

School laundry reduces absences

Teacher wins \$25,000

Sonoma Elementary School fourth-grade teacher Christopher Nuñez received \$25,000 last week as one of 40 elementary educators to receive this year's Milken Award, which have been presented by the Milken Family Foundation since 1987.

"Christopher Nuñez exemplifies what it means to be a teacher," New Mexico Public Education Sec. Kurt Steinhaus said. "He's gone above and beyond to ensure his fourth graders understand real-world applications of classroom material and become lifelong learners. His efforts to amplify the social and academic skills of every child in his class are evident in

the high performance of his students. Thank you for your hard work and leadership, Mr. Nunez. You are a role model for everyone in education."

In Nuñez's classroom, Milken said, "students build problem-solving skills through engaging hands-on activities. Children lead class discussions and demonstrate their strategies to accomplish each lesson's learning objective. Nunez's students excel, growing from 70 percent to 100 percent proficient on the iReady Math assessment and ending the year with 92 percent proficiency on the Star Reading test.

Thank the Irish for Halloween; the Aztecs for Dia de los Muertos

Halloween likely comes to us from ancient Celtic tribes that lived in western Europe and the North Atlantic as much as 2,500 years ago. The first day of their new year was on or about Nov. 1, when they celebrated the end of summer and the beginning of the long, dark, cold winter with a festival honoring Samhain, Lord of the Dead.

The Celts believed the souls of the dead returned at that time to mingle with the living, so they wore masks and lit bonfires to frighten them away. When the Romans conquered the Celts about 55 years before the birth of Christ, they adopted Samhain, and added their own touches. Those included baking ossa dei morti ("bones of the dead") cookies shaped like finger bones to purify their homes. (Visit www.foodnetwork.com/ recipes/bonz-of-the-dead-ossadei-morti-2108755 to create a little finger food of your own.)

The word Halloween and its older spelling of Hallowe'en are shortened from All-hallow-even, the eve of All Hallows Day, also known as All Saints Day, which was a pagan (Celtic and Roman) celebration until Pope Gregory III (papacy: Feb. 11, 731-Nov. 28, 741), moved the old Christian feast of All Saints Day to Nov. 1 to adapt Samhain to the Christian faith.

Trick or treating began in Ireland centuries ago. Groups of farmers went door-to-door collecting food and items for a village feast and bonfire. Those who donated were promised prosperity, while those who didn't were threatened with bad luck.

When Irish immigrants came to the United States in the 1800s, the custom of trick-or-treating came with them.

Pumpkin carving got its start when the Irish began hollowing out turnips to hold lighted candles to frighten off evil spirits. Pumpkins were substituted for turnips when the Irish came to America.

"Jack-o'-lantern has been used in American English to describe a lantern made from a hollowedout pumpkin since the 19th century, but the term originated in 17th-century Britain, where it was used to refer either to a man with a lantern or to a night watchman," according to www. merriam-webster.com.

"At that time, the British often called men whose names they didn't know by a common name like Jack. Thus, an unknown man carrying a lantern was sometimes called 'Jack with the lantern' or 'Jack of the lantern.' At the same time, jack-o'-lantern was applied to another kind of light: the flame-like phosphorescence caused by gases from decaying plants in marshy areas, also known as ignis fatuus – a Medieval Latin term that means literally 'foolish fire' – or will-o'the-wisp."

The name jack-o'-lantern is also tied to the Irish legend of Stingy Jack, a drunkard who bargained with Satan and was doomed to wander through an eternal night with only a burning coal inside a pumpkin to light his way, according to multiple sources.

The orange and black colors that are a traditional part of Halloween "are thought to go all the way back to the Celtic celebrations and be reminders of the candles and fires that were lit to welcome the cold black winter ahead," according to www.colourlovers.com.

The ancient Aztecs believed the souls of the departed were allowed to return to earth one day each year: children on Nov. 1 (All Saints Day) and adults on Nov. 2 (All Souls Day). Celebrations of these days - Dia de los Muertos ("Day of the Dead") - have continued for centuries in many Latin American countries and have been adopted in parts of the U.S., including and especially the Southwest. The families of the departed often build altars to honor their lost loved ones, and they make special treats for the celebration, including sugar skulls and pan de Muerto (bread of the dead).



Looking back, ahead through alums' eyes The eight former students who were named New Mexico State University Distinguished alumni for 2022 have almost

nothing in common. Their career fields are

wildly disparate. Their ages range from their 20s to their 80s. As you might expect,

most of them went to high school in New Mexico, or had other connections to the Land of Enchantment before arriving at NMSU, but

there the similarities end. Yet when they returned to Las Cruces to receive their honors Oct. 21, you could see a crucial commonality.

Charley Johnson, who earned the top recognition the James F. Cole Memorial Award for Service - epitomized that common ground when he summed up his comments this way: "I'm an Aggie. Through

and through." Johnson is likely the most well known of the recipients, with his name emblazoned on the Ring of Fame

in the stadium of the Denver Broncos, the last of three NFL teams he played for in his 15year career. He followed that with a successful career in the oil business, and later returned to NMSU as head of the

chemical engineering

department. A lot of people remember he was MVP of back-to-back Sun Bowl games the Aggies won in 1959 and 1960. But did you know No. 33 earned his bachelor's degree in engineering with a 4.0 grade average? "I sure am an Aggie," Johnson told the crowd again.

Johnson clearly cherished his time at NMSU, as did Michael Galyean, a 1973 grad and this year's Distinguished Alumni in agriculture. He's now the dean

of the ag school at Texas Tech University, but was an NMSU faculty member from 1977-96

"In the fall of 1969, I loaded up my 1966 Mustang (which I wish I still had) and headed to Las Cruces," Galyean said. Shortly thereafter, he found "a sense of belonging."

Each of the honorees echoed feeling that sense of belonging at NMSU, citing specific instructors who made an impact on their careers, friendships made, and influential courses and jobs they had.

Here's a closer look at the other honorees.

Kellie Ann Jurado, NMSU Class of 2011. Grew up in Roswell, to an agricultural family, has done groundbrekaing work on virus pathogens and infectious diseases and is now an assistant professor at the Penn school of medicine. One of Jurado's former NMSU instructors described watching Jurado work

as an undergrad, her passion for her work so overflowing that Jurado would "vibrate." She still carries that energy today.

