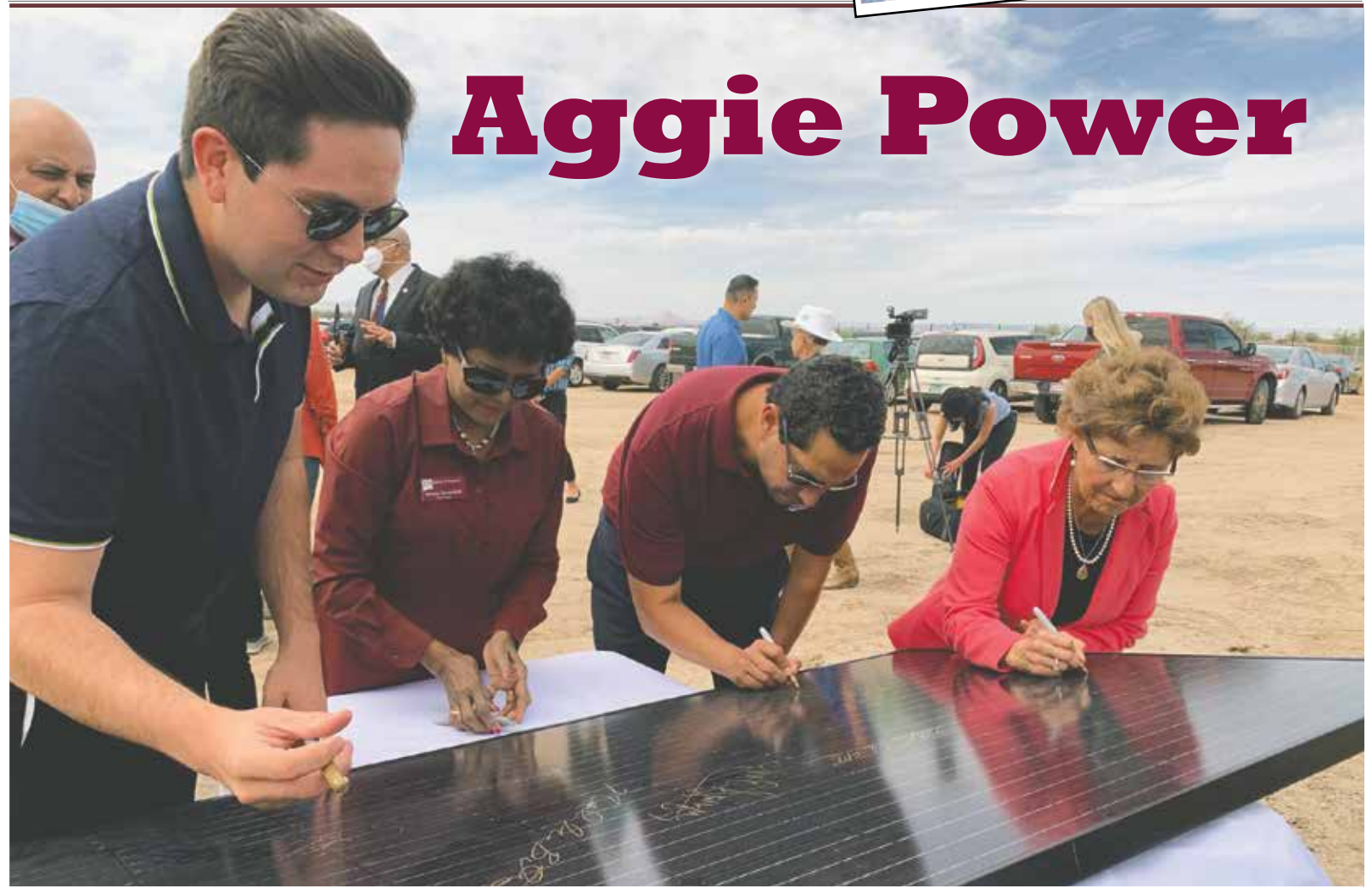

Take a walk: LCPS schools, students highlight benefits of getting active on way to class

All 24 Las Cruces Public Schools elementary schools will participate with in-person walking school buses (groups of children walking to school with one or more adults) and bike trains during International Walk to School Day (IWSD) celebrations beginning Friday, Oct. 1, and continuing through Thursday, Oct. 21.

"We've got 100 percent participation again, which is awesome," said LCPS Safe Routes to Schools (SRTS) Program Coordinator Ashleigh Curry.

LCPS has the most successful walk to school program in New Mexico and expects about 2,000 students to participate this year, along with school staff, administrators and community members, Curry said.

Along with the overall program, Curry coordinates schools' weekly and monthly walking school buses and bike trains along with LCPS SRTS Champion Diane Diahn Nevares and volunteers at each school.

In addition to the health benefits, parents can develop or enhance the connection with their children as they walk or bike to school together, Curry said. Walking and biking also reduces children's anxiety and helps them do better in school.

"There's so many benefits," said Curry, who has been the LCPS SRTS program coordinator since 2011.

Curry began with the program in 2008 and said many of the children who participated 13 years ago are now college students, and she is already "seeing the next generation coming up" to participate in

walking school buses and bike trains.

MacArthur Elementary School is this year's IWSD highlight school, Curry said. She said the Jornada Elementary School walk will be dedicated to the late LCPS Superintendent Karen Trujillo. Jornada Elementary walk participants meet at the insurance office of Trujillo's husband, Ben Trujillo.

LCPS SRTS began at Hillrise Elementary School as a pilot program started by the Mesilla Valley Metropolitan Planning Organization in 2006. Mesilla Elementary School signed on in 2008, with Curry joining Dawn Sanchez and other parent volunteers for the program.

