FEMA APPROVES UPDATED ALL-HAZARDS MITIGATION PLAN

After a two-year planning process, efforts to improve and update the County's existing All-Hazards Mitigation Plan have paid off with approval from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

"FEMA's recent approval of our updated plan makes Doña Ana County eligible to receive post-disaster funding after a presidentially declared disaster, making it easier to address urgent and potentially hazardous situations in communities that experienced severe weather. Disaster caused by weather-related hazards can be a dam failure, flash flooding, severe wind, earthquake, drought, extreme heat or cold, hail, lightning, wildfire and others," said Doña Ana County Flood Commission Engineer Supervisor Michael Garza.

The goal of the mitigation planning effort is to identify the extent to which each jurisdiction is vulnerable to natural hazards, then identify and prioritize actions to reduce or eliminate long-term risk to life and property from high-risk hazards. "Mitigation is more about how we as a community can prevent or lessen the impact of such events when they do occur in our county," Garza said.

A core component of the mitigation planning process involves a risk assessment of the natural hazards most likely to occur within each jurisdiction. This involves analyzing historical data, taking inventory of at-risk infrastructure, and ultimately assessing the vulnerability to these hazards. Most importantly, we then must establish goals, actions and projects that mitigate the associated risks. "The development of this mitigation plan is vital to ensure that historical infrastructure is preserved, protected, and that new growth is safe and sustainable," Garza added.

In November 2019, the Doña Ana County Flood Commission Office and the Office of Emergency Management joined forces with multi-jurisdictional planning and steering committees comprised of representatives from Doña Ana County, the cities of Anthony, Las Cruces, and Sunland Park, the Town of Mesilla, the Village of Hatch, the Elephant Butte Irrigation District and New Mexico State University. They met regularly throughout 2020, as representatives from each jurisdiction provided input on behalf of their communities, which helped to review and update the existing 2012 All-Hazards Mitigation Plan. The recent FEMA-approved plan is adopted through 2026, at which time a new update will be required.

Participating jurisdictions, along with consultants at JE Fuller, completed a final version of the plan update in February, and received final FEMA approval of the plan in June 2021.

Team effort to help campers, hikers in distress

Teamwork is critical when someone is lost or injured in the Organ Mountains, Las Cruces or the desert.

The Las Cruces Fire Department's (LCFD) Technical Rescue Team and Mesilla Valley Search and Rescue, Inc. (MVSAR) are working more closely together than ever to utilize the strengths of each group and their combined training and experience to rescue lost or injured campers, hikers and backpackers. The teams often train and deploy together

to conduct rescues and extractions and respond to other emergencies.

"We realized that our paths crossed a lot," said LCFD Battalion Chief Jeremiah Lay. "It's a really, really good group effort."

MVSAR members "have expertise, have been around for a long, long time and do numerous missions a year," Lay said, so the group was added to LCFD's resource list. He said LCFD also works with other teams that are part of the local search and rescue network, including Doña Ana Search and Rescue and Organ Mountain Technical Res-

cue, plus the New Mexico State Police (NMSP), Doña Ana County Sheriff's Office (DACSO) and Las Cruces Police Department (LCPD).

"I love 'em," MVSAR President Vic Villalobos said of Las Cruces firefighters. "They're a good group of people. Their professionalism is top notch. We just work really well together."

LCFD's Technical Rescue Team and MVSAR worked with DASO and NMSP in May to rescue a group of 24 hikers that had become "separated, disoriented and stranded in the Organ Mountains," according to an LCPD news release.

Villalobos also remembers a joint rescue operation in 2019 when a hiker had fallen in the Organs

and a boulder fell on him, crushing the middle part of his body. Searchers located the hiker and the friends he was with. LCFD was on scene with emergency medical technicians, who stabilized the hiker and contacted Fort Bliss for assistance. LCFD requested the U.S. Army send a Blackhawk



helicopter, which arrived within an hour. The hiker was hoisted out of the canyon he had been trapped in and transported to a hospital.

"He survived because of the life-saving actions taken in the field," Villalobos said.

Because firefighters are trained as emergency medical technicians, the incident commander for an MVSAR mission will call in LCFD if there is any indication of an injury, Villalobos said. EMTs can also administer medication, if necessary.

That LCFD has a swiftwater rescue team and MVSR has a boat. It is another example of their partnership, Villalobos said.

"That makes a pretty

good marriage," said Villalobos, who has volunteered with MVSR since 1997, participating in more than 500 missions and leading the group since 2000.

The LCFD Search and Rescue Team has 21 members, with seven on each shift, Lay said. All are medical professionals with extensive training in swift-water, confinedspace — elevators, trees and tunnels, for example — and rope rescues and heavy extractions. Some team members were deployed to New Orleans and Houston to help with hurricane recovery, said Lay, who has been with the LCFD Technical Rescue Team for 15 of the 16 years he has been with the fire department.

MVSAR, founded in 1995, has ground, canine, ATV, communications and drone teams. Team members have extensive experience in searches and familiarity with the Organ Mountains, where many searches and rescues have taken place over the years. Its canine team also does cadaver searches.

MVSAR members must be at least 16 years old, Villalobos said. You don't have to have any previous experience to join.

MVSAR meets at 6:30 p.m. the second Thursday of each month at A Bite of Belgium restaurant, 741 N. Alameda Blvd.

Saftey tips for hiking, camping

- Follow the Scout motto: Always be prepared.
- Know where you're going, how long and how difficult the trek will be and what the weather conditions are and could become.
- Tell at least one person where you're going and when you expect to return.
- Dress appropriately, including layers that can be easily removed. Wear a proper head covering. Wear comfortable boots or hiking shoes suitable for the terrain to be covered.
- Take a flashlight and extra batteries, first-aid kit, pocketknife or Leatherman tool and plenty of food and water.
- Take a fully charged cell phone and, if available, a portable charger. Avoid depleting the phone battery by overusing the camera function.
- · Don't go alone.
- Keep your group together unless it's essential to separate.
- If you get lost or need help, call only one person to alert emergency response. Save your phone battery so search and rescue can stay in touch with you.
- Follow all signs and stay on established trails.
- Beware of snakes that are more active during warmer weather and as daytime temperatures rise. Snakebite victims should seek help immediately.
- Beware of wild animals in the Organ Mountains and elsewhere, including bobcats, mountain lions, coyotes, foxes, deer and African oryx.





