Patented maple tree glows with NMSU pride

Rolston St. Hilaire must have known he was destined for a place in New Mexico State University history.

The maple tree St. Hilaire began developing at New Mexico State University in the late 1990s is both resilient and resplendent — and its leaves turn a brilliant (Aggie) crimson in the fall.

“It’s a great tree,” said St. Hilaire, a drought physiologist, regents professor and head of both the Extension Plant Sciences and Plant and Environmental Sciences departments in the NMSU College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences.

“I am very optimistic it’s going to be a very good product,” he said.

Through a licensing and marketing agreement developed by NMSU’s Arrowhead Center with J. Frank Schmidt & Son Co., a wholesale grower in Boring, Oregon, the tree is sold in 20 U.S. states and two Canadian provinces. It’s also being tested in China, and St. Hilaire is hopeful it will one day be commercially available worldwide.

St. Hilaire began studying maple trees while exploring projects for

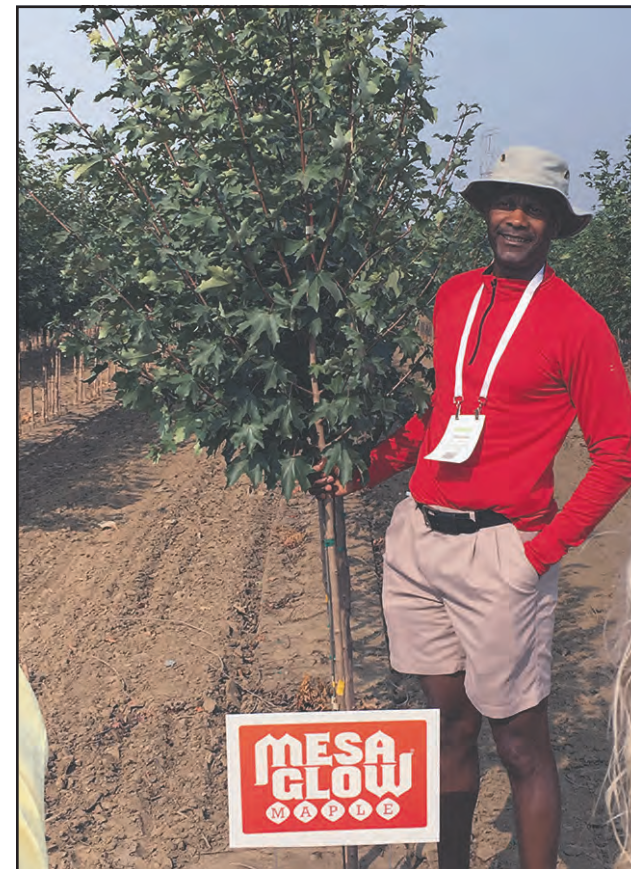

his doctoral research at Iowa State University. He wanted to duplicate the rich autumn colors that some maple varieties show on the East Coast in trees that would thrive in more arid climates in the West and Southwest.

After St. Hilaire moved to NMSU in 1998, he and his students spent the next 15 years gathering maple seeds from throughout the Southwest and growing trees at NMSU “under the worst possible conditions,” he said, to propagate a maple designed for “stressful, managed environments”

for homeowners and professional landscapers

In 2007, NMSU became the first institution to develop a micropropagation method (cloning plants in a laboratory setting) that made it easier to grow the bigtooth maple variety for commercial production, which, in turn, made it easier to micropropagate maple trees in general.

The tree St. Hilaire eventually patented in 2017 has deep crimson fall foliage, is drought tolerant and cold resistant. It also has the uniquely shaped

Johana Bencomo becomes director of Future President Project

Las Cruces City Councilor Johana Bencomo has begun a new job with the national Women's Democracy Lab (WDL). Bencomo became program director of WDL's Future President Project (FPP) in early December.

The "intentionally" part-time job will allow Bencomo to focus even more on her role as a city council member, she said. Bencomo was elected to a four-year term on the council in 2019.

Bencomo said her new job will involve some travel but can mostly be done remotely as she continues to live full-time in Las Cruces. Bencomo was with New Mexico CAFé (Communities in Action & Faith, Comunidades en Accion y de Fe), a Las Cruces-based nonprofit that works to shape public policy, for eight years before accepting the job with WDL. At CAFé, she served as an intern, then as a full-time organizer and the last two years as executive director.

Bencomo said WDL was started in 2020 "by three really powerful women" who have been training women in political strategy — how to run for and win elected office. Founders Anthea Chino, Sayu Bhojwani and Muthoni Wambu Kraal identified a gap in post-election support for women who win, Bencomo said, especially indigenous women and women of color, and that's why they started WDL.

Bencomo is part of the nonprofit's first-ever FPP cohort, which includes "fierce elected leaders

from across the country," she said on Facebook. Bencomo is among mayors, city councilors

and state representatives in that group who are committed to creating a safe space for women to discuss and overcome the unique challenges and barriers they face during elected service, including the desire to seek higher office, she said.

Electing the first woman U.S. president is a major goal for FPP.

"We are going to support women so they can achieve their highest aspirations for their personal and professional lives," Bencomo said. "For me, it's about opening doors and leaving them open so that more women that are coming after us have better and easier access."

Women, especially women of color, face unique challenges in elected public service, including "a lot of expectations ... that men just don't have," Bencomo said, like raising families and taking care of homes. Some must find a balance between being full-time mothers and transformational leaders.

As an example, she said, women have been "significantly impacted" because of the pandemic, with many forced to leave their jobs because of a lack of childcare and family-friendly business policies.

WDL provides "a safe space and a community of women who are going

through the same thing," Bencomo said, including self-doubts that some may be experiencing about being worthy to serve.

"Women of color in elected office are really hungry for a space where they can feel supported and lifted up and seen," she said.

"It's not just about policy," Bencomo said. "We're battling a lot of micro-aggressions, outright discrimination. On top of all of that, we're also navigating a lot of our own internal dealings."

One of WDL's biggest benefits, Bencomo said, is that it is a "huge network of women across the country wanting to support you and wanting to see you succeed."

For the first time in city history, the six members of the Las Cruces City Council, joining Mayor Ken Miyagishima, are all women, as new Councilors Becki Graham and Becky Corran joined Bencomo, Yvonne Flores, Tessa Abeyta-Stuve and Mayor Pro Tempore Kasandra Gandara in January. Graham and Corran were elected in Novem-

ber to succeed Gabriel Vasquez and Gill Sorg, neither of whom sought re-election in November. Flores was re-elected to a second term in 2021. Gandara was first elected in 2015 and re-elected in 2019. Abeyta-Stuve

was first elected in 2019. Miyagishima continues into his 15th year as Las Cruces mayor, an office no woman has ever held. "There have been all-male governing bodies for decades and decades and no one has ever batted an eye about it," Bencomo said. Women, she said "have systematically been left out" of political office and corporate leadership. "Women are saying, 'Absolutely, we belong. We have great ideas. We want to serve our communities.' Communities are responding to that in a very positive manner," she said.

Bencomo was born in Colonia Aldama, a small town in the state of Chihuahua, Mexico, according to her City of Las Cruces biography. She migrated

to the United States with her family when she was 8 years old and has lived in Las Cruces since age 18, when she moved here to attend New Mexico State University. At NMSU, Bencomo earned a bachelor's in government and a master's in social work.

WDL's Chino is a political strategist, fundraiser and operative from Acoma Pueblo, located in Cibola County, about 60 miles west of Albuquerque. Author Bhojwani was born in India and raised in Belize and served as New York City's first commissioner of immigrant affairs. Kraal is a political strategist and organizer who served as national political and organizing director for the Democratic National Committee and lives in Washington, D.C.

