# State requires masks be worn indoors in public places again

Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham re-implemented a statewide requirement that facemasks be worn in all public indoor spaces, effective Friday, Aug. 20, and continuing at least through Sept. 15.

The mandate is in effect with only limited exceptions and regardless of vaccination status, to stem the state's rising tide of Covid-19 infections and hospitalizations.

"Given the slowing of vaccination rates since a peak several months ago, the governor also announced the state will issue a requirement for all workers in certain medical close-contact congregate settings — including hospitals, nursing homes, juvenile justice facilities, rehabilitation facilities, state correctional facilities and more — to be vaccinated against Covid-19," the news release said.

The state also issued a requirement that all workers at private, public and charter schools in New Mexico either be vaccinated against COVID-19 or otherwise submit to Covid-19 testing on a weekly basis.

This policy aligns with the state's requirement for all state government personnel.

The spread of Covid-19 in New Mexico has increased dramatically in recent weeks, driven by the highly infectious "Delta" variant and primarily unvaccinated populations. State modeling projects that New Mexico

will reach 1,000 new daily cases of Covid-19 by the end of August, and as many as 1,000 new daily cases in southeastern New Mexico alone in the weeks after that.

Hospitalizations for Covid-19 in New Mexico had sharply risen to a six-month high as of Aug. 16. Hospital leaders, acknowledging some state facilities already reaching or exceeding 100 percent capacity, have recently amplified their calls for unvaccinated New Mexicans to vaccinate and help forestall a projected shortage of hospital resources amid the projected fall surge. New Mexico has one of the lowest numbers of per-capita hospital beds in the U.S., and rising virus hospitalizations create a ripple effect, hospital leaders say, for other individuals who need care for other purposes within the health care system.

Masks and vaccines, the governor said, are the two tools the state will use to

protect scarce hospital resources and the state's ongoing economic recovery.

"We all have a role to play," Lujan Grisham said. "No one wants to go backward. No one wants to see our recovery endangered by another — and preventable — surge of serious illness. No one wants a full hospital turning away New Mexicans who need care. So mask up indoors to stop the spread. And vaccinate if you haven't vaccinated. These two simple steps will protect our health care resources and ensure our economy can continue to rebound."

Under a public health order issued by state Department of Health Interim Sec. David R. Scrase, M.D., the re-implemented mask requirement applies to all individuals aged 2 and older in all indoor public settings — except when eating or drinking.

Masks will be required

# Community pays tribute to iconic restaurateur Roberto Estrada

“Las Cruces can, and will, be a better place if we will try to emulate the qualities that made Roberto so special,” said Steve Ramirez about his longtime friend and Las Cruces icon, Roberto Estrada, who died Aug. 18 at age 84.

Estrada started the Whole Enchilada Festival, which gained international attention and was named one of the strangest food festivals in America by USA Today in 2015, which was the last year of the festival. His world-renowned enchilada (measuring 10-plus feet in diameter) included more than 1,000 pounds of ingredients. Estrada

started the festival in 1980 and cooked for 32 of its

34 years. His giant enchilada even made it into the

Guinness Book of World Records.

“Roberto was, and his spirit always will be, the epitome of what most Las Cruces strive to be,” said Ramirez, who is a writer for the City of Las Cruces communications office, and before that, a longtime reporter with the Las Cruces Sun-News. “Roberto was the role model of all the qualities Las Cruces strive to be. He was kind and respectful to everyone he met. He was empathetic and sympathetic to those less fortunate and those who were dealing with hardship. Roberto’s generosity was overwhelming and his support for the community unwavering. He gave of himself and all too often asked for nothing in return.”

“Roberto was a very

giving and humble gentleman,” said Mayor Ken Miyagishima. “He would often donate food to anyone, any organization, including fundraisers, all for free! He was also a good businessman; not only did he own a restaurant, he owned the tortilla company and sells his tortillas in most grocery stores throughout New Mexico. He is our icon and has dealt Las Cruces a huge loss. May he rest in peace.”

“Mr. Estrada was a shining example of what it meant to love your community, support your community and always support those in your community,” said The Game and Game II owner

# Council votes to allocate rescue funds, limit plastic bag use

The Las Cruces City Council had unanimous votes at its Aug. 16 regular meeting to spend millions of dollars in American Recovery Plan Act (ARPA) funds, limit the use of single-use plastic bags in the city and adopt a new animal ordinance that includes a trap-neuter-return program.

### ARPA funds

After several months of extensive discussions, the Las Cruces City Council voted 6-0 at its Aug. 16 regular meeting to adopt a resolution authorizing the city to accept a budget adjustment allocating a first tranche of almost \$12.4 million in ARPA money.

The first tranche of

ARPA funding allocations will include:

- Public health response: \$525,000 for Las Cruces Fire Department Mobile Integrated Health squad vehicles; \$160,00 for Las Cruces Police Department victims assistance and community assistance vehicles; \$40,000 for police communications equipment; \$35,000 for personal protective equipment; and emergency response;

- Revenue loss and economic impact: \$429,030 to be used to help construct a competitive community pool; \$2,330,915 to construct a transit maintenance building; \$4,128,725 that will be used to help fund general obligation bond projects; \$500,000 for Visit Las Cruces tourism and hospitality programs;

and \$2,806,243 for community and economic development initiatives that will help address negative economic impacts;

- Water and sewer improvements: \$425,000 for a sewer connect program;
- Premium pay: \$1 million for essential city employees pay.

In response to economic hardships because of the coronavirus pandemic, ARPA funding will provide direct allocations to the city to aid in recovery efforts. A second tranche of almost \$12.4 million will be received by the city in May 2022. All told, the city will be allocated almost \$24.8 million.

### Plastic bag limits

The council unanimously adopted an ordinance to limit the use of

single-use plastic carryout bags in certain retail operations in Las Cruces. The ordinance will go into effect Jan. 1, 2022.

After a written first warning, the ordinance will include a \$100 fine for a first offense to retailers.

The uses of single-use plastic bags and their typical disposal rates create an impediment to the city's waste reduction and recycling goals while creating unsightly litter.

Single-use plastic bags are difficult to recycle and frequently contaminate materials that are processed through the city's curbside recycling program. Reusable bags are the preferred option to reduce waste and litter, protect wildlife and conserve resources and help eliminate a source

for toxins.

Of 1,600 residents who responded to a city survey, 70 percent said they would start or continue using reusable bags or buy bags as a result of the ordinance.

