

Cruces state senator: Interim panels are vital

For state Sen. Bill Soules and many of his colleagues, "lots of the real work" on legislation gets done during the long gaps between sessions of the New Mexico Legislature.

Soules, a Las Cruces Democrat, was re-elected to his third consecutive four-year term in 2020. He is chair of the Senate Education Committee and a member of the Senate Conservation Committee.

Soules also serves on four interim committees, and spends an average of three days a week between sessions attending committee hearings across the state.

He is chair of the Legislative Education Study Committee (LESC), which has met in Hobbs, Socorro and Santa

Capital Outlay Oversight Task Force, which has met three times since the session included, including two meetings in Santa Fe and one held virtually; a member of the Science, Technology and Telecommunications Committee (TSSC), which was created in May and has held meetings in Las Cruces and Los Alamos and one virtual meeting; and an advisory member of the **Indian Affairs Commit**tee (meetings in Gallup, Shiprock and Farmington since the session ended, plus one virtual meeting).

Among many other items on its work list, TSSC will focus on efforts to increase broadband development statewide and energy system modernization, including a look at the ability of the state's current grid to meet anticipated demand.

Changes loom for state education

They may not come up during the 2022 New Mexico Legislature because it's a short session restricted to budget matters and the governor's call, but some important structural changes to education in New Mexico are on their way, said state Sen. Bill Soules, D-Doña Ana, who is chair of the Senate Education Committee and the interim Legislative Education Study Commit-

tee (LESC).

A top priority is redesigning high-school graduation requirements, which currently look like "a Jenga tower," Soules said.

"It's time to start over," he said. "What do we want high-school graduate courses to look like? How do we do that?"

The Aug. 31-Sept. 1 LESC meeting in Socorro included "High School Graduation Requirements: An Analysis of State Options." Drafted

by LESC staff, the report compared high-school graduation requirements among the top 15 state education systems in the county to requirements in New Mexico, which is ranked 51st among education systems in all states and the District of Columbia. States were ranked by the personal finance website WalletHub using 32 metrics. New Mexico was listed as "high spend, weak school system," the

School bus contractor faces shortage of drivers in Las Cruces district

STS of New Mexico General Manager Van Wamel is not only interviewing bus-driver applicants and training new drivers, he's also driving a bus himself.

STS, which has had the bus contract with Las **Cruces Public Schools** since 2011, runs 126 routes for the school district, and

is about 20 drivers short of the number needed to cover all the routes and provide a relief pool of about 10 percent of that total, Wamel said.

Wamel said the base pay for STS New Mexico bus drivers has increased to \$14 an hour. It includes part-time (bus drivers are part-time employees) health, dental and vision benefits and 401K eligibility after a probationary

period.

STS provides 30 to 36 hours of training for drivers to get them fully licensed, Wamel said, and no previous experience is required, nor is any license endorsement. A road test is conducted by an STS examiner who is licensed by the state, he said.

Wamel said the job is ideal for a wide range of people, including college students, early retirees and parents with schoolage children.

Wamel said the shortage of bus drivers is the result of attrition and the pandemic, with a number of drivers deciding to retire when the pandemic shut down schools in 2020.

LESC report said. In their analysis, LESC staff said New Mexico requires students to com-

plete more units than

many other states, and two of the top-performing states (Massachusetts and Vermont) allow graduation requirements to be fully determined by local school boards.

The report said highperforming education

systems worldwide have these commonalities: effective teachers and principals; a rigorous and adaptive learning system; equitable foundation of supports; and coherent and aligned governance. High-performing U.S.

states have robust economies; high kindergarten-12th grade test scores and graduation rates; relatively high spending on schools; strong foundations in early childhood; and widespread postsecondary participation.

Soules said the National Conference of State Legislatures' No Time to Lose report, "How to Build a World-Class **Education System State** by State," can help guide New Mexico as it considers other educational re-

forms, including making sure teachers "are highly prepared," increasing vocational and technical education opportunities for high-school students and looking at education more holistically instead of as separate pieces.

of bills that are introduced during the Legislature's 30-day (even years, like the one coming up

in 2022) and 60-day (odd vears) sessions.

Since he began serving in the Legislature in January 2013, Soules said he has put an average of about 15,000 miles a year on his car traveling to interim committee hearings.

The travel is "a good time to catch up on phone calls," he said (Soules has a handsfree phone system in his car), and "driving this state is incredibly beautiful," he said. Legislators receive per diem during the travels, but are not paid.

If he's frugal, the per diem covers mileage, lodging and meals, said Soules, a retired teacher and principal and former

member of the Las Cruces Public Schools Board of Education.

Soules also travels frequently to meetings of national organizations he belongs to as part of his legislative service, including the Council of State Governments, National Conference of State Legislators, National Caucus of Environmental Legislators, national Energy Council and the Border Legislative Conference.



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Council update: GO Bond projects are ahead of schedule

The present and possible future of General Obligation (GO) Bond projects were discussed by the Las Cruces City Council at its Sept. 27 work session.

The council received an update on the \$35.6 million in GO bonds approved by voters in an all-mail election in August 2018, and council members also got an update on the city's proposed 2022 GO bond program.

Bond-funded improvements for ball fields at the

Hadley Recreation Complex have been completed 46 days ahead of their projected completion dates, including improvements at Ralph Maag Park, Jim Harty Field, Raymond Paz Park and Ron Gall T-ball

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Field.

Improvements for city parks and sports courts, which include repairs to Hillrise Court, 2619 Hillrise Drive: Lions Park tennis courts, 701 E. Picacho Ave.; the outdoor basketball court at Frank O'Brien Papen Center, 304 W. Bell Ave.; and tennis court at Young Park, 1905 Nevada Ave.; are now 79 percent complete. A large shade structure at Young Park was expected to be completed by Sept. 30.

Repairs have also been completed to outdoor basketball courts at Henry **Benavidez Community** Center, 1045 McClure Road; Metro Verde Park, 7125 Metro Verde Drive; Cardon Park, 1050 N. Mesquite St.; and Klein Park, 155 N. Mesquite St.

A public ribbon-cutting ceremony to mark the opening of pickleball courts at Apodaca Park, 801 E. Madrid Ave., was

held Friday, Oct. 1.

Contract negotiations for improvements at Unidad Park, 1500 E. Hadley Ave., are nearing completion, as are negotiations for construction of the East Mesa Public Recreation Complex. Construction is underway for two dog parks, with earthwork 70 percent complete at a new dog park on Rinconada Boulevard, adjacent to the Animal Services of the Mesilla Valley. Also, site clearing began Sept. 6 for a new dog park at Burn Lake.

Construction of a new Animal Services Center, 3551 Bataan Memorial West, is about 15 percent complete, while replace-

ment of the city's Fire Station No. 3, at 390 N. Valley Drive, is approximately 63 percent finished.

Construction and improvements to walking, jogging and biking trails are now 55 percent complete.

All projects will be finished by December 2022.

City administration and staff told the council there will be numerous public opportunities for residents to provide input on projects that could be included in a new cycle of GO bond projects for a scheduled November 2022 bond election.

The council was also presented with several options to consider in making a final determination of how much to seek in bond funding in the election.

To continue GO bond projects without increasing city property taxes which was the consensus of council members at the Sept. 27 meeting — the council could request \$23 million in GO bond fund-

Wanda Bowman can.

As the owner/operator of Ashley Homestore, Bowman has learned of the plight of many children in our community.