Don T. Foster, NMSU Class of 1981. Inspired by his writing instructor, the legendary Mark Medoff, found it infinitely beneficial to "study theater at an ag school." NMSU was small enough, Foster learned every aspect: acting, writing, directing, even set design. So when he found himself in Hollywood, writing scripts for such TV shows as "Roseanne," "Dharma and Greg," "Two and a Half Men," "Mike and Molly" and "The Big Bang Theory," he discovered he was "the best trained writer in L.A." Foster shouted out not only Medoff, but other instructors, including those at NMSU-Alamogordo, where he spent his first two years of college at, as the locals call it, "Harvard on the Hill."

Courts can't fix a broken process lican stronghold in southeast

If Yvette Herrell wins re-election in the newly re-configured New Mexico Congressional District 2, will that disprove the lawsuit filed by the Republican Party now pending in the state Supreme Court alleging gerrymandering?

Earlier this month, the Supreme Court moved to take control of the case from the district court in Clovis. They plan to begin hearing arguments in January. The new district boundaries are in effect for the current election.

In their lawsuit, Republicans argue that those boundaries give Democrats an unfair advantage. Attorneys for the Democrats argue there is no firm legal definition for what constitutes partisan gerrymandering. They

said the new maps achieve the desired goal of bringing rural and urban areas together.


And, they note WALT RUBEL this was the first time in 30 years

the Legislature has been able to complete the redistricting process without intervention from the courts, as the Constitution intended. The last two attempts were conducted under Democratic Legislatures and Republican governors (Susana Martinez and Gary Johnson), who could not come to agreement.

I've written in previous columns that breaking the Repub-



In 2019, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that partisan gerrymandering is allowed under federal law. That legalized a practice that had already been taking place for decades.

As the legal theories are being debated in court, an election is taking place that will soon provide hard answers as to the impact of the new maps. Politico calls the race a toss-up. A recent poll by Global Strategy Group had Herrell trailing by two points, 45 percent to 43 percent, to her

Democratic challenger, former Las Cruces City Council member Gabe Vasquez.

In contrast to the question that opens this column, if Vasquez wins, will that be proof the district maps were drawn unfairly? And, should the courts respond by ripping up the new maps and starting over?

I was a big fan of the independent redistricting commission that tried to lead this process, but was naive to think that Democrats would relinquish their power. Partisan gerrymandering is one of the biggest drivers of our divided politics. Too many candidates serve in districts where the only challenge comes

Anthony Boor, NMSU Class of 1989. Boor grew up and went to high school in Las Cruces, Boor said staying at home for college was "the best decision of my life." He's now chief financial officer of Blackbaud, a cloud software company.

Wencil McLenahan, NMSU Class of 1991. When I saw McLenahan's graduation date, and his photo, I thought something was wrong. When he spoke at the event, though, he explained it. He's an assistant medical professor at Rutgers. As a boy, growing up in nearby San Miguel, he was fascinated with space and wanted to be an astronaut. But when he asked for a telescope for a gift, he got a microscope instead. The rest, as they say, is history and, also, the future.

Our current administration deemed these programs unnecessary and removed them.

Community policing and team building is what we need in this community. Our sheriff's office requires a uniter not a divider, proactive work not reactive work, a leader and not a boss. If we want to live better, safer, and happier, we have to be willing to make the change for those who will do it, and that is why we need Byron Hollister as sheriff.



NMSU grad seeks NM Supreme Court term

New Mexico Supreme **Court Justice Briana** Zamora is seeking a full eight-year term on the court.

Zamora was appointed to the state's highest court by Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham in July 2021 when Justice Barbara J. Vigil retired. Lujan Grisham chose Zamora from a list of candidates submitted by the nonpartisan Judicial Nominating Commission.

If Zamora wins the Nov. 8 general election, it will be her only partisan election as a state Supreme Court justice, as she would face retention elections every eight years after that for as long as she remains on the court.

Zamora was appointed to a Metropolitan Court judgeship in Albuquerque in 2008 and was elected as an Albuquerque district judge in 2012. She was elected to the New Mexico Court of Appeals in 2018 and held that position until her appointment to the state Supreme Court.

Zamora, 48, was born in Torreon (in Torrance

Delays in cases are "heartbreaking," she said. "Justice delayed is justice denied."

Making sure the courts in New Mexico are open to everyone is also vital, she said. Broadband access is essential to maintaining virtual court hearings that may be necessary for cases in some rural areas and tribal communities in the state.

"Look at my record," Zamora said. "My judicial philosophy is, whoever you are, you are going to be treated fairly in my courtroom and by me."

Celebrating its 10th anniversary with a new executive director and assistant director, the Children's Reading Alliance (CRA) is continuing to support and empower parents and put books in the hands of children in Las Cruces and throughout Doña Ana County.

"It's an exciting year and an exciting time," said Marisa DeWolf, who came on board as CRA executive director earlier this year. "New people are continuing CRA's really rich and established history," she said.

"We are reintroducing ourselves," said CRA's new assistant director, Linda Lardner. "We are the book people."

CRA is an independent nonprofit housed at the Community Action Agency of Southern New Mexico, located at 3880 Foothills Road in Las Cruces.

CRA's major programs are

• Book distribution: Getting thousands of books each year into the hands of children through a wide range of community and school events and via La Clinica de Familia, Big Brothers and Big Sisters, Jardin de los Niños, Save the Children, Head Start, New Mexico PreK and other local partnerships. "There are so many opportunities to connect and collaborate," DeWolf said.

• First Teacher Program: This six-week bilingual training course is "our bread and butter," said DeWolf. It is a "really extensive, really effective"

way CRA helps parents engage and interact with their children through reading. Participants receive almost 20 children's books to keep - "It already creates a home library," DeWolf said – along with educational toys and other learning tools. DeWolf said a recent impact study conducted by UTEP showed "families love the program," she said. The overwhelming response from parents who participate in First Teacher is, "I read more often to my child," DeWolf said.

• Reading Buddies: This program matches CRA volunteers one-on-one with struggling readers in second- and third-grade classrooms throughout Las Cruces. CRA is increasing the training in provides to participating volunteers, De Wolf said, especially in recognition of how much reading and learning time young children lost be-

As sitcom actresses go, Hayley Orrantia of "The Goldbergs" is something of a rarity.