Several types of plastic bags will be excluded from the ordinance. Those include: laundry dry cleaning bags; door-hangar bags; newspaper bags; and packages of multiple bags intended for disposing of garbage, pet waste and yard waste; plastic bags used by pharmacies or veterinarians for prescriptions or other medical necessities; bags to take away prepared foods from a restaurant; bags used inside a retail establishment to carry bulk items such as produce, frozen foods, unwrapped

prepared foods or bakery goods. Also excluded will be bags used by nonprofit agencies or hunger relief charities to distribute food, groceries, clothing or household items.

Additionally, city council voted 6-0 to adopt an ordinance that repeals and replaces Chapter 7, Animals, in the Las Cruces Municipal Code with a new version that includes provisions for a trap-neuter-return (TNR) Program.

The TNR program will provide a humane alternative to euthanasia to control feral cat populations by live-trapping cats, spaying or neutering them, ear-tipping the cats for identification, vaccinating them and then returning them to the area where they were trapped.

# Las Cruces journalist Steve Ramirez remembers his friend Roberto

I've known of Roberto and his family for about as long as I can remember. Like so many Las Cruces who have lived through the years in the Mesquite Historic District neighborhood, Roberto and his family were pretty well known.

It was the old saying that "What You See" of Roberto was "What You Got." He was a quiet and humble man if he didn't know you well. But if he knew you, he had a good sense of humor, and he had a knack of putting you at ease. He had a way of making everyone feel important.

Roberto didn't especially like the limelight. From my perspective, he often tried to shy away from interviews, but, interestingly, didn't run away from them, either.

For times that I had to interview him for a story or to get information about an event, I often had to contact him through private numbers he would share with me. Interviews were never conducted between 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. That time block was his to prepare for lunch and through the lunch rush. He often would take time between 2 p.m. and 4:30 p.m. for interviews and

such, again, apparently so those things didn't disrupt the dinner hour.

Roberto, the public figure, was a bit different than Roberto Estrada, the person. He almost always seemed more relaxed when you were just talking, visiting with him one-on-one. That's when I would see more of

his humor, warmth and compassion. In either scenario, I've always sensed a genuine compassion he had for people.

So many people came to him with requests. With me, I would like to believe he could come to me when he needed to get the word out about something he was directly involved in. He would call, explain what it was he was working on and we would go from there. I'd like to think, in that regard, I had earned his trust.

Did you know that his preparation to cook The Whole Enchilada involved a lot of painstaking work? He often spent winters, springs and summers updating and upgrading the equipment he needed to cook the enchilada. As the event drew near, most years he didn't get very

much sleep in days leading to the event. On the Sunday The Whole Enchilada was cooked, Roberto would begin preparing about 2 a.m. and often worked for several hours after the enchilada was made.

He often tried to seek donations for what he needed to cook the enormous enchilada, but just as often he ended up pay-

ing for those ingredients out of his own pocket. All those years Roberto cooked The Whole Enchilada, he never once said, or even estimated, how much it cost to make it.

Even small projects such as planting a tree or installing fence posts can be very dangerous if you do not know what utilities are buried around your dig site. Whether you are a professional

excavator or homeowner, you can be fined AND held financially responsible for repair costs to damaged utilities when 811 is not called. How it works:

1. Use white spray paint and/or white marker flags to mark the ground where you plan to dig.
2. Call 811 two business days before beginning your project and they will alert all of the local utilities to respond to your dig site and mark where the utility lines are buried. Utility companies will have two days, once notified, to respond to your dig site.
3. Once utilities are marked, you must adhere to the "18 inch" rule, which is no mechanical digging (tractor, auger, etc.) within 18 inches of the utility markings. If you must dig within 18 inches of a utility marking, it has to be hand dug or vacuum excavated.
4. Once all of the utilities have been marked, you will have 15 days to complete your digging project. If your project is not complete in that time frame, you must call 811 again.

## Forty years later, nobody can beat Sisbarro

Pat and Lou Sisbarro sat at La Posta, sharing a meal, discussing decisions and thinking about the future.

This meal could have happened last week, but it didn't.

It happened 40 summers ago, in 1981.

"Here we were in Las Cruces, where we didn't know a soul," said Lou.

He brought Pat from Michigan to look at a Las Cruces car dealership that had gone through three owners in four years.

"We had just been to the dealership and were considering buying it. We had lunch at La Posta, and put a pencil to things and the prospect of moving across country. We had three little kids."

"They were 9, 10 and 11," Pat said.

The couple had grown up in New Jersey, and moved to Flint, Michigan, as Lou attended the General Motors

Institute.

He learned the car business, and a friend's father-in-law

owned a dealership in nearby Fenton, Michigan, where Lou cut his teeth on sales.

In 1969, while American astronauts were landing on the moon, Lou was trying to land paying customers on a used car lot.

Today, he still has a clear picture of that first sale.

"It was a 1965 Buick Electra 225," Lou says with a grin.

"And the couple that bought it, I can't quite recall their names, but I remember their faces like it was yesterday."

He became a partner in a dealership but eventually wanted to run his own show.

A dozen years after that first sale, July 15, 1981, to be precise, Lou Sisbarro had his name on a dealership in southern New Mexico.

Forty years later, are there any regrets?

"Not one," said Lou. "Never a doubt. Pretty early on, I was talking with Pat and I remember saying, 'This is going to do better than I ever expected.'"

In 1983, Sisbarro added a used car lot, Bi-State on North Main Street.

In 1985, they opened the Volkswagen dealership on Valley Drive, where it remains today.

And in 1995, they opened their dealership in Deming.

What began with 15 employees, selling about 25 cars a month, has grown to about 150 employees, selling hundreds of cars a month.

Sisbarro estimates his dealerships have sold around 150,000 cars in the intervening 40 years.

"It didn't just happen," Pat said. "We worked hard."

"On Sunday, the store was closed, so we'd go down as a family and work as the cleaning crew," Pat continued. "We

couldn't afford janitors at that point. We really did put our heart and soul into it."

The heart and soul of any organization are the people who make it go.

As the Sisbarro dealerships grew, and the number of employees increased, Pat and Lou realized their co-workers had become friends and another arm of the family.

"We have 14 employees who've been here more than 25 years," Pat said.

They've seen young people come to work, watched them get married, raise children, and in many cases, become grandparents.

They've seen those bright times, but also darker times.

They've had employees struggle with personal issues, including substance abuse.

"We didn't fire them," Lou said. "We paid for their rehab. You can't turn your back on your people."

# Las Cruces plastics ban needed, but new fee adds up to headache

I don't like plastic bags any more than members of the Las Cruces City Council, who recently passed a ban on them starting Jan. 1.

It's not just their uncanny ability to escape confinement and sail into the nearest tree or bush, where they will flap in the breeze until somebody comes along and dislodges them. The health and ecological damages caused by plastic bags goes beyond just being an eyesore.

