The Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico (CFSNM) has been received contributions raising money to help others for more than 30 years. It is now asking for the community's continued support as the foundation nears its \$1.6 million goal to purchase, renovate and maintain a new home.

CFSNM has purchased the Cutter Gallery — the Hadley-Ludwick House at the corner of El Paseo Road and University Avenue, which is just south of the foundation's current location and more than three times its square footage.

The building, which housed the jewelry store and gallery of Glenn and Sally Cutter for many years, is currently being renovated by Noble Builders, Inc. of Las Cruces, owned by Johnny Talley. All of the project's subcontractors are also local, Winter said.

"We're so excited to be in here," she said, noting that the move is not only a step up for CFSNM, it also is helping preserve an important piece of Las Cruces history, the Hadley House, which is 114 years old.

Winter said CFSNM will preserve many of the property's existing indoor and outdoor features, including the chandeliers

Auditor says LCPD responding appropriately to complaints

"Overall, the department is responding with appropriate practices and outcomes," one of the principals of the company hired to provide an independent audit of the Las **Cruces Police Department** told the Las Cruces City Council at its Jan. 10 work session.

"The investigations generally were complete, objective and thorough in the best practices we have seen in our work," OIR Group principal Theresa Magula said at the work session. "The actions taken were very appropriate and show a real commitment to accountability."

OIR, based in Los An-

geles, was hired by the City of Las Cruces March 1 to review complaints of police misconduct filed by the public against LCPD officers, or, in some cases, initiated within the department.

OIR began receiving investigative reports May 1, including "any underlying materials that accompany those reports, so it's full. unfettered access to confidential information," **OIR** principal Michael Gennaco said at the work

OIR reviewed 12 complaints filed Jan. 1-Nov. 30, 2021, Magula said. The complaints included a total of 32 allegations of misconduct. Nineteen of the allegations were sustained by the department against 11 LCPD officers, she said, and resulting

Of the 12 complaints, Magula said, five were

filed by citizens, two were investigations initiated within the department, two were investigated by a supervisor rather than LCPD's Internal Affairs (IA) office, two were vehicle-pursuit cases and one was a complaint submitted through the city's ethics hotline. Most of the cases involved calls for service.

Magula said six separate cases involving litigation against the department, some dating back to 2017, were closed between May and November.

OIR's100-page report to the city shows "the countability," Gennaco said.

at least for this cycle, the department does take accountability seriously and is on the right path to ensuring that your community gets the service and public safety it's entitled to," Gennaco said.

But, he added, "we wouldn't be doing our job if we didn't find some room for improvement."

OIR recommendations to LCPD were that the department 1) update its complaint form to make it consistent with current LCPD policy, 2) conduct a formal investigation of every allegation of police misconduct no matter how it is initiated, 3) ensure investigations are completed in a timely fashion and 4) limit investigations conducted by de-"Our assessment is that, partment supervisors.

OIR's audit "is really more about evaluating how the command staff and leadership of the police department is doing." Gennaco said. "We're not so much focused on the actual misconduct of the officers or the employees. That's important, but what we're really trying to do is, when there is an allegation of misconduct, how well is your police department investigating those allegations? How fairly are they investigating the allegations? And how completely are they investigating the allegations?"

Timeliness is "another metric we look at." Gennaco said. "Then ... is the outcome based on the

The LCU Internship Program is a competitive program that awards internships to new incoming or current full-time students pursuing an Associate Degree in Water Technology at the New Mexico State University Doca Ana **Community College** (DACC).

added by the Cutters, although CFSNM staff will replace their 180 standard light bulbs with LEDs.

Following up on a suggestion made by Casa de Peregrinos emergency food bank Executive Director Lorenzo Alba, Winter said there are plans to partner with the NMSU Art Department to create ceiling art as part of the renovation. The south-facing patio will include an agriculture-themed mural being created by Las Cruces Public Schools art teacher Frances Gomez.

CFSNM will share the space with Mesilla Valley CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates), with CASA and its six employees in the front (the original house) and CFSNM with its three full-time employees, interns and

A bit of history

The Hadley-Ludwick House was built in 1907 for Hiram Hadley, who founded Las Cruces College (now New Mexico State University) in 1888 and served as its first president. The house, with its Colonial Revival architectural style, was listed on the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) in 1991. "Constructed of yellow brick with a sidegable roof (the house) has a finished attic and basement," according to its NRHP registration form.

The house "has further historic significance for its connection with Russell Ludwick (he bought it in 1936), who was a leader in New Mexico agriculture and for many years closely associated with the agricultural orientation of NMSU," according to the registration form. Ludwick sold the house in 1974 to Donald Dwver. who owned the nearby Greenhouse nursery. The house was later used as an NMSU fraternity, first by Sigma Nu and then Lambda Chi Alpha, according to the NPHP form. The Cutters bought the property in the 1990s.

Foundation impact

CFSNM manages more than 300 endowments,

including 46 nonprofits and more than 35 scholarships. As a center for charitable giving, the foundation supports the arts, literacy and health, feeds the hungry and supports many other causes in the 10 counties it serves: Catron, Chaves, Doña Ana, Grant, Hidalgo, Lincoln, Luna, Otero, Sierra and Socorro.

In 2020, CFSNM awarded more than \$350,000 in grant funds; more than \$670,000 was awarded in Covid-19 response grants, including support for 38 nonprofits and 18 restaurants, with almost 3,000 individuals supported and more than 2,000 meals served; more than \$215,000 in scholarships were awarded to 295 students: 55 nonprofits were supported with grant funds; 23 new funds were opened. CFSNM's total assets were almost \$40.5 million.

More often than not, when the Bulletin produces its annual Southwest New Mexico

Legislative Guide, I'm in Santa Fe on the Monday before the legislative session starts on Tuesday.

For as long as I can remember, that Monday has fallen on Martin Luther King Jr. Day.

The holiday means traffic in the Roundhouse (the nickname for the State Capitol) is lighter than you might expect

on the eve of the session's opening day. Of course, the added effect of

a pandemic also has a big impact on the number of people in the building.

Last year, in 2021, the entire Roundhouse grounds were encircled in temporary fencing, and guarded by State Police and National Guardsmen and dogs.

