DOÑA ANA COUNTY IS WRAPPING UP SUCCESSFUL INTERNSHIP PROGRAM FOR SUMMER 2021



For the summer months, the community has been buzzing with high school students working in paid, real-life job experience internships, thanks to a grant funded by the New Mexico Public Education Department's College and Career Readiness Bureau, for a Summer Enrichment Internship Program. As a part of the federal government's pandemic relief efforts, the \$1,307,061 grant provided 520 high school students and recent graduates the opportunity to join the workforce for six weeks. The announcement of the internship program was well-received in the community, with Doña Ana County posting the largest number of student placements among counties in the state with 539. The internship provided gainful employment with pay up to \$1260.00 for the summer, at \$10.50 per hour for 120 hours of work.

Las Cruces Public Schools (LCPS), Gadsden Independent School District (GISD), Hatch Valley Public School District, and area charter schools partnered in the endeavor to recruit students, and to ensure that registration went smoothly for the students who qualified for the internship. The internship was made up of a cross-section of the County with 364 students from LCPS, 127 from GISD, 11 from Hatch, 33 from charter schools and four students who are homeschooled.

The student turnout was exceptional. They were supported by 31 coordinators, who were mainly teachers and other school personnel from around the County, who served as a liaison between the employer, the intern, and the County and mentored the students. These caring professionals were a big part of the success of the first-year program because they monitored and managed all internship placements, kept track of hours, feedback, site-visits, and collected employer evaluation reports which provided valuable feedback on ways to improve this experience for the students and the employers.

"Offering young people an internship gave them valuable job experience, insights into different career options, and extra income to help fund the next step in their plans for the future," said County Manager Fernando Macias. "I am thankful for the response we received from the community in the form of the student interest, the coordinators who were willing to supervise, and the businesses that welcomed the students as interns," shared Board of County Commissioners Chair Manuel Sanchez.

Never forget: 9/11 as seen by those who were not born yet

High school is that place where people stop being children and form into adults, thinkers, movers and shakers. How do those growing children know the events of Sept. 11, 2001? What have they learned? What sticks in their minds?

Freshmen in an area high school social studies class said they have learned about the events of that day every year in school but have a hard time defining why it happened. While they know many people died, two towers were hit by airplanes and collapsed and even that many first responders sacrificed their lives, it's unclear to them who was responsible and what happened after the event.

These 13– to 15-yearolds are left with the viscera l— the images of burning buildings, people searching through the rubble. Some have relatives who were close to the experience.

"It's like two twin towers fell down and they had thousands of people in it," one student said. "They saw people die and there were fires. A bunch of people died."

One girl has an uncle she said who was near one of the buildings at the time.

"He still has flashbacks," she said. "He talks about it but gives out in mid-sentence. I have noticed when people talk about it, it goes on for a short time, then they all just get quiet about it."

Some other students, like 17-year-old Diego (not in the same class), said all he learned in school was that a plane just crashed into a tall building and some people died.

"Some people died on the twin towers and then it started to collapse," he said. "Both start to collapse and almost everyone just pretty much dies. My main question was 'How did that happen?'"

In a senior social studies class, students LJ and Ken spoke up and clearly had gathered more knowledge and had thought about that day and its aftermath.

"I know it was an organized terrorist attack and it was Osama bin Laden and our purpose for invading Afghanistan was to kill him," LJ said. "The Pentagon was attacked, and the towers were attacked, and I think over 3,000 people died. And it put America on pause for a really, really long time."

The students realize airport security was significantly less before 9/11. "It was like the first terrorist attack that America really had," LJ said.

Both students had watched a documentary about the reasons people go to war earlier in the year, "Why We Fight."

They understand the

Border region looking back on 9/11 terror attacks 20 years later

American Airlines flight No. 11, which had taken off from Boston Logan International Airport, crashed into the north tower of the World Trade Center (WTC) at 6:46 a.m. MDT. Tuesday, Sept. 11, 2001. United Airlines flight No. 175, which also took off from Logan, crashed into WTC's south tower at 7:03 a.m. MDT. American Airlines flight No. 77, which had taken off from Washington **Dulles International Air**port, crashed into the west wall of the Pentagon at 7:37 a.m. MDT. United Airlines flight No. 93, which had taken off from Newark International Airport, crashed in a field near Shanksville, Pennsylvania, at 8:03 a.m. MDT.

A total of 2,996 fatalities resulted from the crashes, including 33 crew members, 213 flight passengers, 2,731 ground fatalities (including emergency workers) and 19 hijackers.

