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'A unique spiritual space'

Artist's stained-glass windows transform St. Andrew's chapel

With eight windows that include almost 2,000 individual pieces of stained glass in the most brilliant reds, blues, greens and yellows imaginable, Las Cruces artist Frank Peacock has transformed St. Andrew's Episcopal Church's Kendrick Chapel into "a unique spiritual space" that floods the visitor with "hope, inspiration and love," in Peacock's own words.

The church hierarchy approved the project in July 2019, installation began about 14 months ago and Peacock completed the work in August.

The project actually began 21 years ago when Peacock "embarked on a journey of prayer, faith and spirit-driven production of drawings and paintings" that he hoped would one day become stained-glass windows in a place of worship. A member of the St. Andrew's congregation, his vision fit with then St.

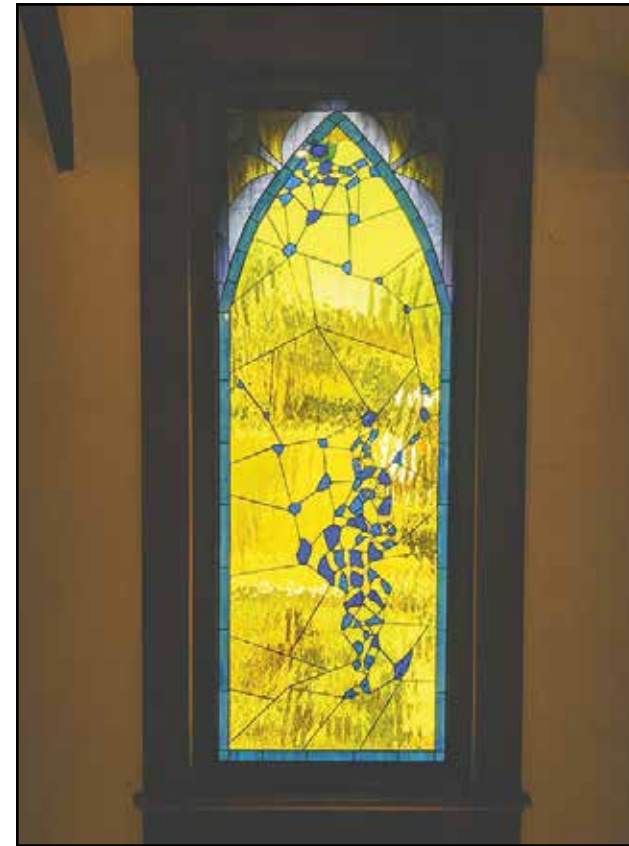

Andrew's Rector Scott Ruthven's plans to redo Kendrick Chapel's origi-

nal windows, which were installed in 1914, Peacock said.

Peacock began by making drawings of the windows and then scale models, visiting cathedrals, churches and chapels across Europe and studying the art and science of stained glass. A popular and respected regional artist who has worked extensively in acrylic for more than 50 years, crosses have often shown up in the trees, plants and other abstract and realistic forms in nature depicted in Peacock's paintings and pastels.

The chapel project was a whole new venture for

Peacock.

"I had never done an architectural job for a building," he said, "much less a church."

Peacock is also an expert framer, and that helps explain his attention not only to the transparent stained-glass, but also to the translucent milk stained-glass border and the original decorative wood framing that was preserved for each window.

Peacock was involved with every step of the project, he said, from cutting down junipers

and other bushes outside the windows to working with carpenters and a contractor to measure the window frames and install the new stained-glass windows and the impact-resistant clear glass sheets on either side.

That came after he worked through "three levels of acceptance" of St. Andrew's leadership and its congregation to get the project approved in the first place.

At first, some may have had their doubts, but once they saw it unfolding, "the congregation has been very excited about the project," he said.

Peacock visited the company in Chula Vista, California, that manufactured the windows, which were fabricated in Tijuana, Mexico, he said.

He found the manufacturer, StainedGlassWindows.com, on the Internet.

"It was a thrill for them and their craftspersons to have an artist in the factory," Peacock said, "as they had never worked directly with an artist before."

"I'm ecstatic," Peacock said, describing the project as a "career-capping event. "It's not about me. It's about the windows. This is my gift."

The entire project cost about \$40,000, Peacock said. He charged nothing for his work.

"Everyone is welcome" to visit the chapel, Peacock said. It's "not just for the use of the congrega-

tion or Episcopalians.”

Ruthven has retired after 17 years with St. Andrew's. Peacock said St. Andrew's will welcome a new rector Jonathan Hanneman Oct. 1, who is moving to Las Cruces from Redmond, Washington.

Kendrick Chapel was built by the Rev. Nicholas Hunter “Preacher” Lewis, who was born in Powhatan County, Virginia, in 1869 and died in El Paso County, Texas, in 1948.

A beloved Episcopal missionary, Preacher Lewis is buried in the Masonic Cemetery located at 706 Compress Road in Las Cruces.

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The Skills of a Father: Las Cruces Utilities Associate Helps Build Daughter's Business

There's a small sticker on the back that says, "Made by Dad" and there's clear excitement when Las Cruces Utilities Gas Compliance Inspector Ruben Garcia talks about the welds and the fabrications that he added around his daughter's lemonade truck. But it's sheer pride you see when he watches Emily Garcia slide open the window to take an order.

For three months, Ruben would come home from work and get back to work, taking a 1970s trailer down to the bare frame and starting from scratch. "We call it 2021 because we completely gutted it," he explained.

It's the home for her business Francy Emilade, a bright yellow and white mobile lemonade stand that can be seen around town and at festivals throughout the area.

The name is a tribute to her grandmother Frances – known as Francy. Other memories come up for Ruben in watching his daughter's business.

"I felt a bit like my dad when I watched her learn to back the trailer up," said Ruben. "I remember him, quiet with patience when I was a kid trying to learn how to back up a cement mixer. Now I know what he felt like. I had to have the same patience, but I've watched her grow, and I'm just so proud."

A sophomore at New Mexico State University studying Civil Engineering Technology, Emily started the lemonade business to supplement her education. She's debated applying to the LCU internship to get skills like her dad – and may still, but right now, the business bug has bit.

"When there were drive-thru birthday parties, I took out the equipment to make lemonade for these events," said Emily. In 2015, she worked as a teenager with a lemonade vendor, who gave up his business and sold his equipment to her. "I've been blessed by the customers I've had," she said and passed that blessing on when life handed her lemons –

after a canceled event.

"I reached out to make free drinks for firefighters, to Central Elementary teachers – where my little brothers are – and then made drinks for my dad's coworkers," Emily said. Did he get kudos from his coworkers? "Yes," Ruben laughed, "But she put me to work."

Window names and themes for chapel stained-glass project

Each of artist Frank Peacock's stained-glass windows in St. Andrew's Episcopal Church's Kendrick Chapel has a name and a theme.

The eight windows were selected by the church congregation from 12 of Peacock's original drawings.

