One of the casualties of the Sunday, Feb. 26, high winds was the roof of the COAS Books 1101 S. Solano Drive location. "The thing I'm most grateful for is it was Sunday, when we're closed and no one was there," said Mike Beckett, owner of COAS, whose downtown location remains open. "Debris and ductwork fell into the store. The decking on the roof rolled up like a can of sardines." According to Weather Underground, at the Las Cruces International Airport Station, around 9 a.m. winds jumped from less than 10 mph to over 40 mph, stayed near 40 until about 5 p.m., with gusts over 60 and 70 mph. At New Mexico State University, a shade rest station (inset) was mangled and the Aggies' softball game was canceled. El Paso Electric reported multiple utility poles down or damaged, with power outages around town.

Velo Cruces has mural contest

Velo Cruces, Inc., a non-profit promoting bicycles for commuting and recreation, will host the second Bicycle Murals and More Contest in March.

Contestants bicycle to local murals and other public art and fill out a bicycle bingo card by identifying the location of the mural or public art in each square, Velo Cruces said in a news release.

During the first week of the contest, a small portion of the public art is displayed on the bingo card and completed cards earn participants three prize entries. During the second week, the entire public art is displayed on the bingo card and completed cards earn two prize entries. During the third week, one prize entry is earned for a completed bingo card or by submitting a picture of the contestant's bike next to any public art display.

Winning contestants will be selected by random drawings from all entries.

Funds raised from the contest "will help Velo Cruces continue its mission to transform Las Cruces into a great bicycle and pedestrian community," the news release said. Registration fees will fund Velo Cruces and The HUB Community Bike Shop and will support the Every Body Rides with Grace adaptive cycle donation program.

LCFD implements Project LIGHT to aid crisis response

On Monday, March 6, the Las Cruces Fire Department (LCFD) launches Project LIGHT, a new program to Lessen the Incidence of Grief, Harm and Trauma in the city.

During fiscal year 2022, LCFD was directed and funded to add mental crisis intervention services to its Mobile Integrated Healthcare (MIH) Program to expand the department's emergency response options for mental health services for those who are in crisis, LCFD Battalion Chief Matthew Hiles told the Las Cruces City Council at its Feb. 13 work session.

The re-assignment of LCFD firefighter paramedics to Project LIGHT has been completed, and all its positions filled, Hiles said. It has two mobile response teams, each comprised of a firefighter/paramedic and a social worker.

Firefighter Paul Ford has been MIH coordinator since that program was created in 2016.

The teams will respond to 911 calls for a wide range of mental and behavioral health services, including de-escalation, transportation to definitive care when

appropriate, mediation and advocacy, on-scene medical assessment and care and providing crisis solutions that might include treatment, providing education on disorders and medications, connecting those in need to community resources and providing appropriate follow-up.

In 2022, LCFD responded to nearly 3,000 calls to deal with behavioral health issues, including 649 protective custody (with the Las Cruces Police Department), 154 suicide attempts, 163 welfare checks and 542 overdoses.

Project Light team members have coordinated with all three Las Cruces hospitals, FYI+ and other community providers and programs it can partner with, Hiles said.

Project Light will be operative 8 a.m.-7 p.m. Monday-Saturday, which Hiles said have been identified as the peak hours for the services it will provide.

"This is really forward thinking," Mayor Ken Miyagishima said. "This is trailblazing efforts on behalf of the city as well as the fire department. I think it's going to work out extremely well."

"I could just stand up and jump for joy, the kind of impact you're going to make in our community," Mayor Pro Tempore Kasandra Gandara said.

DACC opens food pantry

Doña Ana Community College administrators cut the ribbon Wednesday afternoon, Feb. 15, officially opening DACC's Comfort Casita food pantry.

Having the food pantry means no DACC student should have to deal with food insecurity again, DACC Vice President for Student Services Ike Ledesma said as he joined Outreach Coordinator Amy Myers in cutting the blue ribbon to open the facility. Director of Student Accessibility Services Jesse Haas, Ph.D. also participated.

Ledesma said state and federal grants helped get the food pantry open and stocked and DACC has a funding plan in place to ensure its sustainability for years

to come.

The food pantry is in room 109B of the DASH building on DACC's Espina campus, 3400 S. Espina St. at the south end of the New Mexico State University campus.

The pantry is open to all DACC students and in some instances, faculty and staff as well, DACC said in a news release.

"Each semester, there are a vast number of students who state that food insecurity is an issue for their household," Haas said. "This pantry will be able to bridge the gap for some of our students when it comes to feeding themselves and their families."

Students can visit the pantry twice per week for food or other household items. Funding for the pantry comes from a nearly \$60,000 grant from the New Mexico Higher Education Department.

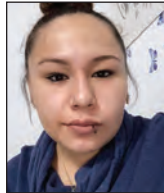
Women's event set for March 8

"DAAC is honored to co-host this event recognizing the power, courage, resilience, and persistence of these five local women," said DAAC Executive Director Araceli Solis.