New law authorizes medical aid in dying in New Mexico

The Elizabeth M. Whitefield End of Life Options Act will "assist people in getting medical aid in dying if that's their choice," said MaryKay Brady of Las Cruces, a board member of the newly formed End of Life Options New Mexico (ELONM) nonprofit, and a longtime advocate.

The act was passed by the New Mexico Legislature during the 2021 session and took effect in

Brady said New Mexico is the 11th jurisdiction (There are nine other states and the District of Columbia) to enact a medical-aid-in-dying law, which she said makes access to end-of-life options easier for terminally ill patients while maintaining safeguards.

"It's patient care," Brady said.

The bill was named for the late state District Court Judge Elizabeth M. Whitefield of Albuquerque, who died in August

2018 after an 11-year battle with cancer.

Whitefield testified in support of the End of Life Options Act when it came before the state Legislature in 2017, according to the End of Life Options New Mexico website.

"Cancer has stolen everything from me; my ability to work, my ability to eat, my ability to drink," she testified. "'Don't let me die without dignity. I implore you to give me the choice that is right for me."

The bill did not reach the floor of either house for a vote that year or when it was reintroduced in 2019.

State Sen. Carrie Hamblen, D-Doña Ana, voted in favor of the bill this year exactly one year to the day after the death of her friend, Cheryl Swannack, a Las Cruces artist,

producer and community activist who suffered from Parkinson's Disease.

"I cast my vote in honor of Cheryl," Hamblen said. "Cheryl

loved New Mexico. It was her home," Hamblen said in a Facebook post. "Although she shared a wonderful life with her partner, Nancy, in Washington D.C. ... Cheryl would have loved to have taken her last breath in her New Mexico home. But, because we didn't have any Death with Dignity provisions/laws in the state, she couldn't."

Swannack, 73, died March 15, 2020 in Washington, D.C.

The most important reason for passing the act was terminally ill patients' "decreased ability to enjoy life," Brady said, including their loss of control over bodily functions.

These patients "would like to live," she said, but "life as you and I enjoy it isn't possible."

Under provisions of the act, death results when a patient takes "a specific, compounded drug," Brady said.

He or she is usually asleep within three to five minutes and dies within an hour.

"It's peaceful. It's beautiful. It's a choice," Brady said.

"No one wants to talk about death and dying, but it's going to happen," said Brady, a retired banker who moved to Las Cruces from Deming five years ago.

Her mother suffered from Alzheimer's disease and died in 1992. Her husband, who had "multiple health issues," died in 2008.

ELONM provides information and helps people plan and take action related to end-of-life options and care, according to endoflifeoptionsnm.org.

"We will help with endof-life planning," said Brady, who has already made all those decisions, including putting her medical plan on video and wearing a DNR (do not resuscitate) medic-alert bracelet.

Details of End of Life Options Act

The New Mexico House of Representatives passed the Elizabeth M. Whitefield End of Life Options Act 39-27 in February. The state Senate passed it 24-17 in March. Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham signed it into law in April. The act became effective June 18.

The act defines medical aid in dying as "the medical practice wherein a healthcare provider prescribes medication to a qualified individual who may self-administer that medication to end that individual's life in accordance with the provisions of the act."

Under the act, a healthcare provider "may provide a prescription for medical aid in dying medication" to someone who has the capacity to make a decision about ending his or her life, has a terminal illness (as determined by a doctor), has voluntarily made the request for medical aid in dying and has the ability to self-administer the medication."

The patient's request form must be signed by two witnesses, at least one of whom is not a family member of the patient or associated with a healthcare facility connected to the patient's care. Neither witness can be the patient's healthcare provider.

The law provides for a 48-hour waiting period after the prescription for medical aid in dying medication has been written before it can be filled.

Language in the act states that it "shall not be construed ... to constitute suicide, assisted suicide, euthanasia, mercy killing, homicide or adult abuse."

"I looked at it as a gift to my son," Brady said.

"He knows exactly what my values are," she said.

"I am passionate about this," she said. "Anything I can do or say so people don't have to struggle."

In-person meetings return at City Hall

David McDaniel was one of 12 people who spoke to the Las Cruces City Council at its July 19 meeting, as the council returned to in-person meetings at Las Cruces City Hall for the first time in about 16 months. McDaniel spoke in opposition to the council's resolution extending Mayor Ken Miyagishima's emergency proclamation mandating that face masks be worn during in-person meetings by the unvaccinated. The council voted to extend the

emergency proclamation through July 23.



"People are going out a lot," said Jerry Harrell, general manager of Double Eagle and Peppers in Mesilla. "A lot more than 2019. Maybe it's

the 'finally-free syndrome.'
People are having dessert more,
they're having second drinks
more and they're splurging on
higher priced items more."

They're also having to go to their Plan B, or Plan C, order.

"I'll have the portabella burger."

"I'm sorry, we're out of that."
"OK. I'll have the green chile chicken alfredo."

"I'm sorry, we just ran out of that too."

Harrell said the outages come from the restaurant distributors, who say they aren't really shortages, but problems with the supply chain. If a boat in Los Angeles is backed up in harbor, or if a trucking distribution center in Dallas is having issues, it could affect what

is available in Las Cruces.

Unfortunately for restaurateurs, there is no consistency with the product issues.

"One week they'll be out of one thing, so you double-order that the next week," Harrell said. "But then they'll be out of something different."

The issue of staffing is not unique to restaurants. People across the country, across industries, are having difficulty finding people to hire. Businesses everywhere complain of people coming to work for a month, a week or even just a day, then not showing up again.

Many blame it on an unmotivated work force, who benefited from Covid stimulus money and increased and extended unemployment payments that are

still coming. Harrell agrees.

"We just can't find many of our old workers," he said of reliable restaurant veterans who were laid off during the restaurant shutdowns of the pandemic.

The difficulties extend beyond Las Cruces. Harrell, who has served statewide roles for the New Mexico Restaurant Association, said there are as many as 9,000 unemployed restaurant workers across the state.

The servers who have come in, most of them 25 and under, Harrell said, lack restaurant experience.

