

# DONA ANA COUNTY DISTRIBUTES OVER \$2 MILLION IN RENT AND UTILITIES ASSISTANCE SINCE JANUARY 2021

The U.S. Department of the Treasury awarded Doña Ana County \$9.3 million to assist residents who have been impacted by COVID-19 with their past due rent and utilities payments. Doña Ana County has already distributed \$2.08 million in assistance and still has resources available.

"While our efforts have resulted in us serving more than 440 applicants, with 89% of the distribution going to Las Cruces residents, we are prepared to assist many more," offered County Manager Fernando Macias. The Emergency Rental Assistance (ERA) program funds, also known as ERA1 for the current round of funding, are meant to assist all county residents. All area residents who are currently renting the place they live, are eligible to apply for grants to cover their rent and utility payments. "We do not want anyone who needs help to miss the opportunity to get caught up on their past due rent or utility bills if the pandemic has caused any interruption of their job or income," added County Commissioner Chair Manuel Sanchez.

The county's outreach efforts are being well-received, with residents who are proud to share their experience, like one of our applicants who had contacted community organizations seeking help. She had fallen behind on her rent and utilities during COVID-19 and while experiencing a family medical emergency. She was referred to the ERA program by Immaculate Church. Not only did she receive help, but her son who was temporarily living in a hotel, was also assisted. The program paid his down-payment for an apartment and months of rent to allow him to get stable as he started a new job.

"We continue to be inspired by the journeys of our applicants," adds Ms. Emma Johnson-Ortiz, an outreach coordinator for the county's ERA program. Johnson-Ortiz is a retired public servant who learned of the county's grant award and sought to join the team because she saw the great need in the community. "The landlords and the utilities companies have been phenomenal to work with during this process. They respect the work that we are doing and understand that we are working diligently to help their tenants and customers, which will benefit them by paying the outstanding amounts that that due." One such landlord is Lori Conn with Coyle Realty who found out about the rental and utilities assistance program from one of their tenants. "Once we were successful going through the process with that one tenant, we started to recommend it to other tenants. This program has helped us assist our tenants who want to be able to pay their bills, but the circumstances around the pandemic have caused them to fall behind. It has been great working with everyone," says Conn.

The word is spreading, and many Doña Ana County residents are learning about the rental and assistance program through difference channels. Alex Lopez heard about the ERA program through his social worker. He is 81 years old and his job as a kiosk salesperson for the El Paso Times was phased out at the onset of the pandemic. Lopez, who is the caregiver for his son, has always needed to work to supplement his social security benefits which does not fully meet his obligations. "For months, my electricity and water were shut-off. I would walk to a local truck stop here in Sunland Park to clean up. The county paid almost \$8,000 to catch me up on my rent and utilities. I just did not have it. It is not easy to find work at 81 years old. Even though I am willing to work, many companies see me as a liability. Without this program, I am not sure what I would have done," offered Lopez.

Doña Ana County will continue its outreach efforts to help as many residents as possible with the available funds. To learn about the qualifications and to start the application, county residents can visit www.donaanacounty.org/ERAP. The online application is available in English and Spanish. For those who need assistance, some county community centers have staff on-hand to assist with applications. For those areas without community centers, every attempt will be made to meet the resident in a public location near their home to assist with the completion of the application. To schedule an appointment, residents may contact (575)-525-5898.

# Steinborn: 'Stomps foot' to keep momentum going with 500-mile-long Rio Grande Trail


State Sen. Jeff Steinborn, D-Doña Ana, said he "stomped my foot on the gas pedal" to keep momentum going on the development of the Rio Grande Trail.

The trail will be about 500 miles long when it is complete, stretching the entire length of New Mexico, from the Texas border to the Colorado border.

The trail already has designed sections in Doña Ana County and is building momentum in the state's other counties that include parts of the trail, Steinborn said.

Then a state representative (he was elected to the state Senate in 2016), Steinborn introduced House Bill 563 and shepherded it through the New Mexico Legislature and into law in 2015. The law created a commission within the state Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department to guide the trail's development, defining it as "a recreation trail for New Mexico residents and visitors to enjoy the natural beauty of New Mexico and the Rio Grande and learn about the culture and history of New Mexico."

The trail "offers a host of outdoor recreational opportunities for exercise, adventure and enjoyment," according to RioGrandeTrailNM.com, which said users will be local walkers and runners: local and visiting bi-

cyclists, mountain bikers, hikers and equestrians; and through hikers and touring cyclists, who are traveling the entire trail.

Signs and other infrastructure will make the trail more attractive to all users, Steinborn said, and through hikers and bikers will spend money on local lodging, food, gasoline and equipment.

Covid-19 slowed down the trail's development, Steinborn said, which was already a slow process because the trail crosses so many different jurisdictions - towns and cities, counties, private landowners and even the

**International Boundary** and Water Commission — that are dealing with "different challenges and opportunities," he said.

"So much work has

been done in (Doña Ana) County" on the trail, Steinborn said. In October 2016, the 4.5-mile La Llorona Trail between Las Cruces and Mesilla became the first segment of the statewide trail to be designated. Other segments of the trail have also been designated in the county.

Steinborn and other government officials and representatives of local user groups met in June to continue planning the trail in the entire county, including "quality campaign infrastructure to accommodate hikers and other users," Steinborn

has almost \$300,000 "to invest in needed infrastructure along the Rio Grande Trail to help this vision become a reality," ORD Director Axie Navas said. The money must be spent before June 30, 2022.

Both locally and statewide, "there's great new momentum ... to make good progress toward developing the planned statewide trail," Steinborn said.

The Rio Grande Trail Commission continues to develop the master plan for the entire trail. Local leaders are being encouraged to tap into state and federal money available for trail development, Navas said.

It's "a very unique trail," Steinborn said, and a "crown jewel for New Mexico."

The Rio Grande Trail will cross four national wildlife refuges, six national monuments, one national heritage area, six state parks, nine of the state's 33 counties, 22 towns and cities and multiple life zones, including the Chihuahuan Desert, national forests, deep canyons, pueblos and mesas.