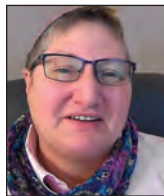

LCU Wins Instructor & Outstanding Operator of the Year

In January 2023, the New Mexico Water and Wastewater Association awarded both Instructor of the Year and Outstanding Operator of the Year to employees from Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) at this year's Annual Short School, where water and wastewater operators and leaders come to train and refresh their skills.

"Both these individuals are truly great at what they do every day; the awards are well deserved. I'm very proud to have them on our team and excited to see them recognized for their efforts," said Deputy Director Water Ronald Borunda.

The first award was presented to LCU Water Distribution Crew Leader Filiberto Aguirre, Jr. for 2023 Instructor of the Year. Aguirre is an instructor for water and wastewater, teaching both basic and advanced mathematics, and has been an active member of the NMWWA Association for eight years. He has been with LCU for 12 years.

"I usually get some of the larger classes because I get the new

operators and those who want to refresh their math skills," said Aguirre, who has even traveled throughout the state to teach. "They tell me that they understand more and that it reminds them of high school because I teach with an overhead projector."

The second award was presented to LCU Water Production Operator Horacio Palacios for the Outstanding Operator of the Year. Palacios has been with LCU for 15 years, first in water distribution and then in water production.

"I came into the field right out of high school," said Palacios, who had initially

considered the fire department before learning how water flowed from the ground up.

"This award means a lot to me," he said.

Borunda said Palacios has been a champion for educating the next generation about water. "One of the main things that makes Horacio stand out is how well

he interacts with young children and High School students during career days or fairs," said Borunda. "He even built a diorama of how the water system works here in Las Cruces, which provides a better visual and understanding of how important our water system is and those that work in it every day."



Law causing New Mexico to lose doctors

We have a column this week (see next page) from a medical doctor, Rebecca Coalson, that confirms some of the recent fears I've had regarding the medical community in New Mexico.

For years, we've known recruiting doctors to New Mexico has been a challenge.

Doctors, no surprise, hold education as a high priority. For themselves and their families. New Mexico's long-maligned public education system has frequently been cited by outside medical professionals as a deterrent to the Land of Enchantment.

As much as we love our big, rural state, with big skies and long vistas, many doctors who grew up and were educated on the east or west coasts wouldn't

even consider going to "the middle of nowhere."

Still, there were many medical professionals who recognized many of the beautiful things we love about our state.

However, the New Mexico Legislature made a move in 2021 that made it difficult for even doctors who love our state to stay here or come here in the first place.

In that still-Covid-covered session, lawmakers passed a law that increased medical malpractice caps exponentially. That instantly increased the cost of being a doctor here, as malpractice insurance increased commensurately. Caps previously in the range of \$500,000 increased to \$5 or \$6 million.

In addition, it greatly increased

the risk for doctors practicing here. It has put a burden on our hospitals, and made it even tougher on small, independent doctors.

I recently learned of an El Paso doctor who had the opportunity to come to Las Cruces, just for a couple of days a week, and increase his annual salary by about a million dollars. He refused the offer, given the dangerous environment for a doctor practicing in New Mexico.

I've been told that in 2000, Las Cruces had about 22 pediatricians. Today, there are six.

That decline has been caused by multiple, varied factors, but the malpractice caps could be the final nail in the coffin.

Could there really be a New Mexico with no practicing doctors? Probably not, but if you were to write a script to get to

that dark place, you would start with this malpractice cap. In Las Cruces, we at least have the advantage of driving 40 miles south to doctors and medical facilities in El Paso. Roswellians can go to Lubbock, and Lordsburgers can go to Tucson, but much of the rest of the state won't have such options.

It is a fact malpractice happens. When it does, we hope justice prevails and victims and their families receive compensation. Ironically, though, as we make New Mexico less attractive to doctors, we actually increase the odds of having less skilled doctors come to our state, potentially increasing the odds of malpractice.

The legislature has the opportunity to correct this mistake.

For the good of our state, let's hope they do.

Neighbors gather to fight crime

When I bought my home in 2002 there were two big selling points - an addition on the back that was large enough to accommodate the pool table I would buy a few weeks later, and the fact it was in a quiet neighborhood on a street that is one block long and doesn't really connect to anything.

For nearly two decades that isolation provided security, but in the last two or three years that has changed. It's still quiet, and I still feel safe walking throughout the neighborhood. But in the last couple of years I've had thefts from both my car and my home.

And I'm not alone. My neighbors have also seen the changes, and they have organized to do something about it.

About 50 of us gathered in the cafeteria of Las Cruces High School recently for a monthly meeting of a neighborhood

watch group that started six months ago in the living room of one of the organizers, but quickly outgrew both that and subsequent meeting spots.

The reason for that growth, and the topic on everyone's mind, is crime. Neighborhood watch organizers have worked hand-in-hand with Las Cruces Police to take proactive steps making our small part of the city safer.

Much of the focus is on helping residents "harden" their homes, either through new technology like security cameras, or simply by making sure doors and windows are locked tightly. And, there is a concerted effort to be more vigilant and keep an eye

out for things that look suspicious.

I agree with those who argue that we need to address crime at its root. Which is why it was so disappointing to see the Las Cruces City Council delay the start of much-needed affordable housing. Of the four city bonds approved by voters last November, affordable housing should have been the top priority, and the last thing to be set aside. Parks are nice, housing is critical.