According to the Center for Biological Diversity, about 730,000 tons of plastic bags, sacks and wraps were produced in the United States in 2015. Less than 13 percent of that will be recycled. The rest will be dumped in a landfill or, worse, in the ocean.

Plastics stored in a

landfill never fully degrade. Instead, they break down into microplastics, which absorb toxins and present health dangers to both humans and wildlife.

We eat, drink and inhale these microplastics every day, without knowing it, according to the Plastics Health Coalition. Many products contain chemical additives associated with hormone-related cancers, infertility and neurodevelopment disorders such as autism.

And so, the Las Cruces City Council was responding to a real and growing threat when it voted to ban single-use plastic bags starting next year, with exemptions for things like drycleaning bags and newspaper wrappers on a rainy day.

I understand what they're trying to do and why it needs to be done. If they had passed an ordinance that simply banned single-use plastic bags, my column today would be in full support of that decision.

Unfortunately, the ordinance does not stop there. It includes a new fee that will create an unnecessary burden for store owners and an additional cost for shoppers.

The ordinance requires that stores charge customers 10 cents a bag for each paper bag they use. Those who qualify for federal food assistance programs would be exempt from the fee. The stores will then be required to file quarterly reports with the city on how many bags were given away and how many 10-cent fees were collected.

The city and the store

will then split that new fee money evenly, with the store using its share to cover the transition away from plastic bags.

The city will reportedly use its share to educate the public on the need to stop using plastic bags. I'm not sure how much of an education campaign is necessary once the bags are banned.

City Sustainability Officer Lisa LaRocque explained during a recent radio interview that the fee is intended to encourage people to bring reusable cloth bags with them

each time they shop. And, maybe a 10 cent reminder will have that effect on some. But the additional burden it will place on retailers would seem to outweigh whatever advantage the new fee will have.

It would be far easier for store owners to comply with the new ban if the city government just got out of the way and let them figure out how best to serve their customers.

Beyond that, by introducing a new fee as part of this process, members of the City Council look like they're trying to gain

a financial benefit from something that needs to be done to protect our health and environment. And, they're doing it at a time when the city is absolutely awash in federal pandemic relief money, with millions more for the city to follow if the infrastructure bill goes through.

Every new city ordinance doesn't need to be an opportunity to collect a new fee.

# Chile growers, processors encouraged to apply for labor funding

We're all familiar with the unmistakable aroma of fresh green chile being roasted this time of year. Chile is a beloved crop in our state. Used in family recipes, for spices, on cheeseburgers, and even used in wine and in peanut brittle, New Mexico chile is one of a kind, and

it's known worldwide.

New Mexico leads the nation, producing 76.8 percent of the U.S. total chile pepper production. Total chile production for 2020 in New Mexico was 68,000 tons, which included 60,200 tons of green chile and 7,800 tons of red chile.

The value of New Mexico chile production in 2020 was estimated at \$51.9 million.

Harvest for the 2021 season began as early as July, and there are many more chile peppers that need to come off the vine. However, there are concerns about a labor shortage

that could impact the 2021 production of the state's signature crop.

Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham announced Aug. 12 the state of New Mexico will commit \$5 million to pilot a wage supplement program for the chile industry. Funding will come from the state's share of federal stimulus distributed through the American Rescue Plan, and the

New Mexico Department of Agriculture is administering the program.

Funding will be awarded on a reimbursement basis to supplement the wages of existing and prospective workers. Claims may be submitted to NMDA on a weekly, monthly or season-end basis. Early and frequent claims are encouraged, as funds are limited and will

be dispersed on a first-come, first-served basis until all the funding has been used.

# Lowe's, HSR volunteers remove stucco from CCC schoolhouse

More than 30 volunteers showed up at Human Systems Research, Inc. (HSR) headquarters in Las Cruces about 7 a.m. Tuesday morning, Aug. 17, to wield hammers, chisels, shovels, picks, rakes, jackhammers, wheelbarrows and other tools, as they removed the 83-year-old building's exterior stucco plaster as part of a major renovation project.

Most of the work was done by volunteers from Lowe's Home Improvement stores in Las Cruces, El Paso and Alamogordo. Lowe's Corp. also gave HSR a monetary grant to help pay for the removal and the application of a new exterior coating.

"The productivity of Las Cruces Lowe's store captain Kevin Quinn and his team of 30 Lowe's store volunteers was truly amazing to witness," said

HSR Executive Director Deborah M. Dennis. "They were a whirlwind of activity removing all the exterior concrete stucco in a single day. While the scheduled finish time was 4 p.m., the team actually wrapped up at 1. The concrete stucco was not only removed, but

the property was left spotless with all the removed stucco in two 30 cubic-yard roll-offs (Dumpsters) waiting for the City (of Las Cruces) Solid Waste Department to haul them off. This special team of Lowe's volunteers and what they accomplished during Lowe's Red Vest

Impact Tuesday is now forever part of the many inspirational stories that have emerged from this historic building," Dennis said.

The HSR building, 535 S. Melendres St., "is the last of the historic Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) camp schoolhouses

still standing in New Mexico," Dennis said.

Built in 1938, the building is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

The cement stucco that was removed was not original to the building, Dennis said. "Lime plaster and lime wash had been the original cover. Sometime in the 1960s, concrete stucco became a fashionable building material."

The renovation comes just in time for HSR's 50th anniversary, which it will celebrate in February

2022.

HSR is the oldest nonprofit in New Mexico doing anthropological and archaeological research and preservation work.

HSR was one of 100 Lowe's grant recipients in 37 states selected from about 2,200 applications received from across the country, Dennis said.

It was one of two New Mexico projects selected and the only one in southern New Mexico.

## Nearly 60 candidates file in local city, school board and other races

A total of 59 candidates filed Tuesday, Aug. 24, for nearly 40 municipal offices in Las Cruces, Mesilla, Anthony, Sunland Park and Hatch; boards of education in the county's three school districts; the Doña Ana and Caballo soil and water conservation district boards of supervisors; and several other boards that will be on the Nov. 2 ballot.

Candidates still must be

certified by the secretary of state's office. Aug. 31 is the filing day for write-in candidates.

It appears that the Las Cruces City Council District 5 race is the only one that will use ranked choice voting this year. Four candidates: Ronnie M. Sisneros, Becky Ann Corran, Normand Robert Paquette and David A. Telford, filed for the seat currently held by Gill Sorg, who is not running for re-election. (Sorg is staying in the political arena. He

filed as one of five candidates for two seats on the Doña Ana Soil and Water Conservation District.)

Ranked choice voting is only used in races with three or more candidates, and the City of Las Cruces is the only governmental entity in the county that's adopted it.