"Many of them didn't grow up eating courses, so they don't

Downtown eyesore persists

We are rapidly approaching the midway point in yet another year. Local media carry news stories about the future of the City of Las Cruces and its new budget, its new strategic plan for the next five years, proposed funding to continue renovation of the historic Amador Hotel and other ongoing plans to revitalize Downtown. But, oddly enough, there's been zero mention of the persistent "elephant in the room" sitting at the southern gateway to Downtown Las Cruces.

Anyone who has lived in Las Cruces for more than a decade, and even relative newcomers like myself, have gotten an eyeful of the partially completed, two-story skeletal steel, concrete blocks and slump brick monstrosity that looms over one of the city's busiest intersections at South Main and Amador. Former Councilman Jack Eakman dubbed the building at 430 S. Main Street the "eyesore of District 4." Ironically, the hulking structure and surrounding property purchased in 2008 by El Paso developer John Hoffman from the county sits directly across the street from the offices of the handsome, new Convention and Visitors Bureau tasked with promoting tourism in Las Cruces and its resurging downtown district.

City officials and city council members have come and gone in the ensuing years, trying in a number of false starts to work with the owner and his representatives to issue building permits and see that city codes

are followed in the property's development. Hoffman ultimately became so frustrated with building code requirements that he ceased development plans and signed a long-term lease with the non-profit Las Cruces Community Partners (LCCP), headed by local developer Bob Pofahl, to handle the property. City offi-

cials have stated they never have seen a copy of the lease agreement.

A local news story printed in 2019 reported that LCCP, which had acquired a 50-year lease of the property from Hoffman, had planned as far back as 2017 to

convert the incomplete structure and surrounding property into a restaurant, office space and a retail complex. But lack of progress on the project led to the expiration of two building permits.

A Bulletin story in August 2018 reported that the city council had authorized then-City Manager Stuart Ed to begin negotiations with Hoffman to purchase the property. However, Ed was quoted as saying those efforts were thwarted because the owner and lessee had refused to allow access to the property to the city's appraiser. However, subsequent emails between Hoffman's representatives obtained through an Inspection of Publication

Records Act request indicate that arrangements were ultimately made for city reps to access the property.

More recently, emails show that Mayor Pro Tem Kasandra Gandara in late 2020 met with Pofahl, who had been in discussion with a local retailer interested in converting the shell of a building into a bicycle shop, taproom and coffee shop. What transpired from that meeting is unknown.

What I do know is that my entreaties to receive up-to-date information from Mayor Ken Miyagishima and District 4 Councilor Johana Bencomo have been deflected with obfuscation and excuses about why nothing has been done. The mayor told me in an email that the city had something in the works with the prop-

erty owner, but that Covid-19 interrupted plans for a face-to-face meeting. He has pledged the city will be "open and transparent" about handling the Hoffman property conundrum. Really? Bencomo said in an email the city's hands are tied since the "city does not have an ordinance to compel private property owners to finish or remove a business, unless it's a threat to public safety." The developer has secured his middle finger salute to Las Cruces with ugly chain link fencing to deter trespassers.

I was hopeful with the city's hiring of Ifo Pili as the new city manager that a conclusion to this long-running nightmare might finally be at hand. We shall see. Pili has tasked Assistant City Manager Eric Enriquez, who oversees the city's Fire, Community

Development and Public Works departments, with tackling the District 4 eyesore situation. That's good news. However, the bad news is: as of June 14, when I spoke with Enriquez, he showed he knows little about the situation. However, he assured me he would talk with the Community Development Department director and city's legal department to start "gathering the history" about 430 S. Main St.

"This is something I will take on," Enriquez said. "Win, lose or draw. I will tackle it. If we need to change things, we will."

When asked if the city council has taken the advice of former councilman Eakman and adopted a new ordinance to prevent similar situations from occurring in the future, Enriquez responded in the negative. Enriquez said he

will be looking at whether the solution perhaps lies within the city's existing family of codes or with property maintenance, public nuisance or vacant properties ordinances.

"I don't want to reinvent the wheel," Enriquez said. "I need to see what the plan was and what's going on. You've got blight. We need to take care of the blight. No excuses. We need to get to the bottom of this."

So, what's it costing Hoffman to poke Las Cruces in the eye? According to county tax records, the El Pasoan paid just a little more than \$3,000 in 2020 on property valued in 2016 at \$265,800.

But what is the "District 4 eyesore" costing Las Cruces citizens for aesthetically marring the look of the southern gateway to Downtown and retarding Downtown revitalization? After 13 years, it's priceless.

I certainly hope Enriquez will succeed where others have failed the public all these years due to staff turnover, bureaucratic strictures and what appears to be a sheer lack of political will to slay this elephant. The time for resolution is way past due. Please do something! Employ eminent domain. Declare the property a public nuisance and take legal action if necessary. Time's a wastin' and my eyes are mighty "sore."



County backs 'green rights'

The Doña Ana County Commission voted unanimously at its July 13 meeting to adopt a proclamation in support of Green Amendments for the Generations, a nonprofit established in 2019 to support constitutional environmental rights amendments in states and nationally.

The proclamation passed by the commission states that the Green Amendment movement "seeks to ensure that all people have access to pure water, clean air, a stable climate and a healthy environment."

"The health of our communities is dire," state Sen. Carrie Hamblen, D-Doña Ana, said at the meeting, as she spoke in

support of the commission adopting the proclamation. Hamblen is also president and CEO of the Las Cruces Green Chamber of Commerce.

In addition to supporting Green Amendments, Hamblen said the commission should have "a plan for action and resolution" to protect air, land and water quality and for the transition from extractive industries to green industries.

"The state's come a long way, especially over the last year," Commission Chair Manuel Sanchez said.

At the July 13 meeting, the commission also unanimously adopted a resolution that adds two additional voting convenience centers for the 2022 and 2023 elections in Doña Ana County.

In addition to the 40

convenience centers that now exist, the commission added locations at Loma Heights Elementary School, 1600 E. Madrid Ave., and Highland Elementary School, 4201 Emerald St.

County Bureau of Elections Supervisor Andy Perez said the additional voting locations are needed to reduce waiting time to vote at existing convenience centers.