Since 2013, LCPS SRTS has had 159,286 incidents of participation in weekly walking school buses or bike trains, 104,332 inci-

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Council OKs electric bus purchases

The Las Cruces City Council unanimously adopted a five-year contract with BYD Coach and Bus company of Los Angeles to purchase five battery electric powered transit buses for RoadRUNNER Transit.

The near \$4.15 million contract was approved by the council at its Sept. 20 meeting. It includes options to purchase seven more buses.

The five electric buses will replace diesel-fueled buses the city purchased in 2004. The electric buses will have a 12-year life expectancy.

RoadRUNNER Transit has a goal of having

20 percent of its buses be battery electric as it transitions its fixed route fleet. The city's comprehensive plan also calls for converting RoadRUNNER Transit's fleet to cleaner energy fuels, such as compressed natural gas or renewable energy such as battery electric

buses.

At the Sept. 20 meeting, the council also agreed to terminate a Local Economic Development Act (LEDA) agreement with 420 Valley LLC, a company that had planned to establish a hemp processing facility in Las Cruces. The termination authorizes

the return of \$400,000 in LEDA funds to the New Mexico Economic Development Department. The city council authorized the funding in December 2019, but 420 Valley was negatively impacted by the pandemic and could not meet hiring goals.

The council also adopted the city's East Lohman Development Plan to guide the development of approximately 509 acres that is roughly centered on the intersection of east Lohman Avenue and south Sonoma Ranch Boulevard. The planning area includes approximately 140 acres of city-owned land located south of Lohman Avenue and west of Sonoma Ranch Boulevard.

dents of students walking to school, 28,692 incidents of students biking to school and 26,262 incidents of adult participation, Curry said.

Curry is seeking volunteers to help coordinate walking school buses and bike trains at one or more schools once or twice a week.

She is also hopeful that

a recent grant application to the U.S. Department of Transportation will allow LCPS to hire two additional SRTS champions.

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NMSU chancellor to advise Biden on science

New Mexico State University System Chancellor Dan Arvizu has been named to the President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology (PCAST). The group advises President Joe Biden on matters involving science, technology, education and innovation policy.

"From Covid-19 to cyber security to clean energy and other topics, science and technology are at the core of so many issues facing the U.S. at this time," Arvizu said. "I'm humbled and honored that I can serve our country by providing my expertise. Importantly, I want to ensure we expand a non-partisan approach to understanding public policy and the ramifications those policies have for the people of New Mexico."

A direct descendent of the scientific advisory committee established by President Eisenhower in 1957 in the weeks after the launch of Sputnik, PCAST

is the sole body of external advisers charged with making science, technology and innovation policy recommendations to the president and the White House.

Arvizu, a native of Alamogordo, has a bachelor of science in mechanical engineering from NMSU and a master of science and Ph.D. in mechanical engineering from Stanford University. He has decades of experience in advanced energy research and development and is an expert in energy materials, process sciences and technology commercialization. His focus is on harnessing education, research and outreach initiatives to foster economic development and social mobility.

"Membership in the President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology is a tremendous honor," said U.S. Sen. Martin Heinrich, D-N.M. "This appoint-

ment is a well-deserved recognition of Chancellor Arvizu's distinguished background, and I know his expertise will be important in helping to guide some of our nation's most important policy decisions."

"Chancellor Arvizu will bring a strong perspective to the President's Council as the Biden administration works to bolster America's competitiveness in science, technology, education, and innovation," said U.S. Sen. Ben Ray Lujan, D-N.M.

"The President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology includes our nation's top minds in science, technology, education, and innovation," said U.S. Rep. Yvette Herrell, R-N.M. Enrollment takes dip at NMSU

The New Mexico State University system saw a small drop in enrollment for the fall 2021 semester over the previous fall, driven primarily by a decline in continuing undergraduate students. NMSU-O, the university's online campus, has seen year-over-year growth.

NMSU had a total of 21,694 students across all campuses on Sept. 3, the university's fall 2021 census date. That's a drop of 3 percent from the number recorded the previous year systemwide. NMSU's Las Cruces campus counted 13,904 students, a decrease of 2.3 percent. That includes 2,674 graduate students, up by 0.8 percent over the previous fall.

Enrollment at NMSU-O increased about 10 percent to 1,220 students, thanks in part to a strategic shift in the program's design.

Enrollment change at NMSU's community colleges was mixed, with some campuses seeing double-digit growth and others declining. NMSU Carlsbad grew by 13.1 percent to 1,361 students, while NMSU Grants grew by 11.3 percent to 692 students. NMSU Alamogordo saw relatively flat enrollment, increasing by 0.5 percent to 946 students, while NMSU's largest two-year campus, Doña Ana Community College, experienced a drop of 8.2 percent to 6,454 students.

This week, right here in Doña Ana County, you can experience one of the most normal, traditional, American, New Mexican events of all: the Southern New Mexico State Fair.