But addressing crime at its root doesn't mean ignoring it as it's blossoming.

Porch piracy and theft from mailboxes have both been growing problems. At the monthly meeting, we brainstormed on how to make it more difficult for thieves. One of the group leaders offered to hold packages for those who would be out of

town. A group member who is trained in self-defense and firearms offered free instruction for neighbors wanting to learn more about those means of protection.

The group also has a hospitality team that welcomes new arrivals, organizes cleanups and hosts the annual Christmas lighting contest. But membership is growing because all of us are frustrated with the crime problem and want to be proactive in finding a solution.

The saga which has led us to our current healthcare crisis is that HB 75-The Medical Malpractice Act, written and sponsored by trial attorneys, was passed in 2021 and wrongfully grouped physicians and independently owned outpatient care facilities (OCFs) into the same category as hospitals. This deliberate grouping allows independent physicians and OCFs to be sued for the same dollar amounts as a hospital, raising malpractice caps from hundreds of thousands of dollars to multiple millions of dollars.

This move by HB 75 is grossly outside the national standards for medical malpractice coverage, and consequently, there is no insurer willing to write a policy for such a deviation from national norms. Therefore, if

physicians and independently owned OCFs, which includes Dialysis Centers, cannot obtain adequate medical malpractice insurance coverage because of the healthcare crisis fabricated by HB 75, they will be forced to close their doors by Jan. 1, 2024. Clearly, losing independently owned OCFs and Dialysis Centers across the entire state would be critically damaging to many New Mexicans.

Everyone agrees, including physicians, that patients absolutely should be rightfully compensated for injuries and loss due to medical errors and malpractice. That is the exact reason why physicians and OCFs in New Mexico must be able to secure adequate malpractice insurance coverage.

New Mexico has lost more than 600 primary care physi-

cians and 63 OBGYN physicians since 2017. The cost of medical malpractice insurance has already significantly increased and is much higher than in our neighboring states. Bills and policies such as HB 75 have caused physicians to flee the state since 2021 and caused others to not practice here. This cannot be tolerated.

Every day I have patients tell me their primary care doctor or specialist moved and they cannot get an appointment with another physician for many months. I know that many of you have experienced the same situation. We cannot suffer losing more physicians and OCFs, which will lead to even more problems with patients obtaining timely appointments due to lack of access to care.

The last week of February,

two critical bills were introduced that would address and fix this dire situation created by the writers of HB75. Our elected lawmakers had an opportunity to correct the crisis that they created. Unfortunately, one of those bills, HB 88, died in committee.

The other bill, SB 296, was scheduled to be heard March 3 by the Senate Tax, Business and Transportation Committee.

Yet, while the future of New Mexico healthcare flails, lawmakers have already passed many noncritical bills like SB 188, Official State Aroma. Do you feel more secure knowing we now have an Official State Aroma?

As a native New Mexican and physician, I love our state, it truly is the Land of Enchantment. I consider it an honor to

serve and raise my family here. I know many of you feel the same. Your fellow New Mexicans and our healthcare system need your voice to advocate for preserving good, accessible and affordable healthcare in New Mexico.

Today, please contact your state senator asking them to support SB 296. You can also be present during SB 296 presentation via Zoom meeting, the link for that online meeting is pending at this time.

Proposed alcohol tax puts small bars, restaurants at big risk

Elected officials in Santa Fe are trying to raise alcohol taxes again. It's one movie that doesn't need a sequel. This year struggling bars and restaurants need a break, not a legislative proposal that hurts our ability to stay open.

It feels we're trapped in a remake of Groundhog Day, and New Mexico breweries aren't sure what potentially business-ending news we can expect to wake up to next. This time, it's sweeping proposed state alcohol excise tax legislation.

During Covid-19, New Mexico had some of the most severe drinking and dining restrictions in the country. The rules seemed to change weekly and were difficult to navigate while keeping our doors open and our team members employed. Since then, inflation, supply chain shortages and dine-in visitors who still haven't returned to pre-pandemic levels are new problems.

Since announcing their "top priority" last fall, some Santa Fe lawmakers have introduced a bevy of proposals for new excise taxes on alcohol. Their determination would be admirable if it weren't so

short sighted.

One bill under consideration would call for all counties to impose local alcohol taxes. Bosque Brewing Co. has eight locations in Albuquerque, Bernalillo, Las Cruces and Santa Fe, so local excise taxes would hit establishments like ours with operations in multiple localities especially hard. Adding an additional layer of compliance means an added layer of costs, which makes life harder for our small margin business. We would have to forget about any plans for expansion, which have already been delayed several times as a result of the pandemic.

While my business has seen recovering revenue over the last year, there are still many challenges we face daily including an unstable economic and labor environment, rising inflation for the most basic materials needed to make our products, and a 10 percent decline in business since the legalization of marijuana, among other things.

We have been fortunate to make it this long. Plenty of restaurants and bars didn't make it and shuttered for good. Our team and customers were able to remain

optimistic that better days were coming soon. We don't want to pass all these costs onto consumers. However, if excise taxes go up we will be left with few options.