As we near the 20th anniversary of 9/11, here are thoughts and memories of that day from some prominent local residents:

Las Cruces Public Schools Board of Education member Maria Flores: "I was getting ready for school, as I taught fifth grade at Tombaugh (Elementary School), and I heard the announcer say, 'A plane has hit the World Trade Center.' I told my husband, 'Turn on the TV. Something is wrong.' When he did so, the second plane struck the other tower. We were deeply shaken as we went to work, and all the teachers

level officials from both the U.S. and Mexico planning to be in attendance. As I was preparing for the meeting, my wife called me in to view something on the television. That is when I saw the videos of the planes crashing into the towers. Our meeting had to be canceled of course, as the whole world was fixated on these shocking occurrences.

"9/11 had a personal element for me because while at Georgetown Law School, I had roommates from New York City. I frequently traveled there and had been in the towers many times. Because of my knowledge of the number of people I knew to be working in those towers, I could already imagine the enormity of the loss of lives.

"An aftereffect of 9/11 was that it impacted our

ability to travel to work. My office was in Juarez. For a year and a half, it became a greater challenge to cross into Mexico."

Doña Ana County Sheriff Kim Stewart: "At the time, I was a federal contractor and spent three weeks in New York City in the first few weeks following 9/11 conducting mental health surveys. I saw people so damaged I was concerned there would be no coming back for that city. Twenty years later. their collective resilience and recovery should be an inspiration to us all."

9/11 made America look at foundations

It's strange, sometimes, the details you remember.

For me, whenever I think of it, the first image that funnels into my brain is my right shoe. A black, Stacy Adams Madison cap toe oxford.

I was staring at that From the Publisher shoe, tying its laces while sitting in front of the television, when the first plane hit.

My oldest daughter, Jessica, then a sixth-grader, was getting ready for school. I was getting ready for my job as publisher of the Alamogordo Daily News.

When I arrived at work, our whole staff was kicking into high gear. We had a lot of work to do.

Though it was a bright clear morning on the East Coast, it was dark and rainy in Alamogordo.

In the Daily News office, we watched events unfold on an old. black-and-white television with — I kid you not — aluminum

improve reception. When the first tower fell, someone shouted, and we looked, incredulous, "What do you

mean, the tower fell?" Then, we gathered around the TV, watching the replays.

When the second tower fell, we gasped, then stared. Most of us had tears in our eyes. We were all trying to sort out everything — our personal feelings, our work, our national shock.

Then, it got personal. We learned one of Alamogordo's own, retired police officer Al Marchand, was on one of the planes that hit New York City's World Trade Center. That information turned our coverage from a huge national and international news event into a local news story.

As an afternoon newspaper whose deadline was around 11 a.m., we had to do a great deal of work in a short time. As soon as we got the afternoon edition off to the press, we turned around and created a special morning "EXTRA" edition for the next dav.

In old movies, you sometimes see newsboys out on the street, yelling "Extra, extra! Read all about it!"

Sept. 11 was the first and, so far, only time I've ever been involved in an extra edition as a journalist.

The events created rollercoaster emotions, by turns horror, anger, sadness, frustration, helplessness, curiosity, uncertainty, worry.

I had known Marchand in his capacity as an Alamogordo policeman and respected him greatly. His loss was a big one to the Alamogordo community. At 44, he should have had a whole lot of life ahead of him.

As if the sky were mourning our local and national losses, the weather in Alamogordo staved dark and rainy the whole week.

The combination of emotions and images of the week were disturbing, confusing, frustrating and upsetting.

That's probably why my memory takes me back first to the mundane image of tying my shoe. The shoe is something normal, something routine, something my brain can readily process.

Even today, 20 years later, the events of 9/11, and all the subsequent events related directly or indirectly to that day, are difficult to process.

For several months after 9/11, we saw flags, patriotism and lots of togetherness.

Americans, for a sustained period, put a premium on unity and people.

Unfortunately, when those feelings began to fade, our national discourse seems to have devolved and declined ever since.

These days, it feels as if there

20 years later, world changed but heartache stays

Twenty years ago, on a Tuesday, I was getting my boys ready for school, shaking them out of their sleep and gently encouraging their eyes to open when from the other room I heard, "Elva, get in here quick!'

I ran into the bedroom and Randy said, "Look," and pointed at the television just in time to watch as a second airplane slid strangely into the South Tower of World Trade

Center in New York City. Two thousand, nine hundred ninety-six people died because of that attack, one of them I knew, though not well. I did know and visit several first-responders and heard their heart-wrenching stories.

It remains the deadliest terrorist attack in human

history and the single deadliest incident for firefighters and law enforcement officers in the history of the United States, with 340 and 72 killed, respectivelv.

Two months earlier, in July 2001, I had my third and youngest son. He will not personally remember those surreal days following 9/11 — the anguish, the numbers coming in, the plumes of smoke or the images of people leaping to their death from 110 stories. No matter what the history books tell him, he will never fully understand what we mean when we say the world changed that day.