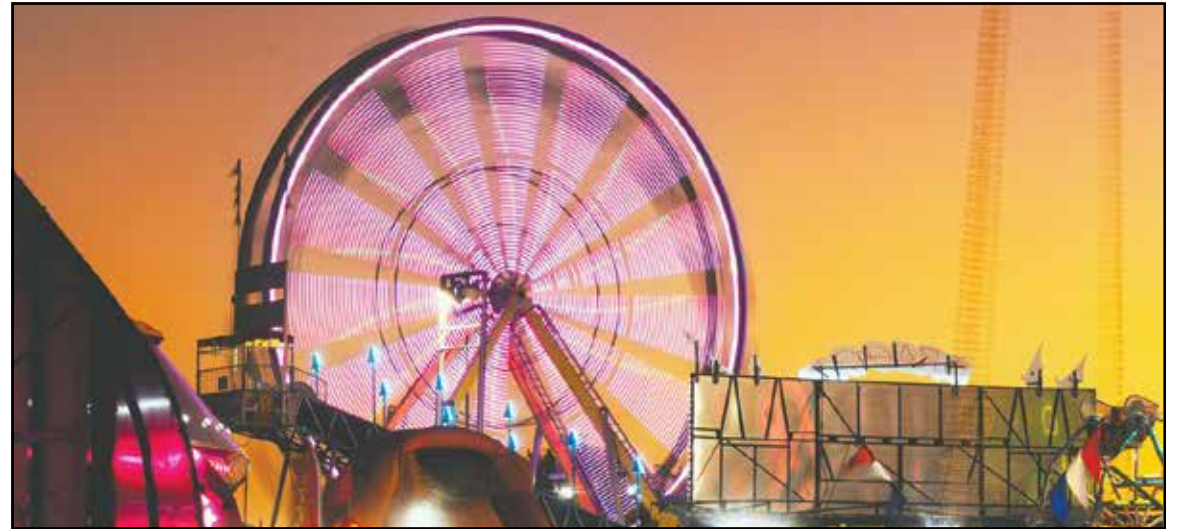
The fair has so much going on for so many people, it's easy to forget what got it all started.

Nonprofit ransacked, asks for public's help

Readers of the Bulletin and Las Cruces Sun-News might remember recent articles on Human Systems Research, Inc. (HSR) and this nonprofit's restoration of the historic 1938 CCC Schoolhouse near Downtown. In July, Lowe's selected the rehabilitation of the original lime plaster exterior for one of its na-

tionwide "Hometown 100" grants. As CEO of HSR, I can say that this grant is an honor and an aid to us in working toward the building's restoration for HSR's 50th anniversary celebration in 2022.

I'm writing to call the community's attention to something affecting HSR more immediately. During Wednesday night (September 22), our building was ransacked and robbed. We

reported this incident to the LCPD and submitted an inventory of items stolen. The most consequential items are blank checks imprinted with "Human Systems Research, Inc." for corporate accounts at Citizens Bank, Las Cruces. Within hours of the theft, one of these checks was fraudulently presented for payment at a local bank. A corporate credit card was used at an all-night conve-

nience store, and just before the card was reported to the issuer as stolen, it was used to purchase a mini-bike at a nearby business.

A silver Dell "Vostro" laptop and four black "Passport" data storage devices were stolen and contain materials vital to HSR's ongoing archaeological projects and to the organization's financial well-being. Several per-

sonal items belonging to HSR employees were stolen as well and we are actively pursuing their return.

Preliminary information suggests that this criminal activity may include two adult men with distinctive tattoos, a somewhat older man and an adult woman. One vehicle was described as a dark blue Ford Explorer type SUV display-

ing a disabled placard. If you have any information related to the incidents above, please contact HSR at 575-524-9456 or LCPD Dispatch at 575-526-0795. Thank you.

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A step into the sustainable future

NMSU, El Paso Electric cut ribbon on 'labor of love' Aggie Power project

El Paso Electric President and CEO Kelly Tomblin welcomed a future “that certainly is going to be powerful, bright, energetic and light,” at a Sept. 23 ribbon-cutting event for Aggie Power, a solar array that will generate enough clean electricity to power about half of the 900-acre Las Cruces campus and serve as a living laboratory for New Mexico State University students and faculty.

The project is a partnership between NMSU and El Paso Electric and involves 10,000 solar panels standing between Interstate 10 and Interstate 25 in Las Cruces in a once-vacant, 29-acre lot on NMSU’s Arrowhead Park.

“It looks like a small step when you hear 3 megawatts,” Tomblin said. “But it’s about the art of the possible — taking that first step. We have to remember where we came from, continue to evolve all the time.”

Wayne Savage, executive director of the Arrowhead Research Park, served as host for the event and introduced Aggie Power as a novel partnership between El Paso Electric and NMSU.

“It’s something that’s been a labor of love and just a labor for a lot of people over the last three years,” he said.

NMSU Chancellor Dan

Arvizu referred to the partnership as a “value partnership,” that goes beyond the generation of energy.

“(The partnership) is about education, about research, about outreach,” Arvizu said. “All of which are important elements of what we put together today.”

He said while technical research is an important

aspect of things, the deployment of energy requires a technology component, a policy component and a financial component.

“What we have now is an opportunity to do things in our energy system to allow us to have better functionality, more reliability, more functionality of all types at a lower cost,” he said. “We are not

talking politics anymore; we are talking business.”

“On one side, our faculty are very thrilled to do cutting-edge research on a new electric and power system and smart grid,” said Lakshmi Reddi, dean of the College of Engineering. “On the other side, we have very dedicated students who are asking for experiential learning opportunities,

which facilities like this and partnerships like this allow us to do.”

After construction wraps up over the next 60 days, Aggie Power will undergo extensive performance testing, Savage said. Then, it will begin supporting a portion of NMSU’s electrical utility load with renewable energy and storage, giving the university more flexibility in managing its utility rates.

NMSU student Andres Acosta, from La Mesa, is a graduate fellow in the electric utility graduate program. He talked about the future for students and the rest of the world started with the Aggie Power project.

“It is so amazing to see these people going through the things they love, seeking the future that they want to see,” Acosta said. “We want green energy for everywhere and we want the planet to live on for the rest of our lives.”

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Retired teacher seeks District 3 seat on Las Cruces school board

A retired teacher is seeking to replace a long-time incumbent on the Las Cruces Public Schools Board of Education.

