



# HAGAIE STOMPING GROUNDS

ou may have lived in Las Cruces your whole life, or you might just be arriving from somewhere far away. Either way, the city has lots to offer. The weather, and recreational opportunities provide outside activities almost year round in Las Cruces.

The vibrant Downtown Las Cruces still has a small-town feel, and new bars, coffee shops and restaurants keep popping up all over. There's also a great bookstore, a comic shop, theaters, museums, galleries and apparel stores along Main Street. It is also a prime spot for festivals, and the stage on the Plaza de Las Cruces hosts many live music and dance events.

Explore the Mesquite Street and Alameda Depot Historic Districts near downtown and walk the Plaza at Old Mesilla, enjoying its shops and entertainment. And if you're the type of person who enjoys the outdoors, you're in the right place. Explore the many peaks and trails of Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument or float down the Rio Grande on a kayak or inflatable tube.

Here are some more ideas to help you get started planning your next outing:

#### LAS CRUCES FARMERS & CRAFTS MARKET

The sights, sounds and people watching at the Las Cruces Farmers & Crafts Market bring a thousand smiles. Food trucks with all kinds of fare gather on Main Street along with artisans offering beard creams and CBD salves, jewelry, art and a wild variety of other crafts. This is the place to find locally sourced meat, a great cup of coffee, music or a card featuring the Organ Mountains to send back home. Local farmers offer the freshest produce from tomatoes, pecans, honey and greens to fresh flowers to brighten your dorm room. The market takes place near the Downtown Plaza every Wednesday and Saturday from 8:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. Info: farmersandcraftsmarketoflascruces.com, 575-201-3853.





### **MESQUITE STREET HISTORIC DISTRICT**

For a sense of the town's history without the touristy feel, take a walk through the Mesquite Street Historic District, a colorful neighborhood filled with character. Along these historic streets you'll stumble upon Klein Park and shops, as well as restaurants like La Nueva Casita, Nopalito, Willow + Blaine and some of Las Cruces' oldest buildings. Beck's Roasting House and Creamery sometimes hosts live music, as well as other special events throughout the week.

#### WATCH THE DRAMA

If your schedule allows for a little drama in your life, Las Cruces is home to numerous theatres where you can test your audition skills or take in a show.

Las Cruces Community Theatre, 311 N. Main St., is located Downtown, and offers a student discount on tickets. Visit lcctnm. org to view the full schedule of perfomances. Black Box Theatre, 430 N. Main St., gives a platform to overlooked and little-known works, as well as a space for local writers to develop their projects. There's also the American Southwest Theatre Company, which hosts productions at the ASNMSU Center for Fine Arts,1000 E. University Ave.

## FILM

The beautifully restored Rio Grande Theatre, 211 N. Main St., is located Downtown. It shows a variety of classic films and hosts national musicians and regional acts. Call 575-541-2290 or visit riograndetheatre.org for more information. Located at 2469 Calle de Guadalupe, in Mesilla, The Fountain Theatre has entertained

residents of Mesilla since 1905. Visit this landmark, enjoy the best popcorn in town and take in an Oscar winner or foreign film. Visit mesillavalleyfilm.org for a list of current showings.

Catch popular current films at Allen Theatres' Telshor 12 or the Cineport 10 at Mesilla Valley Mall. See what's playing at allentheatresinc.com/city/las\_cruces.

#### MUSEUMS

Visit Las Cruces' museums for a day of cultural enrichment. Downtown, you will find the Branigan Cultural Center, Museum of Art and the Museum of Nature & Science. Nearby, in the Alameda Depot Historic District, you'll find the Railroad Museum. And closer to campus is the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum, which serves as a venue for several events, ongoing exhibits and some special breeds of livestock. #### **ART OBSCURA**

Part gallery, part gift shop, this quirky two-story building at 3206 Harrelson St., in Mesilla Park, provides intriguing diversions and gift ideas. Featuring local artists and historic ephemera and oddities, this is a place to get lost in for a little while. Open weekends only Saturday and Sunday 12 p.m.- 4 p.m., learn more at artobscuragallery.com.

#### **SPIRIT WINDS**

A longstanding gift shop and cafe, Spirit Winds offers coffee, sandwiches, snacks and goodies, and a wonderful array of gifts and jewelry. The shady patio at 2260 S. Locust St. has been a study spot for generations of Aggie students. Open daily 7 a.m. – 7 p.m., learn more at spiritwindsnm.com.

#### **TAKE A HIKE**

Las Cruces is near several hiking trails and mountains. Try the simple hike of Tortugas (or "A" mountain) near University Avenue and work your way up to Dripping Springs Natural Area or Soledad Canyon. Hike Baylor Pass and end up at Aguirre Spring Campground. For a day trip, cruise south to the beautiful Franklin Mountains of nearby El Paso.



