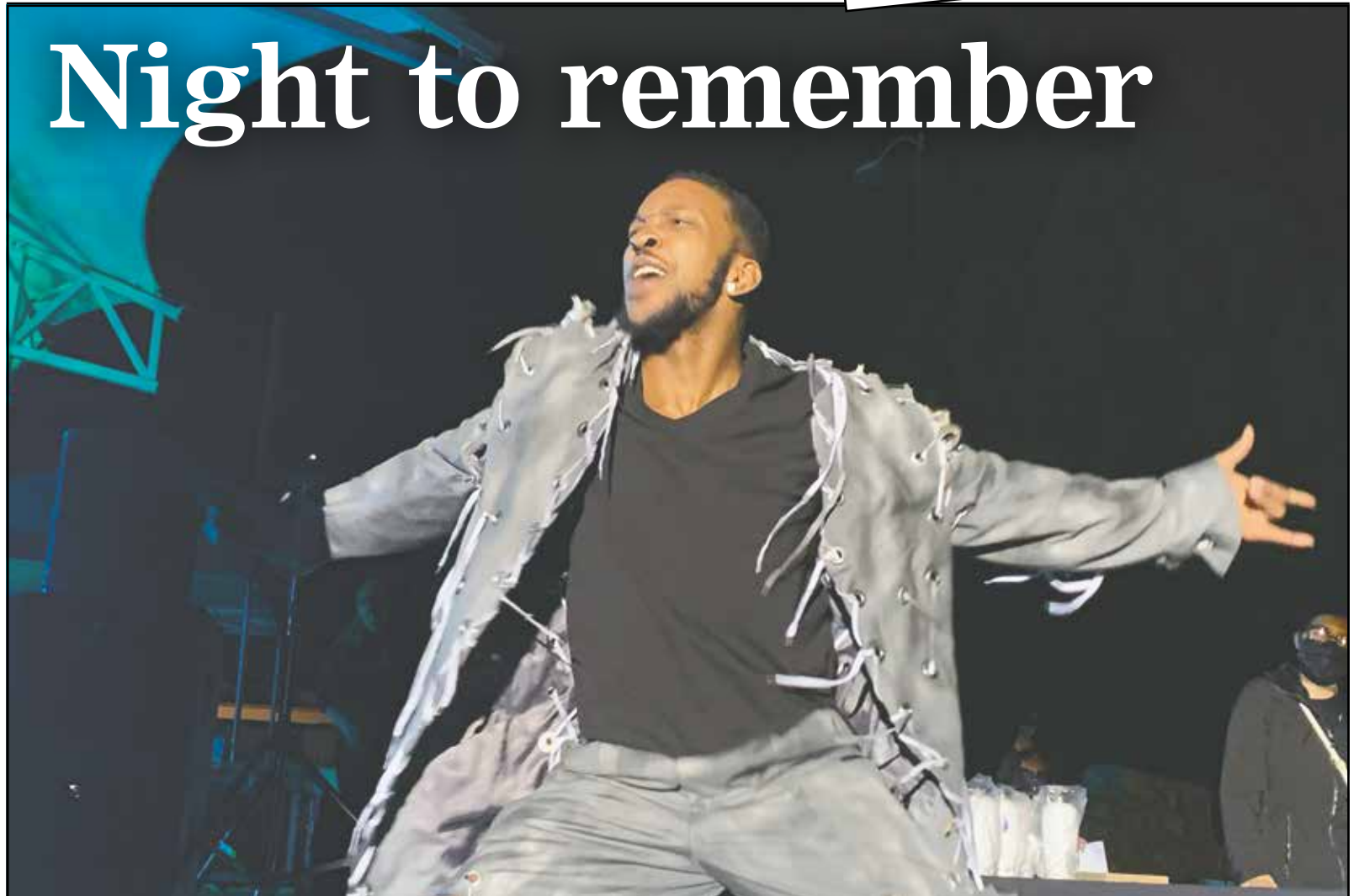

## CRISIS TRIAGE CENTER CELEBRATES 100<sup>TH</sup> GUEST



Doña Ana County's Crisis Triage Center (CTC), in partnership with RI International, hit the milestone of supporting 100 guests after only four months of operation.

"At four months, we continue the learning process in creating the best psychosocial environment for those experiencing a crisis, whether that crisis is due to mental health stressors or the misuse of substances," said CTC Director Karina Diaz.

Despite recent news coverage involving an individual being turned away due to the CTC not having adequate medical staff available, the center continues to receive referrals and maintains its no-wrong door policy to all who need their help.

"The news coverage revealed what is continuously being addressed, which is hiring staff and identifying gaps. It has been a long journey to open the CTC. We fought for it because we understood the need to bridge the gap for this type of care. There is a nationwide shortage of medical and clinical professionals, and we are not exempt from that. We work diligently to have staff on hand as well as a back-up skeleton crew if needed. That day when Sheriff Stewart arrived, we were feeling the squeeze of a shortage in staff. We have made the necessary adjustments and continue to recruit qualified healthcare professionals for continuity of service at the CTC," said HHS Director Jamie Michael.

"We appreciate the community's concerns and the CTC staff's dedication. Supporting those in crisis is important work. The crisis recovery work they do could be the difference between someone receiving caring support and the individual feeling alone in their time of need. So, we appreciate the passion, the concern, and the encouragement from Doña Ana County residents who advocate for our work. They want to see us here for the long haul and we are committed to that as well," added Michael.

The Crisis Triage Center is licensed by the New Mexico Department of Health, to offer 24/7/365 care for residents of Doña Ana County who are experiencing a behavioral health or substance use crisis.

# Las Cruces to have first-ever all-female city council; LCPS bond, 2-mill levy OK'd

It appears the City of Las Cruces will have an all-female city council for the first time since the city's first election in 1907.

Unofficial returns show that 11.2 percent, or 14,434 of Doña Ana County's approximately 128,000 eligible voters, cast ballots in the election, the county clerk's office said in a news release. That compares to a 16 percent turnout in 2019.

## Las Cruces City Council

- District 3: Becki Graham 467 (52.06 percent), Bev Courtney 408 (45.48 percent), Gregory Shervanick (write-in) 22 (2.45 percent). District 3 incumbent Gabriel Vasquez did not run for a second term.

"I'm so honored by the outcome of the election and will be spending the next two months preparing so I can hit the ground running for my district in January," Graham said after the election.

"I'm committed to continuing conversations with people in District 3 — I am here because of them, and for them," Graham said.

- District 5: Becky Corran 1,164 (56.45 percent), Robert Paquette 898 (43.55 percent) after three

rounds of voting in the race, which was decided by ranked-choice voting. After the first round, Corran had 990 votes (44.84 percent) to 502 (22.74 percent) for Paquette, 508 (23.01 percent) for Ronnie Sisneros and 208 (9.42 percent) for David Telford. Telford was eliminated because he had the lowest vote total. In the second round, Corran received 1,064 votes (48.76 percent) to 563 (25.8 percent) for Paquette and 555 (25.44 percent) for Sisneros, which eliminated Sisneros. District 5 incumbent Robert Paquette 898 (43.55 percent) after three

- District 3: Robert Wofford 1,740 (63 percent), Eloy Macha 1,004 (37 percent). District 3 incumbent Maria Flores did not run for a fourth term.

- Las Cruces Public Schools \$50 million general obligation bond issue: Yes 8,763 (69 percent), No 3,911 (31 percent). LCPS 2-mill levy: Yes 7,766 (64 percent), No 4,330 (36 percent).

