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## COMMISSION PROCLAIMS JUNETEENTH IN DOÑA ANA COUNTY

Juneteenth, short for “June Nineteenth” is a nationally recognized day that marks the day when federal troops arrived in Galveston, Texas in 1865 to take control of the state and ensure freedom for Texas’ 250,000 enslaved people. The troops’ arrival came two and a half years after the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation, which proclaimed freedom for all places under Confederate control.

Originally “Jubilee Day”, was the celebration of newly freed Black people, slavery was not formally abolished until the adoption of the 13th Amendment in December of 1865. For decades, Juneteenth celebrations have been celebrated in Texas. The State of New Mexico was the 19th state to recognize “Juneteenth Freedom Day” in 2006, and on June 17, 2021, it officially became a federal holiday.

The Commission encourages all residents of Doña Ana County to speak out against injustice and racial discrimination, in any of its forms and help our society overcome it.

The Commission also invites everyone to celebrate this holiday and support our community, creating awareness about our history and reflecting on ways to overcome the legacy of slavery by recognizing people who have been victims of racism and hate. Let us honor them by being an inclusive society in which everyone is treated with dignity, has equal access to education, healthcare, shelter, and opportunities.

This year, in honor of Juneteenth, NMSU will hold a celebration to “Educate. Liberate. Commemorate,” highlighting organizers’ aim to honor past generations of Black leaders and activists who fought to overcome racial injustices while emphasizing the need to carry on the movement to achieve equality.

The Branigan Cultural Center, NM Music Commissioner Derrick Lee, the Doña Ana County NAACP, and Doña Ana Arts Council present the second annual “New Mexico Juneteenth Jazz Arts Festival” from Tuesday, June 14 through Sunday, June 19. 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# Juneteenth speaker: Look back to build on 'past knowledge'

Look back, look forward, don't look away.

That will be the topic of NMSU Associate Provost Patrick Turner's keynote address at the Juneteenth banquet Saturday, June 18, at the Las Cruces Convention Center.

"We have to look back at the people who have come before (and) build on past knowledge," said Turner, who grew up in a single-parent home in an all-Black neighborhood in

Birmingham, Alabama.

It is also important to look to the future, he said, and ask, "Where are we going?" and "How do we

get to a better place?"

"What I don't want you to do is look away," Turner said. "If you look away, you don't see my pain, my struggle."

Americans had become desensitized to violence and police brutality, Turner said, until the May 25, 2020, murder of George

Floyd by a Minneapolis police officer. Because the murder happened during the enforced isolation of Covid-19 and was videotaped and seen by millions on television and social media, people could not look away, he said.

"It rattled something in us," Turner said. People were forced to "sit here and look at this and feel the pain and anger. They couldn't run away from it."

The incident raised awareness of violence against Black people, he said, and brought forward

many people who are not Black but "want to be allies."

To be an ally, he said, means finding "the way you can do it best — however it resonates with you."

That could be anything from becoming involved in policy change to participating in dance art.

In every case, Turner said, it means taking a risk.

"You can't be an ally from a safe position," he said. "Allies are on the front row."

"It's going to take all of

us," he said, "everybody from any walk of life protesting ... from all around the world."

Turner did not have a white teacher until he attended Kentucky State University (KYSU). He sat in the back of his classes, Turner said, and felt inferior to white students, thinking they would not understand what it was like to grow up in a public housing project in a crime-infested neighborhood.

"However, through

The Las Cruces City Council has proclaimed Sunday, June 19, 2022, as Juneteenth Day in Las Cruces.

In its proclamation, the city said it “stands in solidarity with the Doña Ana County NAACP.” Juneteenth “honors the victories of the past and celebrates the absolute equality of all people, even as we acknowledge that the personal rights and freedoms of people of color remain under attack,” the proclamation said.

Doña Ana County NAACP President Bobbie Green said the city has been “a longtime supporter of the NAACP. They always step up to the plate.”

In addition to other

Juneteenth events, Green said Black churches in Las Cruces will hold Juneteenth programs on Sunday, June 19.

She invited the community to attend services to “experience the beauty, the music, the power of the

church.”

Green said the theme of this year’s Juneteenth celebration is “Always Fighting Forward.”

The Doña Ana County Commission also proclaimed Juneteenth Day in the county.

music, dance and mentorship, I was voted the first Mr. Kentucky State University, held a leadership role in the Student Government Association (SGA), was elected vice president of the band and served as the drum major during my final year at the university,” Turner said. “Things I could have never imagined for myself.

“That is why I advocate for students finding their voice through whatever talents they possess,” Turner said. “That allows them to be seen, heard and appreciated, in addition to building self-confidence, which will transfer to other aspects of their lives. Visibility is an invaluable experience to a

population of people who are often silenced, rendered invisible by society, and not allowed to thrive, but only to survive.”

Turner continued his academic career, earning bachelor’s and master’s degrees and becoming a

professor and administrator in Georgia State University’s J. Mack Robinson College of Business. He also earned a Ph.D. in educational leadership.

Because he wanted to “experience what it meant to be ‘the other,’” Turner moved to Helena, Montana in 2015 to become director of support services and the only Black member of the University of Montana-Helena College faculty and staff. The school had approximately four Black students among a total student population of 1,400, Turner said.

“What can they learn from me?” he wondered. “What can I learn from them?”

“It was an experience,” Turner said. “It opened up my eyes.”

Turner became “intentionally invested in

the community” in Bozeman, he said, attending rodeos and fairs and going on hunting trips with students and faculty. He also explained repeatedly “why we should have the Black experience” to support all students at Helena-UM, Turner said.

“In order to reach me, you’ve got to learn to see me first,” he said.

After three years at MSU, Turner was mentally exhausted.

“I felt welcome,” he said. “I never felt like I belonged.”

That changed when Turner came to Las Cruces in December 2018, he said.

Within six months, “I felt this connection to this place,” he said.

As associate provost for student success, Turner brought more than 20 years of academic experi-

ence to NMSU, along with a passion for dance, music and the arts. He played trumpet in elementary school and high school, attended KSU on a band scholarship, and, at age 18, began secretly taking ballet classes at the YMCA.

“I hid it forever until I got comfortable enough to say, ‘I want to dance,’” Turner said.

He danced for two decades with Ballethnic Dance Co. and Festival Ballet, both in suburban Atlanta. He was also a dance teacher, choreographer and artistic director, and became a personal trainer.

Turner also got the opportunity to perform during the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, work with actress Debbie Allen and train with Jimmy Locust, the choreographer of Janet

Jackson’s Rhythm Nation. He has performed principal roles in more than 100 ballets, including “Swan Lake,” “Nutcracker,” “Peter Pan,” “Alice in Wonderland” and “Le Corsaire.”

Turner’s experience on stage — in fact, his whole lived experience — has helped him to “be comfortable with being uncomfortable,” he said. That’s part of his message to NMSU students, especially freshmen:

“The more I expose myself, eventually it turns out to be something amazing.”

