




Halloween is a fun and spooky time of year for kids. Be safe with these tips from the Doña Ana County Fire & Emergency Services Department:

Don't forget to vote: Nov. 2 election features city, school, other races

Tuesday, Nov. 2, is Election Day, as Las Cruces voters cast ballots for city council, Las Cruces Public Schools Board of Education — plus yes-no questions on a \$50 million school bond issue and a 2-mill levy — and the Doña Ana Soil and Water Conservation District (DASWCD) Board of Supervisors.

Early voting continues at nine locations around the county through Saturday, Oct. 30.

"Public education is very dependent upon public support of bond issues," said former New Mexico Governor and NMSU Chancellor Garrey Carruthers of Las Cruces. "This is true for both our public schools and institutions of higher education. Voting for educational bond issues is your best way to signal you support the efforts of the educational system, the work they are doing and you understand the need for continuous updating of facilities. I have voted for this year's General Obligation bond issue and ask you to do the same.

There are 40 voting locations that will be open across the county — a qualified voter can vote at any location — 7 a.m.-7 p.m. on Election Day.

tions" to find a complete list of early voting and Election Day voting locations.

Las Cruces City Council districts 3, 5 and 6 are on the ballot. There are three candidates, including one write-in candidate, in District 3 and four candidates in District 5, so both races will be decided by ranked-choice voting.

There are only two candidates in District 6, so ranked-choice voting will not be used in that election.

The district 1, 2 and 3 seats on the LCPS Board of Education are on this year's ballot. Each race has two candidates.

Voters may cast ballots for two DASWCD supervisors from among the four candidates on the ballot.

There are also races for mayor in Anthony (New

Mexico) and Hatch; for town council in Mesilla, village council in Hatch and city council in Sunland Park and Anthony; and for municipal judge in Mesilla, Sunland Park and Anthony.

There are also races for seats on the Gadsden Independent School District and Hatch Valley Public Schools boards of education and the Caballo Soil and Water Conservation District board.

Both Gadsden and Hatch have bond issues on their ballots as well.

Absentee ballots must be received in the Doña Ana County Clerk's office by 7 p.m. on Election Day to be counted.

Ranked-choice voting is part of a 'robust democracy,' expert says

In the Nov. 2 local election, two Las Cruces City Council races — districts 3 and 5 — will be decided by ranked-choice voting (RCV), which gives voters a number of advantages, said Maria Perez, a ranked-choice advocate who helped set up RCV in both Las Cruces and Santa Fe.

"We rank things every day," said Perez, cofounder and co-director of Democracy Rising, a national political organization founded in 2020 with offices in Santa Fe and Washington, D.C.

RCV is like "picking an apartment," Perez said. "No apartment is perfect." Some are bigger, she said. Some have better park-

ing, some have carpeting, some come with utilities paid or have other

advantages or disadvantages, she said.

"You rank your options," she said. "It's the same sort of thinking, comparing candidates: What's great about them, what's not so good about them."

And, if you rank them in order of your preference on your ballot, "your vote stays in play even if your favorite candidate does not win," Perez said.

"My hope is that voters prioritize participation in important local elections that often can affect their daily lives more than they realize," said Doña Ana County Clerk Amanda Lopez Askin. "Additionally, RCV's goal is to engage more voters and candidates as well as have a majority of voters that put some level of support behind a winning candidate."

The county clerk's office is administering the Nov. 2 election countywide.

In city council district 3 and 5, if one candidate gets 50 percent plus one vote in the first round of voting, the race is over. If no candidate gets a majority in the first round and there are more than two candidates in the race, it proceeds to RCV and a Doña Ana County computer program eliminates the candidate with the

fewest votes and then allocates his or her second-, third- and possibly fourth-ranked votes to the other candidates in that race. The process continues until one candidate has a majority of votes in each race.

RCV also encourages voters to learn about all candidates in the race or races they are voting in, Perez said, so they can give each one the appropriate ranking on their ballots.

RVC also eliminates any disincentive a prospective candidate might feel about running for office, Perez said. With voters ranking candidates, "you're not going to be spoiling it for anyone," she said, or help to elect another candidate you don't support. Instead, RCV encourages

candidates to talk about their platforms and "what is important to your constituency."

RCV also encourages candidates to "make sure all the voters know about them," she said, "even those that prefer different candidates." That way, a candidate can appeal to voters who have a different first choice but might rank him or her second.

At the same time, Perez said, a voter should only rank those candidates he or she supports.

"No voter needs to put someone you don't like on the ballot," she said.

And, Perez said, it's perfectly acceptable to vote for only one candidate in a RCV race.

With RCV, "elections become more competitive," Perez said, "and

that's a good thing."

It's "good to have diverse voices ... different ideas, (people) thinking of their community in different ways," she said. That is part of a "robust democracy."

RCV can also save municipalities money because they eliminate the need for a runoff election, Perez said. A recent runoff in Albuquerque, which does not have RCV, cost the city \$1.5 million, she said.

The three candidates in the District 3 race are Becki Graham, Bev Courtney and write-in candidate Gregory Shervanick; incumbent Gabriel Vasquez is not running for a second term. The four candidates in District 5

LCHS Band finishes in top 10 despite equipment being stolen

"You overcome and the show goes on," Las Cruces High School Band Director Ty Frederick said about the band's top-10 finish in the Zia Marching Band Fiesta in Albuquerque last Saturday despite the theft of thousands of dollars in band instruments and equipment the night before.

As they were preparing to leave LCHS for Albuquerque early Saturday morning, Oct. 22, Frederick got a call that the band's equipment truck had been stolen from an Albuquerque motel parking lot, along with about \$200,000 in musical instruments and sound equipment.

When Frederick told band members about the

theft, "It didn't feel real at first," said Luke Bugbee, a

freshman who plays bass drum.

When Frederick said he "had some bad news," Luke said he thought there might be a problem with lunch that day, or something like that.

"It was hard to believe for a second," he said. "The more you thought about it, the more you thought about how many important things were on the truck."

Frederick immediately began making calls — to NMSU and Las Cruces area and Albuquerque high schools — to borrow drums, sousaphones, a complete sound system and color-guard flags so the band could perform that afternoon.

One of Fredrick's first calls was to NMSU Music Department Head Fred Bugbee (Luke's father), who loaned drums and color guard equipment to LCHS.

El Dorado High School (Albuquerque) Band Director Brad Dubbs promised the loan of percussion equipment and

Bond tackles infrastructure

Las Cruces Public Schools has a \$50 million bond issue on the Nov. 2 ballot.

If passed by local voters, it will not increase property taxes. The money will pay for a wide range of LCPS projects, including \$5 million for kitchen remodeling at Highland Elementary School and Lynn Middle School; about \$2 million for Zia Middle School for a bus loop and to rebuild an interior wall; \$4.1 million for roof replacements at César Chávez and Hermosa Heights elementary schools; almost \$1.4 million for security fencing, intercoms and safety doors at a dozen schools; and \$5.65 million for land

acquisition and contingency funding.

There is a second LCPS yes-no question on the ballot that seeks voter approval of a 2-mill capital improvements that will be provide funds for maintenance, school equipment, playground improvements, classroom furnishings and other projects across the school district. Visit www.lcps.net/bond.

are Becky Corran, Ronnie Sisneros, Robert Paquette and David Telford; incumbent Gill Sorg is not running for a fourth term.

Incumbent Yvonne Flores and challenger William Beerman are the only two candidates in city council District 6, so ranked-choice voting will not be used in that race.

Districts three, five and six are the only Las Cruces City Council races on this year's ballot.

The mayor and council seats in districts 1, 2 and 4, along with municipal judge, are not up until 2023.

RCV is not used in any other local races in Las Cruces, and Las Cruces and Santa Fe are the only two New Mexico municipalities that use RCV.

RCV will not be used in races for 1) mayor, city or town council or municipal judge in Mesilla, Hatch, Anthony, New Mexico or Sunland Park; 2) Las Cruces Public Schools, Gadsden Independent School District or Hatch Valley Public Schools board of education races: 3) Doña Ana or Caballo soil and water conservation district board of supervisors races; or 4) any other race in Doña Ana County that is on the Nov. 2 ballot.