Candidates for Las Cruces City Council District 3 are Bev Courtney and Becki A. Graham. The seat is currently held by Gabriel Vasquez, who is not running for re-election.

In District 6, incumbent Yvonne Flores will be opposed by William Beerman.

In Mesilla, three candidates filed for two at-large trustee positions: incumbent Carlos Arzabal, Adrianna C. Merrick and Biviana M. Cadena.

There is no race for mayor in Las Cruces or Mesilla this year.

Incumbent Anthony, New Mexico, Mayor Diana Murillo-Trujillo filed for re-election. She has two opponents. Murillo-

Trujillo is also a member of the Doña Ana County Commission. Hatch Mayor Andy Nuñez filed for re-election and has three opponents.

In Las Cruces Public Schools Board of Education races, incumbent Ray Jaramillo will be opposed by Abelardo Balcazar in District 1; incumbent Pamela Cort, appointed by the school board following the resignation of Terrie Dallman in July, is opposed by Henry Young; and in District 3,

Robert Wofford is running against Eloy Francisco Macha. Incumbent Maria Flores is not running again.

"Every single person is to be admired for their willingness to step up," County Clerk Amanda Lopez Askin said.

The county clerk's office will administer the election for all participating entities, Lopez Askin said, as they all opted into the Local Government Act passed by the New Mexico Legislature in 2019.

# Tents to Rents goal is \$60K; participants, sponsors needed

Mesilla Valley Community of Hope (MVCH) will launch its 2021 Tents to Rents (T2R) fundraising program Sept. 3, with a goal of \$60,000 to help people in Las Cruces who are struggling with homelessness to move from MVCH's Camp Hope tent city at MVCH, 999 W. Amador Ave., into their own apartments.

The fundraising effort will continue through Oct. 8.

Participants and sponsors are invited to

participate, said MVCH Executive Director Nicole Martinez.

"We hope to have at least 12 participants who will use their social networks and contacts to help raise money for Community of Hope," Martinez said, adding that MVCH will hold a Sept. 1 orientation session for this year's participants. "Last year, we raised \$57,870. This year, it would be great to raise \$60,000. We have committed to using T2R to pay all security deposits for people moving into the Desert Hope Apartments."

Desert Hope is a 40-unit apartment complex on Pecos Street for people who have been living in shelters or on the street.

Martinez came up with the idea for Tents to Rents in 2016. That year, with 10 participants and four sponsors, it raised more than \$13,000. In 2017, with 10 participants and 13 sponsors, fundraising reached more than \$28,000. In 2018, 15 participants and 22 sponsors raised more than \$53,000. The 2019 event, with 16 participants and 14 sponsors, raised almost \$52,000.

"Without the community's help in raising funds for Camp Hope, we would be unable to operate this safe outdoor space that shelters hundreds of people per year," Martinez said.

"We are grateful to the participants, sponsors and donors who have impacted peoples' lives by helping to end homelessness in Doña Ana County," Martinez continued.

## SCSWA Flexible Residents' Needs After Emergencies

After the recent flooding, SCSWA has extended hours for the La Union County Collection Center at 2590 Visnaga Street to help the residents dispose of contaminated household goods affected by water and mud damage.

La Union, New Mexico, and its residents were tested by extreme weather that led to flooding and unfortunate damage to property. Thick mud destroyed furniture and appliances. It made for habitat for mold in rugs. It knocked over fences and brought down tree limbs. It made a lot of trash.

With South Central Solid Waste Authority managing a county collection center in La Union at 2590 Visnaga Street, the staff knew that extra availability for trash disposal might be needed for residents who would be cleaning up.

"We began mobilizing our operational response to the rain event as early as Friday when we predicted an increase in waste," explained Rafael Leos, SCSWA deputy director. "We brought extra containers and extra staff for extra oversight."

"When the evacuation was proclaimed, we had our response team ready even though we didn't have as many patrons as we thought we might have at that time," he said.

"This was a situation where we need to exercise our obligatory duty to report these changes to the New Mexico Environment Department," Leos said. "But it was also an event that allowed our management to pull together our resources and staff in addition to the County's. When the call came from the County, we were ready to provide relief."

Doña Ana County Assistant County Manager Chuck McMahon explained that they have a great collaboration with SCSWA, particularly during emergencies. "SCSWA is a good partner who is willing to provide

support for residents to get rid of trash and get back to recovery and repairing their homes," he said.

"Sometimes things happen on short notice, and it's good to have the flexibility with our emergency response," said McMahon.

In this case, the La Union county collection center had longer hours for residents that needed more time to drop off cabinetry and household goods that might have been contaminated and unhygienic, especially if the repair work for families may happen on top of a full day's work.

"It's better to be ready for our customers and make sure they can focus on rebuilding and not worrying about where they can dump their trash in an emergency," said Leos.

# Las Cruces Utilities Aids with Local Flooding

Emergencies happen at all hours of the day, and Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) is prepared to jump into action – day or night, and even rain or shine. With rain threatening to overwhelm holding pools, LCU sent crews to ensure that families were kept safe during the storm.

“Our crews went above the call of duty and made sure that water that was already pooling didn’t back up into the neighborhood,” LCU Interim Deputy Director Ronald N. Borunda said.

On-call that weekend was Water Distribution Crew Leader Mike Lara. It had been raining all day, and Lara knew that their services might be required. “We went in at around 2 a.m. on



Saturday and stayed until about 3:00 a.m. on Sunday,” Lara said.

Along with Heavy Equipment Operators Donnail Bailey and Ricardo Gomez, the crew took out the “Ditch Witch,” which is the name for the company that supplies the specialized vacuum pump. It can drain 800 gallons per hour.

Residents slept

through their work, but Borunda said that sometimes residents get naturally curious about the work that might be happening – and may worry about their property.

“It’s completely understandable that they want to know what we’re doing, but in situations like that, our crews are very focused and in crisis mode,” he said.

“We are dedicated to

making sure that not only property, but that quality of life remains during an emergency.”

He continued, “In general, we’re happy to answer questions, but when things are moving fast, follow our lead until we have a minute to make sure that everything is draining as it needs to.”

Both Lara and Borunda said that if you do see crews setting up that it’s a good time to ask if a vehicle needs to be moved for better access to the emergency location and to make sure that residents can access their vehicles during the situation if needed.

*If you see LCU Heavy Equipment Operator Donnail Bailey and LCU Water Crew Leader Mike Lara with the Ditch Witch pump in your neighborhood, know that they may be working on an emergency that LCU is on-call for 24 hours a day, seven days a week.*

# NMSU kicks off year with convocation awards for faculty, staff

For the first time since 2019, New Mexico State University hosted an in-person convocation to kick off a new academic year.