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## Black brought cowboy rhyme and reason

Baxter Black died last Friday, June 10.

His newspaper column, "On the Edge of Common Sense," ran here in the Bulletin for many years. It ran in as many as 100 other newspapers at various times and was always one of our most popular features.

Black grew up in Las Cruces, where his father was dean of New Mexico State University's agriculture college. He earned his veterinary degree from Colorado State University after beginning his studies at NMSU.

The only thing Black enjoyed as much as working with animals was writing about them, and the men and women who take care of them.

Although he wrote about all animals, including llamas, birds and rattlesnakes – as well as the bulls he used to ride as a young

rodeo cowboy -- Black tended to focus on cows, horses and dogs.

He also wrote quite a bit about the human animal, and all its idiosyncrasies, inadequacies and hypocrisies.

Black gained national exposure for nearly 20 years as a weekly commentator on National Public Radio's Morning Edition. That's how I first encountered Black, when I was living in Ar-

kansas in the early 1990s. His 3-minute segments offered insight, education and, often, belly laughs.

When I joined the Bulletin in 2010, I was happy our weekly newspaper was carrying the weekly column, and everywhere I went, people wanted to talk about Baxter Black. Most were big fans, and liked to recount the laughs they got from a recent Baxter column. He did have a

few detractors, though, and occasionally people told me Black was "out of touch," or "annoying."

Regardless, many people found Black nothing but a delight.

I met him a couple of times and watched him perform his poetry, once at a Cowboys for Cancer Research Dinner Dance here in Las Cruces.

He had a bull rider's build, short and spry, with a certain twinkle in his eye. His look was pure cowboy, with the hat, boots, Western shirt, usually a bandanna around his neck, and a big, thick mustache suitable for catching coffee and beans around a wagon train campfire. He also had a cowboy's humility, manners and generosity.

Black died at 77 with leukemia and symptoms of dementia, but kept writing his column through last December. His final piece ran in the Bulletin on the last day of 2021 and, fittingly, lionized the beauty, value and companionship of a good horse.

"I like living someplace where a horse matters." Black used that line to open, and close, that last column.

He spent the last years of his life in Arizona, on a ranch near Benson on a street called Red

## NM voters changed bail system for good reason

The old system of cash bonds that was in place before voters passed a constitutional amendment in 2016 reforming the bail system was not equal justice under the law.

It included a schedule that set the amount of bond for each offense. Those who could pay the bond stayed out of jail; those who couldn't pay the bond went to jail.

Let's say a big company held a party where folks had too much to drink and then drove off. On the way home, the company

president, manager and janitor all get arrested for the same offense. The president pays the bond and never notices the money that's missing. The manager pays the bond, but has to cancel the family vacation to do so.

The janitor goes to jail. Our county jails were filled with people who had yet to be convicted of anything.

Prosecutors and community leaders began complaining soon after the reform was passed that it went too far. And last year, Gov.

Michelle Lujan Grisham joined them. She supported legislation co-sponsored by Democratic Sen. Linda Lopez that would change the burden of proof required to keep people in jail before a conviction.

It involves the legal theory of rebuttable presumption, which means a judge goes into a case with the presumption that Side A will prevail unless Side B is able to provide enough evidence to change that presumption.

Under the 2016 law, rebuttable presumption is on the side of defendants. Lopez's bill would have changed that for those charged

with serious violent crimes or who committed crimes while on parole or probation. And, maybe that makes sense. Any new law should be reviewed after a few years to see if changes are needed.

But, the 2016 constitutional amendment is not the cause for a worsening crime problem in Las Cruces. And, tweaking the bail system will not solve what is an incredibly complex problem being faced by communities throughout the country.

During a recent City Council

Here are a couple of lines he wrote in a poem called, "I Know You'll Miss This Man," a tribute to a cowboy gone on to "the ranch he's always dreamed of and never knew he'd find."

It goes, in part, like this.  
 "And heaven for a cowboy is just what you might expect,  
 It's horses that need tunin' up and heifers that need checked.  
 It's long rides with a purpose and a code that lights the way  
 And a satisfying reason to get up every day."  
 We thank you, Bax, for common-sense facts, born of farming and ranching grit.  
 And we'll carry a grin, from now 'til the end, from your cowboy wisdom and wit.

meeting, Police Chief Miguel Dominguez, Mayor Ken Miyagishima and business leaders all pointed the finger at bail reform as being the root of all evil. That grossly oversimplifies the problem.

Business owners have raised valid concerns that need to be addressed. Peo-

ple committing acts of vandalism should be arrested, and customers should be able to feel safe and secure when doing business at local stores.

Police and courts clearly have an important role to play in solving the problem, and judges should take these cases seriously. But we can't go back to the bad old days when poor people languished in county jail for crimes they

had not been convicted of.

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# Latest state education report has some disturbing numbers

The League of Women Voters believes that education is the foundation for a strong and viable democracy. All students should be respected and safe in learning environments that value diverse cultures.

In July 2018, District Court Judge Sarah Singleton issued a decision and order in the Martinez/Yazzie lawsuit, finding that New Mexico had failed to comply with its constitutional mandate to provide a sufficient education for children. As part of its response, the New Mexico Public Education Department recently released the Discussion Draft of an Ac-

tion Plan.

Data included in the PED Action Plan are disturbing. Approximately 73 percent of the state's entire student population are reported as being economically disadvantaged. In 2019, 25 percent of Native American students tested proficient in reading and 12 percent in math.

The percentage of English learners on track toward achieving English proficiency within five years decreased from 40

percent in 2018 to 29 percent in 2019. The four-year high school graduation rate for students with disabilities was 66.4 percent in 2020.

The PED document describes numerous funding and non-monetary supports, programs and resources for teachers and for students who are economically disadvantaged, Native American, English learners, have diverse abilities or are preschoolers. Community schools are an evidence-based strategy for increasing student success.

The PED also reports that it has developed a financial reporting system, known as Open Books, allowing the public to view school budgets to learn

how money is being spent (<https://openbooks.ped.nm.gov>).

What is difficult for the reader of the plan is to discern how all of the pieces fit together to address the serious challenges faced by New Mexico public schools and students. For example, long before the publication of the PED plan, the Native American community provided a document of its own. We urge the PED to move rapidly to enhance its communication with Native communities.

Similarly, parents of students in the Las Cruces Public Schools (LCPS) will find in Open Books general information about school district revenues and expenditures, but little information about the extent to which funding goes

directly into student learning resources. LCPS budget is on their website but is not very user friendly.

The PED has also created a Culturally and Linguistically Responsive (CLR) Guidance Handbook to support local school districts in designing project-based and engaging learning experiences and resources for teachers, staff and students.

CLR involves learning methods intended to empower all students intellectually, socially and emotionally by using cultural and truthful historical references.