So, a dozen years or so ago, Bowman modified her annual "All I Want for Christmas" project, which supplied rooms of furniture to a handful of needy families in December. She grew to realize the dire need for beds for children in the Las Cruces area. Bowman adopted Ashley's "Hope to Dream" program, where she can purchase youth beds for children and, in turn, donate them throughout the year.

Last week, Bowman donated more than 20 beds to children under 12 in our community. That puts the total over 100 for the year.

Every year, Bowman reads the letters from families request-

Local elections for city council, other boards worth the challenge

Every four years, Americans flock to the polls in droves to elect a new president. Last year, more than 155 million people cast their ballots, most of them just happy

that the campaign was finally over, at least for a minute.

Two year later, we have the mid-term elections, where we elect a new governor, and all members of both the state and U.S. House are up for reelection.

Next year, voters will get to weigh in for the first time on the governor's aggressive public health order to combat Covid-19.

In odd-numbered years

like this one, we get the ugly stepchild of the electoral system — municipal and school board elections.

Unlike the big, national campaigns that make

themselves impossible to ignore, local elections can sneak up on you. Early voting started Oct. 5 for this year's election, which will be held on Nov. 2.

A few years ago, the Legislature did voters a huge favor by requiring that all local elections be held on the same day.

This year, seats on the Las Cruces City Council. Las Cruces Public Schools Board of Education and the Doña Ana Soil and Water Conser-

vation Board will be at stake, as well as similar boards in smaller towns throughout the county.

This will be a transitional election for the city council, with two members stepping down to seek other positions.

Gill Sorg will be running for a spot on the soil and water board, while Gabe Vasquez will be looking ahead to the 2022 election, where he plans to challenge U.S. Rep. Yvette Herrell for her seat in Congress.

Local elections can be a lot more challenging for voters.

Because the elections are nonpartisan, voters don't have the crutch of simply casting their ballots for the R or D.

And, there won't be

a lot of TV ads helping the candidates introduce themselves to voters. There are a lot of candidates this year running for the first time. That can make it tough for voters to make an informed decision.

Fortunately, the Covid vaccines will allow for more normal campaigns this year, with candidates able to host meet-andgreets, go door-to-door and engage in the other traditional campaign events to get their message to the voters.

Both KTAL-LP 101.5 FM community radio and KRWG TV are hosting candidate forums that will be available online. Local newspapers will also help provide information.

And, one of the best resources for voters is the candidates' own websites, where the message is alwavs unfiltered.

Local elections may be more challenging for voters, but they're worth the effort.

Decisions made by the local city council and school board have a more immediate and direct impact on our daily lives than edicts flowing down from Washington, D.C.

The Las Cruces City Council increased the minimum wage for local workers before the state did. We're still waiting on Congress.


They were also ahead of the state and feds in banning plastic bags. And, they are currently working on the thorny

issue of determining when your noisy neighbor crosses the line and is too loud for the law to allow.

The Las Cruces school board drew protests this year when it changed its curriculum in an attempt to make it more inclusive for students of all cultures and nationalities. Several parents expressed concerns that the change would lead to an indoctrination of the students, and to a belittlement of the dominant culture.

We have the power to shape those critical decisions moving forward by voting this year.

ing help for a bed. And every year, Bowman is struck anew at the dire situations right here in Las Cruces.

"Your heart just goes out," Bowman said. "The requests are overwhelming."

One family was able to use Covid stimulus money to buy a bed for their daughter, but couldn't afford a new bed for their son.

Another family wrote of two small boys forced to sleep together in a small twin bed, which the younger one regularly wets. The family hoped for a bed for the older one, so he could stay dry.

"We had a family who lost their home and all their furniture in the La Union flood," Bowman said.

If you can think of

a situation causing a family to need a bed for a child, Bowman's probably seen it.

She's also seen plenty of situations you couldn't imagine.

"These children, less than 12 years old, they didn't choose to be without a bed," Bowman said.

We know how excited children can get over a new toy, a new bicycle or a favorite meal. For most children, though, a new bed is a humdrum thing. For these children, a new bed almost means a new life.

Until you've slept on a broken bed, a lumpy couch, or shared a bed with a couple of siblings, you can't realize the importance of having your own bed. Your own place to sleep and, just maybe, the chance to actually get a good night's sleep, peaceful enough to foster a happy dream.

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
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Retired teacher Cort seeks full four-year term on LCPS board

Pamela Cort was appointed to fill a vacancy on the Las Cruces Public Schools Board of Education in July and is seeking a full four-year term in the Nov. 2 local election.

Cort grew up in Santa Fe and has lived in Las Cruces for the past 31 years. After beginning her career with Albuquerque Public Schools, she taught French at Las Cruces High School for 26 years, retiring in May 2019.

"I have been an educator my entire life," said Cort, who is making her first bid for public office. She was appointed to the school board after Terrie Dallman resigned.

Cort said she decided to seek a full term because

of "some very specific things I want to do as far as taking care of our children," includ-

ing having an "equitable outcome for all of our students," regardless of their ethnicity or what language they speak.

She would also like to see activity buses used at LCPS high schools so those students who want to can stay after regular school hours to participate in clubs and organizations or whatever after-school activities they are interested in.

"When students have a sense of belonging, they

are more active and more successful in school," Cort said.

Cort said she would like to see less emphasis on standardized tests to determine student success. Alternatives like student portfolios ensure that student needs are met and include each student's "rich cultural history and linguistic history" rather than the "one and done" of a standardized test, she said.

Cort said she is very supportive of community schools. She attended the ribbon cutting for LCPS' fifth community school, Alameda Elementary.

"What I love about community schools is they go in first and assess the needs of the community and then work with community partners to make sure those needs are met," she said. "It's amazing. It's wonderful what we can do as a community when we all come together to make sure everyone in the community is thriving."

There are 12 schools in LCPS District 2, which Cort represents on the board, and she has visited all of them, Cort said.

"We just have such amazing schools in Las Cruces," she said. "I am so proud of our district. We do such cool things for kids. I just want to continue that work."

Cort said she appreciates "the adaptability of LCPS" since the onset of the pandemic and the need to incorporate remote learning and deal with "the social and emotional problems for the entire community that came

with that — not just the kids, but everyone."

"We constantly have to reinvent the idea of schools," Cort said, to make the changes necessary to help LCPS meet "our number one priority, to be successful as a kid."

"The biggest challenge for teachers right now ... is making sure everyone feels safe so they can learn," Cort said. "Students need somebody who will advocate for them, make them feel safe, make them feel valued."

Cort said she knew and worked with the late Karen Trujillo, who was LCPS superintendent until she was killed in an automobile accident in February.

Trujillo "did such a wonderful job and had so many great things in

place," Cort said.

Now working with new Superintendent Ralph Ramos, "I am so impressed," Cort said. "He works so hard to make sure we are doing what's best for kids. He is always looking ahead."

Cort was named LCPS teacher of the year in 2012 and New Mexico teacher of the year in 2013.

Cort has a BA in French from Washington State University, an MA in curriculum and instruction from New Mexico State University and an Ed.S. (education specialist) in curriculum, instruction and assessment from Walden University.

Nearly 3K attend EAA's Wings n Wheels 'Fest at Cruces airport

"I can't get the smile off my face," said pilot and state Sen. Bill Soules of Las Cruces during his attendance at Wings n Wheels 'Fest, Saturday, Sept. 25, at Las Cruces International Airport (LCIA).

"This is absolutely wonderful," said City Councilor Yvonne Flores, who is the council's liaison to the airport.