How Las Cruces Utilities Calculates Wastewater Service

Maybe you've been curious but didn't know how to ask: how does Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) calculate your accounts' wastewater service charge? This is the perfect time to ask because what you pay is calculated from information that LCU receives from your account during December, January, and February – and if your account has an undiscovered leak now, it could affect your charge for the rest of the year.

“It's the Winter Quarter Average that calculates the wastewater average for the rest of the year,” said LCU Billing & Receivables Supervisor Steven Valdez. That average comes from 90 percent of those three months' billed for water use of the account.

This calculation is

an industry-standard that considers an assumed lower, outdoor irrigation use during December, January, and February where billed water is from your kitchen, clothes washing machine and your bathrooms that drain to the wastewater system.

Sometimes LCU customer service representatives will encounter a customer who has called in to ask about a higher than average bill. The representative will be able to determine if the winter quarter average from the past year had increased. There may have been a leak – maybe an irrigation line that ran underground and unnoticed during the winter that resulted in an increase to the charge for sewer.

Winter is a good time to double-check

How are your sewage rates calculated? It's 90 percent of the billed water amount from December, January, and February, and it sets your service charge for the rest of the year.

outdoor and indoor faucets – along with toilets - for any drips that may affect your wastewater service charge.

Other times, the leak detection system will provide alerts to the staff monitoring the system, like LCU Management Analyst James Stafford. “Our system lets me know about higher than usual water usage, and I will reach out to customers directly,” said Stafford. He

suggested that customers can sign up for LCU's UtilityHawk system at <http://LCUutilityHawk.com/> to monitor their water usage.

Note: If Las Cruces Utilities is not your water provider, but you are a customer for wastewater services, a default route average is applied. For those customers, LCU encourages them to review their bills from their water provider and determine if their sewer charge should be adjusted in the LCU billing. To update your wastewater charge, please bring in a copy of your water bill from your water provider and LCU can change the wastewater service charge based on your actual water usage.

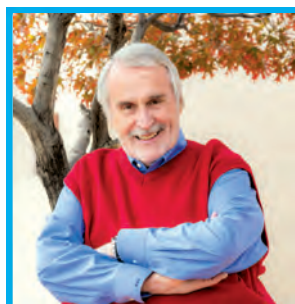

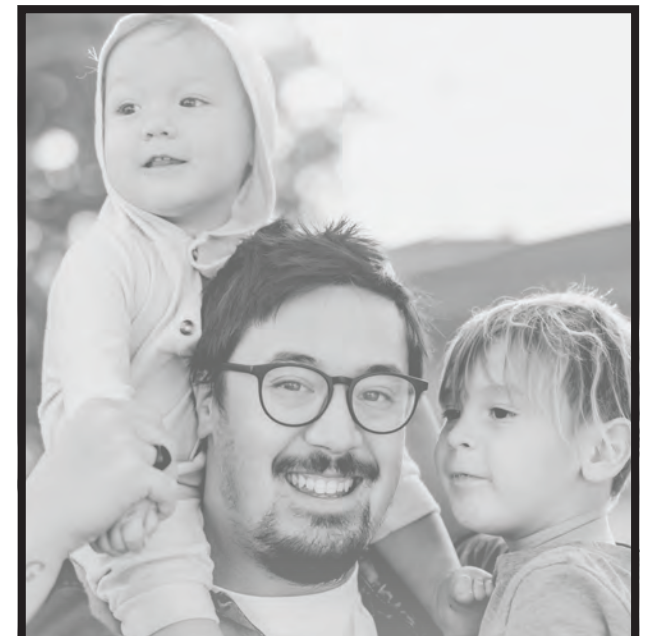

The Year of the Woman in Land of Enchantment

The year 2022 could very well be the Year of the Woman in New Mexico, particularly here in Doña Ana County.

If you read the Las Cruces Bulletin regularly, you already know all of the district city councilors are women. Mayor Ken Miyagishima, who is elected at large, will be the lone male on the council this year.

The district councilors are Kasandra Gandara, Tessa Abeyta-Stuve, Becki Graham, Johana Bencomo, Becky Corran and Yvonne Flores.

Doña Ana County has a female sheriff, Kim Stewart.

New Mexico's three U.S. representatives are all women: Rep. Melanie Stansbury is from the state's Congressional District 1; Rep. Teresa Leger Fernández is from Congressional District 3; and representing Las Cruces and the rest of Congressional District 2 is Yvette Herrell.

When the New Mexico legislative session begins Jan. 18, it

will mark the 12th consecutive year the state has been led by a female governor. For eight years from 2011-2018, Susana Martinez was governor. Succeeding Martinez has been Michelle Lujan Grisham, who will begin her fourth year in the state's highest office.

Grisham will preside over a Legislature with no shortage of women.

The New Mexico House has more female representatives (37) than

male (33), including several representing our region. From the state House in southwest New Mexico, we have Candie Sweetser, Micaela Lara Cadena, Angelica Rubio, Joanne Ferrary, Rebecca Dow, Gail Armstrong, Rachel Black and Doreen Gallegos.

Our regional senators include Siah Correa Hemphill, Crystal Diamond, Carrie Hamblen and Liz Stefanics.

The Doña Ana County Commission has two women: the

melodically named Diana Murillo-Trujillo in District 2 and Susana Chaparro in District 4.

Other county elected officials include Probate Judge Diana Bustamante, Clerk Amanda Lopez Askin and Assessor Leticia Duarte-Benavidez, a former county commissioner.

Another former Doña County commissioner, Isabela Solis, is running for lieutenant governor, and State Rep. Dow is running for the Republican gubernatorial nomination.

Other women judges include U.S. District Judge Margaret Strickland, U.S. Magistrate Chief Judge Carmen Garza, State District judges Marci Beyer, Mary Rosner, Grace Duran and Presiding Municipal Judge Joy Goldbaum.

Monica Torres is president of Doña Ana Community College, Bobbie Green heads the Doña Ana Chapter of the NAACP and dozens and dozens of women in the Las Cruces area are owners and/or operators of vital businesses.

State Sen. Hamblen heads the Las Cruces Green Chamber of Commerce, and our other chambers also have women leadership. Debbi Moore is president & CEO of the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce, and Belia Alvarez serves as board chair for the Las Cruces Hispanic Chamber of Commerce.

All of this should come as no surprise.

In fact, the only thing surprising would be if anyone found this surprising. Women have done most of the world's hardest work since the dawn of time.

And even though women have been able to vote in the United States for a century now, their representation in government has lagged behind.

All of us have mothers. For many, mom is the most important person in our lives. Women are siblings, spouses, daughters, friends, relatives, teachers, bosses, employees and more.

We've long had a female major-

Sankalpa: Get your intentions lined up in new year

The Theory of Planned Behavior (TPB) holds that all actions are controlled by intentions. TPB, developed by Icek Ajzen in 1985, suggests an individual's intention to perform or not to perform a particular behavior is prerequisite to any

action. Intentions are defined as the motivational factors that indicate the extent to which people are willing to go to perform a

particular behavior; hence, the stronger the intention to perform a behavior, the higher the likelihood that an individual will perform it.

I worked with someone a while back who took the theory to an extreme level — if you “intend” something strongly enough, it will happen. I thought of it as kind of a cult, maybe because she told me about it with that glazed dogma look that brooks no argument.

But, I have noticed there

may be a kernel of truth there as well. If there is something we set our minds to and steer toward at every opportunity, it has a stronger chance of being achieved than if we are just moving along and hoping good things will happen to us. Of course, there is an element of seeing what relates to us there as well.

When I was very pregnant, all three times, I saw a lot of pregnant women in the environment — it seemed as if there was an abundance of pregnancy, but

really it was just because it was on my mind and therefore in my view.