Many security experts and educators point to evidence that building relationships with students and strengthening their social and emotional skills

are critical to safety as well as academic success. Warning signs can be spotted by school personnel that can provide supports and resources for a struggling student.

Reducing class size can make relationship building more attainable as well.

Providing a high-quality safe education within a complex system is challenging and takes teamwork among the PED and other state agencies; among school districts, parents, families, students and community partners. It also requires transparency.

We should all begin by studying the PED Plan and set a goal to be actively engaged in improving the education of New Mexicans.

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# From segregation to internationally recognized voice

## H. Prentice Baptiste celebrates a quarter-century making an impact at NMSU

As a kid growing up in Beaumont, Texas, H. Prentice Baptiste could hear the lion roaring at the zoo a few blocks from his home. But he and his brothers and sisters never got to see the lion. Only whites could attend the zoo.

“We could not go to that zoo because of the color of our skin,” said Baptiste, who grew up in a segregated neighborhood.

Now 83, Baptiste is celebrating his 25th anniversary at New Mexico State University, where he serves as a Regents and Distinguished Achievement professor. Throughout an academic career that began more than 50 years ago, Baptiste has taught, written and lectured about the overt and systemic racism that continues “in neighborhoods across the United States and even in Las Cruces.”

He is also a nationally and internationally recognized author and lecturer on multicultural education.

And like the roar of that lion, Baptiste speaks with a voice that travels.

He is co-founder and past president of the National Association for Multicultural Education (NAME), which has been advocating for equity and social justice across the United States since 1990. He is the author or editor of seven books, including textbooks, along with more than 125 articles, papers and book chapters about multicultural edu-

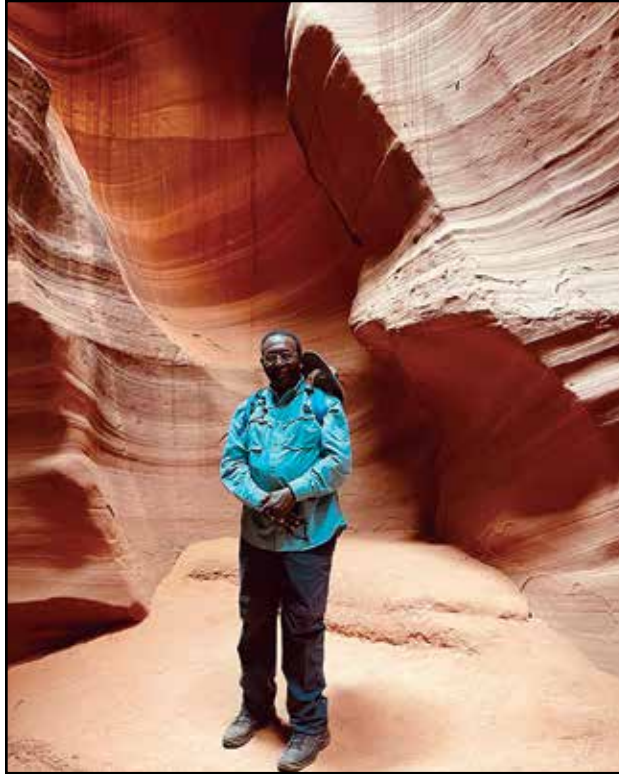


cation. He has presented papers and conducted multicultural workshops in the United States and in Nigeria, Egypt, Germany, Jamaica, Kenya, Morocco, the Netherlands and Cuba.

### Cultural diversity in math and science

Part of Baptiste’s focus is the lack of cultural diversity in science and mathematics instruction in schools, colleges and universities.

“Sometimes, we forget that science has been around for a long time,” he said. “Africa, Asia and other parts of the world were doing science long before the European reformation. They knew quite a bit about astronomy, the movement of planets, the moon and the stars. They used science, trigonometry and other mathematical operations in the construction of the pyramids and other people-

made structures.

“Few individuals are aware of the Alvarez Hypothesis proposed by Mexican scientists Luis and Walter Alvarez,” Baptiste said. “They utilize data collected from a meteor-impacted crater that cause the release of dust and debris into the atmosphere which caused severe climate changes that led to the extinction of dinosaurs.”

In the United States, Native Americans were already farming when the Pilgrims came to America, Baptiste said, and understood poly-cropping and plowing to conserve water.

In the South, agricultural scientist George

Washington Carver (1864-1943) introduced peanut plants to cotton fields to keep nitrogen in the soil and increase cotton production.

Black inventor Louis Lattimer (1848-1928), a contemporary of Thomas Edison, also developed a filament for lightbulbs, but history books “don’t give him credit for what he did,” Baptiste said.

“Many groups of people have contributed to the development of science and mathematics,” he said.

But even today, “We teach (that) science and mathematics came out of one culture,” Baptiste said.

One of the principles he teaches is that “knowl-

edge is socially distributed. What you know is what you’ve been allowed to know. How you control people is by taking their knowledge away from them, not letting them know their own history,” he said. “That leads to the belief that only certain people have the intelligence to do math or do science. It’s been proven over and over again that’s not true.”

But curricula and textbooks continue to “communicate a monopoly of science and math by a particular group of people,” Baptiste said.

“Certain people are given credit, others are not,” he said.

### Racism, sexism and poverty

Exclusions are based not only on race, but also on gender, Baptiste said, noting that for many years people “didn’t think women had the intelligence to do higher math.”

Discrimination can also be based on economics, he said. In Las Cruces, for example, some schools in poor neighborhoods “tend not to have the same kinds of resources” as schools in wealthier areas.

“To me, that speaks of systemic racism,” Baptiste said. “That speaks of taxing everybody but not everybody being able to reap that particular resource.”

Having some degree of wealth is one of three social values that drive systemic racism, he said. The other two are being white and being male.

“If you possess all three of them, you’re OK,” Bap-

tiste said. “If you possess only two, you still have certain opportunities. But if you have only one — or none — of the characteristics, you are not deemed worthy.”

That, in turn, creates a mindset within the oppressed group, Baptiste said, citing “The Mis-Education of the Negro,” written in 1933 by Carter G. Wilson, the son of former slaves, which says, in part, “When you control a man’s thinking, you do not have to worry about his actions. You do not have to tell him not to stand here or go yonder. He will find his ‘proper place’ and will stay in it.”

And because Jim Crow laws (enforcing racial segregation) are still in effect “to a certain extent,” Baptiste said, a Black man still does not have the same opportunities as a white man.

“That will become a point of contention because what it is saying is that systemic, institutional racism is there,” he said, “that allows the individual to do the things that are racist without even thinking about it.”

As one example, Baptiste cited a fistfight at a New Jersey mall in February between a Black and a white (Hispanic) teenager. The two white police officers who responded wrestled the Black teen to the floor and handcuffed him, while the Hispanic teen was taken, without handcuffs, to a bench to sit down, Baptiste said.

