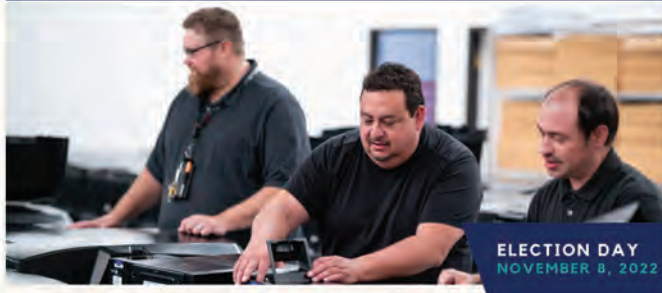

School's starting July 20? Yes, here's what you need to know

Las Cruces Public Schools begins the 2022-23 school year Wednesday, July 20, as the school district moves to a year-round school calendar that adds 10 days of instruction, reduces the summer break and adds a two-week fall intercession.

Kindergarten, sixth- and ninth-grade students return to classes July 20. All other students return July 21.

The LCPS Board of Education decided to adopt year-round schooling earlier this year to improve student performance, LCPS Public Information Officer Kelly Jameson said.

"We owe it to our kids to try something different," Jameson said. "This is a solution experts in the field felt was appropriate."

Jameson said LCPS decided to adopt year-round school this

year because state funding was available.

"The board thought it was time," Jameson said.

Free meals

Thanks to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) program, all LCPS elementary and middle school students will receive free breakfasts and lunches during the 2022-23 school year, said LCPS Community Outreach Liaison Brigitte Zigelhofer. She said LCPS has applied for CEP funding for all high schools. CEP is a non-pricing meal service option for school districts in low-income areas.

School safety

Zigelhofer and Jameson said LCPS will continue to focus on school safety in the new school year.

The LCPS website includes a

message from Amy Himelright, director of mental health and academic counseling for the district. Himelright addresses in particular the May 24, 2022,

shooting at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde, Texas that took the lives of 19 students and two teachers and wounded 17 others.

"When teachers and parents talk about safety measures and practice things like safety drills, doing so with calm, confidence, and competence also mitigates negative outcomes for children," Himelright said on the website. "We can send a message to our young people that we will protect them, they are not helpless, and there are things like situational awareness, knowing where to go and how to respond in a crisis, and keeping an open line of communication with trusted adults, can all be within their control and can keep them safe."

Life journeys lead bicycle enthusiast to Las Cruces

The Hub community bike shop mechanic Hal Ruzal can build and repair bicycles. He also likes to ride them.

Ruzal, 68, has ridden a bike across the continental United States four times since 1980 and estimates he has logged more than 400,000 miles on a bike. In March, he biked from Grover Beach, California, to Las Cruces in 13 days, averaging more than 100 miles a day on the 1,062-mile trip.

Ruzal ate a lot of Impossible Whoppers at Burger Kings along the way (he has been a vegetarian since 1975) and slept on a bedroll in campgrounds most nights, but spent the cold ones in motels.

He took a spare tire and eight spare inner tubes on the trip, but didn't have any flats or other mechanical issues, Ruzal said.

"I just take it as it comes," he said. "I'm really good at not worrying about a thing."

In fact, most of his travels on a bike

have been pretty carefree.

Ruzal encountered two guys at a campground in Missouri a couple of years ago and had a feeling they were looking for trouble. So, he went up to them and asked if they had a 327 or a 396 engine in the Chevy Nova they were driving. (He's also an auto mechanic).

"We talked about cars all night," Ruzal said. "They forgot they were going to get into a fight with me."

He also remembers being outside a grocery store once when "a guy gave me \$20 out of nowhere. You never refuse money," Ruzal said.

He also plays the guitar and writes songs, often composing lyrics while riding his bike.

"Songs are always in my head," Ruzal said. "The hard part is remembering them."

One he does remember is "You Don't Care," which he wrote about an old girlfriend.

A New York City native, Ruzal discovered Las Cruces as he came down San Augustin Pass on a bike trip more than

40 years ago.

"It felt good," he said.

So, 39 years later, Ruzal came back and bought a house here. He also has two antique cars that he works on, a dog named Shiloh and eight bikes, including the English-made 1987 Woodrup bicycle he rode from California to New Mexico.

"It was custom-made for somebody," said Ruzal. "I got it as a result of a bad relationship."

He was given the bike by a neighbor in New York after it was left at the neighbor's house by his daughter's boyfriend.

Ruzal completely overhauled that bike and has also made a bike for himself. Those skills have come in handy at The Hub, which is at the north end of Cruces Creatives makerspace.

"We do a lot of fixing bikes," Ruzal said, especially for homeless people and "good people who have had bad luck."

"It's nice giving back," Ruzal said. "I've been a mechanic my whole life. I love giving back to people."

In addition to a lot of bike riding,

We New Mexicans have a strange relationship with rain. For one thing, we don't trust it.

We've all seen too many days with skies full of dark, pregnant clouds that never yield a drop. And we've seen threatening weather yield a measly hundred drops, just enough to mess up the windows of the car we washed yesterday.

We've also seen lots of sunny, bright clear days, days where we've planned a great outdoor activity. And about 4 p.m., clouds roll in from nowhere and dump a 20-minute shower on our best laid plans.

But, as with any true love, we keep pining for the rain, no matter how many times it's burned us, done us wrong, or left us high and dry.

In a perplexing irony, it seems we see more rainbows than rain in New Mexico.

Sure enough, though, almost

like clockwork, the monsoon rains came back to us this past Fourth of July and, this time, had the good sense to wait until the majority of the fireworks had died down.

The too-brief rains we've seen the past couple of weeks have changed the entire landscape of our piece Chihuahuan Desert.

Ocotillos, lean and brown for months, are suddenly fluffy and bright green. The dusty pale Texas sage bushes erupted into bright purple all over the Mesilla Valley, attracting mysterious buzzing moths as big as hummingbirds. Flowers magically appeared from every plant imaginable, dazzling us with arrays of color. Frogs of many sizes and colors have materialized as if from thin air. There's even water in the Rio Grande, for a little while longer anyway.

Is there a better aroma in the world than the desert after the rains?

I admit green chiles in the roasters is a close second, but the desert rains are also a harbinger for the Hatch harvest, which typically follows the monsoons.

My friend and former co-worker Ellis Neel was a photographer at the Alamogordo Daily News when I worked there. He spent most of his life in Delaware and Philadelphia before his adventurous trip out west. He would sometimes marvel at the kaleidoscope New Mexico skies, or stare in awe at the alpenglow on the Sacramento Mountains, shake his head and mutter, "Man! I can't believe I live here. It's something else."

In the early mornings, or sometimes near sunset, the light catches the utility wires just so. "Gossamer" was the term Ellis used for the wires' reflections at the golden time of day. Indeed, they can look just like finely

spun spider webs.

Even when the clouds are unproductive, they can make for some beautiful scenery. Every color imaginable, wild shapes, dancing with the sun. Montana bills itself as Big Sky Country. Since I've never been to that state, I can't comment fairly. But if they are any bigger than the big, beautiful skies here in the Land of Enchantment, I will gladly tip my hat.