Before installation, Peacock moved each window into different locations throughout the chapel "to see where the light was best" for each one's unique color scheme.

"Each one is my favorite for a different reason," Peacock said.

Starting in the upper right corner of the chapel, and moving clockwise to the chapel's south side, the windows, with names and descriptions by Peacock, are:

• **Glory of the Cross.** "The cross is more than a symbol of Christ's sacrifice and love for mankind. (It) speaks of the suffering of the early Christians (and) to the glory of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit to have us aspire until heaven."

• **Praise the Day.** "Nature and all its elements are given life and being through the grace of God. Whether plant, animal or man, as true believers we praise the light of his love."

• **I Saw Paul Go Dancing from Damascus.** "Saul of Tarsus was known for persecuting

Christians. He was visited by Christ while on his way to Damascus, became Paul and began delivering Christ's message."

• **Angel in the Garden.** "Angels and gardens play an important role in biblical life. Angels visiting mortals often happen in a place whose existence is defined by birth, life, death and rebirth."

• **Cross of the Ages.** "Whether western or eastern, orthodox crosses have either one, two or three cross bars. No matter the significance of the design, the cross has always represented Christ's supreme sacrifice for all mankind."

• **Grace in Full Bloom.** "From God's first garden on Earth to Christ's suffering in a garden, a well-tended garden has been a place to know God's love through beauty, verdant life, death and rebirth."

• **Cross of the Martyrs.** "This cross symbolizes the spirits of those who have given their all for their faith."

• **Light of Faith.** "The flame of a candle has long represented a votive prayer of thanksgiving to God. The Holy Spirit, of no earthly form, is well represented by a flame that has no form, has no matter and begins and ends of its own accord. Yet that flame seems to always be carrying a believer's prayer heavenward."

Fitch appointed to fill Las Cruces judgeship after Schultz retires

Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham has appointed Casey Fitch to fill a Third Judicial District Court (Las Cruces) vacancy.

Fitch will replace Judge Lisa C. Schultz, who has retired, the governor's office said in a news release.

Fitch left private practice in 2017 to join the U.S. District Court for the District of New Mexico as a career law clerk, the news release said.

A New Mexico native and graduate of Socorro High School, Fitch earned a bachelor's

degree from the University of California at Davis

and a law degree from the University of Seattle in 2004.

He moved back to New Mexico in 2010 and was admitted to the New Mexico bar the same year, after stints working in Michigan and Washington state.

This is his second ap-

pointment to the Third Judicial District bench. Lujan Grisham previously appointed him in the summer of 2020.

He was not placed on the 2020 ballot by the state central committee, however, and returned to private practice in Las Cruces.

The governor selected Fitch from a list of applicants recommended by the Judicial Nominating Commission after conducting interviews.

Schultz was first elected to district court in 2006. She was mostly recently retained by Doña Ana County voters in 2020.

New Mexicans take care to remember

Friday morning, Aug. 27, as I was leaving my house to go to work, a neighbor had his front-yard U.S. flag at half-staff.

A little later, as I drove west on U.S. 70, I could see a man and a woman raising the American flag at the Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley on Bataan Memorial. They stopped when the flag reached half-staff.

I had only been in the car 5 minutes and already witnessed three important reminders about America and about Las Cruces.

Foremost, I was reminded of the 13 U.S. service members who had died the night before in a suicide bombing in Afghanistan. There were 11 Marines, one sailor and one soldier. Most of them were in their early 20s.

Secondly, I was reminded how Americans generally, and Las Cruceans specifically, care for and respect their military members and their service.

Thirdly, because the Animal Services Center is on Bataan Memorial, I was reminded of another time when American fighting forces faced death and violence at enemy hands.

The infamous death march in the Philippines took place nearly 70 years ago in April 1942, when U.S. troops — including a high number of New Mexicans — were forced by their Japanese captors to walk a 65-mile trek to prison camps. Many didn't make it.

These were somber reminders, yet they made me proud of our service men and women, then and now. I also felt a sense of pride in Las Cruces, which never seems to forget these moments of sacred importance.

Less than two hours later, I was visiting with Chad Getz of Getz Funeral Home, who reminded me of the local reaction to the February 2020 death of Sgt. 1st Class Antonio

Rey Rodriguez, a Las Crucean. Rodriguez was also serving in Afghanistan, and was one of two Special Forces soldiers killed in an attack.

When Rodriguez's body was returned to Las Cruces, and made its way through town for the memorial services, the turnout was remarkable. People lined the streets with flags and signs honoring the sergeant, a 2009 graduate of Mayfield High School.

Getz said Rodriguez's military colleagues, who had come to accompany the body, were awestruck at the outpouring in his hometown.

We here in Las Cruces aren't surprised by such things, because that's just what we do.

However, we may not appreciate the rarity of such sincere gestures.

Dozens of times over the years, I've written in this space about the overwhelming generosity of Las Cruceans, and how we respond time and time

again to help people in need. The response is that much more dramatic given the fact we live in one of the poorer counties in the country.

My youngest daughter recently traveled to Chicago to help a friend who is moving there for college.

"I knew that people in Las Cruces were nice, but I didn't realize how nice until I spent a few days away from here," she said. She wasn't knocking Chicagoans, necessarily. Overall, she had a good experience. It's just that, compared to anyone anywhere, Las Cruceans tend to stand out for their friendliness and generosity.

I grew up among very friendly people in Oklahoma. But they can't top, however, my experiences in southern New Mexico. Having lived 13 years each in Alamogordo and Las Cruces, I'm convinced we have a concentration of some of the biggest hearts and best people in America.

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Many Afghan refugees starting their new lives in southern NM

Thousands of Afghan refugees whisked to safety during the massive evacuation that concluded this week experienced their first taste of freedom here in Doña Ana County.

The Doña Ana Range Complex, a part of the Fort Bliss Army post that extends into Doña Ana and Otero counties in New Mexico, is being used as a temporary holding site for those evacuated from Afghanistan as part of Operation Allies Rescue.

As many as 10,000 evacuees are expected to be processed there. The Department of Defense has said that up to 22,000

Afghans have been approved for transport to the United States.

Those fortunate enough to begin their new American experience here will find a warm

welcome. Volunteer assistance is being coordinated through the American Red Cross. El Calvario Church in Las Cruces, which has been helping to care for new arrivals to our country for many years, is collecting hygiene kits and basic supplies for those who will be taken to Holloman Air Force Base in Otero County. And, they are working to help find housing options for those who

want to stay in the region.

The deadly attack at the gate leading into the Kabul airport last week in which 13 U.S. troops and many more Afghans were killed provides tragic evidence as to why people are so desperate to leave.

Taliban leaders who now control Afghanistan say they will not retaliate against those who have aided the U.S. military effort for the past 20 years, but those assurances are not believable.

Immigration opponents will argue that people throughout the globe live in dangerous conditions, and we can't take them all in. But the threats faced by those now in Afghanistan are of our own making.

