

Making huge impacts: 'All it takes is everyone'

Legislators, state, community leaders convene for education committee

"How many kids are hungry tonight?" state Sen. Bill Soules, D-Doña Ana, asked the audience Wednesday night, Oct. 13, at the state Legislative Education Study Committee's (LESC) dinner at Hotel Encanto in Las Cruces. "How many kids have no place to sleep tonight?"

Because zero is not the answer to those questions, "We've still got work to do," said Soules, chair of LESC and the New Mexico Senate Education Committee.

The dinner was part of the LESC's two-day visit to Doña Ana County, which also included the LESC's October committee meeting and visits to Centennial High School, Tombaugh Elementary School, the New Mexico State University engineer-

ing complex and Hatch Valley High School.

Dinner speakers also included Lt. Gov. Howie Morales, former Gov. Susana Martinez, New Mexico Public Education Department Secretary Kurt Steinhaus and Katherine Ortega Courtney, Ph.D., co-director of the Anna Age Eight Institute (AAEI) at NMSU.

The focus of the dinner was Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACES) and their impact on "students' health, wellbeing and educational success," LESC said.

AAEI, which re-located to Las Cruces from Española in 2020, is focused on ACES prevention.

ACES is "an incredibly important topic," Steinhaus said. "We're talking about childhood abuse and neglect."

Steinhaus remembered talking to the parents of a student who had committed suicide, and the student's mother telling him, "Don't let this happen to a single other family in this country."

The child welfare system in the United States

was set up to help traumatized children, Ortega Courtney said, but ACES, she said, are focused on 10 experiences children have in the home, including physical, emotional and sexual abuse; physical and emotional neglect; domestic violence and adults in the home who are dealing with substance-abuse addiction and mental health challenges or who are incarcerated.

"Trauma begets trauma," said Ortega Courtney, who said she was bullied in elementary school in Española, New Mexico. The bullying created anxiety which she continued to suffer from through high school, Ortega Courtney said.

"I was facing a bear every single day," she said. "It was incredibly unhealthy."

AAEI focuses on 10 vital services essential for surviving and thriving, she said. They include education, medical and behavioral health services, food, transportation and housing.

"Healthy communities make healthy kids," said

Soules, who has been AAEI's strongest advocate in the New Mexico Legislature.

"We can make huge impacts in our state," Ortega Courtney said. "All it takes is everyone."

The LESC visit included staff from LESC and officials from the Hunt Insti-

tute, a nonprofit based in North Carolina focused on improving education.

The dinner also included New Mexico State Auditor Brian Colon, Las Cruces Public Schools Superintendent Ralph Ramos and Doña Ana County Manager Fernando Macias.

AAEI is active in 17 of New Mexico's 33 counties she said.

AAEI "was funded by

the New Mexico state legislature in 2019 to reach the goal of ensuring that our children, students and families are trauma-free and empowered to succeed in family life, school and the workplace," according to https://annaageeight.nmsu.edu/.

AAEI takes its name from "Anna, Age Eight, The Data-Driven Prevention of Childhood Trauma and Maltreatment," the 2017 book that Ortega

Courtney and AAEI Co-Director Dominic Cappello co-authored. The book details the life and death of a fictional 8-year-old girl who is based on a real child Cappello and Courtney knew about while working for the New Mexico Children, Youth and Families Department. The girl was passed back and forth eight times between her mother's custody and state care before being kicked to death by her mother.





new clothes and shoes to children in need, many of whom have never had new clothes.

In December, volunteers will take each child and a parent shopping at a local store. Each child will have \$100 to spend on clothing; participating stores have always added more to that total, he said.

Dress the Child provided clothing to 15 needy children in 1984 (its first year). It provided clothes to more than 450 children in 2014, 466 in 2015, 487 in 2016, 581 in 2017, 627 in 2018 and 518 in 2019. Numbers dropped to 300 in 2020 and 150 in 2021 because of COVID-19, Boberg said.

Imagine the whole parking lot of Rawson Builders Supply on Nevada Avenue, filled with construction professionals, hundreds of high schoolers and dozens of projects and demonstrations. Each high school was building its own shed, each with a door in school colors.

There was hammering, drilling, painting and anything you could think of, with young people getting a few practice reps in at each stop.

At one point I stumbled upon three Organ Mountain High School students at a demonstration of wiring a home.

When Cole Sattler, a journey-

man electrician superintendent with IES Residential, talked to them about the pay, and about how it can earn a young person \$1,000 a week or more, it got the young men's attention.

It got my attention, too.

There are several reasons LCHBA, Las Cruces and Hatch public schools and local builders and contractors have put their support behind this proj-

One, because there's already a lack of skilled workers in the building trades, and without more apprentices, the situation worsens.

Tweaks to state constitution not enough

New Mexico voters have proven eager in past elections to change our antiquated state Constitution every time they get the opportunity.

There have been 10 proposed constitutional amendments on the ballot in the last four elections, and nine of them have passed. Voters chose to dramatically remake the Public Regulation Commission in 2020, create a new ethics commission in 2018 and reform our bail system in 2016. The only proposal not to pass was in 2014 and would have required school board elections to be held separately from other partisan elections.

There will be three constitutional amendments on the ballot this year, including one to increase funding for early childhood education by taking an additional 1.25 percent each year from the Land Grant Permanent Fund. That would generate \$211.5 million in fiscal year 2023, with

\$126.9 million going to early childhood programs and \$84.6 million to public schools, according to a legislative analysis.

The primary argument

From Here against the amendment is if you increase the distribution from any fund, that will hasten its depletion. The fund gets its money from leases and royalties for oil and gas drilling on state lands. That money is then invested by the State Investment Council.

Drafters of the original provision were looking ahead to the day when oil and gas would run out, and wanted to ensure schools would still be funded. That remains a valid concern, but it's wrong to put the wellbeing of tomorrow's children ahead of those who are falling behind today.

The state has taken steps to improve services for children who are too young to attend public schools, including the creation of a new cabinet-level department in 2019. And they created a separate fund in 2020 for early childhood education.

They have been able to increase funding during years when the state has seen dramatic revenue growth and increased budgets. But history suggests the boom years won't last. An ongoing commitment to early childhood education requires a more permanent funding source.

There are two other proposed amendments on the ballot. One addresses what is probably the most antiquated and unnecessarily burdensome provision in our Constitution, the antidonation clause. Under this amendment, state funds could be used for essential services like broadband internet, energy and water. We are undoubtedly

the only state in the nation that requires a constitutional amendment for those simple functions of governing.

The third amendment would delay the general election for a newly appointed judge until at least one year from the appoint-

I support all three amendments, but I also think it's time we stop making tweaks every two years and finally take a hard look at our Constitution, which was written for a much slower, more agrarian society.

Examining election integrity

that voters in the county

drop boxes at the voting

The nonpartisan League of Women Voters of Southern New Mexico supports procedures for free, fair, safe and accessible elections and encourages all citizens to be actively engaged in understanding the existing processes that support election integrity and in working to strengthen them.

What are the procedures that already provide strength and integrity in our county and state? Online registration saves money, streamlines the process for computer-savvy voters and contributes to the accuracy of voter lists in allowing voters to check and change their information at nmvote. org. Same-day voter registration happens at voting locations, where voters may also update address changes. Voter rolls are maintained continuously by the Bureau of Elections through checking obituaries, voter registration records, motor vehicle information, returned mail and Social Security records.