In August, with hope, pride, trepidation and a renewed sense of adventure, I sent that son into his future by accompanying him to Colorado to start college and then flying back alone. The world changed again for me as everything will be different and my nest is empty. My son and I have new worlds to discover.

Now, in September, 20 years later, I will remember all those sons and daughters who did not come home, a moment of silence for those mothers and fathers whose children were lost that day.

My heart to yours — there is nothing I can say that words can express. There is only heartbreak still.

Confusion, fear, anger and finally understanding 20 years later

As I think back to the morning of Sept. 11, 2001, my primary memory is one of confusion.

I was the editor of an afternoon newspaper in Kansas and was almost finished with the front page.

I'll be forever grateful to the publisher who convinced me to tear it up and start over.

Like most Americans, I didn't know anything about Osama bin Laden or al-Qaida and couldn't imagine how or why anyone would do such a thing.

During an address to a joint session of Congress on Sept. 20, President George W. Bush told us who had committed the attack. And, he attempted to explain why.

"They hate our freedoms: our freedom of religion, our freedom of speech, our freedom to vote and assemble and disagree with each other," Bush offered.

So, young men were convinced to end their own lives in fiery airplane crashes because they despised town hall meetings

Looking at the speech now, it all seems incredibly empty and sad.

"Our grief has turned to anger, and anger to resolution," Bush warned.

"Whether we bring our enemies to justice or justice to our enemies, justice will be done."

We did kill bin Laden 10 vears later.

But I'm not sure how we could ever bring justice to suicide bombers. Whatever justice they receive will come from a higher power.

In the speech, Bush laid out a series of demands that he knew the Taliban could not meet as a pretext to going to war in Afghanistan; just as he would later deliver a list of demands that Saddam Hussein could not meet as a pretext to going to war in Iraq.

And, the president es-

tablished an impossible definition for victory, ensuring the two-decade slog that was to follow: "It will not end until every terrorist group of global reach has been found, stopped and defeated."

The speech was filled with all the Texas swagger that made our 43rd president endearing. We would win the wars to come, Bush assured us, not only because of our superior military force. We also had God on our side.

"The course of this conflict is not known, yet its outcome is certain," Bush crowed. "Freedom and

fear, justice and cruelty, have always been at war, and we know that God was not neutral between them."

Twenty years later, I'm less confused. Now, I understand not only who did it, but who will try to do it again, and why. They are equally convinced that God is on their side.

And, they are determined that all of us must be on God's side and must follow his dictates as they interpret them.

The wars are over, but the threat has not been eliminated.

We have hardened our

defenses against hijackers and bombers, but remain vulnerable in other areas.

We need to learn from past mistakes and move forward with both vigilance and a dose of humility. The scars of 9/11 remain.

My confusion from that morning later gave way to anger and sadness, in that order.

That part hasn't gone away in the last 20 years. I suspect it never will.

Today, 20 years later, we need to remember those days. We need to look down, past today's chaos,


disillusion and politicized anger, to our common foundations.

Providing 'quality, safe care' is Memorial Medical's top priority

"It's all about the people of southern New Mexico." Memorial Medical Center (MMC) Chief Executive Officer John Harris said in a recent interview.

"We need to be our best," said Harris, who has been Memorial's top executive for almost eight

Harris' message to evervone who works at the hospital is "to manage this place like the next person that comes in is a member of your family or a friend."

"Quality, safe care is our No. 1 priority," he said.

MMC was named the top-performing hospital in the 88-hospital LifePoint Health system that Memorial is part of. It was also

rated the best hospital and best place to work in the 2021 Bulletin's Best of the Me-



ley contest.

Harris, who has been a hospital administrator for nearly 45 years, became MMC CEO Nov. 1, 2013.

"This is very special to me," Harris said. "There's a lot of great work being done here."

He currently serves as chairman of the New Mexico Hospital Association board of directors and is also chair of the Burrell College of Osteopathic Medicine's board of trustees. Harris is also a member of the boards of the Mesilla Valley

Economic Development Alliance (MVEDA), the Borderplex Alliance and the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce.

Harris noted that MMC Chief Nursing Officer Caryn Iverson is president of the New Mexico Nurses Association.

"We are developing MMC into a major regional health care center," Harris said, serving all of southern New Mexico.

The hospital uses cutting-edge equipment, he said, and "the highest level of science."

A \$2.1 million surgical robot is one of MMC's recent purchases, Harris said. It was used for the first time ever in March 2021 by Dr. Victor Barnica, who is "an expert at removing polyps and can-

a clean exchange without placing materials in a new container."

He explained that the process might take a while when they receive the new bins by the end of the year. "Our current customer base is 35,416," he said and warned customers not to hang on to the old bins. "While it may be tempting to try and keep the old container. our drivers will no longer be serving the old carts once we've rolled out with the new." SCSWA Director

Patrick Peck said that the new bins would be only the beginning of changes in the coming months.