Bob Wofford, a Las Cruces native, retired in 2017 after teaching English at Las Cruces High School for 34 years. He is a candidate for the District 3 seat on the LCPS school board, hoping to succeed Maria Flores. Flores, first elected in 2009, is not seeking re-election to a fourth four-year term on the

school board.

Although he has been retired from teaching for four years, “I still have more to give,” Wofford said, and that’s why he decided to make his first bid for elective office and run for school board.

“I feel like I can still make a difference in the lives of students,” Wofford said. “I’m very dedicated to education. It’s been my life focus.”

As a board member, Wofford said he will be

“an advocate for teachers, who are the linchpin for student success.”

In particular, Wofford said he wants to focus more on teacher retention and more support for new teachers.

“Too many get frustrated and leave in the first year,” he said.

Although he has an administrative license, Wofford said he never wanted to give up teaching to become a school administrator.

“My passion was in the classroom with students,” he said.

That commitment will continue if he is elected to the school board, Wofford said.

“Students have to be the central focus,” he said. “That is my primary work. Certainly, we need to support our educators and also involve parents and the community.”

Board members also must have “a vision for budgeting and school policy,” Wofford said.

“LCPS has a very large budget with much of it

prioritized into salaries and benefits, but each dollar spent on any line item in the budget needs to be clearly necessary and should match the priorities established by the board,” Wofford said on his campaign website.

“School boards have become contentious, which is too bad, because you need to keep the focus on students and schools,” he said, and “help our students see their places in the larger community.”

As a school board member, Wofford said he will be an advocate for “build-

ing consensus, listening to people and trying to heal any divisiveness.

“The school board should not be a political entity,” he said.

Ensuring that children learn to read early in elementary school is important for student success, Wofford said, and so is “making sure students are welcome at school and succeed in finding their niche.”

Sports and school clubs and organizations are important for students,

Las Cruces Innovation and Industrial Park Has a Plan to Move in New Business

Sometimes the steps and processes for selling land and property can seem daunting and time-consuming. When businesses are interested in property at the Las Cruces Innovation and Industrial Park (LCIIP), there may be ways to move quickly. The City of Las Cruces (CLC) wants to include speed, alongside economic incentives, to entice businesses to set up shop.

With the Master Plan developed – and accessible on the City's website – it gives guidance for development. However, there are still processes set by the state that can take up time, including the sale of municipal property.

"The New Mexico Statutes detail that property

valued in excess of \$25k is subject to referendum," said Cilicia Villegas, CLC Economic Development Coordinator. "There is a 45-day period before the adoption is effective, which means the actual closing cannot occur until this time," explained Villegas. "This causes a delay because development can't occur until the title is transferred."

CLC Economic Development may be able to change – with the approval of the City Council – is the CLC Municipal Code.

"We hope to allow exemptions from the Municipal Code for LCIIP regarding the 2-appraisal requirement for a sale price of \$150k or more, which would also lessen the time for a sale," Villegas said. "Right now, with the housing

market as busy as it is, finding and scheduling an appraiser can be hard as well." CLC also commits extra personnel to help fast-track permitting processes, with a specialized team dedicated to recruiting and assisting prospective businesses. There are approximately 900 city-owned acres available for sale or lease ranging in size from approximately 3 acres to more than 100 acres.

Candidate running for LCPS board after not getting appointed

"I want to see some improvement in education," Henry Young said.

That's why Young applied for an appointment to an open seat on the Las Cruces Public Schools Board of Education earlier this year, and that's why he decided to run for the seat when he didn't

get that appointment.

It's Young's third bid for local public office. He ran unsuccessfully for state representative and for school board in the 1990s, losing the school board race by

12 votes, Young said. He also has volunteered on local campaigns.

Young is running in LCPS District 2 against Pam Cort, who was appointed to the seat in July, following the resignation of Terrie Dallman. Cort, Young and three others applied for the position and were interviewed by the LCPS board at Las Cruces High School before

the board selected Cort. Cort will complete Dallman's unexpired term, through Dec. 31, and either she or Young will begin a four-year term representing District 2 next January.

Young said he had the best interview of the five candidates but wound up ranked fourth in the board's final vote.

Young said Covid and

the enforcement of state public health orders have polarized the school district but have also meant that more people are attending and speaking at school board meetings.

"I'm excited due to the return of parent engagement," Young said. "There is more public engagement than there's been in a long time, which is good."

That kind of engagement is something Young said he would like to see continue in Las Cruces. Today's students "will be voting in just a few years," Young said, and they should be "educated and aware of all public affairs. This, in general, is really important to our future," he said.

The board's adoption earlier this year of Policy JBC: Equity and Excellence for All Students, is another issue that is causing polarization within LCPS, Young said.

The policy itself is not the issue, he said, because it is only a framework. It is how the policy is implemented in classroom curriculum that he and others are most concerned about, Young said, because it could be used to support critical race theory, pit one race against another and bring about progressive social changes in the schools.

Instead of unifying cultures, the policy is "actually causing division," Young said.

With the correct guidelines, he said, culture-based learning is possible "without the race problem occurring."

Young said he has met with LCPS Superintendent Ralph Ramos and

"has gotten to respect him. I think he's a good man," Young said, adding that Ramos' ideas will "greatly benefit the school system."

Young said District 2 is LCPS' largest board district, containing about a dozen schools.

Young said he would support taking school board meetings out of the board room and holding them in schools throughout the entire district.

Young said his candidacy for the school board is backed by the Doña Ana County Republican Party, but he is running for the board as a conservative, not as a Republican.

Young said he is knocking on doors and talking to parents and community members as part of his school board campaign.

"What we're trying to do is just wake people up," he said. "You've got to get out and vote. If we start at the grassroots, we will see change higher up."