The commission also unanimously adopted a resolution adding 19 precincts in the county, effective Jan. 1, 2022. Perez said the additional precincts, which will bring the county's total to 189, are based on the turnout at the past two local elections.

County Clerk Amanda Lopez Askin said the 2020 Census data, which her office is waiting to receive, may add a few more precincts.

Occupational therapist running to stand up for 'freedom'

As a candidate for the District 5 seat on the Las Cruces City Council, Ronnie Sisneros said he is "standing up for people's rights and individual freedom."

Sisneros was raised in Roswell, New Mexico, and has lived in Las Cruces for the past 17 years. He has been an occupational therapy assistant at Good Samaritan Society in Las Cruces for the past year. Before that, he worked for Genesis Health Care, a long-term care facility in Las Cruces, for 15 years. Sisneros was an assistant manager, dairy clerk and a union representative at grocery stores in Roswell before moving to Las Cru-

Sisneros, 58, is making

his first bid for public office.

Sisneros said a number of issues prompted him to run for

run for city council, including council efforts "to ban the sale and use" of handguns.

The council's passing a resolution in 2018 dealing with school safety was "a typical knee-jerk reaction rather than dealing with the issue," Sisneros said.

Sisneros said he wants Las Cruces children to be safe, but "they don't have the right to take our guns," he said.

The "liberal-progressive view" of education in local schools and the vote

by the Las Cruces Public Schools Board of Education earlier this year to change the name of Oñate High School to Organ Mountain High School also prompted his decision to run, Sisneros said.

"Citizens said, 'Don't change the name,' but the school board did it anyway," he said.

"Individual rights and liberties" bring the issues together, Sisneros said.

The view that anyone who is not a liberal and a progressive "must be a racist, to me, that is just literal nonsense," Sisneros said.

"I have been an activist all my life," he said, fighting for "individual rights and liberties."

Sisneros said he stood up to management when a complaint was raised because he was speaking in Spanish to a resident at a long-term care facility. Communicating with patients in a way they understand is a job responsibility, he said, and so is protecting their confidentiality.

"I'm not going to let that shows the city does care slide," Sisneros said. shows the city does care about their sacrifice."

"Right is right," he said.
"I put myself out there. I could have gotten fired."

District 5, which includes northwest Las Cruces, is currently represented by Councilor Gill Sorg.

Sorg, who is completing his third four-year term on the council, is not running for re-election.

Roads, more parks and infrastructure are important issues in District 5, Sisneros said, along with easy and safe access for traffic within the district, walkability, more trees

and development.

Sisneros said he is "100 percent behind veterans and 100 percent behind cops."

"What about paying respect to these people?" he said about veterans. "It shows the city does care about their sacrifice."

"I support law enforcement without reservation as they are the backbone of a civilized society," Sisneros said on his campaign website.

Sisneros said Las Cruces is not a well-run city.

"How about some accountability?" he said.

Councilors are "supposed to represent the people who live here, pay taxes," Sisneros said. The entire council is "as far progressive as it can be," he said. City council members are "just doing what they want to regardless of what the people say," Sisneros said.

Acknowledging that city council races are nonpar-

tisan, Sisneros said he is running as a Republican and a conservative.

If elected, Sisneros said his first priority will be to learn everything a city councilor can and cannot do.

"My hope is to work with whatever city council there is to rescind decisions that have been made in the past. I want to make Las Cruces into what it was."

Sisneros has a bachelor of science degree from Eastern New Mexico University and an associate's degree in occupational therapy from ENMU-Roswell.

He is a state-licensed occupational therapist.

David Tofsted is treasurer of Sisneros' campaign.



State agencies tout water conservation in Lower Rio Grande

This summer, the New Mexico Interstate Stream Commission (NMISC), in conjunction with the Office of the State Engineer's (OSE) Las Cruces District IV Regional Office, will hold a series of online public outreach meetings to inform Lower Rio Grande area farmers about how to apply for grants that will compensate them for opting to let their land lie fallow instead of pumping groundwater to irrigate crops, OFE and NMISC said in a news release.

The online meetings will be held 10:30 to 11:30 a.m. Thursday, July 29; 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 3; and 1 to 2 p.m.

The meetings are part of a groundwater conservation pilot program "to help our state and water right owners to better understand the physical impacts of reduced groundwater pumping," said State Engineer John R. D'Antonio. "This pro-

gram is essential for the future management of the aquifers in the Lower Rio Grande at sustainable levels."

The public outreach is part of NMISC's implementation of the state's 50-Year Water Plan, the commission said.

"Low reservoir levels and lingering drought are just two of the many water challenges OSE and

NMISC are faced with across our state," the agencies said in a news release. "However, none is more profound than the pending litigation with Texas over water availability in the Lower Rio Grande. While this litigation works its way through the courts, there is no question that New Mexicans need to work together to maintain the productive aquifers in the Mesilla and Rincon valleys.

"Given the decline of these regional aquifers – since the signing of the 2008 operating agreement between the Texas irrigation district, the federal government and the Elephant Butte Irrigation District Board – it is imperative that New Mexico continues to work with local entities to establish groundwater conservation practices that will help sustain aquifer levels for the purpose of a water source and a drought reserve in future years," D'Antonio said.

Elephant Butte Irrigation District (EBID), based in Las Cruces, "is already decades into implementing most of the measures discussed in the plan," EBID Treasurer-Manager Gary Esslinger said in a statement.

"The district and its agricultural producer members began planning and implementing water stewardship measures over 100 years ago and continue to this day," Esslinger said. "Their planning and other actions have continuously

proven to be successful water management techniques.

"When New Mexico's 50-Year Water Plan was first enacted in 1987, EBID was one of the first to submit and receive acceptance of their regional plan," Esslinger said. "The district began studying and implementing sustainable improvement and conservation programs long ago and continues to develop new approaches and methods.

"More than 30 years later, EBID is still working, not just to plan, but to implement projects in fulfillment of both legal obligations and the driving need to conserve and protect water resources during frequent regional droughts."

New Shepard rocket ship carries four into space from Texas

In 11 minutes, the world changed again as Jeff Bezos, his brother Mark Bezos, female aviation pioneer Wally Funk and 18-year-old Oliver Daemen blasted off into space, 62 miles above the Earth, on Tuesday, July 20. The flight took off just across the border from southern

New Mexico near Van Horn, Texas.