“That to me is a repre-

sentation of systemic racism,” Baptiste said. “The whole idea of the stereotype that ‘we’ve got to wrestle this Black kid to the floor, but we do nothing with the (other) kid,’ even though both were throwing punches.

“There are numerous examples that we see happening every day,” he said.

As another example, Baptiste said, most U.S. high schools reflect Western culture, to the exclusion of African or Asian heritage. And some high schools with high percentages of students of color continue to offer fewer science courses, “saying to a large number of students, they don’t deserve to know anything about physics,” Baptiste said.

In New Mexico, he said, cultural pluralism is written into the state constitution, but has been “ignored by the powers that be about what should be in the schools and the education system.”

For example, Baptiste said, New Mexico’s Constitution codifies the

preparation of teachers as bilingual in Spanish and English.

Therefore, English- and Spanish-speaking students will benefit from effective instruction.”

And it’s not just schools, he said.

### Churches not immune

“Don’t let religious institutions off the hook,” Baptiste said. Churches often value men more than women, he said, citing “the way nature intended” as justification.

“That’s not nature,” Baptiste said. “That’s people.”

Baptiste said his own daughter, now an adult, decided at the age of 5 or

6 that she wanted to be a Catholic priest when she grew up.

“She became aware early on in her life that females could not be priests,” he said. “The logic of that she couldn’t understand. I had an issue with trying to explain it.”

“We have certain values that we tend to promote and our institutions tend to promote,” Baptiste said. “Unless you do something to directly oppose that, you really support it.”

### Changing the narrative

“I’m trying to change the narrative,” Baptiste said.

He is part of an international writing team led

by Dr. Mary Atwater at the University of Georgia, “looking at science and math globally in terms of what’s being done multiculturally,” he said, and is expecting to publish a book on the topic. In his book, “The Lion Is Roaring,” Baptiste will examine “the manifestation of racism,” giving both a historical and a personal perspective “to what’s going on.”

Baptiste remembers taking a bus trip from Beaumont to the University of Notre Dame in 1964, when he was 25. The bus stopped at a café in Jackson, Mississippi and Baptiste got off.

After seeing the café walls, he decided not to go into the café and instead got back on the bus.

Café signs that directed whites and Blacks to different bathrooms had been removed, but their imprints remained clearly visible on the walls.

“Most interesting, to me, was that Blacks and whites went to their respective restrooms as before desegregation,” Baptiste said.

Baptiste came to NMSU 25 years ago because of its multicultural environment, he said.

“I liked what I had seen and observed with the people who would be my colleagues in the College of Education,” he said. “That was something that drew me to New Mexico.”

Over the past quarter century, NMSU had made strides toward multiculturalism, Baptiste said, but “at a slow pace.

“Yes, it’s moving in the right direction, but it’s very slow,” he said.

“How much patience do you have to have?” Baptiste asked.

Within the Health, Education and Social Transformation College (HEST) of NMSU, “We’ve struggled to keep a pluralistic faculty available,” he said.

“It must go deeper than numbers,” Baptiste said. “It must be by a philosophy that pertains to the central principles of multiculturalism. That’s where we get caught up. We’re talking about it, but we don’t really have the philosophy in place. We don’t want to be uncomfortable,” he said. The hope is to “keep things in such a manner that inequities will continue to be, racism will continue to be, sexism will continue to be so you can be comfort-

able.”

“We cannot keep everybody comfortable if we’re going to strive for a society that is to benefit all of the members,” Baptiste said. “The central core of education is uncomfortable.”

Baptiste said he has no plans to retire any time soon.

“I’m on this journey, in this battle. There is still a lot to be done. I will continue to do it,” he said. “I am an optimist, because during my 83 years I have witnessed the Supreme Court’s May 17, 1954 decision which began the dismantling of de jure segregation; civil rights legislation; and to others of my hue, successfully progressing through desegregation institutions of education. Recently, I have witnessed the election of a phenotype Black man as president and an Asian/African woman elected vice president of my country, the United States. Furthermore, the election of Ketanji Brown Jackson to the Supreme Court of the United States provides hope for me that my grandchildren and great grandchildren will live in a country of equality and freedom for all.”

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# Summer will begin June 21, the longest day of the year

If you want to experience the very first moment of summer 2022, you are going to have to get up very early in the morning.

The 2022 summer solstice, signaling the first day of summer, the day

when the sun reaches its highest point in the sky and the longest day of the year, occurs at 3:14 a.m. MDT Tuesday, June 21.

That will be the exact moment in the northern hemisphere “when the axial tilt of the Earth is at its most inclined toward the sun during

its 365-day orbit — at an angle of 23° 26’,” according to [www.space.com](http://www.space.com).

“The word solstice comes from the Latin solstitium, from sol (sun) and stitium (to stop), reflecting the fact that the sun appears to stop at this time (and again at the winter solstice),” according to [www.almanac.com](http://www.almanac.com).

com.

The summer solstice occurs when the sun is directly over the Tropic of Cancer, the northernmost circle of latitude on Earth.

The 2022 autumnal equinox will be at 7:03 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 22. That means summer will be 94 days.



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

## County puts limits on fireworks

The Doña Ana County Commission voted unanimously at its June 14 meeting to place additional restrictions on the sale of fireworks in the county because of the extreme drought conditions being experienced countywide and throughout New Mexico.

“The issue is about keeping our citizens safe and secure,” Commissioner Susana Chaparro said at the meeting. The restrictions are necessary, she said, because of drought conditions, high temperatures and the irresponsible behavior of some people using fireworks.

The proclamation approved by the commission

declares “extreme or severe drought conditions” in the county and imposes the maximum restrictions possible on the sale and use of “safe and sane” fireworks within unincorporated areas of the county, County Attorney Nelson Goodin said.

Under the county ordinance, legal fireworks can only be used on barren ground, paved areas and areas where there is an available water source.

The proclamation bans the sale and use of aerial and ground audible devices. The ban includes sales by Bowlin Travel Centers, Inc., which as a specialty retailer, had previously been allowed to sell fireworks banned in the county to buyers who provided proof they are not

county residents. Bowlin’s Old West Trading Post is located about 15 miles west of Las Cruces near Interstate 10.

The restrictions and ban are effective now through July 4.

County Fire Chief Shannon Cherry said the county fire department will have additional paid and volunteer staff in areas of the county where brush fires have been experienced. Cherry said fireworks stands throughout unincorporated areas of the county must apply for a permit to sell legal fireworks. He said the county fire department will hire additional staff to conduct inspections of the stands to ensure compliance.

## Oscar-winning drama puts the ‘Spotlight’ on journalism

At a time when journalism is under fire on a number of fronts, “Spotlight” is a worthy reminder of the profession's nobility.