We weren't invited to

Afghanistan. We came seeking vengeance and retribution following the worst attack on our nation since Pearl Harbor.

Somewhere along the line, that morphed into a 20-year attempt to rebuild that nation in our image. That was our decision.

Our initial success in rooting out the Taliban was due to the overwhelming might of our military. But any successes we had following those first days were achieved working in partnership with our Afghan allies.

Jim Bob Leon came back to check on two military members he had just brought breakfast to a few minutes earlier. One of the two chuckled about how quickly they ate their omelets.

"I guess asking how it was really is in the past tense," laughed Jim Bob.

While his location for Jim Bobs BBQ at the Las Cruces International Airport in the Las Cruces Innovation and Industrial Park (LCIIP) opened at the most challenging times, January 2021, his outlook is optimistic.

"There's been support from the airport community," he said. "Brahn Sport Airport donated most of the decorations on the wall."

Fans of Jim Bobs, which has their original location off Solano Drive at 1290 Foster Road, have stopped by to support him. Still, he has noticed that the employees from the industrial park

make up about 80 percent of his customers, with 20 percent coming from airport traffic.

Jim Bob explained that the choice to move up to the airport was due to the size of the facility, which allows them to do more things like bake deserts like cinnamon rolls and brownies from scratch and expand into breads and croissants to give an extra kick to his slow-cooked BBQ offerings. He's also open to experimenting with new sauces, like

his regional prickly pear habanero.

Originally from Ohio, he found himself following family and three years ago opened Jim Bobs after starting to cater for coworkers in August 2011. Ten years later, he's building a name for himself and his business with repeat customers from just down the road and those flying in from all directions.

"People don't realize how large this airport is," said Jim Bob. "We're working on more events to bring

locals out to get a sense of pride in the airport."

The event is open to all interested persons.

The forum will feature a panel of local ecological and resource specialists who will engage in discus-

sions with the audience on visions for the future and the needs for watershed stewardship in New Mexico's most southern Rio Grande watershed region.

The event will also pro-

vide an introduction of the program, which aims to empower citizens to promote stewardship of local watersheds.

Through the series of forums, which will be held during the next nine

months, the program will also engage volunteers in making decisions and implementing conservation projects in New Mexico's southern Rio Grande watershed.

Connie Maxwell, from the New Mexico Water Resources Research Institute (WRRRI) based at New Mexico State University, will provide an overview of watershed issues for the region and will moderate the panel, which will also include Elephant Butte Irrigation District (EBID) Manager Gary Esslinger; New Mexico Department of Agriculture Sec. Jeff Witte; Las Cruces City Councilor Gill Sorg; Doña Ana County Soil and Water Conservation District (DASWCD) Board of Supervisors member

Kevin Bixby, who is also director of the Southwest Environmental Center of Las Cruces; Doña Ana County Flood Commission Director John Gwynne; local rancher Steve Wilmeth; and Don McClure, assistant district manager of the Las Cruces office of the federal Bureau of Land Management.

The program comes at an important time for the Hatch and Mesilla Valley region, as watershed health is currently a critical issue for the resiliency of both our communities and ecosystems. As drought and high temperatures are causing increased aridity and stressing vegetation and rangeland health in the uplands, monsoonal rains

causing scouring floods are eroding soils into the valleys and overwhelming flood infrastructure. Reduced surface water availability is increasing use of and reliance on groundwater.

As groundwater levels diminish, surface flows also decrease as they seep into aquifers that are less full, reducing stream health, at the same time the salinity becomes concentrated in the groundwater, thus irrigating with it leads to reduced agricultural productivity.

This forum is convened in partnership with the Hatch and Mesilla Valley Watershed Plan — a South Central New Mexico Stormwater Management

lege costs without unduly stressing her family’s finances.

“Overall, I cannot wait to see where life takes me and what I manage to accomplish with each opportunity I’m given,” Palacio said. “I know that being a woman, I will be faced with many challenges, but I have already come this far. I am not going to let the world crush me. I am going to work to just make it stronger.”

Del Plain, a 2020 graduate of Oñate High School, is a sophomore at Brigham Young University-Idaho where she is studying music educa-

tion with an emphasis in choral music. Del Plain’s goal is to become a music teacher. The DIBI scholarship will be used to pay for the private voice lessons required of music education majors.

Del Plain said she attended the DIBI conference to better prepare for higher education and life, and learned how to manage anxiety when faced with obstacles in pursuit of achieving her goals.

Chamber's military event welcomes leaders from WSMR, Bliss

Community members gathered Friday Aug. 27 for a Chamber of Commerce-organized event to update Doña Ana County residents about military operations in the area.

Representing White Sands Missile Range were Command Sgt. Maj. Christopher Prosser and Col. Ryan Howell, garrison commander.

Howell said there is a lot of change happening at WSMR.

"There is a Special Forces element that has become permanently stationed at White Sands which is going to bring in hundreds of thousands of rotational forces," he said. "You are already probably seeing some of that influx. More and more people are coming to get trained at WSMR including ... some forces from Kirtland (Air Force Base) that are going to be permanently stationed here."

A new information systems facility broke ground this summer (a \$72 million, 56,268 square-foot, two-story building) which,

Howell said, is the first major construction project on WSMR in 20 years.

Prosser said Project Convergence, an Army experiment that took place last year at Yuma Proving Ground in Arizona will also take place at WSMR this year.

"Project Convergence is a campaign of learning to aggressively pursue an artificial intelligence and machine learning-enabled battlefield management system," according to the Army Futures Command website.

It means the Army will be able to get equipment to the soldier in the field faster, Prosser said.

"Because in the past it

may take from the time I joined the Army to the time I retire from the Army, 30 years, for a piece of equipment to make its way through the entire process," he said. "We really are trying to shorten that up."

Prosser also spoke about concerns as an aging civilian workforce is retiring from WSMR.

"We are looking at STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) employees," he said. "Right now, 26 percent of our entire workforce are retiring. What we are looking for in the future is to partner with the education system in the community."

Prosser turned the mic back to Howell to announce that the Bataan Memorial Death March will be live again for 2022 and there are many opportunities for community members to help and participate.

Lt. Col. David M. Hunter, garrison executive officer at Fort Bliss, spoke about Operation Allies Refuge, which is taking in Afghan refugees and housing them on the New Mexico portion of the installation.

"The numbers that Doña Ana range area operation ... vary day by day," he said. "We are providing services, housing — when our guests come over from Afghanistan, we provide a safe and secure place where they can actually be vetted as well as look out for what is next for them moving forward into the future."

He emphasized that Fort Bliss also continues to provide support for migrant children from Mexico with a safe and secured area to stay until they have a registered sponsor. The two efforts are not related, nor are

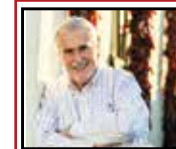

After high school, Norman moved to Albuquerque and enrolled at the University of New Mexico, supporting himself with a variety of jobs – as a factory worker, garbage collector, or night-shift receptionist at the old De Anza Motor Lodge. years of study and continued his education to earn a J.D. from the UNM School of Law in 1980. posing a 300- to 400-word patriotic-themed essay.