On the other hand, you never know. When I was a child, I went with my mom to a certain drug store in Albuquerque regularly. On the wall above a door was a poster that I loved and coveted greatly but I kept it secret because I thought my parents would think it was silly. Come my birthday and voila, there it was in the small present pile.

Phone and Internet Discounts Available to CenturyLink Customers

The New Mexico Public Regulation Commission designated CenturyLink as an Eligible Telecommunications Carrier within its service area for universal service purposes. CenturyLink’s basic local service rates for residential voice lines are \$18.41 per month and business services are \$40.00 per month. Specific rates will be provided upon request.

CenturyLink participates in a government benefit program (Lifeline) to make residential telephone or broadband service more affordable to eligible low-income individuals and families. Eligible customers are those that meet eligibility standards as defined by the FCC and state commissions. Residents who live on federally recognized Tribal Lands may qualify for additional Tribal benefits if they participate in certain additional federal eligibility programs. The Lifeline discount is available for only one telephone or qualifying service per household, which can be either a wireline or wireless service. Broadband speeds must be 25 Mbps download and 3 Mbps upload or faster to qualify.

A household is defined for the purposes of the Lifeline program as any individual or group of individuals who live together at the same address and share income and expenses. Lifeline service is not transferable, and only eligible consumers may enroll in the program. Consumers who willfully make false statements in order to obtain Lifeline telephone or broadband service can be punished by fine or imprisonment and can be barred from the program.

Dems take page out of GOP playbook with congressional redistricting map

Democrats in the state Legislature were able to tilt the playing field to their side this year for the first time in three decades, and they have taken full advantage of it.

The last two times our state has gone through the redistricting process that happens every 10 years after the Census, the power of the Legislature was checked by Republican governors Gary Johnson and Susana Martinez. That led to expensive court battles both years, where the final district maps were drawn.

With Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham now in office, Democrats were under no such constraints this time.

And, they took full advantage of that power by dissecting the state's largest Republican stronghold in the congressional district map passed during a special session last month.

Under this map, the area in southeastern New Mexico known as Little Texas will be broken into all three congressional districts.

District 1, which had traditionally covered the northern part of the state, will come down all the way to Roswell, which would, itself, be divided into two districts.

Our District 2, which had traditionally covered the southern part of the

state, will reach up into the more Democratic-friendly regions of Albuquerque.

The previously urban District 3 will slide down the eastern side of the state into Hobbs.

The goal of gerrymandering is to dilute your opponent's areas of strength without giving away so much that you put other previously safe districts at risk.

Success will mean Democrats holding all three seats in Congress for the next 10 years..

The final map was based on one proposed by the Center for Civic Policy and other progressive political groups that was dubbed, "The People's Map." Which is accurate, assuming that all people are Democrats. Or that Republicans are not people.

The state went to great lengths this year to attempt to take politics out of the process. A new Citizen Redistricting Committee headed by former Supreme Court Justice Edward Chavez held public hearings throughout New Mexico to bring a new level of transparency and citizen involvement to the process.

I believe that effort was sincere. But it was doomed by the compromise reached during last year's legislative session when lawmakers agreed to let the committee do its work,

but rendered it powerless by retaining full authority to pass whatever it wanted

Once the process got to the state Legislature, it simply became an exercise of raw political power.

I shouldn't have been surprised.

House Speaker Brian Egoft told us this was the plan after the 2020 election when he was asked about Yvette Herrell's win.

"This is the last election for New Mexico's 2nd Congressional District with a map that looks like it looks now," he said. "So, next time it'll be a different district and we'll have to see what that means for Republican chances to hold it."

It's the same kind of raw political power that we see every day. Wielded by Mitch McConnell in Congress, it has given us a Supreme Court that is wildly out of step with the nation.

Wielded by Republican state legislatures throughout the country, it has changed the vote-counting process to ensure that candidates can be declared the winner even if they don't get the most votes.

I firmly believe that gerrymandering is wrong. But I was naive to think Democrats would not respond in kind to the new political realities.

Ex-Aggie football player sees great things for new youth program

As coordinator of the Martin Luther King Jr. Commission (MLKC) Youth Leadership Program in Doña Ana County, Jamar Cotton is hoping to have the same positive influence on local youth that his high-school track coach had on him.

“Marvin Hawkins was my turning point,” Cotton said, remembering his days at Irvington High School in his native Irvington, New Jersey.

“He was my biggest difference,” said Cotton, who came to New Mexico State University on a football scholarship. After graduating in 2010, Cotton made Las Cruces his home. He has devoted thousands of hours to public service as a mentor, fitness instructor and motivational speaker, among many other volunteer roles.

“I’m excited,” Cotton said, as he and MLKC New Mexico Associate Director Beverly Jordan discussed the leadership program, which kicked off in Las Cruces in late September and also has opened chapters in Hobbs, Farmington, Albuquerque and Roswell, with a program starting in Clovis

in January and others to follow.

The goal is to “motivate kids to be leaders,” Cotton and Jordan said, encouraging them to follow the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.’s six principles of non-violence (thekingcenter.org/about-tkc/the-king-philosophy/).

Cotton said he will emphasize entrepreneurship, teambuilding, networking and inclusion as he reaches out to teens and parents in towns and cities across the county to build the program.

“I want to get more kids involved in something positive ... and make them successful,” Cotton said. “It’s about empowerment,

so they know their voice is important.”

Cotton said he wants to provide today’s students with the tools they need to become tomorrow’s leaders, so instead of them saying, “‘We never had that,’” they can say, “‘When we were in school, I had that,’” Cotton said. “It starts right now.”

Cotton has already enlisted the City of Las Cruces as a partner in the program, he said. The city will provide meeting space at Meerscheidt Recreation Center for monthly programming that will include guest speakers talking about everything from agriculture to personal finance, Cot-

ton said.

Participating students will also get a free trip to Albuquerque in June 2022 to attend the state Youth Leadership Conference.

Jordan said the program welcomes sponsors in Las Cruces or anywhere in the state, and also would like to find coordinators to take the Youth Leadership Program into other New Mexico communities.

Each community is different, Jordan said, but they all have one thing in common: “Trying to bring about a positive impact for our kids.”

The program will help address mental health, racism, the pandemic, bul-

lying, gun violence and many other issues, she said.

Cotton said the program is open to all middle- and high-school students and will eventually expand to include elementary schools.

“Kids can have a lot of negative energy,” Cotton said. The leadership program will give them “more positive things to focus on,” he said, as it creates “leaders rather than troublemakers.”

Cotton originally came to Las Cruces on a football scholarship. The Aggie linebacker earned a bachelor’s degree in early childhood education and

a master’s in criminal justice.

Cotton is also the general manager of the Cruces Regulators, a full-contact tackle women’s football team that plays in the Women’s Football Alliance, the largest and longest-running professional women’s league in the world.