"We have lots of things in the works and are just now beginning to see

things take shape." said Peck. "We have new operation employees are being added so that we can ramp up recycling in Las Cruces, plus we're taking steps to maintain our existing infrastructure."

Peck continued, "There are repairs almost complete at the **Chaparral Transfer** Station, and we are submitting requests to grow our recycling projects out on Holman Road as a part of the Infrastructure Capital Improvement Plan as well. We're looking forward to sharing our expansion with our customers and enhance how we recycle in Las Cruces."

Hospital, experienced staff serve as 'safe' hub during Covid

"Getting vaccinated is a good thing," Memorial Medical Center (MMC) CEO John Harris said. "Vaccines are safe."

Like other hospitals, Harris said MMC has seen a recent resurgence in Covid-19 patients, with 10 to 15 being seen daily at the hospital, Harris said. As of late August, 100 percent of current Covid patients are unvaccinated, the hospital said.

"Please get vaccinated," Harris said in a message t

Harris said in a message to the community.

Harris said 90 percent of MMC's 1,400 employ-

against Covid and the hospital continues to mandate mask wearing and other safety protocols to keep the public safe and to keep the hospital's employees and their families safe as well, he said.

ees have been vaccinated

Harris also said it is "absolutely safe" to be treated at MMC for any health issue.

It can "be more dan-

gerous putting off care," Harris said.

Hospital staff have the necessary personal protective equipment to deal with Covid, Harris said, and have "much more control over exposure in the hospital."

MMC staff are "extremely well educated in what to do and what not to do" in dealing with the virus, he said.

"Don't put off your

health care," Harris said. "Wear a mask, get vaccinated, see your doctor."

MMC has "operated as a hub" in providing vaccines, he said, and has administered more than 26,000 doses and conducted more than 20,000 Covid tests.

Twyla Anderson, registered nurse, is MMC's director of Infection Control and Prevention and has been with the hospi-

tal for 37 years. In dealing with Covid, Anderson is "at the helm, guiding all our actions," Harris said.

"She is the most experienced in the state," he said.

Harris said he has met with Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham to discuss the pandemic.

"She knows if she needs us, we are here for her and New Mexico," Harris said.

cerous masses," the MMC website said. The robot can also assist medical staff with a wide range of other surgeries, the website said, offering 10 times magnification in 3D.

Harris said MMC's Dr. Ferman Fontan is the only surgeon in New Mexico "doing bariatric surgery robotically." MMC's bariatric services can be "life changing" for patients and their families, and the results are often "just breathtaking," Harris



said.

As an extension of bariatric services, he said MMC has set up a heartburn clinic and uses a tiny, minimally invasive magnetic "bracelet" to treat gastroesophageal reflux disease.

MMC performs more than 25,000 cardiac procedures annually and has "a total, integrated cardiovascular program," Harris said.

Memorial Cancer Center is the only comprehensive cancer program in southern New Mexico affiliated with research experts at the University of New Mexico Comprehensive Cancer Center, the hospital website said.

Harris said he is "very, very proud of that program and those people."

The hospital also has an

"outstanding group" of anesthesia providers, he said, working with Somnia, a national health care provider.

TeamHealth, another national health care provider, serves as MMC's Emergency Department providers.

"We choose our partners really, really carefully," Harris said.

He said the hospital also offers a wide range of other services, including advanced treatment for type 1 and type 2 diabetes, with a focus on limb salvage. MMC had the first pediatric care unit

in southern New Mexico, and its services go "beyond general pediatrics" to include a pediatric interventionist, intensive care and pediatric specialties. The hospital has a stroke center, offers joint replacement and all forms of general and orthopedic surgery. Its urology services are "dramatically improved," Harris said. MMC conducts many patient transfers a month and has its own dedicated ambulance. MMC's emergency services were voted Best Local Hero in Bulletin's Best.

MMC has "very, very

high caliber" surgeons and physicians, Harris said.

Harris said he regularly talks to MMC employees, from housekeeping staff to surgeons, about all aspects of the hospital and the services it provides and is "very lucky to have the people that are around me."

"That's the kind of culture that you should have," Harris said.

"That's what's really, really special about Memorial. We choose to be exceptional. That's the religion of this institution," Harris added.

Animal Services Center offering limited, low cost spay/neutering

The Animal Services of the Mesilla Valley (ASCMV) will provide limited, low-cost spay and neuter surgery for people who provide care to feral cat colonies inside the Las Cruces city limits.

The authority to provide the services came in August when the Las Cruces City Council passed a trap, neuter, release (TNR) ordinance.

Currently, ASCMV will only be able to offer one day per week for TNR surgery, due to the limited availability of veterinarians who can do high volume spay-neuter, ASCMV **Executive Director Clint** Thacker said.