The nearly 80 miles of trail that will exist in Doña Ana County, stretching from Sunland Park to Hatch and Garfield, will include: the historic Rio Grande and breathtaking views of the Organ Mountains; Mesilla Valley Bosque, Leasburg Dam State Park; and Organ Mountain Desert Peaks National Monument.

The Rio Grande was likely first charted by a Spanish expedition in the New World in 1519. It appeared on a map of New Spain for the first time in 1536. The river is called Rio Bravo del Norte in Mexico. Before that, the Pueblo Indians and Nava-

jos had different names for it, translating into "Big River" or "Great Waters."

# City OKs \$2M to continue Amador Hotel renovation

"I have stood on the corner of Amador and Water streets in Las Cruces since the 1870s, serving as a rest stop for weary drovers and travelers," former Las Cruces City Councilor Dolores Archuleta said, portraying the character of Señora Hotel Amador.

"Famous people (including President Theodore Roosevelt and Mexican President Benito Juarez) came and went and I was so proud to show them my hospitality," Señora Amador continued. The hotel's builder, Martín Amador (1836-1903) and his wife, Refugio Amador de Ruiz (1848-1907), left the hotel to their youngest daughter, Corina.

"With love and care from Corina and her husband, Frank Campbell, I became the finest hotel in the region," Senora Amador said. "I was filled with beautiful furniture and exotic collections from all over the world. Soon,

I hope to see the historic preservation take place so I will be restored and will once again be a jewel in the crown of Las Cruces."

Shortly after that presentation, the city council, acting as the Las Cruces Tax Increment Development (TIDD) board, unanimously approved \$2 million to continue restoration of the Amador, which Archuleta called a "beloved and iconic landmark" of Las Cruces. The resolution approved by the TIDD board provides \$1.5 million to the Amador project in fiscal year 2022 and \$500,000 in FY23 for a total of \$2 million, said Amador Foundation Vice President Deb Dennis, Ph.D.

Martin Amador Campbell, the great-grandson of Martin Amador, also spoke at the meeting. He was born in the hotel in 1941, in the same room in which his father, Martin and grandmother, Corina, were born, he said.

"My family have a deeprooted memory of the Amador Hotel," Campbell said. "When I was growing up, it was the social center of Las Cruces."

"We are very relieved and grateful to the TIDD board/city council for their unanimous and strong support for the Amador Hotel," Amador Hotel Foundation Board President Heather Pollard said. "The future of the Amador is now secure for the next two years and we believe this restoration is going to be a reality."

The city purchased the hotel in 2007 and the nonprofit foundation was formed to save and restore the hotel.

The Amador's restoration "will be an important part of the economic development of Downtown," said Amador Project donor Frances Williams, 92, whom Pollard called "a local icon and a good soldier."

"It's a must to continue to revitalize our beautiful downtown," Mayor Pro Tempore and TIDD board member Kassandra Gandara said.

"Without Mr. Amador, we wouldn't have Las Cruces," said city councilor and board member Yvonne Flores.

Archuleta also read a letter from former state Rep. J. Paul Taylor of Mesilla, who turns 101 in August. Taylor helped save the hotel from being destroyed during the urban renewal of the 1960s, when most of the old buildings in Downtown Las Cruces were demolished.

"Any event in town was at the Amador Hotel," Taylor said in his letter.

"It's an extremely important part of our history," said city councilor and TIDD board member Gill Sorg.

The new TIDD funding "will allow us to do many things and jump-start the next phases while meanwhile we can be writing these grants for that additional money," said Amador Foundation board member Sonya Cooper, Ph.D.

It will keep the "best adobe masons and the best lime plasterers in the region" working on the project, she said, and will "keep excitement up" as people see the progress of the building.

More than \$1 million in grants, private funds, in-kind donations and legislative appropriations have been spent on hotel renovations to date, and about 4,000 volunteer hours contributed to the hotel's restoration, said Chris Faivre of the city Economic Development Department. About \$9 million total is likely to be spent to restore the hotel to public use, the city said.

The TIDD was created by the city in 2009 "to generate revenue within the Downtown area" and use the money for public improvement projects Downtown, according to city documents.

It is funded through existing gross receipts tax revenues, with additional funding from the New Mexico Legislature. Before the July 26 meeting, the TIDD had a total balance of more than \$5.3 million.

# Chile just one taste of our agricultural menu

"It's the most wonderful time of the year!"

If that phrase gets you singing a jingle and thinking of red and green, I've done my job today.

Except, I'm not talking about Christmas. I'm talking about New Mexico red and green.

Yes, chile.

Some of the early harvest is already out, and soon every street corner in southern New Mexico will have that intoxicating aroma of green chiles roasting on an open fire.

Many regions have specialty foods and beverages unique to their area or ethnic heritage. Philadelphia has its cheesesteaks. Mississippi has its "tamales," ones much different from ours. New England has its clam chowder. Kansas City has its barbecue. Alaska has its king crab. Hawaii has its ono fish (and Spam). Kentucky has its bourbon. The Rocky Mountains

have, well, their oysters.

Perhaps nowhere else, though, are people as passion-

ate about their products as New Mexicans are about their chile.

Last week, I got a sideby-side comparison of roasted Anaheim chiles and New Mexico chiles. I should correct myself; it was no comparison. The New Mexico chiles burst with complex flavors and heat, while the

Anaheim was about as bland as a green bell pepper.

Many of you know Coloradoans who dare to call their native lifeless green growths "chiles." They even act proud of them. Perhaps the cold weather up there has dulled their tastebuds.

Our green chile is the best, we know.

However, it is just one element of the vital New Mexico industry of agriculture.

The Land of Enchantment creates \$3 billion annually in

agriculture revenues, and 12 percent comes from Doña Ana County alone. Because of its agricultural diversity, our county ranks first in the state for crop value. Just drive around a bit and you'll see that diversity: dairies down south, green chile in Hatch, corn, alfalfa, pecans all around. There are so many onions here you'll see them on the highway, as they have a tendency to roll off the back of trucks.

There are 2,100 farms in Doña Ana County, covering 660,000

In America, with food readily available, it's frighteningly easy to take agriculture for granted. But we do so at our own peril. Every farmer and rancher is one devastating event away from a lost season.