### Doña Ana Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Supervisors

Two at-large seats. Retiring Las Cruces City Councilor Gill Sorg 5,198 (32 percent), Joseph R.

Skaggs 4,558 (28 percent) Joshua J. Switzer 3,663 (22 percent), Jose F. Makk 2,873 (18 percent). Incumbents Craig Fenske and Kevin Bixby did not run for second terms.

### Other races

Municipal races were

also held in Mesilla, Anthony, Hatch and Sunland Park.

In Anthony, incumbent Mayor and Doña Ana County Commissioner Diana Murillo-Trujillo was re-elected with 210 votes (41 percent) to 187 (36 percent) for Fernando

Gomez Herrera and 119 (23 percent) for Ernesto

Alonso Salazar.

In Hatch, unofficial returns show incumbent Mayor Andy Nuñez losing, as he received 35 votes (29 percent) to 42 (35 percent) for James Lynn Whitlock, 32 (27 percent) for G. Dennis Torres and 11 (nine percent) for Roberto E. Torres.

In Mesilla, Adrianna Cecilia Merrick received 239 votes (39 percent) and Biviana M. Cadena received 210 (34 percent) to win election to the two seats on the ballot. Incumbent Carlos Arzabal received 161 votes (26 percent).

The Gadsden Independent School District

and Hatch Valley Public Schools also held school board elections, and both school districts overwhelmingly passed bond issues.

The county clerk's office said it would begin a canvass of the votes Nov. 3 and present a final report to the county commission Nov. 12.

## CASA seeks donations to help group recover from burglary

### BULLETIN REPORT

Mesilla Valley Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) was burglarized in late October and is asking for the community's help in recovering from the losses sustained in the burglary.

Items taken include small electronics, two 65-inch flat-screen televisions used for training staff and teleconferencing and \$2,000 in gift cards,

said CASA Executive Director Doreen Gallegos. The loss is estimated at about \$5,000.

CASA uses the gift cards "to purchase birthday and holiday gifts for children and teens in foster care and live away from home to be safe," CASA said in a statement about the burglary.

"Volunteers, community leaders and business partners have already made contributions to

help us replace what was stolen so that we can continue to meet the needs of children in foster care," CASA said.

"We haven't replaced everything, and we could still use some help."

All funds raised during this time will go directly to kids and teens experiencing foster care, CASA said.

## Prison population continues statewide decline

New Mexico's prison population continued a downward trend in August, with prisons holding an average of 5,794 inmates (5,266 men and 528 women), a 0.6 percent decrease compared with July 2021 and a 7.2 percent decrease compared with August 2020. The numbers were part of the New Mexico Legislative Finance Committee's (LFC) September 2021 news

release.

The total number of inmates at the state's 11 prison facilities, both public and private, was 5,553 (5,030 males, 523 females) on Sept. 21, said New Mexico Corrections Department Public Information Officer Eric Harrison.

The total population at Southern New Mexico Correctional Facility, an all-male prison near Las Cruces, is 590, Harrison said. The state's only female facilities are

Springer Correctional Center in Springer and Western New Mexico Correctional Facility in Grants.

The New Mexico Sentencing Commission is projecting small increases in prison populations over the coming years despite recent downward trends, based partially on the expectation prison admissions will increase once court activity resumes after significant reductions during Covid-19.



## Careers That Keep You Home: Drive for SCSWA

The round trip from the South Central Solid Waste Authority's (SCSWA) Amador Transfer Station, on Motel Boulevard, to the Corralitos Landfill, off I-10 heading to Deming, is one hour and twenty minutes. Javier Hernandez, a SCSWA commercial truck driver, likes to listen to music and use the senses he's developed over the years.

"You get patience and get the feeling about others on the road, knowing when they're going to move into another lane," he said. Hernandez would know; he's been a truck driver for the last 13 years. Before coming to SCSWA five years ago, he did other types of truck driving – from transporting beverages and road

milling to long haul trucking.

"But whenever I'd come over the hill on I-10, I knew that this was where I belonged," said Hernandez, who is originally from San Miguel, New Mexico. SCSWA is continually looking for truck drivers like Hernandez to join its ranks. "If there are drivers who want a local job and be able to stay at home, this would be a good place to gain experiences and learn something new," said Hernandez. "It's not just about trash, but also about recycling."

In the five to seven loads he takes per day, Hernandez gets a peek into the lives of the drivers around him and his 22-ton truck and trailer. He sees more

people texting than he'd like, but the real request is to ask that residents dispose of chemicals correctly. He's had to dump loads from his trailer; one recently at the transfer station when another employee saw his trailer smoking.

"It's good I was still here; if we have to dump the load while we're on the road, it's so much more dangerous for us, and the traffic around us," he said. "People dispose of chemicals in their trash that mixes, but also things like batteries for cordless drills have started fires."

I had just finished loading 184 7-foot steel T-posts, old ones, by the way, in my pickup and was unloading a mere 24 bales of hay from the front section of my gooseneck stock trailer. It was a hot, humid afternoon in early fall when the dead branches begin to stick out of the cottonwood greenery, and the garden starts goin' to heck and no one cares. I could almost smell the cumin from Ramon's

No. 6 Combination Plate being distilled in my sweat from lunch earlier. Then I saw the blue box.

The dreaded blue box. It was still in the stock trailer. It needed to be moved.

The blue box is a metal toolbox I have had since I bought my first set of "made in America" sidecutters, thinking they would last longer. I have now realized that all sidecutters have the sharpness longevity of fresh fruit. They

should be thrown out about as often as you empty the trash barrel in the shop.

Anyway, over the years, the blue box has become my chain holder. It will hold four or five good log chains. I have always said that a 100 pounds of salt weighs more than a 100 pounds of anything else. But a 10-by-10-by-18-inch metal tool box full of log chains is harder to carry than a sheet of plywood in a hurricane.

There are other things that can stimulate a similar sink-

ing feeling, e.g., the same cow prolapsing for the third time, somebody commenting that my horse seems to be favoring his left front or the phone ringing in the deep of night.

I don't know exactly what it is about the old blue tool box that I dread. I've heaved it, moved it, loaded it, dropped it, pushed it and cursed it through a lifetime succession of jobs and homes, horses, and kids, and ups and downs.

# NM deserves more than just partisan posturing on environment

I am a Republican state senator and a proud conservationist.

We are at a crossroads in New Mexico between those who write environmental policy from downtown Albuquerque offices and those who live it out in the rest of New Mexico. With proposals coming left and right from coalitions pushing to spend ARPA funds, and legislators pushing for land acquisition, I believe now is the time to tell my story and stand tall for the conservation of our environment.

Southern New Mexico is my home and I am proud to be raising my children as the next generation of New Mexicans who will steward and care for our land.

My daughters are fourth-generation cattle ranchers and avid hunters, and I am teaching them that our land puts food on the table, that our water is scarce and precious and that our future depends on what we do today. At a young age, they too have learned the importance of conserving our natural resources, while witnessing the vast management

differences of conservation practices vs. preservation lockdowns. Together, we learn these lessons, not from Instagram graphics, but from hunting in the mountains, farming in the valley and ranching on the plains.

As the former director of a Soil and Water Conservation District, I have been disappointed in my role as a legislator to see disingenuous politicians give lip service to the environment with feel-good measures that neglect our land and render our forests ripe for wildfire. The coastal elites who

write policies for the eco-left in New Mexico do not seem to understand that in order to keep our land healthy, we have to manage it. And if you want practical examples of how to manage our land well, look no further than New Mexico's farmers, ranchers, outdoorsmen and tribal leaders.