Together or individually, Perez and Democracy Rising co-founder Grace Ramsey have worked on campaigns to adopt or implement RCV in nearly a dozen municipalities across the country, including Las Cruces, Santa Fe and New York City.

When the orange cones go up on your street, are vou the one who wants to be the first to know what is happening and if you and your neighbors might be affected? If you want to know if it's a Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) crew working on your street, or in your area, get the information before it happens by making sure that your contact information is up to date.

"Alerts are related to emergency service outages, planned service outages, fire hydrant system flushing, and also for utility account statuses — like an overdue bill or the day before service cut-off," said LCU Business System

Analyst Jeff Dillard. LCU provides utility alert messages to customers by email, and as a text to your phone — all specifically about your utilities services or outages that could affect your area.

Will state leave room for teachers to maneuver with new standards?

A great nation is able to teach its history honestly, celebrating its triumphs and correcting its mistakes.

That's what
the New Mexico
Public Education
Department is trying
to accomplish with its
proposed revision to the
social studies standards.
The 122-page plan lays out
in fine detail what would
be taught to students in
social studies classes from
kindergarten through
high school.

And that's one of my concerns. Dictating every detail from Santa Fe wouldn't seem to leave much room for teachers.

The revision comes at a time when school districts throughout the nation are going through

the wrenching process of reevaluating how we look at our past and its impact on who we are today.

In the 1970s, several legal scholars began

writing about the role white supremacy has played in advancing the interests of white people in the U.S. over those of minorities. It was called Critical Race Theory. Today, CRT has become shorthand on the political right for any discussion about race that might make white people uncomfortable.

The state's proposed revision is not CRT. But it does place a strong emphasis on our cultural and racial differences at every level in the process.

Kindergartners would be taught to, "describe ways they are similar and different from people who share their identities and people who do not." Seventh-grade students would be asked to "brainstorm ways in which New Mexicans might heal from past and current injustices."

There is also a heavy emphasis on the natural migration of people that has taken place over the centuries, and on the root causes of scarcity and poverty.

I don't quibble with the historical accuracy of the proposed curriculum, but I worry that if not presented correctly it could focus too much on our differences and not enough on our commonalities.

The success of this new curriculum will depend

on having teachers who understand their students and are able to explain complex and controversial subjects in a way that is nuanced and respectful of differing positions. I hope the PED will give teachers that freedom.

I'm always suspicious of any grand new edicts that flow from the state Capitol to the schoolhouse. We saw the dangers of that recently in neighboring Texas, when school librarians were told that a new state law required them to present opposing views to any books they may have on historical events — even the Holocaust. So, "Mein Kampf?"

Despite my misgivings, it's clear the new curriculum would provide a comprehensive study of who we are and how we got here. Much of it would be specific to our state, heritage and culture. And, all of it is designed to encourage students to think critically about issues and be able to rationally make and support their own decisions. And then get involved.

The plan is still just a draft at this time, and the public comment period is still open. A public hearing will be held via Zoom, from 1 to 5 p.m. on Nov. 12. Public comment will also be taken by email at rule. feedback@state.nm.us;

restaurant's logo, barrels, blockades and the phrase "Road Construction Ahead."

But he barely had to use them.

Friday, Oct. 22, Vaccaro hosted a group of construction workers, planners, NMDOT staff and other key players for a pizza party and thank-you celebration at the site of the south Triviz roundabout on the New Mexico State University campus.

"It's one of the best construction projects I've ever seen," Vaccaro said. "I was really impressed, the way they worked after hours and on the weekends and made a real effort to get it done properly."

The world was a different place on Jan. 1, 2020, the day ground was broken for the project.

"We were originally scheduled for completion in July 2021," said Amy Evans, NMDOT's public information officer. Cynics might say the project's October 2021 completion, three months late, should be considered early in terms of road construction.

Thursday, March 5, 2020, the NMSU men's

basketball team rolled to an 83-50 victory over California Baptist in the Pan American Center. The Aggies' Senior Night was magical. It was NMSU's 19th straight victory, tied with Dayton for the best streak in the nation. It completed a perfect 16-0 season in Western Athletic Conference play, and 25-6 record overall. The effervescent Trevelin Queen had some monster dunks and led all scorers with 19 points. Every Aggie got into the game and the Pan Am crowd was pumped.

No one gave much thought about road construction, and we were just barely hearing about this "virus" hitting certain parts of the globe.

A week later, however, the WAC tournament was canceled due to Covid-19 concerns and, well, you know the rest of the story.

Initially, the construction project was one of the few benefactors of the pandemic.

"The reduced traffic, no school in session, no events, helped us a great deal," Evans said. "But it was a double-edged sword."

Later in the pandemic, she said, production interruptions, supply-chain breakdowns and the lack of available employees slowed the project significantly.

NMDOT project manager Ryan Tafoya and La Calerita Construction of Las Cruces worked hard to keep things on track.

"One of our requirements was that we not impede traffic for any real length of time," Evans said. "We tried hard to keep two lanes of traffic open on University at all times."


The Oct. 22 celebration was a token of appreciation for that work.

"The pizza and this recognition is a thank you to everyone, speaking on behalf of all the businesses on University," Vaccaro said.

In addition to using a local construction firm, NMDOT also commissioned Las Cruces artist Collette Marie to create the art images of chiles, cotton and other designs on the bridges and concrete.

The finishing touches will be added by NMSU, including a monument in the bigger roundabout, and decorative gateway pillars.

New America teacher named state's best

Lorynn Guerrero, who teaches English language arts at New America School-Las Cruces (NASLC), has been named 2022 New Mexico Teacher Of The Year (TOTY).

The announcement was made Oct. 22 by New Mexico Public Education Department (NMPED) Sec. Kurt Steinhaus.

"Ms. Guerrero's efforts on behalf of her teenage students in Las Cruces have been nothing short of extraordinary," Steinhaus said. "New Mexico is fortunate to have her as our 2022 spokesperson for the teaching profession and our representative in the national TOTY competition. Her dedication and high standards will serve as a model to all of us in the coming year."

Steinhaus presented the award during an Oct. 22 ceremony at NASLC, a state-



chartered high school with 257 enrolled students, 98 percent of whom are economically disadvantaged, NMPED said in a news release.

"It's kind of unbelievable to see that I'm the recipient of the New Mexico 2022 TOTY because I think all the teachers in New Mexico do an excellent job, so I'm very honored to be chosen," Guerrero said after learning of her selection.

The New Mexico Oil and Gas Association is the title sponsor for the state

TOTY program for the fourth year and will contribute up to \$25,000 worth in support and professional development opportunities to the winner.

Guerrero, who grew up in Las Cruces, began her teaching career in 2006 in Hatch, where she taught both middle- and high-school students. She ioined Las Cruces Public Schools in 2012, first teaching at Organ Mountain High School, before moving to NASLC.

Guerrero's father was an educator, and Guerrero always intended to follow him into the profession but worried that her dream would be derailed when she became a mother at age 17, the NMPED news release said. The Graduation Reality And Dual Skills (GRADS) program at her

high school kept her on course and motivated her to bring the GRADS program to NASLC in 2020. The associated child-care center opened in August.

"Ms. Guerrero is an outstanding teacher," NASLC Superintendent and Principal Margarita Leza Porter said in her letter nominating Guerrero for the award. "Her increased level of rigor, the setting of high expectations and continual reflection on her teaching sets her apart from other educators," the letter said.

In addition to teaching, Guerrero is working on a master's degree in educational administration, which she expects to complete in May 2022, NMPED said. Her bachelor's degree in secondary educa-



tion is from New Mexico State University. Guerrero also has a teacher of English as a second language endorsement from Eastern New Mexico and an advanced placement certification in literature and composition from New Mexico Highlands University.

Guerrero uses her 12thgrade English classes to help students prepare for college or career.


"I reiterate that as their teacher, I'm going to help them be prepared for anything they choose," Guerrero said. "I tell them it's their choice if they want to attend college after high school, but I have them fill out applications to our local community college and to access a scholarship portal. My main goal for them is to

be able to support themselves and their future families with a career they love. It doesn't have to be college-geared, but any job takes additional education and training."

