




Concept "E"

The Doña Ana County Board of Commissioners (BOCC) is asking residents to give input on three final proposed district maps that will define the county districts for the next ten years.

Redistricting is the process of redrawing political boundaries with equal population represented by a single commissioner on the board. The 2020 Census results showed population increase in the county by 4.9 percent. For redistrictina purposes, the ideal population for each district is 43,912 residents within a 5 percent deviation range.

New era for NMSU Aggie football, other sports will join Conference USA starting in 2023-24

New Mexico State University's athletics program will soon enter a new era.

Friday, Nov. 5, the university announced that it had accepted an invitation to join Conference USA (C-USA) in all sports, starting in the 2023-24 school year.

"To be invited and accepted into Conference USA is nothing short of phenomenal," said NMSU Athletics Director Mario Moccia during a news conference to announce the move.

"As a founding member of the college football playoff, it is unbelievable for us (to join C-USA) and sets us up on a great trajectory for the future, not just competition-wise but financially as well," he added.

The move was largely football driven, Moccia said.

The Aggies have played as an independent in football since their last game as a football-only member of the Sun Belt Conference — the 2017 Arizona Bowl, a 26-20 overtime victory over Utah State and the school's first bowl berth and victory in 57 years.

Since then, the football team has struggled. This year, the Aggies are 1-8. (See this week's Bulletin sports page for more on NMSU's current season). NMSU has been a mem-

ber of the Western Athletic Conference (WAC) since 2005 in all its other sports. And those sports, including men's basketball, will also join C-USA in 2023.

Three other schools were announced as new members of C-USA on Nov. 5 – Jacksonville State, Liberty University and Sam Houston State University.

The move will cost NMSU a \$1.5 million entry fee to join C-USA, Chancellor Dan Arvizu said. The school will make an initial payment of \$250,000 next year and then will make equal payments of \$250,000 spread out of five years and that money will be taken out of future revenues generated by the conference, Arvizu said.

"A lot of things have gone into this event of the day," Arvizu said. "We could not be more pleased. Obviously, the greatest part of this has to do with stability in our conference and giving us the opportunity to play all of our sports, FBS (Football Bowl Subdivision) football, in a conference we are very comfortable in."

NMSU will also have to pay the WAC an \$85,000 exit fee, Moccia said. When asked if the move

Project aims to bring back Mendoza House 'exactly the way it was'

Prasanna Pai of Las Cruces bought one of the city's oldest houses a few years ago, but discovered that the structure, which dates to the 1840s, could not be saved.

The Mendoza House, located at the corner of Campo Street and Court Avenue in Downtown Las Cruces, was torn down as a result. Pai is constructing a new building on the site that will bring the small house back to life "exactly the way it was," Pai said, "from the ground up."

The plan will "reuse character-defining elements" of the original home, City of Las Cruces Historic Preservation Specialist Troy Ainsworth, Ph.D., said.

Ainsworth said he recommended to Pai and Jason Clark of Studio D Architects in Las Cruces, who is working with Pai on the project, "the approach used in Venice, Italy, that is, to rebuild

'com'era, dov'era' ('as it was, where it was'). "They were immedi-

ately agreeable," Ain-

sworth said. "Hence, a reconstruction of the Mendoza House has become part of the overall site development," which includes the Mendoza House and office suites.

"The replica construction of the older block will retain and replicate the original footprint, width of the walls, door and window openings, parapet lines, height and even the partial foundation bumpout on the Court Avenue side," Ainsworth said.

"The seven vigas and the latillas (limbs or sticks used as ceiling material) were carefully removed, laid aside and returned as a non-structural ceiling treatment that, along with a clean, new application of exterior stucco, will maintain the visual character of that street corner as it has been for many decades," he said.

The conference "focuses on education and entertainment," said Director Robert Palacios. "Over 14,000 students of all ages have attended the annual four-day conference, with three days of educational workshops in mariachi music, voice and folkloric dance.

nual event support various programs under the New Mexico Advocates for the Arts that improve the quality of life and promote cultural arts education across southern New Mexico," Palacios continued.

was worth it financially, Moccia said the Aggies will generate as much as five times the revenue being a member of C-USA as they did as an independent in football.

"Just from a business standpoint, the entrance fee and exit fee pale in comparison to what is down the road financially," Moccia said. Moccia also said that

being a member of a conference will make it easier for the football program to recruit players and schedule games and NMSU will benefit from C-USA's ties to multiple bowl games.

The Aggies also will be a member of the same conference with UTEP for the first time in more than 60 years.

"I am really interested in seeing how our fans

react to that," Moccia said. "We have been playing UTEP every year in basketball twice, in football and more or less in every other sport annually. It is not like a team that is close that we haven't played before.

"Now if there is a conference championship on the line (between NMSU and UTEP), that will really ratchet up the experience for the fans," Moccia added.

Moccia said the Aggies' new conference will also benefit from having the school's other sports programs, including men's basketball, join it.

"We are excited and I think they are excited to have us," Moccia said. "We have pretty solid programs across the board. I know football is a big focus, but men's basketball, volleyball, baseball, softball (are quality programs). We have lots

of sports that have been championship quality, like golf. I think that will just help them across the board and we will be associated with Conference USA, with its tremendous teams across the board."

Arvizu also said the move to C-USA was a good fit and the conference and NMSU share the same commitment to academics, the wellbeing of their student athletes and strategic vision.

"I was persuaded that this is very much in line with the direction we want to head as a university," Arvizu said.

Conference realignment is a relatively fluid situation, but here is how C-USA will look in 2023 as of right now: NMSU, Jacksonville State, Sam Houston, Liberty, UTEP, Western Kentucky, Middle Tennessee, Florida International and Louisiana Tech.

NMSU icon Fabián García inducted into national ag hall of fame

After a two-year delay, Fabián García, a Mexican immigrant whose research at New Mexico State University helped influence agriculture nationwide, was inducted into the National Agricultural Center's Hall of Fame in Kansas Oct. 23, becoming the first Hispanic and first New Mexican inductee.

García (1871-1948), who was originally slated to be inducted into the hall of fame in fall 2019, joins the ranks of Thomas Jefferson, George Washington and Eli Whitney, among other notable contributors to agriculture. The first ceremony was postponed due to unforeseen circumstances, and the second ceremony was rescheduled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

New Mexico Secretary of Agriculture Jeff Witte nominated García for the distinction and attended the Oct. 23 ceremony, along with NMSU President John Floros and Rolando Flores Galarza. dean of the NMSU College

of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental

FABIAN GARCIA Sciences. "It is

honor to be present and witness the induction ceremony recognizing a true agriculture icon in Dr. Fabián García," Witte said during the ceremony. "His influence on agriculture and our cuisine continues today, over 100 years since his legacy began. Not only is he known for his agriculture legacy but for the impact he made as a humanitarian as well, a legacy made evident in the New Mexico State University dormitory that bears his name, which he funded to provide a home for those attending college. Today is a great day for all of New Mexico as we celebrate an icon that makes us proud."