Her show is on a short list of comedies that have lasted at least 10 seasons, joining such venerable series as "M*A*S*H," "Cheers," "Friends" and "Happy Days." And she's also perhaps the only actress to play a character that's based on a real person – who's of the opposite gender.

Her character of Erica, the rebellious eldest child in ABC's Wednesday family comedy "The Goldbergs," is actually based on Eric Goldberg, the brother of series creator Adam F. Goldberg, who used his own family as inspiration for the series.

But the 28-year-old actress says she consulted her real-life counterpart when she took on the role 10 years ago.

"I did get to sit down with Adam F. Goldberg at the beginning of the show ... and he told me a bit about his brother," she says. "But the beautiful thing about my character in particular, because it's the only character based on a different gender person and just kind of different experiences overall since Adam Goldberg or any of his family hadn't been raised with a sister, they didn't have a ton of storylines to go off of particularly with a sister. So it gave me a little bit of free reign to play a little more within who Erica was going to be."

When she's not filming "The Goldbergs," the Texas native is pursuing a career as a recording artist, having released eight singles and an EP during her time on the series. While she admits her songs have elements of country and pop, she's reluctant to pigeonhole them into a genre lest people come to them with preconceived notions.

"Some of the artists that I really admire, they don't kind of box themselves into that," she says. "And so while at the moment some of my stuff is more pop-leaning, I can't confidently tell you that that's where I'll be staying forever."

2022 General Election

Statewide Constitutional Amendments and General Obligation Bonds

To better inform the public about the important statewide questions on the ballot, before each General Election the New Mexico Secretary of State publishes the text of the proposed constitutional amendments and general obligation bonds. Voters can use this publication to research and better understand these questions before voting. Visit NMVOTE.ORG for more information and resources about the upcoming General Election.

IMPORTANT DATES FOR THE 2022 GENERAL ELECTION:

October 11: Voter registration (by mail or online) closes.

October 11: First day that absentee ballots can be mailed to voters (who have submitted an absentee application), and first day of early voting and same day registration (at the county clerk's office).

October 22: Expanded early voting begins at alternate voting locations. Same day registration is available at certain polling locations, please reach out to your county clerk for more information.

November 3: Last day to request an absentee ballot.

November 5: Last day of early voting.

November 8: General Election Day, same day registration is available at all locations across the state.

Constitutional Amendment 1:

Proposing an amendment to Article 12, Section 7 of the Constitution of New Mexico to provide for additional annual distributions of the permanent school fund for enhanced instruction for students at risk of failure, extending the school year, teacher compensation and early childhood education; requiring congressional approval for distributions for early childhood education.

Constitutional Amendment 2:

Proposing to amend Article 9, Section 14 of the Constitution of New Mexico to allow public investment to provide access to essential household services, including internet, energy, water, wastewater and other similar services as provided by law, upon the enactment of general implementing legislation by a majority vote of the members elected to each house of the Legislature.

Constitutional Amendment 3:

Proposing to amend Article 6, Section 35 of the Constitution of New Mexico to provide that an appointed judge serve at least one year before a general election is held for the office to which the judge was appointed.

Bond Question 1

The 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of senior citizen facility improvement, construction and equipment acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed twenty-four million four hundred seventy thousand dollars (\$24,470,000) to make capital expenditures for certain senior citizen facility improvement, construction and equipment acquisition projects and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law?

Bond Question 2

The 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of library acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed nineteen million two hundred sixty-six thousand dollars (\$19,266,000) to make capital expenditures for academic, public school, tribal and public library resource acquisitions and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law?

Bond Question 3

The 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of higher education, special schools and tribal schools capital improvement and acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed two hundred fifteen million nine hundred eighty-six

thousand dollars (\$215,986,000) to make capital expenditures for certain higher education, special schools and tribal schools capital improvements and acquisitions and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law?

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 12, SECTION 7 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO PROVIDE FOR ADDITIONAL ANNUAL DISTRIBUTIONS OF THE PERMANENT SCHOOL FUND FOR ENHANCED INSTRUCTION FOR STUDENTS AT RISK OF FAILURE, EXTENDING THE SCHOOL YEAR, TEACHER COM-PENSATION AND EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION; REQUIRING CONGRESSIONAL APPROVAL FOR DISTRIBUTIONS FOR EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. It is proposed to amend Article 12, Section 7 of the constitution of New Mexico to read: "A. As used in this section, "land grant permanent funds" means the permanent school fund described in Article 12, Section 2 of this constitution and all other permanent funds derived from lands granted or confirmed to the state by the act of congress of June 20, 1910, entitled "An act to enable the people of New Mexico to form a constitution and state government and be admitted into the union on an equal footing with the original states.".

B. The land grant permanent funds shall be invested by the state investment officer in accordance with policy rules promulgated by the state investment council.

C. In making investments, the state investment officer, under the supervision of the state investment council, shall invest and manage the land grant permanent funds in accordance with the Uniform Prudent Investor Act.

D. The legislature may establish criteria for investing the land grant permanent funds if the criteria are enacted by a three-fourths' vote of the members elected to each house, but investment of the land grant permanent funds is subject to the following restrictions: (1) not more than sixty-five percent of the book value of the land grant permanent funds shall be invested at any given time in corporate stocks; (2) not more than ten percent of the voting stock of a corporation shall be held; and (3) stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to those stocks of businesses listed upon a national stock exchange or included in a nationally recognized list of stocks.

E. All additions to the land grant permanent funds and all earnings, including interest, dividends and capital gains from investment of the land grant permanent funds shall be credited to the land grant permanent funds.

F. The annual distributions from the land grant permanent funds to the beneficiaries specified in the Ferguson Act and the Enabling Act shall be five percent of the average of the year-end market values of the land grant permanent funds for the immediately preceding five calendar years.

G. In addition to the annual distributions made pursuant to Subsection F of this section, unless suspended pursuant to Subsection J of this section, an annual distribution of one and one-fourth percent of the average of the year-end market value of the permanent school fund for the immediately preceding five calendar years shall be made as provided in Subsection H of this section; provided that the additional distribution shall not be made in any fiscal year if the average of the year-end market values of the land grant permanent funds for the immediately preceding five calendar years is less than seventeen billion dollars (\$17,000,000,000).