The Voice of Democracy program was established in 1947 to give high-school students an opportunity to express themselves on a “democratic and patriotic-themed, recorded essay,” the VFW said on its website.

The 2021-22 Voice of Democracy theme is

“America: Where Do We Go From Here?”

Each year, nearly 64,500 ninth- to 12th-grade students from across the country enter to win their share of more than \$2 million in educational scholarships and incentives, the VFW said. The national first-place winner receives a \$30,000 scholarship. Other scholarships awarded range from \$1,000 to \$16,000, and the first-place winner from each state wins a minimum scholarship of \$1,000.

Students in both contests begin by competing at the local post level. Post winners advance to district competitions, with district winners advancing to the state competition.

“It’s a family-friendly event,” said Witte, who has been NMDA secretary since May 2011.

Witte said Garrey Caruthers started AG Day when he became NMSU president in 2013 to recognize both NMSU — which opened as an agricultural and mechanical arts school in 1888 — and the state’s agriculture industry.

“There are a lot of good things about New Mexico agriculture that people take for granted,” Witte said. “Ag is why NMSU is here.”

Witte said the event is also a chance to cheer on the Aggie football team at its 2021 homecoming game.

“It’s going to be a really fun day,” Witte said. “The college is really gearing up. I think it’s going to be

a tremendous outpouring of support.”

“We are delighted to retake our tradition to celebrate agriculture and all that this magic word represents,” ACES Dean Rolando Flores said. “Agriculture is not only our source of food, but a tradition that has spanned generations in New Mexico. New Mexico leads nation in chiles, pecans; milk production on the rise

BULLETIN REPORT

In its latest New Mexico Agricultural Statistics Bulletin, published in November 2020, the New Mexico Department of Agriculture (NMDA) reported the total value of agriculture production in the state in 2019 was \$3.44 billion. After deductions for labor, production and other expenses, New Mexico’s net farm income was \$1.09 billion in 2019, a 7.6 percent increase over 2018, NMDA Secretary Jeff Witte said.

New Mexico was ranked first among all states in both chile (63,075 tons) and pecan (87.8 million pounds) production. Milk sales increased to \$1.38 billion in 2019, 14 percent higher than the year before.

The value of livestock production increased to \$2.43 billion in 2019, the report said. Crop value increased to \$706 million, up 3.6 percent from 2018.

New Mexico’s inventory of all cattle and calves was 1,450,000 head as of Jan. 1, 2020, the report said. That is down 2 percent from 2019. Milk cow inventory increased 1.5 percent to 330,000 head. Gross income from cattle and calves totaled \$998 million in 2019.

The state’s sheep and lamb inventory totaled 95,000 head as of Jan. 1, 2020, down 5 percent from 2019. The value of wool produced decreased 2.44 percent to \$1.281 million. The average price of wool held steady at \$2.10 per pound.

All hay harvested in New Mexico totaled 245,000 acres in 2019, down from 250,000 acres in 2018, the report said. The average price for all hay was \$223 per ton. Harvested alfalfa acreage was unchanged at 160,000 acres. The price of alfalfa hay averaged \$231 per ton in 2019.

Winter wheat production in the state totaled 3.15 million bushels in 2019, double 2018 production. Harvested acreage was unchanged at 105,000. The value of production was \$14.2 million, with an average price of \$4.50 per bushel.

‘Guardians’ take offbeat approach to saving the galaxy

If you like your Avengers — as in “Marvel’s The Avengers” — rough around the edges, with more than a dash of genre-spoofing irony, welcome to “Guardians of the Galaxy.”

Since the Marvel machine was having such a grand time at the box office lately by holding true to its traditions, via such characters as Spider-Man and Captain America, it’s great that the company was willing in 2014 to have some fun with itself by bringing perhaps its least-traditional franchise to the screen. If Marvel’s other characters are the Cadillacs of superheroes, these are the DeLoreans. TNT shows the result Tuesday, Sept. 7, and Wednesday, Sept. 8.

Comprised of various species with a variety of skills, the Guardians are led by the roguish Peter Quill (Chris Pratt, in a neat variation on the not-as-cool-as-he-thinks-he-is image that the actor had perfected in such television ventures as “Parks and Recreation”).

Those under his lead include a green-hued killer (Zoe Saldana), a literal muscle man (Dave Bautista, of wrestling fame), a raccoon (with the voice of Bradley Cooper) and a single-minded walking tree (voiced by Vin Diesel).

The gang’s mission is to keep a power-granting orb away from a warlord (Lee Pace, “Pushing Daisies”) who wants to use it against a planet. The action never gets too slick for the film’s purposes, though the special effects are right on par with other genre entries.

Ultimately, it’s the attitude of “Guardians of the Galaxy” that makes all the difference. Pratt joked in interviews about his amazement that he was playing a commander of otherworldly beings, and that sensibility infuses his performance, always reinforcing that this is meant to be an offbeat Marvel.

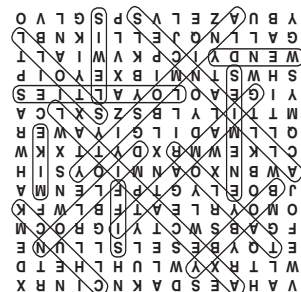

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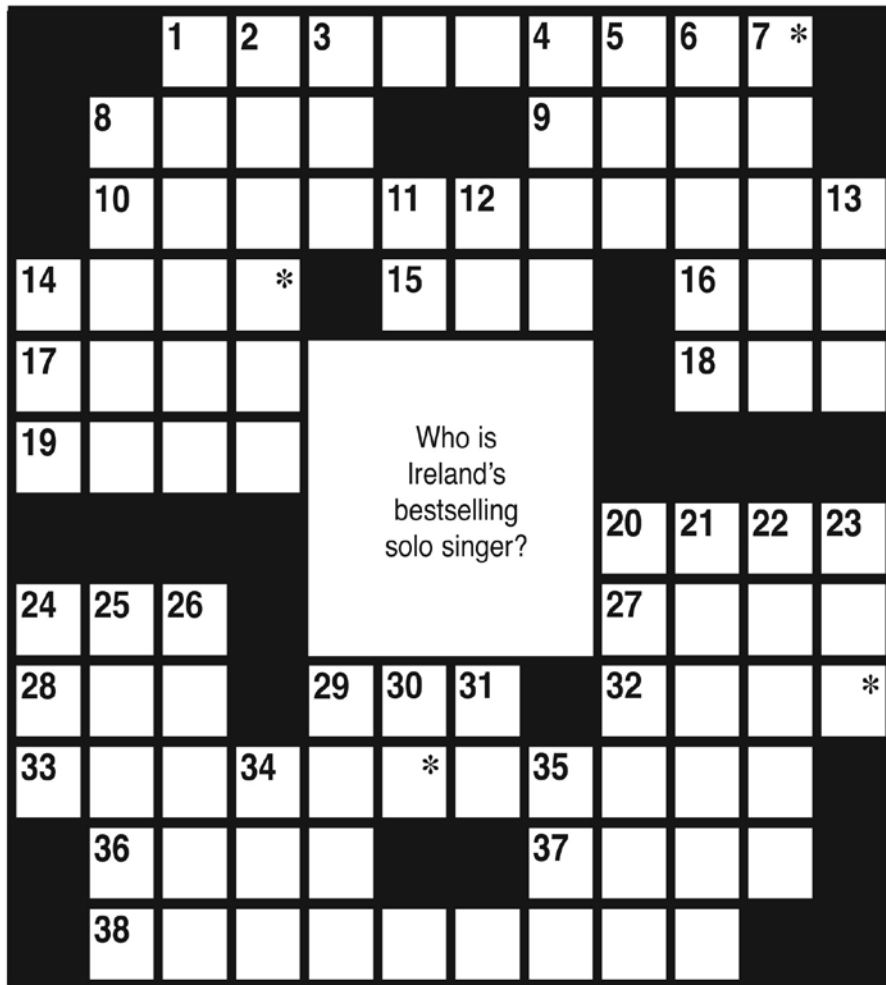