When the rains finally do come, whether for two minutes or two hours, they bring smiles to our faces.

Sitting on a covered porch or patio, watching and listening to the rain, especially when it's accompanied by lightning, can be delightfully soothing, renewing the human spirit as it renews life in our desert.

By the end of August, the monsoons will be over, but the high temperatures will remain until mid-October.

My advice? Enjoy the rains while they last.

Courts reveal cracks in process for city projects

The conversion of unused tennis courts at Apodaca Park to new pickleball courts that get played on every day is an example of city leaders listening to residents and making better use of existing facilities.

That's the good news.

The bad news is that less than nine months after the Oct. 1 ribbon-cutting ceremony last year, cracks have developed running east to west along both ends of the court. Smaller cracks have started to spiderweb throughout the playing surface.

New fencing was installed on three of the four sides. On the north side, where the old fencing remains, the latch to the gate is held in place by a rusty nail that has been bent to serve the purpose. Ironically, it is the only gate that is compliant with federal ADA regulations, but there is no sidewalk leading to it.

All of the work was done without required permits and

inspections, former Parks and Recreation Advisory Board member Frank Carril explained recently on KTAL-LP community radio.

"This project was never permitted, and it never spawned any inspections," Carril said.

That was because the contractor told the state that the project only included rehabilitation of the existing pad and construction of a new sidewalk, which would not

require a permit, Carril said. In fact, the job expanded the size of the pad by eight feet on both the west and east sides and by four feet on the south side, which is why new fencing was required on those three sides.

"Over 65 cubic yards of concrete, steel, rebar and everything else, and then the fence being placed upon that with footings and foundations," Carril said, all done without a permit or inspection.

City officials are also relying on the excuse that the project was renovation of an existing facility for the decision to ignore ADA requirements, making the courts inaccessible to players in wheelchairs.

Carril, who had 20 years of contracting experience before his retirement, said the city needs to change from the current request for proposal process, in which the city sets the price and leaves the details to the contractor, to a request for bid process, which gives the city more control and is less susceptible to corruption.

City officials are in the process of putting together the package of projects for the upcoming general obligation bond election in November.

I've always voted for the GO bond in the past because I believe we need to continue investing in our community. But this year I've got some new questions about what process will be used to select the contactors and how we ensure that everything is properly permitted and inspected.

12 Democrats unopposed in November county races

Thursday, June 30, was filing day for write-in candidates for offices that will be on the Nov. 8 general election ballot in New Mexico. One Republican candidate filed in Doña Ana County to run for state representative.

That means 12 local Democrats will have no opponents on the Nov. 8 general election ballot: seven candidates, including six incumbents, running for magistrate judge; two candidates, including one incumbent, for district judge; candidates for Doña Ana County Commission district one (Christopher Schaljo-Hernandez), county assessor (Gina Ortega) and probate

judge (Judith Ann Baca).

The race for county sheriff is contested, as incumbent Democrat Kim Stewart takes on Republican Byron Hollister. The race for county commission district three has incumbent Democrat Shannon Reynolds against Republican Patricia Kimble.

In New Mexico House of Representatives races that include Doña Ana County, Republican Mark Vieth of La Mesa filed June 30 as a write-in candidate against incumbent Democrat Ray Lara of Chamberino in District 34. Republican write-in candidate Charles Wendler of Las Cruces had previously filed to run against incumbent Democrat Micaela Lara Cadena of Mesilla in

House District 33.

The other contested House races that include Doña Ana County are District 32 (incumbent Democrat Candie Sweetser vs. Republican Jenifer Jones, both of Deming); District 35 (incumbent Democrat Angelica Rubio vs. Republican Richelle Peugh-Swofford, both of Las Cruces, in a rematch of the 2020 race); District 36 (incumbent Democrat Nathan Small vs. Republican Kimberly Skaggs [chair of the Doña Ana County Republican Party], both of Las Cruces); District 37 (incumbent Democrat Joanne Ferrary vs. Republican Rene Rodriguez, both of Las Cruces); District 38 (Democrat Tara Jaramillo of Socorro vs. Republican

Sandra Hammack of San Antonio running for an open seat, as incumbent Republican Rebecca Dow of Truth or Consequences ran for governor); District 52 (incumbent Democrat Doreen Gallegos vs. John Foreman, both of Las Cruces, in a rematch of the 2020 race); and District 53 (incumbent Democrat Willie Madrid of Chaparral vs. Republican Elizabeth Winterrowd of Las Cruces).

Doña Ana County is included in two House districts for the first time in 2022 because of legislative redistricting: District 32, which also includes Luna and Hidalgo counties; and District 38, which also includes portions of Socorro and Sierra counties. As a result of redistricting,

Doña Ana County is no longer part of District 39, which now includes Grant County and portions of Catron and Hidalgo counties.

Statewide, there are contested races for governor/lieutenant governor (they run on the same ticket), attorney general, land commissioner, secretary of state, state treasurer and state auditor; and three U.S. House seats, voted on by district, including the NM02 race between incumbent Republican Yvette Herrell of Alamogordo and Democrat Gabriel Vasquez of Las Cruces.

There are also contested races for two seats on the New Mexico Supreme Court and two on the New Mexico Court of Appeals,

as Republicans challenge incumbent Democrats appointed by Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham in all four races. State Supreme Court Justice Michael Vigil is on the ballot in a retention election.

Two candidates for the New Mexico Public Education Commission in districts six (a Republican) and seven (an incumbent Democrat), which include Doña Ana County, are unopposed in November.

The November ballot will also include three proposed constitutional amendments and three statewide bond issues. City of Las Cruces voters will also be asked to vote on questions about spending \$23 million in general obligation bond funds for city projects.

Closing the gaps: Groups discuss strategies to fight poverty

It was a meeting of the minds – and hearts – as leaders from the City of Las Cruces, the local faith-based community and nonprofits continued their conversation June 30 at City Hall about ways to close gaps in services for people struggling with homelessness and poverty.

The group, called Faith for the Unhoused, held its first meeting in May and plans to continue monthly meetings at City Hall.

“This mission to get rid of poverty in our area ... we need to do this together,” said Casa de Peregrinos emergency food program Executive Director Lorenzo Alba.

“None of us can do it by ourselves alone,” Gospel Rescue Mission Executive Director Henry Young said. “Unless we all work together, we’re not going to see a lot of progress.”

“These are incredible folks doing incredible work,” City Councilor Johana Bencomo said during a panel discussion that included Alba and Young, along with Mesilla Valley Community of Hope Housing Programs Manager

Erin Boyd and Housing Specialist Christina Gallardo from Mesilla Valley Community of Hope, LC3 behavioral health collaborative Community Organizer Logan Howard and Families and Youth, Inc. CEO Jolene Martinez.

Others attending the meeting included representatives from Ngage New Mexico, New Mexico CAFé, Southern New Mexico Pride, local clergy and faith leaders and city officials, including City Manager Ifo Pili, Economic Development Department Deputy Director Francisco Pallares and Housing and Neighborhood Services Manager Natalie Green.

Pili said he “saw the effects of poverty and homelessness in our community” soon after moving to Las Cruces to become city manager in September 2020.