García left behind a legacy that is still felt today. He was born in Chihuahua, Mexico and became an orphan early in his life. His grandmother moved with him to

the Mimbres Valley when García was only 2 years old. Once there, García's grandmother became a domestic worker, and she later found work with the Casad family in what is now known as Old Mesilla. The family provided García with a private tutor and later sent him to what was then known as Las Cruces College.

In 1894, García became a member of the first graduating class of New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanical Arts. now known as NMSU. He studied for another year at Cornell University but returned to Las Cruces to receive his additional degrees.

In 1907. García married Julieta Amador, a member of a prominent Mesilla Valley family. The couple had no surviving children, and Amador died in 1920. García never remarried, preferring the environment of his beloved university.

In 1914, García was named the first director of the state Agricultural Experiment Station as well as horticulturalist. His accomplishments include producing the first reliable chile pod, which was the beginnings of what is now the Sandia pepper popular among chile lovers. He also introduced the Grano onion breed and was instrumental in

planting some of the first pecan trees in the Mesilla Valley. Some of the 35 pecan tree varieties he helped plant still stand today.

García is also credited with developing modern irrigated agriculture in the state, and his horticulture publications included tests on pear, peach, grape and plum varieties, as well as trials of onion, spinach, melon and cauliflower varieties.

"It was an honor to see Fabián García get the recognition he deserves, at long last," Floros said. "He was a leader in helping to create a sustainable and reliable food supply not just for New Mexicans, but all over the world. He also changed the lives of his students for the better. He left a great legacy here at NMSU, and it's wonderful that he is finally receiving national acknowledgement from his peers."

García, who sometimes faced prejudice because of his Mexican heritage. was known for helping poor Mexican-American students, often providing them rooms while they attended school. After

his death, García left behind more than \$85,000 to fund a campus dormitory and scholarships for poor youths with Spanish names, because, "I want to help poor boys, for I know their hardships."

"This is a long overdue acknowledgment of the outstanding contributions to the food production by one Mexican immigrant that dedicated his life to New Mexico and U.S. agriculture," Flores said. "Without his valuable contributions. New Mexico, the U.S. and the world would have not had the advancement in plant production, and the many lives that he touched with his kindness and dedication would have not received that benefit. Fabián García is a true hero of the College of ACES, NMSU and New Mexico."

NMSU has named a 45acre research station after García, as well as NMSU's faculty-senate hall, its largest dormitory and a building that sits atop a hill between Corbett Center Student Union and Breland Hall.

Pai, who has invested personal savings in the project, said he has worked closely with Clark, Ainsworth, the city Historic Preservation Commission and other city staff on the project, which includes a zoning change.

"They really did an amazing job," Pai said.

"They all did the right things."

The new property will be "a window to history" for Las Cruces, he said, and "a gateway to Downtown."

Pai said construction could be done by the end of 2022. He said he hopes the project "sparks attention and respect to historical standards" for other local property owners.

Pai bought the property

as an investment and because of "a great interest in history," he said, especially the history of architecture. He and his family have visited sites in the United States, Peru, Guatemala and Mexico City.

Pai said he is particularly impressed by the work of architect Henry Trost (1860-1933), who designed many buildings in El Paso and Las Cruces.

Pai said he has also visited buildings Trost designed in Marfa. Texas.

A native of India, Pai worked for the state government in Santa Fe before moving to the East Coast to work as an engineer. He and his family moved to Las Cruces in October 2002.

His wife, Sangeeth Shanbhag Pai, is a Las Cruces doctor specializing in internal medicine.

How do you compare a Marine who stormed the beaches of Normandy on D-Day in

1944 to an airman who controlled air traffic at White Sands Missile Range yesterday?

There are probably dozens of answers to that question.

To my mind, though, those answers boil down to two:

1. You can't compare them at all. They're different eras, different missions, different situations in our world.

2. There is little distinction. Both people have answered the call of their nation and responded by doing their mission to the best of their ability.

I tend to lean toward No. 2. In many senses, when someone takes on a military assignment, their fate finds them.

If a military member draws a job that seems less "important" than another one, that's a perception issue.

As do most endeavors, a military mission has many aspects.

What may seem inconsequential on its face can have important consequences when placed in context.

Recognize the service, remember the debts

We recognize Veterans Day each Nov. 11, commemorating the original Armistice Day, which ended World War I (then known as the

Great War), on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918, more than 100 vears ago.

Military service changed in America in 1973, when Congress did not extend the draft, creating a volunteer force. Before that, luck had a bigger role in members' assignments. Today, volunteers have a voice in determining their branch of service, and what fields they want to pursue.

For generations, because of the draft, nearly all American

men served for at least a couple of years in the military.

Don't take this as a call to bring back the draft, but I think our nation has lost something with the loss of the shared experience of military service. The training taught skills, and provided a common ground of discipline, helping generate a sense of being part of something bigger.

That said, the all-volunteer military has worked far better than most people could have imagined nearly 50 years ago. The way the military has adopted technology, and the training required to use that technology, have given generations of men and women skills they can use in the civilian world long after their service has ended.

Our society puts a high value on big, bold acts of bravery. In the field of battle, those acts can turn the tide of war, which can change the fate of history.

The smaller, quieter acts of

military service can also turn the tide and change history.

We recognize the work of the Navajo code talkers in World War II, efforts that required focus and solitude over loud sudden movements. More overlooked is the work of the U.S. Coast Guard, the frequently forgotten fifth branch of military service.

Regardless of the nature of service, we Americans do a better job of appreciating our men and women in uniform than we once did.

One of the darkest periods in American history was the vile reception so many soldiers and sailors got when they came home from fighting in Vietnam. We've heard the tales of Marines being spat upon during parades, of airmen being booed and hissed.

Those responses are particularly galling when you recall the draft was in full swing dur-

State government needs better plan on how to spend federal funds

Worried that federal spending was getting out of control, Sen. **Everett Dirksen** warned in 1973 that, "a billion here, and a billion there, and pretty soon you're talk-

ing about real money." Dirksen's quote seems quaint these days, in light of new spending passed or proposed by Congress to combat and counteract the impacts of the pandemic.

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, passed under former President Donald Trump, had \$1.9 trillion in new federal spending. That was followed by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security, or CARES Act, passed under President

I'll leave it to economists to argue about impacts on inflation and the federal debt. But, there is no question that the new legislation has the potential to lift millions of Americans out of poverty. A study by the Center on Poverty and Social Policy at Columbia University estimated that the first bill alone would cut childhood poverty by more than half, from the current rate of 13.5 percent, all the way down to 5.7 percent.

