NEW SCAM IDENTIFIED IN DOÑA ANA COUNTY

Individuals in several states have reported receiving phone calls or emails informing them that there is a warrant for their arrest. A resident of Doña Ana County reported receiving a similar phone call. This communication is often part of a larger scheme to steal money, based on this deception.

As part of this scam, a person usually receives a phone call from someone posing as a law enforcement officer. The caller usually states that there is a warrant for the recipient's arrest. As technology advances, so do the scammers' capabilities to manipulate caller ID data to show that the call is coming from a local law enforcement agency such as the Doña Ana Sheriff's Office (DASO). Often, the caller claims that the arrest warrant is due to not paying a debt, missing jury duty, or committing some other minor offense.

The caller says that a fine is due and that if it is not paid in full that the warrant will be executed. Typically, the recipient of the call will be asked to wire money or in this local occurrence, purchase a packet of gift cards and provide the codes to the cards.

Report telephone scams online to the Federal Trade Commission. You can also call 1-877-382-4357 (TTY: 1-866-653-4261). The FTC is the primary government agency that collects scam complaints.

IMPOSTOR SCAMS: LEARN TO SPOT THESE SCAMS AND SAY NO!

The Doña Ana County Sheriff's Office would like to help the community learn more about telephone and impostor scams. These scams often begin with a phone call, text message or email. You may receive a phone call from a scammer who pretends to be law enforcement, a government agency or someone that wants to repair your computer. These are attempts to convince you to send money or share personal information.

RECOGNIZE THE SCAM

You get a call, email, or text from someone claiming to be:



Law Enforcement stating you have a warrant or you will be arrested, fined or deported if you do not pay taxes, purchase a gift card, or make a wire transfer.



A Court Official indicating that you failed to appear for jury duty and need to pay a fine or you will be arrested.

Community schools aim to improve quality of education and life

Thanks in part to a \$600,000 grant from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation, Las Cruces Public Schools is adding two more community schools to improve the quality of education at the schools and the quality of life in each school community.

The grant came in July and teachers, administrators, students and parents were at Alameda Elementary School, 1325 N. Alameda Blvd., Sept. 2, to cut the ribbon on the school's new designation as Alameda Community Elementary School.

The other new community school has yet to be selected, said LCPS Community Schools Coordinator Amanda Barela said.

Then National Education Association (NEA) President Lily Eskelsen Garcia was in Las Cruces

Jan. 19, 2017, for the ribbon-cutting that officially recognized Lynn Middle School as Las Cruces' first community school — and an early model for the success of the program in New Mexico.

The Las Cruces Partnership for Community Schools, begun in 2016, is a collaborative effort among LCPS, the City of Las Cruces, NEA-Las Cruces, New Mexico State University and local nonprofits, businesses, faith-based organizations, students, educators and families, according to LCPS. The partnership's goal is "transforming schools into neighborhood hubs."

Since 2017, LCPS has added MacArthur, Doña Ana and Booker T. Washington elementaries as community schools.

Community is the key word, not only in the school title but also in the

definition of its success. That's because collaborative leadership and community engagement and involvement are essential, Barela said.

"It's a strategy, not a program," she said. "It's not about giving people stuff."

"Research is clear that community schools, designed to provide comprehensive academic, social and health supports for students and family members, result in improved educational outcomes for students," the New Mexico Public Education Department (NMPED) said in a March 2021 report. "Community schools are particularly effective in communities of concentrated poverty, in which many families and neighborhoods have limited pathways to be engaged in their children's

education and are in need of additional supports (e.g., nutrition, home visits, medical, dental and mental health, academic enrichment, community-based learning opportunities), beyond what a traditional school typically provides.”

Because no two schools or school communities are alike, conducting a comprehensive needs assessment and creating a strategic plan are essential first steps in creating a successful program at any school, Barela said.

Lynn, for example, in partnership with Doña Ana Community College, has a dental clinic on site that is open to the public.

Another school might benefit from holding citizenship classes, Barela said, or its students and other children in the neighborhood might thrive with new or expanded after-school programming. A community school might also provide space for a community garden or an engineering program or knitting classes.

“We zoom in,” Barela

said. “We look at accessibility. We remove barriers. People participate in what’s going on.”

Along with parent engagement, a successful community school needs support from school leadership and the school district, she said.

LCPS Superintendent Ralph Ramos is fully on board, Barela said. He has expressed interest in establishing community-school feeder patterns within LCPS that could provide students with a community-school background throughout their entire school careers, she said. That, in turn, could mean higher graduation rates and improved college and career readiness.

Partnerships with nonprofits like Friends of Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument and Cruces Creatives makerspace are also essential to success, she said, and “how we are engaging our community in teaching our kids.”

LCPS also has an important connection with Community Partners in Education (CPIE), which “connects K-12 educators and students in Las Cruces community schools with local community partners to ensure that all young people have access to the resources they need to reach their full potential,” according to the CPIE website.

Barela said NMPED and

the state Legislature are also community-school funding partners.

Going forward, community schools will need to “show results,” Barela said, to sustain the initiative, including improved attendance, better test scores and a higher graduation rate. Ongoing assessment is also important to help determine if the school is meeting the community needs that have been identified.

Barela was born in Deming and grew up in Las Cruces. She is a Mayfield High School graduate with bachelor’s and master’s degrees in social work from New Mexico State University. Barela has been with LCPS since 2012 and became community schools coordinator last November.

County opens more early voting stations starting Oct. 16

The Doña Ana County Clerk's Office has added a ninth early-voting site that will be available to county voters beginning Saturday, Oct. 16.

Early voting began Oct. 5 at the Doña Ana County Government Center

(CGC), 845 N. Motel Blvd.

A new voting location at Mesilla Town Hall, 2231 Avenida de Mesilla in Mesilla, will join seven other locations around the county in opening to early voters starting Oct. 16. The other locations, in addition to Mesilla and CGC, are: Anthony City Hall, 820 New Mexico Highway

478 in Anthony, New Mexico; Delores C. Wright Education Center, 400 E. Lisa Drive in Chaparral; Hatch High School, 170 E. Herrera Road in Hatch; Sunland Park Doña Ana Community College, 3365 McNutt Road in Sunland Park, and three locations in Las Cruces (in addition to CGC): Las Cruces City Hall, 700 N. Main St.; Sonoma Elementary School, 4201 Northrise Drive; and NMSU Corbett Center, 1600 International Mall on the NMSU campus.

"We added Mesilla Town Hall as an early voting location this year because we wanted to make sure that each municipality with races on the ballot had a location for its voters to participate," County Clerk Amanda López Askin said.

Early voting at CGC is 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday through Oct. 29, plus 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 30.

Early voting at the alternate voting locations, including the new site in Mesilla, will be 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday-Saturday, from Oct. 16-30.

Absentee ballots will be mailed to voters who have approved applications beginning Oct. 5, the clerk's office said.

Absentee ballot applications are available at NMVote.org. The deadline to submit an application is Thursday, Oct. 28. The deadline to return

absentee ballots is 7 p.m. on election day, Tuesday, Nov. 2.

Anyone who is unable to access the website can visit the county clerk's office, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday in CGC.

Senate confirms Torres Small as undersecretary for rural development

The U.S. Senate has confirmed former New Mexico U.S. Rep. Xochitl Torres Small of Las Cruces as undersecretary of the U.S. Department of Agriculture for Rural Development.

The confirmation came in October and was an-

nounced in a news release by U.S. Sens. Debbie Stabenow, D-Michigan, chairwoman of the U.S. Senate Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition

and Forestry, and John Boozman, R-Arkansas, the committee's ranking member.

"As undersecretary for Rural Development, Xochitl Torres Small will build on her legacy as a champion for small towns and rural communities — much like the one she grew up in in New Mexico," Stabenow said.

"She will give a voice to 60 million rural Americans at the highest levels at USDA. I look forward to working with her to address critical rural needs including high speed Internet, infrastructure and good paying jobs."