The message to him from every city council member, Pili said, was “Help us alleviate poverty.”

Although it is a poor country, Pili said his native American Samoa has “zero homeless” because of “faith and family.”

He sees that same opportunity in Las Cruces.

On July 30, Pili said, his

office will kick off its Lift Up Las Cruces program, which will “get at the root cause of poverty in our community,” by focusing on areas of the city that have the highest concentration of poverty and crime and directing city resources to them.

“I believe we have come up with a program that is going to be successful,” Pili said. “We’re really excited about it.”

Lift Up Las Cruces is “the bones of a program,” he said. “The meat that comes around that is you and you and you,” Pili said to those attending the meeting.

The meeting also focused on a web-based referral program called Symbify, which Ngage New Mexico Executive Director Lori Martinez said can connect churches, nonprofits and government agencies to each other and to thousands of local and statewide services.

Martinez said Ngage began using the program with early childhood education providers and wants to make it “useable for everybody” to track the success of client referrals.

The gaps identified at

Electronic Caregiver chess tournament attracts young, old

Chess players from kindergarten age to 82, including beginners and champions, gathered June 24 on the seventh floor of the Electronic Caregiver (ECG) tower in downtown Las Cruces for ECG's first ever International Chess Tournament, which was open to the community.

"It's just an amazing group of players," said ECG Executive Director John Muñoz, who coordinated the tournament. "You can feel the energy." It began because ECG's 250 employees include chess players, Muñoz said, and the company saw it as another great way to connect with the community of which it is a part.

The tournament also helps build leaders, he said, bring potential ECG employees into the ECG tower for the first time and see its cutting-edge technology first hand.

"We want them to stay in our community and work here," Muñoz said.

"It's what we do and who we are," said Muñoz, who is one of ECG's chess players, along with Public Relations Specialist Jesse Vick.

The chess tournament "brings the community together," said Vick, who has been playing chess for two decades, after his dad got him started at age 9.

Vick, a national chess expert with the US Chess Federation, has more than 50 trophies and medals from chess tournaments he has won.

"You can play with someone across the world without speaking a common language," he said.

When he's playing chess, "I become a different person," Vick said. "I put my heart and soul into the game of chess. It's life or death for me," he said. "You have to take every move seriously." And, "you have to know how to win" – a player can't relax just because it looks like he or she is on the verge of victory, he said.

Chess is a great skill for people to learn, Vick said, especially children.

"It's fun. It's a unique sport," said Manuel Castillo, who is president of the Southern New Mexico Chess Academy in Las Cruces.

The academy has 25 members ranging in age from 5 to middle schoolers, said Castillo, who has been playing chess since

age 7 and coaching the game since 2011. His son, Manuel Jr., 11, is a student at Monte Vista Elementary School in Las Cruces and is excelling in chess, his father said.

"His son's fantastic," said Vick, who coaches the younger Castillo.

"Chess is a form of language," Castillo said. It helps children learn de-

cision-making skills and how to make a plan.

Kids also learn at a young age that it's okay to lose, he said.

"You set up the board again," Castillo said. "You don't lose; you learn."

Castillo said he is "forever grateful" to ECG for starting the tournament.

Tournament winners were, kindergarten-grade

Film, TV production in Las Cruces sets records

What do Mel Gibson, Bruce Willis, Kelsey Grammer, Dolph Lundgren, Kate Bosworth, Ryan Philippe and Ving Rhames have in common? They've all been in Las Cruces in the past 14 months filming major motion pictures.

A local film and television production boom began in April 2021, when actors Thomas Jane and Emile Hirsch came to town to film "Dig." That was followed by Willis in "The Knight," Gibson in "Hot Seat" and Philippe, Bosworth and Rhames in "The Locksmith." Lundgren and Grammer were here filming "Wanted Man" earlier this year.

Other major productions in Las Cruces and Mesilla since last spring have included "Chupa," "The Price We Pay," "Bad Hombres" and "Squealer." And, four years ago, Clint Eastwood made his second visit to Las Cruces (the first was in 1968 for "Hang 'Em High") to film the blockbuster "The Mule."

And, Netflix has been in the Las Cruces-El Paso area since May shooting a reality television series,

said Las Cruces Film Liaison Jonathon Sepp.

For the fiscal year that ended June 30, film and television production has generated almost \$8 million in direct spending in Las Cruces and Doña Ana County, Sepp said. That is the biggest year ever for the city and county. In second place is FY2019, when spending totaled \$2.6 million.

This fiscal year's productions have generated 8,600 room nights in area hotels and motels, 9,600 worker days and 195 productions days, Sepp said.

And there is a more coming.

Sepp and Assistant Film Liaison Andrew Jara were engaged in more than a dozen "active conversations" about film and TV productions interested in Las Cruces when Sepp spoke to the Bulletin in mid-June, and he had held a half-dozen telephone conversations with feature film producers the week before, Sepp said.

The key, he said, is to get producers and location scouts to come to Las Cruces. The locations, the quality of crew and the welcome they will receive in the city and throughout the county will show them "why Las Cruces is such a great place to film," Sepp said.

"The reputation of our film office and our locations is starting to blossom and pay off for us," said state Sen. Jeff Steinborn, who is president of Film Las Cruces (FLC), the nonprofit created in 2015 to support and expand the film and media industry in the city and

county.

Local production has also benefited from the five percent tax credit offered to producers who make films and television shows at least 60 miles outside Bernalillo and Santa Fe counties, Steinborn said. He guided a bill through the New Mexico Legislature in 2019 that added the additional five percent credit to existing tax credits the state offers filmmakers.

"It's all about incentives in the film industry," Steinborn said. "Even the biggest-budget films are cost conscious," he said, looking for places "where they can make their film on a budget."

"Las Cruces is one of the very best places to film in America for an independent or major filmmaker," Steinborn said. "Our job is to get that story out and to keep getting that story out."

Filmmakers, he said, "tend to go back to a place they have comfort with. We are definitely

seeing that."

Film producers who have worked in Las Cruces and Doña Ana County "are becoming our newest ambassadors," Steinborn said. "We will literally stop at nothing to make them feel great about their time in our community."

Another encouraging development, Sepp and Steinborn said, is the increase in locally based union members. There were about a dozen IATSE Local 480 (New Mexico's largest film union) members in Las Cruces and Doña Ana County a year ago, Sepp said, and that number has grown to at least 30.

The bigger the local crew, the more attractive the area is to film producers, Sepp said, because they won't have the added expense of bringing in their own. A single production could employ 75-200 crew members, Sepp said.

For example, when "Bad Hombres" was

filmed in Las Cruces last year, it employed approximately 125 crew members, 20 principal actors and 30 background and extras – all from New Mexico.

"There's lots of activity in the training world," Sepp said. "Seeing the crew base grow has been incredible."

Doña Ana Community College's Creative Media Technology (CMT) program continues to train crew members, Sepp said, and is an important part of the nonprofit Film Las Cruces (FLC) partnership that also includes New Mexico State University's Creative Media Institute (CMI).

FLC "has great relationships with both schools and their film programs," Steinborn said.