Whether by weather, pests, vandals, plant diseases, rules and regulations, or some other outside effect, agriculture is constantly threatened.

It's also affected by forces

thousands of miles away, which can impact prices on equipment, feed and materials.

The global pandemic, combined with restricted border crossings, have put a huge dent in the temporary migrant workers our farms have historically relied on.

The first time I made red enchiladas from scratch, it dawned on me how native that meal is.

While not all the ingredients are always from New Mexico, they certainly could be.

Tortillas made from New Mexico corn. Cheese made from New Mexico cows. New Mexico red chile. New Mexico onions. And on top, an egg from a New Mexico chicken.

A meal like that reminds you how connected we are to the place we live.

When you do your shopping, you have options.

You can buy pistachios made

# Lawmakers must serve state before church

In 2019, the New Mexico Senate rejected a bill that would have removed an old, invalid abortion law from the books.

A year later, voters had their say. Six Democratic senators who had voted against the bill were removed from office, including veterans such as former President Pro Tem Mary Kay Papen and Finance Committee Chairman John Arthur Smith.

Clearly, the bill was supported by not only Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham and the House, but also by a majority of voters in New Mexico.

But, it was passed against the wishes of the Catholic Church, which has tried to strike back.

Sen. Joseph Cervantes,

who voted for the bill and retained his Senate seat, announced last week that "some new clergy" within the Las Cruces Catholic Diocese have decided that his

decided that his vote disqualifies him taking communion.

Cervantes reported via Twitter that he had been denied communion during a celebratory mass at the Carmelite Monastery.

It's a tactic Catholic leaders have used many times before, with little success. President Joe Biden recently was denied communion at a Catholic church in South Carolina. Presidential candidate John Kerry was denied

communion at a Catholic church in Boston during the heat of a presidential race.

New York Gov. Mario Cuomo, former California Gov. Gray Davis, former Kansas Gov. Kath-

leen Sebelius, U.S. Rep. Patrick Kennedy and even former GOP presidential candidate Rudy Giuliani have all been denied communion based on their views on abortion.

That may have caused personal pain for the individuals involved, but not one person changed his or her position as a result.

Christopher Velasquez, a spokesperson for the Catholic Diocese of Las Cruces, defended the decision by explaining to the Sun-News that Cervantes had been told multiple times by the church how he should vote on that bill, including a personal warning from Bishop Peter Baldacchino. Yet he went against their orders.

When John F. Kennedy ran for president in 1960, there was great concern among millions of Amercans that if he won, our nation's leader would be subservient to the pope. Decisions would not be made in Washington, D.C., but rather at the Vatican. Kennedy's independence and his willingness to put the interests of the nation above the teachings of his church opened the door for the many Catholics who have followed him into

public office, including our current president.

Now, Catholic church leaders seem intent on chipping away at that political independence.

If they're successful, it will surely result in further backlash at the polls, such as the one in 2020 that completely reshaped the state Senate.

I realize that I'm making a political argument, and not a moral one. That's because of the insignificance of the bill that's causing the ruckus.

Passage of Senate Bill 10 had no impact on the lives of New Mexico residents. It removed a law that has been unconstitutional - and thus unenforceable - since the Supreme Court's Roe v. Wade decision of

1973.

Should that ruling ever be reversed, the current Legislature at that time should decide how to proceed - not one that was elected in the 1950s.

Cervantes said he has actively participated in his parish church for 50 years, and has served as its attorney for 20 years.

But he was elected to represent all the residents of District 31.

And, as chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, he has obligations to the entire state.

His decision to put the state and his constituents first was the correct one.

# Having options at end of life 'humane thing'

With regard to Naga P. Raja's opinion on endof-life options, I have advocated and fought for a person's right to determine how they die since Oregon brought the issue to light many years ago. Ted rose to his full height


and screamed at the top of his lungs!

# Bridging 'awareness gaps' to connect employers, job seekers

Through New
Mexico True Talent
(NMTT), The Bridge
of Southern New
Mexico is "cultivating an ecosystem of
opportunity," The
Bridge President and
CEO Tracey Bryan said.

At the NMTT website (newmexicotruetalent. org), The Bridge has "created a hub of information to connect resources to opportunities" and produce "a very clear picture" of what employers in key industries are looking for from the local workforce.

The NMTT initiative is the only comprehensive program alignment plan in the state, Bryan said, and is essential because "the workforce system continues to be our weakest point."

It also is a vital resource, she said, as New Mexico emerges from the pandemic.

Opportunity Insights Economic Tracker (tracktherecovery.org) estimates the number of small businesses open in Doña Ana County decreased by 45.3 percent from January 2020 to January 2021. Opportunity Insights is a non-partisan, nonprofit based at Harvard University.

The personal finance website WalletHub said weekly unemployment claims in New Mexico increased by 624.91 percent in early July compared to the same week in 2019. Claims increased by 646.68 percent compared to the start of 2020. Both figures are the biggest increases in the U.S.

About three-quarters of the local businesses lost during the pandemic were small "mom and pop" businesses, said Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce President and CEO Debbi Moore, who is also president of The Bridge's executive committee.

Those jobs "are not coming back, at least not in the short term," Bryan said.

"There's no doubt about it, businesses have closed as a result of the pandemic," said state Sen. Carrie Hamblen, D-Doña Ana, who is president and CEO of the Las Cruces Green Chamber of Commerce. "There's no doubt people have lost their jobs. And there's no doubt that individuals who are now without jobs (are) having to reconsider what their future professional life is going to look like. I think what we are going to see is businesses reinventing how they interact with their customers, how they sell their goods and services and how they

plan for crisis, because something like this was never considered," Hamblen said.

As business, education and government continue to deal with Covid-19, Bryan said they should be asking, "How do you see yourself helping to position the people you represent to take advantage of the opportunities here in Doña Ana County? How do we grow into problem solvers?"