"While our committee handles a diverse range of issues, everything we do boils down to improving

the livelihoods and future for those who call rural America home," Boozman said. "There are many pressing challenges facing our rural communities that Congress and USDA must work together to address. I congratulate incoming Undersecretary Torres Small and stand ready to work with her to expand access to afford-

able high-speed broadband, ensure continued access to reliable energy production, improve water infrastructure and create new economic opportunities in rural America."

Torres Small, a Las Cruces attorney, represented New Mexico's 2nd Congressional District in 2019-20.

"Our staff is able to help with any voting needs, along with other services," Lopez Askin said.

Voters can return ab-

sentee ballots through regular mail, at any polling location or at the clerk's office. Pursuant to the New Mexico Election Code, caregivers and immediate family members may also return an absentee ballot on behalf of a voter, but only at the clerk's office.

Those who are qualified can register to vote at any early voting location through Oct. 30 immediately prior to voting.

The Clerk's Office continues to follow all federal, state and county pandemic-related guidelines, the clerk's office said.

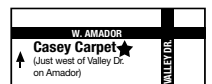

Bond, levy will improve students' lives

In addition to an array of candidates for local elections, your Nov. 2 ballot will feature two questions regarding the Las Cruces Public Schools.

First is a school bond issue, that will retain \$50 million in bonds without increasing your tax rate.

Second is a public school capital improvements levy based on your property values.

"Education is always a good investment for our country," said LCPS Superintendent Ralph Ramos.

Most of the plans for the school system's bond will shore up buildings and facilities.

"The majority of our buildings are older buildings," said Kelly Jameson, public information officer for LCPS.

As an example, two elementary schools – Cesar Chavez and Hermosa Heights – need new roofs. The combined cost

is \$4.1 million.

If you're like me, you still think of the Field of Dreams as "new." But the stadium is more than 20 years old now. The track around the field is showing its age, breaking apart in places, creating potentially injury-inducing hazards for our young athletes. The bond issue would spend a

little more than \$1 million resurfacing the track and adding dugouts to the Field of Dreams softball fields.

Zia Middle School has a crumbling interior wall threatening safety, and the bus loop needs re-routing to prevent traffic hazards on University Avenue. Those renovations combine to more than \$2 million.

Unfortunately, safety in our schools has become a nationwide concern. Safety includes

proper fencing, intercoms and security doors. The bond will include \$1,375,000 to make those modifications at Central, Cesar Chavez, Doña Ana, Hermosa Heights, Hillrise, Mesilla, Mesilla Park, Sunrise and University Hills elementary schools, Lynn Middle School and Mayfield High School.

One of my favorite segments of the bond issue is the Enriched Learning Opportunities. This goes for two important learning centers. One is for Early Childhood and the other for Career and Technical Education. Increased opportunities for early childhood are invaluable. We all know how well the youngest children can learn when exposed to new things. I've long been a believer in the value of vocational education or, as Ramos puts it, "experiential learning." There is a growing shortage of people who can work construction, plumbing, welding and other trades that

often produce careers more lucrative than many college degrees. We need to make sure our young people can experience as much as possible so they can make more informed decisions about their career paths. These learning centers will not be cheap. The price tag of \$3.3 million covers planning, conceptual design and infrastructure. If you ask me, though, this bond is the best way to cover that expense.

The bond includes kitchen remodels at Highland Elementary and Lynn Middle School, districtwide modifications for compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act, solar energy solutions, new maintenance facilities, land acquisitions and, the biggie, \$15 million for the rebuild of Columbia Elementary, which is scheduled to re-open in fall of 2024. If you'll recall, a few years ago, widespread dan-

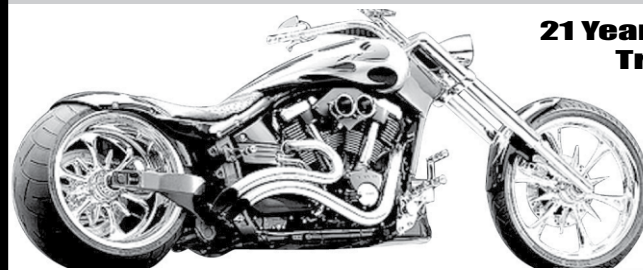

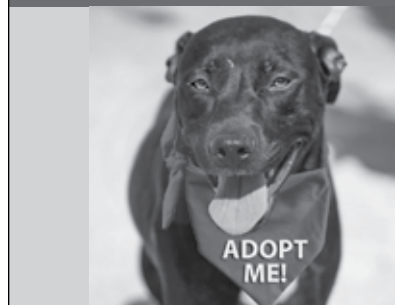

Lots of resources available to get informed for local election

Early voting began for local elections on Oct. 5.

As you prepare to vote, you need reliable information to determine which candidates best represent your values. This involves investigating a variety of diverse sources of media (broadcasting, publishing and the Internet).

In choosing media to review, ask the following questions:

1. Who created the message and what is the purpose?
2. What techniques and images were used to attract your attention or

manipulate emotions?

3. How might other people understand or interpret the message differently from you?

4. Are there relevant issues, values or points of view included or omitted from the message?

5. Who makes money from the message?

6. Why was the message sent?

Public radio and television are generally reliable sources of information. The League of Women Voters of Southern New Mexico (LWVSNM) has partnered with KRWG TV and Fred Martino to

broadcast candidate forums for Las Cruces City Council and school board elections. If you do an internet search for KRWG Election 2021, you will find the recorded forums. The league supports using forums over debates, so that candidates can share their own values and positions on issues. Debates often encourage disputes, which may be less informative of the candidates'

positions.

Please subscribe to our local newspapers, as they are reliable sources of information as well. The LWVSNM published its Voters Guide in English with the Oct. 8 edition of the Las Cruces Bulletin and in Spanish with Camino Real Media about the same time. Additional copies may be found at the Branigan Library, 200 E. Picacho Ave. and other locations in the city and county.

Technology influences our democracy, civil discourse, voter/election information and political participation. There are people who rely strictly on social media for news,

while others view social media as broken and in need of change. It is evident that there are advantages and disadvantages to the Internet and social media.

An advantage is that reliable voter information can be obtained, if users ask questions and think critically about the ideas found. A disadvantage is the ease of spreading disinformation and false information intended to mislead about the integrity of elections and about the positions of candidates. Cyberbullying is easy to do on social media and should be reported to the social media company. Report all voter intimi-

ation to the DAC Clerk and/or secretary of state.

For reliable information, please go to www.VOTE411.org for the LWVSNM Voters Guide and other election information. Also, check out www.nmvote.org, www.dacelections.com and <https://www.facebook.com/LWVSNM/>. The leaders we elect make decisions that affect our daily lives, therefore educating ourselves prior to voting is worth the effort.

Election Day is Nov. 2.

Jaramillo won't accept contributions in bid for 2nd term

Las Cruces Public Schools Board of Education member Ray Jaramillo has decided not to accept any campaign contributions as he runs for a second term in District 1 in the Nov. 2 election.

Without yard signs, paid advertising or mailers, Jaramillo said his campaign is based on the relationships he has developed in the community and the "history of who I am and what I stand for."

Jaramillo said he will "rely on my tennis shoes" in his campaign, as he walks his district and attends activities and events.

"I've never voted for anyone because they've had a fancy mailer or signs," Jaramillo said.

"I believe my district knows me," he said. "I owe it to my community to have four more

years to advocate for students and schools."

Jaramillo is director of Alpha School, Inc. preschool in Las Cruces, and has been with Alpha since 1995, he said.

Jaramillo has been LCPS board president since January, as board members have dealt with the death of a superintendent, hiring a new superintendent, "a huge budget crunch," the ongoing pandemic, replacing a school board member and dissent over school dis-

trict policy.

"Karen was my neighbor ... my friend," Jaramillo said about former LCPS Superintendent Karen Trujillo, who died in an auto accident in February. Jaramillo said Trujillo's husband, Ben, knocked on Jaramillo's door shortly after the accident last February and asked Jaramillo to come to the scene and be with the Trujillos' daughters and their dogs.

With support from the school board, LCPS staff and administrators and the community, Jaramillo led the process of hiring new Superintendent Ralph Ramos "in a short amount of time," Jaramillo said.