"On a personal level, from the very beginning of working on film economic development, it broke my heart to see our kids and young filmmaking talent have to move away for work," Steinborn said. "The dream was always to be able to help them achieve their dreams here in this town. Local people working ... is personally one of the most satisfying things to see happening."

"What helps (build the local crew base) is bringing in a steady stream of work," Steinborn said. "That's where this last year has been really huge for us. We need to just keep it going and constantly working to bring the next show in."

City council honors Battle of Bunker Hill, Sons of the American Revolution

The Battle of Bunker Hill was fought The Battle of Bunker Hill was fought June 17, 1775, during the Siege of Boston in the first stage of the American Revolutionary War (1775-83), which had begun two months earlier.

"Despite their loss, the inexperienced colonial forces inflicted significant casualties against the (invading British Army), and the battle provided them with an important confidence boost during the Siege of Boston (April 1775-March 1776)," according to www.history.com. "Although

commonly referred to as the Battle of Bunker Hill, most of the fighting occurred on nearby Breed's Hill."

The Sons of the American Revolution is a hereditary, non-profit, non-partisan organization dedicated to promoting patriotism, preserving American history and teaching American history to future generations.

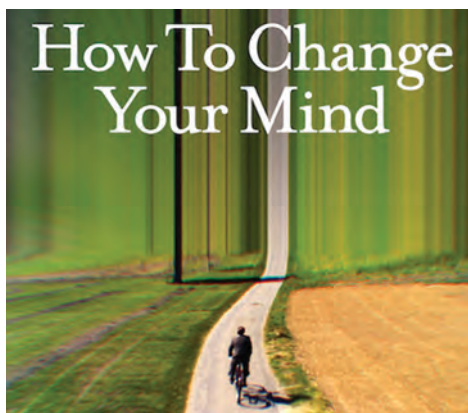

Charlize Theron goes ‘Atomic’ in spy thriller

“Atomic Blonde” definitely is a case of style over substance, but what style – and if they gave Oscars to physical trainers, those who got Charlize Theron ready for the 2017 adaptation of a graphic novel (which FX shows Monday, July 11, and Tuesday, July 12) would have been a shoo-in.

Already well-versed in the action-adventure world by then, with examples such as “Mad Max: Fury Road” and “The Fate of the Furious,” the actress plays a British spy in the late 1980s. She recounts to her superiors (Toby Jones and John Goodman) the details of a Berlin mission that James Bond would feel familiar with: recovering a list of agents operating under assumed identities. Of course, once they’re exposed, their deaths will be virtually certain.

The flashbacks show how she gets along, or doesn’t, with fellow operatives played by James McAvoy and Sofia Boutella. But what the movie does best is to turn Theron loose with a physical ferocity that only certain actresses can embody so well. Scarlett Johansson also comes to mind, of course, but only a handful of talents could get away with this so adeptly and convincingly.

“Atomic Blonde” supplies some early hints of that, but those are only setting the stage for the unquestionable centerpiece, a prolonged and enjoyably showy segment up and down the staircase of an apartment building as Theron dispatches various enemies. (The term “Stairmaster” absolutely gets a new meaning here.)

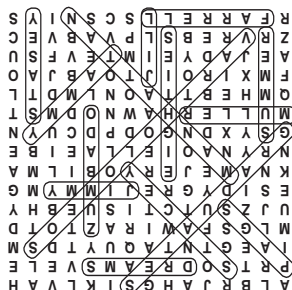

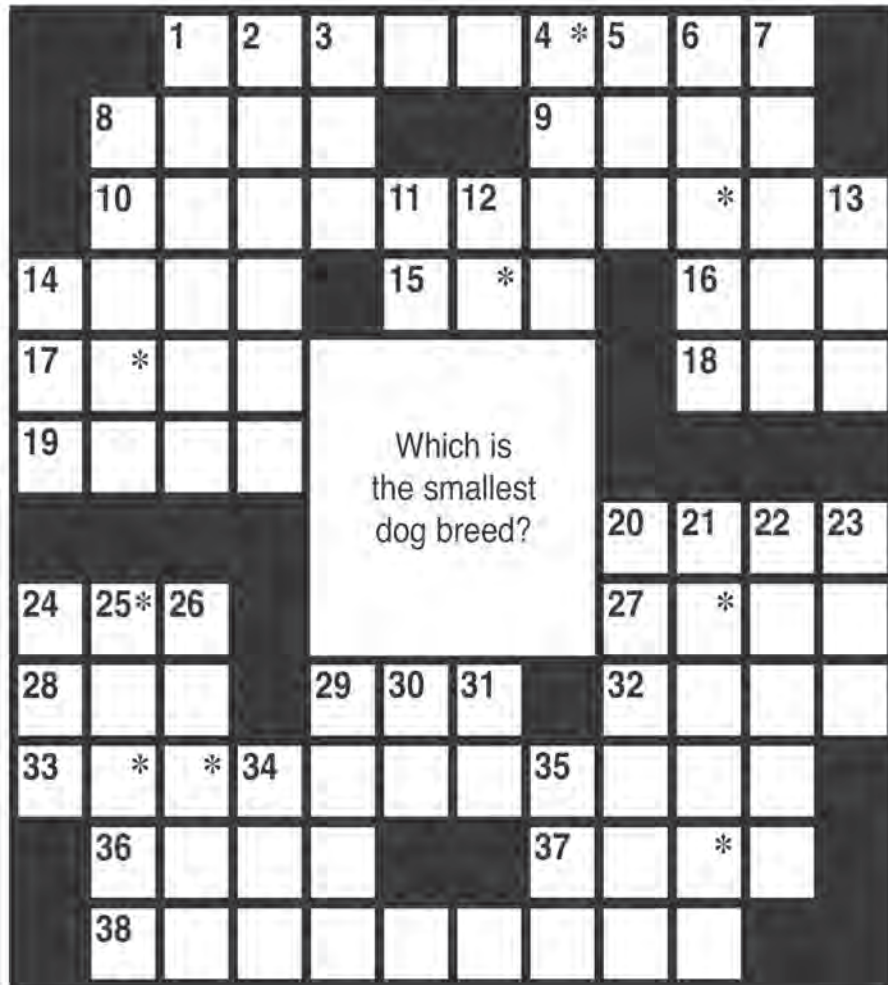

Artspace Consulting, a division of Artspace Projects Inc., a nonprofit developer of creative spaces based in Minneapolis, Minnesota, has been engaged by the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico (CFSNM) and Doña Ana Arts Council (DAAC) to study this possibility.

Artspace Consulting will conduct a hybrid preliminary feasibility study and meet with artists, arts organizations, city officials, funders and other stakeholders in Las Cruces to conduct the study.

Artspace looks at multiple buildings and sites to start to visualize the project and holds a public meeting to listen to the creative sector on their space needs. There are six areas of consideration during the study: alignment with broader community goals, local leadership, funding and finance, potential sites, creative sector and project concept.

The local partners are setting up a "Las Cruces Core Group" to lead the study.

Community members are encouraged to stay tuned for more information on virtual focus groups and how to participate in Artspace Consulting's in-person visit and public meetings in the coming months. Artspace Projects has 57 artist-centered facilities across the United States (including Arizona, Colorado, Nevada, Texas and California), each with its own

personality and unique connections to where it is located.