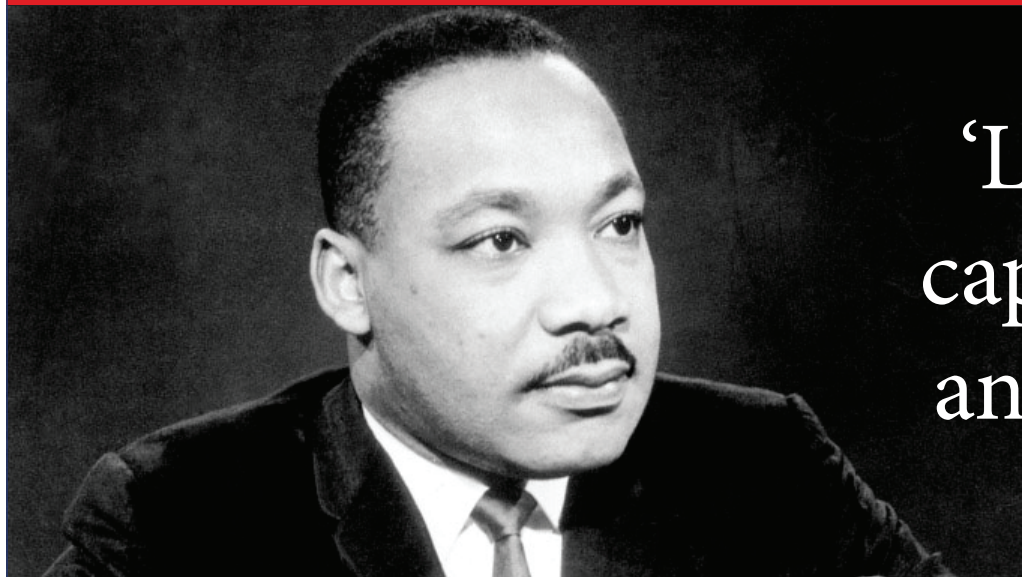

Dress the Child program gets support from raffle, winery



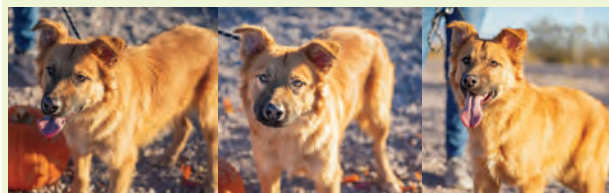

Even small projects such as planting a tree or installing fence posts can be very dangerous if you do not know what utilities are buried around your dig site. Whether you are a professional

excavator or homeowner, you can be fined AND held financially responsible for repair costs to damaged utilities when 811 is not called. How it works:

1. Use white spray paint and/or white marker flags to mark the ground where you plan to dig.
2. Call 811 two business days before beginning your project and they will alert all of the local utilities to respond to your dig site and mark where the utility lines are buried. Utility companies will have two days, once notified, to respond to your dig site.
3. Once utilities are marked, you must adhere to the "18 inch" rule, which is no mechanical digging (tractor, auger, etc.) within 18 inches of the utility markings. If you must dig within 18 inches of a utility marking, it has to be hand dug or vacuum excavated.
4. Once all of the utilities have been marked, you will have 15 days to complete your digging project. If your project is not complete in that time frame, you must call 811 again.

Ban on most single-use plastic bags now in effect in Las Cruces

BULLETIN REPORT

The City of Las Cruces' single-use plastic bag ordinance went into effect Jan. 1, with a goal of abating "the nuisance that has been caused through the rapid and growing increase of single-use plastic bags in the city," the city said in a news release.

The ordinance prohibits the use of single-use plastic carryout bags provided by a retail establishment to a customer at the point of sale or checkout.

It defines a retail establishment as any retail business in a commercial setting. That does not include food banks, public eating establishments

defined as restaurants or take-out food establishments who sell their products to be eaten on or off their premises.

A retail establishment will be prohibited from providing a single-use plastic carryout bag to any customer. All covered retail establishments must provide only the following bag types at checkout to customers: reusable bags, paper grocery bags or cardboard boxes, the city said.

An environmental service fee of 10 cents will be charged to the customer for each paper grocery bag provided.

Retail establishments are not required to collect the environmental service

fee from any person with a voucher or electronic benefits card issued under the Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program, Emergency Food Assistance Program, Temporary Assistance to Needy Families program or the federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), the news release said.

Fifty percent of the fees collected will be retained by the retail establishment for administrative costs incurred by the collection and reporting of the fee.

The remainder will go to the city for promoting the ordinance, purchasing reusable bags for the public and public education

regarding sustainability.

To further promote the use of reusable bags and reduce the quantity of single-use carryout bags entering the city's waste stream, retail establishments are encouraged to make reusable bags free or for sale at checkout counters or provide boxes for use at checkout counters free of charge, the city said.

The city Sustainability Office is authorized to provide reusable bags to the public at low- or no cost, with specific emphasis on reaching out to low-income households.

Vescovo sells on 'high note,' but will stay on as GM with new owners

"I wanted to go out on a high note, and we definitely did," George Vescovo said after he sold his Toyota dealership to Viva Toyota, which took over Dec. 13.

Despite the pandemic and major construction on Valley Drive where the dealership is located, Vescovo Toyota had its best years ever in 2020 and 2021 and sold almost 900 vehicles in 2021, which Vescovo said was more than any other individual dealership in Las Cruces.

"I think it was just the right time," he said about his decision to sell.

And, although he will not be the owner, Vescovo will remain with Viva Toyota as general manager.

"I'm excited to stay on," Vescovo said, and help "take the dealership to the next level."

He said he is pleased Viva offered jobs to all Vescovo Toyota employees, and most of the approximately 40 people who worked for him accepted.

Vescovo is a third-gen-

eration car dealer in Las Cruces, and his full name reflects the entire history: George Kuper Vescovo.

"There's been a car dealer in my family since the 60s," he said.

Vescovo's maternal grandfather, George Kuper, opened Kuper Volkswagen in El Paso

nearly 60 years ago and then opened a VW dealership in Las Cruces. Vescovo's paternal grandfather, Pete Vescovo, opened a Toyota dealership in Austin, Texas, in 1970. When George and his family moved to Las Cruces in 1982, his father, Paul Vescovo, bought Desert Motors, which became Las Cruces Toyota.

George went to work for his dad managing the dealership in 1999. He bought Las Cruces Toyota in 2013 and changed the name to Vescovo Toyota of Las Cruces. It became the fastest growing Toyota dealership in the Southwest in 2014, Vescovo said, with annual increases in new car sales averaging 44 percent.

Vescovo attended Mesilla Park Elementary School and Zia Middle School before graduating from Las Cruces High

School, where he was on the tennis team and "more the nerdy science kid," Vescovo said.

He earned a bachelor's of science degree in microbiology with a minor in chemistry from the University of Arizona in 1999 and intended to go to medical school. But then the family business called and Vescovo worked as sales manager and then general manager at Las Cruces Toyota for the next 10 years.

He earned an MBA from the University of New Mexico Anderson School of Management in 2007 and a law degree from the University of Arizona James E. Rogers College of Law, graduating cum laude in 2012. Vescovo passed the bar in Arizona, and in 2000 became a licensed pilot.

"I've got a lot of tools in my toolbox," he said.

And, at age 45, Vescovo has no plans to retire, and intends to remain with Viva Toyota "as long as it's a good fit," he said.

Vescovo plans to continue working to "make Las Cruces a better place."

He has served on the boards of the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce and the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico, created an endowment and donated a car to support the automotive technology program at Doña Ana Community College. He and his wife, Amanda, and Vescovo Toyota created the 20 for 20 Campaign two years ago, donating \$20,000 to support local nonprofits. And, Vescovo Toyota has been a long-time major sponsor of Las Cruces Public Schools' Count Me In car giveaway to support student attendance.

Vescovo is also an avid outdoorsman and is especially fond of trail running.

"That's one of the things I love about Las Cruces," Vescovo said. It "really shines with all the outdoor activities."

NMSU CMI student earns ESPN internship

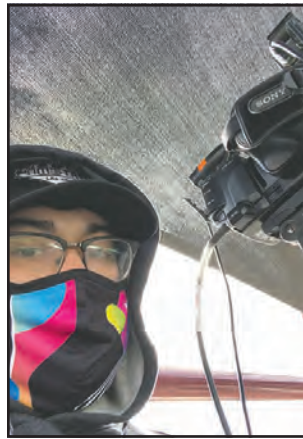

Jack Black will be the envy of students across the country when he graduates from New Mexico State University next May. Black is among a select group picked for a full-time ESPN internship starting in January.