"Ralph is doing absolutely amazing," he said. Ramos "is all the community could ask for."

After board member Terrie Dallman resigned in June, Jaramillo guided candidate interviews and the selection of Pamela Cort as the new board member.

Jaramillo said LCPS Policy JBC, Equity and Excellence for All Students, which the board updated in July, came about because of a 2018 state district court ruling in the Yazzie vs. Martinez lawsuit mandating that the state provide "educational sufficiency" to all students.

The policy had previously been voted on without controversy, he said, and has only become an issue because of political rhetoric.

"There is nothing in the policy that mentions critical race theory," Jaramillo said. The policy,

he said, is "designed to support our students in giving them the necessary tools and education (and) the ability to look at education through multiple lenses."

Students' learning should include multiple "cultural and educational lenses," he said.

"All types of how we learn are exemplified in JBC," Jaramillo said, which allows students "to tap into the multiple ways we can view history."

Nothing has changed since Policy JBC was implemented, he said. The board's vote to update the policy "codifies what the district was already doing."

Jaramillo said he and Ramos have met with a number of groups to talk about Policy JBC, "extending a hand," he said,

to facilitate discussion and understanding of the policy.

Jaramillo said LCPS is in the process of writing the regulation that will accompany JBC, and the school board is involving the community in writing it.

Jaramillo's son graduated from Centennial High School in 2020. His daughter is attending CHS. Jaramillo served as president of the Jornada Elementary School Parent Teacher Organization for eight years.

In addition to his school board campaigns, Jaramillo ran in the 2016 Democratic primary in the New Mexico House of Representatives District 36 race, losing to incumbent state Rep. Angelica

Build My Future means hands-on experience for Cruces students

Talk about hands-on learning!

About 350 students from four Las Cruces Public Schools high schools were in the parking lot of Rawson Builders Supply and Doña Ana Community College (DACC) Technical Studies, 2345 and 2355 E. Nevada Ave., to participate in the Las Cruces Home Builders Association's (LCHBA) Tyson Brown Memorial Build My Future Showcase 2021.

A total of 25 hands-on exhibits were part of the showcase, as local builders and contractors gave students the opportunity to try their hands at everything from welding, drywalling and stucco work to framing, plumbing and cement work.

Las Cruces Utilities and the Las Cruces Fire Department also had booths — and a fire truck — at the showcase. DACC also had a booth.

LCPS Superintendent Ralph Ramos visited with students at the event and called it “a celebration” that highlights the col-

laboration between LCPS and local builders and the construction industry.

That collaboration gives students who are graduating from local high schools more options as they consider their futures at a college or university, in the military or joining the workforce, Ramos said.

“Today was all about workforce,” he said about Build My Future.

Ramos said he could feel students' excitement during his visit to the

event, and heard them saying, “This is what I'm interested in.” Ramos said he also heard students “diving in deep with questions” about construction-industry jobs as they spoke directly with professionals on site.

Ramos said he was approached during his first month as interim superintendent about the school district providing bus transportation for students to participate in the event. He said an enthusiastic “yes” to the request.

Students were building wall panels at the Hakes Brothers residential construction booth.

“These students have a hand in building one of the Hakes Brothers homes,” said builder Ryan O’Hea, who is a member of LCHBA’s board of directors. Hakes Brothers was a major sponsor of Build My Future.

“Hands-on experience is exactly what this day is about,” LCHBA Executive Officer Nicole Black said.

“This is awesome,” said



El Paso Electric was on hand for Build My Future with a line-man and bucket truck.

Maggie Loya, of Desert View Homes, who served as chair of the event.

The event “was held to inspire young people to pursue careers in the skilled trades, and to change public perception and raise awareness about

the construction industry that promotes a skilled workforce for the future,” LCHBA said.

Las Cruces 'can do better,' says board of education candidate

"We are failing overall," Las Cruces Public Schools Board of Education District 1 candidate Abelardo "Abel" Balcazar said.

Student performance in reading, writing, math and science assessments is below 50 percent at all schools, said Balcazar, who is making his first bid for public office in his race for the District 1 seat on the school board.

"We can do better than that," he said. "We don't reach our full potential because of our school system."

A native of San Antonio, Texas, Balcazar joined the U.S. Navy after graduating from high school and served for 20

years. He was a Navy recruiter in Las Cruces from 1994-97. For the past two years, Balcazar has been a safety officer in the City of Las Cruces Risk Management Department.

"I've been a leader my whole life. I know what it takes to solve problems," Balcazar said.

"Just being a volunteer is not enough," he said of his decision to run for school board. "I've got to get involved."

The current board, he said, "is not receptive to input from parents and

the community," and makes decisions that are contrary to what community members want.

One example, he said, is last year's vote to change the name of Oñate High School to Organ Mountain High School.

Another example, he said, is the board vote to adopt Policy JBC, Equity and Excellence for All Students.

"What's the purpose of an equity policy other than to make a political statement," Balcazar said. "It doesn't do anything to improve student performance in the classroom."

The board should focus on the needs of individual students and on "common humanity ... instead of the divisiveness being created in our community,"

he said.

Also, JBC should have been adopted in a more open and transparent way, Balcazar said. If the policy isn't intended to promote critical race theory, he said, the board should "take the time to inform the community," including holding parent forums to discuss the policy instead of saying, "We passed it. Moving on."

The school board is "not receptive to people that have valid concerns and don't necessarily agree with them," Balcazar said. "The board needs to remember who they work for."

The school board should also have control of local education, Balcazar said, not the state Public Education Department.

That includes decisions about mask wearing and other pandemic-related issues.

School board members should "answer to the people that elected them, not to an unelected body in Santa Fe," he said.

Balcazar said he is also concerned about how LCPS is managing its budget.

"We don't spend it where it's most effective," he said.

Classrooms, parent outreach and STEM education are near the bottom of district budget priorities, Balcazar said, and career programs for high-school students and after-school programs also aren't ranked as high as they should be.

The budget process isn't

effective because it lacks parent involvement, he said.

"His heart's in the right place," Balcazar said about LCPS Superintendent Ralph Ramos. "He wants what's best for students, teachers and staff."

But, Balcazar said, the school board "may not be giving (Ramos) the support he needs to do his job."

Balcazar said the school district's most socially disadvantaged populations should receive more support.

"I was that kid in San Antonio," Balcazar said. "I grew up in a bad neighborhood. It's education that got me out of there, and parents that made

Retired colonel to become 56th inductee into WSMR Hall of Fame

Retired Army Col. Robert Lipinski, a longtime resident of Las Cruces, will be the next inductee into the White Sands Missile Range (WSMR) Hall of Fame.

As the 56th member of the hall of fame, Lipinski is noted for his 35-year association with the missile range community as a senior Army officer, a contract manager and as a volunteer in many com-

munity organizations.

The ceremony will take place Wednesday, Oct. 27, at a luncheon at WSMR's Frontier Club. The event will begin at 11 a.m. Reservations are required and can be made by calling the White Sands Protocol Office at 575-678-1028. The deadline for making reservations is

Lipinski was born in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania in 1939. He grew up there and earned a bachelor of science degree in mechanical engineering from the University of Pittsburgh in 1961. Upon graduation, Lipinski was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Ordnance Corps.

He came to White Sands as director of the National Range in December 1985. Lipinski's assignment to the missile range was no fluke, as he actively sought the job based on

his past experiences in weapons development and testing jobs. In fact, he came to New Mexico from Yuma (Arizona) Proving Ground, which he commanded for two years.

For almost four years, Lipinski was director of the organization that oversees the missile testing on the sprawling test range. He was in charge of 1,350 military, civilian and contractor personnel and a \$60 million operation. According to his hall of fame nomination, Lipinski was "adept at managing programs, money and

people. And he did it very well." Later, Lipinski said his approach was to practice "common sense and good timing."

After his tenure as National Range director, Lipinski served as WSMR's deputy commander from 1989 until his retirement in 1990.