Once voting begins, sample ballots are also available from nmvote.org, so voters may learn about candidates, bonds and amendments before voting. Early voting dates and voter convenience centers give voters more access. Machine tabulators are programed and certified so

may vote in any of the voting locations. Absentee for ballots do not require the voter to have an excuse and these can be tracked and returned by mail or in person. There are secure

locations. The use of paper ballots is a very important part of the voting process. Under federal law, any U.S. citizen has the right to cast a provisional ballot, used when there is a question about the voter's eligibility. These ballots are held for counting until officials determine if the vote should

Machine tabulators accurately count ballots and are not connected to the internet. They are tested for function and accuracy before voting begins. Your machine tabulated ballot is safe with the paper ballot available if a recount is needed.

be accepted or not.

After local election officials examine the results, ballots are routinely reviewed by the Secretary of State's Office. A postelection audit by a qualified independent auditor is also required, with a transparent and specific process clearly spelled out in State Statutes. The auditor's reports are found on the Secretary of State's website and reveal the consistent accuracy of our election administration.

What are some addi-

tional ways elections in New Mexico could be reformed and strengthened?

Mailing ballots automatically to all registered voters increases access and participation. The state of Utah provides a good example. All-mail ballots have been used in the state for several years. According to the Salt Lake Tribune for Nov. 24, 2020, 90.1 percent of the state's registered voters cast a ballot in 2020. While turnout in New Mexico in 2020 was the largest in state history, the rate was only 69.7 percent of registered voters, according to the Las Cruces Sun-News of Jan. 26, 2022.

Using Ranked Choice Voting (RCV) changes how candidates campaign. Campaigns are more issuefocused, cost less and winners are elected with a true majority. Voters have the option to rank candidates or vote in the general manner of selecting only one candidate. For more information go to: https://rcvis. com

State legislators talk about record revenue

"I believe we're in a once-in-a-statehood moment," state Rep. Nathan Small, D-Doña Ana, told the Bulletin. Small is vice chair of the New Mexico House of Representatives Appropriations and Finance Committee (HAFC) and a member of the state Legislative Finance Committee (LFC).

Small said the LFC projected in August that the state budget could reach \$10 billion when the legislature meets next January for a 60-day session. The current state budget is about \$8.5 billion.

"We're seeing the most revenue we've ever seen," said Small, a former Las Cruces city councilor who was first elected to the New Mexico House in 2016 and re-elected in 2018 and 2020. In 2022, he faces Republican Kimberly Skaggs in the House District 36 race.

Record budget growth will allow the state "to continue to invest in New Mexico across so many areas," Small said. During this year's legislative session, legislators removed most state taxes on Social Security, lowered gross receipts taxes and increased basic educator pay, he said. Most state residents also received a \$500 stimulus check from the state last summer.

Water research

The state is continuing to expand health care access, including behavioral health, and make it more affordable, Small said, and is investing more in infrastructure and renewable energy development. New Mexico is also making "historic investments" in water and water shed restoration, Small said, including finding ways to access previously unusable sources of water, like New Mexico State University brackish-water research and reclaiming billions of gallons of water used in oil and gas production.

"New Mexico's historic budget surplus will continue to allow us to make strategic investments in needed areas like infrastructure, affordable housing, and behavioral health while also creating new opportunities to help New Mexicans and grow our economy," said state Sen. Jeff Steinborn, D-Doña Ana, a member of the state Senate Finance Committee and the LFC. "This could include investing in emerging areas like expanding outdoor recreation and the creative economy, and clean energy and climate resiliency. Given the historic volatility of oil and gas prices and its corresponding fluctuation on state revenues, it's important that any funding commitments made are sustainable in the future," Steinborn said.

'Return to the taxpayer'

"When it comes to excess revenue, we should treat it as such and return to the taxpayer what is rightfully theirs," said state Sen. Crystal Diamond, R-Sierra, Luna, Hidalgo, Doña Ana. "In 2022, Republicans led the effort to send rebate checks to the citizens of New Mexico and we should do the same

next year. We also have a historic opportunity to fix our aging infrastructure, particularly in southern New Mexico. This will allow us to capitalize on future opportunities for growth and put us in a better position to diversify our local economies," Diamond said.

"This is a unique opportunity to put vital funds back into our communities," said state Sen. Ron Griggs, R-Otero, Eddy, Doña Ana. "Lasting change can only be achieved when our infrastructure scales with our economy. Right now, we have shovel-ready projects across southern New Mexico in desperate need of investment. I intend to push hard to make sure our local governments are ready to jump on this growth opportunity when it arises."

Community impact

"The legislature is setting its budget priorities for 2023 coming legislative session, which begins Jan. 17, said state Rep. Patricia Lundstrom, D-Gallup, San Juan, who is chair of HFAC and LFC.

Those priorities will include "backfilling anything we've had to cut in the past," Lundstrom said, along with public education, public safety and infrastructure issues, including road improvements, water and wastewater and telecommunications – "the kind of thing that has immediate impact on a community."

As chair of HAFC and LFC, Lundstrom said she has appointed subcommittees to look at other initiatives that will be part

of the LFC's state budget proposal for 2023, including health, capital outlay, higher education and "anything regarding wildfire issues," she said.

Lundstrom said the final budget could again include a direct payment to state residents, "putting some dollars in the pockets of New Mexicans."

Lundstrom said it is important that HAFC and LFC include legislators who "come from all over the state." Small, she said, "provides a very unique perspective to make sure you guys (southern New Mexico) are represented."

'Grow our economy'

"New Mexico's historic budget surplus will continue to allow us to make strategic investments in needed areas like infrastructure, affordable housing, and behavioral health while also creating new opportunities to help New Mexicans and grow our economy," said state Sen. Jeff Steinborn, D-Doña Ana, who is also a member of the state Senate Finance Committee and the LFC. "This could include investing in emerging areas like expanding outdoor recreation and the creative economy, and clean energy and climate resiliency. Given the historic volatility of oil and gas prices and its corresponding fluctuation on state revenues, it's important that any funding

commitments made are sustainable in the future."

The budget increase is because New Mexico is "seeing strength across many different sectors of the economy," Small said.

The state's oil and gas production has increased dramatically since the onset of COVID-19 and Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

"New Mexico production has increased at a critical time for the world," Small said.

'Beyond rebuilding'

With legislators of both parties working collaboratively, the legislature can use the budget surplus "to go beyond rebuilding" behavioral health services in New Mexico to make them the strongest in the Southwest, Small said, ensure that local and state law enforcement officers are well paid, well trained and well equipped; and invest more in higher education across the state.

"We can afford to do this in ways we never have before," Small said.

A proposed amendment to the state constitution that would allocate state Permanent Fund revenue to early childhood education is "the right investment," Small said, and could help make New Mexico "the best state in the Southwest to start and raise a family. Investing in kids is the right thing to do," he said.

Spending the state's money wisely and making sure its budget is secure into the foreseeable future is an "incredible responsibility" the legislature must live up to, Small said.

"Leadership is so key," he said. Having a "voice for southern New Mexico" on the House Appropriations Committee who is directly involved in crafting the state budget is critical "at a time when we have the most resources in our history," he said.

A local illegal dumping partnership could be the model for statewide initiatives. The Doña Ana County Illegal Dumping Partnership (IDP) is a multi-agency task force founded to help combat illegal dumping throughout Dona Ana County (DAC). Committed to increasing public health and safety and keeping our desert beautiful. IDP is a concept that might work its way up to northern New Mexico.