Look to the rancher who has kept healthy pastures for 10 generations. Look to the farmer who is feeding America using less and less water through innovative farming practices. Look to the hunter who helps keep our wildlife populations in check. Look to the tribal lands that have vast ecological diversity in their wilderness, without the devastating wildfires we

see on federal- and state-controlled property.

Like these conservationists, I believe in conserving and protecting our land, not sequestering and neglecting it. Land acquisition is not enough. Just as we hire a crew at Chaco Canyon to preserve the structures, we must preserve our public lands through responsible management, including watershed restoration and forest thinning.

As New Mexicans, we are responsible to be good stewards of our environment so current and future generations have access to clean water and air, healthy and productive land and a thriving biodiversity. Our state needs more than political posturing right now and I

am eager to partner with my colleagues to take a responsible approach to conservation in New Mexico. My fellow lawmakers know there are practical and bipartisan approaches to stewarding our land and resources, and I hope they include as many stakeholders as possible in their discussions and strategies. We can and we must do better for the land, the wildlife and the people of our state.

Las Cruces has dreamed of becoming a bustling film production town for years. The film industry spends over \$500 million each year in New Mexico and supports thousands of good jobs, small business, tourism and educational and workforce advancement.

Now that we are in the midst of an unprecedented level of filming activity in Doña Ana County, it's a good time to go over some simple but important tips we can all follow to help successfully grow this industry here.

Be friendly to filmmakers — Las Cruces has a reputation for being exceedingly nice people. Since the film industry can choose to film wherever they want, let's warmly welcome our visitors to town, and use our niceness to our advantage. Like any business, well-treated customers are repeat customers.

Move at the speed of the film industry — Because films and television shows employ a lot of people, their time is expensive. Every minute spent waiting for something to happen is costly for the production. As a result, filmmakers and their crew are often in a hurry and looking for rapid solutions. Businesses and governments that can keep up with the needs of film productions can reap big rewards. If you are a business ready to accommodate the film industry,

sign up at the Film Las Cruces "Film Friendly Vendor" database.

Say YES — Filmmakers are storytellers, and they need lots of different locations and environments to tell their story. Whether it's creating a scene from a shoe store or a zombie apocalypse, they will be looking to secure the perfect location. If approached for help, please say yes if possible. It might make the difference in landing a great project for Doña Ana County. And if you must say "no," try to help solve the problem with "I can't do that, but what about this?"

Do not share film information on social media — Filmmakers and studios need to keep details of a film production confidential until it's their ideal time to promote it. As such they usually don't want pictures taken of filming (after all, images are the product they are selling!). It's important that we respect those rules, and not post pictures online.

Respect actors' privacy — Actors are people and need space to relax when they are not working. We can all help create a good work environment for them by giving them space to relax and not approaching them at restaurants and stores. Resist the temptation to ask for the selfie, and definitely do

not seek them out. They will enjoy their time here much more and want to come back.

Be patient — Filming a scene takes time, and it sometimes happens in places we might be using. Be patient and supportive of film productions and embrace any minor inconvenience for the jobs and opportunities they're bringing to our region.

Welcome changes — To accomplish any one scene requires hundreds of elements, all ready at once. If any one thing falls through, like a day is windy or someone gets stuck in traffic, there is a ripple effect and filming arrangements can change, and change quickly. Change does not mean the filmmakers are disorganized; it's the nature of this complex business.

# Torres Small begins work as undersecretary in US Ag department

“It is such an exciting time to get to be undersecretary for Rural Development, as we are about to see this historic investment in rural America,” Xochitl Torres Small said in an Oct. 28 online interview with the Bulletin.

Torres Small of Las Cruces was confirmed by the U.S. Senate in mid-October as the undersecretary for Rural Development in the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). In 2019-20,

Torres Small was the U.S. representative for New Mexico’s 2nd Congressional District.

She lost re-election in 2020 to current U.S. Rep. Yvette Herrell, R-N.M.

The appointment “is a dream come true. I am so grateful to get to have this job,” Torres Small said. “It’s very exciting taking the lessons I learned

from New Mexicans about the work that needs to be done and applying it for the whole country.”

An attorney, Torres

Small is married to state Rep. Nathan Small, D-Doña Ana.

Torres Small’s confirmation as undersecretary “is a victory for small towns and rural communities,” USDA Secretary Tom Vilsack said in a prepared statement.

“As the daughter of migrant farm workers and a native of rural New Mexico, Torres Small represents the heart and soul of rural communities,” Vilsack said. “In this role, she will serve as an unwavering voice for millions of rural Americans and drive the effort to revitalize rural.”

Vilsack, a former governor of Iowa who served eight years as agricultre

secretary in the Obama administration, is “an incredibly dedicated man and committed to rural America,” Torres Small said.

Vilsack, President Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris are ensuring that “rural communities aren’t left behind,” she said.

Torres Small is the first undersecretary for Rural Development in five years, she said, because the position was eliminated during the Trump administration.

“It’s exciting to see that reach and that investment,” Torres Small said about the allocation of additional federal funding for Internet connections across the country during her first two weeks in office. Part of her work, she said, is to “make sure rural communities get good reliable Internet,” including connecting more people to telehealth at Ben Archer health clinics in southern New Mexico.

Along with climate change, “poverty is a huge challenge” in rural areas, Torres Small said, including colonias in southern Doña Ana County, where

“it’s really difficult to make sure people have the opportunity to succeed.”

People in rural communities in southern New Mexico and throughout the country face similar challenges and have similar hopes, Torres Small said. One hope they share, she said, is that their children can thrive in rural areas.

“We know that America will not succeed if rural America does not succeed,” she said.

Through his Build Back Better program and other initiatives, Biden is “investing and working for the whole country,” Torres Small said. “This investment shows Rural Development is delivering and investing in rural places.”

Rural Development has staff in 47 states, Torres Small said, and many more field offices, where employees “are embedded with the places and people they serve.”

“This is a good day for rural America,” she said.

Barragan was evaluated on scholastics, talent, fitness, self-expression and interview skills with a panel of five judges for the award, Jasso said.

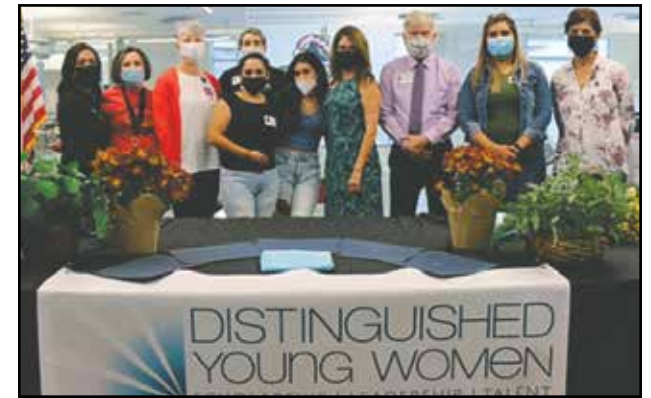
Barragan earned \$2,550 in scholarships as part of her award and is now eligible for additional scholarships from colleges and

## Time to move clocks back is this weekend

It's almost time to "fall back."

November means the end of daylight saving time (DST) for 2021, as New Mexico and most other states return to standard time at 2 a.m. Sunday, Nov. 7.

Set your clocks back one hour.

It is also a good time to check smoke-alarm batteries.