From www.artspace.org/roderick: "In partnership with the El Paso Community Foundation and the City of El Paso, Artspace transformed a vacant lot in downtown El Paso, 601 N. Oregon St., into an arts destination (Roderick Artspace Lofts) animated by artists and creative businesses, helping to rejuvenate a challenged neighborhood. This beautiful new building blends 51 affordable live/work units for artists and their families with 5,000 square feet of multi-purpose nonprofit commercial space and a large community room." The project, completed in 2016, cost \$12.7 million. Visit www.facebook.com/ArtspaceElPasoLofts.

Artspace specializes "in creating, owning, and operating affordable spaces for artists and creative

businesses," according to www.artspace.org. "These spaces include live/work apartments for artists and their families, working artist studios, arts centers, commercial space for arts-friendly businesses and other projects."

"Artspace is thrilled to begin this feasibility study in Las Cruces after many years of conversations with community members about the critical importance of affordable space to the creative community," said Artspace Senior Vice President Wendy Holmes.

The study is made possible by very generous gifts made to CFSNM, both directly and on behalf of DAAC, with this specific study in mind. CFSNM

has been a collaborator for many years and is the co-lead for the study.

"Our board of directors, and team, are excited to partner in the first steps to a larger live/workspace for artists in our community," said CFSNM President and CEO Terra Winter.

"A matching grant of \$7,500 from the USBank Foundation allowed our team to create an opportunity to raise the funds needed to complete the feasibility study. Continual funds will be raised locally and managed by the foundation team while focusing on the sustainability of the project. This is a wonderful opportunity for our nonprofit community to focus on affordable housing while continuing to support the arts in our community."

The Board of Directors of the Arts Council has been unanimous and enthusiastic in its support for the project. The fact that it

is an included action in the Las Cruces Arts and Cultural District (ACD) plan also helps, and we are very grateful to the individuals and entities making major gifts to get this started. It is going to be very good for the arts in our region, and that is going to be very good for our region.

Greg Smith, executive director of the Doña Ana Arts Council, said that artists and representatives from the City of Las Cruces, Downtown Las Cruces Partnership (including ACD), Cruces Creatives, the NMSU Art Museum and other entities will be part of the study.

Still covering the arts from A to Z, DAAC moves from A to B

The Doña Ana Arts Council (DAAC) is moving, but only a short distance.

DAAC will stay at 250 W. Amador Ave., but move from suite A to suite B, Executive Director Greg Smith said in a news release. The new location is in the same parking lot and on the north side of the existing location.

Smith said the DAAC had completed the move by July 1. The move was necessary, he said, because the new owners of the building, "are reconfiguring the spaces in suite A, and our moving out allows them to get started earlier without us having to contend with construction noise and dust."

"Of course, we'd have loved to be able to stay in suite A at 250 W. Amador Ave." Smith said. "It has been the best gallery ever for the Arts Council, but we are excited about what we can do in Suite B. We are looking forward to artists and other members of the public enjoying the increased wall space in the galleries, and we are still adjacent to the Arts and Cultural District (ACD)."

Smith noted that the DAAC continues its search for a permanent home.

"There currently are actually four conversations that show promise," Smith said about a possible permanent location for DAAC. "Those conversations include some hope for a location in or adjacent to ACD, but

there is also potential for one not too far from downtown and another closer to NMSU."

While Covid has restricted the number of small concerts DAAC has been able to host, Smith said he is looking forward to the galleries continuing to be assets for the arts in the community and more concerts coming in the future.

"Between the Artspace discussion and some other bubbling opportunities, things are looking good for the arts in Las Cruces," he said.

DAAC supports and promotes the arts as both part of a thriving creative economy and a source of community pride. DAAC Board meetings are held on the fourth Thursday of most months.

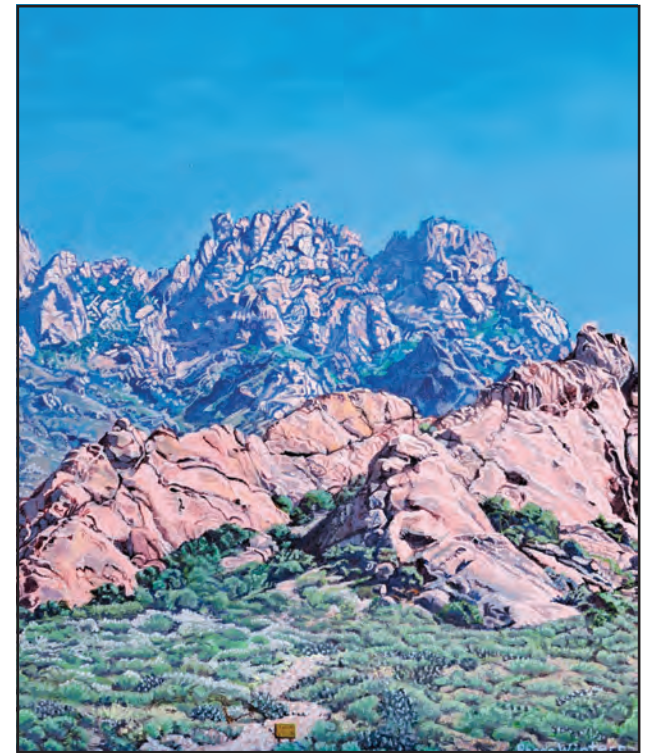

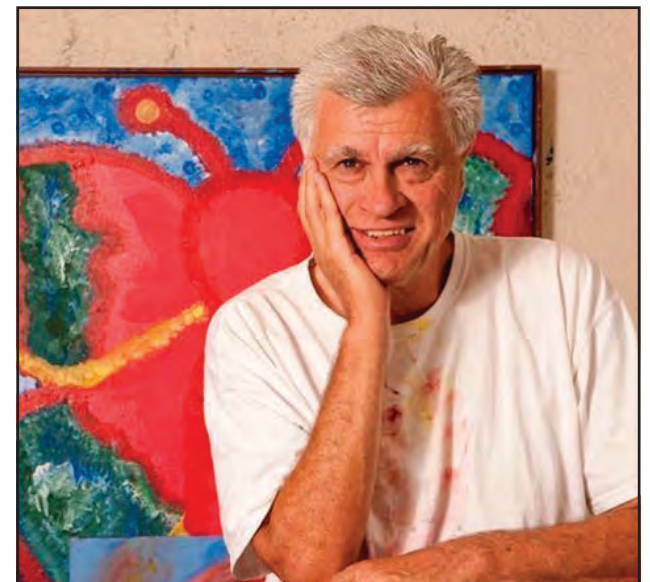
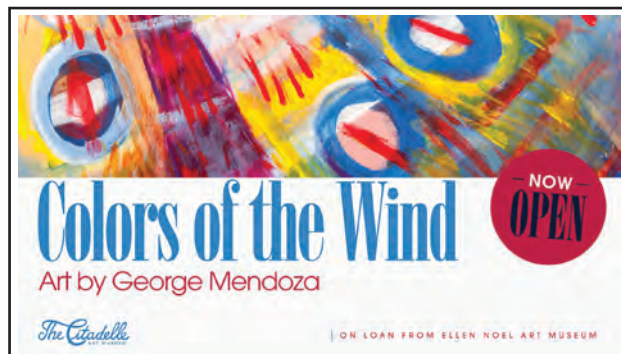
Prize in fiction for “Journey of the Spirit Man.”