Nearly 3,000 people attended Wings n Wheels, said event coordinator Brett Hahn of the Experimental Aircraft Association Chapter 555 of Las Cruces (EAA), which sponsored Wings n Wheels 'Fest. It raised about \$5,000 for the EAA's

Youth Aviation scholarship funds, Hahn said.

All four vendors at the event sold out by early afternoon, Hahn said, offering his thanks to Jim Leon at Jim Bob's Barbecue, Vince Vaccaro at Lorenzo's, Russ Smith at Happy Dog and the Army National Guard. Each vendor served more than 500 meals, Hahn said.

The show had 34 planes, 59 cars and four motorcycles on display, he said. A

World War II-era B-25 gave test flights the Tuesday before Wings n Wheels 'Fest started through the Sunday following the event, and "approximately 400 people came during the week to see her," Hahn said. The B-25 flew 10 flights in three days, he

said, and, with 70 passengers in Las Cruces, beat its last two tour stops in Amarillo and Oklahoma City, he said.

Hahn said the oldest car in the show was a 1930 Ford Model A that was driven to the airport. The newest entry was a 2022 Tesla. The show also included six trucks and one jet boat, along with 42 exhibitors.

Hahn said 14 hand-crafted trophies were awarded "to best-of-show cars and airplanes, along with several people that were acknowledged with awards for their lifetime of contribution, achievement and mentoring efforts for the next generation in aviation and aerospace industry."

Hahn also thanked the event's 70 volunteers, including cadets from the Civil Air Patrol, Las Cruces Aviators Flying Club and co-owner Tania Privette, EAA pilots, Hustle Hard Enterprises, Lasen International and

Food program exceeds Hunger Strike goal of raising \$50,000

With a \$2,000 check presented by The Shed owner Gabe Mendoza to Casa de Peregrinos (CdP) emergency food program Executive Director Lorenzo Alba, CdP surpassed its \$50,000 goal for its third annual Hunger Strike fundraiser.

"It's been a really incredible 24 hours," Alba said Sept. 24, as the fundraiser drew to a close with a breakfast for this year's participants at The Shed.

The hunger strike began Thursday morning, Sept. 23, with breakfast at Josephina's Old Gate restaurant

Between the two meals, this year's 54 participants fasted as they used social media and other personal contact to solicit donations from friends, family and co-workers.

Alba and six others began the fundraiser in 2019, raising \$38,000. The event raised \$42,000 last year, Alba said. His goal for 2022 is 100 participants.

Alba has been CdP executive director since June 2011. CdP was founded in April 1979 by four La Mesa residents: Manuela Moreno, Rosario Rodriguez, Alphonso de los Santos and Lucy Martinez.

They set up in Moreno's home and launched Casa de Peregrinos ("House of Pilgrims") with \$3,000 in the bank.

In 2020, CdP distributed more than 4.7 million pounds of food, compared to 3.8 million pounds in 2019 and 3.5 million in 2018.

In 2020, CdP served more than 35,000 individual clients, an increase of more than 5,000 (16 percent) as compared to the three previous years.

A nonprofit chapter of the national EAA, the Triple Nickel (as EAA 555 is called) was established in 1976 and got its own hangar at LCIA thanks in part to former NASA astronaut and one-time Las Cruces resident Frank Borman, who donated part of a hangar he owned to EAA 555 in 2006.

EAA 555 promotes aviation "by supporting aircraft building, flight training and aviation safety." It sponsors the local Young Eagles, an EAA program that has given flying opportunities to about 2 million youth across the country and thousands locally.

Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) **Deputy Director Business** Services Jose Provencio who works with the team that is responsible for acquisition of short-term, intermediate, and long-term supplies of natural gas for the city-owned utility, sometimes they could use a crystal ball. But since a crystal ball is not available, the LCU team relies on more traditional forms of forecasting demand for natural gas every month. "The team looks at a variety of data points, from what LCU ordered in past months, to transmission pipeline conditions to spot any issues, daily gas prices, including long-range weather forecasts, and even after a purchase decision is made, the team continues to make adjustments throughout the month," said

Lately, Gas Business Analyst Mario Puentes has kept a close eye on

NATURAL GAS PRICES ARE RISING AND SO MAY YOUR WINTER UTILITY BILLS!

the commodity market as natural gas prices are doing something they haven't done in over seven years, dramatically increase. "Prices normally go up in the winter, but, of course, it's not winter yet. And prices in the U.S. have already gone up two or three times higher than where they were last year," said Puentes. Experts point to several factors for the price rise in natural gas. Supplies have been depleted by a series of 2021 weather events. The historic February freeze in Texas lifted demand while clogging wells with ice. Just recently, Hurricane Ida forced nearly all the Gulf of Mexico's gas output offline, and the recovery is slow.

It's not just cold winters that boost demand for natural gas. Hot summers do it, too, because air conditioners use electricity.

And as coal plants get retired because of environmental concerns, when they get shut down. you still need electricity from other generating resources such as gas fueled combustion turbines. That boosts demand for natural gas. And as we head into winter, supplies are tight and the market analysts who monitor natural gas prices don't see that changing anytime soon. One of the reasons goes back to recent years when oil and gas got incredibly cheap, prices were so low

that producers had no financial incentive to drill.

What does this mean for LCU customers? There is a strong possibility that monthly utility bills will rise this winter because of the price increase of the fuel. Remember LCU supplies gas to its customers as a passthrough cost without a mark-up or profit. "However, our (LCU) business analysts closely monitor market prices daily and do their best to get the lowest price available to help our customers manage their monthly budgets," said Provencio.

LCU customers do have a tool to help them manage their monthly utility bills this winter, by monitoring their natural gas usage. LCU unveiled UtilityHawk earlier this year, the service is free service for customers, and works on smart phones, laptops, and tablets, take the time to register at LCUtilityHawk.com.

Howard Oliver Ness, 82

Well, it had to happen. That wonderful young man, who waited impatiently at the Chicago railroad station with fishing rod, shotgun and rifle for the train that would take him to the University of Nevada to begin his studies in wildlife and fisheries has left us. And what Howard Oliver Ness left behind in terms of personal and professional accomplishments is monumental. While he died peacefully at home the morning of Sept. 26, many of the dynamic achievements he obtained remain.

Born to Leota Jane Ness and Oliver Sanford Ness on March 14, 1939 in Reno, Nevada, Howard never stopped. He inherited the insatiable curiosity and intelligence of his parents

and was deeply proud of both his Western and Norwegian heritage.

He was a man who

experienced his dream and more. Those original recreational tools and his passion for the outdoors and all it entailed -- history, geography, archeology, wildlife and more -- led him to a career of innovation and service. He was a fishery biologist on the shores of Lake Tahoe, Nevada, and a professional diver and even sold fish before his return to school at New Mexico State University where he earned a master's degree

in agricultural economics. But economics didn't take him away from his passion, it only added to it. He was one of the first resource economists in the United States when he landed on the shores of Alaska as the daring Limited Entry Plan for fisheries was being introduced and then implemented. He worked with those independent crab fishermen, who learned to respect his integrity and professionalism. But his contributions as a resource economist didn't end there.

The tuna fishery fleet in California strongly supported him as a candidate for the position of fishery attaché for Mexico and South America. With an eye for protecting our fishermen and promoting international cooperation,

he forged strong relations with those in Mexico and the United States. Those international relationship building skills did not escape the notice of the National Park Service, which was looking into opening a Division of US/ Mexico Affairs, since so much NPS land bordered Mexico. So following his State Department Service, Howard returned to Las Cruces and built, from scratch, that international office with the support of New Mexico State University. Both Sens. Bingaman and Domenici were behind the project, as was Rep. Skeen. Howard worked closely with Mexico in developing several national parks in Mexico. Biologists from both coun-

tries were often brought together in the realization that wildlife really didn't care about boundaries. A series of seminars on getting to know Mexico, helped to build respect and cooperation between our countries.