Mountain standard time in 2021-22 will last 126 days, until Sunday, March 13, 2022.

DST was first enacted in the United States in 1918, repealed the next year, reinstated as a "war time" measure from February 1942 to September 1945 during World War II. It became permanent in 1966, and kicked in earlier

in 1974, after President Richard Nixon signed the Emergency DST Energy Conservation Act because of the oil embargo.

President George W. Bush signed the Energy Policy Act in August 2005, which moved the end of DST from the last Sunday in October to the first Sunday in November and the start date for DST to the second Sunday in March.

And by the way, the correct spelling (and the correct way to say it) is daylight saving time – there is no "s" at the end of savings.

New Mexico is one of 48 states that observes DST. Only Arizona (except for the Navajo Nation) and Hawaii do not recognize DST, along with American Samoa, Guam, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

Hunner has published "Inventing Los Alamos: The Growth of an Atomic Community," "J. Robert Oppenheimer, the Cold War, and the Atomic West" and "The Mesilla Valley: An Oasis in the Desert."

In 2016, Hunner "drove more than 60,000 miles visiting places where history actually happened

## Las Cruces Utilities: Continuing Education at All Levels

A lifetime's learning never ends. Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) ensures that employees stay up to date on the latest industry standards and best practices that increase the staff's ability to provide safe, clean water, reliable natural gas, and weekly trash and recycling services.

For LCU Deputy Director Lucio M. Garcia, P.E., the continuation of learning was in the form of a New Mexico State University graduate certification in Public Utility Regulation and Economics (PURE).

The PURE certificate is a professional educational program designed for post-baccalaureate students pursuing a career in the utility sector, with an electric utility company, natural gas utility, water distribution utility, or a government agency regulating these types

of companies.

The classes are advanced technical instruction on utility industry analysis and review utility regulatory methods, policy, and analytical applications. The program also serves students with a wide variety of backgrounds – from accounting to law and public administration – so anyone who may even tangentially work with utilities in the future

has a firm grasp of how it works.

In 12 credit hours, Garcia went back to review the theoretical aspects of what he does day-to-day. Garcia said, "It is a demanding program; however, if you enjoy it, it is straightforward."

"The most difficult was working through all the spreadsheets of a rate case in the earlier classes," said Garcia. "In the latter courses, there is so

much reading through other actual rate cases to develop and write testimony. For me, it's something that can be applied immediately for how we analyze and develop our rates here."

LCU Director Delilah Walsh explained that it's in LCU's mission to ensure that employees have all the tools they need to do their job, not just the physical ones. "Our employees are our greatest resource, and it's our goal to invest in them to be able to do their jobs to the best of their abilities," said Walsh. "We encourage staff to go for that next stage in their career through education; for example, if a water operator wants to test to the next level. It's important not only for them, but reflects that on caliber of our entire organization."

# City manager Ifo Pili earns high marks in first annual review

Mayor Ken Miyagishima said the Las Cruces City Council is very pleased with City Manager Ifo Pili.

The mayor and council conducted Pili's first-ever annual performance evaluation Oct. 26. Pili became city manager Sept. 8, 2020.

"I wish to congratulate Ifo Pili for earning high

marks during his first annual evaluation as city manager," Miyagishima said. "Running a city is extremely challenging. In addition, coming from a different state with different rules, makes it even more challenging."

City council noted Pili's strong leadership and communication skills, adaptability and dedication.

"Ifo has been able to navigate the ship, provide

the city council with a nearly half-a-billion-dollar budget and earn the city the title of ninth best run city in the nation," Miyagishima added.

As city manager, Pili is the city council's sole employee. All other city employees report to the city manager. Currently, Pili oversees 1,512 full-time employees and an adopted fiscal year 2021-22 budget of \$499,632,525.

# County extends rental assistance, hits new milestone for Covid relief

## BULLETIN REPORT

As of Oct. 15, Doña Ana County has paid out \$4.6 million in rental and utilities assistance to 793 households and encumbered another \$80,000, which will be paid out by mid-November for a cumulative total of \$5.47 million, the county said.

The money is part of \$9.3 million in federal Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP) funds allocated to provide assistance to county residents impacted by the pandemic.

An extension has been

granted for the first phase of ERAP to Sept. 30, 2022, the county said.

"This extension underscores the federal government's commitment to allow us to help as many of our residents as we can," county Manager Fernando Macias said.

Since a moratorium for rent and utilities disconnections ended, the county is seeing an influx of residents who still need assistance, the news release said.

"We are strategic in our methods and continually evaluate opportunities to streamline the process,"

said county Grants Manager for ERAP Jonathan Macias.

"We realize that even if someone does not seek out the help, we still can find ways to assist by making details about the program known. For example, we collaborate with the magistrate court on pending case files," Jonathan Macias added.

The county continues to look for innovative ways to make the application process as easy as possible by providing multiple ways for qualified applicants to apply, the news release said.

ERAP helps eligible applicants in a rental dwelling for up to 12 months of owed rent and utilities and three months of future rent, the county said. These funds do not have to be repaid.

Along with a simple, step-by-step process in both English and Spanish on the county website ([www.donaanacounty.org/ERAP](http://www.donaanacounty.org/ERAP)); in-person application processing at the County Government Center, 845 N. Motel Blvd.; and assistance at community centers throughout the county, the county has now en-

abled the option for tenants and landlords to text and use video conferencing for those comfortable with this type of technology.

provide a safe place for students to participate in after-school programs that provide an array of enrichment opportunities."

"We are so delighted to be able to broaden our outreach and touch so many more students in different parts of the state," said Henrietta Pichon, interim dean of the NMSU College of Health, Education and Social Transformation, where the center is housed. "Programs such as these create lifelong learners who see learning as another great adventure."

Programs offered by the center provide academic support and enrichment opportunities to support literacy and science, technology,

engineering and mathematics learning designed to reinforce topics introduced during students' traditional learning day. Students participate in activities such as robotics, photography, coding, engineering design, dance, cooking, crafts and sports. Each participating school chooses the after-school programs that match the interests and needs of its school community.

The center will partner with participating school districts and organizations such as Ngage New Mexico, Cruces Creatives, STEAMing Ahead for Success and La Semilla Food Center to provide a wide range of community resources with the grant funding.

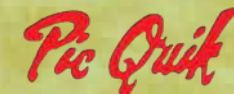

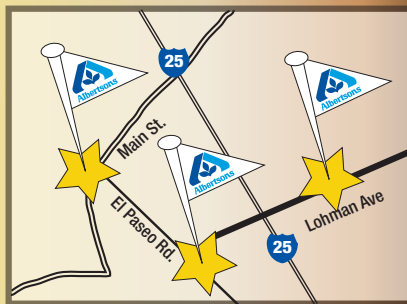

# ‘Mary Poppins Returns’ in very fine form

The most remarkable thing about “Mary Poppins Returns” is how much it had to work against, and how well it does that.

The original 1964 Disney classic is one of those movies many people would prefer to be left untouched by a sequel, especially after so many years and so many generations of fans. No one else could be as purely magical as Julie Andrews, who won an Oscar for the title role ... but in the 2018 follow-up (which Freeform shows Thursday, Nov. 11), Emily Blunt makes a logical and effective-in-her-own-way choice to succeed her.

Thanks to her ever-ready parasol, Mary floats back into the lives of the now-grown Jane and Michael Banks, played by Emily Mortimer and Ben Whishaw. Michael is especially at loose ends over the loss of their mother, to the degree that the bank he works for is ready to repossess the Banks’ house. Saving it rests with an inheritance from the late Banks father, provided the

offspring can find the certificate that proves they have it.