Patrick Peck. director of South **Central Solid Waste** Authority (SCSWA), was asked to present information about IDP to the state's legislative land-grant subcommittee in September. "After my presentation, there was a panel discussion on adopting a similar model and on other solid waste management issues in general," said Peck.

As SCSWA covers 10 percent of the state's population, Peck admits illegal dumping in rural areas is entirely different than in urban

Between 2011 and 2021, the IDP cleaned up over 3.873.000 pounds of trash in Dona Ana County. In 2022 so far, it's been 151,140 pounds. "Illegal dumping is a statewide issue," said Peck. "Sharing resources, ideas, and successes only strengthens the state and makes illegal dumping harder."

Hearing loss often age related, other factors can contribute

"Hearing loss doesn't discriminate," Expert Hearing Care (EHC) of Las Cruces audiologist Dr. Allie Lambert said.

Although the tipping point for hearing loss is often "aging-related changes to the auditory system," owner and audiologist Dr. Kelly Churchill said, EHC has clients from infancy to 105 years old.

A baseline hearing test is the starting point for every client, Churchill said.

That test will determine if there is hearing loss, how significant it is and what steps can be taken to address it, Churchill and Lambert said.

The test can also identify tinnitus (persistent ringing in one or both ears), cerumen (earwax) buildup and other issues that may affect the quality of hearing.

In addition to aging, hearing loss can be caused by heredity, disease and prolonged or even one-time exposure to high-decibel sounds like fireworks, gunshots and loud music.

Approximately 15 percent of American adults (40 million) aged 18 and over report some trouble hearing, according to the National Institute on Deafness and Other Communication Disorders (NIDOCD).

Age is the strongest predictor of hearing loss among adults aged 20-69, with the greatest amount of hearing loss in the 60-69 age group, NIDOCD said. Men are almost twice as likely as women to have hearing loss among adults aged 20-69, and non-Hispanic white adults are more likely than adults in other racial/ethnic groups to have hearing loss.

The institute also re-

ported that fewer than one-third of adults aged 70 and older who could benefit from using a hearing aid had ever used one. The percentage is about half that for adults ages 20-69.

For many people,

Churchill said, hearing loss may come on so slowly that they aren't even aware of it. Indicators include finding yourself frequently asking others to repeat what they have said.

Churchill's husband, Chris Churchill, a professor in the Astronomy Department at New Mexico State Iniversity, said he

University, said he began experiencing hearing loss in his 30s, probably as a result of exposure to loud music.

When there was a lot of background noise, Chris said he "would lose all speech clarity," and found himself withdrawing from conversations to avoid embarrassment.

For Chris, the answer was a hearing aid. "It opened the world up to me," he said.

In addition to improving communication and relationships, a hearing aid can also help with cognitive issues that can be negatively impacted by hearing loss like memory and reasoning, Kelly Churchill said, along with balance.

Chris Churchill said he wears his hearing aid all the time "because it keeps my brain healthier."

Heart disease remains major health issue in New Mexico

Heart disease remains the No. 1 health condition in America, and one of the biggest causes of death in the country and, according to the New Mexico Department of Health, the leading killer in our state.

These are all reasons it makes sense to make a visit with a heart doctor if you have symptoms or a family history of heart problems.

One such local physician is Dr. Lookman Lawal, the founder and chief medical officer of ASC of the

Heart Institute, 1250 N. Sonoma Ranch Blvd. Lawal is board certified in cardiology and in cardiac electrophysiology, the branch of cardiology that deals with the treatment of heart rhythm disorder. Lawal provides preventive and all other aspects of cardiac care for his patients, he said.

Individual counseling provided by Lawal helps patients deal with high blood pressure, obesity, smoking and other issues that can stress the heart. Felton said. An electrocardiogram (EKG). which records the electrical signal from the heart, is often a good start, said the institute's director of nursing, Jared Felton. Next steps can include a stress test and a discussion of a person's lifestyle choices and any history of heart disease in his or her family.

If a person is having issues breathing, has low energy or is "just

not feeling right," it might be a good time for a conversation with his or her family doctor, who can then make a referral to Lawal to continue that discussion and recommend healthy lifestyle changes or medical procedures, if necessary.

Physical therapy, fitness, breathing, balance

"Clinic balance technology is used to measure reaction strategies for NMSU athletes," said Southwest Sport and Spine Center (SSSC) Director of Sports Medicine David Gallegos. "This helps provide insight into performance needs and baselines to measure return to normal after injuries."

Since becoming a part of the FTBC franchise in 2017, SSSC has become a primary care provider for musculoskeletal disorders, which include tendinitis, carpal tunnel syndrome, arthritis, fibromyalgia and recovery from bone fractures.


Equipment at SSSC can detect inner-ear, vision, joint and flexibility issues that could contribute to balance, falls and injuries. In many cases, she said, issues can be reversed within a few weeks using simple exercises that the patient can do at home.

Aquatic therapy is available to treat injuries and health issues like strokes, arthritis and recent surgeries for which weight-bearing exercises are not practical.

With major scientific advances in the last decade, physical therapy and fitness are about the whole person, SSSC found Denise Campbell said, including heart-rate variability, the autonomic nervous system, the immune system, carbon dioxide levels and brain chemistry.

SSSC staff are doing work in breathing science that is not going on anywhere else in the country, Campbell said.

SSSC breathing technician Paola Quiroz helps patients deal with a wide

range of health issues by improving their breathing, and also is teaching diaphragmatic breathing techniques to members of her own family – and they are helping the 22-year-old deal with the knee and hip issues she has had for the past nine years.

"For me, it's literally life changing," Quiroz said. "It has opened my eyes to so many other aspects of being a health care worker. There's a lot you can do, and we can guide you."

Campbell's advice to busy people taking care of families, jobs and homes: "Spend time on yourself." It is easier to not lose it (good health) then lose it completely and never get it back," she said.

Damian Meza

That Tuesday started like any other for Damian Meza. At 5:30 am, he got on his motorcycle and left for work. But Damian never got to his job because an oncoming car cut off his bike.

Two days later, Damian woke up in the hospital, remembering nothing and experiencing extreme back pain. But he woke up. That fact was huge for Damian's family, who counted the days, hours, minutes, and seconds to see his eyes again.

Though this was leaps and bounds of progress, the lifelong injuries Damian sustained in the accident would drastically change his way of life. Damian suffered a spinal cord injury, among other traumatic injuries, in the crash. Nurses told Damian that he would spend the rest of his life with paraplegia and no hope of moving his lower limbs again.

This news crushed Damian. As an avid car lover and racer, how could Damian ever do what he loves again without the use of his legs?

After spending 29 days in the hospital, Damian transferred to the Rehabilitation Hospital of Southern New Mexico. There, for the first time since his accident, Damian began to feel hope. This hope took the form of Cooper and Linda (aka Mama Linda), Damian's therapists at RHSNM and his biggest cheerleaders during his rehab stay.

When he first arrived at RHSNM, Damian couldn't even sit straight up in bed. But by his discharge day, Damian sat perfectly upright and with a wide-eyed smile. Cooper and Mama Linda had taught Damian not to lose faith. They helped him find the motivation he needed each day and celebrated every win with him, big or small. Before leaving the hospital, Damian made sure to express his gratitude to them for all they helped him achieve.

Through the experience, Damian saw an already tight family increase their support for him tenfold. His dad has a new understanding of the spine, the body, and how our entire body works together. Both of Damian's parents are very hands-on with helping him out.