But beyond all of this, he was a storyteller with an incredible and durable sense of humor. He entertained us all with stories drawn from his own experiences. One particular story relives a diving experience in Florida. He and his diving partner were collecting lobster when Howard heard an unusual sound, sort of gurgly. He turned and there was their boat joining them on the sea floor. His partner had inadvertently pulled the plug. And then there was the time.....so many stories. Told. Retold and told again. Often over a campfire at deer camp. He was an avid hunter, who respected the game he sought. He relished in the beauty of it all. His respect for the game he harvested was reflected in the game dinner he hosted for years with friends and family. He was an amazing shot, even more so if you knew he only had the sight of one eye. In those lean years so many of us have, he kept food on the table with a singular box of shells. He was best

friends with one of New Mexico's leading naturalists and hunter, Alton Ford, who often referred to Howard as his fourth son, as they explored the richness of the Redrock, New Mexico area together. Howard was tall and Alton wasn't – quite a pair they made.

He had a gift for poetry and music and often wrote his own songs. Following his introduction to the violin, he taught himself how to play the guitar and piano. His tenor voice was often a surprise coming from that 6-5 frame of his. He was delighted that several of his five grand-children were showing promise, if not in talent at least in appreciation.

He was a passionate man. A man of high morals and integrity and of kindness. In so many ways he was a visionary.

We just received a call from Mexico, from an apprentice of sorts from his days in the State Department. She's now involved in the reintroduction of wolves in the Sierra Madre. Her tribute was from the heart, "Everything I do now, is what I learned from him."

He never forgot who he was and what it was all about, with the many achievements he had, he always felt that it was family.

His sons, Erik and Jon and in time their children were at the core of his universe. For Erik, it is Garrett and Bennett and for Jon, Eleanor, Caroline and Charlotte. And then there the women in his life. He and his wife, Virginia, were married for 52 years. "He was the most interesting man I've ever met," she still says. And there are the wives, Toni for Erik and Cate for Jon – really more like daughters.

His was a life of richness, friendship, loyalty and passion. He knew and savored the value of family and friends. Still though we wish we had him longer, he lives on in the lives of his sons, of whom he was extremely proud and his grandchildren.

Love of the land, our history and archeology continues. He instilled that.

There will be no formal funeral services. He has asked to be cremated and maybe to have a small gathering of friends at his historical home.

He was one of those few souls who was friends to the gardener, workman, farmer, banker, rancher, preacher, ambassadors and senator.

He looked for decency and goodness and we ask you to remember him for that.





Pili begins 2nd year as city manager excited about future

"I'm really excited about where we're heading," Ifo Pili said, as he begins his second year as Las Cruces city manager. His first day with the city was Sept. 8, 2020.

Pili, a native of American Samoa, and his family came to Las Cruces from the City of Eagle Mountain, Utah, where he began work as a management analyst in 2006 and became city administrator in 2012.

Before that, Pili played professional football for the NFL's Houston Texans, Philadelphia Eagles and New England Patriots.

Before moving here with family (wife Jenny Patterson Pili and eight children), Pili said he had heard that "the people are what make Las Cruces what it is."

"It's proving true," he said. "It's been amazing."

Las Cruces has "a small-town feel, but in a good way," Pili said.

Las Cruces is about twice the size of Eagle Mountain, which is part of the Provo-Orem, Utah Metropolitan Statistical Area. Its home, Utah County, and Salt Lake County to the north have an unbroken line of cities and towns totaling about 2 million people, he said.

Having started his job in Las Cruces during the peak of the pandemic, Pili said he is still exploring the city.

Last month's Aggies in Paradise fundraiser for NMSU athletics at Aggie Memorial Stadium was the first major public event Pili has attended since coming to Las Cruces, he said.

He and his family have also been to other local events, including the city's Music in the Park and the Farmers and Crafts Market of Las Cruces. He's also dined at many local restaurants.

"Seeing the city open up is just awesome," Pili said. "I'm looking forward to a lot of things."

Pili said he is enjoying working with Mayor Ken Miyagishima and the Las Cruces City Council.

"They've got heart and conviction for what they do," Pili said. "I appreciate that."

The same is true, he said, for city staff.

"People care about their jobs," Pili said. "They care about their city. It's nice to come to work every day knowing you're surrounded by people like that."

Possibly his biggest surprise since becoming city manager is that, despite Covid-19, "we haven't taken a hit on gross receipts tax," Pili said.

"In fact, it's gone up.
People are spending
more," he said, and the
city is now getting revenue from Internet sales.
Funding from the state
and federal governments
also has "helped us to continue as usual," Pili said.

And, while the future remains uncertain because of Covid, Las Cruces is doing well, he said. Businesses are looking to come to Las Cruces, there are opportunities to grow the film industry here and the future of Las Cruces International Airport is "one we can be excited about," Pili said.

"Andy's done an amaz-

ing job," he said about Airport Administrator Andy Hume.

With an investment of \$60 to \$70 million, the city is "building a real airport that can compete," Pili said. "That's huge."

The city is also investing more in infrastructure, Pili said, as the city council recently voted to boost this year's budget for road maintenance from \$4 to \$6 million.

"Roads are your biggest asset," Pili said, adding that he has been particularly impressed by the city's pavement management system.

With support from the state, Pili said roads will continue to be an important focus, for the city, including the possibility of constructing a road connecting the Las Cruces industrial park with Santa Teresa.

"The Legislature is re-

ally accessible here," Pili said.

Pili said his wife and their eight children "really enjoy Las Cruces."

Despite his hopes that she would attend New Mexico State University, Pili said his oldest daughter, Lia, is now a student at Brigham Young University. BYU is both her parents' alma mater, and "her dream school," he said.

The other Pili children, ranging in age from 5 to 18, are "doing really well," he said. They have "great schools and great teachers" and are participating in Las Cruces Public Schools sports programs and other activities in elementary, middle and high schools, Pili said.

"I'm really impressed with our school district," he said.

8 p.m. on KDBC NCIS: Los Angeles



VOTING INFORMATION

REGISTERING TO VOTE

Registration was closed by the County Clerk on October 5, 2021 EXCEPT at early voting locations prior to voting.

VOTING BEFORE ELECTION DAY

Absentee Voting

- Registered voters are eligible to vote by absentee ballot.
- Registered voters must request an absentee ballot before each election they wish to vote via absentee ballot.
- Absentee voting APPLICATIONS must be received no later than Thursday, October 28.
- BALLOTS must be returned in the provided envelopes by 7 p.m. on Election Day.

A person who willfully and with knowledge and intent to deceive or mislead any voter, precinct board, canvassing board, county clerk or other election official and who falsifies any information on an absentee ballot request form or who affixes a signature or mark other than the person's own on an absentee ballot request form is guilty of a fourth degree felony.

Voting Convenience Centers

Doña Ana County uses Voting Convenience Centers (VCCs). This allows voting at any location where voters will receive their own true ballot containing the candidates running in their district. With VCCs there is no wrong place to vote.

Early Voting

Voting at the Doña Ana County Government Center began on October 5, from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, and will continue until Saturday, October 30. This location will also be open on Saturday, October 16, from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., but will be closed for voting on October 11 in observance of Indigenous People's Day. The last day of early voting is October 30.