That’s where Mary steps in to help, dispensing more of the gentle guidance she’s so known for. Assisting her is Jack, a chimney sweep who’s more or less the successor to Dick Van Dyke’s Bert ... and he’s played by “Hamilton” wunderkind Lin-Manuel Miranda, whose energy is a very big boost to the proceedings here (and the likely springboard to a great screen career, if he can keep finding appropriate projects).

Van Dyke himself makes an appearance here, and director Rob Marshall also makes use of such greats as Meryl Streep, Angela Lansbury, Julie Walters and David Warner in telling the new story. “New” is something of a qualifier, though; if you put this movie beside the first one (which Freeform will show right before this on Nov. 11), it’s easy to see there’s a parallel element for just about everything that has kept the original “Mary Poppins” so embraced by audiences.

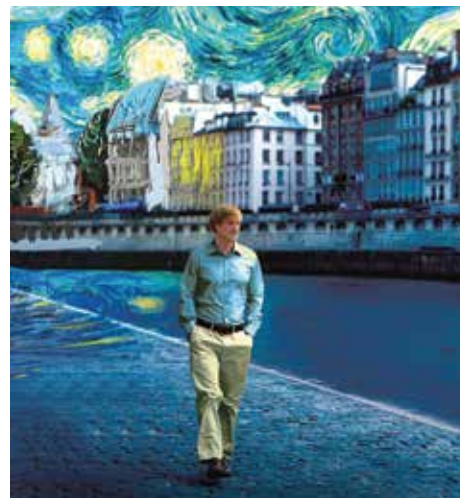
## “Deutschland 83”

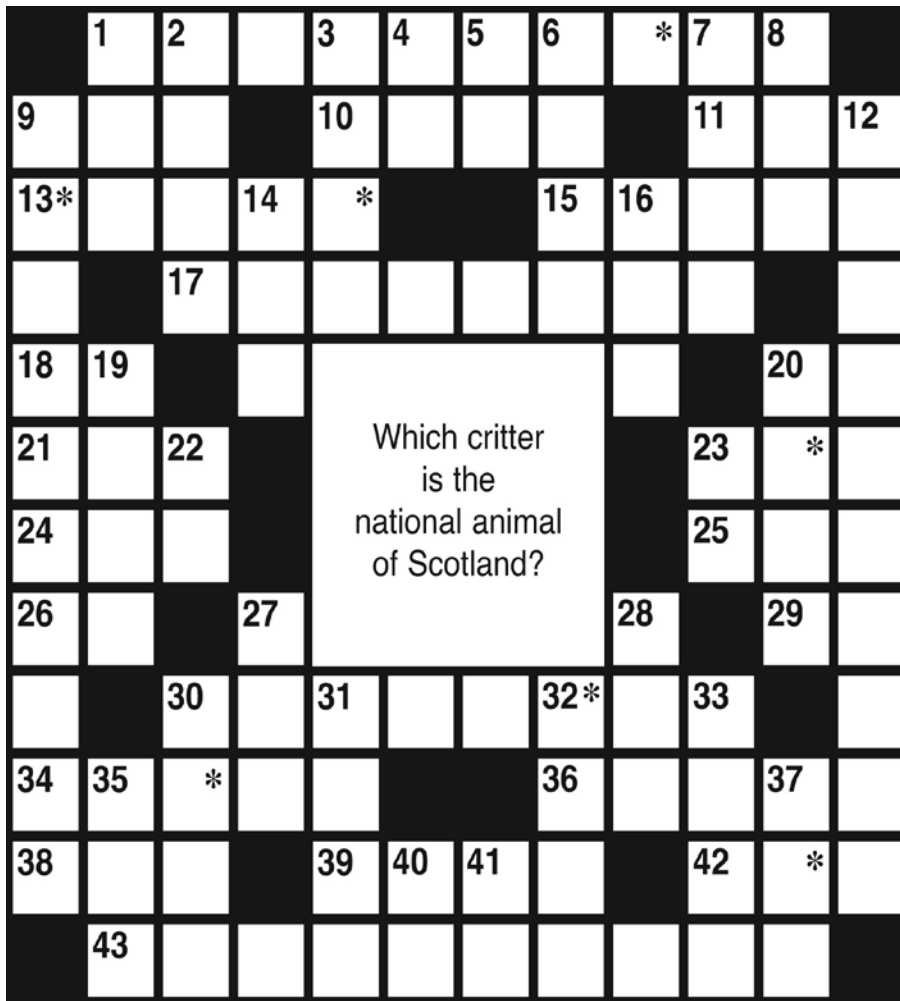

## 'Beautiful Barbarism' exhibit takes provocative look at NM

Art Obscura Gallery, 3206 Harrelson St. in Mesilla Park, will host a solo exhibition entitled "Beautiful Barbarism" that features the work of Las Cruces photographer David D. Sorensen, gallery owner Deret Roberts said in a news release.

The show opens Saturday, Nov. 13, and continues through Friday, Dec. 10. A reception will be held at 7 p.m. Nov. 13. All guests should be vaccinated against Covid-19, wear masks and socially distance themselves.

"This show confronts the viewer with a provocative, yet aesthetic look at New Mexico's less-proud interaction with the environment," Roberts said.

The show is subtitled "New Mexico, (said but) True," Roberts said, and is loosely grouped around six themes: the "Barbarism" title section that

mainly addresses "the wanton shoot-it-up culture and the devastation left behind in the wilderness"; "Developing by Destroying," which "highlights the carving up of the surroundings for new homes, fast food and mining"; "Desert Trash," which "reminds that New Mexicans aren't the most tidy of folks"; "Low Brow NM," about "all our cultural institutions and the fabric of our overall social culture"; "Indifferent Neglect," which "reflects the way entropy seems to rule here"; and "Graffiti Defacement," which "shows the range of beautiful, destructive and impermanent graffiti that is so prevalent in our border culture."

around New Mexico, Sorensen "couldn't help notice the rather casual and sometimes destructive way people treat their surroundings, whether their homes or the desert environment," Roberts said. "Beautiful Barbarism" confronts viewers with his provocative, aesthetic, interesting and sometimes even beautiful vision of who we are."

"I was fortunate to be born with an artistic eye," Sorensen said. "There can be a beauty and aesthetic to even the grubbier of things, depending on the light and framing. New Mexico is what it is and I love living here."

Roberts said Sorensen's show "offers a mix of small, affordable and intimate pieces, along with larger, dramatic photo-

graphs, seen through the eyes of an artist."

"Beautiful Barbarism" will be Sorensen's first solo show since 2012, shortly after the artist moved to Las Cruces from Virginia, Roberts said.

Sorensen's work was part of the "Here & Now" exhibitions at the City of Las Cruces Museum of Art and the New Mexico State University Art Gallery, Roberts said. And, Sorensen recently had 20 of his photographs

included in the spring exhibition at the New Mexico Cancer Center in Albuquerque.