H. Unless suspended pursuant to Subsection G or J of this section, the additional distribution from the permanent school fund provided for in Subsection G of this section shall be as follows and as provided by law: (1) forty percent of the additional distribution shall be for the public school permanent fund beneficiary for enhanced instruction for students at risk of failure, extending the school year and public school teacher compensation; and (2) sixty percent of the additional distribution shall be for the provision of early childhood education.

I. As used in this section, "early childhood education" means nonsectarian and nondenominational education for children until they are eligible for kindergarten.

J. The legislature, by a three-fifths' vote of the members elected to each house, may suspend any additional distribution provided for in Subsection G of this section."

SECTION 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date that may be called for that purpose.

SECTION 3. The distribution provided for in Paragraph (2) of Subsection H of Section 7 of Article 12 of the consti-

tution of New Mexico shall not become effective without the consent of congress.

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND ARTICLE 9, SECTION 14 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO ALLOW PUBLIC INVESTMENT TO PROVIDE ACCESS TO ESSENTIAL HOUSEHOLD SERVICES, INCLUDING INTER-NET, ENERGY, WATER, WASTEWATER AND OTHER SIMILAR SERVICES AS PROVIDED BY LAW, UPON THE ENACT-MENT OF GENERAL IMPLEMENTING LEGISLATION BY A MAJORITY VOTE OF THE MEMBERS ELECTED TO EACH HOUSE OF THE LEGISLATURE.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. It is proposed to amend Article 9, Section 14 of the constitution of New Mexico to read: "Neither the state nor any county, school district or municipality, except as otherwise provided in this constitution, shall directly or indirectly lend or pledge its credit or make any donation to or in aid of any person, association or public or private corporation or in aid of any private enterprise for the construction of any railroad except as provided in Subsections A through H of this section.

A. Nothing in this section prohibits the state or any county or municipality from making provision for the care and maintenance of sick and indigent persons.

B. Nothing in this section prohibits the state from establishing a veterans' scholarship program for Vietnam conflict veterans who are post-secondary students at educational institutions under the exclusive control of the state by exempting such veterans from the payment of tuition. For the purposes of this subsection, a "Vietnam conflict veteran" is any person who has been honorably discharged from the armed forces of the United States, who was a resident of New Mexico at the original time of entry into the armed forces from New Mexico or who has lived in New Mexico for ten years or more and who has been awarded a Vietnam campaign medal for service in the armed forces of this country in Vietnam during the period from August 5, 1964 to the official termination date of the Vietnam conflict as designated by executive order of the president of the United States.

C. The state may establish by law a program of loans to students of the healing arts, as defined by law, for residents of the state who, in return for the payment of educational expenses, contract with the state to practice their profession for a period of years after graduation within areas of the state designated by law.

D. Nothing in this section prohibits the state or a county or municipality from creating new job opportunities by providing land, buildings or infrastructure for facilities to support new or expanding businesses if this assistance is granted pursuant to general implementing legislation that is approved by a majority vote of those elected to each house of the legislature. The implementing legislation shall include adequate safeguards to protect public money or other resources used for the purposes authorized in this subsection. The implementing legislation shall further provide that: (1) each specific county or municipal project providing assistance pursuant to this subsection need not be approved by the legislature but shall be approved by the county or municipality pursuant to procedures provided in the implementing legislation; and (2) each specific state project providing assistance pursuant to this subsection shall be approved by law.

E. Nothing in this section prohibits the state, or the instrumentality of the state designated by the legislature as the state's housing authority, or a county or a municipality from: (1) donating or otherwise providing or paying a portion of the costs of land for the construction on it of affordable housing; (2) donating or otherwise providing or paying a portion of the costs of construction or renovation of affordable housing or the costs of conversion or renovation of authority, the costs of financing or infrastructure necessary to support affordable housing projects.

F. The provisions of Subsection E of this section are not self-executing. Before the described assistance may be provided, enabling legislation shall be enacted by a majority vote of the members elected to each house of the legislature. This enabling legislation shall: (1) define "affordable housing"; (2) establish eligibility criteria for the recipients of land, buildings and infrastructure; (3) contain provisions to ensure the successful completion of affordable housing projects supported by assistance authorized pursuant to Subsection E of this section; (4) require a county or municipality providing assistance pursuant to Subsection E of this section to give prior formal approval by ordinance for a specific affordable housing assistance grant and include in the ordinance the conditions of the grant; (5) require prior approval by law of an affordable housing assistance grant by the state; and (6) require the governing body of the instrumentality of the state, designated by the legislature as the state's housing authority, to give prior approval, by resolution, for affordable housing grants that are to be given by the instrumentality.

G. Nothing in this section prohibits the state from establishing a veterans' scholarship program, for military war veterans who are post-secondary students at educational institutions under the exclusive control of the state and who have exhausted all educational benefits offered by the United States department of defense or the United States department of veterans affairs, by exempting such veterans from the payment of tuition. For the

purposes of this subsection, a "military war veteran" is any person who has been honorably discharged from the armed forces of the United States, who was a resident of New Mexico at the original time of entry into the armed forces or who has lived in New Mexico for ten years or more and who has been awarded a southwest Asia service medal, global war on terror service medal, Iraq campaign medal, Afghanistan campaign medal or any other medal issued for service in the armed forces of this country in support of any United States military campaign or armed conflict as defined by congress or by presidential executive order or any other campaign medal issued for service after August 1, 1990 in the armed forces of the United States during periods of armed conflict as defined by congress or by executive order.

H. Nothing in this section prohibits the state from expending state funds or resources for the purpose of providing essential services primarily for residential purposes if the assistance is granted pursuant to general implementing legislation approved by a majority vote of those elected to each house of the legislature. The implementing legislation shall provide for accessibility to essential services primarily for residential purposes and include safeguards to protect public money and other public resources used for the purposes authorized in this subsection. As used in this subsection, "essential services" means infrastructure that allows internet, energy, water, wastewater or other similar services as provided by law."

SECTION 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next regular election or at any special election prior to that date that may be called for that purpose. A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND ARTICLE 6, SECTION 35 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO PROVIDE THAT AN APPOINTED JUDGE SERVE AT LEAST ONE YEAR BEFORE A GENERAL ELECTION IS HELD

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

FOR THE OFFICE TO WHICH THE JUDGE WAS APPOINTED.