After his retirement, Lipinski went to work for a succession of three range-support contractors, using his experience to tailor support to meet White Sands test requirements. Also, he took on the role as adjunct profes-

sor for the Florida Institute of Technology on the WSMR campus for teaching general management and mathematics courses. From 1992 to 1994, he served as president of the Association of the United States Army and, from 1996 to 1999, he was president of the White Sands Pioneer Group.

Jim Eckles worked in public affairs for 30 years and is in the White Sands Missile Range Hall of Fame. He is now secretary for the Doña Ana County Historical Society.

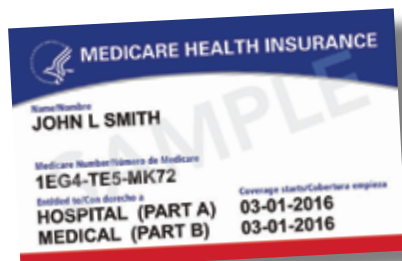

When a customer walks into a store, they may never think about whether the foundation of the building was correctly cured. Driving down streets, residents may never think about whether the right amount of oil was mixed with the asphalt. Yet, materials testing ensures that construction is up to regulatory standards to keep our buildings and roads safe. In Las Cruces, one of these companies, located in the Las Cruces Innovation & Industrial Park (LCIIP), is Design Technologies (D-Tech).

For the last three years, owner Dennis Parrack has brought decades of experience to drill, test, and report on the materials and soils for new developments in Las Cruces and throughout the region.

"We do things like check the density of soil or the compressive strength of concrete during construction," explained Parrack. "During pre-construction investigations many times what

we find are loose or unsatisfactory soils underlying proposed foundations."

Parrack found the location in LCIIP to be the perfect hub for the projects that span from Las Cruces to Silver City to Deming to Elephant Butte. "It's been great access to the highway," he said. "It's close to town but has space to be more solitary and work without interruptions."

D-Tech usually has its front doors locked, and staff spends more of its time back in the testing rooms. In one room, concrete is kept underwater at a specific temperature and then compressed in a high-pressure machine to verify compliance.

In the next room, soils are drying on the floor before testing and asphalt in pans ready to be

taken into the oven to burn off the oil. Then comes the sieve test, which checks the size of the rocks which determines the grade of the asphalt. Every day is different depending on the client's needs, but what keeps changing is the number of certificates that fill the walls in the front hallway.

"I'm a firm believer in certifications, and I push those for my workers," said Parrack. "It helps them better themselves and helps us because it makes us more diverse and lets us bid on different projects. I believe in building their careers while making sure our work is done right."

Joint Superfund Project at Griggs-Walnut Holds 9-Year Anniversary Open House

Many residents routinely visit the Harty Athletic Complex, the BMX bike track, or the skate park off Hadley Avenue. Maybe a few have wondered what is beyond the recreational areas, the building on the hill with two tanks. For those curious, those tanks are attached to the co-owned City of Las Cruces and Dona Ana County Griggs-Walnut Groundwater Plume Superfund remediation project, which is operated and managed by Las Cruces Utilities. The project just completed its 9th Anniversary, where visitors could come out to see how LCU cleans contaminated groundwater daily.

The water treatment facility clears the groundwater of the chemical perchloroethylene — commonly referred to as PCE — to make the water drinkable. PCE is a manufactured chemical used for dry cleaning clothes and degreasing metal and was first detected in Las Cruces groundwater in

1993. The affected water wells were immediately taken offline.

In June 2011, both the Las Cruces City Council and the Dona Ana Board of County Commissioners approved the Environmental Protection Agency's Modified Administrative Order and provided an intent to comply with the EPA. The action allowed for the construction of a water treatment facility which processes more than 350,000 gallons of water per day, removing the PCE and making the water suitable for drinking.

“Due to the efficiency of the project, the upper portion of the PCE plume has decreased in such a manner that the pumping regime for Well 18 has been modified from pumping 8 hours per day at 90 gallons per minute to 6 hours per day at 88 gallons per minute for two days per week,” said LCU Assistant Utilities Director Adrienne L. Widmer, P.E. “This allows the treatment system to treat water that is above the maximum contaminant level instead of treating water below regulatory levels.”

Multiple monitoring wells are used for sampling, analyses, and current mapping the locations of the PCE plume annually. Earlier in January 2021, older monitoring wells were rehabilitated.

“I had an intensive

tour of the facility about a year ago shortly after I joined the commission, but I was interested to see the progress a year later in further reducing the contaminants,” said LCU Board of Commissioners member Dr. Harry Hardee. “It is a very well run facility, but the average citizen probably knows nothing about the facility or purpose.”

The contaminated groundwater is pumped from two offline municipal wells — No. 18 and No. 27 — and passes through air strippers that expose the impacted water to oxygen, which dissipates the PCE, removing it from the water. Chlorine is then added to the treated water before being transferred to the Upper Griggs Reservoir, off Triviz Drive, and distributed for consumption.

More than just a field of corn: Celebrate fall at Mesilla Valley Maze

After 23 years, one business in the Mesilla Valley has grown from one little corn maze made in honor of Las Cruces' 150th birthday into a yearly institution providing not only a maze but numerous games, activities and pumpkins on October weekends.

Anna Lyles is the mover who leveraged her family's 2,000-acre farming operation into a place for adventure including not only the corn maze — this year shaped like the United States — but all the other things going at 3855 W. Picacho at the edge of Las Cruces.

"Everything is going well," Lyles said. "Schools are returning. Folks are coming on the weekends. They seem to be glad to have a place to go and get back to normal."

Area schools are active scheduling weekday visits to the site. There is plenty to do but also plenty to learn, with a hayride to the 20-acre pumpkin patch to choose their own pumpkins as they connect with the agricultural roots of the area.

"Agriculture-based education has been an important part of the operation ever since I started it," Lyles said. "Farming is our family tradition, and it's something that every generation should understand and enjoy."

Although the site is open to the public every weekend, 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays in October, they also host special events like the Pumpkin Festival coming up on Oct. 23-24.

"The community has been really supportive," she said. "I have a great crew of people and the weather has cooperated."

Lyles also said the event has tried to steer away from anything electronic.

"Other than people using their phones to take pictures, there is no reason to have your phone here," she said. "There is enough to do so you don't have to play games on your phone."

Professional musician Ed Montana will be on hand from Amarillo, Texas to play and host the Pumpkin Festival. Las Cruces native and a 2020 American Idol participant, Dzaki Sukarno, will also provide entertainment during the festival.

Montana, who is Lyles' brother, wrote the theme song/jingle for the festival. Sukarno, 20, went to Centennial High School and is currently a student at New Mexico State University.

Activities include not only the maze but also a giant slide, hayride to the pumpkin patch, playground, photo areas, ring games and the live music.

"Three more weekends and we're done for another year," Lyles said.

But, she said, it's not the kind of thing you decide to build in September. The planning for the next year starts almost immediately. In December, things go into action — a maze pattern must be chosen, and fields prepared. Summer is for planting and growing.

"While it's not quite a full-time job to make it happen, it is my focus all year," she said. "It's not the kind of thing anyone

The Mesilla Valley Maze is open to the public from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. every weekend through Oct. 31.

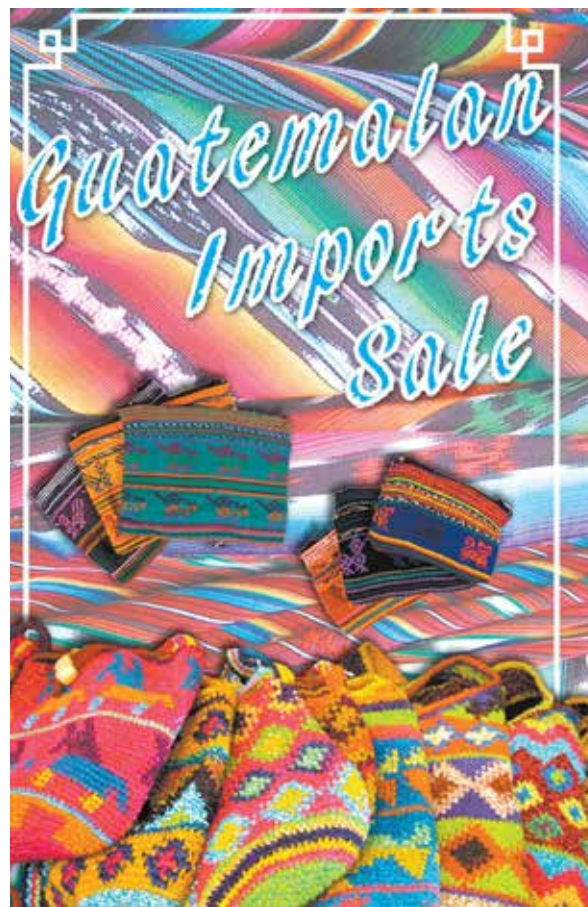

Longtime Cruces resident wants to give back on city council

“This city has given me everything and it’s time for me to give back,” said David Telford, who is making his first bid for elective office in his campaign for Las Cruces City Council District 5.