"A search is underway for another staff vet-

erinarian, but right now we rely on only one veterinarian on staff and contract veterinarians that are sometimes available (and also care for more than 500 animals at the center)." Thacker said. The days TNR surgeries are conducted could expand, he said, depending on veterinarian availability.

The cost for spay/ neuter is \$40 per cat and includes vaccination, microchip and an ear tip that identifies a cat as vaccinated and sterilized. Thacker said.

If you tend to a feral colony, here's what you need to know:

Call ASCMV at 575-382-0018 to find out the designated day for

the next public appointments for TNR surgery and/or for more infor-

mation.

You will be referred to the spay-neuter coordinator if you want to schedule an appointment. If you can't speak with someone right away, leave a message and please be patient, Thacker said.

"We anticipate a high volume of calls," he said. "It may take a little time for someone to get back to you."

Trap the cat the night before the appointment; be sure to throw a towel over the trap to decrease the trauma for the cat.

The morning of the surgery, bring the cat to ASCMV, 3551 Bataan Memorial Highway, between 7:30 and 8 a.m. The cat will be ready to be picked up later that afternoon to be returned to the colony.



terror attack on the twin towers and the Pentagon led to the 20-year war in Afghanistan. They believe the attack fueled an operation that was already being planned by the United States.

"We are not going to war because of terrorism. We are going to war to take advantage of oil and other stuff and the resources available in that other country," Ken said. "The terrorist attack was the justifying reason for it.'

The event also fueled propaganda, LJ said.

"I suppose we needed to

go there to get justice for all those who had died." she said. "I think that there is a lot of misconceptions about why we were there and why we needed to fight there.

"We are sending the message that we are going there to help people who are suffering, and we do need to do that. I think that those in power have a responsibility to protect those who have no power. But we can't market one thing and then have leaders who are doing things for a corrupt purpose."

Sophia graduated from the same school in May and is now attending college. She remembers learning much the same as the other students.

Teachers would show a video, talk about remembering everything that happened but also would never get very specific about facts.

"I remember them explaining that it was men from Afghanistan, that they were from outside of the country and that they did this and that they were cruel," she said. "They were very discriminative towards the people.

"I do think the hate grew more with that action (the attack)," she said. "That was a very bad time. People are so eager for power and for dominance that they just sacrifice lives just to prove a point. They are risking and killing, all for what?"



Las Cruces is leading the way on electrification

The energy landscape is undergoing a massive transformation. New Mexico needs to be ready, and I'm working to make that happen. Our state is uniquely poised to benefit from advances in technologies, the growth of the clean energy economy, and widespread electrification of our homes and businesses.

Widespread electrification is one of the surest actions that we can and should take right now to address the climate crisis. It will also improve our health, create thousands of new, good-paying jobs, and spur major savings on all of our utility bills. That's why I'm proud to be leading the effort in the Senate to call for big and bold climate action and widespread

electrification as part of President Biden's Build Back Better agenda.

Earlier this year, I introduced the Electrifying America's Future Resolution to lay out a clear policy roadmap

for widespread electrification and the decarbonizing of our entire power generation sector. In July, I introduced the Zero-Emission Homes Act to establish rebates that will make clean, electrified appliances affordable and accessible to all American households.

The fact is that many of the devices and appliances that we use every day in our homes and businesses currently burn fossil fuels,

from furnaces to water heaters to cars. As we transition our power sector toward 100 percent clean generation, we should also replace each of these appliances in our homes and businesses with new electri-

fied machines that can be powered by all the new clean and carbon pollution-free electricity generated right here in New Mexico.

Electrifying these appliances would also address the 42 percent increased risk of children experiencing asthma symptoms associated with indoor air pollution from gas stove use. Such indoor pollution disproportionately affects low-income house-

holds with smaller homes. Furthermore, outdoor air pollution from residential buildings currently accounts for 44 premature deaths in New Mexico per year.

We need to accelerate the electrification of our homes and businesses, and we need to avoid locking in decades of unnecessary costs and further damaging pollution by continuing our use of fossil fuel combustion appliances and vehicles. This is a real and proven way for us to meet our carbon emission requirements quickly enough to prevent the worst effects of a warming planet. And it can create incredible health and economic benefits along the way.

I'm enormously proud of all the leadership that the City of Las Cruces is demonstrating on this front. Las Cruces is transitioning its vehicle fleet to electric vehicles and building more electric vehicle charging infrastructure. And city councilors are calling for a phase out the use of natural gas by the city-owned utility.

I'm encouraging local leaders all across New Mexico to follow Las Cruces' example and take bold steps to electrify new and existing city buildings and adopt new codes and initiatives that will incentivize electrification of residential and commercial buildings in the community. This will save tax payers and business owners money because electric infrastructure has significantly lower annual operating costs.