The fences went up well before the session and stayed throughout. No one was granted easy access to the center of the New Mexico people's business. The precautions were in place because of the

> pandemic, but accelerated after Jan. 6, when state capitols all over the country received threats. The 2021 New Mexico

session opened Jan. 19, a day ahead of President Joe Biden's inauguration, another event that generated threats to state capitol

buildings. That created even more heightened security at the Roundhouse.

This year, I was greatly relieved to see no fencing around the State Capitol.

No fences, but still very far from normal.

There was increased security upon entry, in the form of an ID and vaccination card checkpoint, as well as a metal detector, but at least you could enter the building.

Your entry also means you put on a face mask, required

throughout the building.

No fences at Roundhouse, but a different feel

However, if you're packing anything more powerful than a Swiss Army knife, you'd better leave it at home. After years of allowing open-carry weapons in the state capitol building, that is nixed this year.

The Roundhouse Rotunda, the spacious circular lobby around which the Capitol pivots, is normally packed on Opening Day, and on most days of the sessions information tables from different groups throughout New Mexico flood the area.

This year, however, the Rotunda was empty, save for a Covid-19 testing station, another first.

You could also get tested on your walk to the Roundhouse, at a purple Mercedes Sprinter van on Old Santa Fe Trail, just off the Plaza.

Painted on the side of the van in big letters, was "Covid-19 testing," and above that, "Howdy y'all."

On crowded days at the

Roundhouse, expect long lines during the lobby checkpoint. When I went through Monday there was not much activity, but it still took longer than I thought it would.

Visitors Monday, according to a sign-in sheet, included people from Australia and Minnesota, but it was still not very crowded.

Tuesday, Opening Day, I was early enough to beat the bigger crowds, but you could tell the big buzz was coming.

Legislators were gradually coming in and entering their offices, some getting to know new staff.

Activity continues increasing until the governor's state-ofthe-state address.

Normally, the legislators save their sparring until after the speech, but in Tuesday morning's Santa Fe New Mexican, an article previewing the session included quotes from Democratic Speaker of the House

Citizens urged to get involved, seek greater transparency

The League of Women Voters supports the citizen's right to know, including adequate notice of proposed actions, holding open meetings and providing access to public records.

In 2021, misinformation (incorrect or misleading) and disinformation (deliberate attempts to mislead with false information) have been major topics of concern with numerous is-

sues. As members of the public, we can take responsibility for making sure that accurate information is readily available to us. We can do this by directly accessing public meetings and communicating with our elected representatives to hold them accountable for being transparent. Media (newspapers, TV, radio, social) can shine light on the proceedings of government, but for issues that are particularly important, there may be no substitute for first-hand observations.

We are fortunate that Doña Ana County, the City of Las Cruces, and Las Cruces Public Schools offer TV and/or online access to their meetings and post recordings on their websites for those unable to view

them live. It's not the same as being in the room during the meeting, but the recordings are particularly helpful with complex issues since segments of meetings can be viewed multiple times as needed.

Similarly, the NM Legislature has made its sessions available online. Some legislators have complained about the lack of constituent access to the Roundhouse during the pandemic, but far more of their constituents

During debate over voting reform, tune out claims of rampant fraud

Republican lawmakers in New Mexico have alleged for years that our elections are plagued by massive voter fraud. They finally had their chance

to prove it in 2011, with Susana Martinez as governor and Dianna Duran as secretary of state.

Duran was the first Republican secretary of state since E.A. Perrault in 1929. And, she came into office bound and determined to prove that claims of rampant voter fraud were real.

Enlisting the help of the State Police, they combed through seven years of voter registration records, from 2003 to 2010, and matched them against records for driver's licenses. During a legislative committee meeting in 2011, Duran announced they had found 117 people who had used foreign credentials to obtain a driver's license and were also registered to vote.

Further investigation showed the vast majority of those on the list never actually voted. For the 19 who allegedly did, there was not enough information to conclusively prove voter fraud. Even if they did vote illegally, it's 19

votes over seven years. Duran must have hoped for better than that when she set out on her laborious task. We should keep

Legislature considers a slew of election reforms proposed by Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham and Secretary of State Maggie Tolouise Oliver. GOP lawmakers will undoubtedly oppose the plan by citing voter fraud claims they have never been able to prove.

But that doesn't mean everything in the proposal is a good idea.

The plan would restore the option for a straightparty ballot, where voters can choose all Republicans or all Democrats by filling in one bubble. We should make it easier to vote, but not so easy that it's mindless.

This has nothing to do with voter suppression and everything to do with gaining a partisan advantage - not just Democrats over Republicans, but also both major parties over any third-party candidate, who would never get considered.

The plan to let 16-yearolds vote would also appear to be more for

partisan advantage than addressing any problem. It would put us out of step with federal election laws and bring a slew of new voters into the system with limited life experiences.

But, there are also some terrific proposals in the plan. Making election day a state holiday and extending early voting would allow more voters who work odd hours to participate. Expanding access and deadlines for mail-in ballots and making it easier for eligible voters to register would increase turnout without jeopardizing election security.

The plan would also restore the voting rights of convicted felons who are no longer incarcerated. Those who have completed their sentence should be allowed to fully rejoin and participate in our society.

It would be great if each proposal was voted on individually, but that's not how it usually works. I suspect this will all get lumped into one big bill.

My hope is that there will be vigorous debate in the committee process, and the more obviously partisan proposals are stripped out of the bill. Re-

have had access online, not just to listen but to provide testimony. While access to online materials remains limited in New Mexico, improvements are being made.

A good example of transparent work is the Citizens Redistricting Committee, which met with the public (in person and online) around the state in the August-October 2021 period. Through these meetings members of the public were able to voice their concerns about a hugely important issue in representative government and the committee members clearly heard those voices.

Still, there are considerable ways to improve. Viewers of the legislative sessions may not be able to see the materials under discussion. The online audience does not have the access it should have to all of the documents in the meeting room. If slides cannot be shared in realtime, they should be made available after the meeting. More staffing may be needed to assist with the process, including technology.

There are also chal-

lenges in viewing live legislative meetings that may not start at the advertised time. Some of this may be unavoidable, but schedules need to be more accurate.

The League of Women Voters of Southern New Mexico agrees with the New Mexico Foundation for Open Government (FOG) in recommending improved and standardized use of technologies to augment in-person meetings of the legislature. FOG has valuable resources for learning individual rights to transparency on their website (nmfog.org).