A sweeping increase in state excise taxes for all alcohol sellers at this time would effectively wipe out any incremental progress we have made throughout 2022 as our state has lessened regulations and patrons have felt safe to once again enter our establishments.

This proposed tax increase could potentially destroy my business once and for all, which currently employs 335 individuals and has operated in the state of New Mexico for the last 10 years.

While we completely understand the concerns

regarding alcohol consumption and the real impact it has had on our state, why not instead consider a more equitable solution like SB 220, which would earmark all of the current revenue generated by the state's alcohol excise tax to pay for drug and alcohol treatment rather than it going to the state fund, which is currently in a surplus?

With the looming threat of a full blown recession, higher taxes could be the final straw for many restaurants and bars like mine. It's time for lawmakers in the Roundhouse to wake up and realize that higher alcohol taxes are a nightmare for the hospitality sector. Only then will we be able to move on to brighter days.

It's March Madness, not just for basketball but also for the science behind our landscapes. The Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) Water Conservation Program's free Lush & Lean (L&L) Workshops kicked off on March 2 with a workshop on landscape design, focusing on making "plants work for you" by Rachel Gioannini, New Mexico State University (NMSU) Assistant Professor of Horticulture. The second Lush & Lean workshop on Thursday, March 9, will focus on the Community Collaborative Rain Hail and Snow (CoCoRaHS) network.

"We call it our March Madness to recruit more members," said Dr. Dave DuBois, New Mexico State Climatologist and CoCoRaHS State Coordinator.

The CoCoRaHS is a non-profit, community based, network of volunteers who measure and report rain, hail, and snow in their backyards. CoCoRaHS was born in 1998 with the intent of doing a better job of

mapping and reporting intense storms after a devastating flash flood in Colorado. CoCoRaHS became a nationwide volunteer network in 2010 and is now international with citizen observers helping provide critical precipitation observations, benefiting their country's needs. Volunteers submit their observations using the CoCoRaHS website or app and are trained through programs like Lush & Lean.

"This citizen science program continues to grow and supports national programs that track climate and weather, for example. Some important users are the weather forecasters and the River Forecast Centers that track flooding risk when it rains hard," said DuBois.

"Another big user of our data is the drought and agricultural community. They look at when there is no precipitation and count the number of zero rain entries at each station," he said. "CoCoRaHS is one of those programs

that anyone who can read a number can participate. We've got observers of all ages, from elementary schools to retirees."

Each year the LCU Water Conservation Program hosts the Lush & Lean series of workshops, inviting local experts to talk directly to residents about specific topics like water-wise landscaping, what to grow, how to have healthy soil, and how to harvest

rainwater.

"These workshops are adapted to our hot, dry, southern New Mexico climate," said LCU Water Conservation Coordinator Rhonda Diaz. "We want our gardens to flourish and still be water smart."

Free to the public, all workshops will be held at the Thomas Branigan Memorial Library, Roadrunner Room, 200 E. Picacho, Las Cruces, on Thursdays from 5:30 PM to 7:30 PM. Presentations begin promptly at 5:45 PM.

Bus ridership rising

South Central Regional Transit District (SCRTD) ridership has grown each of the past three years, with a strong transit recovery following the pandemic, SCRTD said in a news release.

Ridership rose 36 percent in the past fiscal year, with 85,075 trips, the transit district said.

“Ridership has continued to rise another 30 percent in the first quarter of fiscal year 2023 with 22,219 rides, the news release said. “At the present pace, the district will approach 100,000 rides this year.”

SCRTD is expected to accept delivery of three electric buses by April 2024, the district said. The El Paso Metropolitan Planning Organization is considering awarding a grant to SCRTD that would pay for another five electric buses.

“The continued rise in ridership is due to the district attracting more riders by increasing service on its bus routes that operate across the Mesilla Valley,” said SCRTD Executive Director David Armijo. “Adding zero-emission electric buses adds another challenge but will improve air quality and reduce maintenance costs by lowering vehicle emissions.”

SCRTD is working with El Paso Electric to prepare for the transition to zero-emission electric buses, the district said.

House budget approaches \$10 billion

All members of the New Mexico House of Representatives who represent Doña Ana County except one voted for House Bill 2, the General Appropriations Act, which passed the House Feb. 16 52-17, with one member excused.

It was the first state budget passed under new House Appropriations and Finance Committee Chair Nathan Small, a Las Cruces Democrat.

"Our House budget builds on the LFC's important framework to make responsible investments

that will pay off for New Mexicans now, and for generations to come, while also maintaining robust reserves," Small said in a House Democrats news release.

HB 2 proposes a general fund budget for fiscal year 2024 of \$9.43 billion, an increase of 12 percent over the current budget, according to the Legislative Finance Committee (LFC).

Small and fellow Las Cruces Democrats Joanne Ferrary, Angelica Rubio, Micaela Lara Cadena and Doreen Gallegos, voted for HB 2, along with Democrats Ray Lara of Chamberino, Willie Madrid of Chaparral and Tara Jaramillo of Socorro, who also represent portions of Doña Ana County. Jenifer Jones, a Republican from Deming whose district includes two precincts in the county, voted against the bill. The LFC said HB2 would:

- Increase public school general fund appropriations by \$332.2 million, or 8.6 percent over the current budget. It "raises educator compensation by an average of five percent, provides parity with state employees for educator

health insurance coverage, raises principal minimum salaries and raises educational assistant salary minimums to \$25,000."