More than 120 faculty and staff members from NMSU gathered on the Las Cruces campus Aug. 17 to mark the start of the fall 2021 semester and celebrate a group of fellow Aggies honored for their accomplishments and contributions to the university.

The ceremony also was streamed online for those unable to join in person.

“Convocation is an important occasion when we pause to set the course for the start of the academic year,” NMSU Provost Carol Parker said. “This fall, I am especially proud to focus our attention on faculty who are exem-

plars in terms of teaching as well as community engagement, extension and outreach.”

The ceremony marked the start of a new initiative to align faculty awards with each of the four strategic goals in NMSU LEADS 2025 — a change Parker announced in January.

Parker, who presided over the ceremony with Tara Gray, associate provost for faculty development, director of the NMSU Teaching Academy and convocation coordinator, also introduced a new award to honor outstanding work in extension, outreach and community engagement.

dozen faculty members and a campuswide organization.

NMSU’s most distinguished teaching honor — the Robert L. Westhafer Award — went to Mary Ballyk, professor of mathematical sciences, for excellence in teaching.

The award recognizes work that enhances student success and social mobility — the first goal in NMSU LEADS 2025. Ballyk has taught at NMSU since 2000.

Aggies Without Limits, which brings together students, faculty and community members to assist with the development of local and

international communities through sustainable infrastructure and educational opportunities, received the first-ever Extension, Outreach and Community Engagement Award. The new honor recognizes work that amplifies extension and outreach — the third goal in NMSU LEADS 2025.

Since its founding in the mid-2000s, Aggies Without Limits (AWL) has performed annual service projects in several Latin American countries and New Mexico, building infrastructure to better the lives of those in need.

This summer, members of the group traveled to

Nicaragua to complete a project they were unable to finish last year due to Covid-19 restrictions.

AWL adviser and emeritus professor of engineering technology Kenny Stevens was recognized during the ceremony.

He co-founded the organization with former NMSU student Dorothy Lanphere.

Recipients of Donald C. Roush awards were: Martha Desmond, regents professor of fishery and wildlife sciences; Avis James, college associate professor of biology; and Anne Semrau, assistant professor of biology at

NMSU Grants.

NMSU bestows the Roush awards — named after a former NMSU executive vice president in recognition of his efforts to improve teaching in New Mexico — based on information from students, department heads, deans and community campus directors.

Recipients of the Christmore awards were: David Clements, assistant professor of finance; and Steven Sandoval, assistant professor of electrical engineering.

The Christmore awards, named after former accounting department head Patricia Christmore, honor junior tenure-track faculty members for excellence in teaching.

The Associated Students of NMSU oversee the selection process.

All award winners received a plaque and a stipend.

# LCCT pulls a rabbit out of hat with magical play 'Harvey'

I never imagined that Las Cruces Community Theatre's (LCCT) production of "Harvey," an Oscar- and Pulitzer Prize-winning comedy would leave me in tears. But it did.

There's a scene at the end that caught me off guard, as Elwood P. Dowd (Brandon Brown) and Dr. William R. Chumley (David Edwards) are discussing Harvey's (the 6-foot, 1 1/2-inch invisible rabbit) ability to stop clocks and control time. I won't spoil it for you, because you really should see it for yourself. But the combination of playwright Mary Chase's wonderful script and the work of two of Las Cruces all-time great actors got to me, along with the joy and gratitude I felt being back in the front row at LCCT after seeing the play's director, Gail Wheeler, LCCT Board President Janet Beatty-Payne and board member Tom Warren in the lobby.

This is a wonderful, amazing, magical show filled with talented actors and a great crew. You will love the set, the costumes (kudos to Janet Beatty-Payne), the music (thank you, Mike Wise!), the set design and the fabulous "special art" by the brilliant Bob Diven.

There are many, many gold stars to award for this production, beginning with the theater company itself. Like Black Box Theatre just down Main Street from LCCT to the north and Rio Grande Theatre

to the south, and like the NMSU Theatre Department, Blank Conversations Theatre Company and others, LCCT hung in there through the pandemic and has returned in grand style.

I didn't think Lennie Brown could top her performance (one of the best I have ever seen) as Florence Forster Jenkins in LCCT's 2019 production of "Glorious!". But Lennie may have outdone herself (and Florence) with her work as Veta Louise Dowd Simmons, Elwood's sister and the play's chief troublemaker. Alex Wheeler Larkin, another of my very favorites, is also great as Veta's daughter, Myrtle Mae Simmons. Watching the two of them on stage together is like watching Dave and Brandon — you can almost see the sparks.

Cindy Murrell is just wonderful, as always, as Betty Chumley, Dr. Chumley's long-suffering wife. I loved Miguel Cruz in the fake mustache (I honestly wasn't sure until I saw him backstage without it) as Judge Omar Gaffney, Nathan Harper as the wolfish and overbearing Dr. Lyman Sanderson, Erin Wendorf as the entic-

ing and eager-to-please nurse Ruth Kelly, Alecks Rundell as the evil orderly Duane Wilson, Vanessa Dabovich (kudos also as stage manager) as the high-society and plummy-voiced Ethel Chauvenet (how I loved the hat!) and Ed Montes as cab driver E. J. Lofgren. Ed's part is not a big one, but the entire story turns on it.

Remaining performances are 7:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday, Aug. 27-28 and Sept. 3-4; and 2 p.m. Sundays, Aug. 29 and Sept. 5.

Masks are required for audience members and there are about 190 seats.

And remember, just because you can't see a 6-foot invisible pooka doesn't mean he can't see you.

Ticket prices for "Harvey" are \$17 for adults, \$14 for seniors, military and students, \$10 for children 12 years old and under and \$10 for groups of 10 or more. The event is free and open to the public and will feature authors from Las

Cruces and surrounding area with books published in 2019, 2020 and 2021. The event has been held every year since 2014 except for 2020 because of the pandemic.

Here are three additions to the list of participating authors.

**Bud Russo** came to New Mexico as a student in 1961, intent on becoming a nuclear physicist. After graduating from New Mexico State University, he left Las Cruces and had a successful career writing about manufacturing and automation for trade journals for 40 years before returning to New Mexico to retire and to write travel



features for local newspapers and magazines and start writing books.

His book "Running Free," about reintroducing wolves to Yellowstone National Park, won first place for young adult fiction in the 2009 creative competition of the National Federation of Press Women. "The Poet and The Singer," was a finalist in the 2017 Arizona-New Mexico Book Awards. "Heroes and Villains of New Mexico," is a collection of true stories about historic New Mexicans.