For those interested in monitoring legislative developments, a starting place is www.nmlegis.gov where calendars, agendas and links to meetings can be accessed. The League's tips for using the legisla-

you are a professional excavator or homeowner, you can be fined AND held financially responsible for repair costs to damaged utilities when 811 is not called. How it works:

1. Use white spray paint and/or white marker flags to mark the ground where you plan to dig.

2. Call 811 two business days before beginning your project and they will alert all of the local utilities to respond to your dig site and mark where the utility lines are buried. Utility companies will have two days, once notified, to respond to your dig site.

3. Once utilities are marked, you must adhere to the "18 inch" rule, which is no mechanical digging (tractor, auger, etc.) within 18 inches of the utility markings. If you must dig within 18 inches of a utility marking, it has to be hand dug or vacuum excavated.

4. Once all of the utilities have been marked, you will have 15 days to complete your digging project. If your project is not complete in that time frame, you must call 811 again.

The Thunderbirds' training season, ranging from November through March, is a time to inte-

grate and synchronize as a team and practice the demonstration. This year, the month-long winter training trip will take place in two locations: Spaceport America, New Mexico, and Fort Huachuca, Arizona.

LC legislators provide support to help homeless, abused horses

State Rep. Nathan Small and state Sen. Carrie Hamblen, both Las Cruces Democrats, are among those providing financial support for homeless, abused horses.

The groups Animal Protection New Mexico (APNM) and Animal Protection Voters (APV) an-

nounced the dispersal of \$153,000 in "critical state financial support for homeless and abused horses, donkeys and mules, through the Horse Shelter Rescue Fund (HSRF)" in a Jan. 13 news release.

Ten state-licensed equine shelters serve the entire state by housing hundreds of equines,

> animals who were surrendered when their families fell on hard times, along with stray, abandoned and abused equines transferred from the New Mexico Livestock Board, the two groups said.

"These shelters' work saves animals' lives, keeps communities safer and provides a service for local and state governments, all without any regular government funding, almost solely supported by donors and volunteers," the news release said.

The pandemic, the ongoing drought and the dramatic rise in hay prices have had a devastating impact on New Mexico's state-licensed horse shelters, the groups said.

Most of this supporting funds came from a line item included in Senate Bill 377 (the "junior budget") during the 2021 State legislative session, thanks to support from Small, Hamblen and state Rep. Kristina Ortez, D-Taos. Each legislator committed \$50,000 toward HSRF, resulting in a \$150,000 total appropriation for equines. The remaining amount distributed from the HSRF came from voluntary tax return check-off donations.

"I am humbled by the work the nine horse shelters that received funding

provide," Hamblen said. "They not only help these dignified creatures live a healthy and nurturing life, but also the healing they naturally provide in therapeutic environments. It's the least we could do for them given all they give in return."

In 2013, APV spearheaded the creation of HSRF, a mechanism for horse shelters to receive state funding for their crucial work.

APNM's mission is to advocate the rights of animals by affecting systemic change, resulting in the humane treatment of all animals.

Governor announces crime legislation for 2022 session

Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham was joined Jan. 13 by Attorney General Hector Balderas and others as she announced a comprehensive public safety package ahead of the legislative session. The governor's priori-

ties include:

• Imposing a "rebuttable presumption," which seeks to ensure that those accused of murder, gun crimes, rape or other sex crimes do not pose a danger to the community before being released pending trial, keeping more violent offenders off New Mexico streets.

for gun crimes, including increasing the penalty for unlawful possession of a handgun from misdemeanor to fourth-degree felony; creating a crime of "criminal threat" as a fourth-degree felony; adding penalty of third-



degree felony for fleeing that results in great bodily harm; enhancing penalties for brandishing a firearm in the commission of a drug transaction.

In December, state Sen. Joseph Cervantes of Las Cruces, who is chair of the Senate Judiciary Committee, said the governor's anti-crime legislation is

in response to an increase in violent crime in Albuquerque that is also "now present in Las Cruces," he said, and calls for "aggressive action."

An increase in violent crime in the state, he said, has contributed to a slower population growth in New Mexico than in surrounding states.

The governor is also supporting public safety in New Mexico through a recommendation for nearly 20 percent raises for State Police officers and the creation of a \$100 million fund to be used to recruit, train and hire law enforcement at departments around the state.

Community college expands nursing program to Sunland Park

Doña Ana Community College (DACC) will expand its nursing program to residents and students in southern Doña Ana County at the Sunland Park Center, 3365 McNutt Road in Sunland Park, DACC said in a news release.

The center recently received approval from the New Mexico Board of Nursing to expand the program, DACC said. Students enrolled in the nursing program at Sunland Park will be able to receive hybrid instruction, including online distance learning and in-person clinicals.

Beginning in the fall of 2022, DACC will offer instruction for students as

part of the DACC Nursing Career Ladder Program, which offers licensed practical nurse (LPN) certificates and registered nurse (RN) degrees.

"There is a great need for a nursing program in our south county area," said DACC Nursing Program Director Cynthia Olivas. "Our Espina campus is nearly 40 miles away from those in the Sunland Park area and this allows us to meet the needs for so many more students."

DACC also recently received approval from the Texas Board of Nursing to allow students to complete clinical training in El Paso.

DACC to receive \$200.000 in scholarships

DACC also announced that it will receive \$100,000 in scholarships for the Woody and Gayle Hunt Family Foundation. With a match from the Jon Wynne scholarship endowment at the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico, DACC will receive a total of \$200,000 to be disbursed to community college students in increments in four years.

Eligible students for the scholarships must be from Doña Ana County, particularly high-school graduates from the Gadsden Independent School District, DACC said in a

news release. Students must also have a declared major in business, information systems, health and public services or technical studies.

"This grant has shown to have a great impact on our students who receive the scholarship," DACC President Mónica Torres said.

"Between the years of 2013 and 2021, 80 percent of our Hunt Family Foundation scholarship students have had successful outcomes at DACC by either earning certificates or associate degrees or by continuing their education," Torres added.

The Hunt Family Foundation is a nonprofit in the El Paso region that supports efforts that create

Special education omsbud sought for Las Cruces, Gadsden, Hatch school districts

New Mexico's new ombudsman for special education is seeking volunteers in all 89 New Mexico school districts including Las Cruces Public Schools, the Gadsden Independent School District and Hatch Valley Public Schools in Doña Ana County - to make sure every student needing special education services has an ally to help navigate the system, the New Mexico Public **Education Department** (NMPED) said in a news release.