SECTION 1. It is proposed to amend Article 6. Section 35 of the constitution of New Mexico to read: "There is created the "appellate judges nominating commission", consisting of: the chief justice of the supreme court or the chief justice's designee from the supreme court; two judges of the court of appeals appointed by the chief judge of the court of appeals; the governor, the speaker of the house of representatives and the president pro tempore of the senate shall each appoint two persons, one of whom shall be an attorney licensed to practice law in this state and the other who shall be a citizen who is not licensed to practice law in any state; the dean of the university of New Mexico school of law, who shall serve as chair of the commission and shall vote only in the event of a tie vote; four members of the state bar of New Mexico, representing civil and criminal prosecution and defense, appointed by the president of the state bar and the judges on the commission. The appointments shall be made in such manner that each of the two largest major political parties, as defined by the Election Code, shall be equally represented on the commission. If necessary, the president of the state bar and the judges on the commission shall make the minimum number of additional appointments of members of the state bar as is necessary to make each of the two largest major political parties be equally represented on the commission. These additional members of the state bar shall be appointed such that the diverse interests of the state bar are represented. The dean of the university of New Mexico school of law shall be the final arbiter of whether such diverse interests are represented. Members of the commission shall be appointed for terms as may be provided by law. If a position on the commission becomes vacant for any reason, the successor shall be selected by the original appointing authority in the same manner as the original appointment was made and shall serve for the remainder of the term vacated.

The commission shall actively solicit, accept and evaluate applications from qualified lawyers for the position of justice of the supreme court or judge of the court of appeals and may require an applicant to submit any information it deems relevant to the consideration of the application.

Upon the occurrence of an actual vacancy in the office of justice of the supreme court or judge of the court of appeals, the commission shall meet within thirty days and within that period submit to the governor the names of persons qualified for the judicial office and recommended for appointment to that office by a majority of the commission.

Immediately after receiving the commission nominations, the governor may make one request of the commission for submission of additional names, and the commission shall promptly submit such additional names if a majority of the commission finds that additional persons would be qualified and recommends those persons for appointment to the judicial office. The governor shall fill a vacancy or appoint a successor to fill an impending vacancy in the office of justice of the supreme court or judge of the court of appeals within thirty days after receiving final nominations from the commission by appointing one of the persons nominated by the commission for appointment to that office. If the governor fails to make the appointment within that period or from those nominations, the appointment shall be made from those nominations by the chief justice or the acting chief justice of the supreme court. The person appointed shall serve until the first general election following one year after appointment. The appointee's successor shall be chosen at such election and shall hold the office until the expiration of the term in effect at the time of election."

SECTION 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date that may be called for that purpose. AN ACT RELATING TO GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS; AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF CAPITAL PROJ-ECTS GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS TO MAKE CAPITAL EXPENDITURES FOR SENIOR CITIZEN FACILITY IMPROVE-MENTS, CONSTRUCTION AND ACQUISITIONS, FOR LIBRARY ACQUISITIONS AND FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS AT INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION, STATE SPECIAL SCHOOLS AND TRIBAL SCHOOLS; PROVIDING FOR A PROPERTY TAX LEVY FOR PAYMENT OF PRINCIPAL OF, INTEREST ON AND CERTAIN COSTS RE-LATED TO THE BONDS; REQUIRING APPROVAL OF THE REGISTERED VOTERS AT THE 2022 GENERAL ELECTION OF THE STATE; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.--This act may be cited as the "2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act".

SECTION 2. PURPOSE.--For the purpose of providing funds for capital expenditures as authorized in the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, general obligation indebtedness of the state is authorized for the purposes and in the amounts set forth in Section 10 of that act.

SECTION 3. BOND TERMS .--

A. The state board of finance, except as limited by the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, shall determine the terms, covenants and conditions of bonds issued pursuant to that act, including: (1) date or dates of issue, denominations and maturities; (2) principal amounts; (3) rate or rates of interest; and (4) provisions for redemption, including premiums, registration and refundability, whether the bonds are issued in one or more series and other covenants relating to the bonds and the issuance thereof.

B. The bonds shall be in such form as the state board of finance determines with an appropriate series designation and shall bear interest payable as set forth in the resolution of the state board of finance.

C. Payment of the principal of the bonds shall begin not more than two years after the date of their issuance, and the bonds shall mature not later than ten years after the date of their issuance. Both principal and interest shall be payable in lawful money of the United States at the office of the paying agent within or without the state as the state board of finance may direct.

D. The bonds shall be executed with the manual or facsimile signature of the governor or the state treasurer, and the seal or a facsimile of the seal of the state shall be placed on each bond, except for any series of bonds issued in book entry or similar form without the delivery of physical securities.

E. The bonds shall be issued in accordance with the provisions of the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, the Supplemental Public Securities Act and the Uniform Facsimile Signature of Public Officials Act and may be issued in accordance with the Public Securities Short-Term Interest Rate Act.

F. The full faith and credit of the state is pledged for the prompt payment when due of the principal of and interest on all bonds issued and sold pursuant to the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act.

SECTION 4. EXPENDITURES.--The proceeds from the sale of the bonds shall be expended solely for providing money to be distributed for the purposes and in amounts not to exceed the amounts set forth in Section 10 of the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act and to pay expenses incurred under Section 6 of that act. Any proceeds from the sale of the bonds that are not required for the purposes set forth in Sections 6 and 10 of that act shall be used for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the bonds.

SECTION 5. SALE.--The bonds authorized under the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be sold by the state board of finance at such time and in such manner and amounts as the board may elect. The bonds may be sold at private sale or at public sale, in either case at not less than par plus accrued interest to the date of delivery. If sold at public sale, the state board of finance shall publish a notice of the time and place of sale in a newspaper of general circulation in the state and may also publish the notice in a recognized financial journal outside the state. The required publications shall be made once each week for two consecutive weeks prior to the date fixed for the sale, the last publication thereof to be at least five days prior to the date of the sale. The notice shall specify the amount, denomination, maturity and description of the bonds to be offered

for sale and the place, date and hour at which the sealed bids shall be received. At the time and place specified in the notice, the state board of finance shall open the bids in public and shall award the bonds to the bidder or bidders offering the best price for the bonds. The state board of finance may reject any or all bids and readvertise and may waive any irregularity in a bid. All bids, except that of the state, shall be accompanied by a deposit of two percent of the principal amount of the bonds in a form acceptable to the state board of finance. The deposit of an unsuccessful bidder shall be returned upon rejection of the bid. The state board of finance may also sell the bonds or any part of the bonds to the state treasurer or state investment officer. The state treasurer or state investment officer is authorized to purchase any of the bonds for investment. The bonds are legal investments for any person or board charged with the investment of any public funds and may be accepted as security for any deposit of public money.