The New Mexico TOTY award was established in 1963. Each year, all New Mexico school districts and charter schools are invited to nominate teachers for the award.

Each year's winner represents New Mexico in the national TOTY competition and acts as a spokesperson for the state's teaching profession, NMPED said.

Guerrero was one of two finalists for 2022 New Mexico TOTY from Las Cruces. The other was Monte Vista Elementary School fifth-grade teacher Robbi Berry. A third finalist was Stephanie Noll, an English language arts teacher at Peñasco High School in Peñasco.

NM facing teacher shortage, but LCPS super says district is doing OK

The number of teacher vacancies in New Mexico has nearly doubled in the last year, according to a report by New Mexico State University's Southwest Outreach Academic Research Evaluation & Policy Center (SOAR).

The report found that the number of teacher vacancies rose from 571 in 2020 to just more than 1,000 in 2021.

SOAR Director Rachel Boren described the number as "staggering."

"This increase in teacher vacancies is nearly twice what we found last year, and an increase of 477 open positions is the largest change across one year's time since the vacancy report was first published," Boren said. "The numbers suggest that addressing teacher vacancies continues to be a challenge across the state."

Last year, there were 889 educator vacancies, with 571 total teacher vacancies. This year, the report found 1,727 educator vacancies, with 1,048 of those for teachers. The areas with the highest

number of teacher vacancies are special education and elementary education, which were also the top areas in the prior two reports.

The subjects with the largest needs include math, science and English language arts, which were also in high demand last year.

Teacher shortages are a problem nationwide due to factors such as lower compensation and fewer benefits when compared to other careers, said Rick Marlatt, interim director of the NMSU School of Teacher Preparation, Administration and Lead-

ership, In New Mexico, shortages have been worsened due to challenges brought on by Covid-19, he said.

"Locally, our statewide teacher shortage has been worsened by the pandemic and its socioeconomic fallout, which has disproportionately impacted students and communities of color and seems to have simultaneously triggered an exodus

of teachers choosing to leave the classroom while also creating new barriers of uncertainty for those potentially considering careers in education," Marlatt said.

The report states that across all four-year and two-year higher education institutions and programs in New Mexico, 1,596 students were admitted to an educator preparation program during the 2020-21 academic year, while 979 students completed an educator preparation program. This is an increase of 169 admissions and a decrease of 51 program completions compared to last year.

Las Cruces Public Schools Superintendent Ralph Ramos said LCPS is "in pretty good shape" with regard to teacher employment, although it is dealing with a small teacher shortage issue.

"People are wanting to be in Las Cruces," Ramos told the Las Cruces Bulletin. To offset local shortages, Ramos said LCPS is paying middle- and high school teachers to give up their planning periods to fill in where needed, and the school district has increased the pay for its substitute teachers.

"We are launching new recruitment and retention initiatives to allow students to re-imagine the work of the profession," said Henrietta Pichon, interim dean of the NMSU College of Health, Education and Social Transformation, which houses the SOAR center.

also called the UNM band program for help. LCHS borrowed a sound system from Organ Mountain High School.

Once the calls were made, Frederick met with his staff, the band and band parents.

"I looked at the kids and asked, 'Do we go?' They all said 'yes!' So we loaded up the bus and we left," he said.

Frederick, his students and staff put together a plan during the bus ride, while band parents were picking up instruments and equipment and driving them to Albuquerque.

With percussionists and sousaphone players performing with borrowed instruments, the band finished fourth in the fiesta's preliminary round of 24 bands.

"It just felt very weird," Luke said about playing on a bass drum borrowed from NMSU instead of the one he'd been playing at LCHS. But he was able to put that aside and "focus on the music and the movement and give my all for that performance," Luke said. "We all had to make do with what we had. I thought we all gave it out best shot. That we were able to play at all was just so great. I'm extremely grateful for how supportive everyone has been despite the incredibly unfortunate circumstances."

"The big thing is they just got to play," Fred Bugbee said. "It's all about the kids. It's all about getting them to perform. Everybody just wanted to pitch in."

Frederick said the Albuquerque police located the stolen truck while the band was at dinner Saturday night, before the fiesta's final round. The thieves had taken "anything electronic," Frederick said, including a sound board, synthesizer, speakers, microphones, cables and cords — but left instruments and other equipment undamaged. including color-guard silks created especially for the band.

"We were very lucky," Frederick said. "They only took what they could sell."

With instruments restored, the LCHS Marching Band finished seventh in the fiesta finals — meeting their goal of a top-10 finish.

"The kids more than



NMSU Aircraft Helps to Secure the Mesilla Valley's Water Future

one of the most valuable resources in the Mesilla Valley, knowing what influences and impacts its retention in the soil, and what evaporates during crop growth, can help improve crop management and production. The New Mexico Water Resources Research Institute (NM WRRI) is working with NMSU's Physical Science Laboratory (PSL) in the Las **Cruces Innovation** & Industrial Park (LCIIP) to fly a crewed aircraft out of the Las Cruces International Airport to investigate emerging remote sensing technologies.

Part of a larger NM WRRI research effort with the Texas Water Research **Institute and Texas** A&M, the PSL team is flying a light-sport aircraft outfitted with multispectral and thermal sensors to measure evapotranspiration. Evapotranspiration is the sum of the water that evaporates from the soil surface

and transpires

area of a plant's

through the surface

leaves and stems to the atmosphere. Through data analysis, water usage can be calculated and lead to potentially better and more efficient watering.


"The data gathering concept is straightforward." said Henry Cathey, PSL's Aerospace division director. "The aircraft flies in set tracks over the ground on specific dates and at specific times to capture images in different frequency ranges." The flight dates are generally set to coincide with a satellite passing overhead.

PSL flights capture thousands of spectral and thermal images. Each camera captures millions of pixels that cover PSL aircraft flying over the Mesilla Valley.

an entire region of interest. Each pixel is essentially a measurement of reflected energy at specific wavelengths.

"Ground measurements can be very accurate, but their use is limited because they take a long time to acquire and often do not represent the spatial variability observed in nature," said Robert Sabie,

NM WRRI research scientist. "Although not always as accurate as ground measurements, remote sensing measurements provide a much larger view and show the spatial and temporal trends of what is happening on the ground. This information can be used for future water management decisions."


interview skills and how to present themselves and gained self-esteem, she said.



City OKs \$3.75 million for new food rescue program warehouse

The Las Cruces City Council unanimously approved an allocation of \$3.75 million from the city's Telshor Facility Fund (TFF) to pay for renovations to a new Casa de Peregrinos (CdP) food rescue warehouse just north of the Mesilla Valley Community of Hope (MVCH) campus, 999 W. Amador Ave.

Overcrowding at CdP's food pantry at MVCH has placed a strain on facilities, staff, volunteers, clients and the rest of the MVCH campus, the city said in a news release.

As a result, on March 2, 2020, the council approved a \$1.3 million purchase

of the former Horse N Hound building at 991 W. Amador Ave., adjacent to MVCH.

Plans are to convert that building into a new warehouse and food distribution facility.

Total construction costs for the expansion are estimated at \$7.04 million, the city said.

The city has received

four grants for the project through the state legislative capital outlay process during the last four legislative sessions, including \$85,500 in 2018, \$664,000 in 2019, \$1.4 million in 2020 and \$1.8 million in 2021. CdP also was awarded a \$350,000 community development block grant this

The council's Oct. 4 vote will cover an estimated \$3.3 million deficit in the total construction cost, the city said.

CdP is the largest and most successful food pantry in southern New Mexico, the city said. It now operates a 4,000 squarefoot facility that was built in 2003.

CdP was designed to distribute 500,000 pounds of food per year, but currently exceeds that capac-

In 2020, it distributed more than 4.7 million pounds of food. The food pantry no longer fits its space, and there is no capacity for expansion at its current location.