# Fine arts gallery features artists Tugel, Zucker in November show

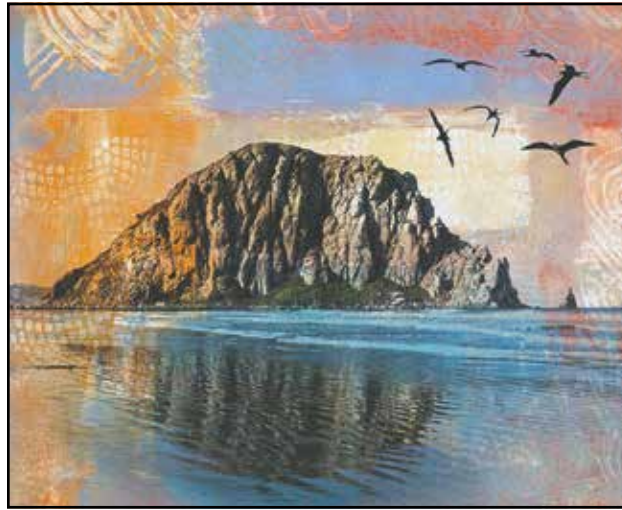

During her career as a soil scientist, Tugel studied and explored a wide variety of natural and agricultural landscapes.

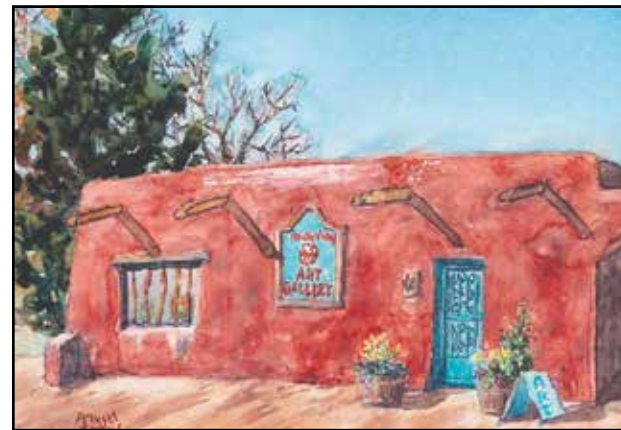

The cover is a compilation of all the past editions with art from many

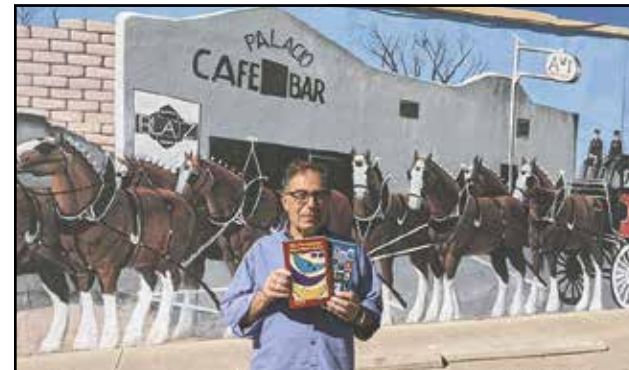
well-known local artists. Featured writers are both local and national.

# Arts Council's latest exhibit features watercolor society members

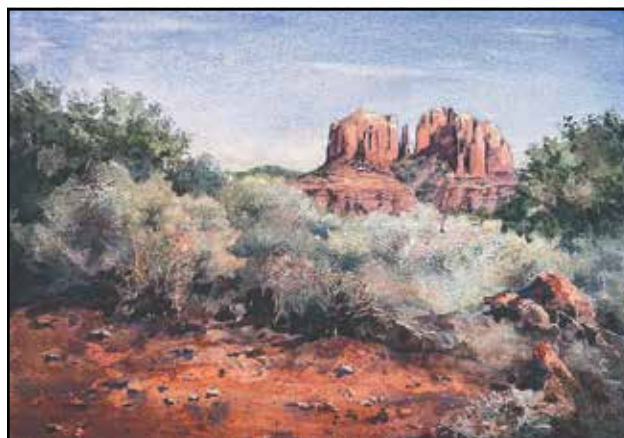

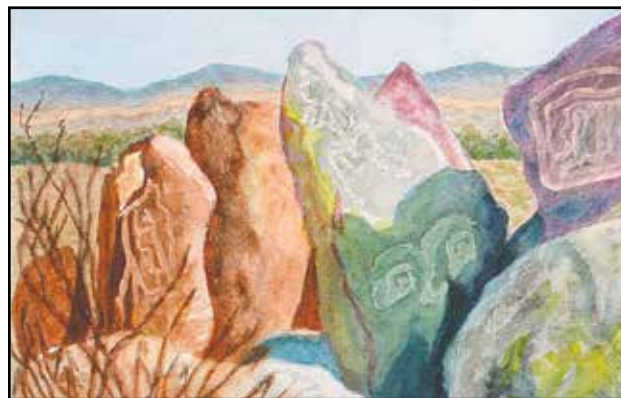

## Fountain murder screenplay a dream project for NM native

“Chalk Hill” is a story that began with two Alamogordo brothers and wound up as a screenplay about a father and son who have become part of the history and lore of southern New Mexico and the Old West.

State Sen. Ron Griggs of Alamogordo was always fascinated by a book he read at his grandparents' house about the disappearance and murders of Albert J. Fountain and his 8-year-old son, Henry, in the late 19th century near where he and his brother, Jeff, grew up.

Ron suggested to Jeff, a professional actor, that he turn the story into a screenplay. Jeff, who lives in Los Angeles, with acting credits that include television series, movies and a Southwest Airlines TV commercial that is now airing, liked the idea.

After five years of research and writing, Jeff completed the screenplay earlier this year and is partnering with the New Mexico State University Theatre Department on a staged reading in Las Cruces this month.

“Chalk Hill” is the title of Griggs' screenplay, and the name of the site near White Sands Missile Range where the 1896 murders likely took place. It's an area the Griggs brothers know well, hav-

ing explored it many times over the years.

In fact, it was Ron Griggs who connected his brother with NMSU Theatre Department Head Wil Kilroy.

“I thought this was a great opportunity for our students to work with a professional coming in from Los Angeles, and to be exposed to a screenplay that is planned for filming in this area in the future,” Kilroy said.

“In addition to our students, there will be actors from Las Cruces and El Paso,” Kilroy said, and Griggs is bringing professional actors from Los Angeles to read some parts.

The “Chalk Hill” cast of characters includes people who were involved in the murders and the subsequent investigation, including Old West icons like Pat Garrett and Billy the Kid, both the Fountains and their alleged murderers, rancher Oliver Lee and his employees Jim Gilliland and Billy McNew. Lee and Gilliland were found not guilty of the murder of

Henry Fountain in an 1899 trial held in Hillsboro, New Mexico. They were defended by Albert Fall — another real-life character in the screenplay — who would become one of New Mexico's first U.S. senators and later spend a year in federal prison for his involvement in the Teapot Dome scandal during the Harding administration.

Fall had a lot of influence in the courts, Jeff Griggs said, and Lee was a powerful cattle rancher who would become a state senator and have a state park named after him.

In his research, Griggs said he learned that Lee publicly said he had never killed a man who didn't deserve killing.

“That's a fascinating thing for someone to say,” Jeff Griggs said. Lee was “OK with taking another man's life, OK with being judge, jury and executioner,” he said.

“They didn't call it the Wild West for nothing,” Griggs said. At the time of the Fountain murders,

New Mexico Territory, he said, was "kind of like Al Capone's Chicago."

Jeff Griggs said people were especially outraged about the Fountain murders because one of the victims was a child.

Territorial Gov. William Taylor Thornton knew the murders wouldn't help New Mexico's efforts to become a state, Griggs said. He brought Doña Ana County Sheriff Pat Garrett into the investigation in 1898, and Garrett "did what he could to bring justice to this egregious crime," Griggs said.

The bodies of Fountain and his son were never found and no one was ever convicted of their murders.