Lapid’s portfolio review class helps students build websites to showcase their work for potential employers and prepare materials

such as cover letters and artist statements, helping students to present themselves in the best possible light in the job market.

“I filled out the application and sent in my resume, but I think the big thing that helped me was writing a cover letter,” Black said. “We had to do it in class. Most employers say it’s optional but I think it made a big difference. Learning how to properly write one and sell oneself really helps, especially when competing with many candidates.”

“Jack has written and directed powerful films in the classes he has taken with me, and I’m thrilled that he received this internship and will have this amazing opportunity,” Lapid said. “I know that he plans to use his

gifts, his insights and personal experiences to have an impact in the world as a filmmaker.”

Lapid points to other students who have also been successful in obtaining competitive internships.

Dominic Vincent won a coveted 2021 Production Fellowship with the Television Academy, and Christina Zuni was chosen as a 2021 fellow in the Sundance Institute Native Lab.

“Our faculty deserves a lot of credit for inspiring our students to believe in themselves and go after opportunities like this one with ESPN,” Lanasa said. “It’s important to recognize how tirelessly faculty are working to help connect our students with opportunities, despite still being in a pandemic.”

Minimum wage increase took effect Jan. 1

BULLETIN REPORT

The City of Las Cruces minimum wage increased to \$11.50 an hour Jan. 1, 2022, the city said in a news release. The increase follows the state minimum wage.

That is an increase of \$1 per hour from the city’s 2021 minimum wage of \$10.50. It was \$9 an hour in 2020.

The hourly wage for tipped employees increased to \$4.60 an hour for 2022, the city said. That is an increase of 40 cents an hour over 2021.

A tipped employee is an employee who customarily and regularly receives more than \$30 a week in tips.

When the girl refused to leave her desk, the guard threw her to the floor and arrested the student. A classmate's video of the incident went viral.

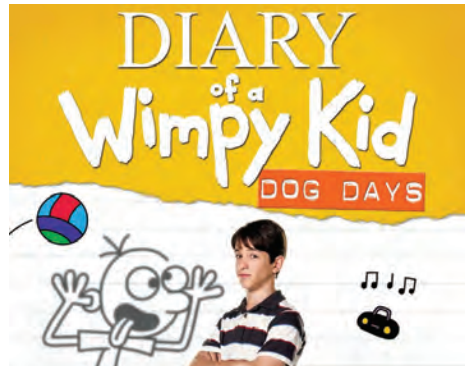

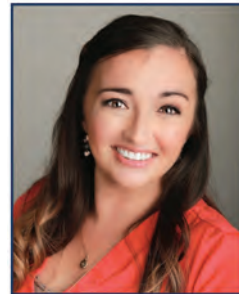

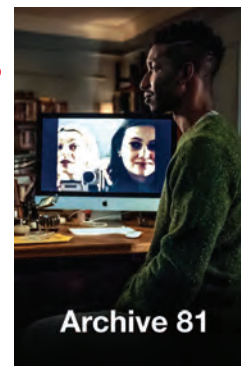

movie review

‘Point Break’ still furnishes land, air and sea excitement

Some movies remain so original and fresh, they don't need updates ... and even though it got one anyway, “Point Break” is among those films.

It's hard to believe the 1991 adventure-drama (which AMC shows Sunday, Jan. 9) is now more than 30 years old, since director Kathryn Bigelow (“The Hurt Locker”) invested it with as much energy as – and arguably more than – many present-day releases. Keanu Reeves went a long way toward establishing his action cred as Johnny Utah, a college athlete whose fame isn't necessarily an asset in his new career as a Los Angeles-based FBI agent.

It doesn't impress his boss (John C. McGinley) nor, at least initially, his veteran partner (Gary Busey) ... until he gets a hunch about an elusive bank-robbery gang

whose masks give the criminals the nickname The Ex-Presidents. Utah suspects the crooks are surfers, so he decides to immerse himself in that culture, seeking training in riding the waves from a reluctant and rebellious young woman (Lori Petty).

Through her, Utah eventually connects with her self-assured and somewhat mystical ex-boyfriend Bodhi (Patrick Swayze), whom Utah sees as a valuable source even if Bodhi himself should turn out not to be involved in the robberies. It's not a leap to say that Utah is seduced by Bodhi and his followers, with one especially striking sequence taking the agent along with them in his sudden introduction to skydiving.

‘It is a debt you owe to the story’

Las Cruces filmmaker completes latest effort, enters it in festivals

Las Cruces filmmaker Brandon Tyler has completed his ninth short film, “Arkansas, Etc.,” and is continuing to submit the movie to film festivals across the country.

The 14-minute, 44-second film was shot in Las Cruces and stars New Mexico State University Theatre Department graduates Nick Check (Dalton, and the film’s narrator) and Imani Caldwell (Eira). Las Cruces actor Cassandra Galban has a supporting role.

Tyler wrote, directed, edited and co-produced the film.

When asked what inspired him to create “Arkansas, Etc.,” Tyler said, “The work is the only possible expression of the impulses behind it. If I could reduce it to some message in clear language, I would not have felt the need to make it into a film. I don’t think the purpose of a story is ever to show a truth known in advance. Perhaps it is to suspend a kind of truth to make way for something else.”

Making “Arkansas, Etc.,” he said, wasn’t about “happiness, or pleasure or self-gratification. The work is difficult, and should demand something of you. It is a debt you owe to the story. Your relationship to it changes over

time, but you always have a debt. If you are true to it, then the impulses at the start show up at the end for you to recognize and be free of. It can be rending, be miraculous; and there are moments of sheer joy, of wonder.”

Tyler, who graduated from NMSU with a degree in philosophy in 2019, took his 2018 short film “Good Night” to the Cannes Film Festival as part of the festival’s Short Film Corner. Check was also in the cast of that film.

The cast of “Arkansas, Etc.” also includes Gail Wheeler, Jayce McCormick, Lucio Orduno III, Tyler Chatterton, Gabriel Flores and Nico Holguin.

The film’s principal crew, in addition to Tyler, includes Juan Kleban, producer, creator of the original score and sound supervisor; Luis Gutierrez,

cinematography; Alex Antholzner, production design; Henry McCall, sound design; Jessica N. Jimenez, costume design, hair and makeup and the film’s intimacy coordinator; Paulina Lopez, digital imaging technician; and Shemar Robinson, production sound.

“I had a cast and crew that went above and beyond in the highest regard,” Tyler said. “Without them the film would be nothing. Because of them I have the potential for an audience, without whom I am nothing. To all those who played a part in this film, it looms with you.”

Although he has no formal training as a filmmaker, “I consider making films a great privilege,” Tyler said. “I will continue as long as I can.”

“Making the movie was a mixture of, on one hand,

getting together with friends and doing what we love and just sort of hanging out, and on the other, noticing that these people I’ve known for a few years are true professionals to the core,” Check said.

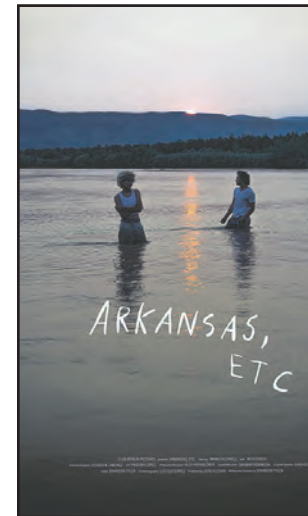
“Everyone on the team was someone I had met and worked with before in some small capacity and to be able to work with trusted and familiar faces is amazing,” he said, “but then to also be able to notice like, ‘Holy cow, these people really know their stuff,’ like with Alex’s (Antholzner) attention to detail in props and scenic design.”