New Mexico, which relies on federal support more than almost any other state, stands to benefit enormously from this new spending. And, it comes just as the state is trying to transition from an economy that is dependent on oil and gas revenue.

It is absolutely critical that our state has a solid plan in place to ensure this new funding is allocated in accordance with federal guidelines and reaches those who are most in need. A report issued recently by the state's Legislative Finance Committee argues that there is no such plan in place, and the state is failing to comply with federal

guidelines as a result.

to the federal government on Covid relief spending, the state failed to provide information in seven of the 11 required categories, according to the LFC. Those left blank included information on how the state would promote equitable outcomes, ensure fair labor practices or provide required performance data.

"While there are no apparent consequences for failed compliance, the public and the Legislature lack a clear plan from

the executive for the use In its first annual report of these funds and how the executive proposes to ensure accountability and transparency," the LFC report said.

There haven't been many tough decisions yet on how to spend the federal money. Almost all of the \$682.4 million in federal relief funds that the state has spent up to this point has gone to replenish the Unemployment Trust Fund and repay the federal government for loans made to the state to cover unemployment payments.

At the peak of the pandemic, nearly 200,000 workers in the state were receiving benefits. The trust fund has been depleted by nearly \$4 billion and needs to be made whole.

Spending decisions moving forward will become much more complicated.

Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham has argued that she has sole authority to spend all federal money without going through the legislative process. That is

ing Vietnam, and most of those military members had no choice but to be there. On top of that, draftees were disproportionately poor, and people of color, without the means to gain a deferment for college, or the ability to sway political protection.

During the first two world wars, the refrain was, "When Johnny comes marching home again, Hoo-rah!" The veterans of Vietnam were not hoo-rahed when they marched home. Korean vets were not as blatantly

reviled, but were in many cases quietly ignored. The military actions in Southeast Asia were hard for the general public to understand. Things were not as clear-cut as they were in World War II, when everyone knew about Pearl Harbor, and the atrocities of Hitler's Nazis.

Today we've come full

circle with our championing of our veterans, but they need our attention and support in different ways now.

In the last 20 years, more servicemen and women have died by suicide than in military actions. The suicides outnumber the battle casualties by more than 4 to 1.

It is right and just to praise and honor the service of our military members, especially around Veterans Day. We need to follow up that praise with understanding and actions to help and support them after their service.

In New Mexico, our veteran suicide rates are even higher than

the national average. If you know a veteran who could use assistance, keep these numbers handy for the state's Veteran Crisis Line. Call 800-273-8255 or text 838255.

For those who didn't serve, Veterans Day is one day a year. For those who did, it's 365 days a year.

Chihuahuan Desert park receives \$20K grant to improve access

The nonprofit Asombro Institute for Science Education (AISE) of Las Cruces was among 25 organizations around the state to receive a trail development grant from the Outdoor Recreation Division (ORD) of the New Mexico Economic Development Department.

The \$20,000 grant, announced Nov. 1, is for the institute's "Gateway to the Desert" project, which "will increase and improve the public's access to outdoor recreation and education opportunities at the Chihuahuan Desert Nature Park (CDNP)," ORD said in a news release. "The project will include an entry kiosk, new



parking area, new trail, interpretive signs along the trail, a restoration project, interactive photo monitoring sites, benches and fencing."

"We're honored to receive the Outdoor Recreation Division's Trails+ grant and to bring support for improved outdoor access to Doña Ana County," said AISE Executive Director Stephanie Bestelmeyer, Ph.D. "Everyone should have the opportunity to experience and learn about the wonders

of the Chihuahuan Desert. This project's new kiosk, map, signs and trail that links to our existing trail network at the CDNP will be especially helpful for people with less experience exploring the desert. We're also excited to use it with more than 1,000 local students hosted by AISE on field trips to

the site each year." The 935-acre CDNP is located at 56501 N. Jornada Road, about 15 miles west of Las Cruces.

ORD awarded \$506,736 in funds through its Trails+ grant program, the news release said. The grant funds conservationbased, shovel-ready projects that are open to the public and demonstrate a clear benefit to the community and visitors, ORD said. Eligible projects include trail systems, trailheads, signs, outdoor classrooms and river access. The grant requires a one-to-one match (inkind accepted) from other funding sources.

ORD said 64 percent of this year's awarded projects are located in rural counties.

In 2021, 60 organizations applied for Trails+ funding, with funding requests totaling \$1.2 million.

In 2020, six organizations received just over \$77,000 in grant funds.

County bar association restart benefits attorneys, the community

The Doña Ana County Bar Association (DACBA) is making a comeback.

After several years of inactivity, DACBA has begun regular monthly meetings for legal professionals throughout the county, said Robert Lara, an attorney associate with the Third Judicial District Court in Las Cruces who is also a member of the State Bar of New Mexico Board of Commissioners.

DACBA had 35 people at its August meeting in Las Cruces, Lara said. It was the first organized meeting of the local bar in several years, he said, as members elected officers and began discussing the services the association wants to provide to its members and to the community, he said.

The association includes attorneys practicing in both state and federal court and with agencies like the FBI and the IRS, as well as the district attorney's (DA) and public defender's (PD) offices.

DACBA helps to "develop collegiality within the local bar," Lara said, which makes for better

relationships among attorneys as they work to resolve civil and criminal issues in court, and it makes job changes easier if, for example, an attorney in private practice wants to join the DA's office or the PD's office or wants to move from one office to another.

Having an active local bar association also makes the area more attractive to attorneys from elsewhere who are considering moving their law practices to Las Cruces, he said. "We have such a need for attorneys here," Lara

said. The bar association also provides an organization that can advocate for attorneys and provide information to legislators, other elected officials and city, county and state officials.

And, DACBA will serve as a clearinghouse for continuing legal education for attorneys in southern New Mexico, Lara said. Monthly bar association meetings are already including continuing legal education (CLE) opportunities, he said, like a judge's presentation on motions and other procedures in district court.

The meetings also will give DACBA members the opportunity to learn about and become more involved with community service to benefit local nonprofits, Lara said.

And, perhaps most importantly, a revitalized DACBA can educate the public about the services attorneys offer, Lara said, addressing questions like what resources are available to resolve your legal problem and when do you need to hire an attorney?

For example, an attorney might be able to help a client resolve issues with a landlord by connecting the client with community programs that are "better suited to solve your issue than a lawsuit," Lara said.

That might include helping the client obtain Covid-19 relief funds or veterans benefits, or helping him or her find alternative housing.

Lawyers can also assist with an individual's financial and end-of-life planning or help a smallbusiness owner apply for a loan or set up a health insurance plan, he said. And they offer many other services as well, Lara said, including some that members of the public might not even be aware of.