There are "amazing career opportunities right here in Doña Ana County," Bryan said, "not only Las Cruces, but also in Santa Teresa's international trade industry due to the nation's efforts in reshoring (returning the overseas production of critical supplies to the U.S.) and nearshoring (leveraging the additional production capacity of Mexico rather than overseas)."

Another local opportunity, Spaceport America, "puts us at the forefront of the rapidly emerging commercial space industry," Bryan said.

"It's not just Virgin Galactic. It's a host of customers using the site and new technologies, things

# Bridge analyzes key industries

## **BULLETIN REPORT**

The Bridge of Southern New Mexico has produced detailed reports on key local industries: healthcare; energy; digital media and film; agriculture; aerospace, commercial space and defense; and trade.

Here are some of the reports' findings:

- International trade: "Turnover in this industry currently stands at about 50 percent, presenting an enormous challenge to employers and accounting for high turnover costs. Many employers use temporary agencies to source talent (and) much of the workforce is comprised of Texans rather than New Mexicans, but employers are open to hiring more people from New Mexico."
- Aerospace, commercial space and defense: "One of the greatest barriers between prospective workforce talent and careers in the industries is simple awareness. Our youth and young adults are vastly unaware of the opportunities available to them."
- Agriculture: "Doña Ana County is the most diverse agricultural area in the state, ranking first in crop value. It is the top producer in the world for pecans, grows 30 percent of all U.S. chile and is second for vegetable production."
- Digital media and film: "There is a holistic, reasonably well-connected education pipeline for talent development here between career and technical education programs in high school, the Creative Media Technology program at DACC and the Creative Media Institute at NMSU."
- Energy: Electric, natural gas, wind and solar energy "provide more than 1,000 jobs and careers in the region that are at or exceeding the country's median income."
- Healthcare: "The healthcare industry accounts for one out of every five jobs in Doña Ana County. There are nearly 1,000 employers who posted 1,200 jobs in January 2021.





# State tax collections fall millions short of amount owed

The "tax gap" between what taxpayers owe but fail to pay has grown by more than \$100 million in the past five years, partly because agency efforts have resulted in greater identification of owed taxes but not an increase in collections, an LFC report finds.

In a follow-up to an

evaluation of the tax gap in 2016, the Legislative Finance Committee's (LFC) Program Evaluation Unit reports the tax gap has grown from \$635 million to \$743 million since its original report. At the same time, spending on tax administration programs increased by 26 percent, and the department invested in technology that has improved its auditing. As a result, staff finds in the progress report that was scheduled to be presented to the LFC July 22 that the state Taxation and Revenue Department (TRD) has improved its ability to assess taxes, but not its ability to collect them. Taxpayers who dodge their responsibilities force the state to raise taxes to support government services, placing a greater burden on law-abiding taxpayers, the report notes.

LFC evaluators point out almost \$593 million in assessed taxes are being challenged by taxpayers in formal protests, a 360 percent increase over the \$161 million under protest in fiscal year 2017. Noting the potential impact of a half billion dollars in protested taxes on revenue forecasts and budgeting, the evaluators report five of the 25 positions in the department's protest unit are currently vacant and almost \$50,000 of a \$500,000 special appropriation for protest litigation was never spent. Many of the weaknesses identified in the 2016 report and a 2017 update remain, the progress report said,

including a finding that the audit program suffers from high vacancies and turnover among staff. However, the report notes, TRD's Audit and Compliance Division increased productivity in identifying taxes owed until FY21, when assessments per full-time equivalent (FTE) fell by 26 percent. In FY20, division staff assessed an average of \$671,000 per FTE, a 12-to-1 return on the state's investment in the division.

we can't even imagine at this point. The careers will evolve quickly, in addition to being here right now," Bryan added. The message to people looking for jobs is, "Don't leave here because you thought there was nothing here for you," she said.

People seeking a career change "might be a course away or a degree away" from a new career track and a better-paying job, she said.

Bryan said NMTT was created in part to "close the awareness gap" that has prevented connections from being made between and among students, those in the workforce seeking a career change, educators and employers. It also helps identify sources of funding and transportation.

"Knowing where to access information is power," Bryan said.

A lack of information has been especially harmful during Covid, she said, and NMTT is a way to "give people the best possible way to recover."

"I know what's possible," Bryan said. "I'd like to see us all working together."

As a state senator and president/CEO of the Green Chamber, Hamblen said she has a unique connection to state and local resources, to ask for help and information for local business and to share state government "where there are deficiencies."

Chambers and other

business-serving groups and organizations "have joined together," Hamblen said, "sharing with each other what resources we have, where we need help from the state and coming up with creative ways to reach out to our businesses."

It's important for business owners to take advantage of the resources being offered, she said.

"I get that it's hard asking for help," Hamblen said. "When you are a small business owner, your success comes from your determination, from your drive, from why you got into business in

the first place. And usually it's been because of your own hard work. But when we have a crisis like we've had over the last 18 months, it is completely fine to ask for help."

The Bridge, founded in 2009, is a unique collaboration among business, economic development, education and government leaders in Doña Ana County to increase high school and college completion rates and build a skilled workforce.

Its board and executive committee include: NMSU Chancellor Dan Arvizu and Doña Ana Community College President Monica Torres; the superintendents of Las Cruces Public Schools, Gadsden Independent School District and Hatch Valley Public Schools; Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce President and CEO Debbi Moore and Las Cruces Hispanic Chamber of Commerce **Executive Director Curtis** Rosemond; Mesilla Valley Economic Development Alliance (MVEDA) Vice President Les Baldock; and Doña Ana County Assistant County Manager Chuck McMahon.

The Bridge has worked closely with a wide range of partners throughout the pandemic to "create win-win situations," Bryan said.

Its specific goal is to connect "all the systems that enable our people ... to be prepared and ready for middle- and high-skilled careers in specific industries vital for economic development," according to NewMexico TrueTalent.org.

# La Semilla farm growing food, planting seeds of social justice

At La Semilla Community Farm in Anthony, New Mexico, it's not just about growing food.

The mission of the 14-acre education and demonstration farm is also about helping people know what they're eating, why it grows in the desert and how it impacts local culture and history.