The countywide election, which includes three school boards, municipal offices in five communities and other boards, will be held Nov. 2. Early voting begins Oct. 5.

Young worked in several local lumber yards and became a pastor more than 30 years ago. He was named chaplain at Las Cruces Gospel Rescue Mission (GRM) and became GRM executive director in January 2017.

Young took two years of accounting at New Mexico State University and attended Pacific Coast Baptist Bible College in San Dimas, California.

Young's campaign treasurer is his wife, Cheryl De Young.



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7 Las Cruces students named National Merit Scholar semifinalists

Seven students from Arrowhead Park Early College High School and Centennial High School in Las Cruces are among 91 students New Mexico high-school seniors who have been named National Merit semifinalists, the first step toward win-

Wofford said, and can make the difference "in terms of student retention and increasing graduation rates."

Career and technical education programs are "greatly needed in our

schools, so that students see a connection between their academic classes and their careers," Wofford said on his website.

These programs, along with dual-credit classes "open doors to students," he said.

"We need to encourage innovation, involvement, and community partner-

ships to help engage our students," Wofford said.

It's important, he said, that not too much emphasis be given to test scores.

"You cannot account for the whole of the student through a single test score," he said.

Wofford said he had known and worked with LCPS Superintendent

Karen Trujillo for many years. Her death in February "was a profound loss for our district," he said.

"I look forward to working with Mr. (Ralph) Ramos," who succeeded Trujillo as superintendent, Wofford said.

Hiring and guiding superintendents is "absolutely critical" for school boards, Wofford said.

"A good school board provides the vision for which way the schools go," he said.

Wofford taught Advanced Placement (AP) English for more than 25 years at LCHS, and has more than 15 years of experience as a consultant for The College Board, a national nonprofit educational membership as-

sociation.

Wofford has a master of arts degree in English and a bachelor of arts degree in education, both of them from New Mexico State University.

Cheryl Frank is Wofford's campaign manager. Jim Greene is his campaign treasurer.

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Storytelling has a vital place in leadership

One of my favorite programs of the Chamber is our Leadership Las Cruces community leadership program. Last week, 28 individuals began their 10-month journey to become more informed about their community, including topics such as economic development, various industries' impact on our economy, how government functions, to name a few. Ultimately, the result is to ensure they are given important tools to enhance their individual leadership styles as they continue to impact and influence our community. I'm reminded of the importance of the effectiveness of

utilizing storytelling in active leadership.

As a leader, it's not always easy to share your passion and vision. You can often face the status quo and "how it's always been done" — an attitude that can be negative

to the creation of the team. Leaders seeking to share their vision often make a critical error: They ask or tell their team to act differently, often by compelling or coercing them to comply. Anyone can command people to act a certain way and could find some success in the short term. For sustainable change to occur, however, leaders must do more than demand actions. A new mindset must be created.

Using the powerful tool of storytelling, change can occur. Beliefs or mindsets can limit our thinking, forcing us to see the world a certain way and impede effort to get people to think and act differently. Stories invite people to suspend their beliefs

— about the world, about what is possible, and about themselves. Here is where the magic happens.

Leaders who tell stories communicate a compelling vision around desired beliefs, behaviors, direction, and results. If you want your team to embrace your vision, sharing stories provides a clear example. In essence, storytelling helps leaders change the way their teams think, which is a critical step achieving the goal.

For stories to have the ultimate impact, it is important that leaders follow three fundamentals of storytelling to share your vision and passion.

1. Choose the right story, and make the connection.

Great stories have a beginning, middle and end, but for leaders to create a vision for their team, there's more. Not all stories are created equal, and some stories can create change that works against an organization. Therefore, it's critical for leaders to be intentional about the stories they tell. Choose stories that clearly demonstrate and reinforce desired behaviors while linking back to desired results. It's also important to deeply engage team members with compelling stories that invite people to suspend their beliefs long enough to disrupt the status quo and create positive movement.

2. Be brief, concise and aim to go viral.

All it takes to deliver a powerful story is 45 seconds and has a better chance of being retold. Keeping a story to 45 seconds is especially important considering evidence of declining attention spans; a recent Microsoft study suggests that humans may have attention spans as brief as eight seconds. Within 45 seconds, the audience should Comprehend the story, feel Comfortable repeating the story and be Clear on the point of the story. If the storyteller accomplishes these three Cs, the story has a better chance of being shared and working its magic across the organization.

3. Conclude with a clear connection that reinforces the desired behavior.

Once a story invites an audience to suspend any beliefs that were getting in the way, create real movement by concluding with a simple phrase that reinforces the direction you want your team to pursue. You might say, "That's what innovation looks like to me," or "That's what good communication looks like to me." Using the term "looks like" instead of "feels like" communicates that the desired action is already occurring, encouraging your team to observe and take note of similar instances in their commitment to the team.

Effective storytelling helps leaders create a unified vision. Stories break through impediments to change; shape new, learning mindsets; and inspire others. A leader's ability to deliver their stories effectively, and quite honestly from their heart, can inspire, motivate and be critical to the team's success.

Countywide effort to expand internet access needs resident participation

In partnership with Doña Ana County, the City of Las Cruces is sharing this news release with the public.

Doña Ana Broadband, DAB, a multi-agency collaborative working to connect households and businesses throughout Doña Ana County, will launch a survey on October 1 that requires the participation of both residents and business owners.

Fast, reliable Internet will enable our community to learn online, access telehealth, explore new careers, innovate, and develop unprecedented opportunities. To build a plan to expand our broadband network, all residents are encouraged to participate.

“You can take the brief survey in English at <https://www.donaanabroadband.com>, or Spanish at www.donaanabroadband.com/nuestra, to help us develop a plan that includes you and your neighbors,” said Bob Bunting, Doña Ana County IT Director.