"Lawyers are here to help solve problems," Lara said. "When you need help, there are options for you."

Lara estimated there are 350 to 400 attorneys working in Doña Ana County. Lara moved to the Las Cruces area in 2013. He lives with his wife in Santa Teresa.

Police to hire crossing-guard supervisor, more crossing guards

The Las Cruces Police Department (LCPD) is expected to hire a crossingguard supervisor and additional crossing guards in the next few months.

Crossing guards employed by LCPD help to ensure the safety of children crossing streets on their way to and from Las Cruces Public Schools elementaries.

The supervisor position, which has been vacant since April, closed Oct. 19. The City of Las Cruces Human Resources Department (HRD) was expected to begin interviews for the position in November, the city said.

A new supervisor could be in place by the begin-





RURAL EXTENSION FUNDS NOW AVAILABLE FROM CENTURYLINK

Rural New Mexico residential and small business customers located in developments of less than four units now have funds available to them through the **Rural Extension Fund (REF)** for Telephone Line Extensions. A Telephone Line Extension is necessary when CenturyLink (formerly Qwest) must construct new distribution cable in excess of 1,000 feet in order to supply primary telephone service at a street address where service was not previously available, and which would usually be charged to the customer.

When placing an order that includes Line Extension charges, eligible customers may receive a credit toward the construction of a line extension of up to \$25,000 per order. Charges in excess of the \$25,000 credit will be the responsibility of the customer placing the order.

Eligibility requirements are as follows:

Because we see so many fine people these days rearing problem children, I feel compelled to share my remaining wisdom on the subject even though I realize that to do so will put me in quite a vulnerable position. If I were really smart, I would wait until my family is grown and we move to another town before sharing these "pearls of wisdom." It would be less easy for people to point at me and show where I haven't succeeded. It's said, "Fools rush in where angels fear to tread." So here goes.

vou say. If you tell him to do something, see that he does it. Many parents ignore their children's offenses because they're too lazy to correct or punish. When the parent gets very annoyed by the child's behavior, the parent may get angry and punish too severely. I believe this is when much child abuse occurs.

Another valuable principle is to give your child responsibility. All of us learn best by doing. Completing a job and doing it well is a great character-builder. When my children were in high school and I was teaching school, when Saturday rolled around, each child had jobs to do. Each one

Be consistent with what was responsible for cleaning his or her room and taking turns cleaning the general areas — bathroom, living room, family room and Mom did the kitchen. (Dad was in his office finishing the church bulletin and sermon preparation.)

We who are trying to teach our children how to carry out jobs find it hard with all the modern conveniences to find something for them to do. With electricity, modern heating, cooling and numerous appliances available, there are not as many necessary tasks around the house.

Often, we parents would rather do the jobs ourselves than be bothered with helping children learn how to do them.

In fact, it takes twice as much effort on my part to get jobs done than to do them myself, after having to listen to the complaints and excuses from the particular child and checking several times to see if the job is being done. But I know that he is not doing me a favor to help me with the work. Instead, I am doing him a favor by teaching him how to work. When a mess is left by a child who is old enough, have him help clean it up for he needs to take responsibility for his actions.



Helping students complete their degree

The financial rewards of finishing college are well documented. Students who never graduate take on massive student loan debts that they can't repay while seeing nothing in return for all their effort. Students who complete a bachelor's degree earn a million more dollars over the course of their lifetimes than those who halt their education after high school. Those rewards benefit not just the students themselves, but their children, their families, and employers and businesses in their communities.

We have a college completion crisis in this country. While 86 percent of students graduated from high school in 2019, a proportion that has steadily risen for the last two decades, only a quarter of students entering public two-year colleges graduate within three years. New Mexico has improved our percentage of high school graduates who enter college, but only around

40 percent of

first-time freshmen who have enrolled in two or four-year colleges have completed their degree. Among Hispanic, Black, and other students of color, as well as those from lowincome families, graduation rates are even lower.

We need to do so much better than this. That's why I was proud to secure the establishment of a first-ofits-kind College Retention and Completion Grants program in the latest version of President Biden's Build Back Better Act that is advancing in Congress.



students, those from low-income families, and students of color—there are more obstacles to overcome between orientation day and graduation day.

We are closer than ever to helping students more easily afford a college education through tuition assistance and a major increase to the Pell Grant, one of the most important tools that helps many low and middle-income students pay for school expenses. But if we want to deliver on the full promise of higher education, we need to do more to help students complete their degrees.

The College Retention and Completion Grants would support a wide-range of evidence-based programs like the Student Experience Project, which is working with partner institutions like the University of New Mexico to create a more inclusive and equitable classroom environment in entry level courses and improve the support services provided to first and second-year students from underrepresented backgrounds. Another great example is New Mexico State University's oncampus food bank called the Aggie Cupboard, which has helped address growing food insecurity among its student community.

The College Retention and Completion Grants would also allow colleges and universities to scale up these types of direct student supports that students need such mental health services, child care, food, transportation, housing assistance, career coaching, and workbased learning opportunities. It would also help schools collect real-time data on student progress, create incentives to keep students on track, and improve their dual education, developmental education, and transfer pathways.

Colleges would also be able to implement twogeneration solutions that help parenting college students. We have not adapted well enough to the reality that more than one-in-five college students are also parents. If parents are able to find time to attend school, they have to fit their class schedule around their jobs and their child's school and child care hours. All of this limits parents' access to a full and rigorous class schedule. If colleges

can provide better support to parenting students and their children, then families will overcome barriers and achieve success together.

No student should have to drop out of college because their car breaks down and they can't afford to spend \$500 fixing it. No parent should have to choose between finding child care for their kids and continuing their own studies. And no student should devote two years to taking courses at a community college only to find out the public four-year school of their choice won't accept their credits.

If we can establish the College Retention and Completion Grants as part of the broader Build Back Better agenda, we can make sure students not only make sure students aren't just getting into college. We will make sure they are also getting through college.

Spaceport America is now home to four on-site tenants: Virgin Galactic, UP Aerospace, SpinLaunch and HAPSMobile/ AeroVironment, and has many other customers utilizing the facilities for the purpose of testing, research, and development of innovative new technologies.

AeroVironment, Inc. has recently expanded its footprint at Spaceport America bringing two new unmanned aircraft systems (UAS) projects to New Mexico for testing and training. Operations for JUMP 20 medium unmanned aircraft systems (MUAS) and tactical unmanned aircraft systems (TUAS) began out of the Spaceport's Vertical Launch

"We developed a great relationship with AeroVironment last year, which has now expanded with these two new UAS projects," said Scott McLaughlin, Executive Director of the New Mexico Spaceport Authority. "We appreciate their confidence in us and what we offer with our employees, our facilities, restricted airspace, remote location, and great weather for flight. Spaceport America's business continues to

grow and bring value to New Mexico."