# **NMSU TRADITIONS** CRIMSON & WHITE

One of the most basic symbols that triggers emotion, pride and a sense of identity is color, and when you're an Aggie, those colors are crimson and white.

Crimson is one of the most emotionally stimulating of all the colors in the spectrum. It has the widest depth of symbolism ranging from passion to anger. Crimson represents power, vigor, leadership and strength.

# VISIT NEARBY ATTRACTIONS

he getaway you need is just a short drive away when you live in Las Cruces. Explore neighboring El Paso or head north to Hatch, the Green Chile Capital of the World. Looking for an outdoor adventure? Visit the area's nearby caverns, hot springs or gypsum sands. Check out the Outdoor Center in the Activity Center on campus to rent any camping equipment you might need.

### WHITE SANDS NATIONAL PARK

Situated 40 minutes east of Las Cruces, 10 acres of white gypsum shine with haunting beauty under a full moon, a setting sun or a rising sun. The shifting light, shadows, and truly outof-this world landscape make White Sands a photographer's paradise. Tours are available November through April, and the park regularly has concerts, full-moon hikes, sunset hikes and educational programming. Bring your plastic disc and slide down the tallest dunes. The entry fee is \$25 per vehicle, and annual passes are available. Info: nps.gov/whsa

#### **CARLSBAD CAVERNS, NEW MEXICO**

Located in the Chihuahuan Desert, Carlsbad Caverns National Park is only a three-hour drive from Las Cruces if you take U.S. 180. Hike in the underground caves by day and watch the flight of bats at night. The \$15-per-person cavern entrance fee is good for three days and reservations are required. Info: nps.gov/cave





## HOT SPRINGS IN TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES

Truth or Consequences is known for its hot springs. Journey out with your friends for a relaxing, therapeutic soak. You can reserve a time slot to soak in a private pool at most places, or you may choose to take a dip in a community/shared pool. There are more than a dozen different springs resorts of all styles and formats, including some that look right onto the Rio Grande. Search hot springs properties at sierracountynewmexico.info.

# **ELEPHANT BUTTE LAKE STATE PARK**

Located an hour and a half north of Las Cruces along I-25 is the largest lake in the state. If you enjoy camping, fishing, boating, or just being outdoors, Elephant Butte is for you. There is plenty of water and plenty of beach room and Elephant Butte Lake can accommodate watercraft of many styles and sizes. Remember to wear your life jacket. Boat safe and boat smart. Besides sandy beaches, the state park offers restrooms, picnic areas, playgrounds, and developed sites with electric and water hook-ups for RVs. #### **GILA NATIONAL FOREST**

If you enjoy camping, hiking and fishing, visit the Gila National Forest. Located two and a half hours north east of Las Cruces, the Gila National Forest covers 3.3 million acres, making it the largest National Forest in New Mexico. Within the forest resides the Aldo Leopold, Blue Range, and Gila Wilderness Areas. In 1924, the Gila became the world's first designated wilderness, preserved as a primitive area by prohibiting motorized vehicles and other strict regulations. This forest offers hundreds of miles of streams, more than 20 campgrounds, and more than 1,500 miles of trails. Please be sure to follow all outdoor safety and ethics and leave no trace. #### **EL PASO, TEXAS**

Less than an hour drive away, take a day to visit the El Paso Zoo or the impressive (and free) El Paso Museum of Art. Stop by the family-friendly Rubiks Arcade Bar for walls of classic and new games. # EXERCISE YOUR RIGHT TO VOTE GET OUT AND VOTE!



ere's what you need to know to register to vote, learn about candidates and cast your ballot.

## QUALIFICATIONS

You must be a resident to register to vote in New Mexico. If you're not, check your state of residency for guidelines on how to cast an absentee ballot.

## REGISTRATION

You must be registered in order to vote. To learn more about voting registration and deadlines in New Mexico visit **vote.gov/register/nm** or visit **NMVote. org**. To find more information on online and in-person registration in Doña Ana County visit **donaanacountyelections. com/voter-information**.

You must submit your application at

least 28 days before an election. You will need a New Mexico driver's license or New Mexico identification card issued through a motor vehicle division of the taxation and revenue department; any document that contains an address in the county together with a photo ID card; or a current valid student photo identification card from a post-secondary education institution in New Mexico accompanied by a current student fee statement that contains the student's address in the county.

# LEARN ABOUT THE CANDIDATES

To see candidates statewide, check the New Mexico State Secretary's candidate portal at **sos.state.nm.us**. For city elections, check the City of Las Cruces' website at **las-cruces.org**//**1295/City-Clerks-Office**.