"One person cannot do this for the entire state," said Michelle Tregembo, who was hired in June to run the one-person Office

ders Council (NMDDC). "We would love to have a volunteer ombud in every New Mexico school district so we could serve as the coordinating and training hub."

The office, which officially opened last month, and the council were established by legislation passed by the New Mexico Legislature in 2021.

Previously, special education students and fami-

lies relied on a network of advocacy organizations to help them request services, negotiate individual educational plans (IEP) and raise concerns on behalf of a special needs child. the NMPED release said

"This is a huge step forward to better serving our students with special needs," NMPED Secretary Kurt Steinhaus said. "While the ombud's office is not housed within NMPED, we consider her work part of our mission and will do everything we can to promote and support it. For starters, we are encouraging districts and special education directors to get involved and help recruit volunteers for this program."

The council plans to recruit regional directors, hire more staff and train volunteers with a goal of having an advocate in each district, said NMDDC Director Alice Liu McCoy.

"We're developing a very rigorous training certification program," McCoy said.

The only requirement to volunteer as a school district ombudsman is a desire to help special needs students and their families and a flexible schedule to attend IEP meetings, the release said.

"It could be anyone. It could be a parent. It could be a retired teacher. It might also be younger people who are interested in getting into education,"

said Tregembo, a former vice principal of Volcano Vista High School in Albuquerque with 25 years' experience in special education.

In 2020, students with disabilities made up 15 percent of state graduates and they had the lowest graduation rate of any group at 66.4 percent, NMPED said.

The special education ombud serves as an independent advocate and watchdog for public school students and provides comprehensive support for families navigating the special education system.

Duties include ensuring that students and parents receive complete and accurate information about the student's rights, adequate services to meet the student's needs and timely responses when they raise questions or express concerns.

Students with disabilities were one of five student groups identified in a 2018 ruling in the Martinez-Yazzie consolidated lawsuit on education equity.

Nearly 300 special education teaching positions statewide remained vacant at the start of the 2021-22 school year, along with 280 vacancies for special education assistants, according to an analysis by New Mexico State University in September.

That represents 28 percent of all teacher vacancies this fall.







Share the news on your website and on your social media accounts like what Lorie Brown did. She saw a huge need to support nurses and healthcare practitioners during this crisis and created the Covid-19 Survival Guide.

She asked us to help her create a multi-guest interview series that delivers daily videos to subscribers, all for free.

6) Ditch out-of-date information and broken links.

It's the perfect time to step back and take a long hard look at your website. Are there any typos? Did

a team member featured on the About Us page quit? Are certain articles no longer relevant?

Maybe your site is too far outdated and needs a complete overhaul. Don't try to go it alone, it's best to hire a professional web development firm who can assist in ensuring your site is professionally done to give your business the best exposure once this crisis is over.

7) Lighten the (remote) workload.

Give your staff easy ways to track their hours like the free time-tracking tool Toggl that we use. Encourage team communication with tools like Zoom, Slack or Discord. Look into team collaboration tools like Monday and Asana to manage project workflows. You can see more team

As we begin a new year, we still have plenty of work ahead of us to help New Mexico communities recover and to rebuild our economy. But I'm confident that the historic, new investments that we passed last year and the transformative policies we're still advancing will help us meet the moment with real solutions to the challenges we face. I have done everything in my power to steer resources to our state so we can rebuild our economy and come back stronger than ever before.

The American Rescue Plan that we passed in March delivered over \$1 billion to help New Mexico's schools reopen for in-person instruction. It included \$1,400 in direct payments to eligible New Mexicans, millions of dollars in critical economic relief for local restaurants and small business owners across our state, and a historic working class tax cut. Nearly every child in New Mexico has benefitted from the expanded Child Tax Credit and

its new monthly payments that helped families keep food on the table and cover the costs of raising children.

New Mexico has long been held back by a systemic lack of investment in our infrastructure. That's why I worked to pass the historic Bipartisan Infrastructure Law that will deliver more than \$3.7 billion in funding to New Mexico over the next five years to build new roads and bridges, improve our clean water infrastructure, install a new electric vehicle charging network, and connect many more

I-40, and they will set a strong foundation for long-term economic competiveness and success. Before the onset of the

pandemic, outdoor recreation activities—from hunting and fishing to wildlife photography —were fueling some of New Mexico's fastest economic growth. I am focused on advancing key protections, opening up more public access, and steering new investments to our public lands so we can build our outdoor recreation industry back better than ever before.

Last year alone, the newly

established National Parks and Public Land Legacy Restoration Fund that I fought to establish as part of the bipartisan Great American Outdoors Act delivered \$60 million to New Mexico's national parks, monuments, forests, and wildlife refuges. That includes more than \$15 million for the Bosque del Apache to make repairs to its roads and trails and finally take on long-needed major renovations to its main office and visitor center. New Mexico's national forests-including the Gila and the Lincolnreceived \$12 million to replace roads and bridges, restore trail networks, and rebuild campgrounds.

Last year, I also welcomed a new expanded hiking access route into Achenbach Canyon in the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument. I reintroduced the M.H. Dutch Salmon Greater Gila Wild

and Scenic Rivers Act to provide southwestern New Mexico's greater Gila River watershed with our nation's highest form of protection and stewardship. And I also partnered with Republican colleagues in the Senate to introduce bipartisan bills to invest in wildlife conservation and species recovery and to make it easier to navigate the permitting process to access our public lands.

Finally, I was proud to support New Mexico's military installations and national security missions by securing critical investments in the annual National Defense Authorization Act. That includes \$2 million in funding to speed the construction of a new radar detection technology testing facility at Holloman Air Force Base, \$5 million to conduct additional hypersonic test and evaluation at White Sands Missile Range, and \$29 million

to accelerate construction of the Missile Assembly Support Facility at WSMR. These provisions, among many others, will benefit New Mexico's economy and advance our state's position as a leader in national security for years to come.