With this new contract. AeroVironment is able to conduct engineering flight test operations for research and development, and validation and verification purposes. The AeroVironment team is also able to conduct customer training

and customer demonstrations at Spaceport America bringing international visitors to the region.

"Spaceport America is an ideal location for testing and training of the JUMP 20 and TUAS vehicles due to the abundant special use airspace and cooperative business arrangements that

exist between Spaceport America and AeroVironment," said Gorik Hossepian, AeroVironment vice president and product line general manager for MUAS.

AeroVironment is currently leasing temporary facilities from Spaceport America for short-term use but is looking to add permanent infrastructure at the Vertical Launch Area to support training and testing operations in 2022.

AeroVironment, Inc. is HAPSMobile's minority owner and aircraft development partner for the Sunglider, a solar-powered unmanned aircraft designed for stratospheric telecommunications platform systems. HAPSMobile Inc., has been developing and testing the 'Sunglider' at Spaceport America since June 2020. AeroVironment and partner Soft Bank invested over \$8 million in developing a hangar and an airstrip at Spaceport America in spring.

The Sopranos: Everything you need to know about managing people

atching reruns of The Sopranos is far more educational than many courses on supervisory management. The beauty of the *The Sopranos* is its full character development and story telling which made it one of the top-rated series of all time. If you are not familiar with The Sopra*nos*, you're probably under 25 years of age or have been sleeping under a rock since 1998. The Sopranos originally graced our living rooms on HBO from January 10, 1999, until January 10, 2007. It is usually on the top of most critics' best shows of all-time.

For the first time, the viewing audience observes firsthand much more than just a bunch of bad guys. There is Tony Soprano. As the show begins, he's trying to deal with a teenage daughter, a 13 year-old under-achieving son, a marriage on the rocks and a mother with the personality of a hungry barracuda. Meanwhile, he inherits the head management job of the Di Meo Mob Family and all its quirky staff. Through the angst of Tony Soprano, we observe firsthand the challenges of managing various personality types common in almost all organizations. As I describe some of the key characters, see

if you recognize any of these personalities in your organization.

Tony's Management Style

When all else failed, Tony was able to handle errant staff by having them "whacked" i.e. killed off.) No such harsh resolution is recommended here. However, problems left without being properly managed will not go away. As we go through some of the members of Tony's team, it's easy to understand why Tony is having panic attacks, seeing a "shrink," and taking Prozac. In many ways, Tony Soprano is every manager dealing with staffing issues and characters seen in many organizations. Let's see how many you recognize in your own organization.

Uncle Junior - (The Junior Dilemma)

Uncle Junior has been with the organization for a very long time. Tony readily admits that in many ways Junior was like a father to him, but time has passed Uncle Junior by. He expects to be respected because he has been around so long. Unfortunately, he hasn't changed with the times. Many of the recent things he has done have created major problems for the DiMeo Family. He is critical of Tony behind his back. He speaks out against Tony and has even tried to have Tony whacked. He is negative, stirs up controversy, and is a source of constant strife. He is always contrary and a major source of conflict. Yet, because of his longstanding membership in the organization, he expects to be respected.

Uncle Junior likes to gossip and makes fun of Tony and the decisions he makes. He is more concerned with having the honor of the big job than doing the actual work. He is resentful. Yet, because he has been around the organization so long and is the figurehead, people continue to ask him for advice. Depending on his mood, he will give appropriate advice, harmful advice or steer people in the wrong direction. Does anyone have or know an Uncle Junior hiding in their organization? If you do, he or she can be exceptionally dangerous and make it difficult to keep your team together. In almost every job I had or organization I observed, an Uncle Junior

is there to create strife within the organization. Of course, the Uncle Juniors of the world believe they are too important to the organization to ever be disciplined. If you try to warn them, they are likely to step up their criticism. The issue needs to be tackled head-on with consequences clearly laid out.

Christopher Moltisanti -(Christopher Syndrome)

Christopher, oh Christoper! Tony had so much hope for you!! Christopher Molisanti is a young, good looking, semi-charismatic, low-ranking member of the Di Meo Family. He's usually charming, and he is an expert at kissing up to Tony when he is around. Behind his back, it's another story. Christopher is so impatient and volatile, one never knows what he is going to say or do. He thinks he knows all the answers and belongs higher up in the organizational structure. Oftentimes, Tony has told Christopher that he is going places and tries to mentor him. Currently at a very low level, Christoper is confident he can move up the ladder without doing much work. Behind Tony's back, Christopher is lazy and impulsive. He is a hard-core drug addict. He can be aggressive and impulsive to prove that he's a big shot. If Tony only knew half the stuff that Christopher has done....

Rather than concentrating on the DiMeo Family business, Christopher is usually trying to do side deals to make some extra income behind Tony's back and position himself as more capable than his supervisors. Of course, Tony gives him so many chances because Christopher is truly a likable guy and Tony really wants him to succeed. Tony catches Christopher screwing off and screwing up time and time again; but Tony tends to go easier on Christopher than he would on others with similar infractions. Christopher realizes he usually gets off easy and takes full advantage of the situation Christopher is a whiner and every time he is caught, he whines and begs for forgiveness. Usually, Tony relents. Bottom line, Christopher feels empowered. He doesn't need to perform because Tony will always have his back. As the series evolves, Tony eventually realizes he's being used and the Christopher problem has to go away. We've all supervised

We've all supervised employees who are smart and likable and, at first, we see a potential shining star. We then begin to realize there are problems. Project deadlines aren't met, there is repeated tardiness, things go over budget. We reprimand them. yet we cut the employee more slack than we should as we still think they have potential to move on to bigger and better things. Ultimately, we need to come down hard on them and, because they are not used to it, they become resentful and even vindictive.

Christopher's Syndrome reigns throughout many organizations. These people may have high aspirations, but they are too lazy or do not have the drive to move up the ladder the right way. They usually stick around the organization at the lower level even though with a little effort they could be a star employee.

Paulie Gaultieri - (Paulie Walnuts)

Paulie Walnuts is almost a Christopher in reverse. Paulie is deeply loyal. He will do whatever is asked of him. He is a dedicated worker and will work hard (not smart) to get the job done. If Paulie seems like the real thing that's because he is. (As an aside, the actor playing Paulie is the only one of the entire cast, who actually served time in the big house. He originally tried out for the Uncle Junior role, but when that role went to Dominic Chianese, he agreed to the Paulie Walnuts role with the understanding that Paulie would never snitch to the Feds.)

In today's technologydriven environment, nonprofits rely on data to drive everything from fundraising campaigns to policy decisions. That's why technology plays such an important role in an organization's mission. With technologyfocused grants, a nonprofit can build or improve upon an existing technological infrastructure.