"This is in fact a com-

munity project," CdP Executive Director Lorenzo Alba said at the Oct. 4 meeting. The council's vote, he said, is "doing something about the poverty that's going on in our community. This is a great opportunity for all

The city council created TFF in October 2004 from proceeds of the pre-paid lease of Memorial Medi-

cal Center to Province Healthcare Company. TFF is designated to support health and human services projects and programs for low-income city residents.

Local men working to restore reputation of Army scout, privateer



Robert Kirker of Las Cruces is planning a trip with his two daughters to Ireland some time in 2022 to visit the home of his great-grandfather, who was born near Belfast, emigrated to the United States in the early 19th century and lived and traveled throughout the U.S. and northern Mexico, working as a privateer during the War of 1812 and as a scout in the U.S. Army during the Mexican War and the Indian Wars of the American West.

James Kirker (1793-1853) married into the family of Judge Roy Bean and gave frontiersman Kit Carson his first job, Robert Kirker said. He was a grocer in St. Louis, a fur trapper along the Missouri River and probably was a copper mine owner in what is now Grant County, New Mexico, Robert Kirker said.


James Kirker is the subject of two books: "Savage Scene: The Life and Times of James Kirker, Frontier King," by William C. McGraw,

and "The Life of James Kirker, 1793-1852," by Ralph Adam Smith. Robert Kirker met and spoke with McGraw a number of times dur-

ing the 15 or so years he worked on his book, Kirker said. McGraw was the one-time owner and resident of the ghost town Mowry City, New Mexico (located about 25 miles north of Deming) and organized the Pancho Villa Museum north of Columbus, according to the book jacket of "Savage Scene."

The younger Kirker, who turns 89 in February, is pictured in one of the photographs in McGraw's book, which shows Kirker with a drill he invented during the 47 years he worked for Kennecott Copper Corp. near Silver City. Kirker was born in Santa Rita, New Mexico. His father, Juan Kirker, James' grandson, was born in Pinos Altos.

Robert Kirker and his distant relative, Daniel Aranda, a Las Cruces historian, would like to restore the reputation that James Kirker earned when he served as a scout with the U.S. Army during the Indian Wars.

Although he was initially friendly with Apaches in the Southwest and traded with them, Kirker is largely remembered for fighting against them, both men said.

"He is best known as a scalp hunter," Aranda said, "but was much more than that. The guy was in a bad place at a bad time. You had to be a hard person. He did what he had to do."

"He's never been given his true identity or the history he deserves," Robert Kirker said of his ancestor.

"James Kirker likely came to New York from

Ireland about 1810. He was a privateer aboard the Black Joke, a ship which was captured by the British and rescued by the USS Constitution," Aranda said.

Kirker probably came to the Southwest about 1817, his great-grandson said, and was later hired as an Army scout by Col. Alexander William Doniphan during the Mexican War and figured prominently in several battles, Robert Kirker said.

James Kirker died in California, probably of cancer, Robert Kirker said, in 1853.

"I'd like to go see the birthplace of my great-grandfather," Kirker said. The house that James Kirker was born in still stands near Kilcross, about 10 miles north of Belfast.

Asked if she was looking forward to accompanying her father on the trip, Kirker's younger daughter, Susan Kirker, said, "Oh, yes, definitely."

She retired two years ago as assistant deputy chief of the federal probation office in Las Cruces.

DACC receives \$4.9 million grant to assist Hispanic and low-income students

Doña Ana Community College (DACC) will receive \$4.9 million over the next five years in grant funds for its Éxito project to assist Hispanic and lowincome students, DACC said in a news release.

The grant will assist DACC Hispanic and low-income students in

the areas of academic achievement, graduation, transfer and career success. The funding comes from a U.S. Department of Education Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI) STEM grant.

The funds will be used to assist students in the development of an online STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) orientation, proactive and intrusive academic advising, STEM courses, peer mentoring, job placement, curriculum, expanding online STEM courses and enhancing agreements with local educational partners.

The Éxito project includes funding for updating existing computer labs

and classrooms as well as purchasing additional technology resources and supports for STEM students.

"This funding from the Department of Education will help DACC recruit, retain and launch more Hispanic and low-income students into good-paying STEM-related careers in southern New Mexico to

the benefit of the entire community," said DACC Dean of Science, Engineering and Mathematics (SEM) Joe Butler.

Programs offered in DACC's SEM and Advanced Technologies divisions include aerospace technologies, architecture and construction technologies, astronomy, biology, computer and information technologies, developmental math, drafting and design technologies, chemistry, electronic technology, environmental and energy technologies, general engineering, geography, geology, nutrition, manufacturing and automation technologies, mathematics, physics and water technologies.







Since we are not promised advanced notification when life's last chapter arrives, I have found this is always a good topic to address sooner rather than later. Hopefully, we will tackle these issues prior to the need for custodial care, making the job of our caretakers and survivors much easier.

Take Inventory:

tiple 401(k) accounts.


Take Action:

Lower the risk for falls

At Electronic Caregiver, a national company based in Las Cruces, Timothy Washburn is the chief clinical officer. He said the most common problem that happens at home to the elderly is falls.

"Maybe hearing, eyesight, tactile sensation isn't quite as good as it once was," Washburn said. "You want to make sure to do a safety assessment on the home."

Washburn also recommends removing tripping hazards, like area rugs without backing.

"If you have a lot of things in the way, clear pathways," he said. "And a lot of tile floors are fairly smooth; that shiny smooth surface can be a fall risk."

In the bathroom, make sure there are non-skid surfaces both inside the bathtub and outside of it.

"Lighting is important too," Washburn said. "The fact of the matter is you want good lighting in the shadows. You may not see the corner of the rug or the pet. Handrails and night-lights can be a real advantage."

Often people don't mention when they lose capacity, he said. Interaction is important for friends and family members, asking questions and noticing if the individual is having trouble hearing and seeing could make a lot of difference.

"This is often overlooked but making sure they have the right eyewear can be really important," Washburn said. "Vision and hearing are important."

At Home Instead Senior Care, a Las Cruces home care company, owner Buffy Johnson said safety checks are important. Having a home care company, or other provider, go through and look at a home can save someone wasted time and money on an emergency room visit.

"The other day I was at a poten-

tial client's home and he is a tall man and has been falling," Johnson said. "He was not injuring himself because he's falling on carpet. The first thing I notice is he has little tennis balls underneath his walker."

Tennis balls are great for tile and wood floors because they help slide the walker, she said. But tennis balls don't slide on carpet, so the man was tripping on his walker. Johnson suggested replacing the tennis balls with little glides, which slide like little skis across the carpet, allowing the client to walk freely.

Another common problem Johnson said she often encounters is some people will drag their oxygen all over their house, and the tubes get wound up and twisted into the furniture causing a major trip hazard.

"What I recommend for people who have a big house is maybe get two machines and put them across the house from each other, or you can get the little portables that hook on the back of a wheelchair or walker," Johnson said. "Those long cords are just really dangerous."

Both Washburn and Johnson said little pets are one of the largest hazards in the home.

"Little pets under their feet are the number one reason for falls lately," Johnson said.

Solutions to home safety don't have to be expensive, Johnson said. You don't have to renovate your bathroom with a walk-in tub and wider doorways, you can buy a special chair you can use to slide from the outside of the tub into to it.

Grab bars can be strategically placed, not only horizontally but vertically and at angles. She suggested talking with experts at medical equipment stores to get ideas and optimize safety at home.

Planning ahead helps with peace of mind

Estate planning is an important part of arranging for your future, ensuring things are handled the way you want and that your loved ones are taken care of after you die.

And while most people know they should have a will, there are other important documents that also need to be considered.

"The really essential documents that everybody should have are a will, power of attorney and a health care proxy," said Estates Law Attorney Michele Ungvarsky of Estrada

Law PC, in Las Cruces.

Power of attorney is a document that allows you to give a person or organization the legal authority to manage vour finances and other affairs while vou're alive but disabled or no longer able to do so. A health care proxy gives someone the legal authority to make health care decisions for you when you are incapable of making and executing those decisions vourself.

Without a will, families are left at the mercy of the state of New Mexico, and the outcome may not be what the deceased had in mind.