- Increases funding for higher education by \$80.5 million, or 7.9 percent, including "targeted raises for faculty." It increases funding for the state's opportunity scholarship fund to \$119 million, up \$12 million from FY23.

- Increases general fund appropriations to the Early Childhood and Education Care Department by \$135 million, a 69 percent increase over FY23, "and sharply increases funding for home visiting and prekindergarten and childcare." In HB2, "appropriations to the Children, Youth and Families Department (CYFD) are up six percent and include funding to fill hundreds of existing and new social worker positions and funding ... to help modernize the state's child welfare system."

- Increase funding for Medicaid by \$242 million, 20 percent over FY23. HB2 increases spending for behavioral health services across the Health; Human

Services; CYFD; and Early Childhood Education and Care departments; and other agencies by \$164 million.

- Increase funding for the state Economic Development Department by 11.3 percent and the state Tourism Department by 11.1 percent. It also includes substantial increases in the budgets of the Environment and the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources departments, and the Office of the State Engineer.

- Provide \$1.5 billion to the state Department of Transportation for infrastructure projects, which is almost \$100 million more than the LFC's recommendation and \$325 million more than the recommendation from Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham.

- Leave general fund reserves at 30 percent.

HB now goes to the state Senate for consideration.

All 45 Democrats in the New Mexico House voted for HB2, along with seven of the House's 25 Republicans. Feb. 16 was the last day to introduce legislation in the 2023 session. The legislature adjourns March 18.

NAMI advocate builds from lifelong experiences

Lived experience is the cornerstone of Micah Pearson's advocacy on behalf of people struggling with mental illness.

With a diagnosis that includes bipolar disorder type 1/rapid cycling with psychotic features, PTSD, ADHD and generalized anxiety disorder, it is an issue Pearson has dealt with most of his 46 years. As second vice president of the board of directors of the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), former president of Southern New Mexico NAMI (2011-20) and an advisor to the New Mexico Governor's Behavioral Health Planning Council, it is "passion, mission and life" to him. And Pearson isn't afraid to talk about his own personal struggles and triumphs with mental health.

"Every person is a miracle" with a gift to share, he said. "Mine is, I can talk and tell a story; and weird (expletive) happened to me, so I always have a story to tell."

Last November, Pearson founded an organization he calls InsideOut to share his skills and experience as a mental health advocate, speaker, writer and consultant.

As an advocate, Pearson is committed to changing the narrative about mental health by reshaping public policy at the state and national level, with a focus on peer support, criminal justice and fair treatment/equitable care for those dealing with mental health issues. He can provide testimony about his own personal experiences with the system – both outside looking in and inside looking out.

As a speaker, Pearson has keynoted local, state and national mental health conferences, and can share "uniquely engaging and powerful" personal stories both virtually and in person.

As a storyteller and artist, Pearson is the author of "A Peek Inside: Illustrated Journeys in Life with Mental Illness." He has written essays and articles for NAMI, the American Psychiatric Association and online platforms, and created a video for NAMI Wichita's 2020 Candlelight Ceremony.

Pearson's goal as a writer is "to turn the conversation surrounding mental health (in) less dire but still important directions for deeper understanding, connection and empathy," he said on his website. "I want you to leave with the good news – that there's hope."

As a consultant, Pearson can not only tell his own story, he can help others tell theirs, he said, and guide them in creating organizations to effectively represent marginalized populations.

"You remind your clients that they're not powerless," he said, and "to never stop until something gets done."

He calls on years of experience presenting and teaching classes and workshops on a wide range of mental health issues, including crisis intervention, and creating "best-practice programs in the criminal justice and public health sectors."

Pearson also has a work background in information systems and research.

"I know how to tell a story," he said. "You'll laugh, you'll cry and then you'll get your data."

Pearson has been in jail – including solitary confinement; been through meltdowns and panic attacks; has been on his meds and off his meds ("I feel better when I take them," he said); and once published a suicide note on Twitter.

"A key reason why I am where I am today; have survived things that others didn't, didn't end up on the streets or the morgue, and instead had the opportunity to do this work – is that I'm privileged and lucky," Pearson said. "My parents had money to pay my medical and legal fees and support me while I got back on my feet."

"I love my brain," Pearson said. "I wouldn't trade it for the world. I wouldn't be who I am without my brain being what it is."

His clients and audiences "appreciate how open I am about how difficult it is," Pearson said. "I'm 10 years into my rock-solid recovery. It's an almost daily struggle. I do not pretend that it's easy."

"I just want to do good, that's all," Pearson said. "I want people to feel good about their condition," he said, "not to the point where they don't treat them, but where they don't feel broken."