"American Phoenix: What the Billionaire Class Won ... Then Lost" was published in June 2021. In it, Russo poses the questions, "What would happen to America if the 'Billionaire Class' won control of the nation's wealth and all its power?" and "What would happen if a handful of patriots wanted it back?" "Autocrat Aaron Blighman and

his 300-member Council for American Unity, Security and Equality (CAUSE) have won The War within the Billionaire Class. CAUSE has grabbed control of America ... nearly all of its wealth and political power, virtually enslaving the nation," Russo said about the book. "Then, Tom Hopkins discovers in a box of banned books the American Republic that once was. He joins a nascent revolutionary group his mother belongs to."

"As kids growing up in Baltimore, my older brother and I created character names for all the times we re-enacted the adventure movies we saw Saturday mornings," Russo said. "We won World War II. We were the cavalry rescuing ranchers under attack. We were deep-sea divers, test pilots attempting to break the sound barrier and astronauts. I've always been a storyteller. If my mother was still alive, she'd tell you about the whoppers I made up to explain why I was late coming home. I made up stories to tell Cub Scouts around campfires. Then, in the late 1970s, I committed a story to paper. I've been writing fiction ever since."

Russo's advice to those who aspire to writing is "learn the craft, don't listen to negativity about your ideas or your work, trust your ideas, write, never stop."

**John Philip Wilson** is a native of a small town in west-central Illinois. He earned degrees from the University of Illinois and Harvard University. Wilson began his professional career with 10 years' expe-

rience as an archaeologist and historical researcher for the Museum of New Mexico, with periods of field work in Arizona. He spent two years in Canada, then returned to the United States and for 28 years worked as a contract archaeologist and historical researcher for public utilities, mining and engineering companies and other agencies in New Mexico and Arizona.


Wilson's two latest books are "New Mexico Episodes, Stories from a Colorful Past" (2020), and its companion volume, "Arizona Across 400 Years" (2021).

The Arizona book, Wilson's latest publication, contains 14 stories that range from the search for Coronado's route across southeastern Arizona in 1540-42 to the futile search for oil in the San Simone area in the 1920s, Wilson said.

Wilson's suggestions for would-be authors include: "Learn to read and write well, write what you know about and what others will want to know and find an organization that needs to have a book written for it and will pay you to do so."

**Yosef Lapid** was born in a small town in Romania where toy stores were absent, but children's stories were abundant. Since retiring from his position at NMSU in 2016, Lapid has published more than two dozen picture books

and Sharon Cunningham will display quilts and Sherwood Hoffman's wooden bowls will also be shown.

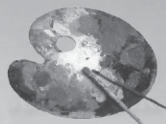

be a show with something for everyone.

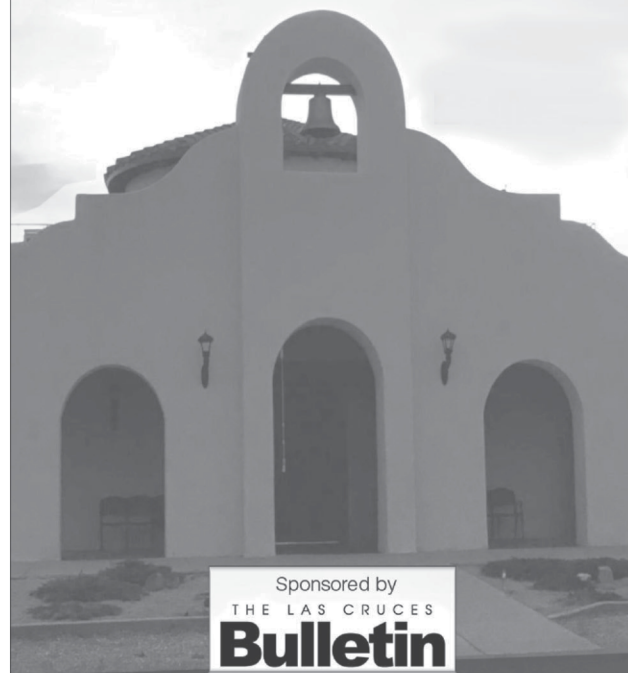

With only 250 "purring monkeys" left, they are now on the world's Most Endangered Primates List.