Early voting at alternate early voting locations will begin at 11:00 a.m. on Saturday, October 16 and will remain open Tuesday through Saturday from 11:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. until October 30.

Absentee ballots may be returned by voters, voters' immediate family members, or voters' caregivers at any voting site or at the Doña Ana County Clerk's Office.

Voting Offenses

Voters are obligated to report voting offenses to the City Clerk or the District Attorney.

Voting offenses are:

- Any form of campaigning within 100 feet of a building containing a polling place.
- Using, possessing, or carrying alcoholic beverages within 200 feet of a polling place.
- False voting, such as, voting or offering to vote although not qualified, voting in another's name, voting more than once during a single election, or assisting another person in committing a voting offense.
- Blocking the entrance to the voting location.
- Creating disorder or disruption at the polling place.

ELECTION DAY

On Tuesday, November 2, the Voting Convenience Centers will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

- If eligibility is verified, the vote is counted the same as other ballots.

 *If you are on parole for a felony, in prison, or a court has found you to be mentally incompetent, you are not eligible to vote or register to vote.

RANKED CHOICE VOTING

Las Cruces City Council Districts 3 and 5 have more than two candidates each and so there will be ranked choice voting in those districts.

What is ranked-choice voting?

Ranked-choice voting is an electoral system that allows people to vote for multiple candidates, in order of preference. Instead of just choosing who you want to win, you fill out the ballot saying who is your first choice, second choice, or third choice (or more as

needed) for each position.

The candidate with the majority (more than 50%) of first-choice votes wins outright. If no candidate gets a majority of first-choice votes, then it triggers a new counting process. The candidate who did the worst is eliminated, and that candidate's voters' ballots are redistributed to their second-choice pick. In other words, if you ranked a losing candidate as your first choice, and the candidate is eliminated, then your vote still counts: it just moves to your second-choice candidate. That process continues until there is a candidate who has the majority of votes.

ELECTION DEADLINES

- October 5: Voter registration (by mail or online) was closed EXCEPT at early voting locations prior to voting.
- October 5: First day that absentee ballots could be mailed to voters (who have submitted an absentee application) AND first day voters could cast their votes in person at their local county clerk's office.
- October 16: Additional early voting locations open.
- October 28: Last day to request an absentee ballot at your local county clerk's office.
- · October 30: Last day of early voting.
- November 2: Election Day

It was the size of a very small hotel room and was dumpy; she rented it out of desperation to shelter her daughter and brand new baby. While our current city council is concerned about plastic bags, we have low income families waiting up to a year to get approved for help. We should focus on the real issues Las Cruces faces and make sure our families come first.
- 2. Offer competitive wages to our police department; conduct more academies until the force is restored. We should implement a hiring freeze on other city positions until it's done. Our crime has steadily increased without a voice of reason to ask,"What's causing the crime spree?" Murder has skyrocketed in recent months. The police department could bring back a drug interdiction team. Neighborhood drug dealers gone. Let's open the door for mental health counselors to help those most in need.
- 3. Mandates affect business in a negative way creating extra cost, more regulations to manage. The cost is passed on to the taxpayers without our consent. The bureaucratic bullying needs to stop. Conducting community campaigns

1. The City should coordinate existing programs and non-profits engaged in affordable/attainable housing efforts to keep up to date with needs and resources and to ensure that educational materials about such resources are readily available to those who may benefit from them. Existing affordable housing units need to be assessed and upgraded,

as needed, to make them as secure, comfortable, and pleasant as possible. These and future units need to be situated for easy access to supportive services.

- 2. The City can expand availability and accessibility of services demonstrated to prevent crime, such as affordable housing and mental and behavioral health support. Design improvements such as lighting of public spaces and maintenance of unused properties is also effective. When possible, expanding or introducing community policing and outreach practices can help improve relationships between law enforcement entities and the community.
- 3. A review process included in the ordinance tied to this initiative will include use of paper grocery bags and environmental service fees. Additionally, surveys should be administered to retail establishments to determine number of reusable bags sold or given to customers; and to residents to gauge their feelings on the program's efficacy, benefits, and challenges. Anecdotally, residents and City employees can provide information about decreases in plastic bag litter in public spaces.
- 4. Economic Development: All areas must have equal opportunities for growth. Investing in existing corridors and local businesses to refurbish abandoned retail spaces, rather than only investing in new construction, will help ensure that we best use our resources.

Public Safety Challenges: Enhanced support for programs offering practical solutions to public safety issues, such as the Mobile Integrated Health initiative and its expansion into opioid overdose response and behavioral health crises.

for such projects. We could further incentivize more building of moderate and low-income housing by simplifying the permitting process and working with Realtors and lenders to find down payment assistant programs to help qualify moderate income households wanting to purchase a home.

2. We can increase the Police Service Aide program to have more of an officer presence in our neighborhoods. We can enhance the Las Cruces Police Department Citizens Academy and increase the number of neighborhood watch programs just as an example. We can more aggressively prosecute crimes especially violent crimes to decrease recidivism.

3. I guess the best way to evaluate the impact would be reading the quarterly reports that stores are required to file with the city on how many bags are given away and how many \$0.10 fees were collected. Other than that I believe it just comes down to seeing if there's a lesser prevalence of plastic bags flying around the city.

1. The need for the people of Las Cruces to live in safe appropriate housing is very important. A vision and goal with needed infrastructure such as roads, street lights, signs, schools, parks, as well as improve job opportunities with better pay are just as important to a viable safe populace. The specific means of how to develop strategies to meet the needs of the people is an all encompassing effort that would require input from various groups, investors, community leaders,

and church leaders.

2. This question has been relayed to me on many occasions. I can easily say there is no reason to reinvent the wheel. Local city police have been an establishment and historical bedrock of modern civilized societies for hundreds of years. The police must know they have the support of the communities that they live and serve irregardless of societal shifts. A sense of consistency and commonsense approach to law-enforcement is needed, although I do not believe in being an armchair quarterback.

3. The only way to evaluate progress or decline in any effort is through consistent unbiased data collection. After data in several established and agreed-upon areas this data can then be reviewed by panel of experts, community leaders, sanitation, and all other relevant groups and agencies. Becky Ann Corran, Las Cruces City Council candidate District 5



1. As a City, we can do several things to address affordable housing: 1. utilize zoning guidelines for new developments to promote affordable housing and promote infill in older parts of town; 2. support the rental community by strengthening landlord-tenant codes; and 3. consider creating an affordable housing trust. It is critical that Las Crucens have the opportunity for safe housing, and

through partnerships with community agencies and innovative policies we can ensure that residents thrive.

2. The city can invest in short- and long-term violence reduction initiatives that focus on the many dynamic factors that lead to crime, and in many areas, it already is. Some opportunities to better address crime include: 1. partnerships with community agencies that focus on prevention of child abuse, domestic violence and addiction; 2. utilize community-based data to develop a data-driven strategy; 3. advocacy for full funding of state and local courts.

3. The existing ordinance will be reviewed after two years, but there are opportunities to evaluate the impact in the shorter term. This calls for evaluating both the commercial/individual impacts and the environmental impact. Specifically, the City can: 1. track paper bag fees that are already planned to identify patterns; 2. outreach to retailers to identify impacts; 3. focus groups with residents and community organizations that pick up litter to see impacts on the local environment.

4. My priorities would be: 1. inclusive city planning through residents' voices to build walkable neighborhoods, affordable houses, green spaces and clean air; 2. economic recovery grounded in small businesses and nonprofit support that creates opportunity; 3. incentivizing employers that provide living wages, pathways to education and health; 4. reduced impact on climate change through the Climate Action Plan and advocacy for shifting utility use and distribution to reduce fossil fuels.