La Semilla works in southern New Mexico and the El Paso-Ciudad Juárez region "to build a healthy, self-reliant, fair and sustainable food system," according to its website.

La Semilla is also about "challenging dominant narratives about our communities and about our desert environment,"

said La Semilla Food Justice Storyteller Michelle Carreon.

For example, Carreon said, "food desert" is a problematic term because

"it reinforces the misconception that the desert is a barren place."

Farm Manager Josh Jasso said La Semilla has these edible crops

currently growing at the farm: watermelon, cantaloupe, sunflowers, summer and winter squash, blue corn, beans, Armenian cucumbers, okra,



eggplant, tomato, chile, asparagus, nopales (cactus) and rosemary. It also has mesquite trees as well as trees producing pomegranates, apples, pears, quince and apricots.

Through its Farm Fresh program (www.

lasemillafarmfresh.com), La Semilla also works with local farmers to help sell their produce, delivering boxes filled with local products in Anthony, Las Cruces and El

# La Semilla launches fellowship

La Semilla Food Center has announced the start of its inaugural Farmer Fellowship: "Training Agroecological Farmers for a Hotter, Drier Future in the Chihuahuan Desert: Increasing Representation and Opportunity."

The fellowship, which is supported by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Beginning Farmer and Rancher Development Program, is led by La Semilla's Community Farm Program.

"The fellowship offers a unique opportunity for beginner farmers and those looking to start their own farming journey in the Paso del Norte region," a news release said.

Throughout the program's six-month paid apprenticeship, fellows are immersed in a handson learning experience and instruction designed around the 10 agroecology principles defined by the United Nations' Food and Agriculture Organization.

Ten farmers were selected for the 2021 fellowship. Some have been placed at La Semilla and others at partner farmer mentors in the region: De Colores Farm (Anthony, New Mexico); Utopia Valley (Las Cruces); and Fossil Face Farms, Myers Mushrooms and One Grub Community/Planty for the People, all in El Paso.

During the applica-

tion process, priority was given to beginning or small-acreage farmers who are low-income. of limited resources and "BIPOC (Black or indigenous People of Color), ESL (English as a second language) and/or female or non-binary." Farmers did not need to be landowners to apply for a fellowship, La Semilla said.

The fellowship is designed to create "community among the fellows and fostering and strengthening a broader, supportive community of desert farmers," La Semilla said.

When the rain hits Las Cruces. certain streets flood. Rainwater captures the oils from cars and sends it off down the road until it hits a barrier or ends up in the sewer. The same process happens with a garbage pile. Rainwater can seep through a landfill or transfer station. and the runoff can be filled with hazardous contaminants. However, South Central Solid **Waste Authority** is proactive about making sure that rainwater stays on its property.

"We hold annual trainings for staff so they can make sure to mitigate erosion of barriers and plan for that 100-year rain," said Miguel Fernandez, SCWA Authority program administrator. "Our staff knows how to access the damage that rain can cause to our facilities."

Fernandez explained that especially county collection sites in Doca Ana ramps can erode, and crews need to come out to do dirt work before residents can safely come back to drop off recycling materials and household trash. But beyond moving dirt. SCSWA employees stay informed about how

to deal with water runoff through regulatory courses which keeps us in compliance with EPA regulations regarding storm water pollution prevention plans.

All site managers have a yearly refresher by certified trainers to ensure we keep up with the date with the U.S. Environmental **Protection Agency** (EPA) on stormwater regulations. The National **Pollutant Discharge Elimination System** (NPDES) Stormwater Program was established by the federal Clean Water Act and makes



sure that states protect surface water quality. More simply, if protections and barriers fail. SCSWA staff must know how to take samples so that New **Mexico Environment** Department (NMED) can check for contaminants that may be contained in the trash pile that ends up in rainwater or runoffs.

"We rarely need to do this because we already cut off any flow of water with sloped ponding areas, drainage ditches, and man-made channels for any rain to flow back inside our property," said Fernandez.

He said, "Everyone who may be on duty from the managers to the attendants, knows to be on alert when we get rain and what to do, especially if it's large amounts like how it has been recently."

Paso, Carreon said.

It's also about the "very intentional spaces we're creating for our community to share their stories," Carreon said.

That includes storygathering sessions led by La Semilla Organizational Storyteller Rubi Orozco Santos, a website, a blog, videos, news releases and even public art – as influenced by the storytelling sessions.

In partnership with

Bowie High School and Native American artist Al Woody of El Paso, La Semilla unveiled a mural called "Life Origins," inspired by local "foodways stories" and the storygathering sessions, in the Bowie High auditorium in May.

There are also murals on both sides of a shipping container at the community farm.

One side shows hands making tortillas with blue corn in the background.

The other side features native plants and pollina-

tors

A new mural will be unveiled this fall, she said.

The nonprofit La Semilla is also committed to social justice, Carreon said.

It works with other organizations in the region to support the creation and growth of small farms, to help farmers of color and historically excluded communities and to focus on issues like farm labor, land ownership, climate change, recycling, defining sustainability and water.

La Semilla was founded in 2010 to focus on community gardens, youth programs and transforming the food system, according to the farm's website. In the past decade plus, it has taught "thousands of elementary and middle school students how to grow and cook fresh food."

Carreon, who grew up in El Paso, has a doctorate in the interdisciplinary field of American Studies, with a concentration in sociology.

"Storytelling has always been an important part of my lived experience," she said. Carreon is especially "pulled toward local history," she said. Before coming to La Semilla in February, one of her prior positions was at the Border Heritage Center at the El Paso Public Library's downtown branch.

"Something that struck me about this position (at La Semilla) was learning about our community members' own lived experiences and stories and how they connected to the broader history of our region," she said.

"We work with and support local farmers and beginning farmers (e.g., the fellowship), but we also work to amplify and learn from the local wisdom and histories of our community and create spaces for community members to share about their own connections to foodways in our region," Carreon said.

"Our stories really matter," she said.

"If I wasn't in my position (at La Semilla), I would want to be out on a farm. I want to be a farmer," Carreon said.

La Semilla Food Center is the parent organization for the farm.