# WHERE TO VOTE

Once you're registered, you can vote at any voting convenience center (VCC) throughout the county, regardless of district. To vote on campus, visit the VCC at the New Mexico State University Corbett Center Student Union. For a complete list of voting convenience centers and early-voting locations, visit donaanacountyelections.com/locations.

# WHAT TO BRING

In Las Cruces, a physical form of identification is required only for firsttime New Mexico voters who registered by mail and did not include identification with the registration form. Otherwise, you will be asked to provide a verbal or written statement of identification including your name, year of birth and registered address.

# ON-CAMPUS COUNSELING

he transition to college life can be both exciting and overwhelming. With new friends, new courses – and in some cases, a part-time job – life can quickly turn into a balancing act, which can be stressful. If you find yourself feeling isolated, depressed or just need someone to talk to, a counselor can be of great benefit to your mental health.

The Aggie Health and Wellness Center provides free and confidential services to NMSU Main Campus students. These services include group, individual and couples counseling with licensed counselors and psychologists. Their qualified staff is there to assist students with crisis, mental health, personal growth and well-being issues.

# **IF YOU ARE EXPERIENCING A CRISIS**

If you don't have an on-campus counselor or you feel you must speak to someone outside of your scheduled appointment, you are welcome to go to the health center and request to meet with the on-call counselor. You will be asked to fill out some brief paperwork. Typically, you will be able to meet with the counselor almost immediately afterward.

# TIPS TO MANAGE STRESS

• **Play on:** Studies have shown playing calm music can reduce the hormone linked to stress, so give your eyes a break from homework and enjoy some music. Laughter is also a stress reliever, watch your favorite sitcom, listen to a funny podcast, or call a friend or family member.

• **H20 and Vitamin D:** Our basic needs are often the ones we ignore. Make sure you're getting a little sun, fresh air and plenty of water. Don't overdo it with sugar or caffeine, it can make your anxiety feel worse and lead to energy crashes. Take a shower or a nap. Your body also deserves a little maintenance, so go for a jog or a swim at the campus pool.

• Take it Easy (on yourself!): College is hard. Life is harder. You are a champ for getting out of bed this morning. So if you didn't finish the extra credit assignment, or you had to cut back on your work hours, it's okay, tell yourself "I've got this." You can also try meditation. Visit the Spiritual Center on campus. It is a non-denominational facility located west of the Educational Services Building and adjacent to the duck pond. It's a great location for peaceful meditation, regardless of faith.

• **Speak up:** Relationships are important to our mental health. Don't bottle up negative emotions. Whether it is roommates, friends or teachers, assertive and thoughtful communication can help you express how you feel, avoid miscommunication and gives others the opportunity to help you sort it out and stay on track.

• **Ask for help:** The Aggie Health and Wellness Center provides free and confidential counseling services that can help in times in need. Don't hesitate to reach out.

# WARNING SIGNS AND RESOURCES FOR SUICIDE PREVENTION

#### SIGNS SOMEONE MAY BE HAVING THOUGHTS OF SUICIDE

- Talking about wanting to die or to kill oneself
- Looking for a ways to kill oneself
- Talking about feeling hopeless or having no reason to live
- Talking about feeling trapped or in unbearable pain
- Talking about being a burden to others
- Increased use of alcohol or drugs
- Acting anxious or agitated, or behaving recklessly
- Sleeping too little or too much
- Withdrawing or feeling isolated
- Showing rage or talking about seeking revenge
- Displaying extreme mood swings

#### WAYS TO PREVENT SUICIDE

Don't wait until thoughts of suicide arise to prevent suicide. There are protective factors, which can serve as a shield from thoughts of suicide.

- a shield from thoughts of suicide.
- Effective clinical care for mental, physical and substance abuse
- Easy access to a variety of clinical interventions and support for help
- Family and community support
- Support from ongoing medical and mental healthcare relationships
- Skills in problem solving, conflict resolution and nonviolent ways of handling disputes
- Cultural and religious support that increase hope and spiritual health, support emotional well-being, and foster positive social connections

## STOP SEXUAL ASSUALT REGOGNIZE AND INTERVENE

Gampus sexual assault is an uncomfortable topic, but one that must be talked about. Did you know that one in six women have been a victim of attempted or completed rape in her lifetime and 3 percent of men have been a victim of attempted or completed rape in their lifetime? While in college, a young woman's risk increases to one in four chances of being sexually assaulted.

Sexual assault may consist of sexual harassment, sexual coercion, sexual contact (unwanted fondling/groping), attempted rape and rape. Unfortunately, a victim of sexual assault or rape may often face blame and shaming.