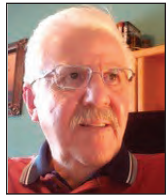

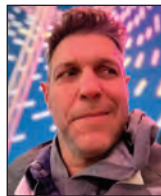

"Anderson takes inspiration from original Navajo spinning songs to produce a completely different sound that combines Native American rhythms and melodies with jazz, funk, and hip-hop," the news release said.

Anderson, a faculty member at San Juan College in Farmington, "bases his music on traditional spinning songs from Native Americans," BLM said. "Historically, Navajo spinning songs have been a way for Diné

to compose new pieces reflecting the present

moment. Traditionally passed from generation

to generation, spinning songs grew with the times

and are still present today.

BLM is sponsoring the Painted Mountains Tour as part of the artist in residence program.

"The tour and residency closely align with Interior's priority to strengthen the government-to-government relationship with sovereign tribal nations," BLM said.

BLM manages approximately 245 million acres

of public land located primarily in 12 western states, including Alaska.

The BLM also administers 700 million acres of sub-surface mineral estate throughout the nation.

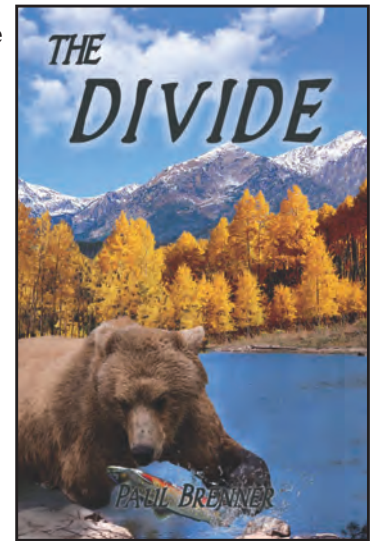
As Wyatt enters his final year as a guide and prepares to pass the business on to his son, his plans for a smooth

Native flute album combines styles

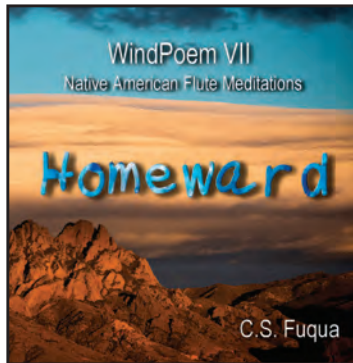

Las Cruces-based musician and author C.S. Fuqua has taken a slightly different approach with his latest Native American style flute album “Homeward: WindPoem VII, Native American Flute Meditations,” combining traditional sound and harmonies with modern structure and percussion, the artist said in a news release.

“With popularity centered around its unique and novel sound, the Native American flute has come a long way over the last three decades and is now featured in a variety of music genres and styles, from folk and jazz to orchestral and world,” Fuqua said. “And yet solo instrumental renditions remain the instrument’s most powerful — and perhaps most popular — means of reaching listeners.”

Four years have passed since “Simplicity,” Fuqua’s last WindPoem native flute album, the artist said. During that time, he produced two albums of multi-instrumental world music incorporating native flute. With “Homeward,” Fuqua “returns to the soulful power of solo native flute that made his first six WindPoem albums favorites among those seeking relaxing, meditative music.”

“I produced this album specifically to create the same type of calm and relaxation as earlier WindPoem recordings but with a more modern, melodic



sound,” Fuqua said.

“Erroneously portrayed as a male-dominated instrument used solely for courting, the Native American flute historically has been an instrument played by children, women and men in a variety of capacities, including spiritual and fertility rites, courting, mourning rituals, basic entertainment and as an instrument of greeting between individuals and villages,” Fuqua said. “In every role, it has been and remains an instrument whose melody is both haunting and soothing.”

Fuqua said he wrote and performed all instrumentals for the album, playing flutes that he made.

Fuqua is the author of the book “Native American Flute: A Comprehensive Guide, Craft & History.”

Interns Investigate and Learn Career Options at LCU

New Mexico Public Education Department (PED) funded Doca Ana County’s (DAC) 2022 Summer Enrichment Internship Program for the second year. The program allows high school students to work with private businesses and government agencies like Las Cruces Utilities (LCU).

Students can earn up to \$2,600.00 by participating in the internship, being paid \$13.00 per hour, up from \$10.50 per hour in 2021, and working up to 200 hours, as opposed to 120 hours last summer. Also, unlike the previous year, 15-year-olds with a work permit were eligible to participate in the summer internship program. They can join juniors, seniors, and prior interns in their first year of college.

One of the 12 LCU interns, Ariana McKahan, was placed in LCU Administration to shadow LCU Director Delilah Walsh. McKahan helped during board meetings and saw how Walsh engaged with commissioners, city staff, and the public.

“I was surprised how friendly all the staff

are and how much they’re willing to help,” McKahan said. “I wanted to do this internship to gain real experience for a future career. Even if local government isn’t where you end up going, at least you have more knowledge about the system.”

Other interns were placed throughout LCU – in Solid Waste, Natural Gas and Energy, Technical Support, Water, and the new Management of Information Systems (MIS) program – and got chances to ride along with workers in the field as much as possible. Interns also received a structured type of professional development that LCU values for all its employees, from full-

time to temporary, and even interns.

“Since this was the second year that LCU has hosted DAC interns, we wanted to prepare a more defined program,” said Walsh. “Our staff spent time developing a curriculum that not only gives the students an understanding of the services we provide for the public but covers concepts they might have learned about in school and now they get a chance to see how those concepts are used in a professional setting.”

Interns took classes taught by LCU staff that covered things like basic accounting, which aids in setting rates for services; cybersecurity, which keeps customer data safe; and microbiology, which is integral for wastewater systems.

LCU Board Commissioner Raymond Hickman, who had a long career as a professional engineer, also wanted to join LCU staff in teaching a class on career management that asked students to question themselves and find how their interests and skills can align to build a life.

“The purpose of my presentation was to give them a focused idea on how to move forward in their career, what to do and how to do it,” Hickman said. “At this stage of their lives, and in remembering my own experience, students are presented, bombarded even, with too many choices, many focused on going to college. For some, it’s a good choice. For others, vocational schools, along with working, is a much better path.”

State initiative to lower small business health insurance premiums

New Mexico Superintendent of Insurance Russell Toal announced that a new initiative will reduce small business health insurance premiums by 10 percent beginning July 1, 2022.

"Small businesses are the backbone of New Mexico's economy," Toal said. "This premium relief comes at a

critical moment in our state's economic recovery. I applaud Governor Lujan Grisham and the Legislature for prioritizing assistance to small businesses."

The Small Business Health Insurance Premium Relief Initiative, which is available to businesses with 50 or fewer employees that offer health insurance that is compliant with the Affordable Care Act to their

employees, was made possible by a bill passed during the 2021 legislative session that created a Health Care Affordability Fund.