Two New Mexicans were along for the ride. Jeff Bezos was born in Albuquerque and Funk is from San Miguel County. Funk, at 82, now holds the record as the oldest person to go to space, something she set her mind on when she was 17.

The vertical launching New Shepard space vehicle is designed to carry people and payloads on brief trips to suborbital space. The 59-foot-tall (18 meters) craft is named after NASA astronaut Alan Shepard, whose suborbital jaunt on May 5, 1961, was the United States' first crewed spaceflight. Shepard's daughters were on-site to witness the flight.

During a press confer-

ence following the flight, Bezos thanked every Amazon customer and employee "because you guys paid for all this."

He said his expectations for the flight were high, but they were "dramatically exceeded."

"It felt so normal," he said. "It was serene and peaceful and floating was a pleasurable experience. It is a most profound

peace."

"It was way more fun than it looked," Daemen said after watching a recap video.

But Bezos also talked about seeing the Earth from space.

"As we move about the planet, we are damaging it," he said. "It is amazing to see how fragile it really is"

Mark Bezos said on the flight with the team, on loan from the Explorer's Club, was a piece of canvas from the Wright Flyer, the plane that the Wright brothers flew; and a bronze medallion made from the first hot air balloon in 1783, the first time man ever left the Earth in controlled flight.

They also had with them the goggles Amelia Earhart wore on her flight across the Atlantic.

"I like to think if Amelia were here, she would be very proud of what we are doing," Jeff Bezos said.

City installs first 'pop-up' bike lanes

BULLETIN REPORT

The City of Las Cruces is inviting bicycle riders to take a ride in the city's first pop-up bike lanes.

"Pop-up bike projects are temporary bicyclelane improvements on city streets that provide a fun way to get active and make the road safer for cyclists," the city said in a news release. Pop-up bike lanes promote cycling, demonstrate road design meant for both automobiles and bicycles and help inform future bicycle infrastructure improvements, the city said.

The current project is a part of the city's ongoing efforts to improve active transportation or "human-powered transportation like walking or biking" in Las Cruces to create a "healthier, safer and overall more livable community for everyone."

The first pop-up is on Idaho Avenue/south Walnut Street and Nevada Avenue from the intersections of Lees Drive/Idaho to Nevada/Triviz Drive (near Young Park). The pop-up was created with temporary barriers, signs and lane markings.







Ultimately, it was and is always love that holds and carries me all the way to the big stage. I have the support of my ancestors, my family, friends and mentors all over the world to thank.

"And I also want to express gratitude for my birthplace and my home, Las Cruces, New Mexico, for instilling a groundedness within me that I wouldn't be me without," she said. "Now that I've

seen more of the world, and am living in Los Angeles, I can honestly say it is a gift to be from there. Even when I'm away, I'm inspired by our most beautiful sunsets, the vastness, the warmth and the perseverance of the desert. The space. The quietude. A land without distraction."

Tawanda also called Las Cruces "a land with just a little bit of jazz! I was raised in a multicultural household and had been singing mostly classical music, showtunes, pop music and my own originals before I was exposed to the world of jazz in college. This music is the language of improvisation and emotion, born directly out of the Black experience. It filled in so

many blanks for me.

"I have a jazz album on the way," she said. "It should be here next year. It will be my kind of foray into this genre, so I'm excited to finish it and share it with my community. I look very much forward to my future in multi-genre fusion, as influenced by my meltingpot of a background.

"There are many big things in the works," Tawanda said. "I just signed with a management company, and as the world opens up again in this new way, and the album comes closer to finishing, I look forward to the opportunity to stop by home in Las Cruces to sing for my homeland and show her how much I've grown!"



"I am fortunate to have had two very different books accepted for publication this past year," Young said. "'Transported' (Finishing Line Press) is a chapbook about my childhood travels when my father got a Fulbright grant to teach in Egypt and the way that experience shaped me. 'Lost in the Greenwood' (Atmosphere Press) is a collection of poems centered around

the Unicorn tapestries of 500 years ago, their art, their mysteries, their world and their fascination."

"Greenwood" was a finalist in the poetry divi-

sion of the National Indie Excellence Awards.

Frank Thayer is a Las Cruces author and professor emeritus at New Mexico State University. A New Mexico native, he also taught in Canada for 11 years before returning for a 30-year career at NMSU. Thayer wrote three journalism textbooks during those years. Thayer was an author

of the 2015 books "The Aztec UFO Incident" and "Magic in the Desert," the latter being the story of



the undefeated 1960 Aggie football season. Thayer's fiction focus began in 2016 with "Cobston Trilogy: The Ontario Horror," followed by "Terror Tales of the Southwest," then "The Whispering Darkness," and followed by "The Vampire of San Vicente" in fall 2020 during Covid.

In June 2021, Thayer published a horror novella, "A Taste of Salt."

Thayer said he is heavily influenced by classic authors such as Edgar Allan Poe, H.P. Lovecraft and Arthur Machen. He feels comfortable with one foot in the world of the supernatural, Thayer said.

For something completely different, Thayer is now completing a novel about dysfunctional college administration in the 1960s titled "The Quantum Jump Machine."

While Thayer is dedicated to classic supernatural horror tales, "this book in preparation reminds readers that some things are just ... funny," he said.

"I wrote my first story at age 6, my first (fairly decent) poem at 12," Thayer said. "I can't tell anyone else how to do it or how not to. If it is important to you, you'll find your way."



"I think he loved this

project so much and had so much fun doing it," Bullock said.

Bullock said Medoff took the book "Walking with Herb," and made some

"brilliant" changes to the story.

"Mark takes it from a deeper, darker place," Bullock said. "It's about the spiritual journey that Joe Amable-Amo has. And Mark had a brilliant idea that we should make the two lead characters Hispanic. We have two of the best Hispanic actors in the world."

The PG-rated film shot in Las Cruces and Artesia, New Mexico, is about Amable-Amo (Olmos) a bank executive and former amateur golfer struggling with his faith after an unexpected tragedy. Faced with doubts about himself, his purpose and his belief in God. Joe is stunned when God tells him that he's been chosen to inspire the world and play in a

world championship golf tournament.