Damian discharged from rehab 65 days after his crash, excited to just "be." To be in his own home. To be with his family and friends. To be with his dog. And, of course, to get back to the car he loves -- a Camaro, to be exact. Damian also looks forward to returning to the "Syn Club," a car club of which he is the president. The whole time he was hospitalized, the club worked to support Damian by fundraising to help with his medical bills and associated expenses.

Though Damian's life has changed, he refuses to let his spinal cord injury define him or his life. "You can drive a modified car with your hands," Damian noted, adding, "You can use ramps as your friends." Lowe's and members of the Moose Lodge graciously and generously supplied materials to build a custom ramp and Damian's home, too.

With the mindset of "I am me, I am not my injury," Damian is taking a saying from Cooper and Mama Linda: "Miracles do happen." He is determined to have full balance and beyond motivated to walk. Someday, Damian also hopes to get back to his work. With his family and his extended car club family, Damian believes "anything is possible when you don't give up!"

FYI+ receives 'transformative' financial grant

Families and Youth **Innovations Plus** (FYI+) of Las Cruces has received a nearly \$4 million grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAM-HSA) "to transition into New Mexico's first certified community behavioral health clinic (CCBHC), FYI+ said in a news release.

"In 2021, our team reimagined, recharged and rebranded our agency as FYI+," CEO Brian Kavanaugh said. "Today, we accept this transformative award from SAMHSA that will strengthen our responsive, collaborative efforts and impact by increasing access to and availability of a comprehensive range of quality behavioral health and community-based services in our region, which it wholeheartedly deserves."

Kavanaugh said the grant will mean eight-10 new hires at the onset, and that number could double or triple "as the model is built over the coming year and beyond," he said.

The central operation of CCBHC will be housed at FYI+'s main office at 1320 S. Solano Drive, Kavanaugh said.

FYI+ received SAM-HSA funding for its grant submission "Advancing Care in Southern New Mexico through CCBHC Implementation," which indicated that one-third of the region's residents need mental health services, and 30 percent of those residing in colonias

identify a need for mental health support, FYI+ said, citing a New Mexico State University Center for Community Analysis September 2020 report.

"Knowing that we played a role in FYI+'s growth and the region's increased capacity for behavioral health support is why we do what we do," said Janet Mendoza, a senior strategist for the Incite Network, which has offices in Las Cruces and El Paso and helps health and human services organizations and others with strategic planning, program design and fund development, according to www.incite-network. com.)

FYI+ said the grant is "strongly supported" by New Mexico Human Services Department's Behavioral Health Services Division (BHSD) Director Neal A. Bowen.

"The CCBHC model is considered as the 'gold standard' of de-

livery system transformation, according to the National Council for Mental Wellbeing," Kavanaugh said. "The award from SAMSHA was simply not possible without the countless contributions and the high level of passion, commitment and dedication the FYI+team has provided to our community throughout the years.

"The CCBHC model reinforces and accelerates our drive to continuously strengthen the care continuum, focus heavily on person- and familycentered integrated services and collaborative efforts across sectors and organizations, and to not only expand the number and variety of services available, but to make certain the services that are available are

provided in a timely manner," he said.

"Additionally, the CCBHC model allows for FYI+ to build a comprehensive delivery system of care in a financially sustainable manner, which will enhance our ability to recruit, retain and train and develop a strong workforce," he said. "Building out the CCBHC model at FYI+ will bring more opportunity for all of us to better understand, influence and change social inequities in health care and related support services and serve our community better."

"We were awarded this grant because our application demonstrated the highest levels of readiness and capacity to participate in the CCBHC certification process," Kavanaugh said. "The award does not instantaneously make us a CCBHC; what it does is provide us the funding and technical assistance from SAM-SHA and the state to work towards certification and ultimately become a 'certified community behavioral health clinic."

FYI+ offers a wide range of community-based services to children, young adults and families, including its summer food program, therapy programs, housing and shelter resources and child well-being supports. The nonprofit began service in 1977.

Memory care program staff member has four legs, big heart

An unexpected staff member at the Village at Northrise (VaN) Memory Support Program is a sixyear-old lab mix named Tusk, an emotional support animal ("resident dog").

Tusk was being fostered from the Animal Service Center of the Mesilla Valley by Starr "Foster" Schneider when the program's resident care director, Bonnie Zeiler, met him for the first time Dec. 27.

"It was an instant hit," said Zeiler, who adopted Tusk the next day and took him to VaN. "We didn't look at any other dogs," she said. "His eyes just told me he was the one."

VaN's memory care program residents and the staff have fallen in love with the sweet-tempered and intelligent dog, who doesn't bite, jump or bark.

Tusk has two beds at VaN, including one in Zeiler's office, where he stays during residents' mealtimes. Otherwise, with residents sharing food with him in addition to his regular meals, Tusk "would be as big as a bus," Zeiler said.

Throughout the day, Tusk follows the staff around, visiting residents.

"He goes from room to room," Zeiler said, often helping to get residents up first thing in the morning.

"It makes such a difference to our residents," Zeiler said. "It's helpful for everybody, especially people with dementia. It helps to bring a little normalcy to their day," she said.

He's also very popular with residents' loved ones and other visitors to the center, Zeiler said.

"It blesses the residents and their families," Zeiler said. "He gets a lot of love. It's really a benefit for all of us."

State offers reporting for dementia sufferers

"Persons with dementia are vulnerable to abuse and exploitation," the New Mexico Aging and Long-Term Services Department (NMALTSD) said on its website, which allows people to file reports and provides useful information.

The intake form is at nmaging.state.nm.us/protecting-adults/senior-protective-services. Or visit nmaging.state.nm.us/and click on "PROTECT-ING ADULTS" and "Senior Protective Services."

The website also includes Silver Alert, "a notification sent out statewide, similar to an Amber Alert, if a loved one goes missing, is an endangered person 50

years or older or an endangered person with a clear indication the individual suffers from Alzheimer's disease or another form of dementia, of any age."

The website has links to NMALTSD Long-Term Care Ombudsman program advocates "for the civil and human rights of residents in long-term care facilities," including one in Las Cruces who can be reached at 1-800-762-8690.



To better inform the public about the important statewide questions on the ballot, before each General Election the New Mexico Secretary of State publishes the text of the proposed constitutional amendments and general obligation bonds. Voters can use this publication to research and better understand these questions before voting. Visit NMVOTE.ORG for more information and resources about the upcoming General Election.

IMPORTANT DATES FOR THE 2022 GENERAL ELECTION:

October 11: Voter registration (by mail or online) closes.

October 11: First day that absentee ballots can be mailed to voters (who have submitted an absentee application), and first day of early voting and same day registration (at the county clerk's office).

October 22: Expanded early voting begins at alternate voting locations. Same day registration is available at certain polling locations, please reach out to your county clerk for more information.

November 3: Last day to request an absentee ballot.

November 5: Last day of early voting.

November 8: General Election Day, same day registration is available at all locations across the state.

Constitutional Amendment 1:

Proposing an amendment to Article 12, Section 7 of the Constitution of New Mexico to provide for additional annual distributions of the permanent school fund for enhanced instruction for students at risk of failure, extending the school year, teacher compensation and early childhood education; requiring congressional approval for distributions for early childhood education.

Constitutional Amendment 2:

Proposing to amend Article 9, Section 14 of the Constitution of New Mexico to allow public investment to provide access to essential household services, including internet, energy, water, wastewater and other similar services as provided by law, upon the enactment of general implementing legislation by a majority vote of the members elected to each house of the Legislature.