Consistency is key for business

Recently, I ran across a saying from John Maxwell, “CONSISTENCY...It doesn’t matter how talented you are. It doesn’t matter how many opportunities you receive. If you want to grow, consistency is key.” Just thinking over coffee, this little saying got me thinking just what is consistency and how it applies to business and, in particular, to leadership.

Consistency can also be applicable as a key to leadership success and, thus, growth of a business. We all have different definitions for a leader along with a multitude of reasons for following a leader. Traditionally, we believe it is the charisma, charm and outgoing, positive nature of a leader that draws us to them. I suppose

in a lot of ways this is correct. However, through the years, I’ve seen charisma dwindle; charm fade and the outgoing positive nature become negative. And with that fading, the leader no longer has followers. It seems to me that we are all looking for consistency in a leader.

Potentially, this consistency follows three areas of focus: vision, values and passion. We all want our leaders to have a vision and know where they are leading us. A leader must communicate the vision and direction with a consistent message. It goes without saying, the values of a leader must be of the utmost consistency. Finally, my favorite, a leader must always be consistent with passion. That energetic commitment to fulfill their vision with passion is key to a leader creating other leaders.

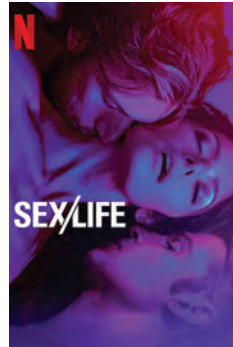

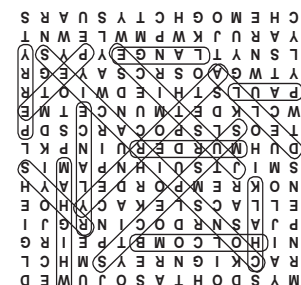

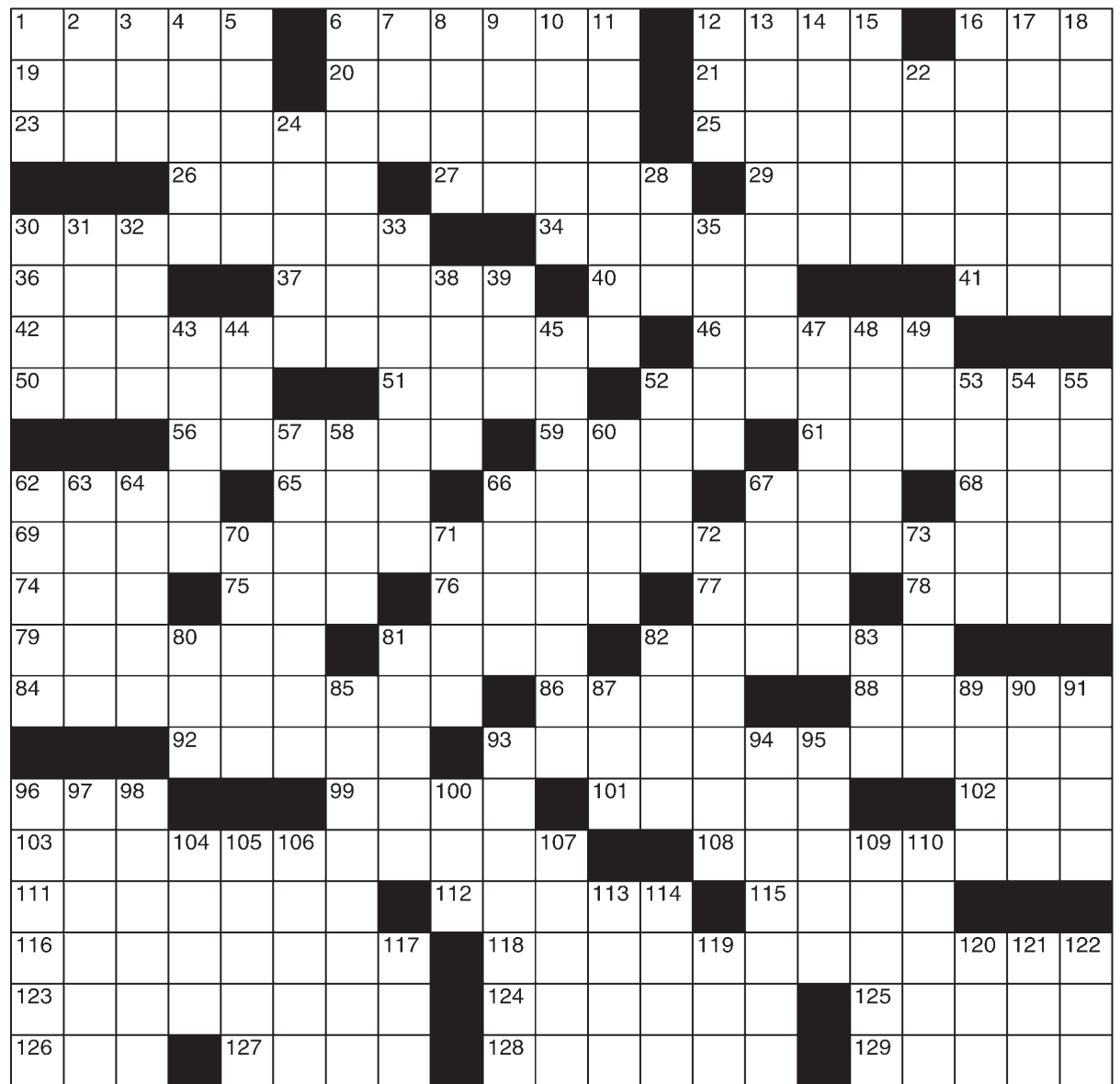

You can enjoy the music of Gustav Holst and Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky in upcoming Las Cruces Symphony Orchestra (LCSO) concerts.