My office also continues to help constituents on a one-on-one basis with federal agencies, including keeping our promise to our veterans and service members so they can access their VA benefits, helping small business owners navigate economic relief programs, and assisting seniors with their Social Security benefits. This past year, my staff processed over 3,000 individual cases that resulted in over \$870,000 recovered for New Mexicans. The pros and cons of a flexible work schedule post-Covid

ow, as more people get vaccinated and the world reopens, many businesses are trying to learn from all of the changes they had to make during 2020. The future of work post-pandemic is unique, with many businesses remaining 100% remote or adopting a more hybrid approach than they had at the beginning of last year

The Covid-19 pandemic impacted work in ways that nobody saw coming. Millions of people lost their jobs either temporarily or permanently as companies closed for good, shut down for the time being or trimmed back their workforce. Other employees were forced to create at-home work setups without advance warning, figuring out how to work full-time while the rest of the family, kids and pets included, were also stuck in the house. And many had to continue going into work, performing on the front lines as grocery store clerks and medical professionals, constantly exposing themselves to the threat of the virus.

As with anything, there are pros and cons to these changes. Let's explore them.

Pro: Employees Have More Options to Take Care of Themselves Post-COVID, employers are setting up support to better protect employees, especially as the health crisis continues to impact us all. This support strives to help and improve all areas of an employee's health, including mental, physical and financial well-being. Examples of enhanced support offered by employers include:

- Child care help
- Community relief funds
- Financial aid
- Flexible hours of operation
- Improved sick leave
- No-cost community services

A big part of this involves creating schedules and systems that allow employees to be flexible so they can care for themselves and their families while still taking care of their job responsibilities and being productive.

Con: You (Probably) Can't Hire Employees From Just Anywhere

If you've decided that your company is still going to have in-person meetings or other types of work gatherings, you can't have employees who are dispersed around the country or world...or even the state, probably. If employees are required to attend live meetings, breakout groups or other types of business gatherings, they have to live within a reasonable



distance to travel there.

However, if you're set on hiring remote workers from farther away – which is a great way to dip into a larger pool of talent – you can consider letting them virtually attend meetings. You can also set up satellite groups if there are a number of remote workers in the same geographic area.

Pro: Gig Work is More Popular Than Ever

During the pandemic, all sorts of workers lost their jobs, and contractors were no different. Furthermore, some of those who lost traditional jobs opted to go the gig industry work, becoming contractors and freelancers who offered the skills they honed during their time as traditional workers.

While a number of organizations reduced their

contractor budget midpandemic, those budgets have started to open up again - and for some companies, they've even grown. Plus, companies love working with contractors because they offer an ideal combination of professionalism and flexibility. Contractors tend to be experts in their field, and companies can hire them without offering them business tools, office space, a salary, etc. That means that post-Covid, gig workers may have even more opportunities than they did before the pandemic.

Con: A Majority of Jobs Cannot Be Performed Remotely

According to McKinsey and Company, only 20-25 percent of workforces in advanced economies are able to work from home between three and five davs a week without a loss of productivity. While this is around five times more remote work than pre-pandemic and about the same as remote work during the pandemic, it's possibly much less than people assume. For job seekers who feel that any and every industry, company and brand is now adopting full-time remote work, they'll be sorely disappointed as they begin hunting for their next opportunity.

Furthermore, some types of jobs that can technically be handled remotely are still more effective when done in person. For example, brainstorming with the rest of the team, making critical decisions for the company and providing difficult-to-deliver feedback in a sensitive way are all best when done in person.

Pro: Flexible Work is More Enjoyable for Employees

It's pretty obvious why flexible work is more enjoyable for most employees. They can do things like set their own schedule, attend to personal and family matters and run out for errands when they want to (assuming that type of flexibility is okay with the employer). When employees are given deliverables to work for instead of strict schedules to adhere to, many of them will be able to turn in excellent work without risking burnout or getting complacent at their job.

For some companies, the idea of having employees work simply to work, regardless of their actual workload or level of efficiency, is an antiquated idea. And when employees can run their life while remaining dedicated to their job, they're happier overall, which means higher-quality work is turned in.

Cons: The Boundaries Can Get Fuzzy

Of course, there's an equal and opposite issue to the benefit described above: All of that flexibility can leave the lines between professionalism and flexibility blurry. If you require employees to clock in, clock out and be present during specific work hours, you'll have to find a way to ensure they're doing just that – otherwise, some may take advantage of their supposed freedom. And setting deliverables instead of work hours means that employees actually have to deliver quality work on time, checking in as the project progresses to report the work they've done. This can require a lot of work on the part of the business to create, set up and explain the flexible rules, what they don't mean and how everything will be tracked.

Highest priority was given to proposals that clearly articulated the planned impact of their efforts, as well as the metrics by which the impact is measured.

Eligible expenses included computer equipment, internet access expenses, printers/supplies, cameras, software subscriptions, etc. needed to successfully provide services to organization's clientele.

This funding opportunity was received very warmly with an unexpected return of over 25 applications from nonprofit organizations, churches, and coalitions. Just one example of an application that was submitted included a request for an organization to start a new program focused on at-risk youth in their community. The youth would have access to a studio where they could express their creativity by creating videos. By creating together, the youth will be empowered, learn to work together and be provided the space access to technology that would not be found

at home. The technology will also be utilized to assist with accessing homework, information on scholarships, workforce positions, and college applications.

The 2021 Technology fund will contribute to the United Way of Southwest New Mexico's goal of helping bridge needs with resources and solutions— specifically related to, basic needs, education, and financial stability for under-served communities in Southwest New Mexico.

Throughout Hispanic Heritage Month, the USHCC was named the official partner of Grubhub's Donate the Change program, which has raised tens of millions of dollars for organizations in need since launching in late 2018. Let's keep it local, New Mexico

ood ideas often start in your own backyard. Almost two decades before our legislature passed a statewide clean indoor air law, the City of Albuquerque implemented smoke-free air policies to protect residents from secondhand smoke in all workplaces. The importance of local leadership is still clear: many cities moved more quickly than states to prevent the spread of Covid-19 by implementing stay-at-home orders, closing non-essential businesses and public parks.

"Local governments are uniquely positioned to meet the needs of the people in their communities. They should be able to pass laws proven to promote good health, well-being and equity, and New Mexicans agree," says Dr. Robert Taylor, President of the American Heart Association board of directors in Albuquerque. The American Heart Association (AHA) believes the ongoing epidemic of e-cigarette use by teenagers can be effectively addressed by cities and counties. This is a serious public health crisis that has spread to every high and middle school in New Mexico."Big Vape" and "Big Tobacco" have addicted a new generation of youth to nicotine and continue to do so unabated as the country is focused on the Covid-19 pandemic.



The tobacco industry spends almost \$37 million annually on advertising in New Mexico, resulting in \$844 million in annual spending from smokingrelated illnesses (\$222.8 million through Medicaid). Corporate lobbyists have spent millions more to convince state legislators to stop communities from passing policies that protect the health of their residents.