However, Lisa Wynn, an attorney practicing estate planning at Morris Hall, PLLC, cautions that just because you have a will won't mean you avoid probate, the legal process in which a will is "proved" in court and your assets are distributed accordingly.

"...A will is just instructions to a judge," Wynn said.

While probate often goes smoothly (if all your heirs agree and your assets are centralized), many people choose to avoid it because it can be slow, costly and public.



"One of the reasons someone may plan with a trust as opposed to a will is to avoid probate," Wynn said.

"A trust is a document that is administered privately by your trustee according to your wishes, whereas a will is a document, or instructions, to a probate judge for the judge to oversee the administration," she said.

Ungvarsky said one of the biggest mistakes people make is turning to the internet to plan their estate.

"...You've got to realize that the stuff that comes off the internet is one size fits all, so it doesn't matter whether you have one dollar or a million dollars; it doesn't matter whether you have no kids or 10 kids," she said.

Not only does estate planning give you peace of mind, but it also makes things less stressful for your family after your death. And it might sound strange, but planning your own funeral in advance, even while you are perfectly healthy, is another smart thing to do to ensure your family isn't left with the burden of making costly decisions after your death.

Leaving a will can prevent myriad problems

Doña Ana County Probate Judge Diana Bustamante has processed more than 1,500 probate cases since she was sworn into office in January 2015. In 2018 alone, the judge handled 353 cases, had almost 600 face-to-face meetings and returned nearly 400 telephone calls dealing with probate issues.

Bustamante said just over half the cases she's handled have been for people who died without a will.

"People make assumptions," the judge

said, often believing they don't have anything of value to leave to others or that the inheritance process is automatic, so they don't need a will. That can cause problems and expenses for surviving family members and other potential heirs, she said.

Bustamante's office charges a \$35 docketing fee for each probate case, which includes a \$30 processing fee and \$5 for a detailed packet of forms and instructions – one set for those with a will and a slightly different set for those without a will. The docketing fee is the same for all probate courts in the state at the county level, Bustamante said. The docketing fee is the same for probate with a will or without.

The nearly 60-page packet includes four forms to fill out and a self-help guide which defines probate as "the legal process through which a court grants a person the legal authority to handle the legal affairs of a person who has died" (the decedent) and explains that probate is necessary if the decedent dies leaving property titled in his or her

name, including real estate, bank accounts, vehicles and stocks and bonds; and probate is not necessary if a total estate is worth less than \$50,000 and does not include any real property like a house or other real estate.

"Probate at the county level is pro se," Bustamante said, which means applicants represent themselves as if they were their own lawyers. "This doesn't mean they can't be represented by a lawyer at the county probate court."

The packet also includes a flow chart detailing all the steps in opening and closing a probate-court case if the decedent has a will (testate) or does not have a will (intestate). If there is a will, a decedent's survivors must file an application to probate the will and appoint a personal representative (PR). If there is no will, only the application to appoint a PR is filed.

"The appointment of a PR is based on who has priority," Bustamante said. "A will nominates a personal representative and thus that person has priority. If there is no will, then the rules of intestacy kick in." The PR is "someone with priority according to state law," Bustamante said, like a surviving spouse, child, parent or sibling.

Probate is "pretty straight forward," Bustamante said, and usually "a smooth process." About 90 percent of the cases in New Mexico are uncontested from start to finish, the judge said.

New law authorizes medical aid in dying in New Mexico

The Elizabeth M. Whitefield End of Life Options Act will "assist people in getting medical aid in dying if that's their choice," said MaryKay Brady of Las Cruces, a board member of the newly formed End of Life Options New Mexico (ELONM) nonprofit, and a long-time advocate.

The act was passed by the New Mexico Legislature during the 2021 session and took effect in June.

Brady said New Mexico is the 11th jurisdiction (nine other states and the District of Columbia) to enact a medical-aid-in-dying law, which she said makes access to end-of-life options easier for terminally ill patients while maintaining safeguards.

"It's patient care," Brady said.

The bill was named for the late state District Court Judge Elizabeth M. Whitefield of Albuquerque, who died in August 2018 after an 11-year battle with cancer.

Whitefield testified in support of the End of Life Options Act when it came before the state legislature in 2017.

"Cancer has stolen everything from me; my ability to work, my ability to eat, my ability to drink," she testified. "Don't let me die without dignity. I implore you to give me the choice that is right for me." The bill did not reach the floor of either house for a vote that year, or when it was reintroduced in 2019.

State Sen. Carrie Hamblen, D-Doña Ana, voted in favor of the bill this year exactly one year to the day after the death of her friend, Cheryl Swannack, a Las Cruces artist, producer and community activist who suffered from Parkinson's Disease.

"I cast my vote in honor of Cheryl," Hamblen said.

"Chervl loved New Mexico. It was her home," Hamblen said in a Facebook post. "Although she shared a wonderful life with her partner, Nancy, in Washington D.C. ... Cheryl would have loved to have taken her last breath in her New Mexico home. But, because we didn't have any Death with Dignity provisions/ laws in the state, she couldn't." Swannack, 73, died March 15, 2020, in Washington, D.C.

The most important reason for passing the act was terminally ill patients' "decreased ability to enjoy life," Brady said, including their loss of control over bodily functions. For these patients, she said, "life as you and I enjoy it isn't possible."

Under provisions of the act, death results when a patient takes "a specific, compounded drug," Brady said. He or she is usually asleep within five minutes and dies within an hour.

"It's peaceful. It's beautiful. It's a choice," Brady said.

"No one wants to talk about death and dying, but it's going to happen," said Brady, a retired banker who moved to Las Cruces from Deming five years ago. Her mother suffered from Alzheimer's disease and died in 1992. Her husband, who had "multiple health issues," died in 2008.

End of Life Options New Mexico provides information and helps people plan and take action related to endof-life options and care, according to their website https://endoflifeoptionsnm.org/.

"We will help with end-of-life planning," said Brady, who has already made all those decisions, including putting her medical plan on video and wearing a DNR (do not resuscitate) medicalert bracelet.

"I looked at it as a gift to my son," Brady said. "He knows exactly what my values are," she said.

"I am passionate about this," she said. "Anything I can do or say so people don't have to struggle."

Provisions of the Elizabeth M. Whitefield End of Life Options Act

The New Mexico House of Representatives passed the Elizabeth M. Whitefield End of Life Options Act 39-27 in February. The state Senate passed it 24-17 in March. Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham signed it into law in April. The act became effective June 18, 2021.

The act defines medical aid in dying as "the medical practice wherein a health care provider prescribes medication to a qualified individual who may self-administer that medication to end that individual's life in accordance with the provisions of the act."

Under the act, a healthcare provider "may provide a prescription for medical aid in dying medication" to someone who has the capacity to make a decision about ending his or her life, has a terminal illness, has voluntarily made

the request for medical aid in dying and has the ability to selfadminister the medication.

The patient's request form must be signed by two witnesses, at least one of whom is not a family member of the patient or associated with a healthcare facility connected to the patient's care. Neither witness can be the patient's healthcare provider.

The law provides for a 48-hour waiting period after the prescription for medical aid in dying medication has been written before it can be filled.

Language in the act states that it "shall not be construed ... to constitute suicide, assisted suicide, euthanasia, mercy killing, homicide or adult abuse."

Technology provides patients and doctors with information connection

Anthony Dohrmann. founder and CEO of Electronic Caregiver. Inc., said there is a big retirement population here in Doña Ana County. While the company provides its services across the country, they are headquartered right here in Las Cruces.

"We have older adults living with multiple chronic conditions including declining vision and hearing," he said. "We don't metabolize our medications the same way. It's important to stay on track with treatment and to have support in case you have an incident where you need services and support and medical attention."

This is a service **Electronic Caregiver** provides. It can range from doctors' connections to their patients, sending out regular information about how medications are being taken to moni-

toring blood pressure, glucose and other systems of concern to an individual.

"People want to maintain dignity and independency and they want to live at home," Dohrmann said. "We have a lot of solutions for that."

He said people don't always want to admit thev have an injury and are embarrassed. Some are bad at following through on treatment plan. Usually, people past a certain age have at least one or two chronic conditions.