SECTION 6. EXPENSES.—The expenses incurred by the state board of finance in or relating to the preparation and sale of the bonds shall be paid out of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds, and all rebate, penalty, interest and other obligations of the state relating to the bonds and bond proceeds under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, shall be paid from earnings on bond proceeds or other money of the state, legally available for such payments.

SECTION 7. PROPERTY TAX LEVY.--To provide for the payment of the principal of and interest on the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the provisions of the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, there shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied during each year in which any of the bonds are outstanding an ad valorem tax on all property in the state subject to property taxation for state purposes sufficient to pay the interest as it becomes due on the bonds, together with an amount sufficient to provide a sinking fund to pay the principal of the bonds as it becomes due, and, if permitted by law, ad valorem taxes may be collected to pay administrative costs incident to the collection of such taxes. The taxes shall be imposed, levied, assessed and collected at the times and in the manner that other property taxes for state purposes are imposed, levied, assessed and collected. It is the duty of all tax officials and authorities to cause these taxes to be imposed, levied, assessed and collected.

SECTION 8. TREASURER--DUTIES.--The state treasurer shall keep separate accounts of all money collected pursuant to the taxes imposed and levied pursuant to the provisions of the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act and shall use this money only for the purposes of paying the principal of and interest on the bonds as they become due and any expenses relating thereto.

SECTION 9. IRREPEALABLE CONTRACT--AUTHORITY FOR ISSUANCE.--An owner of bonds issued pursuant to the provisions of the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act may, either at law or in equity, by suit, action or mandamus, enforce and compel the performance of the duties required by that act of any officer or entity mentioned in that act. The provisions of that act constitute an irrepealable contract with the owners of any of the bonds issued pursuant to that act for the faithful performance of which the full faith and credit of the state is pledged. Without reference to any other act of the legislature, the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is full authority for the issuance and sale of the bonds authorized in that act, and such bonds shall have all the qualities of investment securities under the Uniform Commercial Code, shall not be invalid for any irregularity or defect in the proceedings for the issuance and sale of the bonds and shall be incontestable in the hands of bona fide purchasers or holders thereof for value. All bonds issued under the provisions of that act, and the interest thereon, are exempt from taxation by the state and any subdivision or public body thereof.

SECTION 10. PROJECTS.--The proceeds from the sale of bonds issued under the provisions of the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be distributed as follows for the purposes and in the amounts specified:

Miguel county; and (h) two million three hundred thousand dollars (\$2,300,000) to plan, design, construct, renovate and equip infrastructure improvements, including heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems in the main and west wing buildings, at Santa Fe community college in Santa Fe county; (3) to the board of regents of the New Mexico school for the blind and visually impaired, four million dollars (\$4,000,000) to plan, design, construct, furnish and equip a residential cottage at the New Mexico school for the blind and visually impaired in Alamogordo in Otero county; (4) to the board of regents of New Mexico highlands university, four million five hundred thousand dollars (\$4,500,000) to plan, design, construct, furnish and equip a facilities building, including abatement and demolition, at New Mexico highlands university in Las Vegas in San Miguel county; (5) to the board of regents of the New Mexico institute of mining and technology: (a) five million dollars (\$5,000,000) to plan, design, construct, renovate and equip infrastructure improvements to the Playas training and research center at the New Mexico institute of mining and technology in Playas in Hidalgo county; and (b) three million three hundred thousand dollars (\$3,300,000) to plan, design, construct, furnish and equip Kelly hall at the New Mexico institute of mining and technology in Socorro in Socorro county; (6) to the board of regents of New Mexico military institute, four million dollars (\$4,000,000) to plan, design, construct, demolish, furnish and equip an expansion to Bates hall at the New Mexico military institute in Roswell in Chaves county; (7) to the board of regents of the New Mexico school for the deaf, one million four hundred thousand dollars (\$1,400,000) to plan, design, construct, renovate, furnish and equip improvements and an addition to the Albuquerque preschool facility for the New Mexico school for the deaf in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county; (8) to the board of regents of New Mexico state university: (a) twenty-two million five hundred thousand dollars (\$22,500,000) to plan, design, construct, furnish and equip a college of engineering facility, including abatement and demolition of Thomas and Brown hall, at New Mexico state university in Las Cruces in Dona Ana county; (b) thirteen million five hundred thousand dollars (\$13,500,000) to plan, design, construct, renovate, furnish and equip the health and social sciences building and O'Donnell hall at New Mexico state university in Las Cruces in Dona Ana county; (c) two million dollars (\$2,000,000) to plan, design, construct, renovate, furnish and equip the school of nursing skills and simulation center in the health and social services building at New Mexico state university in Las Cruces in Dona Ana county; (d) one million three hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$1,350,000) to plan, design, construct, renovate, furnish and equip infrastructure improvements, including roof replacement, at the Dona Ana branch community college campuses of New Mexico state university in Dona Ana county; (e) one million two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$1,250,000) to plan, design, construct, renovate and equip infrastructure improvements, including roof replacement, to Martinez hall at the Grants branch campus of New Mexico state university in Cibola county; and (f) ten million five hundred thousand dollars (\$10,500,000) to plan, design, construct, renovate, furnish and equip, including abatement and demolition, the New Mexico department of agriculture building at New Mexico state university in Las Cruces in Dona Ana county: (9) to the board of regents of northern New Mexico state school, three million dollars (\$3,000,000) to plan, design, construct and repair infrastructure improvements, including parking lots and roads, at the Espanola and El Rito campuses of northern New Mexico state school in Rio Arriba county; (10) to the board of regents of the university of New Mexico: (a) forty-five million dollars (\$45,000,000) to plan, design, construct, furnish and equip a new center for collaborative art and technology at the university of New Mexico in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county; (b) thirty-six million dollars (\$36,000,000) to plan, design, construct, renovate, furnish and equip a children's psychiatric center for the health sciences center at the university of New Mexico in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county; (c) three million dollars (\$3,000,000) to plan, design, construct, renovate and equip infrastructure improvements to Gurley hall at the Gallup branch campus of the university of New Mexico in McKinley county; (d) one million three hundred thousand dollars (\$1,300,000) to plan, design, construct, renovate, furnish and equip infrastructure improvements campuswide at the Los Alamos branch campus of the university of New Mexico in Los Alamos county; (e) three million dollars (\$3,000,000) to plan, design, construct, renovate, furnish and equip renovations and an addition to Fred Peralta hall at the Taos branch campus of the university of New Mexico in Taos county; and (f) nine hundred thousand dollars (\$900,000) to plan, design, construct, renovate, furnish and install improvements, including roof replacement and solar installation, to the learning commons resource center at the Valencia branch campus of the university of New Mexico in Valencia county; and (11) to the board of regents of western New Mexico university: (a) two million dollars (\$2,000,000) to plan, design, construct, furnish and equip a Deming learning center at western New Mexico university in Deming in Luna county; and (b) two million dollars (\$2,000,000) to plan, design, construct, renovate, furnish and equip infrastructure improvements, including roadway improvements to Kentucky street, at western New Mexico university in Silver City in Grant county.