The survey aims to pinpoint where people currently have Internet, its speed, where people do not have access and why, more accurately.

“For best results, household residents and business owners

should fill out the survey on their desktop computer, at their respective locations, because the survey includes a speed test. This test is important because it reveals where the speed of internet access is slow and needs to be improved.”

Bunting added, “If there are no computers at home, and a tablet or a phone is normally used to access the Internet, please take the survey on that device. It is key that we get a survey response from every resident and business. If you lack internet access, please answer the ‘no access’ survey. You may request a copy at any municipal government location, clinic or by accessing the link at www.donaanabroadband.com.”

Participants can either enter responses online with someone’s help or get a print version and send it to the County. Doña Ana Community College (DACC) students will enter print survey responses.

The data collected will help guide a broadband expansion plan for the County which will take three to five years to complete, money from different investors, and commu-

nity-wide resources. An initiative of this magnitude takes collaboration from every sector and DAB includes representation from municipal governments, non-profits, business and volunteers throughout our community, including The Borderplex Alliance, the El Paso Branch of the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas, Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce, New Mexico State University and DACC.

The cities of Anthony, Las Cruces and Sunland Park, Town of Mesilla and the Village of Hatch will offer help filling out the survey to people who currently do not have access to the internet.

DAB partners created communications to spread the word about the importance of residents throughout

the county completing the survey. Representatives from the City of Las Cruces, Doña Ana County and Success Partnership developed fliers and social media

posts, listing locations where people who do not have access to reliable high-speed internet can get help filling out the survey.

La Clinica de Familia, Ben Archer Clinics and Health and Human Services promotoras will offer help with in-person surveys. The Community Learning Network developed the survey tool, a website and print versions of the survey for people without access, to facilitate participation.

DAB is a public-private regional partnership formed to develop

and implement a plan to increase access to affordable, efficient broadband, especially to Doña Ana County’s underserved communities, by December 2024.

“DAB’s work is a multi-year effort that involves research, development, and implementation. This broadband survey is an early step and part of the research needed to inform long-range infrastructure plans, across the County,” Bunting said. A trek through a human body is a ‘Fantastic Voyage’

No matter how far science-fiction movies have come in the past 55 years, there's never been another quite like “Fantastic Voyage.”

Offered by Turner Classic Movies to start a tribute to director Richard Fleischer on Saturday, Oct. 9, the 1966 fantasy takes a miniaturized submarine crew on a trip through a defecting scientist's (Jean Del Val) body to repair a critical injury from within. Bear in mind that this was made before the era of commonly used computer-generated special effects, so what the film achieves with its visuals – which earned two Oscars – is that much more amazing.

The story starts on a very realistic note as the scientist in question is delivered, supposedly safely, to his destination by an intelligence agent played by Stephen Boyd. Soon afterward, though, he's the target of an attack committed by automobile ...and it's determined that the only way to repair the damage to his brain is to deploy a team to enter his body, injected via a hypodermic needle, and stage the needed procedure.

That would seem impossible, if not for a top-secret process that can shrink anything – or anyone – down to the size of a microbe. The Boyd character is enlisted to go along on the sub to provide security for a surgeon and his assistant (Arthur Kennedy, Raquel Welch), a rather tightly wound medical consultant (Donald Pleasence) and the vessel's driver (William Redfield). And they have only an hour to get in, accomplish their mission and get out before they start growing back to normal size.



It's a terrific sci-fi concept, and though a remake has been discussed for many years (with such filmmakers as James Cameron and Guillermo del Toro involved at various stages), the original holds up quite durably. For all of its scientific intrigue, it wasn't hurt by the presence of then-relative-newcomer Welch, who made a major splash in the movie industry between this and “One Million Years B.C.” the following year.

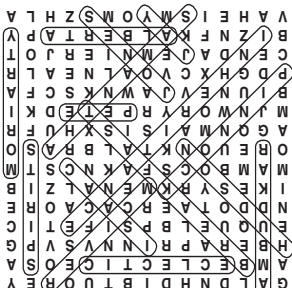

BCC, 501 N. Main St. Downtown, has been closed for renovations since February. The floors have been redone throughout the 1,500-square-foot building, said city Acting Museums Administrator Garland Courts. All exhibit spaces have new, adjustable and more energy-efficient lighting, walls have been repainted and ceiling tiles have been replaced, among other improvements, he said.

Beginning Oct. 1, you can visit “Cleared for Take Off: Aviation in Southern New Mexico” in BCC’s main gallery and “La Calavera Catrina Día de los Muertos” in the Shannon Gallery.

“Cleared for Take Off,” which continues through the summer of 2022, is “an

Army Air Field, local aviatrixes, Pancho Villa and a lot more.

The “La Calavera Catrina Día de los Muertos” exhibition, which continues through Jan. 8, 2022, features 7-foot-tall skeleton sculptures cre-

ated by Los Angeles-based artist Ricardo Soltero. The exhibit comes to BCC from the Denver Botanic Gardens.

La Catrina appears as part of the celebrations of Día de los Muertos held throughout Mexico, where death is not treated with mournful commemoration but as a colorful celebration of life, the City of Las Cruces said in a news release.

“Depicted as an elegant female skeleton, La Catrina was originally born out of Mexican social satire,” the city said. “In 1913, Mexican artist and illustrator José Guadalupe Posada created the very first version of La Catrina. She was intended as a parody, mocking the high-society European obsessions of Mexican President Porfirio Díaz, whose corruption led to the Mexican Revolution of 1911.”

A native of Nayarit, Mexico, Soltero is the set designer for the larg-

est Día de los Muertos celebration in the United States, which takes place annually at the Hollywood Forever Cemetery in Los Angeles.