As New Mexicans advance local solutions to the central challenge of our time, I will keep fighting for climate action at the federal and global levels. We need to pass all of the bold economic and climate investments in President Biden's Build Back Better Plan. If we can do that, we will make once-in-a-generation investments in the American people, lower costs, cut taxes, create climate careers, and make the wealthy and corporations pay their fair share.

We don't have any time to waste on climate. The extreme weather events, floods, heat waves, droughts, and wildfires will only continue to worsen unless we take significant action right now. Our actions can create a cleaner, healthier environment and good paying careers in the building trades all across New Mexico.

This is our moment to act. Let's not waste it.

Spaceport America and Global Spaceport Alliance to bring ISS data into local classrooms

Orion's Quest to provide access to real-time space science conducted on the International Space Station.

"This is a great opportunity for schools in New Mexico who will not only be working with the team from Spaceport America on this project but will also have the opportunity to collaborate with groups in the US, the UK, and Ecuador." says Miller, chair of

the GSA Academic Working Partnership. "We want to engage with our local students to explain the importance of space science and relate it to some of the research conducted right here in our state."

The GSA Academic Partnership Working Group selected the study of "worms in space" which looks at the loss of muscle mass and strength in zero gravity. The research is being led by scientists from Texas Tech University to measure the strength of the millimeter-long round-worm, C. elegans, in space. Muscle loss and strength is currently a major challenge for astronauts on extended spaceflight. With a short lifecycle of a week and 60 percent genetic similarity with humans, the worms have been sent to space

many times before for various experiments. The experiment is scheduled to run for seven weeks, amounting to seven worm generations. Findings from this study are expected to help develop therapeutic interventions for muscle disorders and to improve strength in older people back on Earth.

United Way, HanesBrands donate masks to schools

coronavirus, along with other mitigation strategies like hand-washing, social distancing and regular cleansing and disinfecting of frequently-touched surfaces, in schools and buses.

As America continues

to grapple with COVID-19 and the Delta-Variant- the resulting health, economic and education fallout, United Way's focus has been on the disproportionate impact on the most vulnerable. One place to make a difference is

protecting students, teachers and school staff as schools pursue in person instruction.

In the Las Cruces Public Schools District, masks are going to 28 underresourced schools, which serve high populations of students from low-income families. "Getting our students back to the classroom has been the focus of our district for a year now," said Kelly Jameson, Public Information Officer for Las Cruces Public School. "We cannot do that safely unless all necessary PPE is in place. Donations like the generous one from the United Way of Southwest New Mexico ensures we have adequate supplies to meet those needs."

Amanda Morales, Chief Executive Officer, United Way of Southwest New Mexico said, "This support from HanesBrands will help

"Orion's Quest was founded in 2004 with a mission to bring working science from the International Space Station into classrooms" says Dan Loewen, Program Coordinator for Orion's Quest. "We purposely choose research with real world science applications on Earth so students can relate to the subjects of the study."

Participating students will be able to do classroom experiments as well as have access to data being collected on the ISS. Orion's Quest links the principal investigators to classrooms and provides software for the study without any cost to the schools participating. The Spaceports will provide further academic support ahead of and during the study and relate it to work being conducted at the launch facilities. The entire project commitment is for 1-2 weeks and is designed around current science standards so as not to add additional work for teachers to fit it into lesson

Alliance was formed in 2015 to provide a forum for commercial spaceport operators at all stages of their development to come together and privately discuss their progress, obstacles, and challenges. The GSA provides members with information, data, research, and networking needed for the successful planning, funding, and operation of spaceports around the world. This has led to the formation of sub-groups such as the academic partnership working

group which has representatives from Spaceports representing four different continents.

The monthly Spaceport America podcast covers

Remembering Roberto Estrada

he Las Cruces Hispanic Chamber of Commerce gratefully honors our local legend and icon Roberto Estrada for his leadership, mentorship and support for over the past 28 years.

Roberto Estrada was there in the early days of establishing the Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, although back then it was known as the Hispano Chamber de Las Cruces. He was there from the beginning offering the chamber his ideas and suggestions on how to build a strong chamber for small businesses. In 1996 the chamber made Roberto a lifetime member of the chamber for his contributions not only to the chamber but to the business community of Las Cruces.

Since the early 1990s Roberto Estrada was a longtime supporter of the Las Cruces Hispanic Chamber of Commerce and to many of us in this community. Past board directors said nearly every fund-raiser they held, Roberto insisted on providing the food for the events that took place. Roberto still continued to support the Chamber and its members through the years.

As a long supporter of Las Cruces business and local charities, he had many passions. Among them was his dedication to youth related causes including sports. He always was there with a helping hand for many charities and individual families in need.

Roberto, a Mesilla native and Las Cruces High School graduate, started out making tortillas in a local factory. In 1968, he had an opportunity to buy his own business, La Bonita Tortilla Factory. In 1977, he founded Roberto's New Mexico Foods, whose products include frozen enchiladas, tortillas and other treats, available in regional supermarkets.