As an example, Check said, his character, Dalton, “has an Altoid can that he carries with him 24/7, and it holds a few of his cigarettes, his lighter and occasionally some spare change. It’s briefly seen in one scene with Imani where Dalton gives

her some medicine, but it’s dented and worn and scratched, and it’s truly beautiful that that detail was spread to every single thing.

“And that’s only one of the crew members,” Check said. “Luis’ cinematography was outstanding — the look of the film and how the shooting flowed during the week of shooting was incredible. As an actor, his work and attention to detail made me confident that there was never something — I, any other actor or the world around us — that wasn’t captured in its best light and purest subject form, and I think that shows in the final cut.

“Something that was a first for me was working directly with a producer, Juan Kleban, and it was actually very interesting to see someone who was working side by side with Brandon to not only de-

velop the film, but to challenge the director in all of his choices to produce something better,” Check said. “He was wonderful to work with and it was reassuring to know that there was another set of eyes on the project holistically going, ‘How can this get even better?’ and then making that happen.

“Shemar (Robinson) is someone I’ve worked with on a handful of small projects and he’s a professional through and through; you never ever notice that he’s done his job, and that’s a good thing,” Check said. Sound can and does make or break films, and he got it all and then some, without skipping a beat, he said.

NMSU Museum conservation program gets \$1.2 million endowment

A \$1.2 million endowment from Candis J. Stern will sustain New Mexico State University's Museum Conservation Program's efforts to provide an undergraduate degree and hands-on experience in museum conservation to prepare students for careers in museums across the country.

The endowment will provide long-term support for NMSU's program in the College of Arts and Sciences, one of only three undergraduate programs of its kind in the U.S.

In addition, Stern is also providing funds for equipment and supplies and student support.

"This endowment will position our program na-

tionally while providing needed funding for students, equipment and the lab itself as we look for ways to expand the program to provide conservation services in southern New Mexico," said Julia Barello, head of NMSU's

Department of Art.

There is a high demand for these conservation jobs across the country.

Director of NMSU's Museum Conservation Program Silvia Marinas-Feliner points to a 95 percent placement rate

of the NMSU program's students in museum jobs after graduation.

"It's useful to keep in mind that museum conservation isn't limited to the United States," Marinas-Feliner said. "I have had students going to England, to Rome, to Portugal, to Italy, to Greece, Brazil as well as all over the United States and Canada. I help my students to understand their opportunities are unlimited, that conservation is being done all over the world."

Stern previously established a scholarship at NMSU that provided living expenses for students participating in internships like the one at the Smithsonian Institution

and also allowed them to attend the American Institute of Conservation's annual meeting.

"I appreciate the arts — music, dance, art — all artistic endeavors are fundamental to human expression," Stern said. "Though I've been aware of the restoration process for many years, it became personal when I brought an outdoor bronze here when I moved from Michigan. Unfortunately, I didn't clean or wax it for three years and it began to lose its patina. Someone told me about the program at NMSU. I then contacted Silvia. She and her students have been a blessing to me personally. NMSU should be very

proud; this program is an important contribution to the world of art, not just here but across the nation."

Since 2005 more than 100 students have received a BFA or a minor in museum conservation or received a graduate Museum Studies Certificate.

The demand is high for these courses. Marinas-Feliner now has a new, larger lab inside Devasthali Hall, the state-of-the-art facility that houses NMSU's Department of Art and the University Art Museum.

This new facility allows her to train 16 students — more than twice as many students as her previous lab could accommodate.

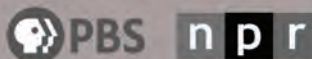

"Jessica (Jimenez) was incredible from not only from her perfect choices for our costumes, but also in the detail there, from the torn shirt pockets to the shades of green, to the divot of Dalton's pants where his Altoids can has worn through," Check said. "She also surprisingly did the intimacy coaching for the film, and having that as just an option was great, but she took it a step further in her execution of that role and made it something remarkable."

Check said he and co-star, Imani Caldwell, had worked together on the 2019 film "Yuri."

"She was great then, but she's only gotten better,"

he said. "Something that always strikes others and definitely was something that stood out to me in the film was her eyes. They have something to them that just really pops on screen and they drag you in to her story individually where her talents give the whole performance a beautiful wholeness that feels so real and raw, and when the camera wasn't rolling it was awesome to get to just chat and talk about music tastes with her and see where she's at in her career.

"Brandon has been a friend and director colleague of mine for about four or five years now, and before I ever met him I knew I wanted to work with him, and then after I worked with him for the first time on 'Waiting for a Train' (2018), I knew I

had to do it again," Check said. "Something that always strikes me about his films is the script being so vastly different from everything else you'll see here in Las Cruces. It's never another Western or odd horror taste/take, but something that makes your brain really engage and want to decide what the message really is, what's really going on here in this movie."

From the moment he read Tyler's "Arkansas, Etc." script, Check said, "I was like, 'Brandon, I want this role.' And the rest is history. Something I always say to Brandon, and that I definitely want to share with the rest of the cast and crew, is that they never cease to inspire me as professionals, but also just as wonderful human beings."

How Christmas, different feasts come to define God for Christians

Christmas, the Festival of the Nativity, was not always commemorated with the enthusiasm shown by various churches in our time. That goes for the East as well as for the West.

It has always been secondary, a sort of stepchild festival in relation to the major festival around which the entire year revolves; namely, Pascha, the Feast of the Resurrection, also known as Easter. That also holds true for both East and West. Easter is ground zero for the Christian year, not Christmas.

I am writing this column for Jan. 7, Christmas Day for many Orthodox Christians in America and across the world. Most of the Orthodox Christian world is on the "old" calendar which dates from the time of Julius Caesar.

Before you snicker, the "new" calendar was not exactly born yesterday. It dates from 1582 under the aegis of Pope Gregory XIII and is thus called the Gregorian calendar. The two calendars are 13 days apart in calculation, so Dec. 25th on the old calen-

dar is Jan. 7 on our civil calendar.

In the Eastern Church, the Church of Israel and Greece and Arabic lands which spread west to Rome and Celtic regions then into Slavic areas like Ukraine and Russia, the main festival at year's turning is Theophany, called Epiphany in the West. It commemorates the Baptism of Christ at the hand of John the Forerunner. This is not the Three Kings Festival popular in the West with cake and coin and the "We Three Kings" hymn and all that. The Three Kings commemoration is folded into the Christmas celebration on Dec. 25 in the

East. Not until the 1960s did the Roman Catholic Church revise its calendar to commemorate the Baptism of Christ on the Sunday after Epiphany, which Anglicans and Lutherans also observe.

These different names are significant. Theophany refers to the revelation of the Holy Trinity at the baptism of Christ (the biblical reference at Matthew 3:13-17 shows why this is so), while Epiphany focuses on the manifestation of God in the person of Jesus, called the Messiah.

The point of these festivals should be clear. The word "God" can mean whatever you want it to

mean. People use it at random for blessing or cursing. It can be a mere cipher. Somebody once called "God" the great aspirin tablet in the sky. Definition is necessary if the word is to have substance and meaning. Without definition we're just talking smoke.

That's what all these festivals of both East and West do: they give content to the word "God." They give shape to it. They identify God with humanity in the person of the Nazarene. This is not something we can invent. It comes by revelation and must come into your heart before it can capture your mind, although the two

must function together in the fullness of faith.

Each Christmas Eve, the Orthodox Church serves Royal Hours, four short services (not an hour long) of psalms and readings from Old and New Testament. One hymn is repeated each hour to express our faith:

"Today the Virgin proceeds to the cave Where she will give birth past understanding to the Word from all eternity. ...