A 2020 American Heart Association-commissioned public opinion poll found 63 percent of New Mexico voters support communities being able to regulate tobacco locally. This poll was conducted by Brian Sanderoff of Research and Polling Inc.The American Heart Association wants everyone to benefit from smart and effective policies. But when corporate lobbyists convince state legislators to block local governments from passing laws, it can hurt communities most where the need is greatest.

Nearly 25 percent of New Mexico high school students use e-cigarettes and 700 youth become new daily smokers each year. Each year, 2,600 New Mexican adults die from smoking and 40,000 kids now under 18 in New Mexico will ultimately die prematurely from smoking. A new research conducted by AHA shows using E-cigarettes damage arteries and blood vessels among young adults. To learn more about the study, go online and use this link:


movie review by JAY BOBBIN **'Taxi Driver' remains a powerful ride**

Certain movie-character names stand as immediate identifiers of what the person and film are all about, and Travis Bickle is one of them.

Any remotely familiar with motion pictures will recognize that as Robert De Niro's role director Martin Scorsese's searing 1976 drama "Taxi Driver," which currently is streaming on Netflix. The Paul Schrader-written story of a disenfranchised loner who finds acceptance through unusual means has retained its power, painting a haunting portrait of the New York era while telling the tale of one man's very specific journey.

Bickle finds work as the late-shift cabbie of the title, and he has definite thoughts about the social decay he sees around him, underscored visually (and brilliantly, by cinematographer Michael Chapman) by the steam that rises from the street grates, create a sort of curtain over the city. His hopes for something better are personified by an attractive political-campaign worker (Cybill Shepherd) who is somewhat bemused, and ultimately turned off, by his efforts to court her.

Soon, though, Bickle finds another purpose in Iris (Jodie Foster), a young prostitute he envisions rescuing from that occupation. Turning himself into her avenging angel of sorts, he changes his physical appearance, fashioning his hair into a mohawk ... and



moving toward turning his increasingly violent fantasies into reality. Bickle's resistance to being questioned is crystallized by his iconic line, "You talkin' to me?"

In a decade of upheaval that was filled with movies that questioned authority, "Taxi Driver" was one of the most disturbing examples, particularly coming from a major studio (Columbia Pictures). It undoubtedly went a long way toward establishing Scorsese's career and it surely centered De Niro as a versatile performer, coming as it did on the heels of his Oscar win as the young Don Corleone in "The Godfather, Part II." 

'Optimist of the Decade' Jack Barclay still going strong at 85


"Somebody has to do it,' that's my motto," said long-time Las Cruces Optimist Club member and community volunteer Jack Barclay. "If there's nobody else to do it, then I will."

Barclay, 85, went to his first Optimist Club meeting with the late Terry Edwards and joined the club more than 30 years ago. He's been club president and district lieutenant governor, and he is the district-governor elect, taking that position next Oct. 1, with responsibility for club building and organizing district conferences throughout New Mexico and El Paso County. As governor, he also wants to sponsor an international Optimist Club in a foreign country to be selected next year.

The Las Cruces Optimist Club is one of the best and largest in the state, Barclay said, and he's been a big part of the club's success. In 2021, for example, Barclay sold and delivered about 250 poinsettias - about one-quarter of the club's total sales during its annual holiday fundraiser. That's just one reason the club voted Barclay Optimist of the Decade in December

He also has volunteered for KRWG-TV for many years and was active in Toastmasters for two decades. Barclay also has a long history as a local Boy Scout leader. He also helps to raise and lower the flag at Veterans Memorial Park in Las Cruces on federal holidavs.

Barclay's grandfather, John Archibald Barclay I, was born in Scotland and stowed away on a tramp steamer at a very young age. He landed in New York and became a newspaper editor and business owner, Jack Barclay said. Jack's father, John A. Barclay II, graduated from the U.S. Military Academy and became commanding officer at Redstone Arsenal in Huntsville, Alabama, where Wernher von Braun led the U.S. Army's rocketry development program.

Jack Barclay served in the 163rd Infantry Battalion, and marched in President Dwight Eisenhower's first inaugural parade in 1953.

Born in Boston, Massachusetts, Jack Barclay lived in Panama and in China growing up. He earned a bachelor of science degree from The Citadel in 1961 and came to Las Cruces that same year to begin work as a chemist at White Sands Missile Range. Barclay earned a second BS, this time in Hotel. Restaurant and Tourism Management from New Mexico State University, where he also earned a BA in economics. Barclay has been a financial planner, a computer programmer and analyst at NMSU, president of Barclay Beatty Brewing, Inc. and general manager of Old Mesilla Pastry Café during a long career.

Now, Barclay is "more or less retired," he said. "I don't think I'll ever retire completely," he said.

A stroke three years ago left Barclay with a slight limp but hasn't slowed him down. He and his service dog, Honey, a rescue, can be seen doing good works all over Las Cruces. "I'll never quit," Barclay said.

searches for ancestral lands and Black futures through the creation of projects that include acts of research, resilience, resistance collecting and

ritual," Sage said. "Especially exciting to me is the project 'Stages of Tectonic Blackness: Blackdom,' a collaborative piece by Nikesha Breeze, Miles Tokunow and Lazarus Letcher," Sage said.

It will be performed on opening night "in and around their mixed-media installation and two-channel film which presents a scored durational dance and elongated mourning rituals for Black bodies that was originally performed on the ruins of



Blackdom, New Mexico," Sage said.

"Founded in 1902 (in Chaves County, about 18 miles south of Roswell) and abandoned by the mid-1920s, Blackdom was created as a 'Black-utopia' focused on Black freedom. land stewardship and education," Sage said. "As part of this work, Breeze, a direct descendent of Blackdom, worked with UAM staff to research. find and interview other descendants of Blackdom who are scattered throughout the United States. The recorded oral histories will be integrated into the final interactive installation to be presented during Breeze's UAM exhibition opening.

"Remembered Landscapes: The Sacred Space of Home, a multimedia installation" by Las Cruces artist Mitchell Edwards, "reveals an elongated poetic search for home and healing through material and spiritual relationships with nature and landscape," Sage said. This exhibition will take place in UAM's Mullennix Bridge Gallery and will remain on view until March 5.