SECTION 11. ELECTION .--

A. Bonds issued pursuant to the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be submitted to the registered voters of the state at the general election to be held in November 2022, and, if they receive a majority of all the votes cast thereon at such election, shall take effect upon certification of the state canvassing board announcing the results of the election. No bonds shall be issued or sold under that act until the registered voters of this state have voted upon and approved the bonds and property tax as provided in this section. Any bonds issued under that act shall be issued within thirty months from the date of such election. B. The ballots used at the 2022 general election shall contain substantially the following language:

(1) "The 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of senior citizen facility improvement, construction and equipment acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed twenty-four million four hundred seventy thousand dollars (\$24,470,000) to make capital expenditures for certain senior citizen facility improvement, construction and equipment acquisition projects and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law? For______ Against______";

(2) "The 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of library acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed nineteen million two hundred sixty-six thousand dollars (\$19,266,000) to make capital expenditures for academic, public school, tribal and public library resource acquisitions and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law? For______ Against______"; and

(3) "The 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of higher education, special schools and tribal schools capital improvement and acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed two hundred fifteen million nine hundred eighty-six thousand dollars (\$215,986,000) to make capital expenditures for certain higher education, special schools and tribal schools capital improvements and acquisitions and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law? For______ Against______".

C. Each question set forth in this section includes a specific work or object to be financed by the bonds. If any such question is not approved by a majority vote of the electorate at the state's 2022 general election, the issuance of bonds for the work or object specified by the question shall be excluded from and shall not be part of the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act. The failure of a question to be approved by the electorate at the 2022 general election shall not affect those questions that are approved at the election.

D. The secretary of state shall include the submission of the capital projects general obligation bonds to the people at the 2022 general election, and it shall be included in the general election proclamation. The secretary of state shall cause the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act to be published in full in at least one newspaper in each county of the state if one be published therein, once each week, for four successive weeks next preceding the general election as required by the constitution of New Mexico.

SECTION 12. ART IN PUBLIC PLACES.--Pursuant to Section 13-4A-4 NMSA 1978 and where applicable, the appropriations authorized in the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act include money for the art in public places fund.

SECTION 13. PROJECT SCOPE--EXPENDITURES--REVERSION.--

A. If an appropriation for a project authorized in the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is not sufficient to complete all the purposes specified, the appropriation may be expended for any portion of the purposes specified in the appropriation. Expenditures shall not be made for purposes other than those specified in the appropriation.

B. The state agencies and state institutions to which money has been appropriated in the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be responsible for monitoring the projects funded in that act to ensure compliance with the constitution and laws of New Mexico and shall cause to be reverted any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the earlier of the third full fiscal year after issuance of the bonds or the termination or completion of the specific project. Reverted funds shall be deposited in the debt service fund established by the state treasurer for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the state's general obligation bonds.

SECTION 14. SEVERABILITY.--If any part or application of the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is held invalid, the remainder or its application to other situations or persons shall not be affected.

SECTION 15. EMERGENCY.--It is necessary for the public peace, health and safety that this act take effect immediately.

"He learned about native traditional pottery from his pueblo elders. His art teacher taught him how to collect, process and shape the clay into pots. He learned how to create colored slip (a thin layer of finer clay) using the natural dyes and to paint designs using brushes handmade from vucca. Finally, he learned the old way to fire the pots in pits," Tombaugh Gallery said.

"Nastacio comes from a large extended, artistic family," the gallery said. "His parents were both well-Nastacio moved to Albuquerque in 2007 "to learn a trade so he could support himself," the news release said.

"In 2010, he relocated to Las Cruces where he works for a metal building contractor in addition to making his art. He looks forward to the day he can return to Zuni."

Winter Gas Prices

As the calendar moves comparable to today, into the colder winter current prices are about months, Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) wants to make sure its customers are prepared in multiple ways. As highlighted in past articles, there is an increase in natural gas prices globally. This is due to the increased use of natural gas to generate electricity, the export of liquefied natural gas (LNG) overseas, and geopolitical events.

"In my 30 plus years of experience, 20 of those years at LCU, I have seen prices rise and fall for natural gas, and I can confidently say prices have been higher than they are currently," LCU Gas Business Analyst Mario Puentes stated. "In the 2005 through 2009 period prices were higher or just as high as the current market prices," Puentes continued. Even though natural gas prices in the first decade of the 2000's were

35% higher now than they were a year ago. This is due to a tight balance between supply and demand for natural gas worldwide. The purchase prices in Europe and other world markets are much higher than in the United States, which creates an incentive for producers to sell natural gas to those markets in addition to the United States (U.S.).

"We monitor and watch prices, as well as study worldwide energy dynamics, this helps form the basis to purchase natural gas in layers or batches that will be used during the winter months," Puentes stated. The rising natural gas prices are not related to the Cost of Service (COS) rates that increased in September 2022. LCU overall will continue to watch trends to look for dips in the market

to buy the rest of the natural gas that will be consumed in the winter months. That is because LCU does not buy all the natural gas that will be consumed each winter in a single transaction. Instead, it is purchased in layers or batches to create a portfolio of gas supply with the objective to achieve a manageable average price.