Telford is one of four candidates in the District 5 race, which means it will be decided by ranked choice voting. Incumbent Gill Sorg is not running for re-election.

Telford is a native of Fabens, Texas, who grew up

in northern Chihuahua, Mexico, where his family were cattle ranchers.

He attended school in Colonia Juarez and served four years in the U.S. Army, including service as a tank commander.

Telford moved to Las Cruces in 1981 and earned a degree in journalism from New Mexico State University in 1988.

He worked in local property management for many years, he said, and retired in 2019 after a 30-year career in local radio, including as an account executive, promotions director and sales manager for Bravo Mic Communications, LLC, and as underwriting coordinator for KRWG-TV at NMSU.

Telford continues to serve as a media consultant to Bravo Mic and teaches a journalism class, creative strategies and copywriting at NMSU.

He also spent several

years as public relations director for Southwest Counseling Center.

“My time there really opened my eyes to the struggle faced by those with mental illness and the stigma attached to it,” Telford said. “We worked with the police department to supply 24-hour, on-call therapists to go out with the officers and help de-escalate situations when there was a possible mental illness element involved in the incident.”

Telford also has volunteered for many community events, including Southern New Mexico March of Dimes, City of Las Cruces Fourth of July celebration and the Whole Enchilada Fiesta and was a member of the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce Conquistadors. He also has served for a decade as a youth basketball and soccer coach and has volunteered on local political campaigns.

District 5 is “a beautiful district,” Telford said, and “a work in progress.” The district has walking trails and parks, but more are needed in that district and throughout the city,

he said.

Telford said he is a pet lover and lives about a mile from the Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley (ASCMV). If elected to city council, Telford said he wants to work with ASCMV staff and volunteers to see that their needs are addressed.

Telford said he wants to work on issues “I have the ability to influence,” instead of focusing on national and international issues that the city council has no authority over.

“Focus on us,” he said. “That’s the first priority.”

Telford said he is concerned about Las Cruces’ crime rate and wants to work with the police department to increase community policing.

“Defunding the police is crazy,” Telford said. “That’s not going to solve anything.”

City government “has gotten very progressive,” said Telford, who describes himself as a moderate and a centrist with both conservative and liberal views.

The city, he said, “needs some new ideas, some new perspectives.”

Telford said he would “bring balance” to the

council.

In 30 years of dealing directly with local businesses, Telford said, “the nature of my business was listening to their business, hearing their stories and struggles, seeing them as they grew.”

Local businesses, he said, are “the backbone of any community.”

Rather than “grinding them down into the ground,” city regulations should help businesses open, grow and flourish, Telford said.

“Let’s make things simple,” he said, including streamlining the permitting process for local businesses.

“It’s been my privilege to volunteer for the city for 40 years,” Telford said. “It would be an honor to serve as city councilor for the next four years.”

Telford said he has begun knocking on doors as part of his campaign and is talking to business owners every day and asking them, “What do you care about? What impacts you?”

movie review

A star, namely Kevin Costner, was born with ‘The Untouchables’

One of the films that made Kevin Costner a star also is one of the best movie versions of a television series to date.

“The Untouchables” – which EPIX shows Tuesday, Oct. 19, while it streams this month on Hulu – was part of a one-two punch, along with “No Way Out,” for Kevin Costner in the summer of 1987. Robert Stack had major TV success from 1959 to 1963 with the role of Prohibition-era agent Eliot Ness, but with the assistance of director Brian De Palma and screenwriter David Mamet, Costner redefined the true-life law enforcer as a more vulnerable figure in his pursuit of legendary mobster Al Capone.

The latter part gives Costner a hugely formidable acting match in Robert De Niro, and though their scenes together are limited, the impact of those moments is palpable. That's not the only case of a veteran actor making a big impact here, either: Sean Connery earned an Oscar as Jimmy Malone, a streetwise Chicago cop who gives Ness a big advantage by joining his small and specially selected team.

Andy Garcia and Charles Martin Smith are the other members of Ness' so-called “Untouchables,” and along with Costner and Connery, the unlikely combination of crimebusters gives the picture a lot of its appeal. There's great pleasure to be had from seeing Connery's crusty Malone educate Costner's relatively genteel Ness in “the Chicago way” of dealing with enemies, while there's just as much enjoyment in seeing Ness use crafty psychology to turn things his way ... which isn't to say he doesn't resort to brute force when deemed necessary.

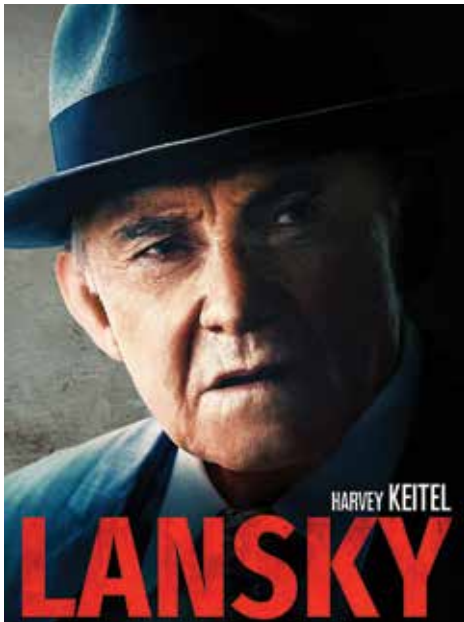

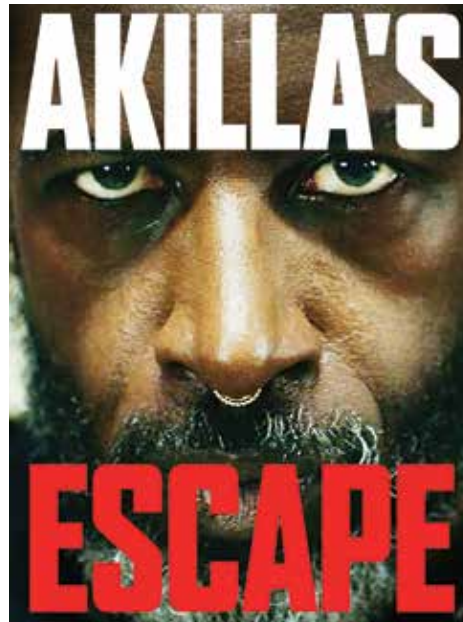

“I can sell jewelry in about five different languages,” said Las Cruces jewelry maker and Las Cruces and Mesilla farmers market regular Marcella Huppke.

A native of the Adirondack region of upstate New York, Huppke has been making and selling jewelry for nearly 50 years.

She sold her unique wooden bracelets and other handmade jewelry in craft stores and, after moving to Florida, traveled in an RV with her cat, Sebrina, for eight months out of the year for many years to indoor and outdoor markets in the Northeast, the South and the Midwest.

Huppke was a featured artist at Busch Gardens, an African theme park in Tampa, Florida, for 20 years.