The Oscar-winning best picture of 2015 – which Showtime presents Thursday, June 23 – recounts the true story of a Boston newspaper team's pursuit of those who enabled priests' alleged abuse of youngsters. Michael Keaton, Mark Ruffalo, Rachel McAdams and Brian D'Arcy James are all excellent as their Boston paper's elite, so-called Spotlight unit, given the relative luxury of weeks or months to work on their investigative stories.

Their publication's then-new managing editor, the legendary Marty Baron (played by Liev Schreiber), initially questions their having so much time ... but he pushes for the abuse probe, no matter whose feathers he might ruffle when he's already seen as an outsider. The story is quite personal for most of the reporters, since they either were altar boys or steady churchgoers who now find their faith in question.

Director Tom McCarthy also co-wrote the Academy Award-honored script for “Spotlight,” which authentically captures the tale's physical environment and also treats the business of reporting realistically. In some cases, sources prove problematic, or their representatives (notably a lawyer portrayed by Stanley Tucci) try to stonewall the journalists.

John Slattery (“Mad Men”), Paul Guilfoyle, Billy Crudup, Len Cariou (“Blue Bloods”) and Jamey Sheridan are among other members of the impeccable “Spotlight” ensemble. Each major cast member gets his or her moment, with Ruffalo arguably giving the showiest performance, but Keaton impressively folds himself in as a member of the group – underplaying just as is called for, quite an achievement for someone who typically stands out, whether that's the mission or not.

AirVoice seeks designation solely to provide federal Lifeline service to qualifying New Mexico consumers and solely on non-tribal lands. AirVoice indicates in the petition that it will not seek (and is not eligible to seek) access to funds from the federal Universal Service Fund (USF) for the purpose of participating in the Link-Up program or providing service to high cost areas. AirVoice is a Michigan limited liability company, with its principal office located at 9920 Brooklet Drive, Houston, Texas 77099. AirVoice is a provider of commercial mobile radio service (CMRS) and provides prepaid wireless telecommunications services to consumers by using the underlying wireless networks of its underlying carriers, AT&T Mobility LLC and T-Mobile USA,

Inc., on a wholesale basis. AirVoice requests ETC designation that is statewide in scope, excluding Tribal Lands, subject to the existence of its underlying carriers' facilities and corresponding coverage. AirVoice asserts that it meets the statutory and regulatory requirements for designation as an ETC, including Section 214(e)(2) of the federal Communications Act of 1934, as amended, Sections 54.101 through 54.207 of the Rules of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), and the State Rural Universal Service Fund (SRUSF) Rule under 17.11.10.24 NMAC. AirVoice requests a waiver of the provisions of SRUSF Rule 17.11.11 NMAC that conflict with FCC rules, i.e., those portions that apply to Link-Up (which is only applicable to facilities-based ETCs providing service on rural, tribal lands); the New Mexico ETC eligibility requirements of 17.11.11.8(A) and (B) NMAC to the extent they deviate from FCC rules, given that the FCC revised the Lifeline eligibility criteria to add the Veterans or Survivors Pension benefit program and remove Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), National School Lunch Program's free lunch program (NSLP), Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), and any other state-specified eligibility criteria from the list of qualifying programs (and federal income eligibility is based upon 135% of the federal poverty guidelines); and 17.11.11.8(C) NMAC, to the extent the application form contemplated therein contradicts the universal application form(s) required by FCC rules.

The cast includes Debbie Jo Felix as Laura Fair, Erin Wendorf as Margaret "Ma" Hossack, Lisa Tay-

lor as Celia Bryan, Nancy Clein Tafoya as Jane Toppan, Autumn Gieb as

Gossipy Neighbor Belle Guinness, Meghan Berver as Lizzy Borden and Nikka Ziemer as Author/Presenter.

Bertram describes the women in her play as "notorious killers from American history (who) reveal their secrets in a suite of monologues."

"Each has a very compelling story to relate," said ToadHall founder Ken Forestal, who is directing the play.

The most famous of the women is Lizzie Borden (1860-1927), who was charged with the August 1892 axe murders of her father and stepmother in

Fall River, Massachusetts.

Fair killed her married lover in San Francisco in 1870; Hossack killed her abusive husband in Warren County, Iowa in 1900; Bryan killed her father, who was also her owner, in Jacksonville, Florida in 1848; Toppan killed at least 11 patients at two Boston hospitals and as a private nurse before she was caught in 1901; and Guinness killed at least 13 people in Illinois and Indiana 1903-08.

Toppan, nicknamed "Jolly Jane," confessed to 31 murders and said her ambition was to kill more people than anyone else

ever had.

A Norwegian by birth, Guinness buried more than a dozen murder victims, including a headless adult female, at the family farmhouse in La Porte, Indiana.

Fair was arrested almost immediately after killing the well-respected lawyer Alexander P. Crittenden. She was so agitated at the police station following her arrest that she was given a sedative in a glass of water. Instead of drinking it, she took a bite out of the glass.

ToadHall mounted its original production of "Murderess" in early 2020, only to be interrupted by

the pandemic. Some cast members from the first production are reprising their roles.

The play premiered in Minneapolis, where Bertram lives, in 2011.

Founded in 2014, ToadHall has previously presented "Pericles," "Medea," "Agnes of God," "Van Gogh," "Bonhoffer," and "A Promise of Roses," all directed by Forestal, who also wrote "A Promise of Roses."

The company has also produced multiple seasons of house concerts at Forestal's home.

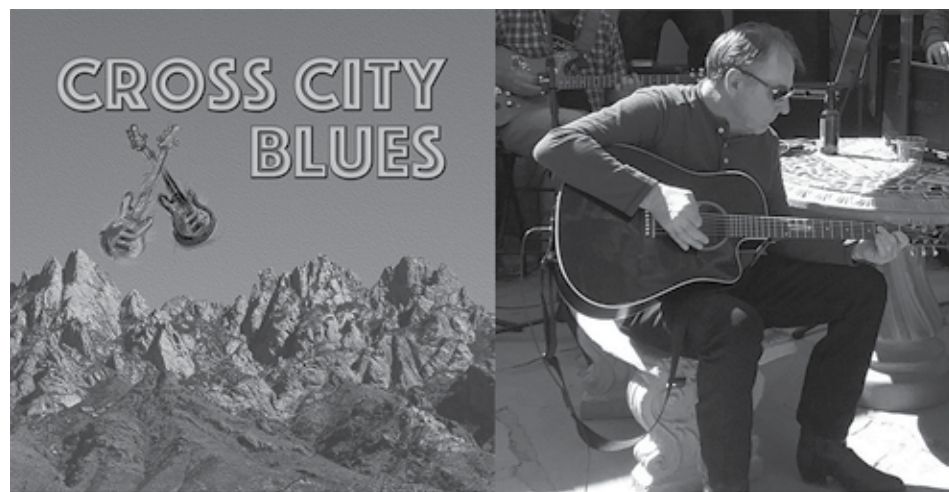

Residents pull up alongside City of Las Cruces (City) vehicles every day. From work trucks heading out to connect new accounts or check up on a reported leak, to the large trash trucks that make their way through neighborhoods and pick up in commercial areas.

