

And then there are the benefits from government programs financed by taxing the rich. Infrastructure expenditures funded by increased taxes on the rich, by reducing the cost of doing business, create jobs offsetting, in part or in full, the jobs lost from increased taxes. The high return of pre-K programs, for example, are well documented. President Biden has proposed funding universal pre-K programs by increasing taxes on the rich. The net return to the

U.S. economy is almost certain to be positive.

The rich benefit disproportionately from many government programs compared to the middle class and the poor. Public education, for example, improves worker productivity, which increases profits, disproportionately benefiting the rich. Public roads, used by workers to travel to and from work and for delivery of products to customers, also contribute to corporate profits, again benefiting the rich. Defense spending benefits the rich in that should there be an invasion, the rich have more to lose.

Programs that are supposedly designed to directly help the poor provide benefits to the rich by limiting the risk of social unrest. Take for example the widespread

protests during the 2020 summer of Covid. Consider what might have happened if the protest had not been just about police violence, but also about starvation and homelessness.

The solution to under-taxed billionaires is not easy. Rich people have lots of money and they use that money to hire tax experts to avoid taxes. Rich people have the resources to migrate — like an Elon Musk fleeing California for Texas — to low tax jurisdictions.

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Strong showing for local wrestlers at state

It might have been the strangest year in Las Cruces High School wrestling coach Kevin Marks' highly successful career.

Because of the pandemic, wrestlers had to compete with masks on, couldn't travel more than 200 miles for any tournaments until state and had limited practice time.

Still, the Bulldawgs ended up with another strong season.

The boys went 14-1 in dual meets, including 5-0 in district, and won their

third straight district championship. They also scored Marks his 500th career dual-meet win over Carlsbad on May 1.

The Las Cruces boys ended up with a state champion, a third-place finisher and a sixth-place.

The Las Cruces girls, in only their second year as an official high school sport, finished second in their district and had

a state champion and a state runner-up.

"This team showed a lot of camaraderie on both the boys and girls," Marks said. "They work together as team and hung out as much as they could. When things started to open back up, they'd do little activities.

"It's a great group," Marks said. "They treat each other with a lot of respect. It's a great room and a great atmosphere for the kids to be in."

Because of the pandemic, New Mexico had its wrestling season in the spring instead of winter, with the state championships being held May 29 at the Rio Rancho Convention Center.

At state, Las Cruces junior Avery Atma won an individual championship for the second straight year. The junior took first at 126 pounds after finishing first last year at 120. As a freshman, Atma took second.

"Avery has always wrestled," Marks said. "He went through all the youth programs and is very committed. He does a lot of work in the offseason to improve himself and he is super dedicated."

Las Cruces High had a second state titlist – junior Heavynne Robles-Wright, who took first in the girls competition at 106 pounds. Last year, she took fourth at state as a sophomore.

Robles-Wright is the first official state girls wrestling champion in school history, Marks noted. She says she likes wrestling because it is an individual sport and she doesn't need to rely on anyone else to succeed.

"If I work hard, I'm the one who is winning," she said.

Las Cruces High had a second girl finalist at state. Eighth-grader Alyssa Sedillo took sec-

ond at 100 pounds.

"The lowest weight class is 100 pounds and she weighs under 90," Marks said. "So, she was competing against older kids and heavier kids and was still able to get it done."

Sedillo, who attended Zia Middle School but competed for the Las Cruces varsity, said she was disappointed in taking second, saying she was used to winning after years of competing on club teams.

"I know I need to do more conditioning and work to perfect my moves," Sedillo said.

Centennial sophomore Tye Barker (138 pounds) was the third state champion for Las Cruces schools this year.

Besides Atma, Las Cruces High had two other boys who made an impact at state.

Junior Elijah Ojas was third at 145 pounds. Ojas suffered a disappoint-

NMSU assistant track coach qualifies for Tokyo Olympics

New Mexico State University will have a presence during the track and field competition at the 2020 Olympic Games in Tokyo.

NMSU volunteer track coach Rachel Dincoff qualified for the U.S. track and field team with a third-place showing in the women's discus competition.