Requirements for this new funding opportunity include: organizations must be recognized by the IRS as tax-exempt under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) and must be located in and directly serving the communities of Dona Ana, Grant, Hidalgo, Luna, Otero, and Sierra Counties. All grant applications

must be completed using the online application form on the United Way of Southwest New Mexico website. Highest priority will be given to proposals that clearly articulate the planned impact of their efforts, as well as the metrics by which the impact is measured. United Way will not consider incomplete proposals, emailed proposals or paper-based applications.

Eligible expenses may include computer equipment, internet access expenses, printer supplies, software subscriptions, etc. needed to successfully provide services to your organization's clientele. Documentation for the estimate of technology expenses must be uploaded in the application to be considered.

"As technology continues to impact every aspect of our lives, there's a real danger of more people getting left behind. We cannot allow that to happen." stated Amanda Morales, Chief Executive Officer. "By providing this funding opportunity, United Way of Southwest New Mexico is assisting to break down the digital divide that can prevent so many from accessing the basic needs, education and financial stability they need to live a quality life." Morales continued.

One example of how United Way of Southwest New Mexico has helped to bridge the education divide and provide response to the COVID-19 pandemic occurred in October 2020. United Way of SWNM donated 108 document cameras to the Cobre Consolidated School District to support remote teaching and learning. The document cameras allowed teachers to project their textbook page or worksheet right on to the computer screen for students who were at home for remote learning. This made teaching much easier as educators didn't have to put their worksheet up to the web camera which provided challenges as it was difficult for students to read the documents.

The 2021 Technology fund will contribute to the United Way of Southwest New Mexico's goal of helping bridge needs with resources and solutions specifically related to, basic needs, education, and financial stability.

movie review 'Close Encounters of the Third Kind' still exist in Steven Spielberg's sci-fi classic

Even if it didn't contain five of the most famous music notes in movie history, "Close Encounters of the Third Kind" would be one of the most memorable science-fiction movies yet made.

Showtime presents the "Director's Cut" of the 1977 blockbuster Thursday, Nov. 18, and Friday, Nov. 19 – and if ever a filmmaker earned such a revisiting of his work, it's Steven Spielberg, whose name was as much a selling point for the picture as anything after his monstrous success with "Jaws." Audiences were eager to see what he would come up with next, and in a hallmark of his work, he imbued the story he wrote about alien-spacecraft sightings on Earth with a humanity that has been a trademark of his career.

Spielberg reunited with two of his "Jaws" collaborators – star Richard Dreyfuss and composer John Williams – to tell the story of several people whose lives are changed, understandably, by unusual experiences eventually traced to the presence of extraterrestrials in our orbit. Melinda Dillon plays a mother distraught when her young son (Cary Guffey) vanishes in the wake of an at-home light show stunning enough to



beat anything ever put forth on a stage, but much of the plot centers on the utility-company worker portrayed by Dreyfuss.

After the truck that he's in shakes, rattles and almost rolls during a bizarre outage of all power sources in his area, he becomes obsessed with visions of an enormous mountain, making models of it ... even one out of mashed potatoes at the family dinner table. He starts to wonder if he's going crazy, but a team of scientists (including one played by iconic French moviemaker Francois Truffaut) also is getting signals about possible UFOs. NMSU Jumpstart Jazz Festival features workshops, live performances

The Jumpstart Jazz Festival will be presented live and in person Friday and Saturday, Nov. 12-13 at the NMSU Music Building, 1075 N. Horseshoe St., on campus.

The event will include performances as well as workshops conducted for area middle- and highschool students from Las Cruces, El Paso, Alamogordo and other local communities, said Jacob Dalager, DMA (doctor of musical arts), who is the event's principal organizer.

The public is invited to attend workshops and performances at no charge, Dalager said.

Dalager said the festival's name includes "jumpstart" because its

goal, in part, is to reignite the interest and enthusiasm of music students as the marching-band season winds down. The festival was started by retired NMSU trumpet professor Pancho Romero, who will participate in this year's event, Dalager said.



The NMSU Jazz Ensemble, plus local and nationally known stars, will perform at the Jumpstart Jazz Festival.

Clinicians and performers will include:

• Legendary trumpet player Bobby Shew, 80, a native of Albuquerque, will participate virtually. Shew has played trumpet with Tommy Dorsey, Woody Herman and Buddy Rich, among others. Shew began his professional career in 1960. His album "Outstanding In His Field" was nominated for a 1980 Grammy award. Shew has done studio work on many popular television.

· Award-winning saxophonist and composer Owen Broder of New York City, who performs with Anat Cohen and Cowboys & Frenchmen. Broder will conduct guest clinics and master classes and perform with the NMSU Jazz Ensemble during the festival. Dalager and Broder attended East-

Daughtrey will sing "A Day in the Life of a Fool," by Luis Bonfa, in Portuguese, Dalager said. Shearer will perform "St. James Infirmary."

Dalager is the trumpet and jazz professor in the NMSU Music Department. A native of Minnesota, he came to Las Cruces from Maryland to begin teaching at NMSU this fall.

Local author publishes new book in 'David Elliott' mystery series

"Pack of Scoundrels" is Las Cruces author Bailey Herrington's latest in his David Elliott mystery series. It was published in late October.

The book is set in 1954, as Elliott travels to Las Cruces for a job assignment and to stay close to the love of his life. While in Las Cruces, he stays with the Lopez family; father and husband, Tony Lopez, works on V-2 rockets at White Sands Proving Ground.

Lopez is mysteriously killed in a one-car accident with a classified government document found nearby.

Those responsible for Lopez's death pose a

threat to his family and to national security. Elliott discovers that

were held at a Nazi death camp during World War II. Two of Tony's friends

are murdered, with one passing on an important message to Elliott before he dies.

Then, Elliott's girlfriend is kidnapped. Thanks to his investigation, state and national law enforcement begin a wideranging search for former Nazis and other powerful

and dangerous criminals. Herrington is a native of Pittsburg, Pennsylvania.

He completed studies at Lutheran Theological Seminary in Gettysburg and served congregations in Pennsylvania and West Virginia for 24 years.

"Pack of Scoundrels" is the third David Elliott mystery, following "What the Barber Knew" and "Dead to Rights." A fourth book in the series. "The Girl in the Orange Maillot," will be published in February 2022.

Las Cruces journalist documents travels across USA with book

"It's been quite a journey," writer-photographer Manfred Schreyer of Las Cruces said about his nearly 10 months of travels across the United States as part of his Experience America project that has produced a coffee-table book and will produce a movie.

Schreyer's travels began in January and ended in October, with Schreyer traveling 19,000 miles through 48 states to talk to people and visit towns and cities across America.

Schreyer conducted hundreds of interviews during his travels and shot hundreds of hours of video for the movie he has been planning since he

came up with the idea for the project.