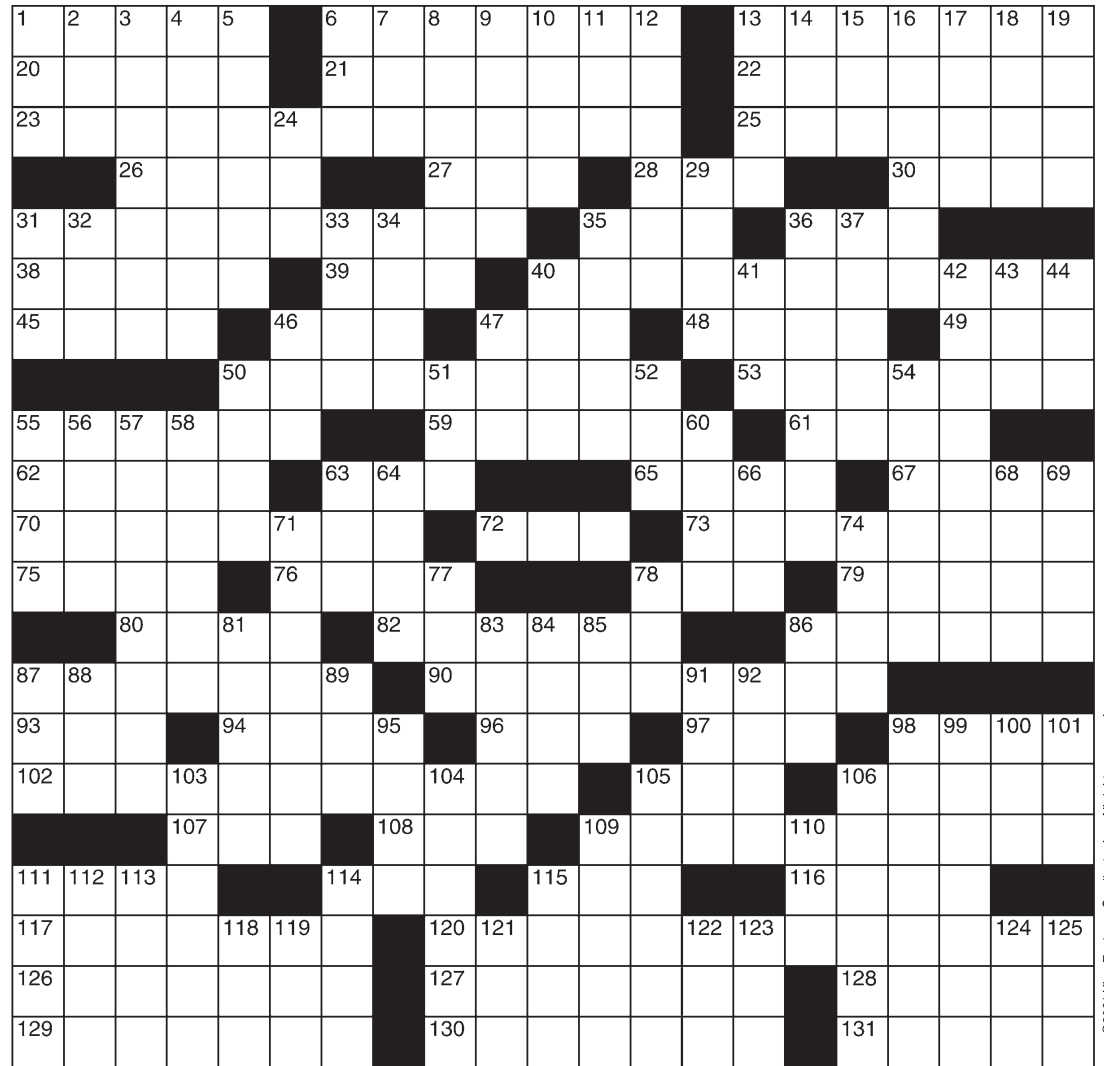

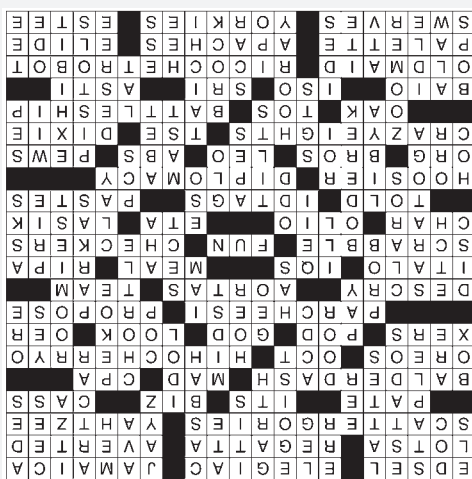

## Social worker: Safely reach out to get support during Covid

Inpatient and outpatient services at Mesilla Valley Hospital (MVH) have seen “a dramatic increase in patients needing substance use treatment during the pandemic,” said MVH Director of Business Development and Outpatient Services Jeanne Resendez.

Substance abuse and other behavioral health issues related to Covid-19 are sometimes the result of isolation, said Desirae Rosenthal, a licensed clinical social worker (LCSW) who oversees outpatient services for MVH.

“When you remove a

certain level of socialization,” Rosenthal said, it can “result in some mal-

adaptive behavior.”

For many people, isolation has meant being at

continuous close quarters with family members, which can lead to conflict and sometimes to behavioral health issues, Rosenthal said.

In all cases, Rosenthal’s advice is to slowly and safely “reintegrate back into your support group” to help with recovery and with more normal socialization.

She also recommends that you “take some time to self-care.”

“The number one thing I tell people is, ‘Take time to do something you enjoy and make yourself fulfilled,’” Rosenthal said.

That might include volunteering — safely — for a local animal rights or-

ganization or one of many local nonprofits. There also are athletic activities that are safe to participate in, including games you can play with others, like tennis, while maintaining social distance, she said. Running, hiking and biking are also possibilities.

Or, you might consider taking up a hobby, Rosenthal said.

You can learn about painting and drawing online, for example, and look for local art classes. And, there are many other hobbies to consider that can be enjoyed in complete safety, alone or with others.

Rosenthal also recommends finding someone to

talk to about how you are dealing with Covid.

The pandemic is a national crisis, she said. “We need to recover from that.”

MVH, which opened in 1987, can make referrals to therapists and counselors who can help people talk about their emotions surrounding the pandemic and help with their recovery, Rosenthal said. She said people can also visit the newly opened Doña Ana County Triage Center at 1850-B Copper Loop.

# 'Garden to table' bistro to open in Mesquite Historic District

Beck's Roasting House and Creamery has an exciting new neighbor in Las Cruces' Mesquite Historic District.

Beck's owners Tyrell Thacker and Arianna Parsons have opened Willow + Blaine Boutique Garden to Table Wine Bar & Bistro in the 91-year-old brick building right next door to Beck's at 118 N. Mesquite St.

The name comes from Thacker's and Parsons' middle names.

The city's first "boutique bistro" is accepting reservations for lunch and dinner (it also has a happy hour) and opens Sept. 4.

The property has undergone extensive renovations inside and out since Thacker and Parsons bought it in January 2020.

"It was a lot of work," said Parsons, who is the former executive director

of the Downtown Las Cruces Partnership.

The couple had planned to open the bistro last fall, but waited a year because of Covid, she said.

The enlarged kitchen

will serve both Willow + Blaine and Beck's Natural Foods Café that is part of the coffeehouse next door, Parsons said. Catering will also be available.

Many of the bistro's

vegetables and herbs are grown in its outdoor garden. A signature dish, the Caprese salad, for example, includes the garden's atomic grape tomatoes and heirloom basil, Parsons said, along with mozzarella cheese and a blueberry vinaigrette reduction.

The garden's 16 raised beds will also grow cucumbers, beans, potatoes, carrots and other culinary herbs and colorful flowers. The outdoor area also has olive and fig trees and will soon be home to a glass conservatory. The outdoor patio has four tables.

The bistro bar features Old World wines, Parsons said, and has nearly 900 bottles in stock. The bar menu will also have a variety of Prohibition-era cocktails, she said, includ-

ing a house Moscow Mule and a French 77, along with other "really unique and beautiful cocktails."

Willow + Blaine offers "a really versatile space," Parsons said. The 2,500 square-foot building seats up to 70 and will be available for bridal parties, showers, corporate events, holiday gatherings and other special events, in addition to lunch, dinner and happy hour.

Parsons said the house was famous in its day for lavish holiday decorations, a tradition she and Thacker intend to revive. They are also looking forward to the bistro being a big part of the growing Mesquite neighborhood experience that includes galleries, shops, dining and coffee.

Much of the interior design work for Willow + Blaine was done by Jamie Langan of Studio Langan in Las Cruces, Parsons said. Daniel Aguilera was the carpenter. His com-

pany is 101 Design and Fabrication.

Bistro staff includes chef Sam Parsons, bar manager Michael Young and events coordinator Ayana Jordan. Saedies Apodaca is the head baker and Alessandra Cogdill is the pastry chef.