A revised vehicle standard operating procedure allows for streamlined training and accountability for all Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) drivers in the system, including the various vehicles that are used to serve the public.

"It's a benefit to not only employees but residents that all the vehicle usage information is now in one standardized document," LCU Safety Office Case Van Dyke. "It provides guidance to line of business supervisors, displaying examples of traffic-related infractions that can be used as a teaching tool

for new employees."

Van Dyke explained that many, if not most, accidents are preventable, especially if drivers are proactive in observing their environment and driving defensively.

"The rule of thumb is to check if the driver did everything reasonably possible to prevent or avoid the accident," he said. "No task is more important than the safe operation of LCU-owned vehicles. Vehicle accidents will be reviewed for root causes and preventability determination."

"This program aims

to decrease injuries, minimize costs and liabilities, increase productivity and efficiency, and save lives," said LCU Director Delilah Walsh. "Sometimes accidents happen, but with some of our employees being on the road as the main component of their daily duties, we want them to have the regular training that reminds them of common scenarios they can avoid. We tailor it to their duties because the vehicles have unique risks that we negotiate in real-world scenarios."

Van Dyke explained

that complacency could happen when drivers use the same vehicle routinely, but, different environments (including weather) can change how a driver handles the vehicle, which is what the training can reinforce.

"These trainings apply not only to vehicles on public roads but also vehicles you might see us working on in the street, like forklifts, backhoes, or front loaders," Van Dyke said. "We want to keep our employees and the public safe."

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# Historian digs deeper into Lincoln County War mysteries

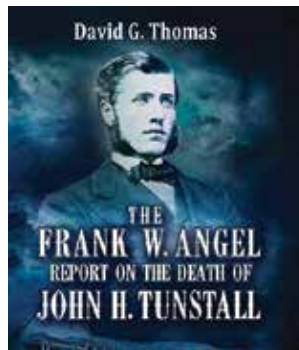
“The Lincoln County War is the single most famous Western conflict because it involved over 200 men and resulted in at least 40 or 50 murders,” said local historian David Thomas who has produced a couple of powerful new books about the subject.

The conflict ended in a five-day war, and just on the last day, more than 1,000 rounds of ammunition were exchanged, according to estimates by

Col. Nathan Dudley, commander of Fort Stanton at the time, July 1878.

The war ended with burning down of the Alexander and Susan McSween house in Lincoln. Dudley was there with his troops and had a Gatling gun and a cannon and did nothing to prevent the burning and the murders as the sheriff ordered the building burned, Thomas said.

It was on Feb. 18, 1878, that the conflict began with the death of an Englishman, John Henry



Tunstall, who had moved to Lincoln County and opened a store.

“In the matter of the cause and circumstances of the death of John H.

Tunstall...” are the words which began the single most important contemporary document recounting the origins of the Lincoln County War, Thomas said. That document is the “Report of Special Agent Frank Warner Angel on the Death of John Henry Tunstall,” known today to historians as the “Angel Report.”

Thomas has taken that report and put out “The Frank W. Angel Report on the Death of John H. Tunstall,” a book which includes the whole report, discusses and explains it.

“The 395-page, handwritten report that Angel submitted on October 3, 1878, on Tunstall’s unprovoked, sadistic murder is published for the first time in this book,” Thomas

said. “The report documents the events leading to Tunstall’s murder — the testimony of the men present at the brutal killing — including Billy the Kid’s eyewitness account — and the violent consequences that followed.”

In addition to sworn accounts by many of the individuals who were there during the time of the murder, supplementing the report in the book are an extensive introduction, notes, contemporary documents, associated letters, biographical details and a timeline.

“The book also reveals the brazen attempt by two powerful politicians — Thomas Catron and Stephen Elkins — to destroy the report depriving history of its priceless contribution,” Thomas said. “There are 46 images, many never published before.”

The Angel Report is the only account of the killing of Tunstall, he said. Since Tunstall was English, the British government asked for a report and the United States government sent Angel from New York to investigate. So, Angel went to Lincoln and interviewed everybody still

alive on both sides and that is what the report consists of — 38 sworn witness testimonies, including the three of the men with Tunstall when he was killed.

Angel shared his report verbally with the U.S. attorney general, and he produced his written report a few weeks later. Over the next few years, Catron and Elkins were able to destroy copies of the report for political reasons.

“The only reason they didn’t succeed was it was in the wrong place,” Thomas said.

It was not until the 1950s that a writer, Frederick William Nolan, was able to find part of it in the British government records and eventually in the depths of the Department of the Interior papers. But Nolan only used parts of the document when he wrote his book, “The Lincoln County War: A Documentary History.”

“The Frank W. Angel Report on the Death of John H. Tunstall,” is available through Amazon, the Billy the Kid courthouse bookshop in Lincoln, Coas Books in Las Cruces and other local retail locations.

## Shootings need to be addressed as sins against humanity

Time to stop talking about what happened in Uvalde and, before that, Sandy Hook and Columbine and the Sutherland Springs Baptist Church and on and on as “tragedies.” We use that word to numb our sensibilities. To call them tragedies is to put them in the framework of drama, and thus remove them from ordinary life. Greek philosopher Aristotle wrote that tragedy’s job is to affect a “catharsis.” First, you make the audience feel compassion and fear, and then you purge

those emotions so the audience leaves the theater feeling cleansed. That’s not what’s happening in the wake of these hideous and shameful acts. People don’t leave scenes having achieved catharsis.

If anything, all of us are plunged deeper into misery and despair and confusion, the opposite effects from what Aristotle had in mind.

Then there’s the canard about “mental illness” that always crops up in these situations. There may be occasions when crazies are on the scene, but to refer acts of violence to mental

illness is a disservice to humanity. It reduces the options to a concept of healthy vs. sick, and we are more than that.

At root here is not mental illness or health, but sin. Sin? Didn’t we get rid of that antiquated notion? Have we not progressed beyond this outdated theological concept? No.

We have not progressed because sin is embedded in the human condition. If I murder someone, it’s not because I am mentally ill. It’s because I hate that person’s guts and am willing to take a life. Maybe my pride has been trampled on. If I calculate to kill a dozen unsuspecting kids in

a school, I am not mentally ill. I am a monster who doesn’t give a damn about human life, who does not respect that every person is made in the image of God. And I am likely a monster because I hate myself, with no sense that I am made in the image of God.

Oh but there’s the problem. We have replaced God with ourselves. Nietzsche wrote about this a century ago, and the prospect did not make him happy, because he knew that human beings are incapable of functioning ethically without some overriding sense of moral imperative. I really don’t care if you call this God, because I am well

aware that atheists can be ethically responsible folks, but when you lose that overarching sense of moral purpose and common dignity and respect for the being of others, you become a monster.