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DONA ANA COUNTY DISTRIBUTES OVER \$2 MILLION IN RENT AND UTILITIES ASSISTANCE SINCE JANUARY 2021



It has been two weeks since the flood event in the southern part of Doña Ana County was declared a disaster by Governor Lujan Grisham. First responders and community partners within the County initially rushed to preserve life and ensure that all residents' basic needs were met. Crews from the County's Flood Department, Engineering and Roads, and the Sheriff's Department have worked around the clock to stabilize the community and keep residents safe. "Thankfully the County dams did exactly what they were supposed to do, despite the extremely high rainfall we received in such a short period of time.

It is unfortunate, though, that even when the dams work correctly, members of our community can be impacted," said Emergency Management Supervisor Stephen Lopez. "I am thankful for all of the county staff that have helped from so many different departments to try to assist those who were affected by flooding, as well as the various churches and volunteer organizations that have stepped forward to help. It has taken a true team effort to try to get the residents back to some sense of normalcy." This week, reinforcements have come in to assist with the clean-up efforts. International organization, Team Rubicon, is in Doña Ana County offering humanitarian aid through Saturday. The mission of this team of veteran volunteers is to provide impactful service to communities affected by disaster. They are joining the County's efforts in putting the community back together. When Team Rubicon sent the call out for help, Greyshirts from Arizona and Northern New Mexico showed up to serve. Local mission-driven veteran organizations- The Mission Continues El Paso Platoon and Team Red, White, and Blue-El Paso- reached out to partner with Team Rubicon to be a part of the clean-up efforts as well. The volunteer groups, who bring their own teams and equipment, are helping residents by cutting down trees, removing debris, and cleaning.

These organizations fulfill their mission through donations to their cause. While serving in La Union, Our Lady of Refuge Catholic Church has offered its church hall as a rest and respite location for the veteran volunteers, and St. Luke United Methodist Church provides breakfast, lunch, and dinner to the groups as they support the community clean-up efforts.

On Thursday, Doña Ana County partnered with Casa de Peregrinos to schedule a special food distribution drive-thru event in the La Union community. "We recognized that while the flood event is over, helping the residents recover will be ongoing," said Director of HHS Jamie Michael. "Casa De Peregrinos is a great partner, recognizing the needs of the community and the urgency, they quickly responded and scheduled this special event. Home Depot has been here throughout the flood event activities, providing cleaning supplies. This is what community partnership looks like."

Since the beginning of the flood event, promotoras from the County's Health and Human Services department have been on the ground, interacting with the residents in the community hardest hit by the recent flood event, surveilling what the needs are. While engaging the La Union community, the County partnered with active community leaders to identify the best way to serve following the disaster. 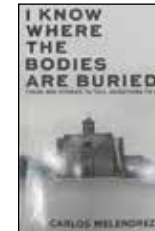

de Oro Prize in 1991; "Escrituras poéticas de una nación," which won the Lourdes Casal Prize in 1998; and "Ediciones El Puente en La Habana de los años 60."

Among his books of poetry are: "Un no rompido sueño," which won second prize in the Chicano-Latino Poetry Contest of 1994; "Aguja de diversos, Venturosos Journeys / Los viajes venturosos"; and the compilation "Cuerpos del delirio."

Part of the Mariel

Cuban exodus of 1980, Barquet is a New Mexico State University professor emeritus and founder and director of Ediciones La Mirada, a Las Cruces-based editorial house founded in 2014.

During Celebrate Authors, Barquet will discuss "Manifiesto inacabado de la hegemonía, nomenclatura y nomenclatura cultural de nuevo cuño y coña," a manifesto discovered in 2020 that describes the operation of a supposed chain of cultural supermarkets called "Gramsci" within the western world of the 21st century, as well as the behavior of its clients,

Barquet said.

He also will discuss Ediciones La Mirada, which has published 13 books of poetry in Spanish by Hispanic writers from the U.S., Cuba, Canada, Spain, Brazil, Chile and Costa Rica. Two of its most popular books, Barquet said, are "Imposeída" (the first compilation and Spanish translation of Mercedes de Acosta's poetry) and "Todo parecía" (the first anthology of LGBTQ topics in contemporary Cuban and Cuban-American poetry). In 2020, with "De cierta arena" by Las Cruces poet Maricela Duarte-Stern, La Mirada started the "Colección

Nuevas Voces (New Voices Collection)," dedicated to the first volume of poetry by Hispanic poets.

"Spanish poetry in particular is a highly regarded and centuries-long literary tradition that deserves to be carefully preserved and continued," Barquet said.

The Friends of Brani-gan Library started Celebrate Authors in 2014. The event was not held in 2020 because of the pandemic.

• Monday and Wednesday mornings, Oct. 11, 13, 18 and 20: Four speakers will make presentations about the history and impacts of immigration to the United States: Jeffrey

Brown, Ph.D. an NMSU emeritus faculty member; Neal Harvey, Ph.D. and Christa Slaton, Ph.D., both professors in the NMSU Government Department; and Nancy Oretskin, a professor in the NMSU Finance Department. human, animal and environmental connections through the lens of global epidemics and pandemics, as well as the responses to and community impacts of outbreaks. The exhibition has customized elements focusing on local responses to Covid-19 and includes 3D virus models printed by the Baker Bioanalysis Lab at NMSU.