Under the law, the New Mexico Office of Superintendent of Insurance (OSI) is charged with implementing programs to lower health insurance costs for individuals, families and small businesses. This fall, OSI

will launch a program to lower premiums and out-of-pocket costs for individuals who purchase health insurance coverage on beWellnm, the state's Health Insurance Marketplace.

"We hope that OSI's initiative will provide meaningful economic relief for small businesses and their employees," said Rob Black, CEO of the New Mexico Chamber of Com-

merce. "With other business costs on the rise, a reduction in health care premiums would be welcome news for small businesses across New Mexico."

Taiwanese visit keeps Santa Teresa profile high in Asia

The Mesilla Valley Economic Development (MVEDA) and the Border Industrial Association (BIA) joined the New Mexico Economic Development Department (EDD) June 30 in hosting a delegation of Taiwanese business executives exploring opportunities in the New Mexico Borderplex region, MVEDA said in a news release.

The delegation consisted mostly of executives involved in the electric vehicle industry and representatives from the Taiwanese Electronic,

Electrical and Mechanical Association, MVEDA said. "Delegation members were exposed to the region's unique assets that support cross border manufacturing and logistics and how that fits into their near-shoring and on-shoring strategies for the United States," the news release said.

The day included tours of the Santa Teresa area and presentations by state and local officials and business representatives operating in both Santa Teresa and Ciudad Juarez, Mexico.

The Borderplex was one of only three regions

across the U.S. the delegation visited, MVEDA said. The visit was designed to gain understanding about the region's automobile supply chain and identify potential investment opportunities in Santa Teresa.

"We have been fortunate to recruit three Taiwanese companies in the Santa Teresa industrial base during the past three years," BIA President Jerry Pacheco told the Bulletin. "Hosting delegations such as this helps keep awareness high in Asia of Santa Teresa's advantages for manufacturing and logistics."

"With the growth of companies seeking to on-shore their manufacturing to the U.S. and with the supply chain challenges that are prevalent across all industries, the advantages found in the New Mexico Borderplex region are becoming more recognized by international companies," said MVEDA President and CEO Davin Lopez. "Our proximity to the manufacturing powerhouse of Ciudad Juarez and Chihuahua, our grow-

ing advanced logistics capabilities, along with our centralized southwest geographical location, enable companies to shorten their supply chains and reach their U.S. customers more efficiently. We hope to continue to strengthen this relation-

ship with our friends from Taiwan as we move forward," Lopez said.

"It was a great honor to host the delegation from Taiwan in New Mexico," said EDD Division Director Mark Roper. "To have them in Doña Ana County first-hand allowed them to directly see the logistical and operating advantages that our proximity to the border offers. This is a continuation of dialogue that began several years ago when the state and

Mesilla Valley Hospital chief medical officer: Be present, connect

As we continue to deal with stress and anxiety associated with Covid-19, along with fears about what may happen next, a leading Las Cruces doctor and psychiatrist is advising people to reconnect with loved ones and to stay in present time.

Mesilla Valley Hospital (MVH) Chief Medical Officer Aghaegbulam Uga said dealing with the pandemic and with fears about public health, the economy and the world situation since the Russian invasion of Ukraine are also contributing to increasing levels of aggression and violence in Las Cruces and across the country.

"Mental health is going to be the next Covid," he said.

Many people experienced a fragmentation of their social support networks even as they were struggling with isolation and boredom, losing jobs,

domestic violence, child abuse and divorce, Uga said.

These factors have escalated drug and alcohol abuse, which goes hand in hand with a loss of judgment and increases "the chances of acting out at the slightest provocation," he said.

"With substance abuse comes aggression," Uga said.

The community's most vulnerable populations are often those most severely impacted, he said, including the homeless.

"These people are in a desperate situation," Uga said.

As summer temperatures rise well above 100 degrees, think for a moment what it would be like if the air conditioner at your house stopped working and there was no one available to repair it, he said.

"Imagine how you're going to feel," Uga said.

That is what it's like for people living on the street, he said. In addition to food and shelter, many are seeking "minimal comfort."

Las Cruces and El Paso lack adequate resources to deal with the drug addiction, mental health and homelessness issues they are facing, he said.

"Most counselors are very busy right now," Uga said. Some are "stretched to the limit."

The result is "a lot of stress on all of us," he said.

Uga's advice: Rebuild your social support network by opening up

more, talking to friends, neighbors and family and seeking support from a counselor.

It's also important for each of us to remember to take one day at a time, Uga said. "Do not overthink the future. Excessive worry about the future" helps nothing.

"I strongly believe we're going to come out of this," he said, but it will take time.

MVH provides inpatient care for people in acute crisis and has an outpatient program for those dealing with anxiety and other issues that do not require hospitalization.

You can "walk in the front door and get an assessment," said MVH Business Development Manager Judy Baca. "We want to help people," she said. "That's our passion."

A psychiatric facility that opened in 1987, MVH is located at 3751 Del Rey Blvd. MVH provides a no-cost, confidential assessment for ages 12 and up 24

Counselor, professor: Empathy critical in dealing with trauma

“For the last 20 years or so, at least at the national level, we have been through one trauma after another,” said mental health counselor and Doña Ana Community College professor Doug Layer of Las Cruces.

“It’s catching up with people and people are scared and they’re unsure and they are acting out, not out of meanness but out of desperation, trying to ground themselves and find safety,” Layer said.

For many college and university students – including students in his classes at DACC, “This is all they know, one kind of trauma after another,” Layer said. “They are a very stressed-out group of students,” he said, dealing with high levels of anxiety, depression and suicide.

“They just don’t have any sense of safety or security,” he said. “They’ve never known it in their own lives, and they don’t see it in the future.”

At the same time, Layer said, the college-age population is “really an empathetic group. They really are focused on the social justice issues of equality and fairness and justice and getting ahold of climate change. They’re just socially minded. They have a good grasp of the global. They’ve grown up with the Internet.”

In the classes he teaches at DACC, “We talk a lot about empathy ... trying to find respect for each other even if we have different values, political affiliations, religions,” Layer said.

“There are so many problems in the world, we don’t need to be at each other’s throats. That’s the angle I take in my social-

ogy classes,” he said. “It’s really hard to hate someone when you can feel their suffering and pain or at least understand it.”

Empathy

Layer said he begins the discussion of empathy by talking about homelessness.

“Our homeless population does have such a stigma,” Layer said. “There are so many false beliefs about people that are homeless. We talk

about the stereotypes and why people think someone might be homeless. Then we turn that upside down and realize that it’s not lazy people who don’t want to work, or men who are hardened criminals. It is families and children and people sleeping in their cars and working full time who don’t have health care and lost everything because they had a medical emergency. Homelessness can impact almost anyone at any time.”

“We try to look at the social structures that are in place that cause homelessness,” Layer said, including a lack of affordable housing, universal health care and childcare. “Once you do that, it’s much easier to empathize.”

A three-pronged approach is needed to deal with the issues, Layer said.

Affordable housing is

vital. “There have to be places to live,” Layer said. “When someone gets hit with a \$200-\$300 (rent) increase, that’s impossible to find in your budget. They’re out on the street.”