So these abject collapses of moral integrity that are so frequent that we have become numb to them are not tragedies that are the result of mental illness. They are acts that need to be addressed for what they are: sins against humanity. I might add that killing the perpetrators is not a solution, either.

Martin Luther King Jr. spoke well when he said that you cannot legislate

morality but you can legislate the conditions in which morality can exist. That’s what the rule of law is for. It recognizes human sinfulness and tries to counter for it. Is it, therefore, not possible that a partial solution to the problem might be to ban any and all sales of automatic and semi-automatic firearms? These weapons are made for one purpose only. You can’t legislate morality but you can legislate the conditions. I cannot understand why our legislators fail to act on this obvious stopgap. To me the failure to act is also a sin; willful

## Hearing loss center has clients ranging from infancy to elderly

“Hearing loss doesn’t discriminate,” Expert Hearing Care (EHC) of Las Cruces audiologist Dr. Allie Lambert said.

Although the tipping point for hearing loss is often “aging-related changes to the auditory system,” owner and audiologist Dr. Kelly Churchill said, EHC has clients from infancy to 105 years old.

A baseline hearing test is the starting point for every client, Churchill said.

That test will determine if there is hearing loss, how significant it is and what steps can be taken to address it, Churchill and Lambert said.

The test can also identify tinnitus (persistent ringing in one or both ears), cerumen (earwax) buildup and other issues that may affect the quality of hearing.

In addition to aging, hearing loss can be caused by heredity, disease and

prolonged or even one-time exposure to high decibel sounds like fireworks, gunshots and loud music.

Approximately 15 percent of American adults (40 million) aged 18 and over report some trouble hearing, according to the National Institute on Deafness and Other Communication Disorders (NIDOC).

Age is the strongest predictor of hearing loss among adults aged 20-69, with the greatest amount of hearing loss in the 60-69 age group, NIDOC said. Men are almost twice as likely as women to have hearing loss among adults aged 20-69, and non-Hispanic white adults are more likely than adults in other racial/ethnic groups to have hearing loss.

The institute also reported that fewer than one-third of adults aged 70 and older who could benefit from using a hearing aid had ever used one. The percentage is about half that for adults ages 20-69.

For many people, Churchill said, hearing loss may come on so slowly that they aren’t even aware of it. Indicators include finding yourself frequently asking others to repeat what they have said or someone asking why your television is turned up so loud.

Churchill’s husband, Chris Churchill, a professor in the Astronomy Department at New Mexico State University, said he began experiencing hearing loss in his 30s, probably as a result of exposure to loud music.

When there was a lot of background noise, Chris said he “would lose all speech clarity,” and found himself withdrawing from conversations to avoid embarrassment and trying to guess what someone else

was saying and how he should respond.

For Chris, the answer was a hearing aid.

“It opened the world up to me,” he said.

In addition to improving communication and relationships, a hearing aid can also help with cognitive issues that can be negatively impacted by hearing loss like memory and reasoning, Kelly Churchill said, along with balance (hearing impaired people are more likely to fall, she said). It can “reorganize the brain in a way that makes the risk of dementia lessen,” she said. It also reduces stress and exhaustion that result from “the effort that it takes to hear” for people who must “work harder to decode what people are saying.”

Chris Churchill said also he wears his hearing aid “because it keeps my brain healthier.”

Every EHC patient who needs it will get a treatment plan, Lambert said. For those who need

a hearing aid, EHC has a wide range of products to choose from, including Bluetooth devices, in-the-ear and behind-the-ear models and invisible in-the-canal models. Prices range from about \$1,500-\$3,500.

Medicare and most insurance policies usually cover the cost of a basic hearing test.

“We’re super passionate about making a difference in people’s lives,” Kelly Churchill said. “We find a way to help patients and give back to our community.”

EHC has two Las Cruces locations. The 4351 E. Lohman Ave., Suite 103, office is open 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Friday. ## How the ‘Success Sequence’ works to help young people in their lives

One of the statistics that has always fueled my passion for, and urgency in, the work in Doña Ana County is our poverty rate.

One in every four people in our county live in poverty (26 percent), according to New Mexico Voices for Children. But that’s not the number that

drives me. It’s that one in three children under 17 live in poverty (38 percent), and two in five children under 4 (40 percent) live in poverty too.

Poverty is growing the younger you look. And

what many studies have shown is that children who grow up in poverty are far more likely to stay there as adults.

But...research has shown it doesn’t have to be that way, if our young people

follow the “Success Sequence.”

The Success Sequence was made popular by authors Ron Haskins and Isabel Sawhill at the Brookings Institution who began looking at the financial wellbeing of Millennials and found that 97 percent of them weren’t in poverty during their

30s if they had followed this path: graduate high school; get a full-time job in your 20s; get married; and have children.

The publication “Spotlight on Poverty and Opportunity” recently reported on a new study from Wendy Wang and Brad Wilcox of the Institute for Family Studies

that looked at the data in response to criticisms that the success sequence didn’t necessarily work for young people of color or who were from low-income families and face systemic barriers to success.

What did they find? The

## Know the New Rates for Amador Transfer Station and Curbside Recycling

Success Sequence works for everyone.

Among Hispanic young adults who followed the sequence, 97 percent were not in poverty. Among African American young adults, 96 percent were not in poverty. Among young adults who came from low-income families (bottom third of incomes), 94 percent were not in poverty. Among those who grew up in “non-intact” families, 95 percent were not in poverty. Among those who followed the sequence and do not have a college degree, 95 percent were not in poverty.

As they looked at these diverse young adults in their 30s, they found, in fact, that 80 to 86 percent of those who’d followed the Success Sequence were in the middle- and higher-income brackets.

This really does come as great news for all of the groups in our community who are working diligently to come alongside our children and families to help lift them out of

poverty.

Admittedly, there are still barriers that need to be overcome, like the public benefits “cliff effect” that penalizes a growth in earnings with a more substantial loss in benefits that recipients simply can’t afford to lose. The key for our young people is to either not enroll in these programs in the first place, or enroll if they need to but plan an exit strategy ahead of time to “out-earn” their benefits.

Another key intervention in supporting young people is helping them build strong, lasting marriages. For people like me who come from broken homes, marriage and relationship training can be a game-changer to the generation of young people who have grown up with a U.S. divorce rate of somewhere between 40 to 50 percent.

In Doña Ana County, we know that 37 percent of our children are growing up in single parent families, 8 percent higher than the national average. Statewide, this disproportionately affects children of color: 60 percent of Native-American children,

51.5 percent of African-American children and 45 percent of Hispanic children grow up in single parent homes compared to 29 percent of white children. And historically, children in single-parent homes have faced much higher poverty rates than those in two-parent homes. But, the Success Sequence can demonstrably change this story.

So, what’s the bottom line?