Huppke moved to Las Cruces about two years ago and is a regular vendor at the Farmers and

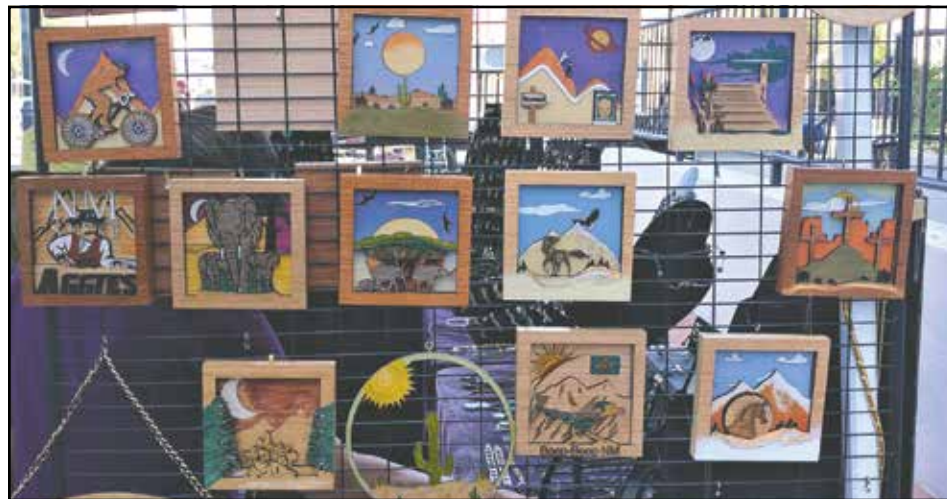

Her Las Cruces farmers market booth in front of the bank, near the intersection of Main and Las Cruces, is Uniquely Chic Jewelry & Accessories.

Handmade wooden bracelets are Huppke’s signature creations. They are made from a wide variety of different woods,

including bamboo and cypress from Florida, mesquite (a tree that blew over in her backyard has been a source), red cedar that grow locally, and more exotic wood like purpleheart and cocobolo. She used solvent-based dyes to create unique colors and also incorporates designs into many of her pieces, including South-

western motifs.

Huppke also sells earrings, pendants, hair jewelry, a few finger rings and jewelry made with semi-precious stones, beads and shells. She also does some wire craft items.

Everything Huppke makes is one of a kind. You can ask her about doing special requests.

Her prices range from \$15 to \$150, Huppke said, and most items are priced under \$50.

“It’s been great,” she said about her move to Las Cruces. “I really wouldn’t want to go anywhere else.”

LCCT's latest 'Almost, Maine' is a fabulous team effort from troupe

They say a great actor makes a great director. In the case of "Almost, Maine," continuing for the next two weekends at Las Cruces Community Theatre, it's absolutely the truth.

Brandon Brown was brilliant as Elwood P. Dowd in "Harvey," which marked LCCT's successful return to live theater after an 18-month pandemic break. It's one of many, many memorable roles he's performed on just about every stage in Las Cruces.

As soon as "Harvey" closed, Brandon stepped into the role of director for "Almost, Maine," and brought more than a pocketful of the magic of "Harvey" with him.

There's no 6-foot invisible rabbit in this show (at least I don't think so), but it has the same enchanting, mystical quality that makes you believe in good things and good people. It has moments that are very sad, deeply insightful and hysterically funny. (I hurt myself a bit from laughing so hard at the scenes with the ironing board and the missing shoe.) There's also more than a sprinkling of fairy dust in these stories, with endings we all wish were possible; maybe, they are in a place called Almost, Maine.

That's the fictitious town created by playwright John Cariani for this exceptional work. It features four outstanding Las Cruces actors: Nora Brown (related to Brandon only

through talent), McKensi Alexis Cabot, Rhiannon Michelle Hardin and Melis Derya White.

I cannot say enough for their performances, both individually and together. Each one shines like the Northern Lights. I was deeply touched by each actor at one or more points in the show, and I was especially impressed with how each played their male characters — no hamming it up, just applying the same skill and talent they brought to every other character.

The play continues the outstanding work that Nora, McKensi and Melis have done in many Las Cruces venues and it welcomes Rhiannon to the LCCT theatrical family — "Almost, Maine" is the first show she's done in more than 10 years. What a cast!

Brandon also benefits from a great crew, including stage manager Cindy Pitts; the wonderful costumes designed by Yamilex Holguin; sound designer Mike Wise;

lighting designer Bekah Taulbee; board operator Jessie M. Ortega; properties by Lennie Brown (she is related to Brandon both by marriage and by talent) for properties and set decoration, with help from Greta Burger; and absolutely fabulous (and sometimes excellently mobile) sets, with scenic design by Doug Roby and Marc Forbes, who were assisted in building the set by Larry Fisher, Alecks Rundell, Alice Carron and cast members. Heidi Brown did the excellent window display and the photos and worked backstage.

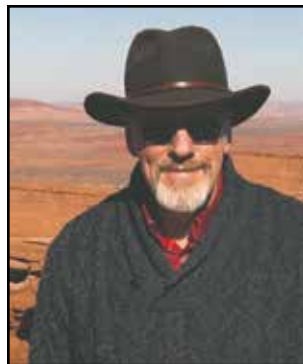

NMSU hears 'no complaints' after return to live theater with 'Fefu'

high-school teacher.

Tony Hillerman (1925-2008) was an American mystery author noted for the cultural details he provided about his subjects: Hopi, Zuni and especially Navajo Tribal Police, the book club said in a news release. "Hillerman's work reflects his appreciation of the natural wonders of the American Southwest and his appreciation of its indigenous people," the news release said.

His novels are set in the Four Corners area. The protagonists are Joe Leaphorn and Jim Chee of the Navajo Tribal Police. Lt. Leaphorn was

introduced in Hillerman's first novel, "The Blessing Way," published in 1970. His last Leaphorn-Chee novel was "The Shape Shifter," published in 2006. Hillerman lived in Albuquerque.

Morris' book captures the author's early years in Depression-era Oklahoma; his near-death experience in World War II; his 60-year marriage; his family life, including six children, five of them adopted; his work as a journalist; his affliction with PTSD and its connection to his enchantment with Navajo spirituality; and his ascension as one of America's best-known mystery writers, the book club said.