But bringing attention

to the crime, "doing what we could to hold men accountable for their actions, we suggested to the rest of the world that we had a level of stability and could govern ourselves," Jeff Griggs said.

"Finding the humanity in these characters" was one of Griggs' goals in writing the screenplay, he said. He drew from historical documents "to develop characters," while others were based on Griggs' father and grandfather, whom he called "the most honorable men I knew."

"Chalk Hill," Jeff Griggs said, is "a period piece that takes place on the incredible canvas of southwest New Mexico." The site "lends itself to the most extraordinary cinematography," he said. "It's just one of the most beautiful, breathtaking

places ever."

Jeff Griggs last scouted Chalk Hill with Ron in September, he said, watching the sun going down behind "the gray-blue giants of the Organ Mountains (with) a gigantic moon over Dog Canyon," as he imagined Fountain and his son riding through in a buckboard.

Griggs is a graduate of NMSU, where he was mentored by Tony Award winner Mark Medoff.

Another career influence is Oscar-winning cinematographer Janusz Kaminski, whom Griggs met when they worked together on location on a movie in Moscow, Russia.

Developing "Chalk Hill" into a motion picture, Jeff Griggs said, is allowing him to use everything he has learned in filmmaking "to do the best work I've ever done."

“During the 1970s, the LGBTQ community struggled and fought for awareness,” Lucca said in a news release.

At the same time, her father came out as gay.

“The secrecy and tumult that followed her father’s truth led Lisa on a path of rebellion and self-discovery,” the news release said.

Written after her father’s passing, “Ashes to Ink” recounts the challenges Lisa and her family faced “as they came to un-

derstand her father’s complexities during a time when openly queer people were shunned, mocked, and attacked.”

Jordan Budd, executive director of COLAGE

(Children of Lesbians and Gays Everywhere), a national LGBTQ+ family organization, said Lucca has written “... a raw and gripping memoir which perfectly captures the unique ripple effects of life with a gay parent,” Lucca quoted in her news release.

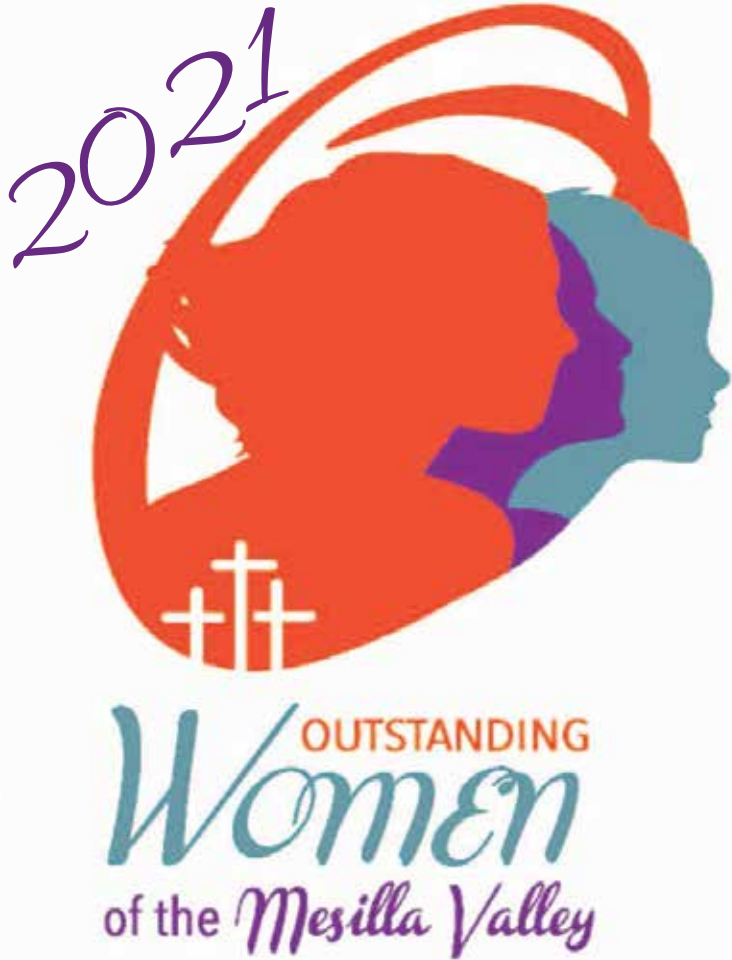

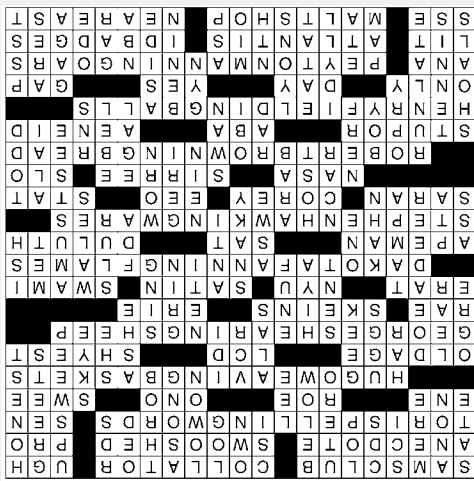

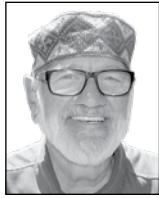


## USA has always had an ‘establishment religion’ but in shadow form

The First Amendment to the Constitution was drafted because many of the founders of our Republic had experienced established churches in their homelands. The Church of England, for example, was and remains the established religion of the land and, for centuries, others were illegal.

The founders of the American experiment did not want such a situation to prevail in this new land. Hence, they crafted the concept of the separation of church and state.

America has, of course, always been dominated by Protestantism, particularly in political hallways. That domination continued into the 20th Century, supposedly — according to the magazine title —

“The Christian Century.” A movement began in the wake of a series of 90 theological treatises called “The Fundamentals,” published in the USA between 1910 and 1915. This series outlined

one view of Christianity, and not so subtly attacked Roman Catholicism, historical criticism of the Bible and a host of other perceived ills that beset religion in America.

Fast forward to 1947. Billy Graham began his preaching ministry. Graham managed to become adviser to presidents from Eisenhower on. Dwight Eisenhower invited him specifically to be his spiritual adviser and the unofficial post extended almost until Graham’s death.

So, what’s wrong with

this picture? Granted that America has always been dominated by the Protestant ethic and religion, such a relationship could indicate favoritism for one religious viewpoint. Hence, transgressing an admittedly blurry boundary.

Consider Graham’s support of Lyndon Johnson and Richard Nixon. Graham actively supported Nixon against Kennedy in the belief that Kennedy’s Catholicism would mean subjection to papal influence.

Graham publicly supported the Vietnam War. Graham repudiated some of his earlier positions in his last years, admitting that they were too political, but you see the problem.

While not technically an establishment of evangelical Protestantism as the norm for the US, such

relationships can be seen as tacit or implicit establishment.

Fast forward to now. Evangelical Protestantism has continued to be the dominant voice in American Christianity, and the connection with politics has never been stronger than at the present. Groups like Jerry Falwell’s Moral Majority pushed an agenda in the late 70s and early 80s that was specifically aimed toward creating and sustaining a strong political voice for evangelical Christianity. The trend continues.

Those of us not of evangelical Protestant movements see the problem, even if others don’t. Protestant domination is longstanding in American society, to the point where it has been taken for granted, hence unnoticed, in the past. Antipathy

toward Roman Catholics was epidemic in the mid-19th century, and the political scene reflected it up through Kennedy’s campaign, and perhaps continues in some quarters. Jews were marginalized in American society, kept out of top universities and social positions. Islamic people weren’t on the map; neither were Orthodox Christians. These groups had no political voice or power at all for a long time.