In 1987, Roberto's Mexican Restaurant opened its doors at 908 E. Amador Ave., and rapidly became

a local icon, serving up everything from nachos, sopaipillas, gorditas and carne asada tacos to several kinds of tamales, enchiladas, burritos and homemade red and green chile sauces. The restaurant was also a source for products like masa and hojas for those who want to make tamales, at home but don't want to start from scratch.

Roberto was among the founders of The Whole Enchilada Fiesta and is known for his giant enchilada. His feats of culinary derringdo have been chronicled on national networks and local TV news, feature and cooking shows, the Food Channel and newspapers and magazines around the world. He's been featured in documentaries and even movies, he said.

His restaurant walls have some intriguing displays documenting his Guinness World Record honors, magazine and newspaper articles, a high school textbook with pictures of Roberto's feat, and a large machete used to carve the enchilada. Roberto was the Whole Enchilada and a whole lot more to us. He was a role model, mentor and a highly respected businessman not only to fellow business owners, but to all us got to know him.

Throughout the years Roberto has received many awards from numerous local and national organizations. Of all the awards that he received from this chamber; it was our greatest honor to present Roberto Estrada with the Las Cruces Hispanic Chamber of Commerce Hall of Fame award in 2013.

Roberto loved his community and the community truly loved him. His contributions and legacy will live on forever with this chamber and in this community.






The Meg' tries to put teeth back in shark movies

I wanted to get a Spanish translation into the hands of Mayas for free. In 2020, with the help of over 100 generous Go-FundMe donors, 2,000 copies of 'Cuando una muier se levanta' were printed in Chiapas. The pandemic has slowed down distribution, but little by little people are reading it. One response from a group of Maya health promoters was music to my ears: 'If Lucia can tell the story of her life, why can't we?" After that, people who had never put pencil to



Sheffield makes great use of rarely seen photos and film clips from the time and adds in some technology and color enhancement to draw the viewer into the events surrounding the exploding of the first atomic bomb and bringing the city of Alamogordo into the limelight of the world for a little while.

His history of the event and of the city intertwine, bringing sense to the reason behind the choice of the location for the test and making connections with the players in the event. From the son of one in dealing with all the clasof Alamogordo's founders Charles Hawkins, David, who met Robert Oppenheimer, the science leader behind the Manhattan

Project, at Princeton, the film provides plenty of interesting fodder for the mind.

He also throws in some tidbits he learned along the way, like the incorporation of a women's brigade into the activities at Los Alamos leading up to the Trinity Test. Four hundred twentytwo enlisted women were brought together to provide essential tasks behind the scenes.

Due to the volume of classified information in the project, the Manhattan District Women's Army Auxiliary Corps Detachment was established to utilize women in uniform sified information passing through the project.

The film, while addressing the test itself and what led up to it, primarily

looks at Alamogordo as a "turning point" from a railroad stop and lumber town to the site of a base that saw the world change.

"Seventy-five years later, we're still dealing with the effects of that moment," Sheffield said. "It's good for the topic to remain at the forefront, because so much happened. I wanted to give a different perspective with this film."

The film was entered into a dozen film festivals for "short documentary" during Covid-19 and reviewed in national and international competition by film judges. The film unexpectedly took home four film festival awards.

Can texting create a love for reading later in life?

Camilla, a firstgrader is amusing herself with her mother's phone while Mom tries on clothes at the store. She recognizes a message from Dad and answers it. Soon Camilla is shouting

into the dressing room, "Mom, how do you spell 'shopping'?" Camilla is a reluctant reader with little confidence. Now, she is happily texting with Dad and asking for help in deciphering his messages. Another win for social media. Now what? Will an early introduction to the seductions of text messages interfere with future learning? According to a Neilson survey, the average American teen texts 3,339 messages per month.

David Crystal, linguist and author of "Texts and Tweets: Myths and Realities," believes that language is evolving as

it always has. "Teenagers say that they text because 'It's cool.' You can't be cool unless you know the rules," Crystal said. Current research reveals that the best texters are the

best readers and spellers because they are getting lots of practice. Studies published in the British Journal of Computer Assisted Learning and the Australian Journal of **Educational Development** and Psychology found a positive correlation between texting and literacy, concluding that texting is "actually driving the development of phonological awareness and reading skill in children."

To abbreviate message as "msg" or tonight as "2nite," you must understand how sounds and letters work, and how words are constructed. Texting encourages students to

think about these relationships, helping them to understand how words are built. Creating a textism, just like writing a poem, isn't easy. To create a readable textism one must break the word into something short and catchy without losing meaning.