Constitutional Amendment 3:

Proposing to amend Article 6, Section 35 of the Constitution of New Mexico to provide that an appointed judge serve at least one year before a general election is held for the office to which the judge was appointed.

Bond Question 1

The 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of senior citizen facility improvement, construction and equipment acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed twenty-four million four hundred seventy thousand dollars (\$24,470,000) to make capital expenditures for certain senior citizen facility improvement, construction and equipment acquisition projects and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law?

Bond Question 2

The 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of library acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed nineteen million two hundred sixty-six thousand dollars (\$19,266,000) to make capital expenditures for academic, public school, tribal and public library resource acquisitions and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law?

Bond Question 3

The 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of higher education, special schools and tribal schools capital improvement and acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed two hundred fifteen million nine hundred eighty-six

thousand dollars (\$215,986,000) to make capital expenditures for certain higher education, special schools and tribal schools capital improvements and acquisitions and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law?

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 12, SECTION 7 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO PROVIDE FOR ADDITIONAL ANNUAL DISTRIBUTIONS OF THE PERMANENT SCHOOL FUND FOR ENHANCED INSTRUCTION FOR STUDENTS AT RISK OF FAILURE, EXTENDING THE SCHOOL YEAR, TEACHER COMPENSATION AND EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION; REQUIRING CONGRESSIONAL APPROVAL FOR DISTRIBUTIONS FOR EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. It is proposed to amend Article 12, Section 7 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:
"A. As used in this section, "land grant permanent funds" means the permanent school fund described in Article
12, Section 2 of this constitution and all other permanent funds derived from lands granted or confirmed to the
state by the act of congress of June 20, 1910, entitled "An act to enable the people of New Mexico to form a
constitution and state government and be admitted into the union on an equal footing with the original states.".

B. The land grant permanent funds shall be invested by the state investment officer in accordance with policy rules promulgated by the state investment council.

C. In making investments, the state investment officer, under the supervision of the state investment council, shall invest and manage the land grant permanent funds in accordance with the Uniform Prudent Investor Act.

D. The legislature may establish criteria for investing the land grant permanent funds if the criteria are enacted by a three-fourths' vote of the members elected to each house, but investment of the land grant permanent funds is subject to the following restrictions: (1) not more than sixty-five percent of the book value of the land grant permanent funds shall be invested at any given time in corporate stocks; (2) not more than ten percent of the voting stock of a corporation shall be held; and (3) stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to those stocks of businesses listed upon a national stock exchange or included in a nationally recognized list of stocks.

E. All additions to the land grant permanent funds and all earnings, including interest, dividends and capital gains from investment of the land grant permanent funds shall be credited to the land grant permanent funds.

F. The annual distributions from the land grant permanent funds to the beneficiaries specified in the Ferguson Act and the Enabling Act shall be five percent of the average of the year-end market values of the land grant permanent funds for the immediately preceding five calendar years.

G. In addition to the annual distributions made pursuant to Subsection F of this section, unless suspended pursuant to Subsection J of this section, an annual distribution of one and one-fourth percent of the average of the year-end market value of the permanent school fund for the immediately preceding five calendar years shall be made as provided in Subsection H of this section; provided that the additional distribution shall not be made in any fiscal year if the average of the year-end market values of the land grant permanent funds for the immediately preceding five calendar years is less than seventeen billion dollars (\$17,000,000,000).

H. Unless suspended pursuant to Subsection G or J of this section, the additional distribution from the permanent school fund provided for in Subsection G of this section shall be as follows and as provided by law: (1) forty percent of the additional distribution shall be for the public school permanent fund beneficiary for enhanced instruction for students at risk of failure, extending the school year and public school teacher compensation; and (2) sixty percent of the additional distribution shall be for the provision of early childhood education.

I. As used in this section, "early childhood education" means nonsectarian and nondenominational education for children until they are eligible for kindergarten.

J. The legislature, by a three-fifths' vote of the members elected to each house, may suspend any additional distribution provided for in Subsection G of this section."

SECTION 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date that may be called for that purpose.

SECTION 3. The distribution provided for in Paragraph (2) of Subsection H of Section 7 of Article 12 of the consti-

tution of New Mexico shall not become effective without the consent of congress.

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND ARTICLE 9, SECTION 14 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO ALLOW PUBLIC INVESTMENT TO PROVIDE ACCESS TO ESSENTIAL HOUSEHOLD SERVICES, INCLUDING INTERNET, ENERGY, WATER, WASTEWATER AND OTHER SIMILAR SERVICES AS PROVIDED BY LAW, UPON THE ENACTMENT OF GENERAL IMPLEMENTING LEGISLATION BY A MAJORITY VOTE OF THE MEMBERS ELECTED TO EACH HOUSE OF THE LEGISLATURE.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. It is proposed to amend Article 9, Section 14 of the constitution of New Mexico to read: "Neither the state nor any county, school district or municipality, except as otherwise provided in this constitution, shall directly or indirectly lend or pledge its credit or make any donation to or in aid of any person, association or public or private corporation or in aid of any private enterprise for the construction of any railroad except as provided in Subsections A through H of this section.

A. Nothing in this section prohibits the state or any county or municipality from making provision for the care and maintenance of sick and indigent persons.

B. Nothing in this section prohibits the state from establishing a veterans' scholarship program for Vietnam conflict veterans who are post-secondary students at educational institutions under the exclusive control of the state by exempting such veterans from the payment of tuition. For the purposes of this subsection, a "Vietnam conflict veteran" is any person who has been honorably discharged from the armed forces of the United States, who was a resident of New Mexico at the original time of entry into the armed forces from New Mexico or who has lived in New Mexico for ten years or more and who has been awarded a Vietnam campaign medal for service in the armed forces of this country in Vietnam during the period from August 5, 1964 to the official termination date of the Vietnam conflict as designated by executive order of the president of the United States.

C. The state may establish by law a program of loans to students of the healing arts, as defined by law, for residents of the state who, in return for the payment of educational expenses, contract with the state to practice their profession for a period of years after graduation within areas of the state designated by law.

D. Nothing in this section prohibits the state or a county or municipality from creating new job opportunities by providing land, buildings or infrastructure for facilities to support new or expanding businesses if this assistance is granted pursuant to general implementing legislation that is approved by a majority vote of those elected to each house of the legislature. The implementing legislation shall include adequate safeguards to protect public money or other resources used for the purposes authorized in this subsection. The implementing legislation shall further provide that: (1) each specific county or municipal project providing assistance pursuant to this subsection need not be approved by the legislature but shall be approved by the county or municipality pursuant to procedures provided in the implementing legislation; and (2) each specific state project providing assistance pursuant to this subsection shall be approved by law.

E. Nothing in this section prohibits the state, or the instrumentality of the state designated by the legislature as the state's housing authority, or a county or a municipality from: (1) donating or otherwise providing or paying a portion of the costs of land for the construction on it of affordable housing; (2) donating or otherwise providing or paying a portion of the costs of construction or renovation of affordable housing or the costs of conversion or renovation of buildings into affordable housing; or (3) providing or paying the costs of financing or infrastructure necessary to support affordable housing projects.