"The latest statistic I have seen is that 133 million Americans have at least one chronic condition and the majority have two or more," he said. "The number one cause of treatment failure is not following through at home. People forget to take meds, don't monitor trends of vitals, weight blood pressure, lung capacity, blood sugar. They will be irregular and

inconstant and if they don't know, the doctor doesn't know."

The company has solutions. Dohrmann said. Electronic Caregiver has resources that remind people about their medications and take vitals regularly.

"We get into communication with them and get them on track," he said. "We are monitoring constantly and getting

early indications to the doctor leading to lower mortalities, less hospitalization, more interdependence and much better quality of life."

The Electronic Caregiver Premier System includes emergency response and care tabs, he said. They have a physician on demand service where customers can get a prescription called in from home.

"Sometimes the idea of driving to an urgent care and sitting in a waiting room for two hours for a prescription seems impossible," Dohrmann said. "We get people in touch with a doc who does an assessment, its super convenient. We also have an interactive smart health hub. which also connects to wireless devices. It

might be a heart patient, might be looking at pulse rate, blood oxygen levels etc."

While Electronic Caregiver systems are available by private pay, there are also more and more doctors able to prescribe the system and that allows it to be paid for by Medicare.

"We are not there to replace primary care physicians" he said. "When a doctor prescribes the Pro-health. we integrate. Our team monitors and if something is amiss. our care team calls up the patient, updates the health record. sends an alert to the patient's doctor."

Sometimes Medicare has services they can pay for that are underutilized because doctors don't realize they are available and

Electronic Caregiver systems can help show the doctor what is available. Dohrmann said doctors' offices are not staffed to be watch over data coming in from their patients. They don't always have resources to keep up with alerts coming from equipment.

Electronic Caregiver will be able to provide the service that can keep that data together and at the doctor's fingertips as needed.

"A lot of times it becomes one size fits all and it is hard to do it right," he said. "There are thousands of profiles and care plans, workflows, languages, cultures and you have to be able to accommodate all of that. It has taken us 80 million dollars and 10 years and hundreds of pilots and providers to get this right."

Up until now, there has not been a way to resolve all the incoming information with an efficient way to get it into a format easily accessible for the doctor.

"With so many people with chronic conditions, they suffer symptoms, and they don't know how to report them – they figure it's just part of life," Dohrmann said. "It's a really amazing time for health care. We are able to give continuous care."

Caregiver survival and thriving tips

This is a small list for anyone caring for someone facing dementia. It comes from our collective Vista Living Care experience of 23 years caring for elders, supporting families through the process of dementia and the creation of New Mexico's only Eden Alternative homes. Vista has a deep commitment to embracing life for elders and providing comfort, education, and hope for families. This list is meant to be a starting point for caregivers to not

just survive but thrive during the dementia journey.

1. Breathe. Find time, even if it is just five minutes everyday to breathe deeply and connect to your body, mind, and spirit.

2. Forgive Yourself. All of us get tired, cranky, everyone will make mistakes.

3. Be honest with yourself. Often the toughest part of being a caregiver is being honest about what they cannot do. Help is a good thing. None of us can do this alone; it is simply not possible. Many issues faced during the de-

mentia journey are relentlessly hard on the person caring for them. Patterns such as disturbed sleep cycles, repetitive questions or hoarding, care needs from bathing to incontinence care, and behavioral changes such as wandering, can all be both exhausting and physically un-safe.

4. Do not wait for a crisis to make decisions. Start looking for help before you think it is needed. Nobody makes their best choices in the emergency room or police station.

5. Knowledge is power. The more you

know about dementia and the systems you are working with, the easier everyone's life will be. This includes assisted living, home health care and funding sources such as VA, Long Term Care Insurances and Medicaid. Ask questions. When looking at home health and assisted living, it is a bad sign when staff are not willing to take the time to talk with you or listen to you.

6. Have balance.
There will be times
when you need to fight
for the person you are
caring for. Know when
to stop fighting and

allow things to work. Gratitude is as important as being a fighter.

7. Make life better. We do not have a way to make progressive dementia go away, but we can make life better during the process. Good food, loving caregivers, music, animals, creativity in all forms all make life better for elders. You can have a life even with dementia. It may not be the life we wanted for the person we love, but life can still be good.

8. Laugh. Sometimes caregiving really is funny. Laughter also relieves stress and can redirect some-

one with dementia from a negative behavior to a positive one.

9. Keep part of your life that is yours. Caregiving can become everything you do. This is not safe for anyone. You will need this.



Movie review Sean Connery's James Bond spies 'From Russia With Love'

Just as most people have their favorite screen James Bond, most have their favorite James Bond movie.

For many purists, "From Russia With Love" ranks extremely high on the list. Currently streaming on Hulu, the 1963 caper came close on the heels of Sean Connery's debut as Agent 007 in "Dr. No" ... and much of the appeal of the second round rests in the actor's cool confidence in a role he grew into very quickly. There's also satisfaction for Bond devotees in the film being one of the most literal adaptations of a novel by Ian Fleming, since gadgetry began to compete heavily with story with the follow-up, "Goldfinger."

Though Bond – or someone we think is him – appears in the pre-credits sequence that became a



standard Bond element with "From Russia With Love," it actually takes a while for him to enter the picture in full. Early scenes are devoted to introducing various villains such as Rosa Klebb (Lotte Lenya), she of the poison-tipped knife concealed in her shoe, and impressively strong henchman Red Grant (Robert Shaw, 12 years before his "Jaws" turn as Quint).

They're in on a plot to discredit Bond by luring him with a much-coveted decoding machine, then filming him while being seduced by one of their allies played by Daniela Bianchi. A problem is that she genuinely falls hard for our hero (of course), leaving her loyalty in doubt until the moment when it counts the most.

While "From Russia With Love" has many highlights, the culmination of a tense trip aboard the Orient Express surely is among the best. Returning from "Dr. No," director Terence Young stages a traincompartment fight that's as brutal as it could be, and it's held up very well over nearly 60 (!) years. The helicopter and boat chases that follow also continue to stand nicely.

Another cast member hugely deserving of mention is Pedro Armendariz, who was terminally ill when he filmed the part of Bond's jovial Turkish contact Kerim Bey. The performer makes every moment he's on the screen count; this entry also marked the first appearance of Desmond Llewelyn as weapons expert Q (the briefcase he gives Bond for the mission is legendary), and Bernard Lee and Lois Maxwell are back as boss M and secretary Miss Moneypenny.

The James Bond series got (and pretty much stayed) a lot flashier after "From Russia With Love," but this espionage saga handles its intrigue quite honorably, a huge reason it remains so cherished by so many 007 afticionados.







Taking a look back at history, traditions of Halloween, Dia de los Muertos

Halloween likely comes to us from ancient Celtic tribes that lived in western Europe and the North Atlantic as many as 2,500 years ago. The first day of their new year was on or about Nov. 1, when they celebrated the end of summer and the beginning of the long, dark, cold winter

with a festival honoring Samhain, Lord of the Dead.

The Celts believed the souls of the dead returned at that time to mingle with the living, so they wore masks and lit bonfires to frighten them away. When the Romans conquered the Celts about 55 years before the birth of Christ, they adopted Samhain, and added their own

touches. Those included baking ossa dei morti ("bones of the dead") cookies shaped like finger bones to purify their homes.

The word Halloween and its older spelling of Hallowe'en are shortened from All-hallow-even, the eve of All Hallows Day, also known as All Saints Day, which was a pagan (Celtic and Roman) cel-

ebration until Pope Gregory III (papacy: Feb. 11, 731-Nov. 28, 741), moved the old Christian feast of All Saints Day to Nov. 1 to adapt Samhain to the Christian faith.

Trick or treating started in Ireland centuries ago when groups of farmers would go door-to-door collecting food and materials

Jim Shearer, jazz trio have premiere concerts at NMSU, UTEP

NMSU Regents Professor and tubist Jim Shearer will present the world premiere performance of a new work for tuba and jazz trio titled "Cloud Bowling," written by UTEP composer and pianist Chris Reyman. The show will also feature Shearer performing (on the tuba) the "Suite for Flute and Jazz Piano Trio" by noted classical/ jazz crossover composer Claude Bolling.