Mental health is also a high priority, he said.

The elimination of co-pays for mental health services in New Mexico was “a really nice move, but not everyone has health insurance. Finding ways to provide access to quality mental health services is essential as well,” Layer said.

“I think we’re kind of doing that as a society,” he said. “We’re certainly looking at mental health care in ways we haven’t before, reducing that stigma. We still have a way to go and that includes substance abuse treatment.”

“There’s just such a lack of options for treatment in this area and

there’s such a need for that as a way of combating homelessness and for relieving the stress that people are under,” he said. “They tend to self-medicate, and that self-medication has become a problem or an addiction.

“And then there’s the issue of daycare,” he said. “Families with kids make up a huge portion of our homeless population right now. These parents need to have a safe, affordable place for their kids if they’re going to go out to work.”

“The money is there” to deal with these issues,” Layer said. “It certainly seems like we have resources that we did not in the past. This would be a good time to tap into those and build some infrastructure for housing, health care, daycare to prevent people from losing their homes, and if they do, getting them back into housing.”

APA holds annual free July pet adoption special

NMSU rodeo team celebrates 80th anniversary

A pair of Levi's, \$68 and a broken nose.

That's what the winner of New Mexico State University's first rodeo received, as reported in archived issues of *The Round Up*.

The College-Ranch Hands' Rodeo, as it was known, was popular at NMSU. A group of Aggies formed the New Mexico Aggie Rodeo Association, according to the 1942 NMSU yearbook.

This year, the unit now known as the NMSU rodeo team celebrates its 80th anniversary.

"I'd like to think we're one of the tightest teams around," said Brice Baggarley, NMSU rodeo's head coach. "They're battling for each other, pushing for each other as much as anything."

You don't have to look hard to find that supportive spirit across generations of NMSU rodeo.

Chris Allison, who rodeoed at NMSU in the 1970s and later served in the NMSU Cooperative Extension Service as a faculty member, built a practice arena on his property a few miles south of the Las Cruces campus.

"I always swore, since we didn't have much when I was a student, that if I was ever in a position to provide students a place to come and practice and keep horses and livestock and get free advice, that's what I'd do," Allison said. "My wife and I always enjoy having the students out here."

You can trace a line in the dirt from today's team to the 1942 team through Frank DuBois, namesake of the scholarship and bronze award that goes to rodeo athletes at NMSU.

As an NMSU student, DuBois roped calves and bulldogged steers, though he wasn't on the rodeo team because, he said, he "didn't have enough money and wasn't good enough."

Years later, DuBois was in a leadership role at the New Mexico Department of Agriculture and a team roper. Eventually, though, multiple sclerosis

forced him to stop competing.

Once he came to terms with his diagnosis, DuBois found a new way to show his love of rodeo and started pushing to get more resources for NMSU's rodeo team, which receives some state money and fundraises on its own. The team was one of the 13 original members of the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association.

With DuBois' funding efforts, NMSU hired its first full-time, dedicated rodeo coach, Jim Dewey Brown, in 2002 and started receiving state funding to support rodeo activities.

With Brown's guidance and more resources, NMSU's rodeo athletes flourished.

It was also in 2002 that DuBois and others honored the five surviving

members of the original 1942 team.

Giles Lee, the last surviving member, who died recently, was a friend of DuBois.

From 2002 to 2015, five Aggies won six national rodeo titles. NMSU had 19 Academic All-Americans, and Brown won NIRA Coach of the Year.

Brown, who now runs the World's Oldest Rodeo in Prescott, Arizona, and serves as the NIRA's commissioner, relished his time at NMSU.

"What I miss is the kids," he said. "They were my students, but now they are part of my family."

One of those family members, Baggarley, now occupies Brown's boots at NMSU.

"Rodeo kids naturally have a lot of self-drive," Baggarley said, "because

it's an individual sport. It's really cool to see, even though it is an individual sport, how much they do for each other."

Baggarley rodeoed at NMSU and later was an assistant coach under Brown. He and his wife, Nicole, a professional breakaway roper, met on the NMSU team.

(Logan Corbett was the NMSU rodeo coach 2015-20. He left the program to return to the pro rodeo circuit.)

When the opportunity arose in 2020, Baggarley applied for the head coaching position, a career change that garnered his family's support. Sadly, Baggarley's father passed away unexpectedly before he got to see his son leading NMSU, which had been a dream of both of theirs.

Short game mastery more than touch and feel

There is one area where recreational golfers and tour professionals have somewhat common ground – the short game.

True, the pros are far more talented with pitching, chipping and putting. But both amateurs and pros need to rely on their short game to score. What's more, chipping and putting don't require brute strength, clubhead speed and length. The short game demands a dozen elements to play masterfully from 60 yards and in. I have covered this topic a few times previously (starting in 2006 when I first started writing this column), but I have mostly focused on the combination of touch and feel for chipping and

putting. After thoughtful research I have come to appreciate that there are several more factors to master.

First, let's take imagination.

That doesn't just come into play when you find your ball in an awkward or precarious position. You need keen imagination when you have several options for your shot, or need to create a certain shot to make a stellar recovery. Like Tiger and Phil.

That comes with skill; the skill to execute. Skill isn't an innate gift; it comes from practice with the right kind of fundamentals and technique. Practice is useless if it ingrains faulty movements.

Very few high handicappers spend enough time practicing their short game technique, and it's partly

why they can't break 100 or 90. You can't rely on a hunch, a guess, a wish or just hope to get it done.

One of the more subtle aspects of short game technique is developing a sense of what is needed for a particular shot. A pitch shot from 60 or 70 yards needs to be precise as to the trajectory and to where it lands. Sensing the distance and the right

club comes with experience. Practice, playing a lot and paying close attention to what happens to your shots will help you develop a necessary instinct as to what to expect when you choose to play a particular shot. It will guide you to make the correct judgment as to what to do, whether it's a green-side chip or an approach shot over a gaping bunker. Experience coupled with skill will serve to keep your nerves from being your enemy, because you will approach what you have to do with plenty of confidence.

Arnold Palmer called it with what he said years ago: "What separates great players from the good ones is not so much

ability as brain power and emotional equilibrium."

When it comes to putting, those same combinations of factors are involved, but then there are a few more.

One is steadiness.

Too many casual golfers tend to putt like they are stabbing a roast turkey. They need watch to tour pros, and especially the women, who stroke the ball (rather than hit the ball) delicately like it is a precious jewel. LPGGA players are phenomenal putters!

Also with putting comes patience. Sometimes you may believe that you're putting well and the ball won't go in. Patience is a virtue. If you're putting well the ball will eventu-

ally go in, more than you think.

One other note about putting is that one really needs to start with a sense of comfort to begin a round, and that means understanding the speed of the greens and sensing the breaks. Try to always go to the practice green and hit putts from 40 feet to 5 feet before your round.

I would be remiss if I did not stress visualization – that is seeing in your mind's eye exactly what you are trying to do.

In 2015, our business community stepped up and purchased a tremendous number of tickets that our athletic department made sure were used by service clubs, elementary school kids, and many other individuals that historically had not attended an Aggie football game.