F. The provisions of Subsection E of this section are not self-executing. Before the described assistance may be provided, enabling legislation shall be enacted by a majority vote of the members elected to each house of the legislature. This enabling legislation shall: (1) define "affordable housing"; (2) establish eligibility criteria for the recipients of land, buildings and infrastructure; (3) contain provisions to ensure the successful completion of affordable housing projects supported by assistance authorized pursuant to Subsection E of this section; (4) require a county or municipality providing assistance pursuant to Subsection E of this section to give prior formal approval by ordinance for a specific affordable housing assistance grant and include in the ordinance the conditions of the grant; (5) require prior approval by law of an affordable housing assistance grant by the state; and (6) require the governing body of the instrumentality of the state, designated by the legislature as the state's housing authority, to give prior approval, by resolution, for affordable housing grants that are to be given by the instrumentality.

G. Nothing in this section prohibits the state from establishing a veterans' scholarship program, for military war veterans who are post-secondary students at educational institutions under the exclusive control of the state and who have exhausted all educational benefits offered by the United States department of defense or the United States department of veterans affairs, by exempting such veterans from the payment of tuition. For the

purposes of this subsection, a "military war veteran" is any person who has been honorably discharged from the armed forces of the United States, who was a resident of New Mexico at the original time of entry into the armed forces or who has lived in New Mexico for ten years or more and who has been awarded a southwest Asia service medal, global war on terror service medal, Iraq campaign medal, Afghanistan campaign medal or any other medal issued for service in the armed forces of this country in support of any United States military campaign or armed conflict as defined by congress or by presidential executive order or any other campaign medal issued for service after August 1, 1990 in the armed forces of the United States during periods of armed conflict as defined by congress or by executive order.

H. Nothing in this section prohibits the state from expending state funds or resources for the purpose of providing essential services primarily for residential purposes if the assistance is granted pursuant to general implementing legislation approved by a majority vote of those elected to each house of the legislature. The implementing legislation shall provide for accessibility to essential services primarily for residential purposes and include safeguards to protect public money and other public resources used for the purposes authorized in this subsection. As used in this subsection, "essential services" means infrastructure that allows internet, energy, water, wastewater or other similar services as provided by law."

SECTION 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next regular election or at any special election prior to that date that may be called for that purpose.

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND ARTICLE 6, SECTION 35 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO PROVIDE THAT AN APPOINTED JUDGE SERVE AT LEAST ONE YEAR BEFORE A GENERAL ELECTION IS HELD FOR THE OFFICE TO WHICH THE JUDGE WAS APPOINTED.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. It is proposed to amend Article 6. Section 35 of the constitution of New Mexico to read: "There is created the "appellate judges nominating commission", consisting of: the chief justice of the supreme court or the chief justice's designee from the supreme court; two judges of the court of appeals appointed by the chief judge of the court of appeals; the governor, the speaker of the house of representatives and the president pro tempore of the senate shall each appoint two persons, one of whom shall be an attorney licensed to practice law in this state and the other who shall be a citizen who is not licensed to practice law in any state; the dean of the university of New Mexico school of law, who shall serve as chair of the commission and shall vote only in the event of a tie vote; four members of the state bar of New Mexico, representing civil and criminal prosecution and defense, appointed by the president of the state bar and the judges on the commission. The appointments shall be made in such manner that each of the two largest major political parties, as defined by the Election Code, shall be equally represented on the commission. If necessary, the president of the state bar and the judges on the commission shall make the minimum number of additional appointments of members of the state bar as is necessary to make each of the two largest major political parties be equally represented on the commission. These additional members of the state bar shall be appointed such that the diverse interests of the state bar are represented. The dean of the university of New Mexico school of law shall be the final arbiter of whether such diverse interests are represented. Members of the commission shall be appointed for terms as may be provided by law. If a position on the commission becomes vacant for any reason, the successor shall be selected by the original appointing authority in the same manner as the original appointment was made and shall serve for the remainder of the term vacated.

The commission shall actively solicit, accept and evaluate applications from qualified lawyers for the position of justice of the supreme court or judge of the court of appeals and may require an applicant to submit any information it deems relevant to the consideration of the application.

Upon the occurrence of an actual vacancy in the office of justice of the supreme court or judge of the court of appeals, the commission shall meet within thirty days and within that period submit to the governor the names of persons qualified for the judicial office and recommended for appointment to that office by a majority of the commission.

Immediately after receiving the commission nominations, the governor may make one request of the commission for submission of additional names, and the commission shall promptly submit such additional names if a majority of the commission finds that additional persons would be qualified and recommends those persons for appointment to the judicial office. The governor shall fill a vacancy or appoint a successor to fill an impending vacancy in the office of justice of the supreme court or judge of the court of appeals within thirty days after receiving final nominations from the commission by appointing one of the persons nominated by the commission for appointment to that office. If the governor fails to make the appointment within that period or from those nominations, the appointment shall be made from those nominations by the chief justice or the acting chief justice of the supreme court. The person appointed shall serve until the first general election following one year

after appointment. The appointee's successor shall be chosen at such election and shall hold the office until the expiration of the term in effect at the time of election."

SECTION 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date that may be called for that purpose.

AN ACT RELATING TO GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS; AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF CAPITAL PROJECTS GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS TO MAKE CAPITAL EXPENDITURES FOR SENIOR CITIZEN FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS, CONSTRUCTION AND ACQUISITIONS, FOR LIBRARY ACQUISITIONS AND FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS AT INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION, STATE SPECIAL SCHOOLS AND TRIBAL SCHOOLS; PROVIDING FOR A PROPERTY TAX LEVY FOR PAYMENT OF PRINCIPAL OF, INTEREST ON AND CERTAIN COSTS RELATED TO THE BONDS; REQUIRING APPROVAL OF THE REGISTERED VOTERS AT THE 2022 GENERAL ELECTION OF THE STATE: DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.--This act may be cited as the "2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act".

SECTION 2. PURPOSE.--For the purpose of providing funds for capital expenditures as authorized in the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, general obligation indebtedness of the state is authorized for the purposes and in the amounts set forth in Section 10 of that act.

SECTION 3. BOND TERMS.--

A. The state board of finance, except as limited by the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, shall determine the terms, covenants and conditions of bonds issued pursuant to that act, including: (1) date or dates of issue, denominations and maturities; (2) principal amounts; (3) rate or rates of interest; and (4) provisions for redemption, including premiums, registration and refundability, whether the bonds are issued in one or more series and other covenants relating to the bonds and the issuance thereof.

- B. The bonds shall be in such form as the state board of finance determines with an appropriate series designation and shall bear interest payable as set forth in the resolution of the state board of finance.
- C. Payment of the principal of the bonds shall begin not more than two years after the date of their issuance, and the bonds shall mature not later than ten years after the date of their issuance. Both principal and interest shall be payable in lawful money of the United States at the office of the paying agent within or without the state as the state board of finance may direct.
- D. The bonds shall be executed with the manual or facsimile signature of the governor or the state treasurer, and the seal or a facsimile of the seal of the state shall be placed on each bond, except for any series of bonds issued in book entry or similar form without the delivery of physical securities.
- E. The bonds shall be issued in accordance with the provisions of the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, the Supplemental Public Securities Act and the Uniform Facsimile Signature of Public Officials Act and may be issued in accordance with the Public Securities Short-Term Interest Rate Act.
- F. The full faith and credit of the state is pledged for the prompt payment when due of the principal of and interest on all bonds issued and sold pursuant to the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act.

SECTION 4. EXPENDITURES.--The proceeds from the sale of the bonds shall be expended solely for providing money to be distributed for the purposes and in amounts not to exceed the amounts set forth in Section 10 of the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act and to pay expenses incurred under Section 6 of that act. Any proceeds from the sale of the bonds that are not required for the purposes set forth in Sections 6 and 10 of that act shall be used for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the bonds.