Free concert performances will be held at 7:30 p.m. Friday, Nov. 5, in the Atkinson Recital Hall inside the NMSU Music Center, 1075 N. Horseshoe St. on the NMSU campus; and at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 9, at the Fox Fine Arts Recital Hall, 500 W.

Joining Reyman in the jazz trio accompanying Shearer will be UTEP faculty members Erik Unsworth, bass, and Andy Smith, percussion.

Bolling wrote his famous suite for Jean-Pierre Rampal in 1973, and their subsequent recording of

that work spent more than 10 years on the Billboard top 40 classical chart, Shearer said. Bolling followed that work with a series of other successful iazz/classical collaborations, but never an original composition for the tuba.

Shearer began learning the flute work on tuba during his college days in the mid-1980s, and this performance will mark the culmination of a lifelong dream to perform and record the entire work on his instrument of choice, he said.

Taking inspiration from Bolling's suite, Reyman's composition of "Cloud Bowling" is comprised of seven movements that blend jazz and classical styles and performance practices, Shearer said.

Following this series of live performances, the musicians will record both works for release on Summit Records for a CD project they are calling "Cloud Bowling with Claude Bolling."



for a village feast and bonfire. Those who donated were promised prosperity, while those who didn't were threatened with bad luck.

When Irish immigrants came to the United States in the 1800s, the custom of trick-or-treating came with them.

Pumpkin carving got its start when the Irish began hollowing out turnips to hold lighted candles to frighten off evil spirits. Pumpkins were substituted for turnips when the Irish came to America.

"Jack-o'-lantern has been used in American English to describe a lantern made from a hollowed-out pumpkin since the 19th century, but the term originated in 17th-century Britain, where it was used to refer to a man with a lantern or to a night watchman," according to www.merriamwebster.com.

"At that time, the British often called men whose names they didn't know by a common name like Jack. Thus, an unknown man carrying a lantern was sometimes called 'Jack with the lantern' or 'Jack of the lantern.' At the same time, jack-o'-lantern was applied to another kind of light: the flame-like phosphorescence caused by gases from decaying plants in marshy areas, also known as ignis fatuus — a Medieval Latin term that means literally 'foolish fire' — or will-o'-thewisp."

The name jack-o'lantern is also tied to the Irish legend of Stingy Jack, a drunkard who bargained with Satan and was doomed to wander through an eternal night with only a burning coal inside a pumpkin to light his way.

According to ancient Aztec tradition, the souls of the departed are allowed to return to Earth one day each year: children on Nov. 1 (All Saints Day) and adults on Nov. 2 (All Souls Day).

Celebrations of these days — Dia de los Muertos ("Day of the Dead") — have continued for centuries in many Latin American countries and have been adopted in parts of the U.S., especially the Southwest. The families of the departed often build altars to honor their lost loved ones, and they make special treats for the celebration.







Microchipping creates happy endings for missing pets, families

It's saving cats and dogs!

Microchipping, that is. Just ask the staff at Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley (ASCMV). During one week in October, ASCMV staff got to make phone calls to a cat owner in Las Cruces, telling her that her cat, Djinn, had been found, and to dog owner Gloria Brown of El Paso, telling her that her beloved Yorkie, Aniken, had been found.

Both pets were identified and returned to their owners because they had been microchipped.

"There's nothing we love more than a happy ending for pets and their people, and an up-to-date microchip is the best shot a lost animal has at a happy ending," said ASCMV Executive Director Clint Thacker.

Thacker said he was "so proud of ASCMV staff member Laura Hennessee, who, with the help of a Good Samaritan, rescued a cat off the median on Interstate 70. She had to keep her wits about her, keep herself safe and make sure not to scare the cat into traffic," he said.

Hennessee's "courage and caring meant that not only did that cat get rescued, because it was chipped it got back to its person who had been looking for the cat for days," Thacker said.

The story of Brown and Aniken is equally remarkable and heartwarming.

Brown said the small dog disappeared from the fenced yard of her El Paso home more than three years ago. She thinks he was stolen. Brown, family members and friends searched everywhere for Aniken, including an online data search for missing pets and missing and found pets sites on social media.

Then on Oct. 2, ASCMV was "closing up shop at about 6 p.m. when someone came with two strays," ASCMV grant writer Elaine Stachera Simon said.

Aniken shortly after his recovery in October 2021.

"Staff member Alaska Smith was already working on an intake, so instead of asking him to hold the dogs, she helped this person too. One of the dogs (Aniken) was microchipped," Simon said.

ASCMV Office Manager Michelle Williams called Brown to report that her Yorkie was found.

Brown "was ecstatic," Simon said. In talking to Brown, Williams realized that the dog had been missing since Sept. 2, 2018, Simon said.

When she received the happy news from ASCMV, "I couldn't contain my emotions," Brown said. "I just couldn't believe it."

The person who had rescued Aniken agreed to meet Brown halfway between El Paso and Las Cruces to return the dog. Brown was so overcome, she had to get a friend to drive her to the rendezvous.

Brown said Aniken was very dehydrated and "not in the best condition" when she saw him for the first time in more than three years.

"When I saw him, it didn't look like him," she said. "I never would have recognized him. When I ... saw his little eyes, I knew it was him; I knew it was my baby. He heard his name, he jumped for joy. He was just so excited; he couldn't contain himself."

Aniken was recognized by his brothers and sisters (Brown has 11 dogs, all microchipped) as soon as he got home. He is eating, drinking a lot of water, his fur is growing back and he is "getting back to normal," she said.

"The people in Las Cruces were so kind," Brown said. "Microchipping is the best thing I ever could have done. Everybody needs to microchip their dogs."

Brown said Aniken was with a female dog when he was found, and Brown thinks that dog helped Aniken survive. He's almost 12 years old and doesn't have good eyesight or hearing, she said.

The other dog, now named Oreo, wasn't microchipped, and is now in a foster home waiting to be adopted.

"All of our staff members love animals, and it's hard to see animals that you know belong to someone go unclaimed," Thacker said. "The animal is scared and confused, and you know someone out there is missing their furry best friend. Microchips make happy endings possible."

ASCMV, 3551 Bataan Memorial West, is open 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. To adopt an animal, check out available animals on the ASCMV website and make an appointment for a "social" during adoption hours: noon to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday and noon to 5 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. Lost and found animals are also posted on the website.

City council approves art design for new animal services center

BULLETIN REPORT

The Las Cruces City Council voted unanimously at its Oct. 18 regular meeting to approve the art design concept of Italian artist Vito DiBari for "an outdoor, site-specific, public art sculpture" called "Sun Shelter" to be installed at the new Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley (ASCMV) that is now under construction.

With the council's approval, the city will draft a contract with the artist to create the sculpture.

"The recommended design concept proposes a 9-foot, die-cut steel sculpture depicting a representation of a cat and dog, the primary animals cared for by the ASCMV, embellished with a silhouette of the sun and a flying bird cutout," the City of Las Cruces said. "The (selection) committee thought the design captured the spirit of the ASCMV, giving it high scores for meeting criteria as a focal point for the new site, reflecting the City of Las Cruces, its

appropriateness to the site and use, and its fit with the landscape of the location."

"The sculpture will be large enough to be an iconic focal point visible from multiple angles, as it is meant to be a beacon to the public," DiBari said. "The symbolic elements — such as the sun, which is an emblem of protection that shines bright upon the animals — embody values of humane animal care and promote responsible pet ownership."

The city said three designs were considered in the final phase of selecting a design, after a call for artists was initiated in March 2021 that was open to artists nationwide.

The art selection committee, a subcommittee appointed by the City Art Board, evaluated 139 submissions, choosing three finalists from among the responses, the city said. Finalists were asked to create a design art concept, including fabrication plan, budget and maintenance recommendations.