When you pay your utilities bill at the East Mesa **Utilities Customer** Service Office at 5195 Bataan Memorial West, there is now an automated kiosk that lets you pay your electric bill as well.

"The kiosk offers our customers another location where they can securely pay their EPE bill in addition to already having a place to pay their LCU bill without driving all the way into town," said Chase Johnson, LCU customer central supervisor. "For customers who live closer to City Hall, EPE will also have another kiosk in their building on Water Street."

# Las Cruces Utilities Adds El Paso Electric Payment Kiosk at East Mesa Location By Cassie McClure

Since it is only for EPE's electric bill payments via card and cash, any inquiries on a customer's EPE accounts cannot be accessed by LCU Customer Central staff.

"However, if LCU customers are needing help with their utilities, especially with the moratorium on accounts ending September 1st, this is the time to have a conversation with one of our representatives to let them know and find a way to pay that works for you," said Johnson.

There are different ways to schedule a payment, make a partial payment with a Promise to Pay program for the remainder. Plus, you can also check with staff to see if you qualify for assistance with your bill if you are having financial



excavator or homeowner, you can be fined AND held financially responsible for repair costs to damaged utilities when 811 is not called. How it works:

- 1. Use white spray paint and/or white marker flags to mark the ground where you plan to dig.
- 2. Call 811 two business days before beginning your project and they will alert all of the local utilities to respond to your dig site and mark where the utility lines are buried. Utility companies will have two days, once notified, to respond to your dig site.
- 3. Once utilities are marked, you must adhere to the "18 inch" rule, which is no mechanical digging (tractor, auger, etc.) within 18 inches of the utility markings. If you must dig within 18 inches of a utility marking, it has to be hand dug or vacuum excavated.
- 4. Once all of the utilities have been marked, you will have 15 days to complete your digging project. If your project is not complete in that time frame, you must call 811 again.

# Las Cruces native is master-at-arms at Rhode Island naval base



Jarden conducted a full orchestra, Voz Vaqueros and Las Cruces Community Chorus in performances at NMSU's Atkinson Recital Hall in celebration of the bicentennial of the signing of the U.S. Constitution.

In 1991, Jarden organized the "International Choral Festival" andhosted The Musicum Collegium Bremen and Chamber Orchestra, from Bremen, Germany.

## Las Cruces musician releases Native American flute album

# Brown Bag lectures return to Railroad Museum Aug. 10

Las Cruces Railroad Museum's popular Brown Bag Lecture series returns to the museum at noon Tuesday, Aug. 10, with George Hackler's presentation "The Mormon **Battalion March Through** Southern New Mexico."

In 1846, 500 members of the Mormon community volunteered for military service in what would become the "Mormon Battalion March," the City of Las Cruces said in a news release. "In exchange for aiding the country in the war with Mexico, the soldiers would receive government assistance

to relocate their families to new lands in the West. The journey took them from Iowa to California. Hackler will detail the route the soldiers took through southern New Mexico, which is largely overlooked in the history books," the city said.

Hackler is a native of the Mesilla Valley. His interest in Southwest history was planted growing up on a farm below Rincon while he was collecting arrow points and potsherds. Hackler graduated from New Mexico State University with a double major in physics and math and worked for 18 years in the Physical Science Labo-

ratory at NMSU in rocket flight determination.

Hackler's additional work experience includes three years at the Martin Denver Company working on the Titan One intercontinental ballistic missile, 17 years at Burn Construction Company and finishing his career designing and building rocket test facilities at White Sands Missile Range-NASA. He also served on the Las Cruces Public School Board of Education.



he said.

H. Clark **McCaffrey** was born in Baltimore, Maryland, but attended elementary, high school and university in Maine,

"Four years of college became seven as the major shifted several times," he said. Reserve officer training was a subject matter that matched his personality, and upon graduation he was commissioned a second lieutenant in the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

The Army then became a career, both in uniform

and as an Army civilian employee, McCaffrey said.


But, the author acknowledges that he may have "had the wrong career," as he spent 25 years as a volunteer ballet company production manager, prop shop chief and backstage crew chief. For 10 years, he ran the talent show for the New Mexico State Senior Olympics. If there is anything else he could have, McCaffrey said, "it would be to live another hundred plus years."

McCaffrey's book, "From a Lifetime," "contains a series of poems and essays (and a little love story) that reflect the observations, opinions and sentiments compiled from a lifetime of living, learning, observing and developing a unique character," he said.

Nancy V. Baker says, for local writers, "our community is fortunate in two ways. First, it attracts so

many others who share the passion and gift of telling stories. Second is the presence of Alice Davenport, a true champion of local authors. Her shop, the Book Nook at Moonbow, brings both visibility to their work and a sense of community and shared endeavors.

"As the author of two novels "Vanished" and "The Boy in the Suitcase" -



I know how challenging the process can be, from developing a rough idea of plot and character, to publication and marketing," Baker said. "Even in ordinary times, a writer can feel isolated and uncertain: those feelings were magnified over the past difficult year. Writers meeting readers face-to-face provides an extraordinary opportunity

for connection. That is why I am so excited to help organize Celebrate Authors in 2021."

David G. Thomas has been researching and writing Mesilla Valley history for almost 20 years. To date, he has seven books published on the subject.

Thomas' book on Sheriff Pat Garrett has won five awards, including the 2020 Will Rogers Medallion Award for Western biography.

His latest book is "The Trial of Billy the Kid."

"The Trial of Billy the Kid" is about the famed outlaw's trial for murder and the events leading up to that trial, Thomas said.

"The result of Billy's trial sealed his fate," the author said. "And yet Billy's trial is the least written about and, until this book, the least known event of Billy's adult life. Prior biographies have provided

extensive - and fascinating — details on Billy's life, but they supply only a few paragraphs on Billy's trial. Just the bare facts: time, place, names, result."

Thomas said the infor-

mation presented in his book "has been unknown until now. This book makes it possible to answer these previously



unanswerable questions: Where was Billy captured? Where was Billy tried? What were the governing territorial laws? What were the charges against Billy? Was there a trial transcript and what happened to it? What kind of defense did Billy present? Did Billy testify in his own defense? Did Billy have witnesses standing for him? Who testified against him for

the prosecution? What was the jury like? What action by the trial judge virtually guaranteed his conviction? What legal grounds did he have to appeal his verdict? Was the trial fair?"