It is never the victim's fault. Ever. Rape and sexual assault are not crimes of passion and love. Rape and sexual assault is about power and control.


There are ways everyone can help prevent sexual assault or other potentially harmful situations from happening or continuing. The following are some tips and resources to understand how you can help intervene and evaluate the situation to help respond in a safe way.

#### HOW TO RECOGNIZE THE SIGNS OF A POTENTIALLY HARMFUL SITUATION

- Body language: Is a potential victim leaning or pushing the other party away or just appears uncomfortable?
- Raised voices: Do you hear yelling, screaming, banging or other alarming sounds?
- Intoxication: Is the person stumbling, swaying, unable to communicate, being forced to drink, or otherwise unable to consent to what is happening?
- The golden rule: Trust your instincts. If you notice something that doesn't feel right, it probably isn't.

he NMSU Police Department is a full-service, 24-hours a day police agency that has its own 911 emergency dispatch center. The department handles routine patrols, criminal investigations, victim assistance and special events.

#### **ON-CAMPUS SAFETY TIPS**

- Use high-quality "U" locks on all bicycles, locking both the frame and front tire to the rack.
- Roll up windows and lock doors on vehicles and campus residences. Do not leave property in plain sight from windows, or unattended on campus.
- Be aware of potential scams via phone calls or email. Don't give out personal information over the phone unless you are sure of the source of the request.

## ALCOHOL NOT ALWAYS FUN AND GAMES, KEEP YOURSELF SAFE

s a freshman in college you may be excited for the school year to begin and yet also feel apprehension about what to expect.

One of the many things you will encounter is alcohol. There will be many opportunities for you to drink, and there is a common misperception that for you to have the college "experience" and "fit in" you should drink, despite being underage. Drinking under the age of 21 is illegal and can lead to hefty charges including, minor



in possession, or fourth-degree felony for providing alcohol to a minor(s).

Anyone who decides to drink should consider ways to reduce serious risks:

- Plan ahead! Set a limit before you start drinking and stick to it.
- Alternate between alcoholic drinks and water in order to stay hydrated and space out your alcohol intake.
- Designated driver Call Crimson Cab at 575-524-8294, or register an account with Uber or Lyft.
- Eat before and while you drink to help slow the absorption of alcohol into your blood stream.
- Avoid playing drinking games or **cheat during play.** Don't drink large amounts of alcohol in a short time.
- Know how much you are drinking: One drink = one 4-ounce glass of wine, one 12-ounce beer, or one shot of

80-proof liquor. Keep track!

- Use Bystander Intervention. If you see a potential harmful situation, either do something about it or let someone know about the situation.
- Don't drink from punch bowls or pitchers – they are easy to drug, potentially unhygienic, and difficult to keep track amount you are drinking.
- Never hesitate to call for help. If someone is showing signs of alcohol poisoning, call 911 immediately. Alcohol may be legal, but it is still a dangerous drug that you can overdose on, or become addicted to over time.
- Remember that it's okay to not drink; you can have just as much fun sober!

## NM STATE ATHLETICS NMSU RODED TEAM CELEBRATES BOTH ANNIVERSARY

pair of Levi's, \$68 and a broken nose. That's what the winner of New Mexico State University's first rodeo received, as reported in archived issues of The Round Up.

The College-Ranch Hands' Rodeo, as it was known, was popular at NMSU. A group of Aggies formed the New Mexico Aggie Rodeo Association, according to the 1942 NMSU yearbook.

This year, the unit now known as the NMSU rodeo team celebrates its 80th anniversary.

"I'd like to think we're one of the tightest teams around," said Brice Baggarley, NMSU rodeo's head coach. "They're battling for each other, pushing for each

other as much as anything."

YNMSU hired its first full-time. dedicated rodeo coach, Jim Dewey Brown, in 2002 and started receiving state funding to support rodeo activities. With Brown's guidance and more resources, NMSU's rodeo athletes flourished.

From 2002 to 2015, five Aggies won six national rodeo titles. NMSU had 19 Academic All-Americans, and Brown won NIRA Coach of the Year.

"What I miss is the kids," Brown said of his time at NMSU. "They were my students, but now they are part of my family."

One of those family members, Baggarley, now occupies Brown's boots at NMSU.

"Rodeo kids naturally have a lot of self-drive," Baggarley said, "because it's

an individual sport. It's really cool to see, even though it is an individual sport, how much they do for each other."

Baggarley rodeoed at NMSU and later was an assistant coach

under Brown. He and his wife, Nicole, a professional breakaway roper, met on the NMSU team.

Logan Corbett was the NMSU rodeo coach 2015-20. He left the program to return to the pro rodeo circuit.