The one who chose to be manifest as a newborn Child

While remaining the eternal God!"

The Association: Successful women helping others to succeed

“Women have unique needs and challenges in business,” said Sumer Rose-Nolen.

That’s why Rose-Nolen and her friend and fellow Las Cruces business owner Marci Dickerson created The Association last year and are kicking it back into high gear after a pandemic-induced slowdown.

The Association gives “ambitious female professionals and entrepreneurs a place to network, develop, connect and support one another through meaningful relationships and expert business-development instruction,” according to The Association’s website and Facebook page.

“It’s a comfortable place to share their wins and their struggles,” said Rose-Nolen, owner of SRN Financial Services, offering guidance on questions like, “How do I start a business?” and “How do I take my business to the next level?”

“This is something we needed to bring to the community in a more for-

mal, organized way,” said Dickerson, who owns The Game, Game II and Dickerson’s Catering.

The Association will host an all-day workshop “Elevate You in 2022: Health, Wealth & Growth,” in partnership with NMSU Studio G, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 11. It is free for The Association members and \$25 for nonmembers.

The group includes VIP members — female business owners, CEOs, CFOs — and general members who benefit from direct connection with their

more seasoned and successful colleagues, Rose-Nolen said.

During The Association’s “speed mentoring” sessions, for example, general members get to spend five to 10 minutes each with “established successful women” like Wanda Bowman, Pat Sisbarro, Amy Hummer, Barbara Hubbard, Julia Brown and Leslie Cervantes, drawing on their experience and insights, their successes and failures and asking any questions they want.

“Here’s 20 years of experience I’m giving you in 30 minutes,” Dickerson said.

“It’s the smart way to do it,” she said, “avoiding the mistakes that others made before you.

“If this is where you want to go, here’s how you get there. We have learned through trial and error. The only way up is together.”

The Association is a “productive, yet casual group,” Rose-Nolen said.

“There are no rules of order.”

There is also no age or experience level required for membership. The Association targets college students and “up-and-coming professionals,” Dickerson said. One of its goals is to keep Las Cruces graduates from leaving the area to find the best career opportunities.

In fact, she said, the Association invites successful male businesspeople to participate in its programs. It also partners with New Mexico State University’s Arrowhead Center, which sponsors a WE (Women Entrepreneurs) Mean Business annual conference in Las Cruces.

“We find the experts everywhere,” Rose-Nolen said.

“It’s all about the connections,” Dickerson said. “How do we help people establish those connections without having grown up here?”

The Association can help members make their businesses more attractive to potential investors, maximize social media as a marketing tool, earn

more and save more, make the best presentation of themselves during an annual review, work successfully from home and thrive as single mothers who balance career and family obligations that many men in business aren’t expected to deal with.

Rose-Nolen started in business for herself in 2005 after bumping her head on the glass ceiling at her previous job, where she watched a man she had trained become her boss and earn a higher salary.

The Association is pro-woman, but “it’s not man bashing,” Dickerson said. “It’s our reality.”

Some of The Association’s events are what Rose-Nolen called “wine and whines,” when everyone feels safe to say what she wants and to ask what she wants.

Rose-Nolen and Dickerson met when Dickerson was hired to cater Rose-Nolen’s wedding.

Rose-Nolen told Dickerson, “I don’t know people. I want to pick your brain. Teach me how to grow my business.”

A friendship — and partnership — developed. And Dickerson has become one of Rose-Nolen’s heroes.

“She took me under her wing,” Rose-Nolen said. “She also put me through the ringer. I appreciated the tough love.”

Rose-Nolen’s other hero is her mother.

“My mom is my motivation,” Rose-Nolen said. Her mother dealt with domestic violence issues and a lot of relocations — Rose-Nolen attended 15 different schools growing up.

Dickerson said her hero is Wanda Bowman, a Las Cruces business pioneer who “came up during a time in which women could not be independent,” Dickerson said.

“She built an empire,” Dickerson said of Bowman. “She just went to work and she did it.”

That reflects a personal mantra for Dickerson: “Don’t ask permission or forgiveness. Just do it.

“Our community is about hard work and networking,” she said.

Inflation small price to pay for economic recovery after lockdown

There is a lot of noise right now concerning inflation. People point to the rapidly rise in prices, starting June last year and cumulating in a rate of 6.9 percent this November. This is the highest rate since June 1982. People are getting upset.

To which I respond, Come on people! Get real! We just suffered through the worse economic downturn ever recorded. Unemployment was 14.8 percent, GDP dropping 9 percent, prices not rising but falling 2 percent. The economy in disarray. And yet after less than two years, GDP is fully recovered, people are back to work, the unemployment rate is now only 4.2 percent. The side effect of this amazing recovery is inflation. It could have been much, much worse.

The current inflation arises initially from the supply disruptions caused by the pandemic lockdown. Factory closings, port disruptions, social distancing, pandemic-

driven shifts in product demand, all these led to reduced output and higher prices.

An option would have been to just let the supply disruptions work their way through the economy. The con-

sequence would have been persistent high unemployment over several years. Eventually, the inflation would have slowed, then reversed. The suffering among those who lost their jobs, who would have been predominately among the working class, would have been immense.

Not surprisingly, our political leaders, Democrat and Republican alike, decided that doing nothing wasn't an option. The

Fed took action to ensure adequate liquidity. Interest rates dropped to near zero. These low rates allowed continued borrowing and spending that help offset the supply disruptions and kept people employed, but it also further contributed to inflation.

On the fiscal side, there was a bipartisan consensus of the need for massive increase in spending. The spending was aimed at both mitigating the immediate economic impact of the pandemic — unemployment extension, The Payroll Protection Program — and at providing stimulus to the economy. In the second category of spending were the three stimulus checks.

The spending in these bills was truly massive, about \$6 trillion dollars

with \$4 trillion enacted under President Trump and about \$2 trillion under President Biden, most passed with bipartisan majorities. The spending amounted to a whopping 30 percent of GDP. The CARES Act by itself, passed under Trump, at \$1.9 trillion, is the largest single economic stimulus package ever enacted.

The stimulus checks and extended unemployment insurance were particularly important for ensuring the continued spending by lower- and middle-income households. Maintaining household spending, in turn, was critical for ensuring small business had customers to sell to. Similarly, the Payroll Protection Program, which

made direct payments in the form of forgivable loans, was also critical to the survival of many small businesses.

But these programs, along with other provisions of the stimulus packages are inflationary. By maintaining demand in the face of supply disruptions, the stimulus programs contributed to upward pressure on prices.

Going forward, the Fed has signaled higher interest rates. Most experts expect two or three rate hikes during 2022. Meanwhile, many of the programs funded by the economic stimulus packages are set to expire. Higher interest rates and declining federal spending should blunt future inflation. I expect inflation to be tamed by the end of

2022; that is, back under 3 percent.

Let's be frank. We are extremely fortunate that the lockdown recession didn't transform into a depression. We can thank the very aggressive fiscal and monetary policy for this. The byproduct of these programs is the inflation we now suffer. Better inflation than depression.

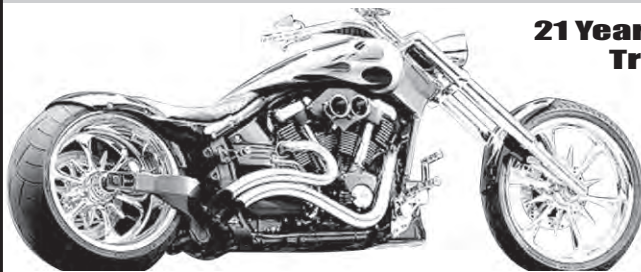

NMSU swimmers, divers hungry to break through at WAC meet

The New Mexico State University women's swimming and diving team is hungry and motivated this season.