"This new body of work by Mitchell Edwards was inspired by artist Breeze's 2020 call for BIPOC artists to create metaphorical tools," Sage said. "Hand Tools of Resilience," an international juried exhibition, "invited artists to examine the conscious and unconscious tools that BIPOC have created to survive, thrive and build within oppressive

and abusive systems. Breeze's call sparked a deeper, more focused research on the power of ritual objects within Mitchell Edwards's greater practice and the results are witnessed in this powerful installation. Mitchell Edwards's own journey as a Black woman in the African Diaspora (a term that refers to the descendants of Africans shipped to the Americas via the Atlantic slave trade) focuses on the primacy of the study of nature and other spiritual traditions."

Like Breeze, Mitchell Edwards "uses ritual and remembrance when creating talismanic healing objects that protect and guide one's way back to their ancestral home," Sage said. "This immersive installation includes abstract paintings, altars, collage, assemblage, talismans and amulets. Crystals and minerals, bones, shells, seeds and roots from desert trees form an archive and landscape of materials used in rituals and presented to viewers by Mitchell Edwards as sacred objects that create and hold her ancestral home. Mitchell Edwards's ritual objects connect her to an ancient story defined by strength, beauty, resilience and spiritual transcendence passed down through generations across the African Diaspora," Sage said.

The themes of resilience, vulnerability,



Illinois and Connecticut, beginning in 1917, who contracted radiation poisoning from painting watch dials with luminous paint.

"In 1926, radium was a miracle cure, Madame Curie an international celebrity, and luminous watches the latest rage until the girls who painted them began to fall ill with a mysterious disease," according to a synopsis of the play at www.dramaticpublishing.com. "Inspired by a true story, 'Radium Girls' traces the efforts of Grace Fryer, a dial painter, as she fights for her day in court. Her chief adversary is her former employer, Arthur Roeder, an idealistic man who cannot bring himself to believe that the same element that shrinks tu-

mors could have anything to do with the terrifying rash of illnesses among his employees. As the case goes on, however, Grace finds herself battling not just with the U.S. Radium Corporation, but with her own family and friends, who fear that her campaign for justice will backfire."

"I was drawn to this play because it's a part of history that is not talked about much," Gieb said. "Though there was a lot of press coverage at the time, you will hardly read about it in history books. This is an important story that needs to be told. These women suffered. not only physically, but they also had to fight to even have their illness recognized and to make a significant change in how

employers protect their employees from dangerous conditions. These women, some as young as 15, were taken advantage of by a big corporation. This is a true David and Goliath-type story."

An exhibit about the incarceration of Japanese Americans following the Dec. 7, 1941, attack on Pearl Harbor will open Saturday, Jan. 22, at Branigan Cultural Center (BCC), 401 N. Main St., the City of Las Cruces said in a news release. The exhibit will continue through April 2.

"Righting a Wrong: Japanese Americans and World War II," a Smithsonian traveling exhibition, "examines the complicated history and impact of Executive Order 9066," the news release said. The order was signed by President Franklin Roosevelt Feb. 19, 1942, authorizing the U.S. War Department to designate certain areas as

military zones, "clearing the way for the incarceration of nearly all 120,000 Japanese Americans during the war," according to Wikipedia. "Two-thirds of them were U.S. citizens, born and raised in the United States."

A coordinating exhibit, "Bound in New Mexico," examines the four incarceration camps located in Lordsburg, Santa Fe, Fort Stanton and Old Raton Ranch in New Mexico, the

city news release said.

"Embracing themes that are as relevant today as they were 75 years ago, "Righting a Wrong' looks at immigration, prejudice, civil rights, heroism and what it means to be

an American," the news release said. "The exhibition explores the complex history through historical images, personal stories and objects from those incarcerated at the camps."



stallations were located west of the Mississippi River. Young and old lived crowded together in the hastily built camps, endured poor living conditions, and were under the constant watch of military guards. While at the same time, brave Japanese American men risked their lives fighting for the United States.

"Some 40 years later, members of the Japanese American community led the nation to confront the wrong it had done. Congress formally recognized that the rights of the Japanese American community had been violated and President Ronald Reagan signed the Civil Liberties Act of 1988, providing an apology and restitution to the living Japanese Americans who were incarcerated during World War II."

The exhibit was developed by the National Museum of American History and adapted for travel by the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service.

BCC is open 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and 9 a.m. through 4:30 p.m. Saturday.

Make your cannabis use more effective: Learn about terpenes

You may recall that I have mentioned Dr. Raphael Mechoulam before. He is the father of cannabinoids. Dr. M is 92 years young, very much alive in Israel and still very involved in cannabis re-

search. Dr. M, not only discovered over 100 cannabinoids in the cannabis plant, including Delta 9 THC, the most well known for its psychoactive properties. There is also Delta 8 THC, potent but less psychoactive; THCA; CBD, best known for its anti-inflammatory properties; CBG; CBN and more. Each cannabinoid has a specific effect in the medicinal value of the plant.

In his research, Dr. M also discovered terpenes and their effect on canna-

binoids. It was Dr. M who coined the phrase "the entourage effect" meaning the full spectrum use of all cannabinoids and terpenes is **HILDA LUZ** more effective when used to-The Good Herb

gether. So, what are terpenes? Terpenes are the compounds in cannabis that give the plant the aroma and flavor that also impacts how cannabis affects the user. Recommendation: Do your own research on the different cannabis strains and terpenes. Look for the ones that can serve your specific needs.

There are at least 16 terpenes in the plants and each one has a specific aroma and effect: A-Pinene, B-Carophyllene, Bisbolol, Borneol, Camphene,

Caryophyllene Oxide, Delta 3 Carene, Eucalyptol, Geraniol, Limonene, Linalool, Myrcene, Phytol, Pinene, Terpinolene, Trans-Nerolidol and Valencene.

Example: Pinene, one of my favorites, has a piney aroma and taste. It is known for its anti-inflammatory and antimicrobial properties. Linalool is known for its analgesic effects.

Keep in mind that the cannabis available today at dispensaries is not the cannabis of our youth. THC levels were lower then (3 percent to 8 percent), compared to today's THC levels (20 percent to 80 percent).

Some research suggests that higher levels of THC are not necessarily therapeutic. Too high and there can be adverse effects such as paranoia,

increased blood pressure, headaches and more serious psychotic reactions. Always use cannabis with caution ... know what you are consuming to avoid an unpleasant experience.