The building that is home to BCC was built in 1935 and was the city library until Thomas Branigan Memorial Library opened in 1979, Courts said. It opened as BCC in 1981, and has hosted many exhibitions, lectures, workshops, musical performances and meetings during the past 40 years. Its “permanent collection” includes a Steinway piano that was donated to BCC in the 1990s, Courts said.

BCC is open 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Tuesday through Friday and 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Saturday. It is accessible from RoadRUNNER Transit Route 1 Stop 1.

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'Mind-blowing' print show continues at Unsettled Gallery

This is an art exhibition you do not want to miss.

The artist is Louis Ocepek (O suh pek). The artwork is "just mind-blowing," to quote Unsettled Gallery and Studio owner Catherine Brenner.

Ocepek is a Las Cruces graphic designer and fine artist who has brought together printmaking, drawing and computer design to create unique and breathtaking encapsulated chromogenic prints.

After a health issue kept him from printmaking a few years ago, Ocepek began to explore the chromogenic process (laser-exposed chromogenic prints).

He scans his pen and pencil drawings into his computer, using Photoshop, Painter, InDesign and Illustrator, and adds layers of shading, color and texture with digital brushes and pencils.

"The possibilities are endless because you can customize everything," Ocepek said. "I love the look. It captures exactly the color, shapes and focus I was working with."

He uploads the finished product to a company with a printer designed by NASA, Ocepek said. Color lasers expose multiple layers of dye on high-resolution photographic paper, which is processed like a regular photograph.

A layer of acrylic that includes a UV filter is bonded to the print and a backing board with silicon adhesive. The bonding is what adds the word "encapsulation" to Ocepek's work, he said. Each piece's colorful border

looks like a matte but is part of the artwork. Ocepek also makes his own frames.

The chromogenic print process is "notable for its crisp detail, accurate color, wide range of sizes and archival permanence," Ocepek said in his book "Nexus." He is also the author of "Around the Block" and "Ink on Paper."

"It's overwhelming," Brenner said of Ocepek's work. "There really aren't words to describe the feeling you get when you're here with the artwork."

"I'm always searching for the source of what it is that energizes life. I'm trying to express that," Ocepek said. "Every piece has a center, a core to it."

Ocepek is a native of Detroit who received his first set of drafting tools from his father at age 11 or 12. He still uses them. Ocepek moved to Las Cruces in 1985 to teach at New Mexico State University, where he started the graphic design program and served as department head for six years before retiring in 2002.

His favorite artists are mostly European "superstars of early modern art," Ocepek said, including Swiss artist Paul Klee (1879-1940) and Russian artist Wassily Kandinsky (1866-1944). He also likes the work of American artist Arthur Dove (1880-1946).

Ocepek has a "lifelong interest in music, mostly jazz but really all kinds of music," he said. His father, Tony Ocepek, was a jazz musician in both big bands and small combos in Detroit who also played in the U.S. Army Band

during World War II. The senior Ocepek was also a carpenter and cabinet maker.

Louis Ocepek said the titles of many of his art pieces refer to music.

Ocepek's limited-edition prints at the exhibition are for sale.

"Nexus" continues through Saturday, Oct. 16. Unsettled Gallery, 905 N. Mesquite St., is open noon

to 5 p.m. Wednesdays, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Thursday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturdays and by appointment. Call 575-635-2285 or stop by — owner Catherine Brenner may be there even during non-gallery hours.

The gallery has been open for more than 12 years.

'Laughing Wild' will make you laugh — and make you think

"Laughing wild amid severest woe" is a line Irish playwright Samuel Beckett borrowed from English poet Thomas Gray. American playwright Christopher Durang uses the first two words as the perfect title and theme of his play that is now in production at Black Box Theatre (BBT), 430 N. Main St. Downtown.

I was in BBT's first Durang production, "Beyond Therapy," about 20 years ago, and well remember that he isn't afraid of strong language or dark themes. But Durang also knows where to find the

humor in the strangest and most disturbing circumstances and places — hence the comedy and tragedy of "Laughing Wild."

Director Ceil Herman and actors Jamie Bronstein and Brad Martinez take the audience on a wild ride through the tuna fish aisle of a supermarket, a couple of gut-wrenching taxi rides through the streets of New York City and even onto the set of the "Sally Jessy Rafael Show."

But it is the darkest and scariest corners of the minds of Bronstein and

Martinez's characters that are by far the most disturbing — and hilarious element of the play.

Bronstein's "woman" hates Sally Jessy, Mother Teresa and happy teenag-

ers from New Jersey, and seems only to have sympathy for her doctors. Martinez's "man" regularly falls to his knees to invoke the power of positive affirmations to overcome the

deeply trying experiences of his life — sexuality, career, faith and family.

It all comes full circle, as only Durang could make it, with a can of tuna serving as both a lethal weapon and an ice breaker.

Credit Bronstein and Martinez for their fearless 30-minute monologues that open this 95-minute play, which is performed without an intermission. With simple costumes, no set and very few props, they have only Durang's timeless script and their own talent to connect with the audience and make this show work.

I also must credit costume designer Robert "Bobcat" Young for his

costume for Martinez's brief performance as the Infant of Prague. It's one of the few, but really funny (and violent), interactions between the two characters in the play.

Remaining performances of "Laughing Wild" are at 8 p.m. Friday-Saturday, Oct. 1-2 and 8-9; 2:30 p.m. Sundays, Oct. 3 and 10; and 7 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 7.