Get your mammogram: It's an hour that could save your life

According to the American Cancer Society (ACS), breast cancer is the most common cancer in women in the U.S., behind only skin cancers. In fact, the ACS puts the average risk

as a one in eight chance that a woman will develop breast cancer in her lifetime. And according to the World Health Organization, breast cancer is now the most common cancer globally, claiming 12 percent of new cancer cases. Breast cancer is also the

second leading cause of cancer death in women, superseded only by lung cancer.

So, that's some not-sogood news. How about some good news? Those death rates have been steadily dropping. Statistics show that the overall death rate from breast cancer decreased by 1 percent each year from 2013 to 2018. Now, the question is "why?" Well, the decreases have been associated with several factors, including better treatments and earlier detection through screenings.

Here's some more good news. You can get screened by scheduling a simple, routine mammogram. A mammogram takes only about one hour, once a year, but its benefits can last much longer. Mammograms help detect breast cancer earlier than waiting for symptoms to appear. That's an incredibly important weapon in

the fight against breast cancer because that early detection can result in an easier and more effective treatment if cancer is discovered.

While there are certain risk factors for breast cancer—including lifestyle-related risks, as well as some risk factors you cannot change, like your family medical history — some breast cancer patients have no risk factors or even any symptoms. And 85 percent of breast cancer cases are in women with no familv history of the disease. That's why early detection is so vital to finding and

treating breast cancer.

If you are a woman 40 and older, you should be including an annual mammogram in your yearly health journey. If you are at higher risk, you may need to begin annual screenings sooner. Some of those risk factors include genetic mutations, having dense breasts, certain reproductive histories, being overweight after menopause, a family history of breast and ovarian cancer, a personal history of radiation therapy or hormone replacement therapy, a history with the drug diethylstilbestrol (DES) and a lack of physical activity.

As with other health issues, it's important to have a discussion with your trusted provider about your lifestyle and risks and to determine the right time for you to begin annual breast cancer screening.

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month, so if you haven't already scheduled your mammogram for the year, now is a great time to get it on your calendar and get the peace of mind that comes from taking charge of your health. It's one hour a year that could save your life.



Chamberino project to create 315 new jobs at former dog food plant

The state of New Mexico and a local economic development fund have pledged more than \$2 million in economic assistance to Wind Turbine & Energy Cables Corp. (WTEC) to redevelop an empty facility in Chamberino, about 25 miles south of Las Cruces, and create 315 manufacturing jobs in New Mexico, the Mesilla Valley Economic Development Alliance (MVEDA) announced Oct.

The New Jersey-based WTEC manufactures wire cable that powers both solar and wind energy units, MVEDA said in a news release.

The Chamberino property, located at 1311 San Francisco De Asis, is WTEC's first expansion in New Mexico. The site will be used for steel-wire manufacturing and eventually expand to produce wind towers, the spine of the wind-energy turbine, MVEDA said. The

68,000-square-foot location is the former home to an Alpo pet food processing plant that closed in 2014.

The company chose New Mexico over Texas for a new manufacturing site because of the collaborative business climate, incentives and the proximity to the fast-growing wind and solar installations in the western United States, the news release said.

"WTEC Corp's expansion into the Chamberino community might just become one of the most impactful job creation projects to ever take place in rural New Mexico," **MVEDA** President and CEO Davin Lopez said. "We are pleased that we could partner El Paso Electric's (EPE) New Mexico Economic Development Fund, with the state of New Mexico and Doña Ana County to land this investment."

The state is pledging \$2 million from its Local **Economic Development** Act (LEDA) job-creation fund to assist WTEC with land, building and infrastructure at the Chamberino site. An additional \$100,000 has been pledged from the EPE fund, which is administered by MVEDA and the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico.

WTEC expects to begin hiring in early 2022 with a ramp-up to 315 full-time employees by the end of 2027, MVEDA said. The

average annual salary is expected to be more than \$37,000 and the

project will have a statewide economic impact of \$409 million over 10 years.

"When WTEC started looking for a new location, we wanted to be in the West, closer to our customers and key raw material vendors," said WTEC CEO Brian Singh, who founded the company. "When evaluating the pros and cons of Texas vs. New Mexico, the incentives offered by New Mexico and our close relationship with the New Mexico Economic Development Department and MVEDA tipped the scale. At this property, we have an existing building with room to expand. We see a lot of growth in the wind and solar sectors and this positions us well to grow our manufacturing

capacity and improve our competitive position in the market," Singh said.

"WTEC Corp's expansion into Doña Ana County supports our efforts to grow new employment opportunities and promote economic development," Doña Ana **County Commission** Chair Manuel Sanchez said. "We are excited about the prospect of creating over 300 jobs and a large \$20 plus milliondollar investment in a colonia that will benefit the community and diversify the base of employment in Chamberino. Their use of the former Alpo building is a way to repurpose an old facility and provides a location that will serve as a base for their operations. This project presents an opportunity for investment and economic development in a more rural part of the county," Sanchez said.

Singh has more than 35 years of experience in

to get away with the ole' sneaky pocket ball drop after his ball was lost. Then last week a golfer at my club, who sounded a little like Ross Perot, blurted out, "Heck, if ya' ain't cheatin' va' ain't tryin'." He was talking

search. To my surprise and dismay, I found that the first three items on my Google search ("cheating in golf") were sites giving tips on how to cheat: "Cheating 101," "How to improve your golf score by cheating," that advised "cheat-

ing at golf is a delicate art and science." Then there was a Website called "Bad-Golfer.com" that has the tagline "for the golfer who really sucks."

One of the articles on BadGolfer read, "(To) win easily on the golf course — cheat! Tips to help golfers win more bets." To me, this is the sports equivalent on the Internet of instructions on how to build a suicide bomb. What has the world come to, I thought.

When it comes to cheating on the golf course there are dozens, if not

hundreds, of ways to do it. You have the obvious. in-your-face variety, like claiming a lower score than actually made. Arnold Palmer once jokingly told a buddy his best tip for taking five strokes off his game was called an eraser. I have heard about the gimmick of magnetically picking up a marker coin with the sole of the putter and sneaking it forward several feet, but a new version popped up on "Cheating 101" which involves rubbing the putter sole on wet grass to make a "water vacuum"

that will also make the coin stick, so it can be moved forward. Then there are the more surreptitious, subtle, slick variety like greasing the face of your driver. Vaseline is preferred by the compulsive cheater, but chapstick works well for no-spin, longer, straighter drives. there is a little bit more of a bounce in their step because we haven't played in the Pan American in so long."

The Aggies had earned three straight NCAA tournament bids under Jans, before the Covid pandemic threw a monkey wrench into that momentum.

NMSU finished 7-6 in the WAC last season and 12-8 overall in an abbreviated season, falling to Grand Canyon University in the conference tournament championship game.

Jans said his team is "über motivated" after last season.

"We have a chip that is firmly attached to our shoulder about how the season unfolded last year," Jans said. "We weren't happy about it. We have a lot to prove.

"I think you'll find a team that will play really, really hard and they will play a brand of basketball that the community will be proud of," Jans added.

Jans said after all the obstacles the program faced last season, they have regrouped this offseason and have had "close to a normal summer."

"And our fall has been great thus far," he said.

"There is a lot of competition in fall camp," Jans added. "A lot of coaches and programs recruit seven or eight guys and everyone is comfortable in their roles and everyone knows what is going to happen each and every night."

Jans said he likes competition at "each and every spot."

"I think it makes everybody better over the course of the season," he said. "You are prepared for nickel-and-dime injury situations. You are prepared for foul situations. I like to have as much depth as possible."

While his players are certainly pumped up

about the upcoming season, so are the fans.

"There are so many people who care so deeply about this program," Jans said. "There is a special relationship between the Aggies and the Aggie fan base. It has nothing to do with me or my staff. This has been here long before we got on campus.

"I have talked to so many people and they all share the same sentiment — about how excited they are to get back into their seats and how excited they are to walk back into the Pan American Center and cheer for the Aggies again."

And the fans might just have a lot to cheer about besides the return of home basketball games.

In a preseason poll of WAC basketball coaches, NMSU received eight of 13 possible first-place votes and were named the conference favorites heading into the season.

Sounds like there will be some fun times ahead in the old Pan Am.