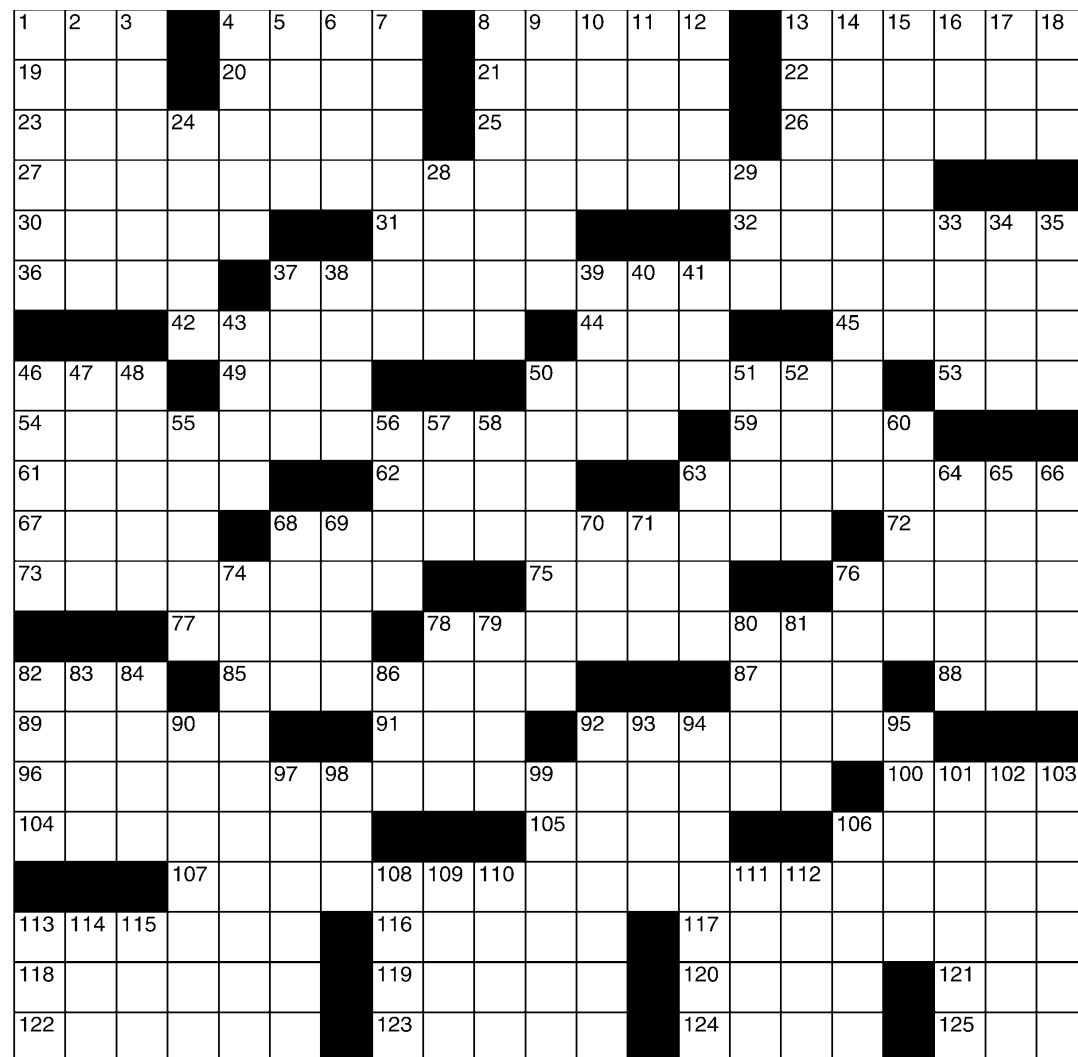

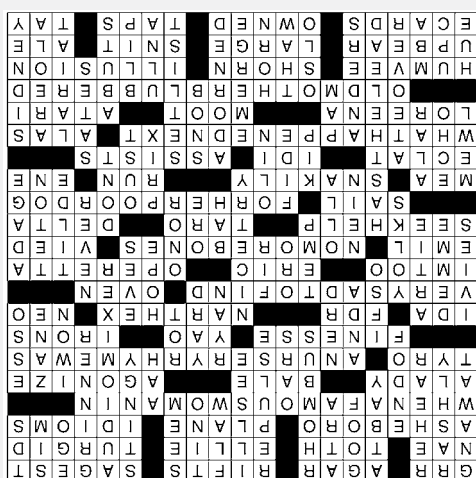

Animal rescue organization settling into new, larger home

Thanks to a generous bequest from the Las Cruces estate of Sheila Pickett, ACTION Programs for Animals (APA) of Las Cruces has made the final payment on its new adoption center at 537 N. Solano Drive.

The facility, on the site of the former Solano Animal Clinic at the corner of North Solano and East Court Avenue, covers more than 3,000 square feet, said APA Executive Director Michel Meunier, and is twice the size of APA's former location on West Picacho Avenue. APA moved into its new digs in November.

APA is an adoption center for cats and kittens, dogs and puppies, Meunier said.

Among its canine population, small dogs

are "easier to find homes for" than large dogs, she said. Sometimes, there are even multiple requests to adopt the same small dog, although Chihuahuas are not as popular as other small-dog breeds, Meunier said.

Large dogs, especially pit bulls and pit bull

mixes, are more difficult to adopt out, she said.

APA often boards other local pet rescue organizations' dogs that are slated for relocation out of the area, Meunier said, and provides that housing for up to two weeks at no cost.

The new adoption center includes small- and large-dog rooms, a cat and a kitten room, outdoor areas for dogs, cats and kittens, a sick ward and a ringworm ward. (Ringworm can take several months to treat, but the animal in treatment will recover, Meunier said.) There is also a bottle-baby ward for the youngest animals that still need to be bottle fed. There is even a separate cat kitchen. And, there is a meet-and-greet room so visitors can get to know a cat, dog, kitten or puppy they might adopt.

APA welcomes volunteers, including dog walkers, Meunier said. It also is grateful to receive donations of money in any amount (you can sponsor

a new cat condo for \$1,200, for example), as well as new or gently used pet supplies and pet food.

Las Cruces veterinarian Dr. Richard Johnson provides dog and cat health care services at APA at a reduced cost, Meunier said. She said APA also works closely with the Schumacher Veterinary Clinic of Las Cruces for care that can't be done in house.

APA has a part-time executive director (Meunier), two full-time location managers and five part-time employees supporting each location (adoption center and thrift store – see below).

P.A.W.S.

Prisoners and Animals Working Together Toward Success (PAWS) is a training program that pairs dogs from APA — which has taken most of them from the Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley — with inmate handlers at Southern New

It will offer these services for \$15 each: microchipping; Bordetella vaccine; DAPP (Distemper, Adenovirus, Parainfluenza and Parvo) vaccine; FVRCP (Feline Viral Rhinotracheitis, Calicivirus and Panleukopenia) vaccine; and Rabies vaccine (one- and three-year dose).

"We administered more than 60 rabies vaccines, 37 microchips and many other vaccines at our August clinic," APA Executive Director Michel Meunier said. "We look forward to offering another affordable clinic for the community."

make up the Zodiac, a different one being visible each month. A multitude of objects make their appearance in the sky. Of course, there are the stars but hidden in their identities are

objects which are much larger than they appear to the human eye which are called "nebulae."

There are nine major

bodies we call planets which rotate around the sun. In order of position, they are Mercury, Venus, Earth, Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus, Neptune and Pluto. Living in Las Cruces, New Mexico, has provided a ringside seat for the controversy among astronomers over whether or not Pluto is really a planet. It is especially significant because Clyde Tombaugh, who was a resident here, discovered

Pluto with his homemade telescope.

Several years ago, National Geographic magazine published on its cover an amazing photograph that appeared to be made up of thousands of stars. Actually, each "star" was a galaxy — a huge grouping of stars. The universe has thousands of galaxies. We on Earth live in the Milky Way galaxy. It is hard to imagine the vastness of space and the variety of things which make it up in addition to the billions of stars, with new ones being created all the time.

I must mention meteorites which we often see passing overhead. Perhaps you have seen bright objects flying through the sky. They most likely

are meteorites, pieces of iron. As they hit our atmosphere, they begin to shine and eventually fall to Earth. Now, since there is so much space debris floating around, it can be surprising what may show up.

In this present world, UFOs have appeared which seem to come from another sort of universe. They come and go and move about in unpredictable ways. Many strange reports of various sightings have become public.

Several years ago, I had a UFO experience. It was about 5 in the late afternoon. The sun had gone down but no stars had appeared. I saw five star-like objects arranged in something like how the stars are arranged in the

Big Dipper. They were stationary in the same position for about 10 minutes. There were no other planets or objects in the sky. I checked for any evidence of airplanes or jet trails but saw none.

Gradually, one by one the bright objects disappeared. The next day when I went to school, another teacher reported to me that he had seen the same bright objects and watched them for about 20 minutes.

I figured that they could qualify as UFOs because they were in the sky, and they were unidentified!

Electronic Caregiver receives \$1.2 million in state job-training funds

Electronic Caregiver (ECG), a tele-health company based in Las Cruces, has been awarded \$1.2 million in New Mexico Job Training Incentive Program (JTIP) funding to support plans to expand and create 120 new jobs at an average hourly wage of \$22.15, the Mesilla Valley Economic Development Alliance (MVEDA) said in a news release.

ECG will also receive

\$135,000 in WagePlus funding from the City of Las Cruces and \$100,000 through El Paso Electric's (EPE) New Mexico Economic Development Fund (NMEDF), which is administered through MVEDA and the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico.

The expansion will almost double the number of ECG employees, which now stands at 150.

The New Mexico Economic Development Department, City of Las

Cruces Economic Development Department and MVEDA worked collaboratively with ECG to foster the expansion, MVEDA said.

The state of New Mexico's JTIP can reimburse companies for a portion of training costs for above-average wage positions. WagePlus is a supplement to the state's JTIP program. WagePlus rewards businesses for hiring and paying higher than median wages. The program provides a \$1,500-per-job

reimbursement for qualifying companies that hire and train new employees for jobs paying at least 10 percent more than Doña Ana County's median wage.