Guided by God's eccentric personal messenger, Herb (Lopez), Joe learns that the seemingly impossible is possible.

"To a person, every actor I talked to said this was the most fun they had making a movie." Bullock said.

"Kathleen Quinlan walked by and hit me and said, 'Joe, thanks for writing that book. I'm having so much fun," Bullock added.

Remembering Vietnam service in video, museum interview

An exhibit called "Through a Different Lens: One Woman's Experience," about longtime Las Cruces resident Frances F. Williams' civilian service during the Vietnam War, was supposed to open to the public at Branigan Cultural Center in March 2020, but then state public health orders closed museums across the state.

No one got to see the exhibit because of Covid-19, so Williams put together a five and a half minute video at https://vimeo. com/514404777 about the exhibit, which includes many photographs that Williams and others took while she was in Southeast Asia.

"I was called by the Pentagon (in early 1968) to see if I would be willing

to go to Vietnam (as a volunteer) because there was a great deal of difficulty getting supplies out to the field to the soldiers," said, Williams, 92, who worked for the U.S. Army at White Sands Missile Range (WSMR) for 37 years and has lived in Las Cruces for 67 years.

"The computer system used was on a contract and the company was not exactly aware of the Army supply system," Williams said. "I agreed and was

sent to the 14th Inventory Control Center in Long Binh, Vietnam, but was housed in Saigon.

"Three weeks after I got there, the Tet offensive (Jan. 31-Sept. 23, 1968) began and all hell broke loose. I was being shot at from the Catholic church in Saigon by snipers while waiting for my bus to take me 26 kilometers away to my workplace.

"After I was able to report to work, I found out that there was the 24th Evacuation Hospital, taking in the wounded from the field, stabilizing them, then sending them to Japan. Since I was only working 12 hours a day and a workaholic, I went over to the hospital to volunteer with whatever I could do. I was a gofer, a letter writer and had many experiences with the soldiers, nurses and doctor I worked with.

"No one knows how bad combat is until you see it up close and personal as

I did.

New Mexico artist, Michael Naranjo, who I wrote a letter for to his family, and then wrote a personal letter to them as well. Michael, a Tewa Indian, is from the Taos Pueblo, and has become an internationally famous bronze artist and also is sculpting in marble. His famous Eagle Man statue is in the courtyard between the Branigan Cultural Center and the museum. The letter his family wrote back to me is one of the displays at the exhibit. To see those voung men in the flower of their lives, wounded, hurt, physically and mentally, was an experience that I will never forget. Every now and then those pictures come into my head, triggered by some incident, and I feel the tears welling up.

"We may not have belonged in Vietnam, as many critics say, but, by

God, when our troops are deployed anywhere, they deserve our support and commitment. Going on this mission was one of the best things I have ever done, and in the exhibit, I focused on the people and children of Vietnam who also suffered. U.S. soldiers were so kind to the kids and that is another story that has not been told. God Bless our troops wherever they serve and God Bless America."

"This tells a story that I don't think has ever been told about Vietnam." Williams said.

During her career at WSMR, Williams served as director of civilian and military equal employment opportunity

programs and also oversaw budgets and human resources for the instrumentation directorate. She also has experience as a professional mediator as well as an instructor in employment law. Williams helped start Temple Beth El and has volunteered for, among other things, the city and state housing authorities, the New Mexico Commission on the Status of Women, the Vietnam War Memorial Committee and with WSMR museum and historical foundation. Williams ran for mayor of Las Cruces in 2003. She was a charter member of the New Mexico Ethics Commission, serving a two-year term that ended June 30.

Dealing with a kitten overload

FROM THE CAT'S MEOW ADOPTION CENTER

We have 34 kittens at our facility, on top of the adult cats we have had for some time, and at least 60 kittens waiting to come in. And the calls just keep on coming.

The City of Las Cruces encourages responsible animal ownership through: owner identification and licensure; population management primarily through sterilization; humane care; vaccination against rabies; and physical control of pets.

There is also an "abandonment" ordinance making it unlawful to abandon a pet, but when a pet's owners have not gone through licensing steps, including microchipping, it is impossible to identify and locate them.

The most serious deficiency in the above guidelines for responsible pet ownership in Doña Ana County is population management. Simply stated, Las Cruces and the surrounding area has

a serious cat overpopulation problem. There are too many cats to care for, and the most effective solution to this problem, sterilization, is not being implemented on a scale sufficient to resolve the problem.

At Cat's Meow, many calls we receive are from people who have found a momma cat with kittens in their yard or garage or underneath their porch.

A public service announcement put out by Animal Service Center of the Mesilla Valley has instructed people to leave the litter alone and call one of the rescues for help. The rescues are overflowing!

A large part of the problem is that people are not getting their pets spayed or neutered, either because they don't think it's necessary because they intend to keep their pets inside (escapes happen, and sometimes are abandoned when owners change location) or because they cannot afford to have it done (veterinary care can be very expensive).

There are programs such as SNAP (Spay Neuter Action Program) for low-income residents. The demand is so high, their budget becomes stretched, as they do rely on grants and donations.

So, really, when it comes down to it, ordinances are only as good as the budget to enforce them. And there are so many cats!

We, at Cat's Meow, make sure that every cat adopted from our facility is spayed/neutered, vaccinated and microchipped. We have been holding clinics to make that happen (largely at our expense), not only for our adopted kittens but when there are some slots available we offer to sterilize other cats as well.

Feral cats

Stray cats are not feral cats, ferals are not strays. A feral cat is one that was born outside and has never had interaction with a human.

Kittens born of a feral momma are not necessarily destined to become feral unless they don't get human interaction. Feral cats have lots of kittens and we have taken in as many as we can.

There is a program that helps to reduce the feral cat population, and it works! It's called TNR --Trap, Neuter and Release.

Not a lot of people are aware of how bad cat overpopulation is here. It is going to get worse (is getting worse) if something isn't done about it. There is a group doing TNR here ("Broken Promises": https://bestfriends.org/our-work/supporting-network-partners/broken-promises-sw), but they cannot handle the load by themselves.

If our cat population is greatly reduced through sterilization, fewer will have to be euthanized and our shelter can start moving toward being a "no-kill" shelter.