Here are days and hours of service: brunch, 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Tuesday through Sunday; happy hour (bar and patio only): 3 to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday; dinner: 5 to 10 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday.

# A lack of access to broadband a barrier to development in NM

The pandemic has laid bare the importance of broadband as never before. From remote work to online schooling, broadband has been the crucial link that has allowed the economy to function in the face of Covid.

And a lack of connectivity is a major barrier to economic development in New Mexico.

Broadband coverage in our state is abysmal. Broadband Now ranks New Mexico as 48th among the 50 states for broadband coverage while getinternet.com ranked us 43rd.

These rankings are im-

portant.

The move to remote work has enabled office workers previously tethered to their desks to relocate outside of metropolitan areas.

Meanwhile, the pandemic has made urban living less inviting.

Remote workers decamping for rural life need places with good Internet connectivity and that isn't New Mexico. We have missed out on this potential growth opportunity.

To avoid missing out on the next opportunity when it arises, we need to fix Internet in our state.

Broadband networks

involve three levels of infrastructure. The "first-mile" or "fiber backbone" connects major providers and hubs to each other. The "middle-mile" infrastructure connects hubs to communities. The "last-mile" infrastructure connects to individual homes and businesses.

While there is a robust fiber backbone throughout the state, what is lacking is the "last mile" connectivity to individual homes and businesses, and the expensive electronics that drive content are located mostly in Albuquerque.

Broadband is a capital-intensive technology requiring high upfront investments. Laying fiber optic cable is expensive and routinely costs tens

of thousands of dollars per mile. To justify this expenditure requires a reasonable expectation that demand will be sufficient to generate adequate revenue.

In sparsely populated New Mexico, this is a problem. There is enough demand in Albuquerque but much of the rest of the state is underserved.

One bright spot in New Mexico's dismal Internet landscape is school connectivity. In recent years, we have spent about \$300 million to connect schools to the Internet. Currently, all schools in New Mexico are on the Internet, which served us well during the pandemic shutdown.

Still, there are problems as there is a critical

shortage of qualified technicians to managing education Internet. The reason for this problem, of course, is low salaries.

During the 2021 session, the Legislature created a \$100 million new matching fund program to finance broadband. Meanwhile, the bipartisan federal infrastructure bill, passed by the Senate and awaiting House action, provides an additional \$100 million for New Mexico.

These funds will help a lot. The state Department of Information Technology estimates that it will take another \$330 million to provide the adequate connectivity to underserved communities.

But this is a moving target.

In fact, connectivity has increased by more than 25 percent in the last five years, yet New Mexico continues to lag. We must run fast just to keep up.

## The wait is over – NMSU vs. UTEP this weekend

Like a prisoner marking off the days on the calendar, New Mexico State University football players, coaches and fans have been waiting for this weekend for months.

The long wait — after nearly two years without meaningful games — is finally over on Saturday, Aug. 28.

The Aggies will open their 2021 season against archrival UTEP at Aggie Memorial Stadium. Kickoff is at 7:30 p.m.

“I think it is a good way to start the season,” NMSU coach Doug Martin said. “All summer long, it is what our players have pointed to, opening up with a rivalry game.

“It focuses them a lot more,” Martin added. “For the fans, it creates a lot more excitement and a lot of buzz and obviously, that game is always well-attended on both sides, whether down in El Paso or here.”

NMSU was one of just two FBS (Football Bowl Subdivision) teams to have their entire fall season canceled last year because of the Covid-19 pandemic. The Aggies did play two spring games but treated those games more as scrimmages and as a way to get in more practice time under NCAA rules.

Defensive coordinator Frank Spaziani said facing UTEP has given Aggie

players extra motivation and a bit of an emotional edge to their preparations.

“It is a great motivator, and it is great we open up with them,” said the former Boston College head coach. “Our guys haven’t played in a real game — you count the days — in two seasons. Having that motivation — the team right down the road they know about — it should help them mentally get their attention.”

Quarterback Weston Eget, who has been competing for the starting job with Jonah Johnson and is expected to see lots of action this year, said the team is pumped to play UTEP.

Eget also says players are super pumped to play in front of fans again for the first two in nearly two years.

“We are all super excited,” said the redshirt freshman from Santa Clarita, California. “It will

be electric. We are super excited to play in front of fans. Last time, obviously there was no one in the crowd (during the spring games at the Sun Bowl), so it was a bit weird.”

Running back O’Maury Samuels, a redshirt junior transfer from Michigan and a native of Los Lunas, said facing a rival like UTEP is a great way to get the season rolling.

“It’s a rivalry game,” said Samuels, who hasn’t played in three years because of losing a year to NCAA transfer rules and the pandemic. “We have to start the season off right and get this thing on a good pace.”

NMSU and UTEP have been playing each other almost every year since 1914 and Saturday will be their 98th meeting. UTEP holds an all-time series edge of 57-38-2. Games were not held during World War I and II and last year during the pan-

demic.

The Aggies have won the last three meetings.

Tickets for the UTEP game range from \$12 to \$30 and may be purchased at the Pan American Center box office or by calling 575-646-1420.

To add to the fun and festivities, NMSU will have a free Fan Fiesta starting at 3:30 p.m. on Saturday in the south Pan Am parking lot. It will feature luchador wrestling, games, giveaways, a live DJ and performances by mariachi bands.

Masks are not required at Aggie Memorial Stadium, because the game is outdoors. If you are going to the Fulton Center for any kind of special events before or after the game, you will be required to wear a mask.

Next, relish all the senses that are involved with golf. I love the smell of wet grass and the feel of soft ground. Sound is the most amazing thing of all in golf, and being able to tell instantly from the sound of the ball off the club whether it was a proper shot, trapped from the very center of the clubface. I like the sound of clubs rattling in the bag, the birds chirping,

Being able to play golf when traveling is a real joy. I hardly ever go anywhere where I can't somehow

Again, back to people. Like many of us, I have made lasting friendships through golf. Some friendships transcend golf and precede golf. One example is my former high school football coach, a terrific gentleman who retired in Orlando following 12 years as an NFL official. We have had an annual golf game in Florida. Then there is a Navy shipmate who I met at Navy officer school in 1967; we have an annual golf game in greater Cincinnati. I could go on.

The fusion of technology, skill, psychology and equipment is quite appealing to me. Today golf has a fetish with technology,

maybe too much so. But I like the fact that high level golf has become athletic, favoring those competitors with strength, flexibility, brains and stamina.

If you have read anything I have ever written about golf you know that I believe golf is a metaphor for life. But let me be clear, golf is a game; life is not

a game. Golf has rules; if you break the rules you get penalized. Some folks don't like that notion; but in reality that's life.