The Aggies had just one dual meet last year because of the Covid-19 pandemic before swimming, competing and taking second place at the Western Athletic Conference championships.

Six times during coach Rick Pratt's 17-year tenure guiding the program, the Aggie women have finished second in the WAC.

This year, they would like to break through for that elusive conference team championship.

"We've been close," said Pratt, a native of Montreal, who swam at the University of Alabama.

"The goal is to win every year," Pratt said. "It's

pretty competitive league. NAU (Northern Arizona University) has been very good. They've got a brand-new facility, great diving (athletes) and good coaches and an interesting training element up there (in the high altitude of Flagstaff). They are always pushing us to be better.

"We have been in the mix to win conference a handful of times and the team is hungry to do that," Pratt said.

After last year's abbreviated season, the Aggies have been taking advantage of all their opportunities to swim and get ready for the WAC championships Feb. 23-26 at the University of Houston.

"We've had more meets this fall than probably anytime I've been here," Pratt said. "We are really trying to take advantage of opportunities we have this year and race as much as we can."

The Aggies were scheduled to host Grand Canyon University and Ottawa University, from Arizona, in a three-way meet Saturday, Jan. 8 at the NM State Swimming and Diving Complex. But the meet was canceled because of Covid protocols on the Grand Canyon team and Ottawa decided not to make the trip because NMSU doesn't have a men's team.

The Aggies are still scheduled to host I-25 rival University of New Mexico at 11:30 a.m. Saturday, Jan. 29. Admission is free.

"You don't have to understand swimming (to enjoy yourself)," Pratt said. "Swimming has been on TV a little bit more with the Olympics. It's just racing. It's getting up on the blocks and seeing who touches the wall first and enjoying the visual and technical aspect that swimming brings and diving too."

The Aggies have 34 women on their roster

this season, with 11 freshmen, 10 seniors and four divers, Pratt said.

"It's a big team; it's the biggest roster we have ever had," he said.

Pratt says his teams always try to balance competitive swimming and diving with excelling in the classroom, all while supporting each other during a grueling training regimen.

"Our team is all about having a family setting where they support each other and are good teammates and help each other through the grind," he said. "Our team are amazing students. We had a 3.6 GPA in the fall. Typically, we have eight to 12 4.0 students on our team."

Senior Natalia Villa, from El Paso, said the team is ready and primed to do well. They beat UNM in a dual meet in October for the first time in a decade and that has set a great tone, said Villa, who swam at El Paso High School.

"It felt good and was a great setup for the rest of the season," Villa said.

Personally, Villa has been on the comeback trail after having to have reconstructive surgery on her elbow, known as Tommy John surgery, after the pioneering baseball player who had it to extend his career in the 1970s.

Villa, who competes in the freestyle and breaststroke, said her goals are to finish strong, stay close to her previous best times and qualify for the WAC championships for the fourth time.

"Swimming in college has been the best experience I've ever had," she said.

Elizabeth Cervantes-Vanderlugt, a freshman from Las Cruces High School, said it has been a great experience competing for her hometown team too.

Cervantes-Vanderlugt,

Organ Mountain High's Nuñez named top cross country coach in state

Longtime Organ Mountain High School cross country coach David Nuñez has garnered a new honor.

Nuñez, who has guided the cross country program at Organ Mountain and Oñate, as the school was previously named, for 27 years, was named the 2021 5A Boys Cross Country Coach of the Year by the New Mexico Track and Cross Country Coaches Association (NMTCCCA).

Nuñez will be given the award Saturday, Jan. 22, in Albuquerque.

His boys varsity team won six invitational meets this past fall, won its fourth straight district championship and took fourth place at the state championships. Top runner Brett Bybee won district and was third at state.

Andrew Parks, Jeron Wisner, Corbin Coombs and Jonathan Torres were named all-district, along with Bybee. Both Bybee and Torres were named all-star cross country seniors by the NMTCCCA.

Nuñez has guided the Knights to district titles in boys varsity competition 16 times and 10 times in the girls.

"It was a season and a team to remember," Nuñez said. "This award is a result of their hard work and season achievements. I am humbly honored and truly grateful to coach such a special group of young men and women."

"Put aside the awards and trophies, and the bottom line is that they were not just good runners, but good students and people, which is what we strive to develop in our program," Nuñez said.

A look back: Golf world lost some notable individuals during 2021

Wally Goodwin, legendary, Hall of Fame golf coach at Stanford University in the 1990s, passed away in July at age 94.

Goodwin led his Stanford Cardinal team to the NCAA title in 1994. While in Palo Alto, he recruited Tiger Woods, who won the individual NCAA Championship in 1996, along with two other notable recruits — Notah Begay III and Casey Martin. Goodwin was Stanford's coach for 13 seasons; he was named National Coach of the year in 1992 and 1994.

Golf course architect Arthur Hills died in May at 91. Hills, who was a strong influence in modern golf course design, had a hand in the design of more than 350 golf courses, including some 200 from his original de-

signs, many of which are in the Midwest and Florida. Hills was a past president of the American Society of Golf Architects (1992-93) and was a member of the Ohio and Michigan Golf Halls of Fame.

As a graduate of both Michigan State University (science) and the University of Michigan (landscape architecture) Hills was a prolific and highly respected golf-course designer. Among his many achievements is the renovation work he made to Oakland Hills before the 2004 Ryder Cup. Hills has been known as an environmental pioneer, designing the first Audubon Signature Sanctuary courses in the U.S., Mexico and Europe.

Frank Thomas, golf equipment expert turned USGA equipment watchdog, passed on March 17,

2021 at age 81. Early in his career, from 1966 to 1974, he was chief design engineer for Shakespeare Sporting Goods Company where he perfected a filament winding technique for graphite fibers (first for fishing rods) that led to the first graphite shafts for golf clubs. During his 26-year tenure as the USGA chief equipment regulator (1974 to 2000), he oversaw the development of multiple landmark protocols and testing procedures, including regulations on everything from the shape of irons, woods and wedges to the trampoline-like effect of drivers. Thomas was also responsible for implementing new ways for testing a golf ball's flight, devising the USGA's Slope System for handicap uniformity and for envisioning the USGA's Research and Test Center with an indoor testing range.

Acting as the guardian of reasonable and suitable golf equipment did not come without controversy. Some charged the USGA with being too lax in its regulations, while others demanded more freedom in design. In 1985, Ping filed a \$300 million antitrust lawsuit over the USGA outlawing Ping Eye2 irons' square grooves. Thomas was named personally in that lawsuit, which was ultimately settled out of court. There have been many other controversies over the years, in no small way involving the rapid acceleration in technology since the 1990s. However, the reams of equipment rules, many of which Thomas wrote, were intended to maintain traditional golf values, but

not stifle innovation and technology.

Bruce Fleisher's love for golf began at age 7 when he started working as a caddie with his two older brothers in rural Tennessee. At age 19, he became the third youngest player to win the U.S. Amateur Championship, and he followed that up two years later by placing as the first amateur at the 1969 Masters tournament. He died of multiple medical complications on Sept. 23, 2021. Fleisher was in real terms a "late bloomer" in golf, who won only once on the PGA Tour — the New England Classic. He was regarded as a "journeyman" in pro golfer circles. That is until he turned 50 and proceeded to become the first player to win back-

to-back championships on the Senior PGA tour (now Tour Champions). He would go on to win 18 times, including the 2001 U.S. Senior Open. While his golfing career was admired by many, Fleisher was mostly revered, respected and celebrated for his character on and off the golf course. As one biographer wrote, "He was gentle, he was kind, he was giving and most of all he was grateful."

Next week, remembering Lee Elder, who was the first Black golfer to play in the Masters.