“We customized the display with a couple of panels of Covid-19 in Las Cruces,” Otto said. “We worked on one with all the doctors and staff in local hospitals, as well as NMSU professors involved in the Covid 2 Home Project. We worked with Iván de la Rosa, social work professor, on another panel that highlights the unequal impacts of Covid-19 on people of color. Another section focuses on student experiences during Covid-19 and how their lives have changed during the course of the

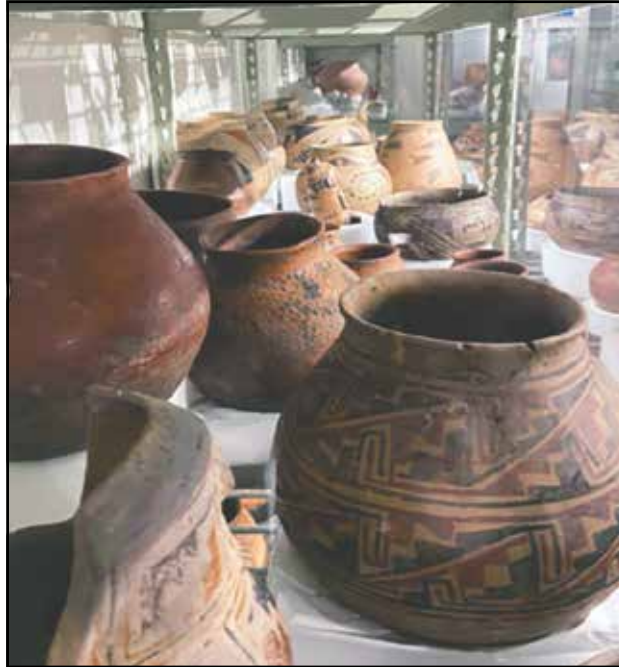
It explores the practice of Maya weaving in Chiapas, Mexico, and the many-layered relationships created as textiles circulate around the world. The exhibition was co-curated by Otto, NMSU professor emerita Christine Eber, the local organization Weaving for Justice and contributions from the Tsobol Antsetik weaving cooperative.

The permanent collection on display is “Pottery from the Americas,” an exhibition of prehistoric, historic and contemporary pottery from the Southwest and Mexico.

“Most people see museums as static,” Otto said. “We’re trying to show that museums are active and let people know through our blog about the work

going on right now. At any given time, we’re supporting student and faculty research, working on digitizing our collections, and sharing information about fun things we have in our collection.”

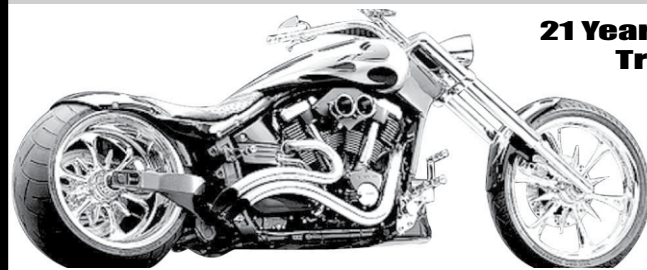

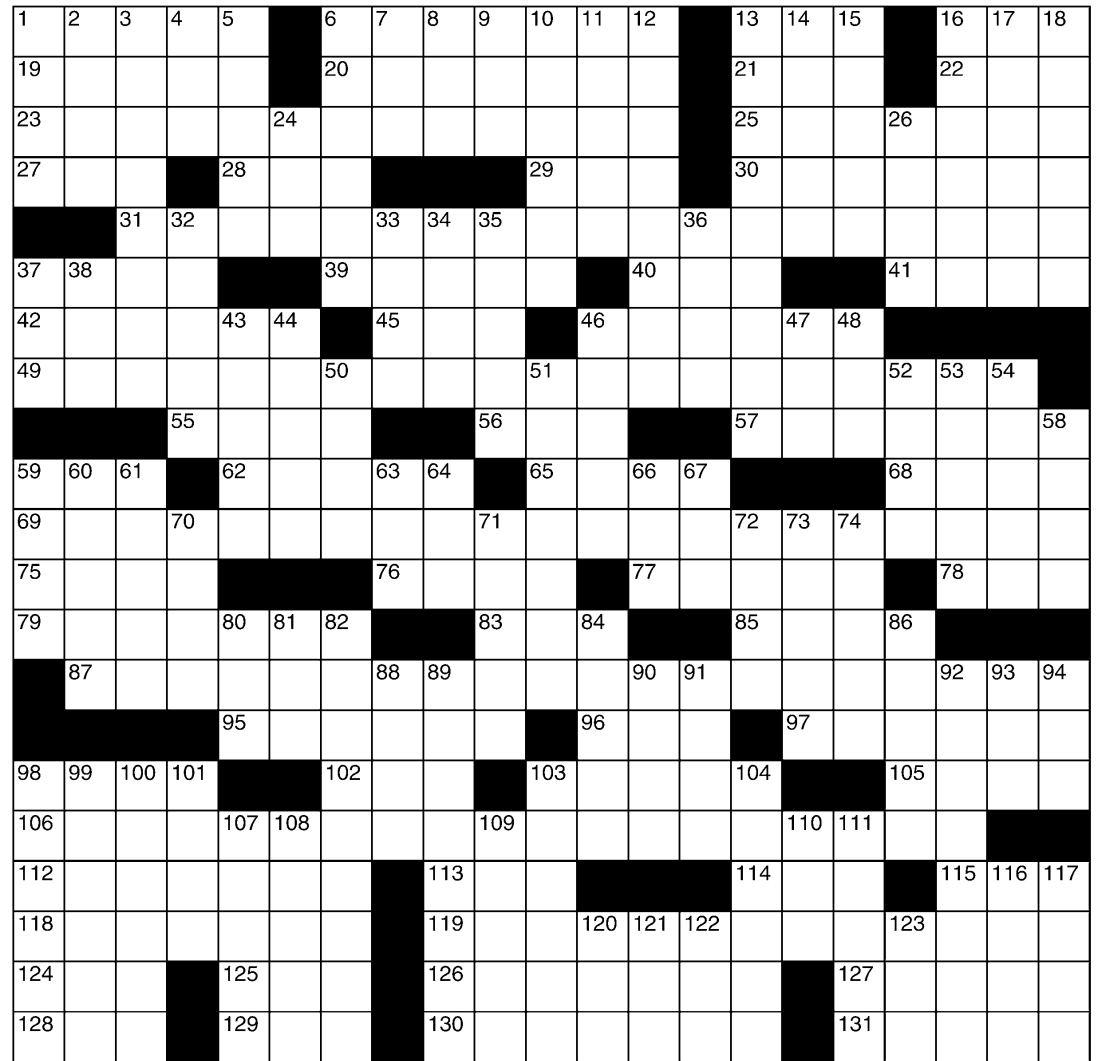

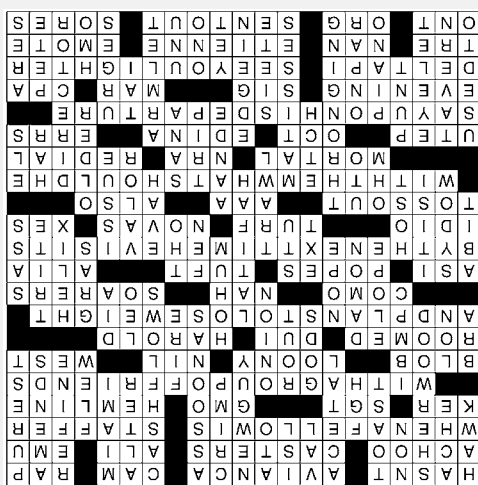

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Shunning social media can bring peace in hectic times

Two months ago, I quit going on Facebook. We were on vacation with no computer. I could have kept checking in on my phone, but I dropped Facebook as a vacation gift to myself. Vacation's long over. I haven't gone back on. I don't plan to, despite my curiosity about the interest groups I have belonged to in past years. I've never used Twitter, Snapchat, TikTok or any other online social media.