As our students navigate the education-to-employment continuum, information like this is power! We can come alongside our students with encouragement and information that breaks cycles of poverty for good. When our students are in position to build strong economic futures, they will create a ripple effect that has a positive impact on the social determinants of health and change economic futures for good.

## New sick leave law takes effect July 1

The Healthy Workplaces Act of 2021 is a law requiring all private employers in New Mexico to allow employees to accrue and use a benefit called earned sick leave. It takes effect July 1.

The act allows employees to earn and use paid sick leave, according to the New Mexico Department of Workforce Solutions (DWS).

Under the new law, employees may use this leave for various reasons listed in the act, like the employee's or their qualifying family member's illness or injury, or to deal with certain legal and family issues, DWS said.

Employers who do not honor an employee's rights to sick leave face potential civil liability. The act authorizes DWS' Labor Relations Division to investigate violations of the act.

"Employers with paid-time-off policies that are more generous than the minimum accrual and usage limits specified in act are compliant with the act if employees may use the leave for the same purposes and under the

same terms and conditions specified in the act," DWS said.

"The earned sick leave required by the act is in addition to any paid time off provided by an employer pursuant to a collective bargaining agreement unless

employees may use the paid time off for the same purposes and under the same terms and conditions specified in the act," DWS said.

The act was passed by the New Mexico House of Representatives Feb. 28, by a vote of 36-33. Sponsors include state Rep. Angelica Rubio, D-Doña Ana. The act passed the New Mexico Senate March 19, by a vote of 25-16.

DWS will host informational webinars about the act at 2 p.m. Friday, June 17 and Thursday, June 23; and at 4 p.m. Wednesday, June 29.

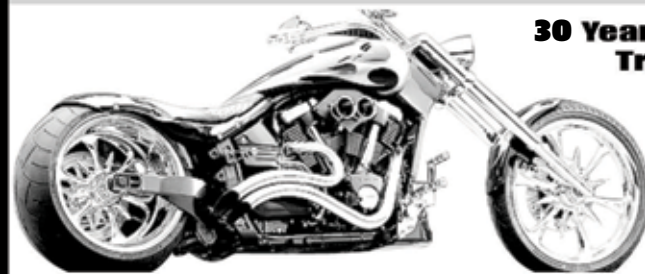
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## Family affair: Mesilla Valley Christian golf wins boys state title

Junior Logan Morris edged younger brother and sophomore Riley Morris by 2 strokes over the two-day competition to win the individual state title in A-3Aa.

Both will be coming back to golf next school year for Mesilla Valley Christian, and Riley promises "it will be close next year too."

team title in golf since 2005. To put that into perspective, that was the year Logan, the oldest and most seasoned golfer on the team, was born.

The first day of the competition was very windy, he said, and the team finished play with a 17-stroke lead.

"I told the boys that they were starting over the second day, like it was day one all over again with the score zero-zero," Morris said.

The SonBlazers ended up beating second-place Clovis Christian by 49 strokes.

All five Mesilla Valley golfers will be returning next year and there are several other golfers at the school who could challenge that group, Morris said.

"We are looking good for a couple of years," he said.

Morris said their motto was "Find a Way." That

means if any of the players had a bad shot, a bad round or a bad day of practice, to get past it and find a way to overcome it, Morris said.

Muro said it was gratifying to be part of a state championship team.

Muro said one of the team's strengths was the friendships they formed over the year.

They practiced every day after school but would get together on the weekend to play golf for fun too, Muro said.

"That helped us bond together even stronger and were able to help each other further," Muro said.

Barker said he was motivated in part by sibling rivalry too.

His sister, Hayley, was part of Mesilla Valley's 2019 girls state championship team.

"She held that above my head," Barker said.

"Not anymore. Not anymore," his coach chimed in.

# The PGA Tour, Saudi-funded rival LIV Golf on a collision course

Pro golf has been disrupted by Saudi-funded LIV Golf. It's complicated; let me explain.

While playing in the Saudi International tournament, in an interview with Golf Digest in early February, Phil Mickelson blasted the PGA Tour for its "obnoxious greed," citing mainly the Tour's strict control over TV and media rights for all Tour players.

Then in an interview with Alan Shipnuck, now writing a biography of Mickelson, Mickelson admitted that he paid lawyers \$2 million to prepare the operational plan for the LIV Golf tour as a way to get back at the PGA Tour.

That bombshell became

public on Shipnuck's FirePit-Collective.com website. Reacting to the heavy fallout of his words and actions, certainly tarnishing his legacy, Mickelson went into exile for four months. He didn't play in the Masters and declined to defend his PGA Championship victory from 2021.

Mickelson has now lost Amstel Light, Workday and KMPG as sponsors. However, he is going to play in the first LIV Golf event.

As the war of words started heating up in late February when PGA Tour Commissioner Jay Monahan explained to the press at Florida's Honda Classic

that he told the players "we're moving on and anyone on the fence needs to make a decision" about joining the LIV tour.

The next day Greg Norman, LIV CEO, sent a strongly worded letter to Monahan, that included "your lawyers at the PGA Tour must be holding their breath," referring to whether the PGA Tour can legally ban players for playing in another league. By mid-May, the PGA Tour declared the LIV Golf tour "out of bounds" and denied requested releases to play LIV events to dozens of PGA Tour players.

Jack Nicklaus recently claimed the Saudis offered him over \$100 million to front the new LIV league. He replied, "I have to stay with the PGA Tour.

I helped to start the PGA Tour (in 1968)."

His Nicklaus Design Company is building a new championship golf course near the Saudi capital of Riyadh. Norman called him a "hypocrite."

Fast forward to the current situation. The first of eight LIV Golf no-cut, 54-hole events will be held June 9-11 at Centurion Golf Club just outside London.

There will be 48 players; the purse is \$25 million with the winner getting \$4 million.

The first big-name player to enter this first event is former world No. 1 Dustin Johnson. Next was Graeme McDowell. Both have been dropped by Royal Bank of Canada (RBC).

Other well-known golfers playing include Lee Westwood, Louis Oosthuizen (both dropped by UPS), Ian Poulter, Kevin Na and Sergio Garcia. Johnson, with 24 PGA Tour wins, and Kevin Na, who has won \$38 million in 19 years on Tour, have both resigned from the PGA Tour. And now Bryson DeChambeau and Patrick Reed have signed on.

At this point, golf club companies, like TaylorMade, Titleist, Ping and Callaway, have not indicated their position on endorsement status on players paid to used their equipment.

On June 9, the PGA Tour issued a statement that 17 Tour players, including Johnson and

Mickelson, have been suspended indefinitely by the Tour. Ten already resigned. Apparently, the gobs of Saudi money offered by LIV Golf makes endorsement cash seem like chump change to many pro players.

Johnson and Mickelson reportedly each received \$125 million cash for signing.

There's an old saying that you can't buy a golf game. But obviously it's possible to buy professional golfers.