The concerts, which will be held in New Mexico State University's Atkinson Recital Hall, 1075 N. Horseshoe St. on campus, are:

- Classics 3: "Space, the Final Frontier," 7:30 p.m. Saturday, March 18, and 3 p.m. Sunday,

March 19. Featuring "The Planets," which Holst composed 1914-16, and composer John Williams' "Star Wars: Suite for Orchestra."

- Classics 4: "Tchaikovsky," 7:30 p.m. Saturday, May 6, and 3 p.m. Sunday, May 7. Compositions by Tchaikovsky to be performed will include "1812 Overture" and "Symphony No. 4 in F minor, Op. 36."

Holst (1874-1934), an English composer, is best known for "The Planets," which he composed 1914-16.

"The Planets" was a perfect

choice for LCSO, as Las Cruces has "a lot of companies that deal with aerospace," Symphony Director Ming Luke told the Bulletin. (Las Cruces was also the home of Clyde Tombaugh [1906-97], who discovered Pluto in 1930).

Russian composer Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky (1840-93), "is one of the greatest composers," Luke said. There are "deep-felt emotions in his work," Luke said, and the LCSO performance will

"show all sides of Tchaikovsky."

Luke, who succeeded Lonnie Klein as LCSO maestro, said he has found Las Cruces to be very supportive of the symphony.

"I am very excited about the future of the symphony," Luke said. In addition to LCSO, Luke is music director for the Merced Symphony in California and the Nashville Ballet and is principal guest conductor for the San Francisco Ballet.

Luke holds a master of fine arts degree in conducting from Carnegie Mellon University and a bachelor of music in music education and piano pedagogy from Westminster Choir College of Rider University.

Review: Fasten your belts for a wild ride on 'Hookman'

When I sat down in the Mark and Stephanie Medoff Theatre at NMSU to watch "Hookman," I thought, "What a fabulous set." When the play ended, I thought, "What a great show."

The 70 or so minutes in between were an astonishing mix of Freddie Kruger and Jason Voorhees, "A Midsummer Night's Dream," "Groundhog Day" and some of the classic horror movies produced during Hollywood's Golden Age.

The best way to enjoy the show is to take the advice of the play's director, New Mexico State University associate theatre professor Larissa Lury.

During the talkback with the cast and creative team after the Feb. 23 preview performance, Larissa suggested (I am paraphrasing) watching "Hookman" as if

you were going on a scary ride at a county fair: Scream if you want, laugh, cry – just enjoy the ride. That is clearly what playwright Lauren Yee has in mind.

And what a ride it is! A bit of gore, some adult themes and language and a little violence (that's the viewer discretion advisory) are secondary to the extraordinary work of props designer Vance Cook (give him a hand for the Hookman's ghastly appendage), guest set and projection designer Hsi-An Chen (how I loved the car, the truly creepy projections and the "snow" storm!), costume designer Chloe Cappuccilli (the masks were fabulous!), sound designer Jim Wilkinson and student designers Alia Belinte (lighting) and Carmen Vugteveen (assistant set designer).

And the cast! What outstanding performances by Eliza Phillips, Liliana Tuda, Tiara

Sibley, Joshua Jackson, Angeliq Reagan and Benjamin Ramsey. (Their understudies are Emma Kenney, Alycia Herrera, Indira Rucker and Austin Reeve.)

The show has no intermission, and no one in the cast ever, for even a moment, let drop the fireball of energy Eliza and Liliana created in the very first scene. Joshua Jackson was actually the first actor on stage, and he also closed the show with an amazing montage.

You guys were brilliant.

The talkback after the show made it clear there is another element shared by everyone in the cast and crew: Joy.

They love being a part of this show – exploring it, making it and bringing it to life. Credit there goes especially, I think, to Larissa and to assistant director Eva Cullen, stage manager

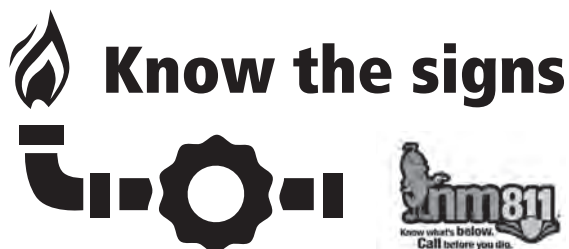

Community support part of Buckhorn business model

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is one in a periodic series of articles from the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico about businesses working to support their neighbors.)

Sometimes you don't have to look far to find the philanthropic hearts of a community. Tucked away in quiet San Antonio, New Mexico, is The Buckhorn Tavern, owned and operated by Ernie and Stephanie Sichler.