Micro-dosing is the recommended approach. It is safer and less expensive. Learn how many milligrams you need. The trick is to use minimal amounts daily on a consistent basis. I also recommend that you keep track of your use and your results. When smoking cannabis, vou may get immediate effects but it is difficult to gauge the milligrams you are consuming. Best to consume edibles which are labeled, by law, with exact milligrams. Begin with 3 to 5 mg and add more as needed. At this time, there is no standard dose; each person will respond differently. There

are other factors to consider, such as interactions with prescription medications. Always do your research.

In addition to microdosing, research suggests that consuming fat, black pepper and/or mango to name a few, can enhance the effects of cannabis. Next time you medicate, eat a mango or some fat: chocolate, yogurt, cheese, avocado or add black pepper to your dose. Keep track of the effects, you will be pleasantly surprised. Beginners be cautious!

Cannabis use does not have to be expensive. Smoking cannabis flower or vaping THC concentrates is most expensive. Edibles, in raw form or cooked, if used consistently in micro-doses can be more effective and less expensive, especially if

you make your own. You will need more flower if you intend to DIY. Come April 1, cannabis will be legal in New Mexico; prices will be less, as there will be more flower since there will be more cannabis growers.

In conclusion, using cannabis medicinally comes with a learning curve. It is up to you to explore and track what strains and terpenes best serve your needs and what methods are most effective and less expensive.



Cold storage company plans \$30M facility at LC industrial park

A company that is planning to make New Mexico one of its first locations for a chain of specialized refrigerated warehouses has been awarded economic assistance from the New Mexico Local Economic Development Act (LEDA) job-creation fund, the New Mexico Economic Development Department (NMEDD) announced Jan. 12.

Artico Cold Management was formed in 2021 and is planning several projects across the United States, with plans to expand into Mexico and Latin America, NMEDD said.

It specializes in the management of temperature-controlled warehouses to help agricultural producers, food manufacturers, distributors and retailers fortify the supply chain.

Artico Cold New Mexico LLC has been awarded \$600,000 in LEDA funds to help with its \$30 million, 120,000-square-foot, cold storage facility at the Las Cruces Innovation and Industrial Park (LCIIP), the news release said. The project will take 12 to 18 months to complete with an expected opening in September 2023. The com-

pany has pledged to hire up to 60 employees.

The City of Las Cruces is also pledging \$281,400 in economic assistance to the company.

The company chose southern New Mexico and Las Cruces because of its robust agricultural economy, proximity to Mexico and the international border, and the state's business climate, including the workforce and incentives, NMEDD said.

"Cold storage is in short supply across the United States, and we see the need in New Mexico for more capacity," Artico CEO Richard Taveras said. "There are significant opportunities to help producers of chiles, dairy, pecans, meats, vegetables. This is an attractive opportunity, and the LEDA investment is critical — the state and city support gets this moving and helps us get over the finish line."

"We are very fortunate to have Artico locating at LCIIP, and this will be the first new business with construction activity out there since 2017," Las Cruces City Manager Ifo Pili said.

"A lot of time and effort has been put in by the city's Economic Development Department and our partners to get here, and we'll soon see that this is the start of something big for the industrial park. We could not ask for a better business to take that first step with us because of the amount of investment and amazing job opportunities they will be creating for Las Cruces," Pili said.

In addition to state and city support, \$100,000 from the El Paso Electric New Mexico Economic Development fund has been pledged to support the project. The fund, which is administered by the Mesilla Valley Economic Development Alliance (MVEDA) and the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico, was established by El Paso Electric in connection with the corporate sale of the utility to Infrastructure Investments Fund.

MVEDA and the City of Las Cruces worked to recruit the company to Las Cruces, NMEDD said.

"Artico is not only making a significant capital investment in new facilities in LCIIP, but the operation itself will also serve as supporting infrastructure to our rich agricultural region and will also assist in attracting future valueadded agricultural interests," MVEDA President and CEO Davin Lopez said.



Looking back on the big golf stories in 2021, and then ahead into new year

There were lots of big golf stories in the past year of 2021, and here are some of the biggest in snippet form. By far the one that stunned the golfing world

was the single-car

crash on a winding road at 80 mph in Los Angeles that nearly cost Tiger Woods his life. He returned to his home in Florida after three weeks in the hospital.

Next is Jon Rahm. Just two weeks after being forced to withdraw from

(Dublin, Ohio) due to a positive Covid-19 test, having surged to a 6-shot lead after day two. Rahm won the U.S. Open at Torrey Pines in stunning

fashion with a birdiebirdie finish. He's No. 1 in the world — the best golfer on the planet!

The biggest shocker of the year was the improbable victory by 50-year-old Phil ("The Thrill") Mickelson, winning the PGA

Championship at Kiawah Island. That was Phil's sixth major, and basically his version of Nicklaus at the 1986 Masters and Woods' 2019 Masters masterpiece.

And what about Captain Steve Stricker's American team's Ryder Cup win in September, trouncing the Europeans 19-9!

As one sportswriter noted, "Not only did the U.S. win by 10 points, it battered the Euros with its youngest and most inexperienced team ever." The Ryder Cup may

stay on homeland soil for

some time to come.

Now, back to Tiger Woods, an athlete and an icon who continues to amaze and astound. Just 10 months after he almost lost his right leg in that horrendous car crash in L.A., he and his 12 year-old son Charlie played together in the PNC Championship in Orlando. Tiger cannot vet walk a full 18 holes but his golf game showed promise. Tiger and Charlie shot 57 for their final "hit-andgiggle" scramble round, with talented Charlie displaying a "chip-off-the-

ole-block" form. They finished second to John Dalv and John II. I'm predicting that Tiger will indeed play a few tournaments this year, certainly including the Open Championship at St. Andrews.

To my mind the most incredible golf score of 2021 was the 57 (14 under par) turned in by Macy Pate, a high-school sophomore in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, to win the individual title in the Central Piedmont 4-A Conference Championships. Think about it - 57!

As we go forward in

2022, the first PGA tournament of the new year, the Sentry Tournament of Champions at Kapalua in Maui, was won by Cameron Smith with a record 72-hole score of 34-under par. Jon Rahm finished second at 33 under. Smith picked up a cool \$1,476,000; Rahm a mere \$810,000. No wonder talented players fight hard to get on tour: and no wonder rival tour challengers are sprouting up around the world. Actually, the 2021-2022 "wraparound"