Turns out that abbreviating words has a very long history. Abbreviations are a natural part of the evolution of language. "OK," the most popular American word in the world, was invented during the age of the telegraph, because it was concise. Teachers were not impressed! Every new technology — from the printing press to the telegraph, radio, telephone, TV (oh, there's another one) to the cell phone inevitably inspired new spelling, new abbreviations and new words. We do it all the time ... BBQ ... RIP. The most popular textisms are becoming official; OMG entered the

Oxford English Dictionary last year.

Try decoding these rebus puzzles of the Victorian age. Lewis Carroll and Queen Victoria were big fans.


Casa for a Cause

Green Goods cannabis dispensary expands, adds Cruces store to NM footprint

A cannabis dispensary has opened in Las Cruces at 1405 S. Valley Drive. It's in the same shopping center with Village Inn restaurant, near the intersection of Valley and Avenida de Mesilla.

Green Goods opened Aug. 18. The company is a subsidiary of Goodness Growth Holdings, Inc., which calls itself "a physician-led, science-focused cannabis company and IP

(intellectual property) incubator."

The Las Cruces location is a 2,490-square-foot storefront, Green Goods said in a news release, making it Goodness Growth's largest retail space in New Mexico. Green Goods also opened a new 1,995-square-foot dispensary in Albuquerque. The two businesses could generate a combined 30 jobs.

The new dispensaries will offer a wide variety of Vireo Health products and items from other cannabis growers in New Mexico, including cannabis flower, concentrates, prerolls, edibles, tinctures and topicals.

The City of Las Cruces does not yet have a specific designation for cannabis businesses, but this likely is the first or among the first to be licensed in Las Cruces.

The Las Cruces dispensary is opened 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday and 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

NMSU coach Doug Martin says the Aggies are in the unique position of having two natural rivals — UTEP about 40 miles down the road in El Paso and UNM, about 200 miles to the north.

The Aggies played much better at times against San Diego State after losing 30-3 to UTEP on Aug. 28. The Aggies dug themselves a 17-0 hole and were never really in the game against their Battle of I-10 rivals.

Now, the Aggies can turn their attention up north to their in-state rivals. The Aggies and Lobos first started playing back in 1894, when Grover Cleveland was president. That's 18 years before New Mexico even became a state.

The Lobos lead the alltime series 72-33-5 and have won the last two meetings.

The Aggies last beat UNM 30-28 in 2017 en route to the school's first bowl berth and bowl victory since 1960.

The win over UNM helped to propel NMSU to a magical season, culminating with a 26-20 overtime win over Utah State in the Arizona Bowl.

Last year's game was canceled because of the pandemic. It was the first time since 1945 that the instate rivals did not meet on the football field. Think about that — 75 years.

So a win this weekend would go a long way to helping to turn around the Aggies' 2021 campaign.

One of the great things about the NMSU-UNM rivalry is it's just a quick three-hour drive between the schools. That means fans from both schools have a history of hitting I-25 and cheering on their team when they are on the road facing their in-state

It's not too late to make some last-minute plans and go and visit Albuquerque for the weekend and cheer on the Aggies. And of course, there are plenty of NMSU graduates living in Albuquerque, the metro area around the Duke City and in northern New Mexico.

After the first two weeks of the season. it would be nice to see a strong contingent of Aggie fans show up at the UNM game. They could sure use the support.

fans taunted Bryson De-Chambeau by screaming "Brooksie" and "Baba Booev."

Of course, boorish, loudmouth and unsportsmanlike fans have been around for a long time. In the 1800s, fellows who had wagered on one player were known to pick up a competitor's feathery ball and toss it into the gorse.

In the modern day, they hounded and badgered young Jack Nicklaus who started beating their

beloved Arnie Palmer, and they were relentless in picking on Colin Montgomerie. It is apparent that the Tour tolerates (maybe encourages) rowdy fans at the 16th hole at TPC Scottsdale (Waste Management Phoenix Open) as well as the Ryder Cup matches.

In early August, Tim Gavrich wrote a great article for golfpass.com with the tag line "Has golf fandom lost its moral high ground for good?" He noted that fan treatment of DeChambeau runs directly against the game's tradition and civility. To me, it is quite evident that Camp Ponte Vedra, along with tournament directors, are afraid to do what Augusta National does at the Masters: remove uncivilized, possibly overserved and unruly, fans for life.

Just a week ago, PGA Tour Commissioner Jay Monahan announced that yelling "Brooksie" or

other as-yet-to-be-named insults could get a fan ejected from an event. "Comments that undermine the inclusive and welcoming nature of the game will not be tolerated, nor will any harassment of players (and others)," he said. Well, at least it's a start, even if somewhat flimsy.

I haven't read through the PGA Tour's dress code for tournaments but I do


including the playoff holes – 134 feet per round.

It's been three years since the U.S. Supreme Court ruling that all 50 states have the right to legalize sports betting.