Supplementing the text are 132 photos, including many photos never published before, he said.

The book is available in both paperback and hardcover from Amazon and Ingram.

"Avoid basing your work on other authors' books about the topic," is his advice to would-be writers of history.

# Book club hosts Billy the Kid author



When New Mexico reached a turquoise sta-



# Two-week Opera Camp culminates with live musical on July 30

Along the way they meet a group of pop starfish, a comedian clownfish, the king of all crabs and his thug eels and a dangerous ninja sword fish. Can they rescue the gods and goddesses from the evil serpent and make it back to the island they love?"

Payton Matthews is the show's assistant director. Darin Cabot is the set designer.

In the process of creating the 30-minute musical, "the young participants will be learning the technical aspects of lighting and sound, as







# St. Andrew's parishioners share stimulus checks, donate \$7K

How can people make a difference for people in need in their own community? They can "Share the Blessings!"

St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Las Cruces always knew how much their congregation had been blessed in so many ways. They decided that they would share any income they had that wasn't needed for their own care. When the stimulus checks started arriving in the mail, there were those who needed the money desperately and others who did not. During the recovery from the pandemic, everyone noticed the divide that happens in society when some people have jobs and a stable income while others who don't end up falling so far behind.

St. Andrew's has a history of helping those in need. In 1984, the church laid the foundation for El Caldito Soup Kitchen when the church began the first soup kitchen in

the community. Using their own kitchen facilities, the soup kitchen operated out of the church for years, serving over 17,000 meals. Today, many members of the congregation still volunteer at El Caldito. Two years ago, we began "Second Sunday Supper" where parishioners could share a potluck meal each month with our sisters and brothers

living at Camp Hope (the tent city at Mesilla Valley Community of Hope).

The idea for "Sharing the Blessings" originated in a brief story out of Portland, Oregon, that was broadcast on KRWG. A parishioner heard how a television newscaster in Portland decided that he had a good job and didn't need his stimulus check. So, driving past the long lines for his local food bank one day led him to create a campaign called "Redirect the Check." The community of Portland raised over \$40,000. Hearing this story inspired many parishioners at St. Andrew's to recreate this campaign at the church. A total of \$7,300 was raised

and divided among three nonprofits.

Casa de Peregrinos (childcare and education for homeless and near homeless children and their families) received \$2.500 on "Giving Day" and that contribution was matched by corporate sponsors.

Both El Caldito and Community of Hope received a check for \$2,400. All three nonprofits are located on the Community of Hope campus, 999 W. Amador Ave.

# Classic Model A car still generating 'a lot of honks and smiles'

Rick Black gets "a lot of honks and a lot of smiles" when he's out driving.

That is, if he's driving his completely restored 1931 Model A Ford.

Black, 77, bought the car more than 50 years ago, and has been interested in classic cars for even longer than that. Just out of high school, he bought a 1936 Ford and later a 1948 Chevy. He also bought a 1940 Mercury from popular Western actor Jack Elam (1920-2003).

"I'm a car guy," Black said.

Black and his wife, Dana, moved to Las Cruces in 2018 by way of California, Oregon and Texas. He spent 10 years as network systems manager at El Paso International Airport, retiring in 2012.

Wherever he's lived, Black has gotten involved in local Model A car clubs.

In El Paso, he started the Borderland A's, which now has about 25 members in the Las Cruces-El

Paso area, with Black serving as president. He created the Model A Ford Club of America's website (www.mafca.com) in 1996.

Black's first Model A was a 1929 Ford. With parts from a wrecking yard in the San Fernando Valley, he placed the car's body on a Mercury chassis and replaced the engine. Black sold the car when he enlisted in the U.S. Army.

When Black came out of the Army and started

college in 1968 in Canoga Park, California, he discovered a 1931 Deluxe (the deluxe model cost \$30 extra) Tudor Sedan Model A Ford parked under a tree three blocks from his apartment. He bought the car and spent the next 25 years restoring it to its former glory - refurbishing about 99 percent of its more than 5,500 parts.

Black drives his Model A about 1,000 miles a year, he said. It's been in parades and car shows, took his daughter and her

husband to their wedding reception and was featured, along with Black, in the Model A Ford Club of America "Restorer" Magazine.

"It's still a joy to drive," Black said.

The 90-year-old twodoor has fewer than 130.000 miles on it and features a quail-shaped hood ornament complete with thermometer. It safely tops out at about 50 mph, Black said. Originally a two-tone gray, research on the car's history helped

him restore it to Ford Maroon

The Model A was the first Ford automobile with conventional driving controls. Black said, allowing a driver's hands instead of his or her feet to do most of the work. Starting the Model A involves putting in the clutch, turning the ignition, advancing the throttle, working the choke and stepping on the starter.

The car has "no automatic anything," Black said, so there are no turn signals and no radio, heater or air conditioning. But the windshield opens to increase air flow.

Henry Ford (1863-1947) produced his first vehicle. the Ford Quadricycle, in 1896 while working for Thomas Edison in Detroit, Michigan. Ford founded the Ford Motor Company in 1903 and produced the first Model A that same year. That was followed by models B, D, F, R, S and the Model T (1908) that revolutionized the automotive industry. The second version of the Model A, designed by Henry's son, Edsel Ford (1893-1943), produced 4.8 million cars 1928-31, Black said.

Ford was the first car

company to allow people to buy vehicles in installments, Black said, which greatly increased their availability to the general public. That's one reason there are still so many classic Fords on the road today, Black said.

There are at least 100,000 Model A's still out there, he said, and possibly as many as 500,000 around the world. The Model A Ford Club of America has about 10,000 members and the national Model A Restorers Club (model-a-ford.org) has about 6,000 members.

Black is looking forward to driving his car to the national Model A Ford Club of America convention in Kerrville, Texas, in June 2022.