LCU recommends, if possible, to upgrade your appliances to energy efficient appliances to be in control of the cost you are paying as we see this rise in prices for natural gas. Make sure that

your house has proper insulation installed, while keeping all doors and windows closed, when possible, to keep the heat from escaping from your home. Although not all of these options may be possible right away, slowly upgrading your home can make a huge difference during the winter months.

With LCU's main goal of providing excellent service and securing natural gas supply to its customers, LCU continues to monitor the market as the winter season approaches. "While constantly trying to provide Las Cruces citizens with the best natural gas service, it is important to know that we do not mark up the natural gas price to our customers, the fuel cost goes directly to the consumer and is not a profit for LCU," Puentes concluded.



Some of the most popular residents at The Arbors are Lulu, Luna, Pepper and Blue Sky.

They are, respectively, a rabbit, a kitten, a goat and a horse.

The Arbors is also home to a couple of turtles, a small herd of ducks and a few colorful birds.

"We use animals a lot for therapy," said The Arbors Assistant Executive Director Monica Leos. "They have brought a lot of comfort to our residents here."

The Arbors is one of

three Vista Living Care facilities for dementia patients in New Mexico. The other two, Sierra Vista and Vista Hermosa, are in Santa Fe. Vista Living Care is owned by a family in Ohio, Leos said. The Arbors has been in operation for more than 20 years.

The animals can be very calming for dementia patients, who may suffer from a lot of emotions, including fear and paranoia, Leos said. Along with subdued lighting and noise levels and a slower pace, the animals help contribute to the overall atmosphere of tranquility at The Arbors,

she said, and to the comfort and independence of the guests.

Lulu, Luna, Pepper, Blue Sky and the other animals can also be soothing for The Arbors staff, Leos said.

She often visits Blue Sky, "to see what he's up to, talk to him, tell him your problems," she said.

The Arbors is licensed for up to 24 guests, Leos said, who have varying degrees of dementia.

Leos, The Arbors Executive Director Bianca R. Loya and other staff work closely with doctors and families to ensure the best care for each guest, Leos said. They also work closely with Mesilla Valley Hospice, she said, and know The Arbors might be a patient's last home.

The more The Arbors staff of more than 20 know about their patients, the better able they are able "to communicate and connect" with them, she said. Staff also receive regular training on dementia care, Leos said.

That includes validation therapy, which allows each guest to live his or her own reality, Leos said, which can be "very important when it comes to dementia care."

The facility also emphasizes safety, cleanliness and good food for its guests, she said.

"We take away all their worries," Leos said. "We simplify their lives." That's why knowing each guest as an individ-

each guest as an individual is so important to The Arbors, staff, she said.

"We don't want institutional living," Leos said.

Not having a set wakeup time each morning is just one example, she said.

"You wake up whenever you want to wake up," Leos said, and patients "can stay in their jammies" all day if they want to.

Patients can also walk or sit in The Arbors' secure Zen-like garden, where they will find Blue Sky, Pepper and other animals to spend a little quality time with.

How to hit a decent shot from a sand bunker

For more than 70 years, golf magazines have featured tips on hitting shots from sand bunkers in almost every issue. Combined with tips on the internet, instructions numbers well into the hundreds of thousands.

And still golfers don't get it.

Have you ever wondered why tour pros say they prefer their ball winds up in a bunker rather than in the greenside rough? That's because they're not sure how a ball sitting down in a nasty, gnarly rough will come out, but they know how to hit the bunker shot because the sand is highly predictable; they know how the ball will react since they have practiced the shot in many different wavs.

Of course, with all due respect to tour pros, the

shots they face from their bunkers are much easier than what we have to deal with here in the desert. Our bunker sand may be hard-pan, wet (from over sprinkling), muddy or super fluffy. But that begs the question about why most golfers struggle with bunkers.

So let's discuss how to hit a sand shot - and here I'm referring a greenside sand bunker, rather than a fairway bunker some distance from the green. From my experience helping golfers of all levels at golf school, the problem is failing to grasp the proper technique for getting the ball out of the bunker.

Notice I didn't say "hitting" the ball. A correct bunker shot requires you thump the sand from just behind the ball, and the sand then lifts the ball out of the bunker. In this case the clubhead never touches the ball. It's like the magician who says

to the audience "my fingers Golf Doctor never left my hand."

We don't have photos here with this article, but picture and average sand bunker with your ball in the middle, some 60 feet from the flagstick. Grab your sand wedge, a 54, 56 or 60 degree wedge, spread your feet shoulder width apart and distribute your weight evenly. You need to loft your ball some 30 feet to get it on the green and then it will roll the rest of the way.

The setup position is with your feet open 20 degrees to a straight line,

and the ball slightly forward in your stance. This position will allow you to open your clubface (an absolute must) so it's facing down the target line. And the reason you open the face of your sand wedge is to get it under the ball and displace the sand beneath. The "secret" to hitting an explosion shot from the sand is to slide the clubface under the sand behind the ball in such a way that the sand lifts the ball an propels it forward.

Too many golfers approach a bunker shot as a chip shot and try to "trap" the ball and it doesn't work. In addition, it requires a distinctly forceful swing to propel 10 ounces of sand up and forward. If you are going to practice bunker shots from the sand, learn to splash the sand from behind the ball. How far behind? Well, that takes practice.

And another thing, you don't need a lot of body movement, just shoulders, arms and hands, not brute force. A lot of touch and feel. Make believe you are carving out a 7-inch path in the sand, about a halfinch deep, where the ball is on top.

Now let's consider the shot from a fairway bunker, which is a horse of a different color, as cowboys here out West say.

Fairway bunkers are typically placed where an errant drive can cause problems. The fairway bunker on the par 5 hole number 5 at Red Hawk is huge and fairly easy to hit a layup second shot out of. There is plenty of fairway to the left so hitting into that bunker is a mistake, but not a big one. But let's say you're in a fairway bunker on a par 4 that is

150 yards to the green. If you normally hit a 7 iron 150 yards, take a 6 iron, or maybe a 5 iron. Try to hit the ball first and clean, since a little bit of sand behind the ball will really slow it down. The technique is to stand tall, and take a full swing keeping your lower body quiet, so your feet don't shift in the sand. Remember, you are not allowed to touch the sand with your club before the shot, so hover your club over the ball and contact the ball first.

It all comes down to a matter of technique, which is another word for skill, and it takes a lot of practice.