Yvonne Flores, Las Cruces City Council candidate District 6



1. Change ordinances to allow infill incentives; buy public land for community housing.

2. Expand an industrially based economy; promote community policing; support education and job training.

3. The impact will be data driven.

4. Roads, infrastructure, preservation of historic buildings, education, housing, behavioral health, sustainability, economic development, art, animals; follow the Comprehensive Plan to assure a healthy community.

William John Beerman, Las Cruces City Council candidate District 6



1. The City should address this using a sound decision-making methodology, such as systems design and analysis, which I studied at the university level. I also reviewed thousands of audit findings about government operations and each audit finding identified the root cause of a problem and addressed it with appropriate recommendations. We need to identify the root cause(s) of the housing problems and address them. We also need to consult experts, such as those at Mesilla Valley Community of Hope.

2. The City has plenty of money for other things and should fund a first-class Police Department, which is the one department we would keep if we could keep only one. City Council's efforts to defund the police during a crime spree have been exposed. They let the department fall to 75 percent of capacity. Now during an election they are publicizing one-time bonuses and other gimmicks, instead of providing respectable, competitive long-term salaries commensurate with the respect our police deserve.

3. I would take an objective approach

even though I am skeptical. Of course, I would have to prioritize my workload as a City Councilor and I might have more important work that would take precedence. That said, I would consider the input of the bag-restriction advocates, and pay close attention to the experiences of businesses who have to cope with enforcing the restrictions and complying with the reporting requirements. I see more discarded facemasks littering the town than I do plastic bags.

4. I would focus on two problem areas: corruption and socialism. Regarding corruption, the 767-page McHard investigative report said violations of laws, regulations, and policies were "rampant" within city management. The City also paid \$1.4 million to settle whistleblower lawsuits. City Council's Socialist ambitions are too numerous to mention here. I will press hard for the City to establish a world-class internal audit function to provide oversight and consulting services for city managers.

- 1. Teachers, support staff, administrators, parents, students, and the support of the community are the strengths of LCPS. A lack of strong leadership among past and current school board members is its great weakness, particularly the board's dismissive approach to involving parents and the community at large.
- 2. Curriculum and programs that have clear and measurable goals and that directly benefit the entire student body's academic growth and achievement must be expanded and funded appropriately. - 1. In general, the facilities range from fair to excellent and are distributed around the districts well. We should look at the districts in the near future to have more equal numbers of schools in each district. The teaching methods can be more beneficial by incorporating systematical use of multiple subjects which allow the students to see how everything can be used in their future professions. The determination of success in education is reported on state level.
- 2. More money is not the answer for producing better results for any type of education. The way that available funds are used is the key to having excellence in education. Use of history and language arts, taught properly, is the key to having the most well rounded presentation of multicultural education.
- 3. The main priority of budgeting monies should always be to get the money to area(s) that best fit the goals of the system. This means that most of the money should go to the classrooms. This is the opportune time to offer early retirement to a top heavy school system, and get that money back to the classroom level. This is now happening at the higher education level and in many corporate level industries. The monies should be used in the best interest of our students and teachers.
- 4. Online learning has been used in NM before COVID. The current system for online learning is a charter school system which is funded through a school system within New Mexico but the teachers are paid by the state. This is beneficial because it allows students with special needs to work from home and have teachers available to help.



Pamela M Cort, LCPS School Board candidate District 2



- 1. LCPS works hard to make sure all its students are successful. Everyone works for the benefit of the children and does the best they can with the resources they have. I think we should prioritize people over resources. Students learn best when community is established before curriculum. I visited an elementary school where there are 30 students in one kindergarten class! This is difficult for the students and the teachers. Students learn best when they feel a connection to their learning.
- 2. Yes. This goes back to the Yazzie-Martinez lawsuit and student connection. Culturally and linguistically responsive teaching allows for ALL student voices to be heard and validated. Multiple perspectives permit students to make connections, comparisons, and associations but, above all, they learn from each other's life experiences. This creates better empathy and promotes a broader world view, which in turn produces global citizens that understand and appreciate other languages and cultures.
- 3. As mentioned earlier, I would prioritize people over resources. I understand that the digital divide widened during the pandemic, but living in a technological void does not serve our students or our world very well. People need to interact with each other. This is how our society survives. We need more well-qualified educators who can give our students the attention, love and support they need. I believe in community first, curriculum second. People are our most important resource.
- 4. LCPS is doing a great job with our virtual academy. The district is reaching out to other, smaller districts and sharing our infrastructure so that all students, no matter where they live, have access to a computer and the internet. Again, I would increase the staffing. I found out that an elementary teacher had a virtual class of 64 students! Teachers cannot give the students the instruction they need with overflowing classrooms. Research

shows that smaller class sizes promotes better learning.

Robert C Wofford, LCPS School Board candidate District 3



- 1. Strengths: The perseverance of educators, families, and volunteers dedicated to providing students with opportunities to succeed by inspiring curiosity, nurturing imaginations, and instilling a love of learning. 

That hunch is advanced by an insistent FBI agent (Ed Harris) who intends to use McDeere as an informant though the firm's security chief (Wilford Brimley) is just as determined not to let the Feds get any such information, A private detective (Gary Busey) and his secretary (Holly Hunter, who was an Oscar nominee for best supporting actress here, but won best actress for "The Piano" the same year) also become involved in the situation.

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

"The fact is Adrian never gave up on himself, or on the safety and welfare of other officers involved in this incident," SAR said. "The training Adrian received in the (Las Cruces Police) Academy and throughout his 17 years with LCPD was successfully put to use on several levels

to bring an end to a volatile encounter."

Las Cruces' 2nd Big Read event features poet laureate Joy Harjo

Thanks to a \$17,000 grant from the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) and Arts Midwest (a nonprofit arts organization), the City of Las Cruces' Thomas Branigan Memorial Library (TBML) and Branigan Cultural Center (BCC) will host its second Big Read event of 2021 in October and November.

The second Big Read kicks off Monday, Oct. 11, and continues through Saturday, Nov. 13. It will include both live and Zoom presentations.

The month-long event will include Joy Harjo, the United States' first indigenous national poet laureate.

Harjo, who lives in Tulsa, Oklahoma, is the author of nine books of poetry, including "American Sunrise," along with plays, children's books and two memoirs.

"The Big Read is a unique opportunity for the Las Cruces community to come together and encounter Harjo's words and work as a community," said city Library Public Programs Manager Brita Sauer. "It also gives us an opportunity to reflect on indigenous history and celebrate contemporary indigenous culture. The library will offer a range of programs and learning opportunities for Las Crucens of all ages."

"We chose to feature Joy Harjo and this book especially for its resounding relevance to the com-

munity of Las Cruces, New Mexico," said City of Las Cruces Museum System Curator of Education Kayla Myers.

"Today, Las Cruces is situated on the ancestral and current homelands of the Warm Springs Apache of the Chiricahua Apache Nation, the Mescalero Apache, the Piro, Manso, Tigua, Tortugas Pueblo, Suma, Jumano, Tapaxkolmeh and numerous indigenous nations through time. Ysleta del Sur Pueblo lies 50 miles to the east in El Paso. At New Mexico State University, there is representation from the 23 recognized tribes in New Mexico. Las Cruces is also home to a large migrant population which includes many indigenous peoples in Mexico, Central and South America such as the Maya, Tarahumara and Chichimeca," Myers continued.