I've always called myself a selective Luddite. I retain an email account and I bank and pay bills online. I use PayPal. Not all technology is to be shunned, but you must be careful. Skype enables me to talk to my European grandchildren, but gas-powered leaf blowers should never have been

invented; they produce far more pollution than a broom.

Then, there is mental pollution, and that's what I avoid — or try to — by shunning most, if not all, online social media platforms. I prefer conversation, and not even on the phone: in person. Face to face. Or actual letters written by hand.

I'm not the first person to discover anew that quiet is better than noise, that genuine relationships are to be preferred to pretend "friendships" online, and that addiction to our phones is a social illness comparable to drugs and alcohol.

These are spiritual problems in contempo-

rary American society: the loss of quiet for solitude and meditation, the loss of relationships and addiction to the media. Go to any restaurant and watch what has happened to

interaction, particularly among younger people. Noses buried in phones rather than talk across a table.

French philosopher Jean-Claude Larchet recently wrote "The New Media Epidemic: The Undermining of Society, Family, and our own Soul," one of a spate of books that address problems we face from these new media. Larchet acknowledges the genuine advantages in com-

munication, information and access to cultural life which the media provide. He goes quickly, however, to the downside, which begins with the monopolization of time by social media — itself a kind of addiction.

Larchet recognized that marketing manipulation occurs when we use social media and this drives our addiction. You know how it works: look up a product on Amazon, and immediately Facebook and your smartphone sprout ads related to the last thing researched on Amazon.

This is the algorithmic funneling of attention. It shapes our whole lives, but however, not merely our product preferences. Social concepts, political positions and educational

preferences are funneled as well, and you wind up in an echo chamber or a silo.

You may think you are broadening your experience and your mind by engaging in social media, but you are confined to the interests you already carry. We expand, yes, but within a narrow band. We move from active to passive participation in life and, to add insult to injury, our attention span shrinks.

The substitution of "virtual" relationships for real ones bypasses the challenge the building of real relationships poses. It takes time and effort to develop relationships and communities, and time and effort are precisely what we misplace in addiction to social media.

Lastly: I've often written that paying attention is the heart of a spiritual approach to life. The opposite of attentiveness is distraction, and we are drowning in distractions via social media today. The information overload that overwhelms us when we do a Google search for a topic no matter how obscure is daunting and tiresome. For our sake and the sake of the next generation, we've got to gain control over the media rather than allowing them control over us.

Luther's legacy can be a complicated mix of greatness and darkness

Sometimes I wish Martin Luther would have died in 1539 at the age of 56, instead of in 1546 at the age of 62. I know, I know, what a horrible-sounding thing to think, especially by a Lutheran himself.

Bear with me for a moment.

Luther was a great man in many ways, and he shook up the world in such a dramatic way that the reverberations are still felt today. A doctor of theology and monk who considered himself loyal to the church and the pope at the time, Luther did not mean to start the

Reformation and split the church in Rome, yet his actions led to just such a religious, theological, political and societal earthquake; he became and is still seen as the main face of, and leader of, the Reformation.

Our great American Civil Rights martyr Martin Luther King Jr. is named after him.

Luther actually never left the Catholic Church; Rome kicked him out when Pope Leo X excom-

municated him in 1521.

In fact, Ol' Martin never wanted a religious denomination named after him called "Lutheran." He asked that anyone who followed his teachings be called simply

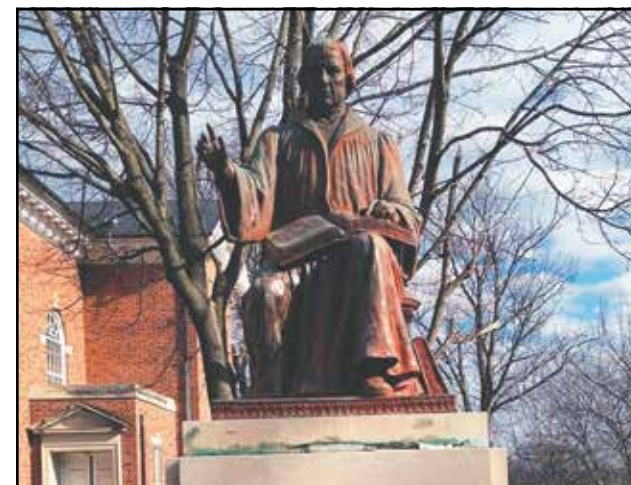
"Christians" and referred to himself as a "stinking bag of worms," no better than other sinners.

"Lutheran" was actually a word of derision used as a sneer by his enemies to refer to many "protestants" (the root word of which is "pro-

test.") Still the name stuck, and now, five centuries later, I and millions of others around the world refer to themselves as Lutherans.

I chuckle every time I think about the fact Luther loved beer and even married an ex-nun.

I even assert that despite a few theological points, some of today's Lutheran factions are closer to Roman Catholicism than to mainstream Protestant denominations. For instance, Lutherans and Catholics both believe

in the real presence of the Body and Blood of Christ in the Holy Eucharist. Luther just wasn't a big fan of all the details of transubstantiation as an explanation, but I find that a theological debate, not one to keep Christians apart. (If some of this is unclear, please take a moment or two at your convenience and Google these concepts. You'll find them interesting.)

In fact, I believe if Luther was alive today, he would have no problem with the Roman Catholic Church, at least big picture.

Heck even Pope Fran-

cis called Luther an important reformer of the church.

I feel good about this. I am proud to be a Lutheran and am very pleased to have born into a Lutheran family and raised such.

Still, there was a dark side to Luther, especially toward the end of his life. I do not refer to his famous temper or sometimes foul language to assert a point. I refer to his anti-Semitism. There were shades of that vile mindset earlier in life, as was common among Christians of the day (and sadly amongst some even to this day.) I do not mean to excuse any of it, but the virulence was not there in as much force. He

wrote an entire treatise explaining/reminding people Jesus was a Jew and that people of the same religion deserved peace and love. But he also believed Jews should convert to Christianity and, somehow for such a brilliant man, naïvely felt many would if they would only be taught the gospel of faith through grace and not the way the gospel had been taught, full of the teachings of works righteousness.