SECTION 5. SALE.—The bonds authorized under the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be sold by the state board of finance at such time and in such manner and amounts as the board may elect. The bonds may be sold at private sale or at public sale, in either case at not less than par plus accrued interest to the date of delivery. If sold at public sale, the state board of finance shall publish a notice of the time and place of sale in a newspaper of general circulation in the state and may also publish the notice in a recognized financial journal outside the state. The required publications shall be made once each week for two consecutive weeks prior to the date fixed for the sale, the last publication thereof to be at least five days prior to the date of the sale. The notice shall specify the amount, denomination, maturity and description of the bonds to be offered

for sale and the place, date and hour at which the sealed bids shall be received. At the time and place specified in the notice, the state board of finance shall open the bids in public and shall award the bonds to the bidder or bidders offering the best price for the bonds. The state board of finance may reject any or all bids and readvertise and may waive any irregularity in a bid. All bids, except that of the state, shall be accompanied by a deposit of two percent of the principal amount of the bonds in a form acceptable to the state board of finance. The deposit of an unsuccessful bidder shall be returned upon rejection of the bid. The state board of finance may also sell the bonds or any part of the bonds to the state treasurer or state investment officer. The state treasurer or state investment officer is authorized to purchase any of the bonds for investment. The bonds are legal investments for any person or board charged with the investment of any public funds and may be accepted as security for any deposit of public money.

SECTION 6. EXPENSES.—The expenses incurred by the state board of finance in or relating to the preparation and sale of the bonds shall be paid out of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds, and all rebate, penalty, interest and other obligations of the state relating to the bonds and bond proceeds under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, shall be paid from earnings on bond proceeds or other money of the state, legally available for such payments.

SECTION 7. PROPERTY TAX LEVY.—To provide for the payment of the principal of and interest on the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the provisions of the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, there shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied during each year in which any of the bonds are outstanding an ad valorem tax on all property in the state subject to property taxation for state purposes sufficient to pay the interest as it becomes due on the bonds, together with an amount sufficient to provide a sinking fund to pay the principal of the bonds as it becomes due, and, if permitted by law, ad valorem taxes may be collected to pay administrative costs incident to the collection of such taxes. The taxes shall be imposed, levied, assessed and collected at the times and in the manner that other property taxes for state purposes are imposed, levied, assessed and collected. It is the duty of all tax officials and authorities to cause these taxes to be imposed, levied, assessed and collected.

SECTION 8. TREASURER—DUTIES.—The state treasurer shall keep separate accounts of all money collected pursuant to the taxes imposed and levied pursuant to the provisions of the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act and shall use this money only for the purposes of paying the principal of and interest on the bonds as they become due and any expenses relating thereto.

SECTION 9. IRREPEALABLE CONTRACT--AUTHORITY FOR ISSUANCE.—An owner of bonds issued pursuant to the provisions of the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act may, either at law or in equity, by suit, action or mandamus, enforce and compel the performance of the duties required by that act of any officer or entity mentioned in that act. The provisions of that act constitute an irrepealable contract with the owners of any of the bonds issued pursuant to that act for the faithful performance of which the full faith and credit of the state is pledged. Without reference to any other act of the legislature, the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is full authority for the issuance and sale of the bonds authorized in that act, and such bonds shall have all the qualities of investment securities under the Uniform Commercial Code, shall not be invalid for any irregularity or defect in the proceedings for the issuance and sale of the bonds and shall be incontestable in the hands of bona fide purchasers or holders thereof for value. All bonds issued under the provisions of that act, and the interest thereon, are exempt from taxation by the state and any subdivision or public body thereof.

SECTION 10. PROJECTS.—The proceeds from the sale of bonds issued under the provisions of the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be distributed as follows for the purposes and in the amounts specified:

SECTION 11. ELECTION .--

A. Bonds issued pursuant to the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be submitted to the registered voters of the state at the general election to be held in November 2022, and, if they receive a majority of all the votes cast thereon at such election, shall take effect upon certification of the state canvassing board announcing the results of the election. No bonds shall be issued or sold under that act until the registered voters of this state have voted upon and approved the bonds and property tax as provided in this section. Any bonds issued under that act shall be issued within thirty months from the date of such election.

B. The ballots used at the 2022 general election shall contain substantially the following language:

C. Each question set forth in this section includes a specific work or object to be financed by the bonds. If any such question is not approved by a majority vote of the electorate at the state's 2022 general election, the issuance of bonds for the work or object specified by the question shall be excluded from and shall not be part of the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act. The failure of a question to be approved by the electorate at the 2022 general election shall not affect those questions that are approved at the election.

D. The secretary of state shall include the submission of the capital projects general obligation bonds to the people at the 2022 general election, and it shall be included in the general election proclamation. The secretary of state shall cause the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act to be published in full in at least one newspaper in each county of the state if one be published therein, once each week, for four successive weeks next preceding the general election as required by the constitution of New Mexico.

SECTION 12. ART IN PUBLIC PLACES.--Pursuant to Section 13-4A-4 NMSA 1978 and where applicable, the appropriations authorized in the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act include money for the art in public places fund.

SECTION 13. PROJECT SCOPE--EXPENDITURES--REVERSION.--

A. If an appropriation for a project authorized in the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is not sufficient to complete all the purposes specified, the appropriation may be expended for any portion of the purposes specified in the appropriation. Expenditures shall not be made for purposes other than those specified in the appropriation.

B. The state agencies and state institutions to which money has been appropriated in the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be responsible for monitoring the projects funded in that act to ensure compliance with the constitution and laws of New Mexico and shall cause to be reverted any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the earlier of the third full fiscal year after issuance of the bonds or the termination or completion of the specific project. Reverted funds shall be deposited in the debt service fund established by the state treasurer for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the state's general obligation bonds.

SECTION 14. SEVERABILITY.--If any part or application of the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is held invalid, the remainder or its application to other situations or persons shall not be affected.

SECTION 15. EMERGENCY.—It is necessary for the public peace, health and safety that this act take effect immediately.

Hendrickson was one of the founding donors to Weaving for Justice's textile project and former president of the board of The Maya Educational Foundation (MEF).

"Weaving for Justice welcomes donations at any time to sell at our store on the third Saturday of the month and on the Weaving for Justice Instagram account," she said.

"If people would like to see additional donations (during the textile sale), such as table coverings, clay figures and books, a volunteer will be on hand

to take them to our store at First Christian Church," Eber said.

Proceeds from the sale go to scholarships for Maya youth.Through a partnership with MEF, Weaving for Justice is a volunteer, nonprofit "working in solidarity with Maya women's weaving cooperatives in highland Chiapas, Mexico," according to the Weaving for Justice website. MEF was founded in 1992 "to help the Maya people who had suffered so much in the 36-year-long violent civil war in Guatemala."

"Each year, more and more children and youth in Belize, Chiapas and Guatemala are pursuing their dreams of an education thanks to our textile donors and MEF," Eber said.

Last year's Weaving for Justice textile sale included 53 donors and raised \$10,000, she said.



Longtime framing business adds art gallery

How do you make Las Cruces' Picture Frame Outlet more appealing to customers and visitors?

Add a space to show the works of local and regional artists to create Picture Frame Outlet and Gallery.

That's just what owner Greg Groves has done with the business his father, Mike Groves, started more than 40 years ago.