Others participating in Big Read include indigenous poet Gris Muñoz and Brandon Hobson, author of "The Removed," "Where the Dead Sit Talking" and other novels. Muñoz and Hobson will conduct writing workshops, talks and readings during the month.

Harjo will do a live reading at 5 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 13 at Rio Grande Theatre, 211 N. Main St. Downtown.

Harjo is "very excited" to be coming to Las Cruces for the event, Myers said.

Harjo has received the Ruth Lily Prize for Lifetime Achievement from the Poetry Foundation, the Academy

of American Poets Wallace Stevens Award, two NEA fellowships and a Guggenheim Fellowship.

Harjo is also a musician and has produced seven award-winning music albums, including "I Pray for My Enemies."

She is executive editor of the "Native Nations Poetry" anthology and editor of "Living Nations, Living Words: An Anthology of First Peoples Poetry."

She is a chancellor of the Academy of American Poets, chair of the board of directors of the Native Arts and Cultures Foundation and holds a Tulsa Artist Fellowship.

Big Read will also include reading groups for children, and there will be readings presented by local book clubs and conducted by New Mexico State University faculty members.

TBML, 200 E. Picacho Ave., will have books available for community pickup to follow along with Big Read, Sauer said.

NEA has funded more than 1,700 NEA Big Read programs nationwide since 2006, providing more than \$23 million to organizations nationwide.


Fine arts gallery features artists Morden, Rimbach in October

RenFaire celebrates its birthday with theme of 'Bridging Cultures'

For the 50th year of the Renaissance ArtsFaire, the Doña Ana Arts Council (DAAC) is honoring local diversity and our region's rich cultural heritage with a theme of "Bridging Cultures."

As historic authenticity is so important and even small mistakes can be considered profoundly disrespectful, the Arts Council has chosen to steer clear of representing precisely any historic figure from our area or any historic figure from Europe.

Instead, there is a man whose appearance alludes to Pre-Columbian Mesoamerica and a woman whose appearance alludes to the Italian Renaissance. The woman represents the tradition of the RenFaire across the last 50 years, but she

also represents new connections, possibly a new Renaissance. The man represents an aspect of the RenFaire that has only occasionally honored traditions on this side of the Atlantic, traditions that the Arts Council wishes to be included more permanently and more prominently in future RenFaires.

We here in the Mesilla Valley live, work and play on land where a culture the Spanish referred to as "Manso" once lived. While we have no record now of what the Manso People called themselves, we know they were genuinely, historically of this place. Descendants of the Manso, as well as of the Piro and the Tiwa, live here even now, and some have long dedicated their efforts to the pursuit of important federal recognition as a tribe. DAAC believes this is a part of our shared legacy that

must be recognized and honored.

In and near our vallev are pit-houses believed to have been temporarily occupied during hunts thousands of years ago by the people we now call "Mogollon." There is, additionally, more recent history of the Chiricahua Apaches claiming lands to the west of the Rio Grande and the Mescalero Apaches claiming lands to the east of that ancient river running through our valley.

There are artifacts, traditions and stories predating the arrival of the Spanish; later, people from Mexico; and ultimately, people from the United States. Among the artifacts, more than a few speak to trade existing between Mesoamerica and what is now northern New Mexico, as well as points in between; others







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ALR tackles immigration in October

New Mexico State University's Academy for Learning in Retirement (ALR) will host four Zoom presentations in October about immigration and the United States.

The programs will be presented by NMSU Department of History emeritus associate professor Jeffrey Brown, Ph.D., Department of Government professor Neil Harvey, Ph.D., Department of Finance emeritus professor Nancy Oretskin and Department of Government emeritus professor Christa Slaton, Ph.D. All four presenters have teaching or research experience that include the impacts of immigration, ALR said in a news release.

Brown earned a Ph.D. at the University of Illinois in Urbana-Champaign in 1979 and came to NMSU in 1984. His research has covered the pre-Civil War United States.

Harvey earned a Ph.D. in 1990 at the University of Essex in the United Kingdom, has carried out extensive

research on rural social movements in Chiapas, Mexico and is author of many articles on the Zapatistas as well as the book "The Chiapas Rebellion: The Struggle for Land and Democracy."

Oretskin established the U.S.-Mexico Conflict Resolution Center (CRC) with congressional funding sponsored by former U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M., and has practiced immigration law since 2010. Slaton earned a Ph.D. at the University of Hawaii-Manoa in 1990, has published three books and has specialized in teaching American national political intuitions, political parties, public opinion, women and politics and political participation.

"The United States is a nation inhabited to a great degree by immigrants and their descendants, but immigration is often controversial and has generated significant debates," the news release said. "This series will review immigration history, laws and policies; explore the causes generating emigration from southern Mexico and Central America; assess current asylum policies and case histories; and discuss immigration and the politics of white nationalism."

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
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Dogged determination: Pet owner lobbies for animal hospital

If Las Cruces gets a new after-hours emergency animal hospital, some of the credit will go to Barney and Fergus.

After Barney, a Basenji and redbone hound mix, was attacked by two other dogs and suffered serious injuries in June 2020, owner Dawn Duncan was able to take him to afterhours emergency care in Las Cruces. But, when Fergus, a schnauzer/beagle cross, started bleeding on a Saturday several days after surgery earlier this year, Duncan discovered that around-the-clock emergency animal care

was no longer available in the city and had to rush him to an animal hospital in El

Paso.

"I was shocked to learn that the second largest city in New Mexico does not have a seven-day-aweek, 24-hour emergency animal hospital," Duncan said in a letter to the editor.

"My dogs are my family," she said. "I have a responsibility to care for them."

Both dogs are now

healthy, and Duncan is on a mission to bring full-time emergency veterinary services to Las Cruces and southern New Mexico. She has organized a "civic action group" called Animal Companions of Las Cruces, which already has 65 local members who meet regularly and its own website.

"I will not stop until something changes," said Duncan, who moved to Las Cruces with her husband, Dennis, and their dogs Barney and Fergus in August 2019.

They came from Moorhead, Minnesota, which is adjacent to Fargo, North Dakota. With a population and median income comparable to Las Cruces, Fargo was able to open its own emergency animal hospital in 2005, Duncan said.

All the veterinarians in Fargo "came together," she said, put up \$50,000 and borrowed another \$150,000 to open an emer-

gency hospital. Each vet took one shift a month at the hospital, which was paid off and making a profit within five years, Duncan said.

That same model could be applied in Las Cruces, she said, and that's why Duncan is trying to organize a consortium of local veterinarians. Animal Companions is also contacting local realtors and the City of Las Cruces to find a suitable space for an animal hospital, she said, and is reaching out to students studying veterinary medicine to encourage them to set up practices in Las Cruces.

"Vets are superstressed," Duncan said. "We recognize that. We're trying to do something that would really help them," she added, as well as being a benefit to local pets and pet owners.

Connections to Hispanic culture are all over — just look around

Living right in the Borderland, we enjoy Mexican food any time of any day. We listen to Latinx music on the radio and watch Spanish language programming on TV. New Mexico is an officially designated bi-

lingual state. We celebrate our multicultural heritage even as we grapple with economic indicators, and health outcomes, low rankings in education and childhood wellbeing.

Doña Ana County is one of the poorest counties in the nation and Spanish speakers are often the poorest and least upwardly mobile segment of our population. What is there to celebrate? Quite a bit, according to John Leguizamo, creator of the 2017 Broadway show "Latin History for Morons."

Leguizamo, a Columbian-Puerto Rican American actor and comic, has combed American history to see where connections from the past impact current challenges faced by 20 percent of the nation's population.