When this did not occur and he aged, the anti-Semitism reared its head in a big way. In 1543, three years before his death, Luther wrote "On the Jews and Their Lies" in which he called for Jews who had not converted to

Christianity to have no rights under the law and even have property taken away. He propagated lies such as Jews are thieves and wrote that Jews were no longer the chosen people of God. He wrote many more horrible things you can look up yourself.

One big grotesque result is that later Germans, even Nazis, pointed to these type of writings by Luther as evidence that Jews were lesser, evil beings and deserved to be treated as such.

How can I reconcile the Luther I love with the man who had such vile thoughts and feelings inside him?

The simple answer is I cannot.

History is history. There is an old joke among journalists that some people "Never let facts get in the way of a good story." Well, facts are facts.

In 1994, the Evangelical Lutheran Church issued a statement recognizing the extreme ills of some of Luther's writings and asked for prayer for the "Continued blessing of the Blessed One upon the increasing cooperation and understanding between Lutheran Christians and the Jewish Community."

Had Luther died in 1539 as I sometimes wish, some of his hatred would have still been already public, but the exceptionally vile works would have never seen the light of day.

Then again, maybe God purposely allowed him to live just long enough to reveal the worst of his sinful nature. Luther had been elevated to such a pedestal, the worst of darkness needed to be exposed, maybe not for his contemporaries, but for later generations like us.

After all, like Luther wrote of himself, we are all a "stinking bag of worms," and need grace.

"She is the best nurse I have ever had; she took

such good care of me," a patient wrote of McMurray's compassion, MMC said. "She would come and fix my pillow, adjust my bed and see that I was comfortable. She really deserves being a nurse. She would come right away when I needed her. She deserves something special."

The DAISY Foundation is a nonprofit established in memory of J. Patrick Barnes by members of his family. Barnes died at age 33 in 1999 from complications of Idiopathic Thrombocytopenic Purpura, a little known

but not uncommon autoimmune disease. DAISY is an acronym for Diseases Attacking the Immune System. The care Barnes and his family received from nurses while he was ill inspired this unique means of thanking nurses for making a profound difference in the lives of their patients and patient families, the MMC news release said.

"We are proud that our participation in the DAISY Program is a powerful way we continue to

honor the hard work of our nurses," said MMC Chief Nursing Officer Caryn Iverson.

Award recipients are chosen by an MMC committee. Each honoree receives a certificate commending her or him as an "extraordinary nurse," a pin and a sculpture called "A Healer's Touch," hand-carved by artists of the Shona tribe in Zimbabwe.

Dincoff, who has trained, worked and coached here in Las Cruces for the past four years, qualified for the Tokyo Olympics in the women's discus.

She didn't make it to the finals in her event, after throwing 56.22 meters or 184 feet, 5 inches.

That placed her 12th out of 15 athletes in her qualifying pool.

Her personal best is

64.41 meters or 211-3, which she did at the Tucson Elite Classic this past spring.

"Of course, I wanted to do better, but I have to look at it that this as my first Olympics," Dincoff said in an interview with *The Las Cruces Bulletin*. "My goals are actually a bit bigger. I want to use

this experience to get where I want to be next."

And where is that? "My next goal is to be on the podium. I would like to train and win a gold medal," Dincoff said.

For now, Dincoff is in New Jersey, taking some much-deserved time off. Her boyfriend, Carl Lawson, is a defensive end

with the New York Jets. Unfortunately, he recently injured his Achilles' tendon and has been ruled out for the season.

Dincoff said she is taking care of him and then will get ready for the next step in her track career journey.

She has spent the past four years as a volunteer assistant coach with the New Mexico State University women's track team, but will soon be moving from Las Cruces.

She followed her coach, Doug Reynolds, out here when he took over as the Aggie track program's head coach. Reynolds has accepted a job as the throwing coach at Florida State and Dincoff said she will eventually move to

Tallahassee to continue her training with him.

Dincoff called her time in Las Cruces "amazing."

"I have so many memories, and it was such a beautiful part of this journey," she said. "I am grateful for the experience. I would never have made my way out to Las Cruces or that part of the country, if it wasn't for my coach moving there."

"I haven't processed (moving yet)," she said.

"It will be exciting to have a new journey. I am definitely sad not to be around the friends I have made in the last four years. The good thing is: That doesn't mean I stop being friends with these people and will come back and visit."

She said she doesn't plan to coach at Florida State but may help out once in a while. Instead, she plans to work part time and focus on her track career.

And that means setting her sights on the next Olympic Games which will be in Paris in 2024.

Making the Tokyo games was "validation for all the hard work I have poured into this," she said.

"It's important to celebrate your victories," Dincoff said. "I haven't reached all my goals, but I have reached many of them. It still leaves me hungry for more and that hunger will get me up in the morning and push me in my training."

And "Never up, never in." It seems I've been hearing more "mental" type clichés lately. So I'm going to explore some of my favorite mental clichés and take a look at what they might mean.

My favorite is: "It's all in your head." This probably got started when

folks felt sick but had no obvious physical signs or symptoms to prove their illness. I used to hear this at our Performance Golf Schools when a high-handicapper turns to me and says, "You know, my biggest problem is that it's all in my head." I often fight back to urge to reply bluntly, "No, it's mostly because you can't get the ball airborne and you don't know how to make a correct golf swing."

Here is one of the mental clichés I encounter regularly while playing golf,

especially with folks who are in the midst of a score meltdown: "I just lost my focus." After many years of this, I've come to substitute terms like concentration, attention, mindfulness, commitment and discipline for focus. That cutie is often trotted out with total oblivion to the cell phone that has been permanently affixed to the golfer's ear since the round began, and may need to be surgically removed sometime later. The real message here is, "I'm too busy and important to put my total energy and interest into today's golf game."

If we want to improve our focus and ability to concentrate on the task right now, we simply must have a routine we follow that makes us comfortable and centered. Total focus is something learned and practiced. Mr. Nicklaus had it. Mr. Hogan had it. Ms. Sorenstam had it. Mr. Woods had it.

"I was thinking too much" is one cliché I hear a lot. This is mostly a nervous reaction to a badly missed shot. What is really going on is something like, "I knew I was in between clubs, and I failed to make a firm decision and commit to it." As I

size up golfers, both chops and sticks, I don't see the problem as thinking too much, or too little for that matter. Only at the wrong time.

Then there's this one, immediately following a painful shriek or wail as the ball sails clear out of bounds or into a lake: "That's just what I didn't want to do!" It turns out that what our intrepid golfer has gotten in the habit of is immediately before taking his swing is picturing the very negative outcome he wants to avoid, thereby making a brainless self-fulfilling prophesy. I'll give those

of you who have done this stupid little cliché (you know who you are) a nifty cheap psychological tip: the mind doesn't understand the word "don't," especially under pressure, and with all those vague swing thoughts swimming around in your head. The athletic mind is much better at processing self-generated visual images, located in the "mind's eye," of what we intend to do; the visceral golfer is much better at remaining steady and calm with strictly positive swing thoughts. Always keep