ACTion Programs for Animals (APA) of Las Cruces will resume its monthly low-cost microchip and vaccination clinics starting Saturday, Aug. 14. The clinic will be held 8 to 10 a.m. at the APA adoption center, 537 N. Solano Drive.

The following services will be offered at \$15 each during the clinic: microchip; Bordetella vaccine; DAPP (Distemper, Adenovirus, Parainfluenza and Parvo) vaccine; FVRCP (Feline Viral Rhinotracheitis, Calicivirus and Panleukope) vaccine; and rabies vaccine.

"We're extremely happy to begin offering affordable clinics to the community again," said APA Executive Director Michel Meunier.

"Animal welfare is a priority for us at APA, and getting your pets vaccinated and chipped is very important when it comes to their health and safety," Meunier added.

APA is a progressive animal welfare organization seeking to improve the quality of life for companion animals in Doña Ana County and greatly reduce the number of unwanted animals impounded and euthanized at the municipal shelter.

Since May 2012, more than 5,000 animals have been rescued.

Chamber CEO looks back on pandemic that 'broke our hearts'

Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce President and CEO Debbi Moore participated in 671 Zoom meetings during the year following state public health orders closed businesses because of Covid.

She still remembers the very first one.

It was a woman who owned her own small business, closed by the health order, crying because she wasn't sure how she would pay the rent or feed her baby.

"We had to get people in line to get money out there," Moore said, "to get resources out there for business."

Moore had dealt with

the recession that started in 2008 when she was with the Rio Rancho Chamber of Commerce. But Covid was different because "people were dying," Moore said.

ARMIJO

"We had to step back and look at the whole picture," she said. "You had to pivot."

Businesses needed guidance on a host of fronts, Moore said.

The Greater Las Cruces Chamber and other chambers in the county "were in the trenches," she said.

"You have to figure out a way to navigate it. You had to make decisions auick."

Moore

said she and

the greater chamber's other two employees, Brandi Misquez and Cindi Armijo, also had to help business owners and employees cope with isolation and grief.

"We had to calm fear," Moore said. "We had to put hope back in the scenario."

Moore, Misquez and Armijo answered 12,636 phone calls (an average of 1,053 per month) during the March 2020 to March 2021 period and spent more than 10,500 minutes (175 hours) per month

answering those calls. That doesn't include the amount of time they spent on research follow-up to the calls.

> "It caused us to be very sensitive to people's needs at a whole new level." Moore said.

> "Covid broke our hearts," she said. It also "brought out a new part of our hearts. That's what I want to hang onto moving forward."

Covid also helped the greater chamber create and strengthen partnerships with other chambers, organizations like The Bridge of Southern New Mexico, Las Cruces Public Schools and state and local governments and others, Moore said.

In particular, the Las Cruces Hispanic Chamber of Commerce and the Las

Cruces Green Chamber of Commerce "were right there with us," she said. "We're all working together. We all want a better community."

With schools closing, it meant helping people cope with daycare challenges. For essential businesses, it meant helping find ways to keep employees safe. For restaurants, it meant finding ways to help them stay open and keep their employees and customers safe as they provided pickup and takeout service.

"Businesses were resilient. We're a very resilient community," Moore said. "We survived Covid together and we can navigate to the normal together."

Going forward, Moore said many businesses will conduct more of their

sales online. That will have to balance with how "they draw the customer back into the business," she said, and with more employees working from home.

"I think it's going to be different," Moore said.

For the greater chamber and other organizations, there will be an increased focus on job training and retraining, she said, and connecting current and future employees with new career paths. It will also mean nurturing entrepreneurs as they create new businesses, and helping existing businesses find the employees they need to fully reopen and to expand.

"We're the keeper of the jobs," Moore said.

Fed action enables quick recovery from pandemic downturn

The rapid economic recovery from the Covid

recession is remarkable. Just a year ago, many feared that economic recovery from the pandemic might take a five years or more. In June last year, Fed Chair Jay Powell was predicting

that full recovery would take 30 months. In fact, real GDP most likely will fully recover this quarter, 15 months sooner than Powell's projection.

This is amazing given the strains faced by the economy over the last year and is a testament to the resilience of the capitalist system. But there is more to the story. Had we just relied on capitalism and free markets, the result would

have been much different than what we are observ-

> ing. Heroic intervention by the Fed to ensure adequate liquidity has been critical.

The liquidity provided by the Fed has been of the firehose variety. Through the purchase of multiple classes of assets -

short term and long-term federal debt, municipal bonds, private mortgages, corporate bonds — unprecedented level of cash have been injected into the economy.

Add to this, lending facilities that offer loans directly to private business and you see a full spectrum of intervention into the economy. As a measure of the vastness of the Fed intervention, consider this

fact: Total Fed provided liquidity has doubled since the beginning of the pan-

This massive intervention has associated with it two major concerns. First is the fear of a taper tantrum.

Financial markets have come to depend on the Fed to maintain liquidity in markets, so as the Fed tapers off purchases, markets could react badly. It happened before and in circumstance far less extreme. In 2013, coming out of the Great Recession, the Fed announced the slow reduction in asset purchases; federal government bond yields spiked. That time, markets eventually recov-

ered, but the fear is that this time, with markets even more heavily dependent on Fed purchase, the consequences of a tapering could more dramatic.

The second concern is, of course, inflation. Many economists expect inflation to be around 3 ½ percent during 2021. This is more than in recent years, but put in historical context, is not that high. Long term inflation is expected to hover at about 2 percent annually.

Given the extreme dislocation suffered by our economy since Covid, it would be surprising if the economy didn't suffer from transitory shortages and consequent price spikes.

Indeed, if you look in detail at price data for April, it turns out that 10 percent of the price hike can be attributed to a single product category, which is automobiles.

The auto industry famously has been victim of a shortage of computer chips arising from decisions early in the crisis to cut back on orders.

But such problems are clearly transitory and with time, auto prices will settle down. Similar stories can be told in other industries, from construction to disposable diapers. These too shall pass.

Still, the chance that the extraordinarily expansive monetary policy now in effect will result in sustained high inflation can't be ruled out.