The impetus for Leguizamo's research and subsequent creation of his one-man show was his son's distress about being called racist names as bullying escalated at his "fancy private school." Hoping to fortify his boy's self-esteem with his rich heritage, Leguizamo began searching textbooks to find a Latin hero for his son's history project.

"I always wanted my kids to be proud of their heritage. There was nothing about Latin history," he said. "Nothing. Zero. I felt nonexistent. I felt invisible. I felt history-less.

And the messaging that comes from that is that vou're worthless."

Leguizamo connects current social inequities to his thoroughly researched history lesson and sprinkles in recommendations to the audience for further reading. His top three picks for getting started are Eduardo Galeano's "Open Veins of Latin America," Howard Zinn's "A People's History of the United States," and Charles C. Mann's "1491" and "1493." The show, now available on Netflix, is intended for "mature sudiences" as it is peppered with expletives in two languages.

Hispanic Heritage Month conversations are vital to Hispanic and Latino children who now comprise 26 percent of the U.S. child population, according to analysis from the National Research Center on Hispanic Children & Families. When families talk about and respect all cultures at home, we strengthen core values of inclusion, empathy, cultural responsiveness, and perspective-taking that a child carries into the world.

In our area there are opportunities to share cultural traditions with

the whole family. Día de los Muertos (Day of the Dead), is a celebration of life and death and signs of the observance are cropping up in homes and public spaces now. Not to be confused with Halloween, Día de los Muertos has its roots in ancient Meso American culture and is observed on Nov. 1-2. Notice the bright paper decorations, colorfully decorated skulls and fanciful skeletons in bakeries, shops and public places. At home, families are reverently preparing altars in honor of lost loved ones for more personal observances. This holiday easily crosses cultures so everyone can participate.

The Children's Read-

ing Alliance will present the bilingual story, "The Festival of the Bones/El Festival de las Calaveras," written and illustrated by Mexican artist Luis San Vicente on Oct. 15. The story is suitable for children and will be performed in English and Spanish by actor and musician Jonathan Contreras with audience participation on Zoom.

Each participating family receives a copy of the book with suggestions for creating their own traditions, instructions for building and decorating an altar and recipes for baking Pan de Muerto and constructing sugar skulls.

Ergomotion, Inc., the world's largest manufacturer of bedding bases, and The Tecma Group of Companies, which provides shelter services for manufacturers, have announced new facilities in Santa Teresa, adding at least 10 new jobs to the state, the Garrity Group, an Albuquerque-based

public relations firm, said in a news release.

Martial arts dojo opens at Mesilla Valley Mall with free classes for women

Under the leadership of general manager Loretta Pina, Mesilla Valley Mall (MVM) is embarking on a new initiative to expand the types of enterprises offered at the mall, including more locally based ones.

Pina said while a martial arts dojo might at first appear to be an unlikely tenant for a shopping mall, it serves as a catalyst for a host of benefits such as increased confidence, self-defense skills, physical fitness and

improved mental stamina and social skills.

"One of my primary goals as mall general manager is to help bring people together to provide a welcoming environment in which to shop, socialize and grow," Pina said. "A martial arts dojo is a great way to help our residents of all ages to grow physi-

cally and mentally."

Pina said she researches prospective tenants that appeal to the needs and desires of the community, and she determined that a martial arts studio would be a great addition. So, she approached Eli Guzman, the president and CEO of Guzman Sport Karate and Kickboxing, Inc.

"Master Sensei Guzman accepted my invitation to meet and explore the mall with me," Pina said. "We discussed all the positive aspects of him locating here and he agreed to sign on."

This is the first martial arts studio in the mall since it opened 40 years ago, Pina said, and she and Guzman are working to bring the mall's first-ever martial arts tournament in the coming weeks.

Guzman's 4,000 squarefoot MVM location is called Guzman Martial Arts. His Guzman Sport Karate and Kickboxing, Inc. will continue to operate at 1203 N. Main St.

"Establishing a second location at MVM appealed to me because of its centralized location and popularity as a gathering space," Guzman said.
"The mall location will make it more appealing to join a class or continue an existing program."

He currently has approximately 65 students at the mall location and the number is growing.

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

NMSU great Trevelin Queen makes Laker training camp squad

Trevelin Queen's dream to play in the NBA is still alive.

In an announcement made by his agent, the former New Mexico State University men's basketball great made it known that he will be occupying a spot on the Los Angeles Lakers' training camp roster.

The partially guaranteed training camp deal makes the Glen Burnie, Maryland, product one of 19 players who currently comprise the Lakers' training camp roster.

While in training camp with one of the NBA's most storied franchises, Queen will be competing alongside the likes of LeBron James, Anthony Davis, Russell Westbrook, Carmelo Anthony, Rajon Rondo and others.

Queen's spot on the

Lakers' training camp roster likely came after the guard turned heads within the organization during his NBA Summer League stint with the club. Through five games with the Lakers' Summer League squad, Queen averaged 13.2 points, 2.6 rebounds, 2.0 steals and 0.6 assists in 19.0 minutes per

game. The athletic guard put up impressive shooting splits of .480/.538/.846 throughout his time in the Purple and Gold.

In the Lakers' final NBA Summer League game on Aug. 17, Queen powered the team back from a 17point deficit against the Golden State Warriors by finishing with 21 points,

five rebounds and four steals.

players to ever suit up for the Aggies, Queen helped NM State go 55-11 (.833) during his two-year stint in Las Cruces. That record included an incredible 31-1 (.969) mark in Western Athletic Conference (WAC) regular season games and as a result the Aggies picked up a pair of WAC regular season titles and the only available WAC Tournament crown during that stretch.

Individually, Queen topped the Aggies' charts in scoring (13.2 ppg) and minutes per game (27.5) during the 2019-20 campaign. In addition to that, the guard submitted averages of 5.2 rebounds, 2.4 assists and 1.7 steals per game while putting up shooting splits of .471/.387/.814. That allowed Queen to earn All-

WAC Second Team, NABC District Six Second Team One of the most exciting and USBWA All-District VIII Team laurels at the conclusion of the campaign.

Beginning his career as a spark plug off of the bench for the Aggies in 2018-19, Queen's path toward NM State stardom began in the 2019 WAC Tournament title bout with third-seeded Grand Canyon with a trip to the NCAA Tournament on the

Queen caught fire, erupting for an NM State career-best 27 points to help the Aggies rip the Lopes. As a result, he was named the WAC Tournament's Most Valuable Player.

With Queen on their side in 2019-20, NM State put up the first 16-0 run through WAC play in the history of the league which was a large part

of the 19-game winning streak the Aggies embarked on to wrap up the season.

Queen and the rest of the Lakers opened training camp for the 2021-22 NBA season on Sept. 29. Numerous options are on the table for Queen who could make the Lakers' roster for the 2021-22 season, earn a spot on the South Bay Lakers (the Los Angeles Lakers' G League affiliate) or collect a two-way contract with the club.

Play by the Rules. It's an unfortunate reality but most golfers don't know a lot about the rules of golf. Serious golfers usually do, but most golfers aren't serious or studious players. One thing I like about golf is that the rules have very little bend (but some) in

them. And the rules can sometimes work in your favor, just as in life. Go online for rules or get a USGA Rule Book.

Become Mentally Tough.

There is no other characteristic of successful people that is more shared between business leaders and sports winners than mental toughness. That's because the challenges are so similar in terms of

angry, grouchy folks who trudge around all 18 holes with bad vibes? If you want to play good golf, think positive; think possibilities.