What has also emerged is a book, "The American Experience," with 64 pages of photos divided into people, places and circumstances.

"It's a time capsule of 2021," Schreyer said. "This is who we are."

The book's cover photo shows homeless people in Denver with a handlettered sign that reads, "Need weed, cash, food and beer." An inside photo shows a Mexican girl peering through the wall built along the U.S.-Mexico border in west Texas near El Paso.

Another photo is titled "I Can't Breathe." "An Era" includes photos with Trump signs taken in Texas and South Dakota. "Small But Mighty" is about Piccinini Brothers butcher shop, which has survived in Hell's Kitchen in Manhattan for more than a century.

Another photo, "We Are a Generation," shows


people over age 65 in Dallas. "Plug Me In" highlights electric vehicles in Chicago. "Rest in Peace" is from a Hugo, Oklahoma cemetery for circus performers. "Separate But Equal" is from an abandoned African-American hospital in Kansas City. There are photos of abandoned towns like Africatown in Alabama and Thurmund, West Virginia. "In the Money" shows college athletes in Dallas.

Other photos are titled "Faith vs. Truth" (photo taken in Topeka, Kansas), "Together" (Chicago), "Hope" (Taos), "It Will Get Better" (Las Cruces), "Just Me" and "The Wealth of Our Nation" (New York City), "When We Were Young" (California coast) and "There Is a Pill for That" (New Orleans).

Schreyer has included historical facts and current statistics with the photos, touching on subjects that include the isolation caused by the pandemic, property foreclosures, human and civil rights, religion, poverty and homelessness, disabilities, pets, small business, aging, garbage and drug use.

There are no political opinions expressed in the book and Schreyer doesn't interpret what each photo shows; that is left up to the viewer.

"It was a healthy experience," Schreyer said. "It



Schreyer is now busy editing his film, which he hopes will be completed in early 2022.

Schreyer's book can be pre-ordered at www.mirageartphotography.com. He will sign the first 250 copies sold. The cost of the book is \$27, Schreyer said, but anyone who preorders before Dec. 10 will receive a 25 percent discount, he said, making the price \$20.25.

Schreyer will have a book signing 10 a.m. to noon Saturday, Dec. 11, at COAS Books, 317 N. Main St. Downtown.

Schreyer retrofitted a 15-passanger van for his travels, complete with bed, computer workspace, electricity, refrigeratorfreezer and even a portable flush toilet.

A native of Germany, Schreyer was a highschool exchange student to the U.S. in 1975-76 and immigrated here in 1984. He moved to Las Cruces from Ohio more than four years ago.

A freelance photojournalist and web designer — he's the owner of Mirage Art Photography

- Schreyer has visited 46 countries around the world and has worked in many of its major cities.



Concert association to have final concert after 7 decades

After its March 2022 concert, the Las Cruces **Civic Concert Association** (LCCCA) will close its doors forever.

After 77 years of providing concerts featuring "world-class musicians at a really affordable price," LCCCA President Lucretia Jones said the nonprofit will cease operation next year. The competition from other entertainment sources and the constant need for fundraising caused the LCCCA board to decide it was time to call it quits, she said.

Jones said the board had decided to close down this year, but was able to schedule two more concerts, one this September and one next March, because of a generous donation from the estate of Eugenia L. Staszewski (1916-2020).

It was "a huge honor to be included in her estate bequest," Jones said.

Jones has been a member of the LCCCA board for 10 years. She said the board's senior member is Fredrecia Olhausen-Finkner, who is 97. She began selling LCCCA tickets in 1958, Olhausen-Finkner said, and has been a board member for many years.

The Sept. 21 concert featured pianist Ilya Yakushev and cellist Thomas Mesa. LCCCA's final concert will be a salute to Glen Campbell with Jeff

Davton. It will be held at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, March 22, 2022, at Rio Grande Theatre, 211 N. Main St. Downtown. Tickets are \$25.

Dayton led the Jeff Dayton Band 1984-2000 and was Campbell's longtime musical director.

Throughout its history, beginning in 1944, LCCCA produced an average of three to four concerts a year, Jones said.

Obscura and Glenn Cutter galleries in Las Cruces. His hand-pulled prints were featured at Iris and Shriek in Amsterdam in 2018, along with works by Miró, Chagall and Picasso. He also participated in the premiere exhibit of the Hiatus collective in London in September 2019.

Van der Aa said his painted collages "are a way of re-imagining landscape painting."

"Traditional landscape is a static snapshot which freezes a scene," he said. "Even as a kid drawing in the back seat, I noticed that clouds moved, light moved and ebbed and flowed. When I began to sketch and paint outdoors,

wind blew my canvas board and bugs flew into the paint. Not only that, I moved and my mood changed as well. Images flowed into each other, and I wanted to find a way to express that.

"The variations are almost musical in nature," van der Aa said. "I state a theme and then expand on it thoughtfully and immediately. These works are quirky, moody and self-contradictory. I enjoy them greatly."



We received this message from a second-grade teacher: "I can see Jayden struggling. I'm anxious to get a Reading Buddy for her."

We need to get to children like Jayden. Parents, teachers and CRA volunteers are frustrated and anxious to get back to work but we face more obstacles with fewer financial resources.

night."

Children learn so much from listening to stories and being read to every day yet many of your neighbors don't know how to give their children positive reading experiences.

Elisa, a home-based childcare provider who took First Teacher/ Primer Maestro Literacy Training: "I didn't realize how important it is to read to children when they are very young. Now, I turn off the cartoon. I read books and set up learning stations. It never occurred to me that I could create a learning environment in my home. Please continue to offer more workshops." Sofia said, "We are com-

sona said, we are coming together as a family. Nobody is bored anymore. Even my ex-husband is more involved in what he calls 'quality time' with his kids.''' Lucy attended Talking Stories/Cuentos que hablan programs with her children, saying, "We are learning Spanish as a family because the books are bilingual."

Abuelo Gabe cares for his grandkids. "I feel like I have been shaken awake. I'm seeing my role change. I'm listening and talking more. It's amazing what you find out about your kids. They are smarter than you think!"

Many Las Crucens keep this work alive with donations and volunteer hours.

Open enrollment for state health insurance exchange lasts till January

BeWellnm began the open enrollment period for 2022 on Nov. 1, the New Mexico health insurance exchange said in a news release.

Open enrollment continues through Jan. 15, 2022. For those who enroll by Dec. 23, coverage will begin Jan. 1, 2022. Those who enroll by Jan. 15, 2022 will have coverage beginning Feb. 1.

With enrollment, thousands of New Mexicans



are eligible to receive health insurance at little or no cost, the news release said. The open enrollment period also marks the transition from a federal marketplace (healthcare.gov) to a statebased exchange.