News media have not helped the problem. Often, when the press mentions Christianity, they mean evangelicalism. Other positions lack representation because they are not numerically important or politically active. The exception, in our time, would be Roman Catholicism but usually the voice of the hierarchy — the pope — gets press.

It may be time to collectively re-think the meaning of the First Amendment considering the reality of American religion and politics.

America always had a kind of “establishment,” albeit in a shadow form. At the very least, we could understand that Christianity is not limited to evangelical Protestantism and that our culture is now pluralistic in a way it has never been before. Consequently, many Christian political positions now prevail, not the agenda of evangelicals only.

## East Mesa Baptist Church food ministry responds during pandemic

Since 2014, East Mesa Baptist Church (EMBC) opened its doors every Thursday at 9 a.m. to East Mesa area residents in need of food or other assistance. Then the pandemic hit. Instead of eight to 12 families seeking food each week, 40 to 60 families became the norm. One day, 80 families came through the line.

With such an increase

in need, and a surplus of food donations coming in from a variety of sources, the church fellowship hall and most of the classrooms filled up with pallets of food. Plans are underway to build a separate building to house the food pantry ministry now that it’s outgrown the small closet that used to contain it.

“It’s grown from where we used to be down here Thursday mornings, and maybe Tuesday morn-

ings, to now we are here probably four to five days a week,” said Scott Baumberger, who along with his wife, Peggy, helps run the ministry.

“The pandemic was very stressful,” said EMBC’s food pantry ministry leader Bernice Sanchez. “A lot of people needed food. A lot of people lost their jobs. They were coming from out of town to live with their parents because they lost their jobs where they

lived. We had to change our things around. Instead of an indoor pantry, it became an outdoor drive-in with masks and sanitizer.”

With Covid protocols restricting contact, cars line up and drive in front of the church, open their trunks and EMBC volunteers decked out in masks and plastic gloves place the food boxes in the car trunks. Recipients show

their IDs to indicate they live in the East Mesa area and church volunteers keep a spreadsheet to record how often each family comes through.

Prior to the pandemic,

area residents could only request assistance once a month, but with the increased need and abundance of food donations, families can come twice a month. Along with the food, tracts and Bibles are sometimes provided, along with fliers announcing services that might be

of interest to the families, such as free GED or citizenship classes.

“Iglesia Bautista Buenas Nuevas next door is a Spanish church, our sister church, so they give us Bible tracts or information on women’s ministries in Spanish because 70 percent of the people

who come through are Spanish speaking,” Sanchez said.

When more volunteers were needed to manage the food pickups, storage and distribution, many stepped up to help.

“We are so blessed in this church with people who are willing and capable,” said EMBC Pastor James Pratt. “There are not enough words of affirmation and acclamation for the many faithful volunteers we have. They are just awesome!”

“I volunteer as service to God,” said Peggy Bamberger. “There’s a lot of families out in this area that need extra help. Those that are very appreciative make it worthwhile for those that aren’t. And when you have little kids come and they haven’t eaten, they want to eat the apple, or the fruit, that’s right there, right now.”

To fund the pantry ministry and offer util-

ity bill assistance, EMBC collects a benevolence offering once a month among church members. The pantry’s food comes from individual donations, through Casa de

Peregrinos, a local food distribution center, or is purchased from the Roadrunner Food Bank of New Mexico. The Las Cruces Gospel Rescue Mission, which EMBC supports through its monthly budget, also donates its excess food to EMBC.

During the pandemic, the church obtained several grants, including one through the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico. EMBC is also one of nine Baptist Convention of New Mexico churches that received weekly deliveries of fresh produce, dairy and meat products through the U.S. Department of Agriculture’s \$19 billion Coronavirus Food Assistance Program. Local grocery stores also call EMBC directly when food donations are available and need to be picked up.

East Mesa Baptist Church is located at 6160 Moongate Road east of Las Cruces.

## Damage control: How to avoid ruining a good round with a miscue

We’ve all done it. Ruining an otherwise very good round of golf by trying to make a miracle escape from bad trouble, only to make it much worse, turning a bogey into a quadruple. After doing that recently I went into my extensive golf library and pulled out a classic Dave Pelz instruction manual entitled “Damage Control.” The subhead of the book is “How to save up to 5 shots a round using all-new, scientifically proven techniques for playing out of

trouble lies.”

What impresses me is that “Damage Control” is not simply a collection of specialty “trick” shots that you might try if you were desperate; it starts out as a golfing

philosophy, based on the reality that golfers play well for most of the round, but then ruin their score with a few bad holes. It’s also based on the fact that we as recreational golfers will never completely avoid errant shots that get us into trouble. Even the best players in the world

have to face seriously troubled lies sometimes; it’s part of the game. We must recognize that golf courses are diabolical; they are designed to lead to trouble should you misplay a shot. Plus, there are bad bounces and bad luck that can cause headaches, so we better learn to deal with them. Pelz believes that we can effectively get out of trouble without ruining the score by acquiring skills and knowledge that is unconventional and perhaps not obvious. “The mental skills of damage control require a different mode of thinking based on a different set of

metrics,” asserts Pelz, the oft-regarded golf “engineer.”

A perfect example of one of those damage control secrets is “setupology,” the term Pelz uses to describe how to set up properly (with posture and position) for swings from lies that might spell disaster. Because “trouble lies” almost always involve difficult terrain and an unusual stance, setting up poorly is often the first mistake golfers make when they are in serious trouble. He says the set-up is the foremost skill to limit damage because it comes before the

backswing, downswing or follow-through of any trouble shot. If you set up wrong, your odds of making a bad swing are much greater, thereby worsening the problem. Take a case where your ball is under a low tree branch. You can take a stance and get the club on the ball but you have to bend way over, with your head in the branches to hit the ball. The damage control play that will allow you to best escape such a lie is playing the shot from your knees, with your torso upright, thereby allowing you to make a better shoulder turn and swing

the club with more force, keeping the shaft below the greenery.

The real beauty of damage control is that you don’t have to have any extraordinary skills or talent to save yourself a bundle of agony. It doesn’t take brute strength or the ingenious escape artistry brilliance of a Seve Ballesterous, the most imaginative tour player ever. But it does take some practice to be able to hit some of these anomalous shots. And it does mean getting a grip on some basics. Take “swing shap-

all of sports: the Anteat-ers.

At this made-for-ESPN event, the Aggies will face Davidson in the opening round on Nov. 18 and will play two more games in the tournament.

ing," for instance. If you have to go steeply uphill, downhill, over or around objects like trees, or have

a tightly restricted swing, you need to shape your swing to create a ball flight that will get you back in position to continue the hole. This means understanding the swing path, face alignment and ball spin dynamics. Take

a waist-high lie where your ball is so far above your feet that you need almost a baseball bat swing. Pelz notes that the club will feel heavier with it horizontal, leaving you with the tendency to make smothered tow hooks.

By gripping down on the shaft, positioning your spine angle properly and maintaining your balance (among other things) you can control the starting direction and curvature of your ball, thereby avoiding the bane of the un-

aware duffer, hitting into real disaster. The shot doesn't have to be perfect; just good enough so you can recover and possibly save losing a stroke. "In damage control you just have to be good enough to get your ball safely back

into the game," Pelz says.