NMEDF was established by EPE in connection with the sale of the utility to provide \$1 million per year for 20 years to support economic development within EPE's New Mexico service area, MVEDA said.

"This is an amazing time for our company,"

ECG Care Coordination Executive John P. Muñoz said. "Our Care Coordination Center will help customers live well, live happy, live safely and live more independently. Our company offers career growth opportunities, medical and other benefits and various shifts. As we transform health care, we will see tremendous growth. health care system that all other urban communities enjoy.

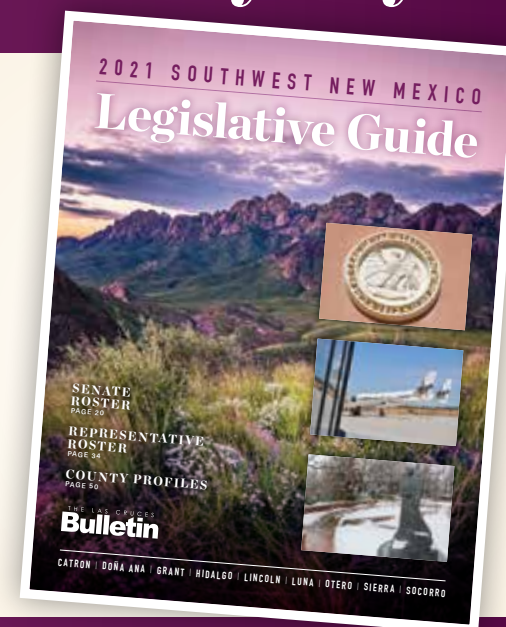

Census shows lessons we should pass on to younger generation

As a community, we have amazing groups of people rallying around our children to help them prepare for their futures. Educators, after-school program facilitators, non-profit organizations, businesses providing internships to high-school students and numerous other big-hearted community members invest in this next generation to help them chart the course to a great life.

From The Bridge of Southern New Mexico's perspective, we've worked across our partnerships to focus on academic outcomes (high school and college completion, dual credit courses, Career and Technical Education) that will render economic impact in the lives of these students (awareness, exploration and preparation for higher wage, higher-skilled jobs).

These are important building blocks, but there are so many other things we should be teaching our young people now to set them up for a life of financial independence. Financial literacy is a critical component. Avoiding student loan debt is another. The pros and cons of public assistance programs, which can be a help in time of need, but place asset and income limits on recipients that will later handicap their ability to take job promotions and other opportunities to increase their earnings.

The release of 2020 Census data revealed some other important les-

sons we should be passing on to our children to help them avoid a life in poverty. We know that one in four members of our community lives in poverty, and one in three of our children until 18 do, as well.

According to an analysis of the data by the American Enterprise Institute, household demographics are "very highly correlated with household income." The researchers broke down the income of U.S. households into five groups (quintiles):

- Lowest fifth: \$0-\$27,026;
- Second fifth: \$27,027-\$52,179;
- Middle fifth: \$52,180-\$85,076;
- Fourth fifth: \$85,077-\$141,110;

• Highest fifth: \$141,111 and above.

The study found, "high-income households are far more likely on average than individuals in low-income households to be well-educated, married, working full time and in their prime earning years. In contrast, individuals in lower-income U.S. households are far more likely than Americans in higher-income households to be less-educated, working part time, either very young (under 35) or very old (over 65) and living in single-parent or single member households."

Let me share some specifics. Let's start with education. Those with bachelor degrees made up the highest percentage of those in the top three quintiles. Those with a high-school diploma or

less made up the majority of those in the bottom two quintiles.

As for employment, the study reported on the number of earners per household. Married couples with more than one earner comprised the majority of those earning higher wages. Single parent families or singles comprised the highest percentage of the lowest three categories of earners, including a whopping 83.3 percent in the lowest earning bracket.

The study also looked at whether individuals

were working part time, full time or not at all. In four of the top five quintiles, those working full time made up the highest percentage of earners, but the numbers grew larger the higher the income bracket. The highest earners comprised 78.4 percent, the second highest 72.1 percent, the middle bracket 61.6 percent and the second lowest 47.

Conversely, those who did not work or worked part time made up the highest percentage of those in the lowest and second lowest quintile.

So, as we come alongside our young people, we can also help them understand the links between life choices and their impacts on future earnings. Information is power, and armed with information, our young people can set a course to a future that brings out the best in them and the best outcomes for their lives.

That's what makes the nearly three decades of sustained success at Organ Mountain High, formerly Oñate High, so amazing.

"When you are out there hurting on the course, you don't run for yourself; you run for your team. I think that is how we get our success. It's so selfless. When you win, you win as a team."

That's how Organ Mountain senior Brynn Olsen describes the success the school has had over the years.

Organ Mountain cross country is off to another strong start under the guidance of veteran coach David Nuñez, who has guided the program since 1994.

The boys and girls var-

sity teams have combined for 24 district championships over the years. The girls have finished as high as third at state and the boys fourth a couple of times. The program also recently won its 100th invitational team title under Nuñez's guidance.

"I would like to see us continue to get better and progress," Olsen said.

"We have won quite a few meets and I want you to continue doing (well) so by the time we get to district and state, we do great."

Nuñez said that Organ Mountain/Oñate has established a tradition of cross country success that breeds upon itself with younger siblings seeing their older brothers and sisters run and then coming out for the team when they get to the school.

"We call it our cross country family," he said.

Nuñez said he likes to tell his runners that everyone is important and every runner counts.

"Every runner in our program has value and worth. My goal is to get them to believe in themselves and reach their full potential," Nuñez said.

In cross country, a team's top five runners score but runners six and seven can displace or knock other teams' top

Playing with matches: How match play can bring out the best in golf

In the wake of the blowout victory 19 to 9 (like 60 to 28 in football) by the American team over the Europeans in the Ryder Cup a few weeks ago, I thought it might be nice to discuss some of the elements of match play golf. The game of golf actually began hundreds of years ago as a contest between

two players, trying to best each other, while bracing themselves against the stiff breezes sweeping over the Scottish links. Match play golf is essentially very simple. Two players (or two pairs of players) compete hole by hole, and the golfer/s who wins the most holes wins the

match. Simple. What's not so simple is that many golfers do not grasp the idea of match play, or the rules or the strategies of match play. The Ryder Cup, President's Cup, Solheim Cup, Walker Cup, Curtis Cup, NCAA golf finals and other international team events are all contested in match play format, in contrast to the regular LPGA and PGA Tour style golf which is

stroke play (total score).

While the Rules of Golf apply, there are, of course, a few variations and contingencies in the rules that are particularly important. One is that a stroke or hole may be conceded to your opponent at any time, as long as the ball is not in flight. Very short putts are the strokes mostly conceded. Note that a conceded stroke may not be declined or

withdrawn. Another rule that is sometimes strictly adhered to is that the player who is "away," i.e. farthest from the hole, plays first. Formal match play tournaments are surely not a matter of "ready golf." You play in order of who is away until the balls are holed.

When a hole is won or lost, neither player need continue golfing. Pick up your ball and go to the

next hole; the match play game tends to be faster that way. In stroke play if you play the wrong ball, you incur a two-stroke penalty; in match play, it's loss of the hole. Slow play that is deemed excessive? Loss of hole. There are many more subtleties.

My first tip about match play is that you play your own game, even when

you have a partner. You should not get caught up in watching your opponent's play and wondering if you can top him. Over the years, I have found that the emotional ups and downs in a one-on-one match can be far greater than just going out an trying to shoot a score. Each hole is a mini-battle,

with a possible victory or a loss. The nice thing, though, is that a disaster on a single hole is only one hole, and usually won't sour the outcome.

In terms of adjusting to match play, my next tip is to keep your emotions in check. Too many golfers start thinking ahead and assuming what will happen. Don't. If anything, expect that your opponent will make the great shot

to get out of trouble and will make the improbable putt that you saw as not makeable.

Don't allow yourself to be surprised. Surprise can be dreadful in a tight match.

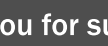
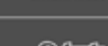