The Borderland A's meet the first Sunday of the month, returning to in-person meetings in April. The meetings often begin with a tour of members' Model A's. You don't have to own a Model A to join the Borderland A's; vou just have to have an interest in the cars.

# Report: Oil, gas 18 percent of NM economy

A report issued in mid-July by the New Mexico Oil and Gas Association (NMOGA) and the American Petroleum Institute (API) shows that New Mexico's oil and natural gas industry added almost \$19 billion to the state's gross domestic product in 2019, NMOGA said in a news release.

The study was conducted by PricewaterhouseCoopers and is based on the latest government data available, the news release said. It was commissioned by API.

"Oil and natural gas are a big part of New Mexico's economy and will continue to play a leading role in driving our state from recovery to prosperity," said NMOGA Chairman Leland Gould. "New Mexico has enormous oil and natural gas potential, and we should continue to make this state a magnet

for capital investment and job creation by prioritizing the development of

these resources right here in our own backvard."

"Our industry is crucial to growing New Mexico's post-pandemic economy, and America's future is stronger when we are leading the world in energy production," API President and CEO Mike Sommers said.

"America's natural gas and oil industry has a footprint nationwide, supporting hundreds of thousands of jobs from coast to coast, even in states with little to no production. This study reinforces that the pace and strength of our nation's economic recovery will depend on policies that support, rather than hinder, American

energy development," Sommers added.

As economic activity, travel patterns and consumption continue to grow during the postpandemic recovery, the U.S. Energy Information Administration expects global oil and liquid fuels consumption to surpass 2019 levels in 2022, the news release said.

According to the report,

in 2019, the state oil and gas industry directly and indirectly:

- · Contributed \$18.8 billion to New Mexico's gross domestic product, 17.9 percent of the state's total.
- Supported more than 46,000 direct jobs.
- · Generated an additional 1.5 jobs elsewhere in New Mexico's economy for each direct job in the

state's oil and natural gas industry.

In 2019, the U.S. led the world in oil and natural gas production, the news release said.

At the national level in 2019, the oil and natural gas industry:

 Supported nearly \$1.7 trillion to U.S. gross domestic product, accounting for 7.9 percent of the national total.

- · Supported more than 2.5 million direct jobs.
- · Generated an additional 3.5 jobs elsewhere in the U.S. economy for each direct job in the U.S. oil and natural gas industry.

NMOGA is a coalition of more than 1,000 oil and natural gas companies, individuals and stakeholders "dedicated to promoting the safe and environmentally responsible development of oil and natural gas resources in New Mexico," the association said.

API represents all segments of America's natural gas and oil industry, the news release said. Its 600 members "produce, process and distribute the majority of the nation's energy." API was formed in 1919 as a standardssetting organization and has developed more than 700 standards to enhance operational and environmental safety, efficiency and sustainability.

New Mexico cast members and 13,538 New Mexico background and extras employed by productions registered with NMFO.

NMFO estimated that 40 percent of production budgets are spent on procuring goods and services

from New Mexico businesses, including caterers, hardware stores, car rental companies, sign makers, dry cleaners, art galleries and glaziers. In addition, property owners who list their property as a film location are discovering the industry can provide an additional revenue stream, NMFO said.

Although production

was halted for approximately one quarter of the fiscal year due to Covid-19, the state still saw 69 productions, 26 film, 24 television and 19 additional media productions since returning to set in September 2020, NMFO said. The Covid-positive rate among productions remained extraordinarily low, an average of 0.13 percent, the film office said.


"We don't just want it to be for the players," Placencio said. "It's been a long year and a half because of Covid and all. We want something amazing for the community to do."

# Cool, calm, collected: Morikawa impresses with British Open win

Louis Ooosthuizen was the leader through the first three rounds of the Open Championship but that was inconsequential to Morikawa, 24.

Morikawa shot a final round of 4-under par 66, finishing the tournament at 15-under and two strokes better than runner-up Jordan Spieth. Spieth, who won the Open at Royal Birkdale in 2017, was lurking near the top all week, but bogies on 17 and 18 at the end of his third round, and two bogies in his first six holes on Sunday hurt his chances.

Morikawa won \$2,070,000, while Spieth won \$1,198,000 in sole second.

Bryson De Chambeau, whose pre-tournament talk suggested he intended to bring Royal St. George's to its knees with his length off the tee, barely made the cut.

After round one he stated to the press that his driver "sucks," to which he needed to apologize hours later.

Bryson finished tied for 33rd and won only \$60,143, and maybe lost some fan support with his complaints.

Morikawa has now won two majors in just eight starts. He won the 2020 PGA Championship last August at Harding Park in San Francisco. Regarded as the best ball striker in the game today, he remains the leader in the "strokes gained approach" stat at +1.52. That means he's one and a half strokes better than the rest of the field for tournaments played this year. That's huge!

On Wednesday prior to Thursday's first round Golf Channel's Brandel Chamblee picked Morikawa to win. "This golf course has a darn good record at picking the best ball striker in the game," Chamblee said. He added that, since the stroke gained metrics came out in 2004 there has only been one player who has ever finished a season gaining more than a stroke and a half over his peers with his iron play — that's Tiger Woods.

Morikawa may not be the longest driver in the world, but he is one of the most accurate.

That counted big at

Royal St. George's, with lurking out-of-bounds on several holes, and extremely long and penal rough.

Plus, for his 72 holes Morikawa averaged perround 27.75 putts. Think about that! How many putts do you take per round?. Majors are won with the putter.

There are many takeaways from this edition of the British Open. One is that Jordan Spieth is back with his game, and he knows that winning is hard. It's hard for everyone.

The R&A and the golf community in the U.K. know how to maintain golfing's ageless traditions. Their fans know and love their golf. The bomb-and-gouge style isn't suited to links golf; links golf is like no other.

Bryson needs to harness his brain and his science to the real world and grow up.

One of the most impressive aspects of Morikawa's game in the final round was the poise and focus he demonstrated. Morikawa's three-minute speech on the 18th green at Royal St. George's, as he clutched the champion's Claret Jug, was professional and moving as he praised the fans and everyone on his team.

Lastly, Collin Morikawa will win more majors and eventually reign No. 1.