Dincoff threw the discus 60.21 meters or 197 feet, 6 inches during the Olympic Trials in Eugene, Oregon on June 19.

Her qualifying throw came on her fifth of six attempts. Only the top three women qualified for Tokyo.

Before her fifth attempt, she sat in fourth place, just out of qualifying position.

Dincoff has served as a volunteer assistant coach with NMSU since 2017, specializing in her work with the team's throwers. During Dincoff's tenure, NMSU has had two athletes qualify for the NCAA West Preliminary meet — Taniya Mitchell (hammer, 2019) and Yemisi Oroyinyin (shotput, 2012).

Before joining the Aggies' staff, Dincoff was an All-American thrower at Auburn University.

Desert sun can pose real dangers for unprepared golfers

The summer heat is upon us. Nighttime temperatures in the 70s are all right for sleeping but the steady 100-plus daytime heat is wilting. Golfing in the dazzling broiling sun can certainly present real health dangers, with the two main concerns being sun damage and heat illness.

Prolonged solar radiation for golfers can cause sunburn, sun poisoning and even heat stroke. You don't have to turn lobster red to suffer sun poisoning. Over-exposure to ultraviolet radiation (UV rays) can result in painful tingling, skin swelling, headache, dizziness, fever, chills, nausea and a painful rash. Sunburn is due to over-exposure to UV rays, when the exposed skin turns bright reddish within a short time, with painful burning and blistering.

For folks who are new to the desert Southwest, it only takes a half hour (even 15 minutes) of being out in the hot sun to get sunburned. One form of

sun poisoning is a condition called "polymorphous light eruption" or PMLE. PMLE can occur in people who are exposed to intense sun that they are not used to, such as folks who live in northern climates where sunshine UV is less extreme. Symptoms of PMLE include skin rash, small bumps all over the body and often hives.

Then, there is the worry about the big C. A cutaneous malignant melanoma, called "lentigo maligna," is usually found in areas of the skin which have been overly sun exposed, often about the face and neck. It shows up as a patch of mottled pigmentation seen as shades of dark brown, tan or black. If you notice such an occurrence, don't hesitate to have it examined by a physician.

The powerful radiation from direct sunshine isn't the only way you can suffer from summer temperatures. Golfers and outdoor enthusiasts

should be aware of the potential dangers of heat-related illness. Prolonged or intense exposure to extremely hot temperatures can lead to heat exhaustion, heat cramps and potentially heat stroke. When humidity is up, the problems can be even worse. Heat illness occurs when the body loses large amounts of absorbed water and salt through excessive sweating, especially from vigorous activity and exercise. Here in our typical low humidity desert climate, sweat evaporates very quickly, giving a person the false sense that he or she hasn't lost much sweat. The secret is hydrating automatically even before you feel thirsty. Those who are at the most risk for heat-illness are people who drink a lot of alcohol, people who have heart problems and people who are obese, people who are on a lot of medications, along with the elderly and the very young.

Heat stroke, which is one of the most serious of the heat-related conditions, happens when the body suffers from

long, extreme exposure to heat and loses its ability to cool itself. I am personally acquainted with the effects of heat stroke during my career of marathon running and Ironman triathlons. Extreme distance athletes, who are well-trained and with very low body-fat percentage, can summon the will to overcome bodily pain (that should be a warning) and push on regardless, which can sometimes lead to disaster. Under prolonged heat conditions, the part of the brain that normally regulates both movements and body temperature tends to malfunction and decreases the body's ability to sweat and cool itself. That's when trouble begins. In October 1978, staggering deliriously, I finished my first 26.2 mile marathon in Detroit, and then was taken to a Red Cross tent for IVs, having succumbed to heat exhaustion and dehydration. Stupidly I didn't stop at water tables. I was determined to qualify for the Boston Marathon (needing sub-three-hours) the following spring but

my brain shut down. I pushed too hard. I was transferred to Ford Hospital by helicopter where they revived me. Will is a hard thing to explain. My time was 2 hours 59 minutes and 57 seconds. But I almost died. Don't do that! Next week we'll go over

preventive and first aid measures for summer outdoor activities.