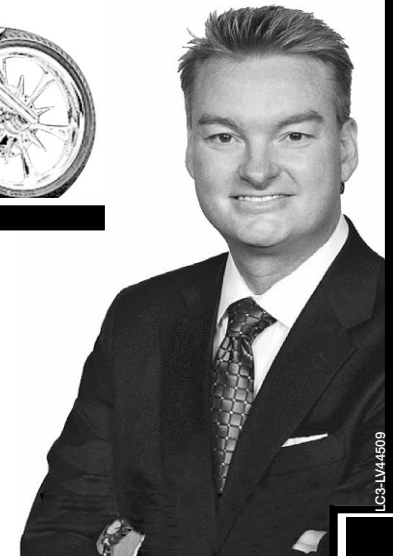
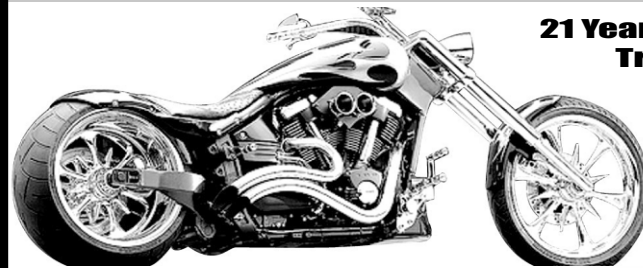

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Isolation of pandemic shows we need each other to fully grow

The more we emerge from “the year of covid,” the more does it seem that we suffered through and from that isolation.

We Americans, for better or worse, think of ourselves as individualists. I take care of myself. I don’t need anybody else. But this gigantic lie runs counter to a basic truth; namely, that humans are communal beings. We are meant for relationships. We only truly understand ourselves in relation to others. Theologian Søren Kierkegaard wrote that, “The self is only a self in

relation to other selves.” On one hand, we know ourselves in the mirror that others hold up for us. On the other hand, we become ourselves in relation to others: parents, teachers, mentors and the odd uncle

or aunt, all of whom enable us to become who we become. Uncle Fred told my mother that I was destined to be a teacher and that he saw this when I was 6 years old. Did I become that teacher because of Uncle Fred’s comment? Did this word somehow play into my future? Obviously, his input made a dent in my psyche.

We become ourselves in relation to others, and the impact they have on our lives helps to shape us. Of course, the reverse is also true. We have an impact on others over the course of our lives, and it behooves us to recognize that. We can easily hurt, or damage, other people as much or more than we are able to heal them.

The year of Covid curtailed our ability to enter relationships that could either heal or hurt others. This had the predictable and inevitable consequence of curtailing our own growth for weal or woe. We lost contact with a lot of people with whom we were developing relationships, which was

not helpful to our growth. It may have looked like a year of standing still for many of us. Unfortunately, in terms of human growth and development, there is no such thing as standing still. With relationships as with muscles, there is either growth or atrophy. I am feeling the effects of atrophy in this year after Covid, and I suspect I am not alone.

Many of us lost friends and family during this period. Mourning was cut short because we could not travel to be with them as they were given to the ages. Many of us were shut off from the normal rites of closure, and such disbarment certainly did not enhance any sense

of completion or finality. The absence of these rites left holes in psyches that cannot be filled.

When we choose change, we look forward with expectation, even joy, as when we choose to move from one locale to another. But when change is forced upon us, we recoil and may react with anger or fear. The year of Covid gave us the opportunity to embrace change but for many people the unwanted nature of it all made us wary and fearful.

We had the opportunity, at least mentally, to broaden understanding of our common lot during the year of Covid. We could have expanded our political horizons and

sought to overcome the polarization in American society. For many, sadly, the year of Covid only led to further divisions, now based on masks and vaccinations.

There were also gains in this year for many of us. We should not forget that. I’m only underscoring some negative effects we all need to overcome in the days ahead. May we discover anew the spiritual resources to overcome these problems.

service during the same time period, LCPS said.

The VAU is the first law enforcement-based victims’ assistance unit in New Mexico, LCPS said.

It is comprised of six

full-time victim advocates and 18 volunteers who are part of the CIRT that responds to emergency callouts initiated by Las Cruces police officers and detectives.



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Three Crosses Hospital 'brings hospitality' to health care

Three Crosses Hospital is "open and seeing patients," said general partner Bob Pofahl, speaking by Zoom to the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce's 2021 Leadership Las Cruces program.

The hospital, located at 2560 Samaritan Drive on the site of the old Las Cruces Country Club, is part of a medical campus, Pofahl said, that provides a wide range of medical services.

Three Crosses "brings hospitality to health care," Pofahl said, as it works to "make patients feel more comfortable and reduce the anxiety" of a hospital visit.

The hospital itself has 46 beds, he said, while the on-campus rehab facility has 60 to 90 beds and the emergency room has 12 to 15 beds.

The campus also includes a medical office building, orthopedics, a women's center, a radiol-

ogy center and other specialties, Pofahl said.

He said the location of the hospital was decided based on interviews with local physicians.

"I never had any intention of building a hospital," Pofahl said.

The original plan was to open a small clinic in an underserved area of the city, he said. But local physicians were so supportive that it grew into a full hospital.

The pandemic delayed the hospital's opening, but it is now operational, Pofahl said.

"We just encourage people to come and visit," he said. "We are already a vital part of the medical community."

Pofahl said another medical office building should be open on the Three Crosses campus

within about 10 months, with more expansion to come, including a hotel.

Covid update

During a health care update for Leadership Las Cruces, Pofahl said about 96 percent of Covid patients at Three Crosses Hospital have not received a Covid vaccine, which he said matched the national average.

"Covid has changed so

many things," Pofahl said.

"It's stressing the system, that's for sure. Some treatments being offered now are helping Covid patients recover quicker. I see great hope and excitement. It's a pretty exciting time in health care with the new equipment for diagnosis and new treatments," Pofahl continued.