"BeWellnm now provides New Mexicans with a local solution to help them find a health plan that best fits their needs," said beWellnm CEO Jeffery Bustamante. "We will be able to set our own enrollment dates, provide the most comprehensive and affordable plans available and create a more intuitive enrollment experience."

BeWellnm is offering dozens of plan options across multiple carriers, including dental insurance.

Free local enrollment assistance and financial

assistance continue to be available so New Mexicans can select a plan to fit their health and budget for 2022.

All plans will continue to cover the 10 essential benefits such as doctor visits, hospital stays, maternity care, emergency room care, prescriptions and more, beWellnm said. Federal law and regulations provide protections against preexisting condition exclusions in health insurance coverage.

Health plans must

permit New Mexicans to enroll regardless of health status, age, gender or other factors that may predict the use of health services.

"Health insurance purchased through beWellnm during the open enrollment period will allow for steep discounts and may completely eliminate premiums for low-income individuals and families," said beWellnm Director of Communication and Outreach Maureen Manring. The New Mexico health insurance companies participating in the beWellnm state-based marketplace include Ambetter from Western Sky Community Care, Blue Cross Blue Shield of New Mexico, Friday Health Plans, Molina Healthcare, Presbyterian Health Plan and True Health New Mexico.

Cannabis legalization allows you to grow your own and DIY

Let's take a little walk back in time to 2007 when the NM Medical Cannabis Program

was estab-

lished. At

that time, there were few licensed growers or dispensaries. The few dispensaries that existed mostly had flower for smoking. The program was not prepared for the needs of non-smoking patients. It took years of constant pressure to get the dispensaries to carry medicinal edibles and when they did, it was mostly hard candy and cookies. Years later, the patients were able to get tinctures, capsules and gummies. There has always been a lack of healthy, quality medical edibles. The dispensaries are now carrying more edibles but the health ingredient quality is still lacking.

Case in point: Diabetic and cancer patients cannot and do not want to eat sugar especially high fructose corn syrup. It is found in most gummies, hard candy, syrup and cookies. I think we can all agree

that sugar is not medicine. of life. Truth be known, It is the culprit in many health issues.

When I was in college back in 1974-1978, I volunteered to teach friends and family how to make their own edibles and tinctures. We started with canna butter; this could be added to any and all breads, cookies, etc. There was no hospice back then, but plenty of cancer patients suffering from the side effects of the chemotherapy who wanted relief from the side effects. My goal was then and has always been to ease the suffering and increase the quality

So that was 40-plus years ago, and here we are now, New Mexico is about to launch legalization and recreational use come April 1, 2022. You may have heard, that as of July 1, 2021, any 18-year-old New Mexican resident can now grow up to 12 plants for personal

use (six flowering and six in vegetative state). It is no longer necessary to have a NM medical card to grow your own.

It has been my experience that growing for personal use is not only rewarding and therapeutic but less expensive. Since 2007, I have taught hundreds of medical patients how to grow and how to make their own medicines. If you can cook, with a bit of guidance and a Magical Butter Machine, you can DIY.

There is more interest in the DIY approach now than ever. If you want to learn how to grow your own and create do-itvourself remedies, email me for an appointment. For years, I taught classes but since Covid, I am only doing private consults and private lessons.

NOTE: Starting Nov. 15 to Dec. 20, we will have **Magical Butter Machines** on sale.

By the way, you do not have to grow your own to make your own remedies.

At this time, if you are a NM medical cannabis patient, you can purchase flower at the dispensaries and make your own medicines.

In April, recreational dispensaries will be open and you will be able to purchase flower to DIY. You can do it.



Information overload can challenge golfers during pressure moments

There are times when we all get on mental "overload," even in our weekly little games at our private little clubs with our regular little friends. We aren't playing in

the U.S. Open but Golf Doctor we still can't seem to keep track of everything we need to do. It all has to do with "information processing," specifically how we do it and how well we do it.

Think of your brain as a

computer capable of processing and packaging huge amounts of data, sensory inputs and experiences — information — CHARLIE BLANCHARD

for potential use by you in numerable activities. For early hominids.

processing information correctly meant survival. For the world's top golfers, it may mean victory in a major, and possibly life-changing. But as for you and I becoming better at processing information, it may simply make us harder for our rivals to beat.

Next time you're out on the golf course, try noticing the myriad inputs to your brain. You have people talking, wind blowing, clubs rattling, dogs barking, muscles tensing, feet hurting, bugs biting, distance numbers in your laser, money to change hands, putts to line up, grass grain to figure, thoughts to control, emotions going up and down,

even cell phones going off. Fortunately, our relatively large brains are "hard wired" to filter, organize, prioritize and utilize the internal and external signals so that information processing for everyday chores will be routine, even mindless.

It's when the demands of newness and situations involving pressure arise that we become especially challenged. Tour pros are lost in their method and just focus on target.

University of Michigan

psychology professor Richard Nesbitt has made a lifetime study of cultural differences in how people process information. His research has shown, for instance, that Asians tend to notice the entirety of a visual scene, whereas Caucasians mostly focus on a single object. Variations exist, such as holistic vs. analytic; emphasis on collectivistic vs. individualistic. It's not that one style is

better, Nesbitt says, but that there is such a vari-

ance in such fundamental human characteristic as sensory interpretation is amazing. We suspect there is also a huge range of tendencies and idiosvncratic styles of brainwork among individuals within the same cultural milieu. On the golf course, you and I will attend to different stimuli and certainly interpret the same things differently. There is really not one absolute best or right way.

Still, when it comes to finding ways to enhance your peak performance, there are some strategies you can use. Our first strategy concerns reducing the internal information you have to process by putting a check on your inner dialogue, so you don't confuse yourself and talk yourself out of playing well. The idea is encapsulated in the classic book "They Played With A Quiet Mind" by Dr. Charles Kemp. "The most effective attitude for winning golf," Kemp explains, "is a 'quiet mind' ... (and) a freedom from tension

and pressure, and a sense of calm and serenity." Kemp adds, "It is what golfers say to themselves that determines how they feel and how they play."

Of course, complicating the whole matter is the business of having to process more than one or two inputs - sensory, cognitive, visual or otherwise — at the same time. Most of the available stimuli are either ignored by our brains, or dealt with on auto-pilot, meaning we don't have to think too much about them.

That's good news for us and bad news for advertisers, who want to get our attention at every moment. As golfers, we're wise to limit those stimuli to the fewest possible ones that are significant to our performance.

For instance, you might have seen Tiger Woods cupping his hands around his hat brim as he reads a putt; he is simply blocking out extraneous visuals that may be an interference. More than one swing thought is interference. Too much conversation can be interference and difficult to process, especially when you're trying to focus.

Even Lee Trevino stopped jawing when it came time to swing.