The project started with a long-needed roof repair, Greg Groves said, completed by contractor Art Diaz during Covid. When that was done, Groves and long-time employee Curtis Bristol began converting the large office space at

the north end of the building into Rio Grande Fine Art Gallery. (Bristol has a background in construction and worked for Las Cruces Public Schools' building trades program.)

The two began with LED track lighting, adding more than 200 fixtures, built eight-foot and 10-foot modular walls and did everything themselves except the taping and texture work, which were completed by a local contractor.

The last step was new carpet, installed by Casey Carpet of Las Cruces a couple of months ago, with quarter-turned carpet tiles replacing industrial linoleum as the floor covering. The same line of carpet



tiles with a different pattern marks the framing area off from the gallery

Using Las Cruces contractors, Groves also had the parking lot repaved and updated the outside of the building to give it "increased street presence.

"I'm the biggest proponent of shop local," said Groves, who was born and raised in Las Cruces.

Then it was time to hang the art and "show things maybe you haven't seen before in Las Cruces," he

The gallery features paintings and drawings by John Glass of Deming, NMSU gaming designer Adrian Aguirre, Dallas artist Jill Malouf, Melvin Landry, Robert "Shoofly" Shufelt, Robert Highsmith, Robert McMurtry, El Paso/ New Mexico artist Lester Hughes (President Ronald Reagan had several of his pieces in the White House), John Meigs (a close friend and neighbor of artist Peter Hurd, and the inventor of the Hawaiian shirt), University of Texas at Austin art professor Bill Wiman and the iconic photography of Mike Groves.

All the artwork is for sale, said Groves, who plans to hang works by different artists every two to three months. He will bring the art of San Miguel de Allende, Mexico to Las Cruces with an art show in November.

You will also find custom coffee cups; greeting cards featuring the photography of Mike's father and Greg's grandfather, L.C. Groves, a telephone lineman and avid photographer; and 2023 calendars that include photos by Mike Groves, who you will still see around the store, even though he sold the business to Greg in 2003.

When Mike Groves opened the frame shop in 1981, he would drive more than three hours - often with Greg accompanying him - to Agua Prieta, Mexico, just below Douglas, Arizona, on the U.S.-Mexico border, to buy hand-made frames. He sold them wholesale in his Las Cruces store and by mail order through a catalog mailed to customers across the country.

Mike Groves bought property at 382 S. Walnut St. (just north of the inter-

and Walnut Street), where he moved the business in 1989. Today, the frame shop

section of Lohman Avenue

is as high tech as you can imagine.

Groves can place an image of whatever a customer wants to have framed on a large TV screen that connects to his iPad and then digitally change the frame, the mat and the glass until the customer has exactly what he or she wants. The program also calculates the cost.

As you might expect, Groves' wall-hung television is framed, but that is not unique to his business. Increasingly, he and Bristol are creating custom frames for wall-mounted TVs in commercial business and private homes in Las Cruces and surrounding communities.


There are also carpet tiles hung on the frameshop wall so Groves can show design work, like a frame within a frame, in the old-fashioned, handson way.

"It's all here, front and center," Groves said.

Groves does framing for NMSU, he said, and has commercial clients throughout Las Cruces, Doña Ana County and southern New Mexico. He and Bristol have also created unique frames and shadowboxes that not only display customers' treasured artwork, sports jerseys and other clothing, posters and diplomas, they help to preserve and protect them.

"Come in with an idea and let's figure out a way to accomplish it," Groves said.

The event will be held 10 a.m.-1 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 3, at the nature park.

There is no cost to attend.

The event includes the grand opening of AISE's newest trail, the Gateway to the Desert Trail, which allows those who are uncomfortable exploring the desert to connect to the nature park, AISE said.

The new trail includes a 0.6-mile loop trail, a half-mile trail connecting the loop to the rest of the trail system at the nature park, an entrance kiosk, interpretive signs, benches and a parking area.

During Desert Discovery Day, visitors can walk the new trail, visit hands-on activity stations to learn more about weather, desert animals

and tools to help identify plants and animals. Visitors will also be welcome to participate in a crowdsourced, timelapse photo project to monitor a desert restoration project and a scavenger hunt and earn free prizes.

Funding for Desert Discovery Day comes from El Paso Electric. Funding for the trail comes from the New Mexico Economic Development Department Outdoor Recreation Division's Trails+ grant Both are also supported by AISE donors.

The origin of oft-dreaded golf course bunkers

Ever wonder about how sand bunkers came to be a standard part of golf courses, and why they are there in the first place?

It all started over 200 years ago on the linksland of coastal Scotland - the ocean-side ground that "linked" the land to the sea - where golf as we know it began. Prior to the early 1800s, the most common use for this land was grazing sheep.

When the fierce storms blew in from the North Sea (a frequent pattern for a thousand years) the sheep would huddle together and burrow themselves into the ground for shelter and warmth. With the linksland so close to the sea the ground was quite sandy and pliable, and the herds

of sheep bunkered for protection, while scraping away vegetation.

As grazing farms gradually gave way to golf courses, partly a playing ground for shepherds, these large sand cavernous areas were often a hindrance to completing the golf hole successfully, as sometimes is the case still today. As the game of golf developed, the sand bunkers gradually were incorporated into course designs, adding another level of difficulty. As the modern era of golf began, on both sides of the "pond," course designers considered bunkering an integral aspect of the layout, and created unique and aesthetic ways to form and position them.

Some different types of


bunkers are "pothole" bunkers (small and deep), "waste" bunkers (large, flat expanse of sand, some

BLANCHARD Golf Doctor distance from the green), grass bunkers (greenside depressions but no sand) and fair-

way bunkers. The term "sand trap" began in 1922 as a colloquial expression, evoking golfers' ire, but appears nowhere in the Rules of Golf. Sand bunkers were first addressed by the Royal and Ancient Rules of Golf in Scotland in 1812.

There are fearsome sand bunkers on famous courses



on the par-5 14th hole at St. Andrews, Jack Nicklaus took four shots to get his ball out of that sand cave in the 1995 Open Championship, sinking his chance of victory. Whistling Straits in Wisconsin has a whopping 967 "sand traps" (some are waste areas) throughout its 18 holes. Hole 18 has 96 of them, and Dustin Johnson found one off the tee during the 2010 U.S. Open. Not realizing it was a true bunker and not a waste bunker, he grounded his club in the sand resulting in a penalty stroke, thereby eliminating

him from a playoff.

bunkers at well-known courses, such as the one at Royal St. George's in Sandwich, England, positioned 230 yards from the tee, which measures 40 feet high (higher than a fourstory building) and 25 feet wide. One other standout bunker formation is on hole 7 at the ultra-private Pine Valley Golf Club in New Jersey, for decades ranked by golf magazines as the No. 1 golf course in the U.S. I played Pine Valley in 1974 when I was a corporate suit, working as a sales manager for a Fortune top-50 manufacturing company. The 7th hole is a 540-yard par-5, with the start of the sand at 240 off the tee, known to locals as "hell's half acre," and

requiring a shot of over 150 yards to reach the fairway on the far side of the waste bunker. I made bogey.

The 17th hole at St. Andrews is affectionately known as the "Road Hole." Along the right is a narrow road, and left of the green is a daunting, steep riveted cavern, known as the "road hole bunker." In the 1978 Open Championship, Japan's Tommy Nakajima was tied for the lead in the third round when he landed his second shot on the green on hole 17. He proceeded to putt it off the green into the road hole bunker. It took him four shots to get back on the green, and he made a 9 on the hole, finishing tied for 17th. The bunker often has