But if higher inflation is the price to pay for the rapid recovery, then so be it. Putting people back to work is an important goal and if 4 or 5 percent inflation is the cost, it's worth

State University Athletics Director Mario Moccia has announced that all Aggie athletics venues will return to 100 percent attendance capacity for the upcoming 2021-22 season.

That's welcome news for sports fans.

That major announcement came shortly after Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham ended the county-by-county color-coded system and lifted all Covid-19 health restrictions on business and day-to-day activities starting on July 1.

What that means is Aggie fans will be able to go out and see their favorite team at home and have

a little fun this school year, Moccia said.

"We are very excited," Moccia said. "This is a shot in the arm for Aggie fans. I think this will help spur football season ticket sales and well as other ticket sales."

Moccia talked to the Las Cruces Bulletin while hosting an invitation-only celebration and unveiling of Cantera Negra being named the official tequila of NSMU athletics on July 8 at Elephant Ranch.

The event was wellattended by enthusiastic fans ready to get back to normal.

"As you can see, people are really anxious to be around other people, be around Aggie events and hang out with everyone," Moccia said.

The Aggies will kick off their football season with a home game on Aug. 28 against archrival UTEP. Other home football games will be against South Carolina State (Sept. 18), Hawaii (Sept. 25) Utah State (Nov. 6) and UMass (Nov. 27).

Last week, NMSU also announced season tickets for men's basketball are now on sale. It will mark the return of men's basketball to the Pan American Center after an absence of nearly two years.

Basketball fans who renew their season tickets or become new season ticket holders before Aug. 15 will receive a souvenir lunchbox that features the jerseys of all former Aggies who have gone on to play in the NBA. The front of the lunchbox features former Aggie great and 2019 NBA champion Pascal Siakam, who is with the Toronto Raptors.

It's sure to become a collector's item.

Moccia is certainly optimistic about the upcoming year and the return of home athletic events.

"If we do our part from a competitive standpoint, we could be on the cusp of an all-time recordsetting year from a ticketing standpoint," he said. "People are ready to go to games. They are ready to go out and ready to support (the Aggies). I think it

Running club to host youth runs


The Las Cruces Running Club has reactivated its summer youth running program with an abbreviated schedule.

Metal spikes, arm-lock putts and green books all should be banned

When you watch PGA Tour golf on television you might hear the distinct sound of clicking on concrete paths

tinct sound of clickin on concrete paths as golfers walk between holes or near the clubhouse. When I hear that I'm truly irritated. That sound is from metal spikes on their golf shoes. You and I can't find a private golf club, resort

course, daily fee public course or muni that permits metal spikes. Why? The metal spikes damage greens, wood bridges and walkways and clubhouse carpets and floors.

Yet, the PGA Tour al-

Yet, the PGA Tour allows metal spikes as legal for their purposes. Talk about bifurcation! Some 15 to 20 percent of Tour players use metal spikes. Among the many still using metal are Tiger

Woods, Phil Mickelson, Bryson DeChambeau, Justin Thomas and most recently John Deer Clas-

sic winner Lucas
Glover. They
fear slipping, no
longer worrying
about tearing
up the greens
because golfers
behind them are
allowed to tap
down all spike

marks. Even if

it's just a concession to everyday hacks like us, the Tour needs to outlaw metal spikes. It's the right thing to do.

One would think that the best players in the world wouldn't struggle so much with their putting. Yet they do. Over the years a number of famous pros have been challenged to overcome the putting "yips." Then, about 30 years ago a few

players began using the "long wand" or "broom" putter close to 50 inches long. From there, tour pros and coaches began experimenting with alternative methods, which eventually evolved into the chest-anchoring and the belly-anchoring techniques. It turns out the USGA determined that the anchoring putting techniques were contrary to the rules about body contact and swing of the golf club, and they banned anchoring five years ago. Still, the USGA rules aren't foolproof. And yippers and other nervous golfers were not content with normal putters or normal putting technique.

Viola! Now we have the "arm-lock" putting method, whereby the golfer braces an overlength putter grip along his lead forearm up to the elbow. PGA Tour players currently using the arm-lock method include: Bryson DeChambeau, Xander Schauffle, Keegan Bradley, Kevin Kisner, Matt Kuchar, Stuart Cink and Will Zalatoris. (Neither Jack nor Tiger were ever insecure enough in their putting to be tempted or lured into trying any bizarre stuff.)

Tour veteran Billy Horschel was the first to voice that arm-lock should be banned. Now. there is growing sentiment among more Tour players and others that the arm-lock method needs to be banned. Xander Schauffele is one of them. "I am for banning the arm-lock putters, but if everyone else is going to use it and I feel like they have a bigger advantage, I may as well do the same," he says.

Here's a take from one of the Tour's all-time best putters (and Rory McIlvoy's putting coach), Brad Faxon: "We have to get rid of arm-lock. It's absolutely anchoring. If the USGA doesn't think it is, then they need to look at themselves in the mirror." Which certainly puts the USGA and the PGA Tour in a bind: in the words of author and satirist Douglas Adams, "A common mistake that people make when trying to design something completely foolproof (like putting rules) is to underestimate the ingenuity of complete fools."

Finally, let's turn to the controversial greenreading books. These books show in high detail directions of breaks on putts and the percentage of slope on every part of a green, and have been on

Tour since 2008. Leading the way to ban the greens books is none other than Rory McIlroy, who is the president of the PGA Tour Players Advisory Council (PAC). "It's not that it's an advantage really; it's just taking away a skill that takes time and practice to be mastered," said McIlroy. "I think reading greens is a real skill that some people are better at than others, and it just nullifies that advantage that people have. Honestly, I think it's made everyone lazier." Augusta National, host of the Masters, is the only stop on Tour that currently doesn't allow them.

will be a wonderful year."
This past year, the Aggies did have some success stories, despite dealing with arguably the most restrictive Covid-19 guidelines in the country, which

"It is a comfort thing. There were student-athletes scrambling to find out who was going to watch their pets when they had to go out of state to play games. There are so many factors that make it easier to play at home.

"You stay in your own

HIGHLANDS UNIVERSITY bed," he added "There is familiarity. You are in your own gym, your own pool, your own baseball field. So, I think it will be a tremendous boost to our athletes."

The bottom line: Aggie fans want to come out to games and "have a party

and celebrate," Moccia said.