Snapshots of how they give are everywhere. Since a public library does not exist in their small town, a little free library sits in front of the restaurant for the community. They host "Warrior Wednesdays," where 10 percent of the restaurant's proceeds go to participating local nonprofits. They recycle and sell aluminum cans used at the

restaurant and give the profits to San Antonio Elementary School to purchase books.

The Buckhorn Tavern didn't always belong to the Sichlers. It was established in the 1940s and became world famous for its green chile cheeseburgers.

Stephanie, from Las Cruces, was on a work trip in Albuquerque in 2019 when she learned the restaurant – in her husband's hometown – was officially closing. With Ernie's food and beverage background and passion for cooking, they knew they could not let this beloved New Mexico establishment close its doors and decided to embark on the journey of becoming restaurateurs.

They packed up their lives and moved from Las Cruces to San Antonio, rolling up their sleeves to bring the restaurant back to life. During this process, they got

to truly know the team of staff members that worked alongside them and realized there were many obstacles the hardworking people in their community had to face. Several of their staff members were not able to attend trade schools or community colleges and some didn't even have the opportunity to complete high school or receive their GEDs.

Stephanie had previously worked at the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico and always said that one day she wanted to be able to give back and make a difference. The idea to create The Buckhorn Tavern Scholarship Endowment Fund to help the community she and Ernie now called home seemed like a natural fit. The scholarship was established to not only provide tuition assistance but also help with transportation

issues that sometimes can be a barrier in a small, rural community.

"As business owners, we have seen the problems employees can have with transportation and how it can even be hard to get to work some days," Ernie said. The scholarship will not only support tuition costs for trade schools, community colleges, or GED test fees but will also cover the transportation costs to help recipients get to GED testing sites in Los Lunas or Albuquerque.

"Being business owners in a small community and being able to support our employees, friends and neighbors is impor-

tant – it is how we grew up," the Sichlers said. "Our community supports us by being our employees, by walking through our doors and ordering a burger, and through this scholarship, we are now able to support them."

Dawdling golfers aren't helping grow the game

Despite all that has been written, blogged and spoken over the last few years, the pace of play is still too slow at most golf courses. I have written about this before, but the issue lingers.

The top three reasons why people quit golf or aren't interested in trying it are: it takes too much time, it's too expensive, and it's too frustrating. We can't do much about the last two, but legions of golfers don't seem to comprehend that they can't play at a snail's pace.

Part of the difficulty stems from golf courses that are far too long for the average player. One golf industry executive, Barney Adams, former CEO of Adams Golf, thinks a round of golf is lengthened by designers who improperly create golf courses

that are not golfer-friendly, by over-watering American courses, and by course set-ups much too long for the average golfer. Adams has a point, but my analysis tells us the problem goes deeper and is more complicated, because there isn't one primary cause of golf played in slow motion.

Let's start with what golfers see on television. Heck, even Jack Nicklaus has said watching golf on television is like watching paint dry. The PGA Tour, as televised, is virtually encouraging slow play by recreational golfers in the way they run their tournaments. On his TV at home, Joe Hacker is watching Jon Rahm walking 100 yards from the fairway up to the green to check out the details, and then walking back to his ball. He's also

watching Lydia Ko stalking her par putt from seven different angles. That's Joe's frame of reference. TV has created slow play by example and default. They don't seem to realize it's dreadful for golf.

Golf courses have tried using signs, advisories, education and cajoling to speed up play. Notices on carts and other tactics to get golfers moving seem to go unheeded. Even marshals and golf course "ambassadors" have little influence on folks who think it's their rightful entitlement to poke along as long as they bloody well please if they have paid their money. Resort courses generally do a better job policing dawdling

golfers, principally because they're keenly interested in two things: getting golfers on and off the course (think turning tables at a restaurant), and making sure their guests have a good golfing experience. But it should be understood most major resorts train

marshals rigorously and empower them to enforce pace of play, something other courses often fail to do.

Still, resort courses don't have to deal with what I call the "notorious groups." These are the groups (usually several foursomes) that play ego-driven games for money and don't care who they hold up or inconvenience. They're like idiot drivers

who don't use their turn signals and cut you off, not caring who they infuriate. The bad-boy bozos should be put on the clock, and their groups relegated to starting times that don't bother us faster players. Providing electric carts that shut off when you drive slightly off the beaten path is fine, but what we really need is carts that won't go after the four-hour allotted golf round time has ended. Golfers are customarily charged "green fees" for a certain number of holes, like nine or eighteen. But maybe they should be charged for four hours "course usage" and ushered away when the time has expired.

Here are some suggestions that can help you speed up your pace of play.

- First, walk faster. I see too many folks just shuffling along not noticing there are golfers waiting.
- Play "ready golf." Be prepared to play before your turn; don't wait 'til your turn to decide what you're going to do. If you're ready to play hit it, don't wait. A fivesome should never hold up a foursome.
- Make your "lost" ball search time limit two minutes. If you suspect your ball is out of bounds, hit a provisional ball.
- Limit practice swings to two, not five or six.
- Put your macho ego on hold and play the proper tees, mostly shorter.
- Don't bother lining up your fifth putt.
